Probers Hope To Summon Alleged Communist Head

Plan Serving Papers At Time Of Deportation Hearing At An Early Date

Washington, Aug. 21—(AP)—The House Un-American Activities Committee today drew up a subpoena for J. Peters, described as a one-time head of the Communist underground in this country.

But there was no assurance that the mysterious, much-sought witness would be taken even if committee agents find him and if he is promised immunity from deportation which immigration authorities are threatening him with.

Peters was arrested last October and released under \$5,000 bond to await a decision on whether he should be deported as a member of an organization advocating forcible overthrow of the government.

Some time in the next ten days the committee hopes to be able to subpoena Peters during the deportation hearing promised by Watson Miller, commissioner of immigration.

Miller informed the committee yesterday he cannot legally produce Peters for a congressional hearing.

But Ray Nison (R-Calif.) said Miller agreed to notify the committee of the time and place of the "early" hearing in the deportation case. At that time, Nison said, the committee subpoena can be served.

Whittaker Chambers, self-avowed former Communist and now a Time Magazine senior editor, has named Peters as the man who headed the Communist underground movement in this country prior to 1937.

Through questioning of Peters the committee hopes to verify some of the testimony it has received from Chambers implicating any former federal officials.

Committee members conceded that Peters, like many other persons named by Chambers, may refuse to talk. But they speculated that he might be willing to name names in exchange for immunity from deportation.

Nat'l Guard Is Found Prepared

Camp Edwards, Mass., Aug. 21—(AP)—Secretary of Army Kenneth C. Royall says the National Guard is more in readiness to protect this country than at any time in its history.

After inspecting guard units and regular Army personnel at this camp yesterday, Royall said he thought the present National Guard "will provide the best type of national defense we have ever had."

He reviewed the 43rd Infantry Division, commanded by Maj. Gen. Kenneth T. Cramer, and returned to Washington by plane after the exercises.

Defense Talks To End Sunday

Newport, R. I., Aug. 21—(AP)—A gathering of U.S. joint chiefs of staff working on military secrets at one Naval War College was expected to conclude Sunday.

Rear Admiral Allan E. Smith, acting president of the college, said today the staff heads planned to return to Washington "by dark."

Schools To Open

City Sup't. of Schools June H. Rose stated today that the city schools will open on Monday, September 6, as originally scheduled, unless something unforeseen develops in the political situation in the state.

County Sup't. D. E. Conley also has announced that the county schools will open on schedule, Monday, August 30.

Home-Buying Problem

New Housing Act Provides Part Of An Answer For How To Get Houses Built, Also Tries To Make It Possible For People To Buy Them At Today's Inflated Costs

Washington, Aug. 21—(AP)—Getting houses built is only half an answer to the housing problem. The other half is making it possible for people to buy them at today's inflated costs.

The new housing act marks a stab at it. One of its several approaches is a "bargain basement" financing for the least expensive kind of house.

It's a 4-year, semi-down, 30-year-to-pay arrangement. The Federal Housing Administration can insure your home borrowing up to 95 percent of the value of the property. But only if the mortgage is not over \$8,000.

That won't buy much of a house in most parts of the country, FHA officials admit. Real estate people, perhaps a little conceding, have given this clause its "bargain basement" nickname.

Congress was uncertain, too, uncertain whether such credit terms might not add to real estate inflation. So the act instructs FHA to grant the bargain rates in these cases:

First, where that type of housing is needed. Second, where houses can be built for that price. And third, where such credit will not "substan-

Pitt Draft Board Members Named

Board Has Not Yet Held Meeting; No Offices Yet Available; Need For Quick Action Stressed By Chairman O. C. Stroud

North Carolina's Adjutant General, J. Van B. Metts, has announced the appointment of the five members to Pitt County's Selective Service Board.

They are: Otto C. Stroud, Sr., of Ayden, chairman; John W. Rook, of Bethel; Rev. H. G. Hany, of Greenville; Marvin V. Jones, of Greenville; Vernon Wells, of Winterville; and William W. Speight, Appeal Judge, of Greenville.

Two members, Stroud and White were members of the World War II Draft Board.

Chairman Stroud said today that the board as yet has not held its first meeting and no time or place for that meeting has been fixed.

No offices have been secured for the board and initial efforts to locate a suitable place for local headquarters have been discouraging. The Raleigh office was described as "perturbed" over the situation, inasmuch as the new peacetime selective service registration is scheduled to start on August 30, and time is pressing.

Stroud today requested that persons having for rent an office suitable for young women to work in, and with enough room for a considerable number of filing cabinets, contact him or Dr. H. G. Hany, of Greenville, or any other member of the Draft Board.

Office space was not available at the Court House and at the City Hall. Chairman Stroud stressed that the need was urgent.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 21—(AP)—Junior Chamber of Commerce president Wallace Dunham announced today that his organization has undertaken to deal with the problem of crime-engendering comic books being distributed in the city.

Support Mounts For Changes In Electoral Vote

Southern Democrats Favor Popular Vote Over Electoral College System

Washington, Aug. 21—(AP)—Southern Democratic support appeared today for a move by Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) to put presidential elections on a popular vote basis.

Senators Sparkman (D-Ala.) and Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) told a reporter in separate interviews they will back in the next session of Congress a proposal to change the present system by which a state's entire electoral college vote is cast for the candidate who tops the popular ballot test.

Lodge offered in the last session and intends to revive a proposed constitutional amendment under which each candidate would share in the electoral vote on the percentage of his election day total.

Thus an aspirant who lost out by only a few popular votes to his presidential opponent would get nearly half of the state's support in the electoral college, instead of none at all.

Sparkman said he thinks Southern Democrats generally will support the proposal because it would "go a long way toward doing away with minority rule in this country."

There are some minorities in northern states who get just about anything they want out of the political parties because the parties fear they may have the balance of power in a state with a lot of electoral votes," the Alabama senator said.

He added that he believed a change such as suggested by Lodge "would have a good effect in the South."

"It would encourage both parties to campaign in the South, because if the Republicans could out like the electoral vote there—which they can't do now—the Democrats would be campaigning to keep them from it."

Johnston pointed out that the South long has felt that its influence in the Democratic party has not been in proportion to the electoral college support it has furnished.

Other Dixie lawmakers have said they think President Truman would not have pushed his civil rights program with any of the vigor he displayed if the proposed new electoral system had been in effect.

Miss Gillars better known to GIs as "Axis Sally" is being brought back from Frankfurt, Germany to face a federal grand jury here on charges she betrayed her native land by wartime broadcasts over Radio Berlin.

The 48-year-old native of Portland, Me., was located two years ago by American authorities in Berlin, living a precarious existence in the ruined cellars of the bombed-out German capital.

She was arrested, but subsequently released to the American occupation zone on condition that she report every two weeks to U.S. Army authorities.

The Justice Department, pointing out that a prosecution for treason requires exact evidence and at least two witnesses "to the same overt act," said that the inquiry into Miss Gillars radio activities had presented "a prodigious task."

Miss Gillars left the U.S. in 1929 to study music in France. She went to Germany in 1934. The Justice Department said she took a job in 1940 with the official German government radio, then primarily engaged in broadcasting propaganda to England.

After American entry into the war, the department said Miss Gillars directed Berlin programs beamed to American forces in North Africa and Italy, where the troops gave her the names "Axis Sally" and "Midge."

The stage for the judge's charge was set last night when Solicitor Jack Hooks completed arguments to the jury by asking the death penalty for Creech for the slaying of his wife, Mrs. Mattie Woodall Creech.

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Berlin Russian Sector Police Continue Raids And Kidnapings

Berlin, Aug. 21—(AP)—Russian soldiers stabbed and beat two German policemen from the American sector of Berlin today when the Germans resisted abduction into the Soviet zone, western sector police announced.

The announcement said Russians carried the two Germans bodily into the Soviet sector. The two plain clothesmen were stopped near the sector border by numerous Russians and ordered to go across, the announcement said. When they resisted, it reported, one was stabbed with a knife and the other beaten with a rifle butt.

While American authorities acted to head off a possible violent clash between the police forces of the eastern and western sectors, still another kidnapping incident was attributed to the Russians.

British authorities announced that armed Russians abducted two German policemen from their sector. They demanded the return of the men.

The latest abduction was the third carried out by the Russians in two days. American officials have demanded formally the release of three German policemen from their sector who were seized by the Russians during a black market raid yesterday on the American-Russian sector border. The Americans said the Russians had no reply.

One of the British sector police seized today later escaped. In all, three of nine western sector police seized in the clashes have managed to flee their captors, who maintain a rival police headquarters in the Soviet zone.

The Americans announced they will seek face-to-face talks with the Russians to try for a truce in the conflict involving Berlin's divided police force. The Russians have

served notice they will continue their raids in downtown Berlin, staged ostensibly to catch black marketeers.

The Americans said there is a growing danger the clashes may grow into serious international incidents. The Soviet-backed police chief, Paul Markgraf, already has made it clear he will recognize no sector boundaries in Berlin.

The British announced they are strengthening their military police and German police patrols at Potsdamer Platz, where the eastern and western sectors meet, because of violent disturbances during the week.

Thus far clashes between the occupying forces have been avoided. But an American spokesman expressed fear that if the present tension continues "something might happen that will involve more than the Germans."

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Soviet Consul Prepared To Leave US Saturday

Passage Booked Aboard Liner; Lomakin Meets With Rebuff From Hospital; Declines To Comment On His Recall

New York, Aug. 21—(AP)—Soviet Consul General Jacob M. Lomakin, whom the State Department has expelled, has booked passage aboard the Swedish-American liner Stockholm, sailing next Saturday.

The Stockholm line said that Lomakin had made reservations for himself and his wife and two children. It said it could not disclose when the discredited envoy had booked his passage.

The Stockholm plies between New York and Gothenburg, Sweden. Lomakin was not available for comment on his scheduled departure.

However, Soviet vice Consul Z. I. Chepurnykh said he knew "a couple of months ago" that Lomakin planned a trip back to the Soviet Union, although he had not known the date.

Meanwhile, Lomakin met with a new rebuff in his efforts to bring Russian-picked doctors into the case of Mrs. Oksana Kasenkina, central figure in the diplomatic dispute which touched off the United States stern demand for his recall.

Roosevelt hospital officials yesterday refused Lomakin's request that two doctors he had named be allowed to examine the Russian teacher, critically injured when she leaped from a fourth-floor consulate window.

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Polio Epidemic Tops 1,600 Mark

Twenty-Seven New Cases Reported Today; Death Toll 83

Raleigh, Aug. 21—(AP)—North Carolina's worst polio epidemic crossed the 1,600 case mark today.

The day brought reports of 27 new cases to the State Board of Health and the state's total of cases for the year to 1,627.

The total now exceeds the state's worst previous epidemic by 144 cases. The total of 1,627 cases was reported during the entire year.

However, a slight drop in new cases was noted in the week ending today. Some 160 cases were reported during the week compared with 194 last week and 190 the week before.

The death of a Buncombe county resident was reported to the board of health today, bringing the death toll for the year to 83.

Buncombe county reported six of today's cases; Cleveland county reported three; Caldwell, Davidson, Guilford, Orange, and Surry reported two each; and Carteret, Catawba, Forsyth, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Montgomery, Stanly, and Wilkes reported one each.

The epidemic has brought postponement of school openings in more sections of the state.

Cases which have developed upon dates include Raleigh and Wake county; Johnston County, Lee County, Oxford and Granville County, and Chatham county. The postponements range from a week to two weeks.

In Kingston, the Lenoir County Board of Health voted unanimously to lift on August 25 a ban on assembly of children under 16 years of age. City and county schools were authorized to go ahead with openings on scheduled dates. The county has had only two polio cases.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 21—(AP)—A 72-year-old couple have married here a second time "for keeps."

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Factory-Made Houses Awaiting Steel Allocation For Industry

Washington (AP)—A major step forward in the building of factory-made houses awaits only approval by the Attorney General.

It involves setting aside 50,000 tons of steel for six months under a voluntary allocation plan already approved by the steel industry and Secretary of Commerce Sawyer.

This wouldn't build many houses, viewed in the light of tremendous overall needs. Estimates are it would provide materials for only 8,000 or so dwellings.

But those backing the infant industry, blocked up to now by inability to get steel supplies, say the plan would let it show how it can make "better houses at lower prices."

Tighe F. Woods, housing expediter, says the all-steel factory-made house is "The First Real Attempt" at tracking the housing shortage.

A few have been turned out and put in use, but now enough to make any dent in the demand for homes.

Lustron Corp. of Columbus, Ohio, has the biggest plant, with a capacity of more than 150 assembly-line houses a day.

But Lustron, like other producers—and there aren't many—has no previous customers tieup with the steel industry. It has found it very difficult to buy the metal.

Once the Attorney General's office says the agreement doesn't violate any anti-trust laws, the 50,000 tons may be made available to Lustron and the others. Lustron is expected to get the biggest slice, although definite allocations have not been made. Five other concerns will share.

A commerce department spokesman says that once the Attorney General acts "We'll move quickly." Sawyer said previously that first amounts will be small so as not to cause a sudden impact on the steel industry.

He said last week that he recognizes there is a shortage of steel but that the program will determine whether these factory-made houses can answer the demand for low-cost homes.

The cost to the man who wants to live in it is estimated at about \$8,000, without the lot. Reliance Homes, Inc., of Lester, Pa., says its homes, with three bedrooms, living room, dinette and kitchen, fully equipped with everything but a refrigerator, sell to the builder for \$6,000. This includes cost of delivery to the site and putting it up.

The Reliance Home comes in seven completely shop-assembled sections, with plumbing, heating and electrical systems installed. The firm says six men can put it together in four hours.

Senator Flanders (R-Vt) and Rep. Sundstrom (R-NJ), members of a joint Congressional committee on housing, say their committee has concluded that mass production of houses is one of the basic solutions to the shortage.

Sundstrom says it takes only 500 man hours to manufacture and put up a factory-made steel house again.

at 1,500 to 2,000 for work at the site alone on a conventional dwelling.

Some backers say it takes about 9 1-2 to 10 tons of steel for each of these houses, compared to 1 1-2 tons for a conventional house. Some of the manufacturers said, however, they would use only 2 1-2 to 4 1-2 tons per house.

Some of those who opposed setting aside the steel said it could build more homes if it were used in regular houses as nails, braces etc.

Those testifying for the factory process said such houses will sell for less than regular-fashioned homes because of mass production methods, less waste and a big volume-small profits technique.

The schools were slated to open Sept. 8.

Blending urban compactness with rural spaciousness, this seven-room modern ranch style dwelling is low and simple in design, accented by a picturesque trellis across its sheltered front entrance. Basements Come In Handy If Put To Proper Usage

Basements come in handy in many ways. They comprise about a third of the space in average homes. They offer unusual possibilities for enlargement of homes.

For many years the basement has been the most popular location for the rumormonger, where a party can cut loose in informal surroundings with noise well muffled.

And the basement is a godsend to the hobbyist. It is an ideal spot for a workbench, a photographic darkroom, a miniature railroad layout, a shortwave radio station.

However, so many basements remain virtually unused that the American Society of Interior Design recently compiled a variety of practical ideas to help house-holders rediscover their basements.

Development and availability of new and improved building materials now makes it possible to turn many basements into living quarters as desirable as any other part of the house. Such alterations can be made at comparatively modest cost.

In many cases at least a half of the basement can be partitioned off into a second living room, child's playroom, teen-age social place, game room, study or other specialized use.

New waterproofing compounds are on the market which have gone far toward ending the dampness problem. Waterproofing paints that can be applied to the inside of a basement wall—previously all waterproofing had to be outside—have been demonstrated in a miniature basement floating for years in a tank of water at the Architects' Samples Corporation, 101 Park Avenue, New York.

One floor covering well known nowadays for its durability is asphalt tile. Engineers say that it is a smooth surfaced and resilient floor covering that can be used successfully on concrete in direct contact with the ground.

This offers a wide range in colors and designs, and a basement is one place where the amateur decorator can go to town with color. It is a place where bright color can be used with a lavish hand.

Mechanical Equipment Is Affecting Size Of House

One midwestern architect finds the demand for modern mechanical equipment stronger than the demand for space in new homes. At the same time he finds that this demand for utilities one of the biggest factors in cutting down the size of houses.

"Our standard of living has been increasing steadily through mechanical and technical improvements, but at an ever increasing cost," points out Walter T. Anicka of Ann Arbor, Mich.

He explains that central heating, the modern equipped kitchen, the automatic laundry, a second bathroom, storage walls and new floor and wall coverings "are all taken for granted in any house which is now put up for sale."

"But each one of these items has increased the cost of the structure," Anicka adds. "There is only one way to put in these improvements and that is by reducing the cubage or the number of rooms."

"The designer, caught in the squeeze of ever mounting costs and increasing demands for the latest improvements, has had to come through with plans which are more flexible and usable."

"Present plans, with fewer but larger rooms, provide better and more efficient living than the larger houses with a series of small cubicles called rooms in the 1920 era."

Anicka cites the combined guest room and study, the living room-dining room combination, the laundry and heater room. Each of those rooms, if used by itself, he says might only be used 25 per cent of the time, but combined they serve an economic and living purpose 100 per cent of the time.

Easterners seem the most reluctant to give up conventional rooms. "I think that most people in New England like special purpose rooms where family privacy for the individual is provided," comments A. Raymond Ellis, West Hartford, Conn., architect.

"The open plan with almost a common living room divided partially for several functions is not widely accepted and neither is it economical," Mr. Ellis contends. However, he admits that "current or transitional" inflation costs "are reducing room sizes and eliminating the better and more expensive finish."

Nevertheless, speculative builders, who could save the most by eliminating frills when they build hundreds of houses at a time, are clinging to those establishments.

Valdosta, Ga., Aug. 21—(AP)—The volume of tobacco moved on Georgia-Florida flue-cured markets dropped below the 1,000,000 pound mark Thursday for the first time this season.

A gross volume of \$96,766 pounds was auctioned, the U.S. Department reported, at an average of \$31.16 a hundred.

Season total sales have reached 131,477,538 pounds at an average of \$47.44.

Pitt County ABC officers yesterday found a liquor still operating three blocks from the Court House in Greenville. Officers J. M. The still was being operated by Duffy when the officers arrived. It consisted of one 5-gallon copper still, one copper condenser, a cooler can, and two fifty-gallon barrels containing about 75 gallons of mash.

Heat was furnished by a 2-burner oil stove. Water was run from his house to the cooler barrel through a garden hose. About one gallon of the spirits had been made.

Duffy stated that he was unable to work and was making whiskey for a living. He was placed in the city jail in default of \$200 bond for court Monday morning.

Officer Ward stated that this was the smallest distilling outfit he had ever assisted in seizing.

OUR NEW WORLD POSES PROBLEMS

Botanists have often observed that sections of the world remote from one another frequently have almost identical vegetation. The reason appears to be that as ships come into port, a little bit of fine seed is blown onto the decks, carried to the port where the ship is to be unloaded, and there blown off again over the landscape by gentle breezes. If enough ships pass back and forth between such remote sections over a period of years, the vegetation of the two sections tends to become identical.

Facts today are quickly carried halfway around the globe. Good things also — helpful customs, diverse cultures, needed raw materials — pass quickly from one land to another. The tendency is for the people of the world to become more alike. What we have to ask ourselves is whether the seeds that go from our land and the seeds which come to our country from other lands — the customs, moral influences, and ideologies — are making human life better or worse.

The Bible speaks a great deal about seed. Jesus said, "He that soweth the good seed is the Son of man; the field is the world." Human life will be safe only when the good seed which the Son of man sows is spread to the farthest corner of the earth.

Around Capitol Square

CLASH—The state board of education ran smack into the conflict between efficiency and sentiment at its special meeting Friday. There was also the age-old clash between progress and tradition, between desire for improved schools and local community pride in the record of what present schools have accomplished. This was by no means the first time the issue has been presented, nor is it likely to be the last. It was in some respects one of the most significant and important hearings ever held by the state board on the subject of consolidation of schools.

GATES—Immediate question was approval of an order by the Gates county board of education effecting consolidation of several Negro schools at Gates, which hinged on abandonment of the present white school at Gates and sending the pupils to Gatesville and Sunbury. Because this represents only part of an overall consolidation program in the county, and because in many respects Gates county is typical of conditions throughout the state, the question admittedly had more than immediate implications.

FACTS—Some facts were brought out, which no one attempted to challenge; but these facts ran head-on into sentimental love for the old schools and pride in them. For instance: There are approximately 1800 Negro school children in Gates county, compared with 1000 white children. There are two white high schools, one Negro high school. Of the 20 Negro elementary schools, nine are one-room "shacks." Twenty-three buses have been assigned to the county, 20 for the 1,000 white and three for the 1,800 Negro children. All sides agree something has got to be done about the matter, but there is wide divergence of ideas as to what or how remedies should be applied.

STUDY—The county board of education some months ago asked an impartial outside committee to study the problem and make recommendations. The recent order by the board was based upon report of this commission, which was headed by Dr. Guy Phillips of the University of North Carolina and included in its make-up Dr. A. M. Proctor of the Duke University school of education. Other members were W. E. Rosenthal, R. A. Tomberlin and J. T. Hatcher.

SPOKESMEN—The case for the county board's plan was presented by W. C. Harrell, county superintendent of schools. The case for the 50-odd protesting citizens of Gates was presented by Kenyon Wilson, Elizabeth City attorney, with support of several Gates people. Read into the record were letters from Charles M. Johnson, board member absent because of previous engagement elsewhere, and Judge L. R. Varner of Lumberton, native of Gates. Both letters supported contentions of the protesting group and opposed approval of the consolidation program.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS

Washington—The nation's leading organization of high school teachers thinks teenagers not only ought to know more about atomic energy but ought to do something about it. To this end they have just put out a quite elaborate booklet called "Operation Atomic Vision."

It was prepared, with the co-operation of the Atomic Energy Commission, under the auspices of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, a department of the National Education Association. It is 95 pages long, illustrated and sells for 60 cents a copy with large discounts if you buy it in quantity. And officials of NEA say that thousands of high schools already have ordered the booklet in expectation of starting classes in atomic energy next fall.

There are two rather unusual things about this particular booklet for high school students and teachers. In the first place it urges that students do more than simply get themselves the know-how about the problem; to pass it along to adults and get the adults to join in study groups, to pester newspapers and radios and get them to carry reports about the work. And in the second place this booklet makes no attempt to dodge even the most highly controversial aspects of the atomic energy problem.

It quotes at length from such men as Robert Hutchins of the University of Chicago and Norman Cousins, editor of the "Saturday Review of Literature," bringing out their belief that the ultimate answer to the danger of atomic destruction should be a world government. The booklet also makes it clear that the high school principals believe we should make sure that atomic energy is kept under civilian rather than military control.

It gives this picture of the possibilities of a new world after atomic energy has been developed to its full peacetime possibilities. "Energy will be cheap and plentiful. A stream of consumer goods will flow from automatic factories. You may live to drive a plastic car powered by an atomic engine and reside in a completely air-conditioned plastic house. Food will be cheap and abundant everywhere in the world. It is unlikely that you or any of your classmates will die prematurely of cancer or heart disease, or from any contagious diseases, or from any other human ills that afflict us now. Many of your generation will reach the century mark, but this will bring them little publicity. No one will need to work long hours. There will be much leisure, and a network of large recreational areas will cover the country, if not the world. The new world, if it develops, will be so interdependent that war and international strife will be impossible."

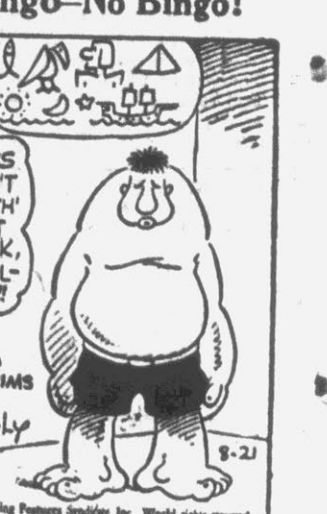

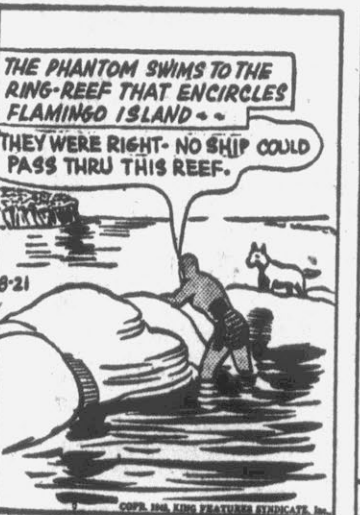

Ruth a great attraction and signed the Babe as a coach for the season for \$15,000.

When he wasn't golfing he visited Yankee Stadium when the Yankees were home. His heart was always in baseball. The game he loved paid him rich dividends for he earned \$394,000 in 22 years, plus \$41,455.11 in World Series shares and approximately one million dollars in endorsements and barnstorming.

His lifetime batting average stands at .343 and his regular season homers totaled 714 plus 15 more he hit in World Series games.

"I could have hit 500," Ruth once said. "But the fans were paying to see me hit home runs."

Ruth holds 26 major league records and as a southpaw pitcher with the Boston Red Sox he gained six 1-0 decisions over the great Walter Johnson.

As recent as 1946 Ruth still had designs on becoming a manager. He approached MacPhail, then president of the Yankees, but Larry told him the only opening in the Yankee farm system was at Newark and that he had

already offered the position to three former Yankee players.

Ironically, George Selkirk, the man who succeeded the famous No. 3 in right field for the Yankees, accepted the Newark job.

During the winter of 1947 Ruth entered the hospital for a delicate neck operation. At first it was announced that Ruth went in for a checkup then another report was that his illness was kicking up. These close to Ruth sought to keep his ailment from the public because his welfare always has been of much concern to everyone.

After 52 days in the hospital Ruth lost his healthy robust appearance. But the fans still remembered him. They turned out 58,339 strong early in the season when the Yankees staged "Babe Ruth Day" in Yankee Stadium.

Wherever baseball is played they'll always remember Babe Ruth.
