GOP Candidates Hammer At 'Red Herring' Labels

Warren Raps Truman Viewpoint As House Committee Deplores Failures

President Truman headed into Oklahoma today for a major campaign speech on Communism—a topic newly highlighted by congressional spy investigators.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, already on record with a promised government "housecleaning" of Soviet-minded workers, carried his GOP presidential drive homeward through the northwest.

Mr. Truman's handling of the Communist issue came under double fire last night.

The House Un-American Activities Committee described "completely inexcusable" what it called the Administration's failure to prosecute persons linked to a "Soviet espionage conspiracy."

A complete and forthright explanation is due the American people of the reasons for this failure," the committee said in a formal report.

Mr. Truman repeatedly has labeled the congressional investigations into Communist activities a "red herring" to distract the voters' attention from the problem of high prices, which he blames on the GOP-controlled 80th Congress.

Gov. Earl Warren, the GOP candidate, fired yesterday's second volley at Mr. Truman on the "red herring" score. He told a Syracuse, N.Y., crowd:

"In spite of the fact that some people have talked about red herrings, there are a lot of Communists at work in this country."

Dewey, meanwhile, outlined in a Seattle address a nine-point program to develop the nation's natural resources to provide "more power to wage the peace."

He said America's power-producing capacity will have to be boosted almost 20 per cent to meet increased demands. Dewey stressed, however, that in the development of the nation's rivers home rule should apply and not the sweeping federal controls he ascribed to the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Relations With Russia 'Never More Serious' Says U. S. Envoy

Aboard Truman Campaign Train, Sept. 26—President Truman weighed a first hand account from his ambassador to Moscow today on gravely deteriorating relations with Russia.

Moving into Oklahoma City, he carried on his political speaking campaign but maintained constant communications with Secretary of State Marshall.

And Representative Rayburn (D-Tex.), Democratic spokesman in the House, kept foreign policy to the forefront of the campaign.

Introducing Mr. Truman to a hometown political rally at Bonham, Tex., the former speaker pleaded again for changing presidents now.

Rayburn's talk followed Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith's extraordinary conference with the Chief Executive aboard the campaign train in Texas. Smith told reporters solemnly that relations with Russia

"had never been more critical than now."

Smith, under questioning, said Mr. Truman concurred in his opinion, but asked the newsmen to modify his estimate of relations with the Russians from "never more critical" to "never more serious."

"Is there going to be another war?" asked a reporter in an impromptu news conference almost as unusual as his flight to the President's campaign train at Dallas for his report to the Chief Executive.

The question, Smith said, was much too "deep" for him. He paused then, and added, "I do not mean that we are trembling on the verge. If we continue a policy of firmness, patience and determination, I do not think the situation will reach the ultimate."

The presidential train was pulling into Bonham when General Smith entered the "press car" before stepping off to fly back to Washington and further consultations with the State Department. He was accompanied by Press Secretary Charles G. Ross.

It was supposed to be simply a greeting, but, all of a sudden, Smith was saying that United States relations with Russia were never more critical than now. He spoke with a knowledge that the United States-French-British "White Paper" of Sunday night supported all he said.

The three nations formally accused Russia of threatening the peace by its blockade of Berlin and announced they were placing the issue before the United Nations Security Council.

A few minutes later, the President was at a high school stadium at Bonham, listening to his friend, Rep. Rayburn, tell a hometown audience that to defeat the President would court unrest abroad.

Scientists Linked With Spy Group By Probers

Congressional Investigators Press Hunt For 'Scientist' X After Demanding Trials For Accused Betrayers Of Atom Secrets

Washington, Sept. 28—(AP)—Congressional spy probers pressed their hunt today for a mysterious "Scientist X" after demanding immediate trials for four persons they accused of tampering with atomic secrets.

The House Un-American Activities Committee linked the unidentified scientist with Steve Nelson, who the committee said should be tried as an outright wartime spy.

Nelson is a Communist party organizer in Pennsylvania.

The House group's preliminary report last night also declared that Dr. Clarence F. Hixey, his former wife, Marcia Sand Hixey, and Dr. John H. Chapin should be prosecuted on charges of conspiring to hand over atomic secrets to Soviet agents. Hixey and Chapin were atomic bomb project scientists during the war.

The penalty for conviction on either charge, spying or conspiracy to spy, is death or up to 30 years' imprisonment.

Chapin, whom the committee described as a "very cooperative" witness, declined comment in New York. Hixey and his ex-wife could not be reached.

The committee said its first report on a month's long inquiry tells "only a small part" of the whole story of atomic spy activities. Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-R-I) announced that locked-door hearings will continue indefinitely.

While stressing that so far it has been able only to "scratch the surface," the committee declared that the evidence it has turned up has been known to government agents for more than five years.

"Any further delay in proceeding with prosecutions of the members of these espionage groups," the report asserted, "could result in tragic consequences to the United States and to the world."

It said failure to prosecute is "indefensible."

Hiss' lawyers filed a suit yesterday asking the U. S. District Court of Maryland for \$50,000 damages for defamation of character. The suit claimed Chambers' statement were "untrue, false and defamatory."

Monetary Fund Nations Warned To Cut Spending

Washington, Sept. 28—(AP)—The world monetary fund said today many of its 47 member Nations must cut government spending and keep taxes high.

World recovery plans may be ruined unless these and other budget-balancing steps are taken by inflation-plagued nations in Europe, Latin America and Asia, the fund declared in its third annual report.

Stressing greater production and efficiency as the main need, the report said price controls, rationing and allocations have been "ineffective" against inflation in some cases.

Dissent Demos Ponder Barkley Plea For Unity

September 28—(AP)—Dissent Democrats pondered today a plea for party unity, without which, he said, the South would be at the mercy of the Republican party which in the past has demonstrated its lack of interest in Dixie.

Standing bareheaded in an icy rain, the 70-year-old Barkley told an estimated 1,000 people in the Asheville, N. C., ballpark last night that a vote for nominees other than those named by the party's convention in Philadelphia "is a vote for the Republican nominees."

And a look back to the administration of Herbert Hoover, he said, should demonstrate what to expect if the Republicans win in November.

The crowd boomed lustily at mention of Hoover, but applauded when Barkley referred to Franklin D. Roosevelt as "a man who knew and loved the South."

He said Governor Dewey, GOP presidential nominee, actively opposed interests of south in his fight for elimination of discriminatory freight rates, and accused the GOP-controlled Eightieth Congress of having refused to finance development of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Dig Deeper Into Agency Feud On 'Censor' Charge

Washington, Sept. 28—(AP)—The Senate investigating committee called in two government employees today for their version of a holy disputed claim about censorship of anti-Communist writings.

The senators are digging into the dispute between Dr. John W. Studebaker, former commissioner of education, and Oscar R. Ewing, director of the catch-all Federal Security Agency.

Studebaker told the committee yesterday that Ewing's policy of centralizing authority had hampered Studebaker's efforts to wage an anti-Communist campaign through the public schools. He emphasized he did not question anyone's honesty or loyalty.

Ewing, trembling with anger, denied the charges and leveled a few of his own against Studebaker. He called the accusations "false and ridiculous."

Today's witnesses were Earl Hutchinson of the Office of Education and John Thurston, assistant federal security administrator.

Studebaker testified he was forced to "clear" all speeches and writings through Thurston, whom he described as "loyal but naive."

Thurston's office censored several statements aimed at Communism at home and abroad—and created "confusion" in the education office.

Hutchinson, Studebaker said, was required to change one speech because his anti-Communist remarks were considered "too radical."

Ewing replied his people got the impression that Hutchinson was suggesting "mobilization of teachers and students in our schools for the purpose of setting out Communism."

"They rightfully believed," Ewing said, "that if there should be any mobilization of teachers and students in our schools to ferret out Communists then such mobilization should be suggested and directed by the FBI."

Had To 'Confess' Every Possibility Of Direct Agreement With Russia Exhausted

Vienna, Austria, Sept. 28—(AP)—Two American oil men expelled from Communist-controlled Hungary said today they had been forced to sign statements saying they sabotaged production of the Hungarian plant of the Standard Oil Company, (N.Y.).

"It was a case of sign or else," declared Paul Ruedemann of Hartsdale, N. Y., chairman of the American-owned Hungarian company. He and his deputy, George Bannantine of St. Louis, Mo., denied emphatically all charges of sabotage.

The two said Hungarian economic police told them: "Go along with us or we will find a way to make you."

They were expelled from Hungary Saturday after seven days of questioning.

They said they held out for four days before finally signing the statements, which said they were criminals engaged in sabotage on orders from the United States.

Schuman spoke at the three western nations prepared their appeals to the Security Council, formally citing the blockade as a threat to international peace and security.

U. S. Secretary of State George C. Marshall and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin conferred during the morning of the strategy the western ministers will follow in the Security Council. Officials said the talks also concerned the British-American position and strategy in Germany after the Berlin question is referred to the council.

U. S., British and French foreign ministers have approved the terms of their note to the United Nations on the Berlin crisis and the text will be handed to Secretary General Trygve Lie tomorrow, an official British source said today. He said the text will be made public tomorrow.

A Russian source at U.N. headquarters, meanwhile, hinted a Soviet surprise when the Big Four dispute is argued in the Security Council.

This usually reliable informant said the Russians will be present in the council chamber when it is discussed and "you will see what happens then."

Schuman, who spoke at United Nations faced the severest test of its turbulent history, planned the return of a demagogue to Germany to the hands of a renegade.

"A renegade Germany must take her place in democratic Europe," he said. "Deprived of self-government, she must first achieve her own internal re-education and then take her place, with her own special qualities, among the European nations."

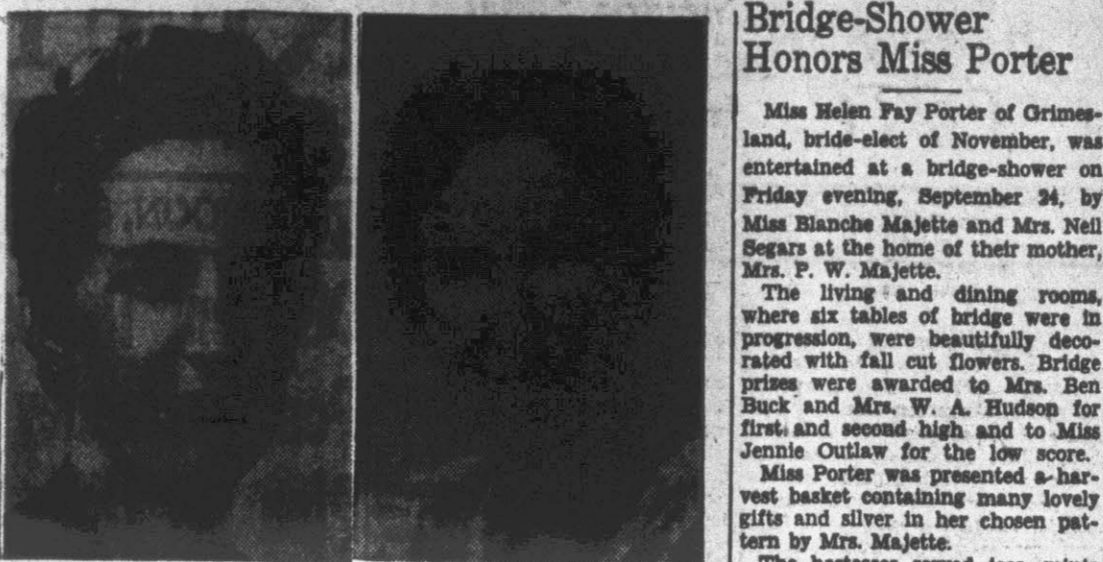

# Demand For Teachers Shown In Requests Received At ECTC

Requests for teachers, principals, and other school personnel received by the Office of Student Teaching and Placement at East Carolina Teachers College from January 1 to September 13 of this year may indicate something of the extent of present demand for teachers and the fields in which they are most needed.

certified to teach accepted work in schools, the college was unable to supply teachers for many of these positions.

A total of 1173 requests was received for principals, teachers in the elementary and the secondary schools, supervising teachers, coaches and others engaged in school work. Twenty-three requests for principals were made. Though most of last year's graduates who are

During the four quarters of the 1947-48 term at East Carolina, 132 students completed work for the B. S. degree and were eligible for certification, according to information from the placement office. Thirty-seven completed work for the master's degree, which at the college here is also a degree for teachers. Of the graduates receiving the bachelor's exactly one third specialized in work for the lower grades and two thirds for work in secondary schools.

Records of the placement office indicate that most of these graduates went into teaching or into allied fields. Of the 37 students receiving the master's degree 34 are engaged in school work this fall and one is teaching part time and taking advanced graduate work at a leading Southern university. Ten of these fill principals' positions.

Among graduates with the bachelor's degree, 105 of the total of 132 are teaching nine are taking graduate work, one is studying law and one, theology; two are home demonstration agents, five accepted positions in business; and two are working in hospitals, one as a laboratory technician and one as a dietitian.

Seven married and did not accept positions for the fall. In addition to these, seven students completing work for the bachelor of arts degree have also accepted work as teachers.

Requests for elementary schools were large, numbering 561 regular classroom teachers, one supervisor, and one kindergarten teacher. The first and the sixth grades led in requests, since there were 83 teachers in demand for each. Figures indicate that there were more than 60 places open for teachers in each of the first eight grades of the public school system.

For positions in secondary schools, requests numbered 618. Among demands for teachers of single subjects the most frequent were for coaches, directors of recreation and physical education teachers; 87 calls to fill such positions were received. Inquiries indicated that there was a need of 42 men and 14 women teachers of physical education 30 men coach teachers; and one man to direct recreational activities.

Other requests were for 77 teachers in home economics, 72 in science, 67 in business education, 48 in mathematics, 35 in English, and 33 in history and the social studies. Significant perhaps of a growing demand for teachers in public school music were 60 inquiries for teachers, band leaders, and glee club directors.

## Malaria Slides For 1,826 Taken In City Schools

J. R. Carrington of the Pitt County Health Department said today 1,826 children in the Greenville city schools were tested for malaria last week by members of the State Board of Health who were in Greenville.

The tests, in the form of blood slides, were made on all students through the seventh grade. Carrington said time did not permit the state workers to make slides of the high school children of the city. The slides will be taken to Raleigh where they will be tested for malaria germs and the local health department will be notified of the number of positive reactions found. Children which the tests show have malaria will be notified personally from Raleigh.

Carrington said it will be several months before the results of the tests are known.

## L. A. Bullock Now In Japan; Is Promoted

With the eighth army in Sendai, Japan, Sept. 18—Recruit Lindward A. Bullock, Ayden, N. C., was recent-

ly promoted to the rank of Private for the excellent performance of his duties as a cook with the 54th Engineer Maintenance Company. Private Bullock entered the army in November 1947. He sailed for overseas duty in Japan in February 1948, and was assigned to the 54th Engineer Maintenance Company in May.

## Formal Attire For Ceremonial Opening Oct. 26

London, Sept. 28 — (AP) — King George sent word to the boys at the Tower of London Monday to dust off the imperial crown. He's going to wear it for the first time in ten years at the opening of Parliament Oct. 26.

The decision for a full ceremonial apparently was taken with government consent in answer to a campaign to get the country back to normal peacetime proceedings.

This means all the lords and ladies must put on their ceremonial robes which have been in moth balls since before the war.

Mr. Haney has served as student pastor at Crew, Va., Bridgeport, Ky. and more recently in Niantic, Conn. He also served as director of religious education for two years at Harrodsburg, Ky.

WHAT WILL HISTORY SAY OF US?

"War takes away the margins of ordinary life and, in most cases, it adjusts the temperament to the new environment by its brutal training."

Who wrote these words? Some modern author or columnist? Not at all. They were written by Thucydides, the Greek historian who lived almost 2500 years ago. He had observed that war does something to individuals and nations which it takes generations and sometimes centuries to eliminate. We are living today in what historians are in the habit of calling "troubled times." Periods like this occur in world history, and almost always they follow protracted and brutal wars. Those who have visited Europe in recent months, and even those among us who through correspondence with destitute persons in Europe have had some insight into their suffering can realize the profound and awful dislocation which the past war has involved. The youngest child today will die of old age before the evil effects of this awful holocaust have been wiped out.

This all adds up to the imperative necessity of getting rid of war. Important as domestic problems are, neither business, education, scientific research, nor any other employment of the modern mind will have any significance if war is allowed to go on to its destructive conclusion. Thucydides said it 2500 years ago, and we are history's worst fools if we do not see it today.

**Boyle's Column**

New York—(AP)—The latest Red bloc here is unlikely to get much attention from Congressmen investigating un-American Activities.

I refer to the campaign by Chief Rising Cloud, an Indian child psychologist, to get back a block of Midtown New York real estate on which to build a ten-story museum of the Red Man.

It is unlikely that the Red bloc will get its block. Rising Cloud only wants to pay \$94 for it—the same price the Indians sold all Manhattan for back in 1624.

He and a number of other Indians noting a gradual increase in business here over the last three centuries, have begun to suspect their ancestors were killed. There is some justification for this suspicion, as the island of Manhattan is currently assessed at \$7,790,001,790.

And its population has grown from 300 to 1,908,596. The population of the whole city is 7,997,746. But there are even more Indians here now than when the white man first came—if you count the members of the strange Tribe of Tammany.

Getting back to Chief Rising Cloud—it'll have to unravel a lot of history if he ever is to obtain a block to erect his memorial to the vanishing Redskin.

The generally accepted story is that Peter Minuit, director general of the new Netherlands, took title to Manhattan—"the little island"—from the Manhattanes for \$24 worth of beads, buttons and trinkets.

At that time panthers and wolves prowled just north of Wall Street.

Generally accepted by everybody except malicious historians and South Carolinians.

**MONUMENTS**—It is not known how many monuments have already been erected to Andrew Jackson. He is one of the few men to have two separate, distinct and authoritative designated birthplaces with stone monuments to mark them. About 40 years ago the Mecklenburg Chapter, DAR, unveiled a monument on the site of the McKemey cabin. A few years later the York County chapter erected a marker at the Crawford plantation site. They are more than three miles apart and each proclaims to the world that Andrew Jackson "was born here."

**Around Capitol Square**

By LYNN HENNEY

**INTERESTED**—A number of top flight Capitol Square folks are manifesting keen interest these days in history and legend about the birthplace of Andrew Jackson. President Truman's acceptance of the invitation to speak at unveiling of the monument to Jackson, Folk and Johnson on Capitol Square has received the century-old debate as to whether Jackson was born in North Carolina or South Carolina. Most biographers skirt the question by noting that the seventh president of the United States was born in the Waxhaw area near the state line.

**COMPLIATION**—It is generally conceded among students of the more or less important question that the most complete compilation of evidence for both claims is to be found in speeches delivered a quarter century ago on the floor of the national house of representatives by the late W. F. Stevenson of South Carolina and the late W. C. Hammer of North Carolina. The gentlemen then represented the respective districts in which both alleged birthplaces are located. Congressmen for the districts now are J. P. Richards of North Carolina and C. B. Deane of South Carolina. Oldtimers recall that it was conceded back in the middle twenties that Stevenson had more facts, Hammer had more argument. So far as can be learned the present representatives are standing by their predecessors, neither conceding decision to the other—but both keeping relatively quiet about it. Old copies of the Congressional Record carrying the debate have been much in demand hereabouts during the past few days. They contain most of the documentary evidence, which is conflicting and confusing, and include official maps, government edicts and personal affidavits of alleged attendants upon the occasion of Jackson's birth—which all sides agree occurred several months after his father's death.

**DISPUTE**—The current upsurge of interest in the question has served to clarify one point. The dispute has not been about location of the state line, admittedly uncertain at that time. The question is whether Jackson was born in the George McKemey cabin, just inside North Carolina, or on the Robert Crawford plantation, three miles over in South Carolina. Mrs. McKemey and Mrs. Crawford were sisters of Mrs. Andrew Jackson, Sr., and there is no doubt about the fact that Mrs. Jackson left her home well over in North Carolina to go to Mrs. Crawford's place for the happy (?) event. The South Carolina hypothesis is that she made the full trip; the North Carolina hypothesis is that the stork caught her while spending the night with Mrs. McKemey, a little more than halfway between her home and the Crawford place. Undoubtedly the North Carolina claim has much more drama and appeal to the imagination. It has been pretty gen-

The World Series is slated to start a week from tomorrow at Braves' Field, Boston.

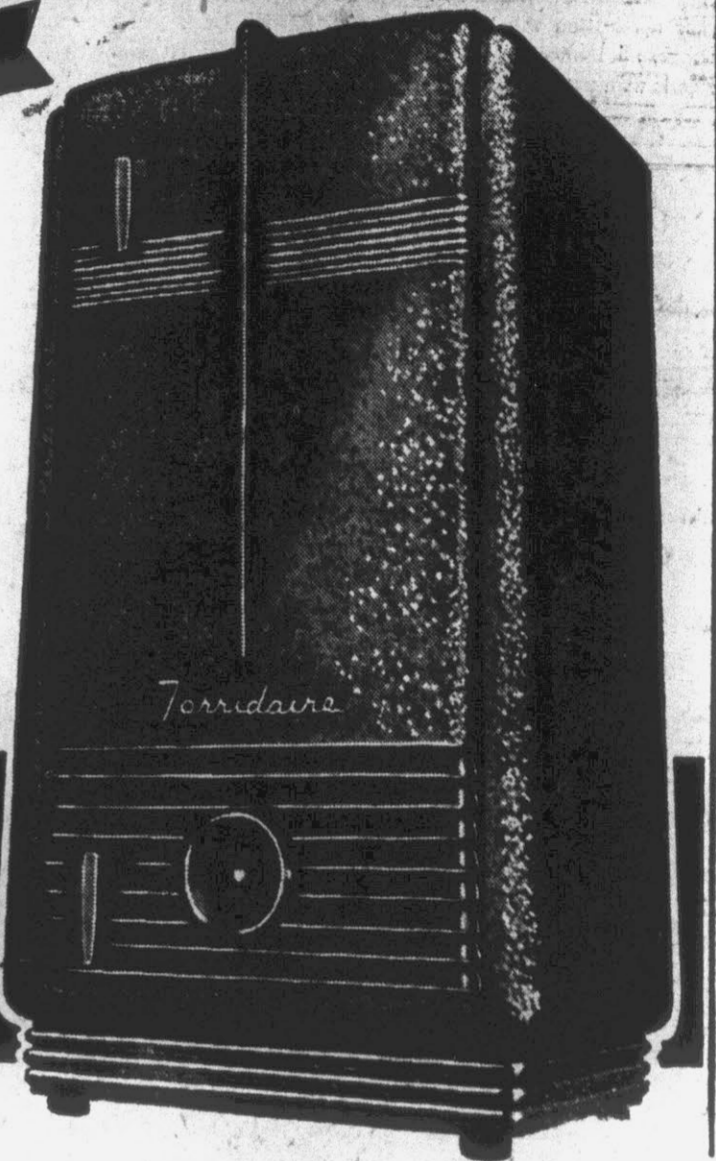

ed Nations Security Council.

That, of course, may break the U. N. wide open, resulting in the withdrawal of the Russian bloc.

It strikes us that this showdown in the U. N. is one of the best things which could happen. We never had a "United" Nations thus far, and it's time this situation was ironed out. However, that's beside the point of who double-crossed whom.

Diplomatic quarters in Washington are puzzled. The speculation is that either Stalin reconsidered, after he made the agreement, and ordered Sokolovsky to scuttle the ship, or that the Generalissimo himself was overruled by the Cominform in the recent meeting reported to have taken place in the Crimea.

If the Cominform reversed Stalin in we have a new and startling development. The Generalissimo has been undisputed ruler of Soviet Russia for more than twenty years.

city by train and truck that had to pass through the Soviet zone.

For a long time, almost three years, the Russians let them do this, without an agreement in writing.

(American officials say that, although there was no written agreement, it was clearly understood between them and the Russians that the Americans had a right to send their supplies overland by train and truck to Berlin.)

(The Russians deny this.)

But—and this is important in view of what is happening now—we did have an agreement in writing with the Russians that we could use certain airlines to send our planes into Berlin.

Earlier this year, when relations between Russia and the other three nations grew critical, Russia refused to let them send any more supplies to Berlin by train or truck.

But—remember that written agreement about the airlines—Russia did not try to stop us from sending supplies into Berlin by plane.

At this point our relations with Russia are near the breaking point. But how did that happen? The steps leading up to that will be discussed tomorrow.
