Demand Count Of Prisoners Kept In Soviet Russia

Western Sources Estimate Over 200,000 POWs Held Despite Deadline

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The Western powers, in a sharp counter-blow to Communist propaganda charges, have demanded an exact count of German war prisoners still held in the Soviet Union.

Under a four-power agreement, all prisoners of war were to have been sent home by the end of 1948. Russia has been claiming that many former German soldiers are being held as "volunteer" workers in the Western zones of Germany.

The United States, France and Britain gave their answer to that charge yesterday.

The State Department announced that a note had been delivered to Moscow asking (a) how many prisoners of war still are in Russia; (b) what the Soviet Union plans to do about returning them to Germany; and (c) how many have died in captivity.

The Soviet news agency Tass replied in a broadcast from the Russian capital that an "overwhelming majority" of the German prisoners have been sent home and added:

"The repatriation of the remainder is proceeding according to the plan adopted by the Soviet government and is to be completed during 1949."

Allied and German sources estimate that more than 200,000 prisoners of war remain in Russian hands.

While Tass repeated the charges that the Western nations have refused to release "a large number of German prisoners of war in guise of wage labor," the State Department noted that the last German war prisoner held by the United States actually was freed by mid-1947, aside from a handful in hospitals or absent without leave.

Britain and France have given similar assurances.

The deadline for repatriating German POWs was last Friday, December 31. That date was set by a Council of Foreign Ministers session early in 1947.

Show Increase In Gov't Employees

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The number of civilian government employees went up again in November, to a total of 2,104,585.

The increase was put at 12,406 by the joint committee on reduction of nonessential federal expenditures, which also reported a net increase of 110,415 for the first 11 months of 1948—an average of 362 daily.

Except for September and October the committee said, the total has risen in each month of 1948, with figures for December not yet compiled.

Britain Plans Trading Accord

London, Jan. 4.—(AP)—A five-year Anglo-Polish trade pact setting up the biggest East-West commercial deal since the war's end probably will be signed today, a British official said today.

A board of trade spokesmen said the two countries would exchange approximately \$200,000,000 worth of goods in the next five years under the projected pact.

Lindbergh In Germany

The Rules Committee

How You Are Involved In What Happened In The House Yesterday; The President's Program Also Given A Better Chance; Why Rules Committee's Powers Curbed

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—You're involved in what happened to the House Rules committee. So is President Truman's program for 1949.

The House yesterday, clipped the committee's power. That may seem complicated and far removed from you. It isn't.

When Mr. Truman campaigned for election, he promised a wide program if the voters gave his Democrats control of Congress in 1948:

Housing, social security, federal aid to education and health, civil rights for Negroes, and a law wiping out the Taft-Hartley labor law. Mr. Truman's Democrats won. They're running Congress now. Suppose this happened:

One of Mr. Truman's Democrats introduced a bill to wipe out the Taft-Hartley act.

Small Town Has 46 Tornado Dead

Dazed Survivors Stumble Through Ruins; Relief Arrives; Wreckage Searched For More Bodies; Damage Near \$1,000,000

Warren, Ark., Jan. 4.—(AP)—This weeping and torn timber town today counted 46 dead and nearly 300 injured in the wake of a tornado which hit with a thundering roar late yesterday afternoon.

Two other tornadoes killed four persons and injured more than 60 in northern Louisiana and near El Dorado, Ark.

All through the night dazed survivors at Warren (population 7,500) stumbled through the ruins of a 20-block industrial and residential area, many aimlessly, others in search of relatives. Warren is 100 miles southwest of Little Rock.

Doctors and nurses from nearby communities and from Hot Springs and Little Rock rallied on the stricken area. They worked through the darkness, rain and hail by lamp and candlelight to treat the stream of injured.

The dead, gathered by common consent at a single funeral home, overflowed the small morgue into a garage.

At daybreak this morning 150 National Guardsmen and State Police-men began the backbreaking task of prying through the wreckage in search of additional bodies.

Mayor Jim Hurley expressed fear that other bodies would be recovered and predicted the death toll would reach 50, maybe more.

Convicts equipped with bulldozers, picks and shovels aided in the task of clearing the debris. Mayor Hurley said damage, conservatively estimated, would reach the \$1,000,000 mark.

Identification of the dead was developing into a difficult job. Many of the bodies were cut to ribbons by falling or flying timbers and other debris.

The storm struck at 5:45 p.m. and lasted only 15 minutes but its arrival as most of the town prepared for supper was heralded by an ominous roar.

W. Parker Brown, watchman at the Bradley Lumber Co., said 11 men saved themselves by taking refuge around a locomotive in one of the shops. The engine was covered with timber afterwards.

Brown said he saw one man wrapped around a utility line "like a coil."

Electric, gas and water lines were broken. Fires broke out adding an eerie glow to the nightmare.

The Red Cross and armed forces sent in mobile kitchens and first aid stations.

The Navy installed a radio communications center to maintain contact with its Camden, Ark., ordnance plant and provide assistance to worn out but heroic telephone operators who stuck by their jobs.

A worker at the Bradley mill, which employs about 1,800 persons said the storm hurled huge timbers through the air like so many tooth-picks.

So great was the force of the blow that it picked up a heavy bus and bent it around a power pole.

Guerrilla Groups Organize In Java

Former Indonesian Cabinet Members Heading Movement

Batavia, Java, Jan. 4.—(AP)—A Chinese newspaper reported today the formation of an anti-Dutch "guerrilla government for Java," headed by four members of the Indonesian Republic's last cabinet.

The newspaper, Sin Po, said the cabinet ministers are Dr. Soekarno, who directed internal affairs and led the republic's largest party, Masjumi (National Muslim); Dr. Lelimens, health minister and a leading figure in Dutch-Indonesian negotiations; Dr. Djanda, communications minister, and Dr. Kasimo, food supply minister.

The heads of the last Indonesian government, including President Soekarno and Premier Mohamad Hatta, have been in Dutch custody since the beginning of the latest Dutch military action against the republic in Java and Sumatra, now virtually complete.

Sin Po's correspondent said Republican armed forces "generally remained fully intact" in the Dutch "police action," and escaped the Netherlands' drives.

The new fugitive government, Sin Po said, is coordinating guerrilla activity and using a number of radio transmitters for the purpose, one of them transmitting at the "mountainous Republic of Java."

A Republican broadcast from a secret transmitter said guerrillas Monday night occupied three estates in the Soekarno area, 50 miles south of Batavia, after a four-hour battle.

"ABSOLUTELY HOPELESS"

Reading, Eng., Jan. 4.—(AP)—Daniel George Maggs, a Reading University student, pleaded guilty today to stealing a calculating machine. The court put him on probation for a year after he explained he took the machine home because "I'm absolutely hopeless at calculations."

Marines Prepare To Leave China As Peace Nears

No Confirmation Peace Talks Under Way, But Demands Spread Over Country

Shanghai, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Demands for peace spread throughout war-torn China today. They were coupled with a report U. S. Marines are preparing to leave their China base at Tsingtao.

A Tsingtao dispatch said some 3,000 United States Marines are leaving their barracks and boarding naval vessels in the harbor. It reported they were expected to withdraw from Tsingtao, anchorage of the U. S. Western Pacific fleet, before Jan. 25.

American naval and diplomatic sources here denied Marines were preparing to leave China. But their denials were half-hearted.

One spokesman, who should be in a position to know, said:

"That report isn't wrong; it's just premature."

The Tsingtao report said "the reason officially given for the surprise move was that since the Chinese government has now decided to negotiate for peace settlement with the Reds, there is a good prospect for peace being restored and the presence of the marines is no longer needed."

There was no confirmation that peace talks were underway. New demands for peace came from Shanghai businessmen. And Communists were reported pressing for local negotiations to end the civil war in five northern provinces.

The Tsingtao report came from the Associated Press' local correspondent. He said Vice Admiral Oscar C. Badger, commander of the western Pacific fleet, would continue to maintain his base in Tsingtao.

Continued efforts were being made to reach Admiral Badger for a clarifying statement.

First Bill Would Benefit Truman

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The first of more than 400 bills introduced in the House at the opening session of the 81st Congress would give President Truman a \$25,000 annual pension when he retires.

Applicable to all former presidents, it also would affect Herbert Hoover. It was introduced by Rep. O'Toole (D-NY).

ECTC Stadium

Members of the East Carolina Teachers College Stadium Fund committee are urged to make their reports of solicitations to J. H. Waldrop, president, at the Guaranty Bank and Trust Co. not later than Friday at noon.

There are 29 members of the committee. Not many of them have made reports. At present nearly \$11,000 has been turned in. Chairman Ed E. Rawl, vice-president of the Stadium Committee, said "Our people will come across if they really appreciate the value of the college to Greenville and the section."

Rawl, at the first meeting of half a hundred leaders, men, said that the \$25,000 needed to start the stadium be collected by Christmas. So far less than half has been turned in. The contributors to the fund to provide a stadium and educational fund for promising athletes at ECTC will be recognized by cards placed in their windows, stating that "This firm contributed to the Stadium Fund."

Temperatures plunged to as low as 23 below zero in Butte, Mont. Winds ranging in velocity from 40 to 60 miles an hour whirled heavy falling snow into huge drifts over the blizzard belt of the Dakotas, Western Nebraska, Western Kansas, Eastern Wyoming, Colorado and Northwest Minnesota.

The mercury ranged from 10 to 15 below to 5 above in Western Kansas. Snow falls ranged from 3 to 8 inches. Chadron, Neb., reported 32 inches of snow.

Trains and buses in many parts of the storm area halted operations awaiting a break in the weather.

Labor Protests May Unseat Ives

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Protests from organized labor threatened today to block a proposal by Democratic Senator Elbert Thomas (Utah) to keep Republican Senator Ives (NY) on the Senate Labor committee.

Under the seniority rule, Ives will lose his spot if the Democrats take eight places and leave only five for the GOP minority. The New York City could stay if the division were seven to six.

Report First Case Of Polio For 1949

Winston-Salem, N. C., Jan. 4.—(AP)—North Carolina's first reported case of polio in 1949 has been diagnosed here.

The victim is Dawn Pulliam, four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Pulliam of Winston-Salem. She is a patient at the North Carolina Baptist Hospital.

BANKS TO REPORT

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 4.—(AP)—Commissioner of Banks Gurney P. Hood today issued a call on all State banks, both commercial and industrial, and all commercial loan agencies for a report on their condition at the close of business Dec. 31.

Unexpected GOP Support For Truman Seen In New Congress

Washington, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Signs of some unexpected Republican support for President Truman appeared on Capitol Hill today as the new 81st Congress ironed out organizational details.

Mr. Truman will face the lawmakers tomorrow when he delivers his annual State of the Union message to a joint Senate-House session.

Development: In yesterday's opening session indicated clearly that Mr. Truman will have far less difficulty getting what he wants from Congress than he has had in the past.

He is expected to want just about everything contained in the platform adopted last summer by the Democratic National Convention.

Mr. Truman campaigned for repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law and for passage of laws to provide housing, health and education aids, a higher minimum wage, firmer farm price supports and protection

of minority groups against discrimination. With both Senate and House in recess until tomorrow, members of the Democratic majority and the Republican minority were trying to interpret an opening-day House vote which, on its face, indicated that President Truman may have a lot of Republican support in the new Congress.

That vote was on an Administration-backed proposal to curb the power of the House Rules Committee, on which in the past a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats has blocked major legislation wanted by the President. The same coalition was a distinct possibility again this year, especially with regard to legislation to repeal the Taft-Hartley labor law.

So Truman Democrats backed a change to make it easier to get around a rules committee roadblock. They proposed that anytime a legislative committee approves a bill

and the rules committee doesn't clear it for a House vote within 21 days, the chairman of the legislative committee can force action.

He can do it simply by making, and getting carried, on the second or fourth Monday of any month, a motion to bring the blocked bill before the House. The new rule requires the speaker to recognize the chairman for that purpose.

Since most House chairmen are Administration Democrats, the party leadership expects no trouble with rules committee bottlenecks. Normally, the leadership tells committee chairmen when and how to move.

Regardless of a decision by their party steering committee to fight the rule change, 49 Republicans went along with the Truman Democrats in support of the bottleneck-breaking plan. It was carried by a 275 to 142 vote. These 49 Republicans were more than offset the 31 Southern and border-state Democrats who refused to back the change.

There is one race in the Senate for the post of president pro tempore. Candidates are Senators J. C. Pittman of Lee, Julian Allsbrook of Halifax and O. B. Moss of Nash.

Pittman, who arrived here yesterday, said he had 33 commitments among the 50 members of the Senate. Allsbrook, also an early arrival, said he doubted if any of his opponents had a majority lined up.

"After what happened in the Truman-Dewey election, I don't have much faith in these here polls," he commented.

Ray Byrley of Sanford, Senate principal clerk since 1937, is unopposed for reelection. Also without opposition are Robert P. Rasmberg of Winston-Salem, candidate for reading clerk, and Herman Scott of Chatham, for sergeant at arms.

Two candidates have announced for the post of House principal clerk. They are Mrs. Annie Cooper, who has been clerk since late in the 1943 session, and Walter Lee Horton, an employee in the State Motor Vehicles Department. Jefferson Wilson of Biscoe has been sounding out members of the House and indicated he is still a candidate, though unannounced.

Extras in the race for House reading clerk are Ralph Menger of Lee, who has held the post several times, and Roy Wilkerson of Kenly. H. L. Joyner of Northampton is unopposed for sergeant at arms, a post he has held for many sessions.

Belief that the legislature will have a happy session was expressed by Rep. Ramsey and Lieutenant Governor-elect H. Pat Taylor, who will preside at Senate sessions following his inauguration Thursday with Governor-elect Kerr Scott and other officials.

"We're all working toward the same end," Ramsey commented. "I don't see why we won't have a harmonious session."

Bank Robbed By Unarmed Woman's Written Threat

San Francisco, Jan. 4.—(AP)—A series of six bank robberies disturbed police today, especially the latest by a apparently unarmed woman.

She shoved a threatening note through teller John Zobel's window yesterday and made off unnoticed except by Zobel with \$2,666 from a downtown branch of the Bank of America.

It was the sixth such holdup here in four months but the first by a woman.

Police Inspector Martin Lee said, "I await a rash of bank holdups as soon as word gets around that a defenseless, middle-aged, dumpy woman held up a bank with no other weapon than a piece of paper."

China's Climax Near

With Nationalists and Communists Standing Pat On Their Peace Terms, Immediate Future Depends On Whether Chiang Has Support Of His Government

China's crisis stands at its tensest pitch in her long years of civil war. The climax is near.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has made a defiant offer of peace—on his own terms—to the victorious Communist armies. With his back to the wall he admits "the military situation has entered an exceedingly perilous stage."

But it's his conditions or a fight to the finish. The Reds refuse to compromise.

With both sides thus standing pat, the immediate future depends on whether Chiang still commands the support of his government and his armies. He has the determination—but he can't win the war single-handed. The Communists are flushed with success and are ready to carry on.

If the war continues, where will the showdown come? If you will take a look at your maps of China you can pick the place yourselves. It's that 90 mile stretch on the mighty Yangtze River between the capital, Nanking, and the metropolitan support of Shanghai. Nanking lies on the south bank of the Yangtze, and Chiang's task is to defend that whole southern stretch. He himself says of this sector:

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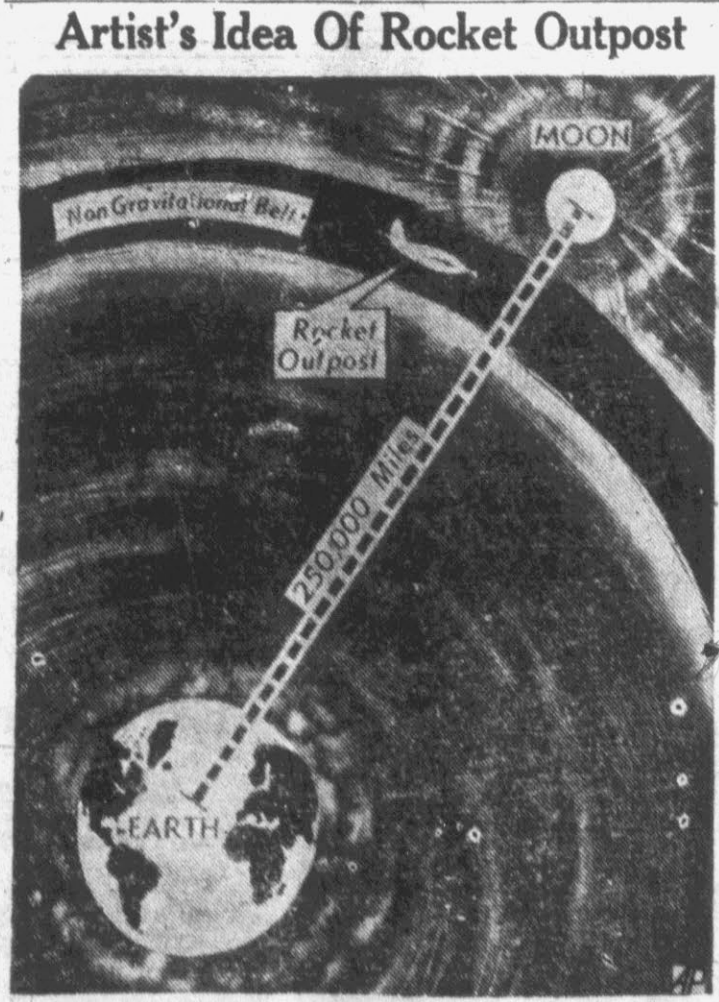

After reviewing some of the advantages and some of the benefits deriving from the presence of the college in Greenville Mr. Waldrop said, "We owe it to ourselves and to the college to build that stadium." He urged further solicitation in view of the fact that some interested donors might not yet have been reached. Jasper Winslow told of having investigated the possibilities of securing a loan to build the stadium.

Concluding the program was effusion a la Hayward Dail on the general subject of "mules"—the subject assigned by Howard McGinnis. His theme was "The Mule Ain't As Far Gone As You Think." Among other things he spoke for removal of the tax from mules because as he said in substantiation of the notion that "I never heard of a man buying a mule for pleasure." One digression was the admonition from Hayward Dail that one not stop at getting the state legislature to agree to law but sit right down with the fellow who writes the law. Dr. L. W. Jenkins, dean of men at East Carolina Teachers College and chairman of the Pitt County polo drive, announced last night that all proceeds of the ECTC boxing tournament will go toward the \$11,000 goal Greenville and Pitt County have set out to raise to combat infantile paralysis.

The boxing tournament, featuring seven bouts, will be held in the Wright Building on the ECTC campus Friday night with the first fight getting underway at 8 o'clock. Dr. Jenkins said a number of other entertainment events are being scheduled to benefit the drive.

Coach Jim Johnson emphasized yesterday, however, that the boxing match will not be of the "we'll slug around a few rounds for a good cause" nature. The fights will be genuine, he said. Winners in the match will represent the school in intercollegiate bouts this season.

It will be the first home appearance of the ECTC pugilist team. The boys, with three weeks conditioning, lost a match to the Charlotte YMCA December 19. Seven of the ECTC fighters lost, one tied and the other, Ken Stargardt, won.

"We just were not in condition," Coach Jim Johnson explained. His boys are settling down to serious training this week in an effort to get in as good shape as possible before Friday night.

Coach Johnson has not announced the lineups as yet but said yesterday that it would be released later in the week. Among the fighters who will probably see action in the three-round events is Ken Stargardt, the Richmond, Va., middleweight who won a decision over Jack Griffen in Charlotte two weeks ago to be the only ECTC fighter to claim a victory in the event.

Thomas Daniels also a middleweight, fought to a draw with Murray Beasley at Charlotte. Daniels, though he is currently suffering from a finger injury, will probably be among the performers Friday.

Donald Denny, a former Golden Gloves champion, who lost a decision to Ronald Short at Charlotte, is another of the ring standouts who will be featured in the Friday night benefit event.

Rose Bowl Took Most Money For New Year Games

New York, Jan. 4—(AP)—The Rose Bowl carved up the largest financial melon of the some \$2,500,000 that poured in from the New Year's Day football games but two of the fattest individual slices went to the teams in the Sugar Bowl.

North Carolina and Oklahoma received the fat purses at New Orleans—better than \$102,000 each—without any commitments to share it.

Principals in the Rose and Cotton Bowls were paid off handsomely but had to scatter some of their wealth among their conference brothers.

Even so, it looked as if California and Oregon, the Coast co-champions, both would wind up with a bit more than \$100,000.

Oregon not only receives its share of the Cotton Bowl profits but, as a Pacific Coast member, gets a bit of the money taken in by the Rose Bowl.

While the Pasadena sponsors haven't completed their audit, the best estimate is that their game grossed \$533,000, after taxes.

This includes receipts from approximately 89,270 ticket sales and \$100,000 for radio and television rights.

Of the total, the tournament of Roses Association gets about \$129,000 leaving approximately \$404,000 to be split between the Pacific Coast and Western Conferences.

The change isn't counted officially but North Carolina and Oklahoma the competing teams, appear sure to get \$102,000 or more. The rest, after expenses, goes to help pay off the stadium indebtedness, around \$825,000.

The Sun Bowl took in around \$49,000, assuring West Virginia and Texas Mines \$12,000 apiece.

McMillin, coach of the Detroit Lions, saw the Cotton Bowl game and spent plenty of time with young Doak. Detroit has draft rights to Walker in the National League.

"I've another year in college ball. Maybe I might go into ranching, or maybe start in business in Dallas," Walker said.

His record is fabulous. Playing part of the 1946 season, and all of 1947 and 1948, Doak has: Carried the ball a total of 353 times for a gain of 1,751 yards. Thrown 173 passes, completing 99 for 1,113 yards. Caught 24 passes for 435 yards. Punted 58 times for an average of 35.8 yards. Returned 45 punts for 664 yards. Scored 28 touchdowns and made 42 points after touchdowns.

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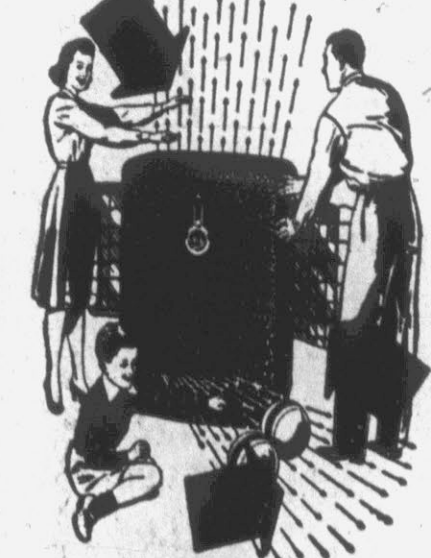

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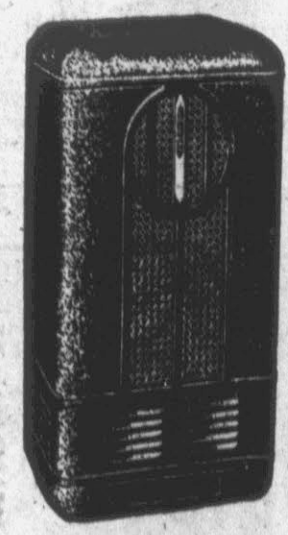

MISSING THE MARK
The word "to sin" when found in the Bible is usually the translation of either a Hebrew or a Greek word meaning "to miss the mark." A sinner is a person who is missing the mark.

Let us retranslate a few well-known Bible statements with this meaning in mind: "He shall save his people from missing the mark." "Neither do I condemn thee; go, and miss the mark no more." "We have all missed the mark and come short of the glory of God." "If we have not missed the mark, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us." "I came not to call the righteous, but people who have missed the mark to repentance." "God commended his love for us, in that while we were yet missing the mark, Christ died for us."

The whole testimony of Scripture is that the sinner is foolish. He thinks he is getting the best out of life, yet all the time he is missing the best. He is missing the very thing he was born into life to get. He is here to be tested for eternal life, to grow a soul; he wastes his time and sloughs off his spiritual qualities as he indulges his appetites, judges his fellows, lives a selfish life, compromises, and neglects every opportunity to know God and deepen the spiritual life. The sinner is missing the mark.

ANTI-CLOSED SHOP RULING

For all practical purposes the question of anti-closed shop legislation in North Carolina is definitely closed—for a few days at least—following a Supreme Court ruling yesterday upholding the North Carolina law banning the closed shop.

When it comes to law in the United States, the decision of the Supreme Court is final, but if a decision of the court does not suit the majority of the legislators on a state or national level, the lawmakers usually find some new legislation to by-pass an unpopular decision of the court.

It will be interesting to watch, both in Congress and in the North Carolina General Assembly, the effect which yesterday's Supreme Court ruling upholding anti-closed shop laws in North Carolina, Arizona and Nebraska has upon the legislation drafted during the 1949 session.

Although the decision handed down by the Supreme Court did not directly involve the Taft-Hartley law's anti-closed shop section, it is significant to see where the high tribunal stands on the question of anti-closed shop legislation. And it is not unlikely that the Supreme Court ruling on the state laws will have some influence on congressional action in considering President Truman's demands for amending or repealing the Taft-Hartley law.

With the Supreme Court's decision upholding the North Carolina anti-closed shop law coming practically on the eve of the convening of the General Assembly, it will be interesting to see what sort of reception a proposal to repeal the state anti-closed shop law will receive in the General Assembly should such a proposal be forthcoming during the 1949 session.



Around Capitol Square

ASSURANCE—Governor and Mrs. Kerr Scott as official tenant-hosts at the executive mansion, and the hundreds of semi-official guests at breakfasts, luncheons and dinners here, have assurance these affairs will be handled smoothly and efficiently. Miss Laura H. Reiley will continue on the job as hostess at the mansion.

HOSTESS—The title of hostess doesn't convey any idea of Miss Reiley's duties. She is a sort of general manager for the executive mansion establishment, having responsibility for keeping up the yards and a 45-room house; supervising eight or ten servants—several of whom are honor grade prisoners; arranging menus, buying and preparing food for the governor's family and guests. Because of the exigencies of political development and the personal vagaries of governors and visitors many emergencies arise. It is not unusual for her to be half a dozen extra for breakfast, or to find that a well-arranged dinner table has to be changed just a few minutes before the meal is served.

BIG—It's a big job. The mansion has reception rooms, dining rooms, libraries and what have you on the first floor; seven bedrooms with private baths on the second floor; living quarters on the third floor and basement levels, as well as kitchens, pantries and storage rooms where needed. The housekeeping job, however, is a minor part of the hostess' duties. Every spring thousands of school children from all parts of the state visit Raleigh and most of them want to see the mansion. It develops upon the hostess to show them around, explain the portraits and furnishings, and keep them from interfering too much with the privacy of the governor's family upstairs. It is not unusual to have more than 500 children in one day, and the thousand figure has several times been reached or exceeded. Besides the school children, there is seldom a day when some adult visitor from within or without the state, does not show up with desire to look over the residence of North Carolina's governor.

EASIER—Big as the job of supervising executive mansion functions

is, it will have fewer headaches for woman, a physician who was imprisoned with Gandhi from 1942 to 1944, and later was his doctor, is now working under a United Nations fellowship. She has been studying maternal and child health and welfare programs.

Dr. Nayar received her medical degree from Lady Hardinge Medical College at New Delhi and is now working under a \$5,000,000 fund raised by the people in memory of Gandhi's wife. The fund is meant for the welfare of women and children in rural India.

Like all Gandhi's followers, Dr. Nayar looked upon Gandhi as her "Bapu" or father, and considers herself one of his "humble instruments." Gandhi, she said, set up programs for education, rural uplift, adult education, improvement of cattle and agricultural conditions and so on. These programs—about 18 in all—are being carried out by some eight or 10 organizations started by Gandhi himself. His followers are working to improve living and working conditions in India's 700,000 villages.

"The idea is to make these villages as nearly perfect as possible so that the people will not wish to build more cities," said Dr. Nayar. She said Gandhi believed that India's life depended on the retention of its rural areas. She cited Gandhi's theory that if India's 400,000,000 were living in a highly industrialized and militarized state they would be "a real menace to the peace of the world."

"Either the ideology promoted by Gandhi must predominate, not only in India, but all parts of the world as well," Dr. Nayar said fervently. "For the ideology of violence symbolized by high industrialization or high militarization will ultimately destroy us. There is no half-way house."

In order to train workers to extend the Gandhi program, centers are being set up in the various provinces where doctors and nurses are working voluntarily for as little as \$50 a month. A young English nurse, Dr. Nayar said, was working for only \$15 a month and said it was all she needed.

"To all according to their need, from all according to their capacity," was the creed Gandhi preached to his people. Dr. Nayar said this theory is quite similar to the Communists' but that Gandhi emphasized that the means were more important than the end, whereas the Communists believe that no matter how you do it, it's the end that matters most.

Ayden Man Dies Of Knife Wounds Incurred In Fight

Plan To Step Up Sale Of Shares

Levy Albritton, Ayden Negro, died in Pitt General Hospital yesterday afternoon of multiple knife wounds, allegedly inflicted Monday morning by Johnny Edwards, Ayden Negro, during an altercation following an argument about a woman.

Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse has ordered Edwards held in the county jail without privilege of bond. He will hold an inquest in Ayden Thursday night at the city hall at 7 o'clock.

Ayden Police Chief J. M. Whitehurst quoted hospital attendants as saying that Albritton had 14 knife wounds in his chest, thigh and abdomen.

The chief quoted Edwina Shields, Negro, of Ayden, the woman over whom the fight allegedly started, as saying that the fatal affray occurred in the Negro section of Ayden, about 8:30 a.m., when Albritton struck Edwards with a bottle during an argument about a package Edwards was supposed to have sent her and which she did not receive.

Chief Whitehurst told the story like this: "Albritton threatened to go to the woman's home to look for the package. She said it was not there. When Albritton picked up a bottle and started towards Edwards, he asked, 'What you going to do?' 'I'm going to bust your head open,' and struck Edwards with the bottle, breaking it. Then Albritton picked up another bottle and started fighting with—first and the bottle. About that time Edwards started wielding his knife in self-defense, he said. When Albritton collapsed out in the street, Edwards dragged him to the curb to prevent a car from running over him, and then left."

Chief Whitehurst apprehended him about two and a half miles east of Ayden on a dirt road and locked him up.

Edwina Shields, Negro, the woman in the case, was an interested spectator in the fatal affray. The officer said Edwards has a good reputation and is a regular worker as a logger in pulp woods. Chief Whitehurst said Albritton has a bad police record; that he was recently released from prison for attacking him while being arrested sometime ago, and added, "Albritton was a dangerous man and a nuisance in the community."

Three Negroes In Trouble For Trespass Here

Fred Cone, Negro, objected to some Negro strangers, with a truck, removing the furniture from his home, 404 Elks Street, in the Bama, about 9:30 last night, and had them arrested for trespassing when they refused to leave his premises. The trio are in jail.

Police Chief Lester D. Page quoted Cone as saying that his wife left him last December 29th; that she had returned to his home with a truck and three Negroes to remove the furniture. When he ordered the truck driver and two helpers to leave, they continued to take over the furniture. He obtained a warrant for them, but they had gone when police arrived at the home.

Shortly afterwards police in a radio car apprehended the truck on Charles Street, leaving town. They arrested Ben F. Oden and Oscar C. Higgins of Washington, and James W. Turnage of Chocowinity, all Negroes, on charges of trespassing. The truckload of furniture is parked at police headquarters. The three men are being held. They will be tried in Police Court Friday.

Edwin Strickland Dies At His Home

Mr. Edwin S. Strickland, 69, died at his home in Bell Arthur Monday morning after a brief illness. Funeral services will be conducted at the home of his son, Bruce Strickland, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by Rev. L. B. Bennett, Christian minister of Macesfield, assisted by Rev. C. J. Harris, Free Will Baptist minister of Greenville. Burial will be in the Strickland family cemetery.

Mr. Strickland was born and spent his entire life farming in the Bell Arthur community. He was married to the late Minnie Jones, and was a member of the Bell Arthur Christian Church.

The government has sent General Chen Cheng, former army chief of staff, to Formosa as governor. The Generalissimo's elder son, General Chiang Ching-kuo, also has been assigned to duty there.

Thus we see that it is the Generalissimo's present purpose to hang onto the Nanking-Shanghai sector so long as humanly possible. Formosa will be used as a training center for Nationalist troops and as a base for supplies. If the government has to abandon Nanking, then it likely will withdraw to Formosa, and try to continue the fight from there.

The immediate future, as previously pointed out, depends on whether Chiang's followers stand back of him, or whether they force the conclusion of peace with the Communists.

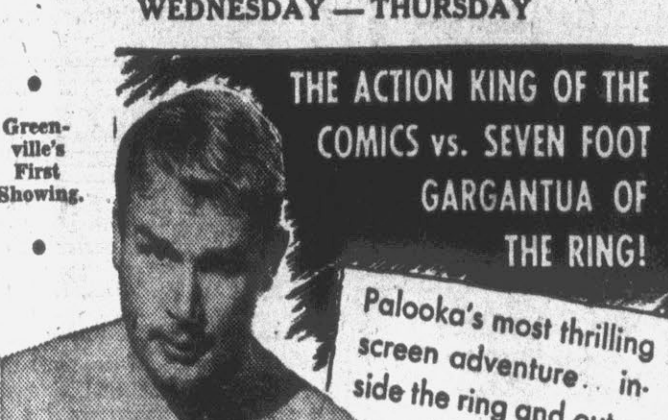

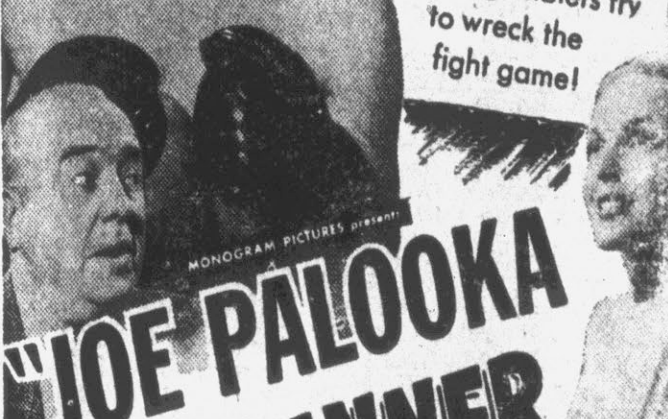

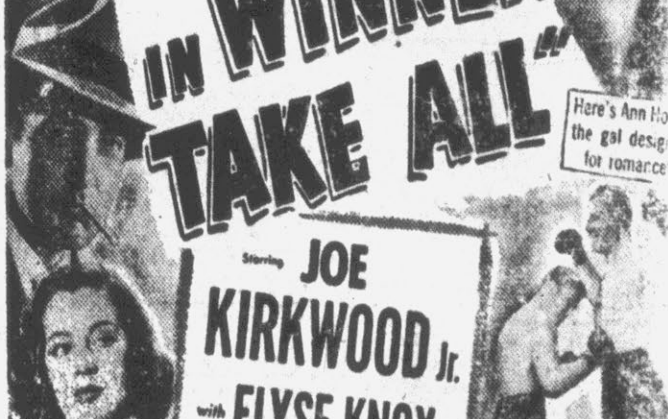
