

Local Cab Driver Brutally Killed; Body Mutilated

**William B. O'Neal
Murdered In Lonely
Area; Authorities
Expect Arrest**

William Benjamin O'Neal, 29-year-old taxi driver, was the victim Saturday night of one of the "most brutal murders" ever committed in Pitt County, Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson said today.

O'Neal's body was found about 11 a.m. Sunday, 40 feet from his car near a tobacco barn on the old Alvin farm in a remote and lonely area, between here and Washington.

Sheriff Tyson said O'Neal's skull was crushed and a fragment of it was found on the ground. His neck was broken, his face was crushed to a pulp. The bones in one hand were all broken. His nose and ears were slashed, both hands bore knife marks, and his back had been slashed.

The sheriff said the murder was evidently committed by some sadist because the body showed that O'Neal had been tortured. Two long knife wounds, a foot long, were carved in straight lines up and down his back. The side of his head was partly imbedded in the soft earth from the crushing blow of a bloody brick found near the body.

O'Neal, a driver for Moye's Taxi Service, was last seen alive Saturday night about 9 o'clock. LeRoy Smith, a Negro, discovered the body Sunday morning and reported it to authorities.

There was evidence O'Neal put up a vigorous fight to save his life. There was blood inside and outside the tobacco barn. A score or more tobacco sticks were broken, indicated that the assassin had broken them while beating the prostrate and dying man on the ground.

Coroner Griffin H. Rouse will hold an inquest after authorities make further investigation. Authorities said they have a clue that probably will lead to the arrest of the murderer.

O'Neal was a veteran of World War II and was a prisoner of war in Germany for 15 months.

Born and reared near Bell Arthur, O'Neal entered the Army in October, 1942, and served until September, 1945. He was the son of the late W. B. O'Neal and Mrs. Mary O'Neal of Greenville. He was married to the former Virginia Dixon of Greenville.

Surviving are his wife and mother, one brother, Sidney O'Neal of near Greenville; three sisters, Mrs. Herman Pollard of near Walstonburg, Mrs. Aza R. Waters of near Greenville, and Mrs. Kelly Nobles of Greenville.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. today from the S. G. Wilkerson and Sons Funeral Home, conducted by the Rev. J. A. Neilson, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist Church, assisted by the Rev. C. J. Harris, Free Will Baptist minister of near Cherry Hill Cemetery.

The General Welfare
Individuals Can Quit Their Jobs As They Please, It's Their Right; But Can All The Workers In A Given Industry Strike, Thus Strangling The Nation? Issues

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—In this country does a man have the right to quit his job if he dislikes the working conditions?

"Yes," you say. "In this country every man is free to do as he pleases so long as he doesn't hurt someone else."

But does a man in an industry which affects the public health and welfare, like a railroad have a right to quit if he dislikes his job?

Again you say "yes" for the same reason as before. But then comes a bigger question.

Do all the railroad workers, banded together in a union, have a right to quit their job in a strike over working conditions?

Remember, before you say "yes," what a railroad strike might mean. If it lasted long enough it might starve the nation and cause a revolution to stop it and get food to the people.

Faced with that, you may say, "No. A union in a vital industry like that should not be allowed to strike."

But isn't that contradicting what you just said a minute ago, when

Messick Announces W. E. Dole Accepting Position; Brings Promising Record; Boone To Continue As Assistant Coach

East Carolina Teachers College will begin the 1949 football season with a new coach.

W. E. Dole, now football mentor at the Fayetteville high school and one of the outstanding coaches in North Carolina high-school athletics, has accepted a position at the college and will be on hand to get the local Pirates in shape for next fall's schedule, President John D. Messick of East Carolina announced here this afternoon. Dole replaces Coach Jim Johnson, head coach at the college for the past three years who resigned his position here early in the winter.

Jack Boone, who joined the college staff last September, will continue his work as assistant coach. During his college days Boone was Little All-American star for Elton Rams, professional team.

Dole has chalked up an impressive record of wins during the past two seasons at Fayetteville. With a total of only three losses and only one tie, Dole's football squad has a record of 28 wins for 1946-1947 and 1947-1948.

East Carolina's new coach is a native of Michigan. He received his education at the University of West Virginia, where he was awarded the B.S. degree, and later earned

the master's degree at New York University. He began his coaching career in West Virginia and remained in that state until he joined the Navy in 1942. During this time he was president of the West Virginia State Physical Education Association.

Look For Aid From South On Labor Bill

**Predict 14 Southern
Solons Will Join
With Republicans In
Preserving Parts Of
Taft-Hartley Act**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Republican Senators predicted today that about 14 Southern Democrats will join at least 30 Republicans in voting to preserve most provisions of the Taft-Hartley labor law.

If true, that would give the Taft-Hartley defenders a majority of senate votes in the furious Congressional fight which is now in its early—but already violent—stages.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic leader of the senate, promptly told a reporter the Republican claim of support is only "political propaganda" and "speculation."

Lucas declined to make a claim of his own. When asked whether he has made a senate survey to discover the chances of Taft-Hartley repeal, he said:

"No, I haven't, and the Republicans haven't either."

Meantime the flustered senate labor committee, behind schedule, struggled into the last four days and nights of its highly emotional hearings on the Truman Administration's labor bill. The committee's present deadline is Thursday night.

During the first six days of the hearing, there were such unwhittled utterances as these from the dignified Senators:

"You keep your mouth shut!" "Double cross!" "False pretense!" "Apologize!" "Blackguard!" "Bulldoze!" "On a personal basis!" "On its political merits alone!" "Filibuster!" "No longer running the Senate!" "Discourtesy!" "Seeking headlines!" "Bad taste!"

**West's Blizzard Relief
Work Hit By New Snow**

Slashing storms had opened up a new front today against the armies of rescuers in the western blizzard areas while hammering again at some sections of the high plains.

High winds in Wyoming piled deep snow drifts back onto highways and rail lines, bringing traffic to another halt. A Burlington Lines bus with 36 passengers was stalled 42 miles west of Casper, Wyo., and a convoy of 14 truck loads of hay for snowbound ranches was marooned south of the city.

The newest storm swept in from the Pacific Ocean yesterday and dumped deep snow on sections of Washington, Oregon and northern California. The rest of the nation generally had fair weather today except a band of rain from the lower lakes southward through the upper Ohio Valley and over most of the southeast.

Temperatures were mostly below normal but not severe.

Gov. Val Peterson of Nebraska yesterday declared four more of the state's counties to be within the emergency area of last month's blizzard and asked the Fifth Army to include them in their program of rescue operations. The additional counties brought to 44 the number completely in the state's emergency area along with parts of five others.

In extending the emergency, Gov. Peterson said the residents in the counties had believed they could dig out without help but have found the job too great.

**Truman Looking
For A Vacation**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—President Truman is considering a flight to Key West in early March for a vacation.

While there has been no White House announcement, several close to the President say he wants to get away for a rest. They add that it will not be possible for him to leave for the naval submarine station at Key West until sometime in early March.

Costly Programs By States Push Budget Upward

**Virtually All Of 48
States Plan Record
Spending; Added
Services Sought**

Chicago, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The nation's cost of state government is going up by more than two and a quarter billion dollars.

The larger budgets are caused by greater demands for education, for generally rising costs of services and materials, and for expansion programs for mental hospitals, highways, and public welfare.

The dollar size of budget plans has pumped in all 44 states where comparable figures are available.

An Associated Press survey showed that the total budget requests or grants for the 1949 fiscal period in 44 states is \$11,524,200,000.

The comparable figure for the previous period is \$9,286,300,000 this represents grants by 45 states for 1947 or 1948 periods.

Education is the chief reason for the increases in more than half of the states. At least 26 states find their biggest single money problem is for higher teacher salaries, for more state money to help local schools, and for improvement of state-aided colleges and universities.

Fourteen states report their operating budgets are up chiefly because they must pay more for wages, supplies, equipment and buildings.

Seven find the biggest item responsible for the boost involves mental hospitals and other welfare and health institutions.

Six others need more for pensions, relief and other social benefits. Highways and veterans assistance are other principal factors.

**Union Organizer
Held In Shooting**

**Policeman Killed
On Investigating A
Demonstration**

Harlan, Ky., Feb. 7.—(AP)—A union labor organizer was being held under guard at the hospital here today in connection with a shooting affray at nearby Lynch, Ky., in which a policeman was killed.

The organizer and another policeman were wounded.

Police Chief John Greenlee identified the man being held as Lawrence Pennington of Clover Fork, Ky., organizer for the United Construction Workers Union, an affiliate of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers of America.

The chief said no formal charge had been placed against him.

Greenlee said John Yelonoski, 40, a member of the Lynch police force for 17 years, was killed and Patrolman Harry Carroll, 35, was wounded. He added that both Carroll and Pennington received leg wounds and that neither appeared to be wounded seriously. Carroll also is in the Harlan hospital.

The shooting resulted when members of the Lynch police department investigated a union labor demonstration Saturday night outside the commissary operated in connection with the United States Coal and Coke Company's big coal mine at Lynch.

Greenlee said Pennington shot Yelonoski through the head and Carroll in the leg when the officers arrived to investigate confusion which resulted when about 35 men, headed by Pennington, assembled outside the company store and attempted to talk to employees as they quit work.

Hoover Commission Seeks Vast Reshuffling Of Govm't

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The Hoover Commission called today for a vast government reshuffling which would squeeze 65 agencies into a tight group one-third that size, all under firm control of the President.

Reporting to Congress on its 16-month search for ways to streamline the government, the group headed by former President Herbert Hoover urged giving the President broad new powers over his official family—powers it said are needed in the present "critical state of world affairs."

It said that under the present set-up, "authority is diffused, lines of authority are confused, staff services are insufficient."

To remedy that, the commission proposed a government pyramid based on the 2,000,000 federal employees and building up to a score of top-level agencies directly under the President—instead of the 65 which now report to him "if they report to anyone."

At the head of this chain of command the President would be fortified with new staff officials, a powerful "managerial arm" in an expanded budget office, much wider powers to reorganize government offices, and authority to name many officials without the Senate's approval.

Omitted from the list of offices tabbed for streamlining were nine "regulatory" agencies, including three—the Interstate Commerce Commission, Federal Reserve Board and Securities and Exchange Commission—which many congressmen have proposed putting out of the

President's reorganization reach. The report was the first chapter of a massive blueprint for federal reform—which Hoover has said could save the taxpayers "billions" to be handed Congress in 15 installments before March 31.

Today's chapter is only a "general skeleton," the report said, of the biggest reorganizing job in history. It promised that later reports—three a week—will fill in that framework with the details of proposed mergers and abolitions and the patching of "weakened or actually broken" lines of authority.

The 12-member commission is half Democratic, half Republican. It was created by law as the "commission on organization of the executive branch of government" and its proposals are expected to carry unusual weight in Congress.

**Norway Looks To
U. S. For Advice**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Norway's Foreign Minister turned to the state department today for the U. S. side of the issue: Should he back the Russian or the American plan for guarding his country against aggression?

Secretary of State Acheson was expected to urge him, in effect, to line up with the United States, Canada and Western Europe in a firm North Atlantic Alliance.

The Norwegian diplomat, Halvard M. Lange, arrived here yesterday amid mounting concern in his country over a sudden offer by Russia to conclude a non-aggression pact with the Norwegian government.

U. S. officials doubted in advance that Acheson would offer any specific advice on the course Norway should adopt toward this Russian move. They saw the secretary's job as making it clear, by presenting facts, that Norway could best protect its interests by rejecting Russia's offer.

Acheson and the American government were reported ready to assure Lange that no bases will be required on Norwegian soil if Norway decides to join the North Atlantic defense arrangement.

Russia's apparent unwillingness to accept Norway's assurance that it does not contemplate offering such bases has stirred anxiety in Norwegian government circles.

**States Righters
Launch Campaign**

Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 7.—(AP)—States Rights Democrats today will formally launch their program for a national educational campaign to impress upon the American people the "dangers of the current trend toward bureaucracy."

The States Rights Executive Committee, headed by former Gov. Ben Laney of Arkansas, is expected to complete and adopt plans at a meeting here for a permanent organization to continue the fight for state sovereignty.

**Four Men Die In
Blazing Shack**

Kinston, N. C., Feb. 7.—(AP)—Four men burned to death early today in a fire at a small shack in suburban Happersville.

Zack Potter, 38, rescued a crippled man and went back into the flaming structure only to meet death.

Potter, who resided about two miles from Kinston, was the only victim positively identified.

Amos Moore, the cripple who was saved, tentatively identified the other three as Raymond Ackerman, Allen Massengill and Earl Mabes.

**Bogart, Davis
Lead Wage Race**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Humphrey Bogart and Bette Davis of the movies have the new leads in that serial drama, "Who made the most money?"

Bogart, with \$461 topped all today in the treasury's latest listing of top money earners, which covered calendar 1946 and business fiscal years ending in 1947. The earnings were all before taxes which take a major part of six figure incomes.

Betty Grable, who had gone out front for her sex in the verdict list, with \$299,333 was eclipsed by Miss Davis with the top female pay of \$328,000.

Opinion Upheld

The North Carolina Attorney General's office this afternoon confirmed City Attorney R. B. Lee's interpretation of the general statute concerning the manner of changing the form of city government.

Under the statute a petition containing the names of 25 percent of the city's voters must request an election on the matter before any official action can be taken.

The Greenville Board of Aldermen will meet tonight in the Aldermen's room of the city hall at 7:30 to continue the meeting which was adjourned last Thursday night.

Soviet Pact Offer For Sweden, Denmark Seen

Fountain, Feb. 7.—The March of Dimes drive in the Fountain community has been completed with a total of \$508.15 collected and turned over to J. W. Overton, treasurer of the Pitt County polio fund.

Mrs. Edna Earle Baker, principal of the Fountain elementary school, said \$293.89 in nickels and dimes was donated by the 243 children enrolled in the school, and that many children who were unable to bring money for the March of Dimes drive brought "eggs, chickens, collards" and other produce which was sold and the money given to the polio fund.

From two square dances held in Fountain, and from collection boxes placed in different parts of the town \$203.30 was collected for the March of Dimes.

**Iran's Shah Will
Not Step Aside**

Tehran, Iran, Sunday, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi told the Iranian people tonight the attempt on his life Friday has not influenced in any way his decision to serve Iran.

The 29-year-old Iranian ruler, target for five shots fired by a newspaper man later identified as a member of the Leftist Tudeh party, said in a nationwide broadcast the assassination attempt has reinforced his decision to sacrifice his life for his countrymen, if necessary.

**Attlee Declines
Mediation Role**

London, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee said today he sees no reason why he should invite President Truman and Prime Minister Stalin to meet in London. For one thing, they haven't asked him to.

The newspapers delivered their strongest attack yet on the North Atlantic pact. The lead editorial in Pravda, official Communist newspaper, termed the pact "a concentrated expression of a policy of aggression and international risk-taking" and "the most important lever for preparing a new world war."

Yesterday's Soviet press seemed to indicate quite clearly that the Russians do not intend to let this matter lie.

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**Prelate Awaits Verdict
On Communist Charges**

Budapest, Hungary, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, the 56-year-old leader of Hungary's 7,000,000 Catholics, today awaited the verdict of a People's court on charges of treason against the Communist-dominated government.

Presiding judge Vilmos Olthys and four lay-jurists who heard the dramatic three-day trial of Cardinal Mindszenty and six others accused with him are to hand down their judgment tomorrow at 9 a. m.

If found guilty the Cardinal faces possible death by hanging.

The verdict will come 44 days after the Cardinal was jailed. Besides treason he was accused of spying and black market money deals. His arrest followed a long and bitter battle between Cardinal Mindszenty and the government, over state seizure of Catholic schools and other issues.

The Hungarian Communists press strongly denounced the Cardinal as the court weighed its verdict. The official Communist newspaper Szabad Nep termed the trial a "defeat for the west" in the cold war.

The paper, in a front page editorial, described the Cardinal as "a wretched worm, a frightened scoundrel who abandoned his principles and aims, and is scared only for his miserable life."

**Ex-GI's Testify
In 'Sally' Trial**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Prosecutors called on more ex-GI's today to tell of being interviewed by "Axis Sally" as they lay wounded in a Paris hospital.

Mildred E. Gillars, 48, on trial for treason in U. S. district court is accused of incorporating soldiers' messages to relatives at home in Nazi propaganda broadcasts.

**Archduke Claims
Cardinal Faces
Hard Sentence**

Salisbury, N. C., Feb. 7.—(AP)—Already drugged and tortured, Cardinal Mindszenty now faces a sentence "worse than death," says Archduke Otto of Austria.

The would-be monarch in a speech here Saturday predicted the Cardinal will be convicted tomorrow of treason by the Hungarian court. But, Otto added, his death sentence will be commuted.

"That," he explained, "would be worse than death, for the Cardinal would be sentenced to a labor camp and could not possibly live more than three years."

**Near-Darkness
At Mid-Morning**

New York, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Virtual total darkness settled over New York City at mid-morning today. It was caused by a cold front passing by.

Cars groped through the streets with headlights on. Office workers peered from skyscraper windows.

The Weather Bureau said it was simply this: a warm southerly wind coming this way met a northerly air front coming this way. Result: darkness. Forecast: clearing.

Hoover Attacks Propagandists For 'Exemption'

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover today denounced what he called drives by "propagandists" to exempt some agencies from government reorganization plans.

The former President said these "propagandists" are inside and outside the government. In response to prompting before the Senate Expenditures Committee, Hoover specifically referred to the proposal to merge U. S. Army engineers into a civilian public works agency.

Senator Glen Taylor (D-Iowa) remarked that the committee has received 2,000 telegrams protesting this plan. Hoover said:

"They (Army engineers) have mobilized their agency and their friends all over the country. They have prejudged the case before Congress has had a chance to see the evidence."

He added that it would be "a disaster" to exempt any agency. He said such exemptions—which he labeled "grasshopper bites"—had mostly killed past reorganization plans.

Shortly before Hoover testified the government's reorganization commission which he heads sent Congress a report calling for broad new powers for the President over his official family.

The report, first of a series, was based on a 16-month study of means to streamline the government. It proposed a vast reshuffling which would squeeze 65 agencies into a tight group one-third that size, all under firm control of the President.

The House, meanwhile, appeared ready to approve a bill giving President Truman broad authority to reorganize almost all of the executive departments. The bill was the first order of business for the House session today. Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) predicted approval by a three-to-one margin.

**Outline Foreign
Aid Proposals**

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—America's multi-billion dollar foreign aid program, its progress and future, comes up for study on Capitol Hill this week.

State department and economic cooperation administration officials are putting together the final draft of their recommendations for carrying out the second year of the Marshall plan.

It's a program expected to cost around \$5,500,000,000 during the coming 15 months.

**Plan Judgment
Gandhi Slayers**

New Delhi, India, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Judgment will be pronounced Thursday against eight men accused of conspiring in the assassination of Mohandas K. Gandhi.

The government said, in making the announcement, that strict security measures will be taken in the court and throughout India when the judgment is given at 11:30 a.m. (1 a.m. EST).

**Prepare Atomic
Energy Handbook**

Bethlehem, Pa., Feb. 7.—(AP)—The government is preparing a "primer" to give the American people the story of atomic energy, says David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the atomic energy commission.

Lilienthal, speaking yesterday at mid-year commencement exercises at Lehigh University, said the government also is preparing an atomic weapons' effects handbook for public release.

No More 'Neutrality'

World Divided Into Two Camps; The Decision To Be Made By Norway; Is It Possible For Any Nation To Be Neutral? Past Experiences; Democracy Must Take Stand

Is it possible for any nation to maintain neutrality when virtually the whole civilized world is divided into two camps—communists and anti-communists? For that matter, is it wise to try?

Those are the questions in effect I take it, which Norway will try to iron out this week in Washington.

Norwegian Foreign Minister Halvard Lange has arrived in America for conferences on whether his strategically situated country should join the proposed North Atlantic Alliance. This projects a treaty among the United States, Canada, Britain, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg and other nations for self-defense.

The Scandinavian states of Norway, Sweden and Denmark have been invited to consider joining the alliance. Norway has been leaning towards participation. Sweden fears antagonizing Russia, and Denmark is undecided.

Moscow has been trying to intimidate the trio, with special attention to Norway. The Soviet Union sent a pointed note to Oslo, intimating the Norwegians were riding for trouble. The latest Red move is

an offer to conclude a mutual non-aggression pact with Norway—a proposal which still has to be considered by the Oslo parliament.

However, the sturdy Norwegians don't intimidate easily. Foreign Minister Lange is going right ahead and discuss matters with American Secretary of State Dean Acheson. Presumably Norway's decision will depend on the outcome of these discussions. In any event, Foreign Minister Lange made it clear in a speech before his parliament last week that Norway's position will be decided by herself and not by any other nation.

"When we take our stand," he declared, "it cannot be decided for us by what other nations want us to do or not to do. The deciding element must be our own estimation of what secures Norway's interests and best contributes to prevent war."

The 46-year-old Norwegian foreign minister is no tyro in foreign affairs. A member of the Labor party, he has specialized in international relations for many years. His father, Dr. Christian L. Lange

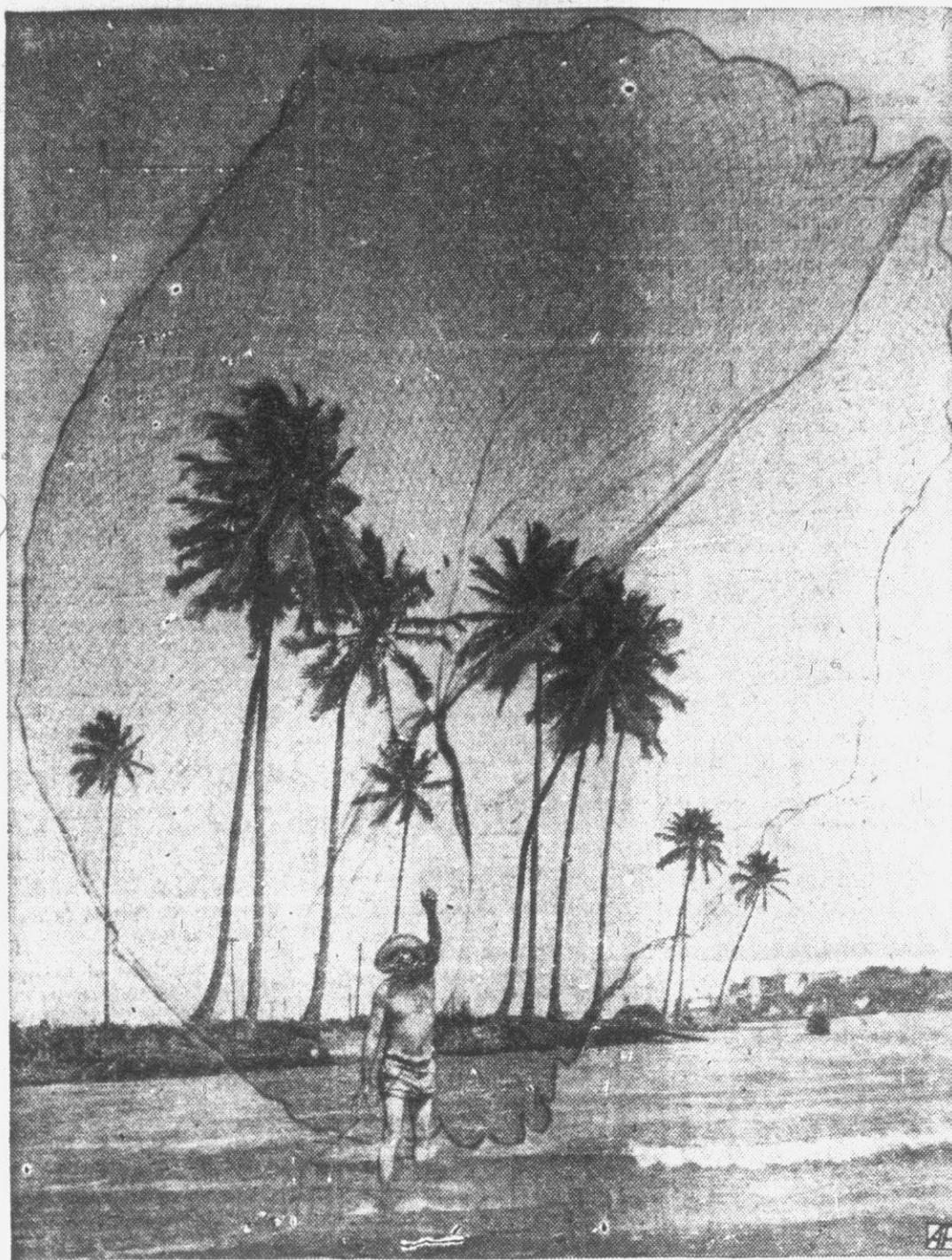
Royall Arrives In Seoul, Korea

'Merci' Train Is Going Southward

Washington, Feb. 7—(AP)—The "Merci" train was heading Southward today—one section of it, at least.

Three cars of the gift-laden special from France were destined for the capital cities of Virginia, North Carolina and Florida, leaving here at 8 a. m. (EST).

First schedule stop was at Quantico, where the marines had planned a 15-minute demonstration.

Arrival at Richmond was scheduled for 11:45 a. m. There the car for Virginia will be dropped off and at 6 p. m. the two other cars are to start their journey again, one to be dropped at Raleigh, N. C. and the other at Tallahassee, Fla.

Some 6,000,000 persons contributed gifts to the train, originated by French railroad veterans as an expression of thanks for the American "friendship train" which distributed food to European needy a year ago.

Yesterday, a torch lighted from the "eternal flame" which burns under the Arc De Triomphe in Paris was presented before the tomb of the Unknown soldier in Arlington Cemetery, just across the Potomac river from Washington.

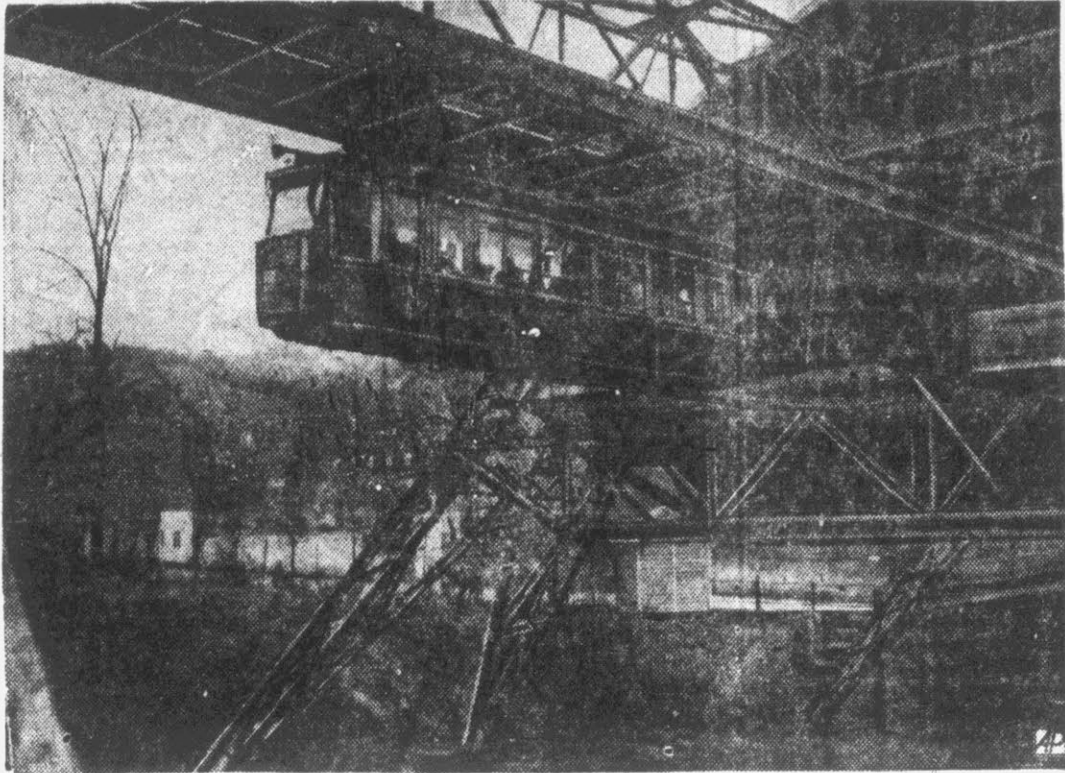
Truman To Greet Raleigh Scout

Dry Forces Win Beer-Wine Vote In Two Counties

North Carolina's dry forces, cheered by sweeping victories in two tests Saturday, today continued their battle to win the entire state.

Continuing along a campaign that has given them county after county during the past year, the dries overwhelmed wets in beer and wine referendums in both Stanly and Rutherford counties Saturday.

In Stanly, which polled approxi-

mately 7,000 votes, the dry margin was roughly 5-1.

Results from Rutherford, scene of several legal battles between wets and dries recently, were even more pronounced for the dries. There the returns showed a 14-1 margin from approximately 11,000 votes. Four of the county's 34 precincts voted unanimously against beer and wine, while only one percent voted wet.

Division Between Premier Govm't

Nanking, Feb. 7—(AP)—China's refugee government in Canton and acting President Li Tsung-Jen are separated by more than distance. There is a marked difference in

policy. Premier Sun Fo brought it into the open over the week-end. Sun warned the Communists they must soften their peace demands or Nationalists will continue the war. The Premier objected particularly to Red demands that Communist listed "war criminals" be handed over. Sun's name is on that list along with that of Li, Chiang Kai Shek, Madame Chiang, her rich brother, T. V. Soong, and others.

Old Nanking associates of the Premier were openly displeased with his Canton statement. One said he

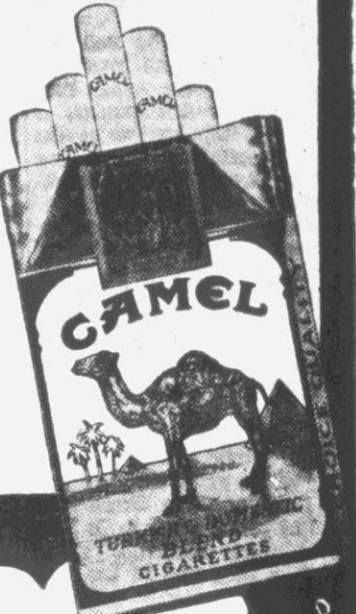
considered it "most unfortunate" that Sun should suggest continuing the war when the slightest tip of the scales might upset peace feelers.

The Premier's South China warning again demonstrated that even if Li managed to get some agreement from the Reds, China leaders might not accept it.

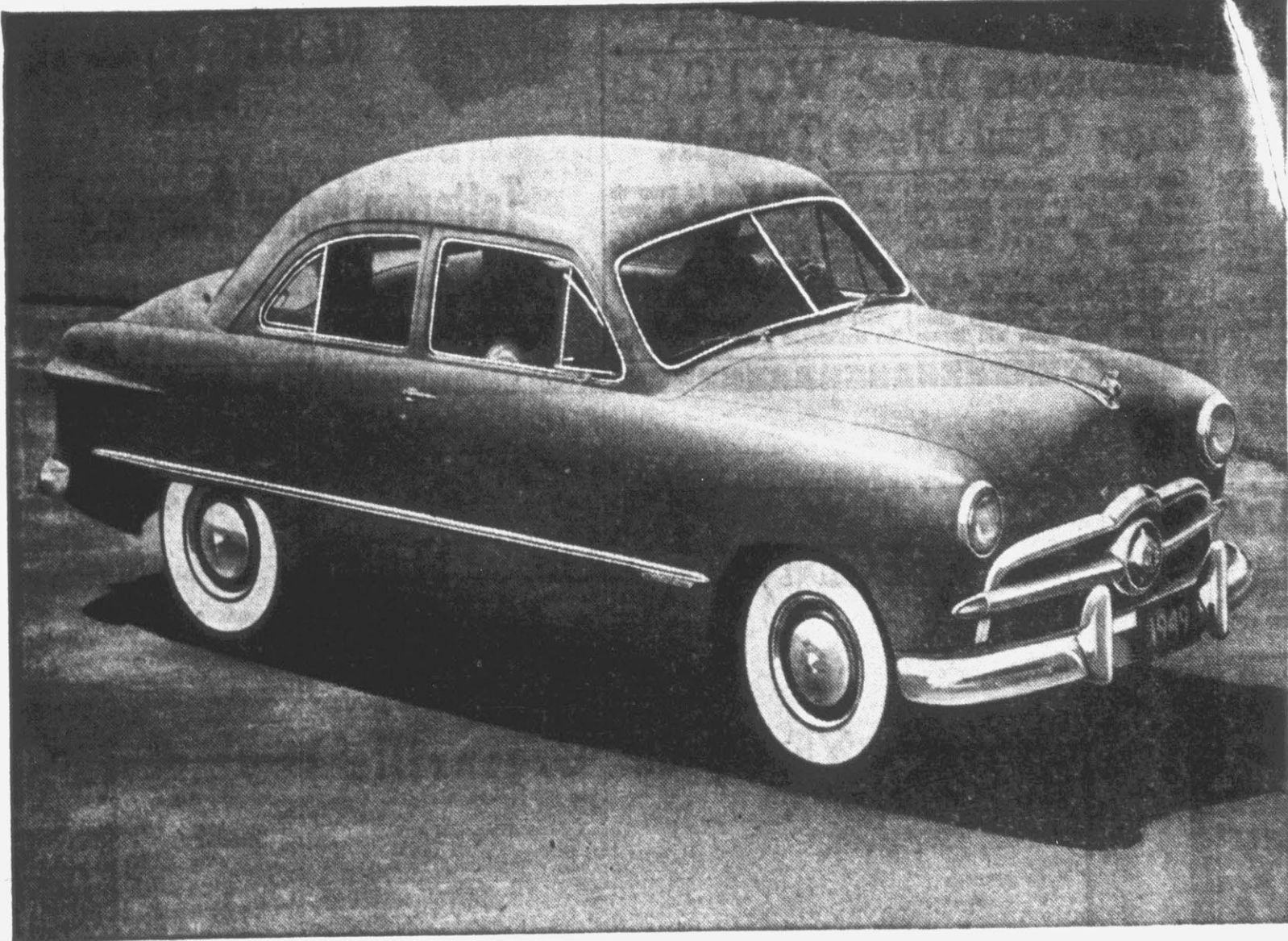

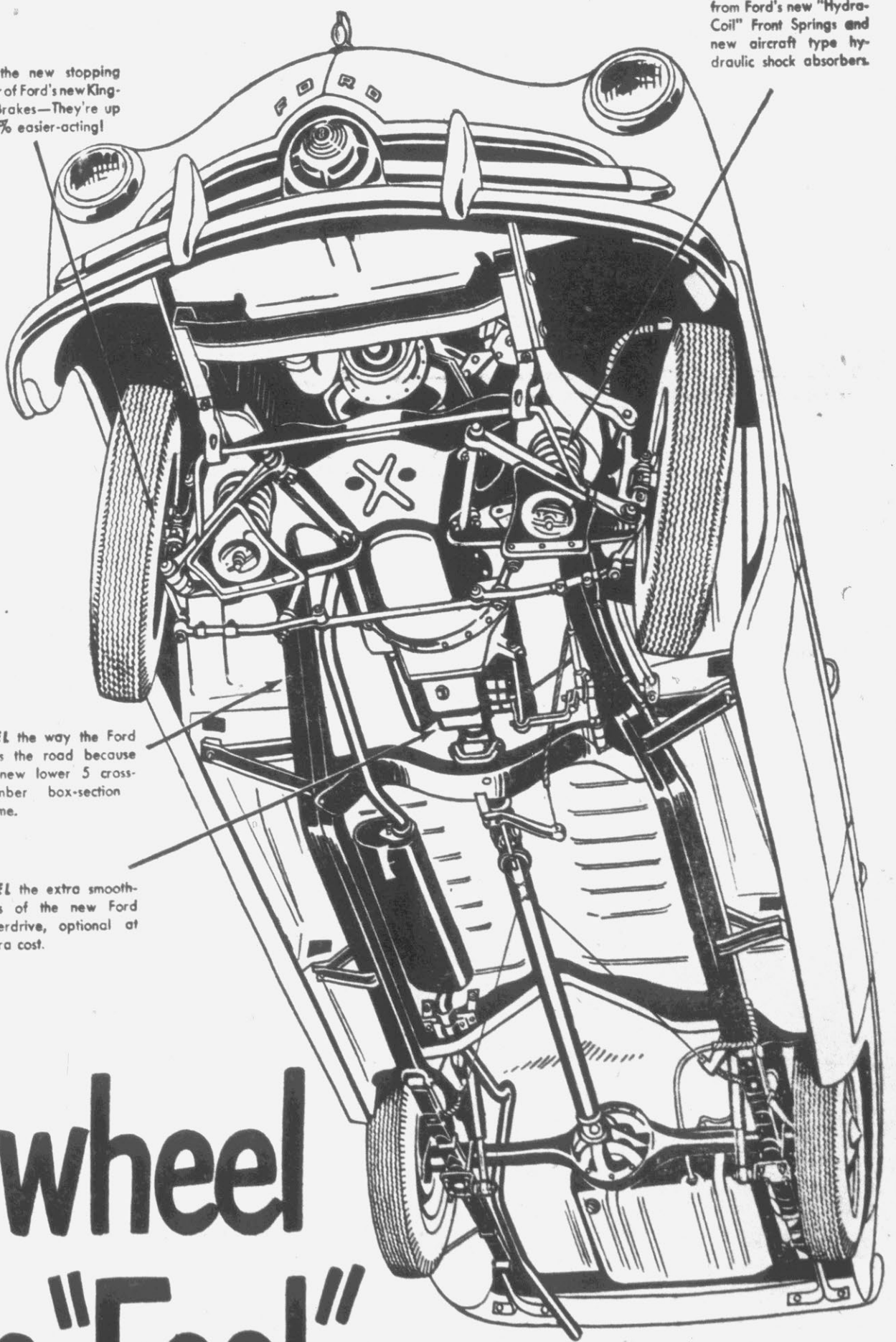

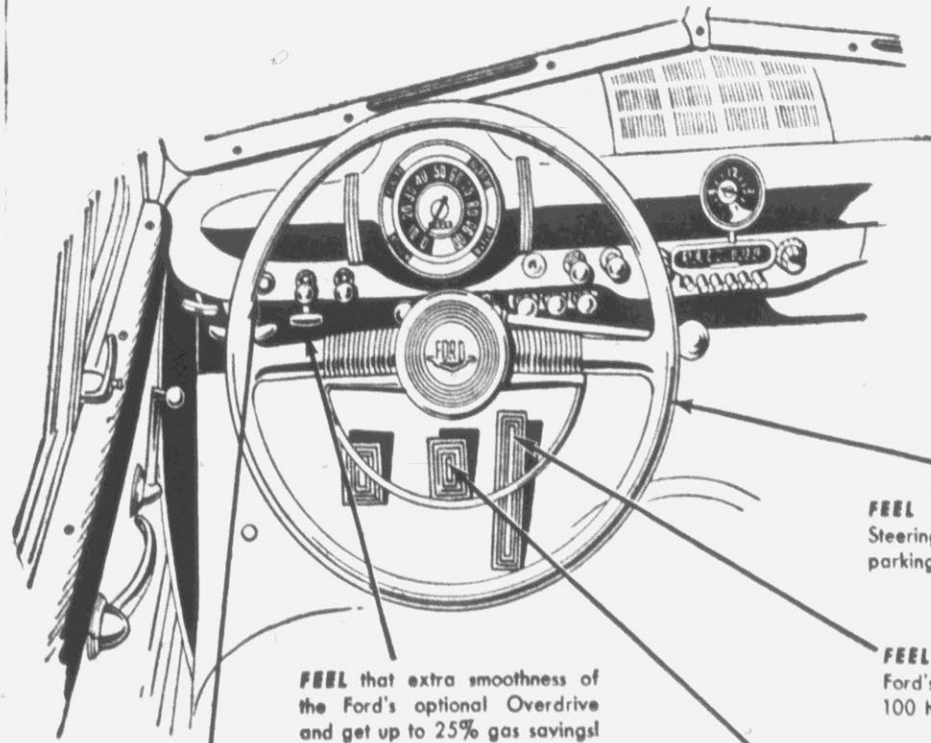

Early Vote On Filibuster Set As Republican Policy

Washington, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Senate Republicans made it party policy today to press for an immediate Senate vote on changing the rules as to curb filibusters.

Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) announced the GOP policy committee had agreed to back a motion by Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) aimed at that. Knowland's motion was to come up in the Senate later in the day.

Democrats already had agreed unanimously to oppose Knowland's move. With a 54 to 42 edge over the Republicans, they were certain of defeating the motion.

On the filibuster issue the situation is this:

The Senate rules committee has before it several resolutions for a change in Senate rules to make it easier to cut off debate. In some situations, there is not a way to halt debate. A small group can keep talking, or filibustering, and prevent a vote on the legislation before the Senate.

Knowland contends the rules committee ought to go ahead and bring a proposed rule change before the Senate. Technically, his motion was to take one of the resolutions from the committee and bring it to the Senate floor for a vote.

The Democrats, controlling the rules committee, replied that they would do things their own way; that they weren't going to let a Republican run things. The committee has a meeting scheduled Wednesday when it may decide whether to send a rule change proposal to the Senate floor.

was an outstanding educator who represented his country at the League of Nations and other international bodies. Dr. Christian Lange was co-recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1921.

Foreign Minister Lange also has

had an illuminating personal experience in the matter of whether a nation can remain neutral these days. Norway, Denmark and Sweden were neutrals at the start of World War II. Both Norway and Denmark were overrun ruthlessly by the Germans. Lange himself was imprisoned by the Hitlerites several times.

The problem of the Scandinavian countries certainly isn't easy, sitting as they do under the muzzles of Moscow's big guns. However, they are faced by the fact that Red Russia apparently is bent on remodeling the whole world under rule of an ideology which deprives man of individual rights.

The nations which don't resist the Red revolution will be taken over like Czechoslovakia, Hungary and the rest of the wretched slave states. This means that every nation must take its stand with one side or the other.

You may argue: "This is a free society. I know. But no man's freedom in America is complete. Freedom here is limited and it's limited for the sake of what I just said: the general welfare."

"For instance, there's a law against murder. So that's a limit on the freedom of any man to kill. But that limit on everyone's freedom increases everyone's freedom from fear of being killed. So we yield some freedom to gain some freedom."

"So our problem in this country is how to preserve the most freedom even when we find it necessary to restrict some freedoms for the general welfare."

"A big strike that endangered the general welfare, or led to a revolution that brought on a dictatorship and an end to all freedom, should not be allowed."

Yes, but a strike is labor's biggest and final weapon in trying to force an employer into an agreement on wages and working conditions. And labor fears that once there was a law forbidding strikes in big, vital industries, inch by inch this

power to stop strikes might spread to the most non-vital industries and, in time, prevent all strikes of any kind.

This is one of the problems Congress faces in trying to figure out a new labor law that will protect the freedom of individuals and unions and at the same time protect the general welfare from the damage of a big strike.

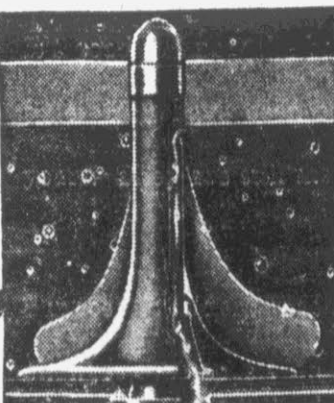

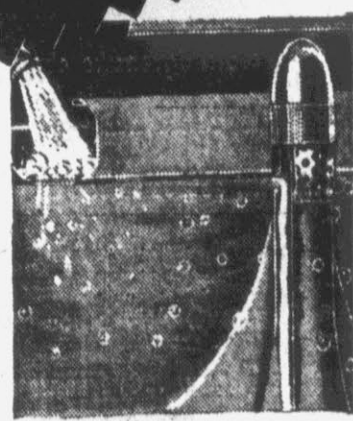
