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Resignations In Gov't Sets Off A 'Talent Hunt'

President Stresses Difficulty In Finding 'Iron Men' For Federal Jobs

Washington, April 22.—(AP)—An increasing turnover in President Truman's official family set him off on a search today for iron men who are willing to work for the government at comparatively low pay.

That's the kind of a fellow a government official has to be these days—an iron man with an elephant hide who can get by on a small salary—Mr. Truman told his news conference yesterday.

The resignations of Secretary of the Army Royal and Robert F. Bacher, atomic energy commissioner, led the president to expound again his theory that it's tough to get good men to take government jobs—and sometimes tougher to keep them.

The president announced the appointment of David K. E. Bruce to be ambassador to France, replacing Jefferson Caffery, who is coming home to an undesignated job.

It was the second diplomatic shift in as many days. Previously Adm. Alan G. Kirk was chosen to succeed Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith as ambassador at Moscow.

Mr. Truman offered no comment when asked who would take Bruce's spot as the European recovery mission chief in France. Shortly after news of Bruce's new job was released, however, the economic cooperation administration announced that he would be succeeded by Barry Bingham, Louisville publisher and editor.

The president had no announcement to make on a successor for Royal in the army department post. In an exchange of letters, Royal said he was going back to civil life convinced the army is in excellent condition and "that war is not imminent."

The president's statement that he has no successor picked seemed to throw a bit of cold water on talk of Curtis Calder, Bronxville, N. Y., business man, as a possible appointee.

Mr. Truman said the army department can be run temporarily by one of Royal's assistants. "That was something of a blow to friends of Gordon Gray, assistant secretary, who hoped he might have a chance for Royal's job."

The president commented that he thinks Secretary of Defense Johnson, who took over this month, is doing a good job. He always knew that Johnson would be successful in that sport, the president added.

Mr. Truman took some obvious delight in stepping firmly on rumors that Attorney General Clark might go back to private law practice. Tom Clark is staying, the president said in a tone indicating that that is a load off his mind.

Detective Capt. R. E. Goodwin stated that Miss Crisp's injuries consisted of a broken rib, abrasions on both knees and a blow on the head received when she was thrown to the pavement in front of 330 Hillsboro Street by an unidentified assailant who snatched her purse and then escaped.

Housing Explanation
Senator Taft Tells Why There Is A Shortage, Why There Are Slums And How They Got That Way; Why More Homes Haven't Been Built; Taking The Long View

Washington, April 22.—(P)—A simple explanation of America's housing problem and why there are slums and how they got that way has been given by Senator Taft, Ohio Republican.

In the Senate debate yesterday on the public housing bill, Taft who supports the bill which would supply government money to help build homes and wipe out slums, said what follows:

In this country there are about 35,000,000 married couples, some with families. About 3,000,000 of them live doubled up with other families.

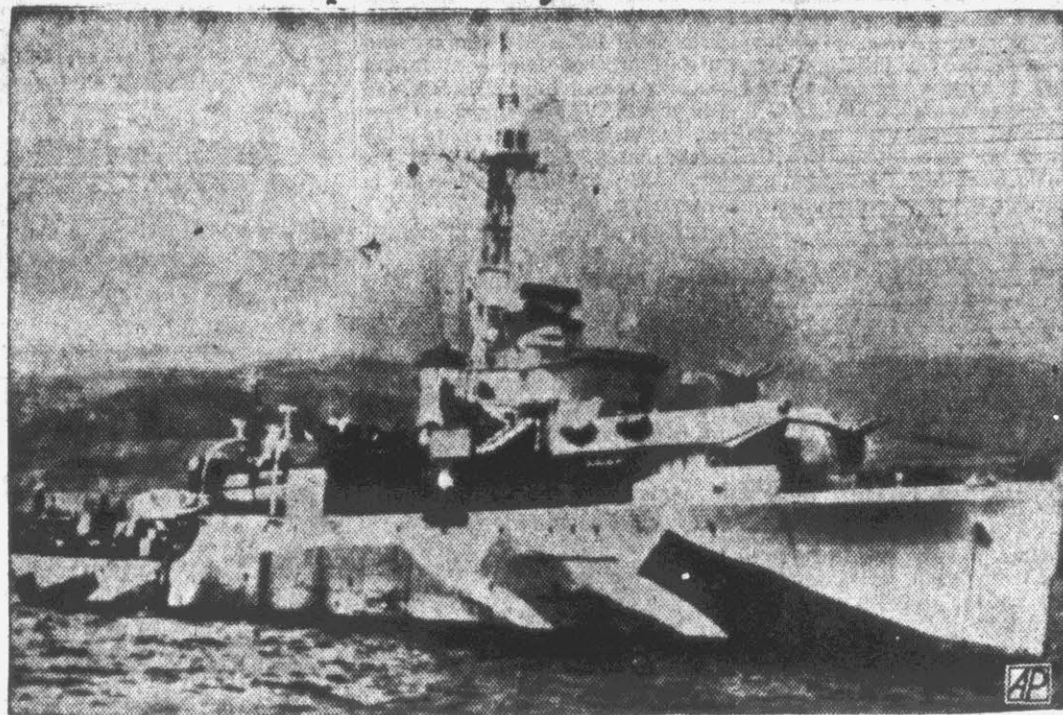
And of that 3,000,000, about one and a half million want homes of their own. But—

Between five and six million housing units are substandard and about half of them—possibly as many as 4,000,000—are in slums.

But why haven't we provided enough decent homes for people? The cost of houses is too high, Taft said. He added:

"If homes could be purchased for half of what they are now being purchased for, I do not believe we would have any slum problem or any

Chinese Reds Meet Little Real Opposition In Attacks

Reds Again Fire On British Ship

Amethyst Under Small Arms Fire On Moving Down River

Shanghai, April 22.—(AP)—A sorely-stricken British sloop was fired on by Reds on the Yangtze again today in a renewal of clashes which have cost the British heavily the past three days.

The sloop Amethyst, first to be attacked by Red gunners on the north bank Wednesday, messaged that it was under Red small arms fire when it moved 10 miles down the Yangtze today.

Nevertheless, the sloop advised the British naval attaché's office, it was able to discharge 16 wounded. These wounded were placed aboard a train bound for Shanghai. The Amethyst presumably remained anchored near the south bank about 70 miles east of Nanking.

Three other British men-of-war which tried to go to the Amethyst's relief lay at Shanghai wharves, crippled by Communist shell fire. All four had fired back on their attackers.

The death toll of the attack by Communist artillery on the four British warships was believed to be 44. An estimated 84 were injured but the toll may be higher. Communist casualties were not known.

The U.S. naval hospital ship Repose arrived at Shanghai from the Western Fleet base at Tsingtao and

Final Action

Raleigh, April 22.—(AP)—Legislation to make the state a self-insurer for public school buildings was enacted by the General Assembly today.

Final action on the measure came when the senate concurred in a house amendment.

Governor Names Negro To Board Of Education

Raleigh, N.C., April 22.—(AP)—Governor Scott today named a Negro college president to the State Board of Education. He will be the first Negro ever to serve on the board.

At the same time, the governor named three other persons to fill vacancies on the board.

The appointments are subject to confirmation by the Legislature in joint session.

Dr. H. L. Trigg, Negro president of St. Augustine's College here, was appointed for a term expiring April 1, 1957 as a member-at-large of the board.

Others named were Paul S. Oliver of Marietta, fourth district; Sanford Martin of Winston-Salem, fifth district; Claude Ferrell of Elkin, seventh district.

Martin and Oliver were appointed for terms expiring on April 1, 1957, and Ferrell for a term expiring on April 1, 1955.

Martin, editor of the Winston-Salem Journal, was reappointed, and Dr. Trigg, Oliver and Ferrell replaced Mrs. R. S. Ferguson of Taylorsville, H. E. Stacy of Lumberton, and A. C. Edwards of Hokeport.

Governor Scott has stated repeatedly that he planned to give Negroes greater representation on state boards and commissions.

Robeson Concert Goes Political

Stockholm, Sweden, April 22.—(AP)—Paul Robeson's concert last night turned into a political row.

The trouble started when the noted American Negro baritone sang a new Russian anthem. The first verse, sung in Russian, was greeted quietly. However, when Robeson sang the second verse in English, which most of the audience understood, the crowd started a demonstration which for a time drowned out the singer.

Anti-Communists whistled loudly (the Swedish equivalent of boos) and many left the hall in protest.

Yangtze River Ports, Cities And Towns Easily Fall Before Advancing Communists; Nanking Officialdom Fleeing

Nanking, April 22.—(AP)—South Yangtze valley ports, cities and towns fell like clay pigeons today before a mounting Red onslaught.

So weak was government opposition that wholesale desertions to the Communists was feared. Foreign military observers said a general troop withdrawal may have been ordered.

Nanking was fast emptying of officialdom. High level Chinese, wearing white helmets for the tropics and many swinging tennis rackets, bolted for departing planes.

Acting President Li Tsung-jen, Premier Ho Ying-chin and Gen. Pai Chung-hsi, commander of the central front, flew to Hangchow for an important meeting with retired President Chiang Kai-shek. Chiang may be asked to take over the government again.

Most important cities below the Yangtze in Red hands were Kiangyin, 85 miles east of here, Kweichin, 130 miles southwest, and dozens of lesser places between Wuhu, 60 miles southwest of here, and Anking, 180 miles southwest.

From Kweichin the Communists could march straight to the sea at Hangchow, less than 200 miles away. Such a move would isolate Shanghai and Nanking to the north.

There was no way of estimating the Communist strength across the river. The Red radio said 300,000 troops had swarmed over the river in small wooden boats between Wuhu and Anking alone. This figure probably was exaggerated.

Fires from Communist shells burned in Pukow, across the river from Nanking. The capital's populace was not overly excited. Most people had become resigned to the Reds' taking the capital.

The Foreign Office urged foreign embassies to follow it to Shanghai or Canton. U.S. Ambassador J. Leighton Stuart had made no plans to leave Nanking.

The allocation for teachers salaries, however, compares with \$101,835,812 being spent this biennium.

With the additional \$4,000,000 the bill calls for spending \$402,000,000 to operate state agencies during the 1949-51 biennium. An allocation of \$2,000,000 from the post-war reserve fund to help counties to build schools would bring the total to \$427,000,000.

This compares with \$332,406,773 being spent this biennium.

Senator Edwin Pate of Scotland told the Senate that the conference approved bill calls for spending \$5,122,000 more than the state will collect during the biennium, including surpluses which will be on hand at the end of this fiscal year.

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Assembly Speeds To Adjournment

Biggest Appropriation Bill In N.C. History To Be Passed

Raleigh, April 22.—(AP)—As the Legislature worked for adjournment tomorrow night, the biggest appropriations bill in state history came up for second reading in the House today.

The adjournment drive was given impetus when a conference committee reached an agreement on the \$427,000,000 spending bill yesterday, and Senate and House quickly approved the conference report.

Economy forces in the Senate won another victory when the conference group recommended addition of \$4,000,000 to the budget for the teachers' salaries, making the total allocated for the biennium for this purpose \$142,267,146.

The legislators were told this will give the teachers a pay increase of 25.1 per cent as compared with a boost of 50 per cent asked by the State Board of Education and 40 per cent requested by Governor Scott.

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Truman Asks Congress To Pass Health Insurance Plan

Washington, April 22.—(AU)—President Truman asked Congress again today to vote compulsory medical insurance as part of a national health program.

In a special message to the legislators, Mr. Truman said the "traditional method" of paying for medical care "cannot meet the health needs of today."

He recommended that Congress provide for a system of government payment of medical bills from a fund to be collected by special taxes.

Mr. Truman also asked:

1. Government financial aid for the expansion of medical schools
2. Federal aid for "construction of hospitals and other medical facilities in communities where they are needed."
3. Increased federal grants to help state and local governments in "controlling certain diseases" and promoting "maternal and child health services, services for crippled children, and general public health activities."

Mr. Truman sent a 3,000-word message to Capitol Hill. His proposals, because of past advocacy, had been anticipated and lines already were forming for a battle over the recommendations.

Some administration backers say they see practically no chance that the program will be enacted in this session of Congress.

The American Medical Association has already begun a campaign against it. Labor organizations are accusing the American Medical Association of setting up a \$3,500,000 fund to fight the program.

The AMA fight is centered on the proposal for compulsory health insurance. Some of its leaders say that would mean "socialized medicine" but some other medical men are backing it.

In his message the president said that voluntary insurance plans have proved inadequate to meet the need, "most of them offering 'only very limited protection.'"

He went on to reply to some of the attacks which have been made on his proposals, offering first in 1945 by saying:

"Health insurance is a method of paying for medical care. It will not require doctors to become employees of the government. It will not disturb the freedom of doctors and hospitals to determine the nature and extent of treatment to be given. It will not interfere with the personal relationship between doctor and patient."

"Under such a plan, patients will remain free to choose their own doctors, and doctors will remain free to accept or reject patients. Moreover, patients, doctors and hospitals will remain free to make their own arrangements for care outside the (government) insurance system if they so choose."

The president gave no estimate of how much his program might cost although he said he recognized that many people "are concerned" about that.

The fate of the bill in the House—which is in recess until Monday—is uncertain. Somewhat similar bills passed by the Senate last year and in 1946 died in the other branch of Congress.

House opposition in the past was directed against the public housing feature. Some influential House members still are contending that it would lead to socialization of the building industry.

That argument was raised during the five days of Senate debate on the bill, too, but it was overridden. On final passage, 33 Democrats joined 24 Republicans in voting for the bill. Against it were two Democrats and 11 Republicans.

Spurred by the bill—11 Democrats—were sole to bring about the defeat of practically all major moves to amend it.

Among the amendments batted down was one by Senators Bricker (R-Ohio) and Cain (R-Wash.) which would have prohibited segregation on the basis of race, creed or color in the renting of public housing.

The proposal was beaten 49 to 31, with supporters of President Truman's civil rights program leading the fight against it. They called the amendment a move to kill the bill and said civil rights should be handled in separate legislation.

Bricker, on the other hand, contended that it was an opportunity for senators to demonstrate how they feel about civil rights.

But the amendment which touched off the noisiest fireworks was one by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) to strike from the bill \$125,000 in grants to farmers for improvement of sub-standard farms. That is only one section of the three-part farm program.

Taft's amendment was defeated, 41 to 30, after Senator Langer (R-ND) had threatened to talk all night against it.

Minimum Pay Bill Killed In Senate

Raleigh, April 22.—(AP)—The Senate Committee on Manufacturing and Labor today killed a bill to provide a 40-cent-an-hour minimum wage for women workers.

The measure was passed by the House last week after it had been emasculated by amendments to exempt various groups of workers.

At a public hearing, former Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus, representing the State Hotel Association, said that because of the exemptions the bill was "unfair."

Old-Time Yale Footballer Dies

New York, April 22.—(AP)—Wyllis Terry, 84, old-time Yale University football star, died yesterday.

He was a star of the Yale football team before his graduation in 1885, and later turned down several professional baseball offers.

He was head of an insurance brokerage firm until his retirement two years ago.

A Test Of Strength

Resumption Of China's War Will Soon Demonstrate Power Of Communist And Nationalist Armies; Another Period Of Bloodshed; Resistance Plans;

We shall know soon how much striking-power the Chinese communist armies possess, for their task of crossing the mighty Yangtze river—last formidable barrier between Red China and the nationalist south—would be napoleonic if they encountered strong resistance.

Perhaps we should do better to put the operation in terms of nationalist weakness. For it is great relatively speaking.

Already the communist chief, Mao Tse-tung, has flung troops across the river at strategic points, spurring them on with the cry: "Liberate all China."

This resumption of fighting, grim as it is, will clarify the situation faster than would long-drawn-out talk. The nationalists now know that appeasement won't work with the communists.

Peace could be achieved solely on Red terms. The only way to reach a clear-cut decision is to fight it out.

If the nationalists carry out the plans which they have been contemplating, we are witnessing the beginning of another stretch of bloodshed and destruction. It is

Senators Surprised At Price On Arming Allies

Living Costs In March Edged Up

Report On Price Index Snaps Five-Month Decline In U.S.

Washington, April 22.—(AP)—The government reported today that living costs edged up a bit in March, snapping a five-month decline.

The Labor Department's consumer price index for mid-March rose half a point over mid-February. It was 169.5 per cent of the average for the 1935-39 pre-war period.

The rise was attributed chiefly to an advance in food prices.

Retail food prices went up one per cent in March over February to end a steady drop since last July.

Most important factors were seasonal advances for beef, fresh pork and lamb.

Prices of fruits and vegetables, as well as rents, also contributed to the rise in the index.

The index is based on a survey of prices in 65 cities.

In March retail prices for moderate income families were three-tenths of one per cent above February. They were 1.6 per cent above March, 1948 and 7.2 per cent above the pre-war level of August, 1939.

Retail prices, however, are about three per cent below the postwar peak of August and September last year.

Sewell Avery Is Still In Control

Chicago, April 22.—(AP)—Sewell Avery kept his iron grip on Montgomery Ward & Co. today.

Avery was assured of reelection as a director of the retail merchandising firm when nominations closed without anyone being put up in opposition to him. Actual counting of votes will take an hour or more.

Directors were scheduled to meet to elect a chairman later today.

Curious Gather At Death Farm

Dover, Del., April 22.—(AP)—Crowds of curious—many of them women—today flocked to the farm of Mrs. Inez Brennan, who police say has admitted plotting the deaths of two men she met through "lonely hearts" correspondence.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Brennan—44-year-old plump brunette—and one of her three sons, Robert, 15, awaited arraignment on murder charges.

Pro-Russian Speech By American Union Leader

The Metropolitan Nicolas Kutit, Paris, April 22.—(AP)—A labor leader from the United States told the Communist-inspired World Peace Congress here today that American workers "will refuse to lay down their lives for Wall Street, Washington and the dollar."

Donald Henderson, international president of the Tobacco, Agricultural and Allied Workers Union of America, an affiliate of the CIO, was given an ovation by the delegates when he said:

"The American working people will not be driven into a war against the Soviet Union."

Henderson called for a fight against "headquarters of world imperialism" which he said is located in Washington.

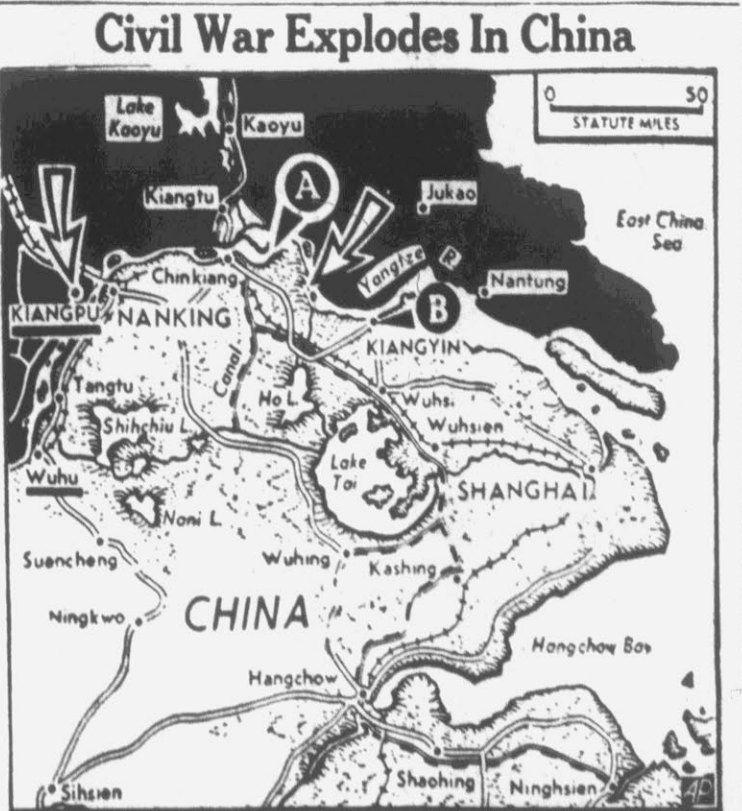

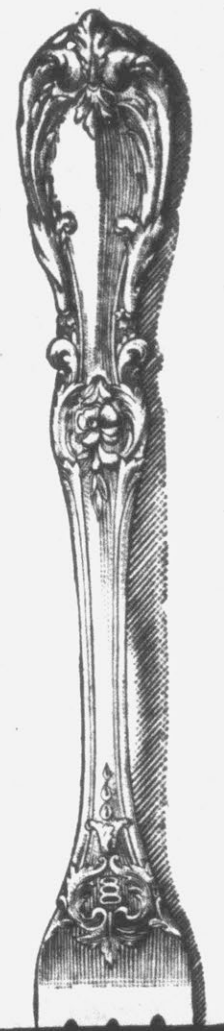

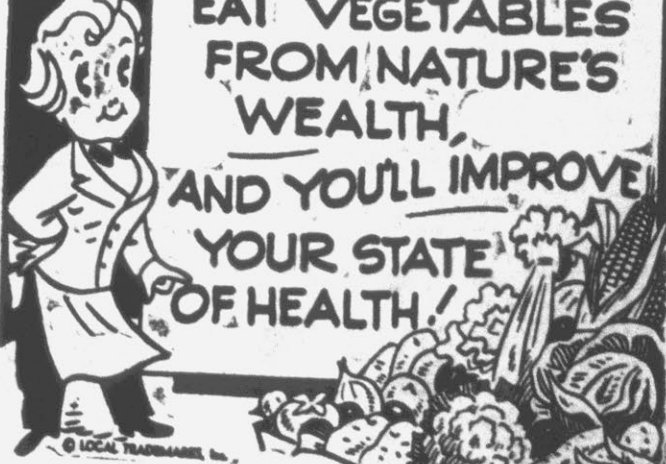

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Strength FOR THE DAY

AN ANCIENT RECORD REREAD
If you want to enjoy reading, be sure to include in your reading list some of the literary classics. The mind grows narrow when we read only the books and magazines produced in our age. Certain books have persisted through the ages—great mountain peaks rising out of the sea in which whole continents of contemporary literature have been submerged.

Right at the present time I am rereading Chaucer's Canterbury Tales. They were written 600 years ago by one of the greatest literary men who ever lived. They give us a vivid picture of the life of that day. Some of the stories are very coarse; others are extremely beautiful. Above everything else I am impressed by two facts: first, how little human nature changes over the centuries; and second, how every age people admire good character, integrity, and religious faith.

Chaucer was a mighty man of action. He held high government office, yet at times he could turn from an active life of things and write poetry which has called forth the admiration of the world. As we read Chaucer's poetry, we see the persistent elements of human life being shown forth. The jewels of faith and character glitter in the ash heap of a coarse and cruel age.

Around Capitol Square

HAPPIER—Faced with bright prospects of going home for good Sunday, members of the general assembly were happier Thursday than any day in recent weeks. As soon as word filtered through grapevine channels that the conference committee had reached unanimous agreement on the appropriations bills, smiles broke out all over. Instead of the tenseness of the previous day when very unkind words exchanged by the governor and legislative leaders cast gloom over the assembly, there was immediate speeded up preparations for the biennial levee Friday night.

CO-INCIDENT—Because unexpectedly rapid developments made sine die adjournment this weekend probable, the senate and house arranged plans to have their levees at the same time. These session-end affairs always highlight the season. The bitter fights and harsh words of the preceding weeks are forgotten and the old capitol reeks with good will and honeyed expressions. Gifts are presented to presiding officers and other personnel, and everybody loves everybody for an hour or two.

WORK—Chances are there will be some very important work left over and suggestion has been made there might be a session of the house immediately after midnight to get final roll call bills out of the way. Acting upon such matters one minute after midnight complies with constitutional requirement for separate roll call readings on separate days, and by working enrolling office employees on a night shift the bills can be ready for ratification many hours sooner. Several times in the past midnight sessions have been held to accomplish this purpose.

PRESENTATION—Former Governor and Mrs. Gregg Cherry have some interest in adjournment of the 1949 general assembly. Unanticipated length of the session has at least twice delayed fixing of tentative date for presentation to the Cherry couple of handsome oil paintings and a set of silverware gifts of state officials associated with Governor Cherry during his administration. It was originally intended that presentation would be made at the end of last year, but the oil portraits of Gregg and Mildred were not quite ready then. Subsequently one or two tentative dates for the formalities were set and deferred because of the legislative. Sometime within ten days after the general assembly closes shop there will be a state dinner occasion and the presentation will be made.

WORKERS—Selection of the 1949 legislative member of the 1949 legislature would be difficult to pick. Chairmen of important committees rate consideration, even though their activities have not been obvious to the public. A tremendous lot of leg work has been done behind the scenes by chairmen and other members that saved up in results but since handed off the floor was not easily discernible. Some of the newspaper boys were talking the other day and they



agreed that on basis of activity in regular sessions of the house Rep. Lister A. Martin of Davidson probably rated honors for hardest worker, with Rep. Roy Taylor of Buncombe almost in the position. There was support for giving Taylor top place in the unofficial appraisal. He has been generally praised for his efforts to improve health, welfare and education facilities. He has also been active for other measures. Martin has mainly opposed bills legalizing liquor and gambling, although he has lent material aid in favor of progressive legislation. Martin rated top place in the unofficial appraisal chiefly because of the evils he opposed and his leg work garnering reluctant voters to answer the roll calls on the issues in which he was interested.

Boyle's Column

By HAL BOYLE
New York—(AP)—The U. S. Senate controversy around the Malmady Massacre trials will produce an unwelcome outcome—it will create a new post-war German military hero. He is Col. Joachim Peiper, a handsome young former adjutant to Chief Heinrich Himmler.

This tough-minded storm trooper, now under sentence of death, is a symbol to many hero-loving Germans of the war they lost. And from the allied point of view, he is a dangerous man for this reason: He isn't the type the German people should ever come to regard as a martyr.

A Senate subcommittee is now investigating the Army's prosecution of Col. Peiper and 72 other German soldiers. They were accused of murdering American prisoners and Belgian civilians in the wintry battle of the Bulge in 1944.

The American Army's quest for justice in this situation has been as confused as was the battle of the Bulge itself. But unlike the battle, it has had no decisive impact for good on the German mind.

The original trial was held in the Nazi concentration camp at Dachau, hardly a score renowned for justice.

Of the 73 defendants 43 were given death sentences. But since then there have been two official investigations of the trial. One was military, one was by a civilian commission. And in a final review of the matter Gen. Lucius D. Clay reduced the death sentences to six. Of the other 67

When audience-participation radio programs became popular about ten years ago very few believed the craze could last. But it has, and Greenville has had its share.

The particular one I have in mind was a quiz show broadcast over WGTO some time ago with Charlie Whedbee as MC. It was the type of show in which every participant was supposed to win, so Charlie was making it as easy as possible. Instead of the program's being a test of the participants' knowledge, it was a demonstration of Charlie's ability to make up hints that would lead to the answer to the questions.

Charlie was doing his level best to help everybody win, so in this particular case he even discarded the next question on his script because he was afraid it was too hard and picked the easiest one on the list, "What are the ABC countries of South America?"

When the look of bewilderment came over the contestant's face Charlie immediately came to his rescue by telling him that the first one is Argentina. That didn't help much, so Charlie struggled on. "Tell me, what kind of nuts do you eat at Christmas time?"

"Peanuts."

"No, no, that's not right. Try again."

"Salted peanuts."

Charlie finally told him it was Brazil, and demonstrated unheard of determination by tackling the third country. Charlie said, "Now this third country is really easy. Here's a hint: How was it when you got up this morning?"

"Dark."

"I mean how was the weather?"

"Warm."

WASHINGTON LETTER.. by Jane Eads

Washington—Beautiful Josefina Rincon takes over as active mayor every time her sister, the mayor of San Juan, Puerto Rico, goes on vacation.

"Fini" as everyone in Puerto Rico calls the statuesque, auburn-haired lady, capably fills the vacancy. She is secretary of the capital—a sort of secretary of state in a municipal government. Some years ago she served as executive secretary of the bureau of commerce and industry.

"My job is to take care of everything," she told me on a visit here. Everybody knows Fini and her sister, the "Alcaldesa," or lady mayor—Senora Felisa Rincon de Gautier. Is called, by high and low alike, "Felisa."

Her sister was San Juan's only candidate for mayor in 1940. Several years before she had been urged to run for the Senate, although she had had no previous political training. Her candidacy for the Senate was strongly opposed by her father, and when she ran for Mayor her husband threatened divorce. On both occasions Felisa withdrew.

Again in 1944 she was proposed for the mayoralty. When she did not accept the nomination, the Popular Party delegates asked her to choose a candidate. He was elected but resigned after two years. This time the people were more insistent. Felisa's husband finally gave in, backed her campaign. In 1948 she was re-elected to a four-year term.

During the years she has been in office San Juan has redeemed four

bond issues for which a large part of the city budget had been apportioned. This covered about \$600,000, plus equipment for the city sanitary set-up and hospital facilities.

Fini assists her sister in the constant entertaining. She also helps her sister hold "open house" in her office twice a week. These sessions usually last three hours, and many persons beset with personal problems through the Mayor's office. Felisa gives ready and specific advice to everyone, whether it be about a job, a place to live or a love problem.

They make a handsome pair—Fini vivacious, femininely fond of clothes, hats, baubles, perfume and other frivolities, and Felisa, who resembles a raven-haired madonna, serene of expression, placid in nature.

Athletics Take Opener By 8-5 Against Locals

Moe Carter Leads Batting Attack With Three For Five; Clark And Brooks Touched For Nine Hits

Manager Joe Antolick's Tarboro Athletics successfully launched its defense of the Coastal Plain League championship by defeating the Greenville Greenies, 8-5, in the season's opener at Tarboro last night before a crowd of 1,679 yelling fans.

Legislators Sensitive About Their Pay Needs

By LYNN NISBET
Raleigh, April 22.—Members of the house of representatives devoted a good part of a day to debate over wording of a constitutional amendment to increase pay of members of the general assembly. They are highly conscious of two things: Present compensation of \$600 is absurdly inadequate; but, since the people have twice in two latest elections—1946 and 1948—voted down proposals for increases, they were reluctant to submit another amendment.

Two bills were pending. One introduced by Rep. J. T. Pritchett of Caldwell would have fixed compensation at \$2500 for the two year term. This was amended to read \$1000 a month. The other, sponsored by Rep. Lee Whitmire of Henderson, would have fixed pay at \$15 per day for regular sessions not exceeding 75 days and special sessions not exceeding 25 days. As later amended that bill would have provided for 90-day regular sessions and would have made maximum pay for the two year term \$1350, without special session.

Need for some adjustment is obvious to the most casual observer. Members of the present assembly had to report in Raleigh on January 4. They may get away April 24. That is 111 days, for which each member gets \$600, or \$5.40 a day. Average price of a good hotel room

Asks Explanation For Higher Price

Raleigh, N.C., April 22.—(AP)—Governor Scott yesterday challenged the oil industry to explain a recent boost in gasoline prices.

In a telegram to Eugene Holman, president of the Esso Standard Oil Company, Scott charged the price boost came in the face of record profits.

“Recently, April 6, I believe,” Scott’s telegram read, “your company raised the tank wagon price of gasoline in North Carolina six-tenths of one cent per gallon. I would like a direct answer to two questions:

“First, what impels you to raise the price of gasoline to our people just after your company has had a year of the largest net earnings in your history? Second, did you provide in this price raise an additional compensation for the jobbers in this state who are handling your gasoline? I request an answer.”

Scott, who claims his rural roads program has been harassed from the start of his term by an oil lobby, has struck out several occasions against the oil industry.

Stokes Firm Wins Suit In Supreme Court Of State

Stokes & Congleton of Stokes, who sued the Johnson-Sherman Company of Goldsboro for \$1,790, the amount they paid for oil burners for tobacco barns, and won the case in Superior Court here last January, when Judge R. Hunt Parker of Roanoke Rapids, was presiding, won their case in the State Supreme Court.

The high court ruled that there was no error in the judgment rendered in favor of Stokes & Congleton in Superior Court in Greenville. J. B. James argued the case before the Supreme Court for the plaintiffs. It found no error in the lower court’s judgment and affirmed it.

According to testimony at the hearing here last January, Stokes & Congleton contended that the oil burners for tobacco barns shipped to them were defective and that they were entitled to a refund of the money they had paid for them.

High School’s Radio Hour Time Changed

The Greenville high half-hour broadcast from station WGTC has been rescheduled for Friday afternoons at 4 o’clock.

Lakeside, Calif., April 22.—(AP)—Spotty, black and white wire haired terrier, was rescued last night after being imprisoned 29 hours in an abandoned water main.

Headless Chicken Is ‘Home’ Again

Los Angeles, April 22.—(AP)—Lazarus, who has been running around for 20 days like the rooster he is with his head cut off, is back home.

“And he’s going to live here until the Lord takes him,” says Mrs. Martha Green, who won court rights to the bird yesterday.

Peace Justice Stanley Moffatt dismissed cruelty charges brought by the SPCA against Mrs. Green and a veterinarian, Dr. Alan Ross. He ruled that they had not violated the state code by keeping a mutilated bird.

Dr. Lawrence Minsky, pet hospital operator who had been given temporary custody of the bird, testified Lazarus was suffering and should be put out of misery.

But Mrs. Green, a Negro, told the court emotionally that “God had willed Lazarus live” and that the rooster had a healing effect on some of her friends. The judge decided to let nature take its course.

“The bird is going to die anyway,” said Justice Moffatt later. “Of the two evils, I chose the lesser and gave Mrs. Green the bird.”

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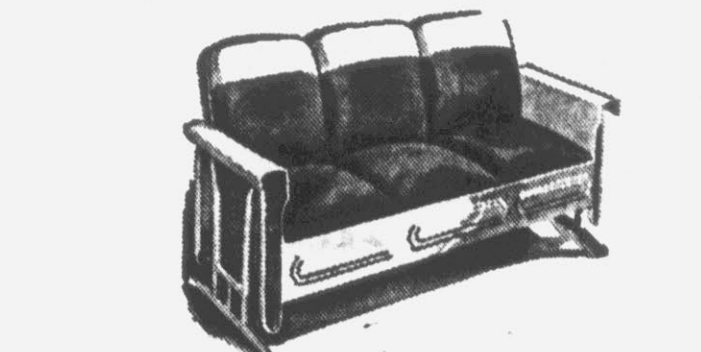

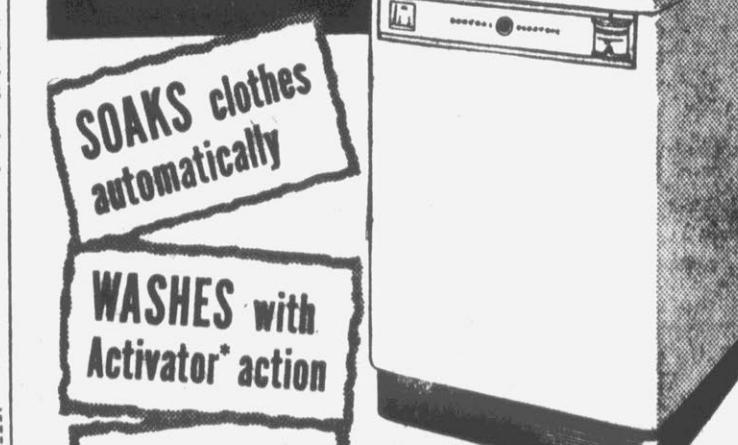


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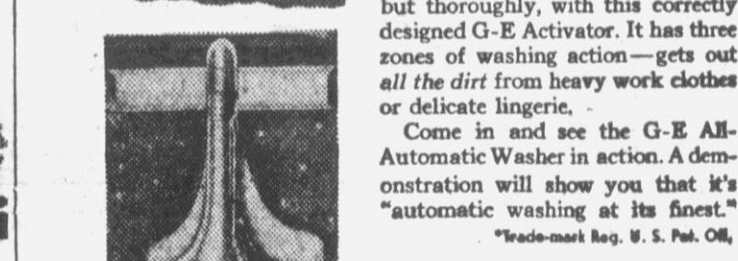
