Scott Appoints 14
To State Posts

New Highway Commission Named; Coltrane Gets Budget Job; State Veterans Commission And High ABC Appointments Made

Raleigh, April 29 (AP)—A new highway commission with nine of its 10 members having farm backgrounds was named by Governor Scott yesterday.

In all, the governor filled 14 state jobs.

He named D. S. Coltrane, now assistant commissioner of agriculture, to succeed R. G. Deyton, Jr., as assistant director of the budget, one of the state's top posts.

Dr. Henry W. Jordan of Cedar Falls, textile mill executive and retired dentist, was reappointed chairman of the State Highway Commission, another top post. The governor also named a head of the State Veterans Commission and a director of the new ABC Board.

Of the 10 highway commissioners, nine of the 10 were replaced. George S. Coble of Lexington was reappointed Sixth District Commissioner.

The 10 highway commissioners will be sworn in Wednesday morning and will hold their first meeting immediately thereafter.

Coltrane succeeds Robert S. Deyton as budget director. Deyton resigned several weeks ago effective July 1. Coltrane, who is 55, is a native of Randolph County. He attended Guilford College and N.C. State College, and at State he was a classmate. A year ago when he resigned as commissioner to run for governor, Governor Cherry appointed Coltrane commissioner of Agriculture.

Jordan will receive a salary of \$12,000 a year in the highway job and Deyton now receives \$12,000 in the budget post. It was not announced whether Coltrane will receive the same amount.

C. A. Upchurch, Jr. of Cary, a newspaperman, was named chief of the newly-created Mail Beverage Division of the State ABC Board. The job will pay \$5,760 annually.

Jim Caldwell of Concord, former state adjutant of the American Legion, was appointed director of the State Veterans Commission, a job worth \$7,920 a year.

Caldwell, a lawyer, was an assistant manager of the Scott campaign for governor. He will succeed Col. Horace L. Johnson of Smithfield, who resigned Dec. 15. Jack Pampin, assistant director, had been acting as director.

In the places of the nine veteran highway commissioners who were let go, Scott appointed:

Henry Grady Shelton, Tarboro farmer, as First Division commissioner succeeding Merrill Evans of Ahoskie.

Guy Hargett, Richland farmer and businessman, as Second Division successor to John G. Clark of Greenville.

Wilbur Clark of Fayetteville as Third Division successor to J. A. Bridger of Bladenboro.

Dr. R. E. Earp of Selma as Fourth Division successor to John N. Hackney of Wilson.

James A. Barnwell of Burlington as Fifth Division successor to George V. Kane of Roxboro.

Otis Poole of Jackson Springs as Seventh Division successor to Ben E. Douglas of Charlotte.

Mark Goforth of Lenoir, Eighth Division successor to H. Raymond Smith of Mt. Airy.

Joseph Graham of Iron Station, Lincoln County as successor to T. Mox Watson of Forest City.

Dale Trush of Asheville as Tenth Division successor to D. Reeves Noland of Waynesville.

Says President
Lost Votes With
Patronage Plans

House Leader Still
Expects Administration
To Win Labor
Law Showdown

Washington, April 29 (AP)—A House leader said privately today President Truman "lost votes" for the administration labor bill by trying it in with political patronage in a news conference statement.

But the Democratic chief said he still expected the administration to win the labor law showdown due in the House today.

Washington, April 29 (AP)—The House refused emphatically today simply to repeal the Taft-Hartley law and go back to the original Wagner Labor Relations Act. The roll call vote was 275 to 27.

The president indicated to newsmen yesterday that only lawmakers who support the Democratic platform—including repeal of the Taft-Hartley law—can hope to have their choices named to federal offices in their district.

The southerners at whom the comment was primarily aimed were furious. And Democratic leaders, who have been busy for weeks trying to line up votes for their Taft-Hartley repeal measure, acknowledged that Mr. Truman's statement hurt. One of them, asking not to be identified, said:

"He lost us some votes. We have had to go around and do over again some of the work we thought we had settled two days ago."

But this administration leader and others stuck to their prediction that the substitute bill introduced by Rep. Wood (D-Ga.) would be defeated.

Some Democratic leaders expected a quick vote on this measure, which has the backing of Republicans. But others talked of calling a Saturday session. Otherwise the final vote on the administration bill might not come before next Tuesday or Wednesday.

The Wood bill would repeal the Taft-Hartley law in name, but it would keep almost all of its provisions and even large chunks of its exact language.

The administration bill is sponsored in the House by labor committee chairman Lesinski (D-Mich.). It would replace the present law with a slightly altered version of the new deal Wagner Act.

Train Tragedy

Johannesburg, South Africa, April 29 (AP)—A three train collision 10 miles outside this city killed 74 persons and injured more than 90 yesterday.

Among the dead were two white Europeans and 14 Indians. The rest were natives. Two of the electric trains were standing on the track when the third came around a curve and smashed into them.

Surprise 'Bonuses' For
Vets Received In Mail

Washington, April 29 (AP)—Thousands of World War II veterans have been receiving government checks in recent weeks for overpaying on their GI life insurance.

The surprise "bonuses," totaling

many thousands of dollars, are an unexpected byproduct of the Veterans Administration's efforts to start insurance dividend checks rolling by the end of 1949.

"As a matter of fact, many recipients of the overpayments checks have confused them with dividend payments," a VA spokesman told a reporter.

"Some have complained that they expected a larger dividend."

"We have had to reassure them that this is 'gravy'—that they are being reimbursed for having paid out too much on past premiums, and that they will get their dividends later."

"Furthermore, the checks now going out will have no bearing on the size of the dividends the recipients eventually will receive."

The overpayments have shown up by the thousands in connection with the audit of accounts that has been under way for many months in preparation for the declaration of dividend.

Adjustments are made as soon as excess payments are discovered, and checks are sent out immediately. Underpayments are being discovered, also. No attempt is being made to collect these amounts due, but they later will be assessed against the dividends.

Fast Action

Washington, April 29 (AP)—The Senate today speedily passed a bill to give the states \$35,000,000 a year in federal funds for school health programs.

The voice vote was taken after less than an hour of debate. There was no opposition to the measure which was introduced by Democrat and Republican members of the Senate Labor and Education Committee.

Well, what can be done about it? The senators want the states to develop programs to give examinations in all schools, public and parochial, where it can be done at reasonable cost.

And, further, they want the states to provide treatment for free for mental and physical ills whenever the parents can't afford to pay.

Senate Economy
Drive Victory Is
Headed By Taft

GOP Senators Encouraged By Upset;
Send Money Bill
Back For Cuts

Washington, April 29 (AP)—Republican senators, encouraged by an upset victory, today drove to slim down President Truman's multi-billion dollar spending program all along the line.

They thus hope to kill off any federal tax increases this year.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) spearheaded the successful economy campaign which late yesterday sent a \$2,400,000,000 money bill back to the Senate Appropriations Committee with instructions to cut it.

A solid bloc of 36 Republicans got unexpected aid from eight Democrats to turn that trick and bowl over a long-standing State tradition not to send appropriation bills back to committee. Voting against the motion were 37 Democrats.

Most senators thought they were voting for a cutback of about \$15,000,000. But experts on Senate rules say the slash actually may include well over \$200,000,000 previously added to the bill but chopped off by its return to committee.

Taft, smiling broadly, told reporters afterwards that he, apparently caught the Democratic leaders by surprise. Only a few moments before he had blocked a GOP move to cut the bill on the floor. The vote was 45 for to 35 against—considerably short of the two-thirds margin required.

The bill, first money measure to reach the Senate this session, carries funds for labor and federal security agencies.

Democratic leaders were silent on their plans but they probably will try to rally their full voting power of 54 when the bill comes back to the Senate.

Originally, senators Bridges (R-NH) and Ferguson (R-Mich.) proposed an amendment which would have required heads of the labor and security agencies to make a 5 per cent cutback in part of the funds. Ferguson estimated the savings would be about \$15,000,000.

When Vice President Barkley, the presiding officer, held that the amendment violated Senate rules against legislation in an appropriation bill, Republicans moved to suspend the rules, which requires approval of two thirds of those voting.

After that failed, Taft proposed sending the bill back to committee. Democrats apparently confident they could beat the motion, agreed to vote with almost debate. To their surprise, it sailed through easily.

Charge Evasion
Of Cartel Order

Washington, April 29 (AP)—An official investigating committee charged today that American occupation authorities are evading presidential orders to break up German cartels and monopolies.

The group, sent to Germany last year by then Secretary of the Army Royal, says the result is a threat that the same international trade conditions that helped bring on World War II will rise again.

Chapel Hill, April 29 (AP)—The Greenville and Roxboro high schools were to meet here this afternoon in the finals of the state high school debating contest.

Greenville defeated Appalachian high school of Boone this morning in the semi-finals, while Roxboro eliminated R. J. Reynolds high of Winston-Salem.

Union To Check
Speed-up Charge

Possible Walkout Of
60,000 Auto Workers
Hangs In Balance

Detroit, April 29 (AP)—A top-level union team was dispatched to the Ford Motor Company's sprawling Rouge main plant today to confirm or disprove strike-threatening speed-up charges.

Hanging in the balance was a possible walkout of 60,000 CIO United Auto Workers which would tie up virtually the entire Ford industrial system and could upset the UAW's spring bargaining drive.

A strike of 6,000 employees at Ford's Lincoln-Mercury plant was authorized by the UAW's executive board yesterday to start May 5. Similar sanction was denied the Rouge plant workers pending an inquiry. Both disputes involve production speed-up complaints.

But negotiations aimed at heading off walkouts were resumed after previous talks had failed.

Lincoln-Mercury walkout probably would have little effect on either overall Ford production or the union's industry-wide campaign for pensions, medical care programs and wage increases. This drive is scheduled to start with Ford May 16.

UAW leaders were hopeful at least that a Rouge plant strike, involving ten times as many workers as at Lincoln, could be averted.

President Walter Reuther told the union's 100-man National Ford Council:

"Don't let anyone get us on a depot, for the main road clearly lies ahead."

The council is framing final demands on Ford which will launch the UAW's 1949 campaign.

Washington, April 29 (AP)—Farmville declared a holiday today for the dedication of the DAR's new \$50,000 Chapter House.

The occasion was highlighted by an address by Assistant Secretary of State John E. Peurifoy to a gathering in the Chapter House.

While saying that the Soviet blockade of Berlin may be lifted but that there is no definite proof that communists are giving up their struggle for world control, Peurifoy put on the record for the first time what many high officials in Washington have been saying privately: That the Soviet feeling for ending the Berlin crisis provide no evidence of any basic change in Russia's attitude toward the cold war.

"The Soviet Union," he said, "would like to see its system spread throughout the world. The communists are working in every corner of the world today."

He declared that American policies aimed at preventing the spread of communism and "creating an atmosphere in the world in which democracy can thrive" have made great progress in the past two years. He cited American aid programs and particularly the Marshall Plan for European recovery as outstanding in achieving results.

But he added:

"The gains to date have been impressive. In many parts of the world the tide has been slowly turning toward a favorable recognition of our way of life. However, there is not yet definite proof that the communists are giving up."

"At this time encouraging developments are taking place, especially in Germany. The Berlin blockade may be lifted but I think most people in the world are going to approach this latest effort with caution and will not be deceived if this effort is not a real interest in furthering world peace."

He added the point he wanted to make is that "we must now do all we can to protect the gains already made."

Other speakers on the program included Mrs. Roscoe O'Byrne, president general of the National Society of the DAR, the first vice regent general, Miss Gertrude Caraway of New Bern, and Mrs. Julius Young Talmadge of Athens, Ga., past state regent, and Chancellor Robert H. House of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Minor Damage In
Oil Barge Fire
At Fayetteville

Fayetteville, April 29 (AP)—A fire on an oil barge was smothered here today after creating widespread excitement and minor damage. Nobody was hurt.

Workers aboard Barge A-26 discovered the fire in a barrel on the rear of the vessel. Fearing the flames would spread to the shipping terminal here, where the barge was moored, they dashed ashore and spread an alarm.

The Fayetteville fire department drowned the fire mostly under foamite. Firemen had laid more than a mile of hose when the fire was controlled. The barge City of Fayetteville, moored alongside the A-26 was not harmed.

Wake Forest To
Lose President

Wake Forest, April 29 (AP)—Trustees of Wake Forest College today accepted the request of Dr. Thurman Kitchin that he retire as president of the college on June 30, 1950.

The trustees voted to name Dr. Kitchin, who has served as president of the college for 19 years as president emeritus and professor of physiology and hygiene effective upon his retirement from the presidency.

Shanghai Faced
With Being Cut
Off From South

Red Columns March
On Flanking Towns;
Final Assault On
City Delayed

Shanghai, April 29 (AP)—Communist troops today seized Wuhing, a key point 40 miles north of Hangchow, the main prop for Shanghai.

Wuhing is 36 miles west of Kashing, control point on the Shanghai-Hangchow railroad.

Kashing, 62 miles southwest of Shanghai, was in the path of a Red column driving south from Soochow (Wuhien).

A Nationalist communique said a Red drive on Shanghai appeared to be a move to protect the flank of the southbound columns.

It asserted the force coming from the west had been checked about 37 miles west of the metropolis near Kunshan, on the Shanghai-Nanking railway. Trains to Kunshan had quit running.

The Shanghai garrison reported the capture of Wuhing now were advancing south toward Hangchow. It earlier had reported the Communist 23rd Army was operating in this region.

It appears that the main Red push is aimed now at Hangchow, not Shanghai. With the capture of Hangchow, Shanghai would be sealed off by land.

This could mean that an attack on Shanghai will be delayed.

The garrison said a strong force of government troops was deployed between Hangchow and the Reds in the north.

The garrison said the Reds were headed toward Wukang, 25 miles northwest of Hangchow.

The communique quoted Red prisoners as saying Communist troops who crossed the Yangtze had only three days rations and were without supply stations.

The garrison charged the Communists were looting the countryside in occupied areas, searching for food.

Vice Admiral Oscar C. Badger, commander of the Western Pacific Fleet, said U.S. Navy forces would be retained at Wusong as long as needed "in the safe evacuation of American nationals from Shanghai."

Wusong is some 10 miles from Shanghai where the Whangpoo flows into the Yangtze.

Washington, April 29 (AP)—W. Averell Harriman told senators today the North Atlantic pact is creating "a growing wave of confidence" in Western Europe.

Harriman, special representative in Europe for the Economic Cooperation Administration, testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He urged ratification of the treaty and approval of an arms-aid program for the pact nations.

Washington, April 29 (AP)—Effective next week, the 7,000 banks of the Federal Reserve System will have an extra \$1,200,000,000 available for lending.

Financial experts said today that is enough to give the lagging economy a powerful "shot in the arm"—provided bankers and potential borrowers want to take risks.

A Federal Reserve Board order was responsible. It empowers the banks to lend the money by cutting \$1,200,000,000 off the amount they were required to have in non-lendable reserves.

The motive of making lending easier was m. e. plain. The board itself, in announcing the order last night, stressed that loans by these banks have dropped \$1,500,000,000 since the start of this year.

An increase in loans—noticeably loans to business, which have fallen farther and faster in 1949 than any year on record—would counter recent deflationary effects reflected in lower prices, production, sales and employment.

The availability of the extra funds—more than double the total lendable funds on hand at these banks as of Wednesday—is expected to give lenders a "psychological" lift, affording them a bigger cash margin and an incentive to get a return on the money.

Nevertheless, there was no certainty about the ultimate effects of the action because business decisions on whether to borrow depend finally on prospects for profits.

The \$1,200,000,000 to be "unfrozen" for lending next week, however, is only about two-thirds of the amount the board "froze" into reserves last September 8 in a move against the inflation prevailing at that time.

Amendment To Present
System Likely
Result Of Dispute

Washington, April 29 (AP)—The present farm program may run on for another year, with an amendment permitting "production payments" for hog farmers.

This emerged today as a possible compromise of bitterly clashing proposals for long range protection of agricultural income.

Such a compromise, if enacted, would:

1. Retain rigid 90 per cent of parity price supports for major farm crops, suspending the "Aiken law" that is set to become effective in 1950 with flexible 60 to 90 per cent of parity support.

2. Use the hog market for a "trial run" of the Truman Administration's new farm program "production payment" proposal. This might mean (a) cheaper pork chops, hams and bacon for the consumer, and (b) a guaranteed hog price for farmers, probably at about \$16.50 a hundred-weight.

3. Use in 1950 of the present government loan and purchase mechanisms for holding up prices by keeping surpluses off the markets. This would set aside the Administration's proposals for broad use of production payments instead of loans and purchases.

The Administration wants to let prices on many foods, such as pork, sell freely at what the market will pay and then make production payments to farmers amounting to the difference between the market price and what the government sets as a fair price.

4. Power for production controls and marketing quotas, to forestall accumulation of large surpluses in some crops.

Chairman Cooley (D-NC) of the House Agriculture Committee—without advocating any specific plan at this time—told a reporter that such a compromise might come out of the present controversy over farm legislation. It would give Congress time for a thorough study of the new Administration proposals, he said.

FACING THE FACTS
When the boy Beethoven first played before Mozart, the latter listened in astonishment and felt that here indeed was a genius. At ten, Beethoven had gone on a concert tour, and at fourteen he had conducted the orchestra at an opera.

But it was not long until the shadow of a great affliction began to fall across his pathway. Little by little, his hearing became dulled, and when he reached the height of his fame, he could not hear a single note of the gorgeous music he had written. Sometimes he would bend close to the piano trying to catch a note or two of "that he had written. He died at the age of 57, murmuring with indescribable pathos, "I shall hear again in heaven."

An affliction is always hard to bear, and it cannot truthfully be maintained that Beethoven always bore his affliction with equanimity. Sometimes he lost his patience and cried out angrily against what he considered the adverse works of fate. This attitude was probably responsible for the fact that he experienced so much unhappiness apart from his affliction. Few men have had more to be proud of in life than did Beethoven, and yet few men have enjoyed life less than he did.

Yet some of the world's greatest heroes have borne great handicaps. They became great because they refused to allow these things to destroy their happiness and efficiency.

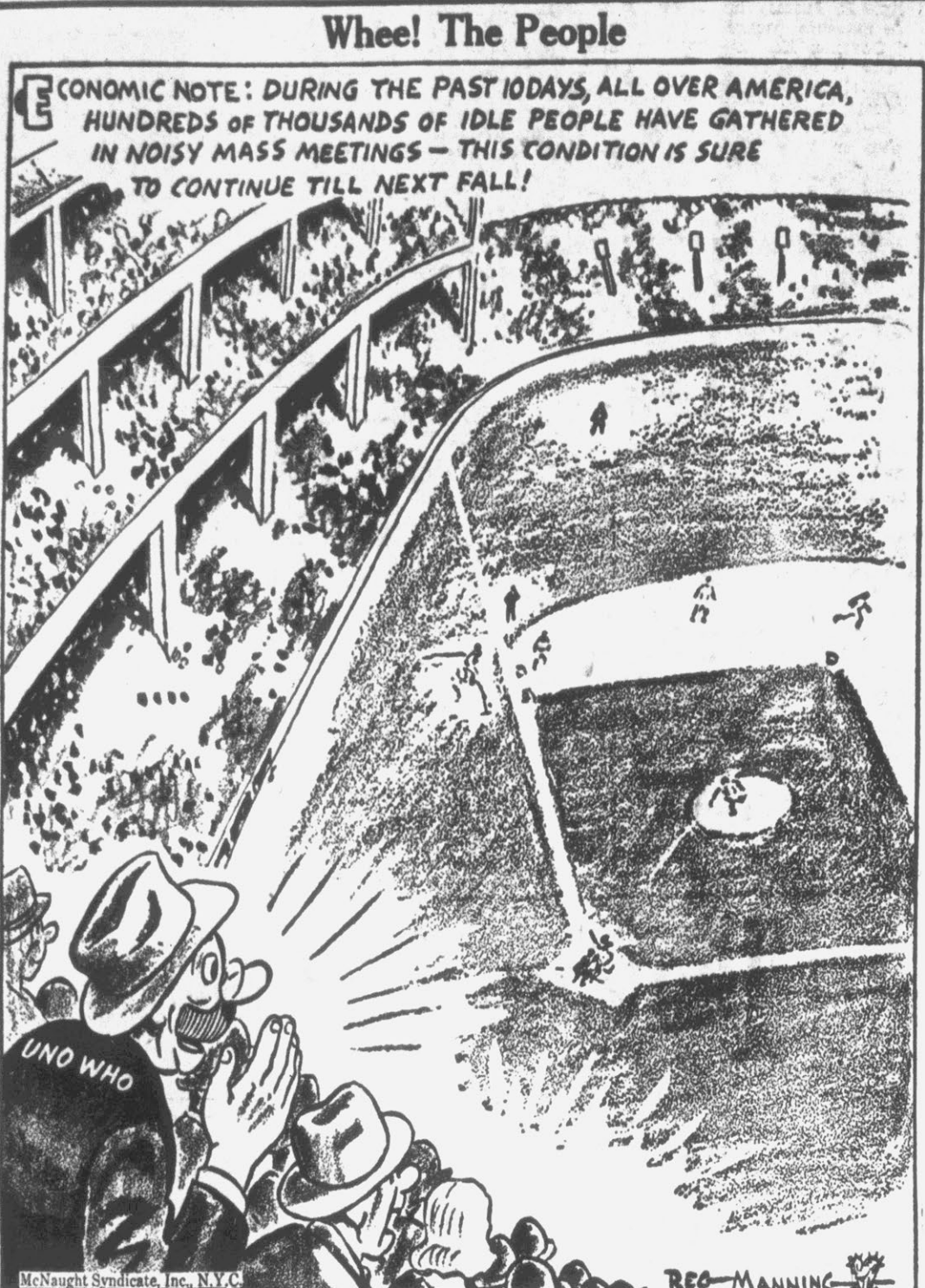

CARRYING-ON—There was nothing about the monthly meeting of the highway commission Thursday except the exchange of farewells after adjournment to indicate it was the last session of the board as presently constituted. Terms of incumbent members expire Saturday night and Governor Scott has said he will have a new list ready for announcement in a few days. During the session, which was attended by every one of the eleven members, the commission handled routine business in casual way, even to fixing projects and dates for next contract letting and date for the next meeting of the commission.

PROFITABLE—The meeting resulted in some profit for the state. Bids approved for two million dollars worth of road work were found to be \$171,000 below state engineering estimates. The board approved sale of the highway shop site at Murfreesboro for \$51,000. The plot cost \$475 a few years ago. Also approved was transfer of 65 acres in Currituck to the county board of education for a Negro agricultural school. This transfer was at cost, approximately \$250 per acre. Sale was authorized of about ten acres of the Ashe County prison farm at a nice profit, the land being located so as to have little value for the prison division, but is attractive for a home site. Altogether these real estate deals netted nice profit.

RETURNED—Several commissioners thought the state made more profit out of giving away some land than by selling some. In 1940 the Kure family, owners of Kure's Beach, decided to sell the state for one dollar a strip of land along the water front to be used for a public parking area. The deed had reversionary clause that if not sold by a certain date the land would revert to county. BOATS—There was combination of serious business and humor about a new ferry boat. Anomaly of the highway commission operating a fleet of ships was mentioned. These ferries boats are operated in lieu of bridges across Alligator River and Roanoke Sound. The highway commission has two ferries in operation and purchase of a third boat was authorized. The boats cost around \$50,000 apiece and operation costs are high. But the bridges would cost more than five millions and maintenance would be almost as much as ferry operation.

use are named "Governor Cherry" and "Sandy Graham." Motion was made to name the new boat "Merrill Evans," in honor of the first division commissioner. Commissioner Evans protested, in view of the fact the ferry could not be put in use before midsummer and somebody else would handle it. His wishes were respected and naming the latest craft was left open. (Some of his colleagues facetiously quipped that Evans didn't want his name attached to something that might sink.) The commission did name a couple of highways. From now on US-301 across the state from Weldon to Rowland, by way of Rocky Mount, Wilson, Smithfield and Fayetteville, will be officially known as the "Blue Star Memorial Highway." And, US-19 from Asheville to Socco Gap will be officially designated the "Smoky Mountains Park Highway." These names fit in with similar nomenclature accorded the routes by Virginia and Tennessee.

RELUCTANT—The commissioners were obviously reluctant about giving official recognition to identifying numerals. There is community jealousy to be dealt with, as well as confusion between official numerical markers and monuments denoting the passage over that route of Daniel Boone, or Jefferson Davis, or George Washington, or some Indian chief or Spanish conquistador. If some local promoter want to call US-1 the "Capitol Route," or US-17 the "Seashore Route," or US-17 the "Main Street of North Carolina," that's one thing. Official nomenclature is another.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—There's a job for you in one of those far away places you've been dreaming about if you are between the ages of 21 and 35 and "an fill all qualifications. The State Department's Division of Foreign Service seeks several hundred stenographers and a few clerks typists for jobs in the United States' 300 foreign service posts throughout the world.

The entrance salary is \$2,525 a year. If you prove satisfactory you get an automatic \$120-a-year raise and will be considered for promotion as vacancies arise. In addition, some allowance is made for those working under unusual or difficult conditions and at posts where living costs are in excess of those in Washington.

Applicants for foreign service jobs must have been a citizen of the United States for at least five years and must be willing to accept assignment to any foreign post. Only single persons without dependents are acceptable for appointment to positions of a clerical nature. They must be in excellent physical condition and able to pass a physical examination comparable to those

required by the Army and Navy for service overseas. All applicants are subject to a security and suitability investigation. Personnel officers warn that the prevailing hazards of war or non-existent. Although health hazards vary in degree and type, they are extreme at about one-third of the posts."

Adverse factors are extremes in climate and altitude, limitation in varieties of food, exposure to exotic diseases, inadequate hospitals and medical service, unavoidable anxiety and stress due to crisis and other hardships.

For these reasons a policy of rotation of personnel is observed, and assignments are ordinarily not less than two or more than four years in duration and transfers may occur on short notice. Thus an average career involves several changes with respect to culture, language, health and living conditions.

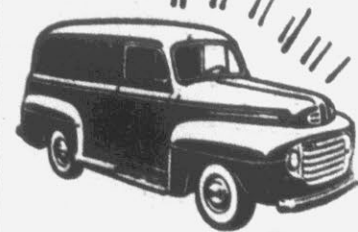

The future of Greenville depends largely upon our administration and how it functions. In addition to the above, at that time there were approximately 58 Negro rural school buildings to be maintained.

During the month of January 1935 I was employed by the White Chevrolet Company as service manager and later was promoted to General Manager and worked in that capacity through the middle of 1938, at which time I resigned and secured the automobile franchise that I am now active manager and have been with the exception of approximately four years of service in the armed forces of the United States during World War II.

I volunteered to the Army and was ordered to active duty April 28, 1942, with the rank of Captain—was later promoted to Major. I was separated from the services at Fort McPherson, Georgia, with the rank of Lt. Col. and am active in the Officers Reserve Corps at this time.

I am a member of the present Board of Aldermen which gives me an insight on city government and how it functions.

I am keenly interested only in Greenville, its citizens, its business, and its progress.

New York, April 20—(AP)—Leo Durocher was in hot water again today, but nobody knew just how hot.

The quick-tempered manager of the New York Giants was accused by a Brooklyn fan of punching and kicking him yesterday at the Polo Grounds. Durocher, however, denied he hit anybody.

From a hospital cot, the fan—22-year-old Fred Boysen—said he would bring charges of assault against Durocher.

Boysen, a vociferous Brooklyn rooster, said he was attacked on the playing field after Durocher's Giants had been whipped, 15-2, by the Dodgers.

Durocher gave this version of the incident:

"As I was crossing the field to the dressing room I recall somebody snatching at my cap. I grabbed it back and kept walking. This sort of thing happens every day. I was surrounded by members of the Giants team and there were hundreds of spectators on the field. Do you think I could knock somebody down in front of them?"

Durocher said he planned to fly to Boston today. The Giants open a series against the Braves there tonight. The team was scheduled for a 9 a.m. (EST) train departure.

Boysen—a war veteran—said he had been razzing the Giants' manager from a box behind the New York dugout. He gave this version: 'After the game my cousin and I went on the field. We were passing first base on our way over to talk to Jackie Robinson. Durocher came up behind me. He grabbed me and punched me. As I tried to get up—I was dizzy—he kicked me in the stomach.'

The incident assumed added importance because of Durocher's stormy career.

Negro Sentenced For Disturbance

In Superior Court yesterday, a jury found George Raymond Whitfield, Negro, guilty of resisting arrest, two charges of assault and using vulgar and profane language on the street. He was not guilty of trespass.
Judge Clawson L. Williams sentenced him to two years at hard

labor on the roads for resisting arrest and continued prayer for judgment in the other three cases.
It was testified that when Manager John Warner ordered Whitfield from the lobby of the Plaza Theater, on Albemarle avenue, that he refused to leave; that he resisted police officers when they arrested him; that he assaulted Manager Warner and Policeman George Crawford, and that he used vulgar and profane language.
Solicitor W. J. Bundy had difficulty getting testimony from Whitfield, but the defendant finally admitted the charges and that he "did cuss" the officers. Whitfield accused the arresting officers of

beating him into unconsciousness, but on cross-questioning said he knew what was going on.
Whitfield was to be taken to a road prison camp today.
In the case against William H. Greene, Negro, charged with attempting to rape Clementine Wilkes, Negro girl, he was tried for assault on a female. The jury found Greene not guilty.
Cases disposed of in Superior Court earlier in the week included the following:
Henry Hilliard, abandonment and non-support, guilty, was ordered to pay the Welfare Department \$50 now for support of his child and \$50 at the October term of court.
Zeno Brown, assault with a deadly weapon, was given 12 months on the roads.
In the cases in which James Cullifer, Andrew Forrest and Martin B. Twiford were charged with highway robbery, the court found Twiford guilty as charged; Forrest guilty of aiding and abetting, and Cullifer was not guilty. Judge Williams gave Twiford and Forrest four to six years each in State Prison. Forrest gave notice of appeal.
Freddie Martin was given two to three years in State Prison for larceny. This sentence is to begin at the expiration of the term he now is serving in Wake county for housebreaking.
Odesty Mabery, guilty of speeding, was given six months on the roads, suspended on condition that he not drive a motor vehicle for 12 months.
John Wesley Burnett, alias James Thomas Burnett, secret assault with a deadly weapon, was given seven to 10 years in State Prison.
The case charging Ludell Moore with reckless driving was not pressed.
J. A. McLawhorn, embezzlement, 12 months on the roads.
Geston B. Guirkin and William A. Simpson were not guilty of driving drunk.
William C. Ebron was not guilty of attempting to rape Ruby Lee.

said such an association might bring to "a harassed and struggling humanity real security and freedom for health and home."
It might seem somewhat strange that India should be the one to object to further recognition of the king's sovereignty. Throughout the long reign of the British throne in India, with her hundreds of Arabian Nights princes, was the scene of a regal splendor rarely equalled in history. The imperial durbars, with the bejeweled maharajahs and their caparisoned elephants, were story book dreams.
Probably no other emperor had such homage paid to him as was tendered by the powerful rulers whose wealth was so vast they could not compute it. Even the emperor's representative, the viceroy, maintained an atmosphere which was more regal than that in London.
So it's given to wonder why India should be the one to refuse recognition of regal sovereignty now. Still having seen much of that country at first hand in the imperial days, I incline to the thought that after all it may be in part because of those times that India shuns imperialism now.

(In World War II, Selective Service records show, about 5,000,000 men—about 30 per cent of all those examined—were physically, mentally or emotionally unable to meet the standards of the armed forces.)
How would the money be spent?
To get the full \$35,000,000 provided for under this bill, the states would have to put up at least \$25,000,000 of their own money.
Not all states would receive the same amount of government help. The richer ones, better able to afford good health programs, would receive a smaller percentage of government money than the poor ones.
For example: The richest states would have to match the government money given them dollar for dollar. This would be a 50-50 arrangement.
But the federal government would put up \$3 for every \$1 in the poorest states. This would be a 75-25 arrangement.
