Lions Report \$1,250 Received In County Easter Seal Sales

The Greenville Lions Club, sponsor of the 1949 Easter Seal Sale, reports a total of \$1,250 received from the sale of Easter Seals.

The Greenville City Schools and the Pitt County schools sold a total of \$503.43 worth of seals as follows: Bethel, Mrs. Alma Shelton, \$84.74; Greenville High School and Training School, Prof. O. E. Dowd and Junior Lions, \$67.89; Chisoom, Mrs. Frances Stokes Porter, \$50.00; Greenville Colored School, Prof. W. H. Davenport, \$43.27; Ayden High School, Miss Cornelia Keuzenkamp, \$27.20; Grimesland School, Mrs. Dorothy Dowling Hendrix, \$24.00; Winterville School, Mrs. Sue Thompson Rouse, \$23.00; Third St. School, Miss Laura Foley, \$20.00; West Greenville School, Miss Agnes Fullilove, \$13.27; Bevoir School, Mrs. Elizabetha Frisby Steig, \$11.95; Fountain School, Mrs. Laura H. Tanner, \$11.00; Arthur School, Mrs. Nellie Crawford Tucker, \$10.20; Pictious School, Mrs. Thelma B. Cherry, \$10.00; Grifton School, Mrs. Nannie Pearl Tucker, \$9.60; Falkland School, Mrs. Marguerite Moye Wilson, \$6.65; Pitt County Colored Schools, Prof. H. B. Sugg, coordinator, \$90.57.

Easter Seals sent to individuals and business places brought in a total of \$637.30. \$56.85 was received from counter coin boxes that were placed in stores and cafes. The Girl Scouts in Greenville, Farmville and Ayden sold seals and tags on the streets for a total of \$52.42. Half of the gross receipts go to the state office in Chapel Hill (state office works with all counties in North Carolina) with the remaining half less local expense, to remain in Pitt County.

The Lions Club, in cooperation with the Pitt County Welfare Department, will use these funds as needy cases arrive during the 1949-50 period.

Expenditures from the Crippled Children's Funds as taken from D. H. Conley's (Secretary and Treasurer) records on the 1948-49 period will give a general idea of what is done with the money received from the sale of Easter Seals.

For transportation to hospitals and to clinics, 32 children, \$150; for x-rays and glasses, 8 children, \$45; for braces, special shoes, 12 children, \$139; for drugs and special service, 2 children, \$17.50; for milk and special foods, 2 children, \$29.14. Total children served, 56.

Total money expended, \$380.64. Hospitalization for rheumatic fever, removing tonsils and teeth and many other services are offered from this fund.

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GHS Freshman Class Graduates

This morning the freshman class of Greenville high school, 125 strong, graduated from junior high school to senior high in a very impressive graduation exercise.

The high school band played the Processional as the students marched in to take the seats of honor. Sidney Briley, freshman class president, gave the invocation. A double trio from the junior high group sang "Green Cathedral."

Principal Orren Dowd read the roll of the class and presented them to Superintendent of City Schools June H. Rose. Mr. Rose accepted the graduates, saying, "This class has one of the best records of any group in the past history of the city schools, for they started out in the first grade with 135 students and have lost only ten or twelve members."

The junior high chorus next sang two numbers, "Dream of Summer" and "In the Time of Roses." Rev. Leon Russell, pastor of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, was the main speaker on the program. In closing the program the Junior High Quartet sang "Passing By."

Each year at the graduating exercises held for junior high a member of the freshman class is selected by the National Honor Society to receive an award for having the highest record in the past two years that he or she has been in school.

CIO Stamps OK On Health Plan

Washington, June 1 — (AP) — The CIO endorsed the administration's health insurance program today, saying it would put an end to "second-rate and second-hand medical care which is the lot of millions of Americans."

CIO Secretary-Treasurer James B. Carey, in testimony prepared for the Senate Labor and Public Welfare subcommittee, said the bill would aid everyone except "some patent medicine manufacturers and others who now profit from illness, poverty and ignorance."

Carey said the "Tait bill and the Bill bill, substitutes for the administration measure, "completely fail to meet the needs of the self-supporting majority in the middle income group."

The administration plan calls for compulsory health insurance financed in part by a payroll tax. It would include everyone. It is opposed by the American Medical Association, the American Dental Association and others as "socialized medicine."

The substitute bills eliminate the compulsory angle, and provide aid largely to low income groups. Also they would operate on a regional basis.

Railroad Company Exonerated; Man Asleep On Track

A Pitt county coroner's jury, in session at the City Hall in Farmville last night, exonerated the Norfolk Southern Railroad Company from any blame in the death of Willie Turnage, Negro farm laborer, who was struck by a freight train last Saturday night while asleep on the track outside the city. Authorities said Turnage's skull was fractured and that one arm was cut off at the elbow.

ABC Chairman Sworn In Today

Raleigh, N.C., June 1 — (AP) — Robert W. Winston of Raleigh became chairman of the State ABC Board today.

In a ceremony in Governor Scott's office, Winston was administered the oath by Associate Justice W. A. Devin of the State Supreme Court.

Wilson Predicts 1951 Prosperity

Atlantic City, N. J., June 1 — (AP) — Charles E. Wilson, president of General Electric Company, predicted today the nation's industrial production will be rolling along at a high level again by the end of 1951.

There's nothing permanent about the current decline in output, Wilson said, and it won't be very drastic.

The General Electric President estimated the slackening may continue until about the second quarter of 1950 before it turns upward.

But by the end of 1951, he said, industrial production may again reach the high level of 1948.

He anticipated a slackening of about 15 per cent from the fourth quarter of 1948 through the second quarter of 1950 and he gave three reasons why he felt it would not be more drastic than that.

"We lack the great speculative excesses in such areas of our economy as inventories and the stock

market, which features the 1920, 1929 and 1937 setbacks," he said.

Edenton Patrolman Succeeds S. G. Gibbs In Greenville Area

State Highway Patrolman P. C. Whitley, formerly stationed in Edenton, has been transferred to the Greenville area to succeed Patrolman S. G. Gibbs, who resigned some weeks ago to become a special agent for the State Bureau of Investigation in Raleigh. Gibbs, a law student, plans to pass the state bar examination in the near future.

Cpl. John Laws said Patrolman Whitley is an experienced officer. He is 36, a native of Carteret county, has a pleasing personality and knows the highway laws. His wife is a school teacher. Incidentally, Patrolman Whitley and Mrs. Whitley are looking for a three-room apartment.

Bolivian Army Reported Checking Mine Unrest

La Paz, Bolivia, June 1 (AP) — Reports reaching here today said the army was "in control of the situation" in Bolivia's strike-town Tin mine region, scene of bloody rioting for the past four days.

Army reservists from 19 to 50 were ordered mobilized last night as the cabinet met in emergency session to cope with what it calls a "state of civil war."

The government said the mobilization was justified by the gravity of the present situation in which striking tin miners have seized mine officials, including Americans, as hostages and fought bloody battles against troops sent to the area.

Los Angeles, June 1 — (AP) — Don Wilson, Jack Benny's radio announcer, has filed suit for divorce from his third wife on a charge of cruelty.

The complaint claims his wife's conduct has been detrimental to his health and work. She is the former Marusia Radunska, Polish beauty. The couple married in Harrison N. Y., Dec. 17, 1941, and separated last Monday.

Sees Increased Tobacco Exports

Raleigh, N. C. June 1 — (AP) — Exports of flue-cured tobacco this year probably will be 15 to 20 per cent above those of the 1947-48 marketing season, Tobacco Associates, Inc., reported yesterday.

The United Kingdom, the report stated, is expected to use between 180,000,000 and 200,000,000 pounds of the United States flue-cured tobacco from the 1949 crop.

J. B. Hutson, of Washington, D. C., president of Tobacco Associates, said he found in a recent survey abroad that there is "a continued strong demand for the better cigarette grade of flue-cured tobacco."

"Stocks of these grades are low in all European countries," Hutson said. He added that stocks of most other types of cigarette tobacco, including the oriental types, are larger.

The British flue-cured tobacco imports were 167,000,000 pounds last year, and 198,000,000 pounds in 1947.

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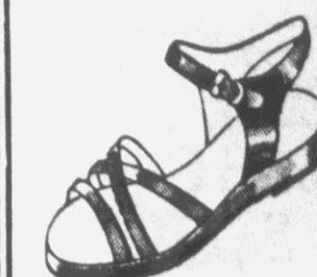
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Strength FOR THE DAY

FOUNTAIN OF LIFE
In ancient times there ran near the Roman Forum a little brooklet called the Girl's Fountain. For many centuries, however, it seemed to disappear; but this was due, not to the fact that the water supply had given out, but that the stream had been covered with debris. In recent years this debris was removed; and when it was, the little brooklet began to sing merrily again as it went on its way.

Jesus said on one occasion that if a man would drink of the water he gave him, the same would become in him a fountain springing up unto everlasting life. There is never anything the matter with this divine source of refreshment. It is always bubbling up ready to make the heart glad. But so often we cover it with debris—greed, false ambition, pride, selfishness.

Commissioner of Banks Guerny P. Hood in support of Governor Scott's proposed \$200 million road bond issue emphasizes the present good financial status of the state in an effort to show that retiring the bonds and interest would be little if any burden on our people.

Mr. Hood, however fails to mention the billions of national debt together with the forty billion dollar national budget, all of which is a direct debt upon every individual and for which everyone is responsible for his or her part. He likewise failed to indicate the financial difficulties that our people might run into even with the slightest depression and the falling off of state revenues.

And above all, Commissioner Hood fails to mention that his present term of office as Commissioner of Banks is about to expire and he is dependent upon Governor Scott for reappointment.

COULD IT BE that Commissioner Hood has a vital personal interest making himself solid with the governor and finds it necessary, like many others, to go along with the program OR ELSE?

Around Capitol Square

AGRICULTURE—Rural North Carolina fared well at the hands of the 1949 general assembly, as witnessed by greatly increased appropriations for schools, health and functions administered by the department of agriculture. Since school and health programs theoretically affect all people, urban and rural alike, treatment of the department of agriculture and State college extension service offers more accurate criterion for appraisal. These agencies fared well as to dollar appropriations and with respect to increased opportunities for aiding farmers.

PROGRAM—Without going into detailed discussion of all the laws affecting the state department of agriculture, the situation can be summarized in the statement that farm leaders generally have approved the legislative program as one of the most progressive in history.

While cities and towns were complaining, with considerable justification, that the legislature was ignoring their problems, the farm groups got almost all they asked for. A legislative summary prepared by the



department says the appropriation for the next biennium is \$3,373,252, of which \$1,001,456 comes from the general fund. This compares with actual spending for the current biennium of \$2,524,932, of which \$330,421 out of general fund revenues.

INCREASES—Stated another way, direct appropriations to the state department of agriculture were increased about 33 per cent and appropriations for extension service at State college were upped about 50 per cent over present spending levels. Substantial part of the increase will go for higher salaries and heavier costs in maintaining standards already set, but a good deal of it will go into expanded services to farmers. In addition to these operating appropriations the department was allotted three million dollars for addition to the downtown building and improvements at the state fair grounds.

FINANCING—One of the most significant actions of the 1949 general assembly was almost overlooked at the time because of more intense interest in appropriations for public schools and the road bond issue. Adoption of what is commonly called a "new pattern of financing for the department of agriculture" had the almost certain effect of abolishing the agriculture fund as a separate and distinct from the general fund.

The change was brought about through the new policy of placing the agriculture department on same basis as other state departments and institutions, in that a departmental budget was approved, anticipated receipts were deducted, and the balance appropriated out of the general fund of the state. That has long been policy with respect to banking, insurance and other departments which collect substantial amounts in service fees. It has also applied to educational institutions.

SEPARATE—The agriculture fund, derived principally from fertilizer, seed and feed inspections, has traditionally been regarded as distinct from the general account. So has the highway fund, derived principally from gasoline taxes and license plates. Theoretically, these funds were secured to their own departments, and the departments were required to live within their own income. Diversion, either in or out, was frowned upon.

OVERLAPPING—As functions administered by the department of agriculture touched more and more phases of state life not directly related to farming, including allocations were made from the general

Jos. McCracken Named Head N. C. Education Board Insurance Division

Raleigh, N.C., June 1—(AP)—The State Board of Education yesterday named Joseph G. McCracken of Elizabeth City to head its Division of Insurance.
His appointment was one of the last steps necessary for the board to put into effect a state-operated system of public school insurance. McCracken, whose salary was set at \$6,500 a year, is expected to report about June 15. The insurance system, according to present plans, is to go into effect July 1.
McCracken, 35, is a native of Buncombe County, a graduate of Wake Forest with a master's degree from

North Carolina, and has been superintendent of the Elizabeth City public schools for five years.
Paul Reid, who is controller for the state board, came to his job from the superintendency of the Elizabeth City schools.
At the time Reid was named controller, McCracken, who had served under him as principal of the Elizabeth City high school, stepped up to become superintendent.
D. Hiden Ramsey of Asheville, chairman of the committee which selected McCracken, described him as "one of the brightest young men in the school system."
McCracken was given a budget of \$23,586 for the first year of operations. Two other employees were authorized for his division, a supervisor of inspections at \$5,500 a year and a secretary at \$2,700.

Russian Sailors Warned Of Spies

Moscow—(AP)—A recent lead editorial in "Red Fleet" told Soviet sailors to beware of foreign spies. The editorial declared that "agents of foreign intelligence services are attempting to obtain various information in the armed forces of our country." It said that the "very character of military service obliges every soldier sailor and officer to be always watchful and on guard."
"Red Fleet" added that "for enemy agents—even the most insignificant information—has interest" and explained that "from details the large picture is built up."
"Red Fleet" declared that "enemy agents especially are on the lookout for people who are morally unstable and who are sycophantic before things foreign, for allphod persons and gossip."

The enemy, the paper said, uses widely the weapon of "bourgeois cosmopolitanism" attempting to weaken Soviet people and undermine their Soviet patriotism.
It is a mistake, declared the editorial, to think that only when a sailor is on watch must he be on the lookout. He must all the time exercise his care and be vigilant, on or off duty. The editorial concluded: "The minister of the armed forces obliges all Soviet warriors to be always in battle readiness, also high readiness presupposes also high vigilance. It is the duty of Soviet naval personnel to vigilantly and ably protect the sea boundaries of our country of socialism. This demand of the motherland is a sacred law for every warrior of the Soviet navy."

'Atomic' Drinks Failed To Save Stricken Girl

Birmingham, Ala., June 1—(AP)—Two "atomic cocktails" failed to save the life of a 15-year-old high school girl suffering with a rare glandular disease.
The girl, Joyce Lee Hughes, died yesterday in a hospital. She was stricken with Hodgkins disease last November and wasted away from her normal 132 pounds to 85 pounds.
Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bryon B. Hughes, had been hopeful she might recover after drinking the "atomic cocktails" at the Isotope Clinic of the University of Tennessee Hospital. The cocktails included radioactive phosphorus from the atomic ovens at Oak Ridge.

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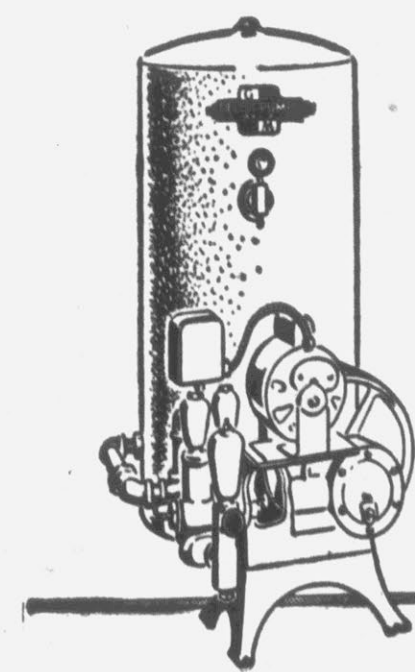

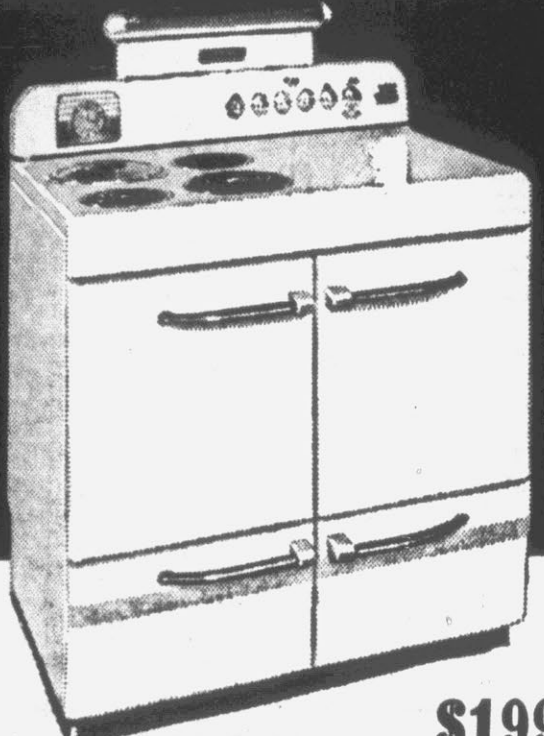

There were 150,558 motor vehicles licensed in 1921 as compared with 958,541 in 1946.

It has been recently estimated that North Carolina now ranks first in population, in retail sales, and in effective buying income among the states in the South Atlantic Group. The population is estimated at 3,761,300 as compared with 2,559,123 in 1920 and 1,893,810 in 1900.

In 1870 England and this country signed an agreement to return to one another a person who had been convicted of perjury in either country.

But the English judge decided that Eisler's falsification of a document here couldn't be considered perjury under the meaning of the treaty, because it didn't cover falsification of documents. So he refused to send Eisler back here.

Knowing perfectly well that Eisler once let loose again would be free to continue to try to destroy Western democratic government, the judge considered first and only what his rights were under the law, as an individual.

The irony of the whole case, of course, is this:

Eisler won his freedom under the laws of the Western democracies which he despises and would destroy and—

If they were destroyed, and replaced by Communism, an Eisler who was an enemy of that new regime and committed a crime here and fled to England, would be bounced back here in a hurry.

the name of Communism and the only way he could be made to bow to it would be by force.

While the chances of any political unity between East and West are slim indeed, authoritative sources in Paris say the Western powers will try to salvage some form of economic unity for Germany from the council meeting. There may be a chance of success here, for there is small doubt that Moscow itself is anxious to get an agreement which will open up trade between Eastern and Western Europe.

The Eastern European bloc is in a bad way, economically, owing to the long disruption of continental trade. Western Europe is doing better, because of the Marshall Plan. However, it might get ahead faster if there were a resumption of trade relations with the countries behind the Iron Curtain.

Thus a revival of economic relations seems to offer the only likely ground for agreement. In any event, that ground probably will be surveyed.

"But," somebody asks, "doesn't all this mean a continuation of the cold war?"

It certainly does! We are just entering a new phase of it, that's all.

'Quick Justice' Victim Is Freed

Jackson, Mich., June 1 —(AP)—Rene DeMeerleer, Michigan's famed "Quick Justice" victim, walked about as a free man today for the first time in 17 years.

The 35-year-old former lifer, who won a fight before the U. S. supreme court, yesterday left Southern Michigan Prison after confinement since he was a youth of 18.

In the warden's office the aging parents, Alphonse and Helen DeMeerleer, met their tall, dark-haired son to take him home.

"It was the most pathetic sight I have ever seen," said Warden Julian Frisbie.

When DeMeerleer entered Frisbie's office, his possessions wrapped in two small, paper-covered bundles, his mother burst into tears.

There were few words. The three hugged and kissed.

Wordlessly, DeMeerleer climbed into a car for the ride to Detroit and a promised job in an automobile factory.

He was 18 when sentenced to life for murder in the fatal holdup shooting of a Lenawee County gasoline station attendant. He was charged, convicted and sentenced in one day.

A few years ago, with the help of prison self-schooling, began a legal battle to have his case reopened. The supreme court ruled that his constitutional rights had been violated in the swift proceedings that followed his arrest.
