

Secret Session On Berlin By Big Four; Silent On Results

Paris, June 3—(AP)—The four-power foreign ministers announced today that they had held a secret session today that they discussed the American and Russian plans for reunifying Berlin.

A terse communique, issued after the meeting, gave no clue as to whether they had made any progress. It said another closed session would be held tomorrow.

The four-power session this afternoon followed an earlier hour-long meeting between U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman.

British sources reported the three western ministers got together to coordinate their ideas in preparation for the crucial phase of the talks they are now entering with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky. There is a general expectation among western diplomats that the fate of the four-power negotiations here will be settled in the next day or two.

Russia and the west already are

agreed in principle on the plan's two most important proposals.

1. Reestablishment of four-power control of Berlin.

2. City-wide elections for an all-Berlin council.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky hinted on Wednesday that Russia was ready to transfer to German civil authority some of the functions exercised in the past by the Kommandatura. That is what the west wants and western diplomats forecast some east-west bargaining.

A tangled problem is Acheson's call for four-power supervision of elections. Both Russia and the western powers have their own version of what constitutes free and fair elections.

The western powers intend to offer a contract which would bind Russia to give the west free road and rail access to Berlin from their zones. They want to avoid the possibility of another blockade.

Russia is expected to suggest unification of currency throughout Germany, under four-power control.

If this proposal fails, Vishinsky might suggest that in Berlin the currency question be passed along to the Germans. The east-west row over control of Berlin's currency was the primary cause of the blockade.

There are signs that both sides will make concessions, because both want to restore peace and quiet to the former German capital.

An important indication is that the Ministers will meet privately, suggesting they will get down to some old-fashioned bargaining.

Another sign is that the western powers are not expected to press too hard to abolish the veto in a reestablished four-power Kommandatura.

Gold Strike

London, June 3—(AP)—Reports of a "fabulously rich" gold strike in South Africa today sent prices of Free State Gold Areas stock soaring from 14 shillings to 33 shillings, one and a half pence (\$2.50 to \$6.50) a share on the London Stock Exchange.

The Gold Areas company was formed in 1947 to explore gold territory in the Free State. The shares were entered on the London Exchange at 15 shillings (3) a share two weeks ago. Previously the stock was available only at Johannesburg, South Africa.

Reports of the gold strike described it as the richest ever made in the South African fields.

Aldermen Cover Many Problems In Long Meeting

Wide Variety Of Issues Taken Up In Regular Session Thursday Night

The Board of Aldermen in regular meeting last night voted to lease a building for the reestablishment of a women's and children's rest center, provided the county board of commissioners would contribute to the operation of the center; voted support to a Junior Women's Club project to eradicate flies in the city; discussed the need for continued bus transportation in the city and heard a number of routine matters.

The three hour meeting was presided over by Mayor J. H. Boyd. In the matter of the rest center for the convenience of visiting shoppers and rural women and children visiting the city, representatives of the Business and Professional Women's Club appeared before the board and stated that the organization would supervise and operate the center if funds for the project were provided by the city and county.

The aldermen voted to lease a building on West Fourth Street for the project provided the county would match the rent money with an equal amount for operations. The women's organization will present the matter to the county board at its regular meeting next Monday.

The matter of the need for city bus transportation was brought to the attention of the board in an announcement that the local bus company would be sold under foreclosure at an early date. Mayor Boyd read letters from the National Carbon Company and the American Lady Corset Company setting forth the need for bus transportation for the convenience of employees of the two concerns. The matter was referred to a special committee to work with the bus company and to help them find a buyer who would continue the operations in Greenville.

Mrs. Johnson Dees, representing the Junior Women's Club, appeared before the board seeking aid in a fly-eradication program in the city. The board promised its support in the undertaking.

Jack Edwards Jr. appeared before the board in behalf of the proposed swimming team for Greenville and asked the city's financial aid in the way of employment of a coach for the team. The matter was referred to the recreation commission.

George Brown registered complaint about an open ditch between Eastern and Lewis Streets and presented letters from physicians stating that many children in the area were infected with malaria as a result of the open ditch. The board ordered immediate action to relieve the situation.

At the request of Leroy Barnes the board voted \$250 to pay expenses of the Rough and Ready Fire Department members to the state convention to be held in Warren on the second Tuesday in July.

The matter of revamping the city's white and Negro recreational programs to bring all activities under single supervision and to appoint two Negro members to the recreation commission was referred to a special committee to work out the plans with the recreation commission.

At the request of Rev. P. H. Mumford the board ordered the police department to take necessary steps to have the highway commission.

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Long Debate Over Bond Issues Nearly Ended; Tar Heels To Vote Tomorrow

Youths Claim Confessions Of Murder Obtained Under Threat

Lloyd Ray Daniels and Bennie Daniels, Negro youths on trial for the murder of William Benjamin O'Neal, white taxi driver on February 5, testified today that oral confessions of the crime had been obtained from them under threat and that they had declined to sign the alleged written confessions.

The testimony of the two youths came while the jury was out of the courtroom to permit argument on the matter of whether some of Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson's testimony would be permitted to go to the jury. The defense put on the two youths in rebuttal to the sheriff's testimony that both of them had made voluntary oral confessions and later had signed them when they were committed to writing.

The first witnesses were called to the stand this morning in Superior court following rapid developments in the court proceedings yesterday afternoon and last night.

Late yesterday afternoon Judge Clawson L. Williams denied the defense motion to quash the bill of indictment against Bennie Daniels, 19 and Lloyd Ray Daniels, 18, charged with the murder last February

5 of William Benjamin O'Neal, white taxi driver of Greenville.

The defense motion, made less than five minutes after the trial was opened here Monday afternoon, charged that Pitt county commissioners and other county officers responsible for preparing jury boxes had created a systematic exclusion of Negroes from duty on the grand jury in the county.

Judge Williams said the court holds that members of the county board of commissioners have not intentionally or otherwise discriminated against any group or person because of color or race.

The judge said he will write a formal order on the motion which he will sign today.

Also during the session yesterday the court completed the selection of 12 jury members and one alternate who will hear the evidence presented in the case. Included in the thirteen are 10 white men, one Negro man and two white women. Four of the jurors were selected Wednesday from the regular 36-man panel drawn for this term of court. Eight additional jurors, including the two white women and one Negro man were drawn from a special venire of 88 persons who were summoned yesterday morning.

When the special venire was exhausted late yesterday afternoon without the thirteenth juror being selected, Judge Williams ordered another special venire of 35 persons drawn to report to court at 8:30 last night. Sixteen members of the sec-

ond special venire were summoned and reported last night. An even dozen of the venire members were examined by the attorneys for the state and the defense before Jack McLawhorn was chosen as the alternate juror.

First prosecution witness to take the stand this morning was Henry James Reddick, Greenville Negro who testified that he knew both the defendants and that he saw them in the Busy Bee Cafe about 8 p.m. on February 5. He said Bennie Daniels struck at him with a knife but that he knocked the blow off with his left hand. He said Lloyd Ray Daniels then said something to Bennie and they went out. Reddick said Bennie knocked him down and that Lloyd Ray pulled Bennie from him. He said he did not see them any more after they left the cafe.

Charlie Moore, Greenville Negro barber, said he had known the defendants all their lives. He said he saw them on the night of February 5 in front of his shop on Bonner's Lane between nine and 10 o'clock. They were fighting in the street. He said they came into his place after the fight and he asked them to leave. One of them had a knife in his hand and they were arguing when they came into the shop, he said.

Under cross examination Moore would not identify a pocket knife as the one the boys had. Lloyd Ray had blood on his shirt when they came into the shop, he said. The

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Selecting A Jury Cost Pitt \$1,110

Fees And Mileage Allowances High As Trial Is Started

The jury for the O'Neal murder trial was completed last night at the cost of approximately \$1,110 to Pitt county in venire members' fees and mileage allowances, records in the office of the clerk of court show.

The twelve jury members and one alternate were selected by state and defense attorneys from a total of 140 white and Negro men and women of Pitt county who were called in the regular jury panel and two special venires summoned to the court to be examined.

The jury which will hear the case is composed of nine white men, one Negro man and two white women, with another white man as alternate juror.

On the jury are six farmers, two carpenters, a beautician, a bookkeeper, a tobacconist, a sales lady and a photographer.

Chosen for jury duty in the case are Fred J. Broadwell, Greenville; Alton Baker, Greenville; J. H. Rabbery of Beaver Dam township; Joe Melton, Jr., Farmville; Mrs. C. L. Davenport, Winterville; F. A. Taylor, Fountain; J. W. Harris, Greenville; W. E. Yelverton, Fountain; Mrs. Willie Dunning, Bethel; W. T. Hobgood Farmville; Travis M. Allen, Jr., Greenville; Carlyle Oakley, Farmville; and Jack W. McLawhorn, Ayden.

Under the laws of the state the jurors are to be kept together and in the custody of jury officers. Until the trial of the case is finished the members of the jury will sleep in the court house where folding cots are put up in the jury rooms and conference rooms at night. So far they have had their meals brought to them in the court house.

The jury was impaneled yesterday afternoon after the twelfth person had been selected, and last night the alternate juror was impaneled.

Scott Ends Campaign Tonight V State-Wide Radio Address; Observers Predict Between 300,000 And 350,000 Votes In Light Turnout

Raleigh, N. C., June 3—(AP)—The long debate over issuance of \$25,000,000 in road and school bonds was virtually over today.

Tomorrow North Carolina by the thousands will turn out to cast their ballots for or against:

1. A \$200,000,000 bond issue to raise funds to finance a big-scale rural roads construction program. Approval of these bonds automatically will result in a one-cent boost in the state's gasoline tax.

2. A \$25,000,000 bond issue to aid counties in school construction. If approved, funds will be distributed to counties in accordance with school enrollment. The General Assembly in authorizing the school bond election made a direct appropriation of \$25,000,000 for the same purpose which will be among the counties equally—\$250,000 to each county.

Governor Scott, who has taken his campaign in support of the bond issues into every section of the state, will end his campaign with a state-wide radio address at 7:30 p. m. tonight. The talk will be carried by 44 stations.

The last day of the campaign also brought a radio talk by Mrs. Scott in support of the bonds.

A. H. (Sandy) Graham of Hillsboro, who was highway commission chairman under Governor R. Gregg Cherry, continued to speak in opposition to the road bonds.

His assertion in a speech broadcast by transcription that approval of the bonds would result in North Carolina's having the highest highway debt in the nation and the third highest total debt.

It will be the first state-wide bond issue election in state history. Polls will open at 6:30 a. m. and close at 6:30 p. m. Political observers here predicted that between 300,000 and 350,000 persons would vote—that would be a light turnout as compared with the total of 700,000 who voted in the general election last fall.

If the bonds are approved, it will be the greatest debt ever assumed by the state—comparing with a previous peak of about \$175,000,000 reached in 1929.

Governor Scott wants to use the road bond funds to hard-surface 12,000 miles of roads and to place 35,000 additional miles in an all-weather condition. The highway system of the state—primary and secondary—consists of about 65,000 miles of road, of which 16,282 miles already are hard-surfaced.

In urging approval of the bonds, the Governor has asserted that improved rural roads will enable farmers to market their crops, will enable industrial workers living in the country to get to and from their jobs, and will enable school buses to cover their routes in all kinds of weather.

The Governor also has asserted that better roads will promote industrialization of sections of the state which are not now developed.

Those opposing the bonds have contended that it is not necessary

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Leading Banker Dies Suddenly

San Mateo Calif., June 3—(AP)—A. P. Giannini, founder and president of the Bank of America, the world's largest bank, died at his home here this morning. He was 78.

Death was attributed to heart disease. He had been in bed for nearly a month with a persistent cold, which doctors said apparently aggravated a heart condition.

Giannini founded the Bank of Italy in 1904. It later became the Bank of America, a six billion dollar corporation.

GHS Graduates 85 In Exercises Last Night

Awards And Diplomas Given Class Of '49; Supt. J. H. Rose Comments On Year Of Achievement; Graduates Speak

Greenville High School graduating exercises at Wright auditorium at East Carolina Teachers College last night were impressive and significant in the history of the fine scholastic and other attainments of the seniors.

"Nineteen forty-nine was a great year for Greenville High School," Supt. J. H. Rose said during his presentation of awards to students and prolonged applause from the audience echoed the sentiment of students, teachers, parents, and friends of the school.

A feature of the graduating exercises was the appearance on the platform of Dr. John D. Messick, president of ECTC, "whose leadership and influence in education are giving strong impetus to its forward march in Greenville and elsewhere in North Carolina," Mr. Rose said.

The highlights of the commencement exercises were the practical and eloquent addresses by two graduates, Bettie Anne Young and Frederick P. Brooks, Jr. Their theme was "The Fort-Niners of the Twentieth Century." They compared the westward trek of the pioneers of 1849 for the making of a better world with the graduates of Greenville High School in 1949 who are starting out on life's journey to use their education and training with a fixed purpose to help to make the world better. No speakers here were ever accorded more rapt attention; none ever received more applause. Their addresses will appear in the Daily Reflector's Saturday's edition.

The senior procession, "God of Our Fathers," played by the High School band under direction of John Arant, and the march of the graduates into the auditorium tingled the atmosphere with a warmth of kinship and appreciation of the school's achievements.

The Ketch Cup distinguished service award, was won by Bettie Anne Young and Frederick P. Brooks, Jr., who were tied. These talented students also tied for the Woman's Club Award for highest scholastic record and divided the honor.

Barbara Clement won the George B. Singletary UDC Award for an essay on the life of Sidney Lanier.

Gov't Jobs Begging

The Hickenlooper-Lillenthal Argument Points Up Well-Known Fact That Most Of Well-Qualified Workers Don't Like Working For Government; Reasons

Washington, June 3—(AP)—Uncle Sam has a time getting his nieces and nephews to work for him, or keeping them when he gets them. His problem is pointed up all over again in the argument between Senator Hickenlooper, Iowa Senator, and David E. Lillenthal, chairman of the atomic energy commission.

The Senator, criticizing Lillenthal's management on the AEC, said it had a turnover in workers of about 87 per cent in 1947-48. That means only about 13 per cent of AEC's people stayed in their jobs.

But Lillenthal said Hickenlooper's figures were away off, that the turnover in 1947-48 was only around 50 per cent. Which means about 50 per cent stayed in their jobs.

But the whole federal government has quite a time getting and holding people, as former President Hoover once more noted in an interview this week with the magazine U. S. News and World report:

Every year the turnover in federal employees is about 500,000. Since the government has around 2,100,000 employees, this means every year 25 per cent of the federal workers quit and another 500,000 have to

be hired to take their places. Mr. Hoover was chairman of a commission created by Congress to study the federal government setup and suggest ways of improving it.

It found getting good people to take government jobs isn't easy. Particularly since the number of workers has increased so much. In 1939 the government employed 900,000 people. By 1945, because of the war, it was employing 3,700,000. This had to be cut down when peace came. But—

Between 1945 and now the government has released or lost 3,900,000 employees and hired 2,800,000, for a total turnover of 6,700,000 employees in three years.

Members of the Hoover commission, anxious to find out what young people think of going to work for the government, sent a questionnaire to 3,448 Senior students in 94 colleges.

This is what was learned: Only one out of four of the 3,448 answered were interested in a government career. What were the

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Fourteen Escape In Prison Break

Convicts Saw And Slug Way From 'Escape-Proof' Cells

Moundsville, W. Va., June 3—(AP)—Fourteen prisoners saved and slugged their way out of a supposedly "escape proof" south hall of the state penitentiary here today.

It was West Virginia's biggest mass prison break in at least 35 years.

Six of the convicts were serving life terms, and six of them were in solitary confinement.

The escaping prisoners left behind them a bleeding guard they had slugged and tossed into one of the vacated cells. He was Jackie James, prominent as a baseball umpire in the Wheeling area.

The guard's station telephone was taken off its hook. When he failed to report at 3 a.m. (EST) and the central desk found his line continued busy, an investigation was started.

Warden Orel J. Skeen said the break was discovered within a few minutes and that roadblocks were being set up within 30 minutes after the men crawled through a window onto Jefferson Avenue.

A skiff moored to the West Virginia bank of the Ohio River was stolen, giving rise to the belief that the escapees may have crossed into Ohio.

State police also received reports of a stolen automobile at suburban Glendale. It was found abandoned in Wheeling, 10 miles away, but near the spot another parked car had been stolen, leading officials to believe the men had scattered.

The section from which the men escaped contains the death house and the solitary, supposedly escape-proof cells.

Big Bond Is Set For Alleged Head Of Lottery Ring

Greensboro, June 3—(AP)—Francis Duval (George) Smith, accused lottery ringleader, has to post a bond of \$26,100 before he will be released from city jail.

The bond in Smith's case was set yesterday by Judge E. Earle Rives who said it was the highest amount ever asked in municipal-court history.

The total bond includes \$15,000 set by the local court \$10,000 required by Wilmington police on two lottery counts, \$1,000 on a charge of assaulting a state highway patrolman, and \$100 on a charge of improper state license.

Tentative trial date set on the Greensboro charge, which accuses him of being involved in a lottery conspiracy, is June 21.

Fire Burns Over Dare Timberland

Elizabeth City, June 3—(AP)—A forest fire, discovered yesterday afternoon, had burned over several thousand acres of timber in Dare county and was continuing to burn today, according to county fire warden Al Hooper.

When discovered the fire was burning on a five mile front six miles from Stumpy Point and for a time the village was believed in danger. However a southwesterly wind carried the blaze toward the Alligator and Long Shoal rivers.

Strike One-Man Snag On Unanimous Pact Approval

Washington, June 3—(AP)—The Senate Foreign Relations committee trying for unanimous approval of a report on the Atlantic Pact, was snagged today by one member's objections.

Senator George (D-Ga.) said yesterday he could not support the report now in the committee's hands. Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) had called it "an able and splendid report."

The group will meet again Monday to try to settle the conflict, so the report can be sent to the Senate along with the pact.

George, who is chairman of the Senate Finance committee, has been ill for the past two weeks and unable to carry on his work at the Capitol.

But he left his hotel to make an appearance at the Foreign Relations

committee meeting and raise his objections to the report. He told a reporter he wants the report to be "very specific" on what authority the President will have to send troops into combat.

He added he wants it spelled out that the President cannot use armed forces to aid any pact nation without approval of Congress.

Critics have argued the treaty would open the way for the President to plunge the nation into conflict without a declaration of war by Congress. Only Congress has the constitutional right to declare war.

Connally and other administration leaders replied that the treaty would not infringe on the war powers of Congress. Connally has said the report will make it clear the pact has no "hidden" meanings or obligations.

Chinese Reds Reported As Occupying Tsingtao

Shanghai, June 3—(AP)—A reliable source said today Chinese Communists had occupied Tsingtao, the North China port which until recently was the anchorage for the U. S. Western Pacific fleet.

U. S. ships and personnel pulled out of Tsingtao several days ago.

The informant said the Chinese Nationalist navy also had withdrawn and the Communists took over the city and port without a fight. It was the last city held by the Nationalists in Northeast China.

The United States maintains a mail consulate at Tsingtao. Carl Hawthorne is acting Consul General. The Shanghai Consulate said as many as 40 Americans are in Tsingtao. There are about 70 British nationalists there.

Tsingtao originally was a German

treaty port and many Germans still live there.

Meanwhile, the Communist "Liberation Daily" announced that dealing in all foreign exchange was being outlawed.

Foreign currency held here must be deposited at the Peoples Bank. Receipts will be issued against it. These receipts will be negotiable.

The ruling was described as temporary, but no expiration date was set.

(Meanwhile, Marshal Yen Hui-Shan, former North China warlord, was named Premier of Nationalist China at Canton.

(The legislative Yuan approved his selection to succeed Gen. Ho Ying-Chin. Marshal Yen was in Forbes, reportedly conferring with Chiang Kai-Shek.)

No Success

Berlin, June 3—(AP)—The four military commanders of Berlin met for three and a half hours today but came to no understanding on the city's crippling rail strike.

It was the first such meeting here in 10 weeks. Brig. Gen. Frank L. Howley, the American Commandant, told newsmen no agreement was reached but a "great number of proposals were offered and discussed."

Atomic Workers Schedule Strike

Thursday Walkout Would Stop Production Of U-235

Oak Ridge, Tenn., June 3—(AP)—A strike of 2,000 workers in a huge atomic production plant is planned for next Thursday.

If the strike comes off, it will stop production of uranium 235 in one of the largest industrial plants in the world. U-235 is the fissionable element that goes into atomic bombs.

A CIO union voted last night to strike and asked its international headquarters for authorization.

At Washington President Martin Wagner, of the United Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers (CIO) said the union's officers would take up the Oak Ridge local's strike resolution today.

Wagner indicated a decision would be announced after the meeting.

The union asked a 15-cent hourly wage increase when negotiations began seven weeks ago for a new contract to begin June 9.

A counter-proposal that wages be reduced six cent was made by Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Corp. operator of all Oak Ridge atomic installations for the Atomic Energy Commission.

The CIO employees' average wage is \$1.59.

J. A. George, president of the union's local 288, said the strike resolution was passed in two union meetings attended by 600 members.

The resolution asserted that "negotiations have produced no results" and asked that the committee be empowered to call a strike.

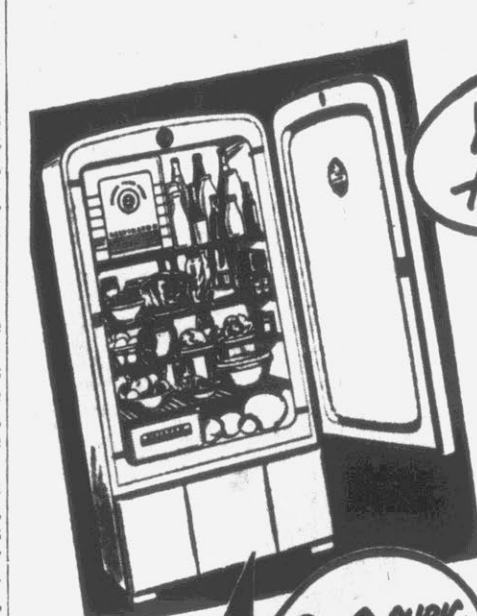

INERTIA AND MOMENTUM
Everyone who has helped to push a stalled automobile knows how hard it is to make the car start rolling, but how easily it rolls once it has started. The tendency of the automobile to stand still and not be moved is called "inertia." The force which tends to keep it rolling once it has started is called "momentum."

Inertia and momentum are terms which apply, strictly speaking, to material objects only. But we all have experienced something like them in our mental and moral activities. How hard it is, when we wake up at night feeling cold, to muster our will power, climb out of bed, and close the window - but once we jump from beneath the covers how quickly and easily we do the job and slip back into bed. Somebody Told Me...

By I. J. (JACK) EDWARDS, JR.

There are plenty of people in Greenville who sit around and dream of the exciting experiences they would like to have in far-away places, but only a few try to make the dreams come true.

Among the few are Frances Kittrell and Rosalie Taylor, who decided they wanted to see the country and became airline stewesses. It may be a different story ten years from now, but at this point most of us consider such positions unusual, dangerous and exciting. In view of that fact, I interviewed Frances and Rosalie by mail. Frances is the first to answer the untempered questions I asked. Her letter is much too interesting to edit, so here it is, word for word:

"Two years ago May 12th I came to work for Delta Air Lines. Stewardesses are hired between the ages of 21-26. There are maximum and minimum weight and height qualifications, certain educational qualifications, and the rest hinges on personality and general appearance. Delta trained me and I went to school for four weeks. (Stewardesses now come from McConnell Hostess School in Minneapolis, where the girls train for eight weeks.)

"Our training course consisted of history of the air line, air craft familiarization, study of weather conditions, routes of all domestic airlines, flight duties, passenger handling, an extensive first aid course, emergency procedures, etc. Most of this information is compiled in our Passenger Service Manual which each stewardess keeps during her period of service with Delta. Revisions for the manual come out even on top of Mount Mitchell.

Every effort is made to operate the state parks in accordance with the highest standards particularly with regard to public health and safety. The most frequently heard comments in state parks are remarks on their cleanliness and well-kept condition and the water safety measures carried out by the life guards. The people of the state own the state parks and they take pride in seeing them kept in good condition.

A large scale construction program is under way to build many much

needed public use facilities now lacking. With the \$500,000 permanent improvement appropriation provided by the 1947 General Assembly and the \$1,074,144 appropriated by the 1949 session, new recreational facilities will be added at eleven state parks.

New York - (P) - Can you find security? How?

Security used to be something that only the old folks dreamed of - and the old nations.

Today the young people and the young nations want it. They feel tired even before they are tested in the crucible of effort and the changing years.

They want a guarantee. And there is no guarantee.

There are as many patterns in security as there are in plaid suits. And the styles change in both.

Right now the pattern of security in America is changing. Or at least the change in pattern is more clearly visible. For the present generation is markedly different in its goals from any previous generation in America.

The traditional ideal of security in this country has been the security of equal opportunity. The real frontier in America was always the small farm a man could enlarge, the little business he could found and make bigger. Security lay in the possibility of growth and expansion. You started low, aimed high. And if you missed your aim it was your own fault. My father, who ran his own trapline in Missouri at the age of ten, exemplified this tradition. All he asked was:

"Give me the same chance Rockefeller had."

He died at 48. He left a \$2,000 insurance policy, five children and a small grocery business. But he was a secure man all his life, economically at least, because he had his chance. And he liked the system that gave him his chance. He didn't simply believe in competition. He loved it.

Today young men follow a different pattern of security. They don't ask for opportunity so much as they do a career insured at the start against risk.

This feeling is shown by a survey

In the current issue of Fortune magazine. It found that only two percent of the 1948 college graduates have any intention of going into business for themselves.

Where a choice was possible, a majority also preferred taking jobs with large corporations rather than with small business concerns they felt were more risky.

These preferences emphasize the dramatic change in thinking that has taken place in America in one generation. Our "hope of tomorrow" isn't looking for adventurous opportunity so much as it is for placid certainty.

It amounts to exchanging the lonely dare of individualism for the warmth of the pastured herd. But entire herds freeze in a blizzard as well as the animal that walks alone. Is it really better to be a small frog in a big puddle that may never dry up than it is to be a big frog in a little puddle that might evaporate tomorrow? If both puddles disappear, which frog is more likely to find another puddle?

What makes love and life and jobs and children so wonderful is the knowledge that they won't be with us forever. Or, if they do stay, the realization we can't remain with them forever.

There is no real safety in the world at all and never will be. There is no security in terms of dollars or health. And there never will be.

The only security lies in accepting the Lord's challenge - He who put man on earth in a celestial gamble that man could make earth and himself better. Anyone who makes himself better finds the only lasting security - peace of mind. And no one else ever does.

workers.
Since those days the communist world revolution has struck in many countries, with particular attention

to the United States as leader of the democracies. There is no communist government which has the support of all the people whom it rules. However, counting the Soviet union and its satellite countries, Moscow probably has control of more than

300,000,000 people.
How many of these folks are communists is a matter of speculation. Only a tiny percentage of Russia's inhabitants belong to the party.
Apart from these nations, the communists have heavy membership in many other countries. France and Italy are among them. And China, with its population of some 500,000,000 appears about to fall under control of the Chinese communists who are working with the blessings of Moscow, if with nothing more. And who can guess how many communists are working underground in our own United States.
Taking the world as a whole there is no lack of material to feed the fire of ideological struggle. As a matter of fact, quite apart from communism, much of our globe is undergoing politico-social upheavals of one sort or another.

'Cease Fire' For Service Pay Bill

Washington, June 3 — (AP) — A congressman said today that Army and Navy wives have received a 'cease fire' order from Secretary of Defense Johnson on their Capitol Hill campaign to push the military pay bill.
Rep. Sutton (D-Tenn) told reporters word has been passed from Johnson's office quietly but firmly, for the ladies to stop calling on congressmen. Sutton said he heard of the order from a friend stationed at the Pentagon.
"I only hope they haven't killed the bill," Sutton said. "I want to see a pay bill passed."
Sutton led a House group of World War II veterans who contended the bill should give larger increases to enlisted men and junior officers, and smaller ones to top ranking officers.
The ex-GIs attempted to scale down the raises for the high brass proposed in the original bill. When they failed they sparked a successful move to recommit the bill to the House Armed Services Committee for further study.
Flying squads of military wives visited the Capitol Wednesday, concentrating on House members who voted to send the bill back to committee.

Can Now Express Own Opinions On Public Issues

Washington, June 3—(AP)—U. S. radio stations have won their eight-year fight for the right to express their own opinions on public issues over the air.
It is something they have been restrained from doing since 1941, when the federal communications commission—which holds life and death power over radio stations through control of their operating licenses—said that broadcasting stations could not "editorialize" or "advocate" anything.
This meant that while stations were expected to make facilities available for all persons or parties of all points of view, they could not express their own opinions on public issues.
The commission amended this policy late yesterday.

Comb Area Near Raleigh For Suspected Killer

Raleigh, June 3—(AP)—Aided by bloodhounds, state highway patrolmen combed an area near here today for a Negro who officers believed to be a man wanted for a triple slaying.
The patrolmen began the hunt yesterday when it was reported that a man closely answering the description of James Diggs, 36, had been seen near Apex, 16 miles southwest of Raleigh.
A three-state search for Diggs has been underway since Tuesday when he shot a Hamlet policeman in the mouth when the officer tried to arrest the Negro on Norfolk, Va. charges of killing his wife and two children.
The condition of the policeman Rex A. Howell, 29, was reported improved at the Hamlet hospital.

Rep. Rivers (D-SC) takes a nice cut at the ball. Hits it, too, sometimes. And Rep. Harris (D-Ark.), in addition to his chores of Democratic manager, also is pretty fair country catcher.

In case you wonder why your Congressman is cavorting around this way, there's a good reason. The game is sponsored by the Washington Evening Star, and the proceeds go to underprivileged children.

Fence-Busting Phillies Slam Five Eighth Inning Homers

Hail the fighting Phillies—new fence-busting champs of baseball.

Five home runs in a smashing eighth-inning rally last night put the 1949 Phils in the record books alongside the 1939 New York Giants. No more Futility Phils.

Only once before in modern baseball has a team hit five homers in one inning. The Giants did it 10 years ago at the Polo Grounds after two were out. In both cases, Cincinnati was the victim.

It was June 6, 1939 when the Giants unloaded their thunder on the pennant-bound Reds. They won 17-3.

Andy Seminick, who nicked Cincinnati pitching for three homers last evening, made the Phils' feat distinct because he hammered two in the same inning. That tied a major league mark shared by several players. The last time it was done was by Joe DiMaggio, June 24, 1936.

Del Ennis' homer started the big inning which opened with Ken Riefensberger enjoying a 3-2 lead. Seminick came next. Before it was over 10 runs were home and Puddin' Head Jones, Schoolboy Rowe and Seminick again had hit the ball out of the park. Seminick's second of the inning came with two on.

In addition to the homers, Jones just missed the second time around with a triple and Gran Hamner's double also crashed against the wall, a few feet short of going into the stands.

Raffensberger went into the game with a string of 18 successive scoreless innings. He left in the midst of the eighth with a dazed expression. The final score was Philadelphia 12, Cincinnati 3.

Counting Seminick's earlier homer, the Phils had six for the night. Only one short of the National League record. In fact it was a new high for a night game, if that means anything. The best previous under the lights was five by the Giants, twice in 1947 and once last year.

Warren Spahn boosted the Boston Braves' National League lead to two full games by defeating Pittsburgh, 4-1, while both the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers lost.

Brooklyn's Don Newcombe blew a 4-1 lead in the ninth and the Dodgers finally succumbed to the St. Louis Cardinals in the 14th, 7-4.

to go into debt to build roads. They would prefer a "pay as you go" program, and they contend that without a tax increase or a bond issue, the Scott administration will have a total of \$291,000,000 available for road work—for maintenance of present roads and construction of new ones.

Supporters of the road bonds have estimated they will cost the state about \$37,000,000 in interest. This is based on the assumption the bonds can be marketed at approximately two per cent interest and that repayment of principal would begin immediately. Total debt service, principal and interest, would average about \$11,000,000 a year for 22 years.

This compares with a total of \$107,943,110 the state will have paid by 1953 on the \$116,800,000 it borrowed during the 1920's to finance building of the primary road system.

Norman Tripp, white taxi driver said he had seen the Daniels boys around for a couple of years. He said he was in a taxi across the street from the bus station between nine and 10 o'clock Saturday night February 5 next to the taxi of Ben O'Neal. He said he saw the Daniels boys come across the street and get into O'Neal's taxi and that O'Neal also got in and drove off toward Washington. The two boys were still in the cab as it went toward Five Points, he said.

Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson testified that about noon of Sunday February 6 he received a phone call from Chief of Police Lester D. Page. He said he went by and picked up Chief Page and that they went out on highway 264 approximately six miles and turned left on a dirt road, went a short distance and turned into another dirt road, reached the scene where a taxi was parked in a barnyard near three tobacco barns. The scene was one of disorder with the left door of the taxi open and an overcoat on the ground at the open door. The back of the car was toward he and Page, he said. O'Neal's driver's license was found some distance from the car and his papers were scattered about the seat of the car. The glove compartment of the car was open and O'Neal's empty pocketbook was found in the car. His driver's permit was found on the floor of the car. Several feet away from the car in front of the barn was O'Neal's body. The head of the dead man was toward the barn and his feet toward the road. O'Neal's head was beaten to a pulp, with a large hole in it and brains were scattered about the ground. His overcoat was torn in two pieces. The head was lying in a hole with the face literally torn to pieces and with one ear nearly cut off. There were cuts across the nose and face and one eye was cut up and down. The hands were cut and the bones in them broken. O'Neal's back bore deep cuts from the waist line almost to the shoulders and his throat was cut almost from ear to ear. Numerous broken tobacco sticks and two bricks all bearing blood were about the body. A long rail from a tobacco barn, also bloody, was nearby. Pictures taken by the police of the murder scene and body were introduced as substantiating testimony. There was also a blood spot inside the barn and there was blood on the doorknob of the barn.

confess the crime he would never be able to "see his mother again." The witness said that fear caused him to tell the officer that he had had a part in the commission of the crime. He said that he did not make a confession in the Williamson jail and that he refused to sign the alleged confession when it was read to him.

On cross examination he admitted that he had later identified bloody clothes as belonging to him and Bennie.

Bennie Daniels, the other defendant, told of being arrested near Winterville and being carried to Williamson. He denied that he had made any oral confession enroute to Williamson and said that in Williamson he was slapped and pushed around by some officer in an effort to get him to confess. He denied that he had made any confession and that he had signed anything.

On cross examination he failed to identify the person who slapped him from the group of officers supposed to have been present when the confessions were made. He also admitted that he had identified some bloody clothes as belonging to him but said they got bloody in a fight on Bonner's Lane in Greenville. He said after the fight he and Lloyd Ray walked as far as Simpson, then thumbed a ride to the dirt road where they got off and went to Lloyd Ray's home for the night.

Former Patrolman Gibbs, now with the SBI, took the stand and testified that Lloyd Ray Daniels had voluntarily made a confession to him while enroute to Williamson. He said no threats had been made and that no rewards had been offered. He further testified that he was present when the written confessions were made in Williamson and they too were voluntary.

As cross examination was begun, Judge Williams recessed court for luncheon.
