

See Five Million Or More Jobless By End Of Year

Two Surveys Agree On Outlook But Dis- agree As To What Happens Next

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Two national surveys agree the nation soon may have 5,000,000 or more jobless, but they disagree on what happens next.

In reports published over the weekend:

The Public Affairs Institute warned, "Nothing in sight indicates a halt in unemployment trends."

The American Federation of Labor declared, "A serious business recession is almost impossible."

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), also in a weekend statement, said the situation is confused and Congress will study it.

The Public Affairs Institute, which describes itself as a non-profit, non-partisan research organization, predicted that 8,000,000 workers will be out of jobs a year from now unless the federal government steps in to give business a boost.

Unemployment may hit 6,000,000 by the end of this year, the institute added.

In a special report on employment, the institute recommended tax cuts for the low and middle income brackets, emergency public works in hard-hit areas, revival of the Civilian Conservation Corps, and other federal actions to reabsorb and stimulate business.

"Unemployment has passed the 'spot' stage," the institute said. "It is not a local, but a national, problem."

The AFL looked over the economic outlook in its magazine, "Labor's Monthly Survey," and found the prospect good. It acknowledged there are some dangers, however, and said policies of unions, management and the government right now are "all important."

It said wages should keep moving upward to increase consumer buying, but suggested increases be based on increases in productivity. It urged unions to cooperate with management in cutting out waste and bringing down expenses.

The AFL warned this is no time for government, management, or unions to start any tinkering that might bring on inflation again.

Nine Injured As Bus, Car Collide

Henderson, June 20—(AP)—Nine persons were slightly injured and several others shaken up early today when a bus and a car collided on the highway between Louisville and Warrenton near here.

There were 39 people aboard the bus when the driver, Joseph Howard Coulson, said he lost control of the vehicle. It plummeted down a ten foot bank, landing in about two feet of water of a shallow pond.

Five white persons and four Negroes were injured. All were treated at local hospitals and all except one discharged.

Aging Educators Go On Honeymoon

Middlebury, Vt., June 20—(AP)—A 79-year-old former president of Pennsylvania State College was honeymooning today with a 75-year-old former dean of Middlebury College.

Dr. John M. Thomas and Miss Eleanor S. Ross were married here Saturday.

Dr. Thomas, now retired, was a Middlebury College graduate and one-time president of that institution. He also was president of Rutgers and Norwich universities.

Health Officers Move Into Flash-Flood Areas

Work To Avert Pos- sible Typhoid Threat From Polluted Wa- ter; Nine Known Dead In Flood.

Petersburg, W.Va., June 20—(AP)—Health authorities moved into the flood-stricken Shenandoah and Potomac River valleys today to avert any possible threat of typhoid from polluted water.

The danger of disease was the aftermath of flash floods that swept through Petersburg and Moorefield, W.Va., and Bridgewater, Va., over the weekend, killing at least nine persons.

Still unaccounted for were about a dozen others in the area. Officials directing the operations said, however, that they might still be alive but unable to communicate with rescuers.

Sheriff C. L. Pratt said damage from the flood may run into several millions. James Breathed, local Red Cross disaster chairman, said only about 15 persons are actually homeless, but that some 300 are depending on the Red Cross food kitchen for meals.

Drinking water in Petersburg and other communities hit by the floods has been polluted, and health officials are starting a program of inoculations.

Dr. Claude A. Thomas, district health officer, said in Romney that no disease has occurred as the result of the flood yet, and that the chances are good that none will.

However, state officials are taking no chances. Chief State Sanitary Engineer H. K. Gridley and an assistant, J. B. Baker, were scheduled to arrive in the area today.

Wouldn't Cook, He Killed Wife

Payetteville, N.C., June 20—(AP)—A 52-year-old Negro father admitted to police today that he killed his wife with an ax and shot and wounded his 22-year-old son because "they wouldn't cook for me."

John Carter, of near Vander, said, "I put up with it as long as I could."

Key Test Votes Near In Senate Over Labor Law

Showdown Seen To- day On Handling Strikes Imperiling Nat'l Welfare

Washington, June 20—(AP)—The Senate labor law debate edged today toward a series of key test votes on how to deal with strikes imperiling the national welfare.

Senate leaders hoped for a showdown by nightfall on that issue. It is regarded generally as a key issue because the outcome is expected to point up pretty definitely for the first time the voting strength of:

(1) Those in the Senate who want to get rid of all or most of the Taft-Hartley law, and (2) those who want to preserve most of it.

As the third week of labor legislation in that second group were backing a proposal by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) which would keep the Taft-Hartley provision for injunctions against critical strikes.

Taft's plan also proposes government seizure of struck plants—something which is not authorized under the present law.

Senators in the other group—those opposed to the Taft-Hartley law—are far from being agreed on an alternative to the Taft-Hartley injunction, a provision the labor unions hate.

But the plan which appears to have the most support in that camp is one by Senators Douglas (D-Ill.) and Aiken (R-Vt.). It would let the government seize plants for up to 90 days.

The Douglas-Aiken plan says nothing about injunctions, but its sponsors have acknowledged that once the government had seized a plant or industry, the way would be open for an injunction.

Taft predicted over the weekend that his plan would be approved. He said he expects that about 16 of the Senate's 54 Democrats will vote for it, and that only four or five of the 42 Republican senators will believe against it.

Byrnes Hits At Stateism Trend

Lexington, Va., June 20—(AP)—President Truman's social-economic program has drawn the fire of former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes.

Some of the new programs "seriously proposed" before Congress "point inevitably to the welfare state," Byrnes told a Washington and Lee University convocation audience here Saturday.

And he added, because "every segment of society is demanding special privileges," the nation is "going down the road to stateism."

Windsor's Chief To Have Hearing

Windsor, N.C., June 20—(AP)—A hearing was scheduled for today in the case of Harold J. Lupton, Windsor's Police Chief who resigned yesterday following his arrest.

Lupton was arrested following a fight between himself and Lee Overton, also of Windsor, over Overton's wife, according to police.

He was charged with assault, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, and disorderly conduct. He was released under \$1,000 bail. Lupton had been Windsor's police chief for nine years.

Coal Miners Troop Back To Pits; Another Holiday

Pittsburgh, June 20—(AP)—John L. Lewis' nearly half-million United Mine Workers trooped back to the pits today as the UMW's contract negotiations neared the showdown stage.

Just as UMW district leaders predicted, the week-long "stabilization" walkout ordered by Lewis ended on schedule. The few mines operating shifts reported full-scale production underway. Little absenteeism was expected as 7 a.m. shifts began.

The 480,000 UMW members can use the money they earn this week on Saturday they quit work again—this time for their 10-day paid vacation. But the loss of last week's wages offset to a considerable degree the \$100 each of them will receive for their vacation.

The miners, too, aren't sure just when they'll return to work after the end of their vacations. That's because the current UMW contract run out June 30.

If Lewis and the operators can't come to terms it's a foregone conclusion there will be a strike. The bushy-browed leader long has adhered to a "no contract, no work" policy.

Last week's walkout didn't hurt the nation's economy. Despite the fact it was the second walkout of the year for the UMW—in March Lewis ordered a two-week shutdown.

There's more coal above ground than ever before. Sources close to the industry say it's enough to keep industrial production humming for 60 to 80 days.

About the only persons, outside of the miners themselves, who suffered from the walkouts were employees of coal-hauling railroads. Last week some 30,000 railroaders were furloughed.

House Probers' Actions Again Upheld By Court

Washington, June 20—(AP)—For the second time in as many weeks, the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals today upheld the House Un-American Activities Committee in cases challenging its investigation methods.

The court ruled unanimously that the committee did not violate constitutional rights when in 1946 it demanded "all the books, records, documents and correspondence" of the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties.

Berlin Accord

Paris, June 20—(AP)—The big four Foreign Ministers are expected to announce today an agreement to bring peace to strife-torn Berlin—Europe's No. 1 trouble spot.

Authoritative sources said agreement was reached yesterday on a "live and let live" pact on the former German capital and also on instructions to the Ministers' deputies to write an independence treaty for Austria.

The agreement on Berlin and on resumption of East-West trade in Germany is expected to ease international tension. It is understood that in return for the west's reopening of trade with the east, Russia will issue a statement guaranteeing the west free access to Berlin, preventing another blockade of the city.

Big four experts reached speedy agreement on a communique to be released later today announcing terms of the accord between the East and West.

Try Compromise On Trade Treaty

Argentine Pact Issue Most Serious Rift Yet Met

Washington, June 20—(AP)—American and British officials apparently are searching for a face-saving compromise in their row over a proposed British-Argentine trade agreement.

While the issue is the most serious which has thus far entered American Relations with any country under the European recovery program, officials discounted speculation that the United States might actually cut off some Marshall plan aid to Britain.

Rather it appeared from information available here—from the state department, ECA and British Embassy and from London and Buenos Aires dispatches—that a compromise is shaping up along these lines:

1. Britain and Argentina will not sign the treaty until after the state department and ECA have a chance to study and comment on it.

2. Britain intends to go through with the five-year agreement but concedes that such two-nation deals are contrary to the principles of free international trade and should be avoided whenever possible.

3. While the British will make a firm agreement to but specified quantities of meat from Argentina for five years the agreements will decide each year what they want from Britain. Thus, Argentina's purchase contracts will be renegotiated every year so that at almost any time an American seller theoretically could enter the market.

This latter point is perhaps the most important now under study here. British Embassy officials stressed it to the state department last week with the argument that Britain is not trying to sew up Argentine trade or exclude American goods from Argentine markets.

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee today said they favor writing a new retirement plan into the military pay bill.

Senator Hunt (D-Wyo.) told his colleagues Congress will be doing "only half a job" if it does not overhaul the military retirement set-up along with the pay scale.

New Retirement Plan Considered

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Secretary of Defense Johnson was reported today to have told senators defense spending can be trimmed by \$750,000,000 in the 12 months starting July 1.

Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee said Johnson told them behind closed doors that this could be done mainly by cutting back the future size of the Air Force from the 70 groups proposed in Congress to the 48 urged by President Truman.

The senators had called Johnson for testimony on the \$15,900,000,000 armed forces money bill passed by the House.

Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Okl.) of the subcommittee considering the bill has said he hopes that at least \$1,000,000,000 can be trimmed from it.

Burglary Tools Bring Jail Term

Laurens, S.C., June 20—(AP)—Grover (Tojo) Pulley, 44, has been sentenced to 12 years in jail for possessing burglary tools. He is the North Carolina murder parolee who was questioned in the Atlanta slaying of Metropolitan Opera Tenor John Garris.

He was convicted in general sessions court here Saturday on the burglary tool charges. Clinton policemen arrested him two months ago on a hitchhiker's tip. The tools were found in his souped up automobile.

First Barn

The first barn of tobacco reported harvested in Pitt County this season was put in Friday on Eugene Price's farm near Grifton.

County Agent S. C. Winchester said today the tobacco harvested on Price's farm is the first reported to this office this season. Winchester said the first barn of the crop reported harvested this season is slightly earlier than last year.

Numerous farmers from various sections of the county have expressed the belief that their tobacco will be ready to begin priming late this week or early next week.

Pouring Of Concrete For First Floor Is Under Way

Pouring of the concrete first floor of the \$1,400,000 Pitt Community Hospital is now under way, according to reports from W. L. Berkett, assistant superintendent of the building project.

Work on the structure is a little ahead of schedule, even though quick sand has caused some trouble in constructing a portion of the building, Berkett reported.

The 120-bed hospital is being constructed by the McKoy-Helgeson construction company of Greenville, S.C., and is the largest hospital financed by local, state and federal funds under construction at the present time.

Since February when work actually began on the building, progress has been rapid.

"We are pleased with the progress being made despite the trouble we've had with the quick sand," Berkett said.

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Pressure On Schools

Field Of Education Gradually Beginning To Feel Pressure Of National Concern About Communism; Growing Arguments; Academic Freedom; Some Events

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Step by step, education in this country is beginning to feel the pressure of the National concern about Communism.

As the pressure grows, inside and outside the schools themselves, angry arguments become intense over this question:

How far can academic freedom—freedom to teach and search for truth—be interfered with without damaging, terrorizing or destroying it?

Here are some examples of recent events:

1. Several professors were fired from the University of Washington for being members of the Communist party.

2. The University of California has ordered its 4,000 teachers to take a new oath of loyalty to the United States.

3. A week ago 20 top educators—including General Dwight Eisenhower, president of Columbia University, and Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard, issued a report which said:

Members of the Communist party should not be employed as teachers. The reasoning behind these three steps was this: A Communist party member has no academic freedom anyway. He surrendered intellectual honesty when he joined the party and now, sheep-like, does what it

Former Private Takes Up Army's Highest Position

Gordon Gray Sworn In Today As Secre- tary Of The Army By Sec. Johnson

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Gordon Gray, an infantry private seven years ago, took over today as the Army's top man.

The modest young, sandy-haired 40-year-old North Carolina Tar Heel from Winston-Salem was sworn in as Secretary of the Army. The oath was administered by Defense Secretary Johnson.

The ceremony was held in Johnson's office and attended by members of the cabinet, the Supreme Court, Congress and high ranking military officers, including Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. A large delegation from North Carolina came for the occasion.

One especially interested spectator was Gen. Omar Bradley, in whose 12th Army Group Gray, then a lieutenant, served overseas.

Bradley, at present Army Chief of Staff, and Gray now have adjoining offices and are close friends.

Attending the ceremony were Gray's wife, his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Bernard; his aunt, Miss Alice Gray; two of the Gray's four sons, Boyden, 6, and Burton, 8; C. A. Bethel, a close personal friend, and W. K. Hoyt, all of Winston-Salem.

Hoyt has taken over as general manager of the Piedmont Publishing Co., which Gray heads. The company publishes the Winston-Salem Journal-Sentinel and Twin City Sentinel and operates Radio Station WWSJ.

After the formalities were over Gray's two small boys decided to help out in the receiving line, obviously very proud of their father.

Gordon, Jr., the new secretary's oldest son, was unable to be present because of illness. The youngest, Bernard, remained at home.

Gray has been Undersecretary of the Army since May 25. Previously he had been assistant secretary since Sept. 24, 1947. He had been acting secretary since the resignation April 27 of Kenneth C. Royall. Royall was here to see his successor take over.

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Thorough Check On Nat'l Health

Washington, June 20—(AP)—Congress this week starts what may be the most thorough check-up on national health it has ever attempted.

General health problems and specific diseases will be examined by a House Commerce subcommittee. Some of these problems are being treated for the first time in congressional hearings.

Here in brief are President Truman's seven reorganization plans and the changes they would make in the government:

No. 1—Create a Department of Welfare to be headed by a secretary of cabinet rank. The department would take over most functions of the present federal security administration.

No. 2—Put under the Labor Department the government's job-finding and unemployment compensation services. The U. S. employment service now has, in effect an independent status.

No. 3—General shake up of the Post Office Department, concentrating in the Postmaster General some powers now held by subordinate officers and agencies of the department.

No. 4—Make the National Security Council and the National Security Resources Board a part of the State Department.

Secrecy In Diplomacy

U. S. Newsmen Abroad Have Difficult Time Getting American Versions Of Developments; Partly Understandable, But Exact Accounting Is Due To U. S. Public

Some of the American correspondents who have been covering the Big Four foreign ministers' conference in Paris have voiced dissatisfaction over the U. S. State Department's arrangements for supplying the American version of developments.

Most of the information available regarding Western plans is said to have come from British and French sources. The Russians, of course, don't talk.

As one who has spent most of the past generation reporting international events, your correspondent has a sympathetic ear for this plaint. It's the old, old story.

American diplomatic circles exact freedom of the press and subscribe to a fully informed public. Despite this some high diplomatic quarters long have pursued the idea that if important problems can be worked out secretly there will be a better chance of success.

On the other hand the British and to some degree the French, allow the lynch string out for news gatherers. London and Paris take a different view than do many American officials, recognizing the propaganda value of presenting the news from their own standpoint.

Go on the whole the life of a reporter abroad is no bed of roses. He has to dig hard for such ore as he unearths, and then has to make

a careful assay to make sure that he has the real thing and not foot's gold. That presents real difficulties, especially when he is dealing with such a complicated situation as the Paris conference presents.

On the whole British diplomats, both at home and abroad, are about the most liberal about giving out news, as I have found in many parts of the globe. For example during a trip to India in 1942-3 I made an exhaustive study of the political situation which then was red hot, with the Indians pressing for independence. When I left for home I had 50,000 words of notes—some of them red hot.

Under the war-time security regulations I had to submit all these notes to the British censor. I got them all back but the censor asked permission to delete one fifty-word memo regarding a delicate situation. He also called attention to a memo I had made of a conversation with an unnamed individual was actually was the victory.

"There's no mistaking the source of that memo," said the censor. "I trust you won't forget that it is high-explosive."

While the British generally are most liberal in giving information, they are past masters at sidestepping when they want to. Of course

Cardinal Raps Barden Bill On Federal Education Aid

New York, June 20—(AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman says Rep. Graham Barden (D-N.C.), chairman of a House subcommittee on education, is a "new apostle of bigotry." Cardinal Spellman, addressing 15,000 persons at a Roman Catholic rally yesterday, assailed Barden's pending bill for federal aid to education.

The cardinal said the congressman had written "un-American and anti-Catholic" legislation to "vent his venom upon children." Parochial schools, the cardinal said, should share in the federal aid funds. (The Barden bill, still in committee, would provide \$300,000,000 annual federal aid to public schools, to be distributed on the basis of need and school population. None of the money could be used for such things as transportation and health services, for either public or private school pupils. The money would have to be used for current expenses directly connected with school operation.)

(The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the government can provide transportation to parochial school children without violating the constitution.) Barden denied at his home at New Bern, N.C., that the bill discriminated against any group. "We wanted the funds for paying teachers and buying equipment and books," he said. "If we start doling out transportation money we would be writing checks for Methodist orphanages, Baptist schools and all

the others." Barden said the subcommittee found that there were about 48 school transportation systems in the 48 states. He said all the major labor unions, including a teachers' union, had urged that about 75 per cent of the funds be earmarked for teachers' salaries. "If being in favor of schools is a crime, then I'm a criminal," Barden added. The Barden bill, the cardinal contended, would bar private school children from health benefits and transportation service provided for public school children. The cardinal said schools under religious control exist "by right and not by privilege or toleration."

Women In The Church

"I'm not 'just teaching English'! I'm teaching girls," says Miss Alberta Tarr, of Walker, Mo., missionary-teacher in the Methodist Girls' School in Hiroshima, Japan—the school in which more than 300 girls were killed when the first atomic bomb fell. "I'm teaching girls to form habits of study, to think, to form judgments, to be thoughtful of one another, to expect more of themselves than society expects, to use their study opportunities for growing into worthy women, to develop a wholesome self-respect. Through the medium of English, I am attempting to lead them out of their narrow, insular thought-world into an acquaintance with and interest in people of other lands and their problems. With 800 girls, this is a full-time job! It means not only hours of teaching in the classroom, but also many hours outside as well."

The Ascension Lutheran Church of Shelby, North Carolina (the Rev. J. D. Sheppard, pastor), is bringing from a DP camp in Bavaria, Miss Velta R. Hesters, a young graduate in piano from a Riga conservatory, to

be the church pianist and choir director. The church has agreed to furnish her home, and salary, an opportunity to teach piano to Shelby children, and lessons so that she may learn to play the organ. When the U.S. Lutheran Resettlement Service found that Miss Hesters had a fiancé, the Shelby church also found a job for him: Ringolds E. Langins, a Latvian DP, a university agricultural graduate, will become a plant specialist in a wholesale flower concern near Shelby. Later a job of housekeeping was found for the bride-to-be's widowed mother. All three "adjusted persons" will soon be in America and in North Carolina.

Miss Nize Fernandez, a native of Cuba, has been named principal of the Colegio Irene Toland, missionary school of the Methodist Church in Matanzas, Cuba. She is the first Cuban woman to head a Methodist school in the half century the church has carried on educational work on the island. Miss Fernandez became a teacher in church schools upon her graduation from Colegio Buenavista in Havana; received the degree of Bachelor from the Government Institute in Matanzas and of Doctor of Pedagogy from the University of Havana, and has been on the faculty of Colegio Irene Toland since 1933.

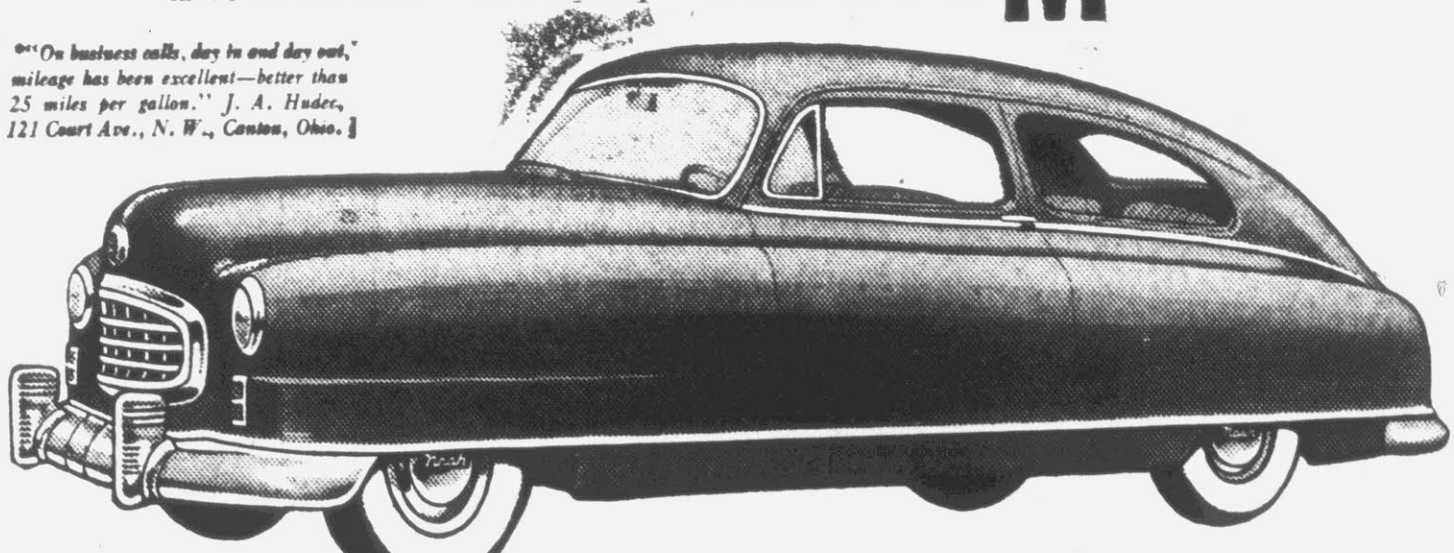
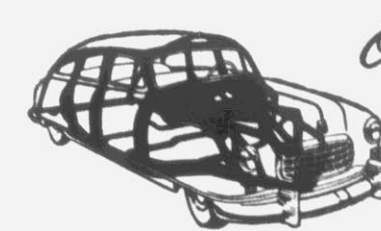

THE PURSUIT OF HAPPINESS
The French historian Ernest Renan once wrote, "When people complain of life, it is almost always because they have asked impossible things from it." This statement expressed a great truth that many people never realize that happiness based upon unreasonable desires can never be attained.

Most of us like to think that we would be perfectly happy if only we could get enough of whatever we want most: money, power, popularity, fame, or some other thing. Yet our common sense tells us, if we but look about us, that to attain such a goal is no guarantee of happiness. We have all known of rich men, possessing more wealth than they could spend, who nevertheless struggled and worried and fought to become still richer. The local politician is restless to become governor; the governor is unhappy that he is not president; the national ruler, like Alexander, Napoleon, or Hitler, may attempt to rule the world. The movie star with a million admirers may still be jealous of every rival's success.

If happiness will not come from the fulfillment of great desires, how should we seek it? One way is to shun the pursuit of the unattainable. As John Stuart Mill, the English philosopher, put it, "I have learned to seek my happiness by limiting my desires, rather than in attempting to satisfy them."

Around Capitol Square

BOOKS—Barring unforeseen delays, the Session laws of 1949 and the North Carolina Manual should be ready for distribution early next month. Secretary of State Thad Eure, who is responsible for preparing and distributing these official publications said he hoped to have a few copies of the laws in hand before July 1. Prior to the war the secretary of state cut the printing time for printed laws after the legislature adjourned down to six weeks. During the hard war years delivery could not be made until late fall. Prospects this year are the Session Laws will be off the press within ten weeks of assembly adjournment. The Manual, containing biographic data on state officials and legislators, election returns, lists of boards and commissions, will be ready a few days later.

CALENDARS—E. S. Eakridge, director of publications in the secretary of state's department, reports that court calendars for the next two years have been completed and all copy sent to the printers. The calendar will show regular terms of superior court and assigned judges in each of the 100 counties for the period July 1, 1949, to June 30, 1951. Blank space was left in the calendar form for pasting on a slip carrying names of new special judges to be appointed within the next few days by Governor Scott.

BLOOD—The highway safety division of the motor vehicles department is seeking co-operation of newspapers and radio to publish daily reports showing number of persons killed and injured in traffic accidents as compared with last year. They call it the "Bloodshed Boxscore." Several newspapers have been publishing weekly scores. Thought back of the expanded idea is that the impact of daily publication showing the deplorable increase in fatalities and personal injuries will help to make motorists safety conscious.

CONCERNED—Traffic safety folks are concerned about the growing death rate on highways throughout the country. The ratio of increase in North Carolina, as compared with last year, is higher than national average. Several meetings of highway patrolmen have been held for the purpose of keeping the patrol alert and attempt to cut the accident rate.

CENSUS—Another appeal for co-operation went out from Raleigh this week. Willard L. Dowell, executive vice president of the state merchants association, has asked all merchants to cooperate more fully with the federal business census. Dowell has heard that some merchants are loath to furnish information, fearing it may be used for purposes other than census compilation. He assures them that it is not the case, and thinks the business census, first since 1940, will be of great value.

Last week Sears, Roebuck and Company opened a branch in Rio, Brazil, and South Americans who pride themselves in taking things easy (i.e. muchas siestas) were in quite a stir. Despite the fact that there was a steady drizzle on opening day, a crowd showed up that 100 policemen couldn't handle. The crowd waiting for the doors to open stretched three blocks. Before entering they waited respectfully for a priest to sprinkle holy water on each of the eight floors of the air conditioned building.

Since there is only one other escalator in Rio, the crowd was quite fascinated with the machinery. In fact, two minutes after the doors were opened the escalators had to be cut off to avoid a panic.

A woman who had lost her shoe in the rush said, "I don't care about my shoe. Where are the refrigerators?" A quick-thinking clerk yelled: "This way!" pointing to the men's shirt department. His plan broke up the jam, but another soon developed.

U.S. refrigerators are 35% less than South American models, so at \$400 a throw, nearly 1,000 (the entire stock) were sold within the first hour the doors were open. Unlike most Greenville buyers this time of year, the customers rushed right by the credit windows for the cash department.

The male customers were walking around with garbage cans filled with DDT bombs, plastic shower curtains, and screw drivers. The women grabbed nylons and boxes of facial tissues. Children tried the radio, bounced on

the mattresses, found the escalator control buttons and tangled the store traffic.

All of this commotion is not confined to the Sears store. Elsewhere, Brazilian merchants have stopped waiting for the customers. Now they run full-page ads regularly. European-style storekeepers are beginning to cut prices and add more variety to their stocks.

At the end of Sears' opening day it was announced that all had gone well despite the uncontrollable mob. The well-trained staff, 96% Brazilian, was commended for the remarkable job. More than 123,000 customers had crowded the store that day, and 20,000 still waited outside. The customers had spent \$550,000, a record for Sears openings.

Even the Sears staff was surprised by the rush. Before the week ended the store had to close. An ad appeared in the newspapers: "Our clerks are fatigued and need a rest. Saturday will be a paid holiday so they can have a weekend rest. We want to serve you with clerks who are happy and attentive." Sounds to me like a businessman wrote that ad.

A friend of mine has his cigars ready for distribution, for he expects to become a father very soon. Recently he came home from college and landed a job. Saturday when his pay check was being made out the secretary was figuring withholding tax and asked, "How many dependents do you have?"

His reply: "Just a minute. Let me telephone and see."

Returning to London, I was struck by the thought that nowhere on the continent or in England had I heard three "fear words" we heard so often in the United States—"war," "Communism," and "depression."

I commented on this to a friend who has spent 20 years reporting continental affairs. I asked him what

Europeans really thought of the United States. "Right now they think Americans are a little hysterical," he said dryly.

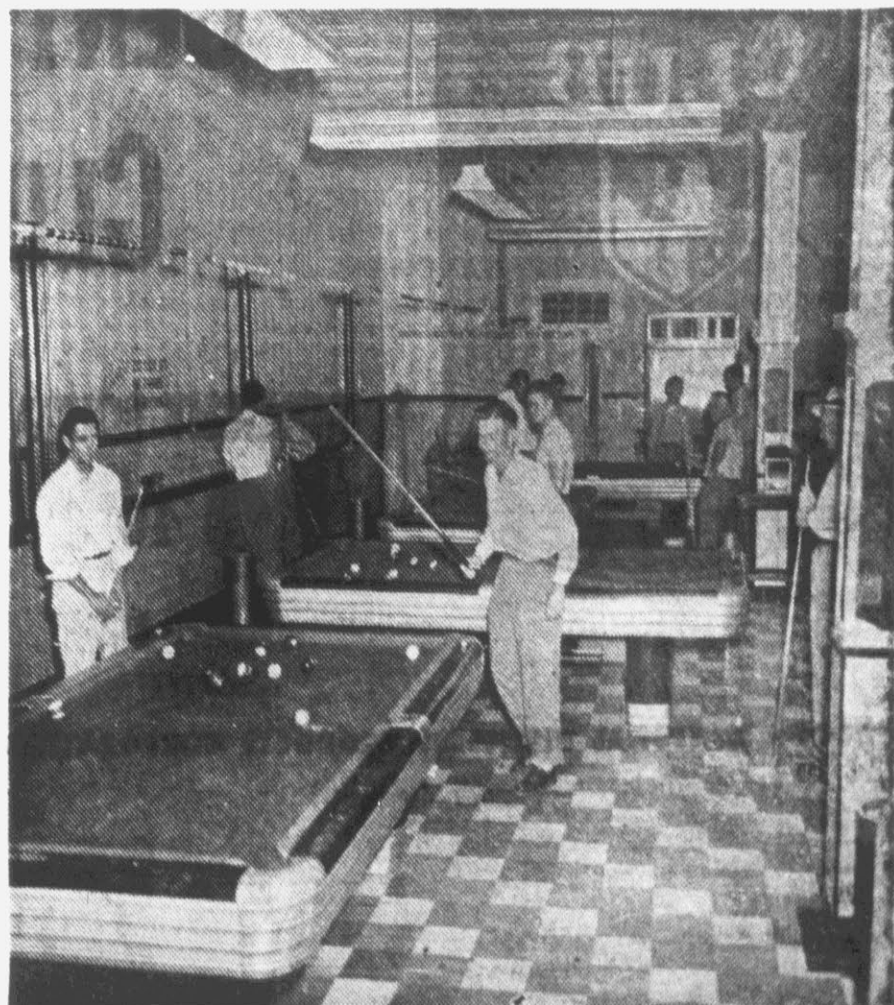

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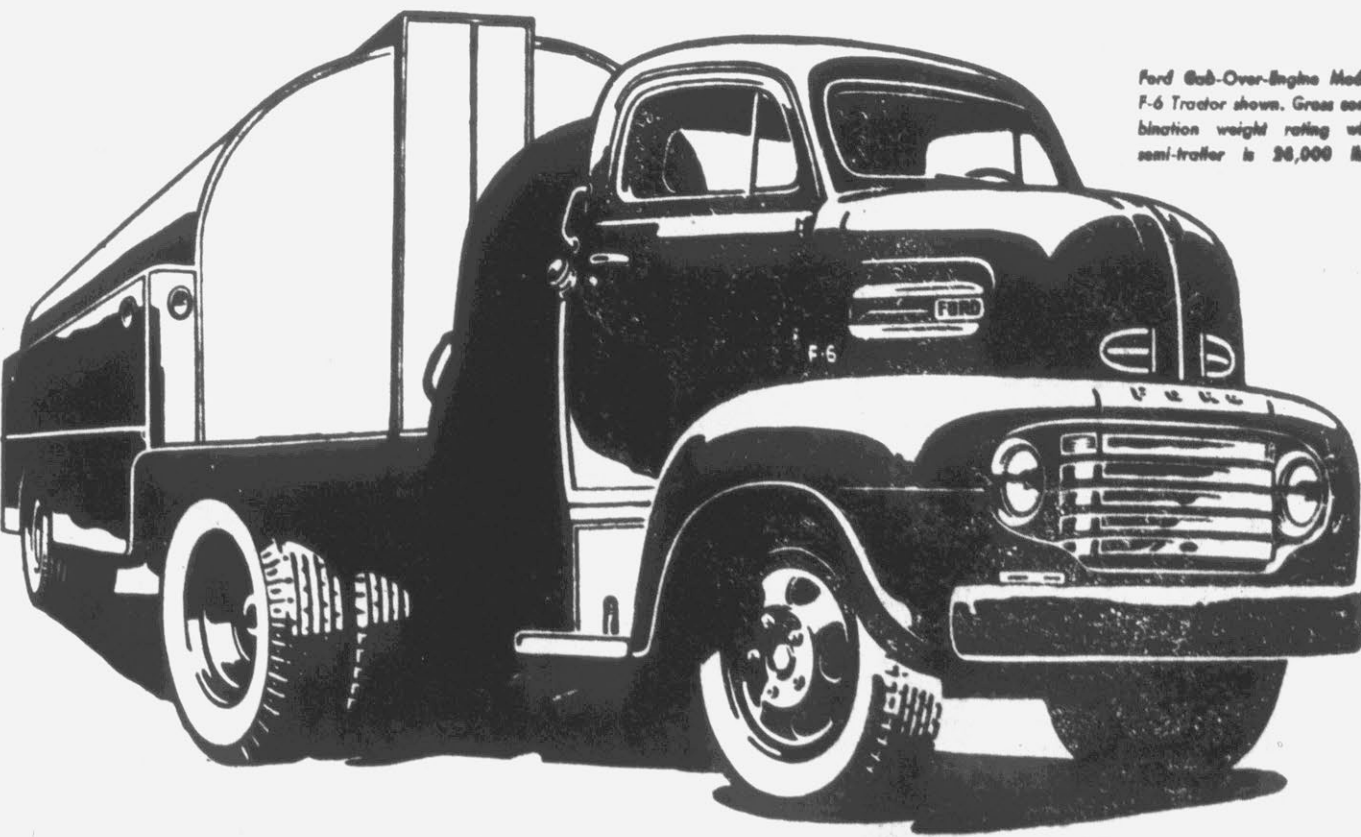

Results Of Leaf Experiments To Be On Display

A field day for farmers on the production and curing of tobacco will be held on the Lower Coastal Plains Tobacco Research Farm in Pitt County Thursday afternoon.

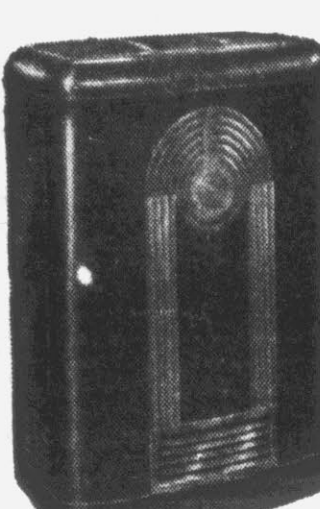
The research farm is located on the old Tar road about two and one-half miles south of Greenville, and according to Assistant County Agent S. J. Weeks the meeting is scheduled to begin at 2 o'clock.

At the meeting farmers in this section will have the opportunity to observe experiments being conducted in advanced strains of tobacco which are resistant to black shank and strains of tobacco which are resistant to Granville wilt growing in the field.

Farmers also will have the opportunity to observe chemical sucker control tests, new methods of curing tobacco, and a yield and quality test in which 16 different strains of tobacco are being grown.

County Agent S. C. Winchester said among the state farm experts who are expected to be in Pitt County for the meeting are R. R. Bennett, extension service tobacco specialist, Guy L. Jones, in charge of the Lower Coastal Plains Research Farm, Dr. W. E. Caldwell of Raleigh, head of the tobacco research program at the central experiment station in Raleigh, and Dr. E. L. Moore, plant pathologist at the tobacco research station at Oxford.

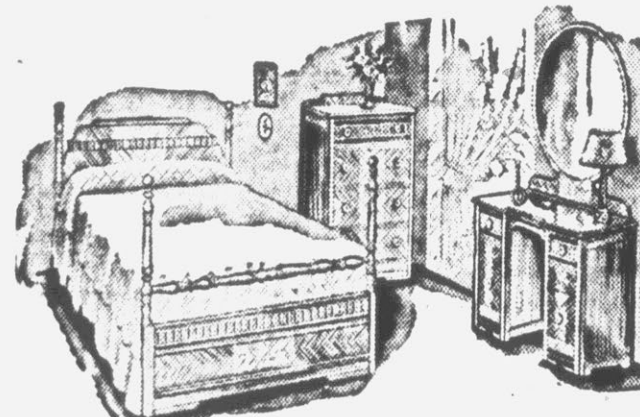

No. 5—Give the chairman of the Civil Service Commission more power to carry out affairs of the commission, but leave policy decisions to the three-member commission.

No. 6—Give the chairman of the Maritime Commission more administrative authority. The full five-member commission would still determine ship subsidies, regulations and major policies.

No. 7—Put the public roads administration under the Commerce Department. It now has a semi-independent status under the federal works agency.

Shapley, he said, spoke at the New York meeting of the "cultural and scientific conference for world peace" where this country's foreign policy was attacked.

Over wants Harvard to set up its own loyalty program. He said: "The test of a professor's actions ought not to be whether he can be actually proved guilty of a crime. Reasonable grounds to doubt his loyalty to our government should disqualify him, for the position is one of trust, and the government has, if it chooses to exercise it, regulatory power over education."

Conant answered briefly that Harvard's long tradition of letting its professors act as private citizens will remain unchanged. He turned the job of a full answer over to Greenville Clark, New York lawyer, Harvard graduate of 1903, and a fellow, or trustee, of Harvard.

Put in its briefest form, Clark's answer to Ober's idea was "no thanks." He reminded him that the meeting attended by Shapley and Clark was public and open to the press. And he said:

Harvard "believes that the members of the faculties, in their capacity as citizens, have the same rights to express themselves as other citizens, and that those rights should not be restricted by the University by trying to keep a 'watch' on professors."

every correspondent recognizes that there are times when the authorities have to delay the announcement of delicate news. Broadly speaking, however, experience has demonstrated that secrecy is a bad thing.

In our democracy the government is the servant of the people. That being so, the public is entitled to an exact accounting of the stewardship. The best way to render that accounting is through the news.

Secret diplomacy, barring rare exceptions, is a mighty dangerous thing.

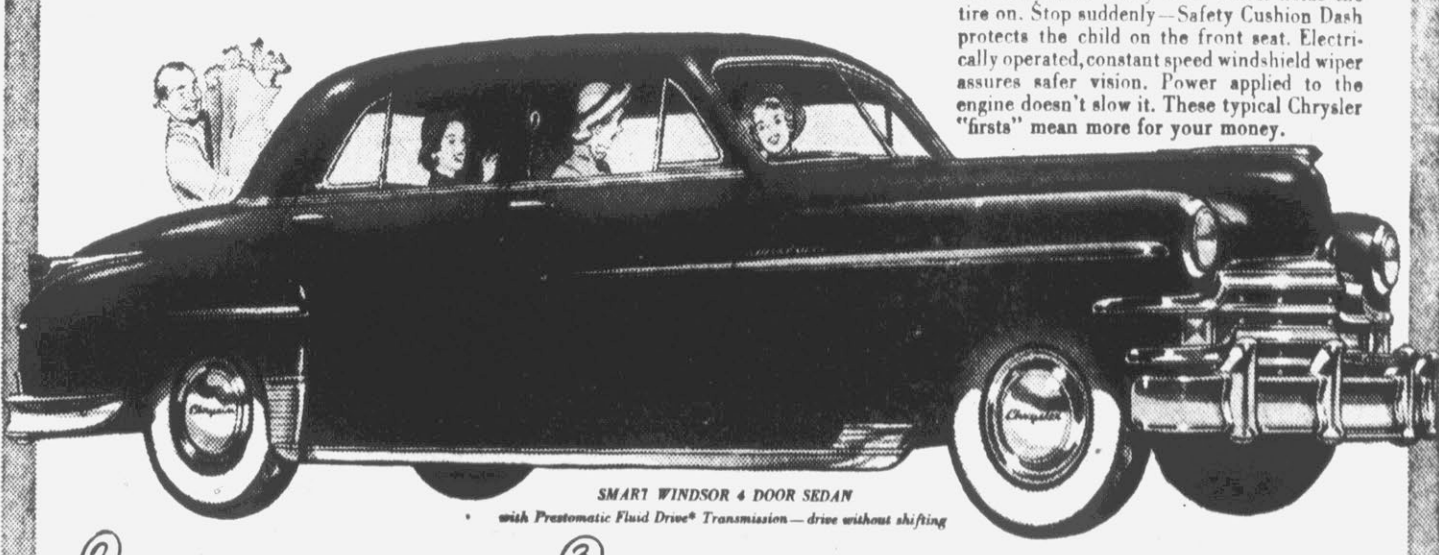

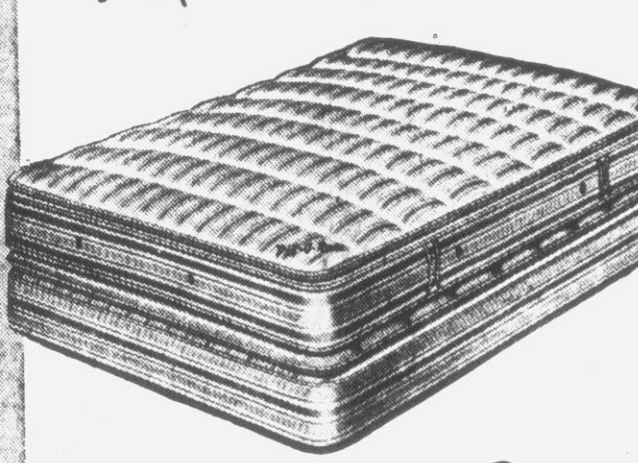
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
