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House Girds For Big Farm Fight Coming Tuesday

Toughest Farm Battle Of Years In Offing; Outcome May Influence Vote

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—What may be the toughest farm battle of many years opens in the House tomorrow. Its outcome may influence political fortunes in next year's congressional elections.

A coalition of Republican and Democrats is fighting the Truman administration's effort to change the present farm program that grew out of the Roosevelt New Deal.

Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.), leading the coalition, claimed victory today. Administration forces refused to concede.

The issue is not whether the farmer should have government help in getting a fair price for his products but how it should be done.

The crux of the battle is the plan by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to get cheaper food for consumers and an assured income for agriculture, through direct subsidy payments to farmers from the federal treasury.

Under the leadership of Chairman Coughlin (D-Ind.) and Rep. Pendergast (D-Mo.), the House agriculture committee—by a party line vote—approved the plan permitting a three-crop trial run for the Brannan subsidy plan.

Gore, usually a staunch administration supporter, quickly introduced a substitute bill, calling for continuation of the present program. He assailed the philosophy of the Brannan plan and immediately got support from the nation's two biggest farm organizations, the American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Grange.

The House Agriculture Committee wrote in its bill only a three-crop trial of the Brannan idea. The secretary has indicated he would like to try it out on hogs, potatoes and wool. The administration has already thrown its support behind the trial run bill, this being the most it could hope for in the present session of Congress.

But those who oppose the "subsidy" philosophy reacted quickly. They pointed out that the present loan and purchase program actually has made money for the government. War demands enabled the government to unload the great stores of commodities on which it had made loans in the 1930s and early 1940s.

Textile Unions Talk Of General Strike Plans

Rockingham, July 18.—(AP)—Union representatives from six Southern textile plants met here yesterday and threatened a general strike.

The Textile Workers Union of America, CIO, threatened the general strike action against the Lowenstein chain of textile plants.

Twelve delegates from the six locals in Lowenstein plants drafted a resolution which asked TWUA President Emil Rieve to "use whatever means he may deem necessary including a strike in all the Lowenstein plants."

Sale of company houses and contract negotiations figure in the dispute.

The plants involved are the Rock Hill Printing and Finishing Company at Rock Hill, S.C.; the Huntsville Manufacturing Company, the Saratoga and Victory mills in Alabama; the Lane Cotton mills in New Orleans; and the Alco manufacturing Company at Rockingham, N.C.

Changing Cold War

Because Of Our Ties With Europe, We Can Fairly Well Understand What Is Going On Over There, But Asia Is The New Front; Coordination; They See No Peace

It isn't the same old cold war any more.

Until the Paris peace conference, the cold war was treated by both sides largely as a European deadlock. The Berlin blockade and airlift held the spotlight.

Now the conflict in Europe is changing, and a vast new front is opening up in Asia.

In Europe, postwar production is filling war-starved markets. Competition is making the economic phase of the European struggle more important. Also, Communism has stepped up its long crusade against religious organizations. The Catholic church has answered with a mighty weapon—major excommunication. In Communist dominated countries with large Catholic populations, the conflict between church and state has been brought to a head.

There are many links with Europe in this country which make it fairly easy for the American people to grasp the meaning of what goes on in Europe.

Neither the average American nor the average European is as well prepared to understand what is happening in East Asia. This is where Communism has opened up a whole big new front.

This front shows signs of being coordinated, like the drive against religious groups in Europe.

But in Asia it takes another form. It preys the vast unrest prevailing

Truman Submits Unification Plan

Designed To Help Strengthen Hand Of Sec. Johnson

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—President Truman today sent to Congress a reorganization plan designed to tighten unification of the armed forces and strengthen the hand of Secretary of Defense Johnson.

He said he was submitting the plan in order to "take action by all means at my command" to obtain prompt unification of the services.

Secondly, he said, he wanted to provide "a sure means whereby all members of Congress will be able to vote" on improving the defense organization "in the event that adequate legislation is not developed" in Congress.

By sending up the plan, the President assured himself of two chances of getting the changes he wants in the defense establishment. He first asked for legislation making the changes. His reorganization plan will go into effect in 60 days if, meantime, neither the Senate nor House disapproves it.

The Senate has passed legislation along the lines the President asked. The House armed services committee sent to the House floor a measure providing only for tightened military budget and accounting practices.

The budget-accounting bill was up before the House today.

In a message accompanying his reorganization plan, the President said the House bill would give specific functions of financial management to a subordinate official rather than to the secretary of defense.

Mr. Truman added: "I cannot support budgetary or other control systems which fail to confer responsibility in a clean-cut manner and which presents possible obstacles to effective administration."

Soviets Display Speedy Jets On 'Aviation Day'

Moscow, July 18.—(AP)—Russia celebrated Aviation Day yesterday by showing off four planes officially described as "superspeed jet aircraft."

Foreign observers, high Soviet leaders and the general public

watched hundreds of fighters and bombers streak across the sky in an impressive display of Soviet air might.

One Foreign Air attaché said the new jets "seemed extraordinarily fast."

Among the watchers were U. S. Ambassador Admiral Alan G. Kirk and other diplomats, with their military, naval and air attaches.

Rear Admiral Leslie C. Stevens, U. S. Naval and Air Force attaché, said it was "a very interesting show. Especially noteworthy was the fact that it was restricted completely to modern aircraft. There were absolutely no obsolescent types."

"As usual, the formation and acrobatic flying was magnificent. Such performance comes only after great practice," Stevens has seen two previous aviation day displays here.

Prime Minister Stalin, who appeared in good health and spirits, watched from the club house veranda at Tushino airport throughout the two-hour show. His son, Lieut. Gen. Vassily Stalin, commanded the military section of the demonstration.

ECA Allocates \$27 Millions For Tobacco Buying

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—The economic cooperation administration today announced approval of the purchase of \$27,719,000 worth of U. S. tobacco for Marshall Plan use.

The OK was included in \$40,868,000 of new recovery allocations for nine western European countries and bi-zone Germany. Virtually the only other commodity to be bought with the grants is \$9,000,000 worth of sugar from Latin America for the United Kingdom.

Seven countries share in the allocations for U. S. tobacco. The list is led by Ireland with a grant of \$10,283,000 to finance purchase of fire-cured, dark air-cured and flue-cured leaf tobacco.

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OK Pay Raise

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—The Senate Armed Services Committee today approved a pay raise for the uniformed services. The vote was 9 to 1 to accept the bill already passed by the House. The measure, estimated to cost \$300,000,000 a year, would raise the pay of almost everybody in military uniform.

Individual boosts would range from three per cent for lower ranking enlisted men to 37 per cent for brigadier generals.

Although the committee endorsed the bill, Chairman Tydings (D-Md.) said he doubts if the bill would pass the Senate "unless savings to offset its increased costs result from other legislation now pending before Congress."

Czech Clergymen Defy Red Orders

Rap Order To Abandon Hierarchy In Church-State War

Prague, Czechoslovakia, July 18.—(AP)—Czechoslovakia's Roman Catholic priests have spurned orders from the communist government to desert Archbishop Josef Beran and the Vatican in the church-state war.

At morning masses throughout the country yesterday, they read a defiant resolution declaring their continuing loyalty to church authorities and willingness to "bear with them whatever consequences they may face."

Rallying to the support of the embattled hierarchy, the priests accused the government of violating constitutional guarantees of religious freedom, condemned the government-sponsored Catholic Action as schismatic, and asserted that clerics' signatures endorsing it had

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China Reds Open New Offensives

Fighting In Central China; Nationalist Reverses

Canton, China, July 18.—(AP)—Fighting between Nationalists and communists flamed into new activity in Central China today.

Official dispatches reported several Nationalist setbacks.

(China) press reports in British Hong Kong said the new Red drive had caused fresh panic among Nationalist officials in Canton. The defense ministry, these accounts said, has chartered 21 civilian planes to ferry important equipment out of the provisional capital.

Economic trouble beset communist-held Shanghai. Rice prices shot up more than 30 per cent. The communist dollar was further inflated, but the official rate of exchange lagged behind the price of rice on which wages are based. Shanghai employers said they couldn't meet the rice increases.

The objective on Red troops—the march after a two-month stalemate—appeared to be Changsha, Hunan provincial capital and a Nationalist stronghold. The official dispatches told of these developments:

Four Red divisions (possibly 30,000 men) captured Ichang, Yangtze port 600 air miles west of Shanghai and 300 miles north of Changsha.

Nationalists, yielding to strong attacks, abandoned Paochi, Shensi province, western terminus of the Lunghai railroad, but counterattacked west and south of the town.

A big battle is shaping up in western Kiangsi province, east of Hunan and directly above Kwangtung—where Canton is situated.

No Punishment, But New Home Sought For Boy

San Francisco, July 18.—(AP)—Juvenile authorities hope someone will come forward today with an offer of a home, love and understanding for a seven-year old boy who killed a man.

Tedd Moreno, housed in the nursery of the juvenile home, is completely unaware that he killed Fred Throckmorton, 67, his grocer friend, Friday.

Juvenile Judge Milton D. Sapiro said the shooting was accidental. There is no thought of punishing the boy, he added. The court just wants a new home for him.

"He comes from a disturbed family," the judge said.

Commented Judge Sapiro: "He's a rejected child. He seeks affection he isn't getting at home. The boy was never a disciplinary problem."

Three-Car Crash Fatal For Baby; Driver Arrested

Nine Others Injured Or Badly Shaken Up In Saturday Night Accident

Three automobiles were involved in a wreck on the highway in Hillsdale Saturday about midnight in which Irvin M. Barber, Jr., 16-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Irvin M. Barber of Greenville, was killed and nine other persons were injured or badly shaken up.

All three cars were wrecked. Police arrested Jack Crawford, 29, 1211 Washington street, Greenville, for reckless driving and he as ordered held under \$5,000 bond by Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse. Crawford provided bail and was released Sunday.

Police investigating the tragedy stated that they had information that the car driven by Jack Crawford, going toward Winterville, attempted to pass the car driven by Jesse Ray Faulkner, 23, of near Winterville, that Crawford evidently saw an oncoming car, changed his direction and passed the Faulkner car on the right, crashing into the right rear end of the vehicle, causing it to hurtle across the highway, colliding almost head-on with the car driven by Irvin M. Barber, 25, of 200 Mumford street, Greenville.

Police said Crawford's car continued 200 feet beyond the scene of the collision and landed in a ditch. Crawford received leg and arm injuries.

Barber was painfully injured; Mrs. Barber received a fractured right arm and broken ankle; their son, Irvin, Jr., suffered a fractured skull and died shortly afterwards at Pitt General Hospital.

Ray Smith, 525 Greene street, a passenger in Barber's car, was slightly injured; his wife was injured about her face and chest; their infant son, Ray Smith, Jr., was painfully injured. Mrs. Smith is at Pitt General Hospital.

Faulkner, driver the car—reported victim of the three-way collision—was badly shaken up. Quinlan, Avery, 23, and Alvan Worthington, occupants of the Faulkner car, were considerably shaken up but not injured.

Coroner Rouse said he will hold an inquest as soon as the condition of some of the injured persons will permit.

Policemen J. R. Tripp, George Crawford and W. D. Berg investigated the wreck. Highway Patrolman Paul Whitley assisted.

The Greenville police department received a call from one of the police radio patrol cars at the scene of the wreck at 11:59 Saturday night, asking that the fire department's rescue truck and ambulances be sent to the scene of the wreck.

The rescue truck and two ambulances from Wilkerson's Funeral home responded. All of the victims except one had been taken to the hospital in private cars, which had stopped to render aid.

The fire department's rescue truck took Irvin M. Barber, driver of one of the cars, to the hospital.

Funeral services for Irvin M. Barber, Jr., were held from the chapel of S. G. Wilkerson & Sons' Funeral Home at 4 p. m. today. Rev. R. B. Crawford, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Surviving in addition to the parents are the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. H. Tom Smith of Washington, and Mr. and Mrs. George E. Barber of near Paoctious; the maternal great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Evans of near Cox's Mill.

Contracts Probe Still Underway

Army's Inspector General Ordered To Continue Inquiry

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—An investigation of Army contract handling was still underway today. It has led thus far to the suspension of two major generals and a congressman's demand that President Truman send his military aide to the sidelines.

The inspector general's office has orders from Secretary of the Army Gordon Gray to continue its probe of Maj. Gen. Herman Feldman, the quartermaster general, and Alden H. Waitt, chief of the Chemical Corps.

Both were relieved of duty Saturday after a Senate investigating committee produced evidence which Gray said indicated they exhibited "a lack of judgment and sense of propriety."

On the heels of this development Rep. Shafer (R-Mich.) demanded that the President suspend Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, White House aide.

A member of the House Armed Services Committee, Shafer said in a statement that Vaughan was "implicated in the same case" with Feldman and Waitt. He gave no details.

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Read Confession To 9 Murders; Drank Blood

Lewes, Eng., July 18.—(AP)—John George Haigh was quoted in Court today as telling police he killed nine persons, drank some of their blood and then dissolved the bodies in acid.

Haigh pleaded innocent by reason of insanity to a charge of murdering Mrs. Olive Durand-Deacon, 69, a wealthy widow, last Feb. 18. The 39-year-old businessman walked jauntily to the bench and answered "Not guilty" in a clear firm voice.

Sir David Maxwell-Fyfe, a prosecutor at the international Nuremberg war crimes trial, is Haigh's defense attorney. He read in court a statement which he said Haigh gave to police admitting the killing of the widow and the others.

He said Haigh was "insane so as not to be responsible for the act," and thus innocent of premeditated murder.

The statement said Haigh lured Mrs. Durand-Deacon to a factory warehouse in nearby Crawley and shot her in the back of the head.

"Then I fetched in a drinking glass and made an incision. I think with a pinknife, in the side of her neck, and collected a glass of blood, which I drank."

The statement also told of the killing of William Donald McSwann, a London youth, in 1944.

"I hit him on the head, then withdrew a glass of blood from his

Governor To Be On Air Tuesday

Raleigh, July 18.—(AP)—Governor Scott's radio speech tomorrow in which he is expected to announce a "surprise" will begin at 8:30 p. m.

His office said the broadcast will continue for 15 minutes.

The governor announced on June 4 that he would soon have another "surprise" for the people. He made the statement just after victory for his road and school bond programs was assured.

Since that time, Scott on several occasions has told newsmen the surprise "won't be much."

GOP Will Stress Red Ink Economy

Fact-Finders In Steel Industry Plan Hearings

Go To Washington To Confer On Where And How To Start Studies

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—Three men who are going to be busy the rest of the summer—President Truman's steel fact-finding board—hurried into Washington today for their first meeting.

They came to confer with Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman in the White House and talk about such things as when to start hearings.

With the eyes of all industry and unions upon them, the three members will hear arguments for and against a fourth round of post-war wage raises in the steel industry, and for and against large pension and insurance plans.

Arthur Goldberg, general counsel of the CIO United Steelworkers of America, has told reporters:

"We are ready to proceed. We believe we have sufficient data at our own disposal respecting the financial situations of the various companies to proceed immediately."

Mr. Truman appointed the three-man board, headed by Dr. Carroll R. Daugherty, professor of business economics at Northwestern University, to study the steel dispute and make recommendations by Aug. 30. The other two members are David L. Cole of Paterson, N. J., and Samuel I. Rosenman, of New York City, both lawyers.

The union has postponed a strike until Sept. 14 at the President's request.

The President averted the strike without using the national emergency provision of the Taft-Hartley act.

The largest steel companies objected vigorously to the President's plan because the board will have power to make recommendations. They pointed out that Taft-Hartley act boards don't have such power.

But the President insisted on his plan. And U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, and Republic finally yielded Friday and agreed to testify before the board, in order to avoid a strike against them at midnight that night.

The union had said it would strike any company that didn't agree to testify.

Slayers Escape Prison Camp

Raleigh, N.C., July 18.—(AP)—Escape of two slayers from the Ashe County Prison Camp was reported today by the State Prison Department.

Assistant Prison Director H. H. Honeycutt listed them as Robert Howell and Homer Johnson.

The two men—honor-grade prisoners—walked away from the camp yesterday, he said.

Five Czechs Are Hanged In Prison

Prague, July 18.—(AP)—Five Czechs condemned for an alleged plot to overthrow the government were hanged today in Pankraz prison.

The men were condemned June 9 after a secret trial on charges that they plotted to replace the communist-dominated government with a military dictatorship to be headed by Gen. Alois Liska, war-time tank troop commander.

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Road To The Future

On Thursday, The Senate Votes On Atlantic Pact; Whether It Will Have Any Real Meaning Remains To Be Seen; A Military Alliance Without Weapons?

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—On Thursday our road into the future takes a new turning.

Whether in the end it will have any real meaning, although it sounds big now, remains to be seen, as this will show.

On Thursday, after two weeks of debate, the Senate is expected to approve our joining the Atlantic pact.

This pledges us to help the nations of Western Europe, which have signed the pact with us, if they're attacked.

Since Russia is the only nation on the continent big enough to do the attacking, the pact is aimed at Russia.

So it's an outright military alliance, the first America has ever entered with other nations in peacetime.

(Our joining the United Nations was a kind of military alliance but it is hedged around with "ifs." Besides, U.N. hasn't worked so far.)

If they stand solidly together as allies—and, in addition, know we'll go to their defense—they'll have more will to stand up against Russia.

The lesson from World War II is still clear. Before 1939 the Western powers were un-united and we stood aloof until Hitler had overrun them. If they had been allied solidly and he had known we'd fight for them, Hitler might not have started the war at all. But the will to resist

is another.

So, after the Atlantic pact is signed, it raises some other questions. What happens then? Do we just sit back and tell Western Europe we'll help out after it is attacked?

Or, having signed the pact, do we pitch in and help Europe build up its defense by sending it arms before there is any attack? The pact supporters, and they're in the majority, point out:

1. If Western Europe is militarily weak, Russia may be able to sweep over it and stand astride all Europe. It might be too late for us to help then. And, if we did try to help, we'd have to fight our way back onto a conquered Europe where we had no allies left.

2. But if Western Europe is well-armed, and Russia attacks, it may be able to stand firm until we arrive with help and then the armies of our allies could join with our armies against the Russians.

President Truman, the State Department and Western Europe want this country to back up the pact by sending arms. That program of arms will cost about \$1,500,000,000 to start probably more later.

But right here the whole thing smags: For two weeks a small band of Republican senators—led by Taft of Ohio and Donnell of Missouri—

Golden Text: John 17:3. "This is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou has sent." Among the citations comprising the lesson-sermon are the following from the Bible: "And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his son." (John 1:5-11) And from the Christian Science textbook by Mary Baker Eddy: "Life is mind, the creator reflected in His creations." Page 331.

World survey of Protestant missions made by the International Missionary Council, London, Eng., indicates that the entire staff of Christian workers connected with Protestant missions number 192,987 persons. This total includes: 26,969 ordained ministers, 126,713 laymen, and 38,286 women.

Miss Ruth A. O'Toole, R.N., of St. Louis, Mo., is director of a leprosy colony in isolated Tunda, on the Lomani River, in the heart of the Belgian Congo, Africa. The colony belongs to the Belgian government which built and equipped it in 1937 but is in charge of Miss O'Toole, a missionary of the Methodist Church. Forty-three of the 200 patients are Christians, and others are studying the gospel message. Men and women have organized separate missionary societies within the colony, and those who are able to farm their produce for the ill and crippled. An African man nurse prepares a class of the less-afflicted patients to receive government leprosy nursing certificate and to give injections of chaulmoogra oil and other medications.

The adoption of a "militant" program for the future work of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in the decade ahead will climax the 75th annual convention of this noted national organization of women in Philadelphia, Pa., August 18 to 23, under the presidency of Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin of Evanston, Ill. Some 2,500 delegates and hundreds of national and international temperance leaders will take part in the convention. Among the early victories of the WCTU was the substitution of grape juice for fermented wine on many church communion tables, war against commercialized prostitution, the establishment of Florence Crittenden Homes for fallen women, and the initiation of the Mann Act by Congress to end white slavery, and the prohibition law of thirty years ago. Despite the repeal of this law, the WCTU is still working for "the

complete elimination of alcoholic beverages from the social life of America," says Mrs. Colvin. "We serve notice upon those engaged in the alcoholic beverage traffic that we shall wage eternal war upon their business which has wrecked more homes and destroyed more lives than all war combined. . . . When we are gone our daughters will take our places."

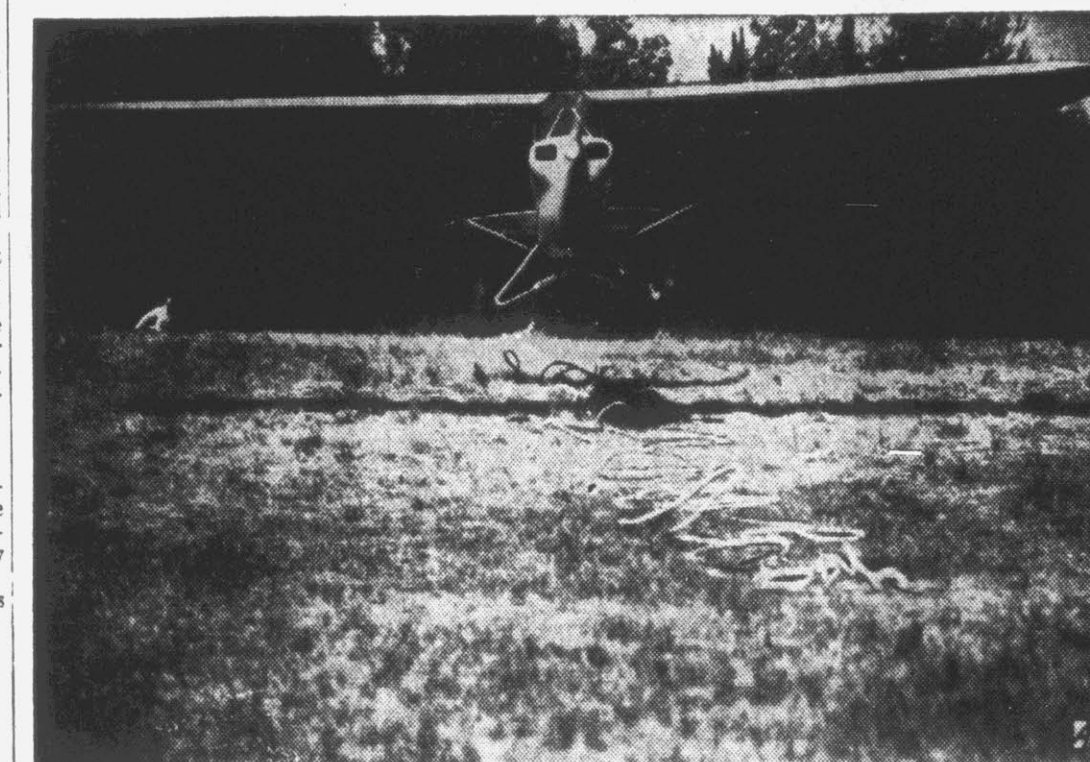

Strength FOR THE DAY

CONCERNING MEANS AND ENDS
People often argue that the end justifies the means. The trouble with this philosophy is that before long the means becomes an end in itself. A selfish, evil means employed to bring about a good end has in itself become the end, with its moral character as bad as ever.

We live in a universe where everything operates according to well-established laws. We observe this in the physical universe, and scientists through the centuries have been able to study some of the laws of nature and become familiar with the way they operate. We are beginning to see that there are definite psychological laws—that the mind does not operate capriciously but as the result of certain well-established patterns. Most people find it hard to realize, however, that there are spiritual laws which are as inflexible as the law of gravitation. If we want to achieve a good end, we must achieve that end through decent and righteous means. We cannot do evil things and cause good to result. A seed brings forth a shrub or a tree after its kind. As we set in motion a series of acts, which result in a series similar to the act in which the series had its origin.

No good end is served by lying or deceit, by dishonesty or compromise, by casting aside the laws of decency and restraint. As we sow, we reap.

Around Capitol Square

DEMOCRATS—The matter of maintaining a year-round office, with a telephone and at least one full-time assistant secretary, is being given consideration by leaders of the state Democratic party organization. The state committee has an office at the Sir Walter Hotel, used jointly with the national committee representatives for the Jackson-Jefferson dinner, in which records are stored. The office does not have an attendant or a listed telephone number. Chairman Everett Jordan and other party leaders are weighing the advantages in relation to cost of maintaining a full time headquarters office.

SCATTERED—The Democratic party is a continuing organization and while its most active periods are the busy days preceding general elections, there are many months requiring attention throughout the year. Until just a short time ago no effort was made to hold permanent files of party records. Each year chairman had to begin each seasonal campaign almost de novo when William B. Umstead was chairman he arranged for keeping files in condition so they could be consulted at any time, but they still were scattered among several office rooms. Succeeding Chairmen W. P. Horton and Capus Waynick made further progress toward concentrating data in one place. Now many leaders think the time has come for the final step of a permanent skeleton staff.

VALUE—It is estimated that total cost of office and phone rent, clerical help and other items will add about \$8,000 a year to current operating costs. Some experienced practical politicians contend that the \$6,000 thus spent will be worth several times that amount at beginning of the real campaign every two years. Keeping in touch with party workers throughout the state providing a central headquarters place for those desiring conference with the chairman, and similar services will, it is argued, save lots of time and money when the election approaches.

FINANCES—The Democratic party is in comparable condition to that facing the state general fund when the 1948 legislature convened. There is a substantial surplus—some \$21,000—in the party coffers. Contention is that money was contributed by Democrats to further the interest of the party, not to lie idle in bank accounts.

VACATIONISTS—Reports from vacation centers in North Carolina indicate business substantially better than last year. Fontana Village reports that during the month of May, too early to attract most people to the mountains, the village had 2924 registered guests. About half this number occupied cottages for one night only, the others from two days to more than two weeks. The beaches report weekend activity since mid-May as comparable to late summer records of previous years. Many of these vacationists are North Carolinians but many of

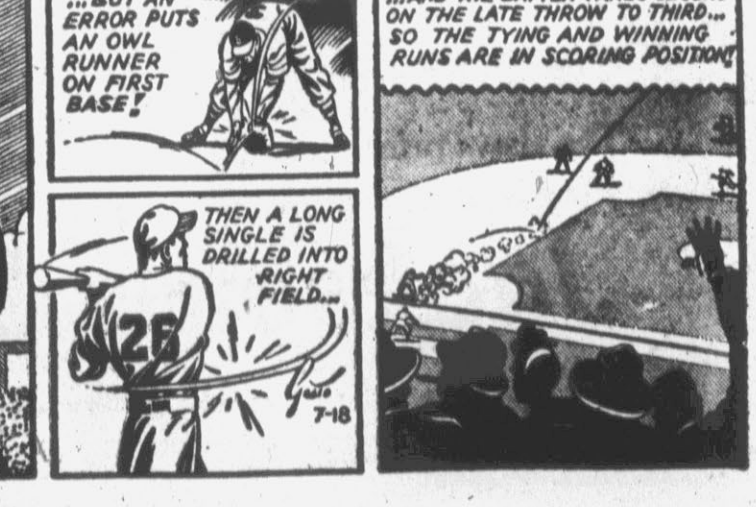

New York, July 18—(AP)—Janice Harvell, 17-year-old blonde school girl from Carolina Beach, N. C., reigned today as the Lions' "Queen of the United States."

She was chosen over entries from eleven other states and Hawaii as the 32nd annual convention of Lions International got under way yesterday. About 31,000 Lions and members of their families are expected for the meeting.

Urge Big Vote In Leaf Referendum

Raleigh, N.C., July 18—(AP)—A big vote in the July 23 Marketing Quotas and Tobacco Associates referendum was urged yesterday by the president of the Leaf Exporters Association, Inc.

L. L. Gravelly of Rocky Mount declared that Tobacco Associates "has rendered most valuable assistance in establishing a new market (for flue-cured tobacco) in the occupied zones

of Germany and in enlarging the markets in other foreign countries."

Dewey Calls For Economic Unity

New York, July 18—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey urged today that Western Europe be welded into an economic unit like the United States, and said Marshall Plan funds should be spent primarily toward that end.

The Republican governor, in an address of welcome to the convention of Lions International, also said it was important that the United States Senate ratify the North Atlantic treaty "with real enthusiasm." "Otherwise," he said, "we would appear to be denying our inevitable and inescapable association with the cause of freedom. We would appear to be starting all over again down the same road we followed after World War I which led to World War II."

Dewey said the United States should "strike while the iron is hot" in cementing the high regard in which this country now is held in non-Communist Europe.

He told the delegates to the service organization's gathering that the U. S. should make certain that our aid to Europe is not used to promote "pet projects of socialism or nationalism."

Attlee Takes On Economic Tasks

London, July 18—(AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee announced today he would take over the job of steering Britain through her economic crisis while Sir Stafford Cripps is on sick leave.

The ailing chancellor was in the House of Commons when the announcement was made.

Sir Stafford plans to leave tomorrow for Switzerland for special treatment of colitis. He was cheered by all members of the House when he entered, and Conservative Leader Anthony Eden wished him "speedy recovery."

Attlee said he hoped Cripps would be able to "take up again his onerous task" at the end of next month.

Meanwhile, Attlee said he would be in charge of the treasury and would "supervise the carrying on of the general policy which Sir Stafford outlined to the House last Thursday." At that time Cripps said his government would sharply cut its dollar imports.

Legal Liquor Sales For Kansas Begins This Week

Topeka, Kas., July 18.—(AP)—Liquor will go on sale "legally" in Kansas this week.

It will mark the end of an era of colorful bootlegging and a multi-million dollar bootlegging business in this long-time stronghold of prohibition.

For almost 70 years the sale of liquor has been banned in Kansas by the state constitution. And for 32 years the state's dry law made possession of so much as a thimbleful of liquor punishable by a jail sentence.

But, last November Kansans voted 422,294 to 358,310 to repeal prohibition.

After a two months struggle to retain local option, the Legislature passed a liquor control act. It wiped the bone dry law from the statute books.

Then followed four months of feverish work to establish a control and licensing setup.

Late today, the state liquor control office will mail out licenses for more than 260 privately owned liquor stores to retail liquor or high per cent beer. Beer of less than 3.2 per cent alcohol was legalized in 1937.

Despite the seemingly radical change for a traditionally dry state, no wild binge is in the making. Saloons and public drinking are barred. Liquor will be sold only in packages at stores licensed solely to sell intoxicants.

Since many distributors already have been licensed, some retailers may find it possible to open tomorrow. But mostly it will take two or three days.

Groveland's Mob Tension Easing

Groveland, Fla., July 18.—(AP)—Tension gradually eased today after a tough weekend which saw an armed mob try to take two Negroes out of jail. National Guard troops moved in to maintain order in this central Florida town, but left early today.

A touch of the Ku Klux Klan was here too. Pamphlets titled "Ideals of the Ku Klux Klan" were tossed from a group of about 20 cars which passed through.

Residents said three or four men were in each car; none wore the traditional Klan hoods and robes.

Sheriff W. V. McCall, who quelled the mob of about 100 men that gathered at the county courthouse in Tavernes Saturday night, said he wasn't around when the Klan literature was tossed.

The two Negroes had been moved to another jail before the mob arrived. McCall reported because he expected trouble. They were arrested on an open charge in connection with the robbery of a white man and the kidnapping and subsequent rape of his wife early Saturday.

Sheriff McCall said the men who marched to the jail were armed "to the teeth. But I knew them all and they were sober, reasonable fellows. I sat on the steps in front of the jail and talked fast. I told them I had a job to do and had to protect my prisoners."

Returning here, the mob drove through the almost-deserted town section and fired several shots into a restaurant and a house.

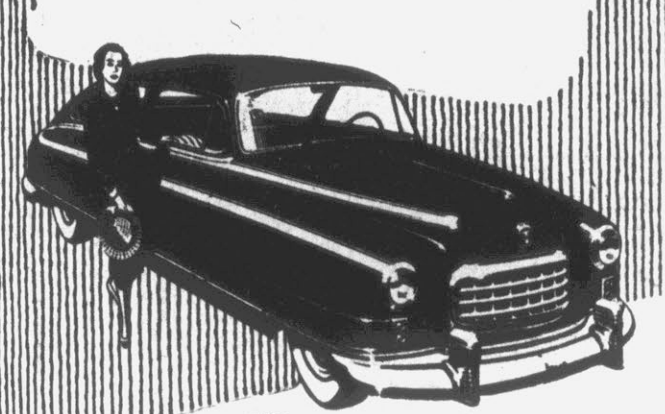
