President's Aide Said Involved In Contracts Probe

Vaughan Reportedly Had Data Which Resulted In Suspension Of Officer

Washington, July 19 — (AP) — The Washington Post says Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, President Truman's military aide, is reported to have had the "improperly furnished personnel data" which resulted in the suspension of Maj. Gen. Alden H. Walt.

In a copyright article, the Post reported that "the data is said to have been relayed to Vaughan by James V. Hunt, former Army officer whose activities are under scrutiny of a Senate committee investigating the handling of government contracts."

The Post said investigators working on the case "suspect Vaughan was used by Hunt" to try to keep Walt as chief of the Army's Chemical Corps.

Secretary of the Army Gordon Gray announced last Saturday that Walt and Maj. Gen. Herman Feldman, Army quartermaster general, had been relieved of duty as the result of evidence turned up in the Senate inquiry.

Gray said the committee had "evidence which indicates that General Walt improperly furnished personnel data to an individual not in the military service and who was not entitled to receive such data."

The evidence also indicated, Gray said, that Feldman furnished to a contractor's representative "procurement information under circumstances which appear irregular."

Later, Rep. Shafer (R-Mich.) contended that Vaughan was "impliedly in the same case." He demanded Vaughan's suspension.

Gray said in a radio interview last night that the Army has no authority over Vaughan since he is the President's aide. Gray also emphasized that there is no suggestion of any "fraud or dishonesty" in the affair.

Hunt denied that he ever tried to sell "influence."

The Post described the data reportedly relayed to Vaughan as a series of memoranda dealing with a half dozen chemical corps officers who were being considered as successors to Walt. The Post continued:

"What use Vaughan made of the information, if any, could not be learned. It is recalled, however, that the White House sat on the Army promotion list for weeks. Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee were inquiring into the reasons for the delay when the President sent the promotion list to the Senate for confirmation."

Vaughan earlier this month brushed aside reporters' inquiries concerning the Herald-Tribune story of the reported Hunt-Grindie contract with the assertion that he knows "about 300 persons in Washington" who engage in similar government contract operations.

Gov. Raps Critics Of Daniels' Trial

Scott Says Group Should Stick To Facts In Case; Greenville Man Co-Chairman Of Committee's Organizing Body

Raleigh, July 19 — (AP) — Governor Scott has criticized the efforts of an organization campaigning in behalf of two young Negroes convicted of killing a white cab driver.

The group, the governor said, in a statement issued yesterday, should stick to the facts in the case.

Bennie Daniels, 18, and Lloyd Ray Daniels, 17, Greenville cousins, are now appealing death sentences imposed in Pitt Superior Court last month. They were convicted of the slaying of William Benjamin O'Neal, Greenville cab driver, who was beaten and knifed last Feb. 5.

The governor criticized the Daniels Defense Committee for its "willingness to use this case while it still pends in the courts as a means of raising a ruckus for propaganda and money for their purposes."

The sentencing of the two Negro youths was termed in one committee circular as a "legal lynching."

A meeting has been planned here Saturday by the "Daniels Defense Committee," with O. John Rogge, former Assistant U.S. attorney general, listed as principal speaker. His appearance is being sponsored by the Progressive Party, according to publicity releases.

The committee has headquarters at 313 Lawson street in Durham. Cornelius Simmons of Greenville and Mrs. Minna Abernathy of Chapel Hill were listed as temporary co-chairmen of the committee's organizing committee, and Nat Bond of Durham as temporary treasurer.

Here is the governor's statement in full:

"This office welcomes word from any citizen who believes that any other citizen is being denied justice in North Carolina. It would be helpful to the State, its officials and its citizens, however, if any group conducting a money raising campaign on the basis of inflammatory insinuations about injustice would itself take some care about the facts before making wholesale charges about justice in North Carolina."

"Circulars being distributed with regard to the case of two Negro men charged with the murder of a taxi driver in Greenville state that these defendants have only until August 6 to prepare their appeal to the Supreme Court. This applies only to the record to be served on the solicitor of the Fifth Judicial District in accordance with judgment in the case which allowed the defendants 60 days for this purpose. Actually, counsel for the defendants have until October 1 to file."

Groveland, Fla. Mob Again Riots

Burn Three Negro Homes Despite Sheriff's Efforts

Groveland, Fla., July 19 — (AP) — A riot of shooting and house burning flamed in this farming section last night after a man was beaten and robbed and his 17-year-old wife raped early last Saturday.

Three Negro homes two miles west of here were destroyed after a mob of about 50 men who rode shooting through Stuckey's still, a Negro community about five miles west of Groveland.

Barter, Lake County Sheriff W. V. McCall hurled a tear gas bomb into the midst of a heavily armed mob of about 50 men who rode shooting through Stuckey's still, a Negro community about five miles west of Groveland.

Three Negroes have been arrested and charged by Sheriff McCall with rape, kidnapping and causing bodily harm in connection with the Saturday offense. The sheriff said the three had admitted the crimes and that a fourth suspect was sought.

He listed the prisoners as Charlie Greenlee, Samuel Shepherd and Walter Irvin, all about 20. McCall said they admitted they beat and robbed Will Padgett of Groveland, then kidnapped and raped his wife early last Saturday.

National guardsmen, called out by Sheriff McCall for the second night in a row, last night ringed the Negro section here some distance from the flaming structures. There were 35 in the detachment which came here from Leesburg.

The situation cooled off as quickly as it had flared after the houses were destroyed. One of the homes was said to belong to the father of one of the suspects.

Bolshevism's Effort

Fiercest Phase Of Moscow-Directed Effort Against Religion Is Under Way; Strong Religious Beliefs May Provide Rock Upon Which Communism May Shatter Itself

Newspaper headlines about Foreign Affairs which impress me as returning to my desk after a two weeks' vacation are those emphasizing the swelling of the battle between Communism and religion.

Developments strengthened the view ventured in this column just before I went away: "The world-wide ideological conflict between Communism and Democracy, involving a life and death struggle between religion and the Red is, intensifying. We have reached a crucial period."

Since then the situation has grown more critical, especially in Europe. It has reached a point where we are justified in saying that the outcome of the war of the ideas may turn in large degree on this question of religion or no religion—of God or no God.

At the moment the fiercest phase of the Moscow-directed offensive is aimed at the Vatican in Rome and the highly organized Catholic church of Europe. However, not only Catholicism but all other forms of faith come under the Red edict that religion must be exterminated as the foe of the masses.

Only last Sunday the leading Communist newspaper of Soviet occupied Germany, the Neues Deutschland, denounced Lutheran Bishop Otto Dibelius of Berlin as a war monger and an instrument of American aggression. This is taken as presaging

Solons Toss Out 'Trial Run' Idea On Brannan Plan

Senate Subcommittee Action Comes As House Opens Farm Bill Debate

Washington, July 19 — (AP) — A Senate Agriculture subcommittee today formally tossed overboard an administration proposal for a trial run of the Brannan farm plan on hogs.

The action was taken during a closed session of the subcommittee which had had the measure under consideration for several weeks.

It came as the House, on the other side of the capitol, squared off for debate on farm legislation.

A Democratic-Republican coalition in the House flatly rejected administration efforts to put through a compromise on Secretary of Agriculture Brannan's subsidy plan.

The Brannan program would let the prices of perishable farm products fall to the natural level on the market. Farmers would get government checks—paid for by taxes—for the difference in those prices and what the government considers a fair price.

The trial run with hogs was proposed as a compromise experiment to find out how the plan would work in practice.

Chairman Gillette (D-Ia.) of the Senate subcommittee told reporters after the group's meeting:

"I was directed to draft a report to the full committee returning the bill without recommendation."

"In effect, the exigencies on the hog situation seem to have passed. It seemed to us that a trial run on one or more farm products would not be best."

As the House members gathered for the opening of the important farm debate, administration forces offered to give ground in an effort to save the bill. They proposed new restrictions on the "trial run."

But Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.), usually an administration supporter although leading the opposition to its farm bill, said "this retreat" merely is "an admission of a basic fault in the bill."

Gore already has offered a substitute bill continuing the present farm program for another year. He predicted the House, after two days of general debate, will approve his measure on Thursday.

Chairman Coolidge (D-N.C.) of the House Agriculture committee just as confidently said the administration bill, with a modified Brannan plan trial run, will win.

Coley announced last night that the administration bill would be revised to restrict the Brannan subsidy plan trial run to two years, with the experiments limited specifically to three commodities—potatoes, eggs and shorn wool.

Truman Departs For Chicago Talk

Foreign Policy Address Slated At Shrine Convention

Washington, July 19 — (AP) — President Truman left by plane for Chicago today to make a foreign policy address. He will speak before the diamond jubilee of American Shriners.

The President was accompanied on the trip by Senators Lucas and Douglas, Illinois Democrats.

His plane took off at 12:37 p.m. (EST).

He speaks at 4 p.m. (EST) in Soldier Field. Thousands of fellow members of the fraternal order were already in Chicago from all parts of the country for their annual convocation.

Illinois' two Democratic senators, Scott W. Lucas and Paul H. Douglas, were invited guests aboard the President's plane, the "Independence."

The plans called for the President, after ceremonies at the Chicago Municipal Airport, to proceed directly to the field for the speaking. Later he will attend a reception for top ranking Shriners, and speak again, informally and extemporaneously, at a dinner in honor of the new and retiring imperial potentates.

The afternoon occasion will be Mr. Truman's first formal speech on foreign policy since his appearance at Little Rock, Ark., June 11. The nearness of the Senate vote on the Atlantic pact added significance to the talk. A vote has been set for Thursday.

Truck Victim's Death Inquest Was Postponed

Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse announced today that he will hold an inquest into the death in a highway accident below Grimesland on July 10 of Andrew Jones, Negro, of Greenville, as soon as the truck driver, Linwood Ragland, 31, of 1216 Clark street, Greenville, is released from a Veterans' Hospital in Virginia.

The coroner said Jones suffered spinal injuries when Ragland's truck got out of control, swerved across the highway, went back across the pavement, traveled a couple hundred yards and landed in woods, according to the State Highway Patrol report. Ragland is charged with careless and reckless driving and defective brakes.

Booker T. Ragland and Sam Stafford, both Negroes, occupants of the truck, received minor injuries. The truck was wrecked.

New Supervisor Of Prison Camps

Raleigh, July 19 — (AP) — Hoyt B. Nichols of Sims has been named supervisor of the Fourth division prison camps, succeeding J. Robert Hooks of Goldsboro.

Hooks will be transferred to the Third division to replace E. N. Pearsall, State Prison Director. J. B. Moore said yesterday, Pearsall will be moved to the Highway Department as maintenance supervisor for Brunswick county.

Prison supervisors receive \$3,600 a year.

Justice Frank Murphy Dies In Detroit Of Heart Ailment

Detroit, July 19 — (AP) — Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy died at 7:45 a.m. (EST) today.

Doctors at Henry Ford Hospital said the 59-year-old jurist died of coronary occlusions, a heart affliction.

Murphy was appointed in 1940 to the Supreme Court by the late President Frank D. Roosevelt. Prior to that, he had served one two-year term as governor of Michigan. He was defeated for re-election.

Before running for governor, Murphy served as the last governor-general of the Philippines. He was also attorney general of the United States.

The justice had been ill here for some time but his condition was not regarded as serious.

He never married. For many years he was regarded as one of Washington's most eligible bachelors.

It was as governor of Michigan that Murphy first came into the national limelight. That was in the 1930's when the first big sit-down strikes occurred. He was vigorously attacked by some for not using force to oust the sit-downers from automobile plants. Among accusations

hurled at him was that he was a "tool of Communists."

Murphy said that if the people of Michigan wanted their governor "to shoot the workers out of the factories and thus end sit-down strikes once and for all," they would have to get another governor to do it.

"If the American workmen are wrong," he declared, "I believe they can be taught the right way without writing the lesson in blood." (He said later that he believed sit-down strikes were wrong.)

Governor Murphy was defeated for reelection. The defeat hurt him, for he felt he had done a good job in pioneering state reforms. Among other things, he had put into effect the state's first civil service law and had overhauled the penal and corrections system.

As mayor of Detroit at the depth of the economic depression of the early 30's Murphy asserted that a great business depression should be as much a federal government responsibility as an earthquake.

In one year he spent \$14,000,000 to feed and house the city's jobless. To critics who accused him of extravagance, Murphy replied that he probably had saved Detroit from rioting and looting. Anyway, he said he had saved that much and probably more by economies. He was reelected as mayor.

Murphy resigned in the spring of 1933 to accept appointment as governor-general of the Philippines and remained in that office and as U.S. high commissioner until 1936. In that year President Roosevelt had him return to the United States so he could run for governor of Michigan.

Soon after his defeat for reelection as governor, Murphy was appointed U.S. attorney general by President Roosevelt. That was in 1939. Roosevelt and Murphy had become close friends while wrestling with relief problems during the depression. Their social philosophy was the same.

When President Roosevelt nominated him for the Supreme Court bench at the beginning of 1940, Murphy, with characteristic modesty, said he thought others were much better qualified. He became a member of the tribunal without ever arguing a case before it.

A total of 11 automobile and truck dealers submitted bids for the two police cars and pick-up truck and a one and one-half ton truck for the street department.

The bids received on the trucks were referred to the street committee of the board of aldermen which was ordered to study the bids and make the purchase for the city. The committee also was instructed to consider the purchase of a truck for the cemetery.

The matter of purchasing a new three-wheel motorcycle for the police department was referred to the police committee with power to act.

Mayor W. S. Stafford presided at the call meeting of the aldermen.

The warehouses and factories might have a record of your number from last year, but it makes good sense to have your card to show your employer so he can get your name and number right and you can get credit for the wages you earn. Marshall Barney, manager of the Rock Mount Social Security office

said today that employers quarterly information returns are more complete every year, but still many errors and omissions are still being made. The one made most often is reporting a man without a number. The way to get all reports complete and accurate is to show your card when you first start to work.

Applications for original or duplicate Social Security cards can be obtained at any Post Office or Employment Service office, Mr. Barney said.

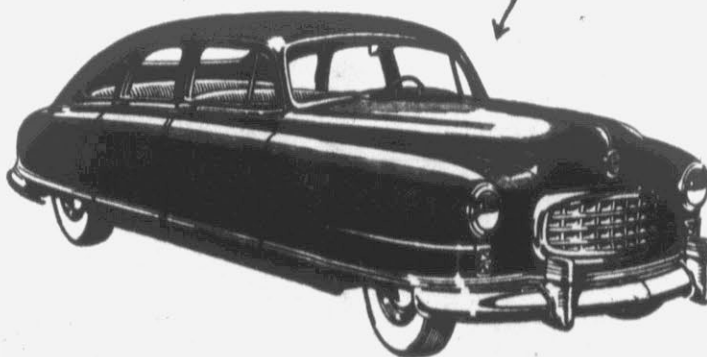

The 37-year-old public information director at Los Alamos Atomic Energy Commission project has been missing since last Wednesday.

Los Alamos Security Guard officer, the FBI, New Mexico State police, the Texas border patrol and

Santa Fe officers have joined in the search.

Yesterday Manager Jerry Polanco of Hotel Fisher in El Paso, Tex., said Snelling registered there Thursday and checked out at noon Saturday. He was accompanied by Albert Bourland of San Diego, Cal. Polanco said.

Saturday morning, before checking out, the pair asked the hotel room clerk to check train schedules

to Phoenix. Bourland said he wished he were home in San Diego.

Snelling signified he would accompany Bourland to the train but did not say whether he would board.

As director of information at Los Alamos Snelling had access to restricted papers of the AEC. But officials say they have nothing to do with his disappearance.

Before Polanco saw him, Snelling had been seen last at newspaper and Associated Press offices here and at La Fonda Hotel bar. He was to have lead a group of newsmen to the Central New Mexico desert Saturday, to inspect the site of the first atom bomb explosion.

Safety Award Is Again Presented National Carbon

National Carbon Company today was cited by the North Carolina Department of Labor for having done an outstanding job of accident prevention during the last two years.

The recognition was in the form of a ribbon to be attached to the Certificate of Safety Achievement which the company was awarded for its 1947 safety record. The ribbon indicates a continuation of the firm's accomplishments in safety during 1948.

The citation was presented to A. W. Bryan, manager of the company, by Ed. Whitley, Jr., safety inspector representing the Department of Labor in the eastern district. The certificate cites National Carbon Company for having rolled up a conspicuous safety record and for work which "resulted in a substantial reduction of accidents and the promotion of safer working conditions, thereby contributing to the prevention of human suffering and curtailing economic waste."

The safety award bears the signatures of State Labor Commissioner Forrest H. Shuford and Secretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin and was presented jointly in the names of both the State and Federal Labor Departments.

Whitley explained that the Certificate of Safety Achievement is presented to establishments which qualify in any one of the following three ways: (1) by reducing their accident frequency rates 40 per cent or more compared with the previous year; (2) by having an accident rate 75 per cent or more below the State average for the industry; (3) by having a perfect record of no lost-time accidents during the year.

When an establishment qualifies for the award for more than one year a ribbon is presented for attachment to the firm's original Safety Achievement Certificate, he said.

The inspector added that National Carbon Company qualified for the ribbon last year by the third method listed above.

Klan Prober Was Once A Member

Birmingham, Ala., July 19—(AP)—A circuit judge who instructed a grand jury to delve into floggings by masked mobs was once a Ku Klux Klansman himself.

Judge George Lewis Bailes told newsmen yesterday he was a Klan member in 1924 and 1925 for "campaign reasons."

However, he added, "I have not been a member of the organization since 1925." Judge Bailes said he made the public announcement because of inquiries about whether he had been a Klan member.

A week ago, Judge Bailes charged the Grand Jury to look into "this business of night riders taking people out x x x and whipping them."

The jury instructed by Judge Bailes recessed last week. It returned no additional indictments in the investigation of floggings, cross-burnings and threats in this area.

A previous Grand Jury indicted 17 persons July 9.

The 17th of this group, a high school football coach, was arrested yesterday. He is Valcus O. McCluskey, 47-year-old coach at West Jefferson High School.

TRESPASSING DOGS AFTER HOUSEHOLDER'S CHICKENS

Mrs. James Wynn, 1002 Chestnut street, reported to police yesterday that two stray Alsatians dogs were rampaging in her yard and attacking her chickens. Identity of the dogs was not established. Police are investigating.

Assails Tobacco Associates Inc.

Oxford, July 19—(AP)—Frank Hancock of Oxford, one-time head of the Commodity Credit Corporation, says Tobacco Associates Inc., which works to promote export of blue-cured leaf is "useless" and should be discontinued.

Farmers will vote Saturday whether to continue a tax of 10 cents an acre for Tobacco Associates. They will also decide in a referendum whether to extend tobacco quotas one year, three years, or discontinued them.

Hancock, a former congressman said in a statement yesterday he would vote against Tobacco Associates. He said he believed the corporation has not been "of any benefit whatever to the tobacco growers. He described the tax for Tobacco Associates as an "unconstitutional and unnecessary burden" on a commodity which is already "exorbitantly taxed."

The Greenville county judge and farmer added:

"Tobacco Associates is a useless and somewhat expensive duplication of at least five existing governmental agencies, all working in the interest of increasing and expanding the export trade of blue-cured tobacco."

Sales for the Pitt county curb market in Greenville for the first six months of this year total \$2,075.90, according to figures which were released today through the Pitt county agent's office.

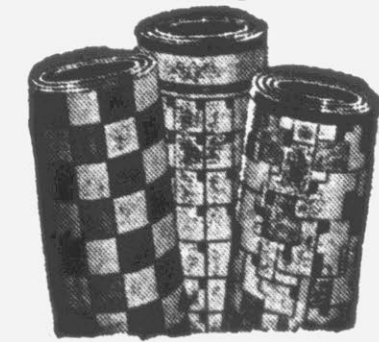

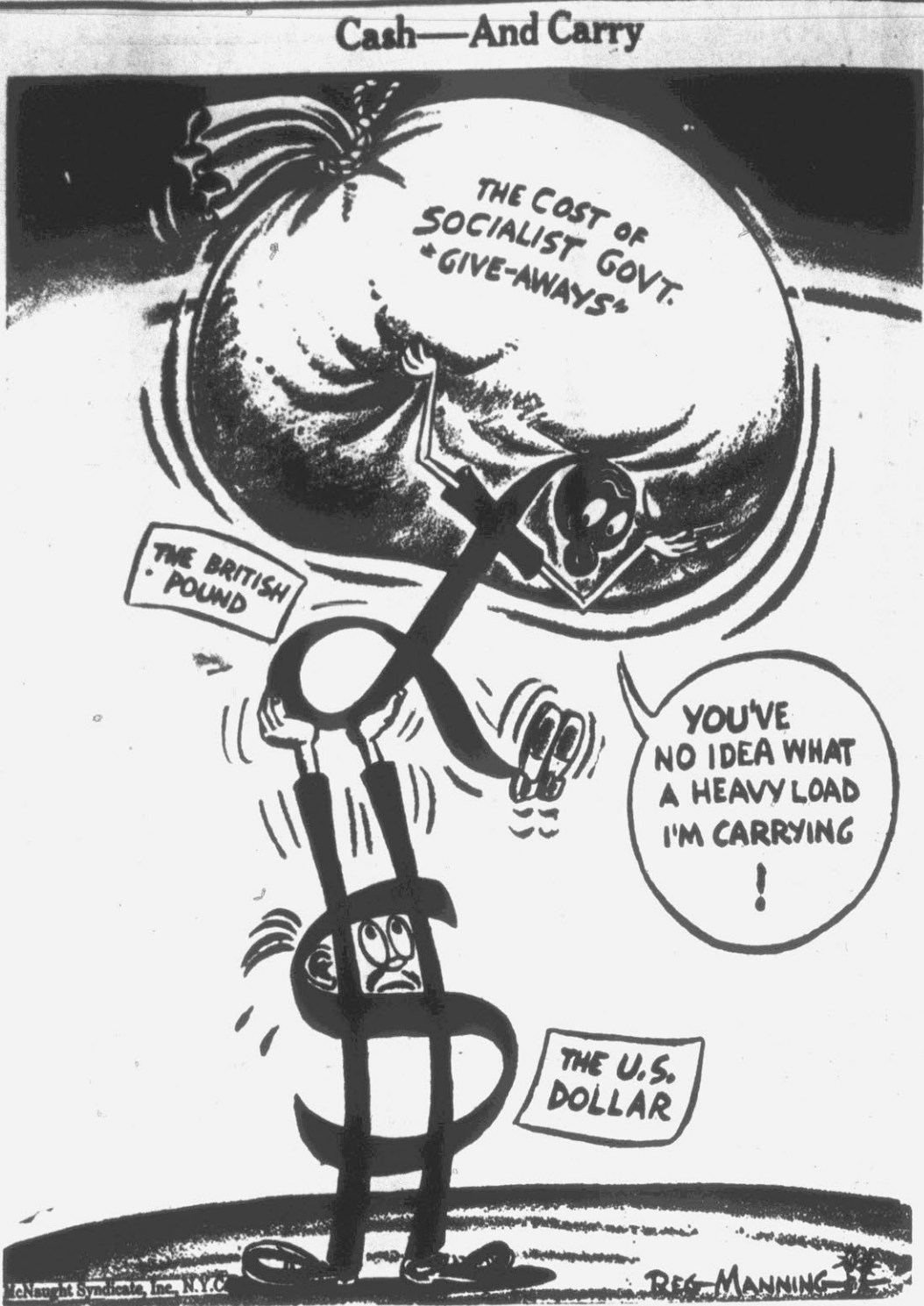

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington—Idleness in our federal penal institutions was an evil that had to be done away with if the inmates were to be rehabilitated and cured of those habits that returned them to those places time after time.

That's what leaders in private industry, organized labor, education and welfare, as well as penologists, were thinking of when Federal Prison Industries, Inc., was organized under a statute passed in 1934.

Federal Prison Industries, Inc., turns out everything from toothbrushes to tug boats, from mattresses to metal furniture, canned goods, clothing, brooms, textiles, gloves, shoes, metal wares, books and tools. It makes a half million mail bags a year for the Post Office department. During the war

it made some ships for the Army mainly tug-type wooden boats not over 70 feet long.

Another inmate, who worked in the glove factory at the Correctional Institution at Danbury, Conn., not only learned how to make gloves, but also took a course in maintenance of glove making machines and upon release manufactured gloves himself.

At the time of the signing of the act creating Federal Prison Industries, Inc., back in 1934, President Roosevelt said: "Without any important competition with private industry or labor, the Government can provide increasingly useful work in itself for those who need to learn how to work and to learn that work in itself is honorable and is a practical substitute for criminal methods of earning one's livelihood."

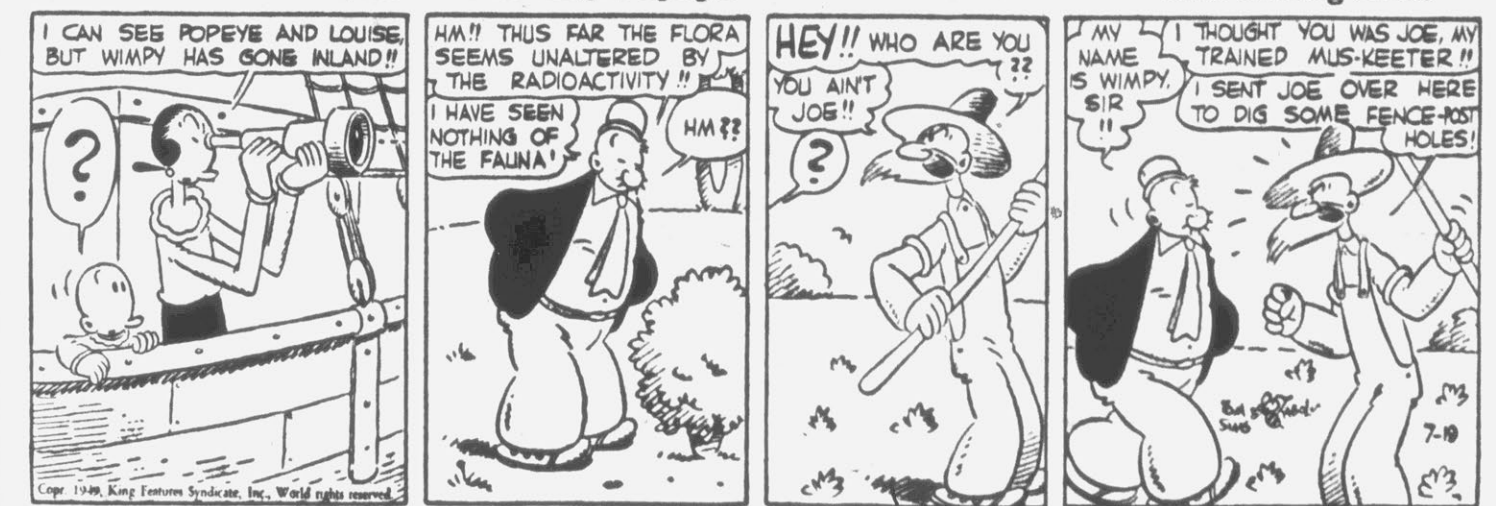

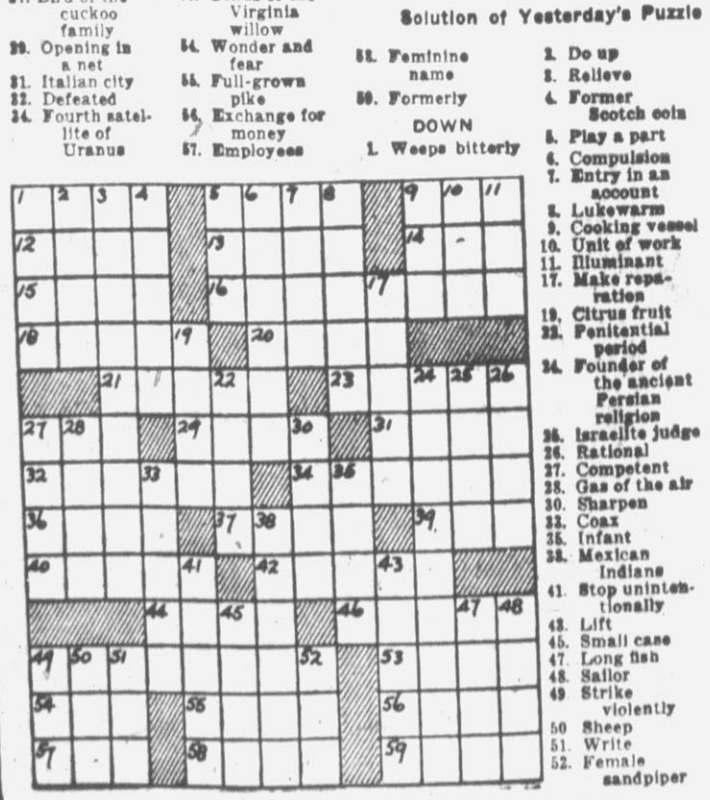

Lanier Sees Great Prosperity Following Recovery Of Europe

By WYATT BROWN

Pitt County will be afforded a greatly expanded market for its flue-cured tobacco if and when Europe gets its economy stabilized, declared J. Con Lanier, general counsel for the Leaf Tobacco Exporters Association and the Tobacco Association of the United States, last night in the Rotary Club when he told the Rotarians about some of the facts and his reactions to his recent trip to Europe in connection with European tobacco markets. Mr. Lanier said that "milk and honey" would flow in Pitt County when Europe gets its economy on a sound basis.

At the outset Mr. Lanier told the Rotarians he had spent no time with paid propagandists but with business men in the eight countries he visited. He said he was seeing business men about the purchase of tobacco from the United States. The leading men in the tobacco industry in each country and their committees were the people he talked to.

His first stop was in England. There he found too many people for the small land area, and observed how the slow down of work due to dependence on the state by the workers under a socialist government. English workers are not working or producing for socialism has destroyed the incentive; so England cannot meet the competition in world markets. More doubts came to Mr. Lanier's mind about the success of the Marshall plan in England than in any other country visited. Either the United States will absorb England's deficit each year until she recovers or England will go down for they have no colonies now to draw on.

France afforded a picture of industrious people who could readily get the country back on its economic feet if they had a government in which they could have confidence. There are two hundred political parties in the nation and no five parties can marshal a majority vote. Mr. Lanier called it a wonderful country.

Switzerland is just a little United States over in Europe is the way Mr. Lanier summed up that country. He was impressed by the industry of the people, the fine people cleanliness and prosperity.

Belgium which suffered none from the war due to capitulation before she was invaded, prospered during the war and seems in good financial shape. It has the largest number of fine American cars which outnumbered any found in any U.S. city which impressed the speaker. This country has already achieved a good measure of recovery.

Holland afforded an impression which encouraged the speaker. She had a long way to go and asks no quarter from anyone.

Denmark he found to be another country over-crowded with people for its small size. It was untouched by the devastation of war but her market disappeared with the downfall of Germany who had always been the chief market of the agricultural Danes.

Germany gave the greatest stimulation to the speaker. Here he found a people who impressed him with their industriousness and the degree they have already progressed in spite of the frightful devastation visited upon them by the bombing of planes. Wallace, Progressive party presidential candidate last year, would seek the post formerly held by Sen. Robert F. Wagner, a Democrat who resigned recently.

"I do not think it necessary to assure the people of North Carolina that these men and all other defendants will receive justice in North Carolina. If there is evidence of forced confession or any other improper procedure, full opportunity to present it in an orderly manner is afforded by appeal to the Supreme Court. These defendants have the benefit of every safeguard of the law for the protection of all its citizens.

"Until the Supreme Court acts on this appeal, the case is not before me. Should it come before me as a matter of executive clemency, I

What's the idea behind this? Labor and President Truman's advisers urge Congress to place a higher floor under wages. They argue that it will create more purchasing power among workers and give more of them fairer treatment.

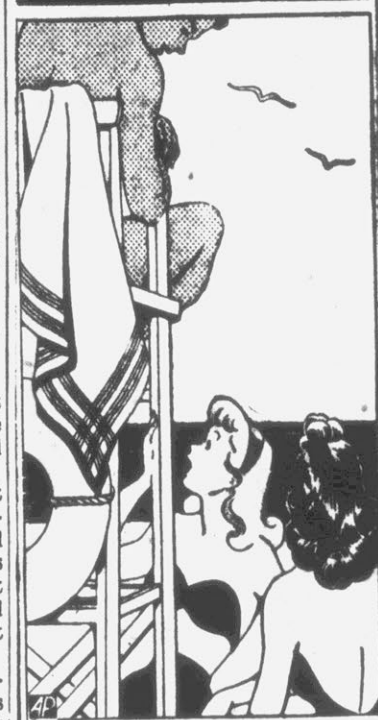

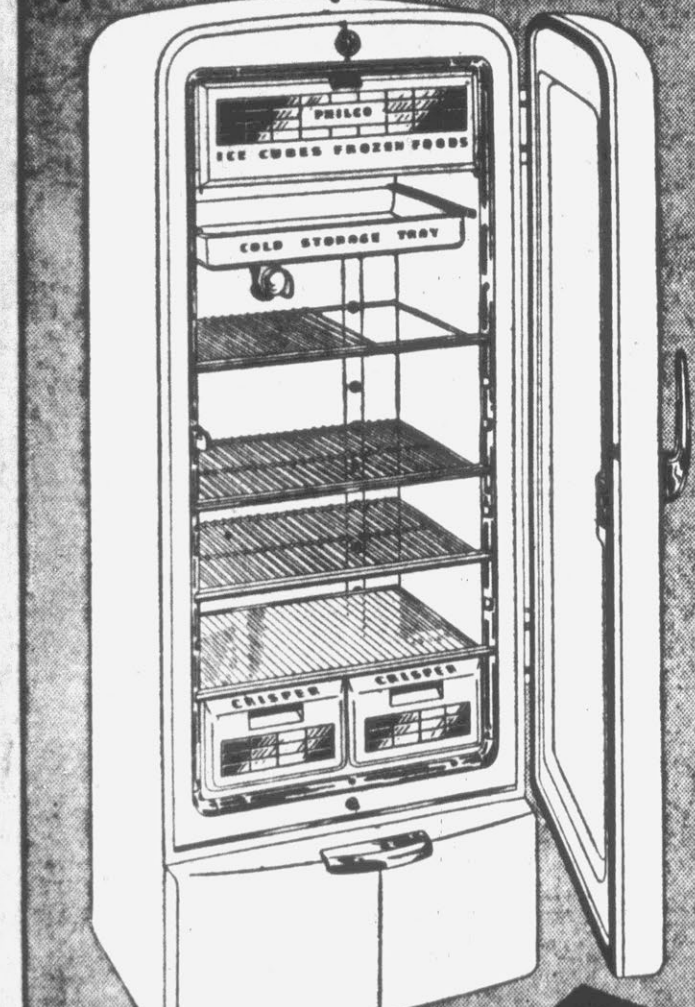

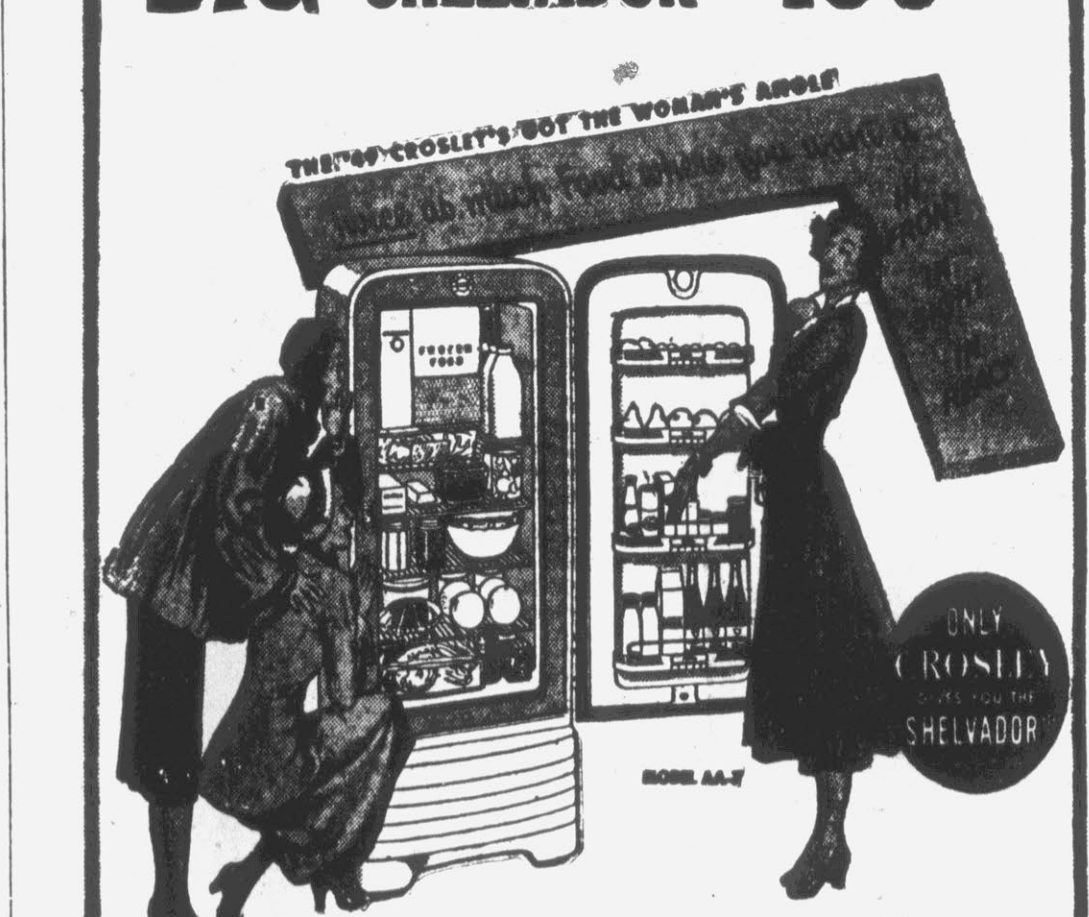
