MacArthur Says Jap Anti-Trust Drive Completed

Controversial Program For Breaking Up Economic Giants Is Wound Up

Tokyo, Aug. 3—(AP)—General MacArthur's controversial program for breaking up Japan's economic giants ended today. The Allied Occupation commander said it was "accomplished effectively."

Eleven big corporations were tagged for deconcentration by a five-man review board which came here from Washington 15 months ago to make recommendations on 325 firms listed as "excessive concentrations." The board recommended divestment of certain holdings for nine others.

The 325 companies were selected for board action out of about 1,300 which had been affiliated with the Zaibatsu holding companies. Through this powerful setup, headquarters said, "a small number of families exercised all pervasive control over the industry, commerce and finance of Japan."

From its beginning, the deconcentration program was a matter of hot international and domestic debate. In the United States as well as Japan some called it "socialization." Others criticized it as "fragmentation" of finance or industry.

A press statement issued today by MacArthur's headquarters said: "The elimination of monopolistic economic power which dominated prewar Japanese life has been accomplished effectively without adverse effect upon, and no 'fragmentation' of, finance or industry."

"On the contrary, competent observers point to the 50 percent increase in production along with considerable progress toward stabilization during the past year as evidence of the growing health of the Japanese economy."

Some observers in Japan have called the program a success. Others have labelled it a failure.

The theft occurred at noon as the Aga Khan and the Begum, with a maid and a chauffeur, left their Riviera villa here en route to Deauville to visit their son, Ali, and daughter-in-law, Rita Hayworth.

The Begum said four shabbily dressed men, speaking with Spanish or Italian accent and carrying tommy guns, not away with one 25 carat diamond worth 25,000,000 francs.

Imprisonment Faces Carpenter

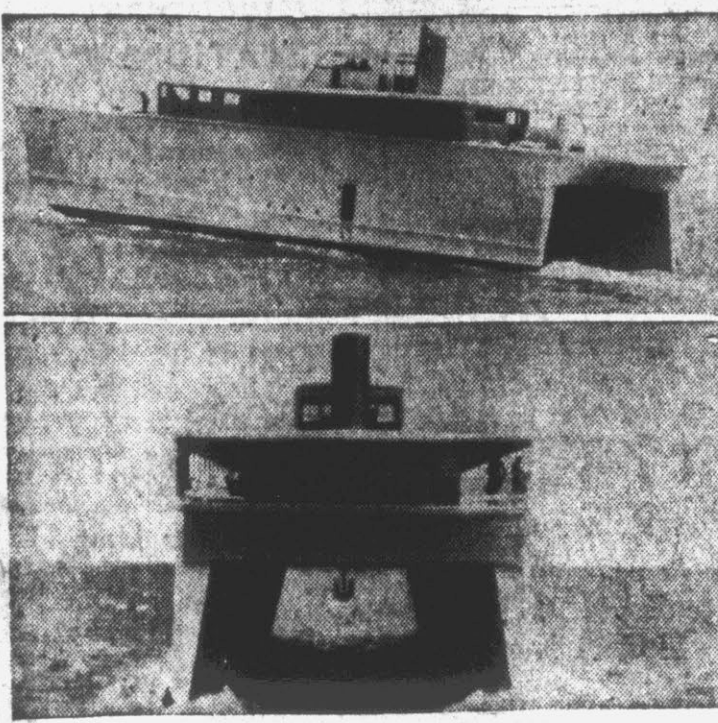
Wilmington, N.C., Aug. 3—(AP)—Fred Quincy Allen today faced life imprisonment for shooting his wife to death.

American And British Military Chiefs Meet

U. S. Chiefs Of Staff Reportedly Urging Pact Partners To Promise Prompt Military Unity In Defense Plan

London, Aug. 3—(P)—American and British military leaders met today to talk over plans for speedy unification of western Europe's armed forces under the Atlantic pact.

Responsible officials said the U. S. joint chiefs of staff want Britain and other pact partners to promise prompt, large scale military units in a common defense program.

The U. S. military staff chiefs, Army Gen. Omar N. Vandenberg and Navy Adm. Louis E. Denfeld, arrived last night from Germany for two days of conference in London before going to Paris late Thursday.

Admiral Denfeld told newsmen the British and Americans were considering how the 12-nation Atlantic Alliance would absorb the military staff already set up by the five-nation western European Union. Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg last year established a joint military committee headed by field Marshal Viscount Montgomery.

Well informed sources here said the U. S. chiefs of staff want the five western union powers to merge their forces and defense resources into a tightly-knit Atlantic pact framework.

Some degree of reluctance against such a fullscale merger has been unofficially reported among the western union partners.

Battle Captures Virginia Primary

Byrd Protege Wins Four-Way Test For Governorship

Richmond, Va., Aug. 3—(AP)—Quiet conservative John Stewart Battle, a state senator with 30 years of legislative experience, captured yesterday's four-way Democratic primary election for governor and proved again the potency of the Virginia political organization headed by Senator Harry Byrd.

The 56-year-old Charlottesville lawyer won the party nomination that means election in November with 23,000 votes to spare on the basis of near-complete returns from the state's 1768 precincts.

He swept the field—capturing seven of the state's nine congressional districts. And in so doing he beat back his nearest competitor, Francis Pickens Miller, the anti-organization candidate and former army colonel, who posed the first serious threat to the organization's supremacy in the last 26 years.

Miller, second in the record primary that ran around 300,000 votes, captured the two remaining districts. Horace H. Edwards, former Richmond mayor and ex-chairman of the state Democratic party, ran far behind in third place. Remmie L. Arnold, Petersburg manufacturer and a newcomer to state politics, was last far down the line.

Not Just Yet

Toledo, O., Aug. 3—(AP)—An ex-convict picked up yesterday by Toledo police for routine questioning wants to go back to prison—but not just yet.

Inside a pocket of Charles A. Rutledge's trousers, police found this note: "My name is Charles Aloysius Rutledge. They call me Walking Charlie. I served two years at Angola, La., and my number is 13389. Should I be found dead, please ship my remains to the penitentiary."

Reaction To Escape

Chinese Communists Are Raging Over Escape Of British Sloop Amethyst, And They Are Telling The World By Radio; Threatening Words, No Commitment

Simple Rage—on the local and semi-official level—is the first reaction of the Chinese Communists to the escape of the British sloop Amethyst.

As I pointed out yesterday, this reaction is going to be worth watching because it may disclose the true temper of the Chinese Reds over an issue that involves their pride and their future policy.

Their first reaction points, but strikes no hammer blow, it shows signs of having been compiled hastily and none too expertly. It was a broadcast by the Peiping radio heard in San Francisco by The Associated Press.

There were two separate items. The first was a "news story" from Nanking by the Communist new China news agency, giving the Red version (and it's a Lulu) of the Amethyst's dramatic escape.

The account attributes everything to a Gen. Yuan Chung-Hsien, who is not identified in what appears to be haste of writing. Later, in the Commentary, the agency names Yuan as the "commander of the People's Liberation Army at the Kiangling front."

It was from near Chinkiang that the Amethyst escaped. Gen. Yuan is apparently the responsible officer who has to explain how she got away.

GOP Divided On Chairman Choice

Three-Way Split In Nat'l Committee Casts Doubts

Washington, Aug. 3—(P)—A three-way split in the Republican National committee cast doubt today on his choice of a new chairman. The election is set for tomorrow.

Backers of Guy George Gabrielson, New Jersey member, were claiming a majority of the 108 votes that might be cast. (There are two vacancies on the 105-member group.)

Critics of the old guard continued supporting Gabrielson disputed this claim.

They added that any chairman who is chosen by fewer than 80 votes will face the same kind of committee disension that eventually forced out chairman Hugh Scott after he won a confidence test last January by a 54 to 50 margin. Scott has said he will turn in his resignation tomorrow.

As a compromise candidate, some western delegates were booming A. T. "Bert" Howard, Nebraska state chairman, who has the support of Senators Wherry and Butler and other Nebraska Republicans in Congress. Howard also had the backing of some members who have been critical of Scott's administration.

Hart Mill Union Rejects Offer By Management

Tarboro, N.C., Aug. 3—(AP)—Management proposals in the 12-week-old Hart Cotton Mill strike were rejected by employees last night. Representatives of the Textile Workers Union of America CIO and Marcus W. Carter, mill manager, met yesterday, and the union leaders agreed to submit management proposals to the workers.

At the meeting Carter agreed to retain a vacation clause in the old contract with the union and to pay time and one-half pay on six holidays stipulated in the old contract.

Carter, however, refused a clause calling for check-off of union dues and a no-strike clause.

House Completes 'Johnson Bill'

Washington, Aug. 3—(AP)—The House yesterday completed congressional action on a bill to give Secretary of Defense Johnson greater control over the Army, Navy and Air Force, and sent the measure to the White House.

Besides strengthening Johnson's hand—as requested by the Secretary, President Truman and the Hoover Commission—the bill sets up a new armed forces accounting system intended to save money, and creates a permanent chairman for the joint chiefs of staff.

Doctor Silent To Drunk Charge

Winston-Salem, N.C., Aug. 3—(AP)—Dr. Samuel Wallace Fleming, a physician on the staff of the Forsyth County hospital, said this morning he had nothing to say yet about charges that he had been drunk while on duty.

The doctor indicated that he may have a statement later. He has been accused of being under the influence of alcohol while administering to patients at the hospital by four nurses and a patient.

Prisoners Give Up After Siege

Morelia, Mexico, Aug. 3—(AP)—Most of 72 prisoners battling police in a mass jail break surrendered early today after an all-night siege. Six prisoners were killed in fighting when the break started from the state penitentiary yesterday afternoon. A policeman was reported killed and two others wounded.

Reports Jobless Count Goes Over 4 Million Total

Number Of Employed Also Goes Up In July For New High In 1949

Washington, Aug. 3—(AP)—Unemployment rose above 4,000,000 in July for the first time since January, 1942, the Census Bureau reported today.

But the number of employed also increased, registering in July the highest figure—59,720,000—for 1949.

Explanation for the simultaneous increase in employment and unemployment was an increase of 417,000 in the civilian labor force—the number having jobs or seeking them.

Only one of each four of the new job seekers managed to find a job. The number of unemployed in July was 4,095,000 compared with 3,778,000 in June and 2,227,000 in July of last year.

The 59,720,000 employed in July compared with 59,619,000 in June, the previous high for 1949, and 61,615,000 in July, 1948.

The Census Bureau commented: "As in June, most of the additional persons in the labor force were of high school and college age. However, in contrast with the past two months, the rise in unemployment between June and July cannot be attributed to the entry of young persons into the labor force. Adult workers accounted for most of the increase in July."

Employment in non-agricultural industries, which have been hit hardest by worker layoffs since the business slowdown began last fall, took an upturn in July. It rose to 50,073,000 from 49,924,000 in June. This year's total, however, was far short of the 53,452,000 figure posted for July last year.

Farm employment slipped to 9,647,000 in July from 9,696,000 in June. But this was well above the 9,163,000 total in July, 1948.

The Census Bureau's figures were shadowed estimates only. They shed no light on the spot-unemployment which the Administration seeks to remedy by concentrating federal spending in the troubled areas.

Tito Forecasts Cominform Rift

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Aug. 3—(AP)—Premier Marshal Tito forecast yesterday that Bulgaria and Albania would quit the Moscow-led Cominform and offered them a helping hand in shaking off Russian domination.

Tito has been tilting with the Cominform (Communist International Information Bureau) since June of last year, when Yugoslavia's communists were expelled for nationalism and other deviations from the Moscow brand of Marxism-Leninism.

Both Bulgaria and Albania have had recent purges among high communist leaders who were charged with heresies similar to the accusations leveled against Tito.

The Yugoslav leader spoke yesterday at Skopje before an audience estimated at 350,000 by Yugoslav officials. It was the first time in recent months he appeared in Macedonia, which has been subjected to propaganda from anti-Tito factions urging an independent state made up of Yugoslav, Bulgarian and Greek Macedonia.

Tito declared the Bulgarian people ultimately would ignore "aiders against Yugoslavia and extend their fraternal hand to us and we will help them remove whatever individuals have so far put obstacles in the path of the creation and preservation of brotherly relations."

Company Closes Plant In Strike

Roanoke Rapids, Aug. 3—(AP)—Management of the strike-bound Halifax Paper Company yesterday ordered the plant closed indefinitely.

K. F. Adams, resident manager of the company, told newsmen that "in the public interest we have decided to close the plant down indefinitely."

A strike of the plant's 400 workers was called by the United Paper Workers Union of America Monday after negotiations for a new contract broke down.

Graham To Speak Here Sept. 3

Senator Frank P. Graham (D-NC) will be the principal speaker at the Farmers Day which will be held in Greenville September 3.

V. C. Fleming, Jr., chairman of the Greenville Farmers Day committee, announced shortly after noon today that Senator Graham had accepted the invitation to be the guest of Greenville on September 3 and to deliver the principal address for the city's Farmers Day program.

Changes Ahead In Europe Arms Bill

House Foreign Affairs Committee Calls Closed-Door Huddle Today On Key Questions Said Still Unanswered

Washington, Aug. 3—(AP)—Some major alterations appeared in store today for the arms-to-Europe bill.

The House Foreign Affairs Committee called a closed-door huddle today to hear from two men who are supposed to know all the details of the \$1,450,000,000 program to help Atlantic pact and other nations erect a wall of weapons against Soviet aggression.

The witnesses are Maj. Gen. Lyman Lemnitzer of the Army and Dr. Lloyd V. Berkner of the State Department. Committee sources described them as "the men who helped draft this plan and know all the answers."

The committee already has received general endorsements of the plan from high administration officials and military men. The testimony they gave dealt largely with generalities and stressed the need to strengthen friendly nations against Soviet advances.

"We have not yet received the answers to the questions bothering us," said Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio). "We hope to get down to brass tacks now."

Vorys and most of his Republican committee colleagues as well as some Democrats said they weren't willing, on the basis of evidence to date, to approve the entire program.

Vorys wants it cut about in half and put on an interim basis while the Atlantic pact nations are working out military agreements. He also wants an ironclad guarantee that the arms sent abroad will be used in a coordinated program if war comes.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee postponed from today until next Monday its hearings on the arms program after Secretary of State Acheson and Secretary of Defense Johnson conferred behind closed doors with the foreign committee and the armed services committee. The two groups will handle the bill jointly in the Senate.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) top GOP member of the foreign relations committee, reportedly told Acheson and Johnson that the President's program won't be approved in its present form. Vandenberg was represented as feeling that the bill goes too far in delegating powers to the President.

One provision of the legislation has been interpreted by Republicans as enabling the President to provide arms to any nation in the world.

Slave Labor Charge Brought By Britain

Unsettled Prices For Border Belt Indicate Shade Over Opening Day

Prices for fine-cut tobacco on the Carolina border belt were unsettled today. Early sales indicated, however, that the average might be a little above yesterday's opening of about \$50 a hundred.

Quality of offerings seemed to be better throughout the markets volume still was heavy. The stabilization corporation and British buyers also were active in helping to hold down fluctuations.

At Timmonsville, S. C., where an opening day average of \$53 was recorded, reported first sales today brought \$56, with a high of \$67. Cigarette tobacco was abundant.

The range at Kingstree, S. C., was from \$28 to \$39.

Unofficial reports from the other markets indicated a like trend. Farmers generally were satisfied and there were few turned tags, a move by which farmers refuse bid prices.

The belt still was under last year's revenue, when the opening day average was \$56.09.

The Familiar Routine

When The President Asks Congress To Approve A Matter Of Foreign Policy, A Big Parade Of State Department And Defense Experts Always Back It Up

Washington, Aug. 3—(AP)—It's when we get into the foreign field that the Mr. Big parade really begins in Washington.

If President Truman asks Congress to approve a foreign program, he's worked out, you can sit in Topeka and call the shots.

His first team—the State Department, Army ambassadors and so on—beats it up to Congress to plug for the program.

There's nothing strange about that. Congress would want to hear their say-so, whether or not they wanted to go.

It would be strange, though, if one of the team crossed up his boss. Mr. Truman, and tore one of the programs to pieces.

You don't see that happen often. And there's a good reason for that. Most of the team probably helped him put the program together in the first place.

So the members of the team march up to the capitol day after day, nod their heads "yes," speak their pieces, get their pictures taken, and go back to work.

It's the foreign program which always seems to bring out the biggest boys in Washington.

Take the arms-for-Europe program. Mr. Truman dropped that in Congress' basket July 25 and asked for \$1,450,000,000 to pay for it. This was pretty hot.

Accuse Soviet Union Of Slavery On Mass-Production Basis; Offer Guide-Book For Labor Camps In Evidence

Geneva, Switzerland, Aug. 3—(AP)—Great Britain accused the Soviet Union before the United Nations Economic and Social Council today of creating "a new slavery organized on a mass production basis" in the USSR.

Corley Smith, British delegate to the council, presented what he described as a copy of the "Corrective Labor Codes of the Russian Soviet Federated Socialist Republic" giving rules for labor camps in the Soviet Union. The R.F.S.R. is the Soviet Union's largest state. Moscow is its capital.

Then he asked for a straight answer from the Soviet delegate—"yes or no"—as to whether the Soviet Union would permit an investigation.

Soviet Delegate Amassap Arutunian countered with the charge that Britain's Labor government had initiated a hostile campaign against the Soviet Union to detract attention from its own economic difficulties.

He said the Corrective Labor Code decreed by Smith was published in England in an English translation in 1936 and declared:

Cash Income For Farms In Southland Show Rise

Atlanta, Aug. 3—(AP)—The cash income of Southern farmers increased the first five months of this year as it dropped in other sections of the country.

C. Parker Persons, regional director of the U.S. Department of Commerce, said the cash farm income from January through May

this year was up nine per cent in the South Atlantic region over the same period last year.

The South Atlantic region is comprised of Georgia, Florida, the Carolinas, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia and Delaware.

The South Central region is made up of Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas.

In other regions of the country, drops in farm income ranged from one per cent to 42 per cent, the Department of Agriculture reported.

Total cash receipts in the South Atlantic region were \$376,000,000 for the first five months of 1949 against \$302,172,000 in the same period last year. This included substantial rises in receipts from crops, as well as livestock and its products.

Indonesia-Dutch Conflict Ends

Batavia, Java, Aug. 3—(P)—The Dutch and Indonesian Republicans formally ended their armed conflict today and issued cease-fire orders to local military commanders in Java and Sumatra.

The cease-fire proclamation is to become effective in Java at midnight local time next Wednesday, Aug. 10, and in Sumatra at midnight Sunday, Aug. 14.

Prefers Death Chamber Quiet

Chicago, Aug. 3—(AP)—James Morelli, who is scheduled to die in the electric chair Aug. 12, is occupying a cell in death row at the Cook County Jail at his own request—so his final nights of sleep will not be disturbed.

The 22 year old "mad dog" killer was removed to one of the four cells adjoining the death chamber after he had complained of too much noise by other prisoners.

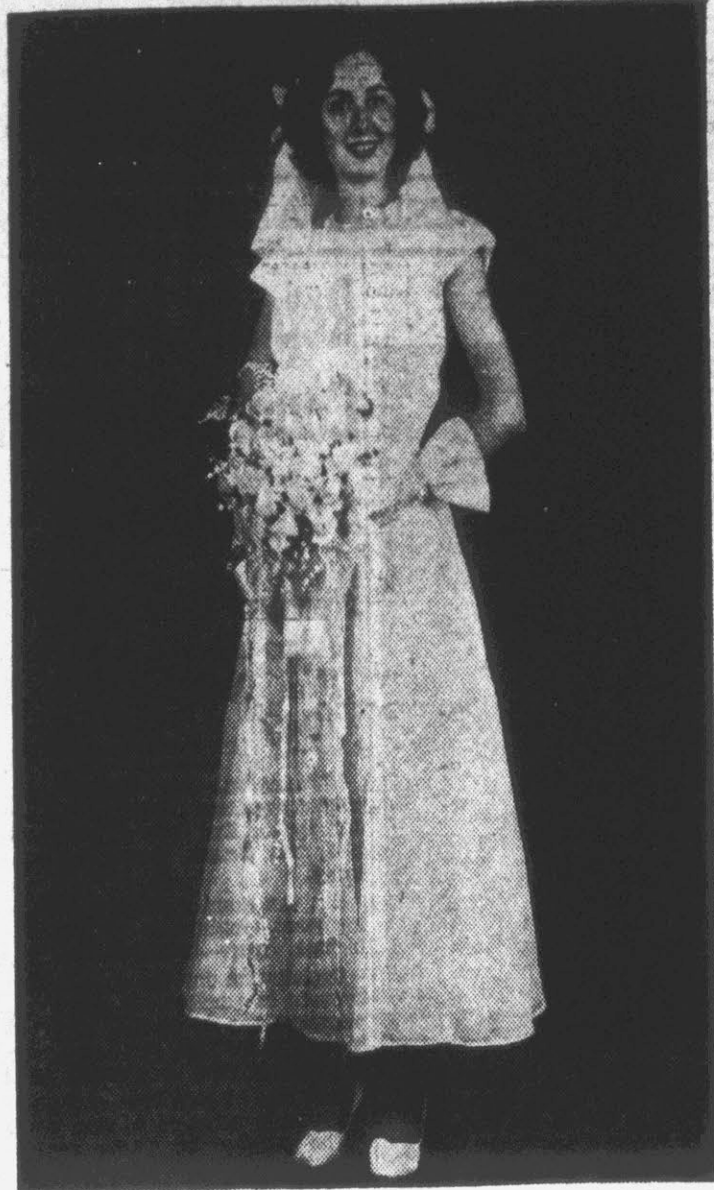

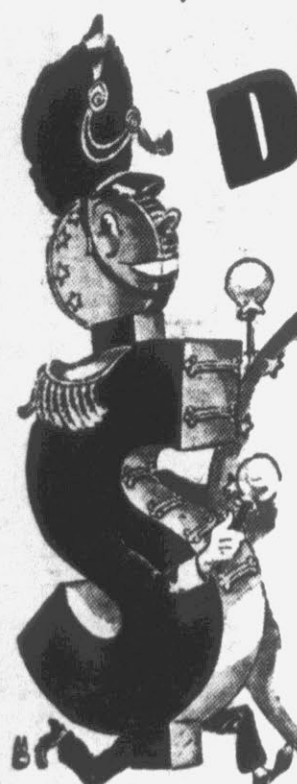

Whether we write the words on our hat bands, or on the fleshy tables of our hearts, or whether we simply keep them in mind, certainly these should play a great part in our daily policy-making. A LUCKY NUMBER

California may not be known as the sunshine state, but she certainly put her sister states in the shade in the attention she received from the United States House of Representatives during the last two weeks of July.

During the days between July 18 and July 25, no less than seven separate bills were introduced in Congress proposing that certain documents held in the National Archives be returned to the state of California.

Whether California's bills will get priority over the administration's program, we don't know, but if Congressional attention is what is necessary to repossess the documents the state wants, she should rest assured she has a fair chance of getting them back.

SPECIAL TERM

Governor Kerr Scott has been requested by the Pitt County Board of Commissioners to grant a special two-week criminal term of Pitt Superior Court beginning November 28.

The request was made by the commissioners at the suggestion of D. T. House, Jr., clerk of the county court, who last week estimated it would take a five-week criminal term of court to erase all backlog cases on the county Superior court docket.

The load on the Superior court has in recent years increased to the point where it is impossible to hear all the cases on the docket in the five regular Superior court sessions allotted to the county each year. During the past four years, there has been at least one special term of court each year, and still it has been necessary to carry over cases from one year to the next.

There is no question about the courts of North Carolina being overtaxed, and if something can not be done to

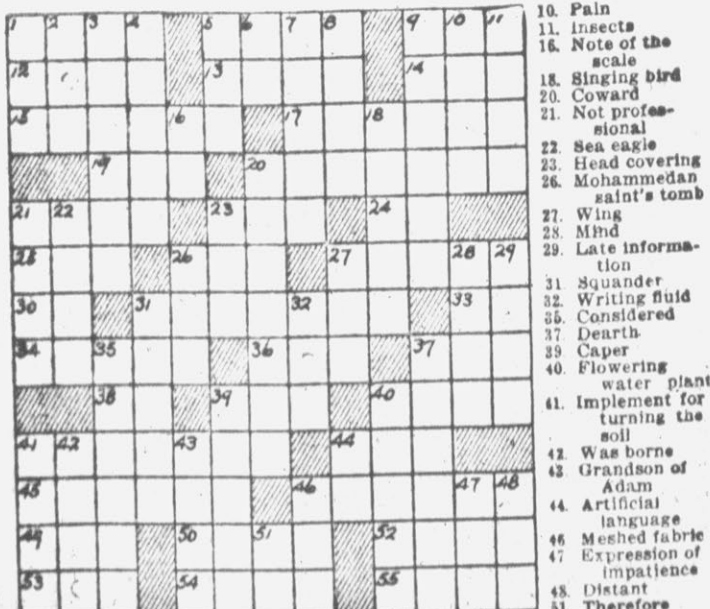

eleventh will almost certainly make contests in other districts more likely. It is known that several men in Cleveland, Gaston, McDowell and Rutherford counties have long cherished ambitions to go to Congress. A few have essayed to beat the Major, with results not very flattering to their prowess. The smaller counties of Madison, Polk and Yancey also have good Congressional material.

CANDIDATES—Candidates may not come into the open until around the end of the year, but at least two have let it be known they would like to succeed the Gaston veteran. Charles Z. Flak of Rutherford, one time secretary to Bulwinkle, would not think of running against his former boss but would like to succeed him. Peyton McSwain of Cleveland said just before the last primary he would certainly be a candidate in 1950, whether or not Bulwinkle ran again. Subsequently McSwain was appointed a special judge by Governor Cherry and omitted from the reappointment list by Governor Scott. Political factions in all the counties are pretty well defined and it is hardly likely these two prospects will have the field to themselves. At least half a dozen entries are expected in the race before close of filing time the middle of next March. It comes with something of a shock to realize that is only about seven months away.

GEOGRAPHY—When Major Bulwinkle was first elected to Congress in 1920 both Cleveland and Gaston were in the ninth district, which had been represented for many years by a Cleveland man—Yates Webb for most of the time with Clyde Hoey serving one term. Acquisition of additional congressmen for North Carolina took both Gaston and Cleveland into the tenth and then into the eleventh districts. Loss of a Congressman to the state may cause switchback in 1951, but will not affect the next election. For 28 years, except for the one Republican term, Gaston has had the congressman. The other counties think time about is fair play, and Rutherford and McDowell may challenge the right of a Cleveland or Gastonian to carry on.

FACTIONAL—Fight for supremacy between party factions is likely to have more bearing than geography. News stories out of Washington following a recent visit of Governor Scott to the capital said the governor indicated he might seek to defeat some of the congressmen next year. The eleventh district would be a bad place to undertake that. Every county in the district except Polk voted against Scott in last year's run-off primary, and the district as a whole turned in a vote of 12,490 for Johnson, 8,893 for Scott. If, as most observers expect, both Senators Hoey and Graham have opposition in the primary the senatorial alignments will inevitably affect congressional races in every district where they occur.

REVOLUTION—A good deal has been said about North Carolina un-

dergoing a political revolution. That may be too strong a term but there is no doubt that situations have changed in many counties and issues which looked like good vehicles to ride a few months ago will not carry to victory now or next year. Some that look good now may be unsafe by next spring.

Mrs. McCarran, wife of Sen. Pat McCarran (D-Nev.); Mrs. Eugene D. Millikin, wife of the Republican senator from Colorado, and Mrs. Owen Brewster, wife of the Republican senator from Maine.

Other prominent students of Spanish include Mrs. Dean Acheson, wife of the Secretary of State; Mrs. Dwight Eisenhower, Mrs. William H. 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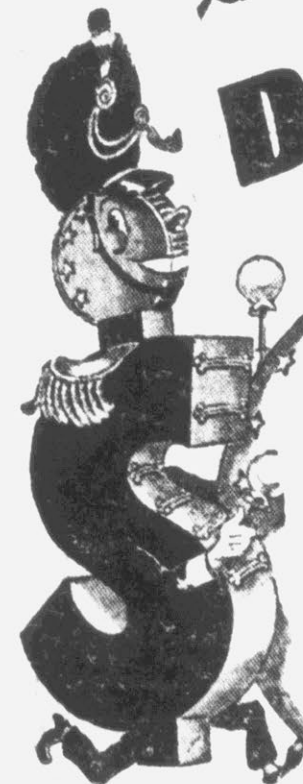

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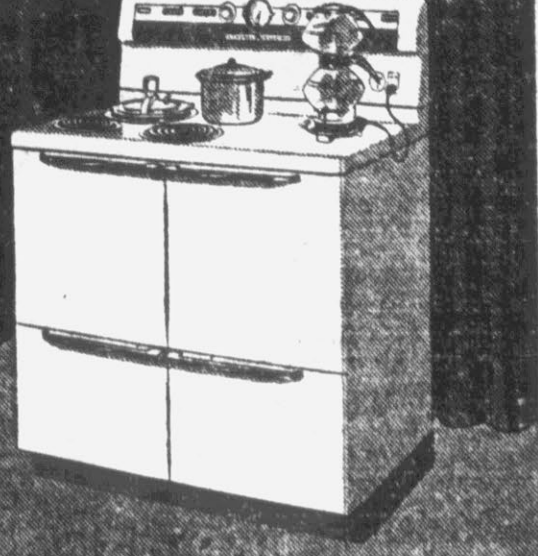

Fernandez Tells Lawyers To Drop Insanity Defense

New York, Aug. 3—(P)—Raymond Fernandez, back-seat driver at his murder trial—has forced his lawyer to abandon an insanity defense.

"I'm not the guy who needs a psychiatrist," the scowling "Lonely Hearts" slaying defendant told newsmen yesterday as his plea was switched for the second time in 24 hours.

As court opened today, the defense for Fernandez again was a general denial of any part in the slaying of Mrs. Janet Fay, 66-year-old Albany, N. Y. widow, in Valley Stream N. Y., last Jan. 4.

Insanity still was the defense for his fat girl friend and co-defendant, Mrs. Martha Beck, 29.

After a conference with the obviously upset Fernandez yesterday, defense counsel Herbert E. Rosenberg told the court: "The defendant Fernandez requests that he be permitted to withdraw the plea of insanity."

It was not announced why the 34-year-old Fernandez—facing a possible death chair conviction—chose not to try the insanity defense.

With the switch in tactics, Rosenberg never got around to putting a final question mark to the incomplete hypothetical question which he had propounded to a defense psychiatrist for two hours and 40 minutes on Monday.

The insanity defense for Fernandez came as a surprise on Monday. Originally, both he and Mrs. Beck had pleaded innocent by reason of insanity. But when the trial started, Rosenberg told the jury he would prove Mrs. Beck was insane and Fernandez had no part in the bludgeoning and strangulation of Mrs. Fay.

Perjury: Henry Wilkens, not pressed.

Driving without operator's license: Lyman E. Ham, prayer for judgment continued.

Ernest Lee Buck was not guilty of driving to the left of center of a highway.

Driving without 1949 license plate: Abraham L. Smith, \$20.

Whiskey for sale: Dick Wilkins colored, four months on the roads, suspended on payment of \$60 and he was placed on probation for two years.

Driving drunk: Henry Staton, colored, four months on the roads, or pay \$100 and costs and his driver's license was ordered revoked for a year.

Month Of July Ends Up In Red

Washington, Aug. 3—(P)—The treasury reported yesterday that the government ran \$1,478,652,000 in the red for July, the first month of fiscal 1950.

The first month's deficit, or excess of spending over income, was less than in the first month of the last fiscal year.

Fiscal 1949 showed a \$1,644,656,000 deficit for the first month. July is always a poor month for government income.

At the end of the year, last June 30, the total deficit for that year was \$1,811,440,000.

Treasury books showed the government spent \$3,434,111,000 during July while taking in \$1,946,458,000 in taxes and other receipts.

One consequence of spending in excess of income: the debt soared above \$253,000,000,000 early in July for the first time in several months and to leave it on July 29 at a total of \$253,902,387,000.

Air Force To Open Navigator's School At Houston, Texas

The Air Force will enlarge its Aviation Cadet Program this fall by opening an Aviation Cadet navigator school at Ellington Air Force Base, Houston, Tex. Captain Ralph W. Ferrese announced today.

The first class will begin November 1, and a new class will follow each month thereafter. Approximately 100 students will be enrolled in each class.

To be eligible for Aviation Cadet training, men must be between the ages of 20 and 26 1-2, must be U. S. citizens, and may be either married or single. They must have at least 2 years of college or the ability to pass an equivalent examination. The qualifications for navigator training are the same as for pilot training except for vision and hearing requirements, which are more stringent in the pilot training physical examination than in the physical exam for navigators.
