Mr. John Richard Overton, 44, died in Tayloe hospital in Washington Wednesday afternoon at 1:15 following two weeks of critical illness. Funeral services were conducted at the Missionary Baptist church in Factolus this afternoon at 3:30 by the Rev. J. E. Hoyle, Baptist minister of Winterville, and burial was in the Wilson family cemetery nearby. Members of the Pactolus Ruritan club served as active and honorary pallbearers.

Mr. Overton, son of the late James Redman and Mary Wilson Overton, was born, reared, and spent his entire life in Pitt county. He was married to Miss Annie Nobles of near Stokes in September, 1936. Turned On Gas, Takes Own Life And Children's

West Orange, N. J., March 2 — (AP)—Mrs. Arlene Kraeutler turned on all the gas jets, police said, and then lay down to die. She took her five children, ranging in age from eight months to 17 years, with her.

Police found all the victims of the tragedy in their nightclothes yesterday afternoon. They listed the death of the 36-year-old mother as suicide.

Only the husband, William Kraeutler, 40, survived. He had left for work early in the morning. Police said they found this note from Mrs. Kraeutler to her husband in a dresser drawer:

"Dearest Bill: "Forgive me, but I cannot stand to be evicted and also my illness and the debts we had in the last year are too much to bear. I don't know what the future has in store, so this is the best way out."

"Love, Arlene." Police said the owners of the building recently sold it to a member of the owners' family and had served an eviction notice on the Kraeutlers.

One of the children was still breathing when police forced their way into the two-family house. He died within an hour.

In one bed on the second floor of the duplex apartment Mrs. Kraeutler was found clutching her two youngest children, Gary, eight months, and Carol, four, all dead.

In the next bedroom were the bodies of Tracy, 17, and Lois, 12. At the foot of the stairs 15-year-old William was found unconscious and slumped against the front door. He apparently had tried to escape the gas, but soon died.

All-Time High For January Road Accidents

Raleigh, March 2—(AP)—North Carolina started off the new year by setting an all-time high for January highway accidents.

The Motor Vehicles Department reported today that 2,012 highway mishaps were reported the first month of the year. This is the highest total reported for a January since 1927, when statistics were first kept.

The figures represent a 42 per cent increase over the 1,419 accidents reported in January, 1949, but a slight drop from the 2,292 reported last December.

C., publicity chairman.

N. C. Farm Income Is \$712 Millions

Washington, March 2 — (AP)—North Carolina's farm income for last year was reported by the Department of Agriculture today as \$712,713,000, compared with \$791,963,000 for the year before. The state ranked 14th in the nation in this respect.

For South Carolina the 1949 figure was \$278,043,000. In 1948 it was \$349,452,000. Texas led the nation with \$2,150,794,000 last year.

Tobacco Associates To Meet On Tuesday

Raleigh, March 2—(AP)—Tobacco Associates, Inc., the flue-cured tobacco export promotion agency, will hold its third annual meeting Tuesday.

President J. B. Hutson of Washington will outline the current export tobacco situation. Around 375 representatives of supporting organizations are expected to attend.

Somebody Likes Trash Baskets

New York, March 2—(AP)—The great wire basket mystery has New York police running around in circles.

Somebody is stealing wire trash baskets from the streets. Hundreds, in fact—316 in mid-Manhattan in the past five weeks, or about 10 a day.

Who? How? Why? The police, red-faced and hot under the collar, say it's got them beat.

"No baskets have been recovered to date," admits Police Department Secretary Frank Doyle.

The city, in a burst of tidiness, put out 4,800 shiny new baskets last Jan. 23. They're big—34 inches high. They're heavy—45 pounds. They stand on crowded streets. The cops watch them as if they were filled with emeralds. Still they disappear.

Pres. Hoover Is First Televised

NEW YORK —(AP)— The first President to be televised, and via "network" at that, was Herbert Hoover. It happened while he was still secretary of commerce in 1927, two years before he became chief executive.

The demonstration used early apparatus developed by the Bell telephone laboratories and comprised the transmission of a head and shoulders picture of Hoover from Washington to New York, partly by wire line and partly by radio.

Democrats Plan Chicago Meeting

Chicago, March 2—(AP)—Democratic party leaders from across the country plan a three-day conference in Chicago in May, with President Truman a probable speaker at a big rally.

The political powwow, aimed at stirring up campaign enthusiasm, is hoped as a "Jefferson Jubilee," marking the 150th anniversary of the third President's election. The conference will be held May 13, 14 and 15. Mr. Truman has been invited to address a rally at Chicago Stadium the closing day. Cabinet members, Democratic

governors, congressmen and senators are expected to join in the sessions. Congressional election strategy and the party's financial matters will be discussed by the Democratic National Committee on May 13.

The Democrats have held regional meetings recently in the Midwest, the South and the Far West and one may be held in New England. Stuyvesant Peabody, Chicago coal operator, is head of the committee arranging the conference.

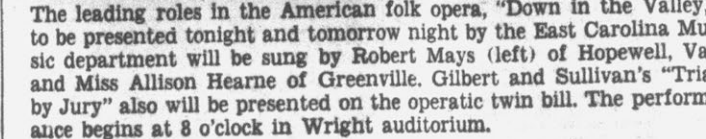
Curtain Goes Up Tonight For Operettas; Two Local Singers

Two young singers from Greenville will be among principals in the casts of a program of operettas to be offered at East Carolina Teachers College tonight and tomorrow evening. The curtain will go up this evening at 8:00 o'clock in the Wright auditorium when the department of music at the college presents "Trial by Jury" by Gilbert and Sullivan and "Down in the Valley" by Kurt Weill. The performance will be repeated Friday evening at the same time and place.

Allison Hearne of Greenville, soprano, will share honors with Robert Mays of Hopewell, Virginia, in the leading roles of the Weill folk-music opera. Rodney Roberts, of Greenville, baritone, is cast as the judge in the frolicsome court scene of the Gilbert and Sullivan number. "Down in the Valley," in which Miss Hearne will appear is something new in American music—an opera which is based on a native theme and which takes its musical character from the folk music of America. The melody which gives the opera its title is the familiar song of a prisoner who begs his sweetheart to "write me a letter, send it by mail, send it in care of Birmingham jail."

As the drama opens, Brack Weaver, played by Mr. Mays, is in jail for murdering an unwelcome suitor of Jenny Parsons—Miss Hearne. The story of the mountain lovers is told in a series of flashbacks. Scenery designed like picture frames and lighting effects are used to create the illusion of the passing of time.

In addition to "Down in the Valley," other folk songs which will be heard in the opera are the dance tunes "Hop Up Ladies" and "Sourwood Mountain," which introduce a series of folk dances, and "The

Sees Collapse Of Support System

Washington, March 2—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said yesterday the farm price support program might collapse unless the Commodity Credit Corporation is given adequate funds.

Appearing before the House Banking Committee in support of a bill to increase the CCC borrowing authority from its present limit of \$4,750,000,000 to \$6,750,000,000, Brannan said:

"The price support program can be destroyed just as swiftly and just as effectively through the lack of adequate funds for the CCC as

through the repeal of our basic price support legislation.

"Doubt as to the ability of the CCC to carry out its obligations could cause chaotic conditions and possible collapse of the farm price structure."

"The purchasing power of farm families in terms of 1947 dollars dropped about \$2,000,000,000 in 1948, another \$2,000,000,000 in 1949, and could drop still another \$2,000,000,000 in 1950 if farm prices do not strengthen," Brannan said.

ISRAEL SELLS ROSES

TEL AVIV, Israel—(AP)—Israel's hardy winter roses and other flowers are finding a foreign market. The ministry of agriculture has received orders for flowers from the United States and Great Britain. Initial consignments already shipped went by air.

Call For Review Atom War Plans

Washington, March 2—(AP)—A congressional committee has demanded that the United States review its plans for waging aerial atomic warfare, especially against big cities.

The House Armed Services Committee said the review must be made by the nation's top civilian leadership—not the military high command.

In a blistering 30,000-word report on its hearings last fall into the so-called "admiral's revolt" against unification policies, the committee:

1. Noted testimony by Gen. Omar Bradley that he and the other members of the joint chiefs of staff "in the absence of any guides from their civilian supervisors" have had to "assume" what this country's national objectives are.
 2. Declared that if this is so "then assuredly the Secretary of Defense should initiate action in the National Security Council to obtain a firm statement of principles upon which the joint chiefs of staff may rely."
- The National Security Council is composed of the President, Vice President, secretaries of State and Defense and the head of the National Security Resources Board.

Gambill Trial Is In Jury's Hands

Dobson, N. C., March 2—(AP)—The murder trial of John Worth Gambill 18, went to the jury today.

Gambill is accused of the December 9 pistol slaying of his friend, C. L. Brown, salesman for a Greensboro pie firm.

The defense rested its case yesterday after using 11 witnesses in an attempt to prove Gambill has "the mind of a child."

The defendant's mother collapsed in the courtroom yesterday while her husband was testifying.

Fraud Is Charged Seven Students

Charlotte, N. C., March 2—(AP)—Seven more ex-GI students of Southeastern People's College were charged yesterday with attempting to defraud the government.

Charges now have been filed against 15 students in the case, which is based on alleged fraudulent collection of government subsistence checks.

Charges also have been brought against Mrs. Marion Leggett, school president, and Mrs. Virginia Loven, school secretary.

More Savings In Hail Insurance

Raleigh, N. C., March 2—(AP)—Tar Heel tobacco growers will save \$157,000 annually under a new schedule of hail insurance rates.

The new rates, approved yesterday by the State Insurance department, affect 43 counties. Insurance commissioner Waldo Cheek said reductions were approved for 28 counties and insurance for five. The rates will vary from 50 cents to \$1 per hundred of insurance.

Beer, Wine Sale Legal On Sunday

Wilmington, N. C., March 2—(AP)—Starting March 5 it'll be legal to buy beer and wine in Wilmington on Sundays.

The City council legalized the sale in an ordinance passed yesterday. Beer and wine can be sold between noon and 11 p. m. in cafes, restaurants and hotels with A or B health ratings, and to members of private lodges and recreational clubs.

Not Affected By Accreditation

Durham, N. C., March 1—(AP)—Seven Negro students are expected to push their suit seeking admission to the University of North Carolina law school despite the announcement yesterday that the North Carolina college law school has been accredited by the American Bar Association.

The students from the Negro school here are seeking "full equality" in their suits.

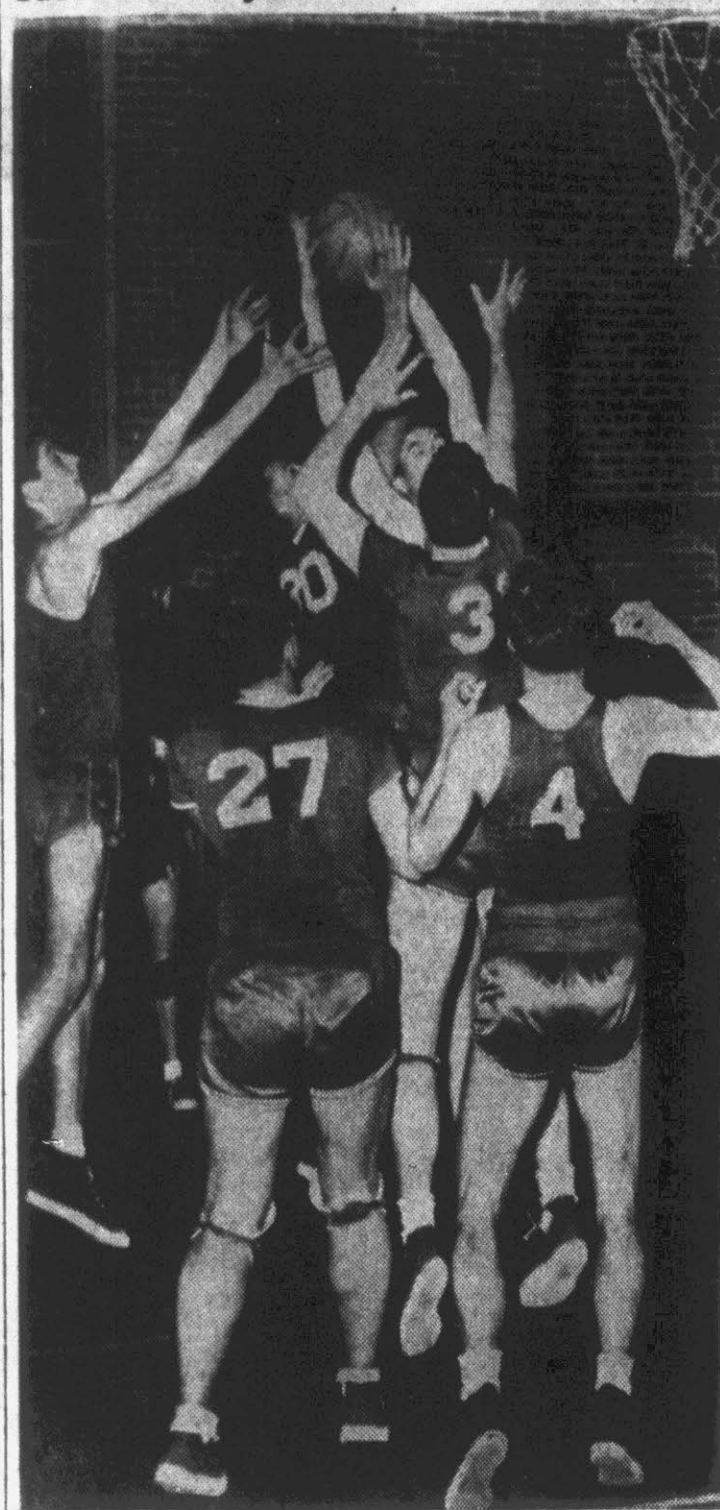

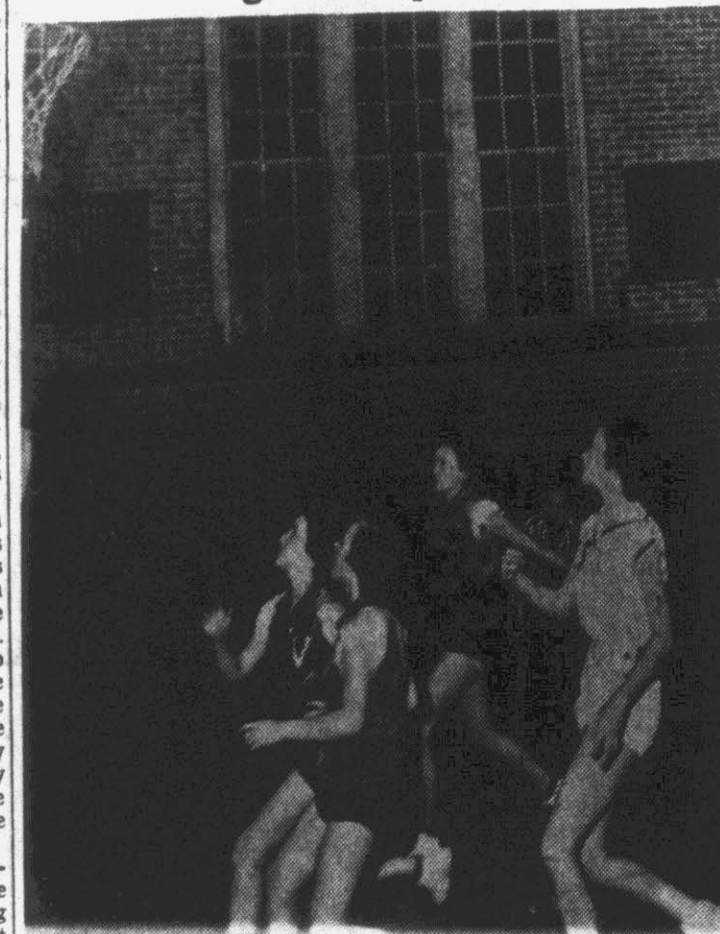

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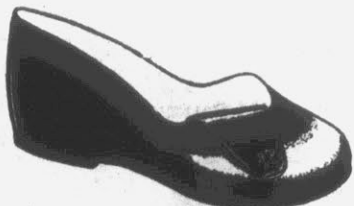

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Bureau In 'Long Range' Forecast

Washington, March 2—(AP)—The Weather Bureau, which called the long range turn two weeks ago, says its experimental outlook for March promises generally below normal temperatures east of the Mississippi. From the midatlantic states south to Florida it will be "as cold as or even slightly colder than" it was in February, the last full month of winter. But this February has been unusually warm in most of the east. To the north, especially in New England, the departures from normal on the cold side are expected to be even greater than in the south. "It's liable to stay cold in New England well past the official opening of spring," Jerome Namias, chief of the Weather Bureau's extended forecast section, told a reporter. In the west, temperatures probably will be higher than normal. Namias said, and California is likely to have more than its share of rain. Generally speaking, this winter east of the Mississippi has been one

of the warmest in the bureau's history. On January 6, the thermometer in Washington reached 79 degrees, an all time January high.

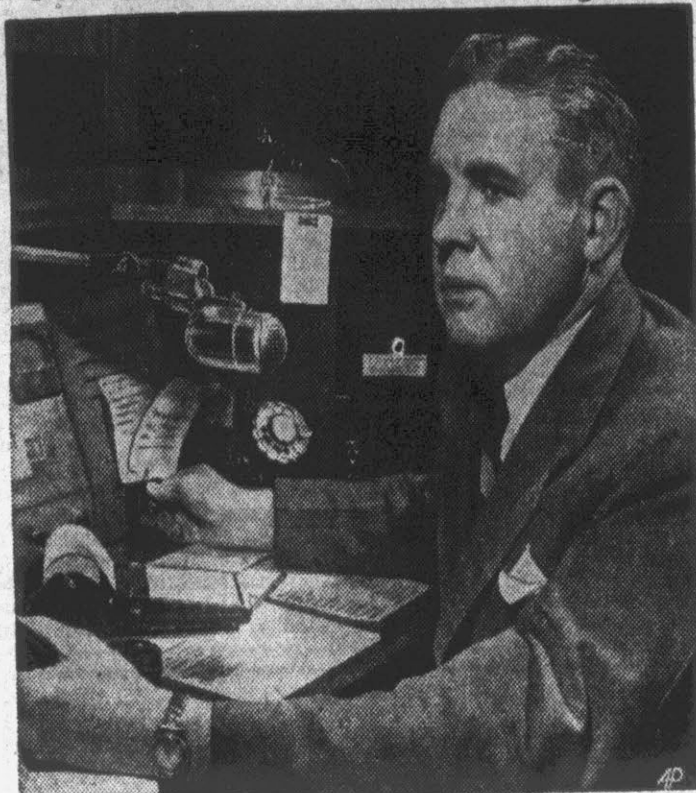
Natural Bridge Familiar Sight

Treasury Has Paid Over Half Of NSLI Dividends

Washington, March 2—(AP)—Original goal of 200,000 checks a day. Thirty-two working days have passed since the first checks were mailed January 16.

The total paid out so far is more than half the \$2,525,000,000 the Budget Bureau had estimated would be paid up to June 30, the end of this fiscal year.

Arrangements are being made to start soon the task of relaying refunds due the survivors of dead veterans. Survivor claims alone number several hundred thousand, helping push the total of persons expected eventually to get refunds to around 16,000,000.

Plans are to make no direct payments into estates of deceased veterans. Instead, it is proposed that the Veterans Administration determine which survivors are entitled to share in refunds and what their shares will be.

In cases where a veteran left a wife and five children, as some did, that will mean individual checks for as many as six people.

The job of determining survivors' eligibility for refunds is expected to be handled by field offices of the VA. Payments of this nature probably will be made through regional disbursing offices.

Delay Rate Hike On Commodities

Washington, March 2—(AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission has held up a proposed further increase in Railway Express rates on a number of selected commodities, including daily newspapers.

The express agency had proposed to make the increases effective today by changing various classifications of commodities and by revising the public tariffs on file with the commission. The ICC, however, directed that the proposed changes be held up pending an investigation as to whether they are reasonable.

The rate increases would have ranged from approximately 10 per cent on daily newspapers, which had been given a previous 10 per cent increase on Jan. 20, to a 30 per cent jump on bakery products. Intermediate percentage increases were also proposed on furniture, hats, millinery, artificial flowers, nursery stock and lamp shades.

The newspaper increase was vigorously opposed by the American Newspaper Publishers Association, and others.

The proposed increases ordered suspended would have raised the newspaper shipment rate from \$1.32 to \$1.44 per one hundred pounds on short hauls; from \$2.42 to \$2.64 per hundred on medium distances; and from \$3.52 to \$3.84 per one hundred on long hauls.

The current case involved commodity rates only.

Defies Pressure To Reinstate A Patrolman

Raleigh, March 2—(AP)—Despite "considerable pressure" from influential citizens, says Highway Patrol Commander Tony Tolar, he is not going to reinstate a veteran patrolman discharged for racing in a patrol car.

The patrolman is Charles D. Lindsay, a veteran of 11 years of patrol duty and an officer at Sylva in Jackson County for the past five years.

Lindsay and Patrolman W. T. Jenkins, with the patrol two years, admitted they raced in their patrol cars along a mountain highway near Waynesville, Tolar said. Lindsay's 1928 Ford was demolished when it overturned on a curve and he was hospitalized for several days. Both men were discharged from the patrol last week.

Now comes Dr. Clifford Zierer, University of California geographer. He has found an 1888 newspaper report that a similar condition was found there then. It continued for at least six days in 1888. There were no industries to blame for it then so it was blamed variously on a Guadalupe Island volcano and forest fires in Washington and Oregon.

Alumni Group In Capital Gather

Washington, March 2—The necessity for taking an active part in political affairs was stressed last night in a speech given before the Washington chapter of the East Carolina Teachers College alumni.

Frank Saunders of Tarboro, a member of the staff of House Appropriations committee, told some 35 alumnae at the Hotel Fairfax in Washington that unless everybody worked actively in political campaigns there was danger that minority groups will get the upper hand. He said only 43 percent of the registered voters came to the polls in the 1948 general election.

The Tarboro man, formerly secretary to Representative John H. Kerr, recalled his experience in Italy immediately following the war. He said the people there, who had long been denied the right to vote, turned out in great numbers when the polls were finally opened. About 95 percent of the eligible persons voted, he said.

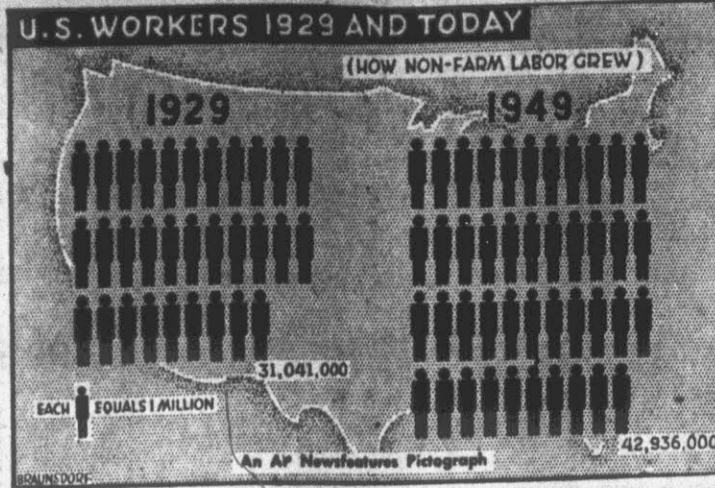
