Defeated Co-Op Housing Bill Now A Political Issue

Washington, March 23—(AP)—Thrown out of Congress in a defeat for President Truman, the \$2,000,000,000 co-operative housing program bounced back today as a warm political issue.

Ignoring a personal plea from the President, the House rejected the co-op idea for middle income housing last night 218 to 155. It then went on to approve 361 to 10 a \$4,000,000,000-plus expansion of the existing program.

The defeated co-op section proposed the creation of a \$2,000,000,000 government corporation. It would have borrowed its money from the public, except for \$100,000,000 contributed by the government.

Claims Truman Action Is Endangering Security

McCarthy Assails 'Refusal' To Release Loyalty Files To Senate Probers; President Said Considering Limited Access

Washington, March 23—(AP)—Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) today accused President Truman of endangering the nation's security by what he called the President's "arrogant refusal" to release government loyalty files to senate investigators.

Expect Delay On AEC Appointee

Naming Of Chairman May Await Return To Washington

Key West, Fla., March 23—(AP)—Highly-placed White House advisors said today that President Truman may delay designation of a new chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission until after his return to Washington in April.

Mr. Truman's announcement yesterday of the appointment of Thomas E. Murray, New York, engineer, banker and inventor, to succeed former Chairman David E. Lilienthal on the commission, lessened the pressure for immediate action on a head of that vitally important post-war agency.

High White House sources have said the President is considering approval of limited access to the loyalty records of persons whom McCarthy has accused.

A key Democratic senator termed McCarthy's criticism of Mr. Truman "such a lowly attack that I can't think of a fitting reply." He withheld use of his name, but added:

"Let the American people be the judge of that kind of criticism of the President of the United States."

Senator Tydings (D-Md) Chairman of the inquiry committee, said he had "absolutely no comment" on McCarthy's remarks.

The Wisconsin Republican made his blunt attack on Mr. Truman in a telegram to the vacationing President at Key West, Fla.

"I feel," McCarthy told Mr. Truman, "that your delay of this investigation by your arrogant refusal to release all necessary files is inexcusable and is endangering the security of this nation."

McCarthy noted that the senate, in coming to investigate his charges of Reds in the state department, gave the inquiry committee power to subpoena the loyalty files of persons against whom he brought charges.

Rioting Flares In Italian City

San Saverio, Italy, March 23—(AP)—Rioting flared up in this south-eastern Italian city today and at least 18 persons—15 police and three civilians—were injured before police restored order. One report said hand grenades were tossed into police ranks.

The new violence was an aftermath to the nationwide general strike called yesterday by the Communist-led Italian confederation of labor (CGIL). One death and scores of injuries were chalked up in demonstrations accompanying the strike.

War Not Anticipated

Construction Going On In Moscow, London, And America's Great Cities Indicate The Builders Are Not Afraid Of War In Offing; Preparedness Is A Deterrent

A colleague having an analytical turn of mind laid a picture on my desk with the quizzical remark: "Does that look as though Russia is afraid there's going to be war?"

The photo showed a model of Moscow's projected industrial building 26 stories high. This is one of a dozen "skyscrapers" being built in the Soviet capital to the fascination of the Muscovites, who aren't used to such tall buildings.

No, that certainly doesn't indicate Moscow fears atomic bombardment. The same can be said of America, for from my office window in the Rockefeller center of New York City one can see numerous buildings miraculously shooting up towards the sky like Jack's beanstalk. And much construction is proceeding in the sprawling city of London, which presents the greatest metropolitan bombing target on the globe.

No, I don't believe Moscow or London or Washington, or any other major capital, actually believes that war is imminent. They all know that it is possible, but they think it isn't probable in the near future.

adena, Calif., gave us a very good reason in an interview commemorating his 82nd birthday yesterday. He said he isn't at all certain that man can make a hydrogen bomb, but having this dealt with this fear-some weapon he added that "we and our possible adversary now possess the instruments to destroy each other."

In short, every capital in the world knows that the first one to toss an atomic bomb in anger is going to get hell bombed out of itself in return. That's plain horse sense.

Does this mean peace? Not at all. We still have the cold war with us. Trygve Lie, secretary-general of the United Nations, is advocating a 20-year peace program to relax international tensions and "bring the cold war to an end."

All right-minded folk will wish Mr. Lie good luck in his effort, and will lend their support. But there are a lot of us who can't envision an end to the cold war now.

In any event, as we work for peace let's do so in the spirit of our colleague.

Utilities To Get Expansion Funds

REA Official Says \$910,000 Request Has Been Cleared

Official word from Washington, D.C. has informed the Greenville Utilities Commission that its request for \$910,000 to finance further rural electrification in Pitt was granted within the next 30 days.

Kenneth Hardy, regional head of the Application and Loan Division of the Rural Electrification Administration, informed the commission this week that its request had been cleared through Washington.

In a telephone conversation to Larry Brown, manager of the commission, Hardy said all the information needed for the requisition was complete in his office and that projected contracts were being prepared now.

Brown said this morning he expected final notification within the month, something "definite for the commission to act upon" in the April meeting.

The request for the near-million-dollar loan was sent to the nation's capital more than three months ago. Final approval for it entailed a number of telephone calls to Brown from Washington concerning further detailed information.

Brown said more than a month ago the requisition would not be unduly late in coming.

Of the requested loan, only a third of the money will be used after final notification of approval—about \$300,000—Brown said. The remainder will be used at a later date when needed.

Military Bases Outside U. S. Given Attention

Washington, March 23—(AP)—The U.S. military forces are embarking upon a huge building program at bases outside the continental United States, especially in Alaska.

This can be seen from the fact that they propose to spend on these bases about \$239,400,000 of the \$665,000,000 they are asking Congress to authorize for military public works.

An analysis of the requests shows that the Army, Navy and Air Force are joining in the major objective. The idea is to safeguard the United States from a sudden "sneak punch," possibly with atomic weapons.

The announced bases that will be strengthened range from Alaska to Okinawa, Hawaii, Kwajalein and Johnston Island in the Pacific to Bermuda in the Atlantic, up to Labrador, over to the Azores, Libya and Saudi Arabia.

B-50 Down; Fate Not Yet Known

Tucson, Ariz., March 23—(AP)—A B-50 bomber with 14 aboard was reported down today near Gila Bend, Ariz., about 125 miles west of here, Davis-Monthan Air Force base announced.

Fate of the personnel aboard was not immediately known. The public information officer of the base said the only report received was that the big plane was "down in the Gila Bend area."

Chides Smith's Entry In Fight

Winston-Salem, March 23—(AP)—Mayor Marshall C. Kurfess, candidate for the U. S. Senate, chided Senatorial Candidate Willis Smith indirectly today for joining a fight against an election board purge in Western North Carolina.

Without mentioning any names, Mayor Kurfess declared the election board purge was the business of local and state election officials and party officials—not the candidates.

Price Supports Compromise Has Heavy Criticism

Northern Senators Say Modified Emergency Farm Bill Favors South

Washington, March 23—(AP)—A new senate-house price supports compromise ran into heavy criticism today from northern senators who said it favors the south.

"I don't know why any northerner would vote for it," said senator young (R-ND).

As approved by a conference committee yesterday, the emergency farm measure would:

1. Tighten price supports for potatoes this year and drop them entirely after this year unless rigid controls operated.

2. Allow price supports on 1,200,000 acres of cotton over a previous allotment of 21,000,000 acres.

3. Allow peanut growers 100,000 more acres above a previous allotment of 2,100,000 acres and also permit excess peanuts to be grown for oil or other uses, without penalties, under certain conditions.

The measure was the second compromise worked out by the conferees after two weeks of work. The first bill was sent back when senator Anderson (D-NM) observed that one of its provisions was included in neither the original house nor senate measures.

The disputed section—which would have allowed wheat farmers who let winter crops through damage by "greenbugs" to replace two acres of wheat by one of corn. The House also scheduled action on a measure increasing the capitalization of the commodity credit corporation by \$2,000,000,000 to meet the needs of next year's price support program. That would boost the capitalization of this agricultural payment agent to a total of \$5,750,000,000.

Discussing the peanuts-cotton-potato legislation, Cooley told a reporter:

"I don't anticipate much trouble getting it through the house. We put it through by about a 2 to 1 margin before and it has been modified to meet criticism."

French Strikes Reaching Africa

Paris, March 23—(AP)—French Communist strikes against U. S. arms aid to Atlantic pact nations spread today to France's North African possessions.

A 48-hour walkout by port workers was announced at Tunis as a demonstration against the expected arrival there of the French carrier Dixmude, bringing a number of American military planes given to France last week under the Atlantic pact program.

Filmland's Oscar Makes Bow On Schedule Tonight

Hollywood, March 23—(AP)—Oscar, still a little pale from last year's near demise, will make his 22nd appearance on schedule tonight.

Searchlights, stars, red carpets and all the conventional trappings of the annual motion picture academy awards have been assembled, yet the level of enthusiasm along "cannery row" is definitely substandard.

For a time, while major studios withheld monetary support, it appeared that the yearly bestowal of honors might pass into history. But the producers finally came through with a financial shot in the arm for Oscar.

Up for best picture of 1949 are "All The King's Men" (Columbia), "Battleground" (MGM), "The Heiress" (Paramount), "A Letter to Three Wives" (20th Century-Fox)

and "Twelve O'Clock High" (20th-Fox). Best actress nominees are: Jeanne Crain ("Pinky"), Olivia deHavilland ("The Heiress"), Susan Hayward ("My Foolish Heart"), Deborah Kerr ("Edward, My Son") and Loretta Young ("Come to the Stable").

Nominated for best actor are Broderick Crawford ("All The King's Men"), Kirk Douglas ("Champion"), Gregory Peck ("Twelve O'Clock High"), Richard Todd ("The Hasty Heart") and John Wayne ("The Sands of Iwo Jima").

Awards presented tonight will be a result of balloting among some 2,000 Academy members. Nominations were made by vote among 10,950 workers in the industry. More than 25 professional categories and a long list of technical achievements are represented in the tally.

Propoganda War Idea Gains Favor

Benton Plan Would Start World-Wide Information Drive

Washington, March 23—(AP)—The State Department looked with favor today on a proposal which would launch the United States on a gigantic war of ideas aimed against the propaganda of Communist Russia. The plan was put forward yesterday by Senator Benton (D-Conn) and twelve other senators as a means to win the minds and loyalties of men to the cause of freedom.

The Benton plan would marshal every means of information in a coordinated world-wide drive to give the lie to Russian attacks on the United States and other non-Communist countries.

Ed Barrett, assistant secretary of state for public affairs, said: "This broad approach is in complete accord with my own feelings and the State Department's estimate of the importance of the work to be done in this field."

Benton, who once served in the position now held by Barrett, said he felt the program would be part of the answer to Secretary of State Acheson's call for "total diplomacy" in the cold war against Russia.

It was given to the senate in the form of a resolution which, if approved, could be the basis for the greatest psychological campaign ever turned against communism.

Students Leave For Speech Tournament

Concerned Over Rift With Solons

Washington, March 23—(AP)—A top-ranking Democratic senator voiced concern today over relations between the State Department and congressional leaders.

He said one reason that Democrats have not rallied to defend Secretary of State Acheson against Republican attacks is that Acheson has remained aloof from the lawmakers.

"He has asked for neither advice nor counsel," he said. The senator asked that his name not be used.

Republican senators McCarthy of Wisconsin and Wherry of Nebraska both have declared recently that Acheson should quit his post. President Truman promptly replied that the Secretary will stay on the job.

The only senator to date who has defended is freshman Senator Benton (D-Conn) who once served as assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs.

Benton told the Senate the Department never has been run better than it is under Acheson. He said that criticism is an "occupational hazard" which was suffered by both James F. Byrnes and General George C. Marshall when they were in the post of Secretary of State.

"Now it is Dean Acheson," Benton said, "in spite of the great reforms he has achieved in the Department and the loyal and able key subordinates he is developing."

Rosser Regrets Tolar Charges

Raleigh, N. C., March 23—(AP)—Motor Vehicle Commissioner L. C. Rosser said today he regretted the "misunderstanding" that resulted in the indictment yesterday of Col Tolar, highway patrol commander.

Tolar was indicted by the Beaufort county Grand Jury on charges of reckless driving and improper use of a siren at a funeral. The charges grew out of an incident that occurred Feb. 28 at a funeral at Chowhinity.

Aldermen To Meet

The Greenville Board of Aldermen will meet in the city hall tonight at 7:30.

Called by Mayor W. S. Stafford, the group will discuss and consider seven proposals, among them alterations in the plans for two residential subdivisions. Registrars and poll-holders will also be appointed for the May 1 election.

Elections Board Meets Today To Receive Ruling

Called Into Session To Hear Disputed Appointments Illegally Made

Raleigh, N. C., March 23—(AP)—The state board of elections was called into session today to hear a ruling that it acted illegally last Saturday on county board appointments.

Board secretary Raymond Maxwell said chairman Charles M. Britt of Asheville directed the group to meet at 5 p. m. Governor Scott's office said the meeting was called to let Britt present a ruling by Attorney General Harry McMillan.

In his ruling, released late yesterday, McMillan said the elections board exceeded its authority in appointing elections board in eight western counties.

In making the appointments, the board disregarded recommendations of the state chairmen of the Democratic and Republican appointees.

McMillan wrote Britt that a state law which says county board appointments must come from the party chairmen's recommendations is mandatory.

He added: "The state board of elections, in my opinion, did not have the right to disregard the recommendations x x x and appoint persons who were not recommended as members of the county board of elections."

The counties affected are Buncombe, Avery, Madison, Haywood, Cherokee, Clay, Graham and Swain.

Seven of the counties are preparing to contest the ruling in court.

Democratic executive committee members in Buncombe, Madison, Haywood, and Graham were scheduled to meet today and the Cherokee and Swain committees are expected to meet. The Clay county committee met Tuesday and condemned the board's move.

In answer to another question from Britt, McMillan said he believed the board could convene and rescind its action.

Appointment Is Big Surprise To Office-Holder

Washington, March 23—(AP)—President Truman, vacationing in Key West, casually announced yesterday that Dillon S. Myer had been appointed Indian commissioner.

The announcement was greeted with almost universal surprise at the Interior Department in Washington.

Indian Commissioner John R. Nichols, on the job with not even a whisper that he might leave, commented in apparent bewilderment: "This is a little sudden, like getting married."

More than an hour after the Key West announcement, Secretary of the Interior Chapman said in a statement that Nichols had been appointed special assistant on his staff.

The job will pay the same salary Nichols now gets, \$10,300 a year.

Supreme Court Test

Decision On Whether The President's Loyalty Program Constitutional In The Manner It Is Being Carried Out, To Be Made; The Case Of Dorothy Bailey

Washington, March 23—(AP)—Now it's up to the Supreme Court to decide: Is the President's loyalty program constitutional in the way it's being carried out?

The program's purpose is to fire government employees found to be disloyal or whose loyalty is considered questionable. Take the case of Miss Dorothy Bailey.

She worked in the U.S. Employment Service. Her work was satisfactory. And her job did not involve national security. It was a so-called "non-sensitive" job.

As part of the loyalty program, the FBI investigated her and turned its information over to the loyalty board set up to carry out the program.

The board notified Miss Bailey it had been informed she at one time was a Communist party member. She denied this and protested she was entirely loyal to the United States.

She was allowed to appear at a hearing before the board, to bring her lawyers, and to produce witnesses who testified for her.

But—she was not allowed to know where the board got its information.

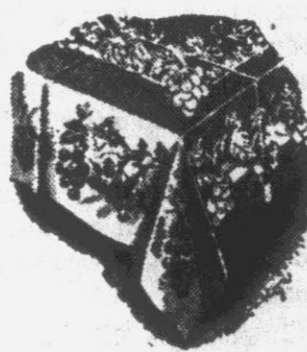

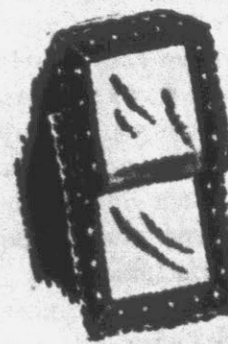

A PREACHER SPEAKS ON HEALTH

Physicians bitterly resent — and rightfully so — medical advice gratuitously handed out by a layman. But here are a few suggestions by a minister on health fundamentals with which probably every physician will agree.

Many diseases — probably most diseases — are caused by infection, injury, or something in no way related to mind or spirit. But many people are sick because of the attitude of mind they maintain. An even greater number fall ill because of a disturbed spiritual life. Stomach ulcers, coronary occlusions, dyspepsia very often have a moral and spiritual origin.

Therefore avoid anxiety, anger, malice, jealousy, and evil thoughts. Practice cheerfulness, good will, tolerance, and patience — especially patience with yourself. Remember that the body was not made to absorb poisons such as alcohol, and although some people can build up considerable tolerance of this sort, it is undoubtedly done at the expense of other vital functions.

Finally remember two things: first, that it is better to call the doctor in time than to wait until it is a toss-up as to whether you will call the doctor or the family will call the undertaker. Second, bear in mind that we are primarily spiritual beings, that the body is transitory and temporary, and that the spirit is eternal.

COOLNESS TOWARD VOLUNTEER WORKERS

During the past two weeks approximately 200 volunteer workers have been ringing door bells and contacting individuals throughout the county asking for donations to the Red Cross.

These people represent a portion of the large number of civic minded citizens who each year devote some of their spare time to soliciting funds for worthy organizations. These people give of their time to help others who are unable to help themselves, and they deserve the respect and cooperation of all the people in every community.

Ironically enough, however, the recent solicitations by the people helping with the Red Cross campaign, have met with coolness from some people contacted, and downright rudeness from others.

Whether a person wishes to give to any sort of organization is strictly his own business; but the least a person can do is to show common decency to the others who are striving to aid their less fortunate fellow men.

The people who knock on the doors or enter the offices in behalf of the Red Cross drive, or any other group, are not asking money for themselves, but for the worthy purpose for which the organization stands.

It seems to the Reflector even if individuals have no inclination to contribute to a specific drive, they should have enough common courtesy not to be rude to the solicitor who requests a gift for a good cause.

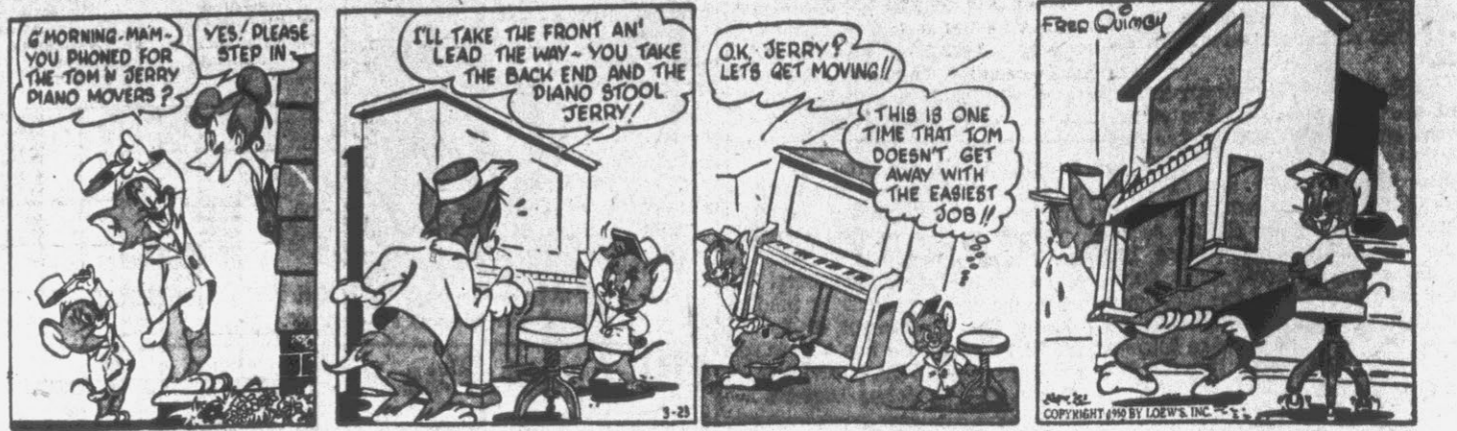
You can't trap a woman in this way. She refuses to commit herself except to get what she knows very well what she wants. Language isn't her means of expressing herself so much as a medium

American history is a story of overcoming obstacles and the solving of problems that were the downfall of other peoples. No apologists or deprecatory citizens can taint the historical miracle of expansion and growth, constant progress and success, freedom and plenty, justice and hope. While perfection is not at hand, it has been constantly sought; and in the seeking, our homeland has become the most envied of all by the oppressed and impoverished.

Around Capitol Square

AAA—Gov. Scott was particularly unwise in his choice of a wise-crack when he told reporters that the squawks about the state board of elections ignoring the law from appointing county boards "came from Triple A politicians." When asked to explain he said he meant the folks who wanted to control elections like they control cotton and tobacco acreage. The governor has long been an outstanding champion of acreage control and the national farm program, and has been heard to say in public speeches that the process is democratic because the farmers vote it upon themselves and then elect at county level the Triple A committees to enforce the program. The law says the county Democratic and Republican organizations shall recommend members for the board of election and the state board must appoint from those recommended. The action which the governor was defending was exact opposite of the AAA plan of local responsibility, because it denied local rights assured by law.

PLANNED—Governor Scott has professed ignorance of just what was done and why at the state board meeting, but there is evi-

Somebody Told Me . . .

"Got a column for you," Travis Flanagan told me at our bridge club meeting last night. He then handed over The Saturday Evening Post and called to my attention an interesting article about the Senate Restaurant, located in the Capitol building at Washington.

The restaurant serves senators, their wives and favored constituents, girls that work in the offices, and one room is open to the public. Bean soup is available for 15 cents a cup, 20 cents a bowl, and a complete plate special, including coffee or tea, is 85 cents. Serving at these rates will put the restaurant in the hole \$42,500 this fiscal year. The American taxpayer, of course, pays the bill.

ence it was planned well in advance. Judge Jeff Johnson, manager for Senator Graham, said he heard at the Jackson-Jefferson dinner that something of this nature was being considered and he then expressed the hope it would be done legally. The Jackson - Jefferson dinner was held on January 26, the national affair in Washington on February 16. There was ample time between the latest of those dates and filing of recommendations by state party chairmen with the state board of elections on March 2 to make adjustments and changes if persons were included who were obviously disqualified. That kind of appropriate routine handling, however, would not have permitted the state elections board chairman to show his power and put his own personal choices on the county boards. Governor Scott told his press conference on two occasions he had discussed generalities with Chairman Charles Britt, but had not discussed names of counties or persons. That leaves Britt holding EVIDENCE — The governor has said a lot about affidavits, canceled checks, letters and other incriminating documentary evidence in his own, in Britt's and in SBI files. He said these documents provided conclusive proof of disqualification for some election officials, but he declined to say which persons or in which counties. When reporters pressed him for a look at the files he said the material is not now in his possession. Fact is, many election officials, school teachers, solicitors and judges have been indicted en masse and in blank by Governor Scott, without specification as to where, when or what specific crimes were committed or by whom.

DEEPROOTED—Judges and solicitors resented the attack upon their integrity, and many school teachers protested they ought not to be tarred in general because perhaps a few of their fellows were indiscreet. There wasn't much more over those charges. Election machinery is a different matter. That gets to grass roots and to the heart of the rights of all citizens. Opinion is general that too much or not enough has been said. Either retraction and apology is in order, or more specific charges are required and the accused persons entitled to their day in court.

REPRESENTATIVE—Too many North Carolinians fail to exercise the privilege and duty of voting, but not one Tar Heel is willing to stand by and see his right of re-election to be taken away by dictatorial action of just a few men. That is why there has been so much commotion about attempts to abuse election law machinery than about the other blanket and unsupported indictments.

FAR-REACHING — Immediate effect will be felt in the current contest for the United States senator short term. It is obvious that developments of the past week have operated to detriment of Senator Graham. There are other far-reaching effects. County boards of elections name precinct registrars and pollholders, who must serve not only for the senatorial race but also for congressmen, state legislators, sheriffs, clerks of court, county commissioners and other elective officers.

The senators eat bean soup and like it—to keep their eating simple like the voters. In fact, bean soup is the only dish the Senate Restaurant is famous for. The senators will never forget how North Carolina's Robert Reynolds defeated the incumbent Sen. Cameron Morrison in 1932. At the crossroads of N.C., with a bottle of birdshot and a Willard Hotel menu, Reynolds laughed Morrison out of his seat in the Senate. Reynolds read the menu, mostly in French, the prices, mostly high figures, and then told his audience that this was the kind of stuff Morrison was eating, always with the right fork, in Washington.

"Caviar," Reynolds would say, waving his bottle of birdshot. "Caviar, my friends! You know what it is? It's fish eggs, mind you, fish eggs! Plain hen's eggs ain't good enough for him when he's up there in Washington."

The noon meal has been lightened at the restaurant, to reduce the number of senators falling asleep in the chamber during the afternoon session. The Post says, "Actually, there hasn't been a senator capable of sleeping peacefully through the sometimes noisy debates since the late Lee S. Overman of North Carolina, a beloved Southern gentleman of the old school. It was routine for Overman's colleagues to nudge him into wakefulness to answer roll calls and to vote. On one occasion, when a North Carolina delegation was invited to the members' gallery to see the old man in action, he was sprawled in his seat, his mouth open, snoring gently. So a page boy was dispatched to arouse him. The page shook his shoulder and whispered in his ear. Overman rose, bowed to his friends in the gallery and then sank back in his seat and was sound asleep again almost before the smile had gone."

Graham Brings Campaign Into Northeast After Smith Attack

Raleigh, N.C., March 23—(AP)—Senator Frank Graham took his campaign for the Democratic senatorial nomination into northeastern North Carolina today in the wake of a sharp attack from an opponent, Willis Smith.

Graham is scheduled to speak at 7:30 tonight in the Sunbury school in Gates County at a meeting sponsored by the County Farm Bureau.

Without mentioning Graham by name, Smith said last night that "one of my opponents favored the FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Commission) in a report of the President's Committee on Civil Rights."

Senator Graham, who was a member of the committee, has said since being appointed to the Senate that he opposes any form of compulsory FEPC.

Smith, a Raleigh attorney, made his attack in a speech in the Pasquotank County Courthouse at Elizabeth City, his home territory. It was billed as the formal opening of his Senate campaign.

"I can say to you tonight that I do not now nor have I ever belonged to any subversive organizations," Smith declared, "and that as United States senator from North Carolina I shall never allow myself to be

duped into the use of my name for propaganda or other purposes by those types of organizations.

"The unwary can do just as much harm as the unscrupulous in the days that are at hand."

Smith did not mention Graham's name in this connection either, but he apparently referred to the fact that Graham has been criticized for allowing his name to be used by some left-wing groups.

Smith's statements drew this comment from Jeff D. Johnson, Jr., Graham's campaign manager:

"Mr. Smith is doing the talking. He did not mention the name of the candidate he was referring to, and we do not know whom he was talking about."

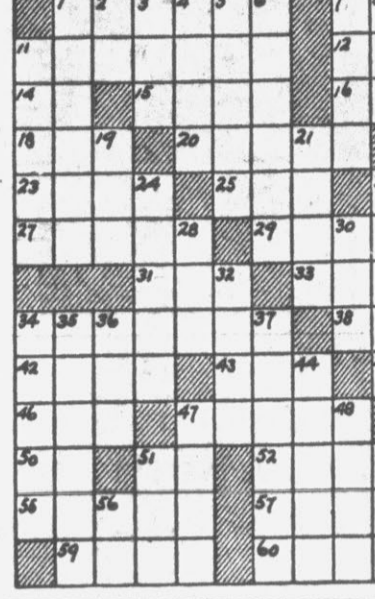
Smith told his audience it would "look in vain for the minority report (of the civil rights committee) which has been talked about so freely" and said it "seems to be only a figment of the imagination of a far-seeing friend who realized the committee had gone too far."

Graham has said that he signed a minority report to the committee report dealing with segregation, and this has been confirmed by Washington dispatches.

If passed by Congress, Smith said, an FEPC law would cause such strife and discord "that the good to be achieved, if any were possible, would be far outweighed by the evil accomplishments." He added that such problems should be handled by states individually.

Newsman Assert Stories Slanted

Los Angeles, March 23—(AP)—Three radio newsmen have told a Federal Communications Commission hearing that while working at station KMPC they were instructed to play up news critical of the Roosevelt family and Jews.

They are Commentator Cleve Roberts and Newscasters Robert L. Horn and William W. Kenneally, all formerly employed at the station. The three are the government's first witnesses in the hearing on charges that G. A. Richards, owner of KMPC here, WGAR, Cleveland, and WJR, Detroit, ordered news slanted.

Horn, now a freelance announcer at stations WIP and WPEN, Philadelphia, said yesterday that after starting work at KMPC in April, 1946, he was told never to mention in a favorable light the CIO, Negroes, Jews, the Roosevelt family or the New Deal.

He said the instructions regarding Negroes were given him by Charles Teas, at that time on the station news staff, and the rest came from Richards.

Asked if he were instructed to read editorials in his newscast, Horn replied: "Yes, in many instances I read Los Angeles Examiner editorials on a program sponsored by the Los Angeles Times." He said part of editorials, without being labeled as such, were read on newscasts.

Horn said he often read news items from wire services to Richards. "If Mr. Richards found fault with any paragraph," the witness added, "he would ask me to delete it to show only one side of the news. I would read the edited version on the air."

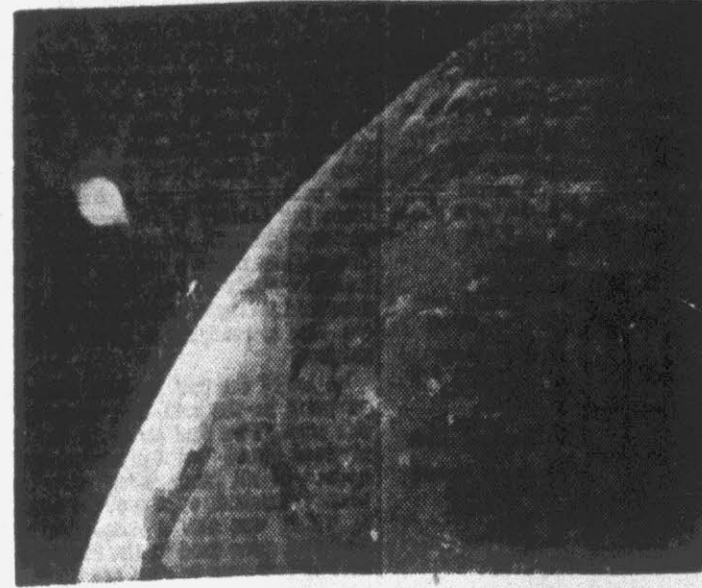

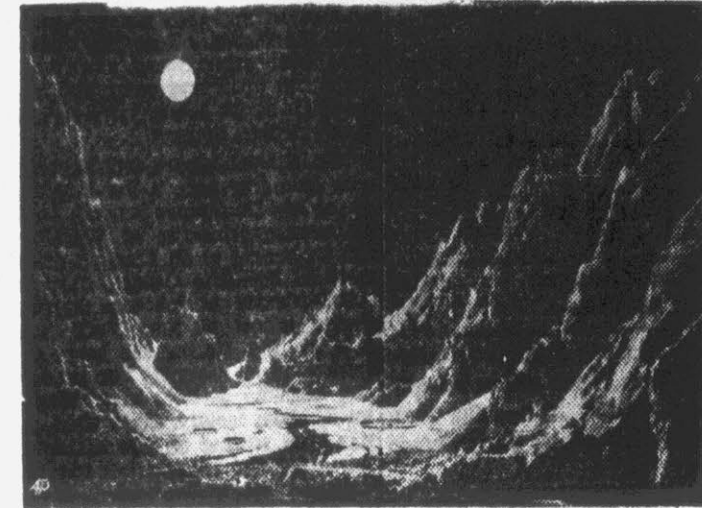

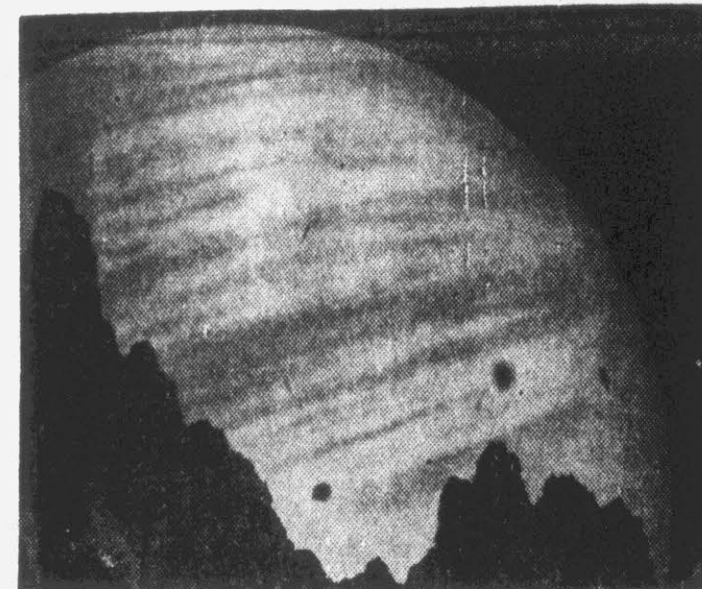

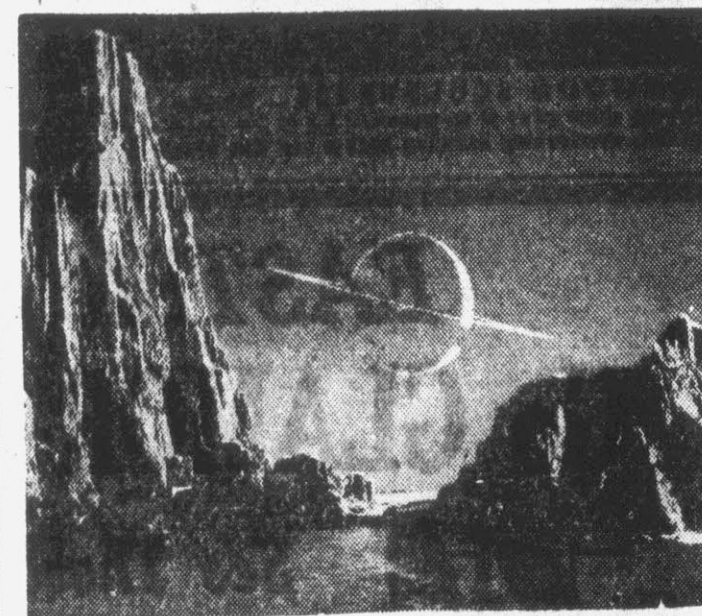
EARTH—viewed from a rocket 2,000 miles away.

MARS—as seen from Deimos, its further moon.



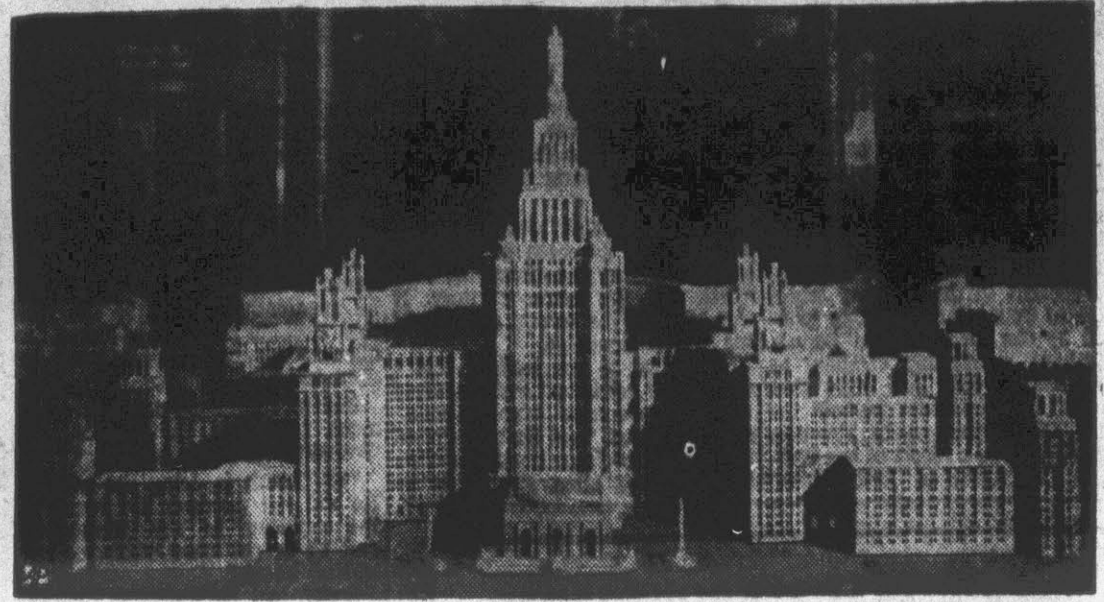

Another new structure will house the capital's newest and largest hotel. It will be near the Kiev Railway Station on the Moscow River. Others will be apartment and office buildings. One office structure

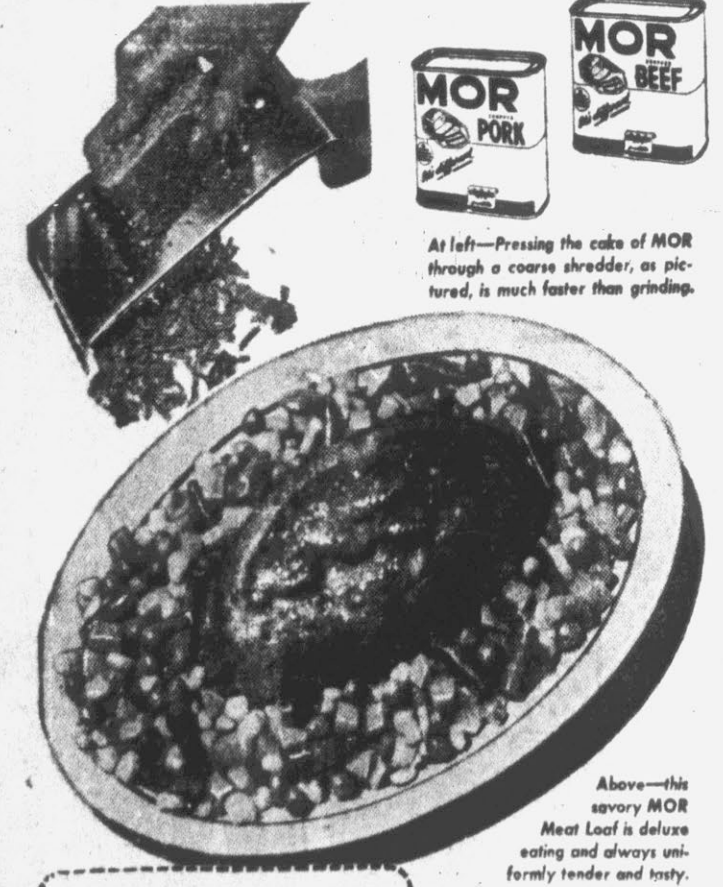

That's a very short time in the life of many trees, he says. And the ideal forest is a long way off, he asserts.

In his opinion it would be one that would furnish an even quota of wood every year—forever. That means it would have enough trees to utilize its growing capacity. Only the oldest would be cut, the age classes would be distributed properly, and cut areas would be reseeded so that normal growth could continue, he says.

San Francisco—(AP)—A duck banded in California is credited with the longest recorded trans-Pacific flight.

Hourly Earnings For Tar Heels Get Good Boost

Raleigh, March 23—(AP)—Hourly earnings of many Tar Heel factory workers got a substantial upward boost last month from the new federal wage minimum.

The State Department of Labor reported yesterday that average hourly earnings in 10 separate industry groups climbed three per cent or more over January levels.

"Practically all industries surveyed by the Department of Labor in February, with the exception of retail and local service industries reported some increase in average hourly earnings," said Statistician C. H. Pritchard.

"However, wage levels in the majority of textile, furniture and cigarette manufacturing firms do not appear to have been affected appreciably by the 75-cent minimum wage."

Average earnings of all factory workers in the state last month were \$1.08 an hour, or \$42.49 for a work week of 39.4 hours, he said. Hourly earnings in all manufacturing rose 2.2 per cent, while the work week was down fractionally.

Total factory employment dropped, principally because of large seasonal layoffs in tobacco stemmeries and redrying plants, Pritchard said. Employment in mid-February was 397,800, about 2,800 below the January level.

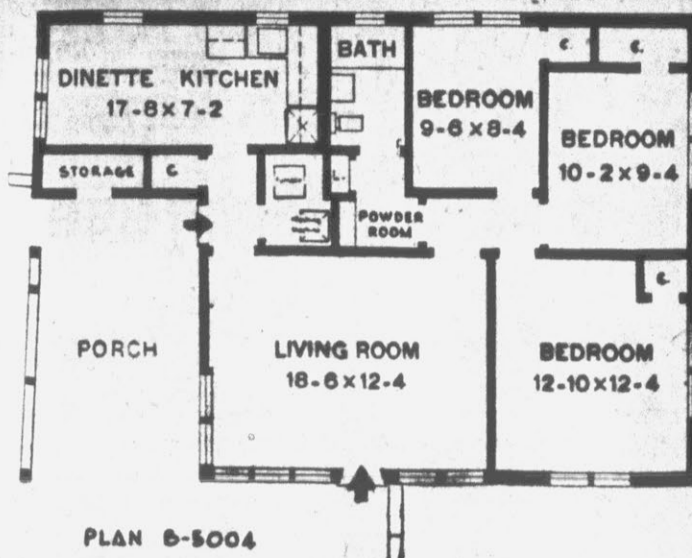

The Cards need a right-handed slugger and Dyer said if he had Cooper he would put him No. 4 in Musial and Enos Slaughter.

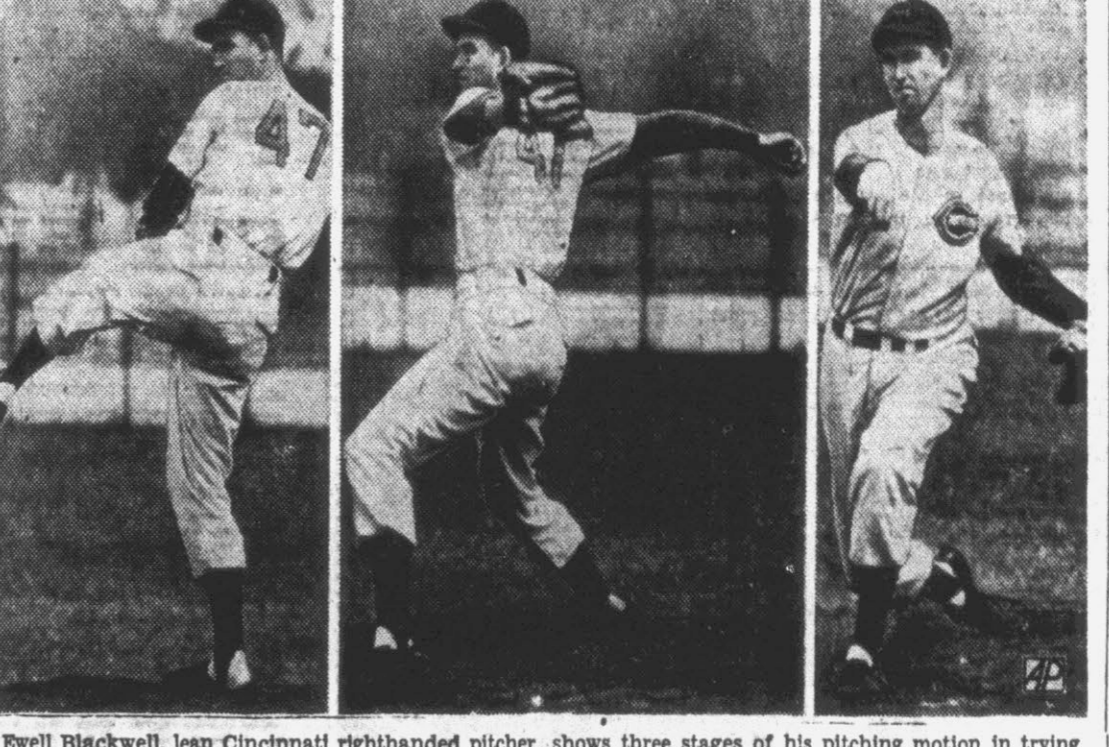
Waitkus To Get First Base Job

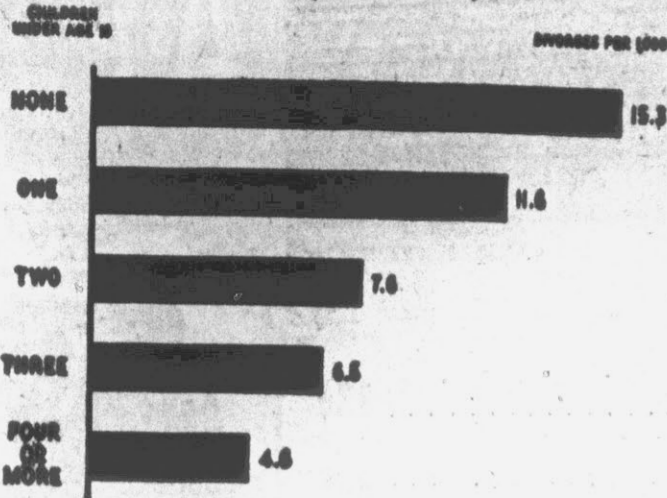

Divorce Chances Decline When Children In Family

Divorces per 1,000 Married Couples, According to Size of Family, United States, 1948



New York, N.Y.—About 1,200,000 persons were involved in divorces granted in the United States in 1948. The total includes \$13,000 children of broken marriages who were under 21 years of age when their parents were divorced.

This is derived from a report on divorces and annulments by Metropolitan Life Insurance Company statisticians. "Divorce in families where there are children is more common than is generally realized" observe the statisticians. "Of the 421,000 absolute decrees granted 42 percent were to couples with children."

The more children there are in a family, the less likelihood there is of divorce, the study shows. In homes where there were no children under age 18, the divorce rate for the United States in 1948 was 15.3 per 1,000 married couples. In homes with one child, the rate was 11.6; with two children, 7.6; with three children, 6.5; and with four or more children 4.8 per 1,000—less than one-third of the rate in the homes where there were no children.

Altogether the relative frequency of divorce for couples with children was shown to be only about one-half that for couples without dependent children at the time of divorce. The difference in divorce frequency between couples with and without children is greatest during the early years, and diminishes as the length of married life increases. Even after the 20th year of marriage, however, the ratio is twice as high for couples without children. After the 30th year the rates for the two groups are practically identical.

"While some unsuccessful marriages may not be broken until the children have grown up, their number is less than is popularly believed," observed the statisticians. "This is borne out by the small difference in the rates between the two groups at the later years of marriage."

Offered \$250 To Dynamite Tower Claims Painter

Charlotte, N. C., March 23—(AP)—A Columbia, S. C., painter testified yesterday that a former technician for Charlotte Radio Station WBT offered him \$250 to dynamite the station's tower.

Charley M. (Chud) Lovell, the painter, pleaded guilty to conspiring to damage the radio station's facilities. The technician, Sterling L. Hicks, pleaded innocent to the same indictment.

The trial continued here today. Lovell walked into the hands of waiting policemen early Jan. 22 after pitching a five-stick bundle of dynamite at the station's tower. Tipped off, police found the dynamite earlier in a clump of bushes near the tower and removed the detonators.

Lovell, the state's star witness, declared that Hicks bargained with him at a Columbia drive-in restaurant to do the dynamiting.

Hicks is manager of the Charlotte local of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. He and nine other WBT members of the IBEW were discharged several weeks ago. The union charged the station with unfair labor practices. An NLRB hearing of the charges was completed here last week. No decision has been handed down.

On cross-examination Lovell was asked if someone got him "to pretend to blow up the tower in order to put the blame on Mr. Hicks."

Hicks returned: "No. If he hadn't come and got me I'd never have told the officers he did."

Growing Bigger On U. S. Food

TOKYO —(AP)— Japanese children are getting taller, heavier and healthier. The second post-war check of more than 16,000,000 school children by public health officials shows that the average is one-third of an inch taller and one to two

pounds heavier than on the first survey two years ago.

It also shows a 20 per cent decrease in tooth decay and a 10 per cent decrease in near-sightedness. The Japanese health ministry credits the improved food supply for which the American taxpayer is responsible through imports by the occupation.

Italy Suppresses Strike Challenge

Rome, March 22—(AP)—The Italian government met a Communist strike challenge today with a massing of police strength that put 3,000 persons under arrest in Rome and rigidly suppressed demonstrations throughout the country.

There appeared to be only scattered violence as a result of the 12-hour nationwide general strike called by the Communist-led Italian Confederation of Labor (CGIL).

The call was issued after a clash last night between police and farmhands carrying Red banners in a village in central Italy. Two farmhands were killed.

The CGIL is protesting government proposals to increase the country's police force and authorize bans on political demonstrations that have taken the lives of several persons in recent days.

An interior ministry press officer said that despite the strike the life of the country was "developing normally." He said the strike was effective in the large industrial organizations and less effective in medium sized industries.

Bob Porterfield Sidelined Again

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 22—(AP)—Bob Porterfield, the New York Yankee's hard luck righthander, can't seem to get away from the injury jinx.

The 25-year-old promising pitcher, out repeatedly last year with a recurring arm ailment, now turns up with a sore leg. He pulled a muscle in practice that docs say will keep him sidelined a week.

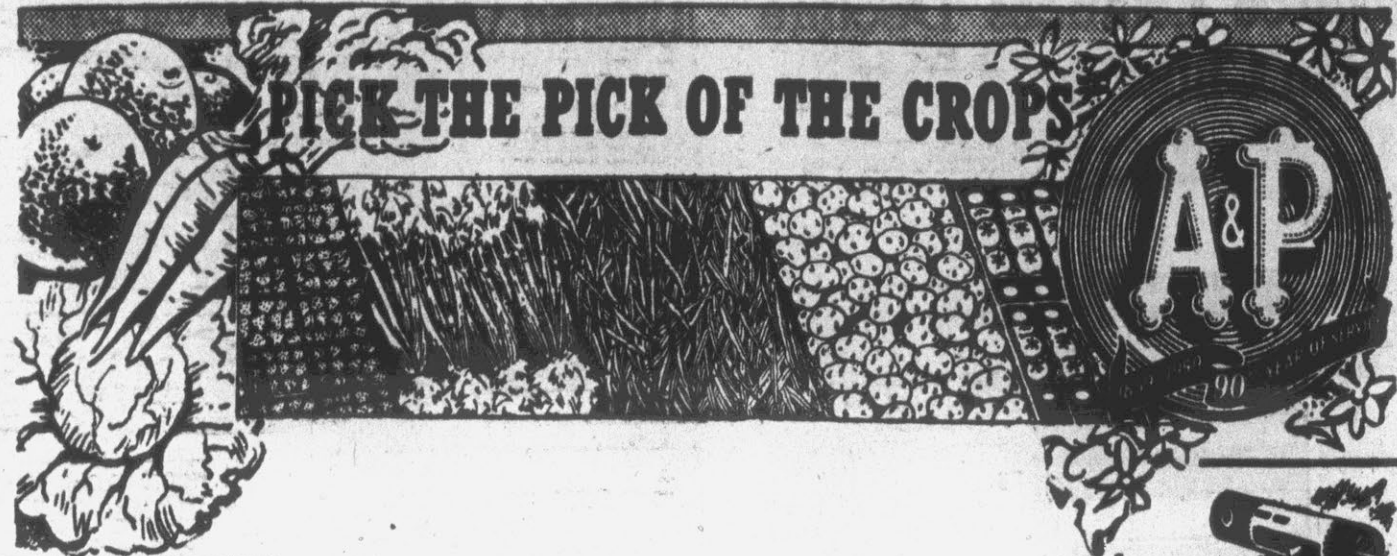

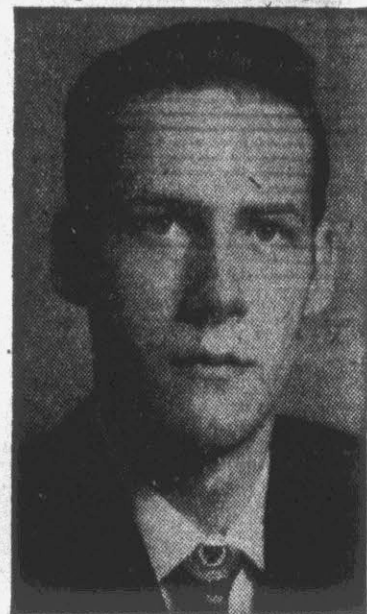

onial ancestors who broke the ground in the new world with their flintlocks loaded and ready at hand. Preparedness is a powerful deterrent to aggression.

Many western observers believe that the danger of another major shooting war would become great if Russia and her satellites should gain a heavy balance of power over the western nations. And of course Moscow has precisely the same view as regards the western bloc.

The crucial test would seem to lie in the rapidly developing Communist offensive in southeast Asia. There lies the balance of power. If Russia should gain control of this vast area in addition to what she already has in Europe, she might be pretty well mistress of her own destiny. She would be potential ruler of the world.

Barring unforeseen developments I believe the cold war must run its course before we can know whether there will be a hot war. If and when we get lasting peace it will have to be founded on something more than fear.

Peace based on fear cannot endure. Permanent peace must be built on the tenets of the sermon on the mount.

The majority opinion, in brief, said no one can claim working for the government as a right. There's nothing in the constitution guaranteeing anyone a government job. Therefore—

Since a person has no right to a government job, the President can fire him from a government job without any explanation at all, if that's the way the President wants it.

In other words, since no right to

a job is involved, no right is taken away even if he's fired without seeing his accusers or knowing precisely of what he's accused.

But suppose the individual—in this case, Miss Bailey—is injured in this kind of situation, particularly at this time when being tagged with "communism" may mean real hardship for the accused.

As to that, the court said, with world conditions as jittery as they are and Communists trying to infiltrate the government, an individual may be hurt but the government—meaning the public interest—comes first.

But Judge Edgerton said Miss Bailey's interest and the public interest, instead of being in conflict, coincide. Why? Because there was no record offered the court to prove Miss Bailey was disloyal, and—

Since dismissal from the government on disloyalty grounds is a punishment, she should have been given full protection of the law. That is, a procedure, or trial, where she could face her accusers and be given the chance to refute them, if possible.
