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Undecided Over Alleged Air Raid

Allied Officers Investigating Communist Protest At Kaesong Find Bullet Marks, But Clues Seemingly Disprove Red Statements; Witnesses Tell Varying Stories

TOKYO (UP)—Allied officers who investigated a Communist charge that a U.N. airplane machinegunned the Kaesong cease-fire zone this morning said today they could not confirm that an air attack really occurred.

There still was no move by the Reds to end their suspension of truce talks as they made the new charge against the U.N.—the 12th in the long series since cease-fire talks first started exactly two months ago.

Air Force Col. Don O. Darrow, senior United Nations investigating officer, refused a Communist demand for an immediate reply to their protest against the alleged machinegunning.

The U.N. team spent four hours inspecting the area indicated by the Communists. They found bullet marks and a dozen .50 caliber slugs in and around a group of three stone houses about 3-4 of a mile from the conference site itself.

The investigators said the bullets appeared to have been fired from several directions and at different angles. This, they said, disproved a Communist claim that the plane made only one pass over the houses during the alleged attack.

Darrow told North Korean Col. Chang, senior Red liaison officer present, that the evidence would be studied further and that he would report his findings to Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway and Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy.

There were several sharp exchanges between Darrow and Chang as the investigation proceeded. Once Darrow called a statement by Chang "stupid" and Chang demanded that Darrow be replaced by another U.N. officer.

Chang charged after the investigation that "this kind of continuous violation" had no other purpose than to delay resumption of the truce talks.

Communist newsmen present for the meeting indicated that the Reds were not eager to take up Ridgway's proposal to find a new site for the cease-fire talks.

"What's wrong with Kaesong," asked Alan Winington, London Daily Worker correspondent, who reported for the leftist Paris newspaper, Ce Soir, said "there's nothing wrong with Kaesong" and that before the talks resumed it was necessary to "get to the bottom" of the alleged incidents and fix responsibility.

The Communists produced two witnesses of the alleged air attack today. Their statements differed as to whether it was a strafing or bombing.

Blind Man Finds Auto For Police

Satellites Acting Up

Developments Over Past Week Indicate Russia Too Muscle-Bound To Be Effective In A Fight; Puppets Are Learning Tito's Lesson And Thinking About It

Fear of the American atomic bomb is one reason why Stalin doesn't blow the whistle to start World War III, but it isn't the only one. He has too many troubles in his own backyard.

Gigantic Russia is like lots of human giants. They are terrifying to look at, but actually they are not healthy. They are suffering from internal troubles and aches and pains at the extremities. They are too muscle-bound to be effective in a fight. As was proved at San Francisco, you can kick them around at will and nothing much happens.

Over the week-end evidence piled up that Stalin has too many headaches at home to give much thought to trying to take over the world by force in the immediate future. It included:

1. There was a drastic shake-up in the government of the puppet nation of Czechoslovakia. Some of the men who have become known as Stalin's stooges are out.

Magnate Dies

WINSTON-SALEM — (AP)—William Neal Reynolds, tobacco magnate (Camels) and a grand old man of harness horse racing, died today. He was 88.

He died at 10:05 a.m. (EST) in a hospital here. Reynolds had been ill for the last month, having been stricken at the last Hambletonian race meeting at Goshen, N. Y.

Reynolds, known to friends and associates as "Mr. Will," was born March 22, 1863, in Patrick County, Va., one of four sons of Hardin W. and Nancy Cox Reynolds. Twelve years later he and his brother, Richard, founded a tobacco company in Winston-Salem, and in 1888 formed a partnership with "Mr. Will" and Henry Roan. Their swiftly expanding firm was incorporated in 1890 as the W. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

In 1899 he advanced to vice president in 1912 to president and in 1924 to chairman of the board of directors.

From 1931 until his retirement in 1942 he was chairman of the executive committee of the board.

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Truman Repeats Stand; Will Keep Acheson On Job

Praises Handling Of San Francisco Assignment; Smarter Than Foes

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman appeared more determined than ever today to keep Dean Acheson as secretary of state.

Mr. Truman restated his position of Acheson yesterday as he flew back to Washington from a week's journey "high" took him to the Japanese peace treaty conference and a visit at his home in Missouri.

Acheson, according to the president, did a "splendid job" at the San Francisco conference, proving that "he's smarter than any of the guys who have been attacking him."

The president planned to talk with Acheson today or tomorrow. He had congratulated him by telephone Saturday night.

Mr. Truman has long regarded Acheson as one of the best secretaries of state in the nation's history and recent attacks on Acheson, particularly those by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) actually strengthened the president's convictions.

The president scheduled a relatively abbreviated engagement list this morning because he planned to "drop in" on a luncheon meeting of International Monetary Fund officials to say a few words informally.

Tomorrow Mr. Truman will make another informal speech at the dedication of the new General Accounting Office Building here.

The White House staff awaited a definite go-ahead from the president on detailed planning of another trip to the Pacific Coast early next month. The president has tentatively agreed to speak to a big money-raising dinner for Democratic Party contributors at Los Angeles Oct. 8.

If the president gives his final okay on Los Angeles, the trip may take on "whistle stop" proportions involving a transcontinental train journey and a number of re-platform appearances.

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Represent Airport In Washington Hearings

Only 4 Sets Of Buyer On Mart

Fifth Set To Be Absent One Week; Attend Old Belt Opening

The Greenville tobacco market will operate next week with only four sets of buyers with the fifth set going to markets in the Old Belt to the September 17 opening.

The action was effected yesterday by the Bright Belt Warehousemen's Association and will take sets of buyers from Greenville, Wilson, Kinston and Rocky Mount in the Eastern Belt and from several cities in the Middle and Old Belt.

Although official notification has not been received here concerning the loss of one set, Fred Royser, president of the Warehousemen's Association from Henderson, said yesterday in Raleigh that the buyers would be away from their present markets for only one week.

Reason for the action is due to the fact that markets in the Border Belt are still operating, marketing the first time in history that all four belts in North Carolina have operated at the same time. Usually the Border Belt has wound up its sales by the time the Old Belt begins operation.

Sales supervisor W. L. Whedbee here stated today that selling hours will have to be extended in order to get tobacco off the floors each day. New schedules for sales hours will have to be worked out for the 17 warehouses which will hold sales during the five days of next week, he said.

Louis F. Parker of Elizabethtown, state commander of the North Carolina Department of the American Legion, will be the speaker at the dedication of new buildings at the Pitt-County Fair Grounds, near the airport, Tuesday, September 18.

Lester Turnage, commander of Pitt County Post No. 39, American Legion, will be master of ceremonies. An entertaining program is being worked out and a barbecue supper will be served "dutch treat." The meeting will start at 7 p.m.

The Ayden, Farmville and Greenville posts and women's auxiliaries are sponsoring the affair. Legionnaires and their wives are invited. The commander of the Greenville post suggests that members try to take in some new members.

The meeting will be held in the main exhibits building. Guests will be shown over the new fair grounds and buildings.

The Pitt County Agricultural Fair will be held there the week of October 1-6.

Military Hero Leading Field In Greek Elections

ATHENS — (AP)—Field Marshal Alexander Papagos, military hero who smashed communist resistance in the Greek civil war, led decisively today in Sunday's voting on leadership in the government.

He had refused privately three times before to take the Greek premiership because he had not been elected by the people.

On the basis of unofficial returns from 3,011 of the nation's 3,910 precincts, Papagos was virtually sure to take command of the country with a clear majority of the 280 parliament seats.

With 899 precincts still to report, Party led the ticket with 35 per cent of the votes.

Dubbed "The Man On The White Horse," Papagos is a right wing leader counted on by his supporters to lead Greece out of the political instability it has had since it was liberated seven years ago.

Ike Avers He Is Good Republican

WASHINGTON (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has told Roy A. Roberts, editor of the Kansas City Star, that he is a "good Kansas Republican, like all his forebears."

Roberts disclosed this yesterday in a National Broadcasting Co. radio symposium which included predictions by three other prominent editors on politics next year.

Roberts said that Eisenhower would defeat any other candidate if nominated for president next year, but that "events in Europe will determine whether he will run."

Clamping Down

LONDON — (UP)—Britain today cut off Iran's supply of dollars from sterling bloc sources and prohibited the export of scarce goods to that country in the latest move in the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute.

The Treasury announced that in view of the breakdown of oil negotiations with Iran the government has been compelled to withdraw "certain exceptional facilities which have hitherto been granted by virtue of the importance of that oil to our economy."

The special facilities included Iran's right to convert sterling into dollars.

Child Struck By Car Fatally Hurt

An 18-month-old child was fatally injured yesterday afternoon around 4:45 when an automobile struck it as the child was playing in a yard.

Herbert Simpkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jessie Simpkins, Route 5, Greenville, died of a crushed head after being struck by an automobile driven by Paul Meeks, 49, of Route 4, Box 301, Greenville.

Charges of driving drunk have been lodged against Meeks by Cpl. H. M. Morrow, who investigated the accident with Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson. The warrant was taken out on information and belief.

The accident occurred about four miles from Greenville just off the Patactus highway near Marion Simmons garage, on the E. Winslow farm.

According to an eye-witness, the Simpkins child was playing in the yard of Charles Simpkins, his uncle, when the car driven by Meeks entered the yard, striking the child as it started out.

A witness stated that the child was out of the path of the car but the driver hit it, and kept on going.

Meeks, accompanied by his brother, L. M. Meeks, stopped after going down the road some distance, upon hearing the calls of the child's uncle.

Taft Is Polled As Favorite Choice Of GOP Leaders

CHICAGO — (AP)—Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) is favored by some 3,000 Republican leaders as the party's 1952 presidential nominee, according to a survey made by a private Republican committee.

The survey of GOP leaders—including delegates and alternates to the last two GOP national conventions—was made by the national Republican Roundup Committee, a private organization not sponsored by the national GOP.

Taft also was first choice for vice president, followed in order by Dirksen, MacArthur and Eisenhower.

The committee said it polled former delegates and alternates and state central committeemen and county chairmen in every state.

A committee statement noted that the Republicans, no less than Jeffersonian Democrats, believe that a coalition of anti-New Dealers would insure a change in the administration in the 1952 elections.

Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) was listed by the Republican leaders as fifth choice for nominee for vice president. Other Democrats mentioned for president or vice president on the GOP ticket were Sen. George W. Douglas of Illinois, Gov. James E. Byrnes of South Carolina, former Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, Dixiecrat leader in 1948, and former Rep. Martin Dies of Texas.

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Three senators—two Democrats and one Republican—said today they would pull no punches in probing into a newspaper's accusation of influence peddling by Democratic national chairman William M. Boyle, Jr.

A special Senate investigating subcommittee, of which the three are members, has set Thursday for the state of public hearings on the charges.

The inquiry stems from a series of articles in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch linking Boyle with a \$605,000 Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) loan to the American Lithofold Corporation of St. Louis.

Said Carol Mitchell, the pretty who was Miss Indiana, to Colleen Kay Hutchins, Miss Utah:

"Wouldn't it be awful if we won. I understand the grind for one year is terrific."

Miss Indiana can now relax and do as she jolly well pleases. She took second place and she got what she was after; which was a scholarship. She will use it to help further her college education at Indiana University.

Miss Hutchins, the tallest contestant ever to win (she's 5 feet, 10) and the oldest (aged 31), has to face it. A gruelling year of personal appearances, smiling when she could do with a good private cry, traveling from town to town, day by day.

In third place was Miss North Carolina, Lulleng Ogburn. Fourth was Miss Arkansas, Charlotte Rosalie Simmen; Fifth, Miss Florida, Mary Elizabeth Godwin.

All got scholarships and a big hand from the crowd.

Five other winners were announced—for their efforts in talent, appearance in bathing suits and evening gowns. These included Misses Alabama, West Virginia, Mississippi, New Hampshire, and Tennessee.

Our new Miss America wants to continue her study of dramatics. She has other charms, too. She is an expert skier, a back-stroking dandy at swimming, and she dances well and sings better.

Germany's Peace Terms Next For Big Three Study

Foreign Ministers Would Like To Make Same Deal As With Japan

WASHINGTON (UP)—The U. S., British and French foreign ministers begin charting today the path for a peace settlement with Germany.

With the Japanese peace treaty signed, the Western governments must decide how to restore Japan's parity of nations. They also may discuss the possibility of a separate peace with Austria and a liberalized treaty revision for Italy.

But the problems facing Secretary of State Dean Acheson, British Foreign Minister Herbert Morrison, and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman are different than those which led to the treaty of reconciliation with Japan.

The three flew back from San Francisco together to begin formal conferences here today.

They hope to iron out details of a "political contract" with Germany that would, in effect, wipe out the occupation and give the Federal Republic nearly complete independence.

The pact—roughly comparable to the peace treaty with Japan—would permit the Allies to keep troops in Germany but at the same time give it the freedom it needs to become a full-fledged member of the Western bloc.

The diplomats will tackle also the tough problem of how to use German forces in Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Atlantic Pact army.

They admit German units must be employed but differ on how big they should be and whether they should operate separately or as an integral part of a European army.

Essentially, the foreign ministers would like to give Germany the same peace treatment as Japan. But whereas Japan was not divided Germany is.

That adds to the problems. Western forces still face Russia in Germany. Berlin, largest German city, is an island in Russian-controlled territory.

When Acheson flew here yesterday, he said that the Japanese treaty "very greatly strengthens the possibilities for peace."

"We have done very well," Acheson said.

Although Acheson said the two foreign ministers had begun outlining their talks, the formal conference will not get underway until late today when Acheson and Morrison hold a preliminary meeting to iron out Anglo-American views on key issues.

Acheson will meet separately with Schuman tomorrow and then the full-session talks will begin Wednesday behind the guarded doors of the State Department's plush international conference room.

Carrier Wasp Is Recommissioned

NEW YORK (UP)—The aircraft carrier Wasp, converted as a jet plane carrier with 5,000 tons greater displacement than during its World War II fighting days, will be recommissioned today at the New York naval shipyard.

The sixth Essex class carrier to be returned from mothballs since the start of the Korean war, the Wasp will bring the Navy's floating strength to 16 heavy carriers.

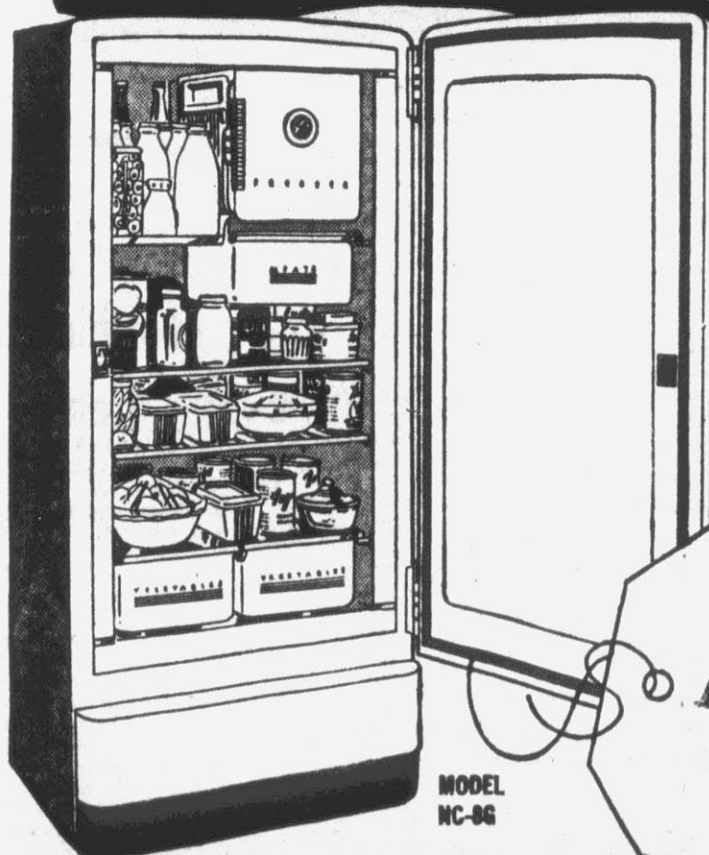

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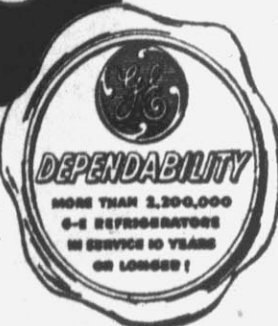

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Strength for the Day

SATISFACTION THAT LASTS
Those who heard over the television some weeks ago to the testimony given by youthful drug addicts must have been struck by the halting speech and sluggish mentality of these victims. It took them a half minute to answer a question which could have been answered in five seconds by a bright, alert youth. There is no doubt that their habits had injured some of their fundamental thought processes. It is to be hoped that treatment will restore them, but this is doubtful. Drug addiction is said to destroy certain cells of the brain, and this permanently handicaps the victims.

But wrong doing of all sorts has a similarly marked tendency. If you have ever come in contact with a person whose whole life has been conspicuously evil, you have no doubt observed that such a person is uninteresting, tiresome in his conversation, and sluggish in his thinking. A life of vice or intemperance, or even a life spent exclusively in the making of money or in the pursuit of superficial pleasures, produces just this type of person.

Lastings satisfactions are not found in trying to attract something to life in order that life may have significance. Such satisfactions are found only when our lives flow from inner springs of wholesomeness, moral purpose, kindness, and religious faith.

Need Some Good Part Time Help?

A part time job with some firm in or near Greenville may mean the difference between staying in school and dropping out of school for a large number of East Carolina College students.

The dean of men at East Carolina has reported that there are 216 students on the campus who have applied for part time jobs to help finance their college education. Some may be able to skim by even if they don't get jobs of some sort, but there will be others who will find it necessary to drop out of school in the near future if they can not find some sort of work.

For the most part, Greenville business men do not think of hiring employees on a part time basis, but if the situation is analyzed, The Reflector believes a good many part time jobs can be found for these college students. Among the students looking for jobs there are doubtlessly those with experience in clerking, typing, bookkeeping and many other fields.

On the other hand there are probably a good many firms in this community that could use a few hours extra help each week from one of these students. It will be to the advantage of the Greenville businessmen to provide part time jobs to enable as many of these students as possible to stay in school at East Carolina.

Killing The Fish For The Shrimp

North Carolina coastal waters are not the only ones which are feeling the devastating effect of the millions of small fish killed annually by the nets of shrimp trawlers.

At the meeting of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission in New York last week Charles M. Lankford, Jr., commissioner of fisheries of Virginia, Arthur H. Brice, Maryland commissioner of Tide-water fisheries and George Ross, director of the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development were appointed along with five technical advisors to study the reported destruction of small fish in Chesapeake Bay by North Carolina shrimp trawlers.

The Reflector has no way of knowing what the committee has in mind to cope with the great destruction of small fish being caused by the trawlers, but if a solution can be found for Chesapeake Bay, perhaps it can be applied to North Carolina waters as well. For several years technical men have been working on a special net which would snare the shrimp, but would allow the small fish to escape. So far the efforts to perfect the net have not been successful.

Until such a net can be produced, North Carolina must do something about the toll being taken in its commercial fishing waters. If small fish continue to be killed

at the rate they are being killed now, it will not be long before North Carolina will find its waters as unproductive as some of its exhausted farm land.

A Major Victory For The Allies

The United States' about face in its foreign policy which has been taking shape gradually over the past 18 months was consummated with the preparation and signing of the Japanese peace treaty in the face of open Russian opposition.

It was not so much the fact that the pact was signed as it was the manner in which the delegates of the United States and other western nations called the Russian bluff, and blocked at every turn the Communists' attempt to break up the conference. Many times before the United States has been at odds with the Russians. In the past this country had accepted the Communists as acting in good faith, and squared away for a fight only after negotiations had been drawn out over a long period, or they realized the conference was being sabotaged by the Russians.

At the San Francisco conference, however, the United States openly, and in advance, recognized the Russian purpose at the meeting was to wreck the Japanese peace treaty. We called a spade a spade, and did the work of the conference accordingly without allowing the Communists an opportunity to carry out their diabolical ideas.

The treaty pushes the Communist hopes of getting a hold on Japan out in the cold. It provides for the stationing of American troops in Japan and allows American military bases. It provides that the American forces may be called on by the Japanese government to put down any insurrection or riots incited by outside influences. It grants Russia neither the island bases she wanted for herself nor the fortress of Formosa the Communists insist Red China should have.

The Japanese treaty in truth sets up for the Allies a military curtain around the edge of the Pacific to face the iron curtain of the Communists. It binds the 49 signing nations to the support of the document, and sets the Communist group apart from the nations of the world which are seeking a permanent peace.

The signing of the Japanese peace treaty, though seemingly a cut and dried proposition at the conference, is a major diplomatic victory for the Allied nations, and a stern warning to the Communists that their threats of further wars no longer send free nations retreating from the diplomatic field.

National Whirligig

News Behind The News

WASHINGTON—Confidential figures in the files of civilian and defense agencies at Washington disclose that approximately 30,000,000 people are drawing their pay checks, directly or indirectly, from the federal treasury. As the rearmament program accelerates in 1952, the year of a presidential and Congressional election, the total may skyrocket to more than 40,000,000.

This revelation is regarded as extremely significant, both economically and politically. In estimating and forecasting the Republicans' difficulty in ousting the Democrats from power in the White House and on Capitol Hill, it is the usual practice to cite the 4,000,000 voters on the government pay roll. With their friends and relatives, and assuming that a majority vote for the "ins," they are supposed to account for at least 15,000,000 votes.

This is what is known to political statisticians as the "federal machine." But it amounts to no more than a corporal's guard, relatively, by comparison with the electoral total which is wholly or partially dependent on Uncle Sam's checks, money orders and currency.

EXPANSIVE—With the government planning to spend from fifty to seven-five billions a year for domestic projects, routine operations, national defense procurement and foreign aid, the Administration will become the largest single purchaser of the products of all private industries. In some instances it will buy the total output of many plants.

Many of our key industries—steel, building, oil, utilities, railroads, etc.—would be the red today, if it were not for federal orders. Many of our major crops would fall far below the parity figure, if Truman dollars did not sustain purchasing power. There would be unemployment in many lines, if it were not for the Marshall Plan and the Marshall rearmament program.

In fact, it is no exaggeration to suggest that Uncle Sam has become the most expansive employer in history. We all work for him directly or indirectly.

ESTIMATES—These seemingly astronomical estimates of the present and prospective number of direct and indirect federal pay-rollers are supported by mathematical calculations at Washington. They have been prepared by order of Democratic National Chairman Boyle in preparation for the 1952 campaign.

It is estimated, for instance, that the government will be spending about \$80,000,000,000 in one way or another in 1952. It is also believed that the total national production will amount to about \$320,000,000,000. Therefore, one-fourth of the working population will be making stuff for Uncle Sam.

EMPLOYER—Since the army of gainfully employed in 1952 is expected to reach about 65,000,000, one-fourth of that figure will be more than 16,000,000. They may think they are working for U. S. Steel, General Motors, the Aluminum Company of America, or Standard Oil of California, simply because they get their pay envelopes from those firms. But their hidden employer will be Harry S. Truman et al.

Even this total does not include the millions of farmers, transportation, service and retail employees who benefit even more indirectly from federal largesse.

ISSUE—The interest in this incredible situation shown by National Chairman Boyle, who is no economist, forecasts the issue on which the Democrats will seek reelection next year. They will not bother about such unimportant questions as the Truman-Acheson foreign policy, official and unofficial corruption, high taxes and prices, prospective bankruptcy.

Messrs. Truman and Boyle will ask the same question Franklin D. Roosevelt did when he sought a third term in 1940, namely: "Are you better off now than you were 20 years ago—10 years ago—one year ago?"

Advice From A Professional



Around Capitol Square

Raleigh, N. C.

SAVINGS—Governor Kerr Scott likes to tell about how much has been saved to the taxpayers of North Carolina through policies inaugurated early in his administration to stop "petty graft" among state employees. As late as the recent State Federation of Labor convention in Asheville the governor reported that he had effected a saving of about five million dollars a year through tightened operating methods and the elimination of such abuses as unjustifiable use of state cars, long distance telephone calls, supplies, and such items. That abuses of such state facilities have been, and continue to be, numerous nobody can deny. That sporadic efforts to tighten up, initiated by governors before Scott and by him have resulted in lessening the abuses is also beyond question. But when Governor Scott or anybody claims reduction in leaks to the amount of five million dollars a year those who know anything about state government are inclined to laugh.

APPROPRIATIONS—The general assembly appropriated out of the general fund for postage, telephone, telegraph and express for all the departments, institutions and agencies supported by general fund taxes, an amount between eight hundred thousand and eight hundred and twenty-five thousand for each year of the current biennium. The total amount appropriated for travel, including operation of state owned cars, was between three quarter million dollars, an aggregate for both brackets of some four and a half million dollars. The amount appropriated for materials and supplies, which includes food for all the colleges and hospitals and correctional schools, as well as miscellaneous items for the administrative departments, is in round figures nine million dollars. In other words there was appropriated for postage, telephone, telegraph, mileage travel, operation of state owned cars, food

and supplies for hospitals, colleges and training schools, an aggregate of about thirteen and one half million dollars.

LARGEST—These were the largest amounts ever appropriated by any general assembly. The budget bureau has saved five million dollars by tightened checks on spending, the inevitable conclusion is that during administrations before Scott the folks in charge of these state agencies had stolen from 35 per cent to 40 per cent of the total appropriations. That is so obviously ridiculous as to raise the question of the incumbent governor's good faith in his statements. That some savings have been effected cannot be denied; neither can it be denied that in spite of these savings the cost of operating all these departments and agencies is more under the Scott regime than ever before.

EXPANDING—State government is expanding and each year it takes on new functions and obligations. For that reason it is difficult to make fair comparison in expenditures. It is interesting to note, however, in connection with claims of economy, that budget reports show more than fifty percent increase in actual cost of operating the governor's office the first year of Scott's regime over the last year of Governor Cherry. During the fiscal year 1947-48, last full period under Cherry, the governor's office spent \$36,342. During the fiscal year 1949-50, first full year of the Scott regime, the cost was \$61,668. Maintenance and operation of the executive mansion also increased more than fifty percent, going from \$25,709 in Cherry's last year to \$38,578 in Scott's first. The budget bureau and the division of purchase and contract are integral adjuncts of the governor's office. In 1947-48 the budget bureau spent \$57,439, including administrative personnel. In 1949-50 the budget bureau required \$93,358 and the new personnel department \$63,239—a total of \$156,597 for the same functions performed two years before by the budget bureau for \$57,439. The division of purchase and contract called for \$74,890 in 1949-50, compared with \$43,849 two years earlier. Stepped up activities all along the lines through state departments, posed more work on these central offices.

COMPARATIVE—These operations so intimately connected with the governor's office increased in cost between the last year of Cherry and the first year of Scott from \$163,332 to \$381,732, or 103-1-3 percent. For the same years the increase in appropriation for the nine months school term was from \$57,756 to \$81,613, or 39-1-1 percent. Appropriations for department of conservation and development was 29 percent, and for the department of agriculture 25 percent. Other state services were upped proportionately, ranging from 20 percent to 50 percent.

INTEREST—Governor Scott has also been quoted as saying that the state has profited to the extent of some ten million dollars in interest on funds which previous to his regime has been left in banks without interest. This is an item of which the governor and every citizen of the state may well be proud, but no stretching of figures can make the last fiscal year the earnings were \$3,182,000, somewhat less the year before. Meanwhile, the state was paying interest on \$7,500,000 port bonds, \$35,000,000 school building bonds and major part of \$200,000,000 secondary road bonds, representing new debt contracted under the Scott regime. No reliable bookkeeper would list the interest collected by the state as net yield in face of the interest being paid on new debt. Furthermore, friends of State Treasurer Brandon Hodges insist he is entitled to the major share of the credit for the reasonably profitable handling of state funds, since the constitution reapeeking upon the treasurer.

What Other Papers Are Thinking

THE DANIELS' PREDICTION
(Wilson Daily Times)

Jonathan Daniels, the editor of The News and Observer in Raleigh, has been close to President Truman. Indeed, he's a frequent caller at the White House. For that reason, no doubt Daniels would like to see the President run again and be re-elected. It would mean something to those people who are close to the President. There are a lot more of us, however, who fear ultimate disaster if we continue our present trends. Are we willing to be Socialists without first voting that way?

The Times recognizes that we are headed that way, regardless of who's in office. It'll be almost a necessity when the cold war ends. For what will America, the greatest industrial nation on earth, do with her surplus products when we quit meeting the defense needs of ourselves and our allies? The demand will go up for full employment, despite the inability of the people to buy what America's capable of producing. Will we at that time have controls with a vengeance? Or will we get back to laissez-faire and a depression?

Most of us are aware that from 1939 on we've been living in a war economy. Must we, then, have constant wars to perpetuate that economy? Or will we take a different stand? Will we use all produce for use, whether those using what we're capable of turning out pay for what they get or not? That, as we all know, is pure Socialism. For the tools of production, whether owned by the state or not, will be controlled

by that state. Allocations will be made in keeping with need. But who'll decide who'll have a new car? We'll get in real difficulties when those problems arise.

Our Socialism today is a circuitous one. We don't allocate sums in the form of bounties. They go to the aged, the blind, the fatherless, the farmer who'll agree not to produce, the industrialist who'll over-produce, if engaged in war work, the veteran and the ex-officerholder. In that way we keep money in circulation. That it isn't enough to buy a new car in all cases is beside the point. It makes a pretense of holding to the old mercantile values, enabling those who deal with the pensioners to buy new cars. But that won't be enough in a prosperous America. We see that now in the demands of the pressure groups. It's in yielding to those demands that results in the raising of eyebrows toward Truman. Only his close friends want him; yet few offer a better substitute. Meanwhile the nation has been drifting badly.

FEDERAL AID
(New Bern Sun-Journal)
Indiana's eighty-fifth General Assembly recently sent a remarkable message to the congress of the United States. It said, in part, "We have decided that there is no such thing as 'Federal aid.' We know that there is no wealth to tax that is not already within the boundaries of the 48 states. So we propose henceforth to tax ourselves and take care of ourselves."

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Business Today

National Home Week this week finds builders and sellers considerably more cheerful than they were a month ago. Their biggest cause for rejoicing has been the relaxation of Regulation X, ordered by Congress. This has already brought many prospects back into the market and real estate men have stepped up selling and promotional efforts.

Under the new credit terms, veterans may make down payments as low as 4 per cent on a house costing \$7,000 or less; 6 per cent on houses from \$7,000 to \$10,000, and 8 per cent on houses from \$10,000 to \$12,000. For non-vets, the down payments as low as 4 per cent on a house costing \$7,000 or less; 6 per cent on houses from \$7,000 to \$10,000, and 8 per cent on houses from \$10,000 to \$12,000. For non-vets, the down payments may be as low as 10, 15, and 20 per cent in the same three brackets.

The home building industry, however, is not out of the woods. The National Production Authority restrictions on the use of scarce metals is a considerable handicap.

This affects selling even more than it does construction. The average builder, especially those constructing one and two-family houses, can work around the limitations, local building codes permitting. But there is a growing feeling among prospects that houses being started now will contain a lot of ersatz materials and some prospects are fearful that in a few years they may have to replace a lot of work. This may not be necessarily so. The restrictions are far less than popularly supposed.

Clyde A. Fulton, president of the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association, recently pointed out that the weights of only a limited number of commonly used products have to be reckoned under NPA rulings. He said the weights of such fabricated products as metal windows, wire mesh, weather stripping, hot-air ducts, furnaces, hardware, plumbing fixtures and similar items need not be counted.

Meanwhile, the caution over houses yet to be built has stimulated interest in older houses now on the market. Bernard P. Day, New York real estate executive, recently completed a survey of housing in most United States and Canadian areas. He found considerable interest in "used" houses. He also noted that there were no critical housing shortages except around new military installations and in the Santa Fe, N. M. area. Real estate men in many regions are certain to dispute him.

NOW IT'S NICKELS THAT ARE SCARCE

First it was pennies, now it is nickels.

Federal Reserve Banks, which began rationing pennies earlier this year, have now begun rationing nickels.

There is no one explanation for the shortage. The rise in odd-cents prices, the increase in coin machines and parking meters, and the many new sales taxes require a greater volume of small coins in circulation. The rise in

population, especially youngsters in the cent and nickel ages, may also be a factor.

SURVEY SHOWS TAXES REDUCE INITIATIVE

Seventy-five per cent of the companies replying to a Mill Factory questionnaire said they felt that high income taxes are curbing the incentive of higher-salaried executives and junior executives. Forty-six per cent noted a reluctance on the part of junior executives to assume greater responsibilities at higher salaries, and 43 per cent said they noted a lowering of efficiency on the part of enterprise men on the part of the juniors.

RAS RANGE SALES DECLINE 164,700

Sales of domestic gas ranges during the first seven months of the year totalled 1,427,000 compared with 1,591,700 in the same 1950 period. The sharpest decline came in July, with 106,500 units sold, compared with 254,800 in July, 1950.

NOTICE: 'TERRATE ZONE TOBACCO CROP RISES

Production of tobacco in the North Temperate Zone this year is forecast about 5 per cent higher than a year ago by the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations.

The Crop in the United States is expected to be about 10 per cent higher; in Canada, 20 per cent higher; in Europe except Russia, 3 per cent higher; and in Africa, about equal to the 1950 crop. Figures on the Russian and Chinese crops are not available, but they are estimated to be somewhat higher.

NEW PRODUCTS LUMINESCENT

For children who fear to go to sleep in the dark, luminescent light shades and toys are being introduced. They glow for 10 to 20 hours after lights are off. The shades are by Verplex Co., Essex, Conn., and the toys by Milton Toys, 649 Broadway, New York, New York.

INTERLINING—An entirely new type of interlining for apparel, claimed to hold shape better, is being produced of wool, camel's hair and other fibers bonded by a chemo-thermic process. It was developed by Fellen Corp. 17 E. 42 St., New York 18.

ANTI-FREEZE—A squirt of a newly developed liquid into a house or car door keyhole is claimed to prevent the lock from freezing for the life of the lock. It is by Elektrik Seal Laboratories, 629 W. Washington St., Chicago.

WASHINGTON—A mineral sometimes used as a gem may be a big shot in the future of atomic energy.

It is zircon, from which is obtained the metal zirconium. The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) says zirconium shows promise as a structural material for atomic power devices.

Highly resistant to heat, the metal has been used in vacuum tubes, incandescent lamps, flash bulbs and some kinds of fireworks. And certain of its compounds have been employed to line industrial furnaces.

The AEC for a long time has been saying that one of the big headaches in trying to build atomic engines for airplanes, submarines and industrial power plants is finding structural materials to withstand the high temperature and other conditions under which they would have to be run.

Dr. Lawrence H. Batist, chief of the AEC's reactor engineering department, told reporters recently that zirconium is "one of the structural materials which happens to have unique properties which make it desirable."

That's all he would say, but the AEC's latest report to Congress and a previous announcement had been made.

The commission disclosed that it is trying to encourage wider industrial production of "high-purity" zirconium metal. At present the stuff is being produced largely in government-owned or controlled facilities.

Zircon occurs in various hues aside from gold-orange, green, blue and red. When heated to high temperature the color is lost or changed, but there is a gain in brilliancy, which accounts for the gem quality of some varieties. The so-called "Matura Diamonds" of Ceylon are zircons which have been so treated.

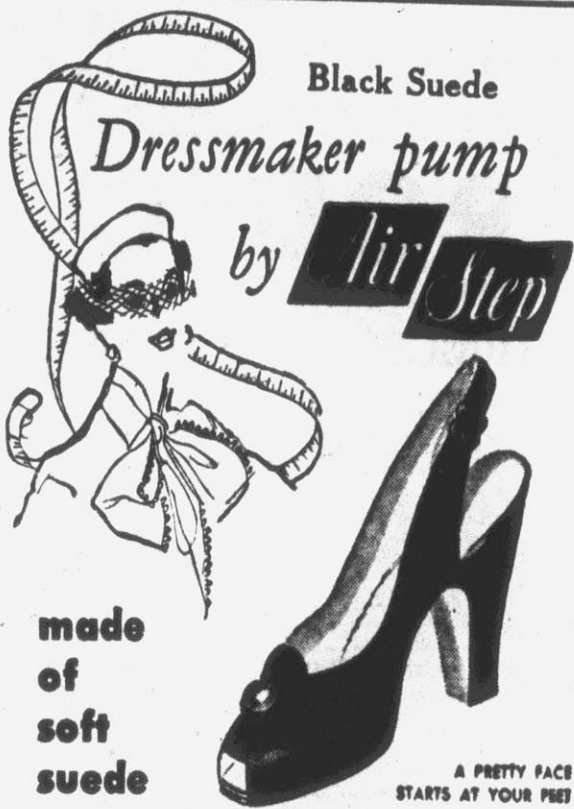
Negroes To Hold Dairy Cattle Show Sept. 26th

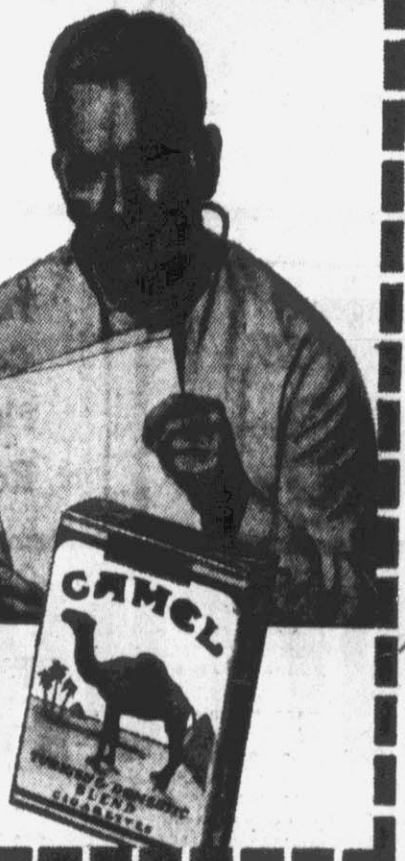

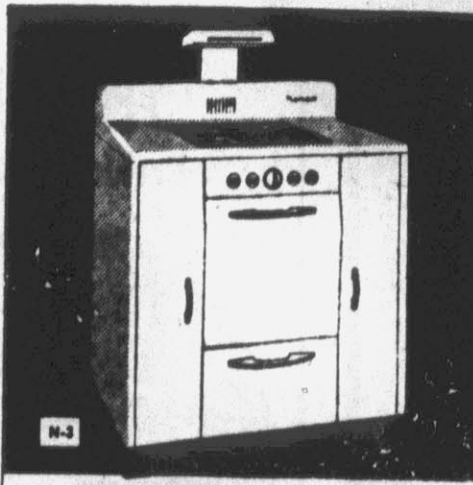

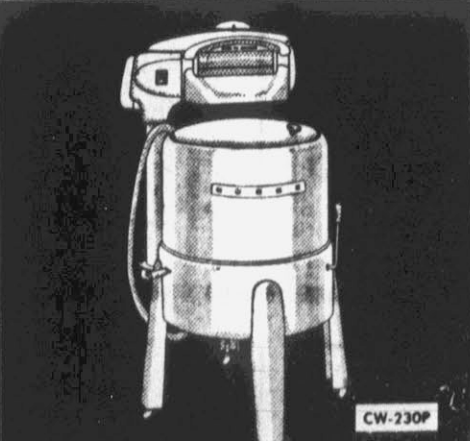

When the East Carolina College Pirates took on the Duke Blue Devils in their practice scrimmage Saturday, they were biting off a large mouthful. However, according to the reports which have come back from Durham, the Pirates chewed right well and gave a good account of themselves against the Blue Devils.

Coach Bill Dole of the Pirates said that he personally thought the session with Duke was "very successful. It (the scrimmage) accomplished all our aims and I am very well pleased with the manner in which the whole deal was run off."

Two of the Pirates were injured in the drill Saturday, neither of them seriously. Al Auerback of Greenville came out of the days action with a sprained ankle and Doc Smith came out with a banged up shoulder. Other than these two, the 33-man team that made the trip came out without any injuries other than the usual bruises.

No score was kept in the scrimmage although it can be suspected that Duke won. There is just too much football talent running around in "Death Valley" up at Duke for a 33-man squad to be able to do very much with them.

The statement that ECO gave a good account of itself although losing will doubtless prompt the statement from many Greenville folks as to just what Bill Dole has for a squad this year. Not too many people know the answer because all his drills, with very few exceptions, have been behind locked gates.

From where we sit, it looks very much like the Pirates are going to have a good first team and

questionable reserve strength. There are sixteen lettermen from last year's squad but after you get past them, there are a bunch of untried men that will have to be used.

The ends, of course, are well manned by Bobby Hodges and Dwight Shoe. Hodges, according to a report out of Raleigh yesterday, is being boomed as the best end in the state. His performance Saturday lent a lot of weight to that claim and Dole will have to do very little worrying about him this year. There's one letterman and two freshmen backing up Hodges and Shoe.

Bill McDonald and Don McKenzie will handle the tackle posts. Both these boys are lettermen and are backed up with some fairly good material but the real reserve lies in a freshman, Bobby Thomas of Henderson.

Doc Smith and George Graybill, both lettermen, will do the guard work and they have two lettermen and a freshman to back them up. Jesse Aldridge, one of the reserves, turned in a bang-up job Saturday.

At center, it looks like Pete Meadows is going to get the nod over three lettermen. Meadows, a from Kingston and is a senior that has not lettered as yet according to the squad roster. Luke Taylor of Greenville, Frank Madigan of Portsmouth, and Bob Bradley of Rocky Mount are backing up Meadows.

It was thought at first that Sandy Siler had the quarterbacking job all sewed up, but Lyn Grissom of Wilmington has come along so fast that it will be difficult for Dole not to use him a great deal. Both are juniors and Grissom's work in the Duke scrimmage would hint that Dole is counting on him for a great deal of work this year. According to reports, Lyn did most of the quarterbacking and did a good job of it.

The halfbacks are manned by two lettermen and Illard Yarborough, a High Point man. Yarborough and Jack Britt will get the starting nods from Dole with Jack Benzies, Jimmy Harris and Tom Albrook forming the relief column.

Fullback is capably filled by John Daughtry, the letterman from Wilmington. His plugging through the Duke line Saturday was one of the highlights of the day's work by the Pirates and Dole has very little worry coming to him from Daughtry. Two freshmen are his understudies.

Local folks won't get to see the Pirates until October 6 when they come to College Stadium in the annual Pirate Homecoming game. Before that date, however, trip will be made to Hattiesburg, Miss., Portsmouth and Norfolk, Va.

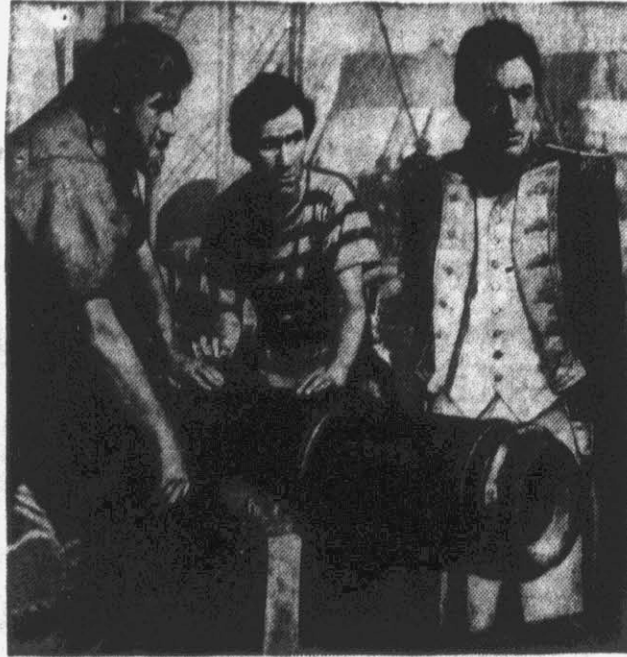

Sanitariums Map New Inspections

Local sanitarians and school officials met in Williamston Friday for an instructional session in the coming school plant inspections.

D. H. Conley, superintendent of the county schools, and W. M. Fate and Dean Futrell, sanitarians from the local health department, attended the meeting in Williamston in which inspection forms and the distribution of the farms were discussed in relation to the inspection of schools in the county and city which will take place as soon as possible.

The inspection will be the first of its kind in the county and the state which will take place twice a year, one before Christmas and once after. Previously the lunchrooms in the schools have stood inspection but now the entire school plant will undergo inspection.

In the coming inspection, sanitarians will note the following things about the school plant: Water supply and supply of drinking fountains; number of toilets in the school and the cleanliness of them; lavatory facilities; lighting and ventilation; garbage disposal units; dressing and shower rooms; and the outside area of the schools.

The inspection of school plants grew out of a meeting in which representatives of the State Board of Public Instruction, the State Board of Health, school principals, supervisors, and superintendents met to set up standards for school officials to aim toward.

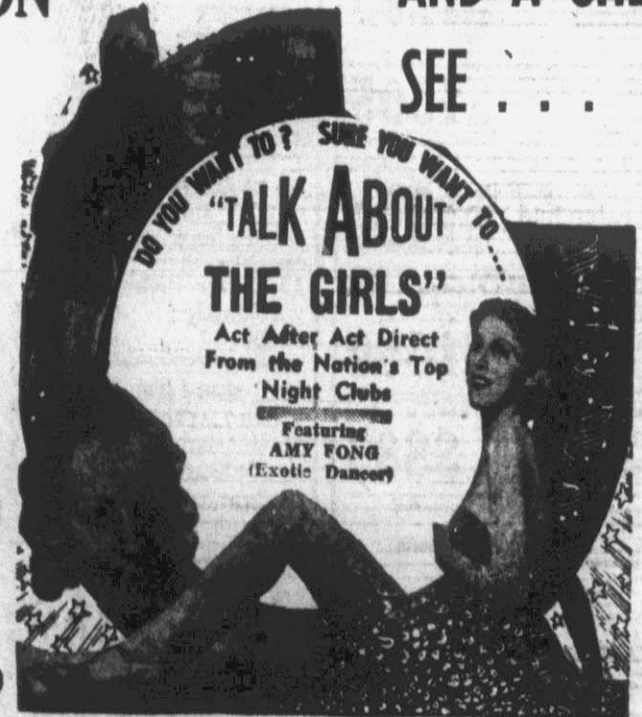
