

June In Winter

June weather continues to prevail in this part of the country. The temperature yesterday rose to 75 degrees. Lowest last night, 54, and at 8 a.m. today the mercury stood at 65. No rain; foggy and cloudy last night and during the forenoon today.

Yesterday a year ago, the highest temperature in the

Greenville area was 68 degrees. Lowest that night, 35, three degrees above freezing, and at 8 a.m. next day it was 36. Nearly three-fourths of an inch of rain fell during the 24-hour period, Mrs. Carl E. Malden, local observer for the U. S. Weather Bureau, reported.

Talked Self Into Serious Trouble

Ethel Hazelton, Negro, talked herself into trouble—serious trouble—Wednesday about midnight when she went to the Greenville police station to swear out a warrant against her husband, Nathan Hazelton, on the charge of assaulting her with his fists.

Police arrested her on the charge of assaulting her husband with a deadly weapon—a switch-blade knife—and put her in jail.

The woman was not too positive about her husband assaulting her, Capt. W. D. Berg said.

She asked one of the officers on duty at the station, "What would you do if I told you I had stabbed my husband?"

The officer replied, "We would lock you up," and she tossed a long-bladed knife on the sergeant's desk, and said, "Yes, I cut him."

Sgt. C. H. Christopher and W. M. Carr were present when she made the confession.

Lt. W. E. Peterson took the woman in the police car in an effort to locate her wounded husband. They did not find him. The woman spent the night in jail. Next day, Deputy Sheriff Jasper Lee Mills found Hazelton at a rural point. A cut in one of his arms required several stitches.

In Police Court Friday Ethel Hazelton pleaded guilty of assault with a deadly weapon. Judge Charles H. Whedbee gave her 30 days in jail, suspended on payment of \$10 and ordered her to be of good behavior for six months and not possess any deadly weapon during that time.

James Battle, Negro, charged with perjury in connection with swearing to a warrant against Chesterfield Payton, Negro, charging him with assault with a deadly weapon, was bound over to Superior Court on probable cause.

William T. Richardson, Negro, charged with raping Louise Dell Simmons, 17-year-old Negro girl, was bound over to Superior Court on probable cause. The girl testified that she was riding in a car with Richardson and that she was afraid of him and that he forced his attention upon her. Her parents swore out the warrant against Richardson.

Arthur J. Morris, Negro, assault with a deadly weapon, was given 30 days, suspended on payment of \$10.

Alex Moore, Negro, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, was given 30 days in jail, suspended on payment of \$5 for the use of Harvey Moore, Negro, and \$15 court costs and medical expenses.

Assault on a female: James Davis, Negro, 60 days on the roads, suspended on good behavior and he is not to violate any law for a year. Eric Fields, truck driver, paid \$15 for having "over the road limit" on his vehicle.

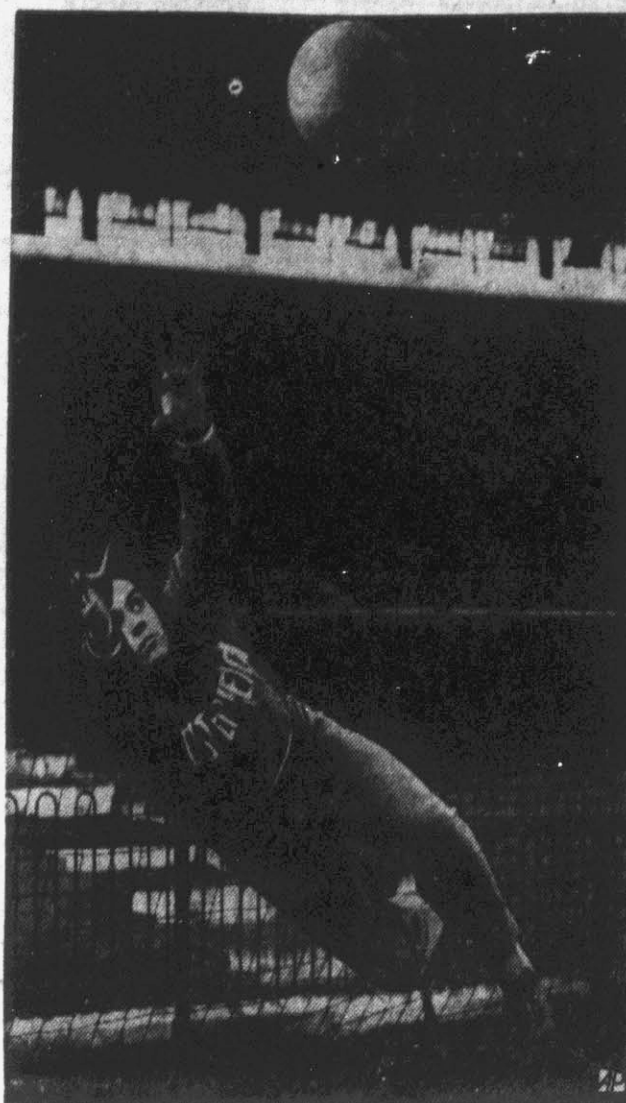
Drunk: Robert L. Gardner, Negro, \$15; Cecil Allen, \$10.

Judge Whedbee explained yesterday that a defendant is fined \$10 for his first offense of being drunk. The next time, the fine goes up to \$15, and so on for succeeding offenses, until it gets to \$40, and then the judge sends the guilty one to the roads.

forgetting this policy was followed by the big banks of Germany where these Pension Plans started. As a result, the money was entirely wiped out with a total loss to everybody. Other Banks want to buy stocks now selling at an average of \$270, forgetting that these stocks sold at only \$42 in 1932 and may again. Other Banks want to buy only corporation bonds, ignoring the continual decline in the value of the Dollar, as do the Life Insurance Companies. Finally, there are Banks which follow all three policies under the "shotgun" theory. The correct procedure is for the Committee, after employing outside independent advice, to consult with the Bank about the policy. AND INFORM THE WAGEWORKERS QUARTERLY THEREON. This cannot be done by using an insurance company.
