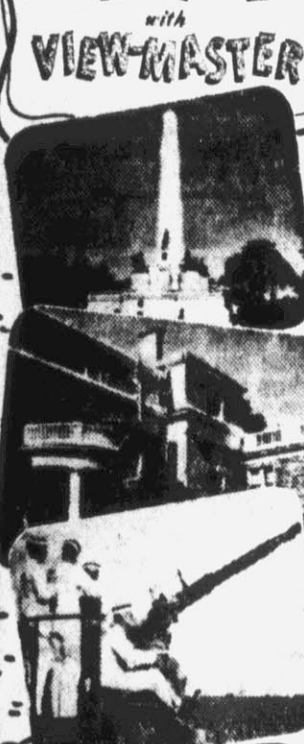

Women In The Church

"The Honor Society of the Healing and Helping" which three years ago founded the Methodist Hall of Fame in Philanthropy under the guidance of the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist Church, this year honored three women and one man as "outstanding contributors of time, talent, and money to money to Methodist philanthropic institutions." They were named to membership in the Hall of Fame. Only seventeen persons have achieved this distinction. Those honored were Miss Katherine F. Lenroot, long the head of the Children's Bureau in Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Mary L. Crossman, of Shaker Heights, Ohio, and Mrs. Emma Lang, of Cleveland, both with records of gifts and service to the Methodist Children's Home in Berea, Ohio, and Swane Burris Lawrence, of Jackson, Miss., a benefactor of the Mississippi Orphan Home.

Manufacturers of war toys in Japan were criticized recently at a Christian peace meeting at Doshisha University as having a bad influence on the future generation of Japan. Delegates to the meeting are urging religious, educational, and civic organizations to seek enactment of legislation that would prohibit the manufacture of war toys. They passed a resolution stating that Japanese people cherish a hope that war will never be repeated and that toys are important tools in the education of children. Toys referred to in the resolution include wooden samurai swords which bespeak Japan's thousand-year-old military tradition. They are on sale everywhere from the plush shops in Tokyo to the smallest Japanese hamlets. More modern toys include war jeeps with sirens and spark-shooting machine guns, warships, and PT boats with multi-cell electrical power units to propel them through the water.

Three thousands delegates will attend the 19th national convention of the Young Women's Christian Association in Chicago, Ill., May 1-7. "Living Our Faith" is theme for the conference at which Dr. Carlos P. Romulo, Philippine ambassador to the United States, is keynote speaker. Delegates include visitors from 65 foreign countries. Students, office, factory and farm workers, and housewives from the U. S. will attend. A strong public affairs program with support for civil liberties, the United Nations, and federal education aid will be urged.

After installing a 13-man cabinet of the National Revolutionary party MNR, the victorious rebels last night sent a delegation by plane to Buenos Aires to invite Paz Estenssoro the party's chief to return. He said he would accept the bid.

Students at the University of North Carolina from Martin and Pitt Counties were listed on the Honor Roll for the quarter just ending.

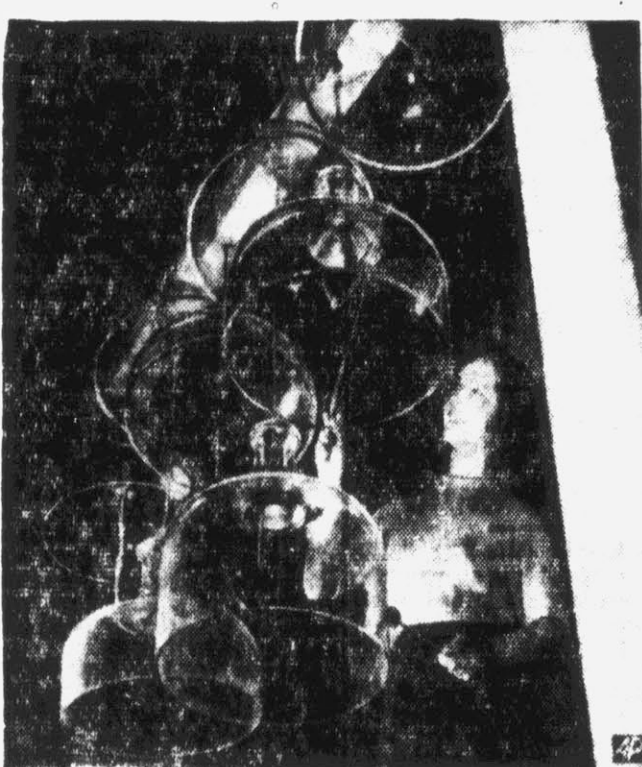

Eisenhower And Taft Supporters Fire Final Shots

NEWARK, N. J. (UP)—Supporters of Sen. Robert A. Taft and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower fired last minute broadsides today before the candidates clash head-on tomorrow in what may be a "turning point" primary for both men.

Eisenhower needed a "clear cut" victory in the industrial state to keep his campaign rolling in high gear. A strong vote for Taft would offset the damage his vote-pulling reputation suffered in the New Hampshire and Minnesota primaries and bolster his stock tremendously.

Political observers generally conceded New Jersey to Eisenhower. But there was ample evidence the voting may be close, a factor favorable to Taft, and Eisenhower backers have urged a heavy turnout.

With mild weather in the offing, election officials predicted that almost a record 1,000,000 of the state's 2,400,000 eligible voters would participate, far outdistancing the old record of 588,000 ballots cast in the 1940 presidential primary.

Former Minnesota Gov. Harold E. Stassen also was entered in the GOP primary, but he was given little chance despite a week-long speaking tour throughout the state.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, who moved into the state today for a brief whirlwind campaign, was unopposed on the democratic ballot. However, delegates are not bound by the result.

The state GOP organization, headed by Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll, has entered a full slate of convention delegates. The governor, a leading Eisenhower backer, said his slate would go to the national convention "morally bound" to the winner of the primary.

Taft, who closed his state headquarters and scrapped his speaking tour in the state when Driscoll openly endorsed Eisenhower, has no delegates entered, although 13 independent candidates are unofficially pledged to him.

Stassen has entered a full slate of 10 delegates at large and district delegates in seven of the 14 congressional districts. Four backers of Gen. Douglas MacArthur are running for "at large" seats.

Taft conceivably could win seats even if he loses the popularity tests, and Driscoll's entire slate is elected. The governor's delegation would be committed to Eisenhower if it wins by a substantial majority but several members who personally favor Taft might bolt if the margin for the general is small.

Library Use In County Increases

Readers in Pitt County borrowed 21,282 books in March for home use from the libraries in the county.

The figure shows an increase of \$398 or 48 percent over March of 1951. At the Sheppard Memorial Library, headquarters of the library system in the county, 65 percent of the books loaned were to adults and high school students.

For the entire county the picture is reversed with 61 percent being borrowed for children under high school age.

The figure, broken down into county and city libraries (K. Sheppard Memorial Library, 5,906; bookmobile, 11,506; Carver Branch Library, 1,574; Ayden, 802; Bethel, 500; Farmville, 674; Fountain, 131; and Winterville, 69).

More than 600 new books were added to the book stock in March and 101 new borrowers registered at the Sheppard Memorial Library.

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Whole Towns Evacuated As Missouri River Crest Rolls Toward Sioux City

SIoux CITY, Ia. (UP)—Whole towns were abandoned today in the greatest mass evacuation in the history of Iowa and Nebraska as the crest of the Missouri River—running almost three stories deep—neared Sioux City.

Like refugees in a war zone, the displaced fled in trucks and automobiles, aboard trains and on foot. An estimated 40,000 persons at major points along the river left their homes, their businesses and most of the possessions in the merciful advance of the Missouri—a river gone wild in the greatest flood in its history.

And the Red Cross estimated that flood waters in seven Midwest states have brought damage to 75,000 persons.

The Iowa towns of Sloan, Whiting, Blencoe and Riverside became ghost cities along with the Nebraska communities of Dakota City and South Sioux City.

And downstream at the large cities of Omaha, Neb., and Council Bluffs, Ia., on opposite shores of the Missouri, 30,000 persons were ordered out. Council Bluffs will be three-fourths deserted when the evacuation is complete.

Armed men patrolled the abandoned towns in boats to prevent looting of the deserted homes and business establishments.

The Missouri churned like a muddy mountain rapids past Sioux City at 24.1 feet. It was expected to creep up to almost 25 feet when it crested.

It pounded at weakening bridges, using as battering rams the accumulation of furniture, tanks, trees and the thousand other items of debris it had snatched up in its furious race to the south.

Every hour, a train made up of a locomotive hauling one freight car and one passenger car made the perilous trip across the river bringing refugees from the Nebraska side to the safety of the Iowa highlands.

Across the river, South Sioux City, Neb., was evacuated.

A short distance downstream at Dakota City, Neb., 3,000 persons carrying clothing, sacks of canned food and family pets streamed out of the town yesterday ahead of the advancing waters.

Sloan and Whiting, although a full five miles from the regular bed of the river, were abandoned as the stream spread wider and wider, eating up the lowland areas in its path.

And to the south, long lines of trucks rumbled out of Council Bluffs. They were loaded with evacuees fleeing while there was still time to leave.

The Missouri was expected to crest there Thursday at 30 feet.

Throughout Council Bluffs and East Omaha, Neb., the lowland district of the Nebraska city, Easter parades were long caravans of moving people, escaping from the onslaught in store for their homes.

And along the river itself, the back-breaking task of sandbagging went forward. Ministers from their pulpits joined city officials in appeals for all "able bodied men" to work on the levees.

Gov. Val Peterson declared a state of emergency in the Nebraska flood zone.

Gov. William S. Beardsley of Iowa appealed to President Truman to declare the stricken counties of Iowa along the river to be disaster areas.

South Dakota's Gov. Sigurd Anderson requested federal aid.

Gov. C. Elmer Anderson of Minnesota said he might appeal to the President to declare portions of his state a disaster zone.

Aga Khan Gift Turns Up Lost

BOMBAY (AP)—More than a third of the \$1,333,710 which the Aga Khan donated to his Kola Moslem followers in 1947 has been lost to the beneficiaries.

The presentation came after the diamond jubilee celebration of the Aga Khan when he was weighed against diamonds in Bombay. The Aga Khan had given the money, equal in value to the diamonds, for the improvement of educational facilities.

Shortly after the deposit of \$514,500 of the funds in a banking concern, the firm went into liquidation and the money was lost.

Fowl-Breeding Farm Is Opened

HUE, Vietnam, Indo-China (AP)—There's a new fowl-breeding farm in operation near this ancient former capital city of the Emperors of Annam.

Equipment for establishing the farm was supplied through the American Mutual Security Administration program. The farm was formally opened by U. S. Minister Donald R. Heast.

'Plain' Bandits Give Selves Up

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Several groups of armed outlaws, totalling 192 men, have given themselves up to authorities in the rice district of West Java, according to police reports.

The report said they did not belong to any political combat group but were "ordinary bandits" who had operated in the area since before World War II.

Umstead Favors Salary Boosts

DURHAM (UP)—William B. Umstead, running for the Democratic nomination for governor, today said he favors using surplus state funds to raise pay of teachers and other state employees by "at least 10 per cent."

Umstead said this would be possible in the fiscal year 1952-53 "if tax collections continue on the present basis." He referred to the \$37,000,000 surplus Revenue Commissioner Eugene Shaw figured the state will have by the end of this fiscal year.

Umstead said if elected he would recommend and urge legislation to raise salaries of teachers and state employees.

The candidate also announced his speaking schedule for the week beginning with the Goldsboro Kiwanis Club tonight at 6:30 p.m.

Tomorrow he will speak at a joint meeting of the Lenoir and Wake Forest Rotary clubs in Lenoir and tomorrow afternoon will speak at the Franklin County courthouse.

Wednesday he will be in Charlotte to address the state convention of the League of Women Voters with his strongest rival, Hubert Olive. Both candidates also will appear together on Thursday at a meeting of the Dunn Information Clinic.

Friday Umstead will tour Johnston County and Saturday will speak at a Hillsboro barbecue.

John L. Fristoe of Greenville, junior at East Carolina College, has been elected president of the ACE chapter of the Association for Childhood Education for 1952-1953. He is the first man ever to hold this office in the organization.

Other newly elected officers include Vivian Mercer, Raleigh, first vice president; Rebecca Pale, Raleigh, second vice president; Alice Robertson, Wilson, third vice president; Patricia Corbett, Farmville, corresponding secretary; Elaine Smith, Wilmington, secretary-treasurer; Janice Meekins, Stumpy Point, Miti Wainwright, Durham, and Janet Kirkland, Durham, are members.

Approximately thirty colleges in the state will be represented at the retreat, which has the purpose of training newly elected council members.

Teaches English, Learns Mandarin

SINGAPORE (AP)—An enterprising young teacher from New York City is working out his own mutual assistance program here.

Peter Lewis, 21, said it works this way: he teaches English to about 40 pupils in a Singapore high school while they, as well as some of their Chinese instructors, teach him Mandarin.

To make the tedious process of learning Mandarin seem a little less like a chore, Peter is living in a Y. M. C. A. "rest house" for Chinese teachers.

Ban 'Sidelines' Within Party

HONG KONG (AP)—The Chinese Communists are out to liquidate a sort of free enterprise system that grew up inside the party organization during the civil war.

Many communist political and military units, stationed far afield, developed farms, factories and even heavy industry centers. Surpluses were sold at a profit, usually exclusively for the Communist big shots who ran them.

Now the Peking regime has told them to turn the businesses over to the central government. The Peking party mouthpiece, Liberation Daily, says such enterprises must go because they are susceptible to "bourgeois erosion."

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Shot 6 Times In Breaking Jail

WILMINGTON (UP)—Hospital authorities described as "poor" today the condition of a Negro shot six times in a berserk attempt to break jail with a wrench and crowbar.

James Edward Stanley, 200-pound, six-foot Negro, was jailed in an assault charge. He was placed in a cell at New Hanover County jail with several other prisoners.

Jailer Marion Ross said the other prisoners objected that Stanley was beginning to act "peculiar" and asked that he be removed. While Ross was taking him to another cell Stanley broke away and fled into Ross' apartment.

He picked up the wrench and crowbar and ran out of the room. Officers said he refused to surrender or drop his weapons. He swung at highway patrol Sgt. A.H. Clark and knocked him down. As Clark tried to rise the Negro knocked him flat again.

Then police Sgt. Luke Rourke drew his gun and told Stanley to halt. The Negro swung the wrench at Rourke, missed, and started toward him.

Rourke shot him in the left arm and left leg and failed to stop him. As the Negro came on Rourke shot four more times. All of the shots were through the arms and legs except one, which hit the man in the neck.

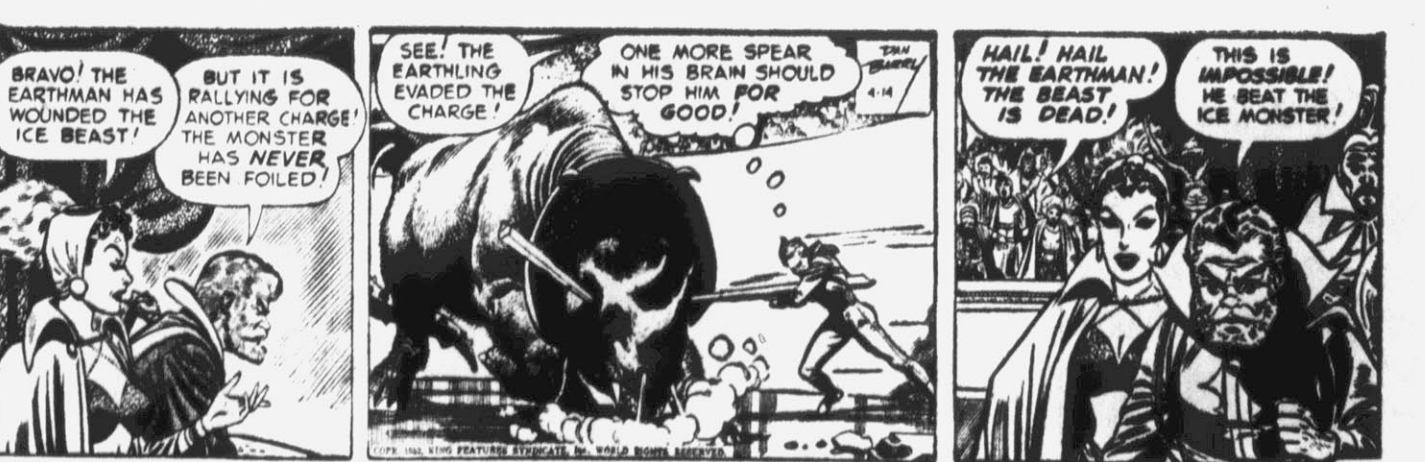

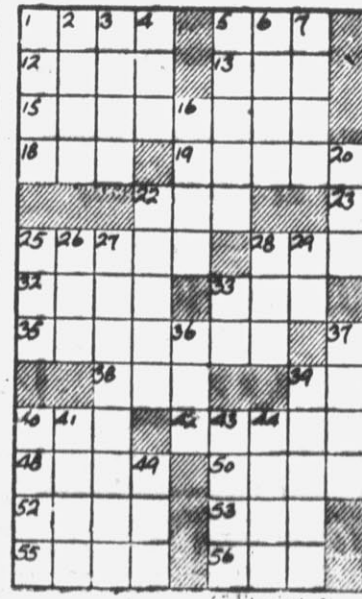
