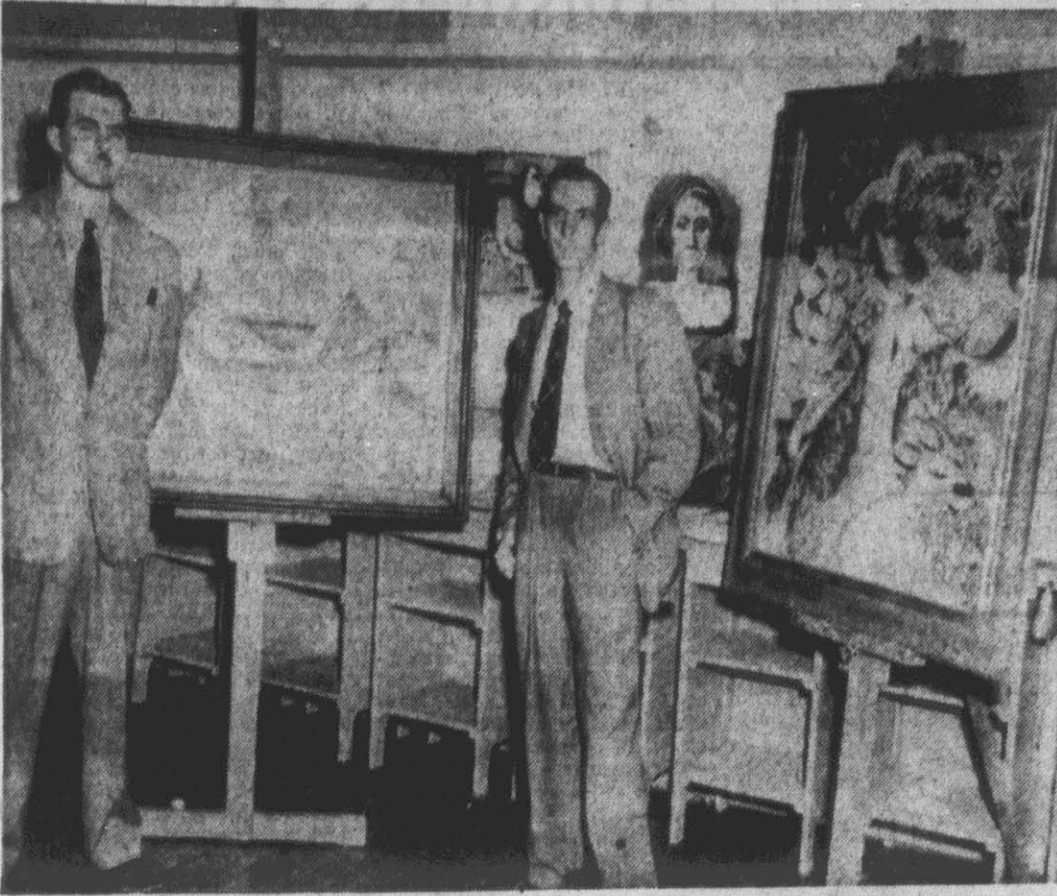


Their Art Work Is Currently On Exhibit

John Gordon and Francis Lee Neel, faculty members of the department of art at East Carolina College, are currently exhibiting twenty-one of their works at the Community Art Gallery of the Sheppard Memorial Library of Greenville.

Included in the exhibition are oils, gouache paintings, etchings, and mobile sculpture. Subjects treated by the college artists are seascapes, human figures, animals, and abstract designs.

The exhibition is Mr. Gordon's first since he joined the East Carolina faculty last September. A native of Kentucky, he holds the degree of master of fine arts from the University of Iowa and has studied in France at the Beaux Arts School in Marseilles and at Biarritz University. At the college he teaches courses in aesthetics, art education, and drawing.

Mr. Neel, who has previously exhibited his works locally at the annual Pitt County Community Arts Festival and at the city and the college libraries, is acting director of the department of art at East Carolina. His etchings, water colors, and oil paintings have won prizes in several exhibitions in his home state of Missouri, and one of his works was recently included in a regional exhibition at the High Museum in Atlanta, Georgia.

Eisenhower Extended Olive Branch To Congressmen

WASHINGTON (AP) — With Truman's sour congressional relations still fresh in mind as he rode up to the Capitol, President Eisenhower tried a different approach.

He carried an olive branch with him, wrapped up in his State of the Union message. He made it pretty plain in his 14-page, and very conciliatory, talk that he wants to get along with Congress. Here and there he may have caused some momentary irritations. For instance, to Southern Democrats when he said he will try to end racial segregation in the nation's capital.

And those members of Congress who had their heart set on cutting taxes right away must have felt hurt when he warned Congress to go slow on cutting taxes. But on the whole the message stroked the congressional fur, the right way. Whether or not, in the end, his relations with Congress turn out to be any better than Truman's is something the next few years will have to show. It would have been extraordinary if, less than two weeks in the job, he could have unraveled a complete blueprint of his program. It wasn't expected of him and he didn't attempt it.

Almost at the start of his message he explained he was too new

in the presidency to lay down now, all in one bundle, his administration's plans in detail.

So his message was a mixture of many generalities and some specific suggestions. Therefore, the rest of his program will have to be revealed piece by piece as events and months unfold.

Even where he made a recommendation he was sometimes vague. For instance, he suggested changes in the Taft-Hartley Labor Act but didn't say what changes.

His Labor Department is working on them, he explained.

He promised mutual security to other nations but qualified it by saying they will get help from the U.S. only in the "measure that they strive earnestly to do their full share of the common task."

No one, in fairness, can quarrel with any of this. No president in a State of the Union message ever spells out ABC precisely what he has in mind on every subject.

Over 1,500 Pints Of Blood Donated

Since January, 1952, and through December, 1952, more than 1,500 pints of blood have been donated by Pitt County citizens through the Red Cross Bloodmobile.

The Red Cross blood program in Pitt County was inaugurated during January of last year with its first visit of the bloodmobile being to Greenville. Since that time, the bloodmobile has visited Greenville, East Carolina College, and other towns in the county, totaling 12 visits.

Since Pitt County became a participating county in the blood program, blood has been sent to Pitt Memorial Hospital several times monthly and more than 870 pints of blood have been administered free of charge except for administration costs.

Not only have Pitt County citizens received blood at the local hospital but 77 pints have been furnished to other hospitals, outside the county, for local persons. In addition 101 units of plasma have been sent to

Pitt Memorial. A portion of the blood donated in the county has gone overseas to service personnel and just recently, a portion of the blood donated to the Red Cross is going into a serum for polio, gamma globulin.

Mrs. George F. Seaborn, assistant administrative director of the Tidewater Regional Blood Center, said that Pitt has helped in meeting the defense quota of blood and is doing its part well in the blood program.

No Medals For Turkish Soldier In Patrol Fight

WITH THE TURKISH BRIGADE IN KOREA (UP)—A Turkish soldier, riddled with burp gun slugs and mortar fragments, lived to tell today how he slashed his way out of a Chinese trap in a bloody bayonet battle.

Wounded in five places and wielding a broken rifle, the Turk cut four Chinese to death and sent two others fleeing in the darkness. His one-man, steel-blade assault broke up a trap that had threatened to annihilate an eight-man patrol.

But Cpl. Abdurrahman Can, 22, of Hatay, Turkey, will receive no medal for his heroism because his government does not permit military awards.

"When I go home, my father will say to me: 'My son, you fought well.' Can said. "That will be my award."

The nightmarish battle, punctuated with screams from dying Reds, opened after a Turkish patrol had waited three hours for the Chinese to cross its path in no-man's land.

"We hadn't seen a single Chinese, so I started scouting for enemy foot tracks which we could follow," Can said.

His search uncovered a Communist trap to cut off the Turks from their own lines.

"I spotted a Chinese soldier through the moonlight standing about 35 yards behind the patrol," Can related. "He fell when I shot but he blasted back at us with his burp gun."

One Turk was wounded before Can pumped enough lead in the Chinese to silence the gun.

"Another Chinese jumped up near the dead one and then our automatic rifleman called for help from behind me," the young soldier said. "We were surrounded."

Three Chinese closed in on the automatic rifleman.

Can's rifle would not fire. With a whip of his hand Can pulled his bayonet, locked it on the crippled rifle and charged the three Reds.

"Then everything hit me at once," he said.

Three bullets splattered in his hips and one cut a hole in his leg. Then a grenade exploded behind him, hurling jagged shrapnel into his back.

"I didn't feel any pain. I kept on running. I had only one idea—to kill Reds," Can said.

Two of the Chinese ran when they saw the bleeding Turk, his bayonet gleaming in the moonlight. Can leaped at the third one. "I rammed my bayonet into his chest and lifted him off the ground," he said. "Then I pointed the rifle down the way they taught us, and he slid off the blade and crumpled at my feet."

"When a Turk is wounded, he makes a little noise that sounds like 'ah.' But the Chink screamed like a dying dog."

A few minutes later the bleeding Can saw three more Chinese. He staggered toward them and jabbed his blood-wet bayonet into the chest of one.

Eisenhower Also Set Match Book Sales Record

NEW YORK (UP)—Chalk up another record in the tide that swept Dwight D. Eisenhower into the White House.

His campaign broke all marks for the number and variety of match books issued on behalf of a candidate by his supporters, according to Sam Rosen, a resident-buyer whose hobby is collecting advertising match books. He claims to have the best collection of "political" among his million fellow "philomathists."

"I like Ike" match books, Rosen found, were the first used to raise funds. In other campaigns, their cost had been a modest part of candidates' advertising budgets. But last fall many local groups supporting the general sold match books at a nickel apiece—in most cases, a 400 per cent profit.

Definite figures on the number of match books were used to boost the new president can never be obtained, Rosen explained, because many enthusiasts placed separate orders for them and often purchased blank match books to be imprinted locally.

\$11 a Cover

However, one match company reported that in New Hampshire alone it had provided 100,000 "Ike" match books in different designs.

The original political match book appeared in 1900, not long after a Milwaukee brewer started the practice of putting commercial messages on match books—a practice now followed by a quarter-million firms a year, enabling Americans to get nine-tenths of their 12,500,000,000 match books free.

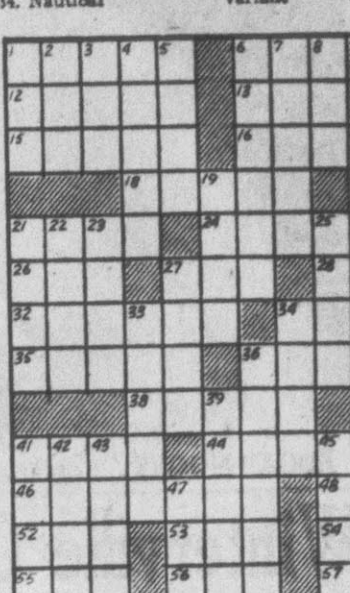
The first, political advertiser, C. W. Beals, rode to Congressional office from the Gettysburg district on his match book slogan, "From Plow Boy to Successful Business Man." Coincidentally, Mr. Eisenhower is a Gettysburg farm owner.

Every president since William Howard Taft has given out souvenir match books from the White House and most have used match books in campaigning, Rosen said. Among the highest valuations in match books for collectors is the Truman-Barley inaugural dinner match cover, valued at \$11 today.

But Rosen feels this may be surpassed by the 12,500 books made for the Eisenhower-Nixon inauguration by the Diamond Match Company, which had the plates destroyed so it would be a "limited edition."

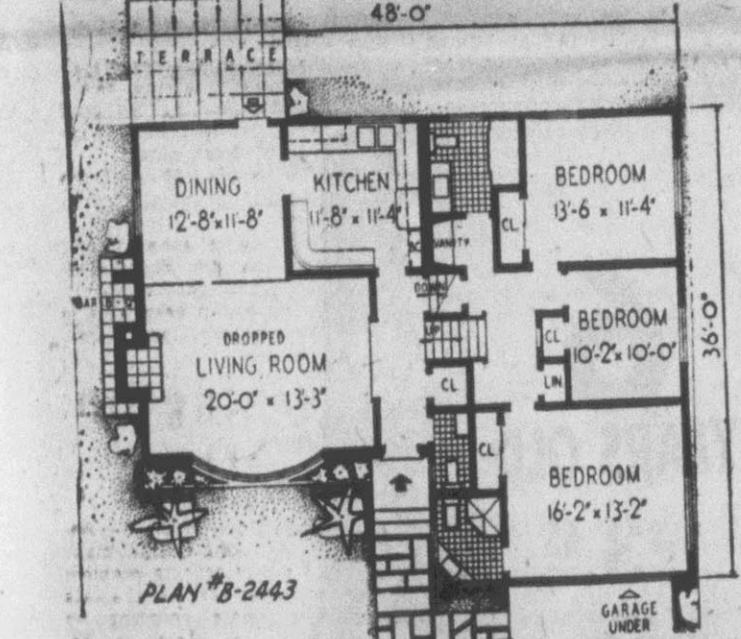

ON THE HOUSE

All houses are heated in one of two ways: by convection, meaning the warming and circulation of air, and by radiation, which consists of rays like light rays, of longer wave length.

No matter if you put an old fashioned coal stove in the middle of the living room, or install the latest new fangled heating plant, the heat is going to be spread by either or both of these means. The only other way heat travels is by conduction. Like the handle of a spoon getting hot in a kettle of boiling tripe. And since we don't intend to serve up any tripe here, you can forget about conduction. It's minor around a house, even in the matter of heat loss.

So you can count on all heating systems boiling down more or less to different methods of making use of convection and radiation.

Forced warm air is complete convection. Panel heating, such as hot water coils embedded in floors or ceilings, depends entirely on radiation. In the floor, a coil's conduction may warm the floor, but you depend on its radiation to warm you.

Hot water or steam radiators that stand out from the wall provide radiation plus some convection. The convection is created by the air circulating between units of the radiator. This is what makes curtains get dirty in a hurry when a radiator is placed under a window to counteract the chill from the window.

However, radiators take up space in a room and present problems in the placement of furniture—the same as warm air registers do. You can't recess the old-fashioned cast iron radiator in the wall without sacrificing much of its efficiency.

So manufacturers have contrived new ways to provide convection and radiation. One is the modern convactor. Another is the radiant baseboard. A third is a painted metal baseboard with slots for air circulation and containing a convactor unit in the baseboard.

The convactor is one of the most interesting modern inventions for getting more heat out of the same amount of fuel. It is a thin-fin radiator. Its thin fins heat more air because they provide more heated surface than that on a big cast iron radiator.

The convactor's efficiency is based on the fact that warm air rises and forces cold air to the floor, thereby setting up a constant circulation. Like radiators, they are usually placed where they will do

the most good, such as under windows—but they can be set into the wall, thereby saving room space.

This concealment can be very complete. The Plumbing and Heating Industries' Bureau points out that finger-tip control dampers serve a decorative purpose when a convactor is not in use, completely concealing the outlet grille and becoming part of the panel front.

Since cold is usually most noticeable from outer walls, perimeter heating has been developed by the engineers. Baseboard heating is an outstanding example.

Originally introduced as a cast iron unit, painted to take the place of the ordinary wooden baseboard, it depended almost entirely on radiant heat. In this form it often was necessary to extend the radiant baseboard around interior partitions to obtain sufficient radiation for the size of a room. This is still an attractive and practicable form of radiant heating.

However, combination radiant and convactor baseboards were soon developed. Slots at the bottom and tops of the baseboards allowed air to circulate and thinfin convectors were incorporated in the baseboard units. Since this type was first introduced in 1946 by Warren Webster & Co., manufacturers of baseboard heating have increased to more than 50.

"Efficient and economical," says the Plumbing and Heating Industries Bureau, "baseboard heating systems are well within the price range of the average home owner. They are easy to install in both new construction and modernization work."

Oregon State College, in a study of heating plants reported by John C. Campbell, found that "one can expect to install baseboard heating for no more than the cost of other hot water systems, and in many cases as much as 10 to 20 per cent less. This means it will cost approximately the same or slightly more than the average warm air system of similar capacity."

Piping for baseboard heating is simplified by the heating unit itself serving as a distribution medium. Doorways are merely piped under.

In rooms such as kitchens, where outer wall space may be covered by base cabinets, convectors are easily used as auxiliaries.

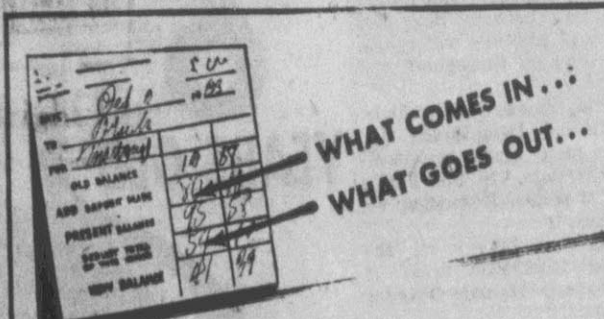

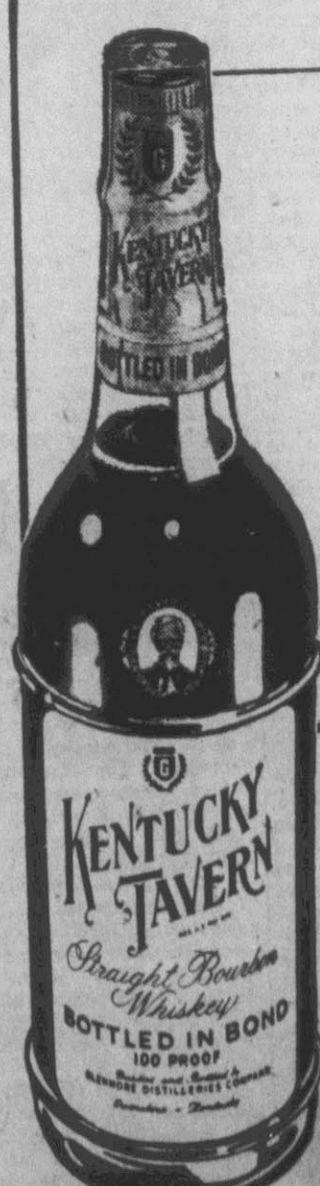
