British Ultimatum Ignored; Tanks Surround Suez City Egyptian Talks War

By WALTER COLLINS United Press Staff Correspondent CAIRO, Egypt (UP)— British tanks sealed off the city of Ismailia in the Suez Canal Zone today when Egypt ignored an ultimatum to return a kidnapped airman and an Egyptian minister talked of war to throw the British forces out.

The Egyptian cabinet met in emergency session here and arming cars sped to take posts controlling all strategic points in the city. Maj. Salah Salem, minister for national guidance, denouncing British action in a national radio broadcast, said Britain was now "a third rate power...morally and materially defeated everywhere, in India, Ireland, Iran, Pakistan, even Africa."

Salem said Egypt had been making preparations for the "forthcoming battle" for more than eight months and "we call upon you to wage it when these preparations are completed."

U.S. Hints Giveaway Without Soviet Or Satellite Gov't OK Food Gift Plans Proceed

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Voice of America hinted broadly today that the United States government may try to deliver food to hungry East Germans despite rejection by Russian and German Communist leaders.

Officials said the first shipments of flour, lard, dried milk and beans were already enroute to New York for shipment to Germany. And the White House said its offer was still open. It was believed likely further representations would be made to East Germany and to Russia.

Administration leaders said they had no intention of letting Moscow off the hook. They planned to make Russia pay politically and diplomatically for turning down the food.

President Eisenhower told Russia Friday the United States would ship \$15,000,000 in food to East Germany if it would lift the Iron Curtain enough to let it in.

Will Give Negotiators 'Chance' To Unite Korea Rhee Allowing Six Months

By EARNEST HOBERECHT United Press Staff Correspondent SEOUL, Korea (UP)—President Syngman Rhee promised today to keep his hands off the Korean armistice machinery for at least six months.

The 78-year-old South Korean president said, however, he would take action if a post-armistice political conference fails to do anything about unifying Korea within a reasonable time.

Rhee, in effect, gave the political conference 90 days to show proof of its intentions to unify Korea.

Western Foreign Ministers Told Southeast Asia Crisis Looms New Red Aggressions Feared Coming

By DONALD J. GONZALES United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON (UP)—The United States, Britain and France today faced the grim threat of a new flareup of Communist aggression in southeast Asia following an end of the Korean War.

Prospects of an early Korean truce and intelligence reports that Red China already is pumping new war supplies into Indochina were expected to be weighed today during the third meeting of the Big Three foreign ministers.

Before shifting attention to the Far East, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, acting British Foreign Secretary Lord Salisbury, and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault reviewed problems facing the Allies in Europe.

Indochina crisis came up when Bidault informed Dulles during Sunday that Red China in the last three months had "sharply increased" the flow of arms to Red rebels in Indochina.

ROKs Win Back Territory As Red Pressure Relaxes

By FREDERICK C. PAINTON SEOUL, Korea (UP)—South Korean troops took advantage of a lull in enemy activity today to regain territory seized by the Communists on the bloody east-central front.

Handymen of the 6th ROK Division reclaimed their lost property in a two-pronged drive on an out-post west of Finger Ridge captured by the Chinese two days ago.

The South Koreans split into two groups and linked on the crest of the outpost, driving off the Chinese defenders in a brief fight.

The Wisconsin Republican made the statement after his Senate investigating subcommittee questioned an unidentified witness for an hour behind doors.

McCarthy said the "shakedown" was submitted by the foreign nation "to get consideration that it was entitled to anyway."

Then we must join with other groups of citizens in our communities in challenging the attacks on our freedom. We must speak boldly even in the face of name-calling. We must resist the impression that mere retaliation of charges guarantees that they are true. We must employ all legitimate methods of writing, talking, and speaking so that others may know the truth. We must make a firm stand based on our knowledge and on principles."

## British Debate Over Romance Is Growing

LONDON (UP)—Britons heatedly took sides today in a growing controversy over whether 22-year old Princess Margaret should be permitted to marry 38-year old Group Capt. Peter Townsend — assuming that she wants to.  
The dispute raged in newspaper columns and church meetings. It threatened to spread to the floor of the House of Commons.  
Photographs of the smiling princess appeared on the first pages of many newspapers today, along with reports that she has recovered from a cold she contracted during a tour of southern Rhodesia, in Africa, with Queen Mother Elizabeth.

Saying "the time has come for the voice of the British people to be heard," the Daily Mirror invited its readers to mail in printed ballots answering "yes" or "no" to the question whether the princess should be permitted to marry Townsend, 16 years her senior, divorced and the father of two boys.  
Dr. Donald Soper, president of the Methodist Council, bitterly denounced the Mirror for its poll.  
"I want to protest as vigorously as I can in the name of this conference against the unwarrantable and disgusting intrusion into the affairs of that royal personage," he said.  
"Hear, hear," cried members of the conference.  
The influential Liberal party newspaper Manchester Guardian defended the idea of the marriage.  
"A section of the Church of England and the Roman Catholic Church might make a protest," the Guardian said. "But this is a private matter in which, so long as the law of the land is observed, we should not interfere."  
Even the Communist newspaper Daily Worker got in its say.  
After referring to "the real degrading servitude in which, for all their wealth, these living idols of the ruling classes are compelled to live," the Daily Worker said:  
"An ordinary decent people will say: Let Margaret marry who she likes, and turn off the spotlight, please."  
The Mirror, in inviting a poll of the marriage question, said:  
"A true and deep affection is reported to exist... but the church frowns on the remarriage of even the innocent parties in divorce... and Princess Margaret as third in succession to the throne, has great responsibilities in giving full weight to the church's attitude."

Southern Solons Buck McCarthy  
WASHINGTON (UP)—The Senate's "old guard" Southern bloc lined up almost solidly against Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy today in the furor over J. B. Matthews' charge about Communism in the Protestant clergy.  
Two of the most influential southerners, Sens. Burnet R. Maybank (D-S.C.) and Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.), have spoken out in strong terms against Matthews, the man McCarthy defended.  
Other key figures in the Southern delegation were united in approving the walkout.  
The triple resignation — Sens. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) and Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) joined McClelland — came as a protest against McCarthy's "one-man" rule. It followed a vote by the four Republicans of the subcommittee to give the Wisconsin Republican absolute authority to hire and fire staff members.  
Matthews wrote that "the largest single group" aiding the Communist apparatus in the United States is Protestant clergymen.  
Informed insiders said Byrd, McClelland and others in the potent "Disland" contingent were deeply concerned about the religious issue being raised, and were determined to buck McCarthy on any similar controversy. The "regular" Southern bloc forms the most powerful single group in the Senate.  
McCarthy has said several times he has no intention of investigating religion or clergymen. He also said he did not agree with the most controversial part of Matthews' article, the opening paragraph with the broadside charge about Protestant ministers.

# Second Term Of ECC Summer School Gets Under Way July 15

East Carolina College will begin the second term of the 1953 summer school Wednesday, July 15. A series of workshops, institutes, and conferences, planned mainly to interest and assist teachers in the public schools, are among special events scheduled for the July 15-August 21 period.

Registration for the term will take place in the Wright auditorium July 15. Enrollment of students will begin at 8:30 in the morning. Registrar Orval L. Phillips has announced. Class work will begin Thursday, July 16.

Sponsored by the department of library science at the college, a workshop extending throughout the term will deal with the elementary school library, its organization and administration. Mrs. Lily Rouse Carr of the East Carolina library staff will be director. The workshop is described as "a practical experience course specially designed for in-service teachers who may expect to assume responsibility for the elementary school library."

physical education department will direct the workshop and will be assisted in instruction and activities by members of the college staff and various consultants from state agencies. The course is planned to give teachers a better understanding of how to use the outdoors to supplement work in the classroom.

Conferences will include the Legal Aspects of Public School Administration, July 23, and a conference on Public School Administration, August 4. Dr. J.K. Long, director of the college education department, and Dr. E.M. Finck, visiting professor of education this summer, are in charge of the programs for these two events, respectively.

Dr. Ambrose Suhrie, formerly professor of education at New York University and a well-known writer and lecturer, will be principal speaker at the Eighth Annual Institute of the Northeastern District of the North Carolina English Teachers Association, scheduled for July 27. The theme of the institute program will be "Social Justice in American Song and Story." Dr. Suhrie will speak on "Edwin Mar-

ham: Prophet of Social Justice," Lois Grigsby of the college English department is chairman in charge of the program for the day.

## Two Jailed In Cutting Fracas

Two imported Negro tobacco workers, a man and a woman, both from Florida, were in Pitt county jail today, casualties of a Sunday night cutting fracas on a farm near Grifton.

A third man involved in the incident was taken to a Kinston hospital for treatment.

Jailed here after being given emergency care at the Pitt County hospital were Charles Williams, 31, and Ezelle Thomas, 26, both of whom reportedly were brought to the county within the last two weeks to aid in harvesting tobacco. Williams received cuts requiring four stitches in his left shoulder and four in his right hand, sheriff's officers stated. They said three stitches were taken in the Thomas woman's left hand.

Both were being questioned for further details by county officers this morning. Additional information was being sought at the Payton farm about a mile and a half east of Grifton where the incident reportedly took place.

## Camel, Elephant Found Between A

### Television Matures Kids More Quickly

By JACK GAYER United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK (UP) — Today's youngsters mature more quickly because of television, in the opinion of Lester Rand, president of the Youth Research Institute, an agency that specializes in surveys of the younger set to determine their buying habits, tastes and interests.

"Our surveys show that the precocity of youngsters who have watched television for the past three to five years is much greater than that of non-viewers," Rand explained.

Rand pointed out that, if for no other reason, the maturing process

is speeded by the kids early learning to imitate the singing, dancing, acting and speech of the TV performers. He also believes that TV viewing encourages youngsters to seek further information.

"Much that the child sees on TV is not easily understood by him," Rand pointed out. "So, he asks even more questions than is normal in childhood; he pays more attention to newspapers and other trading matter at an earlier age in order to satisfy a natural inquisitiveness that has been stimulated by television."

Rand said that adults are pretty much at the mercy of their children when it comes to choice of

programs in homes where there is only one television set. "Any parent may consider himself lucky, if he manages to view his choice when the youngsters want to watch something else," he said. "Parents have come to accept philosophically the vexing habit that many youngsters have of switching channels without warning."

"Our studies among youngsters from the ages of five through 14 show that 85 per cent of them encounter little trouble when it comes to watching the program they want. Any opposition that may arise usually comes from younger brothers or sisters. In such cases, a truce, of course, still leaves the parents generally looking at something they wouldn't watch if left to their own desires."

President and Mrs. Eisenhower are the only persons at the White House who rate a large, official limousine now. The President's is an air-conditioned Cadillac; Mrs. Eisenhower's, a Chrysler.

Presidential secretaries and other White House aides must ride in medium-sized autos. Early in the Eisenhower administration, the custom of giving each presidential secretary and other aides a large limousine, with chauffeur, was stopped. But they were permitted until recently to use the limousines in the White House garage on a pool basis.

The White House has switched most of its limousines for medium-sized cars. In addition to the two

of President and Mrs. Eisenhower, three other limousines—two Lincoln and a new air-conditioned Packard—are being kept for use of visiting dignitaries.

White House sources brand as "nonsense" the behind-the-scenes talk that Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams may be eased out. These sources say that President Eisenhower is fully satisfied with the job Adams is doing. Some Republicans have been grumbling privately that Adams is mainly responsible for the difficulties the President has had with Congress.

President Eisenhower has turned down an invitation to speak at the opening of the International Boy Scout Jamboree at Santa Ana, Calif., next Friday. But he will send a personal message to the scouts by tape recording which he made last week.

In casual conversation, President Eisenhower sometimes refers to his wife, Mamie, as "Mrs. Ike" and "my little gal."

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York had to do some fast backtracking in the White House last week upon a denial that he had an appointment with President Eisenhower. The fact was that the appointment had been made for him without his knowledge, and the White House reporters had been informed of it before he was.

# Lost Dutch Treasure Is Still Target Of Search

By MALCOLM UREN  
(Written for United Press)  
Six separate parties are now searching in the province of Western Australia for a treasure of 78,000 guilders (perhaps now worth about \$300,000) that was carried by a Dutch ship lost in 1656 while out-bound to the East Indies.

History relates when the ship was lost and how, but not precisely where.

From the evidence available the organizer of each of the six searching parties has formed his theory of where the treasure will be found and has led his party there. Someone must be wrong, because the field of search extends over about 170 miles—from about 150 miles north of Perth to 20 miles to the south.

There is no doubt about the existence of the treasure. A translation from authentic manuscript copies of the log-books in the Royal Archives at The Hague says the ship Der Vergulde Draeck (The Gilt Dragon) left Texel on Oct. 4, 1655, for the Dutch East Indies "with a rich cargo including 78,000 guilders in cash in eight boxes."

### Survivors Reported Lost

She was wrecked April 28, 1656, on the coast of Western Australia "on a reef stretching out to sea

about a mile and a half, latitude 30 2-3 degrees." News of the wreck was carried to Batavia by survivors in one of the small boats from The Gilt Dragon.

These men reported that they and others got ashore from the wreck, but "nothing was saved from the ship which foundered and sank at once, except a small quantity of provisions washed on shore by the waves."

Relief ships were immediately sent to pick up the castaways. Intensive search along the coast in the latitude given disclosed neither wreck nor survivors.

Some years later, the crew of the ship Waackende Boey, in a position given at 31 degrees 19 minutes, found "a piece of the mast of The Gilt Dragon. . . the round top and other trifling objects." Presumably they saw no sign of the actual wreck but only some wreckage that might have floated some distance.

From contemporary accounts, therefore we can be sure that there was treasure and it was not recovered.

For years the story seems to have slumbered, but towards the end of the last century two events revived interest in the treasure. Dutch coins dated 1618 and 1648 were found in a cave in the vicinity of the Moore River and a surveyor named Alfred E. Burt discovered a circle of stones, which, he said, was pointed to the locality where the Gilt Dragon's treasure was buried.

### New Interest Aroused

Burt was more enthusiastic than logical. Similar circles of stones—probably they are part of some native rite—exist all over Western Australia, but Burt's association of the stones with the treasure caused immediate excitement. Search parties went out and closely examined the area around the circle of stones. They found several other circles of stones but no treasure.

The current searching has resulted largely because an ex-soldier decided modern scientific methods of mineral detection would make the search easier. He purchased a mine detector and made a solo attempt to locate the treasure north of Perth.

Then an obviously man-made stone figure in the rough form of a Crusader with crossed feet was uncovered by a dairy farmer south of Fremantle, near Perth. This, he decided, must have been made by castaways from the Gilt Dragon and under it would be the treasure.

For two summers now—he cannot work in the winter because the water table rises too high—he has excavated in the vicinity and has not yet given up hope.

University students studied the evidence and began spending their vacations searching for the treasure. At least two of the six parties now in the field have scientific equipment for the detection of minerals.

### Pays Five-Cents He Owed 3 Years

POST, Tex. (UP)—A Ranger, Tex., youth, prodded by a guilty conscience, today paid off a five-cent debt he owed for three years. The youth wrote Bill Windham, owner of a filling station and grocery here, that he bought some airplane glue three years ago and told Windham it cost only 10 cents. Actually, he wrote, the glue was priced at 15 cents.

The lad, who enclosed a nickel in his letter, told Windham he had "done things worse, but nothing has ever bothered me like this before."

# Army's Gun Development Not Entirely New; Past Inventions Had Something

By **HARMAN W. NICHOLS**  
**WASHINGTON (UP)**—The Army is rightly proud of its M-48 tank, whose guns use interchangeable barrels. The Army thinks the idea of the barrels is something new. It isn't exactly new. While browsing through a record of old patents collected by Edward Rogers I came upon a somewhat similar gimmick.

It was invented by James Puckle of London in 1718 and was called a "portable gun." It fired both square and round bullets. Puckle's own description of his invention said:

"The shapes of the chambers may be changed and the bullets may be varied—some for shooting square bullets against Turks and round bullets against Christians."

The rare collection describes many other old and interesting inventions.

In 1885 Herbert W. T. Jenner of Washington patented a new-fangled liquor flask. It was designed to "conceal the flask and at the same time admit of ready access to the contents." The drawing of the invention displayed the flask encased

in a book with a phony inside. The title of the book was "Legal Decisions."

August Lindquist of Iowa in 1899 invented what he called a "grave alarm," describing it thusly:

"My invention is related to improvements in grave alarms; whereby persons who are prematurely buried before life is extinct, can sound an alarm, thus notifying the cemetery officials of the fact."

The invention also somehow was to provide fresh air.

Herbert Morley Small of Baldwinville, Mass., in 1899 came up with a new kind of hammock to be used on trains so the travelers could "sleep with ease and comfort." His drawing showed a man swinging away in the hammock, with his feet draped over the seat in front of him—which was empty. He looked at ease and in comfort.

In 1897 Merrill H. Cram of La Crosse Wis., got to thinking that if hens weren't so lazy maybe they would lay more eggs. So he invented "a device to keep hens from sitting."

A hen would squat on a nest and if she was smart soon would get used to getting her job done in a hustle and be on her way. Under the straw was concealed a bunch of pins. Cram theorized that if the hen got up and moved around after she had dropped her egg "she would be in a better condition to lay another litter of eggs in a shorter time."

The inventor said in a note attached to his drawing that he had tried his no-sitter on his own biddies and wasn't exactly satisfied with his results. "My hens were too smart," he said. "Pretty soon they were laying eggs all over the place and avoiding my device."

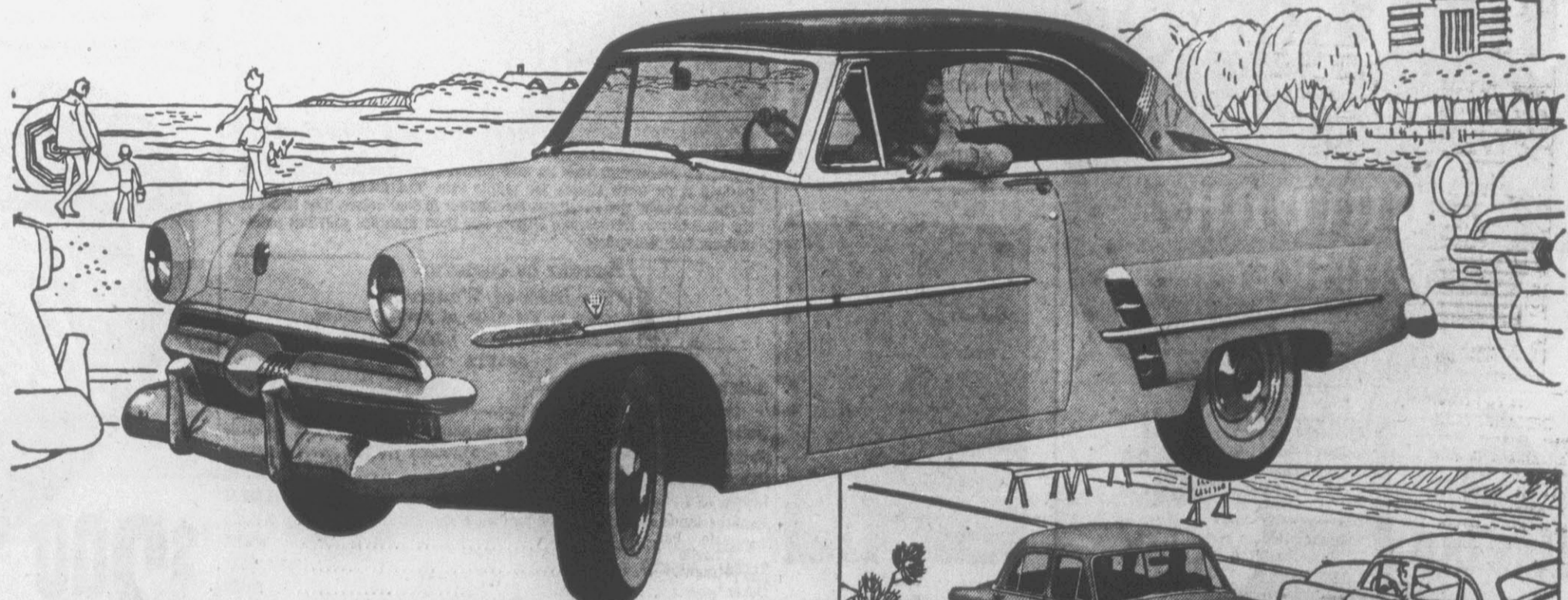

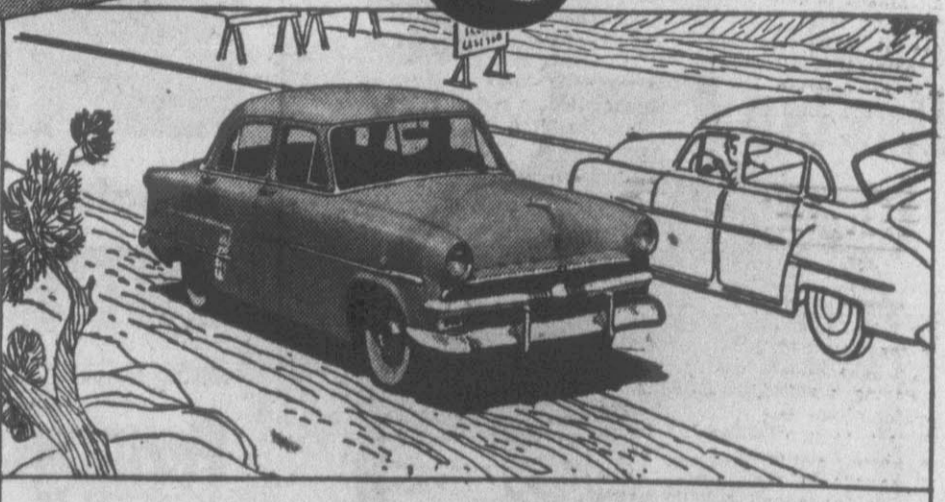

### Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (UP)—Stocks dipped to new lows for nearly two weeks as bull trading today.

It was the third consecutive decline and it carried the industrials to a new low since July 2 and the rails since July 1. Utilities performed better than other major sections but were easier on averages.

Weakness developed in aircrafts where Boeing and Douglas each lost a point and Grumman set a new low on a fractional loss. Chrysler, off 1/2 point, led the motors lower. Steels were little changed. Firestone lost 3/4 point in the tires.

Kern County Land lost a point to a new low in the oils and a long list of others set fractional declines. Shell and Standard of California firmed.

### Food, Water Failed Stop Prison Unrest

**SALEM, Ore. (UP)**—Rebellious convicts at Oregon state penitentiary, refreshed by food and water granted them when they appeared to have ended their defiant riot, turned "ugly" again today.

Warden Clarence Gladden estimated there were nearly 600 convicts still camped on the prison baseball field, where they have been since the sit-down disturbance began four days ago.

Some 145 prisoners, including 21 hardened ringleaders, were returned to their cells late last night after a three-man prisoners' committee and Gladden reached a tentative agreement to end the riot.

Before the warden met with the committee he announced the 21 ringleaders must return to their cells or there would be no meeting. A deputy warden read the names of the 21 men over a loudspeaker and said water would be turned into hydrants on the baseball field after the men surrendered.

There was a wave of cheering, whistling and applause after the names were read, and the men designated slowly picked their way to the fence gate where they were searched and sent back to their cells.

Food and coffee were served to the remaining convicts, and about 9 p.m. guards started moving the men, 20 at a time, back to their cells. Only about 125 had been cleared, however, when the prisoners again turned "ugly" after taking their "fill of food and water."

Gladden immediately stopped clearing prisoners back to their cells and left the convicts on the baseball field.

"Apparently they don't appreciate decent treatment," Gladden said, "and still haven't had enough."

### One Arrest Over Weekend For Liquor Violation

Pitt county ABC officers reported one arrest over the weekend for violation of the state's liquor laws.

Jailed in Bethel on \$200 bond was Spaniel Moore, 43-year-old Negro of the Bethel community, on charges of possession of a small quantity of non-tax paid whiskey.

Assisting Bethel Police Officers Walter Grey and Curtis Martin in searching the Moore premises Saturday night were Pitt ABC Officers J. M. Ward, J. L. Taylor, and Dick King.

The case has been set for the next term of Pitt county recorder's court.

### New Raleigh TV Outlet Is On Air

**RALEIGH (UP)**—North Carolina's newest television station was formally dedicated last night as station WNAO-TV began broadcasting from here on Channel 28.

Raleigh Mayor Fred B. Wheeler made the dedication address and Charles W. Stone, the station's general manager, presided at the dedication ceremonies.

WNAO-TV will broadcast from 5 p.m. to midnight seven nights a week.
