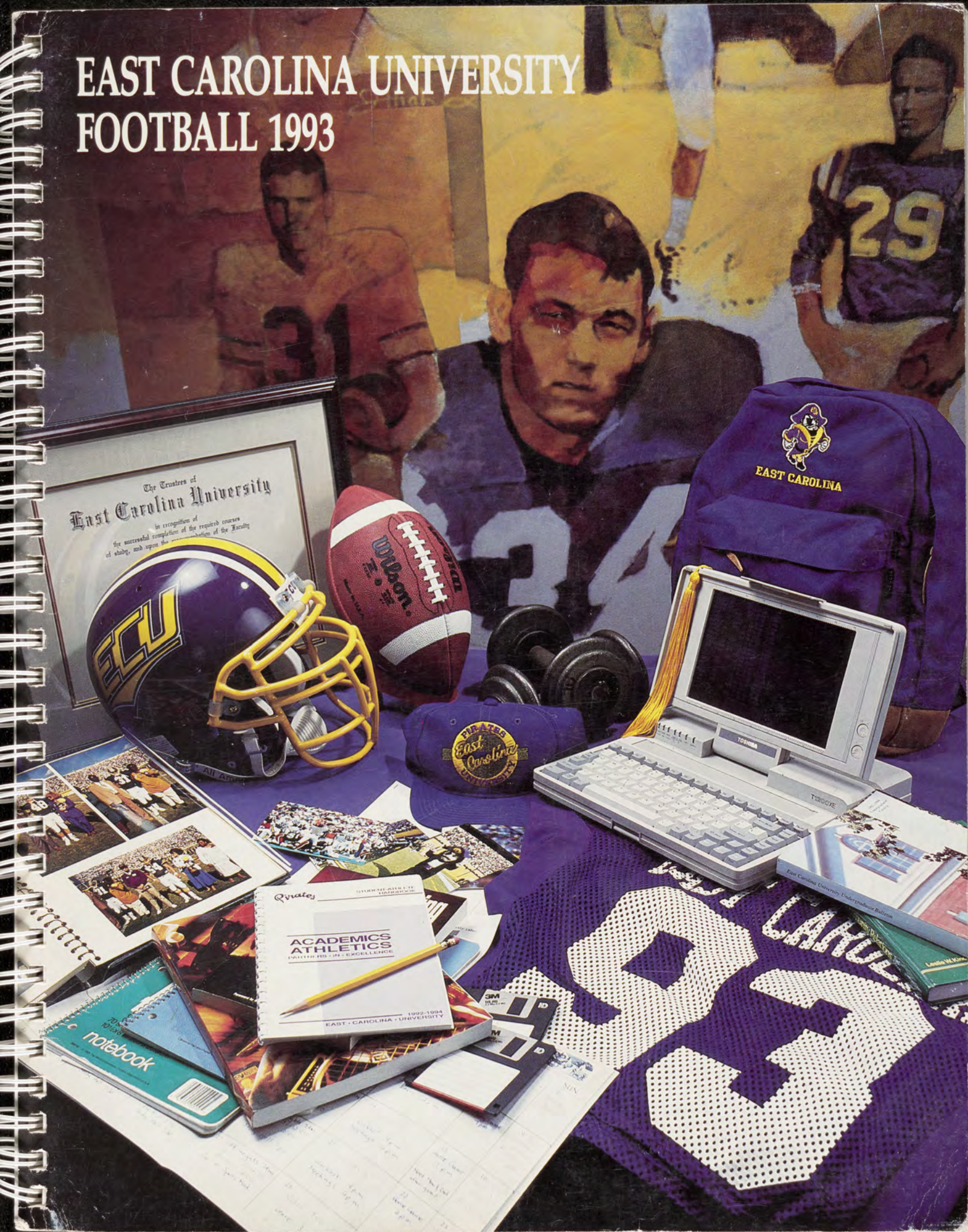

Media Information

In planning your coverage of East Carolina football in 1993, please review the following items:

Working Credentials

Working space in the East Carolina press box will be allotted on the following basis: (1) Daily newspapers covering for Sunday publication and television stations covering for weekend news programs; (2) Sports editors of North Carolina daily newspapers; (3) Radio personnel for an originating broadcast; (4) Official school newspaper; (5) Television sports directors and approved special coverage; (6) Print and TV working photographers. Weekly press representatives and non-broadcasting radio representatives may not be accommodated because of space limitations. We ask that you contact the Sports Information Office in advance to check on space in the press box. We ask that all media representatives write, on company letterhead, early to acquire working credentials for East Carolina home games. If time permits, we will mail your credentials. If not, they will be available at the Athletic Ticket Office in Minges Coliseum. Remember, no spouses or family members allowed on B level of the press box.

Photographers

Credentials for sideline photographers will be issued on the basis of circulation, with priority granted to agencies covering the participating schools on a regular basis.

A limited number of freelance photographer passes are available. Freelance photographer guidelines include:

- 1) Requests must be received at least four days prior to the home game.
- 2) One credential per photographer.
- 3) Each freelance photographer must submit a contact sheet featuring game and/or sideline action to the SID office no later than four days following game.
- 4) Should a freelance photographer request season credentials, the SID requests at least 5 (five) 8 x 10 black and white or color photos from each game photographed.
- 5) The SID reserves the right to refuse a credential request from a freelance photographer if these guidelines are not met.

All photographers who are issued working passes and desire to shoot at field level may pick up arm bands in the press box. Flip cards will also be available.

Telephones

The East Carolina Press Box provides five (5) long distance phone lines for general use by writers. The long distance phones are not located along the working press row, but on a table in the back press area. These telephones are available to all media outlets and are not reserved for any single outlet. Personal phones may be ordered at individual seats by contacting Carolina Telephone (919-355-4800). Please alert the SID office if you are ordering a phone so your seat location will correspond with the work order.

Parking

Media parking passes should be requested at the same time press box/sideline passes are requested. A limited number of parking passes will be available in a lot to the north side of Minges Coliseum behind the soccer field. Entry to the lot is off Charles Street onto Ficklen Drive.

Press Services

Quarterly play-by-play, quarterly, halftime and final stats, final individual offensive and defensive stats, scoring summary, drive charts, coaches' quotes and notes will be provided. Writers will be escorted to the interview room by respective SID's with approximately five minutes remaining in the game. The ECU locker room is closed to all media. A pre-game meal is available beginning approximately 90 minutes before kickoff. Coffee and cold drinks are served throughout the game.

Player Interviews

—During Game Week

All requests for player interviews during the week should be made at least a day in advance with the sports information office.

Players will return telephone calls to members of the media; player telephone numbers will not be released. A time mutually convenient for the player and the member of the media will be set up by the SID office. All player calls returned will be COLLECT.

Pre-game interviews must be concluded by no later than Wednesday. Players will not be asked to miss classroom time to do interviews.

—After the Game

Coach Steve Logan will hold a postgame interview with the media in the Leo Jenkins Auditorium on the second floor of the Sports Medicine Building, to the left of the Ficklen Stadium press box.

Sports Information Office representatives will be available to assist in post-game interviews. Complete post-game plans, both home and away, will be announced on game day in the press box by the SID.

The best time to contact Coach Steve Logan by telephone is between 1:30 and 2:30, Monday through Friday at 919-757-4570. You may also set up interviews through the SID office at 919-757-4522.

Monday Press Luncheon

Coach Steve Logan holds a weekly luncheon-press conference each Monday during the season, beginning at 12:30 in the Ward Sports Medicine Building. Lunch is available from 12:00 to 12:30 p.m. Several members of the Pirate football squad will be available following Coach Logan's press conference. If you wish to interview a certain member of the team at this time, please contact the SID office in advance. A tape of the press conference can be made available, if needed. Please contact the SID office in advance for this service.

Hot Line

Daily taped reports are available on the Pirate hotline, a 900 service. The number is 900-903-ECU1 (3281). Jeff Charles "Voice of the Pirates" and the ECU Sports Information staff will provide actualities on the hotline. There is a \$.99 per minute charge for this service.

Radio, TV

Visiting radio networks planning to originate from Ficklen Stadium are issued credentials by the SID office. Broadcast lines should be ordered through Carolina Telephone (919-355-4800). Visiting networks may also want to contact Jeff Charles, Director of Electronic Media at ECU, about a reciprocal agreement for phone lines.

Also, any television outfits wishing to broadcast action from Ficklen Stadium, must request credentials in advance from the SID office. You are also asked to contact Jeff Davis, Director of Operations at ECU, concerning electrical power, set-ups, etc.

The Facility

A three-level working media facility is available to those covering ECU football. This first-class facility will accommodate 92 print media representatives on Level B, along with food operations, and basic press operations. Level C contains booths for radio, coaches, stadium PA, scoreboard operations, host athletic director and security. Level D is an open-air photo deck for television and coaches' films. All facilities are accessible via elevator on the south side. Entry to the stadium for the media is through the players' gate adjacent to Scales Field House on the southwest corner.

Practices

Fall practices are usually open for all media during the first hour. However, there may be several occasions during the season when practices will be closed. Contact the SID Office in advance if you are planning to attend practice. Only calisthenics and warm-up drills can be video-taped or filmed. All scrimmages will take place in Ficklen Stadium. The press box will be open for attending media. In scrimmage situations, only the first 15 minutes can be video-taped or filmed.

Pro Scouts

Depending on space, pro scouts are given credentials for the press box. Request for credentials should be made through the SID Office.

Directions to Ficklen Stadium

From the Tidewater, Virginia Area

Take U.S. 13 from Suffolk to Ahsoskie, N.C. Take by-pass around Ahsoskie (NC 11). Take NC 11 to Greenville. NC 11 turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive to Fifth Street and take a left. Take Fifth Street to Cotanche Street and take a right. Take Cotanche, which runs into Charles Blvd., to Ficklen Drive (Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

From I-95 North

Take I-95 South to NC 903 exit (Halifax, N.C.). Take left over the overpass. Take NC 903 for eight miles until you reach U.S. 301. Take a right at U.S. 301 (4-5 miles) and proceed NC 125/903. Take left onto NC 125/903 and take for 15 miles until you reach Scotland Neck. Take a right on U.S. 258 when you reach Scotland Neck and go about 1-2 miles through downtown. Then take a left onto NC 125 and take for about 15 miles to Oak City. Take right onto NC 11 at Oak City. Take NC 11 (25 miles) to Greenville, where it turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive to Fifth Street and take a left. Take Fifth Street to Cotanche Street and take a right. Take Cotanche, which runs into Charles Blvd., to Ficklen Drive (Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

From I-95 South

Take I-95 North to U.S. 264 exit (Wilson, N.C.). Take right and go on U.S. 264 through downtown Wilson and head to Greenville. Take U.S. 264 to Allen Road and turn right. Allen Road turns into Greenville Blvd. Take Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. to Ficklen Drive and take right (Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

From Triangle Area

Take U.S. 64 from Raleigh and head east. Take U.S. 264 in Zebulon and head east through downtown Wilson and into Greenville. Take U.S. 264 bypass around Greenville, which turns into Greenville Blvd. Take Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. to Ficklen Drive and take right (Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

From Wilmington

Take Interstate 40 Northwest to Wallace. Take right onto NC 41 and head north through Chinquapin and Beulaville (about 20-25 miles). Get on NC 241 in Beulaville and head about 10 miles north to Pink Hill, where you will pick up NC 11. Take NC 11 through downtown Kinston and to Greenville, where it turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive (past Carolina East Mall) to Greenville Blvd., where you will take a right. Go down Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. up to Ficklen Drive and take right (Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

Directions to Press Parking

Press parking is on Ficklen Drive, located next to the soccer field and behind the North Stands of Ficklen Stadium. Entry to the lot is off Charles Street onto Ficklen Drive, which is located just north of the large Minges Coliseum parking lot.

Directions from Press Parking to Press Box

Walk around the West side of Ficklen Stadium (front of Minges Coliseum). Go under the middle of the South Stands and take elevator to press level. The B level is for working media, the C level is for radio and the D level is for photographers.

Directions from Press Box to Interview Room

Take elevator down to ground level. Go left until you reach the Sports Medicine Building. Take front entrance; use steps to go to second floor. When you reach second floor head straight until the first hallway and go left. Take first door on right (interview room).

Following The Pirates

Pirate Sports Network

Pirate football may be heard throughout North Carolina as well as portions of South Carolina and Virginia via the Pirate Sports Network, owned and operated by the East Carolina University Athletics Department.

All operations of the Pirate Sports Network are coordinated, produced and directed by Jeff Charles, Director of Electronic Media at East Carolina.

This year's Network is anchored by WDLX 93.3 FM with its 100,000 watt signal that blankets all of Eastern North Carolina. Key market affiliates include WCRY 1460 AM Fuquay-Varina (Raleigh), WGLD 1320 AM (Greensboro), WTOB 1380 AM (Winston-Salem), WAAK 960 AM (Charlotte-Gastonia), WOJY 1390 AM (Hampton, Virginia) serving Tidewater. WCZI 98.3 FM and WKQT 103.3 FM are the Flagship stations.

Carlester Crumpler, ECU's all-time leading rusher, begins his sixth year as analyst, Steve Gowan hosts the pre-game, half-time, post-game shows and updates scores, Warren Baker serves as engineer-producer with Martin Fuerer handling sideline duties. Spotters include Aaron Beaulieu and Jim Bass. Britt Purtee is the statistician.

Charles begins his sixth year as "Voice" of the Pirates and his fourteenth year of college play-by-play. The Piqua, Ohio native served as the "Voice" of Virginia Tech and Furman University and also broadcast Big Ten play-by-play for the University of Illinois. He also served as sports director at WSB Atlanta where he handled Peach Bowl duties and hosted a nightly talk show on the 50,000-watt clear channel station.

In addition to his duties at ECU, Charles works Metro Conference basketball telecasts for Raycom and does selected telecasts for Home Team Sports. He has also worked college basketball games for ESPN.

Charles and his wife Debby have one son Britt, and a daughter Heather, deceased.

Anheuser-Busch returns for its 17th year as the primary network sponsor.

Coach Logan Show

The Steve Logan Show, featuring ECU's head football coach and Jeff Charles, will be aired over five commercial television stations and four cable networks in 1993.

The 30-minute program takes viewers inside ECU football with in-depth interviews, taped highlights and interesting features.

The show will be produced by Charles with WNCT-TV Sports Director Brian Bailey serving as assistant producer and reporter. Kevin O'Brien of WNCT-TV is the chief photographer. The show will be produced through the facilities of WNCT-TV in Greenville.

The Steve Logan Show will air each Sunday on the following stations: WNCT-TV (Ch. 9, Greenville, N.C.), Noon; WRDC-TV (Ch. 28, Raleigh, N.C.), Noon; WWAY-TV (Ch. 3, Wilmington, N.C.), Noon; and WNRW-TV (Ch. 45, Winston-Salem, N.C.), 11:30 p.m. Home Team Sports airs the show Thursdays at 5:30 p.m., Sport-South Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m., Raleigh Durham Cablevision Tuesdays at 5:30 p.m. and Fridays at 9:30 p.m., Vision Cable Morehead City Tuesdays at 9:00 p.m. and WVT Ch. 20 Roanoke Rapids at 10:30 p.m. Tuesdays.

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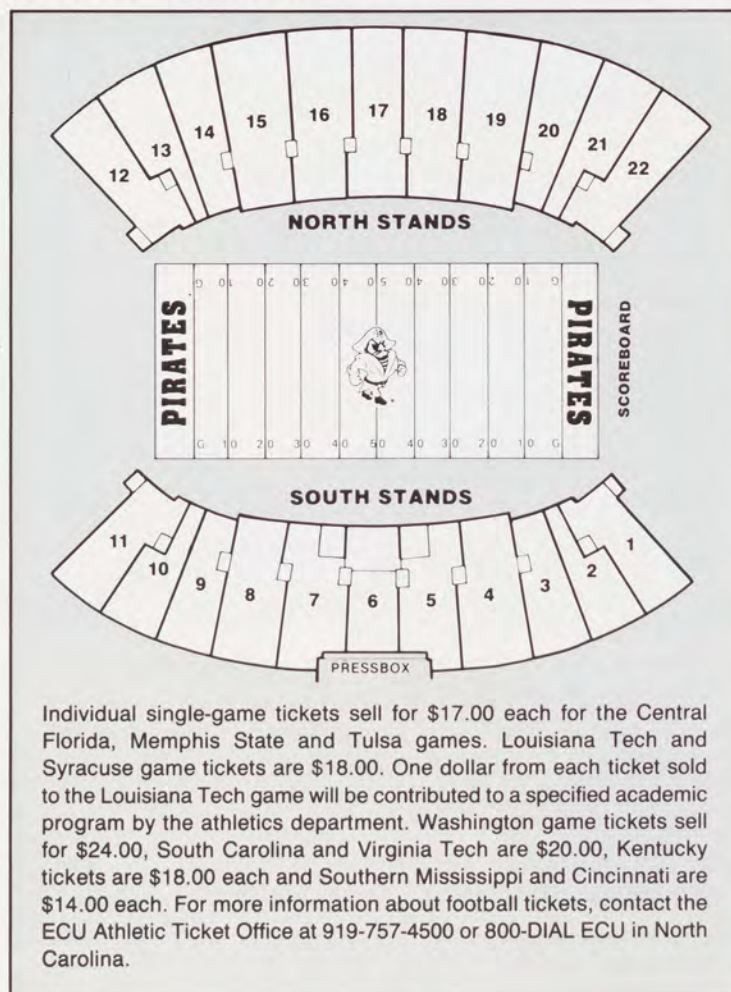

Outlook

In order for East Carolina to improve on its 5-6 mark of 1992, it will have to improve in three different categories. And, the ECU coaching staff has addressed those needs at every available opportunity.

First, the defense must improve on its 105th ranking in the final NCAA statistics. ECU's defense gave up an average of 456.7 yards per game in 1992. Opponents averaged 253.4 rushing yards per game last season, which put the Pirate defense 106th in that category.

To address this need, Pirate head coach Steve Logan hired Larry Coyer as the new ECU defensive coordinator. Coyer comes to East Carolina with plenty of experience, having been the defensive coordinator at Iowa, Oklahoma State, Iowa State, Memphis State and with the Michigan Panthers of the USFL.

"Larry Coyer is the best recruit we had this year," said Logan.

Secondly, the Pirate offense must cut down on turnovers. Last season, ECU quarterbacks threw 27 interceptions. That, along with 10 lost fumbles, helped give opponents 91 points last season. Opponents started 32 drives in ECU's territory last season.

The experience of a season helps address this need. However, Marcus Crandell will start at quarterback replacing Michael Anderson, who has left the program. Also, the addition of running back Jerris McPhail will help the Pirate offense. The tandem of McPhail and Junior Smith will see ECU use a two-back set more often in 1993.

Lastly, kicking game must improve. Last year, ECU averaged a net of 32.4 yards per punt, which was 88th in the NCAA statistics. Also, Pirate kickers hit only two of seven field goals, none longer than 31 yards, last season.

To address this need, Logan signed a punter and kicker during the recruiting period. Bill Wilson, a junior college transfer, averaged 43.44 yards per punt in spring drills. Last season, Wilson played at NE Oklahoma A&M. Chad Holcomb, a freshman from Smyrna, Ga., will be asked to handle the kicking chores.

If East Carolina can improve in these three areas, it looks to be a much improved team over last season.

The Pirates do have an immense amount of talent returning from last season. On the offensive side of the ball, the Pirates have seven starters returning. Running back Junior Smith rushed for 1,037 yards last season and tight end Carlester Crumpler caught 38 passes for 524 yards in 1992.

On defense, six starters come back including defensive end Bernard Carter, who already holds school single season (11) and career (20-1/2) sack records.

The schedule will be tougher. East Carolina opens its season with a nationally-televised (ESPN) contest against Syracuse on Sept. 9. The Pirates also have to travel to Washington (Sept. 25), South Carolina (Oct. 9), Southern Mississippi (Oct. 23), Virginia Tech (Oct. 30), Kentucky (Nov. 13) and Cincinnati (Nov. 20).

In addition, the Pirates host Central Florida (Sept. 18), Memphis State (Oct. 2), Louisiana Tech (Oct. 16) and Tulsa (Nov. 6).

Four of the final games on the 1993 schedule are on the road.

Offense

QUARTERBACKS: With the loss of Michael Anderson to academics, redshirt freshman Marcus Crandell will be asked to handle the load.

Anderson, a sophomore last season, completed 222 of 398 passes for 2,486 yards with 22 touchdowns and 23 interceptions.

Crandell, 6-0, 202, had a fine spring, progressing quicker than coaches would have thought. In four major spring scrimmages, Crandell completed 74 of 163 passes for 831 yards with eight touchdowns and 11 interceptions.

"Marcus has a lot of redeeming qualities," said Logan. "He has a great arm, is quick and mobile, and has great instincts. For a freshman, he has great leadership ability and his attitude has been outstanding."

The Robersonville, N.C. native, was a first-team all-state selection in 1991 at Roanoke High School.

Battling Crandell for the starting position in the spring was Chris Hester, another redshirt freshman. Hester, 6-3, 190, will be the number two quarterback in the fall. Coaches like his quick release and drop-back passing ability.

Orlando Whitaker returns for his junior year and will also see back-up duty.

Perez Mattison, 6-1, 185, from Anderson, S.C., and Dan Gonzalez, 6-3, 205, from Neptune, N.J., will be true freshmen in 1993 and have bright futures at East Carolina.

RUNNING BACKS: Position coach Todd Berry is blessed with talent and depth at the running back spot. Four of his top six players have college game experience and that does not include the projected starter at halfback.

The Pirates will use more of a two-back set this season than last. That means Jerris McPhail, a newcomer, will start at halfback, alongside returning 1,000 yard rusher Junior Smith.

Smith, a junior from Fayetteville, N.C., gained 1,037 yards and scored nine touchdowns in 1992. He became the first ECU running back since Anthony Collins in 1979 to gain 1,000 yards in a season. He'll start at the fullback spot.

At 5-6, 180, Smith is extremely strong and quick. Coaches felt he had a good spring, improving on blocking and catching the football.

McPhail has drawn the raves of Pirate coaches. The Clinton, N.C. native, originally signed with Wake Forest before the 1991 season, but never attended the school. He went to Mount Olive College in 1991-92, but did not play football and redshirted last season at East Carolina.

The 6-0, 190 sophomore, is a supreme talent. He is capable of making the big play with his great speed, tremendous hands, football savvy and size.

Ronnie Williams, a senior, was moved from wide receiver to halfback in the spring and will back up McPhail. The Rock Hill, S.C. native, gives the Pirates someone who can catch the ball well out of the backfield and someone who doesn't mind mixing it up with the defense.

Damon Wilson, a junior, will back up Junior Smith at fullback. The Jacksonville, Fla. native, had a fine spring, showing his hard running style and good blocking. Wilson is a good short yardage situation runner.

Carlos Blake, a sophomore, will be the third halfback while Eric Blanton, a sophomore walk-on, will be the third fullback.

WIDE RECEIVERS: A young and inexperienced group greets coach Dale Steele for fall camp. Of the top five wide receivers, only two have seen college game experience.

Going into fall camp, redshirt Allen Williams and senior Morris Letcher, get the starting nods at wide receiver.

Williams, 6-1, 190, will get the nod at split end. He made the key catches in the spring, averaging 25.75 yards per grab in four scrimmages. Coaches feel he has the potential to be one of the best in ECU history. Williams has great hands and good size.

Letcher comes into the 1993 season with All-America calibre potential. Last season, he caught 47 passes for 557 yards and five touchdowns. The Kansas City, Kan. native, also returns kickoffs and punts. He finished 12th in the nation last season in all-purpose rushing, averaging 147.82 yards per game.

Letcher has exceptional speed (4.48), good hands and can take the big hits. Coaches are looking for big things from him.

Derrek Baston, a sophomore, will likely back up both Letcher and Williams. He made the transition from halfback to wide receiver in the spring. Baston has big play potential. With his work habits, coaches feel sure he'll make an impact in 1993.

Lamont Edwards, a walk-on sophomore, and Mitchell Galloway, a redshirt freshman, will also see backup duty. Edwards missed most of spring practice to play on the Pirate baseball team. He has good hands and size for the wide receiver spot.

Coaches think Galloway has tons of potential. He has outstanding speed (4.45), good hands and is tough. Only a lack of experience stands in his way to becoming an impact player this season.

Linwood DeBrew, 5-10, 175 from Newport News, Va., and Jason Nichols, 5-10, 170 from Norcross, Ga., will be true freshmen this season.

TIGHT ENDS: East Carolina has one of the best tight ends in college football for the 1993 season.

Carlester Crumpler has already earned several first-team All-America mentions in pre-season publications. And, he's truly deserving.

The Greenville, N.C. senior, caught 38 passes for 524 yards and four touchdowns last season. Position coach Doug Martin also feels that "Crump" had his best spring of his career this year. He catches the ball well, is an excellent blocker, has good speed and runs well.

For the East Carolina offense to be successful in 1993, Crumpler will have to be a key component.

Dwight Linville, a sophomore, will back up Crumpler. He moved to tight end from wide receiver before last season, so coaches feel comfortable about his receiving abilities. He has put on about 10 pounds from last season.

Scott Richards and Sean Richardson, both redshirt freshmen, are young back-ups. Richards came to ECU as a quarterback and was moved to tight end during the spring. Former ECU and current Minnesota Viking Luke Fisher was another tight end who came to campus originally as a quarterback.

OFFENSIVE LINE: This group has a mixture of youth and experience. However, the inexperience shows at several key positions.

The key to the offensive line this season will be the availability of Terry Tilghman at left tackle. The 6-6, 276 senior is ECU's best lineman. However, during spring drills, the Mesquite, Texas native, suffered a knee injury, which sidelined him. Position coach Jeff Jagodzinski is hopeful that he'll have Tilghman close to 100 percent by the start of fall drills.

With the loss of Tilghman, several young players could get additional playing time. Redshirt freshman Ron Suddith, Mike McCall, John Schlager and Lloyd Cameron could figure in the picture as well as junior Chad Averett.

Senior Daryl Taylor is the likely starter at right tackle. The Fayetteville, N.C. native, began his ECU career as an offensive lineman, but was moved to defense in his redshirt freshman season. Taylor, 6-3, 290, is probably ECU's best athlete on the offensive line. He is strong and has good footwork.

The starters on the three interior line spots are all seasoned veterans. Tom Coleman will start at left guard and Ken Crawford will hold down the right guard spot. Derrick Leaphart starts for the second straight season at center.

Coleman, 6-3, 280, had the best spring of his ECU career in 1993. The senior is a good run blocker and is quick off the ball. He'll be backed up by junior Reuben Jones, who missed last season coming off a knee injury.

Crawford, 6-5, 278, is a three year starter on the offensive line. Coaches like his pass blocking technique and he has improved his strength and speed. Senior Greg Smith is the likely backup for Crawford at right guard.

Leaphart, 6-2, 310, can be as good as he wants to be at center. He was pushed in the spring by sophomore Kevin Wiggins. ECU coaches feel the competition at the position will be good for both players.

Andy Dulioki, Shane McPherson and Brian Nagy are true freshmen this season and have bright futures in the Pirate football program.

Defense

DEFENSIVE LINE: Youth and experience meet again, this time with the defensive line. Coach Theo Lemon's defensive line has plenty of athletic skills, but will need to take advantage of repetitions and game experience to mature.

Two veterans return to start at the noseguard and defensive tackle positions. Senior Derek Taylor will start at noseguard and junior Walter

Scott starts at defensive tackle.

Taylor, 6-0, 275, had a great spring and will be the nucleus of the defensive line. Coaches like his technique and his work ethic. He has good strength and speed for the position. Taylor had 27 tackles in 1992.

Scott, 6-3, 253, moved from defensive end in the spring and is an outstanding athlete. Last season, Scott had 26 tackles from his end spot.

A redshirt freshman, Lamont Burns, will start at the defensive end position. The Greensboro, N.C. native, began the spring at outside linebacker but was moved to defensive end. At 6-5, 245, Burns has good physical skills to go along with his aggressive attitude. He could be a post-season honors candidate before his Pirate football career is over.

Seniors Jeff Cooke and Dealton Cotton will play reserve roles on the defensive line. Both have started at times during their ECU careers. Cooke, 6-1, 277, had 29 tackles last season. Cotton, 6-0, 274, had 19 stops last season. Sophomore Charles Boothe, 6-6, 248, will back up Burns at defensive end. Coaches feel that the sky is the limit with Boothe. They like his athletic skills and size.

Daniel Russ, Jeff Griffin and junior college transfer Sean Turner will play reserve roles on the defensive line. Turner was injured during spring drills, so coaches could not get a good look at him. He'll need to take advantage of the repetitions in fall camp in order to get playing time.

Chris Aivazoglou and John Krawczyk come into the program in the fall and could make a contribution.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS: The two starters at this position have the skill and experience to be a major force on the defensive side of the football. Bernard Carter will be the starter at the rush end and Eric Meyers starts at the drop end.

Carter, 6-3, 248, has been mentioned in several pre-season publications as one of the ten best defensive ends in college football. Position coach Chuck Pagano thinks Carter is the "total package" — he's smart, has great physical abilities, plays hard, versatile, a leader and a good student.

The Tallahassee, Fla. senior, already holds school records for sacks in a single season (11 last season) and in a career (20-1/2).

Myers, 6-4, 248, began the spring as an inside linebacker and was moved to the outside late in the spring. He played the position last season before injuring a knee against South Carolina. The Allen Park, Mich. native, was able to get an injury redshirt and returns for his senior campaign in 1993.

Coaches feel that Myers is an outstanding athlete and is a very physical player. He showed no effects of the knee injury during spring practice.

Freshman walk-on Isiah Owens had a good spring and could see action as a reserve. Owens served in the military for several years before coming to East Carolina. Coaches like his attitude and athletic skills and feel he could be a major contributor during his Pirate football career.

Pat Hurley, Kevin Stormer and Brian Williams could also make contributions this season.

Willie Brookins and Marcus Jones are junior college transfers that, coaches are hopeful, can make a contribution in the fall.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS: This may be the youngest position group on the ECU football squad and that worries position coach Bob Babich.

Going into fall camp, Mark Libiano, a true sophomore and Reggie Robinson, a walk-on senior, are the starters at the inside linebacker spots.

Libiano, 6-3, 225, was originally set to redshirt last season until injuries to other linebackers forced him to play. He played in the final six games of the season, and finished with 27 tackles. The Easton, Pa. native, has a nose for the football and a lot of potential.

Robinson had a good spring, earning defensive MVP honors in the spring game with 10 tackles. The Greensboro, N.C. native, is smart and a good athlete. He lacks game experience, but really understands the defensive scheme.

Leonard Graham, a junior, will play a back-up role. He missed most of spring with an ankle injury.

Mike Sweat, a junior college transfer, will also see plenty of playing time at inside linebacker. Coaches like his attitude, his football smarts and fundamentals.

Brad Bunch, a redshirt freshman, could also see some playing time in the fall.

True freshmen Marvin Burke and Lorenzo West could see immediate action because of the lack of depth and experience at this position.

SECONDARY: This group is one of the deepest on the squad with eight players who have seen game experience. Four of the defensive backs earned game experience last season as freshmen.

Going into fall camp, senior Travis Render and sophomore Emmanuel McDaniel are the projected starters at the corners and sophomores Morris Foreman and Hank Cooper are the likely starters at the safeties.

Render, 5-9, 182, is a good cover man with good athletic skills. Last season, he started all 11 games and recorded 47 tackles.

McDaniel, 5-9, 168, has good speed and quickness. Position coach Chris Thurmond was pleased with his performance in the spring. McDaniel moved from the number three fieldside corner to the number one spot during the spring.

Foreman, 6-1, 210, can deliver the big hit from the strong safety position. The Farmville, N.C. native, is a fine athlete and good run support player. He can also return kickoffs and punts.

Cooper, 6-0, 184, has good range and is probably the best open field tackler on the defensive unit. Last season, he had 43 total tackles and five pass deflections.

Sophomore David Crumbie and seniors Greg Floyd and Robert Tate will see back-up duty at the cornerback spots. Tate is the fastest player (4.40) and perhaps the best athlete on the squad. Floyd is a two-year starter at cornerback who could push for a starting position in pre-fall camp. Crumbie had 17 tackles last season in a reserve role. Daren Hart could see playing time at cornerback and special teams.

Senior Garrett Beasley and freshmen David Hart and E.J. Gunthrope will provide depth at the safety spots. Beasley, 6-0, 204, is a fine run support and goal line defender. Hart and Gunthrope have bright futures in the Pirate football program and will see playing time this season.

Junior college transfer Columbus Grice will also add depth to the defensive backfield.

Specialists

KICKER: Stephen Padgett held the placekicking duties during spring drills, but newcomer Chad Holcomb will battle him for the starting position. Padgett has range from inside 35 yards on field goals. His average range for kickoffs is the 5 yard line. Holcomb has hit a 49-yarder in high school and had 80 percent of his kickoffs go into the end zone. Holcomb is ECU's first recruited scholarship kicker since 1989.

PUNTER: Pirate coach Steve Logan raves about junior college transfer Bill Wilson. During spring drills, the Sallisaw, Okla. native, averaged 43.44 yards per punt on 41 attempts. Wilson is also adept at hitting the coffin-corner punt and has good hand time.

RETURN SPECIALISTS: Morris Letcher will again handle most of the returns. The senior from Kansas City, Kan., finished 15th in punt returns and 12th in all-purpose rushing in the nation last season. Sophomore Morris Foreman can also return punts as can sophomore Jerris McPhail. Redshirt freshman Mitchell Galloway and McPhail may see action returning kickoffs.

SNAPPER/HOLDER: Michael Jacobs, who punted last season, will be snapping for punts in 1993. Coaches were very impressed with his attitude and effort in becoming the regular snapper. Brian Williams will snap for placement kicks with Jacobs holding for those attempts.

Pirate Football Notes

For the second straight season, East Carolina will have a nationally-televised game from Ficklen Stadium. On Sept. 9, the Pirates will host Syracuse on ESPN. Last season, ESPN aired ECU's game against Southern Mississippi from Ficklen Stadium. The Golden Eagles won that game, 38-21.

Last season's contest was the first-ever aired nationally from Ficklen Stadium. The Syracuse game will mark the fourth time in the last three seasons that ECU has been on ESPN. In 1991, the Pirates were on the network against Illinois and North Carolina State.

• ECU •

East Carolina will have one other game on live television during the 1993 season. The Pirate Sports Television Network will produce the Oct. 2 game against Memphis State. Kickoff is set for 12:08 p.m.

• ECU •

East Carolina will take its longest road trip ever when the Pirates play at Washington on Sept. 25. It will be ECU's first game ever against a Pacific-10 Conference opponent.

The previous long trip for the Pirates had been to West Texas State in 1970.

• ECU •

East Carolina ranked 61st among NCAA Division I-A programs in attendance average last season. The Pirates averaged 32,814 fans per game in 1992, an increase of 772 per game from 1991. Of the top 70 schools in average attendance, 35 of those had increased attendances from 1991.

However, ECU filled Ficklen Stadium to an average of 93.7 percent of capacity each home date.

• ECU •

Of the early pre-season polls, East Carolina will play two schools that are ranked in the top 20.

In the Football Writers Association of America poll, Syracuse is ranked 10th and Washington is ranked 12th. In *The Sporting News* poll, Syracuse is fourth and Washington 11th. In *NCAA Football Preview*, Washington is 8th and Syracuse is 9th.

• ECU •

One Pirate was taken in the 1993 National Football League draft. Offensive tackle Tom Scott was taken in the sixth round by the Cincinnati Bengals. Scott was the 148th pick of the draft.

Scott's selection marked the fourth straight year that East Carolina has had at least one player selected in the NFL draft.

• ECU •

ECU has fielded 57 teams during the school's 61 years of playing collegiate football. During that span, the overall record for Pirate football is 276-256-11, a 51.8 winning percentage. The Pirates have won five games or more four straight seasons, the first time that has been done at the school since 1976-79.

• ECU •

In 1992, only two true freshmen saw action on the gridiron. Linebacker Mark Libiano and defensive back Morris Foreman were the only true freshmen to see playing time last season. Both are expected to start and play key roles on the Pirate defense this season.

• ECU •

East Carolina now has scored in its last 53 games. The last time the Pirates were shut out was Sept. 17, 1988 against South Carolina (0-17). The longest such streak in ECU history is 110 games between 1971 and 1981.

• ECU •

For a football program to have two starting linebackers (Robert Jones and Vinson Smith) for the Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys, the Pirate defense has not been that successful. And, Larry Coyer will try to change that.

The new defensive coordinator came to East Carolina from Ohio State before spring practice. Steve Logan feels that Coyer can do the job.

"Larry Coyer is the best recruit I had this year," Logan has said.

Since 1984, the highest the ECU has ranked in the NCAA statistics is 71st for total defensive yardage and 55th for points allowed per game.

Last season, East Carolina finished 105 in total defense and 101 in scoring defense in the NCAA statistics.

• ECU •

Several walk-ons had great springs and could see playing time in the fall. They include freshman Isaih Owens (Marion, S.C.) at defensive end, sophomore running back Eric Blanton (Warwick, N.Y.), senior linebacker Reggie Robinson (Greensboro, N.C.), sophomore center Kevin Wiggins (Pink Hill, N.C.) and sophomore wide receiver Lamont Edwards (Clinton, N.C.).

• ECU •

The difference between an 11-1 record in 1991 and a 5-6 record in 1992. Try turnovers.

During ECU's top 10 national ranking run in 1991, the Pirates had 10 interceptions and six fumbles for a total of 16 turnovers. Off of those turnovers, opponents scored 55 points.

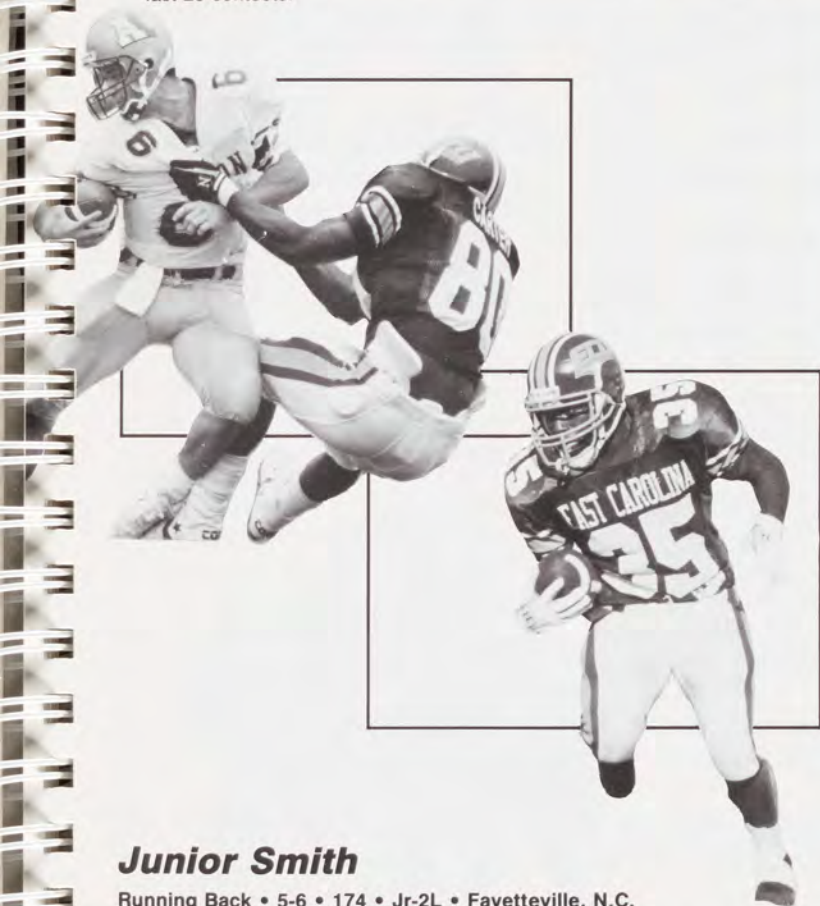

Steve Logan - Head Football Coach

The practice fields are the classroom. Ficklen Stadium is the final exam. Steve Logan is the teacher.

It's the way the second-year East Carolina head coach prefers it.

"When I sat down and asked myself what I enjoyed most about coaching," said Logan, "it was the teaching that I enjoyed most and if teaching is what I enjoy then I would be teaching on Saturday as well."

If you spent time watching Logan on the sidelines, you'll get a feel how the 40-year-old coach uses Saturdays as another teaching tool.

He'll take one of his young quarterbacks on the sidelines and discuss different plans, options and ideas. It's a two-way conversation and the best way for a student-athlete to know what he's doing right and what's he's doing wrong.

"He doesn't pressure you, he doesn't yell at you, but he makes sure you understand what you did wrong," said Jeff Blake, former Pirate and current New York Jet quarterback.

"He makes sure you know everything about the game. He taught me how to keep my composure, how to be a leader."

The teaching and leadership roles continue also off the playing and practice fields. The Lawton, Okla. native, feels that if student-athletes are going to be the best they are going to be, it requires self-discipline, dedication and hard work.

Members of the football squad are told three things by Logan about playing football at East Carolina: 1) if you go to class and practice hard, you will play; 2) have fun playing the game of football, and; 3) play as hard as possible on every play and the wins and losses will take care of themselves.

"I like to see the responsibility for the little things fall upon the players rather than for me telling them to do it," said Logan.

"We never talk to our student-athletes about winning and losing — never," continues Logan. "We talk to them about showing up, playing every play as hard as they can play it and play to the last play of the game. We don't care who it is we're playing. We give a ton of respect to whoever that may be, home or on the road."

Logan developed much of his philosophy through the influence of several head coaches. He worked on the staff of

current Ohio State coach John Cooper at Tulsa, with current Dallas Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson at Oklahoma State, with Bill McCartney at Colorado and with Bill Lewis at ECU.

When Lewis resigned to take the head coaching position at Georgia Tech, ECU Director of Athletics Dave Hart, Jr. did not have far to look for the school's 17th head football coach.

"It became obvious to me through conversations with Steve that he was the best man for the job," said Hart. "Steve Logan is the right person to lead this program and Steve's offensive scheme will become this program's signature."

Logan is mostly credited with the development of the Pirate offensive attack during the 1990-91 seasons when he was ECU's offensive coordinator. In 1991, East Carolina finished the season with an 11-1 record and reached a Top Ten national ranking.

During the 1990-91 seasons, Logan coached quarterback Jeff Blake. The Sanford, Fla. native broke or tied 32 school records before leaving ECU, including most passing yards in a game, season and career. He was named the 1991 ECAC Player of the Year.

In 1992, it was Michael Anderson's turn to rewrite ECU record books. The Decatur, Ga., native broke or tied 12 school records last season, including all of the school's sophomore records.

Logan continues to monitor the offensive side of the football closely. He still coaches the quarterbacks but also makes his way around the practice field to observe his coaches in action.

"What we're doing here in the passing game and with our offense, I feel, is on the cutting edge," said Logan. "I believe our

offense is unlimited on how successful we can be. We just have to work hard and keep teaching the ideals that will make our program succeed."

Last season, the Pirates finished 10th in the nation in passing offense, averaging 280.45 yards per game. ECU also was 18th in total offense, averaging 421.09 yards per game.

Logan came to ECU in 1989 after serving as quarterback coach at Mississippi State for two seasons. During his first season at ECU, he coached the running backs.

His coaching career started in 1975 as an assistant coach at Union High School in Tulsa, Okla. He began in the collegiate coaching ranks in 1980 as a tight ends coach at Oklahoma State under current Dallas Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson and moved to Hutchinson Junior College the following year.

"I had to pull myself up by the bootstraps in this profession," said Logan. "I've been working for this moment 18-20 years. And I'm very ready."

Preparing Logan for his first major college head coaching job was several other stops along the way.

In 1983, he became offensive coordinator at Tulsa under John Cooper, who is currently head coach at Ohio State. While at Tulsa, Logan coached Steve Gage, who played three seasons with the Washington Redskins.

Logan left Tulsa for Colorado in 1985 and coached the Buffalo running backs for two seasons before going to Mississippi State, where he coached the Bulldog quarterbacks.

The year before Logan went to Colorado as running backs coach, the Buffaloes were 1-10. In 1985, Logan's first season at CU, the Buffaloes were 7-5, playing Washington in the Freedom

Bowl. The following season, Colorado went 6-6, playing Baylor in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Many players that Logan recruited to Colorado were on the 1990 squad, which finished 11-1-1 and won a share of the national championship.

While at Hutchinson Junior College, Logan was the Jayhawk Conference Coach of the Year in 1982.

While at Tulsa, Logan did not play football and had plans to get a doctorate degree and become a college professor.

"I realized I wasn't going to the NFL," said Logan. "But, I had to teach in the public schools before going to graduate school. There (Union High School) they wanted me to coach football. I got addicted."

During the next five years, Logan became a high school assistant coach while he completed all but six hours of credits towards his masters degree.

Leaving Union High School, Logan coached tight ends at Oklahoma State for Jimmy Johnson. He became hooked on the college game.

"I loved working with the kids and having an impact on their decisions in and outside football," said Logan. "That, and the intrigue of competitive strategy, really hooked me."

And, since he began coaching in the college ranks, Logan has wanted to be a head coach. And, on Jan. 11, 1992, his dreams were realized.

Logan, an avid tennis player, and his wife, Laura, are the proud parents of two sons — Vincent (11) and Nathanael (9).

- In the 34 games Logan has been ECU's offensive coordinator/head coach, the Pirates are averaging 398.6 yards per game of total offense. Of that total, 248.6 yards per game passing and 150.0 yards per game rushing.
- In the 34 games Logan has been ECU's offensive coordinator/head coach, the Pirates average 28.2 points per game.
- ECU has scored in every game Logan has been ECU's offensive coordinator/head coach, scoring at least a touchdown in each. The Pirates have been held under double digits only three times — seven points against Southern Mississippi (1990), South Carolina (1990) and Memphis State (1992).
- The Pirates had a streak of 26 games of double digit scoring broken last season against Memphis State. Here is what the Pirate offense did during that streak:

- In the 34 games Logan has served as ECU's offensive coordinator/head coach, the Pirates have passed for more yards than rushed in 24 of 34 games. Eight of the 10 games that ECU rushed for more than passed was during the 1990 campaign.
- ECU is 12-4 during the last three seasons when gaining 400 yards or more of total offense.
- ECU is 8-3 during the last three seasons when passing for more than 300 yards.
- ECU has set 100 individual and team offensive records during the past three seasons, including most passing yards in a game and season and most total offensive yards in a game and season for a team and individual.

Bob Babich, 32, joined the East Carolina football staff in March of 1992, as inside linebackers coach. Babich served in the same role at Bowling Green for one season before coming to ECU.

The Aliquippa, Pa. native, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Tulsa in 1984, assisting with the linebackers and scout teams. A year later, Babich was hired to be a full-time assistant coach for the Hurricanes, in charge of the offensive line.

Tulsa claimed the Missouri Valley Conference championship during the 1984 and 1985 seasons.

While still at Tulsa, Babich was given a different role before the 1987 season, coaching the strong safeties and coordinating all special teams.

In 1988, he ventured away from his alma mater for the first time, going to Wisconsin. For two seasons, Babich was still in charge of the tight ends and worked with the offensive line. He also worked with the Badger kicking game and was the coordinator of the Badger Football Camp.

Babich went back to Tulsa in 1990 to assist with the offensive line. In 1991, Babich coached the inside linebackers at Bowling Green. The Falcons finished 11-1, won the Mid-Atlantic Conference, and defeated Fresno State, 28-21, in the California Raisin Bowl.

While in high school, Berry earned all-state honors at quarterback at Miami High School in Miami, Okla. He was also all-state in track.

Berry, an honors student at Tulsa, and his wife, Lisa, are the parents of one daughter, Jordan (6).

Veteran coach Larry Coyer, 49, begins his first year as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at East Carolina University.

Coyer comes to East Carolina from The Ohio State University, where he served as defensive backfield coach for two seasons.

The Huntington, W.Va. native, carries an impressive resume that includes stints in the Big Eight Conference, Pacific-10 Conference, Big Ten Conference, Southwest Conference and professional football.

Coyer came to Ohio State in 1990, following a year at the University of Houston, where he served as defensive coordinator. He has also been the defensive coordinator at University of Iowa (1974-78), Oklahoma State University (1978-79), Iowa State University (1979-82) and Memphis State University (1986).

Coyer left the collegiate ranks in 1983 to become defensive coordinator with the Michigan Panthers of the United States Football League (USFL). The Panthers won the USFL title in 1983. He remained there two years before joining the staff of the Memphis Showboats for one season (1985).

After leaving Memphis State in 1986, Coyer became linebackers coach at UCLA, a position he retained until moving to Houston for the 1990 season.

Last season, the Buckeyes were ranked 13th in the nation in pass efficiency defense and were led by All-Big Ten defensive back Roger Harper.

Coyer has coached in four bowl games including the 1993 Florida Citrus Bowl, the 1992 Hall of Fame Bowl, the 1989 Cotton Bowl and the 1987 Aloha Bowl. He was an assistant at UCLA for the latter two games.

In his collegiate coaching career, he has coached 12 All-America players, including Ken Norton, Jr. (UCLA, Dallas Cowboys), Matt Darby (UCLA, Buffalo Bills) and John Corker (Oklahoma State, Houston Oilers).

Coyer is a 1965 graduate of Marshall University, where he was a standout football player and wrestler. He was an Academic All-America in 1964, an All-Mid-America Conference selection in 1963-64 and an honorable mention All-America in 1964. In 1987, he was inducted into the school's Athletics Hall of Fame.

After graduation, he spent three seasons as Marshall's secondary coach, leaving in 1968 to become head coach at Martins Ferry High School in Ohio. Between 1970 and 1972, he was defensive coordinator at Massillon High School, leaving in 1973 to become secondary coach at Bowling Green.

Coyer and his wife, Linda, have two sons, Matthew and Justin.

Sean McConnell

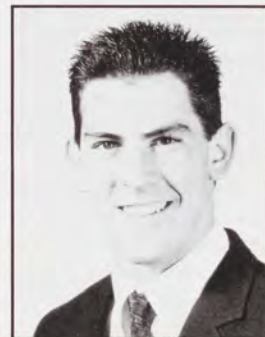
Graduate Assistant Coach

The East Carolina University Sports Medicine Division and Curriculum, reputed to be one of the finest programs in the Southeast, affords every Pirate athlete the best available care and treatment of injuries.

The East Carolina sports medicine program offers the best possible prevention, evaluation, immediate treatment, and rehabilitation of injuries.

Acting Head Trainer Mike Hanley, Assistant Jim Bazluki, Graduate Assistant Stefan Harris and Team Physician Dr. John Siegel oversee the sports medicine program for football. All serve on the staff of the ECU Sports Medicine Conference and as faculty for the Sports Medicine Curriculum within the Department of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Safety.

They are assisted by more than a dozen community-based professionals who lend valuable time in the athletic health care and instructing the 30 to 35 undergraduate students enrolled in ECU's sports medicine educational program for athletic trainers. Dr. Edwin Bartlett and Dr. Tally Lassiter, Jr. are the orthopaedic consultants for football.

The Sports Medicine Center is in the new Sports Medicine Building. The Division, which has been in operation since 1971, is now able to better serve the student-athletes and educate sports medicine student athletic trainers using the latest, state-of-the-art facilities and equipment.

The Sports Medicine Staff are in attendance at every athletic event that involves East Carolina University athletes. Radio communication from practice field to the center is a must and a sports medicine vehicle provides instant transportation for injured athletes to the center. Prevention, evaluation, treatment, and rehabilitation are the main objectives of the Sports Medicine Division and when an injury does occur, the staff provides on-the-spot treatment to make certain the injury does not become more serious.

The Sports Medicine Curriculum, a part of the School of Health and Human Performance, is the only undergraduate athletic training program approved by the NATA in Eastern North Carolina and one of only two in the state.

Objectives and responsibilities of the Academic Leadership Team include: (1) creating a positive, winning work ethic in the classroom; (2) challenging fellow teammates to maximize their potential; (3) serving as role models and mentors for fellow teammates both on the field and in the classroom; (4) assisting the Student Development Office in communicating academic related issues to the squad; (5) assisting with the Faculty Guest Coach Program during the season; (6) mentor with freshmen; (7) providing support and/or recognition to team members on academic matters; (8) serving as ambassadors for the football program at official functions; and, (9) actively participate in the "Athletes for Education" speakers bureau.

At East Carolina University, athletic and academic excellence are inseparable goals for student-athletes. The University is committed to the academic success and graduation of students participating in its athletic programs. The Department of Athletics supports this commitment with extensive counseling services in order to maximize the success of every student-athlete.

"Our mission looks beyond fielding competitive teams and winning games," said ECU Director of Athletics Dave Hart, Jr. "Winning, while important to all of us, is only a part of that development. Graduating student-athletes who are responsible for themselves and to our society is our ultimate goal."

Under the direction of the ECU Student Development Staff, headed by Pam Overton, Pirate student-athletes have reached new heights in academic achievement during the past few years.

East Carolina has had seven student-athletes become recent GTE-CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, including baseball player Lee Kushner, a second-team All-America this year, softball player Laura Crowder, a second-team last year, and swimmer Marc Cook, who earned first-team honors last year. Stacey Boyette (softball) was given the honor twice, Pam Young (softball), Robin Graves (softball) and Steve Sides (baseball) have also attained the high honor.

In the last four years, ECU has had three football players on the GTE-CoSIDA Academic All-District 3 team. In 1989, center Keith Arnold and defensive end R.L. Beeman achieved the honor. Arnold repeated the honor in 1990 and 1991 and Ken Burnette was also given all-district accolades in 1991-92.

The ECU Athletics Department is committed to its Student Development Program and the understanding that student-athletes become well-rounded in all aspects of life.

The primary goals for the Student Development Program are (1) to support in the efforts of every student-athlete who attends ECU to earn a degree, (2) to provide assistance for the student-athlete in the development of values, emphasizing the qualities of leadership, (3) to enhance the interpersonal relationships and communication skills of the student-athlete, (4) to facilitate the fulfillment of career and life goals of each student-athlete, (5) to safeguard the academic integrity of the University by insuring compliance with all rules of the University and the NCAA.

The Office of Student Development does this with a staff dedicated to the principle that the development of the student-athlete is the most important objective.

Overton is in her tenth year of overseeing the academic progress of all student-athletes at ECU. The staff is also involved in personal, social and career counseling as well as supervising the study center and tutorial program for all of ECU's student-athletes.

Carlester Crumpler, Nita Boyce and Jim Weaver also serve as academic counselors while Diane Burt is the office's administrative assistant.

Among the Academic Development Services available for student-athletes are tutorial programs, study halls, academic skills development, orientation, athletic department convocation, and reading and math assessment.

Additional programs such as interview skills workshop, tutorial recruitment and training, leadership development seminars, a speaker's bureau and community service programs are an important part of the student development program.

The athletics department has set up several prestigious awards for ECU student-athletes.

For the past four years, Texasgulf, Inc. has sponsored the ECU Outstanding Scholar-Athlete Award. The award is designed to be the most prestigious that is presented annually to a male and female athlete. Last year, Craig Turnbull, a soccer player, was the male recipient, and Georgeann Wilke, a softball player, was the female recipient.

Academics and Athletics at ECU

Another academic goal for football players to reach is being named a recipient of the Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Scholarship, which is awarded at each home ECU game in honor of a football player who shows outstanding achievement in academics and athletics.

Honored during the 1992 football season were Deke Owens (Syracuse), Nick Wilson (Virginia Tech), Junior Smith (Cincinnati), Peter Zophy (Southern Miss) and Carlester Crumpler (Arkansas State).

Football players also can serve on the Student-Athlete Advisory Council, which serves as an advisory organization for the staff of the Office of Student Development and the Department of Athletics.

The council is comprised of two members from each inter-collegiate athletic squad. Senior Greg Smith and freshman Lamont Burns are representatives from the football squad. These students also serve as academic hosts for prospective football recruits during official campus visits.

The primary goals of the council include (1) serving as a liaison between athletic teams and the Office of Student Development, (2) emphasizing academic opportunities and responsibilities, (3) encouraging student-athletes to apply what is learned in athletics to their course of study and career development, (4) implementing orientation programs for student-athletes, (5) encouraging development of leadership skills, (6) promoting positive relationships between student-athletes and student body and (7) implementing programs that will promote a positive image for intercollegiate athletics and the student-athlete.

"College athletics is the natural place to give young people the important opportunity not only to grow in the areas of physical development and athletic ability," said Hart, "but just as much in the areas of academic, social and personal development."

Adds Hart, "We in the East Carolina program are in the 'people business,' because after all, 'People are our most important product.'"

Pirate Club

The East Carolina University Educational Foundation, better known as the Pirate Club, is the backbone of financial support for ECU athletics. Monies raised by the organization are used to help fund student-athlete scholarship costs associated with the Pirate athletics program.

The Pirate Club continues to grow, as it surpassed the coveted \$1 million contribution mark and 4,000-plus members for the sixth consecutive year. 1993's goals are \$1.4 million in unrestricted contributions and 5,495 members.

Dennis Young, a 1969 ECU graduate, is the Pirate Club's Executive Director. Dennis is responsible for the Educational Foundation's participation in the University's \$50 million "Shared Visions Campaign" and oversees the Pirate Club operation. A native of Winston-Salem, Dennis played football at ECU during the 1965-67 seasons. He and his wife, Ellen have two children — Allison Baise and Chip.

Mark Hessert is the Pirate Club's Assistant Director. Prior to joining the Pirate Club staff, Mark was Executive Director of The University of Akron's Zip Athletic Club. Mark is responsible for the Pirate Club's annual fund campaign and oversees the Pirate Rep Program. Mark and his wife, Cheri, have one child — Logan.

Jennifer Little and Tripp Roakes, ECU graduates, are Pirate Club Field Representatives. Jennifer and Tripp, along with Mark, have responsibility of coordinating the Pirate Club's thirty-seven community chapters, which span the East Coast from the Washington, D.C. area to Atlanta, Georgia.

Pirate Club members enjoy a number of benefits including priority in purchasing football and basketball season tickets and post season tickets; private and semi-private parking for home games; use of Pirate Club facilities; monthly newsletter; and the opportunity to attend special meetings with ECU coaches and athletic administrators. For the 1993 football season, a new point system has been developed to use in determining priority seating for Pirate Club members. The system takes into consideration a member's annual contribution, consecutive years of membership, cumulative amounts given over time, and season ticket purchasing beginning with the 1993 football season. Minimum annual membership contributions begin at \$50.

Members of the Pirate Club also receive a sense of ownership in the success of the Pirate athletics program and a great deal of satisfaction from their investment in the lives of Pirate student-athletes, who represent ECU on and off the "playing fields."

The Chancellor

Dr. Richard R. Eakin

For Chancellor Richard R. Eakin, the terms "academics" and "athletics" are not mutually exclusive, but mutually reinforcing. He knows from personal experience.

As a Geneva College undergraduate, he majored in mathematics and physics while a member of the basketball team.

He also served as President of the Student Senate and Class Valedictorian and was graduated in 1960 with the honor summa cum laude.

Today Dick Eakin is in his seventh year as ECU's chief executive officer and his leadership mark is evident throughout ECU, including athletics.

He has a vision of greatness for ECU and leads in the belief that the university can build upon and add to its elements of distinction and strong tradition for excellence in teaching, research, regional services, and athletics.

With enthusiasm and remarkable stamina, Dr. Eakin pursues this vision around the clock and on-the-road as ECU's highly visible top ambassador.

Strategic planning has been the linchpin of the Chancellor's administration. From it has evolved new degree programs, new



and stronger centers for excellence, campus beautification and modernization of facilities, an emphasis on computer technology for students and faculty, and an energetic, focused fund-raising plan for academics, athletics, and medicine.

Improved campus life and student services continue to be high on the Chancellor's agenda. Under his direction, the campus will soon have a state-of-the-art dining hall, a student recreation and wellness center, and a \$26 million addition to the campus library. ECU's reputation as one of the leading family practice, primary care medical schools in the country is being enhanced with new centers for the treatment of cancer, diabetes, heart disease, and alcohol and drug abuse.

In pursuit of ECU's goals, Chancellor Eakin is chairman of the Board of Directors of the College Football Association (CFA), holds leadership positions with the Southern Association for Colleges and Schools (SACS), and is in the forefront of economic and community development in Greenville and throughout Eastern North Carolina.

Prior to his ECU appointment in 1987, Eakin served for 23 years as a member of the mathematics faculty at Bowling Green State University, where he was also a vice president.

A native of New Castle, Pennsylvania, Dr. Eakin was awarded a master's degree as well as a doctorate in mathematics with a minor in economics from Washington State University. He and his wife, the former Jo Ann McGeehan, have two adult children, Matthew of Charlotte and Maridy of Raleigh.

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Dave Hart, Jr. - Director of Athletics

Dave Hart, Jr., who has gained national recognition for his skills in areas of athletics management, public relations, marketing, and fundraising, enters his sixth year as Director of Athletics at East Carolina University.

Since being appointed Athletics Director on December 21, 1987, by ECU Chancellor Richard Eakin, Hart has become one of the country's most respected athletics administrators.



In making the appointment, Chancellor Eakin stated that, "Dave has an exceptional understanding of all aspects of athletics administration, has a strong commitment to excellence and integrity throughout the men's and women's programs, and possesses, in my judgement, the leadership qualities to develop our athletics program and move it to new levels of achievement."

Hart has done just that in leading ECU's athletics program. East Carolina athletics has moved to another level as it relates to image and respect. Last spring, as the University completed its Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accreditation program, the Athletics Department received one of four commendations from the SACS review team for the manner in which athletics is managed at ECU. In addition, the Athletics Department completed the NCAA's Pilot Certification Program as one of 38 universities which volunteered their participation in the pilot program which has since become mandated.

Since becoming Director of Athletics, Hart has structured several programs of significance within the department. The most notable one is ECU's comprehensive Student Development Program for all student-athletes. Last winter the Athletics Department received a half-million dollar gift from Bob and Margaret Ward of Burlington, North Carolina, earmarked for Student Development. During Hart's tenure as Athletics Director, ECU student-athletes have made significant progress academically.

Facility enhancement has also been very evident during Hart's tenure. Renovations to Scales Field House (non-revenue sports), Harrington Field (baseball) and the football practice facility, complement very nicely ECU's beautiful Ward Sports Medicine Complex which is one of the finest facilities of its kind in the entire nation. This coming Spring a nine-million dollar renovation of Minges Coliseum will be underway which will include chairback seating, air conditioning, a new playing surface, new concession stands and new locker rooms for the men's and women's programs. The renovation project will take ECU's basketball programs to a new and exciting level.

Phase One of a three-phased stadium renovation and expansion plan was completed in August. The original section of the Stadium, on the Press Box side, was replaced. Plans are in place to extend the Press Box to both goal lines in order to accommodate club level seating. Phase III of the Stadium Expansion Project calls for an upper deck on the north side of the Stadium taking the seating capacity to approximately 50,000. Phase III is targeted for 1996.

Pirate athletics continue to gain in exposure and credibility under Hart's tenure. Pirate football completed the best season in school history in 1991, finishing 11-1 and #9 in the nation, the ECU baseball team has made four trips to the NCAA tournament since 1988, and the Pirate golf team captured their 5th CAA golf crown in the last six years. The Pirate Basketball team won the CAA Championship this past winter, making the first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 1972.

Hart was named associate director of athletics for external relations and executive director of the Pirate Club in 1985. His duties included the raising of funds for athletic scholarships through the Pirate Club, as well as overseeing all external areas of the athletic department.

During his first two years in that position, the Pirate Club experienced record-setting growth as it surpassed the coveted \$1 million mark in contributions for the first time ever. The 1987 campaign saw another record performance under his direction as the Club exceeded the \$1.2 million level.

Hart first joined the ECU athletic department in 1983 as an assistant athletic director for marketing. It was the first time that ECU had ever employed a full-time staff member for marketing, and it immediately brought dividends.

ECU's marketing program gained national attention for the rapid growth in crowd participation through tailgating and other promotional efforts. Hart was also responsible for implementing the "Great Pirate Purple/Gold Pigskin Pig-Out Party," which is a weekend extravaganza surrounding the spring football game.

Additionally, attendance at home football games increased greatly as evidenced by the fact that 11 of the top 12 crowds in Ficklen Stadium history have entered the turnstiles since the 1983 season. Promotional ventures such as the "Ain't It Great to Tailgate" idea have added to the atmosphere at Pirate home games.

Hart has served on several prestigious committees during his tenure as Athletics Director, including the Committee for Integrity and Image in College Athletics. He currently serves on the Missions and Values Committee. Hart chairs the CAA's Marketing Committee and is a member of the conference committee on expansion.

Hart is a popular speaker at the national level and has authored articles for a number of national publications. He has made numerous speaking presentations at conventions and seminars on program management, marketing, fundraising, and personnel transition. For the past seven years he has been an instructor at the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics' Management Institute.

Hart, just the fifth athletics director in ECU history, received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Alabama, earning a B.S. in English/Speech in 1971 and a master's degree in 1972. He attended Alabama on a basketball scholarship and was a graduate assistant coach for the Crimson Tide program in 1972. He won nine varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball at Annapolis (MD) High School where he was also an All-State basketball and football player.

He is married to the former Pam Humble of Tuscaloosa, AL, and they have three children — Ricky (21), Jamie (19), and Kelly (16).

Charlie Carr

**Associate Athletics Director
for Compliance and Revenue Sports**

Charlie Carr, a well-known member of the college athletics scene in the state of North Carolina as a player, coach and administrator, begins his sixth year as associate athletics director at East Carolina.

Carr became ECU's associate director for external affairs and Executive Director of the Pirate Club in mid-February of 1988. He followed Dave Hart in this position after Hart's appointment as ECU's director of athletics.

During his tenure as Executive Director of the Pirate Club, Carr was instrumental in the Pirate Club's raising of \$1.7 million.

In 1991, Carr began his role of coordinating all NCAA compliance for the ECU Athletics Department while assisting the athletics director with scheduling and revenue sports programs.

He played football and baseball while attending the University of North Carolina. After receiving his master's degree in 1970, he played two seasons of professional baseball in the New York Mets organization.

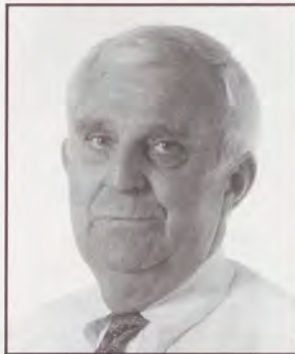
Carr then was an assistant football coach for the Tar Heels from 1971-75 under coach Bill Dooley. He later coached at Rice University from 1975-78.

Dr. Henry VanSant, whose association with East Carolina dates back four decades, is in his sixth year as associate athletics director at his alma mater.

VanSant was an administrative assistant to the athletic director for three years prior to his elevation to associate director. In addition to working closely with athletics director Dave Hart, VanSant is responsible for overseeing all internal operations within the athletics department.

He oversees the business office, student-athlete support services, non-revenue programs, and operations.

VanSant first came to ECU in 1957 as a student-athlete on the 1957 Pirate football team. He was a center and linebacker for ECU teams from 1957-60 before becoming a member of the ECU coaching staff from 1962-1970 under coach Clarence Stasavich.

The Hampton, Va. native was the freshman coach from 1962-66 and, in 1966, he coached the only undefeated first-year team in school history. He also assisted on the Pirates' back-to-back Tangerine Bowl titles in 1964 and 1965.

VanSant has also been a head football coach on the high school level in North Carolina, as well as head coach at Guilford College and Lenoir-Rhyne College.

He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from East Carolina in 1961 and 1962, respectively. He later received his doctoral degree in education from the University of Alabama in 1975.

Jim Bass begins his fifth year as Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing at East Carolina.

ECU Athletics Department Earns Commendation from Accreditation Group

East Carolina University's intercollegiate athletics department recently received a commendation in a self-study in conjunction with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The SACS report gave the athletics department one of four special mentions to ECU in its recent reaccreditation study.

Also, East Carolina was one of 38 programs to volunteer to go through a Pilot Certification Program done by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). The Certification Program was a self-study of all areas of athletics done by representatives from various parts of the University.

All schools in the NCAA will have to go through this certification process in the near future.

All SACS schools are required to be reaccredited each 10 years. This was the first time that the group sent a representative to a campus for the sole purpose of working with the athletics department.

"The committee notes with pleasure that East Carolina University's Athletic Department is being well managed, and that it has developed effective means to integrate its activities into the broader and fundamental aspects of the academic life of the institution, and that it manages the areas of academics, compliance, athletic competition and budget control as a responsible agent of the University," reported the visiting SACS committee in its final report.

Jim Smith, professor of philosophy at ECU, served as the school's chairman of the SACS study while a delegation from the organization visited the campus.

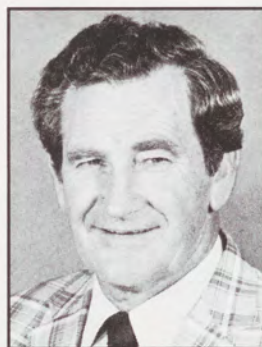

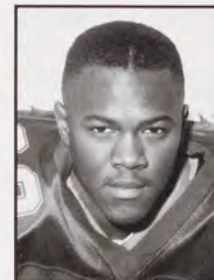

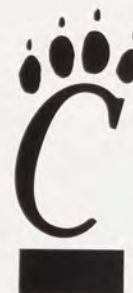

On the following drive, Eric Myers tackled David Small in the end zone for a safety.

* In the 1990 game, Jeff Blake became the first ECU quarterback to rush and pass for over 100 yards since Ron Jones did it in 1985. Blake passed for 199 yards and ran for 119 more. David Daniels also rushed for 121 yards and three touchdowns.

* Anthony Thompson and Ricky Torain had interceptions in the 1989 game's final five minutes. David Daniels scored two touchdowns in the contest.

* After a scoreless first quarter, the Pirates scored 42 points in the next two, giving Art Baker a victory in his last game as ECU coach in 1988. Tim James had a career high 156 yards rushing.

* ECU rushed for a Ficklen Stadium record 500 yards in the 1987 contest. Reggie McKinney had the second highest rushing total in school history — 212 yards. The Pirates scored 28 fourth quarter points.

* ECU had 432 yards of total offense and scored 22 second-half points in the 1986 game. Freshmen scored all of ECU's touchdowns — Willie Lewis had two and Brian McPhatter had two.

(Above) Redshirt freshman Derrek Batson made an immediate impact in 1992. In this picture, Batson returns a punt 97 yards for a touchdown against West Virginia. The return was the longest in school history. Another big play that Batson made during the season was a 14-yard reception on a fake punt that enabled ECU to continue on the game-winning drive.



(Above) True freshman Mark Libiano was supposed to have redshirted the 1992 season. But injuries at the linebacker spot forced the Easton, Pa. native, to play. Libiano finished the season with 27 tackles including a season-best seven against Southern Miss.



(Left) Junior Smith became the first Pirate to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season since 1979. The Fayetteville, N.C. native, had 1,037 yards on 186 carries and nine touchdowns during his sophomore season. Smith also had the second highest single game rushing total in school history with 243 yards on 31 carries against Arkansas State.

(Right) Junior college transfer Morris Letcher also had a fine rookie season with the Pirates. The Kansas City, Kan. native, had 1,626 all-purpose rushing yards in 1992. Against Memphis State, Letcher had 304 all-purpose rushing yards, breaking a school record. He led the Pirates in catches with 47 for 557 yards and five touchdowns.



(Right) Carlester Crumpler's 21-yard touchdown reception against Virginia Tech gave the Pirates a 30-27 victory over the Hokies. Crumpler caught 38 passes for 524 yards and four touchdowns. Not only is Crumpler a fine receiver, but he is an outstanding blocker. Crumpler caught four or more passes in four games in 1992.

(Below) Bernard Carter was ECU's big play maker on defense in 1992. The Tallahassee, Fla. native, had a school record 11 sacks and 20 1/2 for his career. Carter also led the Pirates with 23 quarterback hurries. Against Arkansas State, he had 15 tackles. Playing alongside Carter in this photo is Tony Davis, who led the Pirates in tackles with 122 last season. Davis had eight games with double digit tackles in 1992.





(Left) Michael Anderson had his ups and downs in 1992. The Decatur, Ga. native, completed 222 passes for 2,486 yards and 22 touchdowns, but also threw 23 interceptions. He had over 300 yards passing in four games. Anderson broke or tied 12 school records in 1992 and finished third in career pass completions and fourth in career passing yardage at East Carolina.



(Right) Clayton Driver was known for making the acrobatic catches during his Pirate career. In 1992, the College Park, Ga. native, caught 43 passes for a team-high 624 yards and six touchdowns. Against Cincinnati, Driver had 10 catches for 155 yards.

(Right) Cedric Van Buren's football career came to a sudden end before the Southern Miss game. The Charleston, S.C. native, had a neck condition that was discovered the week of the USM contest. Steve Logan called Van Buren, "the finest football player I've ever coached." Van Buren caught 31 passes in 1992, the most ever by a Pirate running back.



(Above) Tom Scott may have been the biggest player ever to wear an ECU uniform. At 6-7, 338, he was also one of the finest offensive linemen in college football in 1992. The Rose Hill, N.C. native was a first-team All-America by The Sporting News and Football News in 1992 and was named the Southeast's Finest Offensive Lineman by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

(Below) Jerry Dillon played most of 1992 with a broken thumb, but that did not stop the Lake Placid, Fla. linebacker from having a fine senior season. Dillon finished second on the squad with 103 tackles, despite missing two games. Against Arkansas State, he had 17 stops and against West Virginia and Southern Miss, he had 15 tackles each.



(Right) Defensive back Greg Grandison continued to be a big-play maker for the Pirates in 1992. The Pensacola, Fla. senior, had six interceptions to go along with his 68 tackles last season. Against Southern Miss, he had a season best nine stops.

Syracuse 42, ECU 21 — Ismail, Syracuse speed past East Carolina

East Carolina cornerback Greg Floyd compares playing against Qadry Ismail to "lining up against a Porsche every play."

It took a single play Saturday night for Syracuse's Ismail to break the speed limit.

Ismail is sometimes a flanker, sometimes a wishbone halfback, but he is always in fifth gear. Saturday, Ismail scored on a 64-yard run on Syracuse's opening play from scrimmage, setting the tone for a 42-21 Orange victory at sold-out Ficklen Stadium.

The loss broke an 11-game winning streak for the Pirates. East Carolina's last loss previous to Saturday was a 38-31 fall in 1991 at Illinois that turned on a controversial call against the Pirates for unsportsmanlike conduct.

This game had no such drama once Ismail, the brother of former Notre Dame star Raghib "Rocket" Ismail, touched the ball.

Following the opening kickoff, the Orangemen lined up in a pro set with Ismail split wide, then shifted suddenly into a wishbone. The ball went to Ismail on a pitch from Syracuse quarterback Marvin Graves, and 64 yards later Ismail was in the end zone, quite alone.

Ismail "gee-goshed" his way through a post-game interview, giving most of the credit to his blocking. But new East Carolina coach Steve Logan knew better.

"When you let that kid loose, it's going to be a touchdown," Logan said. "That's that."

The next two times Ismail touched the ball were only slightly less impressive. His 20-yard run on a reverse set up Syracuse's third touchdown and a 21-0 halftime lead. His 34-yard reception in the third quarter set up another Syracuse touchdown for a 28-7 edge.

A year ago, the Pirates could have responded with a magician of their own. But quarterback Jeff Blake has left for the NFL and Blake's two successors — Sean McConnell and Michael Anderson — combined to complete just 12 of 30 passes in the first half.

McConnell started, but failed to push the Pirates across midfield in the Pirates' first two possessions. Then Anderson took over, working out of the shotgun to push East Carolina to Syracuse's 12-yard line with a 42-yard completion to Cedric Van Buren.

But Anderson then threw three straight incomplete passes and Michael Jacob's field-goal attempt flew wide. That's as close as the Pirates came to a score in the first half.

Logan hardly sounded contrite afterward, despite the lopsided score.

"I don't think there's an offense in the country that can consume the field better than us. It's really scary," Logan crowed. "If that's the 10th-best team in the country, I'll go tee it up with them in 20 minutes."

Logan drew his cockiness from a short Pirates comeback early in the second half.

McConnell found split end Clayton Driver on a turn-in pattern for a 28-yard touchdown, then ECU gambled on a onside kick.

The play worked when safety Hank Cooper jumped on the ball for the Pirates. But McConnell fumbled the possession away, as he was hit by Syracuse cornerback Doug Womack. On the next play, Graves found Ismail, on a play fake, for the 34-yard completion.

"I really felt we had a chance to get back in the game there, and we didn't," Logan said.

Perhaps the most impressive thing about the Orangemen is their balance. A different Orangeman scored each touchdown.

"They've got Ismail. They also have Graves, (Shelby) Hill and (David) Walker," Greg Floyd said. "They're effective because they're more than one person."

The crowd of 36,500 was the largest in East Carolina history.

ECU 30, Virginia Tech 26 — ECU rallies to beat VPI, 30-27

For one week, at least, the magic is back at East Carolina.

Tight end Carlester Crumpler caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from Michael Anderson with 42 seconds left Saturday to give the Pirates a lead and Clayton Driver caught a pass for a two-point conversion as ECU beat Virginia Tech, 30-27.

East Carolina (1-1) trailed the Hokies 27-22 with 3:46 left in the game, but Anderson directed the winning drive as the Pirates moved 71 yards in eight plays.

"Michael will be the hero today, but he's close to being a goat because of the interceptions he threw. The courage that he showed by being able to come back and go one play at a time indicates what we have seen on the practice field," ECU coach Steve Logan said.

Anderson was the hero as he led the Pirates to 516 yards in total offense. The big sophomore threw for 349 yards and three touchdowns and three interceptions. Junior Smith led the Pirates in rushing with 59 yards on 13 carries.

ECU had to outscore the Hokies because the Pirate defense couldn't stop them. Virginia Tech amassed 357 yards in total offense, just over half of what the Pirates gave up against Syracuse in their season-opening loss.

Virginia Tech (1-1) wasted little time in getting on the scoreboard. The Hokies let a standing room only crowd of 35,121 know what kind of day it would be as DeShazo hooked up with split end Antonio Freeman for a 50-yard gain on VPI's first play of the day.

With the Hokies deep in ECU territory and threatening to get into the end zone, the Pirate defense stiffened and forced VPI to settle for a 33-yard field goal by Ryan Williams. The Hokies led 3-0 with 9:34 left in the first quarter.

After an exchange of missed field goals, East Carolina got moving and reach the VPI 3 thanks to two long completions from Anderson to Driver (18 yards) and Derek Batson (24 yards). On first-and-goal, however, Cedric Van Buren fumbled a pitchout and VPI had survived a major scare.

Late in the second quarter, East Carolina recovered a fumble at the Hokie 28 and took just four plays to score. On fourth-and-2 at the 20, ECU lined up for a field goal attempt, but holder Michael Jacobs stood up and found Van Buren wide open down the middle for a touchdown. Deke Owens tacked on the extra point, giving the Pirates a 7-3 lead with 2:59 left in the half.

An exchange of punts left the Pirates in possession at the VPI 39 with just under a minute remaining. Anderson hooked up with Crumpler for 11 yards and with Pete Zophy for 19 more to set up a 26-yard field goal by Owens with 10 seconds to go.

Virginia Tech took three cracks at the Pirate defense in the third quarter before scoring. The Hokies drove 71 yards in 11 plays to tie the game on a one-yard sneak by DeShazo with 4:08 left. The key play in the drive was an 18-yard run by tailback Tony Kennedy. Kennedy carried six times for 46 of his 56 yards during the drive.

The score was tied at 10-10, but it didn't stay tied for long. On third and 10 at the Pirate 46, Anderson tried to throw a screen pass to wide receiver

Morris Letcher, but VPI corner Tyrone Drakeford stepped in front of Letcher and raced 40 yards for a touchdown. With 3:24 left in the third quarter, Virginia Tech had a 17-10 lead.

ECU was not impressed. The Pirates marched 77 yards on their next possession for what should have been the tying points. On second-and-3 VPI's 39, Driver out-scrambled safety Kirk Alexander to make a diving catch in the end zone.

ECU had narrowed the gap to 17-16, but the Pirates' age-old enemy — the kicking game — reared its ugly head on the extra point. VPI's Bernard Basham broke through and blocked the kick, reviving memories of a similar block that cost ECU a game against the Hokies two years ago.

Just when the Pirates seemed to have found their momentum, Anderson's inexperience cost ECU points again. Anderson tried to go deep to Crumpler on a turn-in, but Drakeford picked off the pass and returned it to East Carolina's 25. The Hokies took five plays to score, this time on a three-yard burst by Kennedy.

With time running out, and the Pirates trailing 24-16, Anderson won his spurs. The sophomore connected on five straight passes as ECU drove 92 yards for a score. Zophy caught a 17-yard strike with 6:36 left to cut the gap to 24-22. An attempted two-point conversion failed.

Another interception by Drakeford nearly cost ECU the game. The junior cornerback returned his third pickoff of the day to East Carolina's seven-yard line. At that point, the Pirate defense got tough. VPI seemed ready to put the game away, but a penalty for illegal motion and a loss of three yards on second down forced the Hokies to settle for a 22-yard field goal from Williams with 3:46 left.

Trailing 27-22, ECU got moving again. Anderson found Van Buren for 13 yards, then went to Batson for 11 more. Zophy's circus catch added 14 yards to the total and brought ECU to the Hokies' 29.

Another pass to Zophy picked up eight yards, setting up a pass to Crumpler that looked very much like a game-winning pattern in the Peach Bowl. Anderson then fired the ball through a small crack in the Hokie defense to Driver for a two-point conversion.

ECU 20, South Carolina 18 — Bucs pull out a winner

There was no joy in Mudville for South Carolina's football team on this stormy Saturday night, but there was for East Carolina's.

Yes, the Pirates pulled a few pranks and pulled out another routinely nerve-wracking 20-18 victory that, in the end, sent shivers up 60,030 spines at rain-drenched Williams-Brice Stadium.

Still using some of their 1991 magic, the Bucs survived two field-goal attempts by sure-footed Marty Simpson in the last 25 seconds, hung on and beat the winless Gamecocks in Columbia for the first time in eight tries.

It came down to this: On third down, Simpson — who had booted four consecutive field goals — tried a 36-yarder that was blocked by Thomas Jones, a stand-in for injured Jerry Dillon.

But South Carolina recovered. So the Gamecocks specialist took another crack on fourth down from the same spot with 15 ticks left. It was no good.

Unbelievable? Nope. Just routine for these 2-1 Pirates, who won close games all last season and edged Virginia Tech in the final seconds with a dramatic drive a week ago.

"Our team was not scared this time at Williams-Brice," Pirate coach Steve Logan said. "This was a big win for us because it proves we can play in this stadium where we have not played well the times I've been at ECU."

They did it, partly, through deception. The Pirates executed one of the game's most scintillating plays when Logan reached up his sleeve again and pulled out another trick.

With ECU leading 13-12 early in the fourth period and facing a fourth-and-14 situation from its own 39, Mike Jacobs dropped back to punt.

But he didn't kick. He tossed a short pass to Derrek Batson, who got away from a Gamecock defender and gained 19 yards for a first down.

The Pirates kept the ball, kept rolling and scored when Michael Anderson threw his third touchdown pass of the night — a 6-yarder to Clayton Driver. Deke Owens' PAT made it 20-12.

Some cynics scoffed at the call, saying it was more nutty than nifty. But Logan believes in foxy football, and it worked like a charm.

"I think that [fake punt] was a key play in the game," Logan said.

But even after all that, the Pirates were not out of harm's way. The Gamecocks marched 72 yards in eight snaps to pull within 20-18.

On the do-or-tie two-point conversion, East Carolina's Fred Walker batted down a pass to keep ECU ahead.

Earlier, the Pirates dodged more bullets. The frustrated Gamecocks, falling to 0-3, fumbled on first down at the ECU 1 and then bobbed again after advancing to the Pirate 2, finally settling for a field goal.

"We couldn't have played any harder," South Carolina coach Sparky Woods said.

Much of the game was played in a downpour, and Logan said "it affected our play tremendously." But the pass-happy Pirates adjusted, prudently mixing the run with its aerial attack.

Anderson completed 18 of 35 for 219 yards and elusive Junior Smith netted 134 yards on 20 rushes, including one 45-yard dash on another trick play.

So it went, touch and go, nip and tuck to the end. And there was Simpson getting ready to kick the Pirates into submission and trying to help USC avoid its seventh straight defeat dating back to last season. But Jones had other ideas.

"The coaches said if Simpson was kicking the ball low, we could get it if we jumped in the middle," Jones said of the block. "I didn't know what was going on after we blocked it. All of a sudden, I looked up and they were kicking it again."

Bowling Green 44, ECU 34 — Falcons hand East Carolina a 44-34 defeat

Football games are not won by offense alone. Even East Carolina head coach Steve Logan has been convinced.

"We didn't play very good defense today and when you don't play good defense I don't think your program has a chance to step forward," Logan said after a 44-34 loss at Bowling Green.

"It's a credit to their offense. I was worried about their offense all week long."

With good reason.

The Falcons (2-2), plagued by 12 turnovers the last two weeks, were near flawless in compiling 472 yards of total offense — 226 on the ground and 246 through the air. They turned the ball over just once.

ECU (2-2) had three costly interceptions, was penalized 12 times and struggled once again in the kicking game. That was too much for even 520 total yards to overcome.

"If we put 34 points on the board and have over 450 yards in total offense, that's got to be enough points and yards to win a football game," Logan said. "Until we take responsibility as a defensive unit to step forward week after week, we're not going to win any football games."

Bowling Green senior quarterback Erik White was the big thorn in ECU's side. He completed 27 of 40 passes with two touchdowns and one interception.

More importantly, nearly every time the Falcons needed a big play he produced.

White kept four scoring drives alive with a completion to convert on either a third or fourth down then twice scrambled for a first down as the Falcons drained the final three minutes.

Aiding White were six running backs with 20 yards or more, led by Zeb Jackson's 79 yards on 16 carries. White also spread his passes to nine receivers. Mark Szlachcic had five catches for 65 yards and one touchdown. Ronnie Redd added four catches for 59 yards and a TD.

"They executed and we didn't play very good defense over and over and over all day long," Logan said. "We played one series of defense to open the third quarter. Other than that, we failed to show up."

Redshirt sophomore Michael Anderson, who played all but the first two series, completed 33 of 55 passes for 379 yards, putting him over 1,000 for the season. He had two touchdown passes and was intercepted three times.

Junior Smith, coming off a 104-yard performance against South Carolina, gave the Pirates some punch on the ground with 71 yards on 14 carries and three touchdowns.

Pete Zophy had career highs for receptions (12) and reception yardage (148). Tight end Carlester Crumpler added six catches for 104 yards.

Anderson's first interception, picked off by Joe Bair, set up a 30-yard field goal by Brian Leaver that capped a run of 17 unanswered points and gave the Falcons a 17-7 lead.

Sean McConnell directed ECU on a 7-play, 68-yard drive to open the game. Junior Smith ran four yards for the score and Deke Owens added the PAT kick.

But the Falcons would score on five of their next six possessions for a 31-20 halftime lead. Two of the scores were set up by Michael Jacobs punts of 15 and 22 yards.

... White hit Szlachcic two plays later from 25 yards and Leaver tied it.

A 15-yard punt by Jacobs after ECU stalled at the Bowling Green 44 kept the Falcons out of a hole. They need just six plays to drive the 71 yards with

Leroy Smith going the final seven.

After Leaver's field goal made it 17-7, the Pirates used a big kickoff return by Morris Letcher and the running of Junior Smith and Cedric Van Buren to close to within 17-14. Smith got the TD on a 1-yard run.

The Falcons answered by matching 72 yards in 12 plays, converting a third-and-7 from the Falcon 48. Jackson scored on a 1-yard run.

ECU struck back quickly when Anderson eluded a rush and found Zophy behind Carlos Brooks to complete a 2-yard play.

Owens missed the PAT attempt, leaving it 24-20.

The Pirates were threatening again on their next possession after Anderson hit Zophy for 31 yards to the Bowling Green 27.

After three incompletes, ECU set up for a field goal. But on a fake, Morris Foreman took a handoff from Jacobs and threw in the direction of Crumpler, who was bumped. The pass fell incomplete.

The Falcons then drove 73 yards, scoring when Redd out-jumped Fred Walker to snare an 18-yard toss from White.

Anderson hit six consecutive passes in a 10-play, 69-yard drive that got ECU within 31-26 in the third period. Smith got the TD on a 1-yard run.

A pass for two points failed when Anderson was blind-sided by Dave Bielinski.

After Jackson scored from a yard out to make it 37-26, Bielinski came up with the first sack of Anderson since the Syracuse game to stop another ECU threat.

Bair and Darnell Staten came up with interceptions on the next two ECU possessions. Staten's was cashed in for TD on a 4-yard Jackson run.

Anderson found Driver for 19 yards with 3:48 left then hit Driver on the two-point conversion.

The Falcons recovered the on-sides kick and ran out the clock.

Duke 45, ECU 14 — Defense Lifts Blue Devils Over Pirates

Duke smothered East Carolina with relentless, hard-hitting defense yesterday afternoon to take a stunning 45-14 victory at Wallace Wade Stadium.

Duke forced six turnovers and feasted on them and ECU's other mistakes in front of a crowd of 34,100. Four of the turnovers were interceptions of quarterback Michael Anderson, and they helped shut down the nation's top passing team.

ECU had been averaging 399 yards passing but was limited to 167 by Duke. ECU managed only 31 yards passing in the first half, after which it trailed 28-0.

Duke used five defensive backs for most of the game to prevent ECU's receivers from breaking open, especially deep.

But even with only four linemen pushing, and sometimes just three, Duke was able to bat several of Anderson's passes into the air and to pressure him into errant throws.

Defensive lineman David Waffle, who led the pass rush, said that Duke wanted to atone for its performance two weeks ago, when it surrendered 511 yards to Virginia and was bombed 55-28.

"We just had a lot to prove," Waffle said. "We thought we could play with these guys. We thought there was some stuff we could do to them. Everybody just got psyched up and was ready to go."

But the loss to Virginia wasn't the only burr under Duke's saddle.

Randy Cuthbert, Duke's tailback, said he and his teammates were mad because they kept hearing that ECU was going to win and its large following was going to celebrate wildly — in Duke's stadium.

"We weren't intimidated by them," Cuthbert said. "We weren't believing what the papers said. We were angry at what we read. We wanted to take care of business today."

Cuthbert helped by rushing for 126 yards, catching five passes for another 36 yards and scoring one touchdown. He ran with the drive of the Cuthbert of old, before knee injuries and surgery slowed him.

Quarterback Spence Fischer, who made his first college start, completed 20 of 29 passes for 222 yards and three touchdowns. He threw two interceptions, but both came after the outcome had been decided.

Duke improved to 2-3 and ECU fell to 2-3.

Coach Steve Logan of ECU once again saw his defense ripped to shreds. ECU allowed at least 42 points for the third time in five games and gave up 461 total yards.

"When you turn the ball over like we did, you lose," Logan said. "Our defense played as hard as they can play. They were really playing hard and creating turnovers for us. We were not responding on the offensive side of the ball."

ECU's downfall started early. The Pirates recovered a fumble on their 46 on the fourth play, but mistakes short-circuited the possession and gave Duke a spark.

On third and one at the Duke 45, Logan went for a big gain instead of a sure first down. Quarterback Sean McConnell, the starter, faked a handoff to the left and then rolled right. He had hoped to freeze Duke's defense so tight end Carlester Crumpler could get open, but Duke didn't bite.

Crumpler was covered and McConnell's pass sailed over his head. ECU was forced to punt, but Garrett Beasley dropped the snap. He tried to pick up the ball and run but was dropped at the ECU 44.

Duke was off and running. It scored in seven plays, when Fischer hit receiver Stanley Dorsey on a four-yard touchdown pass. The point-after kick by Randy Gardner, his first of six, shot Duke into a 7-0 lead with 9:21 left in the quarter.

Duke went up to 14-0 when fullback Robert Baldwin scored on a one-yard run, and regained possession one play after the kickoff when linebacker Darrell Spells intercepted Anderson's pass at the ECU 20.

Duke scored in only one play. Fischer threw a swing pass to Cuthbert on the left and, with center Steve Alderfer out in front for blocking, Cuthbert sped down the sideline into the end zone.

With 34 seconds left in the first quarter, Duke was up 21-0. Duke hadn't scored 21 points in a quarter since Nov. 14, 1987, when it scored 24 against N.C. State.

"That was a great call," Cuthbert said. "We were expecting them to blitz, and they blitzed heavy. Once Spence got the ball over to me, I knew I would get to the end zone. I had a great convoy."

Duke built the lead to 35-0 in the third quarter when defensive back Sean Thomas intercepted an Anderson pass and sped 84 yards for a touchdown. Again, the ball was battered into the air at the line of scrimmage.

ECU did cut the lead to 35-14 by scoring two touchdowns off Duke turnovers, but Duke was still in control.

Coach Barry Wilson of Duke said: "We wanted to go in defensively trying to minimize their game. We figured they'd do their share of moving the ball, but we had to keep them from getting a steady pace of 20, 25, 18, long yardage, intermediate and deep passes completed."

"We knew we were going to give up some yardage and perhaps some points. But as it turned out, we didn't give up too many points. But we surely expected ECU to move the football and, in the first half in particular, our defense did an absolutely tremendous job of bending here and there, but not really breaking and not really giving up points."

ECU 42, Cincinnati 21 — Pirates 'pass' their test, 42-21

Obviously, it's no accident that the Cincinnati Bearcats have been honored guests at three homecoming games already this football season.

It seems the Bearcats, who haven't had a winning season in nine years and haven't been to a Bowl game since Harry Truman was in the White House, are everyone's idea of a homecoming pushover.

They certainly were for East Carolina, which dumped the Bearcats, 42-21, Saturday afternoon during — you guessed it — homecoming day at Ficklen Stadium.

It turns out that a date with Cincinnati is just what the skidding Pirates needed. The loss halted a two-game Pirate losing streak that included a 45-14 debacle last Saturday at Duke.

"This win today really put us back on track for a winning season," East Carolina quarterback Michael Anderson said.

The game featured the return of the explosive Pirate offense that was nowhere to be found against Duke.

After a sluggish first half and a third quarter that opened with Anderson throwing two straight interceptions, the sophomore quarterback got hot and finished with 314 yards passing, including four TDs.

The revelation that changed the game came late in the first half, when the Pirates (3-3) scored their first touchdown using their two-minute offense.

"When we went into our two-minute drill, we immediately discerned that they were not ready for a five-wide-receiver offense," East Carolina coach Steve Logan said.

So that's what East Carolina threw at the Bearcats the rest of the day. The scheme left Cincinnati linebackers trying in vain to cover speedy East Carolina receivers like senior Clayton Driver, who had a career-high 10 catches for 155 yards.

"We feel that our receivers can beat any linebackers in the country," Anderson said.

At least, they can beat any Cincinnati Bearcat linebacker.

"Their offense just never slowed down," Cincinnati coach Tim Murphy said.

The Pirate offense was slow getting started, however. After Anderson's two interceptions led to Cincinnati touchdowns, the Pirates trailed, 14-7, mid-way through the third quarter.

But then Anderson started clicking, first hitting fullback Cedric Van Buren with a 14-yard pass to tie the game at 14.

After holding the Bearcats on downs, the Pirates came back again and scored on a 13-yard pass from Anderson to tight end Carlester Crumpler.

The Bearcats (1-5) had one more drive left in them, and moved 65 yards in four plays early in the fourth quarter to knot the game at 21.

From then out, though, it was all East

Carolina. First full back Junior Smith ran 18 yards up the left side for a touchdown, then Driver made a one-handed grab at the Cincinnati 30, spun away from a tackler, and ran untouched into the end zone.

The Pirates finished the Bearcats for good when safety Hank Cooper stepped in front of a Lance Harp pass at the five and returned it 95 yards for a touchdown.

While the offense spent the second half running up and down the field, Logan said the key to the victory was the play of the much-maligned Pirate defense, which came into the game ranked 105th of 107 Division 1-A schools.

"We've had three victories this year," Logan said. "Where did we play defense? Those three games."

Helping matters was a mostly-inept and unimaginative Cincinnati offense. But for East Carolina, a win is a win is a win.

"This is a thousand times better than last week," Driver said.

ECU 37, Pittsburgh 31 — Pirates top Pitt by 37-31

For the record, East Carolina's win over Pittsburgh on Saturday reads 37-31.

Another case where the Pirates' offense shouldered the burden and put up just enough points, you say? Not so.

Defense, as strange as it may sound, dominated this one. ECU's defense, ranked 106th among 107 Division I-A teams in the nation, stonewalled the Panthers and quarterback Alex Van Pelt before giving up three fourth-quarter touchdowns.

The Pirates (4-3) led 27-10 at the end of the third quarter and 37-17 with just 4:03 to go. Pitt got its final score with 11 seconds left.

"It's a shame there's 31 points on the board because it's very deceiving," ECU head coach Steve Logan said. "We were in a prevent defense on the last two touchdowns and making them milk the clock."

Scoring drives of 74 and 70 yards in the final four minutes enabled Pitt and Van Pelt to wind up with some big — but misleading — numbers. The Panthers had 565 total yards and Van Pelt completed 29 of 47 passes for 367 yards.

Pitt managed just 138 of its total yards in the first half — 12 in the second quarter.

"I made the comment last Monday that this game would be decided by one of the two defenses," Logan said. "It would be whichever defense showed up because I knew both offenses would show up. Our defense showed up today."

Two stands in the first quarter set the tone.

Trailing 7-0, Pitt put together a drive and had a first down at the ECU 4. A penalty put the Panthers back 5 yards. Zaim Cunmulaj then slipped through to drop Van Pelt for a 7-yard loss.

Curtis Martin's 11-yard run put the ball at the 5, but Van Pelt was pressured by Jerry Dillon on third down and threw incomplete.

Sean Conley came on to attempt a field goal. He never got the chance.

A high snap eluded holder John Ryan, who scrambled to pick up the ball but was caught by Dillon for a 28-yard loss.

Pitt threatened again after Deke Owens came up short on a 48-yard field goal. The Panthers moved to the 10, but Mark Libiano tripped up Martin for a 2-yard loss and Bernard Carter sacked Van Pelt for a loss of 10 more.

The drive stalled there with Conley converting a 38-yard field goal.

"As long as we play good defense and the offense does something, the scoreboard's going to reflect what the Pirates are all about," Dillon said.

The offense did its part, but the biggest contribution may have come from the special teams.

The Pirates recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff, recovered a fumble punt, downed a punt at the Pitt 1 and picked up a first down on a fake punt.

Offensively, ECU had 371 total yards — 214 passing and 157 rushing — and turned the ball over just once. Quarterback Michael Anderson, getting his first collegiate start, completed 20 of 37 passes for 214 yards and Junior Smith rushed for 93 yards and a pair of TDs.

The defense, which came up with two interceptions and a fumble, accounted for a touchdown for the third straight week when Greg Floyd returned an interception 55 yards.

"We went out there and played well offensively and defensively and we executed well in the special teams, also," Cunmulaj said. "It was a real good win."

A fast start on a day that turned dark, cold and

wet may have been the biggest factor.

After Morris Foreman recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff, Anderson got the Pirates in the end zone for only their second first-quarter TD of the season.

Pitt came up empty after having first-and-goal at the 4 then managed only a field goal after a first down at the 10.

The Pirates then seized command in the second period, getting a 1-yard TD run by Smith and Floyd's interception return for a 21-3 halftime lead.

A homecoming crowd of 25,766 was not amused.

"We talked to our football team all week about coming up here, getting off the plane, getting off to a good start and taking this thing late into the fourth quarter and winning the football game," Logan said. "We did control the tempo of the game."

"That's the first time our football team has done that."

Some trickery in the third period kept things from getting suspenseful.

After Lyron Brooks scored on a 6-yard run and Conley added the PAT to make it 21-10, the Pirates faced a fourth-and-3 at the Panthers' 48. Foreman took a short snap and raced around left end for a 9-yard gain and a first down.

Six plays later, on third-and-11, Anderson zipped a 29-yard strike to freshman Derrek Batson to make it 27-10. Owens' kick was blocked.

"They knew it was coming but we had good design," Logan said of the fake punt. "They were in the right call and their front set as if we had a quarterback under center."

"We have been practicing this all year long. All it was is the option."

Owens put ECU up 30-10 with a 31-yard field goal — his longest of the season — with 12:34 left. After Van Pelt hit Dietrich Jells with a 13-yard TD pass, Smith ran 55 yards untouched for a 37-17 lead with 4:03 to play.

The two late scores by Pitt made it close. And if the Panthers could have recovered a final on-sides kick, they would have had one play to win it.

And that was reason to give Logan some concern.

Southern Miss 38, ECU 21 — Southern Miss hands ECU a 38-21 defeat

East Carolina's debut in a nationally televised home game, just two days before Halloween, turned into a fright night.

A Thursday night crowd of 33,249 and an ESPN audience watched the Pirates, trying to extend a two-game win streak, turn the ball over seven times and get hammered by Southern Miss 38-21.

ECU's offense, ranked third in the nation in passing yards, was held to a season-low of 156 yards by the nation's fifth-ranked passing defense. Up-and-down redshirt quarterback Michael Anderson was intercepted five times, tying a school record.

"We just weren't functioning real smoothly tonight," ECU head coach Steve Logan said.

That's an understatement.

The Pirates got outmuscled up front and never hit stride. The passing game, limited to short routes, sputtered at best and produced just 97 yards through three quarters.

By that time, the Eagles were up 28-7 and this game was over.

"We really had them off their rhythm," USM head coach Jeff Bower said. "It was a great job by our defensive staff. They gave them a great plan and the kids went and played really well."

The Golden Eagles, 6-3 overall and 4-0 against Independent Football Alliance teams, cashed in the seven turnovers for just nine points — a pair of field goals by Lance Nations and one by Johnny Lomoro. But Michael Welch ran roughshod for 169 yards on 27 carries.

The Pirates, despite the loss of Cedric Van Buren to a season-ending injury, had two backs with more than 100 yards for the first time since Oct. 20, 1990. Junior Smith ran for a career-high 150 yards on 18 carries and Charles Miles, getting his first start, had 112 yards on 10 carries.

Van Buren, the team's second-leading receiver with 31 catches and second-leading rusher with 215 yards, did not dress out and will miss the remainder of the season because of a congenital spinal condition, known as spina bifida.

... Miles caught a 10-yard touchdown pass from Anderson to get ECU within 13-7 with 4:31 left in the half. But the Eagles scored on their first two possessions of the second half to go up 28-7.

... The Eagles forced two punts to start the third quarter, then recovered a fumble and intercepted two passes on the next three possessions. Tyrone Nix had two fumble recoveries and picked off one pass. LaBariona Rankins and Terry Ulmer intercepted two passes each.

Ulmer now has six for the season. The Eagles have intercepted 17 passes.

Anderson finished 23 of 39 with two touchdown passes. For the season he has as many interceptions as touchdown passes (19).

Bower credited a combination of coverages, constant pressure which created three sacks and several more hurries for rattling Anderson.

"We mixed it up," Bower said. "We played him some man, played some zone, played some dime package. We felt like we had to."

Aside from what proved to be a harmless fumble, USM did nothing to hurt its chances.

... ECU's first error came when Carlester Crumpler was stripped of the ball and Nix recovered at the Pirates' 16. The Eagles salvaged a 32-yard field goal by Nations for a 3-0 lead.

USM marched 66 yards in six plays on its next possession for a 10-0 lead. A 39-yard strike from Tommy Waters to Greg Reed moved the ball to the 13. On second down from the 12, the Eagles picked

up the blitz and Waters flipped a pass to Myreon McKinney, who found clear sailing to the end zone.

Anderson was picked off by Rankins at the ECU 46 on the next play from scrimmage. Two Welch runs moved the ball to the 36, but the drive stalled. Lomoro, a true freshman, came on and booted a 50-yard field goal to make it 13-0 with 11:07 left in the half.

ECU's offense hit stride on the ensuing series, moving 92 yards on 12 plays. Smith broke off runs of 13 and 25 yards and Clayton Driver caught passes for 13 and 12 yards to key the drive. The Pirates scored on the only third-down play on the drive — a 10-yard pass from Anderson to Miles.

The Pirates retained possession when Fred Walker jarred the ball from Reed and Travis Render recovered at the ECU 38. But Nix came up with an interception two plays later.

The Eagles nearly had two more interceptions later in the half with ECU backed up to its 14. Rankins dropped what would have been a sure return for a touchdown. Perry Carter then got his hands on a pass intended for Crumpler.

Ulmer's interception of a desperation pass ended the half.

USM upped its lead to 28-7 by scoring on its first two possessions of the second half, moving 58 and 61 yards. Welch was the catalyst to both drives, with 51 on the first and 59 on the second.

His 32-yard scamper got the Eagles to the ECU 18 on the Eagles' opening series of the half. The touchdown came on a 4-yard pass from backup quarterback Kevin Bentley to tight end Marcus Pope. Pope also got free to snare a pass on the two-point conversion, this time from Waters.

Welch scored the next touchdown on a 50-yard run on USM's only option play of the night. After taking the pitch from Waters, he headed down the right sideline then cut back at the 35 and outran the pursuit. Nations tacked on the PAT.

After another interception by Rankins, Nations kicked a 33-yard field goal to make it 31-7.

Smith scored on an 11-yard run and Anderson zipped a two-point pass to Peter Zophy to make it 31-15.

The Pirates were unable to recover the onside kick. USM needed six plays to go 44 yards with Chris Buckhalter dashing the final 20. A 9-yard pass from Anderson to Crumpler with 4:04 to go capped the scoring.

West Virginia 41, ECU 28 — Mountaineers march past ECU

According to all scouting reports, East Carolina's strategy seemed sound — contain Adrian Murrell.

But while the Pirates keyed on the touted West Virginia tailback Saturday, fullback Rodney Woodard blind-sided 'em as the Mountaineers marched to a 41-28 victory in sun, sleet and snow.

Woodard, who had gained just 183 yards all season, belted the Pirates' innards for 135 yards on 14 carries to lead a multiple-faceted attack that also included solid rushing efforts from backups Jim Freeman and Garrett Ford.

"Their fullback hurt us," Pirate coach Steve Logan said. "We geared our game plan to stopping Murrell [94 yards, 23 carries]. But they made the necessary adjustments to counteract our scheme."

Flurries fell much of the day, but WVU's offense handled the elements with the efficiency of a snowmobile, passing and plowing for 521 yards and 32 first downs. On 24 snaps they ripped off gains of 10 yards or more.

Yet amazingly, the Pirates (4-5) had WVU shivering more from fear than the chill factor in the waning moments.

Behind 34-21, ECU wheeled 80 yards, scoring on a pass from Michael Anderson to Morris Letcher with 1:41 left to pull within 34-28.

A miracle finish was possible. But the ensuing onside kick didn't travel the required distance. WVU took over on the Pirate 37 and punched in another TD to assure victory and improve 4-3-2.

"East Carolina is a pesky outfit," WVU coach Don Nehlen said. "We had a chance to put them away and we couldn't do it. I have nothing but praise for them."

While West Virginia controlled the statistics and most of the game, the Pirates caught the 41,138 fans attention with some big — and bizarre — plays.

In the first period, Derrek Batson staked ECU to a 7-0 lead by rambling 97 yards on a reverse punt return, setting a Pirate record for distance.

Then with less than 12 minutes left in the game, West Virginia, ahead 31-14, moved to the ECU 1. But Freeman fumbled, Ernie Lewis scooped up the loose ball and scored on a 97-yard gallop as Greg Floyd shielded the Olympic sprinter James Jett, who was in hot pursuit.

"But," lamented Lewis, "it was just not enough."

All had begun well for the Pirates this day. Batson's brilliant punt return gave the Pirates an early spark. But the Mountaineers quickly thawed out and retaliated with three straight scores — a field goal and two touchdowns.

Then they rebuffed an ECU threat by pouncing on a fumble at their own 9-yard line moments before intermission to protect a 17-7 halftime lead.

WVU prudently employed the punishing Woodard, who found plenty of daylight up the middle. And quarterback Darren Studstill attacked ECU's flats with passes, winding up with

a 15-for-27 throwing percentage and one TD.

Then as Murrell and Jon Jones (74 yards rushing) further augmented the offense, WVU nurtured leads of 17-7, 24-7, and 31-14 before the Pirates' late flurry.

The Mountaineers, who picked off three Pirate passes, also held a huge advantage in field position in the second half, starting six drives between their own 37 and the ECU 37.

"Our kicking game did not help us," Logan said, referring to short punts. "We also turned the ball over too many times [4]. You can't expect to put your defense in tough situations like that all day and expect to win."

Sean McConnell opened at quarterback for the Pirates and directed the offense until 9:16 left in the second period. Then Anderson relieved, went the rest of the way and finished with 21 completions in 34 attempts for 237 yards, 2 TDs and 2 interceptions.

But West Virginia — which had lost three straight to Syracuse, Penn State and Miami — came into this fray still entertaining bowl hopes.

ECU 35, Arkansas State 18 — Senior Day turns into Junior's day for Pirates

The schedule said Saturday was Senior Day at Ficklen Stadium. To those who saw East Carolina's game with Arkansas State, it looked more like Junior Day.

Sophomore running back Junior Smith rolled up a career-high 232 yards rushing on 31 carries and scored two touchdowns as ECU kept its hopes alive for a winning season by turning back a surprisingly feisty band of Indians 35-18.

"His performance didn't surprise me, because he is a wonderful talent — a quality, exciting back," said Pirate coach Steve Logan of Smith, who did not attend the postgame news conference. "This is the first time since I've been here that I look forward to the running game because we have someone who can make something exciting happen on any play." Smith's performance, the second best by any ECU runner in twenty years, overshadowed a surprisingly long outing by senior quarterback Sean McConnell, who played the entire game in place of Michael Anderson, who has taken the majority of the snaps this season.

McConnell, who completed 12 of 22 for 172 yards and three touchdowns with two interceptions, said he was surprised to stay in the game the whole way.

"Coach Logan told me on our third possession, 'this is your last series, so do something with it,'" McConnell said. "But he always told me that if I kept the ball rolling and kept things moving that he'd keep me in there."

Logan said there was no use tampering with something that was working.

"I left him in because he kept putting us in the end zone," Logan said. "The running game was keeping the pressure off of him, and he was doing a good job moving the team."

More surprising than McConnell still being in the game in the fourth quarter was the fact that Arkansas State (1-9) had not been put away by that point.

The Indians, a team that had lost to the likes of Toledo, Northern Illinois and Troy State by a combined score of 121-7, trailed ECU just 28-18 with 11:22 left to play after an 8-yard touchdown scamper by Savastin Henry and a two-point conversion run by State Crockett.

But a 50-yard run by Smith set up a McConnell touchdown pass to Dwight Linville from two yards out, putting the game away for the Pirates (5-5) with 3:03 left.

"It was a good victory. I never had a bad one," Logan said. "But we did not play with very much intensity."

One area of performance that particularly riled Logan was the punt team, which allowed the Indians to block two kicks.

"I was extremely upset about that," he said. "Getting two punts blocked is ridiculous and inexcusable. There will be personnel changes made on the punt team."

Arkansas State coach Ray Perkins liked the effort by his team, but said his troops were physically outmatched.

"We were overmatched with speed, overmatched with size," he said. "Their program is a couple of levels higher than our program. Our program is at the stage right now where ECU was six years ago."

Smith's second 1-yard scoring run of the game gave ECU what seemed to be a commanding 21-3 lead early in the second half. But with 4:58 left in the third quarter, Indian quarterback Tom Sears hit Jack Dollarhide with a 10-yard scoring toss to cut it to 21-10.

McConnell, who had earlier thrown a 17-yard TD pass to Charles Miles, hit Morris Letcher with a 30-yard scoring bomb that increased the margin to 28-10.

Although he would not comment on the quarterback arrangement for next week, Logan sought to quell any speculation of "quarterback controversy" heading into ECU's last game against Memphis State on Saturday.

"As hard as you guys (the media) have tried (to invent one), there is no quarterback controversy," he said. "Whoever is in the huddle is the quarterback. It's really a non-issue."

Anderson agreed, saying, "I've been playing the whole game and that was no problem for Sean, so him playing the whole game was no problem for me. I told (McConnell) before the game that he should play the whole game because it was Senior Day."

Memphis State 42, ECU 7 — Tigers take air out of Bucs' sails

East Carolina's football team did not see Elvis, did not beat Memphis State, and did not achieve a winning season Saturday afternoon.

Instead, what the Pirates saw was a fired-up Tiger team that trotted up under a "We Believe" banner, struck quickly on three big plays and roared to a 42-7 victory at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

With Steve Matthews passing for 335 yards and three touchdowns and MSU's nationally third-ranked defense in a dominating mood, the Tigers easily moved to 6-5. Conversely, ECU finished 5-6, missing its goal of posting back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in nearly a decade.

"This is about as bad a day as I have ever experienced," first-year ECU coach Steve Logan said.

Memphis State's game plan was obvious. Get the ball and score quickly.

The tone was set early as Matthews fired a 51-yard strike to Ray Patterson on MSU's third snap, then connected on an 80-yard bomb with Russell Copeland. For a diversion, fleet John Martin ran untouched for an 80-yard TD on the way to a 164-yard rushing performance.

Are you getting the picture? All of this happened in the first quarter. In just six offensive plays, MSU led 21-0 and that was pretty much the ball game except for rolling up the score and running out the clock.

"I'm just very disappointed," said Logan, struggling to fathom this finish. "I expected a much better effort. I apologize to the ECU fans and university for the effort that went forth today.

"Memphis State is an excellent team — great defense, great kicking team and a solid offense. There were very few if any redeeming qualities for us today."

Redeeming qualities? Well, sophomore Junior Smith gained 109 yards to finish with 1,037 and become the first ECU back to break the 1,000-yard barrier since Anthony Collins did the trick in 1979.

And Morris Fletcher, playing in his hometown, amassed 304 all-purpose yards to break Dion Johnson's single-game ECU mark of 277 set last year.

But the numbers that stood out on this sunny day were MSU 42, ECU 7.

"It's a very big disappointment not to go out with a winning season," senior offensive lineman Nick Wilson said. "If we had played the rest of the season the way we should have, we wouldn't have put ourselves in this hole."

The Pirates, averaging 436.1 yards per game, netted just 267 — their lowest output the year — against an attacking Tiger defense. ECU also was held to less than 14 points for the first time in 24 games.

Down 28-0, East Carolina averted the shutout when Michael Anderson picked a 28-yard pass

to wide-open Carlos Blake with 1:23 left in the first half. It was Blake's first reception of his Pirate career.

"We couldn't establish anything without defense in the second half," Logan said.

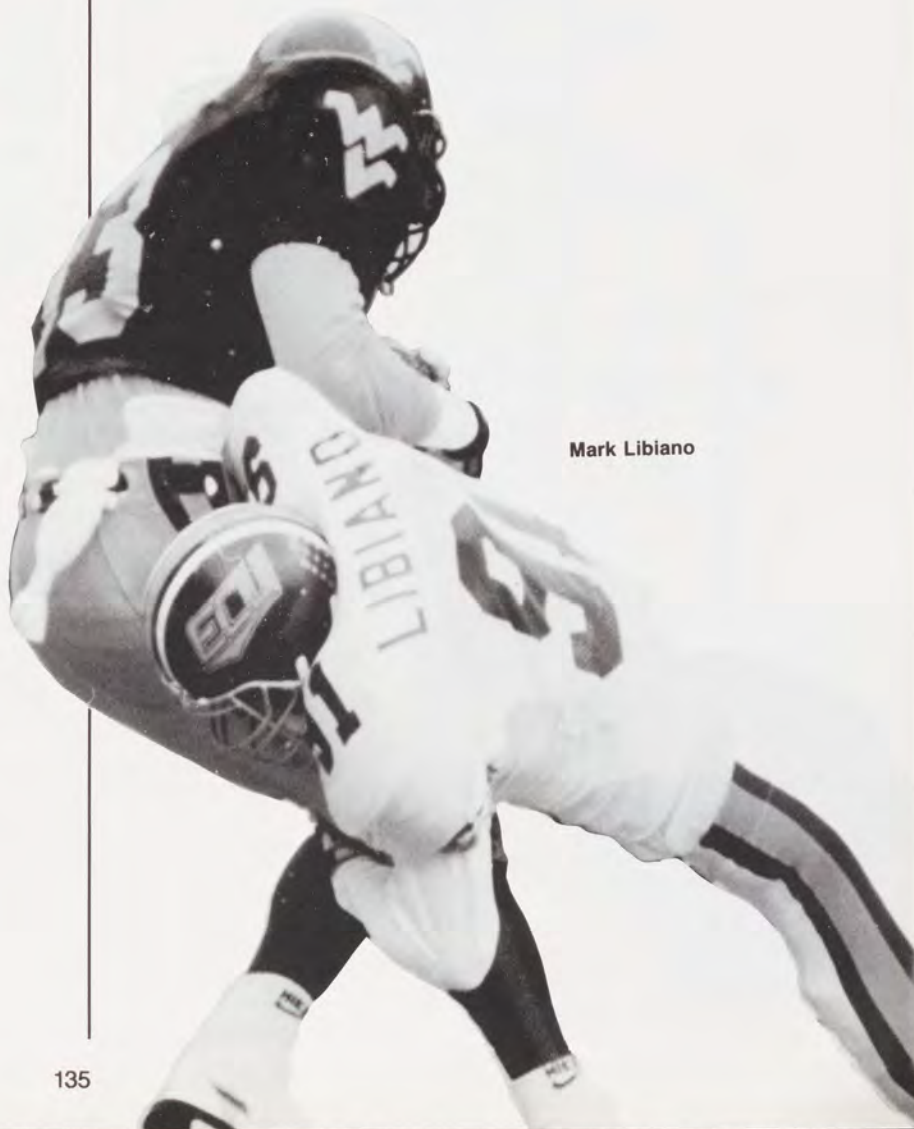

Retired Numbers

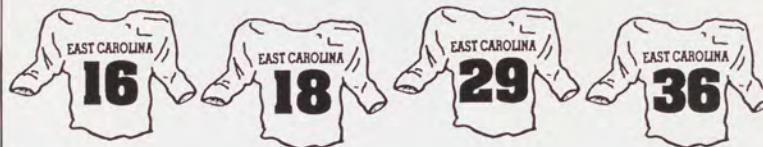
Four numbers have been retired in the history of East Carolina University's football program. Those are numbers 16, 18, 29 and 36.

The jersey number 16 was last worn by Robert Farris, a kicker from Falls Church, Va. Farris was killed in an automobile accident while returning to campus for fall practice prior to his senior season in 1967.

The jersey number 18 was last worn by Norman Swindell, a blocking back from New Bern. The most valuable player on the 1965 team, Swindell drowned near his home during the Christmas holidays following the 1965 season.

The jersey number 29 was worn by James Speight, running back from Greenville. The MVP of the 1957 and 1959 squads, Speight still holds the school record for most points in a single game with 26, while third on the all-time rushing list with 2,700 career yards.

The jersey number 36 was worn by Roger Thrift, a quarterback from New Bern, N.C. He earned letters during the 1949 and 1950 seasons. His jersey was retired by the Student Government Association.

ECU Athletic Hall of Fame

The East Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame was initiated in 1974 as an organization to honor those individuals who have, by direct participation in East Carolina University intercollegiate athletics, brought outstanding recognition to themselves and to the University.

The first honorees were inducted during Homecoming festivities at halftime of the East Carolina-The Citadel football game in 1974. Ten members were selected for the first year. Five years passed between Lawrence "Cotton" Clayton and the induction of the 1989 class—Willard "Butch" Colson, Dr. Leo Jenkins and Kathy Postlewait. Last year, Catherine Bolton, Willie Bryant, Dick Corrada and Bill Greene were inducted into the Hall of Fame.

To be selected, a committee of nine persons must vote with two-thirds of those giving their approval. Those five shall be the official selection committee. To be eligible for selection, a person must not have been connected with the University in the capacity to which the nominee is being elected for a minimum of ten academic years.

1992

Catherine Bolton

Field Hockey, Gymnastics,

Tennis Coach (1969-75)

Volleyball Head Coach (1975-76)

Women's Basketball Head Coach (1969-78)

Bolton was the foundation of women's athletics at East Carolina University in 1969, when she served as head coach of practically every women's sport. She began as head coach of the field hockey, gymnastics, tennis and basketball teams and also took on the duties of volleyball coach in 1975. During her 12 seasons as basketball coach, her teams were 103-51 with eight winning seasons. Bolton currently works in ECU's School of Health and Human Performance.

Willard "Willie" Bryant, Jr.

Football (1973-75)

Wrestling (1974-75)

Bryant was an all-star performer in football and wrestling for two seasons at East Carolina University. As a heavyweight wrestler, Bryant won two Southern Conference titles in 1974-75. In 1973, Bryant won the North Carolina Collegiate Championship. In football, Bryant was named All-Southern Conference as a defensive tackle. Bryant has also been selected to the Gloucester Junior College and National Wrestling Hall of Fames.

Dick Corrada, Jr.

Football (1967-70)

Baseball (1968-71)

Corrada was a two-sport star during his career at East Carolina University. He lettered in football and baseball three seasons at ECU, earning honors in each. In 1970, Corrada earned honorable mention All-America and All-Southern Conference honors as a wide receiver. After 22 years, Corrada still holds the single game reception mark at ECU with 14 catches for 169 yards against Southern Illinois in 1970. He is still ranked in career receptions and receiving yards at East Carolina. Corrada was also a starter at shortstop on the baseball team and signed a professional contract with the Kansas City Royals at the end of his senior season. He was also an All-Southern Conference pick in baseball. Corrada is now Director of Human Resources at King's Dominion in Doswell, Va.

William M.A. "Bill" Greene

Football (1940-41)

Basketball (1940-41)

Greene was a member of East Carolina's 7-0 football team in 1941, the Pirates' only unbeaten, untied football team. After graduating from East Carolina in 1943, Greene served for 30 years in the U.S. Navy. After retiring from the Navy, from which he received the Bronze Star for service in the Vietnam Conflict, Greene served as Executive Director of the North Carolina State Ports Authority from 1977-85. Greene continues to be active in ECU Athletics, helping to organize the annual reunion of the 1941 football team.

1991

Charles "Charlie" Adams

Basketball (1956-59)

Adams played three years at East Carolina, helping lead the Pirates to a 41-29 cumulative record during that span. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1959 and his master's in 1962 from East Carolina. Adams went on to coach at Cary High School from 1962-66 and was athletics director, dean of men and assistant principal at Garner High from 1966-67. He then began working for the North Carolina High School Athletic Association and has served as its executive director since 1984.

Debbie Freeman

Volleyball (1976-78)

Basketball (1976-78)

Track and Field (1976-78)

Freeman earned letters in volleyball, basketball and track and field and still holds many ECU records. She was the Lady Pirates' Most Valuable Player in basketball in 1976 and 1977 and in volleyball in 1977. She was a three-time NCAIAW Division I All-State choice (basketball), one year in volleyball and was the association's Field Events MVP in track in 1978. She still holds Lady Pirate records for single-game rebounds and field goals made, and is third all-time in scoring and rebounding (basketball). After leaving ECU, Freeman coached for seven years at Jacksonville High School and has been coaching since at Broughton High School.

Jerry Tolley

Football (1963-65)

Tolley earned three letters in football under coach Clarence Stasavich, including two seasons that ECU had back-to-back bowl victories (1964-65). He won the E.E. Rawl Memorial Award for Academic Excellence in 1965. He returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Western Carolina in 1963. After graduating from ECU, he coached at Elon College and was named head coach in 1977. During his head coaching stint, his teams won two national championships (1980-81) and were the national runners-up in 1978. He was the National Coach of the Year in 1980. Tolley is now Assistant Vice President at Roche Biomedical Laboratories.

Jerry Woodside

Basketball (1964-66)

Woodside still holds ECU records for most free throws made in a career, is second in career field goal percentage, seventh in career scoring and field goals made and ninth in career rebounding. A three-year letterwinner in basketball at ECU, he led the Pirates in scoring during the 1964-65 and 1965-66 seasons. Since leaving East Carolina, he has taught and coached in high schools throughout North Carolina. After serving as basketball, cross country and golf

coach at Burlington Cummings High School since 1976, Woodside returned to Greenville and became head coach at J.H. Rose High School before the 1991 season. His teams have won 11 conference championships, five district championships and were the state runners-up in 1978.

1990

Ronnie Barnes

Sports Medicine (1971-76)

Barnes went through East Carolina's Sports Medicine program, becoming an assistant trainer and instructor after graduation in 1975. He moved on to Michigan State University, where he earned his master's degree and became head trainer and an assistant professor. In 1980, he was named head trainer of the New York Giants of the NFL. He was named the National Professional Trainer of the Year by the National Athletic Trainer's Association of America in 1983. He has also been selected to Michigan State's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Dr. Ray Minges

Pirate Club

Minges served as president of the Century Club, now the Pirate Club, from 1964-70 and was a charter lifetime member within the organization. He later served a second term on the Pirate Club's Executive Committee from 1982-84 and remained active in the Pirate Club until his death in 1987. Also a surgeon, he traveled with the Pirate football team as team doctor during the 1960s.

Rosie Thompson

Basketball (1976-80)

Assistant Basketball Coach (1987-92)

Head Basketball Coach (1992-)

During her playing career at East Carolina, Thompson became the school's all-time leading scorer (2,352 points) and rebounder (1,183 rebounds). She also holds school records for scoring in a season (723) and rebounds in a season (358). She is the only Lady Pirate ever to have her jersey (10) retired. She also has the school's high marks for free throw shooting and was named as the NCAIAW Player of the Year in 1978.

1989

Willard "Butch" Colson

Football (1967-69)

Colson was named Southern Conference Player of the Year in 1967, rushing for 1,135 yards and scoring 15 touchdowns. He holds the school record for most carries in one game (41) and is fourth in career rushing yardage (2,512) and sixth in total yardage (3,025). His 92 points scored in 1967 is the fourth-most in school history.

ECU Athletic Hall of Fame

Dr. Leo Jenkins

Chancellor (1960-78)

Chancellor Emeritus

It was under Jenkins' leadership and largely at his personal direction that the former small, regional, liberal arts college developed into a large, multi-faceted comprehensive university with the third largest student enrollment in North Carolina. Jenkins directed the building of Ficklen Stadium, Mingos Coliseum, Scales Field House and Harrington Field along with other facilities in the athletic complex.

Kathy Postlewait

Volleyball

Field Hockey

Today, Postlewait is one of the top players on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour, and has career earnings of more than one million dollars. She won the 1983 San Jose Classic, the 1987 Mazda Classic, the 1988 McDonald's Championship and the 1989 Sara Lee Classic.

1984

Lawrence "Cotton" Clayton

Basketball, Baseball (1959-61)

During his two years of athletic participation, Clayton was named All-America in both baseball and basketball as well as All-North State Conference and all-district. Perhaps baseball was his top sport. He led the 1961 Pirate team to the NAIA national championship as the team's leading hitter playing outfield and third base. Following graduation, he played in the Baltimore Orioles organization for seven years.

1983

Howard Porter

Head Basketball Coach (1947-59)

Coached in more games and had more wins than any other ECU coach (183-101). His 1953-54 team was best in school history with 23-2 record and a trip to the national championships in NAIA. Never had a losing season.

J.C. Thomas

Basketball (1952-56)

Played on three conference championships and two that made the national championship tournaments. During his four years, the Pirates were 75-18. He started each season at ECU. He was a team captain and an All-North State Conference selection.

Bill Hill

Wrestling (1971-74)

Finished fifth in the NCAA Championships in 1974 and named All-America, the only one in ECU wrestling history. Finished his career with a 122-15-1 record and four Southern Conference titles. Also had four North Carolina Collegiate Championships.

Dick Cherry

Football (1952-56)

One of the finest quarterbacks in ECU history. Three times made All-Conference, while also earning All-State and honorable mention All-America honors in 1953. Set

school record with four TD passes in a single game and 16 TD passes during the 1953 season. Both of those records still stand.

1982

Louis John Hallow

Football (1953-55)

First football All-America at ECU, gaining those honors in 1955. Played center and linebacker and made All-North State Conference three years. All-State for two seasons and won the Lanche Blocking Trophy twice, three times named outstanding defensive player and MVP as a senior. Drafted out of college by the Los Angeles Rams.

James Martin Gregory

Basketball (1969-71)

Co-Player of the Year in the Southern Conference as a senior, the first Pirate ever to get player of the year honors. Named first-team All-Southern Conference and team MVP in 1971. Currently ranks fifth on the ECU all-time scoring list with 1,193 points and is tied for the highest career rebounding average with 11.1 per game.

Carl Leigh Summerell

Football (1971-73)

Twice named honorable mention All-America while quarterbacking the Pirates. Named Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1973-74. Was Southern Conference player of the year in 1973 and tabbed as starting quarterback in Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. Team MVP in 1970, 1972 and 1973 and all-State the latter two years. Still holds three school records.

John Walter Welborn

Assistant Athletic Director (1976-)

Head Cross Country Coach (1986-)

Head Wrestling Coach (1966-77)

As head wrestling coach, the Pirates were 94-14-3 and had five consecutive Southern Conference titles, the most won in a row by any ECU sport. Three-times, he was named Coach of the Year in the conference. In ten years, he lost but one in-state match and never lost to rival North Carolina. Also coached golf team to two conference titles and is currently cross country coach and assistant athletic director at ECU.

1981

Jack Boone

Head Baseball Coach (1948-52)

Head Football Coach (1952-61)

He is the fifth winningest coach in ECU football history, with a mark of 49-45-5. He coached ECU to its first bowl game ever, the Lions Bowl in 1952 and the Elks Bowl in 1953. He was Coach of the Year in the North State Conference in 1953 with an 8-2 mark.

James Speight

Football (1955-58)

Runningback in the split "T" formation under Jack Boone. One of only three Pirate players to have jersey retired (#29). Ran for 2,700 career yards, third on the ECU all-time rushing list. Scored four touchdowns and a two-point conversion in 1959 game vs. Norfolk Navy for 26 points, a school record that still stands.

Robert Kingrey

Diving (1960-62)

Won national diving championship in 1960 in one-meter and three-meter diving (NAIA) in first year with ECU. Was a three-time All-America (1960-62) in both the one- and three-meter events. Set freshman record for three-meter diving with 11 dives for 420 points, which remains the school record.

Sheilah Cotten

Women's Basketball (1971-75)

First female ever inducted into East Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. Finished career with 1,270 points, first 1,000 point scorer in school history. Led ECU to the AIAW national tournament in 1972-73, when team finished 18-2 and won the school's only AIAW state title. Her 442 points in 1974-75 ranks fifth in single-season scoring, and she holds the school mark for most points in a game (39) and most field goals attempted in a game (33).

1980

Carlester Crumpler

Football (1971-73)

Director of Administrative Services (1988-92)

Academic Counselor (1992-)

Considered as one of the best runningbacks ever at East Carolina. Still holds school records in seven categories including 2,889 career rushing yards, 37 career touchdowns and 1,309 yards rushing in 1972. Honorable Mention All-America in 1972 and 1973 and voted Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1972. Also All-State two years and selected to play in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic in 1973.

Danny Kopley

Football (1972-74)

A third-team AP All-America linebacker in 1974, he was given the nickname "Captain Crunch" for his fine defensive play while at East Carolina. He received numerous honors including national defensive player of the week in 1973, All-Southern Conference three years and All-State two years. After leaving ECU, he starred with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League.

Cecil Heath

Basketball (1951-55)

Baseball (1951-55)

Won seven letters in basketball and baseball at ECU. Played second base and was a four-year starter in baseball, finishing with a .320 batting average. In basketball, he was a three-year starter at guard, leading ECU to a 23-2 mark in 1953-54. Named All-State in both sports in 1954-55.

1979

Dr. Ray Martinez

Head Swimming Coach (1954-67)

Directed the Pirates to the NAIA National Championship in 1957 and 1959. His 1962 team was NCAA College Division Runners-up. A Master Coach and winner of the Kiputh Award for national leadership in aquatics, Martinez had 45 men earn All-America honors, 15 NAIA and 4 NCAA College Division national champions.

ECU Athletic Hall of Fame

Lex Ridenhour

Football (1934-38)

Basketball (1934-38)

Baseball (1934-38)

A four-letter winner in three sports. He served as a captain on all three teams. In baseball, he holds a .366 lifetime batting average and a .411 mark in 1938. He was a captain on the 1932 team that gave up just 13 points.

Ike Riddick

Basketball (1957-60)

A three-year starter for East Carolina basketball in the old North State Conference. Held the school season scoring mark with 24.6 points per game for one season until it was broken in 1977-78. Was a team captain as a senior. Was named MVP in the Portsmouth Invitational Tournament.

Carlton Barnes

Baseball (1962-65)

The MVP in baseball in 1965 while serving as the team captain. Was named All-State three times. Played in the Cincinnati Reds organization from 1965-68. A magna cum laude graduate from ECU.

1978

Jim Johnson

Football (1933-37)

Basketball (1933-37)

Baseball (1933-37)

A three-sport star for the Pirates, he was captain for each team twice. He was athletic director following the war, coached three sports, and helped establish the East Carolina Educational Foundation (Pirate Club).

Jim Mallory

Head Baseball Coach (1954-62)

Won numerous championships during his coaching stint at ECU including the 1961 NAIA crown. His teams won 161 games and lost just 60. He became the Dean of Men in 1959 and was the Associate Dean of Students at East Carolina.

Tom Michel

Football (1960-63)

A four-year fullback under Jack Boone and Clarence Stasavich, averaged 5.7 yards per carry in college and became the first Pirate back to play in the National Football League, serving with four clubs from 1964-68. He led the 1963 team in rushing, scoring and total offense and helped the team to a 27-6 win over Northeastern in the 1963 Eastern Bowl in Allentown, Pa., earning outstanding back honors. His son, Billy, was also a three-year letterman at offensive guard for the Pirates and participated in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic in 1988.

Richard Narron

Baseball (1966-67)

An All-America catcher, he played on East Carolina's first two Southern Conference championship baseball teams, helping the Pirates to a 17-10 record in 1966 and a 23-6 mark in 1967, when he was captain and made All-America. He signed with the New York Mets in 1967 and played there until moving to the Baltimore Orioles for the 1970 season.

1977

Kevin Moran

Football (1965-67)

Winner of the Jacobs Blocking Trophy in 1967, one of only two Pirates to have ever claimed that prestigious award. Co-captain of the 1967 team under Clarence Stasavich that finished 8-2.

Earl Smith

Football (1937-39)

Basketball (1937-39)

Baseball (1937-39)

Head Baseball Coach (1963-72)

Three-sport athlete and two-sport coach at East Carolina with a career that totaled nearly 40 years. His 1963 baseball team was third nationally in the NAIA. Later took four teams to the NCAA regionals. Never had a losing basketball season and only one losing basketball season.

Roger Thrift

Football (1949-50)

Set several football records as a quarterback in 1949 that stood for years. Has been a distinguished coach and athletic administrator in college and high school since leaving East Carolina.

John W. (Jack) Young, Jr.

Football (1940-41)

Played on the first winning East Carolina football team in 1940. Also played on the only unbeaten and untied team in history in 1941. Came to East Carolina as a non-scholarship tackle.

1976

Clarence Stasavich

Head Football Coach (1962-69)

Athletic Director (1963-75)

Outstanding football coach at ECU, whose teams went 50-27-1 in eight seasons and won the Southern Conference championships in 1966. In 1964, he was the NAIA Coach of the Year while leading the Pirates to a 9-1 mark and the Tangerine Bowl. As an athletic director, he engineered ECU's entrance into the Southern Conference and developed the modern athletic complex that the Pirates currently use.

1975

Dave Alexander

Football (1963-65)

An excellent fullback for the Pirate football team from 1963-65. Named All-Southern Conference and Little All-America in 1965. Is currently seventh on the ECU career rushing list with 2,112 yards. He became the first Pirate to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season with his 1,029 yard effort in 1965.

Maurice Everett

Tennis (1955-58)

Came to East Carolina on a basketball scholarship, but became the North State Conference singles tennis champion for three straight years.

Bill Holland

Baseball (1935-38); Football (1935-38)

An outstanding tackle on the Pirate football teams of 1935-38. Also an outstanding baseball player during the same time period.

Ken Midyette

Diving (1957-59)

Earned All-America honors in diving during the 1957, 1958, 1959 seasons. Also was the NAIA diving champion in 1958 and 1959.

1974

Ken Beatty

Head Football Coach (1932-33)

First coach of the East Carolina Pirate football team.

Dr. N.M. Jorgensen

Athletic Director (1947-63)

Served as East Carolina's first Athletic Director.

Lacy T. West

Basketball (1961-63); Baseball (1961-63)

All-America baseball and basketball player at East Carolina. Finished his basketball career with 1,111 points, a school mark at the time.

William M. Shelton

Football (1936-39)

Three sport letter winner at East Carolina from 1936-40. Served as team captain of the 1938 football squad, as an offensive and defensive back.

Robert R. Sawyer

Swimming (1955-59)

Earned All-America honors during his swimming career at East Carolina.

Alden Glen Bass

Football (1957-60); Baseball (1961)

All-America football and baseball player at East Carolina. Served as a team captain of the 1960 football squad, which finished 7-3.

Robert F. Hodges

Football (1950-53); Basketball (1950-53)

All-America football and basketball player at East Carolina.

Claude Keith King, Sr.

Football (1951-55); Basketball (1951-55)

All-Conference football and golf player at East Carolina.

Sonny Russell

Basketball (1949-53)

All-State basketball player at East Carolina. Is currently second in career scoring at ECU with 1,653 points.

Bill Cline

Football (1962-65)

All-America football player at East Carolina. Is the Pirates' career total offensive yardage leader with 3,883 yards and is third in pass completions and passing yardage.

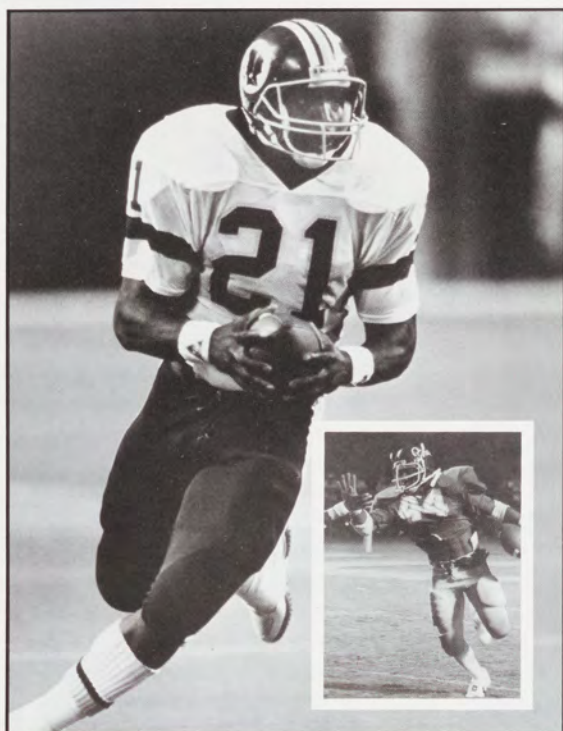

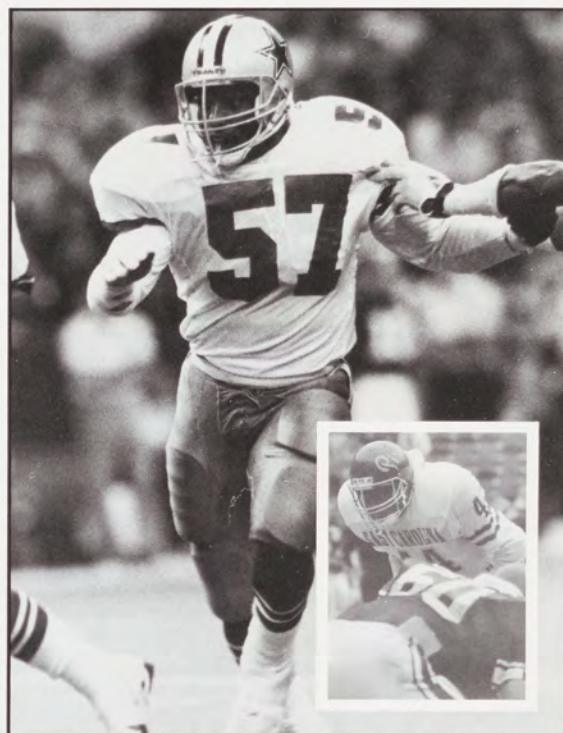

Southern Conference Era

East Carolina began competition in the Southern Conference, one of America's oldest athletic leagues, in 1964. During its tenure in the league, the Pirates enjoyed much success. In June of 1977, ECU left the Southern Conference to become a major Division I independent.

In 12 seasons of football in the Southern Conference, the Pirates were able to win 70.6 percent of their games, claiming a 44-18-1 record. ECU won the Southern Conference football championship in 1966, 1972, 1973 and 1976.

The Pirates also had success in other sports in the Southern Conference. ECU was able to claim the Commissioner's Cup, an award symbolic of the top overall athletic program in the league, four times. The Pirates received the award in 1969-70, 1973-74, 1974-75 and 1976-77.

Appropriately, the Pirates won the trophy in 1977, its final year in the league, and the first year in which the trophy officially carried the name of Clarence Stasavich.

Stasavich was one of the prominent leaders in the Southern Conference from the time the Pirates joined the league in 1964 until his death in 1975.

Bucs Bow 13-6 in Lions Bowl Affair

Salisbury, N.C. — The good right arm of quarterback Dave Bevevino was the big difference here Saturday afternoon as undefeated Clarion State Teachers College defeated East Carolina 13-6 in the first annual Lions Bowl. A crowd of 3,000 watched the game.

Bevevino, a red-haired past-master at passing, engineered both scoring drives put on by the Pennsylvanians. He passed 30 yards for the first six-pointer and ran the show in a 68-yard drive which netted the second touchdown. Altogether, Bevevino threw 29 passes, completed 11, and gained 180 yards through the air.

...In the first period, after an exchange of kicks, East Carolina's Claude King got off a poor punt which sailed out of bounds on the East Carolina 39. Clarion took over, ran one play, and had their first touchdown of the day. The scoring was done on a pass from Bevevino to end Alex Sandusky. Linebacker Frank Madigan blocked the attempted conversion but the damage was done with only two minutes and 55 seconds of playing having elapsed.

...Shoe had recovered the Clarion fumble on the East Carolina 41. One play netted only a yard but set the stage for an 18-yard gain off tackle by Illard Yarborough. Yarborough, Paul Clay and Ted Barnes collaborated on three plays to move the ball to another first down. Quarterback Sandy Siler then took over to direct the touchdown drive.

Siler passed to Clay for 11 yards then to Yarborough for a first down on the seven. Gay, going through the line, moved the ball to the one from where Siler sneaked it over for the tying touchdown. Hawk Grissom's attempted conversion was wide of the mark.

...Bevevino's first toss was to Sandusky and the completion moved the ball to the Clarion 45. End John Lovre then got into the act with a pair of catches that moved the ball up another 17 yards. After a couple of running plays, Bevevino passed to Sandusky to put the ball on the East Carolina seven. Halfback George Czap carried the ball the remaining distance on a pitchout. Ted Wisniewski kicked the point and the scoring for the day was completed.

East Carolina put on two good drives in the last quarter but had them both stopped by pass interceptions. One of the interceptions was made on the Clarion seven, the other on the Clarion 12. Both were with less than two minutes of playing time remaining in the contest.

Morris Harvey Upsets Buccaneers, 12-0

Morris Harvey College, of Charleston, W. Va., defeated East Carolina College, 12-0, in the first annual Elks Bowl football clash Saturday at College Stadium.

...East Carolina won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. Paul Gay returned twenty where the Pirates began a drive which was stopped on the Morris Harvey 36 when Dick Cherry fumbled. J.D. Kidd recovered for the Eagles and the show was practically over for the Bucs.

An exchange of kicks gave the Eagles the ball on their own 16 yard line from where they promptly marched 84 yards to their first TD. Bob Fetty went off left tackle from three yards out for the tally. Quarterback Bob Maxwell, who also played an outstanding game, elected to run for the extra point, but was snowed under by the Pirate frontwall.

...An errant aerial thrown by quarterback Dick Cherry midway through the second period was intercepted by Carr and returned to the Eagles' 30-yard line. A well-mixed series of passing and running plays moved the ball to the East Carolina 28 from which point Maxwell passed to right end Bob Spenik for the touchdown. The attempted placement was wide.

...The entire third period saw both teams battle between the 30-yard stripes as the Pirates sought to find their scoring punch which gave them the North State Conference championship in 1953. The Eagles, however, though outweighed by 30 pounds per man in the line, were not to be denied. They held the East Carolina ground game in check and pushed Dick Cherry, the Pirates' passing ace, so that he suffered one of his worst offensive days.

Only dangerous threat by either club in the third period came on the first play from scrimmage when Carr took a handoff from Maxwell and scooted 70 yards for an apparent TD. The play was nullified however, when an official ruled that he had stepped out of bounds on his own 40 yard line.

Soon after the fourth period opened, a punt by Tom Allsbrook rolled dead on the Morris Harvey four-yard line, but the Eagles kicked out of the hole. The Bucs drove back to the 15 yard line soon after but the charging Eagle line bottled up the Pirates and a desperation pass from Cherry to his favorite regular season target, end and co-captain Bobby Hodges, was knocked down in the end zone.

...Only bright spots for East Carolina were in the personages of guard David Lee and halfback Emo Boado. Lee played virtually the entire contest and was in on the majority of the tackles. Boado, though not used the entire contest, turned in several fine runs.

Pirates Run To 31-0 Win Over Maine For Crown

Orlando, Fla. — Dave Alexander closed out his college career Saturday by leading East Carolina College to a 31-0 victory over the University of Maine in the Tangerine Bowl.

The victory was the second straight for the Bucs in the bowl, and a repeat for them of the NCAA Small College Atlantic Coast Championship.

Maine never had much in the game after its top quarterback Dick DeVarney was injured early in the contest.

And then Dave Alexander began to run the ball, and the Bucs sped away.

They took the lead on a 24-yard field goal by Peter Kriz, then came back just before the half ended as George Richardson connected with Sonny Abernathy for a 35-yard touchdown pass.

In the third period, Alexander scored from the one, then later passed five yards to Churchill Grimes. The final score came late in the game, as Alexander broke away on a 55-yard romp.

...After both teams felt each other out in the first period, the Bucs took over control of the game. Twice they moved within scoring position, once being stopped on the one, and then stopped when a pass was intercepted in the end zone by a Maine defender.

Then on the Bucs third assault on the goal line, the Bucs got down to the one before Maine threw them back to the seven. Kriz then came in on fourth down and kicked a 24-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead with 4:47 left in the half.

The Bucs then got the ball back on a punt, and started their drive from their own 29. Richardson hit Greene on the 38 then found Ruffin Odom loose at the Maine 45.

Alexander moved it to the 43, and after an incomplete pass, he carried down to the 35. From there Richardson uncorked a perfect pass to Abernathy for a 10-0 lead, with 1:28 left in the half.

...In the second half, the Bucs again forced Maine to punt, and took over on their 33. Alexander carried it to the Maine 49, then passed to Odom at the 36, Bill Bailey carried it to the 20, and Alexander moved it down to the 13, then to the 11. From there, the Buc fullback carried it on to the nine. Bailey moved it to the four, and then to the one. Alexander went over on the next play.

The next touchdown was set up by an interception by Todd Hicks on the Maine 45. After a penalty moved the Bucs back to their own 40, Alexander hit Bailey on the Maine 39. Another penalty moved it back to the 44. It appeared here that the drive was going to die, but Richardson hit Norman Swindell to carry down to the 20 for a first down.

Richardson then hit Grimes at the five, and Alexander passed over the middle to Grimes for the score, making it 24-0.

During the final period, the offense slacked up and was in trouble until the final minutes. Then after Maine had been forced to punt, the Bucs took over on their own 45. On the first play, Alexander went through the line, fought loose from several tacklers and raced 55 yards to the final score of the game.

East Carolina Wins Independence Bowl

Shreveport, La. — East Carolina's football team made the most of its first post-season opportunity in 15 years by crushing Louisiana Tech 35-13 in the third annual Independence Bowl.

It was the Pirate's first bowl appearance since they defeated Maine 31-0 in the 1965 Tangerine Bowl. After yesterday's game, ECU coach Pat Dye expressed the hope of bigger and better bowls in the Bucs' future.

The victory wasn't the only honor ECU garnered in yesterday's game. Fullback Theodore Sutton set an Independence Bowl record with 143 yards in 17 carries and was named the game's outstanding offensive player by the press. End Zack Valentine, who led the ECU defense with seven tackles, received the award as the top defensive player.

The East Carolina defense completely shut down the Bulldog running attack, limiting the Southland Conference champions to just 12 yards on the ground. The host Bulldogs were more successful through the air, passing a record 52 times for 263 yards.

Dye also had praise for his offensive unit. "I'm particularly proud of the offensive line. The offensive line has made tremendous progress and (quarterback Leander) Green is executing out offense as well as it can be expected."

Sutton, who had the best day of his career against the Bulldogs, gave credit to the Pirate defense. "Our defense kept us in good field position all game," the Kinston junior said. It was his 45-yard TD scamper in the third quarter that ended a Tech comeback bid putting ECU up 28-13.

Sutton said the bowl trip "means a great deal to us. We finally got a chance to prove to people that we can play football."

His record-breaking performance was a result of taking what the Bulldog defense would allow. "In our offense, one person might get a lot of yardage in a certain game. Tonight, the inside veer was really open and I just took advantage of it," Sutton explained.

It was an afternoon of frustration for Louisiana Tech as the Bulldogs left the football on the ground almost as many times as they put it in the air. Three Tech turnovers in the first half led the Pirate touchdowns and a 21-0 ECU lead early in the second quarter. The Bulldogs turned the ball over seven times in the game, six times before intermission.

...Tech Coach Maxie Lambright said the Pirates were a "fine defensive team. They rush the passer and we didn't move the ball on the ground. We've played an awful lot of football teams and East Carolina is one of the finest."

The lopsided outcome of the game, despite only a 322-275 Pirate advantage in total offense, was the result of the Bucs being able to capitalize on Bulldogs mistakes, while Tech was unable to take advantage of all of its opportunities. A goal-line stand inside the ECU five late in the third quarter closed the door on the Bulldog hopes.

Pirates Take 27-6 Bowl Game Victory Over Huskies

Allentown, Pa. — Overcoming almost overwhelming odds, the East Carolina Pirates moved into Allentown Friday and swept away all of the Eastern Bowl honors — a 27-6 bowl game victory, the most valuable back and the most valuable lineman.

Tom Michel, a 205-pound fullback, was selected as the game's Most Valuable Back. The husky junior carried the ball 20 times and picked up a total of 149 yards rushing. He also passed four times and completed two. One of the highlights of the contest was an 82-yard touchdown jaunt by Michel which broke the game open for the Bucs.

The Most Valuable Lineman award was carried away by East Carolina's middle linebacker and defensive quarterback Frankie Galloway. Galloway's prowess on the football field is nothing new to Pirate fans. The senior hustler was selected as a Little All-America prior to leaving for Allentown.

Dinky Mills, a junior from Ayden, was honored at the post-game banquet as East Carolina's Most Improved Player. Mills took over the wingback position for the Pirates after East Carolina's first two wingbacks had been injured. The 5-7 speedster then retained his position during the remainder of the season.

...Early in the first period, the Pirates put their first six points on the scoreboard as Michel raced over his own right tackle for a 15-yard TD jaunt. Mills and blocking back Maurice Allen threw bone-shaking blocks to lead Michel over the Northeastern University goal line.

Tailback Bill Cline then attempted to pass for the extra two points, but he was hauled down in the Pirate backfield before he could get the pass away.

During the remainder of the first half, the Northeastern University Huskies appeared to dominate the game. The Huskies moved to the Pirate 11 yard line on one occasion and to the Buc 28 on another. However, both times, the East Carolina defensive unit bowed its neck and held the Huskies scoreless.

In the third period, Northeastern's Max St. Victor put the Huskies back in the game by virtue of his seemingly educated toe. St. Victor booted a 48-yard field goal with 11 minutes left in the third period to slice the Pirate lead to 6-3.

With three minutes remaining in the quarter, St. Victor booted a 38-yard field goal to tie the game 6-6 and send Northeastern fans into an uproar.

...On the next play, Michel loped over right tackle and then turned on the speed as he raced 82 yards to paydirt to boost the Bucs to a 12-6 advantage. The extra point kick was made by Ralph Royster and the Bucs led 13-6.

The touchdown romp by Michel provided the spark the Pirates needed as they came up with two additional scores in the fourth period of play.

With 14:40 left in the fourth quarter, tailback Bill Cline fired a pass downfield intended for wingback Larry Rudisill. The pass was blocked and knocked into the air by a pair of Northeastern defenders.

Rudisill picked the ball out of the atmosphere and raced down the sidelines untouched to climax the 81-yard TD play. The PAT by Roster and the Bucs led 20-6.

Four minutes later, the Pirates were adding still another score to their already impressive advantage. Bovender fired a pass to Allen all alone in the end zone to increase the Buc lead to 26-6. The play covered 17 yards and was followed by a PAT off the sure foot of Royster to set the score up a notch, 27-6.

Bucs Gain NCAA Atlantic Coast Championship

Orlando, Fla. — East Carolina College spotted the University of Massachusetts a 13-0 lead, then roared back in the third and fourth periods to take a 14-13 victory and claim the NCAA Atlantic Coast Small College Championship and the 1964 Tangerine Bowl crown.

...The Redmen had shot in front on second period and third period passes from Mass quarterback Jerry Whelchel to halfback Ken Palm, who was presented with the Sportsmanship Trophy.

But with Bill Cline, who was named the outstanding player, and George Richardson grinding out the yardage, the Bucs came from nowhere to take the win.

...In the opening period, East Carolina received the kickoff and had to punt, with Massachusetts taking over on their own 35. But after a penalty, the Redmen were back on the 30, where Whelchel's first pass attempt was pulled down by Jerry Tolley, who carried it down to the 12.

From there, the Bucs drove to the three, where with fourth and one, Cline's pass to Dinky Mills in the end zone was off and the Redmen took over.

...But then fate struck back for the Redmen, as Dave Alexander fumbled and the Redmen took over on the 13. Whelchel then connected with Palm for a 13-yard scoring pass, and the UM quarterback added the PAT for a 7-0 lead with 13:24 left in the period.

Following the kickoff, East Carolina drove toward the goal line for the third time. But at the 19, George Richardson went back to pass and was hit from his blind side and fumbled, with UMass recovering.

But UMass, hurt by a penalty, had to punt and the Bucs took over on their own 25. With Alexander leading the way, the Bucs moved downfield. Cline hit John McPhaul for a 33 yard gain to put the ball on the UMass 29, and then hit Churchill Grimes for a six-yard gain. Mills added five more yards to make a first and ten on the 18.

But on the next play, Palm pulled down a Cline pass to end the threat.

In the second half, the Redmen took the opening kickoff and put the ball in play on their own 33. From there, they moved to their 39, where Whelchel tossed his second bomb to Palm for a 61-yard touchdown. But the PAT kick by Whelchel was wide and it was 13-0 with 10:32 left in the period.

...Then George Richardson entered the game. Alexander had been hampered during the second half by a possible rib injury, but Richardson took right over for him, driving to the 13 on the next play. Cline was thrown for a yard loss, but Richardson bulled his way through the middle, down to the three, and then crashed over on the next play for the first Buc score. Cline attempted to pass to Bumgarner for the PAT, but the officials ruled that he had trapped the ball, and it was 13-6 with 2:01 left.

...Starting on the 10, the Bucs moved for the winning score. On the first play, Cline unleashed a long one to speedster Whitty Bass, which carried 67 yards, down to the UMass 23. Richardson added another yard, and then Cline rounded end for the score.

At 13-12, the Bucs decided to gamble on the two-pointer again, and Pete Crane pulled it in for the clincher, making it 14-13 with 7:41 left.

The fired-up Buc defense then stopped UMass twice, and the Bucs were on the threshold again, when time ran out on them on the Redmen's three.

Bowl Win Over Pack Caps 11-1 Season

The perfect script now has the perfect ending.

And a team that always believed it could do something truly unbelievable. It was done with thrills and chills, suspense to the very end. But what did you expect?

Down 34-17 with 8:41 to go and its never-say-die fans chanting "We believe" East Carolina mustered an incredible rally Wednesday to overcome N.C. State 37-34 in the 24th annual Peach Bowl. The fitting end to a story-book season leaves the Pirates 11-1.

"When we were behind 17 points you couldn't help but hear the people dressed in purple chanting that they believe," ECU head coach Bill Lewis said. "I think we've added a special meaning to 'I believe' or 'We believe' or however you want to say it because I think that we truly captured the spirit of that."

The frenzied bowl-record crowd of 59,322 and the final Peach Bowl to be played in Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium (the bowl moves to the Georgia Dome next year) nearly settled for a tie, but Damon Hartman's 49-yard field goal attempt as time expired was short and wide right.

College football's Cinderella had beat the clock again.

"We've been called a Cinderella story all year," ECU senior center Keith Arnold said. "Cinderella went to a ball tonight and got married. She's queen now."

"The feeling's unbelievable ... now I guess we know who's the best in North Carolina."

East Carolina, with its second-straight win in a series that was discontinued in 1987, can make that claim. But for three-plus quarters, the Wolfpack were better.

Muscle and speed in the running game enabled the Pack to do what it wanted coming in — keep the ball out of the hands of Pirate quarterback Jeff Blake and put a lot of points on the board.

Anthony Barbour was a danger on the corners and finished with 90 yards on 23 carries. Greg Manior and Gary Downs banged inside and combined for 117 more yards. The Pack ran the ball 56 times for 186 yards.

But when time was an ally and first downs were critical, ECU's defense got tough and State wilted.

"I thought we were the better team there for a while," N.C. State head coach Dick Sheridan said. "But we didn't get the job done either offensively, defensively or the kicking game."

State's collapse down the stretch included a shanked punt that gave the Pirates a shot in the arm.

The Wolfpack also could find no solution to a red-hot Blake, who completed 31 of 51 passes for 378 yards, threw four touchdowns and was intercepted three times.

Blake was particularly uncanny in the fourth quarter, hitting on 17 of 26 passes, 15 of 21 for 148 yards on the final three scoring drives in which the Pirates unveiled a shotgun formation.

Tight end Luke Fisher was unstoppable, catching a bowl-record 12 passes for 144 yards. Fisher had six catches for 63 yards in the fourth period, including the game-winner with 1:32 left.

The Wolfpack fumbled with just over a minute to go then lost on a last-second field goal to Maryland two years ago. The Cavs routed State 42-10 this season.

The Wolfpack appeared to have the Pirates primed for the kill after Shad Santee recovered Dion Johnson's fumble of a punt and Ledel George hit Charles Davenport with a 52-yard TD pass two plays later to make it 34-17.

Mike Reid picked off a Blake pass at the Wolfpack five on the next series, but ECU got the ball back at State's 32 after Kilpatrick's 10-yard muffed punt with 8:41 to go.

Then Blake too over.

From the 32, the Pirates needed seven plays and just 1:15 to get in the end zone. Blake got the score, slipping in from the two on a third-down option to the left.

Kilpatrick got off a 50-yard punt into the end zone after the Wolfpack failed to pick up a first down on the next series. Blake promptly marched ECU 80 yards in 11 plays, hitting 8 of 10 passes and burning just 2:06, to get within 34-30.

Blake hit Dion Johnson with a 17-yard pass for the score at the 4:18 mark. The Pirates opted to go for a two-point conversion, but Tyler Lawrence pressured Blake and forced a fumble.

State, still clinging to the lead, took over again and was in immediate trouble when Jerry Dillon disrupted an end around and dropped Davenport for a 9-yard loss.

The Pack was forced to punt and Johnson shot up the middle for 27 yards to give the Pirates the ball at the 41.

Near disaster came when Fisher fumbled after snaring a Blake pass, but Cedric Van Buren recovered. Blake hit Fisher again for 8 yards then 22 for the TD.

Terry Jordan quickly moved the Wolfpack, which still had all three of its timeouts, to the ECU 36 with 26 seconds left. That's when Zaim Cunmulaj burst through to sack Jordan for an 18-yard loss.

After Jordan hit Robert Hinton for 23 yards, the Pack went for the tie.

Barbour, Manior and Downs were workhorses as State drove 68 yards in 13 series on its first possession for a 7-0 lead. Downs scored on a 2-yard dive over the top.

ECU tied it when Blake flipped a 5-yard pass to Van Buren, but State cashed in a Sebastian Savage interception in the second period for a 14-7. Jordan threw a 4-yard pass to Todd Harrison for the TD.

Anthony Brenner's 27-yard field goal put ECU within 14-10, then Blake fired a 55-yard strike to Hunter Gallimore 1:39 before the half for a 17-14 lead.

Brenner missed a 46-yard field goal attempt after an interception by Jones, then the Wolfpack extended its lead to 27-17 with an 8-play, 71-yard drive.

Three passes to Davenport highlighted the drive. Manior got the score on a 1-yard plunge.

Davenport burned Walker after Johnson's fumble to put State up 34-17.

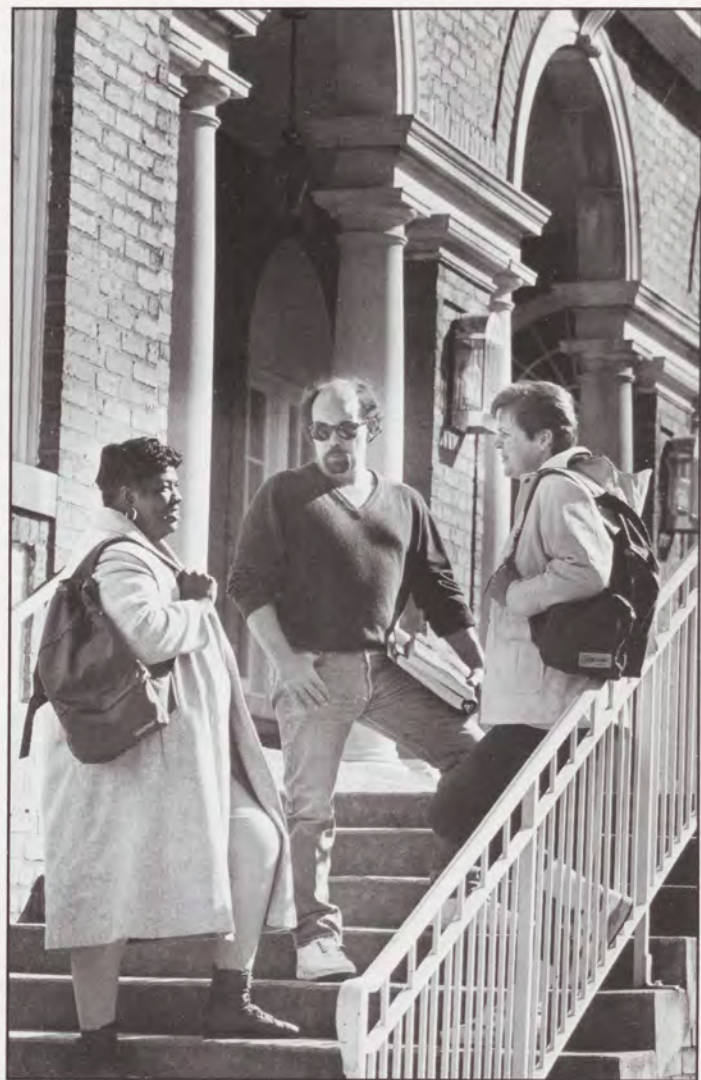

East Carolina University

East Carolina University is a diverse, comprehensive university known for academic quality and for the pursuit of excellence in those areas most compatible with its mission, history and opportunities.

Founded in 1907 as a school for the training of teachers, ECU has grown and developed in progressive stages as a liberal arts college, a regional university and since 1972, part of the 16-campus University of North Carolina system. ECU was designated a university by an act of the N.C. legislature in 1967.

With an on-campus enrollment of 17,500 students, ECU is organized into academic and health sciences divisions. It has a College of Arts and Sciences with 19 academic departments and professional Schools of Medicine, Nursing, Allied Health Sciences, Health and Human Performance, Business, Education, Industry and Technology, Human Environmental Sciences, Social Work, Music and Art. It has a research-oriented Graduate School which offers advanced degrees including the Ph.D. and the doctorate in educational leadership. Through its Division of Continuing Education and Summer School and University College, ECU offers many academic programs as well as programs for personal and professional enrichment.



ECU's strategic goals include achieving distinction in undergraduate education, a commitment to excellence in teaching, respect for individual rights and human diversity, expansion of doctoral programs, strengthening and stimulating research, scholarship and creative activity, improvement of teacher education and public schools, recruitment and support of academically proficient and talented students, and effective advancement of the University.

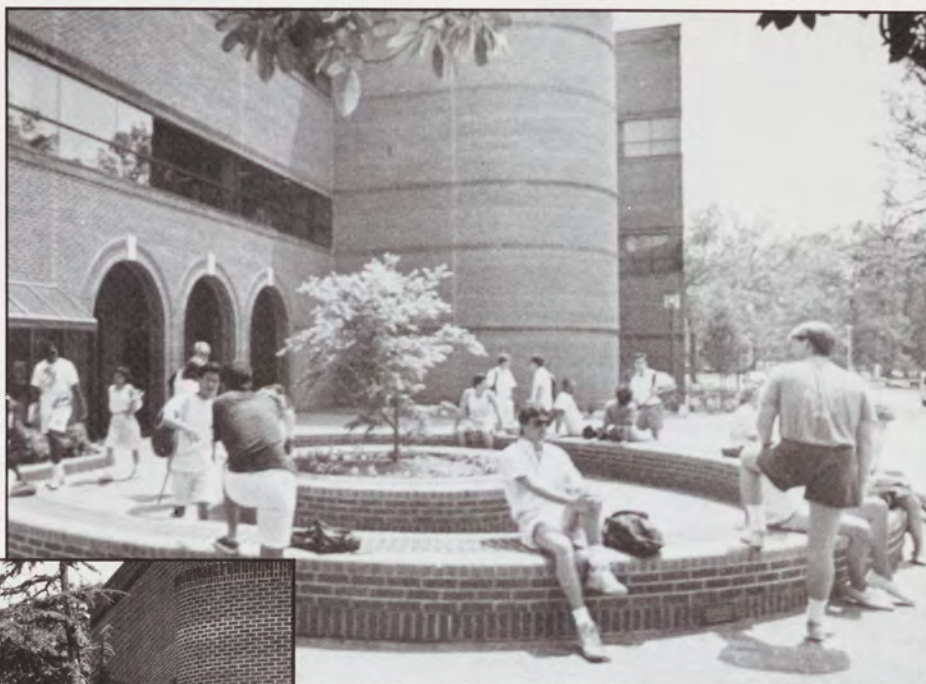
ECU has a Center for International Studies and sponsors several foreign exchange programs with campuses in Europe, Central America and Asia. It has gained international attention for its graduate program in Maritime History and Underwater Research.

With two commencements each year, ECU confers degrees upon 3,500 students annually and has more than 67,000 living alumni around the world. Its on-campus enrollment makes ECU the third largest university in the state of North Carolina, and off-campus extension programs and non-credit educational offerings attract an additional 3,000 students per year.

ECU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) with Division 1A programs in 10 men's and eight women's sports. In football, ECU is independently (non-conference) aligned, while most other programs are affiliated with the Colonial Athletic Association.

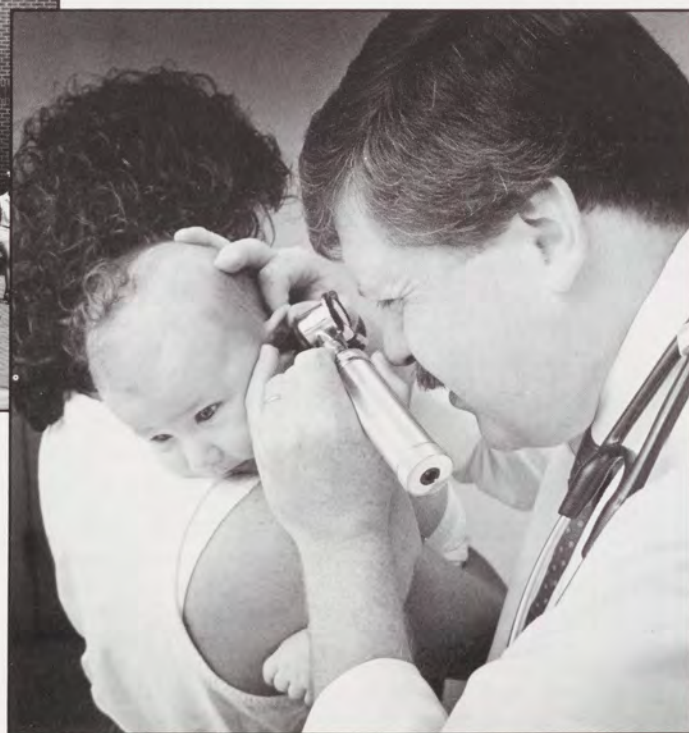
The General Classroom Building is one of the newest on the ECU campus. Many different departments use this building for classes, meetings and seminars.

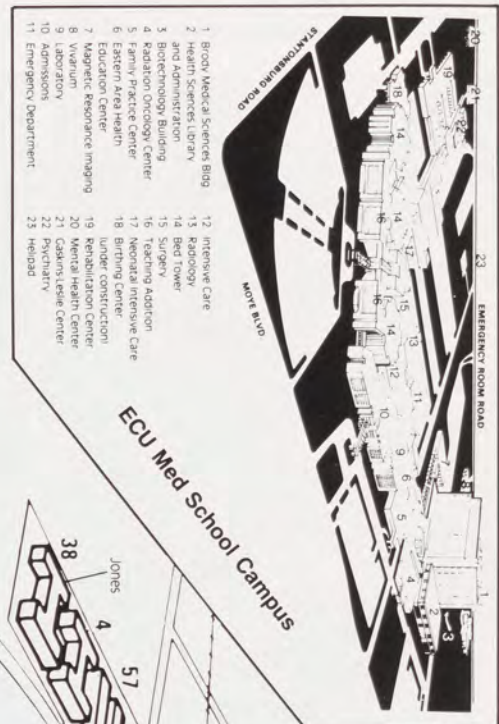


Students head to class on a spring afternoon. ECU's enrollment has steadily increased each year.

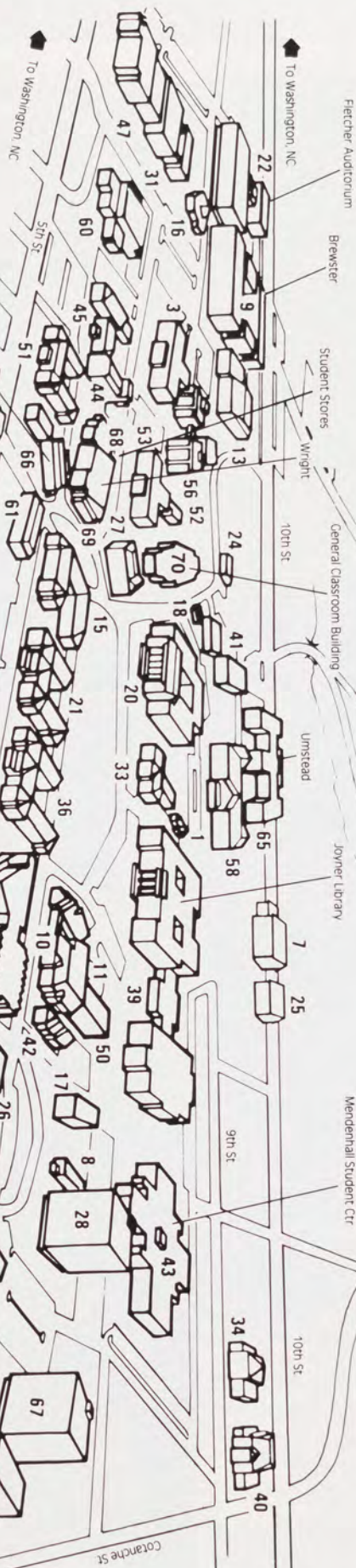


The East Carolina University School of Medicine is ranked at the top nationally in the percentage of its graduates entering primary care specialties.

EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

Ward Sports Medicine Building



The first major step in East Carolina's continuing efforts to upgrade facilities, the Ward Sports Medicine Building, became a reality in October of 1989. The building has been dedicated in honor of Robert and Margaret Ward of Burlington, N.C.

In 1991, the Wards made the largest single endowed gift ever received through the ECU Educational Foundation. The gift is just one of the numerous contributions the Wards have made to the Foundation over the years. They are Endowed Scholarship members of the Pirate Club, have made many contributions toward the enhancement of academics services for student-athletes, and for their son Robert's graduation from ECU in May of 1991, contributed a \$50,000 athletic scholarship in his name. Bob Ward is also the co-chairman of the school's Shared Visions Capital Campaign.

"Bob and Margaret Ward have supported our efforts in the growth of academic and personal development of student-athletes for many years. We are all deeply appreciative of the Wards' generosity and friendship," said ECU director of athletics Dave Hart, Jr.

The Board of Trustees, on Dec. 6, 1991, approved a Motion at their meeting, to dedicate the Sports Medicine Building in the name of Bob and Margaret Ward.

The three-story, 82,095-square foot structure, the home of ECU's athletic department and Human Performance Laboratory, provides the two areas with state-of-the-art technology.

"From a facilities standpoint, this building took us to another level," Dave Hart said. "The building is a very visible illustration of the direction our program is headed.

"It is a great source of pride for our athletic department, as well as our sports medicine and human performance departments."

The injury treatment and rehabilitation center of the sports medicine department includes the latest in technology, making it one of the top sports medicine programs in the country. Among the many features of the new building is a 5,000-square foot strength training center, a state-of-the-art human performance laboratory, bio-mechanics lab, classrooms and men's and women's locker rooms.

The entire coaching staffs for the football and men's and women's basketball teams are housed on the second floor, while the athletic administrative staff has their offices on the third floor.

The building is unique in structure. The shortest of six sides of the building is the front of the facility which faces Ficklen Stadium.

The building has already played host to several conferences, seminars and meetings, including ECU's annual Sports Medicine Conference.

Features of the first floor include:

- ***Sports Medicine Training Center** — Sophisticated injury treatment, evaluation and rehabilitation equipment fill the room including touch-control whirlpools, a computerized isokinetic rehabilitation and evaluation machine, exam rooms including one dental chair, and a 7-foot deep

whirlpool that allows an injured athlete to exercise without bearing weight.

The training area also boasts 19 taping stations and a radio communication center which allows sports medicine officials to monitor action on the football field and basketball court simultaneously.

- ***Strength Training Center** — Includes 5,000-square feet of shiny new chrome and steel, with mirror-lined walls.

- ***Locker Rooms** — Both men and women.

- ***Equipment Storage** — A spacious area with equipment for 135 football players and more.

Attractions of the second floor include:

- ***Pat Draughon Multipurpose Lounge** — An area that overlooks Ficklen Stadium. Trophy cases, retired jerseys and mementos from Pirate athletics line the room.

- ***Football** — Offices for the head coach, nine assistant coaches, graduate assistants, a recruiting coordinator and secretaries. Football also has two storage rooms, a file room, and has access to two mini-auditoriums.

- ***Leo Jenkins Auditorium** — A multi-use auditorium that can seat up to 300 people. The auditorium can be broken down into two or four different rooms. It is used for meetings, classes, press conferences and other gatherings.

- ***Hall of Fame** — Hall of honor recognizing distinguished individuals who have brought honor to Pirate athletics. A plaque recognizes each member of the Hall of Fame.

- ***Basketball** — More offices for each coach, and a meeting room for both the men's and women's staff.

- ***Student Development** — Computers and tutors are available to keep the student-athlete ahead in his/her studies and career development.

- ***Classrooms**

- ***Sports Medicine Offices**

The third floor includes:

- ***Human Performance Laboratory** — A sophisticated lab with the latest in human performance technology.

- ***Biomechanics Lab**

- ***Video Lab and Film Darkroom** — A state-of-the-art video workroom with the latest in high-tech equipment.

- ***Athletic Administrative Staff** — Offices saturate the third floor from the athletic director to the business manager to the sports information director.

The Ward Sports Medicine Building is a unique structure, unlike any facility in the country.

"With the athletics department and portions of the human performance department under one roof," said Hart, "the building is a positive illustration of how athletics and academics go hand-in-hand at East Carolina."

Greenville and Eastern N.C.

Greenville, North Carolina is one of the fastest growing cities in the Tar Heel state. Founded in 1771 as the Town of Martinsborough, Greenville has seen its population grow from just over 29,000 in 1970 to an estimated 45,000 in 1990. And, there's plenty of reason why this city has grown so much.

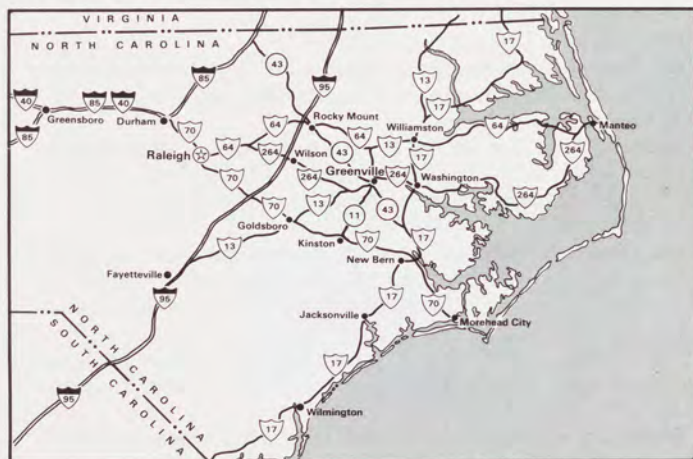
The county seat of Pitt County, Greenville has been traditionally agricultural, holding the distinction as the world's leading producer of bright, flue-cured tobacco, and also a leader in production of peanuts, soybeans, cucumbers and other fruits and vegetables.

Major manufacturing employers in the Greenville-Pitt County area include Burroughs Wellcome Pharmaceuticals, Yale Materials, Empire Brushes and Procter & Gamble.

While the region remains strong in agriculture, Greenville has changed with the times, adding the proper mix of industry and recreational facilities to give the community a variety of options.

Local and regional support for expanded medical services in Eastern North Carolina resulted in the development of a major medical community in Greenville, and the region now depends on the city as a primary source for advanced health care.

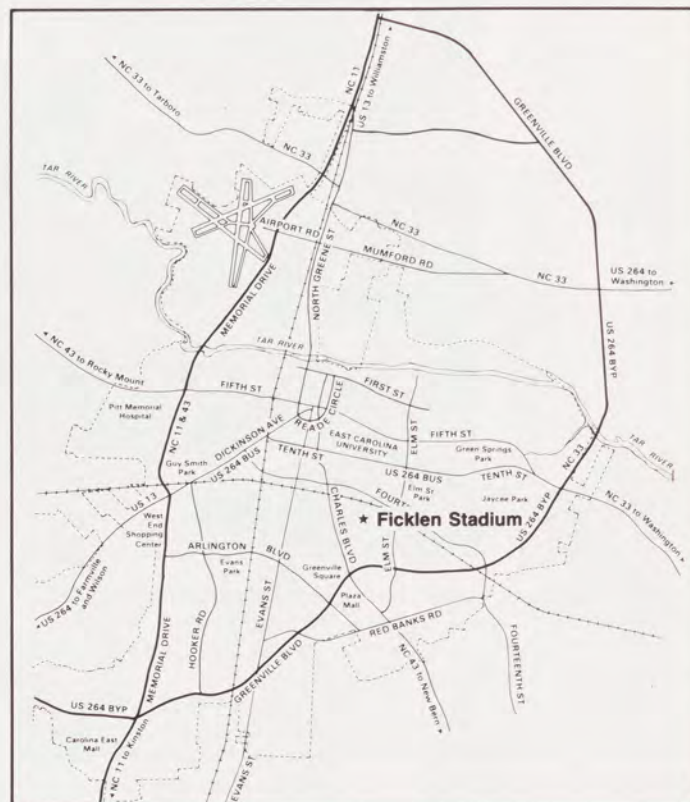
Pitt County Memorial Hospital is Greenville's community hospital and the primary teaching facility for the East Carolina University School of Medicine, and with its excellent facilities and capabilities, it has become the regional referral center for 29 counties in Eastern North Carolina.



Greenville is a rich environment for the arts with a blend of art organization, a private Art Center, Pitt County Arts Council and the East Carolina University Schools of Arts and Music. Popular art festivals highlight the year, while the excellent reputation of the ECU School of Music attracts a high percentage of out-of-state students to the respected program.

A wide array of live theater-plays, musical comedies, opera and operettas and films come to Greenville through ECU. The Summer Theatre, featuring Broadway shows, and the Dinner Theatre series are particularly popular.

Greenville citizens enjoy outdoor recreation all year long thanks to a moderate climate. There are four distinct seasons, none too harsh to enjoy. Winters are short and usually mild, with the average January temperatures hovering around 45 degrees. The long summer is not too hot due to a stiff southern breeze and average July temperatures of 79 degrees.



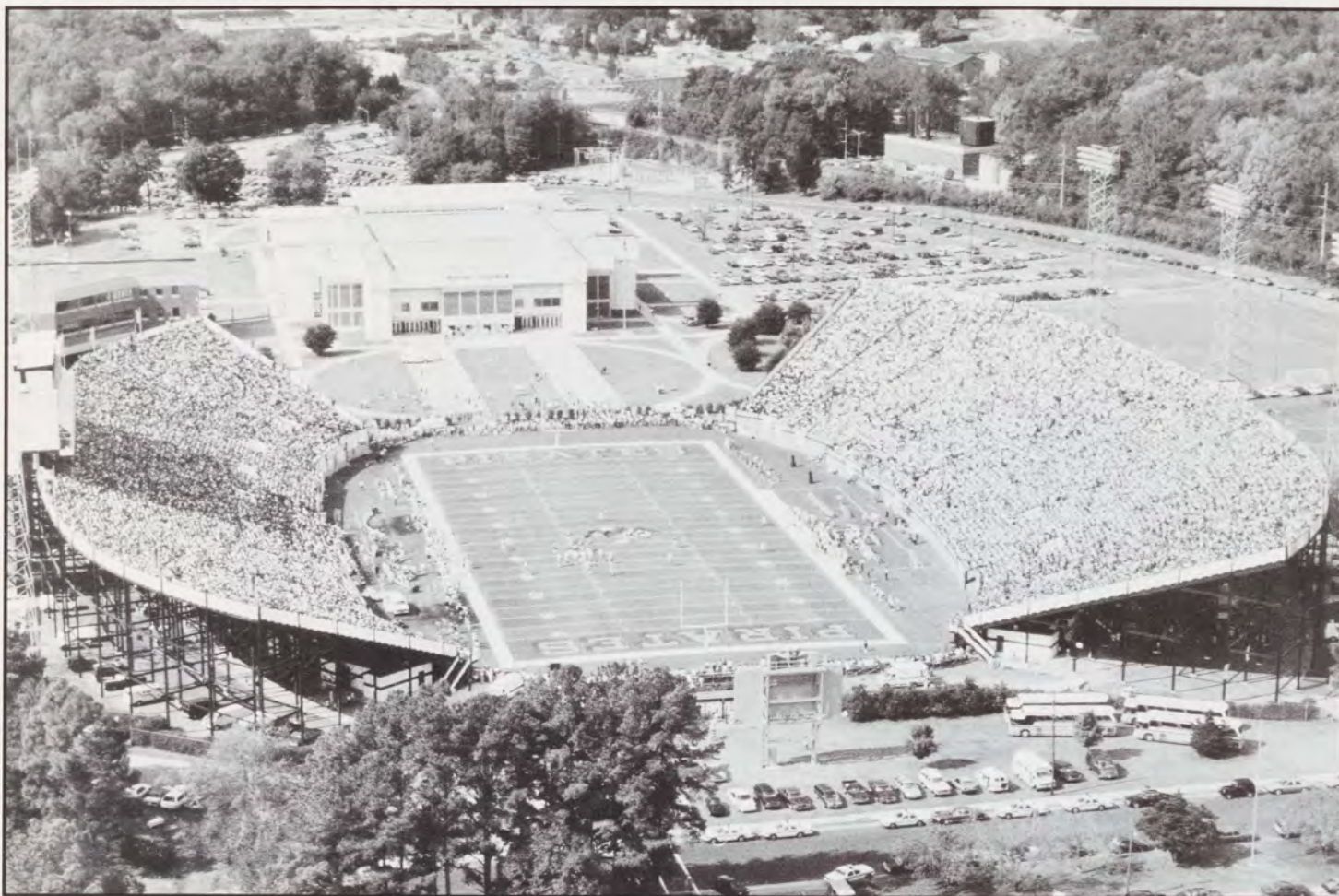
With an average rainfall of 40 inches, well distributed throughout the year, and a growing season of 215 days, the city wears a lush, green mantle most of the year.

Greenville is less than two hours drive from the famed Outer Banks of North Carolina and the beaches, seafood and the recreation-rich Pamlico and Albemarle sounds and other Atlantic coast estuaries.

The proper blend of its people, its technology, and its recreation, makes Greenville, North Carolina a great place to be.



Ficklen Stadium



The James Skinner Ficklen Memorial Stadium was dedicated on September 21, 1963, with East Carolina defeating Wake Forest 20-10.

The dedication game was the culmination of a dream come true for then East Carolina College and all of eastern North Carolina. The original plan was announced on Oct. 7, 1961, by Dr. Leo Jenkins, Chancellor of the College, at a meeting of the Society of Buccaneers.

Within a year, \$283,387 had been raised, although the goal had been only \$200,000. With the funds in hand, Ficklen Stadium was built.

The original stadium consisted of the permanent stands on the south side, a small press box and the old lighting system which was removed after the 1974 season. Total cost was \$300,000.

The north side permanent seating was constructed in 1968, increasing the stadium seating capacity to 20,000.

The stadium was named for the late James Skinner Ficklen, a Greenville resident, who distinguished himself as one of America's leading tobaccoists. At the time of his death in 1955, Ficklen was President and Chairman of the Board of the E.B. Ficklen Tobacco Company of Greenville. He was a close friend of the College and established a financial aid foundation, the Ficklen Foundation, to aid students of the College.

The first major change in Ficklen Stadium was the lighting systems, a change that occurred just before the 1975 season opened. The old inner stadium lights on six poles were removed and replaced with six towers outside the stadium. The system is a combination of metallic

and incandescent lights. There are 288 fixtures of 1500 watts each on six 162-foot towers. Cost of the system was \$450,000.

A radical change greeted fans as the 1978 season opened. An expansion on all four corners boosted Ficklen's seating capacity from 20,000 to 35,000, the third largest stadium in North Carolina. This expansion was made possible with 2½ million dollars through a drive in the spring of 1977.

In addition to more seats, an ultramodern press box with three levels and an elevator for access was built. The much needed press box has space for 92 writers and an entire floor for electronic media. Also, a modern scoreboard with a lightbank message center was placed on the east end of Ficklen.

During the summer of 1983, a complete renovation took place on the playing surface. A new drainage system, a new base of gravel and sand, new treated topsoil and a new grass was installed. The new grass, Tifton 419 Hybrid Bermuda was sprigged at the rate of 600 bushels per acre.

The 1992 season saw the season attendance record fall in Ficklen Stadium as the Pirates drew a school-record 164,068 fans for five home games.

Future plans call for expansion of Ficklen Stadium, with an upper deck. That would add an estimated 15,000 seats, giving the stadium a capacity of 50,000. Also, plans call for a renovation of the press box, enlarging it to include a club seating level.

Ficklen Stadium Expansion Project

Ficklen Stadium will see a major facelift in the upcoming years. Plans call for a new press box and an upper deck on the south side of the stadium. These plans will increase the seating in Ficklen Stadium from 35,000 to 50,000.

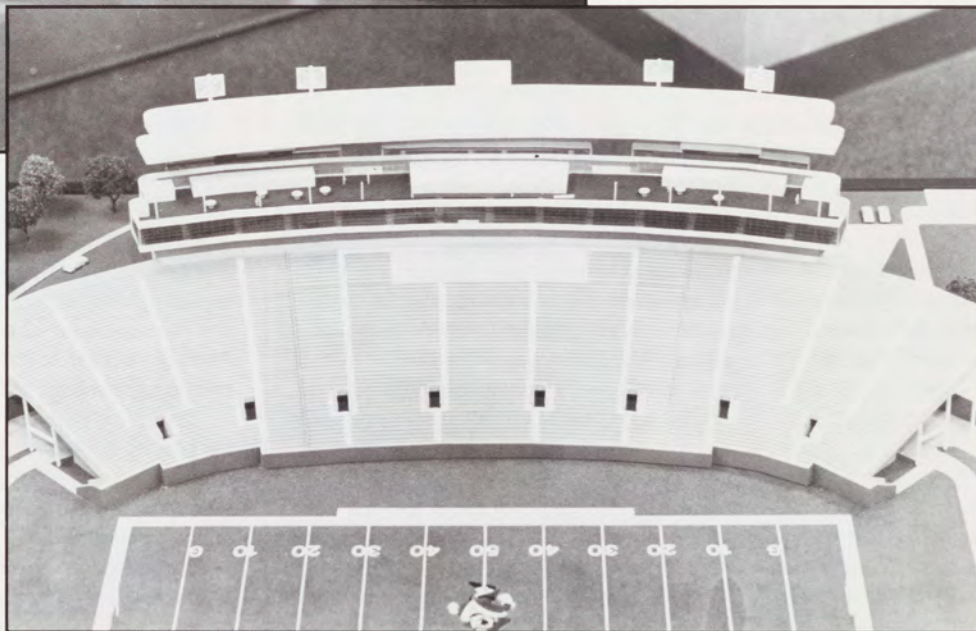
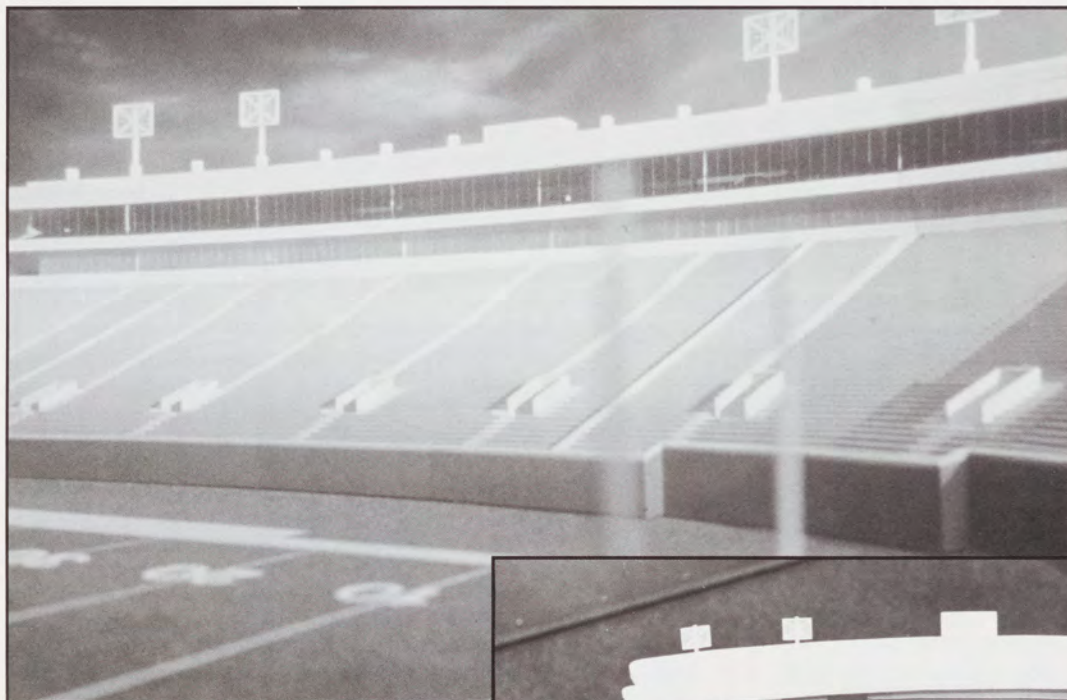
The project is part of the Shared Visions Campaign, which will raise \$50 million for East Carolina University. Of that amount, \$9 million will go to the Ficklen Stadium project.

Included in the new press box will be club seating for 1,500, which will also hold a concession and vending area, coat check room and

have three elevators.

The press facilities will include working space for 90 writers, two television booths, two radio booths, a workroom, a darkroom, a lounge and concession area and various other booths.

"The plan for the Ficklen Stadium press box make it one of the most modern and functional facilities in the country," said Charles Bloom, Sports Information Director. "With the tremendous growth of our football program, the improvements and additional space in the press box is very timely and exciting."



Shared Visions Campaign

Pirates begin play in new football conference.

50,000 fans jam Ficklen Stadium to see Pirates take on arch-rival N.C. State.

ESPN visits modernized Minges Coliseum on a regular basis to broadcast Pirate basketball.

All of the above are "Shared Visions" that Pirate fans share about the future of East Carolina athletics.

To make it happen, East Carolina needs the support of its alumni, friends and fans.

ECU has initiated a \$50 million campus-wide Shared Visions Campaign to raise funds for endowed scholarships, academic expansion, faculty development, student programs and facility improvements.

Included in the \$50 million goal is \$14 million needed for ECU athletics. The Pirate Club, one of the University's three non-profit foundations, is now in the midst of soliciting the funding necessary to meet the school's athletics needs.

Three components have been identified within the "working blueprint" for this fund-raising campaign:

- Enhanced athletic facilities to accommodate more fans and meet the needs of a growing, vibrant program.
- Endow scholarships to attract and retain gifted student-athletes.
- Endow the student development program to insure that athletes get strong support in academic, personal and career development.

To reach these goals, ECU has established these financial targets:

- \$9 million for facility expansion and renovation
- \$1 million to help endow athletic scholarships
- \$1 million to endow a student development program for student-athletes
- \$3 million in annual scholarship funding.

The renovation and expansion of facilities such as Minges Coliseum and Ficklen Stadium are crucial to the future financial health of athletics at ECU.

Dedicated in 1963 with a seating capacity of 20,000, Ficklen was expanded to its present 35,000 capacity back in 1978. Two sell-out crowds of over 35,000 in 1992 and a record average attendance mark of better than 32,000 made a new expansion necessary.

Expansion plans call for the addition of a new two-story press box facility on the south side of the stadium, from end zone to end zone. An enclosed, climate-controlled seating area will occupy the second floor of the facility. Service to this seating area will be via three elevators. Concession facilities and bathrooms will be included in this seating area.

Following this expansion phase, decking of the southside of Ficklen Stadium is planned, which will bring stadium capacity to approximately 50,000 seats.

Along with Ficklen, Minges Coliseum is scheduled for a major facelift. Pirate fans had a taste of success with Pirate basketball last season with ECU making its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 20 years after winning the

Colonial Athletic Association Tournament.

Renovations to the 26-year-old Minges Coliseum will make it more attractive for success. The capacity will be 7,800 with seats to be fixed-back chairs with arms.

The renovation will also include air conditioning, a new playing surface, new concession areas and new locker rooms.

When it comes to athletic scholarship funding, the Pirate Club is trying to boost its endowment fund to the \$2 million mark so it can maximize aid in every varsity sport. ECU also wants to fully endow its comprehensive student development program within the athletics department. In addition, one million dollars is being raised to enhance women's athletics within the "Ladies First" Campaign effort, which was developed in 1990.

The University's Shared Visions Campaign has structured a five-year payment plan with numerous giving levels. There are also several naming opportunities for campus facilities and programs. A \$1 million gift, for example, would allow the donor to add his or her name to Ficklen Stadium.

Major gifts with naming opportunities range from \$100,000 to \$1 million, and will be used for specific facility improvements, plus scholarship and student development program endowments. Gifts of \$100,000 and under are applied entirely to Ficklen Stadium and Minges Coliseum expansion and renovation.

The Shared Visions Campaign is the first external fund-raising effort that involves all three of the school's non-profit foundations. Along with the Pirate Club, the ECU Foundation and the Medical Foundation of ECU are involved. A total of \$26 million was committed during the two-year "silent phase" of the campaign. Chancellor Richard R. Eakin says the \$50 million mark will be passed by Dec. 31, 1995, when the three-year public phase concludes.

Robert A. "Bob" Ward and Henry G. Williamson are serving as the campaign's co-chairmen. Ward is executive vice president of Finance and Administration at Unifi, Inc., in Greensboro, N.C.

Williamson is president and chief operating officer of BB&T Financial Corporation, and chief operating officer of BB&T in Wilson, N.C.

THE CAMPAIGN FOR EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

Pirate Athletics - A Program for the 90's

It started with a short snippet in *The Sporting News* during the summer of 1990. In talking about East Carolina's football program, it said, "The Pirates will be one of the top 20 programs in the 1990s. They will prove worthy for the 'big boys' and often will be sending season's greetings from bowl country."

Not only has it been true for ECU's football program, but the entire athletics department has seen the level of success rise immensely.

After the column appeared in *The Sporting News*, the Pirates finished the 1991 season with an 11-1 record, defeated North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl, and finished ninth in the nation in the two major polls (AP and CNN/USA Today).

For each of the last three seasons, the Pirates have had at least one first-team pre-season or regular season All-America selection. In 1991, Robert Jones was a unanimous first-team All-America at linebacker. He started at linebacker for the Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys in 1992.

Last season, offensive tackle Tom Scott was a first-team All-America by *Football News* and *The Sporting News*. In April, Scott was taken in the sixth round by the Cincinnati Bengals in the NFL Draft.

And, this season, tight end Carlester Crumpler has been named the best tight end in college football by *LINDY's* magazine and *NCAA Football Preview*.

Listed below are the accomplishments of the remaining programs in the ECU athletics department since 1990:



Ike Copeland (men's basketball) was named to the CAA All-Tournament Team in 1993. The senior from Rocky Mount, N.C., helped the Pirates win the CAA title and reach the NCAA Tournament for the second time ever.

MEN'S BASKETBALL—In 1992-93, claimed the Colonial Association title and advanced to the first-round of the NCAA Tournament. The Pirates fell to North Carolina in the East Regionals, 85-65, at Winston-Salem. UNC went on to claim the national championship. Coach Eddie Payne's recruiting class for 1993-94 was rated 11th in the nation by analyst Bob Gibbons.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL—During the 1991-92 season, the Lady Pirates were the CAA regular season champions, posting a 12-2 conference record and a 21-8 overall mark. Last season, guard Gaynor O'Donnell led the nation in assists average, with 10.7 per game, and Toina Coley was second in the nation in steals, for coach Rosie Thompson's squad.

BASEBALL—Coach Gary Overton's Pirates have won the CAA title three times already in the 90s, thus earning three trips to the NCAA regionals. The Pirates have been to the NCAA Tournament five times in the last seven seasons. In 1990, ECU posted the best record in college baseball at 47-9 (83.9 percent). In 1993, Pat Watkins was named the CAA Player of the Year and second-team All-America.

SOFTBALL—The Lady Pirates earned a post-season bid in 1993 to the ECAC Championships and finished the season 34-22. Outfielder Michelle Ward set a new NCAA record for stolen bases in a season with 72 and was named first-team all-region. Pitcher Jenny Parsons finished second in the nation in wins with 31. In 1992, the Lady Pirates had their best record ever, with 42-16. Parsons led the nation in wins in 1992, while Laura Crowder was the national leader in steals.

GOLF—Coach Hal Morrison's golf team has won the CAA title four straight years and six of the last seven seasons. In 1991, the Pirates earned their first berth in the NCAA tournament. In 1993, Mike Teague participated as an individual in the NCAA East Regionals.



Gaynor O'Donnell (women's basketball) led the nation in assists average during her senior season in 1992-93. The Merseyside, England native, averaged 10.7 assists per game last season. She has also set school marks for single-game, season and career assists.

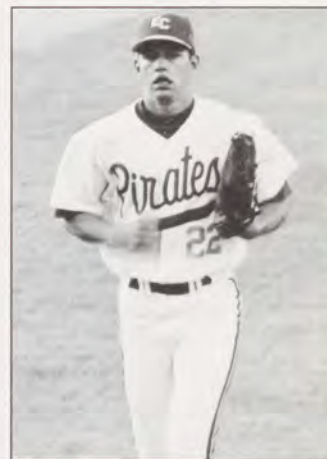
SWIMMING—Both men's and women's swim squads finished third at the CAA Championships in 1993. For the women's squad, it was their best finish since 1987. The men's team has finished third or better in every CAA Championship since 1986. The Pirates won events in the 200 freestyle and 200 breaststroke at the CAA Championships. The swimming teams are coached by Rick Kobe.

CROSS COUNTRY—The ECU women's cross country team posted a first-place finish at the Greensboro Invitational this season. The men's squad finished second in the same meet. The men's and women's squad finished no lower than third in four meets. The cross country teams are coached by John Welborn.

TENNIS—The ECU men's tennis squad finished third in the CAA while the women's squad finished tied for sixth place. The men's squad finished with a 6-3 record and the women's squad was 2-2 in league play. The tennis teams are coached by Dr. Bill Moore.

VOLLEYBALL—The Lady Pirates finished 13-20 under coach Martha McCaskill. In 1992, ECU posted its first-ever CAA Tournament victory, defeating UNC Wilmington in three straight games. Individually in 1992, Wendy Schultz was named first-team All-CAA and Jenny Parsons was all-tournament team at the UNC Greensboro Invitational.

SOCCER—Coach Scooty Carey's young Pirate soccer team continues to improve. Freshman Andrew Racine was a first-team All-CAA selection and senior Craig Turnbull was a second-team All-CAA choice in 1992.



Pat Watkins (baseball) was named the Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year in 1993. The junior from Garner, N.C., was also named second-team All-America.

TRACK—Lady Pirate Danita Roseboro had the top time in the state of North Carolina in the 200 meters with a time of 23.8 this season. Senior Charles Miles won the 200 meter dash at the IC4A Championships with a time of 20.91. The men's and women's squads finished fourth at this year's CAA Championships. The men's track team has produced 15 All-Americans since 1990 including five-time A-A Brian Irvin. The men's track squad is coached by Bill Carson and the women's squad is coached by Charles Justice.
