Four-Party Talks Expected To Begin Week Of Dec. 8

WON'T TALK HONG KONG (AP) — North Vietnam said today its representatives would not talk to South Vietnamese government representatives at the Paris peace talks.

It also declared the Vietnam war could be ended by three-sided agreement of the United States, North Vietnam, and the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

PARIS (AP) — Four-party Vietnam peace talks with a Saigon delegation participating are expected to begin the week of Dec. 8, but U.S. diplomats said today the opening sessions probably will be bogged down by arguments about who will speak for whom.

South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu announced Wednesday he will end his month-long boycott of the talks "to show the good will of the Republic of Vietnam and test the good faith of Hanoi."

But he stressed that the Saigon group still would not recognize the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front as a separate negotiating entity. "We will regard and treat all the persons on the other side of the table as a single side, that of Hanoi," he said.

An NLF spokesman said his delegation will attend "the conference of the four on the basis of equality with the other parties."

The NLF, supported by Hanoi, claims the Saigon regime is a U.S. "puppet," and therefore the Viet Cong are "authentic representatives of the population of South Vietnam."

The U.S. delegation, headed by Ambassador W. Averell Harriman, wants to avoid a delay in opening the conference by not getting into a wrangle with the North Vietnamese on this issue.

An American source said U.S. diplomats hope at this point for a minimal advance agreement with Hanoi only on a time and place for the first meeting. The Americans want the procedural battle to be hammered out at the conference itself, not before, the source said.

Other U.S. sources said the North Vietnamese probably would agree to such strategy, preferring to save their ammunition on the procedural points for the full glare of a public conference opening.

It is not yet known whether there will be a square conference table, meeting the Communists' demands for four equal delegations, or a rectangular table more suited to the allies contention for a two-sided conference—Hanoi and the NLF on one side, and Saigon and the United States on the other.

Some Are Absent

America Pauses For Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Day, an American tradition older than the nation, is once again a time for families and reunions, sports spectacles and stuffed turkeys, children's parades and church prayers.

It is the day the nation goes home to dinner and Americans from Maine to California planned to sit down with their relatives and share the traditional feast and all the trimmings.

President Johnson gathered his family and some friends at his Texas ranch to observe the day with church-going and a turkey dinner. Among the family were his baby grandson and new granddaughter.

But like many other American

family some of the men were absent. Both the President's sons-in-law, Airman I.C. Patrick J. Nugent and Marine Maj. Charles S. Robb were having their turkey in Vietnam.

President-elect Richard M. Nixon and his family joins the family of ailing former President Dwight D. Eisenhower for dinner at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington. Eisenhower is recuperating from a series of heart attacks.

In Vietnam, the 536,000 U.S. troops had their turkey amid hopes that the next Thanksgiving could be celebrated at home.

In a message to his troops, Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, U.S. Commander in Vietnam, said they "should give thanks that as

free men we have been privileged to give a measure of ourselves in assisting the Vietnamese people against the enemy who would enslave them."

The first American Thanksgiving was celebrated by the Plymouth, Mass., colonists in 1621, less than a year after they arrived in the new land seeking freedom to worship as they pleased.

The first winter killed nearly half their number but hopes were rekindled the following summer. When the harvest went well, Gov. William Bradford decreed a three-day celebration of prayer and thanksgiving.

Fifty Pilgrims and 90 Indians gathered for the feast. The Indians brought five deer and in addition to venison the menu included codfish and wild turkey.

Another Explosion Rocks West Virginia Coal Mine

MANNINGTON, W. Va. (AP)

Another explosion thundered through the deep coal mine today where 78 men have been trapped for more than a week. Flames and smoke poured from one of the big mine's entrances. Company spokesmen termed the 2:8 a.m. blast a "major explosion." It was the 15th to wrack Mountaineer Coal Co. No. 9 mine since the first blast trapped the men early on Nov. 20. The other 21 men on the shift

with them escaped.

The explosion this morning was another setback in the long rescue move to reach the 78 with whom there has been no contact since they were entombed. Fear of explosions has prevented more search teams from probing into the mine where an intense fire deep in its pits rages uncontrolled.

The eruption today was at the Mahan shaft where the last

blast occurred on Tuesday afternoon. Company spokesmen said at that time it did not surprise them since the Mahan and Llewellyn shafts—site of the first explosions—were "like two big smokestacks with the fire between them"

The blast today made any Thanksgiving plans for those who are waiting word of husbands and fathers even more gloomy.

Abernathy Harsh On Nixon In Visit To North Carolina

WASHINGTON, N. C. (AP)

"Those of us believing in non-violence," says the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, "will have to work doubly hard" under the presidency of Richard M. Nixon. Abernathy made the comment to newsmen Wednesday as he announced that his North Carolina visit would be cut short. He returned to Atlanta and was hospitalized with what aides said was pneumonia.

Before leaving North Carolina, Abernathy said, "In my opinion George Wallace had the courage to say what Richard Nixon felt" during the presidential campaign.

Abernathy, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, was in North Carolina to support a Negro protest of neighboring Hyde County's federally approved school desegregation plan. That plan calls for

phasing out two previously all-Negro schools. The protestors want all three schools left open as integrated facilities.

He spoke to about 500 persons in Swan Quarter Tuesday and was scheduled to tour the county Wednesday. A doctor said Abernathy had a temperature of 102.8 and chest rattle, and he cancelled the tour, saying he may return to Hyde County next week.

Holiday Sees Much Fighting

SAIGON (AP) — While thousands of U.S. troops celebrated Thanksgiving, the heaviest fighting in 2½ months was reported along the Cambodian border today.

Military spokesmen said 255 enemy soldiers were killed in five swirling engagements Wednesday and today.

Two American helicopters were shot down and destroyed in a landing zone ringed by enemy troops in one of the battles where 15 Americans were killed and 19 wounded.

U.S. casualties in the five battles were put at 21 killed and 37 wounded. Ten South Vietnamese were killed and 20 wounded, spokesmen said.

The late reports of heavy fighting shattered what appeared earlier to be a quiet Thanksgiving Day with GIs sitting down to plates of hot turkey.

More than a half million pounds of turkey, shrimp cocktail, cranberry sauce and other trimmings were shuttled by helicopters and trucks to 536,000 troops some of the manning outposts along the Cambodian border and the demilitarized zone.

"We can pray that peace will come to all the world and that all of us can return to our loved ones in the not too distant future," Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, U.S. commander in Vietnam, said in a message attached to printed menus.

Robbery Warrants Issued

Chief H. F. Lawson said Wooten is allegedly the driver of the "getaway" car in the armed robbery. Wooten was charged with highway robbery and assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill.

Police are still hunting for Donnell Carter, 18, of Goldsboro, who Chief Lawson identified as the man believed to have robbed Carlton Cozart of \$6,134 outside his Dickinson Avenue supermarket.

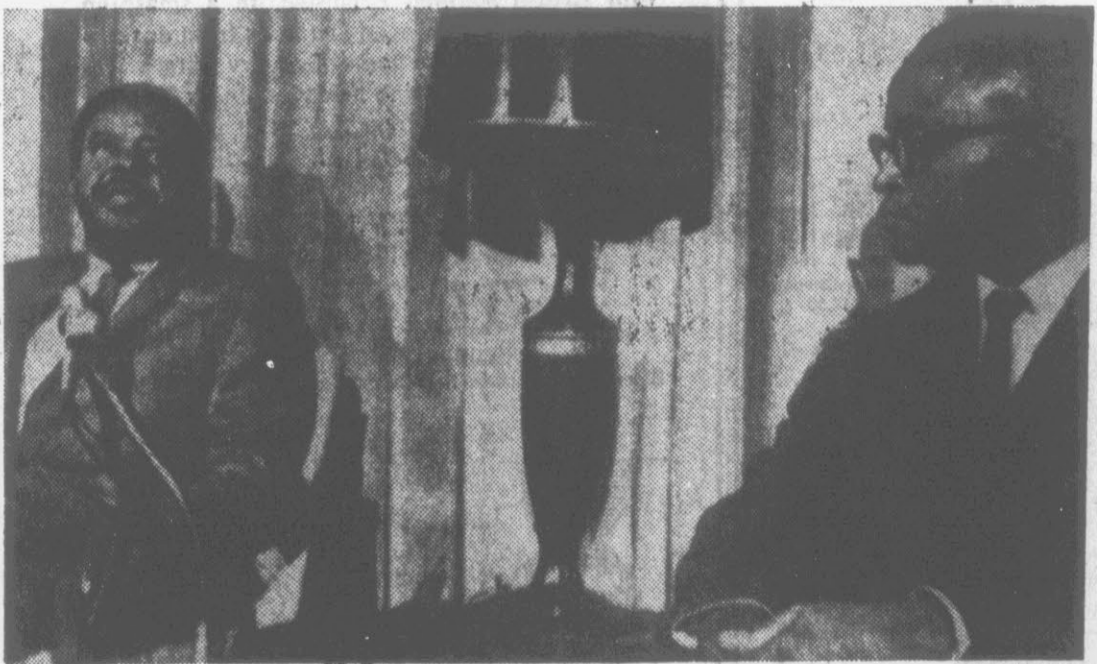

Several New Apartment Developments Are Considered By Planning-Zoning

Presentation of a preliminary plan by Larry Mazingo for construction of an apartment complex and a business building with a combined value of approximately \$2,300,000 led the parade of three apartment complexes considered by the Greenville Planning and Zoning Commission at its meeting Wednesday night.

In considering this complex, to be located off Memorial Drive and Country Club Road, the commission voted to hold a public hearing at the next meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission on January 8, prior to making further recommendations.

Mazingo noted that plans call for a total of 222 units, 66 one-bedroom and 156 two-bedroom apartments. This would make it Greenville's

largest apartment complex, surpassing by a substantial number the 146 units in the two sections of Stratford Arms.

The single business building Mazingo plans to build would be a two story office unit, comprising 12 suites. These would be available for use by insurance agents, real estate firms and similar professions.

Fred Mattox presented plans for an apartment complex to be built by W. E. Dansey, on North Elm Street extending from frontage on Tar River down to Willow Street. This plan had previously been deferred by the board until Dansey revised his street plans to include a continuation of River Drive. Located on a site consisting of 8.84 acres, the proposed complex will contain 100 units and will involve a construction cost of

nearly one million dollars. The commission voted to accept this plan with a provision that dedication of streets be included.

Chairman Frank Little excused himself from the meeting for consideration of a request for a proposed five-unit single building apartment projected for Little's property in the 900 block of 14th Street. The board approved the plan after determining that East Carolina University officials have no interest in this particular plot.

Considerable discussion was involved in the request for a permit by Carolyn Parrott to operate a clothing shop, The Casual Closet of Greenville, in a trailer adjacent to the Koretz Cleaning Establishment at the intersection of Highway 43 and U. S. 264 By - Pass.

Willis Talton, attorney, represented Miss Parrott, who was present.

Talton stated that "Woodrow Wilson, City Building Inspector, would not grant a building permit to the trailer for business usage based on a state law not allowing the use of a wood frame structure as a business establishment, even though it was covered by aluminum."

Wilson informed the events connected with this trailer. "After receiving complaints that the trailer blocked entry to residents of a trailer park adjacent to the Casual Closet trailer, I signed a warrant charging E. M. Vick with violating Code 137 of the city ordinance. The case was tried at Recorders Court on November 11, resulting in an order by Judge Charles Whedbee that the trailer be removed

within 10 days or by November 20. Talton has appealed the judgment."

Wilson explained that the ordinance granting permit to use a trailer as a business office required the approval of the City Building Inspector, the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council. "If the City Manager notifies me to issue a permit I would do so," Wilson stated.

Talton argued "Since Greenville city authorities permit the use of trailers as offices for used-car dealers, it seems to me there is an inconsistency somewhere in the interpretation of city ordinances."

The commission rejected the request of Miss Parrott to operate Casual Closet of Greenville in the trailer at its present site by a vote of 5 to 3.

Jesse A. Johnson requested

rezoning from residential to business usage two lots located at 612 Ford Street. Johnson has torn down an old garage building and wishes to replace it with a new one. The commission deferred action, recommending that a public hearing be called before further consideration of the request.

For a matter of information, City Manager Harry Hagerty read excerpts from a letter of John H. High which states that High agrees to provide entrance and exit to his apartment complex to be located adjacent to Red Bank Road and Highway N. C. 43.

A draft proposal for an ordinance providing for restrictions upon the construction of multi-family dwellings in residential districts was read. This amendment provides for a new paragraph which would

grant permission for construction of multi-family dwelling by the Planning and Zoning Commission or the joint City - County Planning and Zoning Commission if the commission finds from evidence and a study of the record that . . . the general plans for physical development of the city is not adversely affected; that such a building would not adversely effect the safety and health of residents; not be detrimental to the adjacent property; and that such dwellings would meet space, off-street parking and other required standards under existing city ordinances."

The commission made a motion to recommend to the City Council that the amendment be voted into law. Superintendent of City Schools Dr. Cleet C. Cleet-

wood gave an orientation to the commission on the status of city school construction and related school plans. Noting the plan to have one central high school next year, Dr. Cleetwood said "Rose High is now in the geographical center of Greenville. The Junior High is located off center in relation to the population centers of the city. For this reason, transportation is one of our big problems. If the city develops a public transport system in the future, that would do much to help solve the transportation problem."

"At the time our yearly increase in the number of students is somewhat stabilized, with about 100 to 125 new pupils per year. Even at this rate, it will still require an additional school building every three or four years."

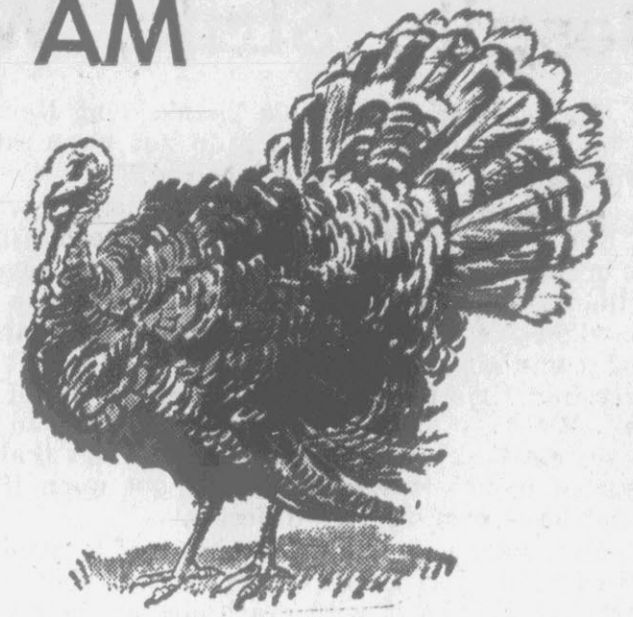

# Negro Schools Will Have Place

RALEIGH — The State Board of Higher Education took a hard, close look at traditionally Negro colleges and Universities and found there is a place for them.

It said the Negro institutions "are rendering a real service" and that to close or

demits—predominantly black. The Board found it unlikely that the bulk of these students could be placed in predominantly white institutions even with large scale remedial and compensatory programs. It also said there is serious question whether many of the black students would willingly attend predominantly white institutions.

It said studies indicate that most students at Negro institutions in the South "do not think well of white institutions in their area." Further, experience in other states suggests that where Negro institutions are closed there tends to be a decrease in the number of Negroes going to college.

**Strong Attachment**  
The report cites a strong attachment to the Negro institutions and strong community and alumni support for them. In the years ahead, it said, these can be valuable assets.

In long-range development of the higher educational system, the physical facilities—described as good—will be needed. The Board predicted that during the next 20 years enrollment at public senior institutions may well double.

**New Roles**  
Achieving transformation of the Negro institutions, the Board said, will require a "great deal of talent and imagination" and "continuous, major financial support."

It said new methods and new ideas will be needed in developing creative programs. Most of the additional financial support must be expected from legislative appropriations although the institutions themselves may turn also to foundations, alumni and federal funds.

The report quoted the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) that Negro institutions need more imagination and more resources but that their financial support is below average. Even in average, SREB said, it would be inadequate.

The North Carolina study said the first step should be to close the gap in average salaries between the Negro institutions and predominantly white schools—then, in order to recruit the talent needed, to make salaries nationally competitive.

phases them out would not further the cause of equal educational opportunity.

A full section of the Board's long-range planning study report is devoted to the future role of the state's five public Negro institutions. Considered in the study were suggestions to close these schools, to merge Negro institutions with other senior colleges nearby, that one or all of the Negro institutions become black colleges devoted to black culture, to leave them as they are. The Board concluded that it "is not in the best interest of the state" to follow any of them.

**New Roles**  
It said the institutions should be contained "in a form and with a spirit quite different from anything they have known in the past."

On the other hand it said they should be continued only if sufficient support is provided to enable a radical transformation.

It predicted a period of transition lasting from 10 to 15 years during which the institutions will seek new roles and raise their standards.

This period, it said, should be characterized by a number of programs which will result in "a forward leap."

**Facilities Needed**  
The fact that racial segregation has been ended in public institutions failed to convince the Board that the Negro institutions should be phased out.

In 1967, it pointed out, the institutions enrolled 10,455 stu-

# Robert Scott Showed Diversified Strength

Bob Scott's diversified political strength in North Carolina is much more evident from the number of counties in which he received a majority of the votes in the recent gubernatorial election than in the 84,000 vote total by which he defeated his Republican opponent Jim Gardner.

Governor-elect Scott carried 67 of North Carolina's 100 counties, leaving only 33 for his opponent. Of those in the Gardner column, only eight were in the East where Gardner had anticipated considerable strength in his bid to become the first Republican governor since reconstruction. The other 25 Gardner counties were mostly in the western Piedmont and eastern mountain region, traditional GOP strongholds.

While this lopsided county victory for Scott in the general election was not as sweeping as his county total in the Democratic primary in which he was high man in all but a handful of the 100 counties, it reiterated a broad base of strength for the new governor-elect.

It suggests that Scott will have to view North Carolina as a whole rather than particular sections of the state as he considers any political debts in the next four years. Equally important, it suggests that Scott's program as governor will be oriented to the needs of every section of the state.

# Santa Cruz Has Pass-Fail Plan

SANTA CRUZ, Calif. (UPI)—When this year's seniors graduate from the University of California at Santa Cruz, they won't have an "A" to their name—or even a "B" or a "C" for that matter.

None of these students will have grades.  
The school, one of the nine campuses of C. was started in the fall of 1965 on the "pass-fail" system. In other words, there are no letter grades given, no percentages, no class ranking—just "pass" or "fail."

**First To Finish**  
This year's graduating class will be the first to complete a full four-year course under the system, which was set up for five years as an experiment.

"But it is a cinch that it will be kept," says Peter Braun, a senior. "It is liked by the faculty and the stud-

ents both."  
"The pass-fail system is one of the things that brought me here," says Nancy Coleman, a junior from Santa Monica.

One of the questions brought up by the system was how it would affect people who wanted to go on with post-graduate work. But apparently it has not worked against them since graduates have been accepted by Harvard Law School, University of Minnesota, Oxford, University of Colorado, and University of Chicago, among others, a spokesman said.

Other schools, such as Reed College in Portland, Ore., have experimented with the "pass-fail" system, but have backed it up with a class-ranking to show in which portion of the class the student finished. This, of course, entails much the same consideration.

# Other Editors Say Reading And Writing

(Tulsa, Okla., Tribune)

A nationwide, four-year study by experts has confirmed the worst fears of most parents: There are severe shortcomings in the teaching of English in the nation's high schools.

The National Council of Teachers of English and the University of Illinois made intensive studies of 158 representative high schools in 45 states and discovered that the two areas of greatest weakness are reading and writing. Some highlights from the study of 1,600 classrooms:

There is little direct instruction in writing despite the fact that 16 per cent of class time is devoted to composition.

Only 13 per cent of student papers examined by observers showed signs of any thorough rewriting and only 17 per cent showed any evidence that teachers help students with organization of ideas, critical thinking and clear communications.

Reading programs are inadequate, uncoordinated and almost non-existent. Most programs seemed lacking in purpose, organization and impact. The non-academic, non-college, slow-learning student is neglected.

Few teachers show themselves capable of effectively leading class discussion. Barely a fifth of the time is used

in discussion and questioning. The emphasis is on recitation and rote response.

Language is the least well taught of all elements of the English curriculum. A majority of schools concentrate on mechanical drill and error-based instruction with ineffective communication being subordinated to grammatical accuracy in classroom presentation.

Those who made the survey stressed the need for quality leadership from the principal and chairman of each English department and the need for a small cadre of "master teachers" in each school employed on a merit pay system. English teachers nationally average 150 students each—50 more than the recommended maximum of 100.

These suggested cures probably sound familiar. Developing a cadre of master teachers in the various disciplines, paying them on merit and freeing good teachers from non-educational duties is what Tribune education writer Kyle Goddard has been preaching for a long time.

When we cheat boys and girls of the ability to read and write well, we limit their ability to communicate effectively and to reach their potential. But like we've said before, quality education costs money. So does under-education.

# Americans May Share In Venture

By ELMER ROESSNER

Americans may be given an opportunity to share in Aristotle Onassis's \$400 million venture in Greece. On his current visit to the United States, the Greek of Argentine citizenship is expected to invite large investors such as banks and syndicates, to participate in his package deal with the Greek government.

The package includes building an oil refinery, leasing a government-owned refinery until his is built, constructing an aluminum refinery eventually able to produce 500,000 tons a year, erecting an air terminal in downtown Athens, and constructing an electric generating plant and shipyards.

While Onassis and Greek associates could probably finance these projects by themselves, there are certain political advantages to bringing

American money in. In fact, getting the United States involved may be a condition of the deal with the Greek military dictatorship.

**Double Advantage**  
The dictatorship has two objectives: first, to create a boom to make its rule palatable if not popular; second, to gain support of the U. S. Greece has always welcomed U. S. investment and the military rulers have encouraged it. Tax shelter and other inducements are offered American and other foreign businesses.

Standard Oil has long been involved in oil and steel and many other U. S. corporations have enlarged old or created new establishments.

The Department of Commerce magazine International Commerce, which has previously shown enthusiasm for Greece under the dictatorship, said in its Nov. 18 issue

that Greece is enjoying a modest revival with an 8.7 per cent rise in retail sales and an increase in building permits in the first seven months of the year. Imports

are expected to be about 6 per cent higher this year than last.

**Banks Interested**  
Both the Chase Manhattan Bank and the Bank of America have opened branches in Athens, joining the First Na-

tional City Bank and American Express, Commerce reports. MacDonald Co. of St. Louis is investing \$150 million in a road project. Tom Pappas, a wealthy Greek who has joined Standard Oil in other enterprises—has launched a \$36 million project for Coca-Cola bottling plants, a chain of canneries and several dairy plants.

Owens-Illinois Glass is involved in a glass container and tableware plant; Reynolds Aluminum is working with Onassis, and a number of other concerns are launching or bidding on various projects.

However, many American firms are being cautious, either because they have no confidence in the dictatorship or because they fear boycotts by Americans of Greek descent, who are largely anti-dictatorship. In fact, many Greeks in Greece are, too.

# Plan The Big Flight

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Every weekday, astronauts Frank Borman, James A. Lovell Jr. and William A. Anders slip into a spacecraft simulator and spend six hours practicing for man's most ambitious space flight yet.

On Dec. 21, they are to ride the force of a Saturn 5 rocket on a six-day journey that will take them into orbit around the moon on Christmas Eve and part of Christmas Day.

When they're not in the simulator, the astronauts are discussing the flight with members of the launch team and reviewing a very demanding flight plan.

On most weekends, Air Force Col. Borman, Navy Capt. Lovell and Air Force Maj. Anders fly to the manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Tex., to huddle with flight controllers, experts and specialists on lunar geology and geography.

"We started training for this particular mission in August," Borman said. "And we have been pursuing it rather heavily ever since. One thing that is different from any of the other missions we've had is the fact that we're doing a lot of specialized training."

"Bill Anders is really the systems man, and Jim Lovell knows the navigation and guidance equipment, and I guess I don't do anything but kititz," joked Borman, who will command Apollo 8.

"We usually get up about 6:15 a.m. and get out to the simulator by 8," he explained. "Mary nights we don't end up until 11 or 12."

The backup Apollo 8 team of Neil Armstrong, Edwin Aldrin and Fred W. Haise Jr. usually spends afternoons in the simulator after the Borman crew leaves.

In the simulator, they are to rehearse every phase of the mission. Stereoscopic maps of the moon, constructed from pictures taken by the unmanned lunar orbiter satellites, are projected outside their windows so they'll have a sense of what it will be like as they orbit the moon for 20 hours at an altitude of 69 miles.

Flight controllers introduce mock emergency situations into the simulator computers to see how well the astronauts react. Emergency and abort situations are practiced.

"They really throw some good ones at us," Borman commented.

The flight plan is calculated to take the astronauts over an area of the moon's Sea of Tranquility, one of five prime sites being considered for the first astronaut landing next year.

If the launching is delayed beyond the 21st, trajectory and lighting conditions change, and, depending on what day they take off, the astronauts will pass over one of the other sites. The last possible launching day for the desired lighting conditions is Dec. 27. If the rocket is not launched by then, the flight will be delayed until the next favorable period, which begins Jan. 18.

Lovell said "One of the difficulties of this is the fact that the three of us have to learn all about each of the five landing areas in case the launch does slip beyond the 21st."

Twice during their training, the three enter their spaceship perched atop a 36-story-tall Saturn 5 rocket on launch complex 39A. They did it the first time Nov. 19, successfully completing a flight readiness test. The second time will be Dec. 8 or 9 during a lengthy countdown demonstration test.

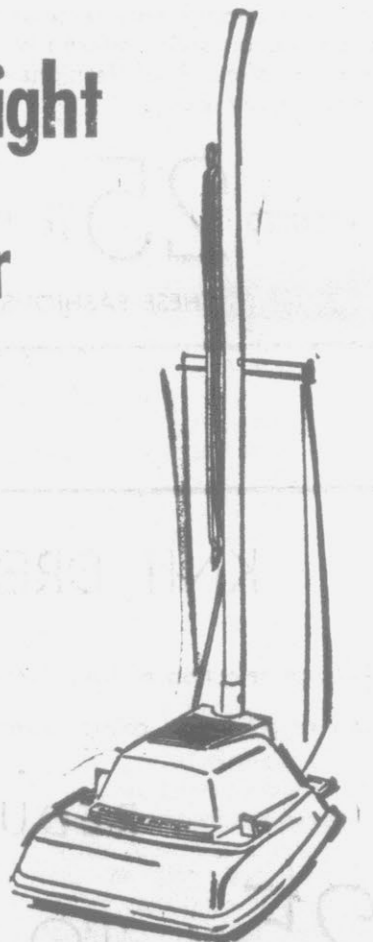

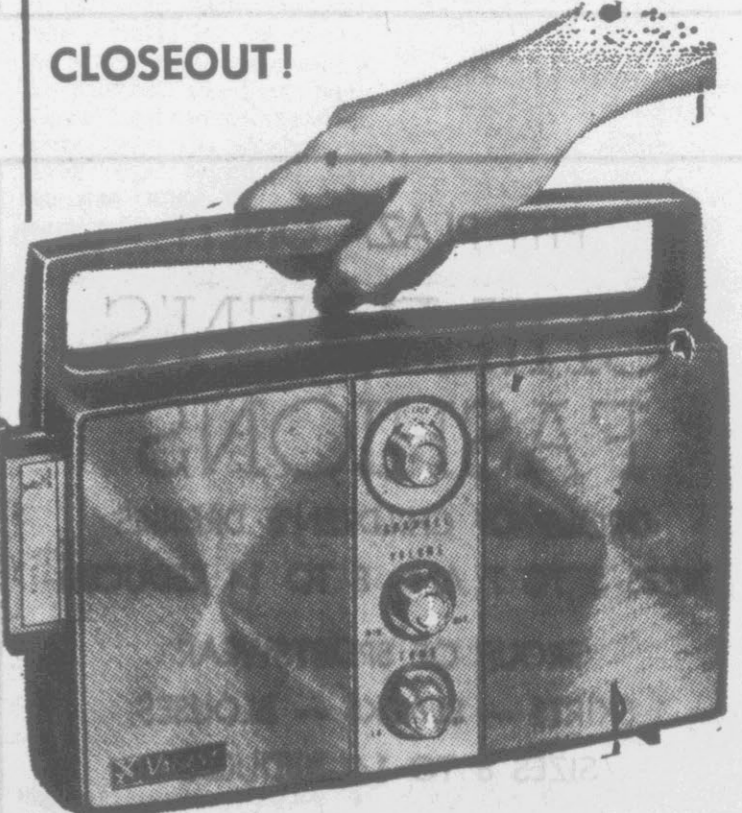

# Forest Fire Danger Can Now Develop Quickly

The immediate danger of forest fires in Pitt County is not a critical factor at the moment, due to heavy periodic rains in the past few weeks. This situation, however, can change quickly.

In late autumn, when leaves fall and dry days often follow adds up to a combustible situation.

It takes only one careless person a few minutes to begin a fire which can destroy in an hour what man and nature worked for twenty or more years to grow.

"There were 76 forest fires in Pitt County last year," reports Assistant County Forest Ranger Ben Forrest. "These fires burned over approximately 1,156 acres of timberland."

Forrest noted that "the most serious fires occur after the leaves fall to the ground. There are two factors which add to fire danger. First, the fallen leaves are easily ignited and help carry the fire. Second, without green leaves on the trees to break the wind created by fire, the wind whips the fire into a much more intense blaze."

Chapter 14-139, of the General Statutes of North Carolina, was passed to help protect the valuable woodland resources. This law reads in part: "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or cooperation, to start . . . any fire . . . in any

areas of woodland under the obligation of the person to control such a fire, and he should take voluntary precautionary measures to keep the fire from spreading out of control."

## Better Dinner For The Poor

CHARLOTTE (AP) — More of a traditional Thanksgiving dinner was possible today for the poor receiving surplus food in the Charlotte area.

Whole canned chickens along with canned green beans, instant potatoes and tomato juice and among eight new commodities that were added to the surplus food program this fall.

"This is the first month we've ever had chicken to give out," said Mrs. Dorothy Fitzjohn, supervisor of the Mecklenburg County program.

"It's just a coincidence it arrived at Thanksgiving time."

She said some 10,000 persons in the county receive surplus foods out of a population of more than 250,000.

"We didn't have time to work up any special Thanksgiving recipes, but if our clients make use of the one they already have I'm sure they can prepare a delicious meal for Thanksgiving," Mrs. Fitzjohn said.

She suggested a holiday menu using surplus commodities might include tomato soup, raisin or prune salad, corn-cheese soup, green beans, instant potatoes with gravy, chicken, cornmeal dressing, homemade bread from rolled wheat or oats and egg custard made from a new scrambled egg mix.

In all, 22 commodities are now distributed by the government under the food surplus program.

"We are reaching the point where our food program is no longer supplementary. It's almost a complete diet," Mrs. Fitzjohn said. "And more commodities will be added from time to time."

Surplus food is issued to persons who receive assistance from the Welfare Department and to those who are in need because of low income but don't get welfare aid.

## Finnish Ferries Collide In Fog

HELSINKI (AP) — Two Finnish ferries collided in heavy fog today off the Isle of Aaland, killing two passengers and a stewardess and injuring seven passengers, the Coast Guard said. Another person was missing.

A spokesman said the 5,100-ton Ilmatar, carrying 150 passengers to the Port of Turku, collided with the 3,800-ton Botnia, carrying 17 passengers to Stockholm. He said the Ilmatar suffered minor damage and continued to its original destination, but a 40-yard hole was ripped in the starboard side of the Botnia above the water line.

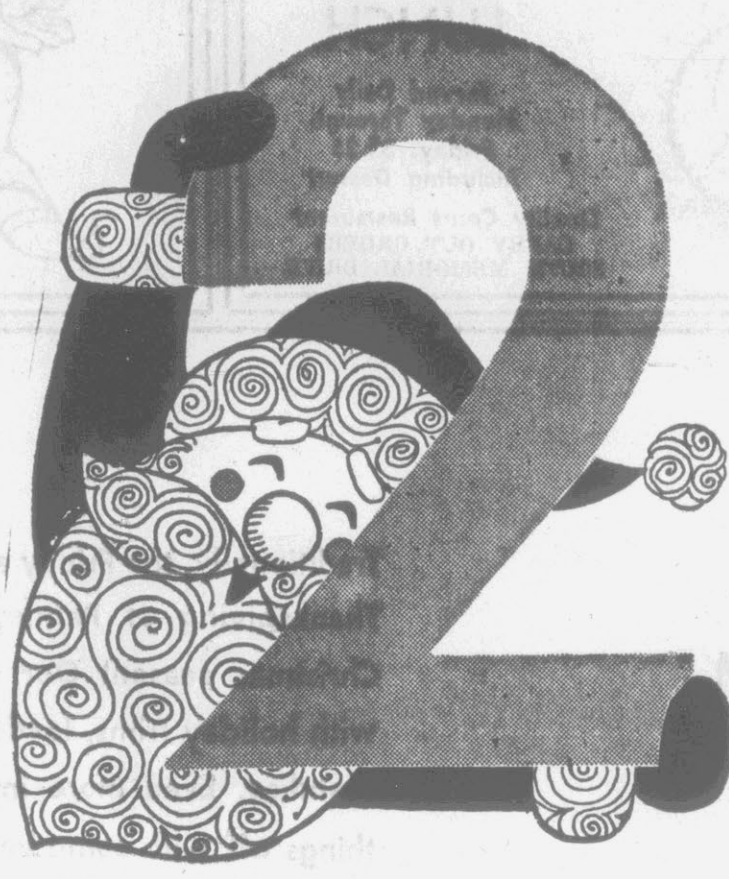

QUEMOY ISLAND, Nationalist China (AP) — The muffled burst of an artillery shell from mainland China, by official count the 900,000th to explode over the offshore islands in 10 years, echoed across the rock-

The fate of the offshore islands rests with the U.S. president, empowered by Congress to commit U.S. forces to their defense if he judges an attack part of an invasion of Nationalist China.

What is seen here as American reluctance to pursue the Vietnam war is considered by some Formosan circles as an indication that the United States

might be less interested in defending Quemoy in the future.

## Profs Are Put On 'Riot Call'

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—A new team of social scientists at the University of California has been set up to move as fast as policemen and newsmen to investigate riots as they happen. The crisis research team is directed by Rodney Stark, a research sociologist, and funded by a grant from the Ford Foundation.

"Although many research efforts are being directed to the endemic crises over authority which afflict the nation, there has been a critical lack of close-up observation and study of such events as they occur," Stark says.

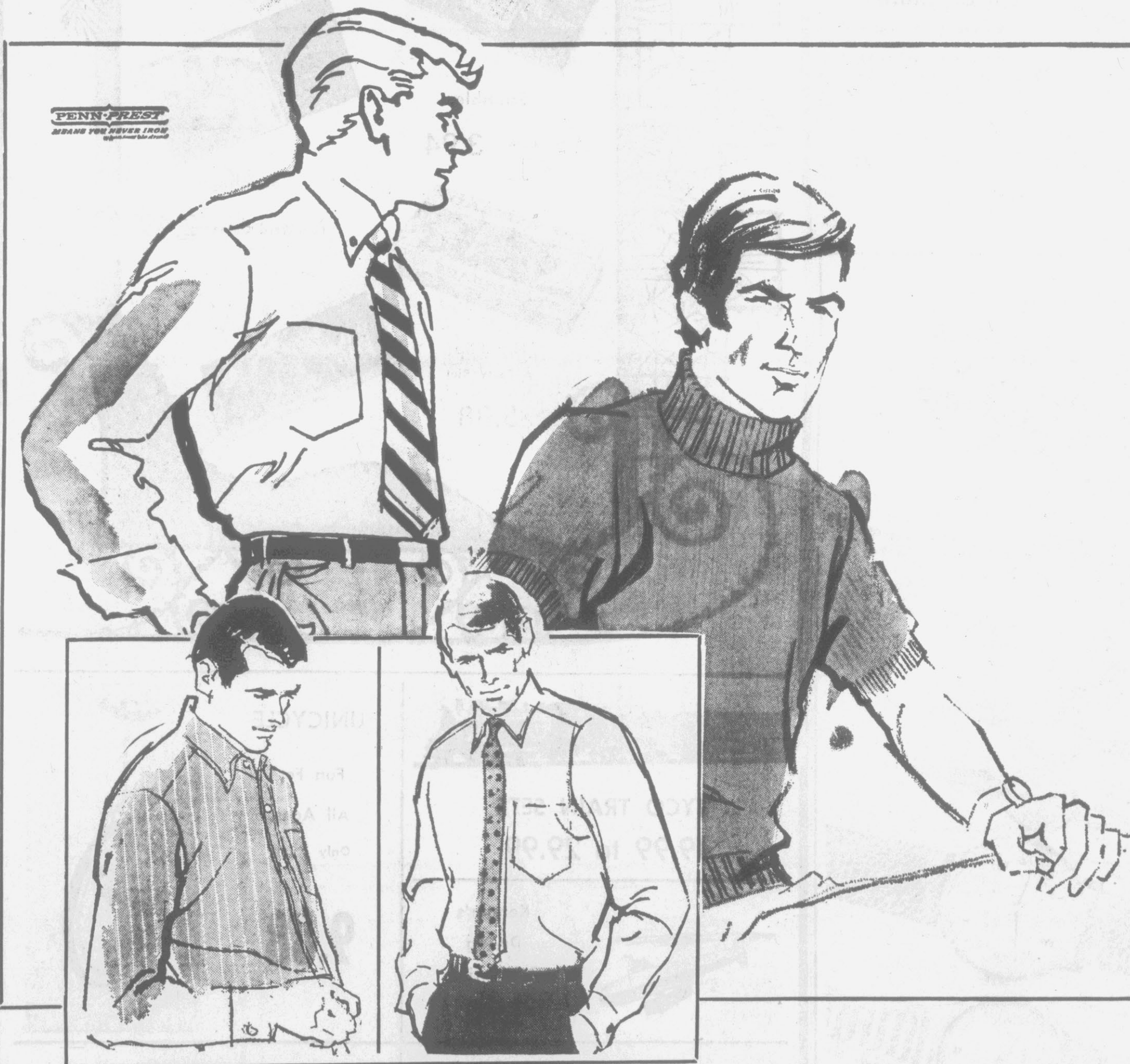

Altho West was dealt the best hand at the table, he was powerless to prevent North and South from bidding themselves into a game contract in hearts.

The king of spades was opened by West and permitted to hold the trick. West continued with the queen which was taken by North's ace. A heart was led to the ace and a second heart put West in with the king.

West tried to cash a spade, but South ruffed, drew the last trump, and ran his diamond suit—discarding two clubs from dummy. A club trick was conceded to the defense and the deal was chalked up as a profit for North and South.

To the players, the result appeared to be routine; however, West had overlooked a unique opportunity to score

an upset on the deal. Had he thrown his king of hearts under declarer's ace when that suit was led, South would have been unable to prevent East from eventually gaining the lead with the jack of trumps in time to make the club shift which West so urgently desired.

An unblock in the heart suit by West, altho superficially sensational, is in reality a clearly indicated play that becomes dictated thru sheer necessity. A count of the missing points will reveal that South is marked with the king of clubs and the remaining strength in hearts and diamonds to warrant his activities during the auction. Inasmuch as declarer will be able to obtain club discards from dummy on his long diamonds when trumps are pulled, it becomes a matter of great moment to get East in before it is too late.

When South refuses to take the finesse in hearts, leading to his ace instead, there is strong suggestion that it is East who has the jack of trumps. West should, therefore, unblock his high heart at once in a desperate attempt to promote an entry into his partner's hand.

Some may contend that it was always within South's power to fulfill his contract provided that he ducks the first trump lead into West's hand, for the latter's king must fall under the ace on the next round. This play would lose, however, if West had started with three hearts instead of a doubleton.

# Dire Predictions On MGM's Health

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "It's a funny thing about this town," said a veteran MGM studio official. "People are ready to bury you while you're still breathing."

Dire predictions concerning the state of MGM's health have been made because of recent symptoms. Long wracked by struggles for power within the corporation, MGM is finally due for a change of management. Financier Edgar M. Bronfman won control of MGM and a new president is being sought to succeed Robert H. O'Brien.

How the switch in power will affect the Culver City studio is a matter of great concern in the film capital. This concern intensified with the news that the studio had disbanded its casting, makeup and music departments. It seemed like a drastic move for MGM, once the best-staffed studio in Hollywood.

A studio official explained: "MGM is tailoring its operation to fit the production schedule for the coming year. There will be increased activity in independent productions to be released through MGM. The independent producers will be able to select their own personnel to handle casting, music, etc."

"The studio now employs 1,800 full-time employees, compared to 2,000 to 3,000 during peak periods. So you can see the

studio is not dead yet."

But it is obviously ailing. MGM's management has still not decided what to do with the sprawling studio which once put forth a feature movie per week. Its huge sound stages remain empty and almost unused. In the past few years television series like "Dr. Kildare" and "The Man From Uncle" kept some of the stages occupied. But MGM had no series on the networks this season.

During his years as president of MGM, O'Brien fostered a plan to sell off the Culver City real estate and create a brand-new studio in the Conejo Valley 40 miles north of Los Angeles. Property was optioned and plans sketched out, but little has been heard about the plan in recent months.

The reason is obvious. MGM has other problems to settle before it can build a new studio.

The problems were visible in the recent financial statement for fiscal 1968. Profits were down a third, from \$14,090,000 to \$9,409,000. MGM Records dropped from a \$2 million profit to a \$4 million deficit. Film rentals fell almost \$2 million to \$21½ million; TV network sales dropped a half-million to \$1.1 million. The drop in all divisions was precipitous in the second half of the fiscal year.

# Black Nights Mean E. Berlin Escape

BERLIN (AP) — Black nights, rain and fog herald another escape season for the Berlin Wall, but West German officials said today fewer East Germans will make it to the West this year.

An authoritative source said there were about 70 escapes over the wall last year, and this year's total is expected to be 20 less.

The "death strip," a ring of stone and steel, explosive devices, wire and flood-lit open

spaces patrolled by guards with dogs, has drastically curtailed the flow of East German refugees. Since the Communists sealed the borders in August 1961, about 163 Germans have been reported killed trying to cross to the West.

A West German government source said there were 19,573 refugees to West Germany and West Berlin in 1967. Of these 1,203 braved border barriers, while the rest reached the West through other countries or were

# 'Giant Centipede' Snakes Its Way To The Border

BAVET, Cambodia (AP) — From the distance they look like a giant centipede, slowly crawling through the tidy, green paddies along Route 1 toward the border.

Two hundred yards from the Cambodian and Vietnamese border posts, the centipede turns left, moves along the outposts' fences and bunkers and crosses on a paddy dike into South Vietnam. The border is marked with two cement blocks right and left of the dike. Then it disappears in a hamlet of a score of long, thatched-roofed huts.

These are smugglers pushing frail bicycles, laden with sacks of Cambodian rice, into Vietnam.

Occasionally the column stops in the shade of a cluster of palm trees and the smugglers wipe their sweatstained peasant faces. Then they move on. Few words are spoken and nobody seems to be in charge as they follow each other's footsteps along the trail into the smuggling center on the South Vietnamese side of the border.

Some of the smugglers cover themselves with small mats of rice straw or reeds as they approach the border. These cover the man, his rice load and bicycle like a tent—good protection against the scorching sun and also, if needed, against the occasional American helicopter that scouts the border.

Returning to Cambodia, the smugglers travel alone or in small groups. Their mats are folded and the loads are much lighter. Some clutch only a bundle of Cambodian money.

Others carry American postage exchange goods—uniforms, combat rations, canned candy or soap powder. One woman had a plastic doll on the rack of her bike—payment and barter for the smuggling services rendered.

Most of the rice smuggled across the border will go to the troops of the Viet Cong. Some will end up in the Saigon market, where Vietnamese housewives prefer Cambodian to American rice.

U.S. officials in Saigon claim that at least 100,000 tons of rice reached the Viet Cong from Cambodia within the last year. Through October the kingdom exported 246,196 tons of milled

rice. Cambodian sources contend the loss to smuggling was closer to 40,000 tons than to 100,000.

The rice farmers and the men and women pushing the bikes down Route 1 do not know who will finally get the rice. They only know that the Vietnamese and their undercover agents in Cambodia pay nearly double the

price that Cambodia pays within its nationalized rice trade.

There are open markets at least half a dozen places along the southeastern border of Cambodia.

Near Toanlop village in Takeo Province, opposite the South Vietnamese province of Chau Doc in the Seven Mountains area, a cattle drive is made

across the border twice a month to Vietnamese markets. Cigarettes, chinaware from Communist China, medicines produced or imported into Cambodia and marijuana also pour across the border to Vietnamese markets.

Villages near the Cambodian side often resemble Saigon's black markets. Almost anything is available that can be found at

U.S. military stores, sometimes even more. In Bavet, noise earprotectors for U.S. Air Force mechanics sell for \$1, boxing gloves for \$3. Combat C rations which cost the U.S. taxpayer \$1 a meal are available for 50 cents.

The Cambodian government says it is doing its best to curtail smuggling, but lacks enough

police. The government also has said: "Despite all allied controls in Vietnam an important portion of American products and materials unloaded on the Saigon docks finds its way into the regions administered by the National Liberation Front."

The Viet Cong control most of the black markets along the border and they seem to profit

the most. But many local South Vietnamese authorities along the border who benefit from smuggling have made local arrangements and frequently ignore the Viet Cong's involvement.

If U.S. military intelligence reports are correct, regular North Vietnamese and Viet Cong battalions have many base

camps on the border or just inside Cambodia a few miles from the market places and use them to resupply the bases. A recent U.S. intelligence listing shows at least 12 such encampments in the Cambodian border districts generally west of Saigon. These camps are away from population centers in secret, isolated locations.

Would-be jockey Penny Ann Early's pro basketball debut was a spectacular dud, but a pair of dead-eyes—Connie Hawkins and Rick Barry—kept things from being completely dull in the American Basketball Association Wednesday night.

Hawkins drilled in a league-record 57 points to fire the Minnesota Pipers to a 110-101 conquest of the New York Nets, and Barry hit 49 in powering Oakland to a 130-116 rout of Miami.

Meanwhile, over 5,000 fans turned out at Louisville to see Miss Early's pro basketball debut. Hopefully, none of them blinked—or they missed the 25-year-old blonde's entire career.

With 8:06 to go in the second quarter, the newest member of the Kentucky Colonels threw the ball in from the sidelines. At 8:07, the Colonels called time and presented the colorful ABA red-white-and-blue ball to her, signifying the end of her career.

Miss Early, denied a chance to ride at Churchill Downs by a male jockeys boycott, made her debut against the Los Angeles Stars in a bright green miniskirt and a snug fitting white sweater.

The Colonels signed her to a one-game contract after hearing about her unsuccessful attempts to ride at Churchill Downs. The 5-foot-3 Miss Early said she now plans to return to horse racing.

For the record, Los Angeles won the game 111-107 in overtime.

## Tests May Have Errors

By GEORGE W. HACKETT Associated Press Sports Writer LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Tugging frequently at his salt-and-pepper colored beard, Dr. Hans Jaffe was an impressive figure on the witness stand.

He was witty, precise and confident of one thing: Some of the evidence used against Dancer's image was valueless.

Jaffe made this observation to the Kentucky Racing Commission Wednesday, pointing out that spectrophotometric which he had reviewed contained some errors.

This is a field in which Jaffe is considered an expert. He has written numerous pamphlets and books on spectrophotometric analysis and in addition is head of the chemistry department at the University of Cincinnati.

Jaffe was called as a witness in the commission's hearing by Peter Fuller, who is trying to set aside a ruling from Churchill Downs stewards that Dancer's image is not entitled to the \$12,600 winner's purse of the Kentucky Derby.

The stewards took such action after state chemist Kenneth W.

Smith reported the colt had traces of phenylbutazone in his urine after the May 4 race. The medication is legal in Kentucky as long as it is discontinued so that all traces have disappeared from the horse's system by the time it races.

One of the tests employed by Smith was run on the spectrophotometer, which uses ultraviolet light to reach a finding.

Jaffe, who punctuated his testimony with brief flashes of humor, said it was apparent that either the machine was malfunctioning or the operator made some mistakes while using it.

Earlier, an analytical chemist, Dr. Gerald Ubreit of Chadds Ford, Pa., said the tests produced by Smith's laboratory indicated it is "inadequate to perform the work it professed to be expert at."

Umbreit went over the tests one by one and said they were not specific or conclusive enough to prove the presence of phenylbutazone.

The hearings go into their third week next Monday with no indication when the commission will rule on Fuller's appeal.

The eyes of Arkansas will be on Texas, the eyes of Texas will be on the playing fields of Austin and the eyes of the rest of the country will be on turkey and television for the highlight of today's Thanksgiving Day college football schedule.

The pickin's are slim but choice, headed by the traditional Turkey Day battle between sixth-ranked Texas and upset-

mined Texas A&M that will decide where Texas and Arkansas go a-bowling come New Year's Day.

A Texas triumph sends the Longhorns to the Cotton Bowl and Arkansas to the Sugar Bowl, even though they will share the Southwest Conference title, while a Texas loss or tie means just the reverse.

Elsewhere, Wichita State plays at Tulsa, which is trying to recover from last Saturday's horrendous 100-6 slaughter by

Houston, and Virginia Tech faces VMI at Roanoke, Va.

A night game finds New Mexico State at Louisiana Tech, a small school which has beaten three major colleges this season.

Houston is at Florida State Friday night and the scoreboard may never survive that one. The regular season comes to a close—save for the Dec. 7 Penn State-Syracuse game—Saturday with 16 contests, highlighted by the meeting in Los Angeles between second-ranked Southern California and No. 9 Notre Dame and the annual Army-Navy war in Philadelphia.

Texas-Texas A&M is an old series, dating back to 1894. They have been playing regularly since 1898 and, for the most part, the home team usually wins.

"There is nothing but blood-letting when these two teams come together," says Coach

Darrell Royal of Texas. "We'll have to play our best game and still get some breaks. The Aggies have found out how to beat us."

That occurred last year when A&M won the conference championship with a 10-7 win over Texas. But the 1968 Aggies are 3-6 to Texas' 7-1-1.

"Texas has fine athletes and they look unstoppable now," says A-M Gene Stallings. "We can't throw any interceptions or give the ball to them very often, and stay in the park."

Quarterback Edd Hargett doesn't have many picked off—only nine in nine games, fewest among the nation's top 16 passers. Hargett is 10th in passing with 2,100 yards and 14 touchdowns and eighth in total offense with 2,177 yards.

The Longhorns are fourth in total offense and second in rushing and Chris Gilbert has rambled for 1,047 yards and 12 TDs.

# Bob Hope May Buy Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Comedian Bob Hope, who has made millions out of laughing matters, may buy the Washington Senators.

The world-famous humorist surfaced Wednesday as a major rival of Democratic Party national treasurer Robert E. Short for purchase of the last-place American League club.

Hope's ninth-inning emergence pierced plans by club officials to complete the sale in time for the new owners to sit in on the start of baseball's annual winter meetings next week.

All discussions were called off over Thanksgiving weekend, and a member of the board of directors said talks would be resumed Monday.

Short is former owner of the Los Angeles Lakers in the Na-

tional Basketball Association. Hope is a director of the Cleveland Indians and would have shed his stock in that club if he buys the Senators.

Short said negotiations have ended, and the Senators officials are considering which of the two or possibly three offers to accept.

The price for the Senators is reported to range around \$9 million. Washington investment broker James H. Lemon, the board chairman, put the club up for sale at the end of the past season.

Hope has been represented in the purchase talks by an intermediary in Cincinnati. The comedian had expressed some interest previously in the club, but apparently no firm offer was forthcoming until the last chance at bat.

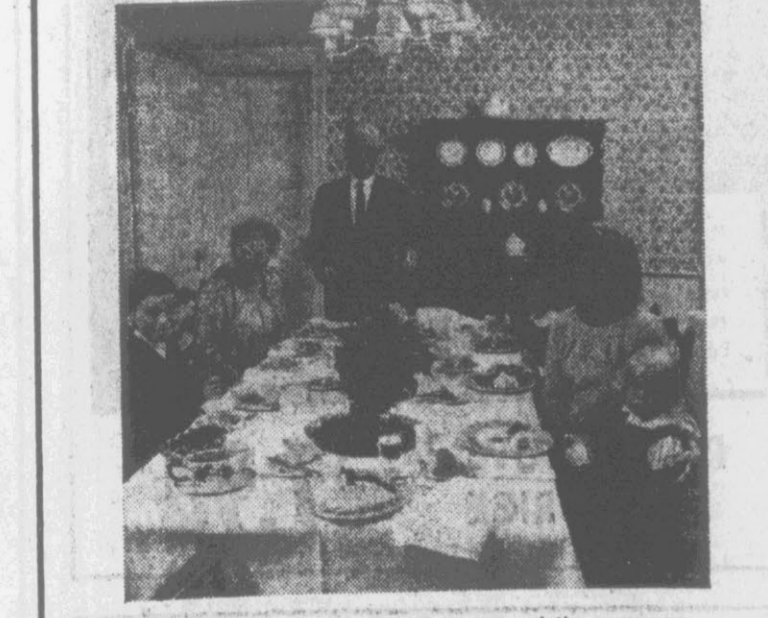

# McLain's Raise Is Short Of His Hopes

DETROIT (AP) — An almost 200 per cent raise isn't hard for any ball player to take, even if it falls short of expectations.

That is what Detroit Tiger pitching ace Denny McLain reportedly got as he and five other players became the first of the world champion Tigers to come to contract terms. General Manager Jim Campbell made the announcement Wednesday.

McLain became the winningest pitcher in Tiger history this year when he won 31 of 37 games. He reportedly signed for a salary of around \$85,000 compared with the \$30,000 he was estimated to have received last year, but short of the \$100,000 he spoke of demanding.

Campbell wouldn't say how much McLain's new salary is, and Denny wasn't available for comment. But sources close to the 24-year-old Cy Young Award winner and American League Most Valuable Player estimate his 1969 contract at \$85,000.

"Use any figure you want"

for McLain's salary, Campbell said. "I won't say whether it's high or low, I'm sorry."

"I feel their contracts are their own personal information," he said. "I feel very strong about this and I won't give out contract information on any player."

The other players coming to terms were second baseman Dick McAuliffe, center fielder Mickey Stanley and rookie pitchers Norm McRae, Mike Kilkenny and Mike Small.

McAuliffe, 29, and Stanley, 26, were key factors in Detroit's drive to its first pennant and World Series championship since 1955.

McAuliffe, who was the team's sparkplug, batted .249 while Stanley came on strong in his first full season as a regular and batted .59.

It's not certain what their salaries are but one source says McAuliffe's is probably in the neighborhood of \$30,000 while Stanley's is around \$23,000.

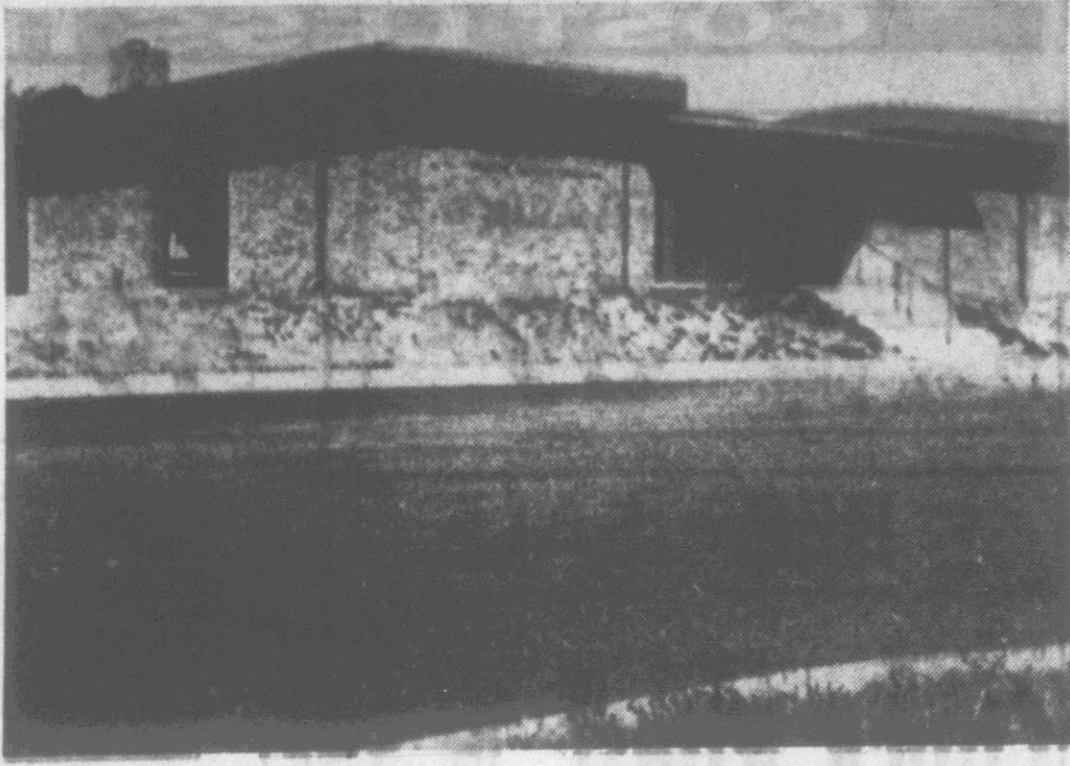
## LIGHT OF HISTORY

**RALEIGH (AP)**—Dedication of the visitor center-museum at the President James K. Polk birthplace at Pineville, near Charlotte, will be a feature of the annual session of the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association at Charlotte Dec. 6. This annual session in turn will be a part of the year-long celebration of the bicentennial of the city of Charlotte.

The Polk Birthplace State Historic Site was dedicated when Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson came to Charlotte last May 20. But the visitor center-museum was not complete at that time.

Constructed and furnished at a cost of \$75,000, the museum tells the life story of Polk, eleventh President of the United States. Featured are his family—pictures of the various members, the homes he lived in—birthplace; home in Tennessee, Old East, where he roomed at the University of North Carolina; and the White House; and the chief events of his administration—war with Mexico, acquisition of California, and others.

Also: The dress worn by men and women of that day and two

cases of memorabilia, including letters of Polk and his associ-

ates and the cape of Santa Anna, Mexican leader.

A 20-minute movie shows the principal events of the life of Polk.

At the dedication ceremonies a concert will be given by the South Mecklenburg High School Band, directed by Ray Neel, and the principal address will be delivered by Dr. Hugh T. Lefler, Kenan professor of history at UNC-CH.

Polk was born in the house now restored, Nov. 2, 1795. His family moved to Tennessee when he was eleven years old. But he returned to the University of North Carolina where he graduated with high honors in 1818.

He served in the Tennessee House of Representatives and seven terms in Congress, where he was speaker of the House. Later he became Democratic governor of Tennessee.

In 1844 as the first "dark horse" he was elected President. As he stated, he had four great purposes: "One, a reduction of the tariff; another the independent treasury; a third, the settlement of the Oregon Boundary question; and lastly, the acquisition of California." He accomplished all of these, and thus may be said to have had one of the most successful

terms of all our Presidents. While Polk was President the Mexican War was fought. At the end more than 800,000 square miles of territory were acquired—largest of all U.S. acquisitions except the Louisiana Purchase.

# Rhinoceros Named Gus Is Mooning For A Mate

In his specifications, weight poses no problem. In fact, a 7,000-pound female would fit the bill ideally.

"He's lonely," says Dan Brennan, zoological manager of the 8,400-acre Lion Country Safari. "We called in veterinarians to check Gus for any organic ailments, but they found none. Their diagnosis — Gus needs a girl friend."

"Gus has been pawing at the ground and I think every red-blooded male knows what that means."

Gus, the lone rhino among hundreds of African animals roaming the preserve, is valuable property. With his enormous horn and doleful eyes, he has become the darling of

photographers. He comes from a family of vegetarians, and perhaps deserves the royal treatment accorded him. After all, his is the only surviving species of countless animals that lived on the earth in prehistoric times.

**White Rhino**  
Gus is a square-lipped or more commonly called white rhino. This type of rhino was almost exterminated by hunters in Africa who received exorbitant prices for the horns from Arab traders. The traders in turn sold the horns to Orientals who thought they had aphrodisiac qualities.

Rhinos are now protected in game reserves in South Africa, Angola and southern Sudan.

## Food And Medical Project Growing

A special program "Emergency Food and Medical Services" is fast becoming a community project, according to W. T. Gartman, director of the Pitt County Welfare Department.

"The classes are designed to help citizens better understand the many uses of surplus foods," explained Gartman. "There are 20 different foods

available many ways to fix good, healthy meals."

The Pitt County Agricultural Service's Home Economics division will coordinate the classes. Home Economics teachers in Farmville, Bethel, Grimesland, Winterville, Ayden, Belvoir, and Greenville have volunteered their time to help teach the classes, noted Gartman.

The schedule of classes is as follows: Farmville, H.B. Sugg High School; Bethel, Bethel High School; Grimesland, G.R. Whitfield; Winterville, Robinson Union School; Ayden, South Ayden School; Greenville, Eppes High and the Meadowbrook Housing Recreation Center; Belvoir, Belvoir Elementary School.

The classes will be held each night from 6:30 to 8:30.

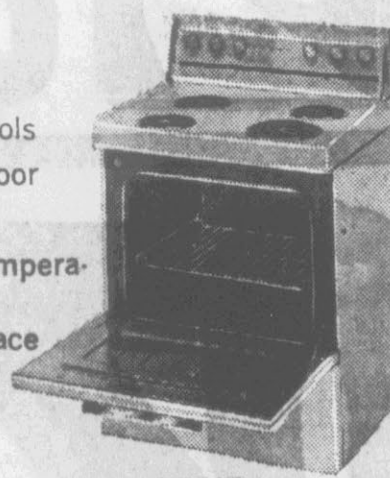

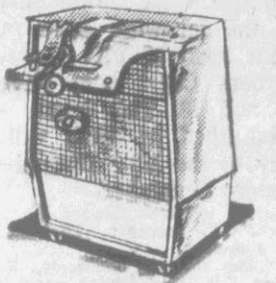

# Arrested By Hoover, Freedom In January

WASHINGTON (AP) — Alvin Karpis, the first criminal arrested by J. Edgar Hoover, will be released from prison in January after serving 32 years of a life term for a kidnapping conspiracy.

Karpis, 60, and raked by arthritis, was a member of the infamous Barker-Karpis gang that was accused of at least 10 slayings between 1931 and 1936. He won parole on his 17th try after first becoming eligible in 1961.

A Justice Department official said Karpis would be deported to his native Canada where a job is waiting for him.

Karpis was captured by Hoover in New Orleans in 1936, three years after the kidnapping of wealthy Minneapolis beer magnate William Hamm Jr. Hamm was released unharmed after payment of \$100,000 in ransom money.

Sentenced to life imprisonment he went to Leavenworth, Kan., penitentiary but spent most of his years in Alcatraz. Karpis was transferred from Alcatraz in 1962 shortly before the old penitentiary was closed down and has spent the past six years in the McNeil Island, Wash. prison.

The parole board said its decision to release Karpis was based on the number of years he has spent in prison, his age, his failing health and his excellent record in custody.

## Police Hunting For Cleaver

The board also said it does not now consider him a "threat to public safety."

The Canadian government said a welfare agency has guaranteed him a home and a job when he arrives Jan. 14. Karpis was born Alvin Karpavicz in Montreal and immigrated to the United States with his parents in 1915.

He is now considered part of the legend which is built up around Hoover, who at 73 is approaching the end of his long career with the FBI.

Dubbed "public enemy No. 1" after the Hamm kidnapping, Karpis was publicly chided by Hoover—the FBI chief called him a "rat—to the extent that the notorious hoodlum sent personal word that he intended to kill the FBI chief.

Hoover, in turn, vowed to be in on Karpis' capture.

He missed him in Hot Springs, Ark., in March, 1936, but caught up with him in New Orleans the following month.

Hoover grabbed his man as Karpis was reaching for a rifle on the rear seat of an auto. Even so, Karpis got something of a last laugh.

When Hoover ordered agents to "put the handcuffs on him," Karpis got a chuckle when his apologetic G-man told his chief he'd forgotten to bring any.

## Police Hunting For Cleaver

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Officials say they believe Eldridge Cleaver may have fled the country to avoid returning to prison despite his statements that he would not.

An all-points arrest bulletin was issued Wednesday for the 33-year-old Black Panther information minister after he failed to surrender as a parole violator and return to prison.

Cleaver was to report at 9 a.m. Wednesday to his parole officer at the State Building in downtown San Francisco. His wife Kathleen and his attorney, Charles R. Garry, appeared and stated they didn't know where Cleaver was.

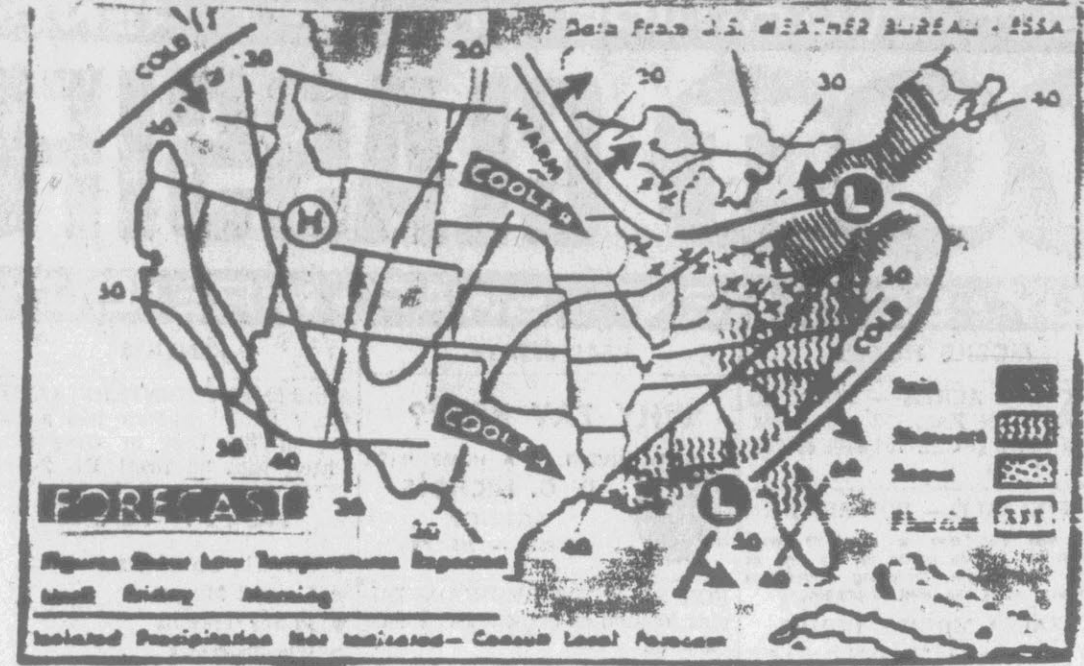
In his last contact with the press, Saturday in San Francisco, Cleaver told a reporter he would "rather be shot down in the street than go back" to prison because he was afraid he never would be freed again.

"I could leave the country but the people who are after me don't deserve that and it sets a bad example," he added.

However, the California Department of Corrections said it received word that Cleaver might have received underground aid to flee the country.

Cleaver was convicted in Los Angeles in 1958 of assault with intent to kill and assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to 13 years in prison. He was paroled in 1966.

The parole was revoked after Cleaver was charged with assault to commit murder and assault with a deadly weapon after a shooting incident with Oakland police last April in which the Black Panther treasurer, Bobby Hutton, 17, was killed.
