


SPRING FOOTBALL NOTES

There have been several position changes during the spring. Included among them are: Kenneth Crawford from DT to C, Mark McConnell from TE to OG and Cedric Howard from WR to SAF. David Daniels has also seen playing time at both fullback and tailback. He will probably play both in the fall as well.

U SPRING FOOTBALL GUICK FACTS

Several players missed spring practice with injuries. Included among them are: DT Reeves Spainhour (shoulder), TE Carlester Crumper (shoulder) did not participate in any contact, DB Travis Render (back), WR Dion Johnson (foot) missed most of spring drills, FB Michael Rhett (shoulder) missed most of spring drills, DE Joe Bright (knee), C Daryl Taylor, C Dean Taylor (wrist) and OT Stephen Brown (ankle).

With Michael Rhett out for the most of spring, David Daniels was a busy man. The junior from Greenville, played both fullback and tailback during the spring. Depending on Rhett's health is where Daniels will play in the fall. In five scrimmages during the spring, Daniels rushed for 319 yards on 76 carries, a 4.2 average.

In pre-spring testing, wide receiver Terry Bennett ran the fastest 40-yard dash time with a run of 4.55 seconds. WR Dion Johnson was second at 4.58, WR Charlie Tyson third at 4.59 and DB Ernest Tynes fourth at 4.62. Greg Gardill was the fastest lineman at 5.00 and Robert Jones the quickest linebacker at 4.69.

Walk-on defensive back Robert Tate had the best vertical jump at 38 inches while linebacker Robert Jones was second at 37 inches. Jones also had the best standing long jump at 10-10 with Tynes second at 10-9.

In the lifting categories, Jones again was tops in the squat with 650 pounds while David Daniels was tops in the bench press at 485 pounds. DE Marc Washington was second in the bench with 465 while Jones was third at 460. FB Michael Rhett had the best power clean at 310 pounds.

In the five scrimmages during spring, Jeff Blake came out as ECU's starting quarterback. The junior from Sanford, Fla. completed 62 of 128 passes for 704 yards and five touchdowns. In the spring game, Blake completed 10 of 26 passes for 137 yards and two interceptions.

Backup quarterbacks Sean McConnell and Chad Grier also had fine outings this spring. McConnell completed 29 of 69 passes for 350 yards while Grier completed 33 of 61 passes for 340 yards.

McConnell is a transfer from Cerritos (CA) Junior College and saw his first action this spring. Grier is a transfer from Richmond who played a backup role last year at quarterback for the Pirates.

In the annual spring game, the Purple squad defeated the Gold, 10-0, before 10,000 fans at Ficklen Stadium. It was the largest crowd ever to see a spring game at ECU.

The only points in the contest were scored on an 18-yard halfback option pass from Erik Booker to Charlie Tyson and a 38-yard field goal by Phillip Brenner.

The defense stood out in the contest as they did during the spring season. During the spring scrimmages, the Pirate offense averaged just 3.6 yards per attempt. That included a rushing average of just 2.6 yards per carry.

Outstanding defenders during spring included tackle Ernie Logan (9 TFL -50), Ken Burnette (2 FR, 2 INT), Greg Gardill (6 TFL-19), George Koonce (5 Sacks-36) and Jerry Dillon (2 TFL -17, 2 INT).

In the special teams department, rising senior Robb Imperato knocked through 10 of 14 field goals, including a long of 47 yards. Phillip Brenner, a rising sophomore, added three of six. Punter John Jett averaged 40.9 yards per punt on 22 attempts including a 60-yarder.

BILL LEWIS HEAD FOOTBALL COACH EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

Give Bill Lewis an hour of your time, and you'll be convinced that the East Carolina University football program can become as successful as any in the nation.

And, if the 1989 season was any indication, Lewis has the Pirates on their way to that level. ECU finished the year with a 5-5-1 record, marking the first non-losing season for the Pirates since 1983.

THE SPORTING NEWS also knows about Lewis and the East Carolina program. In a recent edition of TSN, the newspaper has the Pirate program rated among the Top 20 of the 1990s.

When the 48-year-old coaching veteran was named ECU's 16th head coach on Dec. 3, 1988, Lewis immediately became the Pirates' most zealous supporter.

"I am a very positive person," said Lewis at his first press conference. "I want to point myself and the program in that direction. We will not take a back seat to anyone in this country with the way we are going to approach this football team and this football program."

Lewis spent nine seasons at the University of Georgia as a defensive backfield coach before coming to Greenville. During the last years, Lewis was also defensive coordinator. In that time, Lewis coached 23 All-Southeastern Conference selections and seven All-Americas.

Before arriving at Georgia, Lewis was the head coach at the University of Wyoming. In three years at the Laramie school, Lewis led the Cowboys to a 13-21-1 mark.

A 28-year coaching veteran, Lewis has also been an assistant coach at Arkansas, Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, Pittsburgh and East Stroudsburg State, his alma mater.

Lewis graduated from East Stroudsburg in 1963, earning a B.S. degree in Health and Physical Education. While attending school there, he was a Little All-America selection at quarterback and a team captain of the football and baseball teams, while lettering four years.

He left college to play in the Detroit Tigers minor league organization for two years as a pitcher before returning to his alma mater to work on his graduate degree and work as a part-time football coach. While in baseball, Lewis reached the AA level and played with much of what became the Tigers' 1968 World Series championship team.

Lewis and his wife, Sandy, are the parents of three children, Mark, Gregg and Geoff.

PIRATE ASSISTANT COACHES

MIKE CASSITY DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/SECONDARY

Mike Cassity, 36, was named defensive coordinator for the East Carolina football staff on March 1.

Cassity served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Northeast Louisiana last season.

Cassity, a 1975 graduate of Kentucky, has also served as an assistant at Western Kentucky from 1983-88, serving on the same staff as current ECU assistant Steve Shankweiler. While at WKU, he served as defensive coordinator, and coached the linebackers and secondary.

He has also been an assistant at Morehead State (1982) and Kentucky (1979-81), working mainly with defensive backs and special teams.

Cassity began his formal coaching career at Tilghman High School in Paducah, Ky. in 1976 as a football assistant and head wrestling coach.

CARY GODETTE DEFENSIVE LINE

Cary Godette, 35, was named defensive line coach for the East Carolina football staff on Jan. 19.

Godette returns to ECU where he earned All-America honors at defensive end in 1976 and graduated with a degree in physical education in 1977. He also served as an assistant coach on Pat Dye's staff at ECU from 1977-79.

Godette left ECU in 1980 to coach under Dye at Wyoming. The New Bern native, was there for three years working with the linebackers. He also served as an assistant at Cincinnati from 1983-88 coaching outside linebackers, tight ends and the defensive line.

For the last year, he was an assistant at Terry Sanford High School in Fayetteville, working with the defense.

DAVE HUXTABLE INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Dave Huxtable, 33, was named inside linebacker coach for the East Carolina football staff on March 8.

Huxtable had served for the past five years as an assistant coach at Western Kentucky University.

The 1978 graduate of Eastern Illinois University, also coached the defensive line for two seasons, outside linebackers for one season and offensive line for one season at Western Kentucky.

He has also served as an assistant coach at Northern Illinois University, working as a volunteer coach, Independence Community College, one year as defensive coordinator, Iowa State University, coaching two years as a part-time coach with the inside linebackers and East Aurora High School in Chicago, Ill., working three years as the defensive coordinator.

JEFF JAGODZINSKI TIGHT ENDS

Jeff Jagodzinski, 26, enters his second season on the ECU football staff, serving as tight ends coach.

The youngest assistant coach on the ECU staff came to Greenville from Louisiana State, where he served as a graduate assistant coach for two years, working mainly with the offensive line.

The Milwaukee, Wisc. native, served as a graduate assistant at Northern Illinois for one year, working with the offensive line. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Wisconsin-Whitewater, coaching the runningbacks.

While playing at Wisconsin-Whitewater, "Jags" was a 1983 Wisconsin State University honorable mention All-Conference selection at runningback.

STEVE LOGAN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS

Steve Logan, 37, begins his second year on the East Carolina coaching staff, and his first as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach, after working with the runningbacks last season.

Before coming to ECU, Logan served as quarterbacks coach at Mississippi State for two years.

Logan has been a coach at the collegiate level for 11 seasons. As a major college assistant, he has seen his teams participate in two post-season bowls. While at Colorado, the Buffalos participated in the 1985 Freedom Bowl and the 1986 Bluebonnet Bowl. While at Hutchinson Junior College, he was the Jayhawk Conference Coach of the Year in 1982.

Logan's coaching career started in 1975 as an assistant at Union High School in Tulsa. He began in the collegiate coaching ranks in 1980 at Oklahoma State and moved to Hutchinson J.C. the following year and, in 1983, he became offensive coordinator at Tulsa.

Logan and his wife, Laura, have two sons - Vincent and Nathanael.

GREG NORD RUNNINGBACKS

Greg Nord, 33, was named runningbacks coach for the East Carolina football staff on February 26.

Nord had served 11 years as an assistant on the Kentucky staff, the last eight as runningbacks coach under Jerry Claiborne.

Nord, a 1980 graduate of Kentucky, has coached five of UK's top 12 all-time rushers. The list includes Mark Higgs, currently with the Philadelphia Eagles, George Adams (New York Giants), Marc Logan (Miami Dolphins), Ivy Joe Hunter (Indianapolis Colts) and Alfred Rawls, who last year finished fifth in the SEC in rushing with 893 yards on 185 carries.

The Louisville, Ky. native, lettered three years at Kentucky (1975, 77-78), playing center his first two seasons and tight end his junior and senior campaigns.

Nord and his wife, Donna, are the parents of two daughters - Amy and Angie.

STEVE SHANKWEILER OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/OFFENSIVE LINE

Steve Shankweiler, 37, begins his third year on the East Carolina football staff as offensive line coach, and his first year as an offensive coordinator.

Before coming to East Carolina, Shankweiler was an assistant coach on the Western Kentucky staff, where he coached the offensive line and was the offensive coordinator for the last two years.

Shankweiler coached at The Citadel from 1980-83, working with the defensive line, offensive line, kickers and also serving as an administrative assistant.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Shankweiler coached in the Georgia high school ranks for five years, leading Redan High to the AAA state championship in 1979.

EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

The school that was to become East Carolina University opened its doors to students for the first time in 1909. It was a newly-founded state normal school to train teachers.

Eighty years is a relatively short time among the hallowed institutions of higher learning to develop a heritage of academic richness and tradition, for ivy to cover the stone and old brick walls and walkways of the campus.

Its heritage is that of a small normal school, then a teachers college, still known with affection and nostalgia at E-C-T-C, East Carolina Teachers College, and later as a liberal arts college, ECC. It took 22 years after the close of World War II for the college to reach the stage of development and organization, size and diversity, to become a university.

It became East Carolina University by an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina in 1967 and four years later was made a constituent institution of the 16-campus University of North Carolina system.

Today East Carolina University is a vibrant, pulsing comprehensive university that already possesses tradition and is on the way to becoming a truly distinctive institution of higher learning.

ECU offers strong undergraduate degree programs in more than 100 tracks of study and graduate programs leading to master's degrees in nearly 90 fields in the liberal arts and sciences, and in nine of its 10 professional schools - Allied Health Sciences, Art, Business, Education, Home Economics, Music, Nursing, Social Work and Industry and Technology. It offers research-grounded PhD programs in basic medical sciences and ECU's School of Medicine, the state's newest, has graduated more than 450 doctors of medicine (MDs) in just 10 years.

ECU has built a tradition of striving for excellence - and attaining it in many areas - of determination, of fierce pride and loyalty and of a mission of service related to its role of providing quality educational opportunity. It is a tradition that already sets East Carolina University apart.

ECU has, semester after semester, enrolled the third largest number of students of any college or university in the state of North Carolina, with enrollment of 1989-90 of 16,000 students.

Private support plays an important part in making the ECU ivy grow. In 1987-88, the level of private financial support of ECU's academics, medical education and research and athletics ranked second in the nation among more than 150 public comprehensive universities, totaling \$5.9 million.

This private support provides dollars for a margin of excellence in ECU's programs of teaching, research and public service. Together with substantial state appropriations making up an annual operating budget of \$170 million, funds enrich the instructional offerings and provide facilities, laboratories and scholarships.
