# Nixon's Pledge To NATO No Cutting U.S. Forces In Europe Unless Soviet Acts

ROBERSONVILLE — "Hi, Foks, this is Billy..." were the first gratifying words heard by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Robinson when NBC called them this morning and let them listen to a Christmas message from their prisoner of war son, Billy, monitored on Hanoi radio.

The message continued, "...speaking to you on the occasion of Christmas, 1970. I hope you are all well and in good health and full of Christmas joy. I am well and doing okay."

"It is disappointing that we have been separated so long, especially now during Christmas when being with your loved ones means so much. We must always remain understanding and patient. Now we have only memories and a lot of dreams for the future, which I hope will turn into reality soon. Remember, you are all constantly in my thoughts and in my prayers."

"On Christmas Day when all our friends drop by, extend my

best wishes for Christmas and the New Year. Have a sip for me.

"We are allowed to have a five-kilogram (11 pound) Christmas package. Send it as soon as possible. Send a one-pound fruitcake, a variety of pipe tobacco, lots of coffee, and things sweet and concentrated. Your packages have been outstanding. Thank you much. Keep up the good work."

"Merry Christmas and a bright and cheerful new year to all. May God add His richest blessings to your life."

"My love to all, Billy"

The tape reportedly was made December 2 at 1 p.m. their time (December 2 at 1 a.m. our time). "This is the best thing that has happened since we first received a letter from Billy saying he was a prisoner after he had been missing in action," his mother said. "It is especially wonderful now because we have been extremely worried about his safety since the raid."

"We don't know yet whether any of the other families of North Vietnamese prisoners have had similar messages. We hope they have or that more will be coming."

"We are grateful to NBC for letting us hear the tape itself. It was definitely Billy's voice and he spoke very clearly, though a little fast. Randolph Air Force Base in Texas also called us to verify that the tape had been monitored somewhere in the Orient off of Hanoi Radio."

## Many Paraded At Williamston

WILLIAMSTON — The 1970 Christmas parade for Williamston held yesterday afternoon once more measured

up to the standard of a colorful spectacle which has become a trademark of the annual affair. Under sunny skies on a warm autumn-like day, thousands of people, from infants in carriages to oldsters supported by canes, lined the streets as 35 separate groups marched by.

Four high school bands, those of Robersonville, Bertie County, Plymouth and Williamston, provided Christmas music. The young band members, colorfully dressed and precisely drilled, twice marched the length of Main Street.

Horses, Scouts, fire trucks, antique cars, commercial and religious floats, beauty queens, young people dressed in papiermache masks and costumes — and of course Santa, were all part of the long procession which required more than an hour to finish the route of March.

For the third consecutive year, the event in Williamston was timed to end on a perfect note — just as the sun set on a clear, warm winter day.

## Oil Slick By Navy?

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A massive oil slick blamed on the U.S. Navy threatened 50 miles of north Florida beaches today.

State officials have accused the Navy of pouring more than 500,000 gallons of the thick, black fuel into Atlantic coastal waters.

Florida Marine Patrol and weather observers said if the winds held steady from the southeast, the oil could begin coming ashore late today.

The U.S. Navy admitted dumping two bargeloads of waste liquid into the Atlantic Monday night. A spokesman said such dumpings are made on a regular basis about eight times a year and usually consist of 90 per cent water.

However, Mike Wenzel, a Jacksonville waste oil dealer who had tried to sell the oil, said his tests last week of two barge loads of waste Navy No. 5 special fuel oil at Mayport Naval Station showed an exactly opposite ratio.

## 247 Pints Of Blood Donated To Bloodmobile

"I'm really amazed," Douglas Morgan, chairman of Pitt County Bloodmobile said about yesterday's wholehearted response to a final call for blood donations in 1970. The long lines of volunteers resulted in a collection of 247 units, a whopping 107 units above the 140 unit quota set for the one day drive.

"This is the most successful day ever since I've been chairman," Morgan continued. He attributes the generous response to a number of reasons. "Above all, of course, the people who came and gave are the ones who made this achievement possible."

Morgan mentioned that "one man who has a family member in a hospital receiving blood went out and rounded up 39 donors to give in the name of the hospitalized person." Another factor he cited was 37 donors coming in as the result of letters sent by Pitt Memorial Hospital from attending physicians of people who have recently received blood.

"One of the most encouraging things," Morgan remarked, "is the large number of first time donors we had yesterday. I feel Leon Smith, chairman of the Moose Lodge campaign for the Bloodmobile, and his workers had much to do with getting in many of these first time donors."

Because of the almost unprecedented response, hours of collection were continued on until 7:00 p.m. in order to handle all volunteers. Four additional

nurses from Pitt Memorial's Pathology Department, and two nurses from the nursing staff had to be called in to take care of the large number of donors.

In addition to the 247 donors accepted, approximately 50 prospective donors were rejected due to colds and other minor illnesses. "That means well over 300 concerned people showed up yesterday," Morgan commented.

By virtue of the big turn out of volunteers yesterday, the gap has almost been closed between the previous shortage and the quota established for the county at this time of year in the annual campaign.

Morgan pointed out that an indication of the pressing need for blood was the fact that a truck was waiting to take the blood to Norfolk. Norfolk is the blood headquarters for northeastern North Carolina. Blood needed for Pitt County and other counties in this area of the State is supplied from the storage facility in Norfolk.

## Veterans Hostile

WASHINGTON (AP) — A medical researcher said in Senate testimony today that interviews with 60 ex-Marines convinced him they were more hostile toward the South Vietnamese army and their own officers than toward the Viet Cong.

Dr. Charles J. Levy, a research associate at Harvard Medical School, quoted a former Marine as telling how one man killed an Army officer with a truck, and another put a booby trap in his commanding officer's tent.

"They talked in terms of the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese army not being the primary focus of their hostility," Levy said in testimony prepared for the Senate Veterans Affairs Subcommittee.

Levy said the Marines expressed hostility toward two central targets: the South Vietnamese army, and American non-commissioned and commissioned officers.

Last year U.S. officials gave American strength in NATO as 310,000 men. The current figure is 285,000. But American officials say they will not be tied down to specific manpower figures, only to a promise not to reduce fighting readiness.

Rogers asked the ministers of the other 14 nations to reaffirm their interest in mutual, balanced force reductions with the Soviets and their allies. The East should be urged, he said, to start exploratory talks next year.

The Soviet Bloc has proposed that talks about reductions of foreign troops take place at a general conference on European security. Rogers said exploratory talks might well come before a meeting.

He said it would be useful for NATO to make internal studies of just what it would like to achieve at such a conference, especially on matters not related to security. The Soviets say they want to talk about better economic relations, while the West is interested in more human contacts of all kinds.

Rogers and his colleagues began their semiannual review of problems and plans amid indications that they won't agree to the European security conference until the Communists ease their restrictions on West Berlin.

President Nixon, letting it be known he was outraged by the episode, is studying official reports of the forcible removal of a Lithuanian sailor from a U.S. Coast Guard cutter.

The Department of State and Transportation handed in the reports Wednesday evening. They had been ordered by Nixon Monday. The Coast Guard comes under Transportation Department control.

"The preliminary reports indicate that the procedures followed were inadequate and the action taken was inadequate," Ziegler said. President Nixon, he said, will take appropriate action.

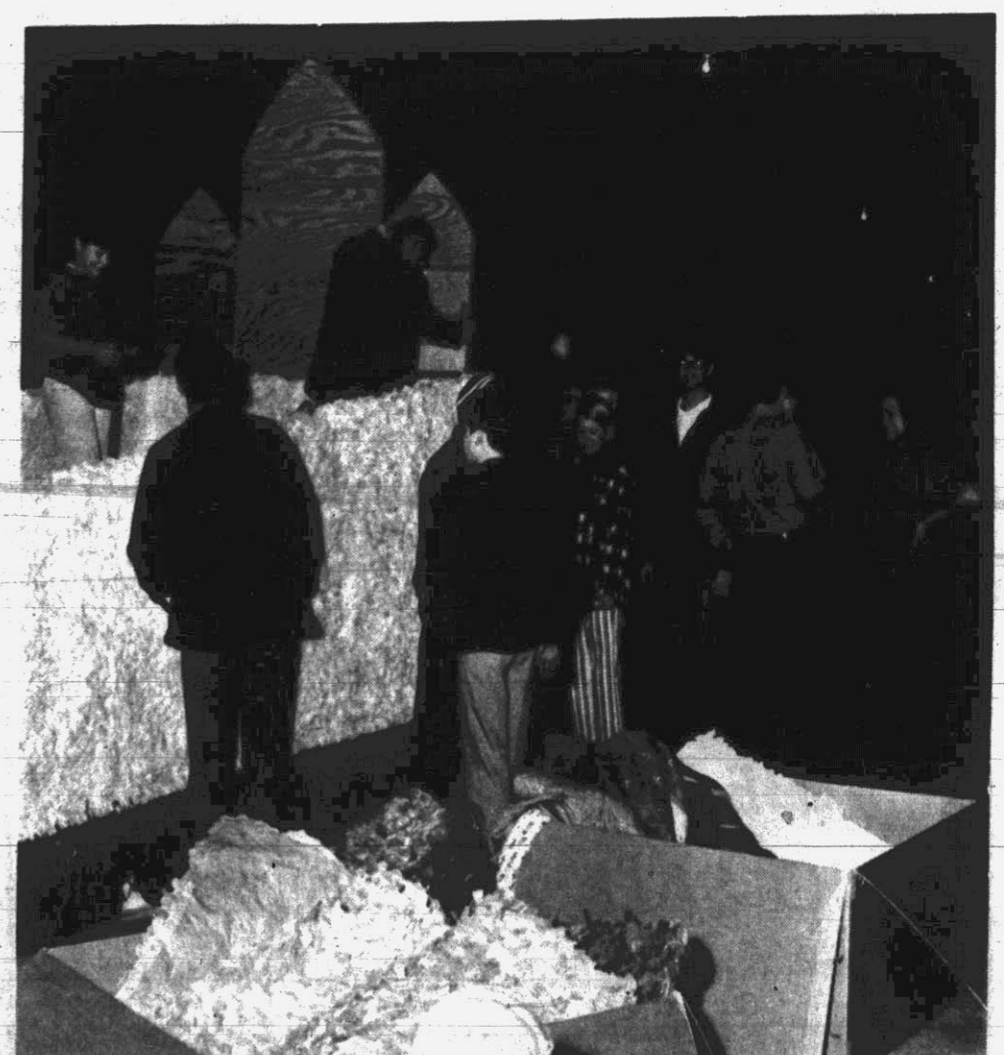

**ELEANOR'S TONGUE AND MUSHROOM DISH**

- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1-3rd cup flour
- 2 chicken bouillon cubes dissolved in 2 cups boiling water
- 1 tablespoon finely grated onion
- 1½ tablespoons anchovy paste
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 pounds cooked smoked tongue, thinly sliced
- ¾ pound mushrooms, thinly sliced

In a medium saucepan over low heat melt butter; stir in flour; remove from heat. Gradually stir in bouillon, keeping smooth. Add onion, anchovy paste and lemon juice; cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until sauce thickens and boils.

Arrange sliced tongue and mushrooms in alternate layers in an oblong glass 1½-quart baking dish (10 by 6 by 1¾ inches) and cover with sauce. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven about 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

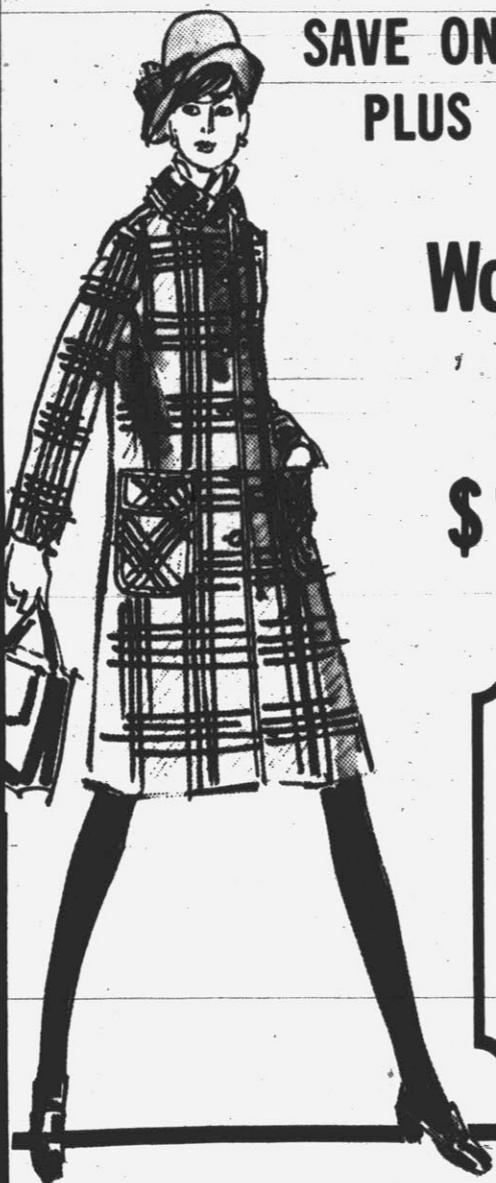

## Deciding The 1972 Policies

RALEIGH — Decisions affecting the '72 style of Tar Heel politics will be on the agenda for the State Democratic Executive Committee here Thursday. Item one: will the delegation to the National Democratic Convention reasonably reflect the registered voters of the party as to sex, age and ethnic background? Item two: should there be a presidential preferential primary for North Carolinians to express their

presidential primary and a National Convention delegation strongly flavored by women, young people and blacks could make for a lively season for Tar Heel Democrats in the '72 presidential year. For example, it could mean North Carolina votes at the Convention for a candidate of more liberal persuasion than has been favored by the state's party leaders in the past. Without question, it will mean a '72 State Convention even more dramatic than the '70 version.

Of course, the State Democratic Executive Committee can only give its endorsement to the presidential primary idea. Actual implementation is up to the General Assembly.

While he has expressed a personal preference for the primary, Governor Scott has indicated he is willing to leave it to the legislature. In short, it won't be a top priority, arm-twisting issue as far as the Governor's office is concerned.

GOP leadership already has urged legislation to make possible a preferential primary, so any move in the General Assembly likely would have bi-partisan support.

The study group recommended that results of a primary be binding upon the delegation to the National Convention at least through the first roll call vote, and that votes for candidates be apportioned on the basis of votes received in the primary.

**Facing Realities**  
The new method for selection of National Convention delegates takes into account the realities of the situation: a delegation which does not adequately represent women, young people, and blacks will have trouble getting seated.

Congressional District conventions would elect 75 per cent of the delegation. The remaining 25 per cent would be elected at the State Convention. Nominations would be submitted by a Delegate Nominating Committee. Each Congressional District Convention would elect one person to serve on the committee. Members so chosen would elect six more members, with a view to the balance of age, sex and ethnic background.

The State Chairman would chair the committee without the privilege of voting. Its slate would be made public in advance of action by the State Convention.

In the past, the Governor has submitted nominations for 30 to 40 per cent of the delegation. While the proposed method of selection would take this authority out of his hands, he undoubtedly would continue as a practical matter to have a deciding word in the selection.

the firing of Secretary Hickel. On the other hand there were those who nodded approval at the departure of the cabinet member, who more than any other, has seemed to be out of step with the President.

It is evident that after two years in office President Nixon has finally reached the decision to surround himself with key officials who at least will not take public issue with his decisions even if they offer opposing views before final decisions are reached. It is a step which should strengthen the administration and perhaps the influence of the executive department both in government and in the nation as a whole.

If there has been a weakness in the Nixon administration — and there obviously have been a number — one key weakness has been the lack of unity of leadership at the top administrative level. In his first two years in office President Nixon has not seemed to be able to get all his key advisers and officials pulling in the same direction. The result has been conflicts at top administrative levels on important policy matters, and confusion on down the line over what the President wanted done and how it should be accomplished.

What is happening now in the Nixon administration is not unique. It happens in most administrations after a year or two. And usually the result is a stronger and more effective leadership for the country as a whole.

We trust the same will be true with the Nixon administration in the two years ahead.

## Something Everyone Can Do, Write Letter

Something that every American can do, regardless of his feelings on the Vietnam war, is write a letter to North Vietnam requesting the return of the U.S. prisoners they hold.

Those who have most strongly opposed the war, as well as those who have supported it, can unite in this common cause.

The men now being held in North Vietnam were carrying out their duties as military men. Some have been held since the beginning of the United States' involvement in the war. They should suffer no more. U.S. and world opinion should determine that they be returned to their homes and loved ones.

## Jenkins Run? About 50-50

GREENVILLE — Chances are about 50-50 that East Carolina University President Leo Jenkins will run for Governor of North Carolina in 1972—and when he talks about the possibilities of such a race, his Marine-toughened countenance breaks into a slight smile and he says: "I like to win."

The ECU President loves politics, is unafraid of the pushing and shoving that goes on in political battles, and says it isn't unusual for a man in his position to be politically motivated. "I tell our students and the members of our faculty to get involved in politics," Dr. Jenkins says. "This is their land, their country, and politics is their business. If I believe this to be true, and I do, then I'd look rather silly if I said that just because I'm a University president, I think politics is beneath my dignity."

Dr. Jenkins is sending up trial balloons to get a reading of any chances he might have in the Governor's race. Like a half dozen other politicians in the State, polls have been taken to test his strength with the people. It won't shock you to learn that one poll circulating North Carolina shows Leo Jenkins to be a very strong name in the East. Some observers believe that Dr. Jenkins is making noises about the Governor's race to strengthen his hand in

the 1971 Legislature, where he plans to win a medical school for East Carolina. There might be a touch of truth to that, but it isn't the whole story. Jenkins, honest-to-goodness, Aunt Virginia, is seriously thinking of running for Governor.

He went to Charlotte for the Davidson-East Carolina football game, arriving there last Thursday. On Friday he held a series of news conferences and spent some time on the telephone talking with friends. Right now, Dr. Jenkins is concerned about money, because it's figured that it will take \$1 million or more to run for Governor in 1972.

"I'm going to address myself to that situation as times goes on," Dr. Jenkins says. "North Carolina should be a pioneer State, to take a stand and say we want no part of a kingmaker. Like it or not, as things are going now, a man must be a millionaire or have access to a million or more dollars before he can hold high office. That's a sad situation and it takes us far away from Jeffersonian Democracy. I have not asked anyone for any money and don't intend to. I plan to present my credentials, to say this is how I've paid my dues, and let the people decide."

Leo Jenkins is 57 years old but looks 10 years younger. He's a Marine Major and in World War II he fought at

## The Idea Of Excellence

It is part of the natural perversity of man, like the natural perversity of the cow, that causes a Washington-based correspondent to write very little of Washington itself. Honeysuckle always looks more interesting somewhere else. Thus most of us have passed over the latest chapter in the sad story of the District of Columbia schools, and it merits a moment of your time.

For it is a sad story. The poor kids! And the point of

the story — the dethroning of excellence — has application far beyond the Potomac.

The capital of our country at one time had a tolerably good system of public schools. True enough, these were segregated schools, prior to the fall of 1954, but they are remembered as reasonably happy and productive schools in which teachers taught and pupils learned and violence rarely stalked the halls.

With the coming of desegregation, the picture

began to change. The school population, which had been roughly fifty-fifty, black and white, grew steadily blacker. Today the process of resegregation is virtually complete. The District's schools are 94 percent black, six percent white.

During the transition period, in a desperate effort to retain some concept of excellence, the then superintendent instituted a track system — but the system was challenged in Federal court and the series of disasters began.

The worst of the disasters came in the person of Judge J. Skelly Wright. He is one of that godlike kind of men, a transplanted Southern liberal; and like the Catholic convert who becomes more Catholic than the Pope, Judge Wright proved to be a greater integrationist than Thaddeus Stevens. In an arrogant and doctrinaire opinion, he destroyed the track system; he decreed a ruthless egalitarianism, filled with illusion but empty of reason; and he succeeded in wrecking the system as a whole. The superintendent departed, leaving Judge Wright triumphant astride the ruins.

Meanwhile, the District acquired an elected school board; the teachers union came on strong; the white exodus continued, and things got worse. Members of the school board quarreled with one another and with a new superintendent, unhappy man, who came and suffered and went. Finally, in a valiant effort to make a fresh start, the board last winter retained Dr. Kenneth Clark to come up with a plan.

He came up with a shocker. He proposed that the pupils be taught how to read. Dr. Clark is a leading sociologist and educator; he is also, incidentally, black. He noted

## Other Editors Say Campaign Costs

(Henderson Dispatch)  
Congress has been in a hassle over a proposal to limit spending in political campaigns. To an extent it still is.

Purpose of legislation that has been offered is to restrict radio and television spending. It is claimed that only those who are well heeled financially are capable of meeting the costs. The Democrats are interested in imposing the restrictions because their bank accounts are not as fat as the Republicans, thus giving the advantage to the latter under present procedures.

But all the laws that may be enacted will not be foolproof. No one knows or can know all the money that is poured into political campaigns, since there is little chance of determining outlays by individuals, and to an extent organizations as well. Friends of candidates could still spend money without authorities discovering all of it in every instance.

In recent times, it has been common belief that only the rich, or those who have rich friends, can finance a bid for high office. That is true in varying degree also of those seeking public favor at lower levels. It is claimed that many well qualified men — and women — are denied public service for this reason. There is an element of truth in that theory.

Legislation passed by Congress would naturally place some restrictions on campaign spending, but it will hardly put the clamps on office-seekers completely because of loopholes that could scarcely be reached by any sort of law.

At the same time, it has come to be ridiculous in the extreme as to the costs of running for office. In most instances, salaries involved would not cover election costs. In some instances, offices are sought for the prominence and prestige involved. In other cases, it is believed, candidates are put up by those who have motives of their own by way of benefits of one sort or another that would be expected.

The time has long since gone when, in most instances, a qualified person could announce his candidacy and the public then left to decide on merits and qualifications. Legal restraints may help, but they will not eliminate the evils entirely.

## Open Door To Foreign Imports

One of the curious paradoxes of the current scene is that many labor leaders are supporting legislation now in Congress that would provide for quotas



for imports of apparel and shoes. Labor spokesmen say that quotas on these imports are necessary to protect the jobs of American workers. The strange thing about this is that labor itself is responsible for the situation it deplures. Now labor is not entirely to blame for inflation. The basic reason is that the United States business operates on rubber money. Once the

American dollar was backed with gold and silver. A person could get \$1 worth of silver for a paper dollar or \$20 worth of gold for a \$20 bill. But since the Depression, paper money can not be exchanged for gold (except by foreign banks) and in the last few years dollar bills have not been exchangeable for minted silver dollars. So paper money has become less valuable all the time.

**Labor's Part**  
Meanwhile, labor and lots of other people have been taking advantage of soft money. Aided by the labor shortage caused by the inflationary boom and by laws that give labor negotiators one wild card in every hand of wage-negotiation poker, unions have pushed up wages.

It is difficult for a union to lose a strike, even today with almost 6 per cent of the labor force idle. Labor has been demanding "all the traffic

will bear," and remember that was an expression devised by a corporation president.

Wage increases have exceeded increases in productivity; wages have increased beyond the rise in consumer prices.

And these increases have not only priced American products out of foreign markets but they have opened the way to foreign imports here.

**Beyond Competition**  
American wages are so high, and foreign wages so low, that a foreign nation can make a product better than the corresponding American product, pay freight costs to the United States, pay duty and still sell it cheaper than the American product. Asia, Latin America and Caribbean wages are far lower than American. Some have been only 10 cents an hour. And even wages in Western Europe are below America's.

that the District's school-children, as a group, ranked wretchedly far behind the national norms. So he called for a "reading mobilization year," in which teachers would concentrate upon reading skills above all else. The school board, captivated by the novelty of the idea, endorsed the Clark program with a single voice.

Alas for Dr. Clark. His plan contained certain overtones of merit pay for excellent teaching. The teachers union reacted in horror. Local parents, whose hopes had been lifted, saw their hopes lost in a bickering fog. A new superintendent, also black, arrived in the midst of the discord. He has now drowned the Clark plan in cold water; the whole proposition has been withdrawn for "further study." Judge Wright once

again in thundering for absolute equality, and the parents are distraught and divided.

What of the children? No one gives a damn about them. They are as faceless as serfs in a feudal war. The reading skill is vital to them. They are growing to maturity in a technological society with no room for the illiterate laborer. Without this skill — this small touch of excellence — they are doomed to perpetual twilight.

But excellence, even the sad excellence of merely reaching a national average, is an overthrown king in these bleak plains of equality. Merit pay is anathema to teachers who fear challenge. The discipline of reading — the discipline of anything — finds no welcome in the soft vapors of social uplift. It is, I repeat, a sad business; and it couldn't have happened to a nicer city.

Guadacanal, Guam and Iwo Jima. He is a very competitive man and to him, losing isn't the best way to build character. He came to North Carolina from New Jersey more than 20 years ago, and his voice still rings with a Northern accent. The people in Eastern North Carolina believe in him, probably because he believes in them.

"The potential of North Carolina is tremendous," he says. "The East needs developing, not just for the good of that section, but for the good of North Carolina. When the people in Greenville have a problem, the people in Charlotte have a problem, too."

Leo Jenkins, of course, is a Democrat and one man prominently mentioned as a candidate for Governor in 1972 is Attorney General Robert Morgan, who is chairman of the ECU Board of Trustees and a close personal friend of Jenkins'. If Morgan runs for Governor, Jenkins won't. There's no doubt about that.

"Bob and I have talked about the Governor's race a lot," Jenkins says. "We both want to take the avenue that's best for the State. No decisions have been made." But then Dr. Jenkins talks about Morgan's chances of becoming a U.S. Senator, almost as if he hopes that's the direction the Attorney General will take in 1972.

"Bob would make an excellent U.S. Senator," Jenkins says. "I think he would gain a national reputation in this area. Consumer problems are national in scope and Bob Morgan is a champion of the consumer."

Jenkins says he hopes there will be a wide-open primary for Governor, with eight or ten candidates running. "It would be good for North

Carolina," he says. "If I run, I will run a positive campaign. No name-calling. I will present my credentials."

A lot of people will influence Dr. Jenkins between now and campaign time. No doubt, his popularity in the East will have a heavy influence on him. It is said that

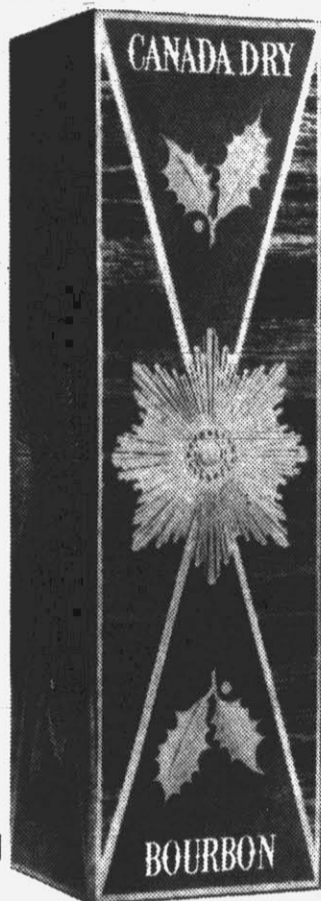
an elderly storekeeper in the East, upon hearing talk that Jenkins might run for Governor, said:

The East Carolina University basketball Buccaneers take the court tomorrow night at 8 p.m., hosting former conference rival George Washington, in Minges Coliseum.

It will be the opening game for the Pirates, who some feel will be the team to beat in the Southern Conference. The Colonials, members of the conference until last year, will be playing their second contest of the year.

The Pirates are having some problems, overcoming illness and injury, but Coach Tom Quinn hopes that the problems will have been solved by the time the Bucs take the court.

"We've been working at two-a-day drills and this has helped," he said. "We've done as much as we can without playing a game."

Jim Gregory, senior co-captain of the team, was lost for several weeks of practice due to a severe ankle sprain, and only rejoined the team Monday a week ago. During this time, however, Quinn got a chance to give a good look at some of his reserve strength, and found it pleasing.

"Both Dave Franklin and Terry Davis have come a long way toward getting ready to move in, and this helped bring them along," Quinn said.

"Gregory has been back over a week, and his physical condition is very good. He's quite close to his playing form. He just needs to get a game in to prove to himself that he's ready," the coach added.

Jim Fairley, junior veteran back from last year, has been

sidelined with a virus for most of the week, but is expected to be at full form by Friday. "He could be close to game form by then, too," the coach said. "He's assuming a different role this year on the team, so the things he's doing will be different. He's made a good adjustment to his greater weight, and has worked hard."

Quinn also likes the looks of Greg Crouse and Franklin. "They have been the most consistent so far," he said. "Franklin rebounds well and is doing a good job on defense. As with the others, he just needs to get into the game."

Quinn, who was critical of the team's rebounding earlier in the preseason drills, feels that this won't be quite as much of a problem now that Gregory is back. "The defense has also shown a lot of improvement. We're still working on our fast break, and it appears that it only works real well with certain personnel in there."

Quinn still isn't sure who will be starting for the Bucs, mainly because of the illness and injury problems. "We know guys like Davis, Franklin, Dave McNeill, Crouse and Arnie Ruegg will play a lot. We know we can depend on them, and we know we can go eight or nine deep and not be hurt as sometime we were

in the past," Quinn said.

"We are going to have to guard against fouls," he added.

Quinn probably will start Al Faber, 6-10 sophomore at center, and notes that he is not a picture player. "His statistics prove, however, that he's doing the job," the coach pointed out. "He is going to steadily progress. He's not an exceptional player at anything, but he does everything well. He's not a flashy shot-blocker, but he's going to be a help on defense."

Probably taking on the point will be the other co-captain Mike Henrich, a steady ball handler. "George Washington will have a height advantage against us in the backcourt," Quinn said. "We know that they are a good team, even without (Mike) Tallent." The Colonials high scoring guard was lost to them early in the year. "They've been without him long enough to learn how to play without him," he said.

Preceding the varsity game, the Baby Bucs will take on Chowan Junior College, starting at 5:45 p.m.

## Arizona State Is Tough Team

CHARLOTTE (AP) — Sure, North Carolina won eight of 11 games and was led by dynamic Don McCauley as it earned a Peach Bowl Bid at Atlanta Dec. 30 against Arizona State.

But how much do you know about Arizona State?  
The Arizona State University Sun Devils are 9-0 and rank ninth in this week's Associated Press poll. The Tar Heels are unrunked.

Arizona State plays in the Western Athletic Conference and is located at Tempe, Ariz. Its enrollment is 28,000 and its home games are played in 51,000-seat Sun Devil Stadium.

Frank Kush is 41 years old and has been head coach at Arizona State since 1958. His over-all record is 98 victories, 30 losses and one tie. His teams are 46-12 in conference play.

The Sun Devils had an open date last week, but wind up their regular season with a regionally telecast Saturday night game at Arizona, which is 2-3 in the league and 4-5 overall. Although Arizona State has beaten Arizona in their last five season-ending games, Arizona leads the series 27-16.

This year's Sun Devil squad

listed 25 lettermen and 25 sophomores.

Quarterback Joe Spagnola, a senior from Paterson, N.J., is the No. 6 man in total offense with a 226.8 average for nine games. He ranks 20th in passing, averaging 13.2 completions. He has thrown 219 with 119 completions, 12 interceptions, 17 touchdowns and 1,855 yards.

Jim McCann, a senior from Phoenix, is the nation's No. 3 punter, averaging 42.8 yards on 42 kicks.

J. D. Hill, a senior from Stockton, Calif., is tied for 10th nationally, averaging 5.7 pass catches a game. He has caught 51 for 853 yards and nine touchdowns.

Don Ekstrand, a junior from Arcadia, Calif., is tied for fifth in kick-scoring, averaging 6.8 points on 37 extra points and eight field goals in 11 tries.

The nation's top punt return man is Steve Holden, a soph from Gardena, Calif. He's returned 15 punts for 295 yards and the top average — 19.7. As a team, Arizona State is tops in total offense, fourth in rushing offense, 14th in passing offense, third in scoring and punting and seventh in total defense.

So now you know what the Tar Heels will be up against.

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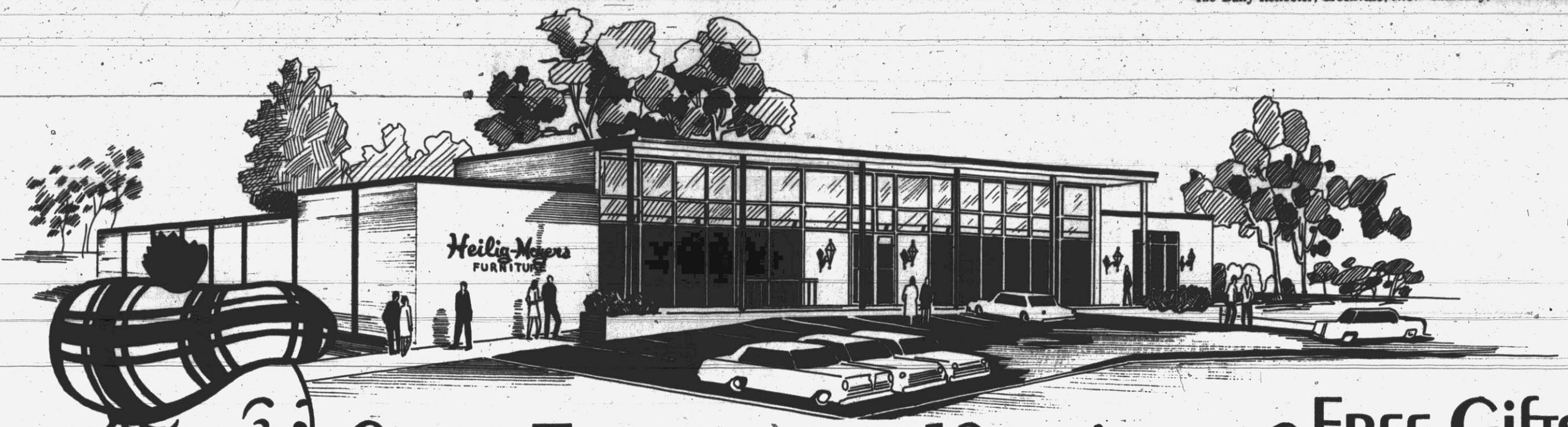
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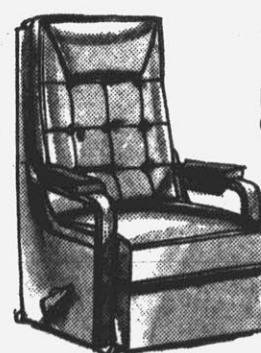
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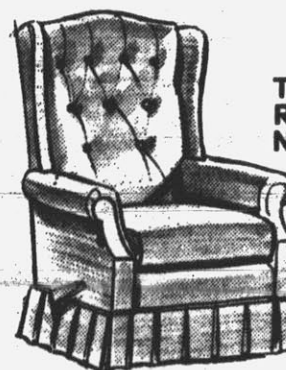
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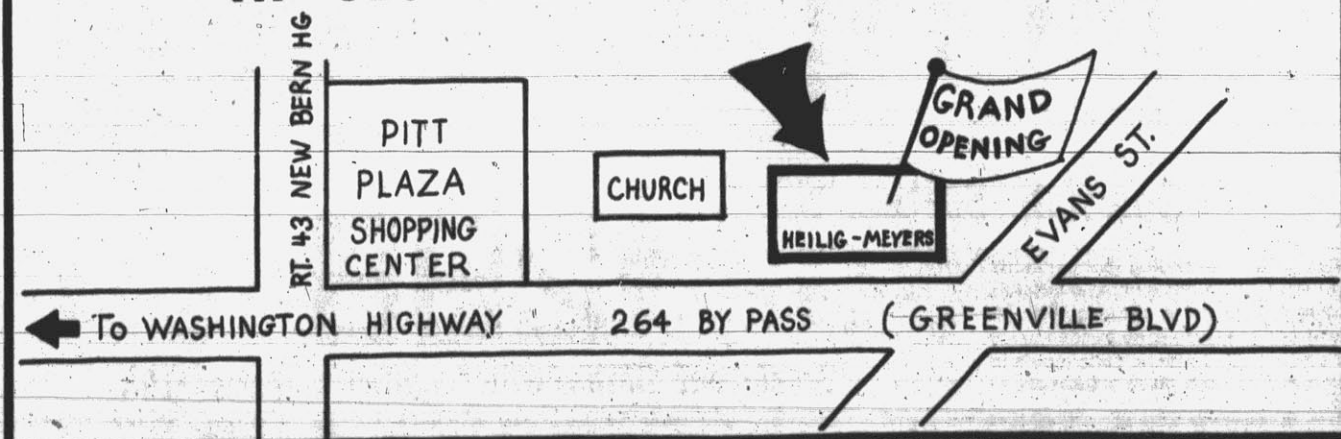

# Two Old Goldsboro Friends Teamed Up

In 1925, George Thornton and Hyman Meyers attended Goldsboro public school together. Little did they realize then that they would get back together in 1970 to head up the management of one of the South's most successful fur-

niture chain operations.

When the two men parted ways after public school, each one went on to build his own separate furniture chain. Years later they renewed their friendship and became close business associates out of

mutual respect and their common interest in the furniture business. It was in 1970 that Mr. Thornton and Mr. Meyers finally merged to form the Meyers-Thornton Furniture Corporation.

Both men are widely

respected in the Furniture Industry. They have both served on the Board of Directors of the National Retail Furniture Association as well as the Southern Retail Furniture Association. From that one store he built and expanded his business to the 9 store furniture chain, called Thornton Stores. It was with this growing, dynamic business that he merged with Heilig-Meyers Company this year.

Mr. Hyman Meyers, President, began his career with Huntley-Stockton-Hill Company of Winston-Salem, N.C. after graduating from the University

of North Carolina. He was manager of the Winston-Salem Store until 1934 when he left to manage the Heilig-Meyers Furniture Store of Wilson, N.C. At that time, Heilig-Meyers was a small furniture chain of 3 stores operated by Mr. Meyers father, the late Mr. J. M. Meyers and the late Mr. W. A. Heilig.

In 1942 Mr. Meyers interrupted his business career to serve in the U. S. Air Force during World War II. Upon completion of the war, Mr.

Meyers returned to Goldsboro as General Manager of the chain. In 1951, the company moved its headquarters from Goldsboro to Richmond, Virginia and it was in 1965 that Mr. Meyers became President of the company.

Up to the time of the merger with Thornton Stores this year, Mr. Meyers had built his company from a small furniture chain to a large 19 store operation in Virginia and North Carolina.

Since the merger of both

companies this year Meyers-Thornton Corporation has opened new stores in Raeford, N.C., Red Springs, N.C., Lumberton, N.C. and now this newest store in Greenville.

## From Delivering On Backs To Large Chain

To have a better understanding of Heilig-Meyers and its growth, one must know about the solid foundation this company was built on. This foundation was started over fifty seven years ago by the late Mr. J. M. Meyers and the late Mr. W. A. Heilig.

Starting out by personally delivering the furniture many miles on their backs, these two young Lithuanian immigrants opened their first store in Goldsboro, N.C. After establishing themselves, the two industrious men graduated to a mule and wagon and thus began the growth pattern that continued to the present 30 store furniture chain.

The Depression years were lean for Mr. Meyers and Mr. Heilig but they managed to stay in business by cutting expenses to the bone and keeping up with their accounts. After the Depression was over and business was on the up-swing again, they opened stores in Wilson in 1934, Raleigh 1935 and Rocky Mount 1939. In 1946 Mr. Meyers and Mr. Heilig dissolved their partnership, leaving Mr. Meyers with the original store in Goldsboro and the stores in Wilson and Rocky Mount.

The trend of the times was toward multiple stores operations, and Heilig-Meyers was prepared to expand its business at every opportunity. Constant growth was the goal and they achieved it...one by one the locations of the stores grew: Charlotte 1946, Scotland Neck 1946, Williamston 1947, Richmond, Virginia 1949, then another store in Richmond,

her husband, Nathaniel Krumben, made the company his career. Mr. J. M. Meyers had worked hard all his life and was rewarded not only with a successful business — but also a family that shared his interest in the business and desire to carry it on.

From his little store in Goldsboro in 1913, Mr. J. M. Meyers had come a long way. Big trucks and vans had replaced the mule and wagon, there were many stores instead of one — but he remained the same. At an age when most men had long ago retired, he still reported to the office every day. Right up until his death in 1968 at the age of 83, he still remained fervently interested in every detail of the company's operation.

### The Worry Clinic Your Surname Is 'Trademark'

Hear Anna's complaint! For thousands of boys and girls become shy and introverted because of her problem. Just remember the song by Johnny Cash, called "A Boy Named Sue." For people may withdraw or else become chronic fighters and anti-establishment, just because of their names. About 50 percent of all Americans change their surnames legally! By GEORGE W. CRANE Ph. D., M.D. CASE P-502: Anna P., aged 15, is in high school. "Dr. Crane," she began, "I have a long Polish name which most people can't even pronounce. "And my teachers never can spell it correctly, for it contains a lot of consonants that aren't vocalized. "So what would you think of having my daddy get our name legally changed? "He says he doesn't mind. If I urged him, I am sure he'd do it." Many of the girls with unat-

tractive surnames can remedy the problem by getting married. For almost half the female population of American changes its surname via the wedding ceremony! Alas, sometimes you brides give up a short, easy-to-spell surname and then are loaded with a jawbreaker after you get married. Vice - President Spiro Agnew shortened his last name into one of only two syllables, which was more efficient and thus politically an asset. As a rule, it is considered a better vote-getter if you have a short name that is easily pronounced. The same is true of advertising slogans and trade names. Sometimes, however, people become unduly proud of their family names because some ancestor served in the Revolutionary War or attained public fame for his political or scientific attainments. Some sons of famous family names are nitwits and ne'er-do-wells who squander their inheritance and become hippies or dope addicts. Other poor boys with unfamiliar surnames, may bring great honor and prestige to their family name, due to their hard work and social success. So don't be slaves to an inefficient surname. If it embarrasses you or is difficult for people to pronounce and spell, have no hesitation in changing it legally. And will you dotting mamas also have a heart and not christen your sons with sissy first names? Take a lesson from Johnny Cash's song: "A Boy Named Sue." Several of my college students at Northwestern University also changed their names legally because their foreign names had a vulgar connotation in English.

# Less 'Success' Among Those Who Believe Luck Controls Life

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Two Emory University psychologists

Life's losers, on the other hand, tend to feel that luck is the compelling factor and that they can do nothing about it, say the psychologists, Dr. Bonnie Strickland and Steve Nowicki.

They based their conclusions on a year-long study of public school pupils in the Atlanta metropolitan area.

They submitted a list of 40 questions to the pupils and checked the answers against educational achievements. They called the master-of-my-fate types "internals" and the luck-is-all believers "externals."

Those who indicated they were internals, said Dr. Strickland, almost invariably were the better students and most likely to be class president, to belong to scholastic and social organizations and to be regarded as popular.

The passive externals, she said, drifted aimlessly along, believing that luck played a large part in their lives and that they had no control over their fate.

Results of the study, the psychologists said, may have implications for those trying to devise methods of teaching children who resist the learning process.

Nowicki said methods of re-orienting children toward an internal approach might some day be used at the preschool level.

Dr. Strickland said the test, called the Nowicki-Strickland Personal Reaction Survey, might be used to help determine which students are more suitable for college.

Nowicki said the experiments generally show black pupils to be more externally oriented than their white classmates and that the gap widens with age and experience.

That finding, he said, is not surprising.

"The lower socio-economic classes don't have the money and the opportunities to make changes in the events affecting them," he said.



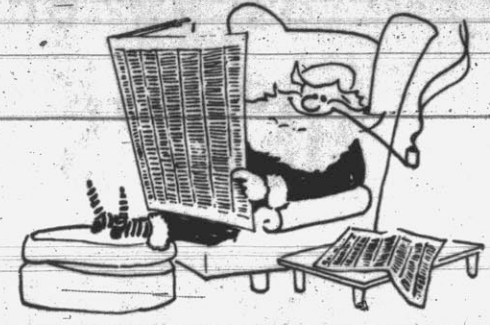
