

## Nationwide Rail Walkout Loophole Before Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rail unions left to Congress today a thin opportunity to avert a nationwide train strike that would strand Christmas mail and travelers and severely crimp the nation's already troubled economy.

C.L. Dennis, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, hinted a walkout scheduled for 12:01 a.m. Thursday could be postponed if Congress included an immediate 13.5 per cent wage hike for 500,000 rail workers as part of legislation forcing a strike delay.

There was no immediate indication that Congress would pick up Dennis' hint as hearings con-

tinued today into the situation. The rail leader made his statement to the House Commerce Committee Tuesday in an apparent modification of his stand earlier in the day when he said a strike was promised, not threatened.

"I haven't said we would strike no matter what you do,"

Dennis told the House committee. That was after he threatened to defy Congress, the White House and the federal courts by ordering the pre-dawn walkout.

In talking with reporters after his committee appearance, the union leader said he would go along with a strike delay ordered by Congress if the legislation also included the 13.5 per cent immediate pay boost and another 5 per cent in April. "This would be okay," he said.

Dennis, whose union is the largest of the four involved in the dispute, has rejected a three-year, 37 per cent package of wage hikes offered by the industry.

The 13.5 per cent raise he demanded for right now would be included in any settlement reached during the congressionally mandated strike delay.

President Nixon had asked only for a simple strike-delaying special law to put the crisis over for 45 days until after the new Congress meets Jan. 20. Rep. Harley O. Staggers, D-W.Va., chairman of the House Commerce Committee, amended the proposal to a 70-day delay.

In another indication of potential strike impact, the Post Office said it would impose a 300-mile limit on the mailing of packages, publications and advertising during a walkout, and, in Detroit, spokesmen for Ford, Chrysler and General Motors said a rail shutdown would halt the shipment of parts and close auto assembly lines within a week.

Dennis, accusing Nixon of siding with the railroad industry in asking Congress to order a strike delay, said his union would risk jail terms and fines to defy a congressional ban.

Chief rail negotiator John P. Hiltz, however, urged heavy fines as part of any legislation to halt the strike.

## Work On Traffic Problems

The State Highway Commission is working on a plan for easing the traffic problem on Greenville Boulevard in the Pitt Plaza, King's and Kroger area.

A spokesman said that property owners are extending Arlington Boulevard from Evans Street Extended to Greenville Boulevard (U. S. 264) along the east side of Kings. The drive will be extended, also by property developers, on the south side of Greenville Boulevard property between Pitt Plaza and

Kroger's. The Highway Commission will then install a system of traffic lights at the Greenville Boulevard - Arlington Boulevard intersection. This will allow traffic access to Pitt Plaza and Kroger's and also to King's. The traffic control will also allow traffic to cross the busy Greenville Boulevard at that point so that all three of the shopping centers can be reached.

## Oppose SST By One Vote

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — A resolutions committee at a conference of the nation's mayors has decided by one vote to urge withdrawal of federal support for development of the supersonic transport plane.

After the vote Tuesday at the 47th annual congress of the National League of Cities, Mayor Louis Welch of Houston, the committee chairman, predicted a floor fight on the issue when the whole conference considers the resolution Thursday.

Mayor Joseph Alioto, of San Francisco, a supporter of the resolution, had asked for a roll call after a show of hands showed its defeat by a 26-25 margin.

The Senate has voted against and the House for \$290 million of federal funds for continuing the development of the plane, which is being built by Boeing aircraft company in Seattle. A Senate-House conference committee will try to resolve the question.

New York Mayor John V. Lindsay told the committee past federal support for the plane has amounted to \$600 million with a total projected at \$3 billion, compared to a federal request for mass transit for the whole nation over the next 12 years of \$500 million.

"If we talk about national priorities, we have to draw the line somewhere and there is no better place to draw the line than here," Lindsay said.

Donald R. Dancy, regional alcoholism program director and program director (superintendent) of the WBJARC, made the announcement of the two positions today.

Dancy stated, "We are very fortunate to have two men with this experience and ability to serve at executive levels in the Eastern Regional Alcohol Program at WBJARC."

A Greenville native, Waldrop and his family moved back here in June, 1969. After two years of clinical training at Duke University Medical Center, Waldrop came here initially as a

counselor and group leader for alcoholics and the training of group therapists as additional people were added to the staff.

Waldrop was named to his new position on Dec. 1. Waldrop is responsible for coordinating all programs for alcoholics in the eastern 32 counties of North Carolina.

## Utilities Approve Bids For Expansion Of Water Pollution Control Plant

Utilities commissioners last night approved bids for construction which will double the capacity of the water pollution control plant.

Low bidder for the general construction was King-Hunter, Inc. of Greensboro. Low bidder for electrical construction was Heath Electric Co. of Kinston. The King-Hunter bid was \$781,800 while the Heath bid was \$41,451. The two bids totalled \$823,251 and the project estimate had been \$831,600.

Other general construction bids were: Eastern Construction, \$924,654; Crain and Denbo, \$835,460; Wrenn-Wilson, \$987,370; Crowder Construction, \$815,000 and Brown Construction, \$809,200.

Other electric bids included: Modern Electric, \$45,643; Watson Electric, \$48,250; National Electric, \$46,200; Stuart Shinn, \$56,655; Electricon, \$45,900 and Whitley's Electric, \$54,645.

The addition to the plant will be built adjacent to the present plant which is located behind

Greenwood Cemetery. The successful bidders will have 15 months to complete the work from the starting date. Awarding of the bids is subject to the approval of the Federal Water Quality Administration.

Director Charles Horne said he is still optimistic that an EDA grant covering up to 60 percent of the cost will be approved. While the Utilities Commission has approval for bonds to cover the project, the local cost will be cut considerably if the federal grant is approved.

William F. Freeman Associates is the engineering firm for the project and their engineers recommend approval of the low bids.

Commissioners last night were given a copy of electrical consultants report concerning the power interruption when lines burned down on Memorial Drive and Greenville Boulevard on Nov. 20.

The report verified that the trouble started when a tree fell over a line at the ECU substation. A power loss in batteries in the GUCO substation north of

the river caused a failure of circuit breakers to operate.

The consultants recommended the installation of a monitoring system on the battery system; additional ground conductors between the VEPCO ground system and GUCO's; and a periodic check and test program for the batteries.

Director Horne said that, while final costs were not in, the damage and repairs to the system resulting from the failure could run \$25,000 to \$30,000.

Business Manager Larry Brown reported that local banks had agreed to a system of collecting Utilities bills at a cost of five cents per bill. The system is expected to be inaugurated beginning in 1971. Under the system a GUCO customer would be able to pay his bill at any local bank.

Commissioners approved the purchase of a Torino four door sedan from Hastings Ford for \$2,897.02 based on a low bid. The vehicle will be equipped with air conditioning and power brakes and steering.

## Crusader Nader Asserts Public Is Bamboozled

"Environmental hazard is any situation or practice that adversely affects the health, safety, and welfare of people," consumer advocate, Ralph Nader, told a capacity audience at Wright Auditorium last night.

Applying this definition, he attacked persons and groups, mostly large corporations, that produce shoddy products and misrepresent their quality to the public.

He also blamed government and the courts for not enforcing the few laws we have against deceptive advertising and labeling; pollution of our air, land, and water; and overpricing.

"Lying has become an accepted institution in this country. We do not even expect companies to give a true representation of their products."

"We read an advertisement like six out of seven dogs prefer a certain dog food and we do not even question how such a conclusion was drawn. And when we go to a competitor and ask him to comment, he refuses."

Most supposedly competitive companies are in cahoots to bamboozle the consumer," he charged.

"A producer of pure orange juice told me he could not continue to compete with the other companies who were adding 15 percent water to juice, a practice that most connoisseurs of fruit juice cannot detect."

"The auto manufacturers say it is 'virtually impossible' to produce a 90 percent pollution-free engine by 1975. This is probably true if all the major ones continue their conspiracy to do nothing. However, progress today can almost be programmed. We said we'd put a man on the moon in ten years and we did it in nine. With the proper investment of money and manpower, a replacement for the internal combustion

engine could be made in the allotted time."

The young lawyer who has offices in Washington where he spends all his time and energy on cases and studies for the consumer, said, "Washington generates more myopia and institutional insanity than any

place in the world." Nader called on students to manifest a new concept of patriotism by "honoring the people and the air, land, and water that make up this country, as well as the flag that represents it."

"The University is the last bastion of freedom," he said. "Students should be given work to do that will accomplish something. They should be given a problem to gather empirical data on and once all the material is gathered, they should be called on to develop a strategy to put into action the ideas they have come up with. A student who leaves a University with technical skill and no values can be only a cog at best. A person who has values but no skills is ineffectual. The only hope for America and the world is to forge strong minds and dedicated people."

The four men outlined plans and made predictions for the 1970's.

"During the next decade, the total economic impact of ECU on this area will increase tremendously," Dr. Jenkins stated. "It is projected that in the years ahead, ECU will be contributing over \$370 million to the Greenville economy."

He added, "By 1980, the total sales from agriculture will be approximately \$70 million; with (continued on page 14)

Jenkins said that enrollment at ECU by 1980-1981 is expected to increase by 4,600 students.

"The purchasing power of 4,600 students is equivalent to that of 690 newly created industrial jobs," he said. The increase in students will increase the number of faculty and staff members.

"ECU will push ahead with its plans for a regional medical complex... which will help attract top medical specialists and bring relief to our physician shortage," Dr. Jenkins explained.

Dr. Pou sees a slight decrease in unemployment and a slight increase in inflation during the next decade.

"If we can expect an annual growth of seven percent in retail sales in Greenville for the next 10 years, our annual total retail sales will be approximately \$200 million, approaching the retail sales of Wilmington today," Pou emphasized.

He added, "By 1980, the total sales from agriculture will be approximately \$70 million; with (continued on page 14)

## Bandit Robs Bank, Makes Escape In Chartered Plane

LEXINGTON, N.C. (AP) — A bandit robbed a bank and escaped in a plane he had chartered. The plane landed in Pineville, W. Va. Tuesday after a branch of the First Union National Bank in downtown Lexington was robbed of an undisclosed amount.

By 5 p.m., two hours after the robbery, the pilot, Joe Dillard, had flown back to Lexington in the single-engine plane. He was met by local, state and federal law enforcement officials and was told not to talk about his experience.

He is believed to have been unaware that his passenger was a fugitive when the flight started. Federal Aviation Authority personnel, using radar equipment in Greensboro and Atlanta,

tried to track the plane. But an FAA spokesman said later that the radar picked up two objects and there was no positive way of determining if either was the getaway plane.

The FAA and law enforcement officials said the plane circled over landing strips at Mount Airy, N.C., and Hillsville, Va., before landing at Pineville, a coal mining town in southern West Virginia. The plane reportedly was chartered to Beckley, W. Va.

A car believed used by the robber to travel from the bank to the Lexington airport four miles away was found at the airport. It was being checked for fingerprints and to determine whether it was stolen.

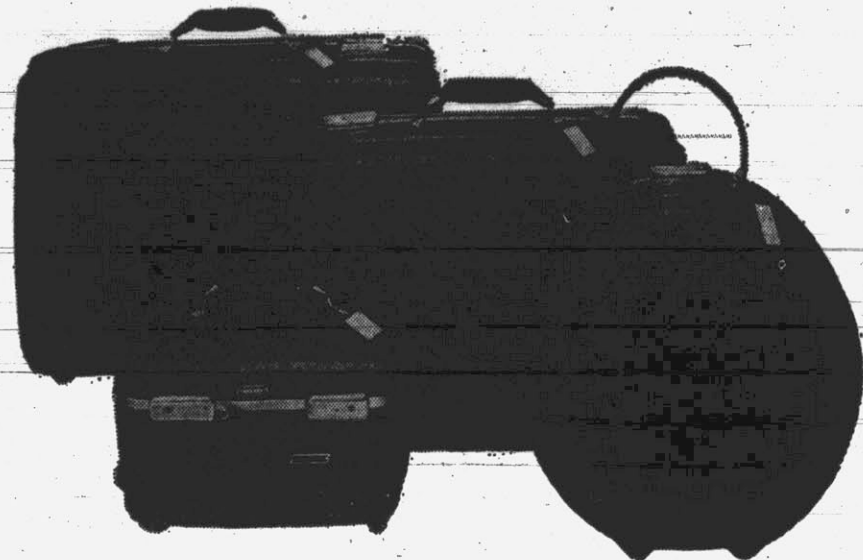
were given for the trainable children during the past month.

# Judge Learned To Stay Loose

RALEIGH — Frank Dupree thought he had flunked out of law school midway his first semester.

He was 19 and up-tight in that Depression fall of 1933, trying hard to justify the financial strain necessary for his preparation to follow his father's footsteps as an attorney.

Those mid-term exam grades made it plain to Frank, Jr., that he wasn't cut

Lieutenant.

Dupree opened his own office in 1948, the forerunner of the present firm of Dupree, Weaver, Horton, Cockman & Alvis. His trial practice in state and federal courts has been heavily weighted toward negligence, compensation and casualty and surety insurance litigation, but has included a considerable amount of general practice.

Republicanism in politics is part of the Dupree heritage, as well as the profession of law. His GOP credentials go back four generations.

His nomination by President Nixon for the judgeship was significant to party loyalists in eastern North Carolina. Other names considered included Willis Smith of Raleigh, a Democrat who worked for the Nixon-Agnew ticket in '68; and Robert Gavin of Sanford, twice a GOP candidate for governor whose residence is outside the district.

Dupree has earned his badges in party service, although he is not by nature drawn to the arena of active politics. He served three terms as the Republican member of the Wake County Board of Elections. He currently is party chairman for Wake County, and he was a candidate for State Senate in the recent general election.

Two-party politics is on the way in North Carolina, Dupree said, and the best evidence is on the ballot. "It used to be when I went to the polls my side of the ticket was barren below the office of Congressman. That's not so anymore. The party is able to field a full slate of candidates in more and more areas of the state."

Away from the office and politics, Dupree is a family man with two married daughters, a Baptist who has taught Sunday School, a civic leader involved in the sight-saving efforts of the Lion Club, and an avid tennis player.

The federal judiciary, a remote institution to earlier generations, has become a major force in American life in the final third of the 20th century. It is a reflection, Dupree suggested, of the drift to centralization on the part of government, the far-reaching intrusion of federal agencies into daily life.

"Certainly it makes it of crucial importance that our people have respect and confidence in the federal judiciary," he said.

"We live under rule of law. Our whole society is grounded upon rules of conduct embedded in statutory and common law under which we live. Without it, there would be chaos."

"Yes, we have to say the system is threatened by destructive forces today. It is not the first time, nor will it be the last. Our system of law will survive. It's got to survive."

# Promising Effort To Get Month-Long Truce

Hardly anyone can argue with the idea of a truce extending over a full month in the Vietnam war.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers said the United States is considering such a truce hoping it will lead to a permanent end of the fighting.

The statement was made after Sen. Henry M. Jackson made such a proposal Sunday in a television interview. Rogers told the senator the administration is considering such a plan and intends to pursue it.

Under the plan the Christmas truce would be extended through Tet at the end of January.

Whether the extended truce will work or not, only time will tell since such things are not decided through negotiations between the two adversaries. Our side can only declare the truce and hope that it works. Nevertheless it is worth a try.

# Real Showdown For Cambodia

WASHINGTON — Behind the insignificant small unit clashes in Cambodia, pumped up into major battles by daily news reports, the real worry of top officials in Washington are the first signs of a logistical buildup for a full-blown Communist offensive next spring.

This buildup of rice supplies in northeast Cambodia, not the clashing of patrols on the outskirts of Phnom Penh, is the key to the future of Cambodia and perhaps of Vietnam itself. If the North Vietnamese army can accumulate enough supplies to support a major Cambodia offensive, the big push is likely around next March or April.

That such an attempt is now being plotted in Hanoi is not doubted by any knowledgeable government official here. Indeed, there is little else the Communists can do. A much-vaunted offensive in the northern sector of South Vietnam pooped out months ago after assaults on Fire Base O'Reilly. Major Communist military activity in the more important southern part of South Vietnam (including the rice-rich Mekong delta) has been at a standstill since U.S. troops cleaned out the Cambodian sanctuaries last spring.

Thus, the prospective Cambodian offensive for next spring poses a critical showdown in the Indochinese war. If it succeeds in reestablishing Communist Cambodian base areas along the South Vietnamese border, the hot war for South Vietnam will be resumed with the

North Vietnamese on the offensive.

Actually, both the anti-Communist Cambodian government formed by Gen. Lon Nol after the fall of Prince Sihanouk and the Cambodian army have surprised everybody. Both government and army have displayed a patriotic elan all too lacking in South Vietnam over the years.

Contrary to widespread expectations by Western observers, Cambodians did not rally to the banner of the exiled Sihanouk but remained loyal to the Phnom Penh regime. Despite frantic recruitment efforts by the North Vietnamese, only 10,000 ethnic Cambodians have been put under arms. The old Khmer Rouge, the country's Communist guerrilla group, has not been integrated into the North Vietnamese forces (there are, in fact, reports of clashes between Khmer Rouge and North Vietnamese units).

Nevertheless, the basic reason for survival of the Lon Nol regime is the simple fact that the Communists have not been able to apply enough pressure. At no time have there been more than 10,000 Vietnamese Communist effectives in the field, resulting in a low-grade war with no major action.

And the reason for that, in turn, is the long-lasting gain resulting from the U.S. incursion ordered by President Nixon last spring. North Vietnamese rice supplies, were so decimated that the Communists could not even contemplate a major assault.

Accordingly, the North Vietnamese now are trying to

There are many who feel that an apology is humiliating. This should not be so. We all make mistakes.

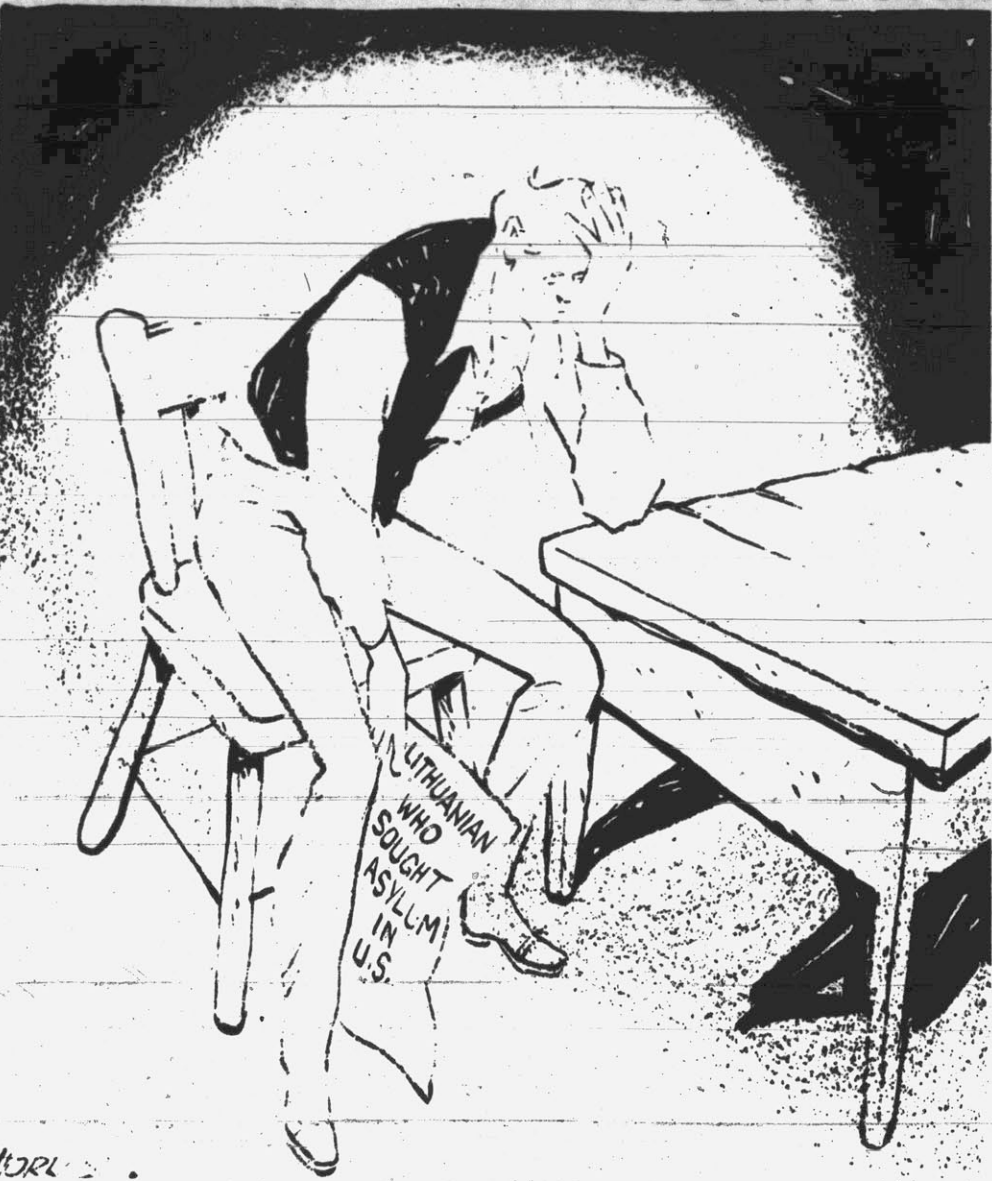
We blurt out unkind words. We sometimes speak of people in terms that should make us thoroughly ashamed of ourselves. When this happens, then an apology is in order.

# Let's Save The Trains

WASHINGTON — The question of what to do about American passenger railroads is still very much on the Administration's mind. There is no doubt that the railroads are losing money on passenger business. If they had their druthers, they would just stay with freight.

At the same time, the public's need for passenger trains, particularly commuter trains, is great. What is the solution? Professor Heinrich Applebaum, who holds the Casey Jones chair of railroad philosophy at Pullman University, has come up with a radical idea that could save both the railroads and the needed passenger service.

Prof. Applebaum says the solution to the problem can be found in large aluminum

containers which are now being used for freight.

These containers are placed on trains already packed, and unloaded the same way. This saves companies money in freight handling, loss due to pilferage and breakage, and also saves time.

Applebaum claims there is no reason you can't use the same containers for people. This is how it would operate: Let us assume that 150 people are going to take the 7:30 a.m. from Greenwich, Connecticut. When they arrive at the platform, they would be placed horizontally in the containers. (This would give everyone an extra hour's sleep to New York.) The container would be insulated as well as air-conditioned.

When everyone was

squeezed in the container it would be sealed. Then a freight train going through Greenwich would stop and the container would be hoisted on board a flatcar.

The same thing would happen all along the way. Commuters in containers at Portchester, Rye and Larchmont would all be waiting to be picked up by the freight train.

When the train arrived at Grand Central Station, the containers would be taken off



by cranes and opened on the platform, and everyone could go to work.

The reverse would happen in the evening, Applebaum said, except in this case, to break the monotony, the commuters would be loaded in vertically.

The beauty of the plan, says Applebaum, is that by using containers, railroads could cut the cost of a ticket from Greenwich to New York by \$3.50.

They could also profit by the fact that they would not have to build new passenger trains, and they could eliminate the bar cars.

Psychologically, they wouldn't have to worry about customer relations, as the commuter service would be run by the freight department.

The big advantage of this is that once the railroads were able to legitimately treat passengers as freight, they would improve their service rather than try to discourage people from using the railroads.

Applebaum says that, at the moment, the container idea would only be practical on short runs, but he felt that as time went on a method could be developed for long runs to freeze people in refrigerator cars and then thaw them out when they

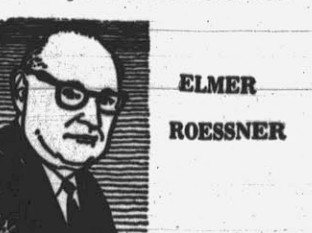

# Computerized Stores In Paris

A computerized store in Paris sells 1,700 items on a floor space of 120 square feet. It requires a staff of only six people.

It's an advancement of a technique tried in the United



States a generation ago. The American version was not successful.

Clarence Saunders built a chain of markets, the Piggly Wiggly stores, through the South. It was highly successful and its stock did so well on Wall Street that several attempts were made to take over control. Saun-

ders decided to teach those Yankee smart-alecs a lesson. He started to corner the stock of his own corporation.

He succeeded, but too well. He bought commitments to deliver more shares than there were outstanding. He calculated that the sellers would be unable to make delivery unless they bought the shares from him at his own price. For a short time it looked as if he could squeeze millions out of the market.

But he reckoned without the stock exchange. It ruled that it was illegal to buy more shares than existed, declared all Saunders's purchases void and threw the stock off the exchange. Saunders had to sell control of his company to pay back money borrowed for his venture.

A spate of litigation followed and Saunders did

stop the new owners of Piggly Wiggly to cease using the name. Saunders, who thereafter identified himself as "Clarence Saunders, sole owner of my own name," launched a new market venture.

He devised a pre-computer, automated store. Each shopper, on entering, was given a key. On shelves were single items of merchandise, with a keyhole under each. The shopper simply inserted her coded key into the hole of items she wanted. By the time she reached the check-out counter her purchases were there, packaged and the bill computed. Saunders called his store the Keedoole Store, a telescoping of "key does all." Get it?

Now Working In Paris  
Saunders was ahead of his time and Keedoole stores did not sweep the country.

But the improved idea is working in Paris. The computerized store at 152 Rue de Javel is called the Distellec and is operated by Michael Turquet. Again single items line the shelves. The shopper, instead of a key, picks up a pre-punched computer card from in front of the items wanted and turns the cards in at a desk. The cards are placed in a computer which prints an itemized bill. A copy is given to a clerk who assembles the items.

The store and warehouse occupy only 918 square feet and all types of food except vegetables, fruits and meat are handled.

The computer keeps a constant inventory. The store handles mail order sales from a catalog, promising delivery in two days after receipt of order.

## Refuse To Help Prize-Winner

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Russian novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn will have to figure out some way of picking up his Nobel Prize for literature without involving the Swedish Embassy in the Soviet capital.

An embassy spokesman dispelled speculation that the prize might be handed over here Thursday—when the main Nobel ceremony is being conducted in Stockholm.

The spokesman said Tuesday he did not know what other arrangements Solzhenitsyn, whose works are in official Soviet disfavor, might have in mind for picking up the \$80,000 prize money.

Solzhenitsyn originally planned to go to Stockholm for the award, but changed his mind, saying he feared the Soviet Union would not permit him to return to his homeland.

build up rice supplies to support an army of perhaps 40,000 for a spring offensive.

The Cambodian army, though well motivated and enlarged from 30,000 to 185,000 over some six months, simply could not withstand such an assault from North Vietnamese regulars. Despite their high morale, the Cambodians are poorly trained and poorly armed (though U. S. military aid will greatly help).

With U. S. forces barred by law and public opinion from reentering Cambodia, the defense of Cambodia would thus fall to South Vietnamese forces (some permanently stationed in Cambodia at Neak Luong along the Mekong, some ready to move across the border) and U. S. - South Vietnamese airpower. Chances of turning back the offensive are no better than fifty-fifty.

Although a substantial majority of both military and diplomatic officials here agrees that the offensive aims only at reestablishing base camps along the border not at conquering Cambodia, this may be overly optimistic. Hanoi has set up a puppet government for Cambodia, as it has not done for Laos, and deeply resents Lon Nol's audacity. Although Moscow and Peking advise against it, Hanoi may seek total takeover in Cambodia.

If it should try and succeed, the rewards would be immense. This would be the first major Communist military triumph in Indochina in years, a body blow to South Vietnam, and a signal to war-weary Americans to hurry out and forget the whole mess. That is why collection of rice by Communist troops in northwest Cambodia could be the first step down a fateful path.

# Consumers Will Learn Cheap Power Is Gone

WASHINGTON (AP) — The era of cheap power is over. It died in 1970, the year that brought unexpectedly heavy demands for power, strict new air pollution laws which require electric utilities to burn only low-polluting fuels, and a serious shortage of fuels that fit the new requirements.

The result has been skyrocketing fuel prices which precipitated widespread electric utility rate increases and promise more to come. However, there is wide agreement between government and industry sources that the situation probably was inevitable and is the price the United States must pay to end pollution.

An Associated Press study of the nation's energy crisis has found:

—Government figures indicate that electrical generating plants using fossil fuels, principally coal and fuel oil, account for 50 per cent of all sulphur oxide polluting the air, 25 per cent of the nitrogen oxide pollution and 25 per cent of the particulate matter, the grit that blackens window sills, dulls paint and erodes masonry.

—New air pollution laws have widely forbidden use of dirty fuels and put a strain on supplies of clean fuels, shortages have increased prices and in turn, utility rates.

cause government regulation of price rates have, in recent years, not permitted gas producers enough profit to enable exploration for new gas supplies. There is not currently enough available natural gas to fill the fossil fuel gap.

—Nuclear energy, once thought to be the panacea for the nation's future power needs, has fallen short of expectation. Nuclear generating plants seep small amounts of radiation and emit so much heat they could possibly alter the environment around them.

—The need to clean up the nation's air and water and keep them clean is considered at the present time by those in authority to be more urgent than keeping down the price of electricity. Consequently, the conditions which raised electric utility rates are likely to remain indefinitely.

New federal, state and municipal air pollution standards restrict the discharge of sulphur dioxide in urban areas. Current standards call for the burning of fuels with no more than 1 per cent sulphur content. In some areas, local ordinances will drop the allowable sulphur level to .3 per cent next year. Most of the coal mined in the United States cannot meet these standards.

For fossil-fuel burning plants, the only other fuels available are fuel oil and natural gas. But

fuel oil in an unpurified state also has a high sulphur content.

The cost of cleaning the sulphur out of coal and fuel oil is high. An alternative is to clean the sulphur out of stack gases after the high-sulphur fuel is burned but before the pollutants get into the air. This, too, is expensive.

To reduce fuel oil sulphur from 2.5 to .5 per cent cost an estimated 50 to 70 cents a barrel. Reducing sulphur in coal from 3 to 1.5 per cent would run 50 to 75 cents a ton, and to get the sulphur content down to .5 per cent could cost as high as \$3 a ton. Scrubbing coal stack

gases of 90 per cent of their sulphur oxide would cost between \$1 and \$2 for every ton of coal burned.

Ultimately, the electricity consumer will foot most, if not all, of the bill.

Natural gas, the cleanest of the fossil fuels, has no sulphur problem. Many utility companies have converted to gas, creating a giant gas demand which further tightened a supply already short due to the decline in exploration for new gas fields.

The crimp in the supply of clean fuels probably will get worse when the sulphur restric-

tions become effective for rural areas and when proposed new laws restrict the discharge of nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide and particulate matter.

Nuclear powered electrical generating plants also are taking flak from conservationists. Once touted as the one true clean way to generate power, it since has been determined that nuclear plants seep some small doses of radiation. There is little evidence that the leakage is sufficient to present any immediate danger, but radiation doses are cumulative and could possibly have long-term effects.

one of the chief manufacturers of nuclear power plants, recently announced the capability to build a leakproof generating station, but such construction would increase the cost of the already expensive plants.

Another major problem encountered by the nuclear plants is heat. All electrical plants require water to keep their generating cores cool. Nuclear plants require almost 50 per cent more water than fossil-fueled plants, principally because nuclear stations have no smoke stacks to carry off heat.

used in the process is heated to 15 degrees by fossil-fueled plants and 20 degrees by nuclear plants. It is estimated that within the next decade, the electric power industry will require one-sixth of the total fresh water runoff in the nation for cooling purposes.

The danger of sending so much superheated water back into lakes and streams still is being debated. Over a period of time, some scientists feel, the constant discharge of the hot water could raise the temperature of a lake or a stream enough to alter the ecology of the area, wiping out whatever

species of life normally lived there.

An alternative to dumping superheated water in lakes and rivers is the use of cooling towers that can evaporate 10 to 20 million gallons of water a day. In some weather, such towers can produce local fogging and icing conditions, but those problems are not considered serious.

## Presentations For Zoo Site Are Begun

RALEIGH (AP) — Competition over a site for the proposed North Carolina State Zoo was to go into the final round today as six areas began presentations before the site selection committee.

The two-day session of presentations was to begin at 9 a. m. in the State Legislative Building.

Representatives of each of the six areas will make one hour presentations and then devote a half hour to answering questions.

The areas bidding for the zoo are Concord, Asheboro, Albemarle, the Raleigh-Durham-Chapel Hill area, the Greensboro-High Point area and Statesville.

The zoo will mean a \$25 million investment and an annual payroll of an estimated \$700,000 to up to 300 employees.

"That's a major industry if I ever heard of one," said Norwood (Red) Pope, a Raleigh bank official who is chairman of the North Carolina Zoo Authority.

He said the presentations are expected to be "an example of the most unabashed hard-sell you've ever seen."

To be eligible as a site for the zoo, an area must be able to put up 1,000 acres of land, at no cost to the state, and provide \$150,000 of privately raised money to get a zoo program started.

The selection committee is expected to announce the winner in mid-February. The zoo is expected to be ready to receive its first visitors by mid-summer in 1973.

## Want Books Off School Reading

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C. (AP) — Seven members of the Fundamental Ministerial Association of Rocky Mount have asked Gov. Bob Scott's assistance in getting certain books removed from the public school required reading list.

The Rev. Robert Durham, pastor of the Grace Free will Baptist Church, said the books include New Worlds Ahead, Voice in Literature, and Focus. He said the delegation which visited the governor in Raleigh Tuesday objected to the material in the books and to the authors.

## Allegations Are Denied

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has denied an allegation by Sen. J.W. Fulbright that the United States knew there were no American prisoners at the Son Tay prisoner of war camp in North Vietnam.

Spokesman Jerry W. Freidheim says the goal of the raid was to get American prisoners out of North Vietnam, there were no "other purposes," as Sen. Fulbright earlier Tuesday stated there were.

Fulbright did not expand on his contention, but said comments by administration officials and members of the Army and Air Force raiding party "indicated officials knew there were no prisoners there, and that the mission had other purposes."

Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, made his remarks in asking for blockage of a resolution praising members of the raiding party. The Senate gave him unanimous approval for the rerouting of the resolution back to his committee for 10 days.

It was the second time he halted progress of such a measure.

# Thoroughfare Decision Delayed By Objectors

**WILLIAMSTON** — Objections by a number of concerned citizens appearing before the meeting of the Town Board of Williamston Monday night has resulted in a another postponement of a decision on the proposed Williamston thoroughfare plan.

The second presentation of the plan was made to the Town Board by State highway planners, but citizens objected to certain features of the revised plan. Board members decided more work needs to be done on the plan, and no action was taken. The planners have been asked to consider more revisions for a third presentation at a later date.

Approval was given for a one year extension of the franchise for cable television now held for the town by Peninsula Broadcasting Company of Virginia. The original franchise expired in November. Attorney Edgar Gurganus, representing the company, explained that certain matters with the Federal Communications Commission have not been cleared up, and that it was not known at this time when and if, the company would be able to install cable TV in Williamston.

A number of resignations were accepted, and some replacements named. The Rev. Paul J. Mears, pastor of the Episcopal Church, resigned as chairman of the Williamston Community Relations Committee. The board tabled naming a replacement. Sam Mabry and

Ed Beach both resigned from the Williamston Board of Adjustments. Larry Roberson and Rankin Dowdy were named to replace Mabry and Beach. W. F. Sparrow resigned as Zoning Administrator. A replacement was not named. Two men, John H. Gurganus and W. E. Ritter were reappointed to the Williamston Planning Board for a three year term.

Action was tabled on a letter from the Mid-East Economic Development Commission requesting a resolution naming the commission as the clearing house for state and federal grants. The board wants to study this matter further before making a decision.

## No More Passes To Leave Base

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Air Force has announced that henceforth, all an airman will need when he goes off base is his identification card. Passes no longer will be required.

The move is part of the military plan to make life in the service more attractive.

Lt. Gen. Robert J. Dixon, chief of staff for personnel, said the Air Force, like the Army and Navy, is doing away with the "Mickey Mouse" activities of the past.

## Price Wars In Milk Continue

**RALEIGH (AP)** — While the North Carolina Milk Commission ponders whether to fix minimum milk prices in certain areas of the state, price wars are continuing, and possibly spreading.

Grady Cooper, assistant secretary of the commission, told the commission Tuesday a survey last Friday showed milk was being sold below cost in several cities.

Generally, the wholesale price in North Carolina is \$1.18 a gallon.

The Commission voted to study the transcript of a hearing held Nov. 16 at Greensboro before deciding whether to fix wholesale and retail milk prices in several areas in an effort to halt price wars and stabilize the industry.

W. L. Teeter of Mooresville, a commission member, said he had been informed that some stores in Kinston were selling milk below wholesale.

Cooper said a survey showed milk was being sold at 99 cents a gallon in Siler City, Ramseur and Asheboro, \$1.08 in Thomasville, 99 cents and \$1.07 in Burlington, and 99 cents in Kannapolis, Durham and Chapel Hill. It was pointed out at the

commission hearing that some stores sell milk as a "loss leader" to attract customers.

State Atty. Gen. Robert Morgan is strongly opposed to any fixing of minimum retail prices.

Spokesman for producers and distributors contended at the hearing that price fixing must be done at all levels to stabilize and improve the marketing situation.

Mrs. Leif Valand of Raleigh, a commission member, suggested Tuesday that the commission delay its action until the transcript had been prepared.

Teeter later offered a motion to this effect which was adopted. Cooper said it may be Christmas before the 300-page transcript is ready. About 72 pages have been completed.

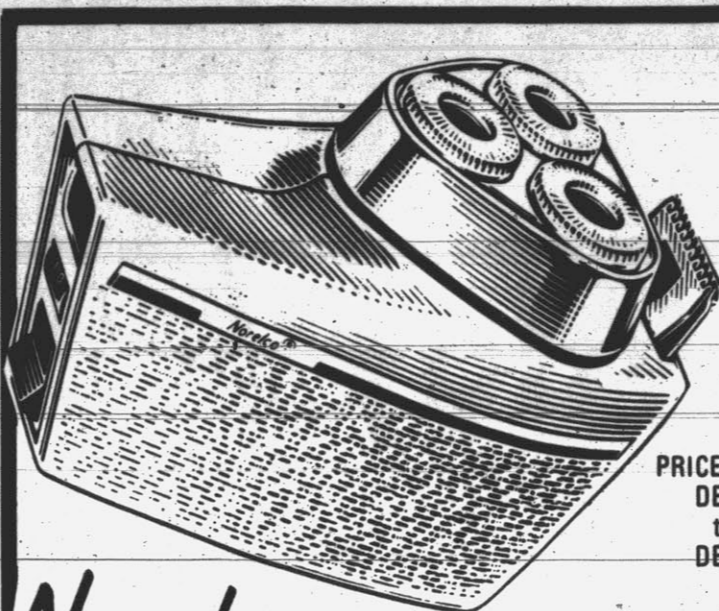
Chairman Neil Bolton said the next committee meeting may be held Tuesday, Dec. 29.

W. C. Harris, commission attorney, told the members, "it would be a mistake to act without the transcript."

Cooper said price increases ranging from one to two cents per quart had been put into effect in North Carolina as a result of a boost in the minimum price dairy firms must pay farm producers for class I or bottling milk.

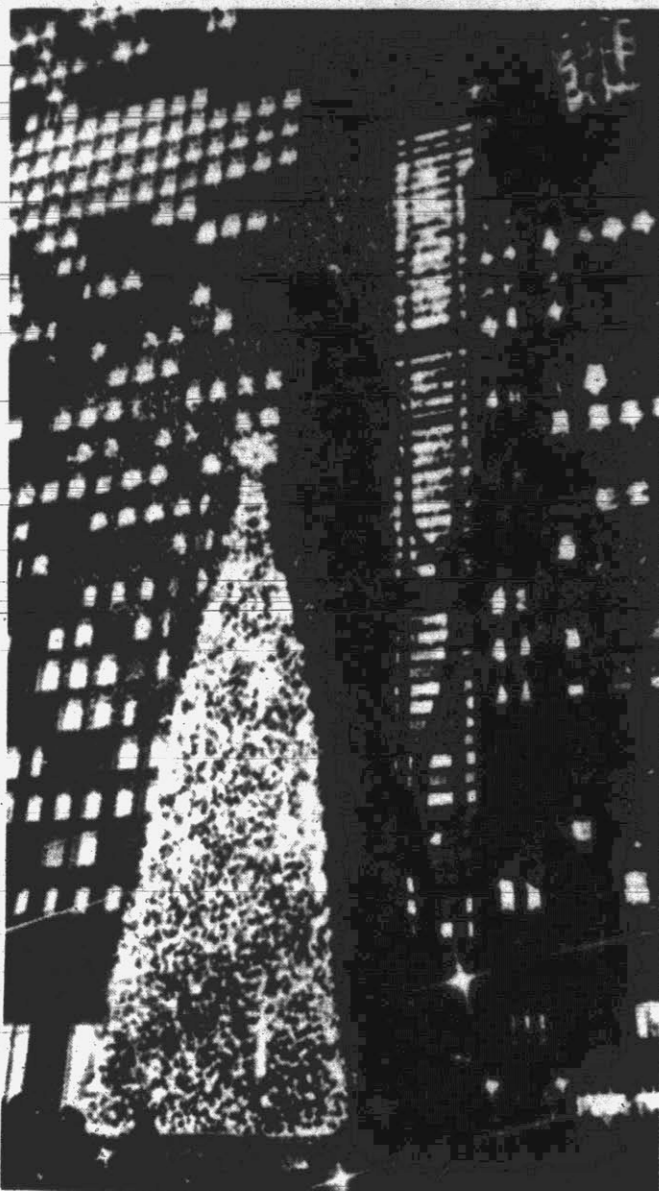

# Move To Safeguard Job Rights Of Young Mothers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government and civil rights lawyers are joining in a Supreme Court bid to safeguard job rights of young mothers.

Using the case of a Jacksonville, Fla., waitress as a springboard, the Justice Department and the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund are seeking a ruling that employers may not refuse to hire women simply because they have young children at home.

All this shapes up as the first high court test of a 1964 civil rights law provision guaranteeing women protection against job discrimination.

Martin Marietta Corp., defendant in the suit, insists there is no real evidence to build a discrimination claim and that the appeal reached the high court too late to be considered.

The case of Ida Phillips, a white woman with seven children, already is well known in the capital. Earlier this year, "sexism" charges were leveled at G. Harrold Carswell by women liberationists because he cast

a vote against reconsideration of her suit by a federal appeals court.

The charges did not help Carswell's efforts to win Senate confirmation as a Supreme Court justice. He was ultimately defeated.

Mrs. Phillips' case began when a receptionist told her she could not be considered for a factory job because she had children of preschool age.

Both U.S. district and appeals courts found Mrs. Phillips was not turned down by Martin Marietta because she is a woman but because she is a woman with preschool-age children.

The Justice Department and the Legal Defense Fund say this interpretation could imperil job opportunities of the more than 4 million American women in the labor market who have young children at home. Many of these women are black. About one-third provide the sole support of their households or have husbands with incomes below \$5,000 a year.

A big issue in the case is whether Martin Marietta hired men with school-age children at the time Mrs. Phillips applied for a job as an assembly trainee.

"To require of prospective women employees that they not have preschool-age children, while not requiring the same of men, is to discriminate against women on the basis of sex," Solicitor General Erwin N. Griswold and Justice Department lawyers said in a brief to the court.

But attorneys for Martin Marietta told the court the record does not show the company's practice at the time and that without such evidence a discrimination argument fails.

Above all, the firm's lawyers are stressing a point that has doomed many test cases before: the technical rule that petitions for review be filed within 90 days of the ruling by the ap-

peals court. Mrs. Phillips' petition, they maintain, was filed Jan. 10, 1970—more than seven months after the U.S. Circuit Court in New Orleans entered judgment against her.

## Yuletide Blues

CHICAGO (AP) — The season to be jolly makes a lot of people sad.

They are suffering from what psychiatrists often call "Christmas neurosis." The holiday makes them feel lonely, sad and depressed.

And in reactions to it, some people may drink too much or engage in extramarital affairs of sexual deviancy, or other activities in which they normally don't engage, psychiatrists have reported.

Dr. George H. Pollack, director-designate of The Institute for Psychoanalysis, says, "At times people do various things to overcome a depressed feeling." In an interview, he cited the reputation for moral looseness at Christmas office parties as an attempt to achieve "pseudo happiness."

The Thanksgiving-Christmas period is a time for family-centered festivities, says Pollack, who has made studies of psychological problems associated with anniversaries, and with reactions to mourning.

"Those who might have various kinds of unfinished business with their family—or who have no family—have a greater tendency at this time to experience loneliness, depression, sadness—a missing of togetherness."

There's no way of estimating how many people feel depressed at Christmas, he said, but for those who do, Dr. Pollack advises "doing some soul searching on their own" to try to determine what is making them unhappy. Being aware of a problem can open up mental associations which help to overcome the problem, he said. The holiday neurosis usually ends after the holiday.

And if a friend or relative has the Christmas blues, it doesn't do any good just to tell him to cheer up, Dr. Pollack said. The person has a reason for his depression. He needs to try to understand why.

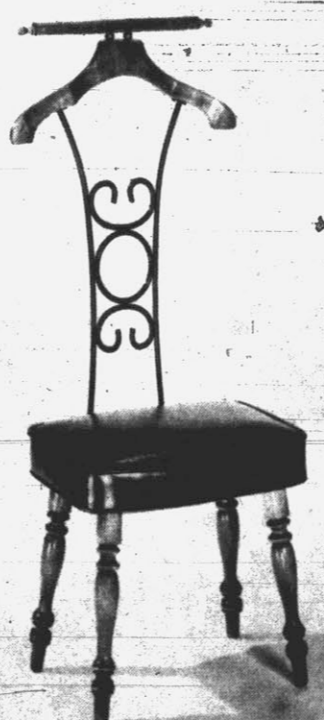

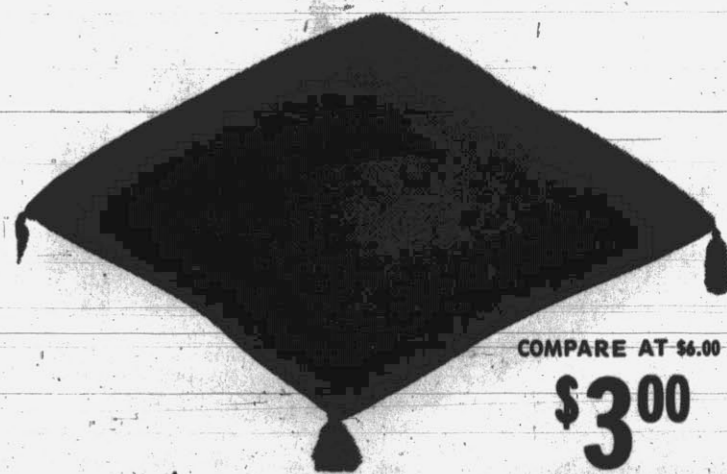

# Manning Describes Events Leading To Boy's Death

"That boy meant a lot to me. I was torn all to pieces," Henry Edward Manning told a Superior Court jury yesterday—as he testified about the death of 15-year-old William Raymond Pearce in a wooded area near Pearce's home west of Winterville June 4.

Manning, a co-defendant in the Pearce death, took the stand before lunch-time yesterday as the trial of Owen Swanson Doss, charged with murder in the death, as is Manning, continued. Manning described how he and Doss allegedly stole a car in Greensboro to make good their escape from a federal prison work release program June 3, then how they stole a truck near Goldsboro after the car ran out of gas on their way to Pitt County.

And Ayden area native, Manning said he and Doss went to the Pearce trailer home after being unable to arouse his brother, Rufus Manning, at Cannon's Cross Roads east of Ayden in the early morning hours of June 4.

Manning described how he went to a window of the Pearce home, saw "Pearce's son lying on the couch," and awoke him by tossing a stone through a broken window at the lad.

"He's always been pretty close to me," Manning said. "He got up, opened the door and grabbed me around the neck . . . hugged me."

The witness then told how Paul Pearce, the victim's father, was awakened, how they talked, then how they went to sleep. Manning described how William Pearce told of a place the truck could be hidden, how the truck was concealed in a wooded area near a pond, and how he sent a note to his brother by Pearce's father late in the morning.

The witness then described how his brother came to the trailer one time with \$13 or \$17 and a pint of whiskey" and returned later with two pints of whiskey. Manning said he and Doss drank the greatest quantity of the liquor, with Manning's brother having only about three drinks.

Manning testified that his brother, late in the afternoon, took him and Doss to the spot where the stolen truck was

parked, and that his brother gave him a knife with which to straight-wire the truck. (Manning explained that he had thrown the ignition key into the pond when the truck was parked there earlier.) The truck was then driven back to the Pearce residence.

"I backed the truck into a ditch . . . because I was drunk," Manning told.

The co-defendant then said young Pearce told them, "The law's going to come," explained that someone would see the truck in the ditch and call law enforcement officials.

Manning said he decided to leave, for fear the police would come, and started walking . . .

but he said "The boy called me back."

Doss had the knife and a .22 caliber rifle found in the trailer, Manning said, and "was holding the boy," when he returned to the trailer.

"I asked Doss what he was going to do. He said 'we need protection'."

Manning said Doss then "forced me out of the door first," with "the boy after me."

"What I have to say from here on is pretty nasty," Manning commented, and Judge Joshua S. James told spectators seated in the court room that they were free to leave the room if they felt they would be offended by the testimony.

Manning then related how Doss forced young Pearce to strip off his clothes; fired a shot between his legs when Pearce at first refused; struck the boy on the right of the neck at one point; and forced Manning to "drop" his trousers, after firing two shots in Manning's "general area."

"Doss," Manning said, "was laughing and carrying on."

Doss then "put a knife at the boy's throat" Manning said, and performed unnatural acts with Pearce.

"I grabbed the rifle," Manning said, "and snapped it, but the rifle wouldn't fire."

He testified that Doss then "stabbed the boy", adding that "the boy was bloody all over."

"I felt like by me trying to attack Doss . . . I felt like I was hurting him (Pearce)."

Manning then said he told Doss "the law is coming," and "he ran . . . went toward the house trailer."

"I heard the officers holler halt, and I fell to the ground."

Manning said the Pearce boy was "trying to get him (Doss) to stop . . . telling Doss he wouldn't call the law . . . begging him not to do it."

Under cross examination by Doss' attorneys M. E. Cavendish and James T. Cheatham, Manning said, "I was pretty loaded . . . high . . ."

"I'd say I was pretty high . . . close to drunk if not drunk."

"I figured Doss at this time was drunker than I was. Doss was almost out of his mind, it seemed to me. He acted like a totally different person."

Manning also identified some clothing allegedly worn by Doss at the time of the killing.

This morning, several members of the Sheriff's Department took the stand. They told of seeing Manning and Doss coming from a wooded area behind the Pearce home during the late afternoon of June 4 (about 180 feet from the site of

the murder); of the manhunt for Doss that followed after Man-

ning was taken into custody; and

the Reedy Branch Free Will Baptist Church about two miles

from the Pearce home about

10:15 June 5.

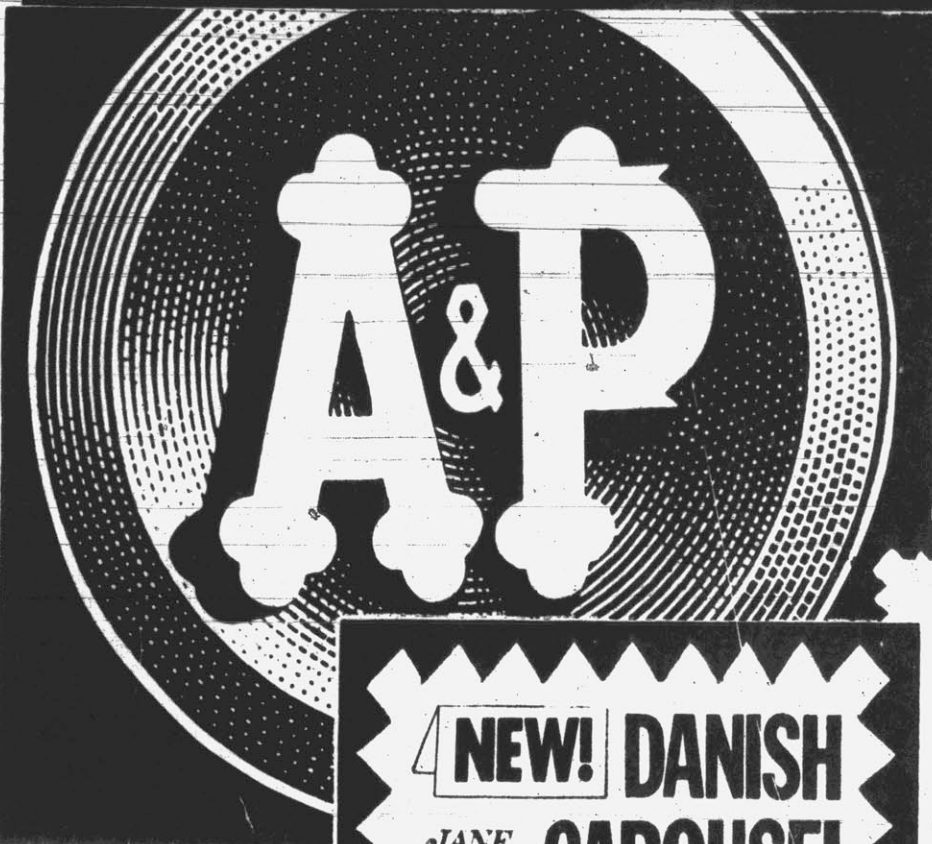

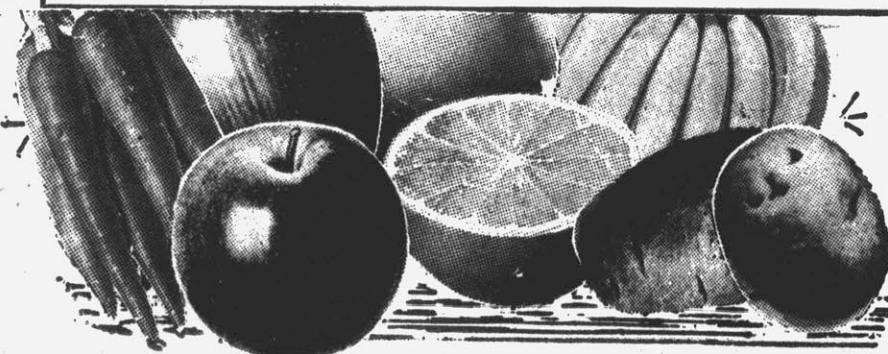

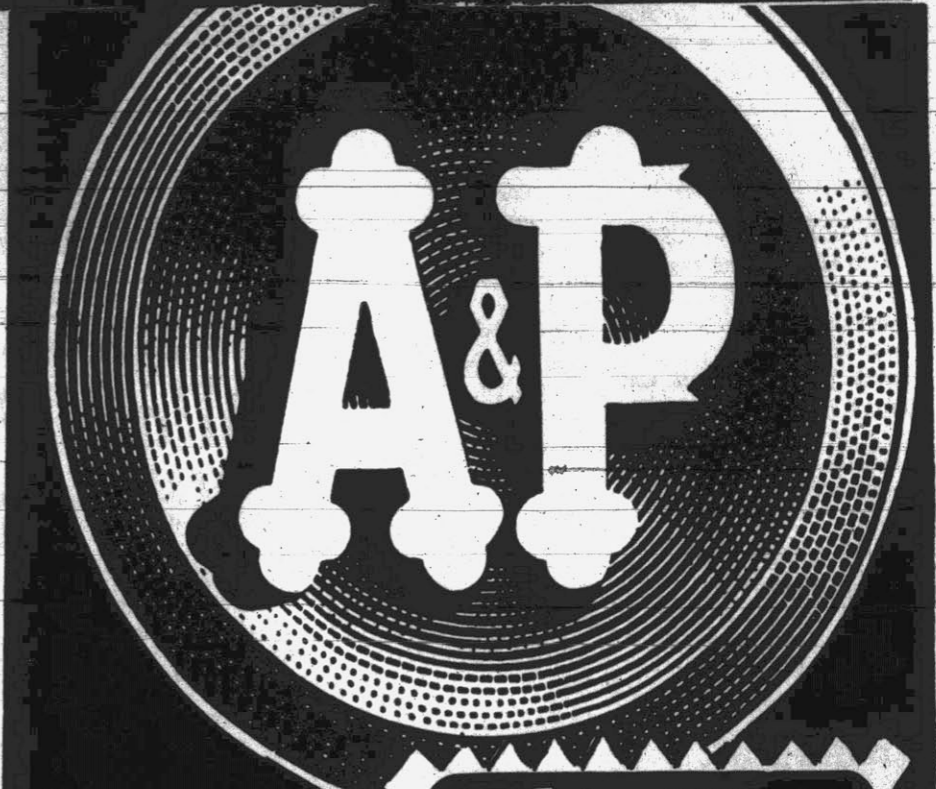

Final preparations were being made this morning for the opening today of the Blind Products Store, sponsored annually during Christmas by the Greenville Lions Club. This year the store will be located in a mobile home parked on the former site of Heilig-Meyers Furniture on the corner of Third and Cotanche Streets. The site was furnished by the furniture company. Lions project co-chairman Ray Brewer said that the store was scheduled to open for business today at 1 p.m. Store hours, six days a week through Christmas Eve, will be from 1 p.m. until 9 p.m., Brewer said. The "business" will be run by members of the Lions Club who donate their time and services toward the operation of the store. As in years past, the store will be stocked with gift items personally made by blind craftsmen of North Carolina. Many of these craftsmen live in the eastern section of the state. According to Mrs. Hilda Alford, area representative of the Home Industries Division of the State Commission for the Blind, the proceeds from the sale of these products go into a revolving fund to pay the blind workers for their products and to pay for materials used in making the various items. The store is operated on a non-profit basis, Mrs. Alford explained, and the blind workers

the increase in income coming from improved yields of soybeans, corn and peanuts and a continued expansion in eggs, poultry, swine, cucumbers and other food crops. "If Congress permits the lease or sale of tobacco allotments across county lines, we will be producing more tobacco in Pitt County in 1980 than we are today as many of the small allotments in the Piedmont will move to this area," he explained. Woodrow Wooten, chairman of the Pitt Memorial Hospital board of directors, discussed the new hospital to be constructed here within the next few years, the possibility of acquiring a rehabilitation center here and patient-related education at East Carolina University. "When the doors of the new hospital are open, we plan for it to be the most modern, up-to-date facility, and operated by the best medical staff anywhere," Wooten said. Willis feels Greenville will develop a new measurement of growth during the decade. "During the decade, no longer will we count just new buildings, new jobs, or population increases," Willis stated.

## Rampants Roll Past North Pitt, 65-43

**BETHEL** — Prosperity proved to be too much for North Pitt's Panthers last night.

The Panthers rushed out to a seven point lead in the closing minutes of the first quarter, then turned into harmless pussycats for the rest of the game as Rose High School came on to take a 65-43 victory.

It was the third straight victory for the Rampants, who are playing without a single returning starter from last year. And it was the third loss in four games for the Panthers, whose offense and defense fell apart in the closing seconds of the first quarter.

Rose came on in the last 1:30 of the period to erase a seven point deficit and take a one-point lead at the horn.

North Pitt regained the lead briefly in the middle of the second period, but that was it. Rose pushed out to a six-point halftime spread, and rolled along easily after that.

The Panthers got the opening basket on a jumper by Wayne Brown, and added a free throw by Russ Andrews before Rose got on the board with Jimmy Hagans hitting on a fast break.

The two teams swapped points for a few minutes, then a free throw by Ronnie Briley edged the lead out to four, and a basket by William Shiver edged it to five at 9-4.

It went back to five at 11-6 with 1:56 left when Frank Brown hit and reached seven at 1:38 when Wayne Brown hit from underneath at 13-6.

But Rose turned it on at that point. Clarence Snuggs hit on a rebound, and Robert Kear hit on a pair of free throws. He drove in for another basket 19 seconds left to cut the lead to one, and Hagans hit on another fast break with five seconds left to give Rose a 14-13 lead at the horn.

Rose hit quickly at the start of the second period for a three-point lead, by a free throw by David Highsmith, followed by a shot from the corner by Shiver tied it up at 16-16. Wayne Brown put North Pitt back ahead, 17-16 with a free throw with 4:42 to go, but that was it for the Panthers.

A pair of free throws by Kear with 4:19 in the half put the Rampants back into an 18-17 lead and they never trailed again.

Lonnie Payton got hot and hit

on three straight baskets to help push the lead out to five. A pair of free throws by Kear moved the margin to seven and another by Payton with 27 seconds left gave Rose its biggest spread of the half, 27-19.

North Pitt came up with a basket in the closing seconds, however, to cut it to 27-21 at the intermission.

The Panthers chopped off two more points on Brown's bucket from the corner to open the third quarter, but Rose countered with two baskets, a driving lay up by Payton and another by Kear to up the lead to eight again. From then on, it was a steady pull-away as North Pitt couldn't seem to find the mark, making only two more baskets in the period, and just seven more in the game.

North Pitt did cut it back to six, but a free throw by Kear, and two steals by Hagans ran it out to 11. Rose slowly built on that, and another drive by Hagans resulted in a bucket and a foul shot running the lead out to 18 at 47-29. A free throw by J. W. Wooten with 13 seconds left cut that to 47-30 as the period ended.

Rose moved on out in the final frame, building up to as much as a 26-point lead. That came just before the end, when the Rampants led, 65-39. North Pitt managed two baskets in the closing seconds to cut the final margin to 65-43.

The Rampants were paced by Kear, Payton and Hanags, each of whom had 16.

Brown was the only Panther to hit double figures. He had a game-leading 19.

In the junior varsity contest, Rose also came away a winner, taking a 53-43 victory. Mike Harris put Rose into a 2-0 lead on a rebounding shot, and James Wooten hit on a fast break for a 4-0 lead. The Rampants Cubs never were headed after that, leading all the way.

By the end of the first period, they had worked up a 23-10 lead. They pushed then out to 39-23 by the end of the half, and held as much as a 17-point spread during the quarter.

In the third period, the tempo of action changed considerably. North Pitt put on a strong rally, outscoring Rose, 14-5. That cut the lead to 44-37, and Rose moved into a more cautious ball-handing offense in the final segment.

Rose held off North Pitt after that, although the lead was closed to within five points in the early seconds of the frame. Rose eventually outpointed the Panther Cubs, 9-6, to wrap up the win.

J.C. Daniels led Rose with 20 points, while Wooten had 15 and James Williams had 13. For North Pitt, Ulysses Jordan had 22.

Rose travels to Winterville Friday night to meet D. H. Conley, seeking their second win over the Vikings and their fourth of the year.

## East Carolina, Davidson Collide In Key Southern Conference Cage Battle Tonight

A few shorts weeks ago, when it came time to predict the outcome of the Southern Conference basketball race, everyone put their attention to the December 9 meeting of the Davidson Wildcats and the East Carolina Pirates in Charlotte Coliseum.

Well, tonight is the night, and if the prophets are correct, the winner of the game should emerge as the team to beat in the 1970-71 season.

However, there are a lot of mitigating circumstances surrounding the game that the prophets didn't take into consideration.

Fact one: Davidson will be missing two of its intended starters, junior Brian Adrian, an All-Conference selection last year, and an All-America nominee by the 'Cats, along with Eric Minkin. Adrian is benched with a knee injury and probably won't be back until around Christmas. Minkin suffered a

hip injury a couple of weeks ago and is not expected to be ready to return until next week.

Fact two: East Carolina has also had its problems. Julius Prince, slated to be one of the starting guards this year, has been bothered by a wrist injury which has hurt his play. Jim Fairley, one of the conference's top sophomores last year, hasn't returned to his 1969-70 form as yet, and this hasn't helped the offensive power of the pirates. Jim Gregory missed most of the pre-season practice with an ankle injury. This isn't helping matters either.

So all-in-all, the highly billed game may not mean as much in the final outcome as it would have appeared to mean several weeks ago.

Not that it isn't an important one. Davidson comes into the game with a record stretching back over several years of not having lost a conference basketball game. The Pirates have never beaten the 'Cats in their previous eight meetings.

But the Pirates also have a record of enjoying stopping long strings.

Several seasons ago, the snapped a long road losing streak at William & Mary that also stopped a lengthy home winning string by the Indians. Since then, the Bucs haven't lost to William & Mary.

So this might be the night for another string to stop. "It's an important one for us," Coach Tom Quinn said. "A victory would put us on top of the conference, and make us the favorites, and we would like to have that position."

Davidson will probably start the quintet of senior Ron Stelzer at the points, senior Duncan Postma and sophomore Joe Sutter at the wings, and sophomore John Pecorak and senior Steve Kirley at the posts. The Pirate lineup is still up in

the air. Quinn has started two different sets this year so far, and might go with a third tonight. But the most likely combination would be Mike Henrich at the point, Jim Gregory and Greg Crouse at the wings, and Jim Fairley and Al Faber in the middle.

Gregory thus far has been the single high scorer for the Bucs, hitting 24 against Baptist. But Faber is the overall scoring leader, averaging 18 points per game, a figure he hit in both the 80-79 loss to George Washington and the 119-92 romp over Baptist. Gregory has a 14.5 average, while Fairley is hitting at a similar mark. Henrich got 10 points in each game, while

Crouse has a 10 point mark, getting four in the opener, and 16 against Baptist.

Faber is the rebounding leader with 11.5, while Gregory has 8.5 and Fairley had a 7.5 mark. The Bucs, following tonight's

game, which also features a freshman encounter, return home Saturday. The Baby Bucs will meet Lenoir Community College at 5:45 p.m. Saturday, while the Bucs face East Tennessee State at 8 p.m.

# Bucs To Challenge For Mat Title Again

For the past several years, the East Carolina University Pirates have been on the verge of winning a Southern Conference wrestling title.

And although Coach John Welborn admits that this year's team is younger than last, this could be the year with a little luck.

The Bucs started things off well enough, winning the mythical North Carolina State Collegiate Wrestling title for the second straight year. Five Pirates captured individual titles in the 10-event meet.

"We are young," Welborn said. "Of the 22 wrestlers we have, 11 of them are freshman. And with 22 depth could be a problem if we have any injuries. But I hope that by the end of the year, our young wrestlers will have come along and help us out in the Southern Conference championships."

There are seven lettermen back this year. They include Ronnie Williams, Steve Morgan, Robert Corbo, Mike Spohn, John Carroll, Bob Vosberg and Joe DeVersa.

Spohn is the only returning member of the team who is a defending Southern Conference champion. He won at the 158-

pound level, but he'll probably go at 150 this year," Welborn pointed out.

Last year, the Bucs were 9-1-1, and their lone loss was a one-point affair. They were second in the conference meet to William & Mary, a team they beat in dual competition.

"I feel like William & Mary is the team to be in the conference, but I think we are the only ones with a chance to go it," Welborn said. "It really depends on how our freshmen come along. If we are ready, it should be a real nip and tuck affair right down to the final match."

Running down each of the weight classes, Welborn pointed

out his top men.

At 118, letterman Ronnie Williams, a native of Greenville, is the leading candidate. "He should have a real good year," Welborn said. "He might even be national caliber by the end of the year. He was second in the state last year, and won the title this year."

Backing him up is Robert Vroom, a freshman from Commack, N. Y., who "just needs experience." He was third in the national Junior Olympics at 122 last summer, and finished third in this year's N.C. Collegiate.

Dan Monroe, a freshman from Warners, N.Y., is the leading candidate at 126. "He was second in his state last year in high school. He reached the finals of the Thanksgiving Open in Norfolk this fall, and was second in the state Saturday. He's going to be a real surprise for us."

Backing him up is Glenn Baker, another freshman, from Massena, N.Y. Baker was fourth in the state, and brings a 64-2 high school record, and All-American ranking with him. "He's going to be real good with experience."

At 134 is veteran Steve Morgan, a senior from Valdwinville, N.Y. "He never has reached his potential with us. He was second in the conference last year, but was hurt and had to forfeit. He was the state title this year," Welborn said.

Roger Lundy, a sophomore from Virginia Beach, Va., provide the depth here. Lundy finished third in Saturday's state competition. Robert Corbo, another veteran will hold down the 142-pound class. A junior from Union, N.J., Corbo is another who hasn't reached his potential, according to the coach. "He was second in the conference and in the state last year, and was second this year, too, in the state." Backing him up is Tim Medicus, a junior college transfer from Cantonville, N.Y.

Mike Spohn, a senior from Frankfort, N.Y., is the Southern champ at 158, and won at the Thanksgiving event, where he was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler in the event. He also captured another state title this year. "He also is national caliber material," Welborn said. Providing the depth is letterman John Carroll, a junior from Bladensburg, Md., who was second in the state last year.

At 158 is Robert Vosberg, a senior from Greene, N.Y., who was second in the conference last year, and second at the Thanksgiving Open. Behind him is Bruce Hall, a freshman from Arlington, Va.

Roger Ingalls, a junior college transfer from Unadilla, N.Y., is the 165 leader. He was second in the national Junior College tourney last year, won at Thanksgiving, and was second in the state.

At 177, Bill Hill, a freshman from Norfolk, Va., is a former state high school champ. He also took a state title this past weekend. Backing him up is Joe DeVersa, of Virginia Beach, who was second in the Thanksgiving event, and was fourth in the state meet at 190.

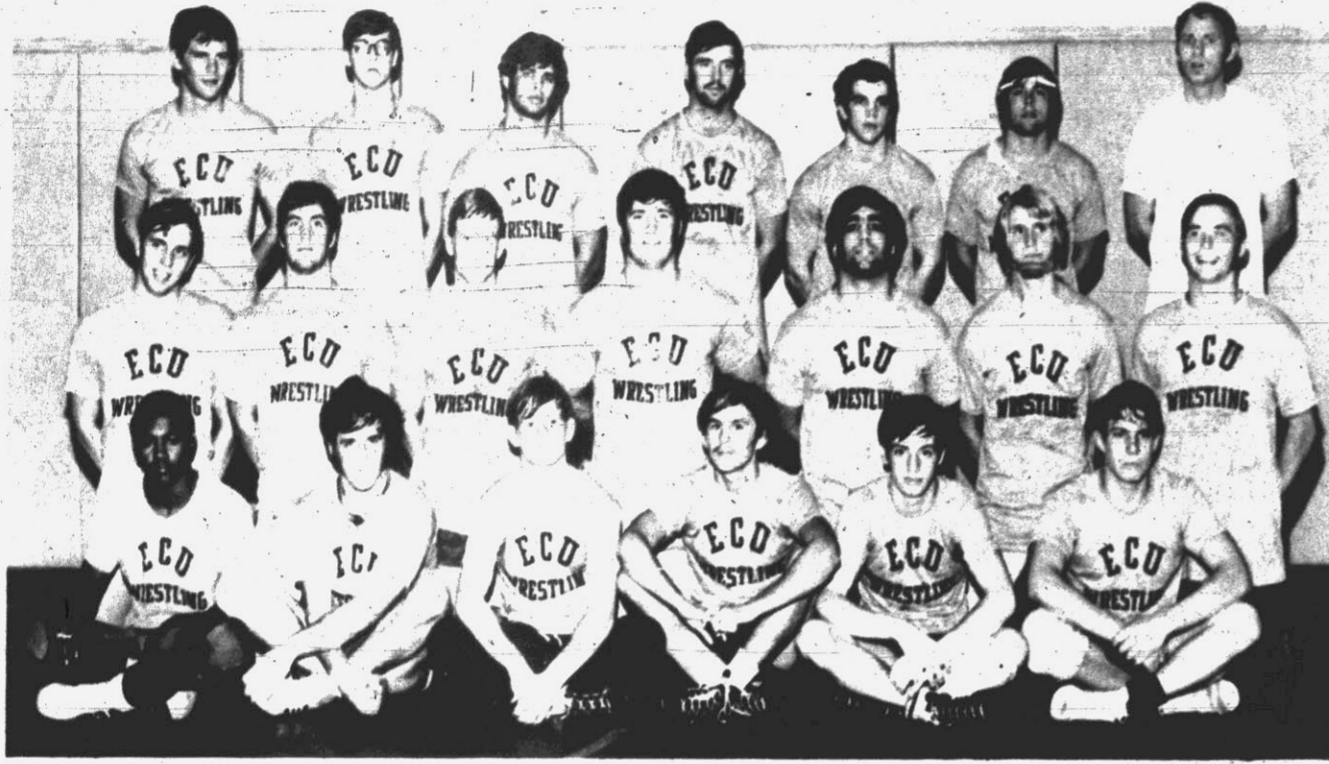
Tim Gay, a freshman from East Rochester, N.Y., is the 190-pound leader, and won the state

title Saturday. He also was a winner in the Thanksgiving tournament, and a former New York state champ.

In the heavyweight class, Welborn has several, including Mark Pohren, a junior from Brighton, Iowa, and an Iowa high school third place finisher. He was third in the state meet Saturday. Also in the group is Joe Tkach of Jacksonville, a

high school champion, and John Huber, a freshman from Greenbrook, N.J.

"We also have some help this year from one of our former team members, Tim Ellenberger, and another graduate assistant, Steve Jackowski, whom I was associated with in high schools in New York," Welborn said. "They are going to help our program a lot."

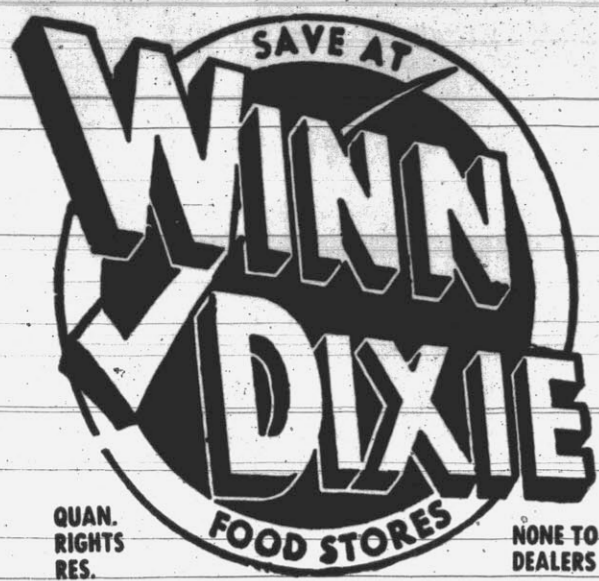

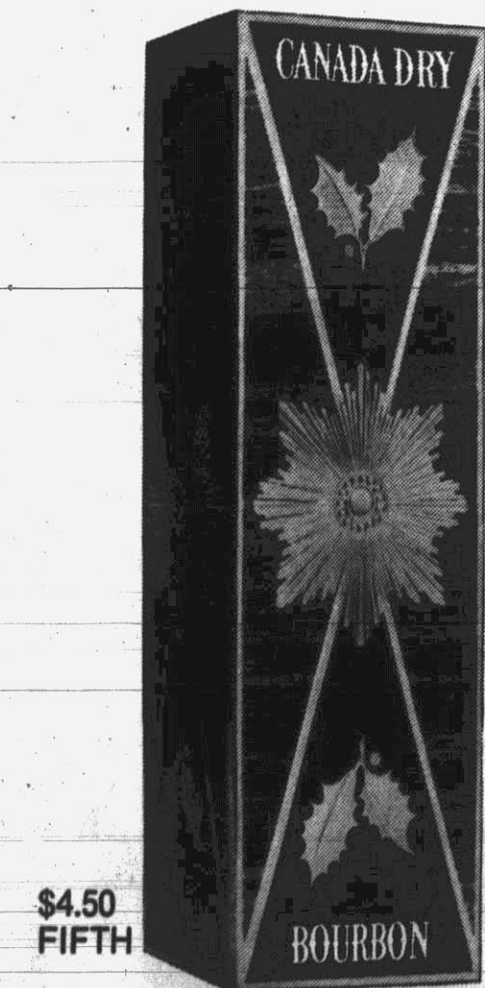

# Sentiment Of No Concession To Kidnappers

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Sentiment is increasing in Brazil's military government against making concessions to the kidnapers of Swiss Ambassador Giovanni Bucher.

Authoritative sources say a growing hard-line faction feels that if the government gives in every time there is a political kidnaping, there will be a spiral of abductions.

Another faction, made up mostly of ex-army officers, is said to feel that if the government does not do its best to get Bucher released, it will be "setting a bad example and will forcibly lower its moral standing among other nations."

Brazil has gained the release of three kidnaped diplomats in the past two years by bowing to terrorist demands for the freeing of political prisoners.

In Bern, Swiss government sources said they expect the Brazilian government to meet promptly whatever terms the kidnapers might be demanding for Bucher's release.

Officials said they had no confirmation yet of what the demands were, but that Switzerland will insist that any terms including the release of political prisoners be met.

Police and officials were studying two documents they said were the first word from the terrorists who kidnaped the ambassador.

One of the documents was said to be a manifesto from the kidnapers, and the other reportedly was a letter written by Bucher. Both were said to be hand-written in French.

Someone called the Swiss Embassy Tuesday afternoon and said an envelope containing the documents had been left at a Roman Catholic church in suburban Tijuca. Police picked up the envelope and began checking the authenticity of the documents.

Police had received several previous notes purportedly from the kidnapers but had ruled them "unauthentic" because they contained nothing from Bucher to prove that he was being held by the senders.

Bucher was snatched from his limousine at gunpoint while on his way to the Swiss Embassy. A Brazilian federal police agent riding with him as a bodyguard was wounded and was in critical condition in a hospital.

A terrorist group called the Popular Revolutionary Vanguard, or VPR, has claimed responsibility for the kidnaping.

# No Relaxing Disney Cartoon Standards

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Starting with "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," every cartoon feature from the Disney studio over a 30-year period bore the personal stamp of Walt Disney himself. "The Aristocats" is the first one that doesn't.

The Disney organization is releasing its latest full-length cartoon at Christmas time, helping parents with the increasing problem of how to find movies the kids can see. "The Aristocats" will be closely examined by critics for evidences of change, now that the master's hand no longer rules the product. "Jungle Book" was the last animated feature to be supervised by Disney, who died four years ago this month.

The critics will find no major difference in "The Aristocats." It displays the meticulous animation, beguiling characters and robust humor that have marked previous Disney features. Plus the cuteness that seems to bug highbrow critics.

The Disney system continues. The man who now oversees the cartoons as producer is a long-time Disney hand, Wolfgang "Wooley" Reitherman. He admitted the loss that he and the other animation makers feel about Walt.

"During the production process, Walt saw what we were doing," said Reitherman. "He let us know if we were on the right track or not. He gave us the vote of confidence that we needed to go ahead."

"You need that at stages when you start to get tunnel vision and you can't get an overall view. Now, instead of Walt, we get our own feedback from the screen. We run what we have made thus far, and the screen tells us if we are on the right track."

"The Aristocats" is one of the few Disney cartoon features based on an original story. It is the first to feature cats as the main figures.

"The Aristocats" began as a live-action script, then Walt said, "I think it would play better as a cartoon." He saw some of the preliminary sketches and gave the project the go-ahead. Shortly afterward he died.

The Disney cartoon features remain unique in the film industry, which is turning out other products faster and faster.

"There seems to be no way we can make them in less than three years," said Reitherman. "Actually, the first two years are spent in trying to master the picture, then the final year comprises most of the making of it. But we've never found any shortcuts."

# Heat Delays Fire Fight

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The task of controlling the worst fire in the history of the oil industry was complicated today by heat coming from the off-shore blaze.

Shell Oil Co. has been drilling three relief wells near its platform 65 miles south of here and 10 miles off the coast where an explosion touched off the fire Dec. 1.

Intense heat from the fire prevented placement of a platform for use by the crew that eventually will bring the wild wells under control.

A fourth movable rig was on the way to drill another relief hole.

A body was found Tuesday in the Gulf of Mexico about four miles from the burning platform. Gary Cole of Krotz Springs has been listed as missing since the explosion.

Three other men died of injuries in the explosion and fire and more than a dozen of the 60 men on the platform still are hospitalized.

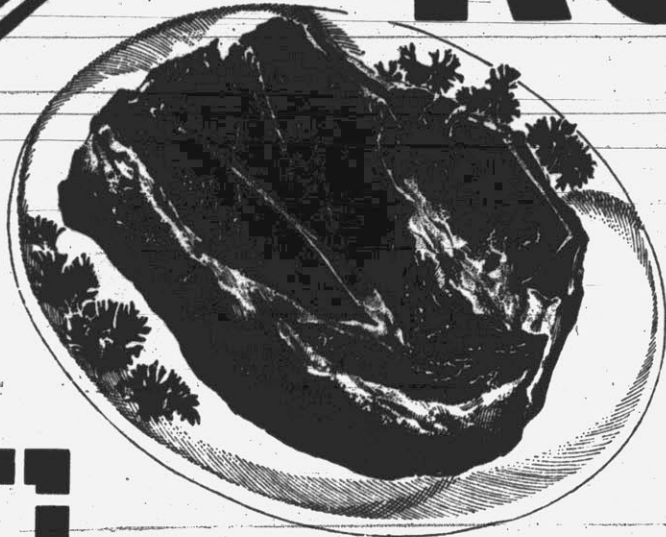

But you can give yourself the equivalent of a college education meanwhile, if you follow Charley's example!

CASE P-508: Charley V., aged 38, is serving a 2-year prison term.

"Dr. Crane," he began, "I have been granted permission to teach about 50 of the other inmates a course on 'Rehabilitation.'"

"My wife sent me a copy of your 'Compiment Club' booklet, which has been a very popular and helpful project."

"But many of these men, especially of foreign background, are not very deft at reading English."

"So could you please send me a few other booklets that might be of aid?"

"Especially, I'd like the one on 'Tutoring Your Child to Read,' as well as the 'Vocational Guidance Booklet,' and the one on 'How to Write Salable Copy.'"

"Thanks for any favors you can extend to us."

Many of you are familiar with the very inspiring story about the famous "Bird Man of Alcatraz."

O. Henry was also one of the greatest short story writers of all time, and he was a prison inmate, too.

St. Paul was likewise a chained jailbird, whose famous letters to the Ephesians, Galatians, Romans et al., make up part of the New Testament section of the Bible.

Even Jesus was also a prisoner!

So don't become unduly discouraged just because you

happen to have made such a serious mistake that you end up behind iron bars.

Instead, utilize that time to prepare yourself for a new and lawful career after you get back into civilian life.

Same goes for thousands of you smart boys in Military Service!

The usual person idles away his years in prison or in the Army and Navy; then has nothing much to show for his time.

The ambitious fellows prod themselves into studying and planning for the future.

When my oldest son, Dr. Philip M. Crane, now a U. S. Congressman of Illinois, was in the Army in Europe, I urged him to memorize at least one choice quotation every day from the bottom of various pages in my college textbook, "Psychology Applied."

For there are over 200 such gems of poetry, science and philosophy at the foot of 200 pages in that text.

"Music," said John Erskine, "is the only language in which you cannot say a mean or sarcastic thing."

That's a superb starter for a talk before a music class!

"Architecture is frozen music," makes another superb opener for an address before various groups.

West opened the nine of spades against the final contract, declarer played the four from dummy and East put up the jack which held the trick. The eight of diamonds was returned and when South followed with the four, West was in with the queen.

West switched back to the eight of spades and declarer put up North's ace. The A-K-Q of hearts pulled the outstanding trumps and a club was led to the ace.

A diamond was led from dummy, East followed with the five and the moment of decision had arrived. South decided, on the basis of East's original lead of the eight of diamonds, to play the latter for a doubleton and he put up the ace of diamonds from his hand.

Declarer's only chance to eliminate one of his remaining two losers was to exit with a diamond and hope that the defender that gained the lead was out of spades. West went in with the king of diamonds and since he had only clubs left in his hand, the forced return permitted South to ruff in the dummy while he discarded the ten of spades from his hand.

Declarer's losers on the deal consisted of one spade and two diamonds.

## Safer Tree On Christmas Is Possible

A recipe for making Christmas trees safer is included in safety tips passed on by Fire Marshal Mike Worthington. Underwritten by the National Fire Protection Association, the solution for Christmas trees is simple to prepare and use.

Mix four tablespoons of micronized iron or any other tree preservative available from florists. Add two cups of light corn syrup, and four tablespoons of chlorinated household bleach. Get the freshest tree available, cut off the trunk one inch above the old cut. Pour the liquid preservative in the tree holder, and set the tree in the holder. Worthington said additional preservative made by the above recipe should be added as needed. Water can be used to keep the container filled, but not much water should be used.

Other standard precautions listed by Worthington to add to the safety of Christmas trees

# Defector's Fate Graphically Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite the pleas and advice of a civilian former refugee, the Coast Guard allowed Russian seamen to take back a Lithuanian sailor trying to defect, Congress has been told.

In graphic detail, Robert M. Brieze, president of the New Bedford, Mass., Seafood Producers Association, told a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee how Simas Kudirka was held for a time, then returned to his ship "either unconscious or dead" in the hands of the Soviets.

Brieze's account was "about as sickening a story as I've ever heard," said Rep. Wayne L. Hays, chairman of the subcommittee.

Brieze, a refugee from Soviet-occupied Latvia, was aboard the cutter Vigilant Nov. 22 to take part in talks with representatives of a Russian fishing fleet.

When he learned of Kudirka's presence aboard the Coast Guard vessel, Brieze said, he urged the captain, Cmdr. Ralph W. Eustis, to call the Baltic Affairs desk of the State Department. Department testimony
