

Clemency Plan For Draft Evaders, Deserters Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford proclaimed a clemency program today for thousands of Vietnam war deserters and draft resisters "in furtherance of our national commitment to justice and mercy."

A key feature of the program would require deserters and draft evaders to spend up to 24 months in low-paying jobs judged to promote the "national health, safety or interest." There would be no minimum time period for "alternate service jobs" and reductions from the 24 months service period would be dependent on military service records and "other mitigating factors."

All those wanting to accept the amnesty opportunity would have to turn themselves in before Jan. 31. Draft evaders would report to the United States attorney where an offense was committed and deserters would report to appropriate military commanders.

Ford also set up a nine-member Presidential Clemency Board to handle the cases of those already convicted of draft evasion or absence from military service.

"The board has been instructed

to give priority consideration to individuals currently confined," the White House press office said in a fact sheet. "The President also has asked that their confinement be suspended as soon as possible, pending the board's review."

Ford briefed Republican and Democratic leaders of Congress before making details of the clemency program public.

"It is not amnesty," House Republican Leader John Rhodes said after the briefing. "It sets forth a mechanism under which these young men can rehabilitate themselves..."

Senate Republican Whip Robert Griffin of Michigan said most participants in the briefing were pleased with the make-up of the clemency board.

However, both Rhodes and Griffin acknowledged that some congressional leaders at the meeting voiced opposition to Ford's action.

The President also provided for a new type of military discharge, a clemency discharge, that would go to military personnel who satisfactorily participated in the clemency plan.

In a proclamation and accompanying the executive order establishing the program, Ford did not specify the precise

kinds of alternate service that would be required.

But the White House press office said there would be a ban on jobs "for which there are more numerous qualified applicants than jobs available." The press office also said pay would compare reasonably with that of men or women entering military service.

Young Americans who fled to other countries to avoid military service would be granted a 15-day grace period after re-entering the country before they would have to report to appropriate authorities.

All participants in the program would have to acknowl-

edge allegiance to the United States.

Those who shun the program or do not satisfactorily complete their part of the clemency offer would be subject to prosecution.

Ford, in explaining his move, said in the proclamation:

"In furtherance of our national commitment to justice and mercy these young Americans should have the chance to contribute a share to the rebuilding of peace among ourselves and with all nations. They should be allowed the opportunity to earn return to their country, their communities and their families, upon their agree-

ment to a period of alternate service in the national interest, together with an acknowledgment of their allegiance to the country and its Constitution."

'No. 1' Rescue Squad

Greenville Rescue Squad competition teams added two more trophies to the squad's large collection of awards Saturday as they took first place in heavy duty rescue and first aid competitions at the 18th annual conference of the North Carolina Association of Rescue Squads, held in Charlotte Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Greenville squad's sweeping victory in state competition was a repeat performance of last year's efforts when local teams took top honors in both competitions.

Placing second and third behind Greenville in the heavy rescue contest were teams from Elkin Rescue Squad and Rowan County Rescue Squad. A team from the Orange County Rescue Squad (Hillsborough) placed second in the First Aid contest while third place in that competition went to the Gates County Rescue Squad team.

The junior first aid competition award went to the Alleghany County junior first aid team, made up of young Boy Scouts.

Greenville rescue and first aid teams have, over the years, consistently placed high in state and international competition. The two trophies won Saturday will be added to display cases at the city's central fire station that already contain eight international awards and 21 trophies given by the North Carolina Association of Rescue Squads that local teams have taken over the past 13 years.

The previous awards include an international heavy rescue championship (the Greenville squad was the first U.S. team ever to win first place in international rescue competition) and a total of 14 state rescue and first aid championships.

Commenting on the squad's impressive record over the years, rescue team captain Tony Brannon said, "We don't give up. We may get beat one year, but we just practice a

Horne Quits Pitt Development Post

James R. Horne Jr., executive director of the Pitt County Development Commission since 1971, has resigned to accept a position with the Georgia Chamber of Commerce.

Horne, who tendered his resignation last week to Commission chairman Corey Stokes, effective Sept. 30, said today that he has accepted a post as manager of the Industrial Development Council of the Georgia Chamber in Atlanta.

Horne said that he viewed the Georgia opportunity as one that, professionally, he could not afford to turn down. He noted that after spending "a good deal of my working life in the Atlanta area," he will be returning to home territory in a sense.

"I certainly have mixed emotions about leaving," he commented.

Asserting that, "Pitt County is certainly one of the most desirable areas in which industry seeks to locate," he said that "I don't expect anything but great things for this area for years to come."

Horne said that he feels he is "leaving the county in good shape" with over 1,200 jobs in the making and an industrial base in excess of \$50 million with two additional industrial announcements eminent.

Saying that "I feel that things are looking up," he said that "we have had our share of excellent prospects and I certainly expect that to continue." He also pointed to the "very good relationships with the... State Division of Commerce and Industry and I expect that to continue."

Horne commented, "I want to thank everybody in the county. Everyone has just been great. I really think everybody put their best foot forward and it has paid off."

He added, "I hope that the Commission will move to fill this position as soon as possible in keeping with the requirements and qualifications for the job."

An Alabama native, Horne came to Pitt County in February of 1971 to succeed the retiring

executive director, Dr. Sylvester Greene. He moved here from Charlotte where he was associated with the American Management Association.

Stokes, contacted this morning, said that, "I am extremely sorry that he has decided to take the new position" but under the circumstances regarding "difference in pay and position he will be filling, you could not blame him."

He said that Horne "has done an excellent job and the county should be grateful for the major industries he has secured."

Stokes said that the Development Commission will meet Wednesday and no action concerning a successor will be taken until that time. He said that a committee will be named to begin the search for a new executive director.

'Unorthodox' Plan For Med School Opposed

RALEIGH (AP)—East Carolina University backers have voiced opposition to an unconventional plan for expanding ECU Medical School because it does not include a traditional program for second-year medical students.

Dr. Leo Jenkins, ECU Chancellor, said Saturday that the 1974 legislative mandate to expand the medical school would be satisfied only by the addition of a sophomore year to the school. He was joined by several other ECU backers in the legislature.

Officials of the University of North Carolina responsible for planning the expansion of the ECU medical school are considering an eight-year program which would begin after the sophomore or junior year of college and last through a three-year residency in family practice.

Students would spend most of their third and fourth year of

the program enrolled in sophomore and junior courses at the UNC Medical School in Chapel Hill.

The plan is now in the form of a nine-page preliminary draft. Jenkins said he had "glanced" it.

"It is my understanding that the General Assembly intended a second year—a sophomore year," Jenkins said in a telephone interview from Greenville. He said he feels "honor bound" to follow the legislature's intention.

Sen. Ralph Scott, D-Alamance, and Rep. Carl J. Stewart, D-Gaston, sponsored the compromise bill in the legislature authorizing expenditure of \$15 million to increase enrollment in ECU's first-year medical program and add "a second year."

In telephone interviews Saturday, Scott and Stewart both said the intention of the legislation was to establish a regular sophomore year and not to add some other year to the ECU program.

Ford Meeting Press Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford will hold a news conference to be broadcast on television and radio from the East Room at 8 p.m. EDT today, a spokesman said.

The session will be the second of Ford's five-week-old presidency and comes the same day as he signed executive orders implementing his program of clemency for Vietnam-era draft evaders and deserters.

Questioning of the President is certain to focus on his controversial pardon for former President Richard M. Nixon.

Doby At Airport Tuesday

N.C. Secretary of Transportation Troy Doby will speak briefly at the Pitt-Greenville Airport tomorrow at 3:30 p.m. when an inaugural ceremony will be held for the expanded Wheeler Airline service to Norfolk, Va.

Wheeler was given a \$140,000 grant from the Coastal Plains Regional Commission to aid in the expansion. The expanded service will be operated on a one-year demonstration project.

The public is invited to attend a brief ceremony at the airport tomorrow when Doby and other officials will arrive on a flight from Elizabeth City, returning from Norfolk.

Also arriving will be Warren Wheeler of Wheeler Airlines and Jack Hawke of the Coastal Plains Commission.

Wheeler will offer three round-trips daily to Norfolk with flights originating in Raleigh.

FORGOTTEN LUGGAGE LOST

After arriving at the Raleigh-Durham airport, I realized I had left a hanging bag at home with most of my clothes. A Piedmont official said we could have the clothes sent to Hawaii from Kinston. I had a friend take the bag to the Kinston airport where it was to begin its journey. It never reached Hawaii and no one seems to know where the bag is now. Someone in Kinston was supposed to be helping me with the problem. They were to send me a claim form, but I haven't heard from this. Mrs. D.P.

After several weeks of searching, Piedmont stated they couldn't find your bag and indicated they would start processing your claim form. Then a Piedmont representative called Hotline to say that your bag might not be covered by their insurance because you didn't accompany it on the flight. Recent regulations state that unclaimed baggage cannot be carried by airlines. The Piedmont official acknowledged that it was an unusual situation and further checking into their insurance clauses would have to be made. It was stressed, however, that Piedmont officials had not indicated to you that they would not accept responsibility for the clothing. A week later Piedmont notified Hotline that they would honor your claim and pay \$147 for your lost clothing.

Take A Miracle

NEW YORK (AP) — Newsweek magazine quotes the personal physician to resigned President Richard M. Nixon as saying Nixon's phlebitis condition has deteriorated until "it's going to take a miracle for him to recover..."

The physician, Maj. Gen. Walter Tkach, reportedly added that Nixon's condition is so critical that he did not discuss the situation with Pat Nixon "for fear of frightening her."

"I guess she'll read this now and I guess that's good," Tkach said in the article published Sunday.

Nixon's chronic phlebitis has swollen his left leg, and Tkach fears a blood clot might form that could lodge in the ex-President's heart.

The doctor wants to hospitalize Nixon and begin intravenous treatment with anticoagulants that could prevent clots and keep the blood flowing.

Tkach said he will continue trying to persuade Nixon to enter a hospital, but the former President has said, "If I go into the hospital, I'll never come out alive."

There has been no comment on Nixon's condition from his San Clemente estate, where he was in seclusion.

Newsweek also quoted an unnamed source close to the office of special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski as saying Nixon knew in advance about the campaign intelligence unit that conducted the Watergate break-in.

"They can tie Nixon into the planning of the break-in. That's the bottom line," the source told Newsweek.

New Daredevil Plans A 'Jump'

NASHVILLE, Tenn.(AP)— Call it what you'd like, a Sky Mower or a Sky Blade, but popular Nashville songwriter Eddie Miller says he's gunning for one-upmanship over Evel Knievel. Knievel's lucrative but unsuccessful attempt to jump the Snake River Canyon in his Sky Cycle was expected to open the floodgates for future death-defying feats.

Miller says he's responding to the call—because it's too late to back out of his mission—and that the betting has already begun.

"Well, we were sitting around the drug store where we usually drink coffee," Miller said, "when I first mentioned what I plan to do. Soon the word got out and people started placing bets and when I walk down the street, people roll down their windows and wish me luck."

"I've already bought my own equipment and I guess this thing has gone too far now to back out. So, I'm going to go through with it."

The preparations are nearing the final stages, says Miller, but a scheduled launching date has not been firmly set, but he's shooting for sometime in October.

"There's a drainage ditch in my front yard and I'm going to build a ramp and jump it on my Sears riding lawnmower," he said, seriously.

"The ditch is two inches deep, but I'm going to build a four-inch ramp to give me the necessary altitude. It is two feet, three inches wide, but it sounds wider if you say it's 27 inches."

"One of the biggest problems is the big tree on the other side. I've been trying to work out the proper engineering techniques to decelerate my vehicle quick enough to avoid hitting the tree."

"If the tests prove successful, I plan to carry a large umbrella to stop me short of hitting the tree."

Union Has \$850,000 To Donate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The maritime unions still have \$886,000 for political donations, after pouring one-third of a million dollars into campaigns of congressmen who supported them on a hotly disputed shipping bill.

Latest campaign finance reports show the unions have given \$333,300 to 141 congressmen who supported the bill. The measure would require that eventually 30 per cent of all U.S. oil imports be shipped in American-flag ships, manned by union crews.

The unions still have some of the richest political trusts in the nation, the reports show.

Federal law sets no limit on political donations by union groups, so long as the funds come from voluntary contributions of members. Direct donations from a union treasury to political campaigns are illegal.

Most of the money, \$595,000, is held by three trusts run by the Marine Engineers Beneficial Association. Other rich trusts are run by the Seafarers International Union and the Masters, Mates and Pilots, and other maritime unions.

The reports show the union money given to incumbents since Jan. 1 has gone almost exclusively to those who voted for the bill or supported it in some way. Maritime donations

went to only three congressmen and one senator who voted against the bill.

The senator, Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., gave \$8,500 back to the marine engineers union two days before the Senate vote on Sept. 5. A spokesman declined comment when asked if Javits had feared the money would create a conflict of interest.

The largest donation by the unions went to Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., who denied that the \$20,000 received by him created any conflict. Long is chairman of the Merchant Marine subcommittee, and as floor manager of the bill he guided it to passage.

The second-largest donation

went to Long's counterpart in the House, Rep. Frank M. Clark, D-Pa., chairman of the Merchant Marine subcommittee, which cleared the bill before the House approved it last May. Clark got \$17,500.

The third-largest sum went to House Democratic Leader Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass. He received \$16,000.

The maritime unions seemed to put their donations where they would do the most good. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., chairman of the Commerce Committee and one of the bill's sponsors, got \$12,900, some of it around the time the committee was holding hearings on the measure.

Another sponsor, Sen. Bob Packwood, D-Ore., got \$10,000. Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, a vocal supporter of the bill, re-

ceived \$12,800. He also received a \$25,000 loan, not yet repaid.

Other big donations went to Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., \$14,500; Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, defeated for re-nomination, \$13,000; Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, \$10,000; Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton, D-Mo., \$7,500, and Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., \$7,200.

N.C. Counts 11 Deaths In Its Weekend Traffic

The Highway Patrol says a young woman fell off the top of a camper trailer while trying to get to the moving Jeep towing it.

She was Betty Kay Morgan, 22, of Durham. The accident occurred Sunday night near Holly Springs, 10 miles southwest of Raleigh.

She was among the 11 persons killed in traffic accidents

in North Carolina over the weekend.

The death toll for the year rose to 1,060, but was still 266 fewer than at the similar time last year.

Fred Davis Greene, 76, of Cliffsides near Shelby, was killed and seven persons were injured in the collision of two cars near Cliffsides.

Noah Smith, 49, of Laurinburg, died in a collision on a rural road for miles north of Laurinburg.

The body of Charles Harold Williams, 35, of Polkton, was found early Sunday on a rural road two miles west of Ansonville in Polk County. The patrol said he apparently was a hit-and-run victim.

A pedestrian, Fred Berry, 59, was struck and killed by a car near his home in Grandy, Currituck County.

Pearl Evonne Rhodes, 31, of Rt. 1, Salisbury, was sitting in the road when she was fatally struck by a car near Salisbury, the patrol said.

Clyde Thomas Hayes, 17, of Rt. 2, Wilkesboro, a pedestrian, was struck and killed by a vehicle five miles south of Wilkesboro.

David Paul Caudel, 16, of Rt. 1, Marshville, lost his life when

the car in which he was riding was in a head-on crash with another near Monroe.

A man with an unusual first name, Cleo Arthur Jones, 25, of Wilson, was killed when his bicycle and a car collided near Wilson.

Don Webster Murphy, 26, of Greensboro, was fatally injured when his motorcycle collided with a car near Jamestown in Guilford County.

Lloyd Fisher Jr., 38, died when his car ran off a rural road near his home at Lewiston in Bertie County.

Sees 50-50 Chance Of A 'Very Cold Winter'

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The South enjoyed an unusually mild winter last year, but an Atlanta meteorologist says it is better than 50-50 that the coming winter will be very cold.

Bill March of the Fernbank Science Center says the climate of the United States is gradually becoming cooler as the result of a 12 per cent growth in the northern polar ice cap in the past decade.

"We're definitely in an ice age," says March.

Acknowledging the unusually balmy weather in the Southeast last year, March points out that much of the rest of the nation suffered through unusually cold temperatures. And this past summer was exceptionally cool in the northern states, he added.

"... I definitely think there is more than a 50-50 chance that we will have a very cold winter in Georgia this year," he concludes.

But meteorologist R. W. Harms of the National Weather Service in Atlanta isn't making any predictions. And he's skeptical of the theory that the nation's weather is becoming colder.

Harms says that hypothesis got a boost several years ago when meteorologists noticed that average temperatures around the country were dropping, and many concluded the climate was changing.

He says it was because official thermometers were being moved from downtown areas, warmed up by pollution and other urban factors, to airports

away from the center cities.

"It's almost impossible to tell if the climate is changing," according to Harms, "because our weather records only date back a hundred years or so. To determine if the climate is changing would require at least 300 years of records."

Plans To Keep Penny Gumball

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The gumball might be hollower and the chicle-chew might be a little less chewy, but one major producer of penny gum is determined to keep the price at one penny each.

"We experimented with a two-cent vending machine in one town and, to me, it is not the way to go," says Leo Leary, president of the Ford Gum & Machinery Co. of nearby Akron, N.Y.

Leary said a finished gumball is 75 per cent sugar, and the price of sugar has skyrocketed in just one year from \$14 to \$40 per 100 pounds.

Q.1—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠75 ♥A3 ♦AK1093 ♣Q642
The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1♦ Pass 1♦ Pass
What do you bid now?
A.—One no trump. Even though the hand may play better at a minor suit, it is better to limit the strength of your opening as soon as possible. A two club rebid, which could be made on a much stronger hand, is apt to encourage partner to bid again on inadequate values, with the result that you may get dangerously high.

Q.2—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠Q83 ♥87 ♦KQ107 ♣AQJ2
The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1♦ Pass 1♦ Pass
What do you bid now?
A.—Two spades. If you do not raise immediately with three trumps to the queen and a ruffing value, partner is unlikely to expect you to have such fine support for his suit. In addition, a two club rebid normally describes at least 5-4 in the minors, which is an unnecessary misdescription considering the alternative.

Q.3—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠75 ♥A3 ♦AK1093 ♣Q642
The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1♦ Pass 1NT Pass
What do you bid now?
A.—Two clubs. Since partner would strain to bid a four-card major if he held one, and would raise diamonds with adequate support, it is quite likely that, on this auction, he holds four or five clubs. Uncovering the fit might enable us to compete and buy the contract against a possible opposing part score in one of the majors.

Q.4—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠KJ764 ♥A7 ♦84 ♣J953
The bidding has proceeded:
North East South West
1♦ 1♥ 1♦ Pass
2♦ Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—Pass. It sounds very much as if partner has a six-card diamond suit. He would tend to raise spades with three-card support or show a second suit if he had one. Since he didn't make a jump rebid and you are near minimum for your response, there is little point in trying to improve the contract.

Q.5—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠873 ♥K5 ♦J9763 ♣A82
The bidding has proceeded:
East South West North
1♦ Pass 1NT Pass
2♦ Pass Pass Dble.
Pass ?
What action do you take?
A.—Bid three diamonds. Do not confuse this auction with a double in the immediate seat, which would be for penalties. Partner wants you to bid—he is trying to prevent the opponents from earning a cheap part score. He did not double at his first turn because his hand either was not strong enough or contained a flaw.

Q.6—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠J87 ♥J862 ♦Q76 ♣843
The bidding has proceeded:
West North East South
1♥ Dble. Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—One spade. The trap is to avoid bidding one no trump, which shows a minimum of 7-8 high card points. Partner has asked you to choose a suit, and since you do not have one, the only alternative is to make the cheapest bid available in a three-card suit. Remember, you are not really bidding a suit of your own—in effect, you are supporting partner.

Q.7—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

The bidding has proceeded:
North East South West
1NT 2♥ ?
What do you bid now?
A.—Three clubs. This bid is competitive and is not forcing. True, if partner has good values in clubs, three no trump might be the right contract, but you should not bid it on your own. Partner still has a bid and with club support and a heart stopper, he might convert to three no trump himself.

Q.8—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠7 ♥QJ964 ♦72 ♣K10852
The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
Pass 1♥ 1♦ 2♥
What do you bid now?
A.—Pass. The only justification for a double would be to warn partner not to bid. However, you are unlikely to win friends and impress partner if the opponents proceed to wrap up two hearts doubled, and you certainly do not have enough defensive strength to guarantee that the contract will be defeated. So choose the lesser of evils and pass—after all, opponents have been known to bid on in these circumstances.

Ecevit Will Soon Resign

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Premier Bulent Ecevit announced today he would resign in the next few days because of a split in his coalition cabinet.

Political observers believe that Ecevit, a national hero since Turkey's triumphal invasion of Cyprus, would be asked to form another coalition or a minority government.

Conflict between Ecevit and the allied National Salvation party has been brewing for some time. The premier said recently that there were "almost irreconcilable differences" between the Salvationists, an orthodox Moslem party, and his own leftist Republican People's party.

Two days ago Deputy Premier Necmettin Erbakan, the leader of the Salvationists, said his party would not endorse a visit Ecevit is scheduled to make to Scandinavia.

Ecevit's party is the largest in the National Assembly with 185 of the 450 seats. The Salvationists have 49 seats.

Here for the first time, he will be accompanied by his congregation of Crossways Holiness Church. The pastor, Elder L. Chancy, said the public is invited.

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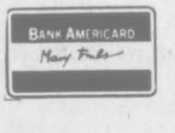
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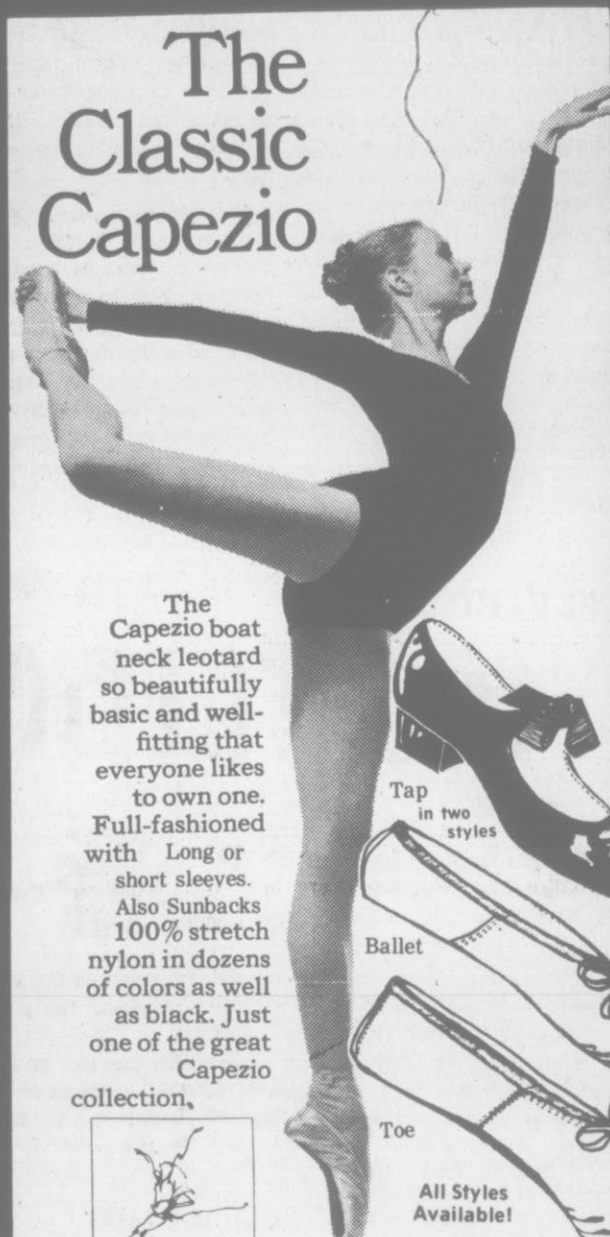


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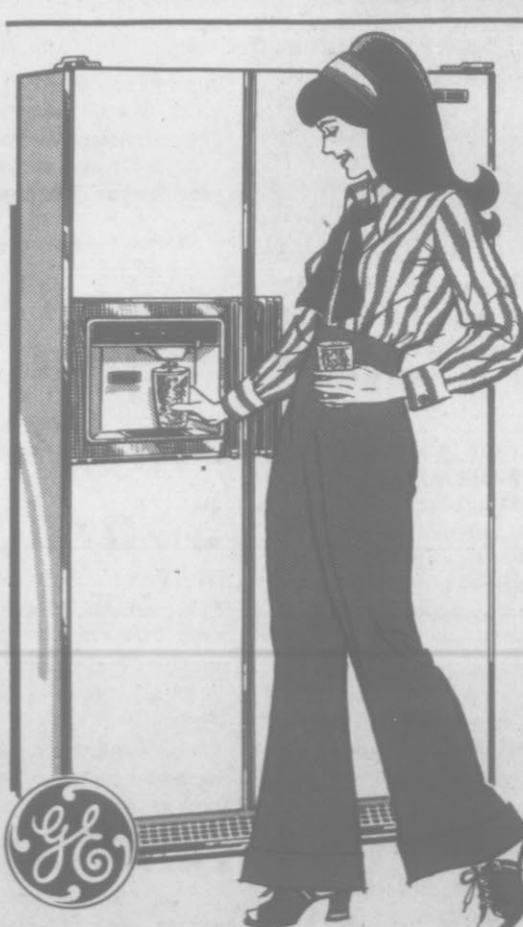
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Burnette-Corey Vows Exchanged On Sunday

Constitution Week To Begin Locally Tuesday

Constitution Week is sponsored nationwide by the Daughters of the American Revolution, Sept. 17-23.

Miss Gertrude Carraway, former president general of the DAR, was directly responsible for the annual designation of the week.

She conceived the idea during a trip to the west in March, 1955, and prepared a tentative resolution submitted to the national chairman of the Resolutions Committee, DAR.

It was adopted April 21, 1955, by the Continental Congress of the DAR as a part of the resolution on the theme for the ensuing year: "Protect America's Future Through Patriotic Education."

On Jan. 5, 1956, Sen. William F. Knowland introduced a bill to have Sept. 17-23 observed as Constitution Week, proclaimed by the President.

The members of the Major Benjamin May Chapter of DAR of this area urge residents to

observe Constitution Week. Dr. Emily Farnham, regent, calls for "a renewed interest and dedication to the national document and appreciation for the events that occurred during Sept. 17-23, 1787."

The U. S. Constitution is 187 years old. It was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, ratified June 21, 1788, and went into effect March 4, 1789. N. C. ratified the Constitution Nov. 21, 1789.

Mayor S. Eugene West has signed a proclamation calling on the citizens of Greenville to observe Sept. 17-23 as Constitution Week in Greenville.

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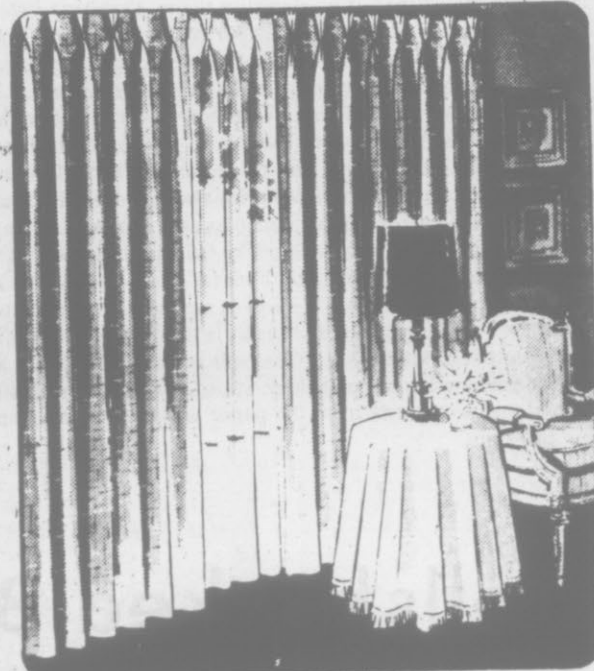
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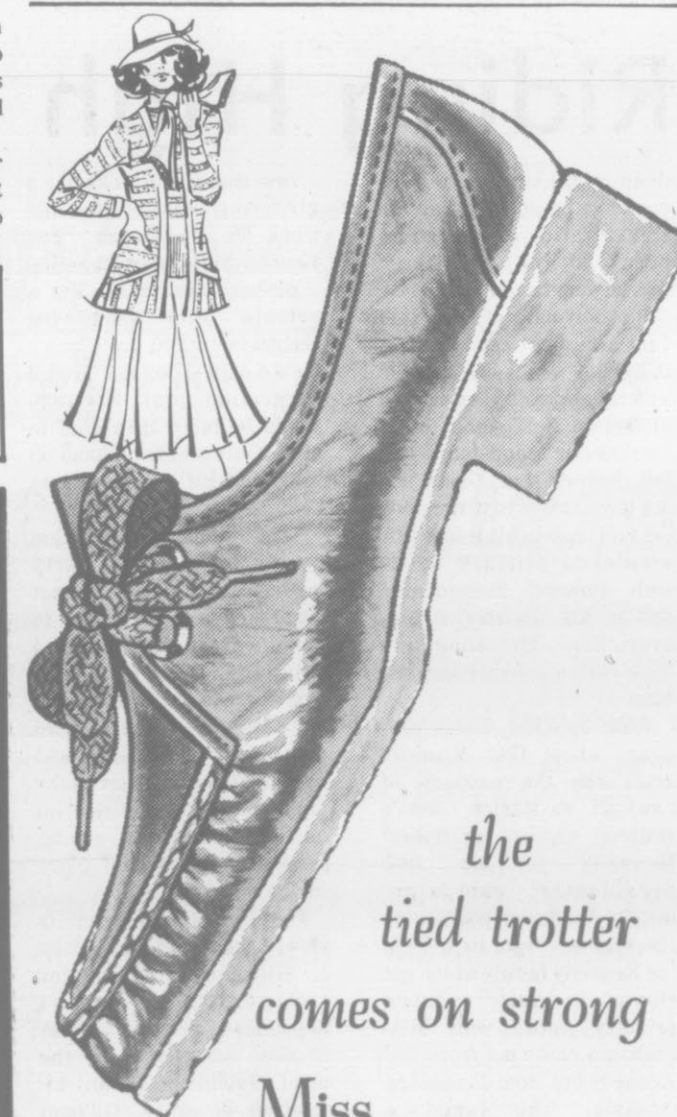
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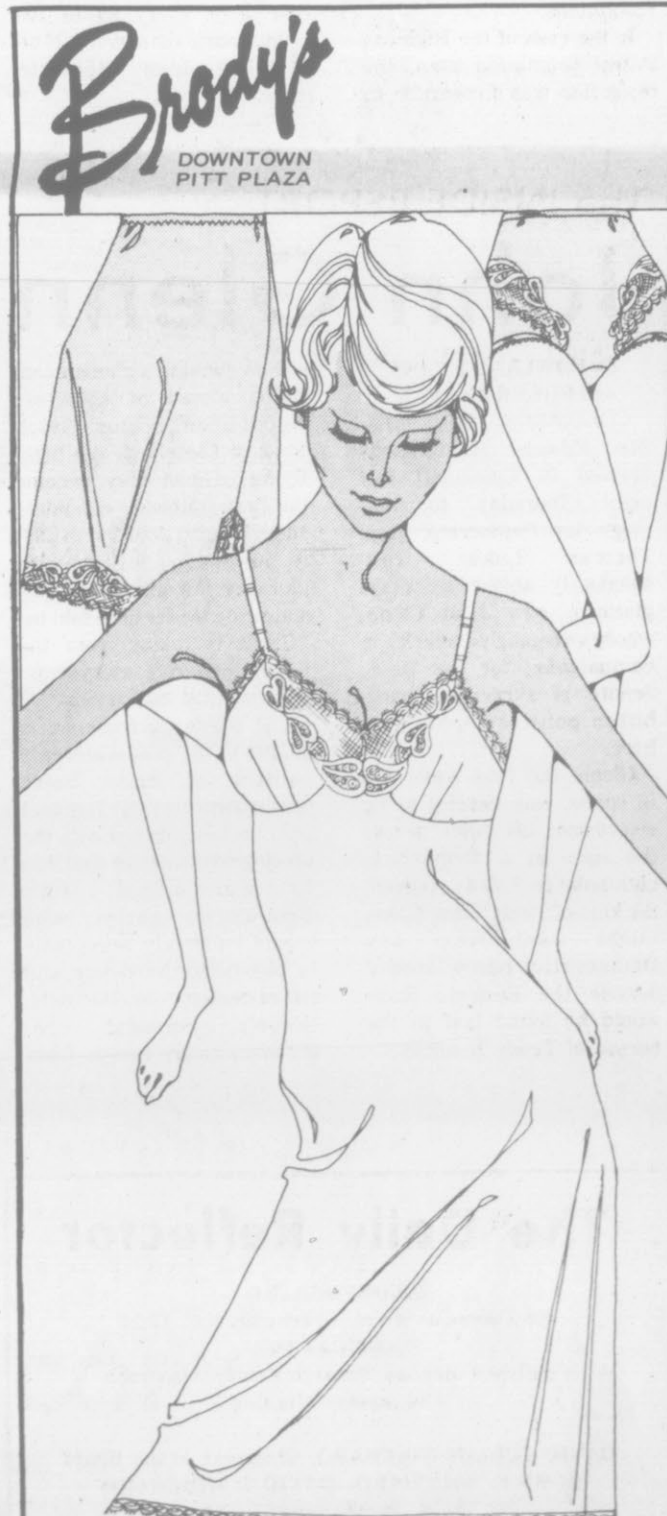

Air Service Grant Welcomed

Wheeler Airlines which has been operating air commuter service between Raleigh and Greenville and Morehead City, this week will begin additional service to Norfolk.

The service was made possible through a grant from the Coastal Plains Regional Commission of \$140,000 for a one-year demonstration commuter airline project.

The Office of Intergovernmental Relations of the Department of Administration will administer the grant and the N.C. Department of Transportation's Division of Aeronautics will provide technical coordination and monitoring of the service.

Wheeler Airlines has operated commuter service to Pitt-Greenville Airport for about a year under a grant and this service will continue. Additionally flights from Pitt-Greenville will land at Elizabeth City and at Norfolk.

The flights of the enterprising Wheeler Airlines from Pitt-Greenville to Raleigh-Durham have been successful and the service has given our city and county an access to commercial air travel which is essential.

This latest grant, which will provide additional

service to Elizabeth City and Norfolk, will give our area an important air link with the Tidewater section. We think it is going to be most important in the future economic development of Eastern North Carolina.

The grant and the accompanying increased service by Wheeler Airlines are welcomed, indeed, by Greenville and Pitt County.

We Just Can't Afford That Inflationary Rate

It has been clear that inflation is far from being under control with a 3.9 percent increase in wholesale prices reported for August.

A news story reporting the increase described prices as "exploding," and that is a very accurate term. If the August rate continues we will see an annual rate of 46.8 percent.

Such inflationary rates as this can't continue, if we are to maintain economic stability in this country.

Two Projects Targeted

RALEIGH—A legislative panel probing governmental spending took steps to chop down two programs recently, but it is still unclear just how much impact the action will have.

Target of the first formal action by the Governmental Expenditure Study Commission were:

—A Highway Patrol plan to promote 42 troopers to field sergeants, increasing the number of supervisors;

—Department of Transportation plans for elaborate rest stops along interstate highways, costing some \$1.2 million each and causing legislators to vigorously denounce what they labeled "million-dollar bathrooms."

Efforts by the joint commission of the state Senate and House of Representatives to take official and firm action against spending programs which are found objectionable took the form of unanimously approved resolutions.

In the case of the Highway Patrol promotion plan, the resolution was forwarded to

patrol officials, the State Personnel Office, and Department of Transportation and Department of Administration chiefs.

Rest Stops

The rest stop proposal was forwarded to the Department of Transportation Secretary Troy Doby, and the Board of Transportation.

Earlier, the spending probes heard a report from Landscape Chief J. A. Saunders spelling out plans for building 17 more of the elaborate rest stops, on top of seven already open, and for renovating an additional number of older facilities, for a total investment of \$50 million. Saunders also explained that each facility required a full-time crew of three men, at a cost of \$50,000 per year at each rest stop for operation and maintenance.

The resolution called for cutting the planned number of rest stops in half; cutting the cost back to no more than \$300,000 each; and locating rest stops every 80 to 100 miles rather than every 30 or 40 miles along interstate routes.

Observers of the spending probe are quick to point out, however, that the effect of this action will probably not be immediate or strong.

State Sen. I. C. Crawford, D-Buncombe County, is chairman of the group. He explains its purpose as monitoring spending programs in a continuing way, and reporting to the General Assembly.

Since the legislature is not in session at this time—and won't be until January, and even then will be made up of a lot of new people—much of the commission material will be lost in the shuffle.

Two Directions

The commission's work at this point has taken two directions: the resolutions just taken, and requests to various department heads that they get information on specific spending questions and report back.

In neither case, however, is there a formal mechanism for guaranteeing results. The commission was established by resolution of the 1974 General Assembly to study and report—action taken has no legal clout.

State employees know this, and the effect of the spending commission's action is more likely to be a speeded up attempt to put criticized programs into action rather than a cutting back. "Executives are more likely to over-react to efforts to stop their pet projects, and may decide to carry out their plans at once before the brakes can be put on after the legislature convenes next year," one insider thinks.

Additionally, the spending commission has no system for following up.

These shortcomings in the legislative process, close observers point out, are common to interim study groups, and even to study activities when the General Assembly is in session.

Crawford, on the other hand, feels the spending probe will serve a useful purpose regardless, and views its purpose as largely educational—informing the public and the General Assembly of abuses, and letting state employees know that somebody is watching the dollars.



They Didn't Get Hired

WASHINGTON—President Ford has been putting his new White House staff together. We have heard about the people who have been hired for his Administration, but we haven't heard anything about those who, for one reason or another, didn't get jobs.

Here are some of the people and what they said to President Ford which gave him pause about hiring them:

"Now, Mr. President, I think the first thing you should do is to install a recording system in the Oval Office. In that way you can tape the conversations of everyone who comes in your office."

"NEXT!"

"Mr. President, it's not too early to think about your election in 1976. I have a plan for your approval here. What I would like to do is set up a committee for your election which would be in complete charge of raising funds and directing your campaign so you wouldn't have to be bothered with the details. We would call this group the Committee to Elect the . . ."

"All right, Gerry, being President is fine, but you have to think about your future after you're out of office. Your best bet, as I see it, is to invest in real estate. Now what I will do is talk to a few rich friends of mine and we'll buy you some land and then we'll get the government to fix it up and . . ."

Other Editors Say In Need Of Trees

(New Orleans Times-Picayune)

Alfred X. Baxter, president of the National Forest Products Association, gives one much to ponder in his recent address here before the Southern Forest Products Association.

Most importantly, Mr. Baxter notes that the United States has plenty of saw-mills but not enough trees to go through them. He advises that more trees be grown on the available timberland and maintains that the small landowner and the federal government are essential in this future development.

The solution to the tree shortage lies in the South, Mr. Baxter contends, and he may be correct. It would not be the first time that America's Southern tier of states will have yielded the bounty to remedy a pinch in resources throughout the rest of the nation. But if America is to provide adequate lumber supplies to build homes for its people, the South's volume of wood production would have to double by the year 2000.

Not so many years ago we were being told that, because of good management and reforestation, the South was growing trees much faster than it was cutting them. That was before mushroom growth of late-model paper and pulp plants, pine-wood mills and hardboard plants.

Essentially, the challenge of growing more trees is one to be shared by land-owner and state—federal governments alike, with the later responsible for research in improved strains of trees, insect and fire control, and promotional efforts. Demand for forest products has stimulated price and this of itself should entice more landowners into raising trees as an annual cash crop in the area where trees mature the fastest, the South. The thought of depending mainly on Federal lands to satisfy the growing appetite for forest products is scarcely an acceptable alternative to encouragement of the little landowner to improve the tree output of his acreage. The best possible solution is intensified partnership of landholder, state, and Uncle Sam, with the continued assistance from the paper and lumber mills and their foresters.

There may be some bitterness left among conservatives over the way in which Holshouser engineered the Stevens nomination at the expense of conservative State Sen. Hamilton Horton. But even without personal feelings, the rift would remain.

Then there is the question of the future of Republican party. Holshouser has shown that, within limits, he wants a party with a broad ideological range and one in which blacks are welcome.

Helms, on the other hand, has spoken of a national realignment in which the two parties would rearrange themselves into a conservative party and a liberal party.

His Congressional Club reflects that. Ellis noted that a significant number of the members are conservative Democrats. They have long ties to Morgan.

The struggle between the Helms and Holshouser factions will continue whatever the results of the Senate campaign prove to be. There are rumors, publicly denied by both groups, that it may culminate in a primary fight between Holshouser and Helms in 1978.

John Glenn Riding High

COLUMBUS, Ohio—When Sen. Edward M. Kennedy arrived in Cincinnati last night (Thursday) to campaign for Democratic Rep. Thomas Luken, conspicuously absent from the platform was John Glenn, whose sweeping popularity in campaigning for the U. S. Senate is surprising hard-bitten political operatives here.

Glenn, the first American in space, was careful to be elsewhere, 400 miles across the state at a Democratic clambake in Toledo. Indeed, the kind of "help" that Glenn might want from any Democratic party leader outside the Buckeye State would be found last in the person of Teddy Kennedy.

Now running a phenomenal 2-to-1 ahead of colorless Republican Mayor Ralph Perk of Cleveland, the high-flying Glenn may become the first statewide candidate since Lyndon Johnson in 1964 to amass a million-vote plurality. As one Republican statewide leader here told us, "Glenn is taking even the Republican vote away from Perk without half trying."

The Glenn phenomenon is unique in the post-Watergate politics of mass voter disillusionment: a national hero, unencumbered with the ideological baggage that has fragmented the Democratic party, who seems eminently acceptable to blue-collar hard-hats and left-of-center intellectuals. Glenn's personal constituency today ranges from

deep right-center to left-center, a broad spectrum the Democratic party badly needs in the embittered search for its soul.

It is only natural, then, that Glenn does not need or want the kind of political help which has made Kennedy an attraction for some other Democratic candidates this fall. Beyond that, Glenn will not soon forget that Kennedy cut him dead in his losing 1970 senatorial primary battle with Howard Metzenbaum and in his decisive victory over Sen. Metzenbaum in their return engagement last May.

What rankled Glenn partisans about that Kennedy snub was the memory of hawkish, ex-Marine Glenn's stalwart support for Robert Kennedy in his 1968 presidential campaign, despite his dovish position on the Vietnam war. Help from the Kennedy family which got Glenn in last spring's primary battle with Metzenbaum came not from Ted Kennedy but from Jacqueline Onassis, who taped a television endorsement for Glenn in the campaign's closing days.

Now that Glenn looks like a glittering winner against Perk in November, Ted Kennedy is not above wanting a piece of the action. But a private offer from his senatorial office to Glenn's headquarters here suggesting that Kennedy would be more than glad to give Glenn a helping hand on his Ohio visit this week was politely rejected.

That Glenn is being courted by such national party leaders as Kennedy is not surprising. He is likely to emerge from the senatorial campaign as the No. 1 Democrat in the fifth largest state. If his awesome lead over Perk holds, Glenn could become a major factor in the party's 1976 presidential battle—at least a strong possibility for second place on the ticket.

That very prospect is viewed darkly by Gov. John J. Gilligan, running for reelection against Republican retread James Rhodes. Afflicted with the usual liabilities of an incumbent governor, Gilligan is only marginally ahead of former Gov. Rhodes.

Shellshocked By The Market

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined so fast this past month that those who write the market advisory letters for the brokerage firms are shying away from the numbers.

Too many of them, it seems, have had the disheartening experience of forecasting a support level in, say, the 700-point area of the Dow Jones industrial average, only to have that level punctured before their customers received the mail.

In a little over one month the industrial average has fallen nearly 170 points to a 627.19 reading, the lowest in 12 years.

"All of us, of course, are shell-shocked after what has happened in the past two months," writes one analyst.

Nobody dares forecast a bottoming out. So much has gone awry in the stock market that almost everyone is certain there's more to come. And this isn't just a hunch; the economic statistics support the gloom.

Price increases, for instance, seem to be accelerating, and that means bad news for stocks. Inflation and high interest rates are known to be among the market's major enemies.

Another depressant is declining industrial activity. As the bear market worsens, incalculable damage is being done to the structure of the market place, which probably will make it all the more difficult to recover.

Thousands of brokers have been laid off, and most of them aren't likely to return. Having adjusted to incomes above \$50,000 during the

glory days of the mid-1960s, few of them could adjust to \$12,000 a year — and then a layoff.

Hundreds of brokerage houses have gone out of business. Even some of the biggest that remain face financial difficulties.

Their customers have disappeared into the bond markets, where interest rates are high.

Whereas it cost \$515,000 to own a seat on the New York Stock Exchange early in 1969, anyone with the qualifications can pick one up for \$65,000 these days.

Even if activity resumed, it isn't likely seat prices will soar.

The reason is the almost imperceptible development of a central market place in which the individual exchanges, such as the New

York or American or Midwest or Pacific Coast, will have much less autonomy and independence.

Since nobody seems to know precisely how the central market will evolve, few brokers want to pay premium prices for seats on any exchange since there may be very little advantage to owning a seat.

Among the current comments being circulated by stock market letter writers is this: "Meanwhile, we stand amidst the carnage and peer into the future."

One well known writer concluded his spiel by advising the reader to draw his own conclusions. Even then he felt compelled to warn: "Of course, the stock market sometimes does strange things — or at least it has in the past."

Strain In The Party

RALEIGH (AP)—The shaky detente between North Carolina conservatives and the Republican party wing led by Gov. Jim Holshouser has taken another beating over the U.S. Senate candidacy of William E. Stevens.

Conservative Republican Sen. Jesse Helms has endorsed Stevens, but his efforts in Stevens' behalf have been less than overwhelming.

In Pinehurst last week, Helms reiterated his support of Stevens. But he added that he wasn't going to say anything critical of Democrat Robert Morgan.

Morgan, Helms said, was an honorable conservative with whom he could serve quite cordially in the Senate.

For a practicing Republican such as Helms, the statement was close to a declaration of neutrality.

The feelings of the conservative wing were perhaps more clearly expressed later in the week by Raleigh attorney Tom Ellis. Ellis was the driving force behind Helms' 1972 campaign. He is the organizer of the conservatives' Congressional Club.

Ellis told the Associated Press that his own choice for the Senate will remain "locked in the bosom of my heart."

An endorsement of either candidate, he noted, might detract from the Congressional Club's effort to pay off Helms' 1972 campaign debt.

The reasons for the conservative aloofness from Stevens are grounded in both philosophy and practical politics.

Democratic politicians agree that if Glenn emerges on Nov. 5 with a plurality which exceeds Gilligan's by anything like 500,000 votes—a distinct possibility—Gilligan's own presidential aspirations will shrivel. The result would be a strong indication that the national party should move to the center in 1976, and away from the left-liberal ideology of John Gilligan.

Glenn was treated by the Gilligan-controlled state party like a pariah until his primary win. He is now showing the same bleakness for Gilligan's new courtship as he is for Kennedy's.

When Gilligan arranged a private meeting with Glenn here ten days ago, hoping for joint Gilligan-Glenn campaigning, Glenn asked as a quid pro quo the right to have equal voice with Gilligan in naming the state chairman and executive director of the party. He wanted 50-50 voice in party control.

There was no deal and Glenn continued on his largely independent campaign. But Glenn will move hard into state party affairs after the election. Far more a party-line Democrat than a party-hated maverick like former Democratic Governor and Senator Frank Lausche, Glenn will use his predictable victory in Ohio as a case study for his party, so harassed and weakened by ever-widening ideological splits.

MOSCOW (AP) — Goon squads with bulldozers and trucks broke up an unauthorized outdoor exhibit of contemporary Soviet abstract art, destroyed the paintings, arrested a number of the artists and spectators and roughed up Americans and others in the crowd.

Organizers of the exhibit sent a protest to the central committee of the Communist party, and the United States Embassy said it was protesting Sunday's attacks on American correspondents and a diplomat.

Some 500 spectators, including foreign diplomats and reporters, were watching as about 20 artists began setting up the exhibit in a muddy vacant lot about noon Sunday. Suddenly four bulldozers roared down the field toward the crowd, followed by squads of toughs and dump trucks.

As the crowd ran, the canvases were crushed or thrown into the mud-filled dump trucks. Officials later said the paintings were burned.

The artists included Oskar Rabin, Vladimir Nemykhin, Lydia Masterovka and others

whose abstract art does not conform to the realistic, photographic style prescribed by the Soviet Communist party.

As the crowd of men, women and children fled, water trucks drove by spraying them.

President Harding Is Dead

Succumbs To Stroke Of W. Jones Dead; E. Allen Apoplexy Before Doctors Could Reach His Bedside

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Warren G. Harding, president of the United States died instantly here tonight at 7:45 from a stroke.

His death was entirely unexpected and came without warning of any kind, before any of the attending physicians could be reached or chief executive summoned. The sudden passing of the 59-year-old president shocked the nation as one of the most appalling deaths since the assassination of Abraham Lincoln.

He was struck down in a weakened condition following an attack of pneumonia a few days ago that subsequently resulted in an attack of bronchitis.

He was attending to the world's chief magistrate at the time.

You can grade the National Football League's opening day D for defense.

Don't feel too sorry for the Miami Dolphins, 34-24 upset losers to the New England Patriots in their NFL opener Sunday. After all, the defending world champions did score three touchdowns and a field goal, and that's considerable more than some clubs managed on a day of defense-dominated openers.

Baltimore was shut out by Pittsburgh 30-0 and Atlanta was blanked by Dallas 24-0. St. Louis managed only one touchdown, but that was enough to whip Philadelphia, which managed only one field goal, 7-3. Four other clubs scored 10 points or less.

Cincinnati ripped Cleveland 33-7, Washington tagged the New York Giants 13-10, Chicago topped Detroit 17-9, Los Angeles beat Denver 17-10, Minnesota whipped Green Bay 32-17, Houston downed San Diego 21-14, San Francisco shaded New Orleans 17-13 and Kansas City stopped the New York Jets 24-16.

The NFL's opening weekend concludes tonight with Buffalo facing Oakland in a nationally-televased game.

Patriots 34, Dolphins 24

While the defenses ruled other games, Miami's didn't seem ready. Jim Plunkett picked the Dolphins apart for 177 yards and running backs Mack Heron and Sam Cunningham gained 88 and 87 respectively as the Patriots sprung their surprise on the Super Bowl champs. The 34 points were the most allowed by the Dolphins since 1971.

New England ran up a 31-10 margin and then held off a late Miami comeback. Larry Csonka scored two TDs for the Dolphins.

Cardinals 7, Eagles 3

Jim Hart's four-yard scoring pitch to Donny Anderson produced the game's lone touch-

down as St. Louis defeated Philadelphia.

Redskins 13, Giants 10

Pittsburgh fans were hooting quarterback Joe Gilliam during the first period when the Steelers' new signal caller managed only two completions for 12 yards.

But Gilliam erased the boos with two touchdown passes, gaining 257 yards through the air to lead Pittsburgh to its

ramp over Baltimore.

Cowboys 24, Falcons 0

Roger Staubach, returning to action from cracked ribs, passed for one touchdown and ran for another in Dallas' victory over Atlanta.

Chiefs 24, Jets 16

Kansas City intercepted Joe Namath four times with Marvin Upshaw and Emmett Thomas returning two of the thefts for touchdowns.

Rams 17, Broncos 10

Cullen Bryant returned a Denver kickoff 84 yards for a rally-killing touchdown that helped Los Angeles past the Broncos.

Southern Teams Beat Outside Opponents

Although Furman Coach Art Baker might have thought his Paladins had a corner on the error market, Coach Bob Thalman of Virginia Military's surprise Southern Conference football leaders said "we did make some mistakes."

But the two lost fumbles and one pass interception for VMI were nothing compared with five lost fumbles, a pass interception and a two-yard punt that haunted Furman as the Paladins were upended 7-0 Saturday by the Keydets in the season's first league game.

VMI's victory, however, was no more surprising than a 5-0 sweep against outside foes by the five other conference teams that saw action, and the biggest was the 29-25 conquest of West Virginia by Richmond's Spiders, now 2-0.

Also improving their record to 2-0 were Appalachian State's Mountaineers as they turned back Middle Tennessee 18-7. William and Mary's Indians bounced back from a 49-7 drubbing at Mississippi State to knock off Wake Forest of the Atlantic Coast Conference 17-6.

East Carolina's two-time defending champion Pirates opened with a 24-6 romp over Bowling Green, their first victory in four tries against a Mid American Conference team, and The Citadel's Bulldogs made their debut with a 6-0 decision over Presbyterian.

The only score of the Furman-VMI clash, the first for both, was a 20-yard run on a reverse by split end Ronnie Moore on the second play after Keydet defensive tackle Alan Pyke recovered a Furman fumble on the Paladins' 23.

Furman also gave VMI scoring shots with fumbles at 34 and 44, and Thalman said in a first game "you worry more about those mistakes. But there was

some good, hard hitting out there."

If Baker thought the Paladins were frustrated the first half, things were to get worse.

The Paladins drove to the VMI two, but Pyke made his second recovery.

With a first down at the VMI six in the fourth quarter, Furman came away with nothing when a fourth-down pass was tipped away in the end zone. And with 1:30 left, three Keydets jarred Brette Simmons loose from another end zone pass.

"This kind of thing takes the steam out of your football team," said Baker, co-coach of the year last season when Furman was the conference surprise with a 7-4 over-all record. "I was extremely proud of our kids the way they came back in the second half."

Richmond fell behind West Virginia 13-0 in the first period, then rallied behind quarterback Harry Knight, who hit 11 of 16 passes for 216 yards and three touchdowns—31 yards to Dinky Jones, 48 yards to Mike Mahoney and 38 yards to Rickey Brown.

In addition, Knight's 22-yard throw to Mahoney set up a one-yard scoring run by George Crossman that sent the Spiders ahead for good in the third period.

"I think we wanted to prove last year's game wasn't just a fluke," said Knight, referring to Richmond's 38-17 upset in 1973.

Richmond Coach Jim Tait said he felt West Virginia "is a real fine football team. They made some mistakes and we played nearly a flawless game."

But Tait was mystified that speedster Danny Buggs wasn't used on reverse plays by the Mountaineers and caught only one pass.

"I don't know why they didn't run him on the reverse, but I'm glad they didn't," said Tait. "I've said it before and I still say he's the greatest offensive football player in America."

William and Mary went to its Veer offense in the third period for touchdown runs by Bill Deery and Doug Gerhart that wiped out a 6-3 Wake Forest lead. The Indians ran for 272 yards, Gerhart getting 92, John Gerdeman 90 and Deery 77.

But Coach Jim Root talked about his defense, which halted a Wake Forest drive at the four after earlier stopping one with a fumble recovery.

"That was as hard as our defense has hit since I've been at William and Mary," said Root, now in his third year. "We came back out in the second half and stopped them cold."

Sophomore quarterback Mike Weaver ran for 85 yards and tailback Kenny Strayhorn for 78 as East Carolina got 337 yards on the ground although failing to complete a pass.

The Pirates were up 24-0 before Bowling Green scored, and new Coach Pat Dye said "Bowling Green's offense was very good, but our defense was great. We really made the stops when we needed them."

Especially effective was two-time All-Southern linebacker Danny Kopley, who had five tackles, intercepted a pass, broke up another and recovered a fumble.

Appalachian Coach Jim Brakefield said "we looked considerably better, both on offense and defense," than in the Mountaineers' opening 16-7 victory over East Tennessee.

Sophomore quarterback Robbie Price once again was a standout, scoring on a 20-yard run and hitting Devon Ford on a 46-yard scoring pass play. Clinton Bradshaw ran for 64 yards and freshman Emmitt Hamilton for 61.

A wet field turned The Citadel's opener against Presbyterian into a defensive struggle.

Quarterback Gene Dotson scored the only touchdown from a yard out at the end of an 11-play, 83-yard march to open the second half. Linebacker Bryan Ruff stood out defensively.

East Carolina University senior record holder Ed Rigsby outpaced the field Saturday to pace the Purples to a 26-28 win over the Golds in East Carolina University's intrasquad cross country meet held on the Pirate course in Greenville.

bama Coach Bear Bryant said, "There is a big difference between winning a football game and beating somebody. We won the game but we didn't beat anybody. Maryland outplayed us all over the field and deserved to win."

Alabama needed a trick fourth-down play—a run instead of a punt—and two turnovers in the final quarter to hold off the Terrapins.

North Carolina State's defensive pressure and the long bomb did Duke in quickly. As the fourth quarter got under way, the Wolfpack was leading by 35-7. It started substituting in the fourth quarter. And Duke, led by reserve quarterback Bob Corbett, a jayvee last season, was able to make it a more respectable 35-21 at the end. Corbett, who played only in the second half, completed 14 of 22 pass attempts for 196 yards. Duke's three touchdowns were by Larry Martinez, on two short runs and a two-yard pass from Corbett.

But State's Stan Fritts and

Roland Hooks slashed Don Buckley caught two touchdown passes.

Duke Coach Mike McGee said, "I firmly believe we will be a good football team. Our attitude and approach to the combat were pleasing. We were pleased with the way Corbett went in and brought the team back."

Duke was without quarterback Hal Spears, who had a bruised leg, and tailback Tony Benjamin, a bad ankle.

Miller Looking For New Goals

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP) — Johnny Miller had just clinched the money-winning title, had reached two plateaus attained only by Jack Nicklaus and was looking for new worlds to conquer.

"I'm basically a lazy person," he said. "I need motivation. I need to keep setting my goals higher."

He quickly found the new goal. He's within sight of the all-time, single-season, money-winning record on the pro golf tour.

"Hey, that'd be nice, too. Wow," he said, grinning broadly.

Miller's dramatic sudden death playoff victory over the disappointed Nicklaus, Frank Beard and Bob Murphy for the World Open title Sunday put the slender blond less than \$5,000 away from Nicklaus' all-time record of \$320,542 in 1972.

Johnny, who joined Jack as the only \$300,000 winner in a single season and the only player in the last decade to win seven American tour titles in a year, collected \$60,000 from the total purse of \$300,000—the richest purse of the year.

It pushed his winnings to \$316,383 for the season and gave him an insurmountable lead of more than \$80,000 in the money-winning race.

He nailed it down with a gorgeous, three wood second shot on the second hole of sudden death, a shot that came to rest only eight feet from the cup and set up a winning, two-putt birdie.

"That kind of intimidated them," he said, "that was the whole tournament. It's got to be the greatest shot under pressure I ever made."

Miller, Nicklaus, Beard and Murphy all finished the regulation 72 holes at 281, three under par on the famed No. 2 course at the Pinehurst Country Club. Nicklaus and Miller, who shared the third-round lead, had closing 72s while Beard and the chunky Murphy came out of the pack with 69s.

Murphy had to birdie the last hole to make the playoff, then dropped out on the first extra hole when he bunkered his tee shot and took two to get out of the sand.

Beard, like Miller, reached the green in two on the 504yard 16th hole, the second playoff

hole, while Nicklaus pulled his second into the edge of the deep rough.

Beard, once a master putter but mired in a deep, dismal, three-year slump, three-putted from the front of the green for par. Nicklaus chipped to about 10 feet, then rimmed the cup with the birdie putt.

Miller still hadn't putted. He now needed only two putts from eight feet to win.

"I've never been in that position before," he said. "You don't figure on that. You're always thinking about making a putt of that distance. I didn't have to. All I had to do was lag. But how hard do you hit it?"

"All of a sudden I wasn't sure I could get down in two. It's probably the most nervous I've ever been."

He ran the first one about 12 inches beyond the hole and made it coming back.

"I was thinking about the money-winning title," he said. "It's not the dollars. It's just that some day I'll be able to look back and say I won the money-winning title when Nicklaus was in his prime and (Gary) Player was in his prime and (Lee) Trevino was in his prime."

"I've never won the money-winning title before. I may never be in position to do it again. It was important to me."

Trevino never really got in this chase. He finished with a 71-285. U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin had 72-286. Player, the winner of the British Open and the Masters, and Arnold Palmer failed to qualify for the final two rounds.

Now Miller has three tournaments in which to break Nicklaus' single season record. He's skipping this week's King Island Open and will close his season in the Kaiser, the Sahara and the Team Championship.

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Petty Wins Delaware 500

DOVER, Del. (AP) — There was something missing in Richard Petty's breezy victory at the Delaware 500 Grand National stock car race.

Petty says it was the challenge of a close-fought battle and the excitement of beating a driver down to the checkered flag.

Others might just say it was Cale Yarborough and David Pearson, who were forced out by engine trouble early in the race, that made Sunday's 500 mile National Association for Strength as much as driver skill.

"Any good driver could have won it today," Petty said after claiming the Delaware 500 by some three laps over Buddy Baker and nine laps over third-place rookie driver Earl Ross at Dover Downs International Speedway.

"If I win by half a car length, I can get excited because I beat them. But when you beat them like this, the mechanics can get excited because they set it up," Petty said.

The victory was the 10th for Petty on the NASCAR circuit this season and came after he led a total of 491 laps of the 500 on the one-mile oval. He moved into the lead for good in his 1974 Dodge on the 40th lap.

So what should we do?

"If we tattle on these 3 boys who cheated, they'll probably beat us up."

"But if we don't tell the teacher, he'll give them those 'A' grades they don't deserve."

"The singing came easily; I never really studied it, and I didn't get help from my parents."

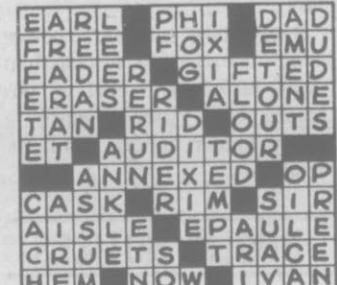

VEPCO Again Arguing Appeal

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Virginia's State Corporation Commission was to resume hearings today on Virginia Electric & Power Co.'s request for a massive emergency surcharge on electric rates.

Commission Chairman Preston C. Shannon told attorneys after 12 hours of argument Friday that he wanted to finish the hearings today on whether the utility should get a \$127.3 million emergency surcharge.

The surcharge would boost the bill for an average customer by some 22 per cent. The rate hike request comes on the heels of a \$28 million permanent rate increase granted by the SCC three months ago.

Charles A. Benore, a New York securities analyst, said Friday night that he'd rank Vepco's stock close to the bottom among the 45 utility stocks he follows.

Benore, a vice president of Mitchell, Hutchins, Inc., said he hasn't been able to recommend Vepco as an investment and predicted doom for the utility's securities unless the company gets emergency rate relief.

Earlier Friday the standing room-only audience at the hearing heard a debate over whether an emergency exists and, if so, how much relief Vepco should be granted.

"We're going to reach the point somewhere down the road with the lights going out" unless the utility gets a substantial rate increase, Vepco President T. Justin Moore warned.

But critics of the rate hike said Vepco's inflation-plagued customers would suffer intolerably with higher utility rates.

They also asked whether projected power needs justify Vepco's multi-million-dollar construction program and whether the utility is using its existing generating facilities as efficiently as possible.

Moore said rate relief now would save Virginians millions of dollars on their electric bills in the future by allowing the utility to complete its long-term construction program.

Vepco is a leader in nuclear power, he said, and the utility hopes to generate half its electricity by that means by late 1976.

But while nuclear power plants are cheaper to run than those fueled with coal or oil, Moore said, they require a much higher initial plant investment.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats are starting to inject President's Ford's pardon of Richard M. Nixon into the mid-term campaign at the same time a survey shows them headed for a strong showing in November.

Assassinate Two Judges

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Irish Republican Army terrorists assassinated two Northern Ireland judges in their homes today and a business executive was reported killed by a bomb at his factory. The two judges shot to death in Belfast were Roger "Rory" Conaghan and Martin McBirney, both Roman Catholics accused by the Irish Republican Army of collaborating with the British. The Provisional IRA wing claimed it ordered the killings. Politicians and legal figures condemned the slayings, and courts all over the province were adjourned to honor the two slain judges. In Pomeroy, County Tyrone, west of here, informed sources said a booby trap bomb went off when businessman Michael McCourt entered his office and he was killed. The three deaths raised to 1,063 the official death toll in five years of violence in the province.

Kennedy Is 'Undecided'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy says his decision whether to run for President in 1976 depends largely on personal considerations. Kennedy disclosed in weekend interviews that he has studied the political situation and concluded: "I think I've got a good chance to win the nomination and a reasonable chance to win the election." He did not talk about the personal factors that will go into his decision. But they presumably would include the concern that members of his family have expressed for his safety should he embark on a presidential campaign. The Massachusetts senator had been thinking of a target date of sometime in 1975 to announce his decision. And during a trip to aid campaigning California congressional candidates, Kennedy disclosed he will make the announcement late this year or early next. Conceding that "the election will be a tough one under any circumstances," Kennedy said he isn't paying much heed to political events and poll results at this stage.

Johnson, will begin appearing in Newsweek starting in the Sept. 23 edition, said Newsweek editor Osborn Elliott. Moyers served as publisher of Newsday, the Long Island daily, from 1967 until 1970. He most recently was host of "Bill Moyers' Journal," an Emmy award-winning series for the Public Broadcasting Service.

could lose two to six Senate seats and governorships, and possibly up to 40 House seats. Carey, opening his campaign against Republican Gov. Malcolm Wilson, said he would make an issue of Wilson's refusal to comment on the pardon and other Watergate-related issues. "The governor of New York has a national voice, and he must speak to national issues and issues of conscience," Carey, a congressman from Brooklyn, declared. In Arizona, meanwhile, Marshall, a Scottsdale publisher, opened his uphill drive against Republican Sen. Barry Goldwater by blasting the senator's support of the Nixon pardon. "Why have these outspoken proponents of law and order gone along with this mockery of the law?" he asked. The best Republicans can hope for, according to the survey by AP bureaus in all 50 states, is to hold losses to about 2 governorships and 15 House seats while breaking even in the Senate. Democrats control the Senate 58 to 42, the House 248 to 187 and the governorships 32 to 18. Though most Senate and governor's seats being contested this year are held by Democrats — 20 of 34 Senate seats, 23 of 35 governorships — few Demo-

cratic incumbents are rated in serious difficulty. Carey, who won an uphill primary battle last week, seems likely to give a stern test to Wilson, who became governor when Nelson A. Rockefeller resigned last December. Democrats consider their chances better than in any year since Rockefeller was first elected in 1958. In California, where Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan is retiring, the Democrats also are mounting a strong bid. Polls show their candidate, Secretary of State Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown Jr., son of Reagan's predecessor, leading Republican Houston I. Flournoy. Democratic triumphs in California and New York could give the Democrats control of the nation's six largest states going into the 1976 presidential election. Democratic Govs. John J. Gilligan of Ohio, Milton J. Shapp of Pennsylvania and Dolph Briscoe of Texas are considered leading in re-election bids, while Democratic Gov. Daniel Walker of Illinois is midway through his four-year term. Democrats also hope to capture Republican-held governorships in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Arizona and Oregon. The

only incumbent Republican governor running is Francis W. Sargent of Massachusetts. The best GOP hopes to gain governorships held by Democrats appear to be in Maine, New Mexico and Oklahoma. None has an incumbent running. The Republican problem in the Senate races is shown by the survey's finding that 13 Democrats are considered virtually certain winners, including non-incumbents John H. Glenn Jr. in Ohio and Dale Bumpers in Arkansas. With 38 holdovers, that would give the Democrats the Senate majority of 51. Five other Democrats are considered ahead, Sens. George McGovern of South Dakota, Birch E. Bayh of Indiana, Mike Gravel of Alaska, Thomas F. Eagleton of Missouri, and Robert Morgan, seeking the North Carolina seat of retiring Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr. The Democrats also expect to win the Florida seat held by Republican Edward J. Gurney, who withdrew following his indictment on federal bribery, perjury and conspiracy charges. Rep. Bill Gunter and Secretary of State Richard Stone meet in an Oct. 1 Democratic primary runoff. Four Republican incumbents

face difficult races: Sens. Marlow W. Cook of Kentucky, opposed by Gov. Wendell H. Ford; Peter H. Dominick of Colorado, opposed by 1972 McGovern manager Gary W. Hart; Robert Dole of Kansas, running against Rep. William R. Roy; and Milton R. Young of North Dakota, opposed by former Gov. William Guy. Republicans' chances of holding the seat of retiring Sen. Wallace F. Bennett are improving in Utah, where Mayor Jake Garn of Salt Lake City opposes Democratic Rep. Wayne Owens. The GOP also hopes to pick up the seats of retiring Democratic Sens. Alan Bible of Nevada and Harold E. Hughes of Iowa. Republican Sen. Charles McC. Mathias Jr. of Maryland is expected to be re-elected. Six other Republicans are considered ahead, Sens. Jacob K. Javits of New York, Richard S.

Schweiker of Pennsylvania, Henry L. Bellmon of Oklahoma and Bob Packwood of Oregon, and Reps. Richard W. Mallary and Louis C. Wyman, seeking the seats of retiring Republican Sens. George D. Aiken of Vermont and Norris Cotton of New Hampshire. In House races, Democrats hope to gain in California, Connecticut, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota, Montana, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Texas, Virginia and Wisconsin. Many of their targets are seats in which Republicans have retired. Similarly, Re-

publicans hope to pick up the seats of Senate hopefuls Rep. John C. 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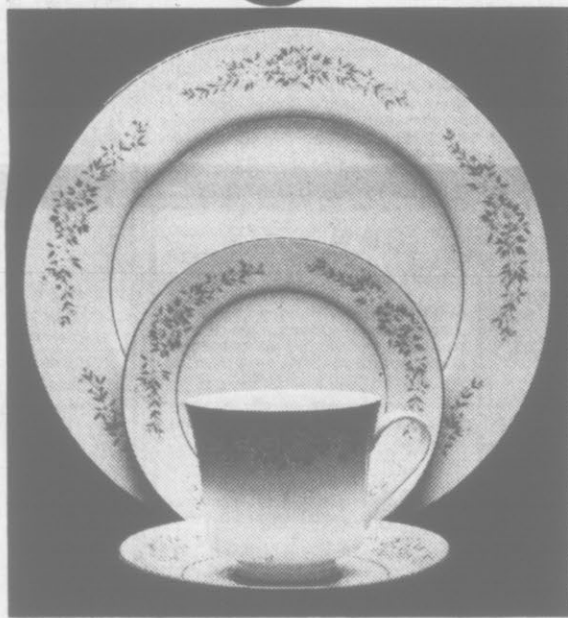
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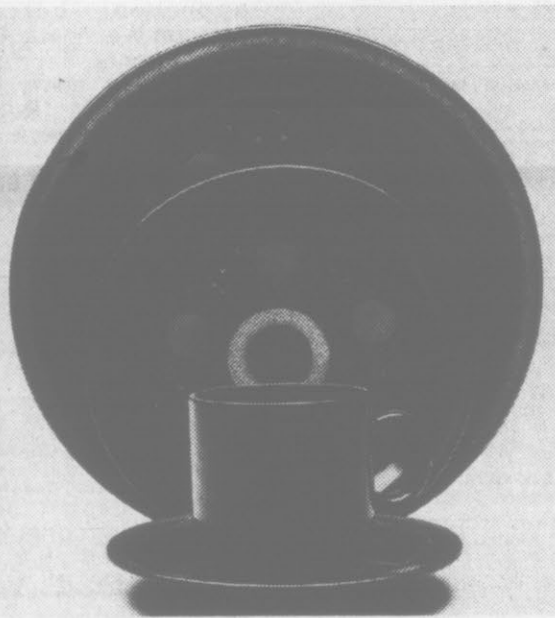
