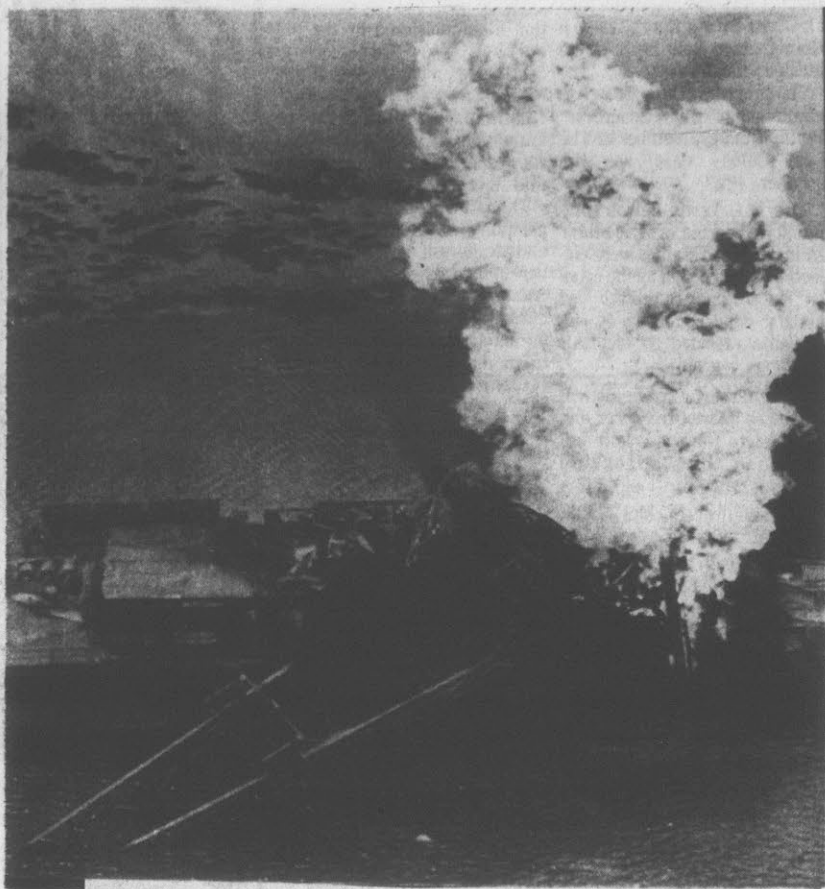

Cox Disparages 'Index'

"In every way you turn, Greenville is anything but a disadvantaged city," Mayor Percy Cox commented this morning in reference to a study index claiming that Greenville is one of six of the most disadvantaged cities in North Carolina.

The study, covering 202 Southern cities with a population of over 25,000 was compiled by UNC

graduate student Mary Dodson and was released Monday at Asheville at the Urban Affairs Conference of UNC-Asheville.

"For one thing," Cox points out, "the data used in the report was accumulated ten to fifteen years ago and is no longer valid. We are all aware that in the last ten to fifteen years, Greenville has been one of the most progressive

cities in the state."

Ms. Dodson's study, entitled The Southern Urban Health Index, is based on a composite of eight factors associated with urban decline. The index lists Wilson and Goldsboro as the most disadvantaged of North Carolina cities, with the other four being Greenville, Gastonia, Asheville and Wilmington.

Cities in her study noted

as the state's healthier urban communities in growth, services, education and other factors are Durham, Charlotte, Raleigh, Greensboro, Burlington, and Chapel Hill.

"Much more recent information will show an entirely different story from that in the report," Cox averred. "For one thing, only last year, 1978, Greenville ranked fourth in the

total monetary value of building permits in the state, ahead of some of the cities listed in the report as the most progressive.

"It's not only in building, but in just about every area, health, housing, education that Greenville is far ahead of other cities in the state, and I'm sure any report using recent information would confirm this," Cox added.

Round Up Smugglers

MIAMI (AP) — Two men who once claimed that George Purvis Jr. of Fayetteville was "knee-deep in organized crime," have had that same charge made against them — by federal agents.

Robert J. Meinster and Robert L. Platsorn were named Tuesday in federal indictments as leaders of a drug-smuggling ring that, at one time, was importing roughly 8 percent of the total marijuana supply smuggled into the country.

They were two of nine persons arrested by federal agents. Five other persons, not yet arrested, were named in the 40-count indictment handed down by a federal grand jury in Miami.

Also charged was Roy R. Walker Jr. of Winston-Salem, a former pilot for Piedmont Airlines.

A 15-month investigation by a special task force uncovered a smuggling ring so sophisticated it was able to obtain secret government information.

And, according to the indictments, the smuggling ring boasted a private army, a fleet of airplanes and a "personal yacht broker."

Members of the group allegedly wore "black tuna" medallions, named for the radio code word used when smuggling marijuana shipments out of Colombia.

Platsorn and Meinster were convicted of aiding and abetting the importation of marijuana into North Carolina last Oct. 17 in U.S. District Court in Wilmington.

They received five-year prison sentences and \$15,000 fines. Charges of conspiracy to import marijuana into the state were dropped so not to interfere with the Miami investigation.

A key witness against them was Purvis, who admitted his participation in the scheme to smuggle more than 11 tons of marijuana into North Carolina.

Purvis received a five-year sentence and \$15,000 fine after pleading guilty to conspiracy to smuggle marijuana and aiding and

abetting the smuggling of marijuana.

He also did investigatory work for the Florida task force and testified before the federal grand jury that handed down the indictments in Miami.

A spokesman for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency in Miami said Purvis is mentioned in the indictments, but that he was not indicted.

The spokesman also said she could not explain the context in which Purvis' name is mentioned.

In the official announcement of the arrests and indictments, U.S. Attorney Griffin B. Bell was quoted as saying, "This is the largest case brought by the (U.S. Justice) Department since I've been attorney general and the first announced fruits of our policy of combined FBI-DEA investigation into major drug traffic."

On Line

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Unit 1 at Virginia Electric & Power Co.'s North Anna nuclear plant went back on line early today, a Vepco spokesman said, making it the only nuclear reactor the utility has in operation.

Unit 1 at the Louisa County facility was shut down March 30, first for repairs and then for Nuclear Regulatory Agency-ordered tests to see if it had similar cracks in steel plates that were discovered in Unit 2.

Unit 2 is still under construction and is scheduled to go on line sometime this year.

Vepco submitted information last month to the NRC, showing that the utility's analysis indicated no such problems in Unit 1 and got NRC approval to put the unit back in operation.

Both units at the Surry plant are down.

Study Joint Budget Items

Pitt County Commissioners and members of the Greenville City Council met last night to review jointly-funded projects such as the Pitt-Greenville Airport and Sheppard Memorial Library before the budgets of the two governmental units are finalized for the 1979-1980 fiscal year.

Robert L. Martin, chairman of the Board of Commissioners, told council members at the outset of the session that with a six per cent growth in the county's ad valorem tax base, a 10 per cent growth in inflation, and the board's feeling that there should be no tax rate increase, the county would be hard-pressed to provide any major increases in its present spending levels.

City Manager Ed Wyatt, saying he and County Manager Reginald Gray had discussed the proposed library budget, told the officials the library's budget, as suggested to both boards last night, is, "as honest-to-goodness bare bones budget based on present service."

As proposed by the library board, the city would provide \$220,000 for the coming year (as compared to \$190,000 this year), while the county would appropriate \$110,000 (\$96,000 this year), to help fund a \$381,480 list of expenditures for 1979-1980. This, Wyatt said, would mean a 15.8 per cent increase in the city's share of the budget, while resulting in a 14.6 per cent increase in county funding.

Watt said, however, that if \$20,000 were cut from Sheppard's requests, the city's share could be reduced to \$206,700 (an 8.79 per cent hike), while the county share could be cut to \$103,350 (a 7.61 per cent increase).

Gray suggested that one method that could be used to cut the cost of operating the library would be to use paraprofessionals rather than so many professional librarians to staff the three libraries in Greenville.

The two boards also

discussed the high costs involved in operating the Carver branch library, which officials were told is not extensively used.

The question of county participation in funding for the city's rescue squad was raised by Mayor Percy Cox who asked, "where do we stand on that, Reginald (Gray)?"

Gray responded by saying that the other rescue squads in the county are, "really up in arms," about the \$30,000 the county appropriated for the Greenville squad this year.

Commissioner Charles Gaskins told Cox, "it appears to me that you all have got a problem," with rescue service in the city, referring to recent studies on whether to separate the city's fire and rescue operations or integrate the two services.

"Go ahead and solve that problem," Gaskins suggested, "then you talk to us."

Martin noted that in his opinion, other squads in the county object to the county supporting a paid rescue service. "They don't want paid rescue squads in the county," he suggested.

The rescue squad budget request presented last night, totaled \$231,000 for current operating costs and \$21,100 for capital outlay items, and asked \$82,956 from the county, based on the number of calls the squad answers outside the city limits.

In discussing the proposed budget for operations of the Pitt-Greenville Airport, officials from both boards suggested that the current level of funding for the airport authority — \$18,500 from both the city and county for current operating funds — be maintained, although the authority has requested \$22,000 from the city and county for the coming year.

The boards also discussed the possibility of fuel sales at the airport being handled by a private concern. At present, the Airport Authority maintains the fuel concession at the flight facility.

Tabled Extending Schools' Program

The Pitt County Board of Education voted Tuesday to table action on extending the scope of the county alcohol and drug education program to the fourth and fifth grades until discussions were held with area principals.

The vote followed a presentation by David Andrews and John Maye Jr., program coordinators. The program, which has been in effect in the city and county schools for the past ten years, currently works with only sixth and seventh grades in an education program.

According to Andrews, the program is funded by the state ABC Board, and presents factual information to young people, so that they may make rational decisions on alcohol and drug use.

Andrews, who works with 13 county schools, told board members that it was not unusual for young people to have experimented with drugs as early as the fifth or sixth grade.

"In one sixth grade class, one child had been busted once, (for marijuana use), one busted twice, and one charged with dealing," Andrews noted.

He explained to the board

that he and Maye both serve in counselor positions, and both guard the client-counselor right of confidentiality.

Maye explained that the program was seeking additional funds to update its educational material. Also, the two coordinators felt that the program needed to take a random stratified sample to alcohol and drug problem in the city and county schools.

Assistant Superintendent Kathryn Lewis told board members that alcohol remains the largest drug abuse problem with young people, noting a national upswing in the problem. She said that principals had expressed interest in having the alcohol and drug education program extended to the fifth grade, but did not know about extending to the fourth grade.

Bill McLawhorn asked for the board to table the motion of extending the program until discussion was heard from principals toward using the program in the fourth grade.

Pitt County Energy Control Officer George Laws commended the efforts of teachers and principals in lowering the use of electricity and fuel oil during the first three quarters of the 1978-79 school year.

The county high schools used 660,184 less kilowatt hours than the 1977-78 year, giving a 14 percent decrease. The elementary and middle schools used 63,569 less kilowatt hours, for a 2.5 percent decrease. Fuel oil use was decreased 20.7 percent in the past year.

However, the cost of electricity increased, even though the use decreased. Pitt County schools did save \$21,563.28 on electricity used in all schools and \$14,162.98 on fuel oil.

Assistant Superintendents Bernard Haselrig and Kathryn Lewis presented material on the Title One program for 1979-80, noting that there would be a reduction of three positions at Sam Bundy, Pactolus and Falkland Schools, regarding the low number of students in each school ranking in the 25th or less percentile.

Other innovations in the program would include a Time on Task focus in the Title I program, the use of one eighth grade medical social counselor as a social worker, and the display of teacher Alma Barnes' techniques with teaching educationally deprived children.

The board approved the county local occupational plan for 1979 as presented by

Jail In Tehran Seized

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Inmates seized a jail in downtown Tehran and heavy gunfire broke out today as they held off revolutionary militiamen.

Bystanders dived into drainage ditches near the jail compound and militiamen blocked off streets in the area, located behind the capital's central police station.

Officials said the prisoners seized control of the jail Tuesday afternoon, and held some guards as hostages before releasing them unharmed. The source of the gunfire was not clear, but police said they believed prisoners had seized the guards' weapons.

Guards said there were 200 to 300 inmates in the jail. Some reportedly were members of the notorious secret police organization SAVAK, arrested following the February revolution that overthrew Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi's regime.

# Await Sentencing Amendments

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Amendments to reduce the severity of sentences contained in Gov. Jim Hunt's uniform sentencing bill were expected in the Senate today, after the measure won tentative approval by an overwhelming margin Tuesday.

Sen. Robert Jordan, D-Montgomery, voted with the majority in its 46-3 approval of the legislation but said he intended to offer amendments today that would generally reduce the length of sentences.

The severity of sentences provided in the legislation has been attacked by a number of legislators and by the N.C. Council on Crime.

The bill, called the "fair sentencing act" by Hunt, is the key proposal of the governor's crime-control package proposed during the opening days of the legislative session.

Hunt says the legislation, which would replace the current paroles system and most of the state's criminal sentenc-

ing laws, will reduce the wide disparity in punishment handed out by different judges for the same offenses.

"This bill is the most important crime legislation in this session of the legislature because it will provide more certainty and fairness in sentencing criminals," Hunt said after the Senate vote.

If given final approval today, the measure would advance to the House.

Recommended by a legislative study commission and the N.C. Bar Association, the bill would narrow a judge's discretion in sentencing by specifying prison terms expected for each crime. To vary from the expected sentence, a judge would have to state his reasons in writing.

"This bill," said its sponsor, Sen. I. Beverly Lake, D-Wake, "will remove the veil of mystery and suspicion now harbored against the courts by most of the public."

The Senate gave its tentative approval after turning back an amendment that would have repealed the state's death penalty for first-degree murder. That amendment, rejected on a 38-10 vote, was proposed by Sen. Fred Alexander, D-Mecklenburg.

If enacted, a person sentenced under the measure could expect to be released after serving one-half his assigned sentence, as the bill would allow inmates one day off for each day served on good behavior. That provision would replace the paroles system for felons.

Opponents charged that the bill would increase the state's already high prison population, but supporters said it would in practice cause little change in the length of average prison sentences.

For example, it would narrow the possible sentences for second-degree murder, which now

range from two years to life in prison, Lake said.

The Senate adopted a committee amendment that strengthens the penalty for first-degree rape from 32 years to life. Opponents said the more severe sentence — which would allow parole only after serving 40 years in prison — would make juries reluctant to convict.

The Senate rejected a series of other amendments that would have deleted mandatory sentences for some crimes, such as armed robbery, and would have allowed judges to reduce sentences without stating reasons.

Sen. Cecil Jenkins, D-Carr, a trial lawyer, said he

avored the idea but believe the sentences contained in the bill would increase the number of persons in prison.

"The logic of it, the plan, is good," he said. "The practicality of it is bad."

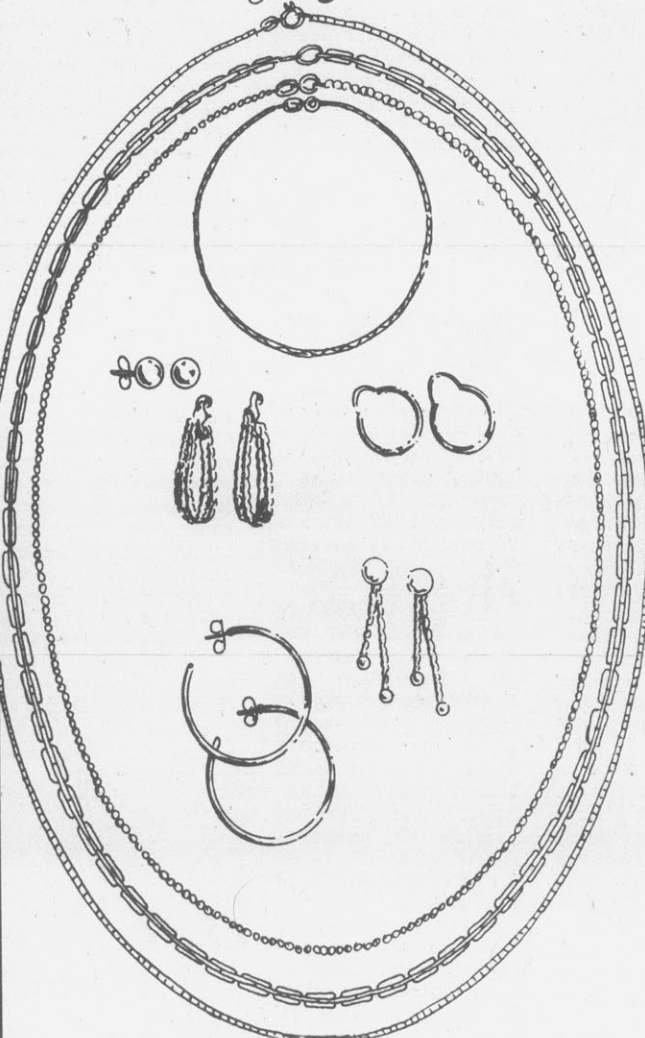

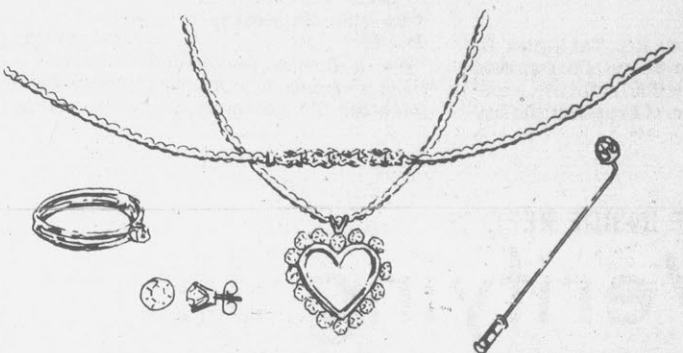
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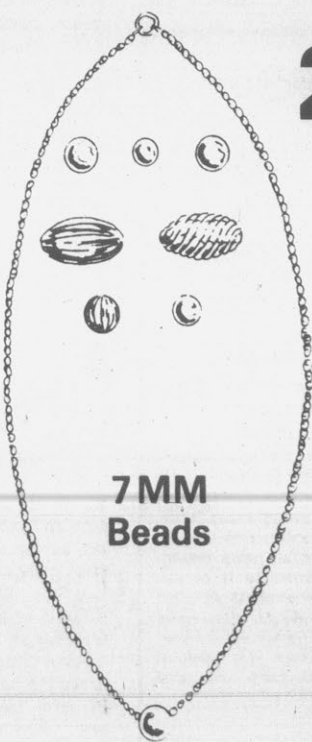
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## Two Years Old, Still Growing

## Some Cool To HMO Plan

RALEIGH — The Health Maintenance Organization is highly regarded by many specialists as the wave of the future in health care.

If a proposal now before the North Carolina General Assembly is passed into law, all Tar Heels who either work for government or for a firm with 50 or more employees must be given the option of joining an HMO. Thousands of other people will be eligible to join where HMO groups are available, since the push will be to enlarge membership.

The need for such large membership (some experts say a minimum of 30,000 is needed to assure success) is one of the arguments which critics and opponents use against the HMO.

And while the proposal in the General Assembly has thus far not attracted much public attention or opposition, that could change at any time.

State Rep. Ted Kaplan, D-Forsyth, one of the sponsors of the HMO Act of 1979, is confident of its passage into law.

"It is not being taken to very readily by the Medical Society," Kaplan says. But he added that many physicians are changing their minds.

**Opposition**  
Some observers had expected strong opposition from Blue Cross-Blue Shield, the state's major provider of health and hospitalization insurance. None has materialized, largely because that organization has gotten into the business of operation of HMO groups in some other states, and is finding a role within the new approach.

But the wave of the future in health care is not without pitfalls, experts caution.

One of those pitfalls is human nature itself. People simply don't like to be limited when it comes to health care — the sky is the limit, and cost is no object. To succeed, an HMO must put limits on its members as to surgery genuinely needed or purely elective, days in hospital, or continued expensive treatment when the outcome is doubtful.

For a monthly fee, the HMO is supposed to provide full health and medical ser-

vices, even dental service in some groups. Such full-scale operations are expensive, and national figures show that the cost runs as much as \$15 to \$25 per month higher than present insurance premium costs. Even so, many people would likely join the HMO since the fee would provide full coverage without deductibles, and would cover all services, not selected ones.

Once seen as a means of helping contain medical care costs to the poor, experts warn that to succeed an HMO must have large numbers of paying members.

If too many of the poor are included, then things tend to go either of two ways: quality of care declines and paying members quit; or the red tape of recovering fees from governmental welfare programs pushes the cost up for paying members. Either

way, the program is in jeopardy.

### High Cost

Startup costs can be extraordinarily high for an HMO, and this tends to limit them. One suggestion was that a group be formed to serve governmental employees in the Raleigh area, but legislators are reluctant to put up the seed money which could run as high as \$5 million. A private firm, of course, could start for much less money by using stock techniques, lease agreements, contracts, etc.

One successful HMO is already operating in North Carolina, at Reynolds in Winston-Salem, and Burlington Industries is actively investigating the possibility. There are reports that a private firm is preparing a group plan for the Raleigh area open to the public and to governmental employees.

From the viewpoint of the health care provider, those familiar with programs in operation say that physicians and others enjoy the freedom from billing and past-due accounts, the steady cash flow, and the regular working hours an HMO provides.

So, after all these mornings of glowering discontentedly into the mirror, relief was just a squeeze of the tube away. At last the wonders of chemistry had contrived a car wash for the old kisser, a pit stop for the average puss.

"At 50," wrote George Orwell, who looked a trifle down in the mouth on all his book jackets, "every man has the face he deserves."

I used to regard that as a sentence and a penalty, unremittable by pardon or parole, handed down by Chief Justice Time at life's bar of justice as the price one had to pay the piper for dancing the night away or even sitting among the wallflowers with a paper cup in hand.

But if recent advances in cosmetic surgery permit quirky alterations at this late date, I

## Oil Profits And A Tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — What's happening, as President Carter tells it, is a classic confrontation over a bonanza of unearned profits, as oil industry lobbyists try to hoodwink Congress into permitting a massive ripoff of the consumer.

Carter has used those terms and more in what he

calls a strong and fervent campaign to get Congress to approve his proposed windfall oil profits tax.

He wants the tax imposed on profits that flow from his order to phase out controls on the price of U.S. oil beginning on June 1.

His problem now is that the tax looks rather tame when

compared with the rhetoric. While Carter gave the impression that his new tax would reclaim half the profits the oil industry gains from decontrol, the administration's own figures put it at about 13 percent during the first three years.

But White House officials point out that those figures are based on profits before taxes and royalties the oil companies will have to pay to the government anyhow. Those levies reclaim all but 43 cents of the profit dollar, and the Carter tax would take an additional 14 cents. Figured that way, the new profits tax comes to about 33 percent.

That is no small bite. And between the windfall tax proposal and the existing federal income tax, the companies will indeed be paying about half the profits of decontrol in federal taxes.

Nonetheless, Carter's tax proposal is not as tough as he made it sound. The advertising took the edge off the product.

And if Carter has strong words for the oil industry, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., has equally strong words for the president.

Kennedy told the American Society of Newspaper Editors Monday that the oil lobby intimidated the administration into "throwing in the towel" by ordering decontrol. He also said industry intimidation led the president to submit "a token windfall tax that is no more than a transparent fig leaf over the vast new profits the industry will reap."

Carter's retort: "That is just a lot of baloney."

He said he couldn't believe Kennedy said that. So Kennedy said it again.

## Verifying Jimmy Carter

WASHINGTON — President Carter's hard sell to persuade the Senate that Moscow can't cheat on the new strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT II) shows signs of backfiring, demonstrating anew his administration's propensity for falling into traps of its own making.

The backfire, clearly audible in Senate cloakroom gossip even among pro-Carter, pro-SALT senators, carries this warning for Jimmy Carter: lack of a serious, well-coordinated political

strategy to carry his great SALT II project through the Senate may trigger the worst defeat of his presidency. To make up for that absent strategy, Carter is now engaging in Carter-style hyperbole which is costing him potentially valuable SALT allies.

In the face of sharply conflicting testimony from his highest military and intelligence officials, Carter told the American Newspaper Publishers Assn. last week that the new treaty "will be verifiable from the first day it is signed". That

statement will haunt the hearing rooms of the Senate's Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees when Defense Secretary Harold Brown and Central Intelligence Agency Director Stansfield Turner testify on the new treaty. Both have publicly disagreed with it.

Far more than Carter, Turner and Brown have been circumspect in predicting when American monitoring may be able to recover from the loss of two CIA stations near the Soviet border in Iran. Turner estimated full recovery could take up to five years; Brown, even though under White House pressure to minimize the problem, said in a carefully-crafted statement April 17 it would "take about a year".

The discrepancy between Carter and the Turner-Brown team is no laughing matter to senators, some of whom feel Carter is not leveling with

them or the nation in his zeal to ward off defeat in the Senate. What has made his position on the explosive verification issue even more worrisome to the Senate is the personal way he is reacting to rising skepticism about verification.

"He acts as though we were calling him a liar just because we ask questions," one verification skeptic told us. That defensive mood of presidential defiance toward genuine Senate concern over Soviet cheating is co-ordinating Carter's political problem. Instead of conceding that real questions about verification do exist, Senate critics say he is treating the debate like an anti-Carter plot.

At least as troubling to the Senate is the surprising failure of the administration's early warning system to detect trouble on the

## Denies Inflation No. 1 Issue

NEW YORK (AP) — The big problem these days, says Harvey Kapnick, is not inflation, even if President Carter has declared it to be No. 1.

As an accountant — chairman of Arthur Anderson & Co., one of the top accounting firms — Kapnick is aware of the current 13 percent rise in prices. Still, he maintains, "inflation is not the problem."

Instead, he says, it is a result of problems: deficit spending, a weak trade position, discouragement of savings, a failure to develop domestic energy, uncoordinated regulation, and lagging productivity.

We attack the symptom, inflation, even while growing aware that the real problems can be dealt with. The real problems, however, are easy to avoid; in every instance they involve painful political decisions.

So often, it seems, accountants limit their function to reviewing the documents, verifying the numbers, analyzing procedures, and applying or withholding their imprimatur. Sometimes they comment on management, but management is their employer; it doesn't happen often.

When Kapnick spoke recently at Indiana University he felt constrained to advise his audience that his words would sound harsh, "all the more so coming from an accountant accustomed to calm, precise expression."

He proceeded to criticize the nation's economic management. We risk disaster, he said. "We need a coordinated economic policy as much as we need a coordinated defense policy." We don't have it, he said.

We discourage thrift, the basis of capital needed to make jobs and raise productivity, he said. Our regulators regulate narrow-

mindedly. Our energy program concentrates on price instead of self-sufficiency.

We don't even stop to identify the overriding issues that cause inflation and that must be dealt with in developing a coordinated, long-term national policy, Kapnick said, adding these observations:

—The federal budget deficit is probably bigger than what the numbers tell us. He should know; his job is peering behind the numbers. Using other accounting methods, accumulated federal deficits for 1975 through 1977 were probably 50 percent greater than shown.

"We need sound data at all levels of government to identify problems before they become crises. We can no longer have deficits of \$30-\$50 billion and unrecorded liabilities of the magnitude shown in the unofficial accrual statements."

—We must have a national program to export more. Our trade position is deteriorating, and it isn't because of oil. "Both West Germany and Japan import greater percentages of their oil than we do, and both have strong economies, sound currencies and favorable trade balances."

The problem is on the sell side. U.S. competitors use tax and other financial incentives to stimulate exports. We do not. We must change our policy.

—We have chosen to wage the energy battle with one hand tied. Nuclear power is still the cheapest and most abundant form of energy. "It is a crime that our vast coal resources have not been mobilized."

We must gain control of energy availability. "In business, a company that loses control over its ability to gain access to necessary raw materials usually goes out of business."

 verification front. Despite the virtually certain loss in the Iranian revolution of the top-rated Kabkhan monitoring station (capable of line-of-sight interception of missile telemetry seconds after a test launch), orders were not issued to devise substitute ways to monitor SALT II.  
 Only weeks before the predictable January departure of the deposed shah of Iran, Carter's budget chief, James T. McIntyre, cut more than \$100 million from Turner's fiscal year 1980 budget request for new verification monitors — presumably satellites. When Turner recently testified before a closed-door session of the Senate Intelligence Committee, his defense of McIntyre's cut, though obviously intended to show a united administration front, infuriated some senators.  
 The Senate committee is

now recommending that the cut be restored and that, as one committee Democrat told us, the president order a "crash program" to build up U.S. monitoring to pre-Iranian revolution levels.  
 Carter failed to foresee that extra spending to enhance verification would serve his political purpose in the Senate debate. That failure was compounded by leaked administration reports that the high-flying U-2 spy plane might be used as a stop-gap verification tool. This tactic quickly backfired. Most experts doubt the U-2 could lift the antennas needed to pick up missile telemetry — performance data radioed from a Soviet missile test.  
 Even if it could, however, there is today no assurance of advance notice of Soviet tests and therefore no sure way of knowing when the U-2 should take off to do its monitoring.  
 But most important, administration officials say the U-2 ploy could work only with Turkish overflight rights. Yet Turkish politicians have flatly informed the administration there is no chance for such overflights. U.S.-Turkish relations are poor, partly because Carter last year decided to jettison a new U.S.-Turkish Defense Cooperation Agreement painfully negotiated in the Ford administration.  
 Little wonder, then, that Carter's performance in the verification crisis — the first in what may be months of crises in his battle for SALT II — has left many senators dissatisfied and vaguely disquieted. The more he protests

 Proposing the profits tax on April 25, Carter said, "The congressional battle . . . will be a classic confrontation pitting the common and public good against the enormous power of a well-organized special interest."  
 Perhaps it will, but the confrontation turns out to be three-sided.  
 Carter criticizes oil companies he says are "awash with their greatest profits since the OPEC oil embargo" and grabbing for more.  
 Congressional liberals also criticize the oil industry.  
 But they also are bearing down on Carter who, after all, issued the order that will permit the price of domestically produced oil to begin rising toward world market prices next month.  
 They're trying to push through legislation that would block the decontrol order. Kennedy is among the sponsors of that move. It doesn't stand much chance.  
 Carter and his advisers had to know in advance they would face sharp congressional criticism when the decontrol order was issued.  
 The president's strategy seemed to be to defuse that by going after the oil industry on

the windfall profits issue.  
 "The oil lobby is going to be all over Capitol Hill like a chicken on a June bug," he said in Richmond, Va. "We are being told by them that we should just turn all the money over to them."  
 And in Manchester, N.H.: "There is no excuse for permitting any such massive ripoff. We must and we will have a good windfall profits tax."  
 The idea, it appeared, was to move the debate past the question of decontrol and on to the issue of a windfall profits tax.  
 For all Carter's warnings, the industry doesn't appear to be putting up much of a fight at the tax terms he proposed. And there still is plenty of controversy about the decontrol decision.  
 Carter told his Monday news conference that the windfall profits tax could not be confiscatory, or the oil industry wouldn't have money to achieve one of his objectives, an increase in domestic oil production. He said if Congress wants to impose a tax more stringent than his, that's all right with him so long as it is fair.  
 He also said decontrol of oil prices is mandated by law, and Kennedy knows it along with everyone else in Congress.  
 The law leaves controls to the discretion of the president beginning June 1, and would have the optional controls expire entirely on Oct. 1, 1981.  
 "This is not a decision that I made," Carter said Monday. "I am complying with an

existing law. In order to minimize the impact of decontrol, we are carefully and slowly phasing out controls over roughly a 28-month period."  
 That's not quite the way he described his role at an April 10 news conference, early in his public campaign on the issue.  
 He said then the controls question had paralyzed energy policy for years but that he had cut the knot "and put that decision behind us . . ."  
 "I have taken that responsibility on my own shoulders, as mandated by the Congress . . ." Carter said.

### Church Services Are Announced

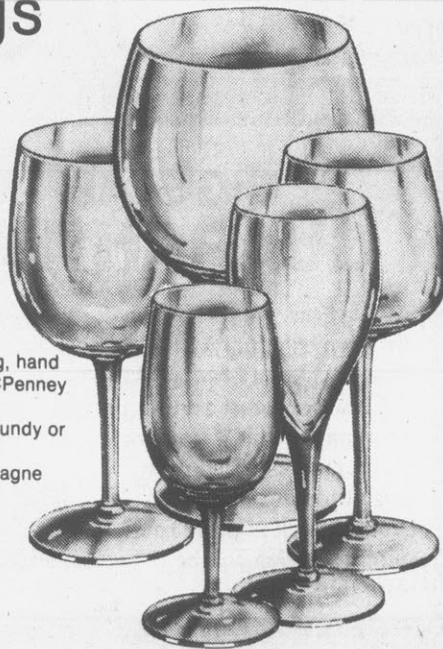

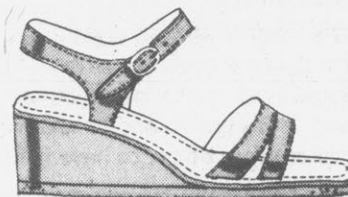

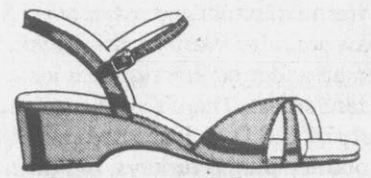

# CAMERA *Angles*

A short time ago, on March 26, 1979, press photographers' cameras and world attention were focused on the signing of the historic peace treaty between Israel and Egypt in Washington, D.C.

It was a formidable first step, a bond between two nations which had been enemies and belligerents for years, and a ray of hope for genuine peace in the Middle East now lit the way.

To a small group of nature photographers, March 1979 had another special significance. It was the first anniversary of the death by terrorists of Gail Rubin, 39, American-born wildlife photographer, in Israel. She was the first victim of a Palestinian terrorist raid in March 1978 on the Mediterranean coast at the Ma'agan Michael Nature Reserve, where she was photographing flocks of birds. That raid went on and left 34 Israeli dead and 80 wounded when it ended four hours later.

A landmark with a prospect for permanent peace is a significant way to remember the first anniversary of Gail Rubin's death and to recall the legacy she left in photography. She grew up in New York City, graduated from the Dalton School and Finch College in Manhattan, and established herself as a top nature photographer.

She went to Israel as a nature lover searching out the animals, birds, flowers and people of the tiny country. Her photographs were published in many wildlife magazines and last winter she had a photographic exhibition at the Jewish Museum in New York City.

One of her favorite photographic retreats was at Ein Gedi near the Dead Sea where she studied and photographed the Nubian ibex, the agile mountain goat often mentioned in the Bible. Another was the nature reserve at Ma'agan Michael north of Tel Aviv. Here, migratory birds criss-crossing Israel find it a great attraction because it has fish ponds where local kibbutz breed carp, mullet and other fish.



**WILDLIFE IN ISRAEL** lured Gail Rubin, American nature photographer, to that country to study and photograph animals, birds, flowers and people. Here's one of her photos of gazelles at a watering hole near the Jordan Valley. In March 1978, she was killed by Palestinian terrorists in a nature reserve, the first victim in a raid which counted 34 Israeli dead and 80 wounded.

The swamp area in Ma'agan Michael is frequented by herons, gulls, spoonbills, storks, ducks, plovers and sandpipers—a splendid parade of subjects for Gail's hunting with a camera.

It's ironic that on the day she was found by another breed of deadly hunters, the weather was so unattractive and stormy that she was the only one who had ventured out. She was glad she could take pictures of the birds undisturbed by other visitors. She never returned.

At Ein Gedi, while tracking the agile ibex with her camera and notebook, she received a great deal of help and information from American-born zoologist Len Aronson, a senior in-

structor in a nearby field school.

She learned that hunters had almost completely decimated the sturdy mountain goats about 30 years ago. They were prized game because every part of the body was useful. It had tasty meat, valuable skin and the long, curved horns made excellent daggers.

The Israeli government took notice of the danger in 1955, initiating a program of conservation of the ibex and all wild animals and birds mentioned in the Bible. Official regulations made certain all species would be preserved and allowed to proliferate.

The nature reserve at Ein Gedi has an Ixex Observatory where people can watch the animals in their natural environment and take pictures if they have proper telephoto equipment.

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## Tillage Methods Given An On-The-Farm Test

Extension and Research personnel are conducting an on-farm test to evaluate different tillage methods, and how it relates to yield and cost of production on the Ray Hardee farm, south of Ayden.

According to Gaylon Ambrose, Pitt County agricultural extension agent, the tillage program is comparing new tillage techniques with standard tillage practices.

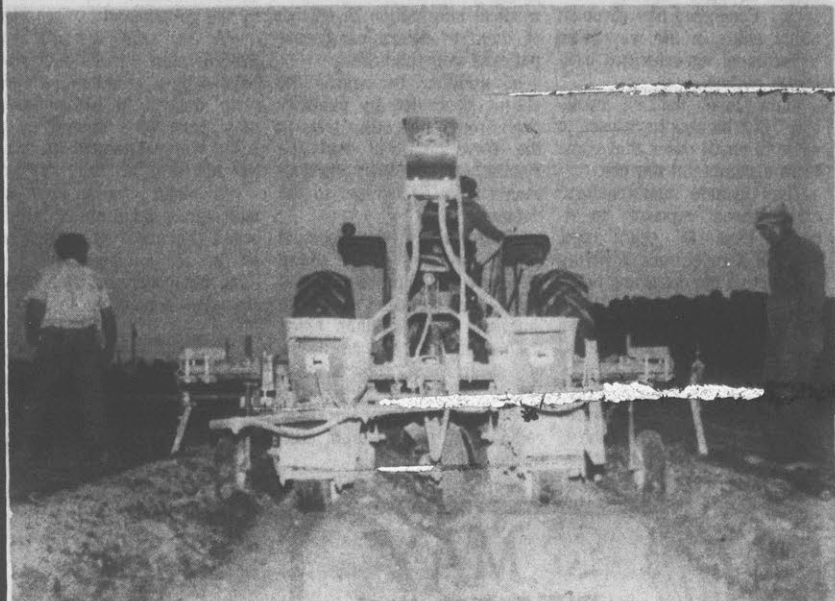
The new concept of using the ripper hipper in row subsoiling and bedding, and variations of the ripper hipper are being evaluated on different soil types.

"I am interested in reducing the number of trips across the field, especially with the rising cost of fuel," said Ray Hardee, Pitt County grower and test cooperater.

Dr. George Naderman, North

Carolina State University soil scientist said, "The tillage tests, such as the one on the Hardee Farm, are being conducted across the state on different soil types and under different environmental conditions on corn and soybeans."

"The tillage tests are comparing in row subsoiling and bedding, bedding only, moldboard plowing and subsoiling without bedding," he continued.

## Scott Urges Funds Go To Teacher Pay Hike

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Former Gov. Robert W. Scott said Tuesday that the money Gov. Jim Hunt's wants to spend on a tax refund would be better spent by providing teachers and state employees with a 7 percent pay increase.

In advocating the increase, Scott became the second major state politician to side with teacher and employee groups.

Last week Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green called for the pay hikes. Both are considered potential challengers for Hunt's job in 1980.

Scott said he favored the hikes because he didn't think it was fair for state employees and teachers to be made an example of when the guidelines are being bent to bring in top administrators from out-of-state.

In a speech to the Wake County Democratic Men's Club, Scott also criticized Hunt's proposed residential math and science school. But the former governor praised Hunts dealings with the University of North Carolina's desegregation dispute with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Last month Scott made a speech in Chapel Hill that was highly critical of Hunt. He said the favorable response he has received from state Democrats to his speech have made him far more serious about getting back in government.

Scott served as governor from 1969 to 1973.

Scott said some people have questioned him recently, asking whether as a Democrat he should be criticizing a Democratic administration.

"No one realized better than I that an incumbent governor has enough problems without some former governor running around giving him a hard time," he said. "That is certainly not my intent. I agree with the governor on a number

of issues." However, Scott said he would speak out when he felt the need.

Scott praised Hunt's proposal to spend \$40 million on the five predominantly black UNC campuses, but criticized his proposal to spend \$3 million for a school for gifted students in math and science.

"When there are so many unmet needs and programs for the handicapped, elderly, research and education, it is reasonable to question just how

pressing is the need for a special school for science and math," he said.

## Wake Tech Prexy Quits

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The president of Wake Technical Institute resigned Tuesday, one day after the school's trustees held a closed meeting to discuss what one called "a very serious allegation."

The trustees declined to say what the allegation concerned. But one official said a woman employee of the school had appeared before the trustees to complain about LeMay's behavior toward her. They also said that they had not requested his resignation.

LeMay, 59, could not be reached for comment.

Meanwhile, former Wake County District Attorney Burley Mitchell said in an interview with the News and Observer of Raleigh that LeMay had been the subject of at least two complaints from women employees at the school in 1976. No action was taken because the women did not want to pursue the complaints, he said.

LeMay sent his resignation from the \$42,672-a-year post to James P. Swindell, chairman of the trustees, said James A. Cox, vice president for administrative affairs.

In the letter, LeMay said he was taking extended sick leave until his resignation becomes effective at the end of June. He cited high blood pressure and fatigue as reasons for the sick leave but did not elaborate on his resignation, Cox said.

LeMay, a retired Army lieutenant colonel, was president of Wake Technical Institute for 14 years.

# Nuclear Radiation-Has It Endangered Thousands?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. government's traditional view that low level radiation doesn't cause cancer is under fire from many directions — and the bureaucracy is starting to backtrack and admit it may have been wrong.

The only official conclusions reached so far are tentative ones that risks are small and compensation for alleged victims will probably be hard to get. But information recently come to light and pressure from Congress has brought slight shifts in the way some government agencies are looking at claims.

"Low level ionizing radiation" is a blanket term used to refer to small doses that come from a number of sources.

They include man's natural environment, exposure to A-bomb tests 25 years ago, medical X-rays, work involving radioactive material, and being in the same neighborhood as a nuclear reactor gone wild as happened at Three Mile Island a few weeks ago.

"Low level" radiation was thought once to have no effect," says Vice Adm. Robert Monroe, director of the Defense Nuclear

Agency. "Now we're not so sure."

Monroe's involvement stems from controversy over open-air nuclear tests between 1945 and 1962 in which an estimated 250,000 military people were present, many of them in shots during the 1950s that included Operation Smoky and others in which large numbers of troops were relatively close.

DNA is now in the midst of an effort to find the 250,000 so the National Academy of Sciences can gather up-to-date medical information on enough of them to determine disease patterns over the years.

In addition to nearly 300 claims generated by publicity over Smoky and other tests in the Nevada desert and the Pacific, these other developments have added fuel to the debate:

—University of Utah medical school research which shows Utah children exposed to fallout from the Nevada tests got leukemia at more than twice the normal rate and disclosure of government reports that showed 4,300 sheep in the area died in 1953 after absorbing radioactive iodine from the tests.

—More than 500 cancer claims from Utah residents in areas exposed to fallout that the Energy Department has so far not decided whether to consider.

—Charges that workers who work on nuclear reactors in the Portsmouth, N.H., naval shipyard and with radioactive material at government nuclear facilities at Hanford, Wash., have contracted cancer far above above normal rates. The charges have been disputed by in-depth studies commissioned by the government.

—A law suit in which a Philadelphia truck driver, backed by a geneticist, alleges birth defects in his children may have been caused as a result of exposure to the Nevada tests.

—A draft report by an interagency government group urged that clear guidelines be set up for compensating victims, but concluded that "it is virtually impossible to deter-

mine whether a particular injury has been caused by exposure to radiation or other factors."

Operation Smoky, a 1954 test, came to public attention two years ago when Paul Cooper, a leukemia patient and former GI who took part in it, refused to accept the Veterans Administration's rejection of his claim for disability payments.

He took his case to the newspapers, a move credited with helping get a VA appeal board to reverse the decision and get him benefits shortly before he died in February, 1978.

Dr. Glen Caldwell of the government's Center for Disease Control in Atlanta launched a study that found the 3,153 men who took part in Smoky have suffered eight cases of leukemia, compared to about 3.5 he says might be expected in a similar-sized group of the same age range.

Caldwell found only about the same number of other types of cancers — roughly 100 — he would expect in a "normal" group, however.

He is leaning toward a conclusion that exposure to five A-bomb blasts the men went through, including Smoky, caused the increase in leukemia cases, but hasn't completed his detailed analysis and says "I'm close, but not quite willing to stick my neck out at this point."

Army records of film badges the men wore in Smoky to monitor their exposure showed the most any of the men received was 1 to 1.5 rem of radiation, with most of them well below that.

Those figures compare with present government safety standards which allow workers exposed to radioactivity to receive a maximum of 3 rem on the job in any three-month period. Government scientists figure the average American

receives about 16 rem in the course of a year, half of it from natural causes and almost all the rest from X-rays or other medical treatment.

But Caldwell and other scientists note film badges don't show radioactive fallout that comes after a nuclear explosion, and say whether the men got a higher dose from fallout and inhaling contaminated dust are some of the unanswered questions about Smoky.

The Defense Nuclear Agency has so far found the names of about 145,000 of the 250,000 military people in the open-air nuclear testing, and has assembled "preliminary" dosage information on about 45,000.

About 30,000 persons who were present at the tests have called in on a toll-free telephone line set up by the DNA. Officials say about 2,900 of them, or roughly 10 percent, have reported having cancer of

various kinds. About 40 percent of those are skin cancers, which have a number of causes including heavy exposure to sunlight and are easily treated.

DNA has so far sought out only those who received doses of more than 25 rem. It has records of 40 and says they were all identified when exposed, checked closely over a six-month period then and given a clean bill of health.

One of them is Albert Campbell, 52, a retired Air Force sergeant who now lives in San Bernardino, Calif.

Campbell was among a group who "took a bath in radioactive fallout" on Rongerik island when the land shifted suddenly during a 1954 test. He said "white flakes drifted down and piled up on tents just like

snow," radioactive enough to make a radio tube light up when placed against them.

"It's an eerie feeling to have somebody hold a geiger counter on you and hear it go click-click-click," he says of his dose of about 40 rem.

Until letters went out a month ago suggesting they get physicals at a VA hospital, the only long-term followup on his group was in 1970, when doctors found abnormally high numbers of thyroid cancers among Marshall Islanders who got doses of 130 rem or higher in the same test.

Similar letters went out then. Campbell never got one and DNA only has records of three of the group being examined, with no apparent ill-effects.

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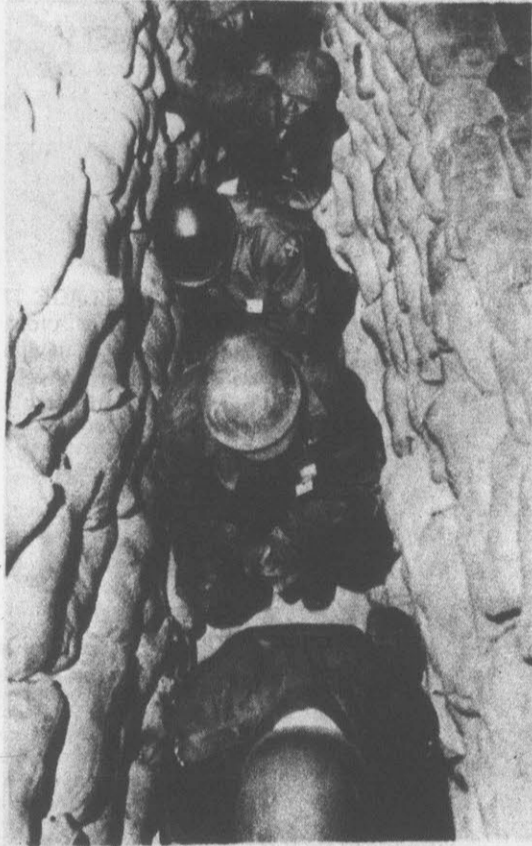

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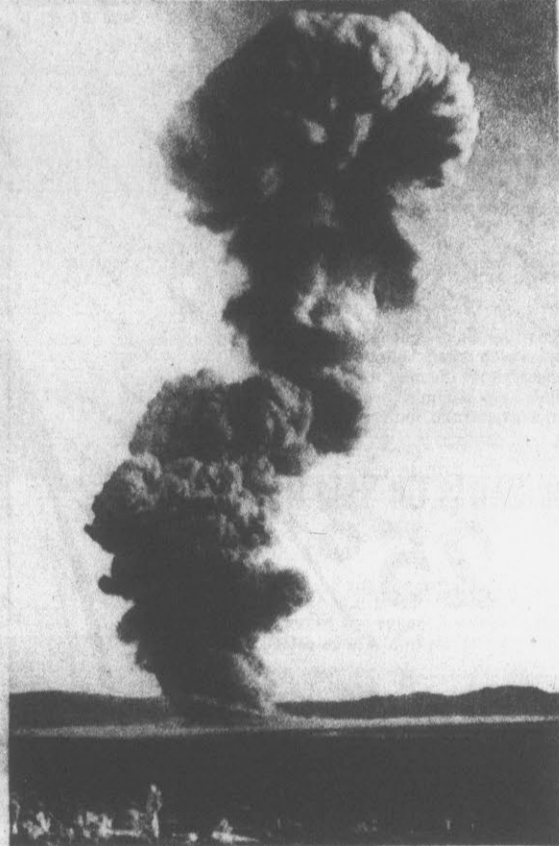

## UN University Has No Degrees

TOKYO (AP) — Nobody ever got a degree from the Tokyo-based United Nations University, and nobody ever will.

But this little-known institution, tucked away on two floors of a Tokyo skyscraper, now has sufficient funds to take its place in the academic world.

The turning point in the U.N. University's three-year history came in December when the British government pledged \$10 million, said its American rector, Dr. James Hester. Hester is former president of New York University.

Britain's contribution "radically altered" the institution's financial picture and prompted other governments in Asia and the Middle East to take a fresh look at their financial assistance, Hester said in an interview.

Instead of paying for the upkeep of a campus and buildings, providing students with learned professors and all the other things expected of a conventional university, contributions are put into an endowment fund, the interest from which supports the university.

The U.N. organization has several research projects in the works and all are "moving ahead vigorously," Hester said.

"In Algeria, for example, we're helping to design a solar village where traditional architecture and modern solar energy will be combined. The university is supplying the technical input on solar knowledge."

"The university has passed its first test. It's really phenomenal when you think we've only been going for three years," he said.

Hester said Britain initially had been one of the governments opposed to the creation of the university but reversed its decision after a thorough evaluation program.

"There was a feeling that international universities already existed and there was no need to duplicate what was being done," Hester explained.

He said Britain's contribution had had a tremendous impact on other countries and that France, West Germany and Italy were now active contributors. He declined to comment on the amounts.

The U.N. agency, the first to be located in Japan, operates in more than 100 countries coordinating research programs such as world hunger, human and social development, and use and management of natural resources.

Japan has been its strongest supporter, pledging \$100 million as well as buildings and facilities.

A \$10-million grant proposed by President Jimmy Carter was turned down by the U.S. Senate, but Hester said he was confident the United States would make a contribution.

Interest from the endowment fund, which Hester hopes will total \$500 million by 1981, is a major source of income for the university.

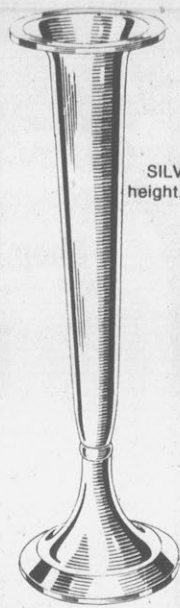
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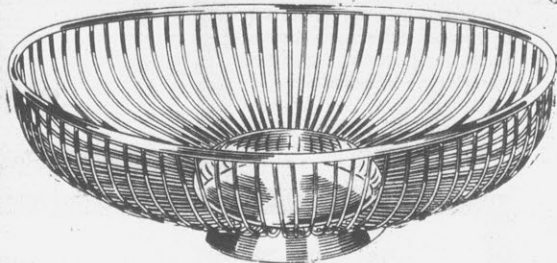
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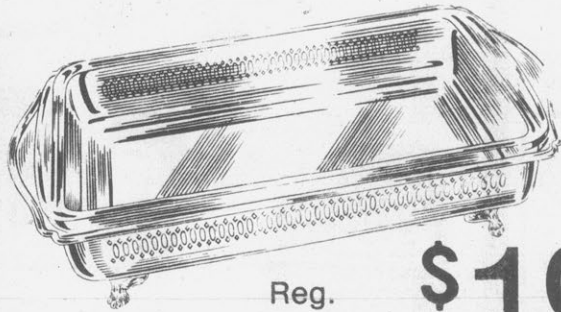
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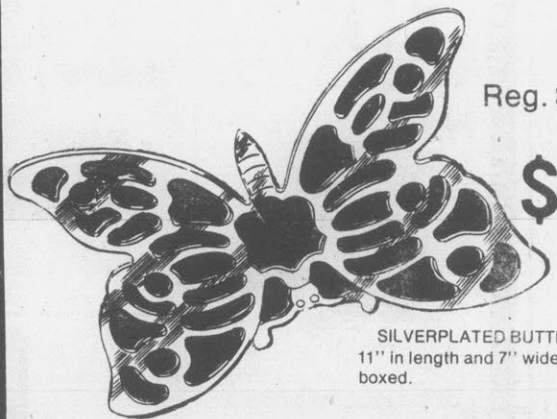


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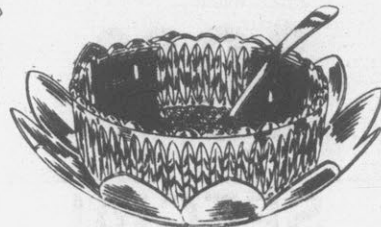
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# Farmville Bd. Gives Drainage Project Go-Ahead

FARMVILLE — Farmville Commissioners voted last night, based on positive testimony from several property owners in the Lincoln Park area, to go ahead with drainage improvement there.

The property owners present — Skin Willoughby, Ecclesiastes Joyner, Louise Foreman, and Abner Williams, the last of whom was representing St. John's Church, said the property owners want the drainage work done and understand that the average cost per lot owned may run between \$250 and \$300.

Commissioner John Turner Walston said he believes the work should be delayed till after the next big rain so it can be ascertained whether any town water flows into the area. If so, the town should help with the cost, he said.

An ordinance was enacted removing the two-hour parking limit in the Central Business District.

The Commissioners expressed interest in having representatives at the hearing on the Department of Transportation's seven-year Highway Improvements Plan to be held May 23 at 2 p. m. at Carteret Technical Institute.

Board members looked at designs for downtown street markers. The two they seemed to like best were one with a tobacco leaf and one with a Farmville logo.

Pete Anderson, president of the Farmville Senior Council, appealed to the board for help on a project to provide a van for transportation for local senior

citizens. His request was honored and a \$533 local match was put up by the town, based on a resolution by the board.

Mrs. Ruth Miller was introduced as the new Senior Activities Coordinator for the community.

Frank Styers, a local businessman, expressed his interest to the board in obtaining a franchise to furnish cable television to Farmville. The Commissioner asked that Town Administrator Patrick Thomas put together a study package about how the town would be involved in such a project.

Geoffrey McLean of Rocky Mount showed and explained a preliminary drawing of plantings his firm proposes for the "town commons," the site of the now demolished old high school in the 200 block of N. Main St. Possible cost, he said, would be in the area of \$15,000 to \$20,000, not counting a possible fountain and a cannon.

Police Chief Ron Cooper outlined the possibility of starting a Police Explorer Post Program here. Explorer members, he said, ranging in age from 15 to 18, would learn about police work by doing clerical and dispatch and other jobs around the station and would receive knowledge and guidance from the police officers.

The date of the proposed annexation of U. S. 264 West property was amended from July 1, 1979 to June 30, 1979, since a tax formula on the state level has been revised to reflect full months remaining in the fiscal year, rather than days left.

Public hearings were set for five rezoning applications for the

next regular meeting June 5. These include:

— Adjoining properties owned by Robert Pierce and Bobby Lewis at Fields and Wilson streets form light industrial to neighborhood business

— 2.15 acres in the Central Business District owned by Miss Tabitha DeVisconti to be granted conditional residential use

— property at the southern end of the CBD owned by the Amanda Barnes heirs, James H. Cobb and the Town of Farmville from light industrial to general business

— 1.24 acres centered around the Mark Owens law office from residential to central business, and

— property on Fields Street adjacent to the Pierce and Lewis property mentioned above from light industrial to residential. This land now contains mobile homes.

All of the above changes have been recommended by the Planning Board or the Board of Adjustment.

The board discussed a request by the Housing Authority for assistance in condemning a vacant lot located on the east side of Main Street opposite Bennett Street so that the street may be extended into a proposed expansion of the housing project.

The Commissioners let it be known that they are not pleased

with the National Guard's asking that the town seek another site for the Older Adult Nutrition Program. The board said that, if such a move is necessary, free utilities and a contribution now being made to the Armory by the town will be withdrawn.

A resolution was enacted affirming the Board's desire to have installed by the State DOT a system to preempt traffic signals on Main Street in favor of emergency vehicle movement when necessary. The cost to the Town is \$700.

It was reported that Dr. William Fulford has made a verbal request that he be allowed to connect a new portion of his Greenfield Heights housing development to the town's sewer system. If plans are presented, the board indicated it would request that the extension be made

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# How Tar Heel Senators, Representatives Voted

**By Roll Call Report**  
WASHINGTON — Here's how area Members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes April 23 through April 25.

**HOUSE**  
**LOTTERY DEVICES** — The House passed, 269 for and 121 against, a bill enabling U.S. manufacturers to sell lottery materials — such as instant-winner tickets and bingo cards — in foreign countries. The bill (HR 1301) was sent to the Senate.

Rep. George Danielson, D-Calif., a supporter, said: "Pass this law and create a few more jobs for American workers. Add a little bit to our own side of the balance of payments and raise some more taxes to help meet our budget deficit."

Rep. Carlos Moorhead, R-Calif., an opponent, said passage of the bill "would place Congress in the posture of encouraging the development and expansion of the lottery services industry throughout the U.S."

Members voting "yea" wanted to broaden markets for U.S. manufacturers of lottery devices.

Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, Ike Andrews, D-4, and Stephen Neal, D-5, voted "yea."

Reps. L.H. Fountain, D-2, Charles Whitley, D-3, Richardson Preyer, D-6, Charles Rose, D-7, W.C. Hefner, D-8, James Martin, R-9, James Broynhill, R-10, and Lamar Gudger, D-11, voted "nay."

**UNITED NATIONS** — The House rejected, 187 for and 214 against, an attempt to eliminate the \$41 million "technical assistance" contribution the U.S. is scheduled to make to the United Nations in fiscal 1980. Technical assistance programs, to be distinguished from the U.N.'s peacekeeping function, mostly benefit Third World countries. The vote came during debate on HR 3363, a State Department spending bill later passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. John Rousselot, R-Calif., said "the American people need relief from the mandatory assessments for technical assistance...an 'international income tax' designed to redistribute the world's wealth."

Rep. Edward Derwinski, R-Ill., an opponent, said: "This amendment would not shave anybody's taxes. It would not work to the advantage of the American taxpayer. It will impede us and embarrass us and weaken our leadership at the U.N."

Members voting "yea" wanted to eliminate the U.S. contribution to the United Nations for "technical assistance" programs.

Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Rose, Hefner, Martin, Broynhill and Gudger voted

"yea." Preyer voted "nay."  
**SENATE**  
**SHIPS FOR IRAN** — The Senate rejected, 26 for and 62 against, an amendment to eliminate budget authority for destroyers which the Shah of Iran ordered several years ago from a U.S. shipbuilder. The new Iranian government no longer wants the warships, and the Armed Services Committee has called their air defense system "clearly inadequate." The effect of this vote is that budget authority exists for the U.S. Navy to acquire them. At issue are four Spruance-class

destroyers under construction at the Ingalls Shipbuilding Division of Litton Industries in Pascagoula, Miss. Total estimated price tax for the four is \$1.35 billion. This vote occurred during debate on S Con Res 22, which set congressional spending ceilings through fiscal 1982.

Sen. Donald Riegle, D-Mich., the sponsor of the amendment, said: "We are going to take these ships off the Iranian government's hands, obsolete though they are for our needs, and we are going to buy them out."

Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., an

opponent, said that "anyone who has paid attention to evolving Soviet naval doctrine over the past 25 years could come to no conclusion other than that we should avail ourselves of the opportunity to acquire these four (destroyers)."

Senators voting "nay" favored the U.S. acquiring the ships originally ordered by Iran.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R, voted "nay."

Sen. Robert Morgan, D, did not vote.

**FEDERAL TRAVEL** — The Senate rejected, 41 for and 44 against, an amendment to reduce fiscal 1980 budget

authority by cutting out \$500 million earmarked for federal employees' travel, \$200 million for filmmaking by federal agencies and \$200 million in overtime for federal workers. The amendment also sought to reduce the federal work force by one percent through attrition, at a projected fiscal 1980 savings of \$200 million. It was proposed to S Con Res 22 (see vote above).

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, the sponsor, said his amendment would cut expenditures on "items considered extravagant by the American taxpayers."

Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, an opponent, said the

amendment had not been brought up in the Budget Committee, and that he was therefore "not about to just act blindly" and vote for it.

Senators voting "yea" favored the amendment.

Helms voted "yea." Morgan did not vote.

**CRIME MONEY** — The Senate rejected, 38 for and 46 against, an amendment to increase the fiscal 1980 budget authority for the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) from \$446 million recommended by the Budget Committee to \$546 million. The LEAA awards grants to and

works with state and local law enforcement agencies in hopes of cutting crime. The amendment was proposed to S Con Res 22 (see votes above).

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., the sponsor, said the agency deserves more money because "in the last five years there has been extraordinary success in the LEAA program."

Sen. Henry Bellmon, R-Okla., an opponent, said "the program has not reduced crime," and that LEAA should not get more money "at a time when it is necessary to exercise federal restraint" over the budget.

Senators voting "nay" were

opposed to additional funding authority for the LEAA. Helms voted "nay." Morgan did not vote.

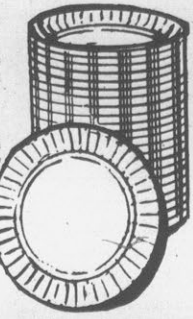

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## On-Campus Pinch Felt

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP) — The housing crunch for students seeking on-campus facilities appears to be worse than ever at Triangle area institutions.

A check indicates about 800 students have been denied on-campus housing at N. C. State for the 1979-80 school term, about 400 more than lost out in the school housing lottery last year.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill has turned away more than 800 students who will have to find other housing for next fall, compared with 600 last year.

Duke University says it has had a waiting list of about 200 students for each of the last three years. But at Duke, students are guaranteed housing on campus for their entire four years.

Richard Cox, Duke's assistant dean of student affairs, says that although 200 students are on the waiting list, they should have a room on the campus by fall.

At N. C. State, Charles Oglesby, residential life director, said more students are seeking space in the relatively inexpensive campus housing — \$245 per semester.

At Chapel Hill, Peggy Gibbs, UNC's assistant housing director, says increased enrollment, the high cost of off-campus housing and the less stringent rules in dormitories have made on-campus living more attractive.

Because of the lack of on-campus facilities, more than 14,000 students live off-campus at UNC.

The NYSE's composite common-stock index lost .02 to 57.34.

# GREAT Ridership Growth Leads N.C.

The Greenville Area Transit (GREAT) operation recorded the largest percentage of rider increases among transit systems in the state during December and January, according to the N.C. Department of Transportation.

Figures contained in a D.O.T. report on urban public transit operating results indicated that Greenville led the state with increases of 19.7 percent in ridership in December and 36.7 percent in January. Both totals offered comparisons with previous

years totals. Chapel Hill with 10.5 percent and Fayetteville with 10.4 percent ranked second and third in December increases while Raleigh with 3.73 percent represented the only other trans-

it system to record an increase. In January, Fayetteville with 29.6 percent, Salisbury with 19 percent, Raleigh with 17.5 percent, and High Point with 12.7 percent, followed Greenville in increases over the previous year. Winston-Salem (7.42), Wilmington (6.95), and Asheville (3.05) were the other cities to record ridership increases in January.

For the 12 months ending in January, Greenville again led in ridership increase over the previous year with 22.2 percent as 193,658 passengers took advantage of the GREAT operation. Raleigh (13.5), Fayetteville (7.3), Winston-Salem (4.02) and Salisbury (2.3) were the only other cities to record increases in ridership for the 12 month period.

According to the report, Greenville buses traveled 173,666 miles in the 12 months ending in January and net cost of service was up 1.7 percent over the comparable 12 month period. The cost-passenger figure for the local operation represented a decrease of 16.7 percent, the report indicated. Greenville was one of ten cities in North Carolina reporting operating results.

Cox indicated he would ask the Greenville Area Chamber of Commerce, along with representatives of the Department of Transportation's Aeronautics Division, to study the question and make recommendations on the operations.

Following the course set in this year's budget, both boards seemed to agree that the city should not contribute to the operations of the Sheltered Workshop.

"We're going to let Pitt County contribute what they want to contribute," Cox said, since city residents are also county tax payers, he indicated.

No action was taken by either board last night on the budget matters.

In other business, Charles Horne, director of the Greenville Utilities Commission, asked the boards to consider granting the commission a 100-foot wide easement across a portion of the city-county airport property for construction of an electric transmission line.

The line, Horne said, would parallel a Virginia Electric and Power Co. transmission line already in place across the property.

Horne also suggested that the extra-territorial jurisdiction limits along secondary road 1203 and 1204 west of the city be moved to the West.

The utilities official noted that the area is, "natural for us to serve with water and gravity sewer service," and said suggested that placing the area under the jurisdiction of the joint City-County Planning and Zoning Commission would regulate the development.

The boards also discussed the difficulty in obtaining a quorum for joint planning and zoning meetings.

"We want to work together," Cox emphasized, pointing out that, "a number of people had to be turned away," from last week's joint planning and zoning meeting because several county members of the board were unable to attend.

Martin said he would write to members of the commission and emphasize the importance of attendance at the sessions.

## Grant Asked

GRIMESLAND — The Town of Grimesland has filed applications with the State of North Carolina and the Environmental Protection Agency applications for funding assistance in preparing a 201 Facilities Plan.

If funded, the \$15,000 would come from the EPA, with \$2,500 each coming from State Clean Water Bond funds and the Town of Grimesland.

Among other things, the plan will include evaluations of potential sites and receiving streams for a variety of sewage treatment facilities that could serve the area.

Town officials, who said many complaints have been heard over the years about septic tank problems in the area, indicated that the 201 Facilities Plan will provide the municipal government a tool with which to plan adequate sewage treatment facilities for the area and help determine if a system would be economically feasible for the users.

The board approved Keeter's request to allow the local Manpower unit to conduct one-day a week classes at H. B. Sugg, Ayden Middle, North Pitt and A. G. Cox Schools.

Board member Jim Black, who has been appointed co-chairman of the Countywide Steering Committee for the Passage of the June 8 School Bond Referendum, gave a brief report on the committee's activities so far, noting that a major push was being made to register all eligible students and school personnel before Wednesday, May 9.

ACT president Annette MacRae told board members that the organization's political organization, PACE, would probably be able to work with the committee toward getting the vote out on June 8.

East Carolina University's baseball team outscored North Carolina Wesleyan by ten runs in a pair of games last night at Har-

rington Field, but came away with only a split in the two.

The Pirates bowed in the first game, 12-9, then came back to romp to a 13-0 win in the second.

N.C. Wesleyan, coached by former Pirate assistant Tony Guzzo, banged out 13 hits in the first game and made them pay off for 12 runs in the eight-inning contest.

East Carolina, which had taken an early lead, saw that vanish in a six-run third inning by the Bishops, then rallied to tie it up in the seventh.

Rick Derechailo put on another long-bat exhibition, hitting four home runs, two in each game.

That brought his total to ten for the season, giving him a new East Carolina season record. The old mark of nine was jointly set by Bobby Supel and Eddie Gates last year.

Butch Davis added three homers during the evening, bringing his total to nine for the year. Macon Moye also added a round-tripper.

The Bishops jumped on starting pitcher Bobby Patterson in the third, chasing him, then got the win off Parker Davis, as they sacked both of the top winners for the Pirates.

Hard-luck pitcher Mickey Britt, however, found himself in a bit of good luck in the second game as he fired a five-hit shutout at the Bishops, winning his fifth game of the year against seven losses.

"We didn't play that bad in the first game," Coach Monte Little said. "We just didn't get that good of pitching. And they hit the ball well. I've got to give them credit for that."

Guzzo agreed that his team came out attacking the ball.

East Carolina grabbed the lead in the first game with two runs in the first inning. Bob Neff walked and was sacrificed off. Davis then cracked the first of his three homers of the night for a 2-0 lead.

Niekro Wins 200th; Perry Gets His 270th

A lot of Phil Niekro's knucklers have danced around home plate since he signed his first professional baseball contract in 1959. Ah, yes, he remembers it well — especially his first contract.

"My biggest thrill was when I first signed at the age of 19," says the ace right-hander of the Atlanta Braves. "That was the biggest thrill I ever had in my life — just getting the chance to play major league ball."

Niekro has played major league ball extremely well and Tuesday night hit the lofty 200-victory plateau with a 5-2 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"I feel great out there," noted the 40-year-old pitcher who has posted a lifetime 200-175 mark with the Braves. "I still like to pitch."

Niekro's 200th triumph came in the city of Pittsburgh where he won his first major league game, in May of 1965. Among the 5,122 spectators at Three Rivers Stadium was his mother, Ivy, from nearby Lansing, Ohio.

"When your mother is sitting in the stands and she brought you up and cared for you for some 20 years, it's a good feeling to do it in front of her," said the right-hander, who tossed a seven-hitter.

In other National League games, the San Francisco Gi-

ants beat the Philadelphia Phillies 7-0; the St. Louis Cardinals edged the Houston Astros 7-6 in 11 innings; the Chicago Cubs whipped the Cincinnati Reds 5-1; the San Diego Padres outscored the New York Mets 10-5 and the Montreal Expos stopped the Los Angeles Dodgers 7-3.

Niekro's historic victory was fashioned with the help of two home runs by Gary Matthews. His second homer, an inside-the-park shot leading off the ninth, broke a 2-2 tie and the Braves added two insurance runs on a sacrifice fly by Mike Lum and an RBI single by Glenn Hubbard.

Giants 7, Phillies 0 Terry Whitfield hit an inside-the-park home run, singled and drove in three runs, while Bob Knepper pitched a five-hitter to lead San Francisco over Philadelphia.

It was the first victory in a frustrating road trip for the Giants, who for the third time since they moved from New York to the West Coast city had lost eight straight games.

## Seattle Runs Down Suns In First Game

SEATTLE (AP) — Running with the basketball is what the Phoenix Suns do best.

On Tuesday night, however, the Suns found themselves romping up and down the court not only without the ball, but on the heels of the Seattle players who had it.

When the opening game of the National Basketball Association's Western Conference championship series was over, the Sonics had beaten the Suns at their own game, running Phoenix off the Coliseum court 108-93.

It was a tenacious Seattle defense, led by the two Johnsons, Dennis and John, and control of the boards that denied Phoenix the lightning quick pace it prefers.

John Johnson harassed Walter Davis and limited the smooth shooting 6-foot-6 forward to just 13 points, nine below his team-leading playoff average.

Dennis Johnson played guard Paul Westphal belly-to-belly and the Suns' leading overall scorer wasn't a factor in the end, either. Westphal had 13 points on 5-of-13 shooting.

"I can't stop Paul every night," said Johnson, named earlier in the week to the NBA's all-defensive team. "My main objective isn't to stop Paul, it's to stop Phoenix."

"Flying Paster definitely is the best horse I've ever trained," said the 60-year-old Campbell of the California-bred horse which figures to go off as the second choice in Saturday's 105th Derby for 3-year-olds. "And he's going to get better."

Unlike his counterpart, trainer Bud Delp of Spectacular Bid, Campbell is a man of few words. But he fumes a little when the subject of California horses' poor showings at Churchill Downs in recent years is raised. Decidedly in 1962 was the last California-bred to win here while Majestic Prince in 1969 and Affirmed last year campaigned in California before coming East to win the Derby.

"California horses have done it before and California horses will do it again," said Campbell, a native of Canada. "There's no reason why horses from anywhere can't win the Derby. The reason some California horses didn't do well in the past was that they weren't good enough. This colt is good enough."

The son of Gummo has won 10 of 14 career starts, including

the Santa Anita and Hollywood derbies. Don Pierce, who has ridden Flying Paster in all his appearances, has been riding for 28 years and will be trying for his first Kentucky Derby win in four starts.

Campbell feels Pierce's experience could help his colt beat Spectacular Bid, who will have off-criticized Ronnie Franklin up. Franklin, 19, has been riding only since early last year.

"I think I have an edge with Don riding because he's going to know how the race is going to be run in the first eighth of a mile. It makes no difference to Flying Paster how the race is run. He's capable of adapting to any situation."

Spectacular Bid, a Kentucky-bred coming off a solid winter in Florida and a Blue Grass Stakes victory last week, has won 12 of 14 starts and figures to go for the lead at the start of Saturday's 1 1/4-mile race, worth \$200,000-added.

Another top Derby challenger is Flying Zee Stable's Screen King.

When the entry box closes Thursday morning, nine colts are expected to be entered. Arkansas Derby winner Golden Act, and General Assembly figure to be other top candidates. Other candidates include Lot O' Gold, King Celebrity, Shamgo and Sir Ivor Again.

# His Name Is Bob Smith, But To The World It's Wolfman Jack

By ROBERTA G. WAX HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — "Even my mama calls me Wolf," says plain old Bob Smith, better known as radio's Wolfman Jack.

Gone are the days of plain Bob. His wife, Lu, is called "Wolfwoman," and the husky-voiced, growling DJ even signs his checks "Wolfman." And contracts, too, of which there are plenty.

He has his fangs in many ples, including three syndicated radio shows — disco, oldies and top 20.

"Aaaaa-oooooo!" comes the shout from Wolfman's wood-paneled offices at the famous intersection of Hollywood and Vine. His voice goes to 2,200 stations, including armed forces radio, in 42 countries. He also hosts "Midnight Special" on television and makes several movie, TV and personal appearances.

Wolf's distinctive sound, brought up from the underground in the film "American Graffiti," lurks even in his normal speech.

Although he does not remember the exact year, it was during the early 1960s that he moved to Del Rio, Texas, and, in a scene that could have come from the movie "Viva Zapata," used guns and bribes to take over XERF, a failing, 250,000-watt radio station across the border in Ciudad Acuna, Mexico.

"I went to Del Rio because I wanted the biggest stage I could get (most AM stations have a maximum 50,000 watts)," Wolfman said. "The biggest station was XERF. It was the most powerful radio signal in the world. It's an all-time legendary radio station."

"Nobody knew where the station was, which gave it a mystique. You couldn't go to the station, you couldn't call us.

And if you wrote, you'd only get a post office box." The station made a fortune selling mail order products — "everything from weight pills to pigeons to burial policies."

The Wolfman himself was a mystery. For years, his race was of much discussion. Because of his voice, his lingo and the soul music he often played, many thought he was black.

"I was uni-racial," he said, with a gleeful cackle, stroking his pointy beard. "I was reaching them all, not only different races, but different cultures from grandmas to little bitty kids who thought I was real cute."

Despite his earthy image, fed by suggestive radio whisperings and a deep throated chuckle that sounds like the punch line to a dirty joke, Wolf, 42, is very much a family man careful about his image.

"There are lots of things I've turned down. I try to keep a good image. I feel a responsibility to the kids who listen and to the public. When people take you on, you have to do right by them."

However, his craziness has occasionally gotten out of hand. For example, while on KDAY in Los Angeles he caused a "War of the Worlds"-type panic by broadcasting a fictional "snoid attack" about "catapillar-like creatures who were crazy for beer."

"I had all these folks calling up, believing these things existed, calling the police. It took hold and got completely out of hand. I couldn't stop it. It went on through the night. I never got that serious again."

But the best stories about Wolfman, particularly about the Del Rio days, come from his wife of 16 years.

They had been married three years and had two children when Wolf went to Del Rio. Although they lived in a nice house, Mrs. Smith said she kept her children inside most of the time.

"You never knew who was knocking at your door. Once, a man brought a skinned baby goat with its head cut open."

"It seems like a fantasy now," said Mrs. Smith, a chic and attractive blonde. "I was young and naive. I didn't realize the danger. It was exciting, but not necessarily fun."

The couple met in Newport News, Va., where he was a disc jockey and she worked for an ad agency.

Dear Charlie:  
You are right. Duplicate bridge certainly helps you improve your declarer play, for you must struggle for every trick. I played this hand at the annual Marbella festival.

The auction was normal. Over my no trump opening partner probed for a 4-4 major fit, then raised me to game when I showed a spade suit.

West led a low club, and I had to make a decision at trick one. Since West was leading into the strong hand, I thought it was unlikely that he was leading away from the king, especially since there was nothing in the auction to suggest than an attacking lead was called for. So I put in the ten and captured East's king with the ace.

I could now afford a trump safety play (and I might have done so at rubber bridge), but the chance of a 4-0 trump break was slight, whereas there was a 40 percent chance that they would split 2-2. So I cashed the ace and king of trumps, on the second of which East discarded a low heart. The rest was easy.

I cashed the queen of clubs, entered my hand with the ace of hearts and ruffed a club. Now I simply ran the hearts. Since it would not have helped West to ruff, he discarded two diamonds and a club. But he was simply postponing the inevitable.

I discarded a diamond on

the fourth heart, then exited with a trump. West won, but he was in an unenviable position. If he led a club, I would ruff in one hand while discarding my diamond loser from the other. So West was forced to lead a diamond away from his king. Luckily, I had no guess in this suit. I called for dummy's queen, and when that held, I made two overtricks. That was good enough for almost all of the points on the board.

Note that I did nothing brilliant — all I had to do to achieve an excellent result was to make the right play at trick one.

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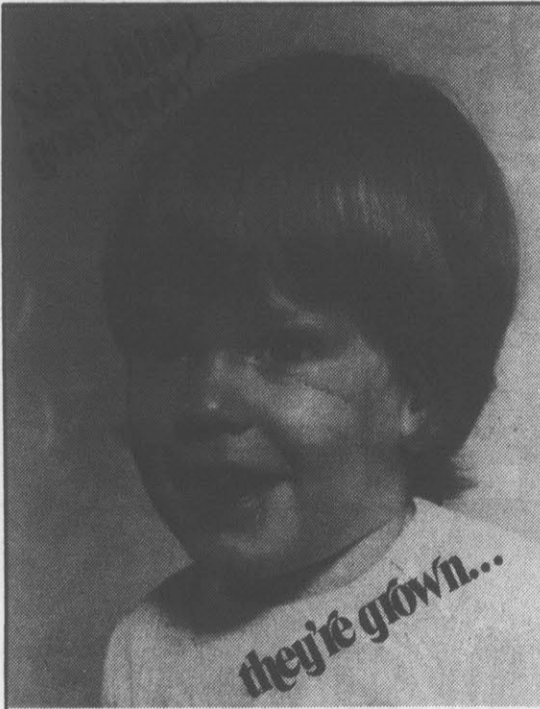

# End Most State Regulations Of Private Schools

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The state's church-affiliated schools and other private schools have won their battle to get themselves removed from most state regulation.

The Senate voted Tuesday to concur on House amendments and enact into law two bills removing those schools from most State Board of Education regulations, which many of the schools have been fighting for nearly two years.

The bills were first introduced and approved in the Senate. But they were rewritten before gaining House approval, and the Senate had to concur on those revisions.

The legislation sets up separate, less-stringent regulations for the church-affiliated and other private schools. Among other things, it removes them from the requirements to hire certified teachers and administer the state minimum-competency test.

The bills moved through the legislature with relative ease. Initial Senate approval came quickly. House approval was also given by an overwhelming

majority, although some House members did oppose the bills, saying they would have a detrimental effect on the state's public schools system.

The bills were opposed by state education officials who say their passage means the state can no longer ensure that every school child gets an equal educational opportunity in North Carolina.

In other legislative developments Tuesday: UNC-TV Legislation setting up a separate board of trustees for the University of North Carolina television network was approved unanimously by the House Higher Education Committee.

The committee first expanded the board of trustees to ensure that the UNC Board of Governors would appoint a majority of the members and to include the UNC president as a member.

The bill was recommended by a study commission, and its chairman, Crime Control Secretary Herbert Hyde, said the new structure would help the TV network secure more money.

Judges Tentative House approval was given to a proposed constitutional amendment that would require judges to be lawyers.

The measure was approved, 79-36, by only seven votes more than were needed to make up the two-thirds majority. Be-

cause it would amend the state constitution, the proposal needed 72 "yes" votes.

Opponents argued it would eliminate the public's freedom of choice in some situations. But proponents said the complexity of the state's laws makes it a necessity for judges to be lawyers.

If the proposal gains final approval in the legislature, it would be subject to ratification by North Carolina voters in the 1980 general election before it becomes part of the constitution.

Mixed Drinks A bill that would allow the sale of mixed drinks at con-

vention centers ran into trouble on the House floor and was sent back to committee for more work.

The bill would allow mixed drinks to be sold at convention centers only during banquets and conventions in areas where liquor by the drink has been approved.

Opponents argued that allowing liquor sales at convention centers would be like allowing bars to serve mixed drinks, which is prohibited by law in this state.

"There would be no way to prevent anybody from the street walking in an getting a drink," said Rep. Dan Lilley,

D-Lenoir. Supporters said the measure would help cities attract convention business and therefore get more money.

GOP Judges House Republicans lost out in their attempt to get a bill passed that would have required that regular Superior Court judges be both nominated and elected in their judicial districts.

Superior Court judges are now elected by statewide vote. Rep. Howard Coble, R-Guilford, said passage of his bill would be a gesture of fair play by the Democratic majority. However, the majority did

not agree, and the bill failed to pass second reading on a 23-85 vote.

Tech Schools The House approved and sent the Senate a bill that would allow technical institutes to be renamed technical colleges.

Approval came on a 75-33 vote with opponents saying the move was not really necessary.

However, the bill's sponsor, Rep. Louise Brennan, D-Mecklenburg, said it would give the institutions more prestige.

She told House members the fact that there was any debate over the matter put the technical institutes in a second-rate class.

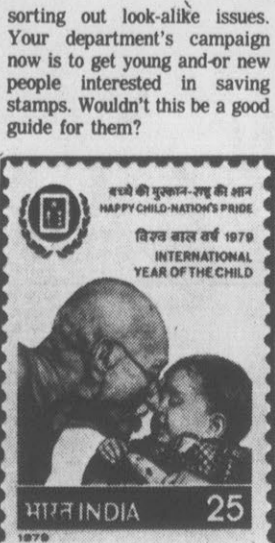
# Stamps In The News Volunteer Guardians Weighed

SEATTLE (UPI) — Mark was born deformed and profoundly retarded and was abandoned by his mother a few hours later.

In many parts of the country, he would have lived out his life as an unwanted ward of the state.

But Mark's needs for concern, affection and attention were answered by Foundation for the Handicapped, a group of volunteers who have become the only family he'll ever know.

"No one wanted him, but he was a living human being," said Ralph Munro, one of two fulltime executives the foundation made up of more than 2,000 volunteers across the state of Washington. It is guided by a board of directors which includes judges, business executives and public officials.

"We now have about 400 orphaned or abandoned retarded and handicapped people for whom we're the only family," Munro said.

He said groups in 16 states have sought guidance from the foundation in the hope of launching similar programs.

The foundation got its start in the early 1960s when John Hauberg, a prominent Seattle businessman with two retarded children of his own, began searching for an answer to the question: "What will become of them after I'm gone?"

"What was happening was that mentally retarded children were beginning to live out their full life expectancy and thus surviving their parents," Hauberg said.

The idea of working voluntarily to provide for such situations wasn't unique. "Organizations in several states had tried, but they had all failed to get a program going."

But, he said, "They all lacked the proper legal and financial framework for a successful program."

Hauberg worked with legislators, attorneys and fellow businessmen to establish such a framework. A businessman with vast timber interests, he brought his influence to bear on business, legislative and civic leaders to launch the foundation then wrote the checks from his own bank account to cover the organization's costs in its early years.

Now most of the financial support required for staffing an office and coordinating volunteer activities in various counties has been taken over by United Way.

The state's major banks each donate the time of a trust officer to handle the accounts set up by the foundation for each of those 400 members of the foundation's "family."

Munro got involved 11 years ago, taking under his wing a retarded boy at Fircrest School who had been abandoned by his parents.

When then Gov. Dan Evans toured the school, Munro complained that "little was being done to help such children."

Evans set up a state agency to coordinate volunteer programs and made Munro its director. Munro later helped combine various federal programs into the Action Agency during the Nixon administration, then joined Foundation for the Handicapped.

Munro credits, in part, the active interest of state officials and the assistance of state employee organizations for the success of the foundation.

"In many states, there is union apprehension about volunteer programs," he said. "They look upon such programs as job-threatening."

And he noted that "in some states, government has tried to

make use of volunteers for all the wrong reasons."

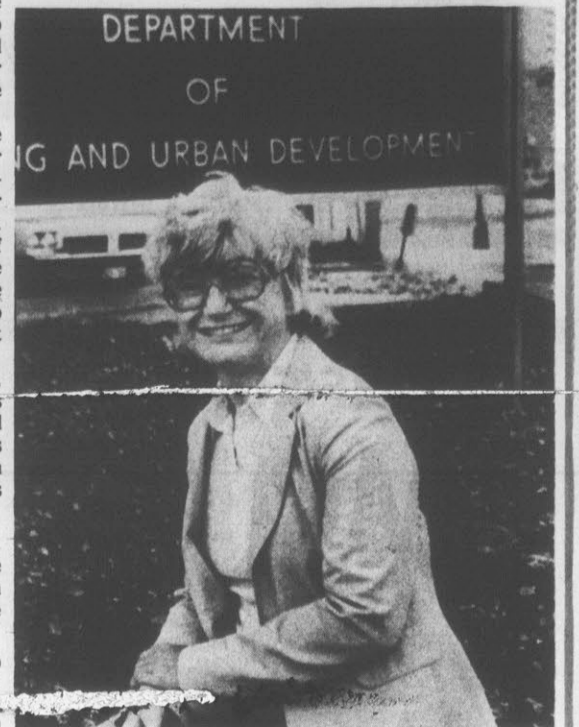
In California, he said, former Gov. Ronald Reagan "once talked of using volunteers to get rid of some state jobs and that killed meaningful volunteer programs there for a long time to come."

"In most parts of the country, these orphaned or abandoned kids are institutionalized and the state looks after their basic needs," Munro said.

"But one of the tragedies of having the state be the guardian is that one state agency won't fight another, so the care frequently isn't what it should be."

"Here we come in and say, 'hey, this person deserves better than he's getting' and the state listens. The volunteers working with the foundation bring some love and tenderness and personal concern."

Mark has changed my life," he said. "It changes the lives of most people who get involved in something like this."

## Use Up Your Envelopes

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," said Postmaster H. Lloyd Mills of Greenville. New size standards will become effective as of July 15.

After that date, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or five inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Mills said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are still likely to have smaller cards and envelopes in the stationery supply," Mills noted.

The regulations also prohibit the use of flimsy cards. Cards must be at least seven-thousandths of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine-thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, other letters can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, Postmaster Mills said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of seven cents for pieces more than 6 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

For more information, the postmaster suggests that customers check with post office window clerks.

John Alder of Hurricane, Utah, was a jet pilot who took part in about 40 tests in the 1950s, flying his F-84 fighter into mushroom clouds above the blasts to take radioactivity samples.

The geiger counter in his cockpit once nearly went off the scale at 500 — enough to kill — but he got out of the cloud before being exposed and is listed with an overall exposure of 28 rem during the tests.

Alder had two operations to remove easily-treated skin cancers from his neck and face in 1972 and 1977 before retiring from the Air Force. He says no other effects have shown up.

The new exams for Alder and the others are only just starting, but the government says it has so far heard of no leukemia or other serious cancer cases among the 40 men.

Scientists say about 16 percent of any group of 10,000 Americans, or about 1,600, can be expected to eventually die of cancer without abnormal radiation exposure.

The interagency group, headed by the HEW Department, reached "preliminary" conclusions one or two additional deaths might be caused by low-level radiation exposure. That would mean 25 to 50 additional cases in the 250,000 that took part in the nuclear tests.

The VA has received 272 claims from participants in the

nuclear tests. Sixty-six were dismissed out of hand after finding nothing wrong with the claimants. Of the rest, 8 have been found eligible for benefits so far and 198 rejected. Six rejections have been reversed by appeals boards.

Considered by many to be an example of government bureaucracy and ineffectiveness at its worst, the VA has come under heavy criticism from Congress and the public.

"It's at best an imperfect science," says a senior VA official of how claims are judged against probabilities of whether or not they were caused by the tests, 25 years or more later. "If you come up 50-50 or more, you give it to 'em. If you come up less than 50-50, you don't. You can't do any better."

In Paul Cooper's case and others, VA ducked the cause issue by finding the illness related to symptoms that appeared while they were still in the service.

But last August, an appeal board granted benefits to Donald Coe, last survivor of the eight Operation Smoky leukemia victims, without doing that. In a landmark ruling, it found for the first time "reasonably probable" cause Smoky radiation was responsible.

Lack of knowledge about low-level radiation — until the Smoky flap government research on animals had only

probed effects of high-level exposure — has led to fear and uncertainty about how much is too much.

Some doctors take the view any exposure to radiation is unsafe and advise patients to avoid even medical X-ray pictures used to diagnose disease.

There are also serious research problems. Studies of Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-bomb survivors showed radiation can cause leukemia and thyroid, breast, lung stomach and urinary cancer.

But most of those survivors got doses of more than 50 rem, and scientists say there is no good way to draw conclusions about smaller doses.

Lab experiments also show radiation causes genetic changes that lead to birth defects in animals. Japanese survivors have not yet suffered the same effects, and scientists say it may take five generations to find out if they will.

Until more is known about low-level radiation, controversy will continue. Some scientists say definite knowledge about specific cases of exposure may wait until after effects show up years later.

"The 'fallout' from Three Mile Island is still 20 or 30 years away," says Dr. Caldwell, the researcher who is doing the Smoky study.

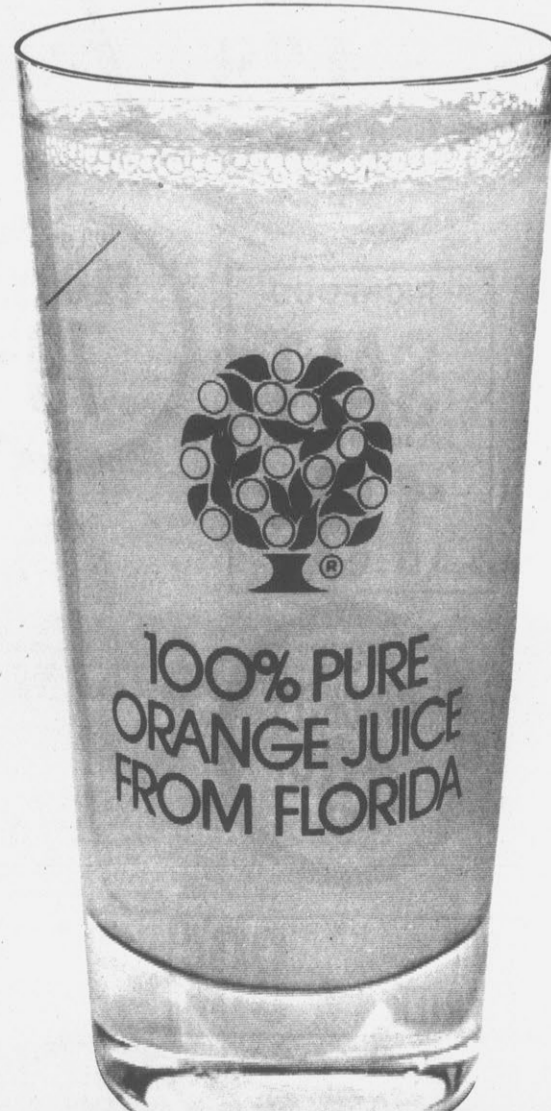

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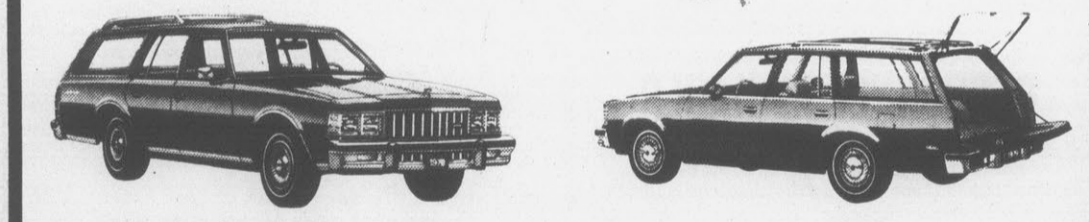

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# Overcoming Those Fears Of Flying

SAN MATEO, Calif. (UPI) — Roughly 25 million people in the United States fear flying, according to aviation industry statistics. Two women pilots have made a small start at changing that.

Through the Fear of Flying Clinic — it has nothing to do with Erica Jong's sexy novel — Fran Grant and Jeanne McElhatton, in a span of 2½ years, have helped some 200 northern Californians.

The women, both members of Ninety Nines, an international organization of women pilots, described their 10-week classroom course. It runs the gamut of overcoming phobias, accomplished with the help of a behavioral counselor, to an actual "graduation" flight to Los Angeles and back.

The course includes lectures by qualified airline and Federal Aviation Administration personnel — in most instances, people who will be with the class during its first flight — films, tours of airline and FAA facilities and demonstrations.

By the end of the course, the group not only has its fears licked, but will have a valuable working knowledge of the total picture of the functions involved in the flight of an aircraft.

"Basically, our program is based on education and relaxation," said Mrs. McElhatton. "We try to expose them to as much knowledge — from the ground crew to the aircraft crew to the people who man the control tower — as we can. We cover all the areas step by step."

"To date, our program has been effective for 95 percent of those who have flown before and 100 percent for those who have never flown. We've had people who backed out of the 'graduation flight' at the last minute, but no one has ever dropped out of the class."

So anxious are some of the participants to overcome their phobias that it is not uncommon to find someone traveling more than 200 miles, once a week, for the three-hour class.

"The first session is the most dramatic," said Mrs. Grant. "That's when people get together and discuss something they normally won't talk about with other friends. Suddenly, there's a whole roomful of people who are in the same situation. They know they're not alone. It's quite a moment for all of them."

The women have pinpointed seven areas that cause flight fright — not being in control, claustrophobia, acrophobia, turbulence, noise, separation from loved ones and dying.

"Each is dealt with one way or another during the course of the program," said Mrs. Grant. To give the program credibility, the women go directly to the source for their lecture series.

"We bring in the people who are in charge," Mrs. Grant said. "Pilots, who, by the way, accompany us on our 'graduation flight,' will come in and explain how an airplane flies. They'll talk about what creates lift, weather phenomena, radio communications, radar — the whole works."

"Then we have flight management personnel lecture the class on what takes place on the ground in preparation for a flight. We also tour the maintenance center where aircraft testing is observed and explained. We also board an aircraft briefly just to get the feel of it."

"Later, another on-board tour is used to explain the various functions of specific, visible parts of the aircraft — from flaps, stabilizers and the plane's auxiliary power to inflating an air vest and use of call buttons. Relaxation exercises also are practiced and a fantasy flight is introduced.

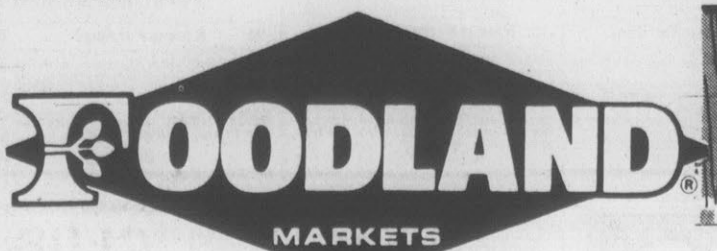
Another session takes the class to an Air Traffic Control Center for a first-hand explanation of its operation.

A final session is devoted to preparing the class for the "graduation flight" to Los Angeles.

"For that, we use the sights, sounds and feeling of getting on an aircraft," said Mrs. McElhatton. "We cover the flight step-by-step and it's very realistic and close for them."

Then, on "graduation day," the group — it's a voluntary flight — meets 90 minutes before flight time and boards the commercially scheduled flight before the rest of the passengers.

One flight volunteer or a member of the Ninety Nines will sit between two class members and hold hands on takeoff and landing.



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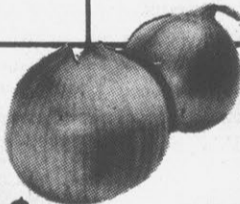
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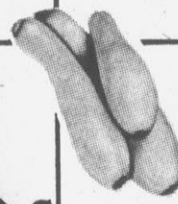
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# Dutch Prison Has Comfort, Good Views

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — Holland's newest prison offers its inmates a bird's-eye view of the Dutch capital and looks like a cluster of swank apartment buildings, but it's likely to be the last of its kind.

Although planned for only 622 prisoners — small by U.S. standards — the place is too big and cumbersome for easy management. Dutch authorities are already thinking again.

Occupying an 18-acre site on the southeast side of town, the \$90-million facility has six white-painted tower blocks where the prisoners live. The cells are comfortably furnished, each with separate washrooms, and prisoners can watch activity outside the prison walls through windows unimpeded by iron bars. The windows look ordinary but are made of laminated, bullet-proof glass and are wired with an alarm system.

In many ways, the new jail represents the optimal use of scarce building land in a crowded city and the ultimate in prison planning. But major problems have arisen during visiting hours in transporting inmates through security checks to the central service area.

Families complain that visiting time is unfairly cut by security.

Long delays when they call to see a client, and it takes prison officers coming on duty 10-15 minutes to work through the checks from the prison entrance to the last of the six 14-story tower blocks, raising the question of whether this time should be paid or not.

"There are just too many people to handle in a complex of this kind," said Ben van der Goorbergh, head of prison government development at the Dutch Justice Ministry, "and it seems unlikely that the experiment will be repeated. In the future, we plan to build for a maximum of 100-150 prisoners."

There are about 50 penal institutions in Holland, of which the new jail is the biggest and most modern, rivaled only by a two-year-old installation at Maastricht in the south of the country. In a land of 13.7 million people, the national prison population on any one day averages only about 3,200. However, about 25,000 persons are jailed each year under the Dutch theory of rapid turnover, which results in 55 percent of all offenders' serving sentences of six months or less.

The new facility will serve as the national prison for women and 70 of them — almost all of Holland's female convicts — have been moved into one of the towers. Male prisoners awaiting trial will occupy the rest of the complex and fewer than 100 are currently housed there, although numbers are expected to rise to maximum when the prison becomes fully operational in 1980. At that point prison staff totaling 750 will outnumber the inmates.

The prison was designed with a maximum consideration for human factors.

Basically, sophisticated electronic and mechanical units are used to seal off each floor in the tower blocks, containing the prisoners within so-called pavilions or residential units of 24 cells.

Each pavilion has its own leisure or dining room and two TV sets. Radio is piped into each cell.

Prisoners are given a key to their cell doors, which are frequently left open, if they want to lock up personal belongings. However, at 10 p.m. lights-out, a second lock is turned and each cell has a third electronic lock which can be centrally operated.

The prison also has ample facilities for sports and recreation, libraries, shopping kiosks, a multidimensional chapel and video equipment on which good late-night TV shows are sometimes taped by prison officers so they can be played back to inmates.

Various malls have been decorated by Dutch artists, who under the country's laws draw commissions worth 1 percent of the construction costs of any public building. Some, without objection from the authorities, have painted in a ladder or two.

However, security arrangements at the prison are regarded as tight enough to do without out-of-doors guard duty. A closed circuit TV system maintains surveillance, but TV cameras are not placed in the residential units.

"We have tried," said Van der Goorbergh, "to strike a balance between security and livability."



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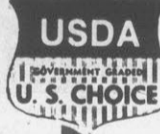

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## Say Humans Are Warming Globe

GENEVA (UPI) — Man is making the temperature rise. And that could have a serious economic effect.

Although discussions ranged over a number of topics, this was the primary conclusion of a 50-nation conference convened by the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) here recently.

"Many human activities have a dramatic effect on the climate," said Robert M. White of the United States, the conference chairman.

"The burning of oil, gas and coal, the destruction of vegetation and deforestation, the use of nitrogen fertilizers and industrial processes which release harmful gases, all contribute to an increase in atmospheric carbon dioxide which could raise the temperature by 4 degrees centigrade by the year 2000."

American economics Prof. Ralph D'Arge said a four-degree temperature rise would be economically "catastrophic," and would "so alter the present configuration and intensity of economic activities that predictable quantities or qualitative changes would become impossible to estimate or even foresee."

White stressed the need for governments to take "full advantage of existing climate information in making economic decisions, particularly developing countries where climatic variations can have disastrous effects on agriculture and consequently on economic stability."

But a lot more information is needed before international action can be taken to pin down and minimize these effects, he said.

On the question of climate change, West German climatologist Hermann Flohn said, "Cooling on a global scale could be produced by heavy volcanic eruptions, a decrease in the sun's radiation or a large-scale surge of the Antarctic ice sheet."

Most experts at the conference agreed there is a long-term trend toward a cooler climate for the next few thousand years, but that man is creating an artificial warming which would affect the world for the next few decades, White said.

He confirmed that research evidence and scientific investigation showed that the oxide nitrogen fumes emitted by supersonic airplanes have no significant effect on the ozone layer, as some experts had thought.

White stressed the importance of gaining more detailed knowledge of the weather. "The conference recommended a series of regional inter-ministerial conferences.

"The state of our knowledge of climate is seriously deficient and considerably more international research is required to clarify and reduce uncertainties, especially those relating to man's influence on the weather," White said.
