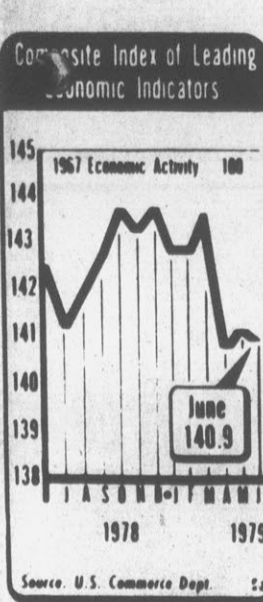


## Indicators Fail Show Down Trend

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government index for predicting future economic trends was down 0.1 percent in June, partly due to a slowdown in employment and factory orders, the Commerce Department reports.



months of downward movement, a traditional measure of impending recession. The June drop came after a 0.3 percent gain in May and a 2.1 percent decline in April.

much of a recession we are in for," said department economist William Cox.

The decline began in the second quarter of this year, according to earlier department reports on the U.S. inflation-adjusted gross national product, and is expected to continue through the third quarter. The leading indicators have shown a decline since December, although the monthly pattern has been erratic.

The Carter administration, acknowledging the economy is in a recession, has predicted it will be mild and short-lived.

The barometer of future trends fell 1.7 percent in the second quarter of the year after a 0.2 percent drop in the first quarter. The index rose in all four quarters of 1978.

The index in June stood at 140.9, or 140.9 percent of the 1967 base period, compared with a revised 141.1 for May. Both are below the 143.7 reported in December.

The Commerce Department report indicates the average work week fell and the layoff rate increased in June, signs that consumers may have less to spend in future months. Factory orders were off, as were vendor performance and sensitive prices.

Five index components showed improvement: contracts and orders for plant and equipment, stock prices, building permits, money supply and liquid assets.

He sells the cans to the recycling truck at Pitt Plaza each Friday and turns in the "return for deposit" bottles at stores for refunds. This project has been a valuable experience for him. He's using his spare time constructively; he's learning to spend money that was not easy to earn wisely; and, in a small way, he's helping to keep Pitt County beautiful. Recently I took him to the Fast Fare Store on Hooker Road with six bottles. He was told that he could get only merchandise, not cash, in return for his bottles. I wouldn't call this spending money wisely. If outlets for soft drinks are going to refuse to pay cash for bottles, perhaps the bottles should be stamped, "return for exchange." B. P.

## School Merger Study Group

The Pitt County Board of Education Tuesday night authorized chairman Mark Owens to appoint members Bill McLawhorn, Beverly Congleton, Jim Black, William Earl House, Dr. J. O. Carson, and Dr. Thomas Patterson to work with Greenville City Board of Education members Ms. Terry Shank, Miles Frost and Donovan Phillips on a committee devoted to studying the possible merger of the two school systems.

The special call meeting Tuesday was held in lieu of the regular August 7 meeting. The board will not be meeting again until September 4, when children in grades K-9 go for orientation day.

Owens' authorization came after board members discussed the idea that county school age children comprise two-thirds of the total county school population. With that in mind, the board felt that the county should be represented by six members to the city board's three to equally represent the population.

"The more I look at the situation from a personal

standpoint, the more I'm concerned that any two groups meeting to evaluate this situation must reflect the makeup of students as represented by the two boards," said Dr. Thomas Patterson.

Transportation Supervisor Rodney Bullock came before the board to discuss triple transportation for children in the Stokes-Belvoir area. Bullock noted that under the present system, Belvoir children in grades K-8 are the first to get to school and usually among the last to be picked up for the afternoon, putting kindergarten children in school around 7:50 a.m. and coming home around 3:40 p.m. The board approved a change whereby buses would be provided for children in K-5, 6-8 and 9-12. With the new system, kindergartners would go into school around 8:15 a.m. and get out about 3 p.m.

Bullock pointed out that there would only be a four to five per cent increase in the number of drivers needed in the new plan, with no need for extra buses.

The board also approved the moving of a mobile unit from Bethel Elementary to

Belvoir Elementary, and two mobile units to be moved to D. H. Conley, one from Bethel and one from Griffon Elementary.

George Laws, energy control officer, reported on the new federal emergency energy conservation measures, whereby grades 7-12 buildings should be cooled no less than 78 degrees and heated no higher than 65 degrees. He pointed out that buildings housing grades K-6 are exempted from the federal guidelines.

Laws noted that the county board of education's policy was based on ranges of 68-72 for heating and 78-82 for cooling. He stated that buildings that house grades K-8 would have to strive toward maintaining federal guidelines in seventh and eighth grade classrooms to comply with the rules.

After a review presented by Superintendent Ott Alford, the board approved a plan for personnel evaluation with the exception of a list of teachers who would be exempted from evaluation. Superintendent Alford pointed out that the exemption was made so that no ill will would be felt toward those teachers who were not evaluated.

Following information presented by Associate Superintendent Tom Craft, the board approved existing

## Says Consumer Revolt Behind State Action

Joseph M. Parker, secretary of Operation Overcharge, said here yesterday that, "it is our belief that the climate created by what can be called a consumer revolt, made it possible," for the North Carolina Utilities Commission to order the Virginia Electric and Power Co. to convert five of its oil fired generating plants to coal use by the end of 1980 and refund some \$31 million to its retail customers in Eastern North Carolina.

Parker, editor of "The News Herald" in Ahoskie, said the utility commission decision only affects about half the residents of Northeastern North Carolina. The others, he said, are served by cities and towns that own their own electric systems and by electric coops, whose rates are set by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

"Operation Overcharge intends to do something about

that," within the next few weeks, Parker indicated.

Parker said some 45,000 residents of the 22 counties in the state served by VEPCO, who signed petitions last year that asked Gov. Jim Hunt to do what he could to seek reductions in VEPCO's rates, resulted in an investigation of the utility by the Utilities Commission's Public Staff. That investigation led to the commission's decision which was made public yesterday.

The commission, based upon the investigation and several hearings, determined that VEPCO's management has operated inadequately in the areas of management and maintenance of its generating facilities. "That's exactly what Operation Overcharge has been saying all along, Parker emphasized.

The petitions were circulated by various chambers of commerce in the East, and some 25,000 of the 45,000 signers of the petitions came from the Greenville-Pitt County area.

## Mailing City Tax Billings

Floyd Little, tax collector for the city of Greenville, reported that 1979 city tax billings will be mailed today. Little said that some 16,000 bills will be mailed out, representing a total levy of \$2.5 million at a total valuation of \$350 million.

The official urged local taxpayers to take advantage of the two percent discount offered by the city for payment of 1979 taxes during the month of August. He said that early payment will alleviate last-minute standing in line.

Little reminded local businesses that the final day for the purchase of 1979 privilege licenses was Tuesday, Aug. 31. A five percent penalty now applies for late purchases.

City taxes and license fees are paid at city hall, located at the corner of Fifth and Washington Streets.

Little said that persons with questions concerning their taxes should call city hall at 752-4137.

## Taking Oath

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Associate Justice Joseph W. Branch was scheduled to take the oath of office today to become the 21st chief justice of the state Supreme Court.

Branch, 63, an associate justice since 1966, was named by Gov. Jim Hunt to succeed Chief Justice Susie M. Sharp, 72.

Ms. Sharp retired from the post Tuesday.

## Carolina East Mall Formally Opened

A fast paced year of construction and preparation culminated today in the grand opening of the new \$16 million Carolina East Mall here, a 64-store regional shopping complex.

Grand opening ceremonies took place at the facility's main entrance and a sizable gathering rushed into the new complex after Vern Davenport, a kicker with the East Carolina University football squad, launched a football

over simulated goal posts and onto the mall roof.

Mayor Percy Cox welcomed the mall personnel to Greenville and said that the opening represented "probably one of the greatest events Greenville has seen."

Cox recalled that the city was approached a little over three years ago by Ernest W. Hahn Inc. regarding possible rezoning and annexation of the 37-acre mall site. The mayor said that the rezoning and annexation took place but the city "never anticipated

what you (area citizens) will see this morning."

The city official noted that Greenville is "getting to be the regional center for the East" and he pointed out that the new mall will be one of the biggest drawing cards in all of eastern North Carolina.

Greenville, he said, is fortunate to be the hub of eastern North Carolina and he congratulated the Hahn company for having the foresight to locate here.

## Carter Asks GOP To Support His Proposed Windfall Profits Tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, back from a trip to the grassroots he said gave him "a much clearer sense of what this nation is, what its problems are," asked Republican congressional leaders today to support his proposed "windfall" oil profits tax.

Senate GOP Leader Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee said he told Carter at a breakfast meeting in the White House that "the chances of getting a windfall profits tax enacted are very good, indeed."

However, Baker said the president and the Republican leadership are not in agreement on the distribution of the revenue from the proposed tax on oil companies.

Baker said he thought a compromise was possible. "You don't have to have a 100 percent plowback," he told reporters.

The senator also praised Carter for making an effort to open regular communication with congressional Republicans.

The president's nine-hour

trip Tuesday to the lush green hills of Kentucky also brought him campaign-like acclaim in the small, whiskey-making city of Bardstown, where he held his first U.S. "town meeting" in four months.

And before heading back to Washington, the president made a surprise trip to a tiny Indiana town struck by severe floods last week. He had declared the area a disaster area before departing Washington.

The stop at English, Ind. — which took him 65 miles out of the way on a helicopter trip from Bardstown back to Air Force One at Louisville — drew favorable reviews from some of the town's 600 residents. "You've restored our faith in government," said one woman. "It shows he's concerned," said Harvey Dearborn.

The questions put to him by citizens at Bardstown, with one exception, dealt with topics and concerns Carter often is asked about in Washington: prospects for gasoline rationing and a resumption of the military draft, the new Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, the plight

of Vietnamese refugees and environmental concerns.

The exception was one woman's complaint about her local telephone service, which Carter promised to look into within 24 hours.

One topic that surely would have been broached in Washington, however, was not mentioned in Bardstown — the president's purge of his Cabinet.

Carter made energy the No. 1 topic for the trip by stopping first at a coal-fired power plant near Louisville, where he met for an hour with coal industry leaders and talked to 200 hardhat workers about the need to place greater reliance on American-mined coal.

Stepping onto a flower-bordered, red-carpeted platform in the steamy gymnasium at Bardstown High School, the president again talked about coal and the energy problem, saying: "America is the Saudi Arabia of coal, blessed with enormous reserves. ...I would rather burn a ton of Kentucky coal than see our nation become dependent by buying another barrel of OPEC oil."

## ECU Searching For Needed Student Housing

East Carolina University, bracing for the opening of the fall semester Aug. 25, is expecting a severe housing shortage.

ECU's residence halls, which have a normal capacity of 5,500, are filled for the

fall semester and Housing director Dan Wooten said a waiting list of approximately 397 already exists. On a temporary basis, three students will be housed per room in 48 rooms and 21 students will be assigned also temporarily, to living space in the ECU In-

firmary.

It is expected that these students assigned three-in-a room and in the infirmary will be able to move during the first month of the semester into regular semi-private rooms as vacancies are created by "no shows" and

early withdrawals.

Chancellor Thomas B. Brewer noted that all possible steps are being taken to alleviate the housing situation for ECU students.

"The supply of off-campus housing information which is usually maintained by the

Housing Office has been exhausted. This, coupled with the shortage of residence hall space, has created a critical situation for students presently seeking housing," Dr. Brewer said.

"The University is in desperate need of assistance

from residents in the community who may be in a position to rent space in their homes," Brewer said. "Anyone interested in offering assistance is asked to call the Housing Office at East Carolina University, 757-6450 or 757-6639."

## Censured Congressman Back To Normal Duties

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Charles C. Diggs Jr. was returning to his normal duties as a congressman today after a climactic day in which he became only the 19th member in the history of the republic to be censured by his House colleagues.

The House voted 414-0 Tuesday to censure the Michigan Democrat for financial misconduct. Four members voted present.

While embarrassing to Diggs, the action had little, if any, practical effect on his congressional standing. He still retains his right to vote, his committee assignments and the perquisites

that go with being a congressman.

He has no positions of power, having relinquished both his chairmanships after his federal court conviction last year on 29 counts of mail fraud and of making false statements.

Diggs, the first congressman to be censured in 58 years, showed no emotion during the debate or as House Speaker

Thomas P. O'Neill pronounced the censure.

Censure, the strongest punishment short of expulsion, requires the member to stand in front of the House while his actions are formally condemned.

The censure was based on an admission by Diggs that he violated House rules by using his congressional payroll to help pay his personal expenses.

The House action has no effect on Diggs' federal conviction, which he is appealing. Nor does the censure close the door to further disciplinary action by the House should Diggs's appeals.

Diggs, a former chairman of the House Black Caucus, faces a three-year prison sentence if his appeal is rejected.

The veteran congressman presented no defense on the House floor, and his comments afterwards were muted. "I don't have anything to say," he told reporters. "It (the censure) speaks for itself."

Asked if he would resign, as one member suggested, Diggs replied: "I'm still here and I expect to serve out my term." Asked whether he intends to seek re-election next year, he said, "Oh, yes."

### Some 'Lightly' Contaminated

SOUTHPORT, N.C. (AP) — Carolina Power & Light Co. said Tuesday four or five workers were contaminated, none seriously, when a small leak occurred in its Brunswick nuclear plant last month.

Officials said the accident occurred when control rods were being withdrawn from the No. 2 reactor at the plant.

Spokesman Fred Tollison said all of the men went back to work immediately after cleaning their clothes, he said.

### Vote 'Near' On Talmadge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Ethics Committee is close to a vote on whether to recommend censure or some other disciplinary action against Sen. Hermand Talmadge for financial misconduct.

The committee scheduled a meeting today to consider a recommendation of censure from Carl Eardley, the panel's special counsel who headed a 14-month-long investigation into the Georgia Democrat's finances.

The committee could postpone any decision on the case until after the Senate's 30-day August recess which begins Friday.

But committee sources indicated Tuesday it was more likely some vote would be taken today.

Talmadge has been accused of five specific violations of Senate rules, including turning campaign contributions to his personal use and knowingly claiming Senate expense funds to which he was not entitled.

Censure was recommended for two other members in this century but both motions were defeated. Those motions involved Democrats Adam Clayton Powell of New York in 1967 and Edward R. Roybal of California last year.

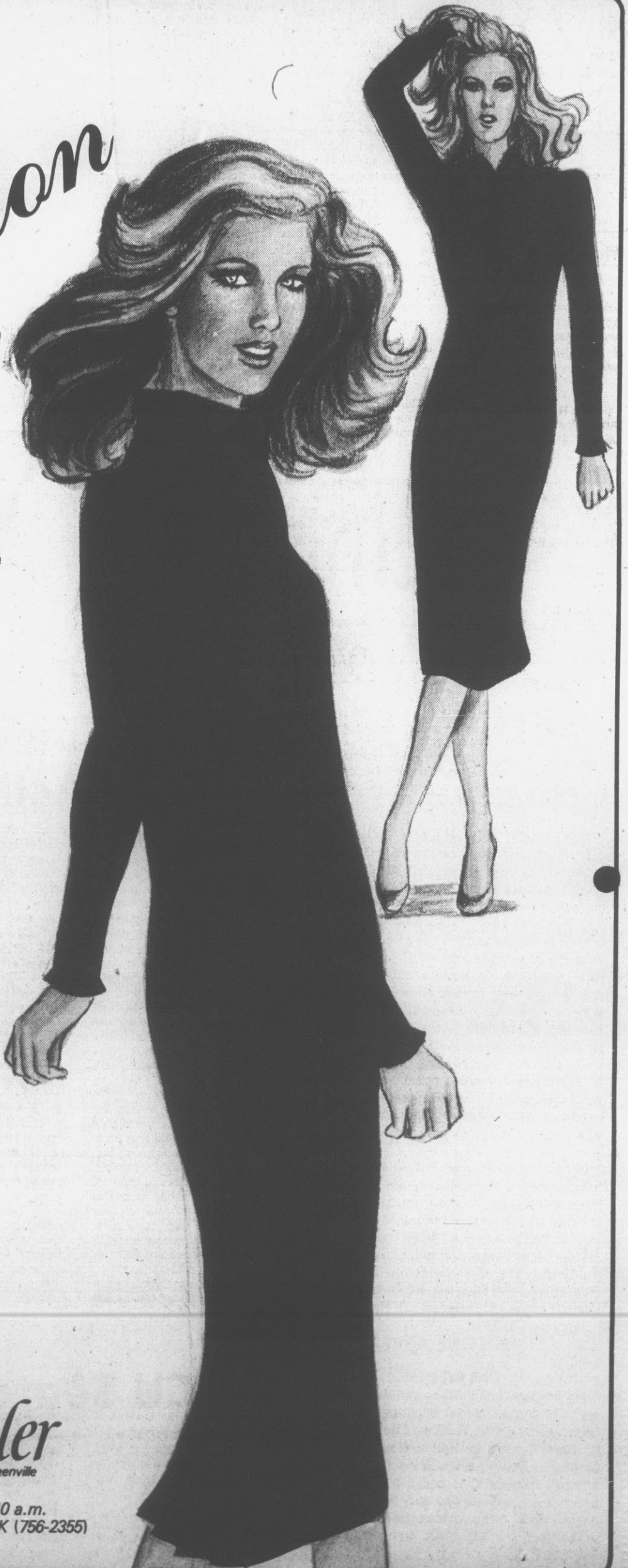

## 'Buy Better Quality' Says Fashion Head

Buying better quality garments, and fewer of them, is advice offered to mothers coping with inflation by Jack Simpson of Chicago, Ill.

As fashion director of children's wear for Sears, Roebuck and Co., Simpson was here prior to the opening of Carolina East Mall today.

Continuing he said, "Mothers should also stick to basic colors and relative basic styling — avoid-gimmicky styling. He also recommends buying ahead within reason. Considering Greenville's climate, mothers might try layering instead of investing in an expensive outer garment when considering growth.

"Using a garment for a double purpose — such as a flannel shirt as a lightweight jacket or as a shirt."

In discussing future fashions or trends in children's clothing, Simpson said, "I think clothing will become simpler and more functional with the use of stretch fabrics in very basic tops and bottoms over the next 20 years.

"Changes over the years have been in selections, particularly in the boys' line. There has been a lot more fashion input, more of a selection for dressing, more colors and a wider variety. The performance of fabrics, year by year, improves — we can do

more interesting things with fabrics and make them easy care."

As the design and fashion coordinator for all children's apparel, he provides direction to Sears children's wear departments on merchandising fashion apparel. He travels to Europe and other world fashion centers several times a year viewing styles.

He works mostly now with designers, not actually in designing, "but more or less screening the designs, adding to or subtracting ideas if needed. I have unconsciously done some designing, but primarily I screen or edit. In most cases its taking away an extra tier on the skirt or a button at the neckline.

"One of my peeves is seeing a youngster dressed like an adult. The garment or style has to be altered to fit the child's size."

Of his position, Simpson said, "It's a fun job. Kids are very honest, very perceptive and they know what they like or dislike and we listen to them. I'm lucky enough to see the merchandise created and follow it through to the point where it's presented to the customer."

Simpson has appeared on national television on the Mike Douglas, Virginia Graham, Dinah Shore and Julia Meade shows. He has taken the Winnie-the-Pooh Collection to Russia and served as Pooh's campaign manager in nationwide political "campaigns" during the past three elections.

"When Sears decided to market the Winnie line, I was assigned to help develop and promote the idea throughout the United States," he added.

## Homemaker's Haven

### "Home Ownership?"

Over the past two years we have seen housing prices skyrocket. Comments like "when will it all stop" and "it's getting so that you can't afford a home" are heard. This situation leaves the average consumer with the question, "Should I buy a house today?"

Some experts tell us that the average cost of a new house is close to \$50,000. If you're considering a new home, you might want to ask yourself, "Can I afford a new house and still have money left over for other things?"

It's not just the initial cost of the house that's high. Taxes, interest charges, maintenance, and fuel costs are rising, too. In fact, these last four items could be the final straw that breaks the house-buyer's back.

An old rule of thumb used to say that you could afford to pay two and one-half times your yearly income for a house. Some financial advisors now say this amount is a little steep for most families.

A more realistic figure is a house that costs just one and one-half times your yearly income. It's true that home ownership brings pride, privacy, some tax breaks and freedom. The first question is, "Can you afford a new home?"

A second consideration for owners of either new or older homes is adequate home insurance. If your house is getting older — its value might be getting higher. So you might do well to check over your homeowners insurance and make sure that

it's adequate. Suppose you could get fifty thousand dollars for your present home. The important question would be, "How much would it cost you to build a new house of the same caliber?"

Keep in mind that the cost of construction materials has risen about ten percent a year. So if your house is 10 years old, building another one just like it could cost you almost double the original amount. This cost of replacement is what you need to insure against.

According to some insurance agents, you should be carrying at least eighty percent of the replacement cost. Unless your insurance company has been adjusting your coverage each year — you may discover your home owner's insurance is far from adequate.

The crystal ball does not guarantee that purchasing a new home is necessarily a profitable investment. As always, making a wise decision rests in the hands of each individual family and depends on a variety of factors which must be weighed carefully.

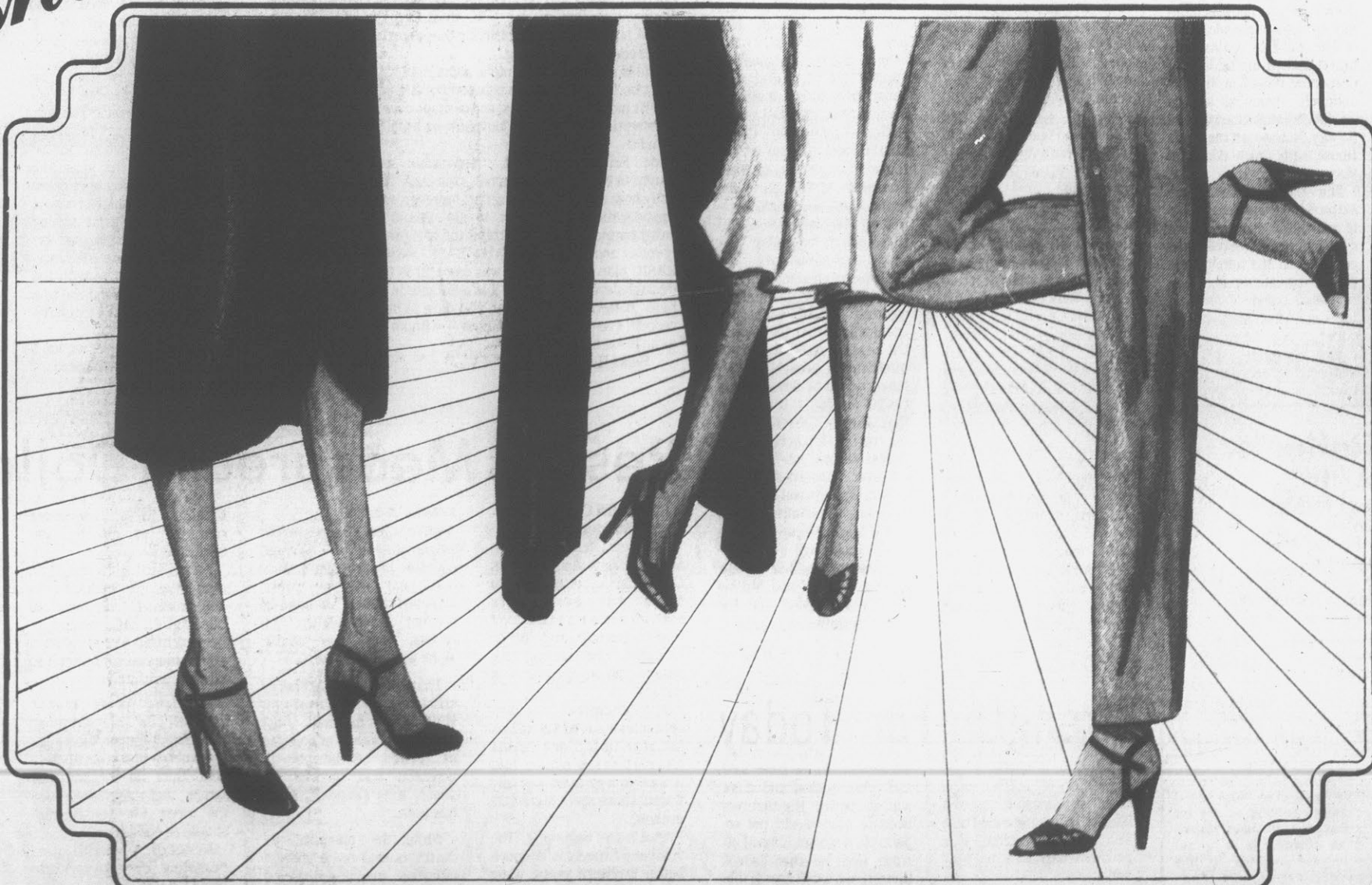

# Two-Language Tar Heels

 RALEIGH — A funny thing about North Carolinians: we talk two different languages, switching from one to the other without even realizing it.

That phenomenon, says Professor Wm. S. Powell, is a dead giveaway of a native Tar Heel. It also traps many a Brooklyn native trying to "pass."

In the sophisticated urban centers, the universities, the downtown commercial installations, Standard English is the rule.

But back home in the rural areas for a weekend — or even when enough North Carolinians are gathered together in some hoity-toity place — we all tend to lapse un-self-consciously into the words and pronunciations we grew up with back home.

All of this is complicated by the fact that three distinct dialects make up that second tongue. The trained ear can spot a mountain-reared person; an easterner; or the Outer Banks native. Further, an expert like Powell can often even pinpoint the county where the speaker grew up.

Human History

A history professor at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Powell escapes the musty image which shrouds so many in his chosen field. A sprightly, human, humorous fellow with a twinkle in his eye, he has published a history of North Carolina which reflects his own personality.

It is, he says, "for those who love North Carolina, and those who would like to be North Carolinians ... if they could only pull up their roots elsewhere." And, he might add, somehow get rid of that slip-of-the-tongue accent, and learn to pronounce the tricky North Carolina place names. Those names, more than any other, will trap the unwary imposter Tar Heel.

Powell's book, he insists, is not for scholars, but for people; and he hopes it will find a place not only in the homes but in libraries and particularly in schools.

"Our children in school today are being slighted. They are not being taught North Carolina history as we were," he feels.

There is no need for history to be stuffy. The North Carolina history did not involve major research to pin

down obscure names and dates. To the contrary, says Powell, he wrote it from lecture notes, memories, and impressions.

"It was almost like writing a novel....I would just sit down and let it flow. The difference being, of course, it is based on fact."

The central theme running through the slender volume is independence: "North Carolinians don't like to be told what to do....never have."

The other pattern running through the history of the state, Powell finds, is a propensity to set off on the wrong track and every body move off in a giant, sweeping stampede toward certain disaster.

Repeatedly This has happened time and again throughout history.

But then, short of total disaster, the stampede stops. "The good sense of the people prevails at last," Powell

chuckles.

What other traits does he assign us from his many years of scholarly study and life as a native son? The people of the state are very tolerant of others and their divergent viewpoints. That's why newcomers from other sections of the country so often find a home in this state.

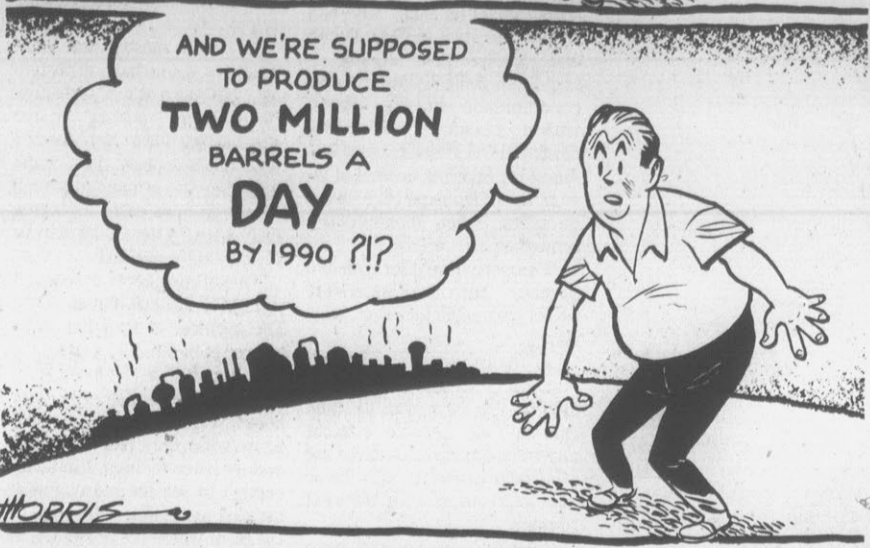
You can typically trust a North Carolinian to do the right thing — once he figures out what is the right thing.

And, you can find people typified as rural, backwoods Tar Heels investing huge amounts of time, energy and money in such things as art museums, symphony orchestras, outdoor dramas, schools of the art and such.

Complex people in a complex society? Not really — at least not hard to understand for those of us who automatically speak two languages.

Powell's book is part of a series of histories supported by the federal National Endowment for the Humanities and directed by the American Association for State and Local History in Nashville, Tenn.

# Carter Tax Cut Hinted

WASHINGTON — Although it came out in his old fuzzy use of language, now supposedly replaced by decisive rhetoric, President Carter last week tipped a change that dwarfs all the recent cosmetic transformations: a tax cut effective next Jan. 1.

The eight members of the House and Senate gathered at the White House Thursday morning to discuss anti-inflation policy could scarcely believe their ears. Shortly after entering the meeting, the president made a statement that, according to note-taking lawmakers, was close to this: It might be a very good idea if, in about October, we propose a tax cut of around \$20 billion effective Jan. 1, 1980.

Whether this constituted a flat statement of a 180-degree policy change was cloaked by Carter's old imprecision. But even if he was not proclaiming an instant abandonment of his iron line against any tax reduction in the face of deepening recession, he was obliquely signalling a high probability that change is on its way. Nobody left the White House with much doubt on that score.

The political implications surpass anything done so far to salvage Carter's presidency. Republicans have been counting on the administration to remain in the deep rout canal school of political economy: when people really suffer from economic policy, it must be working. If Carter instead embraces tax reduction, it may blunt the

Republican edge for 1980 while restoring his own political fortunes.

The first sign of this reassessment came after we reported that Carter, just last year, was lagging behind the conservative tax-cut coalition in Congress. One senior administration official, a member of the Economic Policy Group, told us he agreed with that assessment and hinted that change was ahead.

The change was suggested at Carter's July 25 news conference. Responding to a question about Republican tax-cut plans, he declared "there is no free lunch" but did not rule out a tax cut. "When I heard that," one influential liberal Democratic congressman, who has been backing the president's hold-the-line campaign against tax cuts, told us, "I felt a cold chill."

Chill or not, this congressman was in the White House next morning for a regular meeting of the Democratic congressional task force against inflation with anti-inflation czar Alfred Kahn. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas started the fireworks by declaring that with

unemployment expected to surpass 8.5 percent in the current recession, a tax cut is absolutely imperative.

That set off a barrage from practically everybody else present, especially the Democratic fiscal big guns of Capitol Hill, all ardent root canal advocates: Chairman Edmund Muskie of the Senate Budget Committee; Chairman Robert Gaijmo of the House Budget Committee; Chairman Al Ullman of the House Ways and Means Committee. They insisted on tight fiscal policy, no matter how deep the recession goes.

Bentsen, chairman of the Joint Economic Committee, retorted that his colleagues could think what they would but he was predicting the administration, probably by October, would be advocating a tax cut for Jan. 1. It was then that Jimmy Carter entered the room to lend credence to Bentsen's forecast.

Carter's opaque statement — a cross between a hedged forecast, a melancholy wish and a teasing hint — left the congressional budget-balancers with their mouths gaping. Gaijmo and Muskie quickly responded that the

# Results Measured In Dollars

 NEW YORK (AP) —

Several years ago American Cyanamid Co. set up a plan to save energy in its conglomerate of manufacturing and office facilities, and learned the results can be measured in dollars.

The chemical concern estimates it saved \$19 million last year. Its U.S. and Canada fuel bill was \$106 million. Had it used energy in the old way it would have spent about \$125 million.

That's the beginning. The company expects to do much better in future years, when the program is extended to overseas operations. Present savings come from U.S. and Canadian facilities only.

When Cyanamid began the program, it sought by 1980 a 14 percent saving over 1972 usage, in keeping with an industry goal set by the Department of Energy. It reached 16 percent by 1977; it

aims for 30 in 1980.

While these figures seem extraordinary — savings equalled 12 percent of profits last year — they were achieved without damage to product or job quality. The reverse was true; waste alone was eliminated.

That's the beauty of energy efficiency, say its advocates. It often pays for itself, if not immediately then in a period of years. Although its potential was ignored for years, it is simply efficient business.

While the chemical industry is said to be energy-intensive, meaning it uses a lot of energy, most other companies can benefit from keeping an eye on the fuel bill, and save 10 percent to 30 percent, says Cyanamid.

First they should have an audit, perhaps by a consultant such as the E.I. duPont company (which developed expertise in auditing its own plants), said

Eugene Steel, corporate manager of energy conservation.

Steam heat traps should be examined, for example, to determine if the heat is blowing through instead of being utilized. The problem is a common one not difficult to correct, said Steele.

Lighting is a major wastrel. In his opinion, fluorescent lamps, which use less energy and generate less heat than do incandescent lamps, and therefore reduce the need for air cooling, should be considered.

According to Steele, "Lighting levels historically have been higher than needed," based on Illuminating Society of America standards.

Waste heat should be utilized, Steele continued. "We have processes in which the temperature of the final product must be cooled. We'd use water to do it, and then we'd cool the water. Now we

# Sees A Pledge Too Far

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter seems to have promised more than he can deliver with his pledge to "cut the total size of the federal workforce."

He said that in an address to the nation Oct. 24 in which he outlined several steps he would take to combat inflation.

But at last count the total federal workforce has actually grown since then. As of May it was up about 27,000 people, to 2.9 million civilian workers.

Even discounting normal summer hirings and hiring in the Postal Service, Congress and other areas outside direct presidential control, federal employment is still creeping up.

In fact, the president may soon be forced to throw 1,000 to 2,000 federal workers off the payroll next Oct. 1 to meet a new legal ceiling on federal employment. He had hoped to cut employment through attrition and, in the process, in well under the ceiling.

But so far Carter hasn't delivered what he promised, much as he failed to deliver on his campaign pledge to cut the number of federal agencies from an alleged 1,900 or so to 200.

Carter now has no hope whatsoever of getting the total number of governmental units any.

# Woman Deputy Would Not Hesitate To Shoot

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Durham County may have hired two women as sheriff's deputies to control traffic and crowds at fires, but one of them says she will not hesitate to pull her gun and shoot if necessary.

Lucy Zastrow, who along with Susan Stuart are the first women in the county's history assigned to ride in patrol cars, said Monday the opportunity has not arisen to use her gun, but she believes that possibility goes with the job.

"Every day is different," know what to expect from one minute to the next."

Miss Zastrow said going into law enforcement was her mother's idea.

"I had decided to go back to school, and I sent her to Durham Technical Institute to pick up information on courses," she said. "I thought I would like nursing because I like to help people."

Her mother returned with a

brochure on the police-science curriculum instead, but told her there were no women deputies. Mrs. Zastrow told her daughter she did not know if the Durham County Sheriff's Department hired women deputies.

"Good, I'll be the first one," Miss Zastrow said she told her mother.

Miss Zastrow said after taking only part of the course, she was convinced she had found her career. She went to Sheriff Bill Allen and asked for a job.

Allen said he was concerned that hiring women would create resentment among the men in his department. But he said to date this has not materialized, and is considering hiring more women deputies.

"These women are doing a real good job," he said. "I think they may be trying to show the men up."

In filling future openings for deputies in his department, Allen said he would make no distinction between the sexes.

"If a woman is healthy and otherwise meets the standards of the department, I'll hire her."

"After he hired me, he told me that he had liked my qualifications and had planned to hire me all along," Miss Zastrow said. "He said I hadn't had to get down on my knees for the job."

Mrs. Stuart was a deputy with a sheriff's department in

Louisiana for more than six years before moving to Durham.

"Crime investigation and all that goes with a field deputy's work are just part of the job," Mrs. Stuart said. She said she patrolled Louisiana's Quatchita Parrish for 3½ years.

"I find that if you treat people with dignity and respect, they don't give you much trouble," she said.

Mrs. Stuart, who earned a bachelor's and masters degree in criminal justice at Northeastern Louisiana University, entered law enforcement because she felt "you shouldn't sit back and complain and criticize others who are doing the job."

## Trial Date Set For 3 Killings

RUTHERFORDTON, N.C. (AP) — A tentative trial date of Sept. 17 has been set for a Rutherford County man charged with three counts of first degree murder in connection with the May 31 death of two sheriff's deputies and a Highway Patrol trooper.

A Rutherford County grand jury returned indictments Tuesday charging James W. Hutchins of the Green Hill community with the deaths.

Hutchins, 50, is accused of murder in connection with the deaths of Capt. Roy Huskey, 42; Sgt. Owen Messersmith, 58, and Trooper R.L. "Pete" Peterson, 37.

## Mixed Drinks In Fayetteville

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — When the first mixed drink is served in Fayetteville today, it will be the first time in 81 years that drinkers have legally been able to purchase a cocktail in a commercial establishment in Cumberland County.

Although the regulations in 1979 on mixed drink licenses are myriad, tavern owners in the 1700s and 1800s also were strictly regulated by the local governments.

Taverns, also known as ordinaries, were licensed by the county court and applicants had to provide bond. A provision passed in 1766 authorized the justices of each county to set rates and prices to be charged at ordinaries for not only liquor, but for food, lodging, corn, oats, fodder, stabling and pasturage.

close to 200. That Carter promised Oct. 24 was this: "We will slash federal hiring and cut the federal workforce.... I'm ordering tonight a cut in federal hiring (that) will cut the total size of the federal workforce."

Though he promised to cut "total" employment, he ordered only a semi-freeze on hiring, only in the segment he controls directly, and only of full-time, permanent employees. He left a loophole for part-time and temporary help.

But it sounded stronger to promise a "total" cut than to promise a cut in "full-time permanent employment in the executive branch, excluding the Postal Service," which is what he actually attempted.

Carter let agencies fill only half their full-time vacancies as they came open. The order lasted only a few months and was quietly replaced by specific personnel ceilings in January.

These actions have had their effect. As of May, the latest period for which the federal Office of Personnel Management has figures, there were 28,212 fewer full-time federal workers under Carter's direct control than there were when he spoke.

But bureaucrats have endured hiring freezes off and on for decades, and know how to get the government's work done in spite of them. This time they seem to have hired more than 40,000 part-time and temporary workers to take up the slack. While full-time, permanent employment is down in Carter's segment of the government, total employment in that segment — including part-time and temporary workers — has actually increased by about 14,000 since his speech.

All this leaves Carter with nearly 27,000 more federal workers drawing pay than will legally be allowed on the payroll Oct. 1, under a ceiling imposed by Congress even before Carter promised his cut.

president's own balanced budget must not be abandoned.

After Carter left the room, Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan of New York (who had remained silent) approached White House domestic policy chief Stuart Eizenstat and asked him whether it was not true that the president had just advocated tax reduction. No, the imperturbable Eizenstat replied calmly, the president was merely promising to take another look in October.

Whether Eizenstat joins the congressional liberals in opposing quick tax reduction, it is considered certain that Vice President Walter Mondale (present but silent during the Thursday morning meeting) will be fighting against them. Despite Carter's surprise, nobody believes the battle is over.

The new element is that the president was obviously impressed with what Bentsen told him on the mountain during the Camp David meetings. Considering the inflationary boosts of income tax brackets and the Social Security payroll taxes, it will take over \$20 million for the American taxpayer to stay even. At least another \$10 billion is needed to promote capital formation. Add to this rising unemployment rolls, and the president may become an ardent tax-cutter.

## Magic Of Summer Theater Is Musical

In the same week that sees the opening of Greenville's new shopping center, the old magic of Summer Theater has returned to brighten the entertainment scene.

"Starting Here, Starting Now," which opened Monday night at the A. J. Fletcher Recital Hall, is a pleasant parade of more than two dozen songs that convey a broad range of sentiments.

Two local performers, Del Lewis of the ECU Speech and Drama Department and Carolyn Greene, a graduate student in music, are joined by out-of-town singer Michelle Réilley to form the trio of performers.

today were the Greene Central High School band and an Army Reserve color guard unit from Rocky Mount.

Edgar K. Loessin's crisp direction keeps this talented trio moving at a snappy pace well suited to this show, and Terry Rieser's choreography lends just the right touch to enliven the songs.

The score, with music by David Shire and lyrics by Richard Maltby, Jr. focuses on many facets of today's society in songs that are by turn hopeful, youthful, wistful, happy, and expressive of regrets in a lighthearted vein. The merest thread of a story—boy, girl, and a second girl, serves to tie the material together nicely.

One of the many pleasures in "Starting Here, Starting Now" is the clear delivery of the beautifully crafted lyrics. Time and again, Maltby's lyrics aptly pinpoint a fundamental truth in a new light with a minimum of poetically fashioned words—"The moment you win someone's heart/ That's when the

burden starts. . . " These are lyrics worthy of being read as literature.

Contemporary society's more outlandish foibles are grist for some of the most effective numbers— instant celebrity in "The Girl of the Minute," the mania for relating in "We Can Talk To Each Other"— which turns out to be an unexpected reversal of roles with the male as the dominant talker; and "I Don't Believe It," emphatically caricaturing and puncturing the pretensions of smug individuals.

There are echoes of many musical styles in these songs—a Victor Herbert kind of old fashioned charm in "Beautiful," the brilliant, catchy phrasing in "Crossword Puzzle," and the lilting shuffle of "One Step," which is also the subject of a superb traditional top hat and cane dance routine.

"Starting Here, Starting Now" is ideal summer musical fare,

good music, captivating lyrics, and a winsome trio adding luster to top notch material.

The back up musicians— Brett Watson and Michael Howe on piano, Larry White, percussion, and Rich Vizachero, bass, provide sparkling accompani-

ment that plays a major role in the professional polish of this welcome return to summer theater in Greenville.

The limited size of the Recital Hall is fortunate, as it adds to the intimacy and easy listening of this miniature musical.

# Fire Gutted Apartments

HOUSTON (AP) — Whipped by strong northerly winds, a fierce fire tore through a huge, wood-shingled apartment complex, gutting hundreds of fashionable apartments and leaving residents stunned and homeless.

Fire Chief V.E. Rogers said it was the worst blaze he'd seen in 24 years on the force.

The flames first appeared about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday and quickly jumped from building to building. At the height of the fire, more than 35 buildings were in flames, but no one was killed, authorities said.

As many as 1,000 of the estimated 1,100 15-year-old apartments were destroyed. Officials estimated that up to 1,500 people were homeless.

On the tennis courts, people arranged plush velour sofas and oak china cabinets, preparing for the night.

Standing beside the swimming pool were two young women in bikinis — their only clothes.

"Everything, everything's gone," mumbled Peggy Gardner, 19, a waitress. "No shoes, no money" She and roommate Bette King, 21, spent the day at a Galveston beach about 30 miles south of Houston. "When we got home, our apartment was burned to the ground," Ms. Gardner said.

Arson is suspected, officials say. "We're questioning a couple of people right now," officer Danny Holmes of the police arson division said late Tuesday night.

No figures were available on the extent of the damage. Rogers blamed the quick spread of the fire on the wood shingles that covered the huge Woodway apartment complex on the city's affluent near west side.

Just a few hours earlier, the Houston City Council had tabled an ordinance to strengthen safety requirements for wood-shingle roofs. Houston Mayor Jim McConn said he thought the measure would be reconsidered quickly.

"We're lucky nobody was killed," McConn said after a helicopter tour of the area.

Since most residents were away when the fire started, only a few were injured. Three persons were admitted to Houston hospitals.

Frank W. Tyler, 20, was in

stable condition in Hermann Hospital with second-degree burns over 50 percent of his body. Another resident was admitted for cuts on the arm, and a firefighter was admitted for smoke inhalation. Ten others, including some firefighters, were treated and released.

The Red Cross and others quickly set up shelters for the homeless, and two bulletin boards in the apartment clubhouse were filled with offers of help: homes for the night, free meals, animal shelters, storage areas.

It was the second disaster in a week in the Houston area.

Tropical storm Claudette chased 5,000 out of their homes last Wednesday and Thursday, dumping up to 30 inches of rain on the Texas coast.

## Pony Express Riding Again

GLENROCK, Wyo. (AP) — Pony Express riders are galloping across Wyoming again this week — but padmuh, things ain't quite like they was.

Today's riders still face heat, tornadoes and rattlers, but the beef jerky has been replaced by grub flown in from New York's famed "21 Club." And the upstarts even have a publicity agent.

Twelve riders are racing 1,905 miles from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Calif., this summer to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the death of Sir Rowland Hill, an Englishman credited with inventing the first adhesive postage stamp.

The race is being sponsored by the British Post Office. Riders left Missouri on July 14 and hope to reach California on Aug. 22. They rested a day at Glenrock this week, dining on baby roasted turkey and wild rice stuffing to "let the riders know we appreciate them," said Albert Chioda, publicity agent for the British Post Office.

## Zimbabwe Rhodesia Big Issue At Commonwealth Meeting

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) — Zimbabwe Rhodesia is the big issue at the Commonwealth Conference opening today, but British officials predict much debate and no new action.

Commonwealth Secretary-General Shridath Ramphal told reporters Tuesday there was no expectation of "getting it all together" on the problem. He said just to avoid a split in the week-long meeting of Britain and its 38 former colonies would be an achievement.

British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher met with Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda Tuesday night amid intensified maneuvering to prevent an open row over her leaning toward recognition of Prime Minister Abel Muzorewa's new government in Zimbabwe Rhodesia.

Mrs. Thatcher, who has been

denounced as a racist by the Zambian government's two newspapers, also met with Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser, a fellow Conservative and a key figure in the moves to prevent a blowup.

"Everyone recognizes that there is a new situation in Zimbabwe Rhodesia. This happens to be a fact that cannot be ignored," Fraser told reporters on arriving in Lusaka. But he added: "The position of the Australian government is that there has been a change but it is not such as would warrant recognition."

Australian officials said Fraser, in preliminary discussions with Nigerian leaders, proposed that the conference not slam the door on Muzorewa's government but instead call for it to reduce the vast powers retained by the white minority in

Zimbabwe Rhodesia and end the war with the guerrillas led by Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe.

Representatives of Nkomo and Mugabe, whose guerrillas fought the white regime for seven years and now are fighting to oust the elected black-majority government, were reported anxious to meet with Fraser to hear his views.

The Asian and African majority of the Commonwealth countries contend the constitution Muzorewa and other black leaders inside Zimbabwe Rhodesia agreed to is a facade for the preservation of white domination since it gives the white minority control of the army, police, judiciary and civil service as well as a veto over changes in the constitution.

WASHINGTON (AP) — There seems little chance Congress will complete work on a bill to implement the Panama Canal treaties until just before the treaties take effect Oct. 1.

Rep. John Murphy, D-N.Y., said Tuesday a conference committee working out differences between the House and Senate versions probably won't finish its work until September despite his pleas that the matter be wrapped up this week.

The treaties turn most of the canal zone over to Panama on Oct. 1. Panama gets the canal itself Dec. 31, 1999.

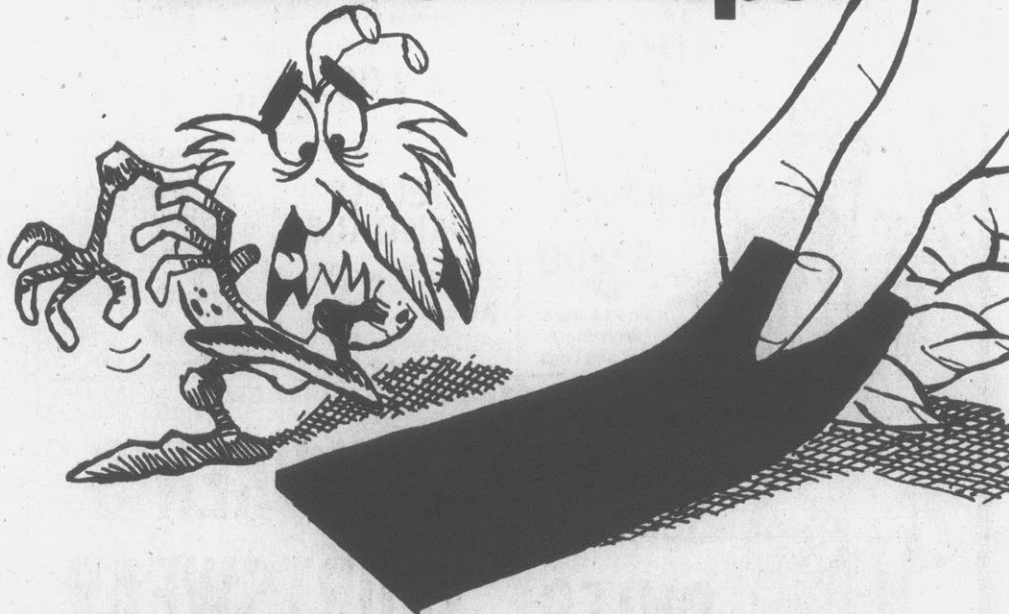

# Glue-Sniffing Messed Up His Life, Says Tucker

FLORENCE, S.C. (AP) — James Keith Tucker says sniffing glue, a habit he acquired at the age of 12, "messed up" his brain and is largely to blame for his problems with the law in recent years.

"When I'm on that glue, I don't think too good," Tucker said Tuesday afternoon as he sat in a cell at the Florence Detention Center in South Carolina, where he was being held on \$250,000 bond.

The 18-year-old High Point, N.C., native is charged with kidnapping 5-year-old Caroline Thompson from a parking lot of a Daytona Beach, Fla., motel and bringing her to Myrtle Beach, S.C. He was arrested there Monday night and the child was returned unharmed to her parents, Russell and Rachel Thompson of Dunwoody, Ga.

Throughout the incident, Tucker said, he sniffed glue. He told Caroline it was medicine. "She's just 5 years old. She didn't know."

Tucker is expected to be sent later this week to Florida. He also is charged with interstate transportation of a stolen vehicle.

Tucker, a slight, soft-spoken man who dropped out of school in the ninth grade, said he didn't mean to take the child. She was in the back seat of her parents' car when it was taken

from the Florida parking lot Saturday.

He said his biggest concern was the child's safety. "I wouldn't harm the girl in no way," he said. "I was scared. She was 5 years old. If anything happened to her, if she got hurt in any way, it would be my fault."

Tucker said he thought about leaving her somewhere along the way. But he added as he puffed on a cigarette, "I was afraid she couldn't get back to her mama."

Tucker, recently paroled from a North Carolina prison, said he took good care of the child. "I didn't let her go hungry. I fed her good."

He said he used money and charge cards that had been in Mrs. Thompson's billfold to pay for the food and for the motel accommodations Sunday in Myrtle Beach.

Tucker said the child even swam in the pool at the Caribbean Quality Inn. Other guests at the motel notified police Monday night after they realized that a man and child who registered at the motel the day before resembled pictures shown on a television news program.

Tucker said he calmed the

child by stopping twice during the trip from Florida and telling her he had called her parents. He also told her he was taking her home to Georgia.

"I know what I done was wrong," he said. "Yeah, it was wrong. I'm talking about everything."

Tucker was paroled July 13 from a North Carolina prison where he was committed earlier this year as a youthful offender for two auto thefts, prison department records show.

Since his release, he had been working at a furniture factory in High Point. But one day about two weeks ago, he said, he left work for his lunch break about noon and had some beers. "I stole this man's truck and decided I'd take off."

With \$20 in his pocket, he set out for Daytona Beach because he had "never been to the beach before," he said.

He picked up a friend in Asheville, N.C., and headed

being driven here from South Carolina by a motel employee.

"We had a very bad time every minute she was gone," said Mrs. Thompson. But she and her husband Russell, both 34, spoke gratefully of the kidnaper.

"He took good care of her," Mrs. Thompson said. "We're so grateful to him. He didn't hurt her in any way. He tried to comfort her."

Tucker had told the child he was "taking her home to her mommy and daddy," Mrs. Thompson said.

Caroline said at first she cried "just a little ... and I told him to take me back. He said, 'No.' He said, 'Shut up.'"

Tucker evidently drove straight through to Myrtle Beach, stopping to sleep in the car on Saturday night and arriving early Sunday.

He and the girl checked into a motel and stayed until Monday afternoon, when a guest recognized them from news descriptions. Authorities were notified and a highspeed chase ended in Tucker's arrest.

## Mother Hopes The Law Looks Kindly On Youth

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Rachel Thompson, resuming the family vacation that became a 2½-day nightmare when her 5-year-old daughter was kidnapped, says the law should look kindly on the man charged in the abduction.

"I think it should certainly be taken into account that he did not mean to hurt the child," Mrs. Thompson said Tuesday. "To punish him for something

he didn't mean to do wouldn't be right." Police have said car theft — not kidnapping — was the aim of the man who jumped into the Thompson's station wagon at a motel here Saturday and drove off with the screaming child and the family dogs in the back.

Suspect James K. Tucker, 18, a paroled auto thief, is being held on \$250,000 bond in Florence, S.C., some 60 miles west of Myrtle Beach, S.C., where little Caroline Thompson was recovered late Monday.

FBI officials say Tucker will probably be moved to Florida this week to face charges.

The man was "mean and yelled," Caroline said, but did not mistreat her or her two pets.

"We ate hamburgers and french fries at McDonalds and he let me go swimming by myself in the motel pool," said the blond, blue-eyed youngster, sitting cross-legged on her rumpled bed at the Holiday Inn where the ordeal began.

The family planned to remain here several days. Their car, with all their belongings, was

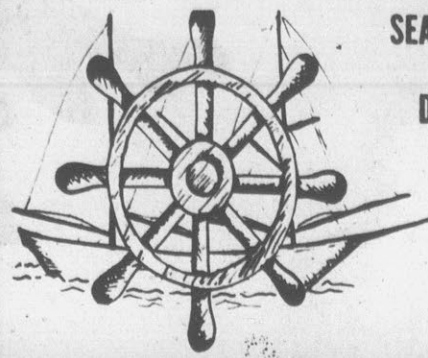

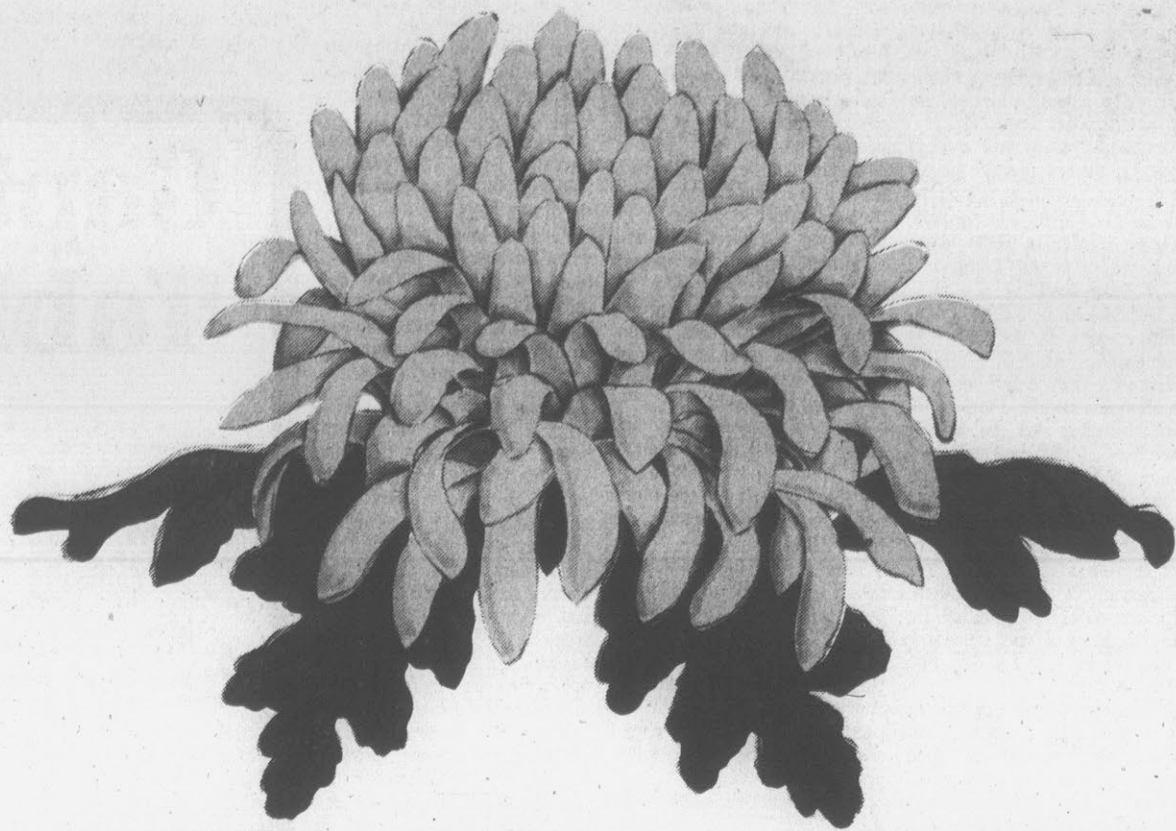

## Winfield Paces Padres

Dave Winfield buys tickets so kids who can't afford them can see baseball games for free. Dave Winfield also hits very well for the San Diego Padres.

He leads the National League in hitting with a .345 average, is tied with Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt for the lead in runs batted in with 81, and his 25 home runs puts him third behind Schmidt and Chicago's Dave Kingman.

His fielding, throwing and baserunning aren't bad, either, if you like understatements. Despite all this, Winfield insists: "People just don't know who Dave Winfield is."

Atlanta's Phil Niekro knows. The Braves' right-hander gave up three of the five Winfield hits and two of the four Winfield RBI that helped the Padres to a 10-3 rout of the Braves Tuesday night.

"I've had a consistently good season," he says, "but I let my

peers determine how good a player I am. (Pittsburgh's Dave) Parker is a great player and you hear people talk about him a lot. People just don't know who Dave Winfield is."

In the other NL games, Phil Niekro's brother, Joe, became the first 15-game winner when the Houston Astros beat the San Francisco Giants 6-4; the Los Angeles Dodgers held off the Cincinnati Reds 7-6, the Montreal Expos blanked the St. Louis Cardinals 5-0, the Phila-

delphia Phillies bested the Chicago Cubs 4-1 and the New York Mets edged the Pittsburgh Pirates 2-1.

**Astros 6, Giants 4**  
Craig Reynolds' two-run triple in the Houston second helped the Astros beat San Francisco and give Joe Niekro his 15th victory against six losses.

A fielding error by Reynolds led to three San Francisco runs in the seventh. The Giants added a ninth-inning run on Jack Clark's single.

**Dodgers 7, Reds 6**  
Dusty Baker and Bill Russell drove in two runs each and Los Angeles survived a ninth-inning rally by Cincinnati to nip the Reds and give Don Sutton his first victory in six weeks.

**Expos 5, Cardinals 0**  
Rudy May pitched a three-hitter in his first start of the season and recorded his first shutout since Sept. 26, 1978 as Montreal blanked St. Louis. Rodney Scott scored on Andre Dawson's first-inning groundout to give May all the offense he needed.

## Defensive Line Has Experience But Depth Could Be A Problem

Veteran players return at all three of the interior defensive line positions at East Carolina, but coach Wayne Hall is still not sure that the situation there is all that rosy.

"We have experience, but we don't have a lot of backup strength right now. We are hoping that a couple of freshmen might come through for us, and the return of another veteran could also help us."

At the tackle spots, there is experience as Vance Tingler (6-3, 225, Sr.) returns on the left side, and Noah Clark (6-1, 225, Sr.) is back on the right.

"Vance is a fifth-year player for us, and is probably our most experienced player. He has the best technique and is a solid performer. Noah has more ability than anyone on the line, and this gives us a strong point there," Hall said.

Clark didn't start last year, after being a starter as a sophomore. "D.T. Joyner (now graduated) just beat him out," Hall said. "It wasn't so much of an off-year for Noah as it was a good year for D.T. Noah played a lot. He has quickness and ability, but his technique has lapses at times."

Hall feels that the nose guard situation is a question mark. "We didn't have anyone show himself to be a winner there in the spring," he said.

This was in spite of the fact that John Hallow (5-11, 210, Soph.) returns to the position. He was the top relief man for Oliver Felton last year, and saw plenty of action.

Along with him is Fee Griffin (6-1, 230, Soph.), who also didn't play as well as was hoped for in the spring.

"Hopefully between the two of them, we'll come up with some good play. They were pretty even at the end of the spring."

In the backup roles, Nate Wigfall (6-4, 275, Jr.) will be at tackle, and Hall notes that right now, that is the extent of the reserve depth.

There is the possibility that Wayne Poole (6-0, 230, Sr.) will return from an injury that kept him sidelined all of last year, including the spring. "But we just don't know at this time how he'll do. We hope that he'll come along. That would give us solid men at both tackles both on first and second teams," Hall said.

Doug Smith (6-5, 225), an incoming freshman regarded as the top line prospect ever signed at East Carolina, is looked for some of the backup work at nose

guard. In addition, two other incoming freshmen, Gary Gambrell (6-2, 220) and James Barron (6-2, 230) are looked to for addition help in the line.

"If Poole comes back and we can bring two of the three freshmen along in time to help us, we could be in pretty good shape. That would give us solid two-deep depth everywhere. It would allow us to play a lot of people, just like we did last year, and I think that was a big factor in our only giving up 26 points (in 12 games) in the final quarter all last year. We were able to keep fresh people out there and wear down our opponents."

Hall said, however, that compared to last year, the situation is similar to some extent. "We didn't know what we had last year. We didn't have a lot of experience, but things fell into place for us. This year, we do have some experience, but unless we get some help from places we don't see it from now, we could be hurting."

## Dad Looks To Race

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Richard Petty said Tuesday he's looking forward to the day he can race "tooth-and-nail" with his 19-year-old son, Kyle.

Young Petty could debut Sunday in NASCAR's Winston 500 at Talladega.

But he has wrecked twice on previous attempts to earn a starting position against his father. The smashups came at Charlotte, N.C., and Daytona Beach, Fla.

Petty said his son's problems hurt father as much as son—probably worse.

"When I get home, his mama (Lynda) jumps all over my head. Kyle's not having any more problems than I did when I started. I tore up a bunch of cars, too. There just weren't that many people watching."

"We're coming to Talladega with a fresh start," said young Petty, who won a 200-mile preliminary event earlier this year at Daytona. "Right now, I just hope the car goes home in one piece."

Being the son of a famous stock car driver creates a lot of pressure, he said. "After what I did at Charlotte and Daytona, they might be looking at it like I need experience, just like any other driver starting out needs. "That's what I hope to get at Talladega Sunday."

"You can learn a lot more on the race track than you can in the pits as a member of the crew."

Meanwhile, Petty will be trying to become the first repeat winner of the Talladega 500. He won the race in 1974. In the ten years of the race, there have been no repeat winners.

## PGA Tourney Doesn't Get Major Headlines

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP)

On the calendar, it's the last of golf's Big Four major championships. Traditionally it is the toughest, the least prestigious, the least publicized.

What's the matter with the PGA National Championship, anyhow?

Once the blame was laid to poor courses. This situation has been rectified. In recent years, it has been played on the nation's finest, most challenging layouts, such as Oakland Hills, just outside Detroit, this week.

Once they said the trouble lay in the original format — match play, head-to-head, sudden death. Too often, the star players — the Hogans, Demarets and Sam Sneads — were eliminated in the 18-hole early rounds, stripping the event of its glamor for the windup. This was changed in 1958 when the tournament was given the regular 72-hole medal design.

This didn't help, either. The PGA remained the orphan child of the "biggies," outshone by the Masters, U.S. Open and, since Arnold Palmer first led the Yankee march across the Atlantic, the British Open.

Meanwhile, efforts have been made to upgrade rival events such as the TPC (Tournament Players Championship), Tournament of Champions, World Series of Golf and even Jack Nicklaus' Memorial at Muirfield, a takeoff on Bob Jones' Masters. All are reach-

ing for "major" status, the TPC and World Series particularly with the nudging of Commissioner Deane Beman.

But the PGA plugs along, 63 years old, reflector of the game's legends, once the pride of the pros but no longer the pet of the guys on tour who now have their own event.

While the late Bob Jones in the '20s was undisputed monarch of the amateurs — and of all golf — the feisty, benighted Gene Sarazen and the flamboyant Walter Hagen set up a little kingdom of their own in the PGA, out of Bobby's reach.

Sarazen won three times, the first in 1922 and the last 11 years later. The majestic Hagen, who was known to appear on the first tee in a tuxedo after an all-night party, won five in the space of seven years in the 1920s, including four in a row. Then came the era of Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson and Sam Snead, playing eyeball-to-eyeball thrillers until match play was abandoned to satisfy the insatiable appetite of TV.

After that, the hiatus. The PGA lost much of its flavor. It evolved largely into just another 72-hole tour event. Its saving grace was that it remained the fourth and last jewel in golf's quadruple crown should anybody take the first three — Masters, U.S. and British Opens — as Hogan did in 1953 only to snub the PGA.

In the latter part of his career, Hogan spurned the PGA. Arnold Palmer, on the other hand, remained faithful but

never managed to win one, a bitter irony. Jack Nicklaus, bent on filling his trophy room with major championship trophies, won his first PGA title in 1963 and has added three since, the last in 1975. Gary Player has won two.

The PGA has not lacked for talent. It has been dressed up, well promoted and placed on the traditional championship courses.

### Charlotte Is Champ

Charlotte Broadmoor captured the 13-year-old Babe Ruth League State Championship here last night, downing Pitt County 4-3 in eight innings.

Charlotte went through the double-elimination tournament without a loss, winning in three games. Pitt, which won in the first round, lost in the second round to Charlotte, then fought back through the losers' bracket to gain the finals, but had to sweep Charlotte twice to win the title.

Going into the seventh inning, the game was tied at 2-2, and each team picked up a run in the seventh, leaving it tied at 3-3. Charlotte pushed over the winning run in the eighth, however, to claim the win.

Charlotte will not move into regional competition later this month.

Further details of the game were not available.

## NE Mecklenburg And Brunswick In Finals

North East Mecklenburg and Brunswick County slipped into the finals of the North Carolina State Little League championships here yesterday, each winning close contests.

North East Mecklenburg edged past Roanoke Rapids, 7-6, while Brunswick nipped Southwest Forsyth 8-7.

The championship game is set for 5 p.m. today at Elm Street Park. The winner advances to the Southern Regional, set to begin August 12 in St. Petersburg, Fla.

In the opener, North East pushed over four runs in the bottom of the second to grab the lead. Jeff Prince opened things up with a solo home run. Brian Prince followed with a single and Gary Preslar cracked another homer, scoring two runs. Wes Black walked, moved up on a balk, and scored when Chip Ferguson singled.

After seeing Mecklenburg score twice more in the third, Roanoke Rapids pushed over two in the fifth to get on the scoreboard. Darrell Mitchell singled and Brian Barnes walked. Both advanced on a wild pitch, and a balk brought Mitchell home. Brent Edwards then grounded out, allowing Barnes to score.

Roanoke Rapids then rallied

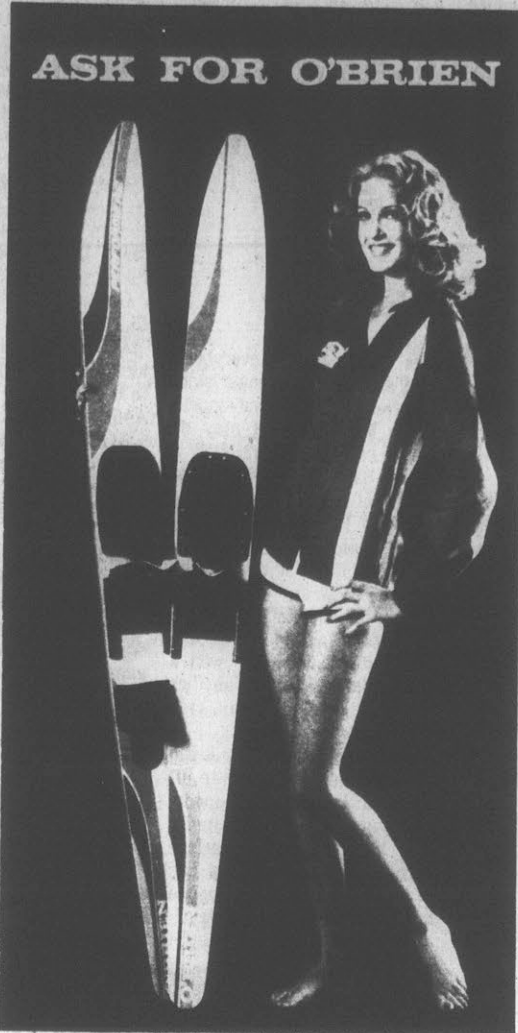

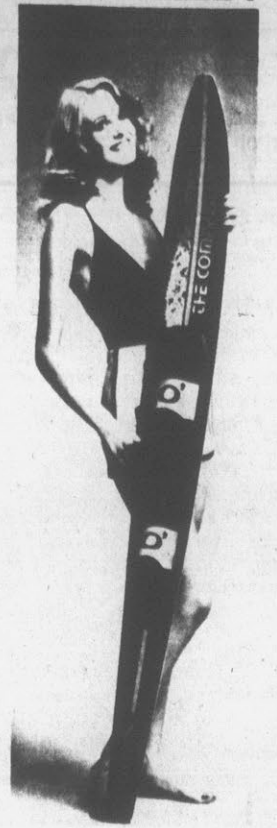

# Son's Tip May Help Nicklaus

## U.S. Team Ices Third

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP) — A lesson from a 17-year-old kid, a little tip given in private by a teen-ager to his father, may change the complexion of the 61st PGA National Championship.

It could be the tip that turns the season around for Jack Nicklaus.

"I was going to go see Jack Groat (his life-time teacher), but I called him and said, 'Jack, who needs you?'" Nicklaus said.

A tip from son Jackie may have solved his problems, Nicklaus indicated.

And he has had his problems this year. For the first time in his unmatched career, Nicklaus has failed to win. He ranks a distant 50th on the season's money-winning list. He failed to make the Ryder Cup team. He isn't eligible for the World Series of Golf.

It has been, without question, the most frustrating season of his golfing life.

But things are turning around for the man who owns a record

15 major professional titles, who generally is regarded as the finest player the game has ever seen. The hints are there. The game is coming together. The tip from Jackie could be the nudge that makes him a winner again.

And should he win in this event that starts Thursday on the famed Oakland Hills Country Club course, it would turn around the entire season for Nicklaus, who places such great store in the game's major events.

"It's hard to say you've had

a successful season if you don't win one of the majors. It's hard to say you've had a bad season if you do win one of them," he has said.

He has played his best in the Big Four. He missed a playoff for the Masters title by a single shot. He had a very good — but too late — last round in the U.S. Open. He tied for second in the British Open.

"I'm making some putts now," he said. "That's the difference. I'm probably not playing all that much better than I was. But I'm making some

putts and that can make a world of difference.

"I got the ball close several times last week (at Philadelphia). I still missed some putts, but I made some. And that helps."

And a little session, early this week, with son Jackie could have straightened that out.

"I was hitting balls and he said, 'Dad, where did you tell me to put the weight when you want to hook it?'" Nicklaus said.

"I said, 'Back in the stance.'"

"He said, 'And if you want to fade it?'"

"Up in the stance."

"He said, 'Then why have

you got the ball so far back in your stance?'"

He paused, significantly.

"I've tried to teach him to analyze swings, problems in others. It's nice to have a little feedback."

If that corrects, even partially, the tiny flaws that have frustrated Nicklaus this season, he will move from a place in a list of those likely to win to a role as solid favorite.

If it doesn't, a clear-cut favorite is difficult to determine. Tom Watson — a four-time winner this year, collector of a record \$387,000 already this season — would be a logical

choice. But Watson has had last-round difficulties in his last few starts. His game could be suspect.

Among the other likely contenders on the 7,014-yard, par 70 Oakland Hills Country Club course are U.S. Open champ Hale Irwin, Masters king Fuzzy Zoeller, Lee Trevino, Ray Floyd, Ben Crenshaw, Hubert Green, Lanny Wadkins, Tom Weiskopf, Jerry Pate and Gary Player, the little South African who won the PGA the last time it was played here.

ABC will provide national television coverage of portions of the final two rounds Saturday and Sunday.

MOSCOW (AP) — The U.S. men's basketball team whipped Latvia, 97-86, Wednesday and clinched third place in their group at the Spartacade summer tournament.

The victory was the second in a row for the Americans, who defeated Estonia, 73-65, in action Tuesday at Vilnius, Lithuania.

The U.S. finished Group B play with a record of three victories and two defeats. They beat Yugoslavia last Saturday and lost to both The Ukraine and Leningrad.

U.S. assistant Coach Tom Bennett of Mesa, Ariz., said the Americans shot only 38 percent from the floor in their losses, which eliminated them from a chance to win a medal in the 12-team tournament.

The U.S. women's volleyball team dropped a close 3-2 decision to the Russian Federation team late Tuesday for their first loss in three matches.

Games scores were 15-13, 12-15, 15-5, 6-15 and 13-15.

A controversial call by a Soviet linesman in the crucial fifth game may have cost the Americans a victory.

A U.S. return appeared to have caught the sideline, but the linesman called the ball out and the Soviet referee didn't overrule him. The Russian squad then went on to take the close two-point victory.

The Americans face Poland Thursday and Byelorussia Friday, and if they win both games as expected, they would play for the bronze medal Saturday against another Soviet team, Cuba or Japan.

Shortstop Mark Belanger of the Baltimore Orioles made the last two outs in three triple plays by his team.

# Bart Conner Newest Star In Gymnastics

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Bart Conner grabbed the hem of the mantle that proclaims Kurt Thomas America's top gymnast and gave it a sharp tug.

Conner, a 21-year-old University of Oklahoma student who began gymnastics at 10, won gold medals in three events, including the high bar that was Thomas' downfall Tuesday night at National Sports Festival II.

Thomas, 22, world champion in the floor exercise and sixth all-around, attempted a triple flyaway dismount — his first in competition — and landed on his knees. He needed a 9.65 from the judges to win the event, but was awarded a 9.55.

"Everybody tries new things, and sometimes you do it and sometimes you don't," Conner said of Thomas' flyaway.

He said he was a little surprised to win the high bar, but added, "After seeing Kurt's routine, I should have won."

Conner estimated Thomas' landing cost him up to .4 on scorecards.

Conner also won gold medals in the vault and parallel bars, while taking second in floor exercise and third in the rings.

Thomas, who passed up a near-cinch gold medal in floor

exercise, won the pommel horse as expected but was second to Conner in the high bar and parallel bars and second again to Larry Gerard in the rings.

The Indiana State graduate was named all-around champion in team competition earlier, and it was Thomas the overflow crowd of 7,300 at the Air Force Academy Fieldhouse came to watch.

"I didn't want to end in a crash," Thomas said later, adding that he had the difficult dismount on his mind all through his routine.

Thomas said he was working on his weaknesses — strength, flexibility and technique in some areas — in getting ready for the World Championships in Dallas in December.

"I'll be ready for it," he said, and predicted the United States gymnastics team could place as high as fourth in the 1980 Olympics in Moscow. The Soviet, Japanese, Chinese and East German teams present the main obstacles, he said.

Conner, a member of the 1976 Olympic squad, expressed surprise at doing so well at the Festival. "The routines I'm doing now are routine," he said. But he is adding new elements for the world title competition and the Olympics.

"The guy who puts in a new

trick that blows everybody away has got it," Conner said. "I have a brand new dismount in the high bar that may be ready by December. It's a double back with two twists. It's about as rare as a triple flyaway."

Gymnastics held sway for the second night in a row at the six-day Festival, which ends tonight. Monday night, Tracee Talavera, a 74-pound sprite who will be 13 next month, won a gold medal and tied for another after taking the all-round title in women's competition.

Elsewhere Tuesday, Justin Whiting scored two goals to lift the East to a 5-1 gold-medal victory over the West in men's field hockey, while Charlene Morett scored a goal and had an assist as the East tripped the West 4-0 in women's play.

Shortstop Mark Belanger of the Baltimore Orioles made the last two outs in three triple plays by his team.




# House Sets Price On Gasoline-Rationing Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House is ready to give President Carter the gas-rationing authority he wants, but only at

a price he may be unwilling to pay — repeal of part of his month-old mandatory thermostat-setting program.  
The House was meeting today to complete action on the ratio-

ning legislation after giving the president the latest in a long string of unwelcome energy surprises late Tuesday.  
The rationing bill's floor manager, Rep. John D. Dingell,

D-Mich., says adoption of the thermostat-law rollback has added new controversy to the legislation and again put its passage in jeopardy.

complain about how uncomfortable Americans have been under the law.

Under the amendment by Rep. Chalmers P. Wylie, R-Ohio, buildings could be exempt from the temperature control law if utility bills — or other documentary evidence — could be produced to show that an equivalent amount of energy had been saved through other means.

Dingell said there's no question about the White House position on the amendment — it's opposed.  
"We tried to stop it but there was nothing we could do," Dingell said. "It's just another example of the House approving something it didn't understand."

Democratic leaders claimed the same thing last Wednesday after the House unexpectedly approved a Republican-sponsored amendment giving Congress two chances to block a

gas-rationing plan proposed by the president.

The House reversed that vote Tuesday after a heavy lobbying campaign by the White House and the Democratic leadership. The vote was 234-189 to give the president a free hand in preparing a standby rationing plan.

The bill stipulates rationing would be used only in a severe fuel shortage, of at least 20 percent.

And the House decided to retain Congress' right to reject a rationing plan by having either house veto it once the president actually moved to implement it. But this was a condition the president said he could live with.

The House rejected the first Carter rationing plan entirely last December.

Thus it seemed things were going well for the president Tuesday night until adoption of the Wylie amendment.

And leaders are no longer as optimistic that the legislation can be placed on the president's desk by the end of the week — the start of the month-long congressional summer recess.

The apparent rationing victory the House gave the president Tuesday night was short-lived. It was followed up by a 267-152 vote to repeal the law championed by Carter requiring commercial buildings to set their thermostats at no less than 78 degrees in the summer and no more than 65 degrees in winter.

That law has been in force only since July 1, but member after member took to the floor of the House — itself held at an energy-saving 78 degrees — to

## Prices Drop On Ga.-Fla.

VALDOSTA, Ga. (AP) — Average prices dropped on the Georgia-Florida flue-cured tobacco markets Tuesday, with almost all heavy grade volumes bringing less than on Monday, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported.

The USDA's Federal-State Market News Service said a few grades showed small gains, mainly on lower quality lugs.

Sales on Georgia markets grossed 2,981,618 pounds at an average of \$136.54 for \$4,071,136 Tuesday, and 27,525,635 pounds at an average of \$131.80 for \$36,278,607 for the season.

Sales on Florida markets grossed 376,879 pounds at an average of \$132.75 for \$500,294 on Tuesday and 5,621,355 pounds at an average of \$124.97 for \$7,025,263 for the season.

Total sales on Georgia-Florida flue-cured tobacco markets grossed 3,358,497 pounds at an average of \$136.12 for \$4,571,430 on Tuesday; and 33,146,390 pounds at an average of \$130.64 for \$43,303,870 for the season.

The volume of sales was heavy, and the practical top price remained at \$155 per hundredweight.

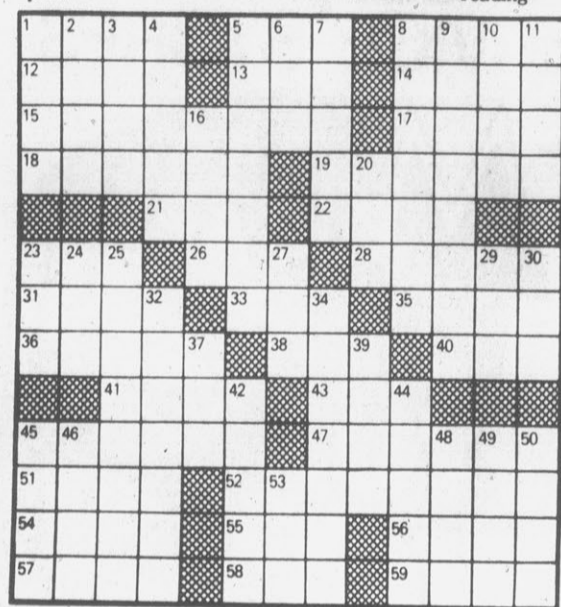

## Opines Wetzel Lucky To Be Alive

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Frank Wetzel "is lucky he didn't get the gas chamber" for the murders of two highway patrolmen in 1957 and shouldn't

be moved from Central Prison to a medium-security institution, the commander of the Highway Patrol said Tuesday. "People have been given the

gas chamber for murdering one person and he murdered two," said Col. John T. Jenkins. "The general consensus of the patrol is that he not be paroled."

Wetzel was sentenced to consecutive life terms for murdering two patrolmen Nov. 4, 1957. Jenkins, who was on-duty as a patrolman the night Wetzel killed Troopers Wister Lee Reece and James Thomas Brown, said the patrol was a close organization that didn't easily forget the slayings of "family."

Family members of the slain troopers themselves said Tuesday they had not forgotten either.

"It wouldn't be fair for Wetzel to go free while my brother is in the ground," said Fred M. Reece of Randleman. "He not only killed my brother, but another man."

Mrs. Lee Brown Sr. of Statesville, mother of the other slain trooper, agreed. "I wouldn't want him to be removed (from Central Prison), because I wouldn't want him to escape," she said. "I still think he ought to serve his terms for both men."

Wetzel, 58, has spent 22 years in Central Prison, the state's only maximum-security institution.

In 1974 he was promoted to medium-custody classification. Twice, however, his requests to transfer to a medium-security

unit have been denied by state prison officials.

On Thursday U.S. District Court Judge Franklin T. Dupree Jr. ordered the Department of Corrections to transfer Wetzel out of the Central unit the court could rule on his claim that prison officials' refusal to transfer him violated his right to due process of law under the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

## Becomes PCA New President

## Pleading Guilty To Fraud On Passport

ASHEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — An attorney for Joyce McKinney, who gained nationwide attention when she was charged with forcing a Mormon missionary to have sex with her, says she plans to plead guilty to fraudulently obtaining a passport.

Miss McKinney, whose trial is set for the week beginning Sept. 2, was released Monday from Asheville's Appalachian Hall, a private psychiatric hospital. She entered the hospital July 20 for evaluation ordered by a U.S. magistrate.

Miss McKinney, who is free on \$5,000 bond, waived a preliminary hearing Monday and asked to be tried in Asheville instead of Seattle, said Bruce Elmore Sr., her lawyer.

The trial date will be a formality, however, because Elmore said she will plead guilty. She faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$2,000 fine.

Miss McKinney, 28, of Avery County, and Keith May, 26, of Los Angeles, were charged in Britain in 1977 with kidnapping the missionary, tying him to a bed and forcing him to have sex with her. May and Miss McKinney skipped bail and slipped out of the country last year.

British officials are not seeking extradition, however.

Miss McKinney and May were arrested July 18 in Buncombe County on the passport charge.

# Judge Opines Killer 'Total Waste Of Humanity'

MIAMI (AP) — Condemned by a judge as "a total waste of humanity," Theodore Bundy has been ordered to pay with his life for the beating and strangulation murders of two sleeping women. But it may be a long time before the people of Florida collect.

"In a way, this is my opening statement," the articulate former law student said in an emotion-choked monologue Tuesday shortly before he was ordered to die in Florida's electric chair.

"This is just the first ... early round of a long battle," Bundy vowed between sniffs. "I haven't given up by any means." It was the first time in his five-week trial he had shown any emotion.

He refused to plead for mercy. "Absurd," said Bundy, "to ask for mercy for something I did not do."

Judge Edward D. Cowart was unimpressed.

"It's a tragedy for this court to see such a total waste of humanity," said the judge. "You're a bright young man. You'd have made a good lawyer. I'd have loved to have you practice before me. But you went another way, partner." Twice the judge ordered Bundy

put to death "by a current of electricity ... passed through your body until you are dead," for the deaths of Margaret Bowman, 21, and Lisa Levy, 20.

Cowart said the beating of Miss Bowman "was vicious, vile, wicked and atrocious."

Both women were attacked with a crude oak club as they slept in the Chi Omega Sorority house at Florida State University in Tallahassee the morning of Jan. 15, 1978. Bundy also was convicted of three counts of attempted murder in the beatings of three other women who lived in the sorority house and in a

nearby apartment. Cowart sentenced Bundy to 198 years in prison for burglary.

Louise Bundy, 52, of Tacoma, Wash., looked at the courtroom floor as the sentences were imposed on the son she has called "my pride and joy." Then she

left, tight-lipped, saying nothing.

Death sentences have taken on added impact in Florida since the state sent convicted murderer John Spenkink to the electric chair on May 25.

But Bundy's determination to

fight his sentence, combined with other pending trials and an automatic Florida review process, seem certain to push any potential execution date years into the future.

Bundy is due for trial Sept. 17 in Lake City, Fla., on a charge

of strangling 12-year-old Kimberly Diane Leach on Feb. 9, 1978. The prosecutor there says he expects Bundy to be made available.

Bundy also is charged with murdering a Michigan nurse near Aspen, Colo., in January

1976, but Colorado authorities say they're probably the last in line for Bundy. A 15-year Utah prison sentence awaits him for the 1974 kidnapping of Carol DaRonch near Salt Lake City.

Bundy's attorneys have already announced they will seek

a new trial in the Chi Omega case. And they say they have found a half-dozen constitutional grounds for appeals. Meanwhile, Bundy has an automatic right of appeal straight to the Florida Supreme Court.

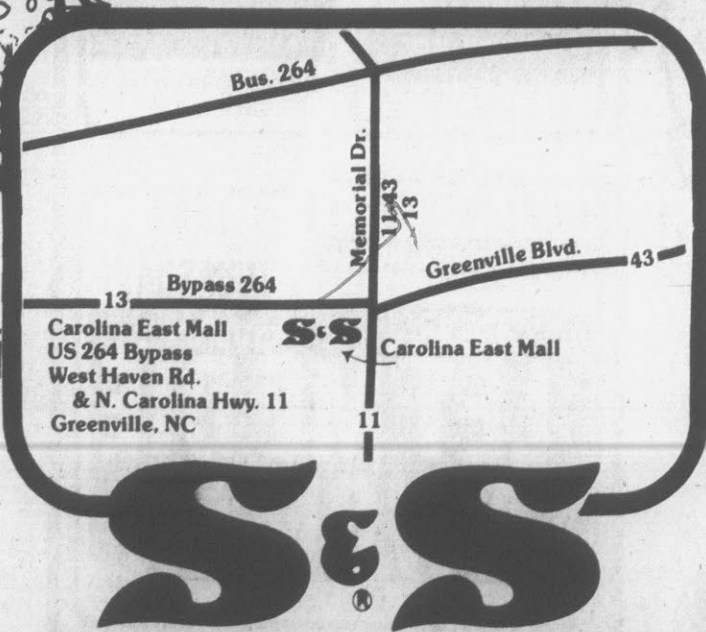

# In October, A Marciano Film ABC Up Front With The Week's Re-Runs

LOS ANGELES (AP) —  
Fwap! A short right connects hard, leather-to-chin and a spray of flying sweat. It is a quick, mean punch, and catches its victim by surprise.

Stunned, he slumps one knee to the canvas and remains frozen there for a moment, as if thinking, "How did this happen?" Then he rolls onto his back with a gentle thump, defeated.

The challenger, not a stylish fighter, is escorted to his corner of the ring as the fallen champion lies silent beneath the count. "... eight ... nine ... ten, out!" shouts the referee, and it is over.

It is Sept. 23, 1952, 43 seconds into the 13th round of a title fight the champ thought he'd already won. But a brutal right that nobody saw proved him wrong, and now Rocky Marciano is the heavyweight champion of the world.

He is, at least, until the leather-lunged fellow in the baseball cap screams "Cut!" and the pleasant, smoky little reverie ends. It is only a TV movie, you're reminded, and it's not Marciano in the ring at all, only an actor making be-

lieve. A make-up lady fusses with the actor's hair.

Marciano was a good champ, a great champ. An enduring champ. After doing away with Jersey Joe Walcott that September night in Philadelphia, Marciano never again entered the ring as challenger. He never lost a fight, retiring in 1956 as the only undefeated heavyweight champion in history.

But he was not a magical, pretty champ. He was a brute in the ring, employing the grace of a Teamster unloading a haul. He didn't float like a butterfly.

"He was very methodical in the ring, with the instincts of a killer," says John Stephens, producer of "Marciano." "But out of the ring he was a quiet man, very softspoken. Not good copy. He didn't make commercials."

ABC's story of Rocky Marciano will be a love story. But

that's okay. As Stephens says, "there have been a rash of boxing movies lately," and besides, Marciano's story makes a nifty yarn without the sports and grunts.

Marciano was born to a mean life, and wanted out. He saw boxing as the way. He fought his way to the top, and with his wife by his side, he stepped out

a winner. He was killed in a plane crash in 1969.

To play Marciano, Stephens hired Tony Lo Bianco, who bears a spooky resemblance to Marciano. This and the meticulous efforts at exact duplication ("If he went down from a left hook, that's what he goes down from in the movie," says Stephens. "Not only the actual

punch, but in the same spot in the ring") will likely make the few fight scenes in "Marciano" vividly realistic.

"Marciano," scheduled for an October Sunday Night Movie run, sounds like a natural. The scramble from down-and-out, triumph, love and tragedy.

This Rocky didn't float, and he wasn't as pretty as Sylvester Stallone. But, to paraphrase that latter Rocky, he wasn't just another bum from the neighborhood.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — ABC led CBS in their continuing nip-and-tuck network rerun battle and won the national Nielsen ratings for the week ending July 29.

NBC's highest-ranked show, "CHiPs," was in 29th place.

Leading the shows was ABC's "Three's Company," which had a rating of 23.6.

ABC won the week with an overall rating of 14.9 and CBS was a close second with 14.6. NBC was third with a rating of 12.3. CBS had finished or tied for first in four of the preceding five weeks.

The A.C. Nielsen Co., which compiles ratings estimates for the three networks, says each rating point equals about 750,000 homes equipped with one television set or more. The latest figures were released Tuesday.

"WKRP in Cincinnati" continued its good performance in summer ratings, showing up second in the list. CBS pulled the show off the air for a short time last season.

When you are unable to squeeze any more tricks out of your cards, you can always hope that the opponents will misguess the location of a key card. If they seem headed along that path, a little push might prove effective. But if you can't tell a plausible lie, you might at least make an effort to conceal the truth!

East gave the show away in an extraordinarily simple manner on this hand. South became declarer at a contract of four spades after routine bidding, and West naturally led the top of his doubleton in partner's suit.

East won the queen of hearts and continued with the ace and king. Declarer naturally ruffed this trick with the ten of trumps, which held the trick. The play was very illuminating. Since East

was now marked with the king of trumps (West would have overruffed had he held the monarch), that finesse could not win. Declarer's only hope, therefore, was that the king was singleton, so declarer quite properly led a trump to the ace.

East might as well have shown declarer his hand when he led a third heart. It should have been evident that declarer would ruff with some trump high enough to prevent West from overruffing, thus exposing East's trump holding.

East's best play at trick three would have been a diamond. West would win with the king to complete the defensive book. Declarer would then have to guess the spade situation to make his contract. If he were able to divine why East did not continue with a third round of hearts, he might still guess to drop the king of spades. But if he does, he is entitled to the applause of the pundit.

What East must not do is force declarer to make the right play. Make him work for his money.

## Solar House Business Is Looking Up

ATLANTA (UPI) — After several false starts, businessmen selling solar energy systems believe the outlook is good for sales to homeowners, small businesses and industries, apartments, motels and to government agencies.

Federal tax credits have helped the small solar energy systems market, they say. Some states also are beginning to give tax credits. Those in the business of manufacturing and selling solar energy equipment believe that if low interest loans were made available to individuals who want to buy a solar-heating-cooling system, the market would really take off.

They also say that as the cost of gasoline, fuel oil and electricity go up, solar energy will become much more competitive.

These opinions were expressed by businessmen and other solar advocates attending the recent International Solar Energy Society's 25th anniversary meeting in Atlanta. The session attracted representatives from 63 countries and 400 papers on solar energy were presented.

George White, 50, of Asheville, N.C., heads a firm, Whiteline, that manufactures 300 solar collectors a month for homes and small businesses. His sales extend to 15 states and include home installations, hotels, restaurants, car washes and retirement homes. His most recent sale was to a contractor who bought 560 solar collectors for installation on the roof of a college in Sylva, N.C.

"What we need," he said, "is a system of low cost loans. If we can get money at the cost of municipal bonds — which is what many utility companies get it for — we could cover the country with solar equipment."

White has a letter from a motel owner in Asheville who wrote that he saved 2,183 gallons of heating oil over a seven-month period after installing White's solar energy equipment. Total savings on oil and electricity costs amounted to \$1,600. The cost of the solar energy system was \$8,500.

White says his system's cost for a 2,000 square foot home would be about \$10,000 installed at present-day prices. It would supply 70 percent of the home's heating needs and 95 percent of the hot water requirements.

"Solar energy systems are not going to get cheaper," White says. "Solar is just a combination of old techniques, using well known materials like copper and aluminum. Unless the price of these metals comes down, solar systems costs will not come down."

Larry Scott, a Casper, Wyo., contractor, has installed solar hot water systems at 128 car wash businesses. He's negotiating to sell his solar heating equipment to a nationwide car wash company.

Scott says owners of exploratory oil wells in Wyoming had to stop operations because of a diesel oil shortage and contacted him about installing solar-powered equipment. He says high temperature collectors that generate up to 600 degrees will be needed. Solar energy collectors capable of producing these temperatures were being displayed at the meeting.

Five years ago, Scott said, "there was a bunch of garbage in this business. There's still some garbage but now there are some very good things."

Joseph Farber, president of Solar Research Systems, Costa Mesa, Calif., predicts there will be booming solar energy market in California in about a year and in the country as a whole in 2-3 years.

Farber manufactures solar heat collectors and a special kind of heat pump for swimming pools. He says it costs about \$1,000 a year using gas to heat a swimming pool year-round in California. A \$2,500 solar heating system cuts that cost by 50 percent and with a California tax credit, a pool owner can regain his investment cost in 2½ years.

Walter Shropshire Jr., assistant director of the International Solar Energy Society, believes solar energy eventually could supply 10 to 20 percent of U.S. energy needs. He said some members of the society think the energy of the sun could satisfy all energy requirements "but I think that's nonsense."

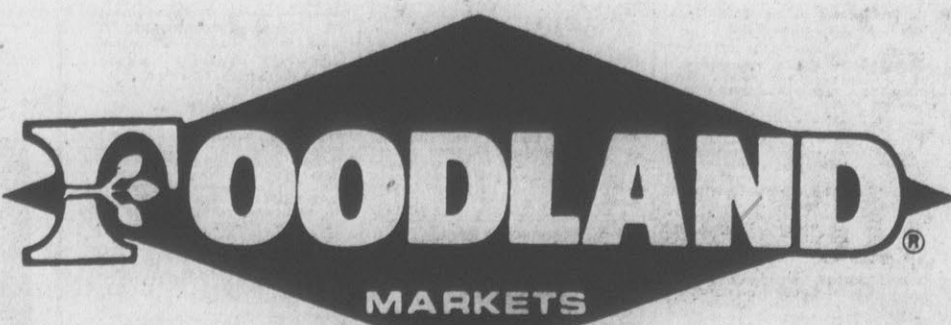

## Wilderness Filled With 96 Trailers

YORK HARBOR, Maine (AP) — Using flashlights in the misty darkness, Gerald and Helen Harper pitched their tent along the rocky Maine coast. They spent the night anticipating the uncluttered beauty of a coastal sunrise.

When the sun finally rose, they found a forest of metal blocking their view. Their small piece of wilderness was crammed with 96 trailers and three trees.

"The guidebooks said, 'Come to Maine to get away from it all,' but we woke up and found it's all still here," moaned Harper, a stockbroker from New York City. "I can see more of the great outdoors in Central Park."

"We thought we could save money and get away from the crowds by going camping," his wife said. "But after paying more than \$1,000 for what the clerk called the 'bare essentials,' we get here to find we're camping in a parking lot with more New Yorkers than we left in Manhattan."

Though the Harpers may not have considered their night in Libby's Campground "roughing it in the wilderness," many of the others in the four-acre field said they had found just what they wanted.

The Harpers' \$228 canvas tent was dwarfed, both in size and price, by the transportable homes that surrounded it.

"Explorer," "Woodsman," "Adventurer," "Deep Woods," "Savage," and other brand names on their metal sides offered the only hint that they had something to do with the outdoors.

Costing as much as \$30,000, the motor homes and trailers carry all the luxuries of home, and sometimes more. Sometimes parked just inches apart, they serve as home base for the visitors attracted to the area's beaches, theaters and vistas.

"I've got a microwave oven, shag carpeting and even a waterbed which I fill up when I get to the campground," said George Domain of Bridgeport, Conn., as he proudly patted his \$26,000 motor home. "I don't mind spending money for this because, contrary to popular belief, you can take it with you — if it's on wheels."

On the rear bumper of Domain's camper was a sticker reading, "Camping — Roughing it is the first step to adventure."

An insurance salesman from Manchester, N.H., stood on the roof of his modest \$11,000 Winnebago and tried to fix his bent antenna. Two of the hefty seagulls that patrol the camp had used it for a roost.

The salesman didn't want his name published because he didn't want his friends, who think he's "camping beside some isolated river in northern Maine," to know where he really was.

"I actually went to the north woods one year," he said. "But I was eaten alive by bugs, got the camper stuck in the mud and was chased by a moose. When I was through I really needed a vacation. This is right better."

"The outdoors is great except for the damn seagulls who sit on my antenna."

## Broken Mercury Lamp Dangerous

CHICAGO (UPI) — A broken mercury vapor high-intensity discharge lamp can be dangerous to everyone in the room with the lamp, according to a report in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Dr. William Halperin of the New Jersey Department of Health noted that an envelope surrounding the inner light source of such lamps cut its ultraviolet radiation output 4,000-fold, but any hole in that envelope permits radiation to escape. Halperin reported that such an incident in a New Jersey high school gymnasium where 81 girls were present resulted in eye damage to 49 girls and skin rashes on 68.

Most of the injuries were not serious but four girls still had burning and tearing of the eyes three months later.

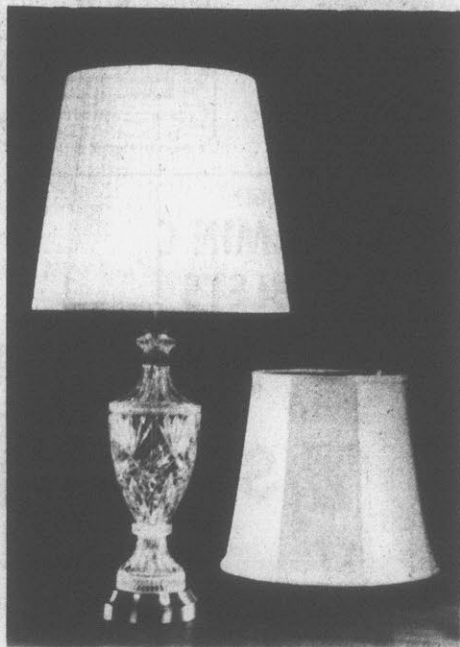

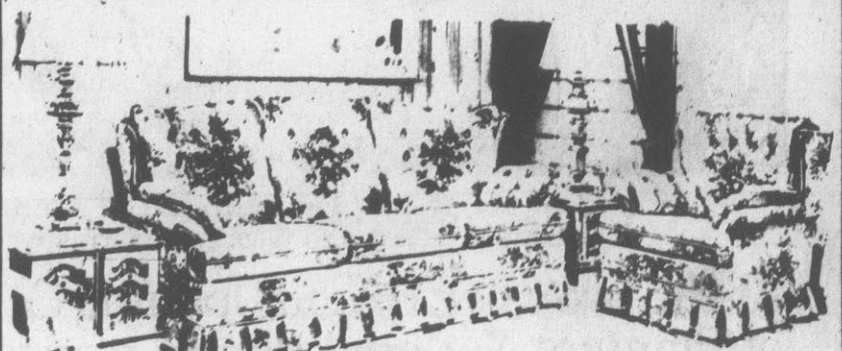

# Twelve Walked On Moon: Where Are They Now?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Twelve men, all Americans, have walked on the moon. They came back as heroes and, for most, with fleeting fame.

Neil Armstrong earned a place in history 10 years ago when he became the first human to stir the ancient lunar dust. Few recall the others, their names only dim memories.

The role, in order, Armstrong, Aldrin, Conrad, Bean, Shepard, Mitchell, Scott, Irwin, Young, Duke, Cernan and Schmitt.

Each was affected profoundly by his visit to another planet. The view from a quarter-million miles away gave each a greater awareness of the Earth

and its relative place in the Universe.

"My impression was of the importance of that small, fragile, remote blue planet," Armstrong reported. "People everywhere have, by television and photographs, shared that perspective and shared our concern for the security of our globe."

On return to Earth, some had difficulty readjusting. But most have carved successful second careers.

Seven are business executives, one a millionaire; one is a U.S. senator, one a college professor, one an evangelist. Two remain astronauts.

Here is a glance at the members of that exclusive club: Neil A. Armstrong ... raised

in a small Ohio town ... flew 78 combat missions Korea ... X-15 test pilot ... commanded Gemini 8, aborted shortly after executing the first docking of two vehicles in space ... first man to walk on the moon ... since 1971 professor of aerospace engineering at the University of Cincinnati ... director of several companies.

Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. ... son of a general ... West Point honor graduate ... fighter pilot in Korea ... Gemini 12 space walker ... landed on the moon with Armstrong on Apollo 11 ... passed over for promotion to brigadier general by the Air Force ... suffered mental depression and bouts with alcohol ... recovered from both ... divorced ... now president of his

own Los Angeles-based firm, Research & Engineering Consultants.

Charles Conrad Jr. ... engineering degree from Princeton ... Navy test pilot ... eight days in space aboard Gemini 8 ... commanded Gemini 11 ... commanded Apollo 12 moon landing ... daring space walks helped save crippled Skylab space station ... now a vice president of McDonnell Douglas Corp.

Alan L. Bean ... aeronautical engineer ... Navy test pilot ... holder of 11 world records in space and aeronautics ... landed on the moon with Conrad ... commanded 56-day Skylab 2 mission ... remains an astronaut.

Alan B. Shepard Jr. ... Naval Academy graduate ... carrier

and test pilot ... in America's first group of seven Mercury astronauts ... first American in space, a 15-minute suborbital flight in 1961 ... grounded for several years by an ear disorder ... commanded Apollo 14 moon landing ... several busi-

ness interests, including a beer distributorship in Houston, have made him a millionaire.

Edgar D. Mitchell ... doctorate of science from MIT ... Navy carrier and test pilot ... developed rendezvous techniques for Gemini spacecraft ... landed on the moon with Shepard ... on return he was divorced and concentrated on research into psychic phenomena ... director of three human resources management companies.

David R. Scott ... fifth in West Point class ... master of science from MIT ... Air Force test pilot ... flew with Armstrong on the aborted Gemini 8 flight ... command module pilot on earth-orbiting Apollo 9 mission ... commanded Apollo 15 moon landing ... Scott and crewmates James B. Irwin and Alfred B. Worden admitted carrying 400 unauthorized stamps to the moon which they planned to sell ... all three were removed from astronaut status ... Scott became director of NASA's Flight Research School and now is with an engineering

consulting firm, Scott-Preys Associates, in Los Angeles.

James B. Irwin ... Naval Academy graduate ... Air Force test pilot ... with Scott, drove first lunar car on the moon ... viewed his Apollo 15 moon journey as an oven over-

## Ripping The Veil From Testing Service Field

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — For more than two decades, Educational Testing Service has operated in strict secrecy at its quiet campus near this university town.

ETS is responsible for most of the tests used in deciding who goes to what college and who is admitted to law or medical schools.

Questions and answers for the estimated 7 million exams administered annually by the firm are guarded like classified government documents. The \$80-million-a-year non-profit operation will take legal action against anyone suspected of leaking test information.

But a New York "truth-in-testing" law signed by Gov. Hugh Carey earlier this month has caused a rip in ETS' veil of secrecy that threatens to affect testing programs across the nation.

Under the law, answers and forms for every standardized test given in New York after Jan. 1 must be made public after 30 days. Test makers also are required to explain how the exams were devised and what they are designed to measure.

The standardized testing industry, which devises exams for everyone from golf-shop managers to gynecologists and Peace Corps volunteers to CIA agents, has come under increasing criticism in recent years.

Consumer groups argue that the public has a right to see their tests and studies on the validity of exam questions. Minority spokesmen accuse test makers of cultural biases that favor the white middle-class.

ETS officials dispute the charges, contending the firm has been accountable to the academic community. They say the New York disclosure law will force them to create a battery of new tests to replace those that must be taken out of circulation as a result of making the information public.

Now, questions are often repeated from one set of exams to another, to save the expense of preparing new questions and to provide a basis for comparison among different groups of test takers.

"The effect of the law is that a test given in New York can never be given again — anywhere," said ETS spokeswoman Mary Churchill.

The sharpest reaction to the law has come from an organization representing the nation's 125 medical schools and 60 dental schools.

Test administrators for the Association of American Medical Colleges and the American Dental Association said they would stop giving admission exams in New York rather than comply with the law.

"There is a limit to the number of relevant questions that can be used in the Medical College Admission Test," said Dr. John Cooper, president of the medical college association.

The decision would affect about 5,000 prospective medical students and 1,000 prospective dental students in New York.

ETS officials also say the quality of testing may be compromised.

"It's a little like the Environmental Protection Agency," ETS Vice President Robert Solomon said of the disclosure law. "The EPA passes acts in the interest of people, but it costs something to have scrubbers in smokestacks."

The costs of extra test preparation are expected to boost testing fees by as much as 50 percent.

## Experimenting With Fare Cuts

MADRID (UPI) — RENFE, the Spanish national railway system, is experimenting with ways to cut fares.

RENFE said that on 306 "blue days" a year it will lower the price of tickets between Madrid and Barcelona and allow sleeping car passengers to take their spouses with them for only \$9 extra.

The railroad also is simplifying its system of sleeping car charges so that long-distance passengers will pay 10 to 30 percent less for tickets.

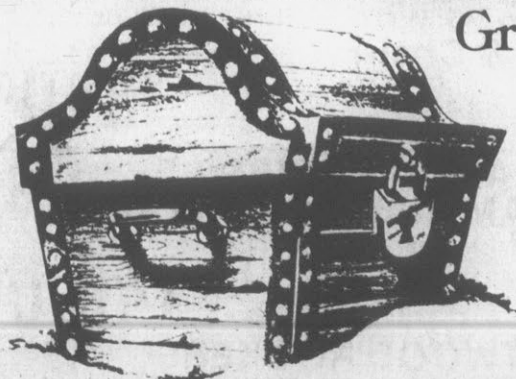

# Haughty Traveler Found A Place She Might Live

**CHAPEL HILL, N. C. (AP)** — When Mrs. Anne Newport Royall traveled through North Carolina 150 years ago, she brought along her intense prejudices against members of organized religious groups, particularly the Presbyterians whom she called "Blue-skins."

Despite her intemperate characterization of many citizens with whom she came into contact, her journal furnishes vivid word pictures of the places she visited.

Born in Maryland in 1769, Anne Newport was brought up by a wealthy Virginia planter, William Royall, who married her. Upon his death, she moved to Alabama.

After a 10-year legal battle over his estate, Anne was left virtually penniless and was forced to begin writing travel books for a living.

Her vituperativeness antagonized so many that in 1829 she was charged and convicted in Washington of the charge of common scold — "communis rixatrix."

Shortly thereafter, she began her trip through North Carolina, hitching rides on mail stagecoaches and accepting the free hospitality of those who were willing to receive the caustic traveler.

Her first stop in the Tar Heel was at Milton, "a flourishing village... a romantic site, on elevated ground, and commands an extensive view."

She wrote of Caswell County, "... the produce is principally tobacco and corn; children and chickens abound, the cattle are

very small, and scarce, sheep and hogs are plenty, and look well."

The people, she said, were stout and healthy, and the black slaves were well clothed, clean, and neat, and "seemed to work with great spirit and energy."

At the tavern in Milton, Mrs. Royall for the first time dined on guinea fowl and found it a delicacy. The night was spent in an excellent tavern at Caswell Courthouse (now Yanceyville).

Proceeding westward, she passed Sen. Bedford Brown's home and went on to Lenox

Castle, "nothing more than a common plain stone building, built many years ago... adorned with a grove of China trees, and handsome shrubberies and lawns."

Approaching Greensboro, the stage passed near the site of the Revolutionary War battle of Guilford Courthouse. She wrote, "My husband was in this battle! Imagine my feelings as I traveled upon the same road he traveled with his men!"

Greensboro was, she recorded, "a considerable village, and like all our towns infested by Presbyterians..."

In this town of perhaps 5,000,

she stayed at the tavern of Christopher Moring, whom she described as a convert to "whisky and Presbyterianism, a great red-faced sot." She thought he belonged to the "Intemperate Society."

Moring also owned the stage line from Milton to South Carolina, a circumstance that led Mrs. Royall to conclude that the Presbyterians were conspiring to control the taverns, post offices, and stage lines.

"There are, however, several fine people in Greensboro," she admitted.

The presence of the notorious Mrs. Royall was quickly com-

municated across the town, and a number of gentlemen called upon her, including editor William Swaim, "a free, generous, liberal man, I believe a (Henry) Clay man; but I underrate no man for his opinion — he might underrate me for the same reason."

Mrs. Royall was particularly impressed by Alexander Murphey, described as "quite a boy in years, but a man in manners and principle; he is the most amiable and promising youth perhaps in the State."

Despite her opinion of Moring, Mrs. Royall was pleased with his tavern. She wrote, "He

has constructed several small neat huts, united in one row, one story high, where the traveler is much more comfortable than when cooped up in a small room in a house surrounded by other rooms and annoyed by noise. I should be pleased to see this plan universally adopted."

Near Jamestown, she was taken by a Quaker by the name of Hodginson on a tour of a gold mine. Her description of the extraction of gold is one of the best early accounts of gold mining in the United States.

At Hillsborough, too, Mrs. Royall found herself on the spot

where her late husband had served during the Revolution. She recounted that he and his men had demanded food and drink from a local resident, and later became violently ill.

The Tory had poisoned the milk that the soldiers drank. She dined with Archibald Murphey, whom she described as "a tall, spare man, with a keen, thin Ciceronian face, and a very mild countenance; but nothing can equal the sweetness of his manners."

Hillsborough was characterized as a delightful town, and she said "some of the handsomest country seats in the Un-

ion appear in the neighborhood of Hillsborough."

At last, the haughty traveler had found a place she liked.

## The Problem Kids Helped At Center

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — "We get a lot of tough child-abuse cases here," said Dr. Brian Grodner, psychologist at the Peanut Butter and Jelly Pre-School, Infant and Family Center. "Many of the cases we get are referred to us by agencies who can't handle them."

The Peanut Butter and Jelly Pre-School was founded in 1972 by Grodner's wife, Angela, a teacher of emotionally and mentally retarded children, and her partner, Christine Boyd, who had had 20 years of experience in working with pre-school children.

The center offers help to families with pre-school children and infants who are not developing normally or are in extremely high-risk situations.

"Some of these children are called emotionally disturbed, developmentally delayed, abused, neglected or autistic," said Mrs. Grodner. "But we prefer not to put labels on them."

The reason that Peanut Butter and Jelly staff members try hard to avoid labels is that they believe kids and families can be helped and that all things are possible.

"While we know that we can provide abused infants or children the kinds of emotional and educational support that will help them to grow and advance their skills, we feel that the advances that the kids make won't last unless we work with the parents," Grodner said.

"We need to get them where they can see that they possess the answers to their own problems. We try to get them to sit down and look at themselves objectively and to determine what it is that they want out of life."

A case in point is that of Maria Sanchez, 24, and her 4-year-old son Roberto (not their real names).

"Roberto was in a foster home when he was referred to us. He was 2 years old, hydrocephalic, very slow developmentally, shy and withdrawn," said Grodner.

"Married him out of wedlock, had abused him and didn't know what to do with him. Maria's mother had been married nine times. Maria had lived for a while with a step-mother whom she feared and simply had little concept of what a parent should be. On top of that, when we first met her she was using drugs quite heavily."

Thus, although Roberto remained in a foster home, the Peanut Butter and Jelly staff began working with Roberto and counseling and instructing Maria in parenting techniques.

# No Time To Write, But 'Shorty' A Pen Collector

CRAMERTON, N.C. (AP) — Straight from the pages of Damon Runyan walked a red-capped, wrinkled-faced, white-haired gent, who wanted it plainly understood that he "never writes nothing unless I have to because I have no time to write."

Shorty Crowe is doing the talking, but strangely, it's pens and pencils he collects for a hobby.

He was just hanging around his service station at Cramerton Crossroads when some fellow crossed to him and shoved a ball point pen or two at him. That's the way it started in 1945 and that's the way it has been ever since.

"I ain't never bought a pen and I don't intend to," says Shorty, whose real name is Evona.

He has long pens, short pens, thin pens, old-fashioned fountain pens, round pens, square pens, pens that light up and pens that offer a headache pill if the going gets too tough. Shorty also has square carpenter's pencils, big, round, and thin pencils, pearl-bottomed mechanical pencils, felt tip pens and one made in the shape of a sledge hammer with the eraser as the sledge.

His prizes have come from every nook and cranny of the U.S. and have advertising messages that tout items ranging from life insurance to grits and from nuts, bolts and screws to bread.

But the most unusual conversation piece of his entire collecting career was stolen by some wag who wanted it more than Shorty. The red and white pen bore this message: "Mabel's Whorehouse - Satisfaction Guaranteed."

Shorty doesn't know where that little gem came from but he reckons that the sender

might have been ashamed to put his name on it. He was able to figure out that it came out of Baltimore.

He and his wife, Velma, are proud of the collection. When it's unpacked from boxes in trunks and nesting places at their home north of McAdenville, a kitchen table becomes a solid mass of pens and pencils, and this by no means shows the entire collection.

Once a year he and Velma, "who gives him his orders," go through the writing in-

struments, clean them and apply some kind of lubricant to keep them from getting rusty.

Plastic won't rust, will it Shorty?

"No, but it builds up a site of mildew."

When the average householder finds those confounded ballpoints stuck away in dresser drawers, they usually hit the garbage can because they won't write.

Not Shorty.

"All ya hafta do to loosen one up is to stick it into a bucket of hot water. If the ink ain't all

dried up, it will write," he says.

Evona Crowe came out of Oconee County, S.C., not too far from where Duke Power's nuclear plant is located. Now 5-foot-4 and 62-years-old, Shorty peers from behind horned-rimmed specs and wears a hearing aid. From the day he was born until he came to Cramerton in 1941 to work for Burlington Industries, he says "I slept."

The reference is to life on the farm, where the living was sometimes easy. He put in 18 years with Burlington and sev-

eral more with an air systems company in Charlotte before finding that he and his wife could earn their living running a service station. And that's the way it has been ever since.

Then came that day in 1945 when he was set afire by the idea of collecting writing instruments. A salesman for Moore & Stewart Co. of Gastonia gave him a mechanical pencil.

"Why not collect pens for a hobby?" Shorty said. And he started collecting pens from Mexico, Germany, England,

and any other place in the world where he could get them. He told his friends he was a collector and they brought him pens. These friends told other people and they mailed him pens.

Pens and pencils rolled in by the hundreds and the problem became where to keep them. When one box filled up, Shorty and Velma found another. Then a strange thing happened. The pens quit coming in and Shorty wondered why. As best as he can ascertain, a thing called inflation dried up his sources.

"When I was gittin' pens from all around they was costing about 3 cents apiece per thousand. Today the same type of pens are costing 25 cents apiece and I don't know if that is by the thousand or by the million. I guess it is a simple matter of overhead being too high to continue giving them away," he reasons.

He knows some of his collection is valuable, but he really doesn't know how much it is worth.

"A man offered me five dollars for that old Moore & Stew-

art mechanical pencil and I told him his money stunk," said Shorty.

But one thing is sure. The pens and pencils will remain in the family because he has it written into his will that his twin granddaughters will inherit them.

"If there are two pens alike they can divide them," he said. "If they don't want any of them they can just pitch 'em out into the yard."

But that's a thought that Shorty won't "write off" very lightly.

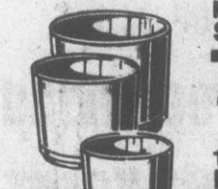

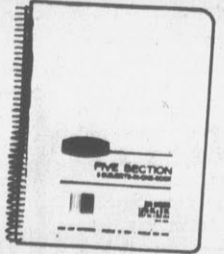

## Sandy Water A Factor

HONOLULU, Hawaii (AP) — Water in the lungs is not the only danger to near-drowning victims, say radiologists at Tripler Army Medical Center here.

They warn that if a victim is near a beach where waves break and mix with sand, it's possible that there is sand, as well as water, in the lungs and breathing passages.

The sand, easily seen on X-ray studies, must be quickly washed out to avoid complications, or even death, in those near-drowning victims, advise Dr. Jaime Bonilla-Santiago and Dr. William L. Fill.

They say they were alerted to such "sand drownings" when X-ray studies of a 23-year-old drowning victim showed pronounced definition ("marked opacity") of the windpipe and bronchus. The autopsy showed these were packed with sand.

In another case, a 20-year-old man was struck by a wave and pulled under but was rescued. His breathing had stopped for only a minute and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation revived him.

He was totally alert and breathed normally but a chest radiograph showed inflammation indicating sand in the bronchus. A bronchoscope was used to wash the area with a saline solution, small amounts of sand were removed, and the man recovered.

## A Live Boa In The Stolen Car

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Car thieves who stole a two-door, white-and-blue sport sedan in the city's Mission District may have got more than they bargained for.

The car's owner, who asked not to be identified, said a live boa constrictor was in the back seat of the auto when it was taken Saturday night.

He urged anyone who comes near the car — thieves included — to "use caution as there is a scared, live, 4 1/2-foot boa constrictor running around inside it."

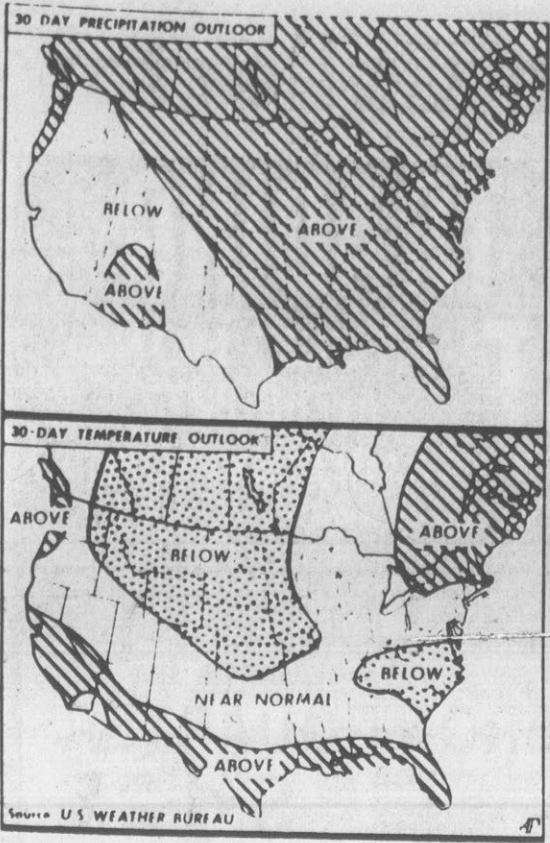

## Repairing Loss Due Vandals

ROME (AP) — Under the gaze of thousands of summer tourists, a small army of workmen is repairing Campidoglio Square, the stately Roman city hall complex designed by Michelangelo that was ravaged by a terrorist bomb blast three months ago.

Rome's Communist-led administration has turned the damaged site atop Capitoline Hill into a showcase of art restoration.

A web of metal scaffolding has grown like ivy on the walls of the Palazzo Senatorio, Rome's city hall, and the twin buildings on each side of it.

Green netting encloses the famed bronze equestrian statue of Marcus Aurelius in the center of the square. The statue was not damaged by the 10-pound dynamite bomb but was suffering the ravages of air pollution.

Signs in five languages put up by the city on corrugated metal fencing tell tourists the restoration is "the consequence of a serious fascist attempt the night of April 19-20."

The bombing, two months before the Italian general election, was a bold strike at the political and cultural heart of the city, built over the ancient Tabularium that housed the Roman archives.

Mayor Giulio Carlo Argan, a Marxist and one of Italy's leading art historians, insisted on holding a city council meeting amid the rubble hours after the blast to show the city was not intimidated.

The Revolutionary Armed Nuclei — identified by police as a right-wing terrorist group — claimed responsibility for the bombing in telephone calls to the news media. Police say no arrests have been made. A few months before, the same group carried out an armed attack on five feminists during a talk show at a leftist radio station.

The city administration estimates it will cost the equivalent of \$1.2 million to repair the damage. Nearly half of it will go to restore the double-stairway and entrance of the Senatorial Palace, whose facade was built in 1592 according to a masterplan for the square drawn up by Michelangelo.

The city and national governments are footing the bill, and city officials say the work will take at least six months to a year to complete.

Also heavily damaged in that building were the walls and ceilings of the Julius Caesar Hall, the city council's meeting

hall. Experts found the blast opened cracks in the twin stone palaces that flank the city hall and damaged the ceiling of the "wedding room," a plush, red-velvet-lined chamber in the Palazzo dei Conservatori, where civil marriages are conducted.

A total of 237 marble and masonry pieces were collected after the explosion. Some were hurled as high as the bell tower atop city hall.

Since the bombing, police have tightened up security. Uniformed guards man wooden barricades at the foot of the hill and bar cars from the area, which is now guarded around the clock. The city is also studying a plan to require employees to carry identification cards to gain admittance to municipal offices atop the hill.

## More Chemical Engineers Seen

NEW YORK (AP) — During the next few years record numbers of new chemical engineers are expected to be seeking jobs in chemical process industries, according to Chemical Engineering magazine.

Luring students to enroll at U.S. chemical engineering schools are high starting salaries and plentiful job opportunities, says the publication.

It says the survey found that demand for chemical engineers will continue strong for the next three years but will not keep pace with the "onslaught of graduates."

## Big Black Bear Is Red-Faced

PHILLIPS, Wis. (AP) — A red-faced black bear is prowling Wisconsin's north woods — and the coloring is caused by more than just embarrassment.

While keeping two Department of Natural Resources foresters treed for two hours recently, the 250-pound beast spray-painted his face crimson when he bit open a paint can and rolled in the mess.

The foresters, David Bailey and Roy Gilge, both 29, were spray-painting the boundaries of a DNR timber sale in the Flambeau State Forest here when the bear appeared.

The bear wandered off eventually and the men made a dash to their pickup truck.

# CAMERA *Angles*

This column is in collaboration with my son, Donald M. Desfor, who recently earned his doctorate in human behavior after a comprehensive survey on how people react to photographs.

He re-emphasizes that photography is a particularly significant and vital visual force in the world today.

"Pictures are everywhere," he says. "They are framed and displayed at home and at work. They hang on walls, lockers and auto visors. Pictures are taped and pinned on bulletin boards, doors, closets, posts and windows. They are crammed into cartons, dumped into drawers, enclosed in envelopes, shoved into shoe boxes and wadded into wallets.

"Similarly, cameras have become a common artifact of American life and our society. They appear everywhere and are used by everyone. Guests and bystanders with cameras rub shoulders with professionals at weddings, graduations, opening nights and public events. We're all aware that our travel and vacation experiences must be documented with photographic evidence. In

most cases, the trip is deemed a success or failure depending on how the pictures turn out.

"Out of the deluge of billions of pictures from millions of cameras, what is the impact

that photographs have on us. What do they mean to us?"

To get some answers, Don conducted a research study in 1978. His subjects were men and women between the ages of 17 and 50 who lived in southern California and in the greater New York City area but who represented many areas of the country. They were a cross section of varied ethnic, social, occupational and educational backgrounds.

The subjects were asked to look at four photographs and freely give their response to each one without any prompting. Then Don probed their responses to find what motivated their thoughts. All the interviews were tape recorded, studied and evaluated.

All the freely given responses were classified into one of six categories: Deductive, Evaluative, Subjective, Photographic, Objective and Reflective.

A Deductive response is a factual statement that can be deduced from one or more visual cues in the photograph. The statement could be substantiated as to whether it was true or false. An example: "This is a mother and her son and daughter."

An Evaluative statement expresses a value, opinion or judgment stimulated by one or more visual cues in the photo but which cannot be substantiated as fact.

Example: "The girl looks happy and the boy looks hostile."

A Subjective response also expresses a value, opinion or judgment but it isn't based on visual clues or substantiated as a fact. An example: "The picture was taken at Easter." In this case, there was no basket, flowers or special attire that would indicate the picture was taken at Easter time.

A Photographic response made a technical or aesthetic statement about the photograph itself rather than about the subject content. An example: "It's a sharp, properly exposed print with good depth of focus."

An Objective response is rare. It's a statement that is detached, impersonal, free of commentary, evaluation and prejudice, and is visually verifiable. An example: "This photograph has three figures in it."

In the sixth and last category, a Reflective response might be one of two types — either personal or philosophical. A visual clue in the photo might evoke a personal response like, "She reminds me of my mother." Or the statement might contain a generality such as, "Family groups like this one are good for the

country." After evaluating all the responses, Don found only one category which included all persons interviewed: Eval-

uative. That's the one in which an opinion is expressed guided by clues in the photo but which cannot be substantiated visually. As a matter of fact, the

preponderance of all responses tended to be evaluative. In contrast, there were extremely few Objective responses, a conclusion that was all

the more noticeable because of the overwhelming number of interpretive statements.

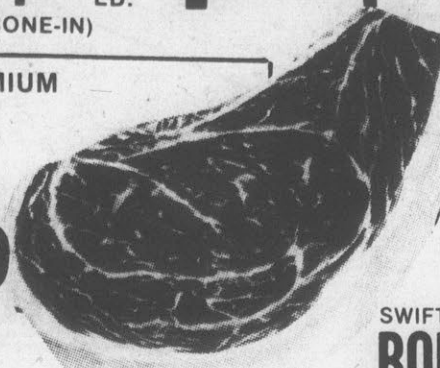

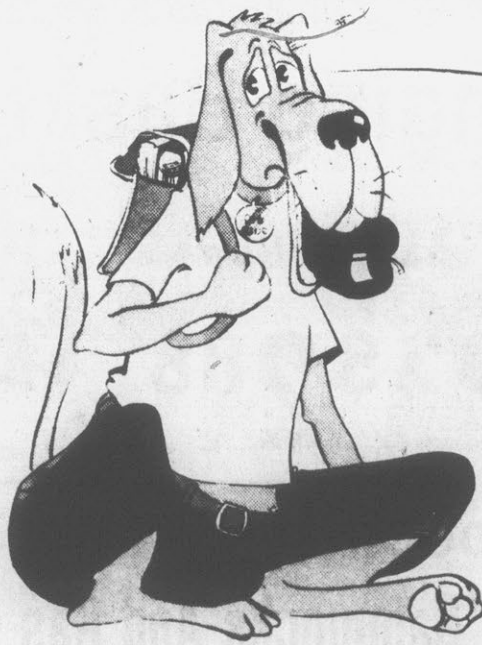

**Readers Ask About Bursitis**

**Q:** What causes a sudden attack of bursitis in an otherwise healthy person?  
**A:** Repeated injuries, exposure to drafts, lifting a heavy weight, off-balance swinging of a golf club or ax, straining the shoulder at tennis, can all cause an attack of this painful condition.  
**Q:** Does bursitis occur only in the shoulders?  
**A:** No. It is estimated that there are 150 bursae in the body. They may lie in the hip, the heel, the knee, the elbow. The shoulder does seem to be the most susceptible, however. About 75 percent of all bursitis cases occur in the shoulder joint.  
**Q:** What is a bursa and what is its purpose?  
**A:** A bursa is a flat sac that normally contains a slippery, lubricating fluid. The name originates from the Latin, meaning "money bag." And a bursa resembles a small, empty change purse. Bursae are the lubricating, ball-bearing system of the body. Bones, joints, tendons and muscles that constantly move are protected against the irritation of friction by these well-placed bursae.  
**Q:** Does one attack of bursitis make a person susceptible to more attacks?  
**A:** Unless the underlying cause is removed, recurring bouts of bursitis can be expected. Tiny calcium deposits, which may lead to stones in the bursa, further complicate the problem of bursitis. Gout

is sometimes overlooked as the real culprit in attacks of bursitis. Uric acid stones, rather than calcium, may be deposited in the bursae.  
**Q:** Why is the pain so severe with shoulder bursitis?  
**A:** The agonizing pain is nature's way of demanding that the shoulder be kept at complete rest. For any further motion irritates the bursa, makes it swell, and sends shooting pains down the arm.  
**Q:** What's the best way to relieve this pain?  
**A:** "Freezing" the shoulder is very effective. An ice bag applied to the tender spot brings welcome comfort. Note well: Ice, not heat. Most important is the fact that the joint must have absolute rest. It can be held in place with splints or slings until the inflammation subsides. There are now a number of very effective anti-inflammatory and pain-killing drugs that can afford great comfort. When pain persists, doctors will inject cortisone or ACTH and the pain-killing drug, "procaïne," into the joint. Besides drugs, X-rays are also used in some cases. Only occasionally is surgery necessary. Under no circumstances should a bursitis be "worked out" with heavy exercise. Manipulation and massage must be avoided, since it is absolutely essential that the joint be kept in a fixed, rigid position, in order to help reduce the inflammatory process.

**Home Filled By 65,000 Relics**

DENVER (AP) - John Kendra, 41, began collecting religious relics when he was only 14 years old. He now has more than 65,000. Most of them are in a 12-foot by 14-foot bedroom of the Kendras' mobile home in west Denver. A collection of Madonnas is kept in the living room. Kendra, who works in the mailroom at Ryall Electric, has crosses, crucifixes, statues, pictures, medals, an altar, rocks, pieces of saints' coffins and particles of hair and bones from saints. The bodily relics, Kendra says, are "first class" relics and most are in small locket-like cases and sealed with a bishop's seal or the seal of the coat of arms of a religious order or congregation. "Second-class" relics include tiny portions or threads from vestments that belonged to saints or some artifact belonging to saints. These include pieces of stone from a tombstone or bits of dirt from a

saint's grave. Kendra has collected relics and religious mementos from various trips in this country and Israel. There he obtained a piece of the Walling Wall and a stone from the garden of agony. He also has a menorah which burns in memory of the 6 million Jews who lost their lives in the Holocaust. Many of the other relics have come from monasteries and religious orders. Kendra says he has relics of the Holy Apostles, Mary's tunic, St. Joseph's tunic, the "true cross," and Jesus' crib, as well as those from several saints. Mrs. Kendra says the relics fill the bedroom, sitting on dressers and tables and hanging on the walls. There are also two storage chests full of relics. None was bought, and, according to Mrs. Kendra, "we would be excommunicated if we bought or sold relics." The Kendras have, however, spent a lot of money on postage.

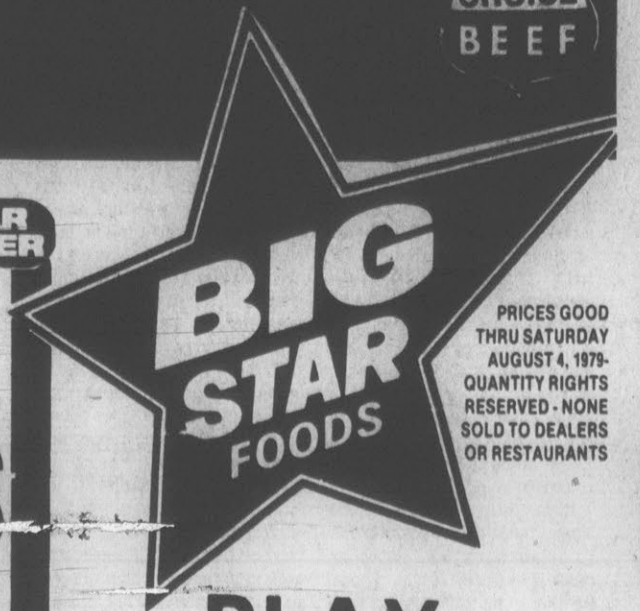

# How Tar Heel Representatives, Senators Voted

**Roll Call Report Service**  
WASHINGTON — Here's how area Members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes July 19 through July 25.

**HOUSE**  
**AMTRAK** — The House rejected 197 for and 214 against, an amendment to continue the full 27,500-mile Amtrak passenger train network for another year. The amendment was proposed to HR 3996, a bill authorizing Amtrak operations in fiscal 1980 and beyond. As later passed and sent to the Senate, the bill cuts Amtrak to 22,000 miles in order to stem its massive financial losses.  
Rep. Albert Gore, Jr., D-Tenn., the sponsor, said that due to shortages of gasoline, passenger train service should be kept intact for at least another year.  
Rep. James Florio, D-N.J., an opponent, said that in preserving Amtrak's least-productive routes the House invites the failure of the entire system.

Members voting "yea" wanted to keep Amtrak at its present size during the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.  
Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, Ike Andrews, D-4, Charles Rose, D-7, and W.G. Hefner, D-8, voted "yea."  
Reps. L.H. Fountain, D-2, Charles Whitley, D-3, Stephen Neal, D-5, Richardson Prever,

D-6, James Martin, R-9, James Broyhill, R-10, and Lamar Gudger, D-11, voted "nay."  
**STAFF INCREASE** — The House voted 214 for and 120 against, to allow House members to enlarge their staffs by up to four part-time or temporary positions. This raises the present ceiling of 18 aides that a member can have on his personal (as opposed to committee) staff. It leaves unchanged the \$288,000 limit on salaries for a member's personal staff. The measure (H Res 359) does not require Senate concurrence and takes effect Aug. 1.  
Rep. Carroll Campbell, R-S.C., a supporter, said the staff enlargement will give members "some flexibility for dealing with situations in their offices, such as a maternity leave, such as the need for a temporary employee to bring special expertise..."

Rep. Lucien Nedzi, D-Mich., an opponent, said the hike "will guarantee more staff proliferation and, in its train, a requirement for more space, more furniture, more parking, and more telephone."  
Rep. John Buchanan, R-Ala., an opponent, said: "The Constitution should never be amended in such a light and cavalier fashion. Would we rewrite the Bill of Rights on the floor of the House on the basis of one of two hours of debate?"

Members voting "nay" either favored busing or felt that amending the Constitution was an inappropriate response to the problems of busing.  
Jones, Neal, Martin, Broyhill and Gudger voted "yea."  
Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Prever, Rose and Hefner voted "nay."

## Navy Gig Has Emergency Role

**CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP)** — Its last assignment was carrying naval officers between a giant cruiser and the French Riviera. Its next task will be to carry local emergency crews to scenes of river disasters.  
"We've been looking for years for something like this for water rescue," said Richard Gray, chief of emergency services for Charleston and Kanawha County, of the retired captain's gig.  
Gray has a crew of 15 volunteers who have taken a U.S. Coast Guard course in boat handling and will be able to man the 28-foot vessel.

Members voting "yea" wanted larger personal staffs.  
Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Prever, Rose, Broyhill and Gudger voted "yea."  
Martin voted "nay."  
Hefner did not vote.

**SCHOOL BUSING** — By a vote of 209 for and 216 against, the House failed to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to approve a proposed "neighborhood schools" constitutional amendment. The measure was designed primarily to outlaw court-ordered busing to integrate schools.  
Rep. Ronald Mottl, D-Ohio, the sponsor, said court-ordered busing "is a social policy imposed by an activist judiciary, and it is a mistaken social policy that is leading to the virtual destruction of public education at neighborhood schools in cities where it is used."

Rep. John Buchanan, R-Ala., an opponent, said: "The Constitution should never be amended in such a light and cavalier fashion. Would we rewrite the Bill of Rights on the floor of the House on the basis of one of two hours of debate?"

Members voting "nay" either favored busing or felt that amending the Constitution was an inappropriate response to the problems of busing.  
Jones, Neal, Martin, Broyhill and Gudger voted "yea."  
Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Prever, Rose and Hefner voted "nay."

## SENATE ELECTION COMMISSIONER

The Senate confirmed 73 for and 25 against, President Carter's nomination of Frank Reiche, a New Jersey Republican, to the Federal Election Commission.  
Reiche was opposed by many Seante Republicans who doubted that he was a sufficiently partisan Republican and dislike his refusal to oppose public financing of congressional campaigns. The FEC, which enforces

federal election laws, has three Democratic and three GOP commissioners.  
Sen. Mark Matfield, R-Ore., a supporter, criticized "those who lead people to believe they represent true Republicanism..."  
Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, an opponent, said that if Reiche proves to be "not a partisan Republican" the Democratic Party point of view could prevail on the FEC.

Senators voting "nay" opposed the nominations.  
Sens. Robert Morgan, D, and Jesse Helms, R, voted "nay."  
**ABORTION** — The Senate adopted 57 for and 42 against, a more conservative position on the abortion issue. The language was included in an appropriations bill (HR 4389) later passed and sent to conference with the House. It permits federally-funded abortions when (1) the mother's life is endangered, (2) the pregnancy is the result of rape or incest, or (3) two doctors say the pregnancy will harm the mother's health.

This vote puts the Senate more in harmony with the harder-line House, thus diminishing the chance of another months-long congressional standoff on the abortion issue.  
Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., a supporter, said that due to the House's hard line the language "is about the best we can do under the circumstances."  
Sen. Robert Packwood, R-Ore., an opponent, said taking a harder line against federally-funded abortions "only denies to poor women equal access to this medical service."

Senators voting "yea" were anxious to compromise with the House on the abortion issue.  
Morgan voted "yea."  
Helms voted "nay."

**SAVE GAS ON AIR**  
**NEW YORK (AP)** — A recent survey by the Illinois Institute of Technology found that 50 to 70 percent of tires checked were underinflated during the summer and 60 to 80 percent had the same deficiency during the winter.  
Not only is proper inflation crucial to the performance and safety of tires, says Firestone's director of consumer affairs Jack B. Scarliff, it also helps lower gas consumption, since underinflation increases rolling resistance.

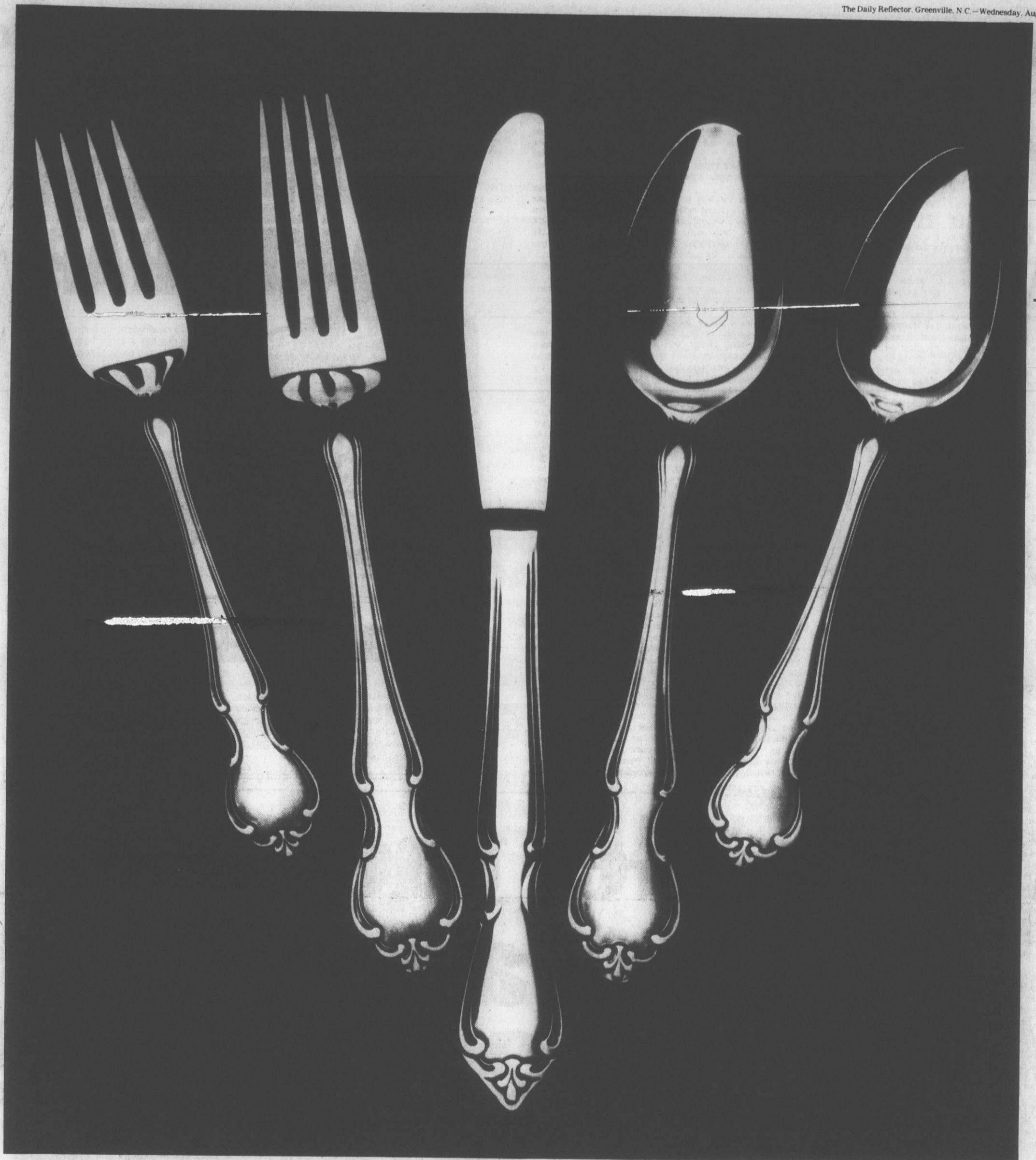

# How Tar Heel Representatives, Senators Voted

**Roll Call Report Service**  
WASHINGTON — Here's how area MEMBERS of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes July 19 through July 25.

**HOUSE**  
**AMTRAK** — The House rejected, 197 for and 214 against, an amendment to continue the full 27,500-mile Amtrak passenger train network for another year. The amendment was proposed to HR 3996, a bill authorizing Amtrak operations in fiscal 1980 and beyond. As later passed and sent to the Senate, the bill cuts Amtrak to 22,000 miles in order to stem its massive financial losses.

Rep. Albert Gore, Jr., D-Tenn., the sponsor, said that due to shortages of gasoline, passenger train service should be kept intact for at least another year.

Rep. James Florio, D-N.J., an opponent, said that in preserving Amtrak's least-productive routes the House invites the failure of the entire system.

Members voting "yea" wanted to keep Amtrak at its present size during the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, Ike Andrews, D-4, Charles Rose, D-7, and W.G. Hefner, D-8, voted "yea."

Reps. L.H. Fountain, D-2, Charles Whitley, D-3, Stephen Neal, D-5, Richardson Prever,

D-6, James Martin, R-9, James Broyhill, R-10, and Lamar Gudger, D-11, voted "nay."

**STAFF INCREASE** — The House voted, 214 for and 120 against, to allow House members to enlarge their staffs by up to four part-time or temporary positions. This raises the present ceiling of 18 aides that a member can have on his personal (as opposed to committee) staff. It leaves unchanged the \$288,000 limit on salaries for a member's personal staff. The measure (H Res 359) does not require Senate concurrence and takes effect Aug. 1.

Rep. Carroll Campbell, R-S.C., a supporter, said the staff enlargement will give members "some flexibility for dealing with situations in their offices, such as a maternity leave, such as the need for a temporary employee to bring special expertise."

Rep. Lucien Nedzi, D-Mich., an opponent, said the hike "will guarantee more staff proliferation and, in its train, a requirement for more space, more furniture, more parking, and more telephone."

## Navy Gig Has Emergency Role

CHARLESTON, Va. (AP) — Its last assignment was carrying naval officers between a giant cruiser and the French Riviera. Its next task will be to carry local emergency crews to scenes of river disasters.

"We've been looking for years for something like this for water rescue," said Richard Gray, chief of emergency services for Charleston and Kanawha County, of the retired captain's gig.

Gray has a crew of 15 volunteers who have taken a U.S. Coast Guard course in boat handling and will be able to man the 28-foot vessel.

Members voting "yea" wanted larger personal staffs.

Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Preyer Rose, Broyhill and Gudger voted "yea."

Martin voted "nay." Hefner did not vote.

**SCHOOL BUSING** — By a vote of 209 for and 216 against, the House failed to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to approve a proposed "neighborhood schools" constitutional amendment. The measure was designed primarily to outlaw court-ordered busing to integrate schools.

Rep. Ronald Mottl, D-Ohio, the sponsor, said court-ordered busing "is a social policy imposed by an activist judiciary, and it is a mistaken social policy that is leading to the virtual destruction of public education at neighborhood schools in cities where it is used."

Rep. John Buchanan, R-Ala., an opponent, said: "The Constitution should never be amended in such a light and cavalier fashion. Would we rewrite the Bill of Rights on the floor of the House on the basis of one of two hours of debate?"

Members voting "nay" either favored busing or felt that amending the Constitution was an inappropriate response to the problems of busing.

Jones, Neal, Martin, Broyhill and Gudger voted "yea."

Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Preyer, Rose and Hefner voted "nay."

**SENATE ELECTION COMMISSIONER** — The Senate confirmed, 73 for and 25 against, President Carter's nomination of Frank Reiche, a New Jersey Republican, to the Federal Election Commission.

Reiche was opposed by many Senate Republicans who doubted that he was a sufficiently partisan Republican and dislike his refusal to oppose public financing of congressional campaigns. The FEC, which enforces

federal election laws, has three Democratic and three GOP commissioners.

Sen. Mark Matfield, R-Ore., a supporter, criticized "those who lead people to believe they represent true Republicanism."

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, an opponent, said that if Reiche proves to be "not a partisan Republican" the Democratic Party point of view could prevail on the FEC.

Senators voting "nay" opposed the nominations.

Sens. Robert Morgan, D, and Jesse Helms, R, voted "nay."

**ABORTION** — The Senate adopted, 57 for and 42 against, a more conservative position on the abortion issue. The language was included in an appropriations bill (HR 4389) later passed and sent to conference with the House. It permits federally-funded abortions when (1) the mother's life is endangered, (2) the pregnancy is the result of rape or incest, or (3) two doctors say the pregnancy will harm the mother's health.

This vote puts the Senate more in harmony with the harder-line House, thus diminishing the chance of another months-long congressional standoff on the abortion issue.

Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., a supporter, said that due to the House's hard line the language "is about the best we can do under the circumstances."

Sen. Robert Packwood, R-Ore., an opponent, said taking a harder line against federally-funded abortions "only denies to poor women equal access to this medical service."

Senators voting "yea" were anxious to compromise with the House on the abortion issue.

Morgan voted "yea."

Helms voted "nay."

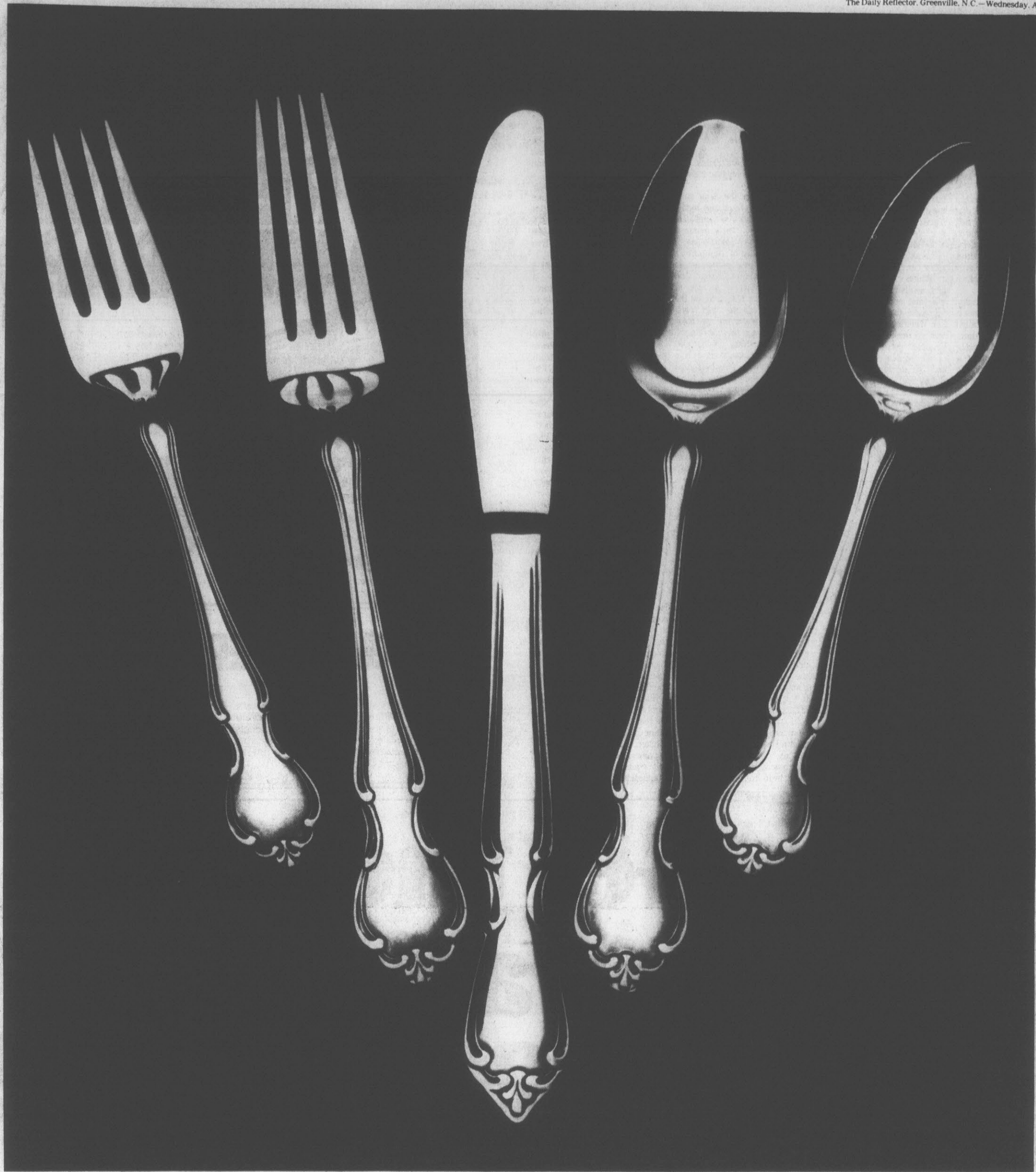

# Black Druggist Says Economics Now Battlefield

CLARKSDALE, Miss. (UPI) — Once upon a time, before Martin Luther King, before the overcoming, before black was beautiful, white was white and black was black and the railroad tracks were the border.

Above the tracks downtown Clarksdale was white and manners and mores operated as in olden days when cotton first came to this flat delta country. Blacks had such titles as Mister and Missus only below the tracks, in black Fourth Street.

Then came the civil rights struggles of the past generation. Martin Luther King visited Fourth Street. Hubert Humphrey, the onetime Minnesota pharmacist, spent much of a day behind the counter in Aaron Henry's Fourth Street drugstore.

And now, today, in the delta where integration once seemed as distant as snow, the railroad tracks are a fuzziy border. Oh, it may look the same. Fourth Street, from Goon's Store down to the Sunflower River, is still all black. The sidewalk loungers in front of

the second hand stores and the drugstore are all black. But there is a difference.

Philip Sherman, a young and husky white man running for reelection as county attorney, stops and chats with a black man with a political style that knows today's Mississippi ballot box is color blind. And across the tracks, in what had been the white heartland, there are blacks on the police and firefighting forces, there are black city officials and through the bank's front window a black teller can be seen.

"Whites are now courteous and southern gentle manners are what once they were only supposed to be," said Willie Lee Watkins, 44, soda jerk and clerk in the Henry drugstore in Fourth Street.

"Whites now say 'Yes, sir' and 'No, sir' to us in the stores and no longer are we the last in line to be served," he said.

Watkins and his brothers and sisters can ride up front in the bus. The separate drinking fountains are long gone. The schools are integrated. But Watkins mashed a ball of chocolate ice cream 'maybe harder than needed into a cone. He was showing emotion.

"But I don't feel equal," he said.

"I can apply for a job but being black, my chances may not be too good at getting it. And blacks are not being promoted."

"We've got civil rights. The battle now is economic rights," Watkins said.

The walls of the drug store speak of yesterday and today. Five photographs of President John Kennedy. Three pictures of President Lyndon Johnson. A colored display of Humphrey's smile. A framed picture of an unsmiling Jimmy Carter. And each wall has a picture of Martin Luther King and, on the counter, beside the cash register, is an almost lifesize, gold-painted plaster bust of King.

The plaster King gives an Old Testament prophet's stare at a display of civil rights literature and signs reading "Be A First Class Citizen — Pay Your Poll Tax!" and "Register Now — Voting Means Freedom."

Behind the counter Clarence Cummings, 40, Henry's manager and pharmacist, pats the King bust. "People say I look just like King. They're wrong; Martin Luther King had more hair," he said.

Cummings, native of Clarksdale, once chopped cotton in delta fields for \$3 a day. His mother and father had moved to town in search of an education for their children — "We were real rural and didn't know what kind of tomorrow the children would have without an education today," his mother, Mrs. John Cummings, 65, said.

Cummings measured some pills into a thumb-sized bottle and said, "I found a program the State of Mississippi had going; they'd pay college costs if I'd just go to school outside of Mississippi."

"I went to Xavier College in New Orleans and Mississippi paid me \$300 to \$400 a semester to do that. I became a pharmacist. It was 1964 and I didn't want to return here.

"I couldn't work in New Orleans then. They didn't hire black pharmacists then. You almost had to pay them to let you work. I went to Newport News, Va." Last year he suffered a marital separation and an auto crash and came home to Clarksdale.

"I earn about \$9,000 a year here. I guess I could make \$20,000 back in Virginia. But I'm living with my folks and I told Aaron Henry I would take the pay cut so he could be free for his politics."

Henry is Mississippi's NAACP leader and is a candidate for the legislature. Cummings said, "Clarksdale is integrated. But a little on the token side."

"The money for black projects is not coming from private sources but from government funds. Ah, but I'm no politician. Just a pharmacist."

Watkins, over beyond the counter of candy and newspapers and cameras, laughed. "Yes, just a pharmacist like Hubert Humphrey."

Cummings said, "Civil rights has a way to go. Progress now depends on how hard blacks work. We got a foot in the door. Education will get both feet in."

"It's economic, really. And the measure of success will be when a white man won't think nothing of working for a black. And when nothing but the railroad track separates Fourth Street from downtown."

Cummings paused for lunch. He went home. In the living room was a saying painted onto a piece of pottery: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; the courage to change the things I can; and the wisdom to know the difference."

His mother asked Cummings what he had been talking about. He told her.

She shooed him into the kitchen with his nieces and nephews. She said, "I always felt equal. I feel equal now. Maybe I feel equaler."

# Simplicity In Good Life

TAYUJICA, Costa Rica (AP) — When the skies open and the gods cry, farmer Marco Tulio Corrales sits on his porch and watches the rain.

He has no broken machines to repair. No creditors to worry him. His tool is his brain. His bank is his mattress.

Corrales used to be a man of the city. Like thousands of other Costa Ricans, he went to San Jose looking for the good life.

Instead he found dirty air, noisy streets, high prices, loneliness and a confusion country folk never have to face.

He returned to the land.

Now he enjoys an easy pace. He has time to teach his sons what a farmer should know about tilling and planting and looking after coffee bushes and garden vegetables and loyal animals.

He lives without electricity, automobile or tractor. Water comes from rain or a nearby creek. His privy has a jungle view.

He and his wife Norma built their frame house with their own hands. With three sons already, it is time to add a room.

Corrales is a new breed of "campesino" — peasant, man of the field.

Unlike his father's father, he can read. He writes poetry. He has traveled far beyond his birthplace and came home again.

Ben Franklin would have liked the Corrales family's habits. They rise before sun-up, are asleep by twilight. They are healthy, moderately wealthy, and wiser than most of their former neighbors in the city.

In 1970, when Corrales was 21 and his bride 16, they left their home ground and moved 90 miles southwest to the capital.

"We went because we thought the work wouldn't be as hard as on the farm," he recalled. "I got a job in a refrigerator assembly plant. Soon I was making service calls, working weekends and nights."

"The first two boys were born. There was never enough room. We spent extra money on movies, a vice that isn't worthwhile. Instead of finding a place with a nice ambience, we found a contaminated society."

"My father had a chance to buy this land, but he said he needed help to work it. I was wasting my time in the city anyway, so we came home."

Corrales is the oldest of four boys. He and Norma and their sons Marco Jr., now 9, and Henry, now 6, moved in with his brothers until they could build a house on the 80 acres his father financed for him.

The house cost \$1,250. It sits on stilts to catch the breeze and stymie the termites. Rain falls off the tin roof and cool breezes waft into the two bedrooms, living room and big kitchen.

Norma made all the bedspreads, utatins, and pillow cushions. She sews all of her family's clothes.

The Corraleses spend about \$70 a month for food, half on staples and the rest on fresh and timed meat. They raise many of their own vegetables,

and the jungle provides much of their fruit — bananas, papaya, mango, wild berries. Their chickens give them eggs and on special occasions wind up in the pot. At Christmas they butcher a pig. The cow gives them butter, cream, cheese and yogurt.

"We are almost self-sufficient. The only drawback is being so far away from a doctor without having a car," Norma says. She walks two miles to the store and to church, but the doctor is in Turrialba, 45 minutes by car, and villagers now charge \$20 for the ride because gas is so high.

"But I love it here, and I never want to leave," she says.

Besides raising coffee and sugar cane, Corrales works parttime as foreman on a pine tree farm up the mountainside.

The extra money goes for the family's big purchases. After every harvest they invest in one major item.

Since he came back in 1975, Corrales has been able to buy a new cow or ox every two years. Each costs about \$450. Every time a neighbor wants to use his finely curried oxen, they pay \$9 a day.

Corrales, his father and his brothers contribute to a general family fund kept for emergencies or fast investments.

"Last year we had a chance to buy a car," says Corrales, "but we had a meeting and decided to stick with what we know best — we bought another cow."

Costa Rica is a democracy firmly rooted in its middle-class majority. Corrales and hundreds of thousands like him vote for their president, elect their Legislative Assemblyman, read uncensored newspapers, send their children to good schools, get free medical care, have plenty to eat and live in adequate houses.

"We feel we have control over our daily lives," he said, sipping a steaming cup of coffee while he sat on the porch watching the rain water the gardenias, bougainvillea, begonias, roses, jasmine, frangipani, hibiscus and poppies in Norma's flower garden.

"A lot of people like us have gone to the cities, but more and more they are going back to the farm as they find out they were happier there. Most of us have graduated from the sixth grade. For some, a college education can give a better way of life in San Jose."

"But for most young campesinos, the land is where they belong, and the land is where they'll stay."

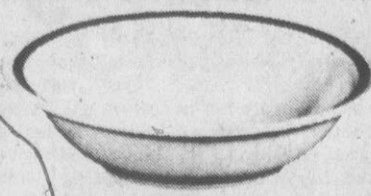

# Part Of Job: Telling Parents A Child Might Die

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — When Michael Farmer tumbled down the stairs five years ago, the boy's parents took him to a hospital to find out why his bruises wouldn't heal. They learned their son might die.

Within a year, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital doctors told Lynn and Robert Farmer their only daughter Leisa, like their son, has a rare, incurable blood disease. Telling parents their child might die — and telling the child — is part of a doctor's job at St. Jude.

"They don't lie to you," Mrs. Farmer said. Mike, now 12, and Leisa, 11, are still alive, and the 35-year-old housewife has learned to cope with the lethal illnesses of two of her three children. "At first it seems unspeakably cruel," she said, "but you learn to appreciate the truth. Knowing makes it somehow less frightening."

The hospital has treated more than 5,000 youngsters from around the world without charge since it opened 17 years ago. It was founded by entertainer Danny Thomas and is supported by grants and charity.

The children's illnesses — leukemia and other cancers, neuromuscular disorders and blood diseases — are catastrophic or the children wouldn't be there. St. Jude's doctors

treat only children with potentially terminal illnesses. They try to keep the youngsters alive in hopes that cures may be found and they help the children — who've hardly lived — to face death.

There is no formula, but the preparation begins with the truth. "If you do not tell the patient what's really happening, then he cannot make the best of his situation," explained Dr. Morris Powazek, a clinical psychologist.

But dealing openly with death doesn't lessen the pain, so the seven professionals in the psychology-psychiatry department try to help the family cope.

Generally when a child is

brought to St. Jude, the parents know he is seriously ill, clinical social worker Janet Payne said. Tests are run to confirm the referring doctor's diagnosis. Then, usually on the second day, the doctor tells the parents and child. It's never easy.

"I felt like somebody hit me in the face with a brickbat," Mrs. Farmer said. "They are as kind as possible but it's there in black and white. I felt like my whole world was collapsing."

On the third day "when some of the numbness has worn off," Mrs. Payne said, the parents are told of the psychiatric services. More than half seek help, she said.

"Losing a child is such a special agony that there's not much anyone can do to ease it," said Mrs. Payne, 35, the mother of an infant daughter. "We try to provide support for the parents and kids and we support each other."

The explanation of death is tailored to each child, Powazek said, because a child's concept of death varies with his age.

"A very young child from 1 year to about 6 ... sees death as a separation, like being away on vacation," he said. "The child between 6 and 10 experiences the idea of death emotionally and sees it as a form of desertion by his parents."

"The child of 9 or 10, however, begins to think of death as adults do, understanding the finality ..."

Play and parental counseling usually work with younger children.

"Although young children can't put their feelings into words, they will express fear and anger in games and drawings," Powazek said. The counselors' offices are lined with children's art.

Parents receive as much attention as the child. "Young children identify strongly with their parents," Powazek said.

"Children have problems when their parents experience emotional difficulties. We try to help parents ventilate their feelings in a private and safe

## Woman Welder Likes Her Work

The war that inspired the song "Rosie the Riveter" was over before Lisa Croft was born, but Miss Croft and Rosie have a lot in common. They liked to work with metals.

"When I was little, most girls had dolls," Miss Croft said. "I

had locks and hammers and tools."

Miss Croft, who was wearing coveralls, a cap and a few grease smudges on her face, is a 22-year-old welder and riveter, the only woman working alongside four men at Collier-ville Welding and Supply.

"I do body work, pack wheels, carpentry, a little bit of everything that needs to be done. We have an aluminum welder I'm learning to use. I can use just about any machine in the shop."

A farmer's daughter, Miss Croft said she was offered the welding job recently while she was having some work done on her trailer.

She said she used to help repair the machinery on her father's 500-acre farm. "I learned how to fix it up, tear it up and get it back in running order. I figured if I could do it free at home, I could get paid somewhere else."

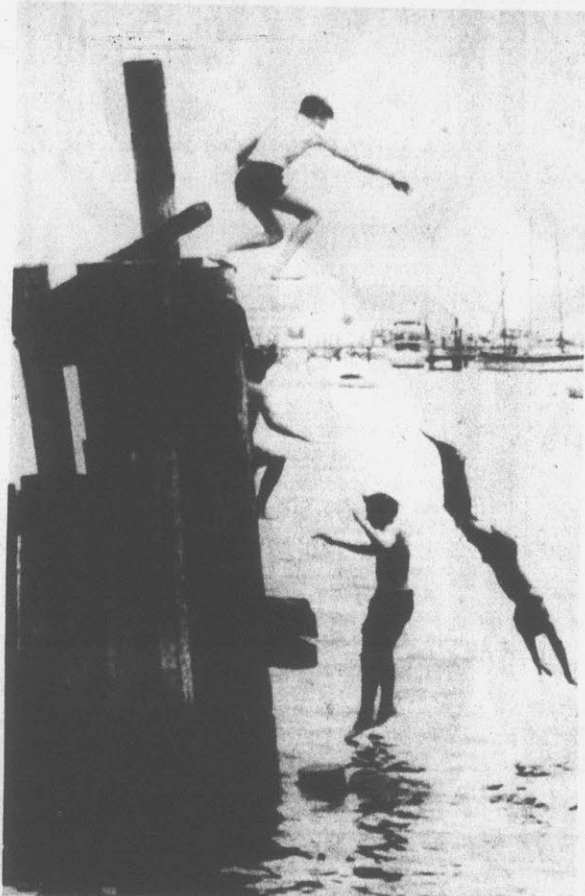
Welding takes patience and skill, she said.

"If you rush it, you'll spend all day trying to get it down to look slick. You have to measure, cut and angle it right. There's a fine hairline between two metals. The more space you leave between them, the harder it is to weld, to get the work stationary and do your welding."

Miss Croft said her mother isn't too pleased with her daughter's current vocation, but there may be something in welding's favor.

"Before I did this, I rode bulls in rodeos, so I guess this is an improvement," she said. She also used to tie goats in rodeos, but her mother wasn't in favor of that, either.

"She was dead set against me goat tying, but when she found out I was bull riding, she told me to go back to goat tying."

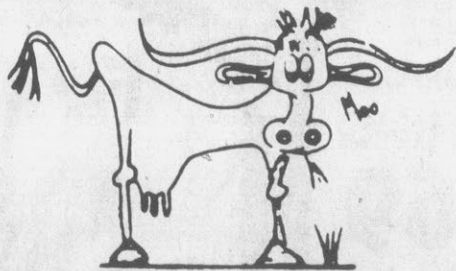

# McKim, Mead & White Was Prolific Partnership

NEW YORK (AP) - The oft-told tale about the odd-looking townhouse on East 77th Street is that architect Stanford White built it for his mistress, actress Evelyn Nesbit.

But a rental agent showing apartments in another townhouse also assures prospective tenants that White built THAT house for Miss Nesbit.

It is undoubtedly true that linking White's name to a residential building today enhances its romance, to say nothing of its value. But the truth is that White built neither.

White, the best-known member of the architectural firm of McKim, Mead & White, did have a notorious affair with Miss Nesbit, known as the girl on the red velvet swing. But he

never built her a townhouse. Perhaps he might have one day, but her husband, Harry Thaw, fatally shot White during one of her performances at the old Madison Square Garden, an edifice White certainly did build.

It was one hundred years ago, in 1879, that White joined Charles Follen McKim and William Rutherford Mead in a partnership that was to become one of the most prolific in American architectural history.

Their commissions dot the landscape from Maine to California, from Montreal to Texas. They designed the Rhode Island State Capitol, the Boston Public Library and renovations for the White House in 1902.

They laid out the town of Naugatuck, Conn., built the Walker Art Gallery at Bowdoin

College in Brunswick, Maine, the main office of the Bank of Montreal, the Boston Symphony Hall, and an exposition hall in San Francisco.

But the greatest treasury of their work is here in New York City where the firm was based. There are some 72 buildings still standing, none of which were designed for mistresses.

They include the recently saved Villard Houses on Madison Avenue, the octagon-shaped Low Library at Columbia University, the elegant Morgan Library and the massive General Post Office with its imposing entrance adorned by a row of twenty 53-foot-high columns.

They designed the arch in Washington Square and Judson Memorial Church on the opposite side of the square.

Such is the reputation of the

firm that a century after its founding the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission still gets calls from well-meaning citizens who believe they've found another MM&W.

"You'd be amazed," said commission spokeswoman Patricia Rich, "at how many calls and letters we still get saying, 'Designate this building, it's by McKim, Mead & White.'"

One reason the firm holds the imagination of Americans, particularly New Yorkers, is because the three founders were not just architects, says architectural historian Henry Hope Reed Jr. They were, he says, "men of distinction who cared about their city and their time."

McKim was a Pennsylvania native trained at Harvard and at L'Ecole Des Beaux Arts in Paris, where the classical tradition was reborn in the latter part of the 19th century.

Mead hailed from Brattleboro, Vt. The most level-headed and quietest of the three, Mead used to say he spent most of his time keeping his partners from "making damn fools of themselves."

That description most often fit White, the youngest and most flamboyant member of

the firm. The son of a New York literary critic, White had versatile talents that spun out designs for everything from buildings to necklaces, picture frames to magazine covers.

White was 26, Mead was 33 and McKim was 32 when their partnership was created. The architecture and lifestyle they gave America was one based on classical Rome. It was an architecture fitting for an America reveling in the culmination of Manifest Destiny and bursting with pride at the marvels its new unity was producing.

Their period was known as the American Renaissance. To celebrate, the country turned - as Europe had during its renaissance - to an older world to express its triumph.

"We were trying to imitate our betters," says critic Brendan Gill, who is working on a biography of White. "We were considered uncouth and were looking for a culture to imitate. So, we turned back."

And so the glory that was Rome became America's too.

McKim, Mead & White adorned their sturdy structures with classical columns, intricately delicate ornamentation, heavy decorative cornices, majestic entrances, dramatic flourishes and flights of artistic fancy that brought Italian pa-

lazzi to Fifth Avenue.

And the three envisioned cities as well-planned communities. Thus, the imposing entrance to the General Post Office was once more effective when it was balanced by Penn Station, considered to be McKim, Mead & White's masterpiece.

Before it was razed in 1963, the station's high archways,

massive columns and soaring ceiling greeted travelers for over 50 years.

Ironically, it was the destruction of Penn Station that aroused preservationists to save what was left. The wrecker's ball already had taken such other McKim, Mead & White works as the W.K. Vanderbilt Jr. mansion, the old Madison Square Garden and

the Herald Building.

With the newfound appreciation of the city's architectural heritage, it seems unlikely that such destruction will continue.

The firm built in a monumental manner, aiming "for eternity" as England's great architect Christopher Wren once said it should. There is a chance the firm may yet succeed.

## Builds Own Highway, Sees Long Road Ahead

WRIGHT, Minn. (AP) - Retired dairy farmer Gordon Bushnell has to travel along dirt washboard roads, avoiding potholes and sand pockets, to reach the "highway" he's single-handedly building to shorten the trip from Duluth to Fargo-Moorhead.

He's 5-foot-6 and weighs 125 pounds, but the 79-year-old Bushnell can pick up a 100-plus-pound log and sling it over his shoulder as if it were kindling.

Then he carries that log 70 yards and climbs a quivering, 4-foot-high pile of logs and brush, surefooted as a mountain goat despite muddy gashes.

"I'm doing it because I think it should be done," he declares. "I thought if I just got it open once and people started using it, they'd demand more work be done on it."

It has taken him 17 years to build about nine miles of road. He expects to finish it in 20 years, when he's 99.

He works on the highway

from 5 a.m. to noon using a wheelbarrow, a mason's hoe, a saw, a pitchfork and sometimes a shovel. So far it's a dirt track that few vehicles could get through.

Bushnell's highway would run between and roughly parallel to U.S. 2 and Highway 210, John Pawlak, engineer for the Duluth District of the Minnesota Department of Transportation, said the department studied Bushnell's proposal four or five years ago but concluded there would be no real economic advantage to that area in building it.

Bushnell moved to the Wright area, about 50 miles southwest of Duluth, in 1918. He bought 80 acres of land and cleared it by hand.

He started trying to get his highway built 40 years ago, as one of the founders of the Cross-State Highway Association. Many of the original members of the group now are dead.

Bushnell, who was wearing

red cotton gloves, jeans a checked shirt and plaid cap, lays the 55-foot tree trunks along the road bed, piling trimmed branches and smaller logs on top. Then he plasters the pile with dirt from the ditches he's dug on either side of road.

The whole thing settles into a ramp, resting atop cast-off culverts he's installed for drainage.

Observers may be skeptical, but Bushnell's work is a source of pride that keeps him healthy and busy.

"A few years back, I had this pain in my side. The doctor said I had to have my gall bladder out," he recalled.

"Well I said, 'nothin' doing.' If I had my gall bladder out I wouldn't be able to finish my road. Well, the more I dug, the better I felt. I work winter and summer.

"Sure, it keeps me young. I like to be doing something constructive. I couldn't quit now if I wanted to."

### Expect Capping

#### Of Oil Spill

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - A Mexican official helping monitor oil drifting from a runaway well off the Yucatan Peninsula says the flow has been cut by a third and the well should be capped by Sept. 16.

"The spill has been reduced from 30,000 barrels a day to 20,000 to 21,000 barrels a day," navy Capt. Jose H. Orozco of Mexico City said Monday.

"That's by direct methods - pumping in special mud (trying to clog the well). We are still working on two relief wells."

He said relief wells will take the pressure off the well, which blew out June 3, "and eventually stop the flow. Sept. 16 is the target date." Orozco joined the U.S. team Sunday as a liaison officer.

## Mall Opens Today

**AERIAL VIEW OF CAROLINA EAST** — The sprawling Carolina East Mall in Greenville with 64 stores holds its formal opening today (August 1) with entertainment and events for children.

The 130,000 square foot Belk-Tyler store is regarded as one of the mall's anchor units. Managerial officers of the mall forecast a substantial financial impact on Pitt County as well as Greenville, indicating that when all 64 stores in the present

enclosed mall are in operation approximately 368 people will be employed throughout the year with more during peak seasons. It is projected that 4.5 million people a year will visit the mall to shop, eat and brouse.



# Okay Annexation Proposals

The Joint City-County Planning and Zoning Commission voted last week to recommend to the City Council that a petition be approved for the annexation of some 46 acres on the southern fringe of the city limits.

The commission gave its unanimous endorsement of the petition by J. H. Blount Jr. and F. L. Blount III to have Section II of Pinewood Forest development annexed into the city.

The property, staff planner Skip Browder pointed out, is located south of Lynndale Subdivision and east of Section I of Pinewood Forest. The acreage involved in the petition is contiguous to the city limits.

Browder reported that an annexation study has been completed and the city staff found very few concerns or

objections regarding the property as a possible addition to the city land area.

Utilities have been installed, the planner said, and no problems were cited by the engineering or planning departments of the city.

Browder said that an area designated for recreational use in the development is needed and would involve some two acres or four lots. The Recreation Commission concurs in the need for the tract.

At full development, he noted that 77 single family homes are projected and the section would add an estimated \$3,650,000 to the city's tax base.

He added that the area meets all of the annexation criteria.

In other business on the joint agenda, commissioners

voted to defer action on the revised final plat of Section I of Oakgrove Estates, located on State Road 1417, until the Recreation Commission has been consulted on the possibility of purchasing two lots in the development for recreational use.

It was explained that initially it was proposed that two lots in the development be designated for possible recreational usage. Bobby Roberson, the city's director of planning, pointed out, however, that options on the two lots have expired.

Roberson recommended that the planning board approve the plat subject to the Recreation Commission deciding whether to purchase the lots.

Commissioner William Gibbs said that some five months ago the question of

recreational areas in Greenfield Terrace came up and plans then called for Greenfield Terrace residents to use the Oakgrove Estates recreational site.

Gibbs said that he would like for the Recreation Commission to give some indication as to whether it has interest in the designated lots before any action is taken on the final plat. Gibbs said the decision will have an impact on the Greenfield Terrace section.

Browder recalled that the Oakgrove land designated for possible recreational use was one of five areas set aside by the recreation board several years ago as sections in need of playground or park developments. Options have not been exercised on the designated parcels in Oakgrove, he said.

A spokesman for the developers of Oakgrove noted that other lots in the subdivision have been sold and the owner is interested in marketing the two remaining lots, whether they be to the Recreation Commission or another purchaser.

The Recreation Commission will be consulted regarding the Oakgrove property.

Joint board commissioners also endorsed the long range maintenance schedule of streets and thoroughfares, based on the Thoroughfare Plan, including three recommendations made by the Engineering Department. The long range plan will be considered by the Council.

Roberson said the maintenance schedule is a joint agreement that will be adopted by the city and the N.C. Department of

Transportation.

City Engineer Ron Sewell explained that the three areas recommended in the maintenance format include: the inclusion of 14th Street, from Dickinson Avenue out to the southern extension, on the state's maintenance schedule; the inclusion of the proposed Arlington Boulevard segment, from Memorial Drive out to the Highway 43 area, by the hospital, on the state schedule; and the assumption by the city for maintenance of Reade Street from Colaniche Street to First.

Commissioners also endorsed, with new member Bill Mitchum voting against, a proposal submitted by the Citizens Bikeway Committee for a bike loop around the city designed to connect the



# Looking For Involvement

The Pitt and Martin Involvement Councils are participating in a reimbursement grant program through the Governor's Office of Citizen Affairs to develop information and referral services for the counties. The amount of Pitt County's grant is \$3,570 and Martin County's is \$2,500.

recreational and cultural centers of the city.

The proposed 9.4 mile route would utilize existing corridors, including the bike path on Arlington Boulevard between Evans Street and Hooker Road, and would be designated by signs. Eventually, it is hoped that a system of links would be added to connect all parts of the city.

The Greenville planning board gave its approval to the preliminary and final plats of Section I of the J. F. Arthur property, located north of Arlington Boulevard between Evans Street and Seaboard Coast Line Railroad.

It was pointed out that the matter was tabled at the last meeting in order to study the Pitt Street situation and it was decided by the city staff that Pitt should be recommended for stoppage at Deck Street.

Attorney Fred Mattox, representing adjoining property owners, said that his clients opposed the proposal to stop Pitt Street at Deck and said that his clients believe good planning dictates that Pitt be extended on through.

Mattox said that if a public right-of-way is not provided, an area will exist with no north-south access. He asked why Arlington Boulevard should be four-laned and improved if traffic was not going to be routed to it.

Attorney Mickey Herrin, representing the Arthur developers, said that since the plat meets the checklist he feels said that since the plat met the checklist, he felt it should be approved.

Roberson said that the city feels Pitt should not be extended and he noted that Pitt is not seen as a major corridor for traffic on long range plans. He said that if it is extended, it would serve as a collector street and would be contrary to the Thoroughfare Plan.

Roberson added that the extension of Pitt to Arlington Boulevard would require signalization at the intersection and that would not be favorable. He said that the city felt the traffic volume should utilize Evans Street which is designated for four-laning.

Other business on the agenda included:

— Approval of the final plat of Patrick Blount property located between McClellan Street and Seaboard Coast Line Railroad and north of Deck Street.

— Tabling of action on the preliminary plat of Whichport Subdivision located on US 264 Bypass, adjacent to Nichols Shopping Center.

— Approval of the final plat of Section II of Whichport Subdivision on the bypass adjacent to Nichols.

— Approval of the final plat of Fairlane Farms, Block B, located on Hooker Road adjacent to Carolina Telephone

# Group Sues Pitt-Greene PCA

A group of 19 Pitt County residents have filed suit against Pitt-Greene Production Credit Association, seeking to recover more than \$84,000 from the Pitt-Greene Farmers Reserve Fund and \$500,000 in punitive damage.

In addition to the half-million dollars in punitive damages and the \$84,370 the group is seeking to recover from the reserve fund, the plaintiffs are asking to recover, "treble damages" for all damages awarded by the jury, an amount that possibly could exceed \$252,000.

The complaint was filed with the Clerk of Superior Court, June 26, by Milton C. Williamson and Mickey A. Herrin, attorneys for plaintiffs, who include Mr. and Mrs. Bobby E. Cannon, Mr. and Mrs. James Marion Cannon, Samuel Ira Cannon, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gaskins, Mr. and Mrs. Tony A. Hardee, Mr. and Mrs. Noah T. Hardee, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney M. Harrell, Mr. and

Mrs. Henry Rex Lewis, Mr. and Mrs. John Tripp, G. W. Hamill and Dorothy Hamill.

The complaint alleges that the plaintiffs have on deposit in the PCA's Farmers Reserve Fund more than \$84,000; that the plaintiffs have demanded that PCA deliver the money...plus interest to the "plaintiffs but PCA has refused to deliver said money...even though PCA has no right whatsoever to hold the plaintiffs' money;" and that PCA representatives, "made misleading and fraudulent statements... with the plaintiffs being told that they were putting

money in a type of savings account that could be used by each of the plaintiffs in the event the plaintiffs needed that money which was being placed in the fund to pay on loans obtained by the plaintiffs from PCA."

Alleging that the agreement under which the plaintiffs placed the money in the fund, "is invalid," the complaint charges that the, "PCA discriminated against each of the plaintiffs in requiring," them to sign an agreement and place money into the fund, "in that other citizens and residents of Pitt County borrowed money from PCA without

having to sign said agreement and without having to place money in the reserve fund."

The suit also charges that, "PCA failed and refused to comply with their terms of said contract in delivering money to those plaintiffs who complied with the terms of said 'Agreement' regarding a request of a refund of the money which they had in the fund," and that, "requiring the plaintiffs to sign said 'Agreement' and contribute to the 'fund' are beyond the bounds allowable by law to PCS and said acts were solely to allow PCA to make loans greater that would

have been necessary to the plaintiffs and to collect interest over and above that which would ordinarily have been due from the plaintiffs..."

Finally, the complaint charges that, "the actions of the defendant...constitutes an unfair method of competition and unfair or deceptive act or practice in the conduct of trade or commerce and are in violation and contradiction of North Carolina General Statutes..."

The amounts allegedly on deposit in the fund and being sought by the plaintiffs range from \$22,173 to \$4,021.94.

# Everything Clicked On County Tour

A tour of the Speight Seed Farm near Winterville kicked off the 21st annual event Monday night, with people in all facets of the tobacco industry gathering for a tour of the farm and a pig picking, as well as for "tobacco talk."

"The rain deterred some visits to various plots on the farm, but people seemed to have a good time," said Ambrose.

Tuesday morning, participants gathered at the Lynn Raymond Hardee farm near Simpson to view use of mechanization in tobacco farming, with viewers impressed by Hardee's production.

"Everything couldn't have been better," said Ambrose of the farm visit. "Different types of machinery were displayed, with two different types of bulk curing shown. I think the tour group was probably impressed."

A tour of Farmer's Tobacco Warehouse followed, with viewers able to view the hustle and bustle of opening day on the Eastern Market. Ambrose noted that some of the tour participants, some from as far away as Jamaica, Brazil and Venezuela, had never been in the market atmosphere before.

Following the warehouse tour, participants moved to the Oliver Smith farm in Lenoir County to study the use of different fumigants in the fields, then to the Horace Phillips farm in Jones County for a display of chemical use on control of Granville Wilt. After a lunch break at a Kinston restaurant, two more tours followed in Duplin and Cumberland Counties before "The Pride In Tobacco" dinner in Lumberton.

Tours on the Border Belt were scheduled for today, with a visit to the Border Belt Tobacco Research Station. Tonight, the Research On Wheels banquet will be held in Benson, with a special program on WRAL-TV and the Tobacco Radio Network.

The tour will wind up Thursday in Wake County at the Sidney Fish farm for another discussion on control of Granville Wilt.

Ambrose seemed pleased with the results of the tour in Pitt County and the participants' interest in the tobacco industry.

"Approximately 100 cars left Pitt County yesterday, all with the research tour," the agricultural agent noted. "We had really good participation."



# Farm Scene



Of all the dozens of vegetables in eastern North Carolina, the tomato is perhaps the most coveted of all summertime garden produce. For most people, the summer has not arrived until the first ripe tomato is picked and consumed. Gardeners really get anxious when it nears time for tomatoes to ripen.

Tomatoes can be grown in small spaces and still bear prolifically. A good tomato plant can yield as much as 50 pounds of tomatoes for a period of two to three months or longer. This is a distinct advantage for gardeners with limited space. There are numerous varieties of tomatoes on the market that are bred specifically for small gardens or even hanging baskets.

Tomato growers are faced with perplexing problems in some years. Many of these problems are caused by largely unknown factors, but some are due to well-known causes. Many tomato problems are insect and disease related, but there are several problems that are caused by physiological or environmental problems.

The most common complaint from home gardeners concerns blossom-end rot, or the sunken, rotted lesion on the blossom end of the fruit. This condition is brought on by a combination of factors. Fluctuating soil moisture, lack of available calcium and heavy suckering all tend to promote end rot. When plants are growing rapidly with adequate soil moisture, and then are subjected to 90 degree and higher temperatures with drought conditions, there is a good chance of the leathery blossom end rot appearing. Adequate moisture and properly limed soils will supply the necessary moisture and calcium. It is not necessary to

remove all the suckers (new stems and leaves that arise from the junction of the leaves and main stem.) The widespread practice of pinching out all suckers may accomplish very little except make blossom-end rot worse. It may also make the fruit more likely to sunscald and have a shorter life span.

Another problem with tomatoes is fruit cracking. Cracks in the fruit are caused by rapid growth. Periods of drought followed by hot wet weather are likely to spur growth and cause fruit to crack.

Cool and cloudy weather causes several tomato problems. Abnormal pollination, mishappen fruit, "cat-facing" and poor blossom set are all related to cool temperatures. Abnormal pollination can cause lopsided fruits, hollow fruits and elongated fruits. Mishappen fruit is often caused by the blossom sticking to the young tomato fruit, resulting in puckering and scarring. The cavities produced may go all the way to the center of the fruit.

Tomatoes often drop their blossoms and the net result is lowered yields of fruit. The cause of blossom rot is closely related to night temperatures. Most varieties of tomatoes will set fruit only in a narrow range of night temperatures. For the most part, night temperatures should be between 55 and 75 degrees. Temperatures below or above this range inhibit fruit set, or rather cause the blossoms to drop. The end result is often a lush vine with no tomatoes. This condition is frequently blamed on too much nitrogen fertilizer, when it is an environmental condition that is to blame.

Tomatoes are easy for some gardeners to grow and impossible for others.

# Medication Could Also Be Harmful

Many medications in common use — both prescription and over-the-counter — can cause temporary or even permanent damage to the eyes.

Improper dosage and ignoring of warning labels can cause problems, reports the American Association of Ophthalmology.

Cold remedies which abound and drug stores and shopping centers contain belladonna derivatives, which act like atropine, a potent nerve-blocker chemical, and may cause acute glaucoma in some susceptible individuals, warns Kenneth R. Fox, M. D. of Falls Church, Va.

Non-prescription sedatives and sleeping pills can cause temporary slowing of nerve conduction, including the nerves around the eye, often causing the double vision which can be extremely dangerous while driving.

While double vision from overindulgence in alcohol or marijuana has been experienced by many, alcohol also may seriously damage the optic nerve which carries visual impulses from the retina in the back of the eye to the brain.

"Although the cannabis in marijuana is currently being used experimentally as a new treatment for certain types of glaucoma, other effects on the eyes from this drug are unknown."

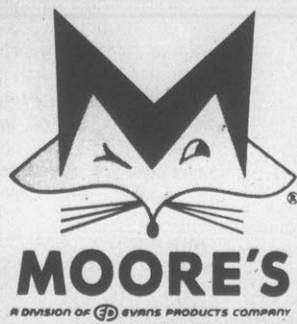
"The pill," popularly used for birth control, can cause occasional serious damage to the blood vessels in the retina of the eye in susceptible women, as well as possible damage to other blood vessels, Dr. Fox said. Also, some users of "the pill" find that their eyes are extremely sensitive to contact lenses. Such patients should check with an ophthalmologist.

Vitamin A, necessary for the health of both the cornea and the retina of the eye, can cause an inflammation of the optic nerve and severe loss of vision, if taken in massive quantities. Vitamin D, if taken in large doses, can cause an accumulation of calcified plaque in the cornea, called "bank keratopathy."

# Solar Energy Applied To Pig-Raising Facility

**GARDNERSVILLE** — With the rising costs of energy, Don and Ann Wilcox decided to harness the sun's energy for heating purposes. However, the heating's not for their house, it's for their self-contained feeder pig production facility, located outside of Gardnersville on State Road 1725.

The solar heating will be used primarily in the farrowing and nursery areas, where warm temperatures are needed the most. Their new operation, dubbed the "Pig Palace" by Nutrena Feeds, is housing 42 sows, with hopefully 8.8 pigs to

be marketed per litter. Wednesday, Nutrena Feeds, a division of Cargill Company, Slade and Harrell Feed of New Bern, and Jensen Solar Inc. of Goldsboro hosted a dinner and demonstration tour of the Wilcox operation. Approximately 50 persons, many of them hog producers, came to a local restaurant to hear about the benefits of solar heating used in an agricultural environment.

Jack Jensen, the eastern North Carolina representative for Nutrena Feeds, explained to the producers that the company

was interested in promoting the new concept as part of keeping in the forefront of new developments in the swine industry. Slade and Harrell officials also wanted to give the producers a chance to talk with the Wilcoxes and see the operation.

Jack Jensen of Jensen Solar Inc. noted that Wilcox had approached him concerning the use of solar heating in his new feeder pig building. According to Jensen, the solar system will supply approximately two-thirds of the building's heating needs, and reduce the need for conventional gas heating.

"This is the first time our company has worked with an agricultural energy problem," said Jensen. "We have installed solar units in residential homes, but nothing like this before."

"Energy is expensive and it's going to get more so," continued Jensen. "Solar isn't the answer to every energy problem, but it doesn't pollute, and it doesn't get more expensive."

Jensen noted that there are several different methods of hog production, and asked interested hog producers to work with him on an individual solar heating system.

"Let us help you define your problem," he noted. "Don't try to copy a system. It has to be engineered to individual needs."

"Some folks say that solar power is the energy of the future," Jensen continued. "Well, that's not so. The energy is here right now."

According to Jensen, the Wilcox's production building has 51 solar panels angled at 90 degrees on the roof top, providing 1,100 square feet of collection area. Heat collected from the sun warms the liquid in the 2,000 gallon storage tank. A backup gas heating system maintains the constant temperature in the storage tank.

Jensen explained that the panels were angled toward providing the best heat during the winter months, catching the longer rays.

## Energy Technology Program Planned

Pitt Community College will begin a new, two-year Energy Technology training program in September, fall quarter. The associate degree program has been developed over a two year period through research and development in conjunction with the N.C. Department of Community Colleges and the Energy Division of the N.C. Department of Commerce.

The purpose of the new program is to provide trained personnel who are capable of assisting business, industry, governmental agencies, utilities and homeowners in coping with the energy problems and crisis. Program emphasis is upon energy management and conservation with additional experiences provided in solar energy and other alternate energy sources.

Employment prospects for energy technology graduates are bright and appear to be increasing daily. One national survey conducted at Baylor University stated that there would be more than 7,000 energy related jobs to be filled in the United States during the next ten years, and that over half of these would require trained energy technologists.

Statewide energy manpower research conducted by Pitt Community College has already identified more than 630 current energy jobs in North Carolina and established a projected need for energy technologists at 650 by 1990.

Graduates of the program will be able to perform numerous tasks including: conducting energy audits, assisting in the designing of more energy efficient structures, monitoring facilities and operations for energy efficiency, operating and servicing energy management systems and conducting energy/benefit analyses.

## Deadline For Veterans On Pension Plan

**WINSTON-SALEM** — Veterans Administration Regional Director Kenneth E. McDonald reminds veterans who are eligible for the improved pension plan that October 1, 1979 is the deadline for qualification of retroactive benefits.

The improved plan offers substantially higher pension rates than the old program, but changes in some income counted under the new plan may make it advisable for certain veterans to remain under their current plan.

In establishing the improved plan, Congress stipulated that veterans may switch before Oct. 1 if they wish the higher rates it provides to take effect retroactively to Jan. 1, 1979.

Detailed explanations were given on "tuning," whereby the optimum heat is gained coming out of the storage tanks. Three valves and a thermometer regulate the flow, obtaining a heat of around 130-150 degrees Fahrenheit for maximum BTU's.

Jensen quoted a base figure of approximately \$14,000 for installation of a solar unit, but cautioned pork producers that each unit would differ, depending methods of operation.

After the talk, producers proceeded in a caravan fashion to the Wilcox farm to see the new building and to hear more about the solar unit. As Don Wilcox walked through the building, he explained how he had decided on using solar heating:

"I just decided by myself that the idea would be a good one," he said. "I looked in the telephone directory for solar installers. It's got to work as long as the sun shines."

For the Wilcoxes, who've moved around the United States for approximately 15 years in the pork production business, the solar collectors will help keep down the costs of overhead and provide warmth for the first litter of pigs to born in the new facility, sometime in the middle of August.

# HRD Class Will Begin On Aug. 9

The next class in Human Resources Development (HRD) at Pitt Community College will begin Thursday, August 9. According to Charles Dickens, HRD coordinator at the College, 21 students will be selected to participate in the class.

The primary objective of the HRD program is to help citizens of the Greenville - Pitt County area who are unemployed, underemployed, and/or recipients of public assistance become gainfully employed tax-paying individuals. Another objective is to develop within the individuals a more positive self-image of themselves. The program also strives to place graduates in wage-earning capacities.

The program consists of two curriculum components, academic and orientation/motivation. The academic consists of studies in English, social studies, science literature and mathematics, with students able to take the General Educational Development test.

The orientation/motivation component deals with training the graduates how to cope with the working world.

The program is state-funded sponsored through the community college system of the State Board of Education. Local and federal funds are utilized only when necessary. The Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA) allocated funds from HEW through the state Employment Security Commission allows some students to be awarded stipends based on economic need.

Enrollees receiving AFDC and/or other forms of public assistance are ordinarily eligible to receive a stipend, daily travel reimbursement plus a small dependents' allowance. Enrollees not receiving public assistance may also qualify for stipends based on need. Each case is personally reviewed and decided on its own merit by the HRD program coordinator or staff appointee.
