LETTERS not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. within 3,000 miles, 3 cents, *pre-paid*, in all cases; over 3,000 miles, 10 cents.—If conveyed wholly or partly by sea, and to and from a foreign country, 10 cents within and 20 cents over 2,500 miles, unless otherwise fixed by treaty, &c. Every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. or fraction carries an additional postage. Letters dropped for delivery at the same post-office, 1 cent. Advertised letters, 1 cent and postage. Penny-post delivery to and from post-office, 1 or 2 cents.

VALUABLE LETTERS will be registered on the application of the person posting the same, and the payment of a registration fee of *five cents*.

NEWSPAPERS, PERIODICALS, unsealed CIRCULARS, or other articles of printed matter, (except books,) when sent to any part of the United States, and weighing not over 3 oz., 1 cent; and for every additional oz. or part thereof, 1 cent. If within the State, and not weighing over $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ cent.

BOOKS, bound or unbound, not weighing over 4 lbs., for any distance under 3,000 miles, 1 cent per oz.; over that distance, 2 cents per oz.

The above must be all prepaid; if not, double these rates.

Penalty for Usury.

Alabama, Florida, Missouri, Rhode Island, forfeit interest and usury. Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, N. York, N. Jersey, Pennsylvania, forfeit entire debt. Arkansas forfeits usury. Georgia, Iowa, Mass., N. Hampshire, forfeit three times usury. Indiana, N. Carolina, Virginia, forfeit double usury. Tenn., Texas, D. C., Ohio, Louisiana, Maryland, contract void. Kentucky, Miss., forfeit usury and costs. Michigan forfeits usury and quarter the debt. Illinois forfeits three times usury and interest due.

FEB.

TUESDAY 24

1863

A fine morning again once more, and we are off to the woods again for trees. This afternoon we do not drill but have orders to fix up our equipments & things for review tomorrow.

WEDNESDAY 25

This review came off this morning. Our Regimental line was formed at 9 o'clock and marched to our position 2 batt^{ns} in the first brigade. - There were about 1500 infantry, 28 pieces of cannon 600 Cavalry. It made rather a fine show.

THURSDAY 26

This morning it rains again and we have no drill. - The mail has just come in but I got no letter. - This afternoon I have written to Emma and J. Grace & Page

FEB.

FRIDAY 27

1863

This morning we have had a skirmish drill. — and this afternoon it has rained and spoiled the fun of our having a brigade drill.

Dull and rainy SATURDAY 28 day. And we have to go through general inspection and muster for pay but — they only inspected one Co. at a time in the Chapel tent so we got along nicely and did not get wet.

MARCH

SUNDAY 1

1863

Dull again this morning and we don't have inspection. The mail came into Camp this noon I had a letter from Emily. —

MONDAY 2

1863

To day about noon we "fell in" to go up to head quarters to raise the flag on our splended "Tiger" flag staff. - But before we got out of our street we got orders to be ready to march at an hours notice, so we broke ranks.

FRIDAY 6

This morning seven regts of infantry one of Cavalry and two batteries of artillery passed our camp ground on the road to Trenton, but their destination is unknown. They were mostly Pa. and New York troops. - Last night I sprained my ankle slightly and it is rather painful.

SATURDAY 7

At ten o'clock this morning we fell in for a second attempt to raise the flag and succeeded in doing it after running up the pole the second time. It is a splended flag, the largest one around New born.

MARCH

SUNDAY 8

1863

I attended church this morning at the chapel tent Mr Manning talked to us very good. - This afternoon I have written to Emily. -

MONDAY 9

It was dull and cloudy this morning. we had a skirmish drill in the forenoon. in the afternoon had a brigade drill. This evening I "fired" Stone, at a game of "Cribb".

TUESDAY 10

This morning we attempted to drill but were driven in by a severe rain storm. The Cavalry that went with the expedition passed the camp this morning. The infantry got in about dark. They had been most at Pickensville -

up the trent road, then came the order right about; march and we put back to camp, - We staid in camp until 3.30 P.M. when orders came to take one days rations. and march up the trent road and receive the 25th of picket duty we saw no "rebs" only their camp fire, -

Sunday morning we were received by the 46th, but instead of returning to camp we laid round until 4 o'clock when we pushed forward above "deep gully", and encamped. This morning we pushed on 5 miles further but finding the rebs had blocked up the road, we returned to camp Rogers

MONDAY 16

MARCH

We arrived in Camp last night - at 5 O'clock. My joints were stiff and feet were awful sore for I got into water up to my Cartridgebox. but did not wet any Cartridges. It has been very pleasant to day, have not drilled any. —

This morning we had a drill in the manual. — this afternoon a short Brigade drill under Col. Codman. — Wrote a letter to Emily this evening.

THURSDAY 19

Our guard to day, is wet, cold and dreary, but there is no help for it - I am in for 24 hours guard duty and there is no crawling out of it. Mail came in to day but I did not have a letter.

It is cold and windy again to day and it rains very fast. I finished my guard duty this morning at 9 O'clock, my clothes were pretty well soaked. — have written to J. Rice to day. The mail closes for the north to night at 7 O'clock.

SATURDAY 21

It still continues to rain, and runs right through the tent, but as long as I can keep my head out of water I can sleep. I played Stone & games of cribb, beat him twice. —

SUNDAY 22

It does not rain this morning, nor does the sun shine. — I have written to J. P. Frye. — This afternoon the sun came out and at 5 O'clock we had dress parade the first one since last Wednesday.

MARCH

MONDAY 23

1863

It is warm and pleasant to-day
we struck tents and dried our
nests. - I had a fine bath in
the sparkling waters of the
Trent. - This afternoon we
had a short battalion drill
under Lieut. C. Whiton

TUESDAY 24

This morning we had a nice Co.
drill under Sergt. Webster. This
afternoon had a brigade drill
all to ourselves. Co. Holbrook
commanding. - This evening
Stone and I beat Alf. and
Kate at Whist. and Euchre. -

WEDNESDAY 25

The mail came in this morning. I
got a letter from P. Rice.
This evening Stone and I played
Cribb with J. Mellen & Elwood.
They beat us the rubber.

MARCH

THURSDAY 26

1863

This afternoon Capt. Whytal took leave of his family and returned to Mass. on a brief furlough. We had a brigade drill under Col. Amory. Lieut. Sumner being crippled. Lieut. Baird took command of Co. D.

FRIDAY 27

This morning has been devoted to taking Photographs of the Regt and Camp. They took 3 different styles first we were at co. distance on the parade ground. 2^d a hollow square 3^d in line at parade rest. We then had one of Co. D separate.

SATURDAY 28

This morning several of us run guard & went to see Capt. Smith catch Herding with a big net. He caught 86 at one lick. - & We then went picking flowers. Strawberries blackberries and blueberries are in bloom. Peach trees have begun to flower.

MARCH

SUNDAY 29

1863

It is warm this morning, but cloudy and looks like rain, we go out however to inspection and get a ducking before we get through with it. — I have written to J. R. F. this afternoon, — have had the toothache all day

MONDAY 30

We have had company drill this morning, this afternoon we have not drilled but got ready for monthly inspection tomorrow. This evening it commenced raining and rained quite fast.

TUESDAY 31

Dull and cloudy this morning did not have inspection until afternoon. They inspected the right wing at 2 and the left wing at 3 P.M. also parade at 5 o'clock

APRIL

WEDNESDAY 1

1863

On guard today is cold and
windy. We have heard heavy
firing at intervals all day in
the direction of Little Washing-
ton. We with all the other Regts are
under orders to march at an hours
notice with 2 days rations. —

THURSDAY 2

We encountered no trouble from
the Rebs yesterday although the
firing continued until after sun-
set, today all is quiet. A mail
came in this morning I got a
letter from Walter. Another mail
came in at 9 P.M. Ell got a letter
from Em, —

FRIDAY 3

The firing commenced again early
this morning and continued
about 3 hours. — It is very
cold and windy the dust flies
across the parade ground so
thick that we could cut it with a knife.

APRIL

SATURDAY 4

1863

The cannonading has been going on all day. The gunboat Shawmut went up this morning with a 132 pound gun on board. I have written to father and Walter to day. The mail left for the North at 12 M.

SUNDAY 5

This morning we had inspection although we are under marching orders, and dress parade at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

MONDAY 6

To day we had a sort of Brigade review, by Col. Anson. The 17th and 43^d were the only ones that turned out. When the parade was over we were ordered to make ourselves as comfortable as we could until dress parade.

APRIL

TUESDAY 7

1863

Struck tents this morning, and this afternoon had battalion drill. To night we had just gone to bed and put out the lights, when the voice of the Lieut. aroused us with "fall in lively boys" orders to march, with 3 days rations, -

WEDNESDAY 8

Last night we traveled to Newbern and were conveyed across the river in transports, and camped for the rest of the night near Fort Anderson. All night they kept bringing troops across the river and until noon the day, about 2 o'clock having a force of about ten thousand

THURSDAY 9

and the column was put in motion the 17th in advance, we marched about 15 miles and encamped near Swifts Creek. This morning we started at 6 on the road to Blunt's creek at 3 we arrived opposite the Rebel

APRIL

FRIDAY 10

1863

battery; a brisk cannonade took place and our boys burst the Rebel's biggest gun. Capt. Belger was wounded by a shell about 4 o'clock and commenced retreating and marched till 10 before we camped. I never was so tired in my life. We had marched 30 miles since morning. Spinola was in command of the expedition.

SATURDAY 11

Yesterday morning about 7 o'clock we started for Newbern and arrived at camp Rogers about 4 P.M. The 17th had about 10 men wounded, several of the artillery, and 1 cavalry boy were wounded, none killed. We slept one night in camp. This afternoon we had orders

SUNDAY 12

to start again with 3 days rations for Washington. This morning finds us in Pamlico river on steamer. Thos. Colyer. At noon we arrive near the rebel batteries (which are on both sides of the river) and anchored, pretty soon one of the gunboats

APRIL

MONDAY 13

1863

commenced shelling the woods, the rebels were trying to get some cannon to bear on the transports, but the gunboats "couldn't see it in that light". Last night they tried to run the blockade with rations but it was too foggy. This morning we fell back below Mott's Pt. at once two gunboats are shelling again up Blunt's Creek Bay. **TUESDAY 14** We are now on board the steamer Phoenix. (Cos. A and D) came on board Sunday afternoon. Last night the steamer Escort with the 5th Rhode Island on board ran the blockade she towed two Schooners loaded with provisions, and arrived safe at Washington although the batteries played on her right smart. Today we have been put on board a schooner, and those on the Thor Collier put on two others 4 for each, and **WEDNESDAY 15** both Steamers returned to Newbern. This morning the Escort came back past the batteries in daylight, with Genl. Foster on board. She took 7 Cos. of the 43rd and went to Newbern leaving C. D. & H. to act as sharpshooters in case the Schooners ran the blockade.

APRIL

THURSDAY 16

1863

We were put on board another Schooner yesterday with Co. C. making 5 different Crafts we have been on since we started on the 10th. It is pleasant today, but yesterday it rained all day, and I was on guard, stood 7 hours in the night on the schooner, but saw nothing.

FRIDAY 17

A fine morning this, about noon a gun boat came down and towed the schooners up to Hills Point, we landed and found 3 Cos of the 44th already in possession of the rebel stronghold, which they must have left by fear of an attack in the rear. For the gunboats could never have shelled them out as they stayed in their holes.

SATURDAY 18

Hot as mustard! This morning the 7 Cos. of the 43rd came back from Newbern on the Escort and went to Washington. This afternoon they have been blowing up the rebel casemates & magazines, it made tremendous reports,

APRIL

SUNDAY 19

1863

About 8:30 this morning Genl. Beckman rode into our camp, a little later and in came Genl. Foster. he had but a small force with him, having sent some to Winston, and another force to Swifts creek. He came through the rebel battery at Blunt's creek, the rebels had evacuated it.

MONDAY 20

Very warm this morning, had a bath in the Pamlico River. The Escort returned to Newbern with the 9th N. P. on board. This afternoon the 23d embarked on the Phoenix for Newbern I believe! To night I am on guard at headquarters for 3 hours only! Bully for me!

TUESDAY 21

This morning is as cold as Greenland. have been scouting through the woods all the afternoon, found the rebel fort on Blunt's Cr. Bay, they meant it for a strong place but our shells made it too warm for them. They left shovels, canisters, clippers, &c behind them.

APRIL

WEDNESDAY 22

1863

I am about sick to day have got an awful cold. The Steamers Escoria & Thos. Collier came up yesterday & returned to Newbern to day the latter with the 44th on board leaving only 3 Co's to Garrison Hills Point. We have orders not to leave camp as they don't know what minute we shall leave.

THURSDAY 23

It has been cloudy all day. I feel miserable too have got the Blues. This evening we had a splendid shower, the wind blew all most a gale and the hail flew thick and fast. about 10 P.M. orders came to be ready to start for Camp in the morning.

FRIDAY 24

At 1 o'clock P.M. we found ourselves on board the Steamer Long Island with the rest of our regt. Steaming for Newbern. Met with no trouble on the way and arrived at the wharf about midnight. landed and marched to Camp Rogers. —

APRIL

SATURDAY 25

1863

We got into camp this morning at 2 o'clock. roused out the cooks and got some coffee. then went to bed and got a short nap. To day we have been giving the sister fitt. I felt better as soon as I got something fit to eat. Now we are waiting for Green backs.

SUNDAY 26

I found a letter in camp yesterday from J. R. Ford from C. S. received another last night from C. S. Our guard to stay is very pleasant. Orders came into camp to night at 10. To be ready to march at daylight to morrow morning with 3 days rations. was it we meat.

MONDAY 27

We had not get started until about 9 this morning. Marched to Newbern and took the Cars Gavent to Bachelders Creek. halted there 4 hours. got on board another train and went most to Core Creek, and encamped for the night.

APRIL

TUESDAY 28

1863

This morning at 7 Co. I went out on a scout. we traveled about 6 miles but saw norebs, found some pretty girls, & some horses. The 17th and 45th started about noon went up the railroad 8 miles found some rebs and had a skirmish.

WEDNESDAY 29

We have layed around camp all day. The 45th lost one man yesterday and several wounded, the 17th caught one guerrilla today. This evening we had a right smart thunder shower, it has rained every night since we left Camp R.

THURSDAY 30

This morning the 45th started up the R. R. marched about 3 miles and posted some pickets and encamped, shortly after we stacked arms the mail came in. I got a letter from home, about 6 it was reported that a Co. of rebs in the woods Co. D was after them in hot haste, but—

MAY

FRIDAY 1

1863

We had a good night's sleep, and this morning I got a nice lot of checkerberries about 10 o'clock orders came to pack our traps. we did so, and were soon past Core Creek and along side of the cars. we arrived at Camp Rogers about half past 4. —

SATURDAY 2

This morning we devoted to cleaning guns &c. This afternoon we felled in for "green Backs" Pgd. 39.00 and a letter from the sutler. some of the boys did not get a cent.

We did not have dress parade to night I think something must be the matter. —

SUNDAY 3

It is awful hot to day. We had Co. inspection this morning of arms & equipments. This afternoon I have written to Emily, and commenced one to C. S. we had dress parade at 6 o'clock. —

MAY

MONDAY 4

1863

It is very hot again to-day, we have not done anything but loaf around camp, Capt. Whypail gave out straw mats to the whole company this evening, I bought a can of preserved Dinner to-day and expect to make myself sick with it. Saw Co. of the 5th reg^t returned to night.

TUESDAY 5

Hot as ever to-day, we are having monthly inspection and must for pay. The Col. inspected us by companies in the streets.

C.D.

WEDNESDAY 6

This morning ~~at~~ at 11 o'clock we had a company drill, under Capt. Whypail, to night after dress parade we drilled half an hour under Lieut. Webster.

MAY

THURSDAY 7

1863

It's cool and quite comfortable
this morning. We had a company
drilled half past nine under Lieut.
Sumner. The niggers bring
pies and gingerbread into camp
now in great abundance, -

FRIDAY 8

Have not drilled any to day. -

Mellen and Sam. Cobb. Rascoe
gone to Howbern City.

Had dress parade to night
Capt. Soule acting Col.
The 43rd relieved the 17th of picket duty
to day, across the Trent river. -

SATURDAY 9

It's a pretty comfortable morning
this. Have not drilled any
but stuck tents. It is a dagg
life. Its lying around camp,
unpassing off slowly, but we
have only a month more of it

MAY

SUNDAY, 10

1868

Went over again to day,
had inspection at 9.30 this morning
all who wished, could attend
Church at Namburn to day, but
it was too hot for me to tramp
up there. Have written to
Annah M. W. this afternoon

MONDAY 11

New orders of the day were read at
dress parade last night; Reveille at
5. battalion drill at 7.30, guard
mounting at 9. A.M. Co drill at 6.
Taps at 10. P.M. Have been to the
old battle field to day, it was a
strong position & I don't see how
we drove them out of it so easy.

TUESDAY 12

Am picked to day, three Chaplains
is one! It is good fun, but slow
all the time. The mail
came in this morning, got a
letter from Emily. Channing
Whitton is grand officer of
the day.

MAY

WEDNESDAY 13

1868

Came off picked this morning
got into camp at 10 o'clock
I had a good bath in the Trent
river, and washed my clothes.
Co. D had battalion drill
this evening, "Maj Whiffel, Capt.
ains Taft, and Webster, -

THURSDAY 14

We have battalion drill every
morning at 7:30. The guard that
is to go on have to drill too,
call that rather rough. -
The air is very close and
sultry this evening. -

FRIDAY 15

This morning the cool and
windy, went into the woods
after some Cedar boughs to
lay on, picked lots of straw
berries, and a few blackberries
It is rumored in camp that
Genl. Hooker ^{is} in Richmond

MAY

SATURDAY 16

1863

It is cloudy and quite comfortable to-day. This afternoon we had brigade review by genl. Palmer. The 4th S^g took the right of the line, and the 4th S^g band had to come and play for us.

SUNDAY 17

Inspection this morning at 9.30. did not go to Church to-day. This afternoon have written to Emily. This evening have had the toothache.

MONDAY 18

Battalion drill this morning under Maj. Lane, practised street firing. This afternoon the mail came in. Elwood got a letter from Emma, and I got a Journal of the 9th.

MAY

TUESDAY 19

1863

After drill this morning I went blackberrying, got the dipper full, put some sugar with them and they tasted very nice. We had no Co. drill to night on account of a big Masonic meeting.

WEDNESDAY 20

On guard to day. Three Chaplains, 'tis very hot, Col. Wharton is Lieut. Officer of the day, but he keeps himself rather quiet.

The Cos. draw 11 days rations to day. There is no sugar in the Department.

THURSDAY 21

Came off guard this morning at half past nine.

This evening we had a short drill under Sergt. Webster. He got right mad, because we did not drill good.

MAY

FRIDAY 22

1868

Battalion drill this morning -
then I went blackberrying & got
two quarts, and I'll send them
all by to morrow morning.

We expected to have inspection
to day at 5 P.M. but did not
D

SATURDAY 23

Hot as mustard to day, -
have been blackberrying again
got big two quarts. I
Capt. Whiston gave every man
a pair of white gloves to night -
bought with the "Company
fund," 186.

SUNDAY 24

Had inspection this morning
with white gloves. This
afternoon have written to
father, a lot of the boys
went out after berries. To
night a Col. Whiston had them
arrested, -

MAY

MONDAY 25

1863

Hot this morning, but came
up cooler in the afternoon.
The mail came in to day. I
got a letter from Com. Went
blackberrying this afternoon
got a quart. Battalion I had a
good drill to night.

TUESDAY 26

On picket to day. It is
rather cool and looks like rain.
This picket duty is awful.
I am posted on a fort, and lay
down and read all the time.
Col. Codman is Genl. Officer
of the day.

WEDNESDAY 27

Came off picket in due season
this morning. This afternoon have
been blackberrying got three
quarts. Genl. Foster came to
see us to day. He wants a lot of
us to enlist in a regt of heavy
artillery, under Major Frankle.

MAY

THURSDAY 28

1863

Cloudy to day and looks like rain, but I guess it won't make out any thing.

All quiet on the Trent,

FRIDAY 29

This morning after drill. Cleaved and I went to the City saw Frank B. He is sick but is getting better. I got his picture taken. Went to Fort Totten. Had a pretty good time.

SATURDAY 30

Battalion drill this morning. To morrow is monthly inspection. Consequently we have got to clean our guns and traps to day. No drill to night.

MAY

SUNDAY 31

1863

The line was formed this morning for inspection at 6.30, and we got through about 10.30. — This afternoon have written to J. Rice and to Cnd, got a letter from J. Rice last night. 2

JUNE

MONDAY 1

1863

To day we have been cleaning out our tent, and got some new fine needles. — It is awful hot, so hot that we hate to keep still, neither do we like to move. —

TUESDAY 2

Main guard to day, Corp. Guild, three Draplights & Sheridan. It is quite comfortable, being cloudy takes the intense heat from the sun.

JUNE

WEDNESDAY 3

1863

Came off guard this morning
at half past nine. Then
had a fine bath in the
Grent. This afternoon
it rained a little so
that we did not have
dress parade nor drill.

THURSDAY 4

This morning I went
Blackberrying got two
grasts. This noon Capt
Whitall came from
Newbern with the good news
that we should start for
home on or before the 16th inst.

FRIDAY 5

We all feel pretty well
to day at the prospect
of going home so soon,
and I hope we shall
have nothing to mar our
prospects.

JUNE

SATURDAY 6

1863

This morning we had a brigade drill under Col. Holbrook, now commanding the first brigade, it was made short by a sudden shower, but it did not rain fast: -

SUNDAY 7

This morning we had inspection as we thought the last one for this place, but bad luck to Gove, Andrew and old Schouler, they say we must not come home until the 20th of July.

MONDAY 8

Battalion drill this morning, after which, Capt. Whistal talked to co. D. He said it was no use to think of the 20th of June any longer, for G. Andrew had countermanded that order and he was to blame for it all. He felt as bad as any of us.

JUNE

TUESDAY 9

1863

Picket guard this morning. Left
Guller, and three Chaplains
we got the outer post. Had a
gay time. No officer of the day
came near us, but oh! the
mosquitoes. They all most
chained us, -

WEDNESDAY 10

This morning about daylight
Lieut. Thompson brought us
news that there was an order
in camp for three Cos. to apply
for transportation to Mass. for
we have a right to be muste-
red out by Companies, or individ-
ually if we demand it. -

THURSDAY 11

Had battalion drill this
morning, this afternoon it
has been showery and hot.
No dress parade or Cos drill
and no news as to where
we are to leave here.

JUNE

FRIDAY 12

1863

Cot. Hobbrook is in camp. To day, at noon he called the regt. together on the parade ground, and made a short speech. said we should probably be on board transports the 1st of July, and there was no use to think of going home by Col. "he got away a cheer"

SATURDAY 13

On guard again to day. so many are detailed on the fort that we have to go on often. It rained all last night, and this morning until noon. The Lieut. Col. of the 46th is officer of the day. he said the guard looked uncommonly well.

SUNDAY 14

I slept this morning beside the "old log shanty" until 6.30 when Miller woke me up. We have Roll calls a day now, and it is fun to witness our dress parades & see the handsomest.

JUNE

MONDAY 15

1863

We had a sweet battallion
drill this morning under Major
Lane. At night at dress
parade we had orders to ^{not} have
battallion or co. drill until
further notice.

TUESDAY 16

No drilling to day, and
its awfully hot. I've
sweat terribly lying
still. Co. R's line is put
to day so we have no more
gunnys, but that don't
bring us any nearer home.

WEDNESDAY 17

On Picket to day. I have post
No. 3 on the bridge, and when
I'm relieved go a few steps to
the sutters, and get some beer.
The mail came in to day. We
got 2 letters Elwood & and I got no

JUNE

THURSDAY 18

1863

It is awful hot to day. We expected
to swap guns with the 17th to day
but have not yet. Some
ordnance officers have been
at the quartermasters all day.

FRIDAY 19

I have been sitting by the
furnt to day, repairing with
the seat (a stick of wood)
got tired, then I went and
got some lager beer at the
shutters.

SATURDAY 20

To day we have been
swapping guns with the 17th
regt. they are hard looking
guns. It is showery
this afternoon.

JUNE

SUNDAY 21

1863

The mail came in this morning, I got a letter from Emily. I have answered it - this afternoon,

MONDAY 22

I am detailed to work on fortifications this week, I don't fancy the work but - like the whiskey, get two rations per day,

TUESDAY 23

This forenoon I worked rather hard but - this afternoon I "shirked" all I know how,

JUNE

WEDNESDAY 24

1863

This morning orders came into camp for us to start for Fortress Monroe at 4 o'clock P.M. 9 P.M. finds us steaming down the river 24 Cos. on a schooner towed by the Mail Steamer Comlie, -

THURSDAY 25

This morning at daylight finds us at anchor near the mouth of the Rappahannock, at 10 o'clock we get under weigh though we move mighty slow, at 1 P.M. we anchored near Watteras.

FRIDAY 26

This morning we started about daylight. we do not make more than 5 knots an hour. this afternoon we had a fine squall it did look magnificent - did not rain much, -

JUNE

SATURDAY 27

1863

This morning when I went on deck we were just opposite Cape Henry Light; entering the Chesapeake, 10 o'clock I gave anchor off Fort Monroe. The Violette arrived in the afternoon about 6 the Emily takes us in tow again, for we know not where

SUNDAY 28

This morning we found ourselves aground near the mouth of the York, we laid until near night when a tug boat came from the Port and got us off and towed us up to York town, where we anchored

MONDAY 29

This morning we all went on board the Emily and are now steaming up the river for White House "this day". arrived at the White House about 2 P.M. This Col. reported to Gen. Dix who sent us back to Fort Monroe

JUNE

TUESDAY 30

1863

We arrived at the Fortress about noon. about 5 we landed and marched to Hampton and encamped in 4 tents. To await orders. It is quite a decent place here, unlike N. C. I can get any quantity of stuff to eat.

JULY

WEDNESDAY 1

1863

Have done nothing but travel around looking at the inhabitants of Hampton, and seeking what good things we could devour. Things are some cheaper than at Newbern and of better quality. —

THURSDAY 2

This afternoon at 3:15 find the 4th 3^d on board the Steamer Kennebec, leaving the wharf at the Fort; bound for Baltimore and from there home by rail. I hope, but can't say Co. D has what was the Cadet's Cabin! —

JULY

FRIDAY 3

1863

We arrived at the at B. about noon.
The Col. went ashore, so did a good
many of the men and got merry drunk
& should fight. Col. returned about
4. and the regt. went ashore taking quarters
for the night. Co. D alone in a freight-depot.
On this evening I went through the market.
It did look splendid.

SATURDAY 4

We sat at a table to eat supper
last & breakfast this morning, at
the "Union Relief Association".
This morning the regt. marched
about a mile out of the city
and encamped in a grove in
shelter tents.

SUNDAY 5

It has rained nearly all day.
Two trains of reb. prisoners
arrived here to day, and are sent
to Fort Mc. Henry. It is a
nice place around Baltimore
so different from N. Carolina

JULY

MONDAY 6

1863

This morning I started for Baltimore with Stone & Johnson, We went up Washington Monument; It is a handsome edifice and we had a splendid view of the city. it is 180 feet high. We traveled nearly all over the city and returned to Camp

TUESDAY 7

We were promised to start for Boston to day, but - have not. Gen. Sigle ordered the regt. to Frederic Col. Holbrook refused to go by his order he then ordered Col. Whitson to take all that ^{willing} were to go, he formed the regt in line took a vote 150 were ready to go. 11 in co. D —

WEDNESDAY 8

To day at 1 o'clock about 500 of the regt. started for Boston, we left Baltimore about 4 P. M. The rest of the regt. with all the officers have gone to Frederick, our detachment is in command of Lieut Poole,

JULY

THURSDAY 9

1863

We arrived at Philadelphia at 4:30 this morning, breakfasted at the Union Vol. Refreshment Saloon, then took the ferry to Camden, then the C. & N. R.R. to South Amboy. Steamer from there to N. York. Steamer from there at 11 o'clock for New Haven, arrived

FRIDAY 10

at N. H. at 4:20, started at 9. for Boston went through Hartford Springfield, Worcester, got to B. at 6. marched to Boylston Hall where they gave us furlough until Tuesday. arrived at home in Dedham. 8:30 found the folks in the St waiting for us --

SATURDAY 11

It seemed strange to go to bed on feathers, but I did it and slept "bully". Have got on a white shirt and don't hardly know myself. Have been traveling this evening did not see but a few of the boys

JULY

SUNDAY 12

1863

I got ready to go to church this morning but was suddenly taken with a pain in my stomach, so gave it up. This afternoon have been to East St. saw all the old neighbors. They were pretty glad to see us, —

MONDAY 13

I picked some pears this morning, and eat them for dinner. This afternoon I was taken with the pain again more severe than ever. Father went for the Dr. sent Dr. Allen he called it a bilious attack. —

TUESDAY 14

Elwood & Mullen have been to Boston had their furlough extended to July 20th. when we are to meet at Rockville. have been comfortable all day only am rather weak,

JULY

WEDNESDAY 15

1863

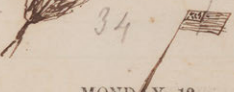

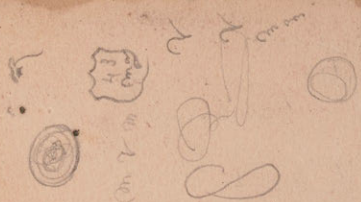
