# Carter In Can't-Miss Delegate Position

President Carter is one week — and eight primary elections — from the delegate majority that will deliver him the Democratic nomination and set up a

three-way autumn campaign for the presidency. The president needs but 86 more votes, or about 12 percent of the 696 Democratic delegates to be awarded next Tuesday in the final installment of the

long-running primary election serial. Carter can't miss winning enough delegates to put him in line for the competition with Republican Ronald Reagan and independent John B. Anderson for the

White House in the fall. Carter defeated Sen. Edward M. Kennedy Tuesday in three more primaries, gained 64 delegates, and The Associated Press count of delegate commitments now shows him with 1,580 of the

1,666 votes that will mean renomination. Kennedy has 849. The Carter victories were in Kentucky, Arkansas and Nevada. He also won a preferential vote in Idaho, but that was for show, not delegates.

White House Press Secretary Jody Powell said the Carter campaign figures the president is only "a handful of delegates, four or five" from nominating strength. Once Carter gets his majority, only an unlikely up-

heaval in which Democratic rules are revised to release delegates from their commitments will stand between him and a second run for the White House. But Kennedy, campaigning in Charleston, W.Va., was

conceding nothing to Carter. He said the real test would come in the big primaries next Tuesday. "I'm convinced that June 3 can be decisive, and I'm also convinced that a powerful and strong showing on June 3 by a candidate can't be denied at the Democratic convention," he said.

# Iran's New Parliament Is Convened Today

Iran's new Parliament convened today with calls from Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to guard against plotters, from President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr to pump life into a nearly bankrupt economy, and from the militants holding the U.S. hostages to keep the captives until the shah and his wealth are returned.

A top adviser to moderate, former Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan, was chosen provisional chairman and Bazargan selected as his deputy despite the shouted protest of Ayatollah Sadegh Khalkhali, a firebrand judge who has sent scores of Iranians before firing squads. Khomeini's message mirrored the religious fervor of the Parliament. The mullahs, or Moslem priests, wore white or black turbans in stark contrast to the red and gold hues of the ornate chamber.

"If inclinations contrary to Islam and the nation do exist in ministries or other national bodies, first offer guidance, but where there are violations, you should introduce motions of censure, because the presence of plotting elements at the head of national affairs or in sensitive positions will bring ruin to the country." Bani-Sadr, in his address, urged an end to ethnic rebellions in Iran, a foreign policy liberated from foreign influences, free parliamentary debate to set an example of non-violence for the nation, and more attention to domestic economic problems.

independent, this is the worst situation that can happen." Iran reportedly has \$15 billion in foreign reserves but more than half of this is frozen in American banks. Some of the remaining amount is frozen in Europe, part of the U.S.-allied effort to gain the release of the hostages.

shah, ousted by Khomeini's revolution 16 months ago, has been the demand of the hostages' militant captors ever since they seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran last Nov. 4.

Many prominent members of the Islamic Republican Party also sympathize with the militants' demand that some of the captives be tried as spies. Iranian officials say the

hostage debate is not likely to begin until late June, after the parliament chooses a chairman, prime minister and Cabinet, formulates its own rules, and discusses a number of domestic issues.

Reagan, a three-time winner Tuesday, will be the Republican nominee, by close to acclamation. He is unopposed now, with George Bush out of the competition for lack of money and delegates.

No sooner had Bush dropped his challenge than delegates once aligned with him began to sign on with Reagan. The former California governor won another 59 delegates in the latest set of primaries, and soared past the majority that will put him atop the GOP ticket.

So it almost surely will be Carter against Reagan against Anderson in the Nov. 4 presidential election. Former President Gerald R. Ford said he thinks Anderson's independent candidacy will deny an electoral vote majority to either Carter or Reagan, and send the election into the House of Representatives.

Ford, in Niagara Falls, N.Y., congratulated Reagan on clinching the nomination, and said he will support Reagan in the fall campaign.

There was scant campaigning in any of the four primary election states, with Kennedy and the Carter campaign both concentrating on the high-stakes finale next Tuesday.

Some \$814,529 in net distributable tax proceeds were received by Pitt County for the quarter ending March 31, according to Mark Lynch, Secretary of the N.C. Department of Revenue.

Lynch reported that on a per capita distribution basis figured relative to population, Greenville received \$209,967 of the total amount. Local population was listed in the distribution report as 34,550.

Farmville, based on a population of 5,510, received \$33,485 of the total distribution, Lynch said, while Ayden, with a population of 4,220, received \$25,645.

Other Pitt towns, their populations and receipts, included: Grifton, (Pitt's share), 2,250, \$13,673; Winterville, 2,410, \$14,646; Bethel, 1,950, \$11,850; Simpson, 530, \$3,220; Fountain, 450, \$2,734; Grimesland, 430, \$2,613; and Falkland, 130, \$790.

Lenoir County, figured on an ad valorem basis, received \$564,298 with \$436,786 going to the county and the rest distributed to Kinston, \$113,222; La Grange, \$10,786; Pink Hill, \$3,448; and Grifton (Lenoir's share), \$54.

Martin County, based on an ad valorem levy, received \$205,471 with \$168,232 going to the county and the balance allotted to nine towns. Receiving shares were: Williamston, \$28,828; Robersonville, \$5,209; Jamesville, \$1,205; Oak City, \$703; Hamilton, \$572; Everetts, \$378; Parmele, \$181; Bear Grass, \$87; and Hassell, \$70.

Beaufort County totals, figured on a per capita basis, included \$359,615 in total distributions with \$266,184 of the total allotted to the county itself. Seven towns shared in the balance, including: Washington, \$61,954; Belhaven, \$15,904; Aurora, \$4,724; Chocowinity, \$4,125; Washington Park, \$3,726; Bath, \$1,530; and Pantego, \$1,464.

## Rigger Cleared; Wants His Packing Job Back

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Army Pfc. Alvin Williams said Tuesday that he would like to return to his job as a parachute rigger now that a military jury has found him innocent of murder in the death of a captain whose parachute failed to open.

Meanwhile, the parents of the dead captain called on the Army to tighten regulations governing the packing and storing of parachutes and the selection of parachute riggers.

Williams, a 20-year-old parachute rigger in the 407th Service and Supply Battalion, was accused of cutting the static line of a parachute drawn by Capt. Lawrence Hill, 26.

During a routine proficiency jump March 26 by some members of the Fort Bragg-based 82nd Airborne Division, Hill's parachute failed to open and he plunged more than 1,000 feet to his death.

Williams' court-martial jury of five officers and three non-commissioned officers deliberated for one hour and 18 minutes Tuesday, before acquitting Williams at 1:12 p.m.

Asked how he felt upon hearing the verdict, Williams said, "Really good, really good, really relieved."

Williams' mother, Nina Wilson of Warsaw, N.C., had tears in her eyes as she walked from the courtroom.

Williams grinned broadly and said he had no bitter feelings toward Army investigators, whose methods he had criticized during the trial.

"I realize their job and I know that sometimes they do things that they think they have to do," he said.

Williams said that although there would be "people out there who still suspect me," he wanted to stay in the Army and return to his

job as a parachute rigger. "That's what I want to do with my life," he said. "I like my job."

An Army spokesman said it had not been determined if Williams would be reassigned. Capt. Michael Wysocki, chief defense counsel, said Williams' old unit was "trying to find a bed for him" Tuesday afternoon.

Williams said he believed whoever sabotaged Hill's parachute was still on base, but he said he did not know who that could be.

Col. Wallace Cox, who acted as foreman of the jury, said Tuesday afternoon that the vote among the eight jurors was not unanimous. He would not give the actual count, but he said the number of guilty votes was "substantially less than" the six required to convict.

"I think the prevailing thought was that the members (of the jury) did not feel that the government had proved its case beyond a reasonable doubt," Cox said.

Mr. and Mrs. Horace Hill, parents of the dead captain, said Tuesday they believed it was a fair trial and they would accept the verdict.

But they said they would not let the investigation into their son's death end with the acquittal of Williams.

"The Army has officially declared our son murdered," Mrs. Hill said. "We have to see where they are going from here."

Army officials were unclear Tuesday about what the next step might be. Maj. Roger Smith, public affairs officer for the 82nd Airborne Division, said investigations into other sabotaged parachutes is continuing.

Hill, reading from a prepared statement, said newly inducted military personnel should receive more experience before being assigned "to such sensitive positions

I know Hotline had an item recently about Circle of Gold being illegal. However, I've been to a meeting this week where we were told in words that could have been very convincing that it's not illegal and that you stand to make a lot of money. C. M.

Yes, Hotline did publish a detail explanation of the Circle of Gold pyramid scheme Monday, May 12 and quoted N. C. Attorney General Rufus Edmisten concerning its illegality and why. However, after your call, we talked to someone in the Attorney General's office once again. She said the Consumer Protection Division is receiving about 100 calls a day concerning Circle of Gold and that every caller is told it's illegal. Any names sent the office are being turned to district attorneys in the whatever areas they come from. Callers are urged to contact their own district attorneys. "It's spreading like wildfire throughout the state," she said, "and is sure to cause a lot of people to lose money."

## Kennedy Keeps Plugging Away

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — For a man supposedly nearing the end of a very long slide down, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy doesn't appear to be conceding very much in his fading quest for the Democratic Party presidential nomination.

Campaigning Tuesday in a big ballroom at an amusement park in Youngstown, Ohio, Kennedy got in one of his sharpest cracks in weeks at the man he has been pursuing for the party nomination.

"This amusement park reminds me a little bit of Jimmy Carter," the Massachusetts senator declared with obvious delight before a noisy, appreciative crowd of more than 1,000 people. "Because of the roller-coaster economics, the merry-go-round on energy,

the chamber of horrors on foreign policy and the hall of mirrors on his 1980 campaign."

Kennedy himself was chuckling by the time he finished delivering the line, and in general, he is a man seemingly at ease with his situation.

The numbers are overwhelmingly against him. With his landslide losses to the president Tuesday in primaries in Arkansas, Nevada and Kentucky, the senator fell even farther behind Carter in the hunt for nominating delegates to this summer's party convention. He also lost to Carter in Tuesday's non-binding preference vote in Idaho.

According to most counts, Carter will pick up the 1,666 delegates he needs next Tuesday.

# Deafness No Handicap For Honored Teacher

NEW YORK (AP) — The awards have been piling up for Lucinda Lowell Hebbeler, a 29-year-old teacher whose most recent honor was being named 1980 alumna of the year by Pace University here.

Among others: she was selected as New York State Teacher of the Year for 1980; was recognized for outstanding contributions to the field of education by the New York State legislature; was one of four finalists for National Teacher of the Year; received the Pace University School of Education Alumni Distinguished Service Award; and was honored for service in the field of education by the New York League for the Hard of Hearing.

Mrs. Hebbeler, who has been profoundly deaf since birth but went through regular schools with hearing children, teaches the hearing-impaired in the Board of Cooperative Educational Services program at a Nassau county school on Long Island.

"Naturally, I'm pleased and proud, personally and professionally, to have received so many honors,"

Mrs. Hebbeler says. "But the greatest reward has been the positive effect it has had on my students and their parents. It gives them lots of hope to reach for realistic goals."

The 13- to 15-year-olds she teaches see her as a role model, she points out. "They want to know about my problems when I was their age. It gives them a feeling of not being alone, knowing that I've been there." Those who have teletypewriter equipment feel free to call her at home at night.

Mrs. Hebbeler, who is a firm believer in mainstreaming rather than in special schools, says she is grateful her parents sent her to regular schools.

"It prepared me for the daily demands of a hearing world and broadened my language and communication skills," she said. "It was not always easy. I received a great deal of help at home to fill in the gaps, copied notes from classmates and had up-front seating so I could lip-read."

She gives credit to the "patience and understanding of a handful of marvelous teachers" who treated her as

a normal child who happened to have a hearing problem and to her parents, who saw to it that she led a normal life, were not overprotective and "talked, talked, talked to me."

"We had the guidance of the New York League for the Hard of Hearing," explains her mother, Ann Lowell, of their decision on mainstreaming, which she points out was not a popular concept at its time.

"The oral method was employed with her from the beginning, since we knew one day she would enter the hearing world and she might as well learn to function in it."

"She attended private schools in which she was the only deaf child, but she had help from the League in special Saturday classes. She had no interpreter or any of the aids that fortunately young people have today."

The language training was difficult — you don't pick up incidental language, and everything has to be taught specifically in speech-reading.

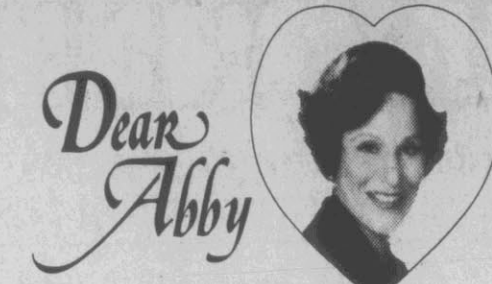
"I was never exposed to sign language until I became a teacher of the deaf," notes Mrs. Hebbeler, who is able to make herself understood when she speaks.

"Because of my own oral training I was adamant in my belief that oralism was for everyone, but I came to realize that for some children sign language or total communication is a proper alternative. I still feel that most hearing-impaired children should have oral opportunity, especially in the very early years."

In her classes, Mrs. Hebbeler uses special techniques of sketching, films and acting out to help students comprehend certain definitions and concepts that can't be simply stated in words only.

Mrs. Hebbeler and her husband, Peter, who is hearing-impaired but not deaf, are expecting their first child but she intends to continue teaching.

In addition to a bachelor's degree from Pace, she has a master's degree in education from Hunter College and plans to take additional courses in linguistics and learning disabilities. She is working on a book about her experiences as a student and a teacher.

## At Wit's End

A class of fourth-graders at the Grimes Center for Creative Learning are nine years old... going on bankruptcy.

They're all enrolled in a class of money management and fiscal responsibility. They perform all kinds of jobs like cleaning cabinets, dusting erasers and inspecting the locker room. For these chores, they're paid a salary with blue mimeographed money.

At the end of the week they are paid. However, 20 percent of their money is deducted for taxes for the teacher's salary. Then there's deductions for rent, water, electricity and a special fee for using the pencil sharpener.

Students are fired for being absent from or late to their jobs. If they are "evicted" for non-payment of rent, their desks are stacked at the back of the room and their belongings piled on top.

So far the locker room inspector has been fired and had to learn to live below his means, a couple of students were "evicted" and a few of them had to form a loan company and live in the "low rent" area of the room in a cluster of desks by the door.

Is this a terrific idea? It may be just the biggest eyeopener to hit education since page 186 of the June, 1953, National Geographic magazine in the library.

I should have had such a course when I was in grade school. I got married thinking all money was mimeographed and whenever a letter came with a see-through address, I gave it to my husband and said, "I do floors — not windows!"

I passed on through the miracle of genetics one of the greatest mathematical minds of the 14th century to my

children. The first job my son got, he came in and said, "I can't believe it! I think I owe them money for working. What's FICA?"

"It's a deduction for Social Security."

"I don't want to join," he said.

"It's not a tennis club; it's a retirement benefit."

"I already paid for one in another box. What does federal withholding tax go for?"

"On your salary, a paper clip for national defense."

"Look at these deductions! State tax! Charitable contributions! Medical! Dues! What a ripoff! I've worked 40 solid, long, back-breaking hours for all of this. I can't go on living like this."

I didn't have the heart to tell him that if he had to pay for his food, room, lights, air conditioning, heat, laundry, medical, cable TV, clothes and phone.

# Watergate Tapes Now Available To The Public

WASHINGTON (AP) — Now the public can hear, dirty words and all, the tape-recorded conversations about Watergate that caused Richard Nixon to resign as president and sent his close associates to jail.

Starting today, 31 of the 950 tapes secretly made by Nixon are available to the public at the National Archives. But only about 100 listeners a day can be accommodated at 24 listening posts.

What they will hear are the tapes heard by the jury that convicted H.R. Haldeman, John D. Ehrlichman, John N. Mitchell and Robert C. Mariani in 1975 of conspiring to obstruct justice and the jury that acquitted former Texas Gov. John B. Connally of accepting a bribe from milk producers.

The first member of the public to show up today to hear the tapes was Frank Smist, 28, of Springfield, Mass., who will start teaching political science at the University of Oklahoma this fall.

Smist said he had been a close student of the transcripts during the Watergate investigation and said: "I want to hear that 'smoking gun.'"

"The tapes are sad," he said. "Here was the president of a democracy saying one thing in public and another thing in private."

Ultimately, the government hopes to make available here and in archives facilities in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Denver, Fort Worth, Texas, Kansas City, Mo., Los Angeles, Bayonne, N.J., Philadelphia, San Bruno, Calif., and Seattle most of the tapes in its possession. They cover 6,000

hours of talk. Nixon is fighting that plan in court, contending it would be an invasion of his privacy.

There is no indication how long the court battle might drag on. Until it is resolved, only the 31 tapes introduced as evidence at the various trials will be available — and those only in Washington.

According to Associated Press reporter Harry F. Rosenthal, who heard the tapes during the trials, listeners will hear hard-to-follow conversations often muffled by the sound of a lawnmower, a band playing or a cup hitting a saucer and punctuated by expletives — "hell" or "damn" — and an occasional barnyard epithet.

"The half-second it took to get the tape reels to gather speed often blotted opening sentences," Rosenthal wrote. "Invariably, the voice of Nixon behind the desk was less distinct than that of the person talking to him. People spoke in half-sentences, interrupted one another and often spoke at the same time."

Archives officials expect big crowds to line up every morning for tickets. Visitors will be given printed transcripts, but they will not be permitted to make recordings.

Donning earphones, they can listen to some of the conversations between Nixon and his associates as they evolved the Watergate cover-up — the plans to conceal White House involvement in the June 17, 1972 break-in at Democratic headquarters in the Watergate building.

Not included, because it was not introduced in evidence at the trials, is the most famous tape — the one containing an 18½ minute erasure of a conversation Nixon had with Haldeman on June 20, 1972, three days

after the Watergate break-in.

The batch made public today — it would take 12½ hours to hear them all — includes a tape made April 25, 1973 revealing how vulnerable Nixon felt.

Warned that he may have committed a crime, Nixon said it was time to "put the wagons up around the president" and devise a story to protect himself.

Another offers the famous "smoking gun" tape — a conversation between Nixon and Haldeman that occurred six days after the break-in. In that one, Haldeman suggested that the CIA be used to stop the FBI from investigating the source of the funds used to finance the break-in.

Nixon resisted giving up that tape. Finally, he reluctantly sent it to the House Judiciary Committee, which was investigating whether to

# Muskie vs. Sverdlovsk

WASHINGTON — One day recently President Carter received and read a devastating intelligence report that appears to eliminate all lingering doubt that the 1977 Sverdlovsk explosion resulted from germ warfare, a finding that now confronts Secretary of State Edmund Muskie with a hard test of his U.S.-Soviet policy.

In chilling detail, the report states that, on the strength of a wide number of intelligence sources, the "first casualties were a fairly large number of male (military) reservists at the military installation," site of the biological warfare laboratory that mysteriously exploded in April 1979. The report says the commander of the military installation committed suicide and that Defense Minister Dmitry Ustinov made an unannounced inspection two weeks after the explosion.

The Carter administration admitted on March 18 that it suspected Soviet germ warfare experimentation after preliminary reports of the deadly accident filtered through Soviet secrecy to the West.

Now, Muskie confronts two choices: Charge the Russians with violating the 1975 treaty banning germ warfare experimentation or production; or sweep it under the rug at a time of heightened U.S.-Soviet tensions.

Complicating the answer are grave new questions linking Soviet violation of the unenforceable germ warfare treaty to American efforts to verify Soviet compliance with treaties on strategic arms limitation (SALT) and nuclear testing. U.S. skeptics have always warned that without verification, Moscow will cheat the U.S. blind. Also at stake as the untutored Muskie comes to grips with American policy toward the Soviet Union are specific — but unprioritized — demands of U.S. friends for immediate international policing to force compliance with the germ warfare treaty.

This effort is being led by Sweden, which with other European states has reated with understandable horror to the mysterious Sverdlovsk disaster. Muskie's predecessor, Cyrus Vance, and the ardent U.S.-Soviet detentists who advised him flatly rejected Sweden's pressure at the recent Geneva conference called to review the unenforceable 1977 treaty. Vance wanted to limit talk about the Sverdlovsk explosion and its alleged treaty violation strictly to Washington and Moscow.

"It is far too important for that," one leading European ambassador told us. "It belongs to all of us, not just to the U.S., because we are all imperiled."

Just how imperiled becomes clear in reading the lurid yet understated intelligence report recently sent to the Oval Office. The report fully justifies the demand for an immediate international move to insist on ways to enforce the germ warfare treaty.

In the past few years, the report states, the Soviets

"have acquired significant technology and equipment, built large-scale biological fermentation facilities and made progress in other areas considered useful should Moscow decide to pursue production of biological weapons."

Starting in late May 1979, persistent rumors were heard on the streets of Moscow — one of the few places where conversation is safe from police discovery — that a "disaster" had occurred in Sverdlovsk. Workers in an adjoining Sverdlovsk institute trying to flee the fatal germ poisoning released in the explosion "were held inside the facility by security personnel." Other workers, downwind in a ceramics factory, died even though inside their building; ventilators had sucked in the fatal bacilli.

When Soviet authorities finally decided a public statement was mandatory, they blamed death on infection from a slaughtered cow suffering from anthrax.

But that "explanation" of the disaster as an outbreak of a "rare disease" called gastric anthrax was undercut when a Soviet general, who commanded the installation that housed the germ factory, committed suicide. Further weakening the "rare disease" myth was the unprioritized arrival of Defense Minister Ustinov, one of the three or four most powerful men in the Kremlin and a possible successor to ailing President Leonid Brezhnev.

The question of why a leading member of the Politburo would bother himself about the outbreak of a rare disease in a distant provincial city is so bizarre that the intelligence report does not address it.

Adding to evidence that the dead died from pulmonary anthrax — breathing in of the biological agents released by the accidental explosion, not infection from touching or eating diseased meat — is the fact that "large areas around the military installation were graded and covered with asphalt" for decontamination.

An effective lethal dose of anthrax for an average man is about 10,000 spores. Accordingly, the death of several hundred human beings indicated "an extremely large number of anthrax spores — effectively negating any assessment of peaceful or defensive research being conducted" at the military facility.

That is the intelligence finding given Jimmy Carter, with all its dispassion. What to do about it now becomes a showcase example for Edmund Sixtus Muskie as he approaches the most important challenge in his new job — the challenge of how to deal with the Soviet Union.

# A New Interstate

Raleigh — Those individuals in state government and business who look ahead to the future shape of things to come are seeing major changes connected to construction of a four-lane highway from Raleigh to Wilmington.

"I've said it a thousand times over that Interstate 40 is going to enable us not only to have economic development, but more important it will boost port development."

"Overall, in the next decade, that single project is the most valuable to southern North Carolina," says Garland Garrett, Jr., member of the North Carolina Transport Board from Wilmington.

Already, the first major development is in the works. The State Ports Authority will ask the 1981 General Assembly to authorize at least \$20 million for ports expansion, more than doubling container handling operations at the port.

Work will start this year on the interstate extension from Raleigh, and highway officials say it will be finished about 1985. While the Board of Transportation has delayed numerous projects and even scuttled some because of falling Highway Fund income, the coastal connection has been moved up on the schedule.

## Statewide

Impact of the project will not be felt in southeastern counties alone.

Some top state officials are already viewing this Raleigh-to-Wilmington link as "the long-sought" interstate type highway con-

necting Wilmington with central, Piedmont and western North Carolina and the existing interstate network in the state.

For decades it has been largely thought that the U.S. 74 east-west route would ultimately become the coast-to-mountains four-lane highway for North Carolina. If it is determined that the Raleigh-Wilmington link answers that historical demand, it could mean a major shift in the direction of growth along other corridors.

State Ports Authority people have maintained that poor highway connections are the major reason why the state's ports handle only about 30 percent of the seagoing cargo leaving North Carolina. Ports in South Carolina and Virginia have been easier to get to by truck or rail.

On the drawing boards at this time is a proposal for an "inland port" where container shipments destined for Wilmington can be processed and dispatched. Early discussion centered around the Charlotte area as a logical location. Construction

of the interstate 40 route, however, could cause the location to shift into the Greensboro-Winston-High Point area.

Meanwhile, other transportation-related developments are expected from businesses such as trucking, rail, airlines, and buses.

## Connected

Garrett believes the ports expansion and interstate link will mean growth in other transportation activity. "I don't think you can have the port and road expansion without having the others," he says.

The Ports Authority is already moving ahead on its

# Disasters Can Enhance Image

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, during his inspection of the Mount St. Helens volcano damage last week, discovered anew how presidents can use disasters to enhance their own image.

The volcano visit was a no-lose situation, unlike his trip Monday to the aircraft carrier Nimitz. While that journey was a fitting way to spend Memorial Day, it also recalled his failure to win release of American hostages in Iran. The ill-fated rescue helicopters were launched from the Nimitz during its Persian Gulf assignment.

Since Carter had no hand in causing the devastating volcanic eruption — a fact he actually pointed out to reporters — his hastily scheduled trip west gave him a noncontroversial way to act "presidential." It also got him some network and local newscast time in California.

California holds an important primary election June 3. It was against this political backdrop that re-

porters from two California newspapers and several broadcast outlets were invited to tour the volcano area with the president. While in the West, the president, uncharacteristically, took advantage of almost every possible occasion to stop and chat with local reporters.

Instead of the usual "tight pool" of White House-based reporters that normally accompanies Carter in such situations, officials loaded up three enormous cargo helicopters with reporters — including those from California, Oregon and Washington — to tour the wreckage from the air.

For weeks, White House aides have said Carter would like to travel to California before the important primary, but a California trip would have been expensive and the Carter-Mondale Committee was running short of cash.

Thus, the volcano eruption gave Carter a perfect opportunity to attain visibility on the West Coast while the trip, officially nonpolitical, was being billed to the taxpayers.

Such trips to disasters normally offer almost no cause to criticize the president. Everyone is happy he is there, showing his concern, and they are eager to see him and relate their tales of the disaster.

But this time, Washington Gov. Dixy Lee Ray threatened that tradition. During a briefing on the volcano's damage, after one government official had given Carter and others a long speech on the huge amount of felled timber, Gov. Ray interrupted to say:

"That's all very interesting, but our top priority is the people who have been affected."

Carter, who had been asking questions about the timber loss, turned to the governor and asked what she needed specifically.

"M-o-n-e-y," the governor said pointedly, spelling out the letters.

Carter, with an edge to his voice, pointed out he had just signed the disaster declaration, which made the area eligible for federal aid. "I did not delay," he said with annoyance.

The bickering continued for a few minutes until Carter said officials should take an inventory of the needs and then work would begin on solving them.

The next day Carter met again with reporters. Picking up the governor's refrain, he declared: "Our first priority, which has been handled so well, even before I arrived, is to deal with human needs."

All in all, the president spent 20 hours on the ground and no one asked a single embarrassing political question. Carter had been careful to say he would only entertain questions about the volcano.

The fact of the matter is that one presidential slip of the tongue — one mention of politics or the upcoming primaries — would have turned the trip into a "political" one for legal purposes, shifting the burden of payment to Carter's campaign committee.

The president's first avowedly "political" trip of the year occurs Thursday, when he travels to Ohio for a fund-raiser in Cleveland.

**DEFENSE SPENDING** — By a vote of 338 for and 62 against, the House passed a

bill to spend \$53.1 billion next fiscal year for weapons. This bill (HR 6974) only authorizes the money. Separate legislation must be passed to actually spend it. The \$53.1 billion is \$6.2 billion more than President Carter had asked for, and although it could help to unbalance the fiscal 1981 budget, it reflects the congressional groundswell for high defense spending.

Rep. Bill Alexander, D-Ark., a supporter, said: "Since the slow process of neglect of our defense began early in the last decade, we have watched our military power drift into a state of uncertain readiness."

**SENATE**

FTC — By a vote of 74 for and 15 against, the Senate gave final congressional approval to a bill (HR 2313) that keeps a weakened Federal Trade Commission alive through fiscal 1981. The bill limits the FTC's ability to regulate children's advertising on television and the insurance industry, and gives Congress power to veto FTC rules if both houses okay the veto.

Sen. Harrison Schmitt, R-N.M., a supporter, said "the possibility of a legislative veto at the end of the regulatory pipeline will insure that the FTC considers our concerns at the beginning of the pipeline."

Most opponents wanted even more restrictions on the FTC. However, Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, opposed the bill as too re-

strictive. "The overburdened people of this country need a diligent Federal Trade Commission that serves as a watchdog in the marketplace," he said.

Senators voting "yea" favor the bill. Sen. Robert Morgan, D., voted "yea." Sen. Jesse Helms, R, voted "nay."

## Subway Gang Beats Woman

NEW YORK (AP) — A marauding gang of 10 teen-aged girls and one 17-year-old boy were charged with beating and robbing an

unintimidated Polish woman on a Brooklyn subway train early today, Transit Authority police said.

The woman, a recent immigrant from Warsaw who cannot speak English, held fast after the group ripped a gold chain from her neck and tried to steal her pocketbook.

"She was beaten, kicked, punched, and knocked down, but wouldn't give up her purse," said Transit Authority Officer Howard Haag.

The incident began around 1 a.m. in the Bensonhurst section of Brooklyn when the youths followed Francis Zarecky, 50, onto the train, Haag said.

The group began to deliberately bump and shove Mrs. Zarecky. She moved to another car, but they followed her and continued their harassment, Haag said.

When the woman got off the train, the gang stepped up its attack, Haag said. One of the girls grabbed her gold necklace while the others punched and kicked her, according to the officer.

Then they ran to the mezzanine, but returned a several minutes later and tried to take Mrs. Zarecky's pocketbook. "That's when they really started in on her," Haag said, "but she wouldn't give in."

Transit Authority police apprehended the suspects about an hour later, but only after three of the girls managed to get away.

# Survey Finds Workers Preoccupied Over Retiring

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most working Americans want to retire early and are more concerned about having enough money to live on than about having too much spare time on their hands, a nationwide survey indicates. But for those already retired, an early life of leisure seemed somewhat less alluring, the poll conducted for the National Commission on Social Security showed.

The survey released Tuesday also found that 61 percent of all those still working have little or no confidence in the Social Security system will have enough money to pay benefits to them when they retire. In the

25-to-44-year age bracket, 73 percent had little or no confidence there will be enough in the Social Security till to pay them.

The poll was conducted for the commission to gauge public sentiment on Social Security and retirement issues. The 1,549 adults surveyed by Peter D. Hart Research Associates last November included 434 retirees.

Despite the lack of confidence, nine of 10 non-retired Americans are counting on Social Security to be their primary or secondary source of retirement income. The people polled also indicated by wide margins they would rather pay higher Social Security taxes than have benefits lowered or the retirement age raised.

Only 17 percent favored ending Social Security while 76 percent favored keeping it for future generations.

The poll was conducted as part of a Social Security study to be sent to President

Carter and Congress in January.

The survey found that two-thirds of the retirees interviewed said they retired involuntarily — 51 percent due to poor health, 11 percent because of a mandatory re-

retirement age and 5 percent who lost their jobs.

Asked whether they were more concerned about not having enough money in retirement or not having enough to do, 61 percent cited money worries, 17 percent said they were worried about using their time, 12 percent were equally worried about both, 7 percent about neither

and 3 percent were unsure. On early retirement, 58 percent of those still working indicated the idea of retiring at age 60 was appealing and only 37 percent disagreed. But among those already retired, 60 percent disliked the idea of retiring at age 60 and only 34 percent favored it.

Overall, only one-third of those surveyed found any appeal in putting off retirement until age 70. Forty percent did say they would postpone retirement until then if they got significantly

higher benefits, but 47 percent said not even that would entice them to delay retirement.

Asked to choose between raising the Social Security tax or lowering benefits, only 21 percent said they would opt for lower benefits, while 69 percent said they would not.

Asked to choose between higher taxes and raising the retirement age by three years, only 36 percent favored raising the retirement age, while 51 percent were opposed.

## Cosmonauts In Space Linke-Up

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet-Hungarian cosmonaut team was adjusting to life in orbit today after joining two Soviet cosmonauts aboard the Salyut 6 space station, Tass reported.

The Soviet news agency said veteran Soviet cosmonaut Valery Kubasov, 45, and 30-year-old Hungarian air force pilot Bertalan Farkas, aboard the Soyuz 36 space craft, linked up with the space station Tuesday night. They joined Soviet cosmonauts Leonid Popov and Valery Ryumin, who have been in orbit for the

past 1½ months. Moscow Radio said flight controllers, who carried out the rendezvous and docking procedure from the ground, burst into applause when the two craft linked up at 10:56 p.m. Moscow time — 3:56 p.m. EDT.

After a three-hour wait while the spacemen checked the firmness of the linkup, Kubasov and Farkas joined the other two men in the space station, exchanging packets of bread and salt, the traditional Russian symbols of greeting, the radio said.

Tass said all systems aboard the craft were functioning normally and the cosmonauts had begun their work program.

After completing their week-long flight the bi-national crew is to return to earth in the Soyuz 35 capsule that lofted Popov and Ryumin into orbit on April 9.

Tass said Kubasov and Farkas were to carry out various activities aboard Salyut 6, including biomedical experiments, photography and studies of earth resources. A Hungarian spokesman in Budapest said they also would try to observe the continuing eruptions of the Mount St. Helens volcano in Washington.

In a congratulatory message carried by Tass, Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev and Hungarian communist leader Janos Kadar called the latest space flight "a striking example of internationalism in action."

Kubasov and Farkas were lofted into space Monday night from the Baikonur cosmodrome in Soviet Central Asia. They are the fifth bi-national crew to take part in the Soviet bloc's three-year-old Intercosmos program. East German, Polish, Bulgarian and Czech cosmonauts flew in earlier Soviet-run missions.

## 2nd Largest See In LA

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles has outdistanced New York and trails only Chicago as the nation's largest Catholic see, according to the Official Catholic Directory for 1980.

Statistics show the archdiocese of Los Angeles with 2.06 million Catholics. The see includes Los Angeles, Ventura and Santa Barbara counties.

Chicago is the nation's leader among the country's 170 archdioceses and dioceses, with 2.4 million Catholics. New York is third, with 1.82 million, followed by Newark with 1.39 million, Philadelphia with 1.36 million and Detroit with 1.2 million.

However, Los Angeles Catholic officials believe the figures for their archdiocese may be too low, because they don't count many Hispanics who aren't legal U.S. residents, according to today's editions of the Los Angeles Times.

The paper quotes Monsignor Joseph Pollard as estimating there may be nearly 3 million Catholics in the archdiocese.

# Oil Jobbers Attend Session

Forty oil jobbers from throughout eastern North Carolina attended a workshop at Pitt Community College Wednesday sponsored by the North Carolina Oil Jobbers Association and PCC.

This fuel oil conservation program will provide training to North Carolina service technicians and installers of oil-fired heating equipment through a grant recently announced by the governor's office and the U.S. Department of Energy.

The training in this workshop will enable servicemen to perform fuel-saving improvements on furnaces for nominal costs. Some of the modifications for oil furnaces covered by Bill

Kemp, public affairs officer of the NCOJ and Gerald Matthews, technical director of the NCOJ, included installing more efficient burners, automatic flue dampers and automatic set-back thermostats. The burner firing rate

can also be improved by installing a smaller nozzle and modifying the combustion air system.

Other topics covered included fuel oil, basic combustion principles, combustion chambers, heat exchangers, excess air effects on heat transfer and smoke production, draft and

draft regulators, measuring draft, smoke, carbon dioxide, gas temperature, efficiency charts, record keeping and homeowner contract.

Combustion testing, student equipment practice, equipment adjustments, energy conservation options such as firing rate determination and optimization, re-

placement flame retention burners, replacement boiler, burners or furnace burners, automatic vent dampers and automatic set back thermostats were discussed also at the workshop.

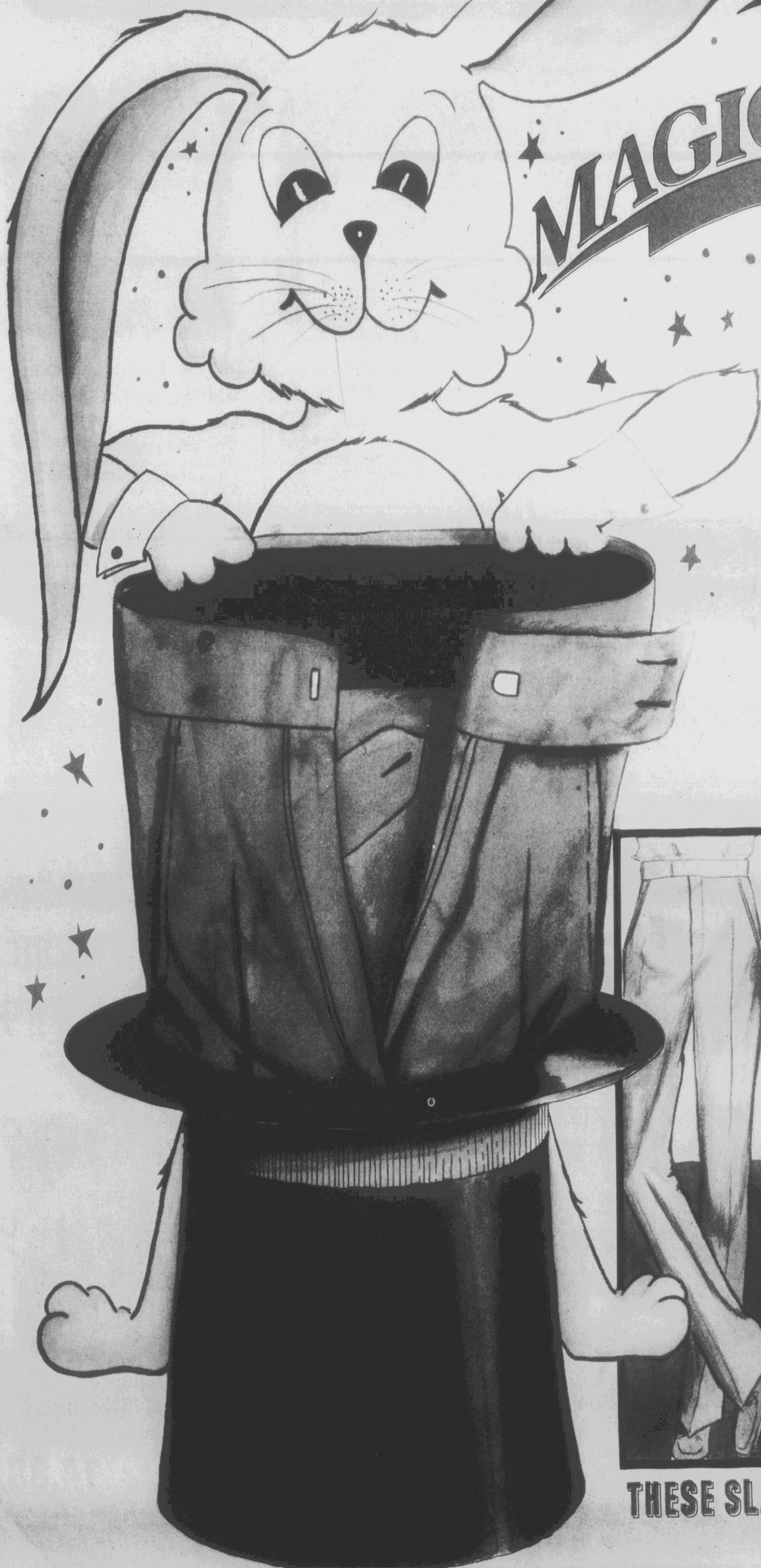

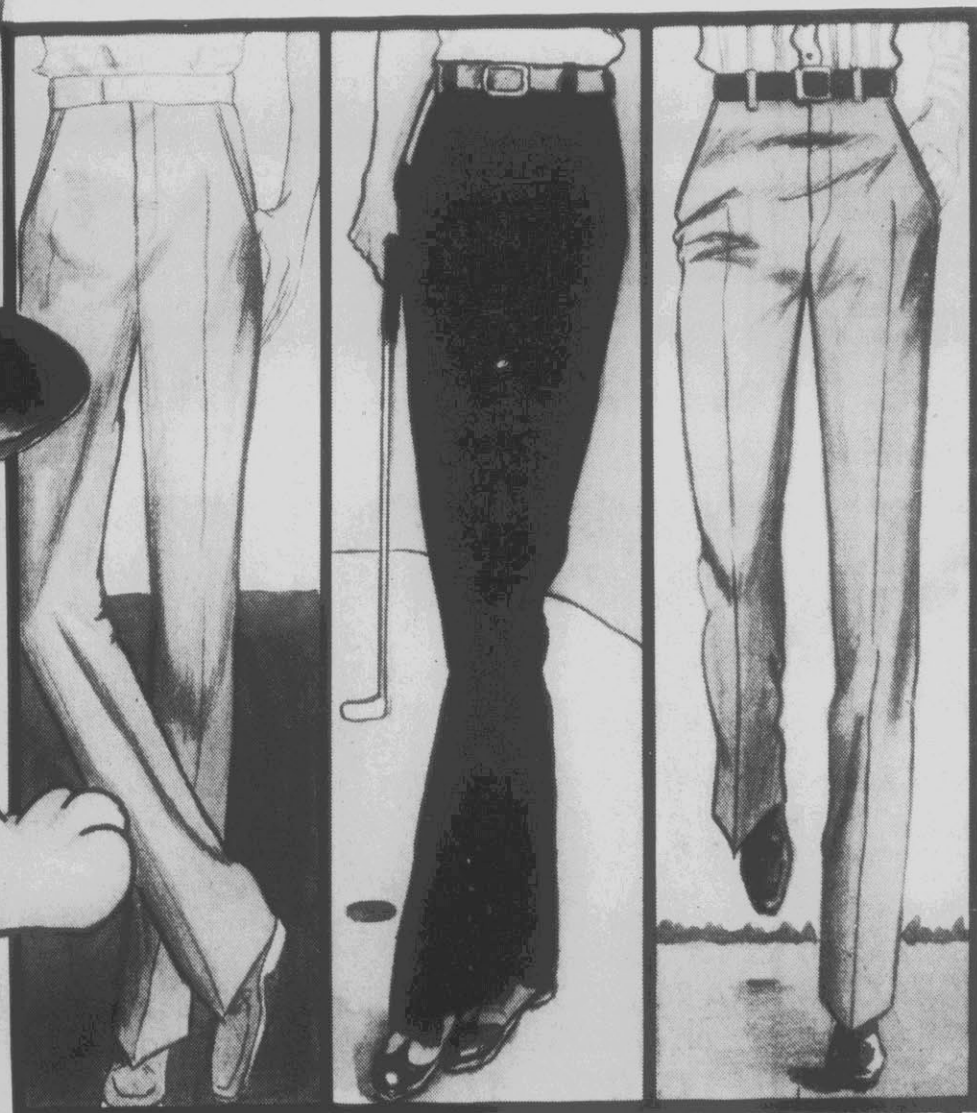

# Disabled Tanker Is Expected Gain Port Thursday

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Aided by favorable weather, the disabled oil tanker Esso Portland continues its towed voyage to Hampton Roads, where it is expected to arrive for repairs early Thursday, the Coast Guard said.

The tanker was reported halfway between Cape Lookout, N.C. and Cape Hatteras, N.C., Tuesday night, said Chief Petty Officer Thomas Dickey.

The journey was aided by good weather off the North Carolina Coast, and the tanker was reporting no problems, Dickey said.

The Coast Guard cutter Madrona had relieved the

cutter Cunifer to escort the tanker into Hampton Roads, he said.

Additional tugs will meet the tanker at the lower entrance to Chesapeake Bay early Thursday and shepherd her into port, said Coast Guard Lt. Cmdr. H.F. Hirsh,

chief of port operations in Hampton Roads.

The vessel had been expected to arrive in port Wednesday morning, but Coast Guard officials said its arrival time was delayed when a decision was made to cut down on its towing speed

so that it could be towed into Chesapeake Bay in daylight.

The Esso Portland began taking on water Saturday morning about 26 miles off Cape Fear, N.C., when a 24-inch valve used to bring in sea water to the engine room for use as a coolant jammed

open, allowing water to rush in.

Divers had fashioned a patch over the valve's intake port below the Esso Portland's waterline late Saturday night, but it failed to hold, so they sealed the patch Sunday afternoon.

The tanker was so weighted down with water that when divers succeeded in plugging the leak, its freeboard — the distance between deck and waterline — had dropped from a normal 25 feet to about 4 feet.

The ship Tuesday had

slightly more than 18 feet of freeboard and apparently was in no trouble, the Coast Guard said.

Some of the tanker's crude oil was pumped into a barge alongside to make the vessel easier to tow.

The Coast Guard said no

oil escaped into the Atlantic.

Coast Guard and Navy helicopters evacuated eight of the Esso Portland's 28 crew members on Saturday.

The remaining crew members will stay on the tanker while it is being towed, Dickey said.

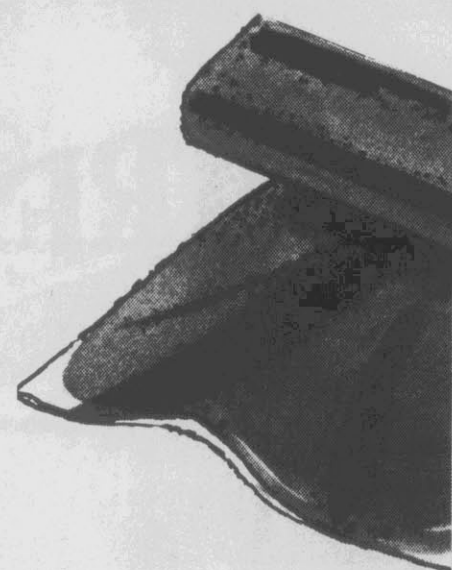

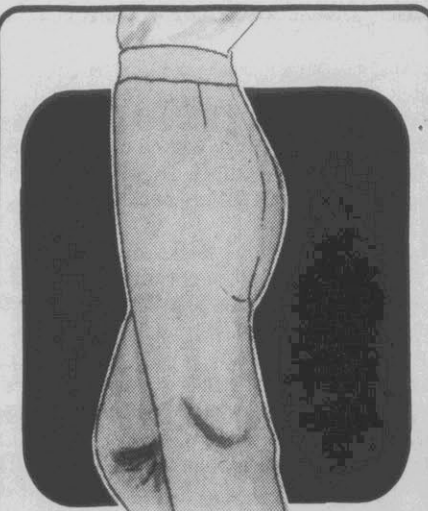

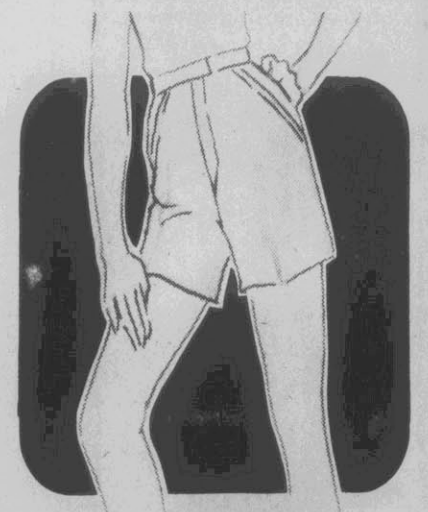

# Venus Probe Finds 'Surprises' On Clouded Planet

WASHINGTON (AP) — An American spacecraft circling Venus, stealing glances through misty veils, has seen most of the planet's face for the first time and has found some remarkable features.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said today that Pioneer Venus 1 has mapped more than 83 percent of the planet's surface since arriving in December 1978 and will have covered 93 percent by month's end.

The unmanned spacecraft has mapped huge continent-sized uplifts, deep rift valleys, mountains as high as Everest and giant, shallow craters.  
For a planet once thought to be drab and featureless beneath its thick layer of

clouds, scientists say Venus turns out to be a stunner. Her features are a combination of the familiar and the alien, and scientists can only speculate about the reasons for both.  
The men charting Venus' face have tentatively decided

to name the planet's features after women, both real and imagined. Major features will be named for goddesses, minor ones for other mythical female figures and still smaller objects for famous Earth women now deceased.

The proposed designations have to be made official by the International Astronomical Union.  
Pioneer Venus soon will finish mapping most of Venus, except for the polar regions, and then begin going back over old ground again.

The mapping process involves converting continuous altitude measurements and radar images along the spacecraft's orbital path into contour and relief maps.  
Dr. Harold Masursky of the U.S. Geological Survey and Dr. Gordon Pettingill of

the Massachusetts Institute of technology, the principal scientists for the mapping experiments, say 60 percent of Venus' surface is relatively flat, rolling plains.  
These plains, roughly equivalent to Earth's sea level, vary in height by only about 300 feet, they say. Only about 16 percent of the surface lies below these planet-circling planes and 24 percent above them, they add.

Low-lying regions are much more common on Earth, scientists say, where the ocean basins occupy nearly two-thirds of the surface compared to one-sixth of waterless Venus.

The largest of the highland regions, roughly similar to the Earth's continents, is an area half as large as Africa. This region, stretching 6,000 miles on Venus' equator, has been named Terra Aphrodite after the Greek goddess of love, known to the Romans as Venus.

The highest and most dramatic highland region is in the north and has been tentatively named Ishtar Terra after the Babylonian goddess of love and war, who was the daughter of the Moon and sister of the Sun.

Several mountain ranges sit atop Ishtar, which is the size of the continental United States, including one called Maxwell Montes. One peak in this range is 35,300 feet above "sea level," dwarfing the 29,028-foot Everest, Earth's highest.

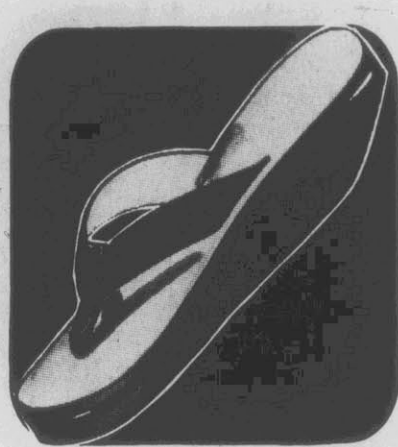

# Congressman, 3 Others Indicted In Abscam Probe

NEW YORK (AP) — A Pennsylvania representative who recently defeated 16 challengers in a primary election is the first member of Congress indicted in the Abscam corruption investigation.

Rep. Michael O. Myers and Camden, N.J., Mayor Angelo J. Errichetti were named Tuesday in federal bribery charges stemming from the undercover FBI investigation, which has been called the bureau's most sweeping inquiry into suspected corruption in 25 years.

It was the second set of indictments to be handed down in the Abscam investigation, in which seven other members of Congress reportedly have been implicated. All have said they are innocent of any wrongdoing.

Also indicted Tuesday were Louis Johanson, a Philadelphia city councilman, and Howard Criden, a Philadelphia attorney, both of whom were indicted last week on similar charges by a grand jury in Philadelphia.

All four were charged with conspiring from July 1979 to February 1980 to commit bribery and defraud the government by demanding and agreeing to receive money in return for Myers' influence in performance of official acts.

Asked late Tuesday whether he took any money, Myers replied, "I'm not going to even talk about whether I did or not. I will answer this in court....In my opinion, I have broken no laws and done nothing wrong."

Errichetti said he would defend himself vigorously, "be vindicated" and remain in office as mayor and state senator.

Johansen and Criden were not available for comment immediately.

No date was set for arraignments.

Asked whether more indictments could be expected, one source involved in the case told reporters, "I wouldn't take a long vacation."

During the investigation, code-named for Arab scam, undercover agents posed as the representative of a wealthy Arab investor and offered bribes to help the fictitious client establish residence and investments in the United States.

The indictments issued Tuesday by a grand jury in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn alleged that an FBI undercover agent posing as a Mideast businessman was told Myers would help him remain in the United States for \$100,000 cash.

The indictment alleged that Myers received an initial \$50,000 for assuring the agent he would introduce private immigration bills to allow him to remain in the country. Myers allegedly shared the \$50,000 payment with the other defendants, keeping \$15,000 for himself, and later demanded an additional \$35,000, according to the indictment.

Errichetti was accused of steering the undercover agent to Myers.

The second count in the indictment charged Myers with bribery and the other

three defendants with aiding and abetting bribery. The third count charged the four with interstate travel in aid of a racketeering enterprise.

The charges carry penalties of up to 25 years

imprisonment.

Myers, 37, a former longshoreman, is seeking a third term in office and swept a crowded field during recent Democratic primary elections for the 1st District seat. He was given a six-

month suspended sentence last year after he was charged with assault and battery in connection with a fight in the bar of an Arlington, Va., hotel.

He allegedly assaulted a 19-year-old female cashier

and a male security guard while he and companions were celebrating after swearing-in ceremonies on the first day of the new Congress.

Myers denied being present during the incident. He

pleaded no contest to reduced charges of disorderly conduct.

Errichetti, 51, who has said he met with undercover FBI agents to discuss the possibility of building a refinery in Camden, is in his second

term as mayor and first full term as state senator. In 1973, he was acquitted of charges of conspiracy and misconduct in the way he awarded contracts while public works director of Camden.

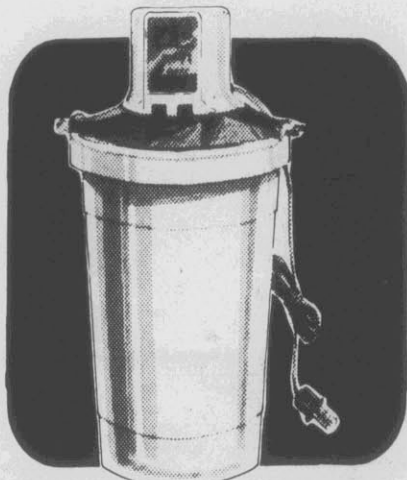

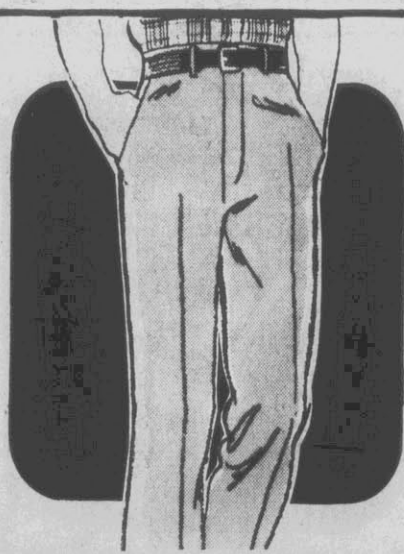

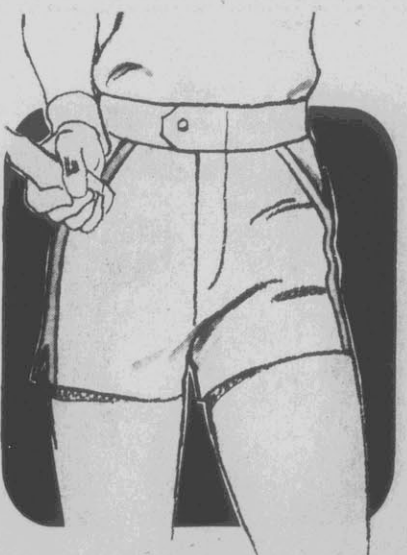

# For Some, More Than A Ten Percent Pay Increase

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Gov. Jim Hunt and legislative leaders have proposed a 10 percent pay raise for teachers and state employees, but all certified teachers and many state

employees will get a larger raise than that if Hunt's budget proposal is approved intact. In addition to the cost of living pay raise, all teachers will benefit from a new salary schedule, and many state employees will gain

additional money through merit raises and other adjustments to the state pay scale. In fact, the budget proposal of the governor and the Advisory Budget Commission would provide an increase of as much as \$2,000

— or 19.3 percent — for entry-level teachers. "Every teacher is going to get more than 10 percent (in salary increases)," said Bruce Harrington, analyst with the state budget office. "Every teacher is going to get something above 10 per-

cent just by going to the new salary scale, even if it's just \$1," he added. House and Senate appropriations committees members got their first look at the new salary scale for teachers Tuesday when they met for an advanced look at the

proposed supplemental budget. The budget would spend 80 percent of the anticipated \$358-million surplus on increased salaries and benefits. The North Carolina Association of Educators, representing teachers and

other school employees, has asked for a 15 percent cost-of-living raise. But in a prepared statement Tuesday, the NCAE praised the total package now before the Legislature as a "tremendous step forward." Some Republican

legislators criticized the pay raises as excessive. "They're getting a larger increase than 10 percent. It's a lot bigger," said Sen. Cass Ballenger, R-Hickory. "It's the biggest political bribe in the history of politics. They (Democrats) are getting 160,000 voters."

"In our budget today we've kept in mind everybody but the taxpayers," said Sen. Donald Kincaid, R-Lenoir, Senate minority leader. "We have a tremendous surplus, but we're not doing anything with the taxpayer in mind." According to state budget office figures, the average pay raise for teachers will be 12.5 percent; for state employees, 12.9 percent; for community college employees, 13.5 percent; and for university employees, 15 percent.

But the amount of actual pay raises for teachers and state employees would vary depending on length of experience and other factors. The minimum salary for beginning teachers, for instance, would go from the current \$10,380 a year to \$12,380 a year, or 19.3 percent.

For a typical teacher now at the 7th-year salary step, earning \$12,610 a year, the increase would be 17.7 percent, to \$14,840.

The maximum basic state salary now earned by teachers with the most experience, \$14,540, would increase to \$16,220, or 11.6 percent, this fall. State analysts said one-third of the state's public school teachers are in that bracket.

But the most experienced teachers will continue to benefit from the new salary scale over the next four years. The new package would establish more salary steps to progress through over the next four years, reaching a maximum of \$19,610 at the new top scale.

It will be four years, however, before any reach that level, and by then future increases will have driven that salary even higher.

Those figures do not include other pay benefits some teachers also will be able to receive, such as \$100 a month extra for having an advanced teaching certificate, \$200 a month more for a doctorate degree and local supplements.

Lobbyists for two associations representing state employees say some state workers will receive only the 10 percent pay raise, getting no additional pay for merit, longevity or the addition of another step in their salary ladder.

**Newspaper On Display Screen**

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Central Ohio residents soon will be able to read their newspaper on video display screens in their homes.

The Columbus Dispatch announced plans Tuesday to transmit the news into home computers through telephone lines starting July 1.

Subscribers will be able to call up almost every story which appeared in the day's paper, including state, local, suburban and national news, sports and entertainment articles and feature stories, newspaper officials said.

Initially, the newspaper plans to make information in each day's newspaper available after 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. The Sunday paper also will become available, officials said.

Later, classified and other

forms of advertising from The Dispatch will be added.

The evening newspaper, which has a circulation of 202,950 daily and 341,567 on Sunday, is working in conjunction with CompuServe Inc. of Columbus to become the first daily newspaper in the United States to offer such a service.

Subscribers must furnish their own computers, which can be purchased at many electronics shops. Some have

video display screens while others are for use with a television screen.

A special coupler will connect the home computer to the telephone lines for electronic transmission of the news. CompuServe will charge users on a per-minute basis.

"There is no thought that

this would replace the home subscription at this point," said executive editor Carl DeBloom. "Maybe some day newspapers won't be delivered to the door the way we know it, but that's along way off."

DeBloom said about 250 subscribers currently have home computers.

# State JC President Loses Chapter Support

**RALEIGH, N.C. (AP)** — The Jaycee jelly sale controversy may have cost former state Jaycee president J. Harold Herring the support of at least one large state chapter in his bid for the national Jaycee presidency. Durham Jaycees Tuesday night voted to withdraw their support of Herring. They also expressed their anger over a decision by a state committee to write-off as a business expense more than \$50,000 diverted from charity funds to the Jaycees national membership fund.

Meanwhile, a Wisconsin Jaycee who had withdrawn from the race to clear the way for Herring's presidency, announced Tuesday that he is re-entering. A Wisconsin delegation spokesman said Jaycees there "knew there was something wrong with the memberships in North Carolina, but we didn't know exactly what, and we never figured it would come to the surface in this way."

The state chairman of the jelly sales said Tuesday he had started soliciting support among the group's executive committee to try to reverse the vote to write off \$50,388 in charity funds. James G. Farmer, a Wilson Jaycee, said he has found widespread anger about the decision. "They've been out selling jelly in the rain and snow, busting their rear ends. They want every penny to go to the burn center," he said. Farmer, who has headed the jelly sales campaign for the past three years, said that if necessary, he and other Jaycees would set up a structure outside the state organization to funnel money to the center.

# New Courses Are Discussed

The Business Administration Advisory Committee of PCC met recently on the PCC campus to discuss implementation of new courses. Committee Chairperson Frank Sutton briefed the committee on the major points concerning the implementation of a new payroll accounting course. 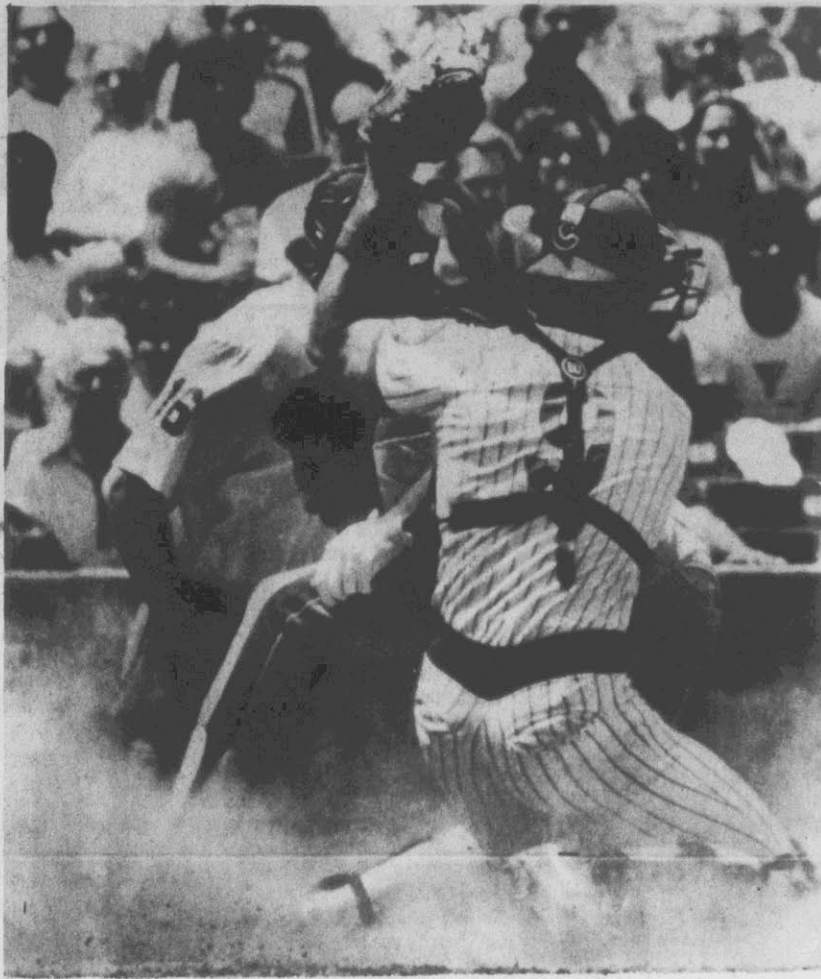

SNOW HILL — Greene Central's power supply has been short-circuited during the playoffs, but Coach Jim Fulghum is confident the outage will be corrected before the state 3-A tournament ends.

All season Al Murray and Donald Shaw have been the Rams' power pair. Shaw hit .386 and Murray .420 during the regular season. So far in the playoffs the duo has one hit in 12 at bats.

"Neither one's hitting the ball well," Greene Central coach Jim Fulghum said. "But they're gonna get their hits. And when they hit we usually hit the ball real well as a team."

"For two and a half years they've hit the ball awfully well and I'm sure right now their confidence is a little shaky. The chunkeys have worked on them. They're in the meat of the order and the pitchers have really bore down on them."

"It's hard to say we can win without them."

But the Rams have and tonight (8 p.m.) Greene Central plays host to Western Guilford in the semifinals of the state tournament. Greene Central, now 22-3, defeated Roanoke Rapids, 4-2, in the opening round of the playoffs and then nipped defending state 3-A champ White Oak, 3-2, last week to get into Wednesday's game.

Against White Oak, it was Murray's glove — not his bat — that helped the Rams win. After scoring the tying run in the sixth, Murray saved the game with an outstanding catch at the fence in deep centerfield in the bottom of the eighth with two men on.

It was a game the Rams had been looking forward to since the Vikings defeated them, 4-1, last season in the playoffs. "We knew if we were going to win the state title White Oak was going to be an obstacle," Fulghum said. "But in the playoffs everybody is an obstacle."

Including Greene Central. "Right now we're playing better than we did this year in the conference, especially the latter part of the year," Fulghum said. "We're making the big plays and have lately been creating them. You just hope you don't create the plays for the other team."

The latest obstacle in the Rams' path is Triad 3-A Conference foe Western Guilford. The Hornets, who hit .336 as a team this season and had 24 home runs, defeated Southern Alamance, 9-6, and South Johnston, 5-4, to set up Wednesday's semifinal battle.

Western Guilford, now 20-2, starts seven seniors, including three all-conference performers: centerfielder Charlie Waynick (.417), third baseman David Bartenfield (.368) and first baseman Mike Everette (.345). Junior shortstop Kevin Hanner leads the Hornets in hitting with a .429 average.

Junior Kenny Clunan, 4-1, will start on the mound for the Hornets. Western's #1 pitcher, Donny Inman, 10-0, has not pitched since the Southern Alamance game because of a sore elbow.

Other starters for the Hornets are leftfielder Ricky Lanier, rightfielder Chris Wilhoit (.339), catcher Dow Nichols and second baseman Ken Inman.

To combat the Hornet attack, Fulghum is expected to start Kevin Korpi, now 12-0 after winning both playoff games.

"I don't have any other choice," Fulghum said. "If the games had been scheduled differently, I would have had to start someone else. But he's done the job for us so far."

That job includes a 4-2 win over Roanoke Rapids in which he allowed only one earned run and struck out 10 while walking three and a 3-2 win over White Oak, a game in which he dueling White Oak fireballer Mike Horne. Korpi struck out three and did not walk a batter while giving up only his third and fourth earned runs in 87 1/3 innings this season.

### The Olympics

#### Officials Predict Further Participation Struggles

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet and Western officials here predict further struggles over participation in the Moscow Olympics despite the publication Tuesday of an authoritative list of participants.

The list, issued by the International Olympic Committee in Lausanne, Switzerland, said 85 nations had applied by last Saturday's deadline to participate in the Moscow

Games — three fewer than participated in the 1976 Montreal Olympics.

But Soviet and IOC officials have indicated 0 1/2 — 1 1/2 Kvi k 3/4 v l big medal-winners at Montreal. Present will be the other top medalists at Montreal — the Soviet Union, East Germany, Poland and Romania.

"In the opinion of the sports public and many government figures, the idea of a boycott of

the Games has failed," said Novikov.

The IOC list showed that teams from 29 countries had unofficially declined to participate, and that 27 other countries hadn't yet responded to the Moscow organizers' invitation.

In Washington, the White House insisted the Carter administration's efforts to punish

### Mavericks' Role Model: Tampa Bay Buccaneers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Dallas Mavericks, the newest member of the National Basketball Association, have a role model for their early years: football's Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"Tampa Bay went the young route, building through the college draft, and that's the way we want to go," says Rick Sund, director of player personnel for the expansion team that begins play in the NBA next season.

But for the time being, the Mavericks will also need some veterans to tide them over. And they'll get them today when they select 22 players from the expansion pool provided by the existing teams.

The selection process was scheduled to be the first order of business at the three-day summer meetings of the NBA coaches and general managers, which run through Friday.

Each NBA club was allowed to protect eight players, which means the pickings were expected to be quite slim.

"Maybe we'll get lucky," said Mavericks vice president Norm Sonju. "Hopefully we will be able to get a few players to build with."

While some familiar names were expected to be available,

they all came with negative qualifications. Some were old, some had histories of injuries or attitude problems, some had lofty salaries or were free agents.

Among the players in this category who were reportedly available to Dallas — the list has not been officially released — were guards Nate Archibald and Pete Maravich of Boston, Austin Carr of Cleveland, Charlie Scott of Denver, Eric Money of Detroit, Earl Monroe of New York, Doug Collins of Philadelphia, Dave Twardzik of Portland and John Williamson of Washington and forwards Rick Barry of Houston, Spencer Haywood of Los Angeles, Dave Meyers of Milwaukee, Marvin Barnes of San Diego and Bobby Dandridge of Washington.

# Ray—A Miniature Ali

NEW CARROLLTON, Md. (AP) — The ever-confident Sugar Ray Leonard appears more and more to resemble a smaller version of Muhammad Ali.

"I'm not trying to pattern myself after Ali," Leonard said Tuesday, "but then again, I can become an Ali, financially."

Leonard made his comments as he formally opened preparations for defense of his World Boxing Council welterweight title against Roberto Duran in Montreal on June 20, a fight that could earn Leonard some \$8.5 million.

Leonard sparred four rounds with his cousin, Odell Leonard, and four with Mike James, knocking down the latter with a hard left to the body.

Afterwards, Leonard, 23, an Olympic Gold Medal winner in 1976 who is undefeated in 27 bouts as a professional, told the crowd that watched him train, "This is going to be the greatest fight in the history of boxing."

"I'm not trying to be like Ali," said Leonard, who weighs 144 pounds but expects to weigh 146 to 147 by fight time. "It's the truth."

Leonard again took verbal shots at Duran, the 28-year-old who has 70 victories and one defeat, boasting 55 knockouts.

"They are all talking about how bad Duran is," said Leonard, who won the WBC title from Wilfredo Benitez last November and successfully defended it against Dave Green in March. "They are all saying Duran is going to destroy Leonard... That his eyes are so penetrating. Well, he don't hit with his eyes."

"Duran won't be able to hit me like he did his recent opponents. They all stood up straight. I'm concentrating on being elusive. They say Duran is such a devastating puncher. My little son could knock somebody out if he isn't moving. I'm not going to take his punches."

Aase hurled a four-hitter, registering the first complete game by a California pitcher since May 6, as the Angels defeated the Texas Rangers 2-0.

The Soviets for their military action in Afghanistan was successful. "The fact (is) that of all the medals won by non-Soviet block nations in '76, something like a little better than 70 percent of the teams and federations that won those medals will not be participating in Moscow," said Jody Powell, Carter's chief spokesman.

However, Powell's figures ignored that the majority of medals awarded in 1976 went to the Soviet Union and its allies — 336 out of 613. Of those remaining, the United States won 34 percent.

Powell acknowledged that "obviously, there are different ways to divide it. You know that old quotation about 'figures don't lie but...'"

Tass stressed in a commentary Tuesday that there were "various reasons" other than political considerations for the decisions of some countries not to show up. Tass said these included financial problems and insufficient training of athletes.

## Top 3 Ready For College Series

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The universities of Miami, Arizona and California will all be carrying big sticks in the College World Series which opens here Friday.

They're ranked 1-2-3 in an impressive lineup of teams as the final eight gather here to decide the national championship.

While Miami has the best record in the field, 57-10, the Wildcats and Golden Bears spent most of the season beating up on each other in the powerful Pac-10 Conference.

Then there's Hawaii, frustrated for years in its quest for a World Series berth, coming into Omaha with 57-16 record and a young, free-wheeling team which blasted its way through the NCAA central regional.

Florida State posted a 51-10 record this season, had a sparkling .304 team batting mark and averaged just over 10 runs a game. Coach Mike Martin is in his first year at the helm, but inherited a strong ballclub from Dick Hower, now employed by the New York Yankees.

"I'm very excited about going to Omaha," Martin said. "This is something you really dream about."

Clemson, ranked fourth in the nation, put together a 38-19 season in the ACC and had to beat a tough South Carolina club to win a place in the series. The Tigers impressed a lot of people this year, including their coach.

"I rank this as my most gratifying season," said Bill Wilhelm, who has coached at Clemson for 23 years. "It's not all that talented of a ballclub but they do give their best effort and you can't ask for more than that."

Friday night's opening games match St. John's against Arizona and Florida State against Hawaii. On Saturday night, Clemson takes on Miami and Michigan meets California to complete the first-round of the double-elimination NCAA championship tournament.

Michigan and St. John's come into the College World Series with the usual handicap of northern teams — a short schedule.

While Miami, Florida State,

Arizona and California each played more than 60 games, Michigan put together a record of 35-16-1 while St. John's is 29-9.

"It's a brand-new team (Coach Bud Middaugh is in his first year) and 13 of our 20 players are in their first year," said a Michigan team spokesman. "About halfway through the season the players realized they weren't that bad and really started playing ball."

# Naber, Rudolph: The Memories Frozen Forever

The moments are frozen in their memories, magic moments when they were the very best in the world at what they did best.

No Olympic boycott can ever take those moments away from swimmer John Naber and sprinter Wilma Rudolph.

In 1976 at Montreal, Naber captured four gold medals and a silver. Sixteen years before, in Rome, Rudolph became the first American woman to take home three golds. For both of them, and for the rest of us as well, they were moments to remember.

"I think the race I remember best, the one I'm fondest of, was the 100-meter backstroke," Naber said. "It is the race that sticks in my mind."

You would think that in the Olympic pool, with water splashing around you, adrenalin would take over and a swimmer would rely on his instincts, not terribly aware of the kind of show he was putting on in any given race. But that's just not true. At least it wasn't for Naber.

"Swimmers have something we call 'the catch,'" he said. The catch involves a swimmer's stroke and how he moves through the water. "Well, in that race, I had perfect catch," Naber continued. "Every stroke was perfect. I knew it was going very well."

So did the other swimmers. After the race, Roland Matthes of East Germany, the defending champion who had to settle for a bronze at Montreal, paid tribute to Naber. "If I could have, I'd have stopped halfway and applauded," he said. It was the ultimate compliment from one athlete to another.

Naber later struck Olympic gold again in the 200-meter backstroke and a pair of relay races.

Rudolph's magic moments came in 1960 when she ran right through the women's track competition at Rome, winning the 100 and 200-meter dashes and anchoring the USA's gold medal 400-meter relay team. Her memories of the individual races are mostly funny, though.

"I was scared," she said, "a nervous wreck."

Why? "Well, you know the commands before a race...On your mark...Get set...Go! Well, I couldn't remember the commands in Italian."

Since that was the operative language in the Rome Olympics, it could have been a problem. But somehow Rudolph overcame the handicap to win her golds.

The medals are nice, of course, solid evidence that they were the very best. And yet the other things these Olympians remember overlap the races they won. There is more to competing in the Games than merely winning, you see. There are the memories, magic moments that Naber and Rudolph can hang on to forever, memories America's 1980 Olympians won't have.

And that is what Naber and Rudolph wonder about now, in the wake of the Olympic boycott which will keep the United States away from the 1980 Games in Moscow.

"I've got my hardware," said Naber. "The people I think about are the ones who haven't won theirs yet and won't get a chance to this summer because of the boycott." He wonders about people like Tracy Caulkins and Cynthia Woodhead and Brian Goodell and Joe Bottom, swimmers for whom Moscow would have been their Olympics.

"Frankly, athletes are pawns," Naber continued. "If I were still competing, I'd be frustrated. I feel for them. They're the best in the world, world champions but nobody knows that from a hill of beans. Unless you win the Olympic gold medal, nobody knows you."

Rudolph agrees. "I think the country owes something to those athletes who've worked so hard, pointing for the Olympics," she said. "They must be made to know that the public cares about their sacrifice."

Naber and Rudolph are touring the country as part of an Olympic project sponsored by Minute Maid, the Coca Cola Company's food division.

The corporation is determined, boycott notwithstanding, that America's 1980 Olympians will not be overlooked. It will present special awards to athletes who qualify for the team and establish training funds in the names of America's top performers in each of the 23 Summer Game sports.

There also will be a dinner, saluting the top individuals in each of those sports, timed to coincide with the closing of the Moscow Games. And maybe, in some small fashion, that will give these Olympians a moment of their own to remember.

## Conner Will Compete Long After 1980 Games

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Bart Conner, one of the best gymnasts in America, says he plans to compete long after the 1980 Olympic Games are over.

"When we came down here, we knew full well that we weren't going," said the 22-year-old University of Oklahoma student, who captured the No. 1 spot on the men's Olympic gymnastics team Tuesday night.

### West Texas St. Gets Probation

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — West Texas State University was placed on two years probation by the Missouri Valley Conference for a series of violations in five athletic programs over three school years.

The penalty includes one year of sanctions prohibiting the university's teams from participating in post-season competition during the 1980-81 school year. The football and basketball teams will be prohibited from competing in any post-season play that year and the university will not be allowed to share in basketball revenue generated by the conference.

"I plan on competing long past the Olympic games (this summer), maybe one or two more Olympics," he said. "I treated this as just another important competition. I don't think of the ramifications of the team that won't go."

Conner said he adjusted his attitude throughout the boycott controversy from one of disbelief into one of acceptance.

"You say 'Okay, what's important to me?' I decided to compete... I can still hang on. For some of the guys who are marginal, this was the crowning blow."

Conner, 22, who finished competition Tuesday with a torn muscle in his right bicep, had led the men's event going into the finals.

Tracee Talavera led 21 competitors for the six spots on the women's national team. Talavera, a slim 13-year-old who captured the hearts of the 8,068 fans who packed the Jacksonville Coliseum, said she had been inspired by Romania's star Nadia Comaneci, who dominated the 1976 Olympics in Montreal.

"The whole Romanian team was good and Nadia Comaneci — she just hits all the time," said Talavera after winning the top overall spot on the team.

"I'm just glad it's over,"

added the 4-foot-9, 74½-pound athlete. "Even though we're not going to Moscow, it's an honor to make the team, and everybody wants to be on it but only six can."

Joining Conner on the men's team are Jim Hartung, 19, of Nebraska; Peter Vidmar, 18, a UCLA freshman; Ron Galimore, 21, of Iowa State; Philip Cahoy, 18, of Nebraska; Larry Gerard, 25, of Nebraska, and one alternate, Mike Wilson, 23, of the University of Oklahoma.

Joining Talavera on the women's squad are Kathy Johnson, 20; Marcia Frederick, 17; Luci Collins, 15; Amy Koopman, 13; Julianne McNamara, no age available; and Beth Kline, 13. The hometowns and schools of the women were not available.

Talavera scored 76.95 to win the overall title, followed by Johnson at 76.55 and Frederick at 76.150. Conner wound up with 57.20 points in the optional competition for a total of 115.20, while Hartung followed close behind with 114.30. Vidmar was third at 114.25.

Although the U.S. team will not go to Moscow, the athletes will compete in various international meets, including events in West Germany and the Netherlands. The team also will tour the United States.

# Watson Looks To Kemper Open

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — Tom Watson will attempt to extend his remarkable success string this week as the PGA Tour makes its first appearance in the Washington, D.C., area.

"When you've got it going, you just try to keep it going, win all you can as fast as you can," Watson said after a practice round over the famed Congressional Country Club course, a hilly, 7,054-yard, par-70 layout in the northern suburbs of the national capital.

The highly regarded course was the site of the 1964 U.S. Open and the 1976 PGA national championship. But the 1980 Kemper Open, which begins Thursday and carries a whopping purse of \$400,000,

marks the first appearance of a regular Tour event in the area.

It is not a completely new event, however. The tournament was played the last 10 years in Charlotte, N.C., but was moved north this season by the sponsor and PGA Tour Commissioner Deane Beman, a native of Bethesda. The tournament has a four-year contract at Congressional and is expected to become a fixture on the schedule.

"We're very pleased and excited about adding the Washington-Baltimore area to our schedule," Beman said.

The purse, with \$72,000 going to the winner, is among the richest on the Tour this year. It is exceeded only by the

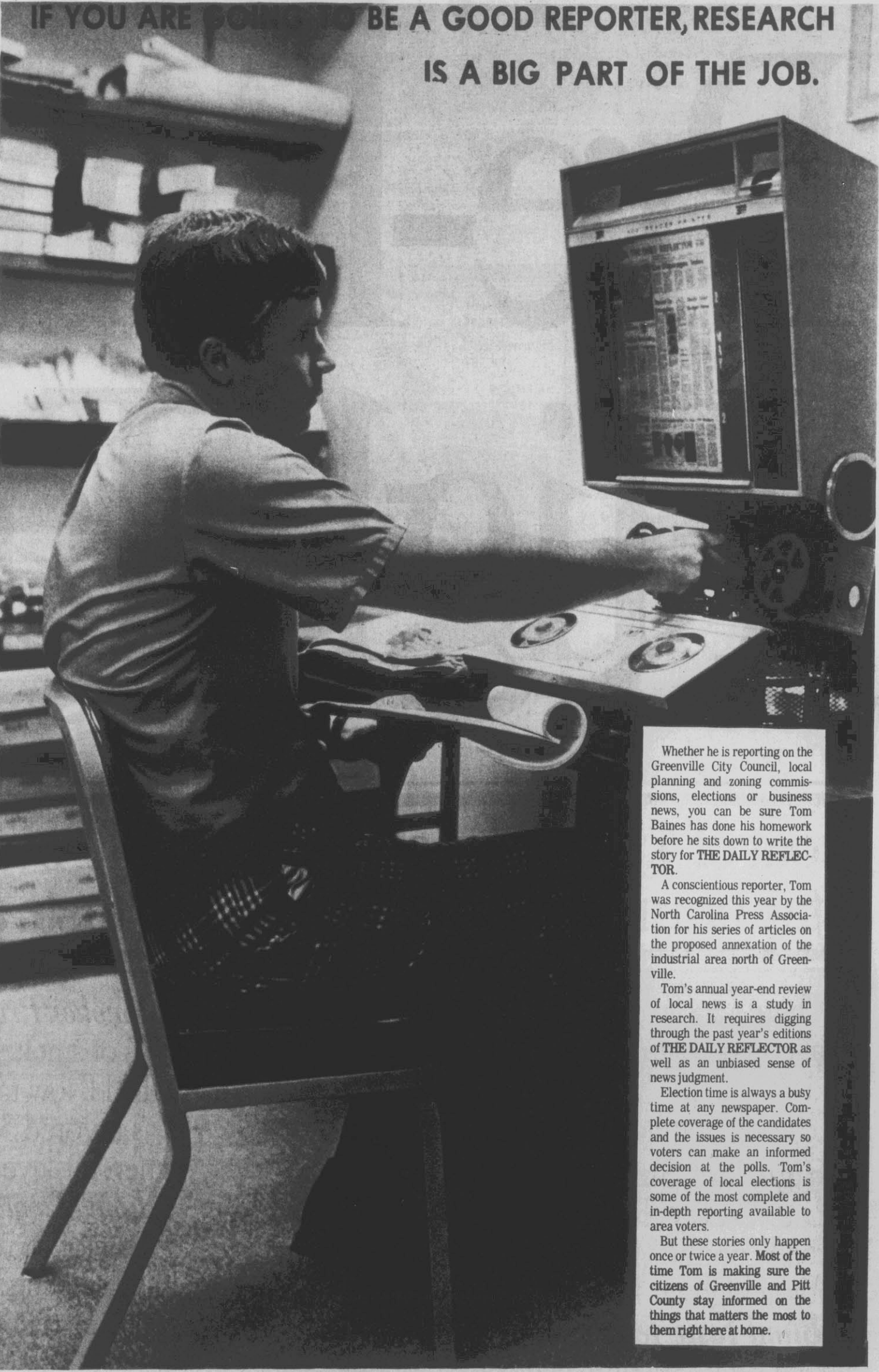
Tournament Players Championship.

The big payoff schedule and the quality of the course has helped attract a strong field of 156. It is headed, of course, by Watson, whose one-stroke loss last week did nothing to detract from his standing as the game's outstanding performer.

His second-place check made him only the third man in Tour history to go past \$2 million in career earnings and boosted his season-leading mark to \$346,125.

And the chances are very good that when the tournament comes down the last few holes Sunday, he'll be in the hunt.

## Movie Close; Doesn't Focus

"The Gong Show Movie" now playing at the Plaza Cinema comes within several stone throws of being a first-rate crackpot entertainment. It moves along breezily as in the Gong television show on which it is based whenever the focus is on the escapades of show participants.

But the focus is never focused. Instead of the excitement that sharply realized vignettes of the bizarre, and often freshly entertaining acts that the television show provided, we are given instead snippets of these acts. In fact, these all too brief tidbits are sandwiched in randomly around the drawn-out, tale of woe of how rough it is to be Chuck Barris, harassed and hounded by the demands of fame.

At first, it's possible to feel a little sympathy for Mr. Barris, but after about the 19th incident underscoring the lack of privacy for one whose face is like a household word, the whole process becomes tedious — and more and more heavy-handed. Eventually, the question arises if Mr. Barris is indeed that familiar to the great American public.

The infrequent scenes that do give the unknown, unnamed performers their moments before the camera are never realized as fully as they were in the TV show — and fans of the show will recognize a few of the zany acts.

One of the best things in this mismatched undertaking is the presence of that saucy, uninhibited lady of the big smile and gritty wit, Jaye P. Morgan. Robin Altman as Barris' girl friend is lovely to look at.

It's unfortunate that Barris (who wrote and directed as well as starred) did not realize that the appeal of The Gong Show rested on the outlandish spectacle of fun offered by hopefuls of all ages and degree of talent — and not on the dreary exposition of his personal neuroses.

## Many Types Of Mutual Funds To Choose From

Mutual funds have been around for many years, but a number of twists have been added in recent years. The result is that investors have many types of funds to choose from today. The current decline in interest rates presents an opportunity to adjust an investment objective to changing economic conditions.

Stock mutual funds are widely owned in the United States. Emphasis in recent

years has been toward income, but stock funds have done relatively well. Last year, according to one survey, equity funds with dividends reinvested rose 29 percent. They showed a loss, however, in the first quarter.

Equity funds come in many varieties. Some buy only stocks for growth and some buy stocks for growth and income. You can even buy shares in a fund which invests only in natural resource stocks, or one that buys only foreign stocks.

Municipal bond funds were not even available in 1975, but they are widely held today. Even this type fund is more specialized now, with one fund buying only municipal issues that are close to maturity. One such fund yields more than six percent, tax free, and offers a relatively stable price since the average maturity of its holdings is 120 days. A longer term fund would provide a higher yield.

Money market funds are probably the most popular

type of mutual fund in existence, particularly with the sharp increase in interest rates in the last year.

Money market funds invest in large denomination securities such as commercial paper, Treasury bills, and bank certificates of deposit which are not generally available to the small investor. Until recently, they offered yields in the 15 percent range. New funds set up after the March imposition of credit controls still yield around 13 percent. And there are specialized types of money market funds. One new fund invests in longer term Treasury notes with 13-48 month maturities. Average maturities of all money market funds are lengthening in an attempt to

keep yields up. Stock or bond funds are generally suitable for accounts with limited investment funds, while money market funds are considered a "parking place" for funds until suitable investments are found.

With interest rates having peaked, investors should

consider the various types of investments which are available. Money market fund yields may continue to decline, while some long term bond yields can be locked in at high rates. Some money market fund assets will likely be invested directly in common stocks for growth.

# Upgrading Of Workers Is Revised

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — After nearly 20 years as a clerk at the State Department of Taxation and Finance here, Shirley F. Cohen is moving into management.

She is one of the first to benefit from a new state program that opens up middle-management posts to civil servants who were once trapped in "dead-end" clerical jobs. It lets rank-and-file workers bypass rules which normally limit management jobs to those with college degrees or other advanced training.

"I've worked very hard for this," says Mrs. Cohen, 56, newly appointed as a personnel administration trainee in the taxation department. She says she had reached the point where "the pyramid narrows" for advancement opportunity, but now will have a chance for better pay, more responsibility and more promotions.

There are about 38,000 state employees — about 85 percent of them women — in clerical positions governed by civil service regulations. For many, the rules keep them in what a union spokesman calls a "clerical ghetto."

The new program will directly affect only a tiny portion of those workers — perhaps 150 each year. But those 150 workers would account for half of the expected 300 or so middle-management openings each year.

And those involved say the opening of the door, however slim, is an important step.

"The people I've worked with look on it as, 'If she can do it, so can I,'" Mrs. Cohen said.

A clerical worker who now earns about \$10,000 per year could earn about \$16,420 per year at the end of a two-year public administration traineeship.

Under a six-point Clerical and Secretarial Employees Advancement program, Mrs. Cohen and others can translate experience and scores on specialized aptitude tests into "bridges" to managerial jobs. The first 62 appointments to a training program were made in recent months.

The clerical workers, used to taking instead of giving orders, will be given training in assertiveness, self-development and stress management, as well as more formal course work.

The program is similar to some in the private sector, but is believed to be the first of its kind among state governments.

It was set up last year under the state's latest contract with the Civil Service Employees Association. But state officials, from Gov. Hugh Carey on down, say they are confident the estimated \$150,000 annual cost will be a good investment in morale and efficiency.

"In every operation there are outstanding secretarial and clerical people who haven't been able to advance," said James Gutowski, who is administering the new program as head of the employee advancement section of the Civil Service Department.

"The reason this was embraced by the state is it makes sense," Gutowski said. "Most of these programs really provide for improved efficiency, productivity and employee morale."

The program is not specifically labeled as a program to advance women within state government.

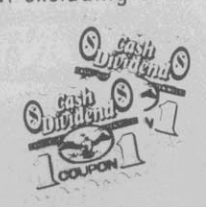

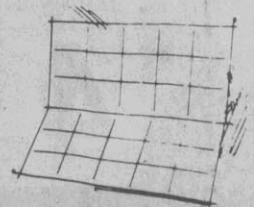

# NBC-TV Preserved From That Cruel Blow Of Baseball Strike

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The baseball season, owing to the intervention of some unseen benevolent force, proceeds as usual. A surprising fit of sanity came over both sides of the dispute just at the edge of a catastrophe, saving the national game.

And, ensuring the equanimity of baseball fans until September or so, when most of the beloved nines are mathematically eliminated from glory.

A strike would have been ugly, and cruel. Baseball, after all, conspired for generations to addict America to its seductive rhythms, employing in its conspiracy unwitting grandfathers and uncles and Moms and Dads,

who sunk the baseball hook into innocent children by gradually revealing to them the game's everlasting vertiges.

Thus, to be a baseball fan is to answer the call of your fathers. An insidious addiction, it is.

But baseball suddenly lost its mind, and fans were left with prospects of a summer of sorrow. Baseball would be gone.

For NBC, baseball withdrawal would have been excruciating. The network's first few weeks of Saturday baseball telecasts rated quite nicely; and 1980 is NBC's turn to televise the lucrative World Series.

Remember, this is a network that has already lost the Summer Olympics. So, NBC had devised an

alternate plan, a baseball fix, so to speak.

On Saturday, where the Game of the Week used to be, NBC scheduled a dialogue on the baseball crisis to be followed by highlights of the sixth game of the '75 World Series between the Reds and Red Sox, the greatest game ever played.

This Saturday, had the pain persisted (and if advertisers didn't mind), NBC planned to televise the early rounds of the College World Series from Omaha. After that, the network would have televised minor league games and even some Japanese baseball.

As awful as a baseball strike would have been, it may have cured the baseball disease. By July, America may not have needed major league baseball.

After a few weeks without a big-league baseball fix, we might have grown accustomed to another brand of the game; different, but in its way more satisfying. How many times have you seen the modern big leaguer go about his job with practiced nonchalance, or heard the grating phrase, "It's just a job, like anything else"?

They don't say that in college ball, or in the minors. In baseball's nether reaches, the game is played with enthusiasm, by players who don't arrive at the park with their publicity agents in tow.

Their version of the game might have caught on. Remember what happened when NBC started paying proper attention to college basketball — viewers tuned out the millionaire businessmen of the NBA and started having fun with the kids. The NBA had to rush out and buy Magic Johnson, whose enthusiasm is chronic, to save itself.

The major league baseball strike might have been the best thing that ever happened to college baseball.

To hell with college baseball. The Dodgers are in first place.

## Angels Producers Deny Fraud Claim

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The producers of the television show "Charlie's Angels" have denied that they tried to defraud actors Natalie Wood and Robert Wagner, part owners of the series, of their share of the show's profits.

The producers, Aaron Spelling and Leonard Goldberg, also criticized journalists for their handling of fraud allegations brought against them.

"While the majority of the news media has been very fair in treating the allegations made against us, a few have been having a sensation-seeking field day," Spelling said after a meeting Tuesday with Los Angeles County district attorney's investigators.

"Even more upsetting than the allegations," he added, "are the innuendoes, distortions and

guilty-until-proven-innocent attitude of many of the stories."

Spelling was accompanied by assistant district attorney Jim Ferruzzo, head of the seven-month investigation into charges that the producers defrauded actors Wagner and Miss Wood, along with "Angels" writers Ivan Goff and Ben Roberts.

Ferruzzo said Tuesday's session was the second meeting with Spelling and Goldberg — whom he referred to as "very respected members of the entertainment community" — and said that no conclusions had been reached in the case.

A district attorney's auditor will cooperate with an outside auditor in reviewing documents seized more than three weeks ago from the offices of Spelling-Goldberg Productions, Ferruzzo said.

must, inevitably, be lost. Postponing the evil moment of payment never makes a bill shrink. Witness South's shortsightedness on this hand.

The bidding was sound in all respects. Having opened a minimum, South did no more than simply rebid spades over his partner's minor-suit responses. By the time he had rebid spades for the third time it was not difficult for North, who was looking at a full opening bid, to realize that his side's best shot for game lay in spades, so he raised with what was, by then, adequate support.

West led the king of hearts and, when he saw the doubleton in dummy, shifted to the queen of spades. In a play highlighted by its futility, declarer grabbed the king and led a second heart. West won and returned another trump, and now declarer had to rely on finding either the diamonds 3-3, or the hand with the long trump also being long in diamonds.

But it was not to be. West ruffed the third diamond and cashed a heart trick for a one-trick set. Another ironclad contract had bitten the dust.

By simply allowing West's queen of spades to win the second trick, declarer could have rendered the contract virtually foolproof. The trump trick had to be lost, and there was good reason why it should be conceded sooner rather than later.

Declarer must assure the uninterrupted run of the diamond suit. If declarer allowed West to win the first trump trick, the best West can do is to cash another heart trick and then lead a second spade. But now declarer can win, draw the last trump and run the diamonds to make his contract.

# Georgia's Electric Chair Being Readied For Use

ATLANTA (AP) — It takes about 10 minutes to put an individual to death in the Georgia electric chair being readied now — after 16 years of disuse — for convicted killer Jack Potts.

Unless he renews his appeals, Potts — denied clemency by the state Board of Pardons and Paroles — will be electrocuted some time between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on June 5 at the Georgia State Prison at Reidsville.

For Potts, convicted of murder and kidnapping in a 1975 crime spree, death will come as it has for 415 others since electrocution replaced hanging in Georgia in 1924 — in a massive, white-painted wooden chair connected by two overhead wires to a transformer.

The last execution occurred on Oct. 16, 1964 when Bernard Dye, a 34-year-old McDuffie County mechanic, was led to the chair protesting his innocence. He was strapped into the chair at 11:10 a.m. that Friday and was pronounced dead at

11:18 a.m. His crime was not a spectacular one.

Acquitted on charges of carrying a pistol without a license and pointing a pistol at another, Dye went home one day in 1961 and engaged in an argument with his wife. She took their small son and sought refuge in the home of a neighbor.

Officers said Dye kicked open the door and sprayed a burst of rifle fire that killed the neighbor and wounded his wife and son. The wife and son recovered.

Prisoners about to die in Georgia are given a chance to say their final words from the chair. Dye's were: "I am not guilty of the charge. I wish who testified against me could see what happens when a man tells a lie. I hope this will be a lesson to those who testified against me and that the Lord will forgive them."

Dye was one of only 15 persons put to death in the entire country in 1964, but in a state conditioned to executions, the story of his death

was not big news. It was displayed on page 30 of Atlanta's morning newspaper the next day.

Georgia set national records for executions over a 20-year period, executing 130 prisoners from 1940 to 1949 and 85 prisoners from 1950 to 1959.

Of the 415 persons who died in Georgia's chair, 343 were convicted of murder, 66 of rape and six of robbery by force.

Of the total, 337 were black and 78 white.

Only one woman was put to death — Lena Baker, 44, executed March 5, 1945 for murder in Randolph County.

A retired "police beat" reporter who witnessed four executions recalls the waiting as the toughest part of the assignment.

"You had a small witness room with three or four rows of chairs and they'd get you in there 10 minutes ahead of time and lock all the doors," said Keeler McCartney.

"The hard part was that you'd sit there and look at

your watch and you'd know that in 10 minutes from now they're going to bring a man in here and kill him," he said.

Finally, McCartney continued, "They'd bring him in, his head shaved, and they would put his arms on those arm rests and strap them down. Then they have a strap that they put around his lower chest, and then they strap his left leg. Usually his trousers are slit so they can put an electrode around his leg."

Next, McCartney said, "They had this thing that looked like a football helmet suspended by a wire from the

ceiling. They put a damp rag on his head and then pulled the helmet down on his head. They put a face towel over his face — you don't see his face."

The execution itself, he said, "is not a pretty sight. When the charge hits him, the main thing you see is his hands clinch. They gave 'em three short jolts. The fists clinch, and when they turn it off their fists relax."

McCartney said all of the prisoners he saw executed were "very calm about it" as they approached the chair.

"The last one was a little, short, fat guy who killed his wife and mother-in-law and

buried them in a back yard. You know, they give 'em a last request, and this guy's last request stumped 'em. He wanted to be allowed to walk by himself from his cell to the chair with nobody around. Well, the prison officials held a huddle and finally they decided he could do it. After all, there was no way for him to get out of there.

"So they all left the cell and sat down in the witness chairs and pretty soon that little guy came skipping around the corner with a smile on his face from ear to ear ... I'm convinced he was crazy."

Though there have been no

executions in Georgia in the 16 years since Dye went to the chair, it is not because death penalties have not been imposed.

Potts, the closest of any present Death Row inmate to execution, is just one of 84 prisoners in Georgia under sentence of death.

Various legal appeals by individual prisoners kept the electric chair silent in Georgia from the time of Dye's execution until the U.S. Supreme Court, in a series of rulings, took over the job for them.

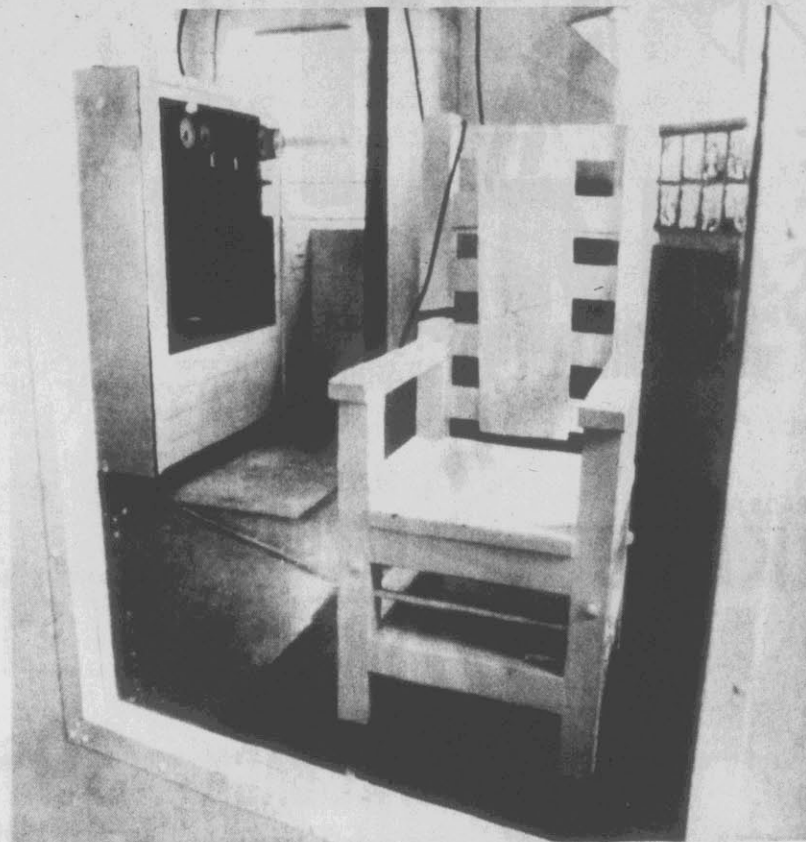
In 1969, the nation's highest court ruled that persons who oppose the death penalty could not automatically be excluded from juries in capital cases. Then in 1972, the court overturned all

existing death penalty statutes as unconstitutionally arbitrary.

Dozens of states, including Georgia, moved to rewrite death laws in the wake of that decision. Georgia's rewritten law was affirmed by the court in 1976.

The new law sets forth a series of specific "aggravating circumstances" — such as the use of torture or if the crime was "especially heinous or inhuman" — which must be present in a felony crime before the death penalty may be imposed.

Potts was sentenced to death after juries in two counties convicted him of kidnapping and murder — crimes they found to be "horrible or inhuman."

## Brazil Inching Toward Birth Control Program

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — The government is cautiously moving toward a nationwide birth control and family planning program as it breaks with the traditional view that Brazil needs people to help protect its boundaries and populate its underdeveloped areas.

Proponents of birth control are slowly convincing government officials of the need for measures to provide education and birth control methods to the nation's poor. Ammunition for the anti-conception advocates includes alarming statistics in this predominantly Roman Catholic nation of 123 million, which show:

— Brazil's population is growing at a rate of 2.8 percent or 3.4 million persons annually and will reach at least 200 million before the year 2000.

— At current rates, the population will double every 24 years exceeding the population of the United States sometime in the next century before leveling off at 375 million 100 years from now.

— Forty percent of Brazilians are under 15 years old, and millions of children are homeless and wandering in the nation's overcrowded coastal cities, abandoned by poverty-stricken parents who cannot support them.

Government willingness to discuss birth control is in itself a major change in official policy from supporting the traditional view that the South American nation —

slightly larger in land area than the 48 continental United States — needs population growth for development.

"This confidence in the contribution of population growth to achieving development objectives has been modified by experience," said one Brazilian population specialist. "Brazil found that although it had made dramatic development progress it had accomplished little to improve the lot of the majority of the poor in their country."

The Health and Social Welfare Ministries now say they expect to adopt family-planning policies within the next year, focusing mostly on making educational material available to all citizens.

"Before anything, it is necessary to make people conscious of the physiology of reproduction," said Health Minister Waldyr Arcoverde. "In that way, when a person decides to control the number of children they have by means of a radical process, he will make a conscious and responsible decision."

But new government legislation will not favor abortion, authorities say, despite research that indicates as many as two million illegal abortions are performed in Brazil every year, many causing complications.

"This ministry exists for health and not for death," said Arcoverde, in discussing his opposition to abortion. "A national debate has developed over what the nation

should do about population control and family planning. Discussion pits traditional right-to-life arguments against a small, emerging women's movement, which says male machismo is preventing women — especially those who are poor — from getting information and help so they can make their own decisions."

One of the major proponents of birth control in the government of President Joao Figueiredo is the nation's only woman senator, Eunice Michiles, who represents the state of Amazonas.

She says discussion of specific methods of birth control is still a sensitive topic, but adds: "It is the right of women to choose and judge how many children they want. We have to discuss this problem without emotionalism and find a solution."

The senator says Figueiredo favors government measures to offer family planning education and acknowledges official reports that rising crime rates, poverty and hunger are related directly to the high birth rate.

"There is no doubt that the high rate of population growth is a pure and simple element in the problems of crime and poverty," Sen. Michiles said.

The National Council of Brazilian Bishops, while upholding Roman Catholic Church dogma against artificial birth control, says the government should focus on the economic conditions

# The Public Hospital In Dire Straits

Cook County Hospital, serving the Chicago area for nearly 150 years, is trying to rebound from a financial crisis that recently spawned missed paydays and enormous annual deficits.

The problems of the Chicago-based hospital also epitomize a national dilemma, says Dr. Quentin Young, 56-year old chairman of Cook County Hospital's department of medicine: how to keep publicly funded hospitals open at a time of inflation and budget cuts at all government levels.

In some 600 counties, he estimates, public hospitals are the only existing medical facilities. And Mark Ravenscraft, health commissioner of Summit County, Ohio, and the chairman of health and education for the National Association of Counties, warned recently that some of those hospitals "will not be there, unless direct federal aid is forthcoming in the next 16 months."

No such funds appear in the proposed 1981 federal budget to assist public hospitals run by cities and counties, however.

Young was named chairman of a newly formed "Coalition for the Public General Hospital" a group of administrators trying to draw national attention to the problems of public hospitals. He summed up the issues in an interview:

A key source of public hospital income since the 1960s has been Medicaid, with funds from both federal and local sources. Depending on state law, persons below a certain income level qualify for Medicaid assistance.

In Illinois, the maximum income level for a family of four to qualify for Medicaid is \$4,200 a year. The trouble is, inflation has lifted many poor people above that level, but they are no more able to pay hospital bills than before.

For that and other reasons, nearly eight out of 10 Cook County patients who apply to Illinois for Medicaid assistance today are being turned down, compared with less than three out of 10 in 1974.

The bills thus go unpaid, and the hospital is left "holding the bag" says Young. The "bag" at Cook County Hospital last year was an \$84.8 million cumulative deficit.

New York City, which runs and finances 17 hospitals at an annual cost of \$1.1 billion, is saddled with \$250 million in bad debts from non-paying patients, says David A. Mannis, an official of the New York City Health and Hospitals Corp.

Undocumented aliens also contribute to mounting public hospital deficits, says Young.

These problems came to a head in Cook County last August and September when the hospital was forced to declare several payless paydays.

"It was very traumatic," Young says. Among other things, he says, it made it harder to recruit residents and interns.

What followed were some fairly drastic measures by the state Legislature: first, control of the county hospital was returned to the county government for the first time in a decade. Ten years earlier, the hospital was placed under a commission appointed by the Illinois governor in an attempt to root out political patronage.

Second, the county doubled the portion of the local property tax used to finance the hospital's \$134 million annual budget, and imposed a 5-cent tax on cigarettes also to pay for the hospital.

The new taxes should go a long way to stamping out the hospital's deficit, Young says, adding, "We have reason to believe the governor will do something to enhance state support."

But he and other public hospital officials contend that help must come from Washington to cure their financial ills

## GIs Choose Danish-Style Weddings

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — "By the power vested in me by the city of Copenhagen, I now pronounce you husband and wife. Next..."

On 52 Thursdays a year, the language spoken in the Florentine wedding chamber of Copenhagen's City Hall shifts from Danish to English — or more precisely, to American.

A little before 2 in the afternoon, couples begin to saunter in until all the seats under the frescoed arches are filled. They look apprehensive, speaking in whispers.

There are no best men or maids of honor; no moist-eyed mothers or solemn fathers. No hats and tails, no white veils or flowing trains. The brides wear slacks and simple dresses, the grooms, jackets and blazers.

West Germany's national railroad, Deutsche Bundesbahn, calls its matrimonial travel packet "Marriage — Danish style." But whether the couples join the tour or not, American GIs have made this city their marriage capital of Europe.

For the past four years, the wedding office at Copenhagen's City Hall has registered up to 40 U.S. couples a week year-round, nearly all of them American GIs — male and female — stationed in West Germany.

"It really went smoother than I thought it would," whispered Army Sgt. Marvin Kelker of El Paso, Texas, waiting with Pfc. Orlanza Walker of Hazlehurst, Miss., to take their vows.

For 572 deutsche marks — about \$310 — the couple boarded a train from their duty stations in Frankfurt for the five-day trip that may last a lifetime.

Leaving Germany on Sunday night, the couples arrive at Copenhagen's main station early Monday morning, in time for the half-hour registration procedure when the wedding office opens at 9:30.

If the couples have valid birth certificates and passports — and no previous marriages — they can be married free of charge the following Thursday.

Cpls. Jack Fiamoncini of Atlas, Pa., and Jayne Sain of Ramsey, Mich., avoided the train fare and up to four weeks' advance booking by driving up from Stuttgart with friends.

"It went good," said Fiamoncini, a few minutes into being a husband. "We couldn't believe how quick and simple it was."

Why Copenhagen, with its \$50-a-night hotels and \$2-a-bottle beer?

Though German wedding fees, roughly 500 marks, are still cheaper than a trip north, the couples save months of waiting and spools of red tape.

West German authorities, the GIs report, require personal documents translated into German, blood tests and permission from American base commanders. Waits of up to six months are not uncommon for Americans in the Federal Republic. For smitten U.S. soldiers, miles seem to be more tolerable than months.

In Copenhagen, the time between Monday registration and Thursday marriage is usually spent with typically tourist pastimes.

Many feel obliged to visit the diminutive little mermaid statue at the mouth of Copenhagen Harbor. Wedding rings wink from shop windows lining the old city's maze of pedestrian malls.

There is also time to try a few of Copenhagen's countless restaurants, with an inviting bottle of half-cold beer and a fiery jigger of icy aquavit. Predictably, the cuisines ringing town hall square get a generous serving of Yankee dollars.

### GET WELL

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — When Carolyn Border was in hospital this past winter, someone tramped out a message in the snow so that all patients on one side of the building could see, "GET WELL SOON."

"It makes you feel good that someone out there cares," Mrs. Border said, "even though you don't know who it is."

# Black Pilots Won Acceptance In WWII Missions

WASHINGTON (UPI) — America's first black military pilots had to fight strong racial prejudice, segregated facilities, grave fears they were no good in combat, and, incidentally, the Germans in World War II.

The black fliers finally knew they had won acceptance when white pilots began asking for them as escorts on tough bombing missions over Europe.

"To my knowledge, we never lost a bomber," said Lee A. Archer, of White Plains, N.Y., a corporate vice president of General Food Corp. Archer was a member of the all-black 332nd Fighter Group that flew more than 1,580 missions protecting planes over some of Nazi Germany's toughest targets.

Benjamin O. Davis Jr., a retired Air Force lieutenant general, and commander of the 99th Fighter Squadron and later the 332nd, said the success of black fliers in World War II was largely responsible for the U.S. Air Force becoming fully integrated by 1960, a full 10 years before the other branches of

the services. In a joint interview at the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum, Archer took it a step farther. "I believe we were the first of the really militant civil rights movements since the end of Reconstruction," said Archer. "No way could the advances that came later have been made without the first step that was made by the military, by the 99th Squadron, and the 332nd Fighter Group. They said to people, 'We're equal, we're equal in more ways than one, we're equal in mentality, and dedication, and leadership, and abilities.'"

It was a difficult mission. Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said in his diary, blacks would fail as aviators and that "leadership is not embedded in the Negro race." Military men said blacks lacked the guts to survive in combat.

In his book, "The Air Force Integrates," Alan L. Gropman reports black fliers had trouble getting an overseas combat mission, and when they did, they almost washed out.

The 99th flew its first combat mission over the island of Pantelleria off North Africa in June 1943, and scored its first kill in July. But after that no more enemy aircraft were destroyed until January 1944, a dry spell that prompted the commander of the 33rd Fighter Group to report the blacks lacked aggressiveness and should be set down. In that January, black pilots scored well over the Anzio beachhead. On January 27, they engaged more than 16 FW-190s, shooting down six and damaging four. Later in the same day, the unit destroyed three more German planes.

After the 332nd was formed with Davis as commander, black fliers in P-51 long-ranged fighters shot down 11 aircraft on July 18. On March 24, 1945, the 332nd flew a 1,600 mile round trip to Berlin, on escort duty, and shot down three jet fighters, planes they had no business outfighting. The 332nd received several unit combat citations.

Davis, a 1936 graduate of West Point, was one of the first six blacks to win mili-

tary wings. It took him six years to be accepted for training and came after President Franklin D. Roosevelt, running for a third term, decided it would be politically expedient to allow the Army Air Corps to accept blacks for flight school.

At the time it was a Jim Crow Army with all facilities segregated. White pilots trained the blacks but then disappeared at the end of the work day.

"So you can see the potential there for mistrust, for misunderstanding, actual hatred, between people in both groups was very great indeed," said Davis.

Both Davis and Archer credited Col. Noel Parrish with taking over a faltering program and keeping it going. "He may have been the only white person who believed that blacks could learn to fly airplanes," said Davis.

C. Alford "Chief" Anderson, was one of the first black civilian pilots, and he provided civilian training for many of the blacks waiting to get into military flight school.

"Actually, white people didn't think any of the minority groups, Chinese, Japanese, anybody other than whites, could fly planes," said Anderson.

"I remember when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, I came in from a flight and the colonel walked up and said, 'You know, Chief, the Japs attacked Pearl Harbor today. They always said they couldn't fly because their eyes weren't slanted right. They were slanted right today because they really raised hell.'"

Anderson said still others refused to believe the Japanese were in the planes, that they were really flown by hired German pilots.

Asked what it was like to try to learn to fly under such conditions, Anderson said, "That's when you fly like hell. You prove that you can."

"You always felt you were on the line," said Archer. "Every time you went up, you were fighting a pink slip (failure). I was always on my toes, to do everything just perfect."

Archer also pointed to Davis' leadership. "I think we all knew he wouldn't tolerate some of the things that white squadrons permitted their pilots to do. I know I was deathly afraid of running off and leaving bombers, not so much for fear of enemy fighters... but that it would be intolerable to the commander."

Davis, the son of an Army general, graduated 35th out of 276 in the class of 1936 at West Point. Because he was black, his classmates kept him in "silence."

He went on to become commander of the 13th Air Force at Clark Field in the Philippines and deputy commander-in-chief of the U.S. Strike Command at MacDill Air Force Base in Florida, before his retirement in 1970. He later served in the government as assistant secretary of transportation.

Archer said his two sons who served in Vietnam continually ask him, "Why in the world would you want to fly and fight for a country that didn't want you?"

It's a question that Archer has thought a lot about.

"I was horrified with what was happening in Germany with the Jews and all, and my belief was that there but for the grace of God goes the black man in America, if they are successful there. So that was part of it."

"A second part of it was that my father, and I think this was symptomatic of a lot of young blacks at that time, had fought in World War I, and much to his disgust, he had been in a service (work) troop, and his idea was that shouldn't happen to his son, and that there should be some advancement."

Davis' flight group lost 76

men in combat, including 10 in 10 days in a particularly tough period escorting bombers over Greece in October 1944.

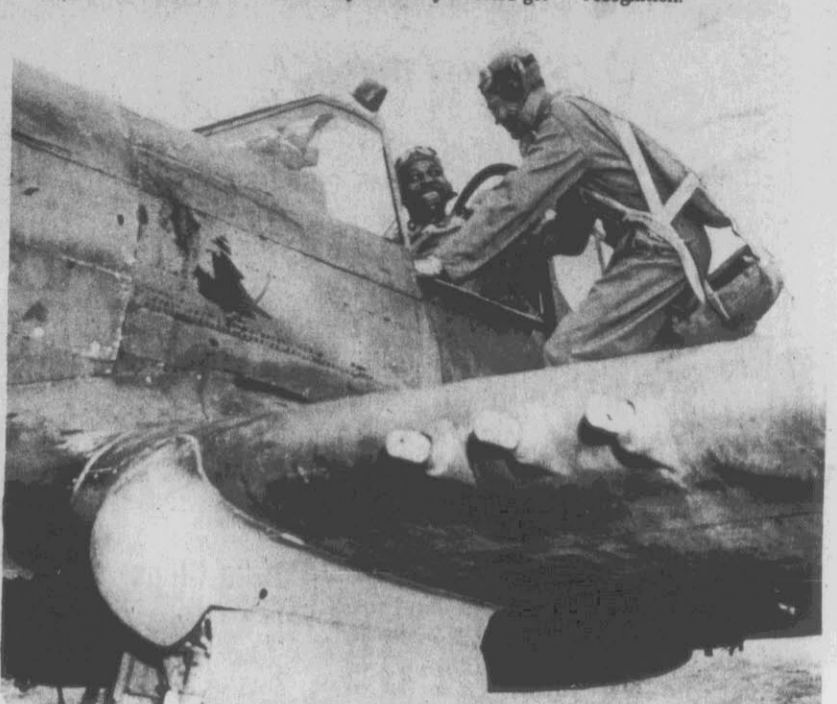
For all their good work, the black fliers got little publicity. Davis recalls that one of his pilots was credited with knocking an enemy destroyer out of the war.

"I was very disappointed that that was not publicized more than it was," he said, "because it was reported very accurately and completely with the name of the pilot and all."

Archer added, "That's the kind of thing that we were talking about. You never really knew if you would get

credit for it (a kill). So you did your job just because you had to... for yourself and your squadron."

The real recognition, Davis said, the one that counted, came "when those B-17 and B-24 crews welcomed the red-tailed escorts over any of the others. Now, that's real recognition."

## Better Students From Unique Source: Poetry

RALEIGH, N.C. (UPI) — Charleen Swanssea learned a lot about communication the day a student in her poetry class threatened her with his switchblade.

She had been trying that time four years ago to get the youth to talk about what he wanted. His story might have had a bloody ending were it not for another student who yelled, "Put that knife down, boy. She's trying to teach you how to talk so you won't need to use that thing."

That broke the tension. It gave her the break she needed in her campaign to produce better students through an unusual weapon: poetry.

"If we don't give youngsters the ability to talk us into giving them what they need, they're going to take it from us," she said. "Talking is something youngsters have got to learn."

A child who can tell what he is feeling and wanting, she said, is "less impotent — and therefore less dangerous."

The verse Ms. Swanssea teaches as director of the Poetry in the Schools program at the Charlotte-Mecklenburg system in North Carolina is not the works many adults encountered as pupils. Ms. Swanssea uses only poetry written by the students.

Sometimes those works can defuse potentially dangerous situations, she said.

Two years ago, West Charlotte High School was

racked by racial tension born in crosstown busing.

Ms. Swanssea asked what the students wanted to write.

"Let's write about being black," a student said. Another wanted to talk about being white. Ms. Swanssea told them to write about what being white or black means. She unrolled a 40-foot sheet of paper and had the students invite the rest of the student body to add their thoughts.

The class took the results and formulated a poem that talks about experiences of blacks and whites and how everyone is human after all.

"That class started with a feeling of tension, and it ended with camaraderie," she said.

She takes the poetry written one day, types and mimeographs it overnight and distributes it the next morning. Students become motivated when they see their thoughts in print, she said.

Ms. Swanssea permits any kind of writing as long as it expresses the way someone feels.

"If a young'un says to me 'I feel like a stove with all four burners turned on high,' I know not to talk with the young'un," she said. "That's communication. That's poetry."

Students often become frightened by demands that they clothe their papers in formal verbiage, she said, and thus never get around to writing at all.

But when they do break out of those strict old rules and use their imagination, their writing opens up, she said.

For example, the poem "My Mother" by one student begins: "My mother smells like pink roses in the Garden of Eden. And when she tucks her little boy in bed it's like she was tucking in a million dollars she is so careful..."

Once the student has opened up it's possible to work on grammar and sentence structure, she said.

Ms. Swanssea's program is one of the oldest and biggest among hundreds nationwide. She says the point is to make students happy about themselves.

"Anybody's who's happy is getting along better in the world than somebody who's miserable."

## Bird Art Show Seeing Growth

# Assimilating Vietnam's Refugees Is Taking Place

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Coming upon a hallway full of chattering Vietnamese in New Orleans, a former soldier shouted, in their own curious language, "Put up your hands or I will shoot!"

Instantly every Vietnamese reached for the sky. Some of them teetered on tiptoe in order to stretch higher.

Afterward, hands down, they were stonily blank when the prankster, a veteran of the Vietnam war, walked among them, smiling. In their country you didn't joke about shooting. After 30 years of war, bloody sudden death had become a possibility too real for jokes.

But that incident took place over three years ago, when the 6,500 refugees being resettled here still bore fresh memories of the war-torn Vietnam they fled in 1975.

A small measure of their gradual accommodation and relaxation into a new life on this side of the world, among the inscrutable Cajun round eyes, is that the hands-up trick probably wouldn't work today.

There are other measures of change. —Jalopies that the crazy Vietnamese first drove have been replaced by shiny late models.

—Viet fishing boats work along the Gulf Coast. —Vietnamese have won a reputation of being willing workers, though some observers contend they are rapidly learning American sloth.

However, they remain a distinct and separate people, clustered in ghetto-style neighborhoods, part of the fabric of this cosmopolitan city but not absorbed by it.

Van-Huy Tran, 25, who came here three years ago after brief stays at cities in Missouri and Tennessee, said things have not changed much for the Vietnamese since he first arrived.

"In this state, you don't have a lot of American friends because the Vietnamese live all together in a community," Huy Tran said. "Some make friends with Americans at work. Not many."

What little social contact develops often involves culture shock on both sides.

"I was invited to dinner at a Vietnamese home by eight sisters who worked at a supermarket with me," said Candice Crider.

"It was incredible. They all lived in this two-bedroom, one bath apartment. One sister had four kids, another had two and I don't know about the rest. Then there was their mother and father, their grandmother and grandfather, two uncles, three husbands. There were more but I lost count."

"No knives or forks at dinner. You put a plate in front of your face and rake food in with your fingers. I don't know what it was — something rice and bland. It was kind of weird but actually I had a ball."

"None of us work there any more. I haven't seen them since."

Overall, some 9,000 Vietnamese resettled in South Louisiana — one of the largest accumulations in the United States. Many of them drifting down here from northern states. The weather here is closer to the climate of home.

Sharon Rodi, of Catholic Charities' Indochinese Resettlement Center, said Vietnamese have a strong family structure and clustering

seems to be a natural tendency.

The 1975 wave of refugees put 130,000 Vietnamese into the United States but not many of the rich and sophisticated, if there were any, came here.

"Most Vietnamese who came to New Orleans were uneducated and poor, fishermen and farmers," said Rodi.

"They have done well. They are happy here. They are managing to keep families together. But there is a serious housing shortage in New Orleans so we don't encourage new people to come."

School officials say Vietnamese youngsters, once the language barrier is overcome, buckle down on their studies.

"To do well in school is part of their culture," said Bob Kastner, a school board spokesman.

How many are on welfare?

The resettlement center estimated 7.8 percent of those over 21 get welfare, and said the figure is higher than usual due to the recent arrival of new refugees from the boat people. A state Labor Department spokesman said the department had no figure because welfare cards list recipients only as black, white and other.

With most Vietnamese on minimum wage jobs, how come those shiny nice cars? "It's because the men will work two jobs," said Rodi. "Women work, too. They are a very frugal people. They will buy a car but you won't find a TV in the home, no fancy furnishings, no fancy clothes. They make money go a lot further than Americans do. They do not demand the living standard that Americans do. They often pool resources."

Economically, things may be looking up.

"The young man who came here as a 15-year-old is now 20," said Rodi. "His English is good. He can get better jobs. Whatever work he does, he is required by the family code to take care of his elderly family. There is a good chance they have not learned English well and have just been scraping by. But now with this young man, with better English, their income rises."

Do most of them miss their native land? You bet.

Two years ago there was turmoil here over the refugees. Urban League and other blacks angrily claimed they were soaking up jobs and housing normally available to blacks.

"We aren't in competition with the buses — there are bus riders and there are boat riders," says Borgstrom.

The boats take only seven minutes dock-to-dock, making runs 10 minutes apart during the morning and evening rush hours. One-way rides are 60 cents, compared

to 40 cents by shuttle bus, and a 10-ride book of tickets is \$4.50.

The river shuttle timetable coincides with that of the trains and operates from early April to early October.

"When it's cool, business drops off 50 percent. Landlubbers like warm weather when they travel by water," says Borgstrom.

## Chicago Has 'Boat People'

CHICAGO (AP) — A Venetian canal it isn't, but the Chicago River is a stimulating way to get to work for 1,000 daily commuters.

Chicago's boat people arrive by train at North Western Station and shuttle cross town to their offices, mainly along Michigan Avenue. It's a special group, preferring boats to buses going to the same place.

"I have a sailboat. I like the water and I've been riding the boats for three years," says Marilyn Cutler, a magazine editor.

Arthur Witte, a certified public accountant, says it is "a delightful way to commute. You'd be surprised how much wildlife is on the river. Fish sometimes are jumping up, and mother ducks with their brood can be seen near the banks."

Suzan Nelson, a public relations executive, rides a bus six miles and, instead of staying on it through the congested downtown area, she gets off and takes the boat.

"I don't like to sit in traffic breathing the fumes, and, besides, I think the boat is faster," she says. "I know it's more stimulating and a pleasant way to start the day."
