Debate Judges Give Reagan Slight Edge

WASHINGTON (AP) - The long-awaited debate may have left undecided voters still unable to make up their minds, even though Ronald Reagan scored a narrow forensic victory, according to a panel of debate experts.

Washington, D.C. "If you wanted to call it anything, I would call it a dead heat." "If there was a disappointment, people were watching this debate to make up their minds," said Unger, who was chairman of the panel. "I suspect this debate may make it more difficult, rather than less difficult, for them to make up their minds."

CLEVELAND (AP) - President Carter and Ronald Reagan emerged upbeat from their dramatic debate and charged into the final six days of the 1980 presidential campaign, concentrating on the big-state prizes. Each claimed the edge from his performance in their head-on confrontation.

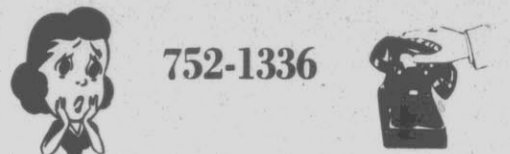

Florida Arrest May Have Ended Nationwide Manhunt For Sniper

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Joseph Paul Franklin, a reputed Nazi and Ku Klux Klan sympathizer wanted for questioning in racially linked sniper attacks in five cities, was jailed here today after an arrest that capped a two-month, nationwide manhunt, officials said. The arrest in Lakeland came three days before a trial there by President Carter, and after federal officials allegedly linked Franklin to a 1976 letter accusing Carter of "selling out to blacks," according to authorities.

Franklin was arrested on a warrant issued Oct. 4 in Salt Lake City charging him with violating the civil rights of two black men there by killing them. Franklin was to appear before a U.S. magistrate today. A police source in Salt Lake City said Franklin's arrest was "a major concern" because of a letter sent Carter during his first campaign for the presidency. Jack Warner, a spokesman for the Secret Service in Washington, said the letter was signed James Clayton Vaughn - allegedly a Franklin alias. Police also want to question Franklin about the deaths of a white woman and a black man in Johnstown, Pa., the deaths of two black youths in Cincinnati and the deaths of a black man and a white woman in Oklahoma City, officials said.

Hospital Quality Is Discussed

NEW BERN — Hospital care is involved and costly and by 1990 it's projected to be three times more expensive and infinitely more complicated, William R. Fifer, M.D., told Eastern North Carolina health professionals attending an Eastern Area Health Education Center-sponsored seminar on quality assurance for hospitals yesterday.

Society is fast realizing it cannot afford its own medical care technology, the University of Minnesota professor of medicine and public health told the 168 participants in the seminar tailored to help hospital trustees, administrators and de-

partment heads solve problems concerning the quality of care it provides patients.

Because we cannot afford to do all that we're able to do, we have to make sure that all we're doing is useful, he said.

He said it's been realized now that the medical audits and utilization review that once were so vehemently required by the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Hospitals, the self-regulating organ of the hospital industry, were all right in themselves, but they did not insure the quality the industry wants and needs to deliver.

Now he said, the quality

assurance process is seen as problem solving. Every area of the hospital's function is looked at. Problems are identified, then they are assessed and finally solutions are sought and hopefully achieved.

The quality of work produced by doctors, he pointed out, is the core of quality assurance. He made it clear that institutions like state boards of licensure, county medical societies, and medical schools cannot be held responsible for the quality of physician care. The hospital in which the physician is allowed to practice becomes the accountability locus.

Computerization, he said, is one hope for increased quality assurance on the horizon. Computers can be used, not to make judgments — human beings will always have to do that — but to make computations.

As the health care becomes more and more expensive to society as a whole, he said, there are going to be changes. There'll be more decision-making as to whether what's possible is also warranted.

There's going to be more emphasis in the future, he said, on personal responsibility for one's own health.

Dr. Fifer will present the same program to North Carolina Hospital Association-hosted audiences in Charlotte, Asheville and Greensboro in mid-November.

To New Tower

WNCT-TV, Channel 9 in Greenville, will make the switchover to its new transmitting facility and 2,000 foot tower at 6 p.m. today.

The tower, located at Grifton, is more than two times as tall as the present facility on Evans Street.

The new RCA transmitter and antenna will carry the WNCT-TV signal to more than two million potential viewers in 51 of North Carolina's 100 counties, and eight counties in Southeastern Virginia.

Planning and construction of the tower, shared with WITN-TV, Channel 7 in Washington, has taken four years.

WNCT-TV, which began broadcasting in 1953, is one of 21 radio and television stations owned by Roy H. Park Broadcasting of Ithica, N.Y.

Shooting Investigated

An incident involving a shooting into an occupied building last Thursday night is being investigated by the Pitt County Sheriff's office.

According to Sheriff Ralph Tyson, an unknown person or persons at about 11 p.m. on the night of October 23 fired into front and rear door entrances of the Pico Club, a private club located on Evans Street Extension. The initial report of the incident was reported by Paul McMann.

The first shot was into the building's rear door, which blew off the door knob. Another shot was fired into a second entrance, going through the wood as well as blasting holes in windows adjacent to the door.

Don Freeman of 221 Country Club, reported that immediately after the shooting incident, an unidentified man, slender, about six feet tall and wearing a stocking over his face entered the premises and told Freeman to hit the floor.

Sheriff Tyson said there were no injuries reported as a result of the incident, and

that results of the investigation to date do not indicate robbery being involved. The sheriff's office is continuing its investigation.

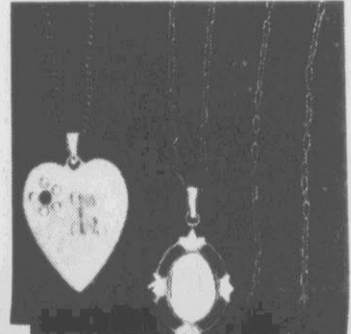

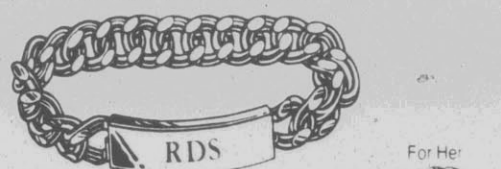

Morgan Serves Well

We have watched with great interest the spirited and expensive campaign between Sen. Robert Morgan and Dr. John East.

Both have strong ties with our area. Sen. Morgan as an alumnus and supporter of East Carolina University and Dr. East as a strongly conservative and articulate member of the university faculty.

Both men have our respect, but as the Nov. 4 election approaches, we can think of no reason at all why Sen. Morgan should be turned out of office.

His voting record and his record of service while he has been a member of the United States Senate have certainly been respectable. Far from being a liberal senator, as the opposition has sought to depict him, he has been pragmatic. His representation in the Senate has been in line with the general opinions of his constituents in North Carolina.

Sen. Morgan has much more in his favor. He has devoted his entire adult life to public service in our state. He served in the State Legislature, as chairman of the ECU board of trustees and as North Carolina attorney general before he chose to seek election as U. S. senator. As a family man who enjoyed his personal life in Lillington, no doubt there were times when he could have contented himself to settle there and practice law.

Sen. Morgan is the first to say that North Carolina and the nation have offered him undreamed of opportunities — and he has spent his life paying back that debt.

The senator was uniquely trained through public service to become a member of the United States Senate six years ago; he has served well and we feel that North Carolina's voters will do themselves a great service by returning Sen. Bob Morgan to office.



Fear Silence On Hostages

WASHINGTON — Attempting to penetrate the wall of silence erected by Ronald Reagan around the hostage issue, this message was flashed to Reagan headquarters in Arlington, Va., early last week: Attack President Carter's record on the hostages no matter what the risk.

That advice, from one of the party's respected elder politicians, so far has fallen on deaf ears. Instead of attacking Carter, the consensus of Reagan's divided counselors is to say nothing until the fine print of Carter's hostage deal with Iran is known. That makes Reagan himself a captive of the hostage issue.

Behind the divided counsel rests a most agonizing political problem for Reagan. The question is whether a silent Reagan can possibly avoid defeat on Nov. 4 if the hostages are returned, creating a wave of patriotic fervor that would dwarf other elements of the presidential campaign.

The current consensus in Reagan's headquarters is that Carter's brilliant but cynical exploitation of the hostage issue could backfire, converting few if any anti-Carter or undecided voters to Carter following hostage freedom. But the advice from the party's elder statesman, multiplied a hundred fold by lesser party operatives, derides that view as pie-in-the-sky.

"If the hostages come out," this party leader told us, "Reagan must have laid the base for serious discussion. He must ask the questions now about why Carter let the hostages get taken in the first place and whether his deal with Iran could get the U.S. into a Persian Gulf war."

Reagan briefly lifted his

self-imposed silence on the hostage issue Oct. 21 when he blamed Carter for helping create "the entire situation that made their kidnap possible." But as soon as Carter accused him of politicizing the issue, Reagan reimposed silence on himself.

Yet, no less than Vice President Walter F. Mondale could not give an adequate response Friday morning when he was interviewed on NBC's "Today" show. Asked by Richard Valeriani why both presidential candidates did not have a "responsibility" to debate Carter's "accountability" for the seizure of the hostages, Mondale could only reply: "We're willing to discuss that whole issue ... But it is uniquely unsuited to politics."

Some of Reagan's advisers feel discussion is long overdue. They see it as a tragic disservice to the country, with political implications stretching at least four years into the future, if an election-eve Carter coup succeeds in bringing the hostages home and blots out the central economic, defense and foreign policy issues of the campaign.

Not the least of these concerns is whether Carter strikes a bargain with Iran that ends American neutrality and puts the U.S. on Iran's side in that Persian Gulf war. This might happen, according to high administration officials, if Carter agrees to send Iran the \$400 million in military equipment sold to the shah before seizure of the hostages.

As one administration official told us: "The president simply cannot publicly offer help like that to the ayatollah. All he can do is hint at it, and make the final deal after the election." But in the Reagan camp, there is total ignorance about what if any

Desperate Action

RALEIGH — Value of stolen goods from North Carolina homes and businesses has more than doubled in just five years. Thieves are obviously on a rampage, with Police Information Network figures showing nearly \$80 million ripped off in just one year.

Recovery of stolen goods, as any law enforcement officer or victim can tell you, is nigh impossible. The recovery rate is only about one-third.

Stolen goods move fast. They can be shuttled around the state quickly by car or truck, and several such operations have been uncovered. They can be on the next plane to points north or south, as investigations have shown is happening to jewelry, in particular.

Or, they can even be considerably altered in appearance in such a short time that the owner could never identify the stuff even if recovered. Police have some evidence that this is happening to much of the silver being stolen from homes and silver dealers: a truck equipped with melting equipment allows thieves to turn the stolen merchandise into ingots even as they flee the scene of the crime.

Selling
And then there is the matter of getting money for the stolen goods. Time after time, law enforcement officers say, stolen merchandise shows up at flea markets and yard sales miles away from the point where stolen, within a matter of a few days.

All of which prompts the recommendation by the Governor's Crime Commission that outlets for stolen property need to be much more heavily regulated — even where the dealers are innocent.

A proposal certain to raise

an uproar around the state is one that secondhand dealers be required to maintain records on every item purchased and the individual from whom they bought it.

With thousands of secondhand dealers running little booths or selling from the backs of trucks at flea markets; with garage and yard sales being a weekend fixture in many Tar Heel towns; with auction houses operating at hundreds of crossroads; and with traveling antique shows a popular fund-raiser for local civic organizations, a lot of people have an interest in this matter.

Here are the basics of the proposal for consideration in the 1981 General Assembly: (Continued on page 5)

Lee Remick could play the frustrated wife of one of the FBI undercover men who takes to drink because her husband keeps going out every night dressed as an Arab sheik and won't tell her what he's up to.

She could be having an affair with a labor leader whom she doesn't know is also an FBI undercover agent. The possibilities are endless to make ABCSCAM into another "Dallas."

Due to the existing circumstances, however, a layoff was inevitable and affected over 45 employees. The layoff was based entirely upon seniority, which I agree is a fairest way to determine who goes and who stays.

Since that time I have spent many days phoning, mailing applications, reading newspaper ads and standing in the unemployment line. I am supposedly in the prime years of my life — able to work — want to work — wasting what I feel is very precious time and getting absolutely nowhere. I have earnestly tried to seek employment. I am supposed to have good work experience and qualifications. Unemployment benefits and special services are okay, but they don't last forever and they certainly do not provide a man the financial security and benefits that a job does. I have a family — groceries to buy, rent to pay, a car payment and a fuel bill for the next four to five months. How can I fit this into a budget of \$139 a week unemployment benefits?

I have sent applications to various businesses, as well as applied at all the industries in the area. Whenever I go to any of these places, they refer me to Employment Security and then Employment Security sends me directly back to where I started. All these places give me the same lines — they are hiring a year from the time you apply.

Do I continue to seek unemployment checks and watch those work skills which I have acquired become of little use to me? Or do I sit back and become another one of those millions who you, the American system, spends its tax money on to support. I want to work. I want the salary that I am qualified to make. Who do I talk to about work, other than Employment Security?

The Abnormal Seen As Normal

NEW YORK (AP) — Commentators and political candidates have often wondered whether the public might lose sight of small variations when economic measurements become as extreme as those of today.

The reason: So saturated have people become with extremes in economic numbers that they forget what used to be normal, both in base figures and in the rates by which they rise or fall.

Abnormality, that is, may have become the norm. It is partially for this reason that if prime interest fell from 14 percent to 12 percent you could expect some people to observe that it is low, forgetting that on November 3, 1976, it was only 6.5 percent.

Prices too may have lost their relationship to a base

that people can understand.

There is no such thing as a semi-permanent price, as there used to be. Prices float today, sometimes changing by the week. Because of this, it is argued, many buyers no longer know what constitutes a fair price.

Consumer price inflation so far this year has raged at an annual rate of 12.7 percent. In 1979 it was 13.3 percent. But in the early 1960s single digit inflation — around 1 to 3 percent — was the rule.

Unemployment of around 7.5 percent has become so persistent that a reduction of two tenths of one percent is considered an achievement. But as recently as 1973 the jobless rate was no higher than 5 percent.

The difference between a 5 percent rate and a 7.5 percent rate, based on the current labor force of 105 million

workers, is 2.1 million, or more than the total jobless in 1953, when the rate was 2.9 percent.

The savings rate — saving as a percent of disposable income — was just 4.5 percent last year, lowest in at least 30 years. It rose briefly to 4.9, and appears now to be under 4 percent. In 1975 it was 7.7 percent.

Federal financing bears little relation to what was. The public debt on Oct. 22 was \$906.7 billion, and interest on it in the fiscal year through August (one month short of a full year) was \$69.2 billion.

In 1959 the public debt was \$284.7 billion, or less than a third that of last year. It has grown by about 50 percent from fiscal 1976, when the debt was \$620.4 billion and the financing cost was \$37.1 billion.

If you go back in history

you will find that the public debt in 1939, near the end of the Depression, was only \$40.4 billion. And that in 1940 federal interest payments were only \$1 billion.

So persistent have federal budget deficits become (12 straight years) and so large (the fiscal 1980 deficit is about \$65 billion) that many people might reject promises to balance the budget as political ploys.

There is a danger however in some such financial comparisons because, as almost everyone knows, inflation has distorted the relationships. A dollar today is a different measuring stick than yesterday's dollar.

Based on the consumer price index — the popular but not always correct measuring stick of inflation — the purchasing power of the dollar has steadily

Anybody who regularly buys or sells secondhand goods would be classed as a dealer. A record would have to be kept in which a complete description of the items bought, any identifying marks, the price, and the name and address of the person from whom purchased — along with the right thumbprint — would have to be entered and kept for a year. A copy would be filed with local police.

If goods totaling more than \$20 are bought, a picture of the person from whom the item is purchased — displaying the merchandise in question — would be required in that record.

Disposal

It would also be against the law for the person who bought the item either to sell it or to alter its appearance, for seven days following the transaction. Fines and prison sentences would enforce the record-keeping, and the records must be open for police inspection.

Several local governments around the state are exploring various alternatives for controlling the action in secondhand goods, particularly with the booming business being done by silver and gold buyers operating from trailers, motel rooms and other locations.

Prospects of a state law governing all secondhand transactions involving dealers obviously raises a number of concerns including the expense of record-keeping and photography, the thumb-printing, and the literally thousands of transactions which go on almost daily somewhere in the state.

concessions Carter may be planning as his election-eve quid pro quo to gain release of the hostages. By the time Reagan learns the facts, time will be running out.

Indeed, lack of knowledge is Reagan's greatest enemy as the hostage drama appears to unfold behind the velvet curtain of secret diplomacy. A Reagan operative in one state that has been regarded as solid for Reagan informed Bill Timmons, deputy director of the Reagan campaign, last Thursday that Reagan was slipping in his state. He believes one factor in that slippage is headline publicity on Carter's efforts to free the hostages.

Despite persuasive arguments being made by the minority of Reagan insiders for opening up the hostage question, the consensus remains wedded to caution. No thought was given to switching Reagan's Friday evening half-hour televised address from economics to Carter's flawed record on Iran and the hostages.

The committee that manages Reagan's campaign is fearful that even a factual, hard-hitting offensive would boomerang on Reagan if Carter's rescue effort falls

short. That leaves unanswered the more important question: What does Ronald Reagan do if Carter's political use of the hostage tragedy succeeds, as it did last November when his approval rating dramatically rose from record lows and later in the spring, when he used it to avoid debating Sen. Edward M. Kennedy in the old Rose Garden days?

For that, stand-patters in the Reagan camp have no answer, and time is growing short.

diminished. Today's dollar is sort of a 6-inch foot.

The 1977 dollar, for example, bought half that of a 1957 dollar. A January 1978 dollar bought half the items a 1967 dollar paid for. By late next year, the dollar may buy but a third what it did in 1967.

The dollar is worth only what it buys, as they say, and that is less than it used to buy. Of all distortions, that of the dollar is the one most easily understood by the public, which uses it every painful day.

Despite the pain, there may be some substance to the fears of those who see the public adjusting to inflation. So persistent has been the dollar's decline that additional declines may be fully anticipated.

People may have become so adjusted to the abnormal, it is feared, that abnormal may now be considered quite normal. And what once was deemed unacceptable, may now be accepted with a weary, resigned shrug.

If you need evidence of this you might simply recall the outraged homemakers of the 1960s who boycotted grocery stores because of price increases that weren't half the size of those today.

You don't hear from them today. They gave up the fight against what they considered abnormal price increases; they accepted the inevitable and silently confessed such increases had become the norm.

Accepting the new way of prices, they went out and got jobs to help pay the bills.

Barbers Oppose 'Sunset' Move

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina barbers protested in strength Tuesday a proposal that would eliminate state requirements for licensing of barbers.

More than 500 barbers appeared at a meeting of the state Government Evaluation Commission — the sunset commission — for a hearing on a proposal that would require licenses only for barbers who deal with potentially dangerous chemicals.

The proposal would require

licensing of shops, however. One barber, J. Nelson Snyder of Charlotte, said the proposal would "open up a Pandora's box for everyone to get himself a comb and pair of clippers and become a barber."

Commission member Jack D. Fleer told the barbers: "Our concern is: When is government regulation necessary to protect the health and safety of the public, and when is it not?"

State law now requires a barber to complete 1,528 hours of instruction in a barber's college and serve a 12-month apprenticeship. That is followed by a mandatory examination given by the North Carolina Board of

Barber Examiners. The commission will vote Nov. 7 on a final recommendation to be presented to the General Assembly.

Greenville Sixth In Construction

Greenville ranked sixth in the state among cities of more than 10,000 population in the value of building permits issued for August and for the first eight months of 1980.

John Brooks, state Labor Commissioner, reported that permits valued at \$2,740,481 were issued here during August, while the permit total for the first eight months in Greenville amounted to \$20,829,799.

Permit values for August and for the first eight months in several neighboring cities included: Elizabeth City, \$424,050; \$4,713,576; Goldsboro, \$871,596;

\$5,347,192; Jacksonville, \$826,502, \$15,157,616; Kinston, \$168,000;

\$5,046,523; New Bern, \$103,372, \$2,770,758; Roanoke Rapids, \$212,124, \$3,884,968; Rocky Mount, \$1,941,140, \$11,320,133; Tarboro, \$199,100, \$2,306,975; and Wilson, \$698,662, \$55,963,737.

In Pitt County, total construction authorized in August totaled \$2,975,432, including \$1,267,296 for 28 single-family units, \$1,245,360 for 59 multi-family units,

\$158,644 for 14 non-residential units, and \$304,132 for 72 additions and alterations.

Brooks said that construction authorized in August in the state's 44 reporting cities totaled 3,657 units, a 4.9 percent decrease from the 3,847 reported for July. At \$81,784,326, he said, valued dropped 12 percent from July's \$92,918,911.

When construction activity

for the first eight months of 1979 and 1980 was compared, the commissioner noted, the number of units authorized dropped 9.5 percent in the 38 cities which reported both years, from 27,540 to 24,930. Value decreased 2.3 percent, from \$598,594,373 to \$584,735,255.

Brooks said that the August report indicated that single-family home con-

struction, non-residential building, and additions and alterations were all down from July, contributing to the nearly five percent drop

in overall construction activity. Only construction of multi-family dwellings increased in the state in August, he added.

Claim Of FB-111 Deal Is Branded Lie By Morgan

North Carolina's Republican candidates and their campaign sponsors blasted the state's news media Tuesday while major Democratic candidates were stepping up their attacks on GOP opponents.

Sen. Robert Morgan, the incumbent Democrat seeking a second term in the U.S. Senate, branded as an "unmitigated lie" a charge leveled by Republican Party Chairman Jack Lee that Morgan had made a political deal with the makers of the FB-111 bombers.

Morgan's opponent, Republican John East, contended in Burlington that his campaign is "on the threshold of victory" and blamed Morgan and other Democrats for the Iranian hostage crisis.

Democratic Gov. Jim Hunt said he sees next Tuesday's general election as a test of the effectiveness of the Congressional Club, the political organization running campaigns for GOP candidates for governor, the U.S. Senate and for lieutenant governor.

In turn top club officials lashed out at press coverage and particularly newspaper editorials of the campaign.

"We're just going to go on plowing our ground and getting our message on TV ... because you sure can't get it out in the newspapers," said Carter Wrenn, the club's treasurer.

Tom Ellis, head of the Congressional Club, refused to talk with reporters who greeted him outside the club's offices Tuesday.

"No, No, I'm not going to talk to anybody in the press, period," Ellis said.

But later Ellis called The Associated Press to explain that he had avoided comment because "I don't want to be the focus of this campaign."

Morgan's declaration followed Lee's statement accusing the Democrat of

making a deal with General Dynamics Corp. over his support of the company's bomber. Lee charged that Morgan received contributions totaling \$5,000 from the company in exchange for his support of a proposed \$5.5 billion government purchase of the FB-111.

"It's an unmitigated lie," Morgan said at a Raleigh news conference. "It is part of the rotten, sorry political campaign that Jack Lee and his John Bircher friends have become known for."

"Never in 30 years of campaigning have I seen someone who has consistently distorted the facts like this," Morgan said.

In Burlington East described Morgan as "the most faithful supporter of the president on every issue" and linked Morgan with leaders he said were responsible for a foreign policy that led to the takeover of the American embassy in Iran.

East spoke at a Dutch treat hot dog supper along with GOP Sen. Jesse Helms, Lee and 6th District Republican candidate for Congress Gene

Johnston. Helms assailed Morgan's voting record, without using the senator's name, on the Panama Canal Treaty, foreign aid to Nicaragua and most-favored-nation trade status for China.

East included Hunt in the criticisms he leveled at Democrats and recounted reading a news story after the Democratic Convention which said Hunt had tears in his eyes following Massachusetts Sen. Ted Kennedy's speech to the convention.

"When I read that the governor had cried, I cried," East said.

He added that Hunt had called the speech touching and said the governor told a reporter Kennedy's oration "defined what we Democrats stand for."

"I don't think the governor speaks for the Democrats of this state when he says that ... the Democrats of this state do not look to Teddy Kennedy to define what they stand for," East said.

In Asheboro, Hunt said he didn't believe the Con-

gressional Club had treated the state Republican Party fairly by taking over the campaigns of East, gubernatorial candidate I. Beverly Lake Jr. and the GOP candidate for lieutenant governor, William Cobey.

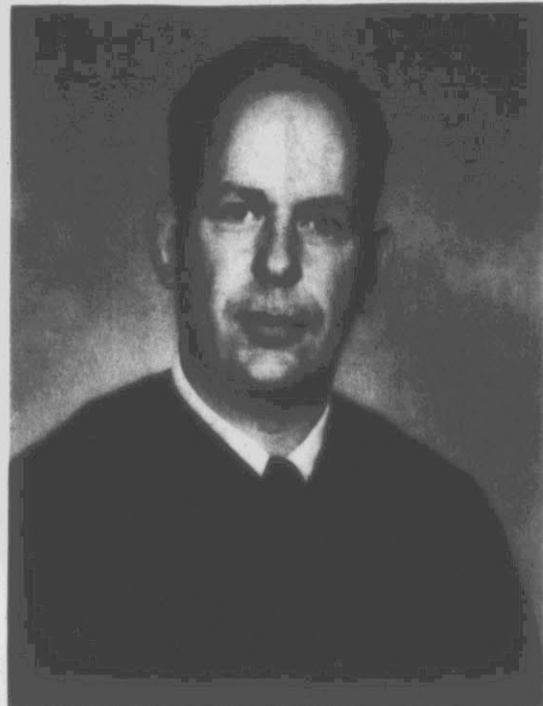
"I would have to say that how the three candidates fare Tuesday will show the relative strength of the Congressional Club," Hunt said.

Lake did not campaign publicly Tuesday while he continued a recovery from a throat infection, but his two campaign chairmen held a news conference in Raleigh to criticize the Hunt administration.

Dick Titus and Bernie Harrell said the administration was making arrangements to accommodate a tunnel between the state Legislative Building and a new legislative office building under construction despite the General Assembly's removal of money from the budget for the controversial project.

Calm Council Of State Races

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — With eight Democrats seeking re-election to offices in the Council of State, there seems to be little concern among the four who face Republican opposition next fall.

No Republican has won election to a Council of State post since 1896, and this year promises to be no exception, the Democrats say. The races have been marked by the absence of issues and a lack of interest.

"It is obviously an uphill struggle (for Republican candidates)," said Keith S. Snyder, GOP candidate for attorney general. "We are outregistered two to one."

Snyder is challenging Democratic incumbent Rufus Edmisten.

The other contested races are secretary of state, state auditor and insurance commissioner.

Snyder, an Asheville attorney, has served as attorney for Caldwell County, judge in the 25th Judicial District and as U.S. attorney for the Western District of North Carolina.

In the Republican primary, Snyder defeated national Nazi leader Harold Covington, who managed to capture 43 percent of the vote.

"I took it for granted a letter to all county chairmen would be sufficient," Snyder said in reference to the primary race against Covington. "But the general public today goes for two things — headlines and television."

Covington, Snyder said, had both of those things.

Edmisten, 39 and a native of Boone, is seeking his third term. Before he was elected attorney general, he served on the staff of former U.S. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr.

In the secretary of state race, 30-year-old Thad Eure is seeking re-election to the post in which he has served for more than half his life, 44 years. Known for his bow-tie, Eure proudly proclaims himself the "oldest rat in the Democratic barn."

Democrat George Breece offered Eure a stiff primary challenge and collected more than 40 percent of the vote.

But Republican challenger David T. Flaherty of Lenoir has run a low-key campaign. Flaherty, an executive of Broyhill Furniture Co., ran against Gov. Jim Hunt for governor in 1976 and captured about 35 percent of the vote.

Flaherty also served as a cabinet secretary under

former Republican Gov. Jim Holshouser.

Democrat Edward Renfrow and Republican James F. McIntyre are vying for the job of retiring State Auditor Henry Bridges. Renfrow, 40, defeated J.E.B. Davis and Bill Chestnut in the Democratic primary.

The Smithfield Democrat is a three-term state senator and an accountant.

McIntyre — who has received the backing of the Congressional Club, the political organization of Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C. — is an accountant in Greenville. This is the first time he has run for a major political office. McIntyre is treasurer for GOP Senate candidate John East.

In another contested race, Insurance Commissioner John Ingram is challenged by Edwin W. Tenney Jr. of Chapel Hill. Ingram, 51, who ran unsuccessfully against Helms for a U.S. Senate seat in 1978, is running for a third term as insurance commissioner.

Ingram defeated a crowded field of Democrats who opposed him in the May Democratic primary.

Tenney, 57, is a realtor in Chapel Hill who has publicly questioned Ingram's competency.

Harlan E. Boyles is running unopposed for a second term as state treasurer. A 50-year-old Lincoln County

native, he served as deputy state treasurer before he was elected to the job.

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Graham, 59, is unopposed in his bid for a fifth term. Graham, who is from Rowan County, has become well known for his defense of North Carolina's tobacco industry and the federal price-support program. He was appointed to the job by former Gov. Terry Sanford to fill a vacancy in 1964.

Also unopposed is Labor Commissioner John Brooks. It would be the second term for the former Raleigh attorney.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Craig Phillips is running without Republican opposition for a fourth term. Phillips, 57, is a former school superintendent at Winston-Salem and Charlotte.

In addition to the Council of State positions, there is one judicial position on the statewide ballot.

Democrat Willis P. Whichard Jr., 40, of Durham, who resigned from the state Senate in September after being appointed to a seat on the state Court of Appeals, is running for election to serve out the remainder of his term, which expires Dec. 31, 1982. Gov. Jim Hunt appointed Whichard to replace Judge Frank M. Parker, who retired.

Former Superior Court

Judge Robert R. Browning, 44, of Greenville, is seeking to unseat Whichard. Brown-

ing, who practices law in Greenville, served for several years as a Superior Court

judge after being appointed to the bench by former Gov. Jim Holshouser in 1973.

On September 21, P&G convened a scientific advisory group to review all known data relating to TSS. The

group concluded that the available data were still fragmentary, but advised that the results of the latest CDC study should not be ignored.

Water Conservation Week Noted

Mayor Don McGlohn proclaimed Oct. 26 through Nov. 1 as Water Conservation Week in Greenville. McGlohn mentioned that "an ample supply of clean water is essential to the economic and social well-being of the citizens of Greenville." He noted that the city "has been unusually well endowed with the surface and ground water resources needed for a prosperous economy and healthy environment."

According to the proclamation, "water shortages can be avoided with better planning and water supply and wastewater disposal has increased three-fold over the past 13 years and promises to continue to mount at this rate in the foreseeable future."

"The cost of energy to pump, treat and heat water, and treat the resulting wastewater has paralleled the rise in construction costs," the mayor said. "A reduction in the amounts of water used by the householder and industrial plant can extend the present supply for other potential uses, reduce the need for costly capital expenditures for water supply and wastewater treatment, reduce the use of energy for water heating, reduce the cost of living without any loss of living standards, and increase competitive position."

McGlohn commended the observance "to our citizens as a period in which to review the opportunities for water conservation through the avoidance of waste and more efficient use of water."

Analysts also said Wall Street appeared cheered by the Carter-Reagan debate Tuesday evening. The market had been restrained in advance of that debate. Among actively traded issues in the early going, Inco rose 1/4 to 21 $\frac{1}{2}$; Genesco gained 1/4 to 5 $\frac{1}{2}$; Mobil rose 1/2 to 80 $\frac{1}{4}$.

Among other issues, Chrysler rose 1/4 to 8. It reported a third quarter loss of \$490 million. Ford was unchanged at 25 after it announced a record loss of \$595 million after the close of trading Tuesday.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrial average closed with a gain of just 0.85 at 932.59. Losing issues outnumbered gainers by a 3-2 margin on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume totaled 40.30 million shares, against 34.43 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index rose 0.02 to 73.84. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 4.16 to 355.59.

Winterville Holds Hearing

WINTERVILLE — A public hearing was held last week concerning the proposed zoning ordinance for the town. Several planning board members and the town aldermen were present.

The ordinance was explained to those in attendance in terms of how it will affect the town in the next few years.

"Winterville will expand rapidly in the next few years," said Town Advisor Carl Dean. "Its growth will be in conjunction with Greenville and that city's growth. We are now very near large shopping areas, industries and schools. This ordinance will supervise that growth, more or less."

Dean said he felt that by 1985 Winterville could double in size. "This ordinance is a planning tool used to organize how the town will grow in the next five years," explained the advisor.

(Continued from Page 1) carefully considered." By contrast he said that George Bush, now Reagan's running mate, once described the GOP nominee's proposal for a 30 percent cut in income tax rates to be phased in over a three-year period as "voodoo economics" that would boost the inflation rate to 30 percent.

Reagan retorted that Carter has broken many of the economic pledges of his 1976 campaign and has tried to place the blame for inflation on OPEC, the Federal Reserve Board and the American people.

"He has then accused the people of living too well," said Reagan. "...We don't

have inflation because the people are living too well. We have inflation because the government is living too well." During rebuttal, Carter called the Reagan tax plan "this ridiculous proposal." He quoted Reagan as saying the minimum wage was a major cause of unemployment and said, "This is a heartless kind of approach to the working families of our country."

Carter said that when Reagan was governor of California "he had the three largest tax increases in the history of that state." Reagan called that assertion "a distortion of the situation," and said the in-

crease in the size of California's state government in relation to population was only one-sixth that of the Georgia state government where Carter served as governor. The tax increases took place as California experienced a tremendous surge of growth while the nation entered an inflationary period that strained state budgets. Though Carter was not about to point it out, Reagan inherited a deficit in California and left office with a surplus.

Carter jumped at the opportunity to attack Reagan's opposition to the SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union as "a very dangerous and disturbing thing."

The president said the treaty designed to limit the strategic nuclear arsenals of the two superpowers had been negotiated over seven years "by myself and my two Republican predecessors."

Reagan retorted that one of those Republicans, Gerald R. Ford, opposed the treaty

finally signed by Carter. Despite his role in negotiating SALT II, Ford has disavowed the treaty, citing changes drawn by the Carter administration.

Reagan said he has not advocated scrapping the agreement, explaining, "I am talking about taking the treaty back and going back into negotiations."

Carter said Reagan was advocating "resumption of a very dangerous nuclear arms race" and added "this attitude is extremely dangerous and belligerent in its tone, although it's said with a quiet voice."

Reagan immediately shot back: "I know the president's supposed to be replying to me, but sometimes I have a hard time in connecting what he's saying with what I have said or what my positions are. I sometimes think it's like the witch doctor that gets mad when a good doctor comes along with a cure that will work."

On Social Security, both

men said their goal was to strengthen the system to make certain no one lost benefits. When Carter repeated his frequent campaign claim that Reagan once advocated making it voluntary, the Republican nominee replied, "That just isn't true." However, a check of the record shows that Reagan had leaped in that direction several times in the late 1960s.

Moments later, Carter said Reagan began his political career "campaigning around this country against Medicare."

"There you go again," said Reagan, who explained that he supported a different piece of legislation that took a different approach to providing assistance to the elderly.

Emory: 'We Came Together During UNC Week'

Despite suffering a 31-3 loss at the hands of nationally-ranked North Carolina last Saturday afternoon, Coach Ed Emory found some good things to say about the play of his Pirates.

And he pointed out that just a couple of inches separated the Pirates from a much better game.

"It's very disappointing any time you lose," he said. "We felt that we had had the best week of practice of the year before the game. We were getting better every day. And our morale has been great all year."

Emory noted that split end Larry O'Roark shaved his head to get up for the game, and about 25 of his teammates followed suit during the week. "We came together more as a team during the week," the coach said.

"We knew on paper that we weren't as good as Carolina, but we were still hoping that our enthusiasm would help us to overcome a lot. We were hoping that the weather (rain) would keep up too. We thought that it was in our favor."

Aside from Carolina's first drive, opening the game, Emory felt that the Pirate defense played an outstanding game in the first half. "Jeffrey Warren had a tremendous game. We read a lot about the great play of the Carolina defense, but Warren had 24 stops of his own. That's some kind of a day. Imagine what he'd be like if he had the kind of people that Carolina has around him."

Pointing out that the Pirates were forced to play for field position all game long, Emory said that the injury sustained by Carlton Nelson helped the Heels score their second touchdown.

"When Carlton went down I didn't know what was the matter with him. I thought that he'd just died or something," Emory said. Nelson, inside his own 20, faded back to pass on first down, then just collapsed in pain at the eight yard line. It turned out he had a pinched nerve in his shoulder, returning for only three plays in the second half.

"That, plus (Greg) Stewart getting sacked on third down put us in very poor field position. Instead of having to punt from up around the 25, Rodney Allen had to kick out of his own end

zone. They got a good return on the kick and started the series at our 40. So you can see the kind of field position it cost us."

That series led to Carolina's second touchdown, allowing the Heels to take a 14-3 lead into the dressing rooms.

"If we had gotten good field position, we might have prevented that and I think going into the half at 7-3 would have been a very positive thing for us," Emory said.

One of the bright spots of the game was the fact that the Pirates didn't have a fumble in the game. "And we had only two five-yard penalties on offense."

"Our backs ran hard, but they didn't block well. That helped to make a bona-fide all-American out of Lawrence Taylor. It made him look good at getting to our quarterback because nobody was blocking him like they should have."

Emory praised Carolina, however, as having an outstanding defensive team. "It may be the best defensive team I've ever seen there."

Still, Emory felt that the Pirates should have scored one or more touchdowns. For one, defensive tackle Nate Wigfall came

within a hair of fully blocking a Steve Streater punt. That could have given the Pirates the ball in excellent field position early. Instead, the ball was just touched enough to affect its total yardage.

"Ernest Byner just about got away when he broke that long run. (Greg) Poole just did get to him," Emory pointed out. "Maybe if Ernest had more experience, he would have been able to get away."

"Too, A.C. (Collins) should have had a touchdown on a sweep. He's had the experience to know what to do but he didn't do it. Otherwise, their defense just dominated the game."

The coach added that it will be interesting to see what the Heels do against the University of Oklahoma this weekend.

"It's hard to lose, but we can still meet our goals. Those included having a winning season, and we can still do that by winning three of our last four games. I don't think that's out of the range of the possible."

"If we can do that, our seniors will go out with four straight winning seasons. That's some accomplishment."

Heels Underdogs Vs. Sooners

OU Reportedly Not Taking Carolina Seriously

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — The North Carolina football team is undefeated, sixth-ranked nationally and the underdog this Saturday against a team with a 4-2 record.

Hard to believe? Not if the other team is 16th-ranked Oklahoma and the game is taking place in Norman, Okla. The Sooners' dominance in college football, especially on their home field, remains in the minds of the oddsmakers.

And, it seems Oklahoma and its coach Barry Switzer have similar ideas, according to Tar Heel coach Dick Crum.

"I don't think Oklahoma is taking us very seriously," Crum said at his Tuesday news conference. "From what I've read in the papers and from talking to the press out there, I don't think they're taking us as seriously as Texas or another team out in that part of the country."

But Crum and the Tar Heels aren't underestimating anyone. Just as they haven't in their previous seven games.

"The game has been in the back of our minds and now we can focus on it," Crum said. "But we're not going to practice any differently. It doesn't matter if we're six-point underdogs or 14-point favorites. You've still got to line up and play."

But with all the publicity

surrounding the encounter, is it just another game?

"I think it is," Crum said. "Our kids have worked hard to get where they are. I don't think just because Oklahoma is nationally known, it is going to make any difference. Last year Pittsburgh was nationally known and so was Michigan (UNC won both games). We've just got to prepare to play the fundamentals better than the other team."

"One game won't make or break our season. I think (linebacker) Lawrence Taylor put it succinctly when he said, 'Some people have had their doubts about us and they will have those doubts about us after the Oklahoma game, whether we win or lose.'"

UNC tailback Amos Lawrence gets a bit upset when told the Sooners don't respect the Tar Heels. He knows from past experience that other so-called national powers have regretted doing just that.

"When we played Michigan

in the Gator Bowl last year, they didn't think we were good enough to hold their jocks, and you see what happened to them," Lawrence said. "All I know is they better not take their eyes off us."

Many people think the Tar Heels' chances for a major bowl bid hinges on the outcome of this game but Crum does not believe the outcome of the game will affect his team's chances one way or another, because the major bowls have so many locked in teams.

But that is not his main concern at the moment. Instead he is thinking about handling the Sooners wishbone offense which is averaging 475.3 yards a game (third in the nation), 371.1 yards rushing (second in the nation) and 35.8 points (fourth in the nation).

On the other hand, North Carolina leads the nation in scoring defense, allowing only 5.6 points a game. It also is third in rushing defense allowing only 76.9 yards a

game and fourth in total defense allowing only 215.6 yards a game.

But Crum may have an edge that not many coaches have.

"I've been getting all sorts of letters from people in Oklahoma, telling me how to beat Oklahoma. That's really unusual," said Crum, who said he normally gets letters from fans, but, "These letters have been specifically about how to play certain players. It's a real change of pace. I guess there are some people living in Oklahoma that don't like Oklahoma."

The Tar Heels have never beaten the Sooners or any other Big Eight team for that matter. They are 0-6 against the Big Eight and 0-3 against

the Sooners. They last played in 1956 and Oklahoma won, 36-0.

But Oklahoma has been beaten in Norman once this year. Stanford did it 31-14.

"Stanford just held on to the ball and Oklahoma just didn't get it," Crum said. "What's going to be important for us is taking advantage of any opportunities they give us. If they turn the ball over, it's important for us to get something out of it."

Chargers Host Jaguars, Panthers Face Mariners

Astro Firing To Bring Legal Action?

HOUSTON (AP) — The firing of Tal Smith as president and general manager of the Houston Astros and his replacement by Al Rosen has brought the threat of possible legal action by some of the National League team's limited partners.

David LeFevre, one of 25 limited partners and who holds the second largest share of stock in the club, suggested that action may be taken to reverse Smith's firing by General Partner John McMullen Monday.

LeFevre, a New York attorney, said he was speaking on behalf of the limited partners, adding: "I think we feel strong enough that we are going to take specific action. As a lawyer and a person very deeply concerned, I feel we are getting into an area of strategy, and I don't want to tie anyone's hands as to what it is we might do and what it is our main concerns are."

McMullen shrugged off the possibility of court action

aimed at reversing his firing of Smith. It was under Smith's reign that the Astros had climbed from the cellar to the title in the National League West and came within one run of winning the 1980 NL Championship Playoff series with the Philadelphia Phillies.

In discussing the firing, McMullen said: "Every man has a time limit on his effectiveness. If a man can't do it in five years, he can't do it in 10."

He also indicated that Smith's contract, which he inherited from previous ownership, was a problem. The pact contained a bonus stipulation based on the Astros attendance.

Rosen, a former general manager of the New York Yankees, obviously was aware that he was stepping into a hornet's nest of fans anger created by the firing.

"I feel every man has to walk in his own footsteps," Rosen said. "If the fans of Houston idolize Tal then I'm

not going to try to change that. But if given the opportunity, I hope the fans may some day have the same kind of feeling for me."

Rosen, hired by McMullen two days after the Astros lost to Philadelphia in the final game of the Championship Series though the announcement was not made until Monday, added:

"I respect the fans' feelings. That bodes well for the future of the Astros. It means to me that they want to win."

Smith, interviewed as he was cleaning out his desk, said part of the reason for his dismissal was McMullen's ego.

"He (McMullen) wants this to be his team," Smith said. "He doesn't want it to be (Manager) Bill Virdon's team or Tal Smith's team. It's a matter of ego."

Smith, given much of the credit for building the Astros into a division champion, also said he thought McMullen's decision to fire him was made in the emotion following the loss to Philadelphia in the

playoffs. "I find the timing most unusual that two days after we lost to Philadelphia in the championship series that he made a deal to hire Rosen," Smith said. "I think most people felt we had really accomplished something. Most of the baseball fans across the country really respected the Astros."

Smith said the New York Mets had asked permission to interview him last January but McMullen denied the request without consulting Smith.

"I have no quarrel with that because at the time I had not thought of leaving the Astros," Smith said. "But in retrospect, if I had known what was going to happen, I would have been interested."

Smith said McMullen had told him a clause in his contract was part of the problem. Smith said his contract called for him to receive an incentive bonus for improved Astros attendance.

Smith said the clause netted him a nominal bonus in 1978

but it improved in 1979 and by 1982 "it would have been very substantial. I feel I've been damaged in a number of ways. This is the only club in town and unless I want to change careers, I'll have to go elsewhere."

Controversy Finds Phillies — Again

NEW YORK (AP) — You can tuck it away in the joy of a world championship or hide it in the corner of the trainer's room, but one way or another, sooner or later, the Philadelphia Phillies find the road to controversy.

There was, for example, a rather innocent request made of Mike Schmidt, most valuable player in the World Series, who was honored at a luncheon Tuesday. He was asked to rate Phillies Manager Dallas Green.

Schmidt considered the question for a moment.

"A-minus," he decided. "Minus?"

"Hey, that's a pretty grade, you know," said Schmidt. "You can't say too much bad about A-minus."

But A-minus is not A and Schmidt was asked where he felt his manager had fallen short.

"Well, I think there are times when he may say something after a game about a player that he might regret that he might not have wanted to say," Schmidt said. "It's my own opinion, but I think sometimes he wasn't tactful enough with the press when the subject was his own players."

Green is a blunt, to-the-point man. He preached teamwork to the Phillies this year and sold them on the "We, not I," approach to baseball.

"The manager has to be part of that 'We, though,'" said Schmidt. "If it's 'We, not I,' for the players, then it has to be 'We, not they,' for the manager."

Green thought the Phillies' discovery of teamwork was the most important ingredient in their season's success.

"We, not I," is the simple way to put it," the manager said. "What we did was break down the class distinction between the eight starters and the bench, the starting pitchers and the relievers. We were a team."

Schmidt, of course, was an important part of the homogenization during the regular season as well as the playoffs and World Series.

"Michael Jack Schmidt deserved this," the manager said of his third baseman's Series MVP award. "He was the guy who had to glue us together. If

he collapsed, we were in trouble. He stayed tough, got us a couple of game-winning hits, seven runs batted in. You can't ask for much more."

Schmidt batted .381 in the Series, had two home runs and two game-winning hits. He scored six runs and drove in seven. That earned him the MVP award which carried with it a \$9,000 watch and a \$5,000 scholarship to his alma mater, Ohio University.

The slugging third baseman sees a bright future for the Phillies.

"I hope they keep our team intact," he said. "We have better pitching than anybody in baseball."

Duke Rolls Past ECU In V'ball

DURHAM — Duke University rolled to a one-sided volleyball victory over East Carolina University last night, winning in three straight games.

The Blue Devils took the first game, 15-10, followed that with a 15-11 win, and closed out the Lady Pirates in the third game, 15-9.

The loss dropped East Carolina to 12-25 overall and 1-7 in state Division I competition.

"We played well in Maryland and when you come off of having a good tournament, you don't seem to play as well in a match soon after that," said Lynn Davidson, assistant coach.


"We weren't psyched up and stayed on defense all night. We never got our offense going. We weren't even in the match."

"Our settings were off the net, and a couple of their hitters were having a good night and our blocks were ineffective. They just hit around them."

The Lady Pirates are idle until November 6 when they travel to the University of North Carolina. "We have some time to recuperate and pull it back together before we play them," Davidson said.

"It's going to be really tough to beat them at home, but we can if we get the breaks and play good ball."

Canadiens Finding Little Joy

This used to be such a fun time for the Montreal Canadiens. The beginning of a National Hockey League season was when the Canadiens would establish their domination over the mere mortals of the sport. Then they would storm to the Stanley Cup.

So far this season, however, the Canadiens have been on anything but a joy ride. Their 2-6-1 record makes for their worst start since 1938. Four of their best players — Guy Lafleur, Guy Lapointe, Doug Risebrough and Pierre Mondou — are sidelined with injuries.

Perhaps worst of all, the Canadiens stir no fear in the hearts of their opponents.

"I don't know if it's because they've lost key players or what," said Buffalo's Tony McKegney after the Sabres blew past the Canadiens 5-2 in the Montreal Forum last Saturday, "but I'm more confident playing against them now. I think the Canadiens are lacking spirit."

"We don't have that killer instinct," noted Steve Shutt, one of the few Canadiens playing anywhere near his peak. "Through the years when we won the Cups, we had a lot of very ordinary players working hard. We've got to get back to that way."

"We rely more on hard work than talent and if we don't work, there is no talent. We still have those players, so injuries shouldn't be the reason. The days are gone when four or five guys could take the night off and say, 'I'll cruise through this game.'"

"Motivation shouldn't have anything to do with it either. If you have to go motivate a guy, he shouldn't be here."

Shutt saw the same signs last season, when the Canadiens' slow start resulted in the resignation of Coach Bernie Geoffrion. Right now, Claude Ruel, the man who reluctantly took over the team's helm and

remained in that post for this season, might be having second thoughts about working behind the Montreal bench.

"If you put yourself in a hole for a month, it takes a month to get out," added Shutt after a 6-4 loss Tuesday to the Islanders. "When things go bad, you have a tendency to blame everyone else. But you should sit and analyze what you're doing wrong, evaluate your own play. That's your job."

"You can't do more than your own job or you become more ineffective trying to do other people's work."

Defenseman Larry Robinson couldn't agree more.

"Except for a couple of guys, this is the same team that won before," said Robinson, hockey's premier rearguard last season. "You can't live on the past. You have to recapture the dedication and togetherness that brought consistency."

"If you take two horses of the same strength and have them pulling at odds, you won't go anywhere. They have to pull together for you to get moving."

Opponents' regard for the Canadiens has changed since they lost to Minnesota in the playoff quarterfinals last spring.

"There's no fear present at

all," said Robinson. "Teams come in saying it, that they're no longer afraid to go to the Forum or play Montreal. No one can install the fear back but us."

Is this team capable of doing that?

"I don't know," said Robinson. "There's definitely cause for alarm. If we don't do something soon, it could take us four seasons to catch up."

"Remember, there are no lower teams in the NHL any more. Teams like St. Louis and Washington, who were down, have good young players. They rebuilt ... everybody goes through rebuilding. It's up to

the guys who've been around to pick up the load."

The team's management, while concerned, doesn't seem to be ready for any drastic moves.

"I can't say that our game plan is changed," said Canadiens Managing Director Irving Grundman, whose mere presence at the Islanders game — he doesn't usually travel with the club — might indicate that the Montreal hierarchy is quite worried. "I don't expect any changes in the club now."

"We don't own a panic button."
"Maybe," replied Robinson. "we should buy one."

Jazz's Two-Man Gang A Hit

Adrian Dantley was the whole show for the Utah Jazz last year when they had the worst team in the National Basketball Association. This season, they have Darrell Griffith to make it a two-man gang, so the Jazz shouldn't be singing the blues so often.

Griffith scored 33 points and Dantley 28 in Utah's 104-96 victory over the expansion Dallas Mavericks Tuesday night, raising the Jazz's early-season record to 4-5.

"Griffith and Dantley were a two-man team. They beat us. There was just no way to stop them," Dallas Coach Dick Motta said. "Dantley is the

league's leading scorer, and after tonight he still is."

In other NBA games, the Philadelphia 76ers whipped the Cleveland Cavaliers 119-101, the San Antonio Spurs won their eighth straight game with a 120-112 decision over the Portland Trail Blazers, the Atlanta Hawks beat the Kansas City Kings 119-109, the Milwaukee Bucks won their seventh in a row by defeating the Chicago Bulls 106-99, the Los Angeles Lakers rolled to a 131-101 victory over the San Diego Clippers and the Seattle SuperSonics swamped the Golden State Warriors 119-102.

Scoring points is something that Griffith, the second pick in the first round of the 1980 draft,

was supposed to do. But an unexpected plus for the former Louisville star Tuesday night, according to Coach Tom Nissalke, was his defensive play.

"This has been a big change-around for him to play both offense and defense, and tonight he played his best defense of the season," Nissalke said. "Most people don't realize it, but it's a big step from college to pro."

Griffith was the key player at the turning point of the game, when the Jazz tallied 16 straight points in a 2½-minute span of the third quarter. During that spurt, Griffith scored nine points as a 57-48

Dallas lead was turned into a 64-57 Utah advantage.

The 6-foot-4 rookie guard also pulled down six rebounds, stole the ball twice and blocked a shot.

Geoff Huston was the Mavericks' leading scorer with 26 points.

Lakers 131, Clippers 101

Earvin "Magic" Johnson scored 21 of his game-high 29 points in the first half as Los Angeles coasted to victory after taking a 73-45 halftime lead.

Johnson also had eight rebounds and 10 assists in just 31 minutes of playing time. Rookie Michael Brooks made his first start for San Diego and scored 24 points to lead his team although he sat out the final quarter.

Spurs 120, Blazers 112
George Gervin scored 30 points and Mark Olberding 23 as San Antonio tied a team record with its eighth straight victory. The Spurs' 9-1 record is the best in the NBA.

Bucks 106, Bulls 99
Milwaukee, which joins the Lakers with 8-2 marks, survived a 14-0 surge in the third quarter by Chicago by coming back with a 19-4 flurry to take a 79-69 lead in the final period.

Marques Johnson led the Bucks with 18 points and Reggie Theus paced all scorers with 25.

76ers 119, Cavaliers 101

Julius Erving and Bobby Jones led a 29-7 point explosion in the final 7½ minutes of the third quarter to lead Philadelphia over Cleveland.

The 76ers outshot the Cavs 58 percent to 30 percent in the period and outscored them 14-5.

Erving led all scorers with 25 points and Jones had 22. Mike Mitchell was Cleveland's top point-producer with 23.

Sonics 119, Warriors 102

Fred Brown, starting his second straight game in place of injured regular Paul Westphal, scored 27 points to lead Seattle over Golden State.

Brown, who scored 28 in a Sonics victory Sunday, hit his last 11 shots, including a three-pointer, as Seattle pulled away from a seven-point lead with 6:35 left in the third period to margins as high as 19 in the final quarter.

Hawks 119, Kings 109
John Drew scored 32 points, including 11 of Atlanta's last 13, as the Hawks broke a three-game losing streak.

Kansas City trailed only 113-107 with 2:31 left in the game, but Drew took over and scored his team's last six points to salt the victory.

Dan Roundfield added 27 points for the Hawks and Scott Wedman led all scorers with 34 for the Kings.

Ferragamo May Insure Arm For \$1 Million

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Quarterback Vince Ferragamo, whose million-dollar arm has nearly 20 times the value of his contract with the Los Angeles Rams, says he is considering insuring his arm for about \$1 million until he can negotiate a long-term deal.

"If I can't work out something with the Rams I don't want to gamble (on suffering a disabling injury)," said Ferragamo, hero of the Rams' near-miss loss to Pittsburgh in pro football's Super Bowl last January.

Now midway through the option year of a reported \$52,000-a-year contract, Ferragamo could become a National Football League free agent when this season is over. And he has added to his negotiating power by leading the National Football League quarterback ratings in 1980.

Little used in his first 2½ years as a pro, his value soared as he led the Rams into and through the playoffs after becoming a starter at mid-season last year. For the past two weeks Ferragamo has been the top-rated passer in the NFL, completing 64.1 percent of his throws for 1,601 yards and 14 touchdowns.

As a result he's on the threshold of a

probable \$1 million-plus, multi-year contract with the Rams or another team. But a serious injury in the meantime could leave Ferragamo with nothing.

"The problem is that it's real expensive for short term policies," he said of his interest in insuring his strong right arm.

"Lloyds of London is the only company I know that makes up policies like that for professional athletes," Ferragamo told the Los Angeles Herald Examiner.

"The more I play without a contract, the hotter things get all the time," said Ferragamo. But he also has a warm feeling when he thinks about what he would have accepted from the Rams just a few months ago.

"I'm lucky I didn't sign," he added. "Things worked out a lot better or me this way. What I would have signed for then and now is quite a contrast."

Ferragamo recently took personal charge of his negotiations with Rams' General Manager Don Klosterman. Ferragamo won't say what he seeks, but he concedes little progress toward agreement has been made in his four meetings with Klosterman in recent weeks.

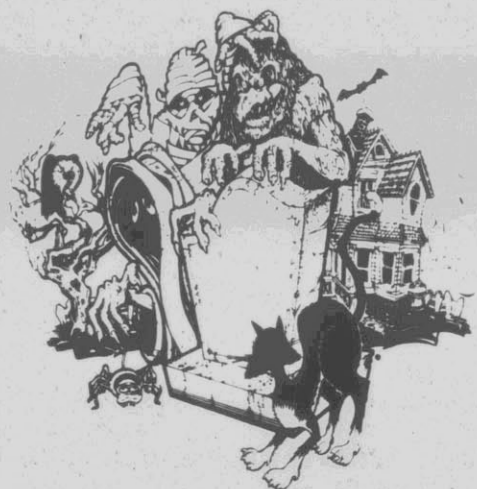

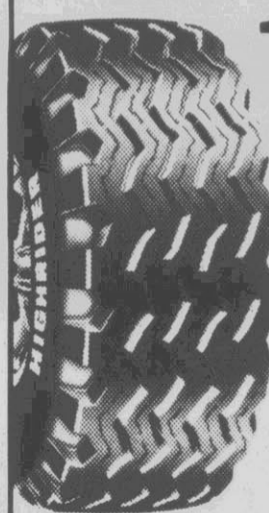

Other players who have declared free agency in the past few days include pitcher Dan Spillner of Cleveland; infielder Dave Chalk of Kansas City; pitcher Luis Tiant of the New York Yankees and pitcher Ray Burris of the New York Mets.

That makes 38 players who have announced they will participate in the Nov. 13 re-entry draft in New York.

Winfield, the San Diego Padres' star outfielder, declared his free agency last Wednesday, the first day permitted under the rules. Since then, there has been much fanfare over the Padres' efforts to trade Winfield and get something in return besides the amateur draft pick they would get if he is signed as a free agent.

Major league owners were asked Tuesday by Ray Grebey, director of the owners' Player Relations Committee, if they would object if the Padres signed Winfield with the understanding that he would be assigned to another club.

Grebey said earlier that such a prior arrangement was not possible.

The result of the poll has not been announced.

Most prominent in the speculation over a trade for Winfield are the New York Yankees, who reportedly are willing to send outfielder Joe Lefebvre and two other players to San Diego.

Before such a trade could happen, San Diego would first have to sign Winfield to a contract, and if the owners object to the Padres' acting as negotiator for another club, then Winfield's lawyer, Dick Moss, said there could be no deal between the Padres and Yankees.

"I've told (San Diego President) Ballard Smith that if he gets the appropriate assurances that we could talk to the Padres about negotiating a contract that could be assigned to the Yankees, or another club, then we could sit down and talk to him (Smith)," Moss said.

"He (Winfield) has to get something in his contract that says he has to be traded to a certain team by a certain date or he would be a free agent," said Marvin Miller, executive director of the Players Association. "He has to have protection."

Under current regulations, Winfield could sign a deal with the Padres that has a clause restricting a trade to any team except the Yankees. But this wouldn't prevent the Padres from keeping him, which is unacceptable to Winfield.

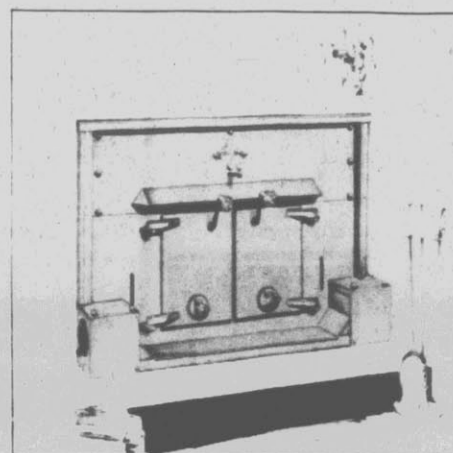

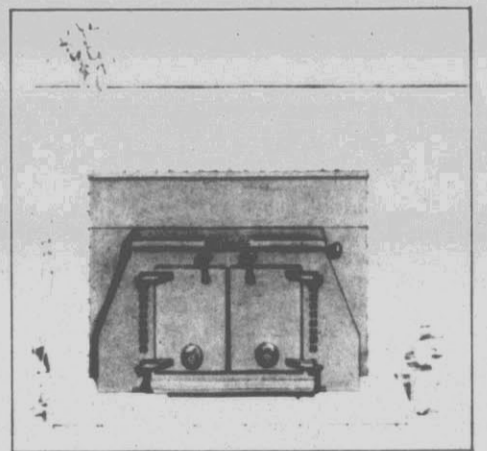

Race For Heisman Wide Open

Is this the year someone other than a quarterback or a running back wins the Heisman Trophy?

Probably not, but not since 1971, when Auburn quarterback Pat Sullivan won out over Cornell tailback Ed Marinaro, has the race been as wide-open as it seems to be this year. The candidates even include a defensive end and a freshman running back.

The selections of Nebraska's Johnny Rodgers in 1972, Penn State's John Cappelletti in 1973, Ohio State's Archie Griffin in 1974 and 1975, Pitt's Tony Dorsett in 1976, Texas' Earl Campbell in 1977, Oklahoma's Billy Sims in 1978 and Southern Cal's Charles White last year were pretty much cut and dried.

But this year's race appears to have seven major contenders — quarterbacks Art Schlichter of Ohio State and Mark Herrmann of Purdue; running backs George Rogers of South Carolina, Jarvis Redwine of Nebraska, Freeman McNeil of UCLA and Herschel Walker of Georgia; and defensive end Hugh Green of Pittsburgh.

The preseason contenders

also included quarterback Rich Campbell of California and nose guard Ron Simmons of Florida State. But Campbell has the misfortune to play on a losing team, even though his statistics are impressive, while Simmons missed a couple of early games with an injury.

Alabama has never had a Heisman Trophy winner and this year is no exception, since the Crimson Tide runs in scores of players every week. UCLA considers All-American safety Kenny Easley a candidate, along with McNeil, which may split the West Coast vote. McNeil also sat out one game with an injury.

For a change, Notre Dame isn't pushing anyone, North Carolina's Amos Lawrence has had to share the tailback position with super soph Kelvin Bryant and Southern Cal tailback Marcus Allen hasn't made as much noise as some of his predecessors.

Nebraska's Redwine probably was the early-season leader when he paced the nation in rushing, but he missed two games with an injury and was forced out of last Saturday's contest with a recurrence of the ailment.

Schlichter hasn't piled up glowing statistics and Ohio

State's 17-0 loss to UCLA probably hurt his chances. Herrmann missed Purdue's opening game with an injury and was almost benched a few games later, although he reentered the picture by smashing the all-time NCAA pass yardage record last weekend.

Rogers, great as he is, has two strikes against him because South Carolina has virtually no football reputation to speak of, never having won more than eight games in a season. Walker was subpar in one game with a sore ankle and Green, after all, is a defensive lineman. Only two linemen have ever won the Heisman — two-way ends Larry Kelley of Yale in 1936 and Leon Hart of Notre Dame in 1949.

Baylor linebacker Mike Singletary gets little ink outside the Southwest and Brigham Young quarterback Jim McMahon suffers from much the same syndrome as South Carolina's Rogers. Saturday's TV battle between Rogers and Walker will have something to say in the Heisman voting.

Is there any such thing as an upset these days? For instance, how can Washington

beat Air Force 50-7, Air Force beat Navy 21-20 and Navy beat Washington 24-10?

"I can't explain it," says Navy Coach George Welsh. "But every team has players who can beat you. That's one of the things that's changed in college football in the last 5-6 years. It's leveled out a little more. Teams are better balanced now and a couple of good skilled people who get hot can beat you. There are more good athletes in college football today than ever before."

In fact, Notre Dame's Dan Devine thinks that players may be getting too big and too fast for even the quick-paced modern game.

"Our trainer says we're the best conditioned team he's ever seen," Devine points out, "but we've lost 13 players for the season and six more are out this week."

"The game has reached the point where it's so fast and the teams we play are hitting so hard...well, every kid we've lost this year has been on a good, clean, legal play. We may have a game that puts such a strain on a player's body that he is unable to handle it. More kids are big, strong and fast and they get better coaching in high

school." Devine also says that "integration has improved the caliber of Southern teams, maybe even swung the balance of power from the Midwest and Pacific Coast, if it was ever there, to the South."

A funny thing happened to Virginia Tech last weekend, and not just the Hokies' stunning 18-7 loss to unheralded Richmond. Going into the game, Tech was the nation's No. 2 team in total defense, allowing just 192.1 yards a game over-all, and was fifth in rushing defense, yielding 84.3 per game.

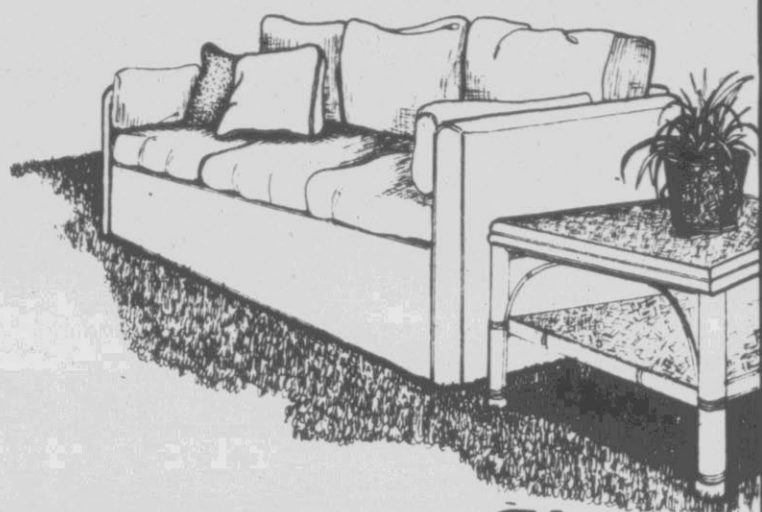
But Richmond's Barry Redden, a 5-foot-11, 195-pound junior from Sarasota, Fla., ruined those impressive figures. He carried 48 times, a school record, for 233 yards, including a 6-yard burst off tackle in the second period that gave the Spiders a 10-0 lead.

"Our game plan was to make them stop the run," Shealy said, "and if they did, we would throw."

Said Redden: "I hoped they would key on me. I don't feel tired. I feel winded, like a runner after a race. But I hope I feel like this the rest of the season."

DALLAS (AP) — In Thousand Oaks, Calif., during the dog days of their July training camp, a 6-2 start for his Dallas Cowboys was more than Coach Tom Landry could wish.

Featuring a new starting quarterback and a green secondary, Landry could see some hard times until the two units jelled. He was so worried about his defense he spent most of training camp working with that side of the line of scrimmage.

"Our team is where I hoped it would be," said Landry. "I felt our offense could do a lot of things it has done."

"But our defense was almost an impossible question. But we kept working and hustling and doing the things we had to do."

Would he take another 6-2 down the National Football League's back stretch?

"I'd take another 6-2 and not suit up," Landry quickly answered.

He added "the toughest part of our schedule is coming up." Landry refused to concede the National Conference East to the Philadelphia Eagles, who presently own a one game lead. He also pointed out the Cowboys and Eagles are in good shape for a wild card berth which goes to runnerup teams with superior records.

"We expect to win the East and won't give it up," said Landry. "Of course, if we're not the champions I'd like to be in the playoffs any way we can get there."

Landry can even see a possible Super Bowl for his team.

"We have the ingredients...we have a chance to be in the Super Bowl," said Landry. "We definitely have a chance for the East and if we keep improving and playing at the level we have been we could get to the Super Bowl with a few breaks."

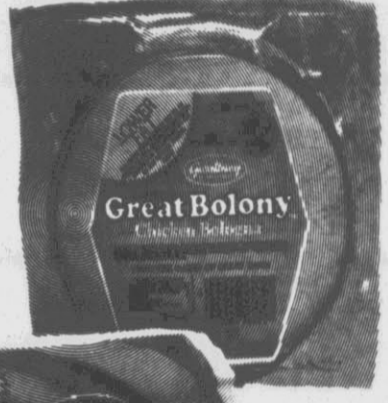
The Cowboys play in St. Louis Sunday, travel to New York to face the Giants, host St. Louis, Washington and Seattle, go to Oakland and Los Angeles, then entertain Philadelphia in the season windup at Texas Stadium Dec. 21.

Landry announced Tuesday that tailback Tony Dorsett, wearing a flak jacket to protect bruised ribs, will return to the starting lineup against St. Louis and elevated the disgruntled Robert Newhouse to the No. 1 fullback spot.

Politicians Her Heroes Of Childhood

DENVER (UPI) — Polly Baca Barragan, who is unable to recall popular singers or movie stars from when she grew up, can rattle off the names of long-forgotten politicians.

While her friends awaited word on their latest heart-throb, says the Colorado legislator, now a candidate for Congress, she was keeping track of the goings-on in Washington.

Mrs. Barragan, the only Hispanic woman now serving in a state senate, has been sidetracked only once from her political goals.

Early in life, when she became convinced a woman of Mexican-American ancestry would have little chance in political life, she decided to become the first woman astronaut. She entered Colorado State University in Fort Collins as a science major with courses heavy in math and physics.

Her flirtation with space was brief. She became involved in student government and the Young Democrats. Midway in her freshman year, two professors pointed out where her real interests were.

"As a kid," says Mrs. Barragan, 39, "I didn't idolize movie stars. I can't remember movie stars, but I can tell you when Truman was elected. When I was 7 years old, I stayed up with my dad and listened to the Truman-Dewey returns. I was demonstrating in second grade for Truman.

"When Adlai Stevenson lost twice, it broke my heart. I gave speeches on his behalf in the seventh grade and in junior high. I was that involved politically... All of my stars, all of the people who fascinated me, were in the political arena."

The walls of her campaign office in Thornton, a Denver suburb where she lives, are lined with pictures of herself with famous political friends — the late Robert Kennedy, President Carter, Vice President Walter Mondale and House Speaker Thomas "Tip" O'Neill. Another wall is lined with her awards.

She worked as a public information officer in the White House under former President Johnson, served two terms in the Colorado House and now is midway in her first term in the Colorado Senate. She also has been a special assistant to the chairman of the Democratic National Committee. She was a co-chairman of the 1980 Democratic National Convention in New York.

A frequent visitor to the White House, she has closer ties with the Carter administration than any other Democrat in Colorado. In fact, she says one member of the state's congressional delegation asked her help in getting a recent presidential appointment.

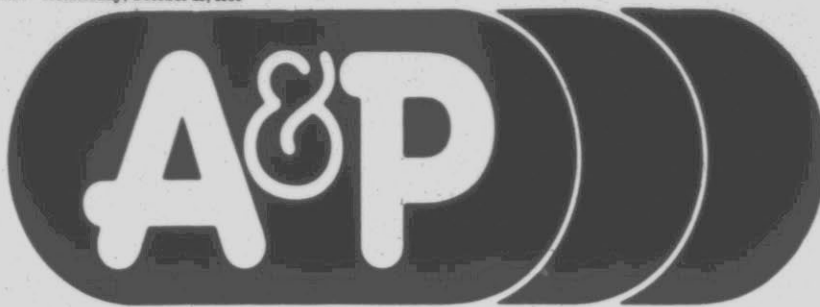
She has been identified as one of "80 Women to Watch in the '80s" by one national magazine, one of 10 "Women of the Future" in another.

During her political career, she was married and divorced and is raising two children — a daughter, Monica, 8, and a son, Michael, born in 1975.

"Politics has been exciting and I love it," she said. "But nothing is more important to me than my children. The honors and awards are all great, but... I know it can be all gone tomorrow, so the only real reality is my children."

Singles Need Estate Planning

NEW YORK (UPI) — A woman who is single and childless needs estate planning more than most married couples, says financial writer Jane Bryant Quinn. Writing in the Oct. 7 issue of Woman's Day magazine, Ms. Quinn says singles usually need disability insurance to provide monthly income if they cannot work; extended care hospital and nursing-home insurance and a good retirement plan. Ms. Quinn also says a will is a necessity — without a will, a single person's estate automatically goes to parents, siblings or other relatives, under state law.

Cartoonist Works In 3

Dimensions

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI)

The sculptor cast sloppy joggers' socks and a toothy grin in the essence of President Jimmy Carter. For Ronald Reagan, he molded an aging cowboy, gunbelt slung around the knees.

"I call them character studies because they fall between the real thing and a caricature," said George Thomas, 36, who prefers to use the name "g Thomas," with a small initial g and no period after it.

Thomas, 36, decided to take the satire of political cartoons one step further — into three dimensions with his four-inch-high silver and bronze figures.

The Rhode Island School of Design instructor's offbeat signature is etched on the originals and the 250 registered reproductions he plans to make of each figure.

"I tried to play up the predominant features and bring the spirit of the person to the surface," he said.

Thomas portrayed Carter as a jogger wearing sloppy socks, enormous sneakers and running clothes stretched over a pot belly. The face is familiar from the hairdo to the laugh lines around the eyes and the teeth-filled grin.

Republican Reagan's figure shows an aging cowboy, six-shooter in hand and a gunbelt slung around the knees of western jeans. His pigeon-toed feet cross the tips of worn boots showing more wrinkles than the cowboy's weathered face.

Thomas spent a month and nearly \$400 molding a caricature of Carter as a three-dimensional approach to the political cartoons in newspapers and magazines.

"It was not politically motivated. I just decided to start at the top with the president," he said.

A sterling silver version was hand-delivered to Carter by members of the Rhode Island delegation to the Democratic National Convention. Thomas said he would do the same for Reagan, "but I don't think the Republican Party is aware" the sculpture exists.

Thomas, who studied anatomy for eight years, labored over Carter's figure and spent several weeks perfecting the cast used in the "lost wax" method of casting silver and bronze sculpture. "Reagan came along very quickly," he said.

"Where the face is long you make it longer. Where features are fat you make them fatter," he said.

Thomas is working up similar character studies of Jimmy Carter. He said his next major project will be a monument to the "bravery and personal sacrifice" of the Americans held hostage in Iran.

The photographer and painter who turned sculptor seven years ago said he would donate the work. "I want Americans to remember what happened. Our feelings should not be diminished by time."

Thomas said he used the signature "g Thomas" on a limited edition work about four years ago, "and the handle stuck."

Nutrients Lost In Glass Jars

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — Glass storage jars for macaroni products are pretty but new research suggests they can affect nutrient retention in the food.

Two University of Minnesota food scientists using egg noodles as the test food found loss of quality and nutrients can be predicted accurately.

Theodore P. Labuza and Joseph J. Wartheson of the food science and nutrition department found noodles exposed to light can lose half their riboflavin content in two days.

Thiamine, or vitamin B1, is light stable, they found, but subject to 50 percent loss in one year if the product is held at 95 degrees F and 65 percent humidity.

"Protein quality loss was similar to that of thiamine," the scientists said.

"Pasta can be a major source of B vitamins," they said, if it is properly stored in a cool, dry, dark place.

Imagination 'Enlisted' To Provide TV Scare

 LOS ANGELES (AP) — While there is something to be said for gory monsters who make anatomical jigsaw puzzles of their victims, as well as for vampires and ghosts and slime retching demons, the best scare is the one that enlists the imagination in its cause.

PBS has such a scare this week (this evening, in most places), a fine specimen of psychological horror that features neither blood nor other-worldly antagonists. It's about a plumber.

"The Plumber" (featuring a fine though unfamiliar cast) was made for Australian TV by Peter Weir, an Australian whose theatrical movies "Picnic at Hanging Rock" and "The Last Wave" had cinema types proclaiming the arrival of the new Hitchcock.

This movie won't unsettle your stomach. It will simply make you nervous. Hitchcock delighted in simply making folks nervous.

Indeed, Sir Alfred is brought to mind in the very first scene of "The Plumber." A man is taking a shower. The camera cuts to the drain, where swirls of soapy water spin between the bather's feet. Nothing happens, but you feel a chill coursing up your spine (even, I'll wager, if you don't remember the "Psycho" scene).

A plumber arrives one morning at the campus apartment of an academic couple — she a housewife temporarily retired from the rigors of academe, he single-mindedly involved in some obscure research that might illuminate his name.

The plumber announces he's there on a routine check. There seems to be something a bit weird about the fellow. Or does there?

The routine check becomes a major repair job, end that hint of bizarre in the stranger becomes overt craziness. Or is it just eccentricity? The housewife at first tries to ignore the plumber, but is soon obsessed by her fear of him. She is changed by the obsession, and that is the center of the film.

Of the Hitchcockian qualities admired by Weir, the one most obviously emulated is the choicest — the ability to isolate tension in the commonplace. The sounds of a man taking a shower, a bar of soap, a tea cake. By merely presenting a fertile circumstance, uncrowded by gimmicks and

Baseball Boosted NBC's Ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — The thousands of Americans who sat glued to their TV sets for the final game of baseball's World Series helped make NBC the winner of the networks' prime-time ratings race for the week ending Oct. 26, according to figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC, which has now led the Nielsen ratings for four of the past six weeks, claims a lead of nearly four ratings points over runnerup ABC for the season to date.

However, NBC maintains the 1980-81 season began with "Shogun" week, Sept. 15-21, while ABC and CBS argue that the season, delayed by the recently resolved actors' strike, began Monday.

Indisputable is NBC's dominance since mid-September, and the most recent Nielsen survey yielded figures to continue that trend. NBC won the week with an average rating of 19.6, to 17.6 for CBS and 17.1 for ABC. The networks say that means in an average prime-time minute during the week, 19.6 percent of the nation's TV-equipped homes were tuned to NBC.

Key to NBC's latest triumph was the deciding game in the World Series, won by Philadelphia over Kansas City. The rating for the baseball game was 40, and Nielsen says that means of all the homes in the country with television, 40 percent saw at least part of the game.

The pre-game show was runnerup in the ratings, with two CBS programs, "60 Minutes" and "Dallas," third and fourth and "Love Boat" on ABC in fifth.

Two other Top 10 shows were from NBC, "Real People" in sixth place and

19.2 million, ABC; "Real Monday Night Football," Oakland vs. Pittsburgh, 22.7 or 17.6 million, ABC; "Dukes of Hazzard," 21.7 or 16.9 million, both NBC; "NFL

Starship Guitarist Appears Improving

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Paul Kantner, the 39-year-old lead guitarist of the Jefferson Starship band, "seems to be improving," after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage and won't need surgery, doctors and officials of Cedars-Sinai Medical Center say.

Kantner was reported in stable condition at the hospital on Tuesday. Hospital spokeswoman Tess Griffin said he was in intensive care, but conscious and talking.

"He seems to be improving," she said, adding that he would remain in intensive care "for a day or two" and would be hospitalized for a couple of weeks.

Kantner's surgeon, Dr. Elliott Blinderman, said the rock musician would not need surgery since there was no blood clot. Mrs. Griffin said.

The sandy-haired, bespectacled Kantner cofounded the Jefferson Airplane in 1965 with Marty Balin. With one-time model Grace Slick singing lead vocals, the group recorded such hits as "Somebody to Love" and "White Rabbit." In 1974, Kantner and Miss Slick, the mother of his 8-year-old daughter, China, assembled the Jefferson Starship.

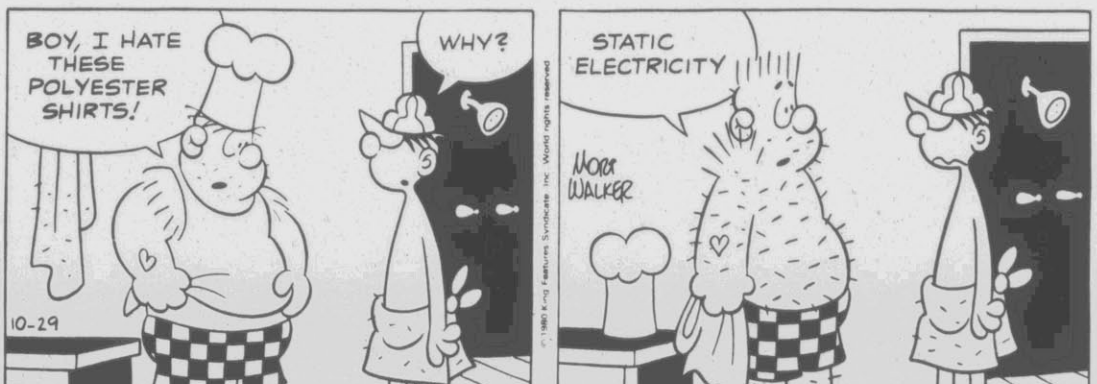

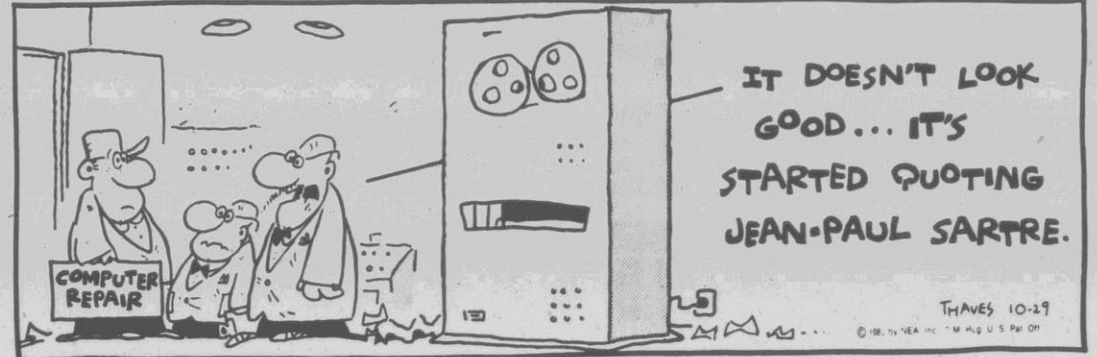

South's two no trump rebid with a singleton in his partner's suit is a little eccentric, but since it was a bare queen and he had the required 19 points with tenaces in the unbid suits, we are not inclined to judge him too harshly. North had just enough to bid game.

West led his fourth-best diamond, and declarer won the ten with the queen. He ran the jack of clubs and, when that held, continued with a club to the eight as West discarded a spade. East won the ace and paused to take stock.

West had led from a four-card diamond suit (his opening lead had been the deuce) and had shown up with only one club. That left him with

eight cards in the major suits. They almost surely were split 4-4, for it is most unlikely that West would have led from a four-card diamond holding if his hand contained a five-card spade suit.

If West did indeed have four hearts, then declarer had only once, and that was obviously the suit to attack in the quest for tricks. It was a feather in East's cap to have worked out the holding, but he needed to take his thinking one step further to defeat the contract. He did not falter.

To protect against the possibility that declarer's singleton heart was the queen, East shifted to the king of hearts. That was the killing blow.

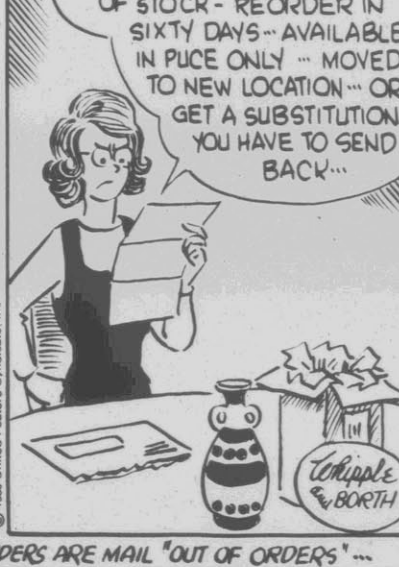
Declarer held up the ace of hearts for two rounds, hoping to exhaust West of the suit. He had only eight running tricks, so he had to try the spade finesse for his ninth. That failed, and the defense took one more heart trick for a one-trick set and a well-earned plus score.

Carter Campaigners See Opportunity In Far West

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The presidential campaign appears to be tightening in the Far West, where President Carter has made dramatic gains in territory long regarded as Ronald Reagan's indisputable domain.

Carter, who trailed in all of the seven westernmost states except Hawaii two months ago, has drawn even in two of them — Oregon and Washington — and has nearly erased his Republican challenger's once-huge lead in his home state of California, according to the latest public opinion polls.

Even in Nevada, a stronghold of the movement to return excess federal lands to the states, Democratic officials are talking optimistically about Carter's election chances after earlier predicting an easy Reagan victory.

But it is hard to believe Reagan is vulnerable in Nevada, and he also seems to be safe in Arizona and Alaska.

"We will hope Billy Carter makes another statement," said Max Benitz, Republican chairman in Washington state. Reagan's state coordinator says the race is a tossup and predicts, "The national debates will have a decided impact."

The Carter campaign has dropped plans to divert money from California to other states, and has scheduled presidential visits there and in Oregon and probably Washington on the final weekend of the campaign.

Reagan plans to campaign in California on election eve. Independent candidate John B. Anderson, whose decline in the polls has coincided with Carter's rise, is spending part of the final week in California.

In the Far West four years ago, in his battle against President Gerald R. Ford, Carter won only Hawaii's four electoral votes out of the

76 votes in the region. The president is believed to be hanging on to a slim lead over Reagan there today.

Some of the most prominent issues in the West appear to favor Reagan — defense contracts, dam building, the conservative populism of the Howard Jarvis "tax revolt" and the "sagebrush rebellion" against federal lands.

But Reagan's popularity in the region has never been unimpaired. Even while he was scoring solid victories in two California gubernatorial elections, polls indicated he aroused considerable opposition in the state.

Here is a state-by-state survey:
—CALIFORNIA (45 electoral votes): Only a few weeks ago, Carter aides were saying privately that the president probably would "write off" the most populous state and divert more than \$1 million in campaign money elsewhere.

After all, Reagan has never lost an election in California, despite a Democratic registration advantage of more than 2 million voters. Now, armed with polls that show Reagan's margin over the president dropping to about 7 percentage points, the Carter campaign is intensifying its efforts in the state.

"I like our chances," said Carter's state campaign manager, Mickey Kantor. "The undecided vote is Democratic."

His Reagan counterpart, Jack Courtemanche, said GOP polls show a 10 percent Reagan lead over Carter. He declared himself "delighted" about Carter's planned visit and said, "We think he ought to stay two or three days."

Carter's fate depends largely on the size of the vote for Anderson. Another factor could be Libertarian candidate Ed Clark, a Los Angeles lawyer who got nearly 400,000 votes when he ran for governor in 1978.

—WASHINGTON (9): This

state once looked safe for Reagan, but mid-October polls indicate a virtual tie between Carter and Reagan.

Carter's state coordinator, Bob Thomson, says, "Anderson is dropping and as his support drops, it improves our chances." Said Reagan's state coordinator, Jane Wilson: "It's a dead heat."

—OREGON (6): This state, which President Ford carried by just 1,713 votes in 1976, has been a tossup from the start.

A poll conducted for the Portland Oregonian Oct. 10-16 gave Carter a 35 percent to 33 percent lead over Reagan, with Anderson at 18 percent, and said there was a trend of formerly uncommitted voters endorsing the president. However, Carter could be hurt by high unemployment in the timber industry that generally is blamed on the housing slump and high interest rates.

—ARIZONA (6): The presidential campaign has been almost invisible in a state

that has gone Republican every four years since 1948. Neither candidate has appeared, and a Reagan victory seems assured.

—HAWAII (4): In this solidly Democratic state, Reagan apparently has cut into a 12 percent lead that Carter had in a mid-September poll. Leaders of both parties say the president has a slight lead and they expect a close election. Carter carried Hawaii by 7,000 votes in 1976.

—ALASKA (3): This state

has voted Republican every year but one since statehood in 1959, and 1980 apparently will be no exception. An early October poll gave Reagan a 41 percent to 25 percent lead over Carter.

Reagan has been helped by his opposition to a conservationist-backed federal takeover of huge areas of Alaska lands. Carter withdrew 56 million acres of land for national monuments, blocking commercial development.

—NEVADA (3): Independ-

ent polls point to a comfortable Reagan victory. An early October poll by the non-partisan Behavior Research Institute gave Reagan 42 percent, Carter 23 percent and Anderson 12 percent.

But Democratic state chairman Ken Haller, who had forecast a 3-2 Reagan

victory, says he has a new poll indicating Carter is moving slightly ahead of Reagan by picking up support previously committed to Anderson and Clark.

State GOP chairman Frank Fahrenkopf predicts a Reagan victory by a margin of 65 percent to 35 percent.

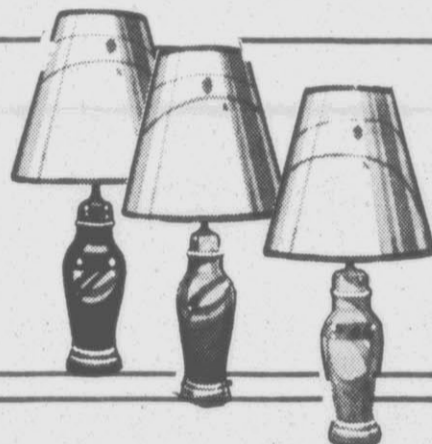

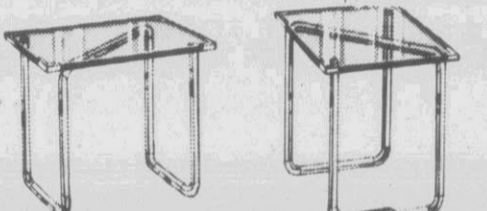

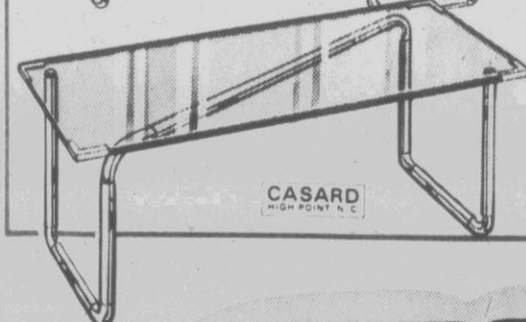

Plants Rooted 'In Thin Air'

SITRIYA, Israel (AP) — Imagine a greenhouse trough filled with healthy houseplants sprouting through a styrofoam cover. But lift the cover and the plants come off right along with it, and you see that they aren't rooted in soil but in thin air.

The empty tub is part of a new Israeli scheme called aeroponics, an agricultural system that dispenses with conventional soil or water methods. Instead, plants sprout and grow in sealed troughs where their exposed roots receive nutrient-enriched mist from a computer-controlled spray system.

Israeli scientists hope aeroponics will one day solve the problem of a shortage in usable agricultural land. Tiers of aeroponic troughs will grow vegetables on even the rockiest terrain, and there's no need for plowing or fertilizing with gas-guzzling tractors.

Israel's Agricultural Ministry has just awarded Adi Ltd., the Israeli company which developed aeroponics, a \$200,000 grant to build a quarter-acre of the modular troughs to test the system's large-scale commercial feasibility.

Aeroponics uses less water, less fertilizer and less

energy, and experimental yields are up to 200 percent higher than soil farming, says Adi's director, Amiram Keshet.

"Until people see it with their eyes it's hard for them to believe it," he said.

A simple computer console and sensors monitor humidity and temperature in each trough, carefully regulating those conditions which in other farming methods cannot be as closely checked.

Because the plants don't have to fight their way through natural resistance to soil and soil diseases, they're stronger and healthier, and the aeroponic system permits "farming" all year long.

"Because the roots are exposed you can see immediately when a plant is diseased and take it out," Keshet said. "So there's no chance for the sickness to spread to the other plants."

In an average trough, a minimum of 1,000 plants grow in approximately 9 square feet, four times the density of traditional soil farming.

According to calculations based on multiplications of experimental yields, a quarter-acre of aeroponically grown tomato plants will produce over 100 tons of tomatoes, while the best hot-houses in Israel produce only 20-30 tons.

GMC Finds Revitalizing Detroit Also Profitable

DETROIT (AP) — A faded Detroit neighborhood near General Motors Corp. world headquarters is drawing the kind of crowd the automaker would like in its dealer showrooms this fall.

The attractions are restored, decades-old houses like the one which serves as a model for the project. Built in 1914, the three-story brick house has leaded-glass cabinets, burnished oak beams, four bedrooms and a completely remodeled kitchen.

That house and 124 others represent GM's backyard venture in urban revitalization. The area four miles north of downtown Detroit earned the moniker "New Center" during its 1920s construction boom. The New Center Community Corp., a GM subsidiary, bought the homes for \$20,000 to \$28,000 and so far has sold seven at the full asking price: \$82,500 to \$88,000.

"We had 2,000 people touring the models last Saturday and Sunday although it's hard to tell how many were just curious," said project manager Robert Gregory. "So far the response has been fantastic despite the general condition of the housing market."

Former GM Chairman Thomas Murphy announced the project in September 1978. At that time, Murphy estimated a refurbished home's market price at \$40,000 and the total project cost at \$20 million. GM declines to say whether the project's pricetag had doubled as the homes' prices have.

However, Gregory noted that each house needed at least \$35,000 in plumbing, roofing and electrical work and kitchen remodeling. Walls were demolished in some houses to return cramped rental rooms or business offices to the original spacious living areas.

The buildings had been home to 325 people — a mix of the elderly, poor blacks and renters from Wayne State University. Small busi-

nesses occupied several homes; Detroit police say dope dealers worked out of at least two others.

At September's end, the city of Detroit had moved all but 17 families with \$800,000 in federal aid. Most people received \$4,000 to equalize new housing costs with New Center rents, which had averaged \$140 monthly, says city housing spokesman Chester Allen.

The crime that induced some former homeowners to sell has decreased. Detroit Police Sgt. Marvin Hyatt says his officers give the area "special attention," and Pinkerton guards watch for vandals. The model home is locked with two deadbolts and guarded by an electronic alarm.

Detroit's much-criticized public schools probably won't concern most new owners, said a New Center appraiser for Calloway Realty Co. "People who buy in that area are able to send their children to any school they like, public or private."

GM is forthrightly proud of the project, which earns it government goodwill if minimal profit. Residents like 87-year-old Helen Stannec, one of 75 homeowners who chose not to sell, said they are pleased with the neighborhood turnaround and their increasingly valuable investment.

"GM has been fair with me. I can't speak for the people who had to move, but some of the ones who owned homes were happy to sell, and for cash!

"I was going to sell at first, but then I decided I couldn't find another place like this, so I changed my mind. They gave me my full deposit back with no trouble," she said.

But the project still rankles people like attorney Michael Barnhart, who represents the former tenants. A lawsuit he has filed asks U.S. District Judge James Churchill for a guarantee GM will provide the low-income housing it has promised.

"GM's saying they have first right of return is ridiculous. Rents will be \$400 where they were \$150," he

claimed. "GM has agreed to low-income housing in principle, but we've seen nothing in writing."

Gregory said GM plans to build a 200-unit senior citizens' apartment building. He mentioned 50 other apartments where rents would be federally subsidized, but said plans for those are tentative.

The rehabilitation has also angered Ola Williams, a black woman whose \$30,000 house in neighboring Highland Park resembles the New Center homes.

"They made this area a dream, but only for the rich, not for the middle class or the low-income people they pushed out," she said. "How long will it be before rich whites decide they want our

houses too, because they're better built than they are in (suburban) Southfield?"

Testing South Jersey 'State'

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J.
(AP) — The strength of recent rumblings for a new state of South Jersey will be tested Nov. 4 when voters in six southern counties are asked if they want to secede from New Jersey to form the 51st state.

Atlantic, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Ocean and Salem counties are offering non-binding referendum questions to gauge public sentiment on the secession issue.

Camden and Gloucester counties — two southwestern counties that would be part of the new state — recently refused to put the issue before voters.

Joel Jacovitz, deputy mayor of Egg Harbor Township, Atlantic County, is chairman of the Committee to Free South Jersey and undisputed leader of the newly revived secessionist movement.

Jacovitz said his committee, born out of a July 12 "convention" attended by about 190 spirited supporters, has spent less than \$5,000 to promote the question among South Jersey's 1.8 million people.

Jacovitz said he is optimistic even though many voters and political leaders in the area and the rest of New Jersey — which would stand to lose millions of dollars in Atlantic City gambling revenues — do not take secession seriously.

"We're looking for a majority to vote yes," Jacovitz said, noting there is no organized opposition. "I would

their movement will have focused statewide attention on South Jersey's "plight."

Largely seashore and agricultural, South Jersey, oriented toward Philadelphia, has long been suspicious of its state government in Trenton, which residents claim is controlled by urban and industrial interests from the New York-oriented north.

South Jersey residents often grumble about the state's distribution of tax revenues to the more-populous northern areas, moves to control development of wilderness and coastal areas and proposals to tax fresh water.

How Three Utilize The Wind Power

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (UPI) — Here's how three homeowners use wind power to provide the electricity they need.

The windmill, or wind generator, Dan Tayloride has at work at his home is probably the most familiar looking. The same basic model was in use on many farms across the country decades ago.

The one lighting the home of West Virginia University industrial psychologist Robert Decker is not so common. Called a Sovanious Rotor, it is built from five 50-gallon oil drums sliced in half and mounted on top of each other.

The third model is being designed by WVU engineering professor John Loth and is known as a vertical axis windmill. Its three vertical blades make it look like a giant eggbeater.

For Tayloride, the economics of spending \$4,000 for his used wind generator were simple. First of all, the Northland Power unit (basically the same as the old Jacobs Wind Electric Co. model) sells for about \$11,000 new. Secondly, it would have cost him \$6,000 to have Monongahela Power Co. string a power line to his two-bedroom house.

"If you didn't live on a ridge, I don't think it would work," Tayloride said. "But with the cost of bringing electricity up here, we're saving money from the beginning."

The three 6-foot blades on Tayloride's generator produce 3,500 watts of direct current, although his inverter allows only 1,500 watts of alternating current. Still, it is adequate to run most appliances.

Tayloride estimated he is saving approximately \$30 a month on electricity bills.

Should the wind die down, ten heavy duty 12-volt batteries hooked up in series supply Tayloride for up to four days.

The system doesn't require a great deal of maintenance. The batteries last about six years and cost only \$10 to \$20 apiece. The brushes on the generator also last about five years, while the bearings should be good for 15 or 20 years.

Robert Decker built his windmill with odds and ends. The 50-gallon barrels were connected to a shaft that runs into his garage where it is connected to a universal joint obtained from a junked foreign car. His rotor is connected to an automobile alternator and batteries as well.

"All the working parts are inside the building," Decker said. "A typical windmill has its working parts up at the top which make them very difficult to get at."

Decker said he is looking for ways to make his model more efficient. The rotor produces only 500 to 700 watts of power now.

The Department of Energy thought highly enough of John Loth's design to award him a grant to build a 35-foot model. It will be more than three times the size of his current machine.

In Loth's vertical axis design, the three vertical blades revolving around the center can catch the wind from any direction. Loth has also designed a centrifugal brake that adds to the windmill's stability in heavy winds.

Paradise Is Regarded As Enterprise

 PORTO CERVO, Sardinia (AP) — Twenty years after discovering his island-tip paradise, Prince Karim Aga Khan is trying to shed some of the jet-set image and develop Sardinia's Emerald Coast into a year-round enterprise.

The area of snow white beaches and crystal clear waters is but one of the myriad of projects controlled by the 43-year-old leader or Imam of the Shia Ismaili Moslems.

But probably because he personally planned Europe's most ambitious holiday development from its private sewer system up to its ecological architecture and flora, and from its private security guard to a subsidiary airline, the Aga Khan spends much of the year flying in and out of his seaside resort by helicopter.

"In 1960 it took you four hours to walk here from the nearest village, and only eight persons lived on this very spot," the prince explained as he contemplated the boat-filled marina on this Mediterranean island. "Now the community of Arzachena has 10,000 and we have generated 3,500 jobs."

On a site originally called "the Valley of Hell," there were no roads, little fresh water, no electricity and no drainage.

Two decades and close to \$1 billion in investment later, the Costa Emerald consortium has 1,000 members under its trademark of a cut emerald.

More than 1,700 villas, low-rise apartments and other buildings nestle in the craggy landscape, with 6,500 more planned by 1990.

Leading architects built three luxury hotels, American specialist Robert Trent Jones carved out a spectacular golf course, and barges brought in tons of cement for a 600-berth marina and a tennis club.

Business interests were kept separate from the non-profit consortium. High rise buildings were banned by an architectural committee, which also controlled lighting, landscaping and even the type of flower villa owners could grow.

The 7,400 acres of dreamland are not without detractors, however.

Bachisio Bandinu, a Sardinian sociologist, termed the project "ethnocide" in a book this year, claiming the group had flushed out local culture and created a wholly artificial community devoted only to pleasure and "visual hedonism."

The Aga Khan objects to that image, saying that he never recalls a black tie evening and that the resort never sought a gambling casino or movie stars.

"This is a no-fuss resort. Much of Occidental society is industrialized and dehumanized. People want to come here and be re-humanized. This will be the lifestyle of the '80s."

Most of the newcomers are purchasing apartments at about \$200,000 for three rooms — rather than the even more expensive villas — and limit their stay to three weeks and two weekends a year.

One day's full board at one of the luxury hotels goes for \$150, with boat transportation to private beaches thrown in.

But the Aga Khan aims to extend the season to eight months of the year, by building a 500-seat convention center, snagging a \$1 million grant from the European Common Market for shipyard expansion, and bringing tourists to golf tournaments, sailing regattas and automobile rallies on Sardinia's rough roads, in the slow periods.

The prince lives near Paris, where he keeps his race horse stables and oversees his world-wide Industrial Promotion Service group of 100 companies, which handle textiles, mining, tourism, construction and newspapers in Kenya, Tanzania, the Ivory Coast, Bangladesh and Pakistan.

The Aga Khan Shia sect has about 15 million followers. They recognize Ali, the Prophet Mohammed's son-in-law, as the rightful successor to Mohammed.

Satellites Offer Options To Television Audiences

PUTNAM, Conn. (AP) — When Johnny Carson gets bleeped on the "Tonight Show" by the NBC censor, Mark Kulaga and Portus Barlow III don't have to read lips to know what he said.

While most Americans saw only snippets of the Moscow Olympics on television, Kulaga and Barlow watched for hours.

With a 12-foot-wide, dish-shaped antenna in their backyard, Kulaga, 21, and Barlow, 32, can hone in on a constant shower of microwaves beamed to earth by eight video-producing satellites parked over the equator.

Some of the satellite-carried programming is ready for public viewing, but some is unedited, such as taped shows and news film being sent from all over the world to New York network headquarters.

"Part of the glamour of this is to watch things you are not supposed to see," Barlow said.

Kulaga and Barlow own a company called Black and White Enterprises Ltd., among about a dozen companies in the United States that have jumped into the "earth station" market.

Home earth stations — antenna, receiver and amplifier — are scaled down versions of the receiving systems cable TV companies use. But while cable companies primarily use just one satellite and provide an average of a dozen channels, home earth stations can catch signals from any of the satellites, which serve more than 50 channels.

The technology involved is not new. What is new is the price — it's now within reach of the consumer.

Black and White's lowest priced system is about \$3,000, excluding installation which can be done by the customer, said Kulaga.

"Two people could put up the antenna and have pictures in a weekend," he said.

About three years ago the lowest priced earth station was about \$20,000. Even a year and a half ago it was \$10,000, Kulaga said.

"What has happened is that as products are mass produced, the price has slowly been coming down and this year the price has finally come down to consumer level," said Kulaga.

But legal fuzziness surrounds this fledgling industry, deregulated last November by the Federal Communications Commission.

FCC rules prohibit "unauthorized reception and use" of satellite signals, but

the industry is so new that "there's not a good set of legal precedents on what is permitted and what is not," said Ronald Lepkowski, chief of the FCC's satellite radio branch.

FCC regulations also prohibit the retransmission or relay of information received from the satellite signals — for example, taping a program and selling it. "That's piracy. It's definitely illegal," said Kulaga.

Also, cable companies pay for the right to relay the programming they receive via satellite, but the earth station owner's obligation to pay the programmer is unclear.

In some cases, the programmers (who originate the material) "are not set up to deal with customers on a one-to-one basis," Kulaga said. "It would cost them too much to process your \$3.50 per month."

"For the individual consumer, we will tell them how to contact all the programmers. ... We'll advise them as to the legality of it and that will leave it up to them whether to pay the programmer," he said. Programmers' fees range from nothing — religious programs usually are free — to \$4.50 a month, he added.

Barlow said he believes, however, that regulating earth stations will be near impossible. The probable solution, he suggested, is a system to protect programming, using devices that

would scramble transmissions. Paying customers would be given decoders to unscramble programs.

The big difference between earth stations and cable is the cost — cable TV's is much lower. In Connecticut, for example, basic cable service runs between \$8.50 and \$11 per month, and the customer gets a dozen channels. Services like Home Box Office cost an additional \$8 to \$10 a month, said Richard Hubbell, president of the Connecticut Cable Television Association.

Satellite TV users, by comparison, might have to pay up to \$4.50 per channel. Kulaga and Barlow agree with Hubbell that satellite TV is no threat to cable while the price gap is so large, but it does offer one attractive aspect already.

Cable is most profitable in densely populated areas but is not generally available in sparsely populated regions. Barlow sees satellite TV's market in those areas, as well as those where broadcast reception is poor.

Barlow said Black and White's recent advertising produced 400 inquiries during its first two weeks, about 60 percent from individual consumers and the rest from video equipment dealers.

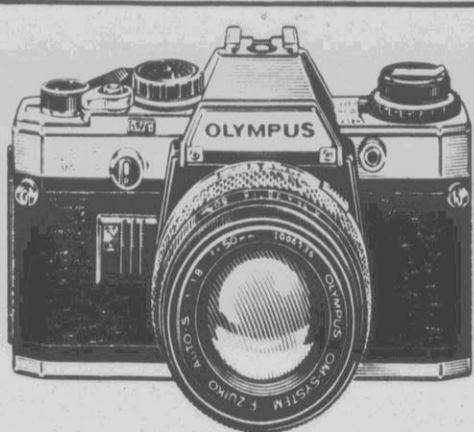
"Four-hundred inquiries in 15 days is a good indication the public is ready," Barlow said. "It's strictly a matter of economics. I'm filling a void."

Coordinate In Painting House

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Homeowners repainting their houses should take care to see that the color of paint selected for the siding and trim coordinates with the color of the roof, according to a spokesperson for a major paint manufacturer (Pittsburgh Paints).

She notes that the color of roof and walls rarely match but should complement each other — for example, with a brown roof, soft gold for the walls and a deeper gold for trim, but a brown matching the roof for doors and shutters.

Other housepainting tips: Light tints for siding make a home look larger, dark colors make it seem smaller; a house with wood siding and also stone or brick should be painted in a color to coordinate with the permanent part — for example, soft rust shades on siding to highlight the brick; trim for colonial or conventional house should be a different color from the body of the house; doorways and shutters can be used for accent colors like bright gold or rich red for individuality.

Sen. Leahy Fights For Reelection In Vermont

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP)

— For Sen. Patrick Leahy the 1980 election offers a chance to prove that his election as the first Democrat from Vermont to serve in the Senate was not a fluke.

But for Stewart Ledbetter, Leahy's GOP challenger, the contest offers an opportunity to "expose the real Pat Leahy."

"He would have you think he's been for defense and frugality — damn it, it is not true," says Ledbetter, after being asked whether he was, as Leahy claims, distorting the senator's record.

"Patrick is good at creating a smokescreen," Ledbetter says. "The reality quite simply is that the only thing we have spoken to is his record, and it's terrible."

Leahy won a spot in Vermont's history books in 1974 when he edged out Rep. Richard Mallary, R-Vt., breaking a century-old GOP hold on Vermont's Senate seats.

Since his first moments in Washington the former Chittenden County prosecutor has worked steadily to strengthen his support.

And at every campaign stop he reminds voters of his efforts. "I have been back to Vermont an average of two days every week," he often says.

Also mentioned repeatedly is the toll-free telephone line he installed in his office, the numerous town meeting-type forums he has held around the state and, without fail, there is a reference to the fact he is a native Vermonter while Ledbetter is not.

But while Leahy emphasizes his service and incumbency, Ledbetter, aided by fellow Republicans, has zeroed in on the Democrat's stands on defense and the economy.

"He has all the advantages of his incumbency save one — his record," Ledbetter says, detailing what he calls "a pattern of votes" that show Leahy is "anti-defense."

The former banking and insurance commissioner won the right to oppose Leahy by besting a field of six Republicans in a primary election that set new spending records for the state.

The interest in opposing Leahy was heightened by the fact that Republicans nationally have targeted the Democrat for defeat. Conservative groups around the country were also eager to help defeat Leahy, who they rate as one of the most liberal members of the Senate.

Ledbetter competed in the big-spending primary contest by walking 450 miles around Vermont, a walk he often mentions as he campaigns against Leahy.

His unceasing criticism of Leahy's stands on defense and the economy has succeeded in setting the agenda for the campaign. While Leahy tries to keep the focus on what he has done for Vermont, he is asked at

almost every stop about Ledbetter's criticism.

The senator tries to deflect the questions by accusing Ledbetter and other Republicans of running a negative campaign.

"This type of campaign is so foreign to Vermont," Leahy says. "It's a sham, the kind of thing we've always rejected in the past."

Leahy says he is for a strong defense but not for weapon systems that are useless.

"My opponent is for the B-1 bomber," he says. "I think he is the only person in the country — Republican or Democrat — that still favors that gold-plate turkey."
