

# Iran's Majlis Discusses Response On Hostages

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The U.S. reply to Iran's terms for freeing the 52 American hostages was delivered to the Iranian government in Tehran today, an aide to Iranian Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai reported.

The Iranian Parliament, the Majlis, discussed the hostage issue during its session today, Tehran radio reported, but it gave no indication on whether the deputies had been told the response was received.

Meanwhile, in an unprecedented interview with an American radio station, Bruce Laingen, the senior U.S. envoy held hostage at the Foreign Ministry in Tehran, said he was fine and "We're anxious to leave, hopeful."

He told radio station KAYO in Seattle that the hostages were gratified by U.S. public and government support, adding "We have no doubt that that is continuing, and at this particularly crucial time

in the discussions going on... support is even more important than ever." But Laingen said he could not comment on the note's delivery. "I am in no position, as you probably know, to speak to that. We are totally out of touch in terms of the substance of the problem."

# Utilities Approve New Pay Increase

The Greenville Utilities Commission last night gave approval to a three-percent cost-of-living pay increase for all commission employees, effective with the current pay period, and okayed funds for merit pay hikes for deserving workers at the discretion of the director.

Wyatt, and Councilman Dick McKee, who sit on the commission, seemed unhappy with the action taken last night.

In other business last night, the commission was told that work toward completion and implementation of the 201 Facilities Plan — needed before work can begin on the new sewage treatment plant — is roughly on schedule, and postponed action on a proposal to add an additional gas service crew to the gas department.

Utilities director Charles Horne told commissioners that if some action is not taken, the gas department will be forced to limit applications for new services because of a backlog of work.

In a report to commission members, Horne said that from June, 1975 through June, 1980, metered electric services have increased 15 percent, substation capacity has increased 78 percent and kilowatthours delivered 40 percent, with an increase of 12 percent in personnel.

The Greenville city council is expected to approve a three-percent pay hike for city employees, to begin possibly in January, as well as merit pay increases for deserving employees.

"It would be demoralizing. I think there has been a serious effort to communicate," between the council and commission, he continued. "It's very unfortunate that an agency of the city government go against the government."

Water-sewer metered services during the same period have increased 17 percent, while water delivered has increased 15 percent, with an 11 percent increase in personnel, while gas metered services have increased 21 percent and gas delivered has climbed 57 percent, with an 18 percent increase in personnel.

The commission approved a bid last night for a ninth deep well, awarding the contract to Layne-Atlantic Co. for \$72,540.

Also approved were bids for three new vehicles and a quantity of wire.

# Dependent Children Aid Has Seen Sharp Increase

Higher unemployment and inflation rates in fiscal year 1979-80 resulted in a larger number of families with dependent children applying for public assistance than in the previous year, according to Robert Ward, director of the N. C. Dept. of Human Resources Division of Social Services.

The year started in July, 1979, with 188,468 and increased to 199,908 by June, 1980, an increase of 11,440 recipients, Ward said.

Pitt County had 4,757 recipients in fiscal year 1978-79; 5,084 in fiscal year 1979-80. Total payments the first year were \$3,309,329; payments this past year, \$3,794,308.

## Quilts Display To Be Held During Tobacco Festival

Can you imagine a beautiful quilt designed to honor the tobacco plant, with the life cycle of the tobacco worm quilted into the border?

Or picture an entire quilt made of the flags of all nations taken from cigarette packages during the early 1900's.

These are two of the unusual and exciting quilts that will be on display Nov. 18-20 during the Tobacco Quilt Show. Over 100 quilts will be exhibited.

The Greenville Quilter's Guild has, according to Mrs. Kay Clemens, assembled antiques with traditional designs depicting family lifestyles and contemporary quilts displaying examples of innovative designs. This will be of help to those who own old quilts and need guidance on caring for them. The evening session will be a demonstration of lap quilting methods by Mrs. Georgia Bonesteel of the PBS television Lap Quilting Show. She is the author of "Lap Quilting Your Legacy Quilt."

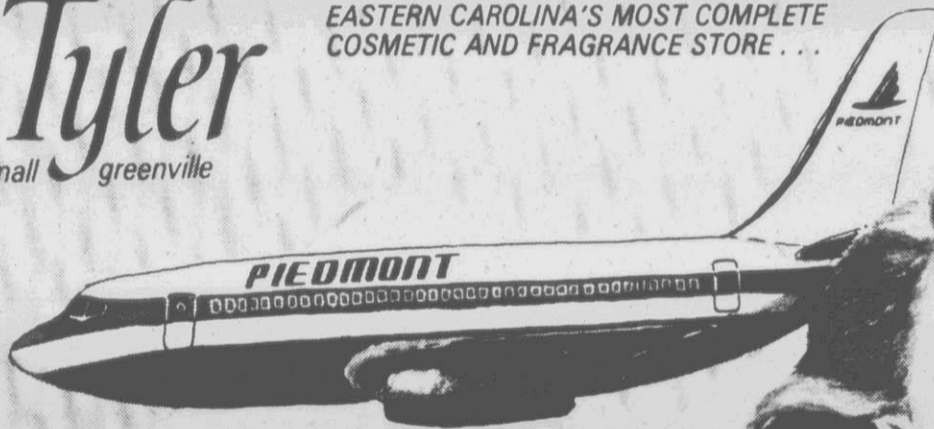

# 'Turn Aggressive'

RALEIGH — Coming years will produce major changes in growth of the American economy which will have considerable impact on Tar Heel communities seeking to attract industrial growth.

But those communities which study the trends, gear up to meet the changed requirements, and "get aggressive" in hunting and winning new and expanded industrial operations can benefit.

That is the overview of these volatile economic times gained from conversation with national site specialists, state and local officials, and professional industry hunters present at the recent Governor's Economic Development Conference.

The consensus is that there are some storm clouds — small ones, to be sure; and uncertain in direction — on North Carolina's Sun Belt Horizon.

The Trends

Here is a condensation of various observations:

- Increased competition; states which once snubbed industrial firms are courting them; states like Washington and Oregon which said no growth find that means backing up and are now looking.
- Rail lines are critical at a time when railways are trying to cut back or go out of business.
- Electric power is essential to industry and nuclear seems the only reliable solution at this time.
- Land costs are out of sight, meaning the plants will be put on smaller tracts rather than sprawling acres suitable for future expansion.
- Foreign manufacturers (notice automobiles) are

seeking American sites while American makers talk of moving overseas with their plants.

—The nation is becoming

service-oriented with manufacturing located in Third World countries where labor is cheap.

—Going rates are high and going higher. One prediction was that the prime rate will hit from 20 percent to 25 percent next spring. Companies will cut back on building and machinery unless lower interest rates prevail and federal investment credits encourage expansion.

—Disposal of industrial wastes, both radioactive and other hazardous materials, has become a critical consideration in locating a plant — and those areas in which disposal is hampered will be overlooked.

—Non-union firms are growing increasingly leary of locating close to a union plant; some won't locate within 100 miles of a strong union factory in which management endorses unionization.

Smaller

—The trend is to industrial park locations where smaller tracts of land, readily available utilities, waste disposal, rail lines and other transportation facilities make operations cheaper and easier.

—Firms seeking new locations look first at what a community does for existing business; that is a measure of what to expect in the future. Governmental attitudes, services, and tax fairness are important.

—Companies are not transferring people as frequently as they did, and the death of "company loyalty"

# Other Editors Say Thank Goodness!

In this month of Thanksgiving, the town of Beaufort might well consider giving special thanks for urban renewal.

If we are thankful for an attractive harbor, the shot-in-the-arm that boaters have given business, for the pleasure of walking once on a boardwalk and viewing yachts from near and far, that thanks must extend even farther back to the project that made this possible.

Prior to 1960, at this season of the year we would be looking forward to arrival of menhaden boats. In a few weeks, the Beaufort waterfront would be chockablock with the commercial vessels, their crew's nest masts creating a forest of poles against the sky. But no more. An era has passed, perhaps never to be hailed.

We had to be halted kicking and screaming into a new era. One that saw the familiar solid two- and three-story brick buildings on the south side of Front Street sag, not only from storm but lack of upkeep. Without the lucrative menhaden business that was the sum total of Beaufort's entire winter economy, few could afford to keep the buildings in repair. When the business isn't there, deterioration is inevitable.

If renewal were possible, Beaufort was among the most needy. In a referendum, the people, by a slim margin, approved the program that involved federal as well as local funds.

To see how successful Beaufort's urban renewal has been, one need only to look at New Bern. There a vast space on the Trent River waterfront sits empty. No business, to produce tax revenue for the town (one of the prime objectives of urban renewal), are located there. New Bern is making effort to have government buildings put on the site — but these do not generate revenue.

Beaufort's urban renewal not only has revived business in the downtown area, it has been a perfect adjunct to the Beaufort Restoration and Hampton Mariners Museum.

Had the advocates of keeping downtown Beaufort "the way it was", prevailed, no amount of federal funding or local input could have made early 20th century buildings as attractive as the new harbor, with open space and uplifted face.

For one urban renewal project that did what was intended, we should be thankful.

# Stonewalling On Defense?

WASHINGTON — A key Democratic senator on the appropriations committee is quietly passing word to colleagues to "resist at all costs" the predictable effort of committee Republicans to boost the defense appropriations bill due for committee mark-up soon after the rump session of Congress convenes.

Here is the first critical test for Democrats in a Senate that comes under Republican control in January: Will they follow the spirit of bipartisan cooperation proclaimed by Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan for the transition period? Or is their anti-defense mind-set so fixed in concrete that, in effect, they will exploit the lame-duck session and their disappearing majority to repeal the Nov. 4 election?

The quiet word being passed out of the office of just-re-elected Sen. Dale Bumpers of Arkansas to colleagues and Pentagon lobbyists leaves little doubt about the answer. Instead of bending to the big blow of Nov. 4 that decimated the anti-defense ranks of Senate Democratic liberals, the answer is a resounding "down with defense."

That atmosphere is quite different from the surface mood of bipartisan backscratching set by a magnanimous post-election Jimmy Carter and a Ronald Reagan thankful for small favors from the outgoing administration. Whether it lasts or not, this mood remains pervasive in the immediate election aftermath. One member of Reagan's transition team pointedly declined a "juicy inside tip" from a Republican mole in the Pentagon casting doubt on the Stealth aircraft, which Carter's men see as America's salvation 10 years hence.

The contrasting mood of politics-as-usual on Capitol Hill points to the Senate as the scene of the first great post-election struggle over an issue that, as much as any other, symbolizes the

cleavage between Carter and Reagan, liberals and conservatives and the old and the new Congress: national defense.

Defense of his own reelection last summer, Carter worked behind the scenes to prevent Senate action on the \$157 billion House-passed defense bill. Delaying it to post-election would give him the option of a possible veto, plus the clout of a new four-year term to influence voting in the Senate.

The decisive nature of the defeat suffered by both Carter and liberal legions in the Senate has now put the long-suffering bloc of defense-minded senators on top — but not until the new Congress comes to town in January. To build a modest defense foundation that will be radically expanded next year, Reagan transition planners want the Senate to pass the House bill with or without amendments before adjourning for Christmas.

But some Republican leaders of the defense bloc are dreaming larger dreams. They will push hard to increase the bill by about \$4 billion in new weapons authorized by Congress but not financed in the House bill. If these increases are voted down, as Bumpers wants, they privately threaten to filibuster final passage of the bill, preferring a simple resolution to permit continued defense spending at current levels rather than a truncated bill for the year that started Oct. 1.

But that October invites political disaster for President Reagan. If the defense money bill fails to pass this year — after the long, intentional delays visited on it by the Carter administration — a brand new start must be made in the new Congress next year.

Down that road lies the danger of unacceptable delay. Two defense bills — one for the year already started and one for the new fiscal year — would have to

# Few Looking To Quick Results

NEW YORK (AP) — President-elect Ronald Reagan has indicated he will move swiftly to put his proposals into practice next January, but it seems that few economic forecasters expect quick results.

It isn't that they're discounting Reagan's moves in advance; what seems to be indifference is merely a reflection of how long they feel will be needed to rein in the wild, undisciplined economy.

The feeling runs the gamut, from establishment analysts who study the world from skyscraper offices to bedroom-office individualists, some of whom shared their maverick views last week in New Orleans.

The message for next year is the same or nearly so: The problems will persist throughout the year, although perhaps with decreasing severity.

Beyond that point the establishment and maverick forecasters part company, the establishment convinced that eventually the problems will be licked, the mavericks tending toward financial collapse.

The Bank of New York (establishment), for instance, advised customers Oct. 29 that "The outcome of the presidential elections will not significantly alter our economic projections over the forecast horizon."

And in New Orleans just after the convention, the annual election of the National Committee for Monetary Reform (mavericks) heard forecasts of a 1981 prime rate above 20 percent and inflation of more than 25 percent.

One of those speakers, Bert Dohmen-Ramirez, editor of the Wellington Letter, an investment advisory service, had originally intended to talk about 30 percent to 35 percent inflation and a prime rate of 25 percent.

In toning down his numbers, Dohmen-Ramirez told some people, he was merely reducing the severity of the numbers, but in no way did the White House change force him to back off from his debacle forecast.

Howard Ruff, perhaps the most successful of the financial evangelists, who forecast a terrible day of judgment if fiscal and monetary policies aren't

corrected, seemed unswayed by the White House change.

Prior to the New Orleans conference, at which he spoke, Ruff's staff (unlike many at the conference, his book, newsletter and television show permit a big staff) issued a typical Ruffian commentary:

"Anyone who does not have a sound overall investment philosophy, out of which arises an overall strategy to be executed over the long haul, is going to be impoverished by inflation in the next few years."

The announcement conveyed the usual advice: purchase gold coins, South African gold mining shares, gems, collectibles and income-producing small town real estate.

While the establishment and the evangelists separate on the eventual outcome of economic problems, they agree that the problems are big as any since the great and unlamented depression of the 1930s.

Inflation, unemployment, crippling interest rates, declining living standards, zero productivity growth, high and rising taxes, budget deficits, instability of the dollar in foreign trade are mere symptoms.

The underlying cause, the groups agree, is a philosophical view that an economy can subsist today by borrowing from tomorrow, with little notion of how to pay the bills, and no inclination to drop the habit.

The establishment seers say the bad habits will be corrected, but then you have to wonder what else they can say. Certainly they cannot suggest that loans will never be paid. That in itself is defeat.

The mavericks, the evangelists, do say it. Meeting in New Orleans last week they were convinced that collapse is the way Americans will learn the lesson of running an economy with common sense and responsibility.

The evangelists tend to think we won't correct the problems. The establishment says we will.

But they join in their belief that whatever the outcome, the new administration will have to put in a lot of hard work before there's a noticeable change in inflation and its related problems.

# Anti-Speed Radar Bugs Scent Victory

NEW YORK (UPI) — The anti-radar bugs are starting to scent ultimate victory in their warfare with speedcoops on the nation's highways. They are out to prove that even the most up-to-date police radar devices are not capable of properly identifying a speeding automobile in traffic and therefore radar evidence no longer should be admissible in court. At stake are millions of dollars in fines collected from speeders on the basis of radar evidence and millions of dollars worth of sales of radar equipment to state and local police, many of the

orders subsidized by the federal Department of Transportation. Also at stake is the national 55-mph speed limit initiated as a motor fuel conservation measure, but which still arouses bitter controversy, particularly in the trucking industry. The anti-radar bugs have three motives. Some just don't believe in the 55-mph speed limit and think that without police radar it couldn't exist. Others, like an official of Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. who complained about his personal experience with police radar in New Jersey, say it is grossly

unfair and inaccurate. He told UPI a police radar gun overestimated the speed at which he was traveling by more than 10 miles an hour. He is convinced the radar reading came from another car and the cop was unsure which car it came from. To fight the case, he said, would have cost him up to \$10,000 in legal and research fees. A UPI reporter recalled a personal experience of this kind in Maryland. The reporter said he was driving at above 70 mph when a cop aimed a radar gun at his car. But instead of stopping his car, the police mistakenly stopped a car driven by a woman, who, the reporter said, appeared to be doing only about 50 miles per hour.

The matter has boiled up in the past two years since the federal Department of Transportation began subsidizing the purchase of police radar devices. Several companies make these. The most important appear to be Kustom Signals, Inc., of Shawnee Mission, Kan., and MPH Industries of Canute, Kan. The police radar devices sell for from around \$400 to just under \$3,000. The states that use them may

order them in batches of several hundred. So far, a national motor fan magazine, Car and Driver, published at Ann Arbor, Mich., has been carrying the ball in the anti-radar campaign. The third motive for opposing police radar is that of lawyers and some judges who say the radar speedtrap violates the search and seizure provisions of the constitution per se. Patrick Bedard, the Car and Driver writer who has written most of the articles, said he discovered cops are

commonly coached by their superiors to testify that they suspected the ticketed car of speeding before aiming the radar gun at it. Otherwise, the judge might throw the case out on the grounds of entrapment. Lt. Joseph Kobus of the New Jersey State Police told UPI that in a test case, the New Jersey supreme court ruled radar evidence valid provided it was shown in the trial that the officer using it had been thoroughly trained in its use and in the legal limitations on its use.

be sent Congress together, with Rep. Joseph Addabbo of New York, a bonded liberal, in the driver's seat as chairman of the House Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. It is almost inconceivable that the first of those two bills would get through Congress before July. Such sorry fiscal management of the national defense should be unthinkable. If the

Democrats who survived Nov. 4 show a particle of the spirit of compromise promised by President Carter, the long-delayed defense bill now stalled in the Senate will be rushed to the president's desk with the additions Reagan needs. 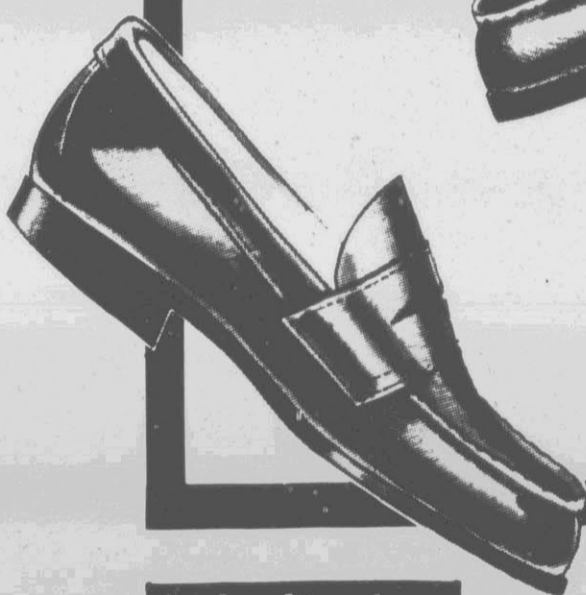

can be used as additives to food for human consumption. "We were well pleased with the overall success," in dealing with quantities of 1,000 and 2,000 pounds. Wooten explained that before the pilot project can become a successful commercial venture, "the USDA (U.S. Department of Agriculture) has to make a determination as to the safety of the product," adding that the pilot operation will involve, "prolonged study. It's nothing that's going to happen tomorrow." To supply a commercial operation, Wooten said farmers could grow, "at least three, maybe four," crops of tobacco a year. He explained that the tobacco can be cut to ground level, with another stalk growing up from the suckers. "One field in Wilson county was cut to the ground after the leaf was harvested. It

was fertilized and irrigated and that field is waist-high and in full bloom now. He said hot houses will be used to grow tobacco for the project this winter, and that some tobacco has been wrapped in plastic to prevent damage by frost to supply the raw product for the experiments. The Farm Bureau, he noted, is "proceeding with cautious optimism," because the funds being used, "belongs to the Farm Bureau membership. But we have a good base to begin from. "If it becomes a reality, it is possibly something that could be of benefit to the growers. I think there is a place for the product." Experiments indicate that almost twice as much protein may be produced per acre of tobacco than with soybeans, a crop known for its protein content. According to tests, 1,400 pounds of protein may be extracted from an acre of tobacco, as compared to 750

pounds of protein per acre from soybeans. Such high-grade protein is colorless, odorless and tasteless and could be used by food and soft drink companies to make "junk food" nutritious. W. L. "Dick" Williamson Jr., vice-president of the N.C. Farm Bureau, and president of the Wilson County chapter noted that, "the reason I was interested in it is for the tobacco farmer. It has got a future ahead of it. It's a good future." There is no problem in extracting protein from young green leaves, according to Williamson. "The problem is coming out of the lab into a pilot plant."

Position can be a critical factor in the outcome of a hand. As the cards lie, six hearts by South cannot be defeated, but if North declares, a diamond lead will hold declarer to eleven tricks.

North's bid of three diamonds is a Jacoby Transfer Bid—it requests the no trump opener to bid the next higher suit. Its purpose is to have the stronger hand concealed as declarer, with the lead coming up to it, and it worked admirably on this hand. North's five-heart jump over game showed slam ambitions with nothing to cue-bid, and South accepted because of the heart fit and excellent controls in the side suits.

West led a spade and the declarer, Eliabeth Havas of Australia, showed that the hand was unbeatable if played correctly. She won the queen of spades, led to the ace of hearts, and then cashed the ace and king of clubs. Next came the king and ace of spades, and West did the best he could by refusing to ruff. However, he was only delaying the inevitable.

Declarer ruffed her last spade on the table and, with the black suits eliminated

from her hand and dummy, she simply exited with a trump. West won the king, but he was faced with an unhappy choice of alternatives.

If he led a club, declarer would simply discard dummy's diamond loser while ruffing in her hand, then claim the balance. A diamond return was no better, since that presented declarer with a second diamond trick, and again a trump was the only loser.

In the other room of this team match, declarer's technique was slightly faulty. After cashing the ace of hearts, he tried three rounds of spades. Now West ruffed and exited with a club, and he still had to score the king of diamonds for down one.

### Largest Airport Keeps Its Cool

ATLANTA (AP) — The world's largest airport terminal is keeping its cool — even though it's "steaming." The new \$500-million Hartsfield Atlanta International Airport has one of the lowest-energy-usage, steam-driven air-conditioning systems ever built, says V. R. McCloskey of Borg-Warner, which supplied the system.

It uses high-pressure steam to run one component of the air-conditioning system, called a centrifugal water chiller, and takes advantage of low-pressure exhaust steam to run a second component, called an absorption water chiller.

This combination of components reduces by nearly 20 percent the amount of steam pressure required for the total system to assure the comfort of the 42.5 million passengers expected to pass through the terminal annually, McCloskey says.

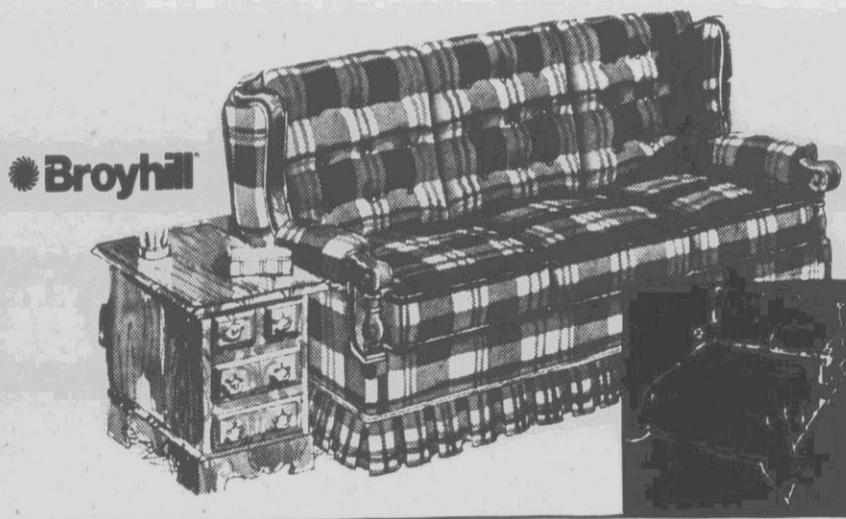

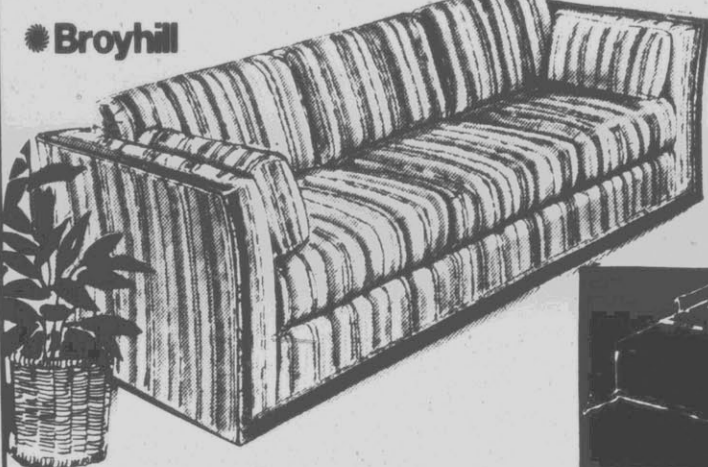

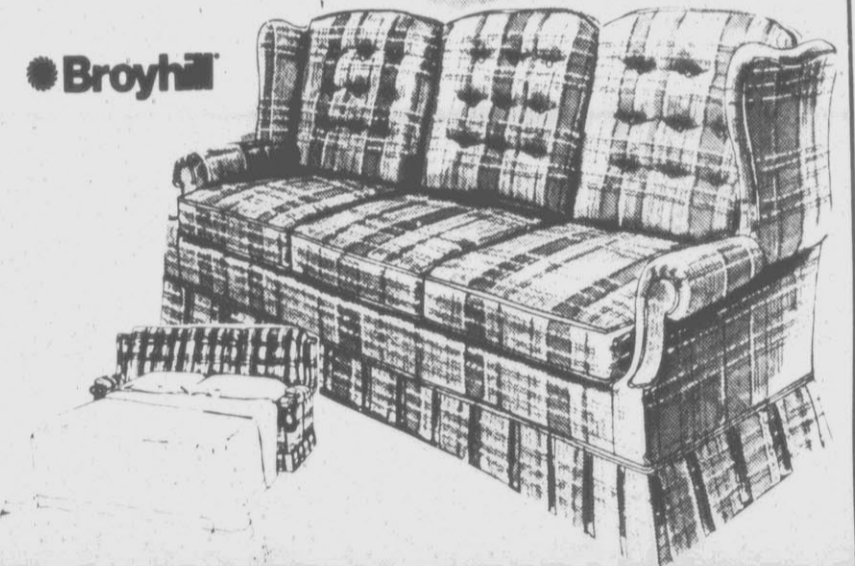

## Resist Rescue On Tiny Island

CAYO LOBOS, Bahamas (AP) — Policemen trying to evacuate 102 Haitians stranded on this tiny island for 39 days will use armed force if necessary to put the refugees on a boat to take them back to their home country, a Bahamian source said today.

The Haitians, who Tuesday met a rescue boat with sticks, stones, bottles, sharpened conch shells and pocket knives, have vowed to resist any efforts to take them anywhere but Miami, their destination when they sailed from Haiti in mid-September.

"The police may need to use force to evacuate the Haitians," a government spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said today in the Bahamian capitol of Nassau. He said the necessary force would be used.

Another spokesman said earlier that the policemen would take the Haitians off the island at gunpoint, "if that is what is required." This island, no bigger than a football field, is just over 20 miles north of east-central Cuba.

The Haitians, stranded without food or water, were discovered by a U.S. Coast Guard aircraft on Oct. 9. The Bahamian government was told of their plight that day, and the Coast Guard airdropped some food and water that day and the next.

Four armed policemen aboard the buoy tender Lady Moore, which was sent from Nassau Monday to pick up the Haitians and take them back to the Haitian capitol of Port-au-Prince, asked for more support when they were met with resistance.

The vow to resist was made by the Haitians shortly after they knelt among cracked conch shells and empty military ration cans to pray for rescue.

The prayer was led by a Haitian-American priest from Miami. He then told them that the Bahamian boat that was a month in coming would try to take them back to Haiti.

"Don't go back to Haiti," warned the Rev. Gerard Jean-Juste, who was brought to Cayo Lobos by a television network's helicopter. In Creole, he urged them to insist on being taken to the United States.

The Haitian leader, Claude Pierre, said they "could not go any place but Miami."

"We sell everything to go to Miami," Pierre said. "We lose everything in Haiti. They will beat us up, kill us, put us in jail."

"It is a decision between life and death."

Bahamian officials dispatched a second vessel, carrying nine armed police officers, Tuesday night to "assist with the transfer of the Haitians," said spokesman Joe Edwards of the Bahamas News Bureau.

The Bahamian police will take the Haitians off the island at gunpoint, "if that is what is required. That is what they are instructed to do," Edwards said.

Four armed officers were among the landing party that arrived Tuesday — one day behind schedule due to ship mechanical problems — at this desolate football field-sized island.

"The Haitians reportedly brandished knives, sticks and bottles and refused to be taken aboard the government tender," Edwards said. "They don't want to go back to Haiti — they want the good life of Miami."

Government spokesman Bill Kalis said the reinforcements should convince the Haitians to leave. The Bahamians still plan to take the Haitians to Port-Au-Prince, officials said.

"We believe there will be an orderly evacuation," Kalis said. "We think that the force that's being sent will be enough to persuade them to return."

The Haitians were spotted on Cayo Lobos by the U.S. Coast Guard on Oct. 9. As negotiations between the Haitian and Bahamian governments went on, the refugees were supplied with water, C-rations and other food dropped from Coast

Guard planes. Some 25,000 Haitian refugees, fleeing poverty in their native land, have arrived in South Florida in recent years and asked for political asylum. Their status there is still being determined by the federal courts. Thousands more Haitians living in the Bahamas have been told they have until January to return home before they will be deported.

## Consumers Show More Optimism

NEW YORK (AP) — Although still cautious about major purchases, consumers felt slightly more optimistic about the economy and their personal finances in October than in the month before, according to a Conference Board survey.

The Conference Board, a business-funded research group, said Tuesday its Consumer Confidence Index — an assessment of income, jobs and the economy — rose from 76.2 in September to 79.2 in October. It was the fifth consecutive monthly gain in the index, which is measured against a 1969 base of 100.

## Find Food Aid Largely Failure

KANSAS CITY (AP) — The National Catholic Reporter, an independent Catholic weekly, has published a series of stories contending that the more than \$2 billion in world food aid — half from the United States — is largely ineffective because of waste, corruption and flawed methods.

# Veterans Of Two Conflicts Reflect On Differences

ASHEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — When Henry Baker and Ralph Brown talk about being veterans, they emphasize

the differences between World War II and Vietnam. Baker, who served with the highly decorated Alamo Scouts, came home after World War II ended and slipped easily into a career as a life insurance executive. But Brown, in combat for nine of his 12 months in Vietnam, came home a loner, avoiding people, loud noises, tense situations and, when the bad dreams came, even sleep.

"I really never had that much of an adjustment to make," Baker said. "You can become an animal in combat, and I've

seen a lot of that. You do things because of self preservation," he said. "But most people revert quickly to their basic Christian values. "There wasn't that much involved in adjustment to civilian life. "But we were accepted back. But the guys who went to Vietnam — I'm on their side — I don't think that feeling was there. That's what made it so different for them."

Brown found it different both as a black and as a Vietnam veteran. "In the field there were guys who were black and

white, Chicano, Mexican. It was a brotherly type of relationship, coming together as a unit, people all doing their job," Brown said. "But in Oakland, right after I got off the plane, I heard a racial slur against me. To tell you the truth, it didn't make me mad so much as it hurt me. It knocked me down. "You're so apprehensive. I felt I had to live a sheltered life. At first, I stayed by myself. I was afraid to mingle. Any situation that might have danger in it, I avoided with a passion. "And there were the

nightmares, of course. It's been 10 years now, and it's still frightening." Both men mention drug use as one of the differences between the wars. "To tell you the truth," said Baker, "In all the time I was over there, I never saw one instance of it. None." Brown did. "When I was in the field, I was a soldier," he said. "But when I came back, I was myself, and you tried to release the tension in any way possible, drinking or drugs. "I got hooked on heroin. But the thing that saved me

was my background, very family-oriented, and my church. And one day I said no more and quit cold turkey. No rehabilitation. No counseling." Like Baker, Brown has been employed since his service discharge, and he has continued his education. But though he has come through the experience "with nothing worse than psychological problems," he expresses bitterness about the reception of the Vietnam veteran in the United States. "We're the bastards of the war," he said. "Nobody cared when we came home.

There was too much else happening. If you were a Vietnam vet, you were looked on as a warmonger, or even a felon.

"Nixon talked about peace with honor. But for us there was no honor. Just a long list of memories we can't forget."

## Delta Buying New Planes

ATLANTA (AP) — Delta Air Lines will buy 45 to 65 Boeing 757 intermediate-range aircraft worth \$2 billion to update its 208-plane fleet, The Atlanta Constitution reported today.

Delta had a news conference set for today, but spokesman Jim Ewing declined to comment on its subject matter.

Delta's order would be one of the largest aircraft orders ever placed by a passenger carrier, substantially exceeding the \$1.7 billion in orders and options that Delta placed two years ago for the Boeing 767-200, a larger aircraft designed to serve coast-to-coast routes, the paper said in a copyright story.

The 757 carries about 180 passengers, compared with about 138 on the Boeing 727 it is designed to replace. Delta has 122 of the 727s in service.

The 757 is also more fuel efficient than the 727. It is a twin-engine aircraft, with the engines mounted under the wings. Both American and British engines are available for the aircraft.

Delta has greatly expanded its routes since the industry was deregulated in 1978. It needs the new planes to replace some of its aircraft that have been in service 10 years or longer.

The 757 is expected to be ready for testing by early 1982, and the first of the new planes should be ready for delivery in 1983, according to industry sources.

# Pitt Extended School Is Moved To Campus

An affiliation agreement has been signed between the Pitt County Board of Education and Pitt Community College that would house the Pitt County Extended School on the campus of PCC.

The Pitt County Extended School is a special high school designed to serve high school dropouts and students unable to attend the regular county high schools. This year, students attending the Extended School come from Bethel, Farmville, Ayden, Belvoir, Bell Arthur and Greenville.

All students are enrolled in a class of job preparation and counseling as well as two required high school courses. These classes are held in the early evening from 4-7 p.m. so that students may receive on-the-job training during the day. This year the Pitt County Board of Education has received \$102,414 from the Division of Employment and Training to educate and job-train 30 program participants.

The Extended School places special emphasis on vocational counseling, occupational training, recruitment of dropouts and individualized learning programs for students with special needs. All classes follow the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction guidelines and are under the supervision of the Pitt County Board of Education.

Under the provisions of "dual enrollment" approved by the state board of education, high school students may take community college courses. This year, students are enrolled in typing, welding, data processing, teacher aide preparation, oral communication, drafting, machine shop and electronics, as well as some remedial English and math classes.

The staff of the Extended School is delighted with the location on the PCC campus because of the opportunity the provide on-site occupational training and an in-

In the three years prior to its location on the campus, the Extended School served 321 students classified as "dropouts." Over 200 students were placed on CETA-sponsored jobs, and 62 students received high school diplomas or the G.E.D. Currently, 57 students are enrolled in the school. Students and employers in-

percent; the state and counties' share 16.18 percent.

North Carolina's AFDC payments rank 42nd in the nation, with maximum payment of \$210 a month for a family of four.

Ward indicated that the number of recipients appears to have leveled off in September, with 199,725 receiving assistance.

The AFDC program provides financial assistance for children who have been denied the support of either one or both parents because of death, disability or continued absence from the home for

other reasons. One adult is usually included in the grant — in the vast majority of cases, it is the mother.

Each adult member applying for or receiving assistance must be registered for the work incentive (WIN) program in the counties that have the program or be registered for employment with the Employment Security Commission in the remaining counties, unless they are exempt. To be exempt, the adult has to be either ill or incapacitated, age 65 or over, required in the home to care for another member of the family who is ill or incapacitated, or responsible for the care of a child under age six.

"In January, 1980, over 26 percent of the mothers registered for the WIN program were exempt, but volunteered anyway. This indicates that these AFDC recipients want to work if given the opportunity. Their biggest problem in finding jobs is lack of education and job

skills. In 1979, only 38.9 percent had finished high school," he said.

Unless the adult family member can show just cause, they must also agree for the Child Support Enforcement worker to seek child support payments from

the absent parent for the children receiving assistance.

County social services departments determine eligibility for the AFDC program based on state and federal eligibility requirements.

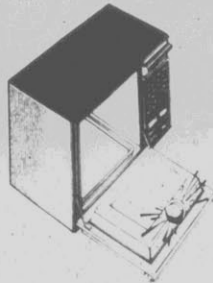

# Reunion After Achieving His Fantasies

In 1942, when he was a high school dropout, Charles Bartels had a dream he thought he would never fulfill. With what he calls "encouragement and confidence" from schoolmate Connie Tindel and some education, he spent his life living his fantasies.

"I always wanted to be a flyer," explained Bartels, Col., Ret'd, U.S. Air Force. "It started out as a fantasy and gradually became a reality due to the encouragement of this lady (Dr. Tindel). Those were pretty grim years back when I was forced to drop out of school. The confidence and support that I knew motivated me to get an education. I knew that to achieve success I must become educated."

Tindel and Bartels went to Oneco Grade School together in Oneco, Fla. Until this past weekend they had not seen each other since they were in junior high school in 1942. Bartels, who is happily married, named his daughter after Tindel because of his respect for her.

Tindel, who teaches courses in adult education for the School of Education at East Carolina University, had no idea she had been the inspiration for his success...no idea that is, until she received a letter recently telling her so. The letter was signed "Boots," Bartels' nickname.

Bartels informed Tindel in the letter he would like to see her again, so last Friday he flew into the Greenville-Pitt Airport. At their reunion, Bartels told her, "The reason I never told you about this

tours of Vietnam he flew reconnaissance missions and dropped supplies to the front line troops. He is now living in Saudi Arabia and employed by the petroleum industry.

"Saudi Arabia is the land of make believe," he commented. "There's nothing there so you just look around and make believe there's something there."

Of his career, Bartels said, "It has been work, but a pleasurable type of work. I've always had a feeling of accomplishment." According

to the ace flyer, he has never had to crash land a plane, although he has bailed out several times when he was hit by enemy fire. "I've never had to bring a plane down and crash it," he explained. "It may have caught fire and burned the moment I got out of it, but all my landings have been successful."

Of Tindel, his inspiration for making his dreams come true, Bartels said, "She's as beautiful now as she was when I saw her last, in fact even more so."

before was because I wanted to be a success. Then, when I was a success, I couldn't find you." Bartels had been searching for years to locate Tindel. He finally found their fourth grade teacher who was able to give him some information about her address.

"I don't remember exactly what she (Tindel) said to me," recollected the colonel. "She just simply said that if being a flyer was the way I wanted to go, then I should pursue it, so I did."

Tindel did not have a clear memory of Bartels or the encouragement she gave him. She knew nothing about the part she played in his life until she received his letter. "I am overwhelmed, I really am," she said. "I think this is the surprise of my life."

Bartels entered flight school shortly after he dropped out of school, received his wings, and after a brief training period, entered air combat over Italy in 1943. He was qualified as an ace after he shot down his fifth plane. He also flew in Korea and Vietnam, downing a total of 17 planes during his career.

"Once I achieved my goal and was good, then I had to get better and better," said Bartels. "So for 32 years I worked at getting better."

His career has taken him to all but a handful of the countries in the world. "I've never been to Paraguay, Angola, Mozambique, Nepal, and let's see, a couple of smaller nations in Europe. I was on the front line during the uprising in Africa a few years ago."

Throughout his air force days he flew such notables as Dwight Eisenhower, General McArthur, Nehru, and Prince Phillip. During his

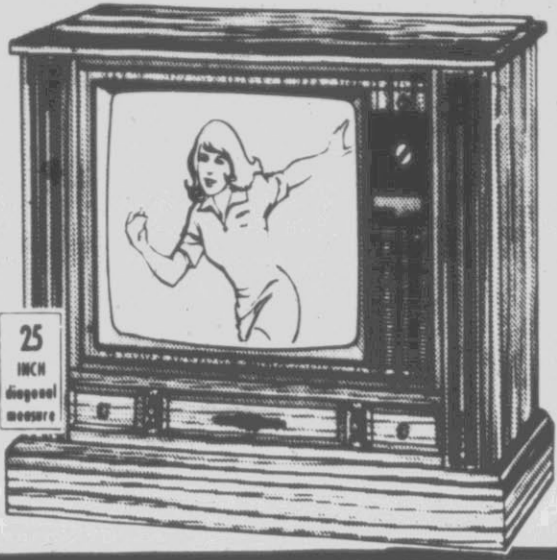

# Hint Of Fight Appears At N.C. Baptist Gathering

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina Baptists re-elected their two top officials Tuesday but signs of a fight between conservative and moderate elements of the denomination erupted in a budding dispute over the church newspaper.

A resolution scheduled for formal consideration today by the Baptist State Convention accused J. Marse Grant,

long-time editor of The Biblical Recorder, of using the 147-year-old weekly publication as a "biased tool ... for degrading character."

The resolution, introduced by the Rev. J. Steve Sells of Standfield, called on the convention to require Grant to use the newspaper "as a unity-building, love-projecting publication, rather than a biased tool

used for degrading character."

A vote also was scheduled today on a resolution calling for rejection of the ideals of the Moral Majority, the polit-

ically oriented organization founded by evangelist Jerry Falwell.

Sells specifically objected to a recent column by Grant criticizing the Rev. Bailey E. Smith of Del City, Okla., president of the Southern Baptist Convention, for saying that God doesn't hear the prayers of Jews.

"We have no apology for the way The Recorder is edited. We think it's a good, objective publication or it wouldn't have stood for 147 years," Grant said in an interview.

"I feel like I know what I'm doing. I've been in this business 31 years, and I'm not easily intimidated."

Baptist conservatives and moderates have been engaged in broad-scale dispute over the question of

biblical inerrancy — the view that every word of the Bible literally is true. Conservatives, led by Smith, have pledged to allow only Baptists who subscribe to the inerrancy doctrine to hold positions of church power.

The Rev. Cecil E. Sherman of Asheville, president of the state convention, and the Rev. Frank R. Campbell of Statesville, first vice president, were re-elected Tuesday. Both men have aligned themselves with the moderate faction in the Southern Baptist Convention.

In an address to the convention Monday, Sherman called for unity within the denomination. North Carolina has about 1.1 million Southern Baptists. Nationally the denomination claims more than 13 million

members.

Sherman was opposed Tuesday by the Rev. M.O. Owens Jr. of Gastonia, chairman of the Baptist Faith and Message Fellowship, a national group considered to be aligned with the conservatives.

"The body was offered a clear choice today on the liveliest issue in our company right now — inerrancy," Sherman said after the election.

Sherman said he hoped that, during the next year, Baptists would "develop a capacity for more tolerance from within. We've got to decide if a Baptist can really be himself to be a leader or if you're going to have to meet the test."

The Rev. W.W. Finlator of Raleigh introduced the reso-

lution to reject the Moral Majority's philosophies, which includes stands against abortion, pre-marital sex, homosexuality and lax military preparedness.

The resolution was drawn "to reaffirm our commitment to the historic Baptist principals of church-state separation," Finlator said in an interview.

"If we do that, it means we're going to reject what I think is the myth of a Christian nation," he added.

Finlator said Baptists do not believe in a Christian nation but instead believe in church-state separation.

"You make a nation a Christian nation, then you've gone way back to the things which we've fought in the past," he said.

In the resolution Finlator

disagreed with the idea of prescribed public school prayers because of the influence of government upon public schools.

"A school is an agency of the government, and the government is not supposed to be in the business of devotion and worship," Finlator said.

## Pitt Farmers Eligible For Loans

Pitt County farmers are eligible for disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration to recover from losses caused by severe drought and extreme temperatures during the 1980 growing season, according to FmHA county supervisor Jimmy F. Smith.

Smith said the emergency loans are available where assessments by the agency show significant loss of corn, tobacco, peanuts and soybeans.

According to Smith, the loans are at varying interest rates and for terms consistent with the borrower's ability to repay. Amounts offsetting actual losses are generally loaned at a low interest rate and additional amounts needed to restore or make necessary changes in farm operations are loaned at prevailing market rates.

Farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living, farming partnerships, and corporations or cooperatives, are eligible.

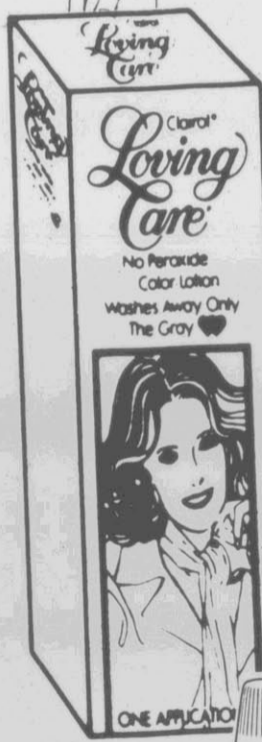

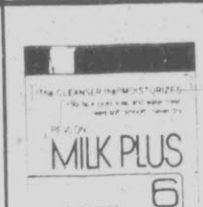

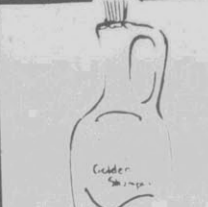

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average gained 10.24 to 944.03.

Advances outnumbered declines by more than a 2-1 margin on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 41.52 billion shares, against 35.72 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index rose .96 to 75.57.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 5.00 at 338.76.

## Hurricane Has Stalled In Gulf

MIAMI (AP) - Hurricane Jeanne, the November surprise of the tropical storm season, stalled in the Gulf of Mexico today as oil companies evacuated about 3,000 workers from offshore rigs.

The storm, centered south of New Orleans with top winds of 80 mph, was unlikely to strengthen if it remained idle, said forecaster Joe Pelissier of the National Hurricane Center here.

At 11 p.m. EST Tuesday, the storm was centered near latitude 24.0 north, longitude 87.5 west. It was expected to remain stalled, possibly for as long as two days, Pelissier said, adding it could drift slightly westward.

"There's no air flow tending to move it in any direction," he said. "I'm rather surprised it became a hurricane at all."

Oil companies began evacuating hundreds of workers from rigs and work barges in the Gulf of Mexico on Tuesday as the storm churned 450 miles south-southeast of New Orleans.

Southeast USA Inc said it had evacuated 1,000 offshore workers by Tuesday night.

Other oil companies said they were closing down some operations and bringing in all but the minimum number of workers required to keep other operations going.

Exxon said it had evacuated 700 workers, Gulf

## UNC To Peach Or Bluebonnet?

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Fifteenth-ranked North Carolina is the top choice to be host team in the Peach Bowl, the Associated Press learned, but the Bluebonnet Bowl is also hoping to lure the once-beaten Tar Heels to Houston.

Peach Bowl officials will be in Chapel Hill to offer North Carolina, 8-1, the home-team spot in that bowl, informed sources told The AP Tuesday.

The sources said officials of the Peach plan to extend the invitation no matter how the Tar Heels fare against Atlantic Coast Conference rival Virginia.

However, published reports today said a representative of the Bluebonnet Bowl also will

be in Chapel Hill with hopes of setting up a match between North Carolina and Texas in Houston on New Year's Eve.

There had been widespread speculation this week that the Peach Bowl was the most likely choice of North Carolina, but Art Gregory, an official of the Atlanta bowl, said Tuesday, "Just let me say that a team we thought was coming to the Peach Bowl isn't coming."

Tex Thornton, executive director of the Bluebonnet Bowl, said he was interested in the Tar Heels, adding that North Carolina is not definitely in the Houston game. "But they are more than they were. I'll say that."

Reports circulating on Monday said North Carolina was holding out for a bid to the Gator Bowl and a possible matchup between the Tar Heels and 14th-ranked South Carolina. The other possibility mentioned for North Carolina would be the Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn.

UNC Athletic Director John Swofford said Tuesday that he was meeting with football coach Dick Crum and bowls would be a topic of discussion. But later in the evening, Swofford responded to the Peach Bowl reports by saying, "That's not the case at this time. No bowl invitations can go out until Saturday."

George Crumby, executive

director of the Peach Bowl, said the Tar Heels have been a top contender for the home spot but that, given the bowl picture at present, "I can't be sure of a thing."

Possible opponents mentioned, should UNC get in the Peach Bowl, were Louisiana State, Southern Mississippi and even Navy. Crumby said in discussions this season with North Carolina officials, Texas, Missouri or a Big Ten team were mentioned.

Come Saturday, the bowls may be in the back of their minds, but primary will be Virginia, 4-5. And, except to say no bids have been received yet, Crum avoided the subject of bowls at his Tuesday news

conference and stuck to the upcoming Virginia game.

The game is important to the Tar Heels in their bid to win the ACC title. They lead the race with a 4-0 mark, but Maryland, 3-1, is ready to jump in should UNC falter.

"This is a key game for us," Crum said. "Virginia is a very good football team. They think this is the best team they've had up there. I know their defense is better than last year. We've got our work cut out for us. It's not going to be an easy football game for us."

North Carolina pulled out a 13-7 win over the Cavaliers last year and then accepted a surprise bid to the Gator Bowl.

## A 5-6 Team In The Rose Bowl?

### It Could Happen As Bowl Picture Gets Muddier

Would you believe a 5-6 team in the Rose Bowl?

It's not likely but it is a possibility as the bowl picture seems to get muddier and muddier each year, even though sometimes that hardly seems possible.

But there are the Washington State Cougars, 3-6 at the present time, still mathematically alive as a possible Rose Bowl host because half of the Pacific-10 Conference members — Arizona State, Oregon, Oregon State, Southern Cal and UCLA — are ineligible because of violations of one sort or another.

The Rose Bowl doesn't have to bother itself with issuing formal invitations. The Big Ten — Ohio State, Michigan or Purdue — and Little Ten — or the Pac-5 — pick both Rose Bowl representatives automatically.

Not so the other bowls and, for a change, Bear Bryant isn't calling all the shots, although you can bet he has his finger somewhere in the pie.

The Georgia Bulldogs are this year's bowlmaker. They are the nation's only unbeaten-untied team and No. 1 in The Associated Press rankings.

If they defeat Auburn this weekend, the Bulldogs will represent the Southeastern Conference in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 against the winner of Saturday's Alabama-Notre Dame showdown. If it's Alabama, the Crimson Tide sees it as a stepping-stone to a possible third consecutive national championship, something no team has ever accomplished.

In that case, the Alabama-Notre Dame loser probably would wind up in either the Cotton or Orange Bowl. Baylor is a virtual shoe-in as the Southwest Conference's Cotton Bowl host while Nebraska and

Oklahoma are tied in the Big Eight Orange Bowl race.

But if Georgia is tied or beaten by Auburn, all signals are off. A tie would still put the Bulldogs in the Sugar Bowl and they could back in with a loss, but either of those developments might make Pitt — or the Pitt-Penn State winner — the visiting team.

What it boils down to are five teams scrapping for the three open spots in the Cotton, Sugar and Orange Bowls. In order of this week's AP ranking, they are Florida State (3), Alabama (5), Notre Dame (6), Pitt (8) and Penn State (9).

All have games left after Saturday, which is the day bowl bids can be officially extended. Translation: The day the official bids that already have gone out become official.

Florida State meets Florida on Dec. 6. Alabama plays Auburn on Nov. 29. Notre Dame faces Air Force on Nov. 22 and Southern Cal on Dec. 6.

Pitt and Penn State square off on Nov. 28.

Word has it that the Cotton Bowl's preferred choices, in order, are Alabama, Florida State and Notre Dame. The Orange Bowl took Florida State last year but didn't really want the Seminoles, despite an 11-0 record. This time, the Orange can't chance a rematch between FSU and Nebraska, who played Oct. 4 (FSU won 18-14).

The rumor mill also says the Big Eight has worked out a three-way deal with the Orange, Liberty and Sun Bowls. It supposedly goes like this: If Nebraska or Missouri is in the Orange Bowl, Oklahoma goes to the Sun and either Missouri or Nebraska to the Liberty. If Oklahoma goes to the Orange, Nebraska's in the Liberty and Missouri's in the Sun.

The only rumored "locks" are South Carolina in the Gator Bowl, North Carolina in the Peach Bowl, Florida in the Tangerine Bowl and Southern

Methodist in the Holiday Bowl against the Western Athletic Conference king, probably Brigham Young.

One of the Big Ten teams that don't make it to Pasadena likely will wind up in the Fiesta Bowl, with Pitt and Penn State also in the picture. Texas is reported to be considering the Liberty and Bluebonnet Bowls. Florida State should surface in the Gator Bowl if the third-ranked Seminoles are shut out on New Year's Day. Pitt and Penn State are possibilities, too.

Mississippi State, conqueror of Alabama, meets Louisiana State this weekend and can have a Hall of Fame Bowl bid right now — win, lose or draw. The Liberty Bowl also has eyes on MSU, but not under those conditions.

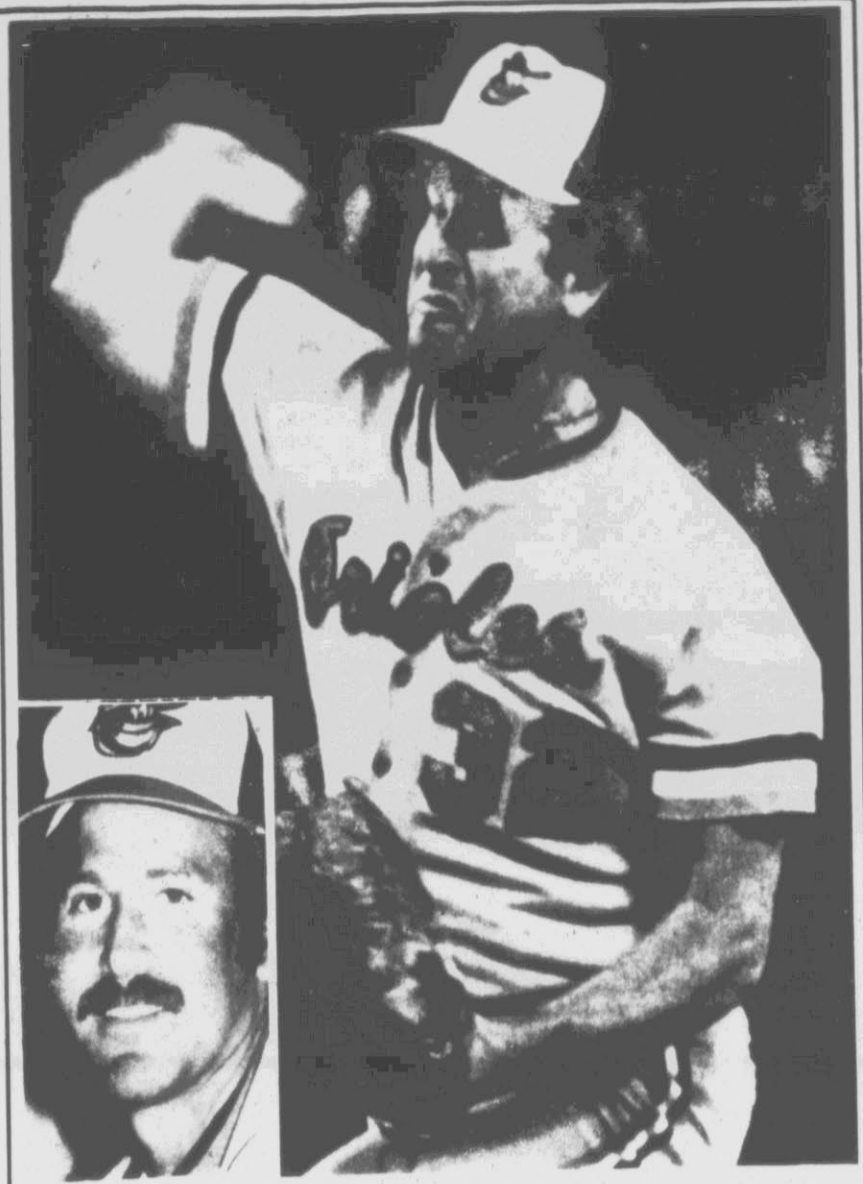
Navy will be invited to host the Garden State Bowl if the Middies beat Georgia Tech. If they lose, Maryland can earn an invitation by beating Clemson. If both lose, there's

always old reliable Rutgers just 50 miles or so down the New Jersey Turnpike. The Garden State has Tulane and Houston high on its list of visitors.

Southern Mississippi reportedly will be the visiting team in the Independence Bowl against the Southland Conference champ.

Other teams with decent, if not awe-inspiring, records include Appalachian State.

## Stone Wins Cy Young Over Oakland's Norris

NEW YORK (AP) — Baltimore's Steve Stone, the majors' top winner in 1980, won the American League Cy Young Award today in a close battle with Mike Norris of Oakland.

Each pitcher received 13 first-place votes from the 28-man committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America, but the Orioles' 25-game winner piled up more second- and third-place votes to emerge the winner by nine points, 180 to 91.

Rich Gossage of the New York Yankees was third with 37½ points while teammate Tommy John finished a distant fourth with 14. Dan Quisenberry of Kansas City was fifth with 7½ points, and Kansas City's Larry Gura and Baltimore's Scott McGregor tied for fifth with one point apiece.

Under the BBWA voting system, five points are awarded for first place, three for second and one for third.

"All along I thought I deserved it and I'm sure that Mike Norris thought he did," said Stone. "This decision in no way diminishes the type of year he had."

In his 10th major league season, the 33-year-old Stone posted a 25-7 record with a 3.23 earned run average. Norris was 22-9 with the A's and had a 2.54 ERA, second in the AL to New York's Rudy May, who led the league with 2.47.

Stone had two spectacular hot streaks during the season. From May 9 until July 26, he won 14 games in a row and from May 9 until August 23, he took 19 of 20 decisions.

"There was no pressure during the (14-game streak) because it kind of snuck up on me,"

said Stone. "I won a few and then had three no-decisions. Before I knew it, it was 8, 9 and 10 in a row and then came the All-Star break when I didn't think about the streak."

The right-hander tipped his cap to his bullpen.

"Tim (Stoddard) and Tippy (Martinez) did an exceptional job," said Stone. "Without them, there's no way I would have won the award. When I get the trophy, I expect to see all three names engraved on it. I'm not the kind of guy who can go out and complete 25 games."

Despite his mountainous victory total, Stone posted only nine complete games in 1980.

The season was by far the best for Stone in a checkered career. He entered the year with a 78-79 lifetime record with four teams and until 1980, his best season was 15-12 with the Chicago White Sox in 1977.

"I can't deny that wearing a Baltimore uniform has made a big difference," said Stone who was 67-72 lifetime with three other teams and 36-14 with the Orioles. "I would have liked to play my whole career in Baltimore, but you can't look back."

Norris finished 1980 with a 22-9 record and placed second in the league's ERA race at 2.54.

Gossage, the Yankees' bullpen ace, had a 6-2 record and a major league-leading 33 saves. He drew the two remaining first-place votes.

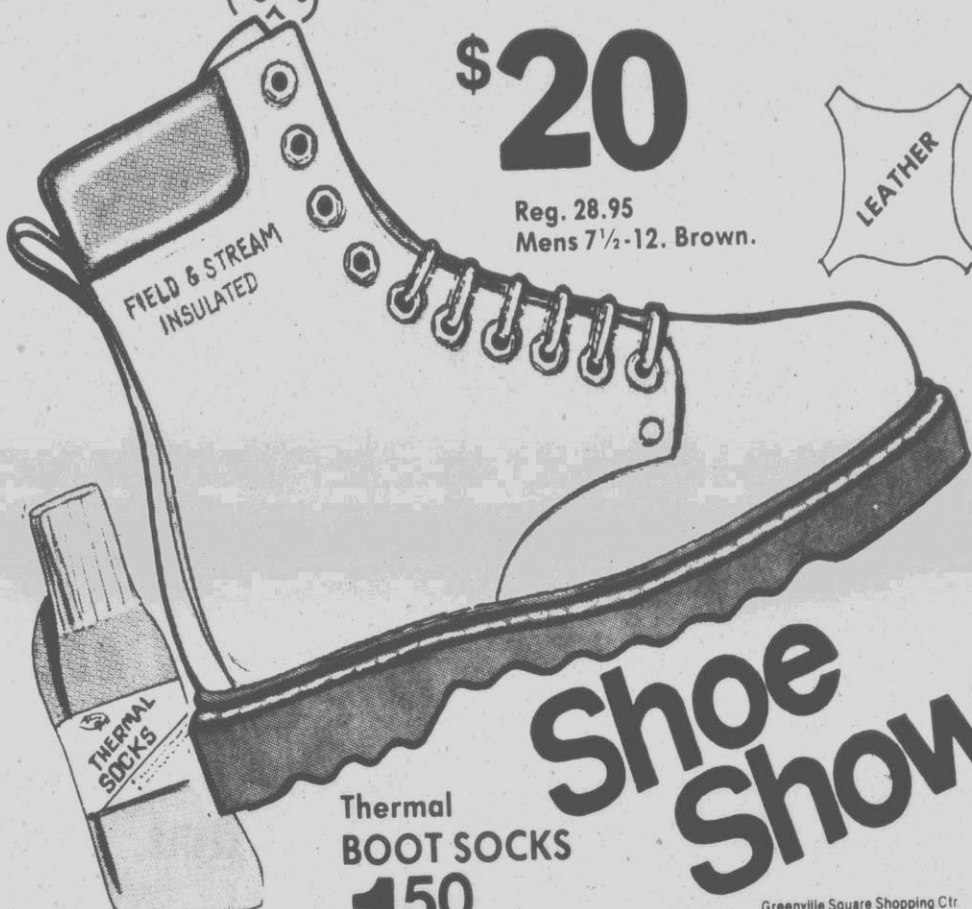

Valvano said that this year will mark the first time in ten years that State doesn't have a superstar. "You win with talent. The best coach in the world can't take a team with no talent and be successful. But a good coach can take good players and really be a winner."

He expects State to be strong in the backcourt with Sidney Lowe at the point and Kenny Matthews at number two guard. "Kenny is hurt right now, and we don't know when he's going to be back at full strength." Backing him up is Dereck Whittenburg.

Up front, the Pack won't be as strong. The leaders here are Art Jones, Craig Watts and Thurl Bailey. Scott Parzych is

also expected to see a great deal of action.

"I plan for us to run a lot," Valvano said. "On defense, we'll be pressing."

Valvano said that he tries to inspire his team to be a success, and that three things are necessary for that success: enthusiasm, a dream, and a willingness to work.

"One of my dreams was to play a 9 p.m. game in Madison Square Garden against one of the major powers. It took 13 years, but I made it when we (Iona) defeated Louisville last year. Now, my dream is to make the final four at the NCAA, and that's one of the reasons I came to State."

Valvano also said:

"That he favors a shot clock, in some form, but at least for the final five minutes of the game."

"That he thinks Kentucky is the team nationally, and Maryland is the team in the ACC, with Virginia pressing very hard."

"That while his wife cannot sing the National Anthem, she can do a pretty nifty tap dance."

"That being picked to finish low in the ACC doesn't bother him, but really is more of a challenge that being picked high."

The next meeting of the Sports Club will be Nov. 25, with Dave Odom of East Carolina as the speaker.

# Sugar Ray: Duran Talks Trash

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — "You got to be mean to fight Duran," said Sugar Ray Leonard, who challenges welterweight champion Roberto Duran in a Nov. 25 rematch.

"I don't intend to be mean outside the ring, but inside it I will" Leonard said Tuesday after his first workout in the Louisiana Superdome.

Leonard, after five months of holding his tongue, finally sniped back at Duran.

"That turkey talks so much trash," the challenger said. "He called me a clown before our first fight, but he couldn't knock this clown out."

"He said I talked too much. But who's doing the talking now?"

Duran, who opened his on-site preparations at the Superdome on Monday, had told reporters at his workout that he doesn't respect Leonard because the challenger never beat anybody tough.

"He respects me," Leonard said Tuesday. "He can talk all he wants to. He just wants to project a macho image."

Leonard lost his World Boxing Council title to Duran in Montreal in June on a unanimous, but close, decision.

Leonard said he has deliberately avoided saying anything inflammatory about Duran. He said he didn't want to precipitate any pre-fight confrontation.

"If he hits me, I'll hit him back, and I don't want to blow my chance at a title."

Duran told reporters Tuesday that he resents being described as a street brawler.

"I didn't start fighting in the street. I started fighting in the ring. It bothers me," he said through interpreter Luis Henriquez.

Angelo Dundee, Leonard's handler, had a different evaluation of Duran.

"He's a master of mystique," Dundee said. "A master hypnotist. He makes you think he's doing something when he isn't."

"Oh, he'll hit you, punch you, right shoulder block, left shoulder block, the head."

"But when you add the punches up, he doesn't throw any glove. He looks effective doing nothing."

Leonard said he will fight essentially the same fight this time, but be more aggressive.

And he said he will stay off the ropes, something he failed to do in Montreal.

"Against the ropes, I gave Duran leverage and momentum," he said. "Now, he didn't throw as many punches as I did, but maybe he threw more effective looking punches for TV."

"He had the bombs. I had the points."

Duran has said repeatedly that he will knock Leonard out before the 15th round. Dundee said Tuesday that he feels Leonard will win by a knockout.

"I honestly feel that Ray will take him out late," Dundee said.

East Carolina University's women's swimming team opens the season Friday night, playing host to Old Dominion University. The men's teams from both schools will also be in action in the 7 p.m. meet at Minges Natatorium.

"We had high expectations last year for the women," Coach Ray Scharf said. "And on paper, I guess we did well, but I wasn't completely pleased." The Lady Pirates finished 13th in the Division II nationals. "I just had higher expectations for them," Scharf explained.

This year, Scharf feels that the women could be improved. "We lost some good people, but we also have some good newcomers, and I think we may be better overall. Our quality is improved, but we will be going up against four of the top Division I teams in the country in North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and N.C. State. Duke is also one of the better teams around, too, and we go

to the strong Penn State Relays.

"Old Dominion is going to be a tough match for us too."

Currently, Scharf has 11 women on the team, with another slated to join at the start of the second semester. "But we have one out with mono, one injured, one coming off a knee operation, and another just plain sick for this week's meet, so we may be down to seven people for this meet."

The top veteran is Tammy Putnam, who holds the varsity records in the individual medley, the backstroke and the breaststroke. "She was all-American in three events last year, and should be our top IM'er and breaststroker this year."

Another top performer, is Susan Hanks, but she is coming off an operation, and Scharf isn't sure how quickly she'll return to top form.

Julie Malcolm, a junior and the most senior girl on the team (there are no seniors on the squad), looks good in the distance freestyles and breaststroke. She has already matched her best times of last year.

The only other returning veteran is Carol Shacklett, whom Scharf calls an outstanding sprinter. "She will be extremely helpful in the short

events."

Two incoming freshmen are on grant. They are Sally Collins and Jennifer Jayes. Collins is a top distance freestyler. "She's already tied the varsity record in the 200 in workouts and we look for big things from her. She's also good in the butterfly and any of the freestyles."

Jayes is a backstroker, and Scharf points out that her high school times are better than the varsity records at East Carolina.

Other newcomers include Sally Marburger, a middle distance freestyler; Laurie McQueston, a fine sprinter; and Moria McHugh, a freestyler and breaststroker.

Ann Powell is currently sidelined with mono. The daughter of the coach at Western Kentucky, she is a butterfly specialist. Tina Poole, another butterfly, is out with an injury.

Joining the team in January will be Dordi Henriksen of Norway, joining two other Scandinavian males on the ECU team. "She is an outstanding freestyler and butterflyer," Scharf said. "She will be super for us."

Overall, Scharf looks for improvement. "I don't know whether our dual meet record will be better, since our schedule is as tough as ever. But

we'll be pointing towards the nationals anyway."

And hopefully, the Lady Pirates will show an improvement there, possibly moving into the top ten.

# Playoffs Without Any Local Teams

Friday evening the high school football playoffs get under way across North Carolina and not one of the teams involved is from the area. None. Zero.

A year ago, three local schools found themselves playing after the regular season came to a close. This year, not one of those three finished above third in their conference.

Farmville Central, winner of the Eastern Carolina Conference four straight years going into the season, wound up tied for fifth in the ECC. Jamesville, champion of the Beaufort-Hyde-Martin Conference in 1979, finished last this year in the league. Greenville Rose, 4-A runnerup a year ago, wound up tied for third in Division I this season.

Southern Nash won the ECC title Friday night, defeating previously unbeaten Charles B. Aycock, 14-8.

In results from last week's regular season finales: Farmville Central, 10-0 last year before losing to Ahoskie in the first round of the playoffs, ended 1980 with a 13-7 loss to Southwest Edgecombe. The Jaguars finish 4-4 in the league and 4-6 overall, Coach Gene Brewer's first losing season at Farmville.

North Pitt rolled past D.H. Conley, 32-6, in a game for last place in the league. The win was only the Panthers second of the season against eight losses. North Pitt finished 1-7 in the league.

The Vikings, meanwhile, suffered through their first winless season. Conley ended up 0-10 overall and 0-8 in the ECC.

Greene Central, which came on strong at the end of the season after struggling early, whipped North Lenoir, 21-0. The Rams, who outscored their last three opponents, 81-0, finish the year at 4-6 overall and 3-5 in the league.

In a Northeastern Conference battle, Williamston blanked Roanoke, 17-0, to finish the year at 8-2 overall and 5-2 in the conference. Roanoke wound up 5-5 overall and 2-5 in the league.

Ayden-Grifton and Jamesville completed their seasons two weeks ago.

### D.H. Conley

0-10. That's how D.H. Conley ended up. No wins, 10 losses and plenty of questions, one being, 'What happened?'

"I don't know," D.H. Conley coach Jimbo Walker said. "We must have been pretty bad to be 0-10. There's not one thing that would cause that. You're talking 0-10. It's got to be a lot of things wrong."

One of those things wrong with the Vikings this year was their inability to hold onto the ball. When the Vikings weren't fumbling, they were having passes intercepted. More than once it cost them a win.

"Usually, when you fumble you lose field position and yardage," Walker said. "But so many times this year our mistakes were turned into points."

Which is exactly what happened last Friday night in their 32-6 loss to county-rival North Pitt. The Panthers returned one fumble and one interception for touchdowns and also recorded a safety. In all, the Vikings lost three fumbles and had four passes intercepted.

"I haven't seen the films, but I think on our second, third and fourth possessions we got down inside their 20 and fumbled," Walker said.

Mistakes, however, were one chapter of the Vikings' 1980 story. Another chapter was headed, 'Inconsistency.'

Conley opened with a 14-9 loss to playoff-bound West Craven, a loss in which the Vikings had a 65-yard touchdown called back. Twice late in the game Conley recovered fumbles inside the Eagle 30 only to come away empty.

Three weeks later Conley lost to North Lenoir, 21-18, a game the Vikings should have won but didn't because of — you guessed it — turnovers.

"We lost some close games early. We just weren't able to have success early and that hurt," Walker said.

Then came Southern Nash, the 1980 ECC champions. The Vikings led the Firebirds, 13-0, at the half, only to lose, 28-13. A month later Conley battled then unbeaten Charles B. Aycock toe-to-toe before losing, 28-14. In between, however, the Vikings lost to Farmville Central and Ayden-Grifton by 17 and Southwest Edgecombe by 11.

"We played well against Southern Nash," Walker said. "If we could have won, if we could have beaten a team of that caliber, we might have had a successful season."

As it was, the Vikings closed out the season with a 34-0 loss to Greene Central and last week's loss to North Pitt to end the season without a victory.

"I never thought we'd be that bad," Walker said. "I knew we had a chance to be very good, but I also knew we had a chance to be very good. I just never thought we'd be that bad."

### North Pitt

North Pitt opened the 1980 season with a 34-0 win over Kannapolis topped the 4A ranks but, in the second round, High Point Central, 11th in the final poll, won the playoff title.

In 3A, Farmville topped the poll but was a first-round playoff loser. Belmont South Point, second in the ratings, won the title.

The 2A-1A poll champion was Maiden, but it lost in the opening round to eventual 2A playoff king Swain County, which was third-ranked. The highest-rated 1A school last year was Princeton, which lost in the finals to unranked Robinsville.

This year, Pine Forest edged Kannapolis 149-148 in the final 4A voting. Henderson Vance was third. Hickory, ranked No. 1 a week ago, dropped to ninth after a 21-12 loss to Asheville, rated fifth this week.

Hickory's demise was typical in the 4A ranks this season, when Northern Durham, Kannapolis and Fayetteville Terry Sanford each led at one time or another.

Lexington edged Burlington Williams 149-148 for the 3A top spot, but Lexington was atop that class from start to finish this year. Third in 3A was Lincolnton. The top five teams in 3A (also including No. 4 East Wake and No. 5 Mount Airy) carry 10-0 records into the playoffs.

Southwest Guilford also led the 2A-1A class most of the season. It outpointed runner-up Littlefield 143-136, with Fuquay-Varina third. Robinsville, the highest-ranked 1A team, was fourth. All four have 10-0 records entering the playoffs.

Enfield. The Panthers closed out the season last Friday with a 32-6 victory over winless D.H. Conley.

In between, North Pitt was on-or-eight. It was not a successful season for the Panthers, who ended up 2-8 overall and 1-7 in the ECC.

"The season was disappointing, that's the way it was and there's no getting around it," North Pitt coach Pat Smith said. "That was the result of several things. We started out playing well and then lost a couple of ballgames and the attitude began to sag."

Following the Panthers' opening-night victory, North Pitt dropped a 13-12 decision to North Lenoir, a game the Panthers dominated but failed to win.

Then, after losing to Southern Nash, 42-14, the Panthers lost to Farmville, 7-0, and Ayden-Grifton, 14-0. North Pitt could have won either of those games but didn't.

The next week the Panthers dropped their second one-point loss of the season, 20-19, to Southwest Edgecombe. At that point, the Panthers were beginning to hurt: many of their starters were injured. Others were quitting.

"We had a number of players who could have played for us but quit and later in the season that hurt us because we didn't have any depth," Smith said. "I don't know what it's going to take to change it here."

"The practice attitude here is poor," he added. "Guys will quit in midseason or they won't come out to practice or they'll come late. I don't know a way out of it. We've got 21, 22 players on the varsity and no JV program and I don't know what the solution is."

### Farmville Central

Two games into the season Farmville Central was 0-2 and had scored just 13 points. The Jaguars had given up 75 points, more than they had given up in the entire 1979 season.

It was a crisis period for the Jaguars and their fans, who have had to endure few losses in the last four seasons. "After our first two ballgames and the way we started out, it could have been a disastrous season," Farmville coach Gene Brewer said.

The Jaguars, however, reeled off four straight victories and appeared headed for a respectable season despite having lost nearly an entire team to graduation.

Something happened, however. The Jaguars stormed out to a 14-0 lead against the 1980 ECC champ Southern Nash only to lose, 32-22. That defeat all but eliminated the Jaguars from the race for the conference title, a title the Jaguars had won for four straight seasons.

That loss also started Farmville on a four-game losing streak that ended with last Friday's 13-7 loss to Southwest Edgecombe. The Jaguars did not win a game after a 26-7 victory over North Lenoir on Oct. 10.

"It was just a matter of we were not totally into the ballgames," Brewer said. "We never picked up the essential things. We had to repeat things for them over and over again that we shouldn't have had to."

"Overall, I felt we had some improvement maybe up to the midpoint of the season. But we did not progress like I wanted us to after that. In fact, we took some steps back."

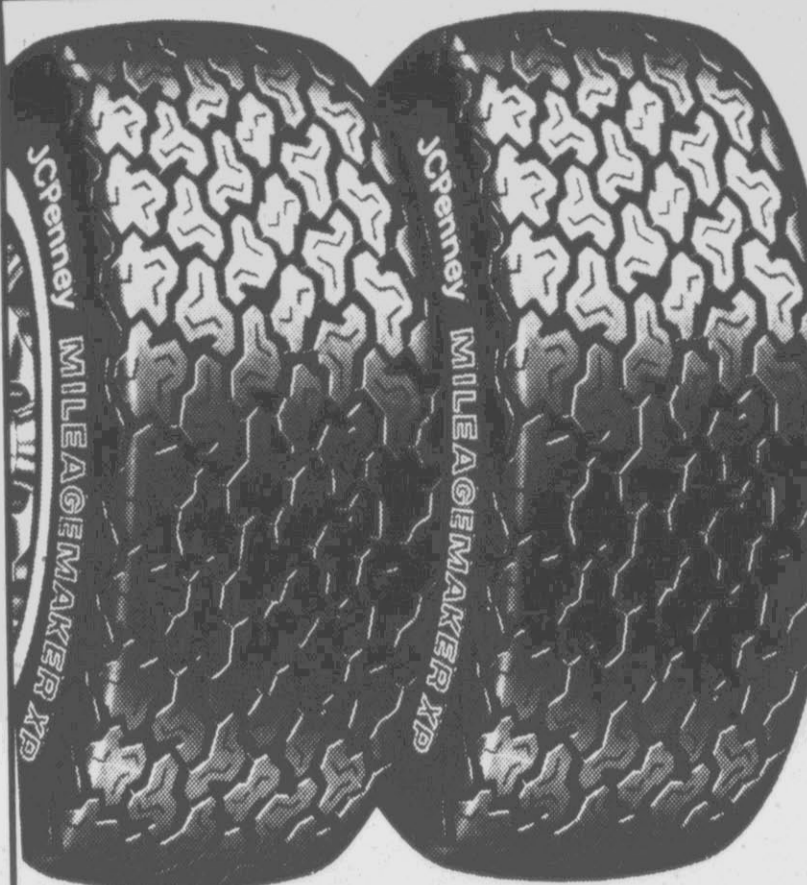
But coach, you were young. You lost 20 players to graduation, five of whom were all-conference, including the Reid twins. "After two or three ballgames they're not young anymore," Brewer said. "Even a sophomore's a veteran."

Still, young players do make mistakes, and that, Brewer said, did hurt the Jaguars.

"Defensively, we were hurt by the big play," he said. "Last Friday night was an example of how our season has gone. They (Southwest Edgecombe) scored on a 90-yard pass on third and 13. It's been like that all season."

"That's the whole season for us. We'd play real good for awhile and then have a letdown."

## Are Bruins, Celtics Leaving Boston?

SALEM, N.H. (AP) — The Bruins, who have been skating in Boston for 52 years, may be leaving Massachusetts for a new home in New Hampshire.

The National Hockey League club's owners said Tuesday that if their plans work out, the team may be in Salem by 1983 in a new sports complex that also would include a rebuilt Rockingham Park, New England's oldest thoroughbred racetrack.

Officials of Delaware North Companies Inc. of Buffalo, N.Y., a sports conglomerate that owns the Bruins and Boston Garden, said a move by the club would be tied to completion of a \$70 million sports complex on the Rockingham Park site. The track's grandstand and clubhouse were destroyed by fire July 29.

Delaware North president Donald Carmichael told a news conference he hoped the complex could also become home for the Celtics of National Basketball Association, tenants at the Garden.

Carmichael said he had not discussed the Rockingham complex with Harry Mangurian, Celtics' owner, but added that "we would hope events in Boston Garden could be moved to Rockingham."

However, Mangurian was quoted as saying Tuesday night his club would not leave Boston.

Carmichael said construction on the complex could begin in June 1981.

He said the reaction of Boston fans — especially those who live south of Boston and who would have to drive farther to reach Salem than they now travel to reach the Garden — would be part of feasibility studies for the proposed move.

Killingsworth, Liddy and Co., an Arlington, Mass., consulting firm specializing in sports, is conducting the study which will be ready in about a month, Carmichael said.

Salem is about 30 miles north of Boston with an Interstate 93 spur into the 260-acre track. Salem is about 20 miles south of Manchester, population 90,000, the largest New England city north of Boston.

The Bruins and the Boston Garden began life together in 1928. The Garden seats about 15,000.

The new Rockingham arena would seat about 18,000. Salem has bus service from Boston but no passenger trains.

The Celtics are unhappy with Boston Garden, which rents for home games, and Mangurian has talked about building an arena in Revere, Mass., next to Suffolk Downs race track.

New Hampshire tried to entice the Boston Patriots of the old American Football League to a similarly proposed complex in Salem in 1969, but the Patriots moved in 1970 to Foxboro, Mass., where they became the New England Patriots in the National Football League.

## N.Y. Reportedly Drops Chargers Against Bruins

BOSTON (AP) — The New York County Criminal Court reportedly has dropped criminal charges against the Boston Bruins that stem from a brawl between players and fans at a National Hockey League Game in New York last year.

The Bruins were informed this week that the case was dropped Oct. 16 on the grounds of insufficient evidence, according to reports in Tuesday's Boston Globe and Herald American.

The case resulted from an incident in the stands at Madison Square Garden. Fans John Kaptain and Jack Guttenplan and various Bruins players fought after a 4-3 Boston victory over the New York Rangers on Dec. 23.

Manhattan Assistant District Attorney Mario D'Natale said the ruckus began when the fans threw a punch at Bruin Stan Jonathan, and a hockey stick at other players. Criminal charges against Kaptain are still pending.

The Bruins still face charges in a \$7 million civil suit involving players Jonathan, Terry O'Reilly, Peter McNab, Al Secord, Mike Milbury, Craig MacTavish, Mike Wensink, Brad McCrimmon, and Bobby Miller.

The NHL and Madison Square Garden, among others, are also named in the suit. Bruins' attorney W.H. Plummer said he has "every confidence that the court will reach a similar decision (in this case)" in a letter to the players.

## Poll Champs Now Must Win On Field

The schools were leaders in the final weekly Associated Press poll, but the North Carolina High School Athletic Association-sponsored playoffs open Friday and will determine the official champs. State finals will be played on Dec. 5.

Kannapolis topped the 4A ranks but, in the second round, High Point Central, 11th in the final poll, won the playoff title. In 3A, Farmville topped the poll but was a first-round playoff loser. Belmont South Point, second in the ratings, won the title.

The 2A-1A poll champion was Maiden, but it lost in the opening round to eventual 2A playoff king Swain County, which was third-ranked. The highest-rated 1A school last year was Princeton, which lost in the finals to unranked Robinsville.

This year, Pine Forest edged Kannapolis 149-148 in the final 4A voting. Henderson Vance was third. Hickory, ranked No. 1 a week ago, dropped to ninth after a 21-12 loss to Asheville, rated fifth this week.

### Irish, 'Bama Loser Won't Be In Race For #1

CHICAGO (AP) — Bear Bryant of Alabama and Dan Devine of Notre Dame long to be No. 1 again but both realize it will be next to impossible for the loser of Saturday's game to nail down the national football championship.

Both coaches revealed Tuesday in separate telephone interviews with the Chicago Football Writers that top-ranked and undefeated Georgia is the main target.

"No. 1 is still possible, yes," Bryant said "but our only chance would be for Georgia to go to the Sugar Bowl and for us to play them there."

"I've never beaten anyone," said Bryant. "My teams have. In the games we lost to Notre Dame, we might have won if I had stayed home. Notre Dame is a big name and it would be nice and I'd be happy if we could beat them."

Bryant said "I would have liked to have them beat Georgia Tech because it would have been to our advantage. But that alerted them."

About this Saturday's game, Bryant said "you have to keep from losing before you can win. You need good defense and a good kicking game and keep the mistakes down."

"My biggest worry Saturday is that one of their big linemen might run out of bounds and run over me," said Bryant. "Heck, I want to be around for a while. They do have an awesome defense."

Would Bryant like to meet Notre Dame in a postseason game?

"If they beat us this Saturday I'd go anywhere to play them, even Elkhart, Indiana," said the Bear, "but if we win, no, I wouldn't want to play them again."

### Sooners Are Reprimanded

MISSION, Kan. (AP) — The NCAA Committee on Infractions has publicly reprimanded the University of Oklahoma for recruiting and financial aid violations in track and football.

However, the NCAA said Tuesday night that the reprimand will not affect Oklahoma's eligibility for post-season competition or television appearances in either sport.

Charles Alan Wright, chairman of the infractions committee, said the violations were isolated and did not represent a pattern of improper conduct.

"(But) the committee felt that a public penalty was required because in some instances members of the football coaching staff were fully aware that their actions were contrary to NCAA legislation," Wright said.

The violations included two instances in which the Oklahoma football staff exceeded the NCAA's three-visit limit while recruiting prospective players, and two cases in which such players were provided improper transportation or refreshments.

The NCAA also said the Oklahoma track coach improperly recruited an athlete at the site of the athlete's high school competition and an ineligible athlete was improperly given financial aid and allowed to practice with the track team.

## Free Agent Auction Thursday

NEW YORK (AP) - Like moths cautiously circling a flame, baseball executives warmed up today for the game's biggest auction, the free agent re-entry draft. There is a considerable amount of strategy involved for Thursday's event. With each of the 48 free agents available limited to 13 teams, some premium players could be closed out early. That is the problem facing the New York Yankees, who are anxious to get into the bidding for slugger Dave Winfield, the most glamorous name in the draft. The Yankees had baseball's best record last season with 103 victories and therefore have the 26th and final pick in each round of the draft. That means 25 teams will have a shot at picking Winfield before New York. Winfield has written to more than a dozen teams, advising them that he has no desire to play for them and suggesting that they not waste a draft pick on him. But many baseball people suspect some devious intentions in the letter, suggesting it is an attempt on the slugger's part to make sure he's still available when the Yankees get their turn in the draft. Only once in four previous drafts has a player reached his 13-team limit in the first round. That happened last year to pitcher Dave Goltz who signed with Los Angeles. Winfield is certain of being selected by one New York team. The Mets own the third choice in the draft following the Chicago Cubs and Seattle Mariners and have expressed every bit as much interest in the slugger as the Yankees. In fact, Fred Wilpon, president and chief operating officer of the Mets, thinks he may even have a small edge when the bidding begins. When Wilpon met Winfield and the player's agent, Al Frohman, there was an inkling of recognition. "You look familiar," Frohman told the Mets' boss. They discovered they had grown up in the same section of Brooklyn, N.Y. and that, in fact, there even had been a business relationship between their families. Wilpon's father was a funeral director in the old neighborhood and Frohman's father was a rabbi who often conducted services in the chapel. A thin connection, to be sure, but at this stage, teams will grasp at any thread which might provide an inroad to a desirable free agent. It's part of the re-entry routine. Remember how in 1978, John Galbreath offered Pete Rose a thoroughbred as part of the Pittsburgh Pirates package? And there was talk of a beer distributorship from August Busch if Rose would sign with the St. Louis Cardinals? Rose eventually decided on plain, old fashioned money instead, signing a four-year, \$3.2 million deal with the Philadelphia Phillies. At the time, it made him baseball's highest paid player. That honor lasted only until the 1979 draft when Houston signed Nolan Ryan for three years at \$1 million annually. That's the plateau Winfield is aiming at now and when the auction is over, Ryan, like Rose, may discover that he's no longer No.1 on baseball's salary ladder.

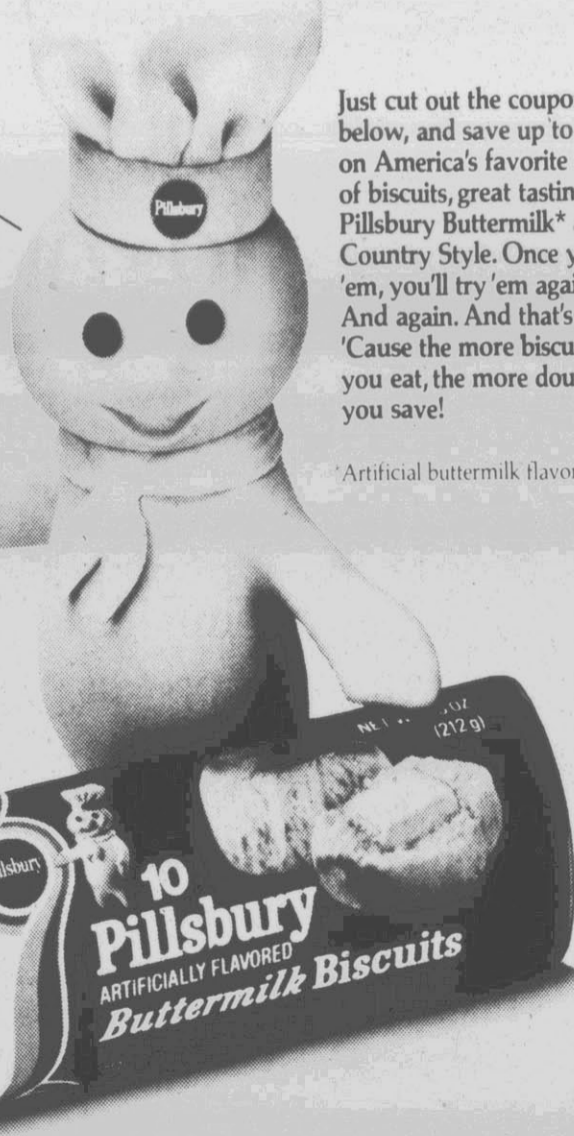

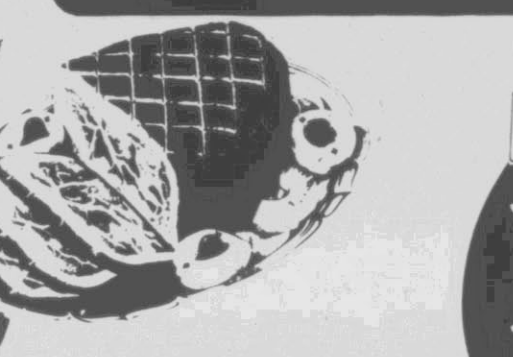

## Youngstown Sees Signs Of Progress

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio (AP) - The fiery glow of molten steel has not lit the sky at dusk here since Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. pulled up stakes three years ago.

Since October 1977, the city has lost 10,000 steel industry jobs. It is still crippled economically, with an unemployment rate almost double the national average, but officials in Youngstown and the Mahoning River Valley that surrounds it say they see some rays of hope.

They cite these signs of progress:

- Unemployment in Mahoning County eased from 15 percent in July to 12.8 percent in August and 12.5 percent in September - still well above the national average of 7.6 percent, but an improvement.

- Commuter Aircraft Corp. bought 94 acres of airport land and plans to put \$50 million into a plant that will create 1,500 jobs.

- Jones & Laughlin Steel Co. sold to the fledgling Youngstown Steel Corp. an old open hearth furnace and surrounding buildings that have been idle since 1977. Youngstown Steel, which began operations last February with 30 workers, eventually hopes to employ 450 persons.

- A 7-week-old cutback in the work week, from 40 hours to 32, for almost all city workers was ended Nov. 1.

Mayor George Vukovich - himself an 18-year steel worker veteran - had instituted the shorter work week to save money in September, when city books were teetering near the red ink because of reduced taxes from reduced industry.

"This is the first year of impact from the steel mill closings of 1977," explained Walter Swierz, the mayor's executive aide. "Instead of growth in taxes, the revenue leveled off - but inflation continued to eat into our purchasing power."

The short weeks saved the city \$320,000 - enough, said Swierz, to get the city through the end of the year. But further trouble looms.

City employees struck for one week in May and eventually won an 18-month contract giving them a 4 percent wage increase. But the duration of the contract, and an additional 10 percent increase, was made contingent on taxpayer approval of higher city income taxes.

Taxpayers rejected the idea twice, in August and last Tuesday, so the pact now expires on Dec. 31. Some officials fear they will have to weather another strike.

"We have to go back to the drawing board in December with less than we had to offer them last May," Swierz said Friday.

This Ohio valley's economic woes began with the flight of the steel industry, beginning Oct. 19, 1977, when Youngstown Sheet & Tube moved out, eliminating 4,100 jobs. In late 1979, Jones & Laughlin and U.S. Steel Corp. announced cuts that took 5,000 steel jobs.

Soon after the mills began closing, President Carter announced \$100 million in federal Economic Development Administration loan guarantees to help the steel industry. He later added \$125 million in loan guarantees to help other threatened local industries.

The Mahoning Valley Economic Development Corp., which grew out of a business effort to keep old business and seek new industry, functions as a clearing house for EDA loan applications.

In the past 13 months, the agency has awarded \$12 million from a revolving loan fund to 12 existing or new companies. Those companies have been able to keep or create 550 jobs.

One of the corporation board members, the Rev. Edward Stanton, has made economic progress here his full-time job.

He was the leader of the first effort to save the steel industry after the initial layoffs in 1977.

That effort - the Ecumenical Coalition of the Mahoning Valley, a community-worker coalition which wanted to buy and reopen the shuttered mills of Youngstown Sheet & Tube - failed.

# NBC's Election Night Journalism 'Stirs' Protests

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC's election-night newspaper promotion was meant to suggest quiet confidence and competence, a bit of understated hypemanship in the intense ratings competition between the network news departments.

"NBC News Journalism That Makes A Difference." Trouble was, NBC's election-night journalism may have indeed made a difference. In its drive to be first on election night, NBC declared Ronald Reagan the winner of the presidential contest with voting booths still open in nearly half the 50 states.

NBC scored a remarkable beat on its two competitors, ABC and CBS, but in so doing stirred the wrath of citizens who felt their votes had been muted. When NBC's Tom Brokaw pronounced, "It's all over, as far as NBC sees it," it was 8:15 p.m. in New York. It was 5:15 in Los Angeles, 2:15 in Nome, Alaska.

Afternoon and evening voters in the West, who awoke last Tuesday believing their votes would count in what was expected to be a close presidential race, were suddenly faced with the prospect of casting redundant votes.

Many, according to California Secretary of State March Fong Eu, simply passed on the opportunity.

Mrs. Eu canvassed the state's 58 counties at mid-day Nov. 4, leading her to conclude that California voters were turning out in numbers expected to exceed her pre-election prediction. Mrs. Eu had called for 79.3 percent of registered voters, but mid-day data suggested the turnout would be more like 81 percent.

"If things turn out normally," Mrs. Eu says, "the evening hours bring out a heavier vote than the daytime hours. But instead, it was lighter." After 6 p.m., the voting dropped considerably, resulting in a 76.3 percent turnout.

NBC News chief Bill Small discounts the influence of his network's early projection, claiming "You hear this whenever there's a landslide." Of Mrs. Eu's data, he says, "I'm not a statistician, but I'd just say that of those who were going to vote, more did so during the day and therefore there were less left to vote in the evening."

Besides, Small points out, while California's real voting percentage declined from 1976, the decline was smaller than the national average.

Mrs. Eu will not be swayed. Convinced that network projections discourage voters and therefore have an effect on local elections in the West, she is pressing for federal and state legislation that will close the

nation's polling booths at the same time.

That seems to be the popular answer to the perceived problem of TV's intervention in the electoral process. Sen. S.I. Hayakawa of California, who says the process "was certainly injured" by the early call, plans to introduce a bill in the U.S. Senate mandating staggered voting hours across the country with the aim of simultaneous poll closing.

"Then, they can make all the projections they like, but it won't influence elections," Hayakawa says.

"For anyone who has ever covered an election," says CBS reporter Dan Rather, "that (Hayakawa's solution) would seem the only practical solution." Another plan being considered would simply withhold voting results from the news media until polls closed around the country.

Rather's network was the last to project Reagan as winner, delaying even until after President Carter had conceded. CBS claims it waited in prudence, although NBC could be expected to suggest sour grapes on the part of a network that was scooped. Rather risks it.

"In this case, we could have gone on the air at noon (EST) and said, 'It's Reagan, and it's Reagan big.' Literally, any of the networks could have. Exit polling made it clear. The data was overwhelming at noon."

"Some people chose to make projections on a basis of guesses, hunchwork and

labeled clearly as just that." NBC's Small insists that NBC's method "is not guesswork." He points out that NBC employed the data of its own survey expert and two outside experts in reaching its early conclusion, and the Reagan projection was based on a combination of raw vote, key precinct results and exit polling.

(It should be noted that raw vote totals can only be used where they are available, that is, in states where the polls have closed.)

"People were angry because the results were projected early," Small says. "So be it. That's what happens when you have staggered time zones. We aren't responsible for that. People still have an obligation to vote."

An obligation, perhaps, but incentive diminishes when a voter is told the election is over.

"The fact that a voter believes he can do something with his vote means he may actually be able to do something with it," Rather says.

A quaint idea, that.

## 'Tarzan' Is Recovering

MEXICO CITY (AP) — It's been a long time since he plunged into a lake as the movies' jungle king, Tarzan, but 76-year-old Johnny Weissmuller is up to a stroll around his Acapulco pool several times a day.

Weissmuller, a swimmer who won five Olympic gold medals, is "improving all the time," his wife Maria said Tuesday. "Any reports that he is dying are just terrible and not true."

Six months ago, she had reported her husband wanted to be left alone, was not lucid, talked very little and was waiting to die.

But things have changed since then, private nurse Alice Miller reports: "He talks all the time when he wants to. When he doesn't want to, he shuts up just like a stubborn old mule."

"Sure he's not as strong as he used to be ... but he's eating regularly and getting stronger all the time. I'd say he is in good condition."

Weissmuller came here in May 1979 after he was removed from an old age home in California where he had begun making "Tarzan" yells in the middle of the night.





# Foreign Judges Flocking To U. S. Judicial College

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Takashi Sonoo of Japan, Patricia Macaulay of Sierra Leone and Charles Lamm Jr. of North Carolina. All three are judges, and all three are "classmates," graduates of the National Judicial College in Reno.

Since 1964, the National Judicial College has been teaching American judges how to do their jobs, with judges coming from around the country for one to three weeks of intensive study in classes with names like "Evidence" and "Traffic Court" and "Minorities and Handicapped in the Courts."

But something new is happening. The judicial col-

lege's reputation is spreading abroad, and more and more of its participants are from foreign countries. A college roster these days might include judges from Afghanistan, China, England, Nigeria — even the Soviet Union.

"This year we've had more foreign judges than ever before," said Judge Ernst John Watts, dean of the college. "We try to encourage all judges visiting in the country to stop up here."

What the judges study at the college largely depends on their interests and where they're from, Watts said. But for the most part, the foreign judges enroll in courses dealing with legal procedure

rather than the law itself, since laws differ from country to country while procedures are often the same.

"Foreign judges come here because they want to compare the process of what we're doing with what they're doing," said Watts.

Part of what they want to learn, he said, is how the United States trains its judges. Most American judges start their careers on the bench with no job training at all, in contrast to most other countries which have mandatory training programs for those who want to become judges, said Watts.

Sonoo, for example, started his judicial training immediately after college, when he entered Japan's Legal Training and Research

Institute. After two years of study, he was appointed an assistant judge. Most of his classmates went on to become practicing attorneys.

Sonoo, 30, is in effect serving a 10-year apprenticeship under a full-fledged judge in Tokyo District Court. Now in his sixth year, he is among the few judges chosen each year by the Japanese Supreme Court to study abroad.

"We are trained much more in Japan than judges in the United States, but it is because our system is much different," Sonoo said. "We put a great stress on education in Japan. Our traditional way of thinking is a little different."

Still, Sonoo praised the judicial college for the training it offers American

judges. And he said the American lecture-style classes were "fascinating."

He nodded in agreement when Ms. Macaulay, a British-trained magistrate in the Freetown Magistrate's Court, said of the judicial college, "I don't know of any one like it anywhere in the world. I mean, a place where judges go to school — it's really quite unique."

Ms. Macaulay, 44, is here to study juvenile law. "Juvenile law is comparatively new with us," she said, "and this has given me an opportunity to see how it is done here."

The college was founded in 1963 by the Joint Committee for the Effective Administration of Justice, under the stewardship of the late Supreme Court Justice

Tom C. Clark. The first session was held in Colorado in 1964. A year later, the college moved to Reno.

Here it is housed in a handsome brick building built in 1972 on the campus of the University of Nevada-Reno. It has a staff of 38, a library of 49,000 volumes.

Its funding comes from the Max C. Fleishman Foundation in Reno, the American Bar Association, Dow Chemical, the Gannett Newspaper Foundation, the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, the Ford Foundation and more than a dozen other sources.

The college awarded more than 1,500 certificates of completion to judges in 1979 — compared with 83 its first year.

Like most American

judges attending the college, Sonoo and Ms. Macaulay are on expense-paid trips. Sonoo's tuition is being paid by the Japanese Supreme Court, and Ms. Macaulay is on a United Nations fellowship.

A three-week session costs \$600. Classes begin at 8 a.m. and generally run until 5 p.m. The judges live together, eat together and talk together. When they talk, it's usually about law.

Watts has been known to boot out judges who didn't view the college seriously. A former Wisconsin judge, he himself takes the college very seriously. He sounds like a man with a mission when he says that, ideally, judges should be trained for two or three years, not three weeks, which is the norm at

the college. "We have so much we want judges to know," Watts said.

## Objects To Airport Art

ATLANTA (AP) — Bob Jones III, head of a large, very conservative private college in South Carolina, wants what he called "a lewd photograph of a woman's backside" removed from Atlanta's new airport.

But city officials defended the picture as a work of art.

"There is a photograph ... that I find highly objectionable. The photograph referred to is that of a black woman's backside," Jones, head of Bob Jones University in Greenville, wrote Airport Commissioner George Berry.

"The figure that you refer to is not a black woman, but rather a white woman dancer in black leotards," Shirley C. Franklin, Atlanta's commissioner of cultural affairs, wrote back. "It is our opinion that the photograph in question is a statement about the beauty of the human form and not, as you suggest, lewd or lascivious."

In a letter back to Mrs. Franklin, Jones suggested that her title should be changed to "commissioner of pornography."

"I knew Atlanta had become a wicked city, but I didn't know the taxpayers had to pay the salary of someone such as you to be deliberately offensive and arrogant about it," he wrote. "If your reasoning holds — that the photograph is justified because of the beauty of the human form — then let's all take off our clothes in order to grace the world with beauty."

Mrs. Franklin said she was not aware of any other complaints about the photograph.

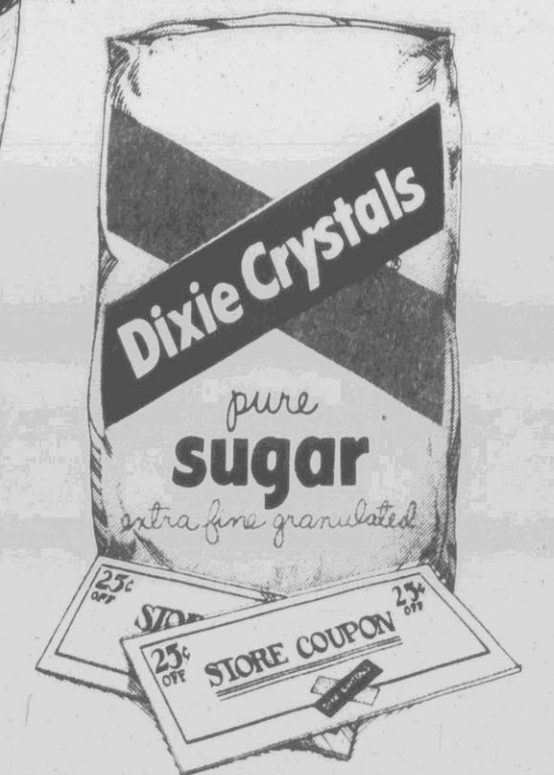

## Chili Pepper Popularity Is Growing

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — To some, unless it brings tears to the eyes and beads of sweat to the forehead, it's no good. To others, the mild type is just fine, thank you.

But either way, the nationwide popularity of chili — red, green, hot, mild — is blossoming.

The trick is to introduce virgin taste buds to the milder varieties of chili and hook them, says Dr. Donald Cotter, professor of vegetable crops at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces.

Then, once jaded, graduate the taste buds to the more pungent pods, he says.

"I think if you introduce them to Mexican food with the hotter varieties, you've lost them forever," Cotter says. "But I think honest chili-eaters still go for the pungent stuff."

Dr. Frank Matta, a horticulturalist and superintendent of New Mexico State's Espanola Valley Branch Experiment Station, also says introduction to mild varieties is a key to enjoying chili.

"Like everything else, people have to get adjusted to it," he says.

Dave Wade, a farmer with 42 acres of chili peppers five miles south of Socorro, N.M., says the vegetable "really doesn't burn that much once you're used to it."

"Folks from the East, they'll eat the hotter chili and it'll burn them up and they'll holler for water and go back the second time. And about the third time, they want more and can't stop."

The harvest season is winding up in New Mexico — ristras hung to dry by seasonal chili vendors splash roadsides with brilliant red.

Wade says his fields were green with red pods hanging off the plants until the first frost hit — "it turned the plants black, and the red pods really show up."

"There are two markets," Cotter says. "The local market is a quite pungent variety — that is the preference. Outside the area is a milder market."

Chili is a universal spice and high in vitamins C and A, Cotter says.

"It really does make a bland food quite attractive — it has quite a flavor-enhancing factor," he says. "The pungency within the chili and the sensation it produces is the thing."

Wade, also a chili-lover, agrees: "You can make 10 different recipes up with a little bit of chili... 99 percent of the whole thing is flavor."

Chili's growing popularity nationwide has created an expanded need for milder varieties, Cotter says. "The producers like the mild variety and so do the canners."

The national popularity for Mexican foods has increased the demand for chili and chili products, he says. "Mexican food now is the second most popular ethnic food only to Italian food."

Producers and food manufacturers are promoting chili and chili products more than ever, Cotter says. "There really is a strong effort to play this thing up and get it more popular."

Wade says he likes growing hotter chili for local markets. "People in Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico are looking for hotter chili."

For the past five years, consumption of chili has been increasing 15 percent annually, Cotter says.

The popularity has caused a greater need for research to produce chili plants that are milder, resistant to disease, produce higher yields and are adapted to mechanical harvesting, he says.

Wade says chili growing and harvesting is hard work, done mostly by hand.

"It is a lot of work and that's why a lot of guys won't do it," he says.

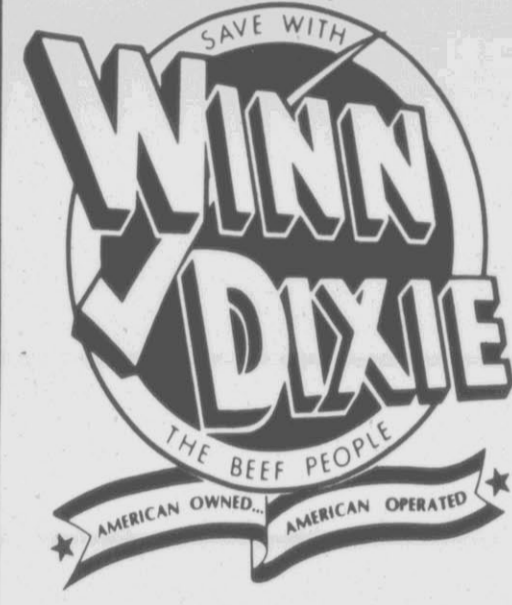

## S. Africa's Whites Go To Fun City

**SUN CITY.** Bophuthatswana (AP) — White South Africans flock to this city of fun in the middle of a poor black tribal homeland to do what they can't do at home.

The pleasures offered at the Sun City Hotel in the scrubby bushland of Bophuthatswana would seem banal to most foreigners: slot machines, blackjack, roulette, Las Vegas-type revues featuring topless showgirls, soft-porn movies and sitting down next to black people for dinner.

But the morality laws which exist in South Africa and the white-minority government's apartheid race segregation policies have helped the 341-room hotel enjoy a 90-percent occupancy rate since it opened last fall.

Sun City, part of a South African hotel chain, sponsored last month's World Boxing Association heavyweight title bout between its reigning champ, American Mike Weaver, and South African challenger Gerrie Coetzee. Weaver, from Los Angeles, kept the title with a 13th-round knockout of Coetzee in a still-unfinished sports arena built on the hotel's grounds.

The fight cost the hotel chain some \$300,000 but reaped wide publicity for the hotel, three hours' drive from Johannesburg in South Africa.

No one was happier with the money spent than Sol Kerzner, head of the hotel chain, who said Sun City cost \$30 million to develop.

Kerzner's company operates 27 hotels in South Africa. Sun City is the jewel of the collection.

A \$13 million expansion program is under way to increase bed capacity from 900 to 1,700 by building cabanas near the man-made lake and the 18-hole Gary Player Golf Course.

On an average weekend, 6,000 to 10,000 day-trippers come to Sun City from Johannesburg and Pretoria to gamble, watch movies not shown in South Africa or to sit around the swimming pool drinking beer.

Kerzner has more ambitious plans for Sun City than just attracting local clientele, however. He said he hopes that money spent on sponsoring events like the Weaver-Coetzee fight will make Sun City into an international spa frequented by jet-setters. The resort could be quadrupled in size in the next five years, he added.

"We think Sun City is unique," he said in an interview. "Where in Las Vegas, for example, you can gamble and then walk outside to play golf, tennis, see elephants and do it all in beautiful weather like we have in southern Africa?"

The resort complex is surrounded by 150,000 acres of mountainous bush country which is being stocked with wildlife for a game park. When full, the game population will include antelope, lions, elephants, rhino and giraffes.

Anti-apartheid critics claim, however, a hotel chain like Kerzner's woos poor black governments into becoming "casino states," enclaves pandering to white South Africans seeking pleasures not available to them back home.

So-called "dirty weekend brigades" of whites, for example, go to black-ruled border nations like Lesotho on weekends for porn movies, gambling and black prostitutes.

Bophuthatswana is a black tribal homeland which was given its independence by South Africa in 1977. But critics claim this independence policy is a fiction of the white-minority government to effectively disenfranchise blacks in their own country — to ensure that the whites remain in power — by making them "citizens" of mythical nations recognized only by South Africa.

Kerzner says he and his company prefer to call Bophuthatswana "an independent state" and not a homeland and that Sun City brings benefits to the government of President Lucas Mangope. Bophuthatswana, which depends on South Africa financially, chipped in half of the development costs and reaps half of the profits.

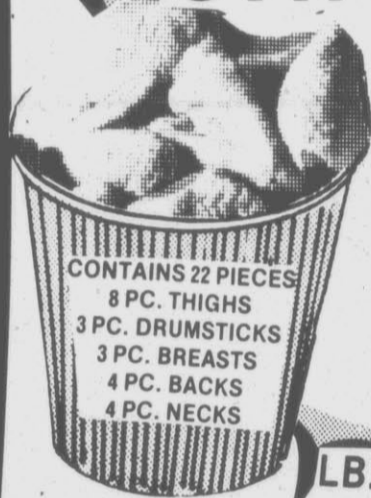

# Restaurateur Offers Low-Calorie, Low Fat Menu

EAST PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — Larry Procopio used to joke with his patrons, telling them to stay away from his restaurant if they were dieting.

"We serve a large portion of food," he used to boast. "It's rich and you're going to gain weight."

Today, however, Procopio boasts about a different sort of menu at his restaurant, The Palms.

He was the first restaurateur in Rhode Island to participate in a program called Creative Cuisine, a new concept in dining which makes low-calorie, low-fat meals available on menus for people who shy away from dishes like creamed chicken or cheese souffle.

Under guidelines prescribed by the American Heart Association, a volunteer committee composed of restaurant owners, nutritionists and a chef designed the program to encourage more people to eat sensibly.

Lois Yohe, a hospital dietician and committee member, said the "special" meals are not just for those who are overweight.

"The beginning feeling was that people on a diet have more difficulty in finding something when they go out to eat," Ms. Yohe said.

"But all in all, the whole program was tuned to the fact that people are now more interested in nutrition. If the restaurant can provide this help, it's going to result in a healthier population.

"In Rhode Island we have a high incidence of heart disease," Ms. Yohe continued, "and this was a logical state to get the people interested."

"The portion sizes are going to be smaller. There's going to be less concentrated sweets in the menu — they aren't going to have the cream sauces — and it's going to be modified to be lower in fat and cholesterol."

The heart association estimates the average person eats every third meal away

from home. Procopio aims to attract those hungry diners who in the past have found it difficult to get the right kind of food in restaurants, low in sodium or saturated fats, for example.

"You just have to prepare for it if you want to keep up with the times," he said. "That's the way I look at it."

Procopio admitted he was at first skeptical about his Creative Cuisine program would affect his business — catering to discriminating taste buds is how a restaurant achieves its reputation.

Nevertheless, under the direction of the committee chef, The Palms was able to modify its menu without much problem.

"We had to eliminate a couple of items," Procopio said. "Our antipasto for instance: we had to eliminate the cheese; we had to eliminate the anchovy; we had to eliminate the salami. So we're substituting a little bit of tuna fish instead."

Participating restaurants

usually note their special selections on the menu with a tiny soup caldron, the symbol of the Creative Cuisine program.

Procopio had separate menus printed for The Palms to call more attention to the

special entrees. Ms. Yohe said an effort is being made to add more restaurants to the Creative Cuisine program.

"There is some resistance on the part of restaurants that have gourmet items

because the chef still thinks that butter is the only item to cook in," she said. "And the sauces and the gravies all are high in fat."

"There was some question on their part that these could be done with the modified

items and still taste good. Of course they don't want to take away from their reputation — it's too important to them."

Because the meals at many restaurants are cooked to order, Procopio said he understands the reluctance of some owners to participate.

"It's going to cost me a little bit more on labor and time," he said. "It will mean I might have to get another cook in here — it's very possible."

Nevertheless he said in view of the good response his customers have shown to the new menu, "There must be a

beck of a demand for it." Beth Higgins, another subcommittee member, said she is contacting dietary departments and workshop groups across the state to ask them to inform their clients about the program.

"One of the first questions they (the dieters) ask you is, 'What am I going to do if I go out to dinner?'" she said. "This is an alternative to them, instead of saying, 'Well you just have to be careful of this or that.'"

"It's the type of program that is beneficial to all Americans. It's a better way of eating and a better way of living."

# Parents Reminded Of Seasonal Child Slayer

DETROIT (AP) — It has been more than 3 1/2 years since the child killer known only as "the Babysitter" struck in the suburbs north of Detroit, but fall is still a time of fear in Oakland County.

When the first snowfall comes, parents worry the killer may try to add to his list of victims — two girls and two boys, ages 10 to 12.

The unsolved slayings also were brought to mind by the killings of 11 black children and the disappearances of four others in Atlanta since July 1979.

The Oakland County children, all of them white, disappeared and were found slain between February 1976 and March 1977. "The Babysitter" got his name

because he took meticulous care of his victims before he killed them. They were well-fed, clean and warmly clothed during their captivity, which lasted up to 19 days, police said.

Three of the victims were smothered and one was shot in the face. All four slayings took place in winter and all the victims were abandoned along lightly traveled roads, their bodies neatly stretched out in the snow. The boys were sexually molested; the girls were not.

Police have linked the slayings because of the careful treatment of the victims and the way the bodies were found.

"The first snowfall always brings back thoughts," said Herbert Baker, director of guidance and pupil personnel

services for the Birmingham schools. The last of the four victims, Timothy King, 11, attended elementary school in that district.

"People are still very much concerned about it," said Sheriff's Sgt. Richard Birmingham. "Calls of suspicious activities are turned in much more readily now."

Police theorize that the killer approached his victims, somehow gained their trust and persuaded them to go somewhere with him.

Mark Stebbins, 12, of Ferndale, was last seen alive Feb. 13, 1976. His body was found six days later in a parking lot in Southfield.

Jill Robinson, 12, of Royal Oak, ran away from home Dec. 22, 1976, after an argument with her mother.

Her body, with a shotgun wound in the face, was found four days later in Troy.

Kristine Mihelich, 10, went to buy a magazine at a party store three blocks from her home on Jan. 2, 1977. Her body was found 19 days later in Franklin.

King was last seen talking to a man in a parking lot next to a blue Gremlin on March 16, 1977. His body was found seven days later.

Some investigators say the killer may no longer be in the area, but for the past two winters there has been a communitywide effort to educate children on safety.
