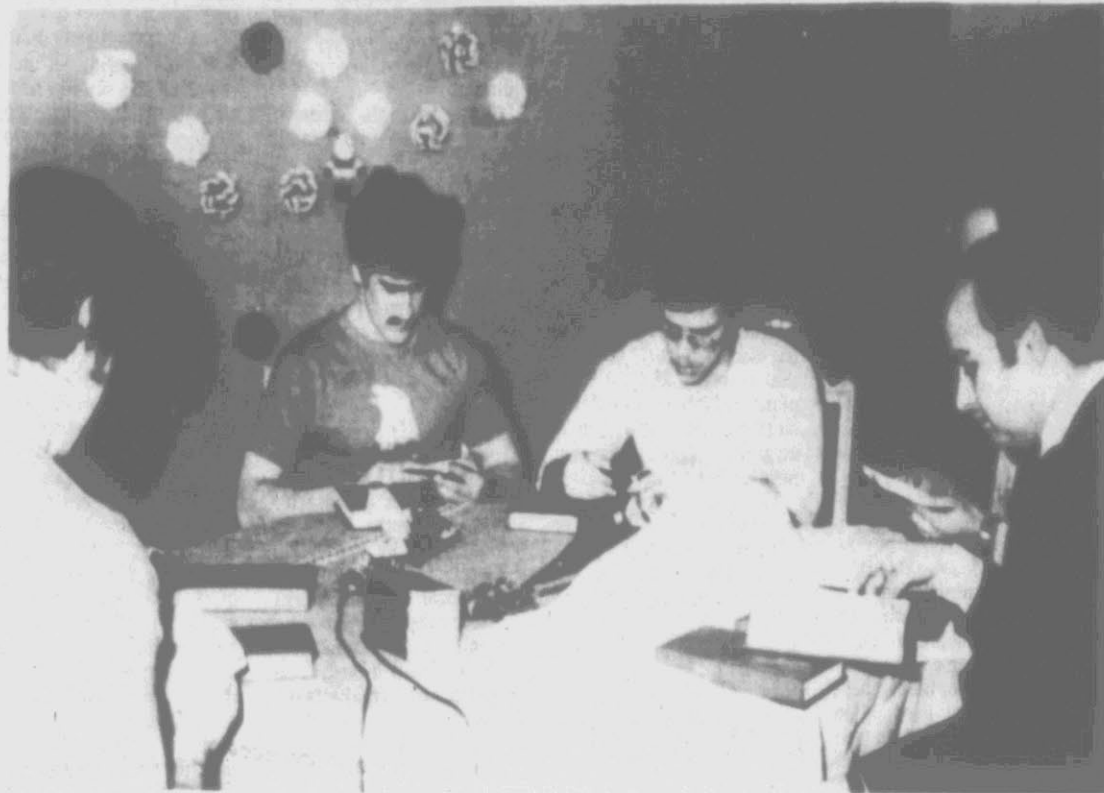

Poland's High Court Puts Off Farmer Union Ruling

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The Polish Supreme Court today adjourned deliberations on the application of private farmers to form an independent union, temporarily defusing the threat of a new strike.

Presiding Judge Antoni Filcek said the date for the next session would be announced later. A ruling on the farmers' appeal of a lower court rejection of their application had been expected today.

Court sources said the decision to adjourn was partly

to give the panel time to obtain official Polish translations of several international labor conventions. But they gave no further details.

Despite the adjournment, lawyers for the farmers said they were optimistic the court would eventually rule in their favor.

Between 800 and 1,000 farmers were on hand outside the downtown Warsaw court building when the high court began its session.

Many of those in the crowd carried small placards from

the independent trade union, Solidarity, pledging support for the farmers.

The crowd before the court building was smaller than expected. About 10 traffic policemen were on duty in the area, along with several others checking court access permits.

Thousands of farmers from Poland's 49 provinces converged on the capital Monday as 80 leaders of their would-be Independent Trade Union of Farmers met in secret to map strategy in the event their application was rejected.

Sources said that among the options was a farm strike that could lead to withholding of meat, eggs, milk and other food from state-run markets, a move that would further aggravate the nation's food shortage.

The threat of a farm strike comes at a time when meat and other food items are already in short supply, prompting the government to impose meat rationing for the first time since the end of World War II and to announce further rationing beginning in February.

In addition, it would heighten tensions in Poland, beset by labor unrest that spawned Solidarity, the nation's largest independent trade union organization, and a government-union confrontation that has raised fears of possible Soviet military intervention.

The Supreme Court is deliberating the farmers' appeal of a lower court ruling in October that they could not organize their own union because they are self-employed. Earlier this month, government sources

said the court might not be able to approve the union until a law is passed declaring farmers to be workers.

The farm group claims the loyalty of almost a third of Poland's 3.5 million private farmers, and at an earlier organizational meeting asserted that the nation's 1.1 million workers on state-run farms should be allowed to join.

Unlike other nations in the Soviet bloc, Poland is unique in that most of its agriculture is in the hands of private farmers who own 80 percent of the land and produce three-fourths of the nation's food. Most agriculture in other communist countries is collectivized.

Governor Hunt Plans Shakeup

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Gov. Jim Hunt will replace Amos Reed as head of the state correction system in the first major cabinet shakeup of his administration, a Greensboro newspaper reports in today's editions.

The Greensboro Daily News quotes unidentified state officials as saying Hunt definitely has decided against reappointing Reed as state Secretary of Correction. But the newspaper's sources said no successor has been chosen.

Algerian Diplomats Being Sounded Out

WASHINGTON (AP) —

The Carter administration, vowing not to pay a penny before all 52 hostages are freed, sounded out Algerian intermediaries today on "new methods" for reaching an agreement with Iran.

The approach under consideration is to put Iranian assets in an escrow account under the control of a neutral country, a U.S. official said. Iran would receive the deposits simultaneously with its freeing of the hostages.

The Algerian diplomats, who have been shuttling between Washington and Tehran for eight weeks in a so-far unsuccessful effort to break the negotiating impasse, called again at the State Department this morning.

Officials said the fourth day of talks probably would produce a formal U.S. response to Iran's demand for \$24 billion in U.S. government guarantees and that the Algerians would take the message to Tehran. Officials had insisted Monday that this country will not accede to the demand.

There was no indication that an agreement could be concluded in the closing weeks of the Carter administration.

A key stumbling block is Iran's demand for guarantees. One U.S. official, who asked not to be named, said the negotiations were centered on trying "to define the concept of guarantees in a way that would be legally feasible."

Another official, who is close to the talks, confirmed that ways are being explored to set up an escrow account. However, he said, determining how much Iran had in assets was a major problem.

In Iran, Behzad Nabavi, head of Iran's hostage negotiations team, said today that his government is willing to

listen to any U.S. counterproposal which would be acceptable to the Algerian government and meet the four conditions Iran set for release of the hostages.

"As I said before, as far as we have concluded there is no other way for guaranteeing the undertakings of Americans," Nabavi told reporters at a news conference, adding that if no solution were found the hostages would be tried.

Nabavi also said he does not take seriously President-elect Ronald Reagan's description of the hostage-taking as a form of kidnapping.

"I personally consider these threats as bluffs especially on the part of the new U.S. administration which wants to gain prestige by frightening revolutionaries of the world," Nabavi said. "We consider the statements of Mr. Reagan as those of one who still thinks he is playing in a Western film."

Reagan said Monday he had no regrets about his characterization of the Iranian captors a day earlier as "barbarians," a description that was denounced by the speaker of Iran's Parliament, Hashemi Rafsanjani.

"What have they got to be angry about?" Reagan asked

reporters in Los Angeles. "They're the ones who did the kidnapping."

Former Attorney General Ramsey Clark, who defied a presidential ban on travel to Iran when he went to Tehran last June, said today that the president-elect's comments were immature and saber-rattling.

"You rarely make it easier to deal with people when you call them 'criminals' and 'barbarians'. We ought to try to get together," Clark said in an interview on NBC-TV's "Today" show from New York.

"The idea that you can bully the Iranians into submission after all they've endured is psychologically unsound. Their whole being depends historically and psychologically on resistance and defiance, and you simply make it much more difficult when you engage in emotional name-calling," Clark said.

In Washington, State Department spokesman John H. Trotter said Monday that the United States sees no need to offer guarantees beyond President Carter's promise.

"The word of the president of the United States is the highest authority that this country can offer," Trotter said.

But another official, who asked not to be identified, said the Tehran regime could get several billion dollars in assets immediately if the hostages are released.

The official said unfrozen Iranian assets could be put into an escrow account under a neutral country's control. Iran would receive the money simultaneously with the freeing of the hostages, now in their 423rd day of captivity.

Iran is insisting the money be deposited in the Algerian Central Bank as a guarantee that Iranian assets held in western banks before the U.S. Embassy takeover on Nov. 4, 1979, will be returned.

Child Horror Story

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A 7-year-old girl has told authorities her father stabbed her in the head with a table fork and then locked her inside a hot electric oven, according to police.

Detective G.H. Westbrook said the child, Dontressa Taylor, told officers Monday she beat on the oven door with her hands and head in a vain attempt to escape.

Westbrook, who said the child also was hit over the head with a soft drink bottle, reported the girl had stab wounds on her head and cuts and third-degree burns over most of her body. She was in fair condition at Wake Medical Center.

The child's father, Donald Joseph Holmes, 30, was charged with child abuse and held in lieu of \$100,000 bond, the detective said.

Westbrook said the child's mother, Jessie Mae Taylor, told police the girl was beaten during a domestic dispute. The mother identified Holmes as the child's father, Westbrook said.

Westbrook said Ms. Taylor told him that she was beaten soon after the domestic dispute began so she locked herself in a bedroom with a second child.

Ms. Taylor later heard Dontressa screaming and went to investigate at about 5 a.m. Westbrook quoted her as saying Holmes left the apartment after Dontressa was locked in the oven. She said the oven controls were on, Westbrook said.

Westbrook said the police learned of the incident after 11 p.m. when an unidentified motorist flagged down a police cruiser with a report that a child had been burned.

Police then went to the Taylor home, the detective said, where they found the child "had not received any medication except some paper towels the mother had wrapped around her."

Killed 3 In Kabul's Riot

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Soviet troops and Afghan police killed three people when they fired on rioters in Kabul, according to a diplomatic report today, and United News of India said an American "military adviser" to Moslem rebels was shot to death about 200 miles southwest of Kabul.

Reports from diplomatic sources on Monday's rioting in Kabul said a group of rioters rampaged through central Kabul hurling stones and that three of them were killed and 10 to 15 wounded when Soviet troops and Afghan security forces opened fire.

The report by the Indian news agency on a dead American quoted official sources in Kabul as saying a camera and some documents were found on the body and that he was wearing traditional pajama-like Afghan dress.

It said he was killed near Qalat, capital of Zabul Province. No further details were available. It was the first report of an American killed in Afghanistan since Soviet forces intervened a year ago to fight Moslem rebels battling the communist regime.

The United States has never said it has military advisers in Afghanistan. In Washington today, State Department spokesman Joe Reap said the department had heard the report but had no comment.

Last June, the Soviet Union accused the United States of supplying the Afghan rebels with arms. The United States

denied it was aiding the rebels.

Several hundred stone-throwing rioters rampaged through downtown Kabul Monday, and an authoritative source said they were mainly young army conscripts angered by the regime's refusal to discharge them after completion of two years' service.

The informant, who declined to be identified, quoted witnesses as saying that nearly all of the protesting soldiers were arrested during the disturbances although few injuries were reported.

Other reports, cited by western diplomatic sources, indicated that policemen also joined in a window-smashing incident at the Ministry of Information and Culture. One said 40 policemen were involved.

A Soviet bookshop and a half dozen vehicles including two jeeps were damaged, they said.

The protest was the most serious Kabul demonstration in the past six months, observers said. It was put down by Afghan riot police backed by low-flying helicopter gunships, armored vehicles, and Soviet and Afghan troops, the reports said.

The incident followed announcements that draftees would not be automatically discharged, apparently because widespread desertions have created a severe manpower shortage in the military. Although bonuses are paid, the discharge postponement has created a morale problem in the army.

My church is sponsoring a Vietnamese family and I'd very much like to relate to them on a more personal basis and to help them better adapt to this country through use of the English language. I don't know where to turn for help in learning something about helping them learn English, however. J. T.

There may be local sources, but Hotline is familiar with the English language study method of Noel Pace, a language consultant with the Baptist State Convention headquartered in Raleigh. Pace has developed a fast method of teaching English to speakers of Oriental languages based on things he learned in a six-week Army Language School course before he served in Vietnam. He now offers a 30-hour course for speakers of Vietnamese in Raleigh and is preparing a book called "Let's Talk American," outlining the details of his teaching method. He plans for the book to be published in Vietnamese, Laotian, Chinese and Cambodian. Perhaps you and your church could consult him for help.

Million Miles Traveled As Employee Of State

Tomorrow will be Horace Vincent's last day on the job after 42½ years as an employee of the N.C. Department of Transportation's Division of Highways.

For the past eight years, Vincent has been maintenance supervisor for Pitt County. "I've driven well over a million miles on Pitt roads with the State," he said, since joining the highway department in 1938.

Vincent began as a truck driver. Two years later, he became a sub gang foreman — working prisoners who, from 1933 to 1960, provided the labor to maintain the State's roadways — then was promoted to a highway section foreman.

In 1943, Vincent entered the U.S. Army, fought in Europe, then returned to the highway department after his discharge to November 1945, as a gang foreman, then in 1947 became a supervisory foreman. He became an area foreman (now called crew leader) in 1960.

"It was pretty good working prisoners along then," according to Vincent. "They did all the loading, ditching, shoveling. One would escape once in a while," but they were, "good workers... did a lot of good work."

Vincent noted, however, "We found it better to work employees. We can work them day and night if we have to."

Sale Of 1981 Vehicle Licenses Begins Jan. 1

The sale of 1981 vehicle license plates and validation stickers will begin January 1, at Home and Auto Supply Co. here.

License agent Mrs. Anna Garris noted that North Carolina is changing to a new vehicle registration system, which will distribute license plate renewals throughout the year. Under the "staggered"

system, owners of cars, motorcycles, trailers, and trucks will be assigned registration months alphabetically by the first letter of their last names. During the January 1-February 15 renewal period, vehicle owners may be required to renew their licenses for as few as eight months or as many as 19 months, and will pay for the actual number of months

from January to their new renewal dates.

Mrs. Garris noted that the annual license tag cost has not been changed. The charge made during the January 1-February 15 renewal period, she explained, will be pro-rated according to the number of months that the vehicle is registered.

Grasso Steps Down

Ella Grasso, who has governed Connecticut for the past six years, is scheduled to step down from her job today, because of an ongoing battle with cancer. As a state lawmaker, secretary of the state of Connecticut, U.S. representative and governor, Grasso has been an important figure in her state's government for more than 20 years. In 1974, she became the first woman in U.S. history to be elected governor in her own right — not as the wife of a former governor. Grasso's departure means that there will be no women governors in office after next month. The country's only other woman governor, Dixy Lee Ray, lost her job in the 1980 elections.

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Railroads' Tax Levy Challenged

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A challenge by railroads of North Carolina's system for appraising railroad property may result in a sharp reduction in taxes levied by local governments, a state tax official said Monday.

D.R. Holbrook, director of the state's ad valorem tax division, said an appeal of 1980 property valuations by Seaboard Coast Line, Southern Railway Co. and subsidiary rail companies at the least would force a delay of several months in the payment of taxes to the 93 North Carolina counties involved.

Holbrook said the total tax levied on railroads for 1980 was about \$5 million, based on yearly appraisals by the state Department of Revenue.

The state has placed the value of railroad property at \$433 million. The companies, in an appeal to the state Property Tax Commission, contend the property is worth only \$310 million.

Their appeal apparently was triggered by a 1979 federal law that bars state or local governments from placing higher valuations on railroad property than on other property.

Similar legal battles in Alabama and Tennessee have resulted in sharp reductions in taxes levied on railroad property.

In North Carolina, Holbrook said, "The chances are good that in a number of counties there will be some significant reductions."

North Carolina law specifies that property owned by a railroad or other utilities must be appraised annually by the state. Other property is appraised every eight years by the counties involved.

The Property Tax Commission is expected to give its decision this spring, but the decision probably will be appealed to state courts, delaying the railroads' tax payments even longer.

The federal law applies only to railroads, but Holbrook said other utilities probably would push for similar treatment if the railroads succeed in their appeal of the 1980 valuations.

"This could have significant ramifications for the way we tax utilities," Holbrook said.

D.F. Gunnells, staff counsel for the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, agreed with Holbrook.

"We are very concerned about the implications of this," he said. "I think the railroads have a legitimate point, and I think it fits into our whole push for the General Assembly to create a study commission ... to look at the whole issue of property tax."

Negotiations At An Impasse

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Contract negotiations with union dockworkers at North Carolina's two state ports remained at an impasse today amid reports the state may break off the talks all together if it succeeds in removing control of two tiny railroads from the State Ports Authority.

Members of the International Longshoremen's Union, who are seeking a 25 percent increase in their average \$6.50 hourly wage, have threatened to strike at midnight Wednesday unless a new three-year contract is negotiated.

Contract talks have been stalled since November. The ILA has asked the National Mediation Board to intervene in the talks.

But Steve Meehan, a special assistant to Commerce Secretary D.M. Faircloth, said Monday the state may end the talks completely if the Interstate Commerce Commission certifies the newly established North Carolina Ports Railway Commission. He said the certification is expected in the next few days.

The commission would take over responsibility for two small railroads operated on port property in Morehead City and Wilmington.

Meehan said the certification would remove all but about 15 of the more than 200

port workers from coverage of the federal National Railway Labor Act. The remainder would subject to state labor law, which prohibits the state from negotiating with a union.

"If and when the railroad is certified, then it would seem that it would have an influence on whether the state would be in a position to continue negotiations," Meehan said.

The state was forced to negotiate with the ILA in 1976 when a federal judge ruled that because the ports operated two railroads, the state was under the jurisdiction of the railway labor act. The act requires collective bargaining where a union exists.

Spokesmen for the ILA could not be reached Monday for comment on Meehan's statement.

Sterilization Lawsuit Is Finally Filed

Revise Ordinance

The City Council has adopted a revised ordinance governing charitable solicitations in Greenville.

Under the new ordinance, the authority to issue solicitation permits is placed with the chief of police rather than the city manager. The filing period has been reduced from 14 days to five days. A revocation, suspension, and denial section is included in the ordinance in case an organization is found to be in violation of the law.

The ordinance applies to any type of fund raising activities in the city limits by charitable, religious, educational, civic, or public interest organizations.

The new regulations become effective Thursday.

Mexico Ends Fishing Treaties In Tuna War

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico, dissatisfied with progress in fishery talks with the United States, struck back at its "Colossus to the North" by terminating two fishing treaties between the two countries.

Representatives of the U.S. fishing industry said the Mexican action would idle boats and men.

U.S. officials who asked not to be identified said Mexico apparently wants broader access to U.S. waters. A U.S. spokesman expressed surprise at the decision, saying negotiators last met here Dec. 22 and that he had expected the talks to continue.

A Foreign Ministry statement Monday gave few details of the decision, but said "the government of Mexico wants to reiterate to the

United States that it is always disposed to initiate at the most opportune time the establishment of a bilateral fishing relationship that will evenly fit the two nations."

It gave notice that in 12 months Mexico will no longer honor a 1976 treaty that gives the United States a share of snapper and grouper catches in Mexico's gulf waters and allows smaller boats to fish inside Mexico's territorial limits.

It said a 1977 treaty limiting Mexican fishing in U.S. waters will officially end in six months.

August Felando, general manager of the American Tunaboat Association, said in San Diego the Mexican decision means "small bait boats ... are on the death list." He called the Mexican decision "a designed effort to

provoke a confrontation."

Pat Pace of Brownsville, Texas, a seafood businessman, blamed the U.S. tuna industry for the conflict. "They've not lived up to their end of the bargain, and Mexico has decided it's had enough," he said. "The tuna industry is one of the oldest and biggest in the United States, and they think they can do whatever they want."

The United States and Mexico have engaged in a "tuna war" since July, when Washington imposed an embargo on Mexican tuna imports after Mexico seized U.S. tuna boats in Mexican waters.

The issue is likely to be a topic when President-elect Ronald Reagan meets President Jose Lopez-Portillo on Jan. 5.

Two doctors also joined in the suit on behalf of physicians statewide willing to provide medical care if those sterilized can be identified. In some instances, they said, the sterilizations may be reversed.

"What the state did was a tragedy," Judy Goldberg, director of the ACLU's Reproductive Freedom Project, said at a news conference in Richmond.

She said thousands of boys and girls were taken from their homes and sterilized for what was then deemed the "good of society."

Cries of outrage greeted the disclosure early this year that as many as 8,300 Virginians had been involuntarily sterilized in state mental hospitals over a 50-year period ending in 1973.

The ACLU at that time said it would sue the state on behalf of the patients.

In most instances, the victims were not told they

were being sterilized and some other explanation was given for the operation.

There was widespread belief during much of that period that sterilization was one answer to curbing poverty and illegitimacy and stopping hereditary mental illness.

State officials acknowledged the widespread use of sterilization but said it was perfectly legal at the time.

Many of the laws permitting involuntary sterilization remain on the books today and the Virginia General Assembly currently is studying their revision or removal.

The lawsuit seeks a court

judgment that the forced sterilization program violated the victims' constitutional rights and an order forbidding further sterilizations without informed consent.

But ACLU officials said it is mainly seeking an order requiring the state to notify all patients they have been sterilized and to provide medical and psychological assistance at state expense.

Since the sterilization disclosure last year, the state has declined to notify those who had received the operation.

Patrick M. Rahe, an attorney representing the ACLU, said notification is extremely important even though the sterilizations may have occurred decades ago.

"All of these people have the potential for other medical problems as a result of sterilization," he said, noting that some studies have indicated a higher rate of cancer in women who have been sterilized.

Ms. Goldberg said many of the victims may be suffering severe psychological effects because "they are still blaming themselves for not being able to have children and have no idea they were sterilized."

Taking part in the news conference was one of the plaintiffs, a 45-year-old divorcee going by the fictitious name of Judith Doe.

Leaf Output Could Jump

WASHINGTON (AP) — World tobacco production could jump by as much as 5 percent in 1981, the Agriculture Department says.

The department's Foreign Agricultural Service said Monday the forecast includes "gains expected in every major production area except Africa." Officials said African output will be down because of a marketing quota in Zimbabwe, 40 percent below the country's 1980 production of tobacco leaf.

World production of "unmanufactured" tobacco in 1980 was 5.2 million metric tons, down 3.8 percent from 1979.

"Major declines in Asian and South American production of 8 and 14 percent, respectively, offset a 12.4 percent gain in North America," the report said.

The preliminary figures showed U.S. tobacco production this year at 808,647 metric tons, up sharply from 693,500 in 1979. A metric ton is about 2,205 pounds.

That pushed U.S. tobacco output ahead of China for the first time in several years, the report showed. China's tobacco harvest, at 797,000 metric tons, was down sharply from 965,000 metric tons in 1979.

Sought To Play Santa, Wound Up Being Hurt

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP) — Jack King tried to play Santa Claus, but wound up getting hurt and learning a lesson.

"...It causes a little emotional turmoil when you open yourself up like that and get hurt," said King, supervisor for about 20 Texas-based evangelists who rent a house here from the Christian Broadcasting Network.

His reference was to his treatment of and by a young couple and their 4-year-old son who asked CBN, a fast-growing communications network which often helps people down on their luck.

King said the couple identified themselves as Mike and Jenny Hickman and

called their son John. They are in their early 20s and claimed they came here in an old Checker cab from Anderson, Ind. They said they were looking for work.

It was two days before Christmas and they were broke, with no friends and no place to stay. People referred them to CBN, which put them up in a house it owns and rents to the evangelists.

When the family left four days later, a stereo console and a high-priced electric guitar were missing. The house was full of trash — pizza crusts, garbage and litter scattered everywhere.

"He seemed like such a nice guy. It was a lesson for me," said King.

He said his group, known as Agape (a Greek word for love) Force, had plenty of room for the destitute family. When the call came from CBN, they were in the process of moving into another larger house, and the old place was empty for the holidays.

After picking up the young family Tuesday at the CBN's television studios, just around the corner from the house, King took them to lunch before dropping them off.

"After that, we tried having them back over to eat. We cooked food for them, but they didn't want to come and eat. They didn't accept our hospitality," King said.

Police reports said the couple did take a stereo console worth about \$300, which belongs to Agape Force, and a Fender electric guitar and accessories valued at nearly \$400.

"He kept talking about finding a job. He was stone broke and would take anything. We left the phone hooked up over there just so he could call on leads for jobs," King said.

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Second Lava Dome In Volcano's Crater

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Molten rock is pushing up within Mount St. Helens, hardening and forming a second lava dome in the volcano's crater, scientists say.

The rate of earthquakes that accompanied the growth of the second lava dome leveled off to less than one an hour by early today, said Steve Bryant, spokesman for the University of Washington geophysics center in Seattle.

Earthquakes, measuring about 2.0 on the Richter scale, occurred about every 20 minutes over the weekend.

Scientists spotted the growth of the second lava dome Sunday, but bad weather prevented observers from getting another look Monday.

Blocks of very thick molten rock have been forming spectacular "spines" or pillars that rise up to 100 feet above the crater floor before eventually falling and breaking up, said U.S. Geological Survey geologist Robin Holcomb.

"Normally, the material coming up is broken, sloughs off and builds up a mound of rubble," he said. "Occasionally, you'll have blocks of material that maintain themselves."

Despite the activity, Holcomb said there is nothing to indicate the volcano is going to erupt soon.

Mount St. Helens last

erupted in a three-day cycle that started Oct. 16. The main lava dome, about 750 feet in diameter, formed after that eruption.

The new dome, next to the old one, was between 150 and 250 feet in diameter on Sunday, he said.

I have no idea who invented living rooms.

But how come they aren't?

I've polled 135 people of varying ages and not one of them can remember doing anything in a living room but clean it. In most houses a living room has become a temple for dust, a shrine for stolen light bulbs and a lounge for guests connecting with another part of the house.

I didn't realize we had a living room until one day the realtor was going through the house and said, "How big is your living room?"

"Where is it?" I asked.

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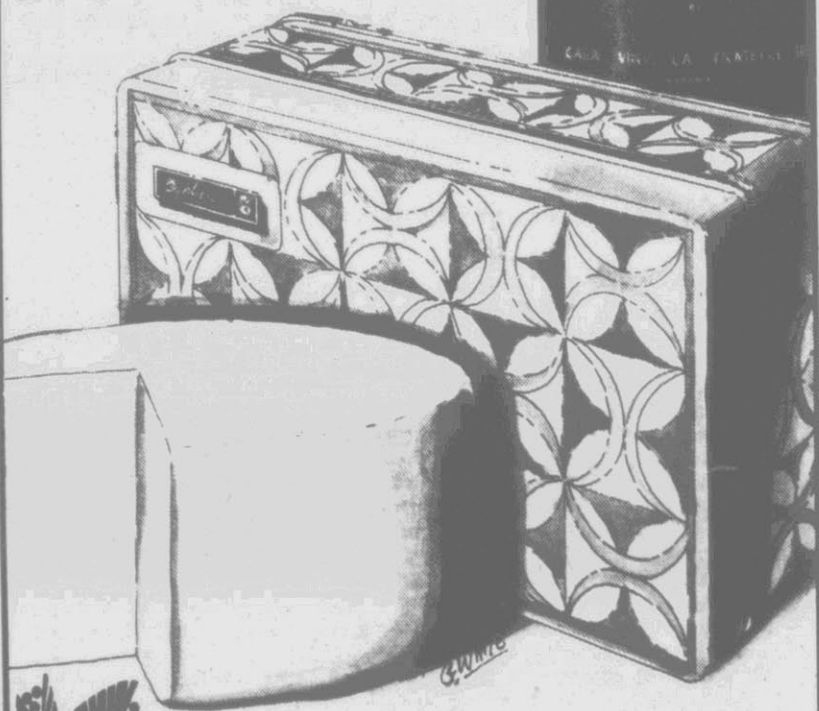

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Doenitz Ended The War

The memory was vague, even for those who recall the end of World War II.

Adm. Karl Doenitz had died at the age of 89.

Who was he? Some recalled that he was the final ruler of Adolf Hitler's Third Reich. He took over the government following Hitler's suicide and in a 23-day reign negotiated the surrender of Nazi Germany which ended the war in Europe.

He had commanded Germany's

submarine fleet which was so awesome that it very nearly tipped the war Hitler's way by devastating Allied merchant fleets. He eventually was sentenced to prison as a war criminal and then spent his final days in obscurity.

Doenitz was a part of the Hitler war machine which brought death and destruction to the entire world. No doubt he was loyal to the fuhrer; yet it fell to him in the end to arrange the unconditional surrender which ended the bloodshed.

Care Called For During Cold

The headline was one of despair: "Yuletide Marred by Dozens of Deaths in Fires."

It should have been printed in red, not that that would help those who have died. Rather it would serve as a warning to all of us to be careful with stoves and furnaces — any flames — during the cold

weather we are facing.

Overheated stoves, chimneys which need cleaning, carelessness in lighting fires can all lead to disasters.

None of us want to be burned out of our homes. Being careful is the way to avoid it.

No Equal Justice

RALEIGH — Numbered among the nearly 16,000 prisoners in North Carolina are some 500 officially classified as mentally retarded.

A study commission of the General Assembly is worried that these individuals are missing out when it comes to equal justice under the law.

Preliminary investigations point toward the conclusion that the mentally retarded are at a distinct disadvantage when dealing with the twists and turns of the law, both in the state's courtrooms, and in the prisons.

T. Clyde Auman, longtime chairman of the Legislative Commission on Children with Special Needs, says this problem is largely due to the lack of understanding of retardation by judges and lawyers, and suggests special training in this area is needed.

Intelligence tests are routinely given to prison inmates, and information based on that procedure shows that approximately 500 prisoners score 70 or below on standard tests for intelligence. That category is generally considered as retarded.

The Result

What does this mean in terms of their ability to cope with the criminal justice system? Dick Urbanik, chief of special programs in the state's prisons, has found that the lack of sophistication and general courtroom knowledge on the part of mentally retarded individuals inevitably leads to longer sentences and less chance for such opportunities as probation, parole, and work release.

It is generally held that equal justice means that individuals know what they did wrong, understand the result of that wrong action, are capable of taking advantage of the various remedies available through the courts, and when talking with law enforcement and court officials are fully aware of what will likely

result from their statements.

Auman points to a national study which demonstrates something entirely different, and believes that the implications apply to North Carolina as well. In 59 percent of all cases studied, the mentally retarded entered guilty pleas; and in 40 percent of those cases where a guilty plea was not entered, the retarded individual waived his right to a jury trial.

In an overwhelming 80

percent of the cases, the arresting charge was the same as the convicting charge, meaning that the retarded lost out when it comes to plea-bargaining or getting reduced charges.

And fully two-thirds of the retarded defendants volunteered confessions or incriminating statements to officials.

Even after conviction, the pattern goes on: no appeal was entered in 88 percent of the cases; and no post-conviction relief such as probation or work release was sought in 84 percent.

Ignorance

In sum, Auman and his commission are convinced that ignorance of retardation among criminal justice officials will likely mean that a mentally retarded person is more likely to be convicted; more likely to serve a longer sentence; and more likely to become a repeat offender.

Two courtroom problems compound this, the commission finds. Being largely poor, the retarded are assigned attorneys, often the younger, less experienced ones; and pre-sentencing investigations which ought to alert the judges to the retardation factor are often too late to help in the process.

Work is currently moving ahead to develop training sessions for judges and lawyers about mental retardation.

Other Editors Say Not All Involved

We seem to be living in an era in which it is common tendency to connect any public official with the Watergate scandal if that official happened to be serving in the administration of Richard Nixon.

To take such an attitude of itself is a shame and a real disgrace. We must not allow ourselves to believe that just because Watergate happened, automatically all people who served in the administration of Mr. Nixon are guilty of wrongdoing or of actual crime. That is far from the case, we feel and believe.

A person in point is General Alexander Haig. Now if the U.S. Senate wishes to bar him from serving this nation as the appointed Secretary of State, let the reasons be other than Watergate. President-elect Ronald Reagan has named General Haig as his Secretary of State. Mr. Reagan knew well that the ugly Nixon brush had already been oiled and loosened ready to paint Mr. Haig as a Watergate traveler.

We cannot believe General Haig had anything at all to do with Watergate, and we feel the time has come when we should stop smearing every Nixon administration worker with the ugliness of this scandal. Many are guilty as cited many times. Far more are innocent except that somehow, we the people, create suspicions.

It could be that matters other than Watergate could figure into the eventual vote in the senate on confirming Haig's appointment. Here is a man who understands political matters and here is one who knows the military side. He has distinguished himself as a soldier, and after the Nixon story he went to Europe as NATO commander. We heard no criticism of his tenure in that sensitive position.

Let the senate look closely at his record. Let that record speak for itself. If he holds positions contrary to the best interests of America, let those positions be stated carefully. But let none of us defame a man on suspicion, rumors, and, because of the fact he happened to be appointed by a president who later was forced to resign under an ugly cloud.

We are of the opinion that General Haig's appointment is a far better one than most people seem to realize and believe. We see the human side just as do a lot of other people. We realize he has human weaknesses but so does every other appointee Mr. Reagan has made...and so does Mr. Reagan.

In full truth, we prefer General Haig over Henry Kissinger who has been mentioned many times for the position. We think General Haig is a far better man than he is being given credit now for being.

WHY GO TO CHURCH?

Many people assert that they do not go to church because they do not find the preacher interesting.

This is a poor excuse. The sermon is only one part of a service of worship, and although it is important, it does not monopolize the importance of the service. The very quiet of the sanctuary has a beneficent effect on our souls. At church we meet fine people — the best in the world. Pres. Reagan And Us

WASHINGTON — In this in-between time in Washington, when there's hardly little hard news to be found, we ink-stained wretches of the press have to make do with soft speculation. One of the main objects of speculation is: What about us? How will Ronald Reagan deal with the press?

The matter is of primary interest to the Washington media, detestable word, but it has a larger interest to the Reagan administration and to the country as a whole. Government is only in part the art of politics. It is chiefly

an exercise in the art of communication. The president who can sell his ideas to other nations, to his own countrymen and to the Congress is likely to succeed. The president who can't, won't.

It is easy enough, in retrospect, to catalog reasons for Mr. Carter's disappointing presidency: He came to town as an outsider, and he remained an outsider to the end. He never developed cohesive support on Capitol Hill. His programs were overly ambitious. He constantly ran into bad luck. He just wasn't "presidential." And so on.

In my catalog, Mr. Carter's inability to communicate effectively with the people and with Congress would rank near the top of the list. There is a touch of irony in this. No president ever strove harder than Jimmy Carter to meet with the press or to get his ideas over. In Jody Powell, the president had a superlative press secretary — probably the best since Steve Early in the days of FDR. The White House press office has functioned just about flawlessly these past four years.

Some of the Carter figures are impressive. By the time he leaves office three weeks hence, Mr. Carter will have held nearly 600 on-the-record sessions with the press. Included in that number are 59 full-blown news conferences, 58 meetings with out-of-town editors, 28 meetings with foreign correspondents, and scores of informal sessions with one or more domestic reporters. In addition, he made himself available for 67 gatherings "for background," and of course he had dozens of radio and TV

addresses to the nation.

In small groups, Mr. Carter could be most effective. His larger efforts rarely succeeded. Part of this was owing — unfairly, but truly — to forensic habits he could not break. He had a way of popping his eyes for emphasis. Like Lyndon Johnson at his worst, Mr. Carter could get soupy; his sentences would trail off; you came to expect a "let us pray" at the end. His style improved over the years, but he still tended to put his prepositional phrases in the middle. In brief, he did not inspire.

Mr. Reagan should do better. He has the physical presence, the actor's sense of pitch, articulation and tim-

Backbone In Final Weeks

WASHINGTON — Jimmy Carter's stiffened spine in his final days in office has produced secret agreement for a strike by stevedores and port workers against Soviet shipping that would immobilize a formidable portion of Moscow's vast merchant fleet, should the Kremlin intervene in Poland.

This countermove has been planned by the Carter administration with the enthusiastic cooperation of AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland and other free-world trade union leaders. Western European states and Japan quietly approved it early this month. It is part of a range of retaliatory measures, including possible sales of "lethal" arms to communist China.

All this is in dramatic contrast to U.S. inactivity during the 1968 Soviet intervention into Czechoslovakia and last year's even more arrogant Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. A major difference is the attitude of President Carter in his lame-duck phase.

The Carter administration informed President-elect Reagan, who liked what he heard. Otherwise, the precise measures planned are a closely-held secret here and in European capitals, often fearful about affronting Moscow. But based on our conversations in West Germany and here, this is the sequence of events:

Carter and national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski agreed that failure of public warnings to Moscow preceding the Czech and Afghan invasions probably misled the Kremlin. On the evening of Dec. 6, following a White House meeting on the massing of Soviet and Warsaw Pact troops, Brzezinski telephoned Carter at Camp David. A Soviet invasion of Poland appeared possible at any hour, he said. Should a warning be sounded?

What followed was a reversal of past performances by the president, showing some overdue American backbone. Carter reacted instantly. Have a statement ready early on the morning of Dec. 7 that

"very adverse consequences" will follow invasion. That statement was issued when Carter returned from Camp David.

The intelligence justification for what Carter then viewed as probable Soviet invasion: 27 Soviet and Warsaw Pact divisions poised on four separate fronts along Poland's borders; between Brest Litovsk and Vladimir Volynskiy to the East; near Kaliningrad on the North, for quick movement to restive Polish shipyards of Gdansk and Gdynia; on Poland's Southern border with Czechoslovakia; in East Germany.

Minute details about this immense invasion force, which is still intact today, are well known in Western capitals. The Russians have accumulated hundreds of medical tents in the Brest Litovsk area for rapid movement into Warsaw. Huge fuel and ammunition depots have been deployed around the entire perimeter of Poland. Soviet airborne units remain on full alert.

In short, Poland was on Dec. 7 and remains today in the cross hair of Soviet sights. So was Czechoslovakia for three full weeks before its 1968 rape and Afghanistan for days before the 1979 invasion. The difference this time is in Washington.

In reaching this time for brass knuckles and not the cream puff of an Olympics boycott, Carter made this decision: Allies of the U.S. would first be invited to participate, but if they held back, they must be strongly challenged to participate.

The response was favorable. West Germany, Washington's most important but increasingly reluctant European ally, was surprisingly obliging, though it flinched at "lethal" weaponry for Peking. However, that idea was fully endorsed by one unnamed NATO ally — probably Great Britain.

At the same time, the West reassured the Kremlin that it intends no change in what one allied official called "the reality of post-World War II international and geographic

What You Don't Know Can Hurt

The rising cost of health care is enough to make you sick. And what you don't know about your medical bills can hurt you.

The federal Office of Consumer Affairs recently prepared a quiz to help people learn more about medical costs and ways to save money. Here are some of the questions; the answers follow:

1. What was the average amount spent, per person, on health care in the United States in 1979?
2. What causes America's most expensive health care problems — viruses and infectious diseases or illnesses related in part to personal health habits?
3. Where does the biggest chunk of the health care dollar go: hospital costs, doctors' services, drugs or nursing home care?
4. True or false: Higher fees are usually an indication of higher quality health care.
5. Which of the following will not help keep your hospi-

tal costs under control: (a) Using outpatient facilities for minor surgery. (b) Having pre-admission tests done on an outpatient basis. (c) Asking your doctor to admit you overnight for routine diagnostic tests or your annual physical. (d) Using the emergency room for routine problems. (e) Asking your doctor when you can go home as soon as you feel ready.

6. Non-emergency problems often can be treated either in a doctor's office or at a hospital emergency room. When it comes to price, which is true: (a) The costs are about the same. (b) The doctor usually charges more. (c) A visit to the doctor is about one-fourth to one-third as expensive as a trip to the emergency room.

7. How much can you save by having minor surgery performed in the doctor's office or in a hospital's outpatient department instead of staying in the hospital overnight — \$10 to \$30 or \$100 to \$300?
8. Which of the following is not a good money-saving idea: (a) Asking whether

generic drugs can be substituted for brand-name items. (b) Calling several drugstores to compare prices. (c) Calling your doctor instead of visiting him or her to get prescriptions refilled or seek treatment of a minor problem. (d) Keeping old prescriptions and using them for everybody in the family whenever they get sick.

9. True or false: It's a good idea to have two family group insurance policies that pay the same health claims.

Here are the answers:
1. The average health bill in 1979 was \$943. More than half the money — \$508 — came from consumers' pockets in the form of direct payments or insurance premiums.

2. The most expensive problems result, in part, at least, from personal habits like smoking, diet, drinking and stress. Cardiovascular, lung and liver diseases are linked to these habits.

3. Hospital costs take the biggest bite — about 40 cents out of every dollar. Doctors' services account for about 19

cents; drugs for 8 cents; nursing home care for 8½ cents; and miscellaneous fees for 24½ cents.

4. False.

5. (c) and (d). Overnight hospital admissions or the use of the emergency for routine tests or examinations add to medical bills unnecessarily.

6. (c). A visit to the doctor's is much cheaper.

7. Depending on the problem and the length of the hospital stay that would be involved, you can save from \$100 to \$300 by having minor surgery done on an outpatient basis or in the doctor's office.

8. (d). Most drugs have a limited shelf-life; they lose their value if they are kept too long. In addition, some family members could be allergic to specific drugs which have not been prescribed for them.

9. False. Most health care payment companies coordinate their group benefits to avoid expensive duplicate coverage which could increase your rates.

Other Carter demands on U.S. allies for Western retaliation have been previously revealed: a total break of commercial, trade and technological links to the Soviet empire; an immediate increase in arms spending; comprehensive sanctions to the extent possible.
All these plans remain in place, as does the Soviet threat. Nobody knows whether this will deter Soviet intervention of some kind, if not open invasion. But Jimmy Carter deserves the highest marks for the weekend of Dec. 6-7. His public warning to the Kremlin may have stayed the Soviet hand, giving him the spurs as a lame duck he did not earn in nearly four years.

But most of a president's communications are filtered through the permeable membranes of the Washington press. Our name is legion, for we are many. Some 1,700 correspondents are accredited to the White House. More than 2,000 reporters are members of the various galleries on Capitol Hill. Other hundreds of journalists and publicists swarm about the city. He will be speaking to us and through us.
My hope is that Mr. Reagan will follow Mr. Carter's high example. There ought to be a half-hour full-blown news conference every two weeks. By adhering to a regular schedule, much of the desperate and unseemly jumping up and down of correspondents might be discouraged. Once a week the president might be urged to meet with regional editors, trade association editors, or members of the foreign press. Occasional one-on-one interviews with network correspondents and print correspondents would add a useful dimension.
Ideally, it seems to me, we would seek some Americanized version of the parliamentary question period, when members of the Reagan Cabinet would make themselves available in the well of the House or Senate in a free-for-all exchange.
All this is "communication." We of the press expect to be used. That is one of our functions. We are a president's vehicles, his avenues, his conduits to the people. We are also his critics. At a

\$600,000 Gift Worth A Degree

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Actor Burt Reynolds, who earlier this year gave \$600,000 to Florida State University to endow a theater arts professorship, will receive an honorary degree from his alma mater next month.
University officials said Monday that FSU President Bernard Sliger will present the degree Jan. 14.
Reynolds' two-year FSU career was spent as a halfback on the 1953-54 Seminole football team, not on the school stage. He entered acting after a knee injury cut short his football career.
He gave the university \$600,000 to endow the Burt Reynolds Chair in Professional and Regional Theater. The state augmented the gift with a \$400,000 grant for a total \$1 million endowment.
The university announced the decision to award Reynolds the special degree in a news release but did not state what degree it would be. University officials could not be reached for comment.

Mao's Widow Asks For Witnesses, No Result

PEKING (AP) — Mao Tse-tung's widow asked for various witnesses to appear at her trial on persecution charges, but the court ruled they had no relation to the case, China's official Xinhua news agency reported today.
Xinhua did not identify the witnesses nor specify evidence which it said Mao's widow, Jiang Qing, also wanted presented.

The special court cut short her final arguments Monday and ordered her thrown out of court after she shouted, "I am prepared to die" and "it is right to rebel," and kept attacking the court, Chinese sources reported.

There still was no word on when sentence would be passed on Jiang Qing and nine other leaders of the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution, a decade of purges, factional fighting and radical leftist policies.

All face a possible death sentence, and in Jiang Qing's case the prosecution urged death. But it appeared that many Chinese were not aware of that. In film seen on television and in official ac-

counts, the prosecution urged "severe punishment" according to Article 103 of the criminal code.

Article 103 provides for the death penalty in case of severe harm for an offense, but many Chinese don't know that.

Seen on television, Jiang Qing gave one hint of what kind of evidence she wanted presented.

She disputed the prosecutor's argument that she claimed to represent Mao, the party chairman who died in 1976 and still is respected as the nation's founder even though his ideology-first policies have been discarded.

It was not only Mao, she said, but the whole central committee headed by Mao. She said she had letters in her safe referring to central committee decisions that she wanted to show.

The prosecution listed some of the persecution charges against her and challenged her to state that Mao had told her to torment people ranging from President Liu Shaoqi down to a sanitation worker who had been named a national model worker. She is accused of

having both persecuted to death.

She argued that she never had heard of some of the crimes attributed to her, and that she didn't recognize the model worker.

Xinhua said she also accused the court of "nitpicking" and "using this small matter and that small matter to defame me," pictured herself as a defender of the Cultural Revolution, and complained that some exonerations in the last four years, since her arrest, amounted to reversing rightful verdicts.

In the strongest public statement yet on Mao, the prosecution said he was responsible for the plight of the Chinese people in the

Cultural Revolution, but that his great contributions to China still outweigh his mistakes. It said Jiang Qing couldn't use his high prestige to cover up her "counter-revolutionary crimes."

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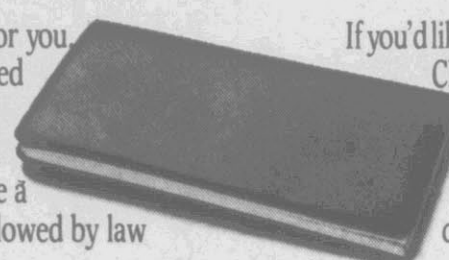

Plant OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency has granted the Coors beer company permission to build a giant brewery a mile from Virginia's Shenandoah National Park, the Washington Post reported in its Tuesday editions.

Coors' selection of land near Harrisonburg, Va., as the site for its first East Coast brewery has raised local concern about potential air pollution and other environmental issues.

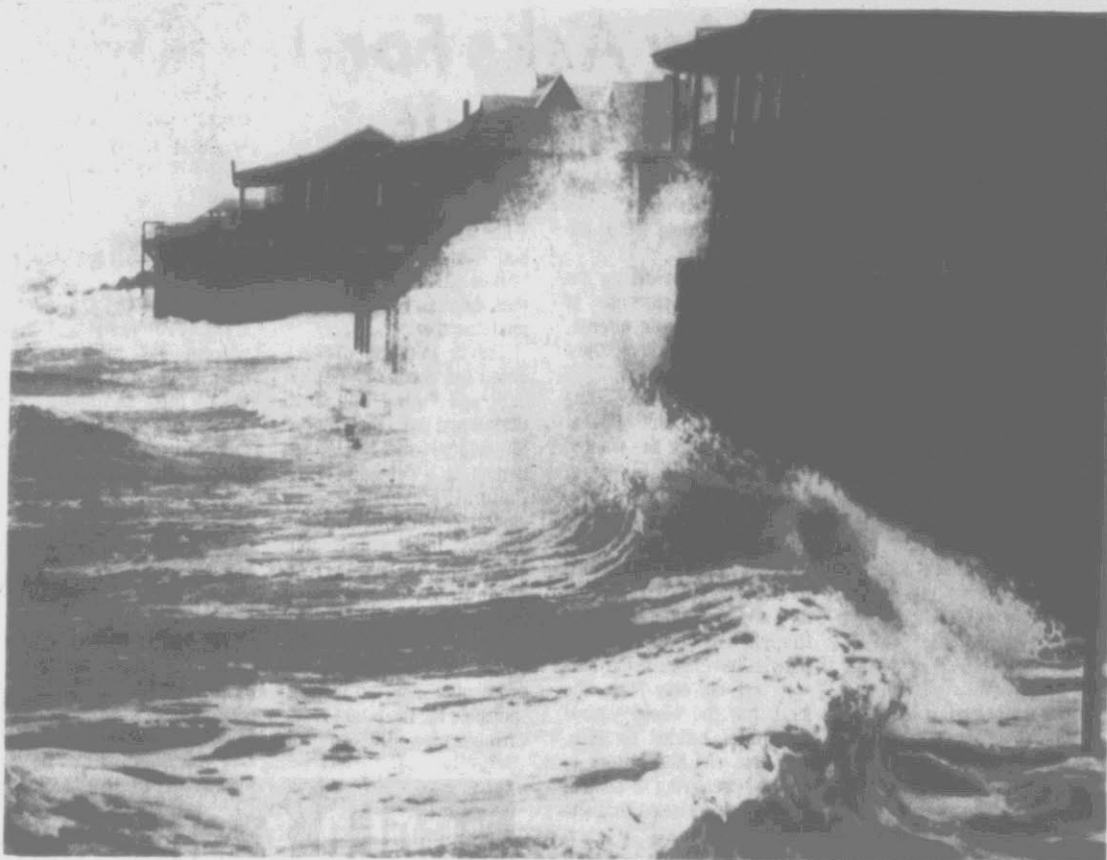
However, EPA officials have contended there is very little likelihood that the facility will prove environmentally objectionable. One official called the brewery "one of the cleanest plants in the country," the Post said.

The \$200 million plant will employ 2,000 persons and may create 2,000 additional jobs from supporting industries.

Verdict Overturned On Reichstag Fire Of 1933

BONN, West Germany (AP) — A West Berlin court has overturned a 47-year-old verdict against a Dutchman convicted of setting the Reichstag fire, an event used by the Nazis to consolidate their power in 1933.

The court ruled that the verdict against Marinus van der Lubbe, a communist accused of setting the fire, was a "clear miscarriage of justice," but left open the question of whether van der Lubbe actually did start the blaze.

The decision was issued

Dec. 15, but was not disclosed until Monday. Robert Kempner, a deputy prosecutor in the Nuremberg war crimes trials, argued the case brought by van der Lubbe's brother to have the verdict nullified.

The Reichstag building in Berlin, seat of the German parliament, was burned on Feb. 27, 1933, about four weeks after Adolf Hitler became chancellor.

After van der Lubbe and four Bulgarian communists were arrested for arson, the Fuehrer used the blaze as a

pretext to ban the Communist Party.

The Bulgarians were acquitted by a Nazi court. But Van der Lubbe was sentenced to death and executed in 1934 as the Nazis rounded up communists and moved to crush free trade unions and the remaining leftist opposition.

Some historians believe the Nazis set the fire themselves as an excuse to crack down on opposition parties. They note that a tunnel ran to the building from the residence of Hermann Goering, Hitler

deputy and Reichsmarshal.

The cause of the fire has never been established with certainty.

Kempner cited these arguments to the court and said van der Lubbe was actually a "weak-willed tool" of the National Socialists. The Nazis used the "strong psychological effects" of the verdict and execution to their advantage, he said on Radio Free Berlin.

Kempner, 81, who took part in the postwar interrogation of Goering, said he regarded the verdict as a final victory for justice.

Van der Lubbe's brother, J.M. Van der Lubbe of Amsterdam, had tried since 1955 to have the verdict erased, but succeeded only in having the sentence "re-

Report First Accident For A Plutonium Cargo

DENVER (AP) — A load of plutonium used in the manufacture of triggers for nuclear weapons survived intact when a "Super Safe Transport" truck overturned in the first serious accident involving one of the special tractor trailers, officials say. "She performed as she was supposed to," Department of Energy spokesman Tom Miskowicz said of the truck, "and we were very, very happy that she did so."

The accident occurred Dec. 19 on ice-coated Interstate 25 about 10 miles north of Fort Collins. The truck lay on its side beside the highway for nearly 18 hours before an Air Force crane righted it and towed it to Cheyenne.

The shipment was part of the department's nationwide program for moving atomic weapons and atomic weapons parts, but contained no explosives and no completed weapons, officials said.

Miskowicz said Super Safe Transports are built to survive accidents without disturbing their cargo. They have reinforced floors, walls and ceilings and are

equipped with a "deterrent system" — gadgets designed to repel attempts to commandeer the truck, he said.

The Dec. 19 accident marked the first time one of the 40-foot trucks had overturned, although the trucks have jackknifed before, said Miskowicz, deputy director of the DOE's Transportation Safeguards Division in Albuquerque, N.M.

Miskowicz said Monday the cargo was in "fine shape" when it was examined at Warren Air Force Base in Cheyenne, Wyo. The truck, still in Cheyenne, will depart soon for Los Alamos, N.M., its original destination, he said. The shipment originated from the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington state.

Burke said the crews of the truck that overturned outside Fort Collins followed the department's accident notification procedure to the letter. The crew members contacted the Colorado State Patrol one minute after the accident occurred. Later, he said, Department of Energy officials at the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant northwest of Denver contacted the governor's office and the state Department of Health as a courtesy.

Gov. Richard Lamm's of-

fice did not learn of the accident until notified by the Department of Energy, a spokeswoman said. Lamm's office issued a sharply worded statement the day after the accident criticizing the agency, but later withdrew the statement when it learned that it was the Colorado State Patrol's job to notify state officials about the accident.

Burke said there are instances when the department would contact state officials about an accident immediately. He said his office also would notify the news media if the public's safety were endangered.

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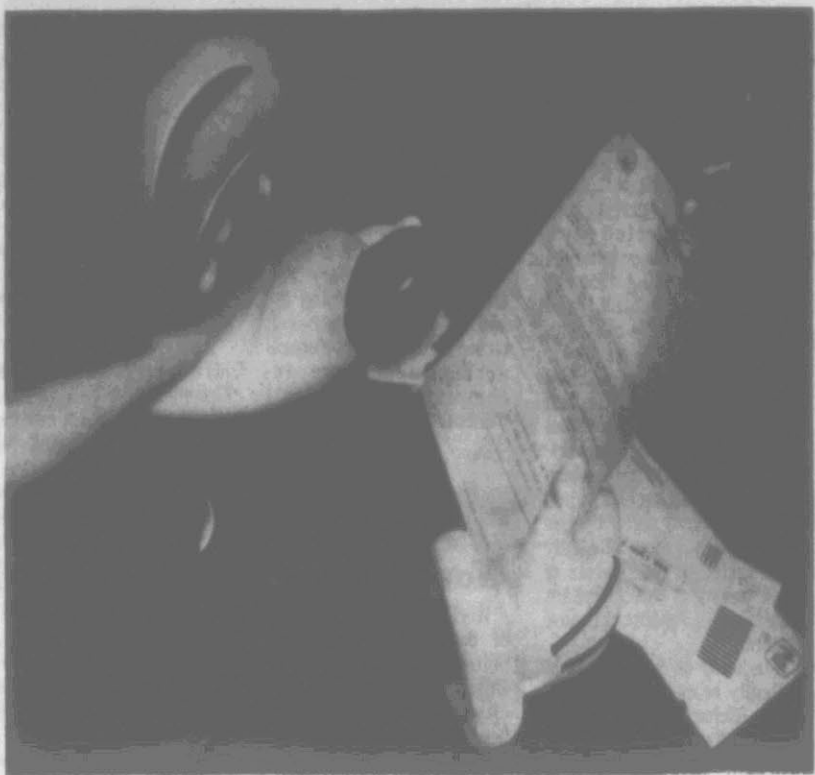

Scientist Sees Spleen Link To Cancer Of Eye

DALLAS (AP) — An unusual link between the eye and the spleen has given researchers new perspective into the body's defense against cancer and could alter methods of combating the disease.

Dr. Jerry Niederhorn, a University of Texas Health Science Center immunologist, said two recent studies indicated removing a cancerous eye could foster the disease's spread throughout the body while removing the spleen could kill the disease entirely.

"It's too early to say, 'Let's change our treatments,' but it's an important step in research," said Niederhorn.

Eye cancer, which claims about 500 victims a year in the United States, generally begins with development of a small black tumor on the surface of the eyeball. When the tumor enlarges it can push the eye out of the socket.

"It's not a very attractive sight and can cause some serious problems if not detected early," said Niederhorn.

Niederhorn is working with scientists from Harvard and the University of Illinois in studying the development and treatment of eye cancer in laboratory animals.

"The eye is a great organ to study. You can watch exactly what's happening," he said. "And what's happening is very exciting."

Researchers injected laboratory animals with a virus that causes eye cancer, removed the stricken eye from half the animals and gave no treatment to the other half.

Niederhorn said 93 percent of the animals that had the surgery developed cancer elsewhere in their bodies, while only 33 percent of those that escaped the scalpel contracted cancer in other parts of the body.

He said in almost all cases here the spleen was removed from the animals, the disease did not spread.

Niederhorn thinks the reason for that is the unique link between the spleen and the eye.

"There is a direct pipeline from the spleen to the eye," he said.

The theory is that the eye,

unlike the rest of the body, adapts to foreign matter — even cancer — instead of rejecting it.

For example, Niederhorn said, a skin graft first put on the eye, then transplanted to any other part of the body, will not be rejected by the body's immune system because the spleen somehow "recognizes" it as part of the body after its acceptance by the eye.

But once the spleen is removed, he believes, the immune system "recognizes" the eye cancer as foreign matter and works to block its spread.

"It makes sense immunologically, but it's still exciting to see it work on the animals," Niederhorn said.

SIGNS NEW LAW

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new law, signed by President Carter Monday, requiring all state courts to abide by child custody decrees issued by other states is designed to deter parents of broken homes from kidnapping their children to thwart custody orders.

Drug Paraphernalia Ban Ready

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — State law enforcement officers and legislators hope to put a stopper on sales of drug paraphernalia by proposing a tough law that would prohibit the sale of such items in stores.

The bill was drafted and adopted as part of the 1981 Legislative Program of the Governor's Crime Com-

mission.

State Sen. Joe B. Raynor, a Fayetteville Democrat and chairman of the Senate Law Enforcement and Crime Control Committee, said he will push — and expects the Legislature to enact — legislation regulating paraphernalia sales in the coming session. He has asked the state attorney general's office to review current laws on the subject.

Robert A. Melott, assistant secretary of crime control and public safety, said several cities and counties already have laws prohibiting the sale of items that can be used for taking drugs. He said a statewide law is needed to provide a uniform standard.

Fayetteville and Cumberland County have both had laws prohibiting the sale of paraphernalia for five months, but no arrests have been made. Havelock has made one arrest under its new paraphernalia law.

About 20 businesses opposed to the legislation have formed their own lobbying group, called the Carolina Accessory Trade Association. They said the proposed law is unconstitutional because it places the burden on salesmen to determine what the customer intends to do with the product.

Melott said the proposed bill is modeled on laws drafted by the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, and intent is a major portion of that legislation.

It outlaws the possession with intent to sell any product that can be used for drugs, such as kits for growing plants that are controlled substances, testing equipment, hypodermic syringes, and cocaine spoons.

Also included are routine items such as scales, bowls, and blenders.

The key to the law is intent, said Melott. "Obviously some of these things can be used for things other than drug use."

"How can you convince me that the hammer, chisel and saw that I have in my tool

shed aren't burglary tools? My fallback point is, That's why we have juries," he said.

Melott said a number of laws regarding the sale of paraphernalia have been found unconstitutional.

"That's because they held that mere possession was unlawful. The DEA learned its lesson from that. Ordinances now being adopted have intent portions," he said.

Vic Larsen, a member of the board of the Carolina Accessory Trade Association, is opposed to the legisla-

tion proposed by the Governor's Crime Commission. Larsen is a co-owner of stores in Raleigh and Durham, called The Joint Head Shops.

"We feel the bill they are proposing modeled on the Drug Enforcement Administration is unconstitutional, because it puts the person selling accessories in a position of determining the intent of use," Larsen said.

Larsen said the state would be better off passing a stringent law prohibiting the sale of all harmful products to anyone under 18, and

establishing a drug education program in the schools.

"They say if they do away with us, they'll do away with the problem," he said. "They had Prohibition in the '20s, but people still drank."

"I acknowledge there is a drug problem. I don't think our stores are contributing to it," he added.

Larsen said determining what a person intends to do with a product also shouldn't be left up to police.

"They're there to enforce the law, not to determine what that law means," he said.

Lost From A Lifeboat

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP) — Seven crewmen of a foundering fishing boat who watched helplessly as an eighth disappeared when their lifeboat capsized Monday are safe in Portsmouth today.

Two Coast Guard helicopters searched more than five hours off False Cape before calling off the hunt for the missing seaman, now presumed drowned.

The seven survivors of the 55-foot Colombian vessel Don Franc were rescued by the Italian motor vessel Centauro after the Don Franc lost its engines, then its deckhouse, and began drifting in 15-foot seas about 60 miles southeast of Cape Henry.

The Coast Guard did not release the name of the missing sailor, pending notification of his relatives.

Lt. John Krupa of the Coast Guard's rescue and coordination center in Portsmouth, said the 50-year-old victim fell into the 39-degree waters after a 17-foot skiff containing the eight crewmen capsized in rough seas. The men were using the small boat to escape to the Centauro.

The Coast Guard cutter Cherokee was dispatched from Portsmouth to conduct a routine search of the Don Franc.

The cutter Point Arena picked up the seven seamen, bought them to Portsmouth Monday night. All seven speak Spanish, but their nationalities were not known.

A Coast Guard spokesman said the Immigration and Naturalization Service would take charge of the crewmen pending an investigation.

Volume on the Big Board totaled 17.01 million shares at noontime, against 16.89 million at the same point Monday.

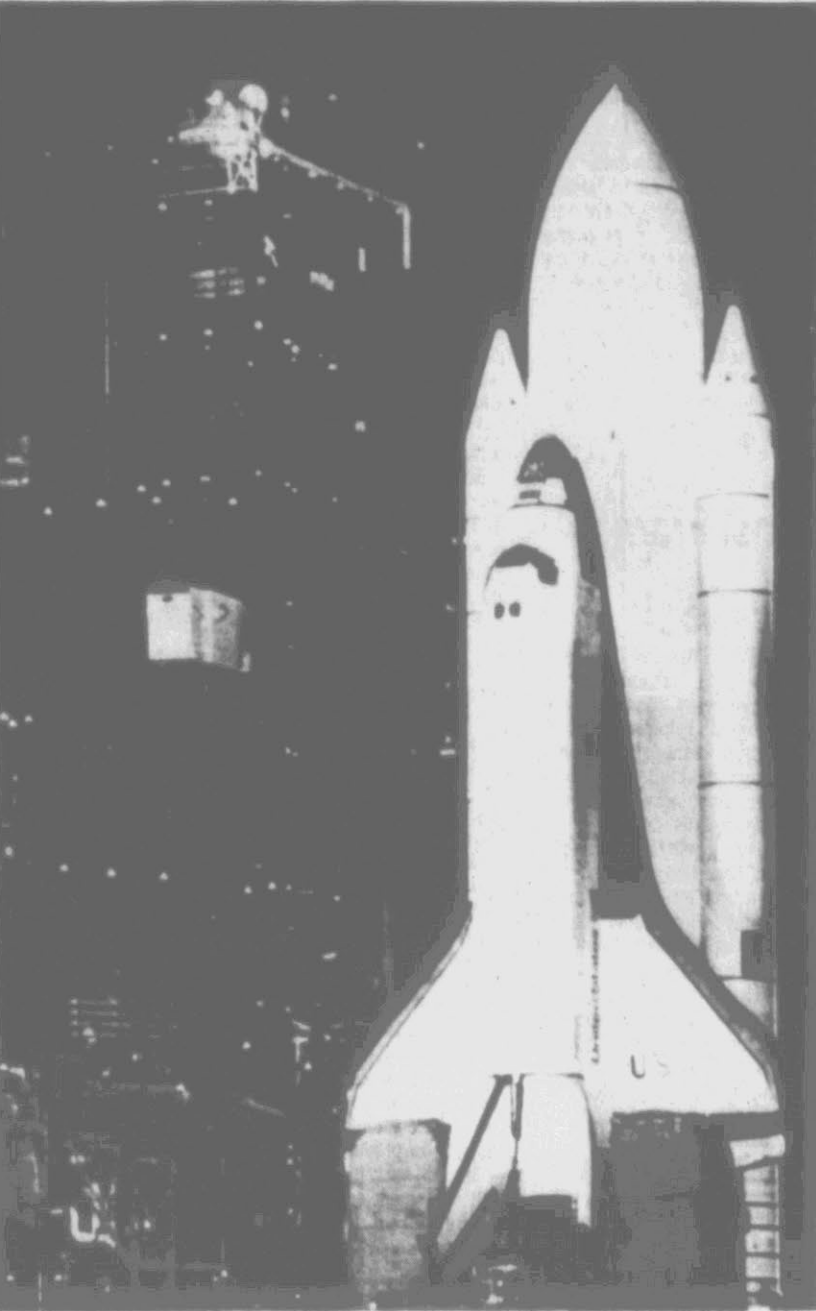

Mrs. Garriss noted that motor vehicle owners should check their renewal cards for the fees they will pay, the license plate expiration dates, and the license renewal dates.

She emphasized that the varying fees and expiration dates make it more important than ever that vehicle owners bring or send in both sections of their license renewal cards when they purchase their plates or stickers.

Mrs. Garriss explained that license plates issued under the staggered system (except truck plates) will display two validation stickers — one for the year validation and the other the permanent renewal sticker. Farm trucks, she noted, will have both the month and year on the same sticker.

According to Mrs. Garriss, vehicle owners who registered their vehicles under the staggered system from July 1 to December 31, 1980, will receive their renewal cards in mid-May 1981, for renewal of their licenses in June.

As in the past, new stickers or plates must be displayed by midnight February 15.

Both North Carolina state vehicle registrations and City of Greenville registrations can be obtained from the license agency at Home and Auto Supply Co. of Dickinson Ave. City vehicle registrations will also be available at the Greenville City Hall.

The 1981 city renewal stickers will be \$.55. If a replacement city plate is needed, an additional charge of \$.25 will be made.

Mrs. Garriss noted that in addition to full-time residents, out-of-town students attending local schools, drivers of leased motor vehicles and company autos are subject to city motor vehicle regulations.

Any motor vehicle which is kept and operated in the city for more than 14 days per month must display a city license tag.

Mrs. Garriss noted that state renewal cards necessary for obtaining stickers of plates should be received by January 8. Owners, she added, should sign the insurance certification on the back of the cards and bring or send both sections of the card when they purchase tags or stickers.

Indict 2 On Bogus Bills

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — A federal grand jury Monday indicted two Greensboro men on charges of counterfeiting \$50,000 worth of \$20 bills, and charged one of the men with passing some of the money.

The pair also was accused of getting halfway through the job of printing more than \$1 million worth of fake bills. The got tripped up, according to the indictments, when the bills were noticed when one of the men allegedly attempted to spend some of the money at three Durham fast-food restaurants last month.

Indicted on four counts of illegally reproducing \$20 bills was Richard Dean Connor, a printing company employee. Indicted on the same four counts plus three counts of passing phone bills, was John Christian Ried Stewart, an insurance agent.

According to court documents, law enforcement officers recently confiscated several items from Connor's home, including a small printing press.

Allen Gimble, an assistant manager at a Durham McDonald's restaurant, said he detected one of the bogus bills while counting cash on Nov. 19.

"A normal person looking at it would say it looks just like a regular bill," he said.

East Carolina Teams Bow In Tournaments

Virginia Nips Women, 58-52

FLUSHING, N.Y. — Virginia outscored East Carolina, 7-1, over the final two and a half minutes Monday night to claim the Queens Holiday Tournament title, 58-52.

Tournament MVP Valerie Ackerman hit a short jumper with 2:30 left to give Virginia a 53-51 lead that the Lady Cavaliers never lost.

During the game the lead changed hands over a dozen times with no team holding more than a five-point advantage. In the closing minutes, East Carolina could get only a free throw from Lydia Rountree with a minute left.

Linda Mitchell hit a free throw and a field goal and pushed the Virginia lead to 56-51 before Rountree's free throw, but Cavalier guard Melissa Mahoney iced the win with two free throws with eight seconds showing after Virginia stalled the ball for nearly 30 seconds.

East Carolina All-America candidate Kathy Riley fouled out of the game with 5:31 remaining as Virginia took a four-point lead, 48-44. Riley scored 17 of her team high 19 points in the first half to keep the cold-shooting Pirates in the contest. Once again the Pirates were cold at the end too, going scoreless for the final 2:45 of the first half.

"It was a very physical and extremely exhausting game on everyone's part," East Carolina coach Cathy Andruzzi said. "It was a well-played game and both teams played good team ball."

"Virginia is a good team and we have a lot of respect for them. It was a very close game in nearly every category."

The stats bear that out. East Carolina shot only 35 per cent from the floor, but Virginia made just 36 per cent. At the line, the Pirates hit 73 and Virginia, 76 per cent. In rebounding, each team had 29. East Carolina had 22 turnovers and the Cavs had 20. East Carolina had ten steals and Virginia had eight. In fouls, ECU committed 19 and Virginia, 17.

"In the second half, Virginia's field goal percent-

age went down. That's when they went to their people in the middle and that's where they won the game," Andruzzi said.

Virginia coach Debbie Ryan explained Riley's two-point second half with two words: "Jill McKone."

"I put Jill on Riley and gave her some help after the first half. We started with Mitchell on Riley, but she just wasn't quick enough to control her," Ryan continued.

It was the play of Ackerman and Mitchell in the second half which spelled the difference. Both had 15 points for the game, and Mitchell's short range jumpers were crucial in the stretch for the Cavaliers, now 10-1.

It was Mitchell who drew the fifth foul on Riley on a short jumper.

East Carolina landed one player on the all-tournament team, selected by the coaches and media, Riley. The others were Ann Bair of Virginia, Amy Prichard of Northwestern, Donna Ward of Massachusetts, along with MVP Ackerman.

In the consolation game, Queens defeated Northwestern, 68-64 after watching a 21-point lead shrink to four in the final ten minutes.

The Pirates, now 7-2, return to action with a trip to Florida where they will play three games, starting on January 5 at the University of Florida.

Second Brown Meeting Crucial For The Pirates

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — East Carolina coach Dave Odom calls tonight's game with Brown a game the Pirates need badly.

In fact, a win against Brown may be crucial for the Pirates. Only last week at the Iron Duke the Pirates gave Brown its first — and only — victory of the season.

Normally on game day teams have only a light practice, mostly shooting and getting loose. However, because Odom does not want a repeat of last week's loss to Brown, the Pirates went all out this morning.

"Brown did not play well (Monday night)," said Odom of Brown 67-57 loss to Fairfield in the first round of the Elm City Classic. "But we know they can play, and play well."

"We can't go into the game thinking anything's going to be easy," he added. "We're disappointed about this loss (to Iowa State, 80-73), but we need a win badly. We need to win (tonight) so we can go home with a win."

Going into the game, the Pirates are 3-5 and in the midst of a four-game losing streak. Brown is 1-7.

Brown is led by Ira James, who is averaging nearly 19 points a game (he had 20 against Fairfield). Jeff Samson

is averaging just over 11 points a game for the Providence, R.I., school.

As a team, Brown shot 41% from the floor against Fairfield. For the season the Bruins are hitting just under 46%.

ECU was led by Barry Wright's 11 points Monday night while Michael Gibson and Tom Szymanski had 10 each.

The Pirates shot 38% from the floor in the first half against Iowa State but hit nearly 57% in the second to end with a 47% mark.

Wright and Mark McLaurin, who had eight points against ISU, are the Pirate leaders in scoring, both averaging around 11 points a game.

•The Elm City Classic got off to a not-so-classic start when water pipes broke in the New Haven Coliseum, where the tournament was to be played, shorting out the electrical system. After a search for a new gym, officials were forced to move play to Fairfield Gym, a 30-minute drive from New Haven.

•A classic it's called? But is it? Going into the tournament, Brown was 1-6, ECU 3-4 and Iowa State 3-4. Fairfield had the best record of the four at 4-3.

•Tom Szymanski did not start Monday night. Instead, Odom went with junior David

Underwood, making the Pirates smaller but quicker.

"We thought David deserved a chance to start. In all honesty, he hadn't been playing that well off the bench," Odom said. "It's not that we have any dissatisfaction with the way Tom's been playing. After losing three in a row, we just wanted a changeup."

How did Underwood do? He was scored six points and pulled down three rebounds while playing 15 minutes. Szymanski, who also played 15 minutes, scored 10 points and grabbed five rebounds.

Junior Michael Gibson had a horrible night from the floor, hitting just four of 12 shots. But the Richmond native did lead the Pirates off the boards with nine rebounds.

Morris Hargrove, who had 20 against Brown had an equally woeful night from the field hitting 1-7.

•One of the bright spots was the play of newly acquired Charles Watkins who joined the club this week. He was 4 of 8 from the field and scored nine points while playing 21 minutes.

"Watkins played well despite having only three days of practice with us," Odom said. "It's gonna take him a while to get used to the system. We're having to use games as practice sessions for him."

Iowa State Free Throws Too Much For Pirates

FAIRFIELD, Conn. — Iowa State guard Lefty Moore's thoughts were back home, but his free throw touch never left him Monday night.

Moore scored 18 points, including 10-of-10 from the free throw line, eight of which came in the final 2½ minutes, to lead the Cyclones to a 80-73 victory over East Carolina in the first round of the Elm City Classic.

The loss puts the Pirates, who were led by Barry Wright's 11 points and 10 each by Tom Szymanski and Michael Gibson, into tonight's consolation game against Brown, a 67-57 loser to Fairfield. Iowa State will face Fairfield in the championship game.

But had it not been for Moore, and Ron Harris' 19 points, Iowa State might not have made it into the finals. Moore's performance was made all the more amazing by the fact his mother died of a heart attack earlier in the day. Moore, however, decided to play and his free throws in the last minute were the difference in the game.

"When we left home she was fine, but earlier today she was taken to the hospital and died of a heart attack," Iowa State coach Johnny Orr said. "This makes coaching enjoyable, to have a kid down like that but plays like he did."

Orr, who was twice named coach-of-the-year while at Michigan before taking over the Cyclones this season, must have also found it enjoyable to watch his club sink 24-of-29 free throws.

It was anything but enjoyable for ECU coach Dave Odom, who also had to watch his team hit only 13-of-23 from the line en route to its fourth loss in a row.

"Deju vu," said Odom of his club's performance on the free

throw line. Last year ECU hit 61% from the stripe but the Pirates had been hitting nearly 70% this season going into Monday's game. "It always seems that our worst free throw shooters get on the line for us. Always."

The same could not be said for Iowa State. "Probably the key to the game without question was their offensive rebounding and their foul shots," Odom said. "The number of free throws they had and the excellent percentage they shot had a lot to do with the outcome."

ECU, which led in the early going before trailing at the half by nine, 40-31, fell behind by as many as 13 in the second half only to rally late in the game.

Trailing 68-57 with four minutes left, ECU scored five straight points — on two free throws by Tom Szymanski and a short jumper and free throw by Michael Gibson, who hit only four of 12 from the field.

The Pirates had a chance to cut it to four moments later but Gilchrist's pass was lost out of bounds by Gibson.

It was then that Moore went to work. The 5-10 junior, who had been hitting 95% of his free throws coming into the game, nailed six straight to put the Cyclones up, 74-66, and all but seal the victory of ISU, now 4-4.

"I'm particularly disappointed for the kids because they put so much into the game," Odom said. "They wanted this game badly and they played hard. They really fought hard and I hate to admit it but part of it (the loss) was because of our youth."

"Everybody's talking about Iowa State's inexperience, but they have eight letterman returning. We've got three. At times tonight we had three or four freshmen on the court at the same time and we didn't play smart some of the time

because of that."

In the early going, however, it was Iowa State that looked inexperienced. Seemingly confused by an active and tight 2-3 zone, the Cyclones failed to score until, with 15:55 left, Moore's jumper was tapped in by ECU's David Underwood, who had been after the rebound. At that point, ECU led, 7-2.

The Cyclones, riding an eight-point outburst, grabbed the lead moments later and maintained it until ECU tied it up at 21-21 on a Mike Fox jumper. Fox was fouled on the play but failed to convert the free throw.

From there, ISU outscored ECU, 17-9, to take a 40-31 lead into the dressing room. ISU's final two points came on a jumper out of the left corner by John Ness as the buzzer sounded.

"That hurt us," Odom said. "We should have never let that happen."

The Cyclones wasted little time scoring in the second half, taking a 46-33 lead with just over three minutes gone on a driving layup by Moore.

ECU, sparked by Szymanski's two follow shots, cut it to seven, 47-42.

ISU then outscored ECU 10-2 to regain its 13-point advantage at 57-44. It stayed that way until the Pirates mounted their last run of the night in the final four minutes of the game, a run that was ended by Moore's dead-eye performance at the free throw line.

"We've just got to forget this game. We didn't accomplish what we came up here to do (win the tournament) but there's nothing we can do to erase this now."

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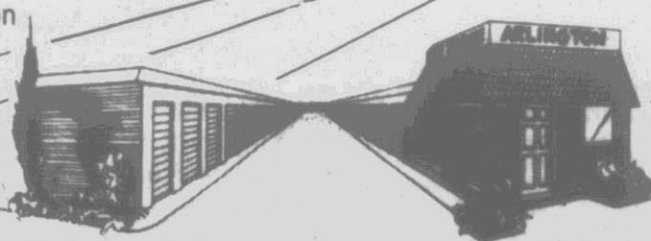

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Pittsburgh's Looking For Some Help

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Third-ranked Pittsburgh will need a lot of help to win the national championship, but quarterback Rick Trocano says the Panthers can rest easy knowing that they've done everything in their power to lay claim to No. 1.

"We don't control our own destiny, so we just have to sit back and hope for the best," Trocano said Monday night after Pitt destroyed 18th-ranked South Carolina 37-9 in the 36th annual Gator Bowl. "We came out and did what we had to do and that was win decisively. Now, if we don't make it to No. 1, we know it's not because we didn't do everything we could to make it happen."

The Gator Bowl victory before a record crowd of 72,287, boosted the Panthers' record to 11-1 and spoiled Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers' collegiate finale for the 8-4 Gamecocks.

It was the Panthers' seventh victory in a row since the team dropped a 36-22 decision to No. 2 Florida State. But it still doesn't put them in the driver's seat for the national crown, which many of the experts predicted Pitt would win in preseason polls.

Top-ranked Georgia must fall to Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl on Thursday and Florida State would have to stumble against 4th-ranked Oklahoma later that night for the Panthers to have a shot.

"It's frustrating not having the final say. But on the other

hand, you've got to give credit to Georgia for being undefeated and Florida State credit for beating us," said Trocano. "I can't predict the future, but if they both lose, I don't see how we can be denied."

South Carolina Coach Jim Carlen agreed.

"I said going in that Pitt was the best around and nothing has changed. They're certainly one of the three best and right now, I'd have to give my vote," he said.

Trocano and his backup, sophomore Dan Marino, both tossed touchdown passes, fullback Randy McMillan scored twice and Dan Trout booted three field goals to key the victory.

Rogers, who was slowed by a pulled leg muscle, carried 27

times for 113 yards against a stingy Pitt defense anchored by All-American defensive end Hugh Green, who finished second in the Heisman balloting.

The game was billed as the first time the top two vote getters in the Heisman balloting had met in a bowl game.

"I didn't look at it as a personal confrontation," said Green. "We felt going in that we could beat them up front, and if we did that, that we could contain him (Rogers)."

Rogers, a 6-2, 220-pound senior from Duluth, Ga., fumbled three times and lost two of them and was obviously disappointed with his performance.

"I played my worst game. I'm afraid I let the team down," he said. "But maybe Pittsburgh had something to do with that."

Eagles Looking For Replay Of Earlier Game Against Vikings

The Philadelphia Eagles probably played their best game of the 1980 National Football League season on Sept. 14 when they routed the Minnesota Vikings 42-7. The NFC East champions wouldn't mind a repeat showing this Saturday when they play the Vikings in Philadelphia.

Minnesota won the NFC Central title with a 9-7 record, the worst of any playoff qualifier. The Eagles, 12-4, tied for the best record in the league and will be solid favorites to defeat the Vikes.

Yet, the Vikings seem unworried.

"We've got everything to gain and nothing to lose," said Minnesota linebacker Jeff Siemon. "We were a team not picked to do anything this year. All of a sudden, here we are. They may fear us more than we fear them."

That seems unlikely since the Eagles outgained Minnesota 529 yards to 207 in their regular season meeting.

"I'm not sure they were quite as dominant during the second half of the season as they were early," added Siemon, a nine-year veteran who is in the playoffs for the seventh time. "We respect them but their whole season could go down the drain with this one game."

Still, the memory of that 42-7 pasting will be on the Minnesota players' minds.

"You can't help but be affected by the outcome of the previous time we played them," added Siemon. "They looked very good in that game but we're a better team now than we were then."

The other NFC playoff contest will pit the Atlanta Falcons, winners of the Western Division, against the Dallas Cowboys, who beat Los Angeles 34-13 in the conference wild-card game last Sunday.

The Falcons, in only their second season of playoff competition, were eliminated by the Cowboys from the 1978 postseason action. If Dallas plays as well this Sunday as it did against the Rams, the Falcons, 12-4, might make another quick exit.

"This was about as well as we can play," said Cowboys Coach Tom Landry after Tony Dorsett rushed for 160 yards on 22 carries and scored two touchdowns. "Tony had a great game. He was really picking up the holes."

"It was a satisfying game," said Dorsett, "and not because it was my best playoff game. It wouldn't have meant a thing if I'd rushed for over 200 yards and we lost."

In the AFC on Saturday, the Buffalo Bills make their second trip to San Diego this season. Buffalo and the Chargers met in the fifth week of the campaign, with both clubs unbeaten, and the Bills upset the Chargers. Buffalo, 11-5, will rely on the AFC's best defense to shut down the super air attack of the Chargers, also 11-5, led by quarterback Dan Fouts and receivers John Jefferson, Kellen Winslow and Charlie Joiner.

On Sunday, the Oakland Raiders, who won the wild-card game against Houston 27-7 last Sunday, travel to Cleveland. The Browns, 11-5, are in the playoffs for the first time since 1972.

NBC Dropping Disney Program

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — The longest-running prime-time series in the history of television — "Disney's Wonderful World" — goes off the air on NBC next fall after presenting cartoons and family entertainment for more than a quarter of a century.

Another Disney television show may be in the works, however, said officials at Walt Disney Productions. And Disney has the right to sell the show elsewhere.

The network on Monday said the series would be canceled when the 52-week contract with Disney ends in late September 1981. NBC gave no reason for its decision.

The Sunday night fixture ran into trouble when CBS scheduled its highly rated "60 Minutes" news program at the same time. Studio stockholders were warned in February that the series might be dropped.

The show premiered as "Disneyland" on ABC on Oct. 27, 1954, featuring adventure stories, nature tales and such animated characters as Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and Chip 'n' Dale. The show was valuable both to the ailing network and to the promoters of Disneyland amusement park in southern California.

Rechristened "Walt Disney Presents" four years later, the show moved to NBC as "Walt Disney's Wonderful

World of Color" in September 1961 and was later retitled "The Wonderful World of Disney" before becoming "Disney's Wonderful World."

The show is generally credited with improving the quality of television productions for children with its mixture of original offerings, movies, documentaries and cartoons.

William Yates, Disney vice president for television, said he has met with all three television networks and hopes to announce a major commitment for next fall.

He declined to describe what kind of show was under consideration, but Disney officials have said in the past that a major expansion in TV could mean a weekly comedy and drama series for the studio.

Ferry Will Be Out Of Service

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The state Department of Transportation said Monday the Fort Fisher-Southport ferry will be out of service for repairs through Wednesday.

The ferry is scheduled to resume its normal operation Thursday morning.

Holmes Devotees Stick To Lore

CINCINNATI (UPI) — "Sherlock Holmes vs. Dracula." Shocking. "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Holmes." Come on now. "Sherlock Holmes in Dallas." Oh no.

The guest lecturer at one of Xavier University's recent classes on Sherlock Holmes was reeling off a seemingly endless list of "pastiche" (imitations) and "parodies" to the famous Holmes stories.

The students, many of them true Holmes devotees, were aghast.

"There's even a series about 'Schlock Homes,'" said lecturer Dan Andriacco. The class groaned.

"Not long ago, someone wrote a story about Holmes investigating the 18-minute gap in the Watergate tapes," Andriacco said. "And this next one, this is almost obscene, really grotesque. A writer had Holmes investigating the Kennedy assassination."

Still, there may be merit in some parodies, like humor, as noted in a couple of Andriacco's examples:

"Why Holmes," exclaimed Watson, "you're a full two feet shorter."

"Special Shoes," explained

Holmes. And, a takeoff on Holmes' bee farm. "Year after year," com-

plained Holmes, "I plant these little devils..."

The 90-minute discussion of pastiches and parodies was one segment of a seven-week course offered by Xavier on Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's famous detective.

Other sessions involve Doyle's writing techniques, listening to old radio adaptations of Holmes' adventures and watching the classic Basil Rathbone-Nigel Bruce movies.

While students may worry about Holmes' long-time enemy, Moriarty, they don't have to worry about exams.

"This is one of our non-threatening, non-credit, out-reach classes," explained the Rev. Lee Benish, a history professor who teaches the Sherlock class out of sheer love.

The course costs \$20 and is taught at night, to attract adults like Zola Frank, 31, the mother of an 8-month-old baby.

"My husband thinks it's hysterical that I'm taking the course," she says. "But he babysits for me and I love it."

A sampling from an evening in the study of Sherlock:

—Only four years after Doyle began writing Sherlock stories in 1887 the first parody was published. Doyle, who wrote 56

Sherlock short stories and four novels through 1927, once penned a note to one pretender, "Create your own characters."

One Holmes pastiche was so good it later fooled the Doyle estate into believing it was a long, lost Doyle original.

—A dissection of a particularly irritating pastiche prompted comments like:

"Or," chimed in the lecturer, "even known about."

—The famous phrase, "Elementary, my dear Watson," never appeared in Doyle's works. It was used in radio adaptations.

—A Holmes resurgence hit America in 1974. "The Complete Sherlock Holmes" increased in sales 10-fold that year. Nicholas Meyer published a pastiche, "The Seven Percent Solution," which later was made into a movie.

—Some hard-line Holmes addicts insist Doyle's stories are true. They contend Doyle was merely a literary agent for Watson's chronicling of Holmes.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Bob Hope has joined the list of entertainers for the Jan. 19 inaugural extravaganza for President-elect Ronald Reagan.

Frank Sinatra, producer-director of the gala, announced Monday that Hope would join Debby Boone, Charlton Heston, Ben Vereen, Dean Martin, Ethel Merman, Mel Tillis and Charlie Pride.

Johnny Carson will emcee the event at the Capital Centre in Landover, Md., the night before Reagan is inaugurated 40th President of the United States.

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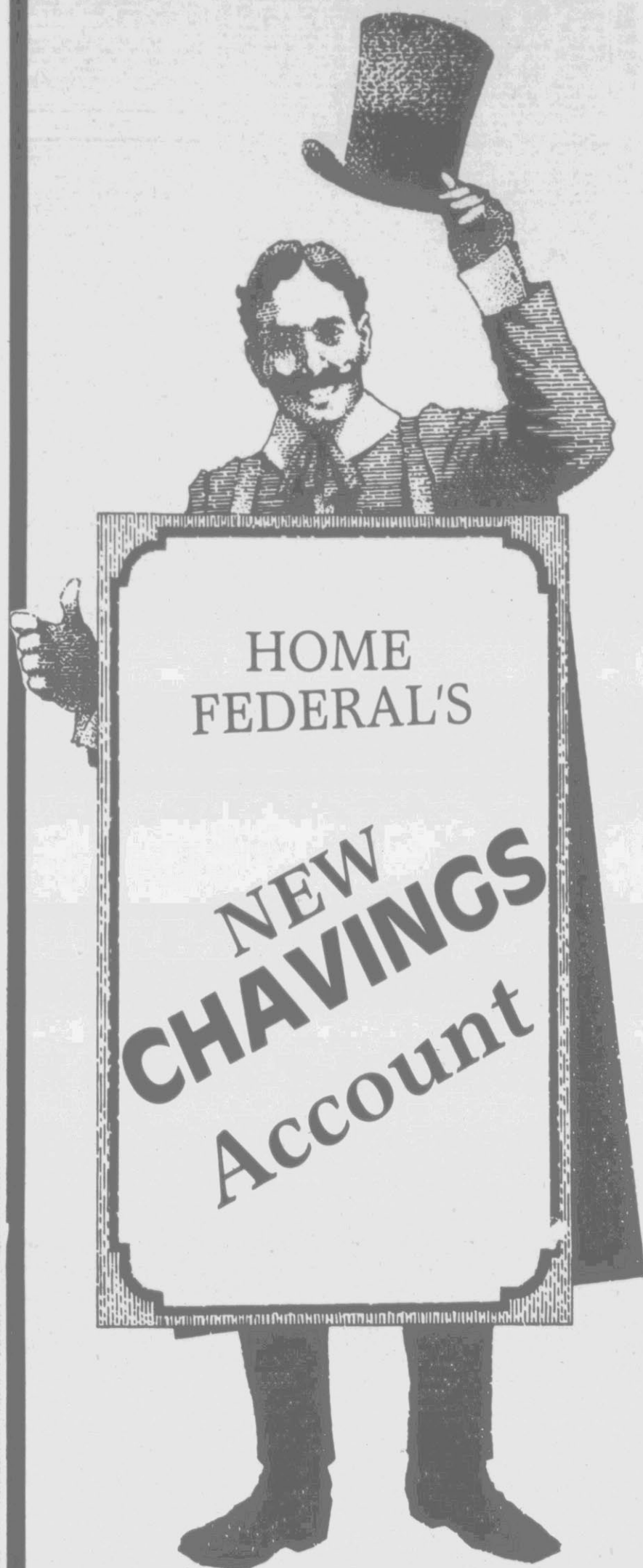
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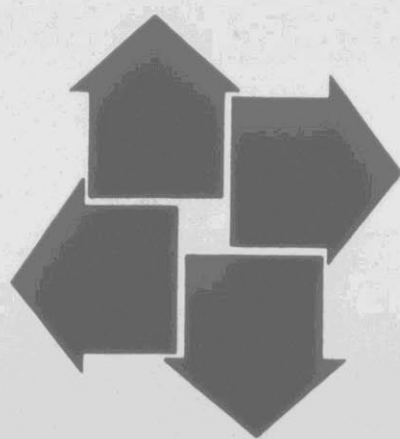

So many of our readers have said that we are behind the times because we still espouse four-card majors, that we have finally given in to the pressure. The new edition of *Goren's Bridge Complete*, which has just arrived in the bookstores, includes a detailed chapter on five-card majors.

Despite the modern trend, four-card majors prove spectacularly successful even though partner has only three-card support. The 4-3 major fit is known to the trade as the "Moysian fit." It is named after the late editor of *Bridge World Magazine* who was the most ardent and forceful proponent of four-card majors. This hand would have given him great delight.

North-South reached a contract of six hearts on a Moysian fit. Since it was quite likely that North held four hearts for his strong auction, South simply bid what he felt he could make. Events proved that he was right.

West led the queen of diamonds, and the hand was soon over. Declarer showed exemplary technique when he ruffed with the queen of hearts and led ace and another heart. It made no dif-

ference whether East won or held up. In practice, East won the king and led another diamond. Declarer won the ace, drew the remaining trumps, and then ran five club tricks and the ace-king of spades to come to twelve tricks.

What would have tickled Sonny Moysie's palate most of all was the fact that although North-South had eight-card fits in both spades and clubs, the only slam that will succeed is the one in the seven-card heart fit!

We have always maintained that there is nothing wrong with a 4-3 fit, providing the long hand does not get forced and cause declarer to lose control.

Reduce Airport Pickpocket Ring

MIAMI (AP) — Airport thefts by a well-trained corps of pickpockets have been cut 60 percent since a new Dade County police detective squad began making the rounds two months ago, police say.

The thieves had been stealing thousands of dollars a day from visitors to Miami International Airport. Police have made 20 arrests and believe they're battling an international ring from Colombia that also operates in Los Angeles and New York.

"We've heard of a school for pickpockets they have in Bogota," Detective Bill Sayers said. "We don't know how true it is, but the story goes that the school even has graduations where they give out class rings."

More Tests Of Space Shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The space shuttle Columbia has passed another milestone in its journey toward becoming the first manned, reusable space craft and was poised today for the final battery of tests before a spring liftoff.

In a 12-hour operation Monday, the shuttle's entire assembly — the 75-ton orbiter, its 184-foot long external tank and twin rocket boosters — was transported 3½ miles and mounted on launch pad 39A.

"I'm looking forward to a very successful launch at the end of March," Kennedy Space Center Director Richard Smith said.

But Launch Director George Page said possible difficulties with the test-firing of engines, fueling and simulated countdowns could postpone the launch until "early April."

The shuttle's two crewmen, John Young and Robert Crippen, were optimistic about the safety of the rocket-plane and a March

or April launch date after almost three years of delays in the \$8 billion program.
