N.C. Fiscal Year Begins: No Budget

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A new fiscal year begins today but there is no state budget to go with it.

With the deadline quickly approaching, the General Assembly approved a resolution Tuesday allowing the state government to keep operating while legislators continued to debate the \$11.7-billion two-year budget.

Sen. Harold Hardison, D-Lenoir, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, introduced the 11th-hour resolution to allow state departments to continue spending at the rate approved in the 1980-81 budget.

The rules in both the House and Senate were suspended so the resolution could be adopted immediately. The Senate then approved the budget package and sent it to the House, where a first vote was scheduled for Thursday.

Marvin Dorman, deputy state budget officer, said that since he began working in 1964, there has been "one... if not two" times when a new fiscal year started without a budget.

"It (budget approval) was in process and just ran over five or six days," he said. Dorman said that even without Hardison's resolution, state government probably would have continued to operate as usual.

"We can't close down overnight," he said. "You have to assume the only thing that has to be done is finalize the budget. The amendments would be minor."

The budget includes \$5.7 billion in state and federal money for 1981-82 and \$6 billion for the second fiscal year. Of that money, the federal government is expected to contribute approximately \$1.5 billion each year.

The budget does not provide for a \$106-million pay raise for state employees and teachers or a reduction in school class size as sought by Gov. Jim Hunt. Two of Hunt's other projects — a microelectronics center and the School of Science and Mathematics in Durham — will get more than \$28 million over the next two years.

The budget is divided into two bills — one with money for continuing state operations and another with money for capital improvement projects.

Before approving the bills, the Senate rejected efforts to remove \$1 million in money for abortions for poor women and \$4.1 million to build horse show facilities in Raleigh and Asheville.

Sen. Bill Redman, R-Iredell, tried to amend the budget bill to take out funding for all abortions except those involving rape, incest or when the mother's life is in danger. But the Senate voted 29-20 to table the amendment.

"I do not want my money being used for abortions," Redman said. "We are not creating responsibility in the young men of this state."

The Senate approved the continuing operations budget by a 47-1 vote, with Sen. Cary Allred, R-Alamance, casting the only dissenting vote.

The capital improvements budget was approved 42-6 after Sen. Marshall Rauch, D-Gaston, tried to amend it to remove a \$4.1-million appropriation for building two horse show

facilities. The amendment failed 28-19.

Rauch said he did not understand how the Legislature could vote to increase the cost of a driver's license from \$4 to \$10

and then spend that much money for the horse show facilities.

Sen. Walter Cockerham, R-Guilford, tried to amend the bill to prohibit using \$3 million that was set aside for renovations

to the Legislative Building for a tunnel between the existing building and a new legislative office building across the street. The Senate rejected that amendment 11-33.

Closest Race Ever In Israel Election

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin's conservative Likud bloc and Shimon Peres' socialist Labor Party were locked in a seesaw battle today in early returns from the election of a new Israeli parliament. But Begin claimed the support of small religious parties that would give him a new majority and keep him in office.

Begin said he would open talks with his prospective partners this afternoon and hoped to have a new government ready within three weeks.

Peres, speaking earlier when computer projections gave the Laborites a four-seat lead, also claimed he could form a coalition if the religious bloc joined him.

The larger of the two religious parties, the National Religious Party, said it preferred a Likud coalition but was open to negotiations.

The neck-and-neck results of the voting Tuesday raised doubts that any coalition would last very long. Interior Minister Yosef Burg of the NRP, one of Israel's shrewdest politicians, predicted another election within a year.

Israel Radio and Television projected 49 seats for Labor and 48 for Likud, with the two religious parties getting a pivotal 11 seats. The National Elections Commission said it would have no official returns until late today and the broadcast outlets did not say how many ballots had been counted. With 120 seats in the Knesset, or parliament, 61 were needed for a majority.

A sweltering heat wave kept voter turnout to 77.4 percent of the 2.4 million eligible voters, down from 79 percent four years ago.

The vote was the closest in Israel's 33-year history as an independent nation and gave unprecedented bargaining power to the religious groups.

"God willing, I will form the next government for the next 4½ years," Begin, 67, told cheering supporters at Likud headquarters. "We have an absolute majority in

the Knesset."

But Peres, a 58-year-old former defense minister, told the crowd at his campaign headquarters three hours earlier: "The task of forming a government will probably be given to Labor."

Small factions, which traditionally won a fourth of the seats, lost heavily.

Moshe Dayan, the flamboyant former foreign minister and war hero, got only one seat for his new independent list. Early polls had given him 10 to 15 seats which would have made him the kingmaker of the next government.

That role now falls to the National Religious Party and the ultra-orthodox Agudat Israel, who together hold the balance of power and probably will throw in with the highest bidder.

The NRP, which may win 6 to 8 seats, was a member of Begin's outgoing government and is closer to Likud's policy that the occupied West Bank should never be relinquished to Arab sovereignty. But it was a member of all the Labor governments before 1977 and has always been able to adapt its policy.

Agudat Israel, projected to win 4 or 5 seats, is more concerned about funds for its schools and institutions.

Whoever forms the government will face formidable economic problems, but the outcome will cause little or no change in Israel's foreign policy.

Peres' calmer tone in contrast to Begin's belligerence could ease some of the tensions in Israel's relations with the United States and Western Europe, but the difference is mostly in style rather than principle.

Both leaders firmly refuse to withdraw from most of the Arab territories occupied in the 1967 war, both reject the return of East Jerusalem to the Arabs, and neither will negotiate with the Palestine Liberation Organization.

A Labor government probably would be more generous in the negotiations for Palestinian autonomy.

N.C. House Panel Okays Splitting Eleven Districts

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The House Congressional Redistricting Committee approved Tuesday a plan for splitting North Carolina's 11 districts that drew the ire of Democrats and Republicans alike. But the map nonetheless broke a long standing committee stalemate.

The map proposed by a subcommittee headed by Rep. Ralph Edwards, D-Guilford, was accepted over three other subcommittee offerings and passed in spite of objections from loyalists of several incumbent congressmen.

Friends of 2nd District Democratic incumbent L.H. Fountain, were against the plan to shift Durham County out of the 4th District and into Fountain's constituency. Those loyal to 9th District Republican Congressman Jim Martin, were fearful of moving his Iredell county home into the 8th District, where Democrat William Hefner is the incumbent.

Several legislators suggested that Martin would move his home back into Mecklenburg County rather than run in the 8th District, and Huskins told the panel that Martin maintained only a "summer home" in Iredell County.

But Martin aide Paul Jones, in a telephone interview, said that Iredell County was Martin's only North Carolina home.

"That's his full-time home, the only property he has in North Carolina," Jones said. "He lives there, votes there, pays taxes there... He's never said he would move into Mecklenburg."

The committee's map appeared to strengthen the standing of Democrats in the 6th District, and it was actually drawn up by a vice chairman of that county's Democratic Party, Lorin Hill.

It would add Stokes County, with a majority Democratic registration, to the current 6th District alignment of Guilford, Alamance and Rockingham counties. Stokes would be moved out of the 5th District, a change that drew the ire of House members loyal to that district's Democratic incumbent, Steven Neal.

Former Democratic congressman Richardson Preyer held the 6th District seat for 12 years until being defeated by Republican Eugene Johnston in 1980. Preyer loyalists had hoped to improve the Democratic standing in that district in order that Preyer might be able to make a comeback bid for his former seat.

But Edwards and Hill both

insisted that they had not shaped their proposal expressly for Preyer, and they contended that the shift of Stokes would not be the boon to Democrats that opponents of the plan had contended.

"It's still a contestable district," said Hill, who noted that Neal failed to win a majority in that county against a Republican opponent in 1980.

The victory for Edwards' plan came as a surprise to

the committee chairman, Rep. J.P. Huskins, D-Iredell, who said he had expected approval to go to a map drawn up by Neal's allies, led by Rep. Ted Kaplan.

The House committee had been stymied for weeks, repeatedly rejecting various redistricting plans and mustering a majority for none of them. The plan varies greatly from one already approved by the Senate, and House approval (Please turn to Page 10)

'Recomputing' Soc. Security Stirs Warning

WASHINGTON (AP) — The entire Social Security system could be plagued with unpaid benefits, incorrect checks and poor service for a year or more if mandated minimum payments for 3 million retirees are eliminated, an internal agency document says.

President Reagan has targeted the minimum benefit for extinction and both the Senate and House have voted to kill it.

But the move, aimed at saving \$1 billion in fiscal 1982, is not easy to carry out. Without manually sifting through millions of files, Social Security has no ready way to tell which of its 36 million beneficiaries are getting the minimum benefit and how much their checks will be cut.

Top Social Security officials acknowledged in interviews Tuesday that it will take them 9,000 worker-years and cost \$170 million to find and recompute the minimum benefits.

The Reagan plan not only would end the minimum payment for future beneficiaries, but would affect 3 million people now on the rolls, mostly elderly women in their early 70s. About 90,000 are over 90.

Last week, Rep. J. J. Pickle, D-Texas, chairman of the House Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security, entered into the Congressional Record a contingency plan written last March by Social Security's Office of Central Operations that warned of near-chaos if the agency sought to make a minimum benefit change in two months.

The contingency plan said that would require postponing all other work, including

figuring mutual benefits for 200,000 new retirees.

"Beneficiaries in large numbers across the nation will be faced with reductions or eliminations in benefits, overpayment notices and poor service, not only on inquiries and post-entitlement actions, but also initial claims," the paper predicted. "This will not be one-month occurrence, but the reaction and the service deterioration will persist for at least one year."

And those assumptions, the document concluded, are optimistic, particularly in terms of automation.

"Any major systems failure could put us in a hole that will require years to overcome," it said.

Pickle tried in vain last Thursday to convince the House to kill the minimum benefit only for future retirees. Besides being morally wrong to take the minimum for current beneficiaries, he said, it is an expensive and unwieldy task.

"If you had a lot of Sherlock Holmes spy glasses and a bunch of bloodhounds to turn loose... you might locate those people, but it will cost you more than you will ever save on it," he said.

But Social Security Commissioner John A. Svahn said the outlook is not as bad as it sounds in the contingency plan, which he said was not an official agency document.

Svahn said Social Security computers will "be able to identify the vast majority of the minimum-benefit cases."

Parking Change

Ron Sewell, director of Engineering and Inspections, reminded residents that the residential permit parking ordinance became effective here today.

Sewell said the ordinance is aimed at helping to regulate parking in residential sections by identifying through petition and review controlled parking areas.

Several sections have been identified, he explained, which have the potential to be designated controlled residential parking areas. They are the neighborhoods between First and Fifth Streets, the subdivisions of Brookgreen and Dalebrook, the area in the vicinity of Elmhurst School, the Rock Springs Road area, and a section between Evans Street and the university.

Under the new ordinance, the City Council may designate controlled parking areas based on various criteria applicable on a minimum per block basis.

If a section is designated as a controlled area, residents of the area are able to purchase a permit decal for each vehicle owned at a cost of \$5 per year. Signs would be posted in the areas and vehicles not bearing a decal would be unable to park in the area any longer than two hours between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Usual Fears Of Elderly Never Materialized

To be old, to be sick, to be alone... these fears reflect in the minds of the elderly. They are fears that, because of her family, never materialized for Mrs. Vermell W. Smith.

"It was just a short period of time for us, but for her, it was the most important part of her life," said Mrs. Mamie Smith, who with her family cared for her terminally ill mother-in-law until her death last March.

The David Harold Smiths — Mamie, David and Darlene — altered their lifestyles to keep Mrs. Vermell Smith — to them mother, grandmother and mother-in-law — out of the hospital during her bout with cancer earlier this year.

"Granny did not want to go to the hospital," said Mrs. Smith. "And she desperately didn't want to go to a nursing home. She didn't want any kind of life preserving apparatus, she didn't want to be cut off from people and she never was — even at the end."

"Rural people take care of their own," emphasized her husband. "It's a matter of responsibility and of taking care of

those who have taken care of you."

For four months Mrs. Smith couldn't leave her mother-in-law. "I couldn't even go out of the room," she said, "and for two months she was completely bedridden."

"Much of the burden for her care fell on me," explained Mrs. Smith. "During this period I gave up all outside activities — it was during Christmas and I went to no parties or festivities."

"But I don't regret one minute of it," she noted. "It takes a big sacrifice for anybody, but I would do the same thing again because it was what Granny wanted."

"I received as much in return as I ever gave," she added, "if not now, then later on."

The family, said Mrs. Smith, soon faces the same situation with her mother.

"And we'll probably do the same thing," she said, "because my mother doesn't want to go into a rest home either."

"Neither Granny nor my mother wanted to be isolated from people and felt a nursing home would do this — I don't know that that's true but it is the way they felt and feel," added Mrs. Smith.

"My mother-in-law was confined for a big part of her life with her husband, who had arthritis. After his death she traveled, loved to be around people and became enthusiastic about life," she said. "She didn't want this to end."

"Something else to consider," noted her husband, "is the cost factor between nursing homes and home care. Even hiring someone, it was less expensive for us to keep her at home."

"But that's something everybody has to find out individually," he added.

The Smiths received a great deal of help from the Home Health Care Service of Greenville.

"This was the only way I got a break," said Mrs. Smith. "Nurses came three times a week and stayed two hours each time. It was just a real lifesaver for us and Granny came to love the nurses and looked forward to their visits."

Friends, neighbors and fellow church members supported the family during their crisis. "Help from the community and the church was overwhelming," said Darlene Smith, who quit her job in Mount Olive to help care for her grandmother.

Paramilitary Camp Ban Clears Panel

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - Over objections from two Ku Klux Klan members, a legislative committee on Tuesday approved a bill aimed at shutting down paramilitary camps.

The House Judiciary II Committee unanimously approved the Senate-passed bill, which would make it a felony to run camps training people to use weapons or explosives if the knowledge was intended for use in protests or demonstrations.

Sen. Henson Barnes, D-Wayne, the bill's sponsor, said the measure is aimed at paramilitary camps operated by the Klan, Nazis

and communist groups. He said the small training camps are dangerous to neighboring residents.

Barnes added that to allow such groups to train for civil disturbances is "anarchy, it's terrorism."

"In a democratic society, they (dissidents) must be allowed to teach against, preach against or throw out people by the ballot ... not at gunpoint," Barnes said.

But Glenn Miller, who said he is Grand Dragon of the Carolina Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and the operator of a Johnston County Klan training camp, told the committee the government is

no longer able to protect Christian Americans.

"All of our training is defensive and we do not encourage people to break the law," Miller told the panel. "All we want is to protect ourselves and our families and if we are to protect ourselves, we must know how."

He said his camp is monitored regularly by law-enforcement authorities, who also have inspected the rifle range at the camp and declared it not to be dangerous to the neighbors.

Steven Miller, a Klansman from Angier, who appeared before the committee, stirred heated debate when he referred to the confrontation between Klansmen and members of the Communist Workers Party on Nov. 3, 1979.

Five people were killed during that confrontation when shooting erupted. Six Klansmen and Nazis were acquitted of first-degree murder charges in the shooting deaths.

"The American people have only had one victory over communism in its entire history, and that was in Greensboro a year and a half ago," Steven Miller said. "Sixteen patriots did what the American government has been trying to do for years, that's send the communists packing."

Rep. Martin Lancaster, D-Wayne, asked Miller whether the training camps were preparing Klansmen for similar confrontations in the future.

Miller hedged on his answer, saying, "Yes, we are training to be successful in maintaining America," adding that the Klan would take on the communists whenever and wherever the government failed to stop them.

In other legislative action:

Insurance
The Senate Insurance Committee reversed itself and voted to pull back a bill that would eliminate auto insurance surcharges on drivers with no traffic violations and put a ceiling on rate increases.

Attempts to amend the bill failed and the committee put off further action until today.

The controversy surrounding the bill seemed headed for a solution Monday. The Senate committee approved an amended version that would eliminate any ceiling and do away with identifiable surcharges, allowing them to be incorporated in the base rate.

With committee approval, a bill usually heads for the floor of the respective chamber. But Tuesday the committee voted to pull the bill back, disregard its vote and try again.

Several options were offered but no action was taken.

In other action, the committee approved a bill that would require insurance companies to provide information to consumers about their policies or why they might have been turned down for insurance.

Pornography
The House Judiciary I

Committee heard opponents of a bill that would do away with adversary hearings to determine obscenity of certain material if the material can be described by eight categories listed in the bill.

Opponents ranged from the Motion Picture Association of America, which represents 20th Century-Fox and MGM, to the North Carolina Library Association and the American Civil Liberties Union.

All argued that the bill would infringe on freedom of speech, and do away with the current protection of fair warning, which requires a hearing to determine if material is obscene.

The opponents also argued that local police would have the authority to judge something obscene and arrest people. They said this could include librarians who might handle books authorities considered obscene.

Speed Limit
A bill that would limit fines for speeding on interstate and four-lane highways was delayed while researchers determine if it would affect federal funds received by the state.

The bill would limit fines for those speeding over 55 mph but not under 65 mph to \$1 for every mph over the limit up to \$5. No traffic violation points would be charged.

Sen. Harold Hardison, D-Lenoir, said the question of federal funds should be answered before voting and the bill was delayed.

Sen. Bob Jordan, D-Montgomery, said "Let's call it what it is, raising the speed limit to 65 miles per hour."

Supporter Sen. Julian Allsbrook, D-Halifax, said, "The bill will allow us to do what we now can't do," because of the possible loss of federal funds.

Federal regulations require state receiving federal money not to exceed the 55 mph speed limit.

Child Restraints
The Senate amended and passed a bill that would require parents to restrain children under 2 in a child restraint seat or a seat belt.

The bill was amended to lower the age from 4 to 2 and delete the misdemeanor penalty, allowing for only a \$10 fine beginning in 1984.

The bill now goes to the House for concurrence in the Senate amendments.

Handguns
The House approved and sent to the Senate a bill for regulating the purchase of handguns. The National Rifle Association has indicated it supports the bill, which would set out procedures for obtaining a handgun permit.

Under the bill, the sheriff would have to determine that the handgun would be used

for protection, target shooting, collecting or hunting. The bill increases the price of a gun permit from 50 cents to \$5.

Strikes
The House State Government Committee approved an amended version of a bill prohibiting strikes by public employees. The bill originally would have disqualified striking workers from public employment for a one-year period.

The bill approved by the committee puts in writing what has been common law practice in the state. It classifies as a strike the failure to report for duty, deliberate absence and work slow downs.

There is no punishment for workers who strike in the amended bill.

Redistricting
The House and Senate both gave tentative approval to the other chamber's redistricting plan, putting off the final votes until Wednesday.

With no debate the Senate passed the House plan for its legislative districts, 44-0. The House passed the Senate plan for its 50 legislative districts, 99-1.

Greenville 11th In Construction Among Cities

Greenville ranked 11th among 44 North Carolina cities of more than 10,000 population in the value of authorized construction for the first quarter of 1981, according to State Labor Commissioner John Brooks.

The commissioner said Greenville recorded a building value figure of \$7,023,441 for the January-February-March period.

Building permit totals for March, according to Brooks, showed that Greenville ranked 13th among the group of cities, with a building figure of \$2,879,609.

Total construction authorized in Pitt County during March amounted to \$3,057,643, including 17 single-family units at a cost of \$774,000, 69 multi-family units at a cost of \$1,711,600, 12 non-residential units costing \$298,218, and 65 additions and alterations at a cost of \$273,825.

Building value figures for the first quarter and for March in several neighboring cities included: Elizabeth City, \$816,464, \$223,164; Goldsboro, \$1,441,699, \$749,808; Jacksonville, \$3,279,665, \$1,454,728; \$4,749,635, \$4,264,685; New Bern, \$2,745,150, \$584,350; Roanoke Rapids, \$1,812,171, \$942,513; Rocky Mount, \$4,494,726, \$1,847,564; Tarboro, \$1,442,650, \$1,102,300; and Wilson, \$5,446,976, \$312,583.

Brooks said construction activity in the state during the first quarter was up 21.7 percent, while in March activity was up 62.4 percent from the same month in 1980 and up 58.6 percent from February.

He reported that residential construction, of both single-family homes and multi-family dwellings, rebounded sharply when compared to 1980 activity. Permits for single-family homes increased 36.6 percent, from 1,228 to 1,677, while multi-family dwelling units jumped 184.6 percent from 631 to 1,796.

Homemaker's Haven

Vinegar, Salt, Alum, and Lime
The selection of good quality ingredients is important in making delicious and safe pickles. So I will discuss vinegar, salt, alum and lime. When selecting vinegar, use white distilled or apple cider vinegar of four to six percent acidity. This may be labeled as forty to sixty grain acidity. Do not use homemade vinegars or those of unknown acidity. Select white distilled vinegar when light color is important. Apple cider vinegar may be used but could darken the product.

An important point about vinegar to remember is: do not dilute the vinegar unless the

recipe so specifies. If you want pickles that are less sour, add sugar, rather than decreasing or diluting the vinegar.

When selecting salt, pure granulated pickling salt is best. This should be used if curing or brining pickles. If you are not brining pickles, you may use pure granulated pickling salt or the uniodized table salt that contains no carbonate. Read the label to make sure the uniodized salt does not contain carbonate. Carbonate in table salt may be transformed into carbon dioxide in pickles that could cause bloated or floating pickles.

The use of alum and lime is not necessary for crisp pickles. If, however, you wish to use a firming agent, use only lime purchased from a drug or grocery store. Alum is not recommended for pickle making.

For Best Outdoor Grilling, Try Thick Steaks
If you're expecting a tender juicy steak hot off the outdoor grill, don't skimp when you're buying the meat.

Thick steaks barbecue better than thin ones because they don't dry out so fast. So look for those that are at least one-and-a-half or two inches thick; even

if you have to ask the meat counter to cut them specially.

Rather than small individual steaks, try one big, thick one that could possibly serve the total family. That calls for at least a two-incher. Then cut it in serving size pieces after it's grilled.

When you're buying, allow for about three-fourths pound of steak per person if there's bone still in it. If it's deboned, then a half pound per person will do.

To come off the grill as a tender piece of steak, the meat must be a tender cut to start with. The best choice is a steak from the loin or rib section. That would mean a club, T-bone, porterhouse or sirloin.

Boneless steaks are also available but run a little higher in cost because of the extra work of taking out the bone. Here you'll find the filet mignons from the tenderloin and the Delmonicos from the rib area.

Choose high quality beef. Choice or Prime cuts are best in that they're more juicy than lower grades. Look for bright red, lean meat, well marbled with fat. Then toss the beef on the grill and let it sizzle.

Good For The Goose...

The General Assembly has moved rapidly this year to shore up the bureaucratic holes exposed by North Carolina's highway bid-rigging scandal. There is no doubt that action was needed, and the Legislature is to be commended in moving toward mandated rules governing the action of state employees. But an effort to take those rules a step ahead - to make it illegal for elected, as well as non-elected, public officials to accept gifts from contractors except under specified conditions - was rejected in the Senate.

Debate on the amendment affecting elected officials came as prosecutors in Wake and Bladen counties announced they would not seek criminal charges against Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green, who has acknowledged he accepted \$4,775 in cash from a paving contractor who did work, and received payment, at Green's tobacco warehouse. In a statement, Wake County District

Attorney J. Randolph Riley said he could find no evidence that Green broke a state law. Riley noted there was "no evidence of Mr. Green having made any promises in exchange for the gift, either before or after its receipt."

The new bid-rigging law makes no such restriction on determining whether a non-elected official has violated the law by accepting a gift from anyone doing business with the state. To condense, the law says that if the official accepts the gift, the law has been violated. Public elected officials, however, are excluded from the prohibition on gifts.

It would seem logical that what is right for non-elected officials should be equally correct for elected officials; that prohibitions needed for one are needed for the other. The act of going before a voting populace does not make an individual a saint.

Several constituents have shared with me your recent "Hotline" article and editorial regarding the expensive loss in food stamps issued by mail in Pitt County. I have received several other letters of concern about this problem in other areas of North Carolina and across the country.

You may be interested to know that the Senate recently adopted a provision which I offered to require States to reimburse the Federal Government for mail losses above one percent during any six-month period.

Such a restriction should provide incentive for State and local governments (which are responsible for administering the food stamp program) to guard more carefully the issuance of food stamps by mail.

During Committee testimony, several witnesses noted that the mail issuance system is highly susceptible to fraud due to the following reasons:

- State agency employees steal the food stamps out of the envelopes designated for recipients;
- Security guards steal them out of the mailbag between the food stamp office and the post office;
- Postal employees steal them inside the mailroom;
- Postal carriers steal them while "delivering" the mail;
- Thieves who follow carriers on their routes and steal the mailed coupons out of the mailbox; and
- Recipients who report not receiving their coupons, but who, in actuality, had received the coupons.

The trend is also clear that mail issuance is more of a problem in urban areas than in highly rural ones. In any event, however, this new restriction should tighten this particular area of potential abuse.

Rallying To 'Protect AI'

WASHINGTON - Word in the White House following Secretary of State Alexander Haig's stunning put-down of United Nations Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick was a determined (but unpublished) "Protect AI Haig."

Senior presidential aides, who felt they had disposed of earlier problems with the secretary of state, will do everything they can to prevent the attack on Kirkpatrick from escalating into an internal crisis for President Reagan that could befall Haig's standing both inside the administration and in foreign chancelleries.

Why did Haig permit - or instruct - his press aide, Dean Fischer, to spoil Kirkpatrick's brilliant diplomatic achievement in toning down Iraq's anti-Israeli Security Council resolution to the point where the U.S. could vote for it? One explanation: Haig really did feel the ambassador had not stayed in close enough touch with the State Department during her long, private negotiations with the Iraqis. Another explanation: His grievance, aired on his plane in the Far East, was a product of extreme fatigue after two weeks on the road.

But the effect of the put-down of Kirkpatrick was devastating. Even if she did "exceed her authority," which is doubtful, the end result was a diplomatic triumph greater than President Reagan dared hope for. Although the White House Thursday accepted Haig's word that he had nothing to do with Fischer's background criticism of Kirkpatrick, no one believes Fischer could have acted independently.

"Get Gramm"
Rep. Phil Gramm of Texas, the brainy "boll weevil" who has proved indispensable to President Reagan's radical attack on government spending, is under increasing fire from regular Democrats, including Democratic Party Chairman Chuck Manatt.

Without help from Democrat Gramm, Reagan's budget-cutting program could not have succeeded nearly so well as it has, despite the President's current problems with the Democratic-controlled House. Gramm's success, regard as apostasy by party leaders, has infuriated the regular Democrats.

The first attack on Gramm was a whispered, cloakroom campaign threatening to remove him from the Budget Committee. Then Manatt swung from the rug, threatening to run Gramm out of his party. In fact, there is far more smoke than fire in the assault on Gramm, but it shows that spirits are reviving within the Democratic Party after six months of hiding in the closet out of fear of Ronald Reagan and his popularity.

Reagan Eyes Civil Defense
Without fanfare, President Reagan has approved a move by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger that could lead to a long overdue effort to build America's "passive defense"

system - that is, civil defense.

All officials agree that the Soviet Union is far ahead of the U.S. in a civil defense system for its population, particularly in large cities. That includes evacuation routes, trenching tools for average citizens to dig temporary shelters against radiation and other safeguards.

Weinberger has asked former Air Force Secretary Tom Reed, a California engineer-financier with national political credentials, to study the civil defense question as part of the broader question of military defense against possible enemy attack. Reed's opening gambit was a meeting June 25 with the high-level Defense Science Board. Any decision to move on the civil defense front would cost hundreds of millions of dollars.

Allen Rampant
Richard V. Allen, President Reagan's national security assistant, told Jewish leaders in a hush-hush White House talk last week that those four F-16 aircraft destined for Israel but delayed because of the Israeli raid against Iraq's nuclear installation would be sent to Israel shortly after the June 30 Israeli election.

But Allen warned the conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations, the top-level leadership of the American Jewish community, that if word leaked out about the F-16s - or even about the fact that he had held the hush-hush meeting - he would deny publicly what he had said.

In fact, the Jerusalem Post, in a story by its well-informed Washington correspondent, Wolf Blitzer, said last Thursday that Allen had threatened not to hold any more private briefing sessions with the Jewish leaders if word got out about last week's session.

Senate Christmas Tree
Chairman Bob Dole of the Senate Finance Committee is slowly building a Christmas tree out of the Reagan tax bill now being written in his committee.

Both the Treasury Department and White House aides, are unhappy about Dole's willingness to accept Republican-sponsored amendments - and some from the Democrats - into the basic bill: a three-year cut in marginal tax rates, a reduction from 70 percent to 50 percent in the rate on income from dividends and interest and faster tax write-offs for capital investment.

The worst offender, in administration eyes: a new provision to stimulate savings, principally in mortgage-lending institutions, many of which are now in danger of bankruptcy. But that amendment at least had broad support in the committee. Other amendments dealing with special relief for truckers and timber operators have very limited application. Dole is willing to accommodate these special constituency amendments in the interest of speed and of keeping his committee together, but in doing so he is angering the administration.

Growth Well Beyond Payrolls

NEW YORK (AP) - When Frank Lautenberg joined Automatic Payrolls Inc., it was grossing \$35,000 a year from processing the payrolls of 12 small business clients in the Paterson, N.J. area. That was in 1952.

"I was convinced that sensitive projects, such as payrolls, could be farmed out and done efficiently, less expensively and far better than within the company," said Lautenberg, who was then 28 years old.

Twenty-nine years later, the company, its name modernized to Automatic Data Processing, Inc. and with Lautenberg as chairman, grosses \$500 million a year. It serves 100,000 clients. It has 13,000 employees.

It has grown beyond payrolls. It now maintains, processes, calculates, analyzes, prints and projects an infinite variety of data. It is, in effect, the office staff of thousands of organizations: manufacturers, brokers, dis-

tributors, pension funds, banks. But it sticks to its last too: It processes paychecks for 5 percent of U.S. civilian workers.

Lautenberg's vision obviously had a lot to do with the growth of ADP, but it probably couldn't have been achieved if the company had not found itself in the midst of the information processing revolution.

So pervasive is this change, now spreading from the business world into the home, that nobody today remains untouched. There is no escape: suddenly, the world of computers and information processing is upon us.

Difficult as it is to comprehend, the industry - made up of computing services, computer manufacturing, and allied areas such as terminal manufacture - is now almost as large as the entire automobile industry. Government figures last year put the auto industry at \$78.5 billion; word processing rev-

enues in the same period totalled \$75 billion.

"We live in a period of 'fast history,'" says Lautenberg. Three decades ago, when ADP came into being, the computing services segment of word processing - programming and data processing, as opposed to the hardware - didn't exist. Twenty-five years ago it was a \$15-million business. By 1970 it had grown to \$3 billion, by 1980 to \$14 billion.

The latter figure now roughly matches the size of radio and television broadcasting, plus cable TV. And the growth is projected to continue. Some independent analysts foresee a \$35-billion industry by 1985.

Lautenberg has a quick explanation of one of the reasons why. People, he says, will want to "buy the solution rather than the hardware."

Computer hardware, he explains, changes often. A professional data processor can contend with the changes, but an individual or

a small business might not be able to make wise choices. It could be costly.

The amateur user also might find himself unable to hire a programmer. Lautenberg estimates that already 100,000 programming jobs are unfilled and that the total will rise to 500,000 by the middle of the decade.

Besides, he argues, the professional can do the processing better and at lower cost. He contends: "I can say categorically that for a small business, we can do the job more efficiently and less expensively."

But, won't companies be relinquishing some of their authority? "You don't relinquish responsibility," Lautenberg responds. "You free yourself of the shackles." By sending your work out, says Lautenberg, ever the salesman, you're free to specialize in what you do best.

"With you the processing is a sideshow," he said. "With us it's the main event."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A planned move to another state by one of two men charged with espionage forced their arrests earlier than planned, FBI sources say.

The two men, William Holden Bell, 61, and Marian W. Zacharski, 29, were arrested Sunday at their neighboring Playa Del Rey apartments.

Zacharski, who served as West Coast representative for a Polish government-owned machine tool company, had been promoted to president of the firm's U.S. operations and would have had to move to the Midwest.

"We simply didn't want to have to try this case in the jurisdictions of two federal courts," the Los Angeles Times today quoted an unnamed source as saying.

Bell worked as an engineer for Hughes Aircraft.

Zacharski, a Polish national, has been fired for what the company called his "inexcusable conduct."

The FBI said it had Zacharski under surveillance since he entered the country in 1977. It is alleged he persuaded the engineer to become involved in espionage.

a lot of study on the subject of governmental efficiency and comes to the conclusion that top government administrators are not, as some might complain, "incompetent or lacking motivation."

"On the contrary...these people are not rewarded, as are private citizens, for the success which comes in the free market system where increased productivity leads to increased sales at higher profit for less cost.

There is no law of supply and demand in government. Agency people must create the demand (public need) so that they can supply the product (services).

And success in government is measured by the size of the budget.

Power

The bureaucrat who has the most money, hires the most people, controls the most decisions, and exercises the most power is considered the biggest success.

Legislators, meanwhile, spend years in the General Assembly totally snowed under by reams of information. They typically become expert in some narrow field which interests them most and depend upon colleagues with other special interests to help keep them informed and to advise them how to vote. Above all, the legislators come to depend upon the fulltime professionals in government agencies to provide details and advice.

But legislators never have a clearcut way to measure what the agencies are doing. Line after line in reports may tell how many clients are treated or meals served or miles paved or children taught — but nothing tells them whether that is being done well; or even if it was needed in the first place.

Few employees would tell their bosses that the job they are doing is not worthwhile and ought to be eliminated.

Critics Keep

On Fighting

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — While the North Carolina Senate was approving funding for a \$24 million microelectronics center Tuesday, foes of the proposed center voiced concerns about waste disposal, safety and urban planning problems that might accompany the project.

"If we spend \$30 million to bring illness and waste disposal problems of \$100 million, we will have not made a very good bargain," said June M. Kimmel, natural resources director of the North Carolina League of Women Voters.

She joined several representatives of the N.C. Occupational Safety and Health Project, a worker advocacy group, in organizing an informal public hearing on the project.

NCOSH spokesmen said at the hearing that workers in the industry face potential health problems because of chemicals used in manufacturing processes. Those problems could include respiratory complaints, liver damages, skin allergies and even eye strain, they said.

Gov. Jim Hunt is seeking the \$24.4 million outlay from the Legislature toward construction of a \$30 million research and teaching center for microelectronics.

The Hunt administration hopes to draw members of that industry into the state by providing technologically skilled workers from which they can draw, as well as a site in which to locate.

NCHOS Director David Austin said the state Department of Labor is "chronically understaffed" to inspect a new influx of plants for health and safety conditions.

And John T. Hughes, who has been conducting toxic waste research for the Institute of Southern Studies in Durham, said waste generated by high-technology industry might exceed the state's ability to dispose of it.

Other speakers questioned Hunt's contention that microelectronics jobs would be high-paying ones.

But the industry was defended by George R. Herbert, the center's board chairman, in a written statement.

"An objective examination of the microelectronics industry (would conclude) that it is a responsible industry," he statement said.

Other invited pro-industry spokesman included state Commerce Secretary D.M. "Lauch" Faircloth and a public relations official for the new General Electric Microelectronics Center in Research Triangle Park, but none appeared at the meeting.

Dr. Quentin W. Lindsey, Hunt's science adviser, attended the meeting but did not speak.

However, asked after the meeting whether the state had provided sufficient public debate on the proposed center, he replied, "Obviously, we haven't."

Undecorated, Leaving Army

WASHINGTON (AP) — Staff Sgt. Joseph Subic jr., the only U.S. serviceman not decorated by the Pentagon after being held hostage in Iran, is leaving the Army about a year ahead of schedule with an administrative discharge, the Army says.

Col. Michael Vargosko, an Army spokesman, said Tuesday the Privacy Act prevented disclosure of whether today's discharge was honorable or whether it was requested by the seven-year veteran from Redford Township, Mich.

Subic, 24, was not available for comment. The Army has refused to say why he did not receive the Defense Meritorious Service Medal given to 20 other servicemen held hostage.

While a hostage, Subic appeared in an Iranian-produced critical of U.S. involvement in Iran. He "did not behave under stress the way non-commissioned officers are expected to act," the Army said June 1 when the decorations were announced.

**Senate Bars
 Credit Card
 Rate Boost**

 RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — In
 a rare defeat for the banking
 industry in this year's Gen-
 eral Assembly, the state
 Senate voted Tuesday to kill
 a bill that would have raised
 the legal interest rate on
 credit cards from 18 percent
 to 21 percent.

The bill, sponsored by Sen.
 Ollie Harris, D-Cleveland,
 would have permitted a 3
 percentage-point jump in
 rates charged to bank-issued
 credit cards and on revolving
 credit issued by merchants.
 But following a long, im-
 passionate speech by Sen.
 Charles Vickery, D-Orange,
 the Senate put down the
 measure by a 31-11 vote.

"This is not a widows and
 orphans bill," Vickery said.
 "The people Senator Harris
 wants to help are making big
 profits."

He said oil companies
 would be allowed to raise the
 rates on their credit cards,
 an increase that would make
 North Carolina one of the
 five most expensive states
 for credit card users.

"We don't want to take
 money out of the pockets of
 the people of North Carolina
 and give it to Exxon, Amoco,
 Gulf, Phillips, etcetera,"
 Vickery said.

"There is absolutely no
 justification for us raising
 those rates," he added. "The
 only reason we're voting on
 this bill is because the big
 boys told us to."

Vickery said lobbyists for
 banks and merchants who
 supported the bill had
 "misled" Senate Banking
 Committee Chairman Billy
 Mills, D-Onslow.

Mills told reporters when
 introducing the bill, based on
 information he said he re-
 ceived from merchants, that
 it applied only to store-issued
 credit and not on bank cards.

Vickery's speech drew
 barbed comments, Sen. Cass
 Ballenger, R-Catawba, a
 manufacturer who supported
 the bill and said Vickery was
 ignorant of economics.

"I had to show Senator
 Vickery how to read a profit
 and loss statement,"
 Ballenger told the Senate.
 "It's obvious he doesn't know
 a great deal about econom-
 ics."

But Ballenger did not have
 the support of the usually
 solid GOP Senate minority,
 as two Republicans — Sen.
 Walter Cockerham, R-
 Guilford, and Sen. Chip
 Wright, R-New Hanover —
 delivered speeches in op-
 position to the bill.

Ballenger said businesses
 that issue credit must first
 borrow the money
 themselves, sometimes at
 rates larger than 21 percent.

"If the credit business is so
 bad, why do they continue to
 stay in the credit business?"
 Cockerham asked.

Harris defended his bill,
 saying all merchants and
 banks issuing revolving
 credit needed higher rates.

"They have not received a
 raise in over 20 years on
 these interest rates," he
 said.

Vickery also delivered a
 blistering assault on the
 Senate's approval of other
 bills sought by special in-
 terests. He said the Legisla-
 ture had lifted interest rates
 on most other types of loans
 "beyond any recognizable
 limit" and had granted a
 tax-cut for savings and loan
 associations.

"This session of the
 Legislature is going to be
 known as the 'big boys'
 session," Vickery said.

**Retiring After
 FCC Service**

WASHINGTON (AP) —
 Serving under seven presi-
 dents and compiling record
 tenure on a federal regula-
 tory board, Robert Emmet Lee
 has retired following four
 7-year terms on the Federal
 Communications Com-
 mission.

Lee, 69, stepped down
 Tuesday as chairman of the
 FCC, a post he held for only
 about four months pending
 Senate confirmation of Mark
 S. Fowler, President
 Reagan's choice for the job.

Appointed to the FCC by
 President Eisenhower in
 1953, Lee was noted for his
 sense of humor, broad
 knowledge of the com-
 munications field and role as
 adviser to a series of FCC
 chairmen.

China's Communists Celebrate

PEKING (AP) — China's Communist Party celebrated its 60th anniversary today with a gala show of unity and heard newly elected Chairman Hu Yaobang tell aging comrades to make way for young blood to modernize the country.

About 10,000 guests were invited to the Great Hall of the People for a celebration staged beneath a glittering red chandelier.

"It is now a pressing strategic task," Hu said, "to build up a large continent of revolutionary well educated, professionally competent and younger cadres."

China's old leaders, he said, would commit an "unforgivable historical error" if they did not groom a younger leadership.

Many of China's Communist rulers are in their 60s and 70s, having begun their careers in the fledgling days of the political organization that grew from 60 members in 1921 to 38 million who lead a nation of 1 billion people in 1981.

Hu is 67. Deng Xiaoping, senior-ranking vice chairman and in effect China's ruler, is 76 and has often said he will retire soon.

Hu replaced Hua Guofeng, a political rival who was the chosen successor of the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung. Hua resigned this week and was demoted to vice chairman by the party Central Committee for blindly following Mao's ideas.

A live television broadcast showed Hu facing a monolithic hammer and sickle on a stage flanked by red banners and the dates "1921 1981." A glum-faced Hua sat on the sidelines.

He said criticism between party leaders should be well-reasoned, and retaliation and vindictiveness are not allowed.

"Our main mistake in the past was to engage in excessive struggle," he said.

In a major party document issued on an anniversary eve, China's leaders called for a peaceful revolution "more profound and arduous than any previous revolution" fought with guns, purges and polemics.

They called for prosperity, not divisive politics, greater democracy, the rule of laws not men, more private enterprise, spiritual civilization, cultural advancement and religious freedom.

The blueprint for the future is the work of men who have won and lost in China's struggles — such as Deng, purged in the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution, and Hu, also a purge victim.

"All our party work," they declare, "must be subordinated to and serve this central task — economic construction."

Industry must turn out more bicycles, TV sets, refrigerators and stylish clothes, the document said, but materialism and consumerism must not be allowed to overwhelm the life of the spirit committed to socialism.

"This is a great revolution, unprecedented in human history," the document said. "Differing from the revolutions before... this revolution is carried out not through fierce class confrontation and conflict, but through the strength of the socialist system itself, under leadership, step-by-step and in an orderly way."

But it said economic construction "can never be plain sailing."

"This revolution which has entered the period of peaceful development is more profound and arduous than any previous revolution," it said.

The document, reported hammered out after a fierce debate between critics and defenders of Mao, charts a course of modernization,

discarding the shackles of Maoist dogma and the "Little Red Book" of Maoist quotations.

It explicitly repudiates the Maoist ideas of class struggle, opposition to private enterprise, intellectuals and foreign contact.

The document affirms that the state and collective economy are the basic forms of economic organization in China. But it declares: "The working people's individual economy within certain prescribed limits is a necessary complement to the

public economy." China also must have more democracy — socialist democracy — it says. It says democracy was lost during Mao's Cultural Revolution and notes, "Here is a grievous lesson for us to learn."

The people must have a greater say in their government at all levels and China must "gradually realize direct popular participation in the democratic process at the grass roots," it says.

China's legal system, too, must be improved, it says,

and the chaos of the Cultural Revolution "must never be allowed to happen again in any sphere." It said China must cherish the things that were damned during the Cultural Revolution: education, science, culture and intellectual pursuits.

At the same time, it said, China must counter "decadent bourgeois ideology."

"It is imperative to continue to implement the policy of freedom of religious belief," it said, but added that religious believers must not be allowed to propagate

anti-Marxist, anti-atheist views.

It concludes by saying China must bring to life the fable of the foolish old man who moved mountains.

According to the story, an old man tried to move mountains that blocked the view from his humble house. Each day he worked with a shovel. His neighbors laughed. In the end, the angels nodded and they carried away the mountains.

"We must work together as one," China's leaders said.

'Mo-Peds' Limits

Greenville Police Chief Glenn Cannon said today that local officers will be taking a closer look at so-called "mo-peds" in the weeks to come and indicated that operators of vehicles similar to mo-peds may face court action.

Under state law, a mo-ped is defined as a vehicle, "having two or three wheels and operable pedals and equipped with a motor which does not exceed 50 cubic centimeters piston displacement and cannot propel the vehicle at a speed greater than 20 miles per hour on a level surface," Cannon said.

Cannon pointed out that mo-peds are not required to be licensed and mo-ped operators, as long as they are 16 years of age, are not required to have a valid operators license.

However, vehicles not meeting all three requirements under the law, must be licensed and insured just as motorcycles, automobiles and other vehicles are. And drivers of vehicles other than mo-peds must hold a valid operators license.

of its committee's map was expected to force the issue into a conference committee.

The plan would move Durham County out of the 4th district and into the 2nd, while shifting liberal, Democratic Orange County from the 2nd district to the 4th.

In the Piedmont, the map would make major changes in the 8th and 9th districts. It would drop Iredell County from the 9th, making it consist of Mecklenburg, Lincoln, Union and Anson counties.

Edwards' map was strongly opposed by Hefner's allies, led by Rep. Aaron Plyler, D-Union, whose county would be moved out of the 8th and into the 9th. He said the plan "drastically changes" the 8th.

The committee also rejected one plan that would have divided a half-dozen counties into more than one district.

The committee's map varies by as much as 3 percent from the ideal population of 534,039 people per congressman, a variation that Edwards contended was close enough to pass scrutiny of federal courts. The variation is smaller than that of the Senate bill, which has a deviation range of more than 4 percent.

Here are the changes from the present alignment that the House committee's plan would make:

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Fourteen grain-laden ships were lined up in the port of Szczecin today but officials did not know where the grain should go because of confusion in state distributing, the government news agency PAP said.

Unloading was slow because there was no distribution list for the grain and receiving centers refused to accept more shipments because their storage bins were full, the news agency said.

While reporting the surprising grain glut in the Baltic city, PAP said many bakeries have cut bread output because they have little flour.

At the same time, cigarette rationing was imposed on five provinces and a sixth was to follow July 6 because of distribution problems, Polish media said.

The new reports of economic problems came as the government warned that food subsidies to hold prices are increasing at a "frightening rate." The government is talking about trying to raise prices again, is shipping more food to coal miners to improve production and is eliminating 300,000 public-sector jobs.

A commentary on the official Warsaw Radio Tuesday said the government will pay out \$7.6 billion this year to keep food prices down, nearly 30 times as much as a decade ago. The subsidy on meat, poultry and fats alone is running \$5.8 billion this year, the broadcast said.

"Our doctor, Dr. Dixon from Ayden, even made house calls, which is unheard of these days," added Mrs. Smith.

"And it brought our family much closer together," she said.

"We all worked together — Darlene even quit her job to help out."

"The Smiths admit it would have been difficult to keep up the constant care for an extended amount of time. "If a person were crippled or bedridden for 20 years, I don't know if anyone could handle that," explained Mrs. Smith. "But we knew it was terminal — we wanted to make her as comfortable as possible for as long as we could."

"The doctors said take it one day at a time," she concluded, "and that's what we did."

BASIS FOR SUPPORT DAR ES SALAAM, TGanzania (AP) — Tanzanian Foreign Minister Salim says most African nations will support the presence of Cuban soldiers in Angola while South Africa controls South-West Africa, or Namibia.

It Is The Act, Not Age, That Counts

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) —
The backyard argument over
a bicycle was the kind of
dispute 15-year-olds have all
the time.

But this disagreement
turned to tragedy with the
appearance of a 22-caliber
rifle: Chris Butler died of a
bullet wound to the chest,
and Bill Allen is charged
with murder.

Despite his age, Allen is no
juvenile in the eyes of the
law. Under a new state
statute, the teen-ager will be
tried as an adult. Armed with
a "get tough" approach to
juvenile crime, New York
prosecutors may now treat
children as young as 13 as
adults when they are accused
of violent crimes.

Before Sept. 1, 1980, a case
like Bill Allen's would have
been handled in family court,
where his interests would
have been the judge's guid-
ing concern and a five-year
confinement the harshest
possible sentence.

Now Allen, who has been
held on \$10,000 bail since his
arrest in November, faces
trial before a judge accus-
tomed to grownup defend-
ants. Prosecutors will not
consider him a boy, but a
defendant accused of taking
a life. If convicted, he could
receive a sentence of three
years to life in prison.

Since September, the cases
of 177 teen-agers have been
adjudicated in adult courts in
New York state; 22 ended in
murder convictions.

Several other states have
made similar changes in the
treatment of juvenile
criminals in recent years.
The American Bar Associa-
tion wants the states to enact
uniform laws that would
change the legal system's
traditional parental
approach toward young de-
fendants.

"The trend seems to be to
get tougher with the kids who
are most violent and more
lenient with the kids who are
least violent," said David
Gilman, who was head of the
ABA's juvenile justice pro-
ject before taking on the job
of revising New York's fam-
ily court laws.

Traditionally, juvenile of-
fenders have been treated as
delinquents rather than
criminals. In sentencing,
judges took into considera-
tion the accused's best inter-
ests and background — not
what the youngster did. And
their names were generally
not made public.

Now, "the trend is to make
the practice proportionate to
the seriousness of the harm
the child has caused," said
Gilman.

Hunter Hurst of the Na-
tional Center for Juvenile
Justice in Pittsburgh said the
revisions are being made out
of frustration and what he
called "an ill-defined need to
do something."

"New York state's laws
were not passed out of any
sense of optimism that they
would be effective, but out of
a felt need to do anything
about the inadequacy of the
existing system," he said.

It's not that there's been a
surge in violent crimes by

juveniles in recent years —
the FBI Uniform Crime Re-
ports actually show an 11
percent decrease in juvenile
arrests from 1975-1979 — but
that there is more frustration
with juvenile crime, Hurst
said. "The general mood is to
get tougher."

But putting juveniles into
adult courts does not neces-
sarily result in stiffer
punishments — the youth
brought into adult court often
receives a lighter sentence
than he might in family
court, he said.

"The seasoned criminal
kid, and there are such kids,
has his prior criminal record
read in juvenile court, but in
adult court he's just a
fuzzy-cheeked kid and there

is less inclination to bring the
world crashing down on his
head," Hurst said. "We talk
tough, but we don't want to
follow through."

John Gormley, the assis-
tant district attorney hand-
ling Allen's case, said adult
court is the place for minors
accused of violent crimes.
"You ought to get into the
adult system if you commit
adult crimes," he said.
"Absent some compelling
factor, if a juvenile is re-
sponsible for the death of
another individual he should
be treated as an adult."

In this upstate New York
city of 180,000, a jury has
convicted a 15-year-old male
prostitute of manslaughter
for killing a businessman.

After meting out a three-
to 10-year sentence, Onondaga
County Judge William Burke
said, "There is no question in
my mind that if he were an
adult, I would have leveled
the 25 years on him."
In other cases here, a
pregnant 14-year-old got a
three- to 10-year term after
pleading guilty to man-
slaughter in the stabbing
death of a neighbor girl. A
similar sentence was ordered
for a 16-year-old boy con-
victed of sodomizing a
7-year-old boy at knifepoint.
The teen-ager was on proba-
tion for assaulting a

12-year-old girl at the time of
the second offense.

Critics of the tougher new
laws say teen-agers prose-
cuted as adults often must
wait too long for trial and
seldom receive harsher
treatment than they would
have in family court.

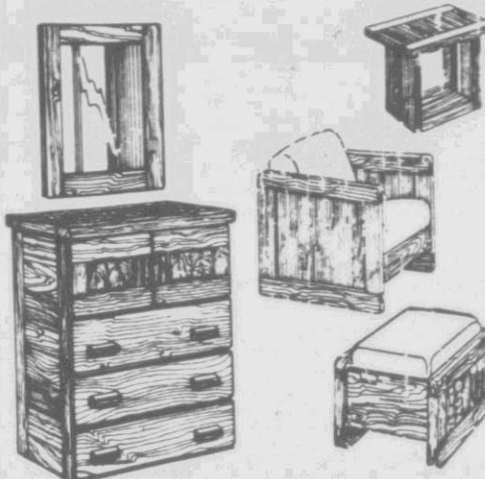
And other critics agree
with Flora Rothman,
director of the New York

Coalition for Juvenile Justice
and Youth Services.

"If 13- and 14-year-olds are
too immature to marry or
quit school or make con-
tracts, do they suddenly

grow up when they are ac-
cused of a crime?" she
asked. "Treating them like
adults may sound good, but it
won't solve the crime pro-
blem."

A Map-Reading Compass

ARDEN, N.C. (UPI) —
Something new for hikers,
backpackers, campers and
other outdoor types: a
pocket-size map-reading
compass unit consisting of a
liquid-dampened capsule
compass mounted on a rec-
tangular, transparent base
plate with integral magnify-
ing lens, map symbol
templates and a red nylon
cord neck lanyard. Cardinal
points — North, East, South
and West — are marked with
luminous dots for use in poor
light. The unit weighs only

Henry's Papers Being Edited

ECU News Bureau

Joseph Henry's experi-
ments with electro-magnets
little over a century ago
opened the way to develop
the telegraph and telephone.
Henry also discovered the
oscillatory nature of electric-
ity.

He became professor of
natural philosophy at Prin-
ceton and was a founder and
first secretary of the
Smithsonian Institution.
From 1868 until his death in
1878, he was president of the
National Academy of
Sciences.

A hundred years have
passed and Henry's papers
are being edited for publica-
tion as a public history pro-
ject in which a graduate
student in history from East
Carolina University is
participating. Harry S.
Warren of Wilmington is
serving as public history
project intern on the
Smithsonian staff engaged in

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market declined broadly today, continuing its week-long slump.

Losers took a 2-1 lead over gainers in the early rally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, off 29.68 points in the last five trading days, dropped another 4.37 to 972.51 in the first half hour today.

Analysts said traders appeared to have become restive over the stubbornly high level of interest rates.

Evidence has continued to accumulate in recent days of a slackening of inflationary pressures.

But interest rates in the bond market have remained high, in part because of heavy supplies of new bond issues.

Today's early prices included American Telephone & Telegraph, unchanged at 56 1/4; Santa Fe Industries, up 1/4 at 26 1/8; and Fluor, down 1/8 at 35 1/2.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average fell 7.71 to 976.88.

Declines outnumbered advances by a 2-1 margin on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 41.55 million shares, against 37.93 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index fell 43 to 76.15.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.18 at 374.63.

Donations Of \$122,500

ATLANTA (AP) - The families of 29 slain or missing young blacks have received at least \$122,500 in donations collected by two groups since the killings began almost two years ago, new financial disclosure reports show.

One report, made public Tuesday by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, indicated that the families of the 28 slain blacks and one missing youth have received \$106,000 in direct aid from the SCLC, an average of more than \$3,600 per family.

Two other reports, filed Tuesday with the Governor's Office of Consumer Affairs by the Committee to Stop Children's Murders, said the families received between \$618 and \$737 each from the committee, or a total of \$16,500.

The SCLC report, released by spokeswoman Marie Fletcher, was based on a just-completed audit of a fund the organization set up to accept donations for the families. That fund has been closed out.

The Committee to Stop Children's Murders' reports covered the period from October through March, but, according to the group's attorney, Don Keegan, the organization has received a flood of donations since March 31.

Those donations, which he said account for 60 to 70 percent of the total money received by the committee, will be disclosed in the next quarterly report.

Contributions have flowed into the city in response to the slayings, which are under investigation by a special police task force.

'Storm' Proved A Mild Disturbance

Tropical storm Bret dwindled into little more than a slight weather disturbance today as it reached the Virginia coast just hours after it threatened North Carolina with 60-mile-an-hour winds.

In its wake, the National Weather Service predicted unsettled weather for the next few days as a broad area of low pressure stagnates over the state. Moist air churned in from the Atlantic by the storm was expected to bring cloudy conditions to much of the state with scattered showers and thunderstorms expected through Thursday.

Along the coast, seas will remain rough for a time and small craft advisories are in effect.

Heavy thunderstorms pounded the Carteret County area early this morning, but showers were light and spotty elsewhere in North Carolina for the past 24 hours.

Tuesday, generally partly cloudy skies prevailed across the state. High temperatures in the mountains ranged from 73 at Boone to 86 at Murphy, while east of the mountains they ranged from 82 at Cape Hatteras to 91 at Rocky Mount and Raleigh-Durham.

Recreational weather outlook...Forecasters called for showers or thunderstorms at times during the next couple of days, in between bouts of sunshine. High temperatures were expected to be in the upper 70s to low 80s.

Beach weather was not expected to be conducive for tanning or boating through Thursday.

The program provides scouts and other youth groups with a wilderness experience for up to nine days that includes activities such as canoeing, camping, backpacking, wildlife observation, and environmental interpretation.

Suspect Kids Set 30 Fires

DETROIT (AP) - Kids "who want to see what a house on fire looks like" may have set 30 fires over three days in a neighborhood where people are moving out to make way for a new General Motors Corp. plant, police Lt. William Gray says.

"We expected this to happen," Thomas Trueman, chief of the Detroit Fire Department's arson division, said Tuesday of the fires.

An estimated 1,500 homes and businesses are being demolished, and about 3,000 people are being moved from the Poletown section of Detroit to clear space for the new Cadillac plant. No injuries have been reported in the fires.

Strike Talks Resume After 4-Day Hiatus

Bargaining resumed today for the first time in four days in the major league baseball strike which has almost certainly claimed the July 4th holiday weekend among its casualties and now is threatening the July 14 All-Star Game.

Unless a settlement can be reached by this weekend, it is unlikely that the players could return in time for the All-Star contest, scheduled for Cleveland Stadium. The players have said they would require 2-2½ days of workout time for each week of the strike, now in its 20th day.

An All-Star Game cancellation would cost the city about \$4 million in revenue, according to Cleveland civic leaders.

Fifteen games were wiped out Tuesday, pushing the walkout's toll to 236 since June 12.

On Tuesday night, Texas Rangers owner Eddie Chiles expressed displeasure once again with the efforts of the owners' chief negotiator, Ray Grebey.

Grebey had said last Saturday that Chiles and Edward Bennett Williams, owner of the Baltimore Orioles, were the only dissidents among the 26 owners. But Chiles replied: "Things have been so bad that maybe Mr. Grebey should take another poll and check to see if the owners really are backing him."

Chiles admitted, though, that he has not been in contact with other owners, didn't know how many might agree with him and would not say whether Grebey should be replaced.

In a strike-related matter, the Major League Baseball Players Association has filed default notices on behalf of eight players who contend they should be getting paid during the strike. Once such a notice has been filed, the club has 10



days to remedy the default or the player becomes a free agent.

The eight are Joel Youngblood of the New York Mets, David Palmer and Steve Rogers of Montreal, Bill Madlock of Pittsburgh, Larry Hise of Milwaukee, John Montefusco of Atlanta, Bert Blyleven of Cleveland and Bruce Robinson of the New York Yankees.

In the cases of Rogers and Blyleven, both players' salaries are paid over more than the six months of the season. The Expos paid Rogers and the Indians paid Blyleven under protest. Hise, Madlock and Montefusco say they have guaranteed contracts with no specific language indicating they would not be paid during a strike. Youngblood, Palmer and Robinson are on the disabled list (as is Hise) and say they should be getting paid.

The only positive sign in the strike Tuesday came when federal mediator Kenneth Moffett announced a resumption of talks at New York City's Doral Inn for 2 p.m. Moffett refused to comment on today's session or whether there had been any indication of movement from either management or the union which might have

caused him to schedule the session, the first since last Friday when talks broke off.

But it was learned that the full Player Relations Committee had met with Grebey Tuesday, an indication that perhaps the owners were prepared to make a new proposal.

Last week the two sides met three times. On Wednesday, the owners revised certain criteria for defining ranking free agents who would qualify for professional player compensation. They reduced their guidelines, saying that instead of 50 and 33 percent of all free agents requiring compensation, they would accept 40 and 25 percent. But Donald Fehr, general counsel of the players association, termed the change "minimal and not anything that would lead to a settlement."

On Thursday, the players answered the owners, modifying their pool proposal to allow teams to protect 36 players from their entire system instead of only from the 40-man roster. The players also accepted an owner concept that if a team did not participate in the re-entry draft, it would not be required to supply any

players for the compensation pool.

On Friday, the two sides met again with no discernable progress and no talks have been held since then. After the final meeting last week, Rogers of the Expos said the players would not return to the bargaining table until the owners had something new to offer.

But on Tuesday, Fehr appeared to back off that position somewhat, saying, "If we come up with something new and different, we're not holding it back."

Shortly after that, Moffett announced the new talks.

The renewed negotiations come one day after the players missed their first paychecks. The strike began June 12 but players were paid on June 15 for the games played over the first 11 days of the month. The average major league salary is \$180,000, about \$1,000 daily. That means Tuesday's missed checks averaged about \$15,000. They were more than that for the superstars and considerably less for the players earning the major league minimum of \$32,500.

Pitt Co. Steamrolls To 5th Straight Area I Title

Helped along by seven Wayne County errors and the outstanding pitching of Gordon Douglas, Pitt County's Post 39 American Legion baseball team romped to a 14-0 victory over Wayne last night and captured its fifth straight regular season Area I title.

Ten of the 14 runs were unearned, thanks to the ineptitude of the Post 11 team. Pitt, which got its first runs in the third inning, didn't get a hit until the fourth, and didn't get an earned run until the seventh when Emmett Walsh cracked a two-run homer with one out. Walsh also had a triple earlier in the contest to break Wayne starter Robbie Pelletier's no-hitter.

"It's good to win another championship," Coach Pat Smith said. "I'm really proud of these guys. They've done a fine job, and I'm especially proud of our pitchers. Tonight Gordon had a terrific game — he's pitched well all season. This is something like 18 straight scoreless innings he's pitched recently."

"But we've gotten good pitching all year, and I've got to give credit to (assistant coach)

Billy Davis for that. It's the strong point of the team."

Last year, after winning the championship with several games to go in the regular season, the team seemed to let things go and didn't win another game before the playoffs started. That has Smith just a little worried.

"We want to have fun these last three games, but we want to win too," Smith said. "The record is important down the road in determining who has the home advantage."

But that's not all that worries Smith. "I'm more worried about the fact that we have a bye in the first round of the playoff, giving us a week off. I don't especially like that. I'd rather be playing."

Pitt played almost flawless ball — only one error, late in the game. Douglas scattered six hits, never more than one an inning, and got two double plays, one initiated by Sammy Hodges and one started by himself, behind him. They were the 15th and 16th twin killings of the year for Pitt.

Hodges played an outstanding game in the field, having eight assists and three putouts. Twice he went deep behind first base to field grounders and throw out the runner going to first.

"Sammy has done a super job for us all year," Smith praised. "I don't think he's made hardly any errors this year."

Wayne did offer some threats. It left men at third in the third, sixth and eighth innings, and at second in the fourth. Appropriately enough, Pitt ended the game when Mike Winbush doubled to center and was thrown out trying to make it to third.

Meanwhile, after being kept off the bases for two innings, Pitt began to take advantage of the Wayne mistakes in the third inning, scoring twice.

With two down, Bill Kittrell reached when his grounder was errored. Mark Douglas' fly ball to right was dropped, allowing Kittrell to score and Douglas to go all the way to third. Then, when the relay to third bounced past the base, Douglas continued on home for a 2-0 lead.

Tigers May Know Fate By Week's End

ANDERSON (AP) — If the NCAA's enforcement committee adheres to its own rules, Clemson University could know the status of investigations into alleged recruiting violations by the end of the week, according to a copyright story in The Orange & White, a weekly publication covering Clemson sports.

The preliminary inquiry by the National Collegiate Athletic Association is into Clemson's recruiting of Knoxville, Tenn., football standouts James Cofer and Terry Minor late last year.

Both players later asked to be released from their Atlantic Coast Conference letters of intent and were granted their requests last week after a bitter struggle with the school.

During the struggle, both had written letters to ACC Commissioner Bob James listing alleged violations by the Clemson coaching staff and by T.C. Breazeale, a Clemson alumnus from Knoxville.

At least one of the two players also disclosed the alleged violations to NCAA investigator Michael Glazier.

In Tuesday's editions, the Orange & White, a weekly publication on Clemson sports, had an article on Section 2 of the "Official Procedure Governing The NCAA Enforcement Program."

According to the copyright article, Section 2 sets a six-month deadline between the time a school is notified of a preliminary inquiry and the time the enforcement committee can notify that school if the preliminary investigation will turn into a full-blown

investigation.

Clemson officials confirmed to the Orange & White that a letter giving notice of an informal inquiry was received by the office University President Bill Atchley the first week in January. The six-month period is therefore in its final week.

However, Clemson Athletic Director Bill McLellan, one of those who confirmed receipt of the notification of preliminary inquiry in January, said he wasn't sure about the exact meaning of the rules.

"I would like to think there is some validity to it," McLellan was quoted as saying in the publication. "I would like to say that at the end of six months it's over."

"From the initiation point, it has been," he told the Orange & White. "But I think they may also begin the six months at the time they visited us. I would think they could extend it."

McLellan was referring to a visit by NCAA investigators March 27-28, when the six-month countdown could have begun. However, the wording of the ruling says: "During the period of preliminary inquiry, the investigative staff shall inform the involved institution of the general status of the inquiry not later than six months after the initial notice."

Ken Vickery, Clemson University Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs, views the rule as "more of a goal than a requirement. They have such a backlog of cases."

Women's Semifinals At Wimbledon Set Today

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Hana Mandlikova remembers the occasion well.

"The first time I saw her play was when I was about 10 or 11," she said. "I once acted as a ballgirl for her."

Mandlikova was talking about her fellow Czechoslovakian, Martina Navratilova, the player she met in the Wimbledon women's singles semifinals today.

At age 24, Martina has done it all, winning Wimbledon in 1978 and 1979.

Mandlikova, five years her junior is the player of the moment. She holds the Australian and French titles and has overcome a back injury to reach the semis here.

Navratilova defected to the United States five years ago. Most of her subsequent achievements have been ignored in her native land. Her meeting with Mandlikova — they are 2-2 head-to-head — is certain to arouse immense interest in Czechoslovakia.

"Now it could be fun," said Navratilova. "The Czechs will have to give the match with Hana a lot of coverage."

The match also provides a chance for Mandlikova to answer her critics. They were legion when the 19-year-old was named as the No. 2 seed here ahead of Navratilova and Tracy Austin. Mandlikova's 6-0, 6-0

quarterfinal victory over Australia's Wendy Turnbull was the most decisive quarterfinal score in 56 years, when Suzanne Lenglen of France defeated Geraldine Beamish of Britain by the same margin.

She came into Wimbledon doubtful if her injured back would stand up to two weeks of intense competition.

"I thought to myself: 'Maybe next year,'" she admitted.

Now Mandlikova is one match away from her first Wimbledon final.

The other semifinal was between top-seeded Chris Evert Lloyd, playing in her 10th straight Wimbledon semi, and 18-year-old Pam Shriver, who upset Austin in the quarters.

Shriver is coached by former Australian pro Don Candy — the French open doubles champion 25 years ago — and credits him with much of her success.

"It is good to know somebody sitting there is 100 percent behind me, because out there on court is a pretty lonely place," said the lanky teenager.

Shriver attacked boldly against Austin and is expected to adopt the same aggressive tactics against Lloyd, who has a similar baseline style to Austin.

Fans Spending \$\$ Elsewhere

You say you want to see the Yankees? OK, you could head out to Jones Beach on Long Island in New York or to the Atlanta Civic Center.

While you're at it, why not hit the local amusement parks? Or plunk down your money at a nearby racetrack? Take in a museum or a movie. Go sightseeing. Or swimming.

Just don't bother heading for the ballpark. Baseball fans, stripped of their sport on the major league level because of the players' strike, are finding other ways to spend their recreation dollar. And they're discovering that summer entertainment does not begin and end with the baseball diamond.

For those fans who just can't stay away from the game—and those many Yankee-haters who have to find some way of booing baseball's most successful team—the musical "Damn Yankees" has provided enjoyment for years.

A current revival of the play is being staged at Jones Beach. Another version begins July 7 in Atlanta.

The Jones Beach version stars that old pitch and hit star himself, Joe Namath. In Atlanta, it will be Dick Van Dyke and Donny Most getting top billing.

Christopher Manos, producer of Theater of the Stars in Atlanta, predicts an all-time high in ticket sales for "Damn Yankees," the opening play of

the season. "I happen to think the whole baseball thing, the baseball connection, is helping," said Manos. "I think that those of us who are baseball nuts will take anything we can get."

Manos thinks the strike, if it lasts the summer, could help other plays at his theater.

"People do a certain number of things in the summer," he said. "If you take the people who predominantly go to baseball games, they're going to have to do something. I hope they'll come to us."

If not, they might be at places like Six Flags over Texas or Worlds of Fun. Those are amusement parks where the only baseball action occurs in computer games or batting

cages. Six Flags, a theme park located next to Arlington Stadium, home of the Texas Rangers, does not necessarily attract the same traffic as the baseball team.

"People do ask if the Rangers are in town when they call for tickets," said Steve Edmunds, a spokesman for Six Flags over Texas. "We feel people come to Six Flags first and then take in a game if they can."

Six Flags was the top tourist attraction in the state long before the Rangers existed. And, whether the Rangers are battling for a pennant or sitting on the sidelines on strike, Six Flags does a brisk business. Lee Derrough, general man-

ager of Worlds of Fun in Kansas City, Mo., noted that attendance is about 6,000 ahead of this date a year ago.

"It's picked up but nothing significant," he said. "The strike has taken the peaks and valleys out of our attendance. We'd like to have the Royals playing, though, because they only enhance the overall entertainment package of Kansas City."

Both Cincinnati and Atlanta are concerned about just that: losses incurred by their cities because a major attraction has disappeared.

According to Cincinnati Mayor David Mann, each major league game not played costs the local economy about \$900,000, which means that the strike has cost the city \$8 million so far.

In an effort to "reinforce that Cincinnati isn't just baseball," hotels are offering "two-for-one packages," a local brewery is staging free tours of its facilities and Kings Island amusement center has planned special package deals.

"Without baseball," said Mike Wilson, president of the Cincinnati Convention and Visitors Bureau, "we are trying to encourage fans not to cancel time here, but to look into other areas of the city."

Philadelphia is one city that seems to be experiencing an upsurge in tourist interest.

"It's hard to determine how many visitors come to Philadelphia to see baseball," says Sam Rogers, spokesman for the Philadelphia Convention and Visitors Bureau. "It's also difficult to say what people are doing without baseball but some local people are looking for other diversions."

In the fifth, and Auto Specialty tied it up with one in the sixth.

True Value went back out in the top of the seventh, scoring once, but again, couldn't hold it.

In the bottom of the seventh, Sterling Edwards led off for AS by reaching on an error. He stole second and scored when Doug Bray reached on an error, allowing Edwards to score the winning run.

Watson, Nicklaus Lead 'Classy' Western Field

OAK BROOK, Ill. (AP) — Four of the top nine money-winners are missing, but officials still insist this year's field for the 78th Western Open may be its classiest ever.

Tom Watson, Jack Nicklaus and Lee Trevino, generally acknowledged as golf's three best contemporaries, are among the 156 professionals who begin play Thursday.

Still, some of its glitter has faded with Raymond Floyd, Bruce Lietzke, Johnny Miller and David Graham all skipping a shot at famed Butler National Golf Club and its rebuilt greens this week.

Floyd ranks second, Lietzke third, Miller sixth and U.S. Open champion Graham ninth on the current money list.

"Nothing balances those losses," said Marshall Dann, executive director of the sponsoring Western Golf Association, "but it's still a solid, classy field."

"Naturally, you want them all to play, but that doesn't

happen." Nicklaus is making his first professional appearance at Butler National, the site of the PGA Tour's second oldest tournament next to the Open. Because of an 11-year absence from the Western, the game's all-time money champion feels he owes an appearance to the Chicago area.

Trevino hasn't entered the Western since he, Jerry Heard and Bobby Nichols were struck by lightning here in 1975.

Watson, another two-time Western titleholder, can expand his money lead by more than \$64,000 over Floyd, providing he wins the first prize of \$54,000.

The Player of the Year and No. 1 money-winner the last four seasons could become the first four-time champion this season, too.

Watson already has won the Masters, New Orleans and Atlanta titles in 1981, joining Lietzke and Floyd as triple victors this year.

While Nicklaus and Watson have fared well over these testing 7,097 yards, Trevino has struggled. He has been no higher than 17th in seven appearances, prompting him to crack: "If they played the Open here, it would take a full week."

Since the Western found a home at Butler National in 1974, its champion's score has been the highest four times for the Tour that year.

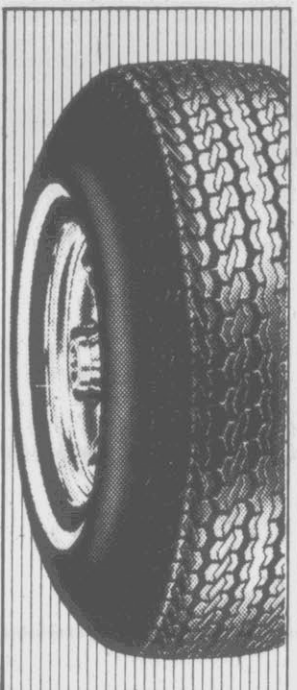

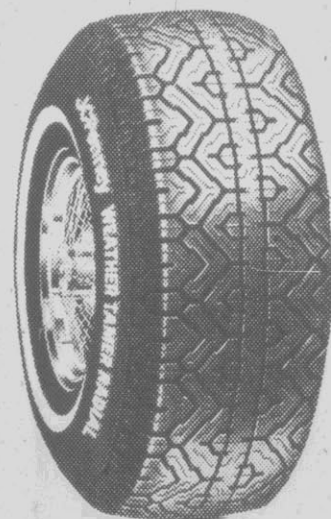

On Tuesday, Jimmy Connors thrilled the 14,000 fans at Center Court when he battled from near-elimination to continue his drive toward his second All-England Club championship.

"I never rolled over and played dead before, and I'm not going to roll over now," Connors said after he rallied to oust Vijay Amritraj of India 2-6, 5-7, 6-4, 6-3, 6-2 in a quarterfinal match that lasted 3½ hours.

"I was under pressure," the third-seeded Connors said. "I proved I could stay out there that long and keep plugging."

The victory moved Connors, who won the title here in 1974, into a semifinal meeting with Sweden's Bjorn Borg. It is the Belleville, Ill., native's seventh trip to the Wimbledon semifinals in eight years.

"If I play against Borg the way I played the last three sets, I can't ask for anything more," he said.

Borg, top-seeded, captured his record 40th consecutive match at Wimbledon in his drive toward a sixth consecutive championship, defeating Peter McNamara of Australia 7-6, 6-3, 6-3.

Third-seeded John McEnroe, who crushed Johan Kriek of South Africa 6-1, 7-5, 6-1, will play Australian Rod Frawley, a 4-6, 7-6, 7-6, 6-3 winner over American Tim Mayotte, in Thursday's other semifinal match.

down at Wimbledon and come back like that before," Connors said.

The smooth-stroking Amritraj, who has always given Connors problems and defeated him in the 1980 Tournament of Champions at Forest Hills in New York played perfect tennis in the

first two sets, hitting elegant ground strokes and putting away winning volleys when he came to the net.

"He played very well," Connors said of his opponent. "He is always dangerous for me. I don't know what he is going to do. He has such a short stroke that his strokes

are difficult to read." Connors found a way to combat Amritraj's dominance in the second set, lobbing effectively to the baseline. But he lost his lead when he lobbed long, then double-faulted to drop the set.

However, Connors found his

serve in the third set and, after breaking Amritraj in the fifth game to take a 3-2 lead, he dominated play.

"Once I won that game in the third, I felt comfortable and hit the ball with more authority," Connors said. "Amritraj was looking tired in the final set."

Shockers Said Charged With 100 Violations

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Wichita State University has been charged with about 100 rule violations by the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the Kansas City Times reported today.

In a copyright story, The Times said recent Shocker basketball teams are the target of most of the alleged violations, including "illegal financial assistance, extra benefits and improper recruiting."

The violations allegedly oc-

curred under the tenures of Gene Smithson, the Shockers' current coach, and his predecessor, Harry Miller, the newspaper said. Sources quoted by The Times said some current players figured in the investigation.

The sources indicated the allegations were similar to ones published in The Times in February. In a series of articles, The Times reported that Shocker basketball players received thousands of dollars in cash, clothing,

airline tickets and "forgotten" loans.

However, neither NCAA nor WSU officials would disclose details of the allegations, delivered Monday and Tuesday to WSU President Clark D. Ahlberg following an extensive NCAA investigation of the university's athletic program.

"We can't confirm or deny anything...that's our policy," said Hale McMenamin, assistant director of enforcement for the NCAA.

Ahlberg, while confirming that he had received the official NCAA letter of inquiry, also refused to detail the allegations.

"Some of the allegations appear to be minor, while others are more serious, involving illegal financial assistance, extra benefits and improper recruiting," Ahlberg said in a statement released Tuesday.

"We will investigate each allegation fully, an obligation we assume as a member institution of the NCAA."

The allegations, Ahlberg said in his statement, date back as far as 1975 and "appear to be about equally divided between the Miller and Smithson eras."

Last winter, the Shockers came within one game of making the NCAA's final four in the national tournament.

NEW YORK (AP) — That huge sigh of relief emanating from Athens, Ga., means that All-American tailback Herschel Walker and All-Southeastern Conference quarterback Buck Belue will be back this fall to help the Georgia Bulldogs defend their national college football championship.

Patriots Get 2nd Shot At Game License

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — The New England Patriots are going to get another shot at convincing Foxboro town officials that the usual 9 p.m. starting time is necessary for a Monday Night National Football League game this fall.

The Board of Selectmen voted unanimously Tuesday night to reconsider a decision that would bar the game with the Dallas Cowboys Sept. 21 unless the opening kickoff is moved up to 8 p.m.

The board agreed to grant the Patriots another hearing at a regular town meeting July 14 so the club can present further arguments for the 9 p.m. start at Schaefer Stadium.

Despite arguments that neither the NFL or ABC-TV would go along with any change in the normal starting time, the board voted 3-0 last week against licensing the Dallas game unless it began no later than 8 p.m.

The board acted at the time on the recommendation of its stadium advisory committee, which cited a higher risk of violence and rowdiness resulting from a 9 p.m. start.

The Patriots, who outlined several plans for greater security, were "shocked" by the action and formally asked for reconsideration. The board granted the request after a 15-minute discussion.

"We were treated fairly by all concerned and we know we'll get a fair hearing on July 14," Patriots owner and president William H. Sullivan said. "We had hoped to have the matter resolved earlier, but another two weeks will present no problem."

Sullivan, who did not appear at last week's meeting, spoke briefly before the selectmen voted to reconsider their previous action.

The Patriots requested reconsideration last Wednesday "so that we may present further arguments...and be given another opportunity to discuss this situation."

"At that meeting we hope that we could establish the importance of playing the game beginning at 9 p.m.," Assistant General Manager Patrick Sullivan, son of the owner, said. "We feel that starting the game at 9 p.m. and playing in Schaefer Stadium is not only important to the Patriots and the National Football League, but above all else is most important to all of the Patriots' fans."

A sellout crowd of more than 60,000 is expected for the nationally televised game with the Cowboys.

There was some doubt about that during the spring when Walker, a sophomore, was being wooed by the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League and Belue, a senior, was battling 348 for the Georgia baseball team with an eye on the major league draft.

"It was 50-50 all the way," said Walker, who is in New York this week along with Belue and 52 high school athletes from every state plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico who are being honored as Hertz No.1 Award winners.

"I listened to them," Walker, who rushed for 1,616 yards last fall, a national record for a freshman, said of the Montreal offer. "But I figured I was born in America and I lived here all my life and I had the opportunity to continue playing in America no matter what the classification."

Even turning down big bucks wasn't a problem.

"I don't need any money," Walker said. "Money won't keep you happy all your life. It takes more than money — it takes friends and family."

Belue, an outfielder who was drafted out of high school by the Chicago White Sox, wasn't selected in last month's baseball draft. That made it an easy decision to return to Georgia.

"A lot of baseball people wanted me to make a commitment before the draft," he said. "When it came down to it, I didn't really want to pass up my senior year. I've got a chance to be drafted again next year. The variables would have had to be 100 percent right for me not to be back at Georgia, and it didn't turn out like that. Also, your senior year in college is really special."

Belue, who worked at a couple of football camps this month, will be back in Athens in 10 days or so to start preparing for the 1981 season. Walker, meanwhile, is heading for Europe and a track tour — he's a world-class sprinter — and won't return to Georgia much before the start of fall practice in mid-August.

When Georgia, which beat Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl, opens its season on Sept. 5, Walker undoubtedly will be a marked man.

"I've heard people say that, but I never think about it," he said. "I just go out and play and whatever happens I'll try to live with it."

Both players know that Georgia, overlooked for the most part at the start of the 1980 season, will not sneak up on anyone this year.

"At the start of 1980, I don't think anyone really expected us to win the national championship," said Belue. "It will definitely be tougher the second time-around. A lot of teams will be gunning for us. But when you've been at the top, you always want to return. The only way to top last year is to do it again."

NAACP To Continue Its UNC Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Court of Appeals has denied a request for an injunction that would have prevented the signing of an desegregation agreement between the Department of Education and the University of North Carolina. But an attorney for the NAACP Legal Defense Fund said Tuesday he has not exhausted the legal options available to stymie the pact.

"Everybody wants me to say this is the last thing we can do," said Joseph L. Rauh Jr. "This isn't the last thing. We're going to fight this thing to the ultimate. Today they wouldn't give us a temporary stay, but we're confident of the outcome."

Rauh, interviewed at his Washington D.C. office by phone, said his next step would be taken Wednesday or Thursday.

"We are filing a motion asking the court of appeals here to expedite the briefing schedule, oral arguments and decision on whether Judge (John H.) Pratt has the jurisdiction over the violations of his own order by the Department of Education," Rauh said, adding that the filing could come as early as today.

The court on Tuesday denied a request for an injunction that would have prevented the agreement from being signed until the court could hear arguments challenging the proposed plan.

Rauh said Tuesday's action did not surprise him. "They almost never grant interim emergency papers like that," he said. "It was a long shot and the long shot didn't work. It's like going to the race track and betting on the longest odds. But you do it sometimes."

But University President William C. Friday disagreed with Rauh concerning the meaning of the decision. "This decision apparently removes the last judicial

However, Pratt ruled the proposed plan should be reviewed by a federal judge in North Carolina. No schedule for that review has been set, but the Reagan administration has promised to submit the case to a federal court in Raleigh.

WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes June 18-26.

HOUSE
PUBLIC RADIO AND T.V. — By a vote of 146 for and 265 against, the House rejected severe, Administration-blessed funding cuts for public radio and television during fiscal years 1984-86. The vote left standing less extensive cuts that will reduce Public Broadcasting Corp. outlays from their current \$220 million annual level to \$130 million in 1986. The bill (HR 3238) was sent to the Senate.

Rep. James Collins, R-Tex., sponsor of the deeper

cuts, said his amendment deserved support from "those of you who voted for the Reagan budget...who said you wanted to have a reduced federal budget."

Opponent Henry Waxman, D-Calif., said the severe cuts "would lead to the disappearance of exceptional public television and radio programs from the air."

Members voting "yea" wanted severe rather than moderate cuts in public broadcasting funding.

Reps. Charles Whitley, D-3, Eugene Johnston, R-6, James Martin, R-9, James Broyhill, R-10, and William Hendon, R-11, voted "yea."

Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, L.H. Fountain, D-2, Ike

Andrews, D-4, Stephen Neal, D-5, Charles Rose, D-7, and W.C. Hefner, D-8, voted "nay."

HOMOSEXUALITY — The House adopted, 281 for and 124 against, an amendment prohibiting the use of Legal Services Corp. funds to "promote, defend or protect" homosexuality. The bill (HR 3480) including the ban and funding the poverty law agency through fiscal 1983 later was sent to the Senate.

Sponsor Larry McDonald, R-Ga., said what while people "in their own personal lives can do as they see fit" it is wrong for Congress to "venerate that conduct by spending funds to protect those practices."

Opponent Gerry Studds, D-Mass., said the ban "is wrong and mean-spirited and it is unworthy of the members of this House and of this country."

Members voting "yea" wanted to stop Legal Services Corp. advocacy in behalf of the rights of homosexuals.

Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Johnston, Rose, Hefner, Martin, Broyhill and Hendon voted "yea."

BUDGET — By a vote of 210 for and 217 against, the House handed the Democratic leadership a major defeat on budget strategy. The vote, which pleased president Reagan, killed a Democratic plan to force separate votes to further massive budget cuts required when Congress in May approved the Reagan-blessed fiscal 1982 budget blueprint. Following this vote, Republicans hoped to

obtain a single up-or-down vote on Reagan's plan for cutting fiscal 1982 outlays by tens of billions. The vote came at the beginning of debate on HR 3982.

Rep. James Wright, D-Tex., a supporter of the Democratic backed floor procedure, asked: "Should we vote on a package dictated by David Stockman or on the provisions individually?"

Rep. Phil Gramm, D-Tex., an opponent of the Democratic plan, said: "This rule takes two-thirds of the president's program and throws it in the trashcan and takes the other third and breaks it up."

Members voting "nay" backed the Reagan position. Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Rose and Hefner voted "yea."

Johnston, Martin, Broyhill and Hendon voted "nay."

SENATE

NINE-DIGIT ZIP — The Senate rejected, 46 for and 52 against, an amendment to deny funding for the nine-digit zip code, which is scheduled to be introduced soon on a voluntary basis. The vote came during debate on a budget reconciliation bill (S1377) that was later sent to the House.

Sponsor David Durenberger, R-Minn., said "we do not object to automation of the U.S. Postal Service (or) to its productivity. We only object to the using nine numbers in the process of accomplishing it."

Opponent John Glenn, D-Ohio, said conversion to the longer zip code "is the best way we can get better productivity in the postal service."

Senators voting "yea" opposed the nine-digit zip code.

Sens John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, voted "yea."

CHILD CARE — By a vote of 46 for and 52 against, the Senate rejected an amendment to restore \$87 million the Reagan administration wished to cut from federal grants to states for child foster care, adoption assistance, and welfare services. The Administration proposes cutting foster care spending by 25 percent and combining it with other social services grants in a new block grant to states. About 110,000 children placed in foster care by state agencies would be affected. The amendment was offered to S 1377 (see preceding vote).

Supporter David Boren, D-Okla., said "some federal programs are so important as to require funding outside

the context of a single block grant."

Opponent John Danforth, R-Mo., said "The question is not whether we are turning our backs on needy children. The question is at what level of government will we vest the responsibility."

Senators voting "yea" favored separate grants for foster care.

East and Helms voted

"nay."

BUSING — The Senate rejected, 30 for and 45 against, an attempt to remove anti-busing language from a Justice Department spending bill (S 951) that awaits final action. The vote affirmed a proposed ban on the department advocating busing as a school desegregation remedy.

Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, who supported killing the ban, said "the Supreme Court has ruled that in-

voluntary busing is one option, maybe even the last option, that should be used" to desegregate schools.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., said "the American people do not support the forced busing of school children away from their neighborhoods."

Senators voting "nay" wanted to prohibit the Justice Department from advocating school busing.

East and Helms voted "nay."

Worley Named Chairman

Scott Worley, a member of the faculty since 1971, has been appointed chairman of the Department of Occupational Therapy, East Carolina University.

The appointment was announced by Dr. Ronald L. Thiele, dean of the School of Allied Health and Social Professions. Worley, an associate professor of Occupational Therapy, formerly was on the faculty at Ohio State University.

He succeeds Jean C. Pennucci who resigned as chairman to devote full-time to teaching and research, Thiele said. Worley was recommended by Miss Pennucci, the faculty and the dean for the chairmanship and his appointment is effective July 1, Thiele said.

Computers May Aid In Puzzle

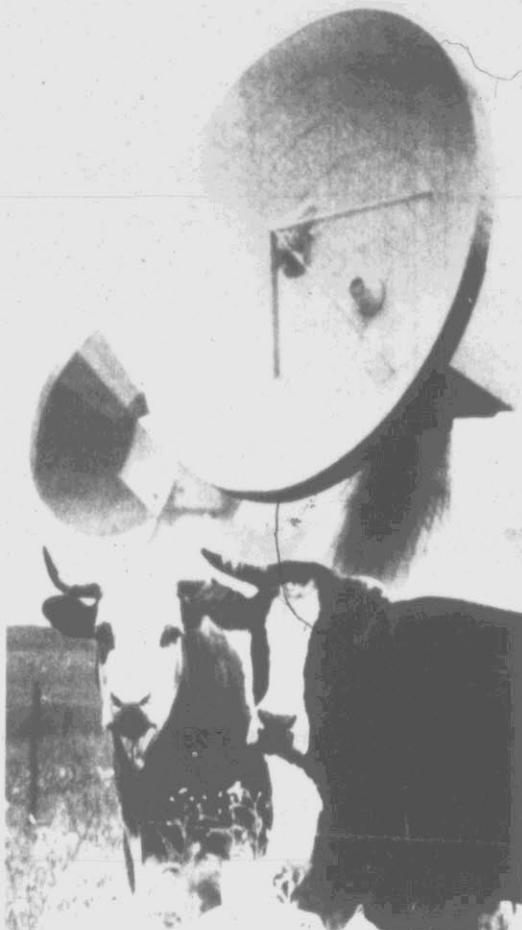
NEW YORK (UPI) — Computers may be used by medical examiners to help with the grisly puzzle of identifying mutilated victims of major disasters, according to a computer management information journal.

The computer system, which originated in France, attempts to match body parts to information provided by families and doctors.

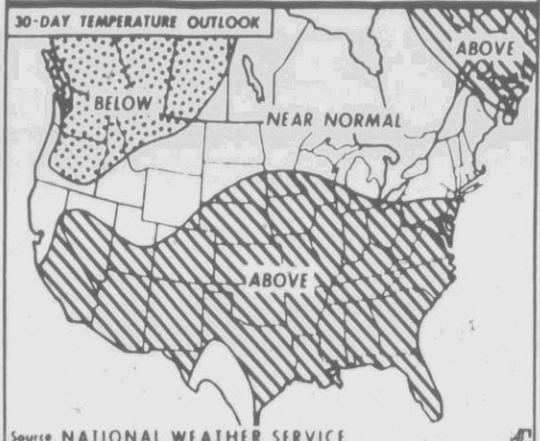
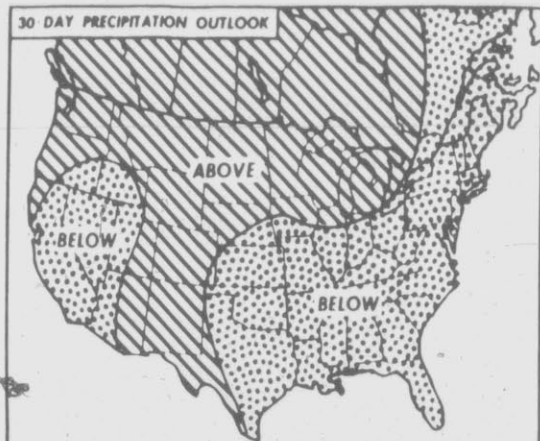
The system can use 29 different characteristics to identify a single tooth, such as fillings or cappings, said MIS Week. Similar processes are applied to limbs, hair color and body marks such as tobacco stains and nail-biting.

Once computers are able to narrow down a body part as belonging to one of three persons, examiners are able to check manually and narrow the field further.

17-Year-Old Ballerina's Career Appears Bright

WASHINGTON (AP) — What does a 17-year-old American ballerina do for encores after a gold medal performance at the Bolshoi Theater in Moscow?
 For Amanda McKerrrow of Rockville, Md., the next step is to get a driver's license.
 She likes driving, and besides it will "take all that pressure off my mother," who has chauffeured her determined daughter untold hundreds of miles to ballet classes in the past decade.
 Those who know her say Miss McKerrrow's decision is typical of her mature, sensible approach to her career — and her life. Her calm and poise have remained unshaken by the worldwide media acclaim that would have overwhelmed most women her age.
 Miss McKerrrow, who began dancing at 7 and became a member of the Washington School of the Ballet company only last year, was thrust into world

stardom last Friday when she tied for a gold medal in the junior women's division at the prestigious Moscow International Ballet Competition.
 She is the first known American-born, American-trained dancer to win a gold medal in international competition.
 The youngest of four children of Alan and Constance McKerrrow, her father is a retired administrator at the National Institutes of Health.
 Even before she went to Moscow on her first trip abroad, Miss McKerrrow had several firm offers, including an overture from Mikhail Baryshnikov, artistic director of the American Ballet Theater.
 But Miss McKerrrow is staying with the Washington Ballet next season.
 "She's very sensible, very intelligent," says coach Mary Day, artistic director of the Washington Ballet. "She knows she's not quite ready yet."

Miss McKerrrow knows she will have more opportunities to dance varied roles with the Washington company, where she began as a student three years ago. "I think I can still learn a lot more here," she said in an interview. "I guess we'll have to see what the future brings."
 The petite, blonde ballerina, who carries her 92 pounds on a tautly disciplined, 5-foot-4 frame, once regarded NEW YORK as the only place to go.
 "Going to Moscow, though, has changed my perspective," she said, wearing a lavender, wool warmup suit given her by Alla Yanshili, the senior women's gold medalist in Moscow.
 "I think I should eventually travel more and look at some foreign companies. My experience in Moscow made me realize how much I don't know about the dance world," he said. "For instance, the way they treat theater in Russia. There it is a way of life, a daily activity and they love it. Here it's a luxury and so expensive."
 "The training is so disciplined and there is a heritage of 200 years.... Their dancers are strong and lyrical and beautiful."
 It was Miss McKerrrow's lyrical grace, in the second-round duet from "Les Sylphides" with partner Simon Dow, that took the sophisticated Bolshoi audience by storm and won the couple eight curtain calls.
 Miss Day, who selected the ballerina's repertoire for the competition, said she chose "Les Sylphides" to show Miss McKerrrow's "particular lyrical quality.... It's what the Moscow audience appreciates, and it's what they spotted immediately in Amanda."
 It is a quality shared by all great dancers, Miss Day said, including Natalia Makarova and Gelsey Kirkland.
 Nevertheless, Miss McKerrrow said she went to Moscow hoping only to survive the three rounds of competition.
 "I don't do well when there is pressure," she said. "Over the years, my rule has been to work hard, do my best and let whatever happens happen."
 Miss McKerrrow does have her fantasies, however. Her dream partner? Probably Baryshnikov, although she's quite happy with Simon Dow. Her dream role — Juliet in Prokofiev's "Romeo and Juliet" as choreographed by John Cranko. "Oh, my heavens," she toast of the Bolshoi replied.

NEW YORK (AP) — Superman stole the show, and James Bond got a nice welcome. But there wasn't too much left for The Muppets during Hollywood's biggest weekend ever at the box office.
 Americans spent \$56,101,095 at the movies last weekend, the trade publication Variety reported today, making it the biggest single weekend in box office history.
 But like some moviegoers, a few new movies found they'll have to wait in line to enjoy the public's renewed interest in film. Action adventures like "Superman II" and "Raiders of the Lost Ark," which both opened in mid-June, continue to draw the biggest crowds — and the most money.
 Later releases, like Universal's "The Great Muppet Caper" and Paramount's "Dragonslayer," which opened Friday, didn't find expected audiences, movie company executives say.
 "The Great Muppet Caper," a sequel to "The Muppet Movie," grossed \$2.8 million during the weekend.

while "Dragonslayer" pulled in \$2.5 million. Both were aimed at the youth market.
 "We're disappointed," said Gordon Armstrong, vice president of advertising for Universal. "We thought we'd open like gangbusters."
 The original Muppet movie grossed \$32 million.
 "There are so many top films in the market place, films like 'The Muppet Caper' are getting the small portion of the pie," Armstrong added. "Looking back with hindsight, we probably should have waited a month to get out of competition with these powerhouse films."
 Not all of the weekend's new entries were disappointments. Columbia Pictures' "Stripes," starring former "Saturday Night Live" comic Bill Murray,

took in \$6.1 million. The new James Bond film from United Artists, "For Your Eyes Only," grossed \$6.9 million.
 While respectable, "Stripes" and the latest Bond adventure didn't approach the \$14 million that "Superman II" made in its opening weekend.
 "Superman II" continues to be the summer's biggest moneymaker. The man of steel has grossed \$36,389,529 in 11 days.
 "Raiders of the Lost Ark," meanwhile, has grossed \$34.4 million in 17 days, while Burt Reynolds' new movie, "Cannonball R7n," earned \$31 million in 10 days.
 Even though Superman's latest weekend gross was 50 percent below its record-breaking opening weekend, it continued to outdraw every

other film in the marketplace.
 "This past weekend, the grosses started to spread a little thinner," said Rob Freedman, vice president for advertising at Warner Bros. "Our big numbers are still heads and shoulders above everybody else, but they still have come down from the first week."
 Most studio executives say the box office rally is due primarily to the number of popular films now being released together and to the higher quality of this season's offerings.
 "You provide a good product, and people will come out and see it," said Frank Price, chairman of Columbia Pictures. The major league baseball strike has helped Hollywood, he added, "but I think that's a minor factor."
 More than 60 movies are scheduled to open this summer. Among those still to come are a new John Travolta picture from Filmways, "Blow Out," and

United Artists' "Tarzan," starring Bo Derek. Both are set to open July 24.
 Will Hollywood's hot streak continue?
 "The consumer is still the ultimate critic," said Gordon Weaver, senior vice president of worldwide marketing for Paramount.
 "If the consumer doesn't like a film, the word spreads like wildfire, especially with today's instant communications. Look at what happened to 'Heaven's Gate.' It took two days for word of mouth to kill that film."
 "Well, the same thing is happening now," he added "except that the word of mouth is positive.... I think this summer, with all these blockbusters out, will be the biggest summer ever."

Aching Backs Are A Costly Complaint

BOSTON (AP) — Bellhops and bank presidents say it. Steelworkers and stenographers say it. At one time or another, so does almost everybody else over age 30 — "Oh, my aching back!"

Low back pain is one of the most common and distressing complaints in the industrialized world, health experts say. It is one of the most puzzling, too. Eight of every 10 Americans will suffer from back pain at least once during their lives. They and their insurance companies spend an estimated \$14 billion a year on diagnoses, operations, rehabilitation and lost-work benefits to try to get rid of it. Yet, most of this effort will fail.

No one really knows what causes most cases of backache. And almost nobody is trying to find out. "It's safe to say that there is no other ailment as widespread as back pain, and there is no ailment less studied and, therefore, more mysterious," says Dr. Joseph Novak, head of rehabilitation medicine at St. Francis General Hospital in Pittsburgh.

Consider the statistics: —Currently, 75 million people in the United States suffer from back problems. —Two million Americans cannot work because of them.

—Back injuries account for 400,000, or one in five, of the nation's work-related injuries.

—Back pain is the most expensive ailment among Americans between the ages of 30 and 60.

—Insurance companies pay \$6,600 for the average back injury claim. Some cost more than \$100,000.

And yet, Dr. Alf Nachemson, a Swedish doctor who is probably the leading expert on the problem, laments: "There are hardly 20 people on this earth doing real, thorough, systematic research into the cause of back pain."

One reason for this is that nobody dies from a backache.

"Low back pain is not the glamorous type of research that draws a lot of people," says Dr. Stover Spook, a Harvard psychologist who conducts back research for Liberty Mutual Insurance Co. in Boston. "It's not a life-threatening injury. It happens to be very expensive and very uncomfortable, but it's not like doing research on cancer or something exotic."

Exotic or not, a backache is miserable. During the National Basketball Association playoffs this year, Celtics Coach Bill Fitch was suffering such back pain that he had trouble sitting on the bench for more than three minutes at a time.

"It might be described as man's most important non-life-threatening disease," says Dr. Augustus White, chief of orthopedic surgery at Beth Israel Hospital in Boston. "It's so common and has such tremendous impact on the quality of life. It can be terribly debilitating or just a damned nuisance. It can be very profoundly inconvenient and lead to a good deal of depression."

Mercifully, low back pain usually goes away by itself. Ninety percent of the victims get well within two months, no matter what their doctors do.

But for some, it is a lifelong affliction. Sometimes surgery helps, but it can also

worsen the problem. About 5 percent of back pain victims have ruptured, or slipped, discs.

Discs are rubbery shock absorbers that fit between the bony vertebrae that form the spine. As people grow older, the discs wear out and sometimes press against the spinal cord. Besides back pain, this can cause sciatica, a pain that radiates down the legs.

Disc surgery can usually relieve the sciatica, but in 60 percent of the cases, some back pain remains.

Nachemson and many

other doctors maintain that American surgeons perform too many disc operations. This kind of surgery is seven times more common in the United States than in Western Europe.

If the first operation fails, there is little chance a second or third will stop the ache. Yet some people undergo a dozen or more back operations in a futile search for relief.

"Sometimes patients get into a pattern in which they complain vigorously of pain," says White. "They see doctor after doctor. Sooner

or later, somebody finds a little something that looks irregular on the X-ray, or in desperation someone ends up offering them an operation. That can start a terrible saga of more surgery, more pain and more difficulty. I have known patients who have had 15 to 20 operations on their back, which is a tragedy."

Backaches are a hazard in many kinds of work. Truck drivers have them more often than anyone, but they are also common among people who do heavy lifting or have jobs in which they sit all day.

White says there is little anyone can do to avoid back pain. But "it appears that being in good physical condition protects against backache, even if the job involves lifting."

He recommends that people get regular exercise. However, those who have already had episodes of back pain should avoid sports that require twisting, such as golf, baseball and bowling.

N.C. Gasoline Prices Vary

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Gasoline is plentiful for motorists planning Fourth of July jaunts this weekend, but prices vary widely at different stations, says the Carolina Motor Club.

T. Ed Pickard, president of the 200,000 member club, said an audit of 168 service stations in North and South Carolina leads to the conclusion that motorists should compare prices before buying gasoline.

"From all we've been able to gather from this month's audit, motorists out on the road this Fourth of July weekend should be very circumspect in their fuel purchases," Pickard said.

"It wasn't at all uncommon for us to find a substantial price difference for the same grade of gas and the same type of service among service stations located within a stone's throw of

each other." The Charlotte-based motor club also says that full-service prices have dropped nearly a penny-a-gallon and that the difference between full-service and self-service facilities has continued to increase.

Prices for full-service in South Carolina average \$1.476 for unleaded and \$1.421 for regular, which is down by 0.8 of a cent-per-gallon.

Self-service prices in South Carolina average 10.6 cents a gallon less at \$1.377 for unleaded and \$1.309 for regular. North Carolina prices decreased an average of 0.9 a cent per gallon since May with unleaded full-service prices averaging \$1.441 a gallon and regular is \$1.396 a gallon. Self-service gasoline averaged 10.1 cents less at \$1.352 a gallon for unleaded and \$1.283 for regular.

Premium unleaded averages \$1.473 in North Carolina and \$1.506 in South Carolina. The motor club said the figures represent a 2.2 cents per gallon drop in North Carolina but only a 0.1 cent-a-gallon decline in South Carolina prices.

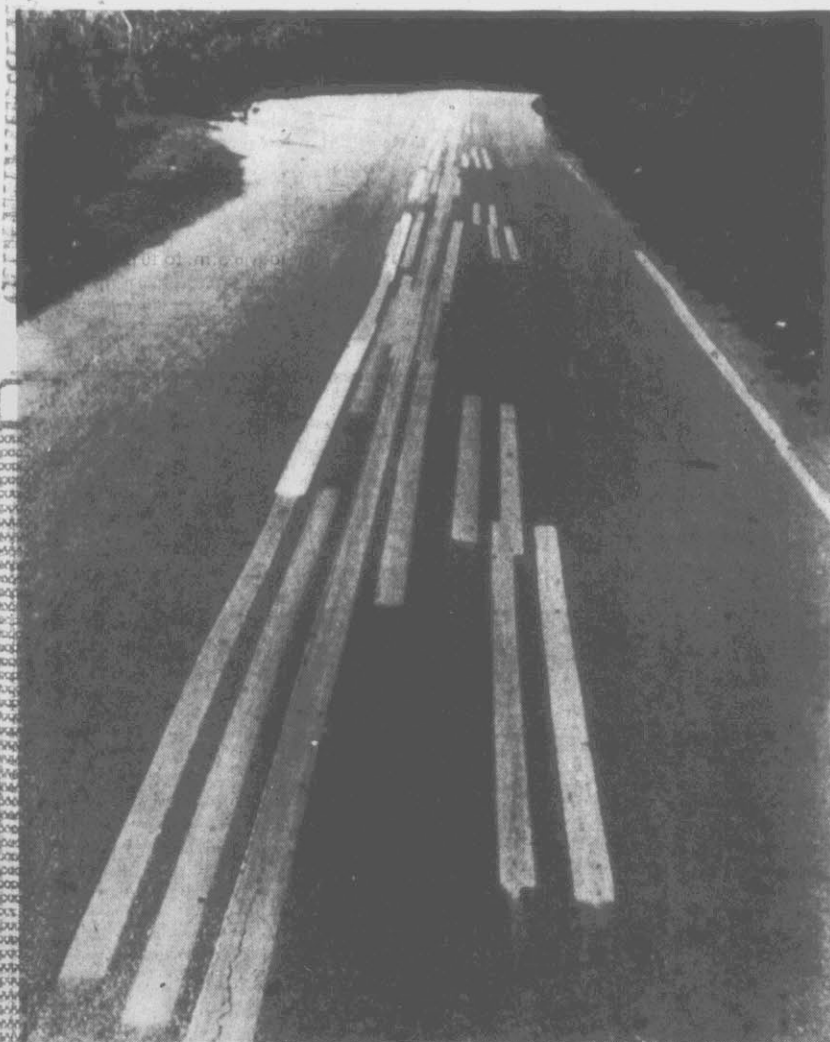
Exxon dealers had the largest decrease in full-service gasoline prices in June of 3.9 cents per gallon. Pickard said Exxon dealers now average the lowest price for unleaded gasoline in the two-state area while Phillips 66 dealers offer the lowest average price for full-service regular gasoline.

The audit of 168 service stations showed the highest prices for full-service gasoline are in Spartanburg, S.C., while the lowest audited prices were in Wilmington, N.C.

Approve Higher Flight Fares

WASHINGTON (AP) — Airlines have been authorized by the Civil Aeronautics Board to raise the ceiling on standard domestic flight fares by 1.2 percent because of increased fuel costs.

The CAB said Tuesday that fuel prices rose from just under \$1.04 a gallon in March to \$1.05 in May. It added, however, that it would maintain the new ceiling for six months because prices appear to be stabilizing.

In no dictionary will you find "obvious" as a synonym for "best." South eschewed the obvious line in favor of another that offered an additional chance, which successfully brought home a well bid game.

North-South conducted an intelligent auction to reach their best game. After South's jump rebid, North pinpointed his heart values in case South was interested in three no trump. When South confirmed spade shortness by bidding four diamonds, North simply converted to five clubs — he had bid his all.

West led a low spade to his partner's ace and declarer ruffed the spade return. A cursory glance at the layout might convince even a veteran player that the contract hinged on the heart trumps, for declarer had an unavoidable diamond loser unless he was fortunate enough to drop a doubleton queen. However, that did not offer much more than a 50 percent chance, and declarer wanted something better.

After some thought he found an improvement. He cashed the ace of clubs and entered dummy with a club to the nine, in the process drawing the last of the opponents' trumps. He ruffed dummy's last spade and then cashed the ace king of diamonds, in case the queen dropped.

When the lady failed to appear, declarer continued with another diamond. As he had hoped, the diamonds divided 3-3 and East had the queen. Now declarer could claim his contract, for East was end played.

If East returned a heart, it would be into dummy's ace queen. Declarer would win two heart tricks and his third heart would go on the long diamond. A spade would be no better, for declarer would discard one heart while ruffing in dummy, and another on the good diamond. In either case, the defenders could collect no more than one spade trick and one diamond.

Leasing Costs Have Soared

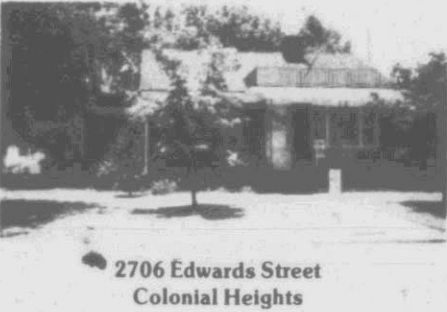

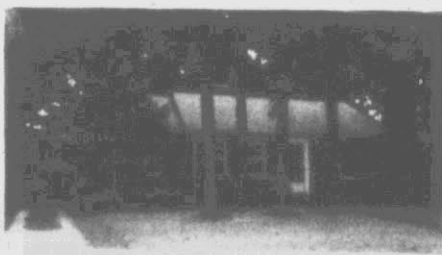

Tax Charges Used In Hub Cap Thefts

DETROIT (AP) — Michigan authorities are using tax laws in an effort to curb a multimillion-dollar business in stolen hubcaps. State Treasury Department auditors began examining the books of an auto supply company where known cargo thieves had taken stolen goods. The auditors obtained the names of people who had sold hubcaps to the company and examined their tax returns.

The case led to the arrests of 14 people for failure to report income from the sale of hubcaps to the retailer. Tax violation charges are pending against 32 others.

Convictions carry a maximum penalty of four years in jail and a \$10,000 fine for felony tax evasion. A misdemeanor conviction carries a one-year jail term, and a \$5,000 fine and payment of taxes owed.

The 14 arrests could bring the state \$55,000 in previously unpaid taxes, small change in a recession-plagued state that has cut more than \$350 million from its budget in the past two years.

But Attorney General Frank Kelley said Michigan could net \$1 million in taxes and fines if it could prosecute all cases in what he estimates is a \$4 million-a-year hubcap theft business in the state.

"We're taking this approach because it's the surest way to get at a serious problem," Kelley said. "We estimate that in the Detroit area alone, it's a \$2 million business per year."

Menu Is On Their Skin

PALM BAY, Fla. (AP) — When Dennis LeClerc bought a truck-stop restaurant that had changed hands five times in a year, he was determined to clean up the place and bring back good food.

But how to re-establish the clientele?

LeClerc and his public relations buddy, Dick MacMillan, came up with a gimmick: Put menus on the waitresses. Literally.

So, now, at Dennis' Truck Stop Rest'Ront, you stroll in and sit down. Either Bonnie Pedell or Judy Bishop comes to the table and asks, "Would you like to see the menu?"

If the answer is "Yes," the waitress flings open her robe to reveal a bikini and the menu — handpainted on her legs, stomach and back.

"Two Eggs \$1.35, potatoes or grits," it says to the right of Judy's navel. She pivots and poses, displaying numerous breakfast specials and other offerings from the kitchen.

LeClerc claims truckers are radiating the news up and down the East Coast, and he figures business is up 40 percent since the waitresses made their debut early this month.

"We have a lot of church people in this area and we don't want anybody to get the wrong attitude," LeClerc says. "We want to keep it clean here. The girls are wearing bikinis, just like what you'll see at the beach. It doesn't offend anybody."

LeClerc says most people take the innovation in good fun.

"I volunteered to do the lettering next week," said Frank Edwards, a retiree who lives near the restaurant.

LeClerc said several patrons have asked for menu men.

China Daily Tries Bring All The News

PEKING (AP) - For the foreign capitalists in its midst, communist China now provides the latest foreign stock market listings, sports scores and crossword puzzles.

It's all in The China Daily, the first English-language newspaper printed in China since the 1949 communist takeover.

Along with Chinese news, features and commentaries reflecting the Communist Party's views, the newspaper reports major international stories in dispatches from such foreign news agencies as The Associated Press, United Press International, Reuters and Agence France Presse.

Like the Chinese-language press, it has movie listings and television programs. Unlike Chinese papers, it has the crossword puzzle and major foreign sports events, including American baseball results - before the current players' strike, which it also reported.

Since The China Daily began appearing regularly Tuesday through Saturday this month, foreign residents and the 530,000 foreign tourists who pass through the country each year have been able to follow the Dow Jones industrial index or see the Yankees displace the Orioles from first place in the American League East.

They can take bridge lessons, too. They can also do that through the Peking Evening News - if they read Chinese.

The headlines in the paper's first regular edition ballyhooed China's invitation to its citizens' relatives on Taiwan, seat of the rival Nationalist Chinese government, to attend the funeral of Soong Ching-ling, widow of Chinese revolutionary leader Sun Yat-sen.

The most prominent headline since concerned Israel's bombing of Iraq's nuclear reactor.

The paper, which has a circulation of 30,000 and costs 7 cents a copy, also reported the non-amorous adventures in Washington, D.C., of the London Zoo's giant panda, Chia Chia, originally a gift from China.

It printed news service dispatches on the assassination of Bangladesh President Ziaur Rahman, political strife in Iran, the Socialists' victory in the French elections, Poland's economic turmoil, U.S.-Soviet disagreements, President Reagan's budget, a disastrous train wreck in India and prospective U.S. arms sales to China.

It did not report Reagan's denunciation of communism as an "aberration" which faces a quick demise. But it did use a Washington dispatch by China's official Xinhua news agency on Reagan's stated intention to keep selling arms to Taiwan.

The Chinese-language papers did likewise. But unlike The China Daily, the Chinese papers include foreign reports supplied only by Xinhua or their own correspondents, although they occasionally quote foreign-supplied reports in their dispatches.

While The China Daily gives more prominent play to foreign news than the Chinese papers, it must strictly follow Communist Party guidelines - it is published by the party newspaper, People's Daily.

The makeup of The China Daily is uncluttered and it uses photographs more prominently than Chinese papers. It carries letters from both foreign and Chinese readers. Its opinion page carries no editorial of its own, instead using translations from the Chinese press and an occasional commentary by one of its foreign helpers.

In one of those commentaries, Jack Steele wrote, "In the past, tourists and other visitors in China often felt as though they'd been stranded on a deserted island without a short-wave set. As far as knowing what was happening back home and in the world as well as in China, there was no way."

He said The China Daily "is aimed at catering to the news needs of tourists and a not inconsiderable foreign community. Any Chinese who wants to can buy the paper."

Migraine Link To Diet Raised

NEW YORK (UPI) — The pain and nausea of migraine headaches may be relieved by eliminating certain foods from sufferer's diets, British researchers report.

Studies of 33 people who suffer such headaches showed 22 of them were allergic to two or three of 13 foods tested, according to Family Health magazine.

Suspicious foods such as milk, cheese, shellfish, chocolate, coffee, tea and wheat were eliminated from the group's diet as it was given elaborate tests to search for allergies.

Most patients who cut out foods they were allergic to became free of headaches, generally within two weeks, the report said, while four patients found no relief.

Tooth Decay Is Preventable

NEW YORK (UPI) — Americans spend \$6 million yearly to repair damage from tooth decay, the most prevalent disease in the nation after the common cold, according to reports by the National Institute for Dental Research.

It said the disease affects 95 percent of the adult population and could be controlled inexpensively and effectively by prevention methods available today.

NEW YORK (AP) — Unlike thousands of other Argentines seized by the military in the last five years, Jacobo Timerman, former publisher of a leading Argentine newspaper, lived to tell the tale.

Timerman's newspaper, La Opinion, had been reporting on the growing number of "disappeared" persons and urging the military regime to use legal methods to combat terrorism.

On April 15, 1977, they came for Timerman.

In his recently published book, "Prisoner Without a Name, Cell Without a Number," Timerman describes the scene:

"At dawn ... some 20 armed men in civilian clothes invade our apartment in midtown Buenos Aires. They say they are obeying

orders from the Tenth Infantry Brigade of the First Army Corps ... They blindfold me, throw me to the floor in the back of the car, cover me with the blanket, stick their feet on top of me and jam what feels like the butt of a gun against me. No one speaks."

In an interview here, the 58-year-old journalist, now a citizen of Israel, talked of torture, anti-Semitism and the rise of savagery and barbarism in Argentina, a nation still regarded by many as the most culturally advanced in Latin America.

"When a country is attacked by paranoia, there are no rational answers," he said, speaking in heavily accented, but precise English. "A man is arrested: he has a notebook with names in it. Maybe some are just acquaintances. But they are arrested. Some are killed — maybe by mistake, maybe by bored guards.

"There were 600 leftist

guerrillas active in Argentina when the military took over in 1976. They killed more than 20,000 people. When they began to kill, they killed and killed."

Amnesty International puts the number of disappeared at about 15,000.

For six weeks the military government would not admit it was holding Timerman. Although no official charges were ever presented against him, he was held for 2½ years — first in clandestine jails, then public prisons and finally under house arrest.

Under intense international pressure, the moderate arm of the Argentine armed forces finally decided to expel him from the country, but only after stripping him of his citizenship and confiscating all his property. On Sept. 25, 1979, the armed forces moderates whisked him to the airport, accompanied by an escort helicopter to ward off a feared attack by rightwing military men opposed to his release.

His open admission that he was a Zionist may have saved his life, Timerman says, because his interrogators thought they had a key figure in "the world Jewish conspiracy" and wanted to save him for a show trial.

Timerman says his interrogators and a military tri-

bunal before which he appeared were obsessed by an irrational fear of Zionism. They accused him of being involved in a Zionist plot to take over the southern Argentine region known as Patagonia and turn it into the Republic of Andinia.

He emphasizes that most of those killed in Argentina were not Jews, but says he cannot forget the hatred shown him for being a Jew. He says he will never return to Argentina to live even if the military regime is replaced by a democracy.

"The memories are so painful. I wasn't treated as a political prisoner. I was treated as a Jew."

And he harbors great bitterness for the leaders of Argentina's 400,000-strong Jewish community for their failure to speak out when he and other Jews were arrested.

"The Jewish leaders in Argentina are repeating the experience of Jewish leaders in Germany when Hitler came to power," he says. "They are trying to compromise with their enemies."

(A spokesman for the Jewish Community in Argentina, Mario Gorenstein, visited New York the day after Timerman's book was released and accused the journalist of exaggerating the anti-Semitism of the military government. He said anti-

Semitism was an "endemic sickness" of his country but denied that the government was encouraging hostile acts towards Jews.)

Seated in a book-cluttered office of his New York publisher, his jacket off and thrown across the back of a chair, Timerman says: "I wrote many stories about torture. But when you are the one tortured you realize you had no understanding before of torture."

"You look so strong, people tell me," says the 6-foot-1 Timerman, now back up to 200 pounds after having lost nearly 50 pounds during his ordeal. "It is a lie. I haven't been killed, but many things inside me have been destroyed. I am being moved by many nightmares."

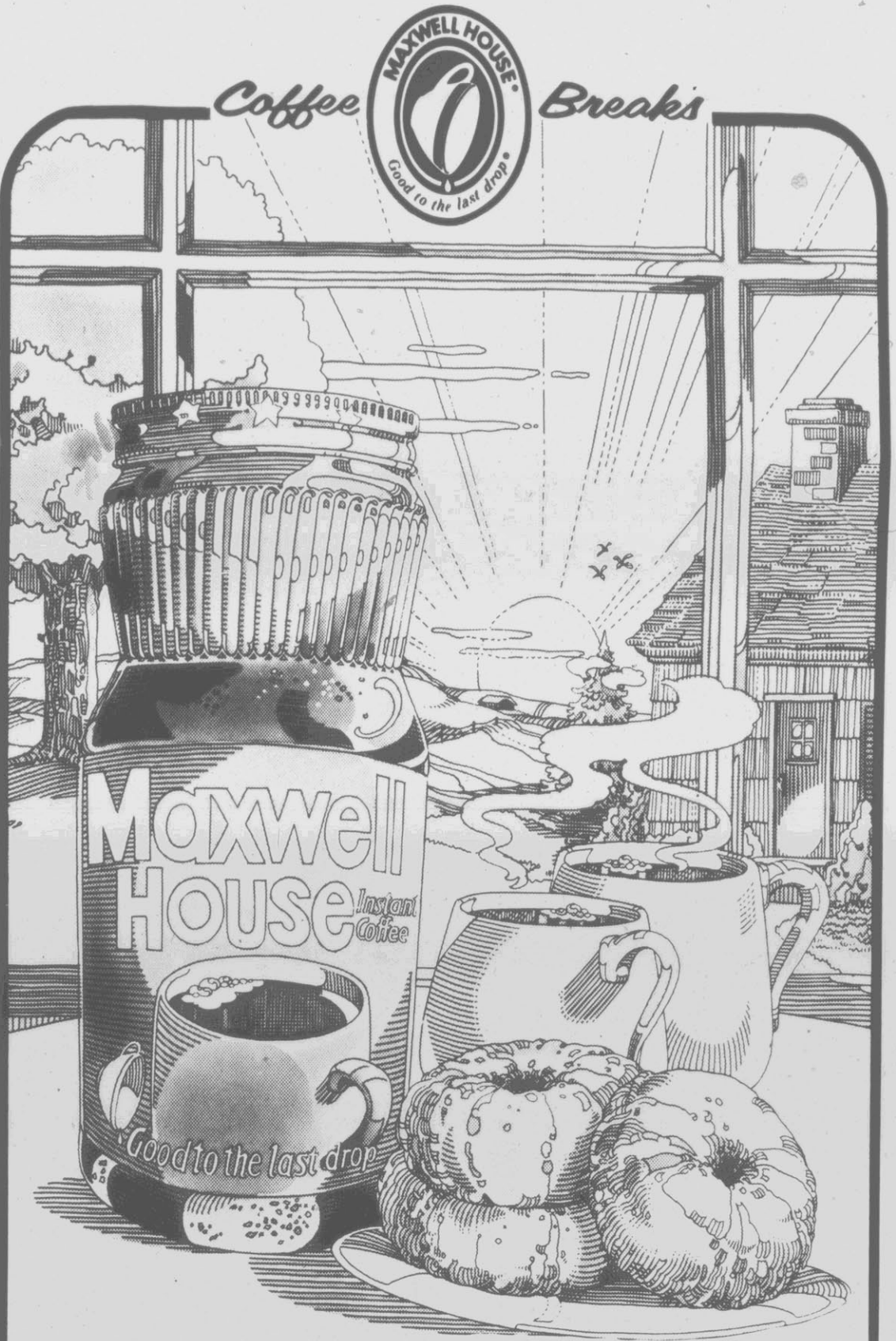

Cycle Jaunt Spans Globe



TIRELESS TRAVELER — Journalist and author Ted Simon took a 63,000-mile, 54-country trip around the world by motorcycle, an adventure-filled journey of four years.

NEW YORK (AP) — There's a fundamental difference between travel and tourism, as world traveler Ted Simon sees it — and that is vulnerability.

"To travel and profit by it so those you visit can also profit by it, you must make yourself vulnerable," he said in a recent New York interview. "The person who visits India for two weeks feels he cannot possibly make himself a hostage to fortune. So he drinks bottled water, doesn't shake hands with an Indian for fear of getting a skin disease, travels first class on trains.

"It's better never to go to India than to fly there for five days," Simon continues. "It's better to go slowly to some place close to home."

Ted Simon would be ranked a world traveler by anyone's definition. While in his early 40s, he spent four years going around the world on a motorcycle, setting out from London in 1973 and arriving home in 1977. His book about his experiences in more than 63,000 miles of travel through 54 countries, "Jupiter's Travels," was issued in paperback this year.

Simon, a journalist and writer, explains in his book that the idea of traveling around the world came to him one day "out of the blue," not as a vague thought or wish, but as a fully formed conviction.

The goal of the trip was not to achieve a tour de force, but "comprehension."

"The only way to comprehend the world," he explains in the book, "was by making myself vulnerable to it so it could change me."

So Simon made himself vulnerable — staying with people he encountered along the way like the young Tunisian he met on a ferry from Italy; having moments of pure joy like the smile an Ethiopian woman gave him as he passed her on a road one day.

"It shone," he says of that

smile, "it beamed towards me with such life and depth that I was her son, her lover, her saviour, all in one."

He had his fearful moments too — including more than a week in custody in Fortaleza, Brazil, for reasons that were never clear except that perhaps his name resembled that of another man who was "wanted."

Simon's kind of travel can be addictive, he conceded in the interview. "It's a sort of Flying Dutchman syndrome." Part of the addiction is the feeling you get in far-away places that you can be "un-responsible" — which, Simon emphasizes, doesn't mean "irresponsible." There's also the warm welcome you get. "People can be as generous as they like to you today," he said, "because you won't be there tomorrow sponging on them."

Like other addictions, Simon added, the Flying Dutchman syndrome can be handled with the "cold turkey" treatment. He's planning to treat his own case by writing another book — about aspects of his trip that he didn't cover in the first one, such as Chile right after the generals took over, and his experiences in Argentina.

Simon, born in Germany, brought up in England and long a resident of France, has bought himself 40 acres in a valley in California's Mendocino County, where he'll think out his book.

He explains his choice of Mendocino County by noting that his travels made him a "landscape freak." The open country of South America, Australia and elsewhere "impregnated my soul. Northern California is the closest I could get to such landscape and still be near a top cultural center."

He concedes that this landscape living is quite an adjustment for his wife, formerly in publishing in London. But she has their baby son to keep her busy.

British See Wedding Bonanza

LONDON (AP) — Monks, brickmakers and even the bridegroom's mother are among thousands of Britons profiting from a \$1.2 billion souvenir and tourism bonanza created by the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer.

Foreign visitors for the wedding July 29 are expected to spend more than \$400 million, says Michael Montague, chairman of the English Tourist Board.

Ring up \$800 million more in souvenir sales, according to manufacturers' estimates, and the wedding adds up to a welcome boost for recession-hit Britain, where one worker in nine is unemployed.

"Bless the bride for this business bonanza," chortled the patriotic London Daily Express.

"It's a short-term but much needed boost," said Kenneth Burton, sales director of Crown Staffordshire, a pottery maker turning out souvenirs by the thousands.

Sales of tasteful mementos in glass and china are "beyond all expectations," says Harrods, the

Knightsbridge department store where Queen Elizabeth II does her shopping.

Unlicensed vendors selling illegally out of suitcases along Oxford Street report the same. Keeping a constant watch for police, they hawk T-shirts, mugs, towels and other items carrying royal emblems or pictures of Charles and Diana.

At Queen Elizabeth II's Sandringham estate, 90 miles northeast of London, visitors have a choice of 60 different wedding souvenirs. They range from pencils with a commemorative inscription selling for 20 cents to glass goblets bearing portraits of her son and future daughter-in-law at \$70.

The shop, which employs 40 villagers, helps meet the upkeep of the estate. In an average year 200,000 tourists pay \$2.20 to tour the house and grounds, but this year bookings are up 50 percent.

Press allegations that Diana's father, Earl Spencer, her stepmother Raine and her step-grandmother, romantic novelist Barbara Cartland, were "cashing in" on the wedding brought angry denials.

The bride's relations said

the "Barbara Cartland Romantic Tour of England," offered wealthy American women at \$1,399 each not including air fares, was arranged two years before the engagement of Charles and Diana was announced Feb. 24. It includes tea with Miss Cartland at her home and lunch with the Spencers at ancestral Althorp Hall in Northamptonshire.

The wedding has brought many extra tourists to the 473-year-old Spencer estate at \$2 each plus whatever is spent in the tea room, tourist and wine shops. As many as 900 a day now arrive on weekends.

There were nearly a million foreign tourists in London last July, and Montague said the wedding is

expected to attract an extra half million this year.

Hotels and restaurants are organizing special events for the wedding day with traditional English roast beef, staff in period costume and yards of bunting. The Savoy Hotel is throwing a \$300-a-couple "wedding ball" that will include a champagne reception, dinner, cabaret, dancing and breakfast.

The monks at the Prinknash Abbey pottery near Cheltenham, 90 miles northwest of London, have \$200,000 worth of orders for 30,000 commemorative plates, mugs and goblets. The profits go toward the upkeep of the monastery.

For \$3, brickmakers Barnett and Beddows at

Walsall are selling souvenir bricks in a tasteful blue inscribed "Charles and Diana 29th July 1981." They sold 1,000 in the first week of production and will gift wrap at no extra charge.

One count put the number of different souvenirs on sale at around 1,600.

There's even a free one — a foil milk-bottle top from Star Aluminium Co., printed with wedding bells and "Congratulations Charles and Diana."

Next cheapest is a box of matches which costs 10 cents and says on the label "The match of the year."

Among the most expensive is a silver jug for \$5,500 by the royal jeweler Garrard.

One of the oddest is a baby-size Union Jack flag with a rattle in the stick.

Ratchet-Wrench Man Tries Live Down Fame

RED BANK, Tenn. (AP) — Sometimes in the evenings, Peter Roberts' friends drop by his split-level house in this suburb of Chattanooga to "drink a beer and play some pinball."

Sound like a millionaire's life? Well, he's the inventor who waged a nine-year battle against the country's No. 1 retail giant and won. Sears, Roebuck and Co. paid him \$1 million in damages in a dispute over his quick-release ratchet wrench.

That was three years ago, and Roberts now is trying both to live down his fame and to battle Sears for more money from his patented socket wrench that can be used with one hand.

"People think you sit in the house and play with \$100 bills," he said in a recent interview. "People are ignorant."

"I just want to be me," said Roberts, 36. "I just want a private life ... It took me a while to get over the first batch of publicity."

Roberts was an 18-year-old sales clerk at a Sears store in Gardner, Mass., when he invented and produced the wrench in his spare time. He obtained a patent and

assigned it to Sears for \$10,000.

He then joined the Air Force. While he was stationed in England, he saw a Sears catalog and was astounded at the display the wrench got because the company had led him to believe the tool had only minor sales potential.

But from 1965 to 1975, the Chicago-based retail giant sold more than 19 million of the wrenches for a net profit of more than \$44 million.

"I was real young, and when you're young, you may tend to trust people too much," Roberts once said, explaining why he took the Sears offer.

Roberts sued Sears in 1969 seeking to rescind the agreement under which he assigned the patent to the company and asking for damages. In 1978, a federal jury found against Sears and awarded Roberts \$1 million in damages.

Roberts also asked that the court force Sears to pay him the profits earned on the tool. U.S. District Judge George Leighton ruled in his favor, ordering Sears to return the patent and the profits to Roberts.

With Sears' profits on the tool totaling more than \$44

million, Roberts' payoff, with interest, was estimated at \$60 million.

But Sears appealed Leighton's order, Roberts lost the appeal and the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear the case last November.

Roberts' lawyer, Louis Davidson of Chicago, now is trying to prove that Sears infringed upon the patent. He declined to estimate how much Roberts could be awarded if he wins this case, now pending in U.S. District Court. But the amount could easily be more than the original \$1 million award, he said.

The plan includes information on standards for non-medical and medical residential facilities for SSI recipients, a system for enforcing standards, and names and addresses of standard-setting authorities who will respond to requests for information on standards, enforcement, waivers, and identity of deficient facilities.

INCOME ELIGIBILITY LEVELS for each service are described in the proposed plan. Maximum income eligibility levels are adjusted by family size based on the maximum amount of income allowable for a family of four (\$16,252 per year).

WRITTEN COMMENTS on the proposed plan will be accepted during the public comment period beginning July 1, 1981, and ending August 14, 1981, at the address listed below. The public may review the proposed plan at any county department of social services.

Snake Helps Cure Fear Of Reptiles

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Irrational fear of snakes is no Freudian hang-up. The phobia can be cured, a University of Oklahoma psychologist says, in two hours, with a 90 percent chance of success.

David Mitchell, clinical psychologist at the university's counseling center, says he has, with a little help from George, treated people with a disabling fear of reptiles.

As part of the treatment, people who fear snakes so much that they cannot raise their eyes from the ground to watch a country sunset, must reach out their hands and touch George, a 42-inch yellow rat snake who lives in a blue-and-white cut-off milk carton in Mitchell's office.

Sigmund Freud treated fear of snakes as a symptom of deeper psychological conflict, Mitchell says. Using Freudian techniques, it might take a psychiatrist two years or more to reach the root of the patient's problem, and even then, the chance of success was only 33 percent.

But Mitchell and other cognitive behavioralists believe snake phobia is something you learn, not a symbol of inner problems. "It can be conceptualized alone as a singularly learned thing," Mitchell says. "That's why it is easy to treat. It's not associated with learning, or sex, or other problems of life. One of my jobs is helping them understand the simplicity of their problem."

Ironically, the irrational fear of snakes is strengthened by a rational fact: unlike the imagined terrors of childhood, poisonous snakes exist.

"Normally we become afraid of bogymen, or ghosts, or Satan," Mitchell says. "We test out that fear and find there is nothing to be afraid of. In the case of snakes, there is a secondary reinforcement which keeps the fear going. The person interprets that 'my fear protects me, because I've never been bitten by snakes. So it's good to have this fear.'"

Mitchell estimates 5 percent of all Americans have an extreme fear of snakes, and the phobia can narrow their lives.

A photographer told Mitchell: "I'm always looking at the ground and missing shots."

A father: "I'm missing out on a lot of things. My children want me to take them fishing."

A mother, who moved to Oklahoma from the north, where there are fewer snakes, and thus less snake phobia: "I've been in Oklahoma three months and I haven't seen it yet. I'm always looking at the ground watching for snakes."

"I've had people say they can't read a magazine because there might be a picture of a snake," Mitchell says.

Mitchell's treatment combines fact and imagination. Learning that snakes "can't jump across the room and get you" helps lessen the fear, he says.

Through a technique called "flood therapy," Mitchell has his "clients" — a term he prefers to the disease-related "patient" — close their eyes as he leads them through their imagined fears.

"You're on a camping trip, and there's a snake on the ground, and he strikes. Then they open their eyes and find out nothing has happened."

In the third phase of Mitchell's counseling, which "seems to be the most powerful," an individual who is deathly afraid of snakes touches Mitchell's yellow rat snake. It's a gradual process, Mitchell says.

At first, the client wears a heavy protective glove as he approaches the snake. Then he switches to progressively lighter gloves until he touches the snake while wearing thin surgical gloves, which provide almost no protection, Mitchell says.

At that point, the client's real fear of snakes remains, but his imagined fears, of snakes as a kind of bogeyman, are gone.

Worst Food In Oregon Is Place-Name

HINES, Ore. (AP) - Betty and Bernie Hannaford cheerfully offer Roloids to customers who eat at their Worst Food In Oregon restaurant in this eastern Oregon wayside.

"It's the worst food you ever ate," says the 53-year-old Mrs. Hannaford. "Service is worse," adds her husband, 56. That's the name of the place - "The Worst Food in Oregon." The signs bring abashed motorists in for a cheap meal - and back for more.

"They can't pass the place up," proclaims Hannaford, who does the cooking while his wife waits on the five small tables and eight counter spots.

The menu urges eaters to "Come in and sit with the flies," although none of the critters was flitting about the spotless premises.

The Hannafords have run the place for 11 years. They live in a mobile home a soggy meatball's throw from the one-story building.

It can't be said the two haven't had a chance to develop their culinary skills. Hannaford was a grocer, and the couple ran diners in Florida and Wagontire, Ore.

Previous owners, says Hannaford, hadn't had much success with the restaurant. When the Hannafords bought it, business was a little slow for the first few days, until the signs went up.

"I don't know how I came up with it," he says. "I was thinking (of calling it) the best, like a lot of restaurants do. I said the hell with that. I'll go with the opposite."

Actually, the food isn't the worst. The portions are generous and the prices are low, circa 1970. The Hannafords sell ham'n'eggs for \$1.60 and a full rib dinner for about \$3.50.

And the word has gotten out.

Hannaford says a well-heeled couple from Salem, 250 miles to the west, heard of the place in Tokyo, several thousand miles further west.

Many an unsuspecting motorist, believing in truth in advertising, takes the Hannafords at their word and comes in to see, says Hannaford.

"My father always taught me to tell the truth, no matter how much it hurt me," he says with a sheepish grin.

Diners even ask what the "chef" recommends. The Hannafords advise them to take their money and spend it at another restaurant down the road.

The couple also cashes in on another advantage - location. The cafe is strategically located as the last place for westbound motorists to eat before striking out over 63 miles of U.S. 20 in sagebrush-covered eastern Oregon high desert.

The way things are going, The Hannafords could stand a little expansion.

"It's a little hole in the wall, but I could double the size of the building," says Hannaford.

"That's all we need," says his wife. "More customers."

Plan Saving Forest And Cut Timber

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — A jungle towering to 145 feet, its trees laced with vines and orchids, will soon be settled by peasant farmers.

Usually that would spell the end of a tropical forest. This time, however, the farmers will be part of a project to save the forest while using it to boost their income.

They'll cut the trees, but only in sections small enough to reseed themselves or be replanted and still maintain the wide diversity unique to tropical rainforests.

Details of the project are still being worked out, but the farmers will either be paid for their timber-cutting or sell the wood themselves. They'll also be able to work on roads and other improvements and probably have small plots for crops.

The experiment, planned to begin late this year with about 80 peasant families moving into the Sarapiquí forest north of here, is believed to be the first of its kind in the Americas.

"This is the first attempt anywhere, in places where there are tropical forests, to demonstrate that it is both ecologically and economically practical to manage a native tropical American forest," said Gary Hartshorn of the Tropical Science Center here.

"The classic attitude toward the forest throughout the tropics is that it's worthless — that you have to cut it down to improve the land," he said.

Tropical rainforests around the world are gradually being cleared for pasture, cropland or firewood or replaced by plantations of one species. Even in Costa Rica — considered progressive in conservation because of a national park system which covers 3.5 percent of its land — more than 40 percent of the dense forest cover disappeared between 1950 and 1977. At that rate, it will all be gone by the turn of the century.

One of the most unusual aspects of the project will be clear-cutting, or removing all the trees in an area, says Steve Knabel, local director of the U.S. Agency for International Development. AID and the Costa Rican government are financing the project.

Farmers will clear-cut in long, narrow strips, perhaps 2.5 acres a year in a 150-acre plot. The cuts will be narrow enough to be reseeded by the surrounding forest, Hartshorn said.

Other experimental techniques will include several methods of selective logging — cutting commercially valuable trees of a minimum size — and letting the forest reseed itself, or replanting desirable species.

Because tropical rainforests have so many different kinds of trees — about 75 on an average 2.5 acres in the Sarapiquí project area and even more in more tropical regions — they are difficult to develop commercially. Only about 20 of those 75 are exploited now, but part of the project will be to search for new uses, Hartshorn said.

Loss of the Sarapiquí forest, Hartshorn said, would threaten 20 to 30 kinds of trees and hundreds of other plants and animals, including a wild relative of the cacao plant used in making chocolate. Like the wild relatives of corn and other domestic plants, it may someday be needed to create new disease- and pest-resistant varieties.

Without the project, the farmers would probably clear the forest for pasture or to sell to larger landholders. Farmers in the area earn about 600 to 800 U.S. dollars a year, many of them as sharecroppers.

Peter Ashton, director of the Arnold Arboretum at Harvard, said the research done in Costa Rica would be most applicable in forests in South America, particularly along the foothills of the Andes in Ecuador, Colombia and Peru, which also have volcanic soils.

The five-year project is one part of a \$21 million, five-part AID land management program which would eventually involve one-fifth of the country.
