

Fascinating Insights Into Earlier N.C. History

Of Tar Heel Towns, Shipbuilders, Reconstructionists and Alliancemen — Papers in North Carolina History. 1981. Greenville. East Carolina University Publications, Department of History. Paper, 126 pages, illustrated. \$4.95

In this fifth volume of ECU publications in history, four faculty members have contributed papers which significantly add to our understanding on developments in the course of Tar Heel history.

Donald R. Lennon's topic is "The Development of Town Government in Colonial North Carolina." William N. Still writes about "The Shipbuilding Industry in Washington, North Carolina." Charles L. Price focuses on "John C. Barnett, Freedmen's Bureau Agent in North Carolina." and Lala Carr Steelman, in the longest of the four studies, writes on "Leonidas LaFayette Polk, North Carolina Alliancemen, and Some Conflicts of Agrarian Leadership, 1887-1892."

As a first comment on this volume, I will cite the statement of purpose in the preface by Fred D. Ragan, chairman of the Department of History. Ragan says "when the series was established, it was anticipated that it would not only offer members of the faculty and graduates an additional avenue for publication of the results of their research but also would keep the scholarly community aware of the department's dedication to the expansion of historical knowledge." A valid consideration, yet one that does not express the possibility of interest in the general, non-scholarly community.

I have not read the previous four volumes, but this volume has material that will appeal to a sizeable segment of general readers, especially the first three shorter papers. Ms. Steelman's article, about 42 pages in length, is nearly twice the length of the other three, which cover about 25 pages each. As her subject matter is more inclusive of a wider range of sources, it is more specialized and thus is more demanding of a reader's concentration.

What all four have in common, and the unifying factor that recommends them to a reader's attention, is the obvious enthusiasm each has for his or her subject. Another plus for the general reader is the clarity and conciseness of the writ-

ing.

What might be termed the "most fun" piece is Lennon's chapter. He traces the town problems of the early permanent settlements, informing us that despite efforts by colonial authorities, "the colonists demonstrated little interest in the establishment of formal communities." These free-spirits in Bath, Edenton, New Bern, Wilmington and Halifax had little inclination to be put into the mold of men restricted by regulations. The pressing urban problems of those pioneering days today may seem colorful, quaint. Regulations and penalties dealt with keeping livestock fenced; contributing free labor to street maintenance; avoiding the construction of buildings onto street sites, and requiring homeowners to keep chimneys clean and water buckets handy.

As North Carolina's earliest towns were waterfront towns, docking rights were important. Marketplaces were designated in the "area beneath the courthouse or in the vicinity of the town docks."

Laws dealt with excessive drinking and nuisances, so that the common jail was an important part of a town plan. The jail complex "in some towns included the jail, a jailer's house, stocks, a pillory, and a public whipping post."

Lennon also provides substantial data on the forms of municipal governments and methods used in electing officials.

William Still's study of shipbuilding in the river port town of Washington adds interesting dimensions to our knowledge of local area history. As early as 1707 "Governor Thomas Cary contracted with Thomas Harding of Bath to build 'at his landing in Bath Creek one sloop, 46 feet by the keel, 18 feet by the beam...'"

A traveler, Johann Schopf, in 1783 wrote that "Washington (is) on the Tar River, a new-settled little place of perhaps 30 houses... the trade is as yet trifling; the chief occupation is the building of small ships and vessels." Then three years later another visitor mentioned a ship of 600 hoghead under construction, commenting it was "rather too large, I fancy, for the navigation of this river."

In 1791 the cutter "Diligence" was launched shortly after Washington had been made an official port with a

customs house established there.

Still shows that all through the 19th century, the fortunes of shipbuilding had its ups and downs, being affected by wars and changing technology. The names of men engaged in building ships, the type of ships and their names, all add color to this fascinating account of an industry important to Washington on into the early quarter of the 20th century.

The Freedmen's Bureaus established in the South following the Civil War is perhaps one of the least known and most maligned agencies of the Reconstruction era. By focusing on one North Carolina agent, John C. Barnett of Charlotte, Charles L. Price is able to give readers a specific insight into this controversial and sensitive operation.

Price tells us early in his paper that "these agents have been pictured as radical extremists who attempted to remold post-Civil War society by utilizing the freedmen of the South for their own nefarious purposes."

This harsh judgement is balanced and placed in a better perspective in the research conducted by Price. In the case of Barnett, at least, we realize that even the most capable agent faced almost unsurmountable difficulties, with a mission that only the hardest could survive with sanity or honor.

Those were days of suffering and turmoil, both for the transient blacks who have a parallel in today's wandering refugees, and for the planters, mostly penniless and dependent on the labor of blacks. Price's research shows that Barnett, "in his role as protector of Negro rights, never lost sight of the rights of the planters... his rulings were fair and relatively unbiased."

"This firm but fair treatment of both sides soon won the respect of whites and blacks alike, and by the fall of 1865 Barnett was lauded by many of his previous critics."

Ms. Steelman's paper on "Leonidas LaFayette Polk, North Carolina Alliancemen, and Some Conflicts of Agrarian Leadership, 1887-1892" brings the reader nearer in time to concerns that carry on over into today's agricultural sector of society.

Unlike the other authors, the subject she has chosen to research and write about covers a much wider scope geographically, involving not only Tar Heel leaders, but people such as the Texan, Dr. Charles Wesley Macune, leader of the Texas Alliance which was reorganized and became a national order, the Southern Alliance.

Much of Ms. Steelman's study deals with the personality conflicts that evolved in Polk's relationships with three other North Carolinians prominent at the time, Sydenham Benoni Alexander, Elias Carr and Marion Butler. One of the basic points of disagreement was rooted in political beliefs — Polk had been a Whig unionist before the Civil War. "A change in party affiliation would be less difficult for him than for Alexander and Carr, both of whom emerged from long Democratic family backgrounds."

The one thing they had in common, and which sus-

tained them in a mutual bond of effort, was that they "were sincere advocates of Alliance liberal principles and supported the sub-treasury scheme, a bold and innovative measure."

Polk emerges as a thorny,

difficult leader, but one who "infused the Alliance with his restless energy and his missionary zeal." He also established the "Progressive Farmer" in 1886, which "developed into one of the strongest farm protest

journals in the nation."

People vitally interested in the mainstream of North Carolina history will find much in this volume to add to their knowledge of our state's past.

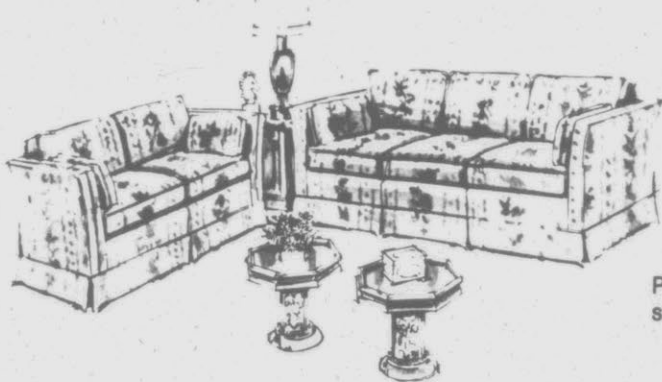

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PCC Training Emergency Medical Technicians

Word has it that prospects are good for persons who wish to serve as emergency medical technicians (EMT's) on local rescue squads after completing an extensive 118-hour course being offered quarterly at Pitt Community College.

"There is a demand for EMT's who want to work on local rescue squads," Terry Payne, assistant Fire Marshal and chairman of the Pitt County Emergency Services Group, said in a recent interview.

"You don't have to be a member of a rescue squad to take the EMT course," said Payne, who is also an EMT instructor at the college, "but you do have to be an EMT to serve on a rescue squad."

The state approved course covers such diverse forms of treatment as cardio-vascular pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), bandaging for minor and major cuts and abrasions, severe bleeding, broken bones, childbirth and other major life support measures.

"In order to maintain the quality rescue service that we have in Pitt County," Payne said, "constant training is required to stay abreast of new techniques and procedures before a person can serve on a recognized rescue squad or ambulance service."

On that point, Betty Whitfield, an EMT student of 211 Britt

Road, said during a practical application session of the spring quarter final examination that she can attest to the need for up-to-date equipment and advanced first aid training.

"It's very serious to me," Ms. Whitfield said, "because I know from personal experience the importance of EMT personnel and I think they're really good."

Whitfield went on to recount how she and her mother, Fannie James, 66, and son, Robert, 5, were victims of an accident, which was a near head-on collision, on the Bethel Highway in front of Burroughs Wellcome last October.

Whitfield, who was driving at the time — about 6:30 p.m. — sustained bad lacerations and a brain concussion. Her mother was hospitalized for nine days and ultimately faced permanent damage to a severed nerve in the right eye. Robert escaped injury, as did the driver of the second auto.

"I was passed out and bloody," she said. "And the first thing I remember was that they (the Greenville Rescue Squad) was doing primary-secondary surgery for further damages, such as fractures and broken bones."

"They did a splendid job because they immediately diagnosed what had happened to me and mama. They didn't let anything slide," she added.

The three technicians, she said, had "the bedside manner

most people need."

Besides coming to grips with body functions and anatomy in the classroom setting, EMT trainees are also required to perform during ten initial hours of in-service training in the emergency room at Pitt County Memorial Hospital, Payne said.

After completion of the course at PCC, students must then undergo a written and oral examination given by the state. Once they become certified emergency medical technicians, they must again complete another 20-hour course every two years, with an oral exam required in order for the technician to remain certified.

"Without training through our community college system, the emergency medical technician program would not be available to our squads and local citizens," he said.

"The college does a real good job supporting the effort and coordinating training in the county," he added, "and Ola Porter (director of Continuing Education at PCC) has done an outstanding job and has worked with us to the fullest in meeting the needs of EMT's throughout the county."

"Training in everything from saving a life by the use of CPR to caring for victims of local disaster to organizing search and rescue procedures often means the difference between life and death situations."

"Remember, EMT's train to save lives," Payne said.

According to Ola Porter, PCC conducts many courses in basic first aid, CPR, and basic emergency medical and refresher emergency medical technology. Classes are made up of members of local rescue squads, local fire departments, nurses, industries, businesses and the general public.

"The average person that enrolls in this type of training is one that is dedicated and highly motivated," Porter said.

Persons who enroll usually have one or more of the following objectives in mind:

- personal development and enrichment.
- acquiring life saving skills beneficial to a lay citizen.

- meeting standards prescribed by the office of Occupational Safety and Health Administration.
- as a prerequisite for certification as a registered emergency medical technician.
- qualifying for membership in a rescue squad.
- re-certification as a registered emergency medical technician.

Since 1975, PCC has sponsored 124 classes in which 2,230 persons have been trained.

Dr. E. Jackson Allison, Jr., director of emergency medicine at the ECU School of Medicine, said "the initiation of standardized training for emergency medical technicians has been a giant step in improving the provision of emergency medical care throughout the state, particularly the 29-county area of Eastern North Carolina."

"Before the initiation of such upgraded training, the philosophy of the old ambulance jockeys was to 'load and go,' without regard to the patient's vital signs or overall condition," he said.

"A medical center can be a renowned trauma center, poison-control center, and emergency cardio-care center," he said; "however, if the patients are not stabilized and brought to the emergency department in viable condition, these facilities would be for naught."

Allison said basic EMT training is "just the beginning." What is needed in the eastern part of the state is an EMT intermediate program which will provide lifesaving IV (intravenous feeding) to the seriously ill or injured patient.

"Within the next few years," he added, "it is also hoped that we will institute the EMT paramedic program which will complete the pre-hospital phase of emergent care and will afford the paramedic the ability not only to start IV lines but also to provide medications and other advanced procedures necessary to save more lives in a myriad of emergent situations 'on the street' in Eastern North Carolina."

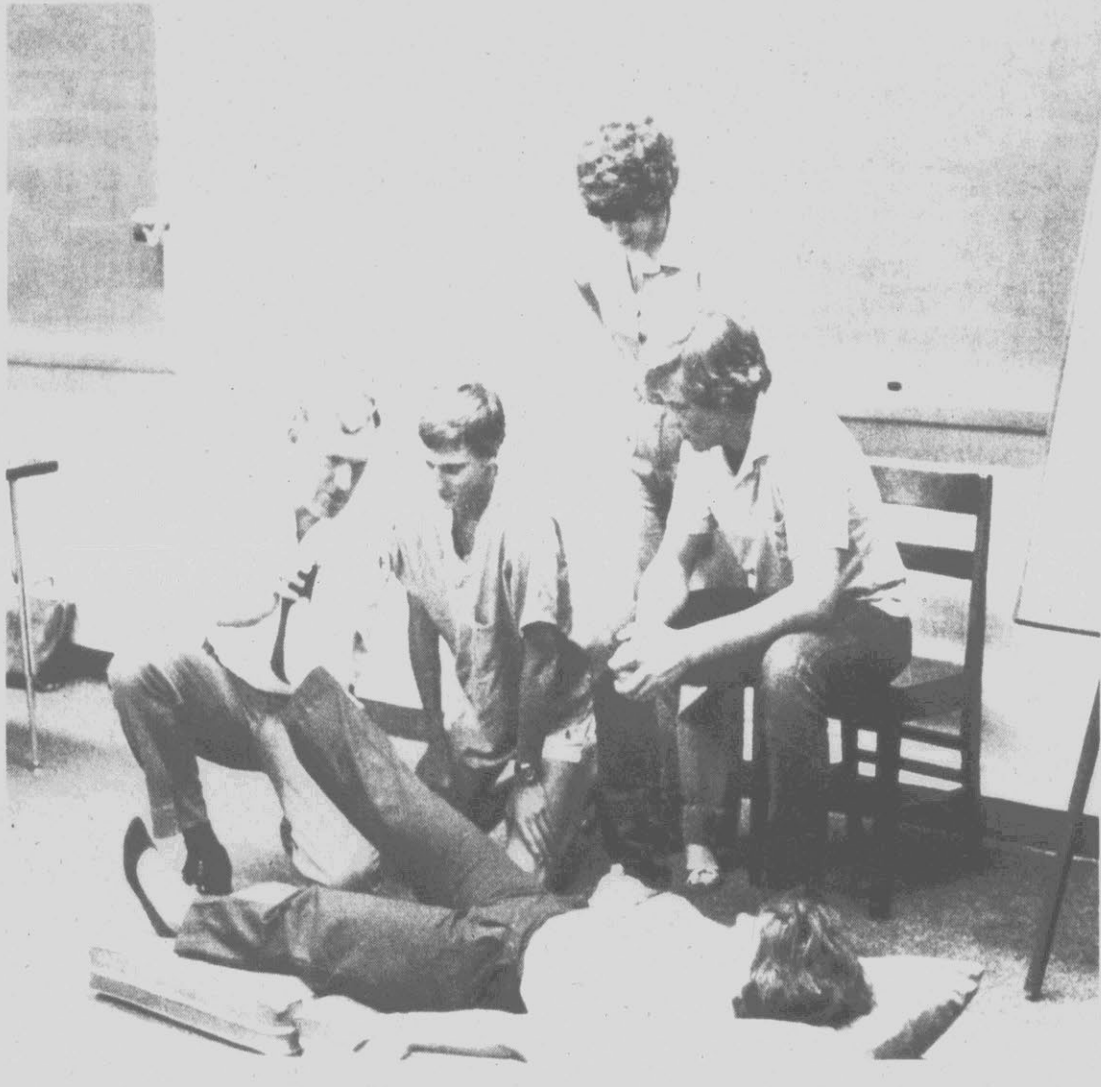

Supreme Court's Conflict Of Interest Decisions May Affect Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — When a conflict of interest forces a judge to step out of a case, justice most often is only inconvenienced. But at the Supreme Court such a disqualification — not rare these days — may change the justice dispensed.

No one is telling the nation's courts to curb the number of times their members must sit out. The focus in recent years instead has been on making sure a judge who has a stake in the outcome of a case does not help decide it or preside over it.

But when that controversy reaches the nation's highest court, a disqualification always changes the make-up of the forum — and possibly the outcome.

Last March 9, the Supreme Court cleared the way for a patent to be issued for an invention that directs the transfer of data within a computer. The vote was 4-4.

As with all such vote splits when one of the court's nine members sits out, the decision was announced in the traditional one-sentence opinion: "The judgment is affirmed by an equally divided court."

A ruling by the U.S. Court of Customs and Patent Appeals that the patent should be granted thus was upheld.

Such 4-4 affirmances are "automatic," and the conventional wisdom among legal scholars and observers of the nation's highest court says such decisions are not road maps to future law. They are not viewed as carrying the weight of legal precedent.

Emphasize the "legal," not the "precedent."

The March 9 decision was a legal and potentially lucrative victory for Honeywell Information Systems Inc., a subsidiary of Honeywell Inc., whose scientists applied for the patent.

The ruling means anyone who makes, sells or uses the invention in the mushrooming field of computer technology for the next 17 years will have to pay Honeywell.

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger did not participate in the case. He did not explain why, but Burger owns from \$15,000 to \$50,000 worth of Honeywell Inc. stock.

It is possible that the issue may some day return to the high court with some other company involved. Would the chief justice then be free to participate? The answer depends on whom you ask.

Burger might find it necessary, because Honeywell would have a very real financial stake in the outcome of that future case, to sit out once again.

If so, the March 9 ruling has set a practical precedent — unless one of the eight other justices changes his mind or a change in the court's membership occurs.

Would the March 9 result have been the same if the chief justice had participated, unencumbered by Honeywell's presence in the case? Only Burger knows. But it is possible the justice dispensed in this case by an eight-member

Supreme Court differed from that of a nine-member Supreme Court.

A section of the Code of Judicial Conduct, as revamped by a team of legal scholars in 1972, states: "A judge should disqualify himself in a proceeding in which his impartiality might reasonably be questioned."

The code lists one ground for disqualification as a "financial interest however small." Congress since has made it a crime to fail to do so.

Although the code says judges "may hold and manage investments," it also says "a judge should minimize his investments and other financial interests to minimize the number of cases in which he is disqualified."

It adds: "As soon as he can do so without serious financial detriment, he should divest himself of investments and other financial interests that might require frequent disqualification."

The chief justice is on safe ground. Honeywell is one of the few stocks he owns. His investments have not caused anything approaching "frequent" refusals.

Burger, on paper, recently may have become a millionaire but his wealth was achieved through real estate investment — a method that rarely sparks the need for disqualification.

Two other high court members, however, have greater difficulty keeping their wealth from interfering with their judicial duties.

Justices Potter Stewart and Lewis F. Powell Jr. are millionaires. Both were born into wealth.

The long list of financial holdings for Powell and his wife as of last May, according to a statement the justice released in compliance with the Ethics in Government Act, totaled from \$1.92 million to \$3.9 million. Their 1979 income from those holdings was between \$87,500 and \$264,500.

Stewart's personal and family holdings, according to the statement he filed last May, totaled from \$965,000 to \$2.45 million. They supplied between \$89,500 and \$246,500 in 1979 income.

Of the hundreds of appeals denied review in the first six months of the court's current nine-month term, Stewart and Powell disqualified themselves, respectively, from at least 13

and eight cases in which they held a financial interest.

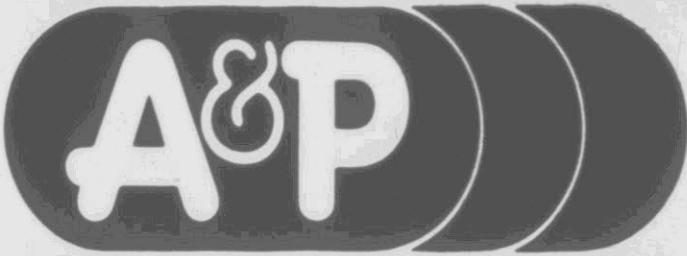
An exact count is impossible because the justices are not required to state for the record their disqualifications from such review denials.

Of the court's first 24 decisions of the term, Stewart or Powell did not participate in four. The justices are not required to, and do not, explain their absence from a case, but financial holdings appeared to be the reason in each.

And in each, the disqualification did not appear to change the decision's outcome.

Stewart and Powell, or members of their immediate families, own considerable amounts of stock in oil and chemical companies — industries whose members increasingly find themselves in court.

Perhaps no U.S. corporation is involved in more litigation than IBM. When one of those many controversies reaches the Supreme Court, it may face a seven-member forum. As of last May, Justices Harry A. Blackmun and John Paul Stevens owned IBM stock.



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GOREN BRIDGE

DEAR MR. GOREN

Q.—My partner and I had an interesting hand the other night, and neither of us knew how to bid it. With both vulnerable, South picked up:

♦ K x x x
♦ Q x x x
♦ J x x x
♦ x

The bidding has proceeded: West North East South 1 Dble 1 NT ? South felt there should be some way he could compete in the auction, yet was afraid that he did not have enough for a free bid. What would you have done?—J. Larsen, St. Paul, Minn.

(This question has been awarded the weekly prize.)

A.—To reach a solution, we must first decide what to do with a good hand. Since partner is showing the equivalent of an opening bid with his takeout double, on all hands where we can be sure we have the balance of power, i.e., those hands which contain 10 points or better, we should start with a double of one no trump. That gives us Law No. 1: All good hands start with a double.

Once this is established, an important corollary follows: Any action other than a double denies 10 points!

Given those two principles, it is a relatively simple matter to decide what we should do with a wide variety of hands. We are free to take any action we please and yet partner will know that we do not have a good hand.

With a long, broken suit and a distributional hand, we simply bid our long suit. If we have a two-suiter, we might even be able to show both suits without having partner take us for much in the way of high cards.

If we have a solid six-card suit missing the king or ace and nothing on the side, we can jump bid that suit.

That leaves us with the type of hand South held. Here, we would like to compete, but partner's double does not necessarily promise four cards in both major suits. Certainly, he has at least one four-card major, but if we attempt to guess which one, we have an even money chance of guessing the wrong one.

The solution is simple: Cue-bid the enemy suit! Normally, the cue-bid of opponents' suit shows a very strong hand. Here, however, we have already denied a strong hand by the fact that we didn't double one no trump. Therefore, the cue-bid carries a different message. It says: "Partner, I would like to compete, but I don't know which suit to select. So you choose the suit, but bear in mind that I can have a fairly weak hand."

This is consistent with the basic principle in bridge: Once you have limited your hand, all other bids, no matter how weak or strong they may sound, must be taken in context of the limits already defined!

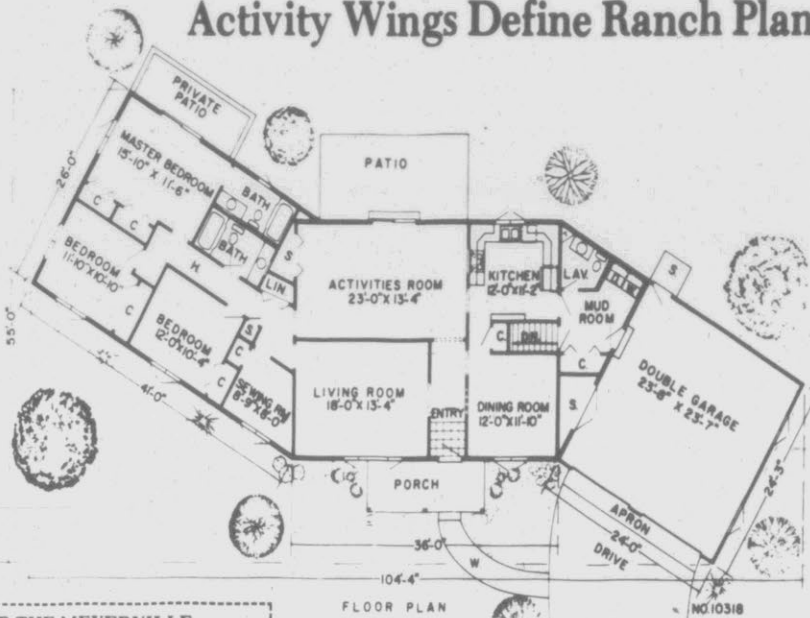
With bedrooms occupying one wing, family living areas a second, and garage and mud room, a third, the Meyerville, a family-oriented ranch plan, emerges as a well-defined, livable home.

In all, plans call for three bedrooms and two and one half baths and include storage areas, sewing room, and formal dining room.

Exterior lines are simple, with horizontal and vertical siding combined for interest. Inside, as tiled entry shields the formal living room from incoming traffic and allows access to dining room and activities room.

Museum Creates Design News

If the subject of design has become a little less ivory tower-ish in the past five years, then Lisa Taylor can take some of the credit.

Mrs. Taylor is director of the Cooper-Hewitt Museum in New York, the Smithsonian Institution's national museum of design. Since its opening in October 1976 in a Fifth Avenue mansion built by Andrew Carnegie, the museum has helped to raise public consciousness on the subject of how and why products look the way they do.

With something like 70 exhibitions plus an education program that reaches about 6,000 people a year, the museum has created a sense of newness about design topics.

Exhibits exploring design considerations for objects such as luxury steamships, wallpaper and hair and of locales such as the urban environment and subways have inspired comment, amusement, affection and outrage, and have made the subject of design lively, interesting and popular.

Mrs. Taylor, who recently journeyed to Colorado Springs to accept the 1981 Trailblazer Award from the National Home Fashions League at its annual meeting, said in an interview at her New York office that the Cooper-Hewitt Museum is about to begin a major expansion effort.

The museum will seek to raise enough money to create a permanent exhibition center for its permanent collection in a building on the

Carnegie site. Most of Cooper-Hewitt's 300,000-item collection of decorative art objects has been in storage.

Also on the horizon — for fall, 1982 — is a master's degree program in the decorative arts that will be offered in conjunction with Parsons School of Design and the New School. The museum's application to begin the degree-granting program was recently approved by New York State's Board of Regents.

Since money is tight — never more so than now — and the Smithsonian pays only about a third of Cooper-Hewitt's expenses, according to Mrs. Taylor, a substantial sum will have to be raised before renovations for a new wing can be undertaken. Fund-raising is a difficulty that is becoming more pervasive at all American museums, she said.

"Raising money is getting to be such a big problem. Every museum is in a terrible situation. The patron class who used to support the arts is disappearing. And government funding is shrinking at the same time," she said.

Ironically, the reduction in funds come at a time when museums are serving the needs of a greater number of Americans.

"Today, we are meeting social needs that did not used to be recognized," she noted. "We, for example, are offering programs to appeal to the disabled, educationally disadvantaged individuals, retired individuals, children. In fact, no other educational institution reaches so wide a public as a museum," she said.

In line with their greater sensitivity to the needs of patrons, museums are also more responsive to social change than formerly was the

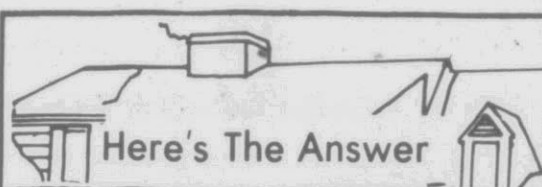
case. Those factors she believes will influence the ways in which museums conduct their business in the future include "the greater number of single households, an awareness that we have squandered our natural resources, and the extraordinary growth of technology."

Technology and the need to preserve natural resources are, for example, two factors which may lead to the televising of exhibitions and events such as talks on art. With the growth of video will come opportunities to visit museums all over the country via the television screen.

Despite the specter of fund-raising difficulties and other potential calamities, Lisa Taylor is an optimist. She notes a new respect for history and tradition. Furthermore, she is happy about the growth of respect for the decorative arts in this country. Critics and the general public as well are beginning to realize that the issues of design are important to all of us, she says.

"After all, every human being is involved in making design decisions. We all live in a house, choose clothing and other objects. Each time we do make a choice, we are making a design decision," she said.

Her attitudes are nowhere better revealed than in her comments to the National Home Fashions League. "You can view the future as bleak; our profession as obsolete. You can envision us all living underground, like moles, stockpiling water. Or you can feel as I do — that we are living in an incredibly challenging time — on the edge of a very promising period in the history of design."

Q. - We have a two-car garage with just a slight pitch to the roof. Lately there is a small leak that occurs only when there is a very heavy rain accompanied by high winds. My husband got up on a ladder and inspected the roof. He says there does not seem to be any break in the roofing material, which appears to be a smooth-faced roll-type heavy paper, but says the leak means the paper is very old and should be replaced. He is sure he can do it himself, but isn't sure whether to use the same kind of material. What is your advice?

A. - Yes, he should use the roll roofing. You mentioned "replaced." Barring something you haven't mentioned, covering the old paper should be sufficient. However, this time use roll roofing that isn't smooth-faced. Get the kind that is covered with mineral granules, which protect the roofing paper from the ravages of the sun's rays. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding installation and maintenance of the material.

Q. - During the winter months, we had one of the rooms in our house repainted. Recently, in trying to open one of the windows in that room, we found that it was stuck tight because the painter had allowed paint to get between the sash and the sides of the frame. My husband got such a stuck window loose a few years ago, but made gouges in the frame. I don't want him to do the same thing this time and I told him not to touch the window until we hear from you. Please tell him how to free the window without making gouges.

A. - He probably made the common mistake of unsticking the window by inserting a screwdriver blade between the sash and the mauling. Instead, he should first try to free the window by taking a block of wood, placing it along the side of the sash and then hitting the block gently with a hammer. Do the same thing along the other side of the sash. The next step is to insert the edge of a putty knife between the sash and mauling and run it along there carefully wherever necessary to break the paint

Lightning Bolts Can Strike Twice

COOPERS MILL, Maine (AP) — Lightning never strikes twice in the same place, you say?

Not true, says Leland F. King, a lightning rod installer for 33 years. The fact

that a bolt can hit the same spot a couple of times in the same storm helps keep his business going strong.

This is summer thunderstorm season, prime time for lightning, says King.

Soon, he'll be getting calls from farmers whose barns have been hit.

When he hears about a building that's been struck, he usually goes right to the scene. If the building is still

standing, he asks the owner if he's ready to have lightning rods installed, or if the old lightning rod system should be checked out and rewired.

"Ben Franklin had iron lightning rods on his house in Philadelphia," says King, who is 59. "But they've improved over the years."

Franklin only half understood lightning, says King, and although his "points" were grounded, they were more of a hazard than a protection.

"Lightning rods are 99 percent effective if they're installed properly with the right materials," says King. "But one time in a million, the current can burn right through the ground cables."

When this happens — or if cables are not bonded properly to metal fixtures in the building — a devastating charge can rip through the structure and flatten it or set it ablaze.

Lightning rods do not attract electricity, as some people think.

They actually protect buildings from it by delivering a charge from the ground, up the building and out the lightning rods, or points, as King calls them.

Last year, an interview with wood finishing expert Horner Fornby produced interesting comments on some ways to determine whether so-called antique furniture might really be antique.

Recently, a second encounter with the same gentleman produced tips on the repair and maintenance of old furniture that is not necessarily antique but is well along in years.

"How do you tell whether to refinish a piece of furniture or merely clean it?"

"Before launching into any refinishing, use mineral spirits or a furniture cleaner and go to work on the dirtiest spot or area that you can find. If that spot disappears and the grain of the wood is clear, don't bother to refinish the piece. If you can't clean up the dirty spot to suit you, the piece needs refinishing. Incidentally, if the piece at first glance looks to be checked or alligatored heavi-

ly, it probably needs refinishing."

"What should you do if the used furniture has drawers that stick, as so often happens?"

First, never plane the drawers to fit. Instead, use a small table lamp with a 100-watt bulb and place it in a pan in the bottom of a drawer so it does not come in contact with the wood. Put a blanket over the piece and let the lamp burn for 24 hours. It will dry out the moisture in the wood. The wood will shrink, allowing the drawers to fit properly.

"Won't the wood swell again?"

"It might, but not if you put lemon oil in a pump bottle and spray the insides of the piece and the drawers. The wood will absorb the oil and be stabilized, preventing swelling. Then take a white candle and rub it on the drawer glides so it will move smoothly."

"Old furniture sometimes has a musty odor to it. How do you remove it?"

"It is virtually impossible

to remove a musty odor from old wood furniture. Therefore, you have to mask it. A good way to do this is to place a pound of cedar shavings in a nylon stocking and tack it to the back of the bottom drawer. The odor of the cedar will permeate the piece and you won't notice any musty odor."

"What if there is a bit of veneer missing from the furniture or there is a crack that needs to be filled?"

"There are various ways to handle this problem, but the easiest is to select a crayon that closely matches the wood. Melt the crayon with a soldering iron into the opening. When the crayon has cooled and hardened, scrape off the excess. A plastic credit card makes a good scraper for this purpose."

"Suppose you don't have a soldering iron?"

"Use a big needle or a small nail and heat it over a candle until it is warm enough to melt the candle into the damaged area. When it hardens, do the scraping."

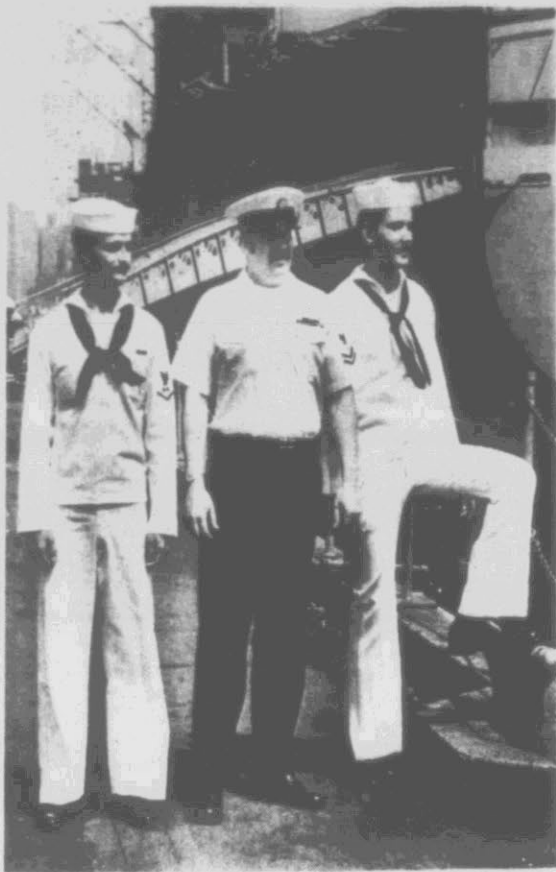

Traditional Bells Are Dress Issue

If you opened Davy Jones' locker today you might find the Navy's "business look" uniform and a couple of mermaids kissing it goodbye. Bell bottoms are back. Sailors like the cut of their jib.

Now they look like sailors — those rollicking ocean rovers who wore their white hats at a rakish angle and their bell bottoms with style and dash. The people who count the most in a sailor's log are welcoming them back with open arms. After a fashion, that is.

"Just the way they fit makes it look sexier. The top doesn't come all the way down, you know," Airman Apprentice Marsha Kitchens said at the Patuxent Naval Air Station in Maryland.

"Everybody is dying to get into them," said Catherine Lareau, assistant manager of the Navy Exchange uniform shop at Newport, R.I. "They are more relaxing. They don't have to keep worrying about white shirts. And they're much sexier."

Now hear this from John Carlson, skipper of the USS Manley, a destroyer drydocked in Boston: "They're great, sharp-looking. The sailors look and feel proud in their bell bottoms. Guys who wear their bells ashore make out like bandits."

"It's the smartest uniform the Navy's ever had," said Robert Del Cogliano of Troy, N.Y., a senior chief personnelman aboard the Manley with 23 years in the Navy. "The sailors like tradition, and it helps them stand out. I think 100 percent of the men are in favor of them."

Del Cogliano wouldn't get much of an argument from sailors surveyed by UPI since May 1 when Chief of Naval Operations Thomas Hayward deep-sixed the business-look uniform for the bells, which became part of each recruit's seabag.

The bells had been optional, and until the business-look uniform is gradually phased out in 1983, they will be the only dress uniform issued all enlisted men through petty officer second class. They include a neckerchief and "Dixie Cup," the traditional white sailor's hat.

Sailors call the uniforms "Cracker Jacks" after the smiling bell bottomed swab tossing off a snappy salute on the box of candied popcorn and peanuts of the same name. They are also named for "Popeye." People rarely mistook the old spinach eater with the permanent wink for anything but a sailor.

Being mistaken for other military — and worse yet for mere civilians — was a common occurrence with sailors dressed in the suit and tie of the business-look uniform.

PURSUANT TO THE GENERAL STATUTES OF NORTH CAROLINA 153A-351, PITT COUNTY MUST CREATE A BUILDING INSPECTION DEPARTMENT AND BEGIN ISSUING BUILDING PERMITS AND MAKING INSPECTIONS ON JULY 1, 1981.

- (1) The construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, removal, or demolition of any building;
- (2) The installation extension, or general repair of any plumbing system;
- (3) The installation, extension, alteration or general repair of any heating or cooling equipment system;
- (4) The installation, extension alteration, or general repair of any electrical wiring, devices, appliances, or equipment;

WITHOUT FIRST SECURING FROM THE PITT COUNTY INSPECTION DEPARTMENT EACH PERMIT REQUIRED BY THE STATE BUILDING CODE.

Farm and farm related buildings are exempt from the building permit requirement, but must continue to obtain an electrical permit and inspection.

MOBILE HOMES

- (5) Permits must also be secured for setting up and the installation of Mobile Homes, which require a Health Department permit and Electrical permit, and must be properly anchored.

FEES:

The building permit and inspection fee as established by the Pitt County Board of Commissioners shall be \$2.50 per \$1,000.00 value of construction. No permit shall be required for construction under \$1,000.00. The minimum permit fee shall be \$12.50 for all permits for construction ranging from \$1,000.00 to \$5,000.00.

The Building Construction Permit and fee shall include the insulating permit and inspection.

Ghetto Kids May Take Their 'Guardian Angel' Concept Abroad

NEW YORK (UPI) — Will success spoil Curtis Sliwa?

The 26-year-old leader and founder of the Guardian Angels was the inspiration for a recent made-for-TV movie, for which he was paid \$32,500, and he's now talking about an international Guardian Angels.

"We've had invitations from London and Paris," said Sliwa enthusiastically as he rode the "Mugger's Express," the No. 4 Lexington Avenue subway train that winds through some of the toughest sections of Brooklyn and the Bronx.

Yes, things have changed since 1979, when Sliwa, then a relatively unknown high school dropout, organized the "Magnificent 13," a group of ghetto kids from the Bronx who volunteered to ride the city's crime-ridden subways in an effort to make the trains safer.

"Through our non-violent resistance we intend on spreading the message of unity and good will for our fellow man," the first press release for the Magnificent 13 declared.

But that isn't always the way Sliwa talks about the Magnificent 13 these days.

In an affidavit he submitted in connection with a court suit filed against the maker of the TV movie, Sliwa called the Magnificent 13 a "concept."

"Certain companies advised me that the concepts created and developed by me and the activities in which I was involved could be marketed commercially," Sliwa said.

"The publicity continues to increase to a noticeable extent and it appears that I have created commercially desirable properties," he continued.

The Magnificent 13 became the Guardian Angels, which Sliwa says has 700 members in New York City and another 400 members in other cities, including Detroit, Atlanta, New Jersey, Los Angeles, Philadelphia and Stanford, Conn.

And Sliwa has become a bona fide celebrity in a city of celebrities. New Yorkers, whether in the 59th Street subway station below Manhattan's Bloomingdale's Department Store or the Fordham Avenue stop in the South Bronx near the Angels' "national headquarters," stop Sliwa, shake his hand, pat him on the back and offer him encouragement.

This adulation filters down in lesser quantities to the other Angels: ghetto kids who dress in a melange of red berets, white Guardian Angels T-shirts, braids, coon tails, Army jump boots, sneakers, fatigue pants and black karate clothes.

They are part urban boy scout, part street gang and part Army platoon as they stand and snap to attention for Sliwa when he arrives at the 59th Street subway station prior to the nightly patrol on the "Mugger's Express" and other subway trains.

"There's a feeling of self-confidence. You've got to feel great when you're an Angel even if you've got zip for a personality. People smile at you and slap you on the back. You become somebody," Sliwa explained.

The "Rock," as he is called, is fully familiar with criticism that centers on his penchant for publicity and hype for the Guardian Angels.

His public relations agent, a pleasant-sounding woman named Fran White, sometimes refers to him as "Mr. Sliwa" in conversations with reporters. It usually takes new reporters in the city several months to discover that Fran White is Sliwa's mother.

"I guess I plead guilty," Sliwa said of his talent for attracting headlines. "But look at all the other people who get media attention who have absolutely nothing to say. We have a message for people."

Sliwa said he had no intention of going to Hollywood or entering politics and was perfectly content running the Angels, or the Association of Guardian Angels Inc., as the non-profit, tax-exempt group is known in legal papers.

He explained that he only wound up with about \$14,500 of the money he was paid for the movie. The Guardian Angels is not a hobby for Sliwa: it is his full-time job and a way of life.

"Of course, I hope to get a salary from the Guardian Angels some day. My savings are practically exhausted," he said. Sliwa

added that he lives on donations from relatives and friends.

The "national headquarters" of the Guardian Angels is a dingy apartment in the South Bronx. It is also Sliwa's home. The walls are covered with newspaper clippings about Sliwa and the group, photographs of Angels in various karate poses and certificates of appreciation from such organizations as the Bronx Chamber of Commerce and the New York City Department of Sanitation.

The phone rings constantly. The callers invariably demand to speak to

the "Rock." No one else, it seems, ever gets a call though the apartment is crammed with Angels attending a class in first aid.

Somebody with a can of black spray paint has scrawled "KKK" and "White Power" in large letters over many of the apartment walls. A kitchen wall contains a long declaration about the proper obligations of the white race.

These messages would seem to be distinctly unpopular with a group that is largely black and Hispanic but the Angels appear to cheerfully treat the graffiti as part of the landscape.

Sliwa explained that somebody broke into the apartment about five months ago and sprayed the walls. He thinks the vandalism was probably the work of "neighborhood youths" despite the evident unpopularity of the Klan in the South Bronx.

Sliwa, who claims to have been threatened, shot at and kidnapped last December by three men who he says identified themselves to him as police officers, noted that the neighborhood was not very safe even for the Angels.

His most outspoken public critic is William McKechnie, the head of the Transit police

union. McKechnie has described the Angels as publicity-mongers who have done little or nothing to contribute to subway safety. He also fears that the under-trained Angels could become a danger to themselves or others in a serious subway confrontation.

"It's their inability to provide protection for people," Sliwa said of the resentment from the transit cops.

The police and the Angels have engaged in some well-publicized rumbles, the most recent last February, when 11 Angels were arrested and charged with riot,

assault and resisting arrest in a fracas with transit police aboard a subway car.

Such confrontations are probably the best possible publicity Sliwa can get in ghetto areas where suspicion of the police runs high and where most of the Angel recruits come from.

The "Rock" derived further pleasure from the incident when a grand jury tossed out all the criminal charges against the 11 Angels.

Now the Angels are "legitimate." Last month, the group reached an agreement with the city and the police that gives the Angels a kind

of quasi-official status.

Under the terms of the agreement, Angels will be issued identification cards by the Police Department. City and transit cops will "render all necessary courtesy and assistance to identified members of the Guardian Angels while they are in uniform on duty."

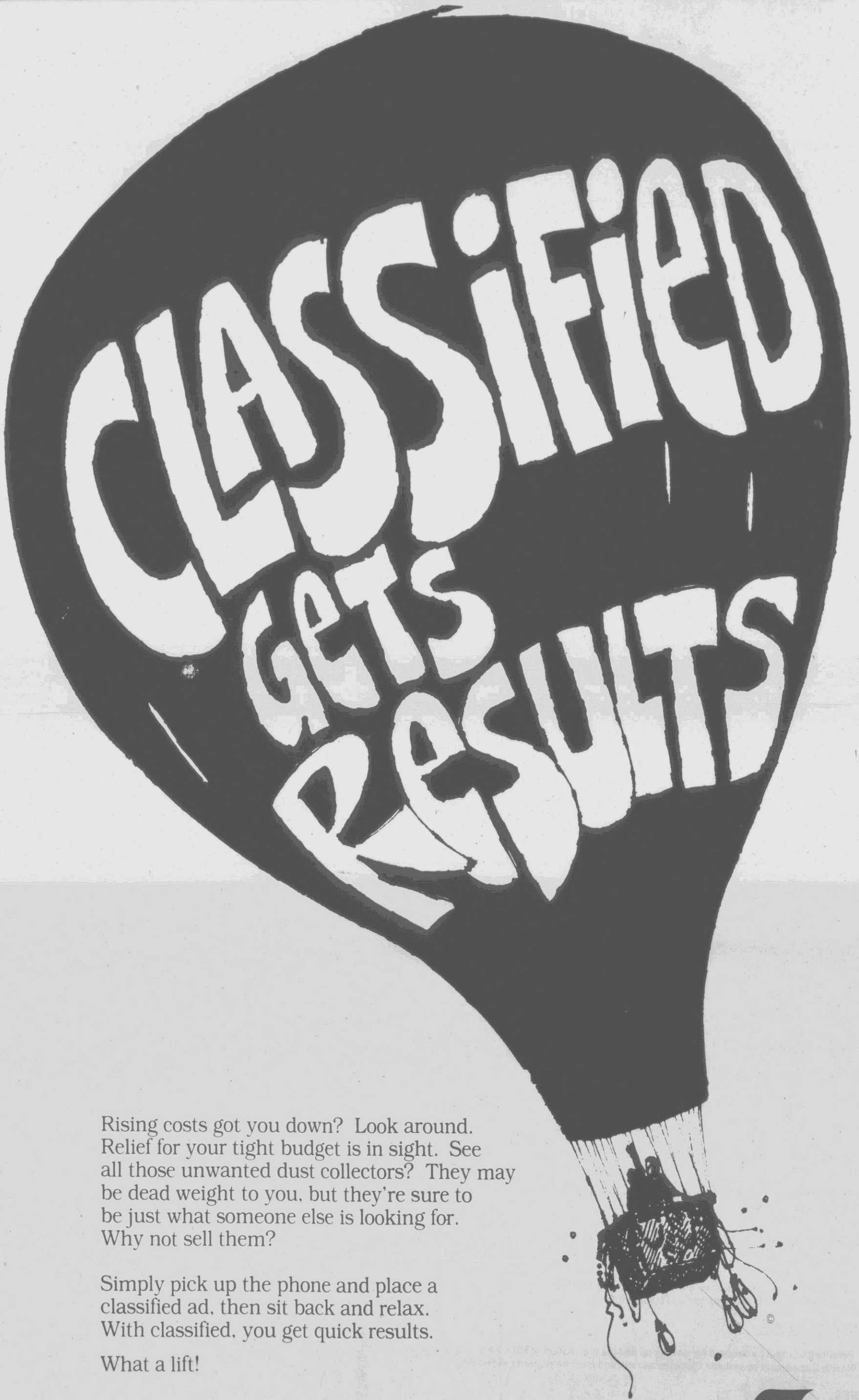
"It will make the New York Times crowd happy," Sliwa said of the agreement. He was, in one breath, referring to the city establishment and a newspaper that has not exactly devoted lavish attention to the group.

Not too many months ago,

Sliwa rejected a similar proposal for official recognition from Transit Authority Police Chief James Meehan. He argued then that accepting Meehan's proposal would make the Angels appear to be an appendage of the police — a circumstance he said would not be wildly popular in places like the South Bronx.

He now insists that the current agreement is "different."

"They (Meehan) wanted us to be auxiliary police. We'll be completely independent under this agreement," he said.
