

Rate Boost Is Passed Along By Utilites

The Greenville Utilities Commission last night voted to pass on to its customers a 21.7 percent increase in the cost of wholesale power from Virginia Electric and Power Co., but decided not to "track" the increase as in the past.

Instead, the commission voted to pass the increase along to customers according to a cost-of-service study compiled for the commission by consulting engineers R. W. Beck and Associates.

"We've been working on this rate study for a year," commission member Harry Hagerty said. "We have to bite the bullet some time or other. Let's go ahead and see if we can bite the right end."

As approved last night, the rate hike will be passed on to customers according to the utilities' cost of serving the

various classes of customers.

Rates for residential customers will increase only 2.3 percent, while rates for small general service will see a 15.876 percent hike. Large general service customers will go up 13.42 percent, while rates for county, municipal and housing authority all-electric buildings will increase 35.26 percent.

Under the rate structure approved last night, rates for seasonal general service — such as for bulk tobacco barns — will decrease 22.62 percent.

Rates for outdoor lighting service under the schedule adopted last night will remain the same.

Had the old "tracking" formula been followed, the rates would have increased an average of 7.67 percent — varying from a low of 4.2 percent for outdoor lighting service and 7 percent for residential service, to 9.4 percent for large

general service customers and 9.6 percent for county, municipal and housing authority all-electric buildings.

City Manager Ed Wyatt, who voted against the use of the cost-of-service rate structure to pass on Vepco's latest increase said "the public is entitled to peruse the final report" before it is adopted by the commission. "I'm particularly disappointed the public did not choose to attend this meeting tonight."

Commission member Margaret Worth, who made the motion to use the cost-of-service study to pass on the rate hike, emphasized, "It's the best information we have." She added that even though the report has not been accepted by the commission, the "philosophy of the report can be applied."

Commission member Gene Prescott, who also said "it's the

best information we have," pointed out that the demand for electricity is "now being created," by business and industry rather than residential customers as in the past. "I think we have to use the best information available," to set the rates.

Saying a 35 percent increase in rates for governmental all-electric building service "is absolutely ridiculous," Wyatt proposed a substitute motion that was defeated by a vote of 4 to 2.

That motion would have tracked the rate hike using the old formula for a month to give the commission time to formally adopt the Beck cost-of-service study.

After voting to use the cost-of-service method to pass on the Vepco rate increase, the commission voted to hold a public hearing on the Beck report in the City Council Chambers at 7:30 p.m. on September 15.

Board OKs Non-Resident Tuition Policy

Voting to charge students attending county schools and not living in Pitt County a \$1 tuition fee, the Pitt County Board of Education Tuesday adopted a non-resident tuition policy.

The policy allows the board to negotiate contracts with area counties such as Craven, Greene, Martin, and with Greenville City schools for the free exchange of pupils. State law requires the board to set some fee for non-residence attendance. The board approved one such agreement with

Wilson County at its monthly meeting yesterday.

Students not otherwise domiciled in North Carolina (those students whose parents live elsewhere) who are attending Pitt County schools will be charged the \$1 tuition fee. A fee of \$150 was recently adopted by Craven County.

A report by the John Proctor Company, auditors of the Board of Education, recommended a cash reserve of 12½ percent of the budgeted expenditures for the board, a figure equivalent to a 45-day reserve. The report, presented at yesterday's meeting, came in response to an inquiry by the

board concerning the amount of necessary monies in reserve.

According to the report, this reserve applies especially to current expense and food services funds, and school finance officer Dan Thomas noted that for the board, a 12½ percent reserve represents approximately \$500,000.

The board passed a resolution mandating earlier suspension from riding school buses for those students with a previous record of creating trouble on buses. The new policy calls for a one-week suspension on a first offense, one-half year suspension for second offense, and a full year's

suspension for the third offense.

A child abuse/neglect policy was adopted. The policy emphasizes that the state requires school employees who suspect child abuse to file a report with the Department of Social Services. The report, according to the board's policy, may be oral, and a written report is required only after the oral reports have produced no results.

Food services director Donna Ware presented the new eligibility scale for free and reduced prices lunches to the (Please turn to Page 10)

Pres. Reagan Will Order Additional Budget Cuts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — President Reagan, struggling to control the federal deficit in the face of persistent high interest rates, is ordering a new wave of budget cuts which may wipe out whole government agencies.

The new cuts for the 1982 fiscal year, which starts next month, would be over and above \$35.2 billion in reductions already approved by Congress,

\$14 billion still being sought by the administration and \$75 billion planned for 1983 and 1984 in the drive to balance the federal budget.

And that still may not be enough to hold the 1982 deficit to the \$42.5 billion promised by Reagan, administration officials say.

"That is still our goal," deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes said Tuesday as Reagan prepared to end his month-long California vacation

and fly east today. "But we have to face reality."

Some senior administration officials, who declined to be identified, said that without further cuts the deficit could soar above \$60 billion.

In Milwaukee, budget director David A. Stockman said the administration would unveil its latest plan in a week or so.

He said a possibility was the wholesale elimination of federal agen-

cies and further cuts in the federal work force. CBS reported Tuesday that 70,000 to 80,000 federal jobs would be eliminated.

The Chicago Tribune quoted administration sources today as saying that from 80,000 to 100,000 positions would be cut, with the departments of education and energy bearing the brunt.

Responding to a question from South

Dakota Gov. Bill Janklow at a Midwestern governors meeting, Stockman said, "We are going to announce some changes in federal employment levels and agency termination levels that will warm your hearts, even in the middle of winter in South Dakota."

Ed Dale, an Office of Management and Budget spokesman, refused to say how much more would be cut from the budget but said every agency would be

vulnerable.

"The president is going to take a sharp knife on these 1982 budgets in order to hold the line," Speakes said. "We realize it's going to be a difficult job."

He said Reagan would be looking for further savings in already hard-hit social programs and probably would make cuts "across the board" in every department and agency.

U.S. Aware Of East Germans, Soviets In Angola

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union and East Germany have established a "heavy presence" in Angola with 1,000 advisers assisting both the Angolan army and Namibian rebels, a senior Reagan administration official says.

The official said he has no reason to doubt a report by South African military authorities that their soldiers killed and captured Soviet military advisers during a raid last week.

While the advisers have been in Angola for some time, the official said the encounter with South Africans is the first indication that the Soviets are advising Angolan troops and Namibian rebels of the South-West Africa People's Organization at the "platoon level."

"I think 1,000 advisers, Soviet and East German advisers, is a fairly heavy presence in the context of that country and the situation," said the official, who briefed reporters Tuesday on condition he not be identified.

He said the presence of the advisers, coupled with a South African military buildup in the region, creates "an explosive

combination."

The advisers are in addition to between 15,000 and 19,000 Cuban troops who have been entrenched in Marxist-oriented Angola for years, despite intense U.S. pressures to have them withdrawn.

The Soviets clearly are trying to take advantage of the turmoil in the region caused in part by the fighting over Namibia, a predominantly black territory under the control of South Africa, the official said.

He said the Soviets are a major arms supplier to Angola and some of the arms are turning up in the hands of Namibian rebels.

The Reagan administration, which has been accused by some black African nations of scuttling an earlier agreement

for Namibian independence, plans to introduce "concrete proposals" soon for a new independence formula, according to the official.

He said the proposals will include general constitutional principles to which all sides would agree prior to elections for a constituent assembly. It is believed they would safeguard the rights of the white minority when a black-controlled Namibian government takes over from South Africa.

The official reiterated administration support for a 1978 U.N. Security Council resolution, also supported by most other U.N. nations, as a basis for an independent Namibia after elections. But he said it can be strengthened.

The official said the Angolans have indicated they will ask the Cuban troops to leave once there is an acceptable independence for Namibia.

"We are persuaded that the kind of approach we are suggesting can be of benefit to all without threat to anyone. Our approach to this problem is not one of holding a gun to the head of the Angolan government," he said.

The official specifically denied suggestions that a Cuban withdrawal and independence for Namibia are linked. But he said:

"We have also said that this would make a decisive contribution to the settlement of Namibia. And we are absolutely serious about that. In fact, we believe that unless progress is mutually reinforcing, it may not be possible to get the result that we want."

In what appeared to be a nudge for South Africa to negotiate in good faith, he said that if hopes for a diplomatic solution in Namibia fade, the Soviets may find "new opportunities to expand in the region."

The official admitted that the South African raid into Angola, during which the South Africans claim to have killed 450 Angolans and SWAPO guerrillas, "does not help our effort."

He said the U.S. veto Monday of a Security Council resolution condemning South Africa for the raid was directed at the "shrill" tone of the resolution, which he said could have been counter-productive in getting South African cooperation on Namibia.

But black members of Congress on Tuesday condemned the U.S. veto as showing support for a "racist, fascist regime." District of Columbia Democrat Walter Fauntroy, chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, said the veto is a "tragic break with our allies" since the United States cast the only vote against the resolution.

Averted Effort Air Grievances

SHANGHAI, China (AP) —

A Chinese man grabbed former President Jimmy Carter by the wrist in a

Shanghai department store today to try to hand him a letter of grievances and was taken away by Chinese security men, Carter's press secretary said.

Chinese agents punched the man and hustled him away in a few seconds of running and shouting while Carter went on unruffled with his visit to the store.

Press Secretary Jody Powell said security men were upset because the man had broken through the security ranks, but that the former president "was completely unhurt and we don't consider this to be a matter of concern."

He said Carter also believed the man was trying to hand him a letter.

The presidential party learned from the Chinese that the man, 51, felt he had been harmed during the chaotic 1966-76 Cultural Revolution and his needs were not being attended to, Powell added.

He said the Chinese had reported the man was released.

Carter was visiting the store as part of a tour of the Caoyang workers' residential area, a district of about 80,000 people.

Later, Carter shook hands with a few of the hundreds of people standing in front of the store to get a glimpse of the man whose administration established full diplomatic relations with the People's Republic in 1979.

At a major Shanghai University earlier in the day, dozens of enthusiastic students pressed in to shake Carter's hand and his own security men cleared a path for him as he went on shaking hands.

In a speech at Jiaotong University, Carter said he hoped Chinese authorities would not require American students in China to live in small American compounds isolated from the Chinese people.

He expressed hope they could live with families of professors, students and working people.

Firm Locating In Martin Co.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Penn Elastic of West Point, Pa., will locate its fabric-manufacturing operations in Jamesville in Martin County, Gov. Jim Hunt said today.

The company will refurbish a 95,000-square-foot building formerly used by Coats and Clark Inc. The Pennsylvania-based company plans to invest \$3 million and eventually employ 120 people, Hunt said.

The plant will begin operation next month.

"We are proud that Penn Elastic will bring 50 years of experience to our state," Hunt said. "I am also

pleased that the company will be working with Martin Community College to help train its employees."

The facility will produce finished fabric from raw yarn. The products will be shipped to domestic and foreign makers of swimwear, sportswear and other apparel.

In a prepared statement, company president Nils Benson said the company chose the Jamesville location from 60 potential sites in four states.

The company has produced fabric since 1930 and is a subsidiary of Courtaulds Ltd. of England.

East Carolina University has accepted 52 students from North Carolina into the first year class at the School of Medicine.

The students represent 33 counties in the state and 21 universities. Thirteen of the students received either undergraduate or graduate degrees from East Carolina.

The class was selected from more than 1,100 applicants. Fourteen of the students are women.

Well, they went and tore down the Biltmore Hotel lobby in New York the other day — clock and all. Begin Urged To Cool It

WASHINGTON — Menahem Begin is being quietly advised by American friends with access to the Oval Office that Ronald Reagan will be personally affronted if the prime minister of Israel uses his state visit here next week to campaign against the president's decision to sell AWACS planes to Saudi Arabia.

Squadron, a foremost leader in the American-Jewish community, all have counseled Begin in recent days. The message: The odds are 50-50 that a majority of senators will join a huge anti-AWACS vote in the House and kill the deal. The warning: If it is killed, forget about special aid for Israel that the Reagan administration has conditionally promised.

That admonition to one of the world's toughest leaders, not famed for pulling his punches, suggests how large the political stakes are in Begin's first meeting with Reagan. If Begin disregards advice from his American friends and takes his anti-AWACS case to the American people, recent U.S.-Israel differences could deteriorate into a serious split. That prospect worries the highest levels of the Reagan administration. It led one senior official to tell us privately: "If Begin's lobbying defeats the AWACS deal, he will have won the battle but he'll lose the war and he'll pay a helluva price for it."

That new aid could prove crucial to Israel's economy. As an offset to the AWACS sale, Reagan has promised to give Israel about a half-billion dollars in military sales besides the \$1.4 billion already programmed. The president also is offering to ease restrictions on Israel's right to manufacture weapons from U.S. patents, partly for sale abroad — a foreign currency earner of great importance to Israel.

Even the most ardent supporters of Israel, who fully endorse Begin's warnings that Saudi Arabia would threaten Israel if it gets the five AWACS, are passing word to Jerusalem: Cool it, Menahem, cool it. One such supporter is conservative Republican senator Roger Jepsen of Iowa, who just signed a "Dear Colleague" letter seeking new backers for the Senate resolution to kill the deal. Jepsen told us: "Begin ought to say nothing about the AWACS deal while he is here except that it's a matter for the president and Congress to determine."

Begin's reaction to the counsel he is getting from his American friends has been muted. He could face a difficult political problem here if he does not make a strong anti-AWACS case, a problem not with Reagan or top Jewish leaders but with the rank-and-file of American Jews. The anti-AWACS campaign has been the dominant issue in Jewish political activity the past three months. Any sign of a Begin retreat from his anti-AWACS hard line would sow confusion. "If it (the AWACS sale) goes through," wrote the authoritative New York Jewish Post Aug. 21, "the defeat can seriously affect the ability of the Jewish community to influence (future) political decisions involving Israel." That is an appeal for continued high pressure from the prime minister.

Similar advice in softer language is flowing to Begin in a stream of American Jewish leaders and politicians who have traveled to Jerusalem to see him just before his visit. Democratic senator Howard Metzenbaum of Ohio, one of the most influential Jewish leaders in Congress; Max Fisher, the Detroit industrialist who plays a potent background role on Jewish affairs with the Republican Party; Thomas Dine, head of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, and Howard

Jewish leaders close to national politics disagree with the newspaper. Defeat of the AWACS sale, they tell us privately, would be a momentary setback, without lingering damage.

A Loud Call For Tax Equality

NEW YORK (AP) — The big tax cut favors big business over small, says the National Small Business Association, whose rolls include 55,000 individuals and enterprises, none listed on a major stock exchange. The NSBA wants to make its position clear, for at least two reasons: First, it seeks to counter the position of some organizations that have little but praise for the cut. Second, it hopes in upcoming bills to correct some of what it sees as deficiencies hurting small business. Its position contrasts sharply with that of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which claims that "contrary to some published reports," the new law "affords substantial tax relief for smaller entrepreneurs." David Fransiak, chamber tax authority, says, "Business people are beginning to recognize the numerous benefits to smaller firms in the bill that may have been overlooked during the heat of debate." Herbert Liebenson, NSBA president, agrees that some relief is afforded small business by the new law. Still, he says, it is skewed in favor of

big business. What was overlooked, he says, was small business — in capital gains, for example, an area of great importance for small business operators considering the sale of their business. Prior to passage of a tax cut, all parties agreed that capital gains taxes should be cut, but there were two different methods: raising the percentage of income that could be excluded from taxes, and reducing the overall tax rates. The latter was chosen, to Liebenson's chagrin. "Increasing the exclusion would have treated every income level equally," he says. But "the method chosen, relying on overall rate cuts, does not." At \$200,000 of income, he states, a taxpayer under the new law will benefit from an overall rate cut from 70 percent to 50 percent, and a reduction in capital gains from 28 percent to 20 percent. That means a total tax reduction of 28.5 percent in the first year, says Liebenson. At \$50,000 of income, he continues, the reduction in the overall tax rate is to 38 percent from 49 percent over a four-year period, bringing with it a reduction in capital gains taxes to 15.2 percent

from 19.6 percent, or a 22.5 percent drop. The inequity doesn't end there, says Liebenson, explaining, "If the buyer is one of the 11,000 companies with nationally traded stock, then there would be no capital gains tax at all, because exchanges of the stock of one company for the stock of another are tax free." Liebenson has lots of criticisms, especially when he compares what could have been with what is. That is, when he matches the unsuccessful Ways and Means Committee version of the bill, which the NSBA supported, with the act finally passed by Congress and signed by the President. The Ways and Means version of the bill would have: 1. Cut corporate tax rates on taxable income up to \$200,000. 2. Allowed first-year "direct-expensing" of \$25,000 of equipment purchases beginning in 1981. 3. Raised the quantity of used machinery investment treated the same as new machinery to \$25,000 from \$100,000 in 1984. In contrast, the version that passed reduces corporate rates on taxable in-

come up to only \$50,000; allowed first-year expensing of just \$5,000 in 1982, rising to \$10,000 in 1986; and put the used machinery clause at only \$125,000 for 1981-1984 and \$150,000 beginning in 1985. All these measures have a pronounced impact on small as opposed to big business, Liebenson points out, and he had his researchers come up with some figures. "The specific small-business add-ons of the Ways and Means bill would have been worth tax savings of \$26.6 billion over five years for small business, or 16 percent of total business tax cuts," he said. As passed, however, Liebenson claims that just \$6.1 billion, or 4 percent, is earmarked for small business. He asks if this is fair to a segment of industry (defined by the Small Business Administration as under 500 workers in manufacturing and \$2 million in sales for retailing) that creates 80 percent of new jobs. And that accounts for about 60 percent of existing private sector employment, half of all industrial innovation, 48 percent of domestic output, 43 percent of the gross national product.

Other Editors Say Hard Choices

(Winston-Salem Sentinel)
Hard choices await the N.C. General Assembly when it returns to Raleigh in October. Human and fiscal consequences, which may not coincide, will be involved in shaping social programs to federal budget cuts. The magnitude of the task for legislators is far from clear. Federal and state officials cannot say yet the extent of reduction in services likely, or the administrative changes which will be necessary. The affected agencies are at an impasse in planning for the future, and many recipients look ahead with foreboding. The cuts Congress voted as part of President Reagan's package to revive the economy will be felt. For some programs, the loss in funds may be as much as 35 percent, taking into account the impact of inflation. The state does not have the money to make up the difference, Gov. James B. Hunt Jr. said. "We will not raise taxes," he added. Early estimates indicated as much as \$300 million might be sliced from programs in North Carolina. The figure has been revised and there are reports it could be as low as \$124 million. The calculation is still going on, said Harvey Lincoln, the state's federal budget coordinator. Until that's completed he said, it would be only speculation to forecast the overall reduction. The lower amount might make the cuts less painful, but it would not make the legislature's job any easier. The October session should deal with the implications of gearing down services to people in need, and not merely review the budget and let the cuts fall where they may. In short, legislators must tackle the issue with compassion, as well as a sense of sound fiscal management.

Four Stab Wounds In Prison Racial Violence

ATMORE, Ala. (AP) — Blacks and whites have resumed living together in inmate dormitories in the strife-torn Holman Prison, but officials at the maximum-security prison are poised for another show of force if racial tensions flare again.

The prison's 250 black inmates and 130 white inmates were segregated Sunday night when a brawl turned into what was described by prison officials as a "near riot." Four inmates suffered stab wounds.

Warden J.D. White ordered the dormitories re-integrated Tuesday night after the transfer from the prison of eight white and 13 black inmates whom state Department of Corrections spokesman Ron Tate described as "troublemakers."

Tate said an additional 16 inmates would be transferred today, bringing to 37 the number of prisoners removed from the troubled state prison near this southeast Alabama community.

"We were going to have to re-integrate the dormitories sooner or later," Tate said Tuesday night.

A federal judge has ruled that Alabama's prisons are overcrowded and ordered relief, but Tate said overcrowding had nothing to do with the disturbance.

Earlier Tuesday, white inmates at Holman tore into beds and walls to find metal for weapons until 140 riot-equipped state troopers and local police put down the disturbance without incidence, authorities said.

Tate said black and white inmates were marched into the prison yard and strip-searched for weapons. He said a large number of weapons were confiscated.

The confrontation was the second time troopers were used as a "show of force" since the Sunday brawl.

Riot-equipped state troopers and specially-trained squads of prison officers would remain "on

Tate said black inmates claimed Sunday's fight took place after some white prisoners tried to steal their property. White prisoners denied provoking the fight.

PAC Is Considered By N.C. Employees

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Two state government employee associations are looking into forming political actions committees, but they have not resolved whether the committees will be jointly held or separate, officials said Tuesday.

The North Carolina State Government Employees Association and the North Carolina State Employees Association currently make no political endorsements, but expect to begin doing so — and engaging in political fund-raising — soon.

Arch Laney, director of the NCSGEA, which includes 12,500 workers primarily in the departments of Correction and Transportation, said that his association was interested in forming a joint committee, however.

"If NCSEA is going to form a political action committee, it would be folly for NCSGEA to form one also," Laney said. "So, we're looking into the possibility of forming one political action committee to represent all state employees — or both associations."

A spokesman for the N.C. State Employees Association said the group would consider formation of a political action committee at its upcoming convention. But Lynn Wilson, editor of the association's publication, The State Employee, disputed reports that a joint committee would be formed with the other association.

"We have not held any discussions with GEA toward forming any committee," he said in a telephone call to The Associated Press.

The 1981 General Assembly's treatment of state employees — including the failure to grant a cost-of-living pay raise and job layoffs — have led to the move, Laney said.

Khadafy Says Will Destroy U.S. Depots

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy threatened to attack American nuclear arms depots around the Mediterranean if the U.S. Navy again challenges his control of the disputed Gulf of Sidra.

"We are warning the peoples of Sicily, Crete, Turkey and all the states of the Mediterranean that if America again attacks the Gulf of Sidra, then we will intentionally attack the nuclear depots in their countries and cause an international catastrophe," Khadafy declared in a speech Tuesday on the 12th anniversary of his overthrow of King Idris.

"We are willing to die for the Gulf of Sidra," he declared. "We will make the Gulf of Sidra into a new Red Sea with our blood."

It was over the disputed gulf some 50 miles off the Libyan coast that two U.S. Navy jet fighters shot down two Libyan fighters that fired on them during Navy maneuvers on Aug. 19. The Reagan administration held the maneuvers in the northern part of the gulf as a challenge to Khadafy's eight-year-old claim, which

no other nation recognizes. Khadafy also told a crowd of 25,000 in Tripoli's Green Square Libya will not lower its oil price under any circumstances, even though its production and revenues are way off because of the worldwide oil glut.

"Maybe we won't sell our oil for one, two or three years," he said, "and we will live in austerity for this period, but we will never kneel."

Diplomatic sources estimate Libyan oil revenues for the second half of 1981 at

\$4 billion to \$5 billion, compared to \$8 billion in the second half of 1980.

The North African nation, which sells about 475,000 barrels a day to the United States, charges \$40 a barrel for its high-grade oil, the highest price in the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. Algeria and Nigeria also charged \$40, and there were predictions that Libya and Algeria would be forced to come down after Nigeria cut its price to \$36 a barrel last week.

Khadafy also attacked

President Reagan in his speech, saying "He was a failure as an actor, and now he is a failure as a president. I am surprised he leads the greatest state in the world."

The anniversary celebration included a three-hour military review during which Soviet-built tanks and missiles rumbled past the reviewing stand and air force planes bought from the Soviet Union flew overhead.

Also in the parade were two dozen American jeeps and scores of other American, Japanese, British and

West German vehicles. "You can buy anything if you have the money," said

Khaliffa el Azzabi, the director of foreign information.

Choice Not Up To Boyce

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — Convicted spy Christopher Boyce said he would rather die by fasting than spend his life behind bars, but he may not be given that choice.

Boyce, 28, was transferred Tuesday night from a jail in Everett, Wash., to the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners in Springfield.

The transfer was a "tactical move" that could allow Boyce to be force-fed without a court order, said Robert Christman, deputy U.S. marshal in Seattle.

The move returns Boyce to the custody of the Department of Justice and the U.S. Bureau of Prisons, Christman said.

Boyce — chained, handcuffed and wearing a hooded sweatshirt — was whisked from Springfield Municipal Airport across town to the prison after his arrival.

He will be kept under close medical observation, said Joseph Crabtree, executive assistant to the warden. Crabtree said doctors would thoroughly examine Boyce before deciding whether to force-feed him.

"Nobody wants to die, but I don't want to go back to prison," Boyce's lawyer, William Dougherty of Tustin, Calif., quoted him as saying.

A federal magistrate in Los Angeles on Monday dismissed an escape charge against Boyce, who had fled a federal prison in California 19 months ago. He was serving a 40-year sentence for selling secret satellite documents to the Soviets.

Dismissing the charge allowed authorities to move Boyce without having to obtain court permission.

Boyce has refused to eat since he was recaptured in Port Angeles, Wash., Aug. 21, although he has been taking some liquids. A doctor who examined him Monday said he was in good condition. Christman said the doctor reported "there was no reason for worry."

Alberta And Ottawa Approve Oil Deal

OTTAWA (AP) — After feuding bitterly for nearly a year, Alberta province and the national government have reached agreement on setting prices and dividing revenues for oil pumped from the rich fields of the western province.

The accord, signed Tuesday in Ottawa, leaves Canadian motorists and consumers of home heating fuel facing the likelihood of massive fuel price increases over the next five years.

However, they have the government's assurance that domestic crude oil prices, long held far below world levels, will not be allowed to exceed 75 percent of the world price.

Under the agreement, based on projections of rising world oil prices, Canadian motorists could pay at least 20 cents more for a gallon of gasoline in each of the next five years. That would add at least \$1 to the current cost of \$1.20 a gallon if world prices rise according to government predictions.

A halt in the upward world price spiral at some point in the five year period would freeze the schedule of domestic increases.

Natural gas prices are scheduled to rise in phases from \$1.49 for a thousand cubic feet at the end of 1981 to \$3.54 for the same amount at the end of 1986.

Since Canada exports

most no oil and relatively little natural gas to the United States, the Canadian prices hikes are not likely to have any major impact on American consumers. But they probably will discourage American residents of the border states who have taken to crossing the border to buy cheaper Canadian gasoline.

As part of the agreement, signed Tuesday by Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau and Alberta Premier Peter Lougheed, the federal government in Ottawa has abandoned its effort to impose a tax on the export of natural gas to the United States, a tax that had ranked officials in Alberta.

After trying fruitlessly for two years to negotiate new price increases and a

division of oil revenues with the Alberta government, Ottawa acted unilaterally last October when Trudeau imposed mild price hikes and new federal taxes to boost the national government's share of oil revenues.

The western province struck back by cutting its oil production by 180,000 barrels a day, some 10 percent of Canada's overall production, in a bid to force the federal government to import more expensive foreign oil. However, declining demand offset the production cuts, which are to be reversed under the new agreement.

The feud also stirred separatist sentiments among some western Canadians angered by Ottawa's efforts to grab a larger share of the oil wealth pumped out of the western region.

After nearly a year of sporadic negotiations, Canadian Energy Minister Marc Lalonde and his Alberta counterpart, Merv Leitch, reached the new accord.

It calls for year-by-year increases in the price of a 42-gallon barrel of domestic oil to raise it from the current \$15.40 to a maximum of \$47.35 by July 1, 1986. The cap, however, will always be kept below 75 percent of the world price, which now ranges from a minimum of \$32 a barrel to a top price of \$40.

Under the plan, the federal

government will receive about \$11 billion a year more in oil revenues than under the previous Trudeau division. Its share increases to 29 percent from 24 percent in past years. Alberta will get about \$7 billion more, with its share rising one percentage point to 34 percent. The oil industry will get \$8 billion more, but will see its share of revenues drop from 43 percent to 37 percent.

The price increases apply to so-called "old oil," petroleum being pumped from

conventional wells. In addition, the price of oil produced in Alberta's "unconventional" oil sands projects will be increased to the world-price level by next June.

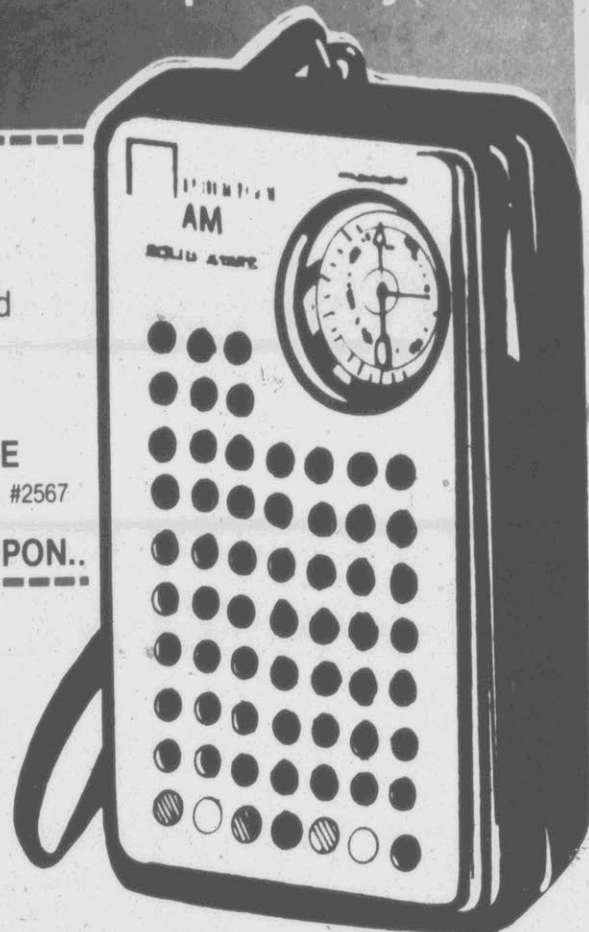

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Three valves that should have been closed were found open in a safety system of the Sequoyah nuclear power plant, and the Tennessee Valley Authority is investigating, a spokesman said.

A Nuclear Regulatory Commission resident inspector at the plant discovered the problem Aug. 26 in valves on a reactor building safety spraying system for Sequoyah's Unit 2 reactor. The reactor is not yet operating.

Carl Crawford, a spokesman for the federally owned utility, said the valves are near pumps that force water containing boron up to spray heads at the top of the building housing the Unit 2 reactor. Boron, a mild cleaning agent, absorbs neutrons and can be sprayed into an atomic fission process to slow the reaction.

FARMVILLE — Volume of sales on the Farmville Tobacco Market was heavy Tuesday compared to the previous day's total. Demand remained steady and prices on most grades showed little change for Monday.

Top price paid by a buying company Tuesday was \$1.90 and deliveries to the Stabilization Corporation continue to account for only a small percentage of total sales.

Coin Error Said Proof True Shroud

CHICAGO (AP) — A rare spelling error on an ancient coin proves that the Shroud of Turin — considered by some Christians to be the burial cloth of Jesus Christ — is not a forgery and establishes the approximate age of the cloth, a Jesuit priest says.

The Rev. Francis L. Filas, a Loyola University theology professor, said an enlargement of a photograph of the coin turned up a misspelling from the Greek words for "Tiberius Caesar" that occurs on both the shroud pattern and the coin.

Filas said in a telephone interview that the "c" among the four letters on the coin, UCAL, is believed to be a spelling error for a "k" in "Tiberiou Kaisaros." He said those misspelled coins were issued between A.D. 29 and A.D. 32 — about the time of Jesus' death.

The coins, Filas said, were issued by Pontius Pilate, then the governor of Palestine.

The shroud is a strip of linen 14 feet by 3½ feet kept under tight security at a church in Turin, Italy. It seems to bear the imprints of a crucified man.

A group of scientists who conducted tests to determine the authenticity of the cloth have reported that stains on the material were caused by blood.

Earlier this summer, Filas said a computer analysis of photographs of the shroud confirmed that a coin issued between those years was placed on the right eye of the figure of the man in the shroud.

In years past, coins were used to close the eyes of a dead person.

Filas, who has studied the shroud for 35 years, said the misspelling, uncovered by enlarging the coin photograph 25 times, "completely excludes the possibility of any forgery of the shroud imprints."

"Even the wildest imagination cannot now justify any claim that tiny letters one-thirty-second of an inch high could have been painted on a cloth as a photographic negative, together with a most unusual misspelling apparently unknown to modern coin collectors, concerning an obscure coin from Palestine long ago," he said.

Some researchers, however, doubt whether a coin really exists in the photographs of the shroud.

"I think the problem is whether there is any indication of a coin," said Dr. Walter C. McCrone, a Chicago microscopist who has done research on the shroud. "Not very many people except Father Filas are able to see it. The linen is so coarse, it's difficult to make out the details."

Rewards Up To \$7,000 Offered

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Authorities have offered rewards up to \$7,000 for information leading to the capture of the person who tortured and killed an elderly Gibsonville woman Aug. 21.

Gov. Jim Hunt has offered a \$5,000 reward, and Crime Stoppers programs in Greensboro and Burlington have offered up to \$1,000 each in connection with the slaying of Nell Greeson Ray, 76.

Leaf Critics' Past Raised By Sen. East

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) — In a heated defense of federal tobacco price supports Tuesday, Sen. John East, R-N.C., made reference to past legal and psychiatric problems of two congressional tobacco foes.

East's remarks came at a press conference when he was asked about reports that several members of Congress think the aggressive style of Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., may backfire and endanger the tobacco programs.

"That story began with (Democratic) Congressman Frederick Richmond of New York," East said. "He was the only one that was quoted. Congressman Richmond is now serving in a rehabilitation program because of a morals charge in the nation's capital."

At another point in the news conference East was asked about possible motivations of Missouri Democrat Sen. Thomas Eagleton' opposition to tobacco programs.

East said: "Now he was George McGovern's running mate, you know, in 1972, and then dropped out because it turned out he had mental problems and ... as to the motivations of Sen. Eagleton, I do not know. I would direct those questions to Sen. Eagleton."

Eagleton was McGovern's vice presidential choice until it was learned he had undergone psychiatric treatment, including shock therapy.

Richmond was arrested in the summer of 1978 in Washington on a charge of soliciting a young man for sex acts. The charge was dropped after Richmond pleaded innocent and agreed to participate in a Washington court's first offender program.

A spokesman for Richmond said East's account of the congressman's arrest three years ago or so, morals charge was untrue and "unworthy of a man of his caliber."

Richmond was in Japan Tuesday, but a spokesman in his Washington office said the court program lasted one month. The solicitation incident, which involved "a conversation and nothing more," has long been forgotten by Richmond's Brooklyn constituents, said the spokesman, who asked not to be named.

"It wasn't news three weeks after it happened," he said. "I just don't understand what Mr. East is trying to do."

East was asked whether his comments on Richmond were pertinent to the questions on tobacco. "I think when a man is under a court order because of dropped charges on a criminal prosecution, it tells you something, possibly, about the character of the individual. Yes, I think that's a legitimate observation," East said.

East wasn't the first senator to refer to Richmond's arrest. Four weeks ago Helms called Richmond a "loudmouth congressman from Brooklyn ... who has a curious lifestyle, I might add." A Richmond aide at the time called it "a graceless remark."

Silverman Will Become Teacher

NEW YORK (AP) — Former NBC president Fred Silverman, a 1958 graduate of Syracuse University, will teach a graduate course in TV programming there beginning in January.

Silverman will be a visiting professor in the university's S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications.

Silverman resigned as NBC's chief executive officer June 30. He is the man generally credited with engineering ABC's rise to dominance in prime time before taking the NBC post.

Silverman's course at Syracuse will be called "Television Programming, Today and Tomorrow."

PEKING (AP) — U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice Warren Burger is in China for a 10-day visit, which will include a meeting with Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping.

South Africans Captured One Russian, Killed Two

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — South Africa captured a Soviet sergeant major and killed two Soviet lieutenant colonels during its Angolan invasion, a Defense Ministry spokesman said today.

In a telephone interview from Pretoria, the spokesman said Sgt. Maj. Nikolai Fyodorovich Pestretsov, who was earlier identified as a warrant officer, was captured during a skirmish in Angola about 30 miles north of the South-West African border.

The spokesman, who asked not to be identified, did not provide names of the slain Soviet officers or details of their deaths.

He said more than half of the South African forces in Angola had been withdrawn and the rest would be pulled out "according to schedule." He could not say when the troops would return to South-West Africa because they were "still having problems with land mines."

An informed source estimated that the force totaled 4,000 when the invasion began Aug. 24.

South Africa's defense minister said Tuesday that the Soviet casualties in Angola prove the Namibian guerrillas are controlled and supported by the Soviet Union.

"There can be no doubt that the terrorist organization SWAPO is controlled by and given ideological and material support by the Soviet Union," said Defense Minister Magnus Malan in a statement.

"Earlier, it was generally believed and acclaimed that Soviet Russia was only indirectly involved, but now the opposite has been proved, namely the direct involvement of military personnel on the lower levels of terrorist movements."

SWAPO is the South-West Africa Peoples Organization, which has been fighting a bush war for 15 years to try to end South Africa's control

of South-West Africa, or Namibia, as the big territory between South Africa and Angola is called by black Africa and the United Nations.

South African forces make periodic raids into Angola to attack SWAPO bases there. This time, informed sources reported, the chief targets were radar and anti-aircraft missile batteries installed by the Soviet Union and its East European allies in southern Angola to aid SWAPO and the Angolan army.

The South Africans advanced more than 60 miles into Angola, then announced last weekend that they were withdrawing. A field commander of the invasion force told visiting reporters that

the radar installations and missile batteries were destroyed and an estimated 450 Angolan troops and SWAPO guerrillas were killed.

In Washington, a senior Reagan administration official said the Soviet Union and East Germany have had 1,000 advisers in Angola for some time, assisting Angola's Marxist government and the Namibian guerrillas. He said the Soviet Union is a major supplier of arms to the Angolans, and some of these are being used by SWAPO.

Meanwhile, the Soviet Union accused the U.S. government of displaying a "high-handed disregard" of world opinion by vetoing a U.N. Security Council resolu-

tion condemning the South African invasion of Angola.

"Even the United States' closest NATO allies have not dared to challenge the world public so blatantly," said the official Soviet news agency Tass.

The United States said it vetoed the resolution Monday night because it did not mention the estimated 20,000 Cuban troops in Angola and the Soviet military advisers there as contributors to the situation in the area.

The other two members of the North Atlantic Alliance on the Security Council are Britain and France. Britain abstained on the vote while France voted for the resolution along with the other 12 members of the council.

Study Cuts In Welfare

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — About 500 employees of social welfare agencies from 10 Southeastern states gathered in Wilmington Tuesday to discuss the impact of federal budget cuts on social programs.

The North Carolina Department of Human Resources is sponsoring the three-day conference of the American Public Welfare Association, said department spokesman Bill Lamb.

"It's an annual conference but it's particularly keen right now in view of the state of flux most human service programs are in," Lamb said.

Most social service workers are now learning what they will have to contend with because the federal fiscal year begins Oct. 1, he said.

"Most are at the point where they will be begin a new era of social service programs," Lamb said.

Conference sessions will discuss ways to cope with budget cuts and what the changes will mean, he said.

Although some agencies will face tighter regulations and others will have more freedom, all will have less money, Lamb said.

Dr. Bert Adams, professor of sociology at the University of Wisconsin, began the conference Tuesday with a speech on the changes affecting families, including changes in economics and individual values.

Association director Edward T. Weaver was scheduled to speak Wednesday morning on national issues in public welfare.

Other topics on the agenda include block grants, employment and welfare, innovative foster parent projects and increasing productivity through motivation.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose 2.57 to 885.27 in the first half hour.

Gainers took a 2-1 lead over losers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

The market, which slumped Monday to its lowest levels of the year, began to recover Tuesday on word that President Reagan was willing to consider cuts in defense spending to help narrow the federal budget deficit.

The prospect of large deficits has taken a heavy toll on the bond market lately because it carries with it the need for increased borrowing by the government.

Analysts also said, however, that many traders were likely to remain skeptical about chances for a balanced budget until they could see concrete evidence of progress in that direction.

Today's early prices included Ralston Purina, up 1/4 at 12 1/4; Union Camp, unchanged at 47 1/4, and Superior Oil, down 1/4 at 37 1/4.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average gained 1.24 to 882.71.

But declines outnumbered advances by a 3-2 margin on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 45.11 million shares, against 40.36 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index gained .08 to 71.28.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 2.96 at 352.89.

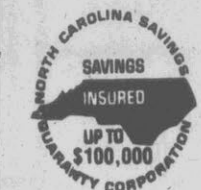

Emory: '81 Pirates Best Prepared Club Been With

"It would be easy to put all the marbles on the 1981 season," East Carolina football coach Ed Emory told the Greenville Sports Club yesterday. "But that would leave something left to desire for 1982, 1983 and the years ahead. That's not our plan."

Emory, speaking to the club's first 1981-82 season meeting, said that he and his staff are trying to build something that will last at ECU.

And looking forward to the 1982 season, he announced that East Carolina had yesterday received Greg Quick, a transfer from Clemson, into the Pirate camp. Quick, regarded as one of the outstanding linemen in the state last year at Scotland High School, is a 6-6, 260-pound offensive tackle, who was highly recruited last winter, and narrowed his choices to ECU, Clemson and Georgia, before signing with the Tigers.

But he left school there last week and came to East Carolina instead, where he will be eligible starting in 1982.

Emory said that the 1981 Pirate team is "the best prepared I've ever been associated with. We have tried to prepare them for any crisis on or off the field."

"But we have lots of 17 and 18-year-olds on this team, and under pressure they might forget what they've been taught. We just hope they can retain it."

While Emory noted that the Pirates are a young group, he feels that they will improve greatly as they gain experience. "I hope we'll get better winning, since success breeds success."

The coach said that the team's confidence has come a long way since last season. "I've asked the kids to be in top playing condition, and I think we're close to this. I've asked them to be mentally tough, and I think we've come a long way in this. They are doing things now they thought

Ali Ready For Risk, To Fight Canadian

NEW YORK (AP) — Muhammad Ali, the best friend a travel agent ever had, has the boxing crowd on the road again.

The globe-trotting three-time heavyweight champ plans to return to the ring once more, this time for a Dec. 2 date in Nassau, the Bahamas, an island vacation stop he had somehow missed until now.

For the announcement of his latest comeback, Ali chose a Biblical-sounding quotation.

"He who is not courageous enough to take a risk," the ex-champ said, "will accomplish nothing in life."

Ali, who has accomplished plenty, is ready to do some risk-taking again.

Although formal contracts have not been signed, Ali and Bahamian officials said Canadian Trevor Berbick has agreed verbally to the Dec. 2 fight.

Berbick said at his home in Halifax, Nova Scotia, he had been told the date depended on television commitments.

The 27-year-old Jamaica-born fighter said that Ali was a hero of his youth, and added: "Yes, I am really going to fight the man. It's for real."

Dec. 2 is six weeks before Ali's 40th birthday and exactly 14 months after he was stopped in 11 rounds by World Boxing Council champion Larry Holmes. Six months after beating Ali, Holmes outpointed Berbick in another title fight.

The loss to Holmes seemed to finish Ali. He looked bad and was unable to get a license from any state boxing commission

Tech Hoping To Surprise Opponents

ATLANTA (AP) — Bill Curry is pushing a positive attitude at Georgia Tech, one he hopes will help the Yellow Jackets return to football prominence.

"We'll be underdogs in 10 games," Curry said Tuesday as members of the Atlantic Coast Conference media tour stopped at Tech.

"I think we'll beat some people we're not supposed to beat," said Curry, who went through a 1-10-1 campaign last year in his rookie season at the helm of his alma mater.

"I know we will," he added. Curry bases his optimism on the return of quarterback Mike Kelley, a more experienced offensive line anchored by 270-pound tackle David Lutz and an improved set of running backs to take some of the pressure off Kelley and the passing game.

Among those runners is Jimmy Stanley, a 200-pound speedster who has run 40 yards in under 4.4 seconds, returning starters David Allen and Ronny Cone and freshman sensation Robert Lavette, who rushed for just under 7,000 yards in his high school career. Kelley, hampered by injuries in 1981, passed for 832 yards last year, including 333 against national champion Georgia. He is getting competition from Jim Bob Taylor, a strong running quarterback who

transferred from Southern Methodist.

Curry put the Jackets through a demanding offseason weight program, and it apparently paid off. On Tuesday, he went down a roster listing spring weights of the players, and he said most had added pounds.

"We worked hard to improve

our size," Curry said, noting that when the Jackets played Georgia last year the defense had only one starter heavier than 220-pound All-American tailback Herschel Walker of the Bulldogs.

"We don't allow 'em on the field with pot bellies," he said. "Size means nothing if you can't move."

McEnroe Wins, Chastises Fans

NEW YORK (AP) — Defending champion John McEnroe welcomed himself home. He won his match.

And then he chastised his hometown audience, saying it didn't know how to treat an American hero.

McEnroe, who won Wimbledon and is ranked No. 1 in the world, beat little-known Juan Nunez of Chile Tuesday, 6-7, 6-1, 6-3, 6-1. They played around two rain delays, so 4 hours and 34 minutes passed between the start and finish of their match.

The frequently embattled and always battling McEnroe made his return to the National Tennis Center in Flushing Meadow in a not-unexpected manner. He argued with officials, and he upbraided a television sound man.

And, in a new twist on temper tantrums, he scolded the children sitting behind him. Their offense: they were cheering for his opponent.

It bothers me when people say 'Come on, Juan,' when they're saying it to me. I told them 'Fine, if you want to say that, go over to his side and say it. But don't just say it to me.' 'It's really disappointing how little support Americans get in general,' he said.

In other openers, third-seeded Tracy Austin, the 1979 champion, defeated Anne Hobbs of Great Britain 6-1, 6-2; fourth-seeded Jimmy Connors

downed John Lloyd of Great Britain 6-0, 6-0, 6-2; No. 3 Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia beat Hans Simonsson of Sweden 6-2, 6-2, 6-2.

In a night match, fifth-seeded Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia scraped by Mary Lou Piatek, winning 6-7, 7-6, 6-3. Piatek had a match point against Mandlikova in the second set.

Mandlikova, who was the runner-up to Chris Evert Lloyd here last year and at Wimbledon this summer, has been incensed at her low seeding this year. And her ire was further provoked Tuesday night by line calls that went against her.

Jose Luis Clerc of Argentina, the fifth seed, easily defeated Australian Brad Drewett 6-4, 6-3, 6-3.

Bjorn Borg, who is seeded second, will play Marcus Gunthardt of Switzerland today. Borg, who had won five Wimbledon in a row, lost there to McEnroe in the final this year and also dropped to No. 2 in the computerized rankings, if not in a majority of minds.

Lloyd, as the defending women's champion, opens her fight for a sixth Open title against Kathrin Keil tonight.

McEnroe is questing after his third consecutive U.S. Open crown. The last time a man won such a string of American championships was in 1925, when Bill Tilden won his sixth.

The 22-year-old McEnroe was shocked in the first set by the hard hitting and aggressiveness of Nunez, who is ranked 193rd in the world.

But after two rain delays, sheer power wasn't enough against McEnroe. For one thing, Nunez frequently overhit

as he grew more tired. And scampering about the court only left him more vulnerable to McEnroe's more practiced tactics.

Nunez was certainly a hero with the crowd of 14,000 after he beat McEnroe in the first set tiebreaker, coming back from 0-5 down to win it 8-6.

Not far into the next set, rain forced suspension of the match, and as Nunez left the court, people applauded thunderously.

The ovation was repeated when he returned later. As McEnroe entered the court, some people booed, but they were quickly overwhelmed by lusty cheers and clapping.

"I like being home and I like playing here. I just wish people would get behind me," he groused.

It was a remarkable perfor-

"Reggie's one of the big reasons we're going the way we are," said Michael after the red-hot Jackson helped the Yankees rout the Minnesota Twins 11-6 Tuesday night. Jackson hit a towering three-run homer and a single and has now hit safely in the Yankees' last five games, which incidentally have all been New York victories.

NCAA Moving To Settle CFA Dispute

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The NCAA was making moves aimed at a settlement with the College Football Association in their dispute over a potential TV contract between the CFA and NBC, NCAA sources say.

The recommendations, prepared by a subcommittee of the Governance Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, specifically recommend many of the changes in NCAA rules and procedures that the CFA schools have sought for years, The Daily Oklahoman reported in today's editions.

NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers is prepared to talk about the recommendations at a meeting of the Big Eight in Kansas City today, and subcommittee member Charlie Scott of Alabama will report on them at a meeting of the Southeastern Conference in Atlanta, Ga., today and Thursday, sources told the newspaper.

A member of the subcommittee said the changes "are intended to give more voice to the football interests in Division I," although he declined to reveal the precise text.

until the proposals are forwarded to the entire committee.

"They are a signal that the kinds of things they (the CFA schools) want to hear are the recommendations that are being made," he said.

The recommendations, generally worded, are to restructure Division IA into a group that would include about 80-90 schools with major football programs, change the method of voting on the NCAA football TV contract, and halt the proliferation of basketball schools in Division I, the newspaper reported.

The NCAA source insisted that the recommendations are no different than they would have been if the subcommittee had gotten around to them a year ago, but admitted that a "crisis situation" now exists.

The CFA has already approved a four-year, \$180 million football TV contract with NBC that would be in direct conflict with a \$263.5 million contract negotiated by the NCAA with ABC and CBS for the same period.

Garner Sent To Houston

PITTSBURGH (AP)—After rejecting the Pittsburgh Pirates latest contract offer, second baseman Phil "Scrap Iron" Garner has been traded to the Houston Astros for three players.

"I suspected it might happen, but I didn't know when," the 32-year-old Garner said Tuesday as he prepared to leave the Los Angeles hotel where the Pirates stayed during their three-game series with the Dodgers. "I'm going to Houston."

Because only players on a team's roster before Sept. 1 are eligible for postseason play, Garner's status for the playoffs was uncertain. Houston and

four other teams on Tuesday were separated by only 2½ games in the National League West.

The only other player in the trade to be officially identified was minor league infielder Johnny Ray, although the Houston Chronicle said one of the others was pitcher Randy Niemann.

"I've been working on this move for a long time," said Astros General Manager Al Rosen.

Ray, a 24-year-old switch-hitting second baseman, spent the entire 1981 season with Houston's Tucson club in the Pacific Coast League, where he batted .348 with five home runs and 75 RBI in 132 games. His 50 doubles led the league.

"The opportunity to get Ray and the fact that Phil is unsigned weighed heavily in the trade decision," a Pirates spokesman said.

Garner, who represented his teammates with the Major League Baseball Players Association, recently rejected what Pirates Executive Vice President Pete Peterson called "a good offer." The two sides had talked for five days.

Without a settlement, Garner would have become a free agent in November.

"Things didn't work out in Pittsburgh," Garner said. "I like the town. I liked (Manager) Chuck Tanner. I've spent six of my seven major league years with Chuck. I really hate to leave him."

Mike Marshall didn't want to make the pitch too good — and it wasn't.

With Houston and the New York Mets tied 2-2 in the bottom of the ninth inning Tuesday night, the Astros had pinch-runner Scott Loucks on third base with two outs, with Marshall on the mound for the Mets.

"I had two open bases and I wanted to make certain I didn't throw it down the middle if the plate," said Marshall. "I wasn't worried about throwing strikes; I just wanted to make quality pitches."

Not only was his fourth pitch to Harry Spilman not down the middle, it was low and far outside, and Loucks scored easily when the ball rolled away from catcher Alex Trevino. The run gave the Astros a 3-2 victory, their sixth in a row, all at home.

Loucks was running for Alan Ashby, who doubled off Marshall with one out in the ninth. He advanced to third on a groundout.

Loucks actually had another chance to score when Spilman's first pitch to Spilman got away from Trevino.

"I didn't think it got far enough away to make it on that first one," Loucks said. "I couldn't take the bat out of Harry's hand. He was up there to drive me in."

Three pitches later, Loucks walked home on the wild pitch. For Marshall, it was his first loss of the season after winning his first two decisions over the Astros in New York last week.

"There aren't many who have learned to handle my pitches effectively, but I'm sure Alex will get better as time goes on," Marshall said. "I just can't concern myself whether the catcher can handle my pitches or not."

Joe Sambito, 4-5, who lost twice to the Mets and Marshall last week, was the winner with two innings of one-hit pitching.

"Today I was better but I know I'm still not all the way back," said Sambito. "I haven't let it bother me. The only way you can get out of a slump is to go out there and do the job."

Houston took a 2-0 lead in the fourth inning when Art Howe doubled home a run and Luis Pujols got credit for an RBI when Howe scored as third baseman Hubie Brooks booted Pujols' grounder.

Houston starter Joe Niekro baffled the Mets on two hits through six innings, but he yielded two runs in the seventh.

Niekro walked Brooks to open the seventh and left the game after Lee Mazzilli's double to center field ycored Brooks from first base.

Dave Smith replaced Niekro and yielded a run-scoring single to pinch-hitter Rusty Staub.

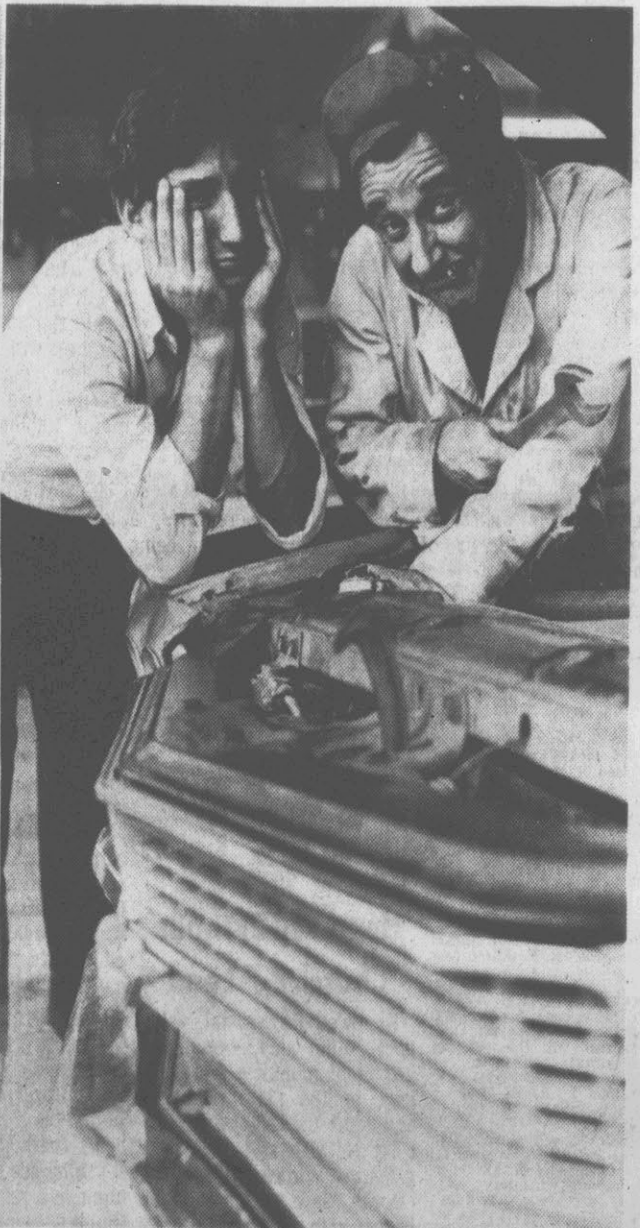

until late last month, when South Carolina granted one to him. But now he is back again, driven by the desire to win the title for a fourth time.

"People give up too easy. They quit too easy," he said. "I love challenges. Don't tell me it can't be done. I'm out to prove it can be."

Speaking in a thick voice, Ali said he now weighs 241 pounds and would be at 230 for Berbick, a Canadian who has a 16-2-1 career record.

"Everybody questions why I want to do this," Ali said. "Why? Because it's there. It's something I've got to do. Why did we go to the moon? Because it's there. They say, 'You've won it three times. Be satisfied with that.' But we weren't satisfied with the moon. Now we're going to Mars and Venus and Saturn, because they're there."

Ali, his attorney and the promoters would not discuss purses, but a South Carolina boxing figure who had hoped to promote Ali's comeback fight said the former champion had told him he was being paid \$2.6 million.

Ali teased newsmen who have suggested he is too old to be fighting. "I won't let you tell me I'm through," he said. "I've never been a quitter. I always liked challenges. Do I look like an old man to you with gray hair?"

He shrugged off his poor showing against Holmes. "You say I looked so bad," Ali said. "What if I threw up my arms and said I quit and walked out?"

That was an obvious reference to Roberto Duran's welterweight title loss to Sugar Ray Leonard last November in New Orleans. It was on the first Leonard-Duran card in June 1980 that Berbick won notice when he knocked out former World Boxing Association champ John Tate. That earned him the title chance last April against Holmes, who was coming off the Ali fight. By going the 15-round distance with Holmes, Berbick snapped the champion's string of eight straight knockout defenses.

Ali said that although he lost to Holmes, he did not get hurt. "There was something terribly wrong with me that night," he said. "I'm 241 now and I can do better than I did that night."

He is driven by the idea of being champion for a fourth time, Ali said.

"I know I can do it..." Then he paused for effect. "... because Holmes is getting old."

The 31-year old Holmes, promoter Don King announced Tuesday, will fight Renaldo Snipes in mid-November at a yet to be determined site.

Kemp, Moses Pass Waivers

As the unkindest cut of all — the final preseason paring of National Football League teams' rosters — was conducted, some players didn't know if they were coming or going. Some, in fact, were doing both.

All 28 NFL teams had to be down to 45 players by Tuesday. Several well-known performers felt the ax and others wound up on the injured reserve list.

But a number of players were placed on waivers, went unclaimed and found themselves back with their original teams and slated to suit up this weekend for the start of the season. That list included rookie quarterback Jeff Kemp of Los Angeles, linebackers Brian Cabral of Chicago, Mike Curcio of Philadelphia and Doug Graf of Washington, wide receivers Haven Moses of Denver, Matt

Bouza of San Francisco and Johnnie Dirden of Pittsburgh and tight end Steve Stephens of the New York Jets.

"I'm just speechless. It's something that I really wanted and the Good Lord came through for me," said Dirden, a former cement truck driver from Houston. He had been cut this season by Winnipeg of the Canadian League after being released in past seasons by Houston and Kansas City. The Steelers have had a slew of injuries at wide receiver, so they sneaked Dirden through waivers and re-signed him.

The Broncos felt that Moses, 35 and a 14-year veteran, was too old and made too much money for any team to claim him. They were right.

"If I felt we were taking a big chance of Haven being picked up," said Broncos Coach Dan Reeves, "I wouldn't have put him there."

A number of veterans were cut and then claimed by other teams, including safety Mike Fuller, released by San Diego and picked up by Cincinnati; defensive end Doug Sutherland, who moved from Minnesota to Seattle, and wide receiver John Floyd, who went from Washington to St. Louis.

Among the noteworthy players who will be out of work are tight end Rich Caster, cut by Houston; running backs Jim Jensen, let go by Denver, and Mike Thomas, sent packing by San Diego; defensive end Ken Sanders and defensive back Marvin Cobb, both released by Minnesota, and placekicker Matt Bahr, cut by Pittsburgh.

They joined players such as quarterback Dan Pastorini, placekickers Don Cockroft and Tim Mazzetti, running backs Elvis Peacock and Terry Miller and wide receiver Lou Piccone — all of whom were

cut on Monday — on the sidelines.

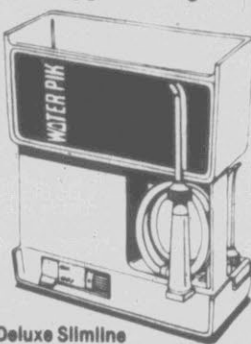
The injured reserve list was filled with NFL standouts, some of whom will be eligible to rejoin their teams after four games this season. Quarterback Gifford Nielsen of Houston, linebackers Jack Ham of Pittsburgh, Ed Simonini of Baltimore, Brad Dusek of Washington and Jerry Muckensturm of Chicago; tight end Ken McAfee and running back Doug Paschal of Minnesota.

Of the veterans cut, the most surprising might have been Thomas and Fuller, both released by the powerful Chargers. Thomas, acquired from Washington in 1979, was the NFL rookie of the year in 1975 with 919 yards rushing and added 1,101 the following season. Fuller ranks 11th among the league's all-time punt returners.

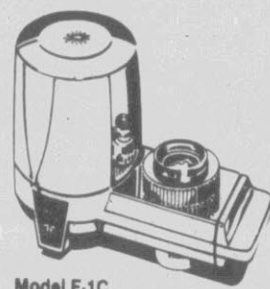

Geothermal Power Is Untapped

OLKARIA, Kenya (AP) — Deep beneath the Rift Valley, which anthropologists consider the cradle of mankind, lies a largely untapped energy source that could provide heat and light for many future generations of East Africans, energy officials say.

The same sedimentary deposits and seismic buckling of the earth's crust that helped preserve the fossilized remains of man-like creatures more than 3 million years ago also formed underground reservoirs of hot water and steam heated by the earth's molten core.

In Africa, Kenya has taken the lead in harnessing this "geothermal" energy — generally found in volcanic regions — and has just commissioned an electricity-generating station powered by steam from beneath the earth.

The Olkaria Geothermal Project, the first on the continent, covers more than 40 square miles in a range of hills on the edge of the Rift Valley near the southern shore of Lake Naivasha about 90 miles northwest of Nairobi, Kenya's capital.

It draws steam from seven of 19 wells drilled so far, ranging in depth from 2,970 feet to 5,561 feet. The one turbine already installed feeds 15 megawatts — around 5 percent of Kenya's electricity needs — into the grid of the East African Power and Lighting Co.

A faint smell of sulfur hung in the air and waste steam plumed from several wells as company officials showed off the power plant to a group of journalists during a recent United Nations conference on new and renewable sources of energy in Nairobi.

Sulfur and silica are among the minerals separated from the steam before it is piped to the turbine. But officials said the amounts extracted are too small for commercial exploitation.

Geothermal power was one of 14 non-conventional

sources of energy considered by the U.N. conference as alternatives to conventional sources such as oil and coal once the fossil fuels run out.

Though new in Africa, exploitation of geothermal power has been under way elsewhere since early this century. The first experimental geothermal electricity station was built in Larderello, Italy, in 1904, and in 1913 the Italians built a full-sized plant to provide electricity for a railway.

The heating of houses with hot water and steam from the earth began in Reykjavik, Iceland, in 1930. According to a London-based energy lobbying group called Earthscan, about 110,000 people are supplied with geothermal heat on the volcanic North Atlantic island.

Italy, the United States, the Philippines, New Zealand, Japan, Mexico and El Salvador generate significant amounts of their electricity at geothermal stations, according to Earthscan and the U.N. Development Program (UNDP).

The United States is far and away the world leader with installed geothermal capacity — 923 megawatts. The Philippines is second with 446 megawatts, Italy third with 440 and New Zealand fourth with 202, U.N. figures show.

According to the UNDP, such countries as China, India, and France; Ethiopia and Djibouti in Africa; and Chile, Costa Rica and Nicaragua in Latin America are at various stages of harnessing geothermal energy — ranging from exploration to construction of plants.

China began work this year on a geothermal project aimed eventually at heating all of Peking, a city of 9 million. The first two-year phase of the project, according to the UNDP, will focus on directly heating a large housing project in one part of the city.

"Geothermal heat is now attractive as an energy

source for power generation," Yves Rovani, the World Bank's energy director, told the U.N. conference in Nairobi. He said the bank has provided about \$100 million for geothermal projects in three countries, including Kenya, and is prepared to expand lending to further develop geothermal energy.

The Kenyans first began exploring for geothermal deposits in the 1950s in the Olkaria field. But it wasn't until the mid-1970s — with financing from the World Bank and the UNDP and help

from UNDP technicians — that the drilling bits struck reservoirs of hot water and steam worth tapping.

The Rift Valley, caused by a fault in the earth's crust, runs from Mozambique, through Tanzania, Kenya and Ethiopia into the Red Sea and is clearly visible in satellite photographs. All the countries along the fault could eventually tap its geothermal reserves.

One drawback of geothermal power is the capital outlay for drilling and construction of the plant. The Olkaria project cost about

\$89 million, the UNDP said, including a second 15-megawatt turbine that is expected to begin operating in 1982.

But the plant will save Kenya about 180,000 barrels of oil a year, which at current market prices is worth about \$5.5 million.

The running costs of such a plant are also sharply lower than a generating station fueled by oil or coal.

"I would call it nothing, almost," commented maintenance engineer Malachi Asura, "because the steam is free."

Awards Are Set

The Southern Flue-Cured Tobacco Festival, the Production Credit Association and the Federal Land Bank will sponsor the Farmer of the Year and the Young Farmer of the Year awards during the 1981 Tobacco Festival. The winners will be honored at a dinner on November 19 in Greenville.

Participation is limited to residents of Edgecombe, Nash, Wilson, Beaufort, Martin, Pitt, Greene, Lenoir and Craven counties.

According to Arnold B. Parris, awards committee chairman, the festival committee is seeking nominations within the nine designated areas.

Nominations, which should be presented to the Agricultural Extension Agent in the nominees' respective counties, must be received no later than September 11.

Participants in the Young Farmer program must be tobacco growers between the ages of 20-35. The Farmer of the Year participants must be tobacco growers and 35 years of age or older. Farmers from both categories need not be self-employed.

The tobacco farmers must have the endorsement of either their county extension office, the tobacco board of trade, an agri-business organization or a tobacco warehouseman. They should submit reasons why they believe they should be considered for the award. Reasons may include improvements made in their farming operation over the past five years. Individual crop acreage must be submitted and certified for the total farming operation.

The judging will be performed by a panel of men and women actively involved with the tobacco industry.

Aerial Alert System Design Said Confusing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Transportation Safety Board says there are problems with the "conflict alert" alarm system that warns air traffic controllers that aircraft are flying too close to each other.

The five-member panel, studying an incident that

occurred last Oct. 7 at Hartsfield International Airport near Atlanta, said Tuesday that the system is designed in such a way that its warnings can be overlooked by controllers.

On that day, the alarm sounded five times in a six-minute period but con-

trollers reacted to it only once, according to the board, which said the system's signals can be confusing.

The alarm triggers whenever aircraft are closer than the separation specified by the Federal Aviation Administration, but because it sounds at a central location, controllers cannot tell from the signal alone which radar screen has the alert, the board said.

The audio signal is identical to an alarm set off when an aircraft goes below a specific altitude. The board said aircraft using visual flight rules often trigger the alarm when, in fact, there is no collision danger.

The conflict alert alarm automatically causes an aircraft's data tag on the radar screen flash. The board said, however, there is an identical flashing whenever an aircraft is about to be handed off from one controller to another.

As a result, the board's staff said, a controller can see numerous flashing data tags on his screen even when there is no conflict alert.

The board held off final recommendations for change to the FAA to give its staff time to refine a number of proposals under consideration.

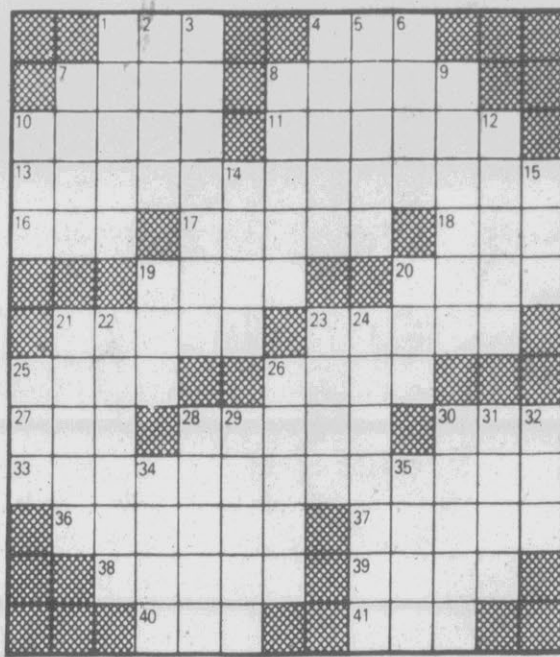
The panel discussed the system as its special task force began investigating whether air safety is being affected directly by the air traffic controllers strike.

Argentina's Political Parties Are Pushing For Civilian Rule

Associated Press Writer BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Argentina's five major political parties, claiming the military government's "process of national reorganization" is leading the country to ruin, have banded together to lobby for a return to civilian rule.

The Radical Civic Union—next to the Peronists the most powerful political organization in modern Argentina—has gathered the parties under what it calls a "national convocation." In addition to the Peronists, the other parties are the Developmentalists, Intransigents and Christian Democrats. The five parties accounted for more than 80 percent of the vote in the last election.

Together they have called on the military to say when it plans the return power to civilians and have demanded unrestricted political activity.

The charter of the "Multiparty"—as the group is called—claims Argentina is facing "a political, economic and social crisis leading us inexorably to national disaster." It contends the only way out is "full respect for the national constitution and the unconditional return to democratic institutions."

Congress was dissolved and political activity banned March 29, 1976, when the armed forces, with the support of most civilian political sectors, overthrew the government of President Isabel Peron.

Security forces at the time were fighting leftist guerrillas in the capital and countryside, inflation was more than 300 percent and workers and students were demonstrating their ability to bring the country to a virtual halt with general strikes and street demonstrations.

The military defeated the guerrillas and set its "process for national reorganization" in motion. But, according to a recent statement by the Justicialist (Peronist) Party: "The process has definitely failed. The government of the armed forces is not able to face or resolve by itself the crisis the country is experiencing."

The most immediate manifestations of the crisis are economic. Inflation rose more than 10 percent during July and a 200 percent annual rate seems likely. Interest rates are among the highest in the world at about 140 percent and that, combined with greatly increased competition from imports, produced thousands of business bankruptcies in the past two years. The federal government provides no unemployment figures, but Economy Minister Lorenzo Sigaut has admitted the jobless rate doubled in the past nine months.

The economy minister of Buenos Aires province said 200,000 people are out of work in Greater Buenos Aires, about 8 percent of the capital's work force.

The national economy showed a zero growth rate last year and the first foreign trade deficit in four years.

The Multiparty has not outlined an economic program, but has called on the government for "concrete steps" to deal with the situation. The politicians have also been careful to emphasize they are not challenging the generals for power and have even stated they would welcome government participation in the group.

President Roberto E. Viola, a 54-year-old former army commander, refused.

Viola has met recently, however, with a number of politicians over breakfast at his suburban residence. His interior minister, Gen. Tomas Liendo, said recently the armed forces—in consultation with party leaders—will have a new law regulating political activity ready by the middle of next year.

Viola, the junta members and other top officials have repeatedly insisted the "process" is intended to result in "a strong, stable and republican democracy."

so much harm."

The Peronists, a labor-based movement founded in the mid-1940s by the late Juan D. Peron, and the Radicals refer to themselves as popular parties, rather than populist. But their respective hierarchies have remained virtually unchanged since 1976, and the positions they have expounded in spite of the political activity ban are not much different from those main-

tained before the coup.

The army commander in chief, Lt. Gen. Leopoldo Galtieri has said: "Peronism as it will have no place in the process. A lot of blood has been spilled in reaching this point, and we are not going to go back in time."

The generals have referred to what they see as the need to develop a new civilian political force, a "movement of national opinion" that some traditional political

leaders see as a prototype of an armed forces-backed party similar to the official party fostered by the military-backed government in neighboring Brazil.

But the economic crisis has sapped whatever popularity the military regime here might once have enjoyed and if solutions are not forthcoming soon, the generals are unlikely to find many civilians anxious to join them in a political front.

Cronkite Is Happy In Semi-Retirement Role

NEW YORK (AP) — Walter Cronkite misses his anchor seat, but says he is happy with his semi-retirement six months after he told the nation for the last time that "that's the way it is."

"I miss the broadcast, but no more than I anticipated," said Cronkite, who anchored CBS' Monday night special on the late broadcaster Lowell Thomas. "I don't think there's going to be any trauma. I don't regret my decision. It was time to move on and do other things. I've

got plenty to do." The 64-year-old former anchor of the "CBS Evening News" said the change in his life is just hitting him now since he worked fairly regularly in March, April and May and then took the summer months off, as he had done in previous years.

"Thirty-six hours after retiring, I was on an airplane to Houston to do a story," he said Tuesday, adding that he was busy in the spring with his Soviet Union segment for CBS' five-part defense series and his weekly "Universe" program on science.

"There was no time to go and have afternoon cocktails, as I always dreamed it was

supposed to be," he said. "It is a bit odd now, though. It's 5:30, I'm in New York and I'm talking to someone casually."

During the summer, Cronkite did a lot of sailing and took trips to Maine and Bermuda. "I feel great, absolutely wonderful. I've never felt better."

He's kept up with the world events by reading newspapers and watching the network newscasts, during which, he says, "I flip back and forth during the commercials. But I face the same frustrations about commercials. They seem to hit about the same time."

He says his dial-switching is a carry-over from his nearly 20 years as anchor of the evening news. "I always want to see what the opposition's doing. I'm still highly competitive and I still have that old feeling for CBS."

Having starred in such classic films as "White Christmas" with Bing Crosby and "On the Town" with Kelly and Frank Sinatra, she was considered "one of the great dancers of the screen," according to A.C. Lyles, a producer at Paramount studios and longtime friend.

Born Vera-Allen Rohe in Cincinnati, Ohio, her first break in show business came when she won the Major Bowes Amateur Hour. That started her on a tour of New York theaters dancing for \$50 a week in the late 1930s.

Eventually she broke into

Broadway musicals, where she was noticed in 1943 by Samuel Goldwyn, who launched her movie career.

She appeared with Danny Kaye in "Wonder Man," with Crosby in "The Big Picture," and with Kelly in "Words and Music" in which the two did a famous dance sequence to "Slaughter on 10th Avenue." With Astaire she did "Three Little Words"

and "The Belle of New York." In 1954, she married oilman Victor Rothschild.

Turbulence Will Cripple Pumps

VERNON, Calif. (AP) — Operators of offshore oil rigs see water all above them, but they have a tough time getting it to where it's needed.
"Believe it or not, pumping water from the ocean up to the drilling deck is a problem for platform designers and operators," said Walter N. Moline of Borg-Warner's Byron Jackson pump division. "And the higher the platform, the worse the problem."

Traditional on-deck pumps, with long steel shafts to their underwater intakes, suffer damage in the ocean's turbulence, he said, requiring frequent repair and replacement.

The solution, says Moline, is a self-contained submersible pump which operates under water. Submersible pumps bring ocean water to the rigs for fire protection, cooling, washdown and waste disposal.

Research Basis For Beer Flavor

NEW YORK (AP) — You might think Morten Meilgaard has a pretty easy job. All he has to do is figure out what makes beer taste good.

But he doesn't do his research in the corner pub on a Saturday night. He does it surrounded by thousands of bottles of beer in a laboratory in the Stroh Brewing Co. in Detroit.

Meilgaard is a professional beer taster, but his research — most of the time — does not consist of sampling the brew.

A brewing chemist, Meilgaard analyzes beer with the help of a \$152,000 gas chromatograph, an impressive machine that theoretically can identify all the ingredients that give beer its distinctive flavor.

Meilgaard has been at this for a while, and it's not turning out to be such an easy job. So far, he has found 850 ingredients in beer, and he thinks there might be thousands more.

He is hoping his chemical analysis ultimately will explain which ingredients are responsible for each of the 122 flavors tasters have identified in beer.

"To control quality, brewers need a basis for predicting the flavor of beer from chemical tests," the Danish chemist said at a meeting of the American Chemical Society here.

Meilgaard has been in the beer business since the 1950s, when he went to work for the Carlsberg Brewery in Copenhagen, Denmark. He worked for the makers of Carta Blanca beer in Mexico before coming to Stroh.

The most important flavors in beer, he said, are bitterness, hop aromas, alcohol and carbonation.

North American beers are lower in bitterness than some European beers and higher in carbonation, fruitiness and sweetness, he said. Dark beers have a caramel flavor that comes from malt cured in a high-temperature kiln.

The secondary flavors in beer include banana, apple and alkyl sulfides, chemicals that smell like sweet corn.

Meilgaard's chemical analyses always are compared with a tasting by a panel of experts, never by one drinker alone.

Busy Artist, 68, Turns Talents To Writing Book

NEW YORK (AP) — Lily Harmon's New York City apartment is spacious and airy. Lily, petite and silver-haired, is attractive and energetic at age 68.

At the moment, but only temporarily for a party in connection with her one-woman show at the Krasner Gallery here, many of Ms. Harmon's drawings and paintings are hung on her living room walls. One painting is a controversial nude of a former mother-in-law that Ms. Harmon painted in the early 1930s.

"My Mother, the Guitar," a construction created by Ms. Harmon during the 1960s, stands in one corner of the apartment. It is an unplayable seven-string guitar mounted on black mannequin legs with a clock for a face. On another wall, in another part of the apartment, a painting of Ms. Harmon's husband, Milton Schachter, is hung, slightly askew.

The artist is dressed in a V-neck animal print blouse and beige pants, drawn and tied at the ankles. Her career has spanned decades, and still she is always working,

always creating in oils, graphics, lithographs, constructions and collages.

"I'm drawing all the time," Ms. Harmon said, in an interview.

Recently, however, she has been involved in another artistic pursuit, her first book, "Freehand."

Ms. Harmon said she was originally encouraged to write the book, which tells the story of her life, by her niece, Mary-Lou Weisman, who is a journalist and author.

"I just sat down on my behind for four years and did it," Ms. Harmon said with a smile. She said she rewrote the book two or three times before it was finally accepted for publication.

Ms. Harmon said her original title for the book was "Drawing From Life," which was rejected by her publisher.

After going through "about one-thousand titles," she decided on "Freehand" because it "epitomized what I wanted to do, which I considered a work of art, and I did it in a free, loose style — impulsively. In a sense, I went where the thought took me."

As a young student at the Parsons School in New York City, Ms. Harmon had taken a class where the students were told to draw by "dynamic symmetry." The students were taught to draw with a diagram, a bisected oblong, and everything had to fit into it.

"It strikes me as stupid," Ms. Harmon wrote in her book. "I don't need guidelines to draw. It inhibits me ... 'Where are your guidelines,' asks the teacher. There are none. I have drawn it freehand."

Ms. Harmon said her friends' and family's reaction to the book has been mostly positive. She said her two daughters "loved it" and her niece "adored it." Her brother asked, "how did you remember all this stuff?"

And what about her ex-husbands, who include producer Sidney Harmon and art collector Joseph Hirshhorn?

She said she finds it "boring" to answer questions about her five marriages, particularly her 10-year marriage to Joseph Hirshhorn, because people assume that she influenced his art collection, "and I keep saying no, I didn't."

Lily Harmon's career as an artist began, in a sense, when she was 6 years old, drawing mermaids on a bunch of her bankrupt Uncle Abe's checkbooks in the attic of her family's home in New

Haven, Conn.

She took drawing lessons every Saturday afternoon when she was 11, and, when she was 14, she studied painting once a week with an Italian customer of her father's clothing store.

By the age of 19, Ms. Harmon had studied art at the Yale Art School, worked in a textile design studio in Paris, and had sold two drawings, for \$18 each, at the Hamilton Easter Field Foundation auction.

At the age of 32, she had

her first one-woman show at the Associated American Artists Galleries in New York City.

"That was the beginning, that established me as an artist," she said. "I could make a living as an artist."

Marriages are turning points, "and kids certainly are," said Ms. Harmon, noting that the events of her life have affected her work and are reflected in them, because "art work is very autobiographical."

The artist, whose work is

scattered "all over the map" in private collections and museums, has had 20 solo

exhibitions of her paintings, drawings and constructions. She divides her time be-

tween her Manhattan apartment and a home in Provincetown, Mass.

Hope To Solve Fusion Physics

LIVERMORE, Calif. (AP)

— The installation of the world's most power laser, a huge research tool scientists hope will help unmask the physics of fusion — a possible route to squeezing energy from water, is under way.

The laser, called "Novette," is part of the \$195 million Nova System facility at the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory, a nuclear research facility operated for the government by the University of California at Berkeley.

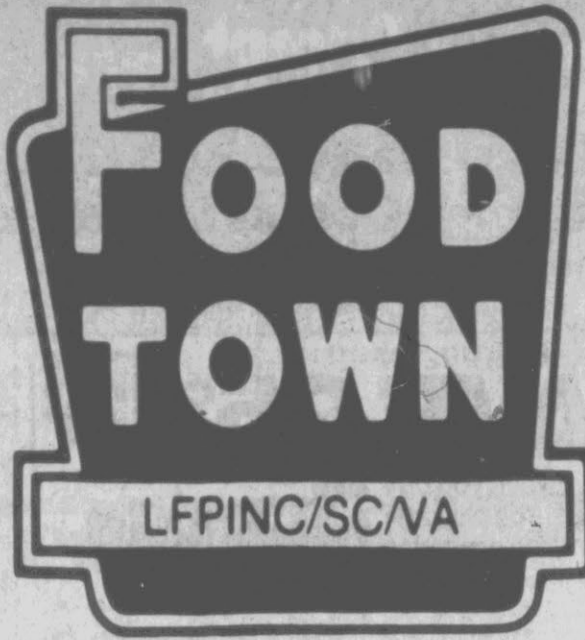

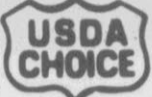

Iran's Moderates Quiet As Leftists Do Fighting

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — At least a dozen Iranian political groups are now operating in and out of Iran.

Most of the moderate and leftist groups that helped bring Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to power in February 1979 are now opposed to his clergy-led regime of religious fundamentalists.

But the moderates are keeping quiet while the leftists battle Khomeini's forces.

Here is a lineup:

Islamic Republican Party (IRP): founded by Ayatollah Mohammad Beheshti who was killed in the bombing of the party headquarters in Tehran June 28, it controls Parliament and the government and is dominated by fundamentalist clerics and laymen loyal to Khomeini. Prime Minister Mohammad Bahonar succeeded Beheshti as party chairman, but he was assassinated Sunday. Hojatoleslam Hashemi Rafsanjani, the speaker of Parliament, or Ayatollah Musavi Ardabili, the chief justice, will probably succeed him as head of the party.

Hezbollah (Party of God): Linked with the IRP and made up of pro-Khomeini fanatics, its leaders are not known. It organized marchers to confront groups protesting President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr's impeachment last June. Hezbollahis police the streets of Tehran, riding motorcycles and often wearing black shirts. They search out behavior they consider anti-Islamic, such as smoking cigarettes during Ramadan, the holy month of fasting.

Tudeh: The 40-year-old, pro-Soviet communist party led by Nooreddin Kianoori, it is aligned with the government and attracted several leftist factions from major groups now in the opposition. Kianoori tried to run for president after Bani-Sadr was deposed but was stricken from the list, an indication that the clergy has no intention of giving the communists any power.

Mujahedeen Khalq (People's Warriors): The largest and best-armed of the opposition groups, with an estimated 50,000 or more guerrillas, it is the most serious threat to Khomeini's regime. Led from exile by Massoud Rajavi, who fled to Paris with Bani-Sadr in July, it was formed in the mid-1960's, blends Islamic rhetoric with Marxist principles and was a significant factor in the street demonstrations that put Khomeini in power and brought down Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

Fedayeen Khalq (People's Guerrillas): Describing itself as Marxist-Leninist, the Fedayeen like the Mujahedeen broke with Khomeini when Bani-Sadr was impeached. Some factions switched to the Tudeh; others defected to the Mujahedeen. The leader of what's left is Hemad Sheibani, and there is a student faction called Pishgan.

Peykar: another Marxist-Leninist group allied with the Mujahedeen Khalq in the terrorist campaign against Khomeini.

The National Front: A moderate socialist party founded by the late Prime Minister Mohammad Mossadegh who nationalized the oil industry in the 1950s. It is led by Karim Sanjabi and is opposed to clerical rule, but there is no indication that it is making any contribution to the fight against Khomeini.

The National Liberation Movement: Similar to the National Front although more oriented to Islamic thought, it is led by the first post-revolution prime minister Mehdi Bazargan. Khomeini broke with him when he advocated early release of the U.S. hostages, and Bazargan and his party now stay out of the limelight.

The Moslem People's Party: Led by Ayatollah Kazem Shariat-Madari, the Tabriz clergyman who was considered the highest religious authority in Iran before Khomeini's return. He is believed to be under house arrest in his theological school in the holy city of Qom. Shariat-Madari advocates a lay government supervised by the clergy. Most of his followers are in and around Tabriz, in western Iran.

Azadegan: A rightist, military-oriented group of exiles led by a general in the shah's army, Bahran Aryana, and identified with the shah's last prime minister, Shahpour Bakhtiar, an exile in Paris. It staged the dramatic hijacking of an Iranian gunboat off Spain this month. Aryana is said to be making his headquarters in Turkey and trying to line up support in the armed forces inside Iran. A spokesman recently said: "When the Khomeini regime falls, the army will take over because there is too much chaos in Iran which can only be controlled by the army."

The Kurdish Democratic Party: Led by Abdulrahman Ghassemlou, it wants autonomy for the Kurds, a non-Persian Sunni Moslem people living in western Iran and in neighboring districts of Iraq and Turkey. With a tradition of rebellion against the Shiite Moslems who are the majority sect in the rest of Iran, the KDP opposed the shah and has been battling Khomeini's regime ever since it took over. It controls some of the highlands near the Iraqi border.

Komoleh (Party of the Toilers): A second Kurdish group with a more religious orientation led by Sheikh Ezzeddin Hussini, a Sunni Moslem clergyman. It is also actively opposed to the government.

Half-Price Dinners Ordered By Judge

VENTURA, Calif. (AP) — A judge who says he likes to hand out innovative sentences has ordered a restaurant owner to sell meals at half price to senior citizens for 90 days as punishment for cultivating marijuana.

Ventura County Superior Court Judge Steven Stone also ordered Peter Knapp, 34, of Malibu, to advertise the half-price meals in a newspaper in Santa Monica, where he has his Japanese restaurant.

Stone, in issuing the sentence last week, admitted it "is unusual, but I kind of like innovative sentences, like when I ordered a guy who set fire to a barley field to spend a summer cutting firetrails for the national Forest Service instead of having him waste time in jail. I'm sure that cured him."

Knapp, owner of the Sushi-Man restaurant and former road manager for

rock singer Joe Cocker, was found to have leased land in a remote area near Fillmore in Ventura County. Narcotics detectives found 80 marijuana plants growing on the farm in 1978.

Knapp's sentencing had been delayed until last week while he unsuccessfully challenged the validity of a search warrant used to seize the marijuana.

Stone said a more conventional sentence, such as the \$1,000 fine and 700 hours of donated labor to a public service which a probation officer recommended, seemed less attractive than offering raw fish dinners at half price to older folks who the judge said "are in a terrible economic squeeze, specially in places like Santa Monica."

Stylish Garb For Those In Ministry

BRUGES, Belgium (AP) — To Christian church leaders the world over, Marc and Dirk Slabbinck represent the latest word in clerical haute couture.

The two brothers from Bruges run Europe's largest fashion house for men and women of the cloth.

They claim among their clients such dignitaries as Pope John Paul II; Maximos V, patriarch of the Eastern Rite Catholics, and officials of many Protestant denominations.

In an ultra-modern plant here, the Slabbincks' staff of 50 produce vestments and other religious articles, including miters, tiaras, stoles and tapestries, for churches around the world.

"It is difficult in a way to speak of 'fashion' in this trade," says Marc Slabbinck, 39, who is in charge of the firm's commercial operations.

"We prefer to speak, instead, of evolution of styles." The past two decades have seen some change in the style of vestments in Roman Catholic and Protestant churches, according to Dirk Slabbinck, who heads the firm's design department.

The Roman Catholic Church's Vatican II sessions of the early 1960s, he adds, created a "mood of ecumenism that made churches look more sober. But this has been changing in recent years. Now we see more and more a return to more flamboyant vestments and a greater demand for tapestries."

The Slabbincks' latest is displayed in a 36-page, full-color brochure, 200,000 copies of which have been printed in several languages.

"Forty thousand of these have been distributed in the United States," says Marc Slabbinck. "We do about 30 percent of our business there. But we also sell in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and throughout Europe."

"We know many of our products end up in Eastern Europe, especially Poland."

Last year, the Slabbincks, who are Roman Catholics, registered sales of \$2.3 million.

Their line of products includes vestments ranging from inexpensive off-white, drip-dry albs to fully-lined, hand-embroidered chasubles costing several hundred dollars each.

Vestments come in different styles, colors and color combinations and in a variety of fabrics. In addition, the Slabbincks make covers for altars and lecterns with motifs matching those on vestments.

"It is our job to add a dimension to a religious service, to give expression to the liturgy," says Dirk Slabbinck.

"For the Pope's trip to Poland we made, at the request of the Vatican, a stole that included the image of Our Lady of Czestochowa."

Czestochowa is the site of a monastery in Poland containing a painting of the Virgin Mary that is revered by Poles as a sacred relic. The pope visited there in 1980.

If the Slabbincks' customers have no particular design in mind, they can choose from 6,000 decorations on microfilm.

In addition, there 200 miter designs and the images of countless saints are kept on file.

"Protestants prefer symbols such as a burning candle, a lamb or a fish. Catholics always choose such images as the Virgin Mary or the head of Christ bearing a crown of thorns," according to Dirk Slabbinck.

"Also Catholics tend to prefer abstract images, while Protestants tend to ask for realistic images."

Soon, the Slabbinck company hopes to present a new garment for Catholic laymen who distribute Communion.


"Since laymen can now hand out Communion," says Dirk Slabbinck, "we hear some priests complain that this is done in jeans sometimes." His solution: a simple muted gray robe "to maintain the dignity of the ceremony."

The Slabbincks not only design and manufacture new vestments, they also restore centuries-old needlework to new glory by stitching old embroidery onto new fabric.

Jean Harris Relishes Her Cabinet Job

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — When Gov. John Dalton asked Dr. Jean Harris, a former Washington physician and professor at the Medical College of Virginia, to join his cabinet three years ago, she was somewhat skeptical.

Being black, a woman and a Democrat, she was not sure what role she would play as the first woman and first black ever to serve in a Virginia governor's cabinet, and a Republican governor at that.

Furthermore, Dalton was asking her to take a \$26,000 cut in pay. She earns \$59,000 a year as state secretary of human resources.

Some Virginia civil rights activists and black politicians also were unsure about the arrangement, and some of them still are, criticizing Mrs. Harris for adopting what they see as a low profile in the state administration.

"I think there was a lot of skepticism, and especially on questions of my race, sex, or even about my knowledge," said Mrs. Harris, 49. But now, she said, she believes she has answered many of the skeptics, including herself.

"I love it," she said of her job as administrator of one of the largest divisions of state government, in which she supervises 15 agencies and about 22,000 employees.

"It has been a tremendous experience — (state government) is where the action is. This is the attainment of an opportunity to see whether or not it was really possible to move government...and it is."

However, a number of observers of state government have questioned Mrs. Harris' visibility in it, among them American Civil Liberties Union of Virginia lobbyist Judy Goldberg.

"I haven't really seen her take enough public positions on the issues," said Ms. Goldberg. "I don't know how she's applied her experiences of being a black and a woman to the job. I'm not aware of any innovative or aggressive changes that she's made."

"I wish she would have taken a higher profile," said Jack Gravely, executive secretary of the Virginia chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. "A lot of blacks don't know she is black."

Gravely said the NAACP has not worked that closely with Mrs. Harris, but "the record will reflect that she's been very successful."

State Sen. L. Douglas Wilder, D-Richmond, the only black in the state Senate, grew up with Mrs. Harris in the Richmond area and attended college with her at Virginia Union University here. He agreed that she's probably not recognized as a black cabinet member.

"You don't think of her as a black in the cabinet," Wilder said, adding that Mrs. Harris "doesn't take a hard line with being Republican or Democrat."

Mrs. Harris dismisses questions of her visibility. "The course I've taken is the middle one where you present alternatives," she said. "You don't win fights by going public."

"We have won some major battles — the majority of them — and many of them have been won from the inside. I think I have a great deal of visibility in program issues, but not in politics."

Del. Bobby Scott, D-Newport News, one of four blacks in the House of Delegates, does not think visibility is important to people "who understand the inner workings of state government." Mrs. Harris must "bear the administration trademark," he said, rather than embark on her own philosophy.

"She has her own views and people who know what her views are," Scott said. "Her views are significantly more progressive (than the Dalton administration's) and I don't think there's any question about it."

Nevertheless, Mrs. Harris said she would campaign actively for Dalton if he were allowed to succeed himself in office, and she supports the governor's philosophy of curbing the growth of state government.

However, she insisted she is not a political person.
