Postal Rates Going Up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Postal Service today increased the price of a first-class stamp from 16 cents to 20 cents, effective Nov. 1.

The Postal Service said it has lost almost \$126 million in the five months since the rate went up from 15 cents.

Without the increase, "the Postal Service would have incurred continuing and dangerously high operating losses for at least another year," Robert L. Hardesty, chairman of the Postal Service Board, said.

Hardesty said that without the rate increase, the Postal Service would have been forced to borrow money to continue operation.

"This course would have been fiscally irresponsible and inconsistent with the legal mandate that the Postal Service be managed efficiently and economically," he said.

He added, "The Postal Service cannot continue to deliver your mail at 1978 prices."

The Postal Service also raised other mail rates today. For example, the charge for mailing a post card was increased from the present 12 cents to 13 cents as of Nov. 1.

The bulk rate for regular third class mail, now 33 cents per pound, goes to 45 cents on Nov. 1, and at the same time the

non-profit bulk rate will increase from the present 15.3 cents per pound to 15.8 cents per pound.

Today's rate hikes represent an unprecedented unilateral action by the Postal Service, which in the past has raised rates only after obtaining approval from the separate Postal Rate Commission.

But the Postal Service can raise rates without that approval. Three times already this year, the Postal Rate Commission rejected formal requests for increasing the first class rate to 20 cents.

The Postal Service board met for three hours Tuesday to again consider raising rates, but Assistant Postmaster General Walter Duka said afterward that no decision would be announced until today.

Raising the price of stamps without seeking the commission's permission will almost certainly be challenged in court by businesses who use the mail.

The Postal Service had another option — trying once again with the Rate Commission. That would have left rates as they are now until next summer, but the eventual hike could make stamps cost as much as 22 cents.

Senate To Pick Choices

The ECU Faculty Senate will hold a special meeting Oct. 6 to select three faculty members to serve on the Chancellor Selection Committee.

The selection committee, now being formed, will screen applicants and recommend a successor to Chancellor Thomas B. Brewer, who resigned effective next June. The faculty will have four representatives on the selection committee, one of whom may be the Chair of the Faculty, Dr. Thomas H. Johnson, a health and physical education professor, but who will be named by the committee chairman.

"Members of the General Faculty are encouraged to submit names of candidates to their Senators before the meeting," Johnson said in issuing the call for the 3 p.m. meeting in Romm 205, Home Economics Building.

The Chancellor Selection Committee also will include five trustees, the president of the ECU Alumni Association and the president of the Student Government Association.

ECU trustees chairman Ashley B. Futrell of Washington will chair the Chancellor Selection Committee and has asked receipt of names of the Faculty Senate nominees by Oct. 6, Johnson said. He asked that such information be submitted in writing at the time of the nominations.

Filing Deadline Friday

Margaret Register, supervisor of the Pitt Board of Elections, noted that Friday, Oct. 2 at 12 noon is the filing deadline for citizens who plan to seek elected offices in Greenville and eight other Pitt municipalities on Nov. 3.

Miss Register said that municipal balloting for mayor and city council will be held here and seats on the various town boards in Ayden, Bethel, Falkland, Fountain, Grifton, Grimsland, Simpson and Winterville will be filled.

The elections official said the deadline for unregistered voters to get their names on the books for the municipal elections is 5 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 5.

She explained that under the state's uniform election law, a person registers once for all elections. New residents who have not registered, as well as persons who have moved from their precinct should make sure they are properly registered, Miss Register said.

She explained that a person who has moved

from his or her precinct for 30 days or more before the election and has not had voter records transferred to the new precinct would be ineligible to vote until the transfer has been made.

Special registration hours will be observed by the Board of Elections, she said. The Greenville office at 201 E. Second Street will remain open Friday, Oct. 2 until 7 p.m. and on Saturday, Oct. 3 from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

The town hall in Ayden will be open Saturday, Oct. 3 from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. and in Bethel, registration books will be open at the police station on Saturday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. and on Monday, Oct. 5 from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Farmville will have an election on Tuesday, Oct. 6, with a run-off, if needed, conducted on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

No absentee ballots are allowed for the elections, she said.

Four Of Iran's Military Leaders Die In Crash Of U.S.-Made Plane

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Four of Iran's top military commanders were killed when their giant U.S.-made C-130 transport crashed in a public square of a Tehran suburb, the government said today. An undetermined number of other Iranians, either aboard the plane or on the ground, also perished.

The plane went down Tuesday evening in Kahrizak, 13 miles south of Tehran, killing the defense minister, Col. Musa Namju, the chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Valeollah Fallahi, the former defense minister and air force commander, Col. Javad Fakuri, and the acting commander of the Revolutionary Guard militia, Mohsen Kolahdoz, Tehran Radio said.

Iranian officials also said the regime thwarted leftist plots to assassinate the chief justice, Abdolkarim Ardabili, and the nation's police chief, Col. Ibrahim Hejazi, and that Revolutionary Guards battled leftist guerrillas today in Tehran's main avenues of Vali Asr, Enghelab and Ferdousi, and arrested as many as 50 of them.

rather heightens their decisiveness in dealing with the enemy," said the commander.

The military said the plane took off from Ahvaz, capital of Khuzistan, with a load of dead or wounded Iranian troops in addition to the top military commanders.

"We do not know at this point, but the plane was totally destroyed," said an official at Iranian joint chiefs of staff when asked by telephone about the cause of the crash.

An official at Tehran Radio who declined to be named said in a telephone interview there were civilian casualties on the ground because of the crash but said exact figures were unavailable.

The government proclaimed a three-day mourning period and scheduled funerals Thursday at the

military academy in Tehran.

The loss was the most serious blow to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic fundamentalist regime since the firebomb assassinations of President Mohammad Ali Raji and Prime Minister Hojatoleslam Bahonar Aug. 30.

The crash came two days before Iranians go to the polls to elect Rajai's successor. The almost-certain victor is Hojatoleslam Ali Khamenei, a Khomeini disciple who heads the ruling Islamic Republican Party.

Khomeini's regime used the Abadan offensive to rally nationwide support for its bid to install a fundamentalist Moslem clergyman as the next president.

The 81-year-old patriarch and his aides have been campaigning for a massive turnout at the polls in Fri-

day's presidential elections. They want this to offset what they called an insurgent campaign to scare voters away.

The government blamed the Mujahadeen, Iran's largest anti-government group, for killing a high-ranking clergyman Tuesday. Hojatoleslam Abdolkarim Hashemi-Nejad was killed by a hand-grenade blast which also killed the assassin, state news agencies said.

The clergy-led regime blames the Mujahadeen for killing more than 300 government leaders. Firing squads executed more than 43 accused leftists Tuesday, raising to more than 1,000 the number of government foes executed in the regime's attempt to crush dissent following the ouster of ex-president Abolhassan Bani-Sadr in June.

Reagan Fiscal Policies Take Effect At Midnight

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government sets a new fiscal course at midnight tonight and nearly 100 million American workers will see the first effects of it in their next paycheck.

But just as the increase in take-home pay won't look like a lot at first, the broad economic changes that President Reagan hopes to bring about with his program are not likely to show up for at least a year.

The administration remains optimistic and determined in the face of doubters who say Regan's program simply won't work and critics who go further and insist it will mean only pain and hardship.

Incorporating the largest income tax cuts in history and unprecedented reductions in non-defense spending, the Reagan program sets a new and uncharted course based on the concept that Americans will fare better if government plays a smaller role in their lives and business is given incentives to rebuild the nation's industrial might.

"It's not something that will transform or is intended to transform the nature of the economy in the next 24 hours," said David R. Gergen, the president's chief spokesman. "It's laying the foundation for gradual progress more than anything else."

In an interview Tuesday, Gergen said administration economists predict things will begin to get better by the end of the year or the beginning of next year as interest rates decline. That will be followed by a new round of budget cut proposals and, if the Reagan program works, a decline in unemployment figures.

The most widely felt instant effect of the personal tax-cut portion of the administration's economic package will be an increase of \$3 to \$7 in a typical wage-earner's weekly take-home pay beginning with the next paycheck. The exact amount depends on how much a worker makes and how many exemptions are claimed.

The slight drop in tax withholding is the first installment of the administration's three-stage plan that cuts individual income taxes 5 percent beginning Thursday and 10 percent in each of the next two years.

At first, it will only amount to a little extra pocket money for most Americans and perhaps help them make up some of the buying power they already have lost to

inflation. But the president hopes they won't just go out and spend it. That would be inflationary.

He would prefer that they take advantage of another program that goes into effect Thursday — tax-free savings certificates. What makes the so-called all-savers certificates attractive, particularly to those who pay 30 percent or more of their income in taxes, is that the interest on them — up to \$1,000 per taxpayer — is tax exempt. The rate of interest paid on the certificates will be tied to what the government pays to borrow — via the sale of Treasury bills.

Next Jan. 1, another part of the program will take effect, enabling anyone to set up an individual retirement account to put off paying taxes on money set aside for retirement. Various business tax breaks granted by the new law are retroactive to last Jan. 1.

Maier Named To Panel On Higher Education

Dr. Robert H. Maier, vice chancellor for academic affairs of East Carolina University, has been appointed to the advisory council for the blue-ribbon National Commission on Higher Education Issues.

The announcement was made in Washington by Thomas M. Stautler, staff director of the National Commission.

The commission, chaired by Robben W. Fleming, president of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and former president of the University of Michigan, is investigating means of maintaining quality in higher education during times of budget cutbacks, high inflation and economic uncertainty.

Its advisory council will study the commission's findings and advise on the key issues for inclusion in recommendations. The commission, underwritten by a grant from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation of Chicago, includes representatives of eight national higher education associations and a number of leading higher education administrators of colleges and universities.

Membership includes Robert S. MacNamara, former president of the World Bank; C. Peter Magrath, president of the University of Minnesota; Barbara Newell, chancellor of the State University System of Florida; Benjamin Payton, president of Tuskegee Institute; E.K. Fretwell Jr., chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte; Edward B. Friske, education editor of the New York Times; Robert Ray, governor of Iowa; Virginia B. Smith, president of Vassar College; Derek C. Bok, president of Harvard University; and Allen W. Ostar, executive director of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

At ECU, Maier has administrative responsibility for all academic departments and related programs and functions in the College of Arts and Sciences and all professional schools except the School of Medicine. He is formerly deputy chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, where he was professor of science and environmental change and of public and environmental administration.

City Holds Final Session On Growth Plan

The final public hearing before the city planning staff submits its draft of Greenville's Comprehensive Plan, which is aimed at providing a guide to the city's future physical development, was held Tuesday night at city hall.

Skip Browder of the Planning Department briefly discussed highlights of the document with a small public hearing gathering, explaining that the plan is part of the City Council's goal to achieve orderly growth.

Browder said the Council adopted a resolution authorizing the formulation of a comprehensive plan which would be a "work document" and "serve as a reference when dealing with changes to precise legislative tools such as the zoning ordinance, zoning map, subdivision regulations, capital improvements programs, etc."

He said the document will be general and reflect "area-wide goals and concepts." It "will be comprehensive in the sense that it will include all of Greenville and its extrajurisdictional area, and will encompass the functional elements which bear on physical development," the planner said.

Browder pointed out that the intent of the city is to make the plan flexible and "reflect contemporary attitudes and concepts, but also lend itself to the review process necessary to keep it current with changing times."

Planning documents in the past have dealt with specific topics such as population growth, recre-

ation, housing, transportation, economy, employment, and development trends, he said. The new plan "attempts to combine these various components into a broad overall view of Greenville's present and future environment."

The comprehensive document "is a plan, not a law," Browder added.

Basic goals and objectives of the plan deal with: public utilities and intergovernmental relations; institutional development (East Carolina University, Pitt Memorial Hospital); residential development; commercial development, industrial development; agriculture and open space; transportation; recreation; cultural aspects; energy conservation; and annexation.

Browder said the staff has put together a draft of the plan, involving some 150-200 pages of data and 60 pages of mapping. The Council, he said, was adamant in underlining citizen input in the development process.

Dr. Delma Blinson, superintendent of Greenville City Schools, said discussions of the city Board of Education "have convinced me that there is a keen interest on the part of the board...in the comprehensive plan."

Blinson suggested "that the city and the school system must work cooperatively together for the mutual benefit of both institutions."

Without mentioning other specific proposals, Blinson suggested "that the critical step now is a commitment to joint planning and cooperation by the city and the school system."

He cited the possibility of a joint committee of board members and councilmen as a means toward opening a channel of communication between the city and school system.

"My main purpose in being here tonight, and the most significant point I wish to make is simply that the welfare and future of the city...is inseparable from the welfare and future of the...city schools."

Dr. Jon Tinglestad expressed a concern relative to school system funding. He said "we are looking at decreased funding."

Councilman Clarence Gray endorsed a working relationship between the schools and the city and said the fact that the city appoints only three members to the education board now "doesn't negate the effort" to have a good relationship.

Councilman Dick McKee said the Council "has an obligation to cooperate" and he said the city's goals and objectives statement should include a section relative to the school system.

Mayor Don McGlohon said the Comprehensive Plan is "one of the most important things we have done" during the present Council's two-year tenure. Addressing a question regarding the Mayor's Advisory Committee recommendations, McGlohon said the committee's work dealt primarily with services while the plan is "basically a land use document."

McKee added that the plan is "intended to be a policy guide for long range planning" and "is meant to be changed" as the community changes.

Pitt Will Offer Nutrition Plan

Pitt is one of three Eastern North Carolina counties selected to participate in a project designed to save babies from the negative effects of poor maternal nutrition.

The project—the only one of its kind—is funded by the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation and has been established through the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The one-year \$74,000 project is intended to improve the health and nutrition of expectant women by training health professional who will counsel them during pregnancy. The training will be offered in a two-week course, half of which will be classroom lectures and half on-site training at a health facility. Five of these courses will be held during the year.

Martha Ogburn, R.N., M.S., a perinatal nurse educator, will help direct the course. She, along with other

professionals from across the state and nation, will lead seminars intended to provide background on nutrition, pregnancy and health advocacy in an interdisciplinary setting. The seminar, titled "Improving Post-partum Outcomes for Mothers and Babies," will be given for selected fellows in community hospitals, health departments, clinics, physicians' offices.

Field sites in Eastern North Carolina are located in Wayne, Wilson and Pitt Counties. The first session will be held in October.

Dr. Jonathan Kotch, assistant professor of maternal and child health in the School of Public Health is co-director of the project. He said the goal of the program is an effort to reach and teach women about the risks of having low-weight babies: especially for teenagers, unmarried mothers, and women with low education and income levels. He re-

lated birth weight to death; "More than half of all infant deaths occur among those with low birth weights—less than 5.5 pounds. We believe, and the March of Dimes believes that good nutrition is an important factor in a good pregnancy outcome."

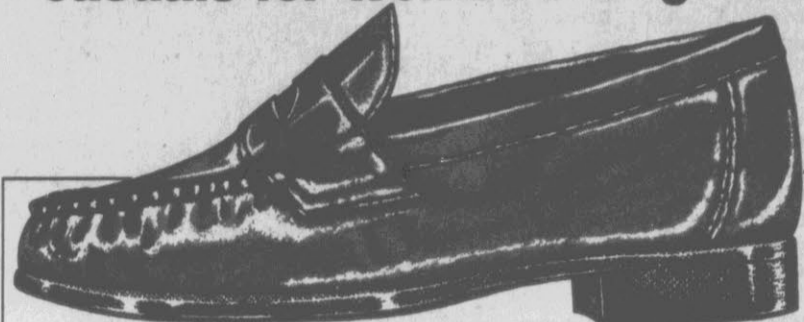

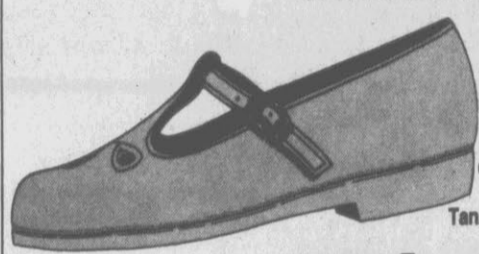

The ECU Board of Trustees apparently settled the matter of reconsidering the resignation of Chancellor Thomas Brewer Friday by taking the initial step in the search for a new chancellor.

The trustees met here with Dr. William Friday, president of the UNC system, to hear the procedures for choosing a chancellor. There had been some sentiment for a reconsideration of the Brewer resignation but apparently no action was taken in that direction during the executive session of the board.

Following the closed session Ashley Futrell, chairman of the board, announced that Dr. Joseph Boyette, dean of the graduate school, had been named executive secretary of the chancellor search committee.

The board actually was not required to take any action on the Brewer resignation since the resignation was submitted to and accepted by President Friday. The president is to work out details for concluding the present chancellor's duties, and President Friday will also name an interim chancellor.

We anticipate that the transition will be made as smoothly as possible. The changing of chancellors is a difficult time for a university, and strong leadership will be needed from all administrators at ECU while the involved process of selecting a new chancellor is underway.

It is most important that an outstanding administrator be chosen as interim chancellor to lead the university until the new chancellor is chosen.

Food Stamp Rules

RALEIGH — It seems such a short time ago that the keyword in food stamps was "outreach." Government was expected to employ people to scour highways and byways hunting people to qualify them for assistance.

In the happy days of Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty, high state officials spent much time defending their program from critics who claimed North Carolina simply wasn't doing enough to get enough people on the food stamp rolls.

All that has changed, with the Reagan Administration cutbacks.

The keyword in food stamps now is "cut-back," and high state officials are taking pains to describe how many people will be "adversely impacted" by the new rules and regulations taking effect this week.

According to pronouncements from the state's Department of Human Resources, the new rules "will eliminate an estimated 10,500 North Carolina families from the program and reduce the amount of stamps received in an estimated 70,000 other families..."

The Rules
A close review of the rules and regulations makes one less than convinced, however, that individuals who really need food stamps will be hurt by the changes.

Until now, when a family went in to apply for and qualify for food stamps in the

middle of the month, they got food stamps for the full month. Under new rules, food stamps will be given only for the number of days remaining in that month, then the full month allotment

get stamps; and any children living at home old enough to qualify not as dependents but as adults could also get stamps. Now, the household will get stamps.

Until now, strikers could get food stamps. The new rules make food stamps available in such cases only when the family income was low enough to qualify for help before the strike, with no additional food stamps to make up for wages lost because of the strike.

The biggest change is that income limitations will be imposed strictly. Unless an elderly person, or one receiving disability assistance

will follow.

Until now, a person who qualified for various welfare aids might be in a nursing home at government expense, or otherwise placed in an institution where meals were provided as a part of the daily operating expense already being paid for. Still, that individual could qualify for and receive food stamps. New rules eliminate that duplication.

Until now, individuals who were members of the same family and lived together in the same house could qualify individually for food stamps. That way, the parents would

Vance Broke Old Custom

WASHINGTON — The leak of a private letter from former secretary of state Cyrus Vance opposing the AWACS deal has undermined President Reagan's plan to line up a pro-AWACS bloc of all living ex-presidents and former secretaries of state and defense in favor of the deal.

Vance's letter, written to anti-AWACS Democratic senator Alan Cranston was not intended for public consumption. Sources in the senator's office, however, leaked word that Vance opposed the sale of five AWACS radar aircraft to Saudi Arabia. What makes Vance's position so valuable to anti-AWACS senators is the reputation he built during the Carter administration as pro-Arab.

Vance told us his letter was a response to a request from Cranston. He said he opposed selling AWACS to any country in the Middle East, including Israel. Former secretaries of state are usually scrupulous in not attempting to defeat another president's policies, but Vance broke that rule earlier in criticizing Reagan's arms control policy.

No Aid for Poland
One of the victims of the latest Reagan administration budget cutting was Secretary of State Alexander Haig's bid for substantial new U.S. aid to the virtually bankrupt communist regime in Poland.

Officials from the Treasury and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), who have been waging a yearlong backstage war with the State Department over foreign aid, ganged up on Haig to defeat Poland. Only Richard V. Allen, the White House national security assistant, backed Haig as a Cabinet council and later the National Security Council decisively voted down new funds for Poland.

Murray Weidenbaum, the usually understated chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, delivered a passionate argument in the Cabinet council against Polish aid. He reflected the objection by Reagan economic policymakers to both the effectiveness of foreign aid and its propriety in a time of budgetary restraint.

An Angry Nixon
Former president Nixon is fuming over the failure of the Reagan White House to periodically give him complete briefings on national security policy.

Nixon confides to friends that he has had only one briefing since Jan. 20, when White House aide Richard V. Allen went to Manhattan to fill him in on foreign, military and intelligence secrets.

There has been no second visit, even though in recent years most presidents have taken elaborate precautions to keep their predecessors fully informed on the behind-the-scenes intelligence. Nixon is demanding similar treatment.

Fritz Moderates
A sign of former vice president Walter F. Mondale's gentle drift toward the Democratic Party's center in preparation for his 1984

presidential campaign was his appearance at a Sept. 15 fund-raising roast for Mayor Edward Koch of New York, whose campaign for a second term has been under intense attack from the left.

Mondale's general rule is not to take sides in contested Democratic primaries, and he had agreed to attend the Koch fund-raiser only because it was to follow the Sept. 10 primary. But when a federal court forced the delay of the primary until Sept. 22, Mondale showed up anyway (roasting Koch as "the John McEnroe of politics").

Mondale's appearance confirmed the judgment by Democratic insiders that he is consciously moving to the right of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, his possible rival for 1984. The black-liberal coalition that supported State Assemblyman Frank Barabaro's unsuccessful challenge of Koch in the New York City primary is also Kennedy's power base.

Labor Feuding
Machinists union leader William Winpisinger was less than happy about the way the AFL-CIO's Solidarity Day demonstration against Reaganomics was conducted, not so much because he was excluded from the list of speakers but because United Auto Workers (UAW) president Douglas Fraser was included.

Winpisinger, famed for the volume and variety of his profanity, has been wondering aloud how speakers were chosen. He had understood that AFL-CIO president Lane Kirkland, as organizer of Solidarity Day, and Jerry Wurf of the state county and municipal employees union, as the union president who brought the most members to the rally, were to be the only labor speakers. How, then, asks Winpy, did Doug Fraser get to the rostrum?

Since the return of the UAW to the AFL-CIO this year, Fraser has become Winpisinger's rival for dominance on the labor federation's left wing. Both are uncomfortable with the AFL-CIO's traditional hard anti-communist foreign policy, and each has toyed with the notion of a new left-labor political party.

Trade Barriers For Wineries

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A bottle of wine retailing for \$4 in California sells for \$18 in Japan — an example from the state's billion-dollar wine industry of international trade barriers against wine produced in the United States.

It takes 21 pages to detail the complicated taxes, label requirements and other roadblocks foreign countries put in the path of U.S.-made wines. The United States, however, is virtually an open market for wines from the rest of the world.

U.S. restrictions on wine are found in one sentence: A tariff of 37½ cents a gallon, and a label listing the percentage of alcohol.

In contrast, here are some foreign requirements, in addition to duty and taxes:

—The European Common Market requires an import license for each shipment, and any member state may veto such a license, barring the wine for the other members as well.

—West Germany won't let Paul Masson use its proprietary name "Emerald Dry" on the label, which must indicate the potential alcohol of the wine.

—France does not allow the words, "produced and bottled by ..." on the label unless the export license holder grows 100 percent of the grapes.

—Italy demands the date of the grape harvest on the label in Italian.

—Wines to be sold in Quebec Province in Canada must be in French and English.

—Mexico imposes six taxes and add-on charges, and demands three bottles for the Ministry of Health.

U.S. winemakers look on Venezuela's rules with particular dismay. That South American nation requires eight certificates, a bill of lading, 18 product and label samples, a power of attorney, six visas, a certificate of ingredients, and 14 copies of various documents.

California produces 70 percent of all wine sold in the United States and 92 percent of U.S. wine sold overseas. A record 10 million gallons of California wine are expected to be shipped overseas this year.

But last year, while the United States exported \$30 million in wines, foreign producers shipped nearly \$700 million in wine to this country.

Edmund Mirassou, fourth-generation patriarch of California's oldest winemaking family, says: "We're only saying if they, any other country, builds up a trade barrier against our wines, then we should do the same with their ..." parity — equal treatment on both sides of the fence."

John De Luca, president of the California Wine Institute, representing more than 400 California wineries, also complained of foreign barriers.

California is still suffering what De Luca called "the legacy of prohibition," when from 1917 to 1934 the U.S. wine industry went dormant, and emerged as a "baby"

competing with countries that had been producing wine for 1,000 years.

The big wine-producing countries — France, Italy and Spain — came roaring back into U.S. markets, gaining trade concessions while refusing to make their own, he said. Until only recently, he added, foreign producers believed that if Americans wanted good wine, they would have to buy foreign labels.

De Luca said that viewpoint is changing because California wines are showing top results in European blind tastings.

California's reputation is evident in a more academic way. The viticulture and enology department at the University of California-Davis is famous for research into new varieties. France, which produces some of the world's greatest wines, also recognizes the school's excellence and is sending its experts there in an effort to improve French wines.

Nation's Debt Ceiling Passes Trillion Dollars

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sixty-five years after it passed the billion-dollar mark, the national debt is headed over \$1 trillion for the first time in history.

The Senate passed by a vote of 64-34 and sent to President Reagan late Tuesday a bill increasing the federal government's temporary debt ceiling from \$985 billion to \$1.079 trillion.

A trillion is a thousand billion, or 1,000,000,000,000.

The figure is staggering. Were every man, woman and child in America to shoulder an equal share of a \$1.079 trillion debt, each would owe about \$4,694. At \$1 per second, it would take 31,688 years just to count a trillion.

"The next stopping point, I guess, is a quadrillion, that is a thousand trillion," said Sen. William Proxmire. The Wisconsin Democrat staged a 16-hour talkathon starting Monday night in his fight for a lower increase on grounds that would show "the American people that we mean business about curbing inflation."

Sen. Russell Long, D-La., however, argued that the new debt limit is only 28 percent of the U.S. gross national product, whereas the ceiling at the end of World War II was 112 percent of the GNP.

With Reagan's signature assured, the measure will take effect with the beginning of the new fiscal year Thursday and will enable the government to continue borrowing money to pay its bills.

Had the bill not passed, it would have meant the federal government's authority to

fund its debt and issue securities would expire at 12:01 a.m. EDT Thursday. Without the boost in the debt ceiling, the limit automatically would have dropped to its permanent level of \$400 billion — meaning the Treasury's borrowing authority would have been cut off.

House and Senate negotiators, meanwhile, were resuming work today on a compromise stopgap spending measure that must be adopted by midnight to keep the federal government operating.

The House and Senate have passed differing versions of the measure, which would maintain the flow of money to federal agencies whose regular appropriations have not been enacted when the new fiscal year begins Thursday. The compromise would require approval by the full House and Senate.

None of the 13 appropriations bills that actually provide the government's money has received final congressional approval yet.

The Senate-passed version of the so-called "continuing resolution" includes provisions lifting the \$3,000 annual limit on the amount of money legislators can deduct from taxes for living expenses related to their work in Washington; lifting the \$25,000 limit on outside income senators may earn from speeches; and raising the pay cap affecting about 46,000 high-ranking federal workers from \$50,112 to \$57,500.

The temporary debt limit has been increased 20 times since 1970 because at the \$400 billion mark the government doesn't have enough money to meet its obligations.

The Treasury Department had told Congress it would run out of cash next Monday. If its borrowing authority were not extended, then for the first time government checks would not be honored.

Before the vote, Senate Finance Committee Chairman Robert Dole, R-Kan., told fellow senators: "We must pass the debt ceiling or we can't honor all the Social Security checks that went into the mail yesterday and today."

The national debt passed

the billion-dollar mark during World War I, rising to \$1,225 billion in 1961. By 1961, the limit was \$293 billion and by 1978 it had risen to \$752 billion.

Eighteen Democrats joined 46 Republicans in voting for the latest increase. Six Republicans and 28 Democrats voted against it.

The Republican leadership of the Senate beat back a series of amendments that would have forced reconsideration of the measure by the Democrat-controlled House. The House had passed it once, but GOP leaders said they were not sure it would do so a second time.

The amendment that came closest to passing was one by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., to increase the limit to \$1,049 trillion and have the new limit expire March 31 instead of running for the full fiscal year.

Moynihan argued that the limit will have to be raised again because the budget deficit will be higher than the \$42.5 billion estimated by the administration.

His amendment was tabled, or killed, by a vote of 53-44.

An amendment by Proxmire to set the limit at \$995 billion, an increase of \$10 billion, was rejected 63-33.

Other amendments that were defeated would have:

- Reduced the tax cut that Reagan pushed through Congress by providing that it could not exceed the amount of budget cuts.
- Allowed the president to withhold appropriated funds, subject to a congressional veto within either 30 or 45 days.

or other welfare aids, lives in the home, the family income can't be more than 130 percent of the official poverty level and allow food stamp help. This means a mother, father, and two children must be grossing below \$11,000 yearly to qualify.

How Much?
Actually pinning down how much the food stamp program cutback will mean in North Carolina is difficult since the rolls fluctuate from month to month depending upon the agricultural season and the employment picture. Normally, from 215,000 to 220,000 families are on food stamps.

During the last six months, the program provided more than \$132 million worth of food stamps in this state. Best estimates are that about one million dollars per month will be lost due to the new rules and regulations. Administrative costs are funded separately at the rate of about \$10 million yearly.

Changes are being phased in over a period of time as the new rules take effect. New applications will fall under the new rules October 1. Income limit changes take place by the end of this year. Other changes must take place by next fall.



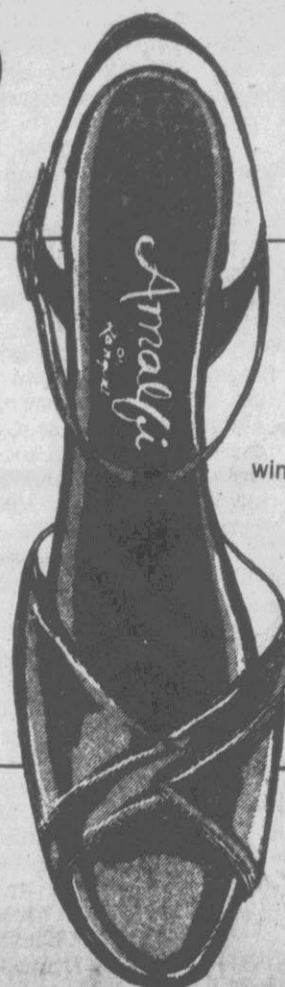

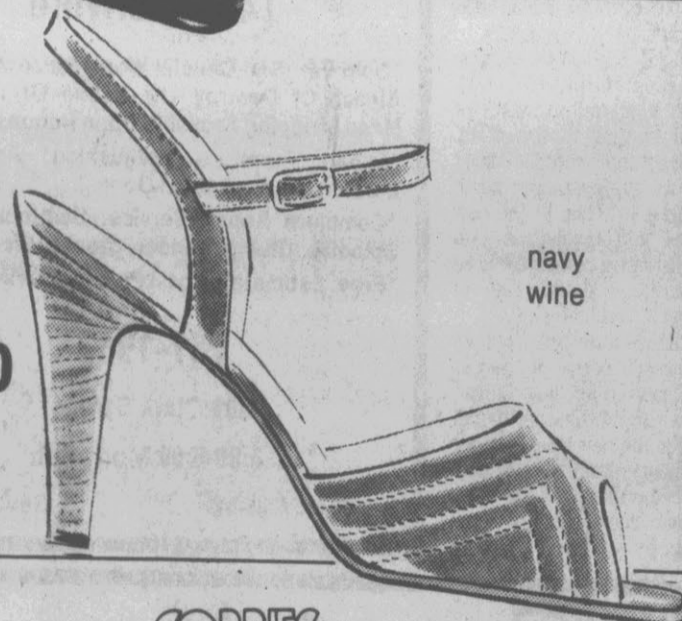

Quake Rattles Sierra Nevadas

BISHOP, Calif. (AP) — A powerful earthquake awakened residents in a wide area of the Sierra Nevadas early today, knocking out electricity in some places and jostling canned goods from grocery shelves, officials said.

There were no immediate reports of serious damage or injuries from the tremor. The earthquake measured 5.7 on the Richter scale, said Bruce Schechter of the U.S. Seismological Station in Berkeley, and was followed by "numerous" aftershocks, the strongest of which measured 3.5 on the scale.

The quake, which lasted up to 20 seconds, struck just before 5 a.m.

Bishop police, who said they had many calls from residents, reported scattered power outages.

The earthquake was felt as far away as Sacramento, about 150 miles northwest, and early reports placed the epicenter in the Mammoth Lakes region about 40 miles northwest of Bishop, said Schechter.

"We're just rocking and rolling. We have had one, pretty sharp, in the Mono County area," said Inyo County sheriff's dispatcher Bill Jessup. "My wife's plants were swinging back and forth."

He said there was slight damage to stores, with "canned goods falling off shelves."

Hanford Police Dispatcher Judy Gordon said she was shaken from her typewriter by the earthquake, adding, "My chair just started rolling away." She said her office received a few calls from residents.

Police in Stockton, at the northern end of the San Joaquin Valley, received about two dozen calls after the earthquake. There were no reports of damage.

"We felt it here," said Fresno Police Lt. Richard Lindstrom, adding the tremor lasted about 20 seconds. He said police received about 15 calls, none reporting damage.

Sheriff's offices in Tulare, Merced and Stanislaus counties also received calls. "I felt it too long," said Kern County sheriff's dispatcher Terri Schroder.

John Butler of radio station KROY in Sacramento said he didn't feel the tremor but had a call from a South Sacramento resident who did.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs.

Nun's Brother Fears Whitewash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The brother of one of four American churchwomen slain last December in El Salvador says that without public pressure, he fears the 10-month-old murder investigation will be "swept under the rug."

William Ford, brother of the late Sister Ita Ford, said the families of the slain women planned to discuss the status of the investigation today in Washington with Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte.

But in an interview Tuesday, Ford was pessimistic about chances the women's killers would ever be brought to justice.

"It is obvious to us that neither the government of El Salvador or the government of the United States is interested in pressing the investigation," Ford said. "Apparently, the United States doesn't want to embarrass its clients, the Salvadorans."

During his 10-day tour of the United States, Duarte has stressed the difficulty of convicting the six Salvadoran national guardsmen who were detained last April as suspects in the killings.

Duarte has argued that the Salvadoran judicial system requires eyewitnesses for the prosecution of a murder case and that no witnesses have been found.

Miami Raiders Seize Cocaine

MIAMI (AP) — About 535 pounds of high-grade cocaine — worth roughly \$30 million — was seized in a raid on a residence in southern Dade County, authorities said.

The drugs were found stuffed in 33 duffel bags.

Four people in the house were found to be illegal aliens and were turned over to immigration authorities.

Pakistani Troops Board Jet, Surprise Hijackers

LAHORE, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistani commandos dressed as sweepers overpowered five armed Sikh hijackers today and freed 45 hostages held for 19 hours in an Indian jetliner, the Pakistani government said.

Provincial Chief Secretary M.S. Chaudhry said there were no casualties in the action, which lasted only a few minutes.

"The successful Pakistani commando action was carried out 2 hours and 15 minutes before the deadline set by the Indian hijackers of the aircraft," a Pakistani government statement said.

Dressed in dirty white overalls and armed with pistols, seven members of the Pakistan Army's elite Special Services Group entered the plane and quickly overpowered the hijackers, an official spokesman said.

A second wave of 25 commandos in overalls followed immediately, he reported.

The 39 passengers and six crew members were in "good spirits," the spokesman said.

The 45 later flew back to India on the same plane that had been commandeered, and the Indian government asked Pakistan to return the hijackers for trial, officials said.

The hijackers released 67 other passengers, including the women, children and non-Indians, on Tuesday.

An Indian Embassy official in Islamabad, the Pakistani capital, said Lt. Gen. Sardar S.F. Lodhi, commander of the 4th Army Corps in Lahore, "was the brains behind the rescue operation."

The hijackers demanded \$500,000 and the release of all imprisoned members of their Hindu sect from Indian jails by 10 a.m. today. They had not said what they would do if their demands were not met, and the rescue occurred 15 minutes before negotiations with them were to resume.

Armed with the sacred daggers that all Sikhs are supposed to carry and at least one hand grenade, the five turbaned men took over the Indian Airlines Boeing 737 during a flight from New Delhi to Kashmir Tuesday.

"I saw a man running with four others after him," said William Seco of Seattle, Wash., the only American among the passengers. "I thought they were trying to catch him but they were five hijackers rushing the cabin crew."

Guatemala Reports Violence Kills 77

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — Guatemalan authorities said 77 people were killed in three days of political violence beginning Sunday, including a national policeman's wife who was gunned down in a city bus.

No group claimed responsibility for the deaths. Both rightist and leftist groups operate in this Central American country in a gangland-style war centered in the countryside.

In Ottawa, the Canadian Foreign Ministry announced Tuesday it had flown home "between five and 10" dependents of Canadian Embassy staff last weekend because Canadian diplomats in Guatemala were receiving death threats.

A ministry official, Rejane Dodd, said the five-member embassy staff would remain in Guatemala to "look after Canadian interests."

"The recent death threats seem more a symptom of the increasing violence and tension in Guatemala,"

another ministry official, Chips Filieul, said. "I don't think the threats are directed at Canada in particular."

Neither official disclosed how the threats were received. "The messages are always vague," Filieul said.

Human rights and Roman Catholic church groups say an average of 200 people a month die in political violence in Guatemala but recently the toll has been higher.

At least four guerrilla groups are active in Guatemala, primarily in the north and west. They are trying to topple the conservative, military-dominated government of Gen. Fernando Romeo Lucas Garcia and install a leftist government.

Government troops and right-wing civilian hit squads oppose the leftists. Human rights groups charge the squads are staffed, and even operated, by the military, but the government denies this charge.

Decision Nears On Fate Of MX Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, after months of intense study, has made his decision about deploying an MX missile system and will make it public Friday, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger confirmed today.

But Weinberger, asked about widespread reports that Reagan will approve a scaled-down version involving roughly 100 missiles rotated among about 1,000 shelters, commented caustically that those reports were riddled with errors.

All three major television networks reported Tuesday that Reagan had decided to build a land-based MX system but had rejected specific details of the "shell game" plan proposed by former President Carter.

Those reports, and one in today's Washington Post, agreed essentially that Reagan would opt for a smaller version of the Carter proposal, placing the

missiles in Nevada and possibly Utah and South Dakota.

"It's an awesome responsibility to take on the Washington Post and all the networks," Weinberger said on ABC-TV's "Good Morning America," "but the simple fact of the matter is that I have never in my experience ... seen so many errors about so many different parts of a single story."

He refused to discuss specifics until the Friday announcement, in which the president will also reveal his decision on the B-1 bomber.

Carter had decided against building the B-1 as a replacement for the fleet of aging B-52 bombers. The new planes, Carter had said, would be obsolete even before they were built.

Discussing the various MX reports, Weinberger said: "I've said from the beginning if people would only wait until the president has made his decision and made

his announcement we'd all get it accurate. But nobody seems to want to be in favor of accuracy. Everybody seems to want to be there first. And as a result a very substantial amount of confusion has been created."

The defense secretary added that it was "totally correct," however, that Reagan has made a decision.

The president is to conduct a nationally televised news conference from the White House Thursday — his fourth in eight months and first since June 16. But his announcement on the MX system and the design of the next U.S. long-range bomber will be delayed until the next day, Weinberger said.

Carter had called for deploying 200 MX missiles among 4,600 bomb-resistant shelters in Nevada and Utah. Reagan criticized that plan during his campaign, and it has come under attack from

state governments, farmers, environmentalists and the Mormon Church.

Presidential spokesman David Gergen said it was merely a coincidence that Reagan's announcement would come shortly after the Pentagon's release Tuesday of a 99-page booklet detailing the buildup of Soviet military power over the last 25 years.

He said, however, that the booklet — which described an "awesome buildup" of Soviet strength — would demonstrate "there is a pressing need to move ahead with U.S. modernization."

Before Reagan's announcement the White House

will inform key members of Congress and allied governments about his decisions on strategic weapons, Gergen said.

On the bomber, Reagan is picking a successor to the aging fleet of B-52s. The choice includes options such as an updated version of the B-1 bomber or a radar-eluding Stealth bomber still under development. Carter had chosen to go directly to production of the Stealth instead of the B-1.

Reagan also could call for production of the B-1, promising to switch to the Stealth when it is ready for production.

Bargain Basement Sale

WASHINGTON (AP) — Come one, come all. Uncle Sam is cleaning house and auctioning what he finds in the federal basement — scores of pricey, garish and gaudy gifts from foreign governments to U.S. officials that they are prohibited by law from keeping.

What will you pay for a brass cigar box from Thailand or a silver gilt Russian liqueur set? And who will buy the oil portrait and five busts of former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger?

There are dozens of men's watches, silver cigarette cases, tea sets, cuff-links, snake skin wallets and bolts of fine materials. There are jewel-studded crowns, hammered brass cordial glasses and a strand of coral beads.

For gamier bidders, there is a picture made from duck, quail and cardinal feathers — a gift from Mexico to Kissinger.

The gifts have been piling up in government storage rooms since 1977 when Congress passed a law prohibiting U.S. officials from keeping gifts valued at more than \$100. The penalty is up to \$10,000.

Before the government decided to hold its first public auction, it offered to give the gifts to federal agencies and museums. Then it offered to sell them at fair market value to the recipients themselves. This reduced the gift list from about 260 items to 182.

The most expensive item, valued by the U.S. government at \$6,000, is a Piaget gold watch, a gift from Oman to Henry Catto when he was chief of protocol.

Catto, now chief Defense Department spokesman, said Tuesday he decided not to buy the watch back from the government. "It's very handsome, but unfortunately, a bit expensive for my exchequer," he said.

His secretary, Alice Parrish, said Catto also had returned a watch given to him by the King of Saudi Arabia. Asked whether Catto planned to purchase that one, she replied, "No comment."

Roy Markon, a top GSA official, said the government hopes to make between \$40,000 and \$60,000 at the auction, which starts at 10 a.m. Thursday at the federal auditorium on Constitution Avenue, across from the Museum of Natural History.

"This is like a garage sale," he said. "We've accumulated gifts for several years, and its time to dispose of them. Much of the good stuff has been snapped up. But the beauty is in the eye of the beholder."

You can almost hear the auctioneer: "What do I get for the Korean gourd-shaped teapot ... the stainless steel cufflinks from Japan ... or this Gucci handbag, only slightly soiled?"

Medfly Assault Shifting

LOS GATOS, Calif. (AP) — Authorities are moving their aerial assault against the Mediterranean fruit fly closer to San Francisco following the discovery of two fertile medflies in nearby San Mateo County.

Helicopters began spraying bait laced with the pesticide malathion Tuesday night over a 9- to 15-square-mile area near the communities of Loma Mar and La Honda, said medfly project spokesman Roger Blake. A 9-square-mile area of San Mateo, Burlingame and Hillsborough will be sprayed tonight, he added.

The discovery of a female medfly was confirmed Tuesday in rural Loma Mar, and a male turned up in the city of San Mateo, about 15 miles south of San Francisco, Blake said.

Both flies were found a short distance outside the 1,113-square-mile area already being sprayed with

malathion, he said.

Deputy project manager Dick Jackson had said Monday that officials were confident of defeating the crop-ravaging pest that was found in San Jose in June 1980.

The finds were the fourth and fifth in September, and officials have been heartened by that pace after a flood of medfly discoveries during early summer before aerial spraying began.

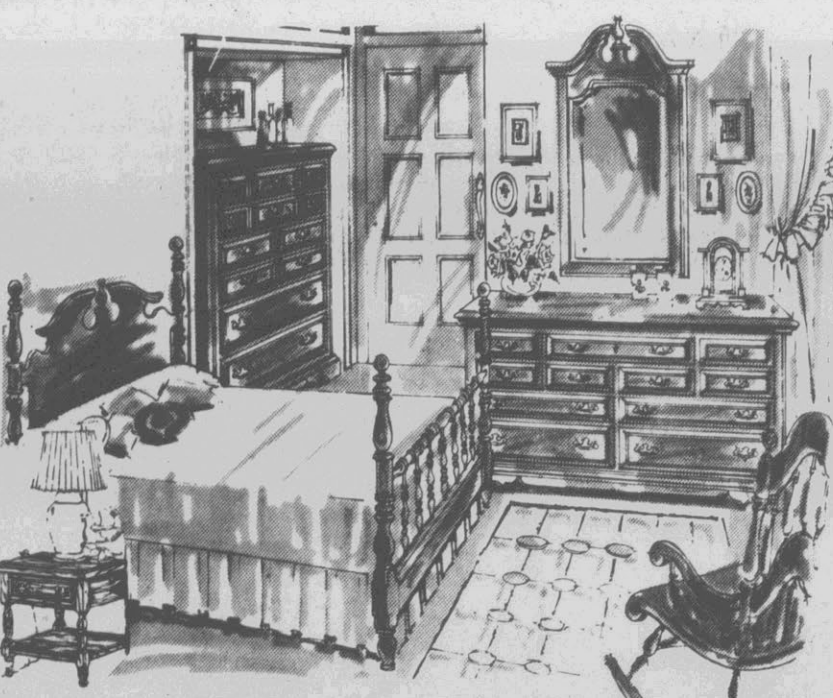

Students Chinese Leaders Extend May Lose Nationalist 'Peace' Bid Credits

CHICAGO (AP) — Eighty-two children attending what the Chicago Board of Education terms the "wrong" school won't be forced to integrate, but they also won't receive credit for attendance, the board says.

Defying board boundary changes to force integration, parents of black and white children at two segregated South Side schools have continued to send the students to their old schools.

On Tuesday, a majority of the students who for the past two weeks had boycotted the mostly white Graham and mostly black Hendricks elementary schools returned to classes.

However, officials said that 82 of the students in attendance were at the wrong schools.

The children will not be forced to integrate, but will not receive any credit for the time they are at the wrong school, said school board spokeswoman Doris Payne.

"I don't think anyone will be forced. But they are not enrolled in the school. They will not be given homework. They will be treated with the same courtesy as other visitors," Ms. Payne said.

Hendricks Principal Charles McGuckin was asked if he would force the pupils to go to the correct school.

"Absolutely not," he said. "He (an individual student) wasn't forced last week, why would we force him this week? I am not an enforcer."

At Graham, 421 students out of 543 attended classes Tuesday, but 51 were supposed to be at Hendricks, Ms. Payne said.

'No-Smo King' Will Take His Word To Grave

APPLETREEWICK, England (AP) — Pub owner John Showers, self-proclaimed "No-smo King" of Britain, says he will take his anti-smoking campaign beyond the grave.

Showers, 77-year-old owner of The New Inn in this North Yorkshire village, showed reporters a tomb he built for himself in his pub yard equipped with a tape recorder so he can greet visitors:

"Hello. How nice of you to come and see me. Of course you are worried about your smoking, aren't you? You smoke too many, and if you carry on like that, you will end up where I am. You see, I didn't smoke, so I lived to a great age."

A plaque on the tomb commemorates Showers' ban in 1971 on smoking in his pub, a first for British drinking establishments. The rule made him a celebrity.

Showers said despite his preparedness, he expects to continue his crusade in the flesh for some time.

"My dear boy, you don't think I am going into that damp tomb just yet, do you?" he admonished one reporter. "I'd catch my death of cold."

By VICTORIA GRAHAM Associated Press Writer PEKING (AP) — China's Communist leaders, in their strongest peace bid yet to Taiwan, today invited the island's rival Nationalist leaders for the first time to join in governing the mainland.

The offer and all the other main points of the peace bid already had been rejected by the Nationalists. And well-placed Chinese officials in Peking said after the power-sharing proposal was forecast by a Hong Kong newspaper earlier this month that the Communists would never permit the Nationalist Kuomintang Party any real power.

Marshal Ye Jianying, China's equivalent of head of state, made a nine-point proposal for the reunification of the mainland and the Nationalist offshore island in a National Day statement, issued in the English language to foreign correspondents by the Foreign Ministry. Thursday is the 32nd anniversary of the proclamation of the People's Republic of China, made on Oct. 1, 1949.

He called for talks between the Communist Party and the Kuomintang "to bring an end to the unfortunate separation of the Chinese nation."

He said after reunification, "people in authority and representative personages of various circles in Taiwan may take up posts of leadership in national political bodies and participate in running the state."

At a National Day reception, deputy chief of staff Gen. Wu Xiuquan told reporters the details of what kind of posts the Nationalists could hold in a reunified government would be dis-

cussed "once negotiations start."

Wu also said: "The thing the Kuomintang fears most is abolition of the army. We will allow them to keep their army and their economic independence."

Western diplomatic sources who did not want to be identified said the appeal appeared to be serious and that they did not view it as a ploy. They said it also appeared to be directed at the United States in an effort to demonstrate Peking's peaceful intentions and dissuade the Reagan administration from selling advanced fighter jets to Taiwan.

Observers also said Taiwan had little to gain from the proposal other than an economic advantage by direct access to the mainland's raw materials and 1 billion Chinese market. Taiwan, with about 17.5 million people, now has some indirect trade with the mainland through Hong Kong, Japan and South Korea.

Wu said he hoped "American leaders will be very cautious" on arms sales to Taiwan. Asked whether the reunification proposal was designed for world public opinion, he said, "It is more important for the United States to understand this."

Ye repeated earlier promises of local autonomy for Taiwan and retention of its social, cultural, legal and capitalist economic systems as well as its economic and cultural relations with foreign countries.

The statement also repeated previous proposals for the opening of mail, trade, air and shipping relations between the island and the mainland, visits by relatives and tourists, and ac-

ademic, cultural, sports and other exchanges.

Ye invited Taiwan industrialists to invest and build factories on the mainland. He also said anyone on Taiwan who wished to settle in China could do so freely.

"It is guaranteed that proper arrangements will be made for them, that there will be no discrimination against them, and that they will have the freedom of entry and exit," the statement said.

But the Nationalists have rejected all such previous overtures as "sugar coated poison" and "Communist tricks." They said earlier this month they would not negotiate with the Communists until they gave up communism.

Since China and the United States established diplomatic relations on Jan. 1, 1979, and the United States broke diplomatic relations with the Nationalists, Peking has stopped threats of taking Taiwan by force and instead has been calling for peaceful reunification.

Crane Boom Falls On UNC Campus

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — One end of a 160-foot-long crane boom fell about 140 feet at the Central Library construction site on the University of North Carolina's campus Tuesday, but no injuries were reported.

The accident occurred about 3:30 p.m. when the boom was being lowered to the ground by a 210-foot-long truck crane boom that appeared to buckle, according to Jim Richter, job superintendent for T.A. Loving Co., a Goldsboro construction firm.

Doctor Dies In 'Vicious Massacre'

By JONATHAN W. OATIS Associated Press Writer COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Strangers seeking help were a common sight at the home of Edward "Doc" Harkless, a "root doctor" whose \$80,000 home was said by police to be equipped for the practice of voodoo.

On Tuesday, however, the two-story dwelling, complete with an altar for the practice of black magic, was the scene of a "vicious massacre" as Harkless, 62, and three others were found shot to death, said Richland County Sheriff Frank Powell.

Harkless' 39-year-old wife, Frankie, and Fletcher K. Felder, 57, of Salley, a visitor, were wounded in the attack that Powell said was carried out by strangers.

The dead, along with Harkless, were identified as Felder's son, Ralph, 33, Leroy Hemphill, 52, of Chester, and Maxcey Lena Lights, 27, a live-in domestic employee in the Harkless home.

Mrs. Harkless was listed in critical condition and Fletcher Felder was reported in stable condition Tuesday in a hospital.

Clients came from throughout the state to seek the "root doctor's" services, neighbors said, adding that residents were accustomed to watching traffic come and go on the dirt road.

One room of the house had benches and an altar, and was equipped for the practice of, "for want of a better name, the occult, voodoo, black magic," Powell said.

The Harkless' daughter Terry, 10, and son Edward, 12, were in school at the time of the shootings.

Powell said Fletcher Felder told police at least two men carried out the killings.

Harkless was found slain in a room he apparently used as an office, said Richland County Coroner Frank Barrow. Authorities also found a large safe with the door open, and Powell said robbery may have been a motive, but that he had no suspects.

"Five of the people were placed in the back of a bathroom, placed their hands on a wall and were shot in the head," Powell said.

An alert was issued for three men in a brown 1972 or 1973 Pontiac. "I consider the people who committed this massacre to be extremely dangerous," Powell warned.

The 7-year-old brick house and its well-kept yard full of chickens and geese was "totally out of place," with the rest of the rundown dwellings in the neighborhood, the sheriff said.

Powell said the two visitors were forced inside the house by the killers around 10 a.m. and were shot shortly after.

He said neighbors discovered Mrs. Harkless after she

got into a car and managed to drive a short distance before losing consciousness.

The Rev. John Dolan, a Roman Catholic priest and lecturer on preventive medicine at the University of South Carolina School of Medicine said "root doctoring" is a tradition in the South, based on practices brought over from West Africa by slaves.

"It's also tied up with

superstitious practices, a great deal of faith healing and voodoo," he said. "It's kind of a family affair." Knowledge of what kind of plant to use is handed down from generation to generation.

"Root doctors" are generally folk healers, Dolan said, adding that there are "very few" practitioners in South Carolina.

Labor Party Approves Plan To Scrap Nuclear Weapons

BRIGHTON, England (AP) — Britain's opposition Labor Party approved a resolution today committing a future Labor government to scrap nuclear weapons unilaterally and ban U.S. cruise missiles.

But Labor delegates, on the fourth day of their annual conference, rejected a leftist proposal that Britain pull out of the 15-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The weapons vote marked Labor's first unequivocal commitment to unilateral nuclear disarmament — which the ruling Conservative Party and critics within Labor charge would seriously undermine Britain's role in NATO.

"We are unilateralists," legislator Joan Lester, a member of Labor's policy-making National Executive, told cheering delegates.

"We will work to match, or more than match, any agreement between the superpowers (on strategic arms limitation), but we will not wait for such agreement," she said.

At its 1980 conference Labor voted for the first time for unilateral nuclear disarmament. But the party stance had been left unclear after moderates pushed through a separate and contradictory resolution for multilateral disarmament.

Unilateral disarmament would mean that Britain would scrap its nuclear arsenal independent of the Soviet Union, the United States or any other nation.

Labor Party leader Michael Foot, a veteran anti-nuclear campaigner, made an impassioned plea in his keynote address Tuesday for the superpowers to halt the

nuclear arms buildup.

He stopped short of outright endorsement of British unilateral nuclear disarmament. But Foot was cheered by the 1,200 delegates when he declared: "I hope to live to see the day when this country is part of a nuclear-free zone."

The strong anti-nuclear sentiment in Labor is in sharp contrast to the policy of Conservative Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, now midway through a five-year term.

Mrs. Thatcher has agreed to accept U.S. cruise missiles due to be deployed in five West European countries from 1983 in response to the Soviet buildup of medium range nuclear weapons.

Mrs. Thatcher also plans to update Britain's aging Polaris nuclear missiles by

spending some \$12 billion on the U.S. Trident missile system.

On Tuesday, Labor marked the first departure from its previous bipartisan approach on Northern Ireland.

The party conference endorsed a policy which envisages reunification of the strife-torn British province with the predominantly Roman Catholic Irish Republic.

The Conservative approach is that Northern Ireland, where Protestants outnumber Catholics two to one, will never be handed over to the Republic against the wishes of its majority, who fiercely oppose reunification.

But the carefully-worded, Labor policy document said that while Protestants must not be permitted "a veto on political progress," a Labor administration would strive to get universal consent for constitutional change.

The conference rejected two radical resolutions which urged a future Labor government to start pulling out British troops immediately from Northern Ireland and ending British rule there.

Labor Party Chairman Alex Kitson told delegates: "Withdrawal (of British troops) would be a complete abdication of our responsibility." He said that for Britain simply to cut loose from Northern Ireland "would provide the perfect conditions for open civil war."

Worker Charged In Store Fire

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — A 22-year-old construction worker was charged Tuesday in connection with a fire that destroyed the Maxwell Brothers Furniture Store on Sunday.

Stephen Robert Szymkiewicz was arrested at his nearby apartment and charged with arson, auto larceny, breaking and entering and felony larceny.

Wilmington Police Capt. W.M. Lewis said damages to the store and its contents were estimated at \$1.4 million.

Autopsy Indicates Man Died In Wreck

A 22-year-old Scotland Neck man died as the result of an auto crash, not because he was beaten or shot by police, says Dr. Lawrence S. Harris, eastern regional pathologist for the State Medical Examiner's Office.

The finding contradicts claims by civil rights leader Golden Frinks that foul play by police was involved in the death of Ricky Davis.

"Everything I've seen with my naked eye is consistent with a high-velocity auto crash, especially the head injuries," said Harris.

Frinks told 200 protesters Sunday that Davis had been "beaten to death or shot" by a Scotland Neck police officer. He said police had fabricated the story that Davis died from injuries he received in a crash after being chased by an officer.

Frinks, national field secretary for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said Davis' body should be exhumed for an autopsy.

Scotland Neck Police Chief William W. Joyner said the chase of Davis began when officer M. Greg Harrington "saw somebody throw a bag in the trunk of a car and take off." The car was leaving a grain storage area that was under police surveillance because of recent corn thefts.

Carolina Power Seeks Increase

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Nuclear plant shutdowns and hot weather forced Carolina Power & Light Co. Tuesday to seek a fuel rate adjustment that would increase the average monthly residential bill by \$8.18, CP&L officials said.

The North Carolina Utilities Commission must rule on the increase, which CP&L wants to collect between December and March.

"It is the second highest fuel adjustment I've seen," said Dennis J. Nightingale, director of the electric

division of the commission's Public Staff. The staff represents consumers in power rate increases.

The company cited high fuel costs for May through August, when all three of its nuclear units were shut down at various times.

The hot weather of June and July resulted in a record summer peak demand of 6.22 million kilowatts on June 16, which was surpassed July 27 by a peak demand of 6.25 million kilowatts.

The nuclear units are now back up and operating, said Norris L. Edge, vice president for rates and service practices. The units were out of service during part of the spring for maintenance, and the Brunswick nuclear units near Southport were out because of unexpected problems, he said.

"While the nuclear units were out of service, the company had to purchase power from neighboring electric utilities and burn expensive oil," he said. "CP&L has reduced voltage systemwide by 5 percent and we have urged our customers to conserve electricity."

Fuel expense per kilowatt-hour for CP&L is about a half-cent for nuclear plants, 1.8 cents for coal-fired plants and 14 cents for oil, Edge said.

CP&L also has a request pending that would add \$9.22 per 1,000 kilowatt hours to its winter rates through a general rate increase.

Together with the fuel adjustment, winter bills would be \$68.69 a month for the average customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours.

If both increases are approved, they would close the gap between CP&L and Virginia Electric and Power Co., which Gov. Jim Hunt has criticized for high power rates. Vepco, which already has put a general rate increase into effect, will charge \$69.51.

'Woolly' Forecast Readied

BOONE, N.C. (AP) — Although winter is several months away, scientists at Appalachian State University are already busy trying to come up with a winter forecast through their most accurate weather "instruments" — woolly worms.

Each year, the university's Center for Woolly Worm Studies makes its prediction for the coming winter weather after studying hundreds of woolly worms.

Woolly-worm weather predictions are based on the folk belief that the coloring of the worms in the fall is an indication of the winter to come. The more black there is on the worms, the more severe the winter. Brown coloring indicates milder temperatures.

A spokesman for the biology department said it's too early this year to tell what the winter will bring. The worms are too small to study at this point.

"The center has just started its studies because the worms are really small now," the spokesman said. "It will be about two more weeks before any prediction can be made."

Dr. Sandra Glover, professor of biology and head of the center, conducts the studies each year on about 500 of the furry worms. The baby worms are only about a quarter of an inch long and earth-colored. Adult woolies are about an inch long with stripes that are believed to indicate winter weather.

Aides Say Hunt Will Push For Liquor Tax Increase

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Top aides to Gov. Jim Hunt say he is determined to win higher taxes on beer and wine when the General Assembly holds its special session next week, despite powerful opposition to another tax increase.

But Senate leaders, in separate interviews this week, say Hunt has a long way to go if he is to dislodge the alcoholic-beverage tax bill from a hostile subcommittee.

The tax bill, intended to raise an estimated \$21 million a year for the state highway program, will be one of Hunt's three major concerns when legislators

hold their extraordinary meeting beginning Monday, said John A. Williams, Hunt's senior advisor.

"He's pushing it," said Williams. "He's calling them himself and he's met with the leadership on it twice."

In addition to the tax, Hunt is also seeking a pay raise for state employees and a \$300 million water-and-sewer bond issue from the session.

Hunt's top political aide, Joe Pell, said the administration put its chances at 50-50 that the tax bill can win enactment in the session, which legislative leaders hope to adjourn by the end of the week.

Hunt proposed the alcohol tax along with the

3-cent-per-gallon increase in the gasoline tax, which lawmakers passed in June.

To win the alcohol levy, however, the administration must overcome opposition by powerful Senate Ways and Means Chairman Kenneth Royall, D-Durham, whose committee has the power to block any tax bill the Senate Finance Committee approves.

Royall, in an interview, called it "foolish" for legislators to pass another tax increase this year.

"It's simply the fact that we've funded the highway department with 25 to 26 percent more money than we've ever given them," Royall said. "In my view, we

should wait and see how the money is spent."

The bill was passed by the House during the regular session earlier this year but stalled in a Finance subcommittee. The chairman of the subcommittee, Sen. Billy Mills, D-Onslow, said he had no plans to hold a meeting during the short session. And he said Royall could stop the measure even if the Finance panel approved it.

"I think there's no way it can fly without Ken Royall's support. It's impossible," Mills said. "I've never seen the Senate take a bill away from a chairman, and that's what would have to happen."

Added Finance Chairman Sen. Conrad Duncan, D-Rockingham: "Hunt's probably working on the bill, but right now it looks like it might be in sad shape."

Zeb Alley, Hunt's chief legislative lobbyist, said he has been working on the tax measure almost exclusively for the past month and believed its support was growing among the full Senate.

Alley said his tally of Senate Democrats showed 13 votes committed to the tax bill and only four firmly against it. The 10 Republicans in the Senate are expected to oppose the tax, and the remaining Democrats in the 50-member chamber are undecided, he said.

The proposal would raise the tax on beer by a penny per 12-ounce can, to 6 cents. On liquor, the tax increase would amount to 40 cents on a typical \$6 bottle.

Hunt has retained a prominent Raleigh lawyer and former legislator, Sam

Johnson, to handle the bond issue. Williams, also state budget officer, is handling the pay-raise issue, leaving Alley with the tax proposal.

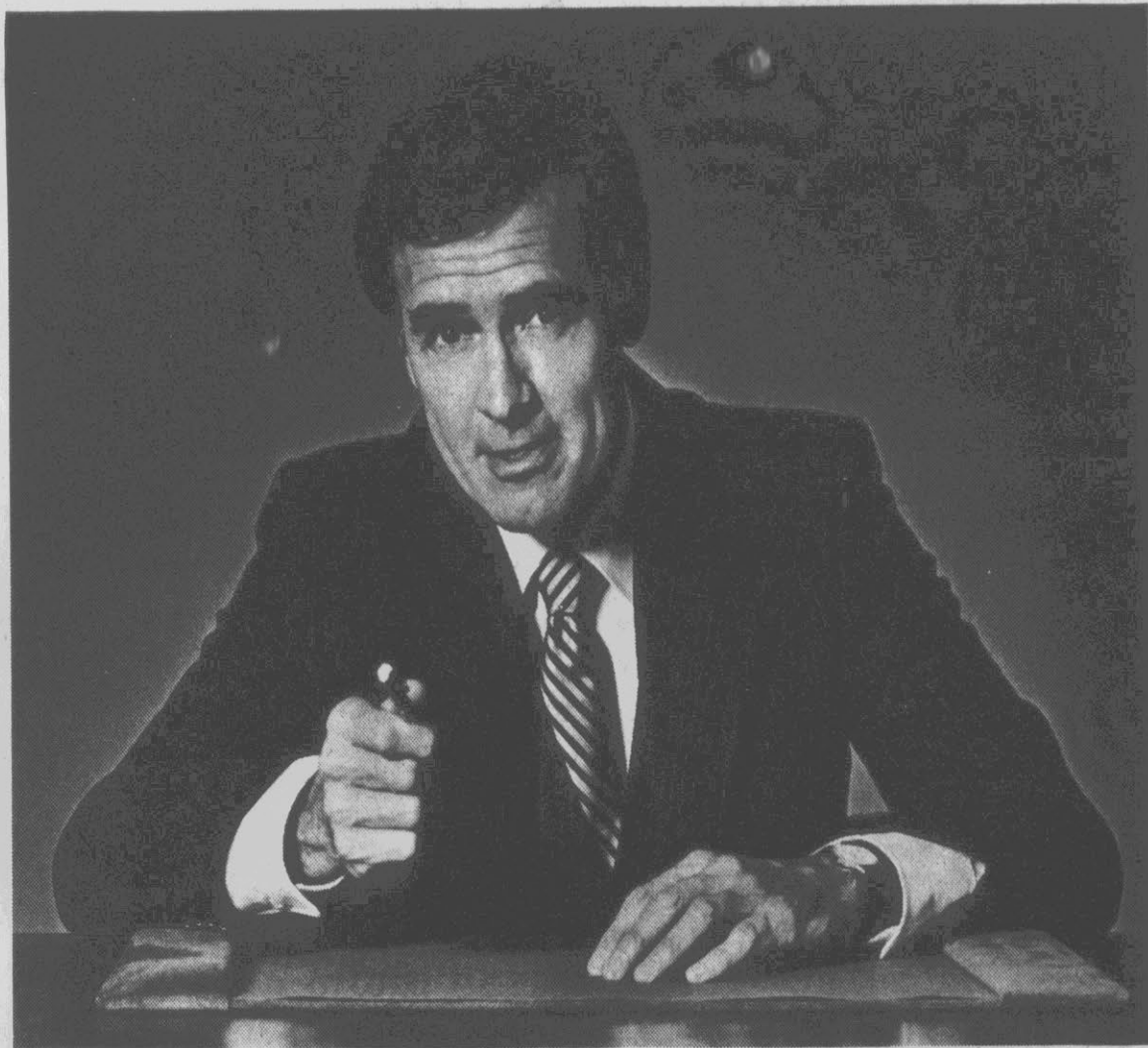
RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A Superior Court judge ordered the state Tuesday not to file any criminal charges against distributors and retailers selling cigarette rolling papers.

Judge James H. Pou Bailey's temporary restraining order came in response to a complaint filed in Wake Superior Court by Raleigh attorney W. Woodward Webb on behalf of Adams Apple Distributing Co. of Illinois, which sells "Job" rolling papers, and Atlantic Tobacco Co. of Raleigh, which distributes the papers in North Carolina.

The complaint challenges the constitutionality of the North Carolina Drug Paraphernalia Act, which takes effect Thursday.

In his order, Bailey said the law "is quite likely unconstitutionally vague and overbroad." He scheduled a hearing on the complaint for Oct. 8, when the temporary restraining order expires.

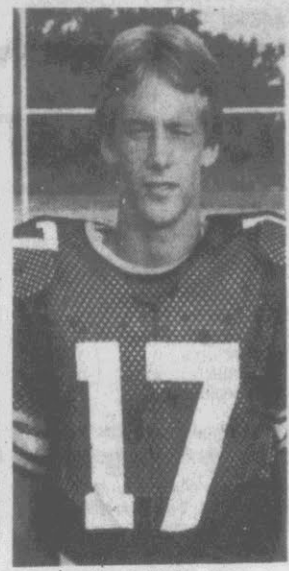

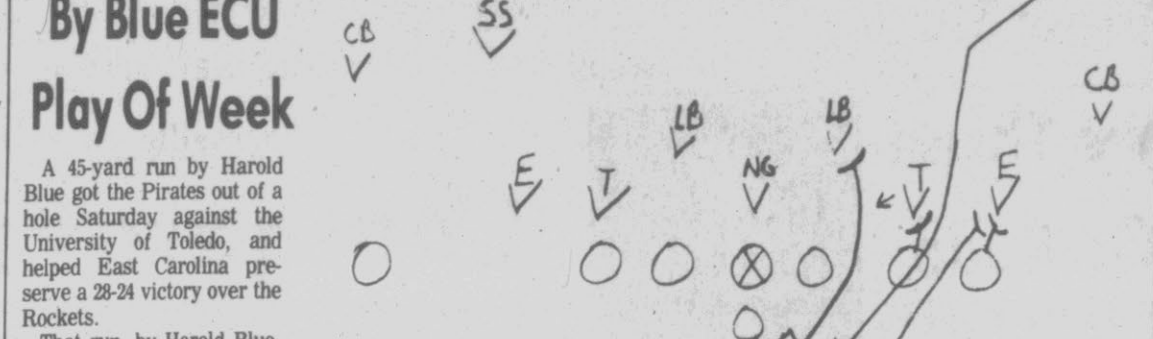

45-Yard Run By Blue ECU Play of Week



A 45-yard run by Harold Blue got the Pirates out of a hole Saturday against the University of Toledo, and helped East Carolina preserve a 28-24 victory over the Rockets.

That run, by Harold Blue, was selected by ECU coaches as the "Play of the Week" for that game.

"The play was a straight belly play," offensive coordinator Wright Anderson said. "The quarterback reads the defensive tackle. If the tackle does not take the fullback, the quarterback hands off to the fullback on a dive. If the defensive tackle closes down, the quarterback pulls the ball and gives to the second back through."

In this case, it was left halfback Harold Blue who got the call.

"The play was nothing special," Anderson continued. "Tootie (Robbins) got a good block and Harold made a quick cut in the secondary."

The 45-yarder bailed the Pirates out of the hole with just over five minutes left in the game. It came on the first play from scrimmage after Toledo had scored a field goal to cut the lead to 28-24. While the Pirates failed to score on the series, it did establish field position, causing Toledo to have to work from deep in its own territory, and it was unable to get a drive going, and the Pirates then ran out the clock on a long drive of their own.

The run was Blue's longest career run and the longest Pirate run of the 1981 season.

Martin Drops Boycott Threat

OAKLAND (AP) — Oakland A's Manager Billy Martin has dropped his threat to boycott the first round of American League playoffs following assurances that the club will compensate coaches for the games.

"It's a dead issue now. I think we made our point," Martin said Tuesday.

Martin — together with his coaches — had vowed to sit out the playoffs in protest of the player-owner agreement that provided no guarantee managers and coaches would share in the divisional playoff revenue.

"I still think it's 100 percent wrong, but now everybody knows about it. I don't think it will happen again," Martin said.

A's President Roy Eisenhardt said he would allot part of the club's 18.5 percent share of the revenue from the first three games to compensate the coaches and team support personnel.

Many of the A's players already had said they planned to vote a share of their playoff winnings to the coaches.

"My intention will be to give them roughly the same share as the players," Eisenhardt said. "Billy won't be paid, which should illustrate that he was pursuing fairness, not his own well-being."

The A's, winners of the AL West first-half title, will open the divisional playoffs next Tuesday, probably in Kansas City.

Tar Heels Doing Just About Everything Right

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — When a football team is averaging nearly 54 points a game, it must be doing something right.

Sixth-ranked North Carolina is doing just that and it's because the Tar Heels are doing just about everything right.

"They aren't making many mistakes," Tar Heel coach Dick Crum said Tuesday during his weekly news conference.

"The biggest things in the games so far is they haven't turned the ball over yet. That's worth two touchdowns to your defense."

And, Crum adds, it's just a matter of confidence.

"Our youngsters believe our offense can score," he said. "That's the way it is anytime they go on the field. They just have that confidence."

The latest to fall to Crum's high scorers was Boston Col-

lege — a 56-14 victim. But it was a surprise to Crum. Of course, he has been surprised every week this season.

"We were kind of surprised to find ourselves with a 35-7 lead at halftime," he said. "The amount of offense we had was a surprise to us. We were really surprised we were able to run the ball like we did."

The only problem with wins like those, Crum said, is the team is not getting the workout it needs. Against Boston College, North Carolina did not get much practice passing. The Tar Heels only threw 11 passes and Crum decided to stay out of the air after building such a large lead in the first half.

And his first string players have yet to play a fourth quarter this season. "It'll be interesting to see what happens when they have to," he said.

North Carolina's sixth ranking is the highest it has attained since 1948 when the Tar

Heels went 9-1-1. The only loss that year came at the hands of Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl. Crum said, "It's nice to be there, but it is only the third week of the season. It really doesn't have much meaning." The team he believes might be No. 1 is Oklahoma which lost to No. 1 Southern Cal, 28-24, Saturday. "I'm not so sure that they're not the best team in the country. Anytime you turn the ball over 10 times and only lose by four points, you're pretty good."

Georgia Tech is the next opponent for North Carolina, and the Yellow Jackets have already beaten one nationally ranked opponent this season. Georgia Tech opened its season by upsetting then second-ranked Alabama. Tech has since dropped games to Florida and Memphis State.

Crum said he didn't know what happened to Georgia Tech. "But I'm sure (Tech

coach) Bill Curry would like to know too."

The Alabama win was no fluke, Crum said. "We're playing a Tech team that is a lot better than a year ago," he said, referring to the 33-0 shutout last year.

The Tar Heel defense, sixth in the nation, has not been tested by the pass — yet. But Crum admits that Yellow Jacket quarterback Mike Kelley is accomplished in that area and "there's no doubt that Georgia Tech has the best passing game we've seen to date."

But Crum does not rule out another high-scoring game.

The Tar Heels' confidence has proved justified so far. North Carolina leads the nation in total offense, averaging 505.3 yards a game.

Also among the nation's leaders is tailback Kelvin Bryant, the No. 3 rusher in the country, averaging 173 yards a game. He leads the nation in scring with 15 touchdowns in three games, more than halfway to the NCAA record of 29 set by Penn State's Lydell Mitchell in 1971.

The North Carolina-Georgia Tech is 1:30 p.m. Saturday at Grant Field in Atlanta.

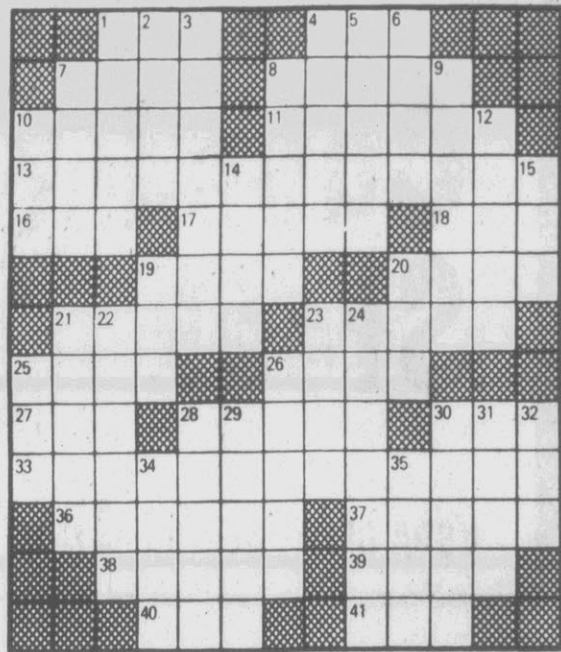

Professor Wins Panel's Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee voted 8-4 Tuesday to recommend that Campbell University Professor David B. Funderburk be confirmed as ambassador to Romania.

By contrast, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved eight other ambassadorial nominees by a 15 to 0 vote Tuesday. The vote on Funderburk, who had been nominated by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., was held up because of concern among some members of the committee about his strongly anti-communist writings.

Funderburk, a 37-year-old associate professor of history and an expert on Romanian language and politics, is expected to win full Senate confirmation later this week. He is scheduled to leave Friday for his post in Bucharest.

The committee voted Tuesday with only five members present, and the record was left open for the committee's other 12 members to vote later.

The vote had been delayed by Sen. Paul E. Tsongas, D-Mass., who questioned Funderburk at a hearing Monday on a book he

published in 1978. Funderburk had written that American colleges, the news media and the Rev. Billy Graham had "whitewashed" communism.

The 67-page book, with a preface by Helms, is entitled, "If the Blind Lead the Blind; the Scandal Regarding the

Mis-Teachings of Communism in American Universities."

Under questioning, Funderburk said he would not write such a book now, but criticized Graham for saying Hungary has religious freedom. He also said some professors do not tell the

harsh side of communism and said some newspapers, including the New York Times and Washington Post, are naive about communism.

Early Tuesday, committee members present approved Funderburk 3-2, with Tsongas and Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., voting against. Sen. Charles H.

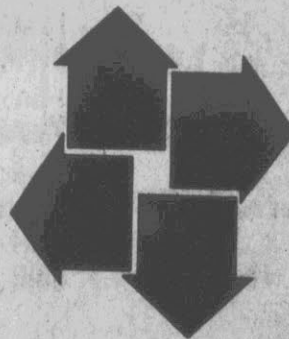

Televised in two-hour installments tonight, Thursday and Friday, "Manions" traces the destitute O'Manion family in Ireland during a period of potato famine and heavy English military intervention.

Hot-headed Rory O'Manion (Pierce Brosnan) is the central focus of this mid-1800s series. He battles with the English landlords and soldiers who tax and harass the Irish tenants, but he must leave quickly for America when he kills an English agent. In Philadelphia, he reluctantly changes his name to Manion to accommodate America's prejudices.

The Irish countryside is beautiful to see and the sets do conjure another time and another world — the only real grace in this clumsy production.

Typical of the lack of subtlety is when Rory accidentally kills the agent. He takes off his scarf so the audience can see his anguish and the English soldiers can see his face.

In Philadelphia, Rory works in a powder factory, which is attacked in a newspaper editorial for ignoring safety regulations and profiting on the backs of illiterate Irish workers. "This is bound to hurt your reputation," the owner is told by a friend.

The love angles — since this is love in the evening there are plenty around — are handled in the same heavy-handed manner. Rory and Rachel Clement (Kate Mulgrew),

daughter of the O'Manion's landlord, fall passionately in love. So does Rory's sister, Deirdre, and Rachel's brother, David, an English soldier with some sympathy for the Irish plight.

It's all too predictable and pat. Poor boy-rich girl. Poor girl-rich boy. Irish-English. Catholic-Protestant. Before too long, they all join Rory in America for some more passion and depression, whenever the action slows. The motivations for all this lust and lost never ring true.

As the fates turn, primary and secondary characters are killed off — and one even comes back from death — but the characters never seem truly affected by any of it. Neither will the audience. To really feel for characters, they must have some credibility to touch our emotions. This never happens.

Only David Soul, last seen as Hutch in an ABC cop show "Starsky and Hutch," is able to bring some depth to the role of Caleb Staunton. With the program's best acting, Soul plays a kind-hearted American who loves Deirdre and marries her the same day that Rachel receives news from David, who was thought to be dead in India.

"Manions" is typical of this genre in which meaningful dialogue and well-developed characters are sacrificed for action, sex and coincidences that defy all logic. It's characteristic of much of commercial TV.

Want more proof? Rosemary Anne Sisson is credited for the screenplay of Hollywood's "Manions," while on Sunday her TV adaptation of "A Town Like Alice" begins on PBS' Masterpiece Theatre. "Alice" may be the best series on television this year. Same writer, different medium.

After six hours of "Manions of America," you won't come away feeling stimulated or challenged in any way. But you may be irritated.

ABC Wins Rating Race

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC won the prime-time ratings race for the second consecutive week, even though NBC scored heavily with programs featuring two of the network's biggest stars, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed.

Ten of the 20 highest-rated programs in the week ending

Sept. 27 were on ABC, including a "Monday Night Football" game between Dallas and New England in the No. 2 position.

NBC, in contrast, listed only three of the Top 20 shows, but two of the three highest-rated.

"Johnny Carson's 19th Anniversary Show" was No. 1 for the week, with a rating of 28, and a second NBC special, "Bob Hope's All-Star Comedy Look at the Fall Season," finished third.

Nielsen says the score for Carson's special means of all the nation's TV-equipped homes, 28 percent saw at least part of the program.

ABC's rating for the week was 16.5 to 16.1 for CBS and 14.1 for NBC. The networks say that means in an average prime-time minute during

the week, 16.5 percent of the country's homes with television were tuned to ABC.

Seven of the 20 highest-rated shows were in first run, four in addition to the three highest-rated. CBS' "60 Minutes" finished sixth, with Part I of a two-part Walt Disney film on CBS, "The Love Bug," eighth, and two ABC shows, "That's Incredible," 14th, and "Best of the West," 16th.

With the start of the 1981-82 TV season just two weeks away, original programs were more common on network schedules in the most recent period surveyed.

CBS' "Evening News," meanwhile, regained the No. 1 position in the network news competition, after a two-week run at the top by NBC's "Nightly News."

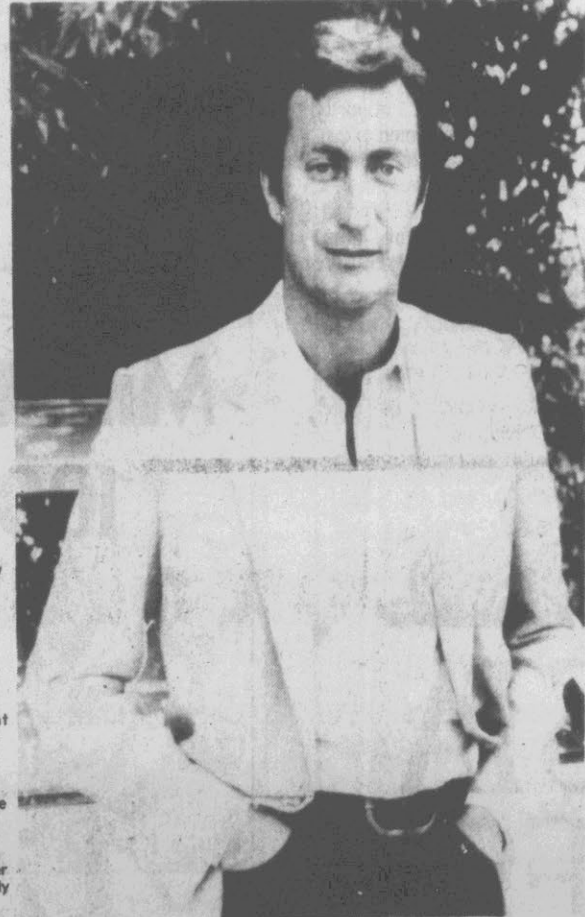

Berrigan Says Military Growth Omen Of Death

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — America's growing military operations constitute "an enormous squadron of death," the Rev. Daniel Berrigan said Tuesday.

In a speech to about 1,000 people at the University of North Carolina, the Catholic priest and former Vietnam War protester said, "No one can assure us there will be a next generation."

Berrigan, who is famous for burning draft cards during the war and more recently for his protests against nuclear arms, also spoke Tuesday in Raleigh, where his presence caused a split among area Roman Catholics.

The Knights of Columbus, a Catholic organization, urged Bishop Joseph E. Gossman to avoid associating with Berrigan, convicted of raiding a Pennsylvania missile-assembly plant earlier this year.

But Gossman introduced Berrigan Tuesday at North Carolina State University's Stewart Theater to a crowd of about 300, saying "the issue is not Daniel Berrigan but the survival of the human race."

Berrigan, 60, said after the Raleigh speech

that he was disappointed the Knights of Columbus chose to boycott his appearance.

"I wanted to meet them all," he said. "I'd really like to sit down with these people, not just to argue with them, but to be their friend. I think a lot of them are victimized by their backgrounds."

Berrigan said nuclear war is inevitable within the next five years unless something is done to stop the spread of atomic weapons. He said that is why he and his younger brother, Philip, joined six other anti-war activists in raiding a General Electric missile plant in Prussia, Pa.

The eight activists were convicted of burglary, criminal mischief and conspiracy for reportedly smashing the nose cones of two Minuteman missiles with a hammer and spilling human blood on machinery and documents.

Upon his arrest, Berrigan said, he was told he would be set free if he pleaded guilty, without serving a prison term. But Berrigan refused, and the case is currently on appeal.

We always have preached that aces were meant to capture kings. Of course, it was understood that we meant your aces and the opponents' kings. But take a look at this hand from the Ruitenboer Tournament in Holland.

After South can do no more than simply rebid his suit, North has just about enough to invite game by raising. Without a ruffing value, South would have been wiser to pass, but he elected to stretch to an optimistic game.

Declarer was not delighted with the contract after West led the queen of clubs and dummy appeared on the table. He was faced with three possible losers in spades and one in each red suit, and entries to the closed hand were going to be hard to come by.

If declarer allows the king of clubs to win the first trick,

accurate defense will beat the contract. Assume that, at trick two, declarer cashes the ace of hearts and concedes a trump trick to the king. West can now shift to the queen of spades, enabling the defense to reel off three spade tricks before declarer can utilize dummy's diamond suit.

To make his contract against this specific distribution, declarer needs to get to his hand to take the trump finesse, and his only entry is the ace of clubs. So at trick one declarer must overtake his own king of clubs with the ace.

Once he is in his hand, he leads the queen of hearts for a finesse. West does best not to cover, but declarer has only one way to play the hand. He continues with a heart, and fortunately West must follow with the king. With the hearts breaking evenly, declarer is halfway home.

He gets back to his hand by overtaking dummy's last trump and takes the diamond finesse. He is doubly lucky—not only is the king outside, but the suit breaks 3-3. So declarer ends up with twelve tricks—six hearts, five diamonds and the ace of clubs.

Treaty May Be Crime Answer

EL PASO, Texas (AP) —
The problem of Mexican kids who cross the border and commit crimes in El Paso, seemed to have an easy solution: ship them back to Juarez to cool their heels in a juvenile detention center.

But that simple solution has become an international issue that some say may have to be resolved with a treaty between the United States and Mexico.

More than two years ago, El Paso officials reached an oral agreement with juvenile authorities in Ciudad Juarez that called for youths caught committing crimes in El Paso to be put in a detention center on the Mexican side of the border. The youths could be held for up to three months.

"It was working beautifully," said District Judge Woodrow Bean II. "The crime rate here went down last year. Those juveniles over in Juarez knew that if they were caught over here, they were going to be taken to the detention center, so they didn't come over here."

Juvenile authorities on both sides of the border said they were pleased with the arrangement. Then came the hitch.

Last December, a Juvenile Probation Department employee named Margaret Ingle refused to take some juveniles to Juarez, saying it was illegal for El Paso County officers to take prisoners into a foreign country.

She was fired, but complained, and the county Juvenile Board ruled 4-3 on April 23 that the process was indeed a violation of a clause in the Texas Constitution that prohibits "banishing" convicted criminals from the state. The board reinstated Ms. Ingle and ordered the probation department to find another way to deal with the alien juvenile criminals.

The divided vote is still a matter of debate among the county judge and assorted district judges who make up the Juvenile Board.

"I voted to leave it the way it was and if, at some future date, the court told us we were doing something wrong, then we could do something different," Bean said. "I think (the other judges) were just scared of it."

District Judge Edward Marquez, on the other hand, said, "The procedure we had before, while working well, was illegal. It didn't appear we were doing any harm until we really got into it and researched it."

The procedure worked this way: Young illegal aliens arrested on suspicion of a crime were sent to the El Paso probation department. Those with criminal records in El Paso were taken to court and, if convicted, placed in the state juvenile center in Brownwood.

If it was a first offense, the officers would load the youths into state vehicles and take them to the Juarez detention center, said Xavier Banales, head of the probation department.

"I felt bad about that, too," Marquez said, "because those kids were being locked up without any kind of a hearing."

Since the shuttle across the border was halted, Banales said, the agency has either tried to prosecute the youths or turned them over to the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

But to prosecute, the department must contact a youth's parents. That can be difficult in Juarez, which has relatively few telephones among its 900,000 people, Banales said.

Lee Holder, assistant INS director for investigations, said the teen-agers are either taken to court for deportation hearings or released at the bridge in what the INS calls "voluntary departure."

"The procedure for handling juveniles is so complicated and takes so long that they probably just find it

easier to release them at the bridge," Banales said.

Banales said the change in policy "certainly had a big influence. All of a sudden, we're beginning to see two things — an increase in the number of referrals and quicker returns by the youngsters."

"Now, we're getting youngsters who come back to our facility about two or three days later," he said.

Bean said the trend proves a prediction he made when he was out-voted at the

Juvenile Board meeting.

"I predicted right away that the crime rate would probably double in El Paso, especially after those kids start realizing that they're just going to take them to the bridge and kick them out," he said.

Statistics appear to bear him out. For the first 28 days of September, 56 Mexican youths have been referred to the probation department, the highest monthly total since October 1980. By contrast, in April, the last month

under the agreement, 25 Mexican juveniles were arrested in El Paso.

Banales said 60 to 70 percent of the illegal alien youths are picked up for business burglaries.

The judges of the Juvenile Board have turned to Congress for help with the matter, since the Constitution limits agreements with foreign countries to the federal government.

"What we have to have is a treaty with Mexico that allows our juvenile people to

return juveniles to Mexico," Bean said.

The judges appealed to Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, who with 14 colleagues from border states has asked the State Department to begin talks with Mexico.

"This year, 3,000 to 6,000 juveniles will illegally enter this country and commit crimes," said Bentsen's press secretary, Jack Devore. "None of these local government individuals can cope with this without a national policy."

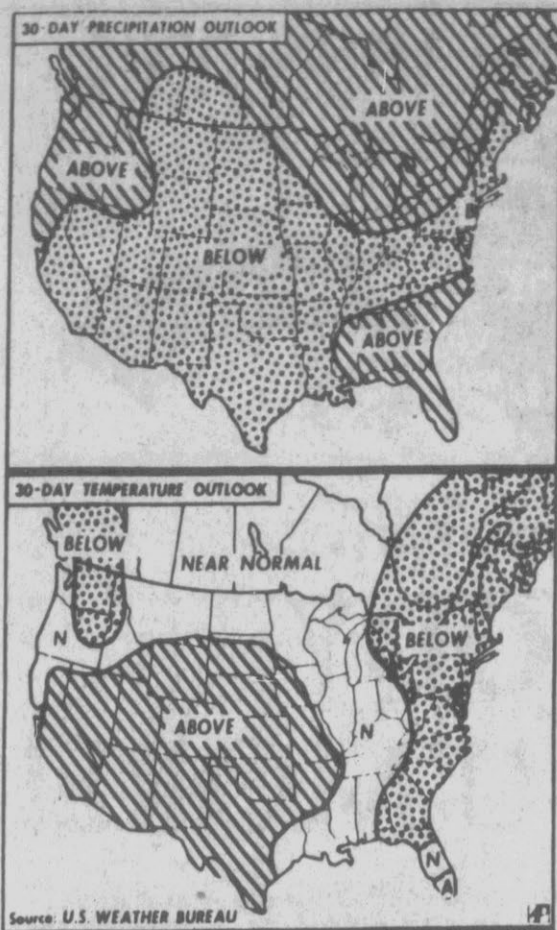

Superpowers' Arctic Buildup Raises Concern

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Geopolitics, energy and new weapons systems are converting the Arctic Circle and its icy northern seas into areas of intense superpower rivalry.

Sweden, Norway and Finland are expressing concern.

"We are deeply worried about the military buildup in the area," said Leif Leifland, undersecretary of state in the Swedish Foreign Ministry. "The superpowers reveal an increasing interest in the Polar Circle region."

The United States has shown an increasing interest in the area. U.S. Navy Secretary John Lehman has announced a new naval strategy to counter alleged Soviet threats in all key oceans, including the Arctic.

Lehman told a Washington news conference the new strategy was to keep the Soviets out of the northern part of Norway and enable U.S. forces in a conflict to attack the Soviet Union's Kola Peninsula and its chief city, Murmansk, headquarters since the 1960s of the Soviet northern fleet. He also argued that such a strategy would help deter the Soviets from attacking NATO's central front in Western Europe.

The Kola Peninsula, situated between the Barents and White seas, "bristles with SS-20 tactical missiles," a Danish Foreign Ministry official said. In addition, it is a base for about 200 Soviet submarines, including 50 nuclear-armed strategic subs; some 200 naval surface craft including an aircraft carrier and 10 cruisers; 300 aircraft; two motorized rifle divisions; and a 10,000-man border force.

The polar region was considered peripheral to international politics until the expansion of Soviet military capabilities in the peninsula, the establishment of national 200-mile economic zones and the discoveries of new energy resources and offshore technologies changed its strategic value.

By that time, neutral Sweden, militarily the strongest of the Nordic states, had embarked on a cost-cutting program that sliced the three branches of its armed forces by some 20 percent in the last decade.

An army officer, who asked not to be identified, said fellow officers from neighboring Nordic countries have expressed alarm that the cutbacks in Sweden's armed might change the region's military balance.

Nevertheless, the Nordic states are trying to lessen the possibility of nuclear conflict in the area, as demonstrated by a renewed debate on making it a nuclear-free zone.

Sweden already is committed not to produce or station nuclear weapons on its soil even in war, but military experts agree that northern Sweden and Finland are possible transit areas for combatants in wartime.

Finland, considered pro-Western despite its ties to the Soviet Union through a cooperation and defense treaty, has strengthened its forces in the north, setting up an air base and expanding its border force to an infantry brigade.

Norway, a burgeoning oil power because of new North Sea oil finds, has more at stake than any of the other Nordic nations but takes a low profile in its relations with the Soviet Union, both in civilian and military matters.

Although it is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Norway will not allow foreign military bases or nuclear forces on its territory in peacetime. It also bans NATO military maneuvers in its northernmost province of Finnmark bordering both Finland and the Soviet Union.

U.S. Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. has rejected a proposal to officially recognize the absence of nuclear weapons in Scandinavia, reportedly because he feels it might jeopardize nuclear disarmament talks with the Soviet Union.

Learning Japanese Has Spread

Nihongo wa muzukashii.
Learning what that phrase means is "an endless, awful struggle that words can't describe," says Beth Tsunoda, a student at Columbia University.

But Mrs. Tsunoda and a growing number of other students think it is worth the effort to learn the Japanese language, to learn, for example, that "Nihongo wa muzukashii" means "Japanese is difficult."

They are doing it at a time when other foreign languages are declining in popularity at American universities.

The Modern Language Association, which keeps tabs of university language rolls, says that from 1970 to 1980, the number of students taking Japanese at two- and four-year colleges went from 6,620 to 11,506 — up 74 percent. Total university enrollment went up only 49 percent — from 7.9 million to 11.8 million — during the decade.

In the last three years alone, the association says, the number of students taking Japanese has increased by nearly 7 percent. Chinese has also grown rapidly, up 15.9 percent. But enrollment in college Spanish and French classes grew less than 1 percent. The number of students taking German dropped by 6 percent, and the number taking Russian shrank 14 percent.

The study of Japanese traditionally has been centered on the East and West Coasts where Japanese influence on American culture and commerce is greatest, and especially in California, where 5,100 students, nearly half the U.S. total, are enrolled in the courses.

But in the last several years, Japanese has spread to the heartland — to community colleges in Kalamazoo, Mich., to the University of Cincinnati, Georgia State University, the University of Alabama and Idaho State University, for example.

At Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., which has one of the most intensive Japanese language programs in the nation, Professor Eleanor H. Jordan says: "We are struck by an incredible increase here. I walked into our Japanese class to find 42 people." Last year, she said, the class had 32 students.

The reasons behind the growth in American interest in Japanese seem nearly as inscrutable as the language itself.

At Alabama University, for instance, the chief motives may be economic. "Business students are especially interested in view of the fact that Japan is now Alabama's No. 1 foreign trade partner," says Michiyasu Shishido who teaches Japanese at the school.

In general, though, business schools do not grant degree credit for Japanese, or for any language.

"It's still very unusual for any graduate school of business," says Professor Robert Hawkins, vice dean of New York University's graduate business school. He said that changing the policy might dilute the strictly professional content of a business degree.

Columbia University Professor Gary Ledyard who teaches Japanese disagrees. "The business schools explain it away, but I make it a charge. Their knowledge of Japan is woefully inadequate, to an extent that it's the country's problem."

Japanese influence on American popular culture is perhaps a bigger factor in explaining interest in Japanese than economics.

Terry Lamphier, a spokesman for NYU's business school, said the hit television mini-series "Shogun" about life in 16th century Japan may have sparked some interest in the language.

"In the air are a bunch of references about Japan. There are, let's face it, a lot of Toyotas on the road. The interest is cumulative, it adds up," says Richard Brode of the Modern Language Association.

One of the most common reasons for taking Japanese may be the simplest: "Most of the students just say, 'I want to,'" says Ms. Jordan.

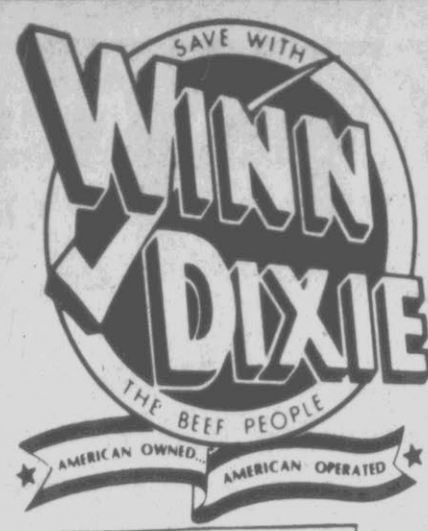

No Looking Back On A Banzai Run

LOS ANGELES (AP) —
The \$100,000 Lamborghini Countach shoots up the on-ramp at 65 mph in first gear, 80 mph in second.

Once in the fast lane, the speedometer inches toward 200 mph. Signs along the deserted freeway flip past in a blur and gentle curves become hairpin turns. Make a mistake at that speed and both car and driver would likely disintegrate in flight.

This is a "banzai run" with an outlaw racer, a man pursuing an illegal, dangerous and expensive hobby that goes beyond the speed limit and even beyond the reach of the law. For these racers, speed is a kind of intoxicant.

"Military jets take off at 200 mph," the driver of the Lamborghini says with a terse laugh. "If this car had wings..."

He eyes the Ferrari Boxer and Vector Twinturbo V2 behind him in electronic rearview mirrors. The exotic cars in this high-speed caravan are barely visible out the Lamborghini's tiny back window: "It's the Italian philosophy of driving," he said of his sports car. "You don't have time to look back."

Indeed, looming suddenly ahead is a dreaded black and white cruiser of the California Highway Patrol. The distance eaten up in a second, the sports cars rocket past in a flash. As seen in the mirrors, the patrol car seems to be hurtling backwards as if shot from a cannon. Are its red lights turned on?

"Doesn't matter — might as well try to catch a Russian spy satellite," sneers the driver, who asks not to be identified. Nevertheless, some banzai runners take no chances — they've installed switches in their cars to flip off their tail lights and make their vehicles more difficult to follow.

By the time the patrol radios for help, the banzai runners will be hiding safely in some small town miles up the coast, sinking down back streets, maybe parking in a dark alley until things cool down.

Although they're hard to catch, banzai runners don't like to push their luck. Up and down the route, scouts with walkie-talkies and binoculars watch for police patrols when several cars make a run. The richest of the runners sometimes hire surveillance planes to watch for the highway patrol — especially its helicopters and planes.

These patrol air units are the only real concern for banzai runners. An ordinary black-and-white is just no match.

The state police recently beefed up its air patrol along certain stretches of freeway favored by the banzai runners. Banzai is a Japanese toast to the emperor that is associated with Japanese servicemen who uttered it before going on suicide missions during World War II.

"Banzai runners? So that's what they're called. I didn't know they had a name," patrol Sgt. Lance Erickson said when asked about the racers.

"Traveling at 200 mph on a racetrack is dangerous, but on the street? It's almost unthinkable. There's no way our cars could catch a Ferrari or a Porsche in a top-speed contest," Erickson admitted. "I've chased (Porsche) Turbo Carreras and thanked the drivers for stopping."

Erickson said he had heard of numerous incidents where high-powered cars out-distanced patrol cars but said he hadn't realized the drivers were organized into what amounts to an underground club.

Rumors of the sport of banzai running and of a so-called "Malibu Breakfast Club" — whose members race down Malibu Canyon's winding road to the sea at excessive speeds in a monthly, early morning ritual — have persisted for months but were difficult to confirm.

Then came Jasjit Rarewala, head of Lamborghini's North American division.

Lamborghini was locked out of the U.S. market for six years because its cars didn't meet bumper and emission-control standards.

Mercouri Is Running For Reelection

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Golden hair swinging, famous smile flashing, actress-politician Melina Mercouri is on the campaign trail again, seeking reelection in Greece's Oct. 18 general elections.

The star of the movie "Never On Sunday," who turns 55 on election day, is an incumbent Parliament deputy of the major opposition party, the Panhellenic Socialist Movement. She has hopes of becoming a member of the government if her party wins.

"There has been talk of the Ministry of Culture," she said recently. "Of course, it is up to the party what role I should play."

Because of the campaign, Miss Mercouri has put off a decision on accepting an offer to appear in a Broadway production by Lina Wertmuller.

"She asked me if I would appear in 'Love and Magic in Mamma's Kitchen,' which is a lovely role, but I had to say that I couldn't give an answer before Oct. 18," she said.

As an actress, Miss Mercouri became internationally famous for her role in the 1960 film "Never on Sunday," a story of the Piraeus waterfront. She first ran for elective office in 1974, but lost. She was victorious in 1977.

As the campaign moves into full swing, evenings are taken up with campaigning in her constituency, one of the poorer areas of nearby Piraeus. Stretched out at full length on a leather sofa in her triplex apartment in the heart of Athens' fashionable Kolonaki district, Miss Mercouri talked of the constituency of Nikea.

"The people there are a microcosm of all the problems in this country," she said. "They have problems with the sewers, with pollution, there are not enough schools or hospitals." The mainly working-class voters of the area — as almost everyone else does — call her Melina.

As she drove up to the campaign office just off the central square of Nikea and stepped out of a jeep, an elderly woman rushed up to kiss her on both cheeks in the Greek fashion. Shortly afterward Miss Mercouri made her way through the coffee shops and the square, greeting voters and shaking hands. Unshaven old men, women trailing small children crowded around to shake her hand or kiss her. A little girl gave her a rose.

"I didn't recognize her at first, but now I've kissed her," said Anna Skarimbis, a housewife in her 50s, with glee. "Yes, of course I'll vote for her."

Miss Mercouri walks from the florist shop, where she collected two long-stemmed roses, into the next-door pharmacy, where she hands one to an Orthodox priest who is sitting chatting. A few people who catch sight of her look dubious.

"It's Melina Mercouri," whispered one father to his two little girls — obviously more excited about it than they. Others looked doubtful, and avoided the leaflets being handed out by the young workers who are walking around with her.

Has the fact that she began her career as an actress helped or hindered her? "A little of both," Miss Mercouri replied.

During the days of the military dictatorship in Greece from 1967 to 1974 it helped, she said, because an actress could speak out when political figures were gagged.

"When I began my political career there was a problem though," she added. "That I was not only a woman but also an actress was something that the diehards could not accept."

Russia Has A Shortage Of Copiers

MOSCOW (AP) — If, as the saying goes, two men and a printing press can make a revolution, what can one man and a copying machine do?

In the Soviet Union, where the distribution of information is tightly controlled by the government, the number of photocopying machines is limited and access to them closely guarded.

Westerners here estimate there are fewer than 20,000 copiers in the Soviet Union — about 2 percent of the worldwide total — and the number is not expected to improve markedly soon.

Those machines that are here are off-limits, often locked up in special rooms, according to Soviet sources.

Soviet citizens say that to copy papers at their jobs, they usually need permission from three people: an immediate supervisor, that person's boss and an official of the organization's security surveillance apparatus. Then, someone else does the actual copying.

Even senior Soviet officials apparently have difficulty getting quick access to the machines.

Foreign businessmen in Moscow say they sometimes have had to interrupt negotiations at Soviet government foreign trade departments and return to their own offices to duplicate contracts, after Soviet officials told them without explanation that the documents could not be copied there.

Nevertheless, the Soviet government may not be able to control the flow of information as closely as it would like. The copying of materials for personal use is said to be widespread, satisfying the intellectual hunger of the intelligentsia — not to mention a craving for more money among copying machine operators.

Access to copying machines, like access to many goods in short supply here, apparently depends largely on whom one knows. One Soviet said recently, "The best way to get something copied is by having a friend whose job it is to copy things."

With such friends, Russians sometimes get to read books and articles the government regards as politically unacceptable, or those simply in short supply. That is no small advantage in a country where all printed materials are censored for political content, and the works of even politically acceptable Russian writers such as Leo Tolstoy and the beloved poet Alexander Pushkin are chronically hard to find in government-run bookstores.

In the case of copying machines, however, the old Russian proverb "better 100 friends than 100 rubles" may not apply. Better both 100 friends and 100 rubles.

It is said by Russians to cost as much as 25 rubles (about \$33 and about 15 percent of the average Russian's monthly salary) to have a book reproduced in Moscow by a copying machine operator, unofficially working for himself. But business is apparently flourishing.

Underground Soviet religious groups use copying machines and underground print shops to distribute their literature, and Russians say several copies of works by exiled author Alexander Solzhenitsyn and other out-of-favor writers have been made and passed among dissidents and intellectuals.

All such activity is not religious or political, however.
