

Redistricting: A Frustrating Experience

"I've never seen anything to beat it in my life ... never seen anything so frustrating," Sen. Vernon White said of the state Senate redistricting plan approved Tuesday which establishes Pitt County, seven townships in Martin County and one Beaufort County township as the 9th Senatorial District.

Under the old plan, which failed to win the approval of the U.S. Justice Department, Pitt and Martin counties were joined as the 9th District with one senator.

The new plan adds Beaufort County's Chocowinity Township to the 9th District, while splitting Martin County's Goose Nest, Hamilton and Robersonville townships — giving

them to the 2nd District.

The only change in the House redistricting plan, which also failed to win Justice Department approval, divides Cumberland County into two districts — one with two representatives and a 57 percent black voter registration and a predominantly white district with three representatives.

"The House was already messed up so bad it didn't bother us anymore," Rep. Ed Warren said, pointing out that under the plan approved Tuesday, Pitt's Bethel and Carolina townships are still split from the rest of the county.

The revised plans were designed to accommodate objections by the Justice Department over the Cumberland County

House district and several Senate districts in the northeast.

The biggest problem with the Senate plan was with Sen. J. J. "Monk" Harrington's 2nd District. The new plan increases black representation in that district.

However, by increasing the number of black voters in the 2nd District, a series of shifts that affected six other districts was needed.

Tyrrell and Perquimans counties were moved from Harrington's district to the 1st District with part of Washington County.

Portions of Halifax and Edgecombe counties and Martin's Robersonville, Hamilton and Goose Nest townships were moved into the 2nd. Beaufort's Chocowinity Township was

moved from the 1st to the 9th and Warren County was put in the 6th District, while Pamlico County was shifted from the 1st to the 3rd and Mannings Township in Nash County was moved from the 10th to the 11th District.

"We're just hoping they (the Justice Department) will approve this," Warren noted.

If the redistricting plans are approved by the Justice Department, the primary will be held June 10. The General Assembly is scheduled to reconvene on June 14.

Justice Department spokesmen gave tentative oral approval to the redistricting proposals Tuesday. A written acceptance, or rejection, is expected later.

'Total War Zone' Is Declared

Britain declared today that a "total" war zone 200 miles around the Falkland Islands would go into effect at 7 a.m. EDT Friday, and Argentina put its forces on "maximum alert."

The two sides also said they were studying a U.S. peace plan relayed by Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. But Argentina said it expects "military operations" in the Falklands area in 24 to 48 hours.

Details of the plan were not known, but a government source in London said: "Clearly Mr. Haig wants to bring some sort of finality to the issue, with some sensible way of resolving it."

As prospects for peace grew dim, the British Defense Ministry announced that any ship or aircraft, including Soviet vessels, that are found within the "total exclusion zone" will be regarded as hostile and liable to attack.

The British move came amid mounting speculation that the task force now off the Falkland Islands was poised to launch an assault on the South Atlantic archipelago seized by Argentina April 2.

It also followed an emergency Cabinet meeting presided over by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. Government sources in London said the session produced "no fresh optimism" of a negotiated settlement.

The British Defense Ministry stressed that the war zone extends to the airstrip at Stanley, the Falklands' capital.

"Any aircraft on the ground in the Falkland Islands will be regarded as being in support of the illegal (Argentine) occupation and accordingly is liable to attack," the British Defense Ministry said.

The zone extends a 200-mile maritime blockade

around the islands declared by Britain April 12 to include aircraft. Defense Ministry spokesmen said the new move includes civilian aircraft and ships as well as military and naval craft.

In Moscow, the Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda accused Britain of aiming to resolve the Falklands crisis by "military force" and said the dispute's "negative influence already makes itself felt, disrupting normal shipping in the southern Atlantic and world trade in general."

Western diplomats in Moscow speculated that the reference to shipping and trade reflected Soviet anxiety that the crisis could interfere with the Kremlin's grain purchases from Argentina. The Soviets buy \$2.7 billion of grain from Argentina annually and is the Argentine junta's leading trade partner. Argentina also is a major supplier of meat for the Soviet Union.

ABC News reported the vanguard of the British war fleet was within shelling distance of the Falklands, 250 miles east of Argentina's southern coast. The report said the main British force, including the aircraft carriers Hermes and Invincible, 20 fighter-bombers and some 1,500 marines, was only one day away.

Reports from Buenos Aires to the British media said Argentine naval sources were predicting a British attack at dusk tonight. These reports said 16 Argentine warships were at sea to challenge the British armada.

The Argentine news agency DYN said a fierce winter storm was lashing the Falklands but otherwise Argentine naval sources reported "everything is calm." The sources said coastal patrols had been increased to detect British commando landings, the agency said.

The British Broadcasting Corp. and DYN reported Haig discussed the U.S. peace plan with Foreign Minister Nicanor Costa Mendez in Washington.

The BBC said the Argentina junta was "holding Mr. Haig at arm's length," and DYN said they rejected his offer to make another trip to Buenos Aires to discuss the proposals.

Costa Mendez told a meeting of the Organization of American States in Washington Tuesday that Britain would attack the Falklands in 24 to 48 hours. The OAS early today approved a resolution calling on Argentina to withdraw from the Falklands and for Britain to "cease immediately" hostilities. But unlike the earlier U.N. resolution, the OAS statement recognized Argentine sovereignty over the islands that have been a British colony for 149 years.

Military analysts said Britain probably would first establish a beachhead on West Island, where Argentina was said to have only 900 troops, and then confront the

estimated 9,000 troops on East Island, which includes the Falklands capital Port Stanley.

But experts said earlier the landing on East Island was not likely for about two weeks, until a backup fleet with 3,000 troop reinforcements reached the area.

Until then, the main British military activity is expected to be an air blockade to cut off supplies and reinforcements for the Argentine garrison. Press Association, the domestic British news agency, published a smuggled letter from a British school-teacher in Port Stanley who wrote: "Many of the soldiers are teen-agers, and lots have died from exposure — some, too, have blown themselves up. ... Livestock has been stolen or killed; they're eating the cats and, we suspect, the horses, too."

Speculation about an invasion was fueled Tuesday when the British government imposed a near-total blackout on news from the war fleet. Argentina also did some blacking out, ordering all foreign correspondents to

Roster Cuts For Schools

The Pitt County Board of Education voted to snip approximately 60 persons from its employment roster for the 1982-83 school year Tuesday night, including several positions in the areas of speech, special education and exceptional children funds.

Those affected include both certified (teachers, administrators) and non-certified (aides, custodians, secretaries) personnel.

Most of the teachers being eliminated, said Associate Superintendent Thomas Craft, had contracts for 1981-82 only and these contracts were not renewed. "The 20 or so teachers were filling for others on leave," he noted. "Those from the special programs such as speech, special education and exceptional children are half-time positions."

The board said uncertainty of state, federal and local funds motivated the special programs cuts. "We are uncertain what money we'll have and it looks as though we will not have the money for these positions," noted Craft.

Board members also approved contracts for teacher-coaches. Under this resolution, the responsibility of coaching is incorporated into a teacher's contract and abandonment of coaching duties violates the contract.

"There has been some concern in regards to persons who are employed to teach PE and coach and for one reason or another, become disillusioned with it, get tired of being away from home on games night, etc., and stop coaching," explained Craft. "This puts a hardship on the schools. The new contract specifies that an individual is employed as a teacher-coach and the two are inseparable."

Craft reminded principals, teachers and parents that Friday, originally scheduled as a teacher workday, will be a snow make-up day instead.

POODLE SUSPECTED STOLEN

I have advertised, called around, done everything I know to try to get my 4-year-old silver poodle, Peppy, back. He's wearing a brown leather collar with a Davie County rabies tag. (I fairly recently moved here). Isn't there anything anyone can do about all the dog thefts around here? I don't know, but I have to believe, as thoroughly as I've searched, that Peppy was stolen. B.M.

Pitt County Sheriff Ralph Tyson agrees with you that there are some dog thefts going on in Pitt County. Most of the dog theft reports his department gets are about hunting dogs, he said. About three years ago, he said, it was worse than it is now, but one or two arrests made at the time appeared to weaken the trend.

He asks that all suspected dog thefts be reported, because the solution of one could lead to the solution of another. "We'll put out the word and be on the lookout all over the county," he said. He also asked that anyone having information about anyone who's stealing dogs contact his department. This information will be kept confidential.

Greenville Police Chief Glenn Cannon says his department has had few, if any, dog theft reports in recent months, but has assisted with locating some lost dogs. The department is glad to render this assistance to citizens, he said, and would like to be made aware of any suspected thefts and provided knowledge about any individuals or groups believed to be stealing dogs.

Sheriff Tyson adds that prevention is more effective than searching and suggests that owners have their identity tattooed on the dog by a veterinarian and that purebred dogs not be left unattended.

Anyone finding a lost dog is asked to report it to law enforcement offices and/or to the Pitt County Humane Society, 752-9922 (Barbara Haddock) or 756-4867 (Elizabeth Savage). Those having lost dogs should also check with the Humane Society.

The owner of a dog wearing a Pitt County rabies tag can be traced by calling in the number on the tag to the Animal Control Section of the Pitt County Health Department, 752-4141.

Reagan Invites O'Neill For Summit Meeting On Budget Agreement

WASHINGTON (AP) — With negotiations to find a compromise on his 1983 spending plan apparently at an impasse, President Reagan has stepped into the controversy by inviting House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill to a budget summit.

Reagan telephoned the Massachusetts Democrat on Tuesday to propose the rare session. The call was placed about an hour after the latest of 13 meetings between White House and congressional negotiators broke up without agreement.

O'Neill — en route to his suburban Maryland home when call was placed — returned it from his house and accepted Reagan's invitation. They agreed to meet at the Capitol in the early afternoon.

Even before the meeting began, Democratic and Republican budget negotiators offered somewhat different interpretations of how apart Reagan and O'Neill are.

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., said on the NBC-TV "Today" show he was not optimistic that the meeting would produce a breakthrough.

"I don't think we're going to get one. ... I'm very hopeful, but not optimistic," Rep. Robert Michel, interviewed on the same program, said he thinks "there's a good possibility they can come to agreement on some items."

He acknowledged, however, that on other issues "there would be serious disagreement."

Earlier, O'Neill urged the president to "face up to the fact that the Reagan economic program is not working and needs to be overhauled." The speaker said Reagan should stop searching for

"new alibis" and "stop passing the buck."

At the White House, deputy press secretary Larry Speakes disputed the contention that the budget negotiators had all but failed. He said they had made "substantial progress in the weeks and days we have been talking."

Speakes said negotiators had "narrowed the range of differences on most major issues ... The major difference is taxes — how much and what kind."

But Christopher Matthews, an aide to O'Neill, said, "Social Security is still in dispute." Another Democrat, speaking anonymously, said, "Nothing has been agreed to."

And Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bob Dole of Kansas, a negotiator, issued a statement saying: "Whether we meet again will be up to the president and the speaker and the decisions that only they can make."

Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker also will attend the meeting with Reagan and O'Neill, along with White House Chief of Staff James A. Baker III, Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, Budget Director David Stockman, House Majority Leader James Wright, House Rules Committee Chairman Richard Bolling and others.

House Republican Whip Trent Lott of Mississippi, a negotiator, said the group needed some guidance from Reagan and O'Neill.

"We need some direction from our principals, that's the basic point," Lott said. "Maybe a little cooling off time by the negotiators would be worthwhile."

On the tax issue, Lott said negotiators "could not talk about those numbers any further. And it was really up

to the president and the speaker — two great Irishmen — to sit down and see if they could work out some agreements."

He predicted, "It's going to take real effort on their part" to make more concessions than the negotiators were willing to make.

According to Speakes, Reagan is holding firm on his three-year tax cut plan, but is open to other tax hikes in an effort to reduce the deficit. The latest worksheet envisions a 1983 deficit of between \$105 and \$110 billion.

For the Democrats, the Social Security issue remained unresolved. But sources said House Democrats were prepared to back a plan to give a 5 percent cost-of-living increase to Social Security recipients in 1983 and 1984 in exchange for concessions from Reagan on taxes and on other matters.

Homemaker's Haven

Potpouri Of Home Care Ideas Ceramic Tile

Ceramic tile scratches easily, but fortunately, it can be cleaned with water and a sponge. If a build up of soap scum occurs, add one teaspoon washing soda or packaged water softener to the cleaning solution. Nonabrasive cleaning powders may also be used. Be sure to remove all traces of the cleaning agent. To do this, flood a small area at a time and sponge up the water quickly. This action causes the dirt to float off instead of remaining in the grout.

Stained grout is practically impossible to restore. If scouring powder and a stiff brush won't do the job, try rubbing the joints lightly with a folded piece of sandpaper. Or treat the area with a weak solution of water and oxalic acid.

One caution: the acid solution is a severe treatment which causes etching of the grout and removes the top layer. No more than two applications of this solution are recommended unless regrouting of the tile is the only other alternative.

Chromium
Plumbing fixtures, appliances, and even some furniture are chromium plated. These items need gentle care because chromium is easily scratched by abrasive

household cleaners and metal polishes.

Usually the only care that chromium requires is rubbing with a damp cloth, followed by polishing with a dry, soft cloth. Sticky chromium usually responds to a washing with detergent and water. A

liquid household cleaner or baking soda on a cloth should remove gummy buildup. For stubborn spots, make a paste of whiting, or fuller's earth, and household ammonia. Apply the paste with a soft cloth and rub. Never use abrasives; they will scratch chromium finishes.

Vote Right Needs Using

Somewhere in the land there are people saying they are concerned about minority voting rights and their answer is a "march" on Washington. We hear it said there is a matter of fear a weakened version of the 1965 Voting Rights Act may be passed in the Senate.

Still, if those people are really concerned about voting rights they could use their time more effectively by organizing voter registration drives in their own backyards.

They had an object lesson in a nationally distributed picture of a little Louisiana lady (age 113!) registering as a voter for the first time. She was registering to please a friend. Somehow, "marching on

Washington" over the past decades just didn't impress her.

The roadblock today that prevents any group of voters from exercising its full political power is not oppression, but its own failure to register to vote.

It is not just a minority failure to register that concerns us, a dreadfully high number of all citizens regularly ignore their right, privilege and duty.

Remember El Salvador's recent elections? A turnout that dwarfed anything we know about in this country flocked to the polls. They defied threats, bombs, guns and a leftist-ordered boycott. Voting meant a great deal to them. How about us?

Unemployment With Us

The unemployment rate in North Carolina hit 9.7 percent in March. It was higher than the national unemployment rate and the highest rate since the recession of 1974-75.

The high rate was partially attributed to the large amount of textile and furniture manufacturing in North Carolina.

Furniture manufacturing has been affected by the slowdown in housing sales, and textiles have

been affected by slumping auto sales and other factors.

The drop in those industries has had its effects on down the line.

There is obviously not a lot that can be done short term to improve the situation at the state level. The state industries will recover when the national economy snaps back.

For the long range North Carolina might look at ways to increase employment in sectors that could better ride out future recessions.

New Ill-Will High

RALEIGH — When the U.S. Justice Department rejected North Carolina's redistricting plan for the state House last week, the ill-will level between the two sides may have hit an all-time high.

State lawyers and legislators said Justice had gone back on a deal and openly questioned whether Justice had any plans of ever ending the redistricting mess.

At issue was a single-member House district formed in the Fort Bragg area of Cumberland County. In February, state lawyers told the Legislature that Justice was recommending a single-member House district comprised of Fort Bragg and two Fayetteville precincts. Because few base residents vote in North Carolina, it was felt that the two predominantly black precincts would control the district election and send a black to the House.

In rejecting the House plan under the 1965 Voting Rights Act, the Justice Department specifically cited Cumberland County, however, Justice said more single-member districts could be formed there. State attorneys and law makers immediately said Justice was hedging on the deal they had offered only two months before. "Lack of integrity" was the phrase most often used to describe Justice's action.

Gerry Cohen, a lawyer on the Legislature's staff, began work last Tuesday on a plan for further dividing Cumberland to suit Justice. The

best black concentration he could find, he told House leaders, was about 45 percent. To date, Justice has said that when blacks could form 55 to 60 percent of a House district, one should be drawn for them.

Cohen's findings left legislative lawyers horrified. If Justice was going to come back and say black districts had to be drawn everywhere a 45 or 50 percent concentration could be found, the House plan might have to be scrapped. Lawyer Bill Hale pulled out a map and pointed at Edgecombe County, which has a 51 percent black population. He also looked at Warren and Vance counties and wondered if some kind of 45 percent black district couldn't be drawn there.

Justice hasn't mentioned those counties yet but the fear among the lawyers was that Justice was playing games with North Carolina — that if the Legislature bent

to Justice wishes in Cumberland, Justice might find other places to complain about later and reject the plan again. That kind of thing could go on forever. As assistant State Attorney General Jim Wallace said, "I can't help but think that they have additional objections in reserve."

Wallace said he had two theories on the reasons behind Justice's actions. First, that North Carolina Republicans, who want as many single-member black

Other Editors Say Notable Strides

(Henderson Dispatch)

Protection of mankind's environment is among the most important challenges facing the world today. There are few who would dispute that reality.

Impressing upon all citizens the need for such protection is one of the objectives of Earth Day, marked Thursday of last week.

In conjunction with the 1982 observance, North Carolina Human Resources Secretary Sarah Morrow and Natural Resources and Community Development Secretary Joseph Grimsley called attention to a number of significant strides made in North Carolina since the previous Earth Day.

Those advances are noteworthy and should be gratifying to most Tar Heels:

— Last summer the General Assembly passed the Waste Management Act of 1981, which established a citizens board to develop a long-range plan for managing North Carolina's hazardous and low-level radioactive wastes.

— North Carolina recently became the second state in the country to receive federal authorization to issue permits for hazardous waste treatment, storage and incineration facilities.

— In the last 12 months the state monitored and inspected more than 1,000 industries in North Carolina that generate at least a ton of hazardous waste per month.

— Increased awareness of the importance of managing hazardous wastes has led to a record number of spills being reported in 1981, making possible quick containment and cleanup of most spills.

— The state continues to promote recycling of wastes into useful materials by offering tax incentives.

— North Carolina is one of only nine states authorized by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency to issue "Prevention of Significant Deterioration" permits for major new sources of air pollution of existing sources that are being modified.

In contrast with some other states, North Carolina has been fortunate in having generally excellent rapport among citizens, businesses and industries, and government agencies in the effort to treat the environment with the respect it deserves. As an example, it is said that 99 percent of the more than 4,000 companies with air permits were in compliance with their permit limits last year.

Baker Won't Lift The Lid

WASHINGTON — Sen. Howard Baker has ignored a bipartisan appeal from four senators for a secret Senate session on the Soviet military threat, raising suspicions that the majority leader wants to keep the lid on alarming intelligence that would make it harder to reduce budget deficits by cutting defense spending.

Some defense officials say Baker fears the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) briefing on rising Soviet power would convert fence-sitters — perhaps even some outright opponents — into supporters of President Reagan's defense budget. Instead of welcoming the bid for a secret session, Baker has not even responded to the March 24 letter. Two Republicans, Sens. Paul Laxalt and Steve Symms, and two Democrats, Sens. John Glenn and David Boren, asked him to arrange the unusual closed-door briefing.

That performance casts doubt on the savvy majority leader's current devotion to the Reagan program. In his intense efforts to shape a bipartisan agreement on the budget, Baker has implied that he knows better than the president how much these spending cuts and tax increases should be.

What is unusual is not the closed-door session (there have been many in past years) but the information to which senators would be exposed. Three examples may explain why Baker has not agreed:

Example No. 1: At their current pace, the Soviets will double the nuclear warheads on their giant SS-18 intercontinental missiles in the next 18 months. This is the counterforce weapon that is the greatest threat to U.S. land-based missiles.

Example No. 2: The Soviets today have eight different types of submarines under construction at the same time; the U.S. has two.

Example No. 3: The Soviets have added slightly over 12 divisions to their army in the past year, only partly connected with vast new undertakings in Afghanistan. The full reason for the growth is unknown.

The DIA briefing would drive home to all senators these and other details of the Soviet military buildup, scrupulously documented. Its impact would be profound, but the letter from the four senators gathers dust on the desk of the majority leader. He would scarcely welcome the intrusion into the Senate debate of new political and military facts that might hurt the defense-cutting game.

When we asked Baker's aides for an explanation, they answered that an attic hideaway just below the Capitol dome could be made available for DIA briefings. This room, they said, is far more secure against eavesdropping than the Senate chamber. Senators could be briefed there in small groups for as long as necessary.

But that is not at all what is wanted by the four letter-writers and a growing number of other senators ready to join the request for the secret briefing. A closet in the attic would deprive the session of its essential element: the group dynamic of the whole Senate exposed at one time to the shock effect of the DIA briefing. As Glenn wrote his colleagues separately on March 4, "It is vital that every member" of the Senate hear the evidence.

The suggestion of Baker's aides that the Senate chamber is difficult to make secure has not bothered the Senate before. On four occasions in the last four years, the Senate has closed its doors to hear top-secret information dealing with the Panama Canal, arms sales to the Middle East and other sensitive matters.

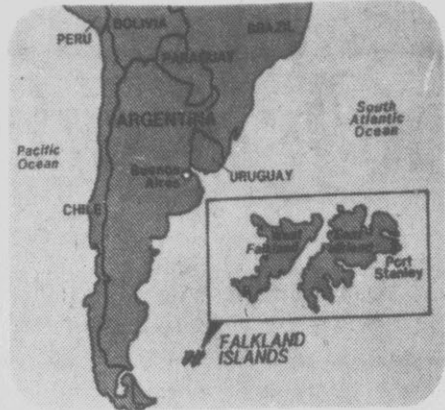

districts as they can get, are engineering the decisions. Second, Justice lawyers want to keep the situation here in turmoil so long that a federal judge will finally have to redistrict North Carolina's House seats.
If the Republicans are behind it, no one bothered to tell Sen. Cass Ballenger of Hickory. The probable Republican gubernatorial candidate got so angry about the plan's rejection that he said everybody at Justice ought to be fired. Taking more black voters out of Fayetteville's multimember district, however, would serve Republican interests by increasing the chance of electing a Republican there.
Regardless of Justice's intentions in backing away from the deal they apparently made, relations between the two sides have now soured. As Raleigh Rep. Al Adams, said, "When I'm negotiating for a client and I get him to make a concession and then I go to the other side and they ask for something else, that's when you stop negotiating."

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Koreans poured more than \$700,000 in donations into Uiryong county as funerals began today for 57 victims of a drunken policeman who rampaged through five villages with rifles and hand grenades before he killed himself.
Thirty-five others wounded by 27-year-old Woo Bum-kon were still hospitalized, and some were listed in critical condition.
Home Minister Suh Chung-hwa, whose ministry is in charge of the police, visited the area in southern Korea Tuesday to console the families of the dead and the wounded survivors, then submitted his resignation to atone for the shooting. President Chun Doo-hwan accepted the resignation today, naming Sports Minister Roh Tae-woo, a retired four-star general and close ally of

Chun, to replace him.
Prime Minister Yoo Chang-soon also offered his resignation, but Chun would not accept it.
As voluntary contributions for the families of the dead and the wounded flooded in, officials said government compensation also would be paid to them. Officials on Tuesday put the death toll at 58 but reduced it today by one.
Woo reportedly got drunk at a fight with his 25-year-old common-law wife, Chun Mal-soon, and took two carbines, 180 rounds of ammunition and seven hand grenades from an unguarded

police armory.
Then he made his way through five villages, firing the carbines and throwing grenades. After eight hours, he entered a farmhouse and killed himself and the three occupants with a grenade.
Mrs. Chun was among the wounded. A Seoul newspaper reported she said she angered Won by slapping flies from his chest while he was asleep.
The government also announced that the mayor of Seoul, Park Young-su, resigned because of a subway construction accident in the capital April 3 that killed 10 people. He was replaced by

Kim Sung-bae, a provincial governor.
It is customary in some Asian countries for high-level officials to resign as an assumption of responsibility for actions of their subordinates.

Now, with one month of Baker's silence behind them, the four senators have decided to move under Senate rules. They want to force a vote on the issue of a secret session before the defense authorization bill comes to the floor late this week.
Without such a move, the Reagan rearmament is imperiled. The bipartisan budget-makers on Capitol Hill working with White House chief of staff James Baker are not fighters for Reagan's attempt to restore the nation's defenses. Of the 18 lawmakers, only Republican representative Trent Lott and Democratic senator Fritz Hollings have any claim to defense expertise.
That leaves the defense budget vulnerable to the give-and-take of deficit-shrinking. Defense-cutter James Baker joins arms with defense-cutter Howard Baker in taking money from the military to induce the Democrats into

accepting a budget compromise.
The missing ingredient might well be the DIA's facts about the Kremlin war machine. The irony of Washington today is that the president has to hurdle his own majority leader to unveil them.

Voting By Senators, Representatives

ROLL CALL REPORT

WASHINGTON — Here's how area senators were recorded on major roll call votes April 15-21. There were no record votes in the House.

TELEVISIONING THE SENATE — By a vote of 47 for and 51 against, the Senate refused to end a filibuster against a proposal to televise Senate proceedings to the American public. A three-fifths majority was needed to silence the talkathon against S Res 20. The measure would put the Senate on a par with the House, which makes live, gavel-to-gavel coverage of its activity available to cable TV outlets and film clips available to commercial networks and to congressmen for their own distribution.

Sen. Charles Mathias, R-Md., a supporter of Senate TV, said the American people feel increasingly victimized by government decisions they do not understand, and that the senate can ease this frustration "by making it possible for the average citizen to participate in the proceedings of the U.S. Senate."

Opponent Wendell Ford, D-Ky., said: "Let us not rush into action that would irreversibly convert the Senate chamber

into a television studio. Proceeding a step at a time, first to radio, and then later to television, if the facts support such a move, will not deprive the public of information."

Virtually all senators voting "nay" opposed moving immediately to televising Senate proceedings.

Sens. John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, voted "nay."

DECORUM — The Senate rejected, 46 for and 51 against, an amendment requiring senators to be present at their assigned desks when they vote on roll calls. Senators vote orally, in contrast to House members who vote electronically via a computer system. Presently senators can state their vote from any point in the chamber, and critics say this creates disorder and diminishes the accountability of senators to their colleagues. The amendment was offered to S Res 20 (see preceding vote). Since it required a change in Senate rules, its adoption would have aided the cause of senators filibustering against Senate TV. When rules change is at issue, a 67 percent rather than 60 percent majority is needed to end a filibuster.

Sponsor Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., an opponent of Senate TV, said: "If there is to be television in the Senate, the

public certainly has a right to see the members...in a posture of decorum and not milling around like players in a rowdy and unruly hockey match."

Opponent James McClure, R-Idaho, said fundamental changes in Senate rules would be processed through the Rules Committee and not piggybacked onto measures such as the pending one dealing with Senate television.

Senators voting "yea" wanted to require senators to vote from their desks, and many supporters also liked the amendment because it bolstered the filibuster against Senate TV.

Panelist Says Parole Board Not Informed Of Threats By Sirhan

SOLEDAD, Calif. (AP) — A member of the board that set a parole date for Sirhan Sirhan says the panel would have acted differently had it known that Robert F. Kennedy's convicted assassin made death threats from prison.

"I don't think there would have been a parole date set, to be honest with you," Manuel Quevado Jr., a retired parole board member, testified Tuesday before a parole board considering rescinding Sirhan's 1984 parole date.

But Quevado testified he believed his board was "locked into" the guidelines that led to the 1975 decision to set Sirhan's parole.

Sirhan has admitted he wrote a death threat to Robert Blair Kaiser, the author of a 1971 book, "R.F.K. Must Die," which suggests Sirhan might have been programmed by others to kill.

Official inquiries into that theory produced no evidence, but Kaiser testified Tuesday he still believes Sirhan was part of a conspiracy.

"It's still my belief that Sirhan did not think it up alone, and he was psyched into shooting Bob Kennedy," Kaiser said.

Kennedy was slain June 5, 1968, just after he won the California Democratic presidential primary, in the pantry of the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles. Sirhan, a Palestinian immigrant, was quoted by witnesses as saying, "I did it for my country," and it was later said he was angered by Kennedy's pro-Israeli policies.

Sirhan was sentenced to death, but his term was changed to life imprisonment after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned California's death penalty law. The parole board gave Sirhan a 1986 parole date, which was moved up to Sept. 1, 1984, because of his good behavior in prison.

Los Angeles County District Attorney John Van de

Kamp, who is running for state attorney general this year, began a campaign last year to have Sirhan's parole date rescinded, saying new evidence indicated Sirhan had vowed to kill Edward Kennedy if the Massachusetts senator were elected president.

Inside the walls of Soledad Prison, where Sirhan's future is being decided,

Kaiser told the parole board he predicts violence if Sirhan is released in 1984. He shifted nervously in his seat as Sirhan glared at him from across a table in the prison hearing room.

Kaiser said he began to fear Sirhan after seeing a 1971 letter from the prisoner. The letter warned if Kaiser kept "mouthing off" about Sirhan on TV, there would be trouble. "If he gets his brains splattered he will have asked for it like Bobby Kennedy did."

"RBK must shut his trap or die," the letter concluded. Sirhan's attorney, Luke McKissack, said the letter was written 11 years ago when Sirhan was a prisoner on death row. McKissack said Sirhan was merely venting his frustrations.

Asked by McKissack why he delayed reporting the letter, Kaiser bristled and said, "I had just wasted three years of my life writing the book and I was just sick of it, the whole thing."

Quevado, in his testimony, referred to the Kaiser letter and a threat by Sirhan in 1975 to kill prison officials if he was not provided with treatment for problems with his teeth.

"Those letters certainly would have made me uneasy," he said. Quevado insisted he and a fellow board member, James Hoover, were following specific guidelines in 1975 which required setting parole dates for life term prisoners.

"I was only carrying out the board's wishes and what the law was," said Quevado. "I felt we were locked into the guidelines."

Hoover, who chaired the panel that set Sirhan's date, also blamed the guidelines set down by former state prison chief Raymond K. Procunier.

"Unless you could specifically point to a negative factor," he said, "you would grant the parole."

He said he searched through Sirhan's prison records for negative reports but found none.

Guide For The Handicapped Now On File

An "Accessibility Guide for the Handicapped" for people living in Greenville is now on file at Sheppard Memorial Library. As a public service, personnel at the library will provide information contained in the handicapped file to anyone calling the library (phone 752-4177).

The accessibility guide has been prepared by students at East Carolina University who are majoring in rehabilitation counseling subjects. Dr. Sheldon Downes, chairman of the department of rehabilitation counseling, is coordinator of the project.

The guide, which consists of a series of cards, contains individual cards for churches, banks, businesses, restaurants, medical offices, government offices, libraries, food stores and other facilities surveyed.

Information contained on each facility includes notations on factors such as availability of entrance ramps, ramps or elevators to upper stories, widths of aisles and doors to facilitate use of wheelchairs, ease of accessibility to bath rooms and water fountains, and other factors essential to the handicapped when they go out into the public.

Data on the cards are kept up to date, and are revised as changes are made in facilities listed on the card files.

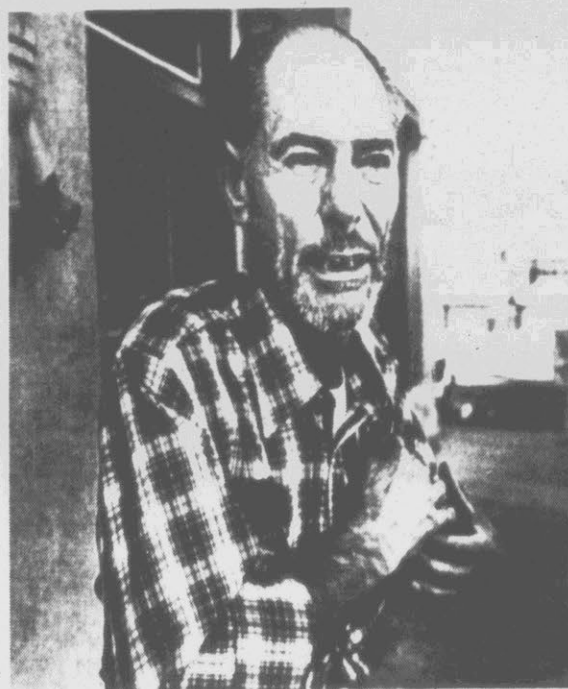

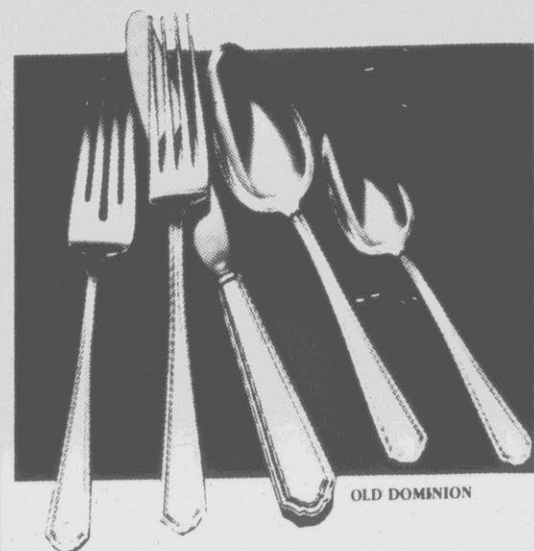

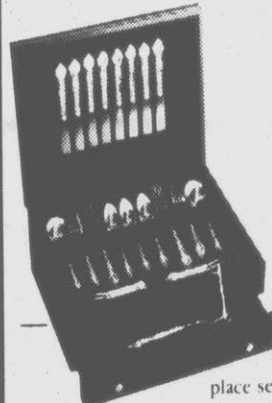

Seekers Of Homes Now Like Looks Of Love Canal

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — A growing number of people are eager to move into the houses that hundreds of Love Canal residents fearful of chemical contamination were eager to vacate just a few years ago.

"People have been coming in for months and months," said Richard Morris, director of the Love Canal Revitalization Agency, which has been buying up the properties in the neighborhood since last year.

So far, according to Mayor Michael O'Laughlin, the "informal, unsolicited" list of potential buyers exceeds

130 names.

"The whole world's a chemical dump, so what's the difference?" said Florence Deyo, 34, who is on the list.

Authorities are awaiting the results of a \$5.5 million federal Environmental Protection Agency study of the neighborhood.

Families began leaving the area of the former Hooker

Chemicals & Plastics Corp. toxic waste dump after the state and federal governments declared health emergencies in 1978 and 1980.

Chemicals — including some known cancer-causing agents — were found to have migrated from the canal into the surrounding neighborhood. In 1976, the state purchased 276 homes from owners nearest the dump. These are slated for demolition this summer.

A second federal

emergency decree in 1980 led to the establishment of a \$15 million fund of mostly federal money for buying up to 555 more homes. So far, Morris said, his agency has purchased 401 of these at prices ranging from \$7,500 to \$90,000.

Ranch-style and wood-frame houses with boarded-up windows line the silent streets of this former middle-class neighborhood. Some houses have been vandalized. Others are occupied by owners who are still negotiating — or who refuse to leave.

Like the hard-core holdouts and Morris, who moved his family into a Love Canal house last summer, the prospective buyers apparently don't believe that all Love Canal homes are dangerous.

"I think there's health problems wherever you live, no matter where you go," Ms. Deyo said. "If I was so worried, my husband and I wouldn't take our six kids over there."

Clayton Miller, 63, also signed the list. "I don't remember seeing where anybody was proven to have suffered any effects. They tested a whole bunch of people, but I don't remember reading they proved it," he said. "I know a guy, retired, lived there a long time and he didn't have any effects."

Calling the Love Canal exodus "hysterical," Margaret Stewart, 73, said it was "a follow-the-leader thing. Those people who moved out wanted to get something out of it — money, honey."

Like many others, the three also said they were lured by the chance of finding a bargain property.

But they may be disappointed, Morris said.

"The fact is, we've got a lot of people who never sold their homes, who had their life savings invested in their property and it's all they have," he said. "We do not intend to undercut those who are remaining. We have a commitment to those who stayed throughout all this."

And nothing will be sold until the EPA report is released.

Officials expect to use that document to determine the areas where homes are safe enough to be sold.

"I do not believe the EPA report will offer a guarantee of a healthy life forever ...

But by virtue of the number of tests and samples they took, they'll be able to quantify what they found and where they found it," he said.

"Therefore, the Love Canal area will be the most

stringently tested environment anywhere I'm aware of. I've also maintained that when this is done, that it'll be the safest place in Niagara Falls, because you'll know exactly what's here and in what quantities."

Hollywood Celebs Raise Funds For Liberal Causes

HOLLYWOOD, (AP) —
Comic actors Chevy Chase and John Ritter teamed up with Hal Linden and Robin Williams to poke fun at the Reagan administration and help found a clearinghouse to match stars with liberal politicians needing support.

"I breathe the air, so I'm concerned about the environment. I'm a resident chicken, so I'm concerned about the (nuclear) arms buildup," said Linden Tuesday night.

"My show just ended," added Linden, whose "Barney Miller" TV series is being dropped by ABC, "so I'm very concerned about unemployment."

A star-studded audience attended the show at the Wilshire Ebell Theatre on behalf of Citizens in Politics, a new group forming a bank of 30 to 40 celebrities willing to make public appearances for any candidate for na-

tional office that meets the group's criteria.

The idea is to match stars, by interest, with candidates who seek the group's help.

Linden is among those celebrities, as is actress Linda Kelsey of TV's "Lou Grant" series.

"I'm strong on environmental issues and women's issues," she said.

The highlight of Tuesday night's show was the showing of outtakes, discarded film segments, from the sets of three Ronald Reagan movies.

In one well-received scene, a young Reagan tried unsuccessfully to buckle and zip up the pants of an Army uniform. In exasperation, he mumbled a profanity.

Chase, best known for his stint on "Saturday Night Live," delighted spectators who paid \$25 to \$250 a ticket for the benefit performance with his well-polished newsman skit from the late-night television comedy

series.

Pamela Lippe, director of Citizens in Politics, said the group wants to counter the "radical right" and its ability to raise money.

"There is such an incredible disparity between the amount of money that is available to the right wing and money that is available to the progressives or liberals," she said.

Ms. Lippe said the 1980 elections saw the defeat of many liberal candidates for the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives.

"We will match up a member of the entertainment community with the right candidate for them on the basis of the issues they are most concerned about. If they (the celebrities) are concerned about safe energy, we will suggest they help

someone who has been a real champion on that issue in the House or the Senate," she said.

Citizens in Politics is a special project of the National Committee for an Effective Congress, a citizens action group formed in 1948.

"What is possible with an entertainer is to reach out beyond the usual political constituency to develop new resources, new people that wouldn't be accessible to the candidate, and that is what is significant about this program," said Russell

Hemenway, the national director of the committee.

Ed Asner, star of "Lou Grant" and president of the Screen Actors Guild, said he would help candidates who "favor a nuclear freeze, a benevolent attitude in Latin America, and the people's revolution that may take place there, and a government that believes in the reduction of (nuclear) arms."

Asner's outspoken support of liberal political causes has angered a group of guild members led by Charlton Heston.

Heston, star of such movies as "Ben-Hur" and "The Ten Commandments," has said that with Asner as president, the guild has

become more involved in political issues. Heston said many guild members criticized Asner's stance on El Salvador, a stance that was illustrated by Asner's Feb. 15 Washington news conference to send medical supplies to El Salvador through left-wing guerrillas.

Jury To Decide

WASHINGTON, N.C. — A Beaufort County jury was expected to decide today whether Greenville neurosurgeon Ira M. Hardy II is a legal resident of Greenville or Bath, where he serves on the town board and is president of the Historic Bath Association.

Bath real estate salesman David C. Everett Jr. has filed a complaint calling for Dr. Hardy's removal from the town board. Everett has contended that Hardy, who maintains homes in both Greenville and Bath and has a medical practice in Greenville, is actually a resident of Greenville.

The Beaufort County Board of Elections and state elections officials have accepted Hardy's contention that Bath is his legal home.

Hardy testified Tuesday that he has been a property owner in Bath since 1972 and moved his residence to the Beaufort County town in 1976, became a registered voter there in 1977 and switched his church membership.

Attorneys for both sides were to present their final arguments this morning, with Superior Court Judge John D. McConnell to charge the jurors later in the day.

McConnell rejected a defense motion Tuesday calling for dismissal of the complaint, ruling that the jury should decide the case on its merits.

Hinckley Juror Selection Continuing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The pool of prospective jurors was narrowed further today in the trial of presidential assailant John W. Hinckley Jr., as the judge ordered those remaining to "turn a deaf ear" to news accounts of the case.

On the second day of jury selection, U.S. District Judge Barrington D. Parker dismissed CBS White House correspondent Bill Plante, who said Tuesday he had covered stories involving Hinckley and knew a number of potential witnesses in the case.

Plante was the third prospective juror to be dismissed, narrowing jury pool from 90 to 87 people. The final panel of 12 jurors and six alternates will be asked to decide the fate of the 26-year-old drifter charged with trying to assassinate President Reagan nearly 13 months ago.

Parker has decided to allow jurors to return home each night during the trial, but he cautioned remaining members of the jury pool to avoid exposure to trial publicity.

"You are instructed to turn a deaf ear, to close your eyes and close your ears" to news accounts, the judge said.

Parker then proceeded to call prospective jurors one by one to the bench to question them out of earshot of the others and of reporters.

Hinckley appeared to be wearing the same tan suit that he wore Tuesday when the trial — which is expected to last at least one month — got under way.

Hinckley spent most of the first day staring silently at the defense table, where he sat under the watchful gaze of three U.S. marshals. Today, he glanced around the 200-seat ceremonial courtroom and studied the mounted portraits of judges.

Government prosecutors, in a memorandum filed Tuesday, offered evidence suggesting that Hinckley stalked former President Carter during the 1980 election campaign before he turned his attention to Reagan one year ago.

The memo detailed Hinckley's proximity to

Carter on two occasions in 1980 but did not draw any conclusions about the incidents.

Hinckley, who is accused of shooting Reagan, presidential press secretary James Brady and two law enforcement officers outside the Washington Hilton Hotel 13 months ago, has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity.

The government memo, which outlines the case it intends to make to the jury, said Hinckley appeared in two cities where Carter was campaigning in October 1980 — and in one instance got within six feet of the former president.

The government said it plans to show videotape of Hinckley in Dayton, Ohio on Oct. 2, 1980. The tape "will show Mr. Hinckley in a crowd approximately six feet from President Carter," the memorandum said.

On Oct. 9, 1980 in Nashville, Tenn., Hinckley

was arrested on weapons possession charges the same day that Carter was there campaigning.

But by March 29, 1981, when he arrived in Washington on a bus, Hinckley focused on Reagan, the prosecutors indicated in the memorandum. The shootings occurred the next day.

"Evidence will be introduced to show that after the shooting Mr. Hinckley's hotel room at the Park Central was searched and the items recovered include: a newspaper showing the president's schedule ... and various writings including a letter to (actress) Jodie Foster setting forth Mr. Hinckley's plan to shoot President Reagan," the memo said.

At one point Tuesday, Parker asked the prospective jurors: "How many have not heard or read anything about the case?"

No one stood in response to

the question. Parker smiled and said, "Well, you don't surprise me."

The judge told them that jurors need not be ignorant about a case, but must be able to "lay aside opinions and render a verdict based solely on all the evidence."

The prospective jurors sat behind the blond defendant who is a month away from his 27th birthday. Hinckley stared all day at the defense table, never turning around to face the pool of potential jurors.

The defendant, in a tan suit, cut a lonely figure at the defense table much of the day while his lawyers were busy helping to question jurors at the bench. His only company was three marshals who didn't talk to him.

Hinckley is charged with attempting to assassinate Reagan and is accused of 12 other felony counts including assault on a federal officer; use of a firearm during commission of a federal offense; assault with a dangerous weapon; assault on a police officer and carrying a pistol without a license.

Five of the charges carry a maximum sentence of life in prison.

Falklands, by Thursday.

The British government's determination to go ahead with military action impelled the opposition Labor Party to withdraw its support of Mrs. Thatcher's policy after three weeks of support.

Labor members shouted "Warmonger!" when she told the House of Commons, "Unless we bring military pressure to bear, the Argentines are unlikely to withdraw from the Falklands." Labor Party leader Michael Foot, whose initial support of Mrs. Thatcher drew resistance within his party, urged her "not to take military action."

Foot told the prime minister she should send Foreign Secretary Francis Pym to New York for talks with U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, who appealed to both sides to comply immediately with Security Council resolution 502, calling for an end to hostilities. But Mrs. Thatcher said further recourse to the United Nations would "achieve nothing."

ERUPTS AGAIN

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — The Galunggung volcano has erupted again, officials reported Tuesday, but caused no casualties. Two previous eruptions killed at least 14 people.

NEW YORK (AP) — First-quarter profits of many of the nation's biggest oil companies are down sharply from last year, and the companies are nearly unanimous in blaming the worldwide oil glut and recession.

Among the international companies, Exxon Corp. reported Tuesday a 22.5 percent slide and Standard Oil Co. of California said its profit plunged 65 percent. Earlier, Texaco Inc. said its earnings fell 44 percent.

Those three companies, which along with Mobil Corp. comprise the Arabian American Oil Co. that produces most of Saudi Arabia's crude oil, were hurt more than most other oil companies because of that Saudi relationship. Mobil has not yet reported its results for the quarter.

The Saudis refused to lower their \$34-a-barrel price while the Aramco partners often were earning less than \$29 a barrel on products refined from that oil. The Aramco partners maintained their contracts with Saudi Arabia because it is considered a relatively stable and reliable source.

"They were caught between the proverbial rock and a hard place," said Alvin Silber, an energy analyst at the investment firm Dean Witter Reynolds Inc.

While most companies that operate mainly in the United States did better than the internationals, Amerada Hess Corp. was an exception.

It reported a loss of \$16.2 million compared with year-earlier profit of \$174.5 million. Its revenues slid to \$2.37 billion from \$2.97 billion.

Silber and other analysts believe the first quarter will prove to be the low point this year for oil company earnings. Improvement is tied to an expected recovery of the U.S. economy and an easing of the oil glut.

Exxon, the biggest U.S. oil concern, said its profit fell to \$1.24 billion, or \$1.43 a share, from \$1.60 billion, or \$1.85 a share, in the same period last year. Revenue dipped to \$27.1 billion from \$30.3 billion.

Socal said its profit dropped to \$230 million, or 67 cents a share, on revenue of \$10 billion. A year earlier it earned \$666 million, or \$1.95 a share, on sales of \$12 billion. The \$230 million in profit was the lowest for Socal since the first quarter of 1977 when it earned \$224 million.

Gulf Oil Corp., ranked No. 6 among oil companies, said its profit fell 12 percent, to \$267 million, or \$1.44 a share, from \$303 million, or \$1.55 a share, in the year-earlier quarter. Revenue fell to \$7.54 billion from \$7.88 billion.

City Schools Student Loss Seen A Problem

Funding and the loss of students are the major problems facing Greenville's city school system, candidates for the city Board of Education agreed Tuesday evening.

The candidates — incumbents Erma S. Carr and Donavan Phillips and challengers Wilson Rhodes, George Williams, Pennie Dunn and Mary Williams — appeared together for brief presentations at a Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce "Pepsi Break" at the Willis Building.

Under rules laid down by the chamber's education committee, the candidates were restricted to a five-minute time slot to answer questions submitted to them in advance.

Each candidate, in turn, cited the flight of students from the city system and the reduction in funding as Greenville's major school problem. None offered a concrete solution, although most cited such possibilities as merger or partial merger with Pitt County's school system, a state bond referendum and realigning school districts.

Phillips noted that the system had lost an average of \$1,700 per student for each of the 500 students lost during the last five years.

Joan Shappley, representing the chamber's education committee, served as moderator for the candidates' panel.

Apply For Jobs Open By Alien Raids

More than 1,000 unemployed workers in Los Angeles applied for jobs made available by a week-long national crackdown on alleged illegal aliens in desirable jobs, but criticism of the raids surfaced in several areas.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service said its nine-city "Project Jobs" had snared more than 2,000 alleged illegal aliens through Tuesday.

Their average wage was about \$4.50 per hour, said spokesman Duke Austin in Washington. The INS said the raids were designed to capture illegal aliens in more desirable jobs than menial labor, making the positions available for American workers.

The Price Pfister Brass Manufacturing Co. plant in the Los Angeles-area community of Pacoima, where 82 suspected illegal aliens were arrested Monday, was deluged with job applicants Tuesday, mostly young blacks and Hispanics, said company President Peter Gold.

He said about 1,000 applications were taken in a few hours before people were turned away.

Two smaller California companies raided Monday, U.S. Sales Co. in Pacoima and Pharmavita, located in Arleta, also reported a surge of job applicants.

The total of suspected illegal aliens arrested through Tuesday topped 2,000, including 282 in the Los Angeles area, 409 in Chicago, 230 in San Francisco and 475 in Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston, the INS said.

The businesses raided ranged from a shoe manufacturer and Mexican food processor in Los Angeles, to a masonry and statutory concern and meat-packing plant in suburban Chicago.

INS officials hope to capture as many as 5,000 people nationwide during the raids.

In Chicago, Ray Romero, an attorney with the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Education Fund, said rights of detainees were being violated.

"They're putting people on planes and forcing them to sign waivers — written in Spanish — giving up the right to remain silent, to speak to a lawyer, the right to post bond pending a deportation hearing," Romero said.

The leftist International Committee Against Racism called for a strike by all workers to protest the raids, which a committee spokesman in Los Angeles compared to the Nazi tactic of blaming minorities for economic problems.

"These raids are an attack on all workers because they divided us at the very time workers need to unite — citizen and immigrant, black, Latin, Asian and white — to build a strong movement against racism and for jobs," committee member Barbara Hertz said at a news conference.

But Ted L. Giorgetti, deputy director of enforcement of the INS in Chicago, called the raids "routine area control operations" meant to open up "some very good jobs for U.S. citizens."

"If this is politically motivated," Giorgetti said, "I don't think it's wrong."

Joe Salgado, the INS national enforcement chief, said Tuesday in Washington that the agency made the planned sweep public Friday after leaks threatened to torpedo the operation.

Arnold Torres of the League of United Latin-American Citizens said at the time that the raids would help perpetuate the "lie" that illegal aliens are responsible for high U.S. unemployment.

Salgado said rumors in some minority communities "had us sweeping through residential areas, rural communities and 50 to 60 cities simultaneously, rounding up huge numbers of illegal aliens indiscriminately and shipping them out of the country."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee have overwhelmingly condemned a proposed resolution pledging U.S. opposition to Cuban aggression in the Western Hemisphere by force if necessary.

Most members present spoke against the resolution Tuesday, with Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., the only one to speak in favor of it. A vote was to be scheduled later.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, sponsored the resolution, a restatement of one adopted during the 1962

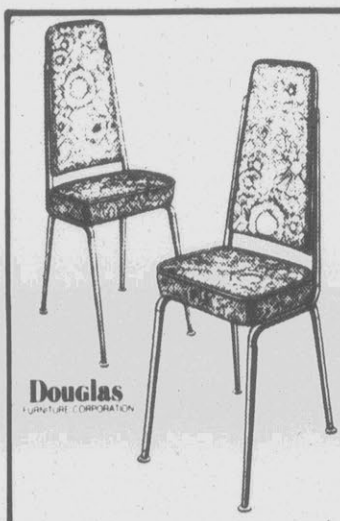
Cuban missile crisis. He said it would make clear to the Cubans that the United States "will not tolerate the export of revolution" to nations in Central America.

On April 20, a State Department official told the committee that Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. had decided the administration would support the resolution, reversing the department's earlier stance.

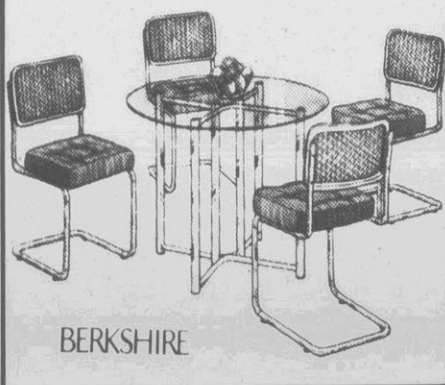

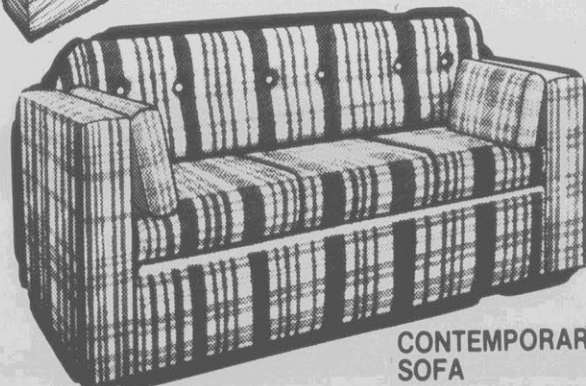

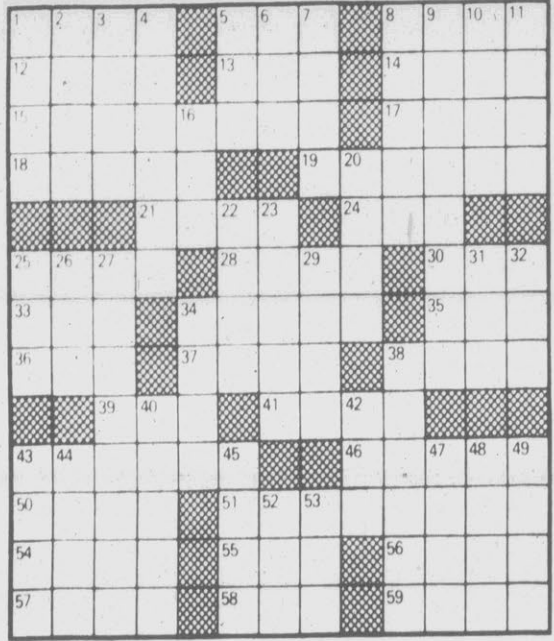

I don't want you to think, from my last note, that the caliber of play in the NatWest Trophy was undistinguished. Zia Mahmood, who played for Pakistan in the 1981 World Team Championship, starred against us on this hand.

British internationalist Rob Sheehan decided that, because of the plethora of aces and kings, his hand was suit oriented, so he elected to open one club rather than one no trump. Zia responded one no trump and Sheehan made an invitational raise which, not surprisingly,

South declined.

Our defense was picture-perfect. My partner, Paul Chemla, led a spade. I won the jack and shifted to a low heart. Paul took his king and reverted to a spade, my queen winning. I now played ace and another heart.

Declarer could take seven fast tricks. If he tried to set up his eighth trick in spades, I would defeat him by cashing my long heart. But my Pakistani friend is not known as one of the world's great dummy players for nothing. Seemingly without a moment's thought, he led a club from his hand. Naturally, my partner played low, and declarer finessed dummy's ten. That was his eighth trick, and our sparkling defensive effort came to naught.

If my opponents are going to play that well, how am I going to win!

Acquit Warden Of Driving Violation

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - Central Prison Warden Samuel P. Garrison has been acquitted of a driving violation after a federal judge heard testimony saying health problems and prescription medicine caused Garrison's erratic driving.

"I feel relieved, and I feel that justice was done in my case," Garrison said afterward. He was arrested Dec. 20 and charged with driving under the influence of alcohol.

Trooper E.B. Fleming testified that Garrison had bloodshot eyes, was unsteady on his feet and had alcohol on his breath when he was stopped.

Fleming said he watched Garrison cross the center line three times, and found two unopened bottles of wine in Garrison's car.

He said Garrison refused the Breathalyzer test. Fail-

ure to take the test results in an automatic six-month suspension of a driver's license and Garrison has surrendered his license.

During the 4½ hours Garrison's case was before the court Monday and Tuesday, his attorneys maintained that his prescription medicine and an inner ear problem caused him to drive erratically and appear unstable on his feet.

Garrison's physician, Dr. Dennis I. Becker, testified that the warden was taking tranquilizers and several other medicines for diabetes, an irregular heartbeat, an inner ear problem and a severe condition of chronic nervous exhaustion.

"I am concerned about his (Garrison's) health problems," said Rae McNamara, head of North Carolina's Division of Prisons and Garrison's superior.

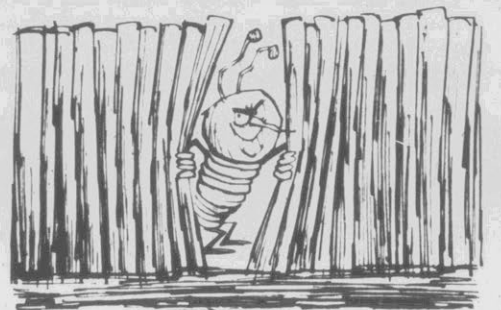

Complain Egypt Is Impairing U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - A House Foreign Affairs subcommittee, approving a \$400-million military aid increase for Egypt, complained Tuesday that Egyptian subsidies are distorting its economy.

The panel adopted a report noting that Egypt is subsidizing energy products by \$3 billion a year and that the price of gasoline in Egypt is roughly one-fifth of the market price.

The subcommittee on Europe and the Middle East said, "such huge subsidies do not give hope for future development, and they impair the effectiveness of the United States economic assistance for Egypt."

The panel acted in approving Reagan administration requests that would raise military aid to Egypt for fiscal 1983 to \$1.3 billion.

The panel also endorsed an administration increase of \$300 million in military aid to Israel for a total of \$1.7 billion.

The administration had asked that grant aid of \$550 million in the Israeli military assistance package be reduced to \$500 million, but the panel voted instead to increase the grant aid to \$750 million.

Total U.S. military and economic aid packages pro-

posed for fiscal 1983 are \$2.485 billion for Israel and \$2.052 billion for Egypt.

The subcommittee called on the United States to follow through on its promises to improve the performance of the U.S. economic aid program for Egypt.

"It is equally essential for the Egyptian government to press ahead with its stated intentions to develop new economic policies," the panel said.

"It is the challenge of the Egyptian and American government for the 1980s to combine Egypt's own policy initiatives with American support, flexibility and creativity to insure growth and economic stability," the subcommittee said.

"Without those efforts, frustrations in the Congress over the inability of this program to achieve its stated objectives will multiply and the commitment to maintain high levels of assistance will wane," the panel said.

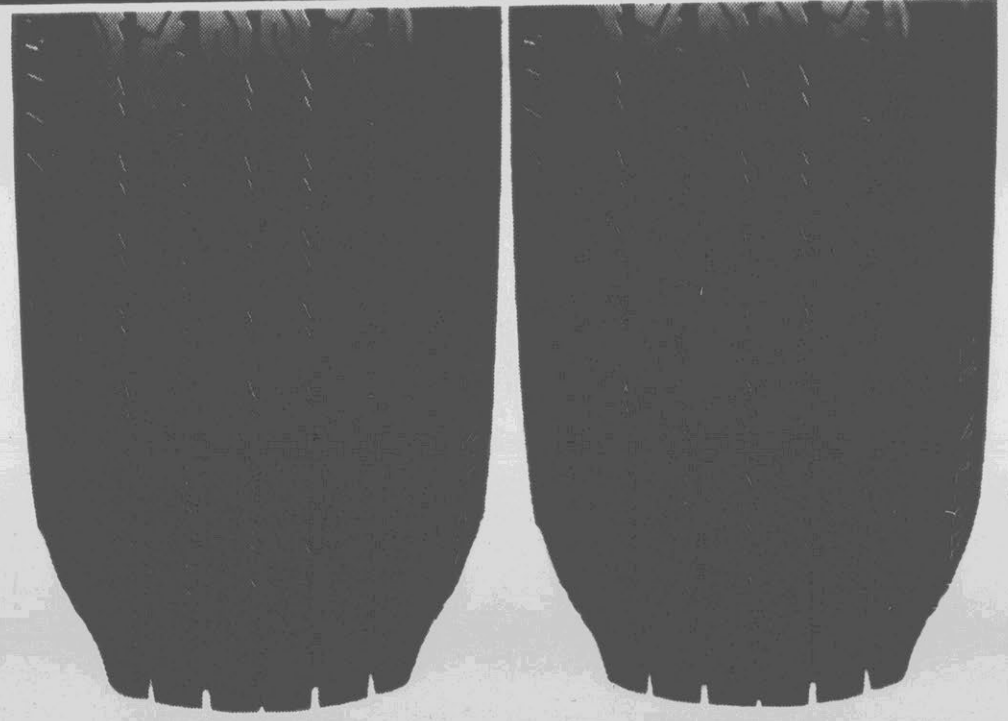

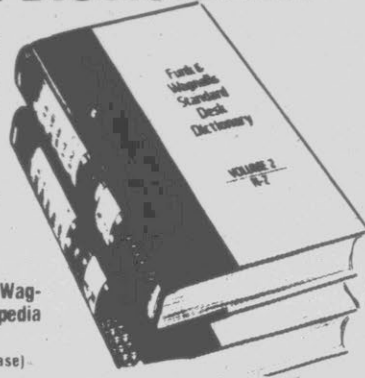

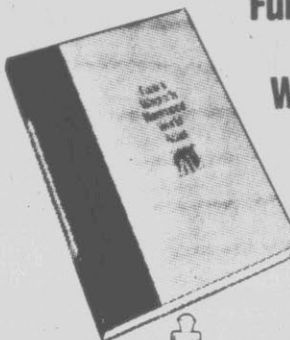

President Reagan was scheduled to meet House Speaker Thomas O'Neill today in an attempt to break an apparent impasse in budget negotiations. Investors fear that failure to narrow projected record deficits would push interest rates higher, reducing chances for an economic recovery. Prospects for further military action in the South Atlantic heightened as Britain declared it would establish a "total" war zone 200 miles around the Falkland Islands on Friday, and Argentina placed its forces on "maximum alert." Today's early prices included Sony, down 1/4 at 14; Standard Oil of California, unchanged at 30 3/4; International Business Machines, down 1/2 at 65; Exxon, unchanged at 28 3/4; General Motors, down 1/2 at 43 3/4; and American Telephone & Telegraph, down 1/2 at 55. On Tuesday, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 8.08 to 857.50 with part of the decline attributed by traders to rumors - denied by the White House - that the president was ill. Five stocks fell in price for every three that rose on the NYSE. Big Board volume totaled 56.48 million shares, down from Monday's 60.50 million. The NYSE's composite index fell .64 to 67.95. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was off 2.82 at 273.47.

Keeping Faith

SINGAPORE (AP) - Vice President George Bush said today the United States intends to remain a Pacific power and is ready to help Asian nations strengthen their defense capabilities. Bush spoke to the American Business Council, an unofficial group of businessmen, on the third stop of an Asia-Pacific tour. He previously visited Japan and South Korea. "Our administration is embarked on a major strengthening of our military forces, including our naval forces in the Pacific," he said. "We are going to remain faithful to our treaty commitments."

Again Dismiss Standards

WASHINGTON (AP) - A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia has again thrown out key environmental standards for licensing nuclear power plants. The effect of the decision was unclear because the court said in its 2-1 decision it was not throwing out any licenses granted under those standards. The case arose from a challenge by the Natural Resources Defense Council to a nuclear reactor operated by Vermont Yankee Power Co. near Vernon, Vt.

Paul Corsivo called Farmville police at 1:15 a.m. to report that a man wearing a stocking over his head left the store on foot headed east on U.S. 264. He described the suspect as black and not old, about 5-foot-9. A butcher knife was held at his side while the man emptied the cash register of an amount of money not disclosed by the police. Corsivo was not injured. Farmville Police Chief Ron Cooper said the investigation of the robbery, the first for this convenience store, was being coordinated by Capt. W.G. Barber.

Their Ducks Disappearing

JACKSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) - Elizabeth Lake residents say they're upset because their ducks keep disappearing. And the man who owns most of the ducks says if they're found, it may be on a menu. "They just might wind up on somebody's dinner table," said Ira Paul, who says the entertaining creatures may not have been stolen as pets. Cynthia Silence Marcoux, who witnessed the ducknappings from her parents' lake-shore home, described the villain as short, "with a beer belly and having dark hair and a full beard." She said he drove off with several mallards peering out the rear door of his camper. Paul said the lake's waterfowl population has dropped from about 80 or 100 ducks three months ago to 35 or 40, including a number of ducklings orphaned when their mothers were plucked from their midst. "Our main problem here now is that we have only a few females left," Paul said. But other lake residents have taken up the slack. Two male geese, one a white domestic and the other a dark Canadian, have adopted one orphaned duckling brood and another whose mother is still on the lake, he said. The other ducks, including the bewildered mother, can't get near the adopted ducklings without ruffling the feathers of the two jealous geese, who honk and hiss at the approach of strangers.

Noguchi Loses His Position

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Dr. Thomas Noguchi, who was removed by county supervisors from his position as coroner, will challenge his demotion to physician specialist in court, his attorney says. Godfrey Isaac called the decision by the board of supervisors "another sham action" and said he expected to go to court today to try to overturn the demotion. Noguchi was demoted Tuesday after supervisors met in executive session. He was not present at the session, but Isaac, reached at a Torrance court, said supervisors were trying to "embarrass" his client, who he said would fight the demotion in court. Asked if Noguchi would assume the role of a regular medical examiner doing autopsies, Isaac said: "He won't take any chances on being insubordinate. He'll go to work as a medical examiner if we aren't successful in court." On Monday, Isaac was unable to obtain a temporary restraining order to halt the demotion. But Superior Court Judge John L. Cole said that he would reconsider the order if supervisors demoted Noguchi the following day. Following Tuesday's session, Board of Supervisor Chairman Pete Schabarum said Noguchi's responses to a letter citing reasons for possible dismissal were "totally inadequate." Said Schabarum, "The Board of Supervisors has

More Shot By Israeli Troops

Israel does not intend to give up the remaining occupied territories. The military command also reported a stone-throwing incident in Dahariya, about 30 miles south of Jerusalem in the occupied West Bank, but no injuries were reported. On Monday, a military spokesman said, soldiers shot and wounded two Palestinian demonstrators in the legs during a clash with Arab youths protesting the closure of a school in the West Bank town of Nablus. Soldiers shot four Arabs in the legs at Jabalya after firing shots in the air failed to disperse the mob. Five Arabs were hit by gunfire in another demonstration in Nablus, the largest West Bank town, a military spokesman said. The incidents did not disrupt festivities marking Israel's 34th birthday, and plans proceeded for ground-breaking ceremonies for 11 new paramilitary settlements in the West Bank. Israel seized the West Bank and Gaza during the 1967 Middle East war. Militant Palestinians are demanding Israeli withdrawal and their own state. Independence Day is a traditional day of demonstrations against the 15-year Israeli occupation, but the trouble this year was a continuation of Palestinian unrest over a crackdown on what Israel calls extremists. Aggravating Arab tempers were well publicized plans for the new outposts and six new civilian settlements in the West Bank approved last Sunday by Prime Minister Menachem Begin's Cabinet. The renewed focus on West Bank settlement was partly aimed at dispelling the gloom engulfing this nation after relinquishing the Sinai Desert to Egypt on Sunday and uprooting Sinai settlements. The Arabs see the settlements as certain indications

Raps Delay On Aspirin Report

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee has criticized the government for being slow to disclose a connection between aspirin and potentially fatal Reye's syndrome in children. The rebuke by Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., was made Tuesday as a consumer group asked Congress to investigate whether the aspirin industry persuaded the government to delay issuing a warning that aspirin may increase risk of the disease. A warning was issued Feb. 11 by the Centers for Disease Control - after the flu season had begun and nearly four months after a panel of experts suggested making such a statement. "What is intolerable is that the (Food and Drug Administration) has not acted six months after the CDC panel made its recommendation," said Dingell, adding that he would ask Health and Human Services Secretary Richard Schweiker for a reply to the charges.

Crump, Robbins Selected In 4th Round Of Draft

East Carolina defensive tackle George Crump and offensive tackle Tootie Robbins were both picked in the fourth round of the National Football League draft Tuesday afternoon.

Crump, a 6-4, 260-pounder from Chesapeake, Va., was picked by the New England Patriots while Robbins, a 6-5, 270-pounder from Mery Hill, N.C., was picked by the St. Louis Cardinals.

Crump was the second player in the fourth round picked and the 86th player overall picked. Robbins, who many thought would be the top ECU draft choice, was the seventh player picked in the fourth round.

Three Atlantic Coast Conference football players were chosen in the first round of the draft and 13 ACC players in all were selected in the first six rounds.

The draft concludes today in New York.

"I'm surprised, definitely," Crump said of his selection. "I'm surprised how high I went and that I was picked before Tootie."

"I'm still in a state of

shock right now. Today's Wednesday, right? But I can't believe it. It's like a dream. All the work paid off, definitely," he said. "All the work paid off."

Said his agent, Ken Hutcherson, "George Crump is a perfect example of a kid who worked hard and, since January, has gone from almost a nothing to the 86th player picked."

Crump joins former ECU running back Anthony Collins in New England. Collins was drafted in the second round last season by the Patriots. His name was inadvertently omitted from a list run yesterday in the Daily Reflector of ECU players in the professional ranks.

"It's nice, very nice to be going up there," Crump said. "I was a little surprised they picked me. I had narrowed the teams (I thought would draft me) down and they hadn't talked to me that much."

Crump watched the draft on television with ECU nose guard Fee Griffin but it was not until it went off the air and Crump had returned to

his apartment that the call came.

"They only televised the first three and a half rounds and after that I came back home and layed around awhile," he said. "I figured the draft was over (a little later). It was about quarter to six then."

"Then, about ten to six I got a call. They asked if this was George Crump and I said, 'Yes, it is.' And they said, 'This is the New England Patriots and we've drafted you in the fourth round.'"

Crump will now report to a mini-camp on May 11.

Robbins, unlike Crump, had mixed feelings about his fourth round choice by the Cardinals.

"I'm pretty pleased. The fourth round is okay, but I felt I should have gone earlier. Still I'm glad to get a chance to play pro ball."

Robbins said he talked with St. Louis last night following his pick. "I talked briefly with the head coach, and they told me to report to mini-camp on May 16." That camp will be held at St. Louis.

"I don't know much about St. Louis," he said. "I didn't keep up with them that much, but I guess I'll have to learn a lot about them. It won't be any problem."

"I'm just glad I got the chance to play. I feel like I have a better chance of playing with St. Louis than I would, say with someone like Pittsburgh," he said. "I feel I have a good chance to make the team and stick around for a while."

Robbins, who was a second-team All-American this past season, said he will be working out with the weights before he leaves for the mini-camp, where he and the other rookies will be going through two-day drills for a week. "Then, I'll be back and working in lifting and running until I report to regular camp."

For Robbins, who left the team several times during his freshman and sophomore years, making the pros completes a turnaround begun two years ago. "I'm very pleased with myself that I came back and had an outstanding junior and senior year."

San Diego Picks Tiger DB Hollis

NEW YORK (AP) — Hollis Hall, a defensive back from Clemson, became the San Diego Chargers' first pick Wednesday — the 188th player, overall — in the seventh round of the 1982 National Football League college draft.

The Chargers in effect sat out the entire first day of the draft Tuesday. They had dealt away their first-, second-, third-, fourth- and sixth-round choices before the draft began. And on Tuesday, they also traded away their fifth-round choice to Chicago for what was called "past considerations."

The Washington Redskins, during the George Allen era, set the record for the most rounds without a pick. In 1972, their first selection came in the eighth round — and they used it to take 28-year-old Moses Denson, a running back from Maryland State.

Earlier, Jeff Roberts, a linebacker from Tulane, was selected by the New England Patriots to start the second day's drafting and the Detroit Lions traded defensive back Luther Bradley to Houston.

Roberts was the first player picked in the seventh round — the draft runs 12 rounds — while Bradley went to the Oilers in exchange for their seventh-round pick. With it, Houston took fullback Phil Bates from Nebraska.

With Bert Jones and Russ Francis having been traded and with Ken Sims officially drafted, the 28 teams went about the more mundane business of looking for "bodies," relatively unknown players with a chance to make their rosters.

The gallery, packed with excited spectators — most of them New York Giants or New York Jets fans — was virtually empty today, only a few hard-core draft followers ob-

serving the proceedings.

The big names were long gone, particularly this year, one which most scouts called one of the thinnest drafts in recent memory. Some called it a one-man draft, Sims being that one. The University of Texas defensive tackle was No. 1, taken Tuesday by the New England Patriots to open the first of the 12 rounds. The 6-foot-6, 265-pounder strode into the spotlight at draft headquarters — and probably into a million-dollar contract, compliments of Patriots owner Billy Sullivan, who knows the value of a buck.

Jones also is close to \$1 million richer. The "franchise" quarterback for nine years in Baltimore was fed up with playing for the Colts — a 2-14 season in 1981 didn't help — and said the only way he'd sign another contract with them was if they then traded him.

On Tuesday, they dealt him to Los Angeles for the Rams' first-round and second-round picks.

And after picking linebacker Johnnie Cooks of Mississippi State with their own choice (No. 2 overall), the Colts used the Rams' No. 5 in the opening round to replace Jones with Ohio State quarterback Art Schlichter.

Of NFL Draft 3 ACC Players Go In 1st

NEW YORK (AP) — North Carolina State wide receiver Mike Quick was one of three Atlantic Coast Conference football players chosen in the first round of Tuesday's National Football League draft, and he left no doubt about his feelings.

"Great. I couldn't be in a better spot I don't believe," said Quick, the 21st player chosen overall and first for the Philadelphia Eagles.

"I was expecting to go in the first," Quick said. "I knew Philadelphia was interested. I actually thought I might have gone earlier to New Orleans or maybe Oakland, from news I had received previously. But I'm happy Philly picked me."

"They've got three good wide receivers, but they are still looking for another one they can count on," Quick added. "And I believe I can do the job."

The 6-foot-2, 186-pound, Hamlet native did the job for the Wolfpack, catching 32 passes for 508 yards last year. He set school career records for receptions (116), yards (1,934) and touchdown passes (10).

"We think he's an exceptional prospect," said Eagles' wide receiver coach Dick Coury. "We like his toughness, concentration on the football

and jumping ability. And, he's the best blocking wide receiver we've seen coming out of college. The only negative is that he does not have the burning speed some people like."

Two Clemson players, Jeff Bryant and Perry Tuttle, were also chosen on the first round. In all, 13 ACC players were chosen along with a pair from East Carolina in the draft's first six rounds.

Seattle was expected to pick guard Mike Munchak to give quarterback Jim Zorn more protection, but instead went for Bryant, a defensive end. Bryant was the seventh overall selection and first from the ACC.

Tuttle, a wide receiver, was the 20th overall pick and first choice of Buffalo to finish a trade with Denver.

North Carolina linebacker Calvin Daniels was chosen in the second round by the Kansas City Chiefs.

In the third round, Duke wide receiver Cedric Jones was the first player chosen, with the New England Patriots calling his name. Wake Forest wide receiver Kenny Duckett was drafted by New Orleans, on a choice acquired from Washington, and North Carolina State linebacker Robert Abraham was taken by Houston in a pick received in a three-way deal.

The two East Carolina players both went in the fourth

round. Defensive end George Crump was the round's second pick as New England dipped once more into the Carolinas, and offensive tackle Tootie Robbins was picked by St. Louis, a choice acquired from Seattle.

Virginia linebacker Stuart Anderson was picked by Kansas City in the fourth round while Duke linebacker Charles Bowser was selected by the Miami Dolphins.

Linebacker Jeff Davis of Clemson and Duke defensive back Dennis Tabron were fifth-round choices. Davis was tabbed by the Tampa Bay Bucs while Chicago got Tabron on a deal from San Diego.

The Lakers, who had a bye in the first round of the playoffs, went on to an easy 115-96 victory and a 1-0 lead in their best-of-7 series.

"Los Angeles came out strong in the first quarter and set the tone," said Phoenix Coach John MacLeod. "We couldn't recover. We were never in position to establish momentum."

But Lakers Coach Pat Riley still is worried about tonight's second game, also in Los Angeles, because it will be necessary for his team to be ready to play again so quickly after Tuesday's success.

"It was a good first-night win," Riley said. "In a back-to-back situation like this on our court, we have to make sure Phoenix doesn't steal one. We'll need the same effort in the next game."

In the other Western Conference playoff opener, the San Antonio Spurs beat Seattle 95-93, negating the SuperSonics' home-court advantage.

The second game of that series is tonight in Seattle, and the Eastern Conference playoffs also resume with Washington at Boston and Milwaukee at Philadelphia.

The Celtics and 76ers won Game 1 of those series last Sunday.

Jamaal Wilkes led the Lakers' balanced scoring with 28 points, followed by Earvin "Magic" Johnson with 23, Norm Nixon with 22 and Bob McAdoo with 21. Los Angeles'

Is Lendl Tennis' New No. 1 Player?

DALLAS (AP) — The Association of Tennis Professionals' computer says John McEnroe is the No. 1 one men's tennis player in the world.

Ivan Lendl's record suggests something else.

The 22-year-old Czechoslovakian, currently ranked No. 3 behind McEnroe and Jimmy Connors, strengthened his bid for the top spot as he scored his fourth consecutive victory over McEnroe in the World Championship of Tennis Finals played Monday night.

McEnroe did make one stride forward in his 6-2, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3 loss. His second-set triumph broke Lendl's nine-set

streak, but the numbers are clearly on the Czech's side.

Lendl now has a 4-2 record over the 23-year-old defending Wimbledon and U.S. Open champion and has won 11 of the last 12 sets they played. All but one of those victories have come on surfaces more styled to McEnroe's serve-and-volley style.

A fourth-round win in the French Open was the Czech's first over McEnroe, who has not fared well on the Parisian red clay courts. Two months later, Lendl and his Czechoslovak teammates came to Flushing Meadow, the site of the U.S. Open, for semifinal Davis Cup action.

Though his team lost, Lendl scored a 6-4, 14-12, 7-5 victory over McEnroe on the same court where the New Yorker has claimed three consecutive Open titles.

The next meeting was on the indoor carpet at Madison Square Garden in the finals of the Grand Prix Masters Tournament. Lendl extended his streak with a 6-4, 6-2 win.

"Obviously his record is better than mine. No one is arguing. He's playing better than I am, winning tournaments. Ivan is letting the results speak for themselves right now," McEnroe said.

Those results include a near-total domination of the 1982 men's tour, winning 78 of 80 matches and earning \$900,000. He can reach the \$1 million mark with a victory in the Tournament of Champions at Forest Hills later this month.

"At the beginning of the year, I said I liked the WCT even before I started winning all the tournaments," Lendl said after picking up \$150,000

for his Dallas victory.

But the money pales for the 6-foot-2 man from the steel-mill town of Ostrovia. Beating McEnroe is what counts.

"Everytime I beat him, it is important. This (the WCT finals) was my second biggest (victory) ... the Grand Prix Masters was the first ... the next will be the French Open," Lendl said.

When asked if there was any additional pressure in reaching the top of the tennis world, Lendl said: "I don't feel any pressure about it. I don't read the newspapers. There is no pressure if you don't know what people are saying."

But many are saying there seems to be a new pairing in the battle for tennis supremacy.

That's the second time the Dodgers have had the distinction of the largest major league baseball buyout. They paid Don Stanhouse \$1.36 million to drop him from the team. He had four seasons left at \$340,000 a season.

Goltz was signed in 1980 as a free agent for an estimated \$3 million on a six-year contract. Stanhouse was signed the same year for \$1.36 million.

Goltz was 7-11 and 2-7 in his past two seasons and made only one start this season—a losing effort.

There he stood, the man who WAS the New York Yankees for five years until George Steinbrenner let him get away. He hadn't had an extra base hit in his first month as a California Angel. It was as if he had saved it up for one swing.

It came on Ron Guidry's first pitch of the seventh inning.

"I'm very happy and pleased. It's like a load off my shoulders. I'll never forget that one," Jackson said after his monumental home runoff the upper deck facade at Yankee Stadium highlighted a 3-1 Angel victory Tuesday night.

Steinbrenner, the New York owner who had dumped Manager Bob Lemon on Sunday in the latest episode of Yankee upheaval, kept a low profile as he watched Gene Michael's debut in his second turn as manager go down the drain.

But the New York fans were anything but quiet. They chanted Jackson's name as they had done many times in the past when he wore pinstripes. And they added a new, obscene chant directed at Steinbrenner.

Jackson admitted the fans moved him. "They gave me a lift, a great feeling of appreciation," he said. "There were signs saying, 'Thanks for the memories.' When you're down,

you need to be lifted."

Jackson also had a single and scored in the fifth inning of the game, which was called after seven innings when a steady rain turned to a downpour. Rookie Angel Moreno, who held the Yankees to four singles, got the win for the Western Division-leading Angels.

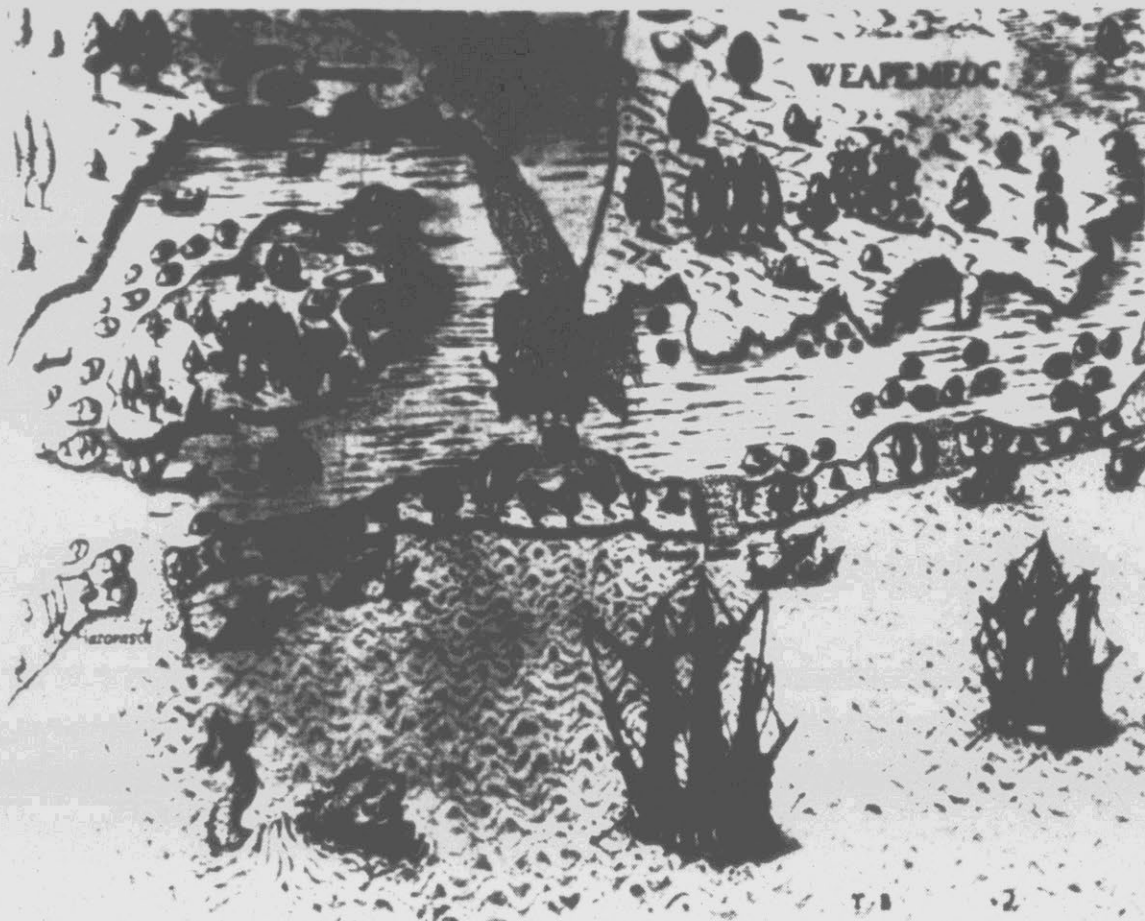

Archeologists Seeking Site, Fate Of Lost Colony

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP)—In 1590, John White returned from Great Britain to find America's first English settlement overgrown by vegetation, its buildings in disrepair, its colonists inexplicably vanished.

For nearly four centuries, the half-timber houses, thatched with weeds and interwoven with willow branches, melted into

the Roanoke Island wilderness until they, too, disappeared. But this summer, archeologists armed with proton magnetometers and soil resistivity tests hope to find clues to the settlement that eluded the shovels of earlier investigators.

The search will concentrate on the northern end of the 11-mile-long island, radiating from Fort Raleigh, an earthwork outpost built to protect the "Cittie of Raleigh," said Phil Evans, a National Park Service technician.

Archeologists gathered Tuesday at the historic park near the fort to review previous excavations, plan strategies and explore historic records.

Sir Walter Raleigh applied for the colony's charter in 1584. A year later, 108 men led by Ralph Lane hacked the settlement from the island wilderness, but Indian hostilities and near starvation forced them to return to England after 11 months.

New settlers reoccupied the village in 1587, sending White, their governor, back to England for supplies. White's return was delayed by the Spanish armada until 1590, when he found the island deserted.

When J.C. Harrington, a National Park Service archaeologist, confirmed the location of Fort Raleigh in 1965, he unearthed clues that led modern scientists to believe the lost colony might lay literally at the fort's doorstep.

Archeologists in the 1940s and 1960s may have been misled by inaccurate expectations, Evans said.

"In the 1940s you probably would have expected houses with nice little brick foundations," he said. "But most of the houses that have been excavated on the early 17th century sites in Virginia show they were mainly built by burying posts in the ground as the upright members of the frame of the house."

Better technology and a more accurate description of the lost colony should improve the chances of success, Evans said.

"Fortunately, (post) holes remain after 400 years," he said. "Even a resealed hole will leave a stain in the soil. You can pretty well plot these soil stains and get an outline of a structure or a house."

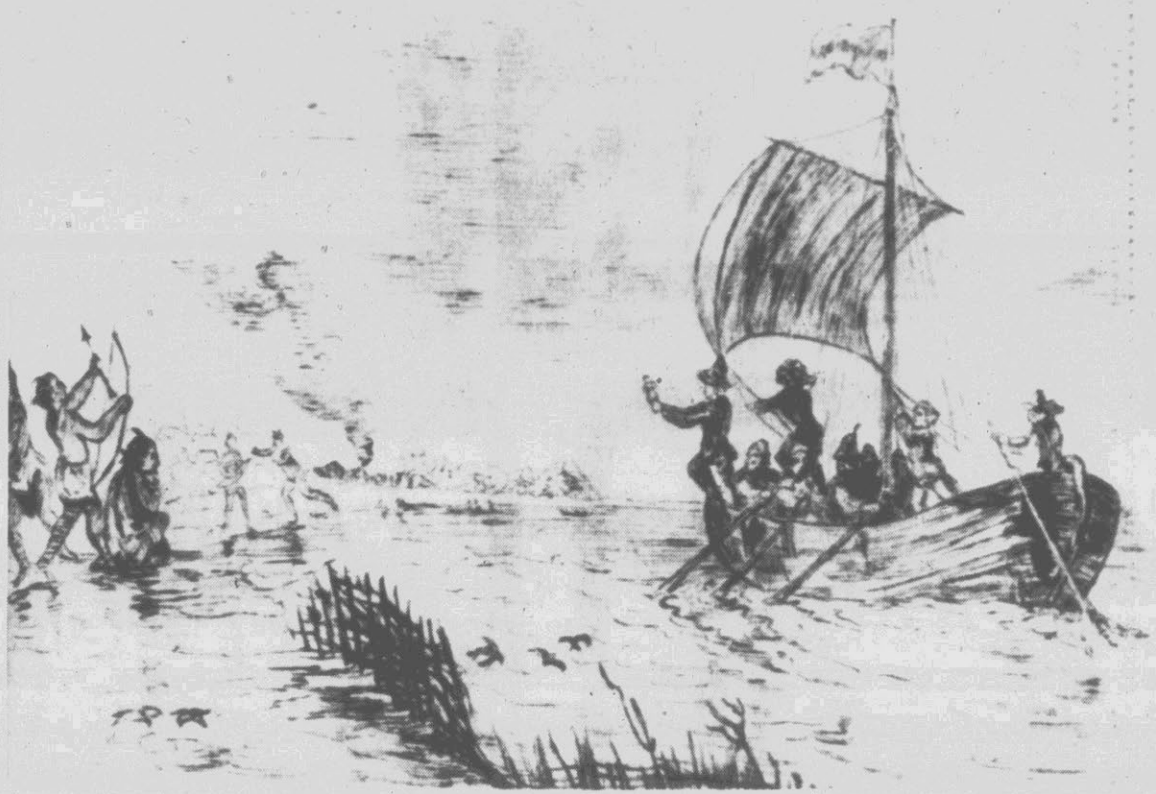
While the park service and scientists from the Southeast Archaeology Center in Tallahassee, Fla., look for post holes, phosphates and artifacts near the fort, another effort may be mounted at sea.

Dr. Gordon Watts, a historian at East Carolina University and a former state underwater archaeologist, believes the settlement lies beneath the waters of Roanoke Sound, perhaps four miles from the fort.

"What's happening from a geological perspective is the north end appears to be sinking while the south end is rising," Watts said. "In addition, there has been a tremendous amount of erosion on the north end of the island and the sea level appears to have risen about one foot per 100 years. When you put the two together, the remains of the settlement might well lie in the sound."

Watts believes Fort Raleigh, made of dirt piled to surround a star-shaped enclosure, is too small to have protected the colonists, suggesting it may have been an outpost for a settlement based further to the south and west.

Remote sensing will be used to explore sites both on land and at sea, said Evans. Tiny changes in the Earth's magnetic field may reveal metal weapons or pieces of iron forged by colonists, while differences in electrical resistance in the soil could signal post holes, brickwork foundations or trenches dug long ago.

Watts plans to use sonar to get a profile of the features at the bottom of the sound, sending divers to examine promising areas.

Both Evans and Watts hoped gravesites or skeletal remains might reveal what befell the colonists.

"Even if skeletal remains are found outside the settlement, the formation of areas on the skull, along with things like height, could determine whether it came from an Indian or Englishman," Watts said.

Results from remote sensing will be analyzed by computer at the University of Florida, said Richard Faust, director of the Southeast Archaeology Center. That study, directed by John Ehrenhard, a research archaeologist at the center, is being funded by a \$15,000 grant from the Eastern National Park and Monument Association with additional funds from the park service.

If promising sites are uncovered in June or July, workers will return to conventional trenching and photography to more carefully scrutinize the area in August or September, Faust said.

The renewed interest in the colony has been sparked by plans to celebrate its 400th anniversary on July 13, 1994—a celebration that tips off America's 400th anniversary.

America's Four Hundredth Anniversary Committee, based in Raleigh, has earmarked \$275,000 of \$3 million to be raised in the next two years for archaeological expeditions, said Dr. John Neville, a historian and secretary for the group. Watts and Evans both planned to request support from the committee, which has raised \$800,000 since October.

Even if the old Cittie of Raleigh is located, it is unlikely to be restored like the fort, Evans said.

"That is something that we try to shy away from because, if you restore something, chances are 20 years from now somebody is going to find out that you did it wrong by finding

new information and you're going to look like a fool," he said. However, an artist may be commissioned to paint the settlement as it once was, commemorating the founding—and finding—of the lost colony.

Say Foresight Paid Dividends

CULLOWHEE, N.C. (AP)—Foresight by the director of Western Carolina University's environmental health program paid dividends during a recent chemical plant explosion which forced the evacuation of 2,000 Hazlewood residents.

Joe Beck said he purchased a toxic-gas analyzing system for his department last spring. He said he thought of it not only as an educational tool, but as something which might be of use in a potentially life-threatening situation in the community.

Beck found himself in one of those situations April 21 when three explosions rocked Benfield Industries Inc. in Hazlewood, sending smoke laden with toxic gas throughout the area.

A couple hours after the explosion, state and local officials asked Beck to test for hazardous chemicals in the surrounding air, using the university's analyzing equipment.

It was the results of those test which prompted authorities to order the evacuation of the residents around the chemical re-packaging plant.

"I had no doubt when I ordered this equipment that we'd use it for something like this," Beck said. "I've worked in public health long enough to know that there is very little equipment like this available for use by health and disaster-response agencies. When an emergency arises, equipment like this can be very valuable in saving lives."

Beck said because the system costs \$500 and fresh chemical indicators are needed every six months, the

system isn't economical for most county health departments.

Beck tested the air for chlorine, hydrogen sulfide, benzene and vinyl chloride. He first sampled the air while flying through a black cloud of smoke in an airplane at 5,000 feet above the burning plant.

"When you get inside a cloud that's pitch-black, over a potentially explosive area in between mountains that are higher than you are flying, it's a spooky feeling," Beck said. "I'm terrified, by the way, of airplanes, but I think I had greater anxiety about being in that cloud. You never know what's in something like that. It could have been hydrogen cyanide. That's what they use in gas chambers."

Beck said he was surprised to find such a large quantity of chemicals stored in the middle of a highly-populated area, saying he thinks "it demonstrates the need for industrial land planning in this area."

Beck said the type of testing equipment he used is primarily used to determine toxic levels of gas in mines. He said he has used it to test for gas vapors in a store and for the presence of formaldehyde in private homes and public buildings.

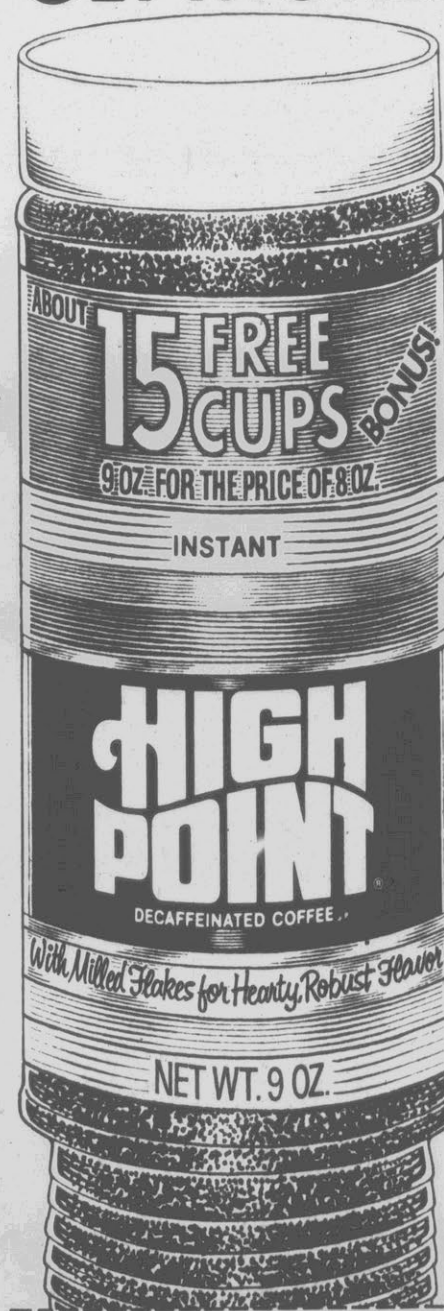
The Candlewick Flames 4-H Club heard Robert Baker of the Winterville Winner 4-H Club talk about safe use of lawn mowers.

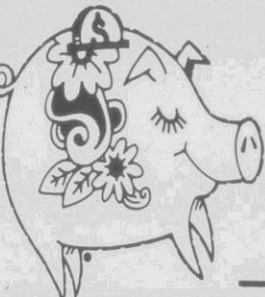
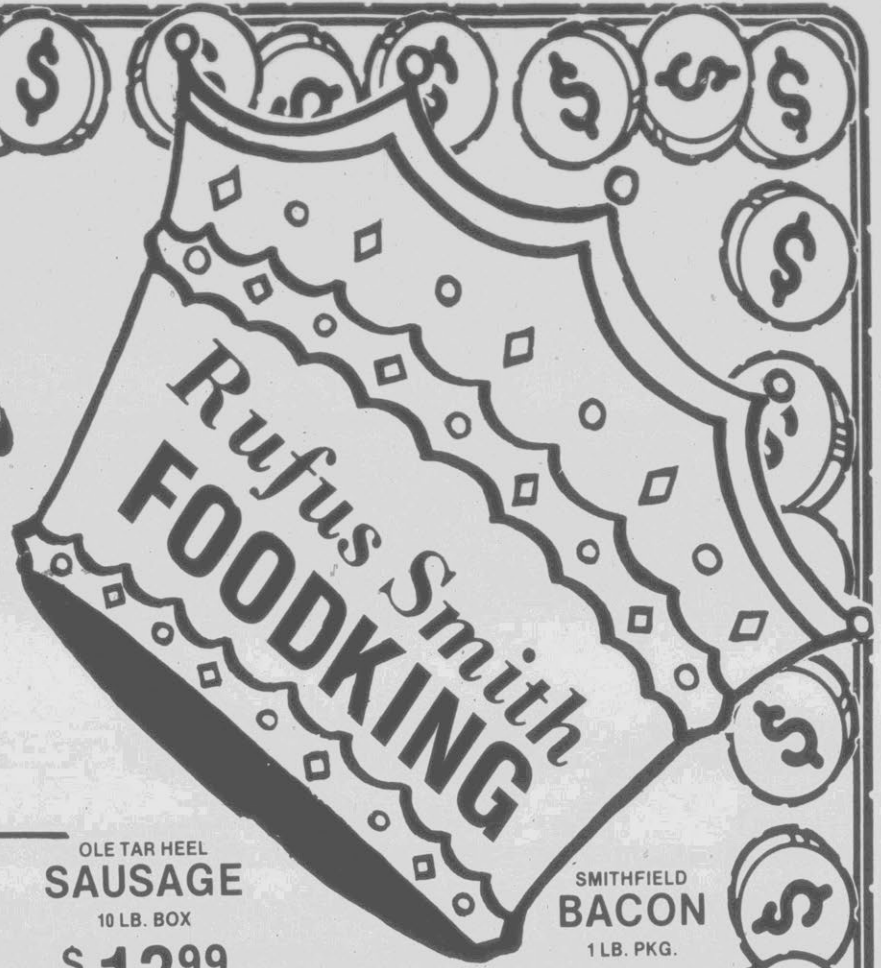

Little Town 'Home Base' Of Hoos-Hoos

GURDON, Ark. (AP) — So much has happened lately in this little southwest Arkansas town of 2,707.

Last month, there was that big basketball game — the one where the Class AA Gurdon Go-Devils beat Class AAAAA Little Rock Hall for the state championship.

And, in February, the town became the headquarters of the International Order of Hoo-Hoo.

Who?
"Hoo-Hoo International — The Fraternity of the Forest Products Industry," says the group's executive secretary, Russell McClain, a retired psychology professor and copy editor for the New York Times.

The Hoo-Hoos supposedly originated in 1892 when six lumbermen stranded by a flood spent the night in Gurdon's Hotel Hall and decided to organize something different for men of their trade.

"I think they got to drinking a little," said Joyce Taylor, who's helping publish The Log & Tally, a magazine for the 9,000 Hoo-Hoo members. Some live as far away as Canada and Singapore.

"There're all kinds of stories about where they got the name," McClain, the city's mayor, says.

Hoo-Hoo literature said that the name originated when one of the founders spied a single tuft of hair on the head of a fellow founder and whimsically dubbed it "hoo-hoo."

"They didn't want it to be like any other organization," McClain said. "So, they adopted a black cat as their symbol. Everybody else thought it was bad luck, and they wanted to adopt it as their symbol of good luck."

The organization's 255 clubs get some of their philosophy from Egyptian mythology. The emblem is based on the sacred Egyptian black cat, and the group uses the mythical nine lives of the cat as its basis. Membership is limited to 99,999.

"Everything's in nines," McClain said. "The convention is the ninth day of the ninth month." Meeting times must have a nine in the number. Initiation fees are \$24.99.

The cat, whose tail curls like the number nine, decorates the Hoo-Hoos' log cabin headquarters. It welcomes visitors at the front door; it hisses from a big orange and white flag; it sits on a table — carved from wood, of course.

During an initiation, Hoo-Hoo participants wear black and orange robes with black cats painted on them. They also wear pointed caps with the cat symbol.

The order's chief officer, "the snark of the universe," is Dan Brown of Klamath Falls, Ore. His title comes from a Lewis Carroll poem, "The Hunting of the Snark."

Members must earn half their income from a lumber-related function. But the rule is flexible. McClain got in by owning about 40 acres of wooded land and by being mayor of a lumber town.

The Hoo-Hoos moved the headquarters from Norwood, Mass., to Gurdon because overhead would be cheaper, because Gurdon was the group's birthplace and because of the log building.

To become the headquarters, the Gurdon Hoo-Hoos had to replace the building's plastic toilet seats with wooden ones. "They try to have everything wood," McClain said.

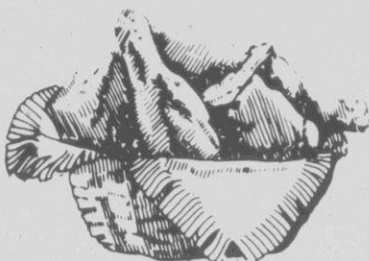
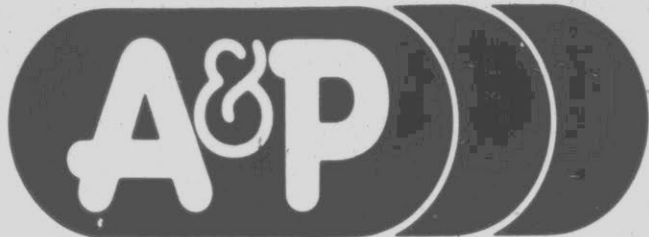

CBS Movie Examines A Well-Traveled Theme

NEW YORK (AP) — "A Question of Honor" explores the well-traveled police corruption theme from a road rarely taken. Tonight's three-hour CBS movie examines the cop not on the take, who can be squashed by overzealous, callous investigators intent on their own political profit.

It's a nice twist on "Serpico" and the latest of the genre, "Prince of the City," which starred Treat Williams as the corrupt cop who reluctantly rats on his fellow narcotics officers to save his own skin.

In "A Question of Honor," Ben Gazzara plays Joe DeFalco, a strong family man and an honest cop on the drug task force, who won't go along with the federal agents and suffers for it.

The point is blunt. Justice is perverted when decent cops are victimized, while stool pigeons and informants get a better shake from investigators, some of whom are operating for their own personal — and political — prestige. Uncovering corruption sometimes can be an afterthought.

"A Question of Honor" is an interesting, inside perspective on the illegal police practices that spawned watchdog groups, like the Knapp Commission in New York during the early 1970s. Its approach comes from former city detective Sonny Grosso, who was Eddie Egan's partner on the famous "French Connection" drug bust, which became a popular movie.

Grosso's book "Point Blank," the story of one of his friends on the force, is the basis for "Question of Honor." Budd Schulberg, who won an Oscar for his "On the Waterfront" script, wrote the teleplay for tonight's dynamic film.

"A Question of Honor" spins a wonderful web of intrigue and double-dealing that is bound to snare viewers and raise questions about where the proprieties lie in this type of internal police investigation.

Paul Sorvino, as usual, is splendid as the gentleman drug dealer, Carlo Danzie, who becomes the bait that federal agents want to use to hook corrupt cops on the city's narcotics detail. Robert Vaughn and Danny Aiello

are the men in charge of the operation.

Danzie is caught by American agents in Italy. Often, a TV movie will use English, even in foreign countries. But the use of subtitles here reflects that "A Question of Honor" is an intelligent, reality-based film.

Danzie is brought to New York, and the trap is set to catch a crooked cop who is fingered by an informer, played by Tony Roberts. The informer role is similar to the role Williams played in "Prince of the City," but Roberts' character is even more spineless in sacrificing others to save himself.

The entrapment plan goes awry when Gazzara's DeFalco inadvertently makes the arrest. DeFalco won't accept Danzie's money; he's not motivated by payoffs but by a driving ambition for bigger busts. He also won't return Danzie to the federal agents, thus jeopardizing the scam operation.

The ruthless Frederick Walker (Vaughn) vows to punish him. Walker has Danzie continually tempt DeFalco in the hopes that the federal agents can get leverage on DeFalco and make him turn police informer. Meanwhile, DeFalco places his faith in Danzie to lead him to a multimillion dollar drug deal.

It's a thrilling cat-and-mouse game, one heightened by Sorvino's suave performance and Gazzara's gritty strength. Even the obligatory domestic scenes with the single-minded DeFalco and his neglected family aren't intrusive. In fact, these situations humanize DeFalco and help us understand the intense sense of honor that motivates him.

It's a deeply disturbing film that provides a different look at the corruption-busters who, according to this movie, grab big headlines on the backs of some good people.

Cinema Verite Is Reintroduced

NEW YORK (UPI) — It's been said that a prophet is not without honor, "save in his own country." Ask Robert L. Drew. He didn't even get to name the film technique he invented. He had to wait to introduce it all over again to some of the network moguls who snubbed it the first time around.

Cinema Verite, in loose translation from the French, means "real movie," and until Drew came along, there wasn't very much of that. In his hands, for the first time, the camera became an extension of the viewer, exploring the world without manipulation by actors or the distraction of human voices struggling to explain what the viewer was seeing.

It was bold, innovative and therefore suspect in the circles of American network television.

"When we made our first films," said Drew, "we showed them to our friends at the nets and a friend of mine at CBS said, 'You've got some good footage there.' But he just didn't see it because there wasn't a correspondent.

"So we took it to Europe

and it was a bombshell! For a while, Paris was the place where our stuff was appreciated before it ever got on the air here, and back came the word 'Cinema Verite.'

"I've never claimed Cinema Verite is the absolute truth, but I thought it wasn't a bad term in the sense that anything that gets the viewer closer to reality has probably got the chance of being truer."

With all three networks betting their Nielsen ratings on expansion of news programming — especially in the area of the documentary — Drew said Cinema Verite finally is going to come into its own in the United States.

"The whole idea of Cinema Verite is that you go out and get what's really happening, and by doing it in a sensitive way you can get more drama and more character," he said.

"So Cinema Verite, which looks like an oddity because you don't see much of it and because half or more of it is badly done, has the answer for a lot of the big news questions that are coming up."

power — the original power — and that's not phony. That's the real thing.

"If you have a really strong story going and strong things are happening and you've got a dramatic logic going and you go to a correspondent and start talking, you kill. You kill!

"Good Cinema Verite is like looking at movies. You're there, seeing for yourself, looking through characters, looking into characters. Characters change. Things happen. And that's the way I think good reporting has to go."

Drew, whose Drew Associates created such award-winning Cinema Verite classics in the early 1960s as "Primary," "On the Pole," and "The Children Were Watching," has not been content to watch while others perfect his technique in Europe.

He has just finished a video tape documentary of "work, conscience and murder" among the young in California and his wife, Anne

Drew, has just finished a film on Indira Gandhi.

But it is his 10th anniversary Watergate special, to be syndicated in every major national market in mid-June, that most excites Drew. Watergate, he said, is made for Cinema Verite.

"When we collapse that story into two hours, the drama will be powerful," he said. "We've got all the stock footage and we're shooting interviews with some of the

Drew would be the last to say that all those high-priced anchormen and on-the-scene correspondents who grin us through the news every evening must go. In fact, he said Cinema Verite works only where they do not.

"The nightly newscast has to stay just about the way it is," he said. "It's got to be a succession of items and those things have to be presented in word logic, so you need a correspondent. You'd have to invent him if you didn't have him.

"But where everything goes haywire is when you put the correspondent into and on top of a documentary that is a one-hour special... Imagine Dan Rather standing up in the middle of a good movie to tell you what's going on. He would just be lousing things up, right?"

Drew called the network penchant for "sticking a correspondent with a mike in his hand" in front of a bombed-out hotel in Lebanon "a phony element."

"What's real is that hotel behind him," he said. "Now if you go in and take pictures of the corridors of the hotel and those things speak for themselves in some way, then you can generate a real

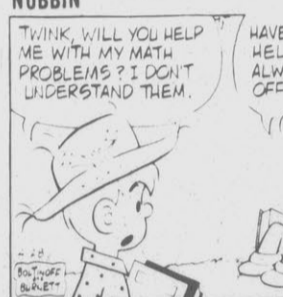

Repeat Offenders 'In Trouble'

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—
Jackson Monroe Martin slumped in his chair and stared at the floor. He couldn't believe he had been sentenced to 99 years in jail for indecent exposure.

"I don't think it's right for me to get that much time for that kind of crime," said Martin, whose 11 prior convictions for burglary enabled the prosecutor to ask for the long sentence.

"Maybe a fine and 30 days, or even a year in the county jail. But not 99 years!" the 42-year-old man complained at his sentencing hearing.

"People are just tired of crime," said Ron Stubbiefield, the district attorney

in Bryan County, Okla., where Martin received his long sentence. "And they want the repeat offenders off the streets."

Throughout the country, prosecutors are increasingly using habitual criminal codes to seek longer terms.

The stiffer punishment depends on the crime, but can range from the sentence for the next higher class offense—in South Dakota—to life without parole—in Louisiana and Arkansas.

Maine and Pennsylvania are the only states without laws or pending legislation for habitual or repeat offenders, according to a recent Justice Department study done at American University in Washington.

In Ohio, a measure by state Rep. Edward J. Orlett of Dayton calling for mandatory sentencing for some felonies unanimously cleared the state House earlier this month.

The proposed law would require judges to impose an "actual incarceration" period ranging from three to nine years on career criminals.

"Society has a right to protect itself against criminals for a specified period of time," said Orlett, who noted the bill is "the first major change in a decade in the state's criminal sentencing law."

Some law enforcement officials contend early releases by parole boards take the muscle out of prison sentences.

"One reason for the increase in the use of the habitual criminal statute is that there was a realization that a 20-year sentence didn't mean 20 years," said Pete Adams, president of the Louisiana District Attorneys Association.

"It's a better bet to put them away, these people who are constantly costing the taxpayers money. People are realizing rehabilitation is not working. The answer is long sentences."

In 29 states, the habitual criminal charge can be considered on the second felony, according to a study by the Rand Corp. Nineteen states consider the charge upon a third offense, two states consider it on the fourth and three states have increased penalties for the fifth conviction.

Another study by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency indicates that at least 17 states have enacted or have introduced within the past five years legislation directed toward getting career criminals off the streets.

U.S. Sen. Arlen Specter, who was a district attorney in Philadelphia for eight years, has sponsored a bill that would make a third armed robbery or armed burglary conviction a federal offense punishable by at

least 15 years in prison.

A study by the senator's staff revealed that robbers serve an average of three years behind bars, and a robber with prior convictions serves an average of only 3½ years.

Research based on interviews after arrest revealed professional lawbreakers individually commit 50-100 robberies or 200-400 burglaries a year, said Paul Michele, a spokesman for the Pennsylvania Republican.

Furthermore, 6 percent of those arrested for robbery and burglary commit 60 percent of those crimes, Michele added.

"These people are one-man crime waves," he said.

In Oklahoma, the Legislature this month approved a bill requiring a three-time armed robber be sentenced to a mandatory 10 years imprisonment.

Other approaches to putting away the career criminal also are being considered. David Armstrong, president of the National Association of District Attorneys, advocates truth in sentencing, in which 20 years means 20 years.

"The sentencing phase of a criminal trial has become a charade," Armstrong said from his Louisville, Ky., office.

"The habitual criminal law is a fair concept," Adams said from Baton Rouge, La. "Judges and district at-

torneys still maintain a fair amount of discretion in deciding whether or not there is any chance to rehabilitate this man or if the smartest thing to do is to put him away."

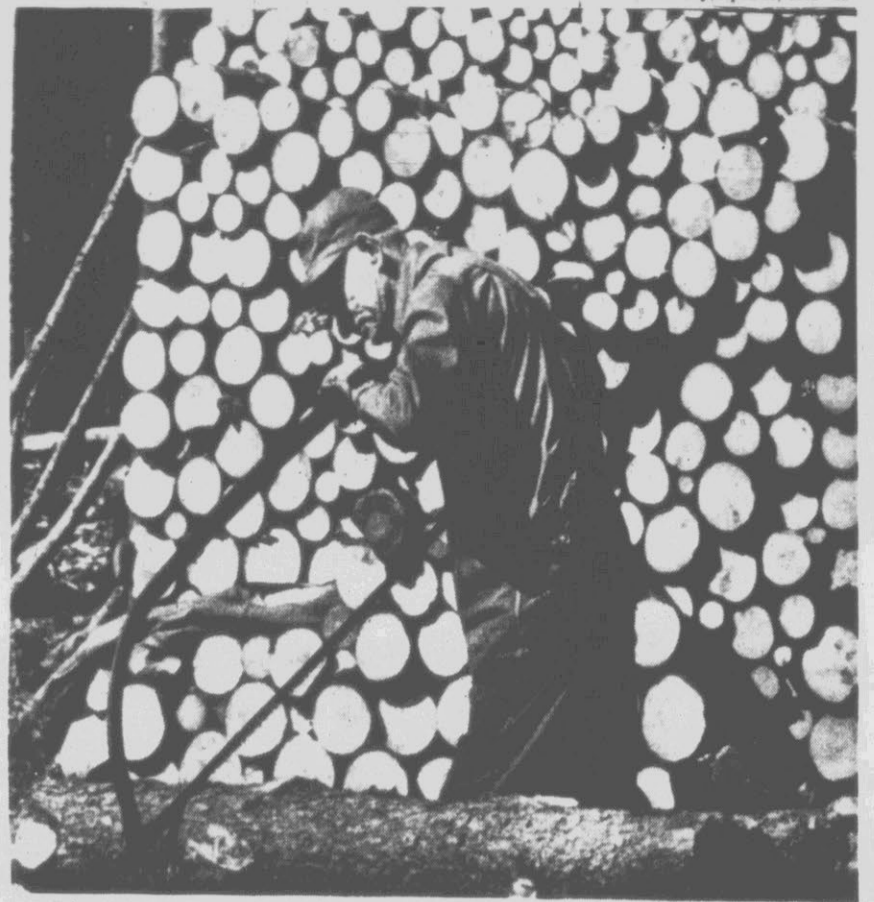
However, the prosecutors disagree on whether stiffer sentences actually prevent crime.

"I can't say it's a deterrent because we're trying to take these people off the streets," Adams said. "Instead, we should say with these people off the streets, more people are not encouraged to commit crimes."

Others say it's too early to make conclusions about the effect of the law.

"It's an evolutionary process," said Tony Burns, district attorney in Duncan, Okla., where a jury last year handed down the county's first death sentence in half a century for a triple murder conviction. "It'll be years before they'll think twice about committing a crime."

"But criminals are coming to understand that they have a better chance with appeals courts and parole boards than in state courts," he said.

Newsprint Price Boost Delayed

Major newsprint producers in Canada and the United States have delayed a 5 percent price increase to their U.S. customers until June 1, and analysts say the price hike could be deferred even longer if publishers do not start depleting supplies.

In eastern Canada, a spokeswoman for Consolidated-Bathurst Inc. of Montreal confirmed Monday the company's planned \$25 increase for U.S. customers to \$525 (U.S.) a metric ton had been delayed from March 1 to June 1. Prices to Canadian customers were increased as scheduled, however, to \$540 (Canadian) a metric ton.

A metric ton equals 2,204 pounds.

Last month, Consolidated-Bathurst said its price increase to U.S. customers had taken effect, as scheduled, on March 1. But president Oscar Stangland said at the time the company was providing discounts to some customers.

Industry sources said Toronto-based Abitibi-Price Inc. — the world's largest newsprint producer — had deferred a similar increase until June 1, but company officials did not return calls Monday.

Spokesmen for Reed Paper Ltd. of Toronto and Great Lakes Forest Products Ltd. of Thunder Bay, Ontario, said the companies had put off their price increases to U.S. customers until June 1.

"When Abitibi-Price deferred until June 1, that had

such a major effect on the marketplace," said Nick Keene, vice president of marketing at Reed Paper. He said "market conditions" and "the actions of our competitors" led to the price deferral.

In the United States, Kimberly-Clark Corp. of Neenah, Wis., and New York-based St. Regis Paper Co., said they had deferred until June 1 a \$25-a-ton increase that had been set to go into effect April 1. A spokesman for International Paper Co. of New York said the company's prices declined to comment on the company's prices.

When Consolidated-Bathurst announced in November that it intended to raise newsprint prices March 1, some pulp-and-paper analysts said they were

surprised the companies would try to increase prices in light of the weak economy and large newsprint inventories now held by American publishers. The other companies followed Consolidated's lead.

According to the American Newspaper Publishers Association, the publishers had a 58-day supply of newsprint on hand at the end of March.

Ed Dunleavy, an analyst who follows the industry for the investment firm Salomon Brothers Inc., said the supply would have to be reduced to 35 days for the price increase to take effect June 1. And only a lengthy strike by eastern Canada paperworkers whose contract expires Friday could deplete the supply by that much.

Czech Economy Sees Darkening Clouds On Horizon

Paralyzed Podiatrist Will Be Aiding Other People To Walk

CHICAGO (AP) — Even Louis M. Lissuzzo admits it's ironic: He's confined to a wheelchair and can't even wiggle his toes, but he plans to help other people walk.

Almost 11 years after a motorcycle accident left his legs paralyzed, Lissuzzo is becoming a doctor of podiatric medicine — a foot doctor.

"It's just a little crazy," Lissuzzo said. "I'm a wheelchair podiatrist who helps people walk. ... But if you want to know something funny — I was a shoe salesman in high school."

He said he'll be a competent doctor.

"We handicapped people do just as well as anyone else," he said. "All you need is your head and hands, not a foot."

Lissuzzo, 29, is scheduled to graduate cum laude from the Illinois College of Podiatric Medicine on May 21, and he has worked at three hospitals in Chicago while in school.

Podiatry is a medical specialty for the treatment and prevention of foot disorders. A doctor of podiatric medicine completes a four-year course of study and is allowed to prescribe drugs and perform minor surgery,

such as removal of corns.

Lissuzzo credited a special wheelchair and encouragement from a paraplegic podiatrist, Thomas Garrison, with helping him complete his studies.

"A terrific guy and a terrific chair," he said. "He helped me, inspired me, keeps me going. And the chair is motorized, goes up and down. I take it around to the various hospitals and haven't had any problems anywhere."

Lissuzzo's paralysis resulted from a 1971 motorcycle accident. "I really don't like to talk about it," he said. "It's irrelevant. I'm a professional now and that's how I want people to see me."

After seven months in the hospital, he began attending a junior college. "I always wanted to be a doctor and no accident was going to get in my way," he said.

Lissuzzo transferred to Loyola University, where he graduated in 1976 with a biology degree. In 1978, he earned a master's degree in biology from Loyola.

That summer, he was ac-

cepted at the podiatric college. He said his friends, his family and his wife, Claudia, 31, a secretary whom he met and married after his accident, share credit for his graduation.

"The people at school pay me one of the best compliments," he said. "They look up to me, even though I'm in the chair. They say, 'You're doing it, we can do it. You're a real inspiration.'"

"It's been a great struggle for him and he's managed to do it, he and Claudia," said his mother, Pauline Lissuzzo, 55. "In the worst weather and everything."

Lissuzzo said he hasn't had any trouble dealing with patients, and his wheelchair enhances his rapport with the people he treats. "It gives us a great starting point, something to talk about. They want to know all about it."

After a Hawaiian vacation, Lissuzzo plans to set up practice in one of Chicago's western suburbs. "The legwork is over," he said. "Now it's time to be a professional."

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Planners in Czechoslovakia's government are wrestling with an economic sluggishness that threatens one of the most prosperous standards of living in the communist world.

Although the Czechs and Slovaks, with an average monthly income equal to about \$270, are still better off than their allies in Poland and Romania, "things are slowly going downhill," said one economist who requested anonymity.

Price increases for gasoline and food in recent months mean fewer people are eating out and taking trips to the country, residents say.

In a popular restaurant a 20-minute drive outside Prague, one waiter said business had dropped by about 70 percent since the government increased the price of gasoline by 15 percent in October.

High-grade gasoline costs the equivalent of about \$3.20 a gallon.

"We had 10 wedding receptions last March. This March we had one," said the waiter.

Judging by the "for sale" ads in some publications, many Prague residents are trying to sell their second homes or looking for something closer to the city.

"Working in my garden in

the country was how I worked off the frustrations" of living in this tightly controlled society, said one Prague resident. "Now it's getting harder to even do that."

Seeds for tulips, hyacinths and climbing beans are said to be among the short-supply items along with staples such as good-quality cheese, pork fat and butter.

Sharp increases in food prices this year included a 41 percent average hike in the price of meat. Beef jumped from the equivalent of \$1.50 a pound to \$2.50.

The price increases for meat were seen as especially significant because Czechoslovakia has one of the world's highest per-capita meat consumption rates.

Much of the belt-tightening stems from the government's determination not to go the way of Poland and Romania, which drove themselves into debt by borrowing for imports.

Western sources put Czechoslovakia's debt to the West at \$3.5 billion, a relatively modest sum, and authorities say no increase in borrowing is planned.

In past years, "we had to import more fodder than was planned," said Zbynek Zima, an adviser in the Government Planning Commission. "We are demanding that agriculture drop its demand for imports."

The nation is trying to

become self-sufficient in grain for food and animal fodder, he added.

Meanwhile, shoppers are lining up and paying more for favored cuts of meat.

A Western businessman who deals in cigarettes and other goods sold in special hard-currency shops said his business was off by about two-thirds in the past year — an indication that the average citizen has less Western money than before.

Even though the shops are ostensibly only for foreigners, Western suppliers say local residents make up the bulk of the market.

The government is also trying to maintain the present level or reduce imports of oil, most of which comes from the Soviet Union.

Although Czechoslovakia pays, by some estimates, only about half the \$34-a-barrel OPEC price for the oil it gets from the Soviets, the price has increased nearly fivefold in the past 10 years and the volume of imports has nearly doubled.

"We had a growth of 85 percent in crude oil consumption over the past 10 years," said Zima. "No economy can sustain a growth of this magnitude."

He cited an ambitious nuclear-energy program that should be producing 20 percent of Czechoslovakia's electrical power by 1985, if all goes according to plan.

That would be about the

same time the current oil pricing agreement with the Soviet Union runs out, leaving the country facing sharply higher prices.

The emphasis is also shifting away from bulk production of chemicals and other goods to more energy-saving production goals, Zima said. This includes granting bigger incentives to energy-saving enterprises.

With investments remaining the same, or even decreasing, the target of 2 percent to 2.6 percent annual growth in the gross national product will have to be achieved mostly by "increased efficiency," said Jan Sakala, another government planner.

"We must economize on imported materials for production, while at the same time satisfying the needs of the population," he said.

But there are signs of uncertainty about exactly how to achieve that. The last five-year plan expired at the end of 1980, and so far no comprehensive new plan has been published. Officials could not say when it was expected.

The lag is "caused by the fact that ... some external conditions have changed" since expiration of the last plan, said Planning Commission spokesman Rudolf Cerny. The planners cited high interest rates in the West, the worldwide slowdown in trade demand and other factors.

Post-Hysterectomy Depression

My mother had a hysterectomy operation done about a year ago. She is 51. She was always a placid woman. Since the operation, however, she is another person. Sometimes she is so depressed that I can barely get her out of her blues. She sometimes snaps at me and my father without the slightest provocation. Can't something be done about this?

—Miss L.R., Va.
Dear Miss R.:

This is not unusual. Many women who seem to be tranquil, well organized, gentle and free from psychological stress react markedly to the removal of the uterus. Those women who have had a history of emotional turbulence are even more prone to overreacting to this type of surgery.

The uterus (womb) has always been a symbol of femininity. When the childbearing function is halted by hysterectomy, it is a threat to the feminine image, especially in a highly sensitive woman.

The fear that the removal of this organ may diminish a woman's attractiveness or sensuality frequently pushes her into a tailspin of anxiety.

Now, in addition to the psychological impact of the operation, there are some very real symptoms that can be annoying and very distressing, especially if the ovaries were also removed at the time of surgery.

The sudden onset of menopause following surgery is frequently associated with increased fatigue, irritability, headaches, hot flushes and episodes of depression. These symptoms are common and are attributed to a hormone imbalance after the ovaries are removed.

When women are carefully prepared for these possible

changes after surgery, the severity of their response is diminished. When, however, these symptoms come as a surprise, the depression that follows can be severe and prolonged. During the immediate postoperative period, the constant support of the family, especially of the husband, is essential.

Since your mother's symptoms have persisted for almost a year, a frank discussion between your father, your mother and her doctor is imperative. Should it be evident that the depressive symptoms are deeply ingrained, a very active approach to the problem must be taken.

There now are a number of excellent and quite remarkable drugs that are specifically aimed at alleviating this kind of depression. The results are often spectacular and when used under proper medical jurisdiction, they can liberate a woman from the depths of misery and help return her to the happiness she deserves.

Far too many people just "wait" for the symptoms of depression to disappear without the help of a psychiatrist or without drugs. The dangers implicit in this approach are great. The advantages of proper treatment are greater.

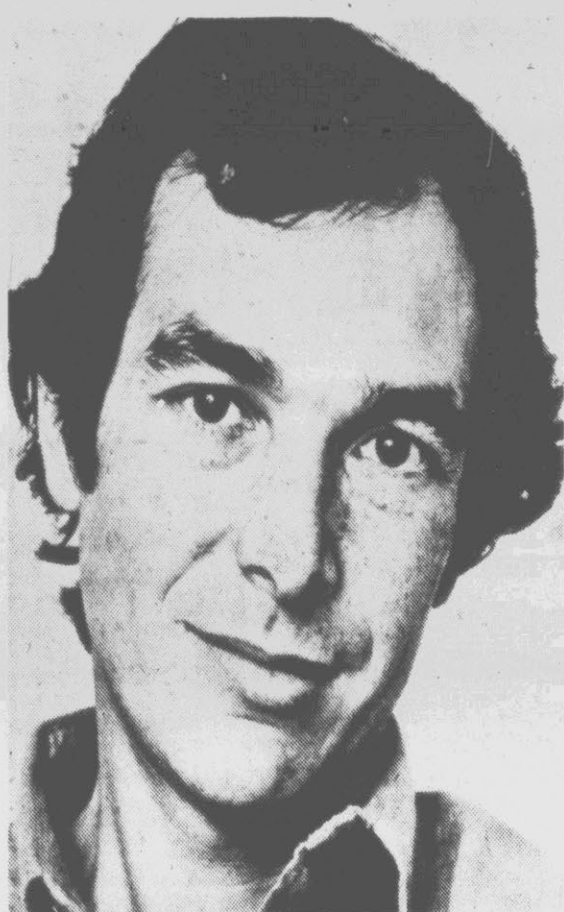

Novel Helped By Critique

NEW YORK (AP) — When Martin Cruz Smith first learned that a Soviet critic had condemned his novel "Gorky Park" as "rubbish" and labeled him "scum," he says, "I became quite irritated. It was so low, so nasty. I was not amused."

Smith viewed the attack as "character assassination." His Soviet emigre friends, however, "were pleased. They told me I was being treated as the best Russian writers were treated."

And the 40-year-old author, whose tale of a Soviet detective investigating a bizarre series of murders has topped both hard- and soft-cover best-seller lists, now laughs. "It is a form of literary criticism new to me, but not to them."

The critique was written by Kirill Senin in the journal of the Soviet Union of Writers, Literaturnaya Gazeta. It begins as a parody of Smith's novel, switching the location from Moscow's Central Park to New York's Central Park and then launches the assault. The review calls the novel "anti-Soviet" and says Smith's portrayal of KGB as well as FBI-CIA corruption "discredits all supporters and friends of detente."

The book has not been translated into Russian, but the British edition seems to be fairly available, especially to students, according to Smith, "many of whom know a good deal of English."

The scathing attack "tells us that someplace books are still important, that Russia's respect for words is stronger than ours," Smith now says, having recovered from the shock of the critique.

"Gorky Park" is an atypical best seller, not just because it is set in the Soviet Union, but because it is not a quick and easy reading novel. The characters are painstakingly well-drawn, the mystery intricate and dependent on an understanding of two ways of life, the American and Soviet.

"Soviet life is more complicated than most people think," Smith says. "There's an enormous amount of corruption in the Soviet Union. If I'd written this about America, no one would have noticed. It's a Soviet fabrication that life is perfect."

And that, Smith maintains, is why the book has found such popularity in the Soviet Union. "It connects with reality and it's about ordinary Russian people. It's a shock of recognition."

All things considered, it's somewhat of a surprise that "Gorky Park" has managed to touch such a tender Soviet nerve.

Smith spent only two weeks in Russia, in 1973. He spoke no Russian and, as with all American tourists, his trip was carefully planned so that he wouldn't see the wrong things.

He did stroll through Gorky Park and managed to figure out the places he wanted in his book. But when he applied to return to Moscow, "telling them what I wanted to do," he was denied a visa. "I did try to give them a chance."

Through a reporter friend, Smith contacted Russian emigres who gave him the inside information he needed to write the book.

Finally, eight years later, the book was published and Smith, who wrote minor mysteries and minor novels to support himself while "trying to get recognized," now is.

Smith's early literary career was not brilliant. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania, then had a few brief stints as a reporter and editor.

He wrote two novels featuring a gypsy hero, then did a series of books with the secret world of the Vatican as their locale.

While doing so, he was working on "Gorky Park," backed only by his wife and agent.

"I always assumed it would be a best seller," Smith now says, smiling. "It's too good a story."

The book is perfect for him, he says, because he sees himself as a "19th-century narrative writer." And the Russians, he says, "are a 19th-century narrative people. They live a narrative life and have a sense of the narrative of life and country. Our lives are broken into daily newscasts."

With "Gorky Park" optioned for the movies, Smith, his wife and children now live in California while he works on his new book, set in New Mexico. Part Indian himself, Smith admits there will be some Indians in the new book, but prefers not to talk about it, saying only it is "more ambitious and more controversial" than "Gorky Park."

Except, of course, it probably won't receive such attention and cause such furor in a place so far away as the Soviet Union. Which, Smith says, is okay by him.

Author Says Followers Are Wrong

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Once a guru of the counterculture and leader of a madcap group of LSD adventurers, author Ken Kesey now farms, coaches wrestling, and considers himself a "solid citizen."

The 46-year-old author of "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" and "Sometimes A Great Notion" says he's been misunderstood by many of the people who thought they were his followers.

"A lot of the long-haired hippie people never understood," he said. "We're as solid citizens as can be. Family types — college educated. I met my wife at junior high."

Although "we still smoke a lot of dope...and wear crazy clothes," he said he feels like "I'm the John Wayne of dope smokers."

Kesey, who led a group of LSD-users on a 1964 trip across the country in a brightly painted school bus — a trip chronicled in Tom Wolfe's "The Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test" — now juggles writing with chores on his 70-acre farm near Springfield, Ore., where he raises cattle, sheep, fowl and trout.

Since his heyday in the 1960s, Kesey has published six issues of a literary magazine, "Spit in the Ocean." A final issue is planned.

But Kesey said it's been difficult to write while farming and raising his children.

"I felt like you can write forever, but you have such a short time to raise a family," he said. "And I think a family is a lot more important than writing."

"It's not that I haven't written. But I haven't gotten a single thread," he said.

"So much of your thoughts and energy needs to go into writing. Writing is like juggling a whole lot of balls — all those ideas, plots and subplots. You can't be distracted by a kid when he comes in and he's got a bloody nose — all the balls fall. And it takes a couple of days to get them all back."

Now that his three oldest children are in college and the youngest is in high school, he believes he can again work on his next novel, he said.

"I've been taking notes for a year. It will be in Alaska — something like 'Great Notion.' I want to do a fishing book and I don't know too much else about it than that."

The former high school and collegiate wrestler who won his class in the 42-50 age group in a recent state tournament coaches wrestling occasionally at Lane Community College. He accepts speaking engagements when he believes the cause warrants it, and he's lobbying for an Oregon law legalizing use of marijuana.

"A lot of the things I did were taken as sarcasm," he said. "But it really wasn't...I gave America my heart."

Kesey said he began using hallucinogens when he was a paid subject for government experiments on LSD, mescaline and other drugs at the Menlo Park, Calif., Veterans Administration hospital.

He organized a smattering of counterculture conferences during the 1970s in Oregon, but isn't anxious to renew his efforts.

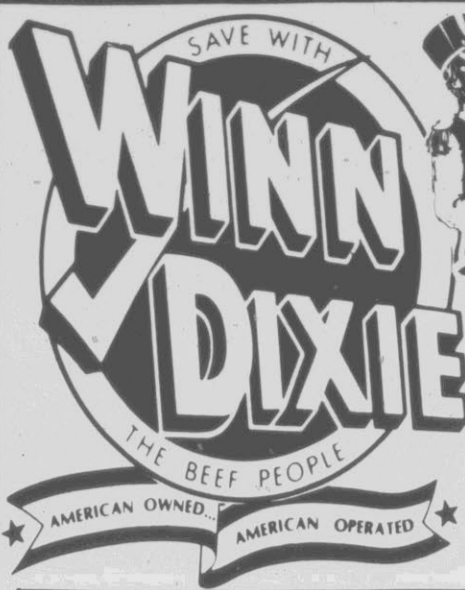
"I'd like to see someone else do it," he said.

Title To The Falklands Long-Talked

LONDON (AP) — Britain has been trying to give the Falkland Islands to Argentina for years, but the pro-British islanders have always blocked the transfer.

Professor J.C.J. Metford of the University of Bristol, a Falklands expert, wrote before the current crisis reached a warlike state that Argentina's best ally "might well be, paradoxically, British officialdom."

"The Falklands were acquired (in 1833) at a time when a base near the Straits of Magellan was essential for naval control of the Pacific coast of South America and the South Atlantic...."

"Strategically, they are no longer important...To the realistic official mind, therefore, the islands are scarcely worth retaining, especially in view of the damaging effect of the dispute on Anglo-Argentine commercial relations."

London began discussing the Argentine claim in 1947 and has repeatedly entertained arguments from Buenos Aires at the negotiating table.

Just five weeks before Argentina invaded the islands April 2, British and Argentine diplomats met in New York on the islands' future.

In 1947 and 1955 Britain offered to hand the dispute over to the International Court of Justice in The Hague, but Argentina refused to go along. Ten years later the U.N. General Assembly passed a resolution urging the two nations to work for a peaceful solution of the dispute.

All efforts devised by the Foreign Office to alter the islands' status were opposed by the 1,800 Falklanders, who are mostly of British descent. In 1968 the Falklanders became so alarmed at rumours of a sell-out that their strong lobby in London addressed an open letter to Parliament declaring they "did not want to become Argentines."

The British Foreign Secretary at the time, Michael Stewart, retreated. "The wishes of the Falkland Islanders are more important than those of either the government of the United Kingdom or that of Argentina," he said.

Even so, sovereignty talks resumed and by 1971 efforts to link the islanders with Argentina had intensified. Air and sea communications with the mainland were established, and educational and medical facilities in Buenos Aires were provided for the Falklanders.

In 1974, Britain and Argentina signed two further agreements on trade, and the Argentine state oil company was allowed to supply the islands. The underlying British plan was to link the Falklands to Argentina so closely that the sovereignty issue would dissipate.

In 1976, a government-backed survey team headed by Lord Shackleton pointed to final transfer of sovereignty to Argentina. Suggestions of offshore oil and gas were tempered by the lack of enthusiasm to invest in the area while the sovereignty issue raged.

In 1980, Foreign Office Minister of State Nicholas Ridley was told to make another try for a settlement. He suggested a joint British-Argentine administration, with sovereignty transferred to Argentina but Britain leasing the islands for 20 to 25 years.

Even if the huge British task force succeeds in recapturing the Falklands from Argentine occupation forces, the ceding of sovereignty in some form will be necessary in any peace settlement.

A commentator in the Sunday Times wrote last weekend:

"The worst thing that could happen in the Falklands would be the sinking of the British fleet. But just about the next worst thing would be for Britain to get the islands back...This must be the first war in history for territory which one combatant wanted — and still wants — to donate to the other."

Moroccans Erect Cities In The Disputed Sahara

EL AAIUN, Morocco (AP) — Safe behind a guerrilla-resistant great wall of Morocco, workmen hurry to build white-washed model

cities in the Sahara, bases for a diplomatic war the wall cannot keep out. "This whole place is a building site," said Mohammed Mounir, one of the legions of Moroccans sent

south to breathe fire into this once somnambulant Spanish colonial capital. El Aaiun is getting schools, hospitals, mosques, a stadium, government buildings and a zoo, along with thousands of little domed houses for slum dwellers. A railroad link to Casablanca is expected by 1984.

Smara, 120 miles west and just inside the new defense perimeter, has its first two-story building: a secondary school. The Beau Geste town of Dakhla, formerly Villa Cisneros, now bustles.

Morocco moved into the Spanish Sahara in 1976 after King Hassan II amassed 350,000 people on the border — the Green March — to press a claim. A second chunk was added in 1979, when Mauritania left.

Saharans who demand independence, the Polisario Front, waged war. With Algeria and Libya supplying Soviet weapons to the guerrillas, and rich phosphate deposits at stake, implications are major.

The 280-mile-long wall — the "berm" — was bulldozed in the rocky sand two years ago to stop hit-and-run Polisario raids. Bristling with dug-in artillery and protected by land mines, it describes a hemisphere around most populated centers in the 120,000-square-mile territory, the size of Colorado.

"If by war you mean control of the useful Western Sahara, Morocco has already won," said a Western military specialist who could not be named. "If you mean until

the last Polisario guy somewhere in Brazil gives up, it could go on forever."

But a subsequent arms race, and the cost of keeping nearly 100,000 men in the disputed territory, drains heavily on an economy already weakened by drought, foreign exchange problems and social unrest.

In six years, perhaps 10,000 men have been killed on both sides.

Last October, guerrillas overran Guelta Zemmur, forcing Moroccan troops to withdraw behind the wall. Five Moroccan aircraft were shot down. Western specialists say the Polisario used SA-6 heat-seeking missiles, among the Soviets' most sophisticated.

Morocco depends on well over a billion dollars a year in Saudi military subsidies. Closer ties with the United States mean moral support but only limited new hardware.

The wall is no final solution. Its fire bases, blends of miniature Crusader castles and Mexican bandit hideouts, have radar that can spot a fox at 20 miles. But the terrain can hide a tank column. In places, the final warning system is a rusty tin can full of pebbles which a forward sentry rattles by pulling a string.

Recently, Polisario leaders have focused on legitimizing their Saharan Arab Democratic Republic which claims the land on both sides of the wall.

"This Polisario business is artificial, concealing a subversive, destabilizing mov-

ement, led by African activists," Moroccan Foreign Minister Mohammed Boucetta charged in an AP interview.

But 26 African nations recognize the Polisario government, and, in January, Organization of African Unity officials accepted it as a member. Morocco and others object, paralyzing the OAU until a solution is found.

Last June, King Hassan offered a referendum, based on a 1974 Spanish census that named 74,500 urban dwellers and nomads in the disputed area.

Polisario leaders count 150,000 Saharans in refugee camps at Tindouf, in southern Algeria, and claim another 750,000 legitimate Saharans live elsewhere.

Morocco says the Polisario is blocking a referendum, in fear of losing. But neutral political analysts suggest Saharans might choose independence, if given a fair choice.

People here don't talk politics. Journalists are kept under a careful, if friendly, eye. But conversations out of official earshot reveal some discontent.

"Things are so-so," allowed a Saharan shopkeeper, speaking in Spanish. "Moroccans now run most stores. Local people have moved out or to the outskirts." He cast a glance around and added: "They've ruined it."

In Smara, a young man also speaking in Spanish, while cutting carrots at the back of a coffee shop: "Most young people have gone."

Asked if many joined the guerrillas, he replied: "Yes. Some."

Asked if he was Moroccan or Saharan — a distinction the government insists does not exist — he said with sudden force: "Saharan." Then, nervous, he went back to his carrots.

"These people just live their lives," explained one veteran observer, who asked anonymity. "They waved the flag for Spain and for Mauritania. They'll wave it for Morocco."

The government takes few chances. Long-distance direct dialing has been put off so operators can listen in, engineers say. Visitors, though told they are in a province like any other, are carefully scrutinized.

Most nomads have moved to towns, along with their goats, and they need military permits to move. The wall keeps out infiltrators but also cuts off traditional flows across the desert.

Morocco spends nearly a billion dollars a year on development and government programs in the Sahara. El Aaiun Gov. Salah Zemrag says there is no special priority.

"This is a simple willingness to do what has not been done before for these victims of colonialism," he told a visitor.

But an influential politician in Rabat put it differently, driving over an unrepaid highway: "These bumps, they're because of the Sahara. That's where our money goes. But it's worth it."

Years Haven't Changed Old Union Leader

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — If anyone thinks old Harry Bridges has mellowed, Harry is here to tell you "stuff it."

The craggy ex-waterfront union leader vows he is still a Marxist, insists capitalism can't work and urges the "working stiffs" of the world to unite.

He is planning a trip to Russia.

Approaching his 81st birthday, Bridges agreed to a rare interview at his modest home on the side of a hill overlooking San Francisco Bay.

Despite his dogmatic pronouncements on what is wrong with the world, and despite the fact his health is failing, Bridges said he is an optimist.

"Every day that goes by right now, this world is a better place. There is better education, better health, better housing every single day.

"And that doesn't mean we are living in a paradise. We've got plenty of problems. In Africa people are starving. Nevertheless, the world looks good to me."

When Bridges retired five years ago after 40 years as president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, shipping executives and public officials celebrated him as a "labor statesman."

One lawyer who often sat opposite him at the bargaining table declared that Bridges was not a Marxist at all but "in reality an American capitalist" who merely enjoyed stirring up public controversy.

"I'm sorry. We are good friends. But he is just wrong," Bridges told UPI.

When he speaks intensely, still with a tinge of the accent of native Australia, the words do not come out fast enough. He skips some.

"I know, old age, retired, respectable. I understand. But the basic thing, what I'm telling you right now, is still there. My thinking, my philosophy is still Marxist philosophy. And, again, I can't see any future for the world, especially for world peace, without following that philosophy."

Asked about the present state of the labor movement in the United States, Bridges said:

"I know what you are saying. It looks like it's not doing its job. It's shot to hell and so forth. My answer to that is the labor movement, with all its weaknesses — and I have some severe disagreements with its leadership and its policies — nevertheless, there's no other way, there's no other group, as far as I am concerned, that could have my faith for the future, for the welfare, for the better future of the workers, plus all of the people of this country."

He said the problems of unemployment and inflation are "incurable under our system... They are the sort of things that go into our social,

economic and political system... They can't be cured under our system."

He said in the Soviet Union "unemployment doesn't exist" and people don't know what inflation means. "I had a helluva time explaining what inflation means. They couldn't grasp it."

But in collective bargaining Bridges never let Marxist ideology stand in the way of a practical settlement with capitalism.

"Certain things can be done," he said, "certain reforms."

Conditions are better, Bridges said, than when he came from Australia in 1920 and the ship he was working on was laid up in Boston.

"They were selling people on the Boston Common," he said. "It wasn't a publicity stunt. It was just before Christmas. The postwar depression was on. They were selling people for one year's room and board."

Already a radical organizer among seamen on his ship, Bridges learned that the industries around Boston, mainly shoe manufacturing, textiles and electric goods, were demanding that the unions grant concessions, or else the industries would move south for cheaper labor.

"That puzzled me. How in hell can you negotiate a wage cut? At that time you didn't have to worry about such things as pensions and welfare. It was strictly wages and hours."

He said the unions "conceded to all these things then. But, two years later the companies said, 'Sorry, we're closing up anyway.'"

The situation of American unions like the auto workers now may be more complex, he conceded.

"It's easy to say. I'm just wondering what I'd do if I were up against this, with hundreds and thousands of layoffs... I'm not going to be too critical because I'm not in there to make the decision."

One matter he is in no way in doubt about is the effort of some unions to seek a role in management. "It's a phony program. I've got no time for that. What is this? Trying to join the boss."

Once Paid For Escalator-Use

FARMINGTON, Conn. (AP) — Escalators might be considered a good travel bargain since they cost nothing to ride on, but Shanghai shoppers once actually paid to do so, according to researchers for a lift maker.

In the early 1900s, when Otis Elevator installed Shanghai's first escalator in the Sun department store, customers were so amazed by the "moving stairs," the police had difficulty in controlling the crowds who wanted to set foot on them.

Many shoppers readily paid 30 cents, redeemable in store merchandise, for a ride on the then-unique people mover.

Minor Burn Can Be Serious

WASHINGTON (AP) — What causes most burns?

The Red Cross says the most common causes of burns include carelessness with matches and lighted cigarettes, scalds from hot liquids, defective equipment, and the use of open fires.

The severity of a burn is determined by its depth and its extent. A minor burn covering a large part of the body can be more serious than a deep burn of only a small area.

Millions Turn To Sunglasses

Collector Eyes Bricks As Rare Pieces Of History

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn. (AP) — Basil Saffer has spent 18 years collecting bricks, and although he admits others might see little glamor in the clay blocks, he is fascinated by the building material of Nero and Nebuchadnezzar.

"Every brick is a piece of history," said the 63-year-old soft-spoken Englishman.

Saffer is curator of General Shale Corp.'s Museum of Ancient Brick, a 200-piece collection housed a stone's throw away from the corporate offices of one of America's largest brick manufacturing companies.

Saffer said he has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars and logged 80,000 miles traveling around the world collecting samples that include two of the oldest bricks known to man — 10,000-year-old rounded blocks of sun-dried clay from Jericho.

"I guess brick really is a mundane thing. How often do you stop to think about a brick?" he said. "Really, it's a romantic subject once you get into it."

The collection, displayed like priceless gems, includes bricks from ancient Egyptian tombs and an unfinished palace of the Roman Emperor Nero; bricks made by Alexander the Great's soldiers and the subjects of Biblical kings Solomon, David and Nebuchadnezzar.

"We will not put anything on display that we cannot verify," Saffer said. "If we're doubtful about the date, I won't include it in the collection."

Last December, China gave the museum a rare,

inscribed block from the Great Wall — the first such brick the government had allowed out of that country since the communist revolution.

The inscription says the block was laid in 1584, during the 12th year of the reign of Ming Emperor Wan Li, Saffer said.

The collection also includes bricks from America's past: used as ballast on the Mayflower and later laid into a foundation at Plymouth Colony; bricks from George Washington's Virginia birthplace, the original White House and Jefferson Davis' Montgomery, Ala., home.

There's a brick from the Springfield, Ill., law office where Abraham Lincoln began his career, and one from the Virginia farmhouse where his fugitive assassin, John Wilkes Booth, died in an Army ambush.

The museum was the brainchild of George C. Sells, who decided in 1964 that someone should study and preserve his industry's history.

He gave the task to Saffer, a former British merchant sailor, world traveler and self-taught archaeologist who was then General Shale's marketing director.

"George told me, 'I don't care where you have to go or what you have to do, but I want that museum,'" Saffer said.

Traveling by boat, car, foot and camel to archaeological digs and ancient ruins, he has built the collection brick-by-brick.

Many countries are represented in the collection. Greece was the only country to refuse Saffer's requests.

"Greece I'm just ignoring," he said. "I want them to be conspicuous by their absence," he said.

With the help of some prominent archaeologists, Saffer said he has thoroughly studied each brick's history

and construction. "Apparently I'm the only brickologist in existence, so my archaeologist friends tell

me. Nobody else studies just brick," he said. General Shale has spent hundreds of thousands of

dollars on the collection, Saffer said, but it would be hard to estimate the value of the museum.

"If you tried to put it in dollars, I don't know," he said. "So many of them are irreplaceable."

Synfuels Plant Will Get Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has decided not to pull the financial plug on a company building a multibillion-dollar synthetic fuels plant in Colorado.

But the federal Synthetic Fuels Corp. is requiring more guarantees from Tosco Corp. that taxpayer won't lose money in constructing a facility to produce synthetic crude oil.

The corporation had debated for the past month whether to cancel Tosco's \$1.1 billion federal loan guarantee, one of the largest ever issued by the government. By comparison, the loan guarantee for Chrysler Corp. was \$1.2 billion.

The corporation was concerned about projected sharp construction cost overruns. When Tosco was awarded the subsidy, it estimated the plant near Parachute, Colo., would cost \$3.2 billion. However, Exxon, Tosco's partner in the venture, now says the plant may cost up to \$5 billion.

Tosco has disputed Exxon's \$5 billion estimate, saying that was a preliminary planning figure and the plant

should cost less than \$4 billion.

The Synthetic Fuels Corp. board of directors held a closed two-hour meeting Monday by telephone conference call at which it hammered out an agreement continuing the loan guarantee.

The resolution says Tosco will be required to pay back any loan guarantee funds it withdraws between now and the end of the year if the corporation decides the loan guarantee should not have been made. So far, Tosco has drawn down about \$78 million of the \$1.1 billion guarantee.

To raise the money to pay back the government advances Tosco could be required to sell off part of its share to Exxon, which already owns 60 percent of the Colony oil shale project. Exxon is not asking for any government aid for its share of the plant.

Under the board resolution, both Tosco and Exxon must meet deadlines to submit better cost estimates to the government and Tosco must supply other guarantees to protect taxpayer money.
