Preparing For Turn To Natural Gas Fuel

Greenville Utilities Commission board members Tuesday night approved the purchase of compressors and conversion units which will enable 31 GUC vehicles to use compressed natural gas as a motor fuel.

The commission awarded the conversion contract for the CNG equipment to Phillips Energy Corp., which submitted a bid of \$86,041.

Studies have shown that by converting all of GUC's 65 vehicles to CNG use, the commission could save as much as \$30,000 a year when compared to the use of gasoline. In addition, the purchase of natural gas by each of the commission's operating departments will increase GUC gas department revenues.

The converted vehicles will be able to use gasoline as a back-up fuel simply by pulling a switch.

The idea of using fuel other than gasoline to power GUC vehicles is not new. A number of commission trucks have been operating on liquefied petroleum gas for a number of years.

Commissioners also voted to place a \$278,448 reimbursement of dues from the N.C. Eastern Municipal Power Agency into a sewer capital reserve fund.

Monies in the fund, created several months ago by the city and the commission, are to be used to help fund construction of the proposed new wastewater treatment plant.

The refund of dues from the power agency resulted from a vote of power agency members to reimburse all dues paid by member cities over the past few years from proceeds of a \$400 million bond sale. The bonds were sold in April to fund the purchase of approximately 20 megawatts of generating capacity (15 MG nuclear and 5 MW coal-fired) from Carolina Power and Light Co.

By purchasing the CP&L generating capacity, the power agency will act as the wholesale supplier for member cities such as Greenville, and should result in lower rates to the municipally owned utility customers than would be available from privately owned utilities such as CP&L or Virginia Electric and Power Co.

In other action Tuesday night, commissioners approved the purchase of eight padmount transformers from low-bidder Mill-Power Supply Co. for a total purchase price of \$36,590.

Board members tabled action until next month on a request by Alert Cable TV Inc. for an agreement to attach its lines to GUC poles.

Alert Cable, of Goldsboro, provides cable television service to the Farmville area and by using existing GUC poles would extend service toward Greenville.

Greenville Cable TV, which has an exclusive franchise within the Greenville city limits, uses GUC poles for its cable and other facilities and pays \$5 per pole attachment per year.

In a workshop-type session following the regular meeting, commission members rejected a proposal to include the purchase of a \$25,000 infrared scanner in the proposed 1982-83 fiscal year budget.

GUC Director Charles Horne told commissioners that the unit would be used to scan the electrical system to detect potential major problems which could lead to disruption of service to customers. He also said some revenue could be generated by providing similar service to industrial customers and energy service (the detection of heat loss areas) for residential, commercial and industrial customers.

Horne added that ownership of the unit would eliminate the need for contracting outside infrared scanning services for electrical system maintenance.

Prior to Tuesday night's meeting, commission members, along with members of the City Council, toured various GUC facilities, including the new water treatment plant under construction off the Old River Road behind Pitt-Greenville Airport.

Twister Hit Big Air Base

ALTUS, Okla. (AP) — A tornado that whipped through Altus Air Force Base and killed two people in a nearby mobile home has caused at least \$1 million damage to two giant C-5A cargo planes and other facilities at the base, officials say.

The funnel cloud — one of 30 that darted through Jackson County in far southwestern Oklahoma about 6 p.m. Tuesday — killed 4-year-old Susan Michelle Cook and Rhonda Price, 25, in Friendship, a town of 300 people about eight miles northeast of Altus.

At least 31 people suffered injuries related to the storm, Highway Patrol and Civil Defense officials said.

Six tornadoes touched down near Altus, including the one that plowed into the base where pilots are trained to fly the cargo planes, the Highway Patrol said.

Winds from the storm tore the roofs off four barracks, damaged two C-5As and their hangars and destroyed the base service station, said Staff Sgt. James Harper, base public affairs officer.

Tornadoes were also sighted in the Texas Panhandle, north-central Kansas and south-central Nebraska. Baseball-sized hail was reported at Hitchland, Texas.

One twister hit the West Texas town of Seminole early today, causing extensive damage to the business district and residential areas and injuring 15 to 20 people, authorities said.

"We don't know how bad it really was," said Gaines County jailer Dale Compton. "We're just trying to look for injured people."

Seminole, a city of 6,000 people, is located southwest of Lubbock near the New Mexico border.

The National Weather Service said 2 inches of rain fell at Sedalia, Mo., while 1 inch was recorded in Moberly in one hour. Minor flooding was reported in some areas.

An Oklahoma Highway Patrol spokesman said a \$1 million damage estimate would be "very, very conservative" since the two planes are valued at \$80 million. The planes, the largest in the Air Force's fleet, were damaged when the high winds tossed them together.

In Friendship, where damage was estimated at at least \$1 million, 25 houses or mobile homes were damaged, the patrol said.

Six people were admitted to Jackson Memorial Hospital after the twister hit Friendship. One of the victims remained in intensive care early today. Seven other people were treated for injuries and released from the hospital.

Sgt. Martin Rosenberger, an Altus Air Force Base Hospital spokesman, said one person was in stable condition after being treated for abdominal injuries, and 17 other people were treated for minor injuries.

Reports 'Some Progress' In UN Peace Bargaining

British Foreign Secretary Francis Pym said today that "some progress" had been made in talks at the United Nations to settle the Falkland Islands crisis but that "many difficult problems remain."

He spoke after a Cabinet meeting in London but did not elaborate.

At the United Nations, Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar said he was "very glad" to hear of Pym's remarks. "I want everybody to be optimistic. But as far as I am concerned I am very cautious. I think we have to work at least for a couple of days."

Asked when the two sides would be ready to shift from indirect negotiations to direct talks on the future of the Falklands, he said: "We might end our exercise by the end of the week — I hope."

Argentina made new proposals at U.N. headquarters Tuesday, and Britain's representative said they were "very interesting" but would take "a few more days" for assessment.

Meanwhile, no new military action was reported in the South Atlantic. Britain claimed its battle fleet has a stranglehold on the islands 250 miles east of the Argentine coast and has isolated the estimated 9,000 troops occupying them. An Argentine naval source said the British claim was "ridiculous."

After a fifth day of talks Tuesday at the United Nations, diplomats reported some progress toward an agreement to call a cease-fire and resume negotiations on the future of the disputed islands. But the possibility of a British assault on the Falklands still loomed.

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher told the House of Commons that "the fact we are negotiating does not close off any military options at all."

British sources predicted the critical point in the talks could be reached by Thursday. But British ministers have denied

speculation that the government has set a deadline for agreement in the talks at U.N. headquarters.

One deadline of a sort was set, however. Cardinal Basil Hume, the Roman Catholic archbishop of Westminster, announced that Pope John Paul II's visit to Britain starting May 28 would be cancelled unless "military hostilities ... cease or be on the way to coming to an end by the middle of next week."

The visit would be the first in history by a pope to Britain. The content of Argentina's new proposals could not be learned immediately. But Perez de Cuellar said he was "rather encouraged," and believed the talks were "on the right course."

He said, however, he needed another "couple of days for achieving practical results."

"There have been some very interesting propositions that have come forward from the secretary-general," said British Ambassador Sir Anthony Parsons. "We'll go now and digest them. We need a little more time ... a few more days."

An Argentine Foreign Ministry official in Buenos Aires said there had been "a change of attitude but not of basic position" on the issue of Argentina's sovereignty over the Falklands.

The official, who requested anonymity, said full British recognition of Argentine sovereignty "is not absolutely necessary," but "at the end of any negotiations, we must be exercising sovereignty."

Argentine insistence on recognition of its claim to sovereignty over the 149-year-old British colony it seized April 2 has been a major stumbling block to the effort to arrange a military truce and get negotiations started.

In negotiations in recent years, the British have in effect recognized Argentina's claim to the islands but have been insisting that the 1,800 islanders must agree. The Falklanders, most of whom are of British descent, have refused. But British spokesmen have abandoned the earlier stand that the islanders' wishes must be "paramount."

British correspondents with the task force in the Falklands reported senior officers said the Argentine ship attacked early Tuesday sent a fireball into the sky when it blew up, and the size of the explosion indicated it was a tanker.

Peter Archer of Press Association, the domestic British news agency, said the frigate Alacrity spotted the ship in the southern approaches of the Falkland Sound, the five-mile-wide channel between the two Falkland islands, and challenged it.

When the ship tried to escape, the frigate opened fire with its 4.5-inch guns, Archer said.

Other British said it was unlikely there were any survivors.

More reinforcements for the British force were sailing from Britain today. The 3,000 troops of the crack 5th Infantry Brigade went aboard the requisitioned luxury liner Queen Elizabeth 2. The 67,000-ton liner's swimming pools and her bow were covered with two helicopter pads to accommodate Sea King choppers that carry 22 fully-armed troops.

Asserts Son Deteriorated

WASHINGTON (AP) — John W. Hinckley Jr.'s father testified today that his son's mental condition began deteriorating in 1978, more than three years before the 26-year-old college dropout admits he shot President Reagan.

John W. Hinckley Sr., a wealthy Denver oil executive, told a federal jury at his son's trial that "1977 was the last year he was able to cope with his life."

The elder Hinckley said his son could find no direction in his life, that he dropped out of Texas Tech University numerous times, and kept moving from Texas to Colorado to California.

Starting in 1978, the father testified, Hinckley "started having several illnesses. One after another, they moved all over his body."

While at Texas Tech in early 1978, he said, his son complained of problems with his ears, throat, arms, legs and tonsils while receiving medication for stress and depression.

As the defendant's father spoke in a steady, deep voice, his wife JoAnn, who spent two emotional days on the witness stand last week, left the courtroom and sat alone on a wooden chair in a corridor outside.

The elder Hinckley said John "just seemed to be so unsettled. He didn't seem to know what he wanted to do. He didn't stick with anything

very long."

John Jr. is the youngest of the Hinckleys' three children. "We tried to treat them all equally. We loved them all equally," the father said.

Before the father took the stand, his daughter, Diane Hinckley Sims, testified under government cross-examination that she did not actually see John Jr. in the three months before Reagan was shot on March 30, 1981, a period when she says she was worried about her brother's depression.

Mrs. Sims, who three weeks before the attempted assassination agreed with her brother Scott that John should be hospitalized, said today she last saw John during the Christmas season in 1980.

During her testimony Tuesday, she told jurors that Hinckley appeared extremely depressed by Christmas 1980, when she saw him at their parents' home in Evergreen, Colo.

Prosecutor Robert R. Chapman asked Mrs. Sims under cross-examination if she "advised the FBI that John appeared to be basically normal" during the 1980 Christmas holiday.

"I don't recall saying that word," she replied.

During the last three months before the shooting, she said she talked with John on the telephone twice.

City Manager List Checked

The initial review of some 135 applications for the post of Greenville city manager has been concluded by the City Council's search committee and the candidate list has been pared, according to committee chairman Louis Clark.

Clark said today that the committee is now "carefully checking out references and other information sources" regarding the remaining candidates and it hopes that by the middle of June to have narrowed the list "down to a select five and no more than 10 to be invited in for personal interviews."

Clark said that, while the interview process could take as much as five to 10 weeks, the committee feels "no sense of urgency to replace

Gail (Meeks, who is serving as interim city manager). No one is pushing because Gail is doing such a super job."

The chairman, who is serving with council members Janice Buck and Stuart Shinn, said the committee is looking at "probably July or August" before a candidate is submitted to the council for consideration.

Clark mentioned that the 135 applications came from as far away as Alaska, the state of Washington, Las Vegas and Mississippi, as well as Florida and New Jersey and "everything in between."

Mrs. Meeks is filling the post vacated by Ed Wyatt, who left Feb. 28 to assume duties as city manager of Fairfax, Va.

Homemaker's Haven

Tighten Your Purse
Strings With Baking Soda
Call it inflation, recession, or whatever — the fact is, most of us are watching our pennies these days. So instead of loading up on many specialized items, why not turn to one multi-purpose, inexpensive, reliable product that will take care of a number of your cleaning and grooming needs — baking soda. It's a box full of ideas for you, your home, car and pets. Some examples:

-Nonabrasive Cleaner:
Dissolve 4 tablespoons baking soda in 1 quart warm water to clean kitchen counters, refrigerators, rangetops, cutting boards, stainless steel cookware, microwave ovens, coffee makers and other small appliances and no-wax floors. Baking soda deodorizes as it cleans, and it won't scratch the finish — not even the finish on fiberglass. Because it's a natural food product, baking soda is safe to use on surfaces that food will touch.

-Cat Litter Deodorizer:
Cover the bottom of your cat's litter box with baking soda; then add cat litter on top. Baking soda in the cat litter means less frequent changing — it will eliminate odors for days, so litter lasts longer. When it's time to give the litter box a thorough cleaning and deodorizing, use a baking soda solution...then wipe, rinse and dry.

Right To Be Wanted Is Child's Right

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DEAR ABBY: You published my letter last March in which I took issue with your statement, "If the parents cannot agree whether to terminate the pregnancy, the decision should be the mother's because it's her body."

I said, "Pregnancy is not simply the state of a woman's body. It is also the stage in another person's life. The whole issue of abortion is difficult enough when both parents agree, but to deny one parent his share in that decision, just because he doesn't agree with the other parent who by biological accident happens to be in control, is unconscionable." My closing remark was, "After all, you could not claim as your own another person's car parked in your garage."

In your published response you said, "A woman's body is not a garage that can be rented by the week or month."

In a subsequent personal unpublished letter to me you wrote, "Now don't tell me you aren't with the right-lifers. You're certainly not pro-choice!"

Wrong! And right! I am still getting letters of congratulations from pro-lifers, which shows how poorly I expressed myself. However, I am not with the pro-lifers; neither am I with the pro-choicers. I have enormous difficulty with the issue of abortion.

In the case of an unwanted child who would be severely emotionally or physically crippled by child abuse because he wasn't wanted in the first place, I would have to opt for abortion to prevent that kind of suffering. But I cannot take lightly the argument that abortion is murder.

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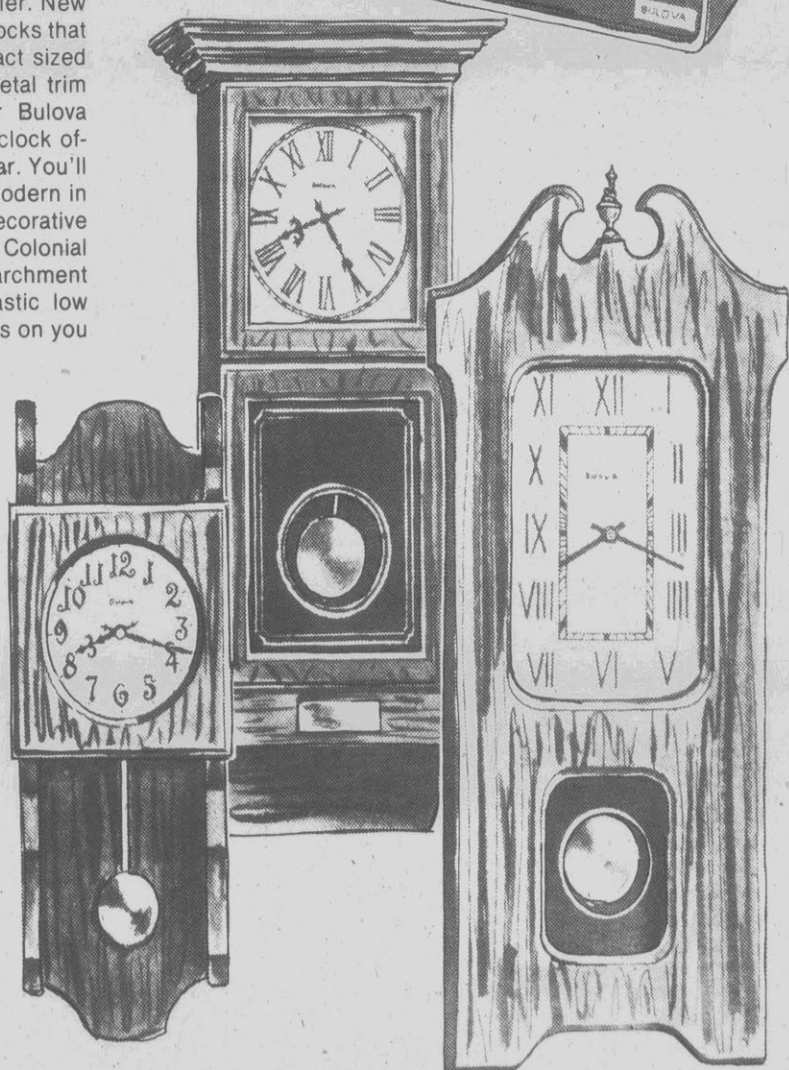
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Learning to Yield

A Miami-based think-tank consultant has raised a few eyebrows with her observations about the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Pat Russian of the Southeast Sex Desegregation Assistance Center was invited to the Greensboro campus by a woman's group to promote equal treatment of its male and female students and faculty. Remember, what is now UNC-G for many decades was Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. It became coeducational in 1964 and today more than 30 percent of its students are male.

Ms. Russian took a look at the campus and studied a 1979-80 report on university life and then told women instructors and administrators that UNC-G teachers have viewed themselves as working for a school that "was marginal and lacked status" because it catered to female students.

We wonder what Jim Ferguson,

who recently retired after 15 years as chancellor and president of UNC-G, thinks about having spent all those years with a "marginal" school. His successor, Chancellor William Moran, observed that Ms. Russian's statements were "somewhat strong."

The sex equity consultant didn't stop with her general observation. She said UNC-G teachers should use the heritage of a women's college to rid male students of the "very false picture they have of how they're going to live in their families later. Men need to be taught to cooperate, to yield, to follow," she said. "How are males going to learn to deal with a situation where their supervisor who's earning \$60,000 a year is a female?"

Instead, Ms. Russian said she had noted a disturbing trend by UNC-G women to allow their male peers to lead. Maybe the cooperation, yielding and following will come later.

Education Needs Support

Gov. Jim Hunt sees reductions in financial aid to college students as undermining the United States' efforts toward economic and technological leadership.

"We need to educate more, not fewer people," he said in a commencement address at Campbell University. "Our nation cannot afford to make drastic cuts in the grants and loans that we make available to college students."

We agree. We simply can't afford

to waste any young person with the ability and the drive to get through college, and as we have seen, investment in higher education pays for itself many times through taxes on the increased earning power of those who graduate.

A well administered federal loan program can sustain itself... and it can keep the United States ahead of other nations in economic and technological development.

Competitive Role

RALEIGH — There is probably no more sacred aspect of North Carolina public policy than industrial recruitment. To a great extent, current hopes for North Carolina's economic future rest on the state's ability to entice out-of-state and foreign industries to create high-paying jobs here.

The state budgets millions each year to employ industrial recruiters and to operate special offices in Germany and Japan. We have a jet helicopter to fly industrial recruits around the state and Gov. Jim Hunt has said he spends as much as one-quarter of his workday in recruitment.

State Labor Commissioner John Brooks, however, thinks the state should set a new course in economic development. In a half-inch thick report prepared by the North Carolina 2000 Commission, Brooks has called for a shift away from industrial recruitment and towards development of more home-grown industry.

Emphasis on industrial recruitment should end, Brooks says, because recruitment has not brought higher wages to the state and because the Sun Belt boom, of which the state has been a part for this century, is coming to an end.

To stay competitive with the many states now seeking new industry, North Carolina would have to make itself

more pro-business with lower taxes for business and lower wages for workers. The alternative would be to lose out to lower-tax states and lower-wage foreign countries.

businesses would leave capital in North Carolina. Instead of profits being

One of the things I can never understand is why learned psychiatrists, who are hired by the government and the defense in a major crime case, can arrive at such different opinions when it comes to the sanity or insanity of a defendant. I asked a defense lawyer why it was impossible for opposing psychiatrists, when testifying, to agree on the mental condition of the accused at the time he committed the crime. "Doesn't it confuse the jury?" I asked. "I guess it does. So, as a

lawyer, I have to be very careful when selecting a shrink that he looks and sounds as if he knows what he's talking about. When you're going for an insanity plea you don't want your ex-

from, what else do you look for in a psychiatrist for the defense?"

"Appearance counts for everything with a jury, so you want your shrink to look more psychiatric than their shrink. I personally prefer one with a beard and glasses so he will remind the jurors of Sigmund Freud. If I can't get a guy with a beard, I'll settle for one that looks like Alan Alda. People believe the medical opinions of an Alan Alda. If my expert has a tweed suit I always ask him to wear it. I don't want my doctor to look too rich, or the jury will suspect he's in the testifying business for the money."

pert to look like a quack."

"Suppose you hire a psychiatrist to examine your client and he decides the person was sane at the time he committed the crime."

"I fire him. Obviously he is not sufficiently qualified to be a defense witness. You waste a lot of money when you hire a psychiatrist with an open mind. I've had cases where five shrinks have examined my client before I could get one to say he was crazy."

"And that was the one you called to the stand?"

"If I called the other four, I could have been sued for malpractice."

"How do you find your medical experts?"

"We have lists of shrinks who believe anyone who commits a major crime is crazy, just as the government has lists of doctors who are willing to testify that anyone involved in one was sane. We don't use their lists and they don't use ours."

"Besides the lists you work

"I imagine the prosecutors prefer their experts to look the same way."

"Yes. Sometimes it's hard for the jurors to distinguish which shrink has testified for the defense and which one was a witness for the state. That's why it's better to have a psychiatrist with a German name, and preferably an accent."

"I always insist that my man testifies in language that will not overwhelm the layperson. But I want him to use enough medical jargon to show he isn't just some doctor who walked in off the street."

"The most important thing of course is that my shrink does not become rattled in cross-examination by the prosecution. I don't want him to lose his cool when they start questioning him about his childhood."

"How do you cross examine the government's psychiatrist?" I asked.

"Ruthlessly. I must make the jury believe the government's expert should never have been granted his medical degree."

"The trick is to trip him up so badly he starts behaving on the stand like Captain

1962 Policy's Teeth Pulled

WASHINGTON — The surprising deletion by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee of key phrases in reaffirming the anti-Cuba resolution passed in 1962 shows how far that key committee has watered down its will and determination despite Fidel Castro's recent inroads into Central America.

The new edition of the 1962 resolution pulls teeth out of the version pushed by President Kennedy, which passed with only one dissenting vote during the Cuban missile crisis. Deleted were the words "including the use of arms" in the resolution's pledge to resist Cuban subversion or aggression.

Conservative anger at the committee's surgery points the Senate to a showdown vote on the Kennedy-era versus the watered-down edition. The White House is moving quietly to make sure the 1962 language gets strong Senate approval on grounds that passage of the committee's text would signal U.S. weakness.

A private letter from William P. Clark, President Reagan's National Security Council assistant, to Sen. Steve Symms, the 1982 sponsor of the 1962 resolution, shows intense presidential interest. Clark wrote Symms April 29 that he "enthusiastically" endorsed Symms' resolution "as an abiding expression of the Reagan administration's policy toward Cuba."

Similar support has come from Defense Under Secretary Fred Ikle, who wrote Symms in late April that his resolution is "important to U.S. policy" and from the State Department. Pentagon lobbying teams have been deployed to help push the 1962 version; Sen. John Tower, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, may tack the amendment to the defense authorization bill now before the Senate.

In the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, a different opinion rules. Voting down the Symms-1962 text, the committee under Sen. Charles B. Percy punched one hole after another in the 1962 language, giving the resolution the appearance of a leaky umbrella. It promises U.S. action not against an "offensive military threat"

but only against one that is "serious."

Equally eye-catching was the committee's curious decision to overrule its own staff and rewrite a section of a companion resolution pledging U.S. support for negotiations in El Salvador. The staff's draft promised U.S. efforts "to reduce the flow of arms into El Salvador."

The committee found those words objectionable and deleted them. The reason: They might be used by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) — or by anti-communist Latin states — as an invitation for covert operations against Cuban-Nicaraguan gun-running.

Indeed, concern over the taint of what Sen. Paul Tsongas called "anti-Castro jingoism" clearly affected both him and other liberal Democrats, including Sens. Claiborne Pell and Christopher Dodd. Tsongas told us: "There's a kind of 'the Russians are coming, the Russians are coming, shrillness in Symms' rhetoric.' That ostensibly led the liberals both to tone down the 1962 Cuba resolution and weaken the mildly-tough talk in the one dealing with El Salvador."

But it is questionable whether so tortured an explanation will suffice in this election year. At the height of former president Carter's strenuous effort to entice Castro out of the Soviet orbit and into the inter-American system, such a dilution of the Cuban resolution might have been politically palatable.

The downward trend since then has hardened suspicions of most American voters about Castro's Cuba. Even apologists for Nicaragua's Sandinista regime now agree it is under the control of Marxists greatly influenced if not totally directed by Moscow and Havana. The Cuban-Nicaraguan effort to unseat El Salvador's anti-communist regime by supporting the pro-Marxist insurgency has been the principal focus of Reagan administration Caribbean policy since the beginning.

Given those circumstances, senators in the Symms camp confidently claim that the 1962 version of the anti-Cuban resolution will be approved by the Senate over the committee's draft. Administration

Some time ago a child was lost in North Dakota. When the word went out that a search party would meet at a certain place, hundreds of people showed up, some even coming in buses from distant points. Then they joined hands and started across the plain looking for the child.

We do not have to go to North Dakota to find lost children. They are in our own community, on our own street, perhaps within our own families. Men and women are constantly losing their children. They break up their homes. They spoil them by

indulgence or alienate them by domination. They give them a false sense of values by putting money and pleasure first. They tell lies — first about little things and then about big things.

What we have to do is avoid the carelessness or indifference which allows children to get lost in the first place. But if they do get lost, we should make our search for them in a moral and loving sense. Then perhaps we can avoid the problem of the searchers in North Dakota. — Elisha Douglass

The Promise Versus Reality

NEW YORK (AP) — In an economy of bizarre inconsistencies there is at least one area of outstanding consistency: forecasts that manage to include a recovery in spite of week after week of bad economic news.

In itself, that split between the expectation and the reality can be viewed as an unusual if not bizarre occurrence, as if hope for the promised economic land seeks to prevail over the grim facts of life.

And it isn't just the president and his supporters who place their faith in the promise over reality, although they of course are the most outspoken. Corporate economists too are playing the same game.

That too can be viewed as inconsistent, because if business really expects a recovery it would seem reasonable to assume it would plan for recovery instead of reducing inventories even more, declining to invest in plant and

equipment, laying off workers and otherwise cutting back.

Throughout those business forecasts is at least one consistent theme that might help explain the apparent contradiction. The consumer, they say almost in unison, will lead the economy up from the pits.

In that case, it can be reasoned, business intends to begin spending and hiring when it gets a sign from the consumer, specifically a sign that the consumer is in a buying mood again. But then you must ask why they should expect him to begin buying again. He is, remember, getting the pink slip. In April, 10,307,000 people were listed as unemployed.

Moreover, many of those who did have jobs weren't really very well off. The savings rate, which had begun to rise, has leveled off again. Many incomes are frozen. And strangely high interest rates have shut millions of people out of the

market, especially for cars and houses.

The forecasts of a second-half recovery, however, seem to reduce the significance of some of these extraordinarily grim bits of news.

To say, as the White House did, that the latest rise in joblessness, by 450,000 in April, was "disappointing" seems to understate the size of the tragedy. Counting those who involuntarily are working reduced hours, and those who have ceased to look, more than 17 million people are involved, and many of them represent one or more others.

The significance of high interest rates also seems to be pulled down by the forecasts. Interest rates have been on the improvement agenda for more than a year now, and still they remain prohibitively high.

Indeed, they remain inconsistently high. Rarely has there been such a spread between the inflation rate and the interest rate; infla-

tion has diminished sharply, but interest rates have not — and might even rise.

It isn't simply that money borrowed at 15 percent is hard to live with, or a nuisance or an inconvenience. More accurately, it is often an absurdity for a manufacturer to borrow money at that rate when he stands very little chance of making a return anywhere near it. Why should he sacrifice himself? Why not just buy someone else's bonds?

True, many recovery forecasts are being toned down by the relentless recession, which might even be worsening. The White House itself has tacitly lowered its sights, and so have many independent supporters.

Still, the recovery forecasts essentially remain in place, although pushed back in the calendar from time to time, and shaved here and there.

In the eyes of some they are a contradiction, but to others, they are a testament to faith in the president.

whisked off to New York or Chicago, the profits would stay right in town to finance other business ventures.

So what is the state's role? First, Brooks says, state government and local business groups can work together to motivate and prepare people for self-employment. Second, the state can help district resources to these people.

Brooks notes that Massachusetts created a resource company that uses contributions from in-state insurance companies to make venture capital loans. Connecticut provides capital to small high-technology firms and then takes a royalty on sales. Pennsylvania gives tax credits to corporations that fund such ventures.

North Carolina already has in place some of the components such a system would need, he says. The non-profit Rural and Community Ventures Corp. could offer managerial, technical and capital-finding assistance to new businesses. He suggests the corporation create a venture finance revolving fund to generate capital for such businesses.

Brooks' plan calls for changes in public school and community college curricula and for creation of local committees to help plan and promote creation of more small industries.

Brooks doesn't see his ideas being adopted overnight. Indeed, his paper raised a good number of snickers within the Hunt administration. But he says the alternative is to follow the course of Northern and Midwestern states who saw their industrial hearts bled off to peripheral areas of the globe.

Tulipomania

Tulip festivals are blossoming all over the world this time of year, from Amsterdam, Holland to Holland, Michigan. These beautiful flowers seem as Dutch as wooden shoes, but actually they are natives of the Mediterranean area and Asia. Not until the 1500s did the first tulips arrive in the Netherlands from Constantinople. They kept their Turkish name — which meant "turban" and referred to the tulip's shape. By 1634 the flowers were so popular that a craze of speculation occurred called "tulipomania." People began buying tulips as investments. Prices soared as high as 13,000 florin (\$5,200) for a single rare bulb. Today a tulipomaniac can choose from over 2,000 varieties, but without having to mortgage the house.

Large Vitamin Doses A Hazard

NEW YORK (UPI) — People who take large supplemental doses of vitamins C, E and A may be doing themselves more harm than good.

In an article in a professional journal, researchers at the University of Nebraska School of Home Economics say clear-cut toxicity syndromes may not be evident in all cases but the extra vitamins are questionable from an efficacy standpoint.

The article in Nutrition Reports International says more than 11 percent of 2,451 people sampled in seven western states said they consumed between 2 and 8 grams of vitamin C daily, a potentially harmful level. Eight swallowed more than 8 grams a day, a distinctly harmful level, the article says.

Very large doses of vitamin C can cause serious problems, ranging from diarrhea to a tendency for cystitis or oxalate stone formation in the urinary tract, the researchers said.

SUGGESTS A 'DISEASE' MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Doctors should be able to cure or reduce drug addiction in the near future, American researcher Roger Guillemin says. He reported his current studies indicate drug addiction is a disease.

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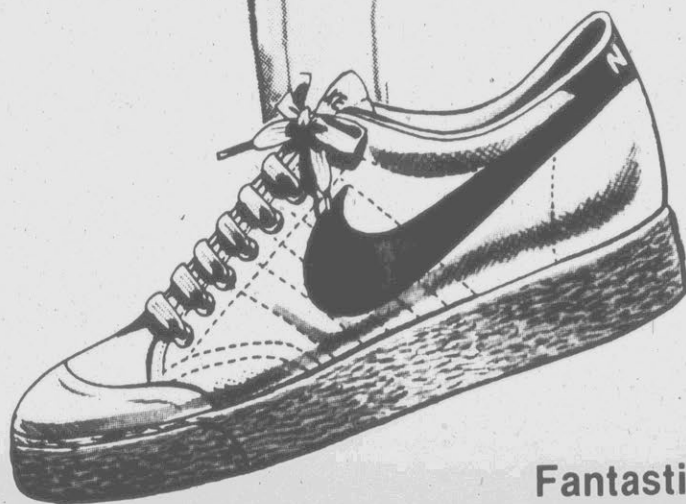
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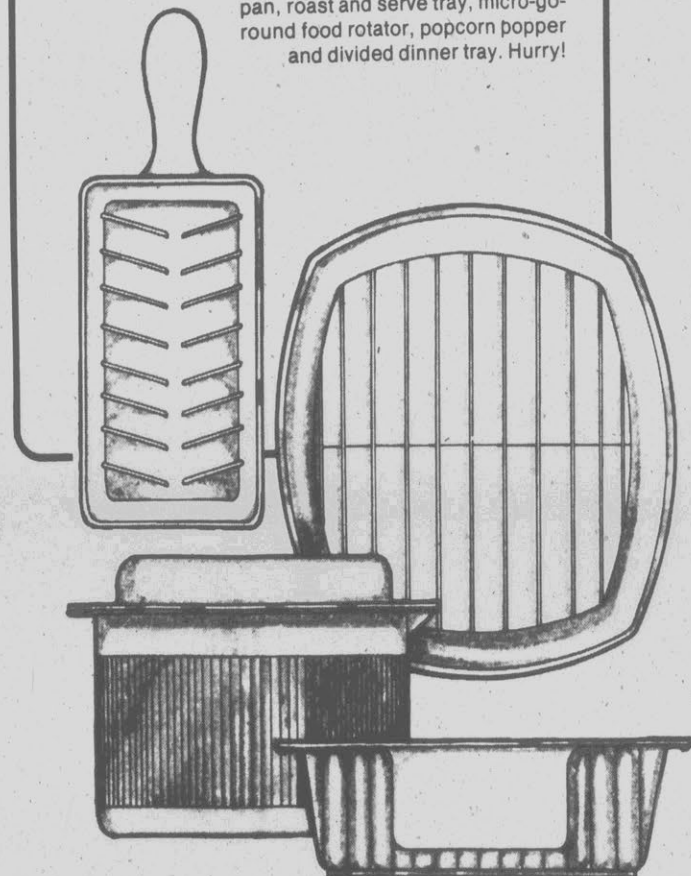
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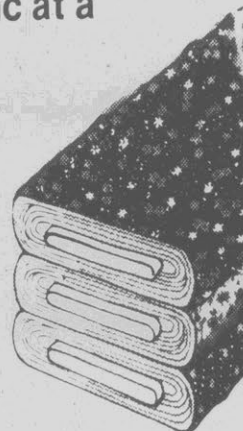


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Billy Graham's Detente Effort Is Under Fire

MOSCOW (AP) - Billy Graham is seeking his own detente with the Soviet government, avoiding criticism of it in the hope that the Kremlin will let him return and preach a lot more.

The 63-year-old Baptist evangelist who used to attack atheistic communism told The Associated Press in an interview Tuesday that since his arrival in Moscow last Friday, he has gotten an insight into the problems and concerns of Soviet officials.

"I'm very grateful that they've given me the invitation to come here and preach the Gospel," he said. "The government has been very friendly to me. I've had the opportunity to see a number of top officials, and have had frank discussions with them. I've gotten a new insight, at least, into some of their problems and some of their concerns. And this helps me in my understanding."

Since his arrival, Graham has also been dogged by questions from Western reporters about his commitment to human rights.

He was asked why his

sermon in Moscow's only Baptist church Sunday didn't include any criticism of Soviet violations of human rights? Why didn't he comment on the arrest during the service of a woman who raised a banner protesting religious persecution in the Soviet Union?

Why, he was also asked, didn't he greet 300 Christian believers who assembled at the church - se they didn't have tickets. Police barriers kept them 200 yards from the church, and while Graham preached inside they sang hymns outside.

He was also asked why he didn't go soon after his arrival to see the six Siberian Pentecostals who have been living in the U.S. Embassy for four years claiming they are victims of religious persecution.

"In a host country like this," Graham said Tuesday, "it's been my practice through the years never to take political sides and get involved in their local problems because then it means my own ministry is limited."

He said he "made representations" about the Pentecostals to Soviet officials and raised the question of human rights during his speech Tuesday to the international conference against nuclear war that he came to Moscow to attend.

His 11-page, single-spaced speech contained one paragraph urging "all gov-

ernments to respect the rights of religious believers." And he visited the Pentecostals for 75 minutes Tuesday night and prayed with them.

U.S. officials in Washington reportedly opposed Graham's trip because they feared his presence would give the anti-nuclear conference additional exposure and credibility. The United States has been attacked regularly at the meeting, as everyone knew in advance that it would be. But Graham said he met with President Reagan, and "the president never objected to me personally."

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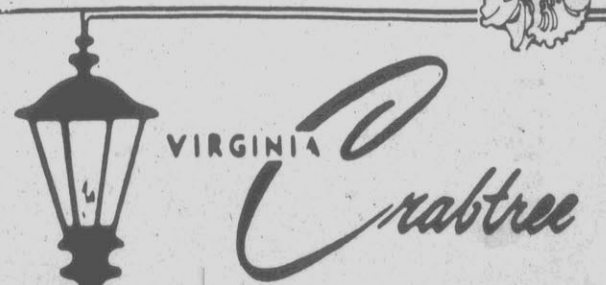

Oil Spill Source Not Determined

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — Officials say they still are unable to determine which ship or ships caused an oil spill on the Cape Fear River last week, but they know the spill was much worse than first expected.

Port Capt. Edward Grace said the U.S. Coast Guard has upgraded the spill to a "medium" or "moderate" spill, after it was earlier classified as "minor" when the amount spilled was estimated at 1,000 gallons.

Now, officials have revised their estimates to between 10,000 and 100,000 gallons.

Oil samples have been taken from five suspected tankers that were in or near the Wilmington port at the time, Grace said. The samples were sent to Washington for analysis, which he said may take as long as eight months.

"This one is the worst anyone around here can recall," said Grace, adding

that the cleanup bill could go as high as \$40,000.

The Coast Guard has asked for \$30,000 to pay for cleaning up the spill, with money coming from a federal revolving fund set up as part of

the Water Pollution Control Act of 1972, he said.

The spill was first reported to Grace's office Wednesday night, but darkness prevented Coast Guardsmen from assessing its damage until Thursday morning.

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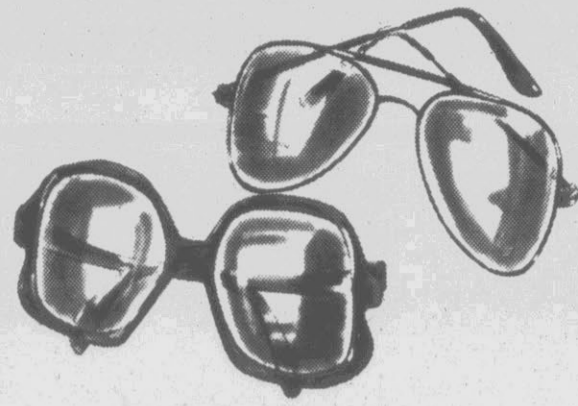

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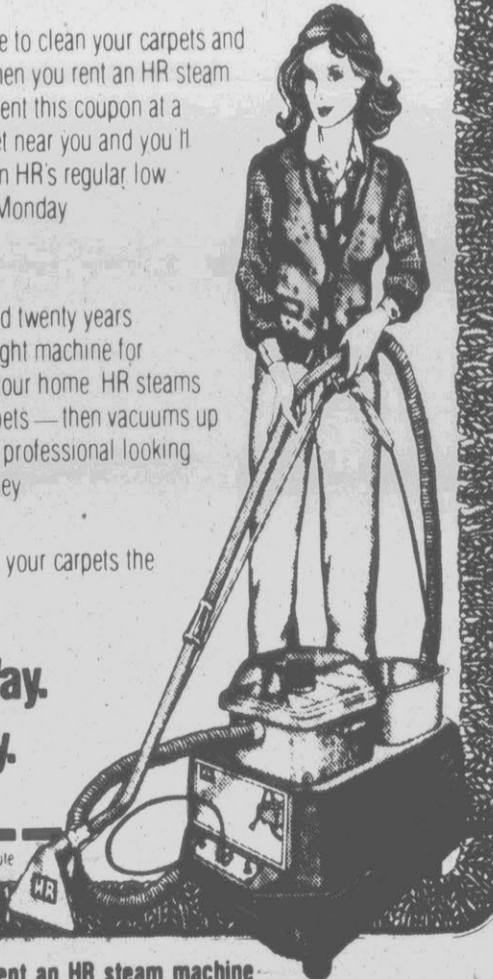

Sec. Of Labor Appears Before Federal Grand Jury

NEW YORK (AP) — Secretary of Labor Ray Donovan says it "felt good" to appear before a federal grand jury after enduring months of allegations linking him to illicit union deals.

Donovan testified for more than five hours Tuesday at U.S. District Court in Brooklyn before a grand jury investigating allegations he witnessed a \$2,000 labor peace payoff in 1977.

After confirming he had testified, Donovan told reporters, "I did it freely, fully and honestly and let me tell you, it felt good."

Donovan continued his refusal to discuss in public the allegations or probe, which began last Dec. 29 with the

Donovan, said his attorney, Gerald Shargel.

The attorney described the allegations concerning Provenzano's home as "patently false."

Donovan met with Silverman for five hours Monday and requested to appear before the grand

jury, said Labor Department spokesman Vernon Louviere. The spokesman said he did not know whether Donovan would face the panel a sec-

ond time. Silverman was empowered to investigate any criminal allegations made against Donovan, including perjury.

The labor secretary had testified under oath at his Senate confirmation hearings in January 1981 that Schiavone company and its

executives never paid for labor peace or colluded with organized crime figures.

Donovan, who was executive vice president of the

Schiavone company, was nominated as labor secretary after managing President Reagan's 1980 New Jersey election campaign.

appointment of attorney Leon Silverman as special prosecutor.

FBI informants have asserted that his business, Schiavone Construction Co. of Secaucus, N.J., had ties to New Jersey organized crime figures.

The grand jury is investigating allegations that Donovan was present in 1977 when another Schiavone executive paid \$2,000 to Louis Sanzo, president of Blaster's Union Local 29. The assertion was made by the local's former secretary-treasurer, Mario Montuoro.

The accusation was not disclosed publicly until after the Senate confirmed Donovan's appointment last year.

The FBI also has told the Senate Labor Committee that an informant said Donovan once knew reputed gangster Salvatore "Bugs" Briguglio, a New Jersey Teamsters Union business agent slain in March 1978.

The FBI reported receiving allegations from an informant that the Schiavone company provided \$50,000 in building supplies for the Clifton, N.J., home of Anthony "Tony Pro" Provenzano, a former Teamsters Union leader now serving a 20-year federal prison term for labor racketeering. According to the FBI, Briguglio was a close criminal associate of Provenzano at Local 560 in Union City, N.J.

Provenzano briefly testified in an earlier grand jury session and did not know

Embattled Judge Wins Against Recall Attempt

LANCASTER, Wis. (AP) — A Grant County circuit judge who referred to a 5-year-old sexual assault victim as "sexually promiscuous" survived a recall attempt and promised to be the "best judge I can" for the next four years.

"He's overwhelmed. He feels the people of Grant County have spoken," a friend of Judge William

Reinecke said Tuesday night. Reinecke was celebrating with about 200 people at the home of the friend, Pat McNamara.

With all 69 wards reporting, unofficial returns in the three-way race showed Reinecke with 7,033 votes, or 50.7 percent. Attorney James Dahlquist of Hazel Green, who was backed by the recall group, had 6,051 votes, or 44 percent, and attorney Norman Kvalheim, 55, of Cuba City trailed with 745

votes, or 5.3 percent.

Reinecke, 51, a veteran of more than 14 years on the bench in this rural southwestern Wisconsin county, angered many residents with his statement in the sexual assault case.

An organization called Citizens for Children collected more than 5,000 signatures in a petition campaign that brought about Tuesday's election.

Reinecke had apologized publicly for his remark, but

that did not satisfy the Citizens for Children.

By winning more than half of the total vote, Reinecke retained his judgeship. If no candidate had won a majority, the top two would have met in a run-off election June 8.

"I will be the best judge I can" for the remaining four years of his term, Reinecke told supporters.

The problem began for Reinecke Dec. 22 when he sentenced Ralph Snodgrass, 24, of Gays Mills, on a first-degree sexual assault conviction.

The judge made his comment about the 5-year-old girl being an "unusual, sexually promiscuous young lady" and ordered Snodgrass

to spend 90 days in jail under a work-release program. Snodgrass also was placed on probation for three years.

District Attorney Rod Satter of adjacent Crawford County said the child's mother was outside the home last Oct. 16 and Snodgrass was sleeping nude at her home. According to the prosecutor, the little girl climbed in bed with Snodgrass and initiated sexual contact.

Reinecke admitted his comment was a poor choice of words.

In a recent interview he said, "I probably just should have said the child was involved in unusual activities instead of saying she was sexually promiscuous."

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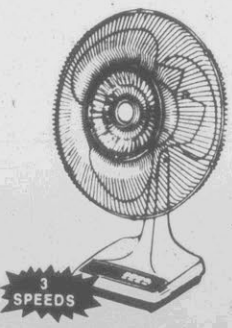

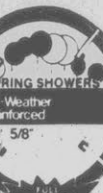

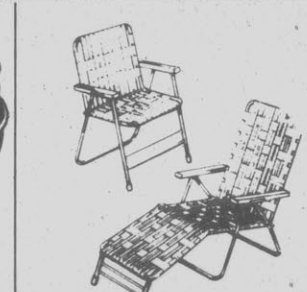

Electronic, steel and chemical issues were numerous among the early gainers.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which resumed its advance Tuesday following an 8.28-point drop Monday, was up 3.90 to 869.77 after 30 minutes of trading today.

The transportation and utility measures also rose.

Gainers jumped out to nearly a 2-1 edge over losers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Prices were gained support from strength in oil stocks and indications that continued weakness in the economy would allow interest rates to decline.

But analysts say uncertainty over the form of the fiscal 1983 federal budget has tempered market enthusiasm. House Republicans are now working on a budget plan that differs from the proposal approved by the Senate Budget Committee and endorsed by President Reagan.

Among the NYSE's early gainers were Federal National Mortgage Association $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 $\frac{1}{4}$, Texaco $\frac{1}{8}$ to 3 $\frac{1}{4}$, Safeway Stores $\frac{1}{8}$ to 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ and Hewlett-Packard $\frac{1}{2}$ to 44.

ICN Pharmaceuticals was up $\frac{1}{8}$ to 8 $\frac{1}{8}$. It said today it dropped plans for a private

sale of 400,000 common shares at \$5 a share.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrial average rose 4.95 to 865.87.

Advances held a 9-5 edge on declines at the NYSE, whose composite index gained 0.58 to 68.80.

Big Board volume totaled 54.68 million shares, against 46.30 million in the previous session.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 5.20 to 280.94.

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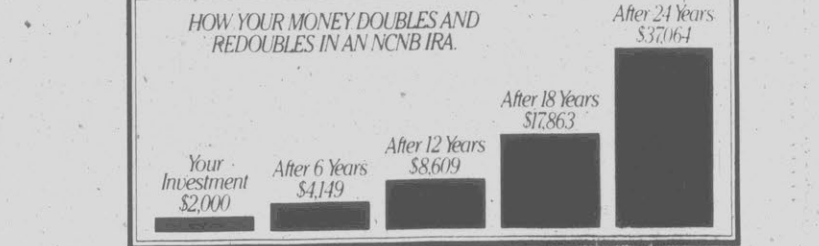

We have been taken to task for suggesting that rubber bridge and duplicate are really two entirely different games. To fortify our contention, consider how you would play this hand at those two forms of the game.

There is nothing to the auction. After North opens the bidding, South's hand is worth going to slam, and it's simply a matter of whether you play in spades or no trump. South chose the latter, in case one of his minor suit tenaces needed protection from the opening lead.

At duplicate bridge, the first question you ask yourself is whether you are in a good contract. Obviously, the answer is yes. Next, are the other pairs sitting in your direction likely to get to slam? Again, the answer is yes. Therefore, you must make at least the same number of tricks that they do.

The slam is safe if spades break either 2-2 or 3-1. The only problem is a 4-0 distribution. This is far less likely than a 2-2 division. If you take a safety play to protect against a 4-0 split, you will lose to all those pairs who cashed the ace-king of spades and found a 2-2 division. So you lead to the spade king at trick two and go down when East shows out.

At rubber bridge, or even IMP team-of-four play, the overtrick is relatively unimportant. You stand to lose so much if spades break 4-0, and to gain so little if you find an even spade split, that it would be foolish not to guard against an unlucky distribution. At trick two, therefore, you lead a low spade from hand and, if West plays low, you finesse the eight. Your foresight pays off when East shows out. You lose only one spade trick, but you make your slam and pocket a fair amount of change in the process. (If West plays an honor on the first spade lead, you win and play a low spade to the nine. Now you can finesse for West's remaining honor.)

Sid Caesar Tells Ordeal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Comedian Sid Caesar, one of TV's early stars, says pressures of live programming led to a 20-year ordeal with booze and pills.

At a news conference Tuesday to promote his autobiography, "Where Have I Been?" to be published in October, Caesar said he often considered suicide.

"I came to the point four years ago when I said to myself, 'Do you wanna live or do you wanna die?'" said the 59-year-old entertainer.

Caesar, who earned \$1 million a year in the early years of television, said the stress of doing a weekly show was a factor in his alcoholism.

"When you're doing an hour and a half of live comedy 39 weeks a year with no cue cards, no prompters, no stopping if you make a mistake, it gets to you," he said. Caesar was a star of "Your Show of Shows" on NBC in the 1950s.

"I'm an addictive person, and I began drinking to relieve the pressure. Also, a part of drinking is swallowing your guilt... My guilt was basic: A son cannot surpass his father. And if your father suffered, then you must suffer, too."

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Character actress Clair Trevor, who won an Academy Award for best supporting actress in 1948 for her performance in "Key Largo," returns to the screen after a long absence for a featured role in "Kiss Me Goodbye."

The veteran actress starred in such films as the original "Stagecoach," "The High and the Mighty" and "How To Murder Your Wife."

The sweeps, held several times a year by the ratings services, are checks on how many people watched particular shows. Sweeps are conducted for a month at the local-station level, and the networks usually enhance their programming to help their affiliates score.

"TV's Censored Bloopers," an NBC rerun, was third, and completing the top five shows were ABC's "Too Close for Comfort" and "Three's Company," Perennial CBS frontrunners "60 Minutes" and "Dallas," which are now showing reruns, did not make the Top 10. "60 Minutes" was in 11th place and "Dallas" was 25th.

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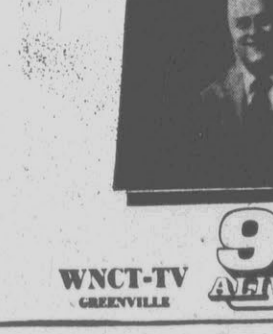

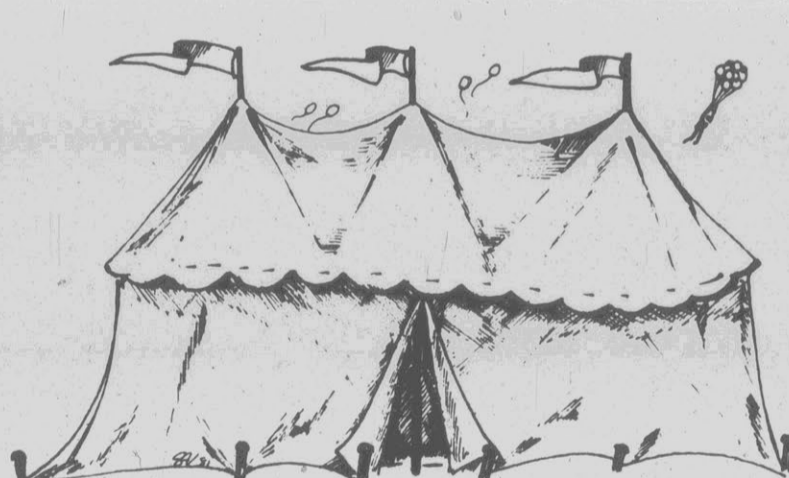

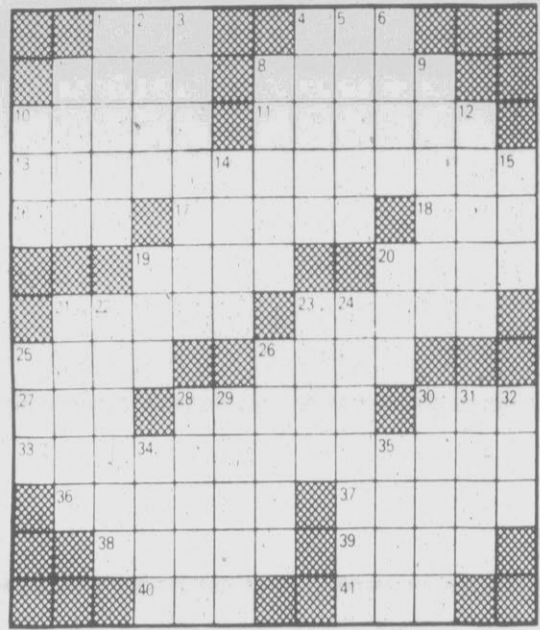

Arrest Four Men In Theft Of Cheese

Police in Selma have arrested four men who were selling cheese that allegedly was stolen from railroad cars carrying the state's second shipment of government surplus cheese.
Some of the cheese was sold to people in Selma, Smithfield and Kenly at a cost of \$2 for 5 pounds. Police said an estimated 600 pounds of the cheese was taken from train cars that were parked in Selma.
"They just started selling it all over the county," said Lt. Ricky Evans of the Selma Police Department, adding that the investigation is continuing.

The two Southern Railway cars, each containing 100,800 pounds of cheese had come from Wilson, where the federal government has stored the cheese. The shipments were part of 600,000 pounds that will go to 34 counties in the second round of the cheese giveaway to poor people.
Evans said the sales were concentrated in low-income areas.
Charged with two counts each of breaking and entering and larceny were Oliver Junior Eason, 32; Donnie Andrea Dublin, 29; David Stewart Carroll, 28, and Thaddeus Mickens, all of Selma.
Evans said the arrests were made after police contacts observed the sales. He said about 150 pounds of the cheese was recovered.

Less Competition In Entry-Level Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) - People looking for what are called "entry-level jobs" in the national work force are going to be facing less competition through the remainder of the decade, the government says.
Because the post-war baby boom generation is already in the labor force and birth rates have been declining in recent years, the number of young people entering the labor force is expected to fall by 2 million during the rest of the decade, "easing the stiff competition for entry-level jobs," the Labor Department said Tuesday.

Students Unite In Crime Fight

MIAMI (AP) — During football season, Fredrick Walker is a rugged blocker whose job is clearing away tacklers for Miami Norland High School running backs.

Off the field, Walker has a different assignment — keeping the school's halls and grounds clear of troublemakers.

Walker is on the 10-member Varsity Patrol, a unique peace-keeping force in the Miami school of 2,000 students. It is the brainchild of assistant principal Jeff Miller, a former baseball coach.

The Varsity Patrol walks Norland's halls before school, during lunch and after school. Wearing gray-and-red T-shirts emblazoned with "Varsity Patrol," they watch for disturbances, drug pushers, and "outsiders" who don't belong on school grounds.

Patrol members are under strict orders not to use violence to break up fights or to nab robbers, chain-snatchers and drug-users. If efforts short of violence fail, they alert administrators.

In the past seven months, the patrols have made a difference in what once was one of the most troubled schools in Dade County, Miller said. During the 1980-81 school year, there were 1,000 incidents, while so far this year there hasn't been one.

The drug problem has also been reduced, Miller said, but no figures will be compiled until after the end of the school year.

A decade ago, when Dade's school desegregation program paired predominantly white and predominantly

black schools to achieve racial balance, Norland went from nearly all white to having a three-fourths black student population.

Miller believes that part of the problem was that black students didn't identify with their new school and its white roots.

"These young people have had a tremendous impact on school pride," Miller said recently of the Varsity Patrol. "This school year is the best I've seen in 10 years. And it's because of these young people."

Nine of the group's members are black, one is Latin and two others, who belonged to the patrol but quit, are white. The two whites "had other commitments, but they still help out sometimes," Miller said.

Peter Rossi, an investigator with the school system's security unit, said he thinks the idea behind the Varsity Patrol — "taking the biggest or the meanest kids on campus" — works because those students command respect from fellow students that administrators, security guards or student "snitches" don't receive.

Walker was one of Miller's first selections for the squad.

For Walker, membership in the Varsity Patrol was sort of a personal revolt against crime. His locker had been broken into, his wallet was stolen. He helped recruit Terry Henry, a 6-foot-3, 265-pound defensive tackle.

"One change is that our crime rate has dropped dramatically," Walker says. "At first, they were calling us names. But after they saw how we were operating, they began to relate to it. Now,

some are asking how to join."

The Patrol members weren't necessarily model students before. Some admit that joining the Patrol may have kept them out of trouble.

"I used to not want to come to school," testifies Todd Eady, a football player and Varsity Patrol member. "But now I want to come to school. This Varsity Patrol thing gave me a reason."

Adds Elesia Smith, one of two girls in the patrol, said she could have graduated early in December. "But I didn't want to leave the

school because I like it so much," she says.

Principal Robert Fowler said the Varsity Patrol often keeps students from getting into big trouble by nipping fights early.

He recalled a recent incident when Walker and Eady overheard two boys in a heated quarrel, then raced to the scene.

"Come to the (principal's) office," Walker told the pair.

At first, they resisted. "I'm not going anywhere," one snapped.

Eady, 6 feet, 220 pounds, pressed the case. "You better go to the office or you'll

get in a lot of trouble."

They agreed and Fowler gave the boys a lecture, not a suspension.

Fowler said he asked one of the boys how he felt about the Varsity Patrol. "After he had cooled down, he was glad they stopped him from fighting," the principal said.

Miller gratefully remembers the time the Varsity Patrol bailed him out of trouble.

He was surrounded by a group of "hostile outsiders." But when Walker and other Varsity Patrol members arrived at the scene, the "bad guys" left, Miller said.

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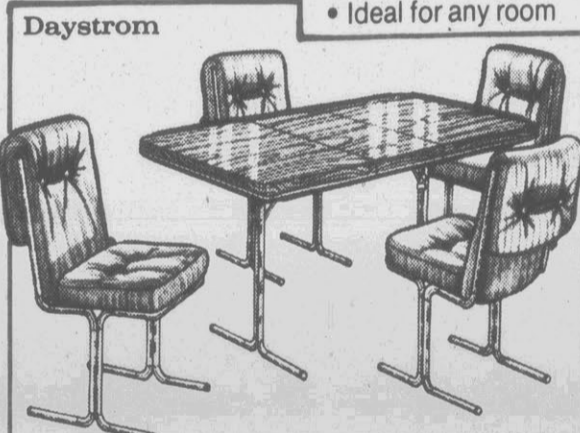
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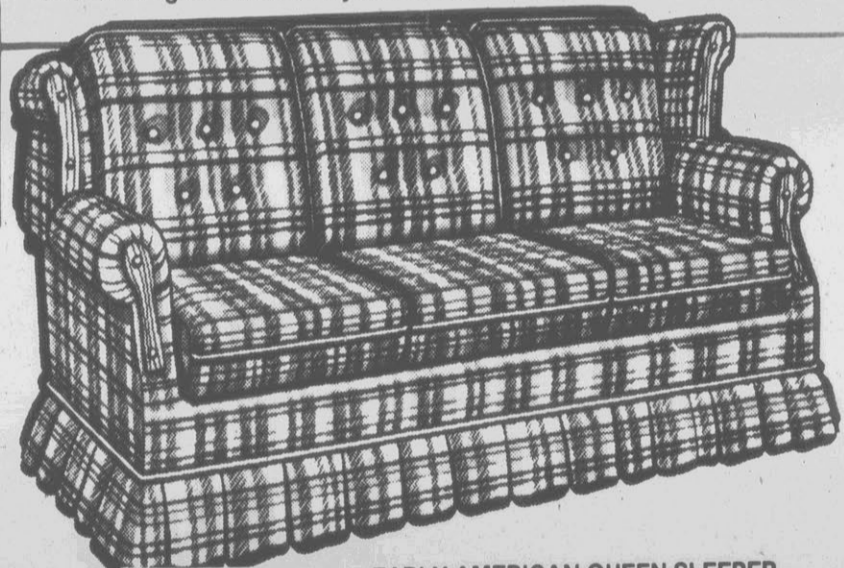

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Speaking of Your Health...

I carry my health insurance with a very good and reliable company. Yet I had an experience which irritated me sufficiently to cause me to write to you and find out if other people have run into similar situations.

I have been paying my premiums faithfully for 11 years. I never once had occasion to have a medical bill sent to the company.

Recently I went to a doctor who told me it was about time I had a complete medical examination. I am 56. Tests were made on my blood and urine. I had an X-ray of the chest and an electrocardiogram in addition to the physical examination.

I was delighted that I was found to be in perfect health. That is until I submitted my bill to the insurance company and found that they returned zlich to me on a \$225 bill. I thought the doctor's fee was reasonable.

When I followed up with the insurance company, they told me that there would be no refund for any diagnostic service done in the doctor's office. There would have been if the doctor had sent me into the hospital with some fancy diagnosis and then done all the tests that he made in his office in just a few hours. This isn't fair, it is? — Mrs. D.H., N.Y.

Dear Mrs. H.: I am completely sympathetic with you and your problem. Thousands of my readers will join in expressing their annoyance for a similar situation that might have occurred to them. As a practicing physician I have come across this hundreds of times.

In fact, there are few conditions that are more disruptive to the relationship between doctors and their patients than the failure of "third party payments" that should have been made to patients or to doctors.

I'll never understand why the excellent Blue Shield and Blue Cross and other insurance agents refuse to pay for diagnostic workups that are made by the doctor with honesty and integrity.

The enormous waste of time and money involved in sending a patient to the hospital for four to five days can be overwhelming. Besides the loss of a week from work, there are the multiple visits by the doctor in the hospital and the utilization of hospital facilities which might better be used in the treatment of the sick.

A diagnostic workup is essential before any therapeutic program can be established. It makes no difference where those diagnostic workups are made. They are essential to recovery from an illness or in the prevention of one.

This problem is being carefully studied all over the country. Some hospitals have instituted rapid one-day admissions so that the total diagnostic workup can be done in a few hours. Some insurance programs are now considering compensating patients and doctors for office studies which do not include a hospital stay.

A saner approach to this problem would help reinforce the doctor-patient relationship rather than to corrode it.

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Tensions Seen Growing In French Basque Country

BAYONNE, France (AP) — About 9:30 one quiet evening in the Basque mountain village of St. Etienne de Baigorry, two hooded men opened fire with automatic weapons on a patrol car. The result was two dead policemen and a precipitous rise in tension in the usually tranquil French Basque country of France.

Within 48 hours, police put out a wanted bulletin for Philippe Bidart, a 29-year-old former teacher known to be a member of the clandestine French Basque nationalist organization Iparretarrak. Police claim to have firm evidence pointing to Bidart, who remains at large. What is less clear, however, is who he was acting for and why, on that night in March.

The attack was unanimously denounced here, even by the most militant Basque nationalists, and sparked fears that years of relative peace in the French Basque country — a marked contrast to the violence in the neighboring Basque area of Spain — could be about to end.

Though extremists here have carried out numerous bombings and terrorist-type attacks over the years, most of the trouble has been a spillover from the Spanish side where Basque separatists are pursuing an armed struggle for independence.

The French Basque country long has served as a sanctuary for the Spanish militants fleeing authorities in the south and occasionally has served as a battleground between the Spanish Basque militants and the mysterious right-wing Spanish Basque Battalion, which many view as no more than an unofficial arm of the Spanish authorities in Madrid.

The ease with which the Spanish Basques are able to cross back and forth between France and Spain irritates authorities on both sides of the border. But the Spanish are particularly unhappy, claiming leaders of ETA, the Spanish separatist organization, use French territory to plan operations and return after attacks.

Proclaimed efforts to seal the border are greeted with derision by residents who know the area, and even police admit it is a futile effort.

"The Germans sent two divisions during the war to seal off the border and couldn't do it," said one police official. "How do you imagine 150 frontier police can do better?"

Nonetheless, authorities haven't been idle, as evidenced by the recent roundup of Spanish militants and the seizure of stocks of arms and documents. Thirteen people, including two French Basques, were arrested and charged in late April on a wide range of offenses.

French anti-terrorist specialists, however, do not see the killings in St. Etienne de Baigorry as a sign of an upsurge in activity by the French militants. Some of-

icials even theorize that the attack may have been set up by the Spaniards hoping to provoke a crisis and a police crackdown here.

French Basque extremists are believed to number fewer than 100, mostly grouped in Iparretarrak, which means "those of the north" in the Basque language, and another group called Hordago.

But the French Basques have never had the separatist passion that exists in Spain. The reasons are largely historical.

Spain's Basques suffered through three civil conflicts, the two Carlist wars of the 19th century and the 1936-39 Spanish civil war. Their support of the republic during the civil war brought severe repression from the Francoist victors.

The French Basques also were engaged in three wars. But these all were national conflicts against a foreign enemy — Germany, in 1870, 1914-18 and 1939-45 — and had the effect of forging a sense of national unity and absorption into French society.

There also is the obvious difference in size. It is estimated that nearly 2.5 million Basques live in the four Spanish provinces of Vizcaya, Guipuzcoa, Alava and Navarra, while in the French provinces of Labourd, Basse-Navarre and Soule, only about 80,000 of the 250,000 residents are considered Basques.

"The Basque country of France doesn't count economically," said Jean Haritschelhar, professor of Basque language and literature at Bordeaux University.

"It ranks perhaps 60th or 70th in population among France's 95 departments and just can't be compared to the Spanish side which is highly industrial. And that strong industry has made it a strong political force."

Also, Spain's Basques historically enjoyed long periods of autonomy through local councils, known as Fuegos, and now have their own autonomous government. The French, on the other hand, have always exercised a strong centralist policy.

Modern French Basque militancy, such as it is, was born in the early 1960s with the founding of an organization called Enbata by a group of university students in Bordeaux. It was officially dissolved by the government in 1974, but its weekly political newspaper of the same name continues to publish.

The goals of Enbata and its supporters are hazy. Generally, they support their Spanish brothers, seek recognition of the Basque language and the Basque people as a nation, whose rights they say have been denied by what they call French and Spanish imperialism, and want some sort of autonomy within a future federated Europe.

"Twenty years ago, Basque identity was not apparent among the people apart from folklore," said Jean-Claude Abeberry, the lawyer who publishes Enbata in Bayonne. "There were no demands, no manifestations of this identity, and France did nothing. Then, in 1960, Enbata was born." Police specialists estimate

that the separatists, Iparretarrak and Hordago, have about 30 hard-core members each. In all, they say, perhaps a maximum of 100 militants, nearly all of them young, are prepared to take up a gun.

Iparretarrak was founded in the early 1970s by the ETA before the Spanish organization split into the ETA Military and ETA Political-Military factions. After the split, when the French organization began to distance itself from the Spanish group, ETA Military then founded Hordago.

According to police specialists, the French separatists always have been manipulated by the ETA. The French Basques often are given special missions there, sometimes acting as couriers or carrying out such activities as renting cars and apartments.

Many Basques, militant or not, resent the French government's attitude toward the Basque country. Some say Paris wants to keep it a tranquil agricultural-touristic region, thus avoiding the militancy of strong labor movements.

Neither has the government been receptive to the growing movement for what is described "re-Basquisation" of the area. Demands that the central government in Paris participate in the financing of the increasing number of private Basque-language schools have been ignored. And no action has been taken on a proposal by several Basque organizations for a special statute recognizing the Basque language and culture.

In an effort to give the Basques some measure of identity and control over their own affairs, the Socialist government of President Francois Mitterrand has promised to create a new Basque department, or county, in the region. The idea is being pushed strongly by the local chambers of commerce and many elected officials, but it has not incited great enthusiasm elsewhere. And, for the moment, it hasn't progressed beyond the study stage.

Week Salutes The Operators

Gov. Jim Hunt has proclaimed May 9-15 as "Operator Appreciation Week" in recognition of the contributions of telephone operators to their communities.

Hunt cited the role operators play in providing telephone service and he commended their performance in assisting citizens during emergency situations.

T.K. McLaughlin, general operator services manager for Carolina Telephone, said the company is honoring its operators who handle long distance calls and directory assistance requests from customers in its service area.

He said Greenville is the location for one of CT&T's 10 long-distance toll centers and 58 operators work here.

As part of the observance, local operators have selected Geraldine Little as an "ideal" operator, he said.

The spokesman said that company operators handled 20.9 million long distance calls last year and 18.3 million directory assistance requests. In the first three months of 1982, 4.8 million long distance calls and 4.2 million calls for directory help were handled.

Took Honor In Competition

CHARLOTTE — Pitt County student Robert May came away with honors in the recent 1982 State Vocational Clubs of America Conference.

May, a student at Farmville Central High School, took first place in the electrical trades competition. He is now eligible to compete in the 18th National Leadership Conference and United States Skills Olympics in Louisville, Ky., June 20-26.

Alternative To Soybean Role

NEW YORK (UPI) — University researchers have developed a peanut alternative to soybean products as an extender for many foods that also increases their nutritive value.

A newsletter published by The Peanut Advisory Board says white, bland-tasting peanut flakes developed by Clemson University scientists are already being used in food service operations on the East Coast to enrich and extend tuna salads, meatballs and bologna. The board is a trade organization of Alabama, Florida and Georgia peanut growers, who produce 65 percent of the nation's goobers.

TO ASK ASYLUM

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Paris' Famed Hotel Ritz Is Scheduled To Be Even Ritzier

PARIS (AP) — The Hotel Ritz, bastion of French elegance founded by a Swiss goat herder's son, is being rescued from troubled times by an Egyptian owner and a German manager.

The hotel on the Place Vendôme is half-way through a \$50 million, four-year renovation that is the first major face lift in the hotel's

85-year-old history. In 1979, "the hotel of kings and the king of hotels" was suffering from a dwindling guest list and five years of financial losses.

There were no television sets in any of its 210 rooms. The telephone system was antiquated. Air-conditioning units were in only a handful of rooms, furniture needed reupholstering and the paint was peeling.

Then came Egyptian Mohamed Al-Fayed and his two brothers who purchased the Ritz three years ago for \$25 million. They hired away Frank Klein, the German, from a competing hotel and installed him as managing director.

Born into a family that had operated a small guest house outside Cologne in Germany since the turn of the century, Klein has risen through the ranks of the hotel business in the manner of Cesar Ritz — the hotel's founder.

"I was shocked when I saw the rooms at the Ritz after it was sold," said the 38-year-old Klein. "The standards just were not up to the standards of the Ritz. That's why some clients left."

The Ritz standards must satisfy a clientele willing to pay daily room rates that begin at \$185 and go as high as \$4,500 for the five-room Imperial Suite.

An one-time occupant of that suite was Hermann Goering, the Nazi air marshal who lived in the Ritz along with other high-ranking Nazis during the German occupation of Paris during World War II.

Another frequent guest was the author F. Scott Fitzgerald, who used the hotel's name in his short story "The Diamond as Big as The Ritz." His friend Ernest Hemingway personally "liberated" the hotel's Le Petit Bar in 1944 when the Nazis were fleeing.

King Edward VII of England used Ritz's last name to create the adjective "ritz." Fashion great Coco Chanel was a permanent

resident and died in the hotel in 1971. Marcel Proust praised the Ritz as a haven where "there is no jostling."

The Hotel Ritz also has housed such diverse notables as Richard M. Nixon, Greta Garbo, the Aga Kahn, Winston Churchill, Mary Pickford, Henry A. Kissinger, the Shah of Iran and almost every European monarch since King Edward VII.

The hotel was opened in 1898 by Ritz, who was fired from his first job as a busboy in Brig, Switzerland.

He later became the first man to place a bathroom in every hotel room. He invented indirect lighting, king-size beds and closets that are illuminated when the door is opened. Ritz also hired Escoffier, one of the most renowned chefs in the history of France, to run the restaurants of the Ritz.

After Ritz's death in 1918, the hotel was run by his family until the 1979 sale. Since then, Klein has followed his predecessor's habit of keeping the hotel's advertising budget small.

"In marketing, we're No. 1. The Ritz stands for itself," Klein said. "You can even find the word 'ritz' in an American dictionary."

Klein also kept the staff as twice as large as the guest list and held to the policy of calling guests by their names rather than room numbers.

The hotel still has no lobby, which Ritz thought would encourage "outsiders" to loiter, and has no directional signs to restaurants, bars and rooms. The hotel's atmosphere remains one of quiet and discrete elegance.

But since 1979, Klein has made changes that have helped reverse the dwindling room-occupancy rate that first began to plague the Ritz in the 1970s.

"When the hotel was sold it had an occupancy rate of 59 percent — which is very bad in the hotel business," Klein said. "We've already increased the occupancy rate to 68 percent. Our goal is to

make it 85 percent to 92 percent all year round in two years when the restoration project is completed."

The hotel made its first profit in five years during its first year under the new owners.

"In 1980 we had a 15 percent profit margin, last year we had an 18 percent margin and we hope to do as well this year," Klein said.

A good number of Klein's innovations at the Ritz were tailored to keep up with the services expected by the biggest patrons of the hotel industry — businessmen.

The changes include direct-dial telephones, television sets, air conditioning, a sauna, health club, whirlpool baths and a businessman's center with telex machines, photocopiers, typewriters and bilingual secretaries.

The Ritz's l'Espadon restaurant, renowned for its fine food, has been redone and now offers "businessman's lunch."

Klein also reopened Hemingway's old haunt, Le Petit Bar, which had been closed in 1973 and transformed into a conference room. It has been renamed "The Hemingway Bar" which serves a drink called Hemingway's Special, a mixture of lime, bourbon, sugar and a touch of Pernod.

The price: 46 francs (\$7.40).

Weed Control In Future Plants

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Plant breeders may some day be able to use plants to poison other plants to enhance weed control.

Researchers at the USDA say they may be able to use the trait — allelopathy — to poison neighboring plants with toxic secretions. For example, scientists have learned that developed varieties of sunflowers are more allelopathic than their wild relatives.

Studies show sunflower plant extracts knock out 50 to 75 percent of such hard-to-treat weeds as johnsongrass, ragweed and wild mustard. Other allelopathic plants include oats, walnut trees, corn and some varieties of cherry and cucumber.

Allelopathy is influenced by climate, but scientists are still puzzled as to why certain plants are susceptible to the secretions.

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


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Primitive Indian Tribe In Brazil Gets Own Land

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — The Yanomani Indians, one of the last and largest primitive tribes in South America, have scored at least a temporary victory over the advance of white civilization in the Amazon jungle.

Interior Minister Mario Andreazza recently signed a bill creating a huge reservation for the Yanomani in northern Brazil, along the border with Venezuela. The area contains some 19 million acres — about the size of South Carolina.

The bill means, at least theoretically, that the Yanomani can continue their nomadic lifestyle free from incursions by poachers and fortune seekers looking for the uranium, gold, diamonds and tin believed to exist in the region.

The Yanomani themselves have probably never heard of the bill, or Andreazza or even Brazil. They are perhaps the most primitive of the primitive South American tribes, living exactly the way their ancestors lived 2,000 or even 3,000 years ago.

"They are unique," says Paulo Moreira Leal, president of Brazil's government Indian bureau known as FUNAI. "Although they live on the banks of rivers, many have never seen canoes or paddles. Others still use stone axes."

"Our job is to win their confidence and give them support," he said.

Leal explained that FUNAI planned to create 10 control posts in strategic areas in the new reservation, to look after the 8,400 Yanomani believed to live in the region.

About the same number are thought to live in Venezuela, according to the Venezuelan embassy here. But apparently they are less threatened by "civilization" than their Brazilian counterparts, because the area is still far from being settled.

The Yanomani — also known as the Yanomamas or

Yamoamans — historically had little contact with outsiders. The high mountains and fast-flowing rivers of their region made their lands too difficult to reach.

However, white civilization got closer with the partial construction of Brazil's North Perimetral Highway through the Amazon jungle. And it got still closer when highway workers discovered radioactive minerals in the Surucucu Mountains, near Yanomani land.

The discovery attracted waves of prospectors. And with them they brought germs and diseases that often proved deadly to the Yanomani.

International primitive peoples' organizations began to express concern for the future of the tribe.

Indian experts have praised the creation of the Yanomani reservation. At the same time, however, they admit that sooner or later the tribe will be absorbed by the white civilization that surrounds them.

Meanwhile, anthropologists are studying the Yanomani.

They have found, for example, that the Yanomani live in large communal huts called "Malocas" that hold up to 200 people. Although the Indians are nomadic, they may cultivate a piece of land for two or three years, growing corn and manioc, a tapioca-like root that serves as their "bread." When they move on, however, they almost never come back.

"The Yanomani are excellent preservers of the ecosystem," says anthropologist and Indian expert Sonia de Almeida Demarquet. "They know, intuitively, that they must preserve nature for their own sake."

Researchers found that when the tribe reaches a certain size, it simply splits up into various groups. Ms. Demarquet calls it "a way to balance the economic structure of the village and

relieve the pressure caused by too many people. They prefer to split up before they create tensions."

Linguists have discovered five Yanomani dialects and have begun a deeper study of the region's languages.


Anthropologists are now lobbying for the creation of a Yanomani national park, which they say will give the

Indians even more legal safeguards against unwanted intruders.

"The Yanomani need two things," says Indian expert Memelia Moreira. They are "Space, to keep the freedom to roam they have always

enjoyed, and time, to assimilate a culture that little by little should become less strange to them."

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Floodwatcher Is Named Mud

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — His telephone is labeled "Mudflood."

That's what people called Bob Nordland after the big flood in 1979, he says with a chuckle. "My name was Mud."

He's called many other names — good and bad — by those who listen to National Weather Service forecasts during flood season. Nordland's job is to collect information on river flows in the Red River Valley of Minnesota and North Dakota and transmit those figures to Minneapolis for use in daily flood forecasts.

The 1979 flood caused an estimated \$100 million in damages and left irate citizens shaking their fists at the weather service. The forecasters did not cause the flood, but since then they have been trying to keep the public better informed, through a broader network of rain gauges and observers — and through Nordland, the basin's data coordinator.

"We take a lot of abuse," he says. "But when you're dealing with the public, you've got to make an effort to compose yourself."

Nordland watches over a river basin of some 40,000 square miles, roughly the size of Kentucky. Sixteen major tributaries flow into the Red, which runs north for 400 miles and forms the Minnesota-North Dakota border.

The river ambles through tabletop land that once was a glacial lake. And it has a mind of its own. Because the land is so flat, Nordland says, the Red River easily spills over its banks.

"I think our forecasts are getting more accurate," he said. "But we're always going to have problems with the Red because of the kind of river it is."

During flood season Nordland starts work before 6 a.m. and goes home 12 to 15 hours later, with a few breaks in between. His desk is filled with telephones, log books, measuring sticks and maps.

His first task each day is to get river readings from mechanical signals set up in a dozen rivers and three dams. If he hears two beeps on the phone receiver, it means the water is at the 20-foot stage. Three more beeps add three feet and the next two series signal tenths and hundredths.

After dialing a number and listening to about 15 seconds of beeps, he can give a river reading of 23.82 feet. He makes 22 of those "beeper" calls every three hours.

About 45 volunteer observers call Nordland with reports on ice breakups and rainfall. Those reports are messaged to the Minneapolis river forecast center about midmorning.

Nordland and Bismarck hydrologist Bob Barnicle review the first official river forecasts early in the afternoon.

Nordland also makes regular calls to engineers, mayors and Civil Defense directors in towns that might be threatened by flooding.

"In 1979, we forecasted a crest of around 36 feet at Oslo, Minn. That figure looked good," Nordland recalled. "But then a farm dike broke. The ground was frozen, and we got a lot of late rainfall. Away went the rivers."

Nordland and his wife Barb, a native of Hawaii, say they love the Fargo area despite the weather.

"I work in a bar, and a lot of people who know Bob come in and say, 'can't your husband do something about it?'" Barb Nordland says. "I just have to tell them the weather service doesn't have a little box where they can press 'sunshine' and 'rain.'"

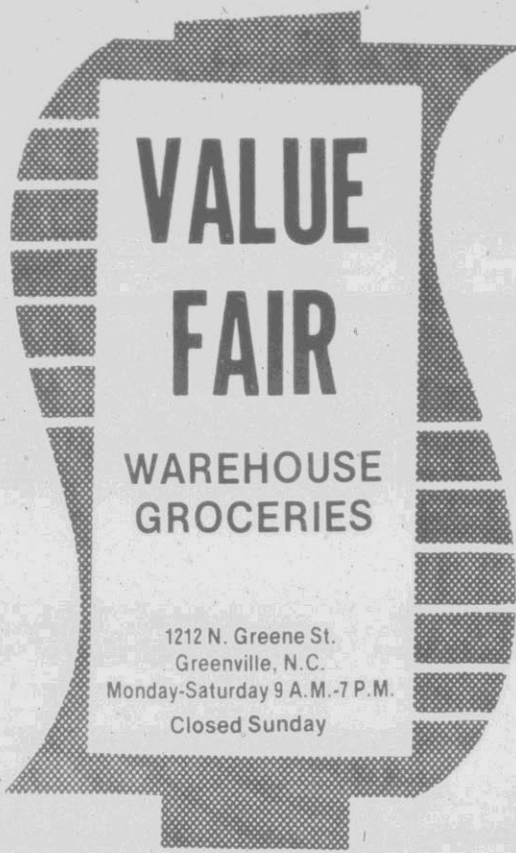

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'Brain Music' When Art Joins With Psychology

BALTIMORE (AP) — The musical composition began with a muffled rumble, like a motorcycle revving under water.

Distant chimes suddenly tickled the hum and then swept across it, harp-like. A hollow harpsichord rose through a gurgle. In a moment — a few bongo taps, counterpointed by tinkling.

The sounds were not generated by an orchestra or any electronic instrument. They came directly from a human brain, via electrodes and a synthesizer.

"We're getting to the brainstorm phase," joked psychologist and brain music researcher Joel Knispel, as the natural symphony rose. Geoffrey Wright, his col-

league and a classically trained musician, monitored an oscilloscope (an instrument that records an electrical wave), where a tiny video galaxy burst and reassembled with changes in the sound.

Over the speakers in the Peabody Conservatory studio came a far-off echo, like a steel door closing in an empty warehouse. Dull thunder rose, accompanying the tinkling, running sound. Finally, a tinny tone, like a plucked wire, introduced a sort of sitar fade-out.

Knispel and Wright called this collection of riffs and trills and snatches of melody the most "intimate" kind of music.

With wires running from the top of his skull to an electroencephalograph or EEG, the "composer" — a

student volunteer who asked that his name not be used — had generated brain music simply by thinking. His brain waves — tiny electrical impulses — were connected to a music synthesizer, which converted them into the eerie sounds.

"It's going to take time to master it," said Wright, whose approach to the research is more artistic than scientific.

"I don't know if we'll be hearing scales played on the synthesizer with EEGs," he said. "I think we'll see a new kind of music."

Knispel, former chief psychologist at the Maryland Penitentiary, said the feedback of brain music — "from brain to synthesizer to speaker to ear, back to brain" — can help to relax patients suffering from acute stress.

"I think the creative potential for this, and the potential to use it in helpful clinical ways, are intriguing," Knispel said.

"I think there are good possibilities for using this clinically, even right now," he said. "What we have here is a technique that works very efficiently... You can very quickly give somebody the feeling of what real relaxation is."

Wright and Knispel have been collaborating on brain music experiments for about two years in the Conservatory's electronic music studio.

The Peabody studio is one of a few in the country where brain waves are being turned into music. It is possibly the only one where art and clinical science are so entwined.

Wright and Knispel described an experiment in which brain waves — patterns of infinitesimal electrical impulses — are mapped.

Points on the waves are assigned musical properties.

For example, when a wave, as recorded in a ragged line on the oscilloscope screen, reached a certain peak, it would cause

a change in the sound produced by the synthesizer. The pitch, or loudness, or timbre might change, the researchers said. Or a chime might go off.

The researchers used all of the studio's three synthesizers. Wright said that the brain's impulses do not produce any particular tone by themselves.

"We let the subject play them (the selected tones) and see whether he likes them... Then we fine-tune them, according to their taste," Wright said, comparing the preparation to that of a painter picking tints.

"We've had people in here who could produce these peaks on demand and make the bell ring on demand," Wright said.

Nonetheless, he says, "It takes a while to learn how to play the synthesizer with your mind."

With the studio's com-

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Overweight Costs Cops

MIDDLETOWN, Conn. (AP) - Patrolman Seth Hubbard plays racquetball, works out with weights and often walks the four miles between his home and the police station.

Yet, while his physical training program has built up the muscles on his 5-foot-10, 215-pound frame, the extra pounds have cost him two days' pay.

Hubbard's two-day suspension stems from an unusual and controversial weight requirement clause in the city's contract with the policemen's union. It is designed to fight heart disease and high blood pressure.

It tells overweight officers to take off pounds or be taken off the force.

Four times a year, this central Connecticut city's 56 patrolmen line up for a weigh-in. If in the January session their weight exceeds a standardized level for their height, the men and women face up to a week's suspension. They're required to hand in a weight reduction program. But after that, and although it's never happened, the officers could be out of work indefinitely if they don't lose weight.

In the last three years, 32 suspensions have been handed out to police officers who were from two to 98 pounds overweight, some of them repeating offenders.

"Some of the (suspended) men" have been physically fit," police union President James Marshall said recently. "The program does not address the problem."

The problem for the city, explained Middletown Personnel Director Thomas F. Malecky, is potential liability under a stringent state law known as the Heart and Hypertension Act. The law assumes that any heart or high blood pressure diseases suffered by police or firefighters is job-related and so municipalities must pay large temporary or permanent disability benefits to those employees or their survivors.

Twenty-one states have heart and hypertension acts, while Connecticut is one of three that have an "irrebuttable presumption" built in, according to Connecticut Conference of Municipalities spokesman Thomas Murphy. The other two are Maryland and Minnesota.

Murphy called the law "a costly measure." Between 1974 and 1978, 30 cities in Connecticut paid out \$2.4 million on heart and hypertension claims. The cities of Bridgeport and New Haven are responsible for about \$300,000 annually.

West Haven is another Connecticut city that has instituted a weight requirement for its police officers, but Deputy Chief Michael D'Errio says it has

not stirred up any controversy. West Haven's regulation allowed police officers to stay at their present weights - even if they were excessive - when the program began. New officers must meet the weight requirements.

Malecky said Middletown is not just concerned about money. A physically fit officer is prepared for the often strenuous duties of police work, he said. The city also has a moral responsibility to the officers and their families in ensuring its employees are in good health, he added.

Marshall said the police union agrees with the city in its aims and that's why the membership has approved the weight requirement three times since 1976. But following the staggered suspension of 15 officers this spring, the union has been clamoring for a change in the requirement.

Thirteen of the officers have filed grievances with the city Personnel Board. Marshall said the union will carry the fight to state authorities, if necessary.

"They're denying me the right to stay physically fit," said the 36-year-old Hubbard, who is 15 pounds over the contract's "maximum acceptable weight" of 200 pounds for men of his height.

"Every year I get a physical from my doctor. He has yet to tell me I'm overweight," the muscular patrolman said.

Officer John Labbadia, who at 6-foot-1 is 37 pounds over the 221-pound limit, said he would like to get down to 200 pounds but doubts if he could because of his big-bone structure. Labbadia has tried losing weight in several ways, including acupuncture. A pin in his ear, he said, restricted his appetite until it came out and "I pigged out."

But, the officer said, "I'm physically fit to do the job." Marshall is concerned about the officers who are not in shape. But he contends that the way to find them may not be on the scale, but in the gymnasium.

He has proposed to the city that police officers be required to pass a certain number of physical tests, such as running a 9-minute mile or doing 45 pushups.

Malecky said the city is "interested in other alternatives" but does not see any benefit to doing away with the weight requirement completely. At 6 feet even, Malecky, who weighs between 150 and 155 pounds, says he's never had a weight problem.

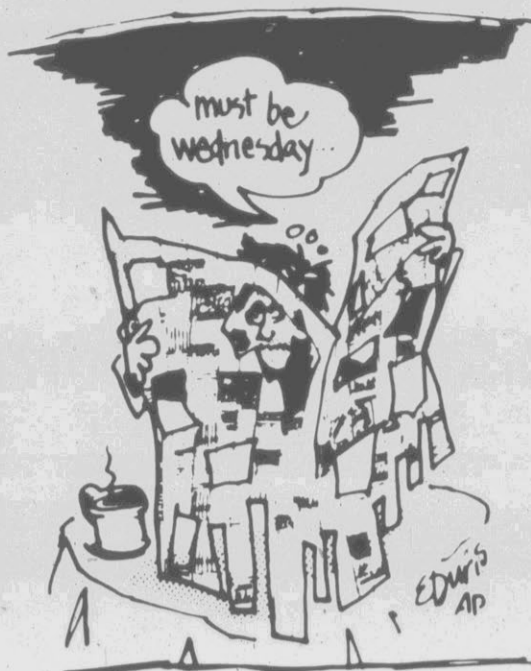

The snip of the scissors is the sound of saving for millions of Americans who have turned coupon clipping into big business.

There are books which tell you how to get the most from coupons, clubs whose members trade coupons with the enthusiasm of youngsters swapping baseball cards.

Stores lure shoppers with promises of refunds equal to double or even triple the face value of coupons. Manufacturers combine coupon offers with refunds which boost the value of some promotions to several dollars.

The A.C. Nielsen Co., which keeps track of marketing trends in a wide variety of areas in addition to television, reports that manufacturers distributed 90.6 billion coupons in 1980, up 12 percent from 1979.

More than 900 manufacturers' coupons were distributed for every U.S. household. And that doesn't count the coupons issued by retailers.

Only about 4 percent of the manufacturers' coupons are redeemed, but the redemptions add up. In 1979 alone, for example, the value of the redeemed coupons was about \$160 million.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that four families in five use coupons. Until recently, the people who used coupons most were the ones who needed them least - middle and upper-income consumers. There are signs, however, that coupon use is spreading on all levels.

A study by Nielsen showed, for example, that 69 percent of families with incomes of \$10,000 or less used coupons in 1980, up from 51 percent in 1975. The study also showed that 57 percent of non-white households and 69 percent of Hispanics used coupons, a finding which Nielsen said was "contrary to traditional perceptions."

To get the most from coupons, it is important to use them properly.

Josephine Swanson, a consumer educator from Cornell University, points out that you don't save money if you use a coupon for a product you don't need.

"Ultimately, consumers end up paying for the cost of offering coupons," she says. "If you would buy the product anyway, use a coupon, by all means. But don't use one just because it's offered."

Ms. Swanson also says that coupons rarely save you much on staples. "You could never feed a family on couponed items only," she says. "Basic foods such as fruit, vegetables, milk and meat, for example, are rarely couponed."

The cost of cheating can be high. Industry sources say as many as 20 percent to 30 percent of all coupons are misredeemed; the cost of the fraud is added to your supermarket bill.

Here are some steps you can take to save:

-Check newspaper and magazine advertisements and store shelves for refund offers which can be combined with coupons. If you see an ad for a refund and your store doesn't have the forms, ask the manager to get some.

-Organize your coupons, separating them according to category and date of expiration. You don't need a fancy filing system; a few

envelopes will do. Go through the file periodically to weed out unused or expired coupons.

-Plan your shopping around coupons. Suppose you see a coupon offering 20 cents off on paper towels - this week only. It makes sense to buy the towels now, even if you don't need them right away.

-Familiarize yourself with regular prices so you know whether an advertised "bargain" is really a good deal. If you visit a particular store to take advantage of a coupon offer, make sure you don't wind up paying higher-than-normal prices for other items.

-Read the fine print. Some coupon offers have strings attached. A store may tie coupon use to a minimum purchase. Don't let yourself be lured into buying things you don't need just so you'll meet the minimum.

-Compare prices for national brands, house brands and generic products. A national brand bought with a coupon may still cost more than the house brand or the generic. Unless you have a good reason for wanting the national brand, it doesn't make sense to spend extra just so you can use the coupon.

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Benefitting By Freedom

WASHINGTON (AP) —
Liberals and conservatives, consumers and businessmen and even state officials trying to keep track of the federal government all have used the Freedom of Information Act.

The act has been used to expand public knowledge of such diverse topics as the CIA's testing of drugs on unwitting Americans, the cancer risks of pregnant women taking the hormone DES, and pollution in the Ohio River.

With the Senate Judiciary Committee planning to consider amendments later this month to restrict use of the act, the Campaign for Political Rights issued a study Sunday detailing more than 500 examples of how consumers, businesses, journalists, historians, state officials and political groups have used the act to obtain federal government documents.

"Many of the 500 cases are familiar stories to the American public," said Peggy Shaker, executive director of the private, liberal group which opposes the amendments before the Judiciary committee. "But few people realize that this information

would never have left the government's filing cabinets if it weren't for the FOIA."

The 180-page study includes cases of disclosures under the act involving consumer product safety, drug safety, and government behavior control; the environment and nuclear power; fraud, waste and government corruption; labor and civil rights; business, history; foreign affairs and defense; government intrusion into political activities, and taxes.

Among the better-known disclosures listed are those about the investigations of the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy and civil rights leader Martin Luther King, the radiation exposure of U.S. soldiers in nuclear tests during the 1950s, FBI spying on dissenters, and various automobile defects.

The Reagan administration supports amendments sponsored by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, that would restrict access to law enforcement, intelligence and business records held by the government. Hatch and the administration argue that the law imposes undue burdens on government agencies and has not been used as much by the public and the press as originally envisioned.

But David Sobel, counsel for the campaign, said in a forward to the study: "The law has uncovered dangerous health and safety conditions, fraud, waste and illegal government conduct. It has helped authors and journalists provide important information to the public. It has also assisted individuals, unions and businesses in pursuing their legal rights in the judicial system. In short, the act has fostered democratic participation in the affairs of state."

Among the examples cited in the study:

—The Public Citizen Health Research Group obtained University of Chicago research from the Food and Drug Administration showing a possible increase in breast cancer among pregnant women taking DES. The Surgeon General later sent a nationwide advisory asking doctors to notify women exposed to DES to get special check-ups for cancer.

—The Center for National Security Studies obtained extensive CIA files on its testing of drugs, viruses and chemical agents on prisoners, terminal cancer patients and some unwitting human subjects. The results appeared in numerous newspaper and magazine articles, several television broadcasts and a book, "The Search for the Manchurian Candidate," by John Marks.

—The Louisville Courier-Journal obtained Environmental Protection Agency audits showing manufacturers were violating local sewage codes by dumping hazardous wastes in the Ohio River, which provides drinking water for those downstream. A month after the newspaper published the information in August and September, 1981, the county ordered 46 companies to cease sewage violations.

—The State of New Mexico used the act to obtain Interior and Energy Department documents which allegedly showed the federal government was failing to meet regulations in its pilot project for disposing of nuclear waste in the state. The state has used the information to file suit against the federal government.

—The Conservative Caucus obtained documents from 17 agencies on federal financing of "liberal-left" groups for an article in the April, 1982, Conservative Digest.

—A group known as Stop Project ELF, opposed to the Navy's plans for a project in northern Wisconsin and Michigan to beam extremely low frequency signals to submarines, obtained Navy Department documents.

—The Progressive magazine obtained Navy department documents about "Project Headspair," in which the Navy implanted electrodes in sharks so they could be steered by radio signals for military uses. The documents showed that human recruits were substituted in the final test because not enough sharks were available.

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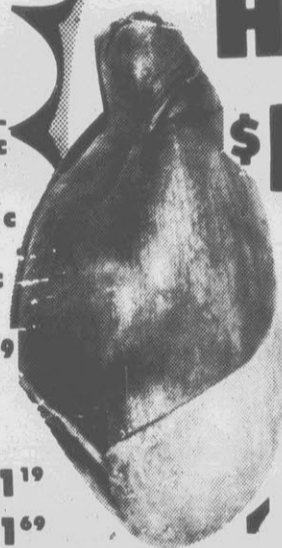

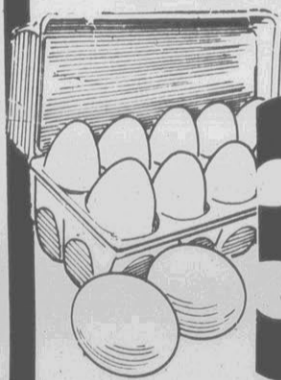

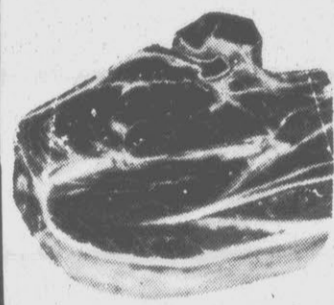

Unexplained Holds Allure

GREENSBURG, Pa. (AP) — They gather quietly, these people who dare to believe, to probe the backlands of Pennsylvania in an attempt to explain the unexplained.

Members of the Pennsylvania Association for the Study of the Unexplained are ready in a moment's notice to investigate reports of UFOs, Bigfoot-like creatures or even seldom-seen wild cats.

"We're not going out and looking for anything in particular," says Stan Gordon, director of the association. "But the people keep telling us the same type of thing. You get out there and interview all these people. And you realize the fact that people can't all be wrong."

Association members say they uncover the same eerie details. There may be strange, pulsating lights on domes in the night sky. Or, perhaps, reports of large, hairy creatures that leave behind the acrid odor of rotten eggs.

Gordon, 32, an electronics technician interested in UFOs since age 10, formed the non-profit organization last September.

The 35 members are volunteers. They use their own equipment to gather data. They come from varied professions and backgrounds — doctors, nuclear physicists, hypnotists and philosophers.

Eyewitness accounts and evidence — plaster casts of footprints and clumps of shredded metal believed dropped from UFOs — are sent to other groups, such as the Center for UFO Study in Evanston, Ill., and the Mutual UFO Network in Seguin, Texas.

An unusually high number of reports were made in 1973, Gordon said. Of the 1,000 reports in Pennsylvania, nearly 95 percent had natural explanations — planets or stars, aircraft lights, meteors. Less than 5 percent were deliberate hoaxes, Gordon said.

There were no answers for the rest, he said. One of the latest documented incidents in Pennsylvania occurred last March near New Castle. Two patrolmen and two others saw "a huge white light configuration" in the sky, according to New Castle Police Chief David Rishel.

Both Gordon and his co-director, George Lutz, say they initially were skeptics. But no more.

"If you're on the scene after a Bigfoot (or UFO) sighting, you don't even have to talk to the witnesses," says Lutz, a retired Air Force pilot. "All you have to do is look at them and look at the animals... and you know they've seen something they've never seen before."

Near Ohiopyle, Pa., normally ferocious dogs refused to budge from their shelters after a Bigfoot

creature was reported nearby, he said.

"If we really went into a lot of things we have run into the public would say we're a bunch of kooks," Lutz said.

"The people can't all be mistaken," Gordon added. "they're having some type of an experience."

Gordon has never had a close encounter of his own.

But despite skepticism by many of his work, he persists because he understands what he calls their fear.

"Who wants to believe?" he asked.

"A lack of privacy can be related to aggression or psychological withdrawal," the article says. It quotes Dr. Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi of the University of Chicago as saying that children up to age 12 who daydream when they are alone "spin out stories and visualize themselves doing positive things. It broadens their imagination, gets them in touch with their feelings, and helps them learn about themselves."

Fear Trade 'Unreliable'

MOSCOW (AP) —
Pepsi-Cola stands are reopening in Moscow after the long Russian winter, a sure sign of spring and the Soviet thirst for Western products.

The Pepsi stands are the most visible reminder of detente-era hopes for U.S.-Soviet trade, hopes that the Soviets claim have been dashed by American insistence on linking politics and trade.

"In overall terms, I would say that the picture is bleak and getting bleaker," said a U.S. diplomat in Moscow. American businessmen and government officials interviewed here agreed that, while continuing to buy corn and wheat from the United States, the Soviet Union is looking to other trading partners for most everything else—especially technology.

"Western Europe and Japan are more natural trading partners for the Soviet Union," the diplomat said, noting that West European nations are negotiating a 20-year deal to buy Siberian natural gas in return for credit and technical know-how.

U.S. grain sales to the Soviet Union have accounted for more than half of bilateral trade over the past five years, even when taking into account the grain embargo imposed in 1980 by former President Carter after the Soviet army moved into Afghanistan.

But even before Afghanistan became an issue, superpower rivalry soured bilateral prospects early in the detente era when the U.S. Congress voted to link commerce to Soviet emigration policies.

U.S. sanctions over Afghanistan and more recently over the martial law crackdown in Poland further cut trade, and angered Soviet leaders who charge that a signed contract with an U.S. company can be sacrificed to politics on short notice.

"As for U.S.S.R.-U.S.A. trade and economic relations, the decline in mutual trade volumes can only be attributed to the American side," Foreign Trade Minister Nikolai Patolichev wrote in the March issue of his ministry's magazine, Foreign Trade.

"The present policy of the American administration has caused some uncertainty among American firms and Soviet foreign trade organizations about the possibility of conducting normal business relations under such conditions," Patolichev said.

U.S. statistics show that bilateral trade hit a peak of \$4.8 billion in 1979, with a \$2.73 billion surplus for the United States. Trade sank back dramatically to \$1.9

billion in 1980, but bounced back to \$2.68 billion in 1981, after President Reagan lifted the grain embargo as he had promised during the election campaign.

Other indicators of a cooling business climate are the lull at the once-bustling U.S. Embassy-affiliated American commercial office here, and a drop in the membership of the U.S.-Soviet Trade Council from about 280 American companies when it was founded at the height of detente to about 220 today. Both offices are trimming their staffs.

More than politics are involved. The Kremlin is balking at deals with the West for a variety of reasons—primarily economic.

—The Soviet economy has been dragged into the recessionary slowdown that has crimped Western countries.

—Three consecutive bad grain harvests have drained Soviet foreign currency reserves by forcing Moscow to cough up hard-earned convertible currencies for livestock feed.

—The imposition of martial law in Poland after months of labor unrest has further taxed Moscow—taking already shrinking resources to help prop up the Polish martial law government with credits and outright aid.

"Last October and November, they were very eager to do business, but there have been very few new deals signed since the beginning of the year," said one U.S. businessman.

"They are asking for financing on downpayments, which they formerly paid cash for," he said.

West German, French and Japanese businessmen have reported recent Soviet requests for additional financing for on-going deals.

Despite the continuing chill in U.S.-Soviet trade, American businessmen with long experience in Moscow remain hopeful.

"The situation is not all that gloomy," said John Marschalko, regional vice president for American Express, the U.S. travel and financial firm that started doing business here in 1934 and opened its first Moscow office in 1958.

Marschalko said his firm handled about 3,546 foreign visitors to the Soviet Union last year, down from the peak year of 1978 when 100,000 Americans visited the country. Virtually no Soviets wander into the downtown offices, decorated with posters of the warm-weather vacations spots preferred by Moscow's foreign residents but beyond the reach of most Soviet citizens.

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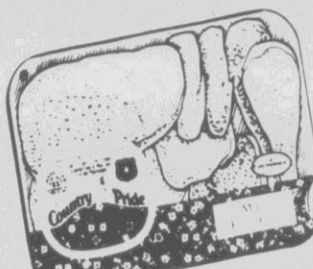

Mission To Indians To End May 29

QUITO, Ecuador (AP) — The Bible-translating missionaries of the Summer Institute of Linguistics, who for 30 years have worked with the Indians in the mountains and jungles of Ecuador, are preparing to leave by May 29 on orders of the government.

The decision, made a year ago, stirred up a national debate over the institute's work and the future of the indigenous people the missionaries will leave behind.

In question is whether the government will be capable of working with isolated native populations — some still living a Stone-Age-type existence — or whether, as one newspaper columnist suggested, their cultures will die and their languages will become no more than "sounds lost forever among the jungle's vegetable mass and river torrents."

"It looks like we're leaving for sure," William Eddy, the institute's public relations man in Ecuador, said in a recent interview.

He added that the institute unsuccessfully appealed for an extension until 1985 to complete its mission in Ecuador, a predominantly Roman Catholic country.

The institute is the overseas arm of the U.S.-based Wycliffe Bible Translators, the world's largest Protestant missionary organization. It has more than 3,900 volunteers working in 237 other countries. About 1,000 volunteers work in Latin America.

One of its Latin American workers, Chester Allen Bitterman 3rd of Lancaster, Pa., was kidnapped in neighboring Colombia in January, 1981, by dissident members of the country's M-19 guerrilla movement who charged that the institute was a front for the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. The dissidents demanded the institute leave Colombia and when it refused, Bitterman was killed.

The institute's contract in Ecuador, like those in other countries, lets it investigate aboriginal languages in return for assistance to government-approved health, bi-lingual education and agricultural projects.

Its prime objective — introducing primitive people to Christianity — has come under fire in recent years by anthropologists who claim it threatens the traditional religious and cultural values of the indigenous people.

Other opponents of the organization — Latin American leftist groups, social workers and human-rights advocates and some anthropologists, maintain that the institute wittingly or unwittingly serves the interests of the United States, especially by opening the jungles to U.S. oil companies by serving as intermediaries with hostile Indians.

More extreme charges, such as those made by the M-19 dissidents in Colombia, are that the missionaries are CIA agents, smugglers and advocates of enforced sterilization.

The institute has denied all these charges.

The Ecuadorean government claims that a major reason for breaking its contract with the institute was to stop the debate.

"The government position is clear," Vladimir Serrano Perez, undersecretary of government, said recently.

"Ecuador is sufficiently mature to handle the cultural problems which exist in the country and to resolve them in an efficient manner."

He said an anthropological institute would be established with support from the Catholic University of Ecuador and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization or UNESCO to take over the missionaries' operations.

"The government insists there are trained personnel prepared to take over the linguistic program," Eddy said. "But they are not out there. It looks like it will be abandoned."

Eddy's opinion is shared by most newspapers in the country, which generally have lamented the departure of the institute.



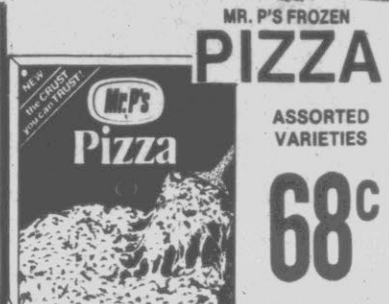
