## Pressuring Argentina British Push Permanent Peace

Britain today put new pressure on Argentina to declare a permanent peace in the South Atlantic, saying hundreds of captured Argentine troops on the Falkland Islands could die of exposure and illness if there is more delay.

The warning came from the commander of the British task force after Argentine President Gen. Leopoldo F. Galtieri and his two junta partners were the targets of violent demonstrations Tuesday night by thousands of Argentines angered at the defeat in the Falklands.

The junta has said that if Britain reinstates British rule over the islands there will not be peace in the South Atlantic.

In a press statement released by the British government in London, Rear Adm. John Woodward said the care of 15,000 Argentine POWs on the Falklands posed "a major disaster relief problem."

"The Argentines must appreciate that I cannot keep their troops dry and warm and fed while we are still subject to attack. They must face the facts and call a halt to all, repeat all, hostilities," Woodward said.

He said the prisoners, some of whom have been on the Falklands in wintry conditions since the Argentine invasion April 2, were "already suffering from malnutrition, exposure — in some cases hypothermia (subnormal body temperature) — trench foot, scabies and diarrhea."

Galtieri, forced to cancel a public appearance because of the demonstrations, went on national television to vow Argentina will never accept London's plans to reinstate British rule in the Falklands.

He said Britain must not "proceed to establish a colonial regime, with which there will be neither definitive peace nor security. It will be Great Britain's responsibility for deepening the conflict."

British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher ruled out any future Argentine say in the running of the islands, rejected a call from the Labor opposition for a United Nations trusteeship and vowed she would "not negotiate on the sovereignty of the islands in any way except with the people who live there."

"I hope we have restored once again the dominance of Britain and let every nation know that where there is British sovereign territory it will be well and truly defended," she told the House of Commons Tuesday.

British Defense Secretary John Nott said Tuesday night he believed the fighting was over but raised the possibility Argentina could continue to strike at British forces from its bases on the mainland.

"I believe it is (over)," he said in a television interview, "although I cannot be certain whether they will continue hostilities from the mainland."

Maj. Gen. Jeremy Moore,

## City Schools Ask For \$100,000

At another in a series of budget workshop sessions, the Pitt County Board of Commissioners Tuesday heard Greenville city school leaders ask for \$100,000 more in current expense money than was proposed in the 1982-83 budget recommended by County Manager Reginald Gray.

Gray, following guidelines set by commissioners, last week recommended a \$25.48 million budget for the coming year — including \$7.26 million in local funds for the county and city school districts.

In his budget message, Gray said "without a tax rate increase of 26.3 cents," which he concluded "the citizens of Pitt County would not stand for ... there is no way to provide all that has been requested by the two school systems."

The county schools have requested \$3.15 million in capital outlay funds and \$5.56 million in current expense money, while the city system has asked for \$541,200 in capital outlay and \$2.4 million for current expense.

Gray's recommendations for the coming year would allocate \$2.02 million for current expense and \$172,700 for capital outlay to the city and \$4.67 million in current expense and \$407,900 in capital outlay for the county.

Greenville school Superintendent Delma Blinson told commissioners Tuesday that the city schools stand to lose "eight to 12 teaching positions" if additional money is not allocated.

Blinson and members of the Greenville Board of Education told commissioners that the city schools' have been hurt by a drop in student population. The superintendent said the loss of one student causes a loss of some \$2,000 in state support and the 1982-83 allocation from the state reflects a loss of some 90 students.

"We can't maintain the same level of service," and keep the same number of teachers without additional funds, Blinson emphasized, adding that the cost of operation of the schools does not decrease in proportion to the drop in the number of students.

Blinson also told commissioners that "less than 12 school systems in the state are not losing teachers this year — Pitt County is one of them," suggesting that the city system needs more local support per capita than does the county school unit to maintain a quality program.

Blinson and members of the school board suggested to commissioners that, ultimately, the only solution to the problems created by declining enrollment would be to change the school district

boundaries (enlarge the city school district), merge the county and city school systems or provide increased local funding for the schools in Greenville.

It is the "unanimous belief and desire" on the part of the city school board, chairman Jon Tinglestad said, that "consolidation" is the best solution to the problem.

Gray, in order to show school board members that the commissioners have supported school needs over the years, circulated a list of figures which showed that budgets for the schools have increased each year for the past 10 years.

According to the figures, local funding of city school current expense items has

increased from \$827,300 in 1973-74 to \$1.98 million for the current year, while the current expense budget for the county system has jumped from \$1.35 million in 1973-74 to \$4.5 million this year. He added that Pitt County ranks 13th in the state in total local funding for schools.

The problem with declining enrollment was pointed out

by figures circulated by Gray which showed that for the 1970-71 school year, Greenville had 6,112 students while the county had 13,395 students (a 31.33 to 68.67 percent division), while the figures on which the 1982-83 funds will be divided is based on a city average daily membership of 4,806 and a county ADM of 11,350 (29.747 to 70.253 percent basis).

### COURT ORDER

The N.C. attorney general has granted a court order that temporarily stops Georgia-based Love Shop Ltd. (L.S.LTD.) from continuing to solicit "business ventures" in North Carolina and from making what the attorney general finds to be unsubstantiated income representations until the firm complies with this state's business opportunity law.

The firm has run advertisements in this state claiming that a 71-year-old investor in the company grossed \$400 million in one year. This claim has not been substantiated, Attorney General Rufus Edmisten says, and the company has not satisfied any of the requirements of North Carolina law governing this type of promotion. The requirement includes documented data placed on record in the office of the N.C. secretary of state prior to placing advertisements, interviewing potential investors or negotiating contracts.

The firm, which also has offices in Canada, also is restricted to court-approved disposition of funds or property received from the sale of "business opportunities" in North Carolina.

Edmisten said the firm has run newspaper ads soliciting part-time workers to "service" display racks of pens and markers in retail stores. The ads claimed that, for a \$6,200-\$18,600 investment, "excellent first-month earnings" are possible because of a "90-95 percent mark up" of the products. Investors are offered local personal interviews with field representatives of L.S.LTD. to discuss the proposed business opportunity. According to a copy of the L.S. LTD. contract obtained by consumer protection officials in Edmisten's office, the firm agrees to provide help in finding locations for the displays and investors are required to pay an initial \$500 — on minimum contracts — immediately and \$5,700 when the contract is approved by the company. Inventory is promised to be shipped within 60 days thereafter.

## Greenville Crime Sharply Up In First Three Months Of New Year

Greenville's crime increased 15 percent in the months of January-March of this year, the sharpest gain in any of 15 North Carolina cities surveyed in a recent report compiled by the state Justice Department's Police Information Network.

According to the report, the most dramatic increase in the city was in property crimes. In the first quarter of 1981, Greenville had 680 property crimes; during the same period in 1982, the city reported 757 property crimes.

In contrast, property crimes decreased statewide by 2 percent, Attorney Gen-

eral Rufus Edmisten said. The report, which includes cities like Asheville, Burlington, Durham, Fayetteville, Goldsboro, Rocky Mount, Raleigh, Wilson and Wilmington, indicates there were 66 violent crimes reported in Greenville in the first quarter of 1982 — 33 more than in 1981.

In addition, five rapes were reported in 1981, compared to two in 1982. Robberies multiplied to 33 in 1982, up from 15 robberies in 1981. Aggravated assaults jumped from 15 last year to 27 in 1982; burglaries increased from 208 to 228; larcenies rose from 457 to 491 and motor vehicle theft in-

creased from 15 to 38. According to the PIN report, Wilson had no change in the crime rate as compared to the first quarter in 1981; Rocky Mount had a 6 percent increase and Wilmington had a decrease of 16 percent. Charlotte and Raleigh each had an increase in the crime rate of 13 percent.

In the state as a whole, Edmisten said PIN statistics show a dramatic upswing in certain violent crimes during the months of January through March.

"I am concerned about the large increase in robbery and aggravated assault

because these often lead to serious personal injuries," Edmisten said. "However, it's encouraging to see the slowing down of property crimes, the most prevalent of all crimes."

The overall number of crimes reported to PIN by law enforcement agencies during the first quarter of 1982 decreased 1 percent compared to the number reported in the first quarter of 1981.

"This is the third quarter in a row that we have seen marginal decreases in indexed crimes," Edmisten said, "and that's encouraging. I only hope that this will become a trend."

## P-Z Commission OKs Rezoning Request

The Greenville Planning & Zoning Commission, meeting briefly Tuesday night, voted to recommend City Council approval of a request to rezone a small tract of land north of U.S. 264 Bypass.

Board members endorsed the request by Tucker Farms Inc. to rezone, from highway commercial to residential (R-6), approximately 0.461 acres located south of Shenandoah Heights Subdivision and north of the bypass.

Staff planner Faryce Goode explained that the Tucker Farms property is surrounded by duplex, town homes,

multifamily and mobile home sales development. She said the owners expressed an interest in rezoning the small strip of land to make it compatible for future multifamily usage.

Bobby Roberson, the city's planning director, said the change to an R-6 designation would square off the zoning line and conform with recommendations made several years ago by the planning staff. Roberson said it now appears multifamily represents the best land use for the tract. Frontage along 264 remains highway commercial, it was pointed out.

Board alternate Jim Ward, who said he owns property near the Tucker Farms tract, was allowed to abstain from voting

on the matter. The board continued until a later date consideration of a request by Methodist Retirement Homes Inc. to amend the thoroughfare plan by deleting First Street extending east of Warren Street and by deleting the Brownlea connector to Fifth Street.

Roberson and Ron Sewell, director of engineering and inspections, said they were not ready to make recommendations on the matter Tuesday night but agreed that a special call meeting could be scheduled. They also said it would be helpful if board members could visit the site to get an idea of what is involved in the amendment request.

## Candidates Favor A Balanced Budget At Forum

A desire to see the federal budget balanced and a re-sounding no to providing additional tax concessions to industry coming into Pitt County were the two issues on which 10 candidates were in complete agreement at a "Meet the Candidate Forum" held Tuesday night in the Pitt County Commissioners Board Room.

Candidates seeking election as county commissioners, city school board members, county sheriff, congressmen and district attorney were on hand to respond to a list of seven issues chosen by the Pitt County Taxpayers Association.

Candidates appearing at the forum were: for County Commission, Dr. Elliott Dixon, Bruce Jones and Charles

McLawhorn; for the Greenville City School Board, Erma Cobb, Wilson Rhodes and Mary Williams; for Pitt County sheriff, Ron Cooper; for the U.S. House from the 1st District, Tom Brandon Jr. and Gene Leggett; and for district attorney, Judicial District 3-A, Tom Haigwood.

Persons moderating the forum were Ralph Tucker, Bob Ramey and Margie

Hart. The issue of whether or not the county and city school systems should be merged drew a considerable response from the candidates. All the candidates emphasized that since the merger study mandated by Pitt County Commissioners several years ago has never been completed and adopted, neither candidates nor the public had substantial in-

formation on which to base a valid opinion pro or con.

Dr. Dixon feels "problems in education have to be solved at the local basis. We can no longer turn to Washington or to Raleigh for funds needed. We have two school systems not equal in size and distribution. We cannot allow one to become a ghetto while the other prospers."

"We must take a hard look

at merger, look at practical realignment of school districts and consider alternatives that are reasonable to taxpayers," was the stand expressed by McLawhorn. "First, we must have facts."

Jones said he would not favor merger now, "but at a later date when I know what the proposal involves, maybe I would say yes."

# Homemaker's Haven

It should be noted that imitation dairy foods are not the only man-made or so-called fabricated foods available in the supermarket today. Imitation eggs, orange juice type beverages, and breakfast patties that simulate sausage, are just a few of the increasing number of substitute or synthetic food products currently available. But among the wide variety of fabricated foods now on the market, imitation dairy foods are among the most widely accepted by consumers.

In a world where imitations abound, it's sometimes difficult to discern what's real and what's not in the dairy case. That's why it takes a keen eye and careful attention to product labels to decide what's real. It is also equally important to know what the difference between products can mean.

The characteristic that sets imitations in a category all their own are their ingredients. Although exact formulations for dairy product "look-alikes" vary somewhat between products, they have one thing in common. They use non-dairy ingredients in place of milk. Some fabricated foods simply remove the milkfat and replace it with a vegetable fat or oil. They're considered a "filled" milk type of product. Others replace all components of milk with non-dairy ingredients.

Up until now, the consumer's best guide and quickest clue in discerning real from imitations was to take a close look at the ingredients listing on the package label. If it's real, the ingredient label is very simple with few ingredients listed...with the names of basic dairy foods like milk or cream listed first. On the other hand, an imitation product has a list of ingredients that seems to go on and on, including names of ingredients that most consumers can't pronounce, let alone recognize.

Because there are no standards which govern the formulations of imitations, manufacturers of dairy food "look-alikes" have two choices in naming their products. They can label the product "imitation" whatever or call them by a fanciful name — which is an entirely new name.

One concern with the fanciful named products is that they also carry what the Federal Drug Administration (FDA) calls a characterizing name, or a sort of descriptive phrase which tells the consumer what the product is. In these characterizing phrases the word "substitute" will be

interpreted to mean that the fabricated product can take the place of, or be interchangeable with the real thing. That is just not true when it comes to comparing the nutrients in real vs. fabricated foods. While it is feasible for a food manufacturer to add specified levels of certain key nutrients to a fabricated food, nutrition experts agree that it is impossible to duplicate the exact nutrient composition of a real food.

The other naming alternative is to call the new food "imitation" whatever. But, because the word "imitation" carries a negative connotation with some consumers, manufacturers usually try to come up with a new name for their products, unless the product is clearly inferior. If it is, FDA requires that it carry the name of "imitation" on its label. But just when is a product considered inferior? At present time there are no clear-cut guidelines on this issue.

Many consumers believe that imitations contain fewer calories than real products. The fact is, they may or may not. Usually, fabricated foods substitute one type of fat for another. But a gram of fat still counts as nine calories whether it's from an animal or a plant source. Only if the total amount of fat is reduced will the imitation product be reduced in calories.

Consumers think that imitation dairy products are lower in saturated fats than real dairy foods. But many fabricated dairy products use coconut oil which is 90 percent saturated compared to butterfat — which is 60 percent saturated.

Consumers automatically assume that ersatz dairy products are always less expensive. But a supermarket check will reveal that while they are sometimes cheaper, that is not always the case.

Consumers, unless they have used the imitation products before, tend to think that imitations can be used interchangeably for traditional dairy foods in cooking. However, cooking properties of fabricated foods are not always the same. Consumers tend to make this mistake once.

And, of primary concern to nutritionists is the fact that many consumers wrongly assume that fabricated foods are the same nutritionally as real dairy foods. This is not


true. It is not currently possible to duplicate the exact nutrient composition of a real food.

The best advice that can be advanced to the average consumer is to shop carefully. Check labels carefully and

know what you are not buying. And remember, protect the nutritional well being of your family.



## Inside Or Outside

Some folks say they would never put up with drying clothes outdoors and others swear that it's the only way to have fresh, spring-like clothes.

Is one way better than the other? According to Harriet Tutterow, extension clothing specialist at North Carolina State University, it all depends on your point of view.

Both methods have advantages and disadvantages. Tumble drying, for example, saves time and effort. It makes clothes soft and fluffy, removes wrinkles and is not affected by the weather.

On the other hand, the dryer will cost \$300 to \$500 you might rather spend for something else. And it costs 43 cents a load to operate with electricity. Last, it may just take up too much space.

Line drying does give you a fresh smell with little or no cost for equipment. Large items can dry thoroughly with no agitation.

Of course, you have to contend with bad weather, stiff clothes and clothing soiled by pollutants and birds.

Whichever method you chose, do it right for best results, Tutterow advises. When line drying, be sure clothes line and pins are clean. Shake and straighten clothes as you hang them and hang by the firmest part of the item. Distribute the weight of a heavy item over two lines.

If your dryer appears to be taking extra long to dry a load, check for overloading, dirty lint filter, exhaust obstruction, too many hard-to-dry articles mixed in or washer not spinning properly.

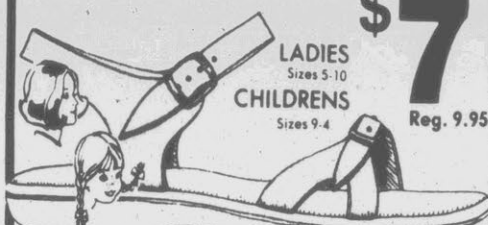

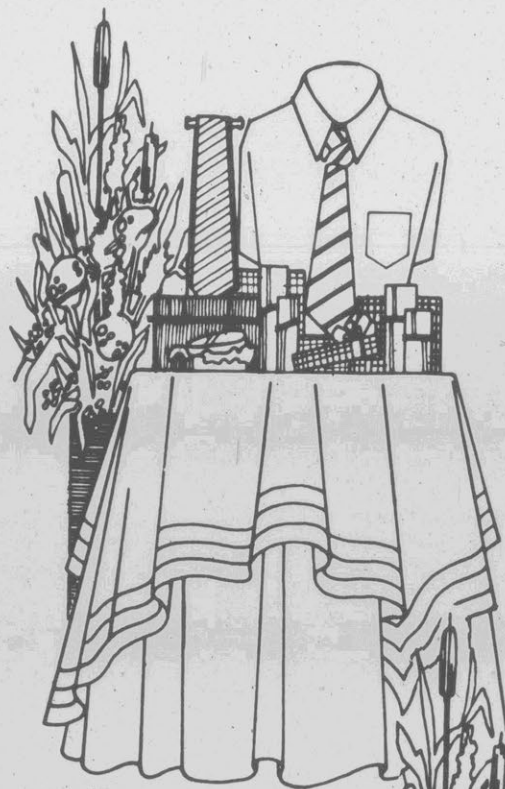

# Aggression Is Rebuffed

The Falklands Islands war is over.

It was a war that was never declared and it may not be formally ended, but with the expulsion of the Argentinian troops from Port Stanley the islands are back under British control.

Argentina could continue to harass the British military and the civilian occupants of the islands through air raids or commando landings, but it is not likely that Argentina will ever re-take control except through negotiations with Great Britain.

This was far from an easy war for the British. To start, it had to be difficult to marshal public support for fighting over a remote spot in the South Atlantic. Then it was necessary to move a large part of the British navy to the area to cut

off Argentinian troops on the islands from supplies from the mainland.

Finally an invasion had to be planned which would put sufficient ground forces on the Falklands to re-take them. The maneuvers were executed brilliantly. The British suffered major and surprising losses at sea, but were little challenged on land — this despite the fact that Argentinian troop strength on the Falklands was underestimated.

What has been gained? Almost nothing as measured in terms of wealth or territory. Nevertheless the British have demonstrated in the most forceful way that aggression will not be tolerated. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and the British people deserve our admiration for that.

Let's see now. As we understand it Henry Kissinger was on his way to a flight bound for a Boston hospital when an activist approached him with an offensive and tasteless question.

Mrs. Kissinger grabbed the person by the neck, and wound up charged with assault.

New Jersey Judge Julio Fuentes

acquitted Mrs. Kissinger, commenting her actions were "a spontaneous and somewhat human reaction to an offensive question."

We firmly believe in freedom of speech and that disputes should not be resolved by violence. There are times, however, when even the most restrained of our public figures can be baited beyond endurance.

# Groundwork First

RALEIGH — Gov. Jim Hunt, his critics have been telling us lately, has personal political ambitions of a national nature. Practically every press release issued from state Republican headquarters these days makes some reference to "promoting (Hunt's) national reputation." Opponents of the Equal Rights Amendment went on the radio waves in May saying Hunt supported ERA because he's running for president.

If you're a political opponent of Hunt's, this probably isn't bad politics. If everytime the governor brushes his teeth you charge he's trying to polish his national image, eventually you'll persuade some people that the sole driving force behind the man is personal ambition. That, of course, can help when your politician runs against Hunt in 1984.

The only problem with the ERA theory and all the Republican bombast about running for vice-president or president is that it doesn't make much sense. Jim Hunt would like to be president like I'd like to be national political columnist for The Washington Post. We can both dream about it, but we know it isn't coming.

There is no chance that Hunt can go from the Governor's Mansion to the White House. He needs a step in-between. Maybe that step is vice-president. But you don't run for vice-president. You get picked. And Jim Hunt is far too smart — and cautious — a politician to stake his political career on

the political whims of the 1984 Democratic presidential nominee who may or may not be someone who needs Hunt as a running mate.

So why is Hunt pushing ERA and working for the national Democratic party and making speeches about Reaganomics and New Federalism? Three reasons. Part of it is his job. When national policy affects North Carolina, he should speak out. Part of it is his personal belief. He believes in ERA. And part is politics. All this

makes him a better challenger to Jesse Helms in the 1984 U.S. Senate election.

Helms is a national senator. He raised \$7 million nationally in 1978 and will probably go for twice that much national New Right money in 1984. Howdy Doodie could run against Helms in 1984 and get a bundle from liberal groups. But if anyone wants to raise that \$5 million or more it may take just to

stay in the ballpark with Helms, they'd better be well known nationally. They'd better be able to get the maximum contribution from every political action committee — liberal, moderate and conservative — that would like to be rid of Helms.

Hunt is laying that groundwork now — even though his aides swear he hasn't decided whether or not he'll run. After he decides to run, he'll then have to decide if he wants national money. Hunt can raise a lot of money here in North Carolina. It might not be a bad strategy to refuse out-of-state money and then hammer Helms with the national ambition tag that the GOP has been trying to lay on Hunt. The Democrats may be able to hurt Helms with the charge that he's been so busy on the national scene that he's forgotten the folks back home.

Getting into the trenches in

"That's not good enough,"

said David. "Nobody enjoys watching scruffy people in a parade."

What kind of uniforms would you suggest?" "Real sharp military ones with shiny boots, snappy

headgear, brass buttons and lots of gold on the epaulets."

"But if it's an anti-war parade, wouldn't uniforms make the participants look militaristic?"

"So what? The main purpose of a demonstration is to win over people to your cause. What better way than to put on a good show with bands, uniforms, flags flying and thousands of people on the sidewalks cheering them on?"

"I'll admit your idea has merit, but what you're describing is against everything the anti-nuclear war people stand for."

"It's the end results that count. Once you've got the people in a patriotic fervor, they'll go along with anything you suggest. Right now no one comes out for an anti-nuclear parade because there

is nothing to see. What attracts people to a parade is they never know what's coming next."

"You're not suggesting the protestors also pass by with missiles, are you?"

"Why not? They could have mockups of nuclear weapons, and drive them past, pointing them toward the sky. Kids love that."

"The next thing I know you're going to suggest a flyby with airplanes."

"That's not bad. All you need is two jets with colored smoke coming out of their tails."

"I can't put my finger on it, David, but there is something crazy about your whole idea."

"I may not know anything about nuclear war, but I do know what makes a good parade," he assured me.

"But there's more to an anti-nuke rally than a parade. There are speeches, and protest songs, and praying," I said.

"Right. But without a good parade all the people are doing is talking to the converted. The ones you want to reach won't follow your parade if you don't give them a decent show. And the only way you're going to do that is by slapping your rifles sharply when you pass the reviewing stand."

"You're suggesting the anti-nuclear protestors carry rifles?"

"With naked bayonets attached, gleaming off the sun. If you do it right you'll have everyone on the sidelines waving an American Flag, from the first color guard that goes by to the last tank bringing up the rear."

# Priority On Schmidt Aid

BONN — President Reagan laid claim to the confidence of self-indulgent West Germany at the NATO summit here by a tour de force of Reagan charm and public relations, but the price he paid may prove costly to his strategy for Western action against the Soviet Union.

He took the advice of Helmut Schmidt and the beleaguered chancellor's leading political aides and sublimated tough talk on the arms race to soft talk on what is called here the "influence race." That is the race to undermine dangerous anti-American peace movements by surpassing Soviet peace propaganda, thereby restoring to the U.S. the influence it must have to reassert alliance leadership.

On that level of public relations ("you invented PR, remember?" a Schmidt confidant told us) the president's Grand Tour and summit display proved that he can communicate in Europe as well as Peoria. "His vocabulary and conduct were exactly right," confided a top hard-liner in the opposition Christian Democratic Union (CDU) who fears the political power of the peace movement. That seemed true enough (even though Reagan never once allowed himself to utter the forbidden word "detente").

But therein lies the rub. When it came down to the nitty-gritty of the NATO communique, Schmidt would not budge from his insistence on including "genuine detente" as NATO's purpose. That frees Schmidt to continue playing the detente game with the Soviet bloc despite a battle by the U.S. to expunge "detente" when the communique was written two weeks ago.

Seeking to minimize that loss, Reagan aides here were bragging half-heartedly over their miserly achievement in preventing a return to an older definition of NATO's purpose as equally split between "defense" and "detente," as Schmidt wanted.

The paucity of Reagan's success in gaining concessions from Schmidt and other NATO chiefs, notably Canada's Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, had been

bluntly previewed at the Versailles quagmire of the economic summit. Clinging to their dubious claim that the West German government gives no assistance to commercial bank credits for the Soviet bloc, the Germans — backed by the French who openly subsidize Soviet bloc credits — flatly rejected Reagan's credit squeeze on the Soviets. That was to have been Reagan's Stage II in the West's campaign to force Soviet concessions for Poland, following last December's sanctions.

The signal that Reagan will confront new alliance problems on this front came quickly: a public statement by Schmidt that he was happy the U.S. could not force Western Europe into economic warfare with the Soviets.

The NATO communique did contain pleasant mood music on strengthening conventional forces and paying closer attention to restricting "technology" to the Warsaw Pact. But one other novelty — extending NATO's interest to "other regions" of the world such as the Persian Gulf — was immediately ruled out by Schmidt for West Germany.

The substantial quality of these gains for the very heart of Reagan's anti-Soviet strategy shadows the future between the U.S. and West Germany, NATO's European anchor.

Domestic politics here are in convulsion. Schmidt suffered severe reverses in the spring state elections. An even more critical setback awaits him in September, threatening to shatter his Socialist-free Democratic Party coalition and possibly drive him from office — if not this year, then in the 1984 election.

That prospect cripples Schmidt today. No matter how personally committed he is to NATO's new nuclear arms deployment, due in late 1983 when U.S.-Soviet nuclear arms talks predictably fail, his Socialist Party is digging in to delay a deployment decision until after the 1984 election.

Even privately, there was little summit talk about such potential new strains in the alliance. If Reagan was worried on this score, he concealed

# Tough Time For Forecasters

NEW YORK (AP) — These are tough times for economic forecasters, which is to say the times demand decisions. Will the economy bounce, or will it just drag itself along as it has been doing? Or even fall again?

Billions of dollars conceivably could be at stake. If, for instance, the economist foresees an improvement, he might tip his company's decision in favor of plant expansion. He can tip it the other way too.

And, you might surmise, if he makes the wrong decision he could tip himself right out of a job. The heat's on, presenting forecasters with the toughest job of all, which is to call a turn in the economy.

While many economists aren't in the forecasting business, those most often in the public eye are, and their reputations could be ruined by a bad call. True, the public has a short memory, but corporate managers have long ones; they aren't

inclined to forget faulty advice.

Based on the facts, Murray Weidenbaum, chairman of the president's council of economic advisers, reaches one conclusion, Edward Yardeni, economist for E.F. Hutton, the securities firm, reaches another.

"Business has been reducing inventories at an extremely rapid rate," says Weidenbaum, who understandably takes a positive approach. "Meanwhile, consumer spending in real terms has increased slightly."

In a statement to the Joint Economic Committee of Congress, the Reagan aide expressed his opinion that the July tax cut will expand consumer saving and spending.

Thus, he said, "an increasing array of business firms should find it necessary to replenish their depleted inventories. The resultant reordering is typically the key to beginning the recovery."

Two days later Yardeni began his weekly "Econ-

ics Alert" with the opinion "The economy is falling off a cliff again." No, he said, the economy is not coming out of recession. It's going deeper into it.

Using much the same data, along with favorite indicators of his own, Yardeni expressed the opinion that "the worst of the recession still lies ahead." While many of his fraternity view the economy as emerging from the economic mud, Yardeni said, "Clearly, the economy still hasn't hit rock bottom." It will, he forecast.

In earlier reports, Yardeni has commented on why he is negative. "Profit plunge exacerbates cash flow crisis," he wrote in his May 28 report. "No recovery visible in new orders data," he said. "Inflation is back," he declared, and he referred to "the housing industry's Alamo." If Yardeni is wrong he will have been very wrong.

Often, but not always, private sector economists are freer to declare their views. In fact, it may surprise some people to learn

that most of them seem to have little interference from higher executives, even when their forecasts might not exactly support the sales effort.

Jack Lavery, Merrill Lynch economist, says his only obligation is to be a good economist. Jim Griffen of Aetna Life says his commitment is the same — that he seeks only to interpret the economy correctly.

There is little question, however, that economists in some companies have been called upon to support their company's position. That is no different, however, than the position in which government economists have found themselves, often to their chagrin and their reputations.

But generally speaking, no number of internal factors can compromise reputations more than incorrectly calling major turns in the economy.

Right now the challenge keeps many economists awake nights, counting sheep and various numbers that spill out of their computers. Decisions, decisions.

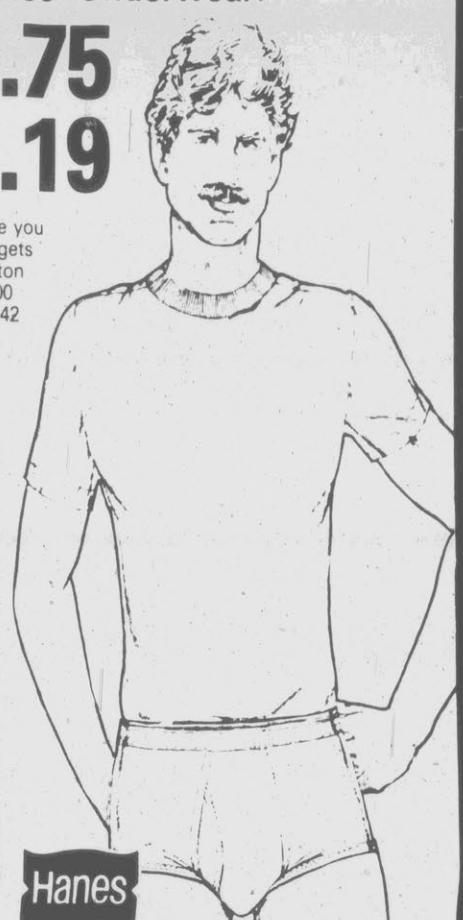

# Pitt Hospital Board Accepts \$4,000 Gift At Meet

The Pitt County Memorial Hospital Board accepted a \$4,000 gift Tuesday night from the Pitt County Insurance Exchange. Doug Hill, one of the independent insurance agents who make up the exchange, presented the check on behalf of the exchange.

The hospital board resolved to request that the county commissioners "do everything in their power" to maintain the enrollment of nursing students at Pitt Community College.

A proposal to have the 264 bypass be a western loop around Greenville was endorsed.

Hospital plant manager Ralph Hall was authorized to proceed with establishing contacts with Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Co. concerning the installation of a Rolm telephone system for the hospital, subject to the approval of hospital officials. This system would have a number of useful facets the present system does not have and would allow for about 500 more units.

During the giving of the finance report, it was noted that accounts receivable were decreased by \$114,427 during the past month.

Approval was given for the purchase of \$345,914.44 worth of equipment, which covers budgeted purchases, and

\$81,869.68 worth of non-budgeted items. It was noted that \$75,000 of the \$232,742.44 worth of monitoring equipment for three critical care units which is part of the purchase will be paid for with a \$75,000 gift from the Greenville Service League.

Claude Hall, an administrative resident from the University of Virginia, was introduced.

Hospital Executive Director M.E. "Rick" Gilstrap noted that June 4 was the day that the hospital

ended its relationship with the county computer system. The hospital's system is now tied in with East Carolina University.

Board members were informed of a new Poisedex system that enables emergency department personnel to better treat poisoning and drug overdose victims.

Director Jack Richardson said the HDR consulting firm is "now on board" inventing the hospital system in its beginning effort to provide long-range planning for the hospital facility.

"Housekeeping" changes in the medical staff bylaws were approved by the board; that the Emergency Services Committee meet on a

quarterly basis, that autopsy reports be completed in 45 days rather than 30, and that provisional anatomic diagnoses be recorded within 24 hours and complete protocol be made part of medical record within 45 days, and that the tissue examination section be rewritten for greater clarity.

Approved for full active staff privileges were Dr. L. Jarrett Barnhill in psychiatry; Drs. Dennis Sinar, Robert A. Shaw, Robert C. Turner, Peter R. Lichstein, George S. Hughes, and Douglas P. Privette in internal medicine; Dr. James P. Gutal in pediatrics; Dr. Vegesena P. Raju in emergency medicine; and Drs. Andrea L. Brand, Rich-

ard P. Rawl and Janice Daugherty in family practice. Approved for full consulting staff privileges were Drs. Gregory R. White and F. David Small, both in emergency medicine.

ECU Medical Dean Dr. William Laupus said the move into the new Brody Medical Science Building should begin in early July. He said the 64 students for next year's beginning medical school class have been chosen. Some 94 medical residents and two dental residents will soon be at work here, he added.

Plans for the establishment of a department of

physical medicine and rehabilitation within the medical school were discussed. Advertising for a chairman is under way.

The 1982-83 budget to become effective Oct. 1 will be presented July 20, it was announced.

# Presbyterians Vote To Reunite

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) — A lopsided vote in favor of reuniting the Southern Presbyterian Church with the Northern Presbyterians stunned opponents and surprised its backers, church leaders said.

The 122nd General Assembly of the 840,000-member Presbyterian Church in the United States voted 344-30 on Tuesday to approve a plan reuniting that body with the 2.4 million-member United Presbyterian Church in the USA.

"The people leading the fight (against reunion) were absolutely stunned that they only got 30 votes. They couldn't believe it," the Rev. Andrew Jumper of St. Louis said.

The two denominations had separated over the slavery issue in 1861.

Before the two bodies merge, however, three-quarters of the PCUS's 61 presbyteries must approve the merger, and church leaders say the plan faces a struggle to win that majority because of opposition in South Carolina, Mississippi and Alabama presbyteries.

Additionally, the UP-CUSA's General Assembly meeting next week must consider the measure and submit it to its own presbyteries for a two-thirds majority vote. The merger would not take place until the two General Assemblies take a final vote and a joint meeting in Atlanta next year.

The vote by standing came after about 70 minutes of debate. Church leaders said the overwhelming approval improves the plan's chances of winning passage by the presbyteries.

Newly elected Moderator John F. Anderson Jr. of Dallas expressed surprise at the decisiveness and PCUS Stated Clerk James Andrews said he had expected about twice as many anti-union votes.

"I think there will be people who will take note of the fact that is an overwhelming majority and that it appears large numbers of commissioners who would traditionally have been identified as anti-union voted for the plan," Andrews said.

Jumper, who heads the conservative, unofficial Covenant Fellowship within the PCUS, said his group's support swayed votes to approval and said the group could prove crucial to the reunion plan's approval by the presbyteries.

"Those of us in Covenant Fellowship, for us to get up there (on the floor) and say we are for union was devastating to those who oppose union," he said, adding that Covenant Fellowship initially opposed reunion but changed its stand after some of the group's suggestions were included in the reunion blueprint.

Andrews agreed that some commissioners, or voting delegates, changed their votes after arriving in Columbus, but he did not attribute their decisions to Jumper or Covenant Fellowship.

"Probably the most influential factor was the people

in union presbyteries (which include PCUS and United Presbyterian congregations), who are able to explain their experiences and what it means to be reunited," he said.

Reunion opponent Cecil Brearley Jr. of Columbia, S.C., said while he does not oppose reunion in principle he objects to the plan as presented.

"There are some things in the plan I don't believe are acceptable to the people in our church," he said. The minister said several major decisions had been

postponed, including the adoption of a statement of faith based on the PCUS's A Brief Statement of Faith adopted in 1962 and whether seminaries should be funded and operated by synods or by the General Assembly of the united church.

Other ministers said the need to reunite overpowers problems with the plan.

"I have some real problems with the plan, but after reflecting on this, I realize the call for unity goes far beyond any difficulties I may have or you may have," the Rev. Dudley Weaver of

Columbia, S.C., said.

In another vote on Tuesday, the General Assembly approved 308-67 an amendment to the Book of Church Order clarifying the group's stand on local property ownership.

The new wording states that while the local congregation holds legal title to

the property, the property "is held in trust nevertheless for the use and benefit of the Presbyterian Church in the United States."

The commissioners also approved by a voice vote a proposal to ordain Christian educators such as youth workers and other denominational staff.

# N.C. Senate Limits Utility Increases

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) —  
The state Senate surprised  
electric utilities Tuesday by  
unanimously approving a bill

that would limit the number  
of rate increases each year  
and affect financing of new  
power plants.  
The measure is almost  
identical to a bill passed by

the House last week and  
supporters expected the  
measure to be enacted by the  
House, possibly today, with  
little discussion.

"I was not only surprised, I  
was absolutely shocked,"  
John D. Hicks, vice president  
for public affairs at Duke  
Power Co., said of the Senate  
action, which some support-  
ers called the most sweeping  
utility reform in a decade.

"With the mood of the  
General Assembly right now,  
I believe almost anything  
could have been done to  
utilities were it proposed,"

Hicks said.

All that remains for the bill  
to become law is House  
concurrence on a Senate  
amendment that orders the  
joint House-Senate Utilities  
Review Committee to study  
construction work in pro-  
gress, or CWIP, charges and  
report back to the General  
Assembly in 1983.

Under CWIP, North Car-  
olina utilities have been able  
to automatically pass on to  
customers the cost of financ-  
ing construction of new  
power plants.

But in an amendment

approved by the House and  
Senate, the state Utilities  
Commission would have  
discretion whether to allow  
the charges to be added to  
rates.

The bill also:  
— Requires that the state  
Utilities Commission hear  
from both sides on requests  
to adjust rates because of  
fuel costs.

— Allows the commission  
to consider utility manage-  
ment and efficiency in  
fuel-adjustment hearings.

— Limits fuel-adjustment  
hearings to once a year. At

present, utilities may request  
rate changes because of fuel  
expenses three times a year.

Gov. Jim Hunt, who has  
lobbied for the bill, said the  
principles of the bill are  
"essential to fairness in a  
fuel-clause proceeding" and  
he praised the Senate for  
standing up for the interests  
of consumers.

The Senate Public Utilities  
Committee approved the  
House-passed bill without the  
CWIP amendment early  
Tuesday and rushed it to the  
floor. Instead of the House  
amendment, the Senate  
panel substituted a provision  
calling for the Utilities Re-  
view Committee study of  
CWIP.

But when the bill arrived  
on the Senate floor, Sen.  
Charles Vickery, D-Orange,  
and Sen. Joe Raynor, D-  
Cumberland, proposed the  
House amendment be re-  
stored. The Senate agreed on  
a 31-16 vote.

Sen. Joe Johnson, D-Wake,  
warned that the amendment  
might be unconstitutional  
because it does not provide  
any standard for determin-  
ing whether CWIP charges  
should be added to bills.

"I'm afraid what we may  
be doing is buying a big  
lawsuit," Johnson said.

Sen. Craig Lawing, D-  
Mecklenburg, also warned  
that taking CWIP out may  
mean larger utility bills  
later.

After the vote, Sen.  
William Redman, R-Iredell,  
chastized the Senate for its  
action, which he said was  
influenced too much by  
thoughts of the June 29  
primary election.

"I'm amazed at how it has  
affected our whole thought  
process," Redman said. "We  
are getting ready to make  
some very, very bad de-  
cisions."

Sen. Marshall Rauch, D-  
Gaston, agreed and re-  
minded senators that they  
had access to facts that  
voters back home didn't  
have.

"Because it was two weeks  
before the primary I don't  
think we had a ghost of a  
chance," Hicks said of Duke  
Power's opportunity to pre-  
sent its side of the issue.

"I am seriously concerned  
what will happen to electric  
utilities in this state if this  
mood persists," he said.

But Zeb Alley, Hunt's  
legislative lobbyist, said he  
believed the General  
Assembly's action is consist-  
ent with voters' opinions.

"I think it is responsive to  
what the consuming public  
has demanded of the General  
Assembly," Alley said.

# Renegade Ex-CIA Agent Urged To Describe Role

WASHINGTON (AP) — Renegade CIA agent Edwin P. Wilson, arrested by U.S. authorities after being lured from his Libyan haven, is being urged to tell prosecutors what the spy agency knew about his alleged supplying and training of terrorists there, government sources say.

Wilson, who worked at the CIA from 1951 to 1971, was arrested Tuesday in New York as his plane arrived from the Dominican Republic, where he was denied entrance after presenting a phony Irish passport, the Justice Department said.

The CIA has denied any official dealings with Wilson or his alleged co-conspirator, Frank Terpil, in connection with their Libyan activities — and reaffirmed that posi-

tion after Wilson's arrest.

Wilson, 53, was being held on \$20 million bail at an undisclosed location pending a court hearing in New York today. Officials said his location was being kept secret because of possible threats against him.

One intelligence source, who asked not to be identified, said prosecutors had talked with Wilson even before his arrest about cooperating with their investigation into illegal shipments of explosives and terrorist training for radical Libya.

Asked if Wilson would agree to cooperate, the source said, "I wouldn't be surprised."

Major unanswered questions in that investigation are what, if anything, did the CIA know about Wilson's activities and did any agency

officials assist him.

One high-level Justice Department source, who declined to be identified, said the department would consider making a deal with Wilson for a reduced sentence in return for his cooperation in bringing others to justice.

"I think a lot of guys at the CIA will be shaking ... for fear over what Wilson might tell us," this official said.

Wilson faces charges of conspiring to assassinate, for \$1 million, a dissident Libyan official in Egypt in 1976, illegally shipping large quantities of explosives and timing devices to Libya in 1976 and 1977, and arranging for former-U.S. Green Berets and other Americans to train Libyan terrorists.

Since his indictment in April 1980, the former CIA case officer has been living in Libya under the protection of its strongman, Moammar Khadafi.

Published reports have linked Wilson and Terpil to several then-active CIA officials in the mid-1970s. During the Carter administration, the CIA fired two employees for dealing with Wilson and Terpil.

The CIA said those employees helped Wilson and Terpil "without official agency sanction."

Rep. Edward P. Boland, House Intelligence Committee chairman, called Wilson "the kingpin of a whole series of sordid crimes" who could supply information that could lead to other indictments.

"Clearly, there are other individuals who are excellent candidates for such a fate," Boland said.

The House committee is still investigating possible links between Wilson and Terpil and CIA agents. The panel also is questioning the CIA's internal investigation.

Terpil remains at large, but a third co-defendant, Douglas M. Schlachter Sr., who managed the project in Libya, pleaded guilty to a reduced charge earlier this year in return for his cooperation with the government.

Justice Department sources who refused to be

identified said they had employed a ruse to lure Wilson into a situation where they could get custody of him.

Some sources suggested the trick used on Wilson offered the hope of a new haven for him in the Caribbean or Central America. But all the sources declined to give details of the scheme for fear, according to one source, that to do so "might tip him off to who betrayed him."

Calling Wilson "a major fugitive from justice," Attorney General William French Smith announced the arrest personally at a Washington news conference.

Smith said that, working with foreign law enforcement agencies, the U.S. Marshals Service had determined that Wilson was traveling on an Irish passport under a false name. They tracked him for

several days through Western Europe and alerted Dominican officials he might be headed there.

Justice Department officials said Wilson arrived, unarmed and undisguised, in the Dominican Republic about 4 or 5 a.m. Tuesday from a Western European country they refused to name. He was held until five minutes before the departure of a non-stop flight for New York.

At that point, Dominican officials told him he was being denied entry for having false documents and was being sent to his native land.


Two U.S. marshals, in the Dominican Republic as part of the search for Wilson, were aboard the flight but did not have Wilson in custody. He was arrested when the plane arrived at Kennedy International Airport. He offered no resistance.

At his court appearance Tuesday, Wilson kept his hands in his dark pinstripe suit, sweating profusely in the air-conditioned room. He was surrounded by U.S. marshals.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Lawrence Barcella said the \$20 million bail was needed because Wilson had made millions of dollars during the past two years and owns millions of dollars worth of land in Virginia and

England. As additional support for the high bail, Barcella said he had spoken to Wilson in person and on the phone several times during the past two years so Wilson had known that he was a fugitive.

## Import Ban Due To Mexican Fruit Fly

Arizona has joined California in banning citrus imports from Mexico after fruit flies were discovered in oranges from south of the border.

Arizona's action came Tuesday, four days after California officials halted imports because Mexican fruit fly maggots were discovered in a shipment of oranges to San Mateo and Santa Clara counties south of San Francisco.

Arizona's ban excludes mangoes and other non-citrus produce, said Glen Thaxton, quarantine division director for the Arizona Agriculture and Horticulture Commission.

Mel Reis, an agricultural economist with California's Bureau of Market News, a division of the state Food and Agriculture Department, said three truckloads of oranges from Mexico — about 62 tons — were unloaded in San Francisco Tuesday.

Four other truckloads of about 86 tons were unloaded in San Francisco Friday and Monday, Reis said.

State agriculture officials immediately dispatched county agriculture commissioners to find out when

the orange trucks entered the state.

George Buxton, program supervisor for the state Food and Agriculture Department's Interior Quarantine Division, said agriculture commissioners in San Francisco, San Mateo and Los Angeles will try to determine whether the oranges arrived after the import ban.

The Mexican fly does not pose nearly the threat to California produce as did an infestation last year of Mediterranean fruit flies, officials said. The medfly infestation cost California farmers up to \$73 million in losses.

"It's nothing like the medfly" because the Mexican insect feeds on a much smaller range of produce, said Stan Caplan, Santa Clara County agricultural biologist. He said host food for the Mexican fruit fly include citrus fruits, avocados and mangoes.

He said it is doubtful whether the Mexican fly could survive the cold of the Northern California winter.

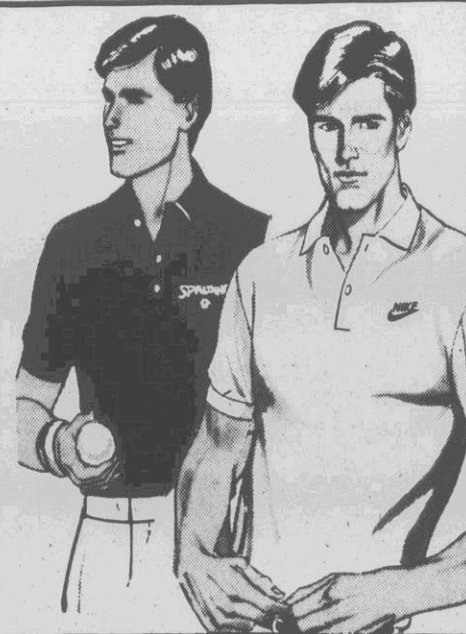

"I would give strong consideration to merger," Mrs. Williams remarked. "The Greenville City School is a good system, but it's losing pupils and that's going to hurt us dollarwise and hurt our programs, too."

Candidate Rhoads advocated merger of two phases of school operations at this time. "It's evident from portions of the merger plan already prepared that merger can now be made in the food service and the garage areas. This would save money. One area I want to study closely is that of possibly hiring too many people to run a large single school system. That is a danger."

Cooper thinks it is essential "to put the whole picture of merger out so that the public can look at it and vote on it," and Brandon posed the question of whether merger

would help prevent the trend of the flight of students to private schools.

Mrs. Carr, citing the central problem of declining enrollment and its effect on the current high standards of programs in the city schools, commented "unless we get help, we may lose some good programs. We must remember, too, that Pitt County cannot grow and prosper unless Greenville grows." She added, "It is time to complete an in-depth merger study, whether for or against merger."

Haigwood pointed out he was not knowledgeable on what effects a merger would have in many respects, "but as a taxpayer, my first thought is it appears cheaper to operate one system instead of two, assuming it could be effectively operated as a single system."

Another issue that resulted

in extensive comments was that of whether candidates favor adjusting real estate values for the tax base more often than the current every eight years basis.

Most candidates were inclined to look with favor on a four-year adjustment basis. All opted to have local adjusters hired to evaluate property rather than bringing in outsiders with no first-hand knowledge of the local economy and land values. Several expressed dismay that more than half a million dollars was paid a team from Ohio on the last evaluation to perform a task that could have been done much better and at less cost from local sources.

On the idea of a county income tax, candidates generally wanted more details on such a proposal before declaring a stand for or against.

Other issues discussed on the former were: "Do you favor a 4 percent tax on all new licensed vehicles to help build and maintain our highways?" and "Are you in

favor of continuing the employment of lobbyists to lobby against us in our own best interests."

The idea of a 4 percent tax on all new vehicles elicited mixed responses. Some of the candidates feel that the \$120 current sales tax maximum on a new vehicle, whether a Datsun or Cadillac, might bear looking into with the idea of eliminating or raising the \$6,000 limitation for taxation of new vehicles. All agreed that a pressing need exists to find new revenue sources for road building and maintenance, and most expressed the opinion that additional tax on gasoline is not necessarily the best solution.

Explaining the "lobby against us" phrase, Tucker declared that in two recent instances the person hired by the County Commissioners Associations to represent Pitt and other eastern North Carolina areas "had lobbied against us in the vital area of the issue of double tax on tobacco."

The consensus of the candidates on the lobbyist issue was that one is not needed, that advocating issues is the responsibility of representative elected to represent Pitt County in Raleigh.

# Israeli Take A Guerrilla Base

Israeli commandos, advancing under covering shellfire from their Lebanese Christian allies, stormed and captured a Palestinian guerrilla stronghold near the paralyzed Beirut airport today, the state-run Lebanese radio reported.

The report said the Israelis took the science faculty campus of the Lebanese University, along the main runway of Beirut International Airport.

According to the reports, the action was aimed at eliminating a major Palestinian stronghold controlling access to the airport and some of the Palestine Liberation Organization's enclaves in Moslem west Beirut.

There were conflicting reports on which forces were involved in the new outbreak of shelling and fighting today, which shattered a few hours of relative calm in war-devastated Beirut.

On Tuesday, Israeli and Syrian tanks battled near the airport for four hours, breaking a four-day-old cease-fire between Israeli forces and their Syrian foes.

The Syrian regular army, which has 1,000 men stationed in the Beirut area, was not observed intervening in the battle for the science faculty.

Private Lebanese radio stations reported that Israeli and Syrian forces were involved in artillery battles elsewhere in Beirut's mountainous outskirts. But those reports were not verified.

Israeli commanders said their gunners did not take part in the two hours of heavy shelling that preceded the reported assault on the PLO camp on the science campus. Associated Press correspondents said most of the fire seemed to come from Christian artillery entrenched in the hills above the airport.

Members of the Christian Phalangist militia Kataeb were fighting openly with the Israelis against their com-

mon Palestinian enemies for the first time since Israel's army reached the Beirut area in a 11-day thrust northward to wipe out Palestinian guerrillas in Lebanon.

Correspondents reported seeing Phalangist liaison officers in olive-drab uniforms with Israeli units positioned all over Beirut's mountainous hinterland.

An Israeli commander, who identified himself only as Col. Arnon, watched the shelling of the airport from Baabda near the palace of Lebanese President Elias Sarkis and told AP correspondent Alex Efty:

"The Christians are doing the fighting, trying to take the university back from the terrorists. The Christians are fighting by themselves, we are not becoming involved, we are just looking."

But the Lebanese state radio report said it was Israeli commandos that captured the modern, six-story buildings. The fall of the campus "raised fears that the Israeli forces would advance westward to take over the airport and storm into the refugee camps of Bourj el Barajneh," the radio said.

Israeli commanders have said they would not invade Beirut because they did not want to get involved in bloody house-to-house fighting.

A PLO communique said: "Our forces are locked in fierce combat with all weapons against the Israeli

enemy, who is trying to capture the science faculty of the Lebanese University."

The Lebanese radio report said loss of the science campus deprived the PLO of

"a strategically important position" commanding access to the airport, as well as the embattled beach resort of Khalde at the southern end of the runway.

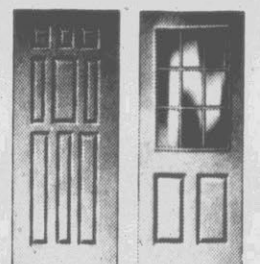

# Hinckley Trial Apparently Approaching Its End

WASHINGTON (AP) — With his trial suddenly nearing an end, John W. Hinckley Jr. has angered a federal judge by blurting out "You're Wrong" at a psychiatrist called by prosecutors trying the case against the presidential attacker.

U.S. District Judge Barington D. Parker will decide today whether to permit more defense witnesses, perhaps including Hinckley, who is charged with shooting President Reagan and three other men.

Parker sharply rebuked Hinckley for his courtroom conduct Tuesday and vowed, "I don't intend to let it go

unnoticed, nor do I intend to see it repeated."

After testimony ended for the day Tuesday, chief prosecutor Roger M. Adelman surprised the courtroom by telling the judge, "Your honor, tomorrow morning we will rest our case."

"What did you say?" asked the startled Parker. "Did I understand you to say there is no more live testimony?"

"That's right," Adelman said.

"We make these judgments as we go along and we feel that we are in a position where it is prudent to rest our case now."

Adelman had been expected to call two more psychiatrists to rebut the defense contention that

Hinckley was insane.

"Well, I'm taken a bit by surprise," said the top defense lawyer, Vincent J. Fuller.

Hinckley has acknowledged shooting four men, including Reagan, on March 30, 1981, but he contends he is innocent by reason of insanity.

Parker had asked opposing lawyers earlier to prepare legal memorandums on whether Hinckley waived his right to testify when he did not take the stand while the defense was presenting its case.

Hinckley's lawyers made clear at earlier bench conferences that their client wanted to take the stand, but they advised against it at the time. They never closed the door on the possibility.

"You're wrong," Hinckley blurted out, his mouth contorted into a scowl. The comment was not loud enough to be heard by everyone in the courtroom.

Minutes later, as his law-

yers were talking with the judge at the bench, Hinckley glared at Mrs. Johnson and mouthed:

"Go to hell. Go to hell." And, "I hate you, you bitch."

Mrs. Johnson turned toward Hinckley for a fleeting moment as a U.S. marshal gestured to defense attorney Judy Miller, who spoke to the defendant to calm him down.

Parker said court personnel reported to him that "immediately before the last recess, Dr. Johnson made a statement and you retorted — you responded to it."

"Now I am sure you realize that such conduct is not to be condoned," Parker continued. "If you don't, you should."

"Do you understand what I'm saying?"

In a weak voice Hinckley responded, "Yes I do."

Mrs. Johnson is a staff psychiatrist at the federal prison at Butner, N.C. She interviewed Hinckley 57 times during the four months he spent there following the shooting.

Until Tuesday, Hinckley greeted her warmly in the courtroom and one defense attorney suggested during cross-examination that the

defendant wanted to establish an "ideal friendship" with her.

But that warmth turned to coolness after Hinckley's lawyer Gregory B. Craig asked:

"Would you agree that the attempt to shoot the president of the United States to win the love of Jodie Foster was bizarre behavior?"

Hinckley's remark "You're wrong" came as she answered, "I felt John's attempt to assassinate Reagan had multiple causes. I don't believe he specifically wanted to win her love."

With the case winding down, Parker told jurors they would be housed in a motel once deliberation begins. They have been allowed to return home nightly since the first day of

jury selection April 27. "I don't want anything to happen that will cause this proceeding to go askew in any manner," the judge told them.

## Lunar Eclipse Due Early Next Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans will get a chance to view a full eclipse of the moon early next month.

The eclipse will occur on the night of July 5-6 and the moon will be totally in shadow for 106 minutes, a length that officials say will not be matched in this century.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the moon, instead of reflecting sunlight, enters the shadow cast by the Earth. It never becomes totally invisible, however, but instead may seem to turn a deep reddish-orange color because of the bending of the sun's rays around the Earth.

This color can vary considerably, depending on the cloudiness of the Earth's atmosphere through which the rays travel on their way to the moon.

For example, in 1963 volcanic dust in the Earth's atmosphere nearly totally

obscured the moon from view. And an eclipse in 1968 showed the moon as coppery red in the center and blue-white on the outside edge.

Observatory officials report that the the eclipse will begin at 1:33 a.m. EDT on the morning of Tuesday, July 6, when the Earth's shadow first begins to dim the moon.

Coverage will increase until the moon is half in shadow at 2:05 a.m. and total eclipse will occur at 2:38 a.m.

The darkest stage of the eclipse will occur at 3:31 a.m. EDT and totality will continue until 4:24 a.m.

At 5:29 a.m., the moon will be completely free from shadow and will appear as the familiar full moon once again. However, the closing moments of the eclipse are not likely to be visible along the Eastern seaboard, with the sun rising at 5:49 a.m.

The observatory reports that another lunar eclipse is expected in December and the next in 1989, but neither is expected to equal the July event in duration.

A lunar eclipse occurs only when the moon is full, but the tilt of the Earth's orbit prevents such events from occurring every month.

# Tax Writeoffs Endangered

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A state bill that some feel would save the state \$8 million won a rare victory Tuesday when lawmakers agreed to debate the bill.

They took no action on a bill sponsored by Rep. Al Adams, D-Wake, that would reverse a state decision to allow businesses to take a faster writeoff on equipment, but agreed to schedule it for debate.

It was a surprising move. Adams' bill received an unfavorable report in the House Finance Committee. He took it to the floor with a minority report and asked for the bill to be placed on the calendar in spite of the unfavorable ruling. Lawmakers voted 73-37 to place the bill on the calendar.

The bill would cancel an interpretation made last year that the state would adhere to the business-depreciation schedules included in President Reagan's Economic Recovery Act.

The faster writeoff means an advantage on state income taxes for businesses, meaning state revenues would decline by about \$8 million or more in the first year, analysts said. In five years the faster schedules could cost the state as much as \$60 million, they said.

The Adams bill would re-

vert state law to the older schedules.

"We have never passed a bill in the General Assembly that says we are going to adopt the Reagan economics," Adams said.

Rep. Dan Lilley, D-Lenoir, argued against the bill, claiming the writeoffs provided a tax incentive for businesses to locate in the state.

In the Senate, a proposed \$2 million tax break bill cleared a major hurdle when the Senate Ways and Means Committee approved the bill.

In a voice vote, the committee agreed to send to the Senate floor a bill providing local property tax exemptions for manufacturers with equipment used to clean air inside their plants.

Textile lobbyists lobbied extensively for the bill, though other manufacturers also would benefit from the bill.

Supporters said the bill would provide incentives for manufacturers to obtain the cleaning equipment, which is non-productive equipment, but opponents fear it could cost local governments more than \$2 million a year.

"I believe this is going to be a larger exemption than any of them realizes," said Butch Gunnells, lobbyist for the N.C. Association of County Commissioners.

"This is just a little way to cushion you on something that gives you no return on investment," answered Sen. Cass Ballenger, R-Catawba. Ballenger said the plastic-bag manufacturing plant he owns would be eligible for the exemption.

The Senate committee approved the bill after refusing to consider an amendment that would have made the state reimburse local governments for the revenue loss.

In other tax matters Tuesday:

— A bill that would set a surcharge on each bottle of liquor sold was approved by the House Finance Committee. The bill would establish a nickel-a-bottle surcharge on liquor beginning Nov. 1 and the money would be used to finance a new warehouse complex for distribution to local Alcoholic Beverage Control stores and to cover operating expenses.

— A Senate subcommittee effectively killed a proposed additional 1 percent local-option sales tax by voting to refer the bill to a study commission that is to report back to the committee in 1983.

## East Carolina Puts Pounding On Seahawks, 12-0

It was only the second time all season East Carolina has scored prior to its opponent and the Pirates found not having to battle from behind much to their liking.

ECU scored eight runs in the first three innings and rode a three-hitter by Bob Davidson to a 12-0 win over UNC-Wilmington Tuesday evening at Harrington Field in a North State Summer League baseball game.

"What can you say?" ECU coach Gary Overton said. "Bob Davidson threw the ball well, we hit the ball real well and we played good defense. There's not much more to say."

"I told the guys before the game that we were starting to

hit the ball well and that I thought Bobby was going to have a good game, and if we played good defense we would win."

The Pirates made their coach a prophet by the end of the night, sandwiching two runs in the first and third around a four-run second to take an 8-0 lead that was never threatened.

The win leaves ECU at 3-6. UNC-W, which has now lost two straight, falls to 7-4.

Davidson, a right-hander, set down the first eight men he faced before Buck Barber singled with two gone in the third. UNC-W managed just two more hits — both infield singles.

Davidson struck out five and did not walk a batter in raising

his record to 2-1. Davidson, who threw 82 pitches, did not allow a Seahawk past second all night.

Davidson was supported by a 12-hit attack. David Wells, the ECU designated hitter, was four for four with two doubles and two runs batted in. Wells is hitting .533 (16 for 30).

"(Wells) is on fire," Overton said.

John Hallow, who came into the game hitting .167, had two hits (both doubles) in four at bats and four runs batted in. Robert Langston was two for three and Ricky Nichols was two for four. Both Langston and Wells scored three runs.

It was the second straight 12-hit effort by ECU, the Pirates having banged out 12 hits in a 5-4 loss to Campbell

Monday. The back-to-back effort has Overton feeling his team may have finally broken out of its slump at the plate.

"We came back from the (NCAA) regionals and we had some new people in the lineup and we had our nucleus playing in different positions," Overton said. "I think it took them some time to get used to it."

"(Also), we really emphasized defense at the beginning of the summer," he added, "and they may have been concentrating on that more."

ECU started the game with two players out of their normal positions and at least one other injured but starting.

Mike Williams, normally a pitcher, started at third and Hallow, ECU's usual third

baseman, moved to catcher. Shortstop Pete Persico started despite an injured knee.

None of the changes seemed to bother ECU as it jumped on UNC-W starter Robbie Skinner for two runs in the first on Hallow's double to the gap in left-center which scored Persico and Wells.

Persico singled with one gone and Wells followed with a double down the line in right before Hallow's double.

It was just the second time this year ECU has jumped head first. The other time came Saturday against league-leading N.C. State in the first game of a doubleheader.

The Pirates upped their lead to 6-0 in the second. With one gone, Mark Shank walked and

stole second. Shank, however, was thrown out at home while trying to score on Langston's single to center.

Nichols reached base on an infield single and when second baseman Gary Hall bobbled the ball, Langston scored. Nichols stole second and scored when Persico reached base on an error by first baseman Buck Barber.

Wells followed with a double to move Persico to third. Hallow then drilled a double to center to score Persico and Wells and ECU led, 6-0.

ECU, facing Mike Melville, who came on in relief after Hallow's double, scored two runs in the eighth to up its lead to 8-0.

Shank walked, moved to second on Langston's single and to

third on a passed ball before scoring on Nichol's sacrifice fly. Langston later scored on Wells' single.

The Pirates scored their final four runs in the fifth. One run came home on an error and Wells singled home a second run before he and Hallow, who reached base on an error, scored on a single by Todd Evans.

"We felt like these two games (against Campbell Monday night and UNC-W last night) were big games," Overton said. "We played well enough to win (Monday night)."

## THEODORE SUTTON

Former ECU Back Trying To Make It In CFL

Former East Carolina University fullback Theodore Sutton is trying once again to prove he can play football — this time as an "import" in the Canadian Football League.

Five years ago Sutton came to ECU as a walk-on, forced to prove he belonged. He left as the university's No. 2 all-time leading ground gainer with over 2,700 yards.

Now, after failing to make it in the National Football League with the Dallas Cowboys, Sutton has journeyed to the CFL and the Winnipeg Blue Bombers hoping for another chance.

The Blue Bombers opened their 1982 preseason Wednesday with a 22-0 win over Calgary. Sutton did not start but came in at fullback later and led Winnipeg in rushing with 25 yards in five carries.

"I played quite a lot, over a quarter," Sutton said in a telephone interview earlier



William Miller, both of whom ran for over 600 yards on a team which is heavily oriented toward passing.

Among those four newcomers, two are from ECU. Along with Sutton on the Blue Bombers is former Pirate running back Eddie Hicks. Hicks, who ranks seventh in rushing in ECU history, injured his neck during practice and was unable to play Wednesday.

Teams in the CFL are allowed only 15 players from the United States — "imports" in the vernacular of the CFL — on their rosters. Sutton hopes that in the final three preseason games he can convince head coach Ray Jauch he is worth one of those spots.

"Ted Sutton is an excellent football player," Jauch said in the team's training camp prospectus. "He has a chance to crack our lineup."

## Golf's Finest Prepares For The 'Crown Jewel'

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — The finest golfers in the land had their last chance to practice on the demanding Pebble Beach course today, preparing for the 1982 United States Open championship, an event many of them consider the tour's crown jewel.

"Worldwide, perhaps the British Open is more important," said Jack Nicklaus. "But to an American, this is the biggest event, because it is our national championship."

It holds particular significance, of course, for Nicklaus, who is bidding for a record fifth Open title. The only other men to win the title four times are legendary names out of golf's history books — Willie Anderson, Bobby Jones and Ben Hogan.

And, the Pebble Beach layout has been kind to Nicklaus. He won his third Open crown here in 1972, the only other time Pebble Beach hosted the event, shooting a 290 that year, the highest winning score in any pro golf event since 1963.

Nicklaus has also won three Bing Crosby titles and two of that tournament's four rounds are played at Pebble. And in 1961, he captured the U.S. Amateur championship here. So his familiarity with the course and record of success over it, coupled with the incentive of a fifth Open championship, makes him one of the favorites.

Others in that category include hot-shooting Craig Stadler, winner of three events including the Masters and the leading moneymaker on the tour this year with \$312,058. Besides the Masters, Stadler has captured the Tucson, opening event of the year, and the Kemper in his last start.

Then, there are Tom Watson, Lanny Wadkins and Ray Floyd, each of whom has won

two events this season. Watson, winner of the Los Angeles and Heritage tournaments this year, has had his share of success at Pebble Beach. He has won two Crosbys here and is familiar with the course, playing it frequently when he was a student at Stanford.

"I've won here twice," said Watson. "That might give you a little edge. But those tournaments were in wet conditions. What if it's dry?"

## Robinson Heads Home After Three-Team Swap

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Veteran outfielder-first baseman Bill Robinson is headed home while reserve Dick Davis is on his way to a new opportunity.

And utility catcher-outfielder Wayne Nordhagen, the third player involved in a three-way deal Tuesday night, is going to a new league.

The Philadelphia Phillies, Pittsburgh Pirates and Toronto Blue Jays worked out the trade just five minutes before the baseball trading deadline expired.

The Phillies re-acquired Robinson from the Pirates in the trade, announced by Pittsburgh one minute after the 8 p.m. EDT deadline. The Phillies had dealt Davis to Toronto for Nordhagen, and then Philadelphia traded Nordhagen to Pittsburgh for Robinson.

In a surprisingly light trading session Tuesday, the only other deal saw left-handed pitcher Dan Schatzeder re-

turned from the San Francisco Giants to the Montreal Expos for "future cash considerations."

Robinson's permanent home is in Turnersville, N.J., near Philadelphia. He played with the Phillies from 1972 to 1974. He bought his home in New Jersey in 1975, just before the Phils traded him to Pittsburgh for pitcher Wayne Simpson.

This season, Robinson, 38, was batting .239 in 31 games with four home runs. He is a lifetime .257 hitter with 163

home runs and 620 runs batted in.

Davis, 28, was batting .279 this season with two homers and seven runs batted in. He joined the Phillies last year from the Milwaukee Brewers and hit .333 in 45 games.

Davis played well with the Phillies, but was caught in a crunch of surplus outfielders.

Nordhagen, who will be 34 on July 4, played with the Chicago White Sox from 1977 to 1981 before being acquired by Toronto during spring training

## Stadler Neither Hot, Nor Bothered By Non-Golf Image On The Course

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Craig Stadler, the golfer who doesn't look like a golfer, refuses to get all hot and bothered about images.

"I guess I don't fit the mold people expect of a pro tournament golfer," says the paunchy, mustachioed Californian, rated by many as the player to beat in the 82nd U.S. Open Golf championship, starting Thursday.

"I admit I look like any ordinary guy. I don't know why people make such a big deal over it. One good thing is that

they at least know I am around. I only wish they'd appreciate me more for my golf."

Winner of the Masters, the first of the Grand Slam events, he is the only player to have won three tournaments on the tour this year and he is the leading money winner with \$312,058.

Such dignitaries as Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Tom Watson are labeling him as one of the chief threats for the title over Pebble Beach's exacting ocean links.

Stadler is a pillowy, jovial fellow with a heavy reddish mustache, a receding hairline and a 46-inch waist.

They call him "The Walrus." Stadler is more amused than annoyed at the nickname, the constant references to his poorly distributed 200 pounds and what has been hailed as an explosive temper.

"That's exaggerated, too," he says. "Sure, I get sore when I make a stupid shot. But it only lasts until I get to my next shot. That's better than letting it seethe in your gut and letting it all out when you get home."

Stadler has become the hero of the truck drivers and the brick layers and little old ladies who do their crocheting on the subways.

He's the prototype as well as the idol of the guy who carries his own bag around the park courses and afterward douses his frustration with a half-dozen beers.

Winner of the National Amateur championship while a sophomore at the University of Southern California, he failed

to pass the TPA qualifying school in 1975 but finally made it in 1976.

Hindered by an ungovernable temper, he struggled through his first few years and didn't win his first tour event until he captured the Bob Hope Desert Classic in 1980.

Two years later, he's the golfer to beat.

"He could be the next dominant player," says Palmer. "He makes his golf swing work for him. It all depends on his attitude and desire."

Stadler's fresh, down-to-earth image is quite unique in a game in which players look so much alike you can't tell them apart until you toss them on a putting green and watch their stroke.

Stan Wood, former golf coach at USC, said Stadler was always basically shy and tended to minimize his feats. "I never once heard him brag," said the former coach.

"I can understand his occasionally getting mad. He is such a perfectionist, he can't stand to blow a shot."

# Chisox Ride Hoyt's Three-Hitter Past Oakland

LaMarr Hoyt has the fundamentals down again. It's just the pain in his pitching arm that's bothering him now.  
Hoyt fired a masterful three-hitter to become major league baseball's first 10-game winner this season as the Chicago White Sox blanked the Oakland A's 7-0 Tuesday night.  
"I was just happy to keep my fundamentals straight," said the bearded right-hander after ending a personal three-game losing streak. "I mixed up my pitches very well — a good slider, sinker, and fastball. I just wanted to get back to the way I throw the ball best," he said after his first shutout of the season.  
Hoyt, who won his first nine decisions, says he's been bothered by stiffness in his right forearm and bicep recently.  
"It happened two starts ago in the Texas game," said Hoyt, 10-3. "I could still pitch, but I was in some pain."  
White Sox Manager Tony LaRussa downplayed Hoyt's

apparent problems, which have not caused the pitcher to miss a start.  
Hoyt walked one and struck out seven in lowering his league-leading earned run average to 2.24.  
Wayne Gross got the first two hits off Hoyt, an infield single in the second inning and a single to right in the seventh. Rickey Henderson doubled to lead off the A's ninth.  
The White Sox scored three times in the first inning on Greg Luzinski's RBI grounder and Harold Baines' two-run double. Steve Kemp's run-scoring ground out made it 3-0 in the second.  
Henderson, who leads the league in stolen bases, swiped his 64th base 63 games in the first inning after reaching on an error.  
Yankees 5, Red Sox 4  
Ken Griffey's two-run homer off reliever Mark Clear capped a three-run eighth-inning rally as New York downed Boston.  
"I was just trying to hit the ball hard and keep it going," Griffey said after his third

home run of the season and first in the Yankee Stadium made a winner out of reliever Goose Gossage, 3-2.  
With the Red Sox leading 4-2, Dave Collins led off the eighth with a double, chasing Boston starter Bruce Hurst. One out later, Collins scored on Andre Robertson's single and Griffey, who earlier extended his hitting streak to seven games, homered to right field.  
Boston took a 4-2 lead in the seventh inning on Rick Miller's sacrifice fly and RBI singles by Gary Allenson and Jerry Remy.

Bob McClure didn't give roommate Robin Yount an ultimatum, but his neddling about needing some support certainly helped.  
Yount clubbed a two-run homer in the first inning and put Milwaukee ahead with a two-run triple in the eighth following a crucial two-out error by Cal Ripken Jr. as the Brewers whipped Baltimore.  
"I'd been getting on my roomie because in the last five

years he had never hit a homer when I pitched," McClure said. "But I think he's hit five in my last five starts."

Dave Hostetler knocked in three runs with a pair of homers, his fourth in the last four games, as Texas beat Seattle for the first time in five games this season. Hostetler now has six homers since being called up by the Rangers from Denver on May 28.  
"This is my biggest night in the big leagues. Hopefully, I can help the Rangers out and stay around a long time," Hostetler said.  
"We knew how strong he was. To me, he's a Frank Howard with strength," said Texas Manager Don Zimmer. "He hits the ball as far as anybody in the game today."

Bud Black posted his first major league victory and John Wathan had two hits and scored three times as Kansas City handed Minnesota its 23rd defeat in its last 25 games.

# Reuss Hurls Dodgers By Padres

The Los Angeles Dodgers may be breaking out of their doldrums if pitcher Jerry Reuss' last two starts are any indication.  
The defending world champions, sitting 7½ games behind the Atlanta Braves in the National League West, haven't been setting the league on fire this season.  
But Reuss, a big 6-foot-5, 225-pound left-hander, has given other teams in the league reason to believe the Dodgers will be challenging the Braves somewhere down the line.  
Reuss, coming off a one-hitter against the Cincinnati Reds, stopped San Diego 3-0 Tuesday night, limiting the Padres to only five hits while striking out seven.

"There's no doubt I'm back in the groove now," said Reuss, who had lost four of his last five decisions before he resurrected his pitch.  
The Dodgers scored all their runs in the seventh inning to break a scoreless duel between Reuss and John Curtis, 5-4.  
Ron Cey led off the inning with a homer and Dusty Baker's had a two-run single.

second preseason game. The Blue Bombers open the regular season July 9 against Saskatchewan. Sutton is hopeful he'll still be around then.

"I look at it as a challenge," Sutton said. "I had one (when I came to ECU) and they get bigger and bigger each time. I'm just trying to take it one day at a time right now."

After being released by the Cowboys on the final cut, Sutton returned to ECU where he was contacted in March by Winnipeg. The first thing Sutton did was take out a map.

"I had never heard of it. I didn't know where it was," Sutton said. "I saw it was up around North Dakota and Minnesota and I said, 'It's going to be cold.'"

Cold or not, Sutton wasted little time in telling the Blue Bombers he was interested. He wanted to play football — somewhere.

Not long after, he was on his way north to sign a contract in a town and with a team he had only heard of days before.

The reception he got surprised him. "When I got here everybody seemed to know my name," he said. "They really accepted me."

Sutton, however, had some adjusting to do of his own. First, there was the climate: "The weather's weird. The first day I got here it was 85 degrees. The next day it was 30 degrees."

Then there was the distance from his hometown of Kingston. "I've written quite

a few letters. My parents think Canada is a million miles away — and I guess it is."

And, finally, there was the field and the rules. Neither resembled what he had grown up to call football.

The field is long (110 yards) and wider, and there are 12 players to a team and only three downs. It is a game that emphasizes passing — something Sutton did little of during his years at ECU as fullback in the wishbone.

"They really pass here more and I've had to adjust to that," Sutton said. "I took it on myself to work on my receiving."

"It's not that I can't catch the ball," Sutton said. "It's just that as a fullback in a wishbone you don't get to catch the ball that much."

The Blue Bombers, who were 11-5 this past season, have one of the top passers and receivers in the league in Dieter Brock and Eugene Goodlaw. Brock completed 62.5 percent of his passes for 4,796 yards while Goodlaw caught 100 passes for 1,494 yards.

It is a team that Sutton feels has a chance to go along way once the CFL regular season gets started.

"The one thing that surprised me when I got here was the talent," Sutton said. "They've got a lot."

"I'd say the competition in the American game is a bit more, but they (the CFL) do have some quality players. On an overall basis, though, the American players are better."



## Newcomer Takes World Cup Opener

MADRID (AP) — Cameroon's soccer team gave cause for a celebration in that African nation merely by qualifying for the World Cup finals.

And on Tuesday night the "Indomitable Lions" earned the first point by a newcomer in the 24-nation tournament.

The only black African team in the final, Cameroon made up for inferior technical skills with strength, speed and agility to hold vastly experienced Peru to a scoreless tie in La Coruna.

"I'm absolutely delighted," said Cameroon Coach Jean Vincent. "Today's result is already an exceptional achievement."

New Zealand, where rugby is more popular than soccer, made a less impressive but nonetheless respectable cup debut. It fell three goals behind Scotland, battled back with two of its own, then lost 5-2 — but earned a standing ovation from the pro-Scottish crowd at Magala.

Three other nations are in their first cup final, thanks to a decision by the 150-nation Federation of International Football Associations to expand the tournament from 16 teams and allow more to qualify from outside Europe and South America, the sport's traditional strongholds.

Algeria and Honduras play their first matches in the tournament's 52-year history today against two-time cup winner West Germany and host nation Spain, respectively, while England battles France. Kuwait, the other newcomer, opens first-round play Thursday against Czechoslovakia.

For countries such as these, a draw or even a goal can be a moral victory. "We came to Spain to learn from the soccer giants," said Algerian Coach Maheddiene Khalef. "If we don't succeed in getting into the second round, it will not be doomsday."

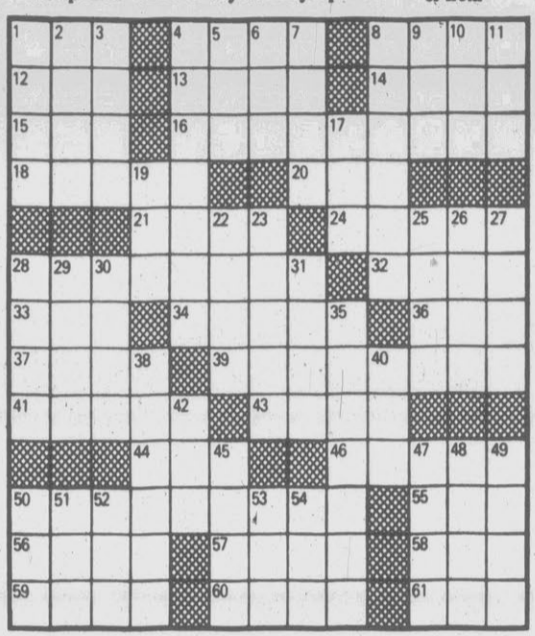

No taller than her TV set, Megan's top score on the home version of Pac-Man — the popular arcade game — is 12,826 points. Her dad's best is 600.

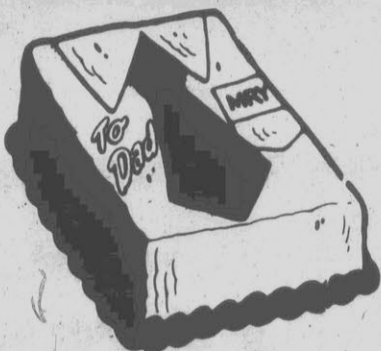
Briens said he recruited his daughter to join the free university staff so she could find friends to play video games.

# New Storms For Nation's Mid-Section

Thunderstorms, floods, tornadoes and hurricane-force winds rampaging across the center of the nation killed at least seven people, washed out the business district of an Iowa town, derailed a passenger train and toppled 70 utility poles in Kansas.

Hundreds evacuated their homes because of flooding in Iowa, Nebraska and Arkansas, while 80 mph winds howled in northern Ohio on storm-tossed Lake Erie, and thousands were left without power Tuesday in the Great Plains.

Mayor Bill Pavkov of Hastings, Iowa, said he was out checking on the level of Indian Creek when he heard an eerie noise "like a real high wind."

"There was a wall of water coming right across that field," he said. "I had to back my truck up to get out of the way while I was talking on the CB telling my wife who to call to tell them to get out of their houses."

About five miles upstream, the San Francisco Zephyr rounded a bend at 76 mph early Tuesday morning and slammed into a 3- to 4-foot wall of water on the tracks, killing a 19-year-old woman and sending 16 others aboard to hospitals, authorities said.

The creek, which grew from 10 feet wide to more than 400, covered sections of the southwest Iowa community of Emerson with 8 feet of water, inflicting heavy damage on downtown businesses.

"That's the core of the business district down there," said James McVay, 37, a resident. "I'd say every business down there has about an 80 percent loss."

Several hundred people were evacuated from the nearby towns of Glenwood and Malvern.

Three people were killed and at least 15 houses were leveled or heavily damaged in Michigan as 57,000 homes lost electrical power because of high winds, heavy rain and six tornadoes.

A 16-year-old Pontiac girl was struck by lightning, an 8-year-old Jackson County boy was killed when a tornado smashed through his home and a 22-year-old Detroit woman died when she stepped on a fallen power line.

In Ohio, a 71-year-old Clyde Smith of Bowling Green suffered a heart attack after a storm hit his home, authorities said.

"He was apparently downstairs and when he came up and saw the damage, he had a heart attack," said Wood County Sheriff's dispatcher Kathy Schumacher.

Winds gusted to 81 mph at the Wood County airport in northeast Ohio, but no tornadoes were reported in the state.

A tornado in the Mark Twain National Forest toppled a tree and killed 51-year-old Wanda Hall in south-central Missouri, while 17-year-old Ray Rogers was electrocuted in Kansas City by a downed power line.

Winds blew the roof and parts of a brick building onto Interstate 70 near Warrenton, briefly blocking the east-west national route. The Missouri Highway Patrol said the winds also overturned a tractor-trailer truck near Warrenton, but there were no injuries.

In Arkansas, rescue workers plucked people from flooded vehicles and waded through high water to evacuate Fayetteville residents after 4 inches of rain sent 4-foot floodwaters into some neighborhoods.

"It's bad," said police dispatcher Ron Carroll. "It's worse than people have ever seen it around here."

Word that an earthen dam on Fayetteville Lake might break led several Johnson City residents to leave their homes, but the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers said the dam was safe.

Nebraska Gov. Charles Thone declared a disaster emergency as residents of Seward began shoring up the downtown area with sandbags. Some highways were covered with up to 3 feet of water.

Four tornadoes struck southern Illinois as hail up to an inch in diameter was driven by 65 mph winds.

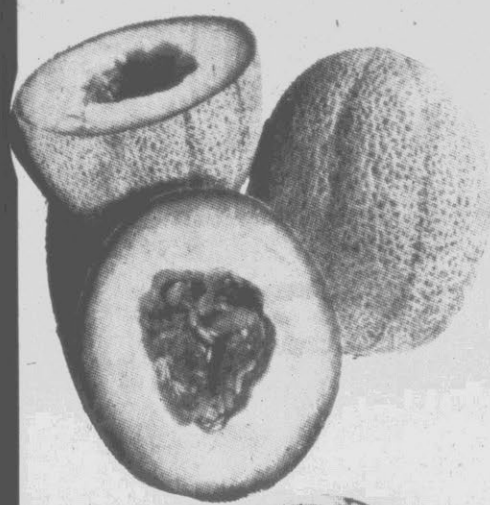

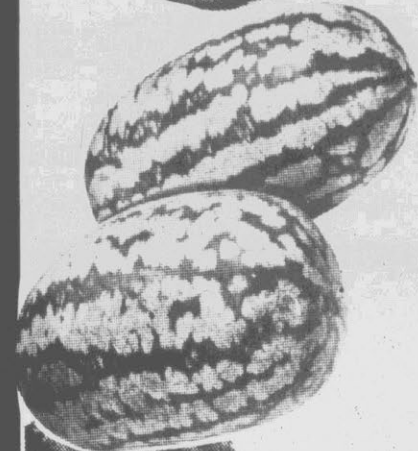

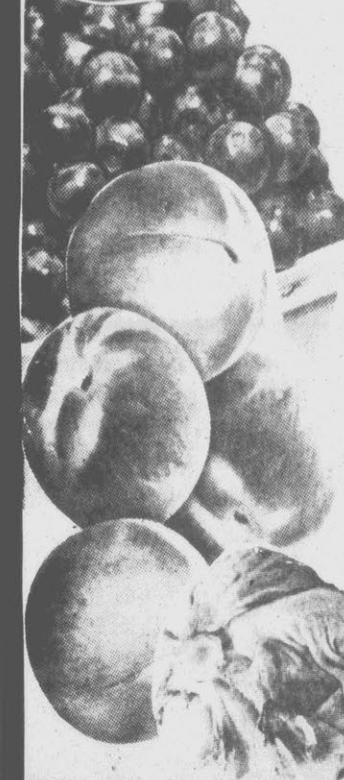

**Texan Named New Leader Of Baptists**

By GEORGE W. CORNELL, AP Religion Writer NEW ORLEANS (AP) —

Conservatives have retained the reins of Southern Baptist leadership, electing their standard-bearer, the Rev. James T. Draper Jr. of Texas, to head the nation's largest Protestant body.

His victory marked the fourth consecutive year in which the conservative-fundamentalist wing of the 13.8 million-member denomination has won its presidency in contest with moderates.

He's a "very solid conservative," said a leading tactician of that camp, the Rev. Paige Patterson of Dallas.

Patterson told reporters the result should "mean a deeper awareness to the fact that a large segment of Southern Baptists hold to the inerrancy of Scripture, and don't want it questioned in our institutions."

That insistence on "inerrancy" — that the Bible is word-for-word without error in literal fact — has been the rallying cry of conservatives. Beyond that lay the presidential power in picking trustees of agencies and institutions.

While the conservative tide has held firm since 1979, the contest was stiffer this time, with the election Tuesday forced for the first time into a second ballot in which Draper beat the moderate Rev. Duke McCall of Louisville.

Draper, 46, who had led a field of four candidates in the initial round, got 8,331 votes in the second, about 57 percent, to 6,292, about 43 percent, for McCall, 67, long-time head of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

"Compared to the recent years, it was a surprisingly close race," commented Porter Routh of Nashville, the denomination's former chief administrator, now retired.

"It seems to me McCall's strong showing should signal some moderating influence in the conservative drive," he added. "Baptists have a tendency to come together in the center after the dust has settled, and the results this time should add to that tendency."

In late-night voting, the convention later elected a moderate, the Rev. John Sullivan of Shreveport, La., as first vice president. He has been among the original four candidates for the presidency.

His winning the second highest office by an overwhelming 68 percent of the vote in competition with a conservative layman, U. S. Rep. Albert Lee Smith Jr., of Birmingham, also added a balancing note to the new leadership.

Draper, 46, has been pastor of the First Baptist Church in the Dallas suburb of Euless for about seven years. He previously served churches in Bryan, Iredell, Tyler and San Antonio, Texas, and in Kansas City, Mo., and Del City, Okla.

There, he preceded the outgoing Southern Baptist president, the Rev. Bailey Smith, a strong fundamentalist, who presently leads that Del City congregation.

Draper, born in Hartford, Ark., the son and grandson of Southern Baptist preachers, is married and he and his wife, Carol Ann, have three children. He is the author of four books, and enjoys golf and racquetball.

Most tournament hands are computer dealt, which has led to a common complaint from players. They claim that computers produce weird distributions. To a certain extent, they might be correct. The deals are "different" from those dealt by hand, but only because they are truly random when hand-dealt ones aren't, and they are nearer the theoretical percentages.

In the recent Vanderbilt Knockout Team Championship, which the ACBL in its wisdom scheduled for Niagara Falls last March, the boards were dealt by hand. This is one of those hands and it is far wilder than anything we have seen pro-

duced by a computer. North-South were the veteran North American internationalists Edgar Kaplan of New York and Norman Kay of Philadelphia. East and West respectively were Ron Von der Porten and Kyle Larsen of San Francisco, one of the country's premier partnerships.

With a nine-, an eight- and a seven-card suit around the table, the bidding reached the high plateau in short time. Not surprisingly, Kay did not relish the prospect of defending five diamonds doubled, and his six spades was a reasonable shot.

Larsen led the three of hearts. Von der Porten rose with the ace to feld the king. Obviously, West had to have a very long diamond suit to leap to the five-level vulnerable, and that was confirmed by the fact that he did not lead his own suit — it had to be too long to lead. If West did indeed have a nine-card suit, twelve of his cards were known, for he was marked with three hearts.

Was West's remaining card a spade or a club? If it was a club, Von der Porten saw little chance to defeat the contract. So at trick two he shifted to a club. West ruffed for a very satisfying result.

At the other table Sidney Lazard of New Orleans became declarer at six clubs. That contract was unbeatable.

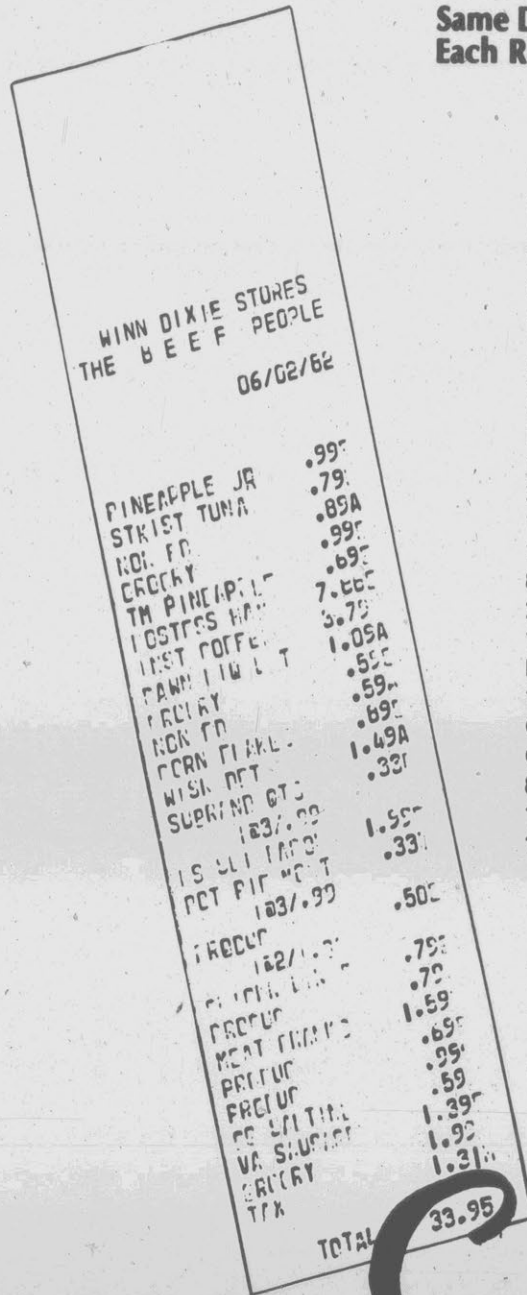

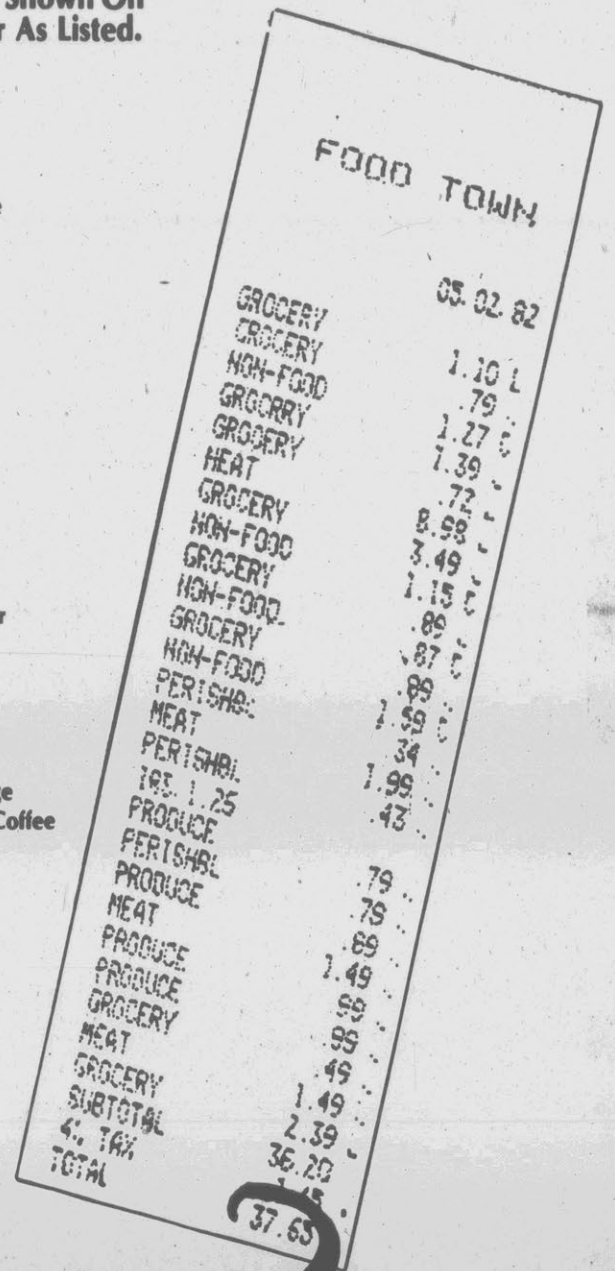

# Mr. T Cannot Be A Pussycat

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Mr. T, the ferocious black who pounds the bejabbers out of Sylvester Stallone in "Rocky III," is the most fearsome villain in recent movie memory, but Stallone says he's a pussycat.

Mr. T grimaced angrily when informed of Stallone's assessment.

"That's not true," he growled, his forehead wrinkling with menace. "I want to strike fear in the hearts of men, women, children and dogs. I want dogs to run when they see me. I want people to stay clear of me!"

Until he made the film, Mr. T had no trouble keeping strangers at a distance. The 6-foot, 210-pounder is scary to behold. Folks in the posh Polo Lounge were transfixed at the sight of him.

His shaved head glistens around a strip of hair running down the center of his skull to the nape. Mohawk style. He says his coiffure is styled after Africa's Mandekas tribe and "helps bring out my meanness." He also sports a mustache and beard.

He wore his usual baseball pants, long striped socks, blue shirt and denim jacket. He glittered like a cut-rate jewelry counter with what appeared to be a gold breastplate, garish dangling earrings, gaudy bracelets and heavy rings, embedded with what appeared to be diamonds, on every finger.

On close inspection the breastplate proved to be about five pounds of gold chains, many laden with charms, including a boxing glove from Stallone, nuggets, a star of David, a razor blade, a large capital "T" and the motto, "Try God."

Mr. T claimed he wore \$200,000 in gold and gems. It would have been pointless to

ask if he was afraid of muggers.

He is a professional body-guard who has protected Muhammad Ali, Sugar Ray Leonard and Leon Spinks.

Asked if he didn't think these fighters were capable of defending themselves, Mr. T frowned fiercely. It was as if the California sun ducked behind a thunderhead.

"Everybody needs a body-guard whether he can afford it or not," he said. "Even me. It's my calling in life to protect people who hire me."

"I'm willing to die for a client. I charge \$1,000 a day. But I earn it. I get hit with all kinds of things when I'm bodyguarding. If a guy has a gun, I'm the one who will get shot."

Mr. T, a native of Chicago whose name at birth was Lawrence Tero, is a child of the ghetto who dreams of building a house for his mother and a ghetto community for youngsters.

One dares not call Mr. T by his former name. As he says, he might cause the culprit "pain, lotsa pain." He says he is a man of God but there are, obviously, limits to his Christian charity.

# Last Elephant Roundup On TV Screen Tonight

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS has a story tonight about elephants. It's for children of all ages.

"The Last Round-up of the Elephants" is a beautifully filmed adventure saga, detailing both traditional and modern ways of capturing elephants in the Indian subcontinent of Asia.

We're told that domesticating these gentle giants, who only become violent when they are attacked or feel threatened, has an environmental purpose now since their food supply is being exhausted by the encroachment of man.

Elephants require hundreds of pounds of vegetation every day, and their waking hours are spent primarily in pursuit of all the leaves and branches they can find. It seems to be a losing battle. Today there are only 40,000 elephants left.

Wildlife cinematographer Dieter Plage, whose other TV credits include films on tigers, gorillas and orangutans, captures the beauty of these beasts in India and Sri Lanka.

In one thrilling caper, an angry elephant charges Plage, who manages to dive clear as his cameras are rolling. The viewing public's gain was almost Plage's loss.

"How I managed to miss all four feet with nothing more than a few scratches remains a mystery," said Plage. "Everyone thought I had had it, including me."

Another highlight of the broadcast is his filming of a method of capture that has been handed down from generation to generation in Asia, where elephants have been doing heavy labor for pean-

ants.

The traditional chase occurs at night, with the local tribesmen herding the elephants toward big cages by firing off explosions that scare the animals into moving. Ultimately, it's too dark for the elephants to see the massive cages. Their fury is awesome when they realize they're trapped.

Temporary prisons of specially constructed tree trunks and branches bend but don't break from the elephants' frequent charges. Then, almost miraculously, the animals' wrath is subdued when domesticated elephants and their human riders enter the cages to rope the wild elephants, cowboy style.

In the modern capture, which Asian naturalists are using to bring the elephants into more bountiful preserves, tranquilizer darts are used to sedate the elephants. They are then roped and are just groggy enough to be nuzzled and pushed by the tame elephants into trucks, no easy feat.

in addition to current footage on these captures, "The Last Round-up of the Elephants" includes fascinating archival footage of Asian elephants being exploited for battle and violent sport.

Jason Robards, as narrator, lends a royal presence to the proceedings.

Feisty Menachem Begin and his Israel come across vividly during the prime minister's appearance on Thursday night's "CBS Reports: The American-Israeli Connection."

While interviewing Begin, CBS correspondent Andrew Lack points out America's changing perception of Israel, from "underdog" to "occupying power." Begin

evidently doesn't like some of Lack's characterizations and suddenly interrupts: "Do you ask questions or do you make statements?"

He then tells Lack, "I don't want Israel to be an underdog. I want Israel to be a free democracy, a proud country."

# Bette's Statue Is Apparently Found

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS won the networks' ratings race in a week dominated by reruns, listing five of Top 10 programs, including the only new show, "60 Minutes," among the 13 highest-rated, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed.

Indeed, one of the three segments on "60 Minutes" had been broadcast before. CBS' broadcast of the National Basketball Association championship game, Philadelphia vs. Los Angeles, was the only other original program among the 23 highest-rated — No. 14 in a tie with NBC's "Quincy."

CBS' No. 1 finish was the network's second in a row.

ABC claimed the week's highest-rated program, "Hart to Hart," which compiled an average rating of 22.1. Nielsen says that means in an average minute of the show, 22.1 percent of the country's TV-equipped homes were watching.

CBS' rating for the week ending June 13 was 13.6 to 12.9 for ABC and 11.2 for NBC. The networks say that means in an average minute of prime time during the week, 13.6 percent of the nation's homes with television were watching CBS.

NBC's rating was the lowest for any network in nearly a year. Despite the low mark, NBC had two programs among the 10 highest-rated — "Hill Street Blues" in eighth place, and "Gimme a Break" 10th.

Despite the high rating for CBS' basketball program, it was not a particularly good week for sports. ABC's "Monday Night Baseball" broadcast — St. Louis vs. Montreal for part of the country, Oakland vs. Chicago for the rest — finished tied for 48th place with an

average rating of 10.3.

Three movies were broadcast for the first time during the week, and only one, "Sister, Sister" on NBC, did particularly well — a tie for 23rd place. "Harry and Walter Go to New York" on ABC and "Another Man, Another Chance" on NBC tied for 46th.

NBC had the five lowest-rated programs, starting with "NBC Magazine" in 65th place and followed by "Chicago Story," "Father Murphy," "Fit for a King" and an "NBC White Paper" called "Facing Up to the Bomb."

BOSTON (AP) — The search for actress Bette Davis in the buff and bronze apparently has ended in a fitting place for a two-time Academy Award winner — the Boston Museum of Fine Arts.

Her image, or at least part of it, as a teen-ager appears to be there as "Young Diana," a fountain statue of the Roman goddess of the hunt and moon, done in 1924 by Anna Hyatt Huntington.

The slim figure standing on a shell made of the fins of dolphins holds a bow and wears a quiver of arrows and a bit of strategically placed bronze sash.

"This is the most certain candidate of any statue that I know of," said Jonathan L. Fairbanks, the museum's curator of American decorative art and sculpture and the son of a sculptor.

"Unlike classical statues, it has a very personal face, and that face does look like Bette Davis."

The search for a nude Miss Davis in statuery began after the 74-year-old actress said in an interview with Playboy magazine that when she was about 18, she posed nude for

a woman sculptor who had a man assistant for a statue to be called "Spring."

She couldn't remember the name of the sculptor but thought the statue had been placed in a park in Boston, a statement that stirred immense interest in Boston park stauary.

"I think we've found it," said Cornelius Vermeule, curator of classical art at the museum, of the statue found in a back room.

He joined the search by making a list of women sculptors doing garden statues in the mid 1920s and then figuring the one for whom Miss Davis posed was either Mrs. Huntington or Anne Coleman Ladd.

In a book privately published by Mrs. Huntington, he learned that she may have worked in wet clay from more than one model for her Diana series, using the pose and the facial features of Miss Davis but using other models for a less mature upper body.

# Survived Life-Or-Death Crisis

HENDERSON, N.C. (AP) — Imagine fleeing from home in the middle of the night. You can't stay because someone wants to kill you, and yet you have no idea where to go. You are leaving behind loved ones and all the possessions you worked for. You know you may never return.

There is a family in the Careys Church community of Vance County that has met that crisis and is surviving it.

The survivors, Chi and Thang Tran and their children, are originally from Saigon, South Vietnam. The children include four sons, Lam, 11; Tuan, 10; Nguyen, 9; and Hong, 6; and a 20-month-old daughter, Lisa Kim, who was born on the first Independence Day after the family arrived in Henderson.

The Trans arrived in Vance County in October 1979 and, as refugees, were sponsored for one year by the Cullom Baptist Association. After that, they were adopted by the congregation of Carey Baptist Church.

Now, however, Chi Tran and his family are moving toward greater independence. They are realizing the traditional American dream of buying their own home.

A few weeks ago, they purchased the old Carey Baptist Church parsonage, which they had rented for some time. The house was put on a truck and moved a half-mile to a lot donated by a church member, Arch Hoyle.

The community feeling toward the Trans has been better recently than ever, said Mrs. Evelyn Watkins, a neighbor. In the past, it has been hit or miss, with difficulties resulting from community members thinking more of themselves than of trying to get (the Trans) established, she said.

The Trans' new home is a comfortable, but modest, white-frame house. It's a step down from what they had in Vietnam. But then again, it's better than the boat they lived in for eight months after they sneaked out of Saigon one night. It's better than the Manila refugee camp in which they lived for two months following their rescue from the boat.

Back in Saigon, the family lived in a five-story brick home. But because Tran had been friendly with the American forces during the Vietnam War, soldiers of the new Communist government told them they would have to leave their home. The Trans

suspect that a member of the government is living in their house now.

Mrs. Tran had two servants, one to help with the cooking and another to mind the children, when she was in Vietnam. "Now I have to work and work," she said.

Trans' family owned a plastic factory and one of the largest recording companies in Vietnam. Now, he works as a machine fixer for Harriet & Henderson Yarns Inc., a textile plant. His wife does odd jobs around the plant. They work separate shifts so

one will be home at all times to care for Lisa Kim.

Ed Laffman, director of missions for the Cullom Baptist Association, said Tran wanted to start work the first day he arrived in North Carolina at Raleigh-Durham Airport.

Tran did not speak English when he arrived in Vance County, and he still has difficulty. He admits its frustrating at times. He said he would like to thank his boss at the mill for giving him the opportunity to work but he can't really express his feelings. Also, the language barrier somewhat isolates the family from neighbors.

A guest in the Tran home must sometimes rely on the son, Lam, a straight-A student, for the interpreting.

The Trans are adapting themselves to a new style of cooking, too, and say fried

chicken is their favorite American dish.

In the evenings Tran reads a bilingual English-Chinese Readers Digest, and the whole family enjoys watching television.

Right now, the Trans don't know if they'll always want to live in Henderson. They say that at present they don't have enough money to move to an area where Tran might get re-established in the recording industry. "Everything here is way high," Tran said.

They would like to be reunited with other family members scattered around the world. Trans' father lives in Paris, and his brother is in Ecuador.


Also, the Trans don't know if they'll ever return to Vietnam. It's very unlikely they could go back under the present government, they said.

# Investigators Reopen Hospital Baby Deaths Probe

**TORONTO (AP)**—A team of a dozen handpicked detectives backed by medical specialists has reopened the investigation of a horrible whodunit, the murder of at least four and perhaps dozens of infants in the cardiac ward of the eminent Hospital for Sick Children.

Police thought they had the case solved more than a year ago when they arrested a nurse, Susan Nelles, and accused her of killing four children with large doses of digoxin, a heart drug which is difficult to detect in the body.

After a long preliminary hearing, a judge ruled last month that there was strong evidence of homicide—but no case against the 25-year-old Miss Nelles. He dismissed the charges against her.

During the hearing, testimony emerged of other "carbon-copy" deaths resembling those in which Miss Nelles was charged. The public did not become aware of the developments until weeks later, when the hearing ended.

As is frequently done in Canadian courts, the judge allowed reporters to attend the hearing, but banned publication of the evidence until the case against Miss Nelles was closed. When the hearing began in January, the sensational case disappeared from the Canadian press. It erupted again on May 21.

On that afternoon—just hours after the case against Miss Nelles was dropped—Ontario Attorney General Roy McMurtry announced that police would examine all deaths on the cardiac ward between July 1980 and March 1981, when Miss Nelles was arrested. The number was originally announced as 43, but officials now say they are looking at 44 deaths.

"You've got to go back and look at every case," Police Chief Jack Ackroyd said in a telephone interview. He said detectives are interviewing parents of the children who died and reviewing records, but he declined to describe how the case was going beyond saying that new evidence was emerging.

Police Superintendent Robert Bamlett said the 12 top detectives pulled together from the metro Toronto force for the case are working closely with forensic and medical specialists, including an expert on digoxin, Dr. Alois

Hastreiter, retired head of pediatric cardiology at the University of Illinois Hospital.

The dismissal of charges against Miss Nelles and the sudden disclosure of the expanded scope of the case brought calls from political leaders and some parents for a public investigation of the deaths. McMurtry said a public inquiry could ruin chances of a successful prosecution and would have to wait until the criminal case is closed.

Health Minister Larry Grossman appointed a panel of outside experts to review current practices at the Hospital for Sick Children. There will be no public hearings and the panel has been told to steer clear of the police investigation.

"We have not had an unexplained death in the Hospital for Sick Children since March 1981," said administrator J.E. Stibbards. "We have tried to emphasize that point."

The Hospital for Sick Children has been a respected medical facility for generations and a world-recognized leader in research. Its accomplishments include the development in 1932 of Pabulum, a nutritionally balanced precooked cereal, and more recently, breakthroughs in the treatment of spina bifida, a severe malformation of the spine that can lead to paralysis and brain damage.

The fourth-floor cardiac ward—the scene of the deaths—is a cheerful enclave populated by stuffed bears and prints of playful seals.

The ward holds 40 patients at a time, mostly infants, but some older children including a few teen-agers. The four children Miss Nelles was accused of killing ranged from 23 days old to just under one year.

The cardiac ward moved into its renovated quarters in July 1980, which is when the number of deaths began to increase. During the period in which the 44 children died, a normal mortality rate would have taken the lives of perhaps seven.

"In an institution like this, every death is reviewed," Stibbards said. Autopsies were conducted on 33 of the 44 bodies, but since a blood check for digoxin is not part of the routine, investigators have had to exhume some bodies to test for the drug.

As the deaths continued, Stibbards said, doctors and nurses searched for an ex-

planation, considering every possibility except the chance there was a murderer in their midst.

"You look at your treatment procedures, you look at your technique," he said. "There was no thought that it

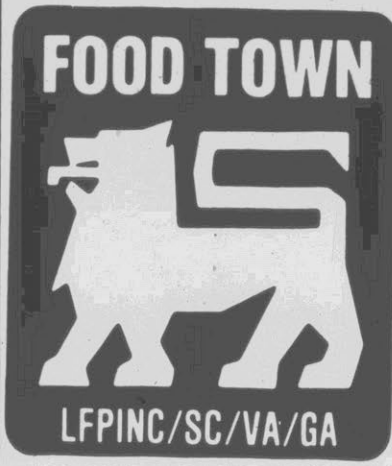
could be intentional." As for Miss Nelles, she has been on paid leave from the hospital. In an interview last

month with the Toronto Globe and Mail, she said she felt "very badly" for the parents of the children who

died. "I can't imagine what they are going through," she told the newspaper. "It's just

incredible that in a hospital that cares and gives therapy to children that there is some crazy running around."

## Typists Proven Artists At Keys

BALTIMORE (AP) — A woman at home with the piano and organ keyboards also displayed her talent on a typewriter keyboard to win first prize in the fifth annual Staff Builders' World's Fastest Typist Contest here.

Mary Jane Mueller, a pianist and organist who also won the top award in 1979, had defeated hundreds of other typists previously to attain a seat in the finals, which she won by setting a new speed record for the contest. The mark was 123 words per minute after deduction for two errors in the five-minute test.

In the finals the administrative secretary for the Baltimore County Auditing Division triumphed over a field of 25 U.S. and Canadian champions to land the \$2,000 cash prize and an

electronic typewriter. Her husband, Joseph, is a patrolman on the Baltimore police force. The prize, she said, will go toward her 17-year-old daughter's education for becoming a veterinarian.

Another accomplished pianist and organist came in second with a net speed of 108.6 wpm. She is Nancy St. Pierre, a Columbus, Ohio, secretary for an architects' firm. She won a \$1,000 cash prize and an electronic portable typewriter.

# Enforce Idea Bureaucrats Should Work For Pay

By DANIELA IACONO ROME (UPI) — Giancarlo Ciani, a 40-year-old civil servant at Italy's post and telegraph ministry, seemed to be a very sick man.

Besides his regular month's vacation and nine paid holidays, Ciani had to take another full 6 months off his job last year because of illness.

But instead of being rushed to a hospital, policemen came to Ciani's house recently and threw him in jail — for defrauding the Italian state.

It seemed Ciani wasn't sick

after all. He just didn't have time to report to his \$540 a month job as an accountant at the ministry's headquarters. He was too busy running a thriving real estate company, buying and selling houses and land through a firm registered under his wife's name.

Ciani is the latest victim of a crackdown, focused mainly on Italy's torpid government bureaucracy, on unauthorized absences from work by public servants and some private employees.

More than 35 public employees have gone to jail,

Another 400 in ministries, state-run hospitals and public schools have been charged with defrauding the state since Deputy State Prosecutor Luciano Infelisi began the crusade against absenteeism about three months ago.

Many of the offenders managed their absences by obtaining false medical certificates from compliant doctors, some of whom are also under investigation. Then they either found other jobs to increase their incomes or simply spent their time at home until payday.

The effects of the crackdown, particularly on Rome, which has been called Italy's "sink of iniquity", have been profound.

New snarls in the city's already chaotic traffic have been caused by workers suddenly bent on being at their

desks by 9 a.m. sharp. "It has become savage and beyond control," a Rome traffic policeman said recently. "It's madness. I've never seen so many traffic jams — cars in slow, nervous lines with people bubbling over with rage."

The bureaucracy itself has reportedly been unable to cope with their employees' new work ethic. After the first arrests, some ministry offices apparently didn't have enough desks to accommodate all their new-found employees.

As a basis for the campaign, officials cite several studies.

A recent survey by the Ministry for Public Administration shows the average Italian public servant takes 26 days a year off in addition to the annual one month vacation.

A 1982 government-commissioned study by the research organization Formez shows 19.5 percent of ministry employees freely admit coming in late, leaving early and going out for personal shopping or very long coffee breaks on a regular basis.

The survey, taken by interviewing the errant

workers, concluded that 10.9 percent of the time employees were present at their desk was spent reading newspapers, doing crossword puzzles, making private phone calls or taking care of personal business.

The Formez study concluded that absenteeism, other absences and office time spent on activities other than work bring the average cost of an hour's work from about \$4.15 to more than \$12.

Infelisi's campaign to curb full and part-time absenteeism from government jobs, has resulted in a stream of reports and cases. Several of them:

—An official on a routine check at Rome's Fiumicino airport post office found only four out of 49 scheduled workers on the job. The rest were absent with no excuse, either working at another job or just resting at home.

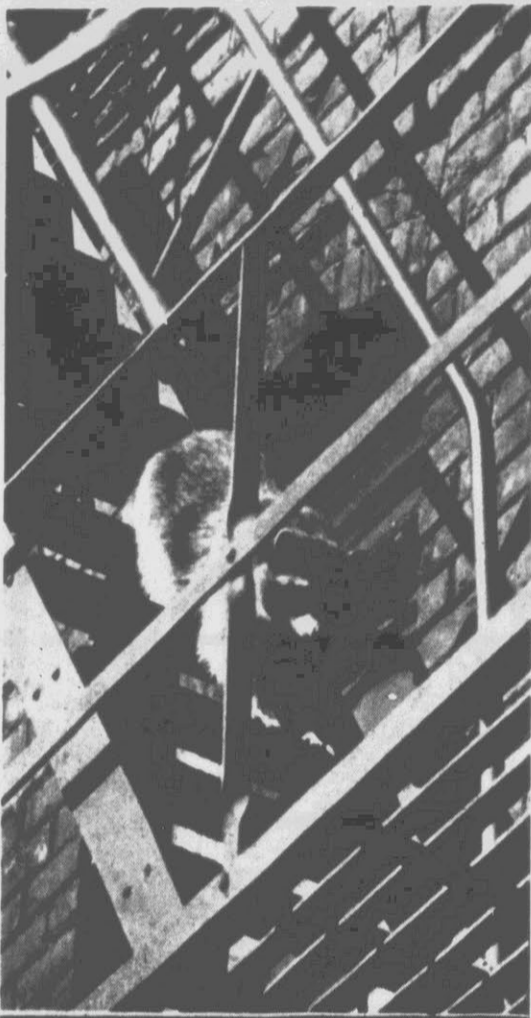
—Eduardo Bonini, a 33-year-old worker at the ministry of post and telegraph, obtained sick leave for 120 days last year. Officials said he was working at his own car repair shop south of Rome.

—Augusto Capponi, 57, a policeman who had taken time off in 1981 on grounds he suffered from nervous exhaustion but was refused a new sick leave this year, rushed into the precinct bathroom and fatally shot himself when agents came to

his precinct to arrest another police officer for chronic

absenteeism. Capponi, authorities said,

thought they had come to get him.

## Heavy Sales Of Typewriters

NEW YORK (UPI) — Two million typewriters are sold in the United States each year with sales running highest in June, when they are often given as graduation gifts, and December, when they are Christmas gifts, according to one major manufacturer.

An estimated 45 percent of U.S. households have a typewriter, according to the Smith-Corona company.

The first typewriter patents were issued to Englishmen in 1647, 345 years ago, and in 1714, although they never were put to practical use. The first machine to actually type letters on paper was invented by an American, William Burt, in 1829, but it was not a commercial success. Another commercial flop in 1874 was the first to be called a "Type-Writer" but the first manual typewriter as we know it to be successful was produced in 1895. The first portable typewriter was manufactured in 1906 and the first portable electric in 1957.

## Discriminate Among Disabled

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI) — A new survey among the disabled indicates boys and girls with similar mental or physical disabilities do not receive equal education.

"A double pattern of discrimination is apparent," says Katherine Corbett, coordinator of the study. "Mentally retarded girls and women are less likely to receive appropriate special education, while physically disabled women are more likely to be isolated into special institutions where their educations are inferior to public schools."

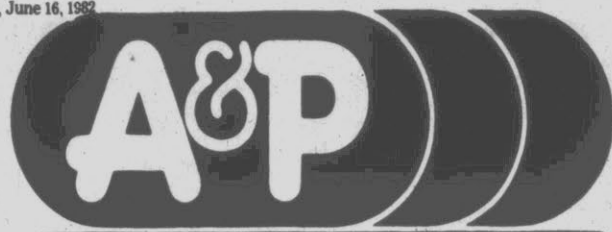
Among the issues the

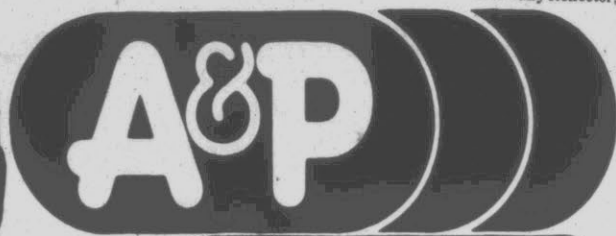

## A Legendary Colonel Is Book Topic

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — John Ed Pearce spent 15 months researching and writing about the man behind the myth.

When he finished, Pearce had 225 fast-moving pages on "The Colonel," recognized throughout the world for his famous fried-chicken recipe. There was no problem finding a publisher.

He had already convinced one that "a book on the life of Harland Sanders should do well," said Pearce. He was right, sales have been brisk everywhere except on the West Coast.

Pearce smiled and suggested that maybe "the folks out there don't eat a lot of chicken."

Material for the biography came from Pearce's notes, interviews and personal recollection.

Sanders had become a legend by the time of his death in December 1980 but, said Pearce, legends sometimes have another side seldom seen by the public.

"The Colonel was a very temperamental person. There were periods when he would become angry with everyone, from his wife to his business associates."

In the latter days of Sanders' life, "he felt that John Y. Brown and Jack Massey had cheated him" when they paid \$2 million for the business in 1964.

"My investigation didn't show that to be true," said Pearce, adding that Brown, now Kentucky's governor, "was very fair to the Colonel. He cared very deeply for him."

Pearce said he could understand Sanders' attitude. "The company was the only thing he had to show for a life of extremely hard work. He suddenly realized that he had sold not only the company but also the right to his name and the rights to his image. He couldn't really use himself as a means of promoting any new enterprise."

Reviewers have praised Pearce for achieving "a delicate balance" in the biography, and that pleases the 62-year-old columnist and staff writer for The Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times Magazine.

"I tried to be fair," said Pearce, who first met Sanders in 1937 "when he wasn't the Colonel. I would stop and eat at his restaurant in Corbin during trips to and from the University of Kentucky, where I was a student."

Pearce did graduate work at Columbia and Harvard universities, and in 1942 he enlisted in the Navy, serving four years in World War II. He spent 31 years in the Navy Reserve, retiring with the rank of commander.

After the war, he edited The Somerset Journal before joining the Courier-Journal as associate editor and editorial writer.

Pearce shared in a Pulitzer Prize, won the Headliner Award, the Meeman Award, three awards from the American Bar Association, and in 1980 was named Kentucky's Outstanding Journalist by the society of professional journalists, Sigma Delta Chi.

He is working on two more books: one about the Kentucky feuds of the late 1800s, and the other a compilation of his columns which are syndicated and which "irritate readers now and then because of their subject matter."

He often appears at six autograph sessions a week to help publicize "The Colonel," but still manages to squeeze in some writing.

"I prefer to write at night — nobody is around and the telephone doesn't ring."
