## Pavement Crumbles On First Street Following Big Rain

## City Street Goes Under During Rain

The storm that brimmed Greenville's streets with water Tuesday, threatening to float the city away, dumped 3.7 inches of rain and left in its wake a huge crevice in a street, a woman stranded in an elevator and a church organ damaged by lightning.

Public works and Greenville Utilities crews continued work today at the site of a drainage system collapse on First Street that resulted in a section of the street caving in, breaking underground gas, sewer and electric lines.

Mayo Allen, director of public works, termed the situation a "real mess," noting it had necessitated closing of First Street to traffic from Holly to Reade and knocked out electric power to the Willis Building.

Allen explained that a concrete header wall, installed in the 1950s to protect the drainage pipe, collapsed during Tuesday's heavy morning rains, crushing the drainage outlet and backing up water in the upstream areas, including Reade Circle. He indicated that the collapse probably followed years of gradual weakening of the fill around the header wall.

Allen said that a motorist spotted the first cave-in problem and notified him around 11:15 a.m. He said "only about a foot of asphalt and the sidewalk was affected when I first got there." The deluge of water continued to eat away the dirt around the header wall and the problem expanded, Allen said.

Workers this morning were still digging out the street section in an attempt to locate the crushed section and assess the damage, Allen said, adding that "it looks like we might have to replace the whole pipe." He said he would recommend installing a larger pipe to handle the water load that includes the downtown area of the city.

Allen, estimating that the repair project could cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000 to \$30,000 if pipe replacement is necessary, said there are no indications that the asphalt was weak before the shoulder collapsed.

The spokesman said that crews are tearing up the rest of the street to correct the problem and he hopes the corridor will be reopened to traffic early next week. "We are going to fix it right," he said.

## Iranians Launch Drive To 'Free' Iraq

Iranian forces invaded Iraq and captured hundreds of Iraqi soldiers in an offensive to "liberate Iraq" and topple the regime of President Saddam Hussein, Tehran radio claimed today.

An Iraqi military communique said Iranian troops pushed six miles into Iraq along a six mile front. But it said Iraq counterattacked and inflicted heavy losses on the invaders.

"The enemy began retreating under the courageous blows of our heroic forces, leaving behind large numbers of dead and wounded," the Iraqi communique said.

Iranian couched its announcement in the rhetoric of a holy war, calling the invasion "Operation Ramadan," after the Islamic holy month currently in progress, and promising its soldiers that defeating Iraq would somehow lead to the liberation Jerusalem and its Moslem holy sites from Israel.

Religious differences are among the underlying causes of hostility between the two Moslem countries. Iran is dominated by Shiite Moslems, while Iraq is governed largely by Sunnis, although it has a large Shiite minority. While both sects are Islamic, they have occasionally bitter disputes over doctrine.

There are also ethnic differences. Iraq's population is largely Arab, while Iran's is Persian. Each side has called on the minorities in the other country to rebel.

Iraq opened the war in 1980 by invading Iran's Khuzistan

province, homeland of Iran's ethnic Arab minority and site of most of its oil fields. Iraqi forces seized large portions of the province before the Iranian army rallied early this year and pushed the Iraqi forces out of the country.

Iran's current invasion is pushing into the home territory of Iraq's Shiites.

"Our Islamic army is coming to liberate you," Tehran radio said in an address to the Iraqi people, urging them to "mutiny."

"Our forces will not lay down their arms until this infidel agent regime and all symbols of treason in Baghdad have been toppled."

In an Arabic-language broadcast, Tehran radio claimed that hundreds of Iraqi soldiers had been captured in the offensive it said began Tuesday night.

A later broadcast quoted Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini as telling the Iraqis to welcome the Iranian invaders and "cut off the hands" of Hussein's followers.

## Senate Opens Tobacco Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Assistant Senate Republican Leader Ted Stevens of Alaska predicted today the Senate will not endorse efforts to change the federal tobacco price support program any more than Southern lawmakers already have suggested.

"The bill, which really is an anti-tobacco bill already, will not be further burdened," Stevens said. "That would be my feeling, and it's the position that I will support."

The Senate was opening debate today on a measure that would significantly reduce tax subsidies for the nation's 2 billion-pound tobacco crop and shift valuable government-issued production rights back to the hands of tobacco farmers.

"I think we are in a period of transition," Stevens said. "But there's no reason for precipitous action."

The bill would give Agriculture Secretary John Block authority to curb future increases in tobacco price supports to avoid overpricing of the American crop. Recent increases are blamed for a 400 million-pound stockpile of flue-cured tobacco as cheaper foreign imports bite into the market.

Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D-Mo., wants more drastic changes in the complex tobacco program, which narrowly survived congressional attacks last fall.

A staunch critic of the program, Eagleton is aiming mainly to force the same kind of congressional review to which all other commodity support programs are subjected every four years. The tobacco industry has vigor-

ously fought similar review proposals in the past.

Eagleton and other critics have complained for years that production restrictions have kept control of the tobacco crop in the hands of those owning about 500,000 federally issued acreage allotments and production quotas. A congressional study says seven of every 10 allotment and quota owners do not grow tobacco but rent or lease their right to grow the crop, often at substantial amounts, to farmers.

Program supporters defend the system, saying it has cost taxpayers little while ensuring substantial incomes for tens of thousands of small family farmers in the South.

Opponents say taxpayers have shelled out more than \$600 million in the last five decades to support tobacco prices.

## State Utilities Eye Peak-Demand Tests

# Pilot Bulk Barn Program Approved

In an effort to save bulk tobacco barn customers money and at the same time reduce the peak demand for electricity on the entire system — a move which ultimately would save all customers — the Greenville Utilities Commission last night gave approval to an experimental program to be funded in part by a \$40,805 grant from the North Carolina Alternative Energy Corp.

The AEC grant will be coupled with a \$10,500 in-kind match from the GUC and a \$2,000 in-kind grant from N.C. State University to fund the experiment — an adaptation of GUC present "Beat the Peak" program which places radio-controlled switches on residential water heaters and air conditioning units so utilities employees can cut them off to reduce the peak demand on the system.

All electric customers pay an "energy" charge, based on the amount of electricity they actually use. Customers also help pay a "demand" charge, based on the peak demand made on the system, GUC director Charles Horne explained.

The "demand" charge, based on the peak system load which usually occurs during the summer months, is paid all year long, whether that amount of electricity is used again during the year or not.

By reducing the peak demand, the GUC and ultimately the

rate payers save by not having to pay for electricity that is not used, Horne explained.

Since the use of bulk barns occurs during the high peak months of the year, Horne said, electric department superintendent Malcolm Green and members of his staff "have developed a plan for testing methods of peak reduction that would lower our peak summer demand with the idea that as our demand is lowered, the farmers participating would share in the savings," similar to the manner in which GUC's "Beat the Peak" customers receive credit on summer utility bills.

The purpose of the program, Green explained, is "to analyze the potential for electric load reduction," through the voluntary participation of 15 tobacco farmers with 100 bulk barns in the pilot study.

Green said that rather than GUC having control over the barns by radio, the farmers will be requested to shut off the electric air circulation fans of bulk barns during times of peak demand." Each of these fans, he noted, "represents around six kilowatts of demand."

Greene, who said there are some 2,500 bulk barns on the Greenville system, suggested that about half of them would be available for load reduction at any one time. State-wide there are about 41,000 bulk barns, which consume about \$18 million worth of power each year.

Each bulk barn on the Greenville system operating at the period of peak demand "costs us about \$50," Green noted, adding that over 50 percent of the rate paid by bulk barn users is a "demand" charge.

By reducing the "demand" with no harmful effects on the curing process, Green said state-wide, 123,000 kilowatts — or \$6 million, based on the average wholesale cost per kilowatt — could be saved each year, Green suggested.

Part of the grant money, according to Green, will be used to purchase and install magnetic tape meters at the 15 farms to monitor the demand. The participating farmers, he continued, will be notified when peak periods are occurring and the farmers at each test location will determine which barns can be cycled off and for how long, according to curing guidelines developed by N.C. State University (the first two days of the curing cycle are most critical, while barns can be cycled off for up to 8 hours the remaining five days of the cycle with no adverse effects).

Greene noted that Carolina Power & Light Co., Duke Power Co., and other utilities in the state are highly interested in the Greenville experiment.

"Our goal is to determine the feasibility ... to see if it will work," Green emphasized.

If the project is successful, such a program could be implemented state-wide.

# Pat's Pointers

Bold and bright or softly shaded, this handsome afghan is knitted in panels of shaded colors. Depending upon your choice of colors, it can take on a decidedly masculine air or appear soft and feminine. Seven panels make an afghan measuring 42 inches by 64 1/2 inches, with each panel knitted in stockinette and twisted cables. Three colors of knitting worsted weight yarn are used; select your own combination, use one of the choices listed below or, for a look of understated elegance, make it in solid white.

Or you may order Kit No. K-247 by sending a check or money order for \$34.50 to Pat Trexler at the same address. The kit price includes shipping charges, instruction leaflet and 15 skeins of yarn. Off-white yarn is used for the lightest shade with a choice of any of the following for the other two colors: light and dark blue; red and gray; bronze and brown; light and dark green; black and gray; rust and brown; avocado and olive; pale pink and rose. Please specify your choice of the above or order Kit KS-247 if you would prefer a solid off-white afghan.

Cable stitches have fascinated knitters for centuries and are just as popular today with the novice as with the more experienced knitter. Whether used singly, in pairs, in an overall design or in combination with other pattern stitches, cables add depth and interest to any knitted item.

If you have never worked cables, here is a basic pattern stitch for you to try. In addition to your knitting needles

and some yarn, you will need a cable holder. This can be a cable hook available at most needlework counters, a double-pointed needle or a crochet hook. For the beginner, I would recommend one of the hooks or holders designed for this purpose.

To practice a simple cable, cast on 14 stitches. The odd numbered rows will be the right side of your work. For the first row, purl 4, knit 6, purl 4. For the second row, knit 4, purl 6, knit 4. Repeat these two rows once more.

On the next — or fifth — row, purl 4, slip 3 stitches from the lefthand knitting needle to a cable holder; hold these in front of your work while you knit the next 3 stitches from the lefthand needle. Now, bring the cable holder up, slide the 3 stitches to the left end of the holder and knit them off onto the right needle. Purl the last 4 stitches from the left needle.

Row Six is a repeat of Row Two; Rows Seven and Eight are repeats of Rows One and

Two. When you have completed the eighth row, start over again at Row One and repeat all eight pattern-stitch rows again. Continue to repeat these eight rows over and over several times.

Then, work a few repeats of the pattern, making this change on each repeat of Row Five: Hold the cable hook with the 3 stitches on it in back of your work instead of in front and notice the difference that this makes in your pattern.

To keep track of the rows worked, write the numbers 1 through 8 down one side of a slip of paper or index card. As each row is finished, make a little check mark after the number of the row just completed.

If you are able to work this basic pattern successfully, you should be able to work almost any cable pattern with no difficulty. Many of the Twist and Cross Stitches used in fisherman knits use the same principle, so these, too, are now within your reach.

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## Kiwi Cake Is For Summer

To usher in a lovely summertime fruit, you may enjoy making and serving a Kiwi Cake as much as we did.

The cake itself is an old-fashioned hot milk sponge layer — but made speedily nowadays in an electric mixer. Filled and frosted with a Tangy Lemon Cream and kiwis it's both delicious and attractive.

### KIWI CAKE

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup sugar

Tangy Lemon Cream: recipe follows

6 to 8 kiwis, peeled and sliced

Grease and flour a round layer-cake pan (9 by 1 1/2 inches).

Stir together the flour, baking powder and salt; reserve. (We do this on a sheet of wax paper.)

Into a small saucepan pour the milk and add the butter; reserve.

In an electric mixer, at high speed, beat the eggs and vanilla until thickened and lemon color — about 3 minutes. Gradually beat in the sugar until mixture is very thick and ivory color — about 5 minutes.

At once, over high heat, bring the milk and butter just to a boil; with the mixer at lowest speed, gradually beat the hot milk mixture into the egg mixture only until smooth. Add the reserved flour mixture and beat gently just until the batter is smooth. Turn into the prepared pan.



KIWI CAKE — A sponge cake layer is split and sandwiched together with a tangy lemon cream and slices of a delightful fruit.

Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean — 35 to 40 minutes. Place pan on a wire

rack to cool for about 5 minutes. With a small metal spatula, loosen edges; turn out cake onto the wire rack; cool completely. Invert cake onto a serving plate whose edges have been lined with wide strips of wax paper.

Cut the cake in half horizontally to make 2 layers. Spread part of the Tangy Lemon Cream over one of the layers; add a layer of kiwis; top with the other cake layer; frost the top and sides with the remaining Tangy Lemon Cream and garnish with the remaining kiwis. Remove wax paper strips from around the plate. Chill before serving.

### TANGY LEMON CREAM

- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup water
- 2 large egg yolks
- Grated rind of 1 medium lemon (about 1 tablespoon)
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 cup heavy cream

In a 1/2-quart saucepan thoroughly stir together the cornstarch and sugar; gradually stir in the water, keeping smooth. Add the egg yolks and beat gently until blended. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is clear, thickened and boiling. Off heat stir in the lemon rind; gradually stir in the lemon juice; let stand at room temperature until cool to the touch. In a small bowl whip the cream until thick; add to the cool lemon mixture and fold in until blended. Makes about 2 1/2 cups.

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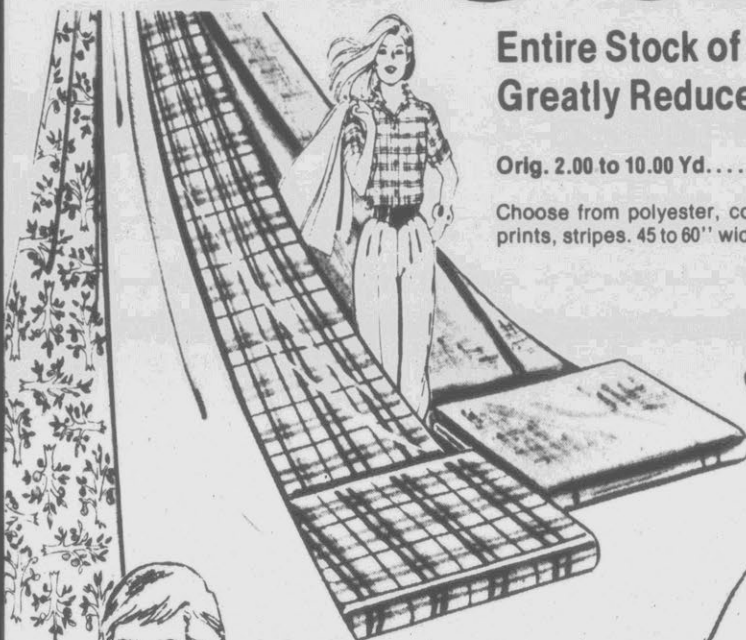
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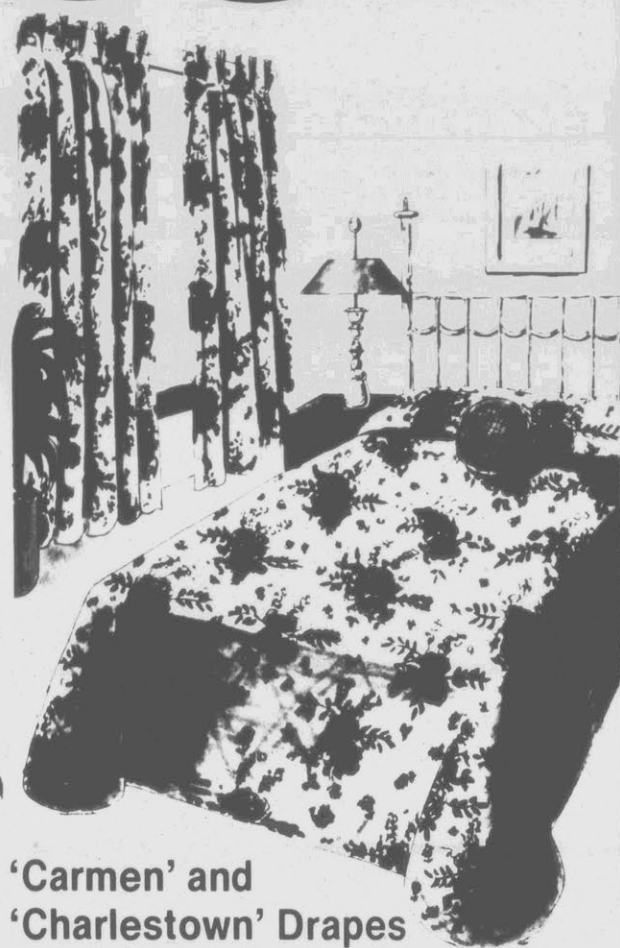
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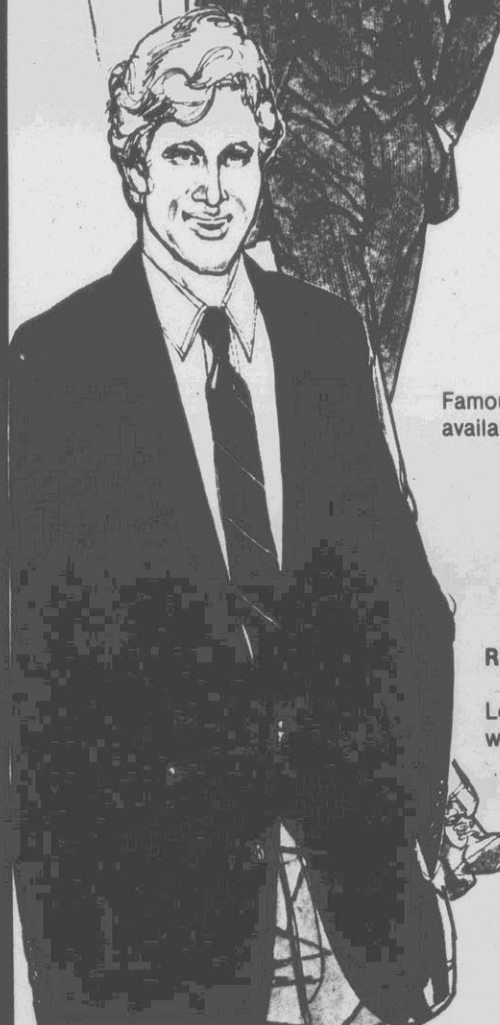
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# One War Behind Us

The Falkland Islands war between Great Britain and Argentina was never declared and it may never be undeclared, but it at least appears to be ended to the satisfaction of British leaders.

The government announced this week it was satisfied that Argentina considered the war over and that it was returning 593 prisoners of war it still holds. The majority of the Argentine prisoners had already been returned to their home land.

The Falkland Islands fight won't be ranked as one of the major conflicts of history. There are many, in fact, who wonder why it ever occurred at all. It was a very real war, however, in the sense that

civilians on the islands were displaced from their homes. It was real in that it cost billions to conduct, and it was real in that young men were killed and maimed in the fighting.

We can hope that there will be no more killing in the South Atlantic. We fervently hope that the fighting is over between England and Argentina. Those two countries and all others which found themselves on one side or the other in the conflict can now begin to look for ways to mend the damage that has been done in relations between nations. The Falklands war should be put behind us and it should spur us on to finding better ways than wars to settle disputes.

# High Placed Vulnerable

In Great Britain an intruder walked right into the queen's bedchamber in Buckingham Palace, sat on the bed and talked for 10 minutes before the queen was able to summon security people.

In this country a couple has been charged with an alleged fraudulent deal involving the sale of President and Mrs. Reagan's California home.

The palace intruder, it seems,

had been arrested previously for breaching security. Here, Mrs. Reagan may be called upon to testify in the case involving the couple.

These two events on opposite sides of the Atlantic seem implausible. It indicates, however, that even as high placed people as the queen and the president are vulnerable to the problems that beset us all.

# Radical Solution

RALEIGH — As director of the state's division of science in the Department of Public Instruction, Dr. Paul Taylor has heard most of the suggestions being offered for improving science and math instruction in North Carolina and across the country. But when he considers that one quarter of all math and science classes in North Carolina are taught by inadequately trained people and that enrollment in math and science courses is dropping rapidly, he wonders if drastic measures aren't needed.

For a while now, Taylor has been thinking about writing up his "radical solution" to the problem. When this reporter happened by his office recently, he laid out his ideas and saved himself the writing. It isn't a formal proposal — just something to think about, he says.

The study of math and science should be declared a matter of national security, he says. Although computers are practically everywhere now and despite being on the verge of a bio-technical revolution in agriculture and medicine, few people are training to become math and science teachers. On the university level, there is a shortage of new engineering professors to train new students.

But a matter of national security? Isn't that a bit severe? Maybe not.

Over Lebanon, Israeli fighter pilots have been terrorizing the Syrian Air Force lately. They've proven that their American weapons are far superior to those of the Soviet Union. Taylor asks how long this country can maintain its lead in high-technology weaponry if such a small portion of the popula-

tion is studying basic math and science.

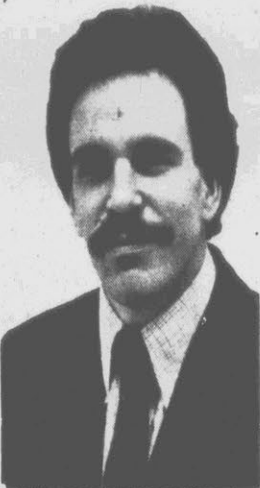
That might not be as serious a military question as one posed in Western Europe where American soldiers would rely on high-tech weapons to repel an Eastern bloc invasion. Our best science students today may be the best in the world when their time comes to design high-tech weapons in the next generation. But, will our foot soldiers know how to use those weapons? Taylor notes that there's considerable concern about the intellectual fitness to use

and technology but we've about reached the brink in some of these areas," Taylor says.

And then there's the quality of life. Workers in high-tech areas earn very good money and the job opportunities in these fields are growing rapidly. It's a question of providing our young people with the training to get those good jobs. (Some people feel there'll be very few non-technological jobs at all in 20 years.)

So Taylor suggests a national effort to enhance science and math instruction. His idea is to drastically increase teacher salaries — maybe doubling them — as a way of getting more people into math and science education. If that doesn't work, he'd start drafting qualified science teachers. Those currently teaching math and science would have to take night and summer courses to beef up their skills. And then he'd require more science and math as part of the student's basic curriculum. Of course the government would have to pay for it.

But as Taylor looks at the world we'll face in the year 2000, he doesn't see any other choice. To him, it's a matter of our own security.

some of the weapons he already has.

There's also a question of protecting America's position in the business world. Our economy depends, to a great extent, on the lead we hold in technological areas. We may not make a widget cheaper than they do in Hong Kong but then they don't stuff a half million gizmos on a silicon chip, either. But they will pretty soon. "American society has relied in the past on its lead in science

# Question Of Geography

No President spends all his

time just signing bills, and making speeches at prayer breakfasts. He is only human and likes to chew the fat with people. Who does he chew the fat with? His White House staff, of course. He isn't going to call up the secretary of State and say, "Hey, come over and have a beer."

Even if he wanted to, the White House staff members, jealous of their turf, are not going to let an outsider like a secretary of State become part of the inner circle.

Not only is the secretary kept away from the President for bull sessions, but the staff goes to great lengths to see that he doesn't get to see the President too often when it involves affairs of state.

The first rule is that a secretary of State must always call the President before he comes over.

The conversation could go like this:

"This is the secretary of State. I have to see the President of the United States."

"I'm sorry sir. The President is in an important meeting with Charlton

Heston. Can anybody else help you?"

"No, I have to talk to the President about China."

"Haven't you already talked to him about China?"

"I have to talk to him again."

"He has a terribly busy schedule. We could fit you in a week from next Thursday for 10 minutes."

"It's urgent."

"We can't move it up sooner. But if we have a cancellation we'll call you back."

After the White House aide hangs up he turns to another White House aide and says, "Can you imagine the gall of the man? He thinks he can just call up, and see the President on 48 hours' notice. What kind of administration does he think we're running?"

"They're all alike," the other White House aide says.

"They believe just because we let them sit in on Cabinet meetings, they can have access to the President any time they want to. If there is one thing I hate, it's a pushy secretary of State."

# Lonely Figure

WASHINGTON — when Sen. Charles Percy, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, urged President Reagan not to "go ahead" with the sale of 75 F-16 aircraft to Israel, he was a lonely figure of protest amid widespread approval of Israel's invasion of Lebanon by the Reagan administration, Congress and the American public.

Percy has received no response from the White House, and none is expected anytime soon, confirming that the Lebanon occupation has increased Israel's influence in the U.S., not reduced it.

That raises this difficult question: Have the Reagan administration and Congress decided to give Israel full freedom to act on behalf of the U.S. in the Arab-Israeli struggle and in the larger context of Mideast policy. Using as their yardstick the lack of official criticism of Israel's Lebanon adventure, the answer is probably yes.

In the first week of the Israeli invasion when Israeli lobby, sarcastically asked an aide of Sen. Alan Cranston: "Why don't you bring up the Cranston Amendment on the floor now and see what happens?" The Senate Democratic whip's amendment gives Israel unprecedented, open-ended yearly aid high enough to pay past debts to the U.S.

In needing Cranston, Mathias naturally assumed the invasion of Lebanon had weakened Israel in the Senate. On the contrary, Cranston has not been notified of any opposition on the floor to his amendment. He is confident it will pass. One reason is the November election.

Israel's control over U.S. Mideast policy was impressed on the Senate during Prime Minister Menachem Begin's contentious session with the foreign relations committee June 22. Begin, who had come to Capitol Hill from the Oval Office, was quoted to us as saying: "I've spoken to the president. We have his support. We have Jewish support. And we have some Christian support."

Considering its carte blanche over U.S. policy, it is not all that surprising that Israel could create a situation requiring President Reagan to send the U.S. Marines to redeem last Israeli demands in Lebanon. White House aides and a minority of State Department officials are trying hard to dilute this impression.

The line goes that President Reagan actually has concealed the anger he feels for Begin and Defense Minister Ariel Sharon; that Reagan was tough in his final session with Begin last month, warning Israel not to interfere with U.S. arms shipments to "friendly Arab states"; that former secretary of state Alexander Haig was even tougher with Begin in ruling out new Jewish settlements on the West Bank.

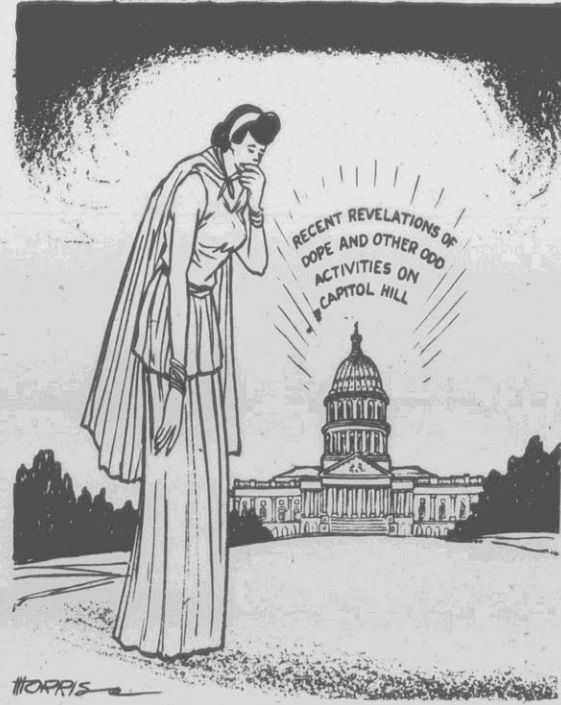
But these and other alleged examples of toughness were all behind closed doors. They were therefore no antidote to the image of Israel's unchecked influence in this country. Protest against Israel's military rampage has been largely confined to the press, liberal Jewish intellectuals, church leaders and a few prominent Jewish Americans who long ago deserted Begin because of his expansionist policies. The official U.S. assent to Israeli seizure of Lebanon helps explain the rise of Israel in post-invasion public opinion polls.

Reagan has passed up multiple opportunities since the June 6 invasion to signal distress over what one administration official described to us as "Begin treating Reagan as his chump." Examples: no complaint over the lack of reply to Reagan's formal request asking whether Israel used forbidden U.S. cluster bombs in Lebanon; no protest over Israel's recklessly premature leak of Reagan's offer of the Marines; no marked reaction to new killings of Palestinians on the West Bank and dismissal of another elected Palestinian mayor.

If White House and State Department publicists mean what they say about the president's intention to get "tough" with Israel after Lebanon, he will be fighting a high tide of support for Israel that he himself helped create.

More likely is a further ceding of U.S. policy to Israel's own interests. Begin's American triumph the past five weeks looks like the threshold for more U.S. impotence and greater Israeli victories.

# Reagan Pension Plan Debated

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's \$22,444 California pension has been questioned by critics who contend it's an unconstitutional "emolument." But the Justice Department says it's a perfectly legal arrangement.

Either way, the on-again, off-again debate centers on one of those often overlooked sections of the Constitution offering little firm proof of which side is right.

The head of the Sacramento (Calif.) Urban League, for one, notes that the Constitution bars U.S. presidents from getting any state or federal emolument other than their salary.

An emolument, says Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary, is a "profit from office, employment or labor; fees or salary."

But the Justice Department, in a legal opinion,

insists the intent of the men who drafted the clause in the 18th century was to bar payments that could influence presidential decisions.

And that problem is absent, the department says, because Reagan will get the pension money from his days as California governor regardless of what he does in the Oval Office.

A 1973 Library of Congress guide to the Constitution lists no disputes over the presidential "emolument" clause.

Major law school textbooks do not probe the true meaning of the provision, which likely will remain in the ranks of some of the other obscure parts of the Constitution.

Federal officeholders need the consent of Congress to accept any "present, emolument, office or title" from "any king, prince or foreign state."

The Justice Department

says it has received inquiries about Reagan's pension from House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., and at least two other congressmen.

And George Dean, president of the Sacramento Urban League, says he informed Attorney General William French Smith by letter that paying the pension as long as Reagan is president is unconstitutional.

Dean, whose group advocates the rights of minorities, says he's asked California officials to stop payments, now set at \$22,444 annually, pending an independent legal review.

The debate over the pension may stay just that — a war of words.

Court challenges may be impossible. If, as is likely, the president keeps on receiving the pension in addition to his \$200,000 salary there's a major question of who could go to court to try

to stop him.

And in the absence of any court challenge, the Justice Department's approval of the pension arrangement last year is almost certain to stand as the last official word.

"The pension is not an emolument within the meaning of the Constitution ... or within the meaning of the laws of California," says Justice Department spokesman Mark Sheehan.

In its original version, the 18th century presidential "emolument" clause reads as follows:

"The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them."

## Begin Said Willing To Hold Back

Israeli jets staged mock bombing raids over west Beirut today, but a report in Israel said Prime Minister Menachem Begin has decided to give U.S. diplomatic efforts as much time as is needed to end the crisis peacefully.

Israel radio said Begin had told Howard Squadron, chairman of the council of presidents of American Jewish organizations, that invading west Beirut to oust the PLO would cause many Israeli and Lebanese casualties and damage relations with the United States.

There was no immediate comment from Begin's office on the report. It contrasted sharply with the tone of recent Israeli assertions that time is running out and that Israel is prepared to drive the Palestine Liberation Or-

ganization's guerrillas out of Beirut if they do not agree to leave peacefully.

The talks on evacuating the PLO have been snagged for more than two weeks on the question of where the guerrillas would go if they left Beirut and how they would get there. There was no indication of substantial progress today.

The mock bombing raid is a tactic Israel has used

before over Beirut in an effort to frighten the estimated 500,000 civilians living in the Moslem quarter and induce them to leave. No bombs were dropped.

On the ground, both sides reported skirmishes, but the U.S.-mediated cease-fire continued to protect the city from artillery barrages. Palestinian gunners fired anti-aircraft weapons at the low-flying Israeli jets, but

there were no reports that any were downed.

The United States has refused to recognize the PLO until it accepts Israel's right to exist and accepts United Nations resolutions outlining a peace plan for the region.

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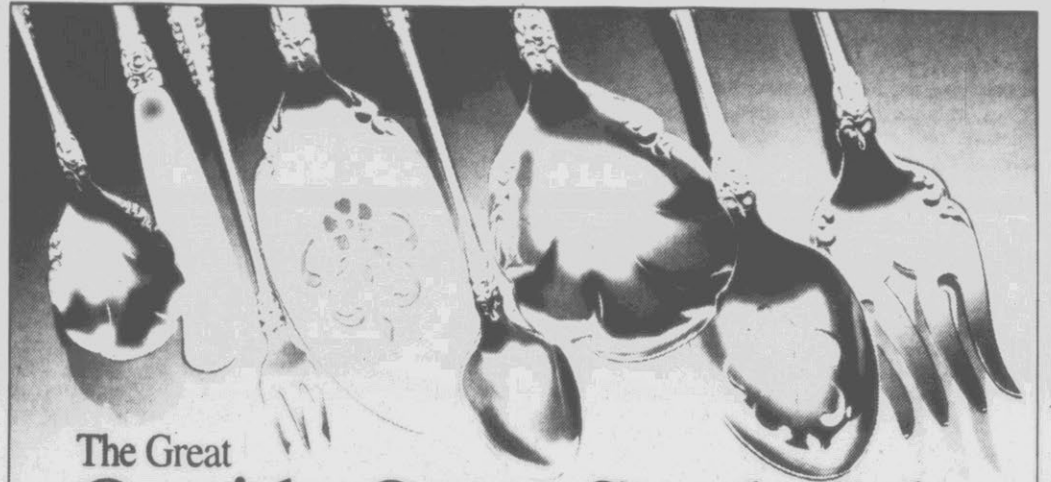
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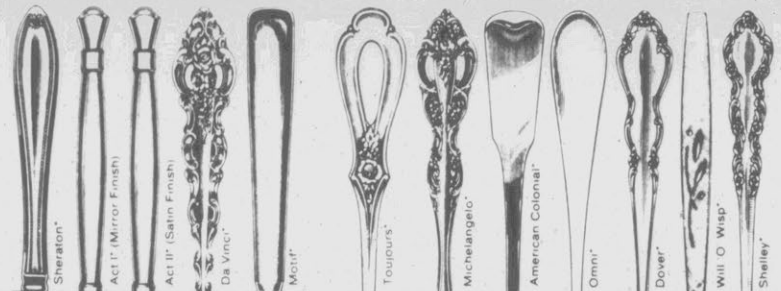

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# GUC OKs Development Policy

Greenville Utilities Commission members Tuesday night voted their approval of a joint statement of policy on development, a tax shelter retirement program for commission employees and an experimental program designed to reduce the demand for electricity created by the operation of bulk tobacco barns.

In approving the statement of policy on development, commissioners joined the Greenville City Council in setting out a five-point policy statement "in order to promote the expansion of the tax base" within the city, "and to encourage the development of land both within the city and within the extraterritorial limits of the city."

The policy statement says water and sewer extensions should be coordinated with the city's comprehensive plan; that land should be developed in accordance with the comprehensive plan; that the development of underdeveloped areas within the city and adjacent to the city limits should be promoted by "adopting innovative policies with incentives" for private development; and that Community Development funds should be used for new street construction and improvements (including all utility system improvements) where applicable.

The statement also said the city and utilities "agree... to require that requests for extension of sewer lines outside the city limits or requests for

service from existing out-of-city sewer lines to serve residential and commercial developments must be accompanied by a petition for voluntary annexation or a petition for annexation to be filed at the earliest time the property to be served meets the statutory requirements for voluntary annexation."

The tax shelter plan given approval will result in an increase in take-home pay of employees by an estimated 2 percent to 4 percent by sheltering the contributions made by employees to the N.C. Local Government Employees' Retirement System.

In approving the program to reduce the demand for electricity from bulk tobacco barn operators, the commission accepted a N.C. Alternative Energy Corp. grant for \$40,805 with which to fund an experimental "Beat the Peak" type program for bulk barns.

In addition to the AEC grant, GUC will provide some \$10,500 in in-kind matching funds for the program, while N.C. State University will contribute some \$2,000 in in-kind services.

The experimental program this summer will explore and test methods of peak reduction, with the goal of saving bulk barn users and ultimately all GUC customers money.

Commission members also approved the search for a consultant to conduct a water and sewer rate study which would establish water and sewer rates on a cost-of-service basis — what it costs to provide specific classes of service — rather than

the present flat rate schedule.

In other business, the commission adopted a resolution to dissolve Power Agency Number 2, which is now inactive because of the establishment of the N.C. Eastern Municipal Power Agency, and approved the write-off of some \$129,561 in delinquent accounts from fiscal year 1980-81. The delinquent accounts amount to .325 percent of the total amount billed during the 1980-81 fiscal year, and include less than \$22,000 in bills for commercial service.

Even though commissioners approved the delinquent bill write-off, the accounts are still carried on the books and efforts will continue to be made to collect them.

Commission members also accepted bids and awarded contracts for supplies and equipment at the session. The low bids and awards included: \$13,719 for 195,000 pounds of chlorine from Suffolk Chemical Co.; \$19,462 for 148,000 pounds of caustic soda from Enece Chemical Sales Inc.; \$27,816 for 450,000 pounds of aluminum sulfate from Gowen Chemicals Inc.; \$8,942 for an air compressor from N.C. Equipment Co.; \$19,654 for a wrecker and body for a currently-owned cab and chassis from Eastern Wrecker Sales Inc.; \$16,030 for two three-quarter-ton pickup trucks from F&D Motors; \$7,626 for one half-ton pickup truck from F&D Motors; \$28,932 for four half-ton compact pickup trucks from Phelps Chevrolet Inc.; and \$23,833 for a tractor-backhoe with front end loader from R. W. Moore Equipment Co.

## New ERA Bill Going To Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vowing the women's equality issue "will not die," supporters of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment are reintroducing the measure in Congress just two weeks after the original amendment failed to win ratification.

"The ERA is about economics and civil rights, not about lifestyles," said Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo.

The issue of equality of rights for women will not die," Rep. Margaret Heckler, D-Mass., said recently. "Current economic conditions have made the ERA's passage even more vital today than it was when this saga began in 1972."

Her comments were made as Capitol Hill supporters were announcing reintroduction of the measure at a news conference today.

The first ERA died on June 30 because only 35 of the required 38 states had ratified it. Congress approved it in 1972, and extended the seven-year ratification limit by three years in 1979.

The pivotal provision of the 52-word amendment states: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

In the House, Reps. Schroeder and Heckler; Peter Rodino, D-N.J.; and Don Edwards, D-Calif., top a roster of more than 150 co-sponsors.

Among the 46 co-sponsors of the measure in the Senate are Sens. Paul Tsongas and Edward Kennedy, both D-Mass.; Bob Packwood, R-Ore.; Joseph Biden Jr., D-Del.; and Charles Mathias Jr., R-Md.

But Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker of Tennessee has said he advocates "a little cooling off," and opposes efforts to bring up a new ERA this year.

Assistant Senate Republican Leader Ted Stevens of Alaska, a sponsor of the new proposed amendment, told reporters today he does not expect Congress to act on the ERA unless prodded by state legislatures.

Stevens suggested that ERA backers follow the course adopted by supporters of a proposed constitutional

amendment that would require a balanced budget. Those forces persuaded nearly the required two-thirds of state legislatures to adopt resolutions calling for a constitutional convention on the subject.

The Senate is now considering the balanced budget amendment and is expected to approve it.

"We are motivated to a great extent by the number of states that have called for a constitutional convention," Stevens said. "I don't think any of us wants a constitutional convention."

Tsongas has said backers will attempt to line up support from the necessary two-thirds of the Senate before trying to force a vote on the issue.

"There will not be an attempt to press him (Baker) until we know we have the necessary votes," Tsongas said, noting that supporters "hope there will be more pro-ERA supporters after the (November congressional) elections than now."

Several women's rights groups, including the National Organization for Women, indicated after the ERA's defeat that they would rechannel their efforts.

While continuing to support the concept of the amendment, NOW president Eleanor Smeal said several weeks ago, "We will not again seriously pursue the ERA until we've made a

major dent in changing the composition of Congress as well as the state legislatures to include a significantly larger proportion of women and of men who are genuinely feminists."

She cited a recent survey by pollster Louis Harris which indicated that public support for the ERA had reached 63 percent. The poll showed 34 percent of those polled opposed the amendment and 3 percent were not sure.

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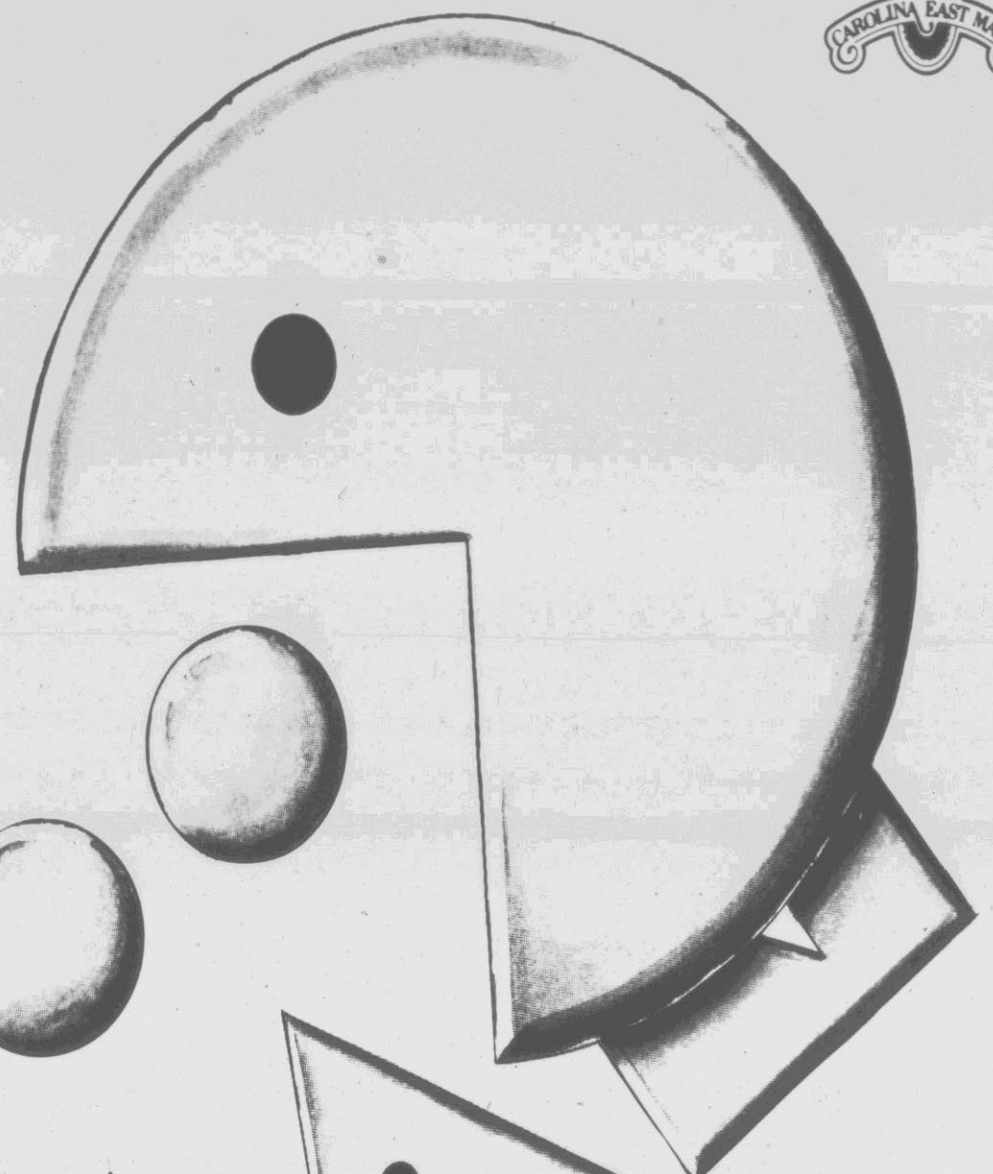
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## Final Controls For Chemical Dumps Issued

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has issued final standards governing 2,000 hazardous waste landfills across the country, putting in place the last major piece of regulatory machinery to protect the country against leaking chemical dumps.

The Environmental Protection Agency, in unveiling the 600 pages of regulations Tuesday, said they would provide a national "insurance policy" to halt past practices which left a legacy of hundreds of dangerous dumps that must now be cleaned up.

"The regulations ensure that the health of the American people will not be compromised, and that their drinking water will be fully protected," said EPA Administrator Anne Gorsuch. However, environmen-

talists attacked the rules for not going far enough, particularly in regulating existing landfills and storage ponds.

The regulations require new chemical dumps to install leak-proof liners and drainage systems to collect any liquid wastes and monitor for contamination of underground water supplies.

Existing facilities have to monitor for contamination, but they do not have to install liners or drainage systems.

David Lennett of the Environmental Defense Fund, which took the EPA to court to force the agency to finally issue the regulations, said EPA's decision to exempt existing dumps from installing liners and collection systems was a mistake.

"The agency's own data indicates a significant number of existing facilities are unlined and are located directly over a groundwater

source," Lennett said. "The agency should not be sanctioning such management practices."

But EPA officials said it was not feasible to force existing facilities to dig up their wastes and install the liners because of prohibitive costs and dangers that would be presented to workers from disturbing the wastes.

The agency said the ground water monitoring — which must be done at both existing and new facilities — would provide adequate warning of leaks.

The EPA estimated the new rules will cost existing facilities an additional \$7 for each ton of waste handled while new facilities will pay an extra \$15. A typical land disposal dump handles 35,000 tons of wastes annually.

The rules covering 2,000 land disposal facilities are in addition to regulations issued earlier.

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## House Democrats Want Higher Taxes, Benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Democrats are working on a plan to increase the income tax on unemployment compensation and use the money to finance additional jobless and welfare benefits as well as cut the federal deficit.

The proposal, likely to spark a fight from Republicans, would provide up to 13 additional weeks of unemployment benefits, providing a maximum of 52 weeks for workers in states where joblessness is highest.

The cost for the program, which would end on Sept. 30, 1983, unless Congress extends it, is pegged at \$562 million.

To finance it — as well make changes in welfare and reduce the deficit at the same time — the proposal would raise taxes on unemployment benefits by nearly \$700 million next year and \$2 billion over the next three years.

The plan already has been approved once by the Democratic-controlled House Ways and Means Committee and is awaiting action in the full House.

But to make sure it gets the fullest consideration possible, Rep. Harold Ford, D-Tenn., arranged to bring it up again today at a subcommittee meeting called to consider 1983 spending cuts required by the budget Congress passed last year.

The session follows one at which a separate Ways and Means subcommittee approved a three-year package of Medicare cuts totalling between \$5 billion and \$6 billion — roughly half of what was envisioned in the budget Congress approved last month.

Together, the two budget-cutting sessions mark the beginning of what is expected to be a long struggle in the Democratic-controlled House to meet tax increase and spending cut requirements in an election-year budget.

Under the Republican-drafted spending plan, the subcommittee Ford heads is required to cut \$593 million in 1983 and about \$2.2 billion over three years from programs such as welfare, Supplemental Security Income and child support enforcement.

Ford produced a package calling for larger than required reductions in the deficit — \$768 million in 1983 and \$2.6 billion over three years — although most of the

money would come in the form of higher taxes on unemployment benefits.

As for the programs themselves, the proposal calls for increasing spending on Aid to Families with Dependent Children by \$71 million in 1983 and \$325 million over three years. Most of the increase would come from expanded eligibility and from permitting recipients to earn more money without suffering a reduction in their benefits.

The panel that met on Tuesday found it impossible to meet its goal of cutting Medicare.

Democrats invited the GOP to take the lead, and Republicans said they opposed any plans to impose higher fees on recipients of the government's health care for the elderly.

While the precise figure was not available, officials said the proposals passed on to the full committee would save between \$5 billion and \$6 billion over three years — in contrast to the \$11.5 billion envisioned in the budget approved last month.

Most of the savings come from a decision to "recognize" a series of regulatory steps the Reagan administration says can cut \$2.3 billion in the next three years.

An additional \$800 million savings through 1985 will result from increased auditing of claims submitted for payment, the subcommittee said.

In addition, the panel

called for consideration of a plan ending the system under which the government reimburses hospitals and nursing homes after services are rendered.

Instead, the government would make a fixed payment in advance, a step that some officials contend would force hospitals to institute cost-saving steps of their own.

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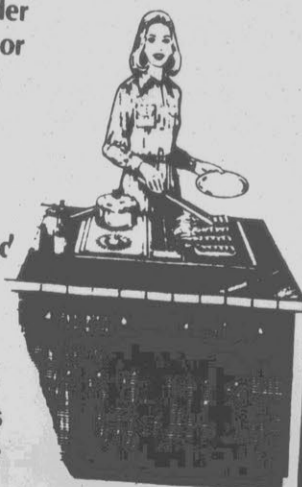
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# Balanced Budget Amendment Is Expected To Pass Both Houses

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate is moving toward approval of a constitutional amendment to balance the federal budget and the House seems likely to follow close behind.

"It will pass," said House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, an opponent of the amendment, on Tuesday.

In two days of Senate debate, only nominal opposition has arisen to the politically popular measure to force the government to match every dollar taken in with every one spent.

A final vote in the Senate was unlikely until later this week or early next week, but the outcome is not in doubt.

One opponent, Sen. Charles McC Mathias Jr., R-Md., said Congress should not enact a balanced budget amendment in the same year

it approved a record federal deficit.

"The American people are bound to wonder how the same Congress that brought back a budget \$100 billion out

of whack can sit here with our hands piously folded in front of us and vote for a balanced budget amendment," Mathias said.

Mathias has introduced a

weaker alternative to the constitutional amendment, but Congress will probably reject the Maryland senator's proposal later this week.

The Mathias alternative includes many of the provisions of the constitutional amendment, but is in the form of legislation requiring a simple majority vote in

stead of two-thirds required by the amendment.

Supporters of the amendment said the Mathias measure, even if enacted, would not work, because

Congress would ignore it once pressure grew to approve federal spending beyond available revenues.

Reagan promised in 1980 to balance the federal budget

by 1982 and O'Neill said the president has backed "a constitutional amendment to deliver on a campaign promise he has not been able to deliver on himself."

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
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
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
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## Auto Industry Hits Alcohol Lookalikes

NEW YORK (AP) — Papa has his Michelob. Now junior has "Pickelob."

Papa's got Miller High Life; junior has "Milder Low Life." But that's too much gusto for the American Automobile Association. It wants Pickelob and Milder — as well as Fallstiff, Heinekant, Lowbrow ("The One For Bums") and Von Schultz — out of the hands and mouths of children.

The "Chug-a-Can" candy, sold in 2-inch miniature beer cans made of plastic, are filled with brightly colored candy, not the frothy golden brew.

The AAA has launched a campaign against the beer lookalikes in editorials sent recently to its 178 clubs for distribution through club newsletters nationwide. AAA says Chug-a-Can fosters unhealthy attitudes toward beer-drinking among youngsters, and they want stores to remove the candy.

"Making alcohol consumption a glamorous activity is something that shouldn't be done," says Allan Wilbur, national director of public relations for AAA, which has 22.5 million members. "We've been involved in alcohol education programs for so long, we just felt we had to say something."

Fleercorp, the Philadelphia firm that makes Chug-a-Can, hasn't answered the club's letters.

A secretary to Donald Peck, Fleercorp president, told The Associated Press on Tuesday: "We have no comment on this subject." Peck, she said, was out of town and she refused to bring any other company officers to the phone.

Chug-a-Can, which costs 30 cents to 60 cents per can, contains tiny, sweet balls similar to jawbreakers. It comes in 20 different "brands," looking like the real thing with their flip-top opening and "Don't Litter" imprint on top. Pickelob carries a drawing of a pickle and a resemblance of the real brew's distinctive can design, but adds on the side: "Just a Joke... Pure Fun."

AAA's battle began a few months ago in Maine and New Hampshire.

It persuaded the merchandising manager for 7-11 stores in the eastern division to stop offering the product from its distribution center, which serves seven states and the District of Columbia. But 7-11 stores may sell the product if they buy it elsewhere.

Carol Wisniewski, public relations manager for AAA New Hampshire, says the club also has persuaded Cumberland Farms convenience stores to pull the product in that state.

Other stores haven't come along so quickly.

Harold Frank, president of Bradlees department stores, just doesn't agree with AAA: "We concluded that these tiny cans of candy presented no threat to any future drinking habits of the children who consume it."

But Eric Baxter, public affairs director for AAA Maine, calls it "another example of the 'everybody does it' kind of conditioning."

"To think of a 7 or 8-year-old kid flipping open this little pretend can ... is very, very negative," he adds. "There are enough other ways to market bubble gum and candy without doing it in beer cans."

## Professor Fights Subversive Label

WASHINGTON (AP) — A University of Maryland professor seeking permanent residency is up against U.S. immigration authorities who have labeled him as subversive.

"I don't belong to any party and never have," Angel Rama said Tuesday. "I am not a Communist. I follow the socialist philosophy."

The 56-year-old Venezuelan, a respected member of the university faculty, was given tenure last year as professor of Spanish literature. But his future in that post remains in doubt as a result of the government's failure to drop its 13-year-old description of Rama as a subversive.

The law states that anyone who is or at any time was a communist or anarchist or member of an affiliated group, or anyone who advocates their beliefs, is permanently ineligible for a visa, according to a State Department spokesman John Caulfield.

Rama was classified a subversive in 1969 following an interview with a U.S. consular officer in Montevideo, Uruguay.

During the course of his conversation with the consular officer, Rama admitted making a trip to China in 1962 and a series of visits to Cuba in order to prepare articles on life in those countries.

Despite the subversive label, Rama was granted temporary entry to the United States under a waiver rule in 1969. State Department officials say last year more than 23,000 persons listed as subversives were granted similar entry to the United States.

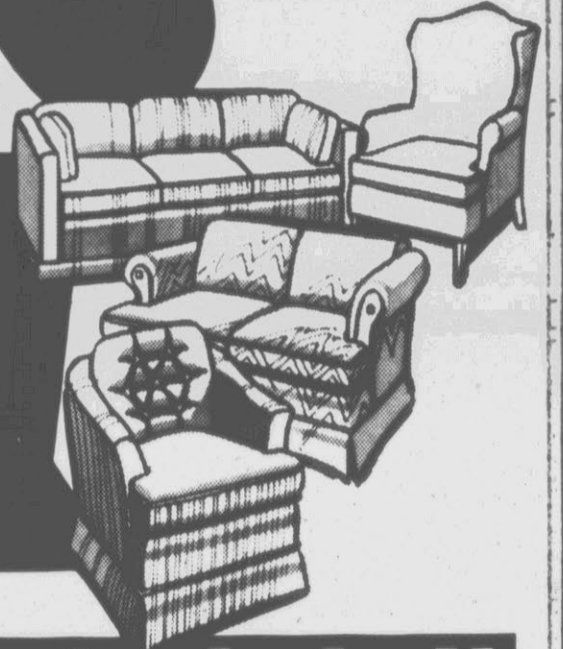
Last year, after receiving his tenure from the University of Maryland, Rama sought to apply for permanent residency in the United States.

"I wrote to the U.S. ambassador in Venezuela a year ago asking for a review of my status and have yet to receive a reply," Rama said.

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# Rose Opposes Change In Block's Power

U.S. Rep. Charles Rose, D-N.C., says tobacco farmers "would get sold down the river" if Congress approves a proposal to give the secretary of agriculture power to set tobacco price-support levels.

A letter from U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block released Monday asked Congress to give him authority to set price supports when the Senate resumes debate today on a tobacco reform bill.

Under the current formula, price supports escalate each year under an indexed

formula tied to the cost of production.  
Rose, chairman of the House Tobacco and Peanut Committee, says he was shocked at the timing of Block's recommendation.  
"He has fired the opposition with new ammunition at a very sensitive and critical time in the legislative process," said Rose, who is chief sponsor of the tobacco reform bill.  
Rose says if Congress gave the secretary such authority, then "we could expect substantially lower price supports from a free market oriented type secretary such as John Block."

In North Carolina, reaction to Block's recommendation was mixed, with growers and state officials opposing the move while warehouseman and exporters favored it.  
Tobacco industry leaders were in Washington Tuesday to plot strategy for today's Senate battle.  
James A. Graham, commissioner of the N.C. Department of Agriculture has said he is bitterly opposed to

Block's proposal.  
"A move of this sort would place additional strain on our tobacco farmers. It is not fair to our farmers to give one government official the authority to set support levels at his whim, and at levels that could severely hurt our tobacco farmers."  
The proposal also has been opposed by Gov. Jim Hunt, a spokesman for Hunt said.  
But Hugh S. Kiger, execu-

tive vice president of the Leaf Tobacco Exporters Association of the United States, says a move to lower prices — if that is what Block would do — would be a good thing.  
"If the secretary could take action that could make us more competitive on the foreign and domestic market, it would be something that would be a plus," Kiger said.

# North Carolina Insured Jobless Rate Increases

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — State Employment Security Commission officials say they did not expect the state's insured unemployment rate to increase in June, but it did — marking only the second such increase in the last 10 years.

The rate, considered a precursor of change in the overall jobless rate, increased from 4.1 percent in May to 4.5 percent in June.

"This increase was not anticipated," said David Pearce, an analyst for ESC.

Pearce says the only other time the May-June insured jobless rate has increased in the 10 years was in 1980, after credit controls imposed by President Carter's administration threw the economy into a sharp decline.

Pearce says the insured rate usually rises and falls in tandem with the state's jobless rate.

The insured jobless rate measures the number of people receiving unemployment insurance benefits from the ESC. It excludes farmworkers, those who have not had a job recently and others not eligible for benefits.

The ESC will compute the jobless rate later this month.

The ESC report is the state's first economic indicator for June, say private and government economists. Those economists declined to draw conclusions from the report until other information is available about June's business activity.

"We had been optimistic due to two months of falling claims (for unemployment benefits)," said a spokesman for the state Office of the Budget.

The insurance fund decreased from 5.3 percent in March to 4.1 percent in May. But he said the increase back

to 4.5 percent indicates a "deterioration of the labor market" during the past month.

ESC figures showed 103,440 people received unemployment checks during June, or 4.5 percent of the 2.3 million workers covered by unemployment insurance.


The number of laid-off workers increased from 13,772 in May to 15,249 in June, according to ESC figures.

The textile industry had a 7.9 percent jobless rate in June, up from 6.9 percent in May. Unemployment in the apparel industry remained stable at 9 percent, compared with 9.1 percent in May.

The furniture industry's jobless rate jumped from 7.8 percent in May to 9.5 percent in June, according to ESC figures.

Unemployment in the trade sector, which includes retail sales workers, rose from 2.9 percent to 3.2 percent in June. The number of laid-off workers increased from 13,772 in May to 15,249 in June.

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# Jobless Rate Up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unemployment in 47 states and the District of Columbia rose in May from year-ago rates, according to the Labor Department.

The rates fell in two states and stayed the same in one, according to a new department report from the Bureau of Labor Statistics giving a state-by-state breakdown of unemployment figures.

The report released Tuesday said the states in which unemployment fell over the year were North Dakota, 4.3 percent from 4.8 percent in May 1981, and West Virginia, 10.9 percent from 13.2 percent. The unemployment rate stayed the same, at 4.5 percent, in South Dakota.

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# School Trains Students In Facts Of Business

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Twenty-six Charlotte area high school students are spending their summer learning how to run a business, and they're getting paid for their effort.

The students were chosen earlier this year to participate in a unique economics program on the free enterprise system. Each student in the six-week institute spends four days a week working with local companies and learning every aspect of the business.

Companies participating in the program donated \$600, \$500 of that going to each student at the end of the course next month.

"We have kids getting up at 5 a.m. to get to their jobs at seven, and it's been tough on them," said program director James Rutherford. "They're doing a different job every day. They're learning what free enterprise is all about."

The students, 12 boys and 14 girls, are rising seniors at Mecklenburg and Union county public and private schools. They were recommended for the course by guidance counselors at their schools on the basis of readership, scholarship and responsibility. Their average grades range from A's to C's.

"What we wanted were bright young people who were interested in finding out about the business world and getting an education to help them make business decisions in the future," Rutherford said.

The economics institute is the only one of its kind offered in the Carolinas. There are only three such programs in operation in the country — one at the Collegiate School in Richmond, and two in Philadelphia.

Rutherford, 42, who has been a teacher for 15 years, believes the program will help bridge the gap between the business community and educators.

"Business does a lousy job of teaching free enterprise," he said. "One of the objectives of this program is to get business people communicating with young people so they will know what's going on out there in the business world when they start making career decisions."

The college-level course has been purposely tough. The students met for one week at the beginning of the course in a classroom setting where they discussed everything from taxes to computer programming. They heard in-depth presentations from 45 area businesses, including E.F. Hutton, IBM, and Family Dollar Inc.

Most days the students brought their own lunches from home to eat between classes or in the car on the way to

dozens of business tours.

But it hasn't been all drudgery. On a recent morning, Rutherford, dressed in an orange shirt and yellow flowered pants "just to get their attention," showed a film on free enterprise called "chickenomics" featuring the San Diego Padres' Chicken. But the movie, with cackling background music by the Hen House Five, dealt with a serious subject — how to make money — using the Chicken as an example of a man who has parlayed a \$2 an hour comedy act into a \$100,000 a year.

"They're laughing, but they're learning, and that's what counts," Rutherford said.

Representatives of the companies who donated their time and money to the program say they are pleased with the

students ability and eagerness.

"It's been a great experience," said Mac Fletcher of Fletcher, Barnhardt and White, a Charlotte advertising agency. "It's been helpful for both sides. Its shown students a slice of life in business, the way things really are."

Rutherford already has planned to expand the program into a year-long course at Charlotte Latin School, where he is head of the Social Studies Department. Eighteen seniors at the school will be taking the course at the beginning of the school year.

"What we're teaching the kids is not economics as such, but real business situations," he said. "We're hoping to take the mystery out of business and free enterprise and replace it with understanding."

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## Tobacco Yield To Be Smaller

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — State agriculture officials are predicting that North Carolina's flue-cured tobacco harvest will be down 10 percent this year from 1981, while production of wheat and oats probably will be higher.

The North Carolina Crop and Livestock Reporting Service also said the peach crop was decimated by a spring freeze, which also reduced the apple crop by more than one-third.

North Carolina farmers are expected to produce the third consecutive record harvest of wheat this year, said Carl Cross, service statistician. He predicted a harvest of 17.3 million bushels — 8 percent above last year's. The yield per acre is expected to average 36 bushels, three bushels less than the 1981 average.

The increase in wheat is primarily due to an increase in acreage, he said. An increasing number of farmers, particularly in the coastal plains counties, are double-cropping wheat and soybeans.

"The wheat was seeded in the fall and the harvest is just about completed," Cross said. "The wet weather has delayed some soybean seeding and it's getting a little late now. But they were still planting quite a few soybeans last week."

Carl said the smaller tobacco crop of 683 million pounds is due to a decrease in acres planted and a lower yield per acre.

"The crop was larger than they (farmers) could market last year at good yields," he said. "That comes off in figuring allotments for this year. The quota was lowered by the tobacco program."

About 329,000 acres will be harvested this season, about 7 percent fewer than last year.

The average yield per acre is expected to be about 2,075 pounds — 68 pounds down from last year, Cross said.

"That's still a very good yield — better than average," he said.

Cross said the state's apple crop was "reduced severely by the spring freezes."

He said the crop would be only 135 million pounds, the lowest since 1966 and only 36 percent of last year's production.

Nationally, however, the apple crop is 11 percent better than last year's, he said.

"The peach crop was almost wiped out," he said, adding that the harvest is expected to total only 2 million pounds. The crop will be only 5 percent of last year's crop and the worst harvest since 1955, when freezing weather destroyed the state's entire crop, he said.

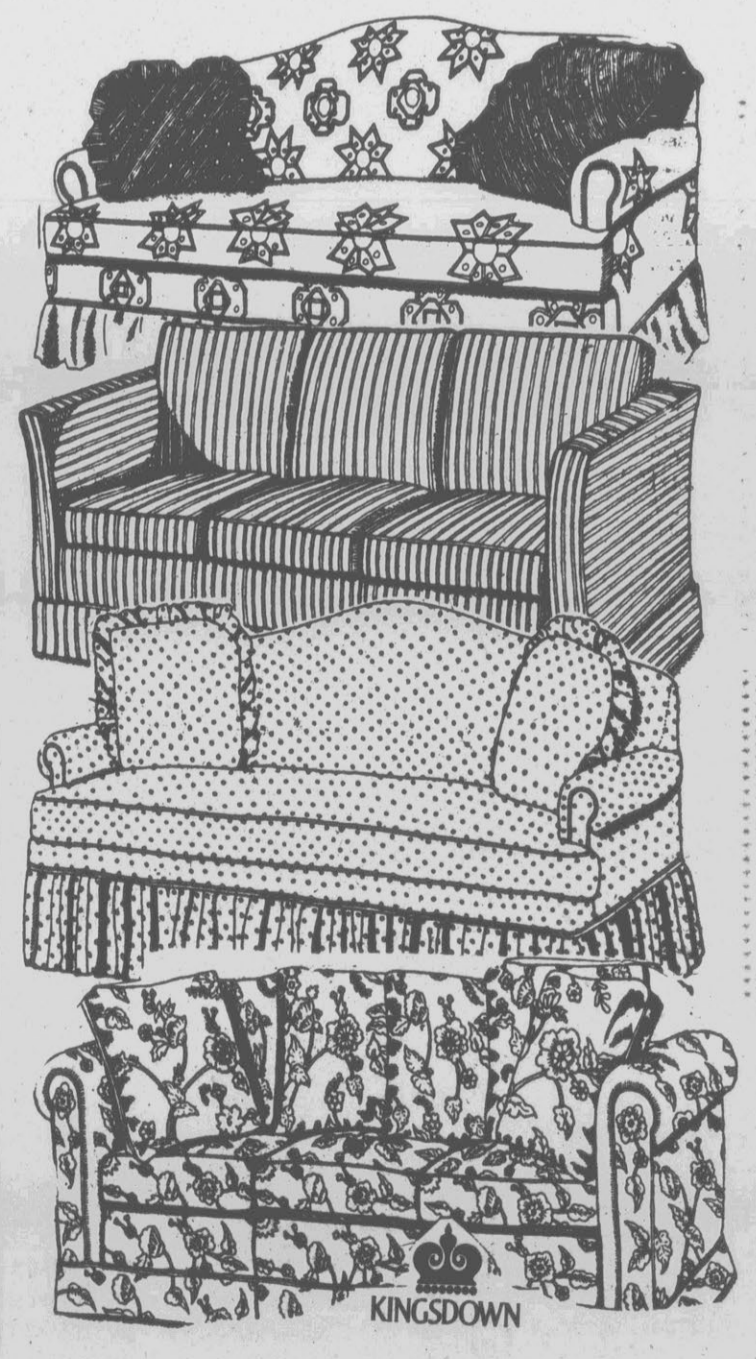

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# State High Court Supports Brown Lung Victims

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The State Supreme Court, in a ruling that may clear the way for other victims of brown lung disease, has reversed lower court decisions and ruled in favor of a former textile worker who became disabled in 1963.

North Carolina's highest court ruled unanimously Tuesday in the case of Dennie J. Taylor, 69, of Greensboro, that state law in effect before July 1, 1963, did allow workers' compensation awards to victims of byssinosis, or brown lung disease.

In making its decision Tuesday, the state's highest court reversed rulings by the state Industrial Commission and the state Court of Appeals in the case of Dennie J. Taylor, 69, a former mill worker from Greensboro.

Both had ruled that state law in effect from 1935 until mid-1963 excluded benefits for disability due to diseases of the lungs and other internal organs.

State workers' compensation law in effect until July 1 of that year allowed claims for a number of occupational disabilities including those involving "external contact surfaces."

A 1979 law passed by the General Assembly appeared to include pre-1963 cases under the law, but the Court of Appeals ruled on technical grounds that it did not have that effect. With its ruling, the Supreme Court said it did not need to look at the 1979 law.

The Industrial Commission ruled Taylor had permanent injury due to cotton dust exposure, but that because of the timing of his disability no compensation was allowed. A Court of Appeals panel agreed, ruling in a split decision that law in effect at the time of his disability excluded compensation for lung disease.

But the Supreme Court, in a decision written by Justice J. Phil Carlton, ruled that the lungs were "external contact surfaces" because the lungs are "in contact with the outer or external environment."

"We reverse and hold that compensation is allowable for disabling byssinosis contracted prior to 1 July 1963 under the definition of occupational disease contained in the Workers' Compensation Act in effect prior to that date," the court said.

William Stephenson, chairman of the Industrial Commission, said the decision would effect 50 to 75 former textile workers whose claims were being held by the commission pending a ruling in Taylor's case.

It could also spark new claims by other former textile workers who left the mills nearly two decades ago and had not filed claims because of previous legal interpretations, Stephenson and attorneys in the case said.

"I would say it's very significant," said Stephenson. "I can't tell you how many numbers we're dealing with — most of those who were disabled before July 1, 1963, are no longer with us. But it's something that will have an impact."

Taylor was employed by Cone Mills in its White Oak plant

from 1949 to Jan. 4, 1963, and had previously worked in other mills. Court records said that he had been totally disabled by byssinosis, the occupational disease of textile mills attributed to cotton dust, since January of 1963.

Taylor's case has been remanded to the Industrial

Commission for an award of money.

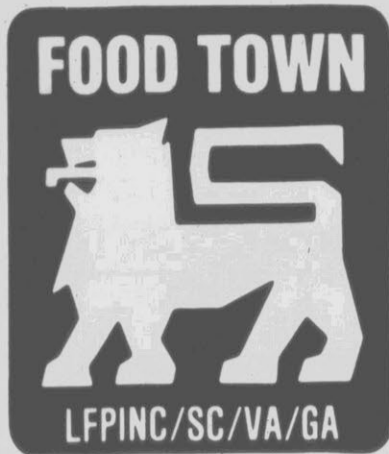
Michael K. Curtis, a Greensboro attorney who represented Taylor, said Taylor was eligible to receive a \$10,000 award plus compensation for his medical expenses.

J. Donald Cowan Jr., attorney for Liberty Mutual

Insurance Co., Cone Mills' insurance carrier, voiced disappointment at the decision.

"There are some people that sopped working in textile factories before July 1, 1963, that have not filed claims and this may bring them forth," he said.

## Shuttle Returns

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — The space shuttle Columbia, which has wound up each of three previous trips into orbit by being ferried piggyback across the country on a jumbo jet, may be making the last such flight.

Weather permitting, the spaceplane was to be flown today, strapped on the back of a 747 jumbo jet, to the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral, Fla., to be readied for its next flight, tentatively scheduled for Oct. 29.

Because of the experience

gained on July 4 in landing the shuttle on a concrete runway here for the first time, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration may allow the craft to land on the Cape's 15,000-foot strip on its next return from space. That would avoid the piggyback cross-country flights to return the shuttle to its launch pad.

The mated shuttle and jet were to stop for refueling at Dyess Air Force Base near Abilene, Texas, and complete the trip by evening, assuming everything went according to plan.

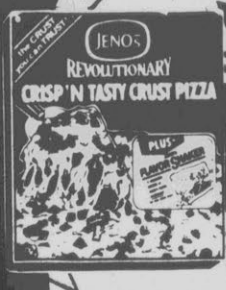

## Counties Plan Fight Against Infant Deaths

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Five North Carolina counties will share more than \$270,000 in grants to help fight high infant mortality rates.

The counties selected to share the money from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation at Duke University were Warren, Granville, Franklin, Person and Vance. They were chosen because their rates were the state's highest, according to Dr. Fred Jelovsek, an associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology and the project director.

The State Center for Health Statistics in Raleigh said the infant mortality rate includes deaths of children under the age of one year per 1,000 live births.

The five counties will receive \$270,360 for 1982-1983 to support a rural maternal health program started two years ago by Duke Medical Center. Each county will receive \$11,644 with the remainder for shared services.

"Although it's too early to tell if we've actually been able to reduce the infant mortality rate, we know the program has greatly improved the level of obstetrical care given in these counties," Jelovsek said.

"It's certainly making some impact," said Joe Lennon, Warren Co. Health Director, adding that it was too early to tell if the impact would be significant.

Among the reasons cited for infant deaths are low income and lack of education among expectant mothers. Jelovsek says the program helps overcome those problems by informing expectant mothers that they need to see doctors earlier.

"One of our major objectives has been to encourage communication between the medical center, where many of these mothers deliver, and the local communities," Jelovsek said. "These areas are predominantly low-income and agricultural."

"We've cut some of the barriers to good perinatal care, but others still exist," he said. "Some of these women are taught birth is such a natural phenomenon that there is no need to go to a physician until the end of pregnancy. And in some of the rural areas, home deliveries still occur."

"We've definitely noticed that more women are coming in for exams during their first trimester than before," he said. "That's one of our goals — to get women in to a clinic during their first trimester of pregnancy. We know for a fact that infant mortality rates decline when the mother seeks care during the first four months of pregnancy."

The perinatal death rate and complications at birth increase by about 50 percent when mothers wait until the fifth month of pregnancy to get care, he said.

The Center for Health Statistics said that statewide, the number of infant deaths decreased last year, from 1,219 in 1980 to 1,102 in 1981. On another comparison basis, the fall was from 14.5 per 1,000 live births to 13.2 per 1,000 live births. Both figures were below the 1977 totals of 1,335 deaths, or 15.8 per 1,000.

North Carolina's rate of 14.5 per 1,000 in 1980 ranked fifth-highest nationally behind Mississippi, 15.9; Louisiana and South Carolina, 15.4; and Alabama at 15.1.

Vance County's 66 is the highest number of deaths in the last five years as it registered a low of 10 in 1979 to a high of 16 in 1981. Last year's figure equaled a rate of 29.6 deaths per 1,000 live births.

The original 1980 Robert Wood Johnson Foundation grant provided funds for organizing perinatal nurse-staffed clinics in each of the counties, using existing health department facilities.

"We planned from the beginning to design a health care system that will exist on its own after 1984, when we anticipate funding will end," Jelovsek said.

## Winterville Board OKs Request For Block Funds

WINTERVILLE — Winterville aldermen gave approval Monday night for application of funds through the Community Block Development program.

Town Clerk Elwood Nobles reported the amount the town will apply for would be \$729,254. Nobles said the breakdown of the areas are as follows:

- Water and Sewer — \$38,564
- Street work — \$29,232
- Clearance — \$5,000
- Relocation — \$5,500
- Rehabilitation — \$561,000
- Administration — \$89,558

Nobles said under the street category, curb and gutter would be placed on some streets and paving in addition to curb and gutter on others. Those streets affected will be Myrtle, Hammond, Tyson, Grimes, and parts of North Railroad.

The complete target area will include the following: Chapman, Grimes, parts of Boyd and North Railroad.

Citizens during the public hearing questioned the board as to the specific target areas and the amount of work to be performed.

The grant will be officially filed by the town July 27.

In further business heard by the board, a resolution was passed dissolving Power Agency No. 2, in which Winterville was a member. The town will be getting power through Greenville Utilities in the future.

Approval was given by the board to allow the Pitt County computer center to print the town's 1982 tax bills. The bills are print and ready to mail at an approximate cost of \$400.

The board also authorized the town attorney to secure the deed from the rural fire association for the new maintenance building which the debt paid. The cost of the building which was funded by the association through a loan, cost approximately \$115,000.

In new business approved by the board, a new utility policy will go in effect July 25. The board approved the cutoff date to be the 25th of each month, except when the 25th falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or a town holiday.

Bills not paid by 10 a.m. on the 25th will be subject to a \$10 service charge, whether the power was cut off or not.

The board also gave approval for the town clerk to set up demonstrations and bids for a new street sweeper.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was mixed today as traders awaited the next move in interest rates.

The 10:30 a.m. Dow Jones average of 30 industrials stood at 824.20, unchanged from Tuesday's close.

Losers held a slight lead over gainers in the early tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Stock prices rallied late last week and Monday after interest rates in the credit markets took a sharp drop.

But those rates have since turned upward again, and by Tuesday the stock market advance ran out of steam.

Traders' attention today began to focus on the next Federal Reserve report on the money supply, which is expected to show a big increase. The report covers the first week of this month, when a 10 percent federal income tax cut and a 7.4 percent increase in Social Security benefits took effect.

Allied Stores led the active list in early trading, unchanged at 27 3/4. A 550,600-share block changed hands at 27 3/4.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average slipped .67 to 824.20.

Losers outnumbered gainers by 7 to 6 on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 66.17 million shares, against 74.69 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index dropped .06 to 62.90.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was off .96 at 248.33.

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# U.S. Pledges Neutrality In Iran-Iraq Fighting

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States pledged today to remain neutral in the fighting between Iran and Iraq, which Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker said poses "a real danger of a major conflict."

Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes, in announcing U.S. neutrality in the fighting, urged "an immediate end to hostilities and a negotiated settlement."

He said that the United States was "deeply concerned" about the conflict and that it supported the "independence and territorial integrity" of both Iran and Iraq.

"Our support for the security of friendly states in the region which might feel threatened by the conflict is well known and the United States is prepared to consult with these states on appropriate steps to support their security," Speakes said.

He would not spell out what "appropriate steps" could be taken, but he said the United States was consulting with allies in the region. He said that no additional military aid for friendly nations, beyond on-going programs of assistance, was contemplated.

Baker told reporters that Iran and Iraq "are arrayed in some strength," with Iran maintaining five divisions of troops and Iraq with seven divisions.

"It's a very real danger the war will spread," he said. "The indications are there is a real danger of a major conflict."

However, Baker said, "I don't think there's any real or immediate danger to the United States."

He said he had not been given any information indicating a Soviet role in the conflict.

The White House briefing was conducted by Robert C.

McFarlane, deputy assistant to President Reagan for national security affairs. It was held during a regularly scheduled meeting between Reagan and Republican congressional leaders.

Post Office 90 Years Old  
Ninety years ago today the community of Stokes got a post office.

That's what two of its residents, C.S. Whichard and J.B. Congleton, discovered when they wrote the Postal Service for information about three post offices in eastern Pitt County — Stokes, Whichard's and Pactolus.

"He (C.S. Whichard) was curious about the post offices around here, I guess, so he wrote them (U.S. Postal Service) and asked when they began," said Congleton, longtime resident of the Stokes community and grandson of W.G. Stokes, the town's namesake.

The oldest, they found, was

the now-defunct Whichard's, established in 1891 and discontinued in 1926. Next-oldest was Pactolus, begun in May of 1892.

Stokes, according to the Postal Service, was opened May 14, 1892, and Congleton said his grandmother, Addie Perkins Stokes (also Mrs. W.G. Stokes), was postmistress.

Whichard's information came from Rita L. Moreny, research administrator and historian for the Postal Service.

The Stokes Post Office serves 1,300 persons, according to Postmaster H.C. Edwards, who estimated that in 1892 it served even more. "I imagine there was even

more then (in 1892) because families were larger and then we had two rural routes," he noted.

The post office has no rural routes now but serves as a substitution for one Greenville route.

Edwards said the office planned no celebration of the anniversary. "It's just another normal day," he said.

Backpacking Trip Planned

He noted that Greenville Utilities expected to have power restored to the Willis Building, located at the corner of First and Reade streets, by midday today.

Allen stressed the teamwork among personnel from public works, GUC and police and fire departments who were on the scene "within 15 minutes" after being called. Officials evacuated about a block and a half of residents as a precautionary measure Tuesday morning in view of the gas line breakage, Allen reported.

In other sections of town, drainage capacities were exceeded during the heavy rains, according to Allen, but runoff took place shortly after the pipes overflowed, causing no major problems. He said "we had more water than any of our drainage systems could handle" but "they were taking water 15 minutes after the rains stopped."

An unidentified resident of University Towers apartments spent 15-20 minutes during the storm trapped in an elevator in the complex but was not injured, reported Fire-Rescue Chief Jenness Allen.

"She was in the elevator yesterday when the current went off," said Allen. "We opened the elevator and removed her and she was very concerned and upset, but not hurt."

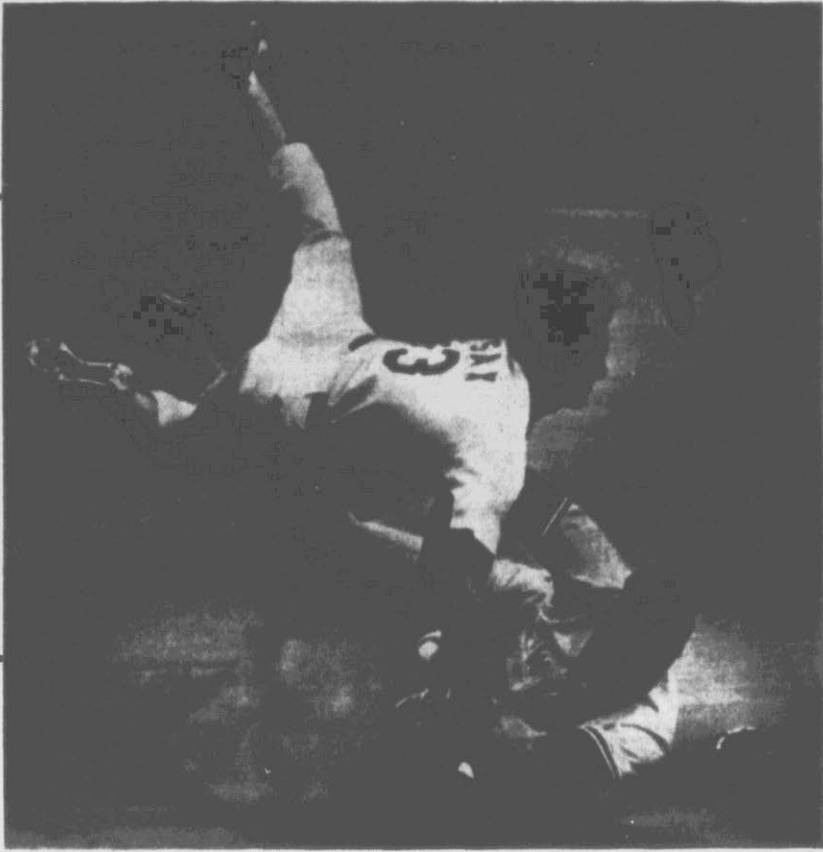

## Frustration Continues For AL As NL Wins Again

MONTREAL (AP) — For the last 11 years, the National League has found a way to win the All-Star Game. This year, the American League supplied the formula.

The frustrated Americans had pledged to win with speed on the bases, tight defense and tough relief pitching. That combination, spiced by Cincinnati shortstop Dave Concepcion's two-run homer, was just how the Nationals built their 4-1 triumph Tuesday night.

Two vital statistics spelled doom for the AL, which now trails this series 34-18 with one tie and has lost 19 of the last 20 games.

Manager Billy Martin's club struck out 10 times against NL pitchers Steve Rogers of Montreal, Steve Carlton of Philadelphia and Mario Soto of Cincinnati, and left 11 runners on base.

"We had enough opportunities," Martin said. "We just didn't capitalize."

Concepcion did, though, hitting a hanging slider from Boston's Dennis Eckersley into the left-field seats in the second inning to earn the game's Most Valuable Player trophy.

The AL took a 1-0 lead in the first against Rogers, scoring on hits by Oakland's Rickey Henderson, who had three singles, and George Brett of Kansas City, a wild pitch and a long sacrifice fly by California's Reggie Jackson.

"Reggie was a little under that ball or it could have been 3-0," Rogers said.

Boston's Eckersley mowed down the first five NL batters but was having some control problems. He walked Dale Murphy of Atlanta on four pitches, bringing up Concepcion.

"I felt I had lost a little," the Eckersley said. "I gave Concepcion a fastball and he fouled it back. Then I went to a slider and it was good-bye."

"I was looking for an off-speed pitch," Concepcion said. "I guess I got the head of the bat out on it."

In his last batting-practice swing, Concepcion had smashed a line drive into Olympic Stadium's lower left field seats. Eckersley's pitch wound up in almost the same spot.

"He yanked it," Eckersley said. "I was hoping it would

hook foul. You know it's a bad pitch when you throw it. You say to yourself, 'Break!'"

Concepcion, who has only one home run this season, had put the NL in front and Manager Tommy Lasorda of Los Angeles thought the timing was every bit as important as the runs.

"When you have two men out and nobody on base and then you get two runs, well, that's a big lift," said Lasorda, 3-0 as NL manager streak. "It came at a very opportune time."

An inning later, the NL was back for more. Pinch-hitter Ruppert Jones of San Diego led off with a triple that bounced off the base of the wall in right-center.

After Montreal's Tim Lincecum walked and stole second, Jones scored on Pete Rose's sacrifice fly, sliding across just ahead of Jackson's strong throw and tagging the plate with his hand as Chicago catcher Carlton Fisk lunged to make the tag.

That made it 3-1 and Carlton relieved Rogers for the NL. He struck out the side in the fourth, stranding two runners he had walked. In the fifth he surrendered a single to Henderson but then started a double play on Kansas City's Willie Wilson, as the NL erased two of baseball's fastest runners.

Soto relieved in the sixth inning and the AL trend continued — runners left on base and batters striking out. He permitted a leadoff single by

New York's Dave Winfield but mowed down the next three hitters, finishing the inning by striking out Boston's Carl Yastrzemski. But the Cincinnati right-hander saved his best show for the seventh.

The Nationals had increased their lead to 4-1 in the sixth on a double by Al Oliver and an RBI single by Gary Carter as the two Montreal teammates gave the hometown crowd of 59,057 — third largest in All-Star history — something to shout about.

Detroit's Lance Parrish opened the seventh with a double for the AL. Soto then struck out Kansas City's Frank White on a changeup. Henderson stroked his third single and promptly stole second. But Soto fanned Wilson and Texas' Buddy Bell.

"I threw three changeups to White," Soto said. "I started Wilson with a fastball and then went back to the change. Bell, I threw him three or four changeups straight."

"When I'm in trouble, I go back to my change. I'm a fastball, change-up pitcher. My change-up is my second best pitch and I have confidence in it."

The AL wasn't done quite yet. In the eighth, Fernando Valenzuela walked two batters and San Francisco's Greg Minton relieved. Parrish hit a slow chopper over the mound. St. Louis shortstop Ozzie Smith, who had replaced Concepcion, dashed in and made a

dazzling play to end the inning, stranding the ninth and 10th AL runners.

No. 11 came in the final inning when Henderson walked with one out. Lasorda went to his bullpen for the Dodgers' Steve Howe, who retired rookie Kent Hrbek of Minnesota. Then Tom Hume of Cincinnati came on to get Bell, ending the game.

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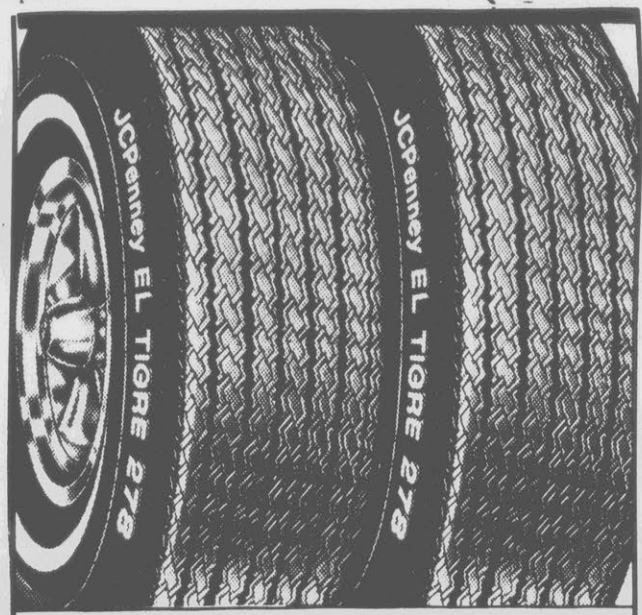

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# Oliver Says NL Has More Super Players

## AL Team Had Hopes, But Not The Hits

MONTREAL (AP) — The American League had plenty of hopes. A few more hits might have been more useful.

For the 11th straight time and the 19th in 20 games, the AL fell to the National League in baseball's All-Star Game Tuesday night.

"You think about the streak, but really, tonight, everybody wanted to win and we were intent on winning," California's Reggie Jackson, the American League's starting right fielder, said after the 4-1 setback. "You hope you'll win."

Could it be that the National League relies more on hard work than hope, he was asked.

"When you've lost 18 of 19, you start hoping," Jackson replied.

He kept the American League from being shut out for the first time since 1968 when he lifted a sacrifice fly in the first inning that scored Oakland's Rickey Henderson, who had singled. The AL had eight hits and plenty of other chances but capitalized on none of them.

"Their pitchers pitched well tonight when they had to," said American League Manager Billy Martin of Oakland. "We didn't get the hits at the right time."

Eleven American Leaguers were left on base, and in five innings runners were stranded in scoring position.

"We could have easily scored two or three runs in the first inning or at other times," said Chicago catcher Carlton Fisk. "I don't have any particular theory (about the streak). We had a chance to win this game."

The mood of the American League players was one of disappointment but not extreme sadness. Several players said they weren't embarrassed by the perpetuation of the streak, and Fisk said there was no defeatist attitude on the bench.

He said he didn't think that as the game went on with the American League still trailing, his team, anxious to snap the streak, began pressing.

"I never thought, 'Oh, no. Here it goes again,'" he said.

New York's Dave Winfield, who replaced Jackson in right field, agreed that the American Leaguers didn't feel extra pressure as the loss came closer.

"Maybe teams that lose a lot get down when they're losing, but these guys are all good players and are used to winning," he said. "One swing can change the game. So we were in it down to the wire."

He was at a loss to explain the NL's dominance of the midsummer classic.

"It's like a roll of the dice and it just happens to continually come up the same way," he said.

Kansas City's George Brett, who singled in his two at-bats as the American League's starting third baseman, couldn't shed any new light on the matter.

Manager Tommy Lasorda's National Leaguers beat the American League in the 53rd All-Star game 4-1 Tuesday night with Dave Concepcion of the Cincinnati Reds, the game's Most Valuable Player, supplying a two-run homer.

Despite their 11th straight victory and 19th in 20 games, the National Leaguers, now leading the series 34-18-1, were again being asked if they are that much better.

Oliver of the Montreal Expos, who played for the AL as a Texas Ranger, sat in front of his locker and tried to shed some light on the subject.

"The difference in both leagues is that while both have super players, the National has more of them," said Oliver, who leads the league in hitting and has knocked in 60 runs.

"I think maybe the personality of the National League players is more outgoing . . . There was no question about it, there was more enthusiasm on our squad."

"Tonight (Tuesday) every time somebody did something, there was nobody sitting down on our bench."

The victory also was a triumph for the once-mighty Cincinnati Reds, who are mired in last place this season in the NL West.

In addition to his homer in the second inning that gave the Nationals a lead they never lost, Concepcion was the middle man in a crucial double play and also reached base on an

error.

Reds' teammate Mario Soto, who pitched four innings Sunday, worked two scoreless innings, striking out four. And Cincinnati reliever Tom Hume retired Texas' Buddy Bell for the final out of the game.

Concepcion said winning the MVP award was one of the great moments of his 13-year career, which includes four World Series and six All-Star games.

He said of the home run, "He (American League starter Dennis Eckersley of Boston) tried to pitch the ball away, but the slider didn't break. It was up and in."

It was only the second home run of the season for Concepcion, one of the "survivors" at Cincinnati.

The Reds have traded or lost through free agency Pete Rose, George Foster, Dave Collins and Ken Griffey.

Soto and Hume shared the relief laurels with the Philadelphia Phillies' Steve Carlton, who worked two innings and struck out four. Carlton started the double play that bailed the Nationals out of the fifth inning.

"We got the American League's fastest runners," Concepcion said of the play on which Oakland's Rickey Henderson and Kansas City's Willie Wilson were retired.

Winning pitcher Steve Rogers of the Expos, who gave up his first runs in seven innings of All-Star pitching, said, "I really didn't have my good rhythm in the first inning. I was fortunate to get out of there, giving up just the one run."

## Legion Title Series To Begin Thursday

Pitt County, the No. 1 seed, and Wilson, the No. 2 seed, will square off Thursday night in the first game of the championship series of the Area I East American Legion tournament.

Game time at Harrington Field is 8 p.m. for the opener of the best-of-five series. Game No. 2 will be played in Wilson Friday night with the third game set for Harrington Saturday night.

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# NFL Talks

## Owners' Proposal To Extend Contract Being Considered By Players

NEW YORK (AP) — A request by National Football League club owners that the current contract be extended beyond Thursday's deadline was being considered by union leaders as the two sides met for a second day in a row.

Jack Donlan, executive director of the NFL Management Council and the club owners chief negotiator, said if there is no extension, no unsigned player will be allowed into training camp.

Donlan said at last count there were 99 rookies and 71 veterans who had not been signed. The Baltimore Colts

will be the first team to open camp on Friday, with the others to open next week.

Union negotiators made no immediate response to the extension request, and said it would be discussed at today's session.

Ed Garvey, the union's executive director, said as he understood management's position, unsigned veterans could agree to accept a team's latest offer, or 110 percent of last year's salary, even after the July 15 deadline and still attend training camp.

Rookies could also accept a team's last offer after July 15

and report to camp.

"But all the players have to have signed contracts before they start working out," Garvey said.

The team owners at Tuesday's session, the first in more than a month, presented a package of proposals for a new contract.

Management offered to liberalize the game's free agent system, increase both minimum salaries and postseason pay and provide improved insurance benefits.

Players representatives,

however, did not like the offer.

"It's totally insulting," said Gene Upshaw of the Oakland Raiders, president of the players association.

Dick Berthelsen, general counsel for the union, said the offer was "essentially the same as they gave us in Miami in February." He said that according to his side's calculations, the new offer would result "in the owners spending less on the players in 1982 than they did in 1981."

Donlan, meanwhile, saw the offer as a good place to start bargaining.

"We took the existing contract and built upon it," said Donlan, after presenting the package of proposals during the first of three planned days of negotiations. "We feel this proposal is a basis for a settlement, but the response from the union was very distressing."

The owners' pay proposal, a \$50,000 minimum salary for a fifth-year player and \$30,000 for a rookie, is far less than \$140,000 for fifth-year players and \$75,000 for rookies that the players want.

## Nicklaus, Watson On Mend For Open

TROON, Scotland (AP) — Jack Nicklaus and Tom Watson, on the list of the walking wounded earlier in the week, are on the mend and ready to hook up in another duel, this time in the 111th British Open golf championship.

The ancient event begins its 72-hole run Thursday on the Royal Troon Links, stretching some 7,067 yards through gorse and heather along the Firth of Clyde. The most international of all the world's major events, it has drawn a field of 150 players from 27 nations.

Aside from the host British, the largest contingent, 32, is from the United States, the nation that has dominated this event in the years since World War II.

Leading that deeply talented contingent are Nicklaus and Watson, who engaged in a final holes confrontation for the U.S. Open only four weeks ago, with Watson winning on a dramatic, chip-in birdie on the 71st hole.

And, it would be no surprise if, when the British Open comes down to its last few holes Sunday afternoon, it is still another Nicklaus-Watson matchup.

Recent history says it's very likely. Either Nicklaus or Watson has been first or second in six of the last seven British Opens and, in 1977, only a few miles down the coast, engaged in that incredible shootout at Turnberry, with Nicklaus playing the last two rounds 65-66 and losing to Watson's closing 65-65.

Britain's legal bookies agree it could happen again. On the eve of the championship, Watson was installed as the 4-1 favorite and Nicklaus listed as the second choice at 5-1.

Each is seeking a fourth British Open title, which would match the most by an American. And each comes into this one with his game in order, with confidence and enthusiasm high and despite a scare early in the week with no physical problems.

Watson skipped practice Sunday with the recurrence of a chronic problem with the little finger on his left hand. He couldn't grip the club.

"Everything's fine now," he said Wednesday, however. "I just took some aspirin and it cleared up. I've been able to play practice rounds the last two days. No trouble."

Nicklaus, too, had some physical problems.

"I had a touch of the flu over the weekend," he said Wednesday. "I'm over it now. Just a little weak, and that's clearing up, too." Watson, now the winner of six major professional titles, has taken three American events this season, is second on the year's money-winning list and is chasing a fifth Player of the Year title.

Nicklaus, 42, has collected a record 17 major professional titles, including four U.S. Opens, five PGA's, five Masters and three British Opens.

Seve Ballesteros of Spain represents the chief non-American threat. But the mercurial young Spaniard said he is having trouble with his swing and lacks confidence.

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## Quad Cities May Lose Hoch

COAL VALLEY, Ill. (AP) — The Quad Cities Open may lose Scott Hoch, the only one of pro golf's current top 20 money-winners entered in this \$200,000 tournament beginning Thursday.

Hoch, the 1980 Quad Cities champion, has been hampered by a mysterious chest injury. He was considering withdrawing because of it.

"I don't know how it happened. I've had it for the past week or so," said Hoch, rubbing his chest Wednesday. "I may have pulled a muscle."

Hoch was one of five former Quad Cities champions entered in this 10-year-old PGA Tour stop. The others who will compete are Roger Maltbie (1975), Mike Morley (1977), Victor Regalado (1978), D.A. Weibring (1979) and Dave Barr.

Barr, a Canadian, won last year's title in a five-way sudden death playoff involving Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner, Dan Hallderson and Regalado.

Barr parred the eighth extra hole to eliminate Blackburn, his last competition before his first American championship.

Even with only three of the top 40 money-winners — four if Hoch plays — the Quad Cities stop has a uniqueness about it this time.

All four of last week's tournament winners are competing for the first prize of \$36,000 over the par-70, 6,514-yard Oakwood Country Club layout.

Calvin Peete won the Greater Milwaukee Open, Miller Barber the U.S. Senior Open, Bob Byman the Scandinavian Open and Jim Thorpe the Canadian PGA.

Ironically, Thorpe beat Barr in three holes of sudden death for the Canadian crown.

## VMI Tailback Allen Hoping To Prove Doubters Wrong

RALEIGH (AP) — Virginia Military Institute tailback Floyd Allen, once spurned by Atlantic Coast Conference schools, says he's determined to play pro football.

"I am going to play pro football," said the 6-foot, 188-pound Allen, whom scouts consider too small for the National Football League.

"There is no doubt in my mind that I will make it. It

may be in the NFL, the Canadian Football League or the new United States Football League, but I will play professional football."

VMI coach Bob Thalman is also confident that Allen will succeed.

"If he gets a fair opportunity, Floyd's got the ability to get the job done," Thalman said. "He's a real durable player and he has excellent hands which would be an asset to him in the pros."

"But the biggest thing Floyd has going for him is that he is a winner," Thalman added.

Allen said he first plans to complete his degree in economics from VMI.

"Pro football is a goal for me, but it's not on the top of my list," said Allen, keeping himself in shape by working out at a local fitness center. "I feel that an education will be more beneficial to me in the long run than football will be."

Rejection is nothing new to Allen, since he was told by college recruiters that he was too small, too short and too slow. His worth improved, however, after a high school all-star football game in which he scored the game-winning touchdown on offense and intercepted three passes as a defensive back.

Allen said schools in the Atlantic Coast Conference began to show an interest in him following that game, but added that his mind was made up for VMI. He said he does not regret that decision.

"I'm sure I might have gotten more publicity at some other school, but I learned a lot about life at VMI," Allen said.

"Plus, I made a lot of business contacts there — contacts that I don't think I could have made at other schools — that will help me later in life."

Allen's 3,569 yards easily established him as the greatest Keydet rusher in the school's history. He also established school records for career rushing attempts (860), rushing touchdowns (27) and total touchdowns (29).

Perhaps Allen's most notable achievement was his selection as outstanding offensive player in the state of Virginia in 1979 and 1980, beating out Virginia Tech's Cyrus Lawrence and Richmond's Barry Redden.

Redden was a first-round draft pick in the NFL.

## Pirates Sign 6 Swimmers

First-year East Carolina swim coach Rick Kobe has signed six athletes in his initial recruiting class.

Kobe became head coach when Ray Scharf resigned after 15 years at the Pirate helm.

Highlighting Kobe's male signees is Dan Booth of Elkton, Md. Booth is a 6-1, 170-pound breaststroke specialist who also swims the individual medley events. Booth, Kobe said, is ECU's most talented multi-event swimmer in the history of the school.

Also joining the men's team are Chris Pittelli of Cranbury, N.J., and Eric Sebnick of Lake City, S.C.

Pittelli, a 6-0, 155-pounder, will be the top freshman sprinter and has the potential to serve on all three relays.

Sebnick is a transfer from Appalachian State and is the reigning Southern Conference champ in the 100-yard breaststroke.

Michele Joyner, a San Antonio native, heads the three women recruits. Joyner has six personal bests that are better than existing ECU varsity records and, Kobe insists, Joyner is a "sure bet to score at the Nationals."

Sandra Schneider, a transfer from Daytona Beach Community College, and Joanne McCulley of Adphia, Md., round out the list of recruits.

Schneider is a junior college all-America whose team won the national junior college tournament last year. She has six times under existing varsity records in the freestyle and backstroke events.

McCulley, a breastroker, holds two personal bests better than curren ECU marks.

## Rogers Admits Using Cocaine

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — George Rogers, the New Orleans Saints' No. 1 draft choice and the National Football League's Rookie of the Year, admits he has used cocaine but won't do it again.

"I made a mistake and it will never happen again," Rogers told a news conference Tuesday in his first public response to reports of his drug use.

"I am sorry for what I did," he said. "I made a mistake, and I have to live up to that."

Rogers, who led the NFL in rushing and set a rookie record with 1,674 yards for the Saints last season, said he underwent testing and treatment for drug abuse last week at a Florida clinic.

His attorney Ed Holler and Saints Coach Bum Phillips also appeared at the news conference, but neither would answer any questions regarding the cocaine scandal surrounding the team and the NFL.

Phillips said it was probably the most important news conference he had ever attended.

"I've been to a whole lot of press conferences in my years in sports — some bad, some good," he said. "I've never been to one as important as I think this one is."

"I think it's important for this football team, this town, the NFL."

"But it's more important for a bunch of individuals who have made a mistake — but not a mistake that can't be rectified."

Holler described Rogers' involvement with the drug as "a brief recreational use of cocaine."

Published reports last month quoted unnamed sources as saying Rogers told a federal grand jury in New Orleans he spent \$10,000 on cocaine last season.

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# Biologists Offer Plan To Halt Condor's Slide To Extinction

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An ambitious plan to stem the California condor's rapid slide toward extinction faces another round of controversy as federal biologists seek permission to take chicks and eggs from the huge birds' lofty nests.

The request to the California Fish and Game Commission comes after four months of trapping failed to produce a single condor for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's proposed captive breeding program.

"It appears California condors may be rather difficult to trap and we are concerned we can't get enough birds through trapping to get a captive flock going fast enough," said biologist Randy Perry of the federal agency's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Laurel, Md., head of the service's endangered species field program.

"We are asking to have the option of taking eggs and-or nestlings in order to initiate the captive flock" to produce birds for returning to the wild, Perry said in a telephone interview Monday.

Fewer than 30 of the condors — wide-ranging vultures that soar over the central and southern California mountains on wings that can span nine feet — still survive of the species that once ruled the Western skies from Canada to Mexico. All sides agree extinction is an imminent threat and a mistake could seal the condors' fate. The emotional debate is over strategy.

"There are risks in taking birds from the wild into captivity," Perry said. "But you have to weigh those risks, which we feel are relatively small and can be controlled, against the greater risk of doing nothing and watching the species slowly slip into extinction."

David Phillips, wildlife programs coordinator for Friends of the Earth, points to the death of a condor chick in June 1980, as it was being weighed and measured by a member of the condor recovery team.

He said the latest request "is an absolutely unwarranted risk to condors. The biologists have hurt more than helped ... in a risky effort to try to pull them out of the wild and raise them in zoos."

Phillips also said the environmental group that leads opposition to the plan does "not propose doing nothing (although) some people have misconstrued our position to say we think the condor should die with dignity. We think we should try to protect the habitat and give our best shot at propagating condors in the wild (rather) than go with this high-risk, high-tech gamble on a zoo population."

The decades-long recovery program envisions raising condors at the Los Angeles and San Diego zoos and monitoring radio-tagged birds to study their habits in hopes of discovering why the population loses an estimated two adult birds a year. The National Audubon Society is working with the Fish and Wildlife Service on the project.

Perry said the new proposal, which the state commission is to consider at its August meeting, would permit the capture of up to one adolescent or adult bird, two nestlings and three eggs.

Permission to capture three free-flying but non-breeding birds and to trap and tag two others with radio transmitters came only after a stormy public hearing last year followed by lengthy negotiations and compromise between state and federal wildlife officials.

Captured chicks "would only be handled to the extent that

they'd be put into a suitable container for transport to one of the zoos," Perry said. He contends experience with a closely related species, the Andean condor, shows chicks survive well in captivity.

Taking eggs and nestlings would "penalize the wild flock" less than removing young adults, he said.

Condors normally lay only one softball-sized egg every two years. With many birds, when a breeding pair loses an egg it often lays another, a process biologists call double-clutching. This past year two wild condors replaced an egg that had been destroyed.

Double-clutching, the argument goes, would allow at least one egg for hatching in an incubator and another for the parents to handle, doubling the pair's output.

# Bechtel Group Has Extensive Foreign Activity

Dealing with foreign governments is an everyday enterprise for the Bechtel Group Inc., the secrecy-shrouded corporate complex that may be the world's largest construction firm.

Whether building a new city in Saudi Arabia, a half-billion-dollar resort in Malaysia or a nuclear power plant in Taiwan, Bechtel pursues a "foreign policy" of its own, a policy centered on profits, not on national interests.

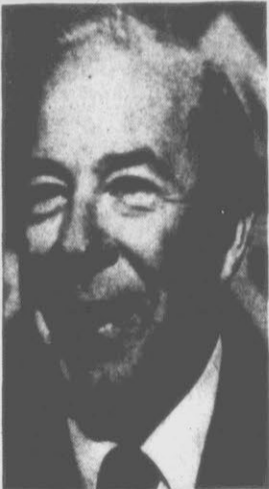
Profits and foreign policy create a volatile mixture for all multinational corporations. The nomination of George Shultz, president of Bechtel, as Ronald Reagan's secretary of state raises questions about Bechtel's operations around the world and Bechtel's effect on future U.S. policies.

But Bechtel officials don't see the Shultz nomination as having a major impact on the company's role.

"I don't think Bechtel will have any more influence than in the past," Harvey Brush, the company's executive vice president, said in an interview last week.

Many questions at today's Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on the Shultz nomination will focus on Bechtel's long and profitable relationship with Saudi Arabia and other OPEC members. In Saudi Arabia, Bechtel is now building a \$3 billion airport at Riyadh and a whole new city at Jubail that could cost as much as \$20 billion.

Its Middle East links have gotten Bechtel entangled twice with U.S. policy and politics.

Last year, the then-manager of Bechtel's Washington office sent a letter to members of Congress advocating the sale of AWACS, advanced radar planes, to Saudi Arabia.

Recently, Bechtel's effort to sidestep U.S. law prohibiting compliance with the Arab-backed boycott of companies doing business with Israel was set back by the U.S. Supreme Court. The court refused to free the company from a consent decree barring it from taking part in the boycott.

Partly at Shultz' urging, Bechtel has also attempted to create more favorable attitudes toward its clients among the American public. It has underwritten at least one film, a book and a traveling cultural exhibit, all of which portray Arabs and the Saudis in particular in a favorable light.

With Shultz at State and former Bechtel executive Caspar Weinberger at the Defense Department, critics have asked whether Bechtel's views will sway the course of American foreign policy on Israel and the Arab countries.

The government's Mideast policy is only one area that affects Bechtel. Others include:

—U.S. policy on nuclear proliferation. Bechtel helped build nearly half of the nuclear power plants in the United States. It would like to build more around the world, but U.S. policy has put a damper on such efforts. Bechtel has said it is pushing for changes in that policy.

—The area of trade sanctions as a foreign policy weapon. Shultz has spoken out in the past against the use of trade sanctions, which could limit the company's foreign sales.

Some of Bechtel's public problems arise from its immense size, involvement in dozens of countries around the world and its penchant for secrecy.

Bechtel reported 1981 revenues of \$11.4 billion, which would make it the 26th largest industrial company on the "Fortune 500" list if it were included. One trade magazine ranked it as the largest construction firm in the world in 1981. But Bechtel is privately held, with all the stock owned by 58 people, officers or directors of the company. It does not report its profits, although one published estimate put the 1981 figure at \$150 million.

Now the company has 113 major projects — each worth more than \$50 million — under way in 21 countries. Bechtel, with a current workforce of 119,000, has built major projects in more than 100 countries. It played a major role in building the Hoover Dam, the Alaska pipeline, the San Francisco and Washington subways and the San Francisco Bay Bridge.

Bechtel often works directly for foreign governments, another potential source of problems.

"Outside the United States, a good bit of what we call industry is government-owned. So the governments become our clients," said Brush, now the No. 2 Bechtel executive, directly under Stephen D. Bechtel Jr., whose grandfather founded the company in 1898.

With the slowdown of the nuclear power industry in this country, about half of Bechtel's business now comes from outside the United States, up from only about 6 percent in 1970.

Bechtel executives like to say their company is a service company, providing the people and services needed by their clients, including the foreign governments.

"I don't think you can say we have a foreign policy in the same way as a government does," Brush said. "We look for business in any area of the world. And when you get business, you have to be a good neighbor."

# Named To Panel

## Couple Charged In Attempted Reagan Fraud

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An elderly, well-dressed couple who authorities say passed themselves off as millionaire prospective buyers of Ronald Reagan's home have been freed under \$1,000 bail each on charges of scheming to defraud the president and first lady.

Ann Yarbrough, 74, and her husband, James, 60, are to be arraigned Friday. They have refused to comment, but their attorney complained the case is "being made into a circus because the president's name is involved."

Authorities, who filed charges against the pair Monday, said the Yarbroughs were such convincing customers that Nancy Reagan had the swimming pool drained at the Reagans' Pacific Palisades home so the prospective buyers could inspect it.

If the case comes to trial, Mrs. Reagan is expected to testify for the prosecution.

Deputy District Attorney Al Botello said the Reagans lost no money to the Yarbroughs. However, he said seven others allegedly were bilked out of \$123,000 in transactions not directly related to the home sale.

"All the victims have one thing in common. They were all lenders of money to the defendants, based on the fact that Ann Yarbrough said she was a wealthy heiress that would be getting money from the estate in the immediate future," Botello said.

Outside court, Botello outlined the alleged real estate scheme in which the Yarbroughs persuaded the Reagans as well as several other people to lend them money Botello said they never intended to repay.

According to Botello, the Yarbroughs were to make a \$400,000 payment for the home, with the Reagans loaning them the balance — "approximately \$1 million." The Yarbroughs opened an escrow account to purchase the house, he said.

The Reagan loan was never made. The Yarbroughs made their \$1.4 million offer last July. They put up a check for \$50,000 on Aug. 14, 1981. A short time later, authorities said, they substituted a check for \$400,000, with the promise that funds to back it would be available by Aug. 19 or Aug. 20. The deal was canceled Sept. 25 when the check had not cleared.

Authorities speculated that the Yarbroughs never expected the deal to go through on the house, but wanted to use papers related to the home sale to help convince others to loan them money based on the claims of an impending inheritance.

The couple was charged Monday with one count of attempted grand theft from the Reagans, one count of conspiracy and seven counts of grand theft from the other victims.

Defense attorney Steven Rheuban told Municipal Judge Samuel Mayerson the couple had lived in the Los Angeles area for 30 years and had children and grandchildren here. He said Yarbrough is on disability and Mrs. Yarbrough is unemployed. They live in a rented home in the San Fernando Valley.

"Ann Yarbrough and her husband, James, were able to deceive the Reagans' agent (attorney Roy Miller) that they were serious buyers," said a confidential memorandum by Botello that was obtained by the Los Angeles Times and the Los Angeles Herald Examiner.

"They accomplished this by displaying to Mr. Miller a false financial statement indicating Ann was worth in excess of \$13 million," Botello said.

The memorandum lists victims including Chatsworth real estate agent Mark Lebens, Northridge dentist John Ellison, former Yarbrough housekeeper Ann Ulrich and a woman who used to drive Mrs. Yarbrough's car, Thomasina Blair.

Lebens said he lost \$47,000, and the other losses ranged from \$4,000 in bad checks to \$25,000, the memo said.

The Reagans raised their children in the custom-built home before Reagan became governor of California and went to Sacramento. They returned after his term in office ended.

After Reagan's election as president, security problems made the Pacific Palisades home inconvenient and he chose his remote Santa Barbara Ranch as the Western White House. The larger family home was placed on the market for \$1.9 million, and was finally bought by Los Angeles attorney Steven Halpern.

## Man Charged In Burning

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Authorities arrested a Charlotte man early today and charged him with murder in the death of a woman whose burning body was found Sunday behind a Mecklenburg County service station.

Investigators said James Lee Williams, 27, was arrested in a Charlotte lounge.

Police have identified the dead woman as Evelyn Griggs Rice, 41 of Charlotte. They have declined to give a possible motive for the murder.

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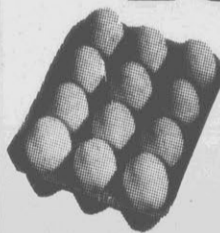

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# National Cancer Institute Backs Duke Program

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — A four-drug treatment may double the survival rate in extreme cases of head and neck cancer, which kills an estimated 900 people a year in North Carolina alone, researchers at Duke University Medical Center say.

The National Cancer Institute recently allocated \$750,000 for five more years of tests for the treatment, said Dr. Andrew T. Huang, who directed the original six-year study.

"NCI earlier had funded a study similar to ours at another university," Huang said. "But when they saw our results they extended their open arms to us."

Head and neck cancers — combining tumors of the voice box, mouth, tongue, tonsils and nose — are related in appearance, prognosis and their association with heavy tobacco use, Huang said.

Head and neck cancers account for 8 percent of U.S. cancer deaths, or about 25,000 deaths annually, according to the American Cancer Society. Huang said the cancers are more prevalent in North Carolina than the national average, a fact he attributed to the impact of tobacco.

Scientists used the new drug treatment on patients who had already undergone surgery and radiation therapy and who were classified as "stage three or four" in the severity of their illnesses.

Unlike stages one and two, in which tumors are localized at the original site of the cancer, tumors in later stages extend to the lymphatic system, Huang said.

"Standard treatment for head and neck cancer in stages three and four has a prognosis, using five-year survival, as low as 25 percent," he said. "Most are dead in two years."

Patients in the study were given the four-drug followup every six weeks for 36 weeks, with a subsequent increase in the survival rate.

"If you look at the group of patients with extra treatment after surgery and radiation, there was a doubling of survival to about 92 percent," Huang said.

Huang, who worked with Dr. T. Boyce Cole of the department of otolaryngology and radiation therapist Arnold M. Herskovic, attributed the unusual success rate to the conservative nature of the treatment.

"Our treatment is very modest," he said. "While most other studies would use a fairly impressive dose of drugs, we felt a more modest treatment program is better indicated. We are concerned about wiping out the patient's basic defense mechanisms."

Combining drugs allowed scientists to reduce the dose of each, slowing the development of resistance that often accompanies single drug regimens, Huang said. Lower doses also reduce the toxic effect on healthy tissues.

"The dosages are not excessive. Our patients are really not knocked out by the treatment," he said.

"In addition, the treatment is short. Most (treatments of this kind) take a year or two. Ours is 36 weeks."

Huang said similar treatments have improved the survival rate in extreme cases of breast and bone cancer, but not to the same extent as head and neck cancers.

## Phone Bills Cut

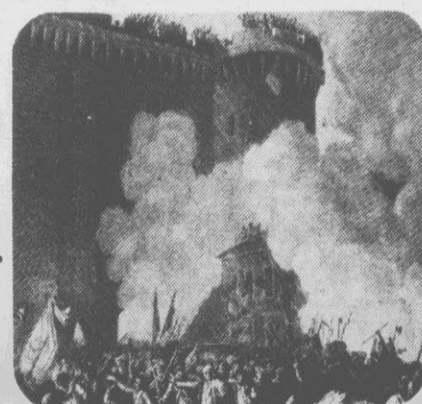
OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — Washington State officials expect to save up to \$5 million a year on long-distance telephone calls with the installation of a new computerized channel-communication program, says a management information systems publication.

According to MIS Week — the state will cut its annual \$12 million bill with a

statewide network of trunk and tie-in lines that will interconnect switching centers at Olympia, Spokane, Seattle and Vancouver, with government facilities across the state.

Some 90,000 employees in about 250 government agencies at state, county and local levels will convert to the state-owned management system, which replaces a leased common channel.

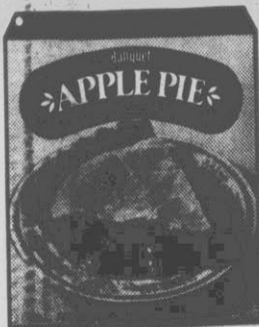

## Ship's Safe Still Closed

NEW YORK (AP) — It's been a year since Peter Gimbel set out to probe the wreck of the Andrea Doria, but his film documentary on the expedition is still in the cutting room and the luxury liner's safe sits unopened in a tank at the New York Aquarium.

Gimbel, a department store heir who has spent most of his adult life going on adventures and making films about them, said Monday his documentary should be finished in mid-August and broadcast this fall.

Whoever buys the rights to the 90-minute documentary also gets to televise at its conclusion the opening of the Bank of Rome safe Gimbel retrieved from the wreck.

Last July, Gimbel observed the 25th anniversary of the Doria's collision with the Swedish liner Stockholm by leading a diving expedition to the wreck on the continental shelf south of Nantucket. The accident occurred on July 25, 1956, killing 51 people.

The networks, however, did not stampede to Gimbel's door, and none currently admits to having any interest in his film.

"Sure, it's a problem," Gimbel said. "It's always a problem getting prime time."

The film will be ready after the sound and music tracks are mixed during the week of Aug. 9, said Elga Andersen, Gimbel's wife and co-leader of the expedition.

Recordings of the divers' voices had to be passed through a "harmonizer," because the helium in their air tanks "made them sound like Donald Duck," explained Ms. Andersen.

"The theme is 30 men and one woman set out on this adventure," she said. "It has the excitement of fiction... it's not the usual narrative documentary."

Gimbel and Ms. Andersen originally hoped to have the film broadcast in early 1982. But none of the networks expressed immediate interest. "They had no original input. We were like an alien coming to them," she said.

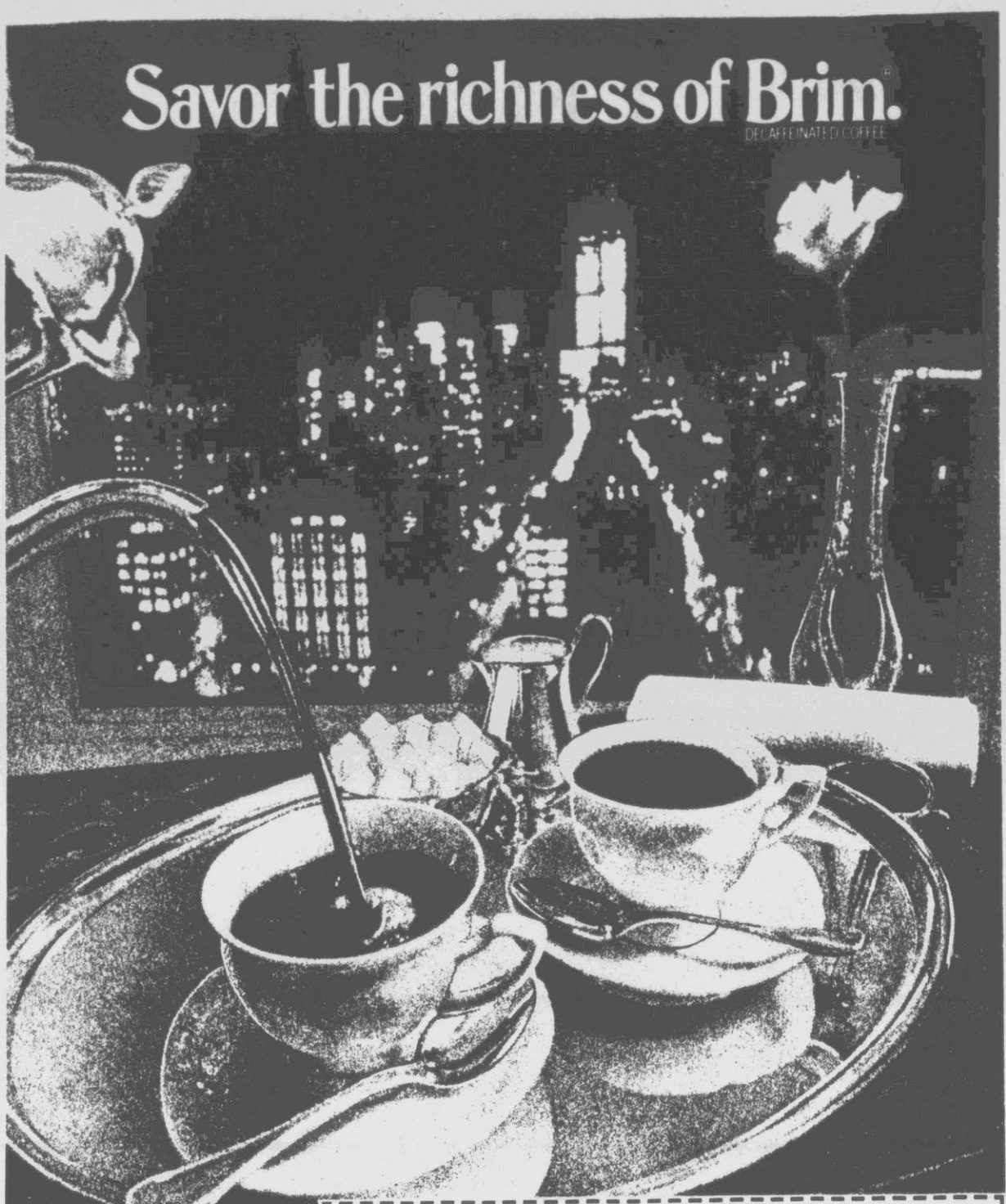
But, "we can't feel pressured or uptight," Gimbel said. "We feel it (the film) is pretty strong stuff."

Gimbel said he had not changed his vow not to return to the Doria's wreck. "No," he said with a laugh, "we sure ain't goin' back."

The safe, meanwhile, is in the tank of near-freezing water to which it was moved last fall from a shark tank with warmer water.

Although some reports have set the value of the safe's contents at \$1 million, no one knows for sure what's inside.



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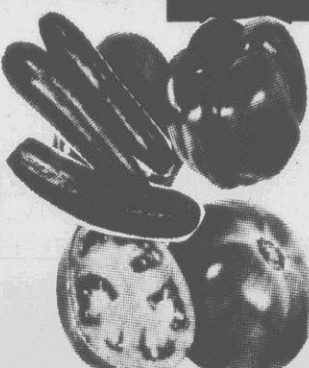

# 'Shenandoah' Offers Good Reflections On Human Conditions

## A Reflector Review

The question of whether or not a strong man's determined neutrality in a time of stress ultimately costs more in personal and collective suffering than blind conformance to public emotions is a basic theme in "Shenandoah," the dramatic musical currently playing at McGinnis Theater.

"Shenandoah" has in satisfying proportions what good musicals and rewarding dramas must have, excellent music, and a story that truly reflects a segment of the human condition.

The joy of being alive and exulting in life, old-fashioned virtues of hard work and

personal independence, the sound of music, the inescapable hand of fate in our lives, these are all encompassed in the multilayered sweep of "Shenandoah."

Virginia farmer Charlie Anderson is determined that his family shall not become embroiled in the suffering, the wanton waste of life, the folly of war and the aftermath of bitterness as the Civil War encroaches all about him. Anderson's determination not to sacrifice any of his family of nine or his hard earned prosperity is embodied early in the play in "I've Heard It All Before."

Fate, however, has the upper hand, and even a man

of Anderson's granite character cannot endure continued assaults on his high standards of personal integrity. In "Shenandoah" we witness the fall from grace of Charlie Anderson. It is a painful process, one that shocks his surviving sons as it pains us watching it happen.

Veteran actor Casper Roos gives a sterling performance in repeating his Broadway role. In turn he is playful, compassionate, tender, angry and remorseful. (Except for a few brief moments, for Roos and in one or two instances for other cast members, every sung or spoken word comes across

with the clarity of a bell ringing in mountain air).

Roos has consistently strong support from the large cast — his lovely womenfolk, daughter Jenny and daughter-in-law Anne (Babs Winn and Patricia Preston), his five grown sons, James (Mitch Nathan), Jacob (Michael W. Hill), Nathan (Rodger Baldwin), John (Chris Phillips), Henry (John Gibson), the younger son, Robert (the boy) (Aaron Neiman), are all solid people, stamped with the heritage of inner strength received from their father.

Music and dance share an equal place in the sun with dramatic developments in

"Shenandoah." Most mountain people love music and dance. "Shenandoah" is blessed with generous portions of both — beautifully sung and invigoratingly danced. "Next to Lovin' (I Like Fightin')" echoes a kinship with "Jubilant T. Cornpone." Mavis Ray's delectable choreography comes into play in the deft combination of athleticism and lyricism in all the dances.

"Violets and Silverbells," is a romantic melody as beautiful as its poetic title, enchantingly sung by Jenny and her soldier beau becomes husband Sam (Paul Myers). "Papa's Gonna Make It Alright" is

"Shenandoah's" lullaby of promises, and the play's hymn, "Pass The Cross To Me" rings true as a 19th century church song.

Charlie Anderson suffers the agony of self-doubt in his graveside conversations with his beloved wife Martha, baring his soul to her in the song "Meditation."

Rodney Freeze leads the chorus of battered soldiers in singing the poignant "The Only Home I Know," and Gabriel (Eric Jennings), the young Negro neighboring slave and playmate to Boy Anderson, is simply marvelous in his song and dance number "Freedom" with James Anderson's wife

Anne.

All down the line, members of the cast in lesser roles add full measure in their performances.

Edgar Loessin's direction, Gregory Buch's and David Downing's stunning sets and lights, Joe Distefano's musical direction, and the array of military uniforms and period costumes all enrich the outstanding work of the cast.

"Shenandoah" is a rarity in today's entertainment world, a play of utmost integrity that not once falls back on "in" vulgarity. "Shenandoah" is worthy of admiration, plus being a triumph in entertainment.

## Study Derides TV Programs For Children

WASHINGTON (AP) — Commercial television programming designed for children provides youngsters with a "distorted mirror" because characters are often portrayed in sexual and racial stereotypes, a new study says.

The study was commissioned by the public interest group Action for Children's Television.

The research by Dr. F.

Earle Barcus of Boston University concludes that family life is portrayed on children's programs "in a traditional and stereotyped manner," with the father being "rather stern, dominant and often engaged in work and adventure activities," and the mother "engaged in household and daily living activities."

Spokesmen for the major commercial networks — ABC, CBS and NBC — all declined comment Tuesday after pointing out that no network executive had yet seen the study.

The Barcus research, released by ACT Tuesday, was funded by the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie Corp. of New York. It is based on a review of 38 hours worth of children's shows aired in the Boston area during January 1981.

Of the 1,145 TV characters that appeared during those 38 hours, Barcus reported only 42 were black and 47 belonged to other minority groups. Females were somewhat better represented, but only 16 percent of all dramatic heroes or major dramatic characters were women.

Blacks, when they did appear, were more often cast as heroes than villains. But blacks and other minorities were more frequently unemployed on television than were white characters, the study found.

Female characters, when attempting to achieve specific goals, "relied on personal charm and dependence on others to a much greater extent that did males who used violence, trickery or deceit and persuasion."

The programming "provides a distorted mirror with outdated models for young children," the study said.

To the question of why such characterizations matter, Barcus wrote: "Simply stated, the rationale for this study is based on the knowledge that children learn from their environment. Thus, if as was found in these studies, 75 percent of the 1,145 characters appearing in the sample were male, there is an implicit message for the child viewer that males are more often recognized, are more visible, are more important than females.

"There is also no doubt that recognition by television legitimizes the status of a particular individual or group in society," he continued. "In this sense, minorities have not yet arrived; they are still waiting for recognition by television. Commercial children's television can only be seen as a major barrier in the battle for recognition of and respect for ethnic groups in this country."

## CBS Holds No. 1

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS, with five of the week's 10 top-rated shows, including "M-A-S-H" in first place, won the networks' ratings race for the third straight week, according to figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co.

It was also the third consecutive week for "M-A-S-H" as the No. 1 show in prime-time, although the audience for the CBS comedy was the lowest for any winning program in the last year.

CBS' rating for the week ending July 11 was 12.6 to 11.9 for ABC and 10.8 for NBC. The networks say that means in an average minute of prime time during the week, 12.6 percent of the country's homes with TV were watching CBS.

The rating for "M-A-S-H" was 19.3. Nielsen says that means in an average minute of the program, 19.3 percent

of the nation's television-equipped homes with were tuned to CBS.

Audience levels normally decline during the summer, but "M-A-S-H" was the first of the No. 1 shows in the weekly ratings to register less than 20 percent of the potential viewers.

Most shows broadcast during the week were reruns. A theatrical film in its television debut — "Rich Kids" on ABC — was the highest highest rated of the week's new programs, No. 29.

A new edition of "Walter Cronkite's Universe" on CBS finished 44th, with an original episode of "Police Squad" on ABC tied for 48th place and a new installment of "Cassie and Company" on NBC was 50th.

NBC had three of the week's five lowest-rated shows. A "CBS Reports"

news special, "A Time to Die," finished 66th, followed by "Code Red" on ABC and the three NBC shows, "Chicago Story," "Father Murphy" and "Lewis and Clark."

Here are the week's 10 highest-rated programs:

"M-A-S-H," with a rating of 19.3 representing 15.8 million homes and "60 Minutes," 18.6 or 15.2 million, both CBS; "Fantasy Island," 18.5 or 15.1 million, ABC; "Alice" and "The Jeffersons," both CBS, and "Hart to Hart," ABC, all 18 or 14.7 million; "Too Close for Comfort," 17.5 or 14.3 million, ABC; "Hill Street Blues," 17.4 or 14.2 million, NBC; "Three's Company," 17 or 13.9 million, ABC, and "House Calls," 16.9 or 13.8 million, CBS.

## Singer Indicted On Drug Charge

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Singer George Jones, the Country Music Association's male vocalist of the year in 1981, has been indicted on a cocaine possession charge.

The Hinds County grand jury action was made public this week and stems from a March 29 arrest in which the Mississippi Highway Patrol stopped the singer's 1982 Lincoln Continental for speeding.

The driver, Nancy Sepulvado, 33, of Muscle Shoals, Ala., was charged with speeding.

Jones, 50, was arrested the next day near Aberdeen, Miss., after a one-car accident. In that case, Jones pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated, reckless

driving, possession of alcohol in a dry county and reckless driving. He was fined \$737.50.

Jones also faces a hearing today in Brentwood, Tenn., on drunken driving charges stemming from a May arrest.

Jones, the ex-husband of singer Tammy Wynette, has been treated twice for alcoholism at a Birmingham, Ala., hospital since 1980.

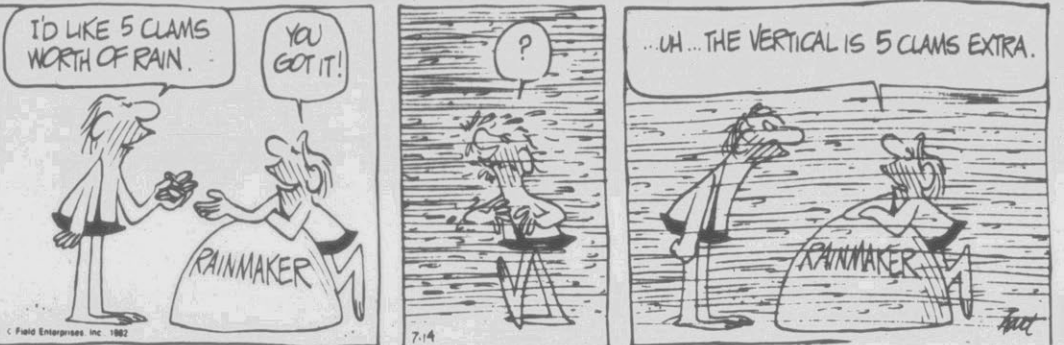

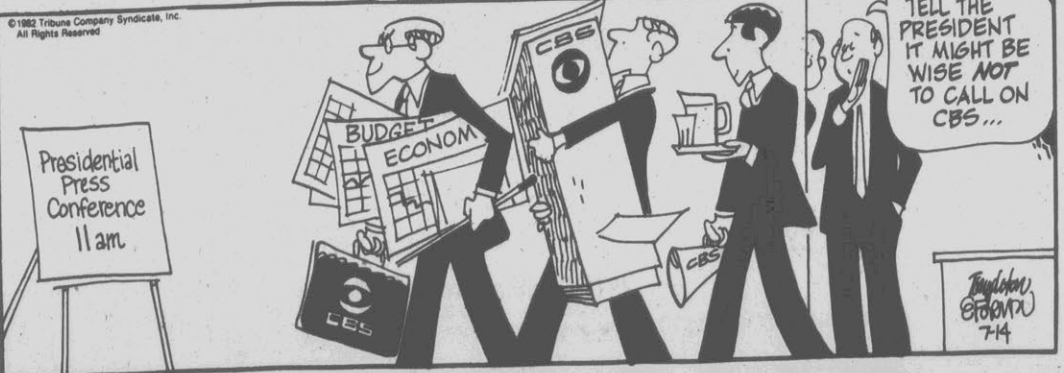

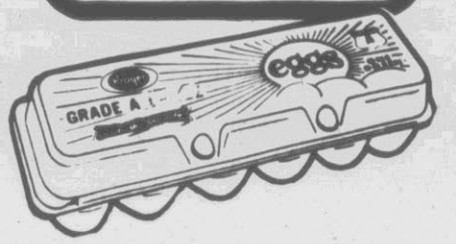

## Mexican Recession May Step Up Aliens

MEXICO CITY (AP) — One of Mexico's worst recessions since World War II will probably increase the flow of Mexicans going illegally to the United States in search of jobs and a better life, American officials here predict.

The economic slump, which started last year with a sharp fall in world oil prices, may get worse. Already, President-elect Miguel de la Madrid says he plans tough austerity measures to restore the nation's economic health when he takes office Dec. 1.

De la Madrid aims to cut government spending, reduce inflation — now running at 60 percent a year — and shrink a foreign debt that is expected to reach \$80 billion by the end of 1982.

Further complicating the country's economic health was the 40 percent devaluation of the peso in February.

All of this adds up to the prospect of about 1 million people out of a job by year's end in a country where unemployment and under-employment combined now total 45 percent of the labor force. Mexico needs to create 850,000 new jobs every year just to keep up with its population growth, one of the world's fastest.

De la Madrid, 47, an economist with a master's degree in public administration from Harvard University, won by a landslide in elections July 4. His Institutional Revolutionary Party has been ruling since it was founded in 1929.

One of his first tasks, aides say, will be to slow down — or even stop for a while — an ambitious industrial development program financed with oil export revenues that outgoing President Jose Lopez Portillo started when he took office six years ago.

De la Madrid took an estimated 73 percent of the vote in the elections, giving him more than enough political strength to try to enforce some unpopular measures.

"If the government party takes its victory as a mandate, there could be a honeymoon period in which he'll have a chance to turn things around," said one American analyst, who asked not to be identified for diplomatic reasons.

"But the economic recovery will be difficult and there will be fewer jobs and less job opportunities. The migration will continue one way or another," the analyst said.

However, so far this year, the recession in the United States has apparently helped reduce the number of illegal aliens arrested at the Mexican border, American authorities say.

Border patrol agents arrested 171,559 aliens since Jan. 1 in Southern California, a drop of 28,212 arrests from the corresponding period last year.

Steve Williams, assistant chief patrol agent of the Chula Vista sector covering most of Southern California, said "When all along the border there seems to be a downturn in arrests, and there had been no real change in the manpower we are using, then it means there is a decrease in the total number of illegal entries."

A bill sponsored by Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., and Rep. Ron Mazzoli, D-Ky., would increase the United States' control over illegal immigration, apply penalties for employers that hire foreign undocumented worker and establish a system for sponsoring temporary legal aliens to do farm work when Americans cannot be found.

There are no firm estimates on the number of Mexican illegal immigrants in the United States, though various studies have given numbers ranging from 1.5 million to as high as 16 million.

"The most common averages given are from two to four million, and some people say as many as one million Mexican illegal aliens enter the United States illegally every year," said one U.S. official, who spoke on condition he not be further identified.

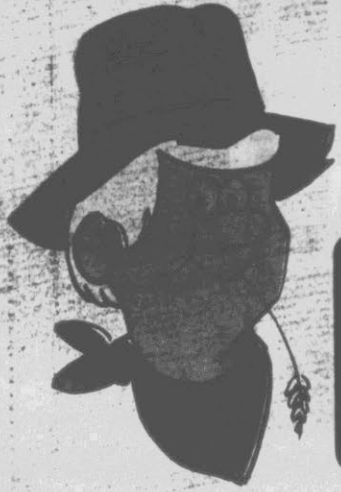

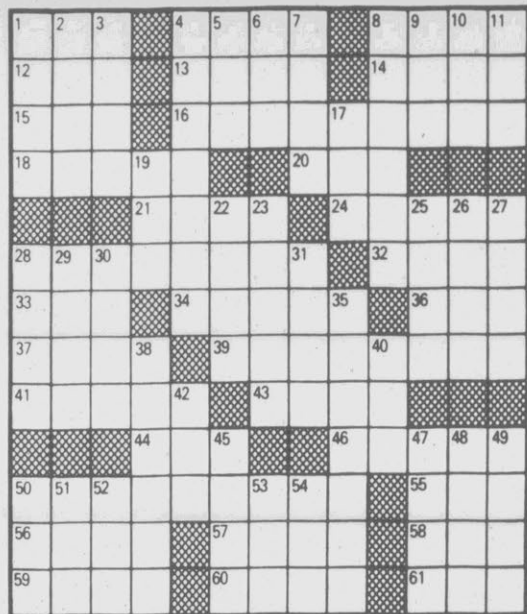

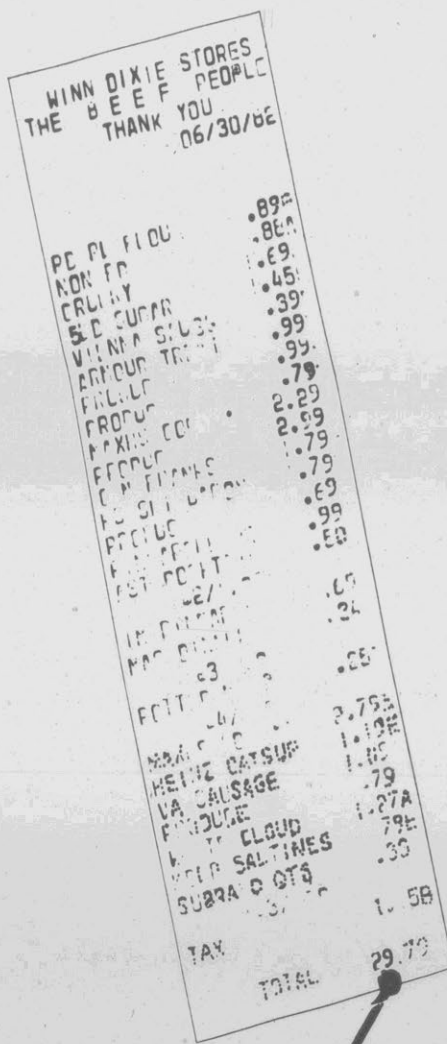
"It's pretty well gutted," said district Fire Chief W.D. Summers. He said damage to the stone and shingle building was at least \$100,000.



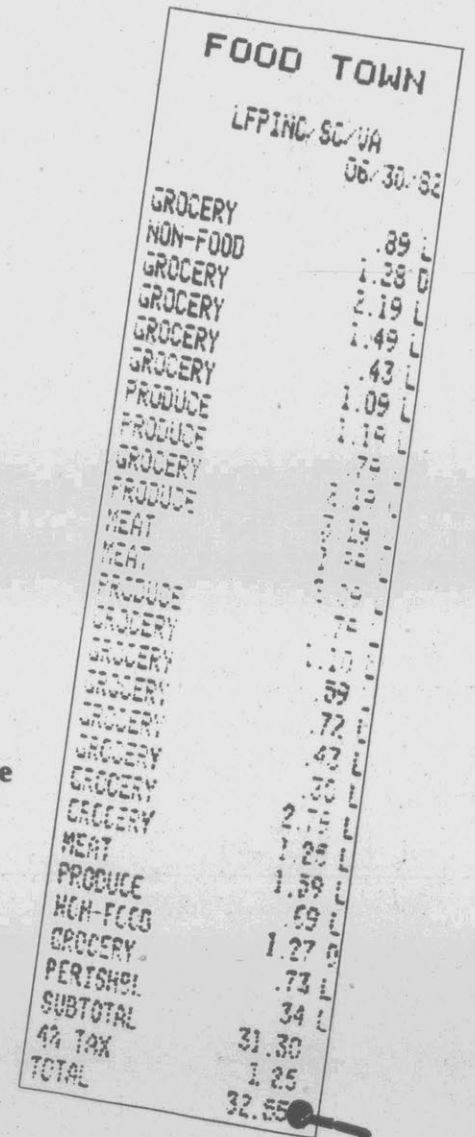

The experienced players spot certain tipoffs on how to play a hand. For example, on this deal the clue to the winning line is the fact that declarer and dummy combined hold all the high trumps.

Note North's raise to three spades. After partner opens with a demand bid, the most important duty of responder is to fix the trump suit if a fit exists. Three trumps to an honor is more than adequate support if your hand has the values for a positive response. Blackwood would not have helped South — if North did not have an ace. South would not know how many diamond losers his side had. So South cue-bid his ace of clubs, then leaped to a grand slam when his partner showed first-round control of diamonds.

West led the queen of clubs, and when dummy came down it seemed that declarer would have to rely on a diamond finesse for his grand slam. However, declarer saw that, because his side held all the high trumps, he could land thirteen tricks with a dummy reversal if trumps were 3-2.

Declarer won the first trick with the ace of clubs, then entered dummy by overtaking the eight of trumps with the nine. A club was ruffed with the ace and the ten of spades was overtaken with the jack. Had a defender showed out on this round of trumps, declarer would have had to draw trumps and fall back on the diamond finesse. But when both followed, the hand became a virtual laydown.

Declarer ruffed another club, crossed to the ten of hearts and then ruffed dummy's last club with his own last trump. The ace of diamonds was the entry to the table to draw the last opposing trump with dummy's seven. On this trick declarer discarded his losing diamond. Now declarer's hearts took the last four tricks. The dummy reversal allowed South to score six trump tricks, five hearts and a trick in each minor for a total of thirteen.

#### DON'T SMILE

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Researchers at the University of Rochester suggest that if you want to deceive someone try to keep your mouth shut.

Psychology Professor Miron Zuckerman and co-workers asked experimental subjects to conceal their true feelings by controlling their facial expressions as they watched videotapes of unpleasant, pleasant, or neutral scenes. The subjects were then asked to describe what they had seen, disguising their feelings this time by changing their tone of voice.

THE VOICES WERE ELEC-tronically filtered so that words could not be understood, but rhythm, pitch, and volume remained unchanged.

Results showed the subjects deceived others more successfully by controlling their facial expressions than by altering their voices.
