Northern Perimeter Project Propose Rural Water Service

The Greenville Utilities Commission board Tuesday night gave tentative approval to the creation of a rural water service area north of the city and agreed to seek the approval from the Greenville City Council and the Pitt County Board of Commissioners for the proposed project.

GUC Director Charles Horne said creation of the rural water service area would provide needed potable water to the area and provide for full utilization of the city's new 12 million-gallon per day water treatment plant scheduled to go into operation in January.

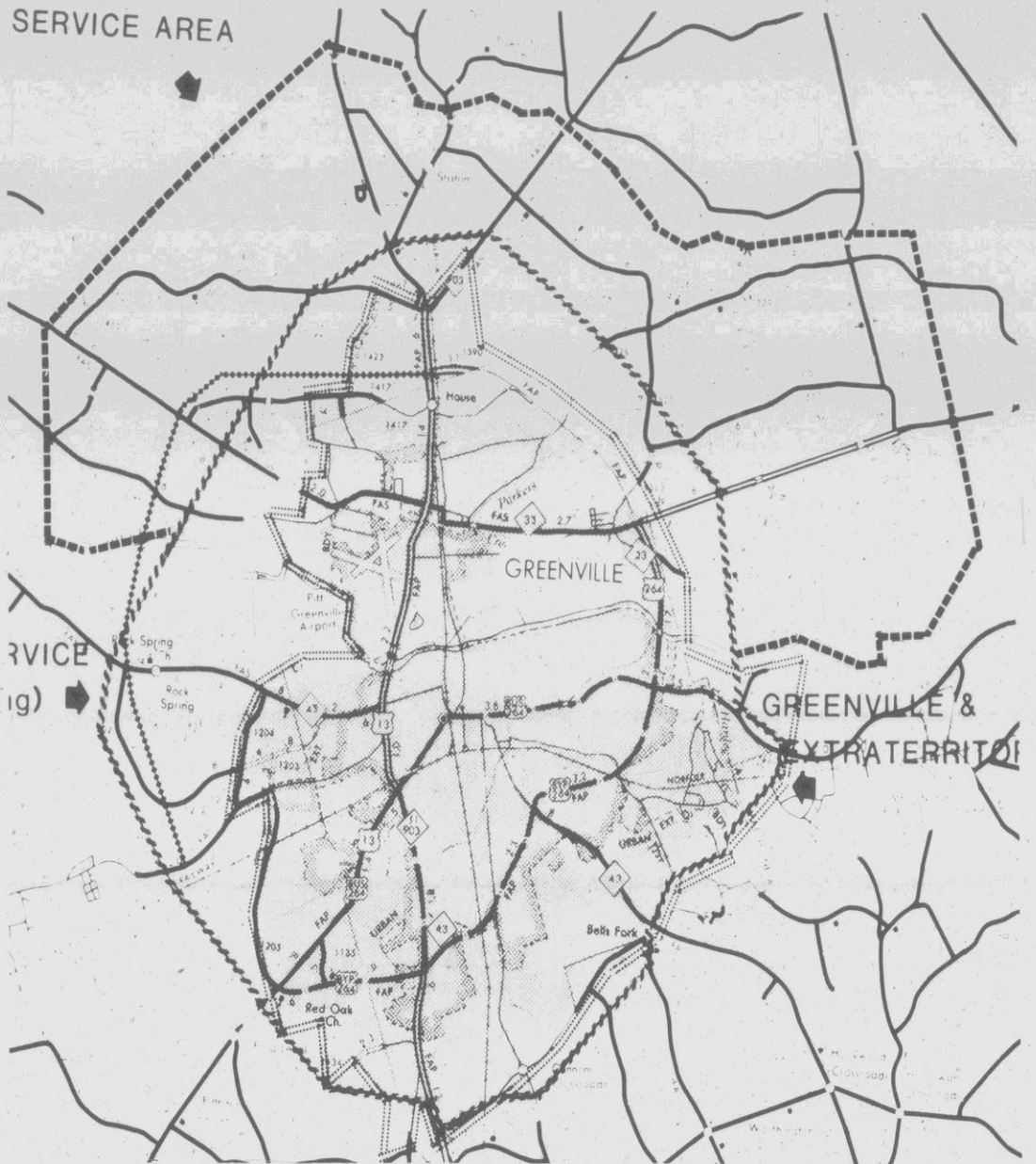
Horne explained that the proposed service area - roughly a four-mile wide semi-circle around the northern perimeter of the city - would be served primarily with 4-inch water mains (as opposed to the normal 6 inch mains used within the city), which would be extended on a "request for service basis" where "economically feasible."

The director noted that out-of-city water rates would be developed, and tapping fees charged, but said the water service could be provided to rural residents at "less than the cost of wells."

Horne said the commission has had a number of request for water service from residents of the area.

In other business, the Commission awarded for construction of the Fork Swamp sanitary sewer outfall like South of the city to Boykin Construction Co., which submitted a base bid of \$244,207. Other bids for the project ranged from \$247,836 to \$345,744.

Commission members also awarded contracts to: Southern Wood Piedmont Co. for 1,380 wood poles for \$123,207; A and P Water and Sewer Supplies for 42,000 feet of pipe and 812 fittings for \$27,954; and Phelps Chevrolet Co. for one cab and chassis for \$24,160.

Murderer Is Executed - As He Requested

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Convicted murderer Frank J. Coppola, a former policeman who once studied to be a Roman Catholic priest, asked a minister to "look after my family," embraced him and strode off coolly and willingly to the electric chair.

Coppola, 38-year-old, was pronounced dead at 11:27 p.m. EDT Tuesday, 61 minutes after the U.S. Supreme Court acceded to his hand-written plea for a speedy execution.

The decision ended a day of frantic legal maneuvering by lawyers who sought to postpone the sentence against Coppola's wishes and state attorneys who fought to carry it out.

Coppola insisted he was innocent of killing Muriel Hatchell, 45, whose skull was crushed during a robbery at her home in Newport News in 1978. Testimony said he repeatedly pounded her head into the floor because she refused to say where she kept her money. Others involved in the crime said he was the killer.

But Coppola, who said he was ready to die to maintain his dignity and spare his family agony of further appeals, resisted attempts to have his execution stayed.

He was the fifth person to be executed in this country since 1976, when the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the death penalty after nearly 10 years of debate. He was the first since Steven Judy was electrocuted in Indiana in March 1981 and the first to die in Virginia's electric chair in 20 years.

His death left 1,005 men and 13 women on death rows in the 35 states that have capital punishment laws.

Even as Coppola walked to the electric chair, lawyers trying to save his life raced by car to the Supreme Court with a hand-written plea for reconsideration.

Outside the prison, meanwhile, about 30 protesters sang "Someone's Dying, Lord" and carried signs with such messages as "Thou Shalt Not Kill" and "Execution Is Nothing More Than Sanctioned Murder."

Vote To End 'Sanctions'

The House Foreign Affairs Committee, looking for ways to slow unemployment, has voted to repeal President Reagan's sanctions against companies providing equipment for the Soviet Union's natural gas pipeline.

By a 22-12 vote, the panel approved legislation on Tuesday that would lift import restrictions the president imposed in June to prevent companies from sending the Soviets equipment made under U.S. license in Europe.

But the full House rallied around Reagan on another important vote, authorizing \$7.5 million for Radio Marti, a U.S.-run radio station for broadcast into Cuba.

Seven Republicans joined 15 Democrats on the pipeline vote, which went against Reagan despite an 11th-hour appeal from Secretary of State George P. Shultz. The bill now goes to the full House.

Proponents of the measure, sponsored by Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., said they were forced to defy the president because the sanctions contributed to severe economic conditions in their districts.

"This is a failed policy," Findley said of the Reagan administration's stance on maintaining the sanctions. "It has not furthered our foreign policy objectives and it has hurt us in many ways."

Implementation of blanket controls on export of oil and gas equipment to the Soviet Union has meant the loss of hundreds of jobs at two major companies, Fiat-Allis Construction Machinery, Inc., and Caterpillar Tractor Co.

Findley said the controls helped push unemployment up to 18 percent in Decatur, Ill., where Caterpillar has a plant.

In a letter read to the committee before it voted, Shultz warned that the repeal bill "would severely cripple the president's ability to pursue one of his major foreign policy goals and limit his flexibility and authority."

Later in the day, the House supported another of Reagan's foreign policy goals when it voted 250-134 to fund Radio Marti.

At the close of more than six hours of floor debate, Rep. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, warned that "there is more to the bill than just broadcasting to Cuba."

Instead, he said, it amounted to "a game of chicken with (Cuban Premier Fidel) Castro, a draw-

ing of the line in the sand across which he will not be able to step."

Harkin said "Cuban officials have repeatedly voiced the view that 'if Castro blocks the broadcasts to Cuba, it will be an act of war and we would be within our rights to 'surgically remove' Castro's transmitters."

Radio Marti is intended "to give the people of Cuba the truth, which they have been denied for 22 years," said Rep. Edward J. Derwinski, R-Ill., another supporter of the bill.

Rep. Timothy E. Wirth, D-Colo., chairman of a House subcommittee on telecommunications, voiced strong opposition to the bill, contending that "the Cubans have made it very clear that they are going to retaliate" against Radio Marti by electronic jamming.

If Castro opts to fight back using two ultrahigh-power 500-kilowatt AM transmitters now being built in Cuba, Wirth said, this could interfere with 200 U.S. commercial AM stations in 32 states.

The bill now goes to the Senate.

Meanwhile, a closely-watched Senate-House conference committee broke off negotiations on a bill raising taxes by \$98.9 billion because it couldn't agree on a minor change in welfare spending.

"We've reached a temporary impasse," Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., chairman of the conference committee, said Tuesday night. "If we are not going to cut spending we aren't going to raise taxes."

Also on the domestic front, both the House and Senate rejected the Education Department's efforts to revise rules for handicapped and disadvantaged students.

The House, by a 363-0 vote, rejected final regulations for implementing parts of the Education Consolidation and Improvement Act.

Israeli jets and tanks hammered guerrilla-held west Beirut again today and Prime Minister Menachem Begin met in Jerusalem with U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib to examine U.S. proposals for evacuating the PLO from Lebanon.

Begin was quoted by the Israeli newspaper Yedioth Ahronoth as saying in an interview: "If all goes well, the evacuation will get under way next week."

A major breakthrough in the negotiations came late Tuesday when Syria reversed its earlier stand and said it would take in all Palestine Liberation Organization fighters the PLO wished to evacuate from Beirut.

The Tel Aviv command said the new air strikes followed cease-fire breaches by the guerrillas that wounded three Israeli soldiers.

The jets swooped down in rapid divebombing sorties, setting fires and sending clouds of smoke spiraling over the Chatilla and Bour-j-el-Barajneh refugee camps - the PLO nerve center in the Fakhani area.

Guerrillas fired ground-to-air missiles but none was seen hitting the jets, making their third series of strikes in three days.

Israeli tanks and bazooka-firing guerrillas also clashed at the National Museum checkpoint on the Green Line dividing Beirut into Moslem west and Christian east.

The city has been under siege since the week after Israel invaded Lebanon June 6 to rout the PLO.

The Begin-Habib meeting in Jerusalem ended with no statement and another session was set for later today.

Defense Minister Ariel Sharon and Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir also attended the meeting, at which Habib was reported to have presented a list of Arab countries willing to take in the guerrillas.

Israel has accepted Habib's proposals in principle but has asked for a series of amendments centering primarily on the Arab countries which will take in the guerrillas, and the multinational force that is to secure their withdrawal.

A senior Israeli official disclosed that 9,000 guerrillas

Did the Concern for Dying organization change its name? CURIOUS IN DELAWARE

DEAR CURIOUS: No. Concern for Dying and the Society for the Right to Die are two separate organizations. They were formerly affiliated, but due to some internal differences they parted company. They both distribute the Living Will and are equally legitimate, but are constantly confused because they both maintain offices in the same building.

The only fundamental difference is that the Society for the Right to Die extends its function to trying to get the various state legislators to make "the right to die with dignity" part of the state law. It has been successful in many states.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 52-year-old divorced male who has dated "T," a 44-year-old divorcee for the last 12 months. We became intimate during that time and planned to be married this summer.

Recently I contracted gonorrhea. I have not been intimate with anyone else since I have known "T." Thus, I was sure I got it from her. (We have, of course, both been treated.)

Homemaker's Haven

The food that comes out of the canning jar can be no better than the quality of raw food that you put into that jar. So when you get ready to do home canning, use vegetables that are young, tender and fresh-gathered.

That old rule — two hours from garden to container — is still a good one. Any delay in canning gives the bacteria in the food a chance to multiply.

So, even if it's convenient, don't prepare the food, or even part of it, the evening before. And that holds true, even if you plan to store the vegetables in the refrigerator. Several hours in storage, even cool storage, gives the sugar in vegetables a chance to turn to starch. And that means some loss of flavor.

Here are some other suggestions that should help you can vegetables with garden-fresh goodness:

Handle vegetables in small batches. Prepare only enough for one pressure cooker load at a time.

Wash, rinse and drain vegetables thoroughly. Any soil left clinging to the vegetables may carry bacteria that will not be destroyed in the canning process — and that could add up to food spoilage.

Pack vegetables into jars loosely enough for water to circulate between the pieces, but tightly enough to prevent waste of jar space.

After you've got the vegetables packed into the jar, cover them with fresh boiling water or with the cooking liquid they were heated in. Then process food, following the recommendations in your favorite canning book.

Watermelon — Low Calorie Dessert

Treat your family to a

cooling, low calorie dessert — watermelon. It has fewer calories than a cupcake, brownie or dish of ice cream and it's easy to serve.

At your store or roadside stand, the "thump" test really doesn't tell you about a watermelon's ripeness. But there are some things you should look for — like a smooth surface with the ends of the melon filled out and rounded. The watermelon rind should have a slight dullness and the underside or "belly" of the melon should have a creamy color.

If you're buying a cut watermelon, you have the advantage of seeing firsthand that the flesh is fresh and juicy. It should be free from white streaks caused by immaturity — but not watery and stringy due to aging. Seeds should be dark brown or black.

Try not to let your melon roll or bump around in your car on the way home. This can cause internal bruising.

Uncut melons keep from one to three weeks. But once you cut your melon, plan to eat it all in two or three days. Watermelons have a short shelf life once cut.

You can store watermelon in a cool shady place if you don't have room in your refrigerator. But once you've refrigerated the melon, you should continue to do so. Keep watermelon out of hot places — this could cause quick deterioration. But at the other extreme, temperatures below 45 degrees will cause chilling damage.

Once you've picked out your watermelon and stored it properly, your work is done. You're ready to serve your family a nutritious low calorie dessert that keeps you out of the kitchen.

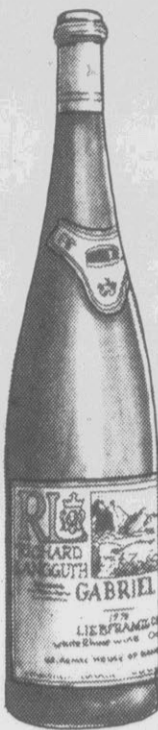

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Pat's Pointers

How many times have you seen a beautifully knitted garment spoiled by gapping, ugly buttonholes? Unfortunately, this happens all too often and it need not be so.

For some reason, most patterns give directions for making a horizontal buttonhole made by binding off a certain number of stitches on one row and casting on the same number on the return row. This results in a horizontal buttonhole that often has "gapos."

When you have front bands worked in vertical ribbing, even a well-made horizontal buttonhole can be unsightly. In my opinion, a vertical buttonhole is preferable.

When you are working in a knit 1, purl 1 ribbing, work to the point where you have a knit stitch where the buttonhole should fall. Then, knit 2 stitches together, yarnover and knit the next stitch. This lets the buttonhole fall in the purl ridge. On the next row, simply treat the "yarnover" as a stitch. That's all there is to it.

Yarnover buttonholes are rather oval in shape and do not necessarily need to have the edges overcast. A more finished look is obtained, however, if you will work a buttonhole stitch around it.

For a larger buttonhole, make a "double yarnover" at the same point. That is, bring the yarn forward, then wrap it completely around the needle, ending with the yarn in front. On the next row, when you reach the double yarnover, purl one strand of the yarnover and drop the other strand. Finally, on the next row, work to the buttonhole; then knit into the buttonhole itself instead of the stitch above it. Drop the stitch above the buttonhole without working it.

Another vertical buttonhole is worked as follows. With the right side of the work facing you, knit to the desired position for the buttonhole. Drop the yarn you are using and tie on a strand from another skein. Work to the end of the row with this strand. On the next row, work back to the buttonhole. Drop the yarn you are using and pick up a

strand from the original skein. Work to the end of the row and then work back to the buttonhole. Pick up the yarn from the second skein and work to the end of the row.

Continue working both sides simultaneously, each with its own strand of yarn, until the buttonhole is the



Pointelle Lace Pattern desired size. Now, you are ready to join the two sides again. When you reach the buttonhole, work the stitch just before and the stitch just after the gap with both strands of yarn, dropping the yarn from the second skein when you have completed the stitch after the gap.

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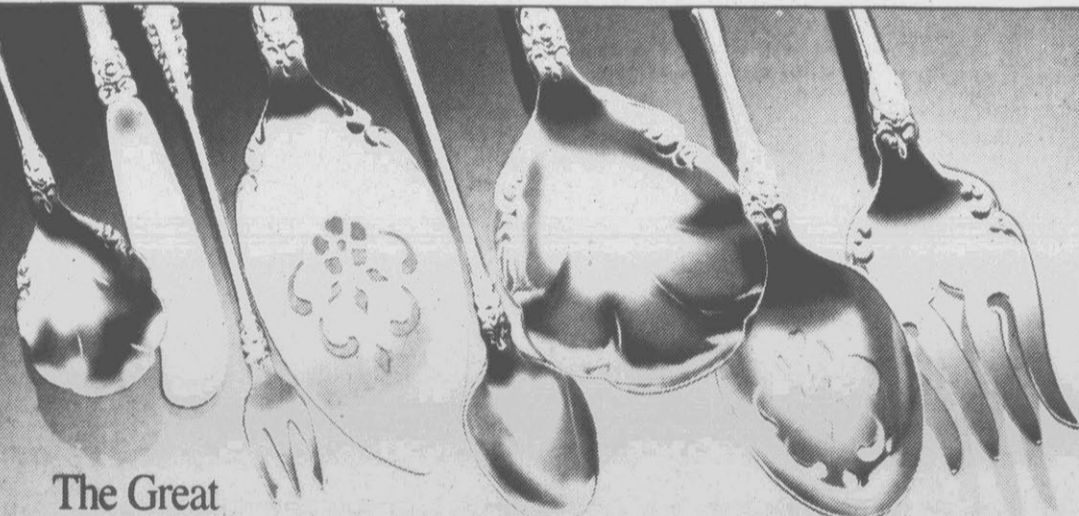

Kemp Leaks Had Purpose

WASHINGTON — Suspicions were raised that the White House staff had ambushed Rep. Jack Kemp when, immediately after a hurry-up meeting between President Reagan and the Republican congressional leadership about the tax increase bill, reports of Kemp being dressed down were leaked by the president's men.

They put out the word to newsmen of a shouting match between Kemp and presidential counselor Edwin Meese, with Meese tongue-lashing Kemp for opposing Reagan on the tax cut. Told of these reports, Kemp placed a late-night telephone call to Meese's home to find out what was going on. Meese responded there was no problem between them.

Meese had suggested in his usual low-keyed manner to Kemp that, as the president's political protege, he should not lead the assault against the tax bill. But all present, including Meese, told us there were no harsh words exchanged. The leaks flowing out of the White House appeared to be an attempt to make Kemp look like a pariah to preempt the impact of a meeting by Reaganite foes of the tax bill called by Kemp that evening.

Kennedy's advisers doubt that Garth, though probably the best in the business, could function without running the Kennedy operation himself. "I'm afraid the senator would find David overbearing," one Kennedy aide told us. Non-Candidate Haig

A secret effort by national and state Republican leaders to enlist Gen. Alexander Haig as Senate Republican candidate in his home state of Maryland was launched but failed in the days following Haig's forced resignation as secretary of state.

Maryland's most prominent Republicans, including Sen. Charles (Mac) Mathias and former Sen. J. Glenn Beall, were behind the effort. Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker also had given his private approval. Telephone calls from Washington to the Greenbriar Country Club in West Virginia, where Haig was staying, tried to induce him to run right up to to July 7 filing deadline.

But Haig insisted it would not be proper for him to resign from the Cabinet and then promptly enter the hurlyburly of elective politics. That means Republicans are stuck with ex-Rep. Lawrence Hogan, currently Prince Georges county executive, as the longshot opponent against liberal Democratic Sen. Paul Sarbanes. Earlier, efforts to recruit columnist George F. Will and ex-hostage Bruce Laingen to run against Sarbanes also failed.

Ron On His Own

Although it had no quick impact on Israeli war policy, President Reagan followed a prearranged plan as the only U.S. official who spoke during the tense Aug. 2 meeting with Israeli Foreign Minister Itzhak Shamir.

Naval Politics

Republican Sen. John Chafee, seeking re-election in heavily-Democratic Rhode Island, said nothing publicly but fired off an anguished private letter of protest after Secretary of the Navy John Lehman Jr. said Chafee had "one of the worst records on Navy matters in the Congress."

The solo diplomatic flight by Reagan, until now a quiet listener, was calculated to impress Shamir with the depth of U.S. anger at Israel's siege of Beirut. During the grim 20-minute session, there was not a single word from other U.S. officials present, including Secretary of State George Shultz and national security assistant William P. Clark.

Lehman's comments about Chafee, himself a former secretary of the Navy, came at the Naval War College symposium in Newport, R.I., June 22. Chafee has opposed Lehman's plans for a 600-shop Navy, specifically voting against a new supercarrier. Angry that Chafee depicts himself in naval-conscious Rhode Island as a staunch Navy man, Lehman was unmoved by the senator's letter of protest.

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Operating Costs And Jobless

NEW YORK (AP) — Even if the economy expands strongly, it might be more difficult than in prior recoveries to lower the jobless rate.

That discouraging assessment, shared by many economists and even by some government labor analysts, is contrary to the White House position that its policies will lead to long-term reductions in unemployment.

The doubts arise for a variety of reasons, the most important of which appear to be automation, foreign competition, and a widespread recognition by employers that they must shave their operating costs.

About 10.8 million individuals sought but failed to find jobs in July. Another 1.5 million were said to have stopped looking for work, and 5.5 million more were working part-time in the absence of full-time jobs.

In previous recoveries since World War II, the gross national product expanded sharply in the first few months of recovery, sometimes at a 10 percent annual rate. Optimistic White House forecasts are half that.

Commerce Department analysts already have predicted that even when the automobile industry recovers, employment might be at lower levels than before the recession, and that part of the reason might be automation.

Robert Dederick, Commerce Department assistant secretary for economic affairs, told a Senate subcommittee in January he expects the industry to have 200,000 fewer workers in the mid-1980s than in late 1978.

He blamed the situation on slower growth in the demand for cars, increased use of foreign-built parts, the switch to smaller cars and increased automation. Carmakers are depending heavily on the latter factor to reduce overall costs and

remain competitive with imports.

The 200,000 figure used by Dederick almost coincides with the number of hourly workers on indefinite layoff from the five major automakers. Last week, 213,921 workers were listed in that category.

Most economists agree that future productivity gains in manufacturing will rely heavily on greater use of automation, including robots, a situation that at least temporarily could mean fewer jobs.

The difficulties might also be compounded by a recovery that seems likely to be weak, even when measured by administration forecasts, which private sector economists generally regard as overly optimistic.

In July, the employment situation worsened. With the jobless rate rising to 9.8 percent of the civilian work force, analysts had to search back to the tailend of the Great Depression to find comparisons.

Robert Theobald, economist, futurist and adviser to corporations and municipal groups, says promises of more jobs are short-sighted and bound to fail, since they are based on outdated economic patterns.

He reasons that noninflationary economic expansion, such as President Reagan seeks, demands the use of automation. To promise jobs too, he says, is a contradiction and a promise that cannot be fulfilled.

Instead, he argues, the prosperous economy of the future should be anticipated now by studying the "refiguring" of work patterns to include job-sharing. While maintaining a high level of production, he says, robots

will free people for more education and recreation.

While the first impact of automation already is being felt, according to Theobald, other observers are keeping their focus attuned to more prosaic factors, such as the apparently greater willingness to fire.

Because of the recession, and repeated assertions by economists and others that American industry is suffocated by its own bureaucracy, almost every large company today has examined its job structure.

The result is the elimination of many thousands of white-collar jobs, the consolidation of divisions under trimmed-down management, and the elimination of the least profitable operations in large companies.

The fact that once strong American industries are beset by foreign competition, especially steel and including textiles, shoes and consumer electronics, adds to concerns about reducing unemployment.

Whether the Reagan team, or any other, can contend with these multiple challenges is hard to say. What can be said is that the job of creating jobs might be tougher in the future than over the past 20 years.

Full Alert

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Citing tensions with the leftist regime in neighboring Nicaragua, Honduras has placed its armed forces on full alert, cancelling all leaves for more than 27,500 army, navy and air force personnel, and police and border patrol officers, a military spokesman reported.

The alert will last "until further notice", the spokesman said.

Relations between Honduras and Nicaragua have been increasingly tense in the three years since the Sandinista Socialist revolutionaries in Nicaragua overthrew President Anastasio Somoza. Honduras' right-wing military government has accused the Sandinistas of a series of border raids, including five over the past 20 days.

Broyhill's administrative assistant, says he thinks most of North Carolina's Democratic congressmen did also.

Kirk said that at the time Broyhill solicited the letters, he knew McDaniel was interested in running for Congress. But Broyhill did not know if McDaniel would run. "I can assure you that we had no ulterior motives and I'm sure that's why we got (the Democrats) to co-sign the letter with us," Kirk said.

As for what other Democrats said about McDaniel, there's some confusion. One congressional aide said he couldn't find any such letter in the files. Another said he wrote what was an extremely gushy letter over his congressman's name and

sent it out without ever showing it to his boss.

Hester said McDaniel has no plans to use the letters in his campaign. But, he wouldn't rule out the possibility. "I don't think they're going to be used for anything other than his personal satisfaction . . . (public release) would be exploiting the intent in which they were given . . . and I would hope that we're in a position where we won't have to rely on that kind of thing." Release of the letters would imply "pulling out all stops", Hester said.

Skip Smith, Whitley's press aide, refused to comment on the letters.

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Fonda Condition Termed Serious

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actor Henry Fonda remained hospitalized in serious condition today after being admitted for a heart condition, according to a hospital spokesman.

Fonda, 77, was admitted to have his heart medication adjusted, said Cedars-Sinai Medical Center spokeswoman Virginia Bohannon.

"The doctor said his condition had worsened despite readjustment of the medication," she said Tuesday. "He is suffering from the progression of serious, chronic and longstanding heart condition."

Fonda was hospitalized on Sunday, Ms. Bohannon said. He had left the hospital July 22 after two weeks of treatment for urinary tract and root canal infections as well as adjustment of heart medication.

Actress Jane Fonda said in a statement that her father

was taken to the hospital "in a weakened condition which required closer supervision than he could obtain at home. He is in no pain and is resting comfortably. His children and family are with him."

Fonda's press agent, John Springer, said Fonda's wife Shirlee and daughter were at the hospital "from early morning until as late as they can be."

He said he was unsure whether Fonda's son, actor Peter Fonda, was in Los Angeles.

"It sounds very bad," said Springer. "I really wish I had nice cheerful, happy news, but I don't."

Springer, in a telephone interview from New York, said Fonda was "conscious, but he's very weak."

The actor has been hospitalized several times in the past year and has been confined to his home most of the rest of the time. In March, he was too ill to attend the Academy Awards, and Miss Fonda accepted in his behalf an Oscar for best actor for his portrayal of the crusty Norman Thayer in "On Golden Pond."

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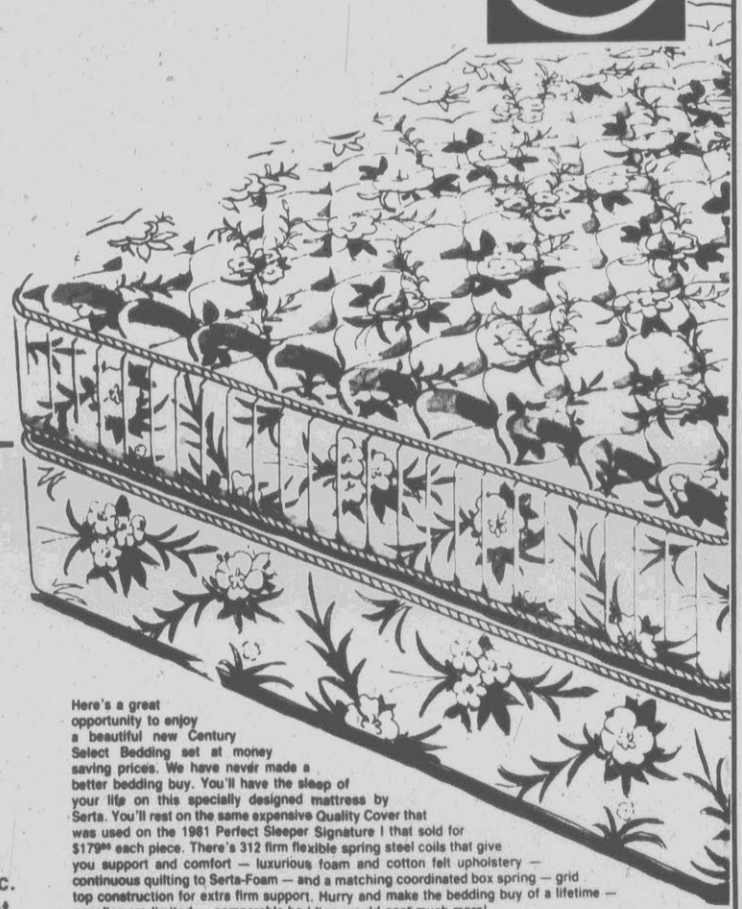

Get Reprieve On Pollution

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Financially struggling U.S. Steel Corp. has won a reprieve of up to three years in meeting federal air pollution regulations, and instead will be permitted to modernize its mills.

The company had planned to spend an estimated \$90 million to meet the regulations by Dec. 31, but now will be able to "channel the money into productivity improvements," said Michael Alushin, acting counsel for the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration.

But Alushin emphasized Tuesday that U.S. Steel officials "still have to spend the money on pollution controls." U.S. Steel Chairman David Roderick called the announcement "timely and helpful."

Changes For 'Recorder'

BOILING SPRINGS, N.C. (AP) — The new editor of the Biblical Recorder says the Baptist publication will be different than when it was run by his predecessor, but not radically so.

R.G. Puckett, who recently replaced J. Marse Grant as editor, says he plans to focus on a wide number of issues, ranging from pornography to nuclear disarmament.

"I probably won't be identified with any single issue," Puckett said Saturday before a commencement address at Gardner-Webb College, his first official speech since replacing Grant.

"Grant zeroed in on liquor by the drink and I share his position on that," Puckett said. "But my style will try to address all the issues."

Puckett, 49, has edited The Maryland Baptist and The Ohio Messenger. His first issue of The Biblical Recorder comes out this week.

Puckett said he disagrees with U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., on prayer in the schools.

"I don't think the Supreme Court ever ruled we cannot have voluntary prayer in schools if we want to," he said.

But Puckett said he shared the concern of many Christians that nation's moral climate is deteriorating.

"Some see this as a result of the Supreme Court decision on prayer," he said. "They blame all the problems in America on the Supreme Court decision in 1963. And this ignores the climate of the 1960s. What we see happening in the schools now is a reflection of what is happening in the family."

Puckett said his viewpoint is "fundamentally Baptist."

"The answer is not in government regulations but the proclamation and application of the gospel," he said.

Three Injured In 4 Collisions

Three people were injured and an estimated \$18,325 property damage caused in four traffic collisions investigated by Greenville police Tuesday.

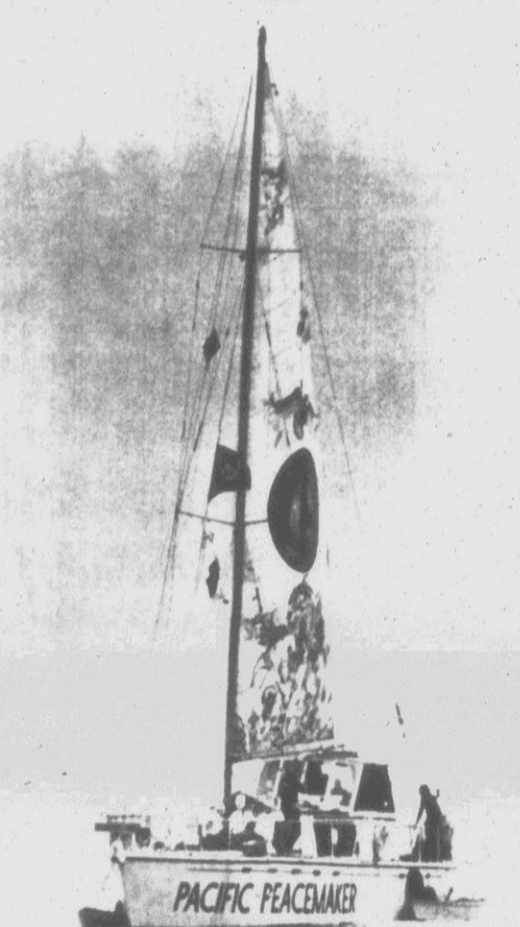

Officials Argue Teacher Evaluation's True Value

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Most North Carolina educators agree that personnel evaluations are helpful but there is little agreement about whether a statewide appraisal plan is the right method.

The state Board of Education is expected to vote Thursday on the Performance Appraisal Plan, a product of concern for quality education that has drawn fierce praise and criticism.

"The advantage of a statewide program is you can be assured of some

conformity," said Juanita Floyd, director of the Department of Public Instruction's Division of Personnel. "You have information and a minimum level from the state and then you give the support and let the local systems adapt that to their needs."

But Loretta Martin, president of the North Carolina Association of Educators, says the proposed plan is too subjective, vague and misleading to offer support and conformity among local school units. She prefers to allow individual systems to

continue writing their own evaluation plans.

"If the object is to improve instruction, a unit ought to be able to use the scale that best helps them," she said.

North Carolina's first step to ensure quality education was a 1978 requirement that students pass a minimum competency test before they receive a high school diploma.

The second step — the evaluation program devised in 1979 — focuses on teachers and principals.

In the past, the evaluation of teachers has been left to

local school boards. All 143 school units now must implement the statewide evaluation system although they may choose to add other criteria of their own.

Each local school system also may decide who will do the evaluations, when they will be conducted and what to do with the evaluation results.

The plan, tested in 24 school systems last year, requires that teachers be evaluated each year by their principal or a designee and principals by their superintendent or designee. At the

start of the school year, personnel are given copies of their job descriptions and criteria to be used in evaluating them.

After the evaluations are completed, teachers and principals are allowed to examine them and add comments.

Teachers are rated in several areas, including their ability to identify students' strengths and weaknesses and form teaching objectives and strategies, keep abreast of current research and match subject matter to student interests and needs.

use appropriate instruction methods, set up the classroom efficiently and monitor individual achievement, and behave in a professional manner.

Principals are rated on skills including leadership, administration, management, relationships with staff and students, fiscal administration and professional ethics.

Ratings can be on a three-, four- or five-point scale.

Mrs. Martin says local interpretations of that scale will prevent establishment of a uniform evaluation system.

Fish Worth \$5,000 Prize

TUKWILA, Wash. (AP) — The chance to land \$1 million got away, but the fish Joe Smith caught was still worth a hefty \$5,000.

Smith, 65, of Edmonds, on Saturday caught a coho salmon specially tagged for a fishing derby sponsored by Schuck's Auto Supply. Had he entered the contest on Puget Sound and caught the fish during a designated 12-hour period July 18, it would have been worth a \$1 million prize.

As it was, Smith almost didn't get anything.

When Smith caught the coho while fishing with his son, Ron, south of Whidbey Island, he cleaned it immediately and threw the head and tail overboard. He also threw away a marker used to identify the fish.

Fortunately for Smith, a second marker remained.

A University of Washington expert on Tuesday identified the fish as the one that had been tagged. Schuck's then accepted what was left of the fish in a ceremony and gave Smith \$5,000.

Schuck's spokesman Tom Aitchison says Smith planned to split the prize with his son. Schuck's hasn't decided whether to mount the salmon with a reconstructed head and tail, or whether to let the headless and tailless fish be "a conversation piece," Aitchison said.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Mayor Richard Caliguiri says he'll take a bath in public to help convince people to come clean and stop littering city streets.

"Just make sure there's a lot of suds," Caliguiri told members of the Pittsburgh Clean City Committee in announcing his plan to help clean up the Steel City.

At a meeting Tuesday where the committee previewed radio and TV ads for an anti-litter campaign, Caliguiri volunteered to dunk and lather at the corner of Sixth Avenue and Grant Street, near his downtown office.

Carolina Beach Man Keeping Alive Old Carousel Tradition

CAROLINA BEACH, N.C. (AP) — The beat of military music has died and the wooden horses have been destroyed, but Nelson Ferris still keeps his intricately carved carousel going.

Ferris operates the carousel and four other rides at Jubilee Park on U.S. 421. Between 2,500 and 3,000 riders will pay the 50 cents to ride the carousel each week.

"People ask me where the carousels have all gone — what's happened to them," Ferris said. "They have all run into the same problem, and that's maintenance. When the wood gets to a certain age, it makes more sense to stop them than put more into them."

"It's a heck of a way to make a living — you can work your tail off," Ferris said. "We do all our painting,

upholstering and machine and platform work. But I like what I do — watching people enjoy themselves and have a good time. I am just an old ride man. It's all I have ever done, and I expect it's all I will ever do."

Ferris, 51, is carrying on what has been a family tradition. He inherited the carousel from his grandfather, Horatio.

In the 1940s, Ferris, then about 12, and his father operated a carousel in New York amusement parks. They traveled through the state, moving their 14-ton, steam-powered merry-go-round to a new park every other week.

When Horatio Ferris entered the carousel business in the late-1800s, the first merry-go-round he operated

was powered by a mule.

"They had a stick tied to the mule with a carrot dangling in front of him," Ferris said. "The mule walked all day for that carrot, but didn't get it till the end of the day."

The traveling stopped in Carolina Beach in 1954. Every season since then, Ferris and his wife, Joyce, have operated their 1910 Herschell-Spillman carousel.

The carousel trade flourished in America in the late 1800s, and soon no city park, carnival, state fair, circus or pleasure resort worth its bunting was without at least one of the mighty whirligigs. In contrast, there now are less than a hundred of the machines in operation across the nation.

The Ferris carousel originally had 36 wooden

horses, but the moisture and humidity at the beach were more than the steeds could take. Ferris sold all but one of the wooden horses several years ago, replacing them with similarly styled and painted aluminum horses.

A new carousel would cost about \$150,000 today, Ferris said, noting that they're made of fiber-glass instead of wood. The machines will last about 25 to 30 years, he said.

"This one has lasted a lot longer because of tender loving care — it has been babied and babied," he said.

"I was raised on this old thing — I've been in this business all my life," he said. "It's like traveling with the circus — once you get sawdust in your boots, you can't get it out."

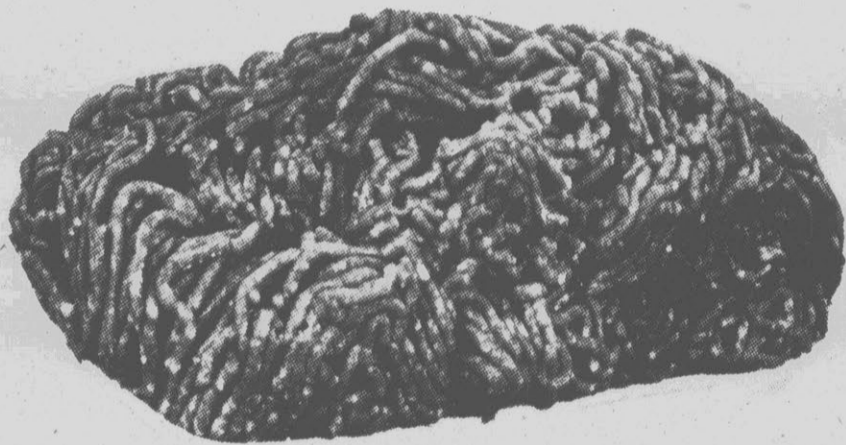

Death Row Population Is Multiplying

America's death row population has swollen to 1,005 men and 13 women, with more than 800 of them concentrated in 10 Southern and Western states.

A survey by The Associated Press found that Florida leads the nation with 188 men under death sentence.

Texas ranks second with 163 men and two women, followed by California with 109 men, Georgia with 94 men and four women, Alabama with 49 men and one woman, Arizona with 46 men, Illinois with 42 men, Oklahoma with 38 men and one woman, Mississippi with 35 men, and Tennessee with 30 men.

The U.S. Supreme Court paved the way for the reintroduction of the death penalty in 1976 after a pause of nearly 10 years. Because the appeals process can often take years, the death row population has grown rapidly ever since. No one faces imminent execution, however.

In 1977, when Gary Gilmore was shot by a Utah firing squad, the count stood at 398. By March 9, 1981 when Steven A. Judy became the fourth man executed in recent years, there were 739 death row inmates.

Convicted murderer Frank Coppola became the fifth on Tuesday night when he died in Virginia's electric chair.

Thirty-five states have the death penalty — including New Jersey where Gov. Tom Kean signed a death penalty bill into law Friday.

But in three of the 15 states that do not have the death penalty, the issue remains hot.

Massachusetts voters will decide in November whether to adopt a state constitutional amendment which could pave the way for death penalty legislation.

Death penalty proponents in Oregon failed earlier this year to get enough signatures to put a similar measure before voters in November.

New York technically has a statute applying the death penalty to people under life sentence who kill prison guards. But it's generally agreed that new statutes would have to be passed before the death penalty could be invoked in that state. Outgoing Gov. Hugh L. Carey has repeatedly vetoed such attempts.

Besides those three states, the District of Columbia, Iowa, West Virginia, Alaska, Maine, Kansas, Rhode Island, Michigan, Vermont, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota and Hawaii do not have the death penalty.

Among other states with capital punishment, Arkansas and South Carolina each have 23 men under death sentences, North Carolina has 22 men and one woman, Missouri has 18 men, Virginia has 17 men, Nevada has 13 men and one woman, Indiana and Nebraska have 13 men each, Kentucky has 12 men and one woman, Pennsylvania has 12 men, Maryland has 10 men and two women, Louisiana has nine men, Idaho and New Mexico have five men each, Delaware has four men, Montana and Utah each have three men, Colorado and Washington have two men each, and Wyoming and Ohio each have one man.

Four states have death penalty statutes but no inmates on

death row: New Jersey, Connecticut, South Dakota and New Hampshire.

The method of execution in 16 states is electrocution. Nine states use lethal gas, three use hanging, and one uses the firing squad. Four states — Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Idaho, use lethal injections. Washington allows a choice of hanging or injection. New Jersey has not chosen its method, but Kean is said to favor injection.

Only a handful of death row inmates have execution dates, and all are in the midst of appeals that will take months or years.

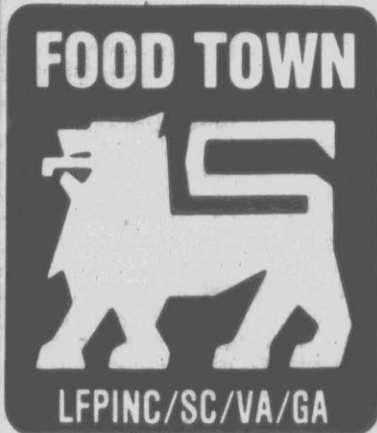
In Texas, Henry M. Porter, convicted of the 1975 shooting death of a Fort Worth policeman, was scheduled for execution on Thursday, but a federal court Tuesday granted him a stay.

In Indiana, William Minnick, convicted of murder, rape and robbery, has an Aug. 27 execution date, but an appeal is considered certain.

In May, the Missouri Supreme Court rejected a request by death row inmate Gerald Smith to be executed immediately. His final appeal, ordered by the court over Smith's protest, is set for September. He was convicted of the beating death of his girlfriend.

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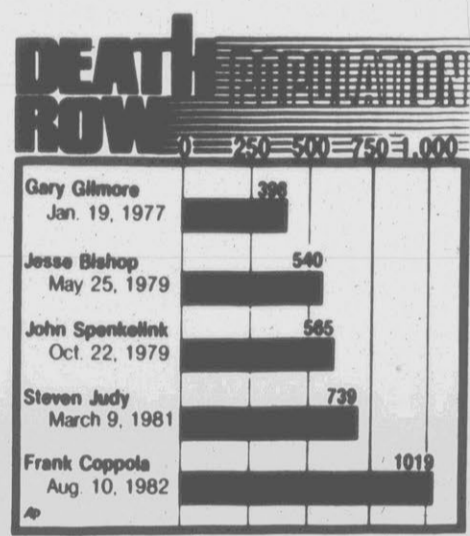

From Murphy to Montego Fighting World Hunger

Chris Loftis strode into Greenville Tuesday, carrying a big staff, a 70-pound pack and a message of freedom from hunger for everyone on the planet.

He wiped the sweat from his body, downed two soft drinks and began talking about the subject that has motivated his 700-plus-mile walk from Murphy to Montego — how each of us blessed with not having to be hungry must take responsibility for the well-being of our fellow men.

He arrived at the Salvation Army Citadel here about noon, having walked from Farmville Monday night he had spoken to the Farmville Kiwanis Club and Tuesday night he gave a folk music concert at the Catholic

Newman Center on the East Carolina University campus. Tonight he will attend an already-scheduled Hunger Project meeting to be held at the home of Grayson Morris, 101 Dellbrook Circle, at 7:30 p.m.

A Gastonia native and a Duke University graduate, Loftis, 23, will enter his second year at Southeastern Baptist Seminary, Wake Forest, this fall. He said that, when he began his studies at Duke, he began to see himself as poor among the students there who, to him, appeared to be rich. Then he realized, he said, that he — the son of school teachers, while never well-off financially, had never had a hungry day in his life.

"God and my parents," he said, "always supplied all my needs and many of my

wants. Facing what seemed to me to be a paradox between how I felt and what actually was true in my life, I began to look at what I could do to help the really poor of this world. I decided I had to take a stand. I got in touch with CROP — the Community Hunger Appeal of Church World Services — and began doing benefit concerts for them.

He's always loved to sing, he said, and is willing to carry the extra weight of a guitar and a banjo in his pack so he can accompany himself at concerts across the state. He emphasizes that he is not the only CROP walker in the state. One of the organization's most successful fund-raising methods is encouraging community walks for CROP across the state. Many are organized, CROP director Ed King says, in the wake of Loftis' visit to a community.

Loftis' walk is to be eight weeks in length. He left the Tennessee border June 21 and walked to Asheville, then down to Charlotte, then up to Winston-Salem, then to Durham and Raleigh, then down to Newton Grove to visit a migrant camp, then to Wilson-Farmville-Greenville and now on to Washington and ultimately Jockey's Ridge on the Outer Banks. At the end of his zig-zag trip, he will have covered about 750 miles and is slated to be met by national television crews.

CROP is doing a documentary on hunger in North Carolina and is using Loftis' as a focal point, having him visit the sites seen by the

organization as areas of particular need. A Charlotte photographer has donated his time to meet Loftis at various points for filming.

CROP has arranged for hosts in each site visited and the hosts arrange for his activities.

He also does a lot of unscheduled talking with "the very poor" along the way. "I know by having experienced them," he said, "that the very poor have all the same emotional and spiritual values as the rest of us. I've stayed in cardboard huts with the very poor in the mountains, in the shabby built condemned public housing that's still occupied in the Piedmont, and in the near-slavery conditions of migrant camps in the Coastal Plain. Those who have all their needs met, not just the wealthy, need to know about these things, too, and commit to doing something about it."

He said giving money to feed the poor is good, but it's only cough syrup for the cold — treating only one symptom

for one short while. "The cure for the cold is elusive and complex. So is the problem of hunger. We've got to create widely held awareness of the hungry and how they can be fed," he said. "We've got to change political and social systems. We've got to do whatever it takes to make sure that the least among us can eat."

Five Bodies Found In Texas Lakeside Houses

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Five people were found slashed, stabbed or shot — including one person who was decapitated and sexually mutilated — in adjacent lakeside cottages as authorities sought to unravel the latest mass slaying to come to light in Texas.

Spent .22-caliber cartridges were found in the cottage where the decapitated body of Ricky Lee Bryant was found by his mother Tuesday and in the home where detectives came upon the four other bodies while looking for witnesses to Bryant's death, police said.

At least three of the four victims in the second cottage were related.

"I didn't think it was him.

It just couldn't seem like it was a person there," June Bryant said of her 31-year-old son. "It still doesn't seem like it was him."

Mrs. Bryant came to her son's house, about two miles from her home, and found his sexually mutilated corpse lying beside his bed with his severed head in the crook of his arm, investigators said.

"I really have no idea who would want to do this," said Bryant's father, Donald. "He's not a wild boy. He's been very close to us. He comes over for dinner just about every night."

The victims in the second house included a man, two women and a boy about 9. Their throats were cut, said Tarrant County medical in-

vestigator J.L. Kirkpatrick. Assistant District Attorney J.E. McEntire said there was "a suspect we want to talk to" in connection with the slayings.

Later Tuesday night, however, Detective A.J. Tiroff told reporters outside the cottages that, "We don't know where we are. We're still in the asking stages."

Officials want to learn whether the female victims were sexually molested and whether victims were shot, Tiroff said.

"We found puncture wounds," he said. "They're puncture wounds that could be anything."

Autopsies were planned today, said Medical Examiner Nizam Perwani.

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Investigators Blame Crew In Air Florida Crash

WASHINGTON (AP) —
The crash of Air Florida Flight 90 could have been averted if the cockpit crew, inexperienced in flying in severe winter weather, had paid closer attention to keeping ice and snow off the aircraft, federal investigators say.

The National Transportation Safety Board concluded Tuesday that the "probable cause" of the crash was the failure of Capt. Larry Wheaton, 34, and co-pilot Roger Alan Pettit, 31, to follow procedures outlined

for snow and icy conditions. Seventy-eight people, including the two pilots, were killed when the Boeing 737 stalled moments after taking off from National Airport and plowed into the ice-covered Potomac River after clipping a bridge Jan. 13.

Robert P. Silverberg, general counsel for Air Florida in Miami, declined comment on details of the NTSB findings, but told reporters the airlines' own findings point to "a severe and uncontrollable pitch-up immediately after the liftoff ... from which recovery was not possible."

The safety panel was to issue a list of recommendations later today as a result of what they learned from the crash, including one urging the Federal Aviation Administration to step up its research on de-icing aircraft.

While acknowledging that Flight 90 was poorly de-iced before taking off, the board said the major responsibility rested with the crew.

The panel said the pilot and co-pilot:

- Failed to ensure that critical surfaces of the aircraft, including the forward edges of the wings, were free of ice and snow.
- Failed to engage the engine de-icers, causing critical sensors to freeze over and give false readings on the amount of power the engines were producing during the takeoff roll.
- Operated the aircraft during a lengthy ground delay in a manner that "increased the aircraft's susceptibility to (ice and snow) contamination."

blamed by investigators on frozen engine sensors that had been exposed to ice and snow.

As the plane rolled down the snow-covered runway, Pettit repeatedly expressed concern that "something was not right," the safety board said.

"There was sufficient doubt about the instrument readings early in the takeoff roll to cause the captain to reject the takeoff," the panel concluded. It added that failure to do so was a direct cause of the crash.

The safety panel acknowledged that the Boeing 737 historically has demonstrated an "inherent tendency" for its nose to pitch up if there is an accumulation of ice or snow on the forward edges of the wing.

Boeing last year disclosed having received nearly two dozen reports of such control

problems with the 737 and issued an advisory to all operators of the plane on how to deal with the problem.

But the safety board criticized the Seattle-based aircraft manufacturer, saying it should have placed more emphasis on the problem and taken "more positive corrective action." The panel said the pitch-up problem was a contributing factor to the crash.

There was no immediate comment from Boeing.

Investigators also said tests on simulators at the Boeing Co., showed that the pilot of Flight 90 might have pulled the aircraft out of danger if he had applied full power as it was about to stall.

The safety board said the crew apparently tried feverishly to get the plane's nose down as it was stalling, but that there was no indication

that full power was applied. The plane gained an altitude of about 200 feet and then crashed into a bridge crossing the Potomac less than a mile from the runway.

Other factors contributing to the accident were the prolonged delay — about 40 minutes — between when the plane was de-iced and when the crew received permission to take off causing the plane to be exposed to continual precipitation.

While the report is highly critical of the way Flight 90 was de-iced, it said the crew should not have allowed the aircraft to take off until it had been thoroughly cleaned of hazardous material.

American Airlines performed the de-icing. Investigators said the accident revealed there is widespread confusion within the airline industry on how to properly de-ice an airplane and what

concentration of solution that should be used.

At the same time, the report was critical of air traffic controllers at National Airport for allowing an Eastern Airlines jet that was about to land, to come within a mile of Air Florida Flight 90 as it was preparing to take off.

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Interned Haitians Determined To Remain In U.S.

JUANITA DIAZ, Puerto Rico (AP) — Haitian refugees whose release from a U.S. concentration camp is scheduled to start this week

say nearly a year behind barbed wire has not diminished their determination to have a new life in the United States.

Because a federal judge ordered their release, the Immigration and Naturalization Service says it will begin this week to release Haitians from Fort Allen, a former Navy communications station where the refugees live in tents on an asphalt plain. Men are separated from women, and all are penned in by high chain-link fences topped with coils of barbed razor wire.

"It feels like being in hell," said Maxine Exantus, 28, one of five inmates interviewed by The Associated Press. "The sun never goes down. It's hot, very hot."

Exantus is skeptical that the ordeal is ending.

"I have heard about the road to liberation, but I haven't seen it," he said.

Georgette Vieux, 19, said her hopes for life in the United States have not

changed. "On the contrary," she said through an interpreter. "After so much suffering here, I am ready to go out and work really hard."

Miss Vieux complained of brutal treatment by guards at the camp, unappetizing food and ailments caused by her detention. But she said she would go through it again rather than return to Haiti.

Gaetjens Pavilus, 28, said he fled from Haitian government persecution for union activities and thought he would get political asylum easily. He said he's been waiting more than 10 months for a decision on his request and is discouraged, but he could never go back to Haiti.

Sonny Douyon, 26, said he left home to escape problems with the "authorities" only to find problems with the "authorities" in the United States. But he said although he has gone through "a lot of misery," he expects the experience to benefit him later in life.

Douyon said other detainees who became discouraged and returned to their homeland "couldn't take the suffering." But he said he would prefer "to spend the rest of his life in Fort Allen" rather than return to Haiti.

U.S. District Judge Eugene Spellman ruled in June that the federal policy of detaining Haitians indefinitely had been illegally implemented. He ordered their parole from federal detention camps until Immigration Service judges decide if they merit U.S. asylum.

By early this week, 151 Haitians had been released from the Krome North camp in Miami under Spellman's order. But it has not brought freedom to any of the approximately 640 refugees at Fort Allen, although more than a dozen were released recently for what the Immigration Service called "humanitarian reasons."

Gherta Jean-Louis, 25, said if she had been confined in Miami instead of Fort Allen,

"I would have been released by now. It's not the mentality here that you're going to be freed one day."

All five refugees arrived in Florida from their impoverished homeland between July and August of last year. Within two months they had

been transferred here from the Krome North center.

Refugee support groups here have charged that the Immigration Service moved the Haitians to Fort Allen to discourage them from staying in the United States. But the Interregional Council for

Haitian Refugees says only about 200 gave up and returned to Haiti.

The future of the camp is not known. According to an agreement between the federal and Puerto Rican governments, announced last week, the Haitians in the

camp now are to be released by Dec. 10. The agreement stipulates that more could be detained there if a new wave of refugees arrives in the United States.

Officials decline to say whether the agreement could be extended after Dec. 10.

The senior class president, Edwin Wilkerson, was unable to attend. The class vice president, Wayne Eidson, served as master of ceremonies.

Among 1957 graduates present who were recognized for various achievements were Wade Jordan of Greenville as the parent of most children, four of them, and John Ed Arnold, now of Tuscaloosa, Ala., as the graduate married for the longest period of time to the same person — a period of 26 years. The person traveling the farthest distance to attend was Sharon Wilfong Walters of Indianapolis, Indiana.

She said she was to visit six of the Missionaries of Charity who live in the Christian sector of east Beirut.

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

Resigns Due Allegations

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - A Durham County magistrate facing charges of soliciting and accepting sexual favors as a bribe has resigned his position.

The petition states Ms. Summey originally was jailed in lieu of \$400 secured bond, but at some point after her bond was set Farmer filled out an order to allow Ms. Summey's release on her written promise to appear in court.

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Governors Plan Write Own 'New Federalism'

AFTON, Okla. (AP) - The National Governors' Association, with its chairman urging President Reagan to become personally involved in negotiations, has politely said it will write its own version of the postponed "new federalism" program.

After Tuesday's closing session of the association's summer meeting, newly elected chairman Gov. Scott Matheson of Utah reassured the White House the group

wanted to continue talks aimed at developing an acceptable program to shift some federally funded programs to state and local administration.

But Matheson, a Democrat, said if there was no agreement by next year, the governors may introduce their own "new federalism" bill, instead of waiting for Reagan or going along with an administration plan they cannot accept.

"I would hope that these

negotiations would be directly with the president," Matheson said at a news conference. "In my judgment, if the president had been personally involved in our discussions during the last six months, we would have made much more progress."

Administration officials say the program Reagan first promised in his State of the Union speech last January but postponed several times will be ready when Congress convenes in January, and it will be in a form the governors will buy.

"Basically, that's the same time frame of the governors," Matheson said. "What we hope to be able to do is to work very closely together on that kind of legislation. But we have not excluded developing and submitting other proposals in whatever form or manner they should take."

"That certainly could be a bill. It could be an amendment. That process is wide open," he added.

But Richard S. Williamson, Reagan's assistant for intergovernmental affairs, cautioned the only way the issue will be seriously considered by Congress will be if the president backs it.

While debate during the four-day meeting centered on the "new federalism" and balanced-budget proposals, the governors also discussed an administration proposal to boost the federal gasoline tax, a call from Canada aimed at increased U.S. use of Canadian-generated electricity, and state administration issues, including pension plans, technological education programs and prison problems.

For six months, the governors and other state and local officials have been bargaining with the White House and each other about the "new federalism" framework proposed by Reagan. Some of the programs funded by the government would remain so, while others would be transferred to state or local governments.

In a statement, the governors said the association "assumes the responsibility for developing our own ... federalism reform proposal ... When a draft proposal has been approved by the executive committee it shall be presented to the president to seek his approval," it said.

The committee will meet in December. Vermont Gov. Richard Snelling, a Republican and outgoing association chairman, will head the effort.

Chief among the differences yet to be worked out is Reagan's insistence that the states take a major share of welfare programs. The governors refused to budge on their traditional view that the cost of such basic welfare programs as Aid to Families with Dependent Children continue to be carried by the federal government.

Lifeguards Abound, But Youth Drowns

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - A North Dakota teen-ager who drowned in a Walt Disney World water attraction packed with swimmers was described by his father as an "inexperienced swimmer."

Howard A. Pueppke, 14, of Erie, N.D., was pulled from the water at the River Country Cove about five minutes after the youth slid down a 60-foot slide into five feet of water, said Rod Madden, a Disney World spokesman.

The accident occurred Monday night with 13 on-duty lifeguards watching about 500 swimmers in the cove, Madden said Tuesday.

A sign posted near the slide reads: "Rapid Water - Strong Swimmers Only," Madden said.

He said there are two 60-foot-high slides with lifeguards posted at the top of each and one guard below both to make sure swimmers get safely down the slide and resurface.

"We feel one guard at the bottom is enough and in the past has been adequate to handle the recreational area," Madden said. He said there were no plans to add another guard as a result of

the drowning. Glenn Pueppke, father of the drowned youth, said in a telephone interview with The Orlando Sentinel on Tuesday that his son "was an inexperienced swimmer."

"I don't think he would have gone down the slide if he had known how deep the water was. He didn't know how to swim," said the elder Pueppke, who learned of the accident late Monday.

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Votes Stacked Heavily Against Kuhn's Return

Whether he's pushed or departs gracefully, all signs point to the exit door for Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn.

The 6-foot-6 former National League attorney, who has theoretically governed the game for a dozen years, will get the bad news a week from today in San Diego, where club owners of both leagues gather to determine his fate.

A cursory telephone poll shows that as of today the votes are stacked heavily against him — the main anti-Kuhn sentiment prevailing in the National League — and only a last-minute miracle can bail him out.

"It's set in concrete," one National League executive said. "Unless there is a

compromise or he agrees to accept a lesser role, Bowie is out."

"You can't say positively," another NL executive said. "We thought — and some of us hoped — that he might see the writing on the wall and make a decision not to continue."

"But he is a tough, headstrong guy and he's carrying on a vigorous campaign to survive."

Actually, lobbying on the issue is as intense and frenetic as in some of the liveliest political campaigns.

At the moment, three National League teams are apparently unalterably opposed to retaining Kuhn — the New York Mets, Houston Astros and St. Louis Cardinals — and two others, the Cincinnati

Reds and Atlanta Braves, are leaning heavily toward the firing squad.

Under baseball rules, the commissioner needs three-fourths of the votes in each league to have his contract renewed. That means that four votes in the NL or five in the American could trip the trigger.

While the commissioner has his detractors in the American League, principally George Steinbrenner of the New York Yankees and Eddie Chiles of the Texas Rangers, the younger circuit has not shown the same organized movement on the issue as has the National.

This is ironic, since Kuhn, a law graduate of the University of Virginia, served for years as attorney for the National League and it was his adroit

handling of delicate situations — such as the transfer of the Braves' franchise from Milwaukee to Atlanta — that got him his present job.

In fact, it was a then vice-president of the Cardinals, Dick Meyer, who joined the late Walter O'Malley of the Los Angeles Dodgers in leading the sponsorship of Kuhn for the commissioner's office.

Now Peter O'Malley, who succeeded his father as president of the Dodgers, is one of the commissioner's biggest supporters. He is said to be using all his charm and clout in an attempt to turn what appears to be an irreversible tide.

Also, Ballard Smith, who pulls all the strings for hamburger king Ray Kroc's

San Diego Padres, is said to be burning up the wires in attempting to twist some arms in Kuhn's favor.

In the American League, Steinbrenner is regarded as wishy-washy, having at the All-Star game in 1975 joined a hard-nosed core in a "Dump Bowie" plot, only to switch at the last minute. Edward Bennett Williams, now principal owner of the Baltimore Orioles, reportedly has changed his stance from anti-Kuhn to pro-Kuhn and is doing considerable lobbying on the commissioner's behalf.

What is the beef against Bowie Kuhn?

"I don't like his policy of revenue-sharing in baseball," says Nelson Doubleday, board chairman of the Mets. "I have told him so. I have told him that he should not be commissioner."

Another influential NL executive said he thought baseball needed a man to solidify the game, bring the two leagues closer together and improve the rapport between the players and owners.

"Some of us felt in the strike last year that Bowie did wrong in meeting always with the Players Relations Committee and never sitting in with the players so he could get a balanced view of what was going on," he said.

One hangup is that the baseball brass hasn't got a man in the wings. The most talked-of possible successor is Tal Smith, very successful as a representative for the owners in salary arbitrations since being fired by Houston's John McMullen. McMullen is one of Kuhn's severest critics.

Dodgers Take Over 1st From Fading Braves

Here come the Los Angeles Dodgers — oops, there go the Atlanta Braves.

"I could feel the momentum building in Atlanta," said Los Angeles first baseman Steve Garvey, whose Dodgers capped an incredible comeback Tuesday night by taking over first place in the National League West over the fading Braves.

That development was made possible when the Dodgers drilled the Cincinnati Reds 11-3 while the Braves lost a 3-2 decision to the San Francisco Giants. The Braves, who led the Dodgers by 10½ games as late as July 29, lost for the eighth straight game and for the 12th time in the last 13.

They got off to a record 13-0 start and held first in the NL West virtually the entire season before their recent spin, dropping to second only once on April 27, percentage points behind the San Diego Padres.

The Dodgers, meanwhile, were part of Atlanta's nosedive, having beaten the Braves nine straight times, including a four-game sweep in Atlanta at the end of July and another four-game sweep in Los Angeles this past weekend.

"From a dream to a reality" was the way Garvey described the Dodgers' dramatic and sudden ascent to first place.

"As defending world champions, we have something to prove," said Garvey, who hit a two-run homer in the seventh inning Tuesday night, one of two Dodger homers.

"We can't forget San Diego; we can't forget San Francisco, and we certainly can't forget Atlanta," he continued. "But I like our team. I like its chemistry."

"I knew we couldn't let down and now that we are in first place, it's up to us to stay there. We had a lot of adversity early in the season, but now we're playing like the team that people expected."

Rick Monday also homered to back the six-hit pitching of Fernando Valenzuela as the Dodgers, in their incredible run toward the top, gained their 11th game in the standings in the last 12 days.

Giants 3, Braves 2

Milt May lined a home run off Al Hrabosky in the seventh inning to give the hot Giants their ninth straight victory. May's homer gave the Giants their 31st come-from-behind victory of the season and they moved to within five games of first place.

Cardinals 7, Mets 2

Steve Mura hurled a six-hitter for his fifth straight victory as St. Louis whipped New York, Mura, 10-7, struck out four and walked four in pitching his sixth complete game of the season. His last loss was June 28, when he dropped a 1-0 decision to Philadelphia.

The Cardinals scored all the runs they needed in the first inning as Dave Green's two-run single keyed a four-run rally off Mets left-hander Randy Jones, 7-9. Jones retired only one batter before he was removed from the game.

"Mura's major problem has been wildness," said Cardinal

followed with the first of his major league career.

Hernandez needed relief help himself from Dick Tidrow after giving up the Expos' third run on Al Oliver's groundout.

"We have a good ballclub," said Martz. "It's a matter of us getting a few breaks here and there, and that's what's been happening. We're playing free and loose because we've got nothing to lose, while the Expos have everything to lose."

Paterno: PSU To Be Big-Play Team

Penn State Coach Joe Paterno says his 1982 squad is nowhere near as solid as last season's third-ranked team, and he's making a drastic change in style to try to compete with the nation's best.

"We are going to have to be big-play oriented. I don't think we have the consistency to ram the ball down anybody's throat. We don't have the big fullback or the power blockers up front," Paterno said.

Paterno does say he has a "solid nucleus" of skill people back: the quarterback, running backs, wide receivers and one tight end.

"My outlook for the season has to be described as cautious," he said. "There are a number of positions where we're going to just have to wait and see what develops."

Paterno has 32 lettermen,

including 11 starters, returning from last year's 10-2 team that won the Fiesta Bowl against Southern Cal. His major problem, Paterno said, is rebuilding the offensive line.

"We lost so many good football players that I'm not sure how good we can be," he said. "We made progress in the spring, but I'm not sure how much."

Guards Sean Farrell and Mike Munchak were taken on the first round of the National Football League draft, and center Jim Romano and tight end Vyto Kab also went to the NFL.

Paterno is counting upon senior tackles Bill Contz and Pete Spero to anchor the line. Mark Battaglia starts at center, with Dick Maginnis and junior Mike Dunlay or senior Scott Carraher at guards.

Paterno usually goes with an offense aimed at wearing teams down early and wiping them out in the fourth quarter with long drives.

"Now we're going to have to score with big plays," he said. "We have those kind of athletes. But I'm not comfortable with that kind of game. I'm going to have to find out if I can coach that style."

Paterno said tailback Curt Warner is his best ever here. That includes Franco Harris, John Cappelletti, Lydell Mitchell and Lenny Moore. He is going to try and get Warner (1,082 yards last year) and Jon Williams (607 yards) in the same backfield.

He's also high on quarterback Todd Blackledge, a junior, who was inconsistent as a sophomore but still completed 50.2 percent of his passes for 1,557 yards and 12

touchdowns. Blackledge is a fine long passer, but he has to work on the short patterns.

Paterno expects excellent production from wide receivers Gregg Garrity and Kevin Baugh, and tight end Mike McCloskey.

Paterno, the eighth-winningest coach in college football history, has had Top Ten-ranked teams 11 seasons since he took over in 1966. He's had 15 bowl teams in 16 years.

The key defensemen are Roger Jackson and Mark Robinson in the secondary, Walker Lee Ashley at end, tackles Joe Hines and Greg Gattuso, and linebacker Ken Kelley. Punter Ralph Giacomarro averaged 41.3 yards in 1981. Sophomore Nick Gancitano replaces graduated Brian Franco as placekicker.

He has a strong foot but lacks experience.

NFL Apparently Loses Fight To Keep Raiders In Oakland

The National Football apparently has lost its battle to keep the Raiders in Oakland, at least for the 1982 season.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rejected the NFL request for a stay of a lower court ruling earlier this year that allowed the Raiders to right to move from Oakland to Los Angeles.

"The NFL has reached the end of its rope as far as the courts are concerned," said attorney Joseph Alioto, who represented the Raiders in the two-year legal battle.

Jim Hefnerman, the NFL's director of public relations, conceded the Raiders will now begin the 1982 season in Los Angeles at the L.A. Coliseum. However, he added the league would continue to appeal the lower court's ruling.

"It appears that what the court is saying is that they (the Raiders) may move ahead at this point," he said. "The NFL, of course, does not agree that the Raiders should leave Oakland pending ultimate determination of the club's location."

"We will work within the legal process to correct the injustices being done to the Oakland community and the NFL under the currently applicable court ruling."

The NFL's appeal is expected to be heard next spring. The Raiders also face an eminent domain suit by the city of Oakland.

Al Davis, the Raiders managing general partner, who was at the club's Santa Rosa training camp when the decision was issued, made his own prediction about the

NFL's next action.

"They couldn't win in the courtrooms of the United States," he said.

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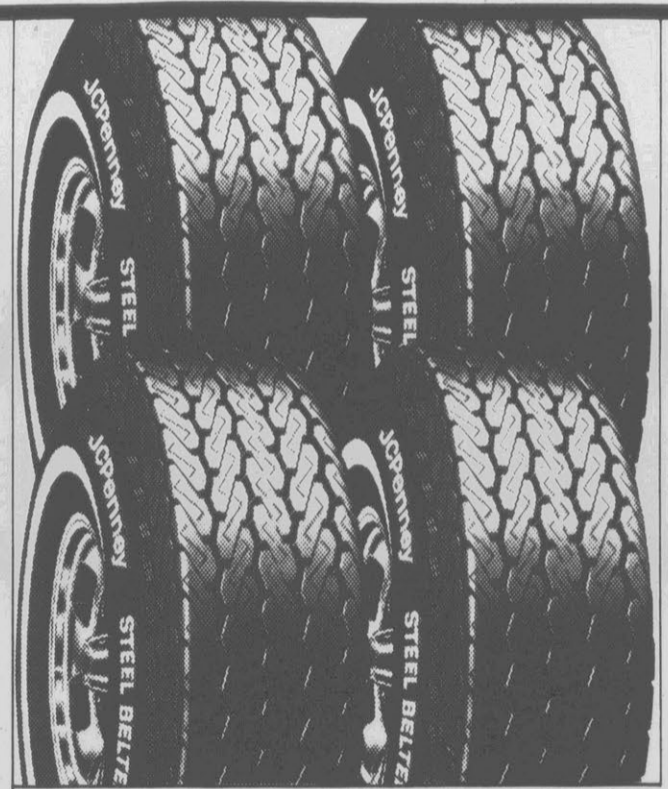
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Floyd Looks For 4th Win Of Season

WETHERSFIELD, Conn. (AP) — Ray Floyd has never broken 270 at the par-71 Wethersfield Country Club. But he likely will have to if he is to win this year's Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open.

With three victories on the Professional Golfers' Association tour this season — including last weekend's prestigious PGA championship in Tulsa, Okla. — the 39-year-old Floyd has been shooting well.

He completed an 8-under-par 272 Sunday to win the PGA and break \$300,000 in winnings this year.

Still, it has consistently taken a lower score than that to win the GHO, played since 1952 on the 6,534-yard course, the shortest and possibly the easiest on the PGA circuit.

Last year's winner, Hubert Green, shot a record-tying 20-under-par 264. Floyd's lowest score, 271, came in 1968 when he finished third behind winner Billy Casper and second-place finisher Bruce Crampton. His 272 in 1974 was good enough for second place and \$22,800 in prize money.

Not since 1967 has a score above 270 won the four-day tournament.

When Floyd tees off Thursday morning, it will begin his 10th appearance in the GHO, which was called the Insurance City Open when he first entered it in 1964. Six times, he has finished in the top five.

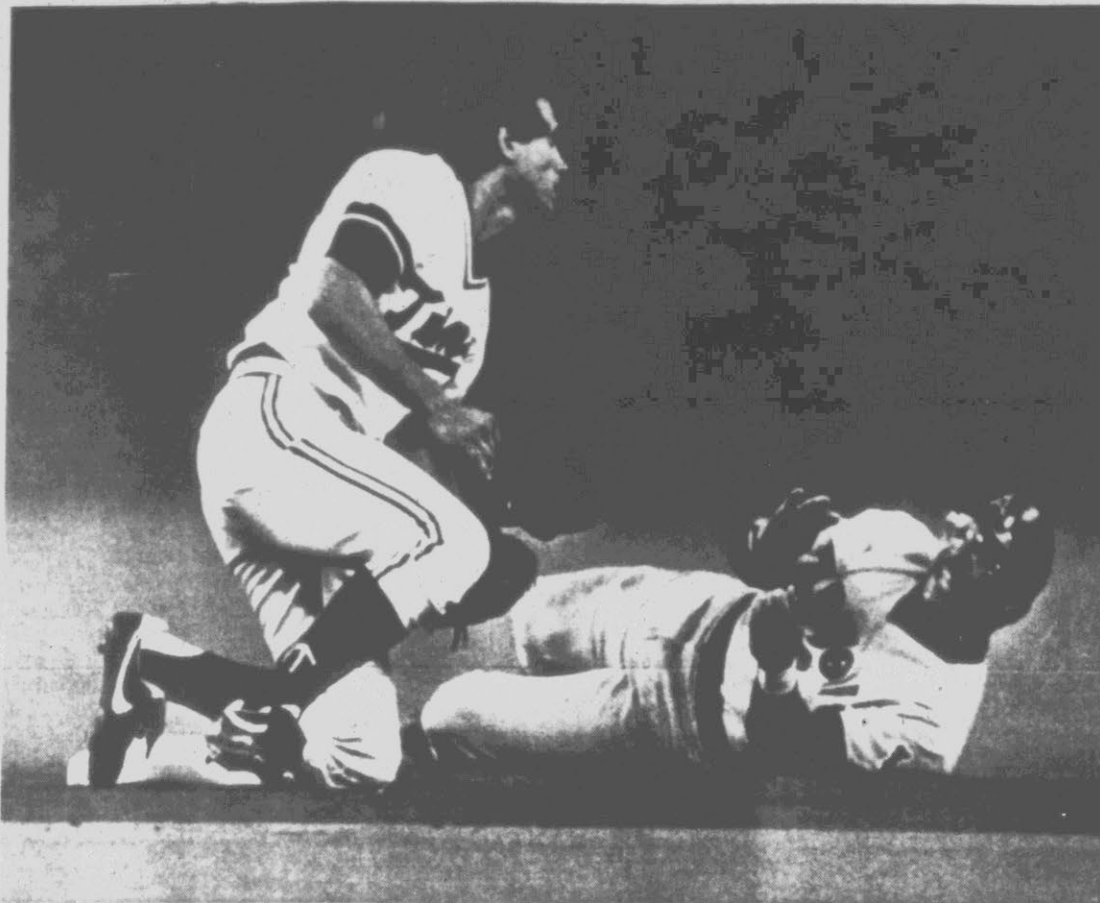
This year, he will part of a 156-golfer field. Among those in contention are five of this year's top 15 PGA money-winners: Calvin Peete, Larry Wadkins, Andy Bean, George Burns and Scott Simpson. Also, eight former GHO winners will compete: Green, Bob Murphy, George Archer, Dave Stockton, Don Bies, Rik Massengale, Bill Kratzert and Howard Twitty.

Many "name" golfers — including Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Lee Trevino, Craig Stadler and Tom Watson — are again ignoring the GHO.

Many pros annually bypass this tournament, considering it less challenging and less lucrative as others on the tour.

But Sammy Davis Jr., who has lent his name and support to the event since 1973, prefers to think of the top golfers who have participated.

"There are guys year in, year out, who come here and played when the total was kind of small," Davis said at a news conference in Hartford Tuesday. "But they've hung in with us. Ray Floyd hung in with us before and now he's not."

States. Now they'll (take) the next step and try to bribe Congress and overturn the court system and have the NFL lawyers rewrite the U.S. Constitution," he said. "We realize the harassment, bad faith and unfair dealing on the part of the NFL will continue."

In 1980, Davis announced he would move the team without approval of other NFL owners to the Los Angeles Coliseum, former home of the Los Angeles Rams.

On May 7, a Los Angeles federal court jury decided the Raiders should be allowed to move on Davis' terms, saying that an NFL rule requiring a three-quarters vote of club

owners to approve franchise transfers violates antitrust laws.

Davis, however, was jubilant over the ruling. "We just hope the Raiders play well in 1982," he said. "We realize the harassment, bad faith and unfair dealing on the part of the NFL will continue."

The three-judge appeals panel, which handed down Tuesday's decision two hours after a hearing on the motion to keep the Raiders from moving, said the NFL "failed to demonstrate that the balance of hardships tips sharply in their favor."

NFL attorney Patrick Lynch told the court during the 1½-hour hearing that "If the

team is moved, it can't be restored. It is comparable to removing the cable cars from San Francisco."

But attorney Moses Lasky, representing the Raiders, argued that the team has sold nearly 50,000 season tickets in Los Angeles and has taken in \$8.5 million.

"If they were forced to come back to Oakland, they couldn't sell 20,000 tickets," he said.

The Raiders' management has announced that the team's first home preseason game will be Aug. 29 against the Green Bay Packers.

Tuesday's ruling comes just two days before the opening of the NFL's first full week of preseason games.

Fourteen games are on tap this week with New Orleans visiting Houston on Thursday, while Cincinnati is at Kansas City and St. Louis will be at Seattle Friday.

On Saturday, it's Buffalo at Dallas, Cleveland at Detroit, Denver at Los Angeles, Minnesota at Atlanta, the New York Jets at Green Bay, the New York Giants at Baltimore, the Raiders at San Francisco, Philadelphia at Tampa Bay, Pittsburgh vs. New England at Knoxville, Tenn., and Washington at Miami. San Diego will be at Chicago Sunday.

In other news, veteran strong safety Bill Thompson of Denver announced his retirement after 13 seasons with the Broncos. He ends his career with a string of 142 consecutive starts.

The Raiders waived 12-year veteran defensive lineman Cedric Hardman, who failed to report to camp, and seven others, including veteran linebacker Don Goode, who was recently acquired from Cleveland.

Miami cornerback Don McNeal will be sidelined about three weeks with a fractured rib he apparently suffered last week in a Dolphin scrimmage, while Green Bay Coach Bart Starr announced that women reporters will be allowed in the Packers' dressing room.

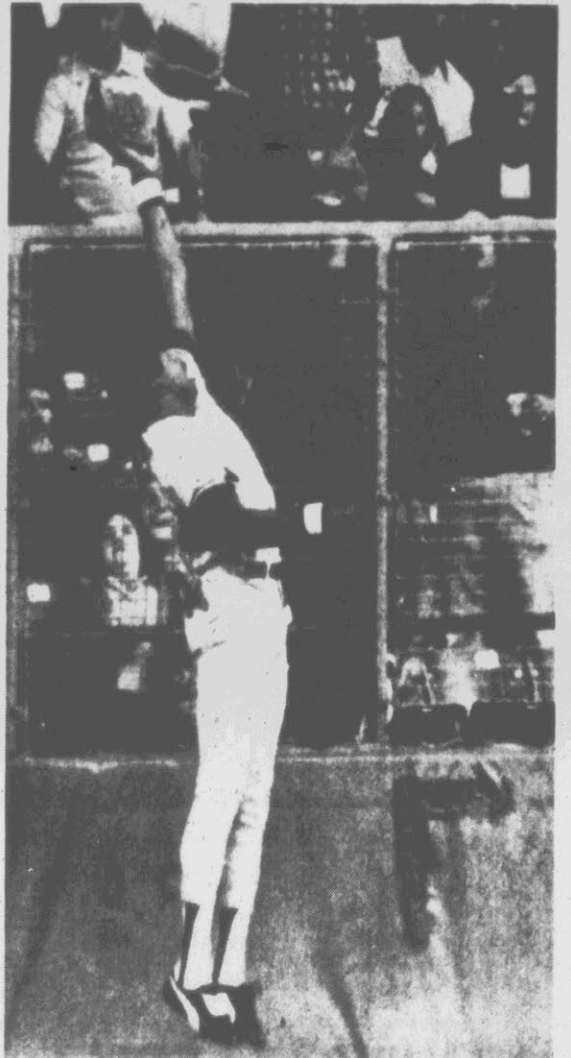

At Georgia Tech, Bill Curry is hoping for some help from one of its best corps of freshmen ever.

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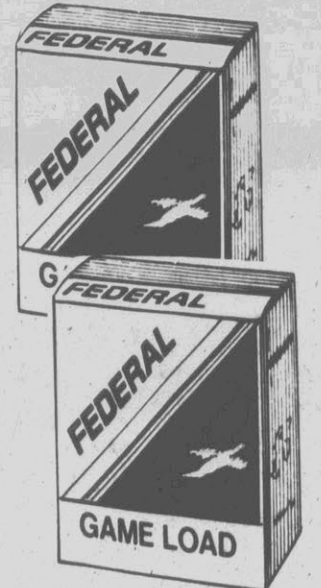

Connors Searching For No. 1 Ranking

TORONTO (AP) — Like an old prospector talking about a lost gold mine, American Jimmy Connors spoke of his search for the No. 1 ranking in tennis.

"If I can win here (at the Player's International tennis championships), in Cincinnati (at the Association of Tennis Professionals championship) and at the United States Open, then I might stake my claim," second-seeded Connors said after his 7-5, 6-4 first-round victory Tuesday night over Australian Pat Cash.

Three other players circulating around the elusive No. 1 spot joined Connors in advancing to the second round of the Canadian Open. Top-seeded John McEnroe dumped fellow American Nick Saviano 6-2, 6-1; No. 3 seed Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia swept American Andy Andrews 6-1, 6-3, and fourth-ranked Vitas Gerulaitis of the U.S., defeated Ricardo Acuna of Chile 6-2, 6-3.

At the moment, the ATP computer ranks McEnroe first, Connors second, Lendl fourth and Gerulaitis fifth (Argentine Guillermo Vilas, who passed up the tournament, is third). However, neither of these players thinks much of where they're rated.

"When I keep winning that's what counts the most — not the computer," said Connors, who is seeking to reclaim the No. 1 spot he held from July 1974 to June 1978 after capturing Wimbledon in June for the first time in eight years.

McEnroe, who hasn't felt comfortable at the top, readily admits Connors has had a better year.

Other seeds advancing Tuesday were No. 8 Steve Denton of the U.S., who swept John Picken of Canada, 6-3, 7-5; No. 9 Tim Mayotte, who beat fellow American David Pate, 6-4, 6-3, and No. 14 Tim Gullikson of the U.S., who eliminated countryman Jim Gurfein 3-6, 6-3.

Andrews Back, Hoping Fans Understand

SUWANEE, Ga. (AP) — Atlanta Falcons running back William Andrews, who will be seeking a fourth consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season in 1982, hopes the fans will understand why he stayed away from training camp for eight days.

Andrews, who reported to camp Monday, had been a holdout since Aug. 1, demanding that the last year of his National Football League contract be renegotiated. The 6-foot 200-pounder, who rushed for 1,301 yards a year ago, reportedly earns about \$250,000 a year.

Falcons spokesman Charlie Dayton said Andrews was fined for missing the first eight days of training camp when he showed up on Monday.

"I missed the sweating part of it, the soreness," Andrews said. "I know that may sound strange, but I did." Andrews also said his decision to report was influenced by a survey done by Falcons General Manager Tom Braatz. It showed Andrews' salary is up there with the top 10 NFL running backs, including salary and performance bonuses.

"I found out they (the Falcons) were more than fair," Andrews said. He said he held out hopes of a renegotiated contract because running backs in the NFL have the shortest career expectancy of all players.

"The first thing people have got to understand is that if they're making \$35,000 a year in some other type job, they can go on making \$35,000 for years and years," he said. "We're only in this game for a short time. When I leave this game, there's no guarantee I can get a job for \$35,000. I hope people understand my position, because I understand theirs. I've got to do as much as I can, when I can."

"You're never satisfied with your salary," added Andrews, who has gained 3,632 rushing yards in three years after being a third-round draft selection out of Auburn.

"You can't put a net worth on ability. But you have to settle for what you can get. But I am satisfied that I've got the opportunity to play and entertain people again."

Andrews' return leaves only wide receiver Alfred Jenkins missing from training camp. The Falcons open their exhibition season Saturday, hosting the Minnesota Vikings.

Meanwhile, the Falcons announced Tuesday that three players had been placed on waivers, lowering the number of players in camp to 84.

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Pryor Says Arguello Fight Means 'Everything'

NEW YORK (AP) — Aaron Pryor hopes the defense of his world junior welterweight title against Alexis Arguello will bring him the recognition he believes he hasn't attained as a champion.

"I'm 26 years old. I've never been beaten. I've never even went the distance in my whole career," he said at a Tuesday news conference announcing the Nov. 12 bout. "To beat a guy like Arguello, especially now, is going to do everything for me that I didn't know I could do. For me, it means everything."

The date of the bout, billed the "Battle of the Champions," was announced by promoter Bob Arum of Top Rank, Inc. The site has not been determined, but Arum said it will be in Miami, Las Vegas or Reno, Nev.

Pryor is guaranteed \$1.6 million for the defense, the challenger \$1.5 million. Both men signed contracts last week.

Pryor said he sees the bout as a way to get a title shot at welterweight champion Sugar Ray Leonard, whose boxing future is in doubt since he underwent surgery for a detached retina in June.

"I want him (Leonard) bad. I want him badder than I want Arguello," said Pryor, adding that Leonard had indicated to him he would return to the ring to fight the winner of the Pryor-Arguello fight.

"He owes me my shot," Pryor said of Leonard for whom he served as a sparring partner. "But, I wouldn't want him to fight unless they said it was OK for him to fight. I wouldn't want anyone to say I beat a handicapped."

Pryor, 5-foot-7 and 140 pounds, is unbeaten in 31 bouts, 29 of those coming by knockouts. He won his title when he knocked out Antonio Cervantz in four rounds on Aug. 2, 1980 in his hometown of Cincinnati.

Pryor was unusually respectful of his Arguello, saying, "It's hard to say anything negative about this guy because he does everything right."

But Pryor later said, "Normally I'm like I am now — full of love. But when it comes time to fight, I'm full of business."

Pryor, a relentless puncher, said the key to the fight will be how well Arguello is able to handle the onslaught.

"The key will be Arguello trying to keep a bumble bee off of him when he's swelling all over," he said. "Can Arguello keep me off of him?"

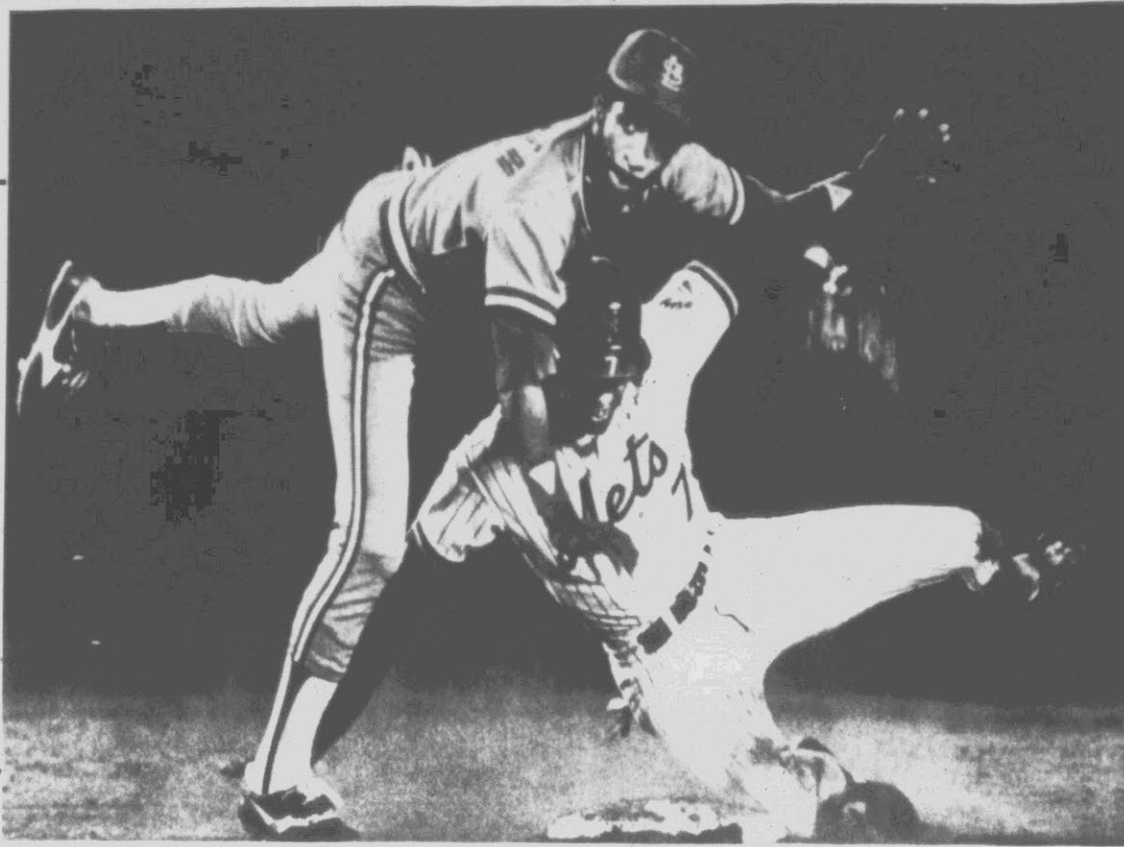
Arguello will be try to become the first man in boxing history to capture titles in four weight classifications.

Arguello, the current World Boxing Council's lightweight champion, also has won the WBA's featherweight and WBC's junior lightweight titles in his 14-year professional career. The King's Bay, Fla., resident, originally from Nicaragua, has a 76-4 record, 61 by knockouts.

Arguello, 5-9 1/2 and 135, said he was dedicating the fight to Henry Armstrong, who failed in a bid for four titles.

Ex-Houston Coach Takes Over For Fired Viridon

Lillis Hopes To Right Astros

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Longtime Houston coach Bob Lillis, handed his first managerial assignment at age 52, believes the struggling Astros have the talent "to make it interesting" in the newly tightened National League West race.

"We still have the talent, we just have to put it together," said Lillis, who was elevated Tuesday after the fifth-place Astros fired Bill Viridon. The Astros made his debut a successful one with a 4-1 victory over the San Diego Padres.

"After what happened to Atlanta last week, anything can happen," added Lillis, referring to the start of an ongoing slump in which the Braves have lost 12 of 13 games and fallen to second place behind the Los Angeles Dodgers.

With the firing, Viridon became the sixth major league manager to lose his job this season.

Manager of the Astros since 1975 — the longest stint in Houston's history — Viridon was relieved Tuesday morning, a day after the Astros lost five games in a row at San Francisco.

Viridon said he plans to return to his Houston home for some relaxation before making any decisions about his future.

The firing caught him by surprise, he said.

"I wasn't expecting it," said Viridon, whose job was reportedly in jeopardy after the Astros were unable to shake off a slow start and an injury siege.

"I'm disappointed, but injuries are part of the business. We lost (relief ace) Joe Sambito two weeks into the season. It wasn't just one thing. We didn't play well early and later

on we started having injury problems. You have to weather those storms, but we couldn't seem to work it out."

Viridon had said in spring training that the Astros had "the best team I ever had in Houston."

John J. McMullen, chairman of the board, said, "We made the decision that the Houston Astros were going to need a new manager next year and in the interest in both the ballclub and Bill Viridon, this seemed to be the appropriate time."

Viridon had helped mold the Astros into contenders after taking over a last-place club that finished 43 1/2 games behind in 1975. Houston finished second in 1979, won the NL West in 1980 in a one-game playoff against Los Angeles and finished first in the second half of last year's strike-caused

split season before losing a three-game playoff to the Dodgers.

Viridon, interviewed at a San Diego handball court, said he accepted the firing as "part of the business. He (McMullen) called about 9 a.m. and said he was going to make a change. He gave no specifics."

Low-key and non-controversial, Viridon has a career mark of 544-522 during stints with the Pittsburgh Pirates (72-73), New York Yankees (74-75) and Houston, where he became the club's winningest manager.

In two separate games against Philadelphia in the memorable 1980 National League championships, the Astros were within one out of reaching the World Series.

Until his firing, he had the most seniority at the same job of any National League manager. That distinction is now shared by Tom Lasorda of Los Angeles and Chuck Tanner of Pittsburgh, both in their sixth seasons.

Viridon said injuries decimated the club's bullpen and "we couldn't close out anyone. The seventh, eight and ninth innings have been misery."

He praised Lillis, a 21-year member of the Astros' organization, as "one of the best people I know and without a doubt the best coach anyone could have."

Lillis was among the original players selected by the Houston Colt .45s, the club's initial name, in the 1961 expansion draft.

Reached by telephone, Lillis said he "surprised" by the managerial change. "I'm still trying to recover. I have deep feelings for Bill. He's a gentleman and a pro."

The 16-year-old high school junior ran away from the competition by a comfortable five shots. Hockaday said consistent putting helped put him in front of the field.

"I was just trying to hit on the greens today, and my putter turned it into a great round," he said. He one-putted the last six holes.

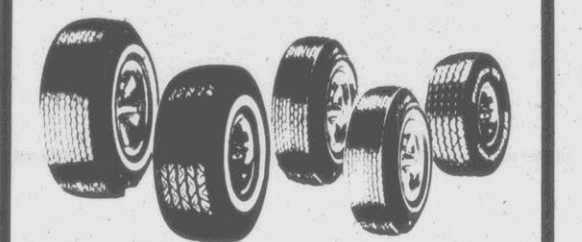

Israel Pervaded By Memory Of Its Dead Soldiers

JERUSALEM (AP) — Yuval Harel loved rock — the Eagles, Moody Blues, Deep Purple.

"They really got him going," says his father. But the curly-haired 19-year-old's dream of pioneering musical videodiscs died with him in the flames of his tank in a Palestinian refugee camp on the third day of Israel's invasion of Lebanon.

The Gai family of Kibbutz Nir Banim lost their son Erez. They phoned their friends Bob and Shelley Wolf in Hollywood Beach, Fla., whose son Zvi lived at Nir Banim and was fighting in the war.

Zvi is fine, the Gais told the Wolfs. A few days later Zvi was killed, too.

More than 320 Israeli soldiers have died in this war. Their black-bordered death notices fill newspaper pages, and their names are read in somber tones on radio and television. Uniformed men go from door to door delivering the news.

They came to the Harel apartment in Jerusalem on Friday, June 11 at 6:10 a.m.

Yuval's father, Yehezkel, answered the ring. He knew the moment he saw the uniforms. His anguished "No" boomed through the stairwell. One of the uniformed men nodded. Neither said a word.

But fate toyed cruelly with the Harels, for another Yuval Harel from Jerusalem had been killed in a tank on the same day. Each family hoped the dead soldier was the other's son. After two days, they learned that both Yuval Harels were dead.

Yehezkel's wife Miriam recalls that her Yuval studied the violin for nine years. He got hooked on rock in Philadelphia, where his fa-

ther worked with the Jewish community from 1977 to 1980. The family moved back to Israel so the son could do his three-year army stint. Yuval carried a big tape recorder wherever he went, even to his army base.

The Harels are typical Israelis — raised on a kibbutz and taught the old Zionist socialist ethic of

helping others. Yehezkel oversees Jewish Agency programs for Jews abroad. Miriam is a teacher. Yuval for three years was a companion to a child paralyzed by muscular disease. There are also two daughters, younger than Yuval.

Their grief is compounded by doubts about whether the war in Lebanon was

justified, and about the military strategy that led to so many deaths.

The Harels visited the Ein Hilwa refugee camp several weeks after Yuval died there in one of the first tanks that tried to pierce heavily defended guerrilla positions.

Yehezkel was stunned by the devastation. The hundreds of homeless

Palestinian children depressed him. So did the explanations he got of how the battle was fought.

He believes the army underestimated its enemy.

"They thought that one armored column would make the terrorists surrender," he said. "They didn't want to bomb the place, but when they saw no other way they

bombed.

"They wanted to be humane, and in the end it was inhumane, and in between Yuval got killed."

"It is a terrible injustice to take away a son," said Miriam angrily.

Yehezkel said he is reserving judgment. If the war destroys the PLO and brings about peace with Lebanon,

"that will be some consolation. If it doesn't, our tragedy will be doubled because the sacrifice will have been in vain."

But no amount of political theorizing can lessen the loss the Harels feel each time they glance at the framed photo of Yuval by the TV set.

"I block my ears and eyes and try not to know," said

Yehezkel. "And each time it gets through to me I am filled with fear. Whenever I think that Yuval is not coming home, I am filled with dread, as though I was in a minefield. My hair stands on end."

"Each time the doorbell rings I jump up thinking maybe Yuval has come home."



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Closets Suited For Medication

CHICAGO (UPI) — The linen closet makes a better storage spot for non-prescription drugs than the medicine chest, says the home service advisor for a Chicago manufacturer.

Pauline Church, of Republic Molding Corp., recommends the closet because most bathrooms are hot and humid. Cooler, drier storage extends the effectiveness of most over-the-counter drugs, she says.

Her other tips for storing medicine include:

—Recap tubes and bottles tightly.

—Don't refrigerate medicines unless the label or your doctor or pharmacist tells you to.

—Discard cotton padding under the lid of pill bottles, but keep the little white disc containing silica gel that is packed in many bottles to keep pills dry.

—Check topical antiseptics such as hydrogen peroxide or iodine periodically. Discard peroxide if it loses its fizz and iodine if it has evaporated and condensed. When that happens, the iodine becomes strong enough to burn skin.

Motorcyclists' Image Changes

LINTHICUM, Md. (UPI) — Contrary to popular stereotypes, motorcyclists today are generally college-educated adults who are more interested in operating economy than in speed and adventure.

A national survey by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation found most respondents are married, think women ride as well as men, and cite reading as their preferred hobby.

Sixty-two percent of the riders surveyed use their motorcycles to get to work.

The study also showed continuing inflation and dwindling fuel supplies appear to be boosting demand for bigger and more expensive motorcycles. Twenty percent of the respondents say they plan to trade in their cycles this year for a machine priced \$1,000 to \$5,000 more than their present ones.

Most said they spend \$450 or less a year on motorcycle equipment, accessories and insurance.

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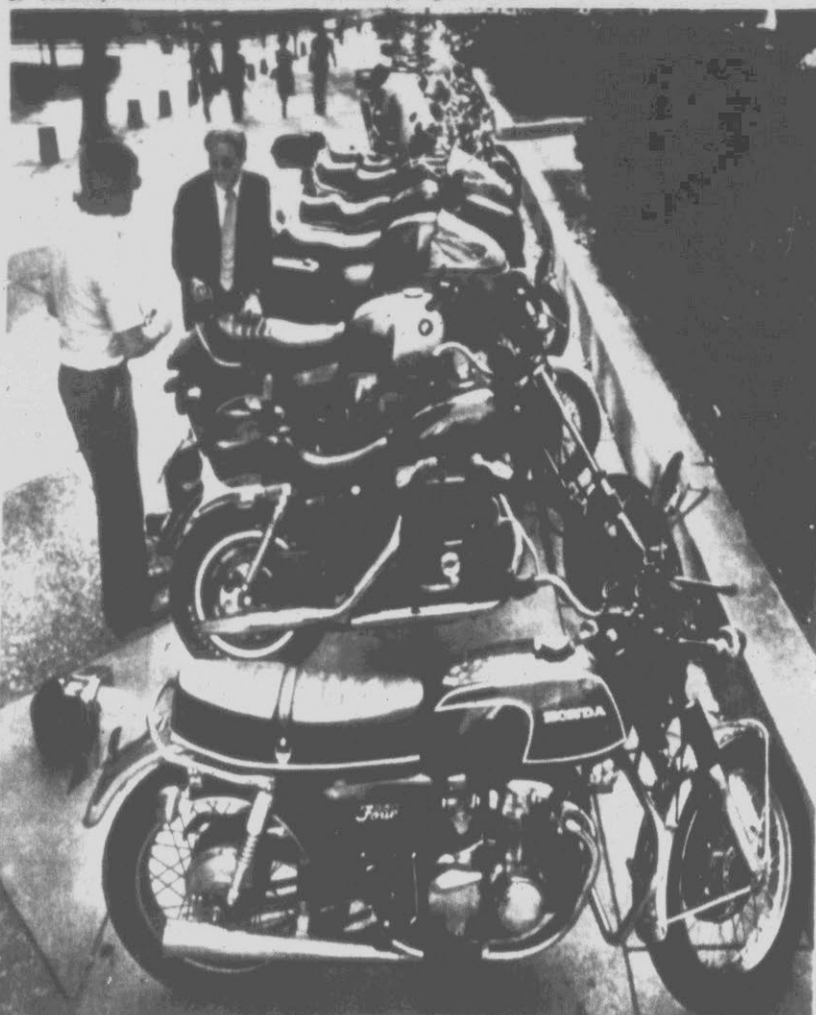

Downtown Block Given To Motorcyclists' Use

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Starting at 7 a.m., a block in the heart of Philadelphia's business district begins filling up with shiny new Yamahas, Hondas, Suzukis, BMWs and even a venerable old Triumph or two.

By noontime, up to 90 motorcycles are crowded on the sidewalk, lined up side by side.

It's not a biking convention, but a regular free parking space for the commuting cyclists, who include

construction workers and computer programmers.

Man and machine co-exist peacefully because the bikers are safe and leave plenty of room on the sidewalk for pedestrians, says the policeman who patrols the area and keeps watch on the cycles.

"The cheapest parking lot in this area is \$6 a day," said the officer, who asked not to be identified. "There are no problems at all with the motorcyclists. Everyone appreciates the right to park here."

A section of the block, on Cherry Street between 16th and 17th streets, originally was designated as a bicycle parking area, but motorcyclists began using it three years ago and the officer got approval from his captain to allow the bikers to park there.

The bikers are required to obey only one rule: no riding on the sidewalk. For the safety of pedestrians, the cyclists push their machines from the street to their parking places.

And the bikers police themselves.

"It's a privilege and we're not going to abuse it," said Bob Burns, 39, a computer programmer from Mount Laurel, N.J.

Burns said he and a few others who use the free parking attach flyers to the bikes periodically to warn newcomers of the prohibition against riding on the sidewalk.

Soccer Is Fine For Slight-Of-Stature

NEW YORK (UPI) — The slight-of-stature youngster can still be a star athlete if he or she picks soccer. Shep Messing says.

Himself, he started out to play football.

But his high school abolished its team and he switched to soccer to stay in shape for baseball and basketball.

Now the goalie of the indoor New York Arrows, former star of the Cosmos, Messing preaches soccer for young people with messianic fervor.

"To play soccer," he says, "you don't have to be six-foot-six. You don't have to weigh 250."

"Forget physical stature," he says. "You can throw that out the window."

"Whether you're fast or slow, tall or short, it doesn't matter. Some of the greatest players have been of different physical molds. It's whether you can control the ball, make it work for you. If you can, you have a chance to be an excellent soccer player."

the kids are going to run and touch the ball. The kid with the least skill gets the ball at least for that moment.

"But kids are free to develop without the pressure they get from parents in other sports. There's not so much the pressure, say, of striking out with the bases loaded."

Messing says soccer is a sport for today's generation. It is growing, both in junior clubs across the nation and in schools.

The young soccer player can expect to continue in the sport in college. The National Collegiate Athletic Association lists more college soccer teams than football teams — 520 to 485. Soccer programs have been added by 177 member colleges since 1975.

Messing's advice to the young player:

"Don't work on your strengths. Work on your weakness. If you're right-footed, work on kicking the ball with your left."

Phil Kibler, 37, of Media, admitted he rides for fun, but noted he also saves money.

"It's cheaper than paying \$100 a month to ride the train," said Kibler, a computer programmer for Girard Bank who has already logged over 15,000 miles commuting on his Honda 125S.

Kibler said three days of commuting, a total of 105 miles, costs him only \$1.85 for gas.

"There's no transportation short of shoes or a bicycle that would get me here any cheaper," he said.

It is part of his preamble to soccer clinics he conducted this summer as part of the Chase Soccer Cup in which 16,000 boys and girls competed from the 70 clubs of the Long Island Junior Soccer League, the nation's largest.

Soccer means fitness more than most other sports, Messing says. "It's the number two sport in the world in terms of physical and cardiovascular fitness."

He says cross country skiing is first. What about running?

"Running, sure. I hate to run. It's boring. But if you put a ball in front of me, I'll run all day. If I have to run six miles on the field chasing that ball, I love it."

"You have to be in shape to run and run intelligently."

"It's also an equal opportunity sport," he says. "All

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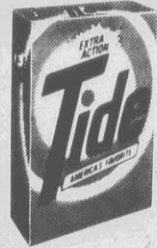
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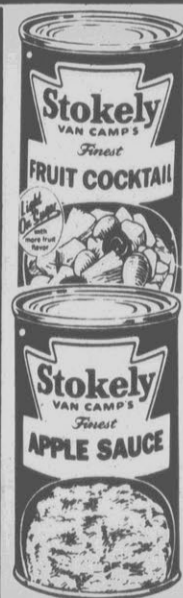

Another Pilot For McLean Stevenson

NEW YORK (AP) — Just as America seems to be losing interest in space flight, CBS comes along with "The Astronauts."

It's a half-hour "comedy special" — another name for a pilot that probably won't become a series — that's destined nonetheless to become a footnote in TV history as another attempt to find a prime-time home for McLean Stevenson.

Indeed, the scriptwriters have given the best lines to Stevenson, who's done a basketful of series for CBS and NBC over the last decade. One remark — made in response to a question from his boss — may even be

present: "I can handle it," Col. M.C. Booker assures. "If not, there's always my brother's shoe store."

Stevenson made a name for himself as Lt. Col. Henry Blake, the commanding officer in CBS' "M-A-S-H," starting in 1972. After four seasons, he set out to make it on his own.

"The McLean Stevenson Show" on NBC lasted only

four months. "In the Beginning" on CBS barely made it four weeks, and "Hello, Larry," also on NBC, didn't catch on, either.

CBS will broadcast "The Astronauts," starring Granville Van Dusen as Capt. Roger Canfield, Brianna Leary as Jennifer Tate, and Bruce Davison as David Ackroyd, tonight at 8:30 EDT.

Canfield, Ackroyd and Ms. Tate are astronauts aboard an earth-orbiting vehicle, and Stevenson's character — Booker — is "your friendly capsule communicator" in Houston.

Booker follows the astronauts' activities on a television monitor 16 hours a day with their knowledge, and the remaining eight without it. That's supposed to

be hilarious — tune in and find out why Jennifer chews her pillow, or what Roger tells his private, recorded diary.

The fact is, Booker overhears conversation that is seldom more than mildly amusing, like:

Roger — "What in God's name did you do to your pillow?"

Jennifer — "Who are you, Mike Wallace?"

Or:
Roger — "I was doing something personal."

Jennifer — "Well, four weeks is a long time."

Roger — "I was recording my private log."

The program includes the requisite naughtiness — Roger slaps Jenny on the seat with a vacuum brush as

she tries to do her yoga exercises, David asks his female colleague, "Can a mouse get Herpes?" The latter presumably is in the script for the adult audience, while the slapstick, one would guess, is for the kids.

The last part of the show is consumed in a tedious game of charades, as Booker tries to appease the astronauts who are disgruntled by his non-stop snooping.

TV has tried the astronaut theme before — "I Dream of Jeannie" ran for five seasons on NBC, into the fall of 1970 — as well as the spacehip setting. But, as Booker tells his inquiring boss when his colleagues-in-orbit hide to avoid the peeping eye, "You can't really compare us to 'Star Trek.'"

M-A-S-H And CBS Top Nielsons Again In Week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "M-A-S-H" and CBS, two perennial winners in the prime-time ratings race, soared to another win for the week ending Aug. 8, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed.

The CBS medical comedy, which is going off the air next year after 11 seasons, scored a rating of 21.3 — a full point ahead of "Too Close for Comfort," its nearest competitor. Nielsen says that in an average minute of the show, 21.3 percent of the television-equipped homes in the country saw at least part of "M-A-S-H."

In all, CBS had six shows in the Top 10. It was another first-place victory for CBS, which won the ratings race for the past season.

CBS had a rating of 13.2, ABC was second with 12.7 and NBC was third with 10.4. The networks say this means in an average prime-time minute, 13.2 percent of the nation's homes with TV were tuned to CBS.

Most of the favorites were

veteran series, and the only rookie in the Top 20 was NBC's "Gimme a Break." The time-tested series in the Top 10 were "M-A-S-H," CBS' "The Jeffersons," third place; CBS' "60 Minutes," fifth; ABC's "Three's Company," sixth; ABC's "Fantasy Island," ninth; and CBS' "Alice," 10th.

Other finishers in the front rank were CBS' "Trapper John, M.D.," in fourth place, CBS' "House Calls," seventh, and ABC's "Hart to Hart," eighth.

Although NBC failed to place a single show in the Top 10, the network dominated the Emmy Award nominations, including another 21 for "Hill Street Blues." The critically acclaimed police drama was

NBC's highest-rated show last week, placing 14th. NBC's rookie series "Fame" grabbed 12 Emmy nominations.

Despite the nominations, NBC had the five lowest-ranked shows: "Chicago Story," "Nashville Palace," "One of the Boys," and two specials, "NBC Major League Preview" and "The Game and Its Glory."

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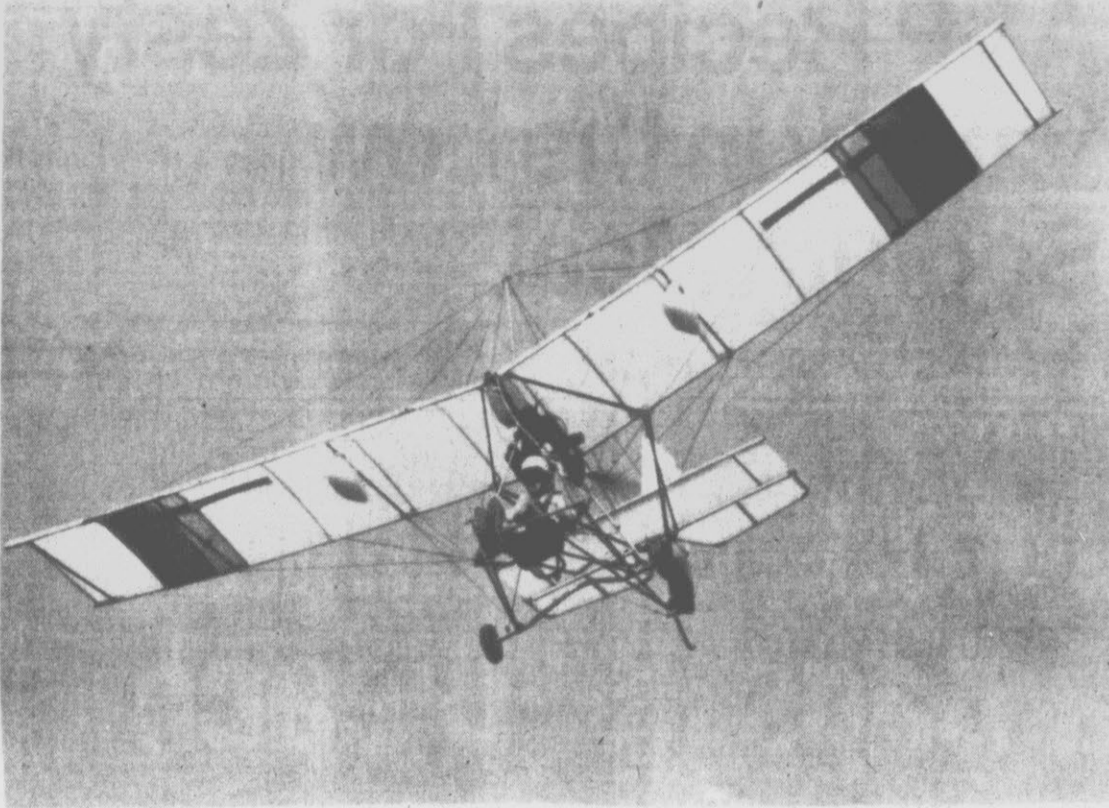
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Ultralight Private Airplanes Enjoy A Booming Popularity

LAKE ELSINORE, Calif. (AP) — The hottest thing in private planes today looks a lot like a spiffy new version of the flying machine Orville and Wilbur Wright took aloft at Kitty Hawk 79 years ago.

And many of those who fly ultralights — colorful little open-air planes built of aluminum tubes, guy wires, Dacron and snowmobile engines — seem to yearn for the barnstorming days of silk scarves and biplanes.

The booming popularity of the unregulated sport is forcing a reluctant Federal Aviation Administration to impose at least some rules on ultralights, probably within the next few weeks.

Ultralights often weigh no more than their pilots. They take off from unimproved beaches, meadows and even lakes. Many ultralights are stored in garages alongside the family car.

You have to keep your feet up when you take an ultralight along the runway, and once you're in the air, flying feels more like riding an airborne motorcycle than piloting a plane. When banking into a turn, if you turn your head and look down, there's nothing there: no walls, no glass, no cockpit — only air between you and the ground.

It is an exhilarating way to fly and that, plus the relatively low cost, probably accounts for the thriving ultralight industry — while conventional airplane makers are facing hard times.

"This is a lot more fun (than a conventional plane) — with the wind blowing in your face and being able to go where you want and land wherever you want," said Lyle Byrum,

president of Eipper Aircraft Inc., which claims nearly a third of the ultralight market.

"I haven't seen too many kids who don't look up when an airplane flies by," said Dave Selair, who publishes the magazine "Ultralight Flyer" in Tacoma, Wash. "People have always wanted to fly and they are discovering that they can do this and they can afford it."

At a recent ultralight airshow at Lake Elsinore, a busy if informal ultralight playground 70 miles southeast of Los Angeles, ultralights arrived on pickup trucks, car tops and modified boat trailers.

The planes are usually sold as kits, and costs range from about \$3,500 to nearly \$6,000. Conventional aircraft start at well over \$20,000 and cost much more to store, maintain and operate.

"This is where aviation is going. Aviation was dying before this," said Byrum, who delights in airshow aerobatics, leaving red trails from smoke grenades as he puts his black ultralight through loops, swirls and spinning dives.

Though ultralights are primarily recreational, Byrum said they are beginning to go to work, especially in developing countries, as crop dusters and for checking fences and cattle. He has put together a booklet proposing a military ultralight — camouflage-colored and brimming with weapons and cameras.

Six years ago, Byrum said, only two ultralights were known to exist. Now well over 20,000 of the little planes are scattered around the country and much of the world.

Though about half the ultralight owners are reported to be licensed pilots, no license is required and the little planes require no federal inspection or certificate.

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Crime Spree In Soviet Is Being Told

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet court called it a story of indifference, incompetence and cowardice — of men who failed to defend women who were being raped, of citizens who aided criminals and of police bungling.

Two Soviet men were sentenced last week to death and a third to prison for 15 years for robbing six stores, committing a series of assaults, raping two women, torturing and robbing an old woman of her funeral money and murdering a man.

The Communist Party Central Committee newspaper *Sovietskaya Rossiya* (Soviet Russia) told of their month-long spree of violence in an article that was unusually detailed for a crime report in the Soviet media.

The article by Deputy Prosecutor M. Gusev and reporter I. Pyrkh included rare public criticism of the police. It also reported a "drunkard" agreed to sell the criminals' stolen goods in exchange for vodka, and a taxi driver took them where they wanted to go in exchange for money.

Gusev and Pyrkh gave this account:

V. Yefremov, a 29-year-old who had just finished his second prison term, went to work in a mine, tired of the labor, robbed an apartment and returned to Orel, his hometown 180 miles south of Moscow.

There he befriended E. Maslenkin, and the two committed several robberies. attacked a militiaman and stole his identification card. Then they moved to Kharkov, in the Ukraine 400 miles southwest of Moscow, where they posed as police and robbed two more apartments, including that of the old woman whose savings for her burial they stole.

A short time later, they hooked up with 20-year-old A. Valuyev in the nearby city of Kaluga, used him in two more thefts and obtained a sawed-off rifle in the city of Bryansk, 210 miles southwest of Moscow, from another ex-convict.

After several more robberies of stores and individuals, the trio boarded a crowded bus for Tula. The driver reported that Yefremov approached him holding the rifle and warned him: "Don't turn around. Don't stop or honk your horn. I have enough bullets for everyone."

Maslenkin ordered the passengers to "get your money ready."

"Your gold also," said Yefremov.

The men robbed the passengers, beating those who resisted. Yefremov raped two women in the back of the bus while Valuyev helped hold them down and Maslenkin held the gun on the driver. The male passengers sat "frozen by fear."

The trio eventually left the bus, hid out overnight and reached Tula on another bus in the morning. Their victims had given the police a description of them, but the police did not act on the information and took more than three weeks to put out the alarm for them.

Meanwhile, the three men went to Moscow, then returned south to Bryansk. There they robbed two more stores and shot and killed a villager who spotted Yefremov's gun and tried to disarm him. Three men who were nearby fled, "abandoning" the victim.

Police spotted the men in a taxi, closed in on them by helicopter, and they surrendered.

Despite the official view that socialism is eliminating the causes of crime in the Soviet Union, a series of articles in the past year have denounced crime and corruption and castigated citizens for not defending each other.

Another newspaper reported in March that a young woman was stabbed to death in her Moscow apartment while her neighbors disregarded her cries for help and failed to call the police in time to save her.

Dutch Face Muskrats In Water War

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP)—A turn-of-the-century scheme to drape Europe with fashionable fur coats has backfired in the Netherlands and evolved into the latest battle in the centuries-old Dutch war to control water.

The enemy forces are hundreds of thousands of muskrats whose North American ancestors were imported to Europe for their sleek fur.

But because of declines in the market brought on by the Great Depression, many escaped their fate on the furrier's cutting table.

Their descendants are now running wild, burrowing through the vast inland system of dikes, dams and canals here and lowering productivity in the below-sea-level agricultural areas the Dutch call "polders."

The threat posed by the renegade rodents has spawned — with typical Dutch bureaucratic complexity — a government committee to fight muskrats.

Spearheading the battle, estimated to cost more than \$4.2 million this year, is the Muskrat Working Party, headed by technical engineer Bernard Litjens.

Litjens, for whom "exotic animals are my hobby," develops muskrat control techniques for an army of 200 government trappers. Last year alone they caught 140,000 marauding muskrats — one for every hundred inhabitants in this nation where agriculture is a major industry.

Through another incentive program, private bounty-hunters are getting \$2 for every muskrat pelt they turn in.

It was back in 1905, according to Litjens, that the Austro-Hungarian Count von Colloredo-Mansfield decided muskrat coats could become the latest fashion rage. He imported five of the aquatic animals from Canada to breed them for their fur in what is now Czechoslovakia.

Muskrat-breeding spread to Belgium and France in the 1930s. But the Great Depression intervened, knocking the bottom out of the fur business, and untended French and Belgian muskrats escaped from the fur farms to forage for themselves, Litjens said.

The hungry herd gradually spread north, and in 1941 muskrats made their first recorded appearance in the Netherlands.

The network of canals crisscrossing the country provided a hospitable breeding environment for the fecund furbearers, as well as ample quantities of their favorite food, aquatic plants.

The muskrats dug their burrows in the land bordering canals and dikes, with their entrances under water.

Even though the number of muskrats caught by government trappers has tripled since 1974, said Litjens, "The rate of damage is still going up. The muskrat is undermining the land."

Part of the problem is the fertility of female muskrats, capable of bearing 18 offspring a year.

One of the solutions being worked on by the muskrat task force is a bait which would attract the odor-sensitive muskrats to central trap locations, according to Wilco Doude van Troostwyk, who heads the Agriculture Ministry's wildlife management department.

The problem is particularly severe at present in the Southern Dutch province of North Brabant, according to Litjens, where a damage survey is currently being conducted.

However, across the border in Belgium, there are still lots of muskrats — known locally as "water rabbits" — but few lowland waterworks and no muskrat problems.

Considered a delicacy, they grace the menus of fine restaurants.



Haunted By False Arrest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It's been almost 14 years since Bill Garretson was jailed by mistake in the bloody killings of actress Sharon Tate and four other people, but the painful memories linger.

"It's something I'd really just rather forget," said Garretson, now 32, who spent several days in jail before being exonerated by a lie detector test.

"It took me a while to get readjusted. It took me a few years. Then, finally, I just got back to normal. The ordeal I went through out there, it wasn't pleasant."

Garretson was 18 years old on Aug. 14, 1968, when he was awakened by a knock on the door at the guest cottage of the Benedict Canyon estate, where he was working as a caretaker.

The estate was the site of five gruesome slayings which Charles Manson and three women later were convicted of committing.

When Garretson answered the door, he found three police officers pointing guns at him.

"I had a few hitchhiking tickets against me, and that was the first thing that entered my mind," Garretson said. "I saw the cops and I went, 'uh-oh.' They told me to get my hands up in the air. They threw me down on the patio and handcuffed me."

"I kept asking what was wrong. They told me to shut up and that they would show me," Garretson said in an interview from his home in Lancaster, Ohio, published last week in the Los Angeles Herald Examiner.

Garretson was shown the stabbed, shot and mutilated bodies of pregnant actress Miss Tate, coffee heiress Abigail Folger, hairstylist Jay Sebring and Polish movie producer Voityck Frokowski and, in a parked car in the driveway, that of Steven Parent, an acquaintance who had come to try to sell Garretson a clock radio.

"I kind of like went into shock," Garretson said. "I didn't know what to think. It was like waking up to a nightmare."

The youth was under suspicion because he was staying in a cottage only a few dozen yards from the house, yet heard only the sound of a barking dog.

He was held in jail for several days. "The officers, when I was walking to take the polygraph, said to each other, 'Hey, there's the guy who killed those people.'"

Garretson was released after he passed the lie detector test. The case was resolved several months later when a member of the so-called Charles Manson family, Susan Atkins, was jailed on a minor violation and told a cellmate about the murders.

Manson and three female followers, including Ms. Atkins, were convicted of the Tate slayings.

Garretson returned home to Ohio, but has been back in Los Angeles three times to testify in court. He lost a false imprisonment suit against the city.

He said he has a vacation from his job at a glass manufacturing plant coming up soon, "and I don't think I'll be taking it in Los Angeles."

Video Games Reduce Anxiety

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — Video games have been cited as helping to reduce anxiety in teen-age cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy, according to a researcher at Rhode Island Hospital.

Jorge L. Rickard-Figueroa, a post-doctoral fellow in psychiatry and behavioral medicine, said questionnaires revealed three cancer patients who played the games had about a 50 percent drop in vomiting, nausea and general discomfort from anxiety about chemotherapy.

Rickard-Figueroa said that in trying to lessen his patients' worry about the treatment, "I tried to think of the most distracting thing I could. Video games seemed to be the best choice."

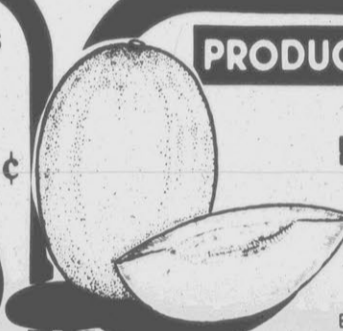

Police Horse Fate Earns Tear Deluge

By MARK S. SMITH Associated Press Writer LONDON (AP) - Scotland Yard pensions its two-legged veterans, but its horses are shot when they get too old to work.

The disclosure that four-legged police vets end up in cans and not in green pastures has brought a deluge of protests to newspapers and radio stations. Officials of the Metropolitan Police, as Scotland Yard is known officially, say they're getting "weepee" phone calls by the hundreds.

The furor was touched off by one man's reaction to the outburst of public sympathy for horses injured in the Irish Republican Army bombing in Hyde Park July 20.

The Hyde Park bombing was one of two that day in which 11 people were killed. Seven horses of Queen Elizabeth II's Household Cavalry were also killed or had to be destroyed, but four injured horses survived, including Echo, a police mount being ridden by an escort for the cavalrymen.

Gifts of apples, sugar lumps, flowers and money have poured in for the equine invalids, and they have become fixtures on newspaper front pages.

The lavish attention angered Ron Kirby, 50, a former Scotland Yard detective who joined the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals after his retirement.

"What if Echo does not sufficiently recover from his injuries to resume normal duties?" He wrote The Standard, London's evening newspaper. "The Metropolitan Police policy is to slaughter all their horses on the day they cease to be useful. I think it's disgusting."

"These animals have given their whole lives to the service of humans and the police force. I think I am expressing the feelings of the entire British public when I say it is outrageous and disgraceful."

"Rewarded - With Death," said the caption over a picture in The Standard of two children petting a policeman's mount. The paper reported that the army sends its old horses to an animal sanctuary in Buckinghamshire.

"Gun Death Awaits Bomb Hero," said a headline in The Daily Express.

The Daily Mail said that even in violent New York City, police horses are allowed to graze their lives away, not shot.

Scotland Yard confirmed that horses considered no longer fit for service are sent to a slaughterhouse in Surrey which shoots them, pays the police about \$170 a carcass and uses the meat for pet food. Twelve horses met this fate last year.

But a Yard spokesman insisted that horses were only put to death after they were unable to handle even light duty.

"They would not be happy in a field being put out to grass," he said. "They have never known that kind of life. All they have really known are the stables and police work."

"Horses continue working until they are no longer fit to do so and to keep them alive would be cruel," said Acting Chief Supt. George Fleming, head of the police mounted division.

"They are put down in the presence of an officer with no less rank than an inspector."

"Police officers love their horses. When they are put down, tears are shed."

Scientists Hail Rat Poison

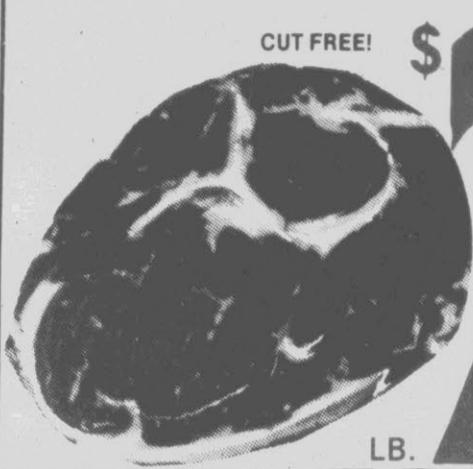
LOS ANGELES (AP) - A new rat poison, which makes male rats sterile in small doses and in larger portions can kill, may be important in fighting the disease-spreading rodent, scientists say.

The compound Epibloc, licensed by the Environmental Protection Agency, should reduce the risk that surviving rats will breed and develop a strain that is immune to the poison's lethal action - a common problem with rat poison.

The compound was developed by scientist Ronald J. Ericsson after it proved too toxic for his original goal: a human male contraceptive.
