

## Polish Police Killed Two Demonstrators

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Police dodging bricks and firebombs fired on a crowd of demonstrators in the town of Lubin Tuesday, killing two and wounding 12 in the most violent incident marking the second anniversary of Solidarity, the official PAP news agency said today.

In Warsaw, mourners fashioned a cross of spent tear gas canisters today and placed a red banner with a black stripe and a piece of paper above it reading: "To the memory of those killed in Lubin August 31."

Thousands of Poles responded to the calls of their underground leaders Tuesday and staged demonstrations in a least a dozen cities in a massive show of support for the suspended union.

PAP said 600 people were arrested in Warsaw during the protests, 645 in Wroclaw and 100 in Szczecin. Western diplomats said Polish officials told them between 65,000 and 75,000 people took part in the protests, and that 136 policemen were hurt. No overall figure on civilian injuries was available.

Meanwhile, the wife of interned Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said after visiting him that he "was not of the opinion to turn out in the streets and fight. But the workers know that the law is not respected (by the authorities) and workers should fight with the appropriate measures." She did not specify which measures would be appropriate. Mrs. Walesa spoke to a reporter in Gdansk.

The report by PAP on the deaths in Lubin was the first announcement of fatalities in demonstrations Tuesday. They were the first deaths caused by clashes between police and protesters since the early days of martial law last December.

PAP said three of the 12 wounded in Lubin were hurt seriously. Eleven police officers and one volunteer police reservist were also reported hurt.

"Investigations so far show that firearms were used because of the aggressive behavior of the crowd, who were attacking the (government) forces with gasoline bombs, stones and bricks," Warsaw radio said in a report monitored in London.

Lubin, in southwest Poland about 40 miles from Wroclaw, was not mentioned in earlier reports about the rioting. It is a

copper-mining town of 67,000 people, where few incidents of unrest have been reported previously. Authorities responded to Tuesday's deaths by imposing an 8 p.m. to 5 a.m. curfew on the town's youths and an 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. curfew on adults.

Similar curfews were reimposed in Wroclaw, Dzierzoniow, Bielawa, Klodzko and Swidnica, official sources said.

Warsaw radio, meanwhile, said police had arrested a "terrorist group" planning "political murders" in Katowice, southwest Poland's coal capital where protests were also reported Tuesday.

"In the apartment of one of the group's members... police found methodical instructions on killing people with specially devised bullets," the radio said.

The broadcast said the arrests were "terrifying evidence of the increasing ruthlessness" of political opponents.

The radio said the group planned to execute officials in

public, sabotage state facilities and provoke demonstrations and riots by Solidarity members who failed to accept their conspiracy.

The state media hinted at a new crackdown by Poland's martial law regime, saying Poles will have to "pay" for the defiant demonstrations in support of Solidarity.

Tens of thousands of Poles, answering the call of Solidarity's underground leaders, went into the streets, braving concussion grenades, tear gas and water cannon fired by riot troops.

In Warsaw, an estimated 10,000 demonstrators marched to within a mile of Poland's Communist Party headquarters before riot police turned them away. The police called in army troops with automatic weapons to help guard the building.

## U.S. Demands Freeze On Settling In Arab Land

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin today called an emergency Cabinet meeting after receiving a strongly worded demand from President Reagan to freeze Jewish settlement on occupied Arab land.

The meeting was set for Thursday.

Israeli officials who refused to be identified said in addition to a demand for stopping settlements, the Reagan letter called for the West Bank to be linked directly to Jordan in a peace treaty. They declined to go into detail.

Under Labor governments in Israel before Begin took over in 1977, there had been talk of making the West Bank a kind of "province" of Jordan to head off formation of a separate Palestinian state in the West Bank.

Reagan's demand came in a letter to Begin Tuesday. It was presented as the president's "thoughts" as he prepared a major foreign policy speech, and contained "a clear and unequivocal" demand to freeze Jewish settlement primarily in the occupied West Bank of the Jordan, Israel radio said.

Begin interrupted his vacation in northern Israel to deal with the affair. Reagan's letter was also expected to come up in Begin's talks with Defense

Secretary Caspar Weinberger who was arriving here later today.

The radio said the message surprised and angered Israeli officials. The Reagan administration has criticized Israel's settlement policy as an obstacle to peace but has never issued such a forthright demand that it be abandoned, the radio said.

The radio quoted the officials as calling it "a total departure" from the Camp David accords governing the Mideast peace efforts. Israel insists that the 1978 accords do not bar further Jewish settlement in the occupied territories.

The radio said the Israelis were offended that the message reached Begin as the last Palestinian guerrillas were leaving Beirut, because the timing could be read as linking the PLO, Israel's arch-enemy, to the peace process.

Science Minister Yuval Ne'eman, speaking for the ultra-rightist wing of Begin's coalition, said Israel should respond by annexing the West Bank and stepping up Jewish settlement there.

An estimated 25,000 Jews live in about 80 settlements in the West Bank, and a few hundred in the Gaza Strip. Some 1.3 million Palestinians live in the territories.

Ne'eman's Tehiya (Re-naissance) Party joined

Begin's coalition in July after winning a promise to move 6,000 more Jews into the occupied territories in the coming year and build seven more settlements.

But Tehiya was rebuffed in its demand for \$120 million in additional settlement funds, which the treasury said it could not afford. Budgetary considerations, heightened by the cost of the Lebanon war, have become the major factor in preventing more large-scale settlement.

Zvi Rafiah, an expert on U.S.-Israeli relations, said the Reagan message may have been designed to offset the impression gained during the Lebanon war that Washington was pro-Israel.

Rafiah told Israel radio: "This message wants to say: Gentlemen, the war in Lebanon is over. We have told you, privately and publicly, that we intend to solve the Palestinian problem in all its aspects. We see the settlements as an obstacle to peace. We beg of you, while we are working out a resumption of peace talks, don't create facts that contradict our views."

The radio said Reagan wrote in his message that unless Israel accepted his demands, negotiations on autonomy for the West Bank and Gaza could not be revived.

Ne'eman claimed the demand was aimed at "nullifying" Israel's victory over the PLO in Lebanon "by putting pressure on us in another way to get out of Judea and Samaria (the West Bank)."

ABC News in Washington said Reagan was planning to warn Israel "by move to annex the West Bank or Gaza would touch a crisis of massive dimensions." White House spokesman Larry Speakes said he would have no comment on that report.

The Camp David accords outlined a plan for five years of self-government for the Palestinians in the occupied territory, after which their final status would be settled in negotiations involving Israel, Egypt, Jordan and the Palestinians. Past U.S. policy has favored some sort of confederation of the territory with Jordan as an ultimate solution to the problem.

## Holiday Inn Has Been Sold; Plans Changes

Greenville's Holiday Inn on Memorial Drive is under new management after being sold last month.

The former owner of the motel, Mark Daley Jr. of Rocky Mount last month sold the motel to Caro Hotel Associates. According to the tax stamps on the deed registered in the offices of the Pitt County Register of Deeds, the sale price for the motel was \$3 million.

At the same time Caro Hotel Associates and Caro Hotel Realty Inc. deeded and leased the Greenville facility to Newport News Service Co.

Jim Smith, the new manager of the Holiday Inn since August 13, said today that the nominal owners of the motel, Victor Management Co. of Hampton, Va., presently operate 12 other Holiday Inns, including motels in Kinston, Goldsboro, Elizabeth City, Nags Head, Virginia and in Western North Carolina.

A native of Selma, Smith has been involved in hotel management for the past 10 years, and has been with the Victor firm since March.

"We plan to do some renovations ... add meeting room facilities within the next year." He also said plans call for beginning Sunday buffets in the restaurant and live entertainment in the lounge.

The Holiday Inn, built about 18 years ago, has been expanded several times, and now features a Holiday, which includes an indoor pool and other recreation facilities.

## Greenville Among Leaders In N.C. Bldg. Permits

Greenville was one of 11 cities in North Carolina recording more than \$2 million in building permit values in April, according to state Labor Commissioner John Brooks.

He said that permits totaling \$2,666,933 were issued here during the month, while the total for Greenville for the first four months of 1982 was \$5,594,270.

The April figure in Greenville compared with \$1,325,629 recorded in March, Brooks said. Totals for the first three months of 1982 here amounted to \$2,927,337.

In Pitt County, construction authorized during April totaled \$2,811,152, including \$517,030 for 11 single-family units, \$110,000 for four multi-family units, \$1,932,046 for 22 non-residential units,

and \$252,077 for 55 additions and alterations. The April total was up from \$1,516,176 in permits issued in the county in March.

Brooks said the state's largest cities authorized 2,926 new construction units in April, down 24.1 percent from 3,857 last April, and a 12.8 percent decrease from March's 3,355.

Estimated value of the construction, at \$80,697,412,

dropped 19.9 percent from last April's total of \$100,721,738, and 27.2 percent from the \$111,541,932 recorded in March.

Permits for single-family homes, at 558, declined 25.3 percent from 747 in April of 1981. Value, at \$23,058,127, dropped 26.4 percent from \$31,308,352.

Brooks said that compared to last April, the average

construction cost for a single-family home fell 1.4 percent, to \$41,323 from \$41,912.

Building values for April and for the first four months of 1982 included: Elizabeth City, \$246,047, \$2,751,097; Goldsboro, \$3,285,749, \$6,380,124; Jacksonville, \$2,036,176, \$7,359,897; Kinston, \$1,665,688, \$2,032,062; New Bern, \$1,028,348,

\$2,033,073; Roanoke Rapids, \$112,760, \$908,101; Rocky Mount, \$574,773, \$3,993,739; Tarboro, \$157,900, \$10,390,640; and Wilson, \$969,820, \$5,788,701.

Raleigh led the 44 reporting cities in value with \$12,845,092 during April, followed by Charlotte with \$12,398,245, Winston-Salem with \$7,959,571, and Greensboro with \$6,218,017.

## Ponder Cuban Motive

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department says Cuban jamming of at least five AM radio frequencies in the United States is another example of "Cuban disregard for international agreements and the rule of law."

The department declined to speculate about Cuba's motives but the broadcasts appeared to be related to an administration proposal for the establishment of a Florida-based station, Radio Marti, to broadcast to Cuba.

The Cuban broadcasts Monday night caused an outcry among the affected American stations. General Manager Abe Barron of WHO of Des Moines, Iowa, said, "This is the first firing in a radio war that the State Department has taken so lightly."

Music and both Spanish and English propaganda were heard on American stations ranging from Fort Lauderdale, Fla. to Salt Lake City, Utah.

In a statement late Tuesday, the State Department said the Cuban broadcasts were on several new frequencies, including some never mentioned by Cuba in a proposed plan that was rejected by an international broadcast conference held last fall in Rio de Janeiro.

"This is unfortunate evidence of continuing Cuban disregard for international agreements and the rule of law," the statement said. It added an American response to the Cuban action is under consideration.

The statement said Cuban jamming and interference has been going on for over 15 years and that Cuba attempted to stir up social unrest in the United States during the 1960's through a so-called Radio Dixie.

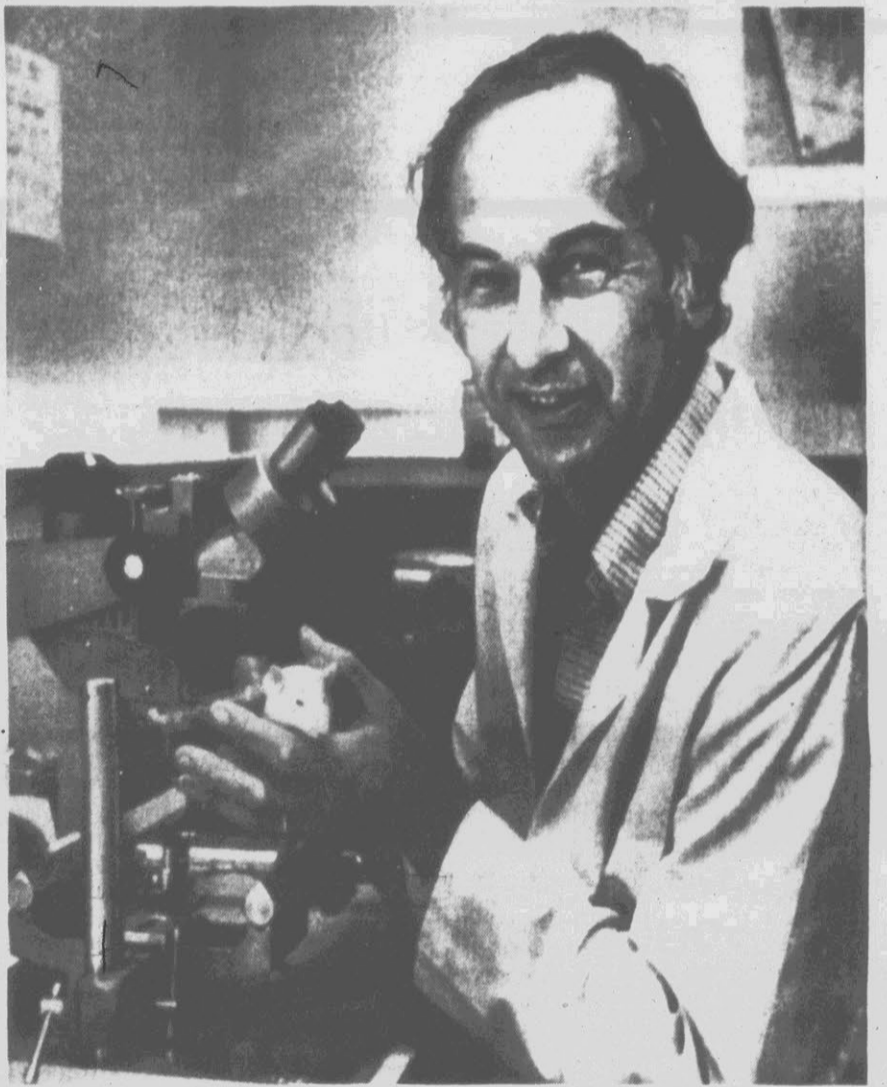
"The problem of Cuban interference, which is now assuming national proportions, needs to be addressed as a separate issue from Radio Marti," the statement said.

In New York, an informed diplomatic source said Monday's broadcast would not be repeated immediately and was meant as a "test and a warning" to demonstrate the interference the broadcasts could cause in the United States.

## See Big Steps In Brain Transplant

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The discovery of a natural chemical the brain uses to repair itself should boost rapidly-expanding research on partial brain transplants that might someday be used against neurological diseases and injuries, a psychobiologist says.

"The reason all this sounds far-fetched is because people think about (transplanting) the whole brain, instead of just a part of it," said Carl Cotman of the University of California-Irvine. "We're just trying to repair or replace a nick in the brain. Given that, I don't think it sounds so eerie."

In a series of experiments in which a portion of rats' brains were cut away and replaced by brain tissue transplanted from unborn rats, Cotman said his group found growth factor proteins that "help the brain's repair capacity and help the graft survive."

The growth stimulant, its existence long suspected, apparently is produced in direct response to injury and peaks in concentration three to six days after tissue is

surgically removed, he said in an interview.

"More of the neurons that we transplant stay alive when we put them in after a delay (to catch the peak). They grow out very vigorously and they make many of the connections that had been lost" through removing the original tissue, he said.

That finding should help other researchers now experimenting with transplants, Cotman said. Growth factors, if isolated and purified, might even be inserted with transplants to improve success, he said.

The research, which also involved Ellen Lewis and Manuel Nieto-Sampedro of UCI and a UC-San Diego team headed by Silvio Varon, Marston Manthorpe, Stephen D. Skaper, Gilles Barbin and Frank M. Longo, was reported in the Aug. 27 issue of the journal Science.

Cotman speculated that years from now treatment with growth factors might be tried to stop or slow progressive brain deterioration, such as in some forms of senility.

Researchers around the world are proving they can transplant a piece of one

animal's brain into the brain of another. The new tissue usually survives and often automatically hooks itself accurately into the brain it is joining. The result in many cases is the correct, though seldom full-scale, production of vital hormones.

The peculiar nature of the brain all but eliminates the problem of rejection, which bedevils most organ transplants, and Cotman said the surgical technique "is not terribly difficult."

Cotman, a major figure in such research, said some scientists have even found they can inject brain cells into an animal's brain and "they definitely become part of the (brain) tissue. They migrate to the correct positions and, as far as people can tell, they do all right. It really is the stuff of science fiction."

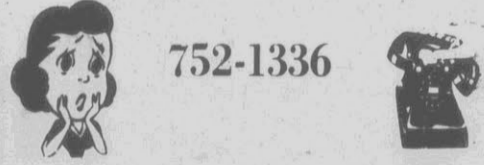

# Knowing Needs Is Key To Her Success

NEW YORK (UPI) — Award-winning handbag designer Magda Makkay's workroom at the back of a manufacturer's showrooms has the intimate clutter of an artist's studio.

Cloth and leather are her media. An old sewing machine, a cutting board, bolts of material and scissors, her tools.

In that room Ms. Makkay spends long hours plying the skill she learned in pre-revolution Hungary at her mother's insistence.

She learned to make handbags from scratch — something she considers important because a handbag on paper is quite different from the finished product.

"Designing skills here — these kids don't know anything. They can make me a pretty sketch," said Ms. Makkay, who judged a show at the prestigious Fashion Institute of Technology a few years ago.

The handbag business can be frustrating for designers. Success doesn't come easy for those who take the traditional path rather than getting into handbags after international success as a clothing designer.

Ms. Makkay said she makes many bags for Baron Handbags that might not move well, "but usually, you get one or two that are really hot and that's enough for a really good season."

Her most popular design is four seasons old and still going strong. It's a soft nappa leather satchel with four zippers on the side that open into spacious compartments. The gathered top snaps shut. An attached leather change purse is inside.

"At first they thought at the factory that it used so much leather, it would cost too much to make," she said.

But at \$80 retail, they can't make enough. In addition to leather she is also making it in a dark striped velour, to retail for \$26.

Another variation for summer and resort wear is in nubby linen with red, blue and green stripes accented with four nappa leather zippers.

"I know the needs of women," said the sprightly 5-foot-1-inch blonde. "Big bags are in demand — but they need to be organized."

There's also a smaller, two-zipper version of the satchel bag, a colorful carpet bag of brown, beige and gold for fall and, for evening, a satin-ribbon striped hobo bag of red, green, magenta, yellow, aqua, purple and white.

The showroom also contains a beautiful collection of snakeskin clutch bags with intricate patterns. Ms. Makkay said she doesn't make them anymore because "it's a dying trade really. I couldn't find anyone to do it and I had to make them myself."

She usually makes models in New York, then sends them to the factory in Florida for mass production.

Ms. Makkay fled Hungary to the United States in 1956. She knew little English and had no relatives here. But with her training and the help of the Pocketbook Local Workers Union she got her first job with Koret handbags.

Admitting only to being in her late 40s, Ms. Makkay is proud winner of an American designer award from the Leather Industries of America for her organizer bag that has been copied around the world.

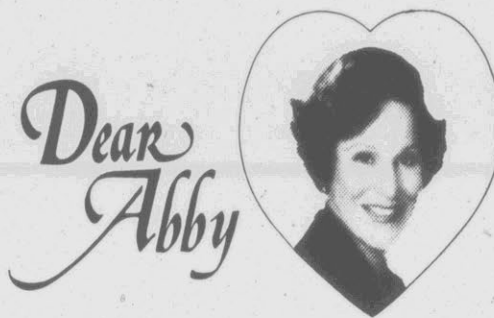

# Labor Day Barbecue: Broiled Cornish Hens

For one of the last barbecues of the season, you might enjoy broiling cornish hens over charcoal. When we decided to do just that, we used a Japanese-style sauce for marinating the hens, brushing them during broiling, and as a dip when they were served. The combination was delicious.

Serve the hens, if you like, with rice. For a salad we suggest garden lettuce plus blanched fresh soybean sprouts dressed with light-flavored sesame oil and rice wine vinegar.

**CHARCOAL-BROILED CORNISH HENS WITH TERIYAKI SAUCE**  
1/2 cup soy sauce  
1/4 cup dry sherry  
1/4 cup water  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 tablespoon minced fresh ginger root  
1 large clove garlic, minced  
4 fresh cornish hens (each about 1 1/4 pounds), halved  
Stir together soy sauce,

sherry, water, sugar, ginger root and garlic. Pour over hens and refrigerate, turning every half hour, for about 3 hours.

Charcoal broil over medium-hot coals, brushing occasionally with some of the marinade, until tender and brown — about 15 minutes on each side.

Heat remaining marinade and pass as a dipping sauce. Provide lots of paper napkins.

Makes 4 to 8 servings — 1 or 2 halves per portion.

Note: If the marinade is stronger than you like when you use it for the dipping sauce, dilute it with a little chicken broth or water.

Place cups in an 8 by 8 by 2-inch cake pan. Pour enough cold water into the pan to come up about as high as custard mixture. Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven

until a knife inserted halfway between edge and center comes out clean — about 45 minutes. Cool cups in a pan of cold water. Chill. At serving time, with a small spatula loosen edges; invert on serving dishes. Pass extra coffee liqueur as a sauce. Makes 4 servings.

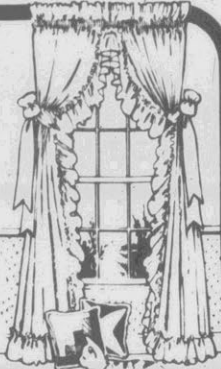

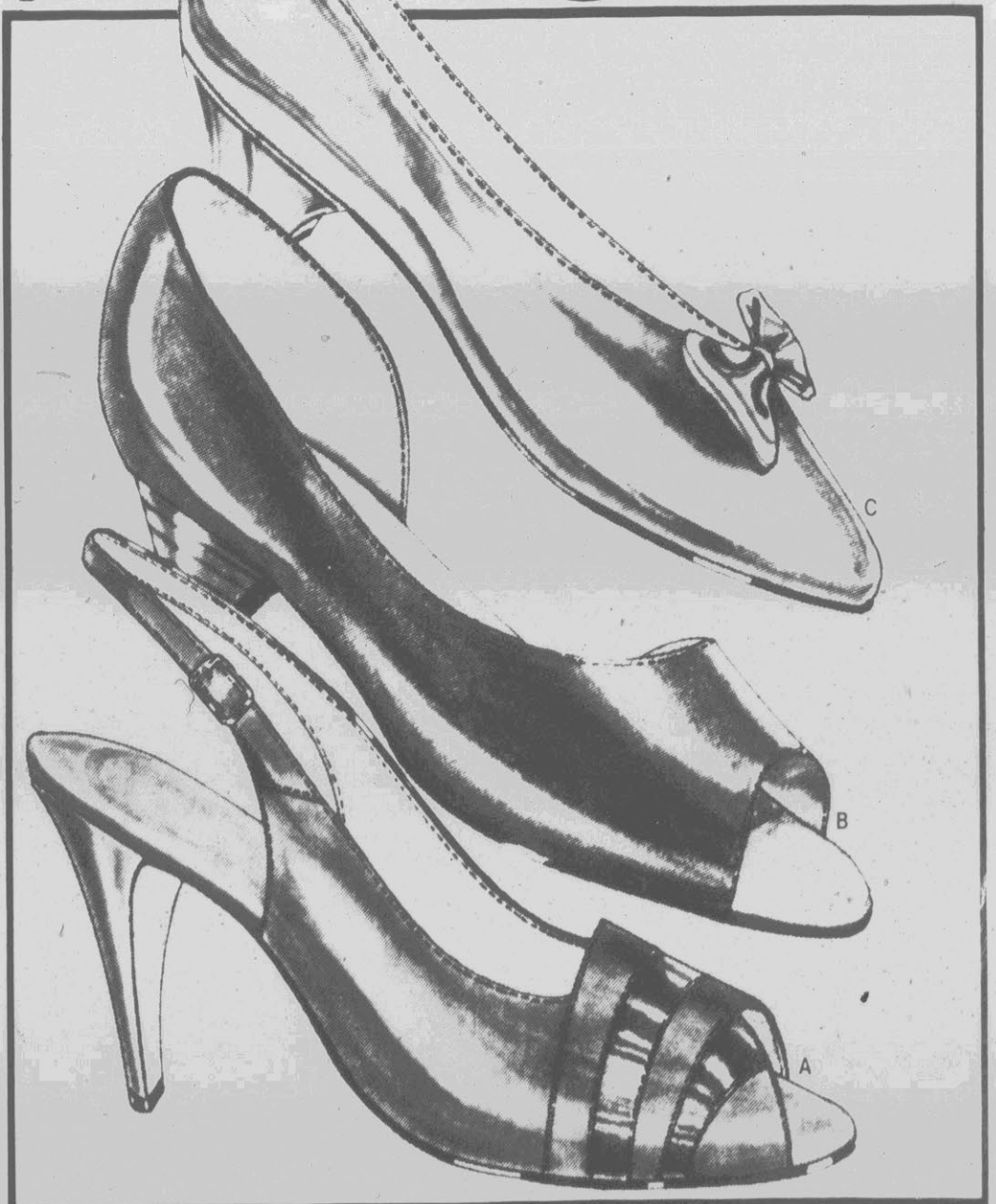

# A Time For Quality

A recent study released by the Institute of Government at UNC-Chapel Hill predicted that 90 percent of the public schools in North Carolina will experience a decline in enrollment during the next 10 years.

Charles D. Liner, who authored the study, said the drop in school enrollment followed the decline in birth rate which occurred in the late 1950s and from 1969 to 1965.

Liner cited the women's revolution, the pill, delayed marriage and women's careers as some of the causes for the falling birth rate.

"Substantial changes in school population will have a marked effect on how state and county governments allocate money for teachers, school building construc-

tion and other expenses," Liner said.

The decline in school enrollment has long been predicted and, indeed, is already showing up in many school systems. It will mean changes in the numbers of teachers hired, school buildings constructed, and sometimes in academic programs offered.

The situation, however, also offers our state the opportunity to make changes which could truly improve the quality of education. For decades we have been running just to keep up with a steadily growing student population. Those pressures may be off for a time and we might be able to use some of our resources to provide better individual instruction for the students we have.

# Hardships At The Grassroots

NEW YORK (AP) — The letter was from a business consultant in Dawson Springs, a town in southwestern Kentucky. "We deal closely with many farmers and small-businessmen and they are both in desperate financial condition," it read.

From El Paso, Texas, came another letter. "I am being wiped out by high interest rates," the writer said. And from York Springs, Pa., a business person wrote: "My costs are going down and sales are going down."

A business person in Grand Rapids, Mich., wrote to say that "The housing and building material industry is all but destroyed here ... material purchasing at a trickle due to job insecurity and interest rates. Believe me, our industry (nationwide) has about 90 days left and then no one will be able to buy and pay. It's a damn shame!! HELP!!!"

Every three months the National Federation of Independent Business surveys a cross-section of its more than 500,000 members, all of whom consider themselves to be in that ubiquitous category "small business."

Whatever their business, members are at the front lines in the battle of the economy. They manage their affairs closely, often handling the books themselves. They know their customers. They know their communities.

They know their minds, too, and they aren't reluctant to share a piece of them, which they often do in written comments accompanying the survey questions.

From Pasadena, Texas: "1. Interest rates — horrible. 2. Quality of available sales — woefully inferior. 3. Lots of available bodies but no one wants to work! 4. Cannot compete with large sales organizations in same field because they are content to operate on 5 percent margin of profit due to the fact that salesmen are just order takers and can't really sell!"

# Covert Sign Of A Strain

WASHINGTON — The first covert signs of bureaucratic strain between Secretary of State George Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger followed Weinberger's forthright Aug. 23 comment over NBC's "Today" show that a Palestinian state next to Israel would be no "threat" to Middle East peace and security.

That departs from the super-cautious Shultz line, uttered the previous day on "Meet the Press," that he could not even endorse the concept of Palestinian self-determination, which he called the equivalent "of a Palestinian state." "I'm not going to bite on that one," he said.

Weinberger, often the burr under the saddle of for Secretary of State Alexander Haig because of his extemporaneous foreign policy comments, upset old colleague Shultz with his Palestinian-state formulation. He saw no reason there could not be "proper" guarantees and cross-guarantees for Israel and a Palestinian state living side by side.

Some friends of both Shultz and Weinberger say that despite years of close association in the Nixon/Ford administrations and later at Bechtel — with Shultz always top dog — they bear little love for each other. Whatever the love level, last weekend lowered it.

Reagan's Sales Pitch  
President Reagan pulled out all the emotional stops in selling his tax increase bill to recalcitrant Republican House members, even invoking the memory of her dead husband to one congresswoman who had taken his place.

"John would have wanted you to vote for this," Reagan told Rep. Jean Ashbrook of Ohio. She was elevated this year to complete the term of Rep. John Ashbrook, who died in the midst of his campaign for the Senate. In fact, John was a conservative stalwart who put conviction ahead of loyalty, running a symbolic campaign for the 1972 Republican presidential nomination because he felt President Nixon had strayed

from conservative principles. His widow voted no on the tax increase.

A footnote: The greatest heat in the presidential hot-box was applied to Rep. Trent Lott of Mississippi, the House Republican whip. Lott attended Rep. Jack Kemp's original meeting of tax rebels but wound up supporting the tax increase vigorously after presidential pressure was applied.

Promise Or Threat?  
In an unpublished conversation several weeks ago with a top Israeli political figure, Bashir Gemayel, the new but beleaguered president of Lebanon, bantered about his plans for Major Haddad, the Christian Phalangist leader in southern Lebanon backed by Israeli money and arms.

Asked what he would do about Haddad after he was elected president, Gemayel said that was a secret, then added that he "might send him to our embassy in Washington as the military attaché."

Some American officials worry that Haddad may prove to be as much a problem for Gemayel, who is also Christian, as he has been the past several years for the outgoing Lebanese government. Haddad's armed forces have greatly expanded since the Israeli occupation of southern Lebanon, the territory along the Israeli border in which Haddad's power was based on Israeli support. Sending him to Washington, these U.S. officials believe, might not be a bad idea.

Reagan-Kemp Reunion?

In the heat of the House debate on the billion-dollar tax-hike bill, White House chief of staff James A. Baker III sent a note to chief antagonist Rep. Jack Kemp, leader of conservative Republican anti-tax-hike forces, with this postscript: "When are you and Joanne going to play tennis with me and Suzy?"

The come-on, obviously, had no impact at all on the course of Kemp's anti-tax battle against President Reagan and Baker. But Baker followed it up with a phone call from Air Force

# THIS AFTERNOON Someday Valuable

Usually, yard sales, flea markets and auctions are of little or no interest to me.

My theory on yard sales always has been that they're mainly a way to get rid of stuff that's piled up in attics over the years.

Flea markets, in my way of thinking, fall somewhere between a yard sale and a legitimate auction, and again they're something to be avoided because they're often dealing in junk or stuff that nobody wants.

Auction sales, I will concede, are a cut or two above yard sales and flea markets.

Mostly, people of my acquaintance I hear talking about auction sales have been bitten by the antique collection bug. They go to these sales with eternal high hopes of coming across the priceless treasure.

It so happens a sister and brother-in-law of my wife are inveterate attenders of auction sales up and down the East Coast. They've even gotten on a first-name basis with some of the folks who travel around the country conducting these sales.

Anyway, my wife and I went with them last Saturday to an auction sale at Hillsborough. And, it was, for me, an eye-opener.

This sale appeared to me to be an auction of various odds and ends that a variety of people might have collected in a lifetime.

The point is, though, that the longer I sat and watched the progress of the sale, the more amazed I was at two things: The taste of the American public and the price that anything old will bring.

I, absolutely, was stunned

at some of the prices paid for items I would consider strictly run-of-the-mill. Afterwards, I went home and even located two or three things I believe would have brought good prices at that day's sale.

To show how easily I could be fooled, the auctioneer put on the block one of those automobiles for kids that you pedal. It appeared to be of a vintage that was around when I was growing up. It probably sold originally for \$15 to \$25. I guessed it might go for \$85 to \$90 but the bidding started at \$200 and it eventually sold for \$650.

Another one, of a later vintage and not in as good condition, sold for \$350.

A little cast-iron play-toy automobile sold for \$35.

A Columbia bicycle with wooden rims — they were just phasing out when I came along — went for around \$300, as I remember. A high-wheeler bicycle of the 1800s sold for over \$1,000.

A collection of five framed sets of automobile emblems sold for more than \$1,400 and a solid brass floor lamp — shade and all — covered with a filigree design was bid in at around \$1,300. A large music box sold for \$1,400 and a spool thread cabinet like you used to see in the stores, in excellent condition, went for close to \$500. Two Sinclair Dino glass emblems for gas pump tops sold for around \$150.

An assortment of lamps, including railroad switch lamps, brass headlights off old automobiles, carriage lights and little black lanterns like I used to have as a kid went from \$100 on up.

A peanut vendor's wagon brought \$350 and a Blue Horse notebook paper

wrapper — the kind you bought at the dime store for 10 cents a pack — sold for \$2.

When the auctioneer was through selling inside, he moved outside to auction a variety of gas and steam engines, horse carriages and automobiles, some of them antiques.

The collecting of old gas and steam engines, it seems, is a current fad, and a group sold from \$400-\$500 each on up. The horse carriages and buggies with any fancy stuff at all commanded prices around \$1,000. Prices on the automobile varied, or course. A beautiful little 1965 Mercedes convertible sold for \$10,000. A 1973 Lincoln sedan, by contrast, brought

# Police Shooting Victim Said Denied Mental Hospital Care

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A man killed by a Raleigh police officer he allegedly attacked was denied admission to a mental hospital less than 24 hours before he was shot, officials say.

Meanwhile, the shooting victim's sister said Tuesday that Phil S. McLean's death was the result of "police brutality." Raleigh police chief Frederick K. Heineman refused to say Tuesday whether patrolman Lynn C. Howard had acted correctly.

A member of the Raleigh City Council said Tuesday he may call for an independent investigation of the shooting.

"I have not formulated an opinion yet," said the Rev. Arthur Calloway. "But the area of suspicion would be greatly reduced if there were an independent investigation."

Howard shot and killed McLean after McLean attacked him with a knife Monday, police reports said.

McLean was rejected for admission to Dorothea Dix Hospital less than 24 hours before the killing. Dr. Frank Highly decided that McLean was not dangerous to himself

or others and could be treated better as an outpatient, said hospital spokesman Mabel Horney. Geraldine Barber, McLean's sister, said her brother was given an honorable discharge from the Air Force after being diagnosed as a schizophrenic. But she said he had never harmed anyone and was not considered by his doctors to be dangerous.

"All he had was a knife — a little, small, dull knife," said Mrs. Barber. "He could have been shot in the leg, anywhere."

"I think that it was downright brutal," she added. "That's just police brutality."

McLean, described by his family as mentally unbalanced, was killed in a Raleigh rooming house early Monday.

Police were attempting to arrest McLean after reports that he threatened another boarding house resident.

When police arrived, McLean crawled out on a roof and began throwing broken glass at officers below. He then re-entered the

room through the broken window.

Two policemen went downstairs, and Howard was left alone in the hall. McLean approached Howard with a knife, and Howard shot him six times, reports said.

Howard, 24, who has been assigned to administrative duty while the shooting is probed, has been with the department for 2½ years.

When asked if Howard could have fled the boarding house to await help, Heineman said: "There are a lot of

variables in a case like that. Could he (Howard) have run out of the house?"

Heineman asked rhetorically if police should have abandoned McLean and "take the chance of letting him loose on the public."

"Sure we could have done that, but I don't think that's what they pay us for," he said.

Calloway said he would meet with Heineman today to discuss the case. Calloway said that, while he didn't know the details, he was

### A Life-Saving Study

Today the American Cancer Society launches the most extensive cancer study ever made. During the next six years, it will monitor more than a million Americans in a search for links between the disease and factors such as diet and the environment. Research is extremely important, because, in 1982, one American will die of the disease every 73 seconds. Seventy years ago a cancer victim had little hope but, by the 1940s, thanks to research, one in four was still alive five years after treatment. Today the ratio is one in three and the odds are improving. Research projects like the one that begins today may someday eliminate the second-leading cause of death in the U.S.

eased somewhat the breach opened between him and anti-tax Reaganaut stalwarts in the House. The veto, on grounds of unacceptably-high domestic spending, would tend to move Reagan back to the path of orthodox Reaganomics.

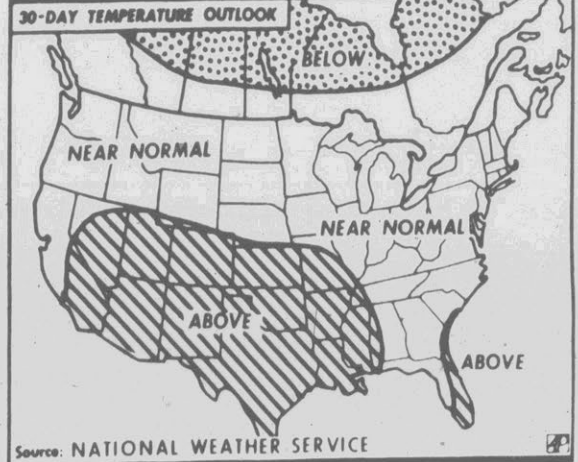
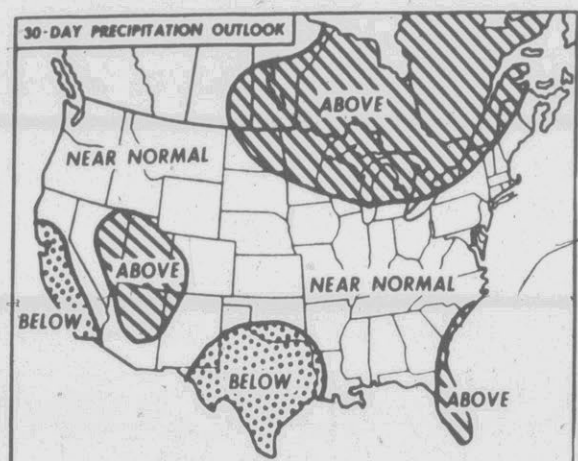
### Pipeline Panic

U.S. failure to bring its European allies to heel in the great Siberian gas pipeline battle has persuaded some hard-liners in the Reagan administration that the U.S. should find a graceful exit that would let the French, British and other Soviet suppliers of American-licensed pipeline equipment go ahead and deliver the equipment to the Soviet Union.

Reaganite insiders believe that this soft approach would lead to U.S.-European rapprochement on other crucial matters involving future East-West trade. A graceful backdown by Reagan, they think, would set a new mood in Europe for greater cooperation.

But backing down, even from the apparently unwinnable legal position that confronts him in France, is not always Reagan's style. And the hard-liners pushing quiet retreat agree the could be dead wrong: Retreat might solidify, not weaken, European resistance to punishing Moscow's Polish clampdown with economic sanctions.

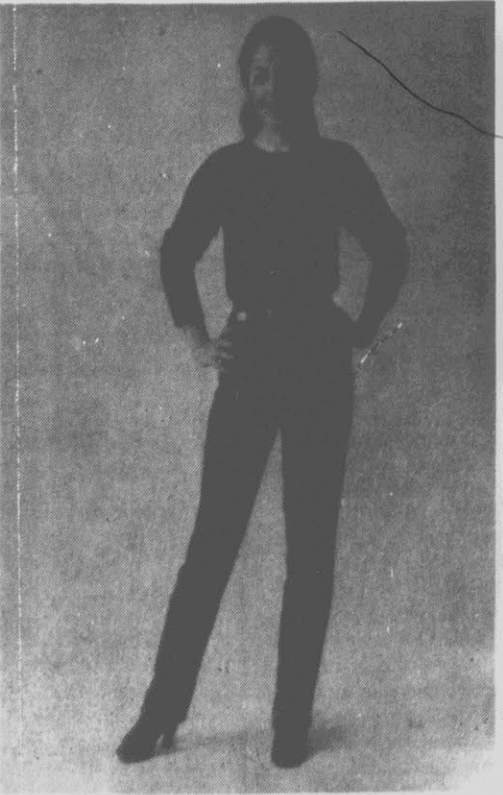

Bridge has borrowed colorful terms from a number of sports to describe its plays. This one comes from one of our favorites, boxing.

The bidding was impeccable. North used the Stayman Convention to locate a heart fit, and then took the pressure off his partner by bouncing into game.

The defenders did much better on this hand than we would have. West's lead of the ace of spades can hardly be recommended, because it is more likely to establish tricks for the no trump bidder than to hit partner with sufficient values in the suit to make the lead worthwhile. But who are we to quibble with success?

West continued with a spade and the defenders quickly reeled in their book. But where was the setting trick to come from? The chances of a diamond trick

were slim — declarer was a big favorite to hold the ace. And even if declarer didn't have the king of clubs, that card surely was finessable. By a process of elimination, East worked out that his only hope was a trump trick.

Even that did not look too promising — with the J-10 in dummy, declarer would finesse for the queen. However, there was a legitimate chance if West held the nine of trumps. Dummy overruffed with the ten, but the spots in trumps were significant — East now had promoted one of his trumps into a certain trick. As long as he just covered whatever trump was led from the table, he was assured of the setting trick.

This play is known in the trade as an "uppercut." Few will argue about its effectiveness over the table as in the ring.

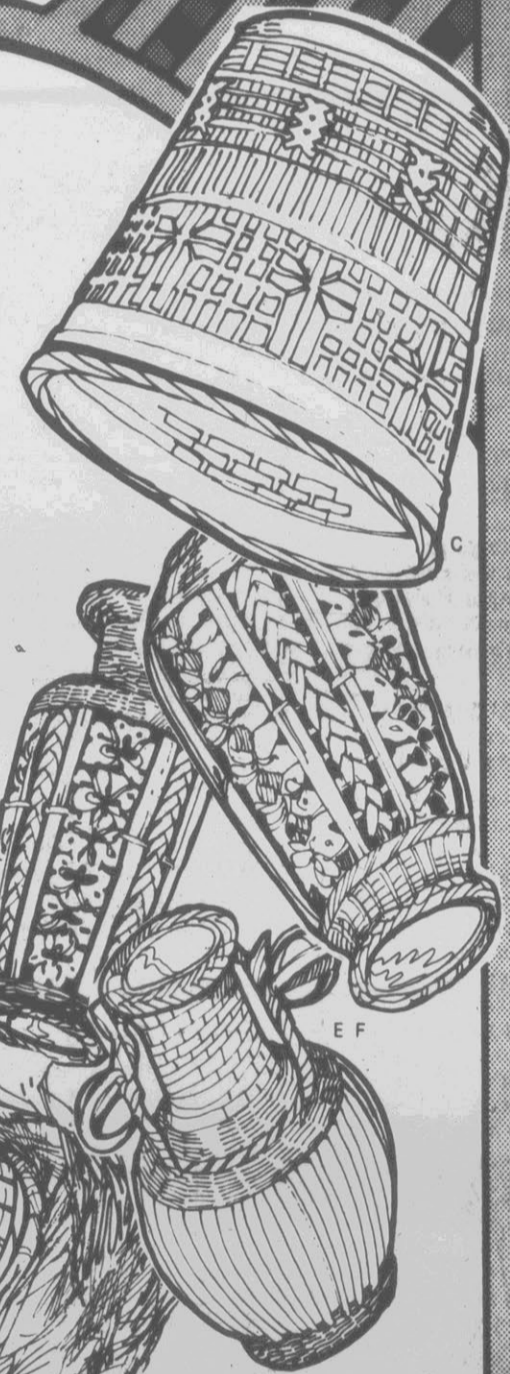

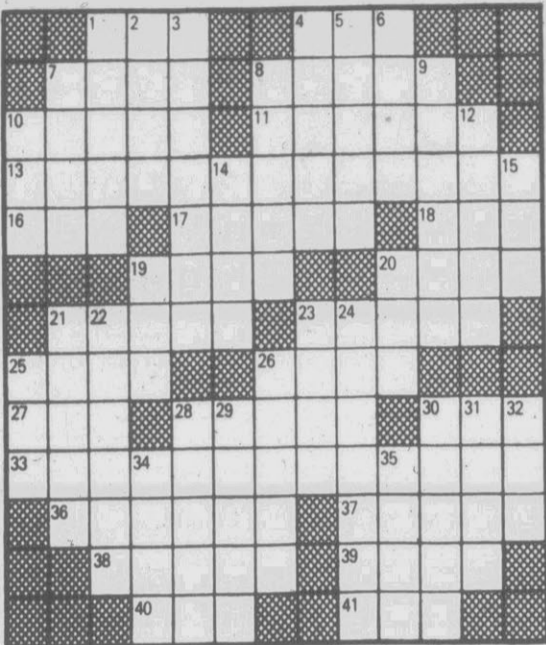

# Oppose Changed Policy In Wastewater Funding

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A state plan for an early increase in local funding of wastewater treatment construction projects has drawn fire from municipal officials across North Carolina.

More than 60 officials objected to the proposal during a public hearing Tuesday, although an official with the N.C. Division of Environmental Management said some form of increase probably is inevitable.

"It's a tough nut to crack," Walter D. Taft, chief of the construction grants section, said during the hearing.

The federal government contributes 75 percent of the funds for sewer projects under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Construction Grants Program. The state and cities split the remaining costs at a rate of 12.5 percent each.

But 1981 amendments to the Federal Clean Water Act require that the EPA's share of each project be dropped to

55 percent in fiscal year 1985.

State officials are proposing that the EPA percentage be lowered in North Carolina to 55 percent in 1983, two years early, to allow 13 more treatment facilities to be funded, Taft said.

The move is needed because the State Clean Water Bond Account, which the state uses to match local shares, is expected to run dry, Taft said.

The 60 people attending Tuesday's hearing objected to any change in the present funding formula.

"To reduce this spending would be a disaster for Rose Hill," said Ben L. Harrell, mayor of the Duplin County town.

"It would be devastating to the budgets of large and small communities alike," added Anthony T. Rolan, director of water resources for the city of Durham.

The officials, some of whom had weathered close bond referendums just to

provide a 12.5 percent share, said utility and tax rates would have to rise dramatically to defray another 10 percent.

Instead, they urged Gov. Jim Hunt to retain the present formula while efforts are made to find another source of state funding before money runs out from North Carolina's 1977 water bond issue, which funds the water bond account.

Taft said Hunt will take a stand on the matter if there is a change in federal funding levels.

"We realize the implications of it," added Brent Hackney, spokesman for Hunt. "We will take a long look at it before the governor responds in any particular way."

The officials also suggested that North Carolina's congressional delegation be lobbied to fight for a retention of the current federal percentages.

# Cuba Trying Defer Debts

LONDON (AP) — Cuba is seeking to defer debt repayments it owes to Western banks because of economic problems caused by a sharp fall in world sugar prices, the drying up of new loans, and economic hardship caused by a U.S. trade embargo, the Financial Times reported today.

The British business daily said Cuban authorities sent a telex message to their main Western bank creditors asking for permission to defer repayments for up to 10 years of principal due between now and the end of 1985 on its hard currency foreign debt of \$3 billion.

The Financial Times said Cuba's main bank lenders were believed to be Japanese, French and Canadian institutions. American banks do not lend to the Communist-ruled Caribbean island for political reasons.

The newspaper said the Cuban move came as little surprise to commercial bankers who had been aware of developing financial strains in Cuba for several months.

It quoted banking sources as saying they would need time to consider the Cuban request, partly because of a scarcity of detailed information on Cuba's foreign debt.

It said Washington's trade embargo was calculated to have cost Cuba about \$9 billion.

# Prison Unit To Hire For Staff

MAURY — When the new North Carolina medium and close custody correctional institution becomes operational at Maury in the early months of 1983, the staffing pattern for the 24-hour, seven-day-a-week operation for 480 inmates will involve 269 employees, according to David Chester, superintendent of the Eastern Correctional Center.

"Some of the people at the minimum custody field unit at Maury will be transferred, some will be promoted," Chester commented, "but opening the new center will entail considerable new employment. The largest contingent of new employees will be in correctional officers at the entry level," he added.

"Correctional officers will constitute about 150 of the total employees. For these positions, which is for general custody work, the entry salaries will range from about \$11,000 to \$16,000."

Referring to the Maury center now in the final phase of construction, Chester calls it "a self-contained unit, a city within a city. There will be five wings of single cells. One wing will house inmates with special problems, including mental health problems. This will involve intensive supervisory care, which means we'll have staff members and support persons who are trained in psychology, rehabilitation therapy, clinical and social work."

Other areas mentioned by Chester that will result in personnel hiring are those of the food service and administrative areas and a maintenance staff. "The maintenance staff, for example," Chester said, "will necessarily be persons experienced in maintenance of boilers, electrical systems and a self-contained sewage plant."

Another area that will be important when the unit is operational is that of vocational and rehabilitation training. "We will be working closely with Lenoir Community College in programs designed to teach inmates basic skills as well as adult and general education needs," Chester remarked.

Chester said a considerable number of applications for positions are already on hand. "A number of ECU students who have degrees in correctional work and civil justice have long been aware of plans to open the new Maury unit and have applied for positions," he said.

The same is true for students at Lenoir Community College who have been trained in various fields of technical and vocational work applicable to correctional units.

Both female and male applicants are being considered for positions at all levels. "Our primary employment requirements," Chester noted, "are training and experience. We are conducting a staff recruiting program and hope by time the unit opens to have a highly qualified staff to begin operations."

# No Such Thing As A Guaranteed Job

MIDLAND, Pa. (AP) — Laid-off steelworker Harold Taylor left the depressed Ohio River Valley 13 months ago for a "guaranteed" job in Texas. Two jobs later and 50 pounds lighter, he's decided that if he's going to starve he might as well do it at home.

He says he learned there are no such thing as guaranteed jobs these days, so people like him have to "weather the storm" of economic hardship.

"Things are going to get better," he shrugged. "I don't think they can get any worse."

Taylor, 40, a father of two, was laid off 13 months ago from the Crucible Stainless Steel and Alloy Division in this Steel Valley town between Pittsburgh and Youngstown, Ohio. Colt Industries is closing the plant Oct. 15.

In February, the week he got his final unemployment check, Taylor took a job in Liberty, Texas, with National Pipe and Tube Co. The subsidiary of National Steel Corp. made pipes in the oil well drilling boom and guaranteed work without layoffs.

Taylor got a pair of \$500 bonuses, a month's free housing and board. He jumped at the chance. His family stayed behind, planning to move down later.

"What did I have to lose?" Taylor said in a recent interview. "I was reluctant to leave. But with guaranteed no layoffs, I expected to work the rest of my life."

But the drilling boom went bust, and Taylor was furloughed May 1.

There still was no reason to fret, he thought. Houston newspapers had help wanted sections filling more than 100 pages.

He took another job as a millwright with St. Regis Paper Co. But again there was talk of layoffs and shutdowns, and Taylor decided to go home — one week before he was due to be

furloughed again. "In six months, it went from boom to bust, literally. It's like the bubble has burst," he recalled.

"I couldn't afford to pay my mortgage up here and be down there. If I'm going to starve, I might as well go back home and starve," he said after returning from Texas this month.

Aside from his vanishing jobs, Taylor had a rash of personal problems in Texas. By the time he was back, he had lost 50 pounds.

He brought his family to Texas in June, but two days

before he was to complete the purchase of a house, he says, it burned to the ground, forcing the family to live through the hot summer in a two-bedroom trailer with no air conditioning. His German shepherd dog died two days after arriving in Texas.

Up North, his house originally was for sale at the appraised price of \$42,000. Taylor ultimately dropped the asking price to \$18,000 but still never found a buyer in the depressed housing market.

After the family moved, someone ransacked the vacant house. His mother, who lives two doors away, suffered a heart attack.

"It was like every day you wonder what's going to happen next," said Taylor, wearing a T-shirt and Lone Star belt buckle. "I finally said we're not living like this anymore. I felt like a gypsy. It wasn't the way I wanted to raise my kids."

Taylor received yet another Texas job offer, but he turned it down flat, because he was offered work as an electrician for a company that unloaded foreign steel at a Texas harbor.

"It was a matter of principle. Under different circumstances, I might have taken the job," he said.

Back at his home in nearby East Liverpool, Ohio, Taylor works at odd jobs, waiting for something permanent. He has two years of college and has attended trade schools, so he's confident of finding work.

"If worst comes to worst, I'll go somewhere else but just until something opens up here. There's no idea of picking up and moving my family again. It would be a last resort," Taylor said.

"Besides, I'm lucky. I've worked in the last six months. There are some real hard luck stories out here."

## Gives 'Ears' To Her Listeners

MUSKEGON, Mich. (AP) — Candidate Ruth Marcus has to bend a few ears in her campaign for state representative, so she's thanking patient listeners by handing out some ears of her own.

Mrs. Marcus is giving away free corn to people she talks to in her bid to unseat state Rep. Marvin L. Knight, a Republican.

It all has to do with an unusual campaign gift Mrs. Marcus received from Eugene R. Kuhn, a backer from Hart, who describes himself as a "hobbyist grower of vegetables." Kuhn gave Mrs. Marcus 80 bushels of corn, or about 5,000 ears.

"I said 'Wow' ... how could I say no?" the challenger said.

Mrs. Marcus, a Democrat, plans to hand out the corn as she talks to potential voters at the Muskegon Farmer's Market.

Kuhn said he thought 80 bushels of corn would help Mrs. Marcus' campaign more than the equivalent cash donation, about \$250.

"I also thought it would point up the fact that we have an oversupply in this region, and that crops are being virtually given away at current prices," Kuhn said.

# GM Reduces Some Car Prices And Freezes Others

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. are expected to follow General Motors Corp.'s lead and hold the line on new-car price increases in the 1983 model year, industry analysts say.

GM on Tuesday announced its 1983 model prices — an average 1.9 percent higher on overall models than the current prices. But the announcement included price reductions on 38 models and price freezes on another 26. The other 60 GM car models will go up in price an average \$357 to \$686.

Arvid Joupil, independent auto industry analyst, said it will be the first time some new-model prices have been decreased nationwide since the Great Depression. He did not know, however, what kind of price decrease occurred in the Depression and in what year.

The move is meant "to promote an early recovery in auto sales, while holding down inflation," a GM statement said. GM

Chairman Roger B. Smith said the action will help GM's cars be competitive.

Auto analysts David Healy of Drexel Burnham Lambert Inc. in New York and John Hammond of Data Resources Inc. of Lexington, Mass., said the move will be copied by Ford and Chrysler.

"They have no choice" but to follow the industry leader, Hammond said.

But he added he was unsure how effective the pricing would be. Consumers likely to be shopping for a new car this year last were in the market four years ago, he said. New-car prices have

risen 60 percent in that time, he said.

Ford spokesman George Trainor said the automaker was studying GM's announcement and "will try to respond in a competitive manner." Ford prices usually are not released until just before model introduction in the fall, he added.

Chrysler spokesman Doug Nicoll said "we will be competitive," but would not elaborate. Chrysler prices are not expected to be announced until model introduction in the fall, he added.

GM's price cuts, ranging

from \$250 to \$1,500 on base prices, are mostly on the automaker's smaller cars which have been selling poorly this year as gasoline prices declined and stabilized.

Base prices on full-size cars, luxury models, some midsize cars and the sporty Chevrolet Camaros and Pontiac Firebirds, which have been selling well this year, will increase, GM said.

So far in 1982, GM car sales are down 13.3 percent from a year ago despite dealer incentives during late summer and rebates and low interest rates earlier in the year. The

1982 models' prices were 6 percent higher than 1981 models.

Specifically, price cuts of \$250 will be applied to GM's mid-size models: Chevrolet Celebrity, Pontiac 6000, Oldsmobile Ciera and Buick Century, the statement said.

Price cuts of up to \$500 will be applied to subcompacts with comparable equipment: Chevrolet Cavalier, Pontiac 2000, Oldsmobile Firenza and Buick Skyhawk.

A price cut of \$1,500 on the Cadillac Seville involves changes in standard equipment on the cars. GM spokesman Cliff Merriott

said the automatic turn-on for headlights, aluminum wheels and special stereo speakers will be removed.

The Cadillac Cimarron price will remain the same but \$400 worth of equipment will be added, the statement said.

Prices of the subcompact and compact Chevrolet Chevette and Citation, Pontiac 1000 and Phoenix, Oldsmobile Omega and Buick Skylark will be unchanged.

The rest of GM's model line will go up in price, although the automaker gave no details.

# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market spurted ahead today, opening a new month with signs that its historic August rally may keep rolling.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which had reached a 12-month peak on Tuesday with a gain of more than 8 points, added another 5.61 to 906.92 in the first half hour of trading.

Gainers outnumbered losers by a 2-1 margin, among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

In the early going, oil stocks showed strength with Exxon up 1/4 to 28 1/4, and Mobil rising 1/4 to 23 1/4. Among oil service issues, Halliburton gained 1/4 to 24 1/4.

The market got some help in the previous session from the government's report of a 1.3 percent rise in the index of economic indicators for July and a 2 percent jump in factory orders.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrial average climbed another 8.01 to 901.31, its highest closing since it finished at 901.83 on Aug. 25, 1981.

Gainers led losers nearly 4 to 1 on the NYSE, with nearly 1,200 issues up on the day.

Big Board volume swelled to 86.36 million shares - the ninth highest on record - from 59.56 million in the previous session.

The NYSE composite index rose 1.02 to 68.54.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 3.65 at 280.02, its best level since May 12 when it closed at 280.18.

# Labor Day Gas Said Plentiful

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - Gasoline costing about 3 1/2 cents a gallon less than it did last year should be in plentiful supply during the Labor Day weekend in North Carolina and South Carolina, according to the Carolina Motor Club.

Most service stations surveyed in the Carolinas will be open during the three-day weekend, the club said, adding that on Labor Day nearly 80 percent of all stations surveyed will be open for business.

Gas prices have dropped only slightly since the July 4 weekend, down only eight-tenths of a cent per gallon, according to the club.

"Our trip routings that we have prepared for our members indicate that motorists are taking full advantage of gasoline prices being somewhat stabilized beneath last year's price levels," Ralph Peters, president of the 219,000-member club, said Tuesday.

Since the Charlotte-based club's last report on July 4, full-service gas prices increased and self-service prices dropped slightly in North Carolina. In South Carolina, prices dropped slightly for both types of services.

Survey results show that the difference in price between full-service and self-service gas has inched back

up to 14.3 cents per gallon, the same as on Memorial Day, and nearly a cent more than on July 4.

The latest figures shows self-service unleaded gas is averaging \$1.30 a gallon and regular \$1.23 a gallon in North Carolina. Full service unleaded averages \$1.43 and regular, \$1.38.

South Carolina's self-service unleaded gas sells for \$1.31 a gallon and regular, \$1.24. Full-service unleaded averages \$1.43 and regular, \$1.40.

Diesel fuel prices average \$1.26 in North Carolina and \$1.31 in South Carolina, an increase of one-tenth of a cent a gallon in North Carolina and a decrease of 2.3 cents in South Carolina.

In North Carolina, a gallon of premium unleaded gas averages \$1.48, full service, and \$1.40 for self service. In South Carolina, full service premium unleaded gas averages \$1.54 and self service, \$1.41.

# Electrocuted

Darrell Worthington lost 24 hogs to accidental electrocution Monday and says, "I'm just glad it wasn't a person."

Worthington, who farms on Route 1, Winterville, said he and some helpers were preparing to repair a motor on an automatic hog feeder when one of the workers saw 15 hogs die as electrified water washed over them during periodic flushing to clean the floor of the hog house.

Worthington had found nine hogs dead earlier Monday but had tentatively attributed their deaths to an unknown illness.

Worthington said the hogs had chewed first on a ground wire and then a hot wire of the feeder that was to be repaired. "If they had chewed the hot wire first, the whole thing would have shorted out and it would have been OK," he said, "but since they eliminated the ground first, we had trouble."

The "trouble" of losing 25 hogs, though, he said, is nothing compared to what might have happened if the men had climbed onto the "hot" feeder to work on it as they planned. "We discovered what was going on just in time," he said.

specific hormone. The transplant was made, but the improvement was described as slight.

Cotman says years of work with animals are still needed before humans reap the potential of brain transplants. Although scientists have shown transplants can survive and form connections, they don't know whether every hook-up is made and the result is functional in all respects.

And a rat's tiny brain is far from the wondrous complexity of a human's.

But the possibilities are dramatic. Brain cells are not reproduced. Once killed by stroke, aging or traumatic head injury, they are gone forever - unless doctors learn to replace them.

"I am very optimistic," Cotman said.

# 'Ultimatum' Over Costs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Navy Secretary John Lehman maintains the price tag for the new F-18 fighter is at least \$1.5 million too high and says the Pentagon will cancel further orders for the plane unless the cost comes down.

Lehman, in an interview published today in The Washington Post, said he will call off the government's contract and buy only 240 of the planes unless the F-18's fiscal 1981 price of \$24.1 million price is cut.

"The price must come down, or we're not going to buy it," he said.

Lehman maintained that the F-18 should cost no more than \$22.5 million by 1984. He said he was making his threat public to help persuade McDonnell Douglas, the plane's prime contractor, and the Northrup Corp., the major subcontractor, that he is serious in price negotiations now underway.

By comparison, the F-14 fighter cost \$26.1 million and the A-6 attack bomber cost \$16.1 million. Increased purchases of both from Grumman Corp. would be made if the F-18 is cancelled, Lehman said.

"The Navy is in a very comfortable and strong position because we have a very attractive alternative to the F-18," Lehman said in the interview.

The F-18 was supposed to have been a lightweight, dual-purpose plane replacing the aging F-4 as a fighter and the A-7 as an attack bomber.

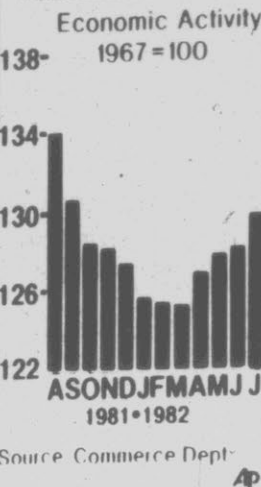
The Navy had planned to buy 1,366 of the F-18s for about \$39.7 billion, and had counted on significant savings from a simpler parts inventory and maintenance program resulting from the use of one plane instead of two.

Only \$5 billion has been spent so far on the F-18.

## Mascarin Upsets King At Open

NEW YORK (AP) — Before 18-year-old Susan Mascarin took the court for her first-round match against Billie Jean King in the U.S. Open tennis championships, she got a little advice from her coach, Owen Davidson.

"He said not to look at her," said Mascarin. "She's very intimidating. I think she can outstare me."

So Mascarin tried hard not to think about King, a tennis legend who won her first U.S. Open crown, a doubles title, in 1964, the year Susan was born. It was not an easy task.

"When she's serving, it's kind of hard not to look at her. I tried to look at the ball, but she got in the way."

Still the teen-ager from Grosse Pointe Shores, Mich. overcame the center court jitters and the 12th-seeded King's stare for an impressive 6-3, 6-2 victory and the first

upset of the 101st U.S. Open tournament.

Other first day winners included No. 11 seed Mats Wilander of Sweden, another precocious 18-year-old, who defeated Bill Scanlon 6-4, 6-3, 6-1; third-seeded Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia, who beat Ramesh Krishnan of India 6-4, 7-6, 6-1; and No. 4 seed Guillermo Vilas of Argentina, who outlasted Chris Dunk 6-7, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

In women's play, Chris Evert Lloyd, seeded No. 2, got started with an easy 6-1, 6-0 victory over Pilar Vasquez.

Martina Navratilova and John McEnroe, the tournament's top seeds, both swung into action tonight.

Navratilova faces Laura DuPont and McEnroe goes against Tim Gullickson in center court matches.

King started fast against Mascarin, winning the first

three games. "I was shaking, really nervous about playing Billie Jean," the youngster said.

But King was having problems with her volley.

"It was one of those days," said King. "I'd get in position to do something with my volley and there would be no volley. Susie knew my volleys weren't doing well. I only won one 30-all point all day and I didn't win the game."

D.H. Conley coach Gerald Garner remembers a year ago when the Vikings shocked SouthWest Edgecombe. He remembers, and he knows the Cougars have not forgotten either.

"We snuck up on them last year," Garner said. "We won't be able to do that this year."

The Vikings, fresh off a 28-13 loss to Washington in their '82 season opener, defeated the Cougars, 19-6, last year in Hollywood. This year the Vikings must travel to Pinetops.

"They tell me they're hungry in Cougar-land," Garner said. "I know we will definitely have our hands full."

Conley was one of three county high schools to open its '82 season last week. Ayden-Grifton, the only county school idle this past Friday, joins the action this week.

"I don't know what it is about them (the Cougars) but they like rubbing it in," Garner said. "They faked an extra point (on their last touchdown) and went for two, and made it."

The Cougars, coached by Timmy Tillman, run a 5-2 defense and the wishbone on offense. They are led by fullback Wayne Mayo, who rushed for 1,004 yards last season and 12 TDs.

In other games this week: Ayden-Grifton, which finished in a three-way tie for the '81 Eastern Carolina Conference championship, will

# Ryan Overpowers Mets On 2-Hitter

By The Associated Press Nolan Ryan hit the spot for the Houston Astros.

"I've never seen him more overpowering," said catcher Alan Ashby. "He was right at the corners."

Ryan's picture-perfect performance almost resulted in an unprecedented sixth career no-hitter Tuesday night. He lost it in the eighth on Ron Hodges' clean single to left field and settled for a two-hit, 4-0 victory over the New York Mets.

"The ball Hodges hit was on the black (of the plate)," said Ashby. "He knew it, and he hit it the only way he could."

"Nolan's ability doesn't surprise me," Ashby continued. "What surprises me is that a human being has that much ability."

Ryan, 14-9, walked three and struck out nine to run his season strikeout total to an even 200, the ninth season he has reached that plateau.

Hodges' hit admittedly dismayed Ryan, but not enough to shake him completely.

"There was no letdown after the hit," he said. "You have to keep it all in perspective."

Almost lost in Ryan's fine performance was the Mets' growing losing streak, which reached 15. The streak is the longest in the majors this year and the Mets' longest since they lost 15 straight in 1963.

The Astros scored a run against Ed Lynch, 2-6, in the first inning when Dickie Thon led off with a double, was batted to third and came home on Tony Scott's grounder. Houston added two runs in the seventh on RBI hits by Ashby and Danny Heep, and scored its final run in the ninth off reliever Charlie Puleo on Scott's RBI single.

Braves 3, Phillies 0 Tommy Boggs, pitching for the first time since injuring his shoulder April 20, threw six shutout innings as Atlanta beat Philadelphia.

Boggs, 2-0, who suffered a slight tear in his shoulder in the spring, allowed three hits,

struck out two and walked two. Reliever Gene Garber completed the shutout to earn his 26th save.

The Braves took a 1-0 lead in the fourth inning without benefit of a hit against loser Ed Farmer, 2-5, then went up 2-0 in the sixth on an RBI single by Bob Horner and 3-0 in the eighth on an RBI single by Dale Murphy.

Burt Hooton earned his first victory in more than four months, hurling Los Angeles over St. Louis. Hooton, 2-5, who has been on the disabled list twice this season, pitched into the eighth inning before Steve Howe picked him up, preserving the triumph with his 12th save.

Hooton, scattered seven hits while walking one and striking out two, in his fifth start since knee surgery on June 21. His only previous victory this season was a one-hit, 4-0 shutout over Philadelphia April 29.

# Downing's Slam Keys California

While Reggie Jackson, Don Baylor, Rod Carew and Fred Lynn got most of the attention on the California Angels, Brian Downing has quietly snuck his catcher's tools and done the job in left field.

Downing, who spent most of his career as a catcher before moving to the outfield this season, was 4-for-5 and drove in five runs with a grand slam homer and a solo shot as the Angels bombed the Detroit Tigers 11-0 Tuesday night.

"I'm comfortable in left field now," says Downing, who is hitting .285 with 22 homers. "That's made all the difference in the world. When I went to spring training this year, I knew Bob Boone was the catcher. Look in my locker; I don't even have a catcher's mitt any more."

California's victory, combined with Texas' 6-0 triumph over Kansas City, cut the Royals' lead in the American League West to 1½ games over the Angels.

"This is a good team," Downing said. "We've got a lot of offensive weapons. If we get down, we know we have the ability to come back."

Left-hander Geoff Zahn, enjoying his best season with a 15-6 record, credited his team's offense with much of his success.

"It's taken me my whole career to find a team that knows how many I need," said Zahn said, who pitched an eight-hitter.

"It's very rewarding to win 15 games," Zahn said. "The significance, however, is the fact that this club is in a pennant race and it's important for me to pitch well."

Leading 2-0 until the fifth inning, the Angels scored seven runs to put the game away.

Jackson, who had three hits and three RBI, led off by belting his 32nd home run. Detroit starter Jack Morris, 14-14, then walked Lynn, gave up a double to Doug DeCinces and walked Baylor to load the bases.

The rest of the inning was a nightmare for Detroit.

Larry Pashnick relieved Morris and uncorked a wild pitch, scoring Lynn. He then walked Grich to reload the bases and threw another wild pitch one out later, scoring DeCinces. Boone walked to

load the bases again, setting up Downing's second career grand slam. Downing's second homer made it 11-0 in the ninth.

## MacPhail: Its Time To Deal With George

NEW YORK (AP) — American League President Lee MacPhail, asked to comment on a recent outburst by New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner, says it is time to deal with "intemperate, petulant and problem-causing public statements by baseball personnel."

Steinbrenner, in a statement released in Toronto Sunday, called the ejections "ludicrous" and said Parks "has had it in for the Yankees ever since I labeled him and several of the umpires as scabs because they worked American League games in 1979 during the umpires' strike."

MacPhail, responding to Steinbrenner's remarks, said he felt "parts of it are objectionable. In the release, Mr. Steinbrenner asks that the matter of umpiring be placed on the agenda for our next league meeting. This will be done."

"I am also placing on that agenda the matter of intemperate, petulant and problem-causing public statements by baseball personnel and the question of how the league feels such should be dealt with."

"Anytime it comes down to this, you're put in the position of being a bad guy," John said. "I hope the people don't think of me as a bad guy. I hope they think of Tommy John as an athlete who tried to do his best every time out, which I did."

One of his new teammates and another former Yankee, Reggie Jackson, said he looks forward to playing with John, who spent three full seasons in New York after leaving the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1978.

John had asked to be traded a month ago, having grown unhappy with the defending AL champion Yankees, who are floundering in the AL East this season.

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Football League's Management Council, whose executive committee is meeting again, has charged the NFL Player's Association with 12 counts of unfair labor practices.

The council said Tuesday that it filed with the National Labor Relations Board a total of 12 counts of violations of the National Labor Relations Act against the players' association.

Today, the executive committee was to hold a regularly scheduled meeting here to discuss the labor problems between the council and the players' union. The executive committee is made up of several NFL team owners.

In July, the players' association filed an unfair labor practice against the council. That complaint, concerning information the union said it needed to bargain with the council, was heard by NLRB Administrative Judge Julius Cohn, who is expected to make a ruling after Labor Day.

The council, in its claim, said in part that the union "has sought to dictate the composition of the management bargaining committee; has demonstrated a 'locked mind' in connection with its percentage-of-gross-revenue proposal; has failed to meet and bargain at reasonable times and places with management representatives; has failed and refused to present a bargaining proposal, and has failed and refused to bargain in good faith over the subject of urinalysis testing."

Jack Donlan, the council's executive director, said the council was "putting on paper the things we've been saying all along."

## Greenwood, Middleton Lead Waiver List As Season Nears

The closer it gets to the National League Football regular season, the more familiar the names on the waiver wire become.

L.C. Greenwood, the last remaining member of Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defensive line, was released by the Steelers on Tuesday, the day teams had to trim their rosters to 60 players.

Terdell Middleton, a 1,000-yard rusher for Green Bay in 1978, was waived by the Packers.

And place-kicker Benny Ricardo, the New Orleans player representative who once made an NFL-record 29 straight field goal attempts from inside 40 yards, was cut by the Saints.

Among those also waived Tuesday were linebacker Ed Simonini, a six-year player with Baltimore; defensive back Ricky Churchman, a San Francisco starter in 1980 who has been plagued by injuries; and veteran defensive end John Banaszak, released by the Steelers.

Teams have to be down to 49 players by next Monday.

"I didn't say anything when I came in, and I'm not going to say anything when I go out," said Greenwood, a week shy of his 36th birthday. He was the oldest Steeler and the only one left from the first Pittsburgh team Chuck Noll coached in 1969.

The 6-foot-6½, 250-pound Greenwood played in six Pro Bowls but saw only limited action in Pittsburgh's three exhibition games this year.

"It's tough. It's not easy," Noll said after Greenwood was released. "We felt we had young people playing well and had to do it."

Banaszak, a seven-year veteran, started 12 games last year. He played in the 1975, 1979 and 1980 Super Bowls.

"My services were no longer needed," Banaszak said. "It certainly wasn't an easy decision on Chuck's part."

In Green Bay, Middleton

gained 1,116 yards for the Packers in 1978, his second season in the NFL. Since then, however, his production has dropped and he gained only 181 yards last year.

New Orleans decided to keep fourth-round draft choice Morten Andersen — who made three of six field goal attempts

in the preseason — rather than Ricardo, who made two of two. But Ricardo said being the team's player representative sealed his fate.

"I think all of that added up, and I was just not a welcome sight around there," Ricardo said.

Last year was Ricardo's

worst in the NFL, as he made only 13 of 26 field goal attempts. When he previously played for Detroit, however, he made 29 in a row from inside 40 yards.

"It didn't matter if Morten Andersen had been 0-50 and I was 50-50. It wouldn't have mattered at all."

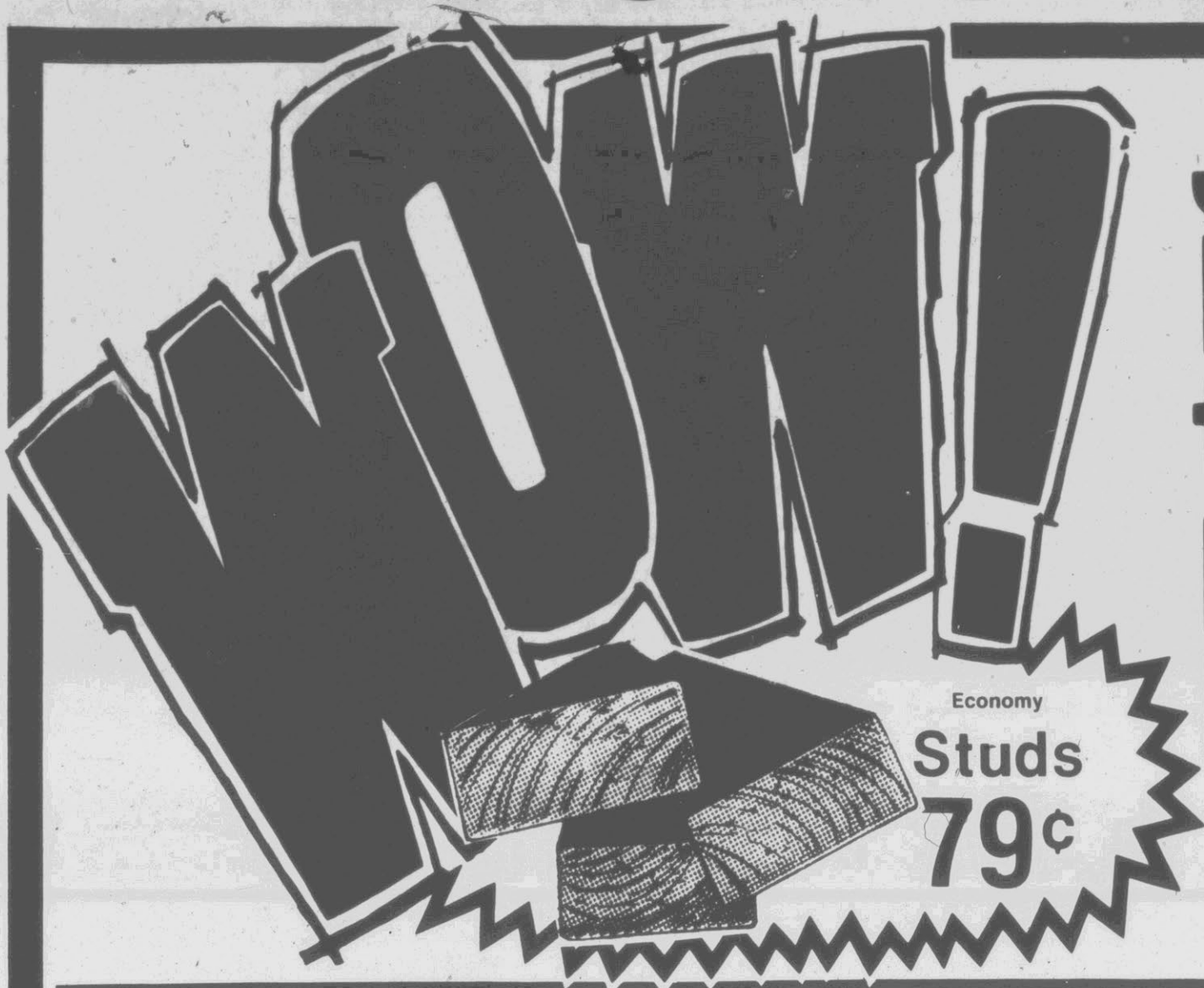

North Pitt coach B.T. Chappell insists North Edgecombe will offer his team a stiff challenge come Friday evening — that, despite a 41-0 loss to SouthWest Edgecombe on opening night.

"The SouthWest coach (Timmy) Tillman told me they are 10 times better than they've ever been," Chappell said. "He said North Edgecombe is a whole lot more aggressive and they execute a whole lot better."

Their coach — from what I understand — cut all the borderline players and has 20 players on the roster who will do anything he asks," Chappell said. "That kind of worries me."

The Panthers, coming off a 27-13 loss to Roanoke, is in no position to take anyone lightly. But, Chappell believes his Panthers, who beat North

**Farmville Central.**  
Farmville begins Friday night a five-week span that will see the Jaguars play four teams considered picked during the preseason to be among the top 10 teams in the East.

The Jaguars travel to Clinton Friday to kick off the five weeks. "It's the first of the big ones," Farmville Central coach Gilbert Carroll said. "I feel like Notre Dame to tell the truth."

The following week the Jaguars travel to Ayden-Grifton before facing D.H. Conley on Sept. 17.

The Jaguars then go to Havelock and play host to SouthWest Edgecombe Oct. 1. Out of those five teams only Conley is not considered to be among the top teams in the East.

Clinton, which defeated Farmville, 29-6, last year, may well be the best of the bunch. "They're good. They're probably about one of the finest teams in the East," Carroll said. "I feel like we're better than last year but they're probably better, too."

Carroll said he will not change his basic offensive plan. "We're going to do what we do best: We're going to run at them. I'll be interested if we can move the ball on them with our little boys."

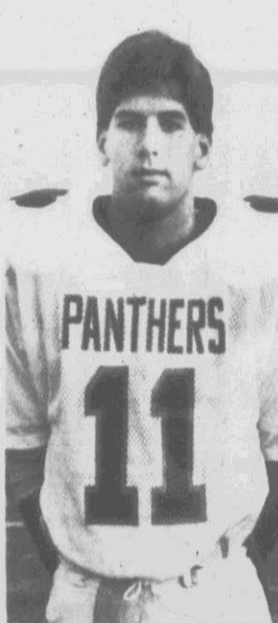

# Clemson Looking To Georgia

CLEMSON, S.C. — Most Clemson fans wouldn't think there could be a game to top last January's Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska and subsequent national championship, but some Tiger players do.

That game is on Labor Day before a national television audience as the defending champions of college football face Georgia, a team bent on revenge after last year's embarrassing loss at Death Valley.

Defensive tackle Dan Benish shared in the joy of last year's perfect season. But he told reporters that opening at

Sanford Stadium next Monday night beats that hot and humid night in Miami.

"I've been thinking a lot about it," says Benish. "I believe this will be the biggest one I've ever played in."

Right offensive tackle Bob Mayberry doesn't go as far as Benish, but he thinks meeting the Bulldogs is on a par with the Nebraska game.

"I don't know if it's bigger than the national championship, but I think it's just as big," says Mayberry. "There's a big rivalry between us and Georgia."

The Tigers and the Bulldogs have interesting problems as they enter the game. Highest on the list is whether Georgia's junior tailback Herschel Walker will play.

Walker, who suffered a broken thumb in a scrimmage, isn't slated to play. But you won't convince the Clemson defense of that. Benish says his unit is preparing as if Walker will start.

"I'd like to see Herschel in there," he says. "I'd like to see both teams at their best."

Defensive back Terry Kinard says he's planning for Walker's appearance, but he adds that he can't spend the next five days worried about Walker alone.

"You have to prepare for the things Herschel can do," says Kinard. "But if you're playing a team with a back like Herschel, you tend to forget the rest of the team."

Meanwhile, Clemson coach Danny Ford must blend youth

and experience on the offensive line, get some outstanding performances early from his defensive ends and hope his secondary can survive what should be several early tests.

"Most of our questions will be answered when we line up and play," says Ford. "This football team is more of a mystery than anyone we've had. I don't know which way this one is going to go."

Ford has quarterback Homer Jordan, four fine running backs and several defensive standouts, including 320-pound nose guard William Perry. Although he may not express the confidence one might expect from a national champion, Mayberry says he

thinks his teammates are ready to defend.

"I worried about it until spring. I think everyone came in with a great working attitude," he says. "I'm not worried about that now. We're up for the Georgia game and that will add fuel to the fire."

# Chinese Communists Convene

PEKING (AP) — China's Communist Party Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping today opened the first party congress in five years and said it would propel the country along on its own course of modernization.

Red ceremonial flags flew in the vast central Tiananmen Square around the Great Hall and inside, banners proclaimed: "Long live the great Communist Party of China," and "Strive to create a new situation in all fields of socialist construction."

About 200 spectators gathered outside.

Deng, 78, who holds the real power in both the party and the government, opened the meeting early today and told the 1,545 delegates that the nation's three major tasks in the 1980s are socialist modernization, striving for the return of Taiwan and combating hegemonism and safeguarding world peace.

"China's affairs should be run in our own way by our own efforts," Deng said. "While we value friendship and cooperation with other countries and people, we value more our own independence and sovereign rights."

"No foreign country can expect China to be a vassal, nor expect China to swallow any bitter fruit to the detriment of China's interests," Deng declared.

He apparently referred to

U.S. arms sales to the Nationalist Chinese regime on Taiwan, which China considers to be one of its provinces, and revised Japanese history textbooks which gloss over Japanese atrocities in China from 1937-1945.

Deng, who has been criticized for his liberal foreign policy, said China should learn from other countries and draw on their experience in modernization, he said, "but mechanical copying and application of foreign experience and models will get us nowhere."

"The Chinese," he said, "must blaze a path of our own and build socialism with Chinese characteristics."

Deng said the 12th Party Congress would adopt a new party constitution and elect a new Central Committee, a Central Advisory Commission and Central Discipline Inspection Commission.

For the rest of the century, he said China must do four things:

—Restructure the administration and economic set-up and make China's leaders more revolutionary, younger, better educated and professionally competent.

—Build a socialist, spiritual civilization.

—Strike at criminal activities and economic corruption.

—Rectify the party work style.

The speech was reported by the official Xinhua news agency. Foreign reporters were not allowed to attend

the Congress, expected to last 10 days.

Deng, chairman of the Congress, declared it the most important meeting since the 7th Party Congress in 1945, which he said overcame wrong ideas in the party.

At the 8th Party Congress in 1956, he said, China embarked on an ambitious crash program of industrialization, but the party was not prepared and "we suffered serious setbacks."

It was a reference to the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung's disastrous economic policy, known as the "Great Leap Forward." The Great Leap was an effort to quickly industrialize the country and create people's agricultural communes. Deng had argued against Mao at the time, but lost.

Deng said the party's Central Committee in December, 1978, finally restored the correct policies. At that meeting, Deng announced his program of modernization and repudiated Mao's leftist idea of continuing and convulsive class struggle.

The current Congress was considered the vindication of Deng's ideals, for which he was twice purged by leftists.

The delegates are expected to abolish the posts of chairman and six vice chairmen, but Deng's ally,

Hu Yaobang, will remain in command as general secretary of the party.

Deng is expected to relinquish his party post and join an advisory commission of elders. However, foreign analysts believe he will retain a major role in national decisions.

Hu, 67, asked by reporters if he would become China's new strong man, said: "I am not an iron man. I am a man with passion and blood."

He said he would be responsible for party and political affairs and Premier Zhao Ziyang, 63, would handle economic matters.

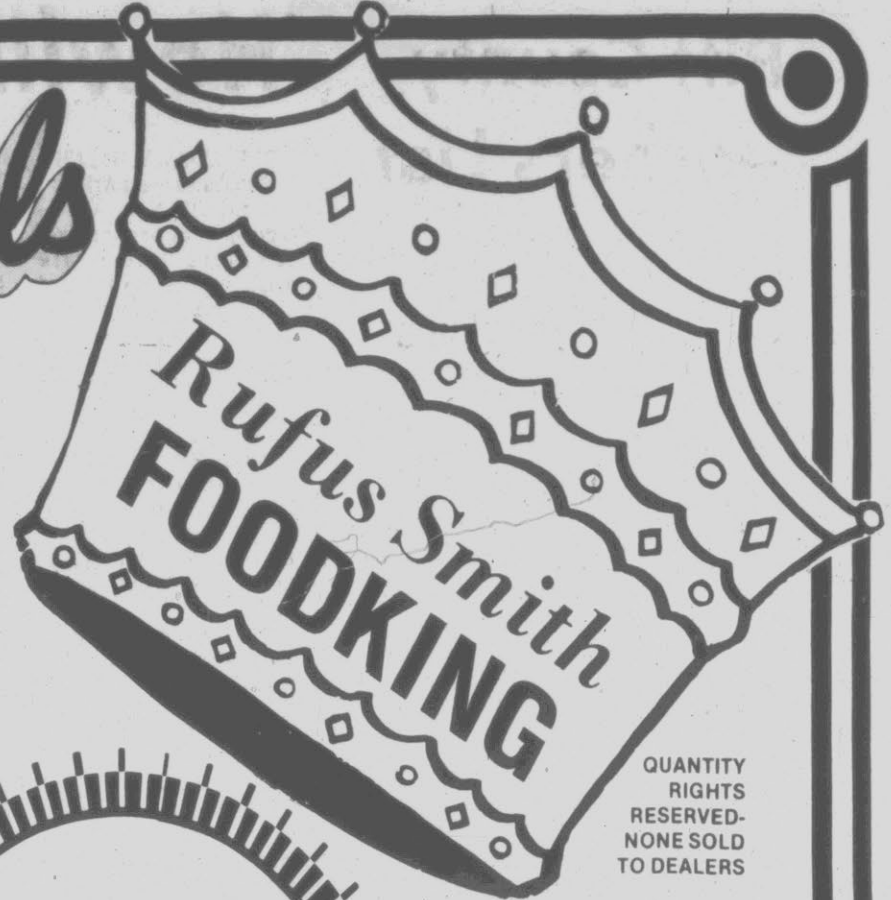

## Another Step In Harnessing Sun

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Scientists here say they have taken a step toward harnessing the sun's energy.

For the first time, low-cost solar cells of amorphous silicon developed at RCA Laboratories have achieved

a 10 percent conversion efficiency.

"This is a major step toward large-scale power production at costs comparable to those of oil-fired electric generating plants," says scientist Brown Williams.

By WILLIAM M. WELCH Associated Press Writer RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Groups representing teachers and state employees are howling mad over a move to reduce the medical insurance benefits they say were promised last June by the General Assembly.

"When the General Assembly left town and said we had a better insurance policy, we believed those people," said Loretta Martin, president of the North Carolina Association of Educators.

"The question the state of North Carolina must ask itself is how long it can keep its teachers and other employees to subsidize the work they do," she added.

"Go ahead and put the plan exactly like the legislature intended," pleaded Emmett Burden, lobbyist for the N.C. State Employees Association. "State employee morale is very low."

The comments came as trustees of the new state hospitalization and medical insurance plan voted 5-2 Tuesday to reduce the benefits scheduled when the new plan becomes effective Oct. 1.

The change means people covered by the state plan would face a maximum, out-of-pocket liability of \$650 a year in medical payments instead of the \$200 maximum approved by the legislature.

The change was proposed by Gov. Jim Hunt and his state budget office, along with its professional insurance consultant.

But Hunt said it was the General Assembly's fault, not his. The legislature's appropriation for the insurance plan, he said, turned out to be \$11 million too low to pay for the coverage.

"I'm just sorry they didn't fully fund it," Hunt said. "The plan will have to live within the money provided."

The change affects the new self-insurance program the state is establishing Oct. 1, replacing the existing health insurance program carried by Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

In the new plan, the state puts up money for claims payment and assumes the financial risk, while contracting with a Texas-based computer-systems firm to handle payments and claims processing.

The General Assembly approved the new insurance program after a bitter fight during its June session. The bill authorizing it established that policyholders would pay a \$100 deductible on the first claims, then pay 5 percent of additional bills up to another \$100 payment, for a \$200

maximum possible out-of-pocket cost.

But the bill also empowered the trustees to alter the plan if financially necessary.

The chairmen of the House and Senate appropriations

committees, who also head a legislative committee overseeing the insurance plan, are Reps. William Watkins, D-Granville, and Sen. Harold Hardison, D-Lenoir. They could not be reached for comment.

State budget officials told the panel such a benefits plan would cost \$202 million, and that the legislature had appropriated \$191 million from state money and insurance premiums paid by policyholders.

The plan approved by the trustees provides instead for a \$150 initial deductible, followed by 5 percent copayments up to \$500, resulting in a \$650 possible maximum.

"We were put on the spot here," said Ray Sparrow of Raleigh, chairman of the trustees. "We certainly didn't intend to reduce anything."

Budget officials said the \$650 maximum deductible would still be an improvement over the existing plan, which ends Sept. 30. Under it, officials said, there is no actual maximum payment because the state has frozen

payment rates for hospital rooms and other services at their October 1981 rates and policyholders must pay the difference.

According to the budget office figures, further cuts or

more money will be needed in the next state budget year beginning in July 1983. Its projections showed the plan would be \$60 million short in fiscal 1984 and \$111 million short in fiscal 1985.

## A Latin Future For Florida

MIAMI (AP) — A study that says Florida's Latin population could nearly triple by the year 2000 should be used to help plan for social change, an immigration specialist says.

If immigration and birth rates stay the same, Florida's Hispanic community would jump from 8.8 percent to 14.8 percent of the total population while the state's percentage of non-Latin whites will slip from

76.6 percent to 68.7 percent by 2000, said the report, prepared by the Population Reference Bureau, a Washington, D.C. firm.

"There is no question that society will change dramatically," Leon Bouvier, the bureau's immigration specialist said Monday. "The question is how do we adjust."

All our institutions, from the schools to the labor force, are greatly affected by this."

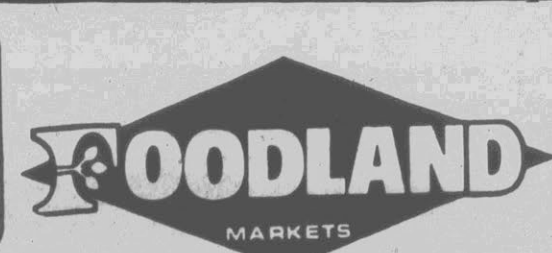

# Preparing A 'Super Bowl' Of Rock Parties

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — A million soft drinks, 600,000 hot dogs, 1,800 portable toilets, 3,200 water fountains and faucets, two convenience stores and a temporary exit ramp off Interstate 15. This party has been a year in the planning.

If organizers of the \$12.5 million US Festival haven't anticipated every need of the

250,000 people expected at the three-day rock concert, they've probably come a lot closer than any other outdoor festival promoters.

The Labor Day Weekend music celebration, which begins Friday, is the brainchild of 31-year-old computer wizard Steve Wozniak, who became a multimillionaire with the creation of the Apple II computer system.

For \$37.50 each, partici-

pants will hear such groups as the Talking Heads, Fleetwood Mac, the Kinks, Police, Santana and the B-52s.

"The timing is so right," Wozniak says. "We're talking a kind of Super Bowl of rock concerts. I decided that I wanted to do it, and the time was now."

Wozniak and a crew of about 30 — who have been living at the site since June 1

have rebuilt a concert site at Glen Helen Regional Park, north of San Bernardino about 50 miles east of Los Angeles.

"We probably removed about 340,000 cubic yards of earth," said festival site planner and developer Craig Tusher. Since ground was broken June 7, up to 60 construction workers have put in 12 miles of road and cleared 280 acres of vegeta-

tion for parking lots and campgrounds.

The concert amphitheater, now an appealing 57-acre bowl completely covered with grass, was just a sloping dirt field when it was sprayed five weeks ago with 12,000 pounds of pulp, fertilizer and a special mix of eight different kinds of grass seed.

Some 20 miles of irrigation pipe kept the amphitheater and other park areas green and moist for a six-week growing season, Tusher said.

To help avoid traffic jams, permission was obtained from the U.S. Department of Transportation to build a special temporary ramp feeding into the park from Interstate 15. That ramp and another entrance will feed cars into 350 acres of lined parking lots, while a third entrance will funnel campers and recreational vehicles into a 150-acre campground.

several first-aid centers will be installed, and a security force of more than 1,000 — including some 300 uniformed officers — has been hired.

"We're encouraging people who are coming for all three days to bring some of their own food," said Dr. Priscilla Lisicich, the festival's public relations director. But she advises anyone who doesn't want to go the brown bag route to bring \$15 to \$20 to keep themselves stocked with a dizzying variety of food and drink on sale at 87 concession stands located throughout the site.

That may not sound like many stands, but food and beverage concession director Andrew Harris points out that the 51 booths in the concert area alone will have 300 service lines.

"This is not your typical stadium fare," Harris says. Indeed, not a single ham-

burger will be on sale. But there will be all those hot-dogs, not to mention 50,000 freshly baked 10-inch french rolls and 25,000 sandwiches (Italian cold cut, roast beef, ham and swiss, tuna) being trucked in each day.

Also on sale will be bagels, cream cheese and eggs for breakfast, pizza rolls, nachos and burritos, barbecued ribs, chicken, Polish sausage, oriental food, vegetarian meals, cheese, cold cuts, ice cream, soft pretzels and fresh and dried fruit.

There are no water or power hookups for campers, who are advised to bring warm clothes, sleeping bags and ground covers, but at least some of the comforts of home will be available. The camping area is dotted with circular cement water outlets, each with two faucets and two drinking fountains; there are banks of portable toilets and even a 24-hour convenience store.

Although the park's small lakes will be off-limits, two large "cooling areas" each feature open air showers capable of spraying 5,000 people at a time.

A temporary hospital and

several first-aid centers will be installed, and a security force of more than 1,000 — including some 300 uniformed officers — has been hired.

"We're encouraging people who are coming for all three days to bring some of their own food," said Dr. Priscilla Lisicich, the festival's public relations director. But she advises anyone who doesn't want to go the brown bag route to bring \$15 to \$20 to keep themselves stocked with a dizzying variety of food and drink on sale at 87 concession stands located throughout the site.

That may not sound like many stands, but food and beverage concession director Andrew Harris points out that the 51 booths in the concert area alone will have 300 service lines.

"This is not your typical stadium fare," Harris says. Indeed, not a single ham-

## A CBS Documentary On Guatemala Set Tonight

NEW YORK (AP) — The background and issues in a complicated story like the civil strife smoldering in Guatemala don't lend themselves to two-minute reports on the evening TV news.

Yet, the conflict in Guatemala, the richest and most populous nation in Central America, is a story of immediate impact — both economically and strategically — to the United States.

Thank goodness there's "CBS Reports," which tonight examines a battle without many explosions and bomber planes, yet still is responsible for 400 political deaths a month.

In "Guatemala," CBS News finds several answers for every question asked by correspondent Ed Rabel, who offers an in-depth, balanced account.

The civil strife in this nation of 7 million is a confusing affair, but Rabel sheds light by examining the perspective of guerrillas, Guatemala's moderate military leader, his political enemies, and American businessmen.

An estimated 5,000 guerrillas, who claim widespread support among Guatemala's 3 million woefully poor Indians, say they are nationalists looking for social equality, not communists playing a part in the East-West chessboard.

Guatemala's leader, Gen. Efraim Rios Montt, says he is interested in reforms. Yet, he says, he can't coax a nation not steeped in free institutions toward democracy when he's being squeezed by guerrillas on the left and rival leaders on the right.

He has asked for American economic and military support to help him do a better job and prevent Guatemala from going the way of Cuba

and Nicaragua. As a born-again, fundamentalist Christian in this Catholic country, Rios Montt comes across as an impressive figure. He has the support of American evangelists, including Pat Robertson of the Christian Broadcasting Network.

Rios Montt's aid requests have raised disagreements in the United States, although they haven't gotten the same attention as requests from El Salvador, where civil war rages.

The Reagan administration, which believes Guatemalan insurgents are trained in Cuba, has recommended qualified support. But Rep. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, says on the program that "until the government of Guatemala absolutely stops the death squads and the massacres in the countryside, we should not give them one more bullet, one spare part or any kind of assistance."

No matter the political position, there's an American connection in Guatemala which can't be overlooked. At one time, the country was virtually a subsidiary of the United Fruit Co. When a democratically elected president attempted to initiate land reforms in 1954, the CIA overthrew him.

Today, 10,000 Americans live in Guatemala, and one-third of the 500 largest U.S. corporations operate there. The American attitude is personified by Fred Sherwood, an American businessman who owns a rubber plantation, a cement factory and part of a textile mill.

He pays his workers about \$4.50 a day.

"It's a wonderful country," Sherwood says. "The people are wonderful here. It's very friendly, they're good workers. And I would like to stay here ... and I'm gonna fight to stay here."

This economic link — along with the oil fields in nearby southern Mexico — make Guatemala more than just another domino. And tonight's documentary is a solid program that doesn't have to resort to "bang-bang."

It's a comprehensive war story, without the bloody warfare.

## Artifacts Of Aztec Temple Are On Display

NEW YORK (AP) — "Aztec Mexico: Discovery of Templo Mayor," the exhibition at the American Museum of Natural History here through Oct. 6, shares with visitors some of the results of an exciting archaeological dig.

Even the design of the installation suggests an excavation site, with sloping cutout walls, angled perspectives and narrow galleries.

The exhibition is made up of more than 100 artifacts from the site of the Templo Mayor, the great temple that was the single most important ceremonial structure of the Aztec empire, and which is at present being carefully dug out in the heart of the huge modern metropolis of Mexico City.

On show here are sculpted works, ceramics and jewelry, all in a marvelously well-preserved condition. Exhibits range from the massive Coyolxauhqui Stone and decorated human skulls to delicate pearly miniature fishes and greenstone frogs.

The present excavations in Mexico City began four years ago with the dramatic discovery of the Coyolxauhqui Stone — at night, by accident, by power-company workers digging a hole for voltage transformers.

The site of the temple had been obscure for centuries. Its foundations had been laid at the beginnings at the Aztec empire in the mid-14th century in the Aztec capital, Mexico-Tenochtitlan, over whose ruins Mexico City was built following the arrival of the Spanish conquistadors in 1519.

Tenochtitlan was destroyed during the final struggle between the Aztecs and the Spanish and the Templo Mayor was almost completely razed. For three centuries all traces of it were lost. Then by chance discoveries here and there the site was relocated, and some intermittent excavation

began.

The finding of the Coyolxauhqui Stone spurred the present wholesale excavation. Later buildings which had covered up the temple have been demolished, and all four of the temple's sides have been cleared. It's evident that there were at least seven major stages in the temple's construction, probably as successive rulers built ever-larger structures over the existing ones. The final top one was the one destroyed by the Spanish, but earlier ones survived and have yielded a wealth of finds, a sampling of which make up this exhibition.

An immediate eye-catcher is a cast of the great Coyolxauhqui Stone itself — a 10-foot-wide, 1-foot-thick oval monument, beautifully carved in dramatic relief showing the dismembered body of the evil Coyolxauhqui, sister of the god Huitzilopochtli.

Three other spectacular exhibits are a trio of sculpted stone standard bearers, more than 6 feet tall, crude, menacing figures with fierce black obsidian and white shell eyes.

The many chambers filled with offerings to Aztec gods found around the Coyolxauhqui Stone were an unexpectedly rich and illuminating source of treasures.

The offerings included images of deities, heavy stone and ceramic vessels, miniature objects, figurines, masks and sacrificial remains. Many of them, especially the masks, came from distant parts of the empire and some were already treasured antiques for the Aztecs.

Among the most charming offerings are the miniatures and jewelry, in alabaster, greenstone, mother-of-pearl and obsidian. There's an obsidian duck-head necklace; another four-strand necklace of tiny fishes, frogs, human faces and shells in mother-of-pearl, greenstone and gold.

George Tregembo's life's collection, a storehouse of ancient and contemporary artifacts collected from throughout the world, opened last weekend in a small building next to the Tote-Em-In Zoo on U.S. 421 between Wilmington and Carolina Beach.

A collector of oddities for nearly a half-century, Tregembo, 61, describes himself as a 'collectorholic'.

"I've been collecting most all my life. I've waited pretty near 30 years to set this up," he said.

"Many of the things I am showing are now unobtainable, because the countries this stuff came from have changed," he said, surveying his collection with pride. "When I was in Guinea in the 40s there were very few roads and headhunters were still around."

"See that picture there?" he said, pointing to a photo of a fierce-looking man holding a 6-foot spear. "He was a headhunter, and that knobby wooden club in the case is like what he used... Of course that's completely outlawed now."

Primitive cultures are well represented at Tregembo's museum, with memorabilia such as ancient Indian swords, African lip plugs and wooden Eskimo snow glasses displayed in sealed glass cases.

Another case filled with 2,000-year-old Roman artifacts contains a large coin with the value to purchase "one slave and a horse of good quality." In the same room, examples of the world's largest shells, eggs from the world's largest birds and specimens of the world's largest insects are displayed.

"You get a lot of people who walk through the museum and don't see a thing," Tregembo said. "But one in 10 is a real buff. Maybe it's someone who likes to see the shoes of the world, or knife collections from different cultures, or original Australian artifacts. There's a little something here for everybody."

Admission to the museum is included in the \$1.75 admission price (85 cents for children) to the Tote-Em-In Zoo, which Tregembo and his wife, June, have owned and operated since 1951. From a collection of 21 animals, it has grown to more than 130 species, making it the largest privately owned zoo in North Carolina.

Tregembo's love of collecting animals and artifacts began at the age of 12, when he converted an old hen coop into an exhibit for some of his mother's antiques. He then set about acquiring animals for a small zoo, trapping a gray fox, a breeding pair of gray squirrels and a couple of skunks in the woods surrounding his Vassalboro, Maine, home.

"That was during the Depression, and everybody was very poor," he said. "It was a way for me and my friends to have fun, and we even made a little money—maybe 30 cents on a good day."

Tregembo returned to Maine after serving in the armed forces during World War II, but seven years of harsh winters eventually drove he and his wife to a warmer climate.

The Tregembo's business has remained a family operation, with his son Robert and daughter-in-law Doris working full time caring for the zoo animals. The hours are long and vacations are rare, but the Tregembo's don't seem to mind.

"We haven't had a day off since we reopened in March," he said. "But when your business is your pleasure it doesn't always seem like work."

One of Tregembo's favorite pastimes is buying and trading with other collectors. While most of his life's collection was acquired during the war while serving in the South Pacific, trading and buying has supplemented his exhibit.

"I just don't know what my favorite items are," Tregembo said. "I love it all."

## An Ice Man Has A Dream In Desert

 TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) —  
 The ice man, Leo Golembiewski, cometh.

He's come to make ice skating and hockey a reality in a seemingly absurd setting — the southwestern desert. And, he's succeeding. "Whether you're in Chicago or Tucson or Edina, Minn., most of your skating is done indoors on artificial ice," Golembiewski said. With minimal support and under adverse conditions at best, he has started a hockey club team at the University of Arizona which has won two championships in its first two full seasons.

The heavy-set 32-year-old Chicago native looks as if he'd be more at ease in a pair of football cleats than lacing on a pair of skates. But don't be fooled.

As a kid he breathed hockey — circa Bobby Hull and his hero, goalie, Glenn Hall, of the 1960s Chicago Black Hawks. His love for the ice stuck.

He played goalie for four years at Illinois Benedictine College before spending parts of two seasons in the St. Louis Blues organization of the National Hockey League. When he didn't make it to the Blues, he decided to teach and coach.

As a coach on both the high school and college level, he says he's had to be "the mother, father, brother, coach, best friend" and motivator.

In doing so he rang up 302 wins, 42 losses and 12 ties during seven years at Lyons Township High School in suburban Chicago.

That was before he decided to pursue his desert dreams.

Golembiewski first visited Tucson in 1973 and fell in love with the desert and mountains. In 1977, as he started on a master's degree at the University of Arizona, he began thinking of Tucson as "a great place to start a hockey team."

His coaching philosophy, he said, is built on "discipline, dedication and sacrifice — and that constant urge to give 110 percent. Give a little more."

He patterned his coaching techniques after friend Scotty Bowman, now general manager and coach of the NHL's Buffalo Sabres, and describes his game as "a fast-break, Scotty Bowman-type Montreal Canadiens style."

"Play your position, don't fight at all," he says. "We body check when we have to. You've got to be in great condition — and we've done it with a 120-foot rink."

The rink they practice on — the only one in town — is about half regulation size. Most of their "home games" have been played in Tempe, though they'll play 12 games in the Tucson Community Center this season.

Golembiewski has taken over operation of the Tucson rink, hoping to instill thoughts of ice skates among a populace keyed to sandals and tank tops.

"I went into coaching to try to prove that American kids can play as well as Canadian," he said. "The thing that used to get me deep in my heart was these kids had no place to go."

He admits he harbored resentment over the favoritism openly given Canadian players in college recruiting. But he added, "The biggest problem with American hockey players is that they haven't had good coaches."

At Arizona, he led the Icecats to a 1979 record of 5-3. In 1980, they joined the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Hockey Association and posted a 17-1 record, winning the championship, before repeating last year at 12-5-2, flush with recruits from the Midwest.

Golembiewski says that he has one more goal: "I have this desire to be a coach in the NHL — at least an assistant."

But for now, he says, his mind is on Arizona's future. And during the torrid summer, his thoughts are turned toward cooler weather, pads, sticks, pucks and ice.

"Where else should you be if it's 106 degrees and muggy outside than where it's 55 degrees and cool?"

# How Tar Heel Senators And Representatives Voted

**ORGANIC FARMING** — The House defeated, by a vote of 189 for and 198 against, a bill (HR 5618) requiring the Department of Agriculture to promote farming methods that reduce the use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides. The bill would have required establishment of six organic farming pilot projects and other measures at an annual cost of \$2 million.

Rep James Weaver, D-Ore., sponsor of the bill, said alternative methods of fertilization and pest control will become vital "as oil grows more scarce and nitrogen fertilizers from fossil fuels become more scarce."

Opponent Joseph Skeen, R-N.M., called the measure an ill-advised move to study the principals of organic agriculture that have been studied and studied since the beginning of time.

Members voting "yea" favored government promotion of organic farming.

Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, L. H. Fountain, D-2, Charles Rose, D-7, and W. G. Hefner, D-8, voted "yea."

Reps. Charles Whitley, D-3, Eugene Johnston, R-6, James Martin, R-9, and William Hendon, R-11, voted "nay."

Reps. Ike Andrews, D-4, Stephen Neal, D-5, and

James Broyhill, R-10, did not vote.

**ENVIRONMENTAL RESEARCH** — By a vote of 244 for and 153 against, the House voted to continue funding for Environmental Protection Agency research at the current level of \$277.9 million per year. The Reagan administration had proposed a \$62 million cut. The vote came on an amendment to an EPA research authorization

bill (HR 6323) later passed and sent to conference with the Senate.

Rep. James Scheuer, D-N.Y., who supported the higher funding level, said the administration's proposed cut would result in "more pollution and a deterioration in environmental quality and public health."

Opponent William Carney, R-N.Y., said EPA is willing to "pare down, tighten up

and improve quality and efficiency."

Members voting "yea" supported higher funding for EPA research than the administration had requested.

Jones, Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Rose and Hefner voted "yea."

Johnston, Hendon and Martin voted "nay."

Neal and Broyhill did not vote.

**DEFENSE FUNDS** — By a vote of 251 for and 148 against, the House passed and sent to President Reagan a \$177.9 billion defense spending measure (S 2248) for fiscal 1983. The administration originally requested an authorization of \$183.5 billion. The bill also included \$182 million in additional defense funds for fiscal 1982.

Supporter William Dickinson, R-Ala., said the spending is "an adequate amount to continue the rebuilding of our military strength."

Opponent Mike Lowry, D-Wash., said "military spending cuts are an essential part of a responsible fiscal policy which will reduce record-high deficits and lead to economic recovery."

Members voting "nay" thought the defense outlay was too high.

Fountain, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Johnston, Rose, Hefner, Martin and Hendon voted "yea."

Broyhill voted "nay." Jones did not vote.

**SENATE DEFENSE BILL** — The Senate passed 77 for and 21 against and sent to the House the final version of the \$177.9 billion defense authorization bill (S 2248) for the next fiscal year.

Supporter Jeremiah Denton, R-Ala., said the bill begins the process of correcting "the defense imbalance that resulted from the fiscal neglect of our security requirements over the past decade."

Opponent William Proxmire, D-Wis., said "this bill is of unacceptable size given our economic situation."

Senators voting "yea" favored the defense bill.

Sens. John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, voted "yea."

**AIRLINE LABOR** — By a vote of 59 for and 38 against, the Senate killed a measure sought by labor unions and the Air Line Pilots Association that would have required airlines to compensate employees who lose their jobs or lose income due to airline mergers or sales.

Such protection currently is provided by Civil Aeronautics Board regulations, but the agency's authority to oversee mergers expires this year. The defeated provision would have extended income protection for five years.

The vote ruled out of order a provision attached to an airline insurance bill (HR 5930) and sent the measure back to a House - Senate conference committee.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., a supporter of killing

the provision, called it "featherbedding for some of the highest paid workers in the nation."

Sen. Howard Cannon, D-Nev., an opponent of shelving the measure, said "it is only fair to give employees this transition time before taking away something they have always had in the past."

Senators voting "nay" favored income protection for dislocated airline employees.

East and Helms voted "yea."

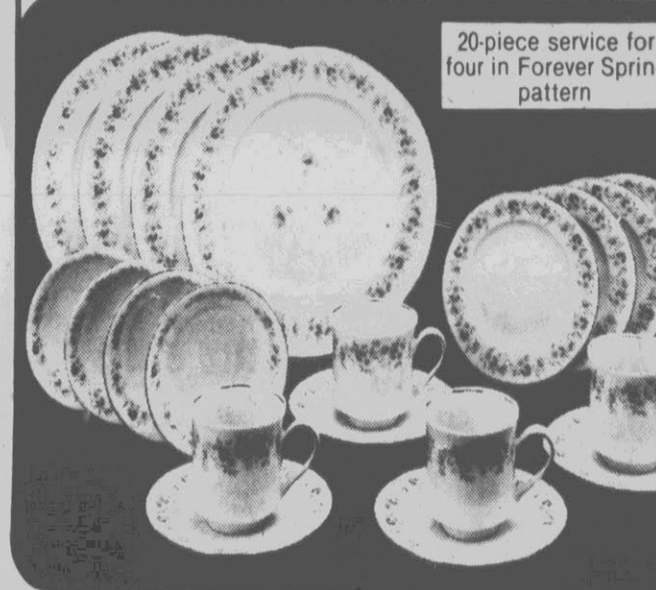

# Handicapped Youth Learns To 'Talk' By Computer

FERGUS FALLS, Minn. (AP) — The number 5 flashes on the computer screen. Watching intently, a 14-year-old who can't talk drops his frail arm. "Thump!"

The numbers 2 and 5 prompt other "thumps" on a pressure-sensitive switch and Roger has communicated a simple message: "I don't know."

The youth has memorized 1,000 three-digit numbers, each corresponding to a word or phrase — "018" means hello; "194" is friend. Words not included in Roger's vocabulary list are spelled. By dropping his arm, he advises friends that his dog's name is "118, 113, 114, 114, 115, 124" — or "Snoopy."

Dr. David Seyfried, 42, who pioneered the communication system, figures that a mute handicapped person possessing even the tiniest amount of bodily control can converse through a specifically programmed computer.

"If a person can move just

one finger or blink an eye, a communication system can be devised," says Seyfried.

Roger has been afflicted since birth with cerebral palsy, a condition that damaged the part of his brain that controls speech and muscle coordination. He can neither speak nor write. He reads. He understands what people say. He's bright, appreciative and inquisitive but he was imprisoned within himself.

"There was really no way for him to get out the thoughts and the intelligence that was locked inside his brain," says Seyfried, who came to the West Central Educational Cooperative Service Unit as a consultant for the physically handicapped in 1977. His job with the consortium of 41 school districts ended this summer because, he says, the schools were financially pinched.

In 1980, Roger was the first person aided by Seyfried's attempts to use computers as conversational tools for the handicapped. "Thanks to the teaching he'd had, we knew Roger had something in his

head. Our challenge was to get it out," Seyfried says.

Roger continued to be the star pupil even after other children joined the program. Since he was 2, Roger has lived with foster parents, the Harlan Knutsons of rural Pelican Rapids. Unable to care for himself, he must be bathed and fed, entertained and taught.

The Head Start program in Pelican Rapids got Roger started at reading when he was 5, before he was enrolled at Lakeview School, a residential facility in Worthington for children with physical handicaps. There he began using an eye-tran, a translucent board with numbers 0 to 9. Roger memorized numbers corresponding to words and then was taught to communicate by looking at numbers on the board. The other person looked through the board, saw what numbers Roger's eyes focused upon and, by using Roger's code book, translated them.

Then came Seyfried, and computer technology. Pelican Rapids schools

loaned a minicomputer for Roger's use at home. Gene Jurgens of ECSU worked up a program, using the number-word matches Roger had memorized. Because Roger had some control of his left arm, the pressure-sensitive switch idea emerged.

The display terminal has three blank squares. Numbers from 0 to 9 appear progressively in the first square. Roger hits the switch when the number he wants appears. The process is twice repeated, to give the digits which stand for the word the youth wants.

The computer lets Roger converse with people unaccustomed to eye-tran movements. Printouts enable Roger to write letters.

A larger computer would be helpful because Roger knows more words than the minicomputer memory holds. Technology exists, Seyfried says, to connect a mechanical voice into the computer.

In Seyfried's absence, part-timers will continue the project for maybe a year.

Seyfried knows of no project quite like the one here.

Roger's future is uncertain but Seyfried says one thing is sure: the youth won't be blocked by inability to communicate. The educator will never forget the message, or the moment, when Roger thumped out his first word. As the youth strained to focus his eyes on Seyfried, "003" appeared on the screen.

In Roger's code book, "003" means "thanks."

# Alaska Residency Benefits Program Is Imperiled

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — When Theresa Windred's grandmother came to Alaska by steamboat 40 years ago, life was hard here. "It really ticks me off," Miss Windred says, that state benefits favoring longtime Alaska residents like her grandmother might be scrapped.

The 19-year-old hotel desk clerk is among scores of Alaskans, both newcomers and "sourdoughs," wondering about the fate of various benefits and regulations following a U.S. Supreme Court decision June 14.

The court tossed out a state plan to distribute part of its oil wealth to citizens based on how long they had lived in Alaska. The court said the plan discriminated against newcomers.

Dozens of other programs and rules, governing everything from licensing of morticians to who gets low-interest student loans, also have residency requirements, ranging from a year to 30 years, and could be vulnerable to the precedent-setting decision.

"Which will survive legal challenge?" Attorney General Wilson Condon asks. "I don't hold out much hope for those programs and regulations that clearly reward people for length of residence."

Many Alaskans do view themselves as special if they have lived in the state for a long time, Condon says. Maybe it has something to do "with the years of natural resource exploitation from outside, by people who came for only the resources and left with the money," he adds.

"It's definitely a status thing to have lived here a long time," says Elaine Wurster, an Anchorage stockbroker who moved to the state four years ago from Worcester, Mass. "At cocktail parties, the first question you're asked is 'How long have you been here?' Anywhere else, you're asked what you do for a living."

Gov. Jay Hammond defends rewarding people with benefits from the oil-rich state treasury "commensurate to how long they've lived in Alaska."

"The idea doesn't seem that outrageous," given the inflation and difficult living conditions Alaskans have endured over the years, he says. "Obviously, if you open these programs to everyone, you would dilute them, and make them unaffordable."

Many of these programs are jeopardized by the high court's decision. That decision said Anchorage attorneys Ron and Patricia Zobel were correct in arguing that it would be discriminatory to distribute oil money from the state's permanent fund in amounts of \$50 for each year recipients had lived in Alaska since 1959.

Anticipating the Supreme Court's decision, the Legislature adopted a backup program which is now in effect. It will distribute an estimated \$416 million to people who, by Oct. 15, will have lived in the state for six months.

The Zobel decision means that "it's just an impermissible state purpose to reward people for length of residence," says Condon.

He says the ruling was like a stone thrown into a big pool of programs ranging from the highly visible \$250-a-month "longevity bonus" for pioneer senior citizens to an obscure rule that a resident must have lived here five years to be on the Rural Affairs Commission.

Condon's staff is busy recording the legal ripples, and has prepared a list of programs and regulations it believes are vulnerable to constitutional challenge.

The major programs threatened by the high court decision include:

— The two-year residency requirement for those seeking student loans of 5 percent. That program is being challenged

by Judith Andress, a third-year law student who has lived in the state 14 months and wants a loan in time for enrollment this fall at the University of California-Davis. The loans can be as high as \$6,000 a year for undergraduates and \$7,000 for graduate students.

— The longevity bonus program. Rodney Vest, 67, has filed suit against the bonus program, which gives Alaskans 65 or older \$250 a month if they have lived in Alaska 25 years and since statehood. Vest recently agreed to shelve the suit in exchange for an agreement from lawmakers that they make an effort to discuss the issue during the next legislative session.

— The Pioneers' Home program. With six homes around the state, it provides virtually free residential care.

regardless of need, to senior citizens who have lived 15 consecutive years in the state or 30 years cumulatively.

Condon also considers ripe for court challenge the requirement of five-years residence to apply for commercial fishing loans of 10.50 percent.

The list of programs with constitutional problems includes the homesite entry program, which offers land virtually cost-free to applicants who have lived in the state at least three years. The program gives priority to applicants who have lived in the state the longest, Condon says.

His staff lawyers say the licensing procedures of at least four occupations — public accountants, morticians, guides and real estate brokers — could also be in legal trouble because they have residency requirements.

## Renovation Of Mother Lode Boom Town Is Remote Dream

TIMBUCTOO, Calif. (AP) — You can skip a long trip to Africa and still boast that you've been from "here to Timbuctoo" — by driving through what's left of a once booming California mother lode town.

What's left isn't much — only a crumbling Wells Fargo building. Fire destroyed Timbuctoo's two hotels, six boarding houses, eight saloons, a church and other structures after the now nearly forgotten town slipped into a decline in the 1870s.

But Jim and Jacqueline Ashenbrenner, who bought the Yuba River townsite 2½ years ago, hope to restore the brick and stone Wells Fargo building and eventually put up replicas of some other structures.

"It's hard when you're doing it without money," says Ashenbrenner. "But we

would like to recreate the gold mining industry as it was then, and maybe in the distant future rebuild a lot of the old town."

Mrs. Ashenbrenner says that so far the venture is a hobby that could mushroom into a full-blown historic restoration project. The couple now divides time between a southern California business and work at the townsite just east of Marysville.

One of the first things done to the town by Ashenbrenner, who runs a commercial diving and diving supplies business in Reseda, was to put up a tall mesh and barbed wire fence around the old Wells Fargo building to keep out vandals and "treasure-hunters."

The building was intact until the 1960s, but since then bricks and foundation stones have been carted off, a fire has charred roof timbers, two walls were knocked out and a third has a gaping hole

in it. An iron door also is missing.

"We're trying to protect the place from those who are trying to destroy it totally," Ashenbrenner says. "The fence is to keep out the treasure-hunters."

The tin roofed structure, built in 1855, now sits amid tall weeds and oak trees. Nearby, Big Ravine Creek, choked with wild blackberries and poison oak, flows into the Yuba.

It was here, so the story goes, that white miners found a black miner busy with a pick and shovel. He was either from Timbuctoo — the ancient center of Islamic study in the great Mali empire in Africa — or he reminded them of an old song, "For he was a man from Timbuctoo."

The name stuck, and with the start of hydraulic mining in about 1854, the boom was on. Within a few years there were up to 3,500 people in

town.

Ashenbrenner says that information on five mines operating in the area shows about \$10 million in gold a year was produced at Timbuctoo's peak, when it was the largest town in eastern Yuba County. Scarred hills around the town attest to extensive use of hydraulic miners' water cannons.

Now there are only a few small houses in the Sierra Nevada foothill area around the old town, located in low, brown hills only a few miles from where the hills give way to the flat, fertile Sacramento Valley.

The road to Timbuctoo is unmarked, narrow and potholed. A main road to nearby Marysville, just north of Sacramento, runs nearby. But motorists on the main road aren't likely to notice the old townsite.

All that now marks the town is a rusted, nearly illegible metal marker put up years ago. Local historic preservation groups worked off and on over the years to save Timbuctoo, but history buff Anita Laney of Marysville says that until the Ashenbrenners got the property nothing much had been done.

Neither former owners nor local government officials were interested in the effort, she said.

# Death Rate In Soviet Union Is Reportedly Rising

WASHINGTON (AP) — Influenza, alcoholism and limited medical care are combining to cause a rising death rate in the Soviet Union, an unprecedented trend in peacetime, according to a private study.

Murray Feshbach of Georgetown University, a leading authority on the Soviet population, also reports a drop in male life expectancy since 1964 in the Soviet Union.

The declines in Soviet population growth could lead to shortages of workers and soldiers in that country by the turn of the century, the study said.

"Barring time of war, this trend is unique in the history of developed countries," Feshbach wrote in his study "The Soviet Union: Population Trends and Dilemmas," published Monday by the private, non-profit Population Reference Bureau.

Feshbach said the Soviet Union's death rate dropped to a low of 6.9 deaths per 1,000 population in 1964, but "since then, if official Soviet data are to be credited, the rate has increased by 50 percent to 10.3 in 1980. The U.S. crude death rate was 8.8 in 1980."

A population's death rate goes up when fewer children are being born, and thus elderly persons make up more of the total population. "However, the dramatic rise in the national crude death rate of the Soviet Union is beyond what can be explained by the population's 'aging' so far," he said.

Life expectancy at birth also is declining among Soviet males, Feshbach found. In 1964, it reached a high of 67 years for a male, but has since dropped to 61.9 years in 1980. By comparison, for American males, the official life expectancy at birth was 69.5 years in 1978.

"Alcoholism, now pandemic in the USSR, is undoubtedly a leading factor behind the mortality rise among working-age Soviet men, although heavy drinking is also increasing among women and teen-agers," Feshbach wrote.

"Alcohol consumption has also increased in the United States but the primary difference is that, in the USSR, hard liquor makes up 65 percent of all alcohol consumed, versus 40 percent in the U.S.," he said.

It was Feshbach who, two years ago, first disclosed an increase in Soviet infant mortality. That was attributed to a number of factors including influenza epidemics, poor prenatal care and inadequate nutrition.

That high infant mortality is also a factor in the rising Soviet death rate, he reports.

Health care has grown in the Soviet Union, but that has centered on expansion rather than upgrading quality. As a result, he concluded, the Soviet medical system is unable to

cope with the needs of the population.

And while he said Soviet leadership has expressed concern about this problem, the proportion of the national budget devoted to health care dropped from 6.6 percent in 1965 to 5.2 percent in 1978.

Feshbach said the decline in Soviet birth rates has been particularly noted among Russians Ukrainians and Belorussians, while births continued at a high level in the Asian sections of that country.

From a current estimate of 154 million Soviets of working age, Feshbach projects growth to only 158 million by 1985 and 160 million by 1990.

This means, he said, that the country's leadership can no longer count on the traditional means of expanding industrial growth through abundant supplies of manpower.

Feshbach also said the need could arise to extend conscription from two years to three to maintain Soviet armed forces at their current level of 4.8 million men.

By 1990, only 2.1 million males will turn 18, not enough to maintain the overall manpower total. But keeping them in service would prevent them from entering the labor market, worsening the shortage there.

"By 2000 one-third of all 18-year-old males available for the required two years of military service will come from the

southern republics, compared to 18 percent in 1970, while the share of 18-year-old males in the Russian Republic drops from 56 percent to 44 percent," wrote Feshbach.

These minorities often have a poor knowledge of the Russian language, the only language used in the military, he said. And "military efficiency could also be impaired by rising ethnic tensions within the ranks," he said.

Some steps have been taken to increase fertility in low-growth areas, such as grants to working mothers, partly paid maternity leave, and even encouragement of illegitimacy. But the measures are probably too limited to change the overall outlook, he concluded.

## Bleak Outlook For Aviation

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — The general aviation business is struggling to stay afloat in the face of soaring fuel costs and high long-term interest rates, North Carolina airport officials say.

"When businesses have hard times, one of the first things they cut out is their airplanes," said an official at a Charlotte-area airport who asked not to be identified. "All those factors add up to a bleak outlook on general aviation."

The nation's estimated 211,000 aircraft in general

aviation range from helicopters to crop dusters and include everything except military and scheduled commercial flights.

According to figures from the General Aviation Manufacturers Association, airplane sales fell 50 percent in the first six months of 1982, from 5,021 the previous year to 2,517.

General aviation at Charlotte's Douglas Airport is down about 15 percent from last year, the first drop since the 1974 recession.

Bernard Groseclose, tower chief at the Charlotte airport, said much of the drop could be attributed to the air-traffic controllers' strike a year ago, which put a strain on air traffic at airports serving commercial airlines.

Ben Hughes, president of Thurston Aviation in Charlotte, said Thurston's total business is off about a third from last year.

Operators of small airports in the area said business is down significantly.

"It makes me nervous as hell," said Phil Hazel, who owns the firm that leases Statesville Airport from the City of Statesville.

Freight shipping, he said, is half what it was last year, and total business is off 25 percent.

Frank Cook, assistant manager of Gastonia Airport, said the weather this summer has hurt business.

"A lot is directly related to the weather," Cook said. "This year has been unseasonably bad weather, with lots of haze. People don't want to fly to Greensboro; they'd rather drive. If you can't see anything, it's not enjoyable."

## Will Display Vintage Car

AUBURN, Ind. (AP) — The wheels of time have moved full circle for the Auburn 12, a vintage car that like its classic cousins, the Cord and Duesenberg, has been out of production for decades.

Beginning Friday, a few of the surviving cars will be displayed at the annual Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg festival.

Few people have ever heard of an Auburn, and fewer have seen one. But 50 years ago the Auburn made its debut on the American automobile market, and the northeastern Indiana community for which it was named is to honor the four-wheel legend this weekend with a parade, auction, shows and other activities.

Organizers have declared this the Year of the Auburn 12, and the festival's focal point will be the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Museum, which originally was built to be the administration building for the Auburn Automobile Co.

From those headquarters, the 12-cylinder Model 12-160 began in 1932. The company couldn't have picked a worse time to introduce it — the nation was heading into the Great Depression. Only 1,849 Auburns were produced. The model was discontinued in 1934.

## CANCELS TOUR

OTTAWA (AP) — Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau has canceled a three-week trip to Asia next month and will spend the time working on domestic economic problems instead, a spokesman says.

## Book Says U.S. 'Cracked' Code

NEW YORK (AP) — A new book says Britain received vital information about Argentine forces during the Falkland Islands war from the National Security Agency, which broke Argentina's code, Newsweek magazine reported.

In "The Puzzle Palace," author James Bamford also implies that the agency, which operates many U.S. intelligence-collection systems, can zero in on international telex, telegram and telephone conversations, Newsweek said.

Bamford, once a clerk at the agency, says none of the information has been classified or comes from the position he held. But, the magazine said, the government has reclassified some of the data and warned Bamford "not to publish or communicate the information."

# Cemetery Is A 'Home' To Caretaker

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — "The cemetery is like my bedroom — I have slept out here in the middle of the night keeping watch for prowlers, says Richard Pendleton.

Pendleton doesn't live in a typical Greensboro neighborhood. In front of his home are the 10,000 tombstones of Guilford Memorial Park.

Pendleton, the park's superintendent, has been working at the cemetery for the past 27 years. He has lived on the grounds with his wife, brother and seven of his eight children for all but two of those years.

Two daughters and two sons, along with his wife and brother, also work at the park.

Pendleton says his five-room, wood-frame house has "vaults on one side, vaults in front." The nearest grave is only 400 feet away.

His driveway is the narrow road that winds through the forest of tombstones that protrude obtrusively across the landscape.

"When I first came," he recalls, "I came just to help them out a day or two."

He got started in the cemetery business because he didn't like farming.

"I liked cotton from the time I was old enough to get into the fields until I was 16," Pendleton says, adding that working in a graveyard is a lot more appealing than picking cotton where you "stay bent over from daylight to dark."

He wanted out of the cotton patch so badly that "I walked 120 miles from Lincolnton to the sign on (Interstate) 85 saying 'Greensboro, 15 miles.'" He says he caught a ride from there to the park.

Pendleton knew there was a chance of work at the cemetery because his parents lived at the corner of the park at the time. An uncle, then superintendent, helped him get a job.

The cemetery is situated on about 100 acres off High Point Road.

The narrow roads that wind through the park break the monotony of the granite tombstones and grave markers.

The closely cut grass clings to the stones as though anchoring them in the parched earth. The air has a sense of stillness which is usually associated with death and is pierced only by the sound of chirping birds. The cemetery — which opened in 1936 — is clean and neat.

Pendleton oversees approximately 10,000 gravesites and supervises his family members in keeping the park clean. He also digs graves. Using a machine, it takes about 20 minutes. But in the early days, Pendleton says, "We did it with a pick and shovel." It took two men "anywhere from four hours to three days" to dig one grave.

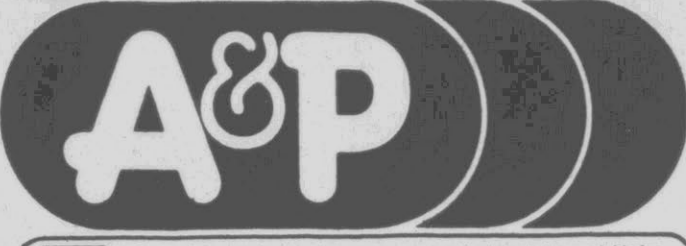
Pendleton's wife, Virgie, who married him before they moved to Greensboro, says that living near a cemetery has become a way of life for her family. She adds that their children are at home there.

Pendleton discounts any talk of things that go bump in the night.

"The cemetery is one of the safest places in Guilford County," he says.

Pendleton, 45, is proud of his profession. And of the cemetery appeals to him as a place to live and die. He says he plans to be buried there, along with his parents.

"I'm not leaving here," he says.

## No-Bug Crop Is Ultimate Future Goal

By ERIC NEWHOUSE, Associated Press Writer, ST. LOUIS (AP) — Scientists are on the threshold of developing crops which won't need to be sprayed. They will repel bugs and worms by themselves.

"Plants and insects are incredibly versatile chemists," said Dr. Thomas Eisner, a biology professor at Cornell University. "They attract each other chemically and repel each other chemically."

"Take catnip, for example. 'It drives cats crazy, but it also turns out to be a very powerful insect repellent,'" said Eisner.

"Now suppose we were able to transmit the ability to produce catnip to cotton or to corn, without affecting the taste of the corn or the texture of the cotton," he said. "Bugs wouldn't go near them."

That day is within the foreseeable future, said Eisner in a recent interview at the Missouri Botanical Gardens during a research seminar co-sponsored by Monsanto Co.

The reason is genetic engineering, the rapidly growing capability of changing a specific gene within a plant's makeup to change one specific trait — such as its productivity or its resistance to disease.

At Monsanto, for example, scientists are growing alfalfa plants which aren't harmed by a herbicide that kills the weeds around them.

The new strain was created by finding a cell which wouldn't die when treated with the herbicide, then growing the plants from that cell. But scientists say it would be simpler and quicker to isolate the proper gene than rely on random selection for change.

"Everything we've learned about chemical compounds suddenly takes on new meaning with the capabilities raised by genetic engineering," said Eisner, a biochemical engineer.

But Eisner said that only about 2 percent of the world's quarter-million plants have ever been tested for alkaloids, chemical compounds which have a strong effect on the animal nervous system like caffeine, quinine, morphine and strychnine.

"The chemicals are out there in a bewildering array," Eisner said. "But we don't know what they are yet. Nature has had millions of years to experiment so there may be fascinating new things out there."

"The problem is that this storehouse is disappearing at a record rate."

Many forms of plant and animal life have become extinct due to man's expansion into the wilderness. Half of the tropical lowland jungle, which was once about the size of Europe, has been wiped out in the past century.

Dr. Peter Raven, director of the gardens, predicted that 1 million plant species — about one-quarter of the plant life on Earth — will be extinct within the next 30 years.

And he called for scientists to catalogue the treasure trove before it is gone.

"Only one of every six organisms in the tropics has a scientific name, the minimum scientific piece of knowledge about them," Raven told nearly 100 scientists from a variety of institutions.

"This means that they're totally unknown in every respect and unavailable for any purpose, scientific or economic," said Raven.

# Trying To Enter U.S. Is Worth The Risk To Poor

EL PASO, Texas (AP) —  
The peso's falling value and a rise in unemployment has sent near-record levels of job-hungry Mexicans scaling fences, swimming rivers and crossing deserts into the United States this month, immigration officers say.

"It's worth the risk," said Jesus Gonzalez, 21. "The most I can make in Juarez is 580 pesos a day. If I get \$100 a week in the United States, that's 10,000 pesos."

For the Mexicans, it is a race against poverty, against an economic upheaval that threatens their day-to-day existence. But it's also a race against the "migra" — as the Mexicans call the U.S. Border Patrol along the 1,900-mile frontier.

"More people are coming to the United States now because the dollar's worth 100 pesos," said Arturo Mendez, 27. "We are looking for work — any kind of work."

Mendez is a carpenter, but has been unemployed in Ciudad Juarez for some time. He sees the dash across the Rio Grande into El Paso as a matter of necessity, not of choice.

"I have a wife and two children," he said.

The number of illegal aliens caught trying to get into the United States has soared near El Paso since the Mexican government allowed the peso to float on international markets Aug. 5. It has plunged from a rate of

about 49 to the dollar to 124.5 to the dollar as of Monday. Unemployment south of the border is about 40 percent and inflation is running at more than 60 percent annually.

More than 17,400 Mexicans were caught trying to enter the United States illegally in August in the West Texas-southern New Mexico sector. The exact number was to be totaled today. The all-time monthly high was about 19,000 arrested in July 1978.

Tom Collier, of the Border Patrol in Nogales, Ariz., said there has been a slight increase in arrests in his sector. "I understand that in other places they are noticing a rapid increase in apprehensions, but we haven't noticed it yet," he said.

"The devaluation is the straw that broke the camel's back," said Alan Eliason, Border Patrol chief agent in El Paso. "A lot of aliens have been struggling to get by, trying to make a living in

Juarez. Or, they would come through from time to time to earn some money on the U.S. side and then go back.

"Now, it appears large numbers of them are saying, 'I just can't take it anymore and I'm going north.'"

At age 21, Antonio Fierro is an experienced runner in the race with the Border Patrol. He boasts he has been crossing the river regularly for "six or seven years" and knows what he is doing.

"But last week, they got me five times," he said.

Usually, the Mexicans volunteer to be deported rather than go through lengthy hearings. They then are freed from Border Patrol paddy wagons at the international bridges. They often return.

"Sometimes, we wait two or three hours," said Fierro, who had crossed the so-called "Tortilla Curtain," a hole-riddled fence on the U.S. side of the border designed to stop the flow of aliens, and was waiting with some

companions Monday for a safe moment to proceed.

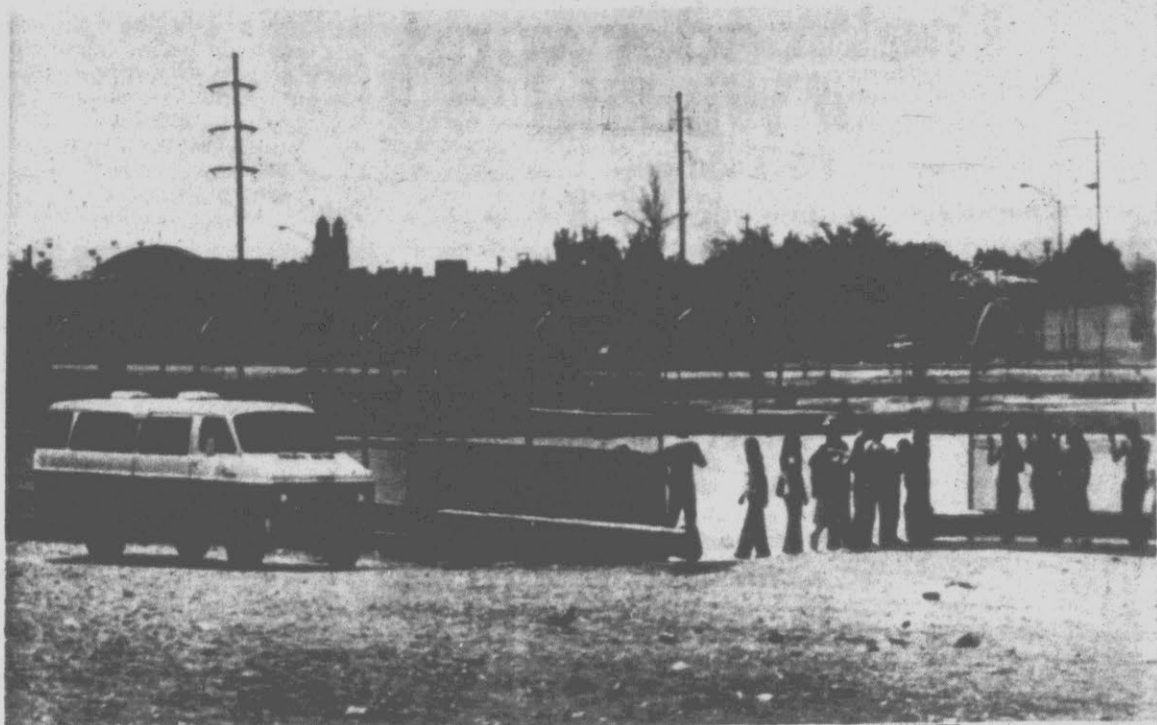
A Border Patrol van approached, and the Mexicans slipped back through the fence and waited on the Rio Grande riverbank until the van moved on.

"That's a typical problem," Eliason said. "The aliens loiter on the levee on the other side of the fence and if we roll up in a van and jump out to make arrests, they run back into the water. We seldom are able to catch anybody that way."

Instead, officers hide on streets and in railroad yards and nab the aliens when they break from the safety of the river.

Marta Lopez, 23, who is pregnant, traveled 250 miles from Chihuahua City with only one dress and her purse. She said she hopes for a job in the United States as a maid.

Are times so hard that she must make this journey? "Bastante duro," she says, "Hard enough."

## Exemption Plan Slated

N.C. Labor Commissioner John Brooks has announced the beginning of an experimental program to exempt from general schedule OSHA inspections firms which voluntarily work with the state Occupational Safety and Health Administration's on-site consultation service.

Brooks said that effective Wednesday, "Firms which voluntarily request a comprehensive consultative survey, correct any serious health or safety hazards and maintain a viable workplace safety program, will be exempted for one year from regularly scheduled OSHA enforcement inspections."

He said that by obviating enforcement inspections of workplaces that OSHA consultants have already assured are free of major hazards, the program will allow OSHA compliance officers to visit other, potentially more hazardous worksites.

The program will cover all types and sizes of general industry, including the public sector, but will initially exclude construction contractors, he said.

After one year's experience with the experimental program, the results will be analyzed and a decision will be made as to whether a permanent exemption program will be adopted.
