## Advisory Budget Group Tours Said Very Helpful

Members of the state Advisory Budget Commission, charged with recommending a budget to the governor and General Assembly for the coming biennium, toured the Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center, Pitt Community College and East Carolina University's Brody Medical Science Building as part of their budget-making process Tuesday.

Sen. Kenneth Royal of Durham, chairman of the 12 member-commission, said the panel's members "feel it is very helpful when preparing a budget to visit ... and see where the money has gone and what the needs really are."

At the Brody Building, ABC members visited several labs, the library, outpatient clinics and other areas of the \$26 million-plus facility.

Following the tour, Dr. William Laupus, ECU vice chancellor for health affairs and dean of the medical school, presented a brief review of the progress of the school of medicine and gave a look at the future.

Laupus said initial planning for the medical science building began in 1975, and said the building will be dedicated in ceremonies on Oct. 29.

According to Laupus, about one-eighth of the building has not been finished on the inside. He said an "agreement" with the University of North Carolina General Administration will allow the completion of the building through "non-state funds or earned income" so the medical school can "fill all the space and utilize it in the next five years."

Laupus, explaining that the school is "programed for 80

students" in each class, said the class size will be held at "64 for a time," but emphasized that "the facility will hold 80 if we want it to."

The medical school, Laupus said, "is still a school of development and will continue to be so for several years."

Laupus also explained and praised the arrangement that allows Pitt County Memorial Hospital to serve as the clinical training site for ECU medical students. He said that by using PCMH, the state has saved more than \$10 million.

At PCC, where the budget group had lunch, ABC members were told that the number of students at the school has increased 75 percent in the past seven years — from 8,977 students during the 1975-76 school year to 12,236 this year — with 69 percent of the students this

year coming from Pitt County.

Forty-six percent of the students are full-time, and 61 percent of the students attend day classes. College transfer students account for 11 percent of the student body, while 72 percent are enrolled in two-year technical programs and 17 percent in vocational classes.

PCC spokesmen told the ABC that the largest needs of the school are funds for new and replacement equipment, growth in enrollment and construction of new facilities.

Other needs, the advisory budget group was told, include increased funding per full-time equivalent students to provide adequate supplies and materials and salaries, and additional support for adult basic education, adult high school, human resource development and vocational education programs.

## Marines Return To Beirut Peace Role

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 800 Marines who returned to Beirut today as part of a multinational peacekeeping force will not take up their guard positions until Thursday, when reinforcements may be brought in, Pentagon officials said today.

Assistant Defense Secretary Henry Catto said the leathernecks — all infantry troops — will guard the re-opened Beirut airport and man guard posts at intersections between the airport and the presidential palace about three miles to the east. The Marines also will be

responsible for guarding all major avenues of approach to the war-torn city from the south and southeast, he said. The first company of 250 Marines went ashore at approximately 6:10 a.m., EDT, from the landing ship Manitowoc. It was about an hour late in docking because of commercial ship congestion in the city's harbor on the northern edge of the city.

About two hours later, another two companies were flown to the city's airport by helicopters aboard the USS Guam, Hermitage and Nashville, all anchored off the coast. The Hermitage is a dock landing ship; the Guam and the Nashville both carry helicopters.

By the time the Marines landed at the airport, the Israeli troops who had been stationed there had departed. The Israeli flag was lowered shortly after 6 a.m., EDT. Catto said the Marines in

the harbor area will remain there until trucks and other convoy vehicles can be unloaded from the tank landing ship Saginaw.

That could come later today. He said the Saginaw will not dock until enough commercial shipping departs to free up dock space.

The Marines in the harbor will then form a convoy and drive south to the airport to join up with the two companies there.

Catto said the Marines would spend today getting settled at the airport, reconnoitering and determining if additional forces should be brought in.

The leathernecks belong to the same 1,800-man 32nd Marine Amphibious Unit that supplied the U.S. force which helped oversee the evacuation of 6,000 Palestine Liberation Organization guerrillas from Beirut in late August and earlier this month.

## Amerasian Children Preparing To Leave For Reunions In U. S.

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Eleven children of American-Vietnamese parents are scheduled to leave Vietnam on Thursday for reunions with American fathers they have not seen for years, U.S. officials said today.

It will be the largest group of Amerasians to leave since the end of the Vietnam war.

The 11, accompanied by nine Vietnamese relatives, are scheduled to fly from Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, to Bangkok for a

stopover of several days before continuing on to new homes in the United States, said U.S. Embassy officer Donald Colin.

The seven girls and four boys aged seven to 15 are among 88 Amerasians in Vietnam documented as American citizens. The U.S. Embassy says it has files on 3,740 Amerasians who "have a burning desire to leave Vietnam now" and estimates roughly that a total of 8,000 "unassimilated" ones may want to leave. Private agencies estimate the total

number of Amerasians in Vietnam at between 25,000 and 50,000.

Colin said that one American father, Gary Tanous, of Vancouver, Wash., will be aboard an Air France flight with representatives of seven private U.S. agencies that is to arrive Thursday in Ho Chi Minh City.

Tanous' daughter Jean Marie, whom he has not seen in 14 years, will be waiting. But all other reunions will take place in the United States, Colin said.

"Letting out these kids is more than a gesture by the Vietnamese. It's a signal," Pearl S. Buck Foundation director John A. Shade Jr. said today. "I pray to God it's a new beginning."

A number of private American agencies involved in taking the children to the United States, including the Pearl Buck Foundation, are hopeful that cooperation between the United States and Vietnam on such issues as Amerasians will lead to better relations between the two countries. The two nations currently have no diplomatic ties.

In recent months Vietnamese officials have been saying that all Amerasians could leave Vietnam for the United States, and have been talking with American private groups about the issue. However, under current U.S. legislation the vast majority of the Amerasian children are not eligible for acceptance by the United States because they are not documented American citizens.

Colin said the 11 children would be going to homes in Washington D.C., Georgia, Texas, Arizona, Oregon, California and Washington.

All will be reunited with their fathers except one child whose father died and who will be living with his father's family, Colin said. He declined to identify the children or their fathers by name.

Some of the children will be accompanied by relatives other than the mother, he said.

For the past two years Tanous has been urging American and Vietnamese officials to help him get his 15-year-old daughter out of Vietnam. Tanous, formerly a civilian contracts employee in Vietnam, has divorced his Vietnamese wife who is now living in the United States.

A large percentage of the children are fathers of U.S. civilians who worked in Vietnam during the war, the U.S. Embassy says. Many of the children live in or around Ho Chi Minh city, some in orphanages, and others roam the streets selling peanuts, candy and movie tickets.

The Hanoi government says there is no official discrimination against these children. But unofficial acts of racism and discrimination are common and many are barred from schools and job opportunities, according to mothers of the children.

"They suffer the emotional and psychological consequences of being Amerasians," Colin said.

## Reagan Asserts Force To Stay As Necessary

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says the U.S. Marines who landed in Beirut today will remain there until all foreign forces are withdrawn from Lebanon, and "I think that's going to come rapidly."

"The Lebanese government will be the ones that tell us when they feel that they're in charge and (the troops) can go home," the president said at a nationally broadcast news conference Tuesday evening.

Reagan's comments were the first he has made on the tour of duty for the Marines, who landed early today at Beirut's harbor and airport to join Italian and French troops in a 3,000-man multinational peacekeeping force.

When "Lebanon says that they have the situation well in hand, why, we'll depart," the president said.

He said the Marines, a force of roughly 1,200, would lend "support and stability" to the government of Amin Gemayel, the new Lebanese president. "While that's taking place, the withdrawal ... of the Israelis and the Syrians" from all of Lebanon was expected, he said.

Question: Are you then saying that they will remain there until all foreign forces are withdrawn?

Reagan: "Yes, because I think that's going to come rapidly."

Under the War Powers Act, Congress has authority to order withdrawal of U.S. forces 60 days after their deployment to a hostile zone.

Reagan also, and for the first time, acknowledged that the unemployment rate might move up from the current 9.8 percent when the September jobless figures are disclosed on Oct. 8.

"It is possible that we might touch 10 percent," he said.

The unemployment figures are becoming a focus of the current congressional campaign. Later today, the president was planning to visit Richmond, Va., to campaign for Rep. Paul Trible, the Republican senatorial candidate opposed by Democrat Richard Davis, the state's lieutenant governor.

Reagan, who sought to focus attention on economic gains while unemployment and business failures have grown, said that there would be no tax increases next year "unless there's a palace coup and I'm overtaken or overthrown."

The president said that in August, the economy was "kind of in the doldrums," but he said, as he has since the spring, that most signs point to a recovery.

## Cooking Is Fun

Mothers who want a new, good and nutritious cookie to bake for their youngsters may be interested in trying this recipe for Waldorf Salad Cookies. They are our own invention. We dreamed them up because Waldorf Salad is so popular and because many American cooks dote on using mayonnaise as a product in baking. You'll find these cookies are fine to pack into lunch boxes and to offer for after-school snacks.

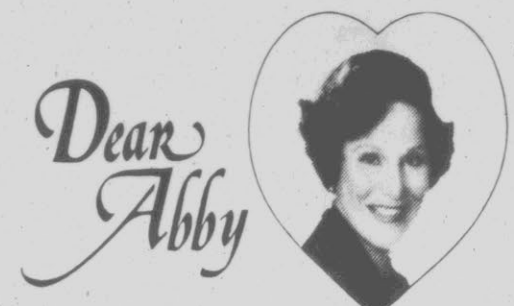
**WALDORF SALAD DROP COOKIES**  
2 3/4 cups all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 1/2 cups firmly packed light brown sugar  
3/4 cup real mayonnaise  
2 large eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped unpeeled red apple  
1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts  
1/4 cup finely chopped celery

In a medium bowl stir together the flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon. In the large bowl of an electric mixer at medium speed, beat together the sugar, mayonnaise, eggs and vanilla until smooth. Add flour mixture and at low speed beat until smooth. Stir in the apple, walnuts and celery.

Drop by level tablespoonfuls, 2 inches apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until lightly browned — 10 to 12 minutes. With a wide spatula, remove to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in a tightly covered container.

Makes about 4 dozen.

**CHILI CHICKEN**

Easy to make and one of my new inventions.

3½ to 3¾-pound roasting chicken

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon paprika

Chili powder

1 large (6 ounces) onion, thinly sliced

1 large (6 ounces) green pepper (seeds and white membranes removed), thinly sliced

¼ teaspoon ground cumin

16-ounce can tomatoes (undrained), cut up

Wash and dry chicken. Mix salt, paprika and 1 teaspoon chili powder; rub over skin side of chicken. Arrange chicken, skin side up, in one layer in a buttered 13½ by 8¾ by 1¼-inch baking dish. Bake in a preheated 450-degree oven, uncovered, for 15 minutes; baste chicken with drippings; remove chicken from baking dish. Turn oven control to 350 degrees. Into drippings in baking dish stir onion, green pepper, 2 tablespoons (or to taste) chili powder and the cumin; stir in tomatoes. Arrange chicken, skin side up, over tomato mixture. Bake, uncovered, in the 350-degree oven until chicken is tender and partly charred — 30 minutes longer. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

The fruit sinks to the bottom and the batter forms a cake-like top.

16-ounce can unsweetened mixed fruit packed in fruit juice

16-ounce can unpeeled apricot halves packed in fruit juice

¼-pound stick (½ cup) butter

¾ cup all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 cup sugar

¾ cup milk

Turn mixed fruit and apricots into a strainer to drain — there should be a generous 1½ cups juice. (Use juice in some other dish or in a drink.) Quarter each apricot half. # Nursing Is Supported

There is still a major need for nurses, particularly in our own county where Pitt County Memorial Hospital is still expanding. The students who complete the nursing program at PCC have every reason to expect that positions will be available for them.

Certainly the appropriation for maintaining the PCC nursing program is money well spent for Pitt County.

# Study of Offerings In Order

Pitt Community College trustee chairman W.C. Everett Sr. said at a recent meeting he had instructed President William E. Fulford to study the feasibility of discontinuing any programs now offered by the college.

If any programs are ended, Everett said, the space freed would be converted to high-priority programs.

It is an evaluation that needs to

be done. Community colleges offer many programs which are desirable, but in the final analysis the courses which prepare students to earn a living are most essential in the current times.

The college, as all governmental agencies, has to develop the most efficient use of all its facilities under current economic conditions, and a thorough study of all its course offerings is in order.

# Punishment Vital

RALEIGH — Talk about alternatives to imprisoning criminals and the public howls. At a time when the crime rate is rising faster than food prices and when 20,000 Americans are being murdered every year, the citizenry isn't in the mood for any fancy corrections work. They want criminals off the street and safely tucked away in the big house.

But within the Department of Correction, the criminal justice system and even in the Legislature, the argument is starting to be made that the state can no longer afford to have just about the highest rate of incarceration in the country. It costs an average of \$9,500 a year to keep a prisoner locked up. Cells today cost about \$54,000 to build.

Rae McNamara, state prisons director, says punishment is the secret to success with any program of alternatives to incarceration. At the state's conference on crime and justice in Raleigh this month, she said, "We've got to let the people know that we're talking about punishment." If a defendant isn't sent to jail, it looks like he got off easy. Advocates of prison alternatives must be able to convince the public that probation which includes compensation to the crime victim and a schedule of community service work is punishment.

In 1981 the Legislature showed a willingness to try some alternatives. The assembly provided \$650,000 to the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety to fund pilot projects that keep criminals out of jail — where they cost the taxpayer money — and at home where they can repay their victims for the monetary loss they may have caused.

Don Welch, supervisor of

the state's deferred prosecution program in Charlotte, told the conference that about 500 defendants have taken part in his program in its first 15 months.

The program is open only to first offenders and those who are accused of a crime that carries less than a 10-year maximum sentence. Those accused of felonious

in and the prosecutor now has his signed admission of guilt.

Before a defendant can enter the program, he must get the permission of the victim of his crime and of the arresting police officer. Welch said about 80 percent of the victims agree to it.

Welch says the program has been a big success so far. In the first year, 117 people completed their contracts and avoided trial. Only 18 flunked. In that year he figures he saved 2,400 hours of court time. On average, a person in an alternative program costs the state only \$600 a year in comparison to \$9,500 for one imprisoned.

Welch sees the program in his county eventually growing to 3,000 participants a year. State law allows such a program to be set up in any county where the district attorney is willing. So far, only Mecklenburg has a full-time program while several other counties are handling a few such cases.

If they're interested, they meet with one of the program's four probation officers who then drafts a contract between the defendant and the prosecutor. The defendant admits his guilt and promises to repay his victim. He also sets out a schedule — usually six months long — of community service work. Things like helping a charitable group, picking up litter for the city or helping the garden club plant shrubbery. He also agrees to undergo counseling for his problems.

# Other Editors Say Bargains In Courts

(Mt. Airy News)

Bargains have a rightful place in department stores and at flea markets and yard sales, but not necessarily in the courtroom.

In recent months, we believe the plea bargain — sometimes a useful tool for reducing court caseloads, making disposition of justice more efficient and saving the state the expense of a jury trial — has been abused by the District Attorney's office in Surry County.

Example: A Mount Airy man who was charged with first degree murder in the death of another man — who was shot six times and pistol-whipped in the face — was allowed to plead guilty to a lesser charge, second degree murder yesterday in Surry County Superior Court.

Example: Last week in Superior Court, the cases of 11 defendants in an interstate stolen goods operation — including two former Surry County deputies — were handled through a series of plea arrangements.

Example: Seven defendants in a methaqualone manufacturing operation had their cases disposed of in Superior Court — again by means of the plea-bargaining routine.

Of course, the acceptance of plea arrangements in the above cases saved much time and expense; the District Attorney's office also looks good when they reduce heavy caseloads more quickly.

But whatever happened to the practice of trying cases before a jury, the basic ingredient in the criminal justice system? It seems the number of jury cases in Surry County in the last year can be counted on one hand.

The jury concept — whereby a defendant's guilt is presumably determined by 12 of his peers — remains the most effective ways of administering justice. But the concept cannot work if prosecutors never allow a jury trial to be held.

We have no problem with prosecutors' accepting plea bargains for smaller cases, especially when the evidence in those cases is weak and the state does not think a conviction can be obtained.

But the plea bargain should be the exception more than the rule and most serious felonies should be tried before a jury — certainly murder cases.

In a recent political campaign involving the present District Attorney, his opponent charged that too many plea bargains were being accepted. Was that more than political rhetoric?

# Only Option Left Reagan

WASHINGTON — Unwilling to punish Israel, President Reagan is turning toward fatter arms deliveries to pro-Arab states as proof of even-handedness in the Mideast and as a restraint against future Israeli adventures.

The move is certain to provoke Israel and likely to encounter resistance in Congress, but Reagan has no other options. Otherwise, Arab countries such as Egypt, Jordan and the Persian Gulf states will conclude that American impotence in curbing Israel's bloody Lebanon operations puts the U.S. in Israel's hip pocket.

The first signal of the post-Lebanon policy switch is the decision to give the tiny Gulf state of Bahrain its own air force. Jordan will soon be ticketed for new aircraft and a mobile air defense system. In Egypt, President Hosni Mubarak privately warns the U.S. that some measure of arms balance in the Middle East is essential to prevent new runaway military operations by Israel (described by Reagan as "David" transformed into "Goliath").

The turn to higher arms shipments for the Arabs is dictated by the president's refusal even to consider punitive measures against Israel. Reagan has ruled out any administration support for cutting the nearly \$3 billion in annual economic and military aid to Israel. White House insiders angrily deny published reports that Reagan wants to maneuver Begin out of office.

Thus, the only remaining way to signal U.S. support to Washington's Arab allies lies in building up their puny military establishments. That neatly fits Pentagon strategic thinking going back to the early Persian Gulf crisis following the Islamic revolution in Iran. The Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) has warned for months that anti-U.S. sentiment born out of the Palestinian issue threatens to wreck the Rapid Deployment Force; more arms for Arabs could soften that mood.

Policymakers agree an overt crackdown on Begin would better convince the Arabs that the U.S. is a reliable mediator between Israel and the Arabs. But

with that ruled out, one high official asked us, "What else is left but military aid?"

The \$180 million cash-and-carry arms package for Bahrain, which went to a skeptical Congress last Friday, will be followed by a larger arms package for Jordan. King Hussein is ready to accept the Reagan Palestinian peace plan if other Arab states agree and if Begin can be talked out of his outright rejection.

The most important arms aid under Pentagon study is destined for Egypt, the only Arab country that has signed a peace treaty with Israel. The Lebanon crisis dangerously undermined Mubarak, forcing him to withdraw his ambassador to Tel Aviv. Last week nearly 200 right-wing Moslem extremists were arrested and jailed for plotting Mubarak's overthrow as an American ally and an Israeli treaty partner.

Visiting Cairo early this month, Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger got an earful from Mubarak and Defense Minister Abu Ghazala. He was told Egypt's military needs must be met, both to compensate for Israel's awesome might and to strengthen Egypt's role as protector of Somalia and the Sudan against Soviet-backed Ethiopia and Libya.

The question now is whether pre-election congressional sentiment for Israel, remarkably intact despite the Beirut massacre, will remain that way in the new Congress. Sen. Robert Kasten, the conservative Republican chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Foreign Aid, was ready last week to add \$425 million to Reagan's Israeli aid request. One reason: the prospect of higher Arab arms sales.

Kasten was supported by at least five of the subcommittee's nine members. State Department officials, belatedly learning details of the bill, intervened. Headlines trumpeting a half-billion-dollar aid increase for Israel but no increase for Arab states, they suggested, would seem a reward for Israel at a time when the president was begging Begin to behave. Kasten agreed to delay the vote.

Aid for Israel therefore will stay at current levels for now.

# Predicts Revitalized America

AP Business Writer NEW YORK (AP) — As Herman Kahn acknowledges in the preface to his new book, his timing might seem to be off.

The book is called "The Coming Boom: Economic, Political and Social," and it appears at a time when a boom of any sort looks like a distant prospect indeed.

The unemployment rate stands at a post-World War II high of 9.8 percent. When the next government report on the jobless rate is issued on Oct. 8, many economists believe it could climb into double figures.

According to Dun & Bradstreet Corp., businesses are filing bankruptcy petitions at a rate not seen since the 1930s — 85 out of every 10,000 through the first 8½ months of this year.

At many other companies, earnings are under pressure. Last year, Standard & Poor's Corp. reports, profit margins of a sample of 400 large industrial companies averaged out to a near-

record low of 4.86 cents for every dollar of sales.

"As dismal as 1981 was for profit margins, 1982 is likely to prove even worse," Standard & Poor's reported.

In short, suggests Raymond F. DeVoe Jr., an investment analyst at the firm of Legg Mason Wood Walker Inc., it is a time when paranoia might be defined as "being in possession of all the facts."

Kahn, chairman and director of research at the Hudson Institute and a prominent "futurist," says something very similar at the outset of his book (published by Simon and Schuster, New York, and priced at \$14.95).

Surveying recent economic conditions, he concedes, "some sober concern, if not paranoia, is clearly justified."

Still, in the 228 pages that follow, he lays out his case for "a revitalized America — revitalized in terms of traditional values, of worldwide status and influence, and of citizenship and morale, as

well as of economic improvement."

Some of the principal reasons he cites for that prediction: Reduced inflation, new technologies and increased savings to help encourage "a long-term capital boom," improving productivity resulting partly from the maturing of the baby-boom generation, and the prospect that "energy should no longer be a depressing influence on the economy."

Kahn labels himself a "guarded optimist"; he does not assert that the picture he paints is a certainty. As he acknowledges in a footnote, the phrase "barring some perverse combination of bad luck and bad management" appears several times in his discussion.

On the subject of energy, he sees the troublesome possibility of a "self-defeating prophecy. If the energy picture looks too rosy, there may, for example, be a slowdown in U.S. efforts to become less dependent upon foreign oil."

Kahn also says that high technology, with all it promises, could bring problems as well: "We are dealing with new technologies and products and other innovations on a scale and with a variety of possible effects that is genuinely frightening."

With all that, Kahn envisions a future in which poverty, as it is now defined, will "disappear" in this country by the year 2000. A century later, he visualizes a society with per capita income of \$50,000 a year in 1980 dollars, which could be in a position to "turn many of its energies away from economic development and increasing affluence and take up other objectives instead."

Kahn is known for "thinking about the unthinkable" (in fact, that is the title of an earlier book) — tackling subjects like nuclear war that don't exactly make for comfortable contemplation. To the many pessimists of today, his "coming boom" may be improbable, but it is nice to think about.

## Woolly Worms Work On Weather Forecast

Woolly worms in the North Carolina mountains are deciding whether to wear their heavy black coats for a cold, snowy winter or their lighter brown coats for a mild winter this year.

Scientists at Appalachian State University in Boone will begin collecting several hundred of the small, furry creatures this week for their research. They will announce the worms' weather predictions at the end of next month.

"I plan to begin collecting woolly worms from the roadsides on Oct. 1," said Dr. Sandra Glover, director of the center for woolly worm studies at Appalachian. "I usually study several hundred to determine what kind of weather the winter will bring."

This is the eighth year Dr. Glover has conducted her woolly worm studies at the college.

Woolly-worm weather predictions are based on the folk belief that the coloring of the worms in the fall is an indication of the winter to come. The more black on the brown-and-black-striped worms, the colder or more severe the winter. More of the reddish-brown coloring means a mild winter.

Dr. Glover says about 500 of the worms are necessary to compile data on their coloring and make the prediction. She said she will use adult worms, about three months old, in her studies.

She is also hatching baby woolies in her laboratory from eggs collected from female worms. She says she will use the babies, about the size of a pencil dot when they're hatched, for life-cycle studies on the worms.

Dr. Glover says she plans to collect the worms for two more years to try to determine if there's any truth to the folklore about the worms and what, if any, environmental factors causes colors on the caterpillars to vary from autumn to autumn.

So far, Dr. Glover says she hasn't come to any conclusions.

"When my 10 years' of studies are finished, then maybe I'll be able to reach a conclusion," she said.

While meteorologists say

they don't put much faith in weather predictions made by worms, people around Boone take woolly worms seriously. Each October, the neighboring town of Banner Elk hosts a Woolly Worm Festival where the town's mayor makes his own weather predictions from looking at woolly worms.

The highlight of the festival is a woolly-worm race. The worms are timed as they climb a string stretched at an angle. Approximately 10 worms race at a time, then the winners of each heat race against each other.

The trainer of the cham-

# Work Resumes On Cathedral After 41-Year Lapse

NEW YORK (AP) — The world's largest cathedral, almost a century old but still brooding in unfinished Gothic grandeur, is growing again — through faith, money and a revival of the ancient stonemason's craft.

to be placed today, marking the first work on the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine since a world war forced workers to lay down their tools 41 years ago.

And as the west towers push upward — their first stone blessed by the Rt. Rev. Paul Moore Jr., Episcopal bishop of New York — more than a church will be grow-

ing. "What's wonderful about cathedrals is that throughout history ... they represented the very best of the common life of the community life around them," said the cathedral's dean, James Park Morton, referring to the fact that each stone was cut and fitted by apprentice stonemasons drawn from

depressed neighborhoods. The cathedral is 601 feet long and 207 feet across the front, its nave vaulting 124 feet high. A note from the organ can reverberate as long as nine seconds between the limestone walls.

St. John's is about 10 feet shorter than the Basilica of St. Peter's in Rome, which is the world's largest church but is not a cathedral.

Construction on St. John's came to a halt after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, when workers departed to fight and construction materials were donated to the war effort.

For years, as church leaders faced questions about whether their commitment was to people or monuments, it seemed the cathedral might never be finished.

Morton, who promised during his first St. John's sermon 10 years ago that the cathedral would grow again, proposed the apprentice program as a way to help both community and church.

# Deputy Undergoes Operation For Gunshot

Deputy Sheriff Billy Braswell today remained in "guarded but stable condition" at Pitt County Memorial Hospital where he underwent surgery for gunshot wounds as authorities continued to investigate the Monday morning murder of his wife, Lillie.

A spokesman at the Greenville office of the State Bureau of Investigation said that, as of this morning, no charges have been preferred. The spokesman said, "It will be a few more days before we decide where we will go." The SBI official said he had "no comment" as to whether authorities have witnesses and he said he

could not comment on further details of the case or circumstances surrounding the investigation. Mrs. Braswell, who was head teller at the Northwest Branch of First State Bank in Greenville, died of gunshot wounds to the chest, according to Dr. Stan Harris, Pitt medical examiner. Her body, according to authorities, was discovered around 11:40 a.m. by a passing motorist near the intersection of Chinquapin Road and U.S. 264 Alternate east of Farmville. Mrs. Braswell had left the First State branch Monday morning, telling manager Jerry Jones that she would "be back in a few minutes," Jones said.

Braswell, a deputy with the Pitt Sheriff's Department since 1969, was found at his home on South Green Street in Farmville around 1:15 p.m., suffering from what were described as gunshot wounds to the chest. The SBI spokesman said this morning that agents have not been able to talk with Braswell. Sheriff Ralph Tyson reiterated today that he has

asked the SBI to handle the investigation and, saying he would not comment on the homicide, referred questions to the SBI. Tyson was asked about the comments of Daryl Daughtry of Farmville, who contended Tuesday that a period of about two and half hours elapsed from the discovery of Mrs. Braswell's body to the arrival of SBI agents. Daughtry said Mrs. Braswell's body remained at the scene until the SBI arrived. Tyson said his officers were "trying to preserve the crime scene" until the SBI personnel arrived but he declined further comment. Daughtry said Tuesday that his wife reported she saw a car beside the road

near the intersection with a woman's body behind it and she notified authorities. Daughtry said he joined his wife at the scene and they were told to remain there until SBI agents arrived. The SBI spokesman also declined to elaborate on the alleged lapse of time other than to say he was in Ahsokie working on a case and re-

turned to Greenville after his office was able to get in touch with him. SBI agents from outside the Greenville area were

apparently called in Monday to investigate, a source indicated. A spokesman for the Pitt County Superior Court clerk's office reported this morning that there were no records on file there of any legal action between Mrs. Braswell and her husband.

# Judge Threatens N.J. Teachers As Michigan Teachers Walk Out

Teachers went on strike in a Michigan public school system, students returned to class in an Illinois district, and a judge threatened to hold Teaneck, N.J., teachers in custody in a school building if they violated his back-to-work order.

Nationwide, about 286,000 students stayed out of class as month's end neared. About 200,000 of them were in Detroit and the rest were in smaller districts in Pennsylvania, Michigan, New Jersey and Illinois.

In New Jersey, a judge planned to meet today with 14 negotiators for 419 striking teachers and 170 secretaries and aides in Teaneck.

The striking teachers promised mass picketing today in protest of Superior Court Judge Sherwin D. Lester's order that they be held in a school building if they continue to defy his back-to-work order, said union spokesman Vince Giordano.

Talks between negotiators for the school board and the striking employees broke off Tuesday without a settlement. The board's latest offer would raise salaries by 16.5 percent over two years. The union seeks 19.5 percent.

Lester threatened Tuesday to fine strikers unless they return to work. Last week, he fined 14 union negotiators for ignoring his order to end the strike, which began Sept. 17 and affects 5,200 students. Schools have stayed open.

Lester ordered the Bergen County sheriff and the Teaneck police chief to confine strikers in schools from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. on school days.

Elsewhere in New Jersey, the Waldwick Education Association approved a contract agreement reached Tues-

day, ending a week-long strike by 127 teachers. The district's 1,750 students had been taught by substitutes. The one-year pact calls for a 9 percent pay raise.

In Detroit, school board member Gerald O'Neill proposed at a board meeting Tuesday night that the teachers be dismissed if they don't return to class by next week. The proposal died with no support from his fellow board members.

"I think everybody's getting fed up with this," he said of the strike.

The 9,800 Detroit teachers walked out Sept. 13. The board wants teachers to make concessions including accepting eight payless holidays that would be reimbursed in cash upon retirement. Union leaders say they won't make concessions in addition to a freeze of last year's contract terms. The teachers' pay ranges from \$15,000 to \$30,000.

No talks are scheduled between the school board and the Detroit Federation of Teachers, but state mediator David Tanzman has begun fact-finding procedures.

Elsewhere in Michigan, 1,225 students were idled when 46 teachers in Saginaw County's Merrill school district walked out Tuesday. No talks were scheduled in the dispute over salary, fringe benefits and class size, school Superintendent Don Aubert said.

In Illinois, 3,000 students and 185 teachers were back in class Tuesday in the Lake Zurich School District 95 after a tentative contract agreement was reached in an all-night bargaining session. Details of the pact were not revealed. The walkout began last Thursday in the district northwest of Chicago, and officials said the main issue was wages.

## Air Controllers In Other Jobs

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Even as they search for other jobs, North Carolina air traffic controllers fired after going on strike are fighting to be rehired in their old positions.

Thirty-nine controllers are asking the U.S. Merit Systems Protection Board to give them their jobs back during hearings this week in Fayetteville.

They are among 11,400 controllers dismissed nationwide after walking off their jobs in a Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization strike over wages and working conditions.

"It was kind of tough there for a while but some have had it rougher," said former Wilmington controller Robert Springle. "Some fellows aren't working yet."

Springle said he found a job in March as associate director of a Baptist retreat near Wilmington. He worked for a peanut processor before that.

Dennis E. Abbott, a former Fayetteville controller, said he went to Florida and drove a truck for a living. He said

he was prepared for the strike and had saved some money.

"I thought at first I wouldn't want to do anything but air traffic, but I've found I'm a survivor and I've come to believe in myself," Abbott said.

Nancy A. Self, another former Fayetteville controller, is working as a legal secretary.

"I'm looking for something as satisfying as air traffic work, but I haven't found it," she said. "It's challenging. It was satisfying if you knew you did a good job."

Jeff Atchley, a former Raleigh controller, said the controllers have been portrayed by news reports as people who struck only for higher wages. He said their biggest concern was a safe air traffic system.

"Even though we're concerned about getting our jobs back, most of us are concerned that the system today is safe," he said. "And the FAA intentionally or because they're a big agency, is keeping the public unaware of that fact."

# Discuss Needs Of Handicapped

Deregulation amounts to condoning educational discrimination against the handicapped, Brian Rangeley, a handicapped East Carolina University student, said as one of several opponents of proposed relaxation amendments to the federal Education of All Handicapped Children Act (Public Law 94-142) during a press conference in Greenville.

Myree Hayes, chairman of the Governor's Advocacy Council for Persons with Disabilities, said the conference was called to make the public aware of proposed amendments to the law, which has been in effect since 1975 and which they see

as the educational salvation of students with all kinds of handicaps. The law calls for free and appropriate education for all handicapped children.

Ms. Hayes said a public hearing will be held on the proposed changes tonight at 7 p.m. at the Willis Building.

Those proposing the amendments say the changes are needed to cut down on regulation and paperwork required of the school systems which administer the law.

"There is a lot of paperwork," Greenville school administrator Charles Ross said, "but we think the law is a good one and we want it to continue in order to ensure the same quality of individualized education we have now for our handicapped students of the future."

Keeping the teeth in the law is essential, Dr. Malene Irons, a Greenville pediatrician and former director of the ECU-related Developmental Evaluation Clinic, said. "Present amendment proposals," she said, "leave off individualized treatment of handicapped children. And that's the only way that public education of the handicapped can succeed. They are individuals with individual problems, often with multiple handicaps. The present individualized planning of the educational program of each, done with input from the parents, is the best and only effective way to meet their educational

needs.

"It does take extra time on the part of teachers and counselors, but most now are willing to take that extra time. We can't be sure, though, that the teachers and administrators of the future will be willing if it's not provided for in the law."

Dr. Irons called mainstreaming (placing handicapped children in regular classrooms with no extra assistance) "a copout."

"It just won't work," she said. "These are special children with special needs."

Sandi Hall, president of the local Association for Retarded Citizens, said, "I am the parent of a handicapped child. I see this as a law that has worked well — one that everyone involved is just beginning to get used to and get maximum value from. Do these amendment proposers want our children returned to the closets? I don't think so, but they need

to know that this could well be what happens if, in the name of deregulation, the law is made virtually ineffectual."

Ross and Dr. Bill Martin, a special education educator of East Carolina University, talked about the funding cuts that have already hampered education of the handicapped in this area. "This block grant idea has set us at odds with advocates of other needs," Martin said, "and has put a lot more on the backs of local officials. We need a strong law to ensure that handicapped children are not slighted."

## C-of-C Trip To Columbia

Twenty-two chamber of commerce leaders from Pitt County and Greenville left today for an inter-city visit to Columbia, Mo.

According to Larkin Little, chairman of the board of Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce, the trip, planned by the local concerns committee of the chamber, will allow participants to conduct a study of the progress and problems that a city the projected size of Greenville in the year 2000 has experi-

enced. Columbia, Mo., has a population of 60,000, has a major university that houses a medical school and has a good-sized industrial base. According to Little, the Pitt County group will talk with officials of the university, city officials and representatives from the downtown district. They will tour the area, see slide presentations and attend the ECU-University of Missouri football game Saturday.

The outcome of the trip will be discussed at the upcoming out-of-town planning conference scheduled for Nov. 12-14 at Williamsburg, Va.

## Will Speak At District Rally

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market headed lower today, continuing the decline that began late Tuesday.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 1.11 to 917.22 in the first half hour.

Losers took a 5-4 lead over gainers in the early tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Stock prices have been fluctuating in a narrow range since the beginning of the week, leveling off after their explosive late-summer rally.

The market showed little positive response Tuesday when interest rates declined in the credit markets and Bankers Trust of New York lowered its prime lending rate from 13 1/2 to 13 percent.

Analysts said falling rates were taken as a symptom of lingering weakness in the economy. They said stock traders might be having some second thoughts about their hopes for the beginnings of a recovery from the recession within the next few months.

Today's early prices included Blue Bell, up 3/4 at 28 1/4; Sears Roebuck, down 1/8 at 23 1/2; and Digital Equipment, off 1/4 at 82 1/2.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrials average dropped 1.57 to 919.33.

But a few more stocks rose in price than fell on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 65.90 million shares, up from 44.84 million in the previous session.

The NYSE's composite index slipped .18 to 70.70. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was off .49 at 288.70.

## Says New Plant Ready In March

Simpson Industries Inc. expects to begin production in its new Greenville plant in March, plant manager Gene Hiner said Tuesday.

Hiner, speaking at a Pepsi Break session sponsored by the Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce, said the company expects to take occupancy of its building in January. Initial employment will be about 25 with the potential of expanding to 175 to 300, he said.

The Simpson plant will manufacture machined engine parts for Consolidated Diesel at Whitakers, a company formed recently by the companies that manufacture Cummins diesel engines and Case tractor and industrial equipment.

Hiner said Simpson, which is based in Michigan, became interested in the Greenville area as a result of its contact with Consolidated Diesel, which required its supplier to be located within a short shipping distance of its plant.

From there, Hiner said, Simpson began "looking for a good community in which to live, a community with a good industrial base," and selected Greenville.

Simpson Industrials, established in the 1930s as a supplier of machined parts to Ford Motor Co., has expanded its operations in the last three decades to produce parts for most of the U.S. automakers as well as some foreign manufacturers, the space industry and for some heavy equipment manufacturers. Ford remains the largest single market source for the company.

Hiner said long-range plans call for the Greenville plant to sell 70 percent of its output to Consolidated Diesel.



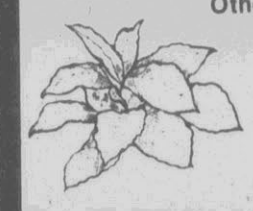

And now it's the Braves. Again. "I'm not about to pop the champagne," Atlanta Manager Joe Torre said. "They wanted me to pop it in July when we were ahead, but it'll have to stay on ice for a while."

With just five games left in the wild National League West pennant chase, Atlanta moved into sole possession of first place for the first time since Sept. 12 with an 8-3 rout of San Francisco Tuesday night. Meanwhile, the Los Angeles Dodgers absorbed their seventh straight defeat, a 4-3, 10-inning loss at the hands of last-place Cincinnati. That put the Braves a game up on the Dodgers and two ahead of the Giants.

"We're confident, we're getting more confident, but we're not overconfident," Torre said. "I'm not about to look past the finish line."

Terry Harper lashed a three-run double for the Braves, Chris Chambliss contributed a two-run double, and reliever Pascual Perez, 3-4, scattered three hits over 62-3 innings of work.

It was the second straight loss for the Giants, after they had vaulted into the thick of the race with five straight victories.

"I hope we can shake it off," said Giant skipper Frank Robinson. "It's a more difficult task, but it's not the end."

Harper, meanwhile, looked ahead to the Braves' two-game series in Los Angeles that starts tonight.

"Everybody is contributing," said Harper. "I don't know that you can say the Dodgers are choking, but I hope we can get in and get out before they straighten themselves out."

Rafael Landestoy's 10th-inning RBI single gave the Reds a 4-3 lead, but the Dodgers seemed poised to win it when they loaded the bases with none out in the bottom of the inning. But Red reliever Joe Price got Steve Sax on a fly to shallow center field, Ron Roenicke on a popup to second and Dusty Baker on a fly to right to end the game.

"No, I can't remember," said Dodger Manager Tom Lasorda, when asked if he recalled greater feelings of frustration. "It's tough, sure it's tough. What do you think?"

Lasorda was asked if he still had confidence in his team. "If I didn't, I'd walk right out of here and quit," he replied.

"I don't know if we're spoilers, but we're sure making it tough for some people around here," said Red skipper Russ Nixon.

## N. Pitt Going For ECC Win No. 2

Having wasted Southern Nash in its opening Eastern Carolina Conference game, North Pitt goes for ECC victory No. 2 and a share of the early-season league lead Friday night.

The Panthers whipped Southern Nash and ex-North Pitt coach Pat Smith, 35-14, last week in their ECC opener. North Pitt is now 2-1-2 and undefeated in its last four games.

"We've got a good attitude right now," North Pitt coach B.T. Chappell said. "We've been able to go out every week this year and compete — that was what I thought we'd be able to do."

The win Friday was the first time a North Pitt football

team has ever won its first conference outing and leaves the Panthers tied for the early lead in the ECC with Ayden-Grifton and SouthWest Edgecombe.

The Panthers will try to retain a share of the early ECC lead Friday evening when they play host to Greene Central. The Rams, 0-3-2 overall and 0-1 in the league, are coming off a 41-0 shellacking at the hands of SouthWest Edgecombe (4-1-0, 1-0).

"You can't say that just because they got beat 41-0 that they're no good," Chappell said. "You can't say that. They've had a some injuries and they're young."

Greene Central has lost six starters to injuries, including quarterback Elmer Dixon. "If they get their key people back they can be tough," Chappell

said. "That's what worries me."

"The two big things about Greene Central are their passing game, if their quarterback comes back and their defense," Chappell said. "They are notorious for their defense."

But, defense is also the Panthers' strong suit. "If we can't move the ball on them," Chappell said, "it could be a defensive struggle."

North Pitt comes into the game off an impressive defensive performance against Southern Nash. The North Pitt defense intercepted three passes, recovered three fumbles and blocked two punts — returning one for a TD.

"Our defense was the difference in the football game," said Chappell, whose Panthers have now given up only 32 points in their last four games

— nearly as many as they surrendered in their season-opening 27-13 loss to Roanoke.

Greene Central beat North Pitt, 30-0, a year ago and Chappell hopes his squad remembers that as they prepare to meet the Rams. Said Chappell: "I hope it'll motivate them."

In other games involving area ECC teams this week, Ayden-Grifton (4-0-0, 1-0) plays host to Charles B. Aycock (1-3-0, 0-0) and Farmville Central (1-4-0, 0-1) entertains SouthWest Edgecombe (4-1-0, 1-0).

D.H. Conley (0-4-1, 0-0) is open this week before returning to action Oct. 8 when the Vikings open their Coastal Conference schedule against West Carteret in Morehead City.

In action in the Northeastern Conference, Roanoke (3-2-0,

2-1) plays host to Ahsoskie (3-2-0, 1-2) and Williamston (2-3-0, 1-2) entertains Tarboro (1-3-0, 1-1).

In the Tobacco Belt Conference, Jamesville (2-2-0, 2-1) is at home versus Aurora (1-3-1, 1-2).

## Ump Vargo Wants To Set Record Straight On Call

NEW YORK (AP) — Ed Vargo, for 23 years a National League umpire, says he has kept quiet long enough. Now, he wants to set the record straight.

"I'm being chastised for nothing, no reason at all," he says. "Why? Because these people don't know the rulebook."

Vargo came under fire in the Atlanta press and broadcast media last Sunday when his call on a flyball to Braves left fielder Terry Harper allowed San Diego to score a controversial run in a 3-2 Padre victory.

"I'm taking a beating for no reason at all," Vargo said Tuesday in a telephone interview. "I'm just applying the rules of baseball, and they're telling everybody how terrible I am."

Vargo called San Diego's Gene Richards safe — with what turned out to be an inside-the-park home run — when Harper raced toward the line, snared Richard's flyball, then flipped over the fence along the dead ball area as the ball fell from his glove, still in play. Critics felt Harper had held onto the ball long enough for the out.

"If it's a judgement call, that's a different story," said Vargo, who lives in Butler, Pa. "Then, go ahead and get on me. That's part of the game. But here I am, doing my job, invoking the rulebook, and I'm getting chastised for no reason. It's a crime to deceive the public like that."

The passage in the rule book that deals with the situation reads: "It is not a catch if, simultaneously or immediately following his contact with the ball, he collides with another player or with the wall or if he falls down and, as a result of such collision or falling down, drops the ball."

Vargo singled out Braves announcers Skip Caray, Darrell Chaney and Ernie Johnson, and also took exception to a column by Atlanta Constitution sports editor Jesse Outlar.

"The only thing in doubt is that the announcers and sports media don't know the rules of baseball," Vargo said. "I've had people from Atlanta TV call me, and they're finally correcting the situation. But,

the damage has been done already.

"Here they are, deceiving the public and telling the public how lousy I am," Vargo said. "I'm only going by the rules of baseball. It's so simple."

In a column, Outlar wrote: "I thought it was an error all right, but the error was committed by umpire Ed Vargo, who decided that Harper did not have proper possession of the ball."

Vargo responded angrily to the column. "A judgement call is fair or foul, ball or strike. This was strictly a rulebook call, no judgement. It was in the rulebook long before I became an umpire. Outlar doesn't know the rule," Vargo said. "Torre (Braves Manager Joe Torre) didn't argue the rule, just whether it was fair or foul. He knew the rule."

Vargo said he wanted an apology, but he didn't really expect one.

## Harrison Says Not Concerned With Negative

East Carolina University basketball coach Charlie Harrison will receive his baptism as a first-year coach at ECU on Nov. 27 when he sends his Pirates up against Duke University.

In looking ahead to that baptism, Harrison remembered another that happened during a crucial game against Michigan while a graduate assistant at Indiana University under Bobby Knight.

"We were playing Michigan for a share of the Big 10 title," Harrison said, "and we had a kid at the foul line. Bobby Knight had this superstition that during crucial times in a game he would grab an assistant's ankles."

Harrison's ankles were the closest available and Knight grabbed them.

"The kid missed the free throw and Knight gave me a Karate chop to my bad leg," said Harrison, who contracted polio in his left leg when one year old. "Tears came to my eyes."

Then, Knight went to get some water. Cup in hand, Knight spotted a referee and began to walk out on the court. Realizing he still had the cup, he tried squeezing it but water came sprinkling out.

"So, Knight throws it back over his shoulder. And you know who it hits," Harrison said. "The (two other assistants) started laughing and Knight said, 'That's the greatest baptism a young coach every had.'"

It was with stories like these that Harrison kept the Greenville Sports Club laughing and clapping. And while Harrison spent time telling tales of old, he did not neglect the present — or the future.

Harrison was hired to replace Dave Odom as the ECU basketball coach July 24, after spending the past two seasons at Iowa State under Johnny Orr. Since he arrived, Harrison has listened to his share of tales of woe about ECU and its basketball program.

"Since I've been here I've probably heard more reasons why I should not be here than why I should," Harrison said. "Negativism doesn't really concern me."

"The only thing about it was I saw the video of last year's team and I called Johnny Orr at Iowa State and asked if I could have my old job back," Harrison said with a laugh.

But, on a more serious note, Harrison said: "Damn it, I'm undefeated right now and I'm not promising miracles. I just promise you that our kids will play hard."

"All I'm trying to do," he added, "is put out a competitive basketball team."

Toward that end Harrison has put the Pirates through a "grueling weight and running program" in anticipation of his first day of practice at ECU on Oct. 15.

"If they're not in shape come Oct. 15 they aren't going to last one day of practice with me," Harrison said.

Harrison brought to ECU a love not only of hard work but of defense, intense man-to-man defense to be precise. To hear Harrison tell it, defense was not a strong suit of former ECU teams.

"The kids thought de-fense was something that separates two yards," Harrison said. Academics have also been a problem for Harrison. "Our kids are going to class and are working hard at academics," he said. "They know we're not B.S.ing them about getting their degree."

Much of Harrison's time at ECU has been spent recruiting. "I've been in 18 homes and I hope to get to maybe six more," he said. "We've been welcomed with open arms."

In recruiting players, Harrison said he is straightforward and honest.

"What you see is what you get," Harrison said. "I don't want anyone here who doesn't want to play basketball for me and who doesn't want to go to school here."

## Broken-Bat Single In 9th Breaks Up Perfect Game

# Clancy Just Misses 'Perfection'

Toronto pitcher Jim Clancy "felt like crying" when designated hitter Randy Bush led off the ninth inning with a broken-bat blooper that was barely beyond the reach of second baseman Damasco Garcia.

It was the first — and only — hit off the 6-foot-4 right-hander as he faced only 28 batters, one over the minimum, in hurling the Blue Jays to a 3-0 victory over the Minnesota Twins.

Toronto completed a sweep of the doubleheader by downing Minnesota 4-3 in the nightcap.

"It was a good pitch," Clancy said of the one that Bush hit. "It was a fastball in. It broke his bat, but I guess I didn't get it in good enough. I thought for a while he (Garcia) might have been able to get it."

Clancy admitted to getting the jitters through the final three innings.

"My legs were shaking on every pitch the last couple of innings when the fans starting cheering every time I came out."

Bush, who went into the game hitting .248, got just enough of the ball to muscle it out of the infield.

"I didn't think it would fall in," he said. "It was a broken-bat hit."

Clancy said the Toronto bench was quiet from the fifth inning on as he went for a no-hitter.

"They weren't saying nothin' to me," Clancy said. "They weren't lookin' at me. Between innings, I would go up the runway and sit by myself."

Selected in the expansion draft when Toronto entered the major leagues in 1976, Clancy was attempted to hurl the first perfect game since Cleveland's Len Barker performed the feat against the Blue Jays May 15, 1981.

"I thought about Barker a couple of times," Clancy said. "I thought I was pitching the same type of game, throwing mostly sliders and fastballs and getting lots of grounders and popups."

Solo home runs by Garth Iorg, Jesse Barfield and Willie Upshaw provided Clancy with the only runs he needed.

In the second game, pinch-hitter Gino Petralli doubled home the winning run in the 10th inning and Roy Lee Jackson hurled five innings of no-hit relief.

### NEW YORK (AP) — As striking National Football League players and team owners traded barbs and prepared for Thursday's negotiating session, President Reagan charged that neither side has been fair to the fans. Reagan said during a nationally televised news conference Tuesday that there "doesn't seem to be the consideration for the fans that there could have been and should have been." "Sometimes I think we ran the Screen Actors Guild better than that," said Reagan, a former president of that union. Meanwhile the NFL Management Council, the owners' representatives, indicated that next weekend's games would be called off. The players union, which formally announced plans Tuesday for a series of so-called all-star games, got favorable rulings in two un-

### fair-labor-practices suits it filed with the National Labor Relations Board against the NFL in an attempt to get the league to open its books.

Administrative Law Judge Julius Cohn of the NLRB ordered the league to provide "all player contracts and all network television and radio contracts ... both current and preceding contracts."

"It is well settled that the duty of an employer to bargain in good faith includes the obligation to disclose to its employees' collective bargaining representative data that are relevant and reasonably necessary to its role as bargaining agent," Cohn said in the 14-page decision.

The league now has 20 days to file exceptions to the decision with the full five-member NLRB, and a spokesman for the Management Council said the union's

# NFL, Turner Join Forces To Show 'Quality' Games

WASHINGTON (AP) — The AFL-CIO-supported National Football League Players Association and the non-union Turner Broadcasting are joining forces to bring NFL "quality" games to a football-starved nation.

But the odd couple faces a number of obstacles.

The players' association, on strike since Sept. 21, Tuesday announced its plans to hold a nine-week, 19-game season of All-Star games, to start Sunday, Oct. 10, at Robert F. Kennedy Stadium in Washington, D.C.

Although they insist they have "locked up" 19 stadiums for the games, union officials reluctantly admit the only signed contract agreement is for the first game.

But Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium Manager T. Herman Graves said he hasn't heard anything about the union's plans to hold a game there Dec. 5.

"They haven't contacted us at all," Graves said. "It's just a big false rumor."

Graves said a nine-member stadium authority would make a decision if the NFLPA sought to rent the facility.

"I doubt seriously if the authority would let a group of union players rent it," Graves said.

The Turner Broadcasting System will pay the players' union \$500,000 per contest for the rights to telecast the

## B. Williams Top-Ranked 3-A Squad

Asheville and Burlington Williams retained their top rankings in the second weekly North Carolina state high school football poll.

Asheville, leading class 4A, received five of a possible 16 votes from a statewide panel of sportswriters, but the most emphatic vote of confidence went to Burlington Williams, a 3A team with a 36-game winning streak and a 4-0 record this season. The panel gave Williams 10 first-place votes and 141 points.

Statesville followed Williams while Kannapolis Brown dropped from second to third. Warren County, ranked sixth last week, received five points after losing 28-0 Friday to Henderson Vance, sixth in the 4A poll.

Whiteville and Randleman exchanged the top two spots in the 2A-1A poll. Whiteville, a 38-0 winner over previously unbeaten Fairmont, received eight first-place votes and 136 points. Randleman received three first-place votes and 128 points.

In 4A, the first-place votes were spread among six teams. Asheville, which travels to unbeaten Gastonia Ashbrook on Friday, had five first-place votes and 131 points. East Forsyth, ranked second, and third-ranked Fayetteville Pine Forest each had four votes for the top spot.

The other first-place votes went to fourth-ranked Rocky Mount, sixth-ranked Henderson Vance and eighth-ranked Fayetteville Byrd.

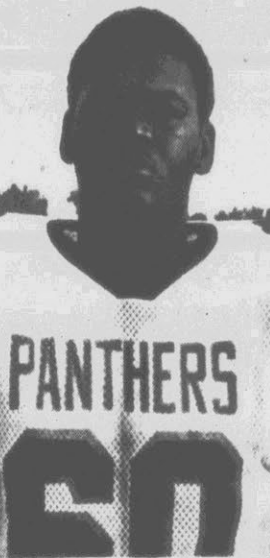

Conley, 8-6, Havelock defeated Farmville, 17-0, Roanoke whipped Plymouth, 33-8, Bertie pounded Williamston, 46-7, and Bath downed Jamesville, 37-20.

Ayden-Grifton Having narrowly escaped an upset bid by D.H. Conley, Ayden-Grifton returns this week to the ECC and a familiar foe: Charles B. Aycock.

C.B. Aycock is the last team to defeat the Chargers in regular-season play, whipping A-G, 29-6, last season. Following that defeat, the Chargers did not lose again until Nov. 27, when Burlington Williams downed A-G, 39-6, in the Eastern 3-A finals.

"They're the only team on our schedule to defeat us in the past two years," Ayden-Grifton coach Dixon Sauls said. "In many ways they resemble us. They have the same offensive and defensive concepts."

But, it is not a typical Aycock team. Graduation has taken its toll on the Falcons. After two straight 9-1 seasons, Aycock has managed just one win in four games this season.

Aycock's lone victory was a 16-12 win over 1-A Rosewood. Aycock has lost to 4-A Wilson Hunt (20-0), 4-A Southern Wayne (14-0) and 3-A North Lenoir (26-7) last week. A-G defeated North Lenoir, 20-0, two weeks ago.

"They have struggled

somewhat early in the season," Sauls said. "They're rebuilding. They lost 17 to 20 seniors off 29-1 teams."

"The Chargers come into the game of their severest test of the season. 'I think they (the players) realize that we must get a good effort and play with intensity every week,'" Sauls said. "I thought we played with poise under adverse conditions."

The win over the Vikings took its toll. Four Chargers are doubtful for the Aycock game. Tight end/linebacker Doug Coley, flanker/defensive back Tyrone Gay, offensive/defensive lineman Quentin Barrett and offensive/defensive lineman David Lister may all be out this week. Lister is also the Charger snapper on punts.

"That's some concern for us," Sauls said. "But, we believe those players will be able to play."

Injuries or not, Sauls felt his team learned something in its test against Conley.

"I think they realize we must get a good effort and have intensity every (Friday) night," Sauls said. "When you're having some success every opponent will be highly motivated to play you."

D.H. Conley D.H. Conley coach Gerald Garner had only two complaints following his team's 8-6 loss to Ayden-Grifton last week. One, obviously, was the final score. The other was the pass blocking of the Viking backs.

Otherwise, Garner said he could not have asked for more from his squad. "I didn't see a single kid who did not appear emotionally beat after the game," Garner said.

A few tears were shed. It was not an easy loss to take. "I don't look at it like they're weak, or candy-butt," he added. "I look at it on the positive side, that the kids really cared."

"We really needed that one Friday. Psychologically, we needed to know we could play a good ballclub, and we can. I saw some character out there on Friday."

It is that character that Garner must try to maintain as the Vikings take a week off before opening their conference slate two weeks from now at West Carteret. The Patriots play unbeaten Clinton Friday night.

A year ago the Vikings were in a similar position. After a tough 14-6 loss to Ayden-Grifton, DHC had an open date. Following the break, however, the Vikings suffered a 40-7 whipping at the hands of West Carteret.

Garner feels a similar fate does not await his team this year. "I think it's an excellent time for an open date," Garner said. "We've got two weeks to prepare for our first conference foe."

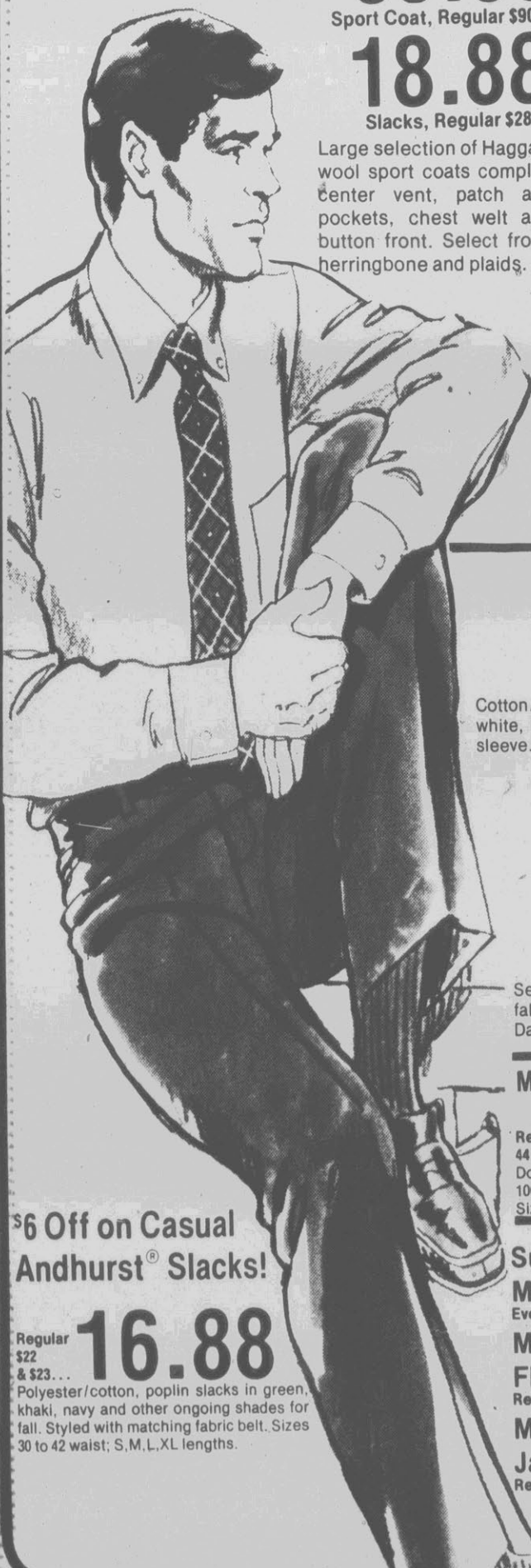

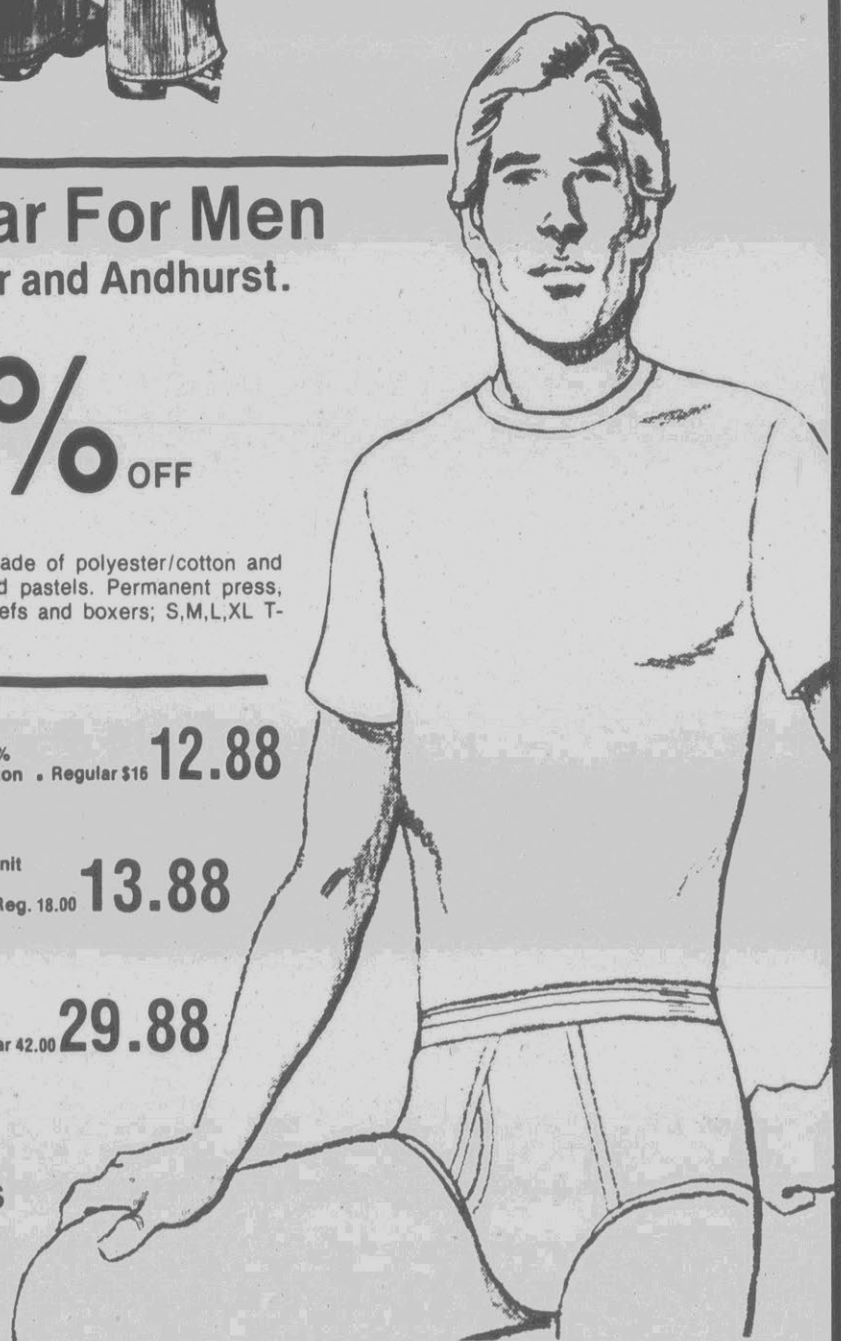

## Many Wondering Why Elkins Was Still In Game

**CHAPEL HILL** — Many people are asking why Rod Elkins was playing in a 27-0 football game which was getting worse, while Elkins simply wants to know why he didn't run out of bounds.

North Carolina was whipping Army last Saturday and Elkins decided not to pass and step out of the pocket. He gained 23 yards, but in trying to elude a Cadet defender, he tore cartilage and ligaments in his left knee.

"I tried to plant on my left leg at full speed," Elkins said in an interview Tuesday. "When I planted, my knee went the wrong way. I knew I was going to get out of bounds. I just took a little long to do so."

The extra time was costly. Saturday night, the senior from Greensboro, N.C., underwent arthroscopic surgery for the second time in his career.

Two years ago, he injured the same knee in spring drills, but recovered to lead the Tar Heels to a 10-1 record and a victory over Texas in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Last season, he suffered an ankle sprain against South Carolina and sat out the Maryland game and tried to play against Clemson after reserve Scott Stankavage failed to generate any offense. Although his first two performances were less than sparkling, Elkins was burning the Cadet defense, completing 12 of 16 passes for 176 yards.

Then came the injury Elkins

thinks he could have gone without.

"We were leading 27-0. We were dominating the game," he said. "There was no reason the injury should have occurred. I was real mad at myself."

Knee injuries are nothing new in Chapel Hill. Tailback Kelvin Bryant suffered knee damage in the Georgia Tech game in 1981 and returned four games later.

"I was thinking of how Kelvin Bryant hurt himself last year," he said. "If my injury was limited to a cartilage tear, my recovery period wouldn't be long. I was

real dejected after I learned I had a ligament tear."

Doctors have placed his recovery time at four to five weeks, but Elkins said "you never can tell. I might be able to come back sooner than that."

The Tar Heel schedule includes an open date on Oct. 23. Elkins would like to be in the starting lineup for the Maryland game the following week, but until then, Stankavage is the No. 1 quarterback.

"He's a good quarterback," he said. "I think from last year, he's gained the confidence of his teammates."

"I don't feel I have to rush things," he added. "I think the team will do well. They won't miss a beat."

### Clemson Win Over W. Carolina 'Ugly'

**CLEMSON, S.C.** — Clemson Tigers coach Danny Ford says Saturday's victory over Western Carolina was "ugly," but he's not too disappointed.

"I have seen some pretty defeats over the years and I would much rather have an ugly win," Ford said Tuesday of the defending national champion's first victory of the new season.

However, he added, "I don't need a lawyer to tell me in big words what we did wrong."

Ford, whose team meets Kentucky this weekend at Death Valley, said the Tigers have got to get rid of the mistakes.

"It was a comedy of errors for us. I am concerned about all these mistakes we have," he said.

Praise was handed out to Johnny Rembert and Terry Kinard on defense and also to defensive ends Edgar Pickett and Joe Glenn for fine performances.

On offense, Ford singled out James Farr and Cliff Austin, adding that the freshmen backs also showed "some improvement."

"Overall, when Clemson quits being its own worst enemy, we should resemble a good football team," he said. "I am confident we can do that."

The coach pointed out that Kentucky has 18 starters who played last year.

# How Tar Heel Senators And Representatives Voted

**BYROLL CALL REPORT**  
WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes Sept. 16-22.

**HOUSE**  
**TRANSPORTATION CUTS** — By a vote of 154 for and 221 against, the House rejected an administration-backed amendment to cut \$320 million from the \$11.2 billion transportation appropriations bill for fiscal 1983. Objections centered on proposals to cut mass transit aid to communities by \$10 million and interstate highway aid by \$50 million. Before the vote, President Reagan signaled he probably would veto the bill if this amendment were not adopted. The bill (HR 7019) was passed and sent to the Senate.

Sponsor Lawrence Coughlin, R-Pa., said "it is worth taking this very modest step" to avert a presidential veto.

Opponent Robert Edgar, D-Pa., said the cuts would "really hamper and short-change ... many of our communities, both rural and urban, that are looking for quality public transportation."

Members voting "yea" favored transportation spending cuts of \$320 million.

Reps. L. H. Fountain, D-2, Charles Whitley, D-3, Stephen Neal, D-5, Eugene Johnston, R-6, W. G. Hefner, D-8, James Martin, R-9, James Broyhill, R-10, and William Hendon, R-11, voted "yea."

Reps. Walter Jones, D-1, Ike Andrews, D-4, and Charles Rose, D-7, voted "nay."

**STOPGAP BUDGET** — The House passed, 242 for and 161 against, and sent to the Senate a temporary appropriations measure (HJ Res 599) to fund virtually all federal programs at their current level from Oct. 1 until Dec. 15. Fiscal 1983 begins Oct. 1, but Congress has not yet enacted any of the 13 regular appropriations bills for the year. "Continuing resolutions" like this measure have become more

prevalent in recent years, prompting barbs from those who say they demonstrate the increasing inefficiency of the Congress.

Supporters said the passage was necessary so the government could pay its bills after Sept. 30.

Opponents cited a variety of objections. For example, critics of Israel's role in the Beirut massacre wanted to cut foreign aid to Israel, but were stymied by the parliamentary rule prohibiting floor amendments. And opponents of higher defense

spending disliked a provision allowing Pentagon outlays to rise to 1983 levels long before the Dec. 15 trigger date for other expenditures. Members voting "yea" favored the stopgap spending measure.

Jones, Whitley, Andrews, Neal, Rose, Hefner and Broyhill voted "yea."

Fountain, Johnston, Martin and Hendon voted "nay."

**CREATING JOBS** — By a vote of 223 for and 169 against, the House passed and sent to the Senate a bill (HJ Res 562) to create some

200,000 temporary public service jobs at a projected cost of \$1 billion. Supporters were mostly Democrats who called the bill a necessary response to the recession. GOP opponents derided the measure as a pre-Election Day ploy that revived the inflationary "make-work" programs so favored by Democrats in the pre-Reagan era. Persons unemployed for at least two weeks could apply for the jobs, which would last for six months and deal mostly with rebuilding roads and bridges

in areas hard hit by unemployment. Most of the sponsors would be local governments.

Supporter Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, called the bill "an urgent and critical step in rebuilding our nation's economic and social health." Opponent Robert Michel, R-Ill., said the bill should be "buried in the graveyard next to CETA and all those other discredited shams of past Congresses."

Members voting "yea" favored the temporary jobs program.

Jones, Whitley, Andrews, Neal and Hefner voted "yea."

Martin, Broyhill and Hendon voted "nay."

Fountain, Johnston and Rose did not vote.

**SENATE**  
**'GRIDLOCK'** — By a vote of 47 for and 53 against, the Senate failed to table and thus kill legislation that would undercut the 1962 U.S. Supreme Court decision that banned organized prayer recitals in public schools. The measure would prohibit federal courts from

overturning state laws restoring prayer to the classrooms. The vote occurred during consideration of a measure (HJ Res 520) raising the national debt limit. While opponents of the New Right-backed prayer amendment lack the votes to kill it, supporters lack the votes to end a filibuster against it — prompting Majority Leader Howard Baker, R-Tenn., to declare the Senate immobilized by "legislative gridlock."

Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., who favored tabling the

measure, said its backers should admit "the die is cast" for its defeat and let the Senate proceed to other business.

Opponent Jesse Helms, R-N.C., responded that Bumpers "can play politics if he wishes with this issue, but the fact remains that the American people want prayers restored to their schools."

Senators voting "yea" wanted to table the prayer legislation.

Sens. Jesse Helms, R. and John East, R. voted "nay."

# Another Delinquent Student Loans Crackdown

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Harold Cuff stood shirtless in the doorway of his home and watched a tow truck haul

away his 1972 Chrysler New Yorker because he had ignored requests to pay back his student loan.  
"I'm unemployed so you might as well take the car."

Cuff, 38, told two U.S. marshals who had begun seizing autos in the predawn gloom.  
Cuff, who owes \$886 after borrowing money in 1972 so

he could attend correspondence school, was a target of the toughest in a series of new programs by the government to crack down on student loan defaulters.

Besides car seizures, which were instituted by the U.S. attorney's office here for offenders in eastern Pennsylvania, the Justice Department also has begun garnishing the salaries of loan offenders in several regions to try to coerce payment, said Virginia Powell, an assistant U.S. attorney here.

U.S. attorneys in Detroit, Cleveland, Milwaukee and Cincinnati have recently launched crackdowns on the deadbeats, including court action. Also, the Education Department in July barred 436 institutions with default rates of 25 percent or higher from receiving new federal loan money during the 1982-83 school year.

More than 800 other schools were targeted for reduced funds. Most of the

institutions affected are trade schools, including dozens of beauty colleges.

The schools were participants in the National Direct Student Loan program, which they ran themselves. Students are charged only 5 percent interest after graduation and the federal government is responsible for reimbursing the lender in cases of non-payment.

In all, the government is owed more than \$1.7 billion in defaults on federally backed student loans, said Richard Hastings, the Department of Education's student finance director.

"There's an awful lot of easy money out there if we can collect it," Hastings said. "We've been pushing the Justice Department to try and become a little more assertive on defaulted student loans."

Many targets of the "get-tough" programs can afford their loan repayments but have disregarded the government's warnings, federal

officials said.  
"It's not they can't pay, it's just that they don't," Ms. Powell said. With the car seizures, "They really do get the message that they can't just ignore us anymore," she said.

Among the cars impounded in Philadelphia raids earlier this month were a Cadillac, a Lincoln and a Porsche.

The program here, which is continuing, is aimed at 175 student loan offenders who owe more than \$430,000, Ms. Powell said.

Cars also are being seized from veterans who failed to pay back overpayments under the GI Bill, said U.S. Attorney Peter Vaira. Autos were chosen in both programs "because that's the easiest asset to take and it has value," he said.

The marshals receive descriptions and license plate numbers on the vehicles from the state Department of Motor Vehicles. The owner is presented a writ of execution at the time of the seizure

informing him why the action has been taken.

"They walk up, knock on the door and say, 'We're U.S. marshals. We're taking your car, thank you very much,'" said Vaira.

If the owner is not present, the writ is left at the home and the car is taken anyway.

Ms. Powell said the goal is to force debtors to pay up. If they don't, the car is sold, with the proceeds going toward what is owed.

This "is done all the time commercially," she said. "We just decided to use the best attention-getting method we possibly could."

Officials familiar with student loans say the high default figures stem from a lack of knowledge about the loans' terms — and a blatant disregard by borrowers of their responsibility to pay.

"Some students take time off, go to another institution and never let the bank know. Some say they didn't even know it was a loan," said Kristl Mehnert, associate

director of financial aid at Temple University.

"But to some degree it's a lack of responsibility, especially when you consider the terms," she said, adding that the students are generally provided with a varying "grace period" before they must begin paying the money back.

## Church Council Defends Gift In Slaying Probe

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — A \$10,000 grant from the World Council of Churches to survivors of the 1979 slayings of five anti-Ku Klux Klan demonstrators was not an endorsement of the demonstrators' politics, a council member says.

"The World Council of Churches is trying to fight for a free world," said Annette Hutchins Felder, a council delegate from New York.

"We do not fund political parties. We're not funding the ideology of the (Communist Workers Party). We're funding an effort to see that justice is expedited. We have done a lot of work on the anti-Klan programs."

The World Council of Churches said Tuesday it had given the Greensboro Justice Fund the money to help the fund "seek justice in racially stimulated slayings and to prevent miscarriage of justice."

The Justice Fund, a nonprofit organization, was formed to give legal help to widows and people injured in the Nov. 3, 1979, shooting

deaths of the five Communist Workers Party members.

A Guilford County Superior Court jury acquitted six Ku Klux Klansmen and Nazis of state murder charges about a year after the slayings. A federal grand jury now is investigating the shootings.

Justice Fund lawyers are representing their clients in a pending \$48 million civil suit filed in 1980 against government officials, Klansmen and Nazis.

WCC news releases issued from New York and Geneva earlier this month describe the Justice Fund as an organization that "grew out of a specific Greensboro case in which a number of people were murdered and wounded — during a peaceful anti-Klan demonstration — by the KKK and American Nazi Party."

The news release failed to mention that the Communist Workers Party, which sponsored the march, sent out "Death to the Klan" flyers challenging the Klan to come to the rally.

Also not mentioned was the fact that some CWP members had guns and fired them, which came out in testimony during the 1980 trial of six Klansmen and Nazis on murder charges. The defendants were acquitted.

Ms. Hutchins-Felder, a WCC delegate from New York, said she was aware of

the challenge to the Klan and that some CWP members were armed.

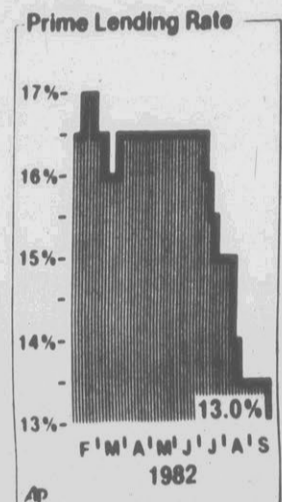
"I do not believe in baiting tactics, of being part of any inciting of racial incidents," she said. "But that's not what we were funding. We're funding an investigation into the process that five people were killed."

"The subtleties, such as information about the flyers," weren't discussed in Geneva, she said. "But even if we had discussed it, they almost surely would have funded it anyway because the project speaks to a much larger question."

Ms. Hutchins-Felder, the only person from the United States on the panel, was a WCC delegate from her United Methodist church. She works for New World Foundation, a family-funded organization supporting equal opportunity.

The grant, allocated from the council's Program to Combat Racism, was approved last July by an executive committee that meets annually in Geneva, Switzerland. The committee distributed \$489,500 to 53 groups in 20 countries.

Similar WCC grants have been criticized over the years, particularly in 1978, when the Patriotic Front, then struggling against the government of Zimbabwe (then Rhodesia) received \$85,000.

# Viewers Offered A Choice Of Two Movies On TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Viewers tonight can choose a movie about female alcoholism on CBS or housewife prostitution on ABC. Both treat sensitive subjects in a serious way, but ABC's "Money on the Side" deserves special attention.

"Money on the Side" is a forthright depiction of how three suburban women get tangled in a web of body-selling. The film never opts for cheap, sordid exhibitionism.

In fact, it takes great pains to avoid it. There's nothing close to a sex scene, nor is any violence shown, although brutality is a major element

in the plot line. This lifestyle is not glamorized.

Over on CBS, Carol Burnett stars in "Life of the Party: The Story of Beatrice," a dramatization based on the activities of Beatrice O'Reilly, a former alcoholic who founded the first recovery house for women in Los Angeles.

"Beatrice" is good — but standard — entertainment. It's the small-scale, inspirational story that TV does well — and often. The protagonist comes to grips with a problem in the first hour, then surmounts it, against various obstacles and odds, just before the credits.

Miss Burnett's interest in this topic is well known. Her parents were alcoholics, and she won a much-publicized libel suit against the National Enquirer, which had reported — inaccurately — that she was drunk in public.

In the beginning, Miss Burnett's bitchy drunk characterization seems too close to her cloying Eunice character. This makes the personality less person and

more caricature. Later, though, after being rescued by Alcoholics Anonymous, Miss Burnett brings more vital reality to Beatrice, the crusader.

"I've been trouble all my life," Beatrice says, explaining why she takes chances on strung-out women.

"None of the women in "Money on the Side" seems as superficially desperate, but an intelligent script provides plausible motivations

for their behavior. One weakness is that the conversion from housewife to hooker happens too easily.

Karen Valentine has the girl-next-door look, giving the issue some common-woman identification. She becomes a prostitute because her son is apparently brain-damaged and in need of special, costly schooling.

Her husband minimizes his son's troubles. He's also having trouble making the mortgage payments.

"Life is complicated," says Miss Valentine's character. "You do what you have to do."

Jamie Lee Curtis' character is more cold-blooded. Her estranged husband is irresponsible. Money is a factor, but she also sees the world as constantly beating down women.

"For that one hour I'm in control," she says.

## Top-Rated TV Show: A Movie

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The top-rated prime-time television show last week was CBS' "The Royal Romance of Charles and Diana," placing it well ahead of a version ABC rushed to the air in a bid to win viewers, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. show.

The CBS movie finished atop the Nielsen ratings for the week ended Sept. 26 with a rating of 24.0. Nielsen says that means in an average minute of the show, 24 percent of the television-equipped homes in the nation saw at least part of the program.

"Charles & Diana: A Royal Love Story," the version ABC hastily scheduled a few days ahead of the CBS movie, was No. 28 for the week ended Sept. 19. The ABC move failed in its apparent bid to get the ratings by being first.

In all, CBS took seven of the Top 10. ABC had two and NBC had one.

NBC had the week's five lowest-rated shows: "Powers of Matthew Star," "CHiPs," "NBC White Paper: The Man Who Shot the Pope," the NBC Friday Night Movie, "The Martian Chronicles, Part III," and the Sunday Canadian Football League Game II.

The week wasn't the official premiere week but some new shows began to appear and many returning series had new episodes.

NBC's "Knight Rider" tied for fifth place with the season premiere of CBS'

"One Day at a Time." CBS' "Gloria" with Sally Struthers playing the title role in the spinoff of "All in the Family," finished eighth.

Two other premieres made the Top 20. ABC's "Tales of the Gold Monkey" finished in 12th place, and a preview of CBS' "Bring 'em Back Alive" finished in 20th place.

CBS easily won the week with a rating of 17.6. ABC was second with 15.8, and NBC was third with 14.4. The networks say this means in an average prime-time minute, 17.6 percent of the nation's homes with TV were tuned to CBS.

CBS' "The Dukes of Hazzard," opening its first season without stars John Schneider and Tom Wopat, finished in 13th place. After the two actors quit the show in a legal dispute, Christopher Mayer and Byron Cherry were cast in the show.

## No Law Against 'Fuzz Busters'

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Michigan motorists may legally use devices that warn of police radar speed traps because there's no state law on the books prohibiting them, the state Supreme Court says.

In its ruling Tuesday, the court told the Legislature to enact a new law if it wants to prevent use of the "Fuzz Buster" devices. The court upheld the dismissal of charges against Daniel Gilbert, who had been ticketed for equipping his car with a radar detector.

A 1929 state law cited by the prosecution case forbids civilian use of radios with police frequencies. The court said that law could not apply because radar had not been invented when the it was enacted.

# 'Symphony' Of Sound Translated Into Music For Eyes Of The Deaf

CHICAGO (AP) — Clarendia Gaudio Johnson is on the verge of tears. She stretches her arms and looks longingly toward the horizon. For thousands of people, she is creating a melody — and it's music to their eyes.

Through mime, dance and sign language, Ms. Gaudio translates a symphony of sounds for those who hear none. She paints an elaborate visual picture of music for the deaf.

Ms. Gaudio is the "voiceless vocalist" of Silent Sounds Inc., a special non-profit group of musical artists who marry music, drama and mime with sign and song for the deaf and hearing-impaired.

Silent Sounds has two bands — Foxfire, a rock group, and Sparrow AM-FM, a jazz group.

"It's a fallacy that deaf people don't understand music," said Ms. Gaudio, Silent Sounds' executive director. "They do. When you have someone to translate words, everyone can relate to it."

"Our music," she said, "reaches people in different ways."

Ms. Gaudio, who has interpreted plays and political speeches, joined Foxfire in 1976 when it was a rock band.

"People thought (adding a signer to the band) was a good idea," said John Magnan, Foxfire's bassist and Silent Sounds' program director. "Deaf people are in a world of their own. They don't have the avenues we have."

And so Silent Sounds — which has about 20 members

— decided to offer that special avenue. Both bands — some members overlap — write their own songs. Foxfire also performs popular music, such as the Beatles.

"Signing songs is not new," Ms. Gaudio said. "We put it in with live music and made the interpreter an integral part of the band. That's my instrument."

As the signer, Ms. Gaudio said she must decide whether the song can be interpreted and how to physically portray it, rather than vocally.

"I don't necessarily follow words," she said. "I just make a picture of what the idea is. You cannot be detailed. You have to blend things together. It becomes a choreography."

Songs with pictures, such as mountains or trees, are easier to sign, she said. The sky, for example, might be translated with an open arms embrace looking upward.

Strong emotions, too, are much easier to translate, she said. A mournful look with tearful eyes, for example, can depict sadness and depression.

The two bands play to hearing and deaf audiences and that creates a special challenge, Ms. Gaudio said. "If I can't be of constant interest, I'm missing the mark."

But the bands don't rely solely on images and music.

Magnan — a member of both bands — has a specially designed bass with special strings and 28 extra notes to sustain sound for a longer time. Each note has a different vibration, Magnan said, so hearing-impaired people in the audience can feel them.

Very few people have no hearing level, Ms. Gaudio said, and the vibrations give hearing-impaired members of the audience a feel of the tempo of the music.

When the group first started performing, Magnan said a deaf woman approached them and said, "You're not getting across to us. Put the amplifiers on the floor." They did. And they are on the floor during most performances.

But despite enthusiastic audiences, the bands have faced obstacles.

When Foxfire first began performing, Magnan said, a club owner was reluctant to let the group play, telling him, "We don't want to scare the rest of the customers away."

Since then, Foxfire has performed in 500 schools. Sparrow has recorded two albums.

Silent Sounds — which also

includes a theater group — eventually wants to establish a performing center for deaf children.

The next project in the works, Magnan said, is a special Beatles show.

Magnan said Beatles requests are fairly common from deaf people attending Foxfire shows. Foxfire already has one Beatles song at the end of its show — "We Can Work It Out."

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — More than a half-million gallons of supercold fuels have been pumped into the space shuttle Columbia's huge external tank in a pre-flight test for the spacecraft's next launch.

Technicians loaded 143,000 gallons of liquid oxygen and about 385,000 gallons of liquid hydrogen into the 15-story external fuel tank Tuesday in one of the last in a series of pre-flight tests, said Rocky Raab, a National Aeronautics and Space Administration spokesman.

The external fuel tank contains the propellants for the shuttle's three main engines. It will be jettisoned about eight minutes into the launch and is supposed to splash down in the Indian Ocean.

"The test was highly successful," Raab said after Tuesday's test. The launch is scheduled for Nov. 11.

Raab said workers found a small amount of frost on the tank's 1-inch-thick foam skin, but the frost was not considered a problem. The fuel tank is coated with foam to minimize ice formation, he said.

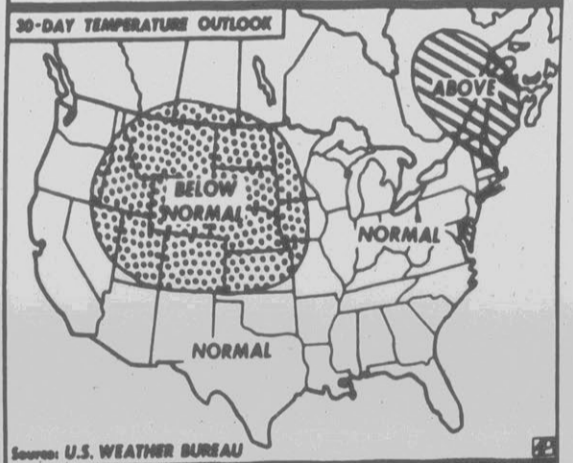
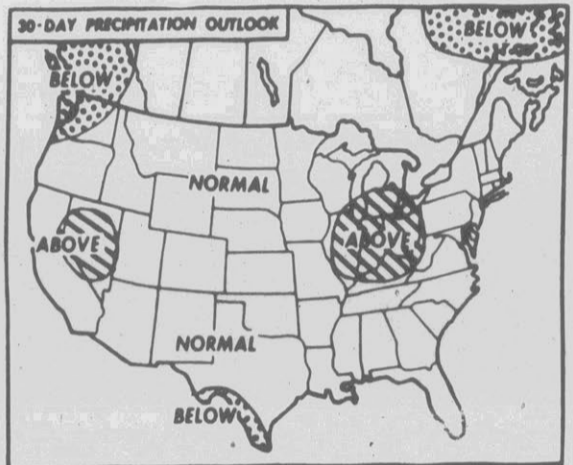
Mark Hess, another NASA spokesman, said the test "is a hazardous operation because liquid hydrogen is extremely volatile."

After the fuels were loaded into the tank, computers conducted a successful simulated launch of the space shuttle, Hess said.

The supercold fuels will be loaded into the shuttle about six hours before liftoff during November's flight, Hess said.

The 100-hour countdown for the first operational mission of the reusable spacecraft is scheduled to begin the weekend before the launch, he said. The previous four missions have been tests.

The shuttle will carry its first four-man crew — Mission Cmdr. Vance Brand, pilot Robert Overmyer and mission specialists William Lenoir and Joseph Allen — into space along with two commercial satellites.

## Arrested In Lennon Theft

NEW YORK (AP) — A former employee of John Lennon was arrested on charges of stealing letters, paintings, electronic equipment and unreleased tapes from the slain Beatle's apartment, police report.

Fred Seaman, 29, of Brooklyn Heights, was charged with grand larceny, police said. Virtually all the stolen property, including thousands of dollars worth of recording equipment, was recovered, police said.

Seaman, fired in January by Lennon's widow, Yoko Ono, had been an advance man, photographer and aide for Lennon and Miss Ono.

Police said Seaman stole the items some time after Lennon was shot to death in December 1980 in front of the Dakota apartment house where he lived. Miss Ono still lives there with their son, Sean.

Last month, Miss Ono "received information that some items were missing and she made an inventory," Detective Lt. Robert Gibbons said. "She then came to us and an investigation was begun."

Seaman was arrested at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday, Officer John Clifford, a Police Department spokesman, said. The stolen material was found in Seaman's apartment and in a warehouse, Gibbons said.

Seaman was accused of stealing photographs, audio and video tape recordings, stationery, a sound mixer, an AM-FM radio and paintings of Lennon, authorities said.

Police said Seaman was the nephew of concert producer Norman Seaman, who testified on Lennon's behalf when the government tried to deport him 10 years ago.

# Propose N.C. Lottery For Aid To Children

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A child advocacy group says North Carolina should conduct a statewide lottery to finance children's programs that have been "gutted" by federal budget cuts.

Child Watch Inc. recommended the lottery Tuesday to the Legislative Study Commission on Children with Special Needs. The group estimated that the lottery could raise \$50 million to \$100 million.

The group also proposed a \$10 surcharge on the fee for a marriage license to create a trust fund for the prevention of child abuse and neglect. And it suggested that taxpayers be allowed to check off \$2 from their income tax refunds to finance programs for handicapped children.

"I recognize there will be controversy about these suggestions," said Charles J. Dunn, president of Child Watch. "The social and moral impact of a lottery

certainly should be studied. "But this is a period of crisis in our state for children with special needs." State law now prohibits lotteries, though a 1979 law allows bingo for charitable purposes. Dunn recommended that the lawmakers amend that law during the 1983 General Assembly session.

A spokesman said Gov. Jim Hunt wouldn't support a state lottery because "it could serve as an avenue for organized crime."

According to Child Watch, a non-profit group established in 1979 to promote the interests of children, lotteries earned \$1.2 billion for 15 states in 1981.

A Child Watch study said cuts in federally funded programs for school lunches, immunization, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and vocational education amount to more than \$70

million in North Carolina. The marriage surtax would provide \$300,000 to \$500,000 a year to the trust fund for the state's estimated 28,000 abused children, on whom the state now spends "very little" money, the group said.

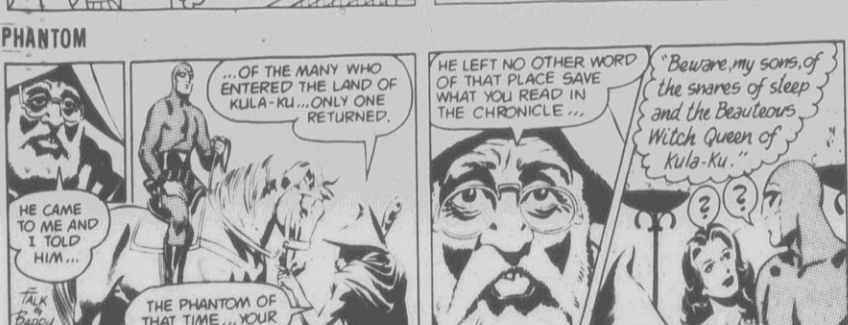
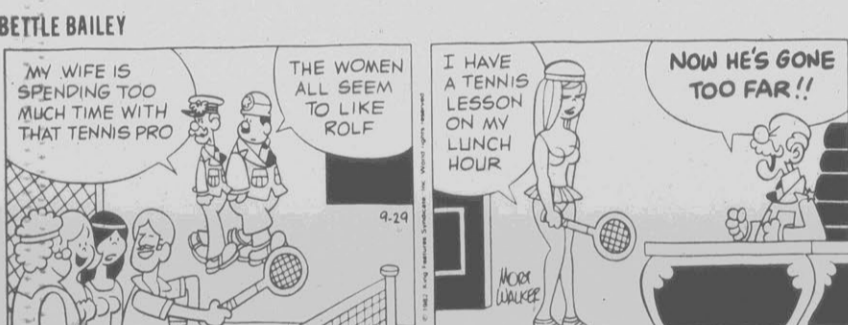

# Primarily Hobbyists In The Pierce Arrow Soc.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — Fred Tycher, president of the Pierce-Arrow Society, bristles at the notion that owners of those classic automobiles are investors first and car lovers second.

"Pierce-Arrow created what we think is one of the most beautiful, one of the greatest cars this country has ever produced," says Tycher. "We're the diehards, the kooks who keep restoring them."

Society members bear out Tycher's point that many antique car buffs are primarily hobbyists, though the sometimes dilapidated cars they purchased or inher-

ited years ago now are worth many thousands of dollars.

Henry Becker of Sarasota, Fla., got his 1917 touring car from his father, who bought it used in 1923 for \$800. Peter Lapey of Grand Island, N.Y., who said he has restored 12 Pierce-Arrows, picked up his 1926 roadster in 1950.

"Some people love to restore them. Others collect literature," said Becker, who has put 230,000 miles on his seven-seater. "I love to drive it. That's the pleasure."

George Pierce began making cars in Buffalo, N.Y., in 1901, two years before Henry Ford opened shop in Detroit. Pierce-Arrow handcrafted about 100,000 luxury cars before going out of business in 1938.

At the turn of the century, Buffalo was an early center of the automobile industry, home to more than 30 different makes of electric, steam and gas cars.

The Thomas Flyer won the New York-to-Paris "Around the World" race in 1908, and other models were well known. But Pierce-Arrows easily were the best cars to come out of Buffalo.

Lapey, a charter member of the 25-year-old society, estimated that only about 5,000 Pierce-Arrows remain.

"Many were sold abroad," he said. "I got a call recently from a man in Bogota, Colombia, wanting parts for a 1917 limousine."

Society members say that the Pierce-Arrow is the greatest automobile America ever produced, with a possible tip of the hat to Peerless and Packard.

"It's the Rolls-Royce of America," said Al Ferrara of Gates Mill, Ohio, whose 1927 roadster, worth perhaps \$150,000, won the society's 1982 Vandever Trophy as top car.

Polished to a gleam, the cars featured huge German silver radiator grills, plush leather seats and walnut dashboards, running boards and oversized tires with hickory spokes. The cars' trademark was a silver archer on the hood and headlights set in the fenders.

A 1910 touring car featured gas lamps, right-hand driving and the sturdy springs and suspension systems so essential in those days of gravel and macadam roads.

Later models — runabouts, phaetons, sedans, coupes, landaus, limousines — featured such innovations as aluminum engines, dual ignition, push-button starting and cruise control.

"The sports ones survived because even when they got down to the junkyard, they were so pretty the guy couldn't cut them up," Tycher said.

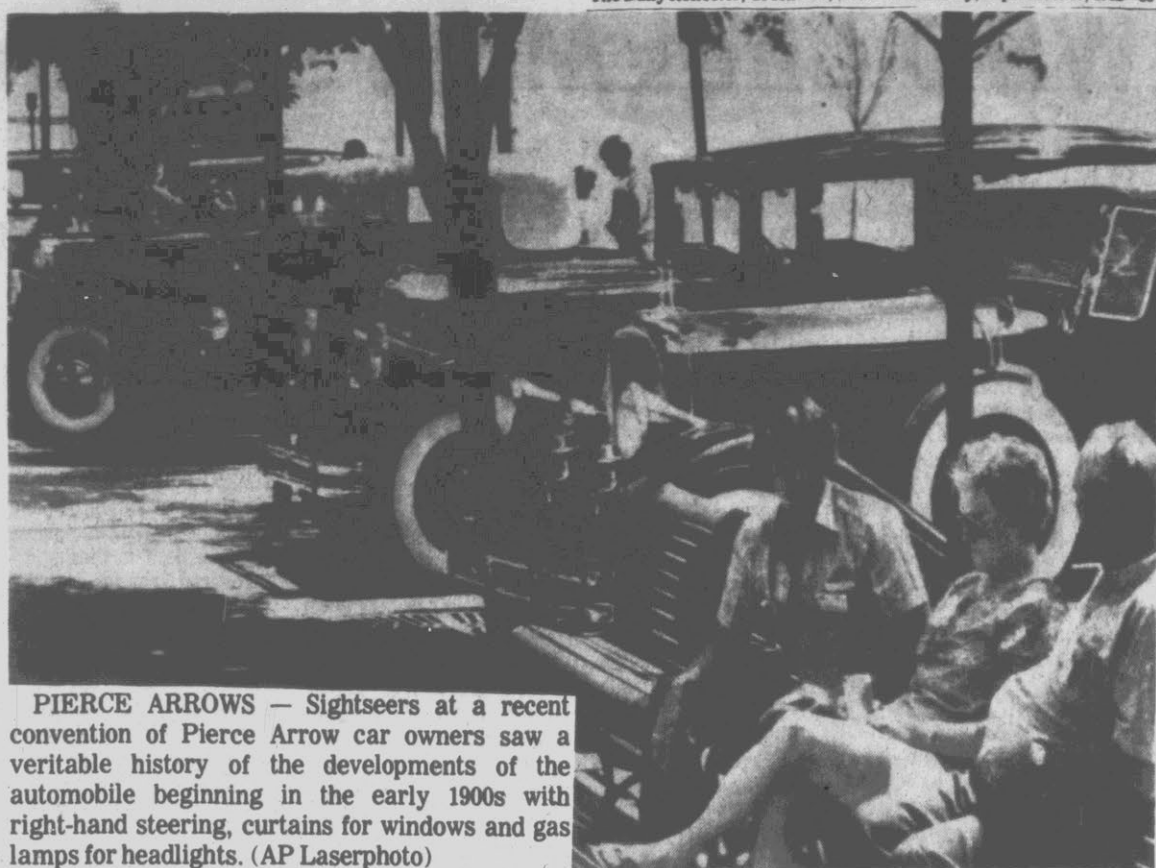
Lapey, a retired insurance executive who restored the first 1901 Pierce Motorette,

said his interest in Pierce-Arrows was piqued as a child when he watched company mechanics test-drive chassis around Delaware Park.

"When they were sure everything was OK and broken in, then they'd put the body on," he said. "Every individual car was road-tested for 500 miles before delivery to a customer."

On the cars they salvaged from junkyards and garages, Lapey and others researched company history to make sure every nut, bolt and cotter pin was authentic. Restoration took years.

Now the cars are worth quite a bit of money, but to stress that point is to miss the hobby aspect of their vocation, society members said.

# WHO Cites More Smoking By Third World People

GENEVA, Switzerland  
(AP) — World Health Organization officials, elated over the eradication of smallpox

and encouraged by progress in controlling other diseases, say they are concerned about the increase in cigarette smoking and lung cancer, in the Third World.

The organization, a specialized agency of the United Nations based in Geneva, calls it a "smoking epidemic." Institute, a lobby and politi-

The WHO officials point to what they say is statistical evidence that a steady increase in cigarette smoking in developing countries is accompanied by soaring rates of lung cancer and cardiovascular diseases.

The organization also accuses the tobacco industry of using higher tar and nicotine contents in cigarettes marketed in the Third World.

WHO officials say the organization's still-incomplete statistics suggest that smoking has been increasing by an overall 5 percent annually in the Third World in recent years while it slowed in the West.

Some experts say they trace the trend at least partly to what they claim is aggressive sales promotion by the top Western cigarette manufacturers looking for new markets.

The International Union against Cancer, also headquartered in Geneva, says that tobacco firms subject "developing countries to many of the most cynical and discredited forms of advertising that are no longer acceptable in most Western countries."

Industry leaders, according to a World Health Organization survey, include British American Tobacco, marketing 300 brands in 180 countries; Philip Morris, with 160 brands in 170 countries, and R.J. Reynolds, 65 brands in 140 countries.

In Washington, William Kloefer Jr., senior vice president of the Tobacco

organization's Smoking and Health Program, charged in an interview.

He said tests are under way in organization laboratories in the United States and Canada to determine whether cigarettes sold in developing countries have higher nicotine and tar contents than the same brands sold in the West.

An independent report, cited by the organization, claims that tar yields of cigarettes sold in the Philippines are twice those of the same four brands marketed in the United States, Britain, and Australia.

In some countries, growth of cigarette consumption has been spectacular. Sales in Thailand, for example, increased by 50 percent between 1970 and 1977. People there spend one-fifth of an average income on cigarettes. In India, consumption of cigarettes has

gone up 90 percent in 20 years, in Pakistan 60 percent in 10 years and in Sri Lanka it is increasing by an annual 8 percent, according to WHO surveys.

Lung cancer is now the most common type of cancer among men in the Philippines, and is slowly increasing among women, the surveys indicate. In Pakistan, according to the surveys, it jumped in four years from fourth to first place in the list of the most often observed malignant growths.

The organization also contends that increased smoking indirectly increases another threat — desertification, the stripping of land of vegetation — because wood is used in tobacco curing in developing countries instead of the more expensive gas and oil burners used in the West.

A new 130-page booklet put out by WHO, "Legislative Action to Combat the World Smoking Epidemic," recommends a package of government measures, ranging from curbs on advertising to restrictions on smoking in public places.

Masironi said government regulation has been "ambivalent" in developing countries, noting that for most of them tobacco growing and tobacco taxes are a major source of national revenue.

"Governments in Asia and Africa are to a major extent reluctant but consumer associations in these countries are becoming increasingly militant," he added.

Masironi said he considers raising the level of public awareness of health hazards more effective in smoking control than any legal restrictions

# Meigs County Combed For Marijuana Crops

POMEROY, Ohio (AP) — On a warm late summer afternoon, several men dressed in camouflage fatigues sling rifles over their shoulders and fan out across hilly terrain.

An airplane circles above, using its radio to direct them to a patch of land where several 10- to 15-foot-tall bushes with long, thin green leaves sprout.

The men are law enforcement officers. They are searching for marijuana, a growing cash crop in sparsely populated counties of southeastern Ohio where one high quality variety, Meigs County Green, has earned a national reputation.

Sometimes the take is small — 15 or 20 plants spread over a half-acre or more. Sometimes, it's a bonanza — fields with thousands of plants, just days away from prime harvest time and shipment to buyers outside the county.

Meigs County is a 436-square-mile collection of rolling hills and backwoods just across the Ohio River from West Virginia. Its scattered population of 23,000, combined with hot days and cool, humid nights, provides a nearly ideal growing spot for marijuana.

Sheriff James Proffitt said marijuana is probably the county's No. 1 cash crop, way ahead of tomatoes and sweet corn which are the official leaders.

If growers reap their crops, they can earn from \$400 a pound for low-quality marijuana to \$3,000 a pound for the highest quality sinsemilla, Meigs County Green.

Meigs County Green has about eight times the THC — or tetrahydrocannabinol — content of regular marijuana. THC is the most active ingredient in marijuana. "The stuff that's supposed to give you the high," says Proffitt.

A healthy plant allowed to grow to its peak will yield between one and two pounds

of marijuana, so growing ventures can be lucrative. A field of 1,000 sinsemilla plants could yield \$3 million to \$6 million, law officials say. And the risks, aside from losing a crop to sheriff's deputies or poachers, appear small.

Sinsemilla, first grown widely in Northern California in the mid-1970s, is produced by keeping the female hemp plants that make marijuana away from male plants. The female plants then produce more THC — hence more powerful and valuable marijuana — and no seeds.

Despite the difficulty of keeping the female plants isolated, the risks of growing sinsemilla — which means "without seed" in Spanish — appear small.

In Meigs County and neighboring Athens County, no arrests have been made in the past two years. But 8½ tons of plants were confiscated in sweeps during the period in Meigs County.

Manpower shortages make it difficult to arrange the stakeouts needed to catch growers in the act. And some of the growers take their business seriously, arming themselves to protect their crops and guarding outposts to protect themselves from thieves.

Officials say they aren't aware of anyone being injured yet, but a deputy in nearby Vinton County reported being shot at during a recent raid.

Sheriffs say there is no way to eliminate the problem, so they raid fields in hopes of putting a large enough a dent in grower profits to force them to move elsewhere.

This year, large confiscations were recorded in at least six Ohio counties. But Lionel Stewart, agent in charge of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration office at Cincinnati, says the crop is spreading throughout southern Ohio.

"It's increased from last year," Stewart said. "If it continues at the rate it's going, there will be a larger

crop next year."

Proffitt, 54, said most big growers come in for the summer, raise their crops, then spend the winter elsewhere living off the illegal profits. They maintain a low profile while here, trying to avoid any trouble that would throw a spotlight on them.

Many have elaborate operations that often include chemically analyzed dirt mixtures with potting soil and fertilizers, reinforcing rods as plant stakes and irrigation systems.

Other growers may be full-time residents who pick up a few thousand dollars a year by planting a handful of plants here and there, or who have large operations and keep to themselves, he said.

Proffitt said his staff of five deputies and an investigator is too small for proper surveillance. So, like neighboring sheriffs, he conducts raids.

Last year, deputies and state Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Identification agents, gathered nine pickup truckloads of the illegal weed in a single day.

The take over a span of several days last year totaled about 7 tons. Three-quarters of it was the top-grade Meigs County Green, meaning the sheriff put a \$30 million to \$60 million dent in the crop.

"We just go out and harvest it, bring it in and destroy it," Proffitt said. "We feel like we're discouraging the big growers who don't like being ripped off by us."

"It does put the problem somewhere else, though. Our loss is somebody else's gain."

The sheriff said word must have gotten out this year. Officers had gathered only 1½ tons in a recent two-day sweep — the largest field had 350 to 400 plants.

"We know there's still a lot of it out there," Proffitt said, estimating that the 1982 raids yielded about 10 percent of the county's total marijuana crop.

# Management Is Factor In High Bankruptcy Rate

NEW YORK (AP) — American companies, weakened by two recessions in two years, are failing at the fastest rate since the Depression. But bankruptcy specialists say the causes of collapse run deeper than the unfriendly economic times.

Stumbling in the executive suites, bungling in the board rooms — just plain bad management — is critical in the failure of many companies, even in the best of times.

Also, moves to clear the web of government regulation from such key industries as finance, airlines and trucking have left many companies vulnerable as they cope with unfamiliar competition.

And the oil glut is battering the energy business, which only two years ago was riding an unprecedented wave of profits and seemed almost immune to recession.

But whatever the cause, analysts say, the sickest side of business is the countless numbers of small, sometimes family-run, enterprises.

Joseph Duncan, chief statistician at Dun & Bradstreet Corp., a private credit-information service, says a great share of businesses that go under are small companies run by people with little previous experience in that line of work.

"It's amazing to me," he says. "Someone will decide he wants to own a marina. Maybe it sounds like a good life. But he has no previous experience in the business. The venture gets mired in debt, and before long the business is in bankruptcy."

The marina, and hundreds of other businesses, might have made it in less hostile economic conditions. But they are folding under the pressure of chillingly high interest rates, sluggish consumer demand and low industrial output.

"It's when times get bad that you separate the good management from the bad," says Ben Evans, a bankruptcy specialist at the accounting firm Ernst & Whinney. "A well-managed company is somehow able to gear its business to the times so it can survive."

By Dun & Bradstreet's count, an average of 473 commercial and industrial companies have either been forced to close or to seek reorganization each week so far this year. That is the fastest rate of collapse since 1932, when the weekly rate was 612.

"Bad management decisions often can be covered up by good economic times," says Michael Horgan, senior vice president of credit policy at Citibank. "But bad decisions are exacerbated when you get a downturn in the economy."

Most bankruptcy specialists agree, however, that even some well-run companies are throwing in the towel.

For the year so far, 17,502 businesses have failed, almost half again as many as in the same period last year. And this year's total already is higher than for any full year since 1933, when 19,859 failures were recorded.

Even so, failures as a percentage of all businesses operating are not nearly as severe as during the Depression, according to Duncan's estimates. He figures that as many as 85 of every 10,000 businesses will fail this year. That is triple the rate in 1979 and double the 1980 rate, but it is far below the 151 per 10,000 recorded in 1932.

Although most failures are of small, little known companies, Dun & Bradstreet says the biggest increase in bankruptcies this year is among larger companies.

In the first six months of this year, failures of companies with liabilities exceeding \$100,000 were up 51 percent from the same period last year, says Rowen Wyant, a vice president in Dun & Bradstreet's business economics division. Failures of smaller companies, by comparison, were up 37 percent.

Despite the dangers of such a rapid increase in business failures, economists say the trend does not mean the country's corporate structure is dying.

"It doesn't tell us there is anything fatally wrong with the economy," says James Meig, the chief economist at First Interstate Bancorp. in Los Angeles. "On the contrary, it's a result of lower inflation. We have a rise in failures in any recession, and we have a recession whenever we try to bring down inflation."

Perhaps nowhere is the reversal in the price spiral more obvious than in oil. Prices that had skyrocketed in 1979 and 1980, following the Iranian revolution, suddenly turned the other direction early this year as the oil glut persisted.

Hardest hit are the independent oil exploration companies, the oilfield equipment suppliers and the smaller wholesalers of petroleum products. In Houston, oil's capital, the federal bankruptcy court reported recently that the oil industry had replaced the construction business as the most frequent bankruptcy filer.

In the Pacific Northwest it is the forest-products and construction companies that are dominating the doom. The industrial Midwest continues to suffer the ripple effects of prolonged slumps by the automobile and steel industries.

The farm country also is hurting, as are their bank creditors. So far this year 30 commercial banks and mutual savings banks have either failed or been merged into stronger institutions with the assistance of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. That compared with 10 such failures or mergers last year.

And while smaller companies are the most frequent failures, the damage to the economy may be far-reaching. "It's like killing off seedling trees," says E. Peter Gillette Jr., chairman of Northwestern National Bank in Minneapolis. "The smaller companies are, in essence, being snuffed out, and you're penalizing future economic growth."

Of the major failures this year, none has been larger than Manville Corp., the construction and forest-products giant that sought protection from creditors under Chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Code. But Manville was a special case.

In fact Manville may be the healthiest company ever to file for reorganization. The company said it entered bankruptcy court because of the burden of thousands of pending lawsuits related to its manufacture of asbestos.

Some of the other well-known companies to collapse this year are Braniff International Corp., the airline; Wickes Cos.,

a big retailer and manufacturer; and AM International Inc., a maker of office equipment.

The Braniff case is a good example of how factors outside the economic environment can crush a company.

There is no doubt that Braniff would have lasted longer if not for the recession that reduced airline travel. But it was deregulation of the skies in 1978 that led Braniff to open new routes across the globe and invest millions in new planes. Just as its bold new plan was getting off the ground, the

travel slump deepened, interest rates soared and new competitors drove ticket prices down.

Although analysts see little chance that Braniff will succeed in surviving its trip to bankruptcy court, the object of Chapter 11 of the bankruptcy law is to resurrect failing companies. A company in bankruptcy court under Chapter 11 does not have to pay interest on any of its debt, and is immune from pending litigation, until a plan is worked out to settle the debt and reorganize the company.

### Be Discriminating With Over-the-Counter Drugs

Liberal laws now allow many people to buy over-the-counter drugs with greater freedom. Of course, narcotics can only be obtained by prescription.

The ease with which drugs are bought by people who are easily impressed by over-the-counter advertising campaigns sometimes can do people a great injustice.

When over-the-counter drugs are purchased with discrimination and when their contents are carefully read, the dangers are minimized.

Promiscuous purchases made especially by people who make their own homemade diagnoses may sometimes lead to adverse effects.

Pain-relieving drugs are often purchased indiscriminately. One person may, because of a good experience, suggest the drug to a dozen other people. Sometimes disagreeable consequences may occur.

Some analgesics may contain caffeine and other ingredients which may enhance their toxic effect. Many such drugs contain high quantities of aspirin which can cause stomach and intestinal irritation. Heartburn, nausea, abdominal pain and ulcer-like distress can be related to the salicylate content of these drugs.

Antacids are frequently bought by people, especially the elderly, who believe their distress is due to indigestion. Unfortunately, symptoms of heartburn may actually be due to much more significant problems in the heart, liver or gallbladder. The temporary relief that is obtained by these antacids tends to give one a false sense of security and frequently delays a consultation with the doctor.

Many of these antacids contain sodium bicarbonate. This is commonly overlooked by people as a source of high salt intake. The sodium in these antacids may do harm to the person who is on a salt-free diet. When these antacids are taken according to direction the chances of running into trouble are very slight. However, far too many people function on the basis of "if two are good, four are better." They consequently can overload themselves with a drug that is potentially harmless when used with discrimination.

The use and abuse of laxatives, especially in the elderly, presents a real problem. Constipation caused by lack of exercise makes people seek an over-the-counter medicine. Constipation that lasts for a long time may not be as benign as it seems. It may represent a variety of intestinal conditions which should be discussed with a doctor. Only in this way can serious causes for constipation be recognized early and treated effectively. The routine use of enemas must be discouraged. Its occasional use can be effective. There are many, however, who feel that an enema or a cathartic is the only way they can have a normal bowel movement.

Vitamins so essential to health must not be overused by those who feel that a health panacea lies within them. A good, solid bit of advice is to read the contents of all drugs that are taken. If one doesn't understand their meaning and if one doesn't know about the interaction of some drugs, the pharmacist and doctor can clarify this.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — A single pair of fleas can produce 6,000 offspring in one month, according to the maker of Spectracide home and garden insecticides.

Flea collars and pet shampoos will kill only adult fleas. However, a fogger treatment is a more effective way to kill pre-adult (larva stage) fleas and adult fleas, which can hide in carpets, drapes, upholstery and floor cracks.

# Baseball Card-Collecting Has 250,000 Hobbyists

You got it in 1963 for the nickel price of a pack of bubble gum — the bubble gum, too. Now it's the hottest baseball card among collectors.

The 1963 rookie card of the Philadelphia Phillies' Pete Rose sells for \$100 to \$120. It is in such demand that it was the subject of a counterfeiting scheme that resulted in two arrests earlier this summer.

In fact, the investment potential of baseball cards is one reason many people are entering the hobby.

"What you buy now — and I'd write this in blood — will triple or quadruple in the next 10 years," said Mark Lewis, publisher of Card Prices Update, the monthly bible of current card prices. "It's a tremendous investment. I hate to use that word, but other people do."

"Some other buy our paper like the Wall Street Journal to see how much they made this month. It gets the younger generation interested and gives them a business sense."

Not that baseball card collecting is all that rosy a picture. The recession hasn't helped people who hold the hobby's high-priced cards.

The renowned 1952 Topps Mickey Mantle was auctioned for a high bid of \$3,100 in 1979. It is only valued at \$500 now.

Collectors and dealers agree that the older, higher-priced cards are not moving at all.

The decision of the Fleet Corp. of Philadelphia and the Donruss Co. of Memphis, Tenn., to join Topps, of Duryea, Pa., as the hobby's major card producers caused a saturation of the market, making most recent cards available for just a

few pennies.

A 1982 set of 792 Topps cards can be obtained for \$15, less than two cents per card, while some dealers are letting a 660-card Fleer set from this year sell for \$10.

But collectors and dealers contacted by UPI say the hobby generally is holding its own against the recession.

"People still set aside so many dollars out of their paycheck for recreation and obviously baseball card collecting is included," said Larry Fritsch, a Stevens Point, Wis., collector and operator of one of the largest card dealerships in the nation.

"The business is as good or better than it was last year. With all the new (card) sets out, there is a multitude of stuff available. Last year, my sales were up 143 percent and my sales this year are about the same as last year."

"It's not as easy to put money toward a hobby as it once was," said Vivian Barning, publisher of Baseball Hobby News, one of three publications dealing with baseball card and sports memorabilia collecting.

## Discover Money Can't Buy It All

TORONTO (AP) — Walter and Bertha Kuhnke are discovering that money can't buy happiness. In fact, the elderly Toronto couple — big winners in a lottery — say they were happier living on their pension.

The Kuhnkes, both 70, won \$767,000 (about \$621,270 in U.S. currency) in the Sept. 18 Lottario drawing, but after living with their windfall for a week, they are finding that friends and acquaintances are treating them coldly.

"We were happier as pensioners than with that money," Kuhnke said Sunday.

"If we had dry bread, we were happy with it because we knew how good it tastes," he said. "Now we go on the street and some people are looking at us like we are enemies because we have money."

He recalled one woman stopping him and asking for \$100. She said: "Why don't you give it to me? You are now rich."

The Kuhnkes, who used to live on \$822 a month, would purchase lottery tickets regularly.

"I used to dream about winning and buying a Mercedes," said Walter. "That's \$51,000. But why do I need a new car? I have a 1978 Dodge Aspen and that is good enough."

While they intend to use the money to fix up their \$356-a-month apartment, a vacation or two, and helping two adopted granddaughters through school, life will be much the same, they say.

## Bank 'Machine' Fraud Doubling

NEW YORK (AP) — Fraud in the use of automatic bank-teller machines has been doubling each year in the past three years, says a management information systems journal.

According to MIS Week, national estimates mirror the results of a survey conducted in Arizona, in which fraudulent manipulation of the machines climbed from \$9,886 in 1978 to \$111,988 in 1981.

MIS Week said the nation's banks have embarked on a program to combat the trend.

Recommendations include thorough screening of applicants prior to issuance of customer cards, closer scrutiny of personal identification numbers, use of closed circuit television cameras, and the setting of limits on daily transactions.

"People are in it because they are intrigued by it, are enjoying it and are getting a lot out of it. The state of the hobby is good. People are crossing over... Coin dealers are getting into baseball cards, so I think what they're telling us is that baseball cards are standing up better than other hobbies."

Today, these experts say, there are roughly 250,000 baseball card collectors. This figure excludes the thousands of children who invest their spare change in wax packs of cards at the grocery store counter.

Now there are regional cards. These are sets issued by teams or local police departments and those printed by food or beverage companies (Drake's cakes, Squirt, Coca-Cola) give the hobbyist a greater selection from which to choose. For the most part, these sets range in price from \$3 to \$10.

The range and variety of the sets has become so wide that Ted Taylor has a warning for would-be collectors.

"The worst thing you can do in coming into the hobby is trying to collect everything," said Taylor, a Philadelphia collector and co-operator of one of the largest card and memorabilia shows in the nation.

"You have to know what you want. You won't get every card so you have to choose what you want."

Some people have gone into baseball cards purely for financial reasons. The high cost of the 1952 Topps Mantle three years ago attracted speculators who tried to make a quick killing. Few succeeded and many got burned, but several remained in the hobby.

But Taylor said, "I think there is investment potential in baseball cards."

"To me, the best investment is set by set. The 1970 set was worth \$12 that year and now you can't find it for less than \$150."

"I always buy two or three sets each year and put them away," said Taylor, who is athletic director at Spring Garden College in Philadelphia. "It's almost like buying a savings bond."

Collectors who also are baseball fans are using their knowledge of the game now to buy cards of the current sensations in large quantities.

This year's hot rookies — Steve Sax of the Los Angeles Dodgers and Kent Hrbek of the Minnesota Twins — are being bought by the dozens in the hopes their values will rise. The cards of some young players who are reaching star potential — such as Rickey Henderson of the Oakland A's and Bob Horner of the Atlanta Braves — are also being noticed.

Mrs. Barning, who was a teacher for 11 years before starting Baseball Hobby News with her husband, Frank, says the tie-in between hobbyist and baseball fan amounts to a fun kind of speculation — figuring out who the up and coming players are and deciding what to buy and sell on that basis.

"What happens on the field reflects directly on baseball card prices and I think that's terrific because it's a real tie-in to the game."

The hobby has a somewhat unique problem — wooing would-be collectors out of hiding.

"There are a lot of people who are in the closet, kind of," Mrs. Barning said. "They didn't want to tell their friends that, as adults, they were collecting baseball cards. There is no reason to be ashamed of being an adult and collecting baseball cards. We're letting people know that we've got

something, and it's a very positive thing."

"A lot of guys in their late 20s and early 30s are coming into my store and getting back into the hobby," Fritsch said. "They have their degrees but they want to get back into it. The bug bites harder the second time."

"It's a way of reliving your youth. For me, it's looking at a 1955 Sandy Koufax card and recalling when he broke in as a rookie. For me, that's where it's at."

If the hobby as a whole is holding its own against the recession, several dealers said business was off and blamed the growth in the number of hobby shows.

"You're getting more lookers at shows," Mrs. Barning said. "They enjoy being there but they can't spend as much. And now that you can go to a show almost every weekend, you're going to take that dollar and stretch it out. It has hurt."

# Cold Winter In The East, Claims Seer

DUBLIN, N.H. (AP) -

The Old Farmer's Almanac, the 191-year-old yellow and black weather bible ready to hang in pantry or privy, predicts a frigid winter for the East and a mild one for the West.

The 1983 edition of the nation's oldest continuously published periodical, issued today, says it makes forecasts based on both "the latest scientific technology" and a secret formula locked in a black box in the almanac's offices.

But Abe Weatherwise - a pseudonym for publisher Rob Trowbridge and editor Jud Hale - cautions that the April 4 eruption of the Mexican volcano El Chichon could throw off this year's forecasts because the almanac went to press before the volcano's effects could be assessed.

Weatherwise predicted severe cold waves rolling across the East in January, February and March after a mild and sunny December.

The West may face a serious drought as a result of a warm and dry November, then rain and relief in December and a cold snap at the end of the year, he said. The Middle Atlantic region should expect a wet spring and possible flooding.

The publishers claim an accuracy rate of 80 percent, and the U.S. government took them at their word at least once. During World War II, all copies of the magazine were confiscated after German spies were captured off the East Coast consulting its forecasts.

The Old Farmer's Almanac's most recent success was predicting last winter's bitter cold wave. The forecast was for a major snowstorm and cold wave in the East and South during the Christmas-New Year's holidays. The forecast was a bit narrow, though: The cold wave spread into the Midwest and lasted through January.

The almanac is not to be confused with a younger publication called simply the Farmers' Almanac, which is only 166 years old. That almanac, published in Lewiston, Maine, is given away by businesses as an advertising promotion.

The younger almanac's winter forecast - prepared by Caleb Weatherbee, a pseudonym for an unidentified weather buff from New Hampshire - also predicts a colder-than-normal winter, with above-average snowfall virtually everywhere but the Pacific Northwest. But the Farmers' Almanac, which also claims 80 percent accuracy, did not predict last winter's killer cold wave.

The Old Farmer's Almanac, on sale for \$1.50, offers anecdotes and stories along with its year-long forecasts for 16 regions of the country, tide and planting tables, and breeding charts.

The publishers say they have gone to great expense to keep all this at a reader's fingertips, and note the almanac is perforated in the upper left-hand corner so it can be tacked to a wall.

This year's almanac offers these tidbits:

-An old-fashioned cure for insomnia: Smell your socks before retiring.

-A list of printers' errors in various editions of the Bible, including a 1632 publication in which the Seventh Commandment admonished: "Thou shalt commit adultery."

-A study that says U.S. workers spend an average of two hours and 44 minutes a day to make enough money to pay their taxes.

-Instruction on hulling corn, "for the three, possibly four people in the world who would be interested."

-For those struggling with the metric system, a look at the evolution of measurements. A foot began as the length of Charlemagne's foot, standardized in 1305 to 36 barleycorns end-to-end.

-Tips on the art of listening: Place left elbow on the table and rest cheek in palm of hand. The posture allows easy use of one finger tip to prop open a heavy eyelid.

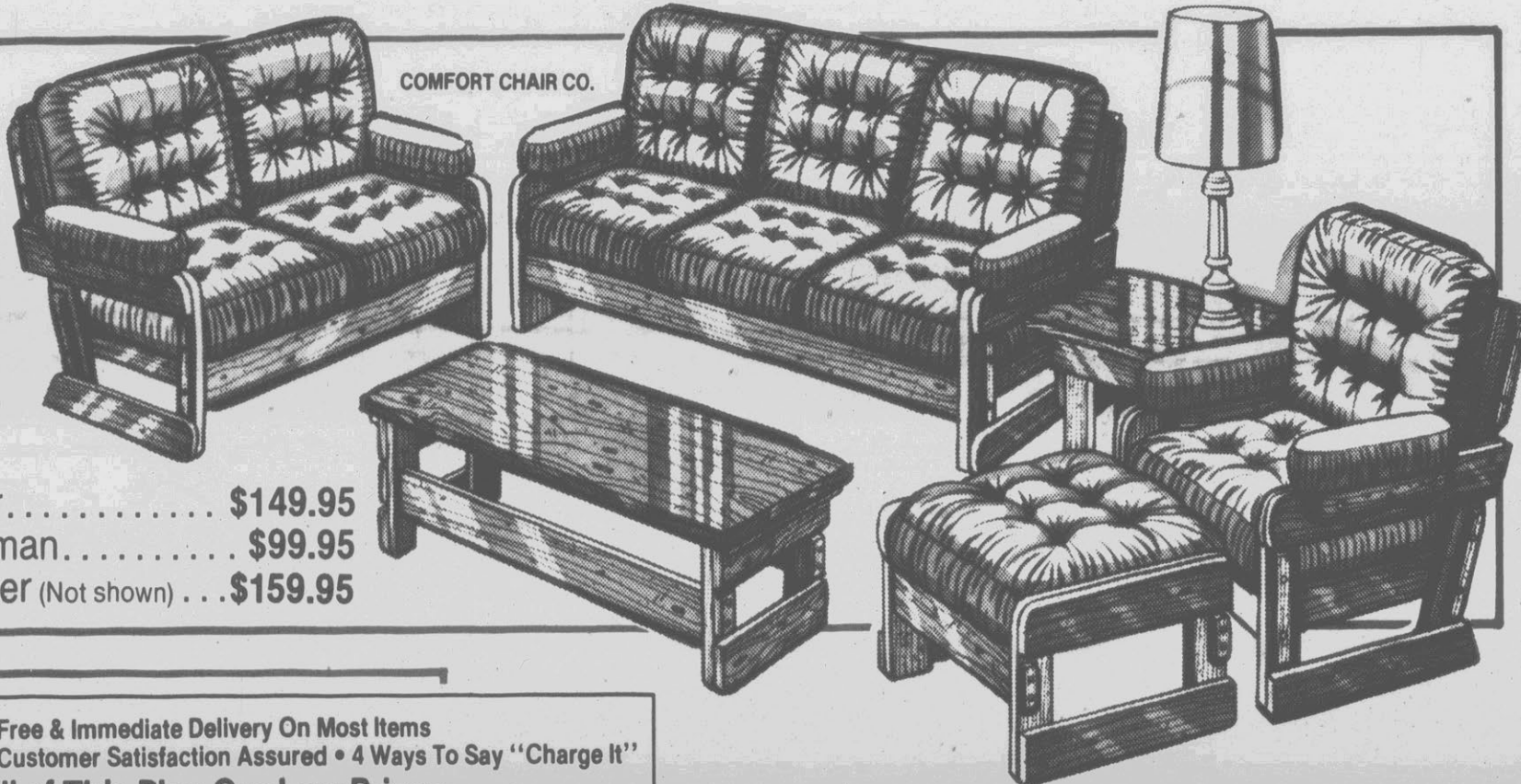

# High Frontier: Staggering Concept For Defense

WASHINGTON (AP) — The concept is staggering: station 432 killer satellites in orbit, each with 40-50 rockets ready to knock out attacking Soviet missiles before they can reach their American targets. The cost: \$50 billion.

The plan, labeled High Frontier, was introduced to the public in March. Its chief architect says it has received considerable attention on Capitol Hill and some response in the White House — but little notice from the State Department and a cold shoulder from the Pentagon.

"We have several hurdles to get over, but we feel confident," said retired Army Lt. Gen. Daniel O. Graham, former head of the Pentagon's Defense Intelligence Agency and a military adviser to Ronald Reagan during the 1980 presidential campaign. "We hope within a month or so to have either an amendment in Congress or instructions for the administration to consider."

High Frontier resulted from a seven-month study commissioned by The Heritage Foundation, a conservative, Washington-based public policy research institute. It was drawn up by a team of 31 scientists, space engineers, economists and military strategists directed by Graham.

Other proposals in the plan are a defense system around U.S. ballistic missile silos, an advanced manned space shuttle to open up industrialization of space and development of solar power satellites to beam energy to Earth.

The killer satellite network is the centerpiece of the plan and has drawn the most attention and created the most controversy.

Graham said that perhaps the biggest obstacle to the satellites is the large political community that advocates the Mutual

Assured Destruction doctrine, under which nuclear war becomes "unthinkable" as long as each side retains enough nuclear bombs for a second strike.

With 432 killer satellites in orbit, Graham said, at least one-fourth of them would be in position at any time to repulse a Russian missile attack. They would be in two layers — the first to intercept rockets as they rise into the atmosphere, the second to knock out those along the path to their target in case they get by the initial defense line.

Here's how the system would work:

—A Soviet missile bursts out of its silo aimed at a target in the United States or Western Europe.

—An American early warning satellite tracks the missile using infrared sensors and radar and computes its course, selecting a high-probability point in the atmosphere through which the missile will pass.

—A designated killer satellite launches one of its rocket-propelled canisters containing a conventional explosive at the interception point. As the canister nears the missile it explodes, somewhat like a grenade, into several hundred small explosives, some of which hit and destroy the missile.

—Any missile which penetrates both layers of the satellite defense is cleaned up by a ground-based anti-missile net protecting U.S. silos.

Graham said that even though he had been a Reagan military adviser just two years ago, he had "some initial trouble getting through the palace guard" in attempts to present the plan to the White House.

But in recent weeks, he said, he has talked with White House science officials, and "we believe the presidential science adviser, Dr. George A. Keyworth, is moving from a rather nega-

tive view to a view that we should have a spaceborne defense system against missiles." However, Graham said, Keyworth's concepts might not necessarily agree with those of High Frontier.

On Pentagon reaction, Graham said: "This is one source of difficulty, and understandably so, because we're recommending a ma-

ior shift in strategy that knocks over a lot of programmatic apple carts."

Some defense officials, he said, might fear a loss of authority in the High Frontier recommendation that development of the killer satellite force be given independent status so it can be implemented quickly.

Graham said, however, he

was encouraged when Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger recently spoke of the need for a space-based defense system against missiles.

Graham said major High Frontier supporters in Congress, all Republican, are Sens. Jesse Helms of North Carolina, William V. Roth of Delaware, William L.

Armstrong of Colorado and Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming and Reps. G. William Whitehurst of Virginia, Newt Gingrich of Georgia and Kenneth B. Kramer of Colorado.

He said he plans to meet soon with Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado, a liberal Democrat who has expressed an interest in the plan.

Graham said there are conservative supporters who worry that High Frontier might be pushed by liberals as an alternative, rather than a supplement, to a buildup in conventional and strategic forces. More than one program has survived development stages only to be dropped when ready for building, he noted.

That, Graham said, is why the system must have guaranteed funding over several years and be constructed quickly. He reported the estimated cost at \$50 billion over 10 years. Of this, \$35 million would be Defense Department money, the rest from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

## Old Foes Share Common Cause

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A onetime king, a communist zealot who helped mastermind a bloody revolution and an aging exile have joined together to fight Vietnamese forces in their Cambodian homeland.

Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the former king; Khieu Samphan, the communist, and Son Sann, the exile — bitter enemies in the past — are preparing to set up a resistance government somewhere in the jungles of western Cambodia.

The Vietnamese invaded Cambodia in late 1978 and replaced the bloody Khmer Rouge regime, of which Khieu Samphan was president, with a pro-Hanoi government. But it took years of wrangling among the three factions to come up with the loose resistance coalition that was formalized in June.

The charismatic, extroverted Sihanouk, 59, is the coalition's president. Khieu Samphan, an introverted 50-year-old bachelor, is vice president. The prime minister is Son Sann, 71, who chose exile in Paris when Cambodia was plunged into the Indochina war in 1970.

"Tigers, horses and elephants in the same cage," is how Hun Sen, the foreign minister of the current

Cambodian government, has described the trio.

The consensus of Western analysts in Bangkok is that the three will have big problems in dealing with each other and that militarily, their alliance won't make much difference.

But having Sihanouk, and to a lesser extent Son Sann, involved should give Cambodian resistance a better international image, attract more aid and improve chances of gaining diplomatic support in the United Nations and elsewhere, the analysts added.

U.S. Assistant Secretary of State John Holdridge said on a recent visit to Bangkok that the United States would provide only humanitarian assistance to the Sihanouk and Son Sann factions but not to the Khieu Samphan's Khmer Rouge. Holdridge ruled out military aid to all three, however.

Tension between Sihanouk and Khieu Samphan goes far back, even though the young radical once served as a secretary of state for commerce under the prince, who had abdicated in 1955 in favor of his father but remained as head of state.

In 1960, Sihanouk's secret police beat and stripped Khieu Samphan naked in the streets of Phnom Penh, Cambodia's capital.

# School Offers Deaf New Hope

MORGANTON, N.C. (AP) — When Jackie Shepherd's son, Mason, was born 11 years ago, his mother noticed after a few months he didn't respond to sounds. But it wasn't until Mason was 18 months old that doctors confirmed what Mrs. Shepherd feared — the child was deaf.

The next step for Mrs. Shepherd was to find a school that specialized in teaching deaf children to communicate. She says the North Carolina School for the Deaf in Morganton was the answer to her prayers.

"A child with hearing impairment can't get the kind of education at any other school that he can get here," said Mrs. Shepherd, who moved from Asheville to be

close to the Morganton school. Mason attended the school's Asheville pre-school classes for four years before enrolling at Morganton.

The N.C. School for the Deaf was built in Morganton in 1890 on land bought and donated to the state by businessmen. The institution also has facilities in Wilson and Greensboro and satellite pre-school operations in Asheville, Charlotte and Shelby.

The pre-school centers accept children from birth through age 4 and the main campuses enroll students from grades one through 12, age 6 to 21.

The Morganton school has 85 faculty members and an enrollment of 400 students. It has a concurrent enrollment program with nearby Western Piedmont Com-

munity College, the only school of its kind in the country with such a program.

It is the only school in the Southeast, with pre-school satellite programs and is the only facility of its kind to have an occupational therapist as part of its diagnosis program.

Walking onto the campus, with its red-brick buildings and green lawn, is like stepping onto a small-college campus, only quieter. Students clustered around the grounds between classes communicate through sign language.

"We use a combination of sign language, we use residual hearing if a student can hear at all, speech reading, anything we can to help the students," said Elmer Dillingham, assistant super-

intendent.

"Hearing-impaired kids have real problems when it comes to communicating," he said. "All hearing folks develop language based on what they hear. Deaf kids never have that input."

Dillingham says the younger a deaf child is when he's first sent to school, the more progress parents can expect.

"It used to be that the school would get a child when he was 10 years old, after trying to go to public school, and it wasn't unusual for a that child to be graduating from our high school at 19 or 20," he said.

"It used to be that a hearing-impaired child was always at least two years behind hearing kids. Now we're seeing a lot of our students graduate right on

schedule."

Students applying for admission have their hearing and additional handicaps evaluated. The school offers a complete educational program for the deaf and for students with multiple physical handicaps.

The faculty-to-student ratio is high at NCS — one teacher for every seven students at the elementary-school level, nine to one in high school and four to one for students with several handicaps.

Students at the state-supported school pay no tuition unless they are from out of state. Most live in dormitories on the campus. Residents of Burke County are required to live at home and parents are reimbursed for transportation costs.

All the usual grammar and high-school subjects are offered. An expanded vocational-training program attracts many students. In the upholstery and furniture-building class, students make and sell couches and chairs.

The furniture brings in about \$4,000 a year, according to instructor Don Clarke. The class recently finished a couch, loveseat and two chairs that will be used in the office of Dr. Sarah Morrow, secretary of Human Resources.

Advanced equipment is available to help the students learn sounds. In speech therapy class, students can speak into a microphone attached to a video articulator, a machine that shows them a "picture" of speech sounds. Another gadget, a polyphonorator, magnifies sounds so students with some residual hearing can pick up sounds.

The school has football, girls' and boys' basketball, volleyball, track, wrestling and volleyball teams, which compete against both hear-

# Art, Literature Are Debated

PEKING (AP) — An extraordinary, vitriolic debate on art and literature — always a volatile subject here — is under way in the Chinese press in a rare display of public and political mudslinging.

It comes at a time of increased restrictions on literary freedom and warnings to artists and writers to endorse the Communist Party and socialism and extinguish bourgeois liberalism.

At the same time China has declared that the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung was wrong in his attitude toward intellectuals and wrong in saying art must serve politics. Now, it says, art must serve the people.

"How?" is the subject of unending debate here.

"It's like walking on eggs here," said one intellectual. "The situation is vastly improved, but the relative freedom expands and contracts and we still have a long way to go."

In China, where political debates in the press frequently are couched in allegorical terms, this is a clear slugfest between two mon-

thly magazines and their supporters: The literati of the Literary Gazette and the hardliners and leftists with army connections of the Report of the Times. The latter became famous last year for its rapacious attack on the army writer Bai Hua who criticized Maoism and the Communist Party.

The debate itself is windy and arcane, turning more on politics than art itself but in China the two are inextricably bound. It centers on a single phrase first used last June by Report of the Times.

That seemingly innocuous phrase was "16 years since the Cultural Revolution."

The Cultural Revolution was a period of artistic retrogression and persecution of intellectuals which officially began in 1966 and ended with Mao's death in September 1976. It officially has been declared a decade of disaster.

Last month the Literary Gazette leaped upon the expression "16 years, saying it distorted history and blurred the distinction between the end of the Cultural

Revolution and present political and artistic achievements.

It said the "16 years" formulation ignored landmark Central Committee meetings of December 1978 and June 1981 — orchestrated by the current top leader Deng Xiaoping — which repudiated the Cultural Revolution.

Then Report of the Times accused the Literary Gazette of the same things and of ignoring Mao's dictums in a widening debate on leftism, rightism and bourgeois liberalism.

In a curious twist, the Communist Party newspaper People's Daily has published the accusations of both sides without taking sides — so far. So have other publications.

Such debates always are messy in China, foreign dip-

ing and deaf teams. The campus has four gymnasiums, a track and tennis courts.

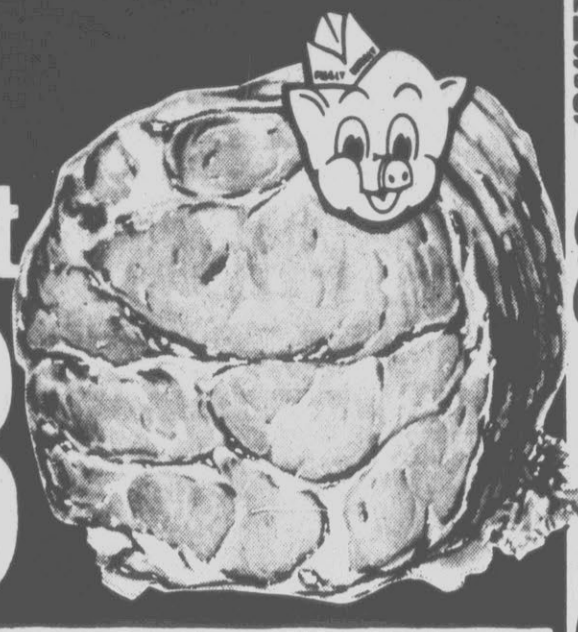

## Plan Estimate Illegal Aliens

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A small team of statisticians at the Bureau of the Census is trying to answer a question the 1980 census never asked: How many illegal aliens are there in the United States?

For the first time they believe they are making headway in solving a problem one of them conceded seems intractable.

While Congress debates what to do about the illegal alien problem, the federal statisticians hope to come up with an overall total based on something better than the stab-in-the-dark reckoning of the past. They are not trying to identify individuals.

In taking the census, the government mounted an extensive, expensive campaign to convince illegal aliens, especially Mexicans and other Hispanics, that they should cooperate in the census without fear of arrest.

They were reassured that the census would not ask whether they were in the country legally or illegally, to keep from frightening the illegals into hiding from the census takers.

Hispanic entertainers on Spanish language TV stations and priests from their pulpits told Hispanics they would not get their fair share of representation in Congress, federal programs and other benefits unless they cooperated. More than \$50 billion in revenue sharing and other federal programs is allotted on the basis of census figures.

The special campaign to increase the accuracy of the count appears to have worked fairly well, say those who took part, holding the estimated "undercount" of Hispanics to 4.4 percent.

The number of illegal aliens has been a subject of intense debate for years, with estimates ranging from one million to 20 million, often depending on whatever political argument the user wanted to make. The current generally accepted figure is three million to six million.

The effort to dig out of the census figures on the number of illegals, by complex mathematical cross checks, was described in a little noticed paper presented in to the annual meeting of the Population Association of America in San Diego by Robert Warren, a census bureau analyst.

A three-man team in the bureau's population analysis staff has been trying to come up with a scientifically reliable method for making the count. The method basically involves use of census and

immigration data to arrive at a total number of foreign-born inhabitants, then subtracting known alien deaths and departures from the country.

"To date, however, the problems involved... have proved intractable," as far as pinpointing the total, Warren told the gathering of demographers.

However, he said, the team has succeeded in developing methods to come up with "a lower bound," a minimum which the illegal population must surpass. Working with figures from the 1979 "Current Population Survey" — a yearly mini-census — Warren came up with a figure of 1.25 million as the minimum.

For a number of reasons, the actual number of illegal aliens "is certainly far higher than that," said Jeffrey S. Passell, supervisory statistician of the three-man team that includes Warren at the census bureau's headquarters in Suitland, Md.

He said the team wants to spend next year working with data from the Mexican census in hope of "setting the upper bound by establishing the maximum number of Mexicans that could possibly be in this country."

The overall total would still be shaky, he said. "Ultimately I expect it won't narrow the range much over the figures so many people use now, 3 to 6 million," he said, but whatever the result, it will have a better factual base.

Passell and coworkers Jacob S. Siegel and J. Gregory Robinson studied the research methods of every known study of illegal alien numbers.

"What we found was that there were no reliable estimates. In virtually every study there's some model or some set of calculations that at some point relies on a variable on which there is no data.

"This doesn't necessarily invalidate the study, but we found that in every case there was no empirical support for the variable. The person doing the study made assumptions and carried on," he said, the result of the study always reflecting the writer's assumption.

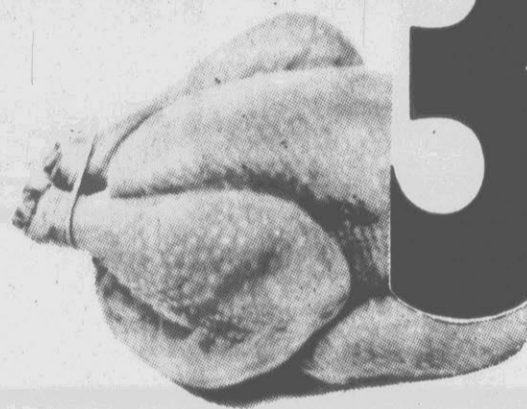

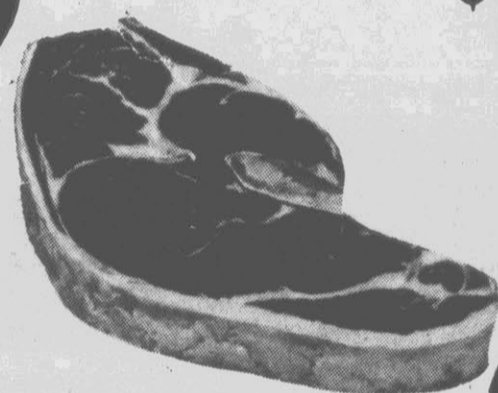

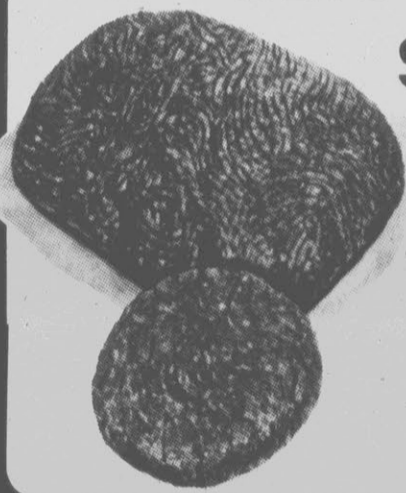

# Pet World's Own Analyst

NEW YORK (AP) — She lives in a luxurious Park Avenue apartment, surrounded by fine works of art. A silken-haired beauty of impeccable breeding, she seems to have everything money can buy.

But the minute she steps into the lobby, her confidence vanishes, and she covers in a corner.

She's a 1-year-old Norwich terrier named Sweets and she suffers from "a clear-cut case of city neurosis," says Warren Eckstein, the combination animal trainer-pet social worker who is trying to cure her.

"Not every dog or cat can be Rin Tin Tin or Morris," he says. "But if the problem is sociological or psychological, no animal cannot be trained."

Sweets' walk around the block is followed by kisses and hugs. Then, briefcase in hand, the tall, bearded Eckstein hurries off to complete his visits to New York's biting birds, dogs and cats.

Eckstein has been known to bite back.

"Animals talk body language," he says. "I get down on the floor with them and speak their language. As long as you get on the animal's level, you can communicate."

There are misunderstandings. Eckstein's hands and arms are tattooed with teethmarks, and wounds on his chest have required 82 stitches.

He is not a veterinarian, and there is no licensing requirement for his work. Eckstein gives his credentials succinctly: "I have worked with 22,000 pets in 14 years."

He also has trained pets for the deaf and for victims of Down's syndrome, and has helped countless humans conquer pet phobias. Five years ago he developed the first course of study ever approved by the New York Department of Education for the training of dog trainers.

Today, he and his wife Fay get \$1,500 to \$6,000 for treatments that last from two months to three years. The 14 trainers who work for them command less.

Eckstein first makes friends with his patients, then teaches them basic obedience. "If a dog doesn't know 'come, heel, sit and stay,' it's like not knowing the alphabet."

From there, the treatment depends on the problem. In one case, he play-acted the role of suitor to cure an over-protective 12-year-old dog who tore the pantlegs off any man who tried to touch his divorced mistress.

He helps shy dogs develop confidence. "After obedience training, I take the dog out to run and jump over walls, build up his self-image."

Sibling rivalry is another common disorder. "One couple had a dog for nine years, then decided to have their first child. Before the child was born, the crib and all the other stuff that would be in the house was already in place, and the couple held a doll to simulate the baby."

Eckstein began his own training as a child on Long Island, where he adopted a vast collection of critters.

He studied psychology at C.W. Post college, then went to Germany with the Air Force, spending his free time at kennels along the Rhine Valley.

When he returned in 1970, he advertised obedience courses at \$100 per pooch.

His big break occurred when he spotted a stray dog, bribed him with a hamburger, and gave him a free course.

Movie producer Tom McGrath saw Eckstein's ad and called in search of a dog for his new film. The stray went on to co-star with Treat Williams in "Deadly Hero," and Eckstein was on his way.

By 1975, he was appearing on TV talk shows, and training pets for such celebrities as David Letterman and Lily Tomlin.

His own menagerie includes nine dogs, six birds,

nine rabbits and a pig. In addition to dogs, he trains cats, birds and goats, and occasionally helps circus trainers with disgruntled lions and tigers.

"The smarter the animal, the harder it is to train, because it questions authority just like kids do. You say 'sit,' it says 'why?' Cats are so smart, they have the public convinced they can't learn. But cats can be taught to do anything."

Eckstein says most trainers "tend to take a more clinical approach. They say, 'You're the pet, I'm the trainer.' They let their ego get involved."

"When I work with animals, we become personal friends. I feel close to them. I'm colorblind, and I have a very strong sixth sense. I'm very instinctive." Eckstein's instincts tell him he has chosen his life's work well.

"I think I was put here to help bridge the gap between people and animals," he says, "because I'm able to communicate with both."

## Pain Eased By Computer

CHESAPEAKE, Va. (AP) — Larry Herrington wears prescription dark glasses indoors, and even in the middle of winter he wears his shirt unbuttoned to the waist — or no shirt at all.

The glasses and the open shirt are legacies of a nine-year battle with a nerve disorder that has left Herrington's skin and eyes hypersensitive.

And beneath his shirt, just under the skin of the left side of his chest, sits a revolutionary, pocket-sized computer that some day could bring relief to pain sufferers throughout the world.

Herrington, 35, knows all about pain. A simple sprained wrist in 1973 mysteriously led to years of unrelenting pain, coronary problems, nearly 40 operations and loss of the use of his left arm below the elbow.

But in the spring of 1981, surgeons at Johns Hopkins University Hospital in Baltimore implanted a small computer, called a neuromodulator, which uses electricity to override pain signals to the brain.

The device, a collaborative effort between the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the university, was the first of its kind.

"This is the model before the prototype. Call it an engineering model," said Wade Radford, a program manager at Johns Hopkins' Applied Physics Lab.

Herrington is the only recipient of the novel device. In the 15 months since the implantation he has appeared on national television and the procedure has been written up in medical journals, newspapers and magazines.

The publicity prompted letters and calls from people all over the world, seeking relief from pain.

"I get weird calls all the time," said Herrington, a "gentleman rancher" who moved from Shiloh, N.C., to Chesapeake in early spring. "I've had some from Mexico, England, from all over."

The callers want to know where they can buy the device, but it's not on the market. It's still experimental, and Herrington still has bouts with excruciating pain.

But, he said, "It's a lot better than it was before. Any outlook of relief was better than none...It's no picnic. Sometimes it works and a lot of times it doesn't. A lot of bugs have to be worked out."

Nevertheless, there have been encouraging results in at least two areas, his doctor said.

"An aspect of the pain is relieved. And that's very significant," said Herrington's long-time medical strategist, Dr. Donlin Long, chief of neurosurgery at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine.

Plus, Long said, "musculature in his upper arm has been built back up. Through nerve stimulation, the muscle tone has improved."

This hand from a team match is an interesting lesson in technique. Both Souths gave an impressive performance, each in his own way.

Because of a preempt from East and a raise by West, both North-South pairs reached a slam that could hardly be described as laydown. Both Wests led a diamond, and both Easts took the ace and made a neutral shift to a trump.

Our first declarer won in dummy and cashed another high trump. Next came three rounds of hearts, on which he sluffed a club. When East followed to all these tricks, declarer had an inferential count of the hand—East almost surely had seven diamonds for his jump, and he had shown up with two trumps and three hearts. Therefore, he held at most one club.

Declarer elected to play for East to have specifically a bare nine or ten of clubs, twice as good as hoping that the singleton was the king. He came to hand with a heart ruff and led the jack of clubs. West covered and declarer was delighted to find that East produced the nine. South came back to his hand with the ace of trumps and ran the eight of clubs. When

East showed out as expected, twelve tricks were there.

The other declarer took a slightly different, perhaps even better, line of play. Since East had long diamonds, he rated to be short in the other suits. So declarer won the trump shift in dummy at trick two, came back to his hand with the nine of trumps and took the club finesse. When that held, he cashed the ace of clubs and then started to run his trumps. From dummy declarer discarded a club.

When declarer led his last trump, West was down to four hearts and the king of clubs. Since he knew that declarer had the jack of clubs, West had to hold the king. He reluctantly parted with a heart, in the hope that his partner had the king. But it was not to be. Dummy's remaining club was ditched, and four hearts brought declarer's trick total to twelve.

**A Warning By Caterpillar Fur**

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP) — The fur of the woolly-bear caterpillars is the darkest Martha Krone has seen in 40 years, leading her to predict a long, harsh winter ahead.

"I have never seen so many solid black ones in my life," Mrs. Krone, 84, said Saturday after surveying the coloring of a handful of caterpillars brought to her by a friend.

Mrs. Krone, who gauges her prediction by the darkness of the caterpillars' coloring, said, "Usually the red ones are sort of strawberry blond, but there aren't any (of that color) this year."

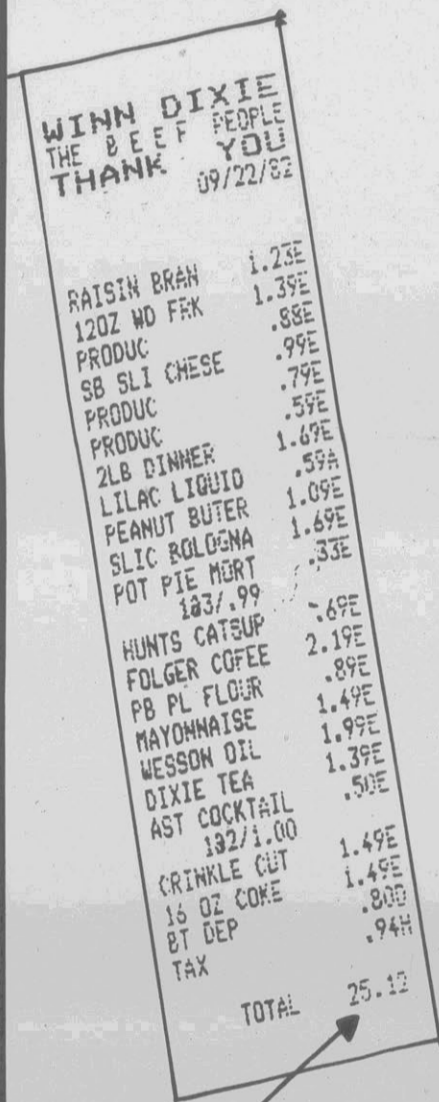

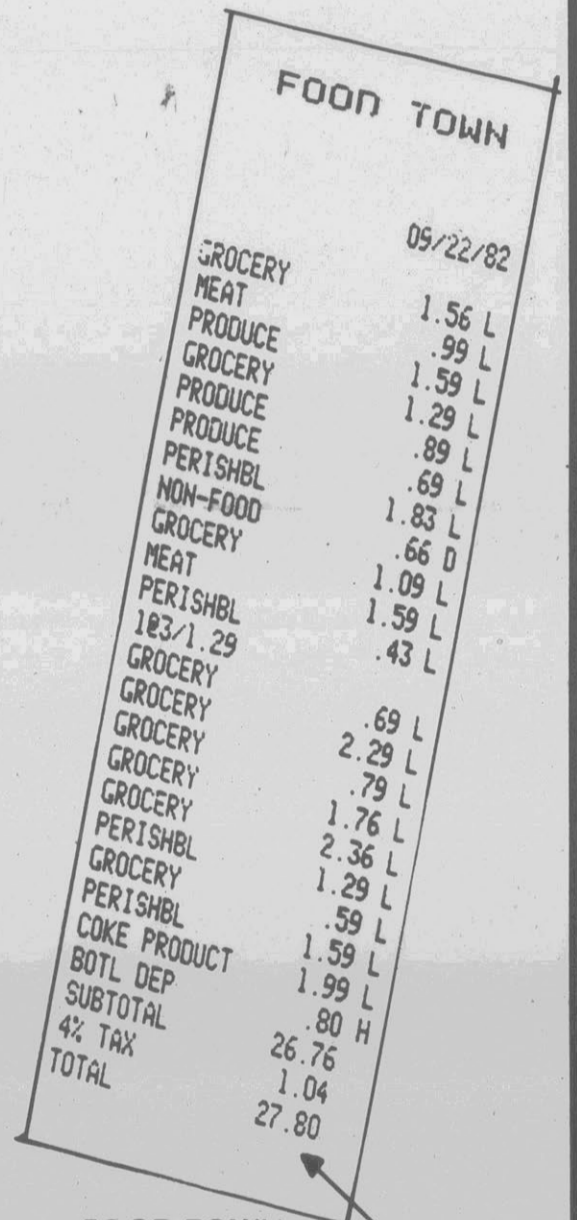

## Hard Times Are Fought By Printer

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Charles Hull was a success in the printing business for more than 25 years — until the economy caught up with him.

Because of business conditions that crimped his paying bills on time, he was forced to file this summer for financial reorganization under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy statutes.

Hull, a 50-year-old gritty New Englander, is determined to pay off his debts and stay in business. He says he spurned legal advice to file for bankruptcy and walk away.

Back in Meriden, Conn., Hull developed a family printing operation from an eight-man to a 35-man, \$1 million-a-year business before selling his share in December 1978 and moving with his wife, Patricia, and two children to Tucson.

Two years later, after managing two printing concerns and getting the itch to be his own boss again, he bought a small printing firm — All Purpose Printing and Copying Inc., specializing in quick printing of letterheads, envelopes, business forms and the like. He put down \$15,000 toward the \$60,000 purchase price of the 2 1/2-year-old Tucson company in December 1980.

The Hulls bought it just in time for the economy to go sour.

By June 1981, trouble blanketed their horizon: —One good customer just stopped doing any printing. —Other clients cut down on the size of their orders. —Three customers skipped town with unpaid bills of almost \$2,000.

Charles and Patricia Hull found themselves in a "struggle to pay our rent." Hull stopped bringing home any money; they began living off savings.

In August, Mrs. Hull invested the first of an eventual \$14,000 of her own to help pay their single full-time employee and their debts.

In October, Hull voluntarily went to a cash-on-delivery basis with suppliers. "But the economy didn't catch up," Mrs. Hull says. The number of clients held steady but was not enough to cover expenses.

By last May, Mrs. Hull went to work at All-Purpose, without pay, replacing a part-timer. Three creditors were threatening lawsuits and, the Hulls say, refused attempts to negotiate monthly payments.

Hull says, "When I talked to my lawyer about this, he said, 'Charlie, why don't you just declare bankruptcy?'"

"I've been in business too long. . . . We pay our bills and the whole bit. We wanted to try to work something out," Hull says.

He says his attorney told him he would still have to pay his bills if he filed for Chapter 11 protection, "and I said, 'I was brought up in New England, and that's the way it is.'"

So the Hulls filed on July 30. They listed nearly \$7,500 in debts to their three biggest creditors, and they also owe \$45,000, the balance of the purchase price, over the next three years and four months.

Hull says he's confident he can survive. He says he felt a business upsurge in July and "it showed it in August," about 25 percent better than any month previously.

The Hulls say they are current on all bills except those in the Chapter 11 filing. They have chosen to pay cash for everything; they still live off savings. The business now pays the employee's salary and monthly bills.

The Bankruptcy Court will set up a three-year debt repayment schedule.

The experience, Hull says, has been "a very difficult thing to go through. It's stressful from a pride standpoint," and it put an initial strain on the Hulls' 27-year-old marriage, but both feel it has brought them closer.

"We're just trying to, doggone, take care of ourselves and family and pay our own way," says Mrs. Hull.

"We were in the wrong place at the wrong time," her husband adds. "We've got a good company, we do good work and we're hard-working people."
