

## Far-Reaching Blow In Leaf Quota Cut

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The 10 percent cut in the 1983 flue-cured tobacco quota will have far-reaching ramifications that will affect more than just the tobacco industry, state agriculture officials say.

"It will have an effect on the furniture stores, the automobile dealers, everybody," said T.C. Blalock, executive secretary of the Tobacco Growers Association of North Carolina.

"You have to assume there will be 10 percent less fertilizer purchased, 10 percent less chemicals and 10 percent less farm equipment," he said.

N.C. Agriculture Commissioner Jim Graham says the cuts will have a drastic impact on tobacco growers in North Carolina, where two-thirds of the nation's flue-cured tobacco is produced.

"I think it's going to drive some tobacco farmers out of business," said Graham, who opposed the cut.

"You can shear sheep one time, and then you shear too close and you cut through the hide," Graham said. "They cut through the hide on this one."

Farm leaders say the reduction would cut into farmers' profits and force more farmers to lease allotments to neighbors, driving up the cost of leasing.

Reginald Lester, a spokesman for the Tobacco Growers Information Committee, said the reduction portends "some very difficult times ahead for North Carolina tobacco farmers."

U.S. Agriculture Secretary John R. Block announced the quota reduction on Tuesday. Block said the marketing quota — the method that keeps tobacco supply in line with demand — would be reduced from 1.012 million pounds to 910,000 pounds next year.

However, he softened its impact by saying he would allow

the Flue-Cured Stabilization Corporation to sell excess leaf directly to foreign buyers.

William E. Little, commodity director for the N.C. Farm Bureau Federation, said he was "very gratified" with the secretary's decision on foreign sales.

Meanwhile, tobacco growers say the cut probably won't cause them to change their minds on a proposal to freeze price supports.

Little said stabilization probably still would sell most of its tobacco through export companies, because those companies already have a network of overseas salesmen.

But he said Block's action gives stabilization the option of selling some tobacco — possibly at a greater profit — to foreign buyers who approach the co-op to buy tobacco.

The action is viewed by those in the tobacco industry as an effort to make U.S. tobacco more competitive with cheaper foreign leaf that has encroached on the dominance of the U.S. market.

To North Carolina farmers, who grow two-thirds of the nation's flue-cured tobacco, the quota cut means they can sell about \$100 million less tobacco next year.

"This 10 percent reduction means they'll only be able to market 90 percent of the pounds they produced in 1982, and that means their income is probably going to be less next year," Lester said. "The flue-cured crop in North Carolina averaged \$1 billion over the past few years, and that's a \$100 million drop in income."

Lester said one of the big reasons for the cut this year was the 8 cents federal tax increase on cigarettes, scheduled to go into effect next year. Tobacco manufacturers, anticipating a reduction in demand, cut back on tobacco purchases this year, resulting in 25 percent of the flue-cured tobacco crop going into stabilization instead of the 9 percent anticipated.

## Electric Bonds Issued

The North Carolina Local Government Commission sold a \$450 million issue of electric revenue bonds Wednesday on behalf of North Carolina Eastern Municipal Power Agency, the agency announced.

The NCEMPA board of commissioners met in Wilson to confirm the sale and the agency's lead underwriter, Smith Barney, Harris Upham & Co., reported that the tax-exempt issue had been fully subscribed.

According to the agency, the true interest cost of the entire loan was 11.36 percent.

The action marks the third issue for the power agency, which represents 32 municipal electric systems, including Greenville, in eastern North Carolina. Initially, NCEMPA issued \$400 million in bonds on April 1, and \$450 million on

July 16. Proceeds from the current sale will be used to purchase additional ownership interests in seven generating units presently operating or under construction on the Carolina Power & Light Co. system.

To complete acquisition and construction of all units included in the joint project with CP&L, the power agency will issue an estimated total of \$2.85 billion in bonds through 1994.

In addition to Greenville, NCEMPA municipalities in this area include Ayden, Farmville and Hookerton in the CP&L service area, and Hamilton, Robersonville, Tarboro and Washington in the Virginia Electric & Power Co. service area.

## N. C. Backing Away From A General Tax Increase

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Gov. Jim Hunt and other legislative leaders have ruled out a general tax increase to resolve the state's tight budget problems, but

left open a possibility of tax hikes next year for highway construction.

Hunt, Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green, House Speaker Liston B. Ramsey and Rep. J. Allen Adams, co-chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, each outlined the state's budget picture during speeches Tuesday to the North Carolina Citizens for Business and Industry.

While Hunt and Green made no new proposals for highways, Ramsey said he might favor removal of the current \$120 ceiling on the 2 percent sales tax on purchases of new cars, motor vehicles, airplanes, railway equipment and boats, with the money to be used for new highways.

State officials have said a source of revenue that will produce from \$45 to \$60 million must be found by next summer or the state will no longer be able to match federal highway aid for construction.

Ramsey, Green and Adams also addressed the state's major operating budget, the \$3.6 billion-a-year General Fund, which is chiefly fueled by state income and sales taxes. Budget officials have warned that a revenue lag could result in as much as a \$130 million shortfall by the end of the fiscal year, June 30.

"There is no question the biggest single issue facing our General Assembly when it convenes at noon Wednesday, Jan. 12, will be money — the lack of it," Green said.

Hunt said the money situation dictates no major new spending initiatives.

"I have told my Cabinet that the watchword for our last two years will be consolidation," said Hunt, who leaves office in January 1985. "We've had a lot of initiatives and our job now is to make them work."

Green said he does not anticipate any successful move to raise taxes to put more money in the general fund. He said, however, that he is not very optimistic about the chances of an economic recovery early next year.

But Hunt repeated his optimistic forecast that a national economic recovery next year would enable the state to meet its budget obligations.

Ramsey said there was no clear indication of the new Legislature's "tax mood." He said the Legislature would need \$312 million over the 1983-85 budget biennium to restore the merit raise and teacher pay steps program.

"If we do come up with any tax increases, they'll be modest," he said.

## Unemployment Rate Increased

RALEIGH — Unemployment rates during the month of October increased in 84 of North Carolina's 100 counties, decreased in 15 counties and remained unchanged in one county, according to figures released Tuesday by Donald A. Brande, director of the Labor Market Information Division of the N.C. Employment Security Commission.

Unemployment rates by counties ranged from a low of 3.7 to a high of 21.5 percent.

The county rates reflect the increase in statewide total unemployment which rose from 8.7 percent in September to 9.3 percent in October. The national unadjusted rate in October was 9.9 percent.

"The combination of some increases in the number of persons filing claims for unemployment insurance

benefits and the seasonal decline in agricultural jobs primarily produced the rise in October's rate," Brande said.

Forty-eight — nearly half — of North Carolina's counties recorded double-digit (10 percent and higher) unemployment rates.

Counties with the lowest unemployment rates were: Orange, 3.7 percent; Durham, 4.8 percent; Wake, 5.1 percent; Gates, 5.2 percent; Watauga, 5.3 percent; and Alleghany, 5.4 percent.

Unemployment rates for Pitt and counties bordering Pitt County for the month of October were: Pitt, 8.2 percent; Beaufort, 9.4 percent; Craven, 9.0 percent; Edgecombe, 10.0 percent; Greene, 6.5 percent; Lenoir, 8.5 percent; Martin, 11.7 percent; and Wilson, 8.9 percent.

## NATO Urges Soviet To Move For Disarmament

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The Western alliance has urged the Soviet Union to make new disarmament proposals but reaffirmed its plans to deploy new nuclear missiles in Europe next year if no disarmament pact is signed.

In a declaration Tuesday, 14 NATO countries reiterated their strong support for the Reagan administration's "zero option" negotiating position at the year-old arms limitation talks in Geneva, Switzerland.

The U.S. stance calls for the Soviet Union to dismantle its SS-20 intermediate range missiles in return for a NATO decision to forego deployment of 108 Pershing 2 and 464 cruise missiles.

Western defense ministers "stressed the importance of a

successful outcome to the (Geneva) negotiations but noted however that while there had been some progress in them, the Soviets have not yet made any move on the central issue," the declaration said.

The ministers also called for agreement by Moscow and Washington on reduction of long-range weapons.

They sent a plea to new Soviet President Yuri V. Andropov for disarmament and promised in the declaration "to give full consideration to any serious Soviet proposals which would enhance chances for effective and verifiable arms control agreements."

"We want genuine disarmament," said British Defense Secretary John Nott.

## Edw. Kennedy Said Determined Not To Seek 1984 Nomination

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen Edward M. Kennedy, bowing to the wishes of his three children, will not seek the Democratic presidential nomination in 1984, sources said early today.

"The reason is personal," said one aide, who added the Massachusetts Democrat would disclose his decision publicly at a news conference later in the day.

"His kids really feel very strongly that they don't want him to run," added this aide. Kennedy is in the process of arranging a divorce settlement with his wife Joan. Their children are Edward M. Jr., Kara, and Patrick.

Kennedy, 50, has been the early front-runner in public opinion polls for the party's 1984 presidential nomination and this aide said that the senator has private polling data that indicates he would do well if he ran.

But Kennedy, after going over the political information one final time with senior aides on Tuesday, reportedly told them, "I think you guys are right, and I think I can win, but I'm not going to do it."

Kennedy spent Tuesday evening at his home telephoning friends and political adversaries to tell them of his decision. Among those called were House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., a longtime political

ally. Kennedy also called several other Democrats who are exploring the presidential candidacy for themselves, including former Vice President Walter F. Mondale and Sens. Alan Cranston of California and John Glenn of Ohio.

Aides to all three said none of the hopefuls would comment until Kennedy's announcement. President Reagan, asked in Brazil if he was surprised, told a reporter, "Yes, I am."

## Reagan Raises Lebanese Needs During Conferences In Brazil

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — President Reagan, in Brazil for meetings with this nation's military president, said today the United States is talking with its allies about expanding the multinational peacekeeping force in Lebanon using troops from other nations.

While Reagan and President Joao Baptista Figueiredo focused on their nations' economic problems during 90 minutes of talks this morning, Reagan discussed the Lebanese proposal with reporters after the meetings ended.

He said the Beirut gov-

ernment's request for a larger international peacekeeping force "has been talked about for some time. It's not a new idea."

"We will be talking with friends and allies about that," he said, adding: "We want to do whatever we can to help get the foreign forces out of Lebanon." This was a reference to the Syrian, Palestinian and Israeli forces stationed in the tiny, strife-torn Middle Eastern nation.

But he indicated the proposal would not involve sending more U.S. Marines into Beirut to join the American,

French and Italian forces already there.

Reagan said the Lebanese request was intended "to see if there are other nations that would like to join in that force."

Asked if he was likely to follow Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's lead in dropping out of the 1984 presidential race, Reagan said, "You know, I don't think there's much of a record of me imitating Teddy Kennedy."

The Massachusetts Democrat's decision was "a problem of the Democratic Party, and they're welcome

to it," the president added. Earlier, he had told reporters he was surprised by the withdrawal of Kennedy, a leading contender to oppose Reagan should the president seek re-election.

Reagan described his session with Figueiredo as "as very fine meeting" in which the two men discussed future cooperation and "their economic problems as well as our own."

After a one-hour tete-a-tete, Reagan and Figueiredo were joined by more than a dozen aides for an expanded meeting.

# Course To Stress Renal Problems

Newer discoveries in the treatment of pregnancy-associated kidney diseases will be discussed Friday and Saturday during seminars in Brody Medical Sciences Building at East Carolina University School of Medicine.

Authorities in the field of renal complications will conduct sessions planned especially for practitioners in family practice, internal medicine and obstetrics with the aim of exploring the relationship between the kidney and gestation in many underlying renal diseases.

This emphasis is in line with a continuing program of preventive medicine and good health care for the pregnant woman, says Dr. Robert G. Brame, professor and chairman of the department of obstetrics and gynecology.

The course will be divided into three general topics: "Renal Function and Dysfunction;" "Underlying Renal Diseases in Pregnancy;" and "Pregnancy-induced Hypertension."

Course directors from the ECU School of Medicine are Lynn G. Borchert, M.D., assistant professor, department of obstetrics and gynecology, and Richard H. Merrill, M.D., associate professor and chief, renal section, department of medicine.

The faculty includes Brame, Raymond A. Dombroski, M.D. and Samuel S. Lentz, M.D., clinical assistant professors of the department of obstetrics and gynecology and Steven H. Grossman, M.D., assistant, department of medicine, Merrill and Borchert.

Wives and family members accompanying the participants will be entertained at a luncheon and fashion show Friday. They will also tour the new Brody Medical Sciences Building. A social hour and dinner will be held during the evening. Entertainment will be provided by the East Carolina University choir.

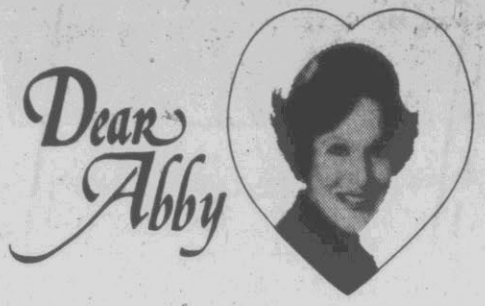

## Job Status Is Changing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The proportion of women working at non-office jobs — as police officers, construction workers, truck drivers, even firefighters — has risen to about two in five.

The American Council of Life Insurance, which provides those figures, says 35 percent of the 43 million working women in the United States at the start of this year held clerical jobs. Another 24 percent had professional, technical, administrative or managerial (except farm) positions.

Nineteen percent were in service jobs, including household work, 10 percent, in operative jobs, including transport, and 7 percent were saleswomen. The remainder were crafts workers or non-farm laborers.

# Popularity Of Early Teddy Bears Growing

GRAND RAPIDS, Ohio (AP) — The teddy bear is coming out of the closet.

Sales of the childhood chum are soaring, prices for antique bears have topped \$1,000, and a psychiatrist says it's not surprising that adults buy the bears for themselves.

So when Sherry Huffman of Grand Rapids wanted to open a mail-order business, she turned to her childhood friend, the teddy bear.

"I've always loved them, and I've always wanted to go into business for myself. So I picked teddy bears for the mail-order business," said Mrs. Huffman, surrounded by bears ranging in size from one inch to several feet tall.

"They've been so popular that I don't even have my catalog out yet and I'm getting calls for them."

The origin of the teddy bear is lost in antiquity, but experts agree that modern-day interest traces to President Theodore Roosevelt.

Roosevelt was on a hunting expedition in 1902, when he refused to shoot a bear that was tied to a tree. Some accounts say the bear was but a cub. The gesture was considered noble, and newspaper stories paid a lot of attention to Roosevelt's hunting ethics.

A newspaper artist used the bear in a cartoon depicting Roosevelt's position on a political issue of the day. The bear figure became identified with the president, and the name teddy bear evolved.

Toy companies picked up on the idea and the stuffed toy became a popular gift for children in the early 1900s.

Bears produced in that era now command prices ranging from \$100 to \$1,000, antique dealers say.

In Medina, antique buyer Bonnie Rowlands says she's not sure why teddy bears are making a comeback, but sales and prices are going up.

"I've been collecting them for the past seven or eight years, and I've seen the prices go up and up and up," Mrs. Rowlands said. "Maybe they're becoming more popular because they're so appealing. The prices just keep going up."

Bears produced by a German company called Steiff are generally the most valuable, Mrs. Rowlands said, and it's not unusual for older ones to sell for \$500 to \$1,000.

Psychiatrist Paul C. Horton, author of the book, "Solace: The Missing Dimension of Psychiatry," says it is common for adults to have teddy bears or other stuffed animals as psychological comforts.

"A teddy bear functions as a solacing object, and that sort of reassurance during periods of stress, confusion or disorder is a lifelong need," Horton said in a telephone interview from Meriden, Conn.

In a heavy saucepan stir together brown sugar, granulated sugar, half-and-half and corn syrup. Over medium heat, stirring constantly, bring to a boil. Without stirring, continue boiling until temperature on candy thermometer reaches 238 degrees or until a teaspoonful of the mixture dropped into a bowl of very cold water forms a soft ball that flattens upon removal from the water. Let stand off heat until lukewarm (110 degrees). Add nuts and vanilla. With a wooden spoon beat until mixture begins to thicken and loses its gloss — about 5 minutes. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto wax paper-lined cookie sheets. Let stand until firm. Wrap individually in wax paper and store in a tightly covered container in the refrigerator. Makes about 2 dozen.

# Argentina Is Rearming

Maybe the world hasn't heard the last of the Falkland Island War. No formal peace agreement resulted from last summer's violent clash, only a declaration by Great Britain that hostilities had ceased. The other side counted its dead and installed a new government; but the world must be aware the frustrations, humiliation and flames of pride and patriotism linger. The report of French port officials that a cargo of Exocet air-sea missiles, and five Super Entendard fighter-bombers — the same jets used to sink the British destroyer Sheffield and freighter

Atlantic Conveyor — are en route to Argentina, poses unpleasant speculation. The Argentine economy was in a state of collapse before the war; fell still further apart immediately thereafter; and there is no way it could have recouped lost ground in so short a time since the disastrous defeat. No government whose attention was focused on internal affairs would consider such costly re-arming measures (with weaponry that proved to be the most effective) unless ulterior motives were in the background.

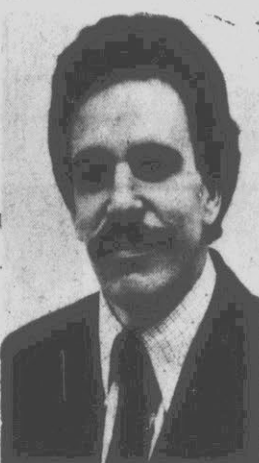

full capacity,' says George Masologites of Tryon, a retired director of research and development for ARCO. "We have made some recommendations and there are some improvements being made; once that's done, it will work just fine." Masologites, who contributed his time to the state for free, didn't mince his criticism of the plant, however. In making his rosy forecast, he also said Phillips could have designed a better plant, the state could have used more caution in negotiating the plant's purchase and the plant can be run more efficiently.

His criticism of the plant design gets very technical. Basically, he says that the current system for feeding catalysts — the substance which start a chemical process — into the refining process is inadequate. He recommends a system ARCO developed. Also, the plant design suffers from the requirement that it be mobile. And the state is wasting time trying to suppress a skunk-like smell that a new catalytic system would eliminate.

The state is operating the plant most inefficiently now, he says. The plant runs 24

hours a day, five days a week. It ought to run 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It should not shut down more than once every six months and it can go as long as three years. A lot of work goes into starting up the plant and into shutting it down. Also, it is during these start-up and shut-down periods that problems are most likely to occur. (Please Turn To Page 5)

To the editor:  
You printed a letter from Carl Adler in Sunday's Reflector. In it, Professor Adler cited an authoritative study which found that 89 percent of leading (physical?) scientists, 95 percent of energy experts, and all nuclear experts support nuclear energy development. He agrees. Those professionals have reached a conclusion which Adler himself supported with telling arguments in a public debate six years ago. Those arguments depend on several assumptions, probable in 1976 and today. Stated roughly, the assumptions include:  
1. U.S. lifestyles won't radically change; Third World lifestyles will require much more energy.  
2. Fusion power may not be economical within a hundred years.  
3. Geothermal power won't be economically available in vast quantity by 2000.  
4. The per-watt cost of solar cells may not be cut more than one more order of magnitude.  
5. Ocean thermal, windpower, small and large tidal and hydropower, ocean wavepower, human and animal musclepower, and focussed or diffused sunpower may contribute but will not in aggregate fill the gap when oil and then gas run out as substantial energy sources in 100 years.  
6. Serious hazards of massive burning of coal cannot be contained; satellite microwave power is uneconomical and/or undesirable.  
7. The breeder reactor will fulfill its promise when uranium and thorium ores run out.  
Many scientists believe all these assumptions today. Barring some unforeseen scientific/technological breakthrough, they point to the necessity of nuclear power in breeder reactors. This in turn points, with the help of assumptions equally accepted, to bomb proliferation and then to substantial or even drastic loss of individual freedom. Therefore, although Adler showed we may well fail, we ought to try hard to falsify one of the first six assumptions. Furthermore, we should notice that the assumptions do not justify the Price-Anderson Act, nor continuing subsidy of nuclear development, nor slashing the conservation and solar alternative budgets. # Merchants Rely On December

NEW YORK (AP) — As the merchant sees it, the autumn mood, having begun with back-to-school sales and then faded like nature's colors, is finally gone. The mood is changed. It's the holiday season now, a time when spiritual reflection and frenzied shopping seek to coexist, and somehow, it is claimed and then countered by critics, maybe even support each other. Thanksgiving Day parades, Christmas trees, holly wreaths, red ribbons, lighted streets, slate skies and maybe the first frost or flutter of snowflakes helped sweep in the new mood or, at least, Main Street's merchants' hope so. But their bright storefronts convey a cheer that isn't there, and hide the harried visage of proprietors praying to Santa Claus, praying for a burst of shopping that ends a financial drought that forced many into bankruptcy. Whatever else is proved by the selling season, none may be more important than what it says about the immediate future of the economy, which everyone from the U.S. president on down says must be lead by the consumer.

That being so, there is no better indicator than the next month when, by tradition, the consumer exerts more buying power than at any other time of the year. This year that buying power will be encouraged by a great seller effort. Many stores once reluctant to open on Sunday have succumbed. Some jumped the gun with promotions that preceded the traditional Thanksgiving pushoff. Discounts seem more common, and retailers seem willing to cut profit margins. In fact, indications exist that some merchants may seek almost no markup in order to move merchandise. Many of them rebuilt inventories on the assumption that economic activity would have picked up by now. So far, it hasn't. Here are some of the possibilities that could enhance sales: —The consumer has been holding back, and therefore is in a better position to buy than earlier this year and last. Many people have reduced credit outstanding as a percentage of income. Many have added to savings, as indicated by a savings rate of 6.7 percent in the second quarter and 6.9 percent in the

third, both above the long-time average. —There have been additions to household assets. The improvement in stock prices has added billions of dollars to the net worth of households. While equity in existing homes has barely risen over the past year, and by some measures has fallen, it seems ready to rise again. While households might not be inclined to withdraw such funds for immediate use, measurements of buyer attitudes show that they provide the confidence necessary for spending. —Interest rates, at least on some big-ticket items, are lower than a year ago. While the impact hasn't yet spread to credit cards, it eventually may do so, assuming a continuation of present trends. That could encourage buyers. Some other factors work against higher sales. —Unemployment is extremely high — more than 15 percent — in many areas of the so-called rust belt, the heavy industry areas of the Midwest and parts of the Northeast. Merchants in those areas don't expect great activity. However, the impact of unemployment is pervasive.

Even in economically healthy areas it is understood that weakness elsewhere can spread and endanger jobs. Statistics indicate that such fears lead to more saving, less spending. —Farm belt conditions, which urban dwellers tend to overlook, are quite poor. Farm income may total only \$18 billion this year, down from about \$24 billion in 1981 and \$26 billion in 1978. The conclusion is obvious: Holly wreaths and Christmas promotions cannot squeeze out money that isn't there. —Christmas gift-giving, even when affordable, may be far down the list of priorities. Many families have postponed buying a car, for example, and may want one now that interest rates are down. Some have been forced to send youngsters to less desired but more affordable schools. Gift-giving tends to pale in significance beside such decisions. Evidence of this phenomenon was shown last year, when many shoppers waited until the last couple of days — when some frightened merchants were forced to discount. Many, in fact, waited for the post-Christmas sales before buying.

SHOULD WE EXPORT RELIGION? More than 150 years ago on the floor of the Senate of Massachusetts, some one objected to the incorporation of a certain missionary society which planned to spread the gospel to foreign lands. The objecting senator argued that this constituted an export and since we had no religion to spare in this country, we should keep what we had for ourselves. But another senator sprang to his feet and said: "Sir, religion is a commodity of which the more we export, the more we have remaining." In reading the Bible we need always to keep in mind that in the spiritual world, the more we give away, the more we retain.  Fritz's Governors  
 Former vice president Walter F. Mondale is out to recruit newly-elected Democratic governors of key industrial states in his early bid for the 1984 presidential nomination, but his handlers are a little worried about the biggest such catch: Gov.-elect Mario Cuomo of New York.  
 When Mondale got the impression from a newspaper column in September that Cuomo thought Mayor Ed Koch had been supported by

Gov.-elect Richard Celeste of Ohio is personally close to Mondale but must stick with his state's favorite son, Sen. John Glenn. Gov.-elect Rudy Perpich of Minnesota is with Minnesotan Mondale.  
 Gagging The Economist  
 The gap imposed during the recent mid-term election campaign on Dr. Martin Feldstein, the new chairman of the president's Council of

Economic Advisers, may be put on him again if he does not quickly heed the advice of senior White House aides.  
 The president's men were outraged when Feldstein, appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press" Nov. 21, painted a picture of low economic growth and high unemployment over the next two years that would spell Republican doom in the 1984 election. But Feldstein entered the White House for work the morning after the program expressing satisfaction over his performance. "He still must think he's at Harvard," a Reagan aide snapped.  
 A footnote: One day later, Feldstein and budget director David Stockman were the only dissenters when the powerful Legislative Strategy Group, headed by chief of staff James Baker, backed a six-month acceleration of the

tax cut. The other seven senior officials present all backed it.  
 Kemp's Switch  
 Because of his belief in monetary policy's supreme importance, Rep. Jack Kemp is surrendering a coveted seat on the powerful House Budget Committee in order to join the Joint Economic Committee, which has little power and lots of vacancies.  
 That move has other Republican congressmen shaking their heads. But

Kemp has had enough of endless Budget Committee maneuvering over fiscal policy — spending and revenue — that he finds less relevant to the economy than the Fed's tinkering with the money supply in the execution of monetary policy. With three of the Joint Committee's four House Republican members defeated in the election, there is plenty of room there for Kemp to discuss monetary policy to his heart's content.

Even before Kemp could officially join the Joint Committee, he sat in last week as a guest for questioning of Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker in a hearing on monetary policy. But questioning of Volcker drifted to his views on tax cuts and budget deficits — that is, fiscal policy. When it came guest member Kemp's turn to question Volcker, he respectfully declined the opportunity to rehash fiscal policy and returned the discussion back to the Fed's money supply policy.

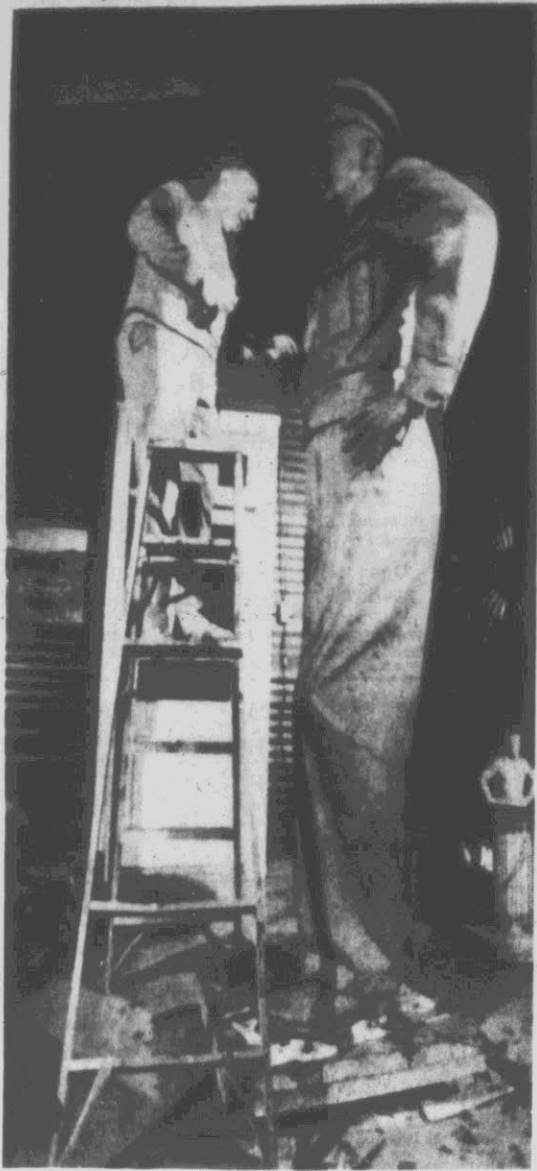

South, declarer at four spades, seemed to have an impregnable holding in the trump suit. But accurate defense proved that appearances can be deceiving.

North-South's bidding was impeccable. However, had they been using some sort of transfer bid to allow North to become declarer, four spades would have been an unbeatable contract.

West led the queen of hearts, which was ducked all round the table. Even if the defenders could take two heart tricks, defensive chances appeared grim unless East held the king of clubs as well. However, since there was no point in not leading another heart, West decided that he might as well see what his prospects were right away. His low heart continuation was won by the ace as declarer followed suit.

East read his partner's low heart as being a suit preference signal for clubs. He duly shifted to the nine of clubs. West won the ace, and paused to take stock. The fate of the contract hinged on his next play.

From his partner's return of the nine of clubs, West

deduced that East could not hold the king. With that card, he would either have first cashed the king before continuing with a low club, or else he would have shifted to a low club rather than the nine. Now, the trump suit was the only place to develop the setting trick. So, West reverted to hearts, again leading low. East used his jack of spades to telling effect when he ruffed. Declarer was forced to overruff with the ace, and now West had a sure trump trick provided he carefully covered the ten if South elected to lead that card.

All it took to sink the contract was some thoughtful defense combined with an up-percut.

# Massacre Is Defended By A Lebanese Rightist

JERUSALEM (AP) — A right-wing Lebanese leader today defended the massacre of Palestinian refugees as a reaction to eight years of civil war.

"We have the full right to deal with our enemies in Lebanon in a manner we find suitable. This is our internal problem. Don't interfere in this," said Etienne Saqa, head of the Guardians of the Cedars, an offshoot of the dominant Phalange Party.

Saqa, also known as Abu Arz, was in Israel to meet Prime Minister Menachem Begin. Begin's government is under investigation by a judicial commission of inquiry for possible negligence in allowing Lebanese Christian militias into the Beirut refugee camps where they murdered hundreds of Palestinians in September.

Speaking at a news conference sponsored by the Israeli Foreign Ministry, Saqa called for the expulsion of the 500,000 Palestinians in Lebanon, and for a full peace treaty and defense pact with Israel.

He denounced Lebanese

Prime Minister Shafik Wazzan as a "Syrian puppet and a PLO puppet" and insisted that the Syrian army and Palestine Liberation Organization evacuate Lebanon before Israel pulls out its invasion forces.

The Guardians of the Cedars is the most outspoken supporter of Israel in the Phalange Party led by President Amin Gemayel, but is thought to have little influence on the president or his government.

Saqa showed impatience here as reporters repeatedly asked about the massacres in the Sabra and Chatilla camps.

"Why is the whole world upset about Sabra and

Chatilla, while we have been killed and persecuted for eight years by the PLO and the Syrians?" he asked.

"It was a Lebanese reaction from the parents and relatives of our martyrs, of the 100,000 Lebanese killed," and to the assassination of President-elect Bashir Gemayel.

"Don't think we are killers. We are civilized people," Saqa said.

But he charged that the Palestinians tried to take over Lebanon and "kill us from the back."

"Don't you have the right to defend your home, your country?" he asked.

# Growers Hope Continue Price Supports Freeze

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina tobacco leaders say the 10 percent cut in the 1983 flue-cured tobacco quota probably won't cause growers to reverse their previously stated position in support of a price support freeze.

Many farmers had hoped to use a price support freeze in the hopes of striking a bargain with U.S. Agriculture Secretary John R. Block in exchange for no cut in the quota, but Block announced Tuesday that next year's marketing quota would be reduced by 10 percent.

But tobacco industry spokesmen say Block's action doesn't mean the tobacco growers will change their minds about the freeze. "We're just getting to the point where (just) cutting quota is not going to solve the problems we have with Stabilization receipts and losing our share of the world market," says John R. Cyrus, tobacco affairs chief with the state Department of Agriculture.

"I've never seen as much support among farmers for anything (as I've seen) for freezing supports," he said, adding that he thought the support would hold steady.

With 26 percent of this year's tobacco crop, the largest amount ever, going under the government loan program, and with tobacco companies beginning to turn away from the highly priced domestic leaf, farmers are ready to try just about anything to keep prices down.

"In talking with growers, their first response is, 'We've got to do something about the continuing escalation of price,'" said T.C. Blalock, executive vice president of the Tobacco Growers Association.

Blalock said he believes a majority of the association's growers will support the price freeze in 1983. The Tobacco Growers Association adopted a resolution supporting the price freeze after a survey of 3,000 farmers who supported the "bargain," Blalock said.

About 91 percent indicated support, which Blalock said was probably enough farmers to sustain backing for the freeze alone, with the hoped-for maintenance of the quota at this year's level.

The Flue-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corp. and the N.C. Grange also have gone on record for the freeze, leaving only the influential N.C. Farm

Bureau Federation to vote on the issue at its annual convention next week.

William E. Little, commodities director for the fed-

eration, said the organization's surveys have indicated that a majority oppose a freeze. But, he said, he doubted the quota cut would sway them.

## CP & L Plans Try Peat Fuel

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Carolina Power & Light Co. will begin testing peat as a possible commercial fuel substitute for coal — a move that could give a substantial boost to the state's fledgling peat-mining industry.

CP&L plans to burn peat, a high-energy material formed by the decay of plants, for a week this month in an unused boiler at its Cape Fear coal-fired plant near Moncure in Chatham County.

A second test has been scheduled tentatively for 1983 at coal-fired plants in Wilmington and Goldsboro.

The company will be watching to see whether the material can compete economically with coal and whether it can be burned efficiently in boilers designed

for coal. "If both of these (tests) turn out well, I'm sure management would be looking at it as a viable option," said Thomas L. Davis of the company's research department said.

The first test will cost about \$50,000 and the second about \$80,000, Davis said. The peat for the first trial is being donated by First Colony Farms in Tyrrell County, Farm Development and Consultive Services Inc. in Creswell and Peat Fuels Inc. in Williamston.

Davis said that if the state's entire reserve of peat could be mined, it would supply the equivalent of CP&L's 1981 coal use for the more than 100 years.

## Braswell Left Hospital's Care

Pitt County Sheriff's Deputy Billy Braswell, who is charged with the first degree murder of his wife, has been discharged from Pitt County Memorial Hospital, a PCMH spokesman confirmed today.

Braswell left the hospital at 11 a.m. Tuesday, according to the spokesman, after undergoing treatment for over two months for gunshot wounds to his chest.

Earlier Tuesday morning, a \$100,000 bond for Braswell was made by several area citizens who put up amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$11,700 to secure his release from custody.

Braswell, charged with the Sept. 27 shooting death of Lillie Braswell, had been held without privilege of bond until mid-November and was under guard at Pitt Memorial during his convalescence. He was admitted on Sept. 27 after officers

discovered him at his Farmville home, suffering from gunshot wounds, following his wife's death.

District Court Judge Horton Rountree set Braswell's bond at \$100,000 on Nov. 12. In his bond order, Rountree said that, based upon reports filed by psychiatrists, the court found that Braswell "is not

severely depressed or suicidal." The judge also directed that Braswell's release on bond was subject to a psychiatric re-evaluation

prior to his discharge from the hospital.

A probable cause hearing for Braswell is scheduled for Friday.

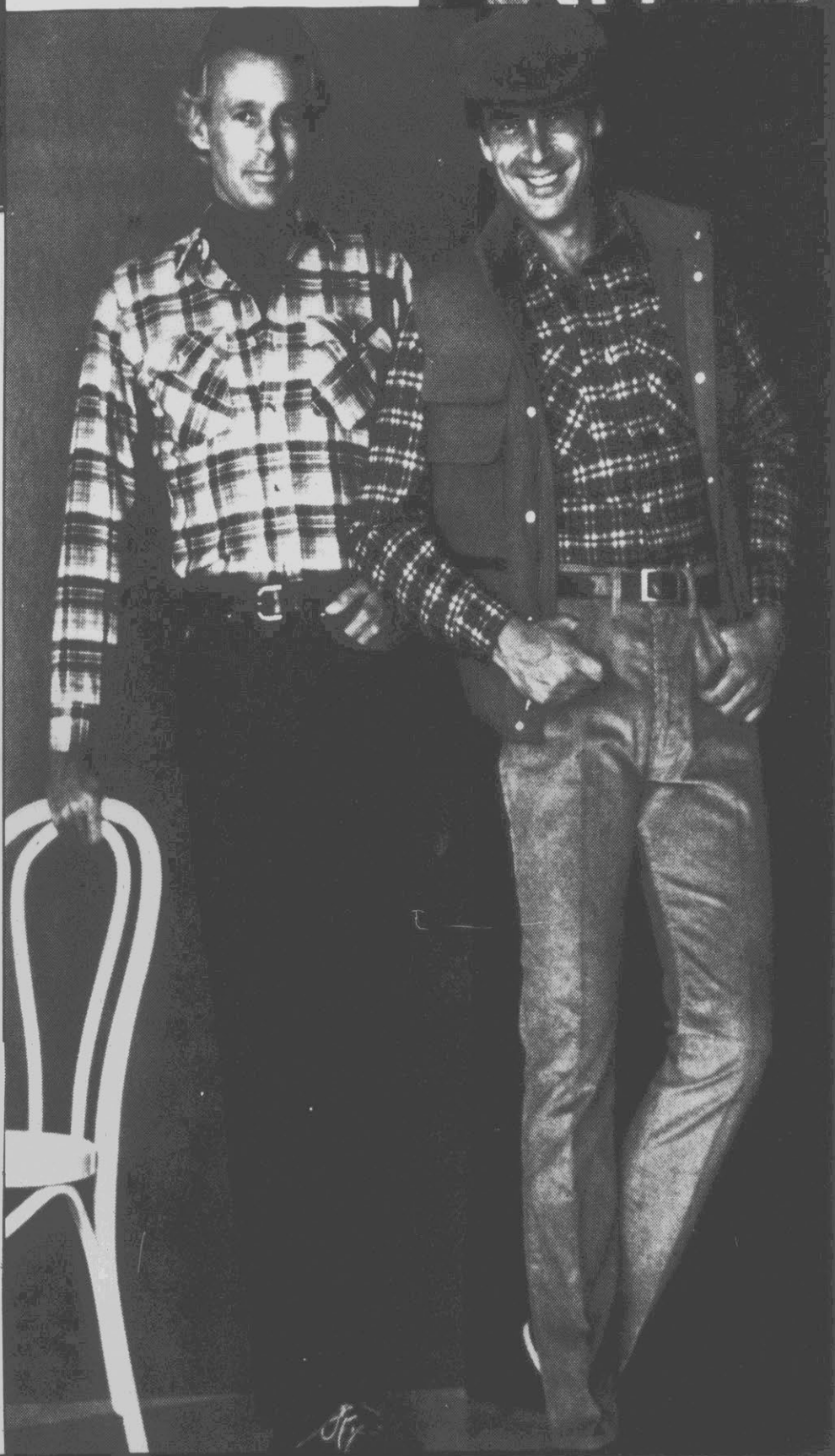
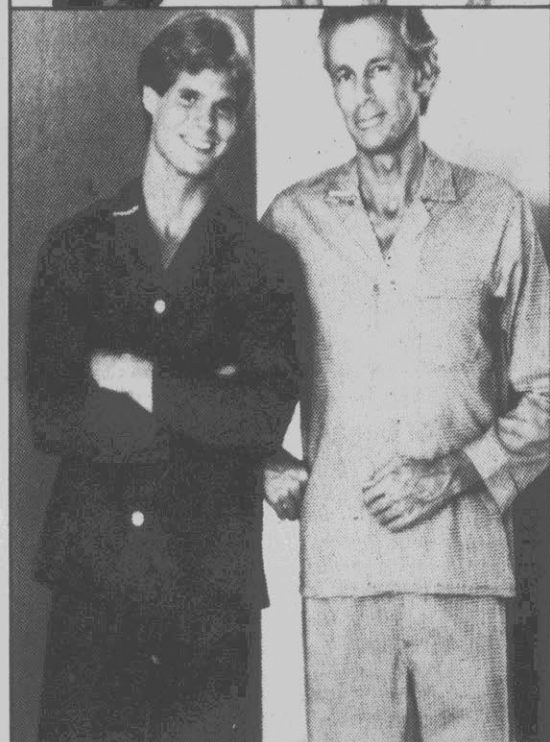

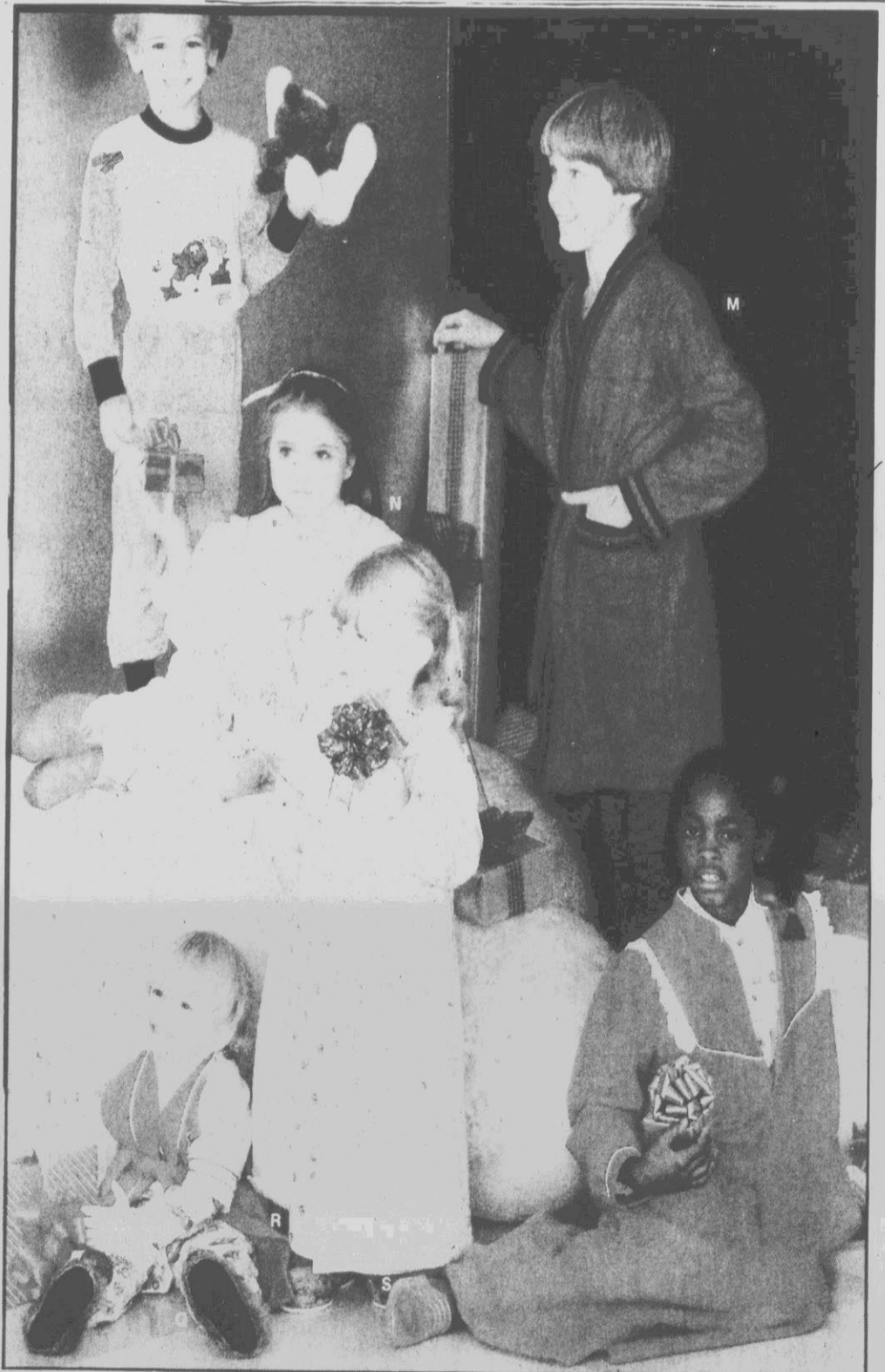

# Statistical Error Issued By Govm't

WASHINGTON (AP) — It might not mean much to most Americans: a gain of 0.2 percent rather than 0.6 percent in the government's Index of Leading Economic Indicators. But to business officials and analysts who care deeply about such figures, it added up to an amazing statistical goof.

The government, sole tabulator of most national economic figures, just isn't supposed to get the numbers wrong.

Abashed Commerce Department economists sent out the word shortly after 4 p.m. Tuesday that the leading indicators had risen just 0.2 percent in October, only

one-third of the 0.6 percent gain officials had announced at 10 a.m.

The index, designed to forecast future trends of the entire national economy, is always news in economic circles. And the economy — mired in a 16-month recession — is big news in even wider circles these days.

So, in the minutes and hours after the first announcement, reporters had reported the news, newspapers had printed it, analysts had analyzed it, perhaps a few business decisions had been made because of it.

On Wall Street, the Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 36.43 points, the fourth-biggest one-day increase in history — though analysts didn't credit that gain to the news on the indicators.

While all this was happening, according to Commerce officials, a few economists in that federal building were wondering why the increase had been higher than they had expected. On Monday, The Associated Press had run a few officials' guesses that the gain would be only 0.2 percent or 0.3 percent.

Chief Commerce economist Robert Ortner explained that Ted Torda, another department economist who specializes in

the leading indicators, pored over the figures, and he finally found one component that didn't look right: October's orders to factories for consumer goods.

They were down but not nearly as much as expected.

After several phone calls back and forth between Torda and the Bureau of Economic Analysis, the Commerce agency that actually puts the figures together, the mystery was solved.

Yes, factory orders should have been down sharply in October. And that change meant the overall index rose only 0.2 percent.

It was already close to 4 p.m., Ortner said, denying that news of the correction was held back until after the

4 p.m. stock market closing. "We let the secretary (Malcolm Baldrige) know; he said get the correction out instantly," Ortner said.

No one at Commerce was saying who made the original mistake or what might happen to him or her. Apparently the employee was not added to the nation's already long unemployment rolls — at least not yet.

One official, asking not to be named, said the mistake was this simple: Someone used a September figure for orders rather than a worse October one.

The government routinely revises its statistics when later and better information becomes available. For example, Tuesday's report said the September in-

dicators gain was 1.1 percent, more than twice the 0.5 percent reported one month ago. And Ortner was asked if it occurred to anybody to try to cover up the October mistake that way.

"Someone did raise that possibility, but it was squelched instantly," he said. "I think that's to our credit."

And how much difference did the change really make? Probably not much since the direction of the index — up or down — is considered much more important than the amount it moves.

John Albertine, president of the American Business Conference, said, "It's incredible they would make that kind of a mistake." And no one else could remember

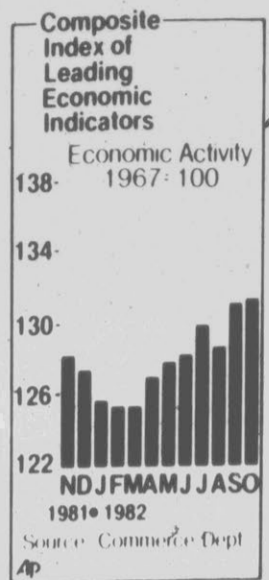
a similar situation in recent years.

But Albertine didn't want to change the analysis he'd sent to reporters earlier based on the higher number. Nor did other economists and officials. Not even — or maybe especially not — Baldrige.

But there was one last change.

Reporters were given a one-sentence Baldrige statement about the situation: "We pride ourselves on our reputation for accuracy, and when an error is made we want to rectify it as quickly as possible."

A spokesman called back a minute later, revising the beginning of the statement to "We have a reputation for accuracy...."

# Fast, Mean Storm Zaps California, Heads East

A fast, ruthless storm bulldozed across California and careened into the Rockies today, with driving rain and heavy snow that left six people dead and four people missing. The storm cut power to hundreds of thousands of homes and flooded rich farmlands.

It stomped into Arizona and Nevada, blasting more rain and snow, and kept going. Winter storm warnings were issued today for Utah and the Colorado Rockies, with a storm watch in Montana, according to the National Weather Service.

The storm, the worst of the season, battered California on Tuesday from San Francisco to San Diego, dumping snow as fast as 3 inches an hour in the Sierra Nevada; ripping up power poles, trees and roofs with winds up to 78 mph; triggering mudslides and sinking boats.

The assault came just one day after the National Weather Service forecast a cold, wet winter for the West.

"It was a complete mess," said California Highway Patrol Officer Jerry Skelton in Los Angeles. "Trees down everywhere, lines down everywhere, cars and traffic accidents everywhere."

As the storm moved east, it blanketed northern and central Nevada with a foot or more of snow and flooded Las Vegas streets with rain. Two avalanches closed roads in the mountains.

In Arizona, 10 inches of snow fell in Flagstaff by Tuesday night and school buses had to be towed. In Kingman, wind gusts were clocked at 84 mph, and in

Phoenix, a building roof collapsed from the weight of rain.

High winds kicked up dust storms from Yuma, near the California border, to Gila Bend, south of Phoenix.

The storm struck California with little warning as winds shifted from light to 50 mph "within a matter of minutes," said Keith Ewing, the state's chief National Weather Service forecaster.

As the storm plowed inland into Northern California, rain combined with record high tides to rip a 50-foot hole in a levee, flooding Venice Tract, a 3,000-acre island on the Sacramento-San Joaquin River delta.

Floodwaters were expected to reach 15 feet over the rich farmland.

Winds gusted to 82 mph on the Santa Cruz coast and turned a parked Boeing 707 jet in a half-circle at San Francisco International Airport.

Falling trees knocked down wires and cut power to up to 400,000 Northern California electric customers. But workers restored power to all but about 22,500 customers by late Tuesday.

By mid-afternoon, 73 inches of snow had accumulated in Norden, Calif., and avalanche warnings were issued for the eastern Sierra.

Four people were missing in the storm and at least six people died, including a 4-year-old boy who was swept into the De Luze River when his family's Jeep overturned. Two men died in San Diego County traffic accidents, a 66-year-old Los Angeles man died in a car accident on a rain-slick street, and a Camarillo woman was missing after her car hit a bridge abutment and she was flipped into a creek.

Heavy winds toppled a 110-foot crane in Long Beach, killing the operator. In Humboldt Bay, a man's body washed ashore after his crab boat broke up in rough waters and two other men were missing. A Napa man was missing after being swept into stormy Bodega Bay.

In Southern California, the storm dumped 2.33 inches of rain in less than 12 hours and washed a \$500,000 home into

the sea at Malibu. In Long Beach and San Diego Bay, dozens of pleasure boats were ripped from their moorings. In Marina del Rey, wind gusts of up to 70 mph blasted panes of glass out of high-rise office

buildings, but no one was injured, authorities said. Rocks and mudslides closed parts of the Pacific Coast Highway, and Southern California Edison Co. reported 877,000 customers blacked out.

"The power was out for anywhere from a few seconds to eight to 12 hours," said spokesman Bob Hull. In Escondido, 8,000 chickens were trapped under a tin roof after gusting winds collapsed it. The birds were

evacuated in driving rain. The San Diego Zoo was closed Tuesday for the fifth time in its 66-year history after wind blew down eucalyptus trees. In Orange, Calif., thousands of people were

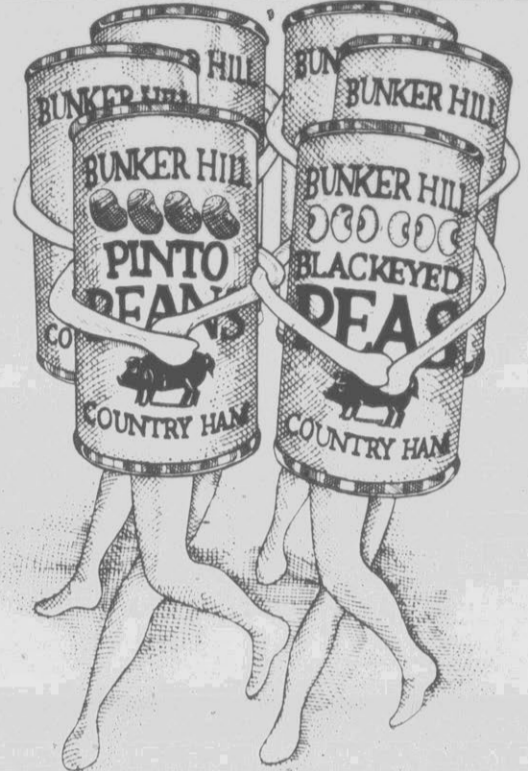
allowed to return home after being evacuated when a toxic cloud escaped into the air when a storage tank exploded. The tank overheated when its refrigeration system died because the power was cut

off in the storm. In Hawaii, meanwhile, the damage from Hurricane Iwa last week was estimated at \$181.5 million. Forecasters had feared a new storm was brewing, but said Tuesday the threat had diminished.

## Small Cars' Safety Is Questioned In Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drivers and passengers involved in accidents in subcompact cars are twice as likely to die or be injured as occupants of large cars, an insurance industry spokesman says.

Domestically-produced small cars, on the average, have a lower death and injury rate than similar cars manufactured in Japan, he said.

Dr. William Haddon Jr., president of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, told two House subcommittees Tuesday that the Transportation Department has predicted that the annual number of motor vehicle deaths could increase from the current 50,000 to 70,000 in the 1990's, "and the big part of this increase would result from the increasing number of small cars."

The House subcommittees on transportation, aviation and materials and investigations and oversight of the Science and Technology Committee conducted the hearing on small car safety with emphasis on the crashworthiness of subcompact automobiles.

The General Accounting Office — the congressional auditors — testified that in

1979 cars weighing less than 3,500 pounds represented only 37 percent of the passenger cars in operation, but by 1990 they are estimated to represent 64 percent of the passenger car fleet.

"This means that more attention must be paid to designing cars so that they do a much better job of protecting their occupants in crashes," Haddon said.

Haddon showed the subcommittee films of the government's crash tests of two Japanese-made small cars and a popular domestic small car. The steering columns in the 1980 Honda Civic and the 1980 Toyota Corolla Tercel smashed

upward with great force into the dummies' faces, while in the 1980 Chevrolet Chevette less violent movement occurred.

Reps. Dan Glickman, D-Kan., and Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., chairmen of the committees, respectively, wanted Raymond Peck Jr., administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, at the hearing, but he said could not appear because he was busy with the President's Commission on Drunk Driving.

# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market opened higher today, extending Tuesday's powerful advance.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 1.28 points to 1,040.56 in the first half hour, while three stocks rose in price for every one that fell in the early going on the New York Stock Exchange.

On Tuesday, the Dow Jones industrials surged 36.43 points in its fourth largest daily gain ever, propelled by a late buying spree by institutional investors, such as managers of pension funds.

Activity today included the offering of up to 18.15 million new shares of common stock in American Telephone & Telegraph, priced at \$60 a share, which would produce \$1.09 billion. That would exceed the record \$1.03 billion raised by AT&T in a June 1981 stock sale.

In economic news, Martin Feldstein, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, said the federal deficit could reach \$200 billion in the current fiscal year. Feldstein also said the unemployment rate for November, to be reported Friday, probably would rise from October's 10.4 percent level.

After the loss of trading Tuesday, the Commerce Department said it made a mistake in calculating its Index of Leading Indicators, the government's main economic forecasting gauge. The index rose 0.2 percent in October, not the 0.6 percent gain reported earlier Tuesday.

Today's early prices included Sony, unchanged at 16 1/2; Western Airlines, up 1/4 at 4 3/4; Genuine Parts, down 1/2 at 43 1/2; Enserch, down 1/4 at 18 3/4; Boeing, up 1/4 at 32 3/4; Chrysler, up 1/4 at 11 1/2; and LTV, up 1/4 at 11 1/2.

On Tuesday, three stocks rose in price for every one that fell on the NYSE.

Big Board volume totaled 93.47 million shares, up from

Monday's 61.08 million and the highest since the 102.91 million of Nov. 16.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks rose 2.22 to 79.95. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 7.36 at 336.17.

The Wynnes told officers that one of the robbers held a rifle on Timmy Wynne and threw a blanket over his uncle before putting the elderly man on a couch in the living room, Tyson said.

After taking a wallet containing \$76 from the elder Wynne, the three intruders began removing items from the house, the Wynnes said. Tyson said that Timmy Wynne told deputies that, while the men were out of the house, he went to another room and got a shotgun. The

younger Wynne said he shot the man armed with a rifle when the robber returned to the front door.

Tyson said that all three men fled from Wynne house, which is on a long path leading off the highway, and apparently left in a car they had parked out on the road.

A chain saw, citizens band radio and stereo and speakers, valued collectively at \$575, also were reported taken from the Wynne home.

Tyson said that neither Wynne or his nephew were injured in the incident.

## Jordan Jumper Helps UNC Beat Tulane In 3 OTs

Michael Jordan has developed a flair for the dramatic, and his most recent effort brought 16th-ranked and defending national champion North Carolina out of a two-game losing streak against Tulane.

The sophomore guard, who hit the basket that gave UNC the national title over Georgetown last year, saved the Tar Heels Tuesday night by hitting a 20-foot jumper at the end of regulation. He then contributed a key three-point play in the third overtime as North Carolina took a 70-68 victory over the Green Wave.

North Carolina lost a six-point edge late in the second half and appeared headed for an unprecedented third straight loss when Tulane's John Williams canned a pair of free throws with eight seconds left. Things really looked gloomy for the Tar Heels when Jordan was called for charging with four seconds left.

"One second, I was thinking about the last two games," said junior Matt Doherty in reference to North Carolina's two opening losses. "Then I said, 'Nah, let's win it.'"

Following a North Carolina time out, two Green Wave

players fought for the in-bounds pass, then lost it to Jordan, who immediately turned and fired.

"Coach (Dean Smith) wanted us to deny (them) the ball," said Jordan. "I just saw the ball fall into my hands and fired away. It just happened to go in."

The teams traded three baskets in the first extra period, but the Tar Heels seemed to be in command when Tulane again committed a turnover. Jordan missed a jumper, however, and Doherty was short on his follow shot. That forced one more period.

North Carolina gained the early edge on Brad Daugherty's follow shot, but Elton Webster countered for the Green Wave and tied the score at 61 with 1:59 left. Smith then ordered the Tar Heels into the four corners and got two Doherty free throws with 38 seconds left.

With one second left, Howard Jenkins grabbed the rebound from a Williams miss and his follow shot forced the third extra period with the score tied at 63-63.

Jim Braddock's jumper, Jordan's three-point play and a Buzz Peterson free throw

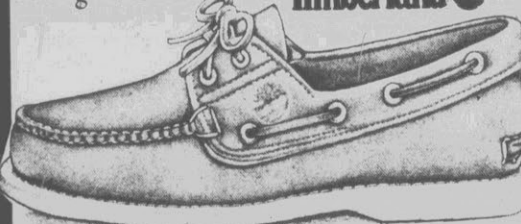

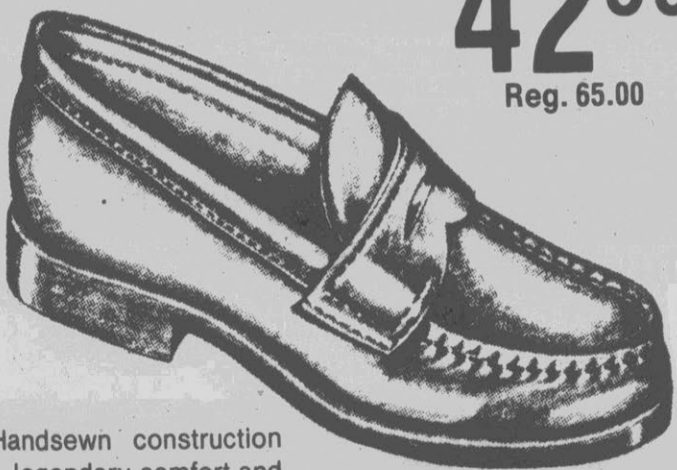

# Carner Named To LPGA Hall

NEW YORK (AP) — It was almost like watching a film of the previous year's LPGA awards luncheon. Player of the Year — JoAnne Carner. Winner of the Vare Trophy for lowest scoring average — JoAnne Carner.

Even the restaurant was the same. There was, though, one big difference Tuesday. Carner also was inducted into the Ladies Pro Golf Association Hall of Fame, only the 10th golfer to be so honored.

Carner had earned a place in the Hall at Pinehurst, N.C., by winning the World Championship of Women's Golf last August, which gave her the required 35 official tour victories. She won two tournaments after that to complete what was another outstanding year for 43-year-old "Big Momma," who has become the most dominant figure on the LPGA tour.

It was the third time she had been named Player of Year and the fourth time she won the Vare Trophy.

"I work a little harder at it now as I get older," said Carner. "The awards mean a little more. Maybe I want to have a better obituary."

Each of her Vare Trophy victories have come with a lower average, this year with a 71.49. In 95 rounds of golf, Carner shot in the 60s 25 times. Of the 26 events in which she competed this year, she was in the Top 10 21 times.

Beth Daniel bristled at the suggestion that it did not speak well for the state of the tour that it was dominated by a woman 20 years older than many of her tournament rivals. "JoAnne Carner is probably at the prime of her career right now," said the 26-year-old Daniel, who finished only .17 behind Carner in the Vare Trophy averages. "She's a great player. I have been close to her two years in a row in the low scoring average, so while she won, she didn't run away with it."

Carner said that playing against the "kids" was a big incentive. "That's the whole fun of it, to see if you can still stand up against them. And, they're getting better, so consequently you have to get better."

There was not even a hint of retirement. "I can go on forever. As long as I'm having fun out there, I'll continue to play."

# Owners, Players Haggling

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three days before National Football League players vote on the five-year, \$1.6-billion collective bargaining agreement that ended their 57-day strike, negotiators for the league and the players' union remain at odds over the document's final language.

"Five or six issues still have to be resolved," union spokesman Frank Woschitz said Tuesday night. Meanwhile, the failure of negotiators to reach a final accord has forced a delay in a vote on the pact by player representatives.

The player reps, who had hoped to vote Tuesday, are now expected to vote late today on whether or not to recommend ratification to the full membership.

That vote is not binding on the full membership, which votes Friday.

Union sources say two major areas of contention in the still-uncompleted agreement are the union's insistence that the league guarantee that players will be paid extra if it expands its regular season and that management drop its demand to extend the college draft in its current form through 1992.

Union officials have accused the league of attempting to write language into the final draft to leave open expansion of the regular season in 1983 and beyond. Management negotiators say the league has no immediate plans to either add teams or expand the season.

On the latter question, union officials say they fear an antitrust suit by the new United States Football League against the NFL and the players' union citing both parties for restraint of trade in extending the college draft past expiration of the collective bargaining agreement in 1986. While the NFL is capable of waging a long, costly court fight, union officials say the players' association does not have the finances for such a battle.

Jack Donlan, the NFL's chief negotiator, and attorneys Sargent Karch and Steve Curran, met with union officials late Monday night and again Tuesday in hopes of ironing out the dispute. Further talks have been delayed as NFL officials travel to Pittsburgh today to attend the funeral Kathleen Rooney.

# Soccer Match Ends With Violent Melee



NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A referee, player and stadium usher have been injured as the result of a violent melee at the ninth Asian Games.

North Korean players, team officials and fans attacked the referee, identified only as "Vijay," during a melee on the field Tuesday after Kuwait beat North Korea 3-2 in a soccer match. Indian police waving wooden batons broke up the outburst while a policeman drew his gun and escorted the referee, who was bleeding, from the field.

A doctor from the stadium clinic said the referee suffered a "minor head injury," while a North Korean player and the stadium usher also were taken to the hospital.

The brawl, during which chairs were hurled onto the field, was sparked by the referee's decision to award a penalty kick to Kuwait. Pictures showed Korean player Bong-Gi La physically restraining the referee as he tried to make the call.

Despite the Korean objections, the penalty kick was allowed and Kuwait's Mahbob Mubarak tapped it home to tie the score at 1-1. That sent the game into overtime, with Kuwait winning. The loss eliminated North Korea from the tournament.

As the game ended, the Korean players moved close to the referee, apparently to protest the penalty shot decision. According to witnesses, some of the players hit down.

Players from Thailand, watching the match from the

stands, jumped on the field while chairs and pieces of equipment were thrown before the police moved in with wooden batons. An hour after the incident, about 100 people, mostly North Koreans, were still on the field, awaiting a decision on their demand for a

replay of the game. Speaking through an interpreter, Chang-Son Lee, president of the North Korean Football Federation, said he had lodged an official protest with the Asian Football Confederation over the referee's decision.

Indian sports minister Buta Singh, chief organizer of the Asian Games, said the North Korean protest would be decided by the tournament's technical committee. Kuwait will play the winner of today's Iraq-Saudi Arabia match for the title.

**LEVEL CROSS (AP)** — Until Richard Petty loses his desire for racing, he says he doesn't plan to leave the NASCAR Grand National circuit. To prove his point, he has embarked on a major overhaul of Petty Enterprises.  
With the reorganization, Richard Petty's operations will be sponsored by STP Corporation. But the car driven by his son, Kyle Petty, will be sponsored primarily by Southland Corporation, the owners of the 7-Eleven Convenience Stores chain. STP will remain an associate sponsor of Kyle's car.  
In the past two seasons, Petty Enterprises' shop has fielded cars for both Petties, but lack of money and manpower resulted in neither being consistently competitive, the Petties said.  
Richard Petty says the changes should help him on the circuit.  
"I'm not saying I'm all of a sudden going to go out and win the first five races next year," he said at a news conference. "But I should be able to run more consistently with the leaders."  
"It's a good deal, enough to run a first-class team," he added.  
Terms of Kyle's contract with 7-Eleven were not released, but he said it was a "long-term contract."  
STP has sponsored Richard Petty since 1972, and Kyle Petty since he joined the circuit in 1979. The younger Petty will continue working for STP under a personal services contract, but his new car will carry the number seven, discarding his usual number 42.

Both teams will work out of the Petty Enterprises building, but will be completely separate entities, Richard said.  
"This will involve hiring additional help, perhaps as many as six people, to round out Kyle's team," Richard Petty said.  
The elder Petty also said he was seeking to further restructure the organization by hiring a new engine builder, a job Maurice Petty, Richard's brother, has handled for 20 years. Richard Petty said he would like to bring in an engine builder for both cars, thus freeing Maurice to become Petty Enterprises' general manager.

Richard Petty said he was talking to "three people," none of whom he identified.

# Questions, Answers On High Court Abortion Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, calm in the midst of an explosive national debate, is considering whether changes are needed in its landmark 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

For more than three hours Tuesday, the justices of the nation's highest court coolly debated the question and heard arguments on the politically and emotionally charged issue.

Here are answers to some of the questions about what's at stake:

Q: Where does this new abortion controversy come from?

A: The court is studying cases stemming from abortion regulations in Virginia, Missouri and Akron, Ohio.

Q: Who's imposing what regulations?

A: The key case stems from an ordinance Akron's city council tried un-

successfully to enforce four years ago. It would require that all abortions on women more than three months pregnant be performed in a hospital.

The ordinance also would require all girls under age 15 to have the consent of one parent or a judge before obtaining an abortion. A 24-hour waiting period for all women requesting an abortion would be imposed, and doctors would be required to tell patients seeking abortions that the fetus is a "human life."

Q: What about the regulations in the Missouri and Virginia cases?

A: The court's argument sessions Tuesday focused primarily on similar mandatory-hospitalization requirements imposed by laws in those states.

Missouri law also requires parental or judicial consent before girls under 18 years of age can obtain an abortion. It

requires that two doctors be present when any abortion is performed on a fetus that may be able to survive outside the womb.

Q: What effect would all these regulations have on the availability of abortions?

A: Most likely, the Supreme Court's decision about the validity of mandatory hospitalization will have little impact on the vast majority of the more than 1 million women who get abortions in the United

States each year.

More than 95 percent of adult women who obtain abortions do so early in their pregnancies and would not be affected by the mandatory-hospitalization requirements.

There's no way of telling how many women would be deterred from having abortions by the other regulations. The various regulations also could have a significant practical impact on the number of young girls who

seek legal abortions.

Q: Is there any possibility that the Supreme Court will use these cases to overturn its 1973 ruling — and allow abortion to be outlawed again?

A: The possibility seems remote at best, but predicting the court's action is always risky.

Justice Harry A. Blackmun, author of the court's 1973 decision, asked government lawyer Rex Lee whether the Reagan ad-

ministration, which favors less court control of abortion, is asking the court to overturn the ruling. Lee said, "No."

Of course, whatever guidelines the court issues for Virginia, Missouri and Akron will apply nationwide.

Q: What reason did the Supreme Court have to legalize abortion in the first place? Isn't that a determination for state legislatures?

A: The court's overturning of such laws passed by state legislatures was based on its decision that a woman had a constitutional right to control her body.

Q: If that's so, how can any state or local community regulate abortions.

A: In the 1973 decision, the court said that governments

can in no way interfere with a woman's decision to have an abortion during the first three months of her pregnancy. But, the court said, government regulation aimed at protecting a woman's health during the pregnancy's second trimester and regulation aimed at protecting fetal life in the final trimester is allowed.

Lawyers for Missouri, Virginia and Akron said the hospitalization requirements legitimately are aimed at protecting women's health.

But Frank Susman, a St. Louis lawyer representing the people who challenged the Missouri law, disagrees.

"The real purpose of all these statutes is to thwart (a woman's) decision-making

process," he told the court.

Q: Did Tuesday's arguments give any insight into how individual justices will vote?

A: Again, it's extremely risky to predict a justice's vote based on what's said during oral arguments. But past rulings on abortion over the last nine years and some new comments give hints.

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justices William H. Rehnquist and Byron R. White have been very deferential to government-imposed abortion regulations. Their comments indicated no change.

Blackmun and Justices William J. Brennan and Thurgood Marshall generally have taken a dim view of such regulatory attempts.

Justice John Paul Stevens and Lewis F. Powell, who fall somewhere in between, seemed disturbed by some but not all of the regulations at issue.

Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, sitting in on her first abortion case, offered little insight as to how she might vote. Mrs. O'Connor, the mother of three sons, was attacked by so-called "right-to-life" forces during her confirmation hearings in the Senate last year for her perceived liberal views on abortion while an Arizona legislator.

Q: When will the court decide the cases?

A: A decision is expected by July.

Dr. Brian A. McMillen has been appointed assistant professor in the department of pharmacology at the East



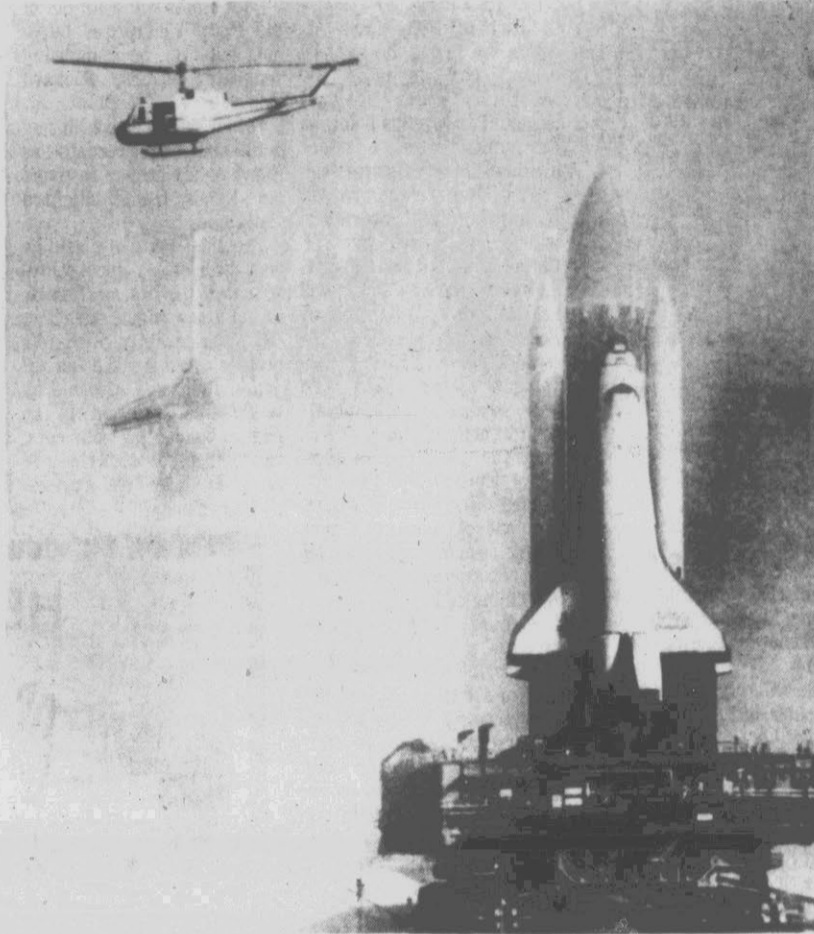
Dr. BRIAN McMILLEN

Prior to his appointment, he was assistant professor of pharmacology at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas, where he also was a postdoctoral fellow in pharmacology during 1977-78.

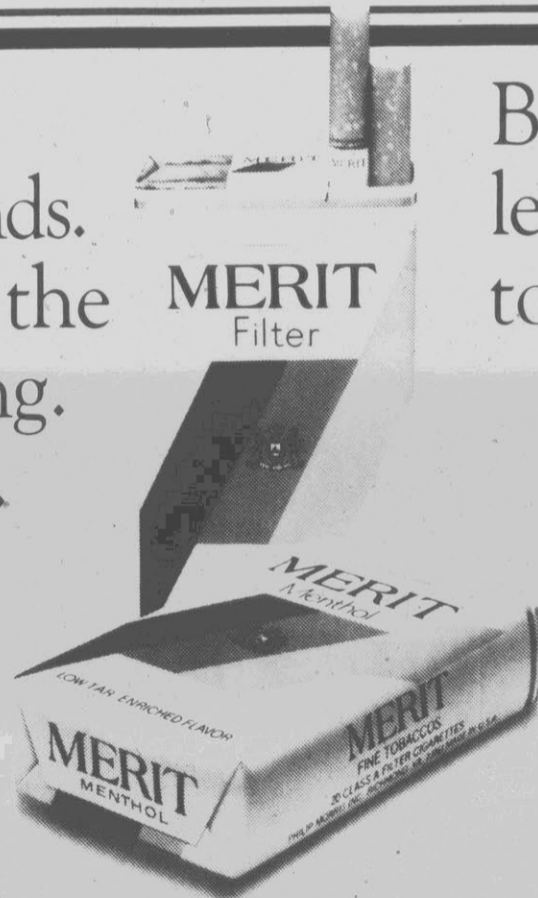

# Recluse Playboy Mogul Loses No Sleep Worrying

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bunny mogul Hugh Hefner rarely leaves the hutch, his luxurious bachelor pad in the exclusive Holmby Hills. But that's the way he's always operated, even when he was president of the troubled Playboy empire.

Now, less than a year after he turned over active management of Playboy Enterprises Inc. to his daughter, Hefner denies rumors

describing him as burned-out and mired in depression while others run Playboy.

"That all started with an article which was written as if the guy had never been here and knew nothing about me or Playboy," Hefner, clad in his customary silk pajamas and robe, said during a recent interview.

"I really have been more involved, in part because of some of the economic problems. But I have not been involved in what might be

considered the operating management of the company for a decade and a half."

It was 5 p.m. Hefner had arisen a couple of hours earlier and was settled on a couch before a backgammon-board table in an elegant study inside his 30-room, Tudor-style mansion. He fiddled with the omnipresent pipe and spoke again about the gossip which swirls around his reclusive life.

"My work style is such,

and has been for more than 20 years, that I work afternoons and evenings. I work in pajamas. I think these things create some of those impressions," he said. "But I've found there just aren't many reasons to go out."

Indeed, Hefner's 5½-acre complex must be the ultimate bachelor pad: staff of 30, tennis court, custom pool with stereo-equipped spa and Jacuzzi tucked under a mock-waterfall, guesthouse crammed with pinball and video games, a small zoo, aviary and fishpond.

Inside the gray stone mansion are marble-floored halls, luxurious dining room, library and an enormous master bedroom with four televisions, four video recorders, lighting and curtains all controlled from the more than king-sized bed. Also there to share it all is Shannon Tweed, a 25-year-old blonde who is the 1982 Playmate of the Year.

It has been 29 years this December since Hefner began publishing Playboy magazine on his kitchen table. His \$600 investment has made him a multimillionaire, able to indulge any whim, follow any fantasy. He knows it upsets people.

"It seems obvious to me that the two great guilts in our society are material wealth and sex, and if you tie the two together it really starts giving people problems," he said. "And if you do it in such a fashion that everything seems to work for you and you seem to be having an awful lot of fun at it, then it does touch some nerves."

Not that he loses much sleep worrying. Now 56, Hefner has turned over management of the Playboy empire to his 29-year-old daughter Christie, who became president in April. He remains chairman.

"My average day during the week begins in the early afternoon and starts usually with some dictation. I usually go into a meeting about two or three o'clock, and that takes up the rest of the afternoon. Then, into the

evening hours," he said.

"I usually retire about midnight or one o'clock, and then probably spend the next three or four hours relaxing with my girlfriend, eating, watching a movie on tapes. That would be a typical day."

It hasn't been Playboy's best year. The company sold off its lucrative London casinos under pressure from British regulatory authorities because of alleged gaming law infractions and also liquidated its book publishing operation, two resort hotels and the New York Playboy Club. Altogether, Playboy lost more than \$50 million in fiscal 1982 and doesn't expect much more than a breakeven 1983.

But Hefner, who still owns two-thirds of the company, was upbeat about Playboy's future.

"What fiscal 1982 has been all about for us (was) cleaning up the balance sheet,

getting out of businesses ... that were borderline or not profitable and also of turning specific equities we had into cash and getting our balance sheet into a strongest cash position," he said.

These days, Hefner's attention is focused on the Playboy Channel, an all-night cable television venture featuring adult films, original programming, talk shows and video versions of the famous Playboy centerfolds.

"I'm very much involved in the video, particularly because it is a brand new area for us. It's a matter, as with the magazine, of sort of setting the course to begin with and then others can follow," he said.

Hefner, a Chicago native who worked for Esquire before starting Playboy, said the idea for a different kind of men's magazine grew out of his own Midwestern upbringing.

"I grew up in a strong

Methodist home that espoused values that were rather typical of the time, that were rather repressive in terms of sex and other related values," he said. "My own set of values were really a response to that ... that's really where Playboy came from."

# Sen. Schmitt Feels He Didn't Get A Fair Shake

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — As jeans-clad secretaries sorted files and packed boxes, the only incumbent Republican senator to lose in the Nov. 2 election sat behind his desk fielding telephone calls and pondering his future.

"I'm disappointed as I think anybody would be," said the 47-year-old Harrison Schmitt, the victim of a bitter political fight and an ailing economy. "I tried very hard to match my activities to the issues New Mexicans felt were important. I guess I didn't do that."

While professing no bitterness, Schmitt feels he didn't get a fair shake in his race with state Attorney General Jeff Bingaman, 39, a soft-

spoken Democrat who will take office in January.

Schmitt, a former astronaut who flew to the moon aboard Apollo 17, said bias on the part of the news media turned the tide in the campaign, especially where the candidates' hard-hitting advertisements were concerned.

"I think we underestimated the degree that the media wouldn't look at it objectively," he said.

Statewide polls done by private researchers indicate Schmitt lost ground rapidly in the two weeks before the election when a dispute developed over the accuracy of the ads.

Bingaman ran a series of television and radio commercials critical of Schmitt's positions on minimum Social

Security benefits, a law that allows corporations to pay foreign entities for favorable consideration and mining on federal wilderness land.

Schmitt said the commercials distorted his positions and countered with ads criticizing Bingaman's actions as attorney general. In one, he said Bingaman shirked his duty by not prosecuting inmates involved in a 1980 state prison riot that left 33 prisoners dead. Another claimed Bingaman had urged Gov. Bruce King to pardon an inmate who had been on the FBI's 10 Most Wanted List.

Bingaman called the ads "lies" and many state officials jumped to his defense. The dispute received daily news coverage and was seen as the turning point in what

had been a formal, issue-oriented campaign.

Schmitt, however, refused to back off the advertisements.

"I still believe that," Schmitt said recently of his ads' contentions. "It is the attorney general's job to be the chief law enforcement official in the state, not to hide behind technicalities ... to neglect doing his duty."

But, he said, the news media believed Bingaman's contention that he was ordered to investigate the prison riot, not prosecute it.

"The media all had been deeply involved with the prison riot and felt they knew all about it," he said. "It was more difficult than usual for me to get an objective reading."

Schmitt said that, looking

back, the controversy over the ads hurt his campaign, but didn't cost him the election.

"These things built on a situation that was already very difficult for Republicans," he said. "The voter turnout and the general economic situation were the big things."

New Mexico has an unemployment rate of about 10 percent, but in some counties, particularly in copper mining areas, the jobless rate is nearly 40 percent.

Schmitt said the record turnout, which also produced a new Democratic governor, Toney Anaya, caught the state's Republicans by surprise.

"The main thing of the election was the effectiveness of the Democratic state

party and organized labor to get the vote out," he said. "The turnout is what beat the whole ticket."

"We don't have at this time a really strong base of support on the grassroots level," he said. "We've been hit in the head with a two-by-four and we've got to go back and look at that."

Schmitt hasn't decided what role he will play in

building that support. He is looking to the future, but says he won't make any decisions about where his life will lead until sometime next month.

Schmitt, who was a respected scientist for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration before his moon trip, said he has discussed a possible job with the Reagan administration and is looking at positions outside of government.

"All I have told the Reagan people is that if there is a way I can serve the country, I will consider it," he said. "All that's passed between us is three or four openings that actually are in the technical or scientific areas."

For now, his future consists of the lame duck session of Congress, and the job of

winding up six years of work and smoothing the transition for Bingaman.

"It's always busy around here, but it's particularly busy right now," he said as the bustle of the secretaries continued in his outer office.

## Poison Leaves Killed 15 Cows

KANNAPOLIS, N.C. (AP) — Poison leaves have been ruled to have caused the death of 15 cows, valued at \$6,500, that belonged to the Church of God Orphanage and Children's Home.

Cabarrus County Veterinarian Dr. E.C. Garlick said after a frost, the sap in small, serrated leaves turned into poisonous prussic acid, which killed the cows.

# Southeast Asians Continue To Be Wary Of China

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Southeast Asian leaders continue to voice deep suspicions of China, despite the fact that the giant nation of a billion people on their northern flank is wooing them and has cut down its support for revolutionaries in

their own societies. "China has never abandoned her scheme to win hegemony over the region," Indonesia's intelligence chief Gen. Yoga Sugama maintains.

Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad of Malaysia told reporters recently that China will be regarded as a threat so long as it does not totally renounce its support for the outlawed, pro-Peking Communist Party of Malaya.

In Burma, government officials say that while Peking has cut some of its aid to the Burmese Communist Party, the rebels continue to receive weapons, ammunition and other military hardware.

China has sought closer ties with its southern, non-Communist neighbors since the mid-1970s, a trend fostered by a deradicalization of the Peking leadership, growing Soviet power in the region and better relations with the United States.

Since the 1978 Vietnamese invasion of Cambodia, China and the five members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations have also had a common cause: getting the pro-Soviet Vietnamese out of Cambodia.

But anxieties and mistrust continues. There is China's size, its potential power and its Communist ideology that many Southeast Asians fear could return to Maoist-style radicalism and add revolution to its list of exports.

What also irks Southeast Asian leaders, who preside

over increasingly prosperous societies, is that Peking has never fully renounced its "dual track" diplomacy — or, in the words of a Burmese proverb, "carrying a water pail in one hand and a fiery torch in the other."

The Peking leadership, however, has come closer in the past two years to rejecting the idea that its government could maintain friendly ties with another government, while the Chinese Communist Party provides support to the "fraternal" Communist Party in that nation.

Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang, touring Southeast Asia in February 1981, promised that only "political and moral support" to fraternal parties would henceforth be extended. At the Chinese Communist Party's 12th Congress last September in Peking Chairman Hu Yaobang said that while fraternal parties should help each other it was "absolutely impermissible" to "issue orders or run things from outside for others."

Some political analysts in the region doubt Peking could afford to cease all support to pro-Peking groups.

Says one Western diplomat in Bangkok, "Everyone agrees that the level of Chinese aid to the Thai Communists is way down, but the idea that the Chinese are out of the game completely is insane."

"The Chinese realize that reducing aid below a certain

level would invite the Soviets, and maybe the Vietnamese, to step in."

A check by Associated Press bureaus in Southeast Asia into Chinese relations shows the following:

**THAILAND** — The Communist Party has been in dramatic decline in recent years, with the country's security chief, Prasang Soonsiri, claiming its armed fighters have been cut by half to about 7,000. Many factors are responsible, but one is certainly a large drop in Chinese aid.

Closer Thai-Chinese relations are considered mutually beneficial. Thailand allows China to ship weapons through its territory for anti-Vietnamese Cambodian resistance fighters. China has vowed to come to Thailand's aid should Vietnam opt for any "military adventures" against the Thais.

Thais are concerned that their own rebels may try to fill the aid vacuum by turning to Vietnam or the Soviet Union, but this has not occurred in Thailand or other areas of the region in any meaningful way.

**MALAYSIA-SINGAPORE** — The Malaysian government, and to a lesser degree that of Singapore, regards the 2,300 guerrillas of the pro-Chinese Communist Party of Malaya as the main threat to national

security. Although Malaysia has presented no evidence that China is currently giving material or monetary aid to the rebels, the government feels that even moral support is an unfriendly, threatening act.

In 1981, China closed the Malayan Communist radio station which had been beaming its message from the southern Chinese city of Kunming, a major propaganda center for exiled Southeast Asian Communists. The Thai Communist radio station there went off the air a year earlier, but a clandestine Burmese Communist station continues to operate from

Chinese soil. **INDONESIA** — The Indonesians, who have no diplomatic relations with Peking, say they need assurances that China would not support any subversive Communist activities in Indonesia.

Intelligence chief Yoga claims Peking still provides "protection" for some leaders of the Communist Party of Indonesia and supports their activities abroad.

A community of Southeast Asian Communist exiles continues to exist in China although Peking has given its members a very low profile in recent years.

Early in November,

Foreign Minister Mochtar Kusummatmadja said that U.S. policy to help modernize China worries Southeast Asian nations so long as Peking maintains a policy of aiding Communist movements in the region.

**BURMA** — The Communist Party in Burma, numbering about 20,000 fighters along the Chinese-Burmese border, is the strongest in the region. Peking, according to Rangoon officials, has ceased giving cash and training to the rebels but provides other military support.

To make up for the loss, the insurgents have turned to the lucrative opium-

smuggling business. **PHILIPPINES** — Defense Minister Juan Ponce Enrile says there is "no hard evidence" that China is giving any support to the Maoist-oriented Philippine Communist Party which is estimated to include more than 3,000 fighters. Defense authorities believe Chinese military aid — said to exist earlier — stopped after Manila and Peking established diplomatic ties in 1975.

Military authorities say that in the absence of foreign support the insurgents turn to extortion and clandestine business ventures to collect funds for their operations.

## New Minister Is Announced

The First Baptist Church of Washington, D.C. has announced the appointment of former Greenville resident Lanny Peters as its parish minister for outreach and fellowship.

Peters received a master of arts degree in guidance and counseling from East Carolina University and taught in the Greenville City Schools from 1977-79. He has served on the staffs of Memorial Baptist Church, Oakmont Baptist Church and the East Carolina University Baptist Student Union. His wife, the former Karen Bridgman, is a graduate of East Carolina University, also.

First Baptist is the oldest Protestant church in the District of Columbia, the worship place of Presidents Truman and Carter. Peters will serve the church in missions and outreach, church growth and fellowship, and share in a broad range of pastoral responsibilities.

## St. Anthony Church Has Fed Millions

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — It is a warm autumn morning as hundreds of people queue up in the sunlight along a grimy stretch of Golden Gate Avenue. The air is scented with cafeteria food and cheap wine, as the line flows through a doorway, down a ramp and into a cellar. It winds back and forth, and back and forth again — a human river of the hungry. For 32 years, the St. Anthony Dining Room has fed the needy free, hot meals. Last month, St. Anthony's served its 15 millionth guest, a milestone no one was happy to reach.

"It's not something we want to celebrate — that 15 million people needed to be fed," says Executive Director James Kilty, who adds he's just happy "that we have been given the gifts to share with the poor. That's what is miraculous."

St. Anthony's and other soup kitchens are doing a booming business. With 11 million Americans out of work, many people who have never before sought a hand-out are trickling in for a free meal.

The University of California, in a survey of 40 San Francisco Bay area charity groups, found a 28 percent increase in the need for food, clothing and shelter during the past year.

In July, St. Anthony's served an average of 1,829 meals each day. That was up from 1,540 in July 1981. And Kilty said the average had been near 1,500 a day for years before that.

The man who received the 15 millionth meal, and a \$50 gift certificate for some new clothes, was Aredios Bryant, a 48-year-old unemployed longshoreman from New Orleans who came to San Francisco in 1953.

"Things were better then. Plenty work. Plenty money," he said. Now, like many others, he comes to the dining room seven days a week.

"I'd be starving if I didn't come here," says Ray Albertson, an unemployed 36-year-old from Santa Cruz who had come to St. Anthony's only twice before.

"Right now, it means survival," echoes an unemployed lab technician who, at 42, has been looking for a new job for almost two years.

Kilty says 85 percent to 90 percent of the diners are men, mostly in their 30s. There also are senior citizens, immigrants, teenagers, winos, hookers, drifters and entire families.

There are no questions asked and there is no preaching. Those are the rules. "We stay open until there's nobody else on the line," says Kilty, who took over administration of the dining room two years ago from the Rev. Alfred Boeddeker, a 79-year-old Franciscan who opened St. Anthony's on Oct. 4, 1950 — the Feast of St. Francis.

Boeddeker and others in the friary of St. Boniface's Church had been giving meal tickets to about 35 hungry people a day, which could be redeemed at the Golden Eagle cafe.

But "Father Alfred," as he is called by virtually everyone in San Francisco's Tenderloin district, felt a need to do more. So he opened St. Anthony's in a vacant garage beside the church.

"On that opening day, instead of those 35 men, there were 350 people," recalls Boeddeker.

Since then, St. Anthony's Foundation has grown to a \$1.4 million enterprise with a clinic, a residence hotel for elderly women, a library, a thrift store, a seniors' service group, an employment service and a farm in Petaluma that provides jobs and food.

The dining room costs \$380,000 a year to operate. Kilty said the foundation would like to help with housing, but cannot afford to.

As he strolls along the meal line, his Franciscan robes swaying in the breeze, Boeddeker exchanges greetings with many of the men. Some ask his blessing. Some want to go to the farm.

Boeddeker said he hasn't seen so dramatic an increase in the number of diners since he opened the dining room.

# Long Chain Of Galaxies May Explain

NEW YORK (AP) — The discovery of the largest known structure in the heavens — a string of galaxies 700 million light-years long — could help explain how the universe took shape eons ago, scientists say.

Astronomers at radiotelescopes in West Virginia and Puerto Rico said Monday that they have identified a string of galaxies stretching from the constellation Pegasus to the Big Dipper halfway across the sky.

The filament of galaxies is 100 million to 200 million light years from Earth, the researchers said. A light year is the distance light travels in one year — about 6 trillion miles.

A typical galaxy contains millions to hundreds of billions of stars.

Riccardo Giovanelli, a staff astronomer at the National Astronomy and Ionosphere Center near Arecibo, Puerto Rico, said finding the huge chain of galaxies supports the theory that galaxies condensed from long filaments of matter.

The theory was proposed by the astronomer Y.B. Zeldovich of the Soviet Union. An alternative theory says galaxies formed independently and later drifted together due to gravity.

But according to Giovanelli, there has not been enough time since the beginning of the universe for gravity to cause a cluster as large as the newly discovered string of galaxies.

Giovanelli and his collaborator — Martha Haynes, assistant director of the National Radio Observatory in Green Bank, West Virginia — used radio waves in finding that two previously identified clusters were actually two ends of one much larger cluster.

The two clusters, named the Lynx-Ursa Major supercluster and the Perseus supercluster after the constellations in which they are located, were separated by the Milky Way.

Giovanelli said in a telephone interview that the chain of galaxies might be only part of a filament "that you can probably trace all the way around the sky." He said the galaxies in the filament are moving away from Earth at a speed of about 3,000 miles per second.

Marc Davis, a professor of astronomy and physics at the University of California at Berkeley, said this research and previous reports of very large clusters of galaxies also suggest that the universe is composed almost entirely of neutrinos, subatomic particles that might make up what's called the "missing mass" of the universe.

This missing mass appears when scientists try to calculate the weight of galaxies. Measurements of the motion of galaxies suggest that they contain large amounts of matter that does not emit light — the missing mass.

If the missing mass is made up of neutrinos, it means that neutrinos have dominated the universe from the time it was formed 10 or 15 billion years ago, Davis said.

The large galaxy chain had been hidden from scientists because dust in the Milky Way absorbs light from stars, preventing astronomers from seeing with optical telescopes what lies beyond it.

Radio waves are not absorbed by the dust in our galaxy, so radio telescopes can effectively peer through the plane of the Milky Way. Using the 1,000-foot-wide telescope at Arecibo and the 300-foot-wide dish at Green Bank, Giovanelli and Ms. Haynes identified a string of galaxies behind the Milky Way that linked the Lynx-Ursa Major supercluster with the Perseus supercluster.

Their research was published in the October issue of the *Astronomical Journal* and was supported by the National Science Foundation.

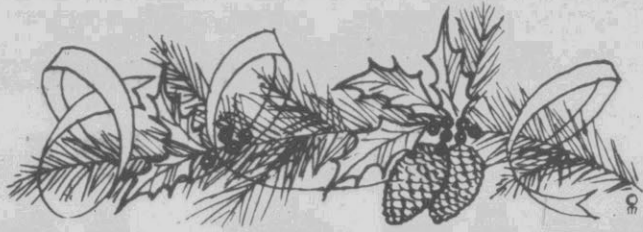

## Drought Has Taken Toll

### In Australia

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Australians greet the official start of the southern hemisphere's summer today with their holiday cheer drained by a 4-year-old drought.

The drought's chokehold on Australia's economy faces the nation of 14 million with a "national disaster." Its grip is felt throughout the massive country:

— Whole truckloads of sheep are sold for 50 cents by farmers who have no water or fodder for them.

— Flashfires sweep the tinder-dry bush, including a recent blaze that engulfed an American tourist.

— Rural showers spit out dark, foul-smelling water. In some areas, residents pay for mucky liquid dug out from dried riverbeds.

— In Broken Hill, 600 miles west of this capital city, 30,000 residents receive water in an odd-even rationing system similar to those used in the United States during gasoline shortages.

— City-dwellers and suburbanites watch lawns brown and dust accumulate on cars as local governments impose tight restrictions on water use. In Melbourne, Australia's second-largest city, residents face fines of up to \$1,000 under restrictions taking effect tonight.

The arrival of summer, and its promise of 100-degree days, has deepened pre-Christmas gloom in a country already hurt by its worse recession since the 1930s.

"If there is no rain between now and Christmas, I would expect it would be approaching a disaster situation," said Peter Abbot-Smith, an engineer in Eurobadalla, 150 miles south of Sydney.

Michael Davidson, president of the National Farmers' Federation, Monday called the drought a "national disaster" that could cost the country \$7.5 billion, a figure equal to 4 percent of the nation's Gross National Product and the equivalent of \$7.1 billion in U.S. dollars.

He said 110,000 of Australia's 170,000 farms were drought-hit. This year's wheat crop is estimated at 8.62 million tons, down from nearly 17.5 million tons. Victoria, normally a wheat-exporting region, has begun importing wheat for the first time in 37 years.

Ralph Hunt, minister for transport and construction, has urged the Australian government to allocate funds to sink wells and build more dams. There are no national rainfall figures, but Hunt called the drought the worst of the century.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics said the drought has seriously affected 80 percent of Australia's large ranches, which raise 93 million sheep and 14 million cattle.

The drought has been accompanied by an outbreak of bushfires in the eastern states. Last weekend, 64-year-old William Benjamin Paxton of Kingston, Ohio, burned to death in the Blue Mountains area.

Unemployment officially stands at 8.2 percent. Labor Party opposition leader Bill Hayden predicts it will reach 10 percent by January. Inflation, meanwhile, spirals at 12.3 percent, while the country's manufacturing industry is in a nose dive.

Bureau of Statistics figures show that as of October, production of steel, cement, fabrics and consumer durables such as television sets and refrigerators had plunged 40 per cent.

With economic hard times trimming Christmas shopping lists, some residents wish for simple things once taken for granted.

"Water is very, very scarce and there'll soon place a ban on flushing toilets," said Doug McLeod, police constable in Cobargo, 175 miles south of Sydney. "The bore (well) water is so smelly and dirty we can't enjoy a decent shower."

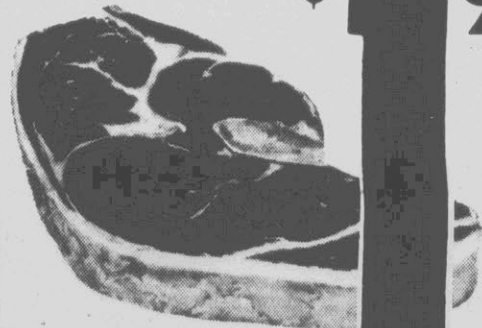

# Alaska's 'Bush Rat' Governor Stepping Down

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — When Barbara Carey of Dade County, Fla., suggested recently that Alaska pay the cost of a new Orange Bowl in Miami, Alaska Gov. Jay Hammond wrote her a poem. "We know you Alaskans are rolling in wealth" is a statement heard often these days — from those with a plan for ripping us off to

further some cause or pet craze," Hammond wrote. In the tortured rhyme that followed, the bearded governor explained that Alaska, despite its oil wealth, had pressing needs of its own, and hadn't the money to build Dade County a new stadium. The 60-year-old governor has penned scores of poems during his eight years in office, poking fun at

lawmakers, noting birthdays and, in his familiar penchant for understatement, swiping back at critics. Barred by law from serving a third term, the former bush pilot, trapper, wolf hunter, commercial fisherman and hunting guide retires Dec. 6.

That's fine with Hammond, who describes himself as a "bush rat more at home with my gum boots in bilge water" than in the Statehouse. The Republican will be succeeded by Democrat Bill Sheffield, a millionaire who owns a hotel chain in Alaska and the Yukon Territory.

Hammond says he and his wife, Bella, will retire to their homestead in the remote Lake Clark area northeast of Bristol Bay to "repair the tattered remnants" of his bush flying service.

After 34 years in government — as a mayor, legislator and governor — Hammond wryly concedes: "I guess there's no escaping the fact that I've spent most of my life as a bureaucrat. ... I certainly had no aspirations to join up with those rascals."

In many ways, Hammond is Alaska — or at least the Alaska that some might envision.

Influenced by a Texas friend's tales of Alaska, Hammond, who was reared in Vermont, bought a 1929-vintage Loening Keystone amphibious plane and flew to Alaska in 1946.

But, "I really wasn't some wild-eyed kid seeking my fortune as so many are who come up here," Hammond recalls.

The former Marine fighter pilot lifts weights regularly

— therapy for a back injury suffered in a World War II crash landing — and is built like a bull. His voice, compared to an "untamed, rushing Alaskan river" by one former state lawmaker, fills up a room.

"His appearance, his doggerel and his style is refreshing," says Byron Mallott, head of Sealaska, a huge native regional corporation with interests in the salmon and timber industries. "He really did bring the flavor of what is good and unique about Alaska to the forefront."

When Hammond became governor in 1974, construction of the trans-Alaska oil pipeline was just beginning. The giant state's sparse population was swelling with newcomers and was confronted with enormous service needs as it waited for a wave of oil wealth.

"We were not rich then. We had the resources, but we didn't have the money," says Hammond, explaining that the huge increases in revenue from state-owned oil leases didn't come until 1979 when oil prices skyrocketed with the Iranian revolution.

Business interests and environmentalists were locked in strident debate over the state's future. Would Alaska's riches — petroleum, fish, timber and minerals — be exploited, or would development be stymied?

Hammond now believes he succeeded in balancing those interests, a contention not shared by some on either side of the issue.

"I attempted to screen healthy growth from unhealthy growth. I was in the middle. I had more empathy with the environmentalists,

but knew there would be decisions they would be affronted by."

Hammond leaves a bureaucracy that has grown along with oil revenues. The state operating budget alone rose during his tenure by 18.4 percent annually. He admits that government growth is out of control, but is proud of his leadership role for a spending limit approved by voters in November.

Many, including Mallott

and veteran state Sen. Bill Ray, say Hammond was "a man of vision." But they assert he often paid scant attention to day-to-day government, allowing it to grow, sometimes without direction.

Hammond enjoys considerable popularity among voters, 40 percent of whom rated his performance as "good" in a recent poll.

Hammond, Alaska's fourth governor since statehood in 1959, says he wants to be

remembered for championing the creation of a savings account to set aside at least 25 percent of the state's resource wealth. The Alaska Permanent Fund, established in 1977, currently contains about \$3.5 billion to help pay Alaska's way when petroleum wealth is depleted.

Some of that money was used this year to give residents \$1,000 checks. The future of the so-called \$400

million "dividend program" is under attack by many as wasteful, but Hammond defends it as a way to share the wealth rather than use it to fuel more bureaucracy.

Hammond's fear is that the Permanent Fund will be "raided" by lawmakers who may lack the courage to re-establish the state income tax when oil revenues decline. The 1980 income tax repeal "was a big mistake," Hammond says.

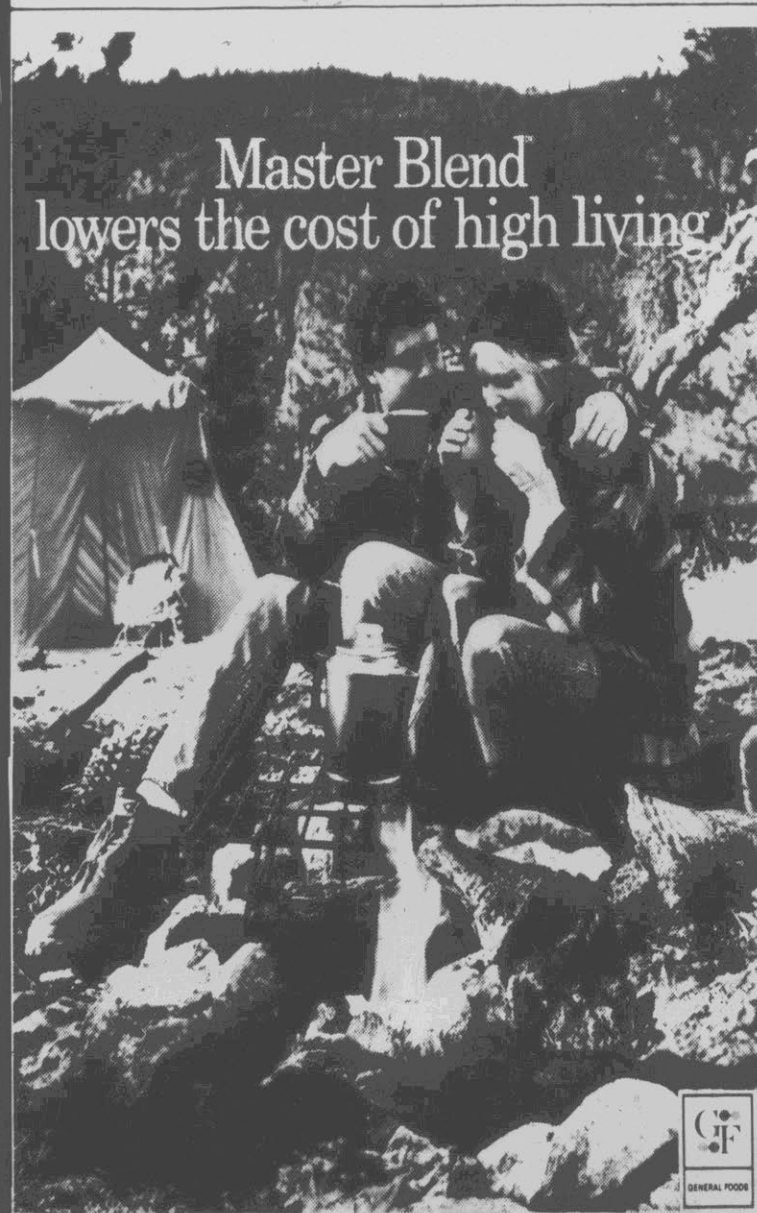

# No Deregulation Boon Appears For The Truckers

At the beginning of 1982, trucking-company officials who were still trying to cope with the newly deregulated trucking industry said this year had to be better financially than 1981. But a recent survey of trucking-company profits shows that 1982 may turn out to be one of the industry's worst in decades. Industry observers say this year's poor performance was a result of the weak economy and increased competition allowed by the 1980 federal Motor Carriers Deregulation Act. "Basically, this terrible year profit-wise was caused by the economy compounded by the fact that you have an increased level of competition chasing a shrinking market," said John B. Pipkin II, who follows the trucking industry for North Carolina National Bank. "The trucking industry is just a mirror of economic activity."

"I've always said when the economy catches cold, the trucking industry gets pneumonia," he said. "At this point, I would say the trucking industry is almost comatose."

In 1981, established freight carriers saw deregulation allow hundreds of competitors to move into their territory and chip away at their profits. In a year that brought one of the steepest declines in freight tonnage in the industry's history, nine of 12 of North Carolina's major trucking firms reported losses or lower profits.

Deregulation has hurt established carriers by allowing new, nonunion companies to move in and take over a large share of the full truckload business. Hauling full truckloads doesn't require big investments in terminals. These operators usually own one or several trucks and lease their services. Since they are nonunion and handle mostly full truckloads, owner-operators can undercut the rates of established trucking firms with higher overhead costs.

As a result, old-line carriers have been forced to cut costs, expand routes and reduce their rates.

The combination of deregulation and the economy proved too much for a few North Carolina motor carriers. For example, Charlotte-based Johnson Motor Lines, a \$90 million a year firm, closed down and Spector Red Ball Inc. of Winston-Salem, the nation's sixth largest trucking company, folded this year.

Winston-Salem-based McLean Trucking Co., the nation's fourth-largest carrier, reported an \$8 million operating loss in 1981, compared with a \$1.6 million profit in 1980. McLean merged with a Dallas-based trucking concern, Meridian Express Co., in September.

Nationwide, a recent survey of trucking company profits showed profits of 63 major motor carriers decreased 90.9 percent in the first nine months of this year to \$14.4 million, from \$158.1 million in the same period last year.

Officials of the American Trucking Association's National Accounting and Finance Council, who conducted the survey, say if the profit pattern holds for the rest of the year, trucking

firms are facing their fourth consecutive year of lower earnings.

However, state industry officials say despite the grim outlook for the rest of 1982, they expect a turnaround by the second quarter of next year.

Franz Holscher, president of Thurston Motor Lines Inc. of Charlotte, said he believes the industry will begin to recover by early spring. Thurston bucked the trend of declining profits last year, reporting that operating income shot up 154 percent to \$6.1 million from \$2.4 million in 1980.

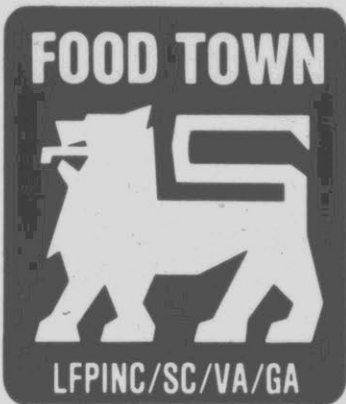
"It's been a hard year but I think recovery is in sight," said Holscher, who attributed his company's growth to aggressive

expansion throughout the Sunbelt area and better productivity. "The companies that have held on this year will be much better off next year."

Pipkin said the trucking industry is one of the first to be hurt by a slow economy but also one of the first to recover.

"Next year will definitely be a better year for truckers because the level of the economy will be better," Pipkin said. "The first quarter will be slow but things should start to really pick up by the second quarter."

"The trucking industry is a major bellwether of the economy," he said. "The good part is that it will start to recover ahead of the rest of the economy."

## Personal Side To Rebuilding

PEKING (AP) — China has provided a rare glimpse of its efforts to rebuild the earthquake-shattered city of Tangshan and aid those who survived the devastating 1976 tremor that took 242,000 lives.

The Chinese magazine Peking Review reported Sunday that 70,000 construction workers were laboring to rebuild the city, 100 miles southeast of Peking, which had a pre-quake population of 1.06 million.

Despite that effort, nearly half a million people still live in small, makeshift brick houses with tar paper roofs, the English-language magazine said.

Looking at the personal side of the disaster, the magazine said 15,000 people lost their spouses when the quake, with a magnitude of 7.8 on the Richter scale, flattened the city.

Most remarried, but 30 percent of those marriages ended in divorce since the partners were brought together "merely by a mutual sympathy and a desire to lean on each other in a crisis," the magazine said.

"Most of these people have married a third time, having drawn lessons from their previous experiences," it added.

The magazine said the quake left 1,814 paraplegics, and 1,727 of them have survived.

Few can return to work and earn a living and some considered suicide to end physical pain or save family members the trouble of having to care for them, according to the magazine. "But for most, thanks to

the help from a sympathetic society, the desire to live has been rekindled."

Some live in nursing homes and many are recuperating in sickrooms operated by big factories, it said.

City authorities support the jobless, who receive free medical care, it added.

Of the 2,600 orphans left by the quake, 700 have been sent to schools in other cities and some have been adopted by sympathetic families.

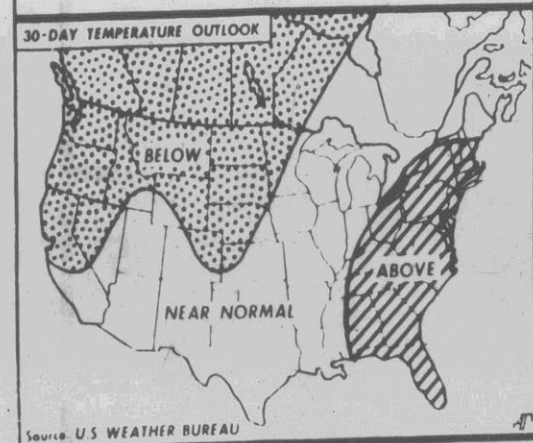
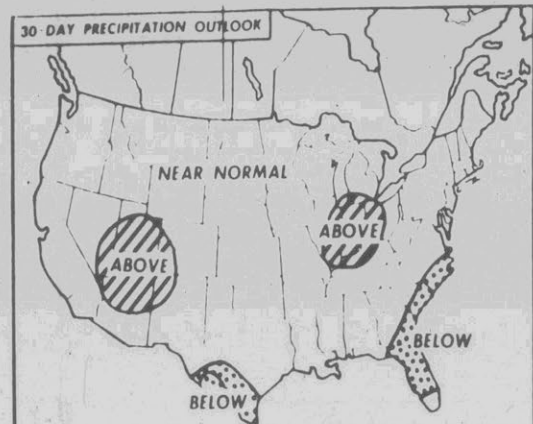
Tangshan orphans receive preferential treatment in job placement, the magazine said, adding, 1,500 have been given jobs and 350 have joined the army.

The Peking Review said 91,801 families have moved into new homes, but narrow side streets remain full of rubble and half of Tangshan's people still live in makeshift housing crammed between ruins and new buildings.

All buildings in the new city, being built with the help of a \$2 billion government grant, are designed to resist a shock of 6.3 on the Richter scale, the magazine said.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded by seismographs. A quake of a magnitude of six is considered capable of causing severe damage.

# Test New, Exotic Airplanes By Remote Control

EDWARDS AIR FORCE  
BASE, Calif. (AP) — Test  
pilot Einar Enevoldson  
calmly maneuvered one of  
the world's hottest planes  
through loops and turns no  
enemy fighter could hope to

match.  
When the sleek experimen-  
tal jet with its swept wings,  
canards and winglets was  
safely back on the ground,  
Enevoldson summed up:  
"It's not very pleasant and I  
don't like it very much, but  
you get used to it."

His disdain had nothing to  
do with the stress of flying on  
the far edge of technology.  
While the jet soared nearly  
eight miles overhead,  
Enevoldson never left the  
ground.  
He flew the 13-minute  
flight from an open plywood

cockpit deep inside the Na-  
tional Aeronautics and Space  
Administration's Dryden  
Flight Research Facility on  
the desert floor. The jet, a  
HiMAT or Highly Maneu-  
verable Aircraft Technology,  
is a scale model less than  
half the size of a manned  
fighter.

Dryden's Remotely Piloted  
Research Vehicle system  
raises sharp philosophical  
differences between the  
engineers and pilots at this  
high desert airstrip where  
the military and civilians  
have pioneered modern  
aviation from America's first  
jets to space-age X-15  
rocketplanes.

"The test pilots don't really  
like it very much, but the  
writing's on the wall," said  
Henry H. Arnaiz, HiMAT  
project manager.

He said, "remotely flown  
planes are cheaper, quicker  
and safer."

Milt Thompson, a test pilot  
of renown and Dryden's chief  
engineer, said, "There will  
be other (remote control)  
applications... This is a  
quick, cheap way of looking  
at a new configuration or  
doing hazardous testing."

"But I don't see it playing  
a really big role here. The  
pilot can contribute a lot —  
he's part of the whole control  
system. We've got to fight off  
these people who want to  
overdo it and make every-  
thing with these remote con-  
trols."

Dryden's remote cockpit is

a raised platform of blue-  
painted plywood. Enevoldson  
wore a T-shirt, sweater and  
slacks for one recent flight.  
He sat in a padded brown  
chair, hands on the control  
stick near his knees and  
watched a full array of dials  
and gauges — roughly what  
he would see if HiMAT had a  
cockpit.

Enevoldson's every move  
is relayed by the cockpit's  
computer to HiMAT's com-  
puter, which manipulates the  
plane's controls. The results  
race back to the cockpit and  
Enevoldson's gauges dance.

A television set mounted  
about where the windshield  
should be displays what  
HiMAT sees through a  
camera near its nose.

"It's just like he's sitting in  
the airplane," said James M.  
Cooper Jr., HiMAT flight test  
engineer. "But of course they  
don't have any of the cues  
they're used to," such as the  
roar of the engine, the vibra-  
tions, motions and pressures  
that should occur when the  
desert floor rolls by on the

TV screen.

Arnaiz, despite his en-  
thusiasm for remote-control  
flying, said, "We are not at  
the point yet where we can  
get rid of the pilot. You still  
need the 'right stuff,'" that  
undefined quality that is  
supposed to set test pilots  
apart from almost everyone  
else.

But for planes such as  
HiMAT, in which "we're  
pushing the technology on  
almost every major system  
of aerodynamics" with a  
single plane, remote control  
saves time, money and  
perhaps lives, Arnaiz said.

At \$17 million for two  
HiMATs, the cost is not high  
by aerospace standards.

"The big thing is that we  
didn't have to man-rate it,"  
with redundancies, life sup-  
port systems and well-tested  
materials, Arnaiz said. "In-  
stead, we just put a load on it  
and when it didn't break, we  
said, 'OK, let's go fly it.'"

Built by Rockwell Interna-  
tional, the 21-foot plane was

designed by computers into a  
unique configuration that  
includes four wings — two  
where wings are supposed to  
be and two canards, shorter,  
upswept wings near the nose.  
Its outer skin is mostly  
weight-saving graphite. The  
wings are, in engineering  
jargon, "aeroelastically  
tailored" — they twist and  
bend under pressure into  
predictable new shapes to  
maintain maneuverability.

Those pressures can be  
intense. Arnaiz said HiMAT  
"is designed to out-  
accelerate and out-turn any-  
thing else around. It has  
almost twice the turning per-  
formance of our best fighter."

Its greatest value is at  
altitudes above 25,000 feet  
and transonic speeds — just  
above and below the speed of  
sound around 700 mph,  
"where most fighter-to-  
fighter combat occurs,"  
Arnaiz said.

"This is an area where  
airplanes have almost no  
performance at all," he said.

"It's quite something to go  
up to Mach 1.2 and pull 6  
G's."

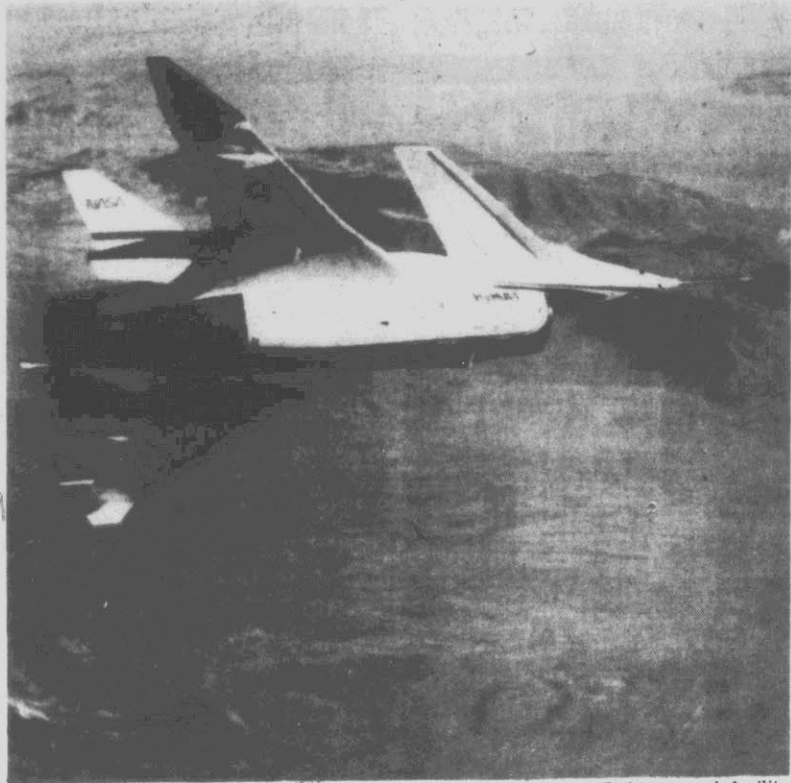
That means the plane was  
moving at 1.2 times the speed  
of sound and the forces  
trying to tear it apart on a  
hairpin turn were equal to  
six times the force of gravi-  
ty.

The two HiMATs will be  
heading into storage when  
the last of their 26 test flights  
are completed by the end of  
the year, he said.

They are not prototypes of  
some future fighter, Arnaiz  
said. Rather they are purely  
research tools to test new  
concepts.

Thompson, meanwhile,  
says any new plane that  
grows from HiMAT will  
carry a pilot long before it's  
delivered.

"There will definitely be  
test pilots around for some  
time to come," he said. "You  
don't give a fighter pilot a lot  
of confidence by telling him  
you flew this thing from the  
ground."
