City Council Has Budget

Reflector Staff Writer

The City Council has received for consideration another "maintenance" budget that once again calls for continuation of the present tax rate and the provision of services at current levels, while actually totaling 3.4 percent less than the 1982-83

City Manager Gail Meeks has submitted a recommended city government budget for 1983-84 totaling \$13,253,160 or some \$462,162 less than the board approved last June

Mrs. Meeks said the financial package, which does not recommend funds for any new programs or new positions. proposes that the current tax rate of 49 cents per \$100 assessed valuation be maintained for the new fiscal year. She said the 1983 property tax valuation is estimated to be \$798,167,857, representing an increased valuation of \$22,205,783 or 2.8 percent.

The city expects to receive the Greenville Utilities budget by the end of the week, according to Mrs. Meeks. Both segments will be adopted by July 1. A public hearing will probably be scheduled around the middle of June, she said.

Mrs. Meeks said that state shared revenues, such as the local option sales tax, utilities franchise tax, beer and wine tax, and intangible property tax, are a concern since they are tied in with the economy and are hard to project. She said payments from those taxes fluctuate and are received by the city three months after purchases are made, making it hard to project budget revenues. The local option sales tax is the most difficult to budget, she said, as the city's share varies

7 Dead, 120 Missing

Nile Shuttle Sinks With 627 Aboard

 ${\rm CAIRG, Egypt}~({\rm AP}) - {\rm A~Nile~River~steamer}$ with 627 people aboard caught fire and sank today in muddy, crocodile-infested waters. Authorities said at least seven people were known dead and 120 were missing

Interior Ministry spokesman Fakhreddin Khaled said 500 survivors were pulled from the river and the rescue effort continued 11 hours after the boat sank more than 800 miles south of Cairo.

The official Middle East News Agency reported from Aswan that some survivors were hospitalized, but did not say how many It said the fire "completely devoured" the

steamer, but there was no immediate word on the cause of the blaze that broke out before dawn on a boat filled mostly with Sudanese and Egyptian passengers traveling south to

of the Southern Aswan governate, said he had received a report that some passengers swam ashore and others were being picked up by military helicopters

Government Borrowing Stops As Limit Runs Out

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Treasury has put government borrowing on hold while the Senate starts work on the Reagan administration's request to increase the national debt limit to nearly \$1.4 trillion

Sen. Robert J. Dole, R-Kan., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said the Senate would begin consideration of the measure late today.

Dole's panel voted 11-5 Tuesday to go along with a House-passed version of the legislation for a nearly \$100 billion increase in the current debt limit of \$1.29

trillion, which Treasury of ficials say will be reached at the end of the month.

The House-passed bill endorsed by the Senate Finance Committee would raise the debt limit to \$1.389 trillion. Administration officials say this will be enough to meet government borrowing needs through the end of the fiscal year, Sept. 30.

Without an increase, the government will have no borrowing authority and may be faced with defaulting on its securities. In addition, there could be disruptions in Social Security benefit checks, unemployment benefits and government payroll checks

But uncertainty over congressional action on the measure has forced the government to indefinitely postpone today's scheduled auction of \$5.75 billion in five-year, two-month Treasury notes.

"The postponement (of the auction) is necessary because congressional action on legislation to raise the debt limit to permit issuance of the notes on the June 1 settlement date is not assured at this time. Treasury officials said in a printed statement

ODD SHOE EXCHANGE

I read an item in Dear Abby recently about the National Odd Shoe Exchange and would like to know more about it. J.S.

The National Odd Shoe Exchange is located near Indianola, Iowa. Its purpose is to serve persons whose feet are not the same size or who have only one foot by getting them together with others whose sizing problems, sex, tastes, ages, etc., match their own. For instance, a woman who wears a 7 on the left foot and an 8 on the right foot can be matched with someone close to her in age and taste who wears an 8 on the left foot and a 7 on the right foot. A right foot amputee and a left foot amputee wearing the same size can be matched to share the cost of each pair of shoes. There are 14,000 members, 1,000 of whom are amputees.

The exchange was founded in 1943 by Ruth Rubin Feldman, an occupational therapist who had had polio herself and saw many others like herself who needed mismated shoes. It is being carried on by Jeanne Sallman, an enthusiastic customer who joined in 1950 to accommodate her 4B and 6B feet. Membership is a \$15 lifetime registration fee, plus \$7.50 annual dues.

Israeli Jets Draw Heavy Syrian Fire

Waves of Israeli jets drew heavy anti-aircraft fire over Lebanon's Bekaa Valley today after Syrian missiles shot a pilotless Israeli drone reconnaissance plane, Lebanese radios reported.

The Israeli military command reported that Syrian warplanes fired air-to-air missiles at Israeli jets but scored no hits. The Israelis said they had no information on a drone being shot down.

It was the first Syrian-Israeli air encounter since Israel invaded Lebanon last June. Israel and Lebanon signed a U.S.-mediated troop withdrawal agreement last

The incidents occurred at a time of rising tension between Israeli and Syrian forces in Lebanon.

State and private radios in Beirut said the Israeli reconnaissance drone was brought down by a Sovietmade ground-to-air SAM-6 missile fired by Syrian forces at 12.35 p.m. (6:35 a.m. EDT). Initial reports by Lebanon's state radio said a missile fired by a Syrian warplane downed the pilotless aircraft.

The incident prompted

reconnaissance jets over the Bekaa Valley in eastern Lebanon, drawing barrages of anti-aircraft fire from Syrian and Palestinian positions, according to the

broadcasts. "Israeli jets have been staging intensified reconnaissance flights over the Bekaa since 2 p.m. (8 a.m. EDT)," said the Christian Voice of Lebanon radio. "Syrian and Palestinian positions are firing antiaircraft guns at the Israeli planes non-stop."

The drone was downed east of Jizzine, 25 miles southeast of Beirut, while the aerial encounter occurred over Besherri, 44 miles north of the Lebanese capital, according to Lebanese police and radio reports.

Israel's military command in Tel Aviv said Syrian warplanes fired air-to-air missiles at Israeli reconnaissance planes over Lebanon, but that there were no hits and all Israeli aircraft returned safely to base.

The Israeli communique did not say where the aerial encounter in Lebanon took place, but asserted the Israeli air force was continuing patrols in Lebanese air

The Israeli command said it had no information about a drone being downed by a Syrian missile. But it said two SAM-7 ground-to-air missiles missed an Israeli helicopter near the Bekaa Valley town of Amiq on Monday

The SAM-7 is a shoulderfired rocket carried by

Syrian infantry units while the SAM-6 is a more sophisticated missile fired from a mobile launcher and is radar-guided.

There was no mention of the SAM-5 missiles that were recently installed at Syrian land positions by Soviet crews. SAM-5s are capable of hitting high-flying aircraft over Israel from Syrian ter-

Exercising Brain Can Boost Mental Performance Two researchers studying the effects of aging on

SEATTLE (UPI) - The old woman fingered her plastic bank card as she stared at the electronic bank machine's buttons and confusing digital instructions.

She had transferred buses to get downtown, shopped in stores and picked up groceries, but the cash machine was baffling.

his research by Sherry L. Willis, an associate professor who is trying to measure the effect of training sessions on the subjects' test scores. The tests are designed to determine abilities in word

passive vocabulary (word recognition) holds the longest," he said. "That's probably because we're talked at until we die.

The tests show inductive reasoning - the ability to synthesize information, make decisions and draw conclusions - is usually the first mental function to de-

This does not mean the aged should be fearful about declining mental faculties, Schaie said

"In effect, it's a case of use it or lose it. We find that those who maintain their mental capacity the longest are similar to those who follow a disciplined program of exercise," he said. "You have to keep exercising your brain like it was a muscle

Schaie and Willis also say certain personality types retain mental function longer than others.

"You have to be able to strike compromises with life, especially as you get older, Willis said. "Rehashing past tragedies or present worries over and over is an indicator of mental rigidity.'

They find older people who work crossword puzzles or play chess or card games such as bridge tend to score higher on their tests at progressively older ages. These games require an active response

Their research also suggests older people probably can still learn or relearn some things.

"We're not talking about training someone to be a nuclear scientist or a computer programmer though there are some older people certainly who could become computer programmers," Schaie said. We're talking about retraining people in living skills, for example, that

Ms. Willis says some testing "seems to show that some of the effects of aging are not irreversible.

Test subjects may forget how to perform a certain test, she said, but training seems to help them relearn the mental skill more quickly

What looks like mental deterioration often isn't, Schaie and Willis emphasized

They said many older people don't function as well as previously simply because they are more removed from work and social activity. Some do not keep up because they aren't exposed to new tasks required by a changing society

The electronic bank machine is a good example of the problem, Ms. Willis said.

"I test myself by seeing if I can write a check at the grocery store before the checker can finish totaling up the bill," she said. "I notice now that I can't do it all the time. It can't be my age (she's in her 40s); it's those new electronic scanning machines. At least that's

An aged person's mental ability is also, in a large way, a factor of the time taken to

think. Schaie said. "Some of the confidence games and swindles perpetrated on older people often try to deprive the person of time by rushing him to make a decision," he said

While the speed of thinking may slow, mental abilities needed to reach a conclusion may remain intact.

We are seeing a lot of very interesting people some who have not shown any sign of decline," Schaie said.

'Some of these people give you courage. If I can be that way, you say, getting older will be okay.

From Tokyo to Paris to New York, the latest rave in the fashion world is the new Japanese look emphasizing comfort and fabric over the more tight-fitting and conservative silhouettes of European and American designers.



Loss Broods Well

North Carolina entered the race, put up a good fight, and lost. The high-priced, income-producing computer research center chose Texas instead. Gov. Jim Hunt's office summed up the situation: "Naturally we're disappointed ... but the fact that we were in the top four shows we have a lot to offer the

At one time, 52 cities in 22 states were competing for the center, a multimillion-dollar project to be developed by Microelectronics and Computer Technology Corp., a consotium of 12 major U.S. corporations. At the end, it was a choice between Austin, Texas; North Carolina's Research Triangle Park; San Diego and Atlanta. Austin won.

It was a big victory, one that would have settled nicely in this state. The corporation will have an annual budget approaching \$100 million with 275 scientists and about 150 support personnel.

Texas Gov. Mark White compares the decision by MCC to NASA's move to Houston in the early 1960s. "It should be a magnet and a hub that will produce a great many technological spinoffs," he said.

This is the type of industry that Gov. Hunt has been seeking for North Carolina. It does, indeed, speak well of his efforts that the state was among the final choices for such a project. The effort to land a victory of this magnitude should not be lessened.

Pay Raise Would Affect More Workers

RALEIGH - When Gov. Jim Hunt presented his budget at the beginning of the year, legislators looked with skepticism on the proposal to lift the freeze on increment pay reaises. To reinstitute the programs of annual steps for teachers and merit raises for state employees, the Legislature would have to find \$96 million. Considering the recession and the mood against tax increases, it didn't appear likely that money would be found.

But now, a recovery is under way some tax increases are being dicussed and Hunt's base budget was trimmed by some \$45 million. So, Hunt and legislative leaders are talking about a pay increase that would go beyond the \$96 million.

The proposal calls for a 5 percent pay hike for all state workers. But, the freeze would remain in effect. Total cost, by my calculations, would be \$146.8 million some \$50 million more than the original

The charm of the across-the-board pay hike is that it is seen as being fairer to all state workers than was Hunt's original proposal. The teacher and state employee increment programs are not identical. If the freeze is lifted, all teachers get a raise this year, but not all

Teachers are on a 10-step salary schedule that was instituted in 1980. No teacher has yet peaked out on that schedule. So, if the increment increases were re-instated, all teachers would have gotten a 4.8 percent raise. State employees are on a nine-step

schedule. More than 15 percent of them have reached the top of that schedule and these people won't get a raise this year if only the freeze is lifted. Also, the assembly never appropriates

enough money to give everyone a merit increase. If the lowest paid employees all get steps, only two-thirds of the state workforce would get the raises.

Everytime a higher paid employees gets one, it decreases that percentage. Emmett Burden, executive director of

the N.C. State Employees Association. estimates that 40 percent of the state employees would not get any increase next July if only the freeze is lifted.

"An across-the-board raise would be much fairer and more equitable," said Arch Laney, executive director of the N.C. State Government Employees Association, "especially since we haven't had anything in terms of a raise in two

State employees last got a raise - 5 percent - in January 1982. But, six months later they learned that the merit program was being frozen because of that year's fiscal crunch.

John Dornan, executive director of the N.C. Association of Educators, says both plans mean the same money for individual teachers. But, with an across-theboard raise, base salaries would rise.

That would be better in the long run, it would make teaching more attractive to beginners and give experienced teachers greater earning potential. NCAE favors

Going to a across-the-board raise would represent a change of heart for Hunt. He's said he favors reimplementation of the step increses because they reward productivity. But there's strong feeling in the Legislature that it would be unfair to do nothing more than lift the freeze.

Hunt worries that if the freeze is not lifted this year, the merit increse program could lose its hallowed place in the budget. Go two years without it and it can no longer be considered an automatic element of the budget every year. Burden and Lanev share that concern but they think the program can wait another year, if it means getting a raise for all state employees.

Wallace Prefers Mondale

MONTGOMERY, Ala. - Reflecting the depth of change in Deep South politics, an intimate of Gov. George C. Wallace was asked which current Democratic presidential hopeful would appeal most to

the old 'segregationist's current constituency and replied: Fritz Mondale! Wallace and Mondale indeed share the same left-ofcenter coalition currently dominant in Alabama Democratic politics. That makes unlikely in the extreme Wallace's endorsement of Sen. John Glenn, help that some insiders here think might be necessary to overcome

Mondale's organizational head start.

This judgment seems extreme, but Glenn is in for the fight of his life against Mondale in Alabama's presidential primary March 13, one of at least 11 primaries on that "super-Tuesday" that might well determine the nominee Glenn's Southern Strategy, predicated on the theory that the ex-astronaut's more conservative image will automatically prevail in the old Confederacy, collides with leftward impact of black voting in the desegregated New South.

Glenn's prospects in Alabama had seemed particularly bright to his managers considering the influence here of one of his supporters back home in Ohio: Marvin Warner, a Cincinnati business tycoon who was Jimmy carter's ambassador to Switzerland. A native of Birmingham, Warner attended the University of Alabama with some of the state's prominent figures - such as Gen. Taylor Hardin, a key aide to Wallace in his glory days as governor.

Harden has been pushing Glenn in Alabama But an even more influential Warner schoolmate, George Corley Wallace, has not. "Who would pay any attention if I did endorse anybody?" he said, when we asked during an interview in his capitol office whether he would endorse anybody for president. Wallace, who once delighted in mimicking and ridiculing liberal Democratic politicians. would not rise to the bait when we asked him his opinion of current hopefuls.

While Wallace was eager to discuss with us such international problems as the Third World debt overhang ("I warned against that, you'll remember,' he said), the only presidential campaigns he wanted to talk about were those of 1964, 1968 and 1972 in which he was a dramatic participant. That Wallace will keep hands off the campaign of 1984 may be the oddest but is surely the safest forecast in today's Alabama politics.

If he has a personal preference for president, it is not Glenn but an old colleague and darkest of dark horees: Florida's former governor, Reubin Askew. Beyond sentiment, however, Wallace is running with political horses not faintly similar to his old American Independent Party

Wallace is allied with a four-pronged coalition — labor, school teachers, blacks and trial lawyers - that opposes the business interests on vital tax questions; in our interview, Wallace complained about the "businessman's greed." With the race issue no longer an obsession, he has returned to his left-populist roots. Hence the confident appraisal by his intimate: Wallace and Mondale have the same constituency.

mainstream Alabama Democratic politician assumed two months ago that Glenn is more to Alabama's taste than Mondale. He consequently contributed \$250 to the senator's campaign. To his surprise, he and several other Glenn contributors were not invited to a cocktail party marking the senator's visit to Montgomery (one of the minor but damaging mistakes now legendary in the Glenn campaign).



NEW YORK (AP) - A juror said there was "never a question of guilt" for a man convicted of slaying a federal witness and three CBS technicians and conspiring to murder another person in what prosecutors said was an effort to cover up a massive

Donald Nash, 47, of Keansburg, N.J., displayed no emotion as he was convicted Tuesday of four cold-blooded slayings on a lonely New York City pier, gunning down Margaret Barbera, 38, and the three CBS employees who came to her aid on April 12, 1982.

"It was never a question of guilt. It was just the degree of guilt." said juror said juror Raymond Coletti after the Manhattan Supreme Court panel convicted Nash follow-

ing an eight-week trial. The technicians gunned down at the parking lot atop Pier 92 in Manhattan were Edward Benford of Hawthorne, Leo Kuranuki of Great Neck, and Robert

Schulze of Clifton, N.J. The jury, which deliberated for 13 hours over two days, also found Nash guilty of conspiring to kill Miss Barbera's friend and coworker, Jenny Soo Chin, a 46-year-old Teaneck, N.J., woman who disappeared on Jan. 5, 1982, and is presumed

dead. Nash faces a sentence of 25 years to life on each of the four murder convictions, and up to 25 years on the conspiracy count. He is to be sentenced by Justice Clifford A. Scott on June 22

Defense attorney Lawrence Hochheiser, who said he felt "terribly shaken" as the verdict was announced, told reporters it would be appealed. He had called only one defense witness, an eye doctor, arguing that Nash's poor eyesight made it unlikely that anyone would hire him as a hit man. He also questioned the validity of the prosecution's

forensic evidence Hochheiser said Nash told him, "You did the best you



Impolite Defendant Has Plea Rejected By Judge

HOUSTON (AP) — A judge who jailed one teen-ager who failed to call him "sir" now has refused to accept a plea bargain for a woman accused of welfare fraud. because she made the same omission.

State District Judge Michael McSpadden refused Tuesday to accept Sandra Thomas' guilty plea even though attorneys for the state and the defense had agreed on conditions of a plea bargain. Under that arrangement, Ms. Thomas would have been sentenced to four years probation and ordered to pay the state \$892.

McSpadden said the woman answered several questions "Yes" and "No" and that he repeatedly admonished her to add "sir" to her answers.

"When you're asking me for probation, I want you to show me some respect." MeSpadden said he told the woman. He said she answered another question "yes," and he refused to accept her plea and set a trial date for June 27.

"We'll just let a jury decide this case." McSpadden said. "It will be interesting to see what they might do with a welfare fraud."

Assistant District Attorney Bill Miller said he would not comment. "I don't want to fan the fires" he said.

Defense attorney Vincent Musachia said he had warned Ms. Thomas to call McSpadden "sir."

Buyers See Continued Economic Improvement

NEW YORK (AP) — The economy will continue improving over the next 12 months amid a "slight or moderate" increase in prices, corporate purchasing managers said in a survey released today.

Fifty-nine percent of the managers said they expect the current quarter to be stronger than the first quarter, compared with 9 percent who think it will be worse, and seven of 10 managers predicted improvement again during the second half of the year, the National Association of Purchasing Management said.

The association represents those who buy equipment and supplies for companies, and the latest survey queried

managers at 250 corporations

Sixty-four percent of the managers said they see price increases during the rest of the year, while only 1 percent expect lower prices. Last November, only 29 percent of the purchasing agents predicted higher prices.

The higher prices will be across the board, according to 22 percent of the agents, while 78 percent "see only selective changes," the association said.


Despite expectations of an improving economy, the purchasing managers reported only a moderate increase so far in production.

Eleven percent said their companies were operating at less than 50 percent of capacity. That was down

from 19 percent last November, but above the 9 percent who reported such factory utilization in May 1982 and the 5 percent in November 1981.

The agents surveyed also could not report a boom in capital spending this year.

Thirty-three percent said their companies will spend more for capital programs, such as new plant and equipment, in 1983, but 40 percent said their firms will spend less than in 1982.

MENTOR, Ohio (AP) — Daniel Zivko didn't know much about wine, but he seemed to recall "they made good wine in Bordeaux." So he bought a dusty collection of bottles for \$500 which may turn into a \$40,000 windfall.

Zivko and his wife went to a sale of furnishings at the mansion of Edward W. Moore in Kirtland last fall, hoping to pick up some art objects at reasonable prices.

A wine expert was reported to have appraised the wine and liquor collection, including about 880 bottles of wine, at \$700. Zivko, who works for a subcontractor doing energy audits,

picked up one bottle marked Haut Sauternes 1912 Bordeaux.
"I pulled it out of the case and held it to the light," he recalls. 'It was a light amber color and gleamed like a topaz.

"The Haut Sauternes meant nothing to me, but from somewhere in the back of my mind, I recalled that they made good wine in Bordeaux."

He offered \$450 for the collection, and was talked up to \$500.

The Zivkos took about 100 of the bottles home with them, stopping along the way to buy a couple of wine books.


Among the bottles was an 1899 Chateau Haut-Brion. That

Reagan Calls MX Vote 'Wise Step' For America

Lobbying hard for votes, President Reagan scored a major legislative victory by persuading the Demo-cratic-controlled House to approve funds to develop the 10-warhead MX missile.

Reagan called Tuesday's 239-186 House vote a "wise, courageous step forward for America" that tells the world 'Americans are uniting in a common search to protect our security, reduce the level of nuclear weapons and strengthen the peace.

The Republican-controlled Senate was scheduled to vote today on MX development funds. In a test of sentiment, Senators voted 59-35 Tuesday to kill a Democratic attempt to delay an MX decision until Reagan agrees to a basing plan to make the weapon less vulnerable to a Soviet attack.

Critics say the MX would be vulnerable to Soviet attack and destabilize the arms race. Reagan argued the MX is needed as a bargaining chip in arms negotiations with the Soviets.

Extensive lobbying by Reagan was credited by MX supporters and critics alike with persuading the House to reverse its 245-176 vote of last December against the

Key Team For 1984 Olympics

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) - One of the teams expected at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles will not run, jump, swim or compete in any contest, yet will play a key role.

According to the publication MIS Week, there will be a team of some 450 technicians whose duties during the 16-day event will be to handle regular telephone service, the broadcasting of video and audio signals to 3 billion people in 160 countries, and the teletyping of data, and teleconferencing - all using digital fiberoptic cable at nine venues in the Los

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) -Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins, trying to become Kentucky's first woman governor, narrowly captured the Democratic gubernatorial primary to set up a campaign against former major league baseball pitcher Jim Bunning.

With more than 600,000 Democratic votes from Tuesday's election counted by early today, Mrs. Collins a former schoolteacher had an 11.519-vote lead over Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloane, making his second successive attempt for the state's top office.

Bunning, a state senator who was supported by the state and national Republican parties, swept his primary against feeble opover many opponents by pledging his commitment to arms control

Reagan won another legislative round as the Senate Finance Committee voted 11-7 to approve his bill to give tuition tax credits for parents of private school pupils. The measure would eventually allow a credit of up to \$300 a year for each private school pupil.

The panel also voted 11-5 to raise the government's debt ceiling another \$100 billion to \$1.389 trillion. Treasury officials say the increased borrowing authority, which has passed the House, is needed because the current debt limit of \$1.29 trillion will be reached at month's end.

Acknowledging that the measure's fate was unclear. Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker, R-Tenn., warned there would not be a Memorial Day recess unless a debt ceiling bill was approved.

The Finance Committee was also planning today to vote to repeal a law requiring the withholding of taxes from interest and dividends starting July 1.

On the other side of Capitol Hill, the House Appropriations Committee cut \$240 million from the first appropriation bill for 1984 before sending the bill to the House The cuts were approved in response to threats of a presidential veto.

The \$14.29 billion measure would provide funds for the Energy Department, Army Corps of Engineers, Bureau of Reclamation and eight smaller agencies including the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Tennessee Valley Authority.

approved a \$54.19 billion spending bill for the Department of Housing and Urban Development and 17 other independent agencies. including the Environmental Protection Agency and National Aeronautics and Space

Administration. The full House, however, is expected to add \$4.6 billion to the measure for revenue sharing with local governments that was not included in the version approved by the Appropriations Committee.

A measure to establish a state-federal health insurance program for the unem ployed won approval of the House Energy and Commerce Committee and headed to the full House with broad bi-partisan support.

States choosing to participate would receive matching federal payments that depended on a state's unemployment rate. Jobless workers who enrolled would pay a premium of 2 percent of their weekly unemployment check.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee, meanwhile, approved former Florida Sen. Richard Stone's nomination to be Reagan's special ambassador to Central America. Gen. Paul X. Kelley won approval from the Senate Armed Services Committee to be the new Marine Corps. commandant. Both nominations now go to the full Senate.























Court's Ruling To Mean **Less Money For Schools**

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Supreme Court, accused by university president Bob Jones III of murdering religious freedom, may have dealt a death blow to some religious schools.

The nation's highest court repudiated the Reagan administration's legal views Tuesday, ruling by an 8-1 vote that the federal government rightly denied tax breaks to racially discriminatory schools.

The government has a fundamental, overriding interest in eradicating racial discrimination in education discrimination that prevailed with official approval for the first 165 years of this nation's history," Chief Justice Warren E. Burger

wrote. Burger said the administration was wrong when it told the Internal Revenue Service to stop withholding tax-exempt status for such private

President Reagan, asked at a White House ceremony about the ruling, said, "We will obey the law.

Tuesday's decision is a serious blow to many private schools that depend heavily on tax-deductible contribu-

The high court had been told that without such special tax treatment, many religiously affiliated schools would have to close down.

President Reagan had explained the administration's break from a 13-year IRS policy as an attempt to rein in bureaucracy, not to promote racism. Administration lawyers said Congress never authorized the IRS to combat racial bias by denying tax breaks.

With only Justice William H. Rehnquist dissenting, the Supreme Court said the administration was wrong. Such tax-exempt status properly was denied Bob Jones University in Greenville, S.C., and the Goldsboro Christian Schools in Goldsboro, N.C., the court

Bob Jones University bars interracial dating and mar-riages for its students, and the Goldsboro schools refuse to admit blacks. The policies are based on religious



Gary Tobacco is a division of Liggett & Myers Tobacco Co. which makes and distributes generic cigarettes. Liggett is the only major tobacco company that sells no-name cigarettes.

When Liggett introduced its generic cigarettes in black-and-white packs two years ago, market analysts predicted that the public wouldn't buy them. But in the first year, consumers spent \$130 million on generic cigarettes, making it the fastest-growing segment of the market.

Price is what convinces consumers to buy generic cigarettes, Dowd said. Generics sell for 15 cents to 20 cents less a pack than name brands or \$2 less per carton.

"The point to consider is that the industry price structure is substantially higher than in years past, making cigarette discounts more meaningful," said John Maxwell Jr. of Lehman Brothers Kuhn Loeb Research in New York.

In 1980, 12,000 stores across the country sold Gary's generic cigarettes. The generics currently are carried by more than 32,000 supermarkets, 15,000 convenience stores, 12,000 selfservice gas stations and thousands of massmerchandising outlets such as K-Mart.

Dowd said he expects the quality of generic cigarettes to keep customers coming back. He said only top-grade tobacco goes into the generics, which are produced through the same process as other Liggett brands

buying generics if they like the taste, and that's what we're counting on to keep our sales up," he said.

Not all the no-name brands are packaged in a black-and-white box. The "Price-Breaker" brand Gary produces for the Winn Dixie supermarket chain comes in yellow-and-red pack. 'Scotch Buy' cigarettes made for Safeway convenience stores are packaged in red, green and white.

Gary can sell its generic cigarettes for less because its advertising budget is low Last year, the company spent nothing on ads for generics.

Jaycees Cover Jamscam Debts

The North Carolina Jaycees have raised \$135,000 in contributions and pledges to cover funds owed to the Jaycees' charitable foundation from the Jamscam scandal, club officials said Tuesday

"It really speaks highly of the integrity of the organization and its members." state Jaycees executive vice president Jerry Wall said in a telephone interview from Asheboro. None of these fellows were involved in the thing. But the name of the organization was at stake.

State Bureau of Investigation had determined that \$153,500 was owed to the Jaycees' charitable foundation. The debt resulted when money was diverted for the use of some Jaycee leaders who created phony chapters and members to enhance their reputations in the national

Wall said bonds and insurance took care of some of the money owed, but that the Jaycees had to raise \$135,000 over three years. All but \$25,000 had been raised by Saturday, when the organization held its state convention in Winston

During the meeting, dozens of Jaycees came forward to pledge and contribute money from their own pockets, he said. More money came from former members.

But Wall said the Jaycees won't consider the debt repaid until all the pledges are paid in two to three weeks - about \$15,000 to \$17,000 worth.

Health Center Adds New Counselor

Recently returned to Greenville after a 10-year absence, Nan Barber is a new substance abuse counselor with the Pitt County Mental Health Center

A Greenville native, she has worked for the past several years as a social worker in Chattanooga, Tenn. Much of her adult life here was spent as a teller with Wachovia Bank. States See **Treasuries** At Low Ebb

WASHINGTON (AP) -Despite signs that a national economic recovery is gaining momentum, state treasuries will end this fiscal year at an all-time low, the National Governors' Association said today.

"Fiscal 1983 state budget balances are expected to total less than one-half billion dollars, or two-tenths of 1 percent of current expenditures; state spending has slowed dramatically; and few states are expecting big revenue gains in 1984," a report by the association said.

The same survey also found that for this fiscal year, which ends for most states June 30, the balance for all 50 states will total \$345 million.

If Texas, an energy rich state and the only one with a large surplus, were excluded from the aggregate, however, the national picture would be a net deficit.

The \$345 million surplus for the fiscal year now nearing an end compares to more than \$11 billion just three years ago.

Despite laws or state constitutions that forbid operating budget deficits, seven states now expect to end the year in the red. These are California, Connecticut, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Vermont and Wisconsin. Their combined deficits are expected to total \$1.4 billion.

Accord Near On DUI Package

After wrangling for weeks, legislative negotiators are on the brink of reaching a compromise version of Gov. Jim Hunt's program to combat drunken driving, lawmakers say.

Sen. Henson Barnes, D-Wayne, co-chairman of a joint conference committee working on the bill, said Tuesday the Senate panel members had formed a proposal on three of five points still separating the House and Senate versions including the controversial dram shop portion.

Senate conferees were to

remaining two differences. If they finish, they might submit their proposals to the House delegation later today.

Barnes said that discussions on a compromise, which had ground to a near halt, have picked up steam under pressure from Hunt and Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green. Hunt met with Barnes and Lancaster last week, while Green attended the Senate delegation's meeting Tues-

Green said in an interview he told the group it was "time to do it (get finished), and they agreed.

"We're mighty close," said Barnes. "Probably within a few days ... we'll be through.

Both versions of Hunt's bill would replace driving under the influence and lesser related offenses with the new charge of driving while impaired. Sentencing would follow a separate hearing and be in accordance with a formula matching punishment with circumstances surrounding individual

Both bills would raise the minimum age for drinking beer and wine from 18 to 19.

The bills would allow immediate, 10-day license revocation for any driver with a blood alcohol content of 0.10 or higher, and convicted drunken drivers could lose their licenses for one year. Cars could be impounded if the owner is caught driving drunk after an earlier DWI conviction.

Sudanese and 48 were Egyptians. The steamer, an old vessel owned by the Nile Valley Co., a joint Egyptian-Sudanese firm, left Aswan on Monday for the 200-mile voyage to Wadi Halfa, a Sudanese river port just south of the border, the sources said

Shortly after 3 a.m. today (8 p.m. Tuesday EDT), they said, fire broke out on board, gutting the steamer and causing it to sink.

The sources said the ship went down about two miles south of the famous Abu Simbel temples of ancient Egyptian Pharaoh Ramses

The area where it sank, the sources said, was infested with crocodiles.

Abu Simbel is about 150 miles south of Aswan.

The steamer was named 10 Ramadan, after the lunar Moslem calender date of the start of the 1973 Arab-Israeli war, which at the time coincided with Oct. 6. Ramadan is the Moslem holy month of fasting.

The disaster coincided with an important event in relations between Egypt and Sudan the inauguration today in Khartoum, Sudan's capital, of a joint parliament of 60 Egyptians and 60 Sudanese.

The joint parliament was formed in accordance with a charter the two countries signed last October outlining a 10-year program of policy coordination.

Mrs. Meeks said that while the city's fund balance (cash on hand) is not considered a revenue, it was necessary to appropriate \$122,455 of the total in order to balance the new budget. An appropriation of nearly \$460,000 from the fund balance was projected last May to help balance the current

The city manager said that capital outlay equipment is recommended to be funded at basically the same level as the current year, with funding expected to be channeled through anticipated revenue sharing allocations. She said if the program is not re-enacted, the capital outlay expenses will have to be deferred until other funds become available

Mrs. Meeks pointed to some "pressing capital improve-ment needs" that should be addressed this year. She recommended that these needs be met through the sale fo net-debt reduction bonds, which are allowed by general statutes. She said it appears the city would be able to issue approximately \$942,390 in net-debt reduction bonds during the new fiscal year

Programs recommended for funding through the issuance of bonds include replacement of the Hooker Road bridge (129,000), Fifth Street and Rock Springs Road bridge repairs (\$25,000), cemetery land (\$100,000), a fire-rescue communications system (\$128,000), fire-rescue substation land acquisition (\$90,000), and fire-rescue headquarters land acquisition (\$110,000)

The city and Pitt County jointly fund the operation of Sheppard Memorial Library and the Pitt-Greenville Airport The city's proposed contribution to Sheppard, budgeted out the revenue sharing trust fund, is \$279,021. An appropriation of \$30,000 is projected for the airport.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average rose 18.\$8, for its best daily showing since April 26, when it climbed 22.25

Gainers led losers by more than 5 to 2 on the NYSE

Big Board volume swelled to 109.85 million shares from 84.96 million in the previous

Both the NYSE's composite index, up 1.19 at 95.58, and the American Stock Exchange market value index, up 6.50 at 458.60, reached record highs.

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Opposition politician Kim Young-sam has vowed to continue his week-old hunger strike to back demands for democratic reforms, even though he was forcibly taken from his home to a hospital by a score of policemen,

Sources said Kim, who began his fast May 18, refused to undergo medical examinations, including blood and urine tests, and declined to take injections. The sources, who asked not to be identified, said the 55-yearold Kim also insisted he would continue to refuse

Kim's wife earlier had reported 20 to 30 plainclothes police agents entered their home in Seoul this morning and demanded he get into an ambulance to go to a hospital. She said that after an hour of arguing, her husband was carried out and taken to Seoul National University Hospital.



Sources had reported he was taking only water and salt and that his weight had dropped by from 143 pounds to 127 pounds. He also was reported to have been running a temperature, suffering headaches and weakness in

Safety Footwear Increasing

NEW YORK (AP) Every morning, nearly 6 million Americans go off to work with secret defensive weapons hidden in their shoes - in men's shoes, women's shoes, black wing tips, cowboy boots, laced high-tops, loafers, oxfords and sneakers.

Concealed daggers? No. James Bond devices? Wrong

They're steel safety toes. Better than anything "007" could invent, these invisible steel shields built into dressy, casual and rugged footwear are "weapons" to defend people against on-the-job foot injuries

Since 1970, the use of safety shoes in the United States has increased over 250 percent, according to The Footwear Council. The rise is partly due to requirements of the U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), founded in 1970 OSHA has mandated safety shoes in more industries than before.

As an example of safety gains, the New York State Workmen's Compensation Board reports that in 1979 (the latest available data year) leg-injury cases involving feet were 8 percent lower than in 1970.

Foot injuries actually have declined far more, believes Dr. Samuel Heller, Board's Chairman of Podiatry Practices, because "With safety shoes, accidents that might have seriously injured feet now result only in minor bruises, which may not even be reported.

Besides OSHA another major factor in increased safety shoe usage is the great progress in styling, The Footwear Council points

At one time, all safety shoes were clunky high-tops with rigid soles, weighing a ton and looking it. Now manufacturing innovations have made possible more flexible soles, and uppers in current fashions. Workers prefer safety shoes that are styled like footwear they wear off the job.

This is confirmed by Republic Steel Safety Director Patrick J. O'Neal. "Our steel operations still require the heaviest-duty models," he notes, "but in the fabrication divisions and for guards and health workers, we approve safety shoes in many modern styles, and they're very popular, particularly with the fashion-conscious young peo-

It's not only men who've begun protecting their feet in style. Women moving into OSHA-regulated jobs are spurring demand for oxford, moccasin, and sneaker-style safety shoes, the Council notes

People also are increasingly wearing safety shoes while doing home chores such as mowing lawns, chopping wood, or do-it-yourself construction projects.

"We encourage employees to wear safety shoes for such jobs," says O'Neal, "because we believe safety is a 24-hour concern. I always wear safety shoes

myself when cutting grass.' The extra protection can keep a tool malfunction or a toppling pile of bricks from causing injury, and the price and styling of the footwear are comparable to other casual shoes. The usual price range is from \$25 to \$60, and has remained stable in the past several years, the

Council reports. During manufacture, the protection is built not only into the toe-box, but the sole and other areas. Specialized safeguards are provided in shoes tailored for every industry from lumbering to oil.

Seven-Up Co. today launched a nationwide advertising campaign declaring that unlike most soft drinks, 7-Up has no artificial color or flavor and "never will."

In the broadcast and print ads. competitors are named and products displayed as containing either, or some combination of, caffeine, artificial color and artificial flavoring

Coca-Cola Co. said it would fight Seven-Up's campaign. Pensico In. had no comment.

The reaction was similar a year ago when Seven-Up set the intensely competitive \$16 billion soft drink industry in tumult with the debut of its campaign that 7-Up contains no caffeine: "Never did. Never will.

The makers of Coke. Pepsi and most other soft-drink producers accused Seven-Up of trading on the controversy over health aspects of caffeine but within months every industry producer had come up with a caffeine-free cola.

Tuesday, in what Seven Up called "Soft Drink Wars, Part II," it boiled over again.

Coke informed its bottlers and field personnel nationwide that it was developing a marketing strategy to confront Seven-Up's "in-'sidious' campaign to raise dark questions about the quality and pureness of its competitors' products.

Pepsico's response was 'no comment.' from spokeswoman Rebecca Madeira. "We're going to concentrate on selling our products," she said.



Smoke Detectors Recalled

WASHINGTON (AP) Honeywell Inc. is voluntarily recalling more than 770,000 battery-operated smoke detectors that may not sound an alarm when smoke is present, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said

The Minnesota-based company said the alarms may not work correctly because of problems in the circuit board mounting, although they may sound when

the test button is pushed. The company is asking consumers to return detectors with model numbers TC89B and TC89C that have this defect. Because Honeywell no longer makes residential smoke detectors, the company will replace returned units with a comparable model produced by another manufacturer.

Honeywell produced the affected smoke detectors in 1977 and 1978. Sold nationally and in Canada, the detectors carry the model numbers TC89B and TC89C and have a date code between 7601 and 7820. The model numbers and date codes are found under the smoke detector cover on a piece of gray cardboard.

Honeywell recommended that consumers check the battery and then determine whether the smoke detector is working properly by using an extinguished candle to create smoke. If the detector does not sound in the presence of smoke, consumers should contact Honeywell at its toll-free number, 800-328-8194, or write to Honeywell Consumer Af-8941 10th Avenue North, Golden Valley, Minn.,

Chanceller Plans Take Year's Leave

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) - Dr. Robert C. Suderburg will step down, at least temporarily, as the chancellor of the North Carolina School of the Arts this fall.

Officially, Suderburg is taking a year's leave of absence, but he said Tuesday that he may not return to the arts school. William C. Friday, the president of the University of North Carolina system, said he will recommend at a meeting of the university's Board of Governors on June 10 that the leave be granted

Friday said that an acting chancellor, chosen from within the university system, will be named before Sept. 1 to run the arts school while Suderburg is away

Suderburg is leaving at a time when the school is coming under increasing financial pressures. The school has been burdened by a \$2 million debt on its new theater, the Roger L. Stevens Center for the Performing Arts. The school has virtually exhausted local sources of funds for the center, which opened a month ago

Suderburg, who is a composer, said yesterday that he wants the time off to work on hismusic and to reassess his caree

A Review Film Is Satire Out Of Control

For 20 years the mad members of the Monty Python troupe have outraged and entertained audiences in both Britain and the United States. The talents of Graham Chapman, Terry Gilliam, Eric Idle, John Cleese and Michael Palin often mixed perfectly to spoof all subjects great and small.


In "The Meaning of Life," now playing at the Buccaneer Movies, Monty Python assaults philosophy, religion, education, sex and the insurance industry. Unfortunately the attack is only party successful

Monty Python's humor is like Tabasco sauce; you either like it or you don't. I usually do, but it is best appreciated in small doses. The short satirical skit has always been the most successful format for the antics of Monty Python. Viewers could put up with dead moments while anticipating a rapid return to humor. In only two feature-length films has Monty Python's humor been sustained, "Monty Python and the Holy Grail' and "Life of Brian" used short comic episodes but were themetically controlled movies. "The Meaning of Life" is not

Comedy is often subversive; it forces us to look at our behavior and beliefs and see the absurdities which underlie them. Comedy is often crude and at times obscene, but to be effective it must be controlled. "The Meaning of Life" is a prime example of satire out of control

The idea behind the film is promising. In attempting to answer the great philosophical question of what life is all about the Monty Python members have resurrected the metaphor of the ages of man and devised short episodes on birth, growth and learning, fighting, middle age, the autumn years, and death. Some of the scenes are genuinely funny, combining wit and comic madness. Most, however, degenerate into crude farce.

The most successful episodes deal with birth and death. In "Birth and the Third World" serious re-

The problem is that nothing else works completely. Individual sequences begin well but often become exercises in gratuitous obscenity and nudity. We are even treated to a five minute

sketch about vomiting. I find nothing wrong with a comic's use of obscenity, nudity, or even vomiting for that matter, if the use has a

purpose. Too often in "The

Meaning of Life" it does not. The movie is like the little girl with a curl in the middle of her forehead, when it is good it is very, very good; when it is bad it is horrid.



That warmth was their success, and the program's cancelation by two networks in two seasons can't take it

When the meter stops ticking tonight, the program that won the Emmy for best comedy three years in a row will be replaced by "Buffalo Bill," about an egotistical talk-show host on a television station in Buffalo, N.Y.

This time, the closing notice will stick. NBC salvaged "Taxi" from ABC's scrapheap after the 1981-82 season, but the producers now have gone off to different projects. Weinberger

and his partner, Stan Daniels, have created a new comedy, "Mr. Smith," about a talking orangutan. It will be on NBC's fall schedule on Friday night.

There was quite a furor when ABC canceled "Taxi" last season, thus losing its one comedy with grit and grown-up wit. The fact that it failed on NBC in three timeslots will substantiate, for some, ABC's decision. But ABC never came up with anything better in ratings, and certainly not in quality.

'NBC did what it had to do," says Weinberger. "I regret it, but I respect it. It was a business decision. They treated us fairly and gave us a shot. There's no kicking or screaming this time. We felt at least NBC

respected us. At ABC, I didn't think it mattered to them that they were canceling a quality show.'

Because of the fifth year on NBC, "Taxi" did 22 more shows and went over the magic 100-episode mark. "You want over 100 episodes when you make your syndication deal," says Wein-

Even if "Taxi" lost some fares the past few seasons, it still produced programs that were funny and touching. Precisely because life was a series of fender-benders for the oddballs in "Taxi," our lives became, by comparison, a bit brighter.

This is not to say that was consistently "Taxi" brilliant. In the past two the show took a

wrong turn whenever it showcased Latka (Andy foreign Kaufman). the grease monkey, and his alien rituals This violated the show's spirit of producing identifiable and realistic human comedy.

But, generally, "Taxi" described the human condition poignantly, better, in fact, than it depicted genuine New York cabbies. Without a black or Hispanic in the front-line cast, "Taxi" was more Hollywood's version of a New York cab company.

The only character who really resembled a hack was Alex Reiger (Judd Hirsch), a seen-it-all type with laissez-faire attitude. He also was most content to being a cabbie forever. Tony (Tony Danza) wanted to be a boxer

herself as a fashionable art dealer and Bobby (Jeff Conaway) was a New York

Conaway left the series midway but made a return visit to the garage - this time Bobby was a struggling Hollywood actor. "Anything else would have seemed phony," says Weinberger. After all, this was a show about potholes, not paved superhighways.

NBC Will Send 'Monitor' Against '60 Minutes

NEW YORK (AP) - NBC has failed against "60 Minutes" with Boomer, Walt Disney and the time-warpers


Thomas Overton Moore's story is that of a Tar Heel who made good after going far $\operatorname{South}-\operatorname{to}$ Louisiana. Born in April 1804, near the village of Turkey in Sampson County, Moore was educated in his home county a few miles south of Goldsboro before leaving at the age of 25 to live with his uncle, Walter H. Overton in Rapides Parish, La.

One of young Moore's paternal ancestors had been politically prominent. James Moore, who had emigrated form Ireland in the 1600s, had become governor of the Carolinas in 1700. On his mother's side, he was a descendant of William Overton who came to Virginia from England about 1670.

On arrival in Louisiana, Thomas Moore took over the management of his uncle's sugar plantations, and at a later date bought his own plantation which became a successful business venture

Moore was as active as a family man as he was in business and politics. In 1830 he married Bethiah Jane Leonard and fathered five children.

After serving in the political arena in Rapides Parish for a number of years, Moore was elected to the Louisiana State House of Representatives in 1848. His political rise thereafter was fairly rapid - he was elected to the Louisiana Senate in

1856 and in 1859 won his Democratic ticket race for the state's governor despite being opposed by another popular Democrat. Thomas J. Wells.

According to the Dictionary of American Biography, Moore was "in disposition fiery and inclined to be exacting and uncompromising, (but) nevertheless a thorough politician who played the political game with great zest and

Typical of his zest for taking action was his decision early in 1861 to order state trops to take Forts Jackson and St. Philip on the Mississippi River below New Orleans, as well as Fort Pike on the Rigolets and the barracks and arsenal at Baton Rouge. This he did, rightly surmising that the Louisiana legislature would soon adopt a secession ordinance.


After the secession ordinance was adopted, Moore promptly took further measures to make Louisiana an active member of the Confederacy. He directed the organization of local defense companies, established supply depots, and had packing plants built in order to provide provisions for Confederate soldiers.

Confederate President Jefferson Davis asked for 3,000 troops from Louisiana - Moore in April 1861 issued a call for 5,000 troops in addition to those requested by Davis.

Following the capture of New Orleans by Federal troops in June, 1862, Moore's administration was disrupted, but Moore continued to govern central and northern Louisiana. He moved his capital from Baton Rouge to Opelousas and later to Shreveport and functioned as governor of unoccupied areas until the end of his appointed term in early 1864.

In his final days as governor, he issued strict guidelines laying down non-fraternization measures to be followed by Louisiana residents - they were forbidden to trade with the enemy, to enter Federal lines, to bear Federal passports, or to accept or use Federal money

It was at this time too, in the spring of 1864, that Moore suffered heavy personal losses. His planatation in Rapides Parish was confiscated by Federal authorities, and his home and sugar mill destroyed. In the summer of 1865, following the issuance of an arrest order, Moore fled to Havana, Cuba, the refuge point for many Confederate leaders seeking to avoid capture and trial

Eventually, through the intercession of friends, Moore, then in his early 60s, was allowed to return to Louisiana with a full pardon. Until his death in 1876, Moore spent the last decade of his life attempting to restore his plantation and to recoup his lost fortune. He never entered the political arena again, and died at age 72 on his plantation near Alexandria.

Engineers Join In Opposition To Defense Work

By FRED BAYLES Associated Press Writer

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — At an age when his friends were taking their driver's tests, Warren Davis got a top security clearance to help develop the nation's first missile warning system.

Now, after more than two decades of defense work, Davis has begun a new project, working with other engineers and scientists who don't want their skills used to create the nation's military hardware.

Davis, 41, is a founder of High Technology Professionals For Peace, a group of 300 self-described "technologists" opposed to the continuing arms race and its impact on the scientific community

The group holds regular meetings, and spreads its word to college campuses through lectures and pamphlets. It has even started its own employment agency to find non-military jobs. Two-thirds of its members live in Massachusetts, but it has members worldwide.

'You have a responsibility, like a parent giving a gun to a child," says Davis. "Technologists have been giving guns to politicians who have not used them wisely

Another member, MIT physicist Barton Lane, says the group also is concerned with the practical problems involved with defense work.

Young engineers, working within the cloister of security clearance, can find themselves out of touch and unemployable when the bubble bursts on defense spending, as it did in the early 1970s, he says.

"Graduating seniors aren't aware of the boom-and-bust nature of defense work," says Barton. "They don't realize the

implications of getting a security clearance.'

The group has written a brochure called "The Campus Defense Information Package" about the pitfalls of defense work. It is being distributed on 500 college campuses.

Davis, who now works as a consultant in medical research, also gets the message across by speaking at college campuses. He draws from his own experience.

A high school junior when the Soviet Union launched its

first Sputnik, Davis was enrolled in a special Ford Foundation program for bright, young science students

After a summer of intensive classroom training, Davis was given a part-time job with a defense contractor working on a missile early warning system.

"It was heady stuff," he recalls. "We got the feeling the Soviets were way ahead of us and we were the vanguard that was meant to catch up with them.

Davis earned a doctorate in physics and worked on the Polaris, Poseidon and Minuteman II missiles, but became disillusioned about the research, which he says is creating more sophisticated weapons to do battle with other advanced

"If war breaks out, it may be well that most of the population in this country will be dead by the time the computers carry out the war," he says.

Davis said he got the idea to form the group when he was looking for a job.

"A friend who was working for GTE told me he would get \$1,000 in his pocket for bringing me in," he said. "It was for the MX missile and I became very upset about it. I decided I would like to go to GTE and wave a \$1,000 bill in front of some engineers and get them to leave."

Instead, Davis and a dozen collegues formed High Technology Professionals in 1981, holding meetings every other week that a member describes as "group therapy

"If you're working on the MX missile at AVCO (a Wilmington, Mass., firm) you certainly aren't going to be talking to people there about your doubts," said one member who asked not to be identified. "It helps to talk about this with other people who have changed their careers.

The organization also set up an employment agency to find members jobs outside the defense industry, but it has had little success, placing only one job.

Davis blames the lack of success on the current economy and the competition from defense contractors who recruit more aggressively. He worries that the defense-oriented companies may drain manpower from other firms.

He is not alone in his fears.

'There is a concern that when the defense contracts really hit, they could have a major impact on the labor market,"says B.J. Rudman, a personnel expert who has done consultant work for the Massachusetts High Technology Council, an industry organization representing high tech

Rudman says defense contractors pay more across a

spectrum of jobs. "They clearly are more competitive in the short term," he says.

Lane says the public is not aware of the pressure faced by researchers to do defense work.

"People have this view of scientists working in labs helping humanity," he says. "They don't realize a large fraction of the best technical minds are working on weapons of incredible power. This is why we are raising this dialogue.

Has One Of Border's Notorious Lockups

By NORM CLARKE Associated Press Writer TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) -The cellblock is still wet from a hosing down, but water can't cleanse the foul air - your lungs rebel at the

stench of raw sewage. Several floors above, from behind a row of bars, come anguished wails from a mentally disturbed woman.

From cell A-8, a 6-footwide cage stuffed with more than a dozen inmates, a rumpled prisoner slouched on the concrete floor calls out a welcome

"Hey, mister, how do you like our hotel?'

Moments later, a shoe flung from an upper cell hits the floor with a whack.

The Kingston Trio sang about it in the 1950s. Others have scorned its squalid conditions, less lyrically. The Tijuana jail of the 1980s has not lost its place among the most notorious lockups in North America.

Even those hardened by frequent visits to the jail, a three-tiered brick compound a block off the city's busy main street, find the conditions wrenching

"Some days you want to close your eyes to what you see, your ears to what you hear and your nose to the smell," said one of several people who regularly visit the jail but asked not to be identified for fear they would be barred from the facility.

'It has the image of being the end of the earth," said Robert Chevez, an official at the U.S. Consulate in Ti-

Ernesto Gallardo, a 38-year-old ex-police officer who became the head jailer two years ago, denied through an interpreter that prisoners were mistreated.

But a visitor noted that tiny cells designed for a few were routinely crammed with 15-20 prisoners, their arms and legs spilling through the pale green bars.

The only furnishings are old toilets, often overflowing, and corroded, dilapidated steel bunks without mattresses or springs - just sheets of iron on frames, with khaki blankets.

Only a few of the roughly 150 inmates in the jail each day have cells of their own. Most of those appear to be deranged. Some well-to-do prisoners pay for private cubicles with such amenities as television sets and curtains, according to the visi-

Tijuana, a city of almost 1 million residents, has no facility other than the jail in which to care for its mentally

Hands clenched on the bars, the screaming woman whimpered as a visitor passed her third-floor cell, its walls smeared with human waste. Across the cellblock from her was a man who stalked back and forth, glowering at anyone who met his

menacing stare. An insider said the man was homicidal and warned two visitors to stay at least an arm's length beyond the stalker's cell.

At the east end of the cellblock's second floor, below a large opening lined with bars, foot-long potato sprouts in a crude garden reached for the morning sun. Several shriveled potatoes were left behind in the freshly dug soil.

According to one of the frequent visitors, the potatoes, skins and all, are boiled in a soup served almost every day at the single meal provided by the jailers. Loathed by the prisoners, the potatoes are often slopped on the cell floor.

The prison diet is supplemented by other food brought in by charity groups. The inmates drink water from a plastic jug issued to each cell.

In 1982, a total of 612 Americans were arrested in Baja California. Of that the arrests occurred in Ti-

For most Americans, the stay is a short one, usually no more than 48 hours. But that's an eternity for some.

"Americans who end up in there are generally very happy to see us," said

Weekends are the busiest. "We bail out 12-15 Americans on a rough Saturday night,' the consular official said. Most are jailed for being drunk and disorderly, which carries a \$3.50 fine.

Jailed Americans are usually treated "fairly decent," he said.

"I'm sure there are a lot of incidents we don't hear about for many reasons - fear among them," he added.

Gallardo complained that the jail received undeserved bad publicity because of the nearby state prison, where prisoners have accused guards of torture methods that include spraying pressurized water up their

Gallardo acknowledged a need for more space and improvements. "We would like to clean up the place. We, would like more food, better food, but we don't have the funds," he said.

Perhaps, he said, when the new state prison is com-pleted near Tecate, the jail might gain additional quarters. But, because of Mexico's failing economy, the jail - like the inmates in

Corporate Sex **Barriers Dropping**

STANFORD, Conn. (AP) - Women already have a firm foothold in corporate and institutional management and may eventually dominate in such posts, believes an expert in the field of issues and policy management.

Women who are skilled in public policy, strategic planning, risk assessment and the communications arts are well placed to outflank their more traditional male counterparts," says W. Howard Chase, editor of Corporate Public Issues and Their Management.

'The evidence is all around us,' adds Chase, who is also co-founder and chairman of the Issues Management Association, whose president is a woman, Dr. Madeleine

Salaries for talented issue-policy managers range from \$35,000 at entry level to as high as \$200,000, according to Chase. And there is no salary discrimination against women in the field, he says, citing several reasons

There are almost as many women as men in the Public Policy graduate schools, and their proportion is growing," he points out. "Ten years ago there were three men for every woman in graduate schools of business administration. Today almost 50 percent of the MBA candidates are women.

'But probably the most important reason for potential female dominance of the issues management field is that they are less troubled by shibboleths of past traditional practices than men," Chase says. "Since men have held most of the executive posts in public affairs, public relations and communications, they frequently take dominance for granted and tend to be intolerant of innovative practices such as issue management disciplines.

'As major companies move toward the concept that there are only two major functions - the management of profit and the management of public policy, integrated by strategic planning — there will be great opportunity for women to move into the vacuum of leadership created by male traditionalists," Chase predicts

English Canadian Children Get All-Day Introduction To French

TORONTO (AP) - More and more English Canadian children are going to school in French - immersed in the language all day long - with study in their native tongue put off at least until fourth grade.

To the delight of those who have pioneered and pushed French immersion schooling for more than 15 years, the children who took part in the experiments seem to learn history, mathematics and science just as well as students in traditional programs.

More surprising, their performance in English rates higher than that of children taught in English from the start.

"It's quite clear from the results of the research that you can have what you would normally get out of an English-only education, plus you learn French," says Merrill Swain, head of the Modern Language Center at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education and co-author of a recent book that surveys Canadian research on immersion schooling.

"A lot of people who would have been afraid to try something as drastic as immersion programs seemed to be 10 years ago are no longer afraid of it," she said in an interview.

There is certainly no fear among the first-graders clustered around teacher Ginette Giroux and an apple-cheeked youngster named Daniel in a French-language version of show-and-tell at Allenby Public School in north Toronto one

Daniel is showing off a toy yellow garbage truck and responds bravely as he is peppered by questions in French from his classmates, who didn't know a word of the language until they started last year in kindergarten.

Upstairs, a fourth-grader, waving his hand to respond to a question, slips and says, "I know, I know," in English, but when called on he answers in fluent French.

French immersion schooling started in the mid 1960s in Montreal, where the English-speaking population is a minority, and spread to Ottawa, where in recent years many civil service jobs have been reserved for bilingual applicants.

But now the immersion classes are booming all over the country, even in areas where there are scarcely any native French speakers. A report by the federal Commissioner of Official Languages counted nearly 70,000 students in French immersion classes this year, including some in each of Canada's 10 provinces.

Of Canada's 24 million people, about 6 million have French as a first language and more than 16 million have English, according to the latest census.

Between 1971 and 1981, the number claiming to speak both

languages increased to 3.7 million from 2.9 million. While more than half the bilingual Canadians are native French speakers who have picked up English, the trend is toward more English Canadians learning French. The number of bilingual English speakers outside Quebec increased by 76

percent in the 10 years before 1981.

Allenby was the first school in Toronto to offer French immersion classes in 1971. The program is now available in 35 Toronto-area elementary schools

Edward Rutherford, Allenby's principal, says about two-thirds of the parents in the well-to-do neighborhood surrounding the school choose to enter their children in French immersion classes.

Normal English classes are also available. The immersion and regular students participate together in sports, choir, recess and other activities, invariably in English

French immersion students in Toronto live in an environment of English television, newspapers, signs, family

By the time they begin English studies in fourth grade, most are able to read the language as well as other fourth graders, Rutherford said, "But their writing is atrocious."

It turns out there is no cause for alarm. "They become very inventive," the principal said. "By grade 7, their written English is superior."

The research by Merrill Swain and her co-worker, Sharon Lapkin, found that students immersed in French in early grades routinely overtake pupils who study English from the

This phenomenon, they wrote, "can perhaps be explained by their knowledge of two different language systems, a knowledge which permits them to compare and contrast French and English and heightens their overall linguistic

In other subjects, such as math and science, French immersion students have about the same test scores - even when tested in English - as pupils in the regular program.





Brother Refuses To Give Up On Missing Soldier

Associated Press Writer

NEW FLORENCE, Pa. (AP) - When 1st Lt. Paul Byron Whipkey, a 26-year-old pilot and company commander, disappeared from Fort Ord, Calif., on July 10, 1958, the Army

listed him as absent without leave. In time, the Army charged him with desertion. Twenty-four

But his family refused to believe the Army. For all those years, they demanded an explanation for why the young officer had vanished so mysteriously

Then, in April 1982, the Army Board for Correction of Military Records held a three-day hearing and concluded Whipkey died the day after he disappeared.

The board's report, issued July 1, said, "His unauthorized absence ... (is) excused as unavoidable ... (and) his death was incurred in the line of duty, not due to his own misconduct.

On Aug. 26, the Army Adjutant General's office issued a certificate of honorable service and acknowledged Lt Whipkey's death, without explanation.

But Carl Whipkey will not give up. "The government knows what happened to my brother. They can't shake me of that," he says. "There are so many questions still unanswered."

Whinkey 55 a thoughtful soft cash.

Whipkey, 55, a thoughtful, soft-spoken communications technician living about 65 miles east of Pittsburgh, has accumulated thousands of government documents in his 25-year "life's work" for his brother's fate.

The continuing unknown, and his failure to pierce the Army bureaucracy, has led Whipkey to suspect the sinister, the seemingly outlandish: that his brother was a secret agent killed by fellow agents, that his aircraft was shot down over the Soviet Union, that he is suffering or has succumbed to illness from secret Army nerve gas or atomic tests of the

"I would be satisfied even if the Army would say they can't tell us for security reasons," Whipkey says. "But until then, we can't rule anything out.

By all accounts, the blond, 5-foot-8-inch Lt. Whipkey was an all-American young man and a superior officer.

He grew up in Pittsburgh's suburbs, earned a civil engineering degree and his Army commission with honors at The Pennsylvania State University in 1954 and won his Army pilot's wings and was assigned to Fort Ord in 1956.

On July 10, 1958, Lt. Whipkey told fellow officers at Fort Ord that he was "going to get a drink" in town.

A few hours later, hundreds of miles away in Mojave, Calif., Lt. Whipkey checked into a motel, said the FBI, which investigated the officer's suspected desertion after the routine 60 days had passed. The next day, July 11, Lt. Whipkey bought 14 gallons of gas in Mojave, according to the FBI findings included in the Army's 1982 report. It appears he was never heard from again.

Carl Whipkey, informed his brother was missing, said he became suspicious July 12 when he telephoned Fort Ord and was told officers were finishing a job begun July 11 - packing his brother's belongings into 11 wooden crates for shipment

'When you catch them packing up your brother's clothes one day after he disappeared, you get superhyper superquick," Whipkey says.

Five weeks later, California fish and game officers found his red and white 1956 Chevrolet in "a desolate and forbidding region" of Death Valley, according to the Army.

The car - 15, miles from the main road, 150 miles from Mojave, 400 miles from Fort Ord — was "found to be in very neat order." the Army report says, and contained Lt. Whipkey's suitcase, personal belongings and dog tags. There was no sign of the officer.

"It appears that (Lt. Whipkey) may have wandered out into the desert ... and succumbed in the extreme heat," the Army board report says, "and that the shifting sands have made it a near impossibility to find, or recover, his remains.

It is here the Army closes its public files on Lt. Whipkey Army spokeswoman Margaret Tackley recently referred an Associated Press inquiry about Lt. Whipkey to the board's eight-page report, which says that the passage of time has made it "remote, if not impossible," to "end all questions concerning (Lt. Whipkey's) disappearance.

Last week, after another AP attempt to get an official statement about the disappearance, the Army said it would have no further comment.

In June 1977. Whipkey sought information from the FBI under a Freedom of Information Act petition. In 1978, he says, the FBI told him it had destroyed field files on the case in December 1977

But Whipkey claims he has discovered an unknown, dark side to his brother's Army career.

According to Whipkey, his brother flew in five atomic test explosions in Nevada. He says he suspects his brother was exposed to radiation and, in his duties in the testing area may have seen evidence of classified experiments involving

The Army report acknowledges that Lt. Whipkey was assigned to temporary duty as a pilot at Camp Desert Rock. Nev., from July to October 1957. But it makes no mention of atomic tests and contends that "extensive investigations" failed to support Whipkey's other assertions.

The Army report does, however, confirm that soon after Lt. Whipkey's Nevada duty, he developed black moles on his body and plantar warts on his hands. His brother and the Army agree that the lieutenant complained of not feeling well, constant colds and weight loss, and that his personality changed, becoming more nervous.

And, according to Army records, several months before he disappeared Lt. Whipkey, then only 25 years old, had all his

teeth removed and was fitted with full dentures.

A retired Army lieutenant colonel, Charles Lewis of Enterprise, Ala., testified last year that he recalled two Army intelligence agents interviewing Lt. Whipkey on the Camp Desert Rock flight line during the atomic tests.

Lewis said he and other officers noted Lt. Whipkey "appeared to be nervous and uptight" after the agents left. His nervousness prevented him from flying several observation missions, Lewis said.

"Paul's actions were always ethical on and off the base," Lewis testified. "But Paul became suspiciously silent to

others when the agents were mentioned or appeared on the scene at the airfield or the officers club.'

Whipkey has gathered some support in his search for his brother's fate. Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., and Sen. Jeramiah A. Denton Jr., R-Ala., have offered to help.

Former Rep. Don Bailey, D-Pa., a Vietnam veteran, appeared before the Army board on his constituent's behalf, 'convinced there are a great many questions about what happened to a very loyal fellow officer.

The American Legion is helping Whipkey and his lawyer press their claims for almost \$14,000 in death benefits, GI

insurance, back pay and interest in the case.

"Whether it is a cover-up or just a bungled investigation, it seems to us there are still some unanswered questions," says Bob Bishop, a state American Legion officer.

The Army report acknowledges that although the FBI 'conducted a thorough investigation' into Lt. Whipkey's disappearance, the Army made "no encompassing investiga-

"Apparently," it concludes, "the responsible individuals who were aware of his disappearance on 10 July 1958 were of the opinion that he would eventually return.

Japanese Seek Computer To Solve Problems

By DAVID LAMMERS Associated Press Writer

TOKYO (AP) - Forty of Japan's top young computer scientists are beginning a 10-year national research project with a mandate to develop a new generation of computers — computers that can assess the meaning of information and figure out ways to solve problems.

The aim is to put Japan in the forefront of the worldwide race for the "Fifth Generation" computer.

Dr. Kasuhiro Fuchi, who helped build Japan's first primitive transistor tube computer in 1964, has handpicked what he calls "the 40 brightest, under 35-year-old computer scientists that I know of in Japan' for work at a new, government-funded lab in Tokyo.

All of his researchers are on loan from eight Japanese computer makers who are participating in the project. Called the Institute for New Generation Computer Technology, the research effort was organized by the Ministry of International Trade and Industry, which is spending about \$40 million for the first three years of research.

Fuchi said the first task will be to design a computer with a different internal design, or architecture, and much simpler to program. The scientists are working with a computer language called PROLOG, developed in Britain, which would ease the burden of software engineers in programming computers to perform complicated tasks, Fuchi said.

Computers designed in the post-World War II period were large and expensive. while the software, or program, was relatively simple and cheap. Today, the situation is reversed, with the software more expensive, and critical, than the hardware.

The current fourth generation computers, still in the developmental stage, can be

"It is just as convenient as buying it in jars and you can use food the rest of the family eats, with a few alterations.

"That means the baby can get used to the household's eating patterns," she added. "That's especially important in ethnic homes where they just don't cook foods like those found in the jars."

Besides paving the way for a smooth transition between pureed carrots and hearty adult meals, homemade baby food usually costs less than the commercial pro-

duct, she noted. "Until about four years ago, there was a legitimate concern that the prepared foods had too much salt in them," Mrs. Miller said. "Since then, most of the baby food manufacturers have eliminated that problem.'

programmed at great effort and expense to help doctors make diagnoses or to aid geologists in the search for valuable minerals.

These "expert" programs, and the large computerstored data banks, rudimentary voice and text recogni tion systems, computer graphics, machine translation, chess-playing programs, and other artificial intelligence developments are the building blocks of the fifth generation computer.

Fuchi, and others in terviewed here, said the strength of Japan's national project is that it will be able to pull the various strands of artificial intelligence research, very high speed 'supercomputers' and other developments into one

Getting a computer to think, or to "draw inferences," means constructing a vast system of "logic rules" which would give it a crude facsimile of human

But Japan's fifth generation project is not really expected to produce a "black box'' that resembles a human brain, Fuchi said.

A "dream" fifth generation computer could listen to a human speak about a problem, pull data out of its storehouse of knowledge, deduct and induct while solving the problem, learn from its mistakes, and voice its answer.

That is unlikely to result from this project, Fuchi

However, Japan's effort does have some lofty goals, which include a mixed bag of major challenges facing the world's computer scientists. Among these:

-A Japanese-to-English translation system with a

vocabulary of 100,000 words capable of 90 percent accu-

-A computer to play a complicated Chinese game called "Go.

-Expansion of current crude voice recognition systems so a machine could hear the voices of several different speakers.

-A computer-aided design (CAD) system that could help design and de-bug other computers. Mega-memory data

libraries that could also store at least 10,000 graphs and photographs. George Lindamood, a

computer scientist working Tokyo with the U.S. Navy's Office of Naval Research, said the project "is asking for a qualitatively different computer that would require several breakthroughs.

'But their goal, to create a

computer that the common man could input into and use, has tremendous commercial potential and is inspiring to researchers.'

The U.S. and British governments have each formed study groups to determine if they should fund similar research efforts, but it is uncertain whether either will proceed.

A U.S. official who follows high technology issues said Japan's fifth generation project is important because 'it will try to integrate the new elements in computer research into a system.

The official, who asked not to be named, added that unless Western nations launch competing projects, top Western scientists would come to Japan to participate in the fifth generation project and the Japanese would pick their brains and teach them nothing.

David Warren, a Scottish computer scientist who has worked at the SRI International in Menlo Park, Calif months of work at the fifth generation computer lab

"The Japanese are already very familiar with my research because what I've done has been published, and they've studied it thoroughly. On the other side of it they've shared their ideas with me very freely," Warren said.

He said IBM and various U.S. government-sponsored research projects are pursuing many aspects of what is included in Japan's fifth generation computer project

'However,'' he said, "there is no government project or private research effort that I know of which compares with what is going on here in Japan.



Parents Learning To Cope

By JOHN DINGMAN Associated Press Writer JACKSON, Miss. (AP) 'It's the greatest thing that's happened to me since Christina was born," said Rebecca Maynard.

She was referring to a special training program at the North Mississippi Retardation Center for parents of autistic children such as Christina.

Mrs. Maynard and Christina recently completed a three-week stay at the center, where the mother learned how to cope with the behavior of her 4-year-old daughter, and help her reach a more normal life.

The pilot program is under the direction of Matt Armstrong, with the help of Peggy Power, a speech pathologist, and Betty Danials, a special education teacher.

Armstrong says that child, and four out of the five are males. The cause is not known, nor is there any cure at the present.

Even the symptoms do not always come from autism. But, if a child shows repetitive behavior, such as rocking back and forth constantly, the possibility is there. Autistic children tend to be very self-centered; they have a limited understanding of ideas or show abnormal response to stimulus. Unusual eating habits also are a symptom.

Some of the indications come early, but they are most noticeable after about 13 months when it becomes apparent the infant is not developing normally.

That's the way it was with Mrs. Maynard and Christina. 'She was different from the beginning, and I knew something was wrong," the

Biloxi woman said. But at about 2, her daughter developed many of the classic autistic symptoms, Mrs. Maynard said, and she began to seek treatment

Until she heard of the program at the center in Oxford, Mrs. Maynard said, 'I was at a dead end and thinking of an institutional program for Christina.

Now, she said, anyone who sees the child would not notice any great abnormali-

Not that she has been cured, although Mrs. Maynard's primary joy at the moment is the fact that Christina finally has been toilet trained.

She also is learning to communicate with others to some degree, mostly through the use of a sort of sign language. Christina has learned to use word-like sounds for certain objects.

The progress is the result of the system taught at the center. Autistic children need a strict, structured management so they will learn to do the same thing properly over and over again.

The three-week course for parents is free and is funded by the state through the University Affiliated Program and by the National Society for Autistic Children.

The first week, the parents attend class and watch special education teachers at work. The second week, they work with their children under supervision of the experts, and in the third week, they care for their own children with the teachers observing and helping after the day's sessions.

Mrs. Maynard said for her, the greatest help was learning what she calls the heart of the program, getting rid of bad behavior by reinforcing the good.

Always, she said, the parent must concentrate on success, not failure. She tries not to put Christina in a situation where she knows the child will fail.

"I started with things she could do, and I am reinforcing her behavior on those,

she said "With something new, I keep a hands-on approach, placing my hands on hers and guiding her, little by little letting her do it herself," Mrs. Maynard said.

"It's a 24-hour-a-day job," Armstrong said, and the children do better if they get the continuing attention

they need.' Right now, there is little hope that autistic children will be cured and be able to lead fully normal lives, Armstrong said.

Danube Town Hears Greek

SZENTENDRE, Hungary - Greek-style music pouring out of amplifiers permeates the center of town. But the sunshine, if there is any, is nowhere near as intense as the Greek sun. The waterfront is not the Aegean or the Adriatic, but the Danube. The announcements that alternate with the music are in Hungarian.

The town is Szentendre, population 17,000, about a dozen miles upstream from Budapest.

Why the Greek music? One could chalk it up to the almost zany reality of Szentendre that makes it a sort of New York Greenwich Village on the Danube. It's a very active artists' town, with museums galore and stores

selling all kinds of craftwork. But this is also a medieval Greenwich Village, whose narrow, cobbled streets, many open only to pedestrians, baroque and rococo houses in all colors, and churches of many architectures, including the Orthodox "onion dome," carry centuries of history into the present.

The Greek music isn't as zany as one might think, either. For the Greeks played a role in the history of Szentendre, as did the Serbs, Bosnians, Dalmatians and Albanians. They all fled to the region from the advancing Turks in the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries. The Serbs particularly were a dominating influence in the town's artistic heritage, although only a handful remain in the area

Szentendre - named for the apostle St. Andrew first appears in records in 1146. The first church, we're told, was built in the 13th century. Until the early 14th century, the town was owned by the bishops of Veszprem. The people of the region grew fruit, especially grapes. But even then, some arts and crafts were produced.

In the late 19th century, blight hit the grape crop, and Szentendre turned to small industry — but also became Budapest's fruit bowl, growing a wide variety of fruit for the nearby city.

But for the average visitor, it's the center of town and the banks of the Danube that are the focus of attention.

Hungarians pour into town for a jaunt on a weekend by train or on the Danube riverboat from Budapest. Their T-shirts with legends like 'University of Georgia" and 'San Jose, California' tribute to the Greenwich Village atmosphere.

So do all the handicrafts for sale, including those draped across the front steps and front door of one of the famous churches. And so does the fact that people spend so much of their time just walking around and looking — and, of course, eating. The restaurants tucked into the baroque houses often have back yards for dining al fresco, and serve Greek and Serbian as well as traditional Hungarian cuisine

A band may set itself up outside one of the eateries. And on summer evenings, there may be an outdoor play on the main square.

The visitor seeking to get away from the bustle can go

into one of the churches or museums, including the Serbian Orthodox Cathedral

and the Greek Orthodox Church. One museum is a collection of Serbian ecclesiastical art. Others give a good idea of how Hungarian artists reacted to such movements as impressionism And perhaps the most popular museum is the home of the Hungarian ceramics artist Margit Kovacs, who

died in 1977 and whose work is collected there. Her philosophy as an artist: 'Everybody breathes his soul into his work, his laughter, his joy and his grief. And how wonderful.'

She found all three, but it's her sense of humor that predominates. She can depict pure woe - but she also saw the humor of the folk custom of paid mourners at a funeral. And her "Noahs," "Ulysses" and "The Miraculous Catch," all showing people in neat, tubby boats, make one think of "Rub-a-dub-dub."

Edgar Kaplan, New York, Norman Kay, Philadelphia, Richard Pavlicek, Ft. Lauderdale and Bill Root, Boca Raton, won the Vanderbilt Team Championship, premier event of the Spring North American Championships held recently in Hawaii. Since they had won the Board-A-Match team event at the Fall Championships, they will be seeded through to the finals of the trials to select the 1984 United States team for the World Olympiad team championships.

In one of the early rounds of the Vanderbilt, the winners met Trump Coup Tom-my's team. They found themselves trailing early in the match when Tommy aggressively pushed to slam on this hand. Tommy's two club opening was a whisker weak, and his decision to drive to slam after partner's positive response showed either touching faith in his partner's ability or belief in a Supreme Bridge Player.

West led the queen of clubs, taken in dummy as declarer discarded a heart. Declarer cashed the acequeen of diamonds, then came to hand with a club ruff. He discarded dummy's jack of hearts on the king of diamonds, then led a heart to the king and East's ace. East thought it would be a good idea to try to protect his queen of trumps for the setting trick, so he continued with a heart. Dummy ruffed, and declarer discarded a heart on the king of clubs when East declined to ruff.

Declarer ruffed a club with the ten of trumps, a farsighted play! Next came a heart ruff with the ace of trumps, followed by the nine of trumps from dummy. If East covered, declarer would win and be left with nothing but high trumps, so East played low. But thanks to his earlier play, declarer was now able to remain in dummy by underplaying the eight of trumps. A club from dummy now completed the trump coup - whether East ruffed high or low, declarer would make the last two tricks by ruffing as cheaply as possible


MINNEAPOLIS (AP) Students at 14 universities throughout China will soon be using American-made computer systems.
