Rate Schedule Is Tabled By GUC

Members of the Greenville Utilities Commission Tuesday night tabled action on a new water and sewer rate schedule which would increase water revenues by about 20 percent over the next two years after members of the City Council voiced objections to a proposed reduction in charges for out-of-city water customers.

The proposed water and sewer rates are based on a cost-of-service

study completed last year, which says revenues from water rates need to be increased by \$500,000 to fund increased current operating costs, maintain and extend the water system and make debt service payments on the new water treatment plant.

The proposed schedule would spread the 20 percent increase in water rates over a two-year period to lessen the impact on customers, by increasing rates each six months. GUC's typical in-city residential

customer, using 8,000 cubic feet of water per month, now pays \$8.30, while an out-of-city residential customer now pays \$16.60.

Following the first step-increase under the proposed rate schedule, the in-city customer would pay \$9.20, while out-of-city customers would pay \$14.35.

Under the proposed rate schedule, the utilities' present policy of charging out-of-city customers double the in-city rates would be (Please turn to Page 16)

Fire Dept. Tax Supported By Bell Arthur Residents

BELL ARTHUR — Residents of the Bell Arthur Fire District Tuesday voted — by a 26 vote margin — to levy an additional tax on property support operations of the volunteer fire department.

According to unofficial returns, 162 residents voted in favor of the fire protection tax, while 136 persons voted against the additional levy.

"This is the toughest battle we've had and we've won," Fire Chief Virgil O'Neal said.

Members of the fire department presented a petition asking for the referendum to the Pitt County Board of Commissioners last year, saying a fire district tax was the only way the department could maintain its operations and purchase new equipment.

While the favorable vote Tuesday will allow a tax of up to 15 cents per \$100 valuation on property in the fire district, fire department officers said before the balloting that a

proposed budget would ask for a tax rate of only 3 1/2 cents.

However, the final tax rate will be set by the Board of Commissioners after the fire department submits a proposed budget for review.

Since the fire protection tax was approved, the fire district will have to bear the cost of Tuesday's referendum, as well as any costs involved in administration and collection of the tax.

Mondale And Hart Face A 'Marathon'

Walter Mondale and Gary Hart, each missing opportunities to sprint to an early victory, emerged from the Super Tuesday primaries and caucuses resigned to running "a marathon all the way to California" for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Before the New Hampshire primary, speculation was rampant that Mondale might wrap up the nomination in Tuesday's balloting. After New Hampshire, there was talk of a Hart tidal wave capable of sinking Mondale.

But the mixed bag of results from the nine primaries and caucuses Tuesday left both camps agreeing that neither will have it easy from now until the San Francisco convention in July.

"It's going to be a marathon all the way to California," Mondale told supporters Tuesday.

"This is going to be a long, tough fight," said Hart campaign manager Oliver Henkel.

Of the five primaries on Tuesday, Hart carried Florida, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, while Mondale was the winner in Georgia and Alabama.

Hart and Mondale were only a few votes apart in Oklahoma caucuses, while Hart jumped to a comfortable lead in Washington.

Caucus results from Hawaii had Mondale winning only 5 of 27 delegates up for grabs, with the other 22 remaining uncommitted. Hart was leading Mondale in Nevada's caucuses.

Hart looked assured of a majority of the 511 delegates chosen on the campaign's busiest day so far, but

Mondale continued to hold the overall lead.

Of the delegates selected since the process began, Mondale had 301 and Hart 165. John Glenn had 28 delegates and the Rev. Jesse Jackson 34.

George McGovern, saying he would "fully accept the verdict of my special friends, the voters of Massachusetts," was the latest casualty of the race after finishing third in the state that stood alone in his column in 1972.

"I feel younger this morning than I did in 1972 when I was defeated by former President Nixon," McGovern said on ABC's "Good Morning America."

His departure cuts the Democratic field to four. The race began with eight contenders.

Hart said he talked to McGovern today but didn't get an endorsement. "He said that Vice President Mondale is in his judgment a more classic liberal."

Hart was flying to Detroit to meet with United Auto Workers officials backing labor's united front for Mondale. Appearing on NBC's "Today" show, he predicted that Michigan "will be a very tough state for us."

But he told the "CBS Morning News" that "I think this campaign does have national strength."

Mondale, meanwhile, bypassed the network's morning news shows to sleep before heading to Illinois to address the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations.

"We're back and ready to run," his campaign manager, Robert Beckel, said on the NBC show. "Yes, I think we're out of trouble. We had a rough couple of weeks."

Hart and Mondale cheered the Super Tuesday results and predicted a long battle to settle who will emerge from the Democratic National Convention in San Francisco next July as the challenger to President Reagan.

Glenn, whose third place finish in Alabama was his best primary showing of the day, nonetheless declared his campaign "is very much alive."

It also was very much in debt and a Glenn aide said a decision on the future of the Ohio senator's bid was still to be made.

Jackson captured 21 percent of the vote in Georgia and regained eligibility for federal matching campaign funds. Jackson was threatened with loss of the federal subsidy after he failed to get 10 percent of the vote in either New Hampshire or Vermont. Jackson vowed to campaign

A brass band welcomed the attorney general, his wife, Linda, and their party at the Pitt County Courthouse at 8:25 a.m. He and his entourage visited in several of the county offices, then hurried to the East Carolina University campus to greet students changing classes. He bought cookies from Angel Flight

members in the ECU Student Supply Store lobby and met briefly with Chancellor John Howell.

Among the supporters accompanying him for all or part of the day were state ABC Commissioner Marvin Speight of Farmville, Robersonville Mayor Pro Tem Mort Hurst, and Greenville residents Charles M. Vincent and John Bizzell.

This morning he was on to Winterville, Ayden, Grifton and Farmville and this afternoon, he was to greet Fountain, Bethel and Stokes residents and visit Pitt Community College. A grand opening of his Pitt County headquarters, located at the corner of 10th Street and Dickinson Avenue, was to be held this afternoon.

Wirth Is Re-Elected As City Utilities Chairman

Members of the Greenville Utilities Commission re-elected Margaret Wirth as chairman Tuesday night and were told that operation of GUC's load management program saved \$113,782 during February.

In addition to Mrs. Wirth, who was re-elected even after telling other members of the commission that she thought the chairmanship should rotate each year, commissioners renamed Bill Taft as vice chairman.

GUC Director Charles Horne told commission members that by

operating the load management program between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m. on Feb. 8, at the time of Carolina Power & Light Company's peak, GUC employees were able to cut 10.15 megawatts from Greenville's demand, which resulted in a savings of \$113,782.

In other action, the commission adopted a new classification and pay plan which provides 21 salary ranges for regular employees and five ranges from department heads.

The steps for employees range from a low of \$4.07 an hour for custodians and laborers (\$8,466 a year), to a high of up to \$15.43 a hour

(\$32,094 a year) for engineers.

The pay ranges for department heads start at \$12.05 an hour (\$25,064 a year) to a high of \$24.10 an hour (\$50,128 annually).

Commissioners also approved the sale of a number of surplus vehicles and other equipment at auction on April 14.

The surplus property to be sold includes 10 trucks, two cars, a van and such items as camper shells, rear truck windows, a wrecker winch, a front end winch, table legs and frames, water heaters and wall-mounted water coolers.

Commissioners awarded a contract to S.T. Wooten Co. for construction of a water line along 14th Street to Greenville Boulevard for \$323,004 to be funded with a 25 percent state grant.

A number of other contracts were awarded for the purchase of equipment to low bidders. The included: four pad-mounted transformers from Hesco Inc. for \$13,264; two pad-mounted transformers from Mill-Power Supply Co. for \$9,719; two pad-mounted transformers from Mill-Power Supply Co. for \$12,587; one pad-mounted transformer from Mill-Power Supply Co. for \$4,850; 75,000 feet of primary overhead cable from Rigby Electric Supply Co. for \$43,950; 40,000 feet of cable from Eastern Electric Supply Co. for \$24,240; and 146 wooden transmission poles from Koppers Co. for \$117,134.

Other contracts approved were for the purchase of: 385 insulators from Eastern Electric Supply Co. for \$100,793; one switching tower from Hesco Inc. for \$27,379; five concrete polls from Rigby Electric Supply Co. (Please turn to Page 14)

Workers With Disabled Children May Find Help At The Workplace

Parents of disabled children may find help in the workplace for family and offspring.

Some corporations, through employee assistance and counseling services, want to help such parents stay on the job, says Dr. Sheila Akabas, director of the Industrial Social Welfare Center of Columbia University's School of Social Work.

Eight percent of the estimated 3.6 million infants born in the United States each year have a disability.

To help firms aid parents of disabled children, Dr. Akabas and associates have launched a project funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

It is titled Families with Disabled Children: Help from the Workplace.

"We're going to develop a guide for the corporation," she said.

In the process, Dr. Akabas and associates will work with three trade unions to identify workers with disabled children under 2 1/2 years of age and assess family needs.

The project also will develop new programs, including one in which retired union members would be trained to look after disabled children whose parents have jobs.

"Information has a monetary value when it is in the right place at the right time," the social scientist said, noting the guide will contain information about resources for both married and single working parents of disabled children.

Dr. Akabas said employee assistance programs at many corporations already are helping workers with health and personal problems, including alcoholism, money management, and sources of crises that affect mental, physical and emotional health.

"Helping parents of the disabled would be making use of this existing structure," she said.

Management isn't just being humanitarian. Corporation leaders know that an employee with problems is not happy or necessarily productive.

Management also knows, the professor said, that if a worker must quit a job to take care of a disabled dependent it usually is not the best for any of the parties.

Further, in the instance of the birth of a disabled child to a worker, the corporation insurance plan will pick up a lot of the expenses until the child is 21. Seeing that the disabled child gets proper medical treatment, rehabilitation services and training is good business.

"Disability and poverty all too often go hand in hand," Dr. Akabas said.

"If a parent has to stop working to care for a disabled child it can push him or her over the brink into poverty."

"Confident that their youngsters are receiving good care, parents would not only be able to keep their jobs, but would retain the network of social support and a sense of personal accomplishment that an employed person enjoys."

Dr. Akabas described her project as "an innovative pulling together of public, private and educational resources that is very much in keeping with the Reagan administration's promotion of shared responsibility."

A workshop connected with the project was attended by repre-

sentatives of major corporations, unions and social welfare agencies.

"The financial issue was utmost to all," Dr. Akabas said.

It was felt money could be saved if the diagnosis was proper, and suitable treatment and training given. The goal of training would be to help the disabled function independently, if possible, as an adult.

At the forum there was general agreement that companies and workers may want to arrange work so the parent of the disabled could be at home when other help was not available.

"Companies allowing the employee to take vacation time a day at a time or using sick time on the same basis was one idea," Dr. Akabas said.

Flex-time came up, too — allowing parents of a disabled child to share a job so one or the other would be at home with child, reducing the need for help from a paid home aide.

There also was agreement at the forum that people should go to the corporation employee assistance office for counseling when a child is born disabled.

"The corporation people said some people feel ashamed but they shouldn't," Dr. Akabas said. "And the corporation people need to say to the worker, 'We understand and we have the capacity to help you find help.'"

Elderhostel Brochures Are Now Available

Elderhostel is an educational program for adults over 60. Participants live for a week in a college dorm, eat in campus dining facilities and take part in classes designed for them.

Planned social and recreational activities are planned as well as free time. Costs to participants are kept to a minimum in order that adults with modest incomes may participate. The cost for a week of elderhostel is \$190 per person which includes room, board and instructional costs.

There are 16 North Carolina campuses which can be visited. Call the Pitt County Agricultural Extension Service for a free brochure for elderhostel courses being offered.

Homemaker's Haven

Usually children do not wear out their dress-up clothing; they outgrow them. It could mean a big saving if they could be altered to fit the growing child or if they could be saved and passed down to the next child in line. Passing them down could be a problem, as no two children, even in one family, have the same build and there's nothing worse than letting your child wear hand-me-downs if they do not fit right. Simple alterations and simple re-designing can make the clothing look new again.

Here are a few simple ideas:

1. When putting clothing away from one child to another, don't just put them into one big bag. It's too easy to forget what you have and, as a result, your next child in line might outgrow them before you remember to sort through the bag. Instead, collect small carton boxes and identify each box with the name of the child the clothes are meant for. Also mark on the box the approximate time the box should be opened. For instance, "Summer of '84, Winter of '84, etc."

2. How to lengthen a coat or jacket sleeve: Don't disturb the hem line; slit lining around the sleeve several inches above the hemline. Pull outer

sleeve down as far as you can. Cut lining fabric 1/2 inch wider than gap formed in sleeve lining. Turn under 1/4 inch on each long edge and back stitch to lining. If the original hem line on the outer sleeve doesn't iron out, top stitch two or three rows around the sleeve and collar.

3. To shorten the sleeve: Do not disturb the hem line. Turn sleeve inside out. Halfway up the sleeve, take a tuck in the lining. This will give you a deeper hem on the outer shell of the sleeve.

4. To lengthen the hem length: Do not disturb the hem line. Instead, follow procedure as for the sleeve. Cut part way up dress, leaving hem intact. Insert trim and make a matching tie for the neckline. If dress is a print, insert solid strip of material. Do the same for too-short pants. Coordinate by making suspenders from the same piece of material you inserted to lengthen the pants.

5. If the next child in line has a slenderer frame: The outfit won't fit no matter how long you hold onto it. If the shoulder is too wide, make an action shoulder. Take a vertical pleat in shoulder and top stitch part way down the pleat back and front.

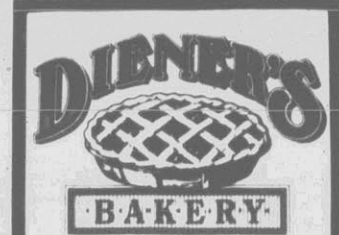
Attach the pleat to the seam at the shoulder. If there is no waistline on the dress, sew four tubes of contrasting material. Using the side seams at waistline as a center guide, sew the tubes (or ribbon) two or three inches on either side of the side seams, two to a side. When tied, the waist will be cinched on both sides with a bow.

• Coats can be shortened into jackets.

• Dresses can be shortened into blouses.

• Too-short sleeves can be cut off and turned into roll-up sleeves.

• Blouses that won't stay tucked can be lengthened by sewing a strip of material on bottom.



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Cooking Is Fun

A friend of mine, visiting France a year ago, was attracted by the way chevre (goat cheese) was displayed and sold in some Paris food shops. Standing on store counters, were glass jars filled with rounds of chevre marinating in olive oil and herbs.

After she had tasted some of the herb-flavored cheese, she determined that when she returned home she would create a recipe for a similar combination — and she did. Her family loves the bonus they get from her chevre jar. She uses any pieces of the goat cheese that break up, along with the olive oil from the jar, plus lemon juice to make dressings for green salad.

HERB-MARINATED GOAT CHEESE

- 1 pound uncoated goat cheese (in log shape), sliced 1/2-inch thick
- 2 cups olive oil
- 2 1/2 teaspoons dried thyme, crushed
- 2 teaspoons dried marjoram, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 2 bay leaves, crumbled
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed

Place cheese slices in a wide-mouthed container that has a tight-fitting cover.

In a 1-quart liquid measure thoroughly stir together the olive oil, thyme, marjoram, rosemary, red pepper flakes, bay leaves and garlic; pour over the cheese. Add additional olive oil if needed to cover the cheese. Cover tightly; carefully turn jar over several times.

Refrigerate for 7 to 10 days. Each day, let jar stand at room temperature until oil liquefies; turn jar over;

return to refrigerator.

An hour before serving time, remove cheese from oil and let stand at room temperature. To serve, arrange on cheese board or platter with crackers or sliced French bread.

FISH ROLLS
The way a Southern cook makes them.

- 4 large or 6 small fish fillets (about 2 pounds)
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 tablespoons finely diced onion
- 2 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1-3rd cup finely diced celery
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3 tablespoons water

Wash and dry fillets. In a medium skillet over low heat cook onion in butter until wilted; stir in bread crumbs, pecans, celery, parsley, salt and pepper; sprinkle with water and mix lightly. Spread mixture over each fillet; roll up; place seam sides down in a 11 1/2 by 8 1/2 by 1 1/4-inch baking dish. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until fish is opaque through and flakes easily — about 8 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Healing Torch

No chain needs a weak link and no school system needs a red-headed stepchild.

Through the years, Pitt County's northern sector has repeatedly said it feels like the red-headed stepchild of the county school system. Whether this is because the school system has neglected the area "north of the river" or because of the area's own frustration in obtaining teachers, funding and support is a moot point.

What is important, however, is that right now, North Pitt High School, because of some special problems, appears to be a weak link in the countywide competency testing program. North Pitt's 1983 test scores are lower than the other four schools ... a reflection, according to a recently released study done by Associate Superintendent John McKnight of Pitt County schools, of the geographic area's special problems. Special problems, noted the study, such as a high number of handicapped students, a lopsided white vs. non-white student population, and many "highly transient" students.

We don't feel North Pitt is a red-headed stepchild. Neither do we feel it is a true "weak link" in the county school system.

We do feel that when a school exhibits problems, it should receive special attention. Not that other schools should be neglected — assistance from the central office, whether it be instructional, financial or otherwise, should be as balanced as possible, but should be in proportion to the needs of each school.

If a chain has a weak link, the welding torch should be applied to that link to strengthen it. Otherwise, a fracture may occur. Similarly, if a weakness appears in a school, the proverbial welding torch of knowledge must be firmly applied by those trained in educational problem-solving.

McKnight's candid study is a good beginning. But it should be used as that healing torch, not as a dissecting knife.

Contributions

Gradually some of the great old actors from earlier days of the movies are being claimed by death.

Last week the debonair William Powell died at age 93. He was known for "The Thin Man" roles in movies of the 1930s and played a role in "Mister Roberts", the classic of 1955.

Another who died last week was Jackie Coogan who began his career as a child star in the Charlie Chaplin movie, "The Kid." His most recent role was as Uncle Fester in the television series "The Addams Family."

Both Powell and Coogan contributed much to the acting world and to the entertainment of all of us. They were among those who helped shape the then relatively new field of film entertainment to make it what it is today.

In The Wings

WASHINGTON — Joining the Democratic rush to Sen. Gary Hart, political intimates of Virginia Gov. Charles Robb are quietly boosting a Hart-Robb ticket, even though their man is still committed to Sen. John Glenn's fading presidential campaign.

Friends have talked about Robb, son-in-law of Lyndon B. Johnson, for vice president in 1984 ever since his election as governor in 1981. But as

Glenn's foremost Southern supporter, he had little hope for second place on the national ticket with Walter F. Mondale seemingly headed for first place.

But Hart might seek not only a Southerner but also another new young face as his running mate. That would give Robb, 44, and Florida's Gov. Bob Graham, 47 (the same age as Hart), the edge against 62-year-old Sen. Lloyd Bensten of Texas, who has been on top of Mondale's vice presidential list.

An unprecedented pressure campaign by the Israeli lobby here against the conservative government of Chancellor Helmut Kohl took a surprising turn last week: a letter signed by 69 House members demanding that Kohl halt any sale of weapons to Saudi Arabia.

The letter stunned West German officials — and diplomats high in the U.S. State Department. Kohl has been under heavy pressure from Israel to cancel arms sales to the Saudis, but on a recent visit to Jerusalem held his ground.

Israel's clout in Congress, well-known in this country, amazed Kohl and his aides and left them put out and a bit angry. Kohl's foreign policy is based on West German interests, not Israel's. Kohl explained during sometimes tense talks with Jewish leaders here that although Bonn would not sell offensive weapons, like tanks, to the Saudis, other arms definitely would be sold.

The more muscular rhetoric in President Reagan's recent speeches can be traced partly to the influence of Georgia's Rep. Newt Gingrich and the absence of ex-White House aide David Gergen.

Gingrich, a leader of conservative Republican back-benchers in the House, recently conferred with White House speechwriters.

RALEIGH — A proposal that would make major changes in the governance of North Carolina's public schools has been set on the long road toward ratification by a legislative subcommittee. But that subcommittee, recognizing the precarious path its proposal must travel, also has a back-up plan which it will put in its final report to the full Legislature.

On March 6, the subcommittee officially proposed three major changes. It would increase the membership of the State Board of Education from 13 to 21, make the office of superintendent of public instruction one which is filled by the state board rather than the voters, and leave with the superintendent, rather than the board, the choice of who shall be controller for the Department of Public Instruction.

Ratification of such drastic changes will not come easily. The process itself will be long because constitutional amendments are re-

quired. And the opposition should be considerable. The proposed changes would significantly reduce the governor's influence over the state board and take from the voters the power to elect a major state officer.

So the subcommittee on governance of the Education Policy Council decided to include an alternative proposal in its final report, something the Legislature can fall back upon if proposal No. 1 fails. The subcommittee had considered a great many proposals since it began work. It wanted to streamline the governance of the public schools. It wanted to better focus accountability for the operation of the system. It also wanted to give the Legislature more say over the schools.

Their proposals to accomplish this fell into two categories: Those which require constitutional changes and those which do not. The subcommittee chose first to recommend the changes which will require constitu-

tional amendments. For ratification, three-fifths of each house will have to vote to put the measures on the ballot and then a majority of the voters will have to approve of those changes. The fallback proposal would need only legislative approval.

The fallback plan would create a commissioner of public schools who would assume the administrative duties now carried out by the superintendent of public instruction. He or she would be appointed by the state board which would have been appointed by the governor. This commissioner would appoint not only the heads of all educational departments but also the controller, an appointment the current superintendent does not have. Under this plan, the superintendent would chair the state board, serve as its secretary and be the major spokesman for education in the state. The superintendent would not have a vote on the board. All of this could be

accomplished without any constitutional changes, the subcommittee members say.

During the subcommittee meeting, several members said they were concerned that they might not be able to convince the Legislature first and the public after that to make the major changes involved in the first proposal. Chairman Sen. Jim Edwards, D-Caldwell, agreed that it would take a major lobbying effort.

But there can be little doubt that opponents will also lobby. There are two natural opponents to this plan. The sitting superintendent of public instruction in 1985 will no doubt resist a plan that reduces him to a position of public relations man for the school board and the sitting governor will no doubt oppose a move that will dilute his influence on the state board.

Public Forum

To the editor:

The United States government recently threatened to withdraw from UNESCO. Two major problems underlie the ensuing controversy.

The first problem is alleged poor management. The U.S., and other members as well, as have complained about UNESCO management practices. Half of UNESCO's \$200 million budget goes to administration; the other working bodies of the U.N. family spend more in programs. Some personnel practices are questionable. UNESCO programs have proliferated. So an administrative review is justifiable.

The second problem is UNESCO policies on communication and information. To get "more balanced and culturally diverse" coverage by journalists, new regulations were proposed. The U.S. and others have argued that this would censor the press. We won — the proposed regulations were not passed, and the British proposed an alternative.

But there is a genuine problem. One of us, from repeated visits to Mexico, has personal experience with more balanced news of the Third World, prime goal of the UNESCO majority. Instead of eternal earthquakes, famines and military coups, there are regular reports of rural developments, building projects, and everyday politics. He returns from each visit with a quite different idea of life in other countries.

The UNESCO controversy itself affords an example of unbalanced journalism. The U.S. decision to threaten withdrawal was widely reported on TV and in the press. Yet no such coverage has been given to the agreement of UNESCO Director M'Bow to a U.S. congressional review three weeks ago. The review will cover both administrative practices and policies. If the congressional findings are damaging to UNESCO, they will lead to M'Bow's resignation, changes in operation and policies, and continued participation by the U.S. If the review does not substantiate the charges, we think it would be difficult for the U.S. to carry out its threat to withdraw.

Don't Rock The Boat

I went over to the Justice Department the other day at about 11 o'clock, walked into the antitrust division and found everyone sleeping.

I woke up one of the attorneys. "Sir," I said. "I'm sorry to disturb you, but I have some important news for you. Standard Oil of California is buying the Gulf Oil Company."

"You woke me up to tell me that?"

"I thought it could be important. SOCAL and Gulf are among the largest firms in the oil business, and the merging of the two firms is certainly a violation of the antitrust laws."

The attorney at the next desk said, "Hey, Harry, will you guys hold it down? I'm trying to catch a few winks."

Harry said, "This guy says SOCAL is going to buy Gulf, Frank."

"So what? It's a free country," Frank yawned.

"Yes," I said, "but if you let two oil Goliaths merge you'll be stifling competition."

"What concern is that of ours?" Frank wanted to know.

"I just thought the antitrust department of Justice should be alerted. Isn't it your job to see that there is competition in the marketplace?"

"You mean you want us to sue SOCAL to prevent them from buying Gulf?" Frank asked. "What kind of antitrust lawyers do you think we are?"

"If we stuck our nose into every two-bit takeover case in this country we'd clog the courts with work," Harry said.

I protested, "This is not a two-bit takeover case. It's going to cost SOCAL \$13 billion, and it won't produce one cup of new fuel for the country. You can't let oil companies eat each other up without a fight."

Frank said, "We didn't do anything about Texaco taking over Getty. Why should we interfere in someone taking over Gulf?"

"Takeovers are good for business," Harry said. "They drive up a company's stock and a lot of lawyers get rich overnight."

"But what about the public?" I said. "How do we benefit from competition when two companies in the same business make a sweetheart deal with each other?"

Frank took a Twinkie out of his drawer and started nibbling on it. "If we thought the merging of two of the largest oil companies in the world would hurt the public

we'd be in court right now. But a marriage of this kind should benefit everybody. It could put a damper on these ruthless gas price wars that are cutting into everyone's profits."

Harry said, "And it will be a warning to the independent stations to stop giving away free car washes when you buy a full tank of gas."

"What about the banks?" I said. "SOCAL wants a \$14 billion credit to buy Gulf. That's \$14 billion the banks can't loan to other types of companies that might create jobs and invest in new equipment."

"That's not our concern," said Harry. "Our job is to see that the antitrust laws are not violated. There is nothing in the Gulf takeover that will hurt competition in the marketplace."

"What have you people done in the last four years to stimulate competition in the marketplace?"

"We broke up the phone company," said Frank proudly. "And there isn't a person in the country who isn't better off for it. If you don't believe me, just wait until you get your bill next month."

Ban On 'Phantom Taxes'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Legislation has been introduced to prevent private utility companies from collecting "phantom taxes" from consumers, a tax loophole one consumer group charges cost Southeastern ratepayers \$787 million in 1981 alone.

Reps. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, and Doug Bosco, D-Calif., said utilities are collecting billions of dollars in "phantom taxes" — money collected from consumers to pay taxes to the federal government that the utilities are not required to pay.

Their legislation has been endorsed by the National Taxpayers Union and the Environmental Action Foundation, which released 1981 figures gleaned from financial reports the utilities filed with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

The foundation said five Southern utilities were in the top 10 in the nation in collecting "phantom taxes" in 1981. Florida Power & Light Co., ranked fourth in the nation and first in the South, taking in \$114.6 million more than they paid back to the government that year.

Carolina Power & Light collected \$112.6 million; Georgia Power Co. \$108.6 million; Duke Power Co. \$105.9 million, and Alabama Power

Co. \$101.6 million.

"Utilities are required by federal law to charge customers for income taxes that they don't have to pay to the government," said Richard E. Morgan, a spokesman for the Environmental Action Foundation.

Morgan claims the offending passages in the Internal Revenue Code were written by utility lobbyists.

Most "phantom taxes" are derived from three major tax breaks enjoyed by private utilities: investment tax credits, accelerated depreciation and shortened tax lives.

Investment tax credits allow utilities to, in effect, let the federal government pay 10 percent of their investment in new equipment.

Accelerated depreciation and shortened tax lives allow businesses to speed up depreciation of new investments for tax purposes, thus postponing the payment of federal taxes.

Utility lobbyists say these tax breaks are necessary, particularly with the regulatory climate created by stingy state public service commissions who don't like to vote consumer rate hikes.

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Seeking A Rift

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — A report submitted to the European Parliament accuses the Soviet Union of trying to disrupt NATO, and says there is "considerable evidence" Moscow was involved in the attempted assassination of Pope John Paul II.

The report, commissioned by the parliament and prepared by British delegate Lord Bethel, says Moscow had intensified efforts to create tension within the Atlantic alliance by spreading "disinformation" and forged documents.

The Soviet goal, it said, was to portray the United States as planning "aggressive interference" in the affairs of its European allies.

Legion To Observe 65th Anniversary

The American Legion will celebrate its 65th anniversary Thursday through Saturday.

The Legion was started March 15, 1919, in Paris at a meeting of representatives of the various outfits of the American Expeditionary Force of World War I. Formed and chartered for the express purpose of assisting World War I veterans in their rehabilitation to civilian life following their discharge from service, the organization has since opened its doors to veterans of World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. It has broadened its scope of assistance to include the veteran's family and the community as a whole.

Among the almost 500 Legionnaires in Greenville there are two whose records show membership dating continuously from the official organization which came eight months after the Paris meeting, on Nov. 11, 1919. These two are Paul L. Flye and D.J. Whichard Jr.

Flye was a charter member of Tarboro Post 19 which was chartered in August 1919, and transferred in late 1919 to Rocky Mount Post 58 when that post was chartered. Thus he was a charter member of two of the original North Carolina posts. He is now a member of Pitt County Post 39, which was organized Oct. 29, 1919.

Whichard was a charter member of Post 39 and still maintains his membership there. He was one of the two official delegates from North Carolina to the first National Convention which met in Minneapolis, Nov. 11, 1919. Whichard was largely responsible for the location of the Legion's national headquarters in Indianapolis.

There are now five Legion posts in Pitt County.

Post 39 was the first and is now served by Dave Sigmon as post commander and Ernest Avery as adjutant. Farmville Post 151 was second in Pitt County and is commanded by Elma Holloman with Wilbur Counterman Jr. as adjutant. Ayden Post 289 is commanded by Jerry W. Cox, and the adjutant is George Watson. Clover Phillips is

commander of Farmville Post 372 and N.B. Tyson is adjutant.

Greenville Post 160 is the newest post in Pitt County. Its commander is Benjamin Braswell and the adjutant is William Atkinson.

Hopes For Hutchins Fading

RALEIGH (AP) — James W. Hutchins' prospects for escaping his scheduled execution this week were jolted severely by a federal court's sound rejection of his latest appeal, defense attorneys said.

A three-judge panel of the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond, Va., Tuesday unanimously denied Hutchins' challenge of a state policy barring death penalty opponents from the jury that convicted him of murdering three law enforcement officers in 1979.

"We therefore deny both the certificate of probable cause to appeal ... and the motion for stay of execution filed by Hutchins on March 8," said the one-page order written by Judge Francis

Murnaghan Jr.

The only remaining appeal routes are to petition for a hearing before the full 4th Circuit Court and to ask the U.S. Supreme Court to take the case. As a last resort, Gov. Jim Hunt could be asked to grant executive clemency.

Defense attorneys said they would meet today in Raleigh to map their strategy.

"We really haven't reached a decision yet on which way to go," Manning said Tuesday.

Another Hutchins lawyer, Joseph Cheshire, acknowledged "we don't have a chance" before the Supreme Court.

"We hold out very little hope," he said.

Hunt remained silent Tuesday on whether he would intervene in the

execution scheduled for Friday at 2 a.m. He met with clergymen on both sides of the death penalty issue and said he would consider the case if asked to do so by Hutchins' attorneys after all legal appeals are exhausted.

Hunt, a capital punishment supporter, said he wanted to "hear people on both sides and ... if it comes to the point that I have to make a decision, I'll make a decision."

"While my position on capital punishment is well known, it is not appropriate for me to say what I would do in this particular situation," Hunt added as he welcomed a group of lawmen led by Rutherford County Sheriff Damon Huskey, whose brother, Deputy Roy Huskey,

was among Hutchins' victims.

Huskey said in an interview after the meeting he had promised to support whatever decision Hunt made.

He said only favored the death penalty when guilt is obvious.

"He (Hutchins) has admitted he killed my brother," Huskey said. "If there were any question I'd be the first person down here to (oppose the execution). I'd be hollering. I don't believe in the death penalty in all cases."

Death penalty foes vowed to fight for Hutchins' life until the end, announcing a heavy schedule of prayer services, news conferences, demonstrations and other activities — including an all-night vigil Thursday at Central Prison.

At a news conference Tuesday at a Raleigh church, a woman whose mother-in-law was murdered nearly 12 years ago joined the sister of a former Death Row inmate in calling for mercy for Hutchins.

"Murder is murder whether or not you have a license for it," said Marie Deans of Richmond, Va., whose deceased mother-in-law was from Wilson. Capital punishment "exploits" families of murder victims, using their grief to obtain the sentence while doing little to help them, Ms. Deans added.

Nina Joe Willey of Mr. Airy said the threat of execution didn't deter her brother, Robert Bondurant, from killing an acquaintance while drunk. A court later reduced his sentence to life imprisonment.

"I sympathize with the (victim's) family's loss. I understand their ... hurt," Ms. Willey said. "But I'm dead set against convicting a person for murder and then killing him."

Hutchins shot two deputies May 31, 1979, when they responded to a report of a domestic disturbance at his Rutherford County house. He later murdered a pursuing Highway Patrol trooper.

A McDowell County Superior Court jury convicted him of two counts of first-degree murder and one count of second-degree murder.

After lengthy appeals, the state Supreme Court stayed his execution 40 minutes before the deadline for killing him Jan. 13. Three days later, a new execution date — March 16 — was set.

Subsequent appeals were been rejected by U.S. District Judge Woodrow Jones and the state Supreme Court.

Heavy Bonds Set For Drugs Crew

WILMINGTON (AP) — Bonds totaling \$2 million were set Tuesday for a nine-member crew of a boat seized off the North Carolina coast last week by the U.S. Coast Guard.

Special U.S. Attorney Larry Craig said the high bonds were justified because the 57-foot fishing vessel apparently was the mother ship of a marijuana smuggling operation.

Craig had requested bonds totaling \$5.25 million for the eight men and one woman, but U.S. Magistrate Franklin Block set lower bonds. All were being held in New Hanover

County Jail late Tuesday.

All are charged with conspiracy and with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. Maximum penalty for the charges is 10 years and a \$30,000 fine.

Only marijuana residue was found on the vessel when it was seized Thursday, but a bale of marijuana was fished out of the ocean nearby. Craig told Block the captain of the vessel, Castulo Julio, had a prior record and had been deported previously from the United States.

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Magician Barred From House Study

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A magician-lecturer who says he has debunked hundreds of allegedly supernatural events was turned away at the door of John and Joan Resch's home, where objects reportedly have been seen flying across rooms without apparent reason.

James Randi of Rumson, N.J., a member of a team representing the Buffalo, N.Y.-based Committee for the Scientific Investigation of Claims of the Paranormal, arrived in Columbus on Tuesday. He said at an airport news conference that the team had no assurance it would be allowed into the home.

On Tuesday evening, Mrs. Resch declined to let them enter the house. She earlier allowed another group of researchers from North Carolina.

"I can't put up with two groups in the house at once. It's been rough on us. We've had a circus, now we have a magic show...No, not here," she said.

Randi's team includes two researchers from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland. He said earlier they would interview witnesses if not allowed into the

N.C. Fishermen Saved In Storm

MYRTLE BEACH, S.C. (AP) — Two North Carolina fishermen were rescued from the Atlantic Ocean during a heavy rainstorm Tuesday after their boat began taking on water and sank, the Coast Guard said.

Robert McCarley of Long Beach, N.C., and Richmond Creech of Southport, N.C., spent more than an hour clinging to a makeshift raft of fish boxes and life jackets after their 41-foot boat, the Bewitched, sank 10 miles west of Frying Pan Shoals, said Petty Officer Robert Schoen of the Coast Guard's Fifth District headquarters in Portsmouth, Va.

"After receiving a distress call, the Coast Guard dispatched the cutter Point Arena, a 44-foot motor life boat and a helicopter from Elizabeth City, N.C., Schoen said.

The Air Force also sent two helicopters from its base at Myrtle Beach, he said.

Fire-rescue personnel spent 1,340 hours in various training exercises and skills development, Allen said.



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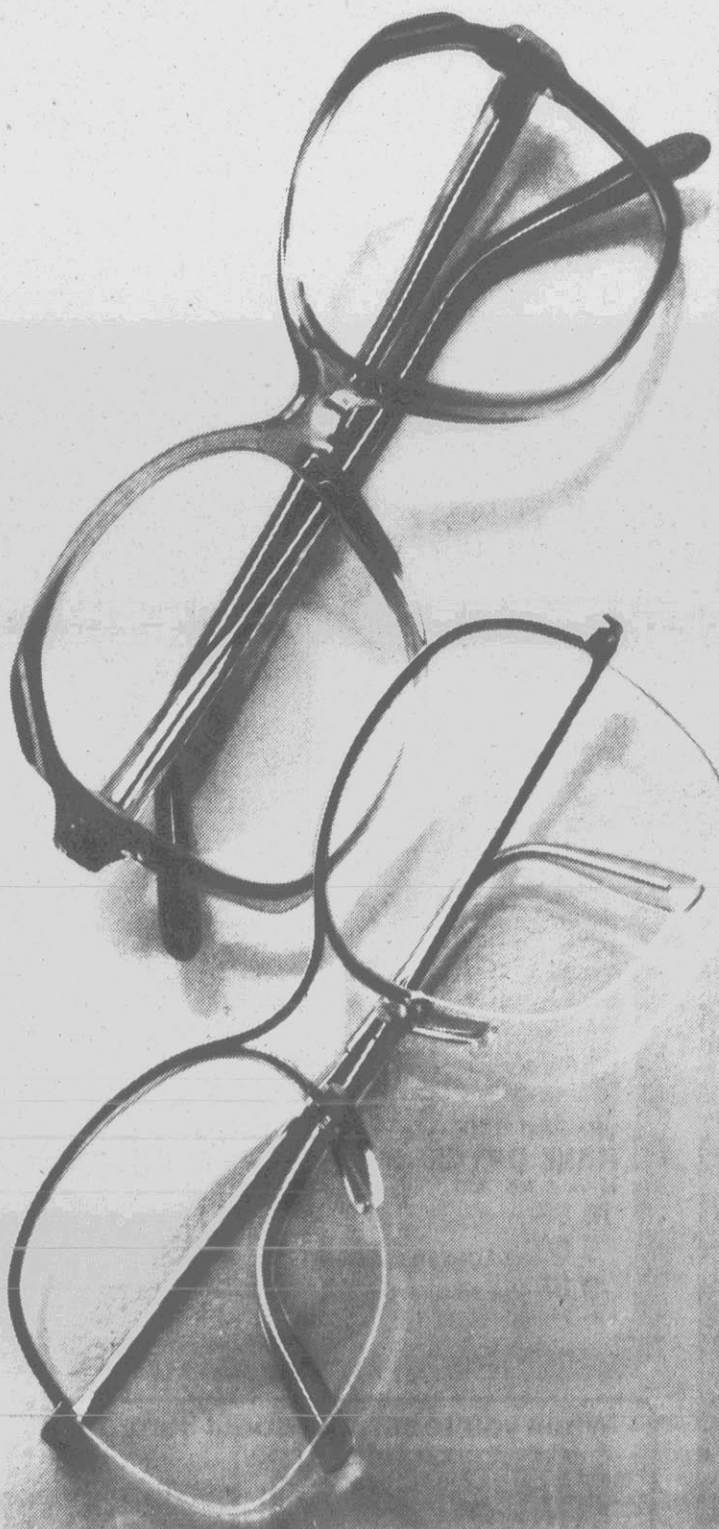
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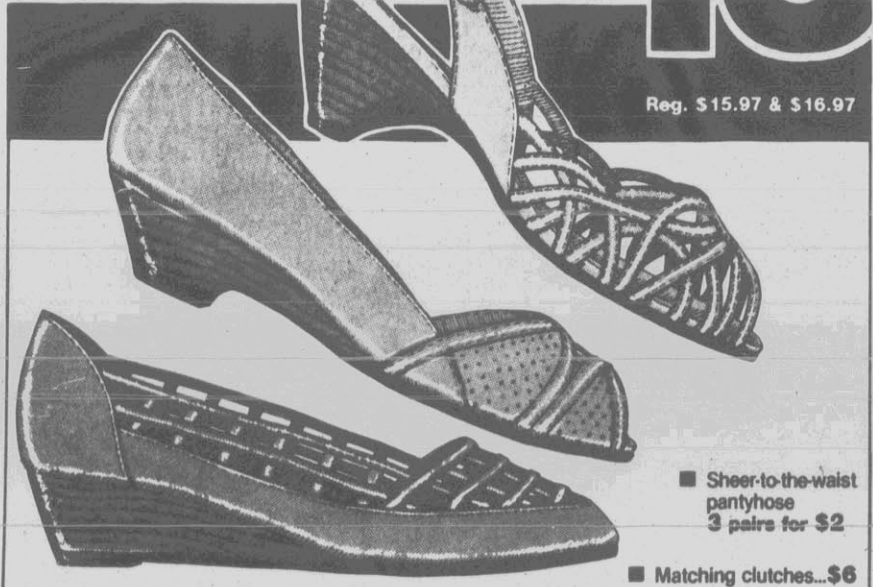
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Programs To Aid Small Business

Gov. Jim Hunt has announced the formation of two new programs to promote small business development in all regions of the state. The programs are administered

by the North Carolina Technological Development Authority, a new state agency within the Department of Commerce. Charles J. Cain of Route 7, Greenville, is chairman of the

authority's 12-member board.

The "Incubator Facilities" program "is an opportunity for communities to establish 'greenhouses' where small businesses can grow and prosper in a supportive environment," Hunt said.

He said the "Innovation Research Fund" is designed to provide "seed capital" for the research and development activities of small businesses.

The incubator program provides one-time grants for establishing facilities that provide low-rent space, shared support services and basic equipment for resident small businesses. Hunt said the facilities are intended to be community projects, utilizing the resources of local col-

leges and universities, business and financial community, and the public.

Localities may apply for grants of up to \$200,000 per facility, he said, noting that grants must be at least equally matched in cash or real estate. The appropriation of the program is \$200,000 in fiscal year 1983-84 and \$200,000 in fiscal 1984-85.

The research fund provides equity financing for the research and development activities of small businesses. Hunt said firms may use the funds to secure technical and management advice, purchase scientific equipment and materials, and otherwise conduct research leading to the development of new or improved products or services.

The fund has an appropriation of

\$225,000 in fiscal 1983-84 and \$250,000 in fiscal 1984-85. New and existing small businesses may apply for financing up to \$50,000 per project. Program applications and pro-

posals must be received by April 6. In addition to Cain, Donovan Phillips and Dr. P.S. Prasad, both of Greenville, are members of the NCTDA board.

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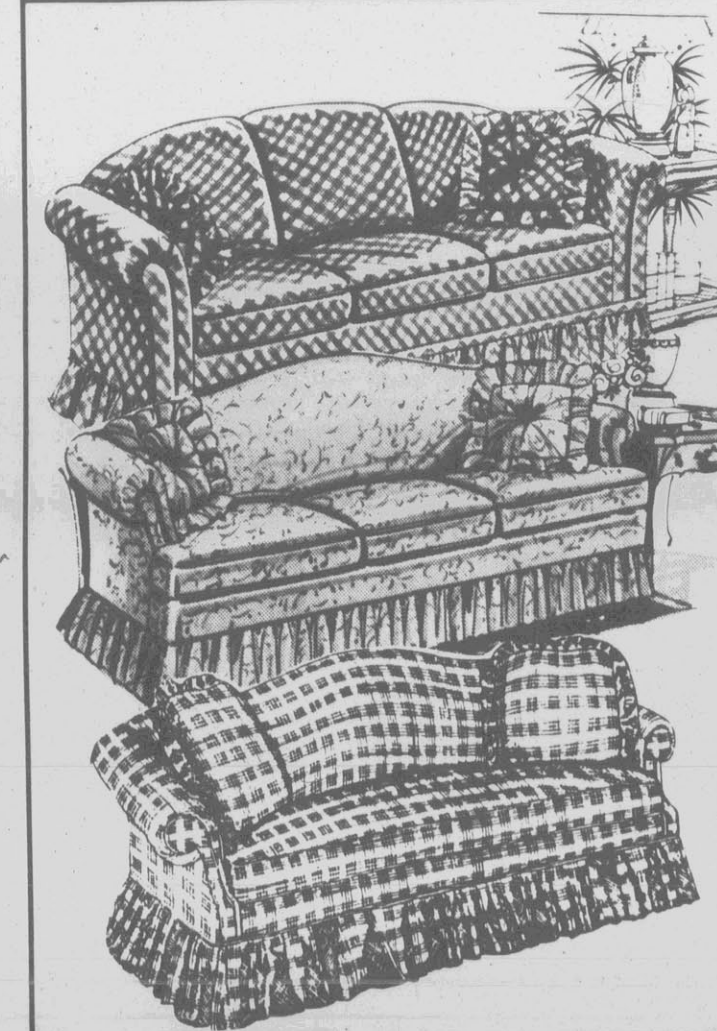
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Texas Executes A Killer By Lethal Injection

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A smiling James David Autry, saying "I love you" to a female pen pal and that he was going to a "better place," was executed by lethal injection today for killing a woman store clerk during a holdup.

months that Autry lay strapped to a hospital gurney in the death chamber, intravenous needles in his arms. But this time there was no stay of execution.

Autry was pronounced dead in the Texas prison's remodeled powder-blue death chamber at 12:40 a.m. by prison physician Dr. L.A. Masters. Gov. Mark White announced 70

minutes earlier that he would not halt the execution, and the U.S. Supreme Court voted 7-2 earlier Tuesday to reject Autry's request for a fourth stay. A federal judge also turned down his request to allow television coverage of the execution.

Autry became the 14th person executed in the United States since the Supreme Court reinstated capital punishment in 1976, and the second in Texas.

In a letter written Tuesday night to The Associated Press, Autry said, "I'm fixing to die and my God has a better place waiting for me."

The condemned man was strapped to the wheeled hospital cart at 12:03 a.m. Needles were inserted in his arms and at 12:15, a saline solution to carry the fatal drug began to flow. A minute later, witnesses were brought into the death chamber.

The flow of lethal drugs began at 12:25 a.m. Warden Jack Purley asked Autry if he had any last words, and Autry replied, "No."

Autry smiled at Shirley Tadlock, a Dallas mother of three who began corresponding with him last October. "I love you," Autry said.

Mrs. Tadlock, 31, clutching a wad of pink tissues, answered, "I love you, too."

After several emotional exchanges between the couple, a smile on Autry's face was replaced by a frown as his breathing became more labored.

Autry cried out again, "I love you." He was pronounced dead 15 minutes after the injection began.

He left all his possessions to the woman, who was brought to the prison by her husband, Ray.

Autry came within 30 minutes of death last Oct. 5 and was lying on the hospital gurney, needles sending

saline solution into his body, when Supreme Court Justice Byron White issued a stay.

Defense lawyer Stefan Presser said in his last appeal to the Supreme Court that Autry was the victim of cruel and unusual punishment because of the aborted execution.

Autry, nicknamed "Cowboy" by fellow inmates, was convicted in the 1980 shooting death of Shirley Drouet, a 43-year-old mother of five who was working overtime at a convenience store in Port Arthur to earn some extra money.

The holdup also left a former Catholic priest dead and crippled a Greek sailor. Autry, who was convicted only of killing the woman, maintained his innocence, saying another man fired the fatal shots.

Autry "deserves to die," said James Svarnas, of Brick Township, N.J., whose brother Athanasios was left crippled and brain-damaged in the robbery.

About 200 spectators gathered outside the prison Tuesday night as the death hour approached. Prison officials roped off a block and stationed guards at 10-foot intervals to avoid the problem of beer-drinking, shouting mobs who turned up at the execution of Charlie Brooks in December 1982 and when Autry was scheduled to die last October.

Autry, in manacles and chains, was taken from his death row cell to a room next to the remodeled death

chamber early Tuesday. At about 6:15 p.m., he ate his last meal, "a simple hamburger with french fries and a Dr Pepper," said prison spokesman Rick Hartley.

During the day, he talked with prison chaplain Carroll Pickett and called his mother and sister, Hartley said.

Autry also met with Houston priest Jack McGinnis, a close friend of the man killed in the holdup. McGinnis said he and Autry cried.

"I offered forgiveness. He accepted it," the priest said, adding that Autry later told him, "I wish I could go back and change it all, make it that it didn't happen." McGinnis said he did not interpret the statement as a confession.

In Houston on Tuesday, a federal judge rejected a lawsuit filed by Autry and a television reporter that sought to allow cameras and recorders in the death chamber. Autry had said he wanted the execution televised in hopes it would stop future executions.

Grads Slackening Up In Final Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Center for Education Statistics says low graduation standards may explain why students apparently slack off and take fewer courses as seniors than in any other year of high school.

The center's researchers, in an analysis of 12,116 transcripts from the Class of 1982, also found that students in Catholic and other private high schools take an average of three more courses in basic academic subjects than their public school counterparts.

It reported that students of Asian background typically took two more courses than their classmates, and students in New England and Middle Atlantic states took one or two more courses than those from elsewhere.

The center checked the transcripts against the list of "new basics" that the National Commission on Excellence in Education recommended for high school graduation.

That commission, in its "A Nation At Risk" report, charged that high schools offer a "smorgasbord" of courses that have been "homogenized, diluted and diffused."

It urged states and local school districts to require as a minimum for a diploma four years of English; three years each of math, science and social studies; a half-year of computer science, and, for the college-bound, two years of foreign language.

The statistics center said its analysis "verifies the popular notion that high school seniors generally take a lighter load of coursework ('the senior slump') ... Even students in college preparatory programs completed fewer courses in the new basics in their last year of high school than in any other year."

It said the explanation may be that many students have already met their graduation requirements before their senior year.

Students on the average earned over five credits a year, but "credits in the new basics ranged from only 3.6 units in the 9th grade to only 2.6 units in the 12th grade," it said.

Only 12.9 of the 21.8 credits the average student took were in the new basics. The number of core courses fell each year, with freshmen taking 3.6, sophomores 3.5, juniors 3.2 and seniors only 2.6.

Students in Catholic schools took an average of 15.7 credits in the new basics, those in other private schools 15.3 and public school students 12.5. The center cautioned the estimate for non-Catholic private schools "may not be as accurate ... because of a small sample size and a high nonresponse rate."

The center reported previously that only 2 percent of 1982 graduates fulfilled all of the commission's suggested requirements for a diploma.

It said Asian students took 14.7 courses in the new basics; whites 13.2; blacks 11.9; Hispanics 11.7; and American Indians 11.2.

Backs Amendment

Republican congressional hopeful Herbert W. Lee today urged residents of the 1st Congressional District to write to their congressman "insisting that he support the president's voluntary school prayer amendment."

"National polls have consistently revealed that 70 percent to 80 percent of the American people favor voluntary prayer in public schools," Lee said.

"President Reagan's amendment simply reflects overwhelming public

opinion. It seeks to allow children who wish to make some religious acknowledgement in their classrooms the opportunity to do so. It does not overrule, abolish or modify the First Amendment."

At least two "vital" points must be made on this issue, Lee said.

"First, prayer in this instance is not being considered as simply the act of praying. It is intended to symbolize the presence of God in our schools. In effect, it will be the only manifestation of God which will be legally sanctioned.

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Space Telescope Project Studded With Big Dreams

When the Space Telescope is launched in 1986, it will have been nearly 40 years since astronomers first seriously suggested the idea of orbiting some kind of telescope above the Earth's atmosphere to get a better look at the heavens.

The transformation of this idea from dream to reality is a fascinating story studded with grandiose schemes, scaled-down designs, technological advances, scheduling setbacks and a cast of thousands, including colorful politicians and dedicated scientists.

"We're not talking about 'big science' when we talk about the Space Telescope, we're talking 'megascience,'" Dr. Robert Smith, a historian of science and astronomy, says. "The Space Telescope is the single most expensive 'instrument' in the history of science; it is a vast enterprise stretching over the United States and Europe."

Smith is the historian-archivist for an ambitious new undertaking aimed at documenting the history of the telescope, from its inception through launch. The Space Telescope History Project is sponsored by the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C., and The Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md., supported by a contract from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Co-directors of the project are Dr. Paul A. Hanle of NASM and Dr. Robert Kargon of Johns Hopkins.

"This is the first time historians have tried to document a project in astronomy at the time the project is occurring, rather than after the fact," Hanle, chairman of NASA's Space Science and Exploration Department, points out. "We're writing this history in 'real time' because it's a story of ideas and engineering, which are not always recorded on paper. We have to talk to the people who have been involved while they're still around."

The history project will set up a resource center in Baltimore where scholars can eventually come to read the most significant documents relating to the planning, design, construction and use of the telescope. Smith's job, as historian-archivist for the project, is to locate official documentation, published and unpublished, and prepare a guide detailing the location and contents of these documents.

"There's a mountain of material to come to grips with," Smith says. Thousands of people at NASA, in the astronomical community and at the 50-plus contractors and subcontractors have been involved with some phase of the Space Telescope, and several hundred of them played major roles. The European Space Agency, which is providing 15 percent of the funding, also has hundreds of people involved.

The task of locating people and documents has already taken Smith and other members of the history project across the United States and to Europe, into the offices — and filing cabinets — of dozens of people. "A major goal of these visits," he says, "is to sensitize people to preserve documents of historical importance."

Smith and other historians at NASM and Johns Hopkins are also conducting oral histories with key people involved. "Today, there's a tendency to transmit ideas by the telephone, rather than by writing them down," Smith says. "The telephone is a fine instrument, but it

is very vexing to historians. In the oral history projects we're trying to replace some of the information that modern technology has taken away."

Hanle, Kargon and Smith will also write a book on the background, genesis and implications of the Space Telescope to be published by Cambridge University Press at the time of the telescope's launch. The story should make interesting reading. For one thing, the Space Telescope jumped in and out of NASA's budget for years before it was finally funded in 1977; along the way, there were confrontations between members of Congress and the astronomical community over the nature of the project.

Even the name of the Space Telescope, which was recently given an official title, the Edwin P. Hubble

Space Telescope (in honor of a noted 20th-century astronomer), is an intriguing historical footnote. In early proposals, the telescope was termed the "Large Orbiting Telescope," and, later, the "Large Space Telescope." One wag in the astronomical community suggested the name "Great Optical Device."

The Space Telescope will be the most important venture in space science for the remainder of this century, historians agree. It will involve virtually the entire astronomical community over the telescope's lifetime — variously estimated at 15 to 50 years. "There's a story here that should be told about how 'megascience' programs get sold, developed and carried out," Hanle says. "There are definitely lessons to be learned from the Space Telescope for the future."

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New Effort For Board Nominees

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, who has been trying to abolish the embattled Legal Services Corp. for three years, has made a new bid for Senate approval of his nominees to the corporation's board of directors.

The White House says Reagan will name four new directors to the 11-member board and renominate seven people whose names he had submitted earlier but whose nominations were never confirmed by the Senate. The agency, established by Congress to provide legal help for the poor, has been run in recent years by recess appointees because the Senate has not acted.

The White House announced that Reagan would name Lorraine Miller, a 49-year-old widowed mother of eight, and Hortencia Benavides, 52, an employee of the El Paso Catholic Pentecostal Renewal Office, to positions on board. Thomas F. Smegal Jr., a San Francisco attorney, and Loyola Law School Professor Basile Joseph Uddo of New Orleans also were named.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — A new cease-fire accord was holding in Lebanon today as the country's rival Christian and Moslem leaders met for two hours in reconciliation talks now centered on the crucial issue of political reforms.

Pro-government and opposition groups meeting here for the third day presented sharply differing proposals on institutional and electoral reforms. The leaders were to reconvene on Thursday.

The atmosphere at closed-door morning sessions was "positive and friendly," but was adjourned to allow time for private consultations between the various feuding factions aimed at "reconciling their differences," said Michel Samaha, spokesman for President Amin Gemayel of Lebanon.

Police in Beirut said artillery shelling stopped soon after the cease-fire was declared Tuesday night and that only sporadic sniping was occurring today along the "green line" dividing the Lebanese capital's Moslem and Christian sectors.

But doubts persisted in Lausanne as to whether the cease-fire would hold. Scores of announced cease-fires have collapsed during nine years of civil warfare.

"I am not sure," said Nabih Berri, leader of the powerful Shiite Moslem militia Amal, when asked if the accord meant an end to the sectarian strife.

He said he instructed his men to stop firing but predicted they would retaliate if fired upon.

When the conference resumed today, both pro-government and opposition groups had prepared detailed but sharply differing proposals on institutional and electoral reforms.

The rightwing Christian groups are committed to a concept that provides for a federal system, with cantons or provinces to be determined largely by religious affiliation. The Syrian-backed opposition, however, wants to gain more power for Moslems and Druse by curbing political practices which favor the Christians.

Berri, with the support of Druse leader Walid Jumblatt, submitted at the working paper that rejected

"any form of partition or political decentralization, be it federation, confederation or cantons."

Berri's proposal called for eliminating all formulas which allot public offices along religious lines. It also would cut the president's term from six years to three years, with much of the presidential power

yielded to a "government of national unity."

Berri told reporters that "everything is negotiable" except the demands for eliminating religious patronage and reducing the presidential term.

The Druse-Shiite proposal also calls for "the trial of all those responsible for the massacre and destruction" during the recent fighting.

Up to now, the Maronite Christians have dominated influential positions in the government and army because of an unwritten "National Pact" based on a 1932 census and agreed to in 1943. Now, however, Moslems claim they make up at least 60 percent of Lebanon's 3 million-plus population.

In Beirut, the leftist newspaper As-Safir quoted Syrian Vice President Abdul Halim Khaddam, in Lausanne as an observer, as saying he expected the conference to reach an agreement on political changes and conclude Friday.

The terms of the cease-fire accord were designed to establish a permanent truce, including the creation of buffer zones, a watchdog commission to be formed by retired army and police officers, and an end to all "hostile media campaigns."

A military committee, comprising representatives of all warring groups, was appointed to take "all adequate measures" to consolidate the cease-fire and to reopen Beirut's port and international airport.

The accord, reached with the help of top-level Syrian and Saudi Arabian observers, averted a threatened breakdown of the conference and cleared the way for discussions on how Moslems and Christians should share power in country's future political structure.

An early deadlock had developed in the two-day old talks when Berri and Jumblatt demanded that all participants, including President Gemayel, sign the accord as "parties to the conflict."

Gemayel, however, said he would sign only as president and chairman of the Lausanne conference.

"This so-called president does not realize yet that he is at war with the Lebanese people," Jumblatt snapped in an interview. But eventually, agreement on the accord was reached by consensus, without requiring signatures.

Arson Indicated In Office Fire

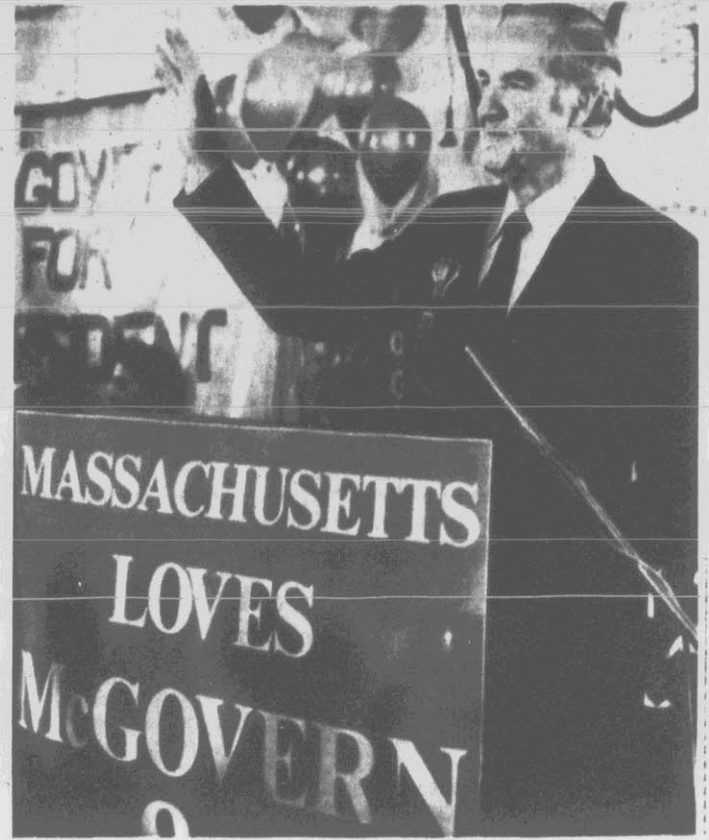

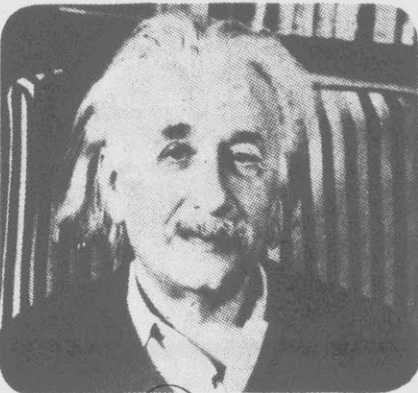

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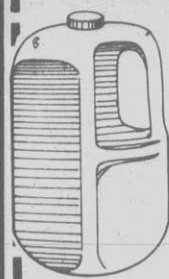

President Says He's Lost 'A Little Faith' In Deficit Reduction Effort

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, who says he has "lost a little faith" in bipartisan attempts to reduce the deficit, is finding it no easier to make a deal with his Republican allies in the Senate.

An internal dispute among senior Republican senators over the size of Reagan's military spending request has stalled talks between the president and the GOP leaders on an approximately \$150 billion package of tax increases and curbs on defense and domestic spending.

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance Committee was meeting again today in an effort to complete work this week on a \$100 billion package of tax increases and spending reductions.

The panel is about 80 percent of the way to its goal and now is struggling with dozens of provisions aimed at limiting tax shelter schemes — especially those in which investors put their money into shelters to avoid taxes rather than make a profit — and other tax loopholes.

While the Finance Committee is making progress, sources who asked not to be quoted by name said there has been no resolution to the bitter GOP squabble over military spending.

Rather than further delay the process, the sources said, the argument will be laid out before the president during a White House meeting, possibly as early as today.

"There's still some ongoing discussions," Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, said Tuesday. The Armed Services Committee chairman is one of those pressing for as large a Pentagon budget as possible.

But Sen. Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., the Budget Committee chairman, said, "Frankly, I think that it's premature for me to say we've arrived at any conclusions." Domenici has been arguing that restraint in military spending is necessary to help reduce deficits, which are projected to be about \$200 billion a year without action to reduce them.

Reagan has requested Pentagon spending authority of \$305 billion for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. That

is a 13 percent increase after inflation over current spending.

The attention being given to the talks between the president and the GOP senators has left Reagan's proposed bipartisan negotiations between the White House and Congress all but forgotten.

And Reagan is blaming Democrats for causing the bipartisan talks to falter.

"Well, frankly, I've lost a little faith in the bipartisan approach to this because the other side seemed more interested, I think, in politics than they did in meeting us in any way on trying to achieve this down payment (on the deficit)," Reagan said in an interview Monday with representatives of newspapers in seven states.

The White House released a transcript on Tuesday.

In the interview, Reagan said no when asked if he had "abandoned altogether any hope of reaching any kind of compromise with the Democrats."

The president said that when he and Republicans agree on a plan, "I will be willing then to go forward with our own proposal and hope that we can, with the support of the people, that we can get bipartisan support for it."

Reagan's remarks had Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, fuming on the House floor Tuesday that the president's allegations were a "lie" and a "falsehood."

Wright, who represented House Democrats at the deficit-cutting meetings, said Reagan did not attend the sessions, which stalled after four sessions.

"He (Reagan) says at one point that we offered no ideas or suggestions at all. That's a lie. It's untrue. I personally offered as many as 20 different suggestions. All of them were summarily rejected," Wright said.

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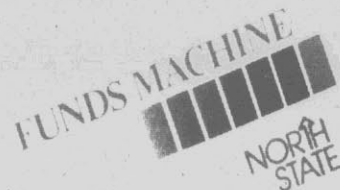
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Jordan, Perkins Lead AP Unit

NEW YORK (AP) — Michael Jordan and Sam Perkins, who led North Carolina to the No. 1 ranking and an unbeaten record in the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season, today were named to the Associated Press first team All-American college basketball squad.

Three of the nation's premier big men — 7-footers Patrick Ewing of Georgetown and Akeem Olajuwon of Houston, and 6-9 Wayman Tisdale — complete the first team.

Jordan and Tisdale were unanimous choices in the voting by a 10-member panel of sports writers and broadcasters. Ten points were given for a first team selection, five for the second team and three for the third team.

Jordan, Ewing and Tisdale are repeaters from last year's team.

It marks the fourth time two players from the same team were chosen to the AP first team. Alex Groza and Ralph Beard of Kentucky

(1949), Bill Walton and Keith Wilkes of UCLA (1974), and Scott May and Kent Benson of Indiana (1976) were the others.

Jordan, a 6-6 junior swingman who has been the Tar Heels' clutch performer since his freshman year, led North Carolina in scoring with a 19.6 average while hitting 55 percent of his shots from the field. The Wilmington, N.C., native, who was named the ACC's Player of the Year, also averaged 5.4 rebounds and made 49 steals.

Perkins, a 6-9 senior forward-center from New York, made 60 percent of his floor shots while averaging 17.5 points and led the team in rebounding with a 9.5 average. He had 66 blocked shots in helping the Tar Heels to a 27-2 record.

Ewing, a native of Jamaica who played high school ball in Cambridge, Mass., was the co-Player of the Year in the Big East

Conference. He led the Hoyas to both the regular-season and postseason league titles and the No. 2 ranking in the nation with a 29-3 record.

An imposing presence defensively as evidenced by his 118 blocked shots, the junior center averaged 10.1 rebounds and 17.2 points on 67 percent shooting from the field and was named the Southwest Conference's most valuable player.

Olajuwon, a junior from Lagos, Nigeria, averaged 16.3 points on 67 percent shooting from the field, 13.8 rebounds and had 189 blocks — 16 against Biscayne — in leading No. 5 Houston to a 28-4 record, including the SWC's regular season and postseason crowns. He has been playing basketball for only five years and late last season blossomed into an outstanding performer.

Tisdale, a sophomore who became the first freshman in history to make first team All-American last season, poured in an average of 26.8 points

on 58 percent shooting and averaged 9.6 rebounds. He had 74 blocked shots.

Tisdale was named the Player of the Year in the Big Eight for the second straight year. The Tulsa, Okla., product was the only returning starter on the seventh-ranked Sooners, who posted a 29-4 record and won the Big Eight regular-season championship.

The second team consists of Kentucky's Sam Bowie, who came back this season after sitting out two

years with a leg injury, Devin Durrant of Brigham Young, Michael Cage of San Diego State, Chris Mullin of St. John's and Leon Wood of Fullerton State.

Pirates Ready For Return To Gridiron

East Carolina's Pirates, who finished the 1983 season with an 8-3 record and ranked 20th in the nation on the final Associated Press Football Poll, begin workouts in preparation for the 1984 season on Thursday.

East Carolina will finish up their spring drills on April 14 with the

annual Purple-Gold game.

Key areas of emphasis for the spring would seem to be at quarterback and in the defensive line.

Coach Ed Emory, who will be entering his fifth year as the head coach of the Pirates, finds 33 lettermen returning including 12

starts. Of those 12, seven are on offense, although two of them shared the same position. Only three return on the defensive unit, while the placekicker and punter are also expected back.

Emory, who spoke to the Greenville Sports Club yesterday, said that punter Jeff Bolch would return only if he elected to use his final year of eligibility as a graduate student.

The key to the Pirate future will be finding a quarterback to replace Kevin Ingram, who led the Bucs this past season at that post. Emory has not one quarterback who has taken a snap in a varsity Division I-A football game.

Top candidates for the post would appear to be freshman-redshirt Ron Jones, sophomore Darrell Speed, who played some as a running back last year, and junior college transfer Robbie Bartlett.

Emory feels that his offensive line will be good if the Pirates stay healthy. "We have more depth and ability and character than we've ever had before. We have eight

tackles who are over 270 pounds. And I think we have the best receivers in the country. We have five or six who can play for anybody, we just have to get the ball to them."

Emory said, however, that the tight end position is a concern. Damon Pope returns there, but the Pirates could find help from former basketballer Barry Wright at that spot.

Norman Quick and Tim Dumas are the only starters back in the line, but they'll find help from lettermen Mack Powers, Tim Mitchell, Brad Henson, and a host of others. Ricky Nichols, Tony Baker, Stefan Adams and Henry Williams all return at the flanker and split end positions.

The backfield should be solid too despite the loss of strong-running Earnest Byner. Jimmy Walden is back at the tailback position, while Reggie Branch and a large group of others return to bolster the two positions.

However, there are no returning starters in the defensive line. Top candidates are expected to be Kevin Banks and Willie Mack at defensive

ends, and Joe Grinage and Leon Hall at the tackles. Emory looks for Chris Santa Cruz to be the best nose guard he's had at East Carolina.

"Our secondary will be the strongest it's ever been," Emory feels. But he cautions it will only be good if the line develops. Kevin Walker and Calvin Adams return in the secondary along with newcomers Vernard Wynn and Gary London, the latter of whom saw late action last year.

The linebacking crew is led by returner P.J. Jordan, while Tyrone Johnson is the top candidate for the other spot.

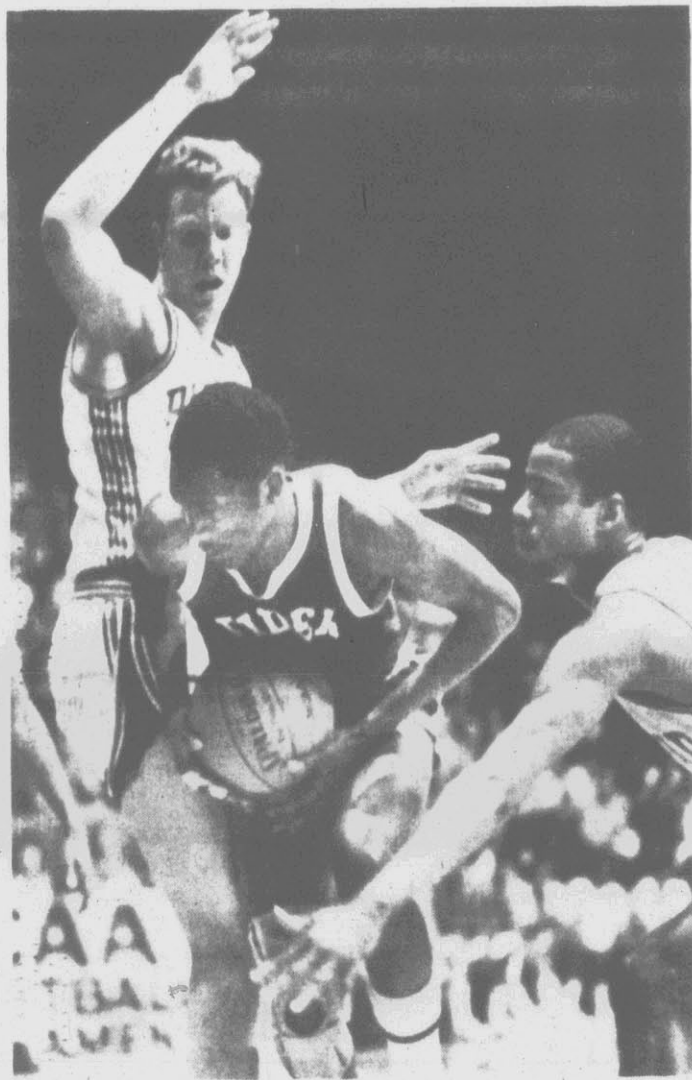
Jeff Heath is back to handle the placekicking duties. "We're a stronger team than we were a year ago, and we're in better shape than we were a year ago. But we don't have the maturity and leadership that we had then," Emory said.

"This has been a positive year for us and we have to build and improve upon it. It's tougher now than it was

four years ago because it's harder to sustain than to build."

The spring will be vital in several areas, and with the third new offensive coordinator in three years another hurdle also has to be overcome.

The real answers, however, won't be known until the fall when the Pirates take the field against someone other than themselves. That someone will be Florida State on September 1 at Tallahassee.

Poulton To Decide ECU-NSCU Series

When the decision on the future of the East Carolina-N.C. State football series comes down, it will come from NCSU Chancellor Bruce Poulton, according to Board of Trustees' vice-chairman James Hackney III of Washington.

Hackney said that Poulton, in informal conversation with the board, relayed the feelings of the school's athletic council that the series between the two schools should be ended when the current contract expires in 1985.

It was revealed publicly yesterday that the athletic council had voted unanimously to end the 14-year-old series between the two schools. However, that was the group's recommendation only and it is up to the athletic director (Willis Casey) and the chancellor to make the final decision.

Hackney said that conversations with Poulton led him to believe that he alone would make the final decision, and that he would not rush into it but would try to come to a decision that would be in the best interests of both schools.

Hackney expressed his own personal opinion that the series should be continued.

A report in the Raleigh Times yesterday, quoting another member of the board as saying that the board of trustees had voted to end the series, was completely erroneous, Hackney added. "The situation was not on the agenda, and no vote was

asked for or even considered," Hackney said.

Meanwhile, East Carolina Football Coach Ed Emory, speaking at the Greenville Sports Club yesterday, said he would be very disappointed to see the series come to an end.

"I don't know anything official, but I will be truly sorry if it does end," Emory said. "It would be a great loss to both universities and to the people of the state."

Emory said that East Carolina's football program was not built on just playing N.C. State, however, and it would survive should the series end. "We don't have to play them to be successful, but we certainly would like to continue. I think the people of eastern North Carolina want the game and I think eight of their top 20 crowds there are East Carolina games. I really don't see how they can justify ending the series."

Emory said he felt that the quality of ECU's recruiting and its play brought on the feelings of those who would end the series. "We had a

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Valvano Takes Same Approach

RALEIGH (AP) — North Carolina State basketball coach Jim Valvano says he'd like to put a National Invitational Tournament trophy next to the NCAA trophy his Wolfpack won last season — something no team has ever done.

"We'll approach the NIT the same way we'd approach the NCAA," Valvano said. "It's a national tournament. There are teams in this field that are probably equal or better than teams in the NCAA. So we want to go in and win it."

Guard Terry Gannon said on Tuesday the NIT is a chance for the Wolfpack, 19-13, to erase memories of a disappointing season.

"This is a chance to redeem ourselves for the last six games," Gannon said, referring to the Wolfpack's six-game losing streak.

"We can accomplish something great, the NCAA championship and the NIT championship."

"The club's excited about that," he added. "This is a whole new season. The last six losses don't really matter."

Valvano said he won't be at a loss at what to do if the Wolfpack does win.

"Look, there are 8,000 Italians in New York," Valvano said Tuesday at a news conference. "I'll find somebody to hug if we win. I'll find some nets to cut down."

The defending NCAA champions host Florida State Thursday and Valvano wants very much to go back to New York, back to a tournament he's known since childhood, back to a tournament he played in. And he wants to come back a winner.

In the middle of a six-game slide, Valvano sees a goal. Nobody has won an NCAA and NIT championship back to back.

"I wanted this team to seek its own identity," Valvano said. "I didn't say this year is not a success if you don't make it back to the NCAA's. I didn't want them to have that pressure."

Fact is, it's a tournament, and

that's good enough for Valvano. "Get eight squads together and go to Fuquay-Varina — it's a tournament," Valvano said. "Can I cut the nets down? Let's go."

Fuquay-Varina is a rural Wake County town 18 miles south of the N.C. State campus.

To go, Valvano said the Wolfpack needs to get on a roll. The stumbling

block is that Florida State is a team already on a roll.

The 19-10 Seminoles have won five of their last six games, including two victories over Virginia Tech. They lost by only two to Memphis State and beat Louisville by 15 during mid-season.

Al Gipson, a 6-foot-10 freshman center, was the Metro Conference rookie of the year and has been the

leading scorer for Florida State in 22 of its 29 games. He averages 20.7 points per game and 6.8 rebounds.

Valvano said forward Vince Martello and guard Dean Shaffer could also be trouble. Martello is the second leading scorer on the team with 13.7 points, and Shaffer averages nearly 10.

But the big trouble, Valvano said, is "they're hot and we're not."

The problem for the Wolfpack in recent weeks has been the sticky defense on 6-9 forward Lorenzo Charles. Though he averages more than 18 points per game, he has been held below that in the last five games.

The burden then falls on the N.C. State guards, 5-7 Anthony "Spud" Webb, 6-0 Gannon and 6-5 Ernie Myers.

"If our guards don't shoot, we lose," Valvano said. "When our guards shoot, we win."

Valvano said N.C. State's exclusion from the NCAA's was its own fault. The 20th win never came and neither did the bid. But this is a chance for redemption.

"The NIT is a losers' tournament only in the eyes of people who haven't suited up," Valvano said.

Tar Heels Not Looking Back But Ahead Toward Tourney

CHAPEL HILL (AP) — Losing in the semifinals of the Atlantic Coast Conference basketball tournament wasn't the end of the world for North Carolina's Michael Jordan. It wasn't the end of the season, either.

Despite their 77-75 loss to Duke last weekend, the Tar Heels not only got top-seed in the NCAA East Regional, they retained No. 1 spot in the latest Associated Press college basketball poll.

"It doesn't concern me, not that much," Jordan said during a news conference Tuesday. "I never like to lose, but it's not the end of the season."

The Tar Heels will meet either St. John's or Temple in a second-round game next Saturday at the Charlotte Coliseum, a home away from home during the regular season for Jordan and his teammates.

"I thought we would drop (from

No. 1) and go out west," Jordan said when asked whether he thought North Carolina would lose its position in the poll after the loss to the Blue Devils.

"I saw the Georgetown game and they played well. They beat Syracuse, which is a very good team," Jordan added. "I felt they would be put in the East."

North Carolina faced St. John's in the finals of last December's Holiday Festival in New York and came away winners by a 64-51 count.

Jordan said he expects the Redmen would be better than that game and added that facing a non-conference opponent wouldn't give the Tar Heels that much of an edge.

"Last year we had the East and we didn't do so well. We lost in the regional finals," Jordan said. "I just think the most important part about the East is that we have the home crowd — maybe. Sometimes, that can affect your play."

Jordan said inconsistent play hampered the Tar Heels against the Blue Devils. Those kinks are being worked out in this week's practices — all 90 minutes long.

"In the Clemson game, we played very well. In the Duke game ... we had a lot of mistakes," Jordan said. "Duke was fired up because the two games before were close and they just had the momentum."

The tournament marked the return of freshman point guard Kenny Smith, who has been out of action since late January with a broken wrist. Smith played briefly in regular-season games against Georgia Tech and Duke before he got the starting nod against Clemson in the opening round of the tournament.

"We knew we could win without Kenny," Jordan said. "With our style of basketball, we can overcome that."

Coach Dean Smith said the Redmen have certainly improved since the teams met in Madison Square Garden.

"We're aware of Chris Mullin, but the thing that makes them go is they're a great rebounding team," Smith said. "You have to know where Mullin is. He's a great passer. He's got a lot of savvy."

Bill Wennington and Jeff Allen account for 12 rebounds per game, although St. John's does not hold an advantage over its opponents in rebounding. Both the Redmen and their opponents average 29 rebounds per game while the Tar Heels grab 34 per game.

Temple swept its 18-game schedule in the Atlantic 10, which parallels North Carolina's 14-0 ACC slate. The Owls, 25-4, are led by Terence Stansbury and Granger Hall.

"I hope it won't be like 1979 when Pennsylvania said they got tired of watching Carolina on television," Smith said. "They thought it was a soap opera or something."

Dalrymple Is Rookie Of Year

GREENSBORO (AP) — Guard Bruce Dalrymple, who led Georgia Tech to a National Invitational Tournament bid, has been selected as the Atlantic Coast Conference rookie of the year by the Atlantic Coast Sports Writers Association.

Dalrymple got 74 votes out of possible 130 as he outdistanced freshman point guard Kenny Smith of North Carolina. Smith, who missed five weeks of the season with a broken bone in his wrist, received 29 votes. Duke guard Tommy Amaker was third with 20 votes followed by Virginia center Olden Polynice with 5 votes.

Earlier, Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, whose team beat top-ranked North Carolina in the league tournament, was named ACC coach of the year.

Dalrymple, a 6-foot-3 guard, started all of Georgia Tech's 29 games and averaged 13.6 points and 6.8 rebounds a game, leading all guards in the ACC in rebounding.

"I'm really happy and pleased for Bruce," said Georgia Tech coach Bobby Cremins, whose team is 18-10 going into its NIT opener against Virginia Tech Thursday night. "I think he deserves it."

"There are some great rookies in the conference," he added. "Players like Kenny Smith, Tommy Amaker, Olden Polynice and others that make it that much greater an honor for Bruce to win."

"Bruce has triple statistics for us — rebounding, scoring and assists. He has also given us the intangibles that you don't see in the box score. He's given everything," Cremins said.

Krzyzewski, 36, who has been at Duke for four years, received 73 of the 130 ballots cast, followed by North Carolina's Dean Smith who got 34 votes. Krzyzewski previously was an assistant coach under Indiana's Bobby Knight and he was head coach at Army for five years.

Last year's ACC coach of the year, Georgia Tech's Bobby Cremins,

captured 17, followed by Lefty Driesell of Maryland with 6 votes.

"One of the things about an award like this is that it is a reflection not only on our team and staff but on the entire university organization," Krzyzewski said. "Individual honors are always shared."

Krzyzewski's Blue Devils have risen from an 11-17 record in 1982-83 to their current 24-9 mark, including a 77-75 upset of the Tar Heels in the ACC tournament Saturday.

Duke received an invitation Sunday to play in the West Regional of the NCAA tournament. The third-seeded Blue Devils will play the winner of Thursday's Washington-Nevada-Reno game Sunday in Pullman, Washington.

"This team has done a nice job this year and made me look good," said Krzyzewski. "I hope we continue to play this well and hard in the NCAA tournament."

Earlier, Michael Jordan, who led top-ranked North Carolina to the No. 1 seed in the East Regional of the NCAA Basketball Tournament, was named the ACC player of the year.

Tacy Excited About Prospects

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — Wake Forest coach Carl Tacy says he's excited about the prospects of his 19th-ranked Demon Deacons reaching the final four in the NCAA basketball tournament.

Wake Forest, 21-8, received a opening-round bye in the Midwest Regional and are seeded third. The Demon Deacons, who made the NCAA tournament for the third time in four years, will play the survivor of Friday's Kansas-Alcorn State game in Lincoln, Neb., on Sunday.

"We are excited and pleased to not only get the bid, but to also get the bye," Tacy said. "With all the parity on the college level now, you wonder just how close all these teams are."

"Because of our lack of size and depth, we need the bye," Tacy added. "It's particularly exciting to me that we need but three wins to reach the final four. That's a lot, sure, but still very possible."

Tacy said that with the NCAA tournament field increased to 53 teams, there wasn't much suspense in waiting for a bid.

"We knew we would be playing somewhere," Tacy said.

The Demon Deacons, who lost to Atlantic Coast Conference tournament champ Maryland 66-64 in the semifinals Saturday, weren't the only ACC team to receive a bye in the tournament. Top-ranked North Carolina, 11th-ranked Maryland and 14th-ranked Duke also got byes.

Another ACC team, Virginia, was also named to the NCAA field but did not receive a bye.

Morehead State is in a horse race with a couple of thoroughbreds from cross-state in Kentucky. It's not the kind of race the Eagles figure to win.

Morehead, champions of the Ohio Valley Conference, won its preliminary round game in the NCAA basketball tournament Tuesday night, edging North Carolina A&T 70-69 on Guy Minnifield's 20-foot shot with only four seconds remaining. Next up for the Eagles: Louisville. If Morehead, 24-5, manages to upset the Cardinals at Milwaukee Friday night in the Midwest Regional, the third-ranked Kentucky Wildcats could be next.

"Every time we play Louisville, it's a nightmare," said Morehead Coach Wayne Martin, whose Eagles lost 85-50 to the Cardinals earlier this season. "We race at Latonia and they're in the Kentucky Derby."

Minnifield didn't let the pressure of the opening steps in the race to the Final Four bother him. His game-winning basket was his only one of the game.

"Guy has been in that position before," said Martin. "He's done it on several occasions for us."

After Morehead's victory at Dayton, Ohio, Alcorn State pounded Houston Baptist 79-60. At the Palestra in Philadelphia, Northeastern downed Long Island University 90-87. Richmond belted Rider 89-65 and Princeton took San Diego 65-56.

The Morehead-NC A&T game was

an historic one. The referees used a television replay with 26 seconds remaining to determine which Aggie should attempt a pair of free throws after an intentional foul was called on the Eagles' Earl Harrison. James Horace hit one of two free throws to put the Aggies ahead 69-68.

Harrison was charged with a deliberate foul after he pulled the jersey of one of the Aggies' players. But the referees couldn't determine which player was fouled. At first, Eric Boyd of A&T was sent to the line. But after watching a replay, the refs awarded Horace the free throws.

The officials, Micky Crowley, Jim Burr and Tim Higgins, issued a joint statement after the game.

"It was a deliberate foul. The player came across and grabbed him by the shirt, making it a two-shot foul," the statement read. "We wanted to be sure we had the correct man at the line. We had a conference, were not entirely sure, so we got clarification from TV and justified our selection."

A&T Coach Don Corbett said: "They didn't know and they admitted they didn't know. I'll give them credit. They were honest about it."

Eddie Childress led the Eagles with 20 points, while Boyd had 23 for the Aggies, champions of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, who finished 22-7.

Michael Phelps led a balanced

Alcorn State attack with 21 points as four Braves scored in double figures. Aaron Brandon added 15 points, Eddie Archie 12 and David Claybon 10 for the Southwestern Athletic Conference champions, 22-9. Alcorn goes to Omaha, Neb., on Friday to play Kansas in a first-round Midwest regional game.

Anicet Lavodrama, an import from the Central African Republic, was high scorer for Houston Baptist with 14 points. The Huskies, champions of the Trans-America Conference, finished 24-7.

"We told our kids before the game that we didn't believe they could blow us out, but that they did believe that we could blow them out," said Braves Coach Davey Whitney.

Both Richmond and Rider made their NCAA debuts. The Spiders, 21-9 and ECAC South champions, took a 16-2 lead six minutes into the game as Rider missed its first six shots. Richmond cruised from there as John Newman scored 25 points and Kelvin Johnson added 22. Rider, which won the East Coast Conference, ended up 20-11.

Ralston Tearful Over Plight Of Invaders

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Tears filled John Ralston's eyes as he tried to explain how his Oakland Invaders had become unraveled and he had lost his job after just three games of the second United States Football League season.

He had been the league's first employee, an important force in bringing it all together. He had been head coach, general manager and chief booster of the Invaders, winners of the Pacific Division title in the league's first year.

But the team is 0-3 now and has been outscored 58-7, including two straight shutouts at home.

In an effort to shake the team out of its misery, owner Tad Taube named offensive line coach and player personnel director Chuck Hutchison, 35, as head coach Tuesday, offering Ralston an advisory position.

Ralston, 56, said he'll stay on for the moment, but if another coaching opportunity arises he'll take it.

Ralston said he cried when Taube

told him of the firing Monday night.

"I got in a dark room and I cried, that's what I did," he said.

Ralston has been steeped in football for more than three decades. He was a linebacker on two Rose Bowl teams at the University of California and later coached Stanford to two Rose Bowl victories. He coached the Denver Broncos of the National Football League for five years before being fired in 1976 after a 9-5 season.

He took an assistant coaching job with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1977 and then an administrative post with the San Francisco 49ers for two years before getting involved with the USFL.

Ralston always put everything he had into his work. He worked hard on starting up the USFL and just as hard for the Invaders, although he said recently he'd been doing a "lousy" coaching job.

Losing the Denver job, Ralston said, was "devastating," and the Oakland firing didn't compare.

When you're not winning, you're a little more prepared for bad news.

"We were 0-3 and not even looking like a football team," he said. "I think it was the total deterioration of the offense ..."

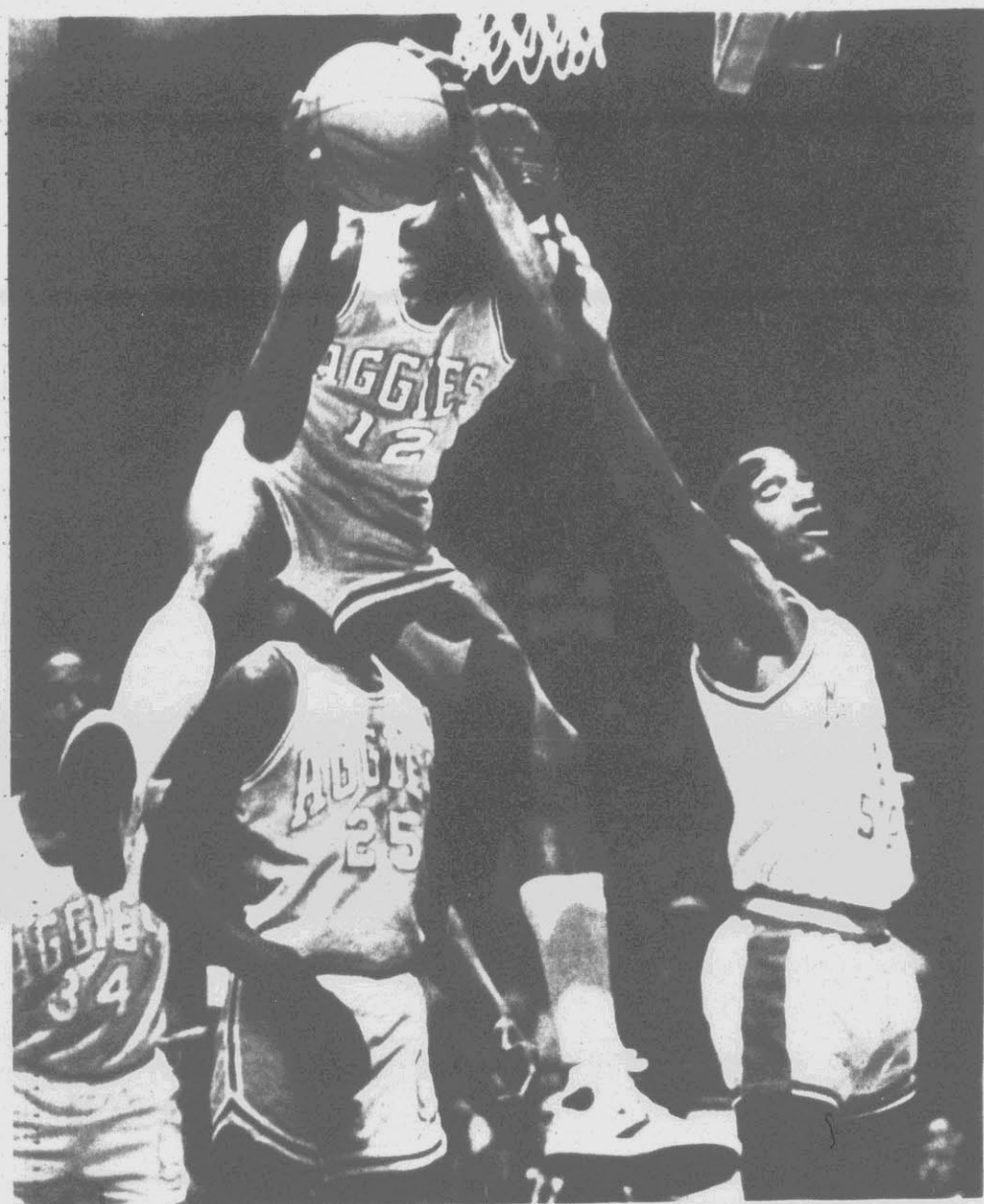
"I felt what was missing was a unity of purpose, getting the most out of the players ... there was confusion among the coaching staff and unimaginative play-calling."

Once considered as a possible commissioner of the USFL, Ralston had scouted the country for potential owners and players, bringing in original owners Bill Daniels of Los Angeles, Ron Blanding of Denver, Jim Joseph of Phoenix and Taube.

Ralston is in limbo for the moment, but he said that situation won't last long.

"I've never been out of football for 33 years, and I don't intend to be now," he said.

Meanwhile, Hutchison, the youngest coach in the league, said he hopes "a change of chemistry" will help the Invaders.

Lamar Faces Mixed Feelings Going Into Tourney Opener

With a 24-5 record, Lamar is the wiryngest basketball team in the 32-team National Invitation Tournament field — and perhaps the most irate at being passed over by the NCAA tournament committee.

Coach Pat Foster, who also is the school's athletic director, says the Cardinals may drop out of the Southland Conference because Foster believes the league doesn't carry enough clout within the NCAA.

"The problem that is evident to everyone is we have an image problem," Foster said. "I think the problem is more acute with the conference than with Lamar."

Lamar, which won the Southland Conference regular season title but was upset by Louisiana Tech in the finals of the league's postseason tournament, will play New Mexico in one of the NIT's opening-round games tonight.

In other first-round games tonight, it's Old Dominion, 20-10, at Notre Dame, 17-11; Georgia, 17-12, at Tennessee-Chattanooga, 23-6; Florida, 16-12, at South Alabama, 22-7; St. Peter's, 23-5, at Tennessee, 19-13, and Southwestern Louisiana, 20-8, at Utah State, 19-10.

On Thursday night, it's Florida State, 19-10, at North Carolina State, 19-13; Georgia Tech, 18-10, at Virginia Tech, 18-12; Wichita State, 18-11, at Michigan, 18-10; Nebraska, 17-11, at Creighton, 17-13; Ohio State, 15-13, at Xavier, Ohio, 20-9; Marquette, 16-12, at Iowa State, 16-12,

and Santa Clara, 22-8, at Oregon, 16-12.

The opening round concludes Friday night with three games — Boston College, 17-11, vs. St. Joseph's, 20-8, and Pittsburgh, 16-12, vs. La Salle, 20-10, at Philadelphia, and Fordham, 19-14, at Weber State, 22-8.

The second and third rounds will also be played at regional sites. The four surviving teams will advance to New York City for the semifinals and finals to be played at Madison Square Garden on March 26 and March 28.

A smaller but much quicker team than New Mexico, Lamar's offense is built around 6-foot-5 Tom Sewell, the Southland Conference Player of the Year who averaged 22 points a game this season.

"He's a lot like Devin Durrant," said New Mexico Coach Gary Colson in comparing Sewell to the Brigham Young forward. "He lives at the free throw line and a lot of what they do revolves around him."

Notre Dame, meanwhile, will be looking for some redemption in this 47th annual NIT, the nation's oldest postseason basketball tourney. The Fighting Irish were knocked out in the first round last year with a 71-57 loss to Northwestern.

Because the 32-team NIT field contains 13 teams who are 20-game winners along with North Carolina State, last season's NCAA champion, Notre Dame Coach Digger Phelps thinks the tourney will be an "inter-

esting march to New York City for all the teams involved."

Tennessee has never played St. Peter's, and Tennessee Coach Don DeVoe is well aware of the Peacocks' reputation for tough defense.

"Our fans have never heard of them and that sometimes carries over to our players," DeVoe said. "The team is obviously good, and I'm very impressed after watching the video tapes. What's critical is that we are fresh, alert, excited, and not overconfident."

St. Peter's is 23-5 and on a 16-game winning streak, tying Iona and La Salle for the Metro Atlantic Conference title at 11-3.

Utah State Coach Rod Tueller sizes up Southwestern Louisiana as a team very much like his own.

"It's interesting to see that they're a team very much like we are," Tueller said. "They don't have a dominant center, they score pretty much the same amount we do and they're a team we can rebound with."

Southwestern Louisiana is known for its ability to get up and down the court in a hurry, and Tueller hopes to fight fire with fire.

"We're going to run and play up-tempo against them," Tueller said. "They're already calling us about (extra) oxygen, so that's a good sign."

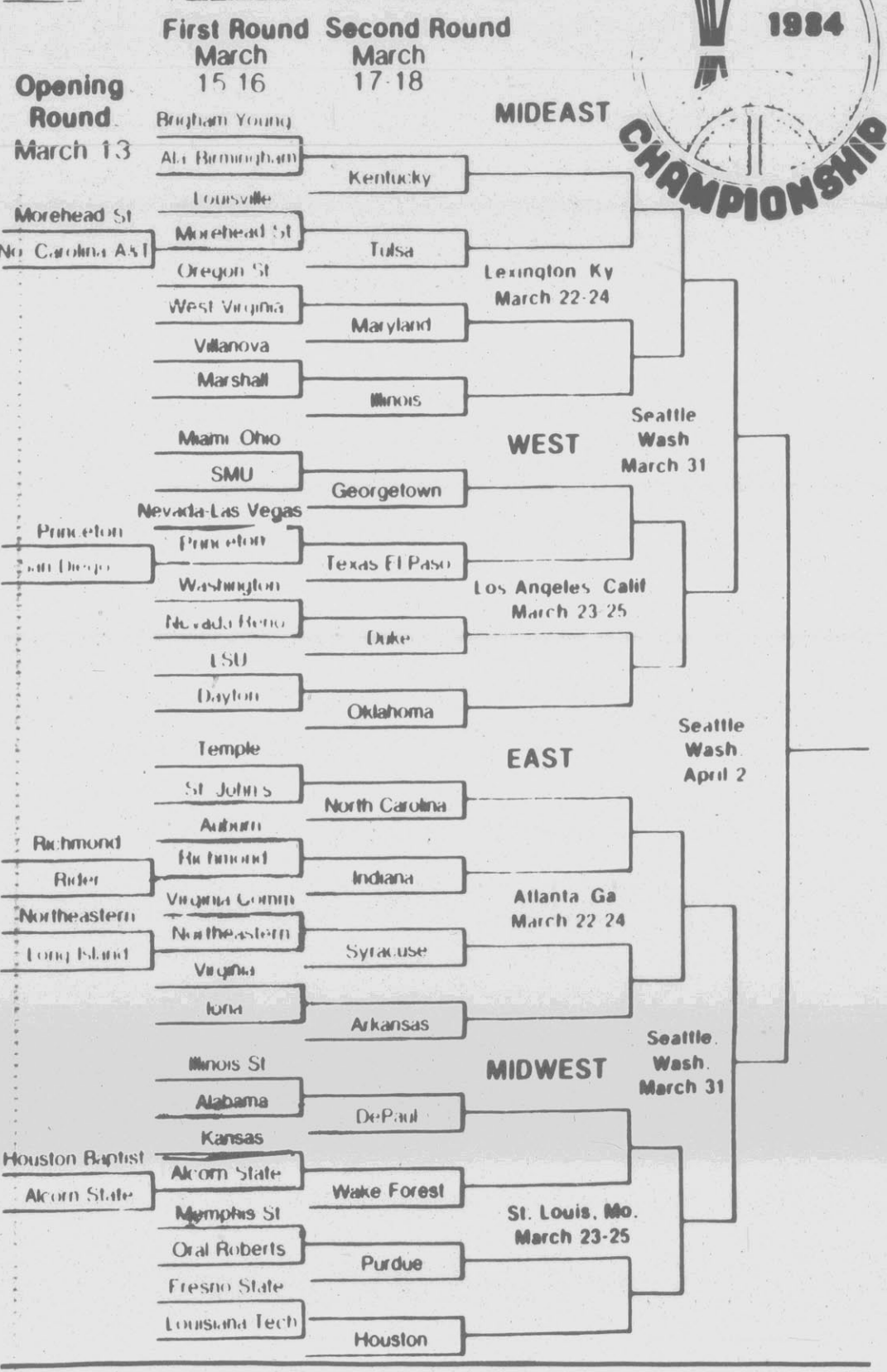

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Hunt And Helms Said Near Even

RALEIGH (AP) — Campaign officials for Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., and Gov. Jim Hunt disagree over the significance of a poll that shows the senator has pulled even with Hunt after trailing his likely re-election opponent by 20 percentage points last fall.

A University of North Carolina poll released Tuesday reported that Hunt, a Democrat, was the choice of 47 percent of the adults surveyed between Feb. 17 and March 1, while 45 percent favored Republican Helms. Among registered voters, 47 percent preferred Hunt and 46 percent Helms. Eight percent overall and seven percent of the registered voters were undecided.

The 3 percent margin of error means the candidates are virtually tied, the pollsters said in a news release.

The poll showed that since last fall, the governor's support has eroded in nearly every voter category except blacks.

"People are beginning to see Hunt's true record in education, spending, taxes etc.," said Claude Allen, a spokesman for Helms' campaign. "We have successfully brought to the attention of the public the difference between Hunt's record and his rhetoric."

But Stephanie Bass, a spokeswoman for Hunt's campaign, said the governor was not losing support.

"He's gaining," she said. "Sen. Helms has desperately been trying to get a lead and has been unable to so far. He's spent about \$4 million and for an incumbent who's been in office 11 years that's pretty sad."

However, Ms. Bass questioned both the poll's accuracy and the way it was compiled.

"You can't feel confidence in any of these polls because they're all done differently," she said. "Some of the things they did ... I wouldn't do."

"I would say it's going to be a tight race. We've never thought otherwise. But we feel fine about where we are now," she said.

She added that a Hunt campaign poll conducted Feb. 24-26 showed Hunt with a nine-point lead.

But Allen said the poll was more accurate than previous ones.

"We're glad to see that the UNC School of Journalism finally has taken pretty much of an accurate poll," he said. "The figures are not far from what we've been seeing of late. They represent a tremendous movement ... since this time last year."

Allen added, however, that Helms "still has an uphill battle to fight between now and November because of Hunt's and (the Rev.) Jesse Jackson's effort to register 200,000 voters, most of whom will vote for Hunt."

"The poll has measured public opinion in the long anticipated Helms-Hunt clash since 1981, and always Hunt has led. In the October 1983 survey, the two-term governor held a whopping 56 percent to 36 percent lead. Last spring, the margin was 54 percent to 32 percent."

"White respondents favored Helms 52 percent to 40 percent, whereas last fall Hunt led among whites 51 percent to 41 percent. Blacks, however, remained firmly in the Hunt camp — preferring him 86 percent to 8 percent for Helms."

"People who called themselves Democrats favored Hunt 67 percent to 26 percent, down from October."

"Hunt's lead among people with family incomes of \$15,000 or less shrank from 64 percent to 21 percent in October to 52 percent to 40 percent in the latest poll."

"People with less than 12 years of schooling who favored Hunt by 56 percent to 30 percent in October split 45-45 in late February."

"Helms forged ahead 50 percent to 41 percent among people aged 40 and above, who gave Hunt a 54-37 lead last fall."

"Hunt's lead among women dwindled from 62 percent to 26 percent in October to 52 percent to 40 percent in the new poll."

"Helms was preferred by 51 percent of the men to 42 percent for Hunt after running virtually even last fall."

"A total of 1,209 people were surveyed in the newest poll. Pollsters said there was a 95 percent chance of getting the same results — plus or minus 3 percent — by dialing every telephone in the state."

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Leviathans Like Pats

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Some gray whales making their annual journey from Baja California to the northern Pacific seem to be stopping along the California coast for a quick pat on the nose or a backscratch.

Fishermen and boaters who encounter the leviathans at close range during the December-to-March migrating season say it appears the wild whales enjoy being petted.

"They have a great natural curiosity," said Bill Seaton at Sea World. "We have had numerous reports about people in boats. They come near and the people can lean right over and pet them. If the boats come too close when they're calving there might be a problem. But if the baby's not in danger, they're not at all dangerous. They could knock over a boat but we don't have many cases that it has happened."

Do whales know they're in for a caress if they approach a boat?

"It's hard to read what a whale is thinking," said Seaton. "We had the only gray whale ever kept in captivity. Gigi was here from 1971-72, and she just loved to be rubbed and hugged. She fell in love with several of her trainers."

Outdoor writer Fred Hootor said the whales may be expecting affection because expedition operators have been taking tourists to their winter breeding grounds at Scammon's Lagoon in central Baja, and allowing passengers to pet the whales.

"It's a matter of learned behavior," said Hootor. "The problem is that if your boat is small and you are not expecting it, the whales can tip you over very easily."

End Prolonged Probe Of Fraud

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — A four-month undercover operation into food stamp fraud and corruption in the Fayetteville-Cumberland County area has been concluded, U.S. Attorney Sam Currin said Tuesday.

Operation Stampout revealed widespread abuse of food stamps as an underground currency used in the purchase or acquisition of drugs, firearms, automobiles and cash, Currin said.

He said 38 federal indictments have been returned in the case, with 33 convictions. The other five people charged are either awaiting trial or still at large, he said.

Old Chores Said Longevity Aid

TIFTON, Ga. (AP) — Churning butter, washing clothes with scrub boards and pushing heavy irons probably wasn't so bad for old-time rural women — because it may have helped them live to a ripe old age, a researcher says.

Doug Bachtel of the Rural Development Center studied data from the 1980 census and found that 3,434 Georgia residents, were over 95 years old — 72 percent of them women.

Although women have a longer life expectancy than men, Bachtel said the nature of their work in the late 1800s actually amounted to aerobic exercise.

Churning butter, he said, "is an aerobic-type exercise that didn't require much strength, but it did require an expenditure of a lot of energy over a long period of time."

Washing clothes on a scrub board or ironing for an hour may have lengthened women's lives by regularly exercising their cardiovascular system, Bachtel said.

"These women were doing this same work morning, noon and night," he added.

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Women's Chess Champion Wants To Outshine Men

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The world women's chess champion, vowing to prove that "women are not less brainy than men," wants to go up against the world's best men at the chessboard.

Maya Cheburdonidze, 23, of the Soviet Union proved she has the potential recently in New Delhi when she won an international chess tournament, defeating 11 men from Bulgaria, India and her own country.

It was one of about a dozen times that she challenged men whose ratings were higher and defeated them, she said in an interview.

"Chess is a game for the intellect. It gives equal chances for both sexes so I am going to challenge the other sex."

Miss Cheburdonidze started to play chess at the age of 8, became the Soviet women's champion when she was 15, and took the world title at 17.

She said she plans now to qualify as a chess grandmaster among men and wants to become the best player of both sexes.

"I could do it because I am gifted and I work hard on it," said Miss Cheburdonidze, a fourth-year medical student from Kutaisi, a city in the Soviet Republic of Georgia.

"Men can't sleep after playing a chess game with her," said her coach, E.Y. Gufeld. They can't get over the feeling that a woman can play as well as, or better than, a man, he said.

"She is extremely intelligent," he added. "I started coaching her in 1976 and she started coaching me two years later." She defeated him in the recent matches here.

For Miss Cheburdonidze, chess is an easy way for a woman to have an "intellectual battle" with men.

"I want to beat men to prove that women are not less brainy than men," she said. "I want to be the greatest chess player in the world."

She has received three invitations for matches with the world's renowned male grandmasters, including American Paul Banker.

"They want to play with me because playing chess with a woman is interesting to them," she said, without elaborating.

She added that she might accept the match with Banker next year, after she defends her women's title in December.

Miss Cheburdonidze was born in a family of amateur chess players. She developed her game at the House of Pioneers, a Soviet organization for young people, and became a woman grandmaster under the coaching of Gufeld.

She used to spend nearly all day learning, but now practices about three to four hours a day because of her medical studies.

"Chess is a game of beautiful art. I feel so content when I play," the chess queen said.

But she also wants a medical career.

"I want to be good in both fields. I'll think about which one to choose for a career when the time comes."

Calling herself an "emancipated woman," Miss Cheburdonidze said she is a daring, aggressive player who tries to force the action.

She said most of her moves are calculated ones, but some are just based on intuition.

"At any rate, I pay no attention to the other player. I just concentrate on the chess board," Miss Cheburdonidze said, adding that she takes this attitude especially when playing with a man.

"When you have this attitude, you forget about the sex of the competing player."

Miss Cheburdonidze said she plans to become a grandmaster among men in three years, then challenge the eight or 10 super grandmasters.

"It's going to be tough work, because the super grandmasters are really tough."

Affirmative Action Adopted For State

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — The head of the state Human Relations Council says women and minorities will have a better chance of landing a job in state government under North Carolina's new affirmative action policy.

The Rev. Jerry Drayton of Winston-Salem said he is "well pleased by the (Gov. Jim Hunt's) action because the executive order encompasses all the recommendations we took to him ... and it enhances job opportunities within the state government for women, blacks and other minorities."

The council sought the order after a six-month study of affirmative action in North Carolina. Hunt had requested the study after he received the council's 1982 affirmative action progress report showing less progress in that area during 1982 than in previous years.

Drayton said the "executive order was necessary to put more obligation on the department heads."

He said the order also makes the council's job "easier because we

have to make progress reports to (Hunt) while at the same time we are supposed to improve equal employment opportunities in state government."

In the order, Hunt said each department head under his jurisdiction would be responsible for complying with the state's commitment to provide equal employment opportunities without regard to race, religion, national origin, sex, age or handicap.

Under the order, each department head must:

— Submit to the state personnel office by Oct. 1 each year an annual affirmative action plan designed to conform to the executive order.

— Provide training on equal employment opportunity or affirmative action compliance to managers, supervisors and others who make personnel decisions.

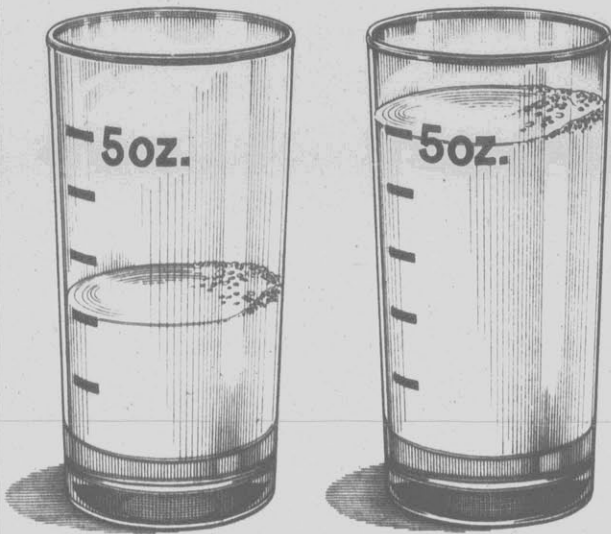
— Provide for an annual internal evaluation system holding managers at all levels accountable for the progress or lack of progress on the department's affirmative action program.

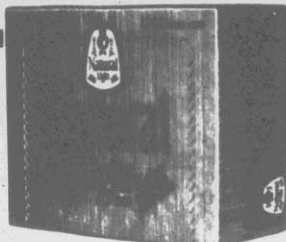

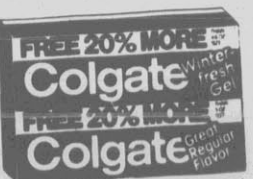

How Tar Heels Voted in The House, Senate

By Roll Call Report
WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes between March 1-7.

HOUSE
FORGIVE — By a vote of 283 for and 111 against, the House passed

and sent to the Senate a bill to rescue the Rural Electrification Administration, which provides low-interest loans to small telephone and electric companies.

To keep the agency solvent, the bill (HR 3050) forgives it from repaying \$7.9 billion it owes taxpayers in Treasury notes, and permits

higher interest on REA loans to rural utilities.

Critics said the bill illuminates the fiscal impact of the little-publicized "credit budget," which is hard to control because it lies outside of the appropriations process, while supporters said the REA returns major dividends to the economy.

Sponsor Kika de la Garza, D-Tex., said American farm productivity depends on "the soundness and integrity of rural electric cooperatives and our small telephone companies."

Opponent Ed Bethune, R-Ark., said Congress should realize that when it bails out operations like Chrysler Corp. and the REA "we do crowd people out of ... the credit marketplace."

Members voting yes favored the REA rescue plan.

North Carolina representatives voting yes were Walter Jones, D-1; Tim Valentine, D-2; Charles Whitley, D-3; Ike Andrews, D-4; Stephen Neal, D-5; Charles Rose, D-7; James Martin, R-9; James Broyhill, R-10 and James Clarke, D-11.

Charles Britt, D-6, and W.G. Hefner, D-8, did not vote.

food supplies for 18 African countries beset by famine. About \$60 million of the outlay will go to the merchant marine industry under a requirement that American flagships carry fixed amounts of U.S. farm surpluses sent abroad.

Supporter Matthew McHugh, D-N.Y., said, "If we are to avert catastrophe in Africa, we must respond swiftly with the necessary assistance."

No opponent spoke against the bill, which provided \$60 million more than the Administration had requested.

Members voting yes wanted to send U.S. food to starving Africans.

North Carolina representatives voting yes were Walter Jones, Valentine, Whitley, Ike Andrews, Neal, Britt, Rose, James Martin, Broyhill and Clarke.

Hefner did not vote.

SENATE

VATICAN — By a vote of 81 for and 13 against, the Senate confirmed the nomination of William Wilson as U.S. ambassador to the Vatican, a city-state that has diplomatic relations with 108 nations. At President Reagan's request, Congress in January restored formal U.S. relations with the Holy See, ending a hiatus of 117 years. The U.S. has diplomatic ties with no other church-state.

Supporters called the move justified in view of the Pope's worldwide political involvement. Opponents said formal ties with the Vatican or any other church violate the constitutional separation of church and state.

Senators voting yes favored U.S. diplomatic relations with the Holy See.

North Carolina senators John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, voted no.

ALASKAN OIL — By a vote of 70 for and 20 against, the Senate tabled (killed) an amendment to remove the ban on exporting Alaskan oil. The amendment was offered to a trade bill (S 979) that later was sent to conference with the House. It called for exports of up to 200,000 barrels daily, with Japan the likely destination.

An energy-independence measure, the prohibition is part of the 1973 law governing construction of the Alaskan pipeline.

Sponsor Frank Murkowski, D-Alaska, said the ban invites higher energy prices by discouraging exploration for additional Alaskan oil, and "certainly undermines an important trade and defense relationship with our Asian neighbors,

notably Japan."

Opponent Alfonso D'Amato, R-N.Y., said exporting Alaskan oil "would increase our dependence upon imports ... and would not lead to a significant increase in domestic oil production."

Members voting yes wanted to continue the export ban.

Senators East and Helms voted yes.

'Seeing Things' Said Better Than Most TV

NEW YORK (AP) — "Seeing Things" was described by one critic as "the best series in the history of Canadian television" (Montreal Gazette) and won the "bold-faced endorsement" of another (Toronto Sun).
It's good — better than a lot of

American TV — with some really funny moments. Trouble is, all those moments, it seems, involve the series' leading character, Louie Ciccone, getting hurt — physically or verbally.

In the episode planned for distribution on public TV in this country starting Saturday, Louie is shot in the head (grazed), nearly electrocuted (burned) and pushed off a balcony (scared).

And he's abused by a lady singer who once was the focus of his dreams: "You're bald and you're overweight and you're sort of schleppey looking," says Stevie Mercer (Diane Heatherington).

"Why don't you stop at that?" Louie interrupts.
"Seeing Things" was introduced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. in Canada in 1981, and the series of 20, hour-long installments crossed the border last November with another CBC show, a science magazine called "The Nature of Things."
In "Seeing Things," Louis Del Grande plays Louie Ciccone, a

general assignment reporter for The Toronto Gazette whose psychic flashes seem to involve him in all kinds of trouble. That part is weak; the producers might have made a better show without the psychic-flash nonsense.

Some of the humor is relatively private — jokes only a Canadian would appreciate. But the writing is first-class, and that kind of quality widens the appeal. Indeed, the CBC has sold "Seeing Things" to broadcasters in more than 20 countries,

including West Germany, Italy, Spain, Singapore and South Africa.

In the upcoming installment, Louie and his estranged wife are celebrating their anniversary at a nightclub when the singer they have come to see, Johnny Lee, is killed by a hot-wired mike.

The scene is not particularly gruesome. It might even be described as mildly amusing, consistent with the rather understated humor of the dialogue. "I can't believe it," Marge Ciccone (Martha Gibson) laments. "Poor Johnny."
"Yeah," says Lou, "he was zapped, just like that."
"Now I'll never get his autograph," Marge replies.

She's wrong. "This is Johnny's picture," Lou says, "before he died."

Louie eventually solves the crime, with help from Heather Redfern (Janet-Laine Green), an assistant crown attorney and a regular in the series.

Though separated, Louie and Marge (Miss Gibson is Del Grande's wife in real life) spend plenty of time in one another's company. In one scene, a nightclub performer suggests aloud that two people as lovely as they are should reconcile their differences.

"Does my whole life history," Marger wonders aloud, "have to go down in a restaurant?"

Del Grande's exposure includes the motion picture "Atlantic City"

and the TV movie "Home to Stay" with Henry Fonda, and he wrote the stage play "42 Seconds from Broadway," which had a run there with Henry Winkler. Along with David Barlow, he created, produced and wrote "Seeing Things" for the CBC.

Give him credit for the show's success.

'Splash' Has Best Week Of Movies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Splash," a love story about a mermaid, has raked up the highest opening gross in the history of Walt Disney Productions, swimming to the top of the box office charts.

Starring Daryl Hannah as the mermaid and Tom Hanks as her boyfriend, "Splash" earned \$6.2 million in its first week in circula-

tion, a sparkling debut for the first film launched under Disney's new Touchstone banner.

Touchstone will distribute the studios' films that don't fit traditional Disney G-rated categories. "Splash" is rated PG.

The previous all-time top-grossing Disney film was the re-issue last year of "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," which earned \$5.9 million in its first week, followed by "The Black Hole," which earned \$5 million, Disney Studios president Richard Berger said Monday.

In opening at the top of the charts, "Splash" drew more moviegoers than "Footloose," which earned \$5.5 million in its fourth week.

Rogers Is Asking A Record Price

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Singer Kenny Rogers' Beverly Hills estate is on the market for \$22 million, possibly the highest asking price ever for a private home in the United States, his real estate agent says.

"It's certainly the highest price ever asked for a house in California," said Bruce Nelson, who has had the exclusive listing for the 11-acre estate since October.

Known as The Knoll, the estate features a 35-room French neoclassic stone mansion, two guest houses, a separate theater complete with popcorn and hot-dog machines, 16 garages and a gas station.

The main house has 14-foot ceilings, Waterford crystal chandeliers and, in the powder room, a collection of antique fans Rogers bought from the widow of oil baron Edward Doheny, who built the house in the 1950s, Nelson said.

Rogers paid filmmaker Dino De Laurentiis \$14.5 million for the property three years ago, then poured an additional \$5 million into renovations and \$2 million into furnishings, Nelson said.

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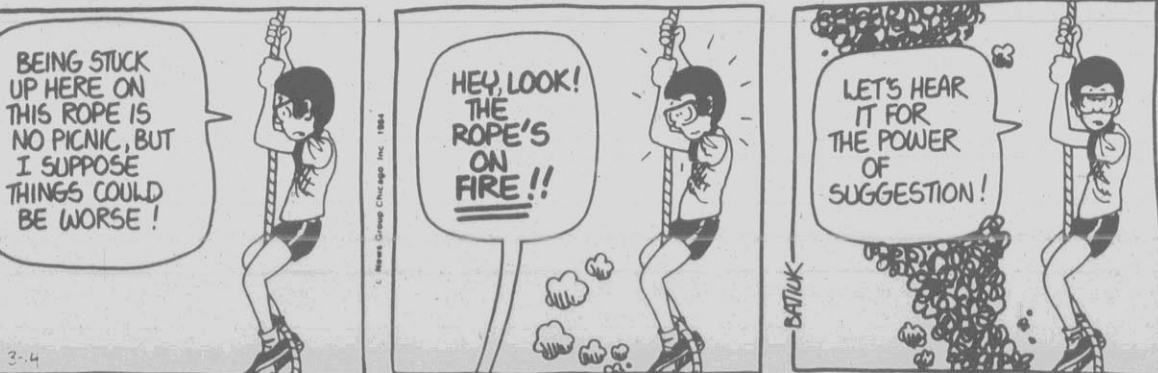

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Overall, Amtrak Given Good Safety Marks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Amtrak hasn't quite lived down stories about "the killer train" — that Silver Meteor which on its way north from Florida last summer struck a woman fishing from a trestle, later plowed into an abandoned pickup and finally derailed after hitting another truck.

On the way back two days later it hit a car, killing the driver.

None of the accidents could be blamed on Amtrak, but it gave the railroad a round of publicity it would just as soon forget.

In the last four months the nation's passenger railroad has gotten more unwanted notoriety: It has suffered two of the most serious accidents in its 13-year history as trains derailed at high speed in Texas and North Carolina, leaving four dead and scores injured.

Overall, however, government and rail industry safety experts give Amtrak high marks and say of all the ways of traveling — plane, bus, car or rail — the train remains among the safest. As the "killer train" incident demonstrated, it is vastly more dangerous to get in front of a train than to ride one.

Since Amtrak began operating in 1971, derailments have not been uncommon but only 20 passengers have been killed in train accidents. During that time Amtrak has carried more than 200 million people. Half of the fatalities came in Amtrak's worst accident, a derailment in 1971 shortly after Amtrak began service.

"The safety record (of Amtrak) I think you would have to conclude is excellent," said Bruce Fine, a rail safety specialist at the Federal Railroad Administration.

Safety experts say that even when a train is traveling at 70-plus mph passengers have considerable protection because much of the impact is absorbed at the front of the train.

"If you can keep the cars upright you almost never have a fatality," says Tom Styles, head of investigations at the National Transportation Safety Board.

Serious injuries have been reduced, the experts say, with improved design of seats, luggage compartments and car interiors to reduce the chances of a passenger

being struck or hurled into a sharp object.

Of about 50 people injured when an Amtrak train derailed near Kittrell, N.C., last week, only 16 were hospitalized although the train was traveling at 79 mph. NTSB investigators attributed the low number of serious injuries partly to improved car design.

In a report to Congress last January, the Federal Railroad Administration concluded that rail passenger service in this country "has compiled a remarkable safety record." The report said the rate of fatalities per rail passengers and miles traveled is on a par with intercity buses, slightly better than air travel and 33 times better than traveling by private car.

The National Safety Council reported that for the three years ending in 1979, the death rate for railroad passengers was .07 per 100 million miles. That compared with .06 per 100 million miles for airline passengers, .02 for intercity bus passengers and 1.3 for auto passengers.

The Railroad Administration report examined Amtrak as well as 19 railroad commuter lines and found that from 1978 through 1982 "a single passenger had a one in 400,000 chance of becoming a passenger casualty and one in 40 million chance of becoming a passenger fatality" when traveling by train.

D derailments are not uncommon at Amtrak and collisions at grade

crossings happen even more frequently. From 1981 through 1983, Amtrak reported 99 derailments resulting in 212 injuries and four fatalities to passengers and crew. It had 527 accidents in which trains hit cars or trucks at grade crossings, resulting in 135 people killed and 140 injured. Amtrak trains also struck and killed 57 pedestrians during the period.

Most often, say railroad safety experts, Amtrak was little more than an innocent party to these tragedies.

"Our trains do not leave the tracks and run pell-mell across the countryside seeking victims," says Amtrak spokesman Clifford Black.

It takes a mile or more for a train to come to a halt when traveling 70 miles an hour. In most cases there is little a train crew can do to avert a collision, officials say.

Such was the case with an Amtrak train in Wilmington, Ill., last July. Traveling 72 mph, it hit a truck that tried to beat it to the crossing. No one was killed, but the truck driver and about half the 107 people aboard the train were injured.

At other times, the culprit is the track which is inspected and maintained by the railroads that own it. While track has improved in recent years, National Transportation Safety Board reports list numerous accidents involving track problems.

One such derailment was near Marshall, Texas, last Nov. 12, the second most serious accident in

Amtrak's history.

The train left the tracks, according to NTSB investigators, when it hit a newly installed section of track on which repair work had not been completed. Four people were killed and 69 were injured. Although the new track's strength was in question, the Amtrak crew was not

advised or told to reduce speed.

But Amtrak also is not always found blameless.

A fire aboard an Amtrak sleeping car left two people dead near Gibson, Calif., in June, 1982. Later, investigators criticized Amtrak for failing to have smoke detectors in their cars, not having enough clearly

visible exit signs and not training crew members adequately to deal with a fire.

Since the accident, Amtrak has installed smoke detectors in many of its Superliner fleet, improved signs, and retrained employees on handling fire emergencies, Amtrak officials said.

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Feast Of Pizza After Big Diet

KANKAKEE, Ill. (AP) — An ambulance crew braved snowy roads for a true mission of mercy — delivering pizza to about 200 hospital employees after they lost a combined 1,700 pounds on an eight-week diet.

The workers, from St. Mary's Hospital and Riverside Medical Center, went on the group diet to raise money for the Kankakee County Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

Dennis Yohnka, a spokesman for St. Mary's, said the effort probably would raise about \$5,000.

The group traveled snowy roads Monday to the Rabideau Grain Elevator to weigh in on the elevator's huge scales.

St. Mary's workers won, but just barely — with an average loss of 12 pounds, compared with an average 11 pounds for Riverside. The group fell short of its 1-ton goal.

After the weigh-in, an ambulance pulled up with an "emergency supply of junk food," Yohnka said. "I think everyone has plans to celebrate tonight."

Ed Schwenke, director of rehabilitation services at St. Mary's, won the overall weight-loss prize, dropping 26 pounds in eight weeks.

And six nuns from St. Mary's lost a total of nearly 80 pounds, Yohnka said. "But the sad part for them is that Lent has just begun," he added.

Pet Lions Don't Know Strength

NOBLESVILLE, Ind. (AP) — Among the newest arrivals at Ron Miller's farm are Leon, Lucy and Libby — who spend most of their time just lion around.

The young lions arrived on the 216-acre farm about two months ago when Miller bought them from a rural Tipton man for \$1,500.

"I've always liked animals," Miller said. "I've had monkeys and a bear and, of course, farm livestock like cows, hogs and horses."

Miller said the lions are good-natured and gentle, but don't know their own strength. His wife, Mary Ann, was accidentally bitten on the arm and Miller was nipped in the calf during a little roughhousing.

Leon, Lucy and Libby spend most of their time napping in the hay in a partitioned-off area of the barn. When there aren't any people to socialize with, the lions enjoy swatting around old bowling balls.

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Indian Editor Beat Odds To Fulfill A Dream

PEMBROKE, N.C. (AP) — Bruce Barton remembers the first edition of his newspaper with a sigh, a smile and more than a little fondness.
Proud as a new father, he carried the 27 copies of his first paper to the Post Office in 1973. He had worked on the six-page paper for three months, and half of one page was blank because he ran out of news.
Eleven years later, The Carolina Indian Voice, one of only two Indian owned and operated newspapers in the state, has a circulation of 3,000 and a tradition of forthright, controversial commentary.
Several previous attempts to publish a newspaper in Pembroke had failed, and Barton seemed an unlikely candidate for a newspaper owner and editor.
He was an alcoholic who had spent a fair amount of time in North Carolina jails, most often for being drunk and disorderly. He was

paroled from Central Prison in 1968 on a bobbyery conviction and his only financial resource was a \$500 loan from a finance company.
But the dream of being a writer had hovered in the back of his mind since his childhood. His father, a published poet, had helped Barton pepper his distinctive Lumbee dialect with lines from Carl Sandberg and Elizabeth Barrett Browning.
"I came home for a school reunion after 13 years and somebody said we needed a newspaper in Pembroke," Barton said recently. "I got to thinking about it and then started coming home weekends from Carboro and putting together a tabloid."
"It just took hold of me. It was a spiritual thing," he said. "I went back to Carrboro, quit my job as the manager of a glass company and jumped into the newspaper business."
"And I never looked back."
He struggled from October 1972 until January 1973 with the first

edition, realizing that with no training in journalism, he was operating at a disadvantage.
Frustrated, he sought some guidance from an editor of a nearby weekly newspaper.
"I'll always love that guy," Barton said. "He helped me all he could, and at least he didn't tell me I couldn't do it. Everybody else was telling me it just wouldn't work."
Barton hadn't had a drink in three years when he started the newspaper, but his newfound career became for him what alcohol had been — a driving passion.
Another man diving into a business he knew little about might have been cautious, but caution was hardly Barton's style.
Editorially, he leaped into controversy after controversy, criticizing the Robeson County establishment, blasting the traditional political system and expressing a fiercely Indian point of view.
"I was an angry man when I

started the paper, and it was an outlet for a lot of frustrations," he said. "In retrospect, that was a mistake. It gave the paper a definite identity that limits both its circulation and its advertising. Today, I feel that we need to take a broader view and identify with all races and the issues they face."
Robeson County's population of about 100,000 is nearly evenly divided between whites, blacks and Indians. The racial mixture had created a political boiling pot, rather than a melting pot.
Pembroke, a predominantly Indian town and the center of the Lumbee community, until 1945 was governed by a white mayor and white board of commissioners appointed by the governor.
While other Southern areas had separate facilities for whites and blacks, Robeson County also provided a third set of facilities for Indians.
But Barton resented more than simple discrimination. He also resented the condescension.
His first campaign was against "double voting," a system that allowed voters in Robeson County's city school systems to vote for both city school board members and county school board members. The city school districts were primarily white, while the county system was primarily black and Indian.
In 1975, a federal court ruled "double voting" was unconstitutional.
He advocated then, and now, Indian candidates for county, state and national offices. He urged Indians to use their votes for Indian candidates, spend their money with Indian businessmen and bring their news to the Indian newspaper — The Carolina Indian Voice.
Residents who first took their news items to the county daily or other newspapers had no chance to see it published in Barton's paper. He would print a wedding announcement or church news item only if he had it first.
"That made some people mad," Barton said. "They'd holler a little bit, but most of them eventually understood when I told them this was the newspaper business and I intended to scoop the other papers with news out of my own community."
"I told them I didn't care if they

like me or not," he said, "but what I wanted was their respect."
People who asked him then when he was going to quiet down and quit slinging barbs got a stock answer. He'd quit, he said, "when Indians have one-third of everything there is to have in Robeson County."
His printed barbs were never limited to the establishment or conservative politicians.
Even white liberals who seemed supportive of minority causes came in for their share of abuse.
He once poured contempt on a commission that took two years to produce a 68-page report on the status of Indians in Robeson County. The report, which was presented 100 miles away from Robeson County in Raleigh, found that Indians in Robeson County suffered economic and political hardship.
The report drew a broadside blast from Barton, who said he could have come up with the same conclusion in far less than two years.
Minorities themselves, who might be expected to receive unadulterated praise from a minority newspaper, often drew curt warnings or outright criticism.
Indians elected or appointed to office were cautioned not to become "apple Indians" — red on the outside and white on the inside.
And Barton recently walked out on an address at Pembroke State University by Julian Bond, a black Democrat from Georgia.
Bond, in an address celebrating Black History Month, referred to President Reagan as an "amiable incompetent" and later made disparaging remarks about Reagan's advisors.
Barton, who would hardly be expected to have kind words for conservatives like Reagan and his advisors, walked out on the speech because Bond "seemed not to notice that he was speaking in a free land," Barton wrote later.
"And I know, without examining it further, that an 'amiable incompetent' cannot get elected President of these United States," he wrote. He said it is "exciting to live in a country like America where one can get up and walk out if the message is offensive, as I found Bond's to be Monday night."
Time, he says, has taken away some of the anger of those early days, when he advised readers that

writing letters to the editor to express their discontent was better than "the negative feedback of a shotgun blast."
He says he still gets a thrill out of the week's struggle to get a paper out, the euphoria of seeing the product coming off the presses. But the battle to keep a small paper financially afloat, the constant push to sell advertising and the other responsibilities of family and community have taken him away from his first love — writing.
"All I wanted to do was write," said Barton. "But people who get into weekly newspapering just to write don't understand what it involves. Someday I'd like to get back to just writing what I want to write."
He's already making a step in that direction. He is applying for a federal grant to critique nearly a century of writing about the Lumbees, or Croatan as they were once called.
He points to an article written in 1900 as an example of the image created by other for Indians here. The article in a scholarly journal of the time points out the "savage" background and "wild ancestors" of the Croatans.
"This is the kind of stuff people have been writing about us for years," Barton said. "What I want to do is write about the nuances of the Lumbee experience."

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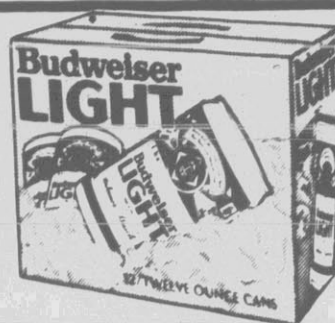
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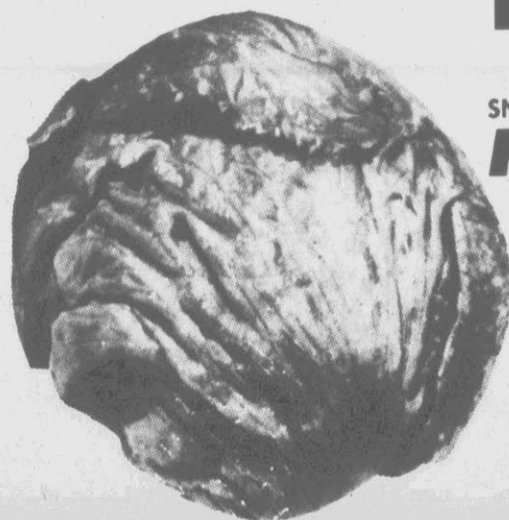


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Coupons Help Housewives Trim Grocery Bills

Americans are clipping coupons faster than ever, trimming their grocery bills by more than a billion dollars a year.

The A.C. Nielsen Co., which handles redemption programs for many coupon distributors, says consumers redeemed 5.56 billion manufacturers' coupons in 1983, up 24 percent from 1982. That compared with an increase of 17 percent the previous year, and it meant that total redemptions over the last four years have risen by 62 percent.

The coupons are steadily gaining in value. In 1982, the coupons redeemed were worth \$1.2 billion, with an average value of 21.7 cents each. In 1983, the coupons were worth almost \$1.7 billion, with an average face value of 30.5 cents each.

While the number and value of coupons increases, however, the redemption rate remains relatively low. In 1983, manufacturers distributed about 142.9 billion coupons, meaning that only 4 percent were cashed in by shoppers.

Note: These figures represent manufacturers' coupons only. They do not include the coupons issued by

the stores themselves on a local basis.

Consumers looking for coupons are most likely to find them in daily and Sunday newspapers; more than one-third of the coupons issued are in free-standing inserts in the Sunday paper; one-fifth are in the pages of the daily paper.

You can get more out of coupons if you take a little time to plan your strategy. Among the ways to save the most:

—Combine coupon and refund offers. Look for coupons for products that also offer a refund for a proof-of-purchase seal. And keep an eye out for stores in your area giving double and triple value for coupons. You could end up getting something for free or actually being paid for using a product. Here's how: Suppose you have a 30-cent coupon for paper plates normally costing \$1.29. Grocery store "A" gives triple value for coupons this week. When you get to the store, you find a form offering a \$1 refund if you buy two packages of paper plates. Buy two packages and pay \$1.68 — regular price for the first package and 39 cents for the coupon-reduced second package. Mail in the appropriate information and get back \$1. Your total expense

was \$1.88, including a stamp for the refund letter. But your final, out-of-pocket cost is 88 cents for something that normally would have cost \$2.58. One package was free, the second cost 41 cents less than without the coupon and refund. If you'd had two coupons, you would have made a net profit.

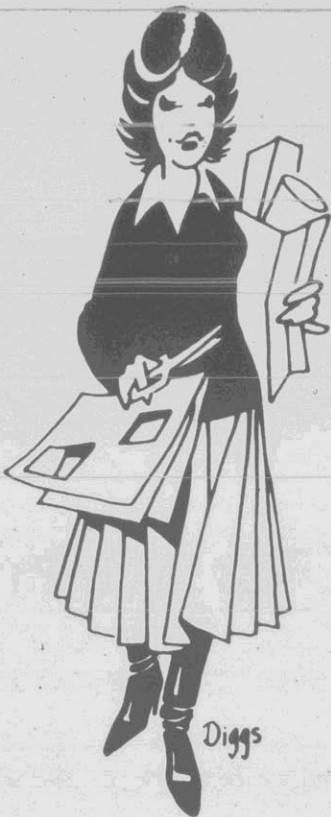
—Look for local tie-ins that allow you to save on staples. Government and university studies have shown that coupons for staples like milk, meat or fresh produce are rare. But you may be able to find a manufacturer's coupon issued in conjunction

with a local promotion that does the trick. An ice cream company, for example, might have a tie-in for a discount on fresh fruit.

—Know your prices before you start. Compare the quality and price of generic and house brands before you jump at a coupon for a national brand. The national brand may be more expensive with the coupon, than the house or generic brand without. You also should make sure that you don't sacrifice over-all value for the sake of coupons. If you take your business to a store that offers double or triple value for

coupons, but has consistently higher prices on non-coupon items, you could wind up paying more in the long run. It may be worthwhile to split your shopping list.

—Watch out for strings and don't buy items you won't use. Some stores will make coupon use conditional: Buy a fixed amount of groceries at regular price and save on specials. Make sure the bottom line really is a saving. And avoid items you wouldn't buy if you didn't have a coupon; an 89-cent item for 59 cents is no bargain if it winds up in the garbage.



Device Permits Severely Disabled To Communicate

YORK, Pa. (AP) — Chester R. Reisinger and Robert A. Horn kid each other like the old friends they are. Pals for almost 40 years, they laugh and joke and share projects.

Recently, they completed an invention together — quite a feat considering Reisinger is totally disabled.

And yet, boasts his friend Horn, "Chester is an inventor."

It is the invention, the "B-H Communicator," a rigid piece of cardboard with the alphabet and numbers on both sides, that allows the two to communicate.

Reisinger has lost the ability to do much more than raise his eyebrows. He does this as Horn moves his fingers along the alphabet on the card. In this way, Reisinger can spell out the message he wishes to convey.

Chester Reisinger is in the advanced stages of multiple sclerosis — a disease that began to take its toll on his body 40 years ago.

Now a resident of Colonial Manob Nursing Home in York, Reisinger can no longer eat, speak or swallow. He cannot push the buttons for his television's remote control. But he can and does smile.

The friends met four decades ago as young married members of Christ Lutheran Church in Manchester. Then, the disease was in its early stages.

"He went from a limp to a cane to crutches to a wheelchair to becoming bedridden," says Horn.

It was almost six years ago that the cardboard insert from a freshly laundered shirt belonging to Horn became the first primitive B-H Communicator.

The current version has been refined by the use of heavier cardboard, placing the letters on both sides and cutting out a hole in the center for easier access to all letters.

By simple hand movements along the alphabet and a response by eye or facial movement on the part of the patient, messages other than just "yes" or "no" can be realized.

"It is not a panacea for all communications under adverse circumstances," says Horn. "But it is applicable in many instances. People suffering consequences of strokes, diseases or accidents in which vision remains, but no other physical capabilities, might very well utilize the B-H Communicator."

But Horn admits the communicator is "still amateurish."

"We're not professionals," he says. "But it works. What an exhilaration when we get a message through."

The B-H Communicator has been copyrighted, Horn says, to prevent it from being exploited.

"We're not going to sell it," he

says. "The intent is to deliver this item to as many hospitals, nursing homes, rehabilitation centers or individuals as possible, for whatever help it may be."

Horn has contacted several facilities in the York area about the B-H Communicator. And so far, professional reception has been positive.

"We told him we're interested in receiving some," says Karen Smay, a speech pathologist at York Hospital. "Mr. Horn asked if there was anything similar on the market. Texas Instruments does make something. But it is a more complicated and more expensive device."

Ms. Smay says the B-H Communicator is especially valuable because it is light and can be used by patients' friends and relatives without any special training.

"This is Chester Reisinger's conveyance."

Seek Means

To Bolster Sudan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is seeking ways to bolster Sudan's armed forces against "increased security threats," the State Department says. But it denies Ethiopian charges that a big arms airlift to Sudan is under way.

Sudan has accused Ethiopia of aiding rebels in southern Sudan and of attacking Sudanese territory. Ethiopia in turn accuses Sudan of attacks on Ethiopian soil.

"U.S. and Sudanese authorities are reviewing the ongoing military assistance program to determine how the U.S. can strengthen Sudan's defensive capability against increased security threats from outside the country," State Department spokesman John Hughes told reporters. "No decision has been taken yet as to the type of military equipment nor the mode of delivery."

Found Monument Sinking In Soil

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Washington Monument has settled into the ground somewhat over the last 100 years, but no one is sure how much because a bronze marker has disappeared, the National Geodetic Survey says.

The survey took bearings on the 555.5-foot monument, using two new, stainless steel benchmarks placed securely in opposite corners of the towering, century-old structure.

It will be five or 10 years before any change in the position of the monument would be large enough to be detected by new measurements, said Charles G. Whalen of the survey.

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More East Germans Than Ever Head West

BONN, West Germany (AP) — More East Germans are legally emigrating from their communist homeland than at any time since the Berlin Wall was built in 1961, and Bonn officials see the development as an East Berlin overture for better relations.

In the last three weeks alone, about 4,000 East Germans have been allowed to go West compared with an average of only 750 a month in recent years, according to spokesmen at a government-run refugee reception center in Giessen.

In addition, another 15,000 to 20,000 East Germans have asked permission to emigrate to West Germany and may be allowed out this year, a high-ranking Bonn government official told The Associated Press in an interview.

"It could even be more than 20,000 if things keep going the way they are," he said.

By easing emigration restrictions, East Germany is addressing long-standing pressure from Bonn for a more liberal resettlement policy, especially so that German families can be reunited in the West, the official said.

Bonn is ready to answer East Germany's gesture with economic concessions for the cash-strapped Communist nation, said the source, who spoke on the condition that he not be identified.

"We are not going to pay cash. There is no deal," he said. "But we will give economic consideration, such as goods and technology — but no strategic goods and no strategic technology" that could be used for military purposes.

The official stressed that the goal of West Germany is not to empty the East German state, which has 17 million residents compared to 60 million in West Germany.

"We want to help people that are in need, but it is not our goal to have thousands of people coming out of the GDR (East Germany) every year," he said.

There are probably several reasons why the East Germans have decided to open the refugee floodgates, Bonn sources and officials at the Giessen camp said.

East Germany's desire for a good name abroad and the wish to be rid of potential anti-government troublemakers probably play a role, they said.

"These people were a disquieting factor. They may be seeking to normalize their own society by getting rid of those who don't want to be there," said Rudolf Kraus, a social worker at the Giessen reception center.

The East Germans' flagging economy, which is \$8 billion in debt to the West, is probably also a spur for improving East-West relations, officials said.

West German banks have long been tapped by the East Germans for loans. But the Bonn government became involved last summer when it guaranteed a \$400 million Western bank credit to the East Germans.

There were no economic strings

attached, but Chancellor Helmut Kohl said he expected some compensation in the form of improved relations and progress in human rights in the communist country.

East Germany responded by dismantling some of the automatic firing mechanisms along its border with the West and dropping the minimum amount of money required to be spent daily by Western children visiting East Germany. Until last September, children from

the ages of 6 through 13 visiting East Germany had to buy the equivalent of about \$3 a day in East German marks. Visitors 14 and older still must exchange the equivalent of about \$10 a day.

There is no East German request pending "at the moment" for another \$400 million credit, said the Bonn official. But he said East Germany has a long-term need for more capital to rebuild aging factories and make its economy more

competitive in world markets.

On an international level, he suggested the East German release of many people who have wanted to emigrate for years could be part of a Soviet bloc attempt to ease tensions with the West.

"This is a small sign of the East's readiness to negotiate" with the West on all levels, including arms talks, he said.

East Germans at the Giessen reception center, where their papers

are processed before they are resettled in West Germany, said East German President Erich Honecker might be trying to improve his showing at upcoming national elections May 6.

"By letting us out, he is rid of the people who might vote no or just not bother to vote," said Werner Hammer, 55, a building engineer from Dresden. He and his wife applied to leave East Germany four years ago.

A young East German couple who asked to leave in 1982 said the recent exodus has resulted in a flood of new applications to emigrate.

"This has given many people who didn't have it before the courage to apply," said Horst Bieberstein, 28, also of Dresden.

"The trouble is, they don't know when it (the emigration) is going to end. They are afraid of being left behind," said his 21-year-old wife, Elke.

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Cocaine Search Said Intensified

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Customs Service says it is intensifying its searches of passengers and cargo from Colombia in a drive to stem a flood of illegal cocaine from the South American country.

The Customs Service asserted it would search all cargo from Colombia, especially perishable commodities such as cut flowers, bananas, yams and coffee. The blanket searches also apply to air and sea passengers arriving from Colombia, regardless of nationality.

"Colombia is unquestionably the primary source of cocaine being smuggled into the United States," Customs Commissioner William Von Raab said. "And though these steps will be painful and an inconvenience to some, they are certainly necessary and expected of me by the people of our country who do not want to see the United States become a drug-dependent society."

Importer Recalls A Datsun Series

WASHINGTON (AP) — About 4,500 cars from the 1979 Datsun Model 310 series are being recalled by the importer to adjust an emissions control valve, the Environmental Protection Agency says.

A throttle opener control valve may have been misadjusted on the assembly line, causing the cars to emit unburned gasoline in excess of federal standards, the agency said.

Cars from that series originally sold in California are not affected by the recall, EPA said. Datsun cars are imported by Nissan Motor Corp. U.S.A.

Argonauts To Follow A Legend

SPETSAL, Greece (AP) — A score of oarsmen plan to set out this spring in a Bronze Age-style open boat to test the legend of Jason and the Argonauts' quest for the Golden Fleece.

The Argo, a 54-foot vessel built of pine, is getting its final fitting out on this Greek island. Its crew will attempt to take it on a 3,000-mile, round-trip voyage north through the Aegean and into the Black Sea to Soviet Georgia.

"We want to try and establish how historical the Jason legend was. It's the earliest Western voyage story that exists," British explorer Timothy Severin, who will captain the Argo, said in an interview.

According to Greek mythology, Jason and his crew set sail from Iolcos in central Greece a generation before the Trojan War.

"In line with current archeological thinking, that would have been around 1260 B.C.," Severin said. He believes the legend had its roots in tales told by the first Greek sailors who explored the Black Sea coast.

"It's very rare for an epic to be entirely imaginary. There's a kernel of truth in it somewhere that stands up to examination," he said.

The modern Argo, named after its mythological ancestor, was designed by a British naval architect, Colin Mudie, who tested a model of the vessel in a tank to make sure it was seaworthy.

For local shipbuilder Vassilis Delimitros, 53, it's the most difficult project he has worked on.

"It's a real challenge to build a boat entirely of wood without using any nails at all," he said in an interview. "I took it on for fun — after all ancient shipbuilders can't have been better than us."

Instead of nails, tongue-shaped pieces of wood are slotted into the ship's planking, and joints are reinforced with round wooden pegs. The rowers will sit two to a bench, each pulling on a 14-foot oar.

"We ransacked the texts of Homer's Odyssey and the archeological evidence to get as close as possible to a late Bronze Age galley, a fast passenger ship of that time," Severin said.

The 10 British and 10 Greek oarsmen who will set off May 6 from Volos, the modern port overlying the ancient site of Iolcos, can expect an uncomfortable, hazardous voyage lasting around four months.

"Like ancient sailors, we'll hug the coastline, navigating by eye from the landscape, and beach the vessel at night. But we have to expect some rough weather in the Black Sea," Severin said.

The 43-year-old explorer said the ship will carry a single, square sail made from flax, but "we'll rely on muscle power."

An Oxford University rowing coach has been called in to train the crew, he said.

The adventurers will stop off at sites in Greece and Turkey connected with Jason's mythological voyage, as recounted in a 3rd century B.C. poem by Apollonius of Rhodes.

Apollonius tells how Jason sailed upriver to Colchis to find the Golden Fleece hanging in a tree guarded by a serpent. With the help of the sorceress Medea, he carried it off.

The Golden Fleece story probably was linked with an early method of gold extraction.

"Ancient writers record that sheepskins were pegged to streambeds to trap particles of gold washed downstream," Severin said.

The modern Argo's voyage is expected to end at the mouth of the Rion River in the Soviet Republic of Georgia on the eastern shore of the Black Sea, Severin said.

Funds for the project came from the proceeds of Severin's books about two previous voyages he undertook to reconstruct legendary seafaring exploits of Sinbad the Sailor and St. Brendan the Navigator.

St. Brendan was an Irish monk who is credited by medieval writers with having sailed across the Atlantic to Newfoundland in a leather boat in the 6th century.

Military Academies Flourish

 WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) — Uncle Sam wants to spend \$151,000 on your college education. Interested?
 More people than ever before are, but getting admitted to one of the four American service academies is also harder than ever before. The glitter is back on being a military officer.

Despite declining enrollments at many colleges, applications are running higher than usual at the United States Military Academy here and at the Naval, Air Force and Coast Guard academies.

West Point, for example, is receiving applications for the Class of 1988 from more students with better combined academic and extracurricular records than in any of the previous 179 classes, according to Col. Manley E. Rogers, the director of admissions.

Beyond their qualifications, even simple numbers tell a lot. More than 14,000 young men and women will start the application process at West Point this year, the most ever except when the Class of 1980, the first to accept women, applied in 1976. The applicants will compete for 1,400 places in a class from which about 900 will graduate as Army second lieutenants.

By the time they graduate, the U.S. government will have spent more than \$151,000 on each cadet — for class work, mandatory athletics, summer military training and the \$6,000 annual pay. In return, graduates will give at least five years to the Army. Most will make it a career.

"Last year we got a larger percentage of the high test kids than we've gotten in the 30 years we've been using it," said Rogers. The test is an academy rating that considers such high school factors as class rank, course of study, class size, standardized test scores, physical aptitude and academic and extracurricular honors.

Rogers said West Point competes for top candidates with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and the eight Ivy League schools, as well as the Navy and Air Force academies.

And that competition is doing well, too. At the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., 13,572 people applied and 1,356 were accepted for the Class of 1987, said Dennis Boxx, an academy spokesman. Of that group, 82 percent were in the top fifth of their high school graduating class, he said.

At the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn., the Class of 1987 had 6,956 applicants for 251 openings, and 92 percent of those entering were in the top fifth of their high school class. While it was not the largest applicant pool ever, said Cmdr. Edward R. Williams, associate director of admissions, the 28:1 ratio of applications to acceptances was the highest.

In Colorado Springs, Colo., 1,449 students entered the freshman class at the Air Force Academy last summer, 89 percent of whom had been in the top fifth of their high school class, said Lt. Col. Larry Thacker, director of admissions. The class was drawn from 12,481 applicants, the most ever, he said.

"We look for a participant, a doer, a leader," said the Army's Rogers. The chief gauge of such qualities is class rank, he said.

"If you had to select one thing you had to hang your hat on in this admissions business it is how the kid did in his own competitive situation," Rogers said. Eighty-five percent of the members of Army's plebe class were in the top fifth of their high school class, he said.

Drawing such applicants has gotten easier, Rogers ticked off a list of attractions: alumni that include Eisenhower, MacArthur and at least three astronauts; free tuition; more Rhodes and Hertz (engineering) scholars than all but three other schools, and excellent career training.

But Rogers said more fundamental factors were responsible for the recent increase in applications. He cited three reasons:

— Vietnam is over. As memories fade of the devious Vietnam War, students from a younger generation are again embracing traditional views of military careers. "I'll bet you that some of the 11 kids downstairs" waiting for an admissions tour "wouldn't even be able to identify Vietnam or tell you where it is," Rogers said.

— Patriotism is back in style. Even before favorable reaction to the U.S. invasion of Grenada, Rogers said, the country's mood had shifted back to one of pride in its military. "Fifteen years ago, 10 years ago, that was not the case," he said. "To talk about (West Point) drew fire."

— Costs. Private colleges are struggling to keep tuition and other charges within reach, Rogers said, while West Point offers a free, quality education with military pay and a guaranteed job upon graduation.
