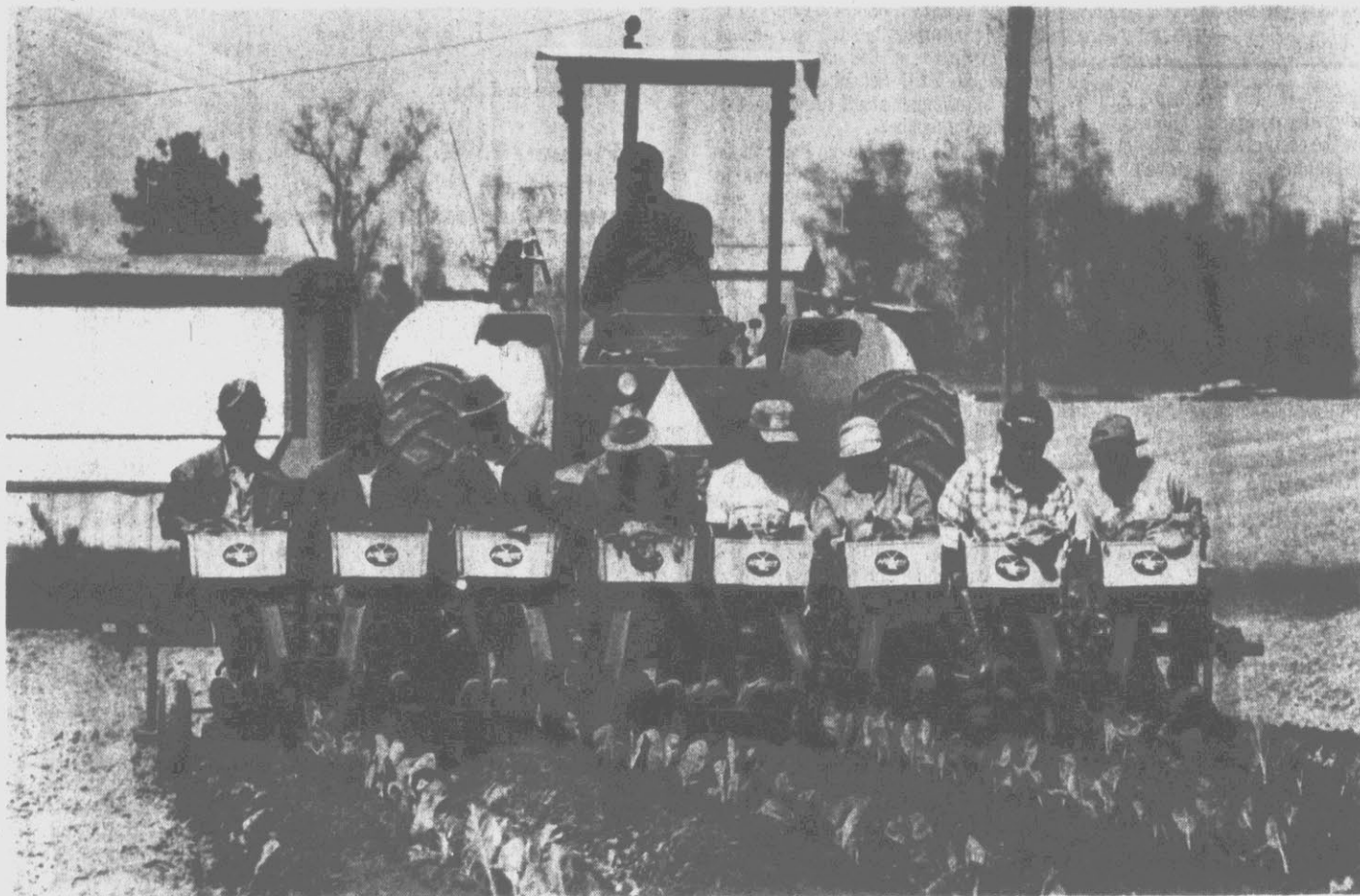

Shuttle Puts Down Safely In California

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Challenger's astronauts, diverted from a Florida landing by bad weather, swooped out of orbit and glided to Earth today on a California desert lakebed after a weeklong mission that saved a derelict satellite and opened an era of spacecraft servicing.

Commander Robert Crippen and pilot Dick Scobee guided the 98-ton shuttle to a centerline touchdown at 16 minutes after sunrise, 5:38 a.m. PST, and rolled to a stop on the hard-packed sand. Only a few spectators were on hand because of the late decision to shift the landing to Edwards, where eight of the first 10 shuttle missions also ended.

"Welcome back on Friday the 41-Charlie," Mission Control told the astronauts, continuing a running joke. The current flight was originally designated STS-13, but NASA changed its name to 41-C, and the astronaut took to calling any number 13 "41-Charlie."

After securing systems aboard the shuttle, the five astronauts left it 28 minutes after touchdown, the fastest any crew has disembarked. They brought out a container of flying companions — 3,300 honeybees that were aboard to determine how well they could build a honeycomb in weightlessness.

The spacemen reported during the flight that the bees had erected a honeycomb covering half their cage and that at least 20 of them had died.

The director of the shuttle program, Air Force Lt. Gen. James A. Abrahamson, said he hoped the diverted landing would not detract from what he termed a "fantastic mission."

"We were able to shift plans easily and quickly," he said. "It demon-

strates our flexibility, our operational capability."

"We're, of course, disappointed that we didn't land at the Cape," said Burton Edelson, head of NASA's office of space sciences. "But it was a great mission. The crew rendezvoused with and captured the Solar Max satellite. And they repaired and returned it to orbit, and it appears to be working well. And that was the purpose of the mission."

Skies were bright blue at Edwards, in contrast to pouring rain at the Cape.

The shuttle was over the Indian Ocean in its 107th orbit when Crippen and Scobee triggered its orbital engines for four minutes. That slowed the speed by 313 mph, enough to start its hourlong plunge on a supersonic glide over the Pacific Ocean and into Edwards in the Mojave Desert.

Challenger's five crewmen — who dubbed themselves the "Ace Satellite Repair Co." for their fix of the Solar Max spacecraft — had planned to land at their home port of Cape Canaveral after a 3-million-mile journey. They were just 10 minutes from firing the braking rockets when a weather plane reported low clouds and rain moving over the Kennedy Space Center runway there.

NASA, which brought the shuttle down in Florida for the first time last February, prefers landing there because of the time and money it saves preparing for future flights.

But after realizing that the Florida weather was only going to get worse, Mission Control waved the astronauts off.

"KSC is getting worse, with rain shower ... So we'll be going to Edwards."

City Council Follows Recommendation Of Board On Appeal To Rezone Tract

A request by a local physician to rezone his office site in order to bring the property into zoning conformance and to protect his future

interests in the tract was turned down Thursday night by the City Council.

The board followed the recommendation of the Greenville Planning & Zoning Commission in denying

the petition of Dr. Andrew Best to rezone four-tenths of an acre from residential to medical arts. The property is located at the southeastern corner of Moye Boulevard and South Roundtree Drive.

The physician's attorney, Fred Mattox, said during the public hearing that Best had his office at the location when the zoning classification was changed, making it a non-conforming use. He said the law entitles Best to remain at the location and make interior changes but prevents him from adding to the facility or rebuilding if 50 percent or more of the office is destroyed.

Mattox said Best was asking the council to give him back what he had before the zoning was changed. He said Best plans no changes in the facilities.

Best appealed to the council to rezone the tract, saying he sought to protect his property in the event it is damaged or destroyed.

City Attorney Larry Graham said that if damages totaled 50 percent of the actual tax value of the property or 75 percent of the replacement cost, Best could not rebuild unless he secured a variance from the Board of Adjustments or had the tract rezoned.

Gwynett Hilburn, an attorney representing Jesse Roundtree Moye, an adjacent property owner, said her client asked the city to deny the request. She contended the Best petition called for spot zoning and she saw no basis to justify approval. Ms. Hilburn said Best would have the right to petition to rebuild in the event his property is destroyed.

GENEALOGICAL SERVICE

The local Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has asked Hotline to make known a new free service for genealogists being offered by the Genealogical Department of the church.

The Family Registry is available without charge to anyone actively involved in genealogical research, according to David Mayfield, library direction. The registry can help researchers find others who are doing research on the same family lines. They can then contact those individuals to coordinate efforts and share results. For those in family organization, the registry provides a way to communicate with others about their organization or to locate others who have organized around one of their ancestors.

The Family Registry has two parts: registration and inquiry. Individual researchers and family organizations may register by submitting forms to the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City or to one of its branches. They may make inquiry of the registry by referring to the registry index and microfiche copies of the registration forms, which will also be available at the Salt Lake Library and its branches in mid-1984.

The family organization listing will give organization and a person to contact. There are three possible ways to list family organizations: (1) ancestral — those formed around a common deceased ancestor; (2) surname — those doing research on a selected surname in a specific locality and time period; and (3) proposed ancestral or surname organizations — those who want to begin a family organization.

Any family organization centered around a living person will not be registered because they can usually contact each other easily.

The registration phase is currently in progress. To register for either the research or the family organization registry, one may request the proper form (each requires a separate form) from the Genealogical Library, 50 N. Temple St., Salt Lake City, Utah 84150. Enclose a stamped self-addressed envelope with 37 cents postage affixed. An explanatory brochure will be sent with the forms.

Suspended

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration today suspended all Social Security disability reviews and ordered benefits restored for 40,000 people appealing their cutoffs.

Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler said the moratorium would last until Congress can pass disability reform legislation and the Social Security Administration can replace its "splintered and divided" disability policies with new "consistent, nationwide criteria."

John Trollinger, a spokesman for Social Security, said Mrs. Heckler's action would affect a quarter-million people in fiscal 1984.

Some 40,000 people who have lost benefits but have administrative appeals pending will get their benefits back, and 210,000 whose cases were under review will stay on the rolls, he said.

People who are fighting in federal court to get their benefits back will not be restored to the rolls, he said.

Cooking Is Fun

POTATO LEEKS
Utterly delicious French-inspired dish that is easy to make.

1 1/4 pounds leeks (4 large)

1 1/2 pounds (generous) all-purpose potatoes (5 medium)

1/4 pound Swiss cheese, grated medium-fine

Salt and pepper to taste

1 cup heavy cream

1/4 cup grated Parmesan

cheese
Trim ends from leeks and cut away heavy dark green tops and discard. Slice leeks in half lengthwise and clean thoroughly under cold running water; slice crosswise 1/4-inch thick - there should be 2 1/4 cups. Peel potatoes, halve or quarter, and slice 1/4-inch thick - there should be 5 cups. Steam potatoes and leeks until tender. Mix together leeks, potatoes, Swiss cheese, salt and pepper. Turn into a 1 1/2-quart buttered baking dish (10 by 6 by 2 inches), arranging some of the potatoes in a pretty pattern on top. Pour cream over top and sprinkle with Parmesan. Bake in a reheated 350-degree oven until bubbling hot and top is golden - 45 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Special June Camp Planned For Children With Cancer

Camp Rainbow '84, a summer camp specially designed for children with cancer and their siblings, is planned for June 13-15.

Approximately 75 children will attend the camp which is being sponsored for the third year by the East Carolina University Department of Pediatrics and the Department of Therapeutic Recreation at Pitt County Memorial Hospital.

The earlier camps have been held in city parks. This year the youngsters will be staying overnight at Camp Don-Lee, located on the Pamlico Sound near Arapahoe. Camp activities will be supervised by Camp Don-Lee counselors and trained Camp Rainbow staffers. The ratio of campers to staff will be 3 to 1. Members of the medical staff from the ECU School of Medicine will be on hand at all times to care for the youngsters.

Any child age 7-18 who has cancer and lives east of Wilson is eligible to attend. His or her brothers and sisters of the same age group may also come. Siblings of deceased patients are invited.

Medical center professionals, who will be working at Camp Rainbow, will be available to provide more information on the camp during an informal meeting for the families of cancer patients. The meeting will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the auditorium of the Brody Medical Sciences Building at the medical school.

Because of the high medical costs involved in treating cancer, the medical school and hospital want to

send the children to camp at no cost to their parents. The cost of attending Camp Rainbow for three days is \$120 per child. Through the generosity of the N.C. Chapter of the American Cancer Society, dozens of civic and church groups and many individuals across Eastern N.C., more than \$7,500 has already been raised to help pay for youngsters to attend.

Nurses Surveyed On Treatment Of Severely Deformed Newborns

Maybe you've never heard the phrase "die comfortably." It shows up in a report on a survey of nurses and describes what usually

happens to badly deformed babies when families, alone or in concert with a doctor, decide against heroic efforts to keep the infant alive.

Babies allowed to die comfortably, the report says, get food and water. They are spared dying as the result of starvation and dehydration.

The phrase appears in a report in NursingLife and was explained by Patricia Nornhold, clinical director of the professional journal.

Presumably, babies left to die of dehydration and starvation would be viewed as dying uncomfortably.

The insider's view of delivery and neonatal suites was provided by a NursingLife survey report. Some 3,500 nurses were polled about their views on fates decreed by doctors or parents for severely deformed infants.

Fifty-four percent of those surveyed said they favor allowing such babies to "die comfortably" when there is no possibility of any meaningful existence, the report said.

Among pediatric nurses surveyed, 72 percent, nearly three out of four, favored allowing such newborns to die comfortably.

Among all respondents, regardless of nursing specialty, 31 percent had mixed feelings while 9 percent were "slightly" against the practice. Six percent, however, favored allowing grossly abnormal infants to die.

Many nurses surveyed commented about necessary distinctions among handicapped infants, cautioning that not all handicapped ones are grossly malformed.

"I'm in favor, I think, of allowing and perhaps even hastening the death of a severely abnormal newborn," one said.

"I am, however, very concerned that many pediatricians and laymen lump Down's Syndrome children into the severely retarded group."

"These children are so different from, say, microcephalic babies. We have to educate the public."

Another said, "We haven't the right to decide when retarded babies should die." She identified herself as the mother of a Down's Syndrome child.

"He teaches me every day to be happy with small things ... and shows me that loving and being loved is what living is all about," she said.

One nurse said of her personal experience: "I gave birth to a microcephalic infant. My husband and our obstetrician decided before delivery not to resuscitate after diagnostic studies confirmed the problem."

"They didn't discuss the decision with me at the time, but I have no

regrets. "We wouldn't feel differently today. Our child is far better off in God's hands than if we'd tried to provide for her here on earth."

Several respondents commented on making life or death decisions based on an infant's chances of having a meaningful existence.

"Who has the right to say an abnormal child won't have a meaningful existence life?" one nurse asked. "I have a retarded brother who does well. He's happy with his life. He has a job and his family, and he has music to listen to."

"Abnormal children will never know any different life. It's all they've got, and they'll get what they want out of it. If they're seriously abnormal, they'll die before long."

Guidelines for hospitals and parents were in the 1983 report from the President's Commission for the Study of Ethical Problems in Medicine and Biomedical and Behavioral Research.

The Commission advocated withholding treatment only when continued existence would not be a net benefit to the infant.

It didn't consider that Down's Syndrome, for example, justified withholding medically proven treatment, such as surgical correction of a blocked intestinal tract.

The dilemma of whether to treat seriously ill newborns emerges as more worrisome than ever for affected doctors and parents as a result of falling infant mortality rates.

For newborns weighing 2.2 to 3.3 pounds, the mortality rate has dropped from 50 percent to 20 percent since 1961. For those weighing less than 2.2 pounds, the mortality rate has dropped from more than 90 percent to 50 percent since about 1962.

In addition, surgical advances have improved survival rates for infants with certain congenital defects such as spina bifida, an open spine.

An estimated 6 percent of the nation's 3.6 million newborns each year spend some time in a neonatal intensive care unit.

Billing for an average patient is \$8,000. In complicated cases, charges go well over \$100,000.

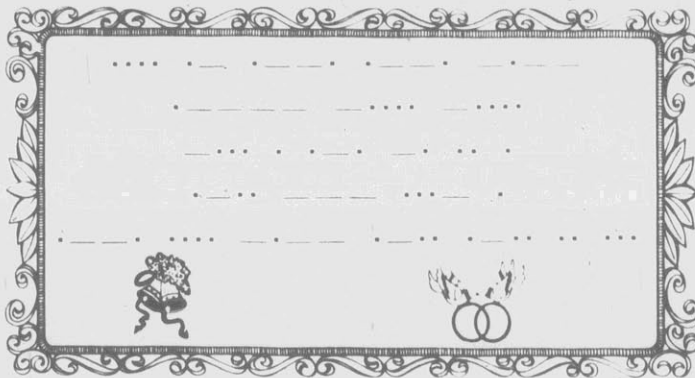
"Incidentally, spaying a female reduces her chances of uterine infections or breast cancer."

Cooking Is Fun

Probably most American cooks have read or heard the phrase, "There's a cooking explosion going on in the United States."

Cooking schools have proliferated in every state. Cookbooks are published in profusion. And we now have six national magazines devoted to the subject of food.

This cooking explosion expresses a new interest in American foodstuffs — and those from other countries — and in their new uses.

One of these foods is dried mushrooms. Once upon a time you had to seek out a little shop in which to buy them. Now supermarkets carry them. And once upon a time it was cooks of East European background who knew their goodness and made wonderful soups with them. Now many more cooks are recognizing their virtues.

Recently a soup recipe that calls for both dried and fresh mushrooms came across my desk. We found it had intense flavor that's unusual and delightful.

MUSHROOM SOUP

- 1 ounce dried Italian-type mushrooms (about 3/4 cup)
 - 1-3rd cup Madeira wine
 - 3 tablespoons butter
 - 1 large onion, finely chopped (1 cup)
 - 4 cups thinly sliced mushrooms (about 1/2 pound), lightly packed
 - 1 1/2-ounce can ready-to-serve clear chicken broth
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1-3rd cup heavy cream
- In a strainer rinse the dried mushrooms well under cold running water. In a small bowl, soak mushrooms in the Madeira for about an hour.
- In a 3-quart saucepan over medium heat, melt the butter. Add onion; cook, stirring, until tender — about 3 minutes. Add fresh mushrooms to onions. Cook, stirring occasionally, until mushrooms are very tender — about 15 minutes. Stir in chicken broth.

With a slotted spoon, carefully lift dried mushrooms from Madeira and add to saucepan; let any sediment in Madeira settle; pour off Madeira and add to saucepan. Add salt and pepper. Bring mixture to a boil. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer until the dried mushrooms are very tender — 45 minutes.

Pour soup through a strainer into a 4-cup liquid measure. In a blender or food processor, puree mushroom and onion mixture from strainer with 1/2 cup of the soup liquid from measure until almost smooth. Return mixture to saucepan with remaining soup liquid from measure. Reheat; stir in cream and reheat again.

Have extra fresh white mushrooms on hand to use raw and thinly sliced as a garnish.

Makes 4 servings (3 cups).

Note: This thick soup has true mushroom flavor and an earthy color. If you like, you can add milk to thin soup and lighten color.

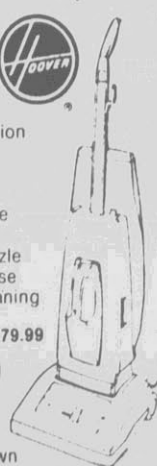

The asbestos scare after Ayden Elementary School was damaged by the March 28 tornado was unfortunate in that it did cause concern, but it is reassuring that a state inspector, apparently acting on his own, would hold enough interest in his job and the public's safety to act.

It seems the inspector, seeing material that resembled crumbled asbestos in the debris around the school, notified his office in Raleigh, which followed procedure in ordering all repairs on the school stopped and the building cleared of personnel pending a formal examination. The subsequent inspection, of course, concluded with a report that no damaging asbestos was found.

There has been some criticism of the first inspector; we hope it has not been severe. Right or wrong, he was acting in the public's interest.

And the formal inspection gave a clean bill of health to the school's construction, shoring the reputation of Pitt County's school system. Nothing was lost, but an awful lot would have been gained if asbestos inadvertently had been used in the initial construction of the school.

Ties Are Close

Alumni Day is a special occasion for former students of East Carolina University; and it is also a highlight for friends of the university who give their talents to help the growth and stature of a onetime teachers' college into the university role it plays today and will play tomorrow.

Three such supporters, J.A. Johnson of Virginia Beach, Va., John F. Minges and Rep. Ed N. Warren, both of Greenville, will be honored for their contributions at the Alumni Day luncheon Saturday.

Town and Gown in this little segment of North Carolina have a comfortable relationship with each other. In a very real sense, we have been growing up together.

Year by year, as the ranks of East Carolina's alumni grow, their numbers include ever more hundreds of young men and women who were raised in the shadow of what would become their alma mater.

We do not doubt that within their ranks are others who will someday be honored as three will be honored on Alumni Day for distinguished service. The ties are that close.

Tempting The 13th

NEW YORK (AP) — Whenever the calendar comes up "Fri 13," a lot of people spend some time thinking about luck.

For example, would it be tempting fate, and the auditors of the Internal Revenue Service, to send off your income tax return on Friday the 13th?

Or would it be tempting fate, and the vengeful demons that dwell in the stock and bond markets, to invest some of your hard-won savings on such a day and date?

Actually, superstition isn't what it used to be. More and more professional athletes appear on playing fields these days with the number 13 brazenly stretched across their backs.

Searching for four-leaf clovers, or shying away from black cats, has become a bit passe. When modern people want to improve their chances in life, they seem to put

their trust in things like self-help books, aerobic dancing and a good accountant.

But luck can still call the turn in many money matters. For instance, even if your tax return is a white-glove-clean document, free of the slightest hint of an exaggerated deduction, you'd probably prefer that the IRS didn't pick it out for microscopic examination.

"No one wants to be audited," observes Prentice-Hall, a publisher of tax information. "An IRS audit can be both costly and time-consuming, and it very rarely turns out to your advantage."

The odds against your being audited at all are slim — about 49-1, on average. Last year, less than 2 percent of the returns filed were audited.

Tax advisers say your individual probability of being audited varies with your circumstances. For one thing, the larger your income, the greater the chance the IRS radar will home in your return. The experts also say you can inadvertently raise a red flag when you file by taking unusual or exceptionally large writeoffs, or even by messing up the arithmetic.

However, since the IRS says it randomly selects thousands of returns each year for auditing, in an effort to keep the general public honest, every taxpayer is still subject to the luck of the draw.

People who invest — or try to predict the future course of the economy, interest rates and stock prices — need luck too. High-level committees, computer models, and ingenious "indicators" all have failed so far to reduce these imponderables to any degree of certainty.

Raymond F. DeVoe Jr., who makes his living analyzing the economy and the markets for the firm of Legg Mason Wood Walker Inc., has developed a list of laws that apply to the writing of research reports. A sampling of them follows:

—"When working towards the solution of a problem, it always helps if you know the answer (provided, of course, that you know there is a problem)."

—"If the facts do not conform to the theory, they must be disposed of."

—"No report is ever a complete failure — it can always be used as a horrible example."

—"The more and more closely you look at the raw data, the bigger the trouble you are in."

RALEIGH — With six major candidates seeking their party's gubernatorial nomination, Democratic voters have plenty of choices in the May 8 primary. But, if none of those six strikes your fancy, there are four "minor" candidates whose names will also appear on the ballot.

The four have gotten varying degrees of publicity during the campaign and they have political views that span a far broader spectrum than that of the six major candidates.

Probably the most publicized of the minor candidates has been Glenn Miller of Angier in Johnston County. Miller, 43, is chief of the North

Carolina Ku Klux Klan and is running on a platform of white rights and Christian supremacy. Miller neatly blames all of America's problems on black and Jewish people. He says, "I am the only white man running for governor because everyone else is seeking the black vote. There is no future for the white race." About Jews, he says they promote drugs and pornography.

He would like all Jews to go back to Israel and he'd like blacks to move to their own separate country which would be formed somewhere in the United States. Asked if there weren't some other ethnic or religious groups he'd also like thrown

out of the country, Miller said Jews and blacks would be sufficient. He did recognize that some non-Jewish whites also cause problems.

Robert Hannon of Greensboro is also getting some press notice. He's a retired political science professor who is the only black in the race. He and Miller do not agree on much. Hannon says he's raise starting teacher salaries to \$20,000 a year, reduce class size, beef up programs for the elderly and support a state-run lottery.

Hannon has a terrific sense of humor and he's been using it to charm audiences at the forums for gubernatorial candidates which he

regularly attends.

J.D. Whaley of Dover is an engineer with the Seaboard Railroad. He's running on a platform of upholding the U.S. Constitution. But Whaley would not wait for the Legislature to enact his proposals before he moved to change the system. He says that if he's elected he'd tell the state Revenue Department to stop collecting income taxes and that he'd throw the Internal Revenue Service out of the state. He says government has "no legitimate role in education." He was vague as to whether that meant he'd seek to close the public schools.

Whaley says that he'd develop a monetary policy for the state which would end inflation. Asked if he wasn't confusing state and federal responsibilities, Whaley said that wasn't really important.

Finally, there's Andy Barker, nine term mayor of Love-Valley in Iredell County. He's running on a platform of not making any commitments to special interest groups. He's refusing all invitations to attend gubernatorial candidate forums, saying he wouldn't want anyone to mistake any of his remarks as campaign promises. Barker, who ran for governor in 1976 and came in last, advocates more volunteer work. He thinks North Carolinians should start taking care of each other again. He'd develop punishment and rehabilitation programs for young lawbreakers that would not include incarceration. He'd support a state lottery.

North Carolina won't improve its public schools, he says, until parents and the community become involved in the schools again. He promises to lead such an effort.

There they are — four candidates with some unusual ideas. None has even shown a blip on the polls, but they'll be on the ballot.

Fortunately the bill was vetoed by the mayor.

I say fortunately because once you start down the road of making booksellers liable for what they sell you run into the problem of where degradation stops and mind-boggling romance takes over. (For further evidence see your favorite soap opera.)

The hottest item in the publishing business these days is the paperback "romance novel." They sell in the millions and purveyors of these kinds of books will tell you they are almost all bought by women.

It provides 3,000 descriptive "tags" that people writing romance novels could use to jazz up their writing.

Here are a few examples that could be considered degrading to women, but are very helpful in appealing to that large female audience which eats the romance novel up like peanuts. I couldn't include the ones that are inappropriate for a family newspaper.

"It was flesh against flesh, man against woman."

"She shattered into a million glowing stars."

"She lay drowned in a floodtide of the liberation of her mind and body."

"While he would be merely filling a moment of physical desire, she would be allowing him to tear apart her soul."

"She yielded to the searing need which had been building for months."

"Her body began to vibrate with liquid fire."

"She kissed him with a hunger that belied her outward calm."

"She buried her face against the corded muscles of his chest."

"Her knees were weakened by the quivering of her limbs."

"In her haste to reassure him she went too far."

I guess you have the idea.

If the Minneapolis ordinance had gone into effect the sellers of romance novels would be in the same jeopardy as those who handle the raunchy magazines and books usually sealed in cellophane.

No matter how noble their cause the women of Minneapolis can't use civil rights as a reason for stopping someone from publishing books about sex.

The reason is quite simple. One woman's pornography is another woman's fantasy.

I am absolutely against degrading the American woman. At the same time, as a First Amendment buff, I feel her civil rights are far more threatened by city ordinances than by "degrading" books that could possibly help her have a nice day.

Baseball Changes Its Ways

WASHINGTON — A few years back, former San Francisco Giants manager Alvin Dark lamented in his memoirs that there were few true students of baseball — only the armchair variety. "Everybody, my 83-year-old mother included," wrote Dark, "thinks they learned all there was to know about it at puberty."

But what bothered Dark has helped make baseball the national pastime. In the stands as on the field, everyone is an expert. Indeed, only at a baseball game can a orate president sit next to a ber and discuss the merits of a rookie pitcher's curve ball.

Unfortunately, America's baseball stadiums may not deserve their melting-pot image any longer. The whole meaning of an outing to a ball park has changed for the worse.

For starters, baseball fans today are increasingly separated by economic means. Financially pressed ball clubs have undermined the populist tradition of ball parks by offering a series of multipriced tickets that matches the stratification of an opera matinee. A walk

through any box seat section these days reveals a controlled, sober crowd that munched on nachos.

In Baltimore, for example, a fan has a choice of purchasing seven different types of seats: lower boxes (\$9), terrace boxes (\$8), upper boxes (\$6.50), lower and upper reserve (\$6), general admission (\$4.75) and the bleachers (\$3.50). Similar choices are offered in other big league cities.

Moreover, good seats for weekend games and contests between intensely rival teams are harder to come by. In Chicago this season, the chances of purchasing a box seat for a White Sox game won't be good unless one's a season ticket-holder for weekend games.

Without most fans knowing it, businesses, which according to the baseball commissioner's office purchase 80 percent of all box seats, have consumed the best seats at most stadiums. An unofficial survey of team ticket sales this year suggests more season passes are being sold than ever before. The

world champion Baltimore Orioles, for example, had 6,032 season ticket-holders last year. This year, the Birds have unloaded more than 12,000 such tickets. Likewise, in Los Angeles, the Dodgers have had to place a ceiling of 27,000 seats for season ticket-holders.

The price of baseball tickets is increasing for everyone. Half of all American League teams have raised their ticket prices this season (only a quarter of all National League teams have done so). The average price of a ticket to a major league baseball game is now \$5.93.

Meanwhile, the traditional atmosphere of ball parks is dissipating, too. You need only look at what's being offered to eat there to understand how. Gone are the old days on inexpensive hot dogs, peanuts and popcorn. Everything is more expensive and exotic at baseball stadiums. Now you can buy shrimp at Fenway Park and Swedish ice cream at Shea Stadium, not to mention manicotti at the Dodgers home in Chavez Ravine.

"We're serving specialty foods at stadiums to keep our new clientele happy," explained an official with the Harry M. Stevens Co., which has the concession rights at many ball parks.

Of course, the corporate clients who purchase season tickets aren't the only ones to blame for the changing nature of American ball parks. Nor, for that matter, are the financially strapped clubs. They're only doing what's necessary to stay solvent in an era of enormous player salaries.

Equally culpable are Congress and the White House. Until the business tax deductions for sports tickets, Big Business will continue to consume large blocks of tickets, making it almost impossible for fans to gain entry to stadiums built with their tax money. We don't expect such a revolutionary change to occur. But maybe other people will start to wonder when their ball parks install conference rooms for use by high-paying fans during the seventh-inning stretch.

Collision Toll Feared

WIGGINS, Colo. (AP) — Two Burlington Northern freight trains collided head-on this morning, causing an explosion and fire. Four crew members were injured and five others were missing, authorities said.

Two crew members were hospitalized in good condition and two others were en route to the hospital, Morgan County Sheriff's Cpl. Evan Beecham said.

The accident occurred about 4 a.m. and an explosion and fire that followed burned out of control early today, filling parts of the small northeastern Colorado town with dense black smoke, he said.

No evacuations were necessary, but the local school was closed for the day because of the smoke, Beecham said.

Pat Stafford, a spokesman for Burlington Northern in St. Paul, Minn., said both trains were being pulled by five diesel engines. One train consisted of 72 cars and the other had 77 cars.

Two cars of inflammable material

were part of the trains, but they weren't threatened by the wreck or the fire, Beecham said.

Moyewood, asked that the request be denied in order to retain the residential nature of the neighborhood. Ms. Dixon, who said she was speaking for several residents, said she wondered why Best is now concerned about damage to his property after 18 years at the location.

Various property owners, appearing before the planning board, said they did not object to Best continuing his practice in the neighborhood but they feared what might happen if the property were rezoned and Best later moved.

In offering a motion to deny the petition, Councilwoman Judy Greene said she did not feel spot zoning would be in the best interest of the city and she had not heard what she considered a reasonable reason to spot zone.

In other business, council members approved the first reading of orders authorizing the issuance of \$132,000 cemetery bonds, \$80,000 land acquisition bonds, \$584,000 street improvement bonds, and \$140,000 library bonds. The council

set a public hearing on the bond orders for April 24 at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall.

City Manager Gail Meeks said the cemetery bonds will provide funds for the acquisition of land for an additional cemetery, while the \$80,000 bond order will provide funds for the purchase of land for an additional city fire and rescue station.

She said the \$584,000 order will provide money for street improvements, including reconstruction and resurfacing and the installation of traffic controls, signals and markers. The library bond revenues will be used to construct an addition to the Children's Room at Sheppard Library and to acquire necessary land, rights of way, furnishings and equipment.

Council members reappointed Bill Shires to a full term on the Environmental Advisory Commission and named Ann Bellis to fill the term of Maurice C. York, who resigned. York's term expires next April. Charles L. Clark was reappointed to his second term on the Traffic Commission.

Business handled through a single motion on the "consent agenda" included:

— Scheduling of public hearings for May 10 on three annexation petitions;

— Adoption of ordinances amending the 1983-84 city budget, the 1981-82 small cities budget, and the

1979-80 community development budget;

— Approval of a request by the state Department of Transportation to change the speed limit to 50 mph on a portion of Greenville Boulevard and to establish a school zone with a 40 mph speed limit at Greenville Christian Academy;

— Approval of the sale of a parcel containing 18,946 square feet on the west side of Evans Street between Eighth Street and Reade Circle to Bill Clark Construction Co. Inc. for \$31,500;

— Adoption of an ordinance providing for the sale by the purchasing agent of surplus city property valued under \$500;

— Approval of an amendment to the airport improvement grant program agreement, adding \$5,100 for drainage improvements, and

— Adoption of a resolution authorizing Ms. Meeks to apply for federal financial assistance for cost incurred as a result of the recent tornado.

Uncover Fossils In Polar Region

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists have uncovered the fossil remains of 11 species of marine animals on an island off Antarctica, a finding they say indicates that polar regions played a larger role in evolution than previously believed.

In a report to be published today in the journal Science, researchers said some of the animal remains that were found, including certain classes of crabs and starfish, have never been seen before and others previously were known only in temperate climates.

Order Flynt To Undergo Exam

WASHINGTON (AP) — A judge has ordered Hustler magazine publisher Larry Flynt to undergo a mental examination to determine if he is competent to stand trial in federal court on charges that he shouted obscenities at Supreme Court justices.

U.S. Magistrate Jean F. Dwyer on Thursday ordered Flynt sent to St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington even though Flynt told her he had undergone three mental examinations in the past six months.



Stabilization Corp. Manager Sees Survival

BETHEL — The general manager of the Flue-Cured Tobacco Stabilization Corp. says that, in spite of anti-tobacco forces and 1982 legislation that "changed the whole complexion" of the program, the cooperative has been through tough times before and will survive.

"We don't plan to go out of business," Fred Bond said here Thursday, appealing to all segments of the tobacco industry to "group together for the good of the entire program."

He said, "Tobacco is still a very viable and important crop and will continue to be," providing "basic economic support for this part of the country."

Bond said the grower-owned cooperative, which buys market offerings that fail to sell above the support price, has moved less of its inventory this year than in the past 15 to 20 years. He suggested that a

worldwide tobacco surplus has curtailed Stabilization's progress in reducing its stocks.

Current inventory of what Bond labeled as a non-government tobacco growers' marketing association stands at 760 million pounds farm weight, ranging from 15 million pounds from the 1976 crop to 440 million pounds from 1982-83.

Bond said Congress passed a law in the spring of 1982 that mandated the "most significant change ever made in the tobacco program." He said no other commodity had ever been subjected to "no net cost" legislation that passed the cost of the program on to the producers.

Under the legislation, shortfalls in principal and interest on loans after the tobacco is sold by Stabilization are made up by producers in the form of assessment. He said 450 million pounds have been handled under "no net cost" since the law

was adopted, with \$118 million in assessments collected.

"The growers have had to assume a tremendous financial responsibility," said Bond, claiming that the law is discriminatory as it relates to other people who grow a commodity. He said the argument that tobacco is

not a food or fiber is not valid when considering that the product provides for the livelihood of thousands of people.

"That financial responsibility ultimately could become too great for the growers to assume," he said.

Bond said "anti-tobacco people

are going to continue their fight to eliminate tobacco, if possible, with well-financed campaigns." He said opponents will "raise a lot of money through the fear tax" and are "crowding in on 55 million Americans" who enjoy tobacco products.

Cigarette sales fell 7 percent in 1983, he reported, citing restrictions on smoking, such as designated areas on airlines and in restaurants and taxes that discourage consumption, as contributing to the decline.

In spite of the problems, Bond said the "future of Stabilization is good, but every segment, especially the grower segment, must stay together." He acknowledged that

differences of opinion exist among growers and those internal rumblings must be settled.

"Every person in Bethel needs to support tobacco," said Bond. He pointed to "some ridiculous charges" levied against the product through the press. "Our side of the story just doesn't get out there to the public," he claimed.

Bond cited Rep. Walter B. Jones, D-N.C., for his influence and assistance over the years in protecting the tobacco industry. Jones, who is seeking re-election, attended the meeting, which was sponsored by the Bethel Council of the Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce.

Doctor Ordered Pay \$700,000 For Fraud

RALEIGH (AP) — A Fayetteville psychiatrist has been ordered to pay \$700,000 for what investigators call the largest fraud involving health care benefits and doctors in U.S. history.

In a consent order signed by U.S. District Court Judge James C. Fox Wednesday, Dr. Jacob Fishman of Cumberland Psychiatric Associates was directed to pay \$194,460 as reimbursement for fraudulent health care claims, a \$450,000 penalty and \$50,000 in interest.

In addition to the \$700,000 payment, Fishman was ordered barred from the federal health care program for 10 years and surrendered his medical license to the North Carolina Medical Board.

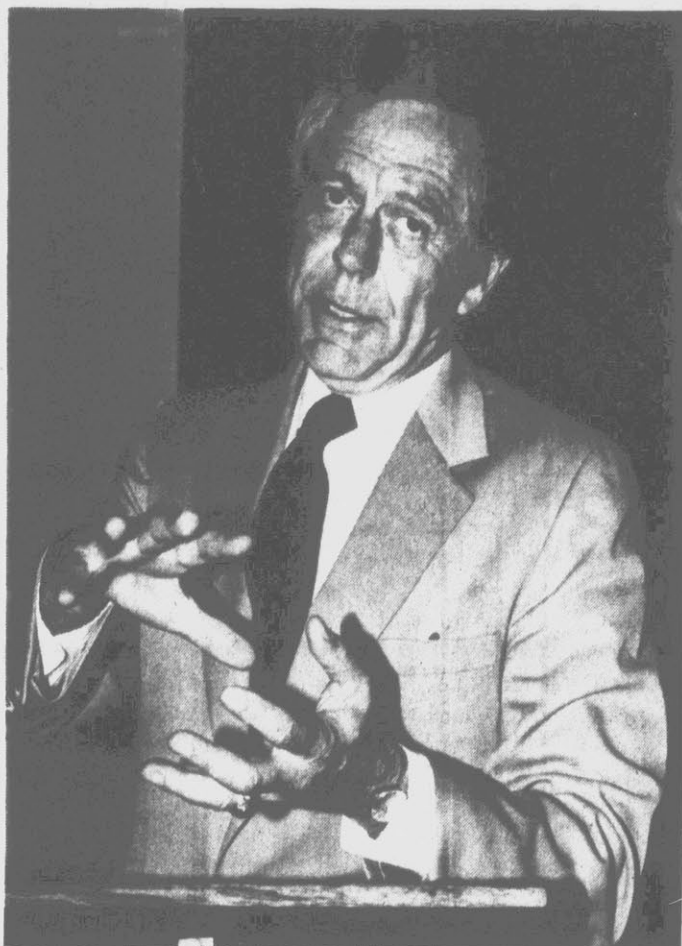
The settlement brings to nearly \$2 million the amount of money the government has recovered from Fishman, Cumberland Hospital in Fayetteville, and Cumberland Psychiatric Associates, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert Showers.

Showers said the hospital used artificially inflated room rates and duplicate billing to the federal insurance program as part of a fraud scheme. The hospital agreed in August 1983 to pay \$1.25 million to the government.

Fishman was half owner of the hospital and a major stockholder and president of Horizon Health Inc., the corporation which owned and managed the hospital.

In the consent order, Fishman admitted he knowingly submitted over 241 false claims for payment amounting to \$194,460. He was ordered to refund that amount, plus \$50,000 in interest and about \$450,000 as a penalty for fraud.

The government filed a civil complaint against Fishman April 2,

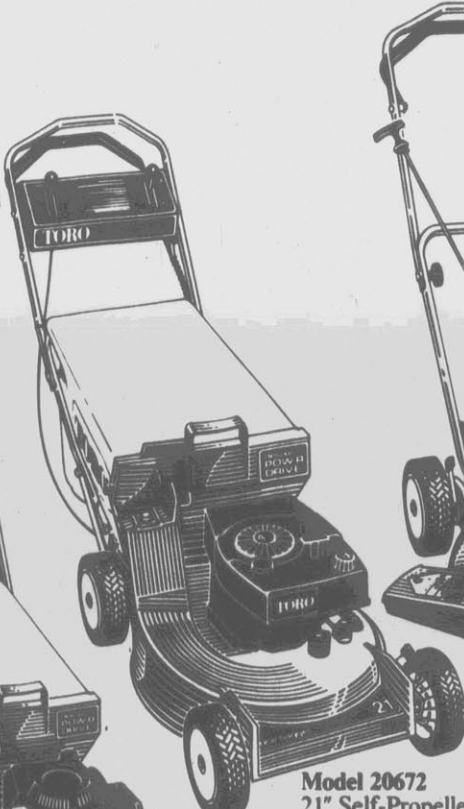

Suspended Physician Has Been Reinstated, Working

A physician stripped of his license to practice medicine after he was given a five-year suspended prison sentence for obtaining a controlled drug by fraud last year was reinstated by Pitt County Memorial Hospital as a resident in obstetrics and gynecology in February, after an absence of only four months, hospital officials said this week.

Dr. John Lee Waeltz of 2608 Jefferson Drive pleaded no contest on Oct. 17, 1983, to three counts of obtaining Percoset, a narcotic analgesic, by fraud. A five-year prison term was suspended on condition he pay a \$5,000 fine and surrender his license to practice medicine. He was also placed on probation for three years.

Waeltz went back to work as a resident on Feb. 20, after his license was restored by the State Board of Medical Examiners.

State Bureau of Investigation Agent Tim Nelson testified during Waeltz's trial that 46 illegal prescriptions written by Waeltz were found during a survey of 18 pharmacies. The prescriptions involved 1,300 dosage units of the narcotic, which is used for pain relief and sedation.

Nelson, a member of the SBI's special diversion investigative unit, which concentrates on drug law violations by professionals such as physicians, dentists, pharmacists

and nurses, told the court that the offences occurred between Sept. 2, 1981, and April 14, 1983.

Waeltz told investigators he had used the drug for severe headaches.

Defense witnesses, including physicians at the East Carolina University School of Medicine, told the court that Waeltz had been a good student and that the drug problem did not place patients in jeopardy.

Jack Richardson, president of PCMH, said this week that "it is my understanding that he (Waeltz) has been taken back into the residency program" since the State Board of Medical Examiners "did reinstate him under probation."

Fred Brown, senior vice president of PCMH, said, "I was a little surprised. I understood it would take longer than that" for Waeltz's license to be reinstated.

"But apparently the board (of medical examiners) felt he had enough support. ... There were enough people who felt he ought to be given an opportunity to continue on in his career, and they were able to convince the board to move quicker," Brown said.

"Our prerequisites for his being reinstated," Brown said, included "acceptance back in the residency program by the chairman of the department (Darnell Jones, acting chairman of the department of obstetrics and gynecology at the East Carolina University School of Medicine) ... and, of course, getting his license back. The hospital then approved accepting him back into the residency program."

Residents at PCMH are hospital employees and are paid by the hospital. They are supervised and "receive their direction from members of the faculty at the ECU School of Medicine ... full-time medical school physicians and private practitioners who participate in the teaching program," Brown explained.

"There is every indication," Brown said, "that he (Waeltz) made a mistake. But apparently he is exceptionally well qualified, a good resident, and will do a good job."

Bryan Paris, a spokesman for the Board of Medical Examiners, said the return of Waeltz's license in four months was not unusual. "It's a decision of the board. Sometimes the board revokes a license period. Sometimes they put physicians on probation," he said.

"It depends on a number of things," including community need. "A problem with drugs," Paris said, may have "nothing to do with a person's ability to practice medicine. Each matter is considered on its own merits."

Paris explained that Waeltz "has a resident's training license," and therefore is "limited to the training program ... confined by the parameters of the training program."

A resident's license, Paris said, would not allow Waeltz to practice outside the residency program. "That's the routine for a resident's training license."

Brownie Leader Facing Charges

GREENSBORO (AP) — The Guilford County sheriff department says it may have caught a Greensboro Brownie leader with her hand in the cookie jar.

Phyllis Burns, a Brownie troop leader, has been charged with three counts of embezzling money from Girl Scout cookies sales.

Warrants issued Wednesday accuse Ms. Burns, 28, with embezzling \$4,000 from sales of 174 cases of Girl Scout cookies. Sheriff's department Detective E.L. Siwinski said the department was drawing extradition papers Thursday for Ms. Burns, who apparently has moved to southern California.

Girl Scout officials reported the suspected embezzlement after cookie sale money from Ms. Burns' troops was not deposited by the March 24 deadline.

"The Girl Scouts had first tried to contact her because they hadn't seen her in a while," Siwinski said. "She was required by Girl Scout regulations also to open accounts for the Brownie troops. They can't find any records of that."

Girl Scouts take orders during the winter for cookies, which are picked up by troop leaders in February. The Scouts turn in the money to the troop after distributing the cookies.

Wholesale Prices Rose .5 Percent In March

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices spurted 0.5 percent in March, the second-biggest jump in 16 months, as a huge increase in prices for fresh fish pushed overall food costs upward, the government reported today.

The 0.8 percent jump in food costs outweighed a 1.2 percent decline in March energy prices, which dropped for the seventh time in nine months, according to the Labor Department's Producer Price Index for finished goods.

Food prices actually would have declined slightly except for a 30.2 percent increase in fish prices, which Labor Department officials said rose because bad weather drastically slowed fishing off the Northeast coast in March.

The overall 0.5 percent increase in the index followed rises of 0.6 percent in January and 0.4 percent in February.

Prices so far this year are rising at an annual rate of 6.1 percent, a level well above the rates of 0.6 percent for all of 1983 and 3.7 percent for 1982.

Economists and government officials are now forecasting an inflation rate of about 4 percent for all of this year.

For the first three months of the year, food prices have surged at an annual rate of 17.8 percent. Officials say bad weather in the South is partly to blame.

Other details of the report said:
—Auto prices rose 0.7 percent after jumping 1.4 percent in February.
—Capital equipment climbed 0.3 percent following a 0.5 percent rise the previous month.
—Clothing costs rose 0.5 percent after increasing 0.6 percent in February.

Within the overall food category, prices rose for fish, vegetables, poultry, beef and veal while declining for fresh fruits, pork, dairy products and eggs.

In the energy category, prices declined 2.3 percent for natural gas and 1.5 percent for gasoline. Heating oil costs rose 1.4 percent, but that was well down from February's 8.2 percent.

If March's overall price increase

of 0.5 percent were to be repeated 12 straight months, the yearly advance would be 5.9 percent. That annual rate computed by Labor Department economists is based on more precise calculations of monthly prices than the figures made public.

In all, the Producer Price Index for finished goods stood at 291.7 in March, meaning that goods costing \$10 in the base year of 1967 would have cost \$29.17.

Commenting in advance of the report, Allen Sinai, chief economist for Lehman Brothers Kuhn Loeb Inc., said, "There is nothing particularly negative yet on inflation."

However, Federal Reserve Governor Lyle Gramley said Thursday that "warning signs are beginning to emerge that suggest the need for concern and caution."

Sinai said, "The danger on inflation is more a late-1984 and 1985 possibility, after product and labor markets have gotten tighter."

But he also said that if the economy continues to grow strongly

"it is inevitable" that inflationary pressures will also pick up sooner.

And Donald Ratajczak, director of the Economic Forecasting Project at Georgia State University, said other figures on raw material prices suggest bigger gains coming up for the main gauge of wholesale prices.

Part of the problem may be unusual weather patterns in late winter, he said. "It could, however, signal the beginning of a more permanent increase in inflation that many have been expecting as a result of an overheating economy."

All three indicated wariness about "overheating" — a reference to inflation pressures that arise when strong economic growth brings heavy demand for goods that are still in short supply in the aftermath of a recession.

Today's report measures month-to-month changes in prices paid to producers for food, energy products and other items. The prices American consumers actually pay — often to retailers — are measured by the Consumer Price index, but the Producer Price Index often gives a good idea where consumer prices are heading.

In general, the government takes the word of producers for the price report, basing it for the most part on questionnaires, which companies fill out on a voluntary, confidential basis. Some prices are obtained from trade publications and other government agencies.

The figures are adjusted to discount for normal seasonal variations in weather and production schedules.

"We know that Gov. Hunt would be the best person in Washington, and once we see something happen for children and for us, we are ready to take out all the stops and send him there," Frances Cummings, president of the NCAE said Thursday at the organization's annual convention.

Ms. Cummings said that raising teachers' salaries at least 15 percent and reducing class size would be the NCAE's legislative priorities when the General Assembly meets in June.

Ms. Cummings also said she was calling on the Sanford Police Department to keep the Ku Klux Klan off school grounds in the city.

"I am calling on Sanford law officials to take all possible measures to keep vigilantes off of school grounds and to protect the children and teachers at McIver School and all other schools from harm by intruders," Ms. Cummings said.

In separate incidents earlier this month, two men were found hiding in girls' bathrooms at McIver Elementary School in Sanford. One suspect has been arrested.

The Ku Klux Klan has said it would patrol the school beginning Monday if Sanford police did not provide a full-time guard there.

Ms. Cummings said school and law enforcement personnel and not the Klan should handle the situation.

"It will only make the situation worse to have private citizens who are admittedly prejudiced against a large portion of our population patrolling school grounds and harassing people," she said.

"This kind of possible conduct could result in serious injury to innocent parties or to students who might get caught in a confrontation between a vigilante and someone else," she said. "There certainly would be violations of constitutional rights if vigilantes are permitted to stop, to question or to search people."

Ms. Cummings said she has not formally given her plea to the Sanford police.

At an NCAE banquet Thursday night, the Terry Sanford award for creative and innovative teaching was presented to Vivian L. Hartsoe, a second-grade teacher at Glen Arden Elementary School in Bumble County.

Would Ease Up On Price-Fixing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Federal Trade Commission economist has proposed legalizing some price fixing at the retail level so that manufacturers can ensure the availability of products in major stores.

Thomas R. Overstreet Jr. said Thursday he was trying to stimulate discussion with the release of his report, but declined to say precisely what the legal rule should be on what is known as resale price maintenance.

He said that unless some manufacturers can restrict prices of their products, shoppers are often likely to visit department stores to see products and then go to discount stores to buy them. That leads department stores and other major retail outlets to drop those product lines and eventually discounters follow suit, he said.

Atheists Protest Undersea Statue

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — An atheist group, the Freedom From Religious Foundation, has sent a protest to Florida officials, insisting that they remove an underwater, 9-foot statue of Jesus in John Pennekamp Coral Reef State Park at Key Largo, Fla.

The statue, called "Christ of the Deep," placed there by a Christian skin divers' group, "is an obvious violation of state-church separation," wrote Anne Gaylor, president of FFRF.

Wounded, Charged

FARMVILLE — A Farmville man wounded in an exchange of gunfire with police earlier this week has been charged with two counts of assault on a police officer and one count of discharging a firearm inside city limits.

Willie Sims, 78, was wounded in gunfire that broke out after police responded to a report of a disturbance at his home on Baker Boulevard Wednesday night.

Police said Sims shot through the door facing as police Sgt. William Waters attempted to enter the residence with a key obtained from the housing project manager. The bullet missed Waters' head by not more than 12 inches, Police Chief W.G. Barber said.

Barber said Officer Jerry Lee, who had been watching Sims through a bedroom window while the key was being obtained, returned the fire and shot Sims in the hip.

"We didn't know Sims was hit," said Barber, who arrived within minutes after the shooting, until after Sheriff's Deputy James Satterthwaite had got inside the house through a window and subdued him. "He was standing there keeping Mary Walker away from the window as the officers got the window up and tried to help her escape through the window. The rest of the house except the bedroom was dark, but the best we could see him he didn't let on that he was hit."

Barber said he believed that Sims was taking strong medication and possibly some alcohol at the time of the incident. "He thought people were after him, trying to throw anti-freeze on him," he said.

A neighbor had called police at 9:46 p.m. after three shots were fired inside the residence.

Sims' bond was set at \$50,200. He was being held at the Pitt County Jail.

McGovern As McGovern On 'Sat. Nite Live'

NEW YORK (AP) — "Saturday Night Live" has a great tradition of political satire, from Chevy Chase as President Gerald Ford to Eddie Murphy as the Rev. Jesse Jackson. Now, George McGovern will play George McGovern.

"Anybody who's arrogant enough to run for president shouldn't fear 'Saturday Night Live,'" said McGovern, who stopped running for the White House last month after losing the Massachusetts primary. Does his stint this Saturday as host of NBC's late-night comedy institution suggest he's now running for the nut house?

"I have to admit I couldn't find any of my advisers who thought it was a good idea," said the former Democratic senator from South Dakota.

But that didn't stop McGovern from throwing his top hat into the ring. If an actor can become president, then a could-have-been president certainly deserves a chance to become a song-and-dance man.

"It's an opportunity to express my humorous side," said McGovern. "Political appearances tend to be somewhat constrained and serious. Here, if I want to I can play the piano, dance, yell, spoof, act out my fantasies and get paid for it."

Plans call for him to play piano in a happy-hour bar and do a little singing, "if that doesn't turn off the audience," he said. One number will be "Brother Can You Spare a Dime?"

McGovern said he's being paid \$5,000, which is the same as his lecture fee. Will this drum up business? "I just hope it doesn't destroy me," he said.

"He's the only host to do the show for the money," cracked Executive Producer Dick Ebersol, referring to McGovern's campaign debt, which will be one subject the ex-candidate plans to address in his opening monologue.

"I'm prepared to say George McGovern needs the money," McGovern said in the deadpan delivery that might be the biggest boost for "SNL" since the rollicking

newsmen, Edwin Newman, was host earlier this year.

Ebersol said he's always wanted a presidential candidate as host. The closest he came was a Ford film clip that was shot at the White House. When it was finished, Ebersol swears Ford actually tripped over the camera cord.

Ebersol said he considers McGovern "very charismatic. He's got a wonderful voice with a great lilt to it. It reminds me of Liberace." The executive producer said he's always been impressed with McGovern's self-deprecating style.

In one scheduled sketch, McGovern, playing himself, will be an unemployed, deadbeat sponger, living in his sister-in-law's house. His family will berate him for embarrassing them. "How dare you run again?" asks his sister-in-law.

McGovern, a three-term senator who lost his first presidential bid to incumbent Richard Nixon in 1972, said his career in public life certainly had taught him to laugh at himself. "SNL" is more proof.

"It's just having the guts to do it," he said. "It's a question of having the nerve to expose yourself to spoofs and have a capacity for self-deprecation."

McGovern said his only suggestion to the writers was that they didn't

involve him in any ethnic or racial slurs.

"We're not going to put him in anything that will embarrass him. We respect him too much," said "SNL" writer Kevin Kelton. "We won't put the man in a Bozo the Clown suit."

The show's writers said McGovern's appearance helped percolate the creative juices.

"It's a greater joy writing a song for George McGovern than someone who's been singing for 4,000 years for a living," said Andy Breckman. McGovern said he's still interested in politics and, who knows, this might spawn another comeback. (Remember Nixon's appearance on "Laugh-In" in the late 1960s?)

Ironically, McGovern and Nixon will share the weekend TV spotlight. Nixon will be on "60 Minutes" Sunday for his final appearance in the series of three 30-minute interviews on CBS News broadcasts.

One difference, though, is that Nixon is making much more money.

"George doesn't have as interesting a truth to tell," said Kelton.

"Nixon has a better agent," said McGovern.

Sheen, 43, was playing in a foursome with professional golfer Betsy King. Calls to him at his Las Vegas hotel went unanswered Thursday.

"When I got to the tournament site, it was obvious I should remove him for conduct unbecoming an amateur golfer," said Herb McDonald, chairman of the four-day tournament.

He "wanted to play without his shirt, but we require all amateurs to wear shirts," McDonald said. "There are certain rules of conduct and you have to follow them. This is a business. You don't let football players play without helmets."

Celebrating 100th Year On Broadway

NEW YORK (AP) — The longest run on Broadway is celebrating its 100th anniversary, and the stars who have appeared in it include Grace Kelly, Clark Gable, Helen Hayes, Pearl Bailey, Danny Kaye and hundreds more.

It's not a musical, comedy or drama, but the Tony Award-winning magazine Playbill, the theater program founded in 1884 which is distributed free to theater-goers and filled with biographies, interviews, casts of characters and, most of all, advertising.

"One hundred years ago, a guy got an idea — you can sell ads for more money than it costs to print the program. That was smart," said Arthur T. Birsh, Playbill's publisher. "One good idea can last a century. That's what we do, we sell more ads than it costs to print the program."

On Thursday, the Museum of the City of New York opened an exhibition entitled "Playbill: The Longest Run on Broadway," featuring a selection of the museum's 100,000 theater programs.

Featured is "The Father" from 1949, with Grace Kelly; "Old Dutch" in 1909, starring Helen Hayes; "St. Louis Woman" in 1946, with Pearl Bailey; and "Machinal" in 1928, starring a young actor named Clark Gable.

"We've done a kind of encapsulated history of Playbill," said Mary Henderson, curator of the museum's Theatre Collection. Many

of the programs are priceless because they are irreplaceable, she said.

The company that eventually became Playbill was established in 1884 by Frank V. Strauss, an Ohio man who sold advertising for the Madison Square Theater in New York and eventually took over the printing of programs for all legitimate theaters. The magazines didn't become Playbill until 1934.

Some of the oldest programs at the museum predate Playbill, including a Nov. 20, 1785, program for a performance of "The Merchant of Venice" by the American Company, the first permanent troupe of actors in America.

The exhibition, which will continue through June 10, also includes a reproduction of the April 14, 1865, program of "Our American Cousin" at the Ford Theater in Washington, D.C. — the night Abraham Lincoln was assassinated.

Playbill, which won a Tony Award in 1971 for "87 years of dedicated service to the legitimate theatre," is now distributed in 34 theaters and prints about a million copies a month. The magazine pays theaters for the right to distribute the magazine, Birsh said.

"They deserve it, too," he said at a party Thursday night to mark the museum opening. "We don't need a subscription department. We don't need a post office. I've got these lovely ladies with little white collars (distributing the magazine). After 100 years, it still works."

Shakespeare's 37 Plays Performed

GLASGOW, Scotland (AP) — After completing a 78-hour, non-stop marathon performance of all 37 of William Shakespeare's plays, four actors and three actresses had just one desire: "To sleep, perchance to dream."

"I just want to go to bed and sleep," said 23-year-old Robin Cairns, actor-director of Glasgow's tiny Stage Dialogue Theater, on Thursday as he finished — appropriately — "A Midsummer Night's Dream."

The plays were performed in the foyer of the city's Albany Hotel to raise funds for a permanent theater.

Glasgow's Lord Provost, Dr. Michael Kelly, put in a guest appearance as the gravedigger in "Hamlet." But the rest of the parts were played by the seven cast members, who "snatched what sleep they could when not on stage and took five minutes between plays," Cairns said.

"Some guests at the hotel were impressed and others totally bewildered, but the hotel staff clapped at the end of each play," Cairns said.

Ferlin Husky Is Hospitalized

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Country music entertainer Ferlin Husky, best known for his songs "Wings of A Dove" and "Country Music is Here to Stay," is in the hospital, a spokeswoman says.

"The family has requested that no information be given out," said Sue Greer, spokeswoman for Nashville Memorial Hospital, after the singer was admitted Thursday.

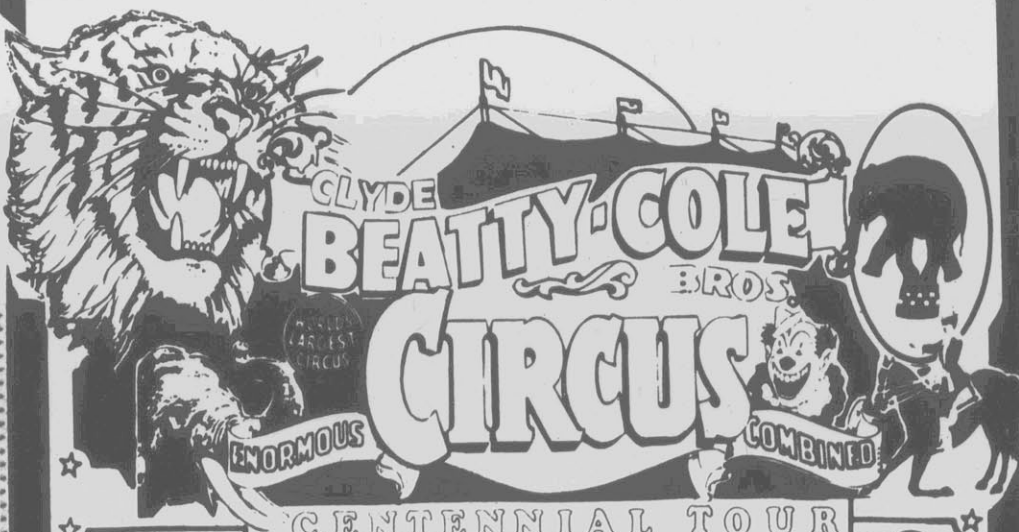

Continuing Efforts Made To Picture Jesus

He "was made like his brethren in every respect," the book of Hebrews says of Jesus, that special man whose entry into Jerusalem for his last earthly week is celebrated by Christians this Sunday.

But just what he looked like has remained a question ever since, although countless concepts of his appearance have been produced in paintings, icons and sculpture.

Most every major art museum includes some of those portrayals by renowned artists through the centuries. The efforts still go on.

"He had no form or comeliness that we should look at him," says Scriptural prophecy in Isaiah 53, regarded by Christians as referring to him, "and no beauty that we should desire him."

He was "a man of sorrow, acquainted with grief."

The classic paintings generally convey that aspect, in direct or indirect ways, depicting him as he taught, sat with his apostles at the

Last Supper, in his death on the cross, even in his resurrection.

One of the most widely popular of the paintings, Warner Sallman's "Head of Christ," was the subject recently of a 60th anniversary exhibit in Northbrook, Ill., where Sallman's widow, Ruth, resides.

Millions of reproductions of that painting, showing a gentle, serene face with blue eyes and light hair, adorn walls of many homes, hospitals, churches and offices around the world.

"He was despised, and we esteemed him not," says the prophecy of Isaiah. He was "wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that made us whole, and with his stripes we are healed."

Sallman, whose painting often is criticized as too blandly pleasant and Anglo-Saxon, did it for a Christian magazine cover in 1924. He related how he had trouble deciding how to do it, but inspiration came to him and he got up and swiftly executed it.

A new painting of the face, widely reproduced lately in the religious press, has been turned out by British artist Curtis Hooper, drawing on indications from a man-size figure on the ancient and mystifying Shroud of Turin.

Scientists who have examined it so far remain baffled by the cause of the image, although some conclude that the cloth wrapped the body of Christ in burial, his imprint left on it at his resurrection.

Hooper, who spent seven years in research, analyzing enhanced photographs of the image and consulting with specialists to produce his work, says he believes it is the most accurate depiction yet of Jesus' countenance.

It shows a short-bearded man, his

dark hair down to his shoulders, with deeply perceptive, dark brown eyes.

"One day I looked at the eyes I had painted, and the face suddenly became real to me," he says. "It overwhelmed me... Even after the painting was finished, it took me nearly a year before I could really look at it."

A reproduction was carried in Life magazine recently, and it since has appeared in the fortnightly, Christianity Today, in the national Catholic weekly, Our Sunday Visitor, and other religious publications.

In determining various minute details for the painting, Hooper learned that the shroud image of the man, who had been beaten and crucified, showed his face sunken in death, his nose and lips swollen, his forehead scratched.

Hooper made a preliminary clay model of the head and consulted plastic surgeons, a mortician and forensic pathologists to learn how the face looked before the injuries.

In determining the dark hair and eye color, Hooper studied the racial anthropology of Jesus, and spent time in Israel observing modern Bedouins and Sephardic Jews. His findings suggested they resembled the Jews of Jesus' time. Hooper, reared in the Church of England and always intrigued by drawings, paintings and icons of Christ, said they usually showed a bleak resignation not in accord with his own understanding of Jesus.

For all the artistic efforts, new and old, the appearance of the man considered by Christians to be the

human representative of God and foreign of their own ultimate resurrection, remains an unknown.

But the first chapter of the book of Revelation offers a descriptive vision of the glorified Christ, saying:

"Then I turned ... and I saw ... one like a son of man, clothed with a long robe and with a golden girdle round his breast; his head and his hair were ... white as snow; his eyes were like a flame of fire, his feet were like burnished bronze, refined as in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of many waters... His face was like the sun shining in full strength."

RALEIGH (AP) — A Raleigh car salesman says he believes some Florida automobile distributors made contributions to the gubernatorial campaign of Attorney General Rufus Edmisten in order to keep Edmisten from taking a firm stand on a new law that deals in part with the allocation of cars to dealers.

The Edmisten for Governor campaign reported receiving \$4,000 each from three top executives of Southeast Toyota Distributors Inc.

"I have no doubt in my mind that their interests to keep that attorney general from taking any real substantive position on it (the new law)," said Richard J. Goodman, president of Goodman Toyota in Raleigh.

The law regulates the relationship between franchised automobile dealers and the automobile manufacturers or distributors, according to John R.B. Matthis, of the state Consumer Protection Section.

Goodman said that since the law took after the last legislative session, that Southeast Toyota has not honored the law.

Edmisten denied that allegations. "That's ridiculous," he said Thursday. "That's totally ridiculous."

Goodman said he complained to Southeast Toyota's executive vice president John McNally in a mailgram after he said the company did not begin complying with the new law. After McNally responded that he thought the allocation system was fair, Goodman said he approached Sen. Julian R. Allsbrook, D-Halifax about getting an advisory opinion from Edmisten's office.

Goodman said Allsbrook told him Aug. 18 that he would ask for the advisory opinion. He said he also visited the attorney general's office in September, and met with Millard R. Rich Jr., a deputy attorney

general and furnished him with documents relating to Southeast Toyota's distribution method.

Rich later send a letter to Goodman, along with a copy to Allsbrook, saying "based on my conversation with you and the material you furnished me, I am not in a position to state whether or not Southeast Toyota is violating the provisions of the law"

Rich said Allsbrook never contacted him and never asked, directly or indirectly, for an official opinion on the new law. Allsbrook has been hospitalized and unavailable for comment.

Edmisten's office also received a request from Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green to give a position on the act. Green said in a letter to Andy Vanore, an assistant attorney general, that he had been contacted by Goodman, who he said needed the information.

Vanore sent Green a letter telling him that Goodman should contact the Consumer Protection Section, and added that the act appeared to be primarily designed to protect dealers, and did not generally affect members of the general public. Vanore said in the letter that if Goodman felt the public was being harmed, that the office would talk to him.

Southeast Toyota executives contributing to Edmisten's campaign included president James M. Moran, McNally, and Richard G. Knox.

Edmisten said he had never met Moran or Knox, but that he was introduced to McNally on June 3 in Boone when the attorney general formally entered the gubernatorial race.

He said he was introduced by a longtime friend and supporter, Norman L. Cheek, who owns a Toyota dealership in Boone, Edmisten's hometown.

"... (McNally) told me that ... Norman has talked to him about me on several occasions and that I sounded like the kind of man they

wanted to be governor." Edmisten said.

Edmisten said he was given the checks by McNally later at a restaurant in Raleigh.

He said that McNally told him, "I'm doing this because I live in North Carolina. I know Norman Cheek. I don't want anything out of you. You'll never catch me asking for anything."

McNally lives in Deerfield Beach, Fla., but also owns a home near Boone, Edmisten said.

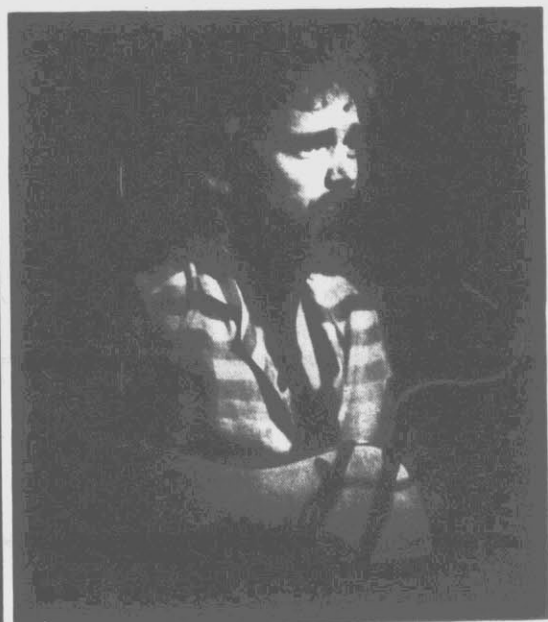

Long Day Proposed

BOONE, N.C. (AP) — State Board of Education Chairman C. D. Spangler says the greatest weakness in the public school system is that it has not expected enough out of students in the past.

"They could and want to do more," he said. "A person does almost what is expected of them."

Spangler made the comments to members of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors and trustees of the 16 state universities during a Thursday meeting at Appalachian State University.

Spangler also called for a longer school day in North Carolina and more specific course requirements for students graduating from all public schools.

Halifax and Polk counties are experimenting with a longer school day and school year.

Students in those systems go to school seven hours a day, one hour more than the normal day, and there are 200 days in the school term, 20 more than in the normal term.

Spangler praised the university system for action it took last month to raise the minimum requirement for admission to a University of North Carolina institution. The tougher standards are the first to be applied to all UNC system schools.

"What you (the board) have said by doing that is we expect more from you high school students," he said. "You were convinced that you would still be able to get the quality and the number of students that you need and I am absolutely confident that in the public school system we will be able to deliver better students to you because you changed the requirement for admissions."

The Trojans learned all about enemies who brought them gifts. Yet bridge players still have a trusting faith in their opponents. Consider this hand.

We agree with North's decision to use the Stayman convention. Had he located a 4-4 major fit, his hand would have been worth two or three tricks. And who knows how many tricks in no trump would be available opposite a two no trump opener?

West led the fourth best of his long suit. East won the ace and shifted to a club. Declarer rose with the ace and returned the queen of hearts. West took the king and continued with a heart, won by declarer.

Declarer now played the king and jack of clubs, taken by West. With nothing better to do, West shifted to a spade. East grabbed the ace and returned a low diamond. Declarer seized the chance for a finesse, but West had the queen and that was down one.

South railed a little about finesses always losing on Friday the 13th. Truth of the matter is that he was a trifle naive to go down in his contract.

He should have realized that the defenders knew full well that he had to have two of the three top diamond honors for his strong opening. If he had an entry to the table, he had enough tricks no matter what the defenders did. Therefore, if East held the queen of diamonds, all he had to do was put South back in his hand and wait for the setting trick.

Why, then, did East shift to a diamond? Obviously, because he wanted to give declarer a choice of plays. He knew that, left to his own devices, declarer would have to bang out diamonds from the top, and if he held A-K-x in diamonds, he was going to drop the queen.

East did well to give declarer a losing option. Declarer was rather ingenious to swallow the bait.
