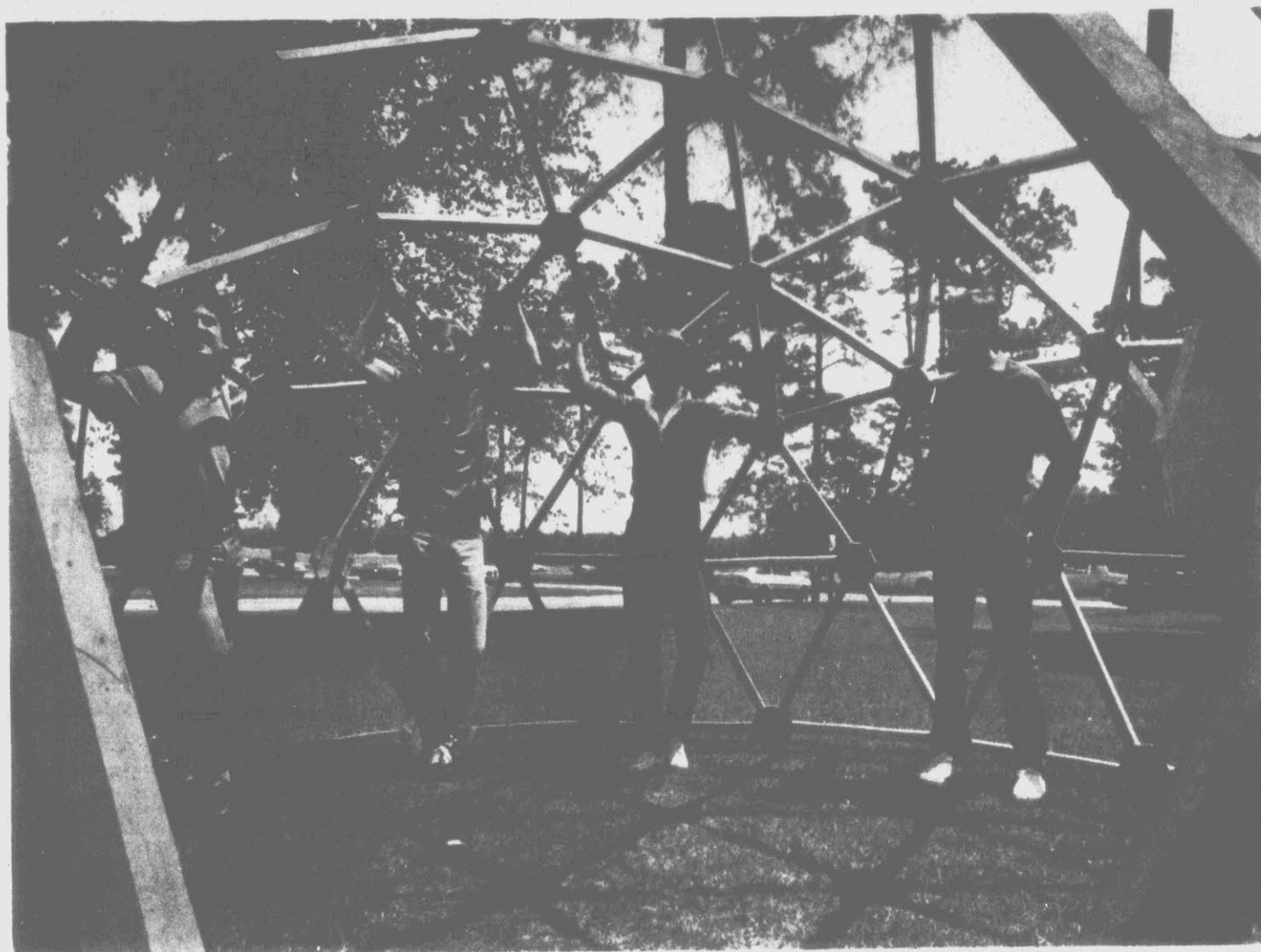

Reagan Unprepared To Send U.S. Troops To Gulf, C. America

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says he's not preparing to send American troops to war in Central America or the Persian Gulf, although he is pledging to keep the gulf open to oil tankers despite the brewing crisis in the region.

However, when pressed, the president refused to unequivocally rule out the possibility of sending U.S. forces to either region.

At a nationally broadcast news conference dominated by foreign policy questions Tuesday night, the president also said:

— The Soviet Union may not return to the nuclear arms reduction bargaining table until after the November presidential election, but he is not willing to make any concession to get them back earlier.

— He doesn't believe the United States and Soviet Union are any closer to a "confrontation that could lead to a nuclear conflagration" than before he took office.

— He doesn't foresee an impending recession, despite the rise in interest rates. "There are always some pessimists out there," Reagan complained.

— The increase in the number of Soviet submarines off U.S. shores doesn't worry him. "If I thought there was some reason to be concerned about them, I wouldn't be sleeping in this house tonight," he said.

— "I just hope and pray that the Soviet Union will do the humane thing" and allow Yelena Bonner, the wife of Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov, to seek treatment of heart and eye ailments in another country.

During the East Room session, the president was asked about the likelihood that U.S. servicemen would become involved in a war in the Middle East, where Iran and Iraq are at war and have attacked oil tankers plying the Persian Gulf.

"I think very slight," he replied. "I can't foresee that happening. As

things stand now, no, I don't think so."

In a nearly identical question — this one concerning the possibility of committing U.S. troops to El Salvador if that nation ever appears ready to fall to the communists — the president said:

"We'd lose all those friends and neighbors (in the region) if we did that. They want our help ... But they

Reagan At-A-Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here, at a glance, are highlights of President Reagan's nationally broadcast news conference Tuesday night.

Reagan said the oil states of the Persian Gulf want to handle the attacks on their oil shipments without American intervention but the United States stands ready to play a role "if they ask us for help."

But, asked what the likelihood is that American troops will become involved in a shooting war in that region in the near future, Reagan said, "I think very slight and I can't foresee that happening."

Reagan repeated his call for Congress to send more economic and military aid to the rebels in Nicaragua and the government of El Salvador.

If Congress refuses to buy his Central American proposals, Reagan said, "we would be in a very difficult position and so would they."

Reagan said he did not think the U.S. economy is headed into a recession and he said the Federal Reserve Board policies for controlling the nation's money supply are "right on target."

Waters Says He's Conservative

Maynard Waters of Route 4, Washington, filed Monday as a candidate for the Republican nomination for the North Carolina Senate from the 9th Senatorial District.

Waters, 48, is opposing Democrat Tom Taft of Greenville for the office. He describes himself as "a free enterprise-oriented conservative." He said he is running "to maintain the conservative tradition of this district so effectively represented for so many years by Senator Vernon White." White, a Democrat,

announced this year that he would not run for re-election to the state Senate.

"We need a senator with a strong commitment to agriculture and our small businesses," Waters declared, saying he would be "the kind of senator who knows how to say no to the tax increases and excessive government regulation that threaten our farmers, businessmen and average working people."

Waters is the minister of CVM Christian Center near Washington. A Beaufort County native, he is a graduate of Bath High School and

Atlanta Christian College and did graduate work at Lincoln Christian Seminary in Illinois. He has been in the ministry for 27 years. He and his wife, the former Kay Shelton, have four grown children and four grandchildren.

The candidate has served on the executive committee of the Beaufort County Republican Party and as a delegate to several conventions of the North Carolina Republican Party. He is precinct chairman of Beaver Dam Precinct in Beaufort County.

Marilyn Rhodes Appointed Nursing Executive At PCMH

Marilyn K. Rhodes has been named vice president for nursing services at Pitt County Memorial Hospital.

Ms. Rhodes has served in an interim capacity as vice president for nursing services since Oct. 18, 1983, managing a \$25 million budget and a workforce of 1,200. Hospital President Jack W. - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon chicken-flavor instant bouillon granules
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dried minced onions

1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
2 1/2-pound chicken, cut up
1 tablespoon corn oil
In large plastic bag shake together flour, breadcrumbs, cornstarch, sugar, bouillon, salt, paprika, onion and garlic powder. Brush chicken on all sides with oil. Shake chicken pieces, two at a time, in bag of flour mixture. Bake in single layer in a shallow baking pan in preheated 400-degree oven for 20 minutes; turn chicken and bake 20 minutes more. Serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

Pat's Pointers

By Pat Trexler

Stitch a personalized picture frame in an evening or two with colored plastic canvas and acrylic yarns. You'll have a choice of plain or fancy pattern stitches for the borders and can leave the background unworked, as shown, letting the colored canvas stand on its own, or completely fill it in with stitches.

To obtain directions for making the Personalized Frame, send your request for Leaflet No. NL-0520 with \$1 and a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope to: Pat Trexler (The Daily Reflector), P.O. Box 810, North Myrtle Beach, S.C. 29597.

The kit price includes shipping charges, full instructions, needle, plastic canvas and yarn sufficient for making two frames. Please specify your choice of blue or brown plastic canvas for the frames. (Coordinating yarn colors will be sent.)

Surprisingly often, the beginner can be taught a seemingly complicated needlepoint stitch more easily than the basic tent stitch. This is a happy circumstance because mastery of a beautiful stitch pattern will quickly encourage the beginner to experiment more and more.

One example of this is the rice

stitch worked in two colors. The first part of the stitch is a simple cross stitch worked over two canvas threads in each direction, as shown in Stitch Chart A. Bring your needle up in hole 1, take it down in hole 2, up in 3, down in 4. Now with a needle threaded with a contrasting color, cross the four corners by following steps 5 through 12 in Charts B and C, always bringing the needle up in odd-numbered holes and taking it down in even-numbered ones.

In actual usage, you would make a full row with one color, following Chart A; then cross the corners with the contrast color.

Another stitch that will make people think you are almost professional when you are just a beginner is the jacquard stitch. Notice that the stitches represented by the arrows are worked diagonally over two canvas threads and that these stitches lie side by side.

Try working seven stitches in this manner at the right corner of a scrap of canvas. (I think plastic canvas is the best choice for learning new stitches.) When these seven are made, change to another color of yarn and work the zigzag row of small tent stitches shown as fat little ovals on the chart.

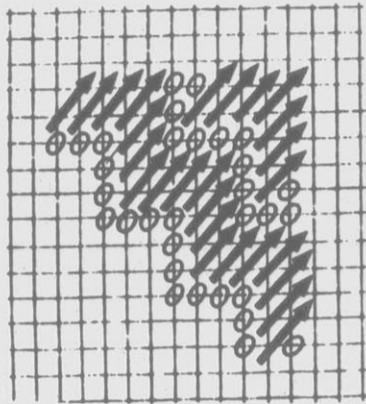
By the time you have made a stitch for each arrow and oval on the chart, I think you will have the idea and can go right ahead and use this as a fascinating background or overall pattern stitch.

These are just two of several hundred pattern stitches that can be used for needlepoint. There is no need to settle for plain, repetitive stitchery.

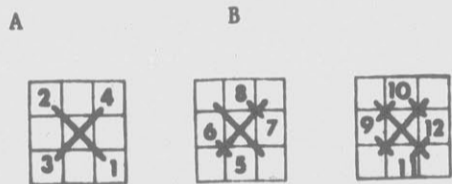


PERSONALIZED PICTURE...frame worked on colored pastic canvas is a fast and easy project.

Editorials

Growing Cost

Most people have long been aware the cleanup of hazardous waste is a costly and often time-consuming project. Just how costly remains unclear.

In North Carolina alone there was the occasion of trucks spilling their toxic wastes along a highway, and it took a long time to first become aware of the disaster and even longer to decide how best to detoxify the strip and how to dispose of the contaminated soil.

It was not a really "big" operation insofar as area involved, but the price-tag came high.

Many millions of dollars, displacement of many people and much anguish resulted in the Love Canal area and subsequently in a small Southern community where unpaved streets were sprayed with a polluting material ... presumably to keep down the dust stirred by vagrant breezes and wind.

Those are just a few of the more publicized examples of problems toxic wastes pose. There were (and remain) many more.

Now a General Accounting Office study says the cleaning up of polluted waste sites with money from the emergency "Superfund" resources could run anywhere from \$5.3 billion to \$26 billion ... far, far in excess of the sum originally tagged for clean-up operations. Even the relatively conservative Environmental Protection Agency now says the cost could run from \$8.4 billion to \$16 billion. (Hard information is difficult to come by, which explains the difference in estimates.) Still, it does underline how far short the estimate of a few years ago turned out to be at \$1.6 billion.

Some congressional spokesmen are now moving to enlarge the "Superfund" to cope with the emerging picture. It takes time. Few people in Congress have the time to devote full attention to all the many issues besetting government; so they focus much of their effort on those issues of immediate concern to their own constituents.

Each time a problem of nationwide scope comes to the fore a host of lawmakers require materials and time for study and familiarization with aspects of an unfamiliar field. So it's just as well the promoters of enlarging the EPA's superfund are calling attention to the growing toxic waste disaster so that the clean-up process is not stopped by lack of money.

Of course, one's first thought turns to the adage "an ounce of prevention, etc.," but all this began years ago, before the potential scope and risks of toxic wastes were a matter of common concern.

Exercise Needed

Seldom has this nation seen an emphasis on exercise greater than is apparent today.

Joggers are everywhere, and people of all ages are enjoying bicycling, hiking, swimming, handball, tennis and all the other sports.

For most, it is serious business, for medical research continues to tell us that appropriate exercise is good for our bodies and our health. And most advocates of exercise say they feel better, can stay trimmer and generally benefit from their activities. The important thing is to consult a physician and develop an exercise program which fits the individual's physical condition and age.

But with all that is going on in the way of exercise it is distressing to learn that there are still substantial numbers of obese children.

Ann Harrison reported to the city school board this week that, based on a recent survey 10 to 15 percent of children in the city schools, from kindergarten through seventh grades, are obese. The prime reason appears to be lack of exercise.

It is a matter of concern to learn that so large a percentage of children are overweight, and it tells us that we need to develop exercise programs which include all our young people. They are at a time in life when they should have the energy and enthusiasm to burn up excess calories. They must be guided properly.

Colors Do Make A Difference

Do you find that people ignore you when you come into a room? Are you one of those who is constantly being interviewed for jobs and never get them; or if you do have a job, you're the last one to be promoted? Even though these brokers had exceeded their sales quotas, Shearson brass felt they could do even better if their people improved their wardrobes.

"Color Me Beautiful" experts break down people's skin undertones in to four seasons, "Spring," "Sum-

mer," "Fall" and "Winter." The secret of sartorial splendor is to wear the colors that fit the tones of your skin.

Miss Vlahovich took one look at my face and told me I was a "winter" person. This, she assured me, was nothing to be ashamed of. Other "winter" people included Dick Van Dyke, Rock Hudson, Gary Hart and Richard Nixon. Our problem, if we have a problem, is that we can never wear brown or yellow, because it clashes with our faces.

Miss Vlahovich explained to me if you are not wearing the right colors, you will not be in harmony, and therefore subconsciously when people first size you up they feel that there is something wrong with you.

I know she was right because every time I wear my hot turquoise sport jacket with shocking pink pants, no one will talk to me. Only a summer person like Dustin Hoffman in drag could get away with an outfit like that.

Miss Vlahovich told me, "You can either give a powerful image or a weak one, depending on what you're wearing. Also, if you are dressed in the wrong colors you subconsciously feel depressed. But if you have on the right ones you'll feel great, and therefore have much more confidence in yourself."

Once again I knew she was speaking truth. The evening before, I wore a lemon yellow Hawaiian shirt decked out with orange birds of paradise, and true red slacks, and brown moccasins. I felt awful and so did all the people around me. I thought it was the food, but those brokers who had already been evaluated by the "Color Me Beautiful" consultants didn't have the heart to tell me I was in the wrong season for someone with my golden undertones.

What I learned from my hour with Miss Vlahovich is that if I wanted to really climb the ladder of success I must stick to charcoal grays, Navy blues, icy pinks, aquas and violets; though we "winter" people also give off very good vibes in magenta, fuchsia and royal purples, providing we don't use them to excess.

"Don't follow Reagan," she warned me. "He's an autumn person, and he can wear a lot of colors you can't."

"How about Paul Newman?"

"Stay away from Paul Newman. You just don't have the skin or blues eyes to get away with the colors he can."

"That's funny," I said. "You're the fifth person who's told me that this week."

Sakharov Standoff Hurting Soviets

WASHINGTON — At 4:30 p.m. on April 23, two senior State Department officials went to the Soviet Embassy to warn in diplomatic but explicit language that if Soviet political dissident Andrei Sakharov died because of his hunger strike, relations between the U.S. and Soviet Union would grow still worse.

Sakharov's wife, Yelena Bonner, had just appealed to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. If her husband's hunger strike failed to change the Kremlin's mind against permitting her to go West for desperately needed medical attention, she would appeal for refuge in the American Embassy.

The "nyet" that came back from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko exactly one week later confirmed that the Kremlin has no intention of thawing the U.S.-Soviet relations, even if all that had to be done was save the life of a world-famous scientist. Therein lies an

irony with deep consequences for American politics.

Not long ago, President Reagan's political inner circle felt that warming relations between the two superpowers were important to his re-election. Today, the Kremlin's freeze and its many manifestations may be a major asset in the Reagan campaign.

Whether or not Reagan operatives now are premature in believing that the war-and-peace issue is no longer a domestic political liability for the president, the failure of the new Soviet leadership to understand how politics works in the U.S. is undeniable. At least a partial explanation of the brutal treatment the Kremlin is dishing out to Dr. Sakharov and his wife is its unquenchable lust to ridicule and insult Reagan in the belief that such treatment will help defeat him on Nov. 6.

The Kremlin may get exactly the opposite of what it wants if

Sakharov's courageous self-starvation tactics fail to enable his wife to obtain treatment abroad and the famed nuclear physicist dies. Instead of damaging Reagan's re-election prospect, the Kremlin's obduracy may only reinforce the image of the present Kremlin leadership as beyond civilized discourse.

"If Sakharov dies," one key Reagan aide told us, "you can be sure there will be an anti-Soviet furor, and not just in the White House." That furor clearly would be directed against the Soviet Union, not against Reagan.

Such misreading of American politics in an election year would have been highly unlikely in the earlier Soviet regimes of Nikita Khrushchev, Leonid Brezhnev and perhaps even master-spy Yuri Andropov. But when the present nominal Soviet leader, Konstantin Chernenko, came to power last

winter, he apparently was compelled to make unusual concessions to his colleagues. One was granting Gromyko immense if not total power over foreign policy.

The return here last week of U.S. Ambassador Arthur Hartman for consultations confirmed what the White House has been suspecting: Gromyko is driven by a Stalinist scorn for President Reagan, a commitment to drive him from office and an appalling lack of subtlety and sophistication in going about it.

Hartman's diagnosis is confirmed inside the White House. Repeated efforts to upgrade the "hot line" (connecting the Oval Office and the Kremlin) have been spiked by the Russians, even though they had lobbied the last several months for upgraded communications. "They're afraid it would look like collaboration with Reagan," a presidential adviser told us.

Networks Give Up Children's Programs

WASHINGTON — In 1954 the Supreme Court boosted the process of desegregation by ruling that separate but equal education facilities were inherently unequal. On the anniversary of that decision last week, however, educational segregation of a sort was taking hold on the nation's television airwaves.

Network TV, at the federal government's nod, has moved to slash its commitment to quality programming for children. Children from poor families won't be able to afford alternatives to cartoons.

One need only look at this fall's lineup of children's programs to realize that the major television networks have taken the Reagan administration's deregulatory message to heart. With the exception of a few specials sprinkled about, the networks have slated a spate of cartoons for next season.

Take, for example, "Turbo Teen" (ABC), an animated 3-D (special glasses are available) comedy-mystery series starring a teen-age boy who turns into a sleek, turbo-charged racing car whenever his body temperature rises. His arch-enemy is a mysterious, super-sized big wheel.

Then there's "Broots" (ABC). Also in 3-D, this futuristic show stars five lively robots with distinctive personalities and super powers. The robots combine to form one super-robot, known as "Broots." Controlling the awesome powers of Broots is little "Oh No," a female robot.

Or how about "Kid Video" (NBC). The story line behind this cartoon features a young rock 'n' roll band that battles another rock quartet, the Copy Cats, who rip off songs from different groups.

The plethora of such brain-drainers, suggests Children's Defense Fund President Marian Wright Edelman, is so common that affluent

parents are supplementing their children's TV diet with more enriched menu of programs available on cable TV or at video rental houses. Disadvantaged children unfortunately don't enjoy such alternatives.

The double standard of options has developed because of the Reagan administration's reluctance to interfere with the marketplace. The president and his FCC chairman, Mark Fowler, a former Reagan campaign counsel, have adopted a philosophy toward television that says: If you don't like what television broadcasters offer, purchase superior programs elsewhere.

The Federal Communications Commission and the Congress have been grappling with children's tele-

vision issues for 20 years. In 1974, the FCC concluded that broadcasters had a special obligation to serve children. Under the direction of Dean Burch, Sen. Barry Goldwater's onetime presidential campaign manager, the FCC urged that TV stations make a "meaningful effort" to increase the number of informative programs they offer to children.

Five years later, the FCC discovered that broadcasters had ignored its recommendation and subsequently began a rule-making effort. Yet, with an anti-regulatory administration in office in 1981, TV stations correctly anticipated that the feds weren't going to enforce their word. Gradually, the networks reduced what few educational programs they had for children and

replaced them with more lucrative cartoon shows.

Since the Reagan administration entered office, for example, CBS has reduced Captain Kangaroo's airing from an hour each morning to one 30-minute spot every Saturday. ABC's "Animals, Animals, Animals" has been canceled, as has CBS's popular "Thirty Minutes," (a kids' version of "Sixty Minutes") and NBC's "Project Peacock" and "Kids Are People Too."

The latest assault began last December. A few days before Christmas, the FCC issued, in the words of a dissenting commissioner, Henry Rivera, "the epitaph for children's television." In its final policy statement on the subject, the FCC altered its pre-existing children's programming policy by deciding to "leave it (children's programming) up to the marketplace."

In short, the government said if you want good television programs for your kids, go out and buy a video-recorder and some decent tapes or subscribe to a cable service. Or see if you can tune in PBS on your present set. With that decision, the government abandoned its responsibility to provide children, America's most vulnerable resource, with a more renaissance view of the world.

As justice would have it, less financially secure parents are now stuck with whatever the networks find profitable to offer their children. (Meanwhile, independent stations are now airing kids' programs that have been produced by toy companies.) Working-class parents don't even have the luxury of dictating control over their children's 30 hours a week of television viewing. About 58 percent of mothers with children ages 3 to 5 are in the labor force.

Two Die In Colombian Blasts

Bombs Go Off Near U.S. Sites

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Seven bombs aimed at U.S. and Honduran targets exploded in Bogota, including one blast which killed two people and injured 11. A renegade leftist guerrilla group reportedly claimed responsibility.

Two bombs exploded near the U.S. Embassy, and a car bomb heard five miles away exploded 200 feet from the U.S. ambassador's residence, but neither building was damaged.

A hard-line terrorist group that broke away earlier this year from the Colombian Revolutionary Armed Forces, a Moscow-line guerrilla group, claimed responsibility for the bombings in a telephone call to the Bogota daily El Bogotano, according to the paper's news editor, Henry Holguin.

He said a woman caller claiming to be a member of the breakaway group said: "Honduras is cooperating with the United States in the

destabilization of the Sandinista government of Nicaragua."

The main faction of the Colombian Revolutionary Armed Forces has agreed to a one-year truce, starting next Monday, with government security forces.

All casualties occurred in one incident, when a bomb exploded late Tuesday afternoon in the downtown offices of the Honduran airline SAHSA, police said in a communique.

The two dead and three of the injured were among a group of young people that brought the bomb into the office, office manager Rafael Olivo told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

The young people were asking about reduced fares to Honduras when the bomb exploded in the hands of one of the young men and blew a two-foot-wide hole in the floor, Olivo said. The office is on the second floor of a 30-story building.

Later, police reported finding and disarming a car bomb in front of the

Honduran Embassy.

Other bombs began exploding late Tuesday night, starting with the car bomb left near the residence of U.S. Ambassador Lewis Tambs. The explosion threw car parts 75 feet.

The ambassador's residence, set behind an iron gate and a tightly knit row of evergreens, was not damaged. It was not known if Tambs and his wife and infant daughter were in the two-story house at the time.

Five minutes later, two bombs went off on street corners of a small block occupied entirely by the U.S. Embassy. The bombs, left with trash piled up for the next morning's collection, broke windows of other buildings but did not damage the embassy, which is 150 feet from the street.

Early today, three other bombs went off, one inside the U.S. government operated Colombian-American Cultural Center, and one each on street corners at offices of IBM and ITT.

The bomb at the cultural center exploded on the fourth floor of the

five-story building, damaging classrooms on the third and fourth floors. Hundreds of people attend English classes daily at the center, in downtown Bogota.

IBM's offices, undamaged by a bomb that exploded in a telephone booth in front of the building, are on a busy avenue that connects the downtown of this city of 6 million people with the international airport.

ITT's offices, also undamaged, are in an industrial sector near the downtown area.

U.S. Joins War Game In Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)

— More than 4,000 American, Honduran and Salvadoran troops begin combat exercises today that will take them near troubled border areas of El Salvador and Nicaragua.

It is the first time that El Salvador's government, locked in a 4 1/2-year war with leftist rebels, has sent troops to participate in military maneuvers here.

The war games, to last until June 30, are the second phase of Granadero I, the latest in a series of exercises that critics of the Reagan administration charge is creating a semi-permanent U.S. military presence in this strategically located Central American nation.

Washington says the exercises are aimed at increasing the defensive capacity of troops of friendly nations in the region.

A U.S. diplomat, who spoke on condition he not be named, said the maneuvers are more than a training exercise.

"They have two fundamental purposes — to apply psychological pressure on Nicaragua and to reassure our allies in the area," he said. "There are some training benefits, but that is not the main objective."

Another U.S. diplomat said at the start of the first phase of Granadero I that the maneuvers were intended to intimidate both the leftist Nicaraguan government and Salvadoran rebels.

"It's a poker game," he said. "The stakes are going up, but it's still under control and I think it will stay that way."

The Reagan administration accuses Nicaragua's Sandinista government of supplying arms to Salvadoran rebels and says it poses a threat to Central America's security because of its ties to Cuba and the Soviet Union.

In the first phase of Granadero I, which began April 1, Army engineers from Fort Lewis, Wash.

constructed two dirt runways large enough for C-130 transport planes. One is at Cucuyagua, about 25 miles from the Salvadoran border; the other at Jamastran, about 20 miles from the Nicaraguan border area where CIA-backed rebels are fighting Sandinista troops.

Col James Strachan, spokesman for U.S. forces in Honduras, said American troops are under "rigidly enforced" orders to stay five miles from either border to prevent incidents like the Jan. 11 downing of a U.S. Army helicopter by Nicaraguan soldiers after it crossed into Nicaraguan airspace.

A U.S. military officer, speaking on condition he not be identified, said pilots will have to use extreme caution because of lack of good maps and frequent cloud covers in mountainous regions.

U.S. Aid Isn't Being Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is finding out that in the Persian Gulf as well as in Central America, even friendly governments are reluctant to call on the United States for military assistance to solve their problems.

They will accept Uncle Sam's help — up to a point.

The Saudis, for instance, built their air force and army on U.S. weapons purchases. El Salvador is battling leftist rebels with American military and economic aid.

But faced with attacks on their tankers, the Saudis and the other oil countries along the Persian Gulf prefer, as Reagan acknowledged Tuesday night at a news conference, "to take care of this themselves."

And, he said, President-elect Jose Napoleon Duarte and the Salvadorans "don't want American manpower."

Besides, Reagan said, he did not offer to intervene in the Gulf or in El Salvador, although he repeated his warning that if oil shipments are choked off the United States and its allies could not simply stand by and watch it happen.

The net result is to lower the likelihood of Americans going into combat, but it could also mean the United States might come up short-handed if it looked to Saudi Arabia to take on a policeman's role.

"You can't implant guts," said a perturbed general the other day about the Saudis' reluctance to send their U.S.-built jets into the air to

deter attacks by Iran on tankers.

With 62 advanced F-15 jets and AWACS (airborne warning and control system) radar planes the Saudis have a modern air force. The Carter and Reagan administration sold the U.S. weapons shipments to a skeptical Congress with the argument the Saudis were a bastion against radicalism.

But the Saudis are nervous about taking on Iran because that could provoke fundamentalist elements in their own country. Besides, Reagan told reporters, the Gulf states "are concerned about not enlarging the war" between Iran and Iraq.

The U.S. offer of military support was not really explicit in a letter Reagan sent to King Fahd with Assistant Secretary of State Richard

Murphy, a former U.S. ambassador to the kingdom.

According to U.S. officials, the president informed Fahd he preferred a diplomatic solution to the Gulf conflict. Failing that, Reagan said it would be better if Saudi Arabia and its allies took collective action than if the United States stepped in.

Direct U.S. involvement was raised only as a last resort, said these officials, who declined to be identified.

In any event, the Saudis did not nibble at the suggestion of an American military role. "We have not volunteered to intervene and we have not been asked to intervene," Reagan said after the letter had been received and studied in Riyadh.



Security Council To Meet Friday

The U.N. Security Council agreed to hold an emergency meeting Friday to discuss the attacks on ships in the Persian Gulf, and Syria said it was sending two envoys to Iran today, reportedly to urge its leaders to enter peace talks with Iraq.

Arab diplomats in Damascus said Syrian President Hafez Assad was sending two top officials to Tehran to try to persuade Iran to stop its attacks against Persian Gulf shipping and to consider negotiating an end to its 3 1/2-year war with Iraq.

Syrian officials confirmed that Vice President A.H. Khaddam and Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa would go to Iran but declined further comment.

The diplomats said Saudi Arabia's King Fahd, in an urgent message delivered to Assad on Tuesday, had asked Syria to intervene. They said it was the first time Syria had agreed to act as a mediator in the gulf conflict.

Syria and Libya are the only Arab countries that back Iran.

At the United Nations, the 15-nation Security Council agreed to a request by six Persian Gulf states to hold an urgent meeting on the gulf crisis Friday when the foreign ministers from some of those states were expected in New York.

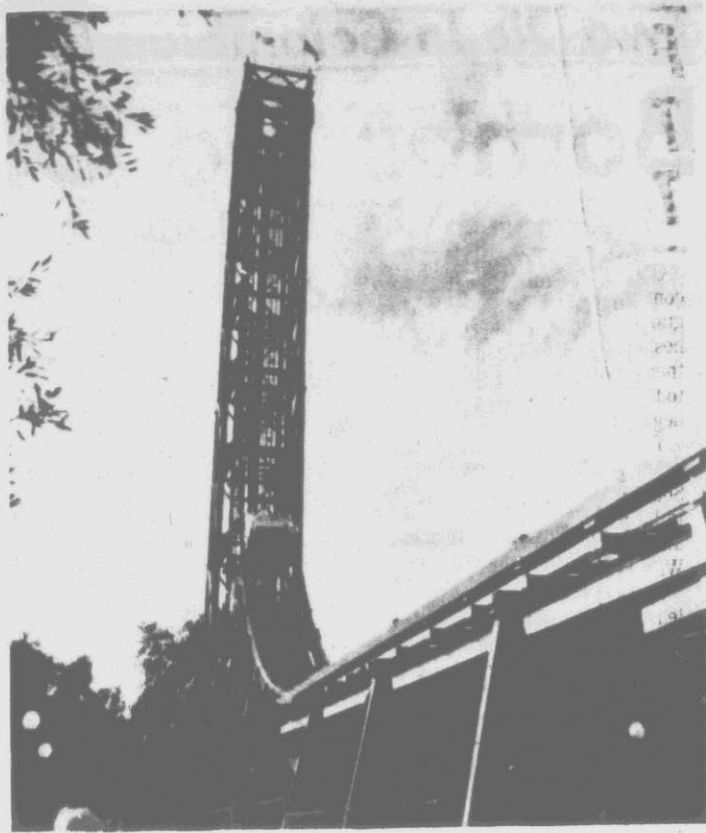
At least 20 ships have been damaged by attacks in the gulf since January, including five oil tankers from Kuwait and Saudi Arabia hit during the past month. Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and the United States blame Iran for the attacks, although the Persian state has denied responsibility.

In Saudi Arabia, Fahd received U.S. envoy Richard Murphy on Tuesday, and there were reports Washington was offering protection for shipping threatened by Iranian and Iraqi air raids.

The official Saudi press agency reported that the king met with Murphy, but did not elaborate.

Murphy, assistant secretary of state for Middle East affairs, reportedly brought a letter to the Saudi leadership offering help if the Iran-Iraq war threatened to close the gulf to shipping.

Officials in Washington said the offer was made conditional on the gulf countries opening their airfields to American aircraft.

Prisoner Frees Two Hostages, Then Surrenders

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A convicted murderer who used a fake gun to disarm prison guards at a hospital clinic and then took two of them hostage gave up peacefully today after more than 12 hours of negotiations.

The standoff with Paul Brumfield, a 37-year-old inmate from the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility in Lucasville, ended shortly before 3 a.m., said police spokesman Ralph W. Webb.

As he surrendered, Brumfield released his only remaining hostage, guard Rick Hayes, unharmed from the basement clinic at Riverside Methodist Hospital, Webb said. He had freed guard William Brewer, 41, of Portsmouth, Tuesday evening.

"At 2:55 he slid one gun out and then slid the other gun out and at 2:58 he released corrections officer Hayes," Webb said.

Although Brumfield complained of feeling ill, "I think fatigue had the biggest effect on him," Webb said. Brumfield had been serving a sentence at the Lucasville prison for aggravated murder, rape and robbery. He was in the Columbus hospital for treatment of a lung ailment when he took the hostages.

The inmate began negotiating through a closed door with Detective Julie Joseph in the basement clinic shortly after 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, said police Lt. Charles P. Foley Jr.

"I can't remember what we talked about. I'm too tired," the detective said, who added she had been previously acquainted with Brumfield through narcotics work.

She said Brumfield's primary concern was a transfer from Lucasville where guards said he was being held in a disciplinary cell block.

Brumfield demanded cigarettes and drugs, including the narcotic depressant Dilaudid, but police gave him only cigarettes, Foley said.

Brumfield was to be kept at the Columbus Correctional Facility

overnight, but could be taken back to Lucasville, Webb said.

Foley said Brumfield had been brought to the hospital in leg shackles and with his hands cuffed in front of him for treatment of a chronic lung condition. Other guards said it was common for prisoners to be handcuffed in front to prevent injury in case they fell.

Department of Corrections officials would not say how Brumfield had obtained the fake gun or what it was made of, but suggested it could have been made in a prison shop.

"It's homemade. You'd swear it was real," Foley said.

The police spokesman said 11 people originally were in the "8-by-10 room with a table and a sink" at the end of a hall, but two

nurses, a resident doctor, three other inmates and two other guards quickly escaped unharmed.

"He had too many people to keep his eyes on. They just slid away," Foley said.

When Brewer was released, he brought with him the fake gun and an unloaded pistol, both of which he obtained by tricking the inmate, Foley said.

"When Brewer came out, it was

under the pretext to call the director of corrections to arrange for Brumfield to be moved from Lucasville, Webb said.

He said that when the hostage drama was over, police found many rounds of ammunition on the floor of the room.

Tapeworms Kill Aliens

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A brain-crushing tapeworm infection has killed dozens of immigrants to the United States, sometimes because doctors misdiagnosed the problem as a severe headache and treated it only with aspirin, experts say.

The disease poses a threat mainly to immigrants and citizens who travel abroad. It has killed five Los Angeles County residents since 1980 and "is something we're extremely concerned about," Frank Sorvillo, a county Department of Health Services epidemiologist, said Tuesday.

The disease was blamed for 45 deaths nationwide between 1962 and 1979, the latest year for which national statistics are available, said Dr. Frank Richards, an epidemic intelligence officer at the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Most of the deaths — as well as infections among hundreds of other people who either had no symptoms or recovered — occurred among Mexican and Central American immigrants in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, Richards said.

The infection can be cured with praziquantel, the generic name for a drug effective against a broad variety of parasitic worms.

Seven deaths from the infection — called cysticercosis — are documented in the May issue of The Western Journal of Medicine by Dr. James R. Keane, a neurologist at Los Angeles County-University of Southern California Medical Center.

White House Hails Report

The White House says a 0.5 percent rise in consumer prices shows "inflation under control," but some economists saw signs that demand is starting to push prices higher.
The April consumer price increase compared with a modest 0.2 percent rise in March and a 0.4 percent increase in February.
In a separate report Tuesday, the

government said new orders for "big ticket" durable goods fell 6.4 percent in April, the biggest decline in four years.
On Wall Street, the stock market sank Tuesday for the fourth consecutive session. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had been down 15 points at midsession, finished with a 8.69-point drop at 1,116.62 — its lowest close since it reached 1,113.49 on April 6, 1983.

On a brighter note, a survey by Dun & Bradstreet of 5,000 firms showed companies with 100 to 999 employees plan to spend 20.4 percent more in 1984 over last year on capital improvements.
In its consumer price report, the Labor Department said food prices held steady during April but that housing costs rose 0.6 percent, largely because of higher prices for residential telephone and electrical

service and for heating.
With the April increase, prices for the year have risen 5.1 percent, calculated on an annual basis. This is right in line with Reagan administration predictions and the forecasts of most private economists.
Presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said the report showed that inflation was under control. "Growth with low inflation is the surest formula for long-term prosperity," he said.
Economist Donald Ratajczak of Georgia State University said, however, that the April report gave the first indications that prices have begun to rise because of demand pressure — too many dollars chasing too few goods.
He said this was particularly evident in increases for used cars and household furnishings.

Report Says Casey Got Carter Papers

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators have concluded that CIA Director William Casey re-

ceived some of the Carter administration documents that reached President Reagan's campaign in 1980, according to sources familiar with the House probe.

These sources said that besides naming Casey, a 2,400-page report scheduled to be released today states that the House investigation was unable to identify who in the Carter camp supplied the documents.

The report further says that the year-old probe by the Post Office and Civil Service human resources subcommittee found credible evidence that a crime had been committed in the transfer of the Carter papers, sources said.

Last year, White House Chief of Staff James A. Baker III told House investigators that Casey gave him Carter documents, including a briefing book used to prepare Jimmy Carter for a pivotal presidential campaign debate against Reagan.

Sources said the subcommittee's report cites independent testimony supporting Baker's statement. However, Casey, who managed Reagan's presidential campaign four years ago, repeatedly has said he cannot recall seeing any Carter papers during the campaign.

"Mr. Casey will have no comment until he has read the report," Dale Peterson, a spokesman for the CIA chief, said Tuesday night.

On Tuesday, subcommittee chairman Donald J. Albosta, D-Mich., released a letter from the panel to Attorney General William French Smith urging him to immediately appoint a special prosecutor to investigate the case.

Winner Gives It All Away

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Harold Collins is quite happy on the money he earns from his factory job. So, he said, he is giving away the \$2.3 million he won in the Illinois Lottery, making good twice over on a 16-year-old promise to a friend.

"Most anybody would think it's weird what I did. I think it's all right," Collins, a 57-year-old engine repairman at Caterpillar Tractor Co. in nearby Pekin, said Tuesday.

"I clear \$350 to \$360 a week," he said. "I don't need any more. I don't do any running around any more, so I got no use for the lottery money."

After hitting the jackpot last August in the Lotto Game, he said, he gave the first of 20 annual installments of \$115,276 to a woman he regards "sort of as my adopted daughter."

He said he intends to give the remaining installments to the woman, now 33 and living near Fort Lauderdale, Fla., with a husband and three children. He asked that she be identified only as Kathy.

"I like to work. I like the way I live. I like to watch sports on TV," he said in a telephone interview. "My God, what could I have possibly done with almost \$2½ million? I don't need it."

"Kathy can do whatever she wants with the money, invest it for her children or whatever," he said. She used part of the winnings to buy him a new car, "which I didn't really want or need."

A spokesman for the Illinois State Lottery, Dale Arvidson, said he had not previously heard of Collins' plan for his winnings but said it was "strictly Collins' business."

"I'm amazed at it," Arvidson said, calling Collins' plan unprecedented among the 99 people who have won \$1 million or more since the Lotto Game began 15 months ago.

Hart Gets Nod In Idaho, Mondale Eyes California

Walter F. Mondale, increasingly optimistic down the home stretch of his race for the Democratic presidential nomination, is relentlessly attacking chief rival Gary Hart, while the Rev. Jesse Jackson talks about challenging party rules at the San Francisco convention.

Hart scored a psychological gain Tuesday by easily winning over Mondale in Idaho's presidential preference primary, a beauty-contest with no delegates at stake.

"It does indicate that a tide is turning in our direction," Hart said while campaigning in New Mexico.

But Mondale predicted flatly that he would have enough delegates to secure the Democratic nomination by noon on June 6, the day after the climactic round of primaries in California, New Jersey and three other states.

"About noon, 12 o'clock, June 6, 11:59," Mondale said while in West Virginia. "That's firm."

Mondale, who once was a picture of caution before each primary, has been growing more optimistic as the final round of primaries grows closer. He predicted victory in

California, New Jersey and West Virginia.

"The more I campaign around the country, the more I'm convinced that's the case," he said.

There are 486 delegates at stake on the final primary day in California, New Jersey, West Virginia, New Mexico and South Dakota. Mondale needs about 300 more delegates to have the 1,967 needed to claim nomination.

Mondale was in Illinois today after a tour of West Virginia where he hammered at Hart's record on environmental cleanup and troubled industrial plants and renewed a call for a debate in New Jersey.

"When you needed public leadership to save this company ... I was there and he was on the other side," Mondale said after touring a Wheeling-Pittsburgh Steel plant in Beech Bottom, W.Va. The company was rescued through the help of a federal loan in 1979, and Hart voted against the assistance in the Senate.

He again accused Hart of playing "hooky" when Congress passed the original bill to clean up toxic waste dumps and called on him to repudiate support for the "build-down" proposal on nuclear arms,

which Mondale says isn't compatible with the nuclear freeze he backs.

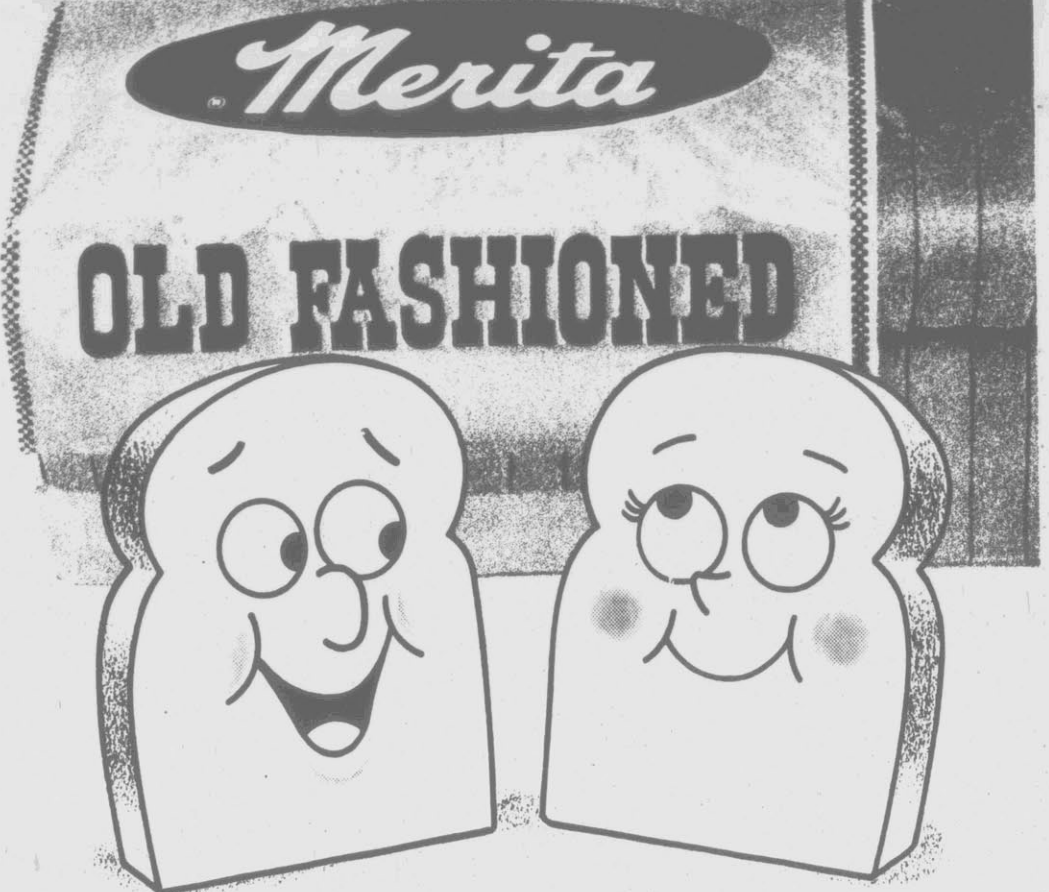
But while Mondale kept up the attack, Hart mentioned the former vice president not once during a long campaign swing through Colorado and New Mexico.

Instead, Hart planned to lay out much of the legislative program he would propose as president as a counter to Mondale.

Hart began the effort Tuesday in a speech in Grand Junction, Colo., in which he called for broad reforms of the nation's voting system to sharply increase the number of Americans who go to the polls. Aides said he planned more speeches on the economy, military reform and the environment.

Hart called for easier voter registration, holding elections on Sundays or perhaps 24-hour voting, and public financing of congressional candidates through voluntary taxpayer checkoffs such as the one now used for presidential campaigns.

The Hart camp's hope is that the result will be a sharp contrast in style with Mondale. "All we know is what he (Mondale) wouldn't do; all we know about what he would do are some vague generalities," said Hart press secretary Kathy Bushkin.

Bad Investments Hurt City

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — Risky investments by three financial officers "shooting dice with public money" have cost the city of San Jose \$60 million, and officials say roads, parks and some other major projects will have to be postponed.

Officials said Tuesday the problem began with city money being tied up in long-term bonds that fell in value, and worsened as the officers tried even riskier investments to recover the losses.

The officers have been put on leave while an audit team, hastily assembled last week, reconstructs financial records "down to the gnat's eyelash," City Manager Jerry Newfarmer said.

Newfarmer said there were currently no suspicions of "personal involvement or taking from the till" on the part of Finance Director Kent South, Treasurer Dick McCoy and

investment officer Arthur Mathiesen.

Roads, parks and other major capital projects will be delayed at least a year because of the loss, Mayor Tom McEnery said at a press conference, announcing the steps the city had taken to get rid of the investments.

"This is a very, very serious

problem for the city of San Jose," McEnery said.

House OK's Funds For Nuclear Warheads

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has waded into the first of 13 money bills for fiscal 1985 and approved legislation to spend \$7.4 billion on nuclear warheads next year, double the amount the United States spent four years ago.

The House approved the spending Tuesday as part of a \$15.5 billion appropriations bill for the Energy Department and the government's water development agencies. The bill, which was passed 349-46, now goes to the Senate.

The Energy Department by law has custody over the nation's nuclear weapons program, and defense activities now account for about 68 percent of the department's total budget.

The weapons spending has been rising at a steady pace since President Reagan took office, both in terms of dollars and as a percentage of the department's budget. In fiscal year 1981, for example, \$3.67 billion

was spent on warheads, 49 percent of the department's budget.

The 1985 appropriation is about \$844 million above the amount allocated for the current fiscal year. But it is \$401 million below the president's budget request for the weapons program.

The weapons money in the bill went virtually unmentioned in debate Tuesday as congressmen instead congratulated the House Appropriations Committee for avoiding controversy in the second section of the bill, which provided money for water development projects.

The bill traditionally has been among the most controversial of the annual appropriations measures

because of the hundreds of local construction projects it funds, most of them involving several million dollars, some of them costing billions — and many of them attacked as needless, "pork barrel" spending.

The battles have been fought over such issues as the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway in Alabama and Mississippi and the Clinch River breeder reactor project in Tennessee, both criticized as worthless boondoggles.

That criticism was absent Tuesday. The Tenn-Tom has been completed; Clinch River was killed by Congress last year. No money was provided in the bill for new con-

struction starts, avoiding another source of contention.

Overall, the bill provides \$2.8 billion for the Army Corps of Engineers and \$1 billion for the Interior Department's Bureau of Reclamation, the government agencies responsible for water development projects such as flood control, navigation improvements, water supplies and irrigation projects.

The corps budget includes \$933 million for continuing construction on more than 150 water projects now being built by the agency. The bureau receives \$708 million for water projects it has under construction in the 17 western states.

Buyers Seeking Larger Homes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The president of the National Association of Home Builders says his organization may need to educate young homebuyers to the current facts of housing life: less square footage and houses closer together.

Trade association president Pete Herder said Tuesday a nationwide survey, conducted at nine universities, shows college students want, and expect to be able to afford, single-family suburban homes larger than their parents' home.

"They have to downscale their plans," he said.

The survey found 82 percent thought it would be "somewhat to very difficult" to buy a home. But two out of three surveyed thought they would eventually be able to buy a home equal to or exceeding the value of the home where they grew up.

The students told interviewers that home prices and high mortgage rates would be the major obstacle to realizing their dream, but that raising the cash for a down payment would be less of a hurdle.

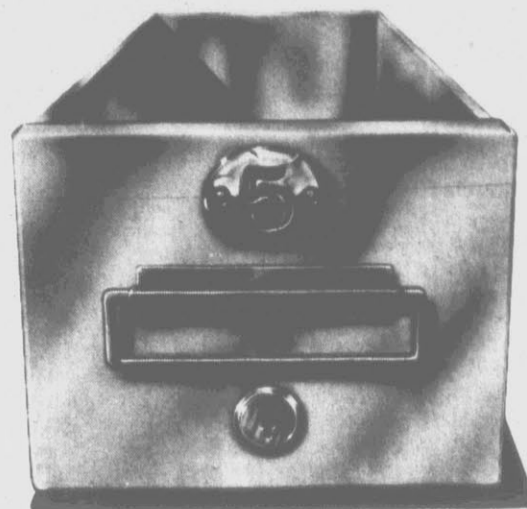
When it came to a question about monthly payments on their dream home, 55 percent of the 1,324 surveyed said they would be willing to commit between \$300 and \$500 of their paycheck.

The realities of today's money markets, with 13 percent interest rates, mean the prospective homebuyer would pay \$500 a month for principal and interest on a loan of \$45,000. Figuring a standard 20 percent down payment, the most expensive house affordable in that monthly payment bracket would be one costing \$56,500.

The National Association of Realtors reports that half of all resale homes sold in the first three months of this year cost more than \$71,800.

Overall, Herder said the survey shows him that today's college students "want to fit more into the system."

Toastmasters Marking 10th Anniversary This Week

If a person had to pay every time he said "ah" or "um" while speaking he'd probably break the habit. And that's what the Greenville Toastmasters club does — helps its members end bad speaking habits, while learning to present effective speeches.

The club, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary this week, is a non-profit organization in which members are taught to communicate effectively, read and listen analytically, think on their feet and break bad speaking habits, especially when they have to pay 5 cents for each "ah" or "um."

"People join for different reasons — to overcome shyness, to overcome speaking disabilities or to learn to conduct meetings. Most people join for job-related reasons," Carol Lunney, president of the club, said.

While the Greenville club began 10 years ago, the first club ever was formed in 1924 by Ralph C. Smedley in the basement of the YMCA in Santa Ana, Calif. Gradually, clubs sprang up over the nation, but it was

not until 1973 that membership became open to women.

"The Greenville club was a diverse group with people from a number of different fields. Today there are 16 charter members in the club," charter member Joe Sherwood recalled.

The club, which meets at Archie's every second and fourth Wednesday of the month, helps people learn communication skills by a trial-and-error method. Each member presents a speech at every meeting, while the other members evaluate him.

"There's no such thing as a bad speech. Speakers are not judged on how bad they are, but on how good they are. Criticism is given in a positive way, so it's a real upbeat group," Mrs. Lunney said.

Sherwood said that evaluations are given on the person's emotions, eye contact, use of time and how well he accomplishes the speech's objective. Each person must devise a speech around a given objective, such as selling an idea or concept or using certain words.

Mrs. Lunney said the group is introduced to two new words at each

meeting, which speakers try to incorporate into their speeches. In addition, members must give impromptu speeches during the portion of the meeting designated as "table topics."

"Table topics is designed to perfect impromptu speaking abilities. A different person is assigned to be table topics master at each meeting. He asks people questions about current events, politics, economics, what's going on in town, exciting things that happened during the day or humorous questions (such as telling a person to describe an elephant to a blind person). The person asked has a set amount of time to discuss the question," Mrs. Lunney explained.

The groups also designate a toastmaster of the evening, a timer and a grammarian at each meeting.

"One intention of the group is for every member to participate. Everyone has some function at each meeting. Nobody comes to a meeting and just sits there and goes home," Sherwood said.

There are three levels of toastmasters according to skill and

accomplishments: competent toastmaster, able toastmaster and distinguished toastmaster. The Greenville group, which currently has 16-18 members, has three distinguished toastmasters.

The club also sponsors a humorous and a serious speech contest each year, as well as Speechcraft courses and a youth leadership program.

"The club is a selfish club. The people who join are looking for something. The result a person gets from being a member is related to his own participation. If a person belongs and doesn't participate, he's cheating himself," Sherwood added.

The group will have a banquet tonight beginning at 6 p.m. at the Holiday Inn in honor of its anniversary. Mayor Janice Buck is the guest speaker.

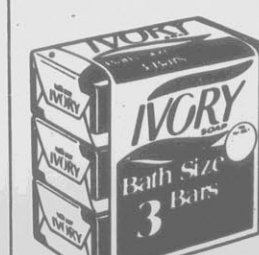

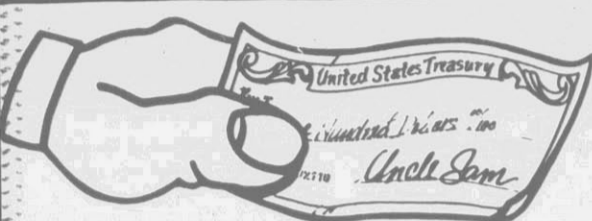

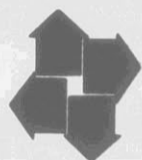

Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices headed lower today, continuing the decline that has carried the market to its lowest levels in more than a year.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, off 36.54 points in the last four sessions, slipped another 1.04 to 1,115.58 in the first half hour today.

Losers took a 4-3 lead over gainers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Analysts said rising interest rates continued as the market's major problem. With high returns available in interest-bearing investments like Treasury bills, they noted, investors generally are apathetic about stocks.

Trading has been generally sluggish in the stock market lately as prices have fallen.

"While some will claim that the light volume indicates little selling pressure, it also means a lack of buying interest," observed Newton Zinder at E.F. Hutton & Co.

"In the absence of buyers, stocks continue to fall of their own weight and you can go broke while the market declines without much pressure."

Esmark led the active list, up 1/2% at 56 1/2. Beatrice Foods said it began its previously announced \$56-a-share offer for the company's stock.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average fell 8.69 to 1,116.62, its lowest close since it stood at 1,113.49 on April 6, 1983.

Declines led advances by about 3 to 1 on the NYSE.

Big Board volume increased to 88.03 million shares from 73.38 million in the previous session.

The NYSE composite index fell 55 to 88.43. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index lost 1.74 to 202.68.

don't want American manpower there."

Asked if he could be unequivocal, Reagan said, "You're asking me a hypothetical question, and one in which I think that I would be very foolish to try and answer."

At another point, the president was asked why so many people believe the world is moving closer to war rather than peace. "I would say that is because that's all that most of the people have been hearing in political dialogue ... that I somehow have an itchy finger and am going to blow up the world."

But he said he didn't know of anyone more committed to peace than he.

Reagan began the news conference with a statement urging Congress to approve his request for \$62 million in emergency aid to El Salvador, now awaiting action in the House. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., has predicted Reagan will win handsily.

"If Congress offers too little support, it will be worse than doing nothing at all," the president said.

Asked to confirm reports that the United States had offered to provide air cover to vessels in the Persian Gulf, Reagan replied: "We haven't specified what we would do but we have told them ... that neither we nor the Western world as such would stand by and see the straits of Hormuz or the Persian Gulf closed to international traffic."

The president added, "We have not volunteered to enter, nor have we been asked to intervene ... It seems as if the gulf states want to take care of this themselves. They're concerned, as I think we all

should be, about not enlarging the war." Iran and Iraq have been at war since 1980.

Asked if there were any circumstances in which the United States would take unilateral action in the gulf, he responded: "I can't foresee that ... We are in consultation also with our allies — with those nations that would be affected — because we're not contemplating anything unilaterally here. This problem is one that affects all of us."

He said the United States receives only 3 percent of its oil from the region, and acknowledged there were contingency plans in the event the gulf nations seek U.S. help, but he would not be specific.

On the domestic side, Reagan was asked about rising interest rates in the face of his recent prediction that they would decline during the warm weather season. "We may have to have a warm September," he said, "but summer isn't over until then."

Schnellenberger Quitting Miami

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Howard Schnellenberger, who took over a struggling football program at Miami in 1979 and guided it to the national championship five years later, will leave the university even if a lucrative offer from the United States Football League's Washington Federals falls through, according to a report published today.

The Miami Herald reported that the 50-year-old coach will likely sign a reported five-year, \$3 million contract with the Feds if owner Sherwood Weiser moves to the team to Miami, as expected.

But in any event, Herald Sports Editor Edwin Pope wrote, Schnellenberger will not coach the Hurricanes beyond the 1984 season because of budgetary restrictions.

During an interview with The Associated Press on Tuesday, Schnellenberger said he hoped to

make a decision on the Feds proposal this weekend, but emphasized he would not sign with the USFL club if Weiser doesn't move it to Miami.

Schnellenberger told the Herald that new budgetary guidelines were established after Edward Foote replaced Dr. Henry King Stanford as Miami president and pointed out that the Feds offer is "maybe the best financial opportunity any coach ever had."

"I hold the president and other UM officials in the highest regard," Schnellenberger told the Herald. "I simply do not think the overall priorities for college athletics here are high enough for me to work successfully within them."

Meanwhile, the Orlando Sentinel reported that Schnellenberger has agreed on Orlando as an alternate home for the Feds should the USFL's reception become "hostile or apathetic."

Any optional site north of Orlando, however, would give Schnellenberger the option of leaving the Feds and still collecting his hefty salary.

Sentinel Sports Editor Larry Guest said.

Schnellenberger said when he came to UM in 1979, he reported only to Dr. John Green, executive vice president for administration and the man who hired him.

"I reported to him only," the coach told the Herald. "Dr. Green told me to do anything I had to do moneywise and within the rules to win."

"Now, I report to Sam Jankovich (athletic director) and we are terribly under-funded by comparison with the schools we play."

Schnellenberger, whose 11-1 Hurricanes won the national crown with an Orange Bowl triumph over favored and previously top-ranked Nebraska, brushed aside the suggestion that some might perceive him as another money-hungry sports figure should he decide to sign with the Feds.

"There's a lot more to it than money as it relates to the excitement of being with a new team, (having) part ownership of the club and being president and general operational

officer," Schnellenberger said. "And with all these things happening in the city of Miami, it makes it even more attractive."

Lucrative offers to leave the school he rescued from a decade of mediocrity aren't new to Schnellenberger, but the Feds' proposal is the first that conceivably would allow the coach to remain in the town he said he loves.

His contract with the university, paying him about \$250,000 a year plus outside revenue from radio and television, runs through the 1986 season. Schools officials have said they won't stand in his way nor will they renegotiate the pact in an effort to keep him.

Schnellenberger indicated that he doesn't expect Weiser to encounter problems moving the Feds to Miami where the USFL club would play in the aging Orange Bowl stadium.

"Of course he (Weiser) could still change his mind, but I think he's pretty well said his preference is to move the team to Miami," the coach said, adding that Tampa Bay Ban-

dit's owner John Bassett has helped agreeing to sell Weiser the USFL territorial rights to South Florida.

Davis Is Conspicuously Absent From NFL Party

WASHINGTON (AP) — The absence of Los Angeles Raiders' owner Al Davis was offset by a human dressed as a duck, the banjo sounds of a Mummer's band and a bevy of cheerleaders as the National Football League's spring meeting opened a three-day run in the nation's capital.

Davis, whose running feud with NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle over the transfer of his franchise from Oakland to Los Angeles has resulted in a myriad of lawsuits, was conspicuous by his absence at a reception Tuesday night hosted by Rozelle and Washington Redskins' owner Jack Kent Cooke.

Davis, who will attend the league meetings, used the occasion to unveil the Super Bowl Champion Raiders' highlight film at his own Capitol Hill party.

At the NFL party, the rest of the league's owners were greeted by the first of what promises to be an interesting spectacle of demonstrations promoting various cities bidding to host a Super Bowl.

Minneapolis, which is hoping league officials will disregard the January snow and cold that traditionally buffet Minnesota, was the first to get its message across with a person dressed as a duck at the entrance of the hotel bearing a sign that said "Minneapolis Loves Winter."

Inside the Philadelphia delegation, led by Mayor Wilson Goode and Philadelphia Eagles' owner Leonard Tose standing between a Mummer's band and a line of 6-foot-long Hoagies, spurred the efforts of the City of Brotherly Love to land the Super Bowl.

"What makes anybody think this is a game that must be played in the sand," said Tose, putting down the efforts of warm-weather sites for the game. "We play regular season games in December in Philadelphia, why can't we play a game there two or three weeks later?"

Rozelle, who watched the Eagles beat Dallas in sub-freezing temperatures in a January 1981 playoff game in Philadelphia, did not seem anxious to see another.

"I sat through a game in Philadelphia in January. I don't know if I'd like to do it again," he said.

While Philadelphia is seeking to be the first northeast city to host the Super Bowl outdoors, Detroit is hoping to return to game to the Silverdome, its site in 1982.

Next year's game already is set for Stanford Stadium in Palo Alto, Calif., while New Orleans will host the 1986 game. Representatives from both cities are among 14 cities hoping to win the rights to the two to four Super Bowls that will be awarded this week.

Other cities hoping to land a Super Bowl are: Tampa, site of this year's game; Los Angeles; Anaheim, Calif.; San Diego; Seattle; Miami; Houston; Jacksonville, Fla.; and Phoenix, Ariz.

The cities will have 12 minutes to make their presentations on Thursday with league officials announcing

a decision later in the day.

Today's session, to begin in late afternoon, will include the pro forma approval of the sale of the Denver Broncos to Canadian oilman Patrick Bowlen and Denver businessmen John Adams and Tim Borden for a reported \$70 million.

Also up for consideration this week is a rule change regarding kickoffs that go out of bounds. Under the current rules, the kicking team is penalized five yards and forced to kick again if a kick rolls out of bounds. The new rule, if approved, would allow the receiving team the option of another kick or taking possession at the point where the kick went out of bounds.

Reds, Parker In Celebration

Dave Parker's homecoming was a fun affair — for Parker and his new team, the Cincinnati Reds. It wasn't

so pleasant for his former club, the Pittsburgh Pirates, or the fans in the crowd of 7,959 who came to heckle Parker.
The Reds beat the Pirates 5-3

Tuesday night and Parker helped the cause with a run-scoring double in the first inning. It was the right fielder's first appearance in Three Rivers Stadium since leaving Pittsburgh as a free agent to sign with the Reds last winter.

"I feel like I'm reborn in Cincinnati and there's a monkey off my back," said Parker, who is hitting .320. "I feel like I have four to five more good years of baseball. I think I've learned that you concentrate on baseball 11 months out of the year instead of six."

Parker was not the brightest star in Cincinnati's triumph. Mario Soto, baseball's hottest pitcher, threw a four-hitter for his sixth consecutive victory. Though he allowed homers to Lee Lacy and Tony Pena, Soto boosted his May record to 5-0 with his fourth complete game in his last five starts. Soto has a 10-3 career record against Pittsburgh, 7-0 in Three Rivers. He struck out four and walked two and added a run-scoring double and a single.

But Parker was the center of attraction — and abuse — for the fans.

"The verbal abuse tonight was worse than I got (here) before but I

didn't have anything thrown at me," Parker said. "If they like me or not, they have to respect the way I play the game."

"One guy called me fat. I turned around and he was six feet wide and six feet tall. He couldn't get in a building without taking the hinges off."

"I kind of resented the fact they talked about my wife and my mom. That has nothing to do with baseball. There was a sign with a battery on it, a car battery, and underneath it said, 'Heads up.'"

Twice as a Pirate, Parker had batteries thrown at him from the stands.

He blew a kiss at end of game to fans in those stands.

"That's I love you," he explained. "You abused me the whole game. I was telling them come back tomorrow and help the Pirates. We won. I'll be back tomorrow."

Phillies 3, Dodgers 1
Philadelphia had only three hits but made them count against visiting Los Angeles to extend the longest winning streak in the majors this season.

Ozzie Virgil collected two of the hits, scored a run and batted in one. "We just overpowered them tonight," said a smiling Phillies' Manager Paul Owens. "When you're going good, you win these kind of games. Once you get it rolling, the players don't think they can get beat."

Jerry Kosman, 45, went seven

innings, then Al Holland earned his 10th save of the season to tie for the National League high. He has pitched 14 2-3 innings without giving up an earned run.

Rookie Juan Samuel, the Phillies second baseman, saw his 15-game hitting streak end when he went 0-for-4.

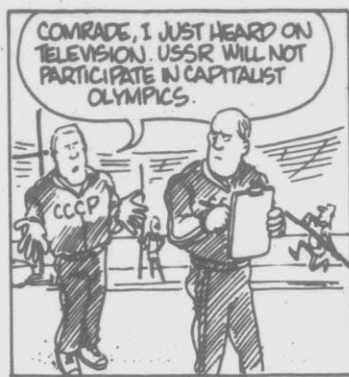

As Many As 50 Could Boycott

Col. F. Don Miller, executive director of the U.S. Olympic Committee, says the number of nations boycotting the Los Angeles Games could range from 20 to as many as 50 if African nations stay away for other political reasons.

Miller, speaking Tuesday at a New York luncheon after a symposium on the preparedness of U.S. athletes,

said he concluded that the number of boycotting nations would increase after last Friday's emergency meeting of the International Olympic Committee at Lausanne, Switzerland.

"We returned from there with mixed emotions," he said. "The Soviet Union and the satellite countries who have indicated they will not participate are not going to participate."

Cuba was expected to announce today whether it would send a team to the Summer Games.

Miller said the absent nations could increase to 50 "depending what the African nations do." He said possible friction could result if Britain adds South African-born runner Zola Budd to its track and field team or if Britain competes, as scheduled, against South Africa in a rugby match.

About 25 nations boycotted the 1976 Montreal Olympics after a rugby team from New Zealand played against a South African team. However, African Olympic officials have said no countries from that continent plan to skip the Games.

To date, the Soviets have been joined by East Germany, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, Laos, Vietnam, Mongolia and Afghanistan.

Meanwhile, Romania, the only Warsaw Pact nation not yet committed to a boycott, delayed its decision on whether to attend.

Romanian sports officials had planned to meet by Tuesday, but did not and had not set a date for a meeting.

Miller noted that politics has intruded on the Olympics for more than 50 years, but that intrusion has grown in intensity.

"Now, in my judgment, the total Olympic movement has been eroded," he said. "The athletes of the world are being used as sacrificial pawns. We are not blameless. We participated (in a boycott) in 1980."

But Miller said there is a difference between the two boycotts. "In 1980, there was a specific cause ... the brutal invasion of

Afghanistan," Miller said.

This year, Miller added, the Soviet-led boycott has "political overtones of self-serving nonsense."

Miller said that there would be representatives from the Soviet Union and its allies at the Games, just as there were U.S. officials in Moscow four years ago.

He said credentials would be issued to representatives scheduled to attend meetings of international sports bodies traditionally held during the Olympics, and to some members of the media.

He predicted the Soviet media would keep a close watch on the number of gold medals won by the United States to see if Americans can match the Soviet total of 80 in Moscow in 1980.

Miller also said that he had been told by Marat Gramov, president of the Soviet Union Olympic Committee, that the Soviets "would not conduct mini-Olympics per se," during the Games.

"It would be a blatant violation of the Olympic Charter," he said. "But they may, as we did in 1980, hold competitions in selected sports."

Soviet Olympics reportedly have planned track and field events in Prague Aug. 15-28, track meets in East Berlin and Potsdam in July, possible swimming competition in the Soviet Union, and fencing, modern pentathlon and boxing in Poland.

While Miller said he is convinced the boycotting nations would not change their minds, Juan Antonio Samaranch, president of the International Olympic Committee, is still trying to reverse that decision. He plans to meet with Soviet Bloc sports ministers in Prague Thursday.

Samaranch had asked for a meeting with Soviet President Konstantin

Chernenko after Moscow announced the boycott May 8, but Chernenko has yet to reply. Samaranch, however, was invited by Soviet Bloc officials to the Prague meeting, the IOC said.

In other Olympic development, ABC said insurance could allow the network to recoup up to \$75 million of its investment for the 1984 Olympic broadcasting rights if the boycott hurts its ratings.

Under a clause of ABC's policy with Firemen's Fund Insurance Co., payments could be made if the average daily rating during Olympics coverage drops below 21 for a variety of reasons, including a boycott by the Soviet Union or East Germany.

Under terms of the policy, however, ABC can collect only to cover losses. Thus, the network couldn't collect unless it lost all of its profits, projected at \$100 million by ABC at the time the policy was signed.

Suns Attempt To Stay Alive

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — With the odds stacked firmly against them, the Phoenix Suns will attempt to stay alive in the Western Conference finals against the Los Angeles Lakers tonight.

"It's not the best of situations," admitted Phoenix Coach John MacLeod, whose team trails the Lakers 3-1 in the best-of-seven National Basketball Association playoff series. "But we're not out of it yet. We still have a chance. All we can do is give it a good shot."

Tipoff time at the Forum is 8:30 p.m., PDT, and the game will be televised nationally, including in the Los Angeles area. If the Suns win and prolong the series, Game 6 would be at Phoenix Friday night.

A victory by Phoenix would be an upset, considering that the Lakers beat the Suns by 16 points in each of the two games of the series at the Forum, and that Los Angeles has a 7-0 record in playoff games at home this year and is 10-2 overall in the postseason.

"It's a unique team," MacLeod said of the Lakers. "They have great individual talent, and they play team basketball. They have all that talent harnessed together, and team basketball is the No. 1 thing."

"They adhere to that concept, and they always believe in it. They give the ball up, always thinking team first. That is impressive."

The Lakers, led by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Earvin "Magic" Johnson, are shooting for their third straight Western Conference championship and third NBA title in the last five years.

"It starts with Kareem and Magic," MacLeod said. "Magic sprays it around, keeping everybody involved. And Kareem was reared on team basketball."

"Kareem flourishes under that system. The ball goes in (to him) and comes out. They are more than willing to throw it in to him, and he knows what to do with it."

Abdul-Jabbar, 37, was at his best in the third and fourth games of the series at Phoenix, scoring 31 points in each. He made 24 of his 33 field goal attempts despite the fact that the Suns weren't giving him much.

"They've been packing it in the middle a lot," said rookie Los Angeles guard Byron Scott, who totaled 42 points in the two games at Phoenix. "They don't want Kareem to get it, which is smart strategy."

"That leaves it up to us to hit our shot. They've been making it very hard to drive, because they're so physical. But we've been drawing fouls and going to the line a lot on drives."

Scott is one of several key Lakers who aren't starters. Among the others are Bob McAdoo, James Worthy and Jamaal Wilkes.

McAdoo, Worthy and Scott combined to score 36 points last Sunday

as the Lakers won Game 4 126-115. Overall, the Los Angeles reserves have accounted for 211 points to 103 for the Suns.

"When they get all those points from three guys off the bench, it makes it tough," said Phoenix forward Maurice Lucas. "They have three guys who can play three different positions, they rotate them in and they all produce."

Lucas said the Suns plan on making it as difficult as possible for the Lakers.

"We've got a lot of pride on this team, and I don't think our pride will allow us to just give the game away," he said. "If LA wins, they're going to have to take the game. One thing we know, it won't be a cakewalk for them."

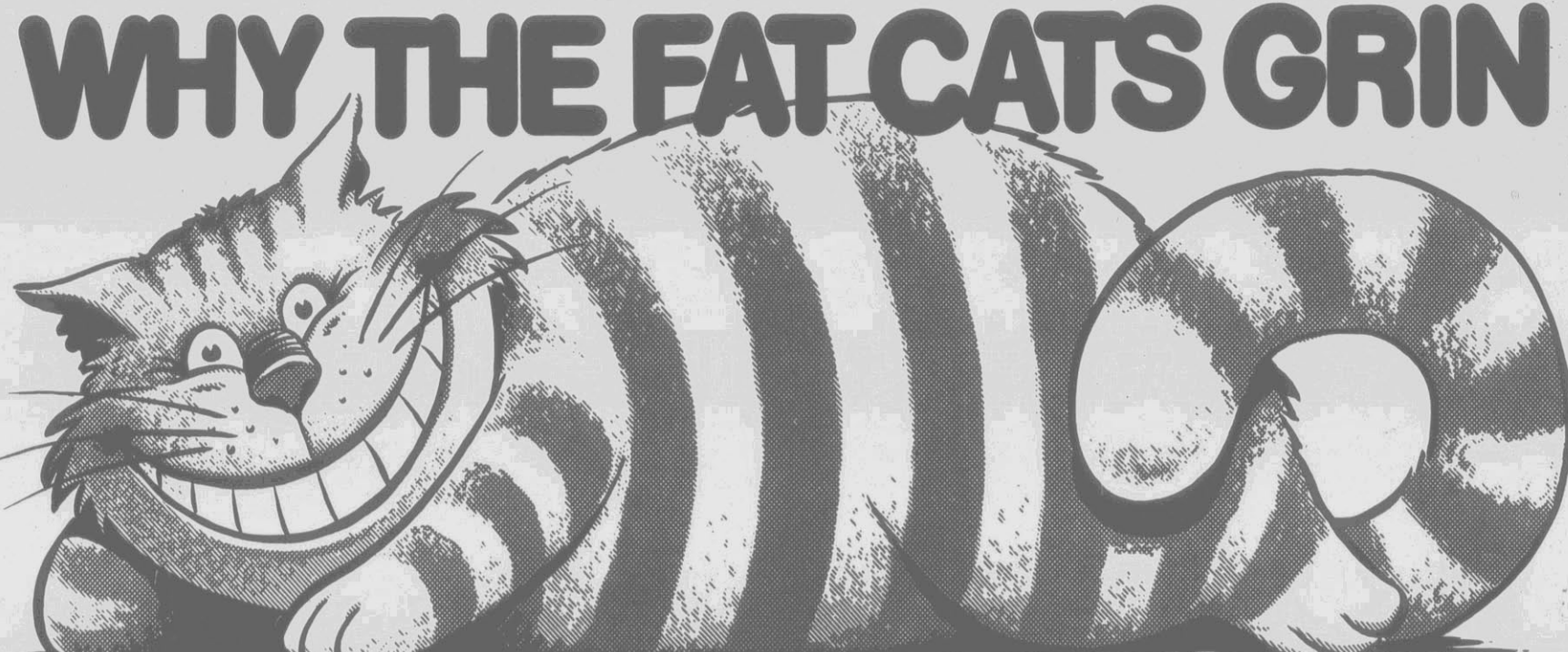

CBS Gets Top Spot In Ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS, after losing to ABC for four straight weeks, reclaimed the top spot in the Nielsen ratings as "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest" sprang their summer cliffhangers and captured the top two positions.

The narrow win for the week ended May 20 was the first weekly victory for CBS since it took the season ratings title in March.

CBS' "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," both of which left viewers in suspense until the fall, finished one-two for the week.

ABC was only a tenth of a ratings point behind in second place and NBC was third. The Top 10 was fairly evenly split among the networks. CBS took the first three places ("Miss USA Beauty Pageant" was third) and didn't win another spot in the Top 10. ABC had four shows at the top and NBC had three.

CBS won the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with a network average of 14.3. ABC was second with 14.2 and NBC was third with 12.7.

CBS kept its lead among the evening news shows. NBC was second and ABC was third. The ratings: CBS 10.7, NBC 9.0, ABC 8.9.

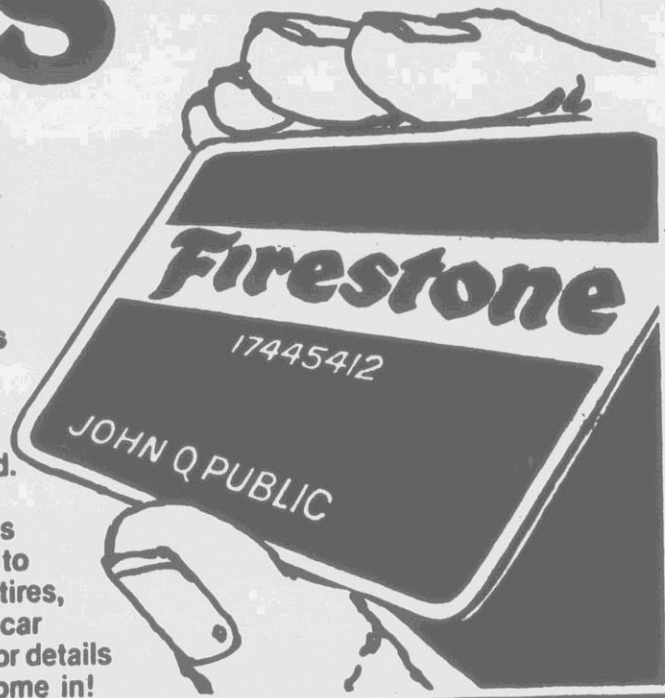

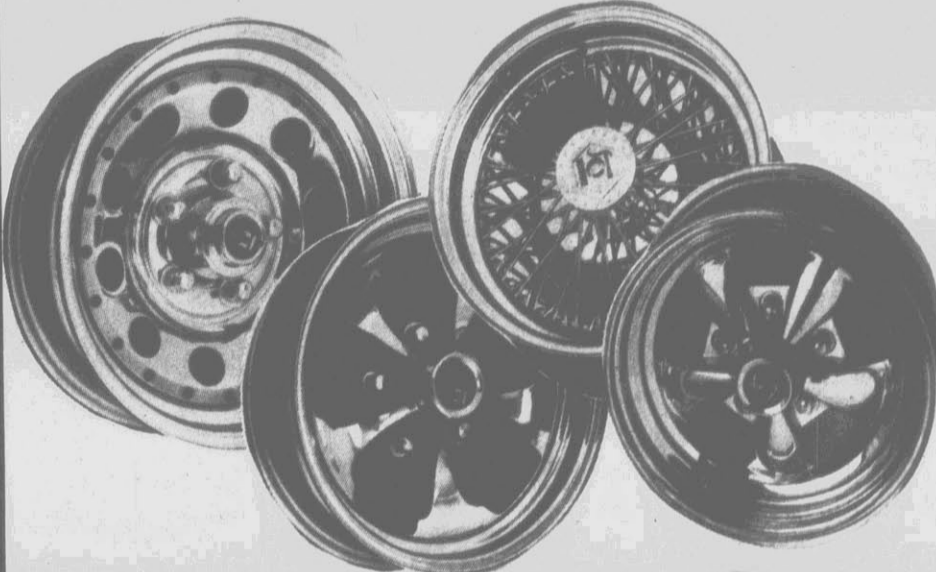

'College Bowl' Returns to TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Here's a 30-point bonus: Take the age of the United States on July 4 ... add a perfect bowling score ... and subtract President Reagan's age. Your numerical answer is the membership of what federal body?

That's not the typical television game-show question, which is more partial to "What's your favorite cheese?" or "Who's your dream date?"

But the question does fit "College Bowl," the scholarly competition that was a TV series from 1959-70 and a radio program from 1979-82. It will return tonight as a live, one-hour special on NBC.

The show's competitive format has not changed. Two teams of collegiate scholars square off in a basketball-type game of intelligence and quick recall. There are toss-up questions that give the school answering correctly a shot at the bonus question. The show will include two semifinal matches and the final.

To further stimulate the prime-time audience, NBC is injecting hoopla and color: a 125-piece marching band, cheerleaders and spectators at a 10,000-seat arena at Ohio State University.

"Except for that, the network insisted that 'College Bowl' be exactly the same as it was," said executive producer Don Reid, who created the original program for radio 30 years ago. He even wrote the theme song, and the Ohio State band will give it a brassy rendition to open the show.

Pat Sajak, host of NBC's "Wheel of Fortune," will be the moderator. Robert Earle, the series' former host, is listed as color commentator. But he won't be another Don Meredith, chattering, yodeling and singing, "Turn out the lights, the party's over ..." when one school builds an insurmountable lead.

Asked why Earle wasn't going to serve as host, Reid said: "He's not as young as he used to be, but he's part of the program. He'll be handling the retrospective (a short look at past programs). If we ever go to series, we'll still find a place for him."

Some previous "College Bowl" competitors were Tom Huston (Indiana University), former counsel to President Richard Nixon; Jonathan Yardley (University of North Carolina), Pulitzer Prize-winning book critic for the Washington Post, and Ruth Duskin Feldman (Northwestern University), author of "Whatever Happened to the Quiz Kids?"

Steve Tesich (Indiana University), who wrote the screenplays for "Breaking Away" and "The World According to Garp," and NBC News correspondent Jim Polk (Indiana University) tried but failed to make their varsity teams, Reid said.

Lorimar, better known for slightly less intellectual programs such as "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," approached Reid about bringing the

show back. All three networks expressed interest, Reid said, and NBC agreed to do a prime-time special and consider the show for a series.

Interestingly, when the program first went to TV 25 years ago, the advertising executive who sold the project to CBS was Grant Tinker, now chairman of NBC.

The initial resistance then was that show would be too intellectual. "I never feared that, but the advertisers and the network did," Reid said. "They thought it would be too difficult for people to understand. But in the mid-'60s we reached a 42 share (percent of audience with sets on watching "College Bowl"), so there had to be some garage mechanics intrigued, too."

The questions come from a variety of sources.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Liberace, the flamboyant master of the keyboards, is keeping a promise he made more than 20 years ago and has set aside 200 seats at his opening performance for the nuns and staff of St. Francis General Hospital.

The king of classical glitter, who's appearing at Pittsburgh's Heinz Hall from Tuesday through Sunday, was

in Pittsburgh for a performance on Nov. 22, 1963, when he received news of President John F. Kennedy's assassination. The show was canceled, and a despondent Liberace remained in his dressing room overnight.

Unaware of Liberace's presence, workers fumigated the building and the performer became ill from the toxic fumes. He was taken to St. Francis, where he was hospitalized in critical condition for several weeks.

Liberace promised then to set aside seats for the hospital staff on the opening night of his performances in Pittsburgh.

How They Voted

WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes May 10-17.

HOUSE
RELIGIOUS - By a vote of 270 for and 151 against, the House failed to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to pass a bill (HR 5345) opening the way for voluntary student religious meetings in high schools.

The Equal Access Act, also known as "son of school prayer," proposed withholding federal education funds from any high school that denied student religious groups the same access that secular organizations have to its facilities. The groups were to have been able to pray or discuss religion without faculty interference.

Supporters viewed the bill best alternative to the school prayer constitutional amendment, defeated earlier this year by the Senate. A two-thirds majority was required for passage under the short-cut parliamentary procedure — limited debate, no amendments — by which sponsors chose to bring the bill to the floor.

Supporter Steve Bartlett, R-Texas, said the bill was constitutional because it protected students from being "discriminated against because of the religious content of their speeches."

Opponent Don Edwards, D-Calif., said the Constitution "requires government neutrality in religion."

Members voting yes wanted a federal law insuring that high school religious groups could meet voluntarily in school facilities.

North Carolina representatives voting yes were Walter Jones, D-1; Tim Valentine, D-2; Charles Whitley, D-3; Ike Andrews, D-4; Stephen Neal, D-5; Charles Britt, D-6; Charles Rose, D-7; W. G. Hefner, D-8; James Martin, R-9; James Broyhill, R-10; James Clarke, D-11; Voting no: None. Not voting: None.

MX - The House rejected, 212 for and 218 against, an amendment to halt the missile program by deleting all money for the weapon's continued production from the fiscal 1985 military authorization bill.

Although the House later approved a compromise plan for MX production (below), this vote was a clearer test of sentiment. Some members who voted to delete funding later supported continued production. This amendment sought to eliminate \$2.7 billion in MX money from the \$208 billion defense bill (HR 5167), which was headed for the final passage and the Senate.

At a projected cost of \$22 billion, the MX is to supplant the Minuteman as the most potent U.S. strategic missile. Carrying 10 to 12 nuclear warheads, it is designed to hit targets as distant as 6,000 miles. Present plans are to base it in hardened Minuteman silos in Wyoming.

Supporter Nicholas Mavroules, D-Mass., said that by killing the MX "no longer will Congress support billion dollar dinosaurs promoting deficits but not deterrence."

Opponent Hal Daub, R-Neb., said "our ability to deter Soviet forces is the most effective means of preserving freedom and independence in the Western world."

Members voting yes wanted to halt the MX missile program.

Voting yes were Walter Jones, Neal, Clarke. Voting no: Valentine, Whitley, Ike Andrews, Britt, Rose, Hefner, James Martin, Broyhill. Not voting: None.

COMPROMISE - By a vote of 229 for and 199 against, the House approved a compromise that President Reagan and his House allies accepted to save fiscal 1985 funding of the MX missile. Fifteen missiles would be funded, rather than the 40 advocated by the president and the 30 favored by the House Armed Services Committee.

The plan addresses Reagan's argument that the MX is a necessary bargaining chip to induce the Soviets to resume arms-control talks. The 1985 money would remain

unspent until at least next April, to see if the threat of MX deployment brings the Soviets back to the negotiations. If they return, the money could be withheld even longer to assess their mood. If they remain intransigent, the funds presumably would be released.

Supporter Robert Michel, R-Ill., said "the true test of the bargaining power of this missile can be discovered only when the Soviets are convinced we in Congress are going to fund the MX."

Opponent Edward Feighan, D-Ohio, said "the bargaining chip theory has always given us more than we bargained for: More weapons, with more warheads, that add up to danger."

Members voting yes supported continued MX production.

Voting yes were Valentine, Whitley, Ike Andrews, Neal, Britt, Rose, Hefner, James Martin, Broyhill, Clarke. Voting no: Walter Jones. Not voting: None.

SENATE
DOWN PAYMENT - By a vote of 74 for and 23 against, the Senate passed and sent to conference with the House a fiscal plan (HR 2163) to take a \$142 billion bite out of the \$600 billion or more in additional deficits projected over the next three years.

The House-Senate conference now becomes the focal point for constituents, Wall Street, foreign governments and others who question Congress' ability to get a handle on runaway deficit spending. The House has targeted \$182 billion in cuts between fiscal 1985-87. No other major legislation to slow the deficit growth will be passed in this election year.

The Senate's \$142 billion figure was roughly the amount endorsed by President Reagan as a "down payment" on the deficit. Democratic plans sought upwards of \$200 billion in reductions, chiefly through more ambitious defense cuts and tax hikes than Reagan wanted. But the GOP-controlled Senate rejected these efforts during five weeks of debate on the measure.

Taxes would be raised by \$48-\$50 billion in both the House and Senate plans. The House would slow Reagan's military buildup by \$96 billion over three years, compared to the Senate figure of \$40 billion. Domestic spending increases would be slowed by \$15 billion by the House and \$36 billion by the Senate.

In an interesting application of political arithmetic, both chambers claim large "savings" in the billions of dollars of additional interest that will not have to be paid on the national debt as a result of their proposed cuts in 1985-87 annual deficits.

Most senators voting no thought the \$142 billion plan did not go far enough in slowing the growth of deficit spending. Both John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, voted yes.

N.C. Peach Crop Shows Improvement

RALEIGH (AP) — Some 45 million pounds of peaches should be harvested in North Carolina this year, a fourfold improvement over last year when late spring freezes killed much of the crop, state agriculture officials say.

But the bumper crop won't necessarily mean top prices for growers.

"The trouble is, all the other (Southern) states are doing equally well or better this year," said Jeff K. Morton, market specialist with the N.C. Department of Agriculture's horticultural crop section. "That might mean growers could have a problem getting a good market (price)."

The North Carolina peach crop hit a low in 1982, when only 2 million pounds were harvested because of cold weather. Last year, 10 million pounds were gathered.

This year, the weather has cooperated and the crop in nine Southern states is expected to be 783 million pounds, up from 297 million last year.

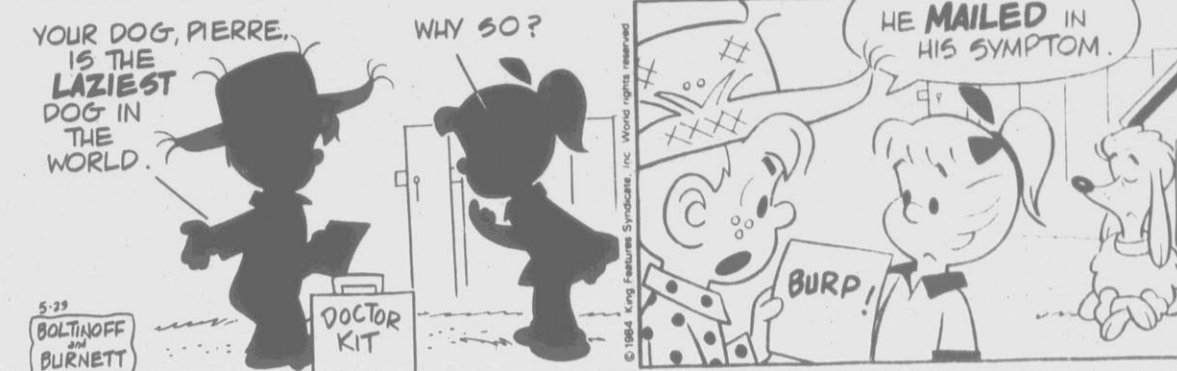

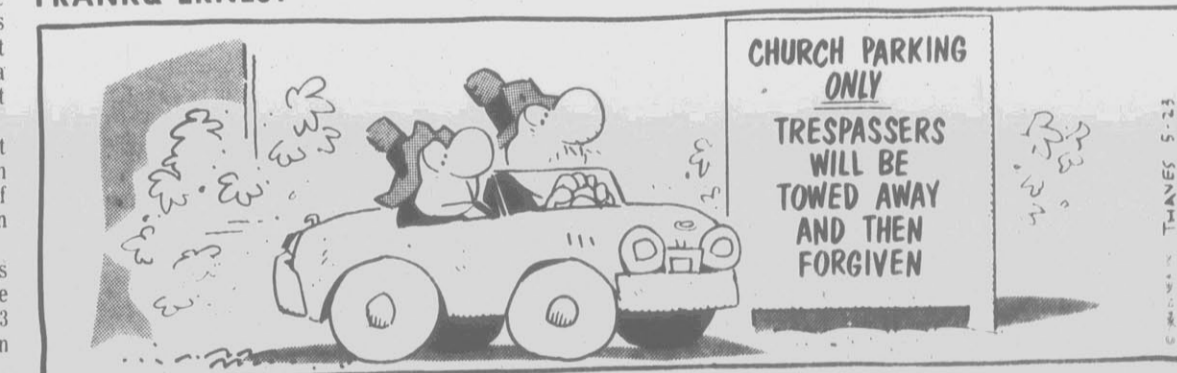

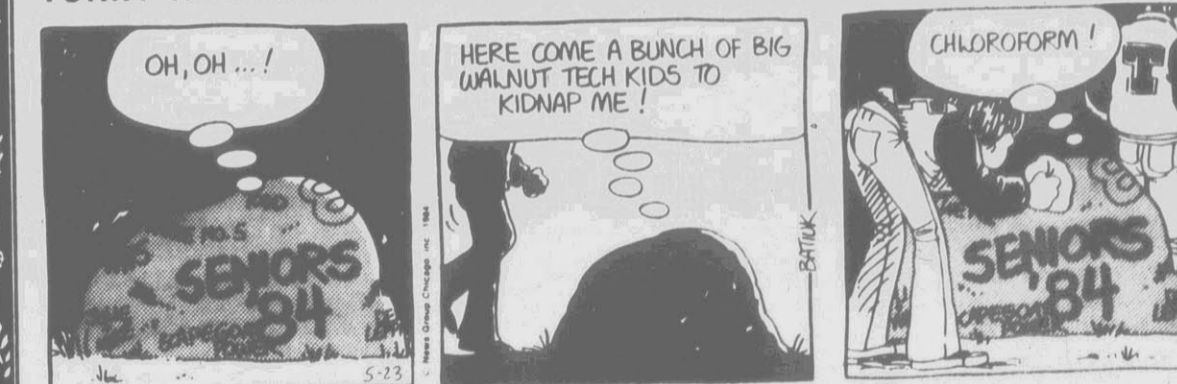

New Report By Surgeon General Links Cigarettes And Chronic Lung Disease

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cigarette smoking is the primary cause of chronic, obstructive lung disease, including bronchitis and emphysema, the surgeon general said today in his newest report on smoking.

In "The Consequences of Smoking: Chronic Obstructive Lung Disease," Surgeon General C. Everett Koop blamed cigarette smoking for up to 90 percent of the 60,000 deaths associated with obstructive lung disease in 1983.

By comparison, 170,000 heart disease deaths and 130,000 cancer deaths are attributable to smoking.

"Thus while smoking-related chronic obstructive lung disease mortality is less than estimates for smoking-related deaths due to coronary heart disease and those due to cancer, it nonetheless represents a significant number of excess deaths," said Dr. Edward N. Brandt

Jr., the assistant secretary for health at the Department of Health and Human Services. Brandt called these deaths "preventable and premature."

The report also examined the evidence on tobacco smoke in the environment on non-smokers. It concluded that although clinical studies have suggested a relationship between smoking and the lung diseases, allergies and asthma, the evidence isn't definitive and more research is needed.

The study said cigarette smoking can contribute significantly to indoor air pollution and increase eye irritation. It cited some evidence that smoke exposure produces small changes in the lung function.

But the strongest indictment of environmental smoke was connected with its effect on children.

The report said children of smoking parents have a higher prevalence of respiratory symptoms and more frequent bouts of bronchitis and pneumonia early in life. In addition, they have measurable if small differences in lung function when compared with children of non-smoking parents, although the long-term effects of this aren't known.

The Tobacco Institute, the trade group representing the nation's cigarette makers, took issue with the report's conclusions.

"The only really significant new information we can find in the report is a chapter on environmental tobacco smoke. Open-minded readers will discover that health claims by anti-smokers about environmental tobacco smoke remain unproven," said William Toohey, a spokesman for the institute.

"The surgeon general's opinion regarding chronic obstructive lung

disease is scarcely news. It's the same opinion expressed 20 years ago in the first report. We still do not share the surgeon general's opinion on this subject, recognizing that it is based on a great deal of conjecture. An opinion should be backed up with facts. In this case, the facts are insufficient. Research has to provide them," he added.

Brandt said that although more research on how cigarettes damage the lung is needed, "the important public health focus must shift to how to prevent children from becoming cigarette smokers and how to help those who now smoke to quit."

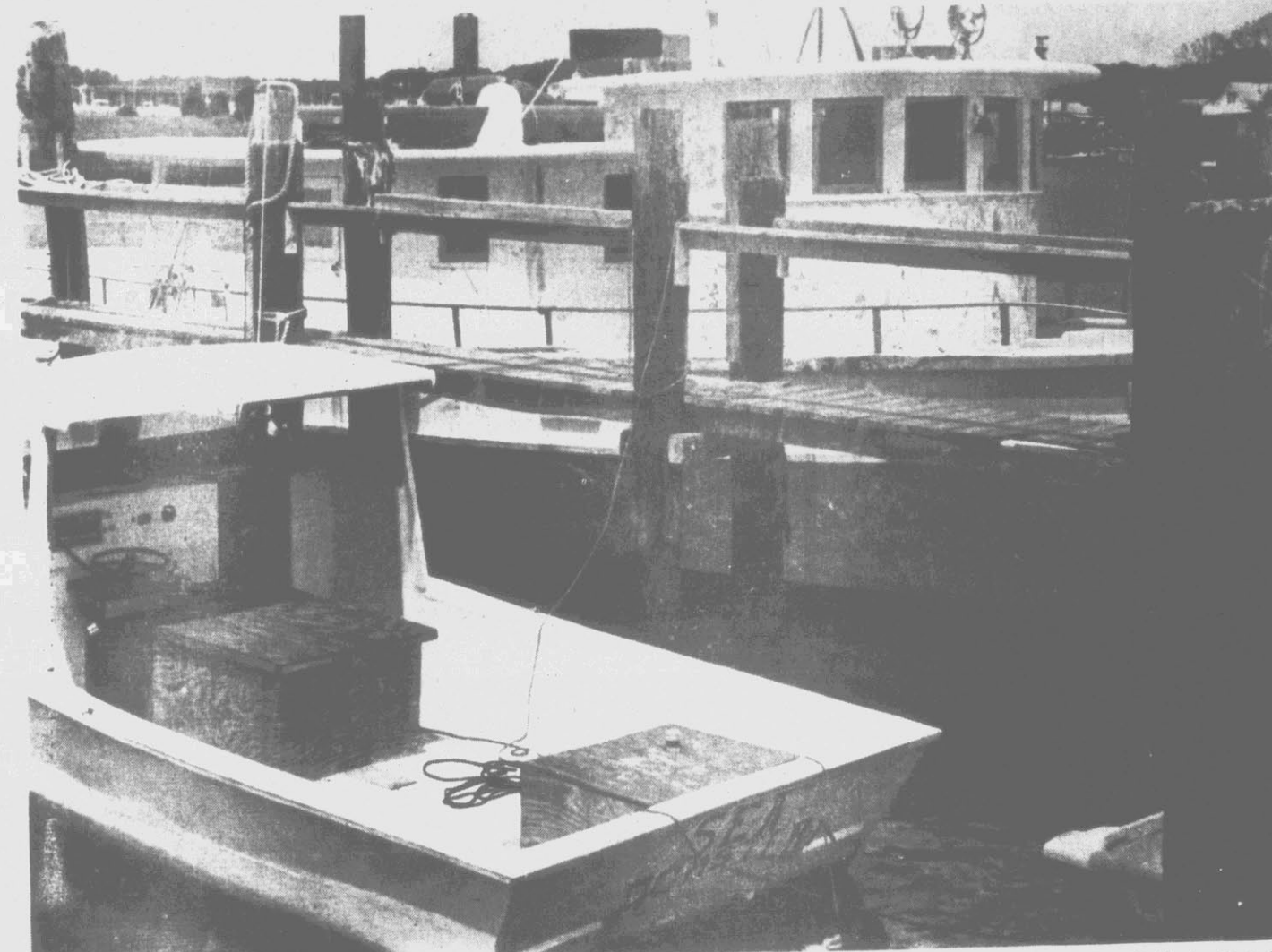
"Cigarette smoking is causally related to chronic obstructive lung disease, just as it is to cancer and coronary heart disease; severe emphysema would be rare were it not for cigarette smoking," Koop said in a preface to the 515-page report.

Hunt, Helms Forces Discuss Debates

Negotiations are continuing for debates between Gov. Jim Hunt and Sen. Jesse Helms.

Carter Wrenn, a Helms representative and official in the National Congressional Club, said both sides have agreed to 10 debates Tuesday. He said they have talked about dates but have not selected any.

Wrenn and Hunt aide Gary Pearce said the negotiators agreed not to discuss details of their 90-minute talk at the office of Phil Carlton,

special counsel to Hunt's campaign. Helms' representative Tom Ellis also attended the meeting.

"It was a very satisfying meeting," Wrenn said. "I think we made some progress."

The campaign for state labor commissioner heated up as incumbent John Brooks and his challenger, state Sen. Richard Barnes, accused each other of not lending strong support to telling workers about dangerous substances.

In another development, Barnes

said he had learned the State Bureau of Investigation and FBI were looking into "accounting discrepancies" in connection with an audit of federal job-training grants issued by the labor department.

State Auditor Ed Renfrow confirmed Tuesday that the SBI and FBI were examining use of CETA money distributed to subcontractors by the Labor Department. He declined to identify the subcontractors or elaborate on questions raised during the audit.

In other political news, about 125 campaign leaders attended a one-day seminar Tuesday for Reagan-Bush campaign officials from the Southeast. U.S. Rep. Eugene Johnston of Greensboro, who is North Carolina chairman of the Reagan-Bush campaign, attended the program.

Ed Rollins, the national director of President Ronald Reagan's reelection campaign, predicted that the South will determine the 1984 presidential election.

Edmisten Outlines Job Plan

RALEIGH (AP) — Attorney General Rufus Edmisten says he would give local economic developers their own officers and staff to help bring new jobs to North Carolina.

"We should mean enough business in this state to get them the proper equipment, the proper office help," Edmisten said at a news conference outside the state Employment Security Commission Tuesday.

Edmisten will face former Charlotte mayor Eddie Knox in the June 5 Democratic runoff.

Edmisten also promised he would:

- Lobby against increased federal cutbacks affecting the Employment Security Commission and highway programs.
- Launch a more aggressive campaign to lure industry to North Carolina. Edmisten said he would personally go on as many trade missions as possible and make as many telephone calls to executives as possible.
- Avoid creating new levels of bureaucracy that "sap the taxpayer's money while diluting the industry seeking strength of efforts already in place."
- Improve highways and water and sewer facilities. Edmisten said his road priorities are Interstate 40 in the Southeast, U.S. 17 in the Northeast, U.S. 421 in the Northwest and U.S. 74 in the Southwest.
- "No industry will locate anywhere unless you have the proper highways, the proper sewer system, the proper educational system and the proper recreational system," he said.
- Improve education, including better vocational training.

Edmisten said he would continue to focus on increasing the number of jobs in traditional industries.

"As governor, I would never lose sight of the fact that it was farming, furniture, textiles and other traditional industries that brought us this far and will give us the foresight for the future," he said.

He said he has not decided how to pay for the improvements in roads or water and sewer facilities.

"We will always be considering bond issues," he said. "I said in education that if it were necessary I would be bold enough to ask for a tax increase... we just have to take it as it comes."

Knox Keeping On Attack

DURHAM (AP) — Former Charlotte mayor Eddie Knox says opponent Rufus Edmisten and his staff should have given thought to personal attacks before they started making them because it isn't likely that they will stop now.

Edmisten has been calling for an end to the personal attacks as the candidates enter the final two weeks before the June 5 Democratic gubernatorial runoff.

But Knox said Tuesday that Edmisten and his staff "should have thought of that before they put out the poison," adding that Edmisten started the bitter exchanges.

In an interview after a meeting with black leaders, Knox said he would "turn up the heat" by continuing to criticize Edmisten's record.

"People are entitled to know the truth about both candidates," Knox said. "The difference between me and Mr. Edmisten is that I'll put my name on what I say and stand behind it."

The charges have been flying between the Democrats, each accusing the other of making false allegations.

Knox says Edmisten is behind a statewide National Rifle Association mailing that Knox says distorts his position on gun control, and he says his opponent has tried to make an issue out of his divorce.

Edmisten, meanwhile, says Knox has misled the public by accusing them of failing to pay state taxes in the early 1970s. Edmisten said Monday it was time for the campaign to rid itself of personal attacks.

"We intend to continue discussing the real issues of this campaign like education, jobs, the environment and high utility rates without engaging in the extremely personal and misleading tactics that he has been advised to use apparently in the last days of this campaign," said Edmisten press secretary Jerry Mobley.

Knox met with the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People Tuesday, his third meeting with black leaders this week, in attempts to woo black voters.

Edmisten met with the Durham Committee immediately after Knox.

"There is a disciplined vote, and we very much need it," Knox said, adding that local black leaders were highly influential, especially in urban areas.

'Operation Raleigh' To Be Largest Expedition

NEW YORK (AP) — What does the sunken wreckage of a Civil War ironclad off North Carolina have in common with millions of penguins in the Antarctic?

The answer: both are scheduled for study by scientists and young people embarking this fall on "Operation Raleigh," history's largest scientific-exploration expedition.

Camels and Hovercraft, blimps and helicopters, sailing ships and motorized vessels will be utilized in the gigantic four-year project involving some 4,000 young men and women "venturers," as they are called, from over 50 nations, at an estimated cost of \$25 million.

The expedition commemorates the extraordinary life of Sir Walter Raleigh, the Elizabethan explorer, scientist, poet, soldier, sailor and historian.

One aim of the undertaking is to give youth aged 17 to 24 the experience of leadership and inspire them to motivate others with enthusiasm for pioneering. From the United States and England each will come 1,500 venturers, while another 1,000 will be selected from more than 50 other countries.

Each venturer will join the expedition for a three-month phase involving such varied projects as:

— Diving some 220 feet to the wreck of the ironclad "Monitor," which was lost in a storm following her epic battle with the Confederate ironclad "Merrimac," during the Civil War.

— Helping the Australian government count an estimated 2.5 million penguins on the outer islands and riding camels across the Gibson Desert as part of a scientific research project.

— Searching for two lost cities — Ciudad Blanca in Honduras and Ubar, somewhere in the bleak desert "Empty Quarter" of Oman. Offshore, meanwhile, others will take part in a series of marine biological experiments in the Arabian Sea.

The expedition director is famed British explorer Col. John Blashford-Snell, who also led a similar two-year, round-the-world project with 400 youth called "Operation Drake," which ended in 1980.

Britain's Prince Charles, who served as patron of the Drake expedition, was so pleased with the results that he suggested it be repeated on a vastly expanded scale. The prince is also patron for the new project, increased tenfold.

Adding her support, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher declared "Operation Raleigh" will "engage young people in keeping alive the Elizabethan spirit of adventure which Sir Walter Raleigh epitomized."

"It will provide them with an opportunity to develop their talents and learn and display leadership of the kind shown by those earlier Elizabethans."

Flagship for the forthcoming project is a 1,600-ton motorized exploration vessel, renamed the Sir Walter Raleigh. It was purchased by the city of Hull, some 300 miles northeast of London.

Plans call for the ship to tie up at Hull as a tourist attraction after the expedition ends in 1988, Blashford-Snell said in an interview.

"In Operation Drake, we had a beautiful 150-ton brigantine. The Eye of the Wind, as flagship, but the sailing ship proved to be too small and too slow for its assigned tasks," he said. "This time we will have a logistic support vessel large enough to be equipped with laboratories, a diving center, an audio-visual

center, hospital and an advanced radio room."

Most of the venturers' expenses — averaging an estimated \$5,500 each — will be provided by sponsoring corporations, such as Chase Manhattan and IBM, and individuals. At each stop around the world,

local youth will join the visitors on scientific and community projects in their areas on six continents.

Planned stops include the Bahamas, the Caribbean, Central America, Antarctica, Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Pakistan,

Japan and Africa.

According to Blashford-Snell, each applicant must speak English, be able to swim and undergo physical and mental screenings.

"On Operation Drake, for example," he said, "such things as large snakes, a gorilla and huge spiders

were produced for the potential explorers to handle."

Few Americans will be involved in the first year, since early expedition work will be on the American continents, and most venturers probably will want to work on projects farther away from home.

said Blashford-Snell.

The flagship will set sail from Plymouth, England, arriving at Roanoke Island off North Carolina in December, some 400 years after Sir Walter Raleigh established the first English-speaking settlements in North America.

Judge Says Job Or Jail To Cheaters

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Judge Dale Crawford has a simple choice for welfare cheats: Get a job or go to jail.

The Franklin County Common Pleas Court judge makes staying off welfare a condition of probation for people convicted of welfare fraud. He says such people typically repay their illegal gain with welfare funds they continue to draw after being convicted.

"What they're doing is slapping the hand that feeds them, and that burns me," Crawford said in an interview. "I say, 'Hey, you've got two choices: Jail, or get off welfare and (get) probation.'"

Assistant County Prosecutor Robert Smith handles fraud cases and estimates that 50-60 percent of those convicted of the offense continue to draw welfare support while on probation.

"The Catch-22 is, when these persons get convicted, they will then lose their jobs," Smith said. But Crawford says if they have the right incentive — such as staying out of jail — they find work.

"If they don't want probation, then obviously I have the power to put them in jail," he said, "and if I'm not going to exercise that I tell them the conditions they must meet."

Israelies Say Black Cult Must Be Ousted

DIMONA, Israel (AP) — In 1970, about 50 American blacks arrived in this Negev Desert town saying they had come to settle in the land of their forefathers and to end what they said was their slavery in the United States.

The "Black Hebrews" now number about 2,500 members and the cult is being viewed with growing suspicion by local authorities and government officials who said in interviews that they are seeking their expulsion from Israel.

"We're sitting on a keg of dynamite," said Mayor Eli Hilali of Dimona. "It's a state within a state ... an isolationist group with no legal status that educates its children on racist teachings."

"The state of Israel cannot and will not agree to the cult remaining in Israel," said Yehoshua Kahane, deputy director-general of the Ministry of Interior.

The solution, Kahane added, was for the group to return to the United States, although Israel would be willing to let individual members remain for humanitarian reasons.

However, the task is complicated by the fact many of the Black Hebrews have renounced their American citizenship. U.S. officials say they can only return if they apply for visas like any other foreign national.

Israeli officials indicated in the recent interviews that they are reluctant to expel the cultists outright for fear of harming relations with African nations and blacks in America.

"If we kicked them out, everyone would be crying racism," said Kahane.

The leader of the Black Hebrews, former Chicago bus driver Ben-Ami Carter, told a visiting reporter that his supporters in the United States were acting to prevent the cult's expulsion.

"We have influential friends working through the State Department, in Congress," he claimed. Carter also said he believed he was destined to lead a "spiritual revolution and form a new type of Messianic government in Israel."

Sect members regard themselves as descendants of the Biblical Israelites but have no legal status here. The Israeli Supreme Court ruled in 1972 that the cultists were not Jews and therefore ineligible for automatic Israeli citizenship.

Authorities have long banned the entry of Black Hebrews into the country but contend that many sneak in with false passports.

Their numbers also have been swelled by a high birth rate. Women do not practice birth control and every male is entitled to take seven wives.

Most live in overcrowded stone barracks on the edge of Dimona, a town of 30,000, and several hundred others live in Arad and Mitzpeh Ramon.

Their village looks like a kibbutz, an Israeli collective farm, with its small houses, stone paths and well-tended flower beds. At its hub are a communal vegetarian store and a dining room which also serves as a meeting hall.

The women wear flowing robes and turbans in vivid colors and the children bow in deference to any adult they meet.

Defectors from the cult have told reporters that Carter commands obedience through his total psychological and financial hold on the members. They claimed rebels are flogged or forced to wander in the desert. Their claims could not be independently verified.

Three days a week the cult is banned from consuming salt as part of a strict vegetarian diet that Carter enforces; health authorities maintain the diet has led to deaths from malnutrition.

A government-appointed commission investigated the sect and issued recommendations in 1980 which called for the Black Hebrews to be allowed to stay and given legal status.

But the government, under pressure from local officials as the July 23 national elections approach, has rejected the recommendations and recent statements indicated a new policy designed to get the United States to take the cultists back.

"The Americans have told us that if we put the Black Hebrews on a plane and send them home, they'll send them back," a senior government official said.

"We are trying to be as helpful as possible and to take into consideration the humanitarian aspects ... but it all has to be within the framework of the law," said a U.S. official, who also spoke on condition he not be identified.

Carter, 44, said that returning the Black Hebrews to the United States "would be like telling the Jews they have to go back to Nazi Germany."

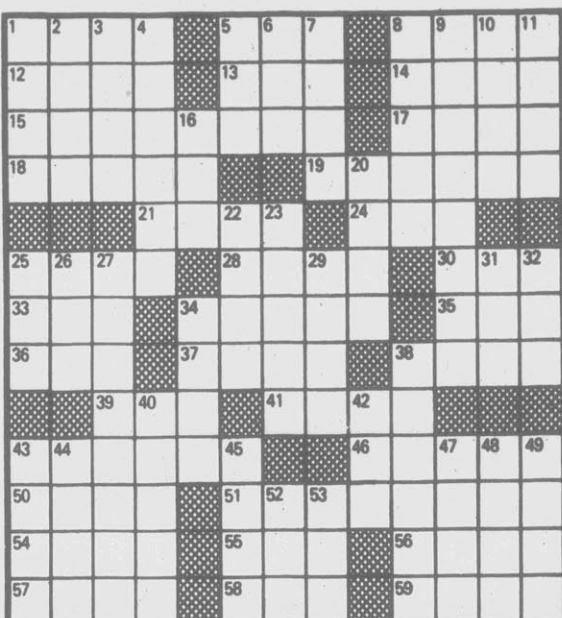

The same fingers that save lives in a heart unit at a Kansas City, Kan., hospital can nimbly create folk music in a pasture in north Arkansas.

Dr. Mike Boggan, a cardiovascular surgeon, takes his banjo and guitar and heads for the Ozark hills each spring to attend the Mountain View Folk Festival.

He and comrades like Dr. Joe Smiddy of Kingsport, Tenn., and Smiddy's father, who is with Clinch Valley College and plays stand-up bass, spend a relaxing weekend amid a crowd of people who love old English ballads and folk music.

Jimmy Driftwood of Timbo, in whose pasture Boggan and Smiddy camp, says the doctors come for a weekend of playing and singing and playing and singing. Driftwood is known for songs like the "Tennessee Stud" and the "Battle of New Orleans."

Boggan and Smiddy are practically old-timers now. Boggan, 44, said in a recent telephone interview that he and Smiddy first made the trip to Mountain View in 1969 or 1970. They were both at the Kansas University Medical Center then. He has missed a couple of years.

"There used to be a big bunch of us that'd go down," Boggan said. Friends scattered across the country gather there and that makes the weekend more memorable, he said.

The feelings that the trip and the festival create aren't easy to describe. It is partly, he said, seeing the Driftwoods, partly gathering with old friends and partly just getting involved in the music, re-learning old songs. Because of his childhood in south Georgia, he says, he gets a coming-home kind of feeling.

Chinese City's Treasures Face Threat From Tourists

SUZHOU, China (AP) — This ancient city, exalted for its tranquil canals, pagodas and elaborate gardens, has become such a big Chinese tourist spot that the communist government fears the treasures it opened to the public face major damage.

From the fabled Pillow Rock, where a famous Chinese monk named Shen Gong once slept, to the giant limestones in a garden called the Lion-Rock Forest, Suzhou's solitude has been transformed by thousands of Chinese visitors with cameras and screaming children.

The carefully crafted fish-pond gardens and rosewood alcoves, once retreats for silk merchants, monks and poets, are littered with candy wrappers, cigarette butts and discarded film.

On holidays, Suzhou is jammed with Chinese from Shanghai, an hour's train ride away. Wearing Western suits and dresses, they photograph each other with Chinese-made double-lens cameras, a favorite pastime and a sign of China's growing prosperity.

Then they rush to the scores of privately run fast-film developing shops that process black and white negatives in 10 minutes for the equivalent of less than a dollar.

Suzhou's garden estates were once the domain of wealthy Chinese, who banned commoners from entering.

When the communists took power in 1949, they converted many of these forbidden places into public parks, reserving others for official residences.

The government says it is now worried that without strict controls, tourists will wreck the beauty that has made the city of canals famous as "the Venice of China."

Concern for Suzhou's protection reflects a new attitude among Chinese officials, who are beginning to fear the same drastic consequences of uncontrolled development that has helped spawn environmental and zoning laws among modernized countries.

Mayor Fang Ming recently told the official news agency Xinhua that nearly 100 ancient sites, streets and areas in the 2,500-year-old city have been given special protection, and that many residents and factories will be relocated.

"Suzhou is building a new city area on the western outskirts to shift the center of life and production there," he said. "Quite a proportion of the present 360,000 inhabitants of the old town will move to the new area."

He said the government has allocated \$90 million to protect and restore old Suzhou, a fan-shaped area of two-story whitewashed homes and Song dynasty (960-1279) pagodas bordered by a network of canals.

In this zone, he said, "no new tall building may be built and existing ones must be demolished."

Suzhou is one of the oldest towns in the Yangtze River basin, and became a major silk-producing center under the Song dynasty during the 12th century.

Venetian explorer Marco Polo was reminded of his hometown while visiting Suzhou in the late 1200s, when the city was ruled by Kublai Khan of the Yuan dynasty.

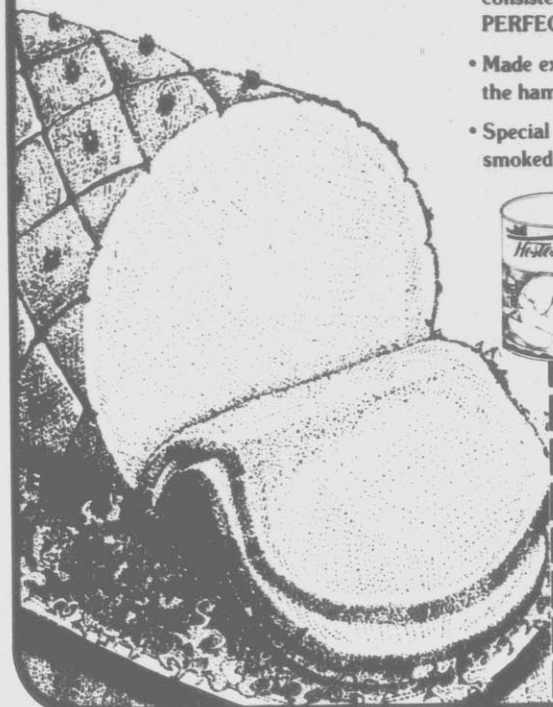
"I tell you quite truly that there are quite 6,000 bridges of stone in this city, below the greater part of which one galley and two would well pass," he wrote in his journal.

The city also is famed among Chinese for the beauty of its women and the pleasing sounds of the local dialect.

"An argument in Suzhou is more pleasant than praise in Canton," goes an old Chinese proverb.

Program Provides Services

GLENDALE, Ariz. (AP) — A couple whose child has died of smoke inhalation may want to hold their baby one last time.

An elderly woman who lost her husband six months ago may be devastated by a residential robbery.

What they share in common is the Glendale Victim Assistance Program, a program sufficiently extraordinary to have beaten out 25 other metropolitan finalists last year in winning the program excellence award of the National Organization for Victim Assistance.

The program, said Director Rita Koppinger, combines a variety of services, including crisis intervention, advocacy and support, neighborhood mediation and prevention.

For example, Ms. Koppinger said, Glendale police call out her department on all child abuse and sexual assault cases and some psychiatric emergencies, such as deaths, family fights and suicide attempts.

"Our goal is to meet the emotional needs of the victims," Ms. Koppinger said. "It includes very practical things like getting people seated and calmed down and doing death notifications."

For example, in addition to arranging the last request of the family whose baby died of smoke inhalation, she said her department had explained the procedures involved in a violent death, including the need for a medical examination, and had helped make mortuary arrangements.

For an elderly woman assaulted by robbers, devastation can be total even though her injuries are minor, Ms. Koppinger said.

"That could be the last straw," she said.

The Glendale Victim Assistance Program tries to make personal contact with all the elderly who are victims of crimes in this city of 102,800 people, including such minor crimes as purse snatching and obscene phone calls.

"It gives them somebody to talk to," she said. "So many elderly people are so isolated."

The department's mediation team provides a different kind of service. Last year, Glendale police were called out on 2,700 cases involving 650 sixth-grade students.

Out of that workshop, 11 came forward to report potential assault cases and two cases will be followed up, Ms. Koppinger said.

Another Sheriff Faces Drug Charge

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The fourth eastern Tennessee sheriff in two years has been arrested on drug charges, following a federal investigation in which a deputy sheriff worked as an undercover agent.

FBI agents on Monday delivered Anderson County Sheriff Dennis O. Trotter, 62, and three other men to U.S. agents in Knoxville following their indictments last week on charges of conspiring to distribute cocaine, marijuana, valium and counterfeit quaaludes.

The 27-count indictment said one of the men, Johnny Ray Morgan, was to pay Trotter in exchange for keeping the sheriff's office from investigating alleged drug deals.

Skepticism Greeted New Drugs For Diabetes

NEW YORK (AP) — After years of debate and delay, two controversial drugs for adult diabetics that have been sold in Europe for many years are becoming available in the United States.

and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration requires a warning that the drugs could cause heart attacks or strokes.
At issue is the health of some 10 million Americans with what's called Type II, or adult-onset, diabetes.
They make up what is now a \$200 million market for diabetes drugs in the United States. Drug industry

analysts say that market could double with the arrival of the new drugs and the marketing push behind them.
The drugs are called oral hypoglycemics, meaning they control blood sugar and can be taken by mouth, unlike insulin which must be injected.
The newest are referred to as second-generation drugs, to distin-

guish them from existing oral hypoglycemics.
The principal first-generation drugs are Tolinase and Orinase, made by Upjohn, and Diabinese, made by Pfizer. The new drugs are glipizide, marketed by Pfizer as Glucotrol, and glyburide, sold by Upjohn as Micronase and by Hoechst-Roussel as DiaBeta.
The strongest critic of the oral

diabetes drugs has been the U.S. Food and Drug Administration which approved them at the beginning of May. The approval was delayed for years while the FDA wrangled with the drug companies over the wording of a warning label.
The link between the drugs and an increased likelihood of heart attack or stroke comes from a single large-scale study of the first genera-

tion diabetes drugs — the University Group Diabetes Program, or UGDP, study.
In that study, certain patients taking the drugs experienced heart problems. That was in the late 1960s, and the study has since been sharply criticized as badly designed, with no way to be sure the heart troubles were related to the drugs.
In addition, other studies failed to find the same risk.

When the possibility of a problem became apparent, the FDA moved to take the responsible drug off the market but was stopped by a court action initiated by doctors who wanted it for their patients, according to Dr. Robert Silverman, a diabetes expert at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md.
Nevertheless, the FDA is still concerned enough to require the new drugs to be sold with a warning saying they have been "associated with increased cardiovascular mortality as compared to treatment with diet alone or diet plus insulin," the standard alternative therapies.

Dr. Allan Drash, president of the American Diabetes Association, was quick to point out in a statement released May 10 that "a regimen of diet and exercise, with the goal of weight loss for obese patients, remains the treatment of choice for those with Type II diabetes."

As many as 70 percent of Type II diabetics are obese, Drash said in a subsequent interview.

Does he think drugs are being overused?

"There are probably a lot of people with diabetes in the United States who are on oral agents, who might be effectively treated with diet and exercise alone," he said. But the drugs do have their place, he added. If the patient is not going to adhere to a diet and exercise program "then the physician's got to go somewhere else."

Type II diabetes occurs most often in adults. Their production of insulin, which regulates blood sugar levels, drops.

The drugs seem to revive insulin production, at least temporarily, and to somehow make the rest of the body more responsive to insulin, doctors say. In some cases of Type II diabetes, insulin injections are prescribed.

Type II diabetes, which most often appears in children and is much less common, is caused by a complete loss of insulin production. Sufferers require insulin injections.

In the mid-1970s, the oral diabetes drugs were in disfavor, said Silverman, chief of the diabetes programs section at the National Institute of Arthritis, Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases, one of the branches of the National Institutes of Health.

"The basic teaching was that they don't work at all," he said in an interview. "There was a feeling in the academic diabetes community, especially at that time, that they were being overprescribed ... that patients were taking the easy way out."

Now, use of the drugs is growing, according to Paul Brooke, senior health care analyst with Morgan Stanley in New York. Sales of \$206 million in 1983 were up 20 percent over the previous year, and it appears sales will grow another 20 percent this year, Brooke said.

Approval of the new drugs was critical for the companies, industry analysts said, because patents on existing diabetes drugs have either expired or will expire later this year, opening the way to competition in the form of cheaper generic versions of the drugs.

The FDA has taken so long to approve the second generation drugs that patents on those drugs will be expiring within a few years.

The question of interest to diabetics, however, is whether the second-generation drugs are any improvement over the first generation.

"I think they offer the possibility of improved tolerance and ease of use," said Silverman. "They're not a major scientific breakthrough. I think they have a place in therapy for diabetics, but unfortunately like a lot of easy therapies they have a potential for overuse."

The FDA has determined that the drugs represent "little or no therapeutic gain" over the first-generation drugs.

"The major difference is that on a weight basis, they get the effect with a smaller amount of substance," said Dr. James Bilstad of the FDA's office of biologic research and review. "There's really no indication that these are therefore more effective in early diabetes."

Donald Rose, product manager for Hoechst's new drug, DiaBeta, said the drug was an improvement over present therapy for several reasons: Its greater potency means it might need to be taken only once a day; it is less likely to build up to toxic levels in the body because it is excreted differently than existing drugs, and it does not cause fluid build-up as the existing drug, Diabinese, does, according to Rose.
Bilstad replies that those are minor considerations.

Turkish Women See Two Lifestyles

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — Sixty years after the abolition of harems, Turkish women sit in Parliament, perform surgery and run banks and newspapers — legally on a par with men. But not so on the dusty plains of Anatolia: women there still wear veils while ploughing the fields and the feminine condition seems little changed from the days of the Turkish Ottoman Empire.

Meetings and debates throughout the month of May, Turkish women celebrated the 60th anniversary of the first of a series of reforms that led to their legal emancipation. In 1924, Kemal Ataturk, founder of the Turkish republic, threw out the Islamic law that had kept women veiled and confined behind latticed screens.

Those reforms made Turkey the first Moslem country to recognize women as the legal equals of men, and Ataturk gave women rights that were long unrivaled elsewhere in the Islamic world.

"In the 1920s, most Turkish women, even city women, knew little beyond the window grills of their houses," said 81-year-old Mehlika Basarir, whose father was an official in the Ottoman court. "I felt uncomfortable with my head uncovered."

For centuries under the Ottomans, Turkish pashas had kept their wives, concubines and female slaves cooped up in warren-like harems. The sultan's harem, dubbed "Gate of Happiness," was the largest in all Islam and held more than 650 women. In hamlets and the countryside, Turkey's women worked and bore children, but were considered their husbands' property and had few rights.

With a stroke of the pen, Ataturk changed that, just as he abolished the Ottoman sultanate and laid the groundwork for modern Turkey. But equality in practice came as a shock for many.

Turkey's first woman lawyer, Sureyya Agaoglu, caused a sensation when she tried her first case in Ankara in 1924.

"As I entered the court, a village woman came up to me and lifted my gown to see if I really was a woman," Mrs. Agaoglu said recently.

In the six decades since Ataturk's proclamation and Mrs. Agaoglu's court debut, Turkish women have made impressive strides. Now one in five lawyers here is a woman, and one in six is doctor — higher ratios than in the United States.

Turkey has more female university graduates than any of the Arab countries, and women here are free to attend all of the schools men do.

But for untold millions of women on the farms and in hamlets of Anatolia, equal rights remain a dream, even an unthinkable concept.

"Ataturk started things off on a grand scale in the 20s, but the reforms were never carried through," Mrs. Agaoglu said in an interview. "Turkish women have rights and freedoms, but the so-called educated women of this country have never managed to get out into the fields and explain to the rural womenfolk that they have any rights at all."

A 23-year-old woman who identified herself only as Fatma said she came to Istanbul four years ago from Asian Turkey with her husband. The brown-eyed woman who wears a dark blue veil is typical of many who come from the country's rural regions.

"My husband would be angry if I went bare headed or alone," Fatma told a reporter, explaining why she wears the veil and travels only when chaperoned. "He doesn't want me to work either, because I might meet strange men."

In rural Turkey, where two-thirds of the nation's 50 million people live, many women still have their husbands chosen for them by their parents. Girls often marry cousins or other relatives to keep family holdings together, and suitors must pay as much as \$5,000 for a wife.

A resurgence of Islamic religious feelings may also have confused women's status. In cities like Konya, where the mystic order of the whirling dervishes was founded, many middle-class families insist their daughters wear the veil.

The generals who staged the coup in 1980 that interrupted parliamentary rule have reinstated religious instruction in Turkish public schools to calm clerical agitation.

Economic pressures, however, may be doing as much to bring about true equality for women in Turkey as laws. As thousands seeking work flock to the shantytowns of Istanbul from the hinterlands of Anatolia, they are thrust into a Westernized lifestyle.

Old women shrouded in black accompanied by their teen-age daughters in blue jeans are now a common sight in Turkish cities.

Tens of thousands of other Turkish women have gone abroad, swelling the ranks of the 1.5 million Turks working in West Germany and other European countries.

Judge Awards Custody To Babysitter

DOVER, Del. (AP) — Brenda D. Smith has been fighting for more than two years to get custody of her little boy, Daryl Smith, but she still doesn't have her child. Her former babysitter does.

The Family Court judge who handled the case didn't accuse Mrs. Smith of neglecting or abusing her child. Instead the issue is 6-year-old

Daryl's dependence on the former babysitter's family.

The judge's original decision awarding custody to the babysitter has been appealed, reversed and sent back to him, but he recently decided to stick by his ruling.

"I was very hurt," said Mrs. Smith, 26, of Christiana. "It was like reliving it almost all over again."

Daryl was placed in the custody of Dorothy Marx and her husband

James in February 1982 after they petitioned the court to become the child's guardians.

Mrs. Marx, 47, of Bellefonte, met the Smiths when she was sent by a private babysitting agency in 1978 to help care for the infant Daryl while his mother recuperated from an auto accident. Mrs. Marx has said that even after the full-time babysitting ended, Mrs. Smith continued to ask her to care for Daryl.

But Mrs. Smith contended Mrs. Marx would beg to take Daryl to her home. Mrs. Smith has consistently said that although she could not provide as much for Daryl as the Marxes, she could provide the minimum care he needs.

Family Court Judge James Gallagher said in his 1982 ruling that Mrs. Smith and Gary Smith, who at the time was estranged from his wife, "failed to plan adequately for Daryl's physical, mental and emo-

tional needs, health and development."

The Smiths have since divorced and Smith now lives in Elkton, Md. Mrs. Smith said her former husband supports her efforts to get custody of Daryl, even though he filed a separate petition for custody.

Gallagher didn't cite the Smiths for abuse or neglect but said Daryl had been raised by the Marxes to the point where he was dependent on them for his needs.

That ruling was appealed, and Superior Court Judge Clarence W. Taylor reversed the decision in August 1983 and sent the case back to Gallagher for reconsideration.

Taylor's ruling instructed Gallagher to review the case and apply the state's legal definition of a "dependent child," without comparing the Marxes to Mrs. Smith.

Taylor said: "The dependency issue turns on the overall condition of the child and not upon an evaluation of one person's effect on the child compared with some other person's effect ... The status of a dependent child rests upon the totality of the care ... and other conditions from all sources affecting the child and the determination is whether that totality has impaired or ... will impair the child's health and well-being."

Carolyn Schlecker, Mrs. Smith's attorney, said she had understood Taylor's ruling to mean that another custody hearing would be held. But she said Gallagher instead accepted only written briefs from attorneys.

"He did not consider any new evidence at all," Ms. Schlecker said.

When Gallagher issued his new decision in April, "we were quite surprised," Ms. Schlecker said.

Mrs. Smith has appealed

Gallagher's latest ruling.

"We feel it's the same decision he rendered before. We don't see any difference in it and that's one of the major reasons we're appealing," Ms. Schlecker said. "We argued that the law was not correctly applied and Judge Taylor agreed with us. The disappointment for us is there will be a further delay in Daryl being reunited with his mother and brother."

Mrs. Smith has another son, 10-year-old Phillip, who lives with her.

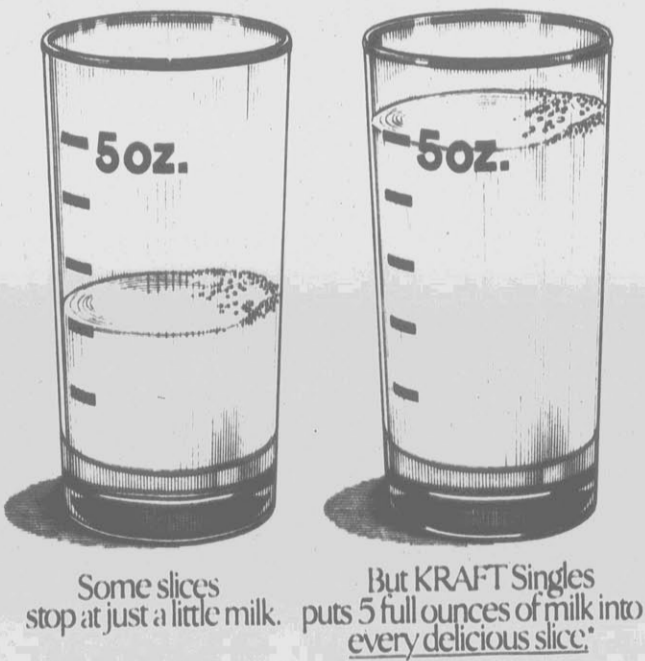

Once you have opened with a demand bid, there is no need for you to be overly aggressive. You have described your hand, so you can afford to make minimum bids thereafter and leave it to partner to press on.

After receiving a positive response to his two spade opening, South simply showed his second suit. When North could do no better than take a preference to four spades, South wisely elected to pass. The fact that he was void in his partner's suit was a serious drawback. Had North had anything in the way of extra values, he would have found some other bid.

West got off to the best lead of a trump, and when dummy appeared even four spades was no laydown. Declarer was faced with the possibility of losing two tricks in each minor suit, and he could not take advantage of the ace of hearts for a discard because there was no quick entry to dummy.

While declarer could have ruffed a club had West not led a trump, to pursue this course now would be throwing good coin after bad. If declarer leads the ace of clubs and another, the defenders will win the king and play another trump, and now declarer has no way to avoid three more losers in the minor suits.

A sounder plan is to make use of dummy's jack of clubs. Declarer should win the trump and immediately lead the queen of clubs from hand! The defenders have no satisfactory rejoinder.

If East wins the king of clubs, the table's jack of clubs becomes an entry to the ace of hearts, and declarer can discard one of his losers. But by refusing to win the king of clubs East does even worse. Now declarer continues with the ace of clubs and a ruff, and he can make an overtrick by taking a discard on the ace of hearts.

Longtime Prisoner Wins His Freedom

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP) — The government has freed a man who had spent more than 21 years in jail and, along with another man held in the same case, was considered South America's longest-detained political prisoner.

Guillermo Ovando, a former army sergeant, was weak from a three-week long hunger strike when released Monday by the Interior Ministry, according to his attorney, Francisco de Vargas.

The government did not say why it released Ovando, who made no comment.

Ovando and Napoleon Ortigosa, an army captain, were jailed in 1962 in connection with the death of a military academy cadet. The incident reportedly involved accusations of a conspiracy against Gen. Alfredo Stroessner, who has ruled Paraguay since 1954. Ortigosa, who is still in jail, was alleged to have been part of the plot.

Ovando was sentenced in 1963 by a military tribunal to 15 years in prison. Including time served before sentencing, the term was completed in 1977. But the government, branding Ovando a subversive, kept him in jail under terms of a 30-year-old state of siege that suspended most civil liberties.

Refuge Aids Bird Flock

OCEAN SPRINGS, Miss. (AP) — A little tinkering with Mother Nature, the watchful care of wildlife officials and its own desire to survive are slowly adding to a Mississippi bird flock once threatened with extinction.

The Mississippi sandhill crane, a large, gray bird with a wingspan of up to 8 feet, still faces a battle for survival. In the last few months, shots by armed vandals have depleted the flock by almost 5 percent, simply by killing two of its estimated 50 birds.

A few years ago, observations indicated there were fewer than 30 of these birds in existence. The cranes, a subspecies found in the wild only on the grassy plains of Jackson County on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, already enjoy a unique place in American wildlife history. The sanctity of their nesting area became the first U.S. Supreme Court test of the Endangered Species Act passed by Congress in 1973.

That legal battle in the late 1970s temporarily halted construction of an interstate interchange and eventually led to a special land purchase around the interchange to keep development from spreading into the cranes' nesting area.

Dr. Ed Cake, a biologist with the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory who has done volunteer work with the birds for several years, said it was man's manipulation of the cranes' habitat that had brought them to the brink of extinction. Ironically, he said, "they will die if man does not step in."

"We can document several reasons why the birds were dying off, but the primary reason was the elimination of habitat," Cake said. "The sandhill cranes thrive on what we call a savanna, simply a moist, grassy plain with few shrubs or trees."

"Over the last quarter-century, large paper company interests and small private interests have altered these savannas by draining them with ditches and planting pine trees," said Cake, also an associate professor of environmental science at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Interior Water Plan Criticized

WASHINGTON (AP) — A major environmental group says the Interior Department has done such a poor job of recovering costs of Western water projects that negotiations for repayment contracts should be turned over to the Justice Department.

Interior is ignoring recommendations from its own inspector general that would increase cost recovery by more than \$10 billion over the next 50 years, according to the report issued Monday by the National Wildlife Federation.

"Indeed, the department's policy appears in many respects to minimize cost recovery," the report said.

Justice would do a better job, the federation said, because it would be "unfettered by a vested interest in maintaining an influential constituency for underpriced water and power."

Interior spokesman Doug Baldwin declined comment because the department had not seen the federation's report.

Under the federal reclamation law, costs attributable to irrigation are supposed to be recovered from users without interest; costs of other

activities such as power production are supposed to be recovered with interest. Still other costs, such as for recreation facilities, are not recovered at all.

The \$50 billion in potentially unrecovered costs is in addition to subsidies provided by Congress through no-interest repayments or below-market interest rates, the report said.

The report said its examination of seven audits by the office of the inspector general, six of which were completed in the Carter administration, showed that the department's Reclamation Bureau:

—Sets inadequate rates for hydro-

electric power and water supplied to cities, industry and farms.

—Continually postpones repayment schedules on some projects.

—Allocates costs to future construction not yet authorized by Congress, which has the effect of lowering the sum collected from users of the parts already built and authorized.

The federation gave these figures for the potentially unrecovered costs:

—Central Valley Project, California, \$10.2 billion by the year 2038.

—Pick-Sloan Project, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana and Wyoming, \$6.3 billion by

2077 and more than \$1 billion over the next 50 years.

—Fryingpan-Arkansas Project, Colorado, \$218 million by 2024.

—Central Arizona Project, Arizona, \$239 million by 2038.

—Colorado River Storage Project, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico, \$1.5 billion by 2043.

—Southern Nevada Project, Nevada, \$1 million by 2022.

These figures add up to \$18.5 billion. Ed Osan, one of the authors of the report, said the federation disregarded cost more than 50 years in the future, on the grounds that they were too uncertain, in arriving at the \$10 billion estimate.

Research Group Provides Aid In Business Planning

North Carolina will need more expertise in planning and market research as smaller firms grow and more middle-sized companies move to the state, says the manager of RTI Management Services.

"Mid-sized companies are likely to have grown fast enough to be understaffed in management," said Jerry VanSant. "They'll have a need for help to supplement their management ... for long-range planning."

RTI Management Services is a self-supporting division of the Research Triangle Institute, a non-profit organization based in Research Triangle Park between Durham and Raleigh.

The institute, owned by the University of North Carolina, Duke University and North Carolina State University, primarily does research

for government. But RTI Management Services is aimed at the private sector, said VanSant.

Since it was formed four years ago, the division has helped 25 North Carolina firms with corporate planning and with market research. It also has aided development projects in Indonesia, the Philippines, India and Jamaica, and some of that knowledge has been applied to the domestic sector, VanSant said.

Communication is a major problem in the developing world as well as in mid-sized U.S. companies, he said.

"We're working with people to improve their information system so that when they evaluate projects, they're better able to use that information to plan," he said.

The group's market research involves a technique called "focus-group interviewing," which stresses qualitative rather than quantitative

information, VanSant said. It's cheaper than rigorously scientific surveys and the results are more useful to decision-makers, he said.

For example, a residential developer in the Triangle area wanted to know what kind of houses to build, and RTI Management Services interviewed a target group on their preferences for size, location, recreational facilities and other factors — even for computer hookups in the house.

The group's corporate planning services involves more than just planning — it also means teaching the company how to do the planning, VanSant said.

The organization charges a fee based on the amount of time the work requires, he said. There are other consulting firms in the state, but most are either very small or branches of out-of-state companies.
