## Pitt Gets Second Heavy Rainfall

Yet another show of mother nature's summer fireworks greeted folks when they left work Tuesday, ending a day of gray skies, frequent downpours and wicked lightning storms.

A series of heavy thunderstorms that hit the area around 5 p.m. Tuesday dumped 1.23 inches of rain in Greenville, according to Greenville Utilities, and over two inches on the southern end of the county, according to unofficial measurements.

The lightning added to the damage GUC's electrical system has suffered in the frequent and severe electrical storms that have plagued the county since Friday, according to Malcolm Green, superintendent of GUC's electrical department.

"We are continuing to see further damage to the system from these

storms," Green said. "We know there's some damage out there we need to respond to, and we can't because of the constant bad weather. It just won't let up long enough."

Lightning during Tuesday's storm destroyed an oil switch in a pole-top transformer on Old Creek Road, Green said, interrupting power to 275 customers for around 45 minutes. Other outages, he said, were scattered, but by 8 p.m. either crews were at trouble spots or power had been restored.

"Our men were out there working in that hard rain and lightning we had between 5-7 p.m.," said Green. "There was no reluctance whatsoever on their part, even though they've had to do it for several days in a row now. I think that deserves mention."

The heavy rain briefly flooded many city streets during rush-hour traffic Tuesday.

## Runoff Possible In 6th Senate Primary

The first primary was held Tuesday in the recently realigned 6th districts of the N.C. House and N.C. Senate, resulting in a possible runoff in the Senate race while L.M. (Mutt) Brinkley of Ahoskie defeated Joseph M. Parker in the 6th district House balloting.

A runoff in the 6th District Senate race could be held Aug. 14 between Shelly Willingham of Tarboro and R.L. (Bob) Martin, longtime member of the Pitt County Board of Commissioners. Martin received a total of 5,633 votes and Willingham received 3,721 votes, according to unofficial results compiled by The Daily Reflector. Others in the race were John D. Constable who received a total of 2,435 votes, and Vernon Morton with 220 votes.

Brinkley defeated Ahoskie publisher Parker in the 6th District House race by a total vote of 2,563 to 2,022. The two candidates ran for the seat vacated by John B. Gillam III.

Realignment of the districts, approved by the General Assembly in March, was ordered by a federal court to correct racial imbalance. The reapportioned House district includes the Pitt County precincts of Bethel and Carolina, as well as part of Bertie, Hertford and Martin counties. The realigned Senate district includes portions of Edgecombe and Wilson counties, Robersonville in Martin County, and the Pitt County precincts of Arthur, Belvoir, Bethel, Falkland, Farmville and Fountain.

In Pitt County's portion of the 6th House District, Parker received 251 votes to Brinkley's 184 votes, but Brinkley led in Bertie and Hertford counties and defeated Parker.

Martin led in Pitt County in the Senate district with a total of 1,159 votes, followed by Willingham with 266 votes, Constable with 62 votes and Morton with 9 votes. Martin also was victorious in Edgecombe and Martin counties, but he lost to Wilson-native Constable in Wilson

County. Because no candidate in the Senate race received a majority, Willingham could call for a runoff, election officials said.

Margaret Hardee, supervisor of the Pitt County Board of Elections, said for a runoff election to be held,

Willingham must file a request for the runoff with the State Board of Elections by Tuesday.

Mrs. Hardee said turnout, although low, was about what was expected. She said several factors contributed to low voter interest in Tuesday's primary.

"There are so many elections now, and this primary came so late," Mrs. Hardee said. "It is not the candidates' fault that they were shifted to another district and they had to wait so late to hold the primary. (Public) interest wanes in all the time that intervenes between

the day of the first primary Nov. 8 and the day the (the 6th district) was allowed to hold its primary because of reapportionment," she added.

Mrs. Hardee said rain and voter vacations also could have contributed to the light turnout.

## Request Prompts PCMH Zoning Study

A spot rezoning request that would have allowed a small shopping mall to be built across from Pitt County Memorial Hospital prompted the Greenville Planning and Zoning Commission to take a new look at development plans for acreage around the medical complex.

The commission's unanimous decision Tuesday night to deny recommendation of Guy Mayo's request to rezone five acres across from the hospital from medical arts to shopping center was strongly opposed by Commissioner Wally Wooles, who said he was afraid that approval of Mayo's request would "foster devel-

opment of another Greenville Boulevard." He labeled the boulevard as an eyesore before urging the commission to place a four-month moratorium on rezoning requests within the medical arts district until a study of possible locations for commercial development could be done.

Because the commission does not have the authority to impose a moratorium, board members elected to ask for a joint meeting with the Greenville City Council concerning future commercial development of the medical arts area.

In related business, the commission approved recommendation of a proposal to include professional

offices in the medical arts zoning district by a vote of 4-2. The proposal will now go before the City Council.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, the commission heard a summary of the Tar River Neighborhood Association's request to rezone a portion of the neighborhood bounded by Fifth Street and the Tar River from R-6 (allowing single, duplex and multifamily dwellings) to single-family residential. If changed, existing duplex and multifamily dwellings would be allowed to remain in the neighborhood, but would not be allowed to expand.

George Laws, vice president of the Tar River Neighborhood Association, told the council that the

association has been striving to improve the livability of the area since 1981. "As you know," he said, "before we got involved, the area was fast becoming a potential slum."

The commission will act on the city-sponsored rezoning proposal at its August meeting.

In other business, the commission elected to recommend the following rezoning requests for final approval to the City Council:

\*A request by J.F. Arthur Jr., Louis C. Arthur and Louis Clark to rezone approximately 1.47 acres from highway commercial to residential (R-6). The property is (Please turn to Page 6)

## Ayden To Buy Old School Property

The Pitt County Board of Education has agreed to sell the old Ayden Middle School property to the town of Ayden for \$150,000 to be paid in three one-year installments.

The board voted to accept Ayden's offer at its monthly meeting Tuesday. Three installments of \$50,000 will be made to the county schools annually beginning in 1985. The property is located on South Lee Street in Ayden.

The board also approved a transfer of \$325,284 from the current expense fund balance to capital outlay to complete the new Ayden Middle School.

"As you recall we began the project recognizing that we would be short of funds necessary to compete the project," school Superintendent Eddie West told board members. "To assure completion we are recommending that this sum be transferred. We will utilize funds received from the sale of the old Ayden Middle School to offset funds transferred."

The board also revised its exam exemption policy for students for 1984-85 to prevent students with a C average from bypassing exams. Currently, students with A, B and C averages and the appropriate number of absences are exempt from final exams. Next year, according to the new policy, only students with A and B averages and the right number of absences will be exempt.

"It concerns me and has since we adopted that policy that we are

rewarding students with C averages," board member Anne McGaughey said. "Students with A and B averages I can see, but not those earning C's."

Associate Superintendent John McKnight reported to the board he had received the same comment from numerous parents and recommended the board revise the exam exemption policy to exclude students with C averages.

The board also considered revising its school attendance policy to reduce the number of absences allowed per school year before

automatically failing the class.

Currently, a student who is absent a total of 30 days per class per period automatically fails the work for that class for the school year. This policy includes excused and unexcused absences.

Board members discussed lowering the number of absences allowed before failure to 20, 15 or three, but no changes were made for the 1984-85 school year. A study on the numbers of students affected in the upcoming school year by a change to 20 days was requested.

In other business:

\*The board voted to reduce the instructional fee for typing students to \$4.50 a semester for 1984-85. The fee was \$7.50 a semester. Other fees for the coming school year were approved at the previous levels. According to Superintendent West, the county will begin a phased-in elimination of fees in 1985-86. "We had hoped to begin (eliminating fees) this school year but for budgetary reasons I believe we must hold off on that until 1985-86," he said.

## PCMH Proposes Rate Increase

Pitt County Memorial Hospital rates for the fiscal year which begins Oct. 1 will be higher in virtually every category, according to room rate adjustments and a budget approved Tuesday night by hospital trustees. The budget and the room rate changes will now go to the Pitt County Commissioners and then to Blue Cross-Blue Shield for approval before final adoption.

If adopted as approved by the board, regular room rates for adult patients will be up from \$160 to \$168 a day; pediatrics up from \$185 to \$205. The cost of a day in the newborn nursery will be up from \$135 to \$155. Rehabilitation care will be up from \$185 to \$205; psychiatric

care up from \$160 to \$185. Intensive care rates will be up as follows: pediatric, from \$425 to \$485; neonatal, from \$475 to \$555, and adult from \$425 to \$550. Intermediate neonatal care will be up from \$375 to \$455; intermediate critical care for adults — no rate designated before, to be \$485.

The board approved a budget that reflects a projected gross revenue of \$83,685,117 and projected expenses of \$68,648,184. This is an expected 9 percent smaller revenue than last year's budget projected; with expenses projected to be 7 percent less. Patient days, even with the addition of the cardiac surgery and radiation therapy units to the hospital, are expected to be down from a projected 150,000 before Oct. 1 to

149,602 after Oct. 1. Deductions from revenue (bad debts, contractual adjustments with Medicaid-Medicare, etc.) are expected to be \$17,593,053. Other income from the medical school, the Eastern Area Health Education Center, cafeteria sales, etc., is expected to be \$6,662,872. Included in the budget is an allowance for an average 6 percent adjustment in employee compensation to be administered through a pay-for-job performance plan. These pay increases will become effective Oct. 1.

After some discussion, approval was given for the inclusion of a helicopter ambulance service in the hospital's services. State certificate of need and local Health Systems (Please turn to page 16)

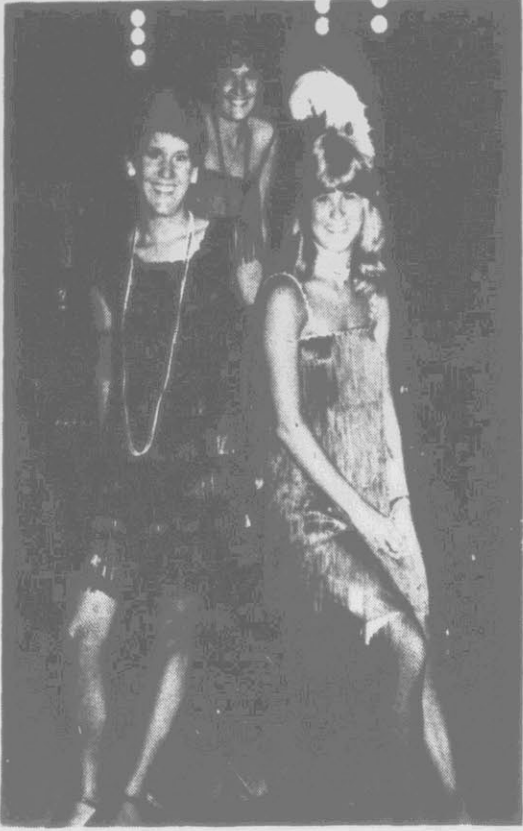

We bought her only educational toys... large, expensive wood blocks that encouraged dexterity and modeling clay that nurtured creativity. She smashed the wood through a glass coffee table and forced the clay up her nose.

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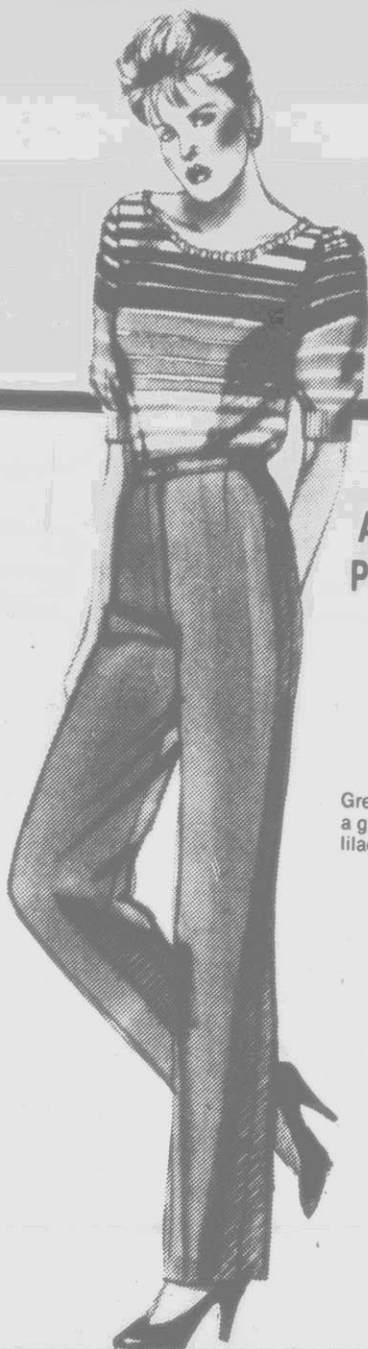
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# Editorials

## Rhetoric To Await

Small wonder spokesmen for Gov. Jim Hunt and Sen. Jesse Helms sound enthusiastic over an agreement to hold five debates before the Nov. 6 elections for U.S. Senate.

There have been too many echoes of dismay over conduct of the campaign across the state; we have yet to see one smile of approval.

The campaign to date has been a saturation of television advertising with innuendo and half-truths and subtle implications by anonymous voices carrying overtones of "reasoned" disapproval, and accompanying queries for the target to answer ... but impossible to respond to in a 30-second format and in some cases would require several minutes. They are posed that way not for reply but to raise doubts and keep the respondent on the defensive.

North Carolinians know the tactic well. It debuted four years ago. The Daily Reflector despised it then and with the increased bitterness this year our disapproval has proportionately mounted. It demeans the office of United States senator.

There is yet another basis for relief and pleasure at the prospect of public debates; the race could end up costing the rivals some \$20 million ... an unprecedented price for a U.S. Senate seat. It is beyond reason. It is madness. The face-to-face meetings might resolve some of the frustrations over domination of the race by televised advertisements. Too, it will give the voters a true taste of the issues and an opportunity to make an intelligent decision.

Of course, all five debates might never be consummated.

A candidate who fears the encounter put him at a disadvantage may resort anew to inflammatory TV spots. It invites a retaliatory vote of rejection by the public.

Tentatively, Mr. Hunt and Mr. Helms will be debating in late July or early August and again on Oct. 13. The other three meetings have not yet been fixed. There is no assurance the remaining three will be held other than via Tuesday's announcement. Agreements can be broken through pique or emergence of "other commitments."

So don't hold your breath. You might turn blue.

## Ice Is Broken

When the novelty of a woman running for vice president wears thin, U.S. Rep. Geraldine Ferraro of New York is going to be looked upon first as a candidate and judged accordingly.

To win her seat in Congress Rep. Ferraro had to demonstrate a quality of political savvy and an ability to identify herself as reflecting the attitudes and opinions of voters in her district. Now she must extend that to a nationwide constituency. It won't be easy.

Her staff members will be the key ... providing position papers in keeping with those of Walter Mondale and the Democrat Party, they will also give the candidate tip-sheets on points to bring out before audiences of different backgrounds; they will ensure travel arrangements and scheduling do not become hopelessly snarled. The rest is largely in her hands.

Candidate Ferraro will make mistakes. There's too much room for error to think otherwise. Hopefully, for the lady herself and for those who come after her, the stress of campaigning will not prove shattering.

Whatever the outcome we're rather pleased the ice has been broken insofar as choosing a woman to run for the vice presidency.

A few countries with democratic traditions have chosen women to head their government, and presumably that, too, will come to pass in the United States.

In this country, the rules of political warfare are on the loose side and electioneering sometimes shapes up as a no-holds-barred brawl. Maybe a lingering sense of chivalry has persisted, with the idea of avoiding the custom of shoveling verbal abuse on somebody's wife or mother.

The coming campaign may provide indicators of what to expect in the future. It will be well worth watching.

RALEIGH — North Carolina is beginning to debate a "woman's issue" which has the potential of being as controversial in the 1980s as the Equal Rights Amendment was in the 1970s. In addition, the issue — called "comparable worth" — has the potential of costing the state millions of dollars in higher salaries for its employees.

The issue of comparable worth is based on the fact that jobs which have traditionally been filled by women pay less than those traditionally held by men — even if the woman's job holds more rigorous qualifications than the man's job. Advocates of comparable worth

often cite the low pay of highly educated librarians — usually women — against the higher pay of groundskeepers who are usually men.

During its 1984 session, the General Assembly appropriated \$650,000 to hire a private consultant to develop a "point factor system" for setting salaries of state employees. The aim of the system will be to place a point value on every job in state government and then to adjust the salary schedules to reflect these point values.

In determining a job's point value, the consultants will consider a number of factors, says Sen. Wilma

Woodard, D-Wake, a leading proponent of comparable worth. "They'll look at working conditions, experience, education and the levels of responsibility required for a job. For example, highway patrolmen and psychiatric nurses — people who face danger — would get extra points to compensate them for that danger. Also, those in supervisory positions would get extra points, as would those whose jobs require considerable education, like a librarian."

"It will, by 1986, have revamped, completely and entirely, the state personnel system and everybody will be reclassified," she says. "This

is something that was long overdue. The current system is archaic. It was passed in 1949 and in past years we've only been able to do minor surgery to it, helping nurses and highway patrolmen and prison guards."

Mrs. Woodard says she's certain that "we're going to find a lot of underpaid classifications that are held by women." But she suspects that there'll be some jobs held by men which will also be found to be worth more than the state is currently paying. For example, prison guards.

Once the study is completed, Mrs. Woodard hopes the Legislature will come through with the money needed to implement the system. "I don't know how much it will cost. That's what the study will show us. But we're talking lots of money, lots of money, \$50, \$60, \$70 million if the system's as bad as it might be."

Mrs. Woodard hopes the system could be phased in over several years. The Legislature should put money in a fund that would be used to raise the salaries of workers the study finds to have been shortchanged. The raises would come in steps until parity was achieved. For workers whose jobs were being overcompensated, there would be no salary cuts, Mrs. Woodard said. But as new people were hired to fill those jobs, they'd be paid a salary in line with the point factor system.

Point factor personnel systems are new to North Carolina but some of the state's largest employers use them, Mrs. Woodard said. R.J. Reynolds, Duke Power, Carolina Power and Light and Hardee's and 25 or 30 other firms use some form of a point factor system, she said.

The Legislature has directed that the contract on the consultant's study be let by December.

If Notre Dame-educated, pro-US moderate Duarte is a threat to our national interests in Central and South America, let us all hope that Duarte clones spring up to replace the Samozas and Pinochets and Galtieris that Helms has embraced throughout his bizarre, embarrassing tenure as our senior senator — the one and only U.S. senator opposed to our foremost ally, Great Britain, in its battle to retake the Falkland Islands.

Jesse Helms has a pathological need to stand alone on the world stage, or so it would seem. Let's allow him to carry on his foolishness — as a private citizen.

## Sense Of Relief

SAN FRANCISCO — A reason for the immense sense of relief brought to the Democratic Party by the selection of Rep. Geraldine Ferraro is how close Walter F. Mondale came to picking Mayor Dianne Feinstein of San Francisco.

As late as the night of July 10 Ms. Feinstein was Mondale's first choice but nobody saluted that flag. An unfavorable reaction by Mondale supporters spurred second thoughts by the prospective presidential nominee. Thanks to Mondale's incredibly inept vice presidential selection process, the only viable alternative was the congresswoman from Queens.

Although the process ended with the same disorder as it began, the conclusion was far better than any Democrat could have hoped for even a few days earlier. Whatever her limitations in amassing electoral votes, Ms. Ferraro does give Mondale a badly needed positive burst at the convention — and that's more than most running mates ever provide.

Such an outcome hardly seemed possible just one week before the convention. Thanks to the North Oaks, Minn., selection process, Mondale was backed into a corner with limited options.

He was uncomfortable with Sen. Gary Hart, popular choice of the delegates, and struck him from the list. By this time, no white male Southerner was left. The distinguished Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas had been eliminated with brutal insensitivity, contributing to the decision by Sen. Dale Bumpers of Arkansas to pull out.

The real choice by the Mondale inner circle was New York's Gov. Mario Cuomo as a charismatic comer who could energize the convention and a passionate New Deal liberal trusted and liked by Mondale.

John Reilly, the old Washington hand serving as Mondale's "senior counselor," wanted an overt appeal made to Cuomo asking him to run despite his 1982 pledge to New York voters that he would not seek national office in 1984.

It was at Reilly's urging that Mondale met with Cuomo in Boston July 5. When the governor gave no slight sign of bending, the former vice president made no appeal.

Three days later, Mondale lawyers began background checks on four possibilities: Ms. Ferraro, Ms. Feinstein, Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio and Gov. Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts. But of these four, Ms. Feinstein was clearly the first choice. She had enchanted Mondale in their North Oaks interview.

Enchantment was not the word for Mondale's meeting with Rep. Ferraro. He complained after his first session with her as Platform Committee chairman that she let the staff director, Harvard law professor Susan Estrich, answer all the tough questions. Staff leaks that Ms. Ferraro came over as too political in her vice presidential interview probably reflected Mondale's own view.

But the Feinstein trial balloon was sinking quickly. Did Mondale really want a thrice-married, once-divorced Jewish woman who had made unavoidable political accommodations with the San Francisco homosexual community and who lacked experience above the municipal level? Besides, Mondale's background checkers wanted more information about the export-import business carried on by her husband.

If not Ms. Feinstein, who? Cisneros, a 37-year-old Hispanic, represented the highest-risk politics. Mondale likes and admires Dukakis, but the time for a white-skinned

male had passed. It was back to Ms. Ferraro.

Ironically, but not intentionally, mishandling the selection process had made Mondale's choice of a woman more acceptable. The negative comments about Ms. Ferraro a week earlier had the effect, though surely not the intention, of making her choice seem less a pandering to the feminist lobby. And Geraldine Ferraro had the virtue of not being Dianne Feinstein.

Democratic politicians still worry about Ms. Ferraro's ability to perform on a broader stage. Speaking here Wednesday, she blundered by promising U.S. air, sea and land intervention in the Persian Gulf if necessary.

**Prepare Child for Kindergarten**  
Children enter kindergarten with feelings that range all the way from sheer excitement to absolute fear. But children who are prepared for school have a better chance of working through these feelings and gaining self-confidence than do children who haven't been prepared. So do all you can to help your child get ready for kindergarten.

Keep in mind that when your youngster goes to school, he'll take all of his experiences with him. So give him opportunities for gaining self-confidence, learning new ideas, trying new activities, and listening and sharing.

Also encourage your pre-kindergartener to accept mistakes and disappointments.

One of the important things your child can learn during the early years is that he's okay. It's only

when your child learns to accept himself that he will learn to accept others.

There are some additional things you can do to help your child get ready for his kindergarten experience:

•Take your child on a visit to the school, school grounds and play yard.

•Also let him spend some time with an adult relative or neighbor. That way, he can get used to doing some things without having you nearby.

•And by all means, make sure your child can state his name and address, understand and follow simple directions, talk clearly, take care of his toilet needs and obey traffic rules.

•Remember that your child's school day starts at home. Therefore, see that he gets plenty of rest, eats a good breakfast, gets up early enough to get to school on time and starts the day in a happy mood.

## Make a Child's Room a Special Place

A child's room is much more than a place to sleep. It should be a fun, lively, colorful, yet durable place.

Space and privacy needs change as a child grows older, but that doesn't mean you need to spend a lot of money redecorating the room. The key is to plan the decor and use materials suited to different age levels. For example, simple furniture can last from toddler to teenager. After buying the basic

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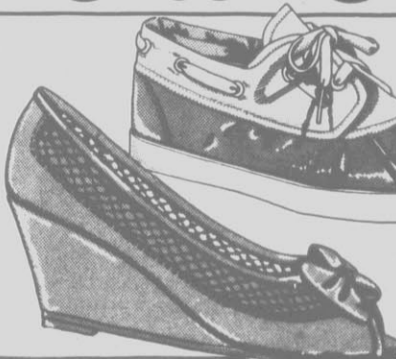
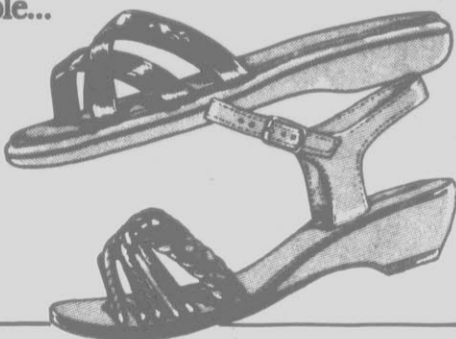
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# Democrats To Deliver Nomination Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Democrats deliver their presidential nomination tonight to battle-scarred Walter F. Mondale, ending the long season of setbacks and comebacks that kept him in combat against two bogged rivals almost to his hour of victory.

In their hearts they must have known they were whipped, but the Rev. Jesse Jackson and Sen. Gary Hart — one the candidate of the dispossessed and the other a new voice from the West — would not say so.

But Jackson removed the prospect that he might walk away from the party this year, telling delegates in a stirring prime-time television speech, "I will be proud to support the nominee of this convention for the presidency of the United States."

With 1,967 delegates' votes needed, Mondale had more than 2,100. Triumph, at last, was in sight.

Only massive defections by Hispanic and black delegates to the Democratic National Convention could derail Mondale's first-ballot victory. Jackson sought exactly that, and some Hispanics plotted a symbolic abstention to flex their muscles, but it was mostly talk. Mondale's strength held firm.

But playing it safe to the last, Mondale was courting the constituencies today with visits to caucuses of Hispanic and black delegates to put down those threat of rebellion.

At most, the attempt to deny Mondale a first-ballot victory seemed to cost him a handful of delegates, and he had scores to

spare. So tonight, with the first call of the roll, the delegates are expected to award their nomination to a familiar figure on the American scene, the protégé of Jimmy Carter and then of Jimmy Carter.

On Thursday, the vice presidential nomination will be awarded to his choice, Geraldine Ferraro, new to the national scene but a hit at this convention wherever she goes.

Son of the Minnesota plains, Mondale is a spokesman for rockbed American liberalism — "just plain old, ordinary Fritz Mondale," as he said across the country, appealing to the old New Deal coalitions to come to the aid of a man they knew and understood.

Hart and Jackson refused to make it easy for Mondale, however. They

were carrying the fight into the presidential balloting, refusing to concede or withdraw.

Jackson asked the delegates for their support on the first ballot "as a vote for a new direction for this party and this nation." Yet his conciliatory tone and pledge to support the eventual nominee united the hall in hand-clasped warmth and drew praise from some Jewish leaders for his apologies for old wounds.

Hart was still saying he is in the race for the good of the party as the candidate most likely to beat President Reagan in November.

Skirmishes over the platform Tuesday demonstrated decisively that Mondale has the delegates to win. His forces proved their loyalty.

Mondale compromised where he could, prevailed where he had to. No planks that Mondale opposed made it into the platform.

The Hispanic threat was a way of

protesting the immigration control bill that has passed the House and Senate, with bipartisan support, and may be sent to Reagan for his signature later this summer.

Across the state, all incumbents except Sen. Dallas Alford, D-Nash, emerged victorious the five other legislative districts revised this year under court order.

Veteran Sen. J.J. "Monk" Harrington, D-Bertie, won the 2nd Senate District nomination over two black challengers.

Meanwhile, three 14th Senate District Democratic incumbents won re-nomination and three Republicans were nominated to challenge them in November.

Sen. Jim Speed, D-Franklin, overwhelmed two Democratic opponents to win re-nomination in the 14th Senate District. In the 61st House District Democratic runoff, former Rep. Casper Holroyd defeated Raleigh lawyer Brenton Adams.

Runoffs, where needed, will be held Aug. 14. Under state law, if no candidate gets more than 50 percent of the vote the second-place finisher can call for a runoff.

The 2nd and 6th Senate Districts have heavy black populations and underwent substantial revision as the Legislature sought to comply with a court order to increase black voters' clout.

Harrington got 7,755 votes or 57 percent in unofficial returns. William R. Lewis received 3,509 votes or 26 percent and John B.

Moore got 2,287 votes or 17 percent.

In the 10th Senate District, Alford was upset by James E. Ezell, who got 7,013 votes or 53 percent to 6,179 or 47 percent for the incumbent.

Speed got 4,555 votes or 81 percent to Tommie Pearce's 848 votes or 15 percent and Melvin Holmes' 220 votes or 4 percent.

State Sens. Wilma Woodard, D-Wake, Joe Johnson, D-Wake, and Bill Staton, D-Lee, withstood a 14th District challenge from Democrat J.K. Sherron, a former state Department of Administration official.

Mrs. Woodard received 10,563 votes or 27 percent, followed by Staton with 9,978 votes or 26 percent, Johnson with 9,137 votes or 24 percent and Sherron with 8,935 votes or 23 percent.

GOP winners were Paul Stam Jr. with 990 votes or 31 percent, Paul Smith with 790 votes or 25 percent, and Allan Schwartz with 753 votes or 24 percent. Eliminated was C.S.

"Cookie" McGee with 671 votes or 21 percent.

In the 61st House District runoff, Holroyd bested Adams, 2,618 votes or 56 percent to 2,054 votes or 44 percent.

The drowning happened at the child's home in the Old Farm section of Spring Lake.

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# Hart, Jackson Make Marks On Platform

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — The party platform that Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro will carry into their campaign to unseat President Reagan bears the marks of Gary Hart and the Rev. Jesse Jackson.

The Democratic National Convention adopted the 35,000-word document Tuesday after Mondale agreed to support a Hart plank spelling out restrictions on use of U.S. military might overseas and a compromise Jackson plank on affirmative action programs for minorities.

Three other Jackson planks — advocating reductions in military spending, a "no first use" policy for nuclear weapons and elimination of runoff primaries in the South —

were rejected by delegates. "Gary Hart won one, and we did what was needed to do and maintained our votes on the other three," said Mondale campaign chairman James Johnson.

The Hart plank stipulates that a Democratic president would not commit troops in parts of the world where U.S. goals were not clear, where diplomatic channels had not been exhausted and if the cost of such an operation outweighed benefits. Hart delegates said the plank was intended to refer primarily to Central America and, to a lesser extent, the Middle East.

The vote on Hart's plank was 3,271.8 in favor and 351.2 against.

The fractional votes occurred because some delegations have more people than votes.

Computer terminals placed by each state delegation helped tabulate the vote — a first at a national political convention.

The compromise Jackson plank, adopted by voice vote, supported the use of "goals, timetables and other verifiable measures" to combat discrimination in employment, housing and education. Mondale gave his support after Jackson backed away from a stronger measure that advocated racial quotas in some circumstances.

The debate over the platform was far more civil than in 1980, when forces loyal to then-President Carter and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy bat-

led over 23 separate minority planks. But emotions did rise Tuesday during debate on Jackson's plank involving runoff primaries, which Jackson considers discriminatory against black candidates.

Many black Jackson delegates booed and hissed the black mayor of Atlanta, Andrew Young, when he opposed the plank as being more stringent than needed to root out discrimination in voting practices.

Runoff primaries are held when a candidate fails to receive 50 percent of the vote the first time around. Ten states, most of them in the South, follow such a practice.

The Jackson plank was rejected 2,500.8 to 1,253.2.

Delegates also turned down, 2,216.3 to 1,405.7, a Jackson proposal insisting on a "no first use" policy for nuclear weapons. And it rejected, 2,591.6 to 1,127.6, the Jackson plank calling for "substantial cuts" in defense spending.

Even before Tuesday's session, the platform contained numerous contributions from the Hart and Jackson campaigns. All three can-

didates endorsed the platform, which was adopted by delegates by a unanimous voice vote.

The platform criticizes Reagan's "government by subtraction," blasts soaring federal deficits under his term and calls for a nuclear weapons freeze, ratification of a new Equal Rights Amendment, revitalization of older industries and tough new environmental laws.

# Jackson Gives Unity 'Sermon'

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — The Rev. Jesse Jackson, who has sometimes divided Democrat from Democrat, comes to the end of his path-breaking campaign for the presidency with the applause still echoing for his climactic sermon of unity and redemption.

With the eloquence that has lifted many audiences, the civil rights leader made an extraordinary plea for forgiveness in a prime-time address to the convention Tuesday night. Tears flowed from many delegates.

"If in my low moments, in word, deed or attitude, through some error of temper, taste or tone, I have caused anyone discomfort, created pain or revived someone's fears, please forgive me," he asked the Democratic National Convention.

Applause was frequent. "Powerful, compelling, a stirring moral appeal to our nation for justice," said Walter F. Mondale, the man who will win the presidential nomination on tonight's roll call.

"It was superb," added former rival, Sen. Ernest Hollings of South Carolina.

The stirring message — interrupted 34 times by applause — was also the last major act of Jackson's bid for the nomination. With Mondale's formal victory tonight, the black leader's campaign officially comes to an end.

With a final flourish Tuesday, Jackson repeated the plea he has made often in past weeks, asking for "a vote of conscience" on the first ballot.

After such a plea to the caucus of black delegates, they voted to back

Jackson. But interviews with black delegates turned up no evidence the applause Tuesday would be joined by the votes of Mondale or Hart delegates tonight.

And Jackson quickly added: "There is a time to compete and a time to cooperate... I will be proud to support the nominee of this convention for the presidency of the United States."

The speech included a long passage asking Jewish Americans to work with blacks once again, a plea stemming from the controversy following Jackson's reference to Jews as "Hymies" and his slowness in separating himself from Black Muslim leader Louis Farrakhan, who has been accused of anti-Semitism.

"Our communities, black and Jewish, are in anguish, anger and pain."

Jackson said. "We must turn to each other and not on each other and chose higher ground."

Jewish leaders responded favorably to Jackson's pleas but said much has to be done to overcome some of his previous comments and those by some of his supporters.

"One speech does not in itself undo all that has gone before," said Henry Siegan, executive director of the American Jewish Congress in New York. "But we are encouraged by his effort to heal the wounds, and by the apology he uttered for the pain he caused."

Rabbi David Saperstein, director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism in Washington, D.C., said he was "gratified by...the generous and conciliatory tone he adopted tonight."



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## Ferraro Thriving As Convention Star

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — Moving around the city as nominee-in-waiting, Geraldine Ferraro used New York style to woo Southern Democrats. "I may talk funny, OK," she allowed. "We all accept that. But I think we all care about the same things."

To female delegates and political leaders who helped engineer her selection as the first woman to run for vice president, she offered a Yiddish word for congratulations: "Mazel tov."

And to members of her home state delegation who cried and cheered and hugged each other when she appeared at their Tuesday brunch, she cracked: "What a bunch of rabble-rousers."

Gerry Ferraro is in high gear, thriving in her new role as Walter Mondale's anointed running mate.

For every group, she has a quip, a message. For every day, a different colorful outfit — and so far, all clothes she has already worn in Congress.

At almost every spot, she is greeted with rhythmic clapping and a chant: "Ger-ry, Ger-ry."

Secret Service men and woman track her every step. Reporters who predicted she never had a chance to be selected now beg for interviews. And in public appearances, staff members form a human wall with their arms to keep well-wishers from knocking her over.

For just a little peace and privacy, she orders meals from room service.

"She's doing great, just great," said Rep. Barbara Mikulski, a close friend and colleague who said she had an early morning meeting with Ms. Ferraro. The two discussed convention business while Ms. Ferraro stood in her hotel room bathroom drying her hair.



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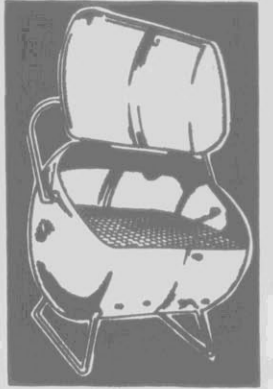
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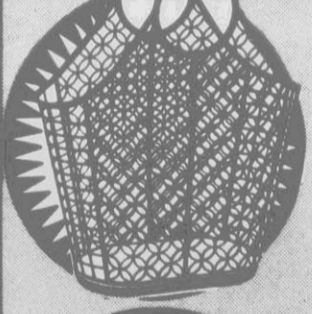
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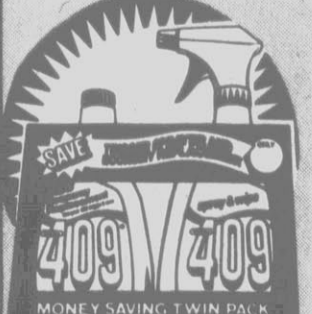
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# Convention-Goers Learn The Art Of Waiting

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — If you, too, would like to attend a Democratic National Convention, you'll have to wait.

You'll have to wait to get a hot dog, wait to buy a stamp, wait to use a pay phone. You will wait for a cab until your feet grow numb. Just to get into the convention hall at the height of the crush, you will wait 45 minutes.

David Brinkley waited 2½ hours to check into his \$250-a-night suite at the St. Francis Hotel.

Paul O'Dwyer's wait was even more frustrating. O'Dwyer, the feisty Democratic maverick from New York, a member of the party's platform committee, was told to pick up his ticket at the gate reserved for

special guests — the VIP gate. He waited a solid hour.

"We are Democrats," he said, "and we expect a certain amount of confusion, but this is beyond the pale."

"Governors were in that line. Our state chairman, Dominic Baranello, was in that line. You expect better treatment," O'Dwyer said.

Jesse Jackson's state chairman from Arkansas, William H. Clemmons Jr., expected better, too. All he wanted was to make a phone call.

"The lines at the pay phone banks, all of them, were too long to contend with. I toured them about every 20 minutes to see if they got shorter.

They never did."

With more than 30,000 people here for the convention, the entire downtown area is bustling, to say the least. A delegate from rural Louisiana, waiting at a street light, said, "It's like the World's Fair with hills."

When all or most of them pour into the convention center, things get tight.

At the rear of the hall, just off the convention floor, peddlers have set up shop along a 10-foot-wide corridor to sell souvenirs, fast food, ice cream: a Mideast bazaar in Moscone Center. As the lines form at the peddlers' stalls, the corridor

becomes as crowded as a cattle truck. At times, movement in both directions just stops. Pedlock.

Lines everywhere. Lines to get in, lines to get out. Lines of buses. Lines of tow trucks. Lines of trailers, 50 of them, for TV equipment: communication lines.

Monday, a line of cops tossed a line of people with strangely colored hair into a line of paddy wagons and hauled them to the police station where they lined them up and booked them.

The line to end all lines was the line to get into California Assembly Speaker Willie Brown's big bash on the waterfront.

He had invited 10,000 of his intimate friends, some of whom got there in a line of 74 buses from the convention hall, got off the buses and lined up with those who walked.

An hour after the party started the line outside was still two blocks long and 20 people abreast. How long did they wait? "I don't know," said Elaine Lucas, a delegate from Macon, Ga., "I stood so long, I lost track."

Ms. Lucas, questioned while she was standing in line at the post office counter at the convention hall, said she was glad she stuck it out because the party was worth it.

Carole Feldman found that out the hard way.

Ms. Feldman, an Associated Press reporter from Washington, D.C., stood patiently in the line going into the party. Somehow that line got mixed up with the line going out, and she was back where she started. A friendly policeman expedited her second assault, and she made it.

Security guards at the convention center's entrances said they have had surprisingly few complaints about the long waits.

"I guess everybody realizes the security screening is necessary," a guard supervisor said. "But we're getting more proficient at it. I can assure you it will get better."

That seems to be the party line.

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## Last Speaker

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — It was late and the Democratic National Convention was in its ninth hour when Rep. Steven Solarz of New York stepped to the rostrum to be eloquent before nearly 12,000 empty seats.

He was reminded, the congressman said, of the political candidates' night that featured 30 speakers. By the time the 29th speaker got up, only one man was still in the audience.

The candidate told the man that before he started his speech, he wanted to know why the man had stayed when all others have left, Solarz related.

"Because," said the man, "I'm the next speaker."

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## Postal Unions Break Off Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two postal union presidents, who broke off contract talks with the U.S. Postal Service, say they can't discount the possibility of illegal wildcat strikes if they fail to reach agreements this weekend.

Moe Biller, president of the American Postal Workers Union, and Vincent Sombrotto, head of the National Association of Letter Carriers, also refused Tuesday to rule out a nationwide strike — but said their unions wouldn't consider a general work stoppage until their national conventions met Aug. 19.

Any type of walkout by the nation's 600,000 union-covered postal employees is illegal. The Postal Service fired the majority of the 226 workers who staged wildcat strikes in 1978 in four New Jersey and California locations.

Sombrotto said he and Biller left the bargaining table after management negotiators called union economic demands "unacceptable" and refused to budge from their proposal for three-year wage freeze for current employees.

More than 500,000 workers are represented by the two unions, whose members handle one-third of the mail volume of the western world — sorting it, delivering it and selling the 29 billion stamps that the Postal Service says would stretch around the globe 19 times.

The two unions are negotiating jointly. Their contracts expire at 12:01 a.m. EDT Saturday, as do the contracts of two smaller unions

which are bargaining separately. The independent National Rural Letter Carriers Association and the Mail Handlers, a division of Laborers International, whose members move heavy mailbags, are still meeting with management.

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## President Will Sign Deficit Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is signing a mixed bag of tax increases and spending cuts intended to cut about 10 percent of the \$600 billion in federal budget deficits expected through 1987.

Facing a re-election campaign in which he is likely to be reminded that he promised four years ago to balance the federal budget, Reagan pushed hard for passage of the legislation.

The president has been on a legislation-signing spree lately as the bills Congress passed before adjourning are making their way to the White House.

The president was putting his signature today on what has come to be known as the deficit-reduction package, although deputy press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said late Tuesday that it hadn't been decided yet whether to hold a ceremony for

the occasion.

The bill would require investors, savers, telephone users, drinkers and businesses to carry an extra share of the burden of reducing the deficit.

Although the bill amounts to the third major tax increase in three years, few of its hundreds of provisions would have a major effect on any taxpayer. The measure makes no significant changes in the across-the-board tax cut enacted in 1981 — the centerpiece of Reagan's economic program.

The bill would raise taxes by \$50 billion through 1987 and cut the growth of federal spending by about \$13 billion. More than \$11 billion of the spending changes would be in social programs, mainly in the Medicare health care program for the elderly and disabled.

Medicare payments to doctors would be frozen for 15 months and beneficiaries would have to pay an extra \$1.40 a month for coverage of doctors' fees by 1986.

## Son Charged In Father's Robbery, Death

NEW YORK (AP) — When Gentry Little came home on payday his 14-year-old son was waiting for him — with the floor slicked by oil, bleach to throw in his face, a knife to stab him with and a golf club to smash his head, police said.

By the time the 60-year-old Little was found the next day he was brain-dead. His heart stopped three weeks later, and on Tuesday his son and an alleged accomplice were charged with murder.

Authorities said the motive for the attack by Clayton Little and 18-year-old Ismael Velaz, both of the Bronx, was robbery — of \$260, which they split.

"They bought sneakers for their girlfriends and took them out," said Detective Sgt. Richard Klev.

The elder Little, a Housing Authority caretaker who was separated from Clayton's mother, "was

well-liked in the neighborhood and known as a generous guy. He gave his son money," Klev said. "We couldn't find anything negative about him."

On Friday afternoon, June 22, the youths broke into Little's apartment, knowing he would be coming home that night with his week's pay, police said.

The teen-agers spilled oil on the floor and waited for him with bleach, a knife and a golf club, Klev said.

When Little entered the apartment they threw the bleach in his face, blinding him, and the man slipped on the oil and fell. The youths then stabbed him repeatedly until the knife broke, Klev said.

Then one of the teen-agers slammed Little's head five times with a four-iron golf club.

The pair fled, "leaving him for dead on the floor," according to

police spokeswoman Officer Toni Ciardiello.

Little was discovered the next day by his brother-in-law after his wife, who lived in the Bronx with Clayton, said she wanted someone to check on him. Little was declared brain dead

at Harlem Hospital, but did not die until Monday, three weeks later.

The victim had worked for the Housing Authority for 27 years, according to authority spokesman Roy Metcalf. He would have turned 61 the day he died.

## Additional U.S. Grain Purchased

WASHINGTON (AP) — China and the Soviet Union have bought additional U.S. grain, including some for delivery next year, according to the Agriculture Department.

In separate deals announced Tuesday, China bought 300,000 tons of wheat for delivery in the 1984-85 marketing year that began on June 1. That included 210,000 tons for this calendar year and 90,000 tons in the first five months of 1985.

The 210,000 tons will be credited to China under terms of a long-term agreement with the United States, which operates on a calendar year basis. This is the fourth and final year of the pact, and there has been no indication that a new agreement is in the works.

If no new agreement is forthcoming, it means China will be operating in the regular U.S. market for the 90,000 tons specified for calendar 1985. The current pact is due to expire on Dec. 31.

Under the agreement, China is supposed to buy at least 6 million tons of wheat and corn annually. However, according to USDA's latest accounting, sales totaled only 3.83 million tons in 1983. The shortfall was a result of a trade dispute over U.S. import restrictions on Chinese textiles.

So far in 1984, including the latest sales, a total of 3.85 million tons, all wheat, have been purchased. China, however, has indicated to U.S. officials that it would live up to the agreement by making up for last year's shortfall.

A metric ton is about 2,205 pounds and is equal to 36.7 bushels of wheat or 39.4 bushels of corn.

Sales are made by private trading companies and then reported to USDA. No prices or terms are announced. However, at the current estimated farm price of about \$3.25 per bushel, the latest wheat sale of 300,000 tons — about 11 million bushels — would have a farm value of about \$36 million.

In the other sale, the Soviet Union bought 350,000 tons of corn for delivery after Oct. 1, the first grain to be purchased for delivery in 1984-85, the second year of Moscow's long-term agreement with the United States, which coincides with the U.S. fiscal year.

At USDA estimates of \$3.30 a bushel, the 13.8 million bushels of corn would have an estimated U.S. farm value of about \$45 million.

The Soviets have bought almost 12.4 million tons of wheat and corn under terms of the agreement for delivery in 1983-84, including 6.05 million tons of corn and 6.31 million tons of wheat. Also, 416,200 tons of soybeans have been sold.

## Driver Held

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A driver and bodyguard for two brothers, whose precious metals firm allegedly bilked thousands of investors, was ordered held without bond for allegedly killing one brother and stabbing the other.

James Joseph Doyle, 42, was charged with second-degree murder in the death Sunday of William Alderdice, 40, and with the attempted murder of James Alderdice. Doyle met the pair when the three were being held in the Metropolitan Correctional Institution in Dade County, police said.

## Brothers Charged

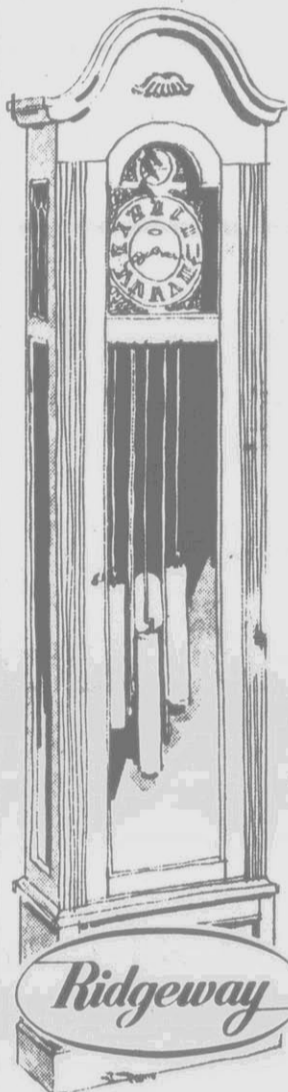
LOS ANGELES (AP) — A twin faces a maximum sentence of 27 years to life after he pleaded guilty to murder, while his brother awaits trial in another slaying.

Grant Christon, 22, pleaded guilty to the June 1983 slaying of Lamont Norwood, and is to be sentenced Sept. 6. Christon's twin, Kent, and another man are awaiting trial for the murder of a woman who was to testify against Grant Christon in the slaying of a cab driver.

Prosecutors were forced to drop charges against Grant Christon in that case after the witness was killed.

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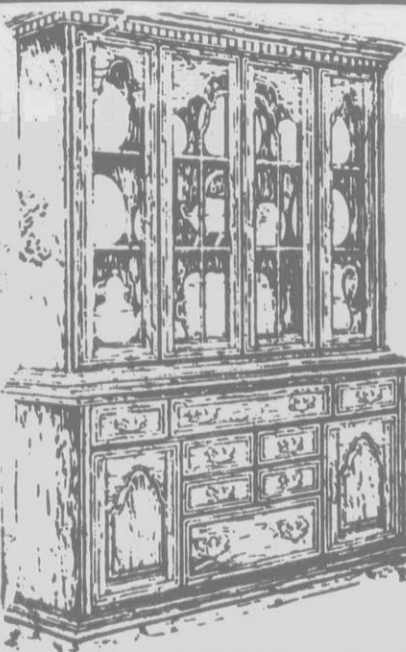
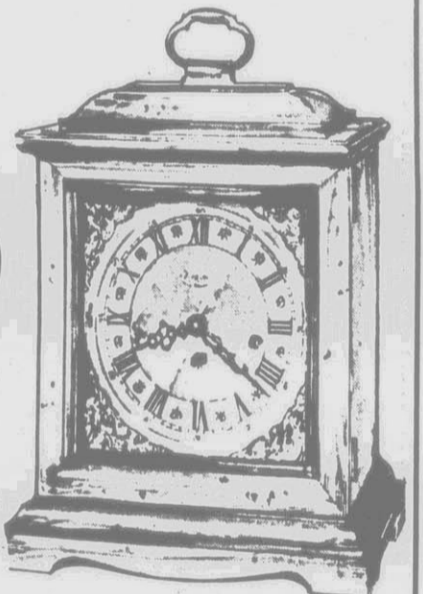


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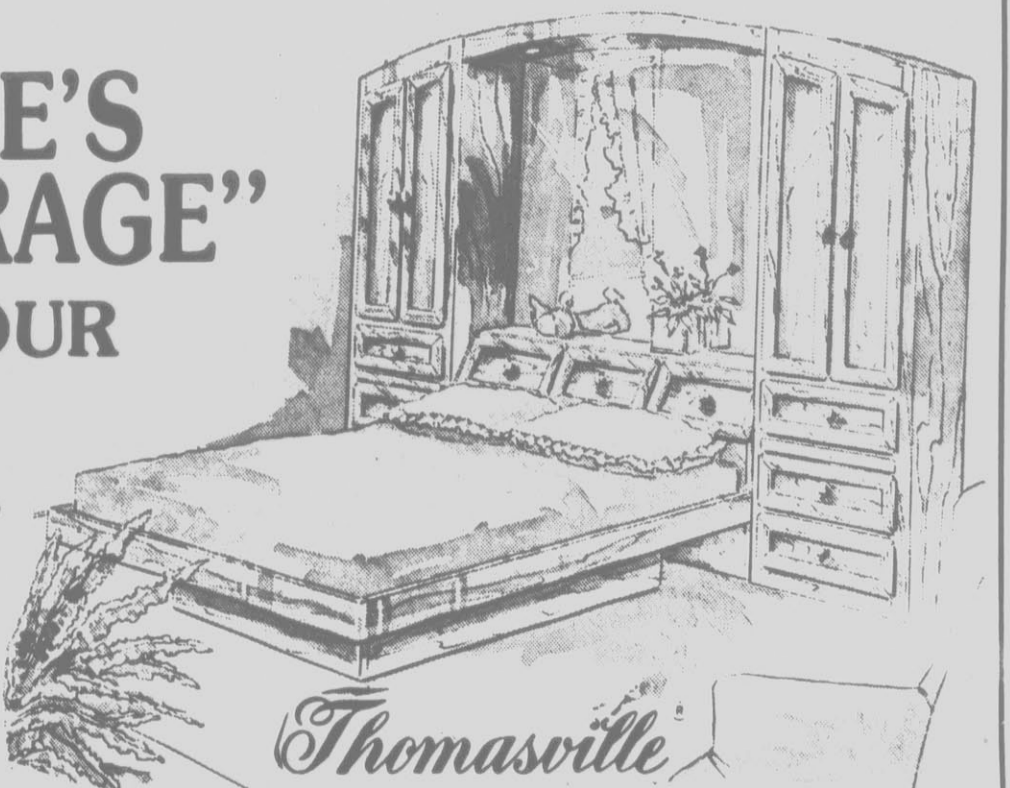
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# Housing Starts Increase In June By 5.3 Percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing starts climbed 5.3 percent in June, reversing a sharp decline in the previous month, the government said today. The increase was spurred by the biggest rise in multi-family units since September 1973.

Permits for new construction edged up 1.8 percent last month; they had tumbled 10 percent in May.

Spokesmen for the housing industry have complained that they're being hurt by high interest rates and that they see few prospects for those rates to fall significantly anytime soon.

Mortgage interest rates shot up in June to their highest levels in about

two years, putting home loans out of the reach of many homebuyers. Charges for conventional, fixed-rate mortgages stood at an average of 14.76 last month, according to a survey by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which oversees the savings and loan industry.

Indeed, today's report by the Commerce Department said the June increase was due to a gigantic 32.5 percent surge in starts for buildings with five units or more.

For single-family homes, it said, starts were down 7.2 percent last month after falling 3.8 percent in May.

Overall, the report said work was begun on new homes at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.9 million

units in June, up from the 1.8 million of May. Starts had plummeted 10.4 percent in May from the April rate.

Permit applications rose at an annual rate of 1.78 million, up from 1.75 million in May. That increase was also attributed to a burst in applications for buildings with five units or more.

June's housing starts were 9 percent above the year-ago level, and permit applications were 0.7 percent higher.

All the figures in today's report were adjusted for normal seasonal variations.

Before such adjustment, the report said, work was actually begun on about 185,400 new homes in June, up from 181,900 in May.

# EPA Launches Crackdown On Operators Of Landfills

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency says it doesn't know how many hazardous waste landfill operators are contaminating groundwater because few are making the right checks, but a top agency official says it will launch a new crackdown to prevent pollution.

The first step will be to make the 1,500 landfill operators apply for full-fledged permits next year, two or three years earlier than they expected.

Landfill operators were "grandfathered" by the 1976 hazardous waste law. They could operate under loose standards, pending full regulation, while EPA got around to calling on them to apply for permits.

Those standards called for an annual report to EPA and required monitoring to make sure that groundwater — which supplies half the nation's drinking water — was not being polluted by leaks from the dumps.

Internal studies have convinced the agency "it's extremely difficult to have full compliance in a self-implementing program," said Lee A. Thomas, assistant EPA administrator, at a luncheon meeting with reporters.

Or, as his aide Russ Dawson put it, "virtually no one was doing it right."

The agency cannot say how many of the landfills receiving toxic sub-

stances are polluting groundwater, because "the data we do have we don't think are reliable."

John Skinner, director of the office of solid waste under Thomas, said operators have put sampling wells in the wrong places; used polyvinyl chloride pipe, which contaminates samples, and made other mistakes in gathering data.

"You've got to fill your sample bottles all the way to the top. If you don't, (organic compounds) will vaporize when you open the bottle and it comes up clean when it's not," Skinner said.

As part of its new strategy, EPA will send headquarters experts to its regional offices in San Francisco

and New York City, and later to other regional headquarters, to train regional officials and their state counterparts about the law's requirements and how to meet them.

Then, those headquarters experts will accompany the officials they have trained on their first inspections. EPA hopes to inspect a third of the dumps in the first year of the new strategy, Thomas said.

Also, headquarters will require from the field an affirmative determination that other methods of disposal such as incineration are not suitable for hazardous material being taken out of abandoned dumps being cleaned up under the "superfund" program.

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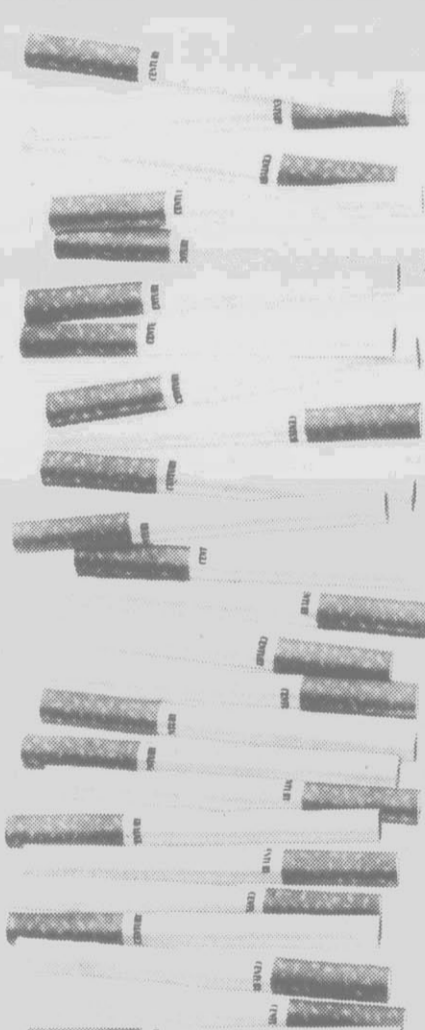
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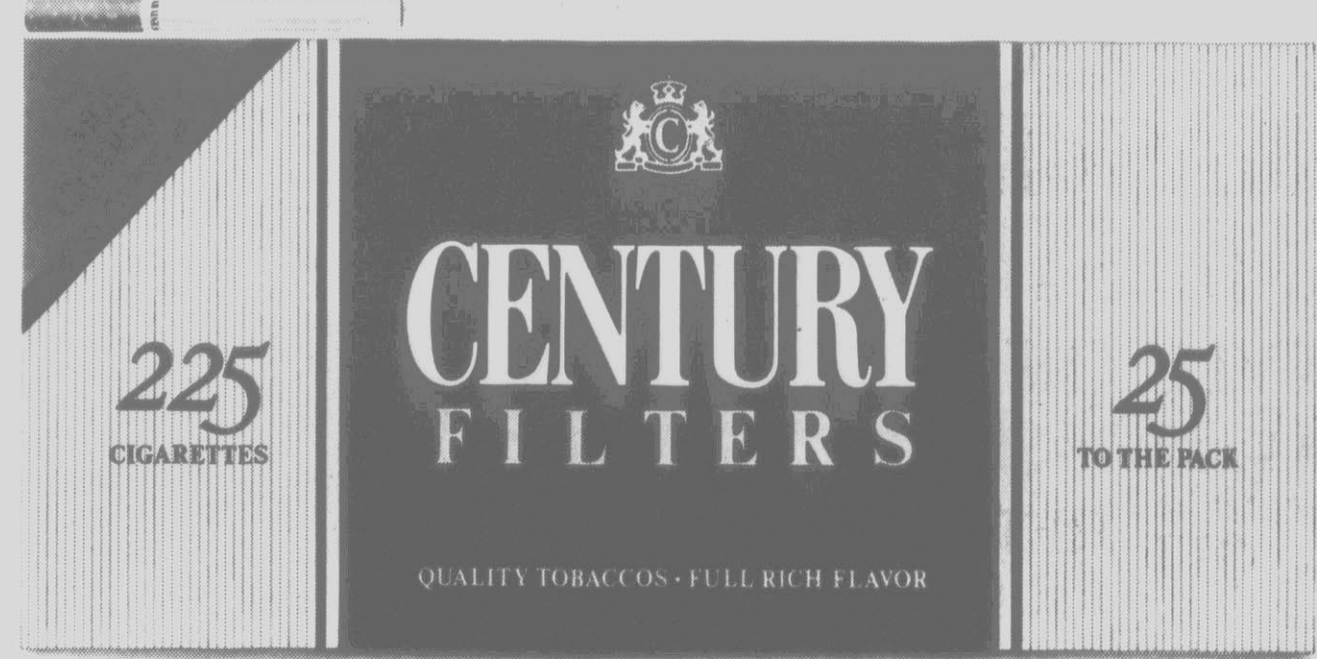
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# Jackson Trip Will Get OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House will not prevent the Rev. Jesse Jackson from traveling to the Soviet Union on humanitarian grounds to try to secure the release of Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov, a spokesman says.

Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes said Tuesday that "We certainly wouldn't stand in Reverend Jackson's way over going to the Soviet Union for humanitarian purposes to be helpful on the Sakharov matter if he could."

Speakes said no objection would be raised so long as the trip is strictly humanitarian in nature and does not confuse any official discussions that might be better done by government.

Sakharov, a physicist and Nobel peace prize winner, reportedly began a hunger strike in early May in an effort to convince Soviet authorities to permit his wife, Yelena Bonner, to seek medical treatment in the West.

Although U.S. officials say they since have received assurances from Soviet officials that Sakharov is all right, there has been no independent confirmation of his condition.

Jackson met Monday with Sakharov's daughter, said he had an

invitation to visit the Soviet Union and has applied for a visa. He would not say who invited him, but promised not to interfere with any diplomatic efforts under way on the Sakharov matter.

Speakes called the matter sensitive and added, "it's one we have generally tried to conduct with the Soviets in a private forum through diplomatic channels, and we would like to continue that. It just depends on what happens. We have never discouraged private citizens from seeking to do humanitarian relief."

He declined to say what efforts were under way by the U.S. government on Sakharov's behalf.

"I'm certainly drawing the distinction between humanitarian and official in reference to the Logan Act," said Speakes, referring to the law which bars individual citizens from negotiating with foreign nations.

# 'Hot Line' Changes Allowed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reagan administration officials hope the U.S.-Soviet agreement to upgrade the 21-year-old crisis "hot line" between Washington and Moscow with state-of-the-art communications technology will prompt a modest thaw in frigid superpower relations.

"We hope that this is the beginning of a process that will now lead to other areas of improved communications and confidence building," said one of the U.S. officials who explained the agreement reached Tuesday on condition they not be identified.

The hotline agreement, reached at the end of a year of off-and-on talks, was toasted with champagne by Soviet and American delegates in Washington.

President Reagan called it "a good example of how we can, working together, find approaches which can move us towards a reduction in the risks of war."

"This agreement is a modest but positive step toward enhancing in-

ternational stability and reducing the risk that accident, miscalculation or misinterpretation could lead to confrontation or conflict between the United States and the Soviet Union," the president said in a written statement.

Administration officials said there are indications the Soviets are interested in pursuing another U.S. pro-

posal dealing with nuclear terrorism.

"We're open to further confidence building measures and we will be following up with the Soviets when we can," said a senior State Department official. At the same time, he said that "we don't want to exaggerate the significance of what has been done so far."

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# Women Stay Off Jobs More

WASHINGTON (AP) — Women are much more likely than men to be off the job for big chunks of time, but that still doesn't explain why they generally earn less, according to a government study.

The Census Bureau study, released Tuesday, found that more than 60 percent of working women — three times more than men — have left their jobs for at least six months.

More than half of the women did so to care for home or family, compared with less than 1 percent of men.

Some social scientists have argued that such career gaps could well account for the low earnings of women.

But the Census analysts discounted the effect. Women in the study earned an average of \$4.38 an hour, compared to \$6.92 an hour for men.

"The difference in earnings would be reduced by only 12 percent if women were assumed to have the same levels of experience and interruptions as men," the Census Bureau said.

The study said that 62.7 percent of working women — most married and mothers — interrupted their careers for six months or more, compared with 20.5 percent of working men.

About 54 percent of the women did so to take care of their families or homes, compared to 0.9 percent of the men.

Nearly 6 percent of the women stopped working because they were sick or disabled, while 6.4 percent of the men did. Thirteen percent of the women had career gaps because they couldn't find work, and 15.3 percent of the men did, too.

When the group was expanded to include those out of work at the time of the survey, the discrepancy was even greater.

About 26 percent of that group of men had been off from work for at least six months, compared with 72 percent of women.

About two-thirds of the women did so for family reasons, compared with 1.5 percent of the men.

Women who quit work for family reasons did so for an average of 9½ years, it said. For men, the family interruptions averaged about four years.

When broken down by race, the study found that black women took less time off to help out at home than white women.

"A plausible reason for the greater labor force attachment of black women would seem to be that they have less of an economic option (or lengthy periods of time)," it said.

Spanish-origin women, it said, interrupted their careers for family reasons at about the same rate as white women.

Some of the other findings: — About 56 percent of working women with less than a high school education took time off for family reasons, compared with 40 percent of women with college degrees.

— Women in professional or technical jobs were "somewhat less likely" to have interrupted their careers for their families than those in sales or clerical jobs.

— Just 0.8 percent of men in white-collar jobs stayed home for family reasons; 1.2 percent of laborers did, and 0.1 percent of service workers did.

— One percent of men with less than a high school education stayed home for family reasons, the same percentage as men with college degrees.

— Spanish-origin men were a bit more likely to interrupt their careers for family than white and black men. About 1.5 percent of Spanish-origin men did so.

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# New French Premier To Name Cabinet

PARIS (AP) — The Communist Party chief cut short his Romanian vacation and rushed home today as reports circulated that President Francois Mitterrand's premier-designate, fiscal conservative Laurent Fabius, would name a new Cabinet on Thursday.

Georges Marchais' Communist Party had four seats in the outgoing 41-member Cabinet, but Fabius was expected to demand that the Communists quit sniping at the Socialist government's economic austerity policy if they want to continue to share power.

The French left, in power since May 1981, has suffered a series of electoral setbacks in the past two years, and Mitterrand's approval rating has slumped to 30-35 percent, according to polls.

Mitterrand on Tuesday named

Fabius to replace Premier Pierre Mauroy. At 37, Fabius is France's youngest premier in more than a century.

Fabius' main task will be to try to revive the Socialists' flagging popular support before the 1986 legislative elections.

French television and press reports said the Cabinet would be named Thursday. The Communist Party Central Committee was to meet tonight.

As recently as last week, the Communists reaffirmed their intention to remain part of the ruling coalition.

Among the four Communist ministers in Mauroy's Cabinet was Transportation Minister Charles Fiterman, the party's No. 2 man. Mitterrand was the first president to bring the Communists into a government since the Fifth Re-

public was founded in 1958. Fabius, an economist, was a principal architect of a plan to overhaul French industry that called for elimination of tens of thousands of jobs with an eye to streamlining production and making the nation more competitive. French Communists were among the most vocal critics of the plan, which sparked strikes and other labor protests nationwide.

Mauroy had led the Cabinet since Mitterrand's Socialists came to power three years ago, but in France the real power lies with the president and not with the premier.

Mitterrand's term lasts into 1988, and elections for the National Assembly are scheduled for 1986. Under the French system, there is no need to call elections with the creation of a new Cabinet.

One foreign policy expert, Dominique Moisi, assistant director of the French Institute for Foreign Relations, said today "there is a 50 percent chance" that Claude Cheysson will be replaced as foreign minister by Roland Dumas, a high-ranking government spokesman and — like Fabius — a close associate of Mitterrand.

Mitterrand accepted the resignation of Mauroy, the presidential Elysee Palace announced, and promptly appointed Fabius. The new premier was minister of industry and research under Mauroy and is considered one of the most economically hard-headed members of Mitterrand's administration.

# Parliament Says British Failed To Check De Lorean

LONDON (AP) — A report released today by a House of Commons committee criticizes British officials for failing to check a "shocking misappropriation" of funds by American automaker John De Lorean at a government-assisted factory in Belfast.

The report by the Public Accounts Committee alleged that about \$10.5 million earmarked for development of De Lorean's gull-winged sportscar apparently was diverted for other purposes.

De Lorean, 59, a former General Motors vice president, set up the Belfast plant in 1978, aided by \$101.64 million of British taxpayers' money allocated over several years by authorities trying to ease strife-torn Northern Ireland's high unemployment.

The plant closed Oct. 19, 1982, the same day De Lorean was arrested in Los Angeles on drug charges. He is on trial there charged with conspiring to distribute \$24 million worth of cocaine in an alleged plan to use profits to save the plant. He pleaded innocent.

The British parliamentary committee, a powerful group that includes members of several political parties, said De Lorean diverted \$10.5 million to a Swiss-based firm called GPD by agreement with Colin

Chapman, head of the British Lotus car firm, who died of a heart attack in December 1982.

Sir Kenneth Cork, appointed receiver for the car plant when it failed in 1982, described GPD as a small Swiss company registered in Panama which had no known assets and about which almost nothing was known.

The committee's report said the money was intended to be spent on contract work through Lotus, but that according to Cork, none of it went for developing the car.

The report, again quoting Cork, said \$4.75 million of it was "diverted" to the United States to guarantee borrowing by De Lorean for a deal involving a separate business.

In Los Angeles, De Lorean's attorney Howard Weitzman, who had details of the report in advance, said before its official release:

"I find it a strange coincidence that the British government, which is so concerned with publicity during a criminal trial, and a defendant's right to a fair trial, should cause a document to be disseminated which would clearly cause a negative impact on John De Lorean's right to a fair trial."

The De Lorean plant spanned both Labor and Conservative Party ad-

ministrations in Britain and the committee's report said each mismanaged it.

The committee described the Belfast project as "one of the gravest cases of the misuse of public resources to come before us for many years."

Money was "misappropriated without any suspicion being aroused in the minds of any of those responsible for the monitoring activity," including the Northern Ireland Development Association and directors of the board nominated by the British government.

The report stated: "The evidence discloses a shocking misappropriation of public and private money and shows also that Mr. De Lorean's automobile companies received about 77 million pounds (\$101.64 million dollars) of United Kingdom taxpayers' money and lost most of it within four years..."

Officials never should have agreed to help De Lorean, it said.

"We can only conclude that the prospect of creating large-scale employment in (Roman Catholic) West Belfast proved so much irresistible to the Department of Commerce as to diminish its sensitivity to the commercial risks involved, impair its judgment and lead to the wrong decision being taken," it said.

# Sandinistas Pick Choices

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Former guerrilla leader Daniel Ortega, now the coordinator of Nicaragua's three-man leftist junta, will be the Sandinistas' presidential candidate in the election scheduled for November.

The Sandinistas, who overthrew right-wing President Anastasio Somoza five years ago this week, picked another junta member, Sergio Ramirez, to be their candidate for vice president. The choices were announced after a meeting Tuesday of the Sandinista National Liberation Front's 81 top leaders.

In El Salvador, the U.S.-backed government reversed an earlier decision and said Tuesday it would not send a delegation to the Sandinistas' anniversary celebration Thursday.

Julio Adolfo Rey Prendes, chief of staff for President Jose Napoleon Duarte, said Duarte decided to cancel the visit to protest Ortega's comments last week that the Sandinistas would continue to support guerrillas trying to topple the Salvadoran government.

Ortega, 38, said Tuesday that the Sandinistas are committed to "fortify the popular power, maintaining the forces in the power of the people."

He also said the Sandinistas are seeking peace in Central America, and that they respect freedom of religion as long as religion is not used for political ends.

Nicaragua has been at odds with the United States over what the Reagan administration says are its close ties with Cuba and the Soviet bloc, and because of Nicaragua's alleged aid to rebels in El Salvador.

The government also has been on bad terms with the Roman Catholic Church, and it recently expelled 10 foreign priests for alleged anti-government activities.

Sandinista political coordinator Bayardo Arce said Carlos Nunez, head of the Council of State, a Sandinista-dominated advisory body, will lead the list of Sandinistas running for the 90-member Nicaraguan legislature.

The Sandinistas' political opponents have not formally committed themselves to taking part in the Nov. 4 election, although the Social Christian Party, one of the most important opposition groups, has announced its presidential candidate.

The Social Christians said they would not register the candidacy of Adan Fletes, a 39-year-old economist, until the government guarantees that the elections will be free.

# West Germany OKs Aid To El Salvador

BONN, West Germany (AP) — West Germany has decided to release an \$18 million aid package to El Salvador, part of which was suspended five years ago because of questions about human rights violations.

Bonn will release the money over the next six months "for the improvement of living conditions of the El Salvadoran people," said a statement issued today by the Ministry for Economic Development.

The money — 50.6 million marks — is intended to improve the

country's economy and repair damage done by the Salvadoran civil war, a Bonn spokesman said.

The deal was completed Tuesday evening at a meeting between El Salvador's President Jose Napoleon Duarte and Bonn's economic development minister, Juergen Warnke.

Ministry spokesman Manfred Ob-laender said \$9.85 million of the money had been held up in 1979 by the government of former Chancellor Helmut Schmidt because of questions about human rights violations in El Salvador.

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# Soviets Launch New Spacecraft

MOSCOW (AP) — The flight of Soyuz T-12, carrying the first woman to take part in two space missions, was "proceeding normally" today, the official news agency Tass said.

The spacecraft launched Tuesday night will dock with the orbiting Salyut-7 complex in which three other cosmonauts have spent the last 160 days, Tass said. It did not say when the two spacecraft would link up.

On board Soyuz T-12 were Svetlana Savitskaya, mission commander Vladimir Dzhanibekov and Igor Volk. Miss Savitskaya became the first woman to make two space journeys.

In the past, relief crews such as the one on Soyuz T-12 have brought fresh re-entry capsules to long-term crews aboard the Salyut-7 complex. The Soviet space program concentrates on testing man's stamina over long periods of time, and unmanned cargo ships periodically replenish supplies for long-term crews.

Tuesday's launch was the first for the Soviets since April 3, when a Soviet-Indian crew began an eight-day mission. That crew practiced yoga to study the effects of weightlessness.

The Soyuz T-12 crew will work

with Leonid Kizim, Vladimir Solovyov and Oleg Atkov of the Salyut-7 mission on "scientific and technical research and experiments," Tass said Tuesday night. It did not elaborate. Those three cosmonauts were sent into space on Feb. 8.

The Soviet government has not announced when they will return to earth. With Tuesday's launch, it was possible that the Soviets might try to break their own 211-day space endurance record. The Salyut-7 crew would have a fresh re-entry capsule, extending the potential length of their stay in space, if the new group of cosmonauts return in the capsule currently docked at the orbiting station.

As of today the Salyut-7 crew was 51 days short of the endurance record.

The Salyut program has had a number of problems, including an aborted flight involving three cosmonauts and two failed docking attempts.

The current Salyut crew has spent part of its time repairing the space station's power system, according to news reports. The craft reportedly had a fuel leak last year that left it drifting in orbit.

# Amnesty Proposal Postpones Trial

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The trial of four prominent Solidarity advisers was postponed today because Parliament plans to consider an amnesty for Poland's political prisoners, two Solidarity supporters who were in the courtroom said.

Bronislaw Geremek, a top adviser to the now-outlawed union, said the three-man judicial panel walked into the Warsaw military courtroom and, after five minutes, announced the postponement of the highly publicized trial.

"The judge said that in connection with PRON's appeal to the Sejm (Parliament), the court had decided to postpone the trial and wait for its decision," Geremek said. PRON is the common name for a public opinion group, closely tied to the government, that on Monday urged Parliament to adopt a "broad amnesty" for political prisoners.

Tadeusz Mazowiecki, a Solidarity adviser who also attended the court session, confirmed that the trial had been postponed.

The four defendants, including prominent opposition intellectuals Jacek Kuron and Adam Michnik, are accused of plotting to overthrow Poland's socialist system by force.

# Drivers Block Ferry Service

LONDON (AP) — Truck drivers stranded by the nine-day-old British dock strike vented their anger today by blockading passenger ferry services across the English Channel.

The truckers blocked Britain's main ferry terminal at Dover for several hours during the night, and shortly after dawn drivers from Britain and other European countries took similar action across the channel at the French port of Calais, French police said.

One ferry voyage from Dover was canceled and another diverted to Ostend, Belgium, British port authorities said.

They were leaders of the Committee for Social Self Defense, a workers' rights group known as KOR, and were Solidarity advisers in 1980-81.

Their trial began last Friday. Western correspondents were not allowed in the courtroom today, and several dozen policemen moved reporters off the sidewalks outside the building before the session began.

The postponement was announced less than an hour after the four defendants were taken inside the court building.

The other two defendants are Henryk Wujec and Zbigniew Romaszewski. All except Romaszewski have been jailed since the Dec. 13, 1981, imposition of martial law that suppressed Solidarity.

The government of Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski made intensive efforts to avoid staging the trial, offering the four freedom in return for pledges to abstain from political activity or accept temporary exile. All rejected the offer.

The trial finally was scheduled after Kuron went on a hunger strike to demand that either a trial be held or the defendants set free without conditions. A defense lawyer who briefed reporters after Friday's court session said: "The authorities still don't know how to treat this trial... They don't know whether it should be a big political event or just pass unnoticed."

Also detained by the government are seven former leaders of Solidarity, the first independent trade union in the Soviet bloc.

Western nations have set release of the four KOR defendants and the seven Solidarity leaders as a condition for lifting U.S.-led sanctions imposed in response to martial law.

Government spokesman Jerzy Urban announced Tuesday that Communist authorities were drafting an amnesty bill to free political prisoners and said it would be presented to a special session of Parliament on Saturday.

Urban said the final shape of the bill had not been determined and that he did not know whether it would include all of Poland's political prisoners, which he said numbered 660.

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# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined slightly today, giving back some of its gains of the past three sessions.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up more than 18 months in the last three trading days, slipped 1.88 to 1,121.02 in the first half hour today.

Losers took a 7-6 lead over gainers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

The government reported this morning that housing starts rose 5.3 percent in June, bouncing back from a 10.4 percent drop the month before.

That better-than-expected showing provided evidence of continued strength in the economy, and thus tended to reinforce concern on Wall Street over the interest-rate outlook.

Rates were mostly higher in the bond and short-term money markets this morning.

Today's early prices included Honeywell, up  $\frac{3}{8}$  at 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ ; Chrysler, up  $\frac{1}{8}$  at 27; Dana Corp., unchanged at 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ , and Johnson & Johnson, down  $\frac{1}{8}$  at 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ .

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average rose 6.07 to 1,122.90.

Advances outpaced declines by about 4 to 3 on the NYSE.

The NYSE's composite index rose 0.42 to 87.76. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 0.58 to 193.64.

## Martin Gets Bipartisan Backing At Local Rally

"My absolutely strongest organization in the whole state of North Carolina is right here in Pitt County," Republican gubernatorial nominee Jim Martin told a Greenville rally Tuesday night.

Martin, a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, spoke to a sizable crowd of both Republicans and Democrats that gathered despite the inclement weather.

Monroe Waters, who coordinated Eddie Knox' Democratic gubernatorial campaign, endorsed Martin and said, "I contend that we do not have a choice... Jim Martin is the only man that can be governor of North Carolina."

U.S. Sen. John East of Greenville introduced Martin and told the crowd, "North Carolina's gain is going to be Washington's loss because I can say with authority and accuracy that this man is among the most respected members of the U.S. House of Representatives."

In his remarks, Martin discussed state employee pressure, political affiliation, campaigning in eastern North Carolina, gun control, utilities, and industry taxes.

He stressed that state employees should not feel pressured to support a certain candidate. "State employees will have less to fear from me as governor than if someone from a different wing of their own party gets in," he said.

Martin said he does not believe in "vindictive retribution against people because of their party affiliation." He mentioned East and other Republicans who have helped to "blaze a trail across the state" for the GOP. Martin said this has helped to build "a stronger, more competitive system of politics" which he believes "will be healthier for all of us, Republicans and Democrats."

Martin said he intends to form a "balanced utilities commission" to watch out for consumers so they will not have to pay more than necessary for electric, telephone and gas services.

Martin said he has spent "a disproportionate amount of campaign time" in this part of the state where he said people take their politics "so very seriously."

On the issue of gun control, Martin said he has "defended the second amendment to the Constitution" every time it has been addressed. "I just don't believe there's anything wrong with having a gun in your house to protect your home and family if need be," he said.

Martin said utilities have become a "witch hunt" in the campaign. He said Democrat gubernatorial nominee Rufus Edmisten and his supporter John Ingram were using a "dangerous tactic" in deciding "which industry of the day" to attack for "political purposes."

Agency approval will have to be obtained before it becomes effective. If approved, the helicopters will be leased and will serve the 29-county area which Pitt Memorial serves as an acute-care hospital. There are now 60 hospital-based helicopter ambulance services in the nation, the oldest 9 years old, the board was told. All are making money and have remained operational once they were begun.

Locally, 402 flights are projected for next year, with anticipated revenue for the hospital expected through the bringing in of patients who would have gone elsewhere and the saving of patients who would have died without the quick transport to acute care, board members were told.

Several changes in administrative staff designations were approved. Fred Brown, who has been senior vice president, will be executive vice president. Dave McRae, who has been vice president for patient services, will be senior vice president for professional services. Roy Clark, chief financial officer, will be named vice president for financial services. Ed McFall, currently director of information services, would be vice president for information services. 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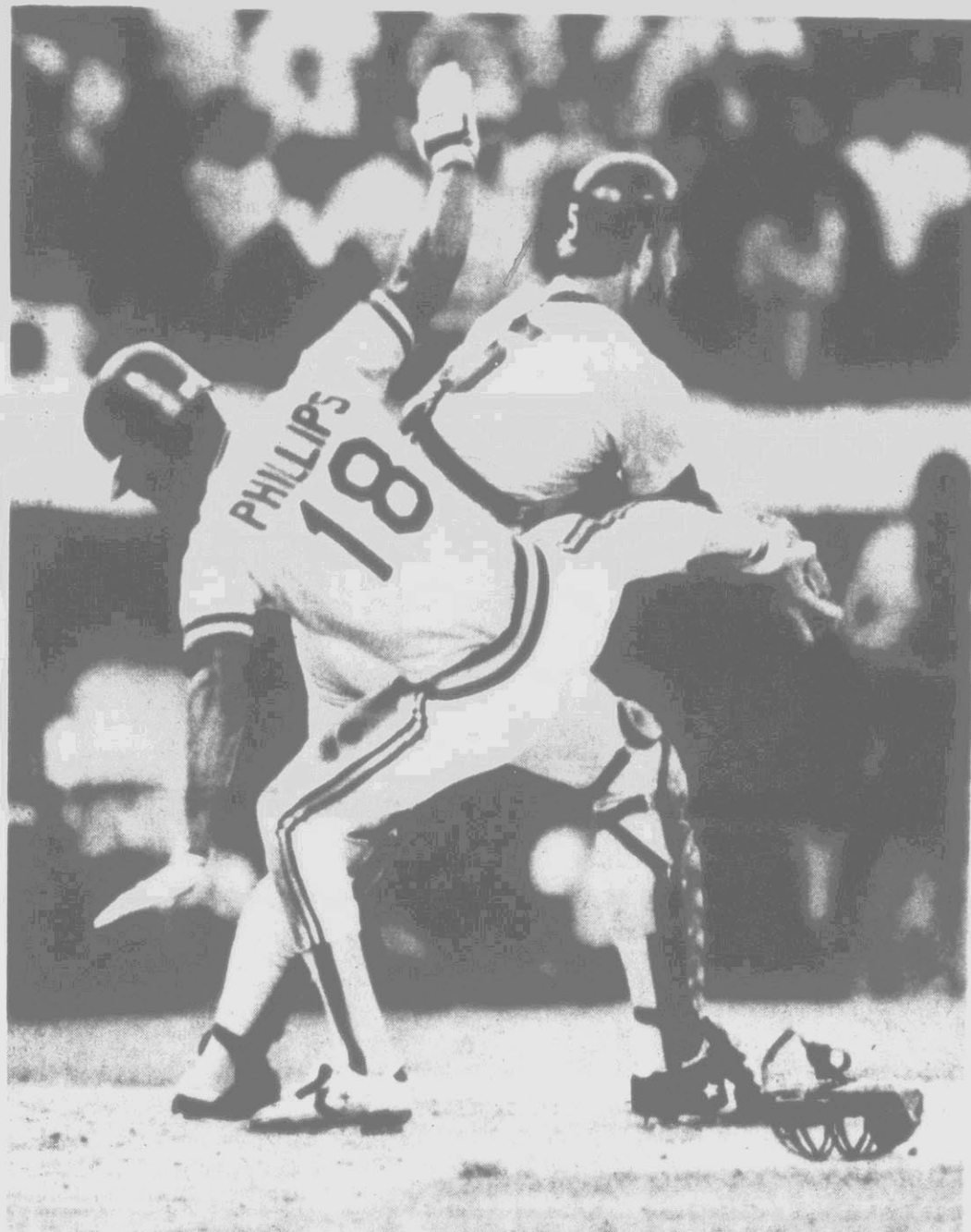

# Jackson Equals Gehrig On Career Homer List

It takes a lot to get Reggie Jackson excited these days. Equaling a record by the great Lou Gehrig will do it, though.

"I don't get thrilled easily anymore but this was exciting," said Jackson after his 493rd career home run, a two-run shot, helped the California Angels beat the Toronto Blue Jays 5-3 Tuesday night. "I'm no Lou Gehrig by any stretch of the imagination but it took me sixteen and a half years to get here and I'm happy."

Jackson's 15th homer of the season tied him for 13th place on the all-time list with Gehrig and proved to be the margin of California's victory.

"Something like this makes you proud, although my ego doesn't need any help," said Jackson, who also lifted his average to .250 with a three-hit game. "It was good to chip in with a homer. I've been swinging good, but was fighting the psychological battle of not having many hits to show for it."

In other AL action, Texas beat New York 10-4, Cleveland took a doubleheader from Kansas City 9-7 and 6-2, Baltimore beat Minnesota 3-1, Detroit nipped Chicago 3-2, Seattle turned back Milwaukee 3-1 and Boston stopped Oakland 6-1.

Jackson hit his homer with two outs in the seventh inning off left-hander James Key, who had just come on in relief after Fred Lynn's single.

Earlier in the inning, Bobby Grich's solo homer off Jim Aker, 2-5, had given California a 3-2 lead.

Right-hander Mike Witt, 10-7, surrendered two runs and six hits over the first three innings. He left in the ninth after giving up a run-scoring double to Rance Mulliniks.

Rangers 10, Yankees 4

Tommy Dunbar smashed his first major league home run, a three-run blast in the fifth inning, and Larry Parrish homered and drove in two runs as Texas pounded out 17 hits in routing New York.

Charlie Hough, 10-7, allowed 10 hits, striking out five and walking none in winning for the eighth time in his last nine decisions. The 36-year-old knuckleballer registered his 11th complete game in ending Texas' four-game losing streak and halting a six-game New York winning streak.

Phil Niekro, 12-5, suffered the loss.

With Texas trailing 3-2 in the fifth, Pete O'Brien drilled a one-out single and one out later Buddy Bell walked. Dunbar then connected on Niekro's 1-2 pitch to give the Rangers a 5-2 lead and their eventual winning run.

Ken Griffey knocked in three of New York's runs with a two-run homer in the second inning and an RBI single in the fourth.

Indians 9-6, Royals 7-2

Carmen Castillo's two-run homer capped a four-run uprising in the third inning that carried Cleveland over Kansas City in the opener of their double-header.

The Indians pounded out 15 hits to help Neal Heaton, who had given up seven hits and took an 8-4 lead into the eighth. But George Brett led off with a double and Hal McRae followed with his second home run of the season, finishing Heaton, 6-9. Reliever Ernie Camacho gave up Jorge Orta's pinch-RBI single in the eighth before getting his 11th save.

Jerry Willard hit a double and a triple and Mel Hall walloped a two-run homer in support of Steve Comer's pitching to lead the Indians to victory in the second game. Comer, 2-4, scattered seven hits in 6-2-3 innings while Frank Wills, 0-1, took the loss one day after being called up from Omaha.

Orioles 3, Twins 1

Cal Ripken drove in the tie-breaking run in the fifth inning and Scott McGregor scattered 10 hits as Baltimore defeated Minnesota.

Petry struck out five and walked one in 7-2-3 innings to post his fourth victory in his last five starts and improve his record to 12-4. Hernandez worked the final 1-3-3 innings to record his 17th save.

The Tigers gave Petry all the runs he needed off White Sox starter Gene Nelson in the first inning. With one out, Rupert Jones doubled, moved to third on a passed ball and came home on Kirk Gibson's sacrifice fly. Lance Parrish followed with a single and scored on Evans' ninth home run of the season.

"It's just a matter of confidence and work," said Hernandez of his recent excellent relief work. "I've known all along that I believe in myself and if you let me believe in myself I'll do a good job."

Mariners 3, Brewers 1

Rookie left-hander Mark Langston pitched a two-hitter and struck out 12 batters before leaving in the ninth inning and Al Cowens blasted a home run to lead Seattle over Milwaukee.

Langston, 8-7, won his sixth game in his past eight decisions. His strikeout total was the highest by an American League pitcher this season. He was relieved in the last inning by Mike Stanton after issuing a walk to the leadoff batter, his fifth of the game.

# Watson Chases British Mark

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — It is a homecoming of sorts for Tom Watson.

"I call Scotland my second home," Watson said before a practice round on the revered Old Course at St. Andrews where, beginning on Thursday, he will seek a record-matching sixth British Open title. "I'm a born-again enthusiast for Scottish golf."

"If there were not a British Open, I'd still come here — here and Ireland — once a year to play the great courses."

In fact, he did that last week. After scoring his third victory of the year on the American PGA Tour, a dramatic playoff triumph over Australian Greg Norman in the Western Open, Watson took a week's golfing vacation, touring Irish courses before coming to Scotland.

Now, it's down to business. And, this week, Watson's business is strongly tinted with history.

First, there's the course. Actually, the links, the Old Course, with a past stretching back beyond written records, a history that is counted in centuries.

"It's the home of golf," Watson said. "It's the place you think of when you think of golf in Britain. When you go home after a trip to

Britain, everyone wants to know, 'did you play the Old Course?'"

"There's no question that winning at St. Andrews would be something special ... something very special to me."

It would mean something very special in golf.

In all the long history of the British Open, dating back to 1860, only the immortal Harry Vardon has won the title six times. His victories came between 1896 and 1914. His contemporaries — the other members of the Grand Triumvert — James Braid and J.H. Taylor, won five apiece. Australian Peter Thomson won five times between 1954 and 1965.

Watson, with his second consecutive British Open triumph last year, became the only other man, and the first American, to win the title five times. Now, the man generally acknowledged as the current leader of world golf has a chance to tie Vardon's record.

Moreover, he has the opportunity to complete a unique sweep of all the Scottish courses used in the Open

rotation. His victory last year was at Royal Birkdale, in Southport, England. The others came in Scotland: Carnoustie in 1975, Turnberry in 1977, Muirfield in 1980 and Troon in 1982.

Only St. Andrews has eluded him. And no one, ever, has won on all five courses in Scotland.

At age 34, at the height of his golfing powers, he'll never have a better chance. It is expected to be another six years or more — when he'll be 40 or older — before the Open returns to the ancient links along the Firth of Tay.

He brings to his quest a game that is building to a peak, and a confidence that is bolstered by recent success, a record that is the best in the United States this year.

His playoff victory over Norman in his last start made him the only three-time winner on the American tour this season. In addition to his triumphs at the Match Play Championship and the Tournament of Champions, he was second in the Masters and third in the Byron Nelson Classic. He is in his

customary place at the head of the game's money-winners with \$426,959.

Those successes were built around his phenomenal short game, his uncanny ability to get it up and down.

"My long game may be a little suspect," he said. "I'm not completely satisfied with it. It's not quite in the slot."

Then he offered that gap-toothed grin.

"But it's getting there. It's getting closer."

# IOC Rejects Moving 1988 Games

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rejecting pressure to move the 1988 Summer Games out of South Korea, the International Olympic Committee says it has every intention of keeping the Games in Seoul.

But IOC President Juan Antonio Samaranch admitted that escalating U.S.-Soviet tensions threaten the Olympic movement.

Samaranch emphasized that the IOC's position on Seoul's status "is very clear. As always the IOC is honoring its contract. We signed a contract with Seoul and the 1988 Games will be held in Seoul."

At news conference Tuesday, Samaranch said the future of the Olympics "depends on the future of the world. If we have peace and normal relations between mainly the two superpowers, we will have great Games in 1988."

If not, "we will be affected and we really will face some problems," he said.

One solution, he said, might be a crackdown on boycotting countries.

"Maybe if a country does not take part in the Games, for political reasons, maybe they will not have the right to take part in the next Games," he said.

Meanwhile Tuesday, the South Coast Air Quality Management District said it would urge only 1,500 businesses and factories to cut air pollution during this summer's Olympics in Los Angeles — not the 3,500 mentioned after a "smog summit" was called last Friday.

The 1,500 firms, all in Los Angeles County, will be urged to cut emissions in response to one of the longest first-stage smog sieges in recent years.

AQMD executive director Jeb

Stewart said the district's public information office had erroneously put out the greater number.

Asked about the smog, Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee President Peter V. Ueberroth admitted air quality "won't be great," but noted that the problem faces all major cities.

Ueberroth, appearing at the news conference with Samaranch, insisted that athletic performances will not be affected.

The conference ended in a surprise 64th birthday party — complete with four-foot-long cake — for Samaranch, who said he plans a trip to Moscow on Sept. 3 to try to resolidify the Olympic movement, shattered by the USSR-led boycott and others in past years.

In September he plans to meet with South Korean Olympic officials and attend a dedication for Seoul's new 100,000-seat stadium.

The Los Angeles Games are the third consecutive Olympiad damaged by political pullouts. About 30 black African countries walked out of the Montreal Games in 1976 over New Zealand's ties with South Africa. More than 80 teams boycotted the 1980 Moscow Games because of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Led by the Soviet Union, 14 countries will miss the Los Angeles Olympics.

Asked if it was possible that the 1988 Games could be open to professional athletes, Samaranch did not directly respond, but said the IOC "must be realistic. We are living in the 80s. We're not living in the 20s."

He said the international federations are "very, very worried" about the professionalism issue, adding,

"We would not like to favor some countries over others."

Samaranch predicted the Los Angeles Games will be "a great success" and described the villages and sports facilities "wonderful" and among the best in Olympic history.

Ueberroth announced that more than 2,000 athletes from 64 countries have checked into the Olympic Villages, residence halls at the University of Southern California and the University of California

since Saturday.

Ueberroth, downplaying criticism about cramped quarters from such athletes as superstar Carl Lewis, said the Olympic setup will be "comfortable" for the athletes and each village will be "a great place to stay."

He added, "I hope that Carl Lewis does his talking on the field of play."

Ueberroth, responding to criticisms from some police officials, also defended the private security force hired by the LAOOC,

saying they "are doing a very good job."

The local Olympics chief, praising the friendliness and efficiency of police and other security agencies, said security forces in Los Angeles are less numerous and obtrusive than those at the 1980 Moscow Games.

Ueberroth also suggested that police Chief Daryl Gates and the FBI reserve harsh words about each other until after the Games.

Gates had suggested that the

FBI's establishment of a 50-member hostage rescue team represents a "dangerous direction" toward assuming national police responsibilities. FBI officials disagreed.

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## Smith Wants College Players In NBA Draft

Some people might consider North Carolina basketball coach Dean Smith the last person to suggest making all college players eligible for the National Basketball Association draft, but he has such a plan.

His idea was presented last April during a seminar held by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics in Seattle. That was about a month before one of his own, junior guard Michael Jordan, surrendered his senior year to become eligible for the NBA draft.

Under Smith's idea, the NBA teams would take turns selecting college athletes much the way major league baseball conducts its draft. Each team would select a player in each of 10 rounds, and a player may try out only for the team that drafts him.

"Why is a baseball player different from a basketball player?" Smith asked. "A baseball player can be drafted at the end of his junior year, discuss it with them and then go back (to school)."

Being drafted is no guarantee that a player would make the team, based on the plan.

With Smith's idea, a player could determine his current market value, then return to college to enhance his future chances. With the current arrangement, once a player forfeits his collegiate eligibility, he cannot return.

"I've said from day one that a young man should do what's best for him," Smith said. "I've tried to do what's best by our players."

Jordan now is on the verge of becoming a member of the Chicago Bulls. Two years ago, James Worthy left after his junior season and was the first pick in the 1982 draft. Bob McAdoo also left Chapel Hill after the Final Four season of 1972 to get

in on the NBA action.

Smith had two more players who might have left early. In a recent interview, he said he advised Sam Perkins to hang around for his senior season to increase his chances in the draft. On the other hand, Smith suggested that Phil Ford leave after the near-championship year of 1977. Ford chose to stay.

In every instance, Smith wanted to make sure his players were among the first five chosen and close to completion of their degree work before suggesting the move.

"For many years, I've thought the rules of the NBA and the NCAA have prevented a young man from doing what's best for him," Smith said. "Consequently, it wasn't that bad until what I call the Sampson rule. That gave (the NBA teams) bad publicity, but it also gave a tremendous leverage to Ralph to get what he wanted or he'd return to school."

A college player who was drafted would then have 30 days to reach an agreement with the NBA club, otherwise he would return to school.

"It wouldn't hurt anybody, in fact it would be of great help to the player who thinks he's good, makes himself available for the draft and then goes in the third round," Smith said. "He knows immediately 'hey, I've got to go back to college.'"

The idea reportedly met with approval from Lawrence Fleischer, general counsel for the NBA Players Association, although Smith said he hasn't presented the plan to any other group.

There would have to be bugs worked out of the idea. Players would likely retain agents and attorneys if they were drafted. Someone would have to pay the attorney even if the deal fell through.



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# Primary Challenge Is Rejected

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Many of North Carolina's black delegates to the Democratic National Convention question whether they could get minorities out to vote for the party ticket in November because of a platform they say fails to address their concerns.

Unsuccessful congressional candidate H.M. "Mickey" Michaux of Durham, N.C., Tuesday asked the convention to reject primary runoffs, but delegates overwhelmingly voted instead to study which runoffs are discriminatory.

Of North Carolina's 88 delegates, 32 voted to adopt a proposed minority plank to eliminate second primaries. Fifty-three other delegates, most if not all of them supporters of apparent party presi-

dential nominee Walter F. Mondale, voted against the minority position.

Before Florida's vote was tallied, convention officials announced the proposed change had been defeated. There were 1,252.2 votes for the change and 2,363.8 votes against it.

North Carolina Gov. Jim Hunt was among those voting against the minority stand.

"If they are not discriminatory they should not be prohibited," Hunt said. "In many states they have served a useful function."

The proposed party platform recommended an investigation of runoff primaries and elimination of those found to be discriminatory. The Rev. Jesse Jackson wanted to change the wording to eliminate all runoffs.

Some North Carolina delegates had argued that the national party

should not dictate local practices and argued that second primaries can strengthen minority candidates by building coalitions among Democrats.

Former U.S. Sen. Robert Morgan, a Mondale delegate from Lillington, N.C., said the Jackson positions "could be devastating" to North Carolina Democrats this fall.

"It's just what the Reagan and (Republican Sen. Jesse) Helms people would love to throw at us," he said.

LaVonia Allison of Durham, a Jackson delegate, seemed bitterly disappointed Tuesday by the loss on the platform issues.

"What Jesse was trying to do tonight was raise our spirits," she said. "The party is turning its backs on those who will do so much for them in November."

She said the party has given minorities a "half-hearted message" to sell in the fall campaign and it looks like too little to build enthusiasm among voters. She said she was "distressed" by the action.

G.K. Butterfield of Rocky Mount, also a Jackson delegate, said he just hoped the debate would "focus public attention on the need to change this discriminatory practice."

George Cunningham, a Gary Hart delegate from Wilkes County, N.C., spoke in favor of lowering the percentage of votes a candidate needs in order to avoid a runoff. He said that would lead to single-member legislative districts and that would benefit everyone.

North Carolina state Sen. Jim Edwards, D-Caldwell, is drafting proposals for the 1985 General



Assembly to try to make the state's runoff primary system fairer to minority candidates.

Edwards, an alternate delegate for Hart, is proposing that a candidate who receives more than 40 percent of the vote be declared the winner unless the second-place finisher is close behind the leader.

He would require that the difference between 50 percent and the first-place finisher's margin of support be more than the difference between the first and second place

finishers to avoid a runoff. "I think it was a key issue as far as minorities are concerned," said Walter Marshall of Winston-Salem. "To vote the issue down would be a slap in the face of black folk, especially in the South."

In a speech to the women's caucus earlier in the day, Jackson told the delegates, "You'll never get a Jim Hunt over a Jesse Helms unless blacks are emancipated. The only remote chance that Hunt has now is that new registration."

"It may look big to us today, but there are other issues in the campaign," said former U.S. Sen. Robert Morgan. "Two days ago I thought that Bert Lance would kill us. Now other things have come up."

Jackson told the convention Tuesday night that the Rainbow Coalition's victory wasn't whether they won or lost the vote on platform issues.

"We could afford to lose the vote," he said. "Issues are negotiable. We could not afford to avoid raising the right issues. Our self-respect and our moral integrity were at stake."

## Delegates Consider Switch Of Support

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — One of North Carolina's black delegates to the Democratic National Convention says she plans to switch from Walter Mondale to the Rev. Jesse Jackson in first-ballot voting tonight as a sign of appreciation for Jackson's campaign.

Frances Cummings of Lumberton said she thought she "ought to give Jesse Jackson the opportunity to let him know that I support him." But she added she thinks it inevitable that Mondale will get the nomination and she will support him later.

Ms. Cummings decision was made as Mondale campaign leaders said they did not believe delegates would switch to Jackson in a symbolic gesture. The convention's Black Caucus passed a resolution Tuesday urging blacks to reserve their first-ballot votes for Jackson.

There are 28 black North Carolina delegates and 711 in the entire convention delegation. Of the black N.C. delegates, 10 are for Mondale and 16 are for Jackson.

Without Ms. Cummings' vote change, there were 49 Mondale delegates, 16 for Jackson and 18 for Sen. Gary Hart in the state's delegation. If the blacks go with Jackson, Mondale could be denied a show of unity on the first ballot.

Ms. Cummings said Mondale would need Jackson's support and the first-ballot vote might be one way to send that signal to voters back home.

E.V. Wilkins, mayor of Roper, party vice chairman and a Mondale delegate, said he was considering voting for Jackson on the first ballot but only if he could be assured that Mondale would win anyway. He said he was reserving his decision until after he caucused with black N.C. delegates today.

Former Raleigh Mayor Clarence Lightner said he would stick with Mondale on the first ballot although he is a good friend of Jackson. Lightner said the "bottom line is that we all get out together to get Ronald Reagan out."

Almetta Armstrong of Candor, another black Mondale delegate, said Jackson would "do a fantastic job as president but I don't think this country is ready for him."

LaVonia Allison of Durham, a Jackson delegate, praised the Mondale delegates for considering a change. She said that might be a way to clearly send a message of unity to supporters of all three presidential candidates.

Meanwhile, North Carolina's uncommitted delegates still have not announced who they'll support.

Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt said he's made his decision but won't reveal it. Gov. Jim Hunt, Attorney General Rufus Edmisten, state Sen. Bob Jordan, D-Montgomery and Congressman Steve Neal say they've not made up their minds yet.

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## Senate Candidates Seek Funds Throughout Nation

RALEIGH (AP) — From California to the New York islands, Americans who ordinarily might ignore North Carolina politics are helping Jesse Helms and Jim Hunt fatten their campaign war chests.

If financial reports filed this week by both U.S. Senate candidates are any indication, political observers who have called the race one of the nation's most visible this election year are on target.

Page after page of the reports filed by incumbent Republican Helms and Democratic Gov. Hunt are filled with names of out-of-state residents and political action committees.

Among the contributors are such well-known figures as novelist Gore Vidal and singer Carly Simon, who have given to Hunt, and Helms supporters Bob Hope and Holly Coors, wife of Colorado beer magnate Joseph Coors.

Spokesmen for both camps downplay those donations and emphasize their in-state contributions, but acknowledge that they're not shy about soliciting help nationwide.

"We cast our nets far and wide," said Will Marshall, press secretary for the Hunt campaign.

"A lot of business people, housewives, retired individuals... across the country are interested in helping Sen. Helms," said spokesman Claude Allen.

In its report, the Helms campaign said it had raised \$8.4 million — topping the \$7.6 million amassed in 1978 when Helms won re-election by defeating Democrat John Ingram.

The Hunt committee said it had raised \$5.1 million.

Both camps said over 90 percent of their donations had come from individuals, and the Hunt campaign said 53 percent of its money was given by North Carolinians. Allen said the Helms campaign keeps no in-state versus out-of-state statistics.

One reason for the infusion of money from other states may be the unusually heavy attention paid the race by the national media. Some observers have called the race the second most important in the nation behind the battle for the presidency because of Helms' status as leader of the New Right.

Also, both sides have made extensive use of direct-mail appeals, a technique perfected years ago by the National Congressional Club, Helms' political organization. Then there are the out-of-state money-raising rallies Helms and Hunt have attended.

Both sides say they'd welcome a less expensive campaign, but both say the other team has advantages that leave them with no choice but to take every cent they can get.

The Hunt camp says Helms has a well-oiled money-making machine that will earn him \$15 million before the Nov. 6 election. "We've developed our own extensive plan as a matter of political survival," said Marshall, adding that Hunt's goal is \$5 million above expenses.

Allen says the Helms campaign has a built-in disadvantage — a news media that is hostile to Helms and

friendly to Hunt. "We need money to buy TV time and offset the negative coverage (of Helms) and free press enjoyed by Gov. Hunt," he said.

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# Medical Licensing Is Upheld

RALEIGH (AP) — The state's law against practicing medicine without a license is clear, the North Carolina Court of Appeals ruled Tuesday in the case of a man claiming to diagnose ailments by looking into a person's eyes.

The decision upheld the Guilford Superior Court conviction and sentencing of Joseph Nelson Jr., of Guilford County, who was convicted in June 1983 on five counts of practicing medicine without a license.

Testimony during the trial showed that Nelson, who called himself a doctor, said he was an "iridologist," meaning that he could "look into patients' eyes and make a diagnosis."

Martha Bradley Long testified that Nelson told her she had a lung problem and sold her a kit containing volcanic ash, psyllium hulls, laxatives and garlic capsules. In November 1982 she was admitted to a hospital with severe breathing problems.

Later an undercover Greensboro police officer visited Nelson, who told him to stop taking medication a doctor had prescribed for high blood pressure because "it was not working."

Nelson examined the officer's eyes and told him he had "deposits of drugs" in his liver, lungs, stomach, large intestine, left leg and foot. Nelson gave the officer an herb kit to remove the deposits and told him to take a "ginger bath."

Under state law, a license to practice medicine is required to diagnose, treat, operate, prescribe, or profess "to treat any human ailment... injury... or deformity."

Nelson appealed, contending the law was so vague that it could be interpreted as barring family members from treating each other for such minor ailments as cuts and bruises.

But the three appellate judges said the law permitted "home remedies," whereas Nelson had treated people for money and had called himself a doctor.

"The state is certainly empowered to protect its citizens from those who would attempt to practice medicine without having been duly licensed," the ruling said.

# Lawsuit Permitted By State

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A federal appeals court ruling Tuesday cleared the way for North Carolina's antitrust lawsuit against the Psychiatric Institutes of America if there are no appeals, says assistant state attorney Frank Gamin.

The 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said a hospital that receives state permission to take over another facility can be sued under federal antitrust laws. One-time state regulation does not replace the pro-competitive force of antitrust laws, the court ruled 6-3.

The court said the "overriding aim" of the 1974 federal law requiring state review of health care facilities "was obviously to buttress competition."

"The candid recognition in that context of competition's failures is not tantamount to a finding that Congress intended to bar use of the most powerful pro-competitive laws, the federal antitrust laws..."

The court reversed a ruling before a three-judge panel of the appeals court. The state had requested a rehearing before the full court.

In 1974, Congress required states to pass legislation mandating "certificates of need" — reviews of changes in buildings or purchases of major equipment — or risk losing federal funds. Congress was concerned about rising costs and wasteful duplication in the health care industry.

North Carolina's law was tougher than required by the federal government because it also mandates review of acquisitions even if the bed capacity does not change.

P.I.A., the largest national private operator of acute psychiatric hospitals, obtained a certificate of need to acquire 50 percent of the stock of Highland Hospital, formerly a division of Duke University Medical Center.

It already owned and operated the only other private psychiatric hospital in the area covered by the Western North Carolina Health Systems Agency. And before the certificate was granted, North Carolina Attorney General Rufus Edmisten challenged the acquisition under federal antitrust and state antitrust laws.

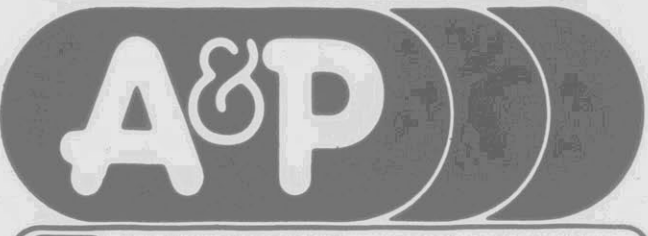
P.I.A. said it was immune from antitrust suits because Congress intended to grant immunity with the 1974 law and the state regulation takes the place of the competition protected by antitrust laws.

But the court said immunity can be claimed through state regulation only if the state has a "clearly articulated state policy" and "on-going supervision," and the latter is missing in this case.

**Methodists Elect Two Bishops**

LAKE JUNALUSKA, N.C. (AP) — In an unprecedented move, delegates to the United Methodist Church's Southeastern Jurisdiction Tuesday selected two bishops — a North Carolinian and a Virginian.

Church officials said they knew of only one other time when the jurisdiction elected even one bishop on the first ballot — in 1972. The record number of ballots taken is 25 — also in 1972.

"It is our firm conviction that the effectiveness of the witness and mission of the United Methodist Church will depend in a large measure upon the strength of the leadership of its Council of Bishops," Bishop L. Scott Allen of Charlotte said in the opening Episcopal Message, which reflects the views of all 11 of the jurisdiction's bishops.

Elected were the Rev. Ernest A. Fitzgerald, 59, senior pastor of West Market Street United Methodist Church in Greensboro, and the Rev. Kern Eutsler, 65, director of the Virginia Conference Council of Ministries. Fitzgerald received votes from 382 of the 576 delegates, while Eutsler garnered 378 votes.

Fitzgerald said he would "do everything I can do to strengthen the local church and help it find its mission in the community and the world."

The Rev. Joseph P. Bethea, assistant to the bishop of Raleigh, is trying to become the first black bishop ever elected by the conference. Bethea received 247 votes on the first ballot and 262 on the third, but was still short of the 60 percent needed to win and must be elected on subsequent ballots.

The delegates must choose four more bishops to replace retirees and assign all 11 bishops to their posts for the next four years.

Representing about 3 million Methodists in 13,000 churches in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee and Kentucky, the delegates each picked six candidates.

To become a bishop, a candidate must be chosen by 60 percent of the delegates. If no one is elected on the first ballot, voting continues until someone is picked by 60 percent. No candidates were chosen on the second or third ballots and no action was expected on the fourth ballot before Wednesday. The process will continue until all six are elected.

The delegates, half laymen and half clergy, were expected to determine assignments Friday. New bishops cannot be assigned to the conferences from which they were nominated, and the others can remain in one region no longer than eight years.

Ten blacks, including Bethea, received votes on the first ballot. Allen, who is among the six retiring, is black. But he was elected in 1967 by the former Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, which was all black and which was dissolved in 1968 when the United Methodist Church was formed.

The bishops' main influence on the faith is their authority to appoint ministers. They also act as administrators and spokesmen for their areas.

"As bishops of the church, we feel morally obligated to acknowledge our failure to exercise ... the intensity of leadership that is necessary for accelerating the rapidity of the denomination's progressive movement toward full Christian inclusiveness in the placement of persons across racial lines as pastors," Allen said in his speech.

Four other United Methodist jurisdictions across the nation also are electing bishops, with a total of at least 18 of 45 to be chosen. The Southeastern Jurisdiction includes about a third of the denomination's 10.4 million members in the United States.

In addition to Allen, the bishops retiring are H. Ellis Finger of Knoxville, Tenn.; William B. Cannon of Raleigh; Edward L. Tullis of Nashville, Tenn.; Joel D. McDavia of Atlanta; and Frank L. Robertson of Birmingham, Ala.

**Voters Reject Liquor Proposals**

ROCKY MOUNT, N.C. (AP) — Voters in Nash and Edgecombe counties Tuesday defeated separate bond referendums on whether to allow the sale of liquor by the drink.

Edgecombe County voters overwhelmingly defeated the proposal for mixed drinks by a vote of 5,828 to 3,978, according to unofficial returns from all precincts.

In Nash County, 7,647 voted against the referendum, while 5,520 favored it, according to unofficial returns from all precincts.

**Children Killed**

WILSON, N.C. (AP) — Two girls died after the bicycle they were riding was struck by a car about two miles north of Wilson, the N.C. Highway Patrol said Tuesday.

Trooper J.G. Jones identified the victims as Angela Kaye Rogers, 10, of Route 4, Wilson, and Elizabeth Dawn Carnley, 3, of Rocky Mount.

# Derek Loses Right To Photos

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Director John Derek has been ordered to turn over about 1,000 photographs, including some showing his wife Bo in the buff, which were taken during production of the film "Bolero."

Superior Court Judge Lawrence Waddington has ruled that Derek must relinquish the photos, some of which appeared in a recent issue of Playboy magazine, to producer Cannon Films, Cannon attorney Sam Perlmutter said.

Cannon paid for processing the

photos and is entitled to them for promotional purposes, Perlmutter said. The Dereks' attorney, Alfred Rothman, did not return telephone calls for comment Tuesday.

Derek argued that publishing the pictures would be an invasion of his wife's privacy, Perlmutter said.

But the judge said that because Derek, the film's director, writer and cinematographer, had total control over "Bolero," he and his wife had waived any claim to invasion of their right of privacy.

"Bolero," dropped from

MGM-UA's release schedule in May after the film received a preliminary X rating from the Motion Picture Association of America's Code and Ratings Administration, is scheduled for release by Cannon in late August.

"Bolero," in which Miss Derek plays an American heiress looking for romance, will not have a rating, Perlmutter said.

## 'Joseph' Is Musical 'Fun'

It's Monday night, it's raining, and dedicated cigarette smokers crowd the front steps of McGinnis Theater during the intermission of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat."

"Well," the man beside me says to his companion, "it's different

from the others and I guess there's lots of critiques that could be written." He darts a glance at my notebook and stands a little taller. "But I'm having fun," he says loudly.

That's probably the most succinct review "Joseph," which opened Monday night at the East Carolina Summer Theater, will ever receive.

"Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" is pure musical show — an hour-long production with a five-minute plot. The show is cheerfully and blatantly devoid of characterization, subplot and theme, and revels in a total lack of dramatic tension.

Fortunately, its creators — Tim Rice and Andrew Lloyd Webber, who later wrote "Evita," "Jesus Christ Superstar" and "Cats" — never take "Joseph" seriously. And happily, the fast-paced Summer Theater production, directed and choreographed by Jay Fox, treats "Joseph" with the energetic irreverence it deserves.

"Joseph" is based on the biblical story of Joseph and his 11 brothers, who sell him into slavery. The Technicolor version uses the story less as a plot than as an excuse for a musical juggling act that parodies musical styles from Gene Autry to Elvis Presley to French chanson.

The show takes its form and momentum from its musical balance and comedic timing and goes for the laughs from start to finish.

The East Carolina production, which runs through Saturday of this week, features Barbara Gulan, narrator; David Heckert, Pharaoh, and Bruce Ewing in the title role.

Miss Gulan, who is on stage from rise to close, gives an energetic and well-defined performance as the show's narrator. Her voice is strong and clear in the opening number of both acts. Unfortunately, her voice loses volume and faults in the acoustics of the theater both work against her for much of the play.

David Heckert, the Presley-style Pharaoh, has similar problems in the second act but though barely audible, manages to stop the show with the sheer pelvic power of his Elvis parody.

Bruce Ewing as Joseph performs one of the play's most demanding roles well, but the show's spark and drive are generated by Joseph's brothers (Michael Scott Krohn, Gary Lamb, Jeff Loeffelholz, John Vaughn, Gerry McIntyre, Kevin Bailey, Leonard Goffredo, John J. Peterson, Loren Watkins, Eric Sox and Mitchell Riggs).

Standouts include Loren Watkins (in a Gene Autry parody), Kevin Bailey (in a parody of a French chanson), and particularly Gary Lamb who, through a twist of double-casting, manages to steal the same scene twice.

John Kuhn and Doug Mitchell offer strong performances as Jacob and Potiphar, respectively. And the Technicolor lighting and slightly out-of-hand costuming match the irreverent slant of the production.

With any luck at all, "Joseph" should never be confused with anything more than show. The main danger, judging from Monday night's performance, may be to occasionally let the "show" of the piece backslide to "show-off." But all in all, the man on the steps was right: "There's lots of critiques that could be written" on "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" — but the show is still fun.

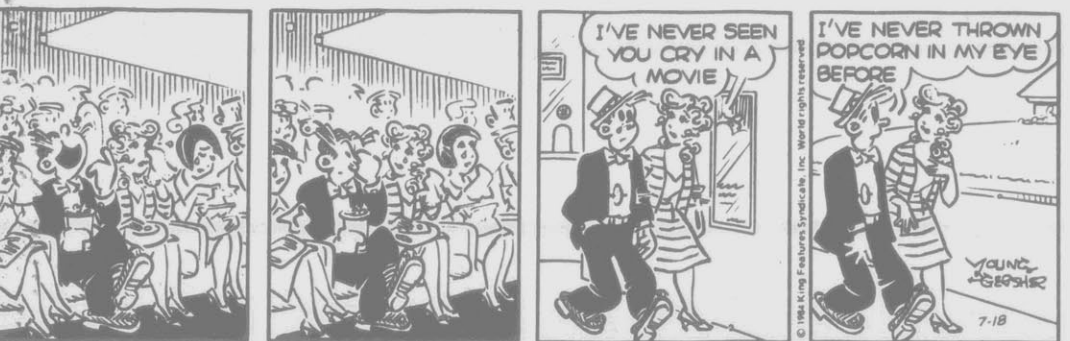

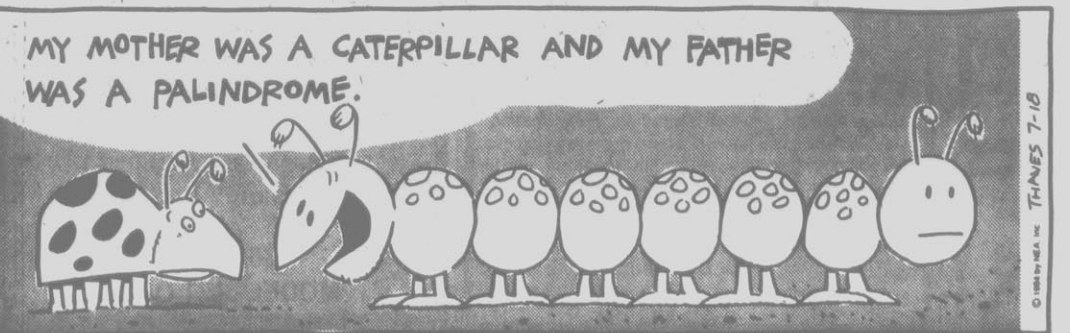

# Jobless Rates Show Decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — Only four states were still struggling with double-digit unemployment rates in May but a slew of cities were hampered by high levels of joblessness, the government says.

In its monthly report, the Labor Department said Tuesday that four states — Alabama, Alaska, Michigan and West Virginia — registered unemployment levels in May above 10 percent.

West Virginia posted the highest at 13.7 percent, which was 5.1 percentage points below its May 1983 rate. Others were: Alabama, 10.4 percent; Alaska, 10.5 percent; and Michigan, 11.3 percent.

Two metropolitan areas in Texas had the highest rates of 240 cities surveyed by the department. Laredo turned in a 17.3 percent jobless rate and the McAllen-Pharr-Edinburg area had 18.3 percent.

Modesto, Calif., recorded 17.5 percent, the report said. Also posting double-digit rates were cities in Alabama, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Minnesota, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

At the other end of the scale, Nebraska weighed in with only a 3.6 percent jobless rate in May.

Other low rates were recorded in Massachusetts, 4.0 percent; Connecticut, 4.1 percent; North and South Dakota, 4.2 percent; and Virginia, 4.3 percent.

Cities with unemployment below 3 percent were: Stamford, Conn.; Nashua, N.H.; and Lincoln, Neb.

Nationally, the seasonally unadjusted civilian unemployment rate fell from 9.8 percent in May 1983 to 7.2 percent in May 1984.

State-by-state unemployment rates are not adjusted to discount seasonal factors. They are compared on a year-to-year basis rather than month-to-month to lessen the impact of seasonal variations on the numbers.

The overall civilian jobless rate stood at a seasonally adjusted 7.1 percent in June, the lowest since April 1980.

# State Appealing Ruling On DUI

RALEIGH (AP) — The Attorney General's office has asked the state appeals court to hear the state's case involving the Safe Roads Act, which has come under fire since it was enacted last October.

Special Deputy Attorney General Ike Avery Monday filed written notice appealing a Wake Superior Court judge's dismissal of a lawsuit seeking to consolidate constitutional challenges to the driving-while-impaired law.

The suit was filed two months ago against 22 defendants, including seven district judges who objected to the DWI law on constitutional grounds. The action was brought to settle legal challenges quickly by getting the Superior Court to rule on the law's constitutionality. The attorney general's office also sought to bar District Court judges from raising constitutional challenges to DWI in the future.

Last month, a Wake County judge dismissed the suit, saying any ruling made at the Superior Court level would still be subject to appeal and would not ultimately settle the controversy involving the Safe Roads Act.

Attorneys across the state have questioned the constitutionality of the 10-day license revocation and the use of affidavits in court from Breathalyzer operators. Some judges contend the law is vague and ambiguous and have refused to hear DWI cases.

Avery said that while he is prepared to present the state's case to the North Carolina Court of Appeals, the attorney general's office also is trying to take the case directly to the state Supreme Court.

If the state's highest court agrees to consider the suit, the earliest several constitutional issues can be resolved would be October. If the case goes to the state appeals court, legal arguments would not be heard until next January or February, Avery said.

# S.C. Town Says No To Secession

HEMINGWAY, S.C. (AP) — Blacks cheered while whites stood sullenly in small groups along Main Street as word that a succession referendum which has polarized this small tobacco farming community for the past 13 months had failed.

Voters Tuesday narrowly rejected an attempt to allow the predominantly white community of Hemingway and adjoining Johnson Township to secede from predominantly black Williamsburg County.

While the local area is 54 percent white, Williamsburg County, one of the poorest in the state, is 65 percent black. "It's fantastic," Freddie Williams, a spokesman for the Florence civil rights group Operation Help, said of the referendum's defeat.

He said it showed that both blacks and white "love Williamsburg County, and they saw behind the racial motives of the people who supported the secession."

"I am certainly disappointed," said attorney Bill Chandler, one of the organizers of the annexation drive. "But I think we gave it a good effort. I don't know how to break it down along racial lines. I assume we got some black votes and they got some white ones."

Final totals in the Hemingway area showed that while 1,299 voters favored annexation by neighboring Florence County and 889 were opposed, the move failed to win the two-thirds majority needed for approval.

# Business 'Vision' Needed

ASHEVILLE (AP) — It may take intuitive vision as well as technical expertise for American businessmen to survive an increasingly competitive world market, the chairman of the board of Eastman Kodak Co. said Tuesday.

Colby H. Chandler, in the keynote address to about 1,100 managers at the opening of the 65th annual Southern Industrial Relations Conference in Black Mountain, pointed to competition from the Far East.

He noted that 86 different countries have automobile assembly lines and 95 percent of all baseball mitts are sewn in Japan from Brazilian leather. Chandler added that American industry must learn how to improve incentive among employees by taking a less aggressive management role.

"People don't want to be managed. They want to be led. Who ever heard of a world manager? You have world leaders," Chandler said.

Drawing on Lao-tse's proverbs, Chandler said, "The strictly rational approach to leadership works best when the future is a predictable straight line. When tomorrow is characterized by ambiguity and surprise, intuition, experience, feeling, and gut reaction become important."

Chandler urged the businessmen to become "pathfinders, decision makers and implementers" in that order.

That quality of human imagination rather than high technology will pave the way of the future for American business, Chandler said.

# Support Groups Help 'Forgotten' Kids In Coping

NEW YORK (AP) — Often referred to as the "forgotten children," siblings of the mentally retarded are beginning to speak out and are finally being heard, says Jack Gorelick, associate executive director of the Association for the Help of Retarded Children (AHRC), New York City chapter.

"These children have been neglected and ignored by professionals in the field and taken for granted by parents and families," says Gorelick, adding that a new force is emerging in the field of developmental disabilities: sibling power.

There are approximately 6 million Americans who are mentally retarded, according to Gorelick, and about one in 10 people in the United States has a mentally retarded person in the family.

"In response to the overwhelming demand and need for sibling support groups and related information, AHRC has started a pilot sibling network program, which has begun to address sibling issues locally and nationally," he says.

It is, he reports, one of the first organized self-help groups in the country for brothers and sisters of the mentally retarded.

"We are involved in the family situation whether or not we want to be," says Bonnie Cohen, a social worker in the field and a sibling herself. "We want to meet with other siblings, to sort out our own feelings and find our own directions."

"Normal" siblings want to have their own lives but are torn by family relationships and responsibilities, Gorelick notes. Many express guilt and anger over their situations and their siblings.

"Siblings are forced to play many roles ... that of caretaker, child and surrogate parent," he says. "Some siblings have so much responsibility that they become adults at a very early age, even though they haven't finished being children themselves."

Siblings often feel that they grew up deprived of parental attention and that they were not praised as much for their achievements as were other children in households without a handicapped child, he adds.

"Two persistent issues," Gorelick explains, "are identity and genetics. Will I become like my brother or sister? Am I handicapped myself? Will my children be retarded? Siblings have anxieties about dating, marriage and having children, as well as about having a continuing relationship with their handicapped brother or sister in the context of their own lives."

Many adults are also worried

about the futures of their handicapped siblings, including guardianship issues and what arrangements are possible for residence, occupation and care should their parents die, he points out.

"Siblings of all ages frequently feel isolated and need to talk to other people about their feelings and thoughts on living with a handicapped brother or sister," Ms. Cohen says. "To be able to say

publicly that you feel murderous rage at times toward your handicapped sibling is a boon."

Until recently, she says, sibling groups were non-existent and a typical parent reaction was, "I'm afraid to hear what my daughter is going to say."

Many siblings resent professional help because they feel that professionals tend to view them under a microscope, Gorelick says, explain-

ing that professionals sometimes have an urge to solve or cure the problem and siblings know that the "problem," the handicap, is not conducive to a quick fix.

"In the past, professionals have dutifully listed siblings' names and ages on intake sheets and then usually have ignored their needs and their concerns," Gorelick says. "Associations for the handicapped must remember that very little work

has been done that could ever quantify or blueprint the roles siblings play, the emotions and responsibilities they experience or the relationships they have with their handicapped siblings."

Traditionally, he says, associations have been concerned with providing services for the handicapped or advocating, with governments and society, better treatment. Associations have

primarily been parents' or professionals' organizations and siblings have not been a main focus.

Recently, however, due to siblings' articulation of their needs, more time and effort is being focused on the families of handicapped persons as well, Gorelick says. The result has been conferences covering sibling concerns, newsletters, case studies, research articles and formation of sibling groups.

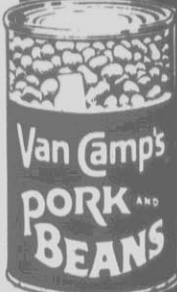

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## City Seeks New Face

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP) — A government dream to "dignify" this congested northern industrial center is rising from the rubble of 400 years in the heart of Old Monterrey.

The "Grand Plaza," 100 acres of downtown redevelopment with enough open space to make a city planner jealous, "is the most ambitious urban project in the country at the moment," said Nuevo Leon state Gov. Alfonso Martinez Dominguez. "It's one of the greatest achievements of my administration."

Salvador Perez Chavez, the governor's public relations director, said Martinez Dominguez had undertaken the project three years ago, "to leave a more dignified city for our children."

The plaza has moved ahead steadily despite Mexico's severe economic crisis and some public criticism.

The site, settled when Monterrey was founded in 1596, was pitted with decaying buildings and houses, cantinas and brothels, said Perez Chavez.

Today, the steel-beamed triangular skeleton of a 15-story state office building looms upward on one side of the plaza. The cement shell of a new Monterrey cultural center stands on another side, while a huge parking lot and vehicular tunnel are under construction below ground.

In keeping with the blend of colonial and modern architecture traditional in Monterrey, government designers preserved the best of the old buildings on the plaza.

But the pride of this Nuevo Leon state capital will be the 50-acre pedestrian mall stretching from the modern city hall to the 75-year-old Governor's Palace.

The mall — tree-filled mini parks, cascading water fountains and wide plazas — one day will be straddled by flourishing restaurants, boutiques, hotels and office buildings if the dream reaches its climax.

Though Monterrey's 2.5 million citizens have watched for years as sprawling cement factories and smokestacks took priority over parks and plazas in the dash for development, many complain the project is too extravagant for the times.

"The governor has been criticized for putting construction of a luxury site ahead of basic needs," Perez Chavez said. He says the criticism is unjust.

About 5,000 laborers have continued to work on the project during the economic crisis and the government plan calls for the project to pay for itself through the sale of 108,000 square yards of land.

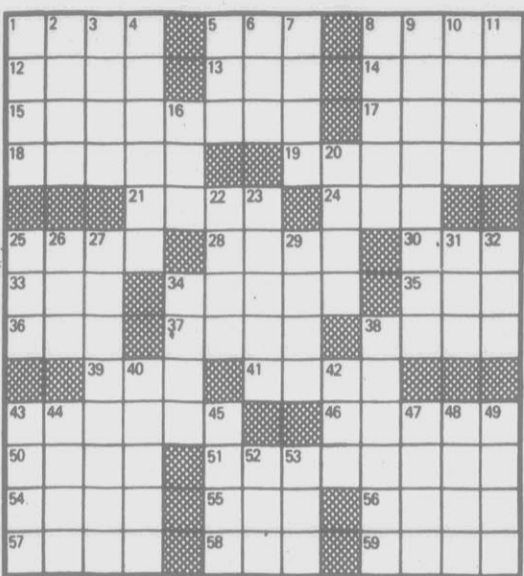

Whether West should have been taken in by declarer's ruse is open to question. Had he stopped to count declarer's points, he would have found that there was no way declarer could have enough for an opening no trump bid without either the ace or queen of clubs.

#### Laws Revoked

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — The military government has revoked two laws that were criticized by opposition leaders as instruments of repression.

One, put into effect last year, had given the government the power to bar citizens from political activity for two to seven years. The other, passed in 1977, empowered it to fire public officials without giving cause.

The revocations were designed "to create conditions that facilitate national elections," the government of President Gregorio Alvarez said in a prepared statement.

#### Bishopric Letter

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The Philippines' Roman Catholic bishops have drafted a pastoral letter urging repeal of President Ferdinand E. Marcos' law-making powers and proposing a nationwide fast to appeal for an end to violent killings.

The letter also strongly criticizes the "secret marshals" corps created by Marcos to combat crime, saying "criminals are not animals" to be hunted and killed.

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## How They Voted

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes before the current summer recess.

### HOUSE

**PARTIES** — By a vote of 226 for and 169 against, the House passed a bill (HR 5950) to spend an additional \$4 million in taxpayer subsidies of the 1984 Democratic and Republican presidential nominating conventions. The Senate later approved the bill on a non-record vote.

This brings the subsidy of convention expenses to about \$8 million per party. The money is raised through the optional "presidential check-off" box on tax returns that diverts \$1 or \$2 of many tax payments from the general fund to a presidential election fund.

Supporter Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., said House members as "patriotic Americans" should approve the added subsidy, which is earmarked for security at San Francisco and Dallas.

Opponent Lynn Martin, R-Ill., said San Francisco and Dallas "should be ashamed of themselves" for seeking the money in view of all the economic benefits the conventions will generate for them.

Members voting yes favored a 25 percent increase in the taxpayer subsidy of this year's GOP and Democratic nominating conventions.

North Carolina representatives voting yes were Tim Valentine, D-2; Charles Whitley, D-3; Ike Andrews, D-4; Stephen Neal, D-5; Charles Britt, D-6; Charles Rose, D-7; W.G. Hefner, D-8; James Broyhill, R-10, and James Clarke, D-11.

Walter B. Jones, D-1, voted no. James Martin, R-9, did not vote.

**PORK** — By a vote of 259 for and 33 against, the House passed and sent to the Senate a bill (HR 3678) authorizing \$9.2 billion over five years for planning or building more than 300 U.S. Army Corps of

Engineers projects throughout the country. This is the first large-scale water resources bill approved by the House since 1976.

In addition to funding projects such as port dredging and navigation to spur commerce and dam construction to control flooding, the bill provides loans for repairing water systems in aging cities. Also, it cancels hundreds of planned but outdated Corps of Engineers projects, and creates a National Board on Water Resources Policy to set national priorities for water-related construction.

Supporter Arlan Stangeland, R-Minn., said "we are fast approaching the point where deteriorated or outdated (public works) are posing bottlenecks to national economic growth."

Opponent Dick Cheney, R-Wyo., said the National Board on Water Resources Policy revives a bad idea of the Carter Administration and would deprive states of "fundamental control over their own water."

Members voting yes supported the bill.

North Carolina representatives voting yes were Walter Jones, Valentine, Britt, Rose and Hefner. Broyhill voted no.

Those not voting were Whitley, Ike Andrews, Neal, James Martin and Clarke.

**SHARING** — By a vote of 85 for and 213 against, the House rejected an amendment placing a greater financial burden on local interests that directly benefit from federal development of water resources. The amendment, which was backed by President Reagan, was proposed to HR 3678 (above).

Local beneficiaries are required to contribute a small part of the cost of most water projects funded in the bill, on the rationale that those who reap direct profits from the taxpayers' investment should invest some of their own money. This amendment sought to require part of the cost-sharing payment to be made "up front" as a test of whether local beneficiaries are committed to the project.

North intended to employ the Stayman Convention as an invitational sequence over his partner's no trump opening. However, when South showed a spade suit, North changed his mind and barged into game. Because of his collection of quacks (as queens and jacks are known in the trade), he might have been wiser to carry through with his original intention and bid only three spades.

West led a diamond, and declarer thought that he had seen better contracts. But when East won the ace of diamonds and continued the suit, declarer saw a ray of light. If the opponents could be convinced to attack clubs rather hearts, he might get home. So, at trick two, declarer won the king of diamonds and continued with the 10. Since one heart discard would avail him naught, he sluffed a club from dummy!

Next came the king of spades, taken by West's ace. Impressed by declarer's

# Hong Kong's Trade Status In Jeopardy

HONG KONG (AP) — Political uncertainty stalks this small British colony. A barren island ceded to Britain in the mid-19th century, Hong Kong has become the world's third-largest financial center, after New York and London, and the world's 18th largest trading power. It's been no small feat. Except for its excellent harbor, Hong Kong has few natural resources. A total of 5.5 million people are crammed into 412 square miles of mainly inhospitable hilly terrain. What made Hong Kong's prosperity possible was political stability. But questions about the future keep surfacing, with no answers in sight. For almost two years, dating back to a visit by British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher to Peking in September 1982, China and Britain

have been discussing the future of the British colony after 1997, the expiration date of Britain's lease on 92 percent of Hong Kong's territory. China has said it will reassert sovereignty over all of the colony, but leave Hong Kong's social and economic systems unchanged for 50 years. The two countries have held 18 rounds of talks since 1982 in an attempt to reach agreement by September of this year. Chinese leaders have said they will make a unilateral announcement if no agreement is reached by that deadline. The continuing uncertainty about Hong Kong's future has caused the worst political turmoil since China's Cultural Revolution inspired riots in 1967. In a place where people vote not with ballots but checkbooks, the stock market is one barometer of

political and economic health. The Hang Seng stock index, which hovered slightly below the 1,100 level shortly before Thatcher's visit, nosedived and reached a low of 690 last October. And when a three-day visit by Britain's state minister for Hong Kong affairs was announced last week, the index dropped more than 41 points and closed at 763.61. The visit set off rumors that the British-Chinese negotiations had hit snags. In this period, the Hong Kong dollar also has lost value as compared to the U.S. dollar. John Gray, assistant general manager of the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank, which acts as Hong Kong's central bank, has warned that if a two-year decline in industrial investment continues it could blunt the competitiveness of Hong Kong's exports.

The British colony is the world's largest exporter of clothing as well as toys and games. It also exports more watches and radio receivers than any other trading power. In trade, Hong Kong ranks below South Korea but above East Germany, which has a population three times bigger and a territory 101 times larger than Hong Kong's. Some countries are said to be waiting in the wings for Hong Kong's demise. Guam officials hope that their island could become the new regional financial center. Some Australian politicians believe that Sydney could be turned into a second Hong Kong. South Korea plans to develop its southern island of Cheju into a business and tourist center to succeed Hong Kong. Chinese leaders refuse to acknowledge that British administration is responsible for Hong Kong's prosperity.

said "a lot of so-called vital projects would become less necessary the moment we ask the beneficiaries ... to help with the costs."

Opponent Virginia Smith, R-Neb., said "we have never provided (public works) money on the basis of the fellow that had the most at home. We have provided it on the basis of need."

Members voting no were opposed to requiring up-front payment of part of the local share of water resources projects.

Broyhill voted yes. Those voting no were Walter Jones, Valentine, Britt, Rose and Hefner.

Not voting were Whitley, Ike Andrews, Neal, James Martin and Clarke.

## SENATE

**ACROSS** - By a vote of 49 for and 44 against, the Senate tabled (killed) an amendment to inflict a four percent across-the-board cut in the fiscal 1985 appropriations bill for the Justice, State and Commerce departments and the federal judiciary.

As later passed and sent to conference with the House, the bill (HR 5712) has a \$11.45 billion pricetag, \$722 million above the House figure and \$296 million more than the Administration had requested.

Warren Rudman, R-N.H., who voted to kill the proposed cut, said "accusations that the bill is too high" should be directed at the White House. "These increases, in the main, were requested by the president," he said.

Don Nickles, R-Okla., who sponsored the amendment, chided lawmakers who refuse to cut spending after "all the time running back to the states and districts saying, 'Yes, these deficits are terrible and we need to get them down.'"

Senators voting yes were opposed to the four percent spending cut.

North Carolina senators John East, R, and Jesse Helms, R, both voted no.

**SPREAD** - The Senate rejected, 44 for and 49 against, an amendment to spread America's democratic ideals throughout the world by means of educational and cultural exchanges rather than through the National Endowment for Democracy.

The amendment sought to kill a \$21.3 million appropriation for the year-old endowment, while increasing funding of the USIA's Fulbright and Hubert H. Humphrey fellowship programs by \$11.9 million. It was proposed to HR 5712 (above). The House earlier deleted all fiscal 1985 funding for the endowment, and whether the project will survive is to be determined in a House-Senate conference.

The Democratic and Republican parties, along with the AFL-CIO and U.S. Chamber of Commerce, operate the National Endowment for Democracy with taxpayers' money, developing various programs to promote democratic ideals overseas.

Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., who supported the amendment, said "I have never seen, in 32 years of public office, such a raucous, outrageous raid on the federal Treasury" as the endowment is making.

Opponent Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, called the endowment budget "a pittance compared to what the Russians are spending" worldwide to undermine democracy.

Senators voting yes wanted to kill the National Endowment for Democracy and allocate part of its budget to educational and public exchanges.

Both East and Helms voted yes.

**PREVENT** - The Senate rejected, 36 for and 63 against, an amendment to prevent the Federal Trade Commission from bringing anti-trust actions against local governments. This was a response to FTC suits to end taxicab fare regulation by New Orleans and Minneapolis.

The House voted previously to delete fiscal 1985 FTC funding for such actions. The Senate version of the bill (HR 5712; above) permits FTC suits that seek injunctive relief but not financial damages. The issue will be settled in conference with the House.

Supporter Bennett Johnston, D-La., said the FTC should spend its limited resources on large economic issues such as corporate takeovers rather than on "purely local matters."

Opponent Slade Gorton, R-Wash., said it "may well be a good idea" for the FTC to promote competition in the taxicab industries of various cities.

Senators voting no wanted the FTC to have limited anti-trust authority over certain municipal matters.

East and Helms voted no.

**MOORHEAD, Minn. (AP)** - A woman who allegedly threatened her two children with beatings unless they shoplifted faces a hearing Aug. 6 after pleading innocent to possessing stolen property and a small amount of marijuana.

LaVonne Shirley Mageors, 36, remains free on a \$5,000 bond after entering the innocent plea in Clay County Court.

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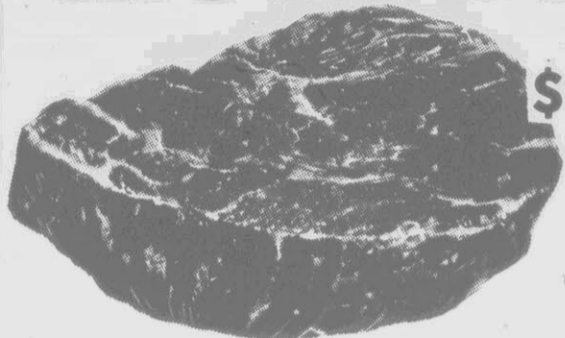

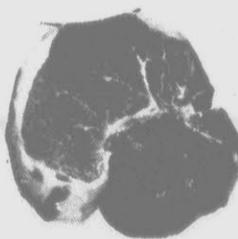

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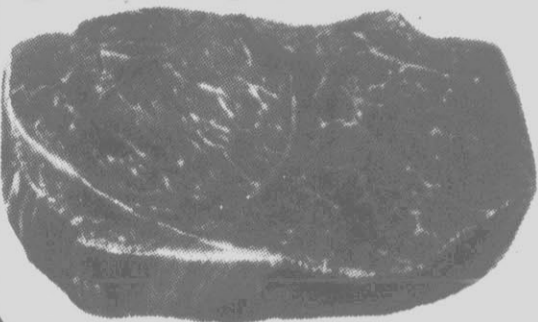

## Vandal Strikes Roman Gardens

ROME (AP) — A man went on a rampage in the gardens of Rome's largest park and disfigured 86 marble busts, police report.

The man knocked several of the two-foot-high marble busts off their pedestals Monday and repeatedly struck them with a large cobblestone, police said. They said other busts had chipped noses, beards or ears, and that the man was found carrying a bag full of noses from the statues.

Police said they arrested the man inside the 1,700-acre Villa Borghese after they found him smashing a bust on the ground. They said he said he was 40 and born in Poland.

The man identified himself as Ierzj Gumemiale, the Italian news agency ANSA said. ANSA said police heard the man say he acted "to attract attention to Poland" and because "I am against the KGB" — the Soviet secret police.

The suspect was not charged immediately and was taken to a prison hospital.

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# Hosiery Makers Turning To Robots

CHARLOTTE (AP) — The nation's hosiery manufacturers are looking to fashion designers and even robots to help get a leg up on overseas competition, industry officials say.

"The industry is really moving to become fashion-oriented," said an official with the Charlotte-based National Association of Hosiery Manufacturers. "They still make plain black socks for men, but they're getting involved in all sorts of different colors, designs and patterns."

The official, who asked not to be identified, said imports account for about 3.5 million dozen pairs of hosiery per year, compared to U.S. production of about 309 million dozen pairs.

"That doesn't look like a great deal," he said. "But it's become a little heavier in the last few months. Our people are very much aware of it — they've been modernizing and putting in new machinery."

Robots are being tested at some hosiery plants in an effort to improve productivity, but applications are more difficult with these "soft products" than with more rigid and more easily handled products, the official said.

The association has sent promotional kits on the upcoming National Hosiery Week to about 1,600 retailers across the country on behalf of its members. The association wants to stress the wide variety of American-made hosiery products during the week, Aug. 12-18.

That variety includes special jogging socks with padded bottoms and socks for children featuring characters from Star Wars and the Muppets.

In addition to the retail promotion, National Hosiery Week will also be used by many mills to honor employees and enhance community relations. For example, 15 mills in High Point will be gathering for a celebration and joint plant tours.

Some plants in other major hosiery areas, such as Hickory, Mount Airy, Burlington and Asheboro, will be holding breakfasts and barbecues.

North Carolina alone manufactures more than half of the hosiery produced in the United States. The 415 plants across the nation employ about 66,000 people and produce about \$6 billion worth of socks, stockings, tights, pantyhose and other products per year.

"They're largely family-owned, and almost all are located in small towns," said the official. "Hosiery is more of a textile than an apparel. It goes from yarn to sock — there's nothing in between."

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## Frozen Embryo Births Reported

CAMBRIDGE, England (AP) — Scientists say two pregnancies have resulted from embryos that were frozen and thawed before being implanted in the prospective mothers' wombs — the first successful use of the frozen embryo technique in Britain.

The procedures were carried out by "test-tube" baby pioneers Dr. Patrick Steptoe and Robert Edwards, a spokesman for their clinic at Bourn Hall near Cambridge said.

Two babies have been produced from frozen embryos. The first, a girl, was born in Melbourne, Australia, in late March. The second, a boy, was born in the Netherlands on July 6. Both were reported healthy.

Scientists at the University of Southern California said they used frozen embryos to produce five pregnancies in May.

The British women, who were not identified, are nearly two months pregnant, clinic spokesman Bill Hunter said.

## Pope Schedules Canadian Visit

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican has released the full schedule for Pope John Paul II's 12-day trip to Canada in September, during which he will meet twice with Indians and Eskimos.

The trip begins in predominantly Roman Catholic Quebec province on Sept. 9, takes him eastward to St. John's, Moncton and Halifax, westward to Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Vancouver and then back east to the capital, Ottawa, before departing for Rome on Sept. 20.

The pope is scheduled to meet with Indians and Eskimos at isolated Fort Simpson in the Northwest Territories and also in Quebec.

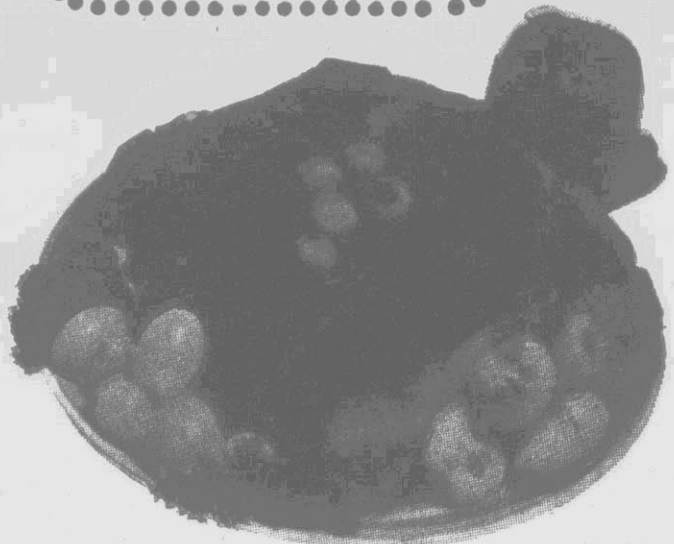
It will be John Paul's 23rd foreign tour.
