## 'A Giant Has Fallen'

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — The death of former U.S. Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., the "country lawyer" who presided over the Watergate hearings that led to the resignation of a president, has cost the nation a "towering historical figure" who championed the Constitution.

Ervin, 88, died of respiratory failure Tuesday at North Carolina Baptist Hospital's Bowman Gray Medical Center, said hospital spokesman Roger Rollman. Kidney failure contributed to his death, Rollman said.

The funeral will be held at 2 p.m. Friday at First Presbyterian Church in Morganton with burial at Forest Hills Cemetery, according to Kirksey Funeral Home, which is handling the arrangements.

A critic of the civil rights movement and a supporter of individual civil liberties during his 20 years in the Senate, Ervin was hailed by former Gov. Jim Hunt as a man who "loved the Constitution more than any man alive today."

"He protected it during its time of greatest crisis and helped write history for our state and nation," Hunt said. "He will truly be recorded as a towering historical figure and all North Carolina will forever be proud of him."

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., who called Ervin his mentor, adviser on constitutional matters and friend, said, "A giant has fallen ... dedica-

tion. I've never known a more remarkable American than Sam Ervin."

U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica, who presided over trials involving the break-in at Democratic party headquarters in 1972 and the subsequent White House coverup, said: "I was very fond of him and admired his patriotism, his dedica-

tion to his work and above all, his courage."

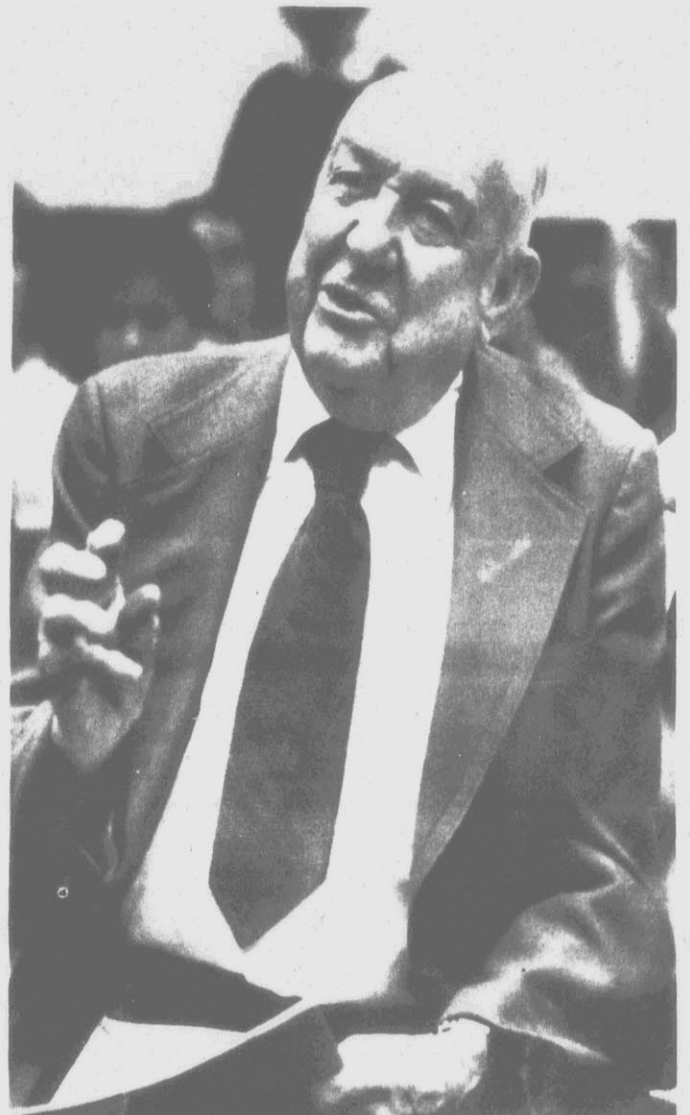
Ervin's strict interpretation of the Constitution defied easy political classification. He sided with liberals and conservatives in becoming one of the chamber's most respected authorities on Constitutional law.

Ervin battled affirmative action proposals, the Equal Rights

Amendment, surveillance of dissenters during the Vietnam War and efforts to return prayer to public schools.

For him, it was all the same battle — preserving the Constitution.

Ervin's independence made him a natural choice when Senate leaders sought a chairman for the sensitive (Please turn to page 8)

## Ervin 'Was An Institution'

Sen. Sam Ervin Jr. will be "sorely missed" in the state and the nation, according to local politicians. Today he was remembered as a humorous man who was a well-respected supporter of the U.S. Constitution.

Ervin, who spent 20 years in the U.S. Senate and was chairman of the Senate Watergate Committee, died Tuesday of respiratory failure at Bowman Gray Medical Center at N.C. Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. He was 88.

"Certainly North Carolina as well as the entire nation has lost one of the most outstanding citizens of this entire generation," said U.S. Rep. Walter B. Jones, a Pitt County Democrat. "Who can forget the impartial yet thorough investigation of the Watergate Committee of

which he served as chairman. His knowledge of the Constitution was so vital at that time and meant more to this nation that one can perceive.

"I am sure the entire nation is saddened by his death, but his family can be assured that no public servant in recent times has been held in any higher regard than 'Senator Sam.'"

"He was such a remarkable man," said Betty Speir of Bethel, national committeewoman for the Democratic Party. "Sam Ervin was more than just a man to North Carolina, he was an institution. He represented to us the abiding faith that North Carolinians have in the Constitution and in law and order."

"He helped guide us through very difficult periods in our history and he did it with much dignity and humor. Through him, we were

always able to laugh at our own weaknesses. He was a very special man whose place in history is secure."

Malcolm Howard, a Greenville attorney and a member of the White House legal staff during the Nixon administration, said, "I think Senator Ervin was a great American and obviously one of the Constitutional experts of this century. He performed a valuable service throughout his Senate days, and particularly as it related to the Watergate issues."

"We are all grieved by the passing of Senator Ervin," said Clifton Everett Jr., chairman of the Pitt County Board of Elections. "He was one of the most respected constitutional authorities ... His influence and guidance and counsel will be (Please turn to page 8)

## Dusty And Dry, Pitt Awaits Showers

Farmers and forestry officials are brushing off dust and holding their breath for rain tonight as a cold front is expected to move across North Carolina, bringing a 40 percent chance of much-needed rain to the east.

Meanwhile, sunny skies today continued to parch already dry fields and forests, escalating area farmers' concern for crops and foresters' fear of wildfire.

Less than an inch of rain has fallen in Pitt County in April, according to

measurements by Greenville Utilities' Water Plant. In comparison, the county received 3.4 inches of rain in April 1984, which weather officials say was a normal year. The spring drought, already responsible for several wildfires in the state that did millions of dollars of damage to forests, has left most woods and farms bone dry.

According to Pitt Extension Chairman Leroy James, the county's wheat crop has been hit hardest by the drought. "The wheat is really suffering," James said today. "If we don't get some rain in

the next few days, I'm afraid we'll have a very short crop of wheat this year."

The effect of the dry weather is less severe on tobacco, he said, but "there is some (tobacco) in the fields that needs resetting," James said. "The land is so thirsty that the root systems can't develop."

The extension chairman said conditions were currently too dry for farmers to plant peanuts and soybeans, crops which are normally in the ground by late April or early May. "It's just too dry (for the seeds to germinate). Farmers need to wait until we have a little water to put the

seed in the ground," he said.

The county's corn crop "is OK right now," James said. "The (mid-April) frost did more damage than anything else." The nitrogen in fields will "perk the corn up" despite the drought, he added.

The county needs at least an inch of rain to alleviate the dry conditions, according to James. "A slow inch or inch and a half of rain would really be a blessing in Pitt County now," he said. "That is exactly what we need."

Forest service personnel, already tensed by what some say is the worst

fire season in history, are also keeping their fingers crossed for precipitation. The statewide burning ban which into effect at 8 a.m. Monday remained in effect today. "The drought conditions are getting critical for us," Tom Harris, forest ranger for Pitt County, said today. "The woods and fields are very dry."

Extremely low humidity — 17 percent on Tuesday — also increased the possibility of a forest fire, Harris said. Harris said the humidity was expected to increase today, but that weather forecasters

predicted that winds would increase to 12-20 knots, another danger for woods land.

"In the 10 years I've been here, this is the most critical fire season I've seen," Harris said.

According to National Weather Service forecasts, tonight will be mostly cloudy with a 40 percent chance of showers or thunderstorms. The low will be near 60, with southwest winds. On Thursday there will be a 40 percent chance of an early morning shower followed by partial clearing. Highs will reach the lower 80s.

## Senator East Returns To Hospital

U.S. Sen. John East has returned to Bethesda Naval Hospital in Maryland for "further observation and treatment" of a urinary tract ailment that required surgery earlier this year, an East spokesman says.

Palmer C. Stacy, administrative assistant, issued a one-paragraph statement Tuesday saying East had been hospitalized Saturday. Neither Stacy nor East's press secretary, Jerry Woodruff, could be reached for comment.

Lt. Charles Updegrave, public information officer for the hospital, said in

an interview that East was admitted at 1:30 p.m. Saturday. He said East was in stable condition. He made no further comment.

U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms told reporters Tuesday that East was in the hospital for routine follow-up to his surgery.

Helms said he was notifying reporters to head off reporters' questions on why East would probably miss Tuesday night's Senate vote on aid to rebels in Nicaragua.

East spent more than a week in the Bethesda hospital in late February for surgery to remove a benign blockage in his urinary tract.

## National Consumer Week Proclaimed In North Carolina

"Consumers Should Know" is the theme of National Consumers Week, which started Monday and will continue through Sunday. The emphasis this year is on the right of consumers to adequate pre-purchase, post-purchase and money management information, and the responsibility of consumers to locate and use reliable information in their financial decision making.

Gov. Jim Martin followed President Reagan's lead in proclaiming the week as Consumers Week in North Carolina. Throughout the state, current consumer concerns are being featured in local school and community programs and in press coverage. The North Carolina Consumer's Council, a state-chartered, non-profit citizen's organization, will hold its annual meeting in Raleigh Saturday.

Health care and insurance costs are probably today's major consumer concern. Also causing confusion is the deregulation of the financial services and telephone industries. Complaints received by the Attorney General's Office Consumer Protection Section highlight consumer problems with creditors, home repairs, mail order purchases and car repair service.

Young people continue to underestimate the cost of car ownership, leading too often to poor credit ratings which are difficult to improve. The greatest cause of stress in families is disagreement about how to manage money. Many families spend more than they earn, making consumer purchases with credit which they cannot afford to repay.

Schools, businesses, community organizations and the media can

help people of all ages become knowledgeable consumers. Consumer economic education is part of the social studies, home economics, business education and math programs in the state's public schools. North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service offices in every county have a Home Economics Agent who offers Family Resource Management programs and materials for adults and a 4-H Agent who promotes youth activities in consumer education and management.

Responsible conduct by all parties in our market economy requires early training and lifelong continuing education. National Consumers Week emphasizes that need.

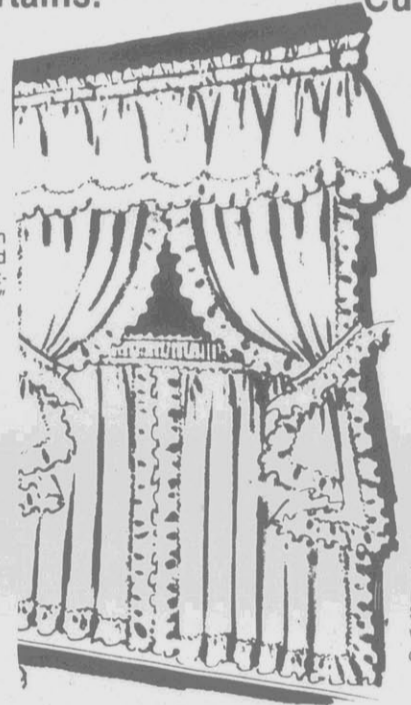

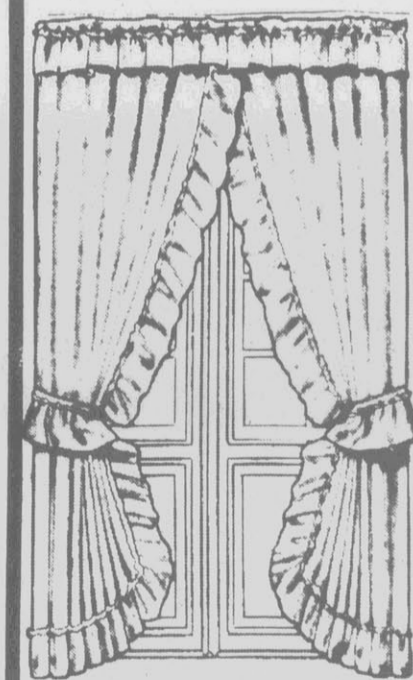
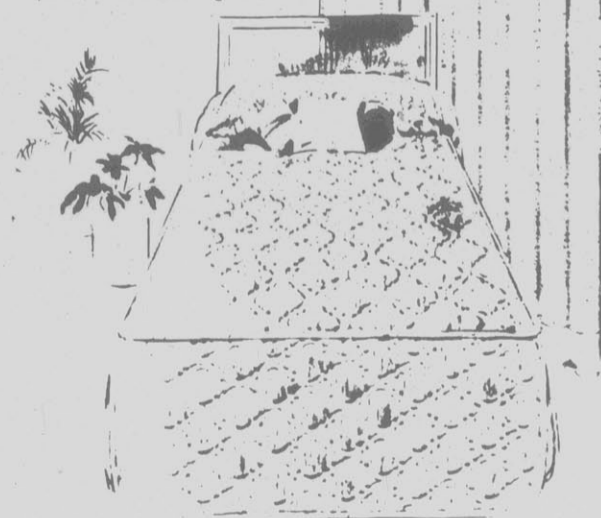

# Editorials

## Downtown

Opportunities abound in downtown Greenville. The area, despite being the oldest shopping center in the city, is a business district waiting to be rediscovered. It has good population areas nearby, adequate street access to outlying residential areas and good offstreet parking.

So why isn't it booming? A shift in shopping patterns might be the best answer to that question, but if all goes as planned, investors could be knocking down the doors as fast to get in downtown Greenville as they have to get out of central city areas in the past.

Evergreen, a local non-profit organization, with the help of the city and other investors, has hired Pennsylvania developer/investor Owen Kugel and his company to work on a plan to bring new life to Greenville's downtown district.

Kugel Associates is under contract to study the heart of Greenville (an area encompassing and extending beyond the Fifth Street area of the city commonly known as downtown) and make recommendations for revitalization. As part of that contract, the company is also required to make a \$2 million investment in downtown Greenville, or forfeit \$5,000 a month fees paid by Evergreen.

Kugel is also working on similar projects in seven other North Carolina cities and says he expects those efforts to bring the state \$100 million in downtown development within a year. He has already initiated similar projects in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Massachusetts.

We look forward to seeing what Kugel can do for Greenville and the rest of the state. Proper development and promotion could make this city's downtown a vital, thriving place once more.

## What's Ahead?

The flight of Discovery ended with another near-perfect landing after a two-day extension of its planned orbits in space. Such flights, which originally were filled with all the excitement, suspense and glamor the concept deserved, have been reduced by repetition ... and that's the way it was supposed to be.

Failure of an \$80 million communications satellite to fire itself into a higher orbit can hardly be blamed on the shuttle, nor does the misadventure appear (to us) as supporting advocates of satellite-launch via an unmanned rocket rather than the shuttle.

The incident did provide one more example of improvisation and teamwork between earthbound engineers and the flight team.

Lurking behind the complacent facade, however, is suspicion the shuttle fleet has been laying the groundwork for more spectaculars.

We have heard no reason why the craft is incapable of greater altitudes; though we also understand there has been no need as yet to use that capability. Halley's Comet might provide such a reason (specialized cameras might well be hoisted well above atmospheric distortion).

Too, construction of an orbiting space platform has been a longtime engineering dream. Concepts and blueprints abound. We're sure the idea is being weighed.

Back to the Discovery flight:

We'll confess some admiration for Utah's Sen. Jake Garn who rode the shuttle as a human guinea pig. His role was not a pleasant one — he was aboard to deliberately try to "get sick" in experiments dealing with motion sickness in space.

He stayed pretty much in the background during the flight save for one in-flight interview in which he heaped praise on the professionalism of the shuttle crew. The value of his contribution is up to analysis of the data he provides. However, the former Navy pilot came through looking good.

## The Vote Is Recorded

RALEIGH — Experience is valuable in any profession. In the General Assembly, some freshman Republican legislators learned just how valuable experience can be when House Democrats hoodwinked them into voting against a big tax cut.

Democrats set a trap for the Republicans in the House Finance Committee but the committee's veteran Republicans caught on and protected themselves with a vote to approve the tax cuts. The mostly less-experienced didn't catch on, voted their emotions, and now have a record of having opposed what could amount to one of the biggest tax cuts in North Carolina history.

Here's how the trap was set. Gov. Jim Martin has proposed a series of tax cuts that no one expects he'll get in totality. But he's made tax cutting such a big issue that the Democrats have to approve some tax relief.

The House leadership quietly drew up a package of tax cuts that a House Finance subcommittee attached to a bill already in committee. In that way, Republicans didn't

see the package until just before they had to vote on it.

Republicans were furious. They charged that the package was being crammed down their throats. And they argued that Martin's tax package had not been given due consideration.

Then they voted. All 30 committee Democrats voted for the tax cuts. Of the 18 Republicans, seven voted for the cuts, 11 against. (Of the 11, only three have at least a full term of experience.) The Republicans should have known something was up when the Democrats requested a roll call vote — instead of just a voice vote — to make sure there was a record of how each individual voted. Usually, the Republicans call for a roll call vote.

After they voted, veteran Republicans were more critical of their colleagues than were the Democrats.

Rep. Harold Brubaker, R-Randolph, said the 11 had allowed themselves to vote against the Democratic methods instead of voting for the substantive issue. In other

words, they voted with their emotions, not their brains.

"I don't know why the others (Republicans) voted against it," said Rep. Austin Allran, R-Catawba, who supported the cuts. "This is exactly what Gov. Martin campaigned for, what I campaigned for." Some Republicans had charged that the Democratic package was a "knee-jerk" response to Martin's tax cuts, that it was thoughtlessly put together to give the Democrats a political issue. Allran called that charge "far-fetched."

Rep. Maggie Keese-Forrester, R-Guilford, who also voted for the cuts, just shook her head and said, "You take what you can get ... compromise is the art of politics."

A Republican House member said the 11 had voted "stupidly." He said he'd told some of them that. "They said it was just a procedural vote. But I told them that in the 1980 elections, we beat (U.S. Sen.) Bobby Morgan primarily on procedural votes."

## Precedents At The Point Of A Gun

BERLIN — Although tension has eased since the murder of Maj. Arthur Nicholson in this focal point of Europe's division between East and West, a direct Soviet threat to shoot down an American corporate jet on a flight to Berlin several months ago shows that Moscow's unprincipled conduct could ignite another crisis at any moment.

The Soviet threat, held top-secret till now, was viewed with utmost seriousness by American officials and is reported here for the first time. The U.S. suddenly confronted an unprecedented Soviet demand to break longstanding practice and divulge information about the corporate jet the Russians had no right to under East-West access agreements signed in 1947. These pledged the Western powers unrestricted access through three air corridors over Soviet-controlled East Germany into West Berlin.

The dangerous incident comes to light just when the new Soviet regime of Mikhail Gorbachev is promising to end physical violence

against Western military teams (such as Maj. Nicholson's) operating in East Germany under those same 1947 post-war agreements. Top West German officials and the U.S. high command here told us privately they believe the onset of the Gorbachev era may end such practices, any one of which could result in armed conflict.

But there is healthy skepticism. The air corridor to West Berlin — one each for the U.S., the U.K. and France — have been the stage for continual efforts by the Russians to narrow access rights. The threat to shoot down the corporate jet was described to us as "a dangerous moment" in an atmosphere of "great tension." If the U.S. provided the information demanded by the Soviets, another slice of Western rights would have been cut away, salami style. If the U.S. refused, the small jet and its passengers faced destruction.

U.S. authorities played their deadly hand ambiguously. The corporate jet entered East German air space without its pilot aware of its possible fate; Soviet fighter planes rose to meet and menace it. In Berlin's Four-Power Air Control Center, Soviet officers warned that unless the plane's registration, place of origin, cargo and other identification data were provided at once, it would be shot down.

With tension mounting, American officers handed the Soviets a thick technical manual. "The information you want is in that book," the Soviets were told. It satisfied them. Just before the small jet reached West Berlin, the fighters dispersed, and the business plane, whose ownership is being kept secret, landed safely.

The Soviets emerged from this confrontation with an important concession from Washington. However difficult it was to find the information in the manual, it did provide the answers the Soviets wanted. Thus a new precedent was created.

Earlier, on Feb. 2, 1984, the Soviet Union engaged in similar salami

tactics leading to another concession that has cost the U.S. and its allies part of their precious air space. Without publicity, the Reagan administration agreed to the demand that permits the Soviets to "reserve" all air space in the three Western corridors below 3,000 feet and above 10,000 feet. That leaves dangerously little maneuver space for Western aircraft as they come in to land in West Berlin, forcing steep, downward spirals instead of the customary long glide to the ground.

The Soviet demand was based on its claimed need for air space during military "maneuvers." In conceding, the U.S. created a precedent that the Soviets now use at will to reduce rights of access agreed to nearly 40 years ago.

This is the dangerous business that some specialists here on the front lines of the struggle between East and West think Gorbachev may decide to end. If so, it would mark a radical shift in Soviet tactics away from the deadly practice of creating precedents at the point of a gun and converting them into permanent U.S. concessions.

Media in Raleigh, N.C., James P. Cain said, "We're delighted with the news of Mr. Turner's offer and will more than likely do everything we can to assist him in that effort."

Fairness in Media was set up by allies of Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., to try to mobilize conservatives to buy stock in CBS with the goal of ending what the group describes as the network's "liberal bias."

Helms represents a populist view that the "elite media" is "profoundly out of step with the ideals and goals of the American people."

And no segment of the "elite media" so gets the senator's dander up as does CBS.

# Divided Congress Seeking Solution On Nicaragua

WASHINGTON (AP) — A divided Congress is looking for middle ground on President Reagan's request for \$14 million in aid to Nicaraguan rebels, after the Democrat-led House rejected the plan and Republican-controlled Senate passed it.

Key votes were expected today in the House on Democratic and Republican alternatives. Both would supply \$14 million but differ on how the money would be distributed.

Secretary of State George Shultz said the crucial vote would come on a Reagan-backed Republican proposal, sponsored by House Minority Leader Robert Michel of Illinois. That plan would give \$14 million in

non-lethal aid to the Contras through the U.S. Agency for International Development.

"We are working hard on that and we are in there to win," said Shultz.

The House Democratic plan, sponsored by Reps. Michael Barnes of Maryland and Lee Hamilton of Indiana, would give \$10 million to the International Red Cross or United Nations to help Nicaraguan refugees and set aside \$4 million to implement a possible Nicaraguan peace settlement.

All sides agreed that the votes on the competing House alternatives were likely to be close.

After a long day of debate Tuesday, the House voted 248-180 against

Reagan's \$14 million proposal for "military or paramilitary operations in Nicaragua." Only a few hours earlier, the Senate passed the same language, 53-46.

The votes came after the president pledged to re-open direct negotiations between the United States and the leftist Sandinista government, a key issue in Democratic opposition to his Nicaraguan policy. In a letter to the Senate, Reagan also pledged that he would use the money only for non-lethal purposes for the rest of the fiscal year, ending Sept. 30.

Despite Democratic skepticism about Reagan's intentions, Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole of Kansas said, "I think we can trust the word of the president of the United States."

Shultz added: "The president of the United States has made these commitments and he will abide by them. There is no plan for the use of U.S. forces in Central America."

# Democrats Plead For More Concern

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats on the congressional Joint Economic Committee issued an unusual plea today for liberals to worry more about the needs of business and for conservatives to show more concern for the poor.

"Probably no factor threatens our long-run growth more than our inability to agree on national goals or to work together to achieve those goals," the Democrats said in the committee's annual report on the state of the economy.

However, symbolic of the current political polarity on economic issues, Republican members of the joint committee issued their own assessment of the economy, declaring that progress under President Reagan's leadership has been remarkable.

"America today is the strongest, most productive economic power in the world," the Republicans said in the introduction to their report. "Suffice it to say that we are on the road to opportunity for all Americans."

The GOP and Democratic reports were issued as the Senate took up debate on an administration plan to shrink the federal deficit below \$100 billion by 1988 without raising taxes.

While in the past, the Democrats have used the annual report to present detailed alternatives to the administration's budget, this year they shied away from specifics in favor of a list of broad goals the country should work toward to achieve economic prosperity.

The Joint Economic Committee does not draft legislation but does provide recommendations to other congressional committees for action. In recent years, the committee has devoted much of its energies to airing partisan debates over Reagan administration policies.

Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., chairman of the joint committee, said there was no question that the U.S. economy is strong enough to overcome the obstacles facing it. But he said there was "substantial question" over whether the political

# Common Cause Questions Ethics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Common Cause said today the Reagan administration made a "dangerous and radical change" in ethics rules for federal employees by deciding that appearances of conflict of interest are not violations.

The self-styled citizens' lobby told Congress that the January ruling of the Office of Government Ethics, in the case of Attorney General Edwin Meese, attempted to write "a totally new definition of the standards of conduct."

David H. Martin, director of the ethics office, ruled that Meese violated no ethics rules even though federal jobs given to his financial benefactors created an "appearance problem."

He concluded it was necessary to "look behind the appearance to determine if there was any substance to the appearance" — and found none in Meese's case.

In testimony prepared for a Senate Governmental Affairs subcommittee, Common Cause senior vice president Ann McBride said that agencies throughout the government have punished employees for creating the appearance of conflict — even when there was no evidence that their decision-making was affected.

### Shuttle Will Touch Land In California

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Space shuttle Challenger, set for liftoff Monday, will land in the wide-open California desert because of brake and tire blowout problems when shuttle Discovery returned to Earth here last week.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration officials Tuesday decided all other elements of Challenger's mission were OK and gave the go-ahead for a launch at noon Monday.

But as a precaution they said the ship will land at Edwards Air Force Base in the Mojave Desert, where there are miles of hard-packed sand runways and plenty of margin for error. Landing is set for May 6.

The concrete runway here is 15,000 feet long, 300 feet wide and is flanked by canals where more than 400 alligators lurk.

As Discovery came home Friday, astronaut Karol Bobko, the mission commander, battled crosswinds up to 15 mph that pushed the spaceship 50 feet off course as it descended to a touchdown. The space plane landed 20 feet left of the center line and drifted another 30 feet to the left before he applied his right brake to pull the space plane back to the middle of the strip.

Engineers believe this right braking action led to the brake locking. Just before Discovery rolled to a stop, its right inboard tire blew. The other three main tires were frayed or badly worn.

An Edwards landing will break a string of four straight shuttle returns here. NASA wants to land shuttles here routinely to cut down turnaround time between flights. A California touchdown loses several days because the shuttle has to be bolted to the back of a modified Boeing 747 jetliner and ferried across the country to the launch site.

Challenger will carry a crew of seven who will conduct materials processing, astronomy and life sciences experiments in the European-built Spacelab mounted in the cargo bay. The research lab also will be an orbital home to four squirrel monkeys and 24 rats.

### Seven Kids Left Alone

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Authorities took custody of seven children ages 1 to 15 after they found three of them in a one-room shack, apparently abandoned with no food except bird seed they were eating off the floor, officials said.

Health officials went to the shack after being tipped by a concerned school nurse, said Helen Reeves, nursing director of the City-County Health Department.

"It was real bad. It was just a little shack," Ms. Reeves said Tuesday. "Clothes were scattered on the floor, and mattresses were propped against the wall."

Ms. Reeves said some of the children told them they hadn't eaten in four days. Three were in the shack, one was found in a separate building on the property and three others were taken into custody when they came home from school, officials said.

"The story we got was that there were little children being left alone with a 15-year-old while their parents went to Mexico," Ms. Reeves said.

The building was described as a one-room shack with a restroom and no cooking facilities. Police reports said it appeared the building was used as a mechanic's shop because clothes scattered on the floor were covered with oil.

### Fifth Baby Is Little Surprise

DENVER (AP) — Kathleen and Greg Miller were expecting quadruplets, so when the doctor said, "Don't go away, there's one more," there was considerable commotion in the birthing room.

The surprise announcement was made by Dr. James Delaney as he rushed to deliver the babies by Caesarean section by midnight Monday so they'd have the same birthday. Because No. 5 was tucked high up near Mrs. Miller's rib cage, ultrasound had not detected it, he said.

All five, born 7½ weeks early, made the midnight deadline and were doing very well Tuesday, hospital officials said.

Dr. David Belenky, the chief neonatologist at St. Joseph Hospital who specializes in critically ill newborns, said because the doctors and supplies were only set up for four babies, "It took some scrambling to get ready for the fifth one."

He said each baby had its own placenta, so they are not identical.

Mrs. Miller, 28, and her 29-year-old husband had been trying to have children for six years. She was taking a fertility drug when she became pregnant with the quintuplets.

"It's one of the greatest feelings that Kathy and I have ever had. We lost a baby last spring," Miller said at a news conference Tuesday.



**Soviets Seize Ship Carrying American**

Soviet officials say they seized a Japanese fishing vessel carrying a U.S. government employee because the ship was operating in an area where fishing is prohibited, a Japanese diplomat in Moscow said today.

The Japanese official, speaking on condition he not be identified, said the vessel, carrying 22 crew members and the American, was being escorted to a Soviet port and was expected to reach there by Friday.

A U.S. Embassy official in Moscow said he could provide no details about the seizure. "We are trying to effect the release of the American," he said. "We have not been in touch with him yet."

In Tokyo, a foreign ministry official said the government had yet to receive a Soviet reply to a request for an explanation of the seizure, which he said took place in the Bering Sea off Alaska. The request was made through the Japanese Embassy in Moscow.

Japanese Maritime Safety Agency spokesman Toshiya Mikuni said the 349-ton No. 18 Fukuho-maru was seized about 187 miles west of Alaska's Saint Matthew Island at 4:40 p.m. Japan time (2:40 a.m. EST) Tuesday after it was ordered to stop.

The report came to Marue Fishing Co., owner of the Fukuho-maru, from another Japanese ship, the No. 18 Teisho-maru, which was operating near the scene, Mikuni said.

He said the Fukuho-maru left Ishinomaki in northern Japan on April 9 and took the U.S. observer, Becky Kruppenbach, on board at Alaska's Dutch Harbor last Saturday.

In Washington, Anita Stockman, a State Department press officer, said the American worked for the Commerce Department's Marine Fisheries Service as an observer aboard the Japanese boat, which was licensed to fish in U.S. waters.

She said the department was using diplomatic channels to try to secure the American's release. She did not give the American's name.

Ms. Stockman said she did not know if the boat was fishing at the time it was seized, or if it was fishing on the U.S. or Soviet side of the maritime boundary.

**U.S. Delays Pershing 2 Deployment**

BONN, West Germany (AP) — The deployment of U.S.-built Pershing 2 missiles in West Germany is being suspended while the weapons are modified, officials said today. A fire in a missile last January killed three American soldiers.

Because a repeat of January's accident cannot be ruled out, the deployment has been suspended, Defense Minister Manfred Woerner told the Parliament's defense committee, according to committee chairman Alfred Biele.

Biele spoke with reporters after the closed-door meeting.

Earlier, government sources said American experts have traced the fatal fire in a Pershing 2 missile three months ago to a freak electrical discharge, not human error.

The accident Jan. 11 also injured 16. The sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Tuesday experts found that static electricity was discharged into the solid fuel propellant of the unarmed nuclear missile's first stage.

"Human error and systematic technical defects have been ruled out" as possible causes, one of the sources said.

He said modifications are being made to the Pershing 2s that will improve the grounding of the engines and reduce the risk of similar electrical discharges.

A U.S. Army report to be released today in Bonn and Washington outlines the findings, and a copy was delivered last Friday to the Defense Ministry in Bonn, said the sources, who normally are well-informed on defense issues.

They said the investigating team reached its conclusions in a three-month, \$6 million study of the accident at a Pershing 2 training site near Heilbronn in southern West Germany.

NATO is deploying 572 cruise Pershing 2 nuclear missiles to counter Soviet SS-20s already in place. All 108 Pershing 2s have been assigned to West Germany.

The report said experts would conduct further tests with modified Pershing 2s under cold-weather conditions similar to those on the day of the accident, the sources said.

Col. Thomas H. Denney of the U.S. Army Safety Center at Fort Rucker, Ala., led the investigating team, the West German sources said, and other members were from the U.S. Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala.; the Air Force, and NASA.

# Bomb Threat Reported At Aycock

A telephoned bomb threat during the lunch hour at E.B. Aycock Junior High School on Tuesday resulted in an hour of lost time, with no bomb or bombs discovered during a search of the premises.

"An anonymous caller at 12:44 p.m. said 'I have planted six bombs in the building, and they are due to go off at any minute,'" Kay Whitehurst, principal of Aycock, said this morning. "The call was taken by one of the secretaries, who immediately notified me." Mrs. Whitehurst said that, in accord with

emergency procedures, "we immediately went into evacuation drill and emptied the building. At the time one-third of the students was in the cafeteria, another third had just gone back to their classrooms, and the other third was in fourth period classes.

"At first we evacuated to the track area, and after five minutes moved everyone to a shaded area where they would be more comfortable."

Personnel from the Greenville Police and the Greenville Fire departments searched all areas of Aycock, including the roof, all rooms and hallways, "every inch of the building, without

finding anything," Mrs. Whitehurst said. She praised the prompt, efficient action of police and firemen as well as members of the school's emergency group headed by Wilbur Bennett.

"Everybody was calm despite the fact some students were an hour late getting lunch," Mrs. Whitehurst said.

Based on statements volunteered by several students, investigation was being conducted into the possibility that a student may have made the bomb threat call.

The search was called off with students and teachers returning to the building at 1:45 p.m.

# Five Die For Last Glimpse Of Leader

BELO HORIZONTE, Brazil (AP) — Five people were trampled to death by a delirious crowd fighting for a last glimpse of the body of President-elect Tancredo Neves.

Hundreds more were injured when the wildly chanting multitude

Tuesday toppled an iron security fence in front of the governor's palace in Minas Gerais state where the body of the 75-year-old leader lay in state, authorities said.

Neves, whose political career spanned 50 years, died Sunday of an

uncontrolled bacterial infection and complications from seven operations. He was first hospitalized March 14, hours before his scheduled inauguration as Brazil's first civilian leader in 21 years.

Neves' body was to be flown on an airforce plane today for burial in his hometown of Sao Joao Del Rei, a city of 53,000 located 115 miles south of here. President Jose Sarney, Neves' family and government ministers were to fly by helicopter to the town, where Neves' body was to lie in state until his funeral late this afternoon.

There also have been processions for the deceased leader in Sao Paulo and the capital Brasilia.

Dr. Antonio de Farias Vecchio, coordinator of the main emergency ward in Belo Horizonte, said: "The crowd charged forward and the fence fell on them." Television film showed hundreds of women and children screaming in anguish as they were trampled by the stampeding crowd.

Her voice shaking, Neves' widow, Risoleta, tried to quiet the shouting

masses from a palace balcony after the tragedy. "Have patience and remain calm," she pleaded. "He is here and you will see him."

"Tancredo lives. He did not die. He is alive in your hearts, long live the martyr of liberty," she said, referring to Neves by his first name, as nearly everyone here does.

and potentially explosive hearings on Watergate in the summer of 1973. To Ervin, the scandal that led to the resignation of President Richard Nixon was the nation's biggest tragedy since the Civil War.

"In the Civil War, there were many redeeming features of sacrifice and valor displayed on both sides," he said. "But there was no sacrifice or spirit of sacrifice, or no valor, really, displayed on the part of those responsible for the Watergate hearings, except to sacrifice their character." However, he added, "We do have this encouragement. We were able to weather the Watergate affair with all our essential institutions of government intact."

During the Watergate hearings, "Senator Sam" T-shirts and buttons sprouted across the nation. But Ervin, his bushy eyebrows telegraphing moral indignation and blue-gray eyes twinkling at the onset of a joke, insisted he was "just an old country lawyer."

Ervin was born Sept. 27, 1896, in the foothills town of Morganton, one of 10 children.

His father, Samuel J. Ervin Sr., was a self-taught lawyer who "hated the oppression of government, and I guess instilled in me the idea that, after all, the greatest threat to our liberties comes from government, not from others."

After fighting in World War I and armed with a law degree from Harvard in 1922, he returned to Morganton and married Margaret Bell.

Burke County elected him to the state Legislature, where he helped defeat a bill that would prohibit the teaching of evolution in public schools, saying "Such a resolution

serves no good purpose except to absolve monkeys of their responsibility for the human race."

For 25 years, Ervin interspersed public service with his law practice. He was a Superior Court judge from 1937 to 1944 and served in Congress in 1946 after the suicide of his younger brother, Joe.

In 1948, Ervin was appointed an associate justice of the state Supreme Court. He might have ended his public career as its chief justice but for the 1954 death of Sen. Clyde Hoey.

Gov. William Umstead, an old college friend, appointed Ervin to fill the seat and he was sworn in by then-Vice President Richard Nixon. He was re-elected later that year and thereafter encountered little opposition.

At the height of his fame and popularity in 1974, Ervin retired to his hometown. He said staying in the Senate until he was 84 would be asking too much of God and the people of North Carolina.

He wrote three books: "The Whole Truth: The Watergate Conspiracy," "Humor of a Country Lawyer" and "Preserving the Constitution: The Autobiography of Sen. Sam Ervin."

He had two daughters, Leslie Hansler of Pennington, N.J., and Laura Smith of Morganton, and a son, Sam J. Ervin III, who followed in his footsteps and was named a judge on the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Ervin said he tried to heed Shakespeare when confronted with a choice between his own conscience and politics: "To thine own self be true, and then it must follow as the night the day, thou canst not then be false to any man."

# Stock And Market Reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market opened mixed today after scoring a late rally in the previous session.

Computer, defense and telephone issues paced the early gainers.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials inched up 0.11 to 1,278.82 in the first 30 minutes after opening at its highest level in nearly seven weeks.

Advances took a slim lead over declines on the New York Stock Exchange.

Wall Street was pleasantly surprised by the late upswing Tuesday, but some analysts were skeptical about the rally's staying power since the overall market did not show the same strength as displayed by the blue chips.

They noted, for example, that less than half of the 2,000 stocks that traded on the Big Board finished ahead.

Still, the market's advance came in the face of relatively bearish developments. Interest rates rose in the money markets, the dollar rose against other currencies and the Commerce Department reported a 2.3 percent March drop in factory orders for durable goods.

On the NYSE's active list today, Unocal fell 1/2 to 48 3/4, Pan American World Airways slipped 1/8 to 5 3/8 and American Express rose 1/4 to 43 3/4.

It's just like old times in the American League. Minnesota's Tom Brunansky is playing long ball with Salome Barojas and the Toronto Blue Jays' bullpen is blowing late leads.

Brunansky has faced Barojas 14 times. He has seven hits, including five home runs and 11 RBI. Home run No. 5 was a two-run shot in the first inning Tuesday night that started the Twins to a 4-2 triumph over the Seattle Mariners.

"There are certain guys you just feel confident against," Brunansky said. "Ever since he was in Chicago (with the White Sox) I've had great success against him. I don't think I've hit this well against any pitcher."

Meanwhile, Toronto took a 4-2 lead into the ninth inning only to see the Kansas City Royals score five times off relief ace Bill Caudill and make off with a 7-6 victory.

"I guess I was right after all when I said last week in Baltimore that it wouldn't be the last time," said Caudill, who was hit hard on April 13 as the Orioles scored six times in the eighth inning, rallying from a 7-2 deficit for an 8-7 victory. "It just came a lot quicker than I expected. But it won't continue. I'm too good a pitcher for that to happen and I didn't get here on a fluke. I'll hear a

lot more applause before the season's over."

Brunansky's homer and Frank Viola's six-hit pitching paced Minnesota. Brunansky's first-inning homer came after Kent Hrbek walked with two out. ## ECU Faculty Senate Favors New Rules

The East Carolina University Faculty Senate has called for an end to freshman participation in football and basketball, joining a number of other universities across the country.

The proposal was contained in a list of suggestions drafted by a faculty senate committee and approved Tuesday by the senate. The suggestions call for the NCAA Division I-A convention to meet and approve these and other suggestions which would improve academics among athletes.

Freshmen would be ineligible for those sports which "create substantial threats to successful academic adjustment," the proposals said.

Other recommendations included:

- That there be no weakening of the requirements governing initial eligibility of students athletes in Division IA.
- That there be no lengthening of any playing season, and that some consideration be given to shortening the length of each, along with reducing the number of contests to provide students with a more appropriate balance between academic and athletic activities.

• That the recruiting practices permitted by the NCAA be revised with the purpose of relieving the pressure on prospective athletes.

• That the constitution, bylaws and rules of the NCAA be simplified to promote clarity and good sense and to provide for enforcement procedures with the spirit of the rules.

• That some form of periodic audit by which athletic programs are reviewed to achieve greater compliance with the rules and to ensure that presidents, faculties and governing boards are better informed about their own programs.

Dr. Tom Johnson, chairman of the faculty's educational policies and planning committee, said that he hoped that something would be done about the ECU proposals and those of other schools in June during the NCAA meeting in New Orleans.

Johnson added that the statement is a substitute for a resolution proposed last month by the psychology department that would have barred students with SAT scores of less than 700 from participating in intercollegiate sports during their freshman year.

# New Coliseum Plan Approved

CHARLOTTE (AP) — The Charlotte City Council has approved a working design for a new coliseum with 25,000 seats, an elliptical shape and a glass-enclosed concourse wrapped around it.

"We're very excited about this design. We think it's terrific. There's nothing like it in the country," architect Gene Bodycott of Odell Associates of Charlotte said.

The design approved by the council Monday includes 8,000 parking spaces and two levels of

seating. For basketball, the arena would seat 23,500, officials said.

The coliseum would be about 100 feet high, but would not look that tall from the outside because the lower seating level would be below ground. The glass concourse would be about 30 feet wide at its widest point and would make the coliseum unlike any other arena, Bodycott said.

Construction and design of the coliseum is expected to cost \$47.4 million. Voters approved bonds for the project in November 1984.

Once again, the Chicago Cubs are riding the Sutcliffe & Sandberg express.

"He really looked determined before the game," Cubs Manager Jim Frey said after Sutcliffe, last year's National League Cy Young winner, scattered eight hits and blasted a long home run Tuesday night to lead Chicago past the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-0.

Sandberg, the NL's Most Valuable Player last season, was batting just .143 and had not driven home a run this year before he homered in the fourth inning.

"I'm glad he got a hit," Frey said. "He's in one of those streaks right now where you just have to fight your way through it."

## Cavs Don't Want To Hear About No Bird

The Cleveland Cavaliers, after winning their first National Basketball Association playoff game since 1977, didn't want to hear that it was tainted.

The Cavs, who lost the first two games of their first-round series in Boston by a total of five points, took advantage of injured Celtics star Larry Bird's absence in Game 3 Tuesday night. Cleveland broke a 17-game losing streak against the Celtics with a 105-98 victory in front of a sellout crowd of 20,900 at Richfield, Ohio.

"I said to the players after the game, 'Be proud about tonight. Don't let Larry Bird not playing take away from what we did,'" Coach George Karl said. "That team probably wins 55 (regular-season) games without Larry Bird, instead of 63 with him."

"We played them two tough games in Boston when they had Larry Bird, and we should have won at least one of them," added World B. Free, who scored 32 points to lead the Cavaliers. "When you take a guy like Kareem (Abdul-Jabbar) off the Lakers, they're still a great team."

Bird, who had scored 70 points in the first two games, didn't play because of a persistent problem with bursitis and bone chips in his right elbow.

In other playoff games, Denver edged San Antonio 115-112 to take a 2-1 lead in their series, the Los Angeles Lakers completed a 3-0 sweep of Phoenix with a 119-103 victory and Portland took a 2-1 lead over Dallas with a 122-109 decision. Tonight, Milwaukee is at Chicago,

Detroit at New Jersey, Houston at Utah and Philadelphia at Washington. The Bucks, Pistons and 76ers lead 2-0 and the Rockets-Jazz series is deadlocked 1-1.

On Thursday, Boston is at Cleveland and Dallas at Portland, while the fourth game of the Nuggets-Spurs series is at San Antonio Friday.

Celtics Coach K.C. Jones sent in Scott Wedman as Bird's substitute, and he filled in admirably, scoring 30 points. But a lack of depth hurt the Celtics, who got just 10 points out of their non-starters.

"K.C. said, 'Let's just run the plays for Scott that we run for Larry,'" Wedman said. "Psychologically, it took us a while to adjust to him not being here."

Wedman led a Boston rally in the fourth quarter with 12 points before he fouled out with just over a minute to play.

"I did all right, but we lost," he said. "I'm not Larry Bird."

The Cavaliers led by 10 entering the final period, but Wedman scored four of the Celtics' eight straight points to cut the deficit to 76-74.

Three more times — 88-86, 90-88 and 92-90 — the Celtics got within two, but each time, Cleveland responded with baskets — one each by Phil Hubbard, Free and Roy Hinson, who hit 10 of 14 shots and scored 21 points.

"What I enjoyed was, down the stretch, when they got it down to two, we distributed the ball very unselfishly," Karl said.

Kevin McHale finished with 21 points and 11 rebounds for Boston. Robert Parish scored 19.

#### Trail Blazers 122, Mavericks 109

Kiki Vandeweghe and Kenny Carr each had a run of 10 straight points to help Portland overcome Dallas.

The Mavericks, who got 30 points apiece from Rolando Blackman and Mark Aguirre, led by as many as nine points twice in the third quarter before the Trail Blazers fought back.

Portland reeled off 12 unanswered points, including 10 straight by Carr, to pull ahead 81-78 with 4:11 to go in the third quarter. In the fourth period, Vandeweghe put the game out of reach with 10 in a row, the last two with a 20-footer to make it 117-106 with 45 seconds to play.

Vandeweghe led Portland with 24 points, while Clyde Drexler had 20 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists for the Blazers.

#### Nuggets 115, Spurs 112

Alex English scored 27 points to lead Denver, which held off a San Antonio rally in the fourth period to beat the Spurs in Texas for the first time since 1981, a span of 15 games.

John Paxson, who finished with 16 points, led the fourth-quarter rally for the Spurs with 10 points, but missed a three-point attempt that would have tied the game at the final buzzer.

George Gervin, who finished with 30 points, and Paxson led a 20-6 Spurs surge in the opening 4:35 of the final quarter, but San Antonio could only close the gap to 100-99 and never took the lead.

"No more jinx in San Antonio," Denver guard Mike Evans said. "We came out determined to play well. We wanted to bury San Antonio on their home floor, but it didn't turn out that way."

#### Lakers 119, Suns 103

Los Angeles completed its sweep of Phoenix in what turned out to be the closest game of the three.

James Worthy scored 12 of his 23 points in the second period, when the Lakers outscored the Suns 43-33 to take control of the game.

The Lakers, who will meet the winner of the Dallas-Portland series, opened the second period with a 15-4 run that turned a 25-25 tie into a 40-29 lead.

Phoenix closed to 60-52 on Mike Sanders' layin with 1:07 remaining, but Worthy scored seven points down the stretch — including a three-point goal at the buzzer — for a 68-58 halftime lead. The Suns, who got 26 points from Maurice Lucas, got no closer than nine points in the second half.

"It doesn't make any difference who we play next," Lakers Coach Riley said. "You have to play your best in the playoffs, and that's what we got to be concerned about. We're moving up and that's the only thing that counts. I'm delighted to get this one over with."

## Geography Has Role No More

DETROIT (AP) — Modern college football recruiters have taken all the fun out of life for Ted Gouge.

There once was time when geography played a key role in determining how successful a college football program might be.

A large Nordic population, for example, helped make the University of Minnesota a national football power in the 1930s and 1940s.

In a report to the 81st annual convention of the Association of American Geographers on Tuesday, however, Gouge said those days are gone forever.

"Distance doesn't mean anything anymore," Gouge said. "College football is big business now and the NCAA Division IA schools have the money to go anywhere to bring in the talent they need."

Gouge, a professor at Southwest Texas State, is a former collegiate football player himself. He played linebacker for three years at Northwest Missouri after transferring from Army.

He decided to study the relationship between the location of colleges to their long-term football success as a follow-up to a study by

John F. Rooney Jr. of Oklahoma State.

In his book "The Recruiting Game," Rooney pinpoints by county the most fertile high school football areas in the country. States such as Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas and Michigan turn out a high number of big time college football players, the Rooney study showed.

Gouge found, however, that hometown talent doesn't ensure success at the college level.

"On the one hand, there are football programs that have been successful year in and year out that possess good relative locations, such as Alabama, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Penn State, Pittsburgh and Texas," Gouge wrote in his report. "On the other hand, there are sufficient numbers of successful programs with relatively poor locations: Arkansas, Arizona State, Brigham Young, Miami, Nebraska and Washington."

Gouge's study included the years from 1952 to 1983.

"Things began to change after 1952," Gouge said. "That was the year they legalized grants-in-aid and the NCAA took control of television contracts for college football."

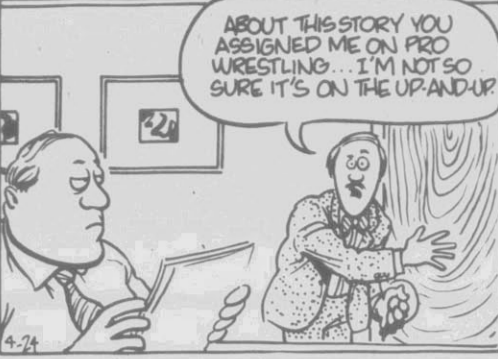

# Kosar Chooses Browns

MIAMI (AP) — Quarterback Bernie Kosar today said he will go with his hometown favorite, the Cleveland Browns, in the National Football League supplemental draft, spurning overtures from the Minnesota Vikings.

"In all probability, I'm going to finish off this semester, which ends in the next two weeks, and then make myself eligible for the supplemental draft," Kosar said.

The athlete said a major part of the decision was his "commitment to the Youngstown-Cleveland area, I wanted to go home."

Kosar left open a slight possibility

that he wouldn't join either team if he has any academic problems during the University of Miami's summer session. He needs six credits in summer school to be eligible for graduation and the NFL.

NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle, in an 11-page decision released Tuesday, gave Kosar two days to make up his mind. Rozelle said Kosar, the top quarterback in Miami history, had to decide whether he wants to play for the Browns or the Minnesota Vikings.

Rozelle upheld both the trade between Minnesota and the Houston Oilers that gave the Vikings the first

crack at Kosar in next Tuesday's regular college draft, as well as Cleveland's deal with the Buffalo Bills that gave the Browns first pick in a supplemental draft if one is necessary.

Kosar has two years of college eligibility left, but has said he intends to graduate this summer. Rozelle's ruling gives him the choice of declaring himself eligible for next week's draft by Thursday — Rozelle's deadline — or completing his studies and then announcing he wants to play in the NFL.

In the first case, Minnesota could draft him. In the second case, he would likely go to Cleveland, which has made it no secret it would select him if it gets the chance.

When he announced his intentions to forgo his final two years of college eligibility last month, Kosar said his first choice in the NFL was the Browns, whom he had followed since his childhood in nearby Boardman, Ohio.

The Vikings were his second choice because their quarterback coach, Marc Trestman, filled the same role when Kosar was at Miami in 1983.

The confusion began March 13 when Kosar announced that he would obtain his degree this summer and turn pro rather than return for his third season with the Hurricanes, whom he led to the national championship in 1983.

That immediately focused attention on Houston, which held the second pick in the draft and had the first shot at Kosar because Buffalo, which has the first pick, had already signed Virginia Tech defensive end Bruce Smith. Finally, two weeks ago, the Oilers traded their first-round pick to Minnesota, which picks third, in exchange for the Vikings' first- and second-round picks.

On the same day, however, the Browns dealt their top pick in the 1986 draft and an undrafted player, believed to be linebacker Chip Banks, to Buffalo for the first pick in the supplemental draft.

The commissioner summoned representatives of all four teams involved for a hearing. Tuesday's decision stemmed from that meeting, during which Houston and Minnesota contended that Kosar must enter the regular draft because he had hired an agent.

"After weighing all facts in this matter, including a hearing, attended by the four clubs, and a thorough discussion with the Kosar interests, I have determined to apply the rule as written and as applied in the past," Rozelle said in a statement.

## New NASCAR Rule Slowed Bill Elliott

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Bill Elliott says a new NASCAR rule slowed him down a little, but you wouldn't have known that during practice runs where he topped NASCAR's absolute qualifying record twice.

Elliott blistered the Alabama International Motor Speedway with laps of 206.379 and 205.494 mph Tuesday, even with the height of his Thunderbird raised one-half inch to 50 1/2 inches to conform to the rule.

Two months ago, Elliott set the NASCAR qualifying record of 205.114 at Daytona. Prior to that, the qualifying record was 202.692, set by Cale Yarborough for the Winston 500 here last year.

Elliott, who claims the rule change was aimed directly at his team, said after his fast laps Tuesday that the new rule "probably slowed us down a little."

But he acknowledged that "it's hard to tell because this is a brand new car and it takes awhile to get the bugs out anyway. In the end, it could have no effect at all except to make us work harder to win the pole and the race."

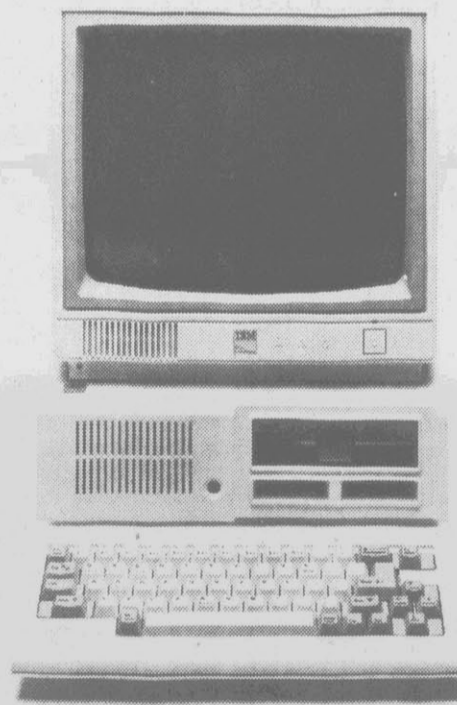

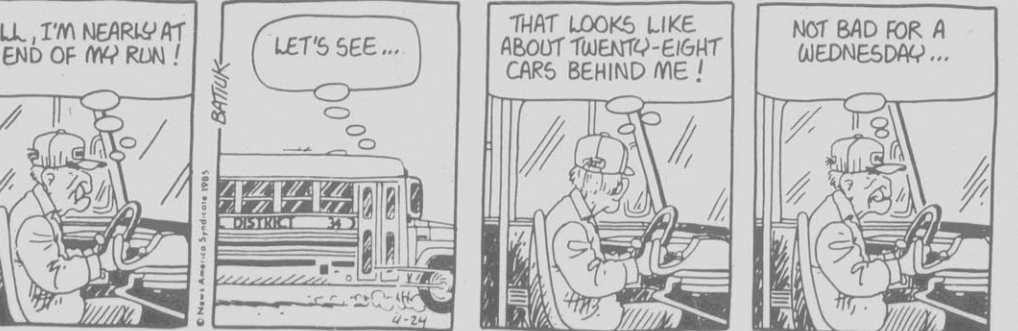

RALEIGH (AP) — John W. Sledge, president of the North Carolina Farm Bureau Federation since 1974, died Tuesday evening at Rex Hospital from an extended illness, according to a spokesman for the N.C. Farm Bureau. Sledge was 60. Sledge had undergone lung surgery last fall and was readmitted to Rex Hospital about five weeks ago. A nursing supervisor at the hospital said Sledge died of cancer. Sledge was elected president of the federation after serving as both its vice-president and assistant to the president. A native of Nash County, Sledge was also a member of the board of directors of the American Farm Bureau Federation since 1978. Services will be held at Oak City Baptist Church in Martin County on Friday, April 26, at 2 p.m. Burial arrangements are incomplete.

Duke Transplant Patient Reported In Good Condition

DURHAM (AP) — The growing success of heart transplants, performed mostly in California and Virginia over the past 18 years, led to North Carolina's first use of the procedure, Duke University Medical Center surgeons say. "Cardiac transplantation is now, in our eyes, an appropriate therapeutic alternative," said Dr. Andrew S. Wechsler, one of the surgeons who gave a 55-year-old Durham plumber a new heart Monday night. George F. Sheldon, chairman of the Department of Surgery in the School of Medicine at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, said more than 1,000 transplants have been performed worldwide. The survival rate has increased to about 80 percent, Sheldon said, and the hospital stay has fallen from 100 to 60 days, he said. Wechsler credited surgeons at Stanford University and the Medical College of Richmond with fine-tuning the techniques that gave hope to Thomas Harrison, listed in good condition early today in the acute care center. Harrison, who is married and has five children, is doing "absolutely as well as we could hope for. He is comfortable. He seems aware of his surroundings," Wechsler said at a press conference. The hospital identified the donor only as a man in his 20s. His family has asked that no additional information be disclosed, said Duke spokesman Charles Blackburn. Harrison's family was "too tired" to speak to the press Tuesday, said Kay Miller, director of public relations for the hospital. In the next week, doctors will be watching for signs of rejection or infection, said Dr. R. Randal Bollinger, assistant professor of surgery and an immunologist. He said with rapid improvements in surgery and the increasing number of places performing transplants, as many as 100,000 Americans could be helped by heart transplants if donors were available. "There are 20,000 to 25,000 potential donors a year," he said. "Since 1981, between 2,000 and 3,000 have actually been utilized."

Wechsler said Harrison had been on the list of heart recipients for nearly four months and that "as time passed we felt that his requirement for a heart became greater." He said two more people, whom he declined to identify, are awaiting heart transplants at Duke. Harrison suffered from giant cell cardiomyopathy, an inflammatory condition in which the heart tissues become stiff. The condition is always fatal, Wechsler said. Wechsler said he could not predict how long Harrison would have lived without the surgery, but that one requirement for considering him for a transplant was that he be expected to live less than six months. Wechsler said the procedure, including hospital stay, could cost up to \$85,000 but noted that 85 percent of heart transplant recipients are able to resume their former occupations. "Because of the age criteria that we work under, they tend to be people who are in the most productive years of their life," Wechsler said.

'Missing' Family Has Been Located

A Charlotte family thought to have disappeared while on their way to Florida earlier this month was located, and authorities say they don't know why the family's abandoned trailer was found in South Carolina. "They're not missing anymore, there was no foul play involved, and we don't have any charges on them," said Capt. Wade Stroud of the Charlotte Police Department. "They're free to go where they want to." Steve and Deborah Nimmo and their two children, ages 3 and 5, stayed in the lobby of the Wrightsville Beach Police Department for about four hours Saturday after authorities towed their car from a travel lane of a beach road, Capt. M.R. Rice said in a telephone interview. A church paid for the family to stay in a Wilmington hotel Saturday night and the Nimmos spent Sunday with people connected with the Salvation Army, Rice said. The family returned to the police station Monday afternoon and plans were made with the towing company for the Nimmos to get their car back, he said. "Last I saw, he was going toward Charlotte," Rice said. Stroud said authorities there have not looked for the Nimmos since they were reported seen at Wrightsville Beach. The Nimmos' empty U-Haul trailer and hitch were discovered on a dirt road in Aiken, S.C., on April 15. The family's possessions were scattered around the trailer, said Aiken County Detective Bo Rearden. The family had last been seen April 1 in the Charlotte area, where they rented the trailer and trailer hitch, Rearden said. The Nimmos were reportedly on their way to Pensacola, Fla., to visit Mrs. Nimmo's father, Rearden said. Nimmo was a stockbroker who had recently left his job in Charlotte, he said. Rice said he did not know why the trailer was found in South Carolina. "They just told us they had been ripped off of all their possessions and they had been selling their jewelry to get back to North Carolina," Rice said.

Cardinals Named

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II named 28 new cardinals today, including a pro-Solidarity prelate from his native Poland, the head of the embattled church in Nicaragua and the archbishops of New York and Boston. The new cardinals, who come from 19 countries, will be formally elevated at a consistory at the Vatican on May 25. John Paul named cardinals from Ethiopia and Nicaragua for the first time and promoted the Rome-based leader of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, Archbishop Myroslav Ivan Lubachivsky, a U.S. citizen.

# IN THE STATE

## Senate OKs Age Change

RALEIGH (AP) — Despite grumbling about "federal blackmail," the Senate has agreed to raise the drinking age for beer and wine to 21 to save an estimated \$30 million in federal highway funds over the next two years.

The bill, which won final approval Tuesday 39-10, has already passed the House, but will be returned there for concurrence in a minor amendment. If the House accepts the amendment, the law would take effect Sept. 1, 1986.

"I think the Senate realized that in order to save \$30 million, they had to pass some sort of bill," said Sen. Dennis Winner, D-Buncombe, an opponent of the measure. "I think the public ought to know that we're not doing this because it's a good law, but because the federal government is forcing us to do it."

Congress has given the states until October 1986 to raise their drinking ages to 21 or face the loss of federal highway funds.

## Tobacco Tax Wins Approval

RALEIGH (AP) — A Senate committee has endorsed a possible state tax on cigarette manufacturers as a "last resort" to save tobacco farmers, with one senator saying farmers take a higher priority than cigarette companies.

"This (tax) is an action of last resort," said Sen. David Parnell, D-Robeson, one of four legislators to attend a weekend tobacco summit meeting in Kentucky. "I would point out that our last resort is to save farmers, not the cigarette companies...."

"The time has come for farmers to recognize who their friends are and who their enemies are, and I'm prepared to say I don't think the tobacco companies are the friends of North Carolina farmers," Parnell told the Senate Agriculture Committee Tuesday.

Parnell's remarks came after Sen. Weldon Price, D-Rockingham, an employee of The American Tobacco Co., questioned whether the committee should endorse a position paper presented by the North Carolina delegation at the summit. That position paper endorses the cigarette manufacturing tax if other measures fail to save the federal tobacco program.

No bill has been introduced calling for the manufacturing tax, but Sen. James Speed, D-Vance, the chairman of the committee, has said one would be introduced if needed.

## Hearing Set On Tax Plan

RALEIGH (AP) — Gov. Jim Martin's allies are pondering their response to a surprise announcement that the House will conduct a hearing on his tax-cut package after overwhelmingly rejecting it last week.

The public hearing will be held next Tuesday morning during the regular Finance Committee meeting, said chairman Dwight Quinn, D-Cabarrus, who acknowledged there was little chance the committee or the House would pass Martin's package.

"I think we have gone as far as we can go with tax relief," said Quinn. "If he (Martin) can come over here and persuade us otherwise, then okay."

Martin's chief lobbyist, I. Beverly Lake, called the hearing "an amazing development. I frankly don't see much purpose in it now."

But House Minority Leader Betsy Cochrane, R-Davie, whose request for a hearing last week was refused, said next week's discussion would give Democrats an opportunity to "more fully understand what the governor's proposal is."

Martin has called for repealing the property tax on intangible assets, ending the 3 percent state sales tax on food and non-prescription medicines, and giving an income tax credit to offset the property tax on business inventories.

## Students Protest Tuition Proposal

RALEIGH (AP) — The Martin administration says University of North Carolina system students can afford to pay an extra \$45 or so for tuition this fall.

But student leaders say the increase, combined with proposed cuts in federal aid, might be just enough to force some students to leave school or keep from enrolling.

About 20 students from UNC campuses demonstrated in front of the Legislative Building, then met privately with key legislators Tuesday and urged them to reject Gov. Jim Martin's proposed 10 percent tuition boost.

"Students are feeling the pinch; many have had to drop out," said Patricia Wallace, student body president at UNC-Chapel Hill. "Other young people have had to abandon their dreams of going to college at all."

Lee Monroe, Martin's education adviser, said the increase was needed to cover expenditures sought by the UNC Board of Governors.

## Guard Mobilization Scheduled

RALEIGH (AP) — The 5,000 vehicles in the North Carolina National Guard will begin moving early May 3 as part of a test of the Guard's ability to respond to a federal call-up, officials said.

"It will be as close to a real (wartime) situation as we could train for," said Maj. Gen. Hubert M. Leonard, the Guard's adjutant general.

Most of the 13,000 members of the state Guard will meet at Fort Bragg that day for the first statewide mobilization in the state's history. Some Guard officials describe as the largest peacetime mobilization of reserves ever staged in the U.S.

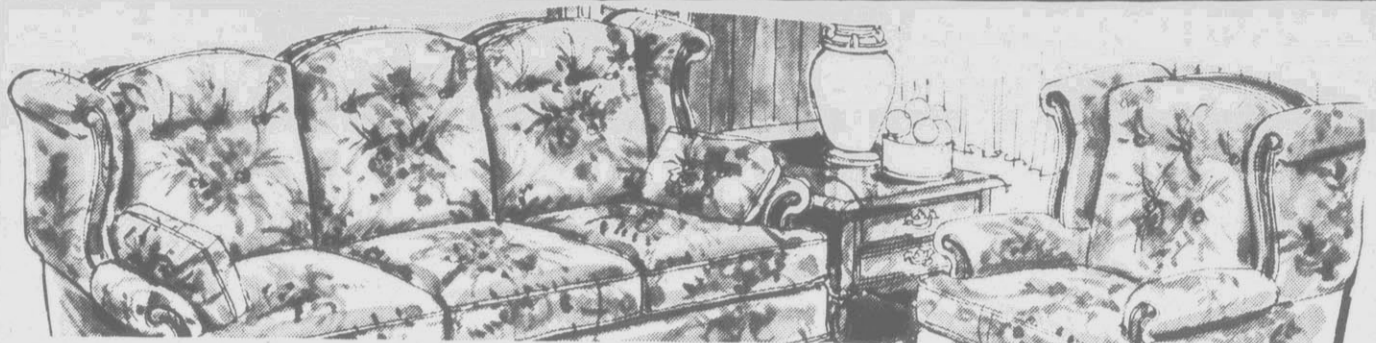

# Nerve-Wracking Stage Fright Is Treatable Problem

Stage fright afflicts 80 percent of Americans, in some cases so severely that it makes them drop out of school or limits their careers. The problem can be overcome, according to an article in the May issue of Science Digest, with treatment programs that have racked up an almost 95 percent success rate. Clinically, stage fright begins when the brain sends a fight-or-flee danger message to the central nervous system. The adrenal glands

pump out adrenaline and the stage fright victim feels his heart beating faster, his hands sweating and shaking and his mouth dry. Psychologists and psychiatrists disagree about the cause. Some hold it is a form of shyness, and author Amy Mereson says most people who are shy also suffer stage fright. But the converse is not necessarily true, according to Jonathan Cheek, a personality psychologist at Wellesley College, and people who suffer stage fright are not necessarily

shy. Cheek reported to the Eastern Psychological Association that shyness and stage fright are two distinctly different problems. Shyness, he believes, is a complex problem rooted in childhood when parents and-or teachers made a youngster feel incompetent. Stage fright, on the other hand, may be due simply to lack of experience. Whatever the cause of stage fright, in most cases new techniques that bypass psychoanalysis can overcome it within a few weeks or months.

One pioneering approach, conceived by Gerald Phillips, a speech specialist at Pennsylvania State University, teaches people how to organize their thoughts, how to stand, gesture, etc. Other methods stress relaxation training, or concentrate on building confidence and self-esteem. Dale Carnegie Associates offers a 14-session course that starts the student off making short talks on simple subjects and building to longer speeches on more challenging

subjects. That way, according to Frank Ashley, international manager of instruction, "People are not put on the spot nor threatened." Members of Toastmasters International, described as the Alcoholics Anonymous of public speaking, help each other by giving, listening to and offering critiques of each other's speeches. Some experts believe all phobias and fears stem from a basic fear of being fearful. At the San Antonio Phobia Clinic, Dr. Haib Nathan's

treatment includes group therapy and independent fieldwork done with a therapist. Nathan said in the three years he had run the clinic he had found some students so afraid to speak in public that they dropped out of school. Nathan's approach is not so much to eliminate that fear as to teach patients how to control it and channel it in a positive way. "Anxiety can be good," Nathan told Science Digest. "It may make people try for perfection."

## Redesigned Bike Gives Rider Good Trip In All-Weather

ALIQUIPPA, Pa. (AP) — It's called a Human-Powered Vehicle. In its most basic form, it's a bicycle. But Joe Kochanowski has rebuilt it, refined it and redesigned it to a point where it has 72 gears and serves as his primary means of transportation around Aliquippa and neighboring communities. And he's not done yet. His home in Aliquippa parallels the laboratory of a mad professor. There are skeletons of old bikes scattered everywhere — frames, wheels, handlebars — occupying every available nook. Magazines and brochures on the subject lie scattered around, opened to the page that had his attention before he returned to the hands-on work. And there is the fruit of his labors. Kochanowski owns six recumbent vehicles, down from the 17 that he had at one time. "There are two different types, recumbent and semirecumbent bikes. It's determined by the position of the driver, whether he is almost completely reclined or in a partially sitting position," he said. "I keep building them, improving them, making them better. I can't believe more people aren't interested in them." The 26-year-old Aliquippa native began building souped-up bikes in 1981, after going to a bike show in Cleveland. "I needed plans the first time. Now, I don't use them," he said. His interest stems from his childhood days and his tricycles. His definition of tricycle today, however, is far from the tiny three-wheeled red bike most children remember. Kochanowski's tricycles have gears, a brake system that equals that of a truck and a steering system that "enables me to round corners with no problems."

Kochanowski practically lies in his vehicle, his line of vision falling just above the pedals. Gears for each hand stem from handlebars that look inverted and elongated. His latest model is enclosed with sheets of lightweight metal that, to date, make it his best. "My feet never get cold. That's a big plus. Enduring the elements is the hardest part about riding," said Kochanowski, who rides in all kinds of weather. He has traveled to nearby towns as easily as if in a car. In fact, he doesn't own a car, and has mastered running errands and making short trips in his HPV. Around town, most people have gotten used to seeing the helmeted, goggled, bundled-up man driving on the streets. There's always someone who hasn't, though, and the stares are followed by curious inquiries. Kochanowski tends to get on a soap box when allowed to discuss the merits of his mode of transportation. — It's less expensive than a car. In fact, his HPVs are made from scrap metal and discarded materials. — It's safer than a regular bike. If he crashes, he falls over because his body is about three feet off the ground. — It's easier on the body, more comfortable. "When I rode long distances on a conventional bike, my whole body would be tired. Now, after a drive into Pittsburgh, for example, only my legs are tired. The rest of me has been



practically lying down the whole way." — It's faster than a conventional bike. Kochanowski has gone about 37 mph in his vehicles. Although he's a die-hard devotee of HPVs and intends to keep building them, Kochanowski doubts if he will go into business and sell them to the public. There are still too many kinks he has to work out. "I could probably motorize it, but then I'd have trouble with the police and motor vehicle rules," he points out. Kochanowski obeys the rules of the road when traveling, although he says he does not always receive the same respect from drivers of cars.

## Top Model Says Classic Approach Brought Success

NEW YORK (AP) — She came from Africa a decade ago and rocketed to the pinnacle of modeling fame in Paris, Milan and New York until, to some fashion designers, a show is not a show without Iman. On the runway, she is a perennial favorite among top couture designers like Calvin Klein, Ralph Lauren, Oscar de la Renta, Bill Blass and Willie Smith, despite what she calls her "nightmare" of a body. Perhaps it is her smooth, honey brown skin that radiates confidence or the regal way she carries her pencil thin, 5-foot-7 frame. Or the way she pouts and smiles and swaggers and swirls. "I convince everybody that I look good in this and you better believe it," Iman says. She was born in Somalia in the Horn of Africa but moved frequently during her privileged childhood. "My father was a diplomat. My mother was a doctor. I was always in boarding schools," she said. Iman learned Russian in grade school in Mogadishu, because "the teachers were Russian so it was compulsory." She graduated from high school in Cairo, and added Arabic to her languages, which also include English, French and Italian. In 1976, Iman was working in Kenya's Ministry of Tourism in Nairobi, when Mirella Riccardi, author of "Vanishing Africa," introduced her to photographer Peter Beard, who took her picture and put in in his New York exhibition. Wilhelmina, owner of the modeling agency by the same name, saw Iman "and one thing led to another. It was not, 'Would she like to be a model?,' but 'We'll make her a model.'"

Armed with a return ticket she never used, she came to the United States, became a New Yorker and a citizen. Two years after her arrival, Iman Abdulmajid married pro basketball player Spencer Haywood in a Moslem ceremony, and six months later had a daughter, Zulekha, now 7. Haywood retired last year from the Washington Bullets after 15 years as a pro and keeps busy managing their investments and real estate. Iman, who will be 30 in July, has no plans to retire from the job that earns her about \$300,000 a year. She says she could easily go another five years because she has a classic approach to style. "I'm like a cashmere sweater," Iman says. "A black cashmere sweater. If you have one black cashmere sweater, you bet you'll have it for 15 years."

Iman's options are wide open. She's the star of a Germaine Jackson music video and has made an appearance on the Bill Cosby Show. A couple of years ago, she was in the movie "Exposed." Last month, she spent three weeks in Africa among the animals, posing — clothed — for a Playboy layout shot by Beard. She also took a bit part in the movie "Out of Africa," starring Meryl Streep and Robert Redford, which was being shot in Kenya. Iman is negotiating with Public Broadcasting Service to do an animated version of her compilation of African fairy tales. Originally she collected the stories as a children's book but ran into publishing snags because of distinctions between fairy tales and witchcraft. While Iman always is busy, she laments the difficulty that most black models have in getting work. She blames consumers.

# Cubans Find Spot In Conservative Florida Legislature

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — When Rudy Garcia sits in his high-backed, official House office chair overlooking the Florida Capitol grounds, he resembles a youngster who sneaked into his father's office at a lunch break for a moment in the seat of power.

His neatly pressed suit, authoritative presence and eloquence aside, Garcia is only 21, the youngest state legislator in over half a century.

"Ever since I was seven I've wanted to do things for my school, my community," said Garcia.

Hialeah, the son of Cuban immigrants. "I thought being in the Legislature was where I could contribute most."

Last year while Garcia's fellow students at the University of Miami went searching for beach parties, he combed Hialeah for votes and found himself the youngest elected representative in Florida since Fuller Warren, who was three months younger when he won a 1926 House race.

"I've been accepted overwhelmingly," said Garcia. "I walk down the halls and the speaker and the other members already know me by first name ... This seems totally natural to me. Politics just runs through my veins."

Garcia is more than a statistical anomaly. He also is one of seven recently elected Republican House members from Dade County who share Cuban backgrounds and a conservative political agenda in a state Legislature that is dominated by white Democrats.

The group includes two men in their 20s, two women, and two men who list among their career highlights fighting in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion attempt to overthrow Cuban President Fidel Castro.

They already have scored one legislative victory by successfully lobbying House Speaker James Harold Thompson to sidetrack a pair of bills that would make English the official state language.

"Miami must seem like a foreign country to a lot of the members," said Javier Souto, R-Miami. "Here in Tallahassee, many just don't realize the magnitude of our crime and the drug problem, and what it's like to be an immigrant."

Like others in the Cuban-American delegation, including Arnhilda Gonzalez-Quevedo, R-Coral Gables, and Alberto Gutman, R-

Miami, Souto was elected just last year in a heavily Cuban district. Roberto Casas of Hialeah and Ileana Ros of Miami were elected in 1982.

Suoto, along with Luis Morse, R-Miami, says he was a veteran of the ill-fated Bay of Pigs mission. That fervent anti-communist sentiment goes a long way toward explaining the Cubans' fierce loyalty to President Reagan and the Republican Party, Suoto said.

"The Cubans are very conservative and the Republican party makes sense to them," said Havana-born Gutman, 26. "They

vote and they know their legislators at every level. They take their politics seriously because they've been in Cuba where they didn't have those rights."

Mike Zotti, spokesman for the Republican Party of Florida, said Cuban-Americans will be more influential in coming years.

"A lot of the recent immigrants aren't yet citizens and they can't vote," Zotti said. "As they continue to move throughout the state and register they will be a factor most everywhere south of Orlando in a few years."

# Texas Town Split Over Question Of New Home For Retarded Adults

CLEBURNE, Texas (AP) — "It hurts knowing the people in my hometown don't want me living there," Kim Banks said, deliberating each word uttered in a rich Texas twang. "It hurts real bad."

Banks, 24, whose epilepsy has left him with learning disabilities, added, "I just don't understand why folks in Cleburne would want to keep people with just a little sort of handicap from learning to help themselves."

It is now up to the Supreme Court to decide whether officials in this attractive city 60 miles southwest of Dallas violated the rights of Banks and mildly or moderately retarded adults by denying a proposed group home a permit to operate.

The court's decision, expected by July, could reach beyond the nationwide "home movement" aimed at removing the mentally retarded from large institutions, and affect, for example, the voting and employment rights of such people.

The court is being asked to determine how closely state and federal courts must scrutinize any law treating the mentally retarded differently than other people.

But no matter how sweeping or narrow the court's eventual ruling, the fate of a big, turn-of-the-century house at 201 Featherston Street in this city of more than 20,000 hangs in the balance.

Jan Hannah bought the house in 1980 to use as a group home for 13 mildly or moderately retarded adults. But that use was classified by the city as a "hospital for the feeble-minded" requiring a special permit.

The vacant house sits in a neighborhood where apartment houses, public schools, nursing homes and most hospitals may locate without any special permits.

"We would not need such a permit for a hospital for the asthmatic or a nursing home for the feeble-minded. But classifying the group home as a hospital for the feeble-minded made the permit necessary," said Bobbie Northrop, who, with Mrs. Hannah, operates a group house in nearby Keene.

No complete public record exists of the Cleburne Planning and Zoning Commission's 1980 meeting at which Mrs. Hannah's request for a special permit was discussed. But according to those present, it was stormy.

An account was published in the local newspaper, the Cleburne Times-Review. The report said Mrs.

The Supreme Court is hearing arguments in a dispute over the authority of communities to ban group homes for mentally retarded people from some neighborhoods. The case has the potential to alter significantly the legal rights of the nation's mentally retarded. But its impact on a small Texas city already has been felt.

Cash Zimmerman, a neighbor of the 201 Featherston house, told the commission. "I'm a coward. It's not a very pleasant thought to go to bed and know there's 13 demented, self-afflicted people across the street from you."

Dr. Larry Willis, a dentist whose office is close to the house, presented a petition signed by 29 families opposed to locating a group home there.

The Cleburne City Council, at a later meeting in which public comment was limited, denied the special permit. Council members cited concern over 13 people living in a home with only two bathrooms, with three and four residents in each bedroom.

The council also voiced concern over the heavy traffic generated by a junior high school just across Featherston Street, and noted that the property could be flooded by waters of nearby Buffalo Creek once every 500 years.

Earl Luna, the lawyer representing Cleburne in the Supreme Court, believes the city council had the best interests of the mentally retarded at heart when it denied the permit.

"Jan Hannah wanted to stack them in those rooms like cord wood," Luna told a recent visitor to his downtown Dallas office. "Our folks said that's not normal. The city council went about preventing her from putting people in such a ghetto-like existence."

Luna said Mrs. Hannah and Mrs. Northrop have let their profit motive blind them to what is best for the people they seek to help.

The two women are co-owners of Community Living Concepts, a for-profit corporation that owns the Featherston Street house and group homes in the nearby communities of Keene, Rio Vista and Burleson.

Their "clients" — Mrs. Hannah said "residents" is a state institution term and that "patients" is an unacceptable term because "they are not ill" — pay to live in the group homes under a Medicaid program chiefly funded by the state and federal governments.

Clients share chores, aided by Community Living Concepts staff members, and most put in full work days at a sheltered workshop in Keene.

the Cleburne Times-Review, thinks fear of the unknown may have been the real reason.

"The City Council has a very good reason for its opposition — the size of the house," he said in an interview. But he added: "The rationale began forming after the emotional reactions."

Bodine's newspaper was inundated with angry letters after nationally televised reports of the Cleburne controversy featured opponents' unkind comments about the mentally retarded.

The letters, some published over three pages of one day's edition, overwhelmingly supported allowing the group home to locate in Cleburne.

"I'm so embarrassed to say that I'm from Cleburne when asked," wrote Betty Blalock. "They are people, not just mentally retarded. They deserve a decent environment to live in."

Coy Sims said, "Cleburne is one of the finest places in the world to live but the Supreme Court (case) is revealing our prejudice."

Banks, who left his father's home in Keene as a first step toward independence, was surprised by the permit denial. "I don't think that's one bit like my hometown," he said.

If 201 Featherston ever becomes a group home, Banks said he would consider leaving his budding lawn-mowing business in Keene and moving to Cleburne if similar work could be found here.

"This business is making people know I'm dependable," Banks said. "The people in Keene are good people. They give you a chance," he said. "But I don't know half the people in Keene that I know in Cleburne."

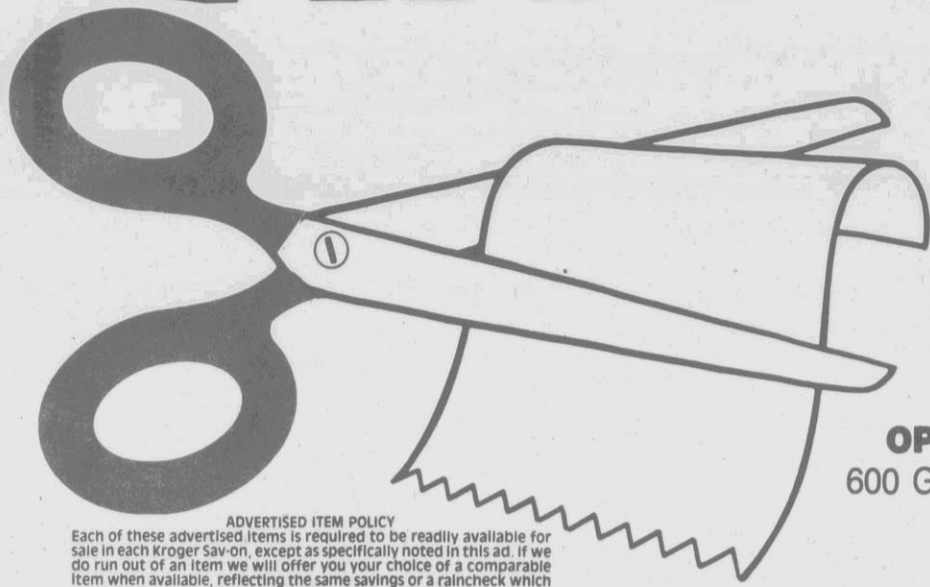

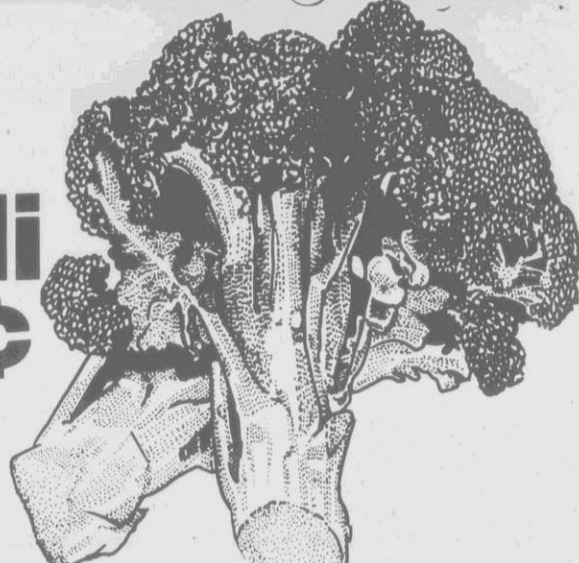

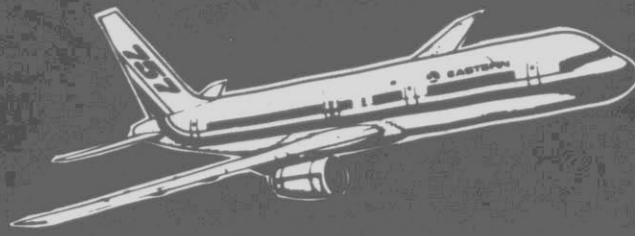

# Synthetic Liquid Fuels Get Tests

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — If oil prices ever skyrocket again, synthetic liquid fuels could fill the gap without dependence on foreign sources, the Mississippi Power Co. believes.

The utility has been testing the synthetic fuel at its Sweatt electric generating plant near Meridian.

Harry Bell, the firm's vice president for bulk power resources, said the tests show the fuel could replace oil as an energy source with a minimum of delay. Changes in the plants would be very minor, and he said bulk production of the fuel could begin within a few years.

"It would be a relatively simple and inexpensive job to modify oil-fired furnaces to synthetic fuel," Bell said.

However, right now, the synthetic fuel is far more expensive than oil. He said current prices for oil were about \$28 a barrel, while the synthetic fuel would run an estimated \$45. However, he pointed out that prices could drop if the fuel went into large scale production. Now, it has been produced only on a laboratory scale.

Six different coal-derived liquid fuels were involved in the tests, which covered such points as handling, burning performance and air pollution emissions.

Bell said that the fuels met all environmental standards, were superior to other liquid fuels and burned more efficiently than the fuel oil ordinarily used at the plant.

The test was sponsored by Mississippi Power, Southern Company Services and the Electric Power Research Institute.

The institute provided the 27,700 barrels of fuel used in the three-month test.

Bell said that since the test, the plant has burned natural residual oils in the converted furnaces with no problem at all.

"All we had to do was disconnect a few pipes and reconnect the normal fuel pipes," he said.

There are no plans for further tests on the synthetic fuel, he said, although the utility would be in a position to experiment if there should be significant new developments.

He said that although Mississippi Power was pleased with the tests, and sees the synthetic fuel as a good source of energy in a time of emergency, the utility plans to rely heavily on coal-fired furnaces.

"We see coal the inexpensive fuel now and in the future, along with nuclear power," Bell said.

The parent Southern Co. operates four nuclear plants, two in Alabama and two in Georgia, but Bell said there were no plans for a nuclear plant in Mississippi at any time in the near future.

"We have adequate sites for coal burning facilities, and the next thing we build probably will be a coal burner," he said.

## Civil War Sites Attract Tourists

MURFREESBORO, Tenn. (AP) — Some authorities thought the nation's fascination with the bloodiest war fought on American soil would wane after the Civil War Centennial in the 1960s.

But today, more than a century after a war that nearly tore a nation apart, the conflict remains one of the world's most popular historical topics and is even bringing a tidy profit to businesses capitalizing on the intrigue.

The memory of the three-day battle where Union forces began bisecting the Confederacy toward Atlanta and Savannah, Ga., is enshrined at Stones River National Battlefield at Murfreesboro, one of 27 National Park Service sites — from Pennsylvania to Georgia — maintained as Civil War monuments and visited by more than 11.4 million people last year.

"The Civil War is one of our most popular topics," said Donald Kloster, associate curator at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

"Even during the Bicentennial of the American Revolution, we got more inquiries about the Civil War than the revolution. And we get 15 to 20 times more inquiries about the Civil War now than we did when I came to the Smithsonian in 1960."

Authorities say the South — where most of the brutal contest was fought — doesn't have a monopoly on Civil War interest. Groups from California to England have been formed to seek a better understanding of the conflict, which most historians agree was rooted in the issue of slavery.

Thousands of people have joined groups that suit up in blue and gray uniforms and re-enact battle scenes. The weekend hobby has turned into a lucrative business for suppliers of weapons and clothes from the Civil War era.

There are more than 100 Civil War Round Tables — including groups in Belgium, France and Australia — where amateur historians study and discuss the war.

The Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic has 2,000 members who are descendants of Union veterans. The North-South Skirmish Association, with about 3,300 members, holds shooting contests.

# Peanuts Will Fuel Power Plant In Alabama City

DOTHAN, Ala. (AP) — Many of the lights and appliances in this southeastern Alabama city soon will be operating on peanut power.

The Dothan Oil Mill Co., the nation's largest independent peanut sheller with plants in Alabama, Georgia and Florida, will build a \$6 million plant in Dothan to generate electricity from peanut hulls.

Bob Jones, DOMCO's vice president, said the new plant, scheduled to begin commercial operation in February 1986, will have a total capacity of 6,250 kilowatts. Five thousand kilowatts will be sold to the city and the remainder will be used at the plant.

"It will handle in excess of 50,000 tons of hulls in a year," said Jones, explaining that hull disposal has been an age-old and costly problem for the company, which has been giving them away or paying to have them burned.

DOMCO has purchased a wooded 20-acre tract in an industrial area north of Dothan on which to build its new plant. Its old oil mill in downtown Dothan eventually will be moved to the new site.

DOMCO's generating plant has been designed by an Oregon firm that specializes in boiler systems that can burn a variety of fuels, such as wood shavings, sawdust and, in one case, almond hulls. Jones said it would meet all existing emission standards.

The heart of the system, he said, will be an overhauled steam-powered turbine built in 1941 by Westinghouse that was used until about 10 years ago at the Kinston, N.C., municipal powerhouse.

"The cost of buying a used one like that and bringing it up is less than buying a new one," said Jones, who is the coordinator of the energy project.

The hulls will be stored in two silos and carried to the plant's furnaces

by a conveyor belt. Steam from the burning hulls will drive the turbine, while the combustion gasses pass through a collector and other filtering devices before going out a smokestack.

Jones noted that most of the nation's electricity in the 1920s and 1930s was produced at industrial sites like DOMCO's future plant.

Power companies eventually were able to make electricity cheaper and it wasn't until the 1970s, following the Arab oil embargo, that alternate sources were considered, he said.

A 1978 federal law requires utilities to purchase the excess capacity of small electrical producers, but many utilities already have excess capacity, making projects like DOMCO's impractical, Jones said.

After being turned down by two utilities, the company went to the city, and with help from the Chamber of Commerce and the

Industrial Development Board, was able to negotiate a deal to provide about 3 percent of the electrical needs for Dothan's 36,733 residents. "The way we got into it was in

looking for feasible uses for hulls," Jones said in an interview. "This type of operation meets our needs. If it's done properly we benefit and the city benefits."

**Dotson's Attorney To Seek New Trial**

CHICAGO (AP) — The attorney for Gary Dotson, convicted of a rape his alleged victim now insists never occurred, said Tuesday he would make another attempt to free his client by seeking a new trial.

Attorney Warren Lupel said he would file a petition for the new trial with Chief Cook County Criminal Judge Richard Fitzgerald. In that petition, Lupel is expected to cite the recanted testimony of Dotson's accuser, Cathleen Crowell Webb, and call into question the original trial testimony of a state forensic expert.

Dotson, meanwhile, remained at the Dixon Correctional Center, awaiting decisions by Gov. James Thompson and the Illinois Appellate Court that could also result in his freedom.

"It would, of course, be very nice if the governor pardoned Gary based

on his innocence and cleared his name totally so that could be the end of it," Lupel said Monday. "But if that doesn't happen, a new trial is the only answer."

On Friday, in asking the Illinois Appellate Court to set bond for Dotson, Lupel contended that the 1979 trial testimony from a forensics expert about semen found in Mrs. Webb's panties the night of the reported rape was misleading, suggesting a stronger identification of Dotson as her attacker than recent more accurate tests have shown.

The appeals court said it would rule on the bond issue Wednesday.

Thompson, who has been reviewing Dotson's petition for executive clemency, said he would decide today or early Wednesday whether to call a special meeting of the Illinois Prisoner Review Board.

# Controversy Rages In Texas Over Oil Clear As Water

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Oil and gas producers are feuding in the Texas Panhandle over "black gold" that is as clear as water and flows as cold as ice in the middle of the summer.

The independent operators who drill for it call the stuff "vaporized crude oil" or "casinghead gas," a natural by-product of oil drilling.

Lawyers for the major energy companies, who want to shut off the taps, refer to the independents as "refrigerator operators" and their product as "frozen gas," "albino oil" or "Panhandle light."

To the towns and school districts in the area, the issue is money, pure and simple. If the majors win their case, the money stops.

It comes down to this: If you call it gas, you can drill one well on 64 acres. If you call it oil, you can drill every 10 acres — or 64 wells in the same space as one gas well.

The controversy has wound its way to Washington where the federal government will be in the unlikely position of telling Texans what oil is.

An administrative law judge ruled that independent producers were violating natural gas price regulations, but the full Energy Commission must rule on the case.

There's an estimated \$27 billion worth of oil and gas beneath the Panhandle Oil and Gas Field, an area larger than Delaware. For Panhandle communities that rely on the revenue, it's vital that "white oil" be classified as oil and not as gas.

"Business is dead in Pampa, Texas," said Pampa lawyer David Martindale, who represents the 300-member Consolidated Royalty Owners Association.

"One-half the economy is based on

oil and gas, and 80 percent of that is independent operators. These people are afraid to spend — they're not buying cars, they're not doing anything. They're going to wait-and-see what happens," he said.

If the independents lose, Pampa Mayor Calvin Whatley said, "the economic impact would be quite severe from all appearances."

"Things like that snowball," the mayor said. "One merchant is hurt, then another and so on."

Tom Harkey, superintendent of the 500-student White Deer school district, said 48 percent of his tax base comes from independent oil producers caught up in the controversy.

The district has estimated it would

have to lay off four or five of its 49 teachers — "and possibly more" — if the independents lose, Harkey said. If they lose, the value of their property drops, and school property tax revenues drop too.

"It would have a tremendous impact on our district," he said. "You betcha, it sure would."

The Panhandle field is the only place in Texas where oil and gas rights are still sold separately. The Texas Railroad Commission, which controls the state's oil industry, issues drilling permits after deciding what is an oil well and what is a gas well.

Major energy companies control the natural gas wells in the area; they left the slow-producing oil wells

to independents. The independents, however, found a way to turn a vapor from the wells into a liquefied natural gas.

They call it "white oil."

The majors have gone to the Railroad Commission and to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission complaining that the independents are not producing oil at all, but are taking natural gas that belongs to the majors under the old long-term contracts.

In 1977, the commission's chief counsel ruled that "white oil" could count as oil if mixed with a small amount of crude.

In 1978, the Natural Gas Policy Act raised the price of gas produced from newly drilled oil wells.

The white oil boom was on. Independents installed refrigeration units to liquefy portions of the gas stream produced by the well.

In some cases, the vapor is cooled as low as 20 degrees below zero. A witness told the Railroad Commission of seeing a thick coating of ice on the equipment even on hot summer days.

Some independents call their product "casinghead gas," a natural by-product of oil drilling. Operators are allowed to produce up to 500,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas a day from an oil well.

In 1981, the Phillips Petroleum Co. and other majors asked the Railroad Commission to shut down the white oil boom. Three hearing examiners

denied that request but recommended that anything counted as crude oil must be liquid.

The white oil boom has made Panhandle landowners richer by vastly increasing the value of their oil leases. About three-fourths of the area's independent oil producers are farmers or former farmers.

"They're scared of the personal economic impact and scared for the economic community impact," Martindale said.

"For the first time, they've gotten royalties off liquids, and they've sold or leased their farms, borrowed money to buy houses, and all of a sudden it could be gone. These guys are scared. How are they going to make payments?"

## Furniture Exports Are 'Negligible'

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) — The American furniture industry is "a sleeping giant as far as exports are concerned," a U.S. Commerce Department trade specialist says.

"We're the furniture center of the world, but our exports are negligible compared to what we could do ... if we get these companies really moving on exports," said Fred Farmer of the department's Greensboro field office. "We've got to practice some smarts in international trade as well as domestic."

Farmer was manning the Commerce Department booth at the Southern Furniture Market in High Point, providing information and translation services to hundreds of buyers from foreign countries. The semiannual market, running through April 26, is considered the most important in the industry and attracts buyers from all 50 states and 60 foreign nations.

Exports of U.S.-made furniture amounted to \$434 million last year, down from \$510 million in 1981, according to the American Furniture Manufacturers Association. U.S. manufacturers produce about \$10 billion worth of furniture a year.

Meanwhile, furniture imports were up 37 percent last year to \$2.53 billion. Farmer said imports still are not the life-or-death problem they have become in the textile industry, which has blamed a surge in imports for hundreds of plant closings.

"But we've got to be sure of other countries' movements, otherwise we'll end up like the textile industry," he said. "That's been on the horizon for years."

Farmer said furniture imports into the United States may have peaked because the dollar is declining in value compared to other currencies, which makes U.S. goods relatively cheaper. But he said it's up to U.S. manufacturers to move aggressively to capture more of the overseas market.

"There's no quick fix," he said. "It's just as difficult as opening a new market in Virginia. You've got to spend money on research."

U.S. manufacturers find it easier to produce hundreds of thousands of the same items for domestic use than to study overseas demand and discover what specific items foreign customers need in smaller quantities, he said.

High-quality American furniture, especially unique items like decorative glass, will sell well overseas — and it costs the same to transport an expensive item as it does a cheap item, said Farmer.

"They've got to develop some new products, a new look," he said. "They're getting away from the old bulky items and looking more modern."

Farmer blamed half of the \$125 billion trade deficit on the strong dollar and half on the strength of the U.S. economy, which has led manufacturers to neglect overseas possibilities.

"We've got to keep our tentacles out for overseas contacts and always cultivate them, not just when things are bad in the United States," he said.

# 'Third World' Marks 30th Anniversary

BANDUNG, Indonesia (AP) — The seed that grew into what is commonly known as the non-aligned Third World movement was planted here 30 years ago this week.

The 29-nation Afro-Asian Conference and the "spirit of Bandung" it was said to have engendered in 1955 will be commemorated in a two-day ceremony in Bandung starting Wednesday.

The conference's Bandung Declaration called for the right of all nations to freely choose their governments, an end to colonial rule and no military alliances with the

two superpowers, the United States and the Soviet Union.

Another declaration is to be issued Wednesday, said Foreign Minister Mochtar Kusumaatmadja of Indonesia. Western diplomats expect it to urge a dialogue between the rich and poor nations of the world on economic matters and to appeal for curbs on the nuclear arms race.

The original meeting in this West Java capital was sponsored by India, Burma, Pakistan, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) and Indonesia. It paved the way for the 26-nation conference in 1961 in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, where the formal non-aligned, or Third World, movement

was launched. The outcome of the Belgrade conference came to overshadow the narrower concerns expressed at Bandung as fervor drained from the anti-colonial campaign with the granting of independence to many territories in Africa and Asia.

Indonesian officials said the Bandung conference brought together for the first time a number of pan-Asian and pan-African spokesmen who had been opposing colonialism for decades.

Bandung received much attention because it provided a major forum for some small-nation leaders at the height of the Cold War between Communist and Western powers.

Not all became full participating members of the non-aligned movement, however.

The Philippines, Thailand, Iran, Turkey and Pakistan were represented at Bandung, even though they belonged to Western military alliances. On the other hand, two leaders of the modern non-aligned movement, Yugoslavia and Cuba, were not represented in Bandung 30 years ago.

The participation in Bandung by China was at first opposed by Pakistan, one official said. Burma, a sponsor like Pakistan, said it would not come unless China was invited and Pakistan's objection was

withdrawn. Burma has decided not to attend this week's commemorations. Also missing will be representatives from Vietnam, Ethiopia and Botswana, according to Antara, the Indonesian news agency.

Invitations were sent to more than 70 countries, Foreign Minister Mochtar said.

Carlos Romulo, 86, the retired Philippines foreign minister, is the only one of the four surviving 1955 chief delegates expected to return. The others are Burma's U Nu, Premier Pham Van Dong of Vietnam and Cambodia's Prince Norodom Sihanouk, now head of a coalition trying to oust Vietnamese occupation forces from his country.

China's delegation is to be headed by Foreign Minister Wu Xueqian although diplomatic relations between China and Indonesia have been suspended since 1967. The freeze followed an abortive Communist coup attempt in Indonesia two years earlier which Indonesia claimed was supported by China.

Indonesia's President Suharto is to address the gathering as is Paul Lusaka of Zambia, chairman of the United Nations General Assembly.

The Indonesian government has allocated \$1.2 million for this week's observances.

Bandung, a somewhat seedy university city of three million, has been given a facelift for the occasion.

## Racism Issue Raised In France

PARIS (AP) — "Is France becoming racist?" headlined the news magazine Le Nouvel Observateur. "France, is it really racist?" asked the rival weekly Le Point.

The issue also has been raised in French political debate — as well in the violence of bombs and the more subtle undercurrents of society.

The foreign immigrant in France has become a focus of attention with the rise of unemployment and the economy far from healthy.

About 4.7 million immigrants live among France's 54.6 million people. Large numbers of them entered illegally but became legal residents under a special amnesty offered by President Francois Mitterrand's socialist government after 1981.

Many of them — most particularly 1.5 million legal Arab immigrants — have complained of job and housing discrimination for years.

And, in France where anti-Semitism is usually lumped in with racism, the March 30 bombing that wounded 18 people at a Jewish film festival in Paris added another bloody punctuation mark to what many French Jews have encountered since the Nazi occupation of World War II.

More recently, bombs went off before dawn April 13 outside the Israeli-owned Bank Leumi and the National Immigration Office in Paris. Damage was extensive in both places but there were no injuries.

The largest foreign colony in France is Portuguese, numbering about 860,000. They, along with 426,000 Italians and 380,000 Spaniards, are generally well accepted into the community.

The major butt of racism is the North African community, 777,000 Algerian and 520,000 Moroccan immigrants, and the 420,000 "harkis" — Algerians who fought for the French in the Algerian war, fled at independence in 1962 and now are French nationals.

The smaller groups of black, sub-Saharan Africans also come in for racist attacks, but the phenomenon is not one of straight-forward color. The North Africans are much lighter-skinned than the sub-Saharan Africans, but often distinctive by facial structure.

French blacks from the Caribbean and Indian Ocean seem to be generally integrated and less

objects of racial tension. There are many in the Paris police force, for example, but no official statistics are kept.

That the French establishment is now posing the question of racism and that mainstream politicians of all stripes are denouncing "the rise of racism" reflect the introduction of a new element in the social and political equation — the National Front.

The National Front is a political party on the extreme right headed by a 57-year-old former paratrooper, Jean-Marie Le Pen. After a decade on the political fringes, the party is now in a position to tip the balance in France's 1986 legislative elections.

Le Pen's talk of "France for the French" has the political establishment concerned over an awakening of xenophobia — a fear or hatred of foreigners.

Le Pen denies he is racist. He sues for libel — and wins — any time anyone accuses him of it.

"Listen," Le Pen said in a recent interview, "if there are racists in France that has nothing to do with me. I don't look inside people's heads. If there is a rise of racial tension in France, the National Front acts as a moderating force because we never appeal to hatred or violence."

Still, Le Pen has been denounced universally by the French left. The French right has tried to ignore him. Others, like Simone Veil, the Auschwitz concentration camp survivor and leading centrist politician, have gone on the attack.

France's Roman Catholic bishops, led by Cardinal Jean Marie Lustiger — a Jew who converted to Catholicism while hiding as a youth with a Christian family during World War II — have warned against the "rise of intolerance" represented by "certain political figures."

An estimated 500,000 badges denouncing racial hatred have been sold around the country by a year-old organization called SOS Racism.

Le Pen wants to send home the immigrants brought in legally as cheap labor during the boom years of the late 1960s. Many of those low-paid jobs no longer exist. Those that do, he says, should go to unemployed French people.

"If you hire a plumber to install your bathroom, when the job is over you pay him and he leaves. He's not supposed to show up one fine day with his wife and announce that they'll be

taking baths in your bathroom because he earned that right by installing it."

He was referring to the foreign labor that came during the 1960s and later were given legal status.

Le Pen wants to expel illegal immigrants outright.

"If you forget to lock your apartment door and you wake up the next morning and find that a family has moved in, you don't negotiate with them, you call the cops," he said in the interview.

Le Pen first gained attention during national municipal elections in 1982 when the French economy was stagnant.

Campaigning under the slogan, "Two million unemployed is two million immigrants too many," the National Front polled almost a million votes nationwide and Le Pen won a district council seat in Paris' immigrant-saturated 20th arrondissement.

Commented the magazine l'Evenement: "How can you deny the racist import of such a statement when you only have to take one more step and say: '700,000 Jews (the French Jewish population); 700,000 unemployed. The solution is simple.'"

Unemployment in France is now close to 2.5 million, and Le Pen's party won 11 percent of the vote in the elections for the European Parliament last summer and 8 percent in the first round of March's regional elections.

In a country where the balance of power between left and right has traditionally been determined by a percentage point or two, Le Pen is now a force for other political groups to be dealt with.

"If the traditional right is unable to form a parliamentary majority (after the 1986 elections) without the National Front," Le Pen said, "then obviously we will make a number of demands to liberate the economy, limit immigration and restore the principles of law and order."

There are indications, however, that many people in France hope Le Pen will fade away, as did his one-time political mentor Pierre Poujade. In 1955, Poujade, a shopkeeper turned politician, polled 2.6 million votes and led 53 "Poujadists" — including the 27-year-old Le Pen — into the National Assembly in Paris.

## Ex-Viet General Supports Garwood

JACKSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Robert Garwood, a former Marine convicted of collaborating with North Vietnam, was a prisoner of the communist regime, not a deserter, an ex-South Vietnamese general said in a recent letter to President Reagan.

"As an eyewitness, I feel an obligation to support the fact that Mr. Garwood was not a deserter, but was a prisoner of the Hanoi regime," said the letter from Lt. Gen. Lam Van Phat. He said he learned in April that Garwood had been convicted in 1981 of desertion and collaboration.

"The judgment of the U.S. court could affect other MIAs and U.S. prisoners in Vietnam who have sacrificed everything to fight against the communists," Phat wrote. "I am available anytime to testify for Mr. Garwood. I have all the details to prove Mr. Garwood's innocence."

In the letter, released by former

Special Forces soldier Ted L. Sampley to the Jacksonville Daily News. Phat said Garwood was held "under communist guard day and night" from 1976 to 1978.

Phat said in the letter he was imprisoned by the communist regime for more than seven years before escaping on May 25, 1984. He said from June 1976 to October 1978 he and 31 other South Vietnamese generals at a camp near the North Vietnamese city of Yen Bai saw an American prisoner in charge of an electrical power supply station on a tea plantation.

"On April 2, 1985, to my surprise, I met the above American prisoner in the office of Congressman Bill Hendon from western North Carolina and then found out at that time his name is Bob Garwood," Phat said in the letter.

Garwood, living in the Washington, D.C., area while his conviction is being appealed, could not be reached for comment on the letter.

# Haste, Training May Leave Breast Cancer Undetected

CHICAGO (AP) — More than half the lumps that signal the start of breast cancer — the leading malignant killer of American women — may escape doctors' detection during routine exams because of inadequate training or haste, a researcher says.

Eighty physicians who were tested to see if they could find hidden lumps in silicone breast models actually located only 44 percent of the lumps, doctors reported in today's Journal of the American Medical Association.

"If anything, this finding may overestimate physicians' ability to find lumps," said one of the researchers, Dr. Suzanne W. Fletcher of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She added that doctors commented they found it easier to locate lumps in the models than in patients.

Time spent was one of the most

important factors in effectiveness, with longer exams resulting in more lumps found, the researchers said. But "few exams done suggest physicians spent enough time," the study said.

That was despite the fact the physicians knew they were being tested and tended to approach the exams "very carefully and seriously and may have searched more thoroughly than during a routine physical examination."

Time of exams ranged from 42 seconds to three minutes, 42 seconds, with a mean time under two minutes, researchers said.

Still, doctors apparently are better at detecting lumps than are women performing self-examinations, Ms. Fletcher said in telephone interview.

A study in England indicated women doing self-examinations failed to discover lumps until they had reached an average size of about 1 inch, she said. The largest

lumps in this study were less than half that big, and some were as small as 0.1 inch.

"The whole reason for screening for breast cancer is to find the lump when it's small," Ms. Fletcher said. A woman's chance for surviving five to 10 years after detection of a malignant lump decreases with the increasing size of the lump, she said.

One of 11 women gets breast cancer. It will strike about 119,000 women this year and kill more than

38,000.

"Probably a nice, careful, thorough exam that is not hurried is one of the best things that can be done," Ms. Fletcher said. "That's nice. That's possible. It doesn't require high-tech or anything."

A recent study of routine exams found "the average length of time for a complete clinical breast examination was 1.8 minutes, including examination of both breasts and counseling on breast self-

examination," the researchers said.

Quality of training was cited as an important factor, Ms. Fletcher said.

"A third of the physicians we tested thought their training was inadequate," she said. "The vast majority thought they could improve their technique."

In the study, general internists were best at finding lumps, followed by family practitioners, general surgeons and obstetric-gynecologists.

# PBS 'Heroes' Offers View Of Custer, Thomas Eakins

NEW YORK (AP) — Lt. Gen. George Armstrong Custer sparked the American imagination far more than painter Thomas Eakins did in the 19th century, and in a documentary to be shown tonight, Custer wins again.

"Heroes and the Test of Time," a "Smithsonian World" broadcast on public television, tackles the difficult task of telling about two men of another age. Custer, far more famous and connected to an exciting and mysterious frontier battle, makes for the more engaging story.

The segment on Eakins (pronounced "A-kins") calls him one of America's greatest painters and says one of his works, "The Gross Clinic," is widely considered "the greatest American painting ever."

A realist in an era of romanticism, Eakins endured hostility and indifference from critics throughout his career. He focused on heroism in

unexpected places, in the mind and spirit, painting such subjects as a chemistry professor and an anthropologist living with Indians. His commitment to realism was such that even in commissioned portraits, he refused to improve on the subject's appearance.

His ideals cost him deeply. In more than 40 years of painting, he sold only 20 works. "The Gross Clinic," with its grisly details of surgery, shocked his contemporaries. It sold for \$200.

Now it's worth millions. The documentary says Eakins' work was rediscovered only a few years after he died in 1916 at age 75. His impact on American art remains, especially among realist painters.

Was he a hero? Clearly he kept his ideals at great cost. But what makes Eakins greater than other American painters? What makes "The Gross Clinic" the greatest painting? The documentary's evidence just isn't convincing.

As a result, Eakins' name probably won't stick with us after the show.

Custer, on the other hand, was a figure whose reputation continued to inflate upon his death in 1876. Already a Civil War hero, Custer was portrayed as the man who faced savage foes and overwhelming odds at the Little Big Horn.

Poems, dime novels and artists picked up the beat. Buffalo Bill Cody even gave his Wild West show a scene called "First Scalp for Custer," in which Cody killed and scalped an Indian. Movies in the early 20th century kept the myth alive.

Custer, however, was a blemished hero. He was moody and reckless, and he made a fatal tactical error in dividing his troops before attacking the massive Indian encampment. From the 1930s on, Custer's reputation suffered, partly from a new appreciation of Indian culture. In the

movie "Little Big Man," he was portrayed as a lunatic.

Early in tonight's Custer segment, the documentary poses key questions about the legend: What happened in the final minutes at the Last Stand? Did some of Custer's men commit suicide? Were they outgunned? What kind of a man was Custer?

The show focuses on the battle more than Custer, capitalizing on last summer's archaeological dig at the battleground. More than 2,000 artifacts of the battle were found and mapped, allowing archaeologists to piece together a theory about the final minutes of Custer's last battle.

That theory is well illustrated in the segment, which does a good job of portraying the Last Stand story. The camera flies over the Montana battleground, emphasizing the rolling terrain. At one point, while describing a cavalry charge into the trees of a valley, the camera makes the trip at full tilt.

Part of the battle story is told by descendants of Indians who were there, which makes the historical event closer and more human. One Indian talks by the light of a campfire, which is a little too melodramatic, but another speaks while walking through the battlefield, a much better setting.

The documentary concludes that while the new archaeological evidence tells a few things about the battle, other questions about that day — and certainly about Custer himself — must be left to the imagination.

Perhaps that's where they belong. "We create our own heroes," says host David McCullough. "They exist only in our eyes."

## Former CIA Agent William F. Buckley Jr.

# 'Firing Line' Host Is Also Author Of Novels Dealing With Superspy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — William F. Buckley Jr. sat on a couch in his hotel suite and tinkered with the portable computer on the coffee table.

He was having trouble getting the printer to print the speech he was writing. The night before, he had written his newspaper column and sent it electronically to his syndicate by telephone.

Buckley, a conservative writer, is the host of PBS' "Firing Line," the founder and editor of the National Review, and author — he has just written

another spy novel, "See You Later Alligator." A Yale graduate, he served briefly in the CIA. This summer he will sail from Honolulu to Rabaul on the southwestern Pacific island of New Britain.

Buckley is the Renaissance Man of the Right. After much button pushing, he got the computer's printer to work. It spewed out a copy of his speech.

"Firing Line," which celebrated its 19th year on April 6, is the sixth oldest television program in the country. It began as a syndicated show but is now produced by the Southern Education Communications Association of Columbia, S.C., for public television.

"Doing 'Firing Line' wasn't my idea," said Buckley, holding a pen in his hand. He seldom talks without either a pen or pencil in his hand.

"I thought the show might last 13 weeks. Then it kept getting renewed. My goal with the show was to give a human being an entire hour in which to ventilate his position. Then people will know a hundred times more about him than they would learn on '60 Minutes.'"

Buckley's trademark is his distinctive, and often mimicked, Eastern accent and the precise way he selects words that would stump a lexicographer.

"See You Later Alligator," from Doubleday, is Buckley's sixth novel about intrepid superspy Blackford Oakes. There have also been a number of collections of his columns and essays, and he has rhapsodized about his passion for sailing in two books and is at work on a third.

"I'd never written fiction before when I was invited to lunch by the editor of Doubleday," he said. "I should have smelled ambush: he was too glib. He asked me what fiction I'd read recently. I said 'Day of the Jackal.'"

"The next day I got a contract for a novel. Watergate had just happened. So I said I'd write 100 pages. They could then abort or they could accept it and we would go all the way. To me, giving a publisher approval of the manuscript gives them all the cards."

He said when he created his hero he deliberately went against the trend. "At that time a hero had to be unattractive, an alcoholic, cuckolded, and he worried about who was right, them or us," he said.

"So I made him as handsome as Billy Budd, but with a sense of humor. I made him a big, perfect human being who is unequivocally on the side of the West."

Buckley denies that he's an intellectual James Bond. He is also not his alter ego. "I put him in Yale, which was laziness so I wouldn't have to learn the topography of a new college," he said. "But he is different. He's a scientist, a Protestant, a career CIA agent. I was in the CIA for only nine months. I was always headed in the direction of being a writer."

"In the CIA I was a deep cover agent. And as a deep cover agent you learn less about the CIA than anybody else. I only knew a few people. But I took a lot of training, so I was able to cite a lot of that training."

## 'Police' Holds Top Spot At Box Office

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Police Academy 2" grossed \$4 million over the weekend to hold onto the top spot among the leading box office moneymakers.

The Warner Bros. film boosted its four-week total gross to \$37.9 million while playing on 1,613 screens.

Debuting at No. 2 with a gross of \$3.5 million was "Moving Violations," the traffic school comedy from 20th Century Fox.

Warner Bros. "Ladyhawke" moved up a notch in its second week of release, taking third on \$3.1 million to increase its total to \$7.6 million.

In its seventh week, "Mask," the Universal movie starring Cher,

dropped from second place to fourth with a gross of \$2.8 million. Its total reached \$29.8 million.

"Desperately Seeking Susan," which also stars a pop singer, Madonna, followed in fifth place with \$2.7 million for a four-week total of \$11.2 million.

"The Company of Wolves," a Cannon release, opened in sixth place with a gross of \$2.2 million.

Don't ever believe that a contract can't be defeated. Accurate defense can work wonders.

We like North's decision to raise to two spades at his second turn rather than rebid his diamonds. If there is game in the hand, it is more likely to be in the major suit than the minor. And should South have responded on a four-card suit, he must allow for the possibility of a raise with only three-card support during the rest of the auction. South's spade rebid confirmed a five-card or longer suit, and North had no hesitation in accepting his partner's game invitation.

West got his side off to an excellent start when he chose to attack with a heart rather than a club. Declarer played low from dummy, East won the king and took some time to study the situation. It seemed probable that his partner had a trump trick and that, together with the ace of diamonds, would complete the defensive book. Where was the setting trick going to come from?

A club trick was doubtful, especially since declarer surely had either the king or queen in the suit. A third red-suit trick was impossible. That left only the possibility of developing a second trump trick. The one distribution where that might be feasible was if diamonds were 2-2 and West held two spade honors.

At trick two East shifted to a low diamond. Declarer won in dummy and immediately led a trump to his jack and West's ace. West returned a diamond and a pretty defense reaped its just reward. East won the ace and returned his last diamond. Whether declarer ruffed high or low made no difference. West's ten of trumps was promoted to the setting trick.

### Tiny Tower Tops Town

LAKE PLACID, Fla. (AP) — France has its Eiffel Tower, Italy boasts the Leaning Tower of Pisa, England has the Tower of London and Canada is home for the CN Tower, the world's tallest.

But residents of this quiet central Florida town, the caladium capital of the world, are more impressed with their own tower, a 240-foot-high structure that unexpectedly looms into view as one travels north on U.S. 27.

Called Placid Tower when it was built in 1960 and opened to the public Jan. 1, 1961, the structure was made from an estimated 90,000 cream-colored cement blocks trucked from Texas.

Set in a mini shopping mall 150 feet off the east side of the highway between a couple of the area's rolling hills, the observation tower was closed for about three years until it was purchased last November by Dr. George W. Ibrahim and his wife, Jean.

The couple have reopened the tower and renovated the ground level with small shops that cater to tourists as well as local residents.

Mrs. Ibrahim says one of the reasons they bought the property was so the tower could be reopened as a gesture of their thanks to the community they became a part of seven years ago.

"I love the people here," says Mrs. Ibrahim, a British-born nurse. "The pioneer people around Lake Placid are very sincere. I want to promote Lake Placid."

Considered one of the tallest concrete block structures in the state, it measures 25 feet square at the base where the outside walls are three concrete blocks thick.

A single automatic elevator carries visitors to the observation deck 195 feet above the ground. There, one can walk around the four sides of the tower and enjoy an unobstructed panoramic view that, on a clear day, allows one to see up to 40 miles in each direction. A second observation level, reachable only by a narrow stairway, is at the 225-foot level and the peak is measured at 240 feet. For safety reasons, the upper level is closed to the public.
